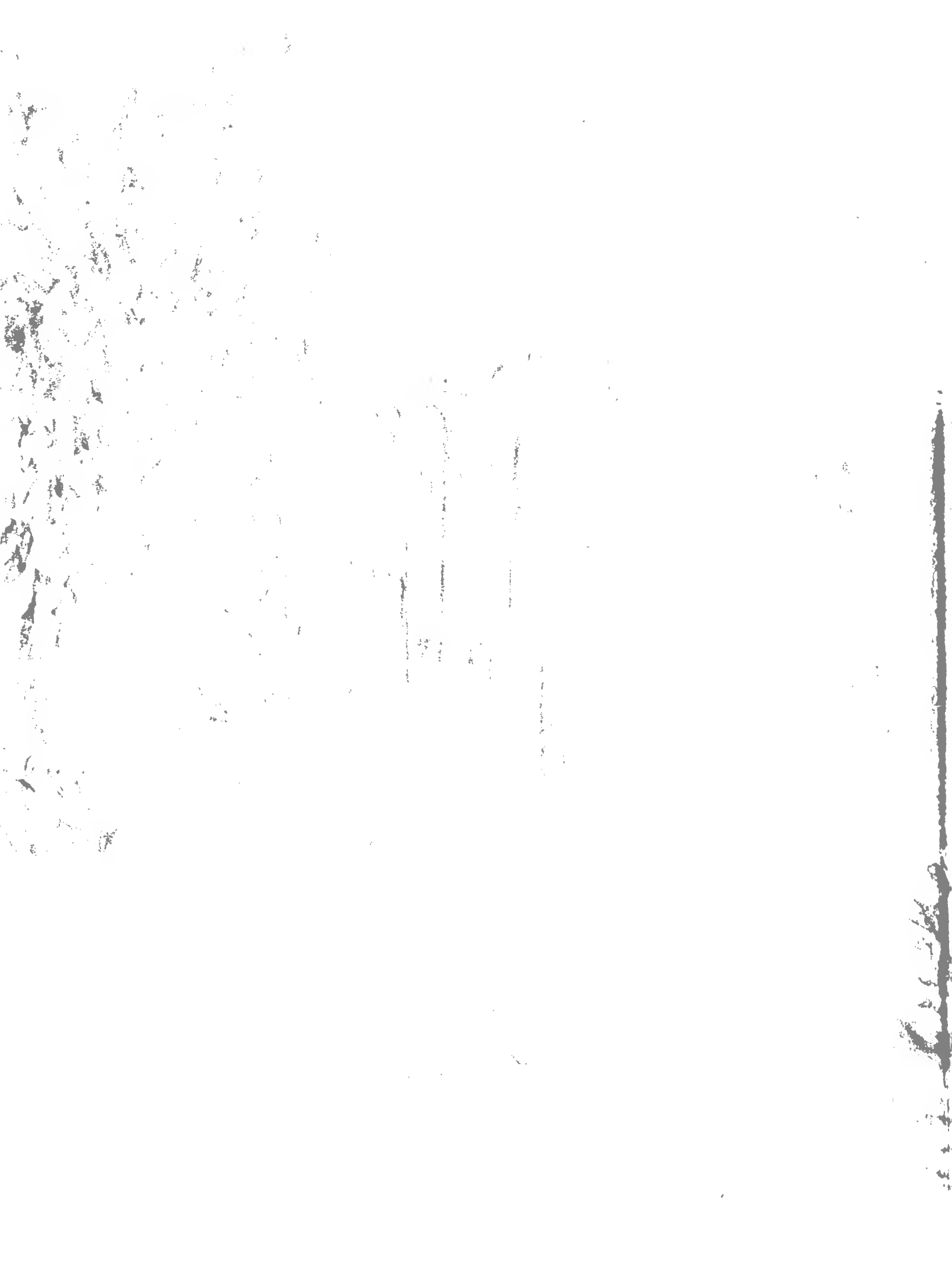

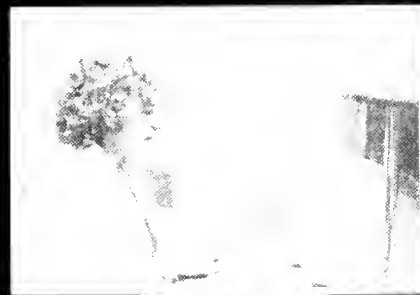

# 1960's . . .

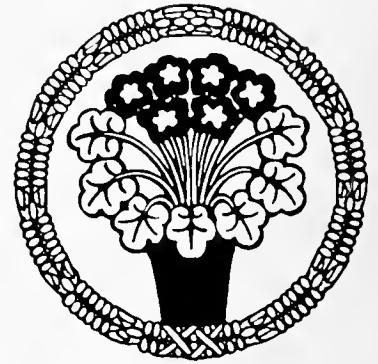
## 1960's

In the early 60's there was among the students, those forerunners of where the action is, the great social and political involvement as the students strove to bring about racial equality, peace through anti-war demonstrations and the right to life protest . . . . .

The music, styles of hair, clothing, dancing, singing, theatre, painting and sculpture of this decade show a violent rebellion against the static "Clear and Distinct" Cartesian forms. (There must be more to life than what suburbia was so busily striving to possess.) The world had based its dreams of happiness on science and reason, put it all into neat boxes and labeled it, but it had forgotten the most important element, human love. In his encyclical "Christianity and Social Progress", Pope John XXIII, pointed out the development of Christian social doctrine in modern times and its attempt to meet the challenge of our changing times. "The world is in dynamic change and the Church must make the Christ present in this society". Pope John met the challenge and projected the Church dramatically into the society which had rejected it in the Reformation and the French Revolution; he projected it into the societies of the newly forming worlds which many times, know not the Christ; he projected it so that we can apply it in the American society in which we live. 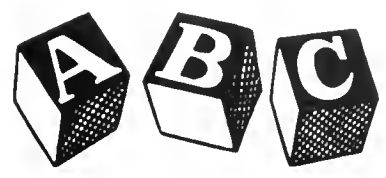

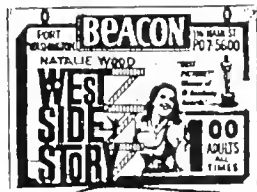
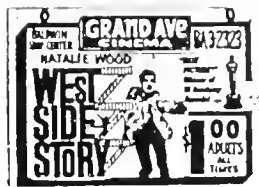

## 1960's

In August 1963, some 200,000 persons marched on Washington to demonstrate for civil rights. The following will be remembered.

"I HAVE A DREAM THAT ONE DAY THIS NATION WILL RISE UP, LIVE OUT THE TRUE MEANING OF IT'S CREED: "WE HOLD THESE TRUTH'S TO BE SELF-EVIDENT, THAT ALL MEN, ARE CREATED EQUAL". I HAVE A DREAM THAT ONE DAY EVEN THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI, A STATE SWELTERING WITH THE HEAT OF INJUSTICE . . . . . WILL BE TRANSFORMED INTO AN OASIS OF FREEDOM AND JUSTICE. I HAVE A DREAM THAT MY FOUR CHILDREN WILL ONE DAY LIVE IN A NATION WHERE THEY WILL NOT BE JUDGED BY THE COLOR OF THEIR SKIN, BUT BY THE CONTENT OF THEIR CHARACTER."

A Southeast Asian country formed in 1954 once a French colony of Indochina caused Americans through out the 1960's, to be divided over a war in which victory seemed unattainable. 16,000 military "Adviser's" were sent to South Vietnam in 1962. By 1966 there was 375,000 United States armed forces in Vietnam.

June 8, 1969, President Richard Nixon announced the withdrawal of 25,000 U.S. Troops out of Vietnam, and pledged to pull out 235,000 more by mid-1971.

NBC-TV'S David Brinkley and Chet Huntley were the decade's top team of newscasters. Their weekly night show usually began in New York, where Huntley opened the program, while in Washington Brinkley came in via monitor.

SNOOPY was the hero of Charles Schults's comic strip "Peanuts".

APOLLO 11, blasted off for the moon at 9:32 E.D.T. on July 16, 1969, the mission was exactly 102 hours and 46 minutes old, when astronaut Neil Armstrong the command pilot aboard the luna module radioed earth, "The Eagle has Landed".

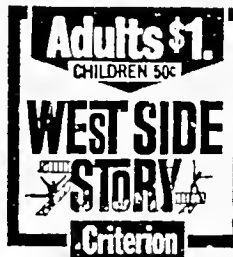

## 1970's

The 70's will be noted by the rise in anxieties and stresses in daily living. Before a world torn by violence and great oppressive injustices, by hunger and crime some students are beginning to ask themselves just what does it mean to be a Christian. 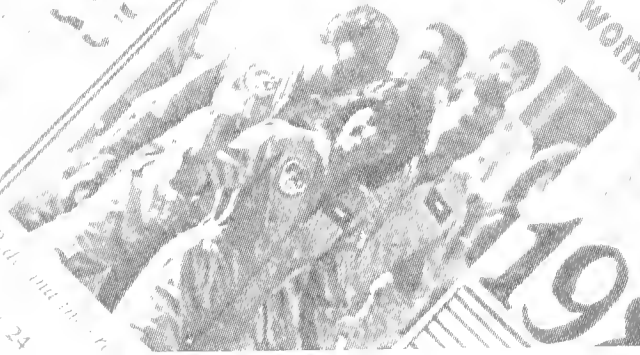

In the morning, President Reagan sailed the USS Iowa, surveying 20 warships from the U.S. and 21 from other nations. Tall ships sauntered alongside stodgier craft. Overhead, jet fighters from France performed exuberant aerobatics.

At lunchtime, Reagan met with French President Francois Mitterrand, ostensibly to discuss arms control. But how could an American president refuse to meet a French leader today? If France had not kindly delivered the bronze statue 100 years ago, there would be no excuse for the present festivities.

After months of refurbishing, Liberty reopened to visitors. Her first guest was, ironically or rightfully, no American but an English tourist. The line for the statue was incredibly long, and the heat (it was in the 90's) unbearable, but a visit paid on the 5th of July was an unspeakable, mortifying idea.

Miss Liberty, facelift finished, is showered in fireworks on her 100th birthday.

CLARE ROSE PLAYERS BRING BACK PART II OF INTERNATIONAL EXCHANGE PROGRAM

Members of the cast of GODSPELL are working hard at the St. Joseph's College Clare Rose Playhouse, preparing for the second half of an international exchange program.

In July, performers, technicians and behind-the-scene personnel will travel to Italy under the auspices of "Due Case --- Una Tradizione," the New York State International Partnership Program Instituted by Governor Mario Cuomo. In March, a group of performers from Italy performed "Il Drago Nella Fumana" ("The Dragon in the Fog") at the College.

The late John-Michael Tebelak conceived GODSPELL as his master's thesis at Carnegie-Mellon University in 1971. He read a book called A Feast of Fools by a theologian named Harvey Cox. In the book, Christ and his followers were depicted as harlequins. However, the book was not irreverent, as the figure of Christ as a clown augured hope and joy. John-Michael felt that he had the basis for a gospel musical with a circus ambience, and judging from the success of GODSPELL on Broadway and in regional theatres, he was right.

The show was also a big hit during its TWO runs at the Clare Rose Playhouse. Some cast members enjoyed their roles so much, that they are returning a third time for GODSPELL. Under the direction of John Bonavita of Babylon, a veteran Clare Rose Stage performer, the Clare Rose Players are restructuring and updating the classical 70s musical for its trip overseas. Cast members are bringing their own interpretation, choreography and costume ideas to their roles for a bright, upbeat, soft-rock performance. Everyone plays numerous roles, assuming characters and lines in the parables told by Jesus to illustrate his moral lessons. The atmosphere is wild and wacky, with an underlying touch of realism. Members of the Rose Road Show work well together for a show that is as entertaining as it is morally educating.

# HISTORICAL NOTES ON THE "LA BARACCA" COMPANY

"La Baracca" is created as a theatre collective for children in 1970, having discerned an extremely stimulating dialectical referent in children, and identified the theatre as an optimal instrument of communication due to its completeness and versatility. In 1978 the Company takes on a professional capacity for the first time, and in 1979 moves on to the more complete structure of a cooperative.

Our activity in the production of children's plays is characterized by the originality of the texts proposed and by the prevalent use of the actor technique: not an academic actor, but one who is expressive and real even in surreal situations; who uses language which is simple and current, but not simplified and infantile in the adult sense of "infantility"; who intervenes, transforms, and reassembles the stage space, his body, and everyday objects in such a way that they become dynamic, and not merely descriptive.

As Puppet Theatre is the "first love" of the Company ("Cappuccetto Rosso", "Perche Burattini!", "Il Gioco delle Tre Carte" are the first productions), La Baracca continues its productive research in this field as well: "The Dragon in the Fog" and "The Christmas Story" are the most recent productions dedicated to this productive genre.

In its more than ten years of activity, the company has taken its shows all over Italy, participating in the most important national exhibitions of Children's Theatre. Abroad, the Company has been invited to Germany, France, Switzerland, Belgium, Spain, where it was the guest of honour at Barcelona's "Tamborinada" in 1982 and 1987, at the "El Carrer Theatre Fair" in Tarrega in 1984, and at the Theatre Review for the Granollers Schools in 1986, Brazil and Mexico.

In Brazil, in the Summer of 1986, it produced the play "The Dragon in the Fog".

This last is based on the novel of the same name by Giuseppe Pederiali, published by Rusconi Editrice, which was the 1985 winner of the national literary Prizes "Piano di Sorrento", "Citta di Penne" and "Selezione Bancarella". The show has been presented - after a tour of Brazil which included cities such as Rio de Janeiro, Brasilia and Sao Paulo - with public and critical success in several prestigious national theatrical displays, and in June 1988 was invited to the Spring Cultural Festival of the State of Hidalgo in Mexico. Its profitable collaboration with regional and local Government - in particular the Bologna City Council and the Emilia-Romagna Region - which began in 1979 on the occasion of the first edition of the exhibition "Un Posto per i Ragazzi" ("A Place for the Children", currently in its tenth edition under the name "Sanleonardo Children's Theatre Centre Festival"), has allowed the Company to fulfil its "dream": the opening of the Children's Theatre Centre in Bologna.

The Centre is a permanent body for the production and promotion of shows for children at the national and international levels, which also allows the Company to carry out a variety of activities related to the world of children, and to embody the intense stimuli which exist therein.

Ken Sweeney started game one, going five solid innings before a back injury sidelined him. Sweeney left the game with the bases loaded and a 4-3 lead. Bob Crowley came in for relief and had the misfortune of pitching to a lefty in a park with an unfriendly 250 foot right field fence. Crowley got the batter to hit a flyball to the right, that was a routine out, in a normal park. However, on this day it was a grand slam and the Golden Eagles lost 7-4.

After an emotional between game meeting, the Golden Eagles fell behind again 9-7, in game two, but it was pay back time for the Golden Eagles, when Chris Lamendola stepped up with bases loaded and one out in the top of the seventh, and smacked a grand slam over the right field wall. Bobby Crowley pitched four innings of strong relief to get to win. The Golden Eagles had their first victory of the year.

The winning habit continued as the Golden Eagles traveled to Poughkeepsie, N.Y. and swept a doubleheader from Vassar College 7-5 and 13-10. Charlie Caputo (6 for 9) and Fran Rogalle (5 for 6 and a home run) were the hitting stars. Fran Rogalle and Dave Frabizio were the winning pitchers. All in all the month of April saw St. Joseph's College play fourteen games, winning seven and losing seven.

The season ended with the loss of a double header to St. Thomas Aquinas College 6-0 and 7-4. The Golden Eagles finished their first season of competitors with a record of 7 wins and 16 losses.

## History Of Commencement Robes

What suggests the future more than the sight of graduates in academic robes?

The garb is an ancient one, centuries old and rich in meaning. Academic dress is traced to the robes medieval monks wore for warmth in unheated monasteries. The hoods on today's commencement robes probably originated from the need to keep tonsured heads warm. Since clergy were the literate class in medieval society, they became associated with scholarship. And the first universities actually grew up around the great cathedrals that were centers for ecclesiastical education. As the universities began to train young men for occupations other than the ecclesiastical, such as law, some students probably were inclined to abandon "monkish" robes for more worldly garb.

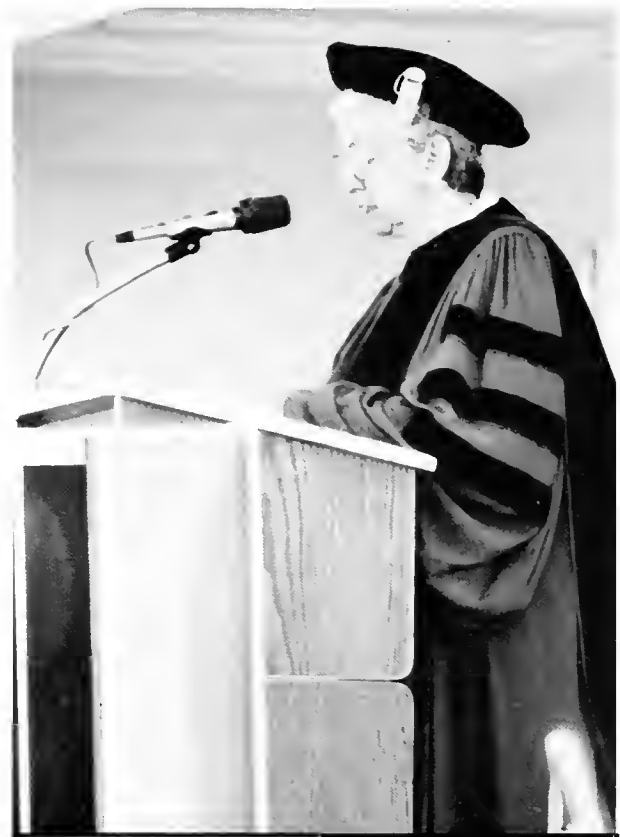
Possibly in reaction to this, a 1321 statute at the University of Coimbra required all "Doctors, Licentiates, and Bachelors" to wear gowns. Other statutes during the second half of the 14th century forbid "excess in apparel" at English universities, instead directing the wearing of long gowns. This distinctive dress set students apart from other citizens in university towns, fueling the historic conflict between "town and gown."

Academic dress design varies among European institutions. But the United States has a standardized code of academic dress authorized by the American Council on Education. Because of this code we can look at today's commencements and know the wearer's study discipline, degree level and even what institution he or she is graduating from.

According to the Academic Costume Code, a bachelor's gown is worn closed with long, pointed sleeves. A master's gown is worn open, with long sleeves cut to hang away from the forearm in an oblong shape. Doctor's gowns can be worn open or closed and may be trimmed with wide velvet panels running down the gown's front and velvet bars on the sleeves. The velvet is black or the color of the wearer's study discipline. Hoods, if used, are lined in the college or university's color and bordered with a color that indicates the wearer's degree.

According to the Academic Costume Code, here are the colors associated with degrees or study disciplines.
