## INTRODUCTION.

The HOVEY BOOK owes its existence to the wishes and combined efforts of many individuals. The materials have been drawn from all parts of New England, and even from distant regions of the Continent and from foreign lands. Here and there have lived men and women of today who longed to know more facts than were in their possession concerning their ancestors. They ransacked attics for ancient relics and old family documents. They frequented bookstores, and old curiosity shops. They tried to build up family traditions and records into consistent genealogies. They made scrap-books filled with clippings, often disconnected and less authentic than could be desired. They did not disdain any scrap of information that might come to hand concerning anybody by the name of Hovey.

Meanwhile the scattered branches of the family did not even know of each other's existence, much less of the kindred aims that led them to similar lines of independent research. It is impossible to do justice in these pages to every individual whose patient mind and diligent hand have wrought out the results now for the first time offered in a combined form to the public. Yet this passing recognition is due to those who have even secretly taken a wholesome and praiseworthy interest in their colonial ancestry.

By way of introduction the writer, who has from the first been honored as the President of the Daniel Hovey Association, desires to tell the story of its origin and aims, of its various annual and mid-winter meetings, of its officers and members, and also to give a few facts of interest that hardly seem germane to the body of the book.

In May, 1900, on a grassy knoll, under a gnarled and twisted apple-tree, near the spot where the Newbury pilgrims landed long ago, two families by the name of Hovey, one from Portsmouth and the other from Newburyport, picnicked together. They found the occasion so agreeable as to suggest a larger family gathering; to effect which the following circular was issued with a few additional names:-

DEAR COUSIN:

You are invited with kith and kin to Ipswich, the home of our common immigrant ancestor, Daniel Hovey. Let us meet at noon, on Tuesday, the twenty-first of August (or if stormy, the next fair day), at the rooms of the Ipswich Historical Society, near the railroad station in that city.

After a friendly interchange of greetings, we will visit the Public Library and other points of interest. Dinner will await us at 2 p. m., at fifty cents a plate, at the Agawam House.

At 3 p. m. we will proceed to the foot of Hovey street and cross the river by row-boats to the ruins of the Hovey Home and the remains of the Hovey Wharf, built 240 years ago. A delightful sail at high tide may follow; or carriages may be had at reason-

able rates for a drive among the hills.

Ipswich may be reached by railroad, electrics, or steamboat,

and the ride thither is a favorite one for wheelmen.

If you can come, please notify the chairman a week in advance, or as soon as possible. If you cannot come, please send a letter to your assembled cousins, addressing any member of the committee; saying who you are, and how related to Daniel Hovey. Valuable information, of interest to us all, may thus be gained.

Will you kindly extend this invitation to any other relatives of Daniel Hovey with whom you may be acquainted?

The program thus indicated was carried out with a degree of success beyond the expectations of the impromptu committee convening the assembly. After inspecting the rooms of the Ipswich Historical Society, the company repaired to the chapel of the First Church, and Rev. Henry Emerson Hovey, of Portsmouth, called the meeting to order, asked Dr. Alvah Hovey, of Newton, Mass., to offer prayer, and then moved that Dr. Horace C. Hovey, of Newburyport, take the chair. In answer to a roll-call seventy-six persons responded as present, and greetings came from others who were absent. On motion of Rev. Henry Emerson Hovey an organization was effected under the name of the Daniel Hovey Association, officers were duly elected, and a committee on genealogy was informally chosen, consisting of all who had been at work in that line: namely, Henry E. Hovey, Horace C. Hovey, Lewis R. Hovey, Henry Russell Hovey, Charles L. Hovey, Alvah Hovey, Augustine Caldwell, Edmund Slafter, William H. Ricker, Mrs. Gardner Chapin, Miss Caroline Hovey, and Miss Lefavour.

As a contribution to the family genealogy Dr. H. C. Hovey read a concise memoir of Daniel Hovey, our immigrant ancestor, a printed copy of which was presented with the author's compliments, to every member of the association. At 2 P. M. dinner was served at the Agawam House; after which came postprandial speeches and letters from numerous absentees. Barges were then taken to Town Hill, the old burying ground, Hovey Street, the site of the ancient Daniel Hovey house, and the Hovey Wharf; followed by a ride down the river on the steamer Carlotta, which conveyed the party out to the Ipswich Bay, and brought them back in time to witness a glorious sunset. On arriving again at the Hovey Wharf the assembly dispersed, voting to meet again the ensuing year.

INTRODUCTION

Eleven annual meetings have been held, all at Ipswich, except one at Groveland Pines, and one at Ipswich Bluffs on Plum Island. Six mid-winter meetings have been held; five of them in Boston and one in New York City. The attendance has usually heen about the same as at the first meeting; varied, however, by the absence of some of the original members and the advent of new members. The ranks have also been thinned by the death of some of the veterans; especially of Rev. Henry Emerson Hovey. Dr. Alvah Hovey, Mr. George Hovey, Dr. Edmund F. Slafter and Mr. Hamblin L. Hovey, all prominent as founders and able, generous supporters of the association. One of the most interesting of the special meetings of the Association was held on November 18th, 1907, in Newburyport, in honor of the Golden Wedding of the President and his wife; when the Vice-President, Rev. Henry Emerson Hovey, modified the Episcopal marriage service to suit the occasion, and the guests left a golden memorial of their esteem and affection.

Only a few of the more salient facts recorded by our secretary can be related in this introduction.

Mr. Hamblin L. Hovey, of Waltham, headed a subscription for a memorial tablet to be erected at Ipswich in honor of Daniel Hovey, which was placed on the south wall of the Historical reception room with appropriate ceremonies, August 6, 1903. Regret was expressed that careful search had failei to locate the last resting-place of our distinguished ancestor, but we rejoiced to be able thus to show our veneration for his name and appreciation of his worth. The tablet of bronze was designed and cast by Mr. George P. Tilton of Newburyport, and bears an inscription suggested by Rev. Henry Emerson Hovey.

Each member of the genealogical committee had previously been at work, and some of them for many years, on different branches of the family. Of course there were some discrepancies, and not a few difficulties; data also accumulated rapidly. It became evident that all material should be placed in the hands of an expert, who should adjust what was on hand, correct errors, and obtain as much additional material as possible. Mr. Sidney Perley, of Salem, Mass., was accordingly employed as our historian and genealogist, to work under the supervision of our Executive Committee. Mr. Perley's familiarity with Essex county, and indeed with the entire State, and his exact and painstaking methods, led us to regard him as a responsible and conscientious man for the position; and the results have verified the wisdom of our selection.

In order to get into touch with as many of the Hovey Family as possible, we employed an amanuensis. Miss Helen A. Pike, to examine the hundreds of domestic and foreign directories in the hands of Messrs. Samson and Murdock, and thus obtained a vasuable of addresses in all parts of the continent and abroad, to which a circular was sent soliciting the fullest information. All replies were placed at Mr. Perley's disposal. Church records were searched and town records inspected; old family Bibles were examined, and many old tombstones visited, either by members or our committee or by our historian himself. It is our impression that, first or last, we came into touch with nearly 5,000 individuals, the maiority of whom came from Daniel Hovey of Ioswich.

Our attempts to find an authentic coat of arms were too successful. We found too many coats; enough for a wardrobe.
We assume that Daniel Hovey himself had none, or he would
have used it. Evidently different branches of the iamily have exercised their right to adopt, or manufacture, armorial bearings to
suit themselves. In this they simply followed the example already
set by the American families of Adams, Franklin, Hancock and
Paul Revere—none of which had any patent from Royalty, or
grant from any College of Heraldry, but devised their own coats
of arms. It is our impression that George Washington did the
same.

At the outset we agreed to use, and have habitually done so, the crest of the English Hovey Family, namely, a hand holding pen, with a scroll underneath, bearing the legend "Hinc Orior" (by this I rise): not inappropriate in view of the literary character of many of the family. In 1902 it was agreed to adopt a combination of two or more coats of arms known to have been granted to foreign branches of the Hovey Family by heraldic authority. But after all this composite design did not please us, and in 1903 it was voted to postpone the vexed subject indefinitely. In 1910 it was suggested that, unless serious objection was offered, we should make use of the duly recognized English coat of arms, honestly stating it to be such. It appeals to us more than any one of the five or more American coats of arms, whose history we have thus far heen unable to verify.

To assist our Historian, and at his request, several special committees were appointed in 1906: namely, to examine Boston records, etc., Miss Shapleigh, Mrs. Ricker, and Miss Chapin; for

those of Cambridge, Mr. Ricker, Miss Caroline Hovey, and H. N. Howey; for Brookfield and Hadley, H. C. Hovey and Miss Amy Kenyon; for Lowell and vicinity, Mr. Grenville Hovey; for Dedham, Mrs. N. W. Davis and Mrs. Mildred Alexander; for Harvehill and Groveland, Mr. Lewis R. Hovey. Mr. Perley himself has visited numerous places to examine town, church and family records and inscriptions in cemeteries.

Our first aim was to get the facts; but when, in 1908, we found that we had a sum total of 1221 pages of MSS, we felt that the time was ripe for a Hovey Book. Accordingly we appointed a Comimttee on Publication, with full powers; of which Dr. H. C. Hovey was made chairman and treasurer; and Mr. Lewis R. Hovey was chosen as printer; and funds were provided by rift and by loan.

The materials amassed are as complete as possible under the circumstances. After all there may remain some differences of opinion. This remark applies to the identification of the old Hovey House. It is certain that Daniel Hovey, Sr., bought a home before his marriage in April, 1639, being one of a series of houselots laid out along the south bank of the river. He added other lots bought of Wm. Holdred and Wm. Knowlton. Rev. T. F. Waters, president of the Ipswich Historical Society, gives a very full account of the various Hovey real estate transactions in early times. (See "Ipswich, in the Mass. Bay Colony," pp. 482-485.) By permission Daniel Hovey built a fence, made stiles at each end of his property, and in 1650 had leave to "build a wharf against his ground," and also "such building as may tend to the improvement thereof." Mr. Waters says, in a letter to us dated Jan. 13, 1011, "I see no reason to believe that Daniel Hovey ever lived in any other part of the town. The grant of wharf privi-leges, etc., indicates residence here." His migrations to other towns did not alienate him from Ipswich, which he still claimed as his settled residence." (See petition quoted pp. 11 and 12 of this book.) His will mentions his "dwelling-house"; and his inventory, in 1692, speaks of his "house and wharf," as if contiguous to each other. Thus he certainly had a house in 1630 and also in 1692; but we do not know them to be identical. He moved to Quabog in 1668, and thence to Hadley; but he seems to have returned to his Ipswich home in 1678. According to Mr. Perley he was at that time "in straightened circumstances, and there is no reason to think he built another house of which he died possessed." Our Historian also reasons that "when Daniel Sr. removed to Quabog, apparently Daniel Jr. lived on his father's homestead, and not being satisfied to have his new wife live in the old house, as soon as he obtained control of the premises, he got from the town the right to fell trees for a house." Hence the conclusion that what we have known as "The Old Hovey House" was built by him in 1668, and stood till 1894 when it was burned down. But some of us cling to the previously received idea that this ancient dwelling was the original home of our immigrant ancestor. It pleases our fancy to think of him as residing there, with his "loving and well-beloved" wife Abigail, and their six sons and "one dafter"; holding family councils under its roof-tree; extending hospitality to their neighbors, and particularly honoring as a guest the learned teacher, Thomas Andrews, their 'truly dear and well-beloved brother," who died July to, 1683. The house was two story frame, with a "lean-to"; nine windows in front and four at the end, with small square panes, of which only those over the front door were "bullseyes." Around it were rocks and trees and in the distance Sagamore Hill was visible, overlooking the bay.

We cannot be denied a brief reference to the ancestry of Abigail Andrews, with whom Daniel Hovey says, "I did more than forty years ago match and by whom the Lord hath blessed

me."

Our colonial ancestor, her father, retained the English way of spelling his name, signing it "Robert Andrewes"; the extra "e" in the final syllable being suggestive of the "ancient ancestry" of Suffolk County, England, that spelled it thus.

The widow of Thomas Andrewes, (Master of Trinity House), Mrs. Johane Andrewes, residing at London, on "Tower Hill, All Saints Barking," left a will which is found in "Genealogical Gleanings in England," Vol. I, p. 603. She mentions her son, Lancelot, the Bishop of Winchester, who lived in the reigns or Elizabeth, James I., (whom he assisted to crown), and Charles I. He was first in the list of fifty-four learned men selected to make what is known as King James' "authorized version" of the Bible. The will also mentions her son, Thomas; and her brotherin-law, William, to whom (along with Richard Ireland) she left "one-third part of the ship called 'the Mayflower,'" on certain conditions. It has pleased our fancy to imagine that this was the same ship on which the Pilgrims embarked for the New World, and on whose deck they made the celebrated Mayflower Compact. It is said that William afterwards, in 1633, came over and settled in Boston. This will likewise mentions a brother-in-law Robert Andrewes.\*

\*It is a curious fact that none of the earlier records of the Pilgrims ever mentioned the name of the vessel that brought them to these American shores. They always mentioned it as "the ship"—"the biger ship" or by some similar term, vague and uncertain, or else as the all-important ship to them. Antiquarians have identified twenty or thirty different vessels bearing the name "Mayflower." For a full discussion of this interesting subject, the reader is referred to "The Mayflower and her Log," by Azel Ames, Houghton-Mifflin Co., 1907, especially pages 94, 95 and 96,

The Bishop's will, found on pp. 609 and 610, of the same volume, names numerous relatives, among them his "cousin Robert Andrewes." Thomas and Richard Andrewes are mentioned in Bradford's Letter-Book, as among the forty-two merchant adventurers of London who financed the Plymouth Plantation; and Thomas at least belonged subsequently to the Massachusetts Company. Both names figure frequently on the pages of what is sometimes styled "The Log of the Mayflower."

How the foregoing persons stood related, if at all, to Captain Robert Andrewes, master and owner of the Angel Gabriel, we do not certainly know; but they shared in planting New England.

The Angel Gabriel was an armed ship that came as confort of the James, in August, 1635, and both were caught in a terrible thunder storm,\* and had to part company. The James anchored near the Isles of Shoals, and the Angel Gabriel off Pemaquid, on the coast of Maine. The diary of Rev. Richard Mather, published by Dr. Young, in 1846, and republished by the Dorchester Antiquarian and Historical Society, gives an account of that disastrous gale, as it imperilled the James, which finally arrived "rent in sunder and split in pieces" in the Boston harbor. Mr. Mather remarks that "The Angel Gabriel was the first vessel which miscarried with passengers from Old England to New." It was built for Sir Walter Raleigh, and sailed from Bristol, England, and was of 240 tons burden, carrying sixteen guns. For a full account of the wreck of this gallant ship, we refer the reader to Chapter XI of a book entitled "Ten Years at Pemaguid," and to Vols, XXX, and XXXIX of the Massachusetts Archives. Omitting details it interests us that among the rescued passengers. besides Captain Andrewes and his family, were his three nephews, John, Thomas and Robert Burnham, sons of his sister Mary, who had been put under the charge of their uncle. These all, with a London merchant, named John Coggswell, afterwards settled in the town of Ipswich. From the town records it appears that large land grants were made in 1635 to Mr. Coggswell, and considerable grants were made to Robert Andrewes. The latter was also licensed to "keep ordinary (an inn) in the plantation where he lives during the pleasure of the court." It was agreed that he might sell wine, "if he do not unwittingly sell to such as abuse it by drunkenness." This was probably the first case of the kind in this region. Under the circumstances it proved the confidence men had in Mr. Andrewes as a man of discretion and integrity.

Consulting various histories and genealogies of the Andrews Family (e. g. the files of the Essex Antiquarian, the N. E. Hist.

and Gen. Register, the Andrews Memorial, by Rev. Alfred Andrews, the "History of the Andrews Family," by Hon. H. F. Andrews, etc.,) we find no little confusion as to the different dwelling-lots and land grants, owing to the fact that a number of representatives of the family with similar names, settled in Ips-wich, Topsfield, Rowley and other adjoining places. Caldwell's "Antiquarian Papers" states that our Robert Andrews lived near the South Church, and he probably did.

In Waters's "Ipswich," p. 58, it is stated that road surveyors were appointed in January, 1640-1, and that Mr. Robert Andrews was one of the first four men designated for that responsible office. Their task was to transform crooked paths and grassgrown lanes into passable highways for ox-carts and primitive carriages. It was also their duty to detect encroachments on the labor of all "youths above 14 years of age." They had power to call out all the Town for at least one day's work with men and teams for mending walls and wharves.

The will of Robert Andrewes, March first, 1643, mentions his wife, Elizabeth, his sons John and Thomas, his grandchildren, one of them being his "son-in-law Franklyn's daughter," and the other "my son Daniel Hovey's child, Daniel Hovey my grandchild." The mother of the former has been identified as Alice, and the mother of the latter was Abigail, as proved by Daniel Hovey's will. In order of age they were Alice, Abigail, John and Thomas. Robert Andrewes provided by his will for the education of his younger son, Thomas, who also had further aid by a legacy from John Ward, and became the school master of Ipswich, concerning whose estate Daniel Hovey made a certificate. (See pp. 12 and 13 of this book.) The will of Robert Andrewes names his nephews, John, Thomas and Robert Burnham, who were with him on the Angel Gabriel. The family of the Captain must have included our colonial grandmother, Abigail, who was married to Daniel Hovey six years later. John, mentioned in the will as the eldest son, must also have been a survivor of that shipwreck. Hammatt states that the latter was in the Pequot War, being first Corporal, then Lieutenant. He moderated the town meeting, August 23, 1687, when sturdy resistance was made to the tyrant, Sir Edmund Andros, who violated the terms of the charter of the colony by levving taxes without consent of the General Court. In memory of that event the seal of Ipswich bears the motto: "The Birthplace of American Independence, 1687." A memorial brochure of 16 pages has been published concerning this heroic Lieutenant, by Hon, H. F. Andrews, in 1909, expressing doubt as to his relationship to our Captain Robert Andrewes, of whom he may have been a brother instead of a son. Anyhow "it was all in the family." The authority above quoted is of the opinion that the name of Andrewes ceased with John Andrews of Salem, a shipwright, who was the grandson of Captain Robert, and had three daughters but no sons. We certainly hope this conjecture (which honesty requires us to give for what it may be worth) is groundless; for the descendants of Lieut. John Andrews now number many thousands, and have intermarried with many of the best families of Essex country and elsewhere.

Our conscientious genealogist has very wisely aimed to exclude conjectures from the body of this volume. Yet, in this introductory chapter it is not amiss to give brief room for some conjectures as to the origin of our ancestral name and allied lineage.

The name of "Hove," accented on the terminal syllable, is found in France, Holland, Norway and Sweden. So strongly was the late Rev. George L. Hovey, of Bricksburg, N. J., convinced of the identity of this name with his own, as to cause him to change the pronunciation accordingly. His theory was that the "y" was added to prevent the English name from being sounded as one syllable. This was also the theory of Gen. Charles E. Hovey, of Washington, D. C., and Prof. E. O. Hovey, of Newark, N. J.\* The learned linguist, Dr. J. D. Butler, of Madison, Wis., derived our name from the Angle-Saxon words, "Hof," meaning a walled place, and the suffix "ey," meaning an island; the "f" being changed to "v" for euphony; the combination meaning "a walled island."

In my memoir of Daniel Hovey, published in 1000, another conjecture was offered, on the ground that "f" and "v" are often interchangeable; e. g. in the words "save" and "safe," "calf" and "calve," "half" and "halve," and in such proper names as "farmam" and "Varnam." Possibly the "Hovey" of colonial days was identical with the "Hoffe" so frequently found in our early annals, and which Trumbull assumes to be the same as Goffe. Agawam (Ipswich) was settled in 1633 by John Winthrop, Jr., and twelve men, "the rest to be supplied at the coming of the next ships." The largest of these was the Griffin, on which Mr. Hoffe was a passenger. Winthrop's letters show that Hoffe and Goffe were not identical. In 1635, Winthrop, Dummer and Hoffe were chosen as assistants to Governor Haynes; and in 1637 Hoffe is again mentioned along with Dummer, Saltonstall and Wheel-wright. It was in 1637 that the name of Hovey first appears in

\*The fact is worth noting that the traditional original form of our family name. Hove, is given to a municipal borough of Sussex, England, with a population of about 37,000 souls, and an area of 1521 acres. It boasts a mayor, to aldermen and 30 councillors, and within its bounds is located the Sussex county cricket-ground. Although the parish of Hove is ancient, the incorporation of the borough only dates to 1898, having formerly been a part of Brighton, whose famous seawall continues along its border, forming a delightful promenade.

the records of Ipswich. Later Hovey's wharf is described as Hoffe's wharf. These facts may not amount to proofs, but are worth considering.

Our colonial sires were not exact spellers, and varied from Hovey to Hovy, Hovie, Houey, etc. Mr. W. H. Ricker, an officer of our Association, when in England, in 1910, gave this question some attention. The rector of Waltham Abbey, Rev. J. M. Stamp, suggested that the original name may have been "Tovi." dating back to the great Danish thane, Ralph de Tovi, the royal standard bearer at whose wedding feast Hardicanute died, and on whose land the famous Holy Cross was found which he brought to Waltham and reared on a church built for its reception. Giving this idea for what it may be worth, we are further assured by Mr. Ricker that he had the satisfaction of seeing in the Waltham Abbey vestment room the name of "Hovey," thus spelled, "in bold, clear Saxon letters," thus proving that our own way is not an American innovation. But he also says that "there is no place yet known, except at Waltham, where the name was spelled 'Hovey' prior to 1590; but 'Houfe' was common in the older Waltham MSS., and elsewhere. There was one Richard Houfe in Lincolnshire in 1329, and another Houfe was buried in Westminster Abbey. The names of Houfe, Huffe and Huffee are found in English history."

In our preliminary correspondence we have found only her and there some one of our name in America who did not claim descent from Daniel Hovey of Ipswich. Letters have come from Canada, Ireland, Scotland and England sent by those of other lines of ancestry. But the task has been sufficiently great to trace the more immediate connections. And even here perfection in detail must not be demanded. All we can say is that we have done our best, and we hope that this volume may at least serve the purpose of bringing into better acquaintance the widely scattered branches of our American family by the name of HOVEY.

Besides the tablet in memory of Daniel Hovey already mentoned, hundreds of monuments mark the resting-places of many of his descendants. Among more public memorials may be specified the ornate oriel window over the main entrance to the Centre Presbyterian Church at Crawfordsville, Indiana, for Professor Edmund O. Hovey, of Wabash College; the splendid window recently placed in St. John's Episcopal Church, Portsmouth, N. H., in honor of its Rector, the Rev. Henry Emerson Hovey, our beloved Vice-President; and the marble fountain also at Portsmouth to commemorate his gallant son. Emerson Hovey, Ensign in the U. S. Navy, who fell in battle in the Philippine Islands. As Ipswich has been the Mecca of our family pilgrimages, it is suggested that, ultimately, copies of all books and pamphlets published by any of our name; all available photographs and relics that may not be retained by private families; and all documents accumulated in the preparation of this Hovey Book, should be placed for safe-keeping and ready reference in the custody of the Public Library at Ipswich, in whose fire-proof building they may remain accessible to coming generations.

### ILLUSTRATIONS.

No fixed plan was adopted by the Publishing Committee concerning either the subjects or the styles of illustration. They simply sought to serve the tastes and wishes of the individual members of the Daniel Hovey Association, as far as these could be ascertained. A circular was issued opening the way for any member to send any material he pleased. Hence, there is much variety and individuality in the portraits to be found in this volume. Concerning views of historic localities and Hovey houses, a similar rule has been observed; and those used have been mainly such as were given and expense provided for by the interested parties.

Most of the engraving and printing of engravings has been done by the Walker Lithograph and Publishing Company of Boston, under the direction of our Publishing Committee.



# PARENTAGE OF DANIEL HOVEY.



HE origin of Daniel Hovey, the ancestor of the American Hovey family, has hitherto been unknown to genealogists, and it would have continued to be a matter for investigation had it not been for a chance discovery in 1905 by John Albree of Swampscott, Mass. He was making a search in the

Boston public library for a copy of a work mentioned in an account of the unfortunate Sir Henry Moody, son of Lady Deborat Moody, the versatile, interesting and almost forgotten English woman of noble birth and breeding who "was (good, poor lady) almost undone by buying Master Humphries farme. Swampscott." The library possesses four copies, and by chance the one Mr. Albree chose for examination proved to be the one with the record of the birth of Daniel Hovey. The title is: "G, de Saluste du Bartas: His Devine Weekes and Workes, with a Compleate Collection of all the other most delightfull Works Translated and written by y' famous Philomusus Iosvah Sylvester Gent: London Printed by Humfrey Lownes, dwelling on Bread Street Hill, 1621."

The eye of the reader caught the following on page 200:-

Daniel Hovey his boke hee was born in waltham aby y\* 9th of Augusti 1618. Son of Richard Hovey of y\* fam town. fent him by M\* John Gibons y\* minister of that town. sent him as a token from him in 37, ver of the pequod wars.

This inspired further search, and on page 266 the record again appeared in different form:—

Could this be indeed fresh material? Was it a fact that at length had come to light a record made over two centuries ago? Was it an autograph? As to the last it was an easy matter to verify the signature by that on the will at the Essex probate office and other family papers. It was also readily found that no record was known as to the place of Hovey's birth, nor as to the exact date. Why should he have chosen this book for this record? The thought suggested itself to Mr. Albree that some knowledge of the personality of the founder of the Hovey family and his associates might be found in the book.

The volume itself is a large octavo of thirteen hundred pages, bound in full leather. In the middle of each cover are the letters D and H, stamped deeply, each being separated with a conventional bookbinder's design. These are the initials of Daniel Hovey's name; and does the fact that they are in so conspicuous a place indicate that he had a pride in the possession of his books? Possibly these initial letters may have been stamped on the covers in England as the book was about to be presented to young Daniel, who was then but nineteen. In his will he makes specific bequests of books, and from their number and character it is known that he had a good library. This particular book, however, is not mentioned by name. But there is sufficient internal evidence to trace the book into his possession, by the entries in different styles of chirography and at various dates.

On the inside of the front cover is written:-

At page 155 is this orphic statement, not however in Hovey's handwriting:—

The second of these statements, that of the grandson, is crossed out, perhaps by some later owner who thought that in this way he could dispose of any evidence of possession or ownership by another.

On page 1216 is found:-

On another page is the record of still another transfer:-

The history of the ownership of the volume appears to be complete and without a break from Daniel Hovey. It went first by will to the grandson Daniel, then by sale to Francis Wainwright, and then, by gift, to Joseph Sewall, who was the pastor of the Old South Church, in Boston. Thomas Prince, who accumulated the Prince library, was his associate, and a number of Sewall's books are in the Prince library now, whether by gift or purchase is not material at this late day.

Guillaume de Salluste du Bartas, the author of this book, was a French poet, born in 1544, who died of wounds received in the battle of Ivry, having commanded a troop of horse in Gascony. His principal work, "La Divine Sepmaine," an epic poem on the creation of the world, was so popular that thirty editions were issued within six years after 1570, when it first appeared. It was translated into Gascon French, Italian, Spanish, German,

English, Latin, and, later, Swedish and Danish.\* Its style and religious tone made it a great favorite with English writers in his time, and was influential in forming English style. Joshua Sylvester, a Spenserian poet, translated this as well as the "Weekes and Workes" of Du Bartas into English. This poem is divided into portions for reading each week, hence the name "Weekes."

After the discovery of this book and the manuscript entries, Mr. Albree wrote to the clerk of the parish of Holy Cross, Waltham, England, requesting verification of the record. The curate, Rev. J. Henry Stamp, answered, saving that the parish registers were under his charge, and enclosing an attested copy of the record of baptism of Daniel Hovey, which corresponded exactly with the statement in the book. He, also, subsequently sent copies of all the Hovey baptisms, marriages and burials recorded in the register, copies of several issues of a monthly historical publication issued by the parish, and five views of the church. The publication contained much of the history of the parish and information concerning Rev. John Guibon, who gave the book to Daniel Hovey. The copies of records sent by Rev. Mr. Stamp are as follows:-

What is now the town or village of Waltham Holy Cross known as Waltham Abbey, as far back as the days of Hardicanute, was the hunting lodge of the Danish thane Tovi or Tovius, known as Tovi the Proud. Tovi subsequently founded there a small convent; and, through the wastefulness of Tovi's son Atheston, his family lost the grant in the days of Edward the Confessor. Waltham reverted to the crown; and it was subsequently granted to Harold, who built a new church or enlarged the existing one, dedicating the foundation to the Holy Cross May 3, 1060. Harold's body was buried by the high altar in the church. After the Conquest, various benefactions were received. Queen Maud gave a mill and Queen Adeliza the tithes of Waltham to the abbey, while from Stephen was received the confirmation of all privileges.\*

The great forest there was long known as the forest of Waltham, and the part yet remaining is called Epping forest.

At Waltham Cross is the beautiful cross erected between 1291 and 1294 by Edward I. at one of the resting places of the corpse of Oueen Eleanor while on its way to burial in Westminster Abbey. It is of Caen stone, and is supposed to have been designed by Pietro Cavalini, a Roman sculptor.

Waltham Abbey, or Waltham Holy Cross, is a market town of Essex county, and lies thirteen miles north of the Liverpool street station, London, on the Cambridge branch of the Great Eastern Railway. The town lies in a hollow, and the streets are for the most part crooked and narrow.

Waltham was the home of John Fox, the martyrologist, and there a considerable portion of his work was written.

The parish has had several famous minisiters. Rev. John Guibon, who presented the copy of Du Bartas' "Weekes and Workes" to Daniel Hovey, was a resident of Waltham as early as 1629, and succeeded to the curacy of the Abbey church. He left Waltham in 1640, going to London, where he appears to have been preferred to the living of St. Anne's, near Aldersgate. He eventually became a member of the Westminster Assembly of Divines, and was elected chairman of one of the three committees into which the Assembly was divided. Like his great predecessor, Bishop Hall, Mr. Guibon retained his affection for his old parish. He was ejected from the living of St. Anne's, and soon after died of consumption, the burial taking place in Waltham.

# DANIEL HOVEY AND HIS DESCENDANTS.



ANIEL HOVEY¹, the ancestor of the American Hoveys, was born at Waltham Abbey, in Essex county, England, Aug. 9, 1618, being son of Richard Hovey, a glover, of that place. He was apparently a man of education, and the fact that the curate of his parish church was friendly to and interested in him

while he was in his teens and far away in a strange land, indicates that there were elements in his character which drew and held attention to him. He was one of the early settlers of Ipswich, Massachusetts, in 1635, at the age of seventeen. Feb. 5, 1637, the town granted to him six acres of land on Muddy creek; and also "Granted to Daniell Hovey, an house lott, I acre of ground on the South syde of the Town River, having a house lott, granted to William Holdred on the West, and a house lott granted to Thomas Sherman on the East. Also six acres of planting ground, lying on Sagamore Hill, having a planting lott, formerly granted Henry Wilkinson on the West, and a planting lott granted to William Holdred on the East: to enjoy the sayde Landes, to him, his heirs, or assigns forever. Entered this 27th day of March 1639."\* The freemen of the town granted to William Holdred a house lot of half-an-acre adjoining Daniel Hovey's on the southwest, being on the south side of the river, and bounded by the house lot of Roger Preston on the southwest; also six acres of planting ground on Sagamore hill adjoining Daniel Hovey's planting lot west, and the planting lot of Roger Preston on the east; the grants being entered April 9, 1639; and both of these lots were conveyed by Mr. Holdred to "Daniel Hovey of Ipswich, planter," and, also, one dwelling house built on the house lot and all the fencing belonging to both lots. Entered April 10, 1630.\*

Feb. 10, 1644, the town of Ipswich ordered that Mr. Hovey

be paid three shillings for killing three foxes.

In 1648, he subscribed three shillings three times a year to Mai. Daniel Denison, "so long as he shall be their leader, to encourage him in his military helpfulness," the whole annual sum being twenty-four pounds and seven shillings, and the largest subscription ten shillings.

Mr. Hovey was somewhat prominent, and held several town offices in Ipswich, being chosen one of the selectmen Feb. 14, 1650; a surveyor of highways in 1648-0 and 1640-50; and a constable in 1658. In 1656, he was one of a committee to set up a saw mill on Chebacco river. The selectmen ordered, 12: 12: 1650, that Symon Tomson and Daniell Hovey shall view a certain parcel of land.\* In 1649, he was a juror at Ipswich court.

In the county court which sat at Ipswich 29: 1: 1642, Mr. Hovey was plaintiff in three civil actions. One was against James Pitney and James Howe, in which he recovered judgment for nine bushels of corn; one against Jo: Lee, which was not tried; and the other was against George Varnham and Io: North, which

was continued

Daniel Hovey was granted a highway to go to his lot in, by the town of Ipswich, March 4, 1650.\*

22: 12: 1652, the town gave him liberty to set his fence down to the river at his ground which he bought of William Knowlton, making a stile at each end.\*

At a town meeting held Feb. 14, 1659, Daniel Hovey was granted liberty to build a wharf against his ground that he bought of William Knowlton, and, also, such building as may tend to the improvement thereof.\*

Mr. Hovey was living on his farm in Topsfield in 1663 and 1664. Jan. 15, 1663, he was chosen one of two persons to lay

out some land.†

Mr. Hovey was complained of for speaking falsely to the prejudice of General Denison, and was fined twenty shillings in Ipswich court Sept. 24, 1667. The records show that in some case, in which evidently General Denison acted as magistrate, Mr. Hovey said that Major Denison did not write his determination nor state his sentence in public, and what was done occurred after he was gone, and that John Gould whispered in the major's ear as he was going away.‡ Magistrates did not allow themselves to be criticised in those days.

In May, 1660, a colony went from Ipswich to Quaboag, a place subsequently named Brookfield; and Daniel Hovey joined

it in 1668. His sons James and Thomas went with him. The lots of land laid out to the father and sons adjoined, and were situated easterly of the little brook, on the north side of the road. Daniel Hovey was living in Quaboag in May, 1672, and settled in Hadley before the massacre at Quabog in 1675.

While in Hadley, he lived on a farm of Mr. Henry Clerke; and Mr. John Russell, jr., and Mr. Peter Tilton, sr., executors of the will of Mr. Clerke of Hadley, deceased, brought an action against Mr. Hovey, at the court in Springfield Sept. 26, 1676. for withholding rent due to said plaintiffs "for a ffarm or Land of ve savd Mr. Henry Clerkes which ve savd Hovey hath Occupved as a tenement."\* The jury found a verdict for the plaintiffs, and awarded them fourteen pounds damages, due in 1676.† At the succeeding term of court held at Springfield the same year, Mr. Hovey brought suit against Mr. John Russell, jr., being an "Action of unjust molestation in a Suite at ve last Corte at Springfield & for uncharitable Charges to ye defamation or Slandour of the sd Dan" Hovey & his Wife & Charging ye sd Dan" to be a man of a Scandolous life in an Open Afsembly & therefore was denyed Church Comunion & this threatened to be made Out to his Church and yt he belonged too & all yt Churches thereaboute." The jury found a verdict for Mr. Hovey. Whether these proceedings and the unhappy contentions that must have been engendered by them had aught to do with his departure from Hadley or not the writer does not know; but Mr. Hovey returned to Ipswich in 1678.

While living in Hadley, he suffered much at the hands of the Indians, and was also a sharer in providing defence for the town. Three years after his return to Ipswich, he sent to the colonial council a petition, an exact copy of which, copied from the original instrument on file in the Massachusetts archives, at the state house in Boston, is as follows:—§

To the Honoured Council now sitting in Boston; the humble petition of Daniel Hovey of Ipswich,

Wheras your humble petitioner was an inhabitant of Hadly in the time of the late Indian warrs, and there expended (beside my lofses) much of my Estate in the Countreys service against the common enemy; and since that time was removed thence by Providence to Ipswich, where I have remained now these three yeers last past; and by reason of the remote distance fro Hadly and want of intelligence thence I mised the opportunity of sending in my last accol\* together with my neighbours there, to the last Sefsions of the Gen'i Court; which caused me much labour and long travell thither from Ipswich; yet at the last I have gained a certificate of those my Expences from the Committee of Militia in

Hadley, being the last of mine Expences there on the Countreys service; amounting to 11<sup>th</sup> 13<sup>th</sup> 08<sup>th</sup>; as by the said Certificate doth fully appear; now my humble request and petition is, that yo' Hono'' would be pleased to grant me an Order to the Constables of Ipswich that I may receive the said Sums there; where my settled residence is, and have no commerce or dealing at Hadley: that so I may discount my present Rates, and may have the residue for the relief of my family, which hath been much straitned by my lefses and expences there in time of the warrs, and by rates both then and since. The Lord direct your counfells and afsist yo' endeavot' in all weighty transactions now in hand, that we may rejoice and blefs God under yo' good governmi' continued over us. so prayeth

The selectmen of Ipswich granted to him six pine trees, presumably for timber, at two times, three on Jan. 2, 1678, and

three Dec. 15, 1679.\*

Daniel Hovéy married Abigail, daughter of Robert and Elizabeth (Franklin?) Andrews of Ipswich, about 1641. Mr. Andrews died in 1643, having given to Mr. Hovey a legacy of ten pounds. In the settlement of the estate of Mrs. Hovey's brother Thomas Andrews, a prominent schoolmaster, Mr. Hovey certified to the county court as follows:—†

## Farial Depose fini.

The real estate transactions to which Mr. Hovey was a party besides those that were grants from the town in the earlier days are as follows: He owned, with others, twenty-five acres of marsh, which was divided Jan. 30, 1658.\* He bought seventy acres of upland and meadow in Topsfield, bounded north and northeast by the pond, east by a part of the Ipswich commons, south by upland and meadow of Robert Andrews and west by common land and meadow, June 12, 1660.† When he was living at Quabog, he conveyed a piece of marsh and "my farm in Topsfield weh my son John now liveth in, to him he surrendering to me his land in Ipswich," and paying forty pounds and allowing to the grantor thirty shillings a year during the latter's life; and also "my division of land at wheall brooke," June 13, 1671.‡ While Mr. Hovey was still at "Quabaugh," he conveyed one-half of an acre of land in Ipswich, lying on the south side of the river. together with the frame of a house standing on the adjoining land of his son Daniel and some shingles at Topsfield, May 8, 1672.§ When Mr. Hovey lived at Hadley he sold twenty-four rods of land in Ipswich, being part of that lot called Knowlton's lot, on the south side of the river, May 1, 1677. After Mr. Hovey's return to Ipswich, he sold one and one-half acres of plowing land lying on the south side of the river in Ipswich. Feb. 11, 1688-9. He also conveyed six acres and seventy-one square rods of pasture land in Ipswich April 23, 1680.\*\* He also conveyed one and one-half acres of plowing land in Ipswich, lying on the south side of the river, next to the lot last above described. Oct. 12, 1680,††

Mrs. Hovey died between 1676 and 1683. He died in Ipswich April 24, 1692. His will was proved Oct. 31, 1692.

Daniel Hovey2, born in Ipswich in 1642. He was a husbandman, and always lived in his native town. He was made a freeman March 11, 1673-4; and held several offices in the town. He was a fence viewer in 1671, having been chosen by the commoners and confirmed by the selectmen; a surveyor in 1671; a

tithing man in 1681; a constable in 1601 and 1603.

The selectmen of Ipswich granted to Mr. Hovey, Nov. 27, 1668, the right to fell trees for a house. This ancient Hovey house stood upon the south side of the river, and was burned July 17, 1894.1 It had been untenanted since 1877, its great chimney had been torn down, and the building used as a hay-barn. Over the front door were bull's eye panes of glass. The engraving on the opposite page is the most picturesque picture of the old house extant. It was made by E. Whitefield in 1888. The house had been owned by strangers for about half a century,

March 2, 1670-1, the selectmen granted to Daniel Hovey timber for a neb and axletree. Jan. 17, 1680, the selectmen granted him liberty to fell some more trees. In 1683, the town paid him three pounds and eighteen shillings "for fetching the

boat from ve Island."

Among the papers on file in the office of the clerk of courts at Salem, in the settlement of the estate of Thomas Andrews of Ipswich, the schoolmaster, is the following certificate of Daniel Hovev as to the heirs of the deceased:-

The only real estate transactions recorded in the registries of deeds in which Mr. Hovey was a party was a deed, dated May 3, 1694, by which he conveyed twenty acres of upland and salt marsh in Labor-in-vain field in Ipswich, on the south side of the town river, and six acres of pasture at Heartbreak hill on the south side of the river;\* and a conveyance from his brother Thomas of one acre of land in Labor-in-vain field in Ipswich, on south side of the river, March 23, 1694.†

Mr. Hovey married, first, Rebecca -, who died, on the day her son Daniel was born, May 24, 1665. He married, second, Esther, daughter of Thomas Treadwell of Ipswich Oct. 8, 1666.

Mr. Hovey died in Ipswich May 29, 1695, at about fifty-three years of age.

Thomas Hovey, the surviving executor of the will of Daniel Hovey, with his mother and his brothers and sisters, viz.: John Hovey, Ebenezer Hovey, Abigail Hodgkins, Mary Hovey and Thomas Hodgkins, all of Ipswich, conveyed a six-acre lot of pasture land in Ipswich, in Labor-in-vain field, on the north side of Heartbreak hill, June 28, 1607.\*

The same executor conveyed two acres of planting land in the same field, on the south side of the river, May 2, 1704;† and he also conveyed to his brother Ebenezer Hovey four acres of marsh on Barr island in Ipswich, bounded westerly by the river, July 20, 1704;‡ The same executor also conveyed to his brother John Hovey of Ipswich, weaver, five acres of salt marsh, pasture and planting ground in Ipswich, on the south side of the river, in Labor-in-vain field; one acre of marsh and upland (the upland being an island in said acre) in Labor-in-vain field; and four and one-half acres of marsh at Barr Island, on Plum Island, in Ipswich, April 18, 1705.§

The same executor, for twenty-one pounds, conveyed to Joseph Fuller of Ipswich, carpenter, three acres of upland or pasture in Labor-in-vain field in Ipswich, April 23, 1712.||

The same executor, for three pounds and ten shillings, conveyed to his brother John Hovey of Ipswich, weaver, half an acre of upland in Labor-in-vain field in Ipswich, Dec. 28. 1715.¶

Mrs. Esther Hovey survived her husband, and died in Ipswich, his widow, Jan. 4, 1730, at the age of ninety.

Serg. John Hovey<sup>2</sup>, born in Ipswich, Mass., in 1644. He lived in Ipswich until after 1667, and subsequently in Topsfield, on the farm which his father conveyed to him by deed June 13. 1671.\* The house was probably built before 1663, and was gone in 1709. He built a new house near the old site before the latter date, and lived in it. The new house measured forty feet long and twenty-six feet wide. Before 1789, the place had come into the ownership of Thomas Emerson, and while he owned it the house was burned on the night of Jan. 2, 1821, having caught fire from an oven.†

Mr. Hovey was a yeoman, and attained the rank of sergeant in the militia. He was prominent in town affairs, being tithing man in 1682; pounder, 1694; assessor, 1694; constable, 1672; treasurer, 1672; selectman, 1678, 1680, 1684, 1686, 1680 and 1602. He was a grandjuror in 1600, and representative to the general court in 1704. March 2, 1676-7, he was one of two chosen by the town to see to the mending of fences; in January, 1680, he was one of a committee chosen to treat with a new minister; March 1. 1680-1, he was chosen to view some land; March 10, 1680-1, he was chosen to erect a gallery in the meeting house; July 15, 1681, he was chosen one of two to inform Rev. Mr. Danforth of the invitation of the town to settle in the ministry in Topsfield; Sept. 1, 1681, he was chosen to view some land for the town; March 4. 1683-4, he was chosen one of a committee to lay out a highway from Rowley to Topsfield; April 22, 1684, he was chosen one of a committee to settle the town line with Ipswich; May 16, 1684, he was chosen one of a committee to provide for the ordination of

Rev. Joseph Capen; March 3, 1684-5, he was chosen with others to run the Salem line: March 2, 1685-6, he was chosen to lay out some land to Mr. Capen, and to renew the parsonage bounds; April 16, 1686, he was chosen to perambulate the Salem line; Jan. 25, 1686-7, he was chosen to repair the gallery in the meeting house; April 6, 1687, and Jan. 14, 1689-90, he was chosen to "seat" the meeting house; March 4, 1689-90, he was chosen one of a committee to settle the town line with Boxford; and March 7. 1692-3, he was chosen to view a highway, to lay out a highway, some land, etc.\*

Mr. Hovey was a man of property, being the sixth on the list of those assessed for the minister's rate in 1681, that is, there were only five men that paid a larger tax. There are a number of transactions in real estate on record, in which Mr. Hovey appears as a party. He bought, with several other men, Mr. Nelson's farm in Rowley Village (Boxford), containing two thousand acres, July 17, 1683.† Of this large tract of land which was situated in the northwestern corner of Boxford, being bounded by the Andover and Bradford lines, various divisions were made, Jan. 1, 1701-2,‡ Jan. 13, 1709-10.§ Feb. 13, 1709-10. One of the division deeds, dated Jan. 1, 1701-2, released to Mr. Hovey a lot on Rush pond, another on Walnut tree hill and on Maiden hill, on the Andover line and one on Philistine hill on the Bradford line; also, a part of rough meadow. The deed dated Jan. 13, 1709-10, released to Mr. Hovey a part of maple meadow on the Andover line and a part of long meadow.§ All the other deeds were releases in which Mr. Hovey joined as grantor.

Mr. Hovey bought four acres of meadow in Rowley great meadow Sept. 26, 1684.\*\* March 3, 1692-3, he conveyed twenty acres called the sticky meadow on the south side of Ipswich river, which his father had conveyed to him. †† Feb. 10, 1702-3, he conveyed seventeen acres of upland on the south side of the river between Smith's hill and round hill, and two and one-half acres on the same side of the river. 11 Feb. 10, 1702-3, he bought ninety-one acres of land in Boxford.§§ Jan. 24, 1703-4, he conveyed three and one-half acres in Fries' meadow in Boxford.|||

Aug. 28, 1706, he conveyed to his son Luke Hovey forty-three acres of upland and meadow in Boxford, on which Luke "has built and now dwells."\* March 7, 1706-7, he conveyed to his son John Hovey forty-nine acres in Boxford on the Andover line adjoining Philistine hill, and a part of maple meadow.† He also conveyed to his son John five acres of meadow and upland at rough meadow in Boxford Nov. 22, 1708.1 He conveyed to his sons John and Luke part of maple meadow in Boxford on Andover line and Wade's neck, Jan. 13, 1709-10.§ On the same day, he conveyed to his son Ivory thirty-two acres of upland and meadow in Topsfield, near his house, on Pye brook. March 26, 1715, for twenty pounds, he conveyed to his son Luke twenty-five acres in Boxford, known as the bush hill lot. March 14, 1717-8, fifteen days before his death, Mr. Hovey divided the remainder of his real estate among his sons John, Luke and Ivory. To his son Ivory he conveyed one hundred acres being the remaining part of his homestead farm in Topsfield with dwelling house, barn, etc.; also, one half of his common rights; land bought of Col. John Wainwright in Boxford (except fifteen acres he gave to his son John); one-half of his part of Rowley great meadow; and two-thirds of his marsh in Ipswich.\*\* He conveyed to his son Luke one hundred acres of upland and meadow in Boxford, being the remainder of the farm on which Luke then lived; also, part of long meadow; part of little rock meadow; and one-half of his remaining interest in the Nelson farm in Boxford.†† To his son John, "for ye Severall Duties that he Shall doe towards my maintainance if need Shall hereafter require & ve payment of his part of Severall portions to his Sisters & Cousens as he is bound as he is with his brethren to me st John Hovey Sent as appeareth more at large in a bond from him & his bretheren to me," he conveyed fifty acres of land lying between Andover line and Philistine hill and Walker's hill; also, twenty acres lying between Bradford line and Philistine hill to Walker's hill; "my share" in ash swamp; fifteen acres "I bought" of Col. John Wainwright lying on the road from Rowley to Boxford; one-half of "my part" of Rowley great meadow; one-half of "my interest" in the Nelson farm in Boxford; one-third of "my marsh" at Hovey's island in Ipswich; and "my land" in Topsfield next Baker's pond.11

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Mr. Hovey was administrator of the estate of his brother Joseph Hovey in 1693, and John howy the following is a copy of

his signature on his official bond:

March 18, 1717-8, Mr. Hovey, then called seventy years of age, testified relative to a certain salt house in Ipswich. This was only eleven days before his death, and his signature to the deposition is signed by mark: "Boo."\*

A week before his death, Mr. Hovey made his will, which was proved in the probate court April 7, 1718. The following is a copy of the will as it is recorded in the probate records,† the original not having been found:-

Mr. Hovey married, first, Dorcas Ivory Aug. 13, 1665; and she died there Nov. 5, 1711. He married, second, Mercy, widow of Dea. Joseph Goodhue of Ipswich (published in Ipswich, Nov. 30, 1712). Lt. Thomas Hovey<sup>2</sup> was born in Ipswich, Mass., in 1648, was one of the grantees of Quabog (now Brookfield), but did not settle there. He lived in Hadley as early as 1672, and was a yeoman and a prominent man in the town. He served as representative to the general court in 1699 and 1703; and was a lieutenant in the militia.

Joseph Barnard brought a suit against Mr. Hovey in the court held at Northampton March 25, 1672-3, for "unjust mo-

lestation."\*

Mr. Hovey was bound over by the commissioners of Hadley for resisting the constable of Hadley and fined twenty shillings in 1676.†

Mr. Hovey was admitted freeman in the court at Springfield, Mass., Sept. 27, 1681.‡ and was sworn in the court at Northamp-

ton March 28, 1682.§

Samuel Gardner, sr., brought a suit against Mr. Hovey about

some pork in the court at Northampton March 27, 1683.

Mr. Hovey was a party to several real estate transactions on record, and probably there are others that are not recorded. He bought of Thomas Dickinson of Hadley, for ninety pounds, Mr. Dickinson's homestead, of house and eight acre lot and other land April 22, 1679.¶ He also, bought eight and one-half acres of land in Hoccanum meadow in Hadley of Caleb Watson of Hartford, Conn., Oct. 10, 1680.¶

March 23, 1694, he conveyed one and one-half acres of land in Labor-in-vain field on the south side of the river in Ipswich, bounded by land of his father, etc.,\*\* and on the same day he conveyed to his brother Daniel Hovey one acre of land in the Labor-in-vain field on the south side of the river in Ipswich, bounded by his father's estate, etc.†† Oct. 18, 1697, with Daniel Hovey of Ipswich, carpenter, he conveyed Hovey's island of

Mr. Hovey bought of James Smith, who had removed from Hadley to Haddam, Conn., a house and eight-acre lot of land in Hadley Jan. 23, 1705-6.†

Oct. 28, 1707, Mr. Hovey deposed in reference to land his

Mr. Hovey again deposed, Feb. 17, 1712-3, as to bounds of the land his father bought of Deacon Lumpkin, that "his land was at ye End of a great oake tree which formerly stood by a Swamp Side beyond a little Pond hole northeasterly from the place where John Hovey Jun his dwelling house in Topsfield now is weh Tree is now fallen down." Feb. 13, 1722-3, was recorded another deposition of Mr. Hovey relative to the farm of his father, lying upon Pye brook in Topsfield, that he saw possession of it given to his father, and that it extended to Baker's pond.

For ninety pounds, Mr. Hovey conveyed an old common right in Ipswich, which had been granted to his father Feb. 14 1664, and also other rights granted Feb. -, 1678, Jan. 25, 1702-3. and March 29, 1728. He also conveyed to his grandson Thomas Austin of Suffield land in Hadley, on the south side of Mount Holyoke, Jan. 8, 1728-9,\*\* He and his wife's brother Westwood Cook of Hadley released to each other, June 27, 1730. one hundred and sixteen acres of land in Hadley that had been laid out to them.††

Mr. Hovey married Sarah, daughter of Capt. Aaron and Sarah (Westwood) Cook Nov. -, 1677. She was born in Hadley Jan. 31, 1662; and she was his wife in 1734. He died March 4. 1730, at the age of ninety-one. His remains lie in the old burial place in Hadley, and his gravestone is inscribed as follows:

James Hoven, born in Ipswich, Mass., in 1650. He was one of the first settlers of Quabog, in Hampshire county, Mass., in 1668, and received a grant of a homelot, upon which he built a house and lived.

He married Priscilla, daughter of John Dane of Ipswich in 1670.

Mr. Hovey was one of the signers of the petition to the general court dated Oct. 10, 1673, praying for the incorporation of the settlement, and that it might receive the name of Brookfield.

The following is a copy of Mr. Hovey's signature to this

petition:

The request was granted, and Quabog became a town, its name being changed to Brookfield.

Mr. Hovey was killed by the Indians, when a considerable number of his townsmen were massacred, Aug. 2, 1675.

Mr. Hovey's wife Priscilla survived him; and she returned to the court an inventory which was taken Sept. 25, 1676. She was appointed administratrix. The inventory states that "Only ye land at Brookfeild by Reafon of ye Indian wars & the Defolation at her dispofe for the bringing up of the Children & when they Come to age to be devided amongst yem according to law." For nine pounds, he conveyed four and a half acres of marsh on Plum island, at Bar island, April 3, 1705;\* and, for eight pounds, he bought forty rods of land on the north side of the mill river in Ipswich, next to the land his shop then stood on, June 16, 1708.† For five pounds, he conveyed lot 294 in Chebacco woods, Dec. 11, 1712;‡ and, for twenty-one shillings, he conveyed twenty-one rods of land in Labor-in-vain field, being part of his pasture, Dec. 28, 1712.§ For eighteen shillings, he conveyed his new thatch lot of half an acre at "holl island" in Ipswich, being lot 317, on the south side of Rowley river, March 25, 1714; and, for three pounds, he conveyed his new upland lot 44, at Jeffries' neck, in Ipswich, containing sixty rods, and being on Manning's hill, Jan. 12, 1715.

In exchange for other land, he bought of his brother Thomas Hovey ten acres of marsh and upland in Ipswich, on the west side

of Labor-in-vain creek, March 20, 1718.\*\*

With his brother Thomas Hovey, he bought of his nephew Nathaniel Hovey, the latter's interest in the dwelling house of the latter's deceased father, in Ipswich, on the south side of the river, April 8, 1718;†† and, on the same day, the said Nathaniel also conveyed to his said uncles his interest in the estate of his grandfather Daniel Hovev.11

Mr. Hovey married Mehitable Safford of Ipswich May 25, 1702; and died, "at his house in Ipswich," Aug. 17, 1720, aged thirty-five. His remains lie buried in the ancient cemetery at Ipswich, and his gravestone bears the following inscription:-

His brother Thomas Hovey, for rent of twenty-two shillings and six pence yearly payable to his mother, conveyed to the heirs of the deceased a right of way to his marsh Jan. 26, 1721.\*

John Hovey's widow, as his administratrix, for one hundred and thirty-six pounds, conveyed thirteen acres of tillage, pasture and marsh land in Labor-in-vain field in Ipswich which belonged to the estate of the deceased, April 17, 1722.\*

Mr. Hovey's daughter Mehitable, wife of James Moulton of Ipswich, conveyed to her brother Samuel Hovey her interest in her father's real estate, particularly in his homestead of a quarter of an acre, with the house and barn thereon, and a common right in Bush hill and at Birch island, in Ipswich, Ian. 7, 1733-4.†

His daughter Sarah and her husband, Bartholomew Pearson of Newbury, for twenty-seven pounds, conveyed her interest in the estate of her father to her brother Samuel March 25, 1734.†

Mr. Hovey's widow married, secondly, Ebenezer Browne of Rowley (published April 7, 1722). They apparently had no children; and he died in April, 1733, having devised to her half of his real estate, besides bequeathing to her all of his personal property. She married, thirdly, Lt. Jacob Perley of Boxford (published June 24, 1733). She died in Bradford in 1754, being the widow of Mr. Perley, who had died in the spring of 1751, in Bradford, where they then dwelt. Administration upon her estate was granted to her son Samuel Hovey March 23, 1754.

The children of John and Mehitable (Safford) Hovey were born in Ipswich as follows:-

EBENEZER HOVEY<sup>8</sup>, born in Ipswich, Mass., Jan. 11, 1680. He was a weaver, fisherman and yeoman, and lived in his native town. He was possessed of considerable property, and was a party to a number of real estate transactions.

Mr. Hovey bought a house and barn and half an acre of land in Ipswich, on the south side of Town river, Feb. 16, 1703-4.§ He,also, bought of his brother Thomas Hovey, surviving executor of Daniel Hovey, sr., of Ipswich, planter, deceased, for eight pounds, four acres of marsh in Ipswich, on Barr island, lying on the easterly side of the river, July 20, 1704. when he is called a laborer; and, also, two acres of tillage land in Labor-in-vain field in Ipswich April 30, 1708. He bought six acres of land in Labor-in-vain field, in Ipswich, Oct. 22, 1708;\*\* and on the same day sold two acres of land in the same field.††

For one hundred pounds, he conveyed his house and homestead, in Ipswich, "where I now live," and half an acre of land on the southeast side of the Town river, northwest side of the highway, and southwesterly side of "ye proprietors' land of ye wharfe"; and also six acres of pasture and tillage land in Laborin-vain field in Ipswich Sept. 20, 1714.‡‡

He mortgaged to his brother John Hovey and Thomas Hodgkins four acres of salt marsh at Barr island on Plum island:

For six pounds, he sold an upland lot on Jeffries' neck in

Ipswich, May 16, 1724.

Mr. Hovey was apparently not prominent in town affairs. He was a corder of wood, a town officer, in 1711 and until 1715.

He was engaged in fishing to a slight extent, having bought a small schooner the winter before his decease. His sons also became fishermen.

The following is a copy of his autograph, taken from his signature to a bond dated 1718:

Mr. Hovey married Elizabeth, daughter of Thomas and Grace (Searle) Dennis of Ipswich (published July 23, 1704) in 1704. When her father died, in 1706, he bequeathed to her one hundred pounds. A pillow-case possessed by her, having been spun, woven and sewed by her mother and embroidered with the maker's initials, is in the possession of Rev. Augustine Caldwell of Eliot, Me., a descendant of Mrs. Hovey.

Mr. Hovey died in Ipswich Aug. 8, 1720, at the age of fortynine. His attending physician was Dr. Thomas Berry of Ipswich. His widow and their son Ebenezer Hovey were appointed administrators of the estate Dec. 22, 1720; and they duly returned the following inventory to the court:—

For eleven pounds, he bought two and three-quarters acres of land in Topsfield, being the first lot of the second division, "at or near the place called Wintrops Hills," and bounded on the northeast by the Ipswich line, Dec. 2, 1724. For six pounds, two shillings and six pence, he bought one and three-quarters acres. being the second lot in the above-mentioned division, May I, 1724.

Mr. Hovey was a husbandman all his life. He married, first. Mary, daughter of Michael and Mary Dwinnell of Topsfield Jan. 11, 1601-2. She was born in Topsfield Jan. 21, 1668-9. She died there May 7, 1737, at the age of sixty-eight. He married, second, Mary Abbot of Ipswich March 8, 1737-8; and she was living in 1743. He died in Topsfield May 31, 1751.

Ens. Luke Hovey3, born in Topsfield May 3, 1676. Mr. Hovey lived in Topsfield until 1700, when he settled in Boxford. On the land of his father, he built a house for himself across the road from the present residence of John M. Pearl on the northern shore of Mitchell's pond in the West parish of Boxford, where an ancient cellar now marks the site. It is said that he and his wife spent the last few years of their lives at the old Hovey house which formerly stood near the brook on the west side of the highway between the houses of I. Warren Chadwick and the late Asa Kimball, nearly on the opposite side of the pond from the house he first built.

Mr. Hovey married Susannah, daughter of Moses and Susannah (Worth) Pillsbury of Newbury Oct. 25, 1608. She was born in Newbury Feb. 1, 1677.

He was a husbandman; and held several offices in the town, being one of the selectmen in 1708, 1709, 1719, 1736, 1743 and 1748. He was, also, ensign in the militia.

His father conveyed to him forty-three acres of land and meadow in Boxford, on the northeast side of Mitchell's pond, including the sites of the two houses he had built. Aug. 28, 1706.\* It was bounded on the southwest by the pond, north and east by the two roads, and on the southeast by the brook.

His father also conveyed to him and his brother John Hovey his part of maple meadow on Andover town line, in Boxford, Jan. 13, 1709-10.† Mr. Hovey bought, for eleven pounds, thirteen shillings and six pence, three acres of meadow "known as Mr. Jewet's five-acre piece that is excepted out of Mr. Nelson's farm,' March 9, 1714-5.1 His father, for twenty pounds, also conveyed to him twenty-five acres of land in Boxford, known as the Bush hill lot, March 26, 1715; and, also, in consideration of love and a bond, one hundred acres of upland and meadow in Boxford, part of the farm Luke was living on; also, his undivided land in Mr. Nelson's two thousand acres, March 14, 1717-8.

For twenty pounds, Mr. Hovey sold three acres of meadow in Mr. Jewett's five acres that were excepted out of Mr. Nelson's farm, Sept. 14, 1722.\* For fifty pounds, he bought ten acres of upland in Boxford March 2, 1730-1.† With his brother John Hovey he conveyed eleven acres of land in Boxford in three deeds, Aug. 8, 1733.‡ For love, he conveyed to his three sons, Luke, Joseph and Abijah, his interest in Walker's meadow in Boxford, March 8, 1748.§ With others, he bought a thatch bank ou the long island in Parker river, Newbury, July 3, 1750.] He bought sixty acres of land in Oxford Jan. 6, 1723-4.¶

Mr. Hovey died Oct. 31, 1751, at the age of seventy-five. His remains lie buried in the ancient burial place in West Box-

Captain Hovey was the commander of the miltary company of the town and deacon of the church in Topsfield from his election, Dec. 2, 1735, until his death. He was constable and treasurer of Topsfield in 1718 and 1729-1738, and selectman in 1720, 1721, 1728 and 1736.

In 1747, he wrote the following letter to his son Ivory and his wife:--

Mr. Hovey left a will which is on file in the office of the probate court at Salem, and the following is a copy of it:—

In the division of the real estate, Nov. 14, 1732, a houselot in Hadley, with the orchard, a lot in the East swamp in Sunderland, and a lot in a division known as Pasture lots were assigned to his daughter Mary; two adjoining lots of land in the South field in Sunderland, in the third division of plowing land, a lot in the second division of plowing land in the South field in Sunderland, and a lot in the division known as the flag swamp, were assigned to his daughter Hannah; and one-half of the homelot in Sunderland, one-half of the barn, one lot in the little meadow,

Mr. Barstow represented that his wife's mother had become non compos mentis, by reason of age and infirmity, Nov. 4, 1755; and several persons certified "that She is no ways Capable to mannage any Affair fhe is reduced to Nothing and will hear no more to Reason than the Seat fhe fits on and is a Woman of the Profanest Language as Can be uttered with Tongue and it is her Common Practice to wish the Divil would fetch them away alive and would be heartily Igdal if y\* House was of a Light fire & they shut in meaning her son & Daughter: this the Neighbourhood Dayly hear as they are Providentially in there," Jan. 10, 1756.

Her daughter Martha said that she had nursed her mother

from 1740 to the year 1745.

The inventory of the estate of Mrs. Hovey amounted to \$326, os., rod. Mr. Hovey was a carpenter, and lived in Ipswich, where he held several minor offices, until 1722, when he removed to Oxford. Mass.

While he was living in Ipswich, with Thomas Hovey of Hadley he sold Hovey's island, of twenty acres of upland and salt marsh on Sagamore Hill creek, in Ipswich, Oct. 18, 1697;\* with his brother James and sister Priscilla, he conveyed to Benoni Morse of Dedham, farmer, for eight pounds, thirty acres of upland and meadow in Brookfield July 7, 1703;† and, for forty shillings, he sold his old thatch lot at Chebacco in Ipswich, 471. of about one acre, June 15, 1715;‡

Mr. Hovey was called a yeoman Feb. 12, 1718-9, when he bought, for sixteen pounds, seven and one-half acres of salt marsh on the north side of Plum Island river. This was prob-

ably in Ipswich.

He conveyed, for twenty-eight pounds, an old right on Jeffries Neck July 8, 1721.

He bought of Ebenezer Learned of Oxford, yeoman, fifty acres of swamp and upland, lying between Long and Flat hills, partly on both, in Oxford, and half an acre in the great meadow, Feb. 11, 1722.¶ For thirty-four pounds, he conveyed one-half acre of his old division in the south-eighths, March 26, 1722.\*\*
He bought of Samuel Barton of Oxford, yeoman, a fifty-acre lot of land on Long hill, in Oxford, April 4, 1722.†† and on the same day he bought of David Town of Oxford, yeoman, twelve acres of upland on Long hill.‡† Two days later, he bought of Philip Amidown of Oxford, cooper, lot 10 in the great cedar swamp in Oxford Village.§§

After his removal to Oxford, when he is called a yeoman, for twenty-three pounds, he sold seven and a half acres of marsh on Plum Island river, in Ipswich, Dec. 27, 1725;|||| and, for sixty-three pounds, he conveyed to Joseph Pratt of Oxford, husbandman, twenty-five acres of land on Long hill, in Oxford Village, Jan. 9, 1734-5.¶¶ By deed, he gave to his son, Daniel Hovey, eighty-seven acres of land in Oxford Village on Long and Flat hills, April 7, 1735;\*\*\* and, on the same day, to his son James Hovey one-half of his farm, "whereon I now dwell," and

one-half of his right in the great cedar swamp in Oxford.\*

March 25, 1736, for three pounds, he conveyed land in Oxford Village to Joseph Rocket of Oxford, husbandman;† and, on the same day, for a similar consideration, he bought of Mr. Rocket land in Oxford Village.‡

The farm he bought in Oxford, on Long hill, was occupied by him and his descendants for more than a hundred years.

Mr. Hovev was one of the selectmen of Oxford in 1726 and 1727; and a deacon of the church from 1729 until his death.

Mr. Hovey married Mercy - in or before 1697; and died March 7, 1741-2, at about seventy years of age. She survived him, and died, his widow, March 30, 1743.

Their children were born in Ipswich as follows:-

-(dau.)\*, born May 29, 1695; probably died young. Mercy\*, born May 10, 1698; married, first, Thomas, son of Thomas Gleason of Sudbury, as his second wife, June 10, 108-11. 1729. PRISCILLA\*, born June 16, 1709; married, as his third wife, David, son of John and Mary (Smith) Town of Oxford Dec. 28, 1737. He was born in Topsfield, where he was baptized Oct. I I I --- V. 29, 1693. Mr. Town had married, first, Mercy Barton of Oxford Dec. 31, 1716; and she died Dec. 3, 1730, aged thirty-seven, having had three children. He married, second, Sarah Town lived in Oxford, where his children were born. The only child of himself and his wife Priscilla (Hovey) was, 1. Priscilla, born March 7, 1740; married Jacob Thompson (published May 21, 1768).

I12---VI. JAMES\*, born 14: 7: 1712; was a husbandman; and lived in Oxford, where he was a constable in 1750. His father gave to him, by deed, one-half of his farm and one-half of his right

in the great cedar swamp, in Oxford, April 7, 1735;\* and he conveyed it to David Town of Oxford, husbandman, Sept. 9, 1740;† James Hovey and his father then lived upon the farm. David Town of Oxford, yeoman, for three pounds, sold to him fifty acres of land in Oxford Sept. 9, 1740;‡ For one hundred and sixty pounds, he sold fifty acres of land in Oxford to Israel Whitney of Oxford, cordwainer, April 17,141;§ and bought of Benjamin Davis of Oxford, husbandman, for one hundred and seventy-five pounds, forty acres of land in Oxford, Dec. 7, 1741. [] With his mother, his sister. Mercy Gleason, and brother Daniel Hovey, he released to David Town of Oxford, husbandman, the real estate of his father, April 2, 1742;¶ and thus the paternal farm came into the possession of Mr. Town. For seventeen shillings, Mr. Hovey also conveyed to Benjamin Davis five and one-half acres of land in Oxford, Nov. 23, 1742.

Mr. Hovey married Rebecca, daughter of Joseph and Hannah (Chamberlain) Rockett of Oxford April 1, 1740. She was born in Oxford Dec. 4, 1716. He died in Oxford May 1, 1752, at the age of thirty-nine, childless. She sur-

vived him.

The following is a copy of Mr. Hovey's will:-

I James Hovey of Oxford in ye County of Worcester in the Province of the Massachusetts Bay in New England yeoman labouring often under Bodily Indispessitions and weeknesses: Do make this my last will & Testiment as follows viz: First & principally I commit my Soul into the thro' the merrits Death & passion, and prevailing in his mercy thro' the merrits Death & passion, and prevailing intercession of Jesus Christ my Lord & Saviour, and my Body, I desire may be decently interred at the Discretion of my Executor's hereafter named, in faith of the Resurrection of it at ye Last Day, and as Touching such Temporal estate as God hath betrusted me with (after my Just debts & funeral charges are paid) I will & bequeath ye same as follows, That is to say. Imprimis I give and bequeath unto my beloved wife Rebeccah Hovey all my personal and moveable estate whatsoever & wheresoever (excepting wearing apparell & arms) to be Disposed of as she pleaseth after my Just Debts & funeral charges are paid; I also give & bequeath unto my sd wife Rebecca Hovey all that piece of meadow which I bought of Seth Twitchel lying in the great meadow, & two acres & a half more lying on the Southermost part of my other right of meadow, lying in the uper end of the sd Great meadow, to be to her, her heirs & assigns forever. Moreover, I give and be queath unto said wife Rebeccah Hovey, the free uses im-

JAMES HOVEY8, born in Brookfield, Mass., in 1674. He was a weaver, and lived in Malden, Mass., until the summer of 1716. when he removed to Mansfield, Conn., where he was afterward a veoman. He joined with his brother Daniel and sister Priscilla in conveying to Benoni Morse of Dedham, farmer, for eight pounds, thirty acres of upland and meadow in Brookfield, adjoining land laid out to Daniel Hovey, July 7, 1703.\* He joined his wife and her sister, Mary, widow of John Chadwick of Bradford, in conveying to Thomas Pratt of Charlestown, boatman, for fifty pounds, a five-acre lot and one-half of a three-acre lot of upland, lying on the north side of the country road, and half of an acre lot of fresh meadow on the south side of the country road, all of it being in Charlestown, May 10, 1715.† Mr. Hovey sold his interest in seven acres of land in Charlestown, on Spot Pond brook, near Spot Pond mill, up stream, for seven pounds. May 5, 1716.‡ He conveyed his homestead of fifteen acres of land and five and one-half acres of woodland in Malden, for two hundred and twenty pounds, June 8, 1716; and a week later he bought of Bowley Arnold of Mansfield, Conn., one hundred acres of land in Mansfield.|| Oct. 8, 1716, for three pounds and ten shillings, he bought of Jonathan Roode of Mansfield, husbandman, other land in Mansfield. Feb. 6, 1716-7, he bought of Israel Foulsham one hundred acres of land in Mansfield.\*\* For

love he conveyed to his son James Hovey, jr., fifty acres of land on Mount Hope river, being a part of the one hundred acres bought of Bowley Arnold.\* Jan. 25, 1721-2, for love, he conveyed to his son Edmond Hovey between forty and fifty acres of the one hundred acres he bought of Israel Foulsham.† April 25, 1722, he exchanged with Thomas Storrs of Mansfield, husbandman, eight acres of land and meadow in Mansfield for seven acres of land, in Mansfield, on Mount Hope river. Sept. 28 1722, for love, he conveyed to his son John Hovey forty acres of land, being part of the one hundred acres he bought of Bowley Arnold; and, for love, he conveyed to his son Daniel Hovey fifty acres of land in Mansfield Feb. 16, 1732-3.

Mr. Hovey married Deborah, daughter of Edmund and Mary (Pemberton) Barlow of Charlestown about 1694; and she died in Mansfield May 15, 1749. He probably died in the spring

of 1760, as his will was proved May 6, 1760.

The following is an exact copy of his will, taken from the original instrument on file in the probate office at Willimantic, Conn.:-

JOSEPH HOVEY8, born in Hadley, Mass., Feb. 28, 1677-8. Upon his marriage, in 1702, he settled in Cambridge, being a cooper by trade. Dec. 15, 1704, he mortgaged the estate known as the Sign of the Blue Anchor,\* though his deed from the heirs of the former owner Capt. Jonathan Remington of Cambridge, deceased, viz.; his widow, Martha Remington, and children, Jonathan Remington of Harvard college, gent., Martha Remington, jr., Hannah Remington, Elizabeth Remington and Sarah Remington, is dated May 12, 1705.† This ancient tavern was situated near what was then the market place, and included the house and other buildings and land. It was then bounded on the south side by the "Lane that leads from the market place Towards Cooks Pond," and on the west side by "the Queens highway leading to the College." Mr. Hovey conducted the inn for about five years; and, April 1, 1709, conveyed the estate, for one hundred and forty-five pounds, to his brother John Hovey of Charlestown, baker.1

July 13, 1711, Joseph Hovey joined with others of the heirs of his grandfather Daniel Hovey, sr., of Ipswich, deceased, in

conveying, for twelve pounds, one hundred rods of upland lying

in Ipswich, on the southeasterly side of the highway.\*

When he is called a laborer, Feb. 11, 1725-6, Mr. Hovey and his wife released a claim against Amos Marrit, sr., of Cambridge, yeoman.† This Amos Marritt was probably Mrs. Hovey's father.

When he is called a cooper, Aug. 29, 1729, he bought, for seventy pounds, a messuage in Cambridge, situated near the school house on the north side of Town street; and, Aug. 24, 1730, he mortgaged the same property for sixty pounds.§

Mr. Hovey married Mary Marret of Cambridge Dec. 10, 1702; and she was his wife a third of a century. He died in the

late summer of 1735, at the age of fifty-seven.

The following is a copy of his will, transcribed from the original instrument on file in the probate office at Cambridge:-

Mrs. Hovey survived her husband, and married, secondly, Nathaniel Parker of Newton, yeoman, Jan. 27, 1736-7. Mr. Hovey's mansion house and homestead, containing a quarter of an acre, were conveyed, under power to her given in his will, for

Mr. Parker died before 1758; and his wife survived him. She lived in Newton; and when she made her will, June 25, 1758, she said that she was then "well stricken in years." Her will was filed in court March 20, 1758, but was not proved until July 10, 1761. The original instrument is on file in the probate office at Cambridge. In it she gave her property to her Hovey children. The inventory of her estate amounted to fifteen pounds, four shillings and nine pence, being personal estate.

DEA. EBENEZER HOVEY3, born in Hadley Nov. 5, 1680. He was called a blacksmith in 1706, but subsequently was a yeoman. He settled in Weymouth as early as 1703, and ever afterward lived there. His wife and himself, for ten pounds and ten shillings, released to her brother Joseph Benson of Hull, cordwainer, all their interest in the real estate of her father (who had deceased), in Hull, Jan. 2, 1706.\* June 5, 1710, Mr. Hovey sold, for ninety pounds, to Nathaniel Searle of Weymouth twenty-five acres of land on the north side of the highway in that town. With his brothers he conveyed, for twelve pounds, one hundred rods of upland in Ipswich on the southeasterly side of the highway, July 13, 1711.1 For three hundred and eighty pounds, Mr. Hovey conveyed to Thomas Hunt of Weymouth, yeoman, fifty acres of land in Weymouth, called the Pond plain, on the south side of Pond river, April 18, 1739; and on the same day, for one hundred and fifty pounds, he conveyed to Nathaniel White of Weymouth, gentleman, six acres of land in Weymouth, on the east side of the river.

Mr. Hovey married, first, Joanna, daughter of Joseph Benson of Hull about 1702; and she died in Weymouth March 26, 1735. He married, second, widow Sarah King of Norton Nov.

13, 1735; and she was his wife in 1744.

Deacon Hovey made his will July 9, 1744, and the following is an exact transcript of the instrument on file in the probate court office in Boston:—

In the Name of God Amen, this Ninth day of July A. D. 1744: I Ebenezer Hovey of weymouth in the County of Surfolle. & Province: of the Mafachufitts Bay in New England yeoman being very Sick & Weak in Body, but of perfect Mind and Memory, thanks be given to God: therefore calling unto Mind the Mortality of my Body and knowing that it is appointed for all men once to Dye, do Make and Ordain this my laft Will & Teftament, that is to fay, Principally and first of all I give and Recommend my Soul into the hands of God that gave it; and my Body I Recommend to the Earth to be Buried in decent Christian Burial at the discretion of by Executor; nothing doubting but at the General Refurrection I Shall Receive that Same again by the mighty Power of God, and as touching Such worldly Estate wherewith it hath pleafed God to Blefs me in this Life, I give demite and dispose of Same in the following Manner and form.

JOHN HOVEY8, born in Hadley, Mass., Aug. 21, 1684. He was a resident of Cambridge, Mass., at an early age, being a baker. He bought of his brother Joseph Hovey the old Blue Anchor tavern, on the corner of Dunster (?) and Mt. Auburn

streets, in Cambridge, for one hundred and forty-five pounds, April I, 1709,\* when he is called of Charlestown. He afterward conducted the tavern.

Mr. Hovey joined with his brother in conveying, for twelve pounds, to Rev. John Emerson of New Castle, N. H., one hundred rods of upland in Ipswich, on the southeasterly side of the

highway, July 13, 1711.†

May 6, 1714, Mr. Hovey bought of John Stedman of Cambridge, tailor, for one hundred and eighty-nine pounds, thirty-one and one-half acres of land on the southwest side of Charles river, and northwest side of the road leading towards Roxbury: and, May 22, 1714, when he is called a yeoman, he conveyed, for fifteen pounds, one and one-half acres of marsh in Cambridge to Richard Ward of Newton.

Mr. Hovey married Abiel Watson of Cambridge in 1706. She was born about 1687. He died Sept. 13, 1714, at the age of thirty. The following is a copy of the inscription on his grave-

stone in the old burial ground at Harvard square:-

Here Lves Buried The Bodv IOHN HOVEY Aged 30 Years 1 Month and 3 Weekes Decafed September The 13th 1714

Mr. Hovey's estate was valued at £389, os, 8d. The real estate included house, barn, etc. The house is mentioned as having a hall, kitchen, parlor, hall chamber, kitchen chamber, parlor chamber and garrets. The real estate was assigned by the probate court to the eldest son John Hovey. The widow was ap-

pointed administratrix of the estate Dec. 10, 1715.

Mrs. Hovey married, secondly, Edmund Angier of Cambridge April 9, 1717; and he died in Cambridge April 24, 1724. at the age of thirty-nine. She married, thirdly, Isaac Watson of Cambridge Aug. 27, 1725; and he perished in the conflagration of his dwelling house Feb. 25, 1741, at the age of fifty-four. She died, in Cambridge, his widow, Sept. 18, 1753, at the age of sixty-six.

Mrs. Hovey and her then husband, Isaac Watson of Cambridge, yeoman, for thirty pounds, conveyed to her son John Hovey of Cambridge her interest in the estate of her deceased

For fifty pounds, Mr. and Mrs. Watson released her interest in thirty acres of land which had belonged to the estate of

John Hovey, her first husband, Nov. 12, 1736.†

John Hovey, for seventy pounds, also bought the interest of his brother James Hovey of Plymouth, joiner, in the real and personal estate of his father and also of his brother Thomas Hovey, Nov. 1, 1737.‡

His wife Lydia died Feb. 23, 1771, at the age of fifty-five; and the

Mr. Hovey married, thirdly, Mrs. Margaret Connel (Correll?) of Boston (published Sept. 24, 1774); and she died at Boston in 1787.

Mr. Hovey settled in Cambridge in 1733; was a carpenter and joiner there from 1733 to 1742; and a preacher from 1742 to 1750. He was afterward a clerk for Edward and J. Winslow. He died in Plymouth Jan. 7, 1781, at the age of sixty-eight; and his remains lie by the side of the Pilgrim fathers on Burying hill, the inscription on his gravestone being as follows:—

In Memory of JAMES HOVEY, Esq<sup>r</sup> who died Jan<sup>r</sup> y<sup>e</sup> 7<sup>th</sup> 1781 in y<sup>e</sup> 72<sup>d</sup> year of his Age.

He had no children.

July 13, 1711, he joined with his brothers in conveying one hundred rods of land in Ipswich, for twelve pounds, to Rev. John Emerson of New Castle, N. H.\* May 9, 1717, he and his wife Elizabeth and John Brintnal of Charlestown, tanner, and wife Deborah, divided between their wives eight acres of land and the house and barn thereon, one and one-half acres of fresh meadow, and one and one-half acres of salt marsh and upland, all situated in Charlestown, which had been left to them by their fathers John and William Mellins, both of Charlestown, mariners, deceased:† and on the same day Mr. and Mrs. Hovey conveyed to Mr. and Mrs. Brintnal their (James and Elizabeth) share of that estate.1

For twenty-eight pounds, he bought two acres of land in Malden Dec. 1, 1722.8 He bought ten acres of upland and salt marsh in Charlestown, lying on the north side of the country highway, April 6, 1724. For one hundred and twenty pounds, he bought of John Townsend of Charlestown, sadler, eight acres of land, in Charlestown, in two lots, one being on the east side of the country road, and the other being salt marsh. Feb. 24, 1724. Sept. 1, 1753, for three hundred and thirty-three pounds, he bought of John Shute of Malden, yeoman, and others house and barn and eight acres of land on which they stood, lying on the north side of the country road; sixteen acres of orchard, marsh and upland, lying on the south side of the country road, and north side of the mill pond; one-half acre on the south side of the country road; twelve acres of woodland in the great swamp; and ten acres of woodland, lying on the north side of a road; all being situated in Malden. Daniel Hovey4, born in Ipswich, Mass., Oct. 29, 1701. He was a cooper, and lived in Boxford until the winter of 1741-2. when he married and settled in Bradford, having bought, for one hundred and ninety-five pounds, one and one-half acres of land, with the buildings thereon, in Bradford, Nov. 25, 1741.\* He lived in Bradford six years; and, then removed to Sutton, selling his estate in Bradford for three hundred pounds, July 2, 1747.7

Mr. Hovey bought of Daniel Chase, jr., of Sutton, husbandman, for one hundred and six pounds, thirteen shillings and four pence, fifty acres of land with a house and barn thereon, in Sutton, Aug. 26, 1754.1 This estate was situated in the northwesterly part of the town, now included in Oxford; and June 4. 1772, with his wife, he conveyed the same estate, valued at that time at two hundred and thirty pounds, to his son Moses Hovey. The property was conveyed upon condition that Moses support his parents as long as they lived, and pay certain sums of money to his brothers Daniel and Benjamin and sisters Anna and Mary.

Samuel Hovey\*, born in Ipswich, Mass., and baptized there 8: 2: 1711. He was at first a house-carpenter, and lived in the Rowley part of Byfield parish until after the death of his wife; removing to Mendon in 1754.

He was a grantee, in the right of Caleb Kimball, of Narraganset No. 1 in 1735, and a prominent promoter of the settlement of that town, which became Buxton. The meetings of the proprietors were held at Newbury-falls (Byfield) for many years, and Mr. Hovey was a usual attendant. April 11, 1739, he was chosen one of the committee to build a meeting house for the new town; and, June 20, 1774, a member of the committee chosen to draw up resolves for the town.

For one hundred and eighty-two pounds, he sold a quarter of an acre of land, lying on the north side of Ipswich river, in Ipswich, that John Hovey of Ipswich, deceased, bought of Thomas Safford, Dec. 25, 1734.\* For fifty pounds, he sold a new common right in Bush hill eighths in Ipswich, being part of his father's new common right, March 22, 1735.† He purchased of his sister Mary Hovey, for forty pounds, her fifth interest in the estate of her father, particularly the homestead, one-fourth of an acre of land, house, farm, etc., also the new common right in Bush hill and at Birch island at Ipswich, Nov. 4, 1735.‡ For eleven pounds and four shillings, he bought of his sister Mary Hovey, he being

called a yeoman, two acres of land, in Rowley, near his house,

Nov. 29, 1754.\*

Mr. Hovey immediately removed to Mendon, in 1754, and became a weaver. Feb. 10, 1755, while living in Mendon, he bought, for fifty-three pounds, thirteen shillings and four pence, a house and some land in Rowley (in that part of the town which is now Georgetown), on the southwest side of Pentucket pond, between the pond and the road; † and went there to live. Aug. 22, 1755, for twenty-six pounds, thirteen shillings and four pence, he sold the house and land to John Adams.‡

Upon his second marriage, in 1757, he again became a resident of Byfield parish. Jan. 27, 1759, being of Rowley and a stay-maker, for fifty-two pounds, he sold seven and one-half acres of land in Rowley, in Byfield parish, lying on the south side of the road "that leads to Andover spring," with the house, barn

and orchard thereon.§

Mr. Hovey then removed to Cape Elizabeth, Me., where he resumed his trade of a housewright. He was of Falmouth in 1768; and, Dec. 13, 1768, when he is called of Cape Elizabeth, he bought of John Boynton six rods of land in Buxton, at the Lower corner.

Mr. Hovey removed to the new town, in which he was so much interested, Narraganset No. 1, in York county, now Buxton, Me., and again became a yeoman, before 1770. For sixty pounds, he sold six and three-fourths acres of land in the westerly part of Newbury and a right in a township bordering on Androscoggin river and New Gloucester, granted to the proprietors of Baker's town, etc., Sept. 28, 1770.\ Nov. 13, 1772, when he called himself a weaver, he sold, for eighteen pounds, six acres in Penny Ordinary pasture, in Newbury, that had been set off to his son John Hovey as a part of his share in the estates of Benjamin Ilsley and Sarah Ilsley of Newbury, deceased (probably parents of Mr. Hovey's first wife). || For twenty-nine pounds, six shillings and eight pence, he sold five and a half acres of marsh in Newbury, set off to John Hovey, as stated above, Nov. 8, 1773. For six pounds, he sold two acres of marsh in Newbury, lying on the north side of Rowley great creek, Nov. 12, 1774.\*\*

Mr. Hovey married, first, Mary, daughter of Joseph, jr., and Hannah (Pike) Ilsley, of Newbury Sept. 15, 1732. She was born

Mr. Hovey married, second, Lydia Langley of Chelmsford May 24, 1757, in Chelmsford. He died in Buxton in 1786, at the age of seventy-five. His wife Lydia was living in 1785, and probably survived him.

In the name of God, amen, I Samuel Hovey of Buxton, in the county of York and commonwealth of Massachusetts, in New-England, yeoman, being infirm of body, but through the goodness of God of sound disposing mind and memory, not knowing how short my time in this world is do make and ordain this my last will and testament:—First of all, I do commit my Soul into the hand of God who gave it, hoping in his mercy through the merits of Christ for eternal life; and my body to the earth, to be buried in a decent manner, at the discretion of my executor hereafter named, in hope of its resurrection unto immortal life,-and respecting those worldly goods it hath pleased God to bestow upon me, I will and order the same to be disposed of in the mannare following; that is to sav.

Imprimis. I will and order to my beloved wife, Lydia Hovey, the sole use tnd improvement of the westerly half of my house together with my household stuff properly so called, with one cow, for and during the term of her natural life: except two heds hereafter mentioned: which are given to my son Samuel, and daughter Lydia.

Item. I will and order to my son Samuel Hovey, after the decease of my wife, to him and his heirs forever, my homestead house, and land also the one half of my household stuff properly so called: together with half a right of the undivided land in said Buxton, originally the right of Caleb Kimball; and the residue or remainder of my personal estate after the legacies hereafter named are delivered to the legatees hereafter named. I will and order in case my said son shall pay all my just debts and funeral expenses as soon as may be after my decease, and also the expenses of the settlement of my estate, whom I here order so to do.

Tem. I will and order to my six daughters, viz Hannah the wife of Elenezer Chaplain, Sarah the wife of Wells Chase, Mehitable Hovey, Elizabeth the wife of Jonathan Thurston. Phebe the wife of Stephen Jaques, to them & their heirs, to be equally divided between them, the sum of one Pound ten Shillings lawful money: to be paid in silver currency at six shillings and eight pence P ounce. Item; I will and order to my daughter Lydia Hovey, my looms.

with all that appertains to them, for the business of weaving—which she is to receive at my decease, with one bed and the furniture thereunto belonging; and one half of my household stuff, properly so called at the

decease of my wife.

Item; I will and order to my son John Hovey, who is absent, five shillings lawful money; to be paid him by my executor, in case he makes a demand of it within five years after my decease, but if he make no demand of it within that term, he has received his full share of my estate.

Item; I do will unto my son Samuel Hovey, one bed with the furniture thereunto belonging, at my decease; also do appoint & constitute my son Samuel to be executor to this my last will and testament.

In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand & seal this the thirteenth day of September 1785.

For ninety-five pounds, he bought old lot 7, in the Booth hill pasture division, in Ipswich, Sept. 18, 1743.\*\* For one hundred and thirty-eight pounds, he bought two acres of upland, in Ipswich, within the fields commonly called Manning's Neck, being the easterly side of a fouracre lot, Dec. 10, 1747.††

Mr. Hovey built a schooner, seventy-two feet long, of fiftytwo tons burden, valued at six hundred pounds; and he became non compos mentis at that time, Aug. 30, 1749, when John Hodgkins, jr., of Ipswich, shipwright, was appointed his guardian. His estate was then valued at £1,040, 6s. His house, barn and land were appraised at £325.

For twenty-two pounds, his guardian sold old right 7. in Potter "Bushill Eighths" in Ipswich, drawn by Daniel Jordan's

original right, on the road leading from Ipswich to Topsfield, May 7, 1761.\*

Mr. Hovey married Rebecca Lakeman of Ipswich (pubished Nov. 18, 1738); and died in 1771, at the age of sixty. His son John Hovey was appointed administrator of the estate May 7, 1771. Mr. Hovey was called a shoreman and yeoman. His estate was then appraised at £105, 8s., 8d., his house, barn and land being valued at £150, 16s., 8d. The estate was insolvent. His wife, Rebecca, survived him.

JOHN HOVEY4, born in Topsfield, Mass., Aug. 27, 1699. He was a farmer, and settled in Boxford upon his marriage, building a house thirty-two feet long and twenty-four feet wide, two stories in height, with a chimney of the large old-fashioned type. in a pleasant, picturesque valley on the northern side of the road leading from the house of George W. Chadwick to the North Andover town line. June 14, 1743, his father conveyed to him, for love, about seventeen acres of land in Boxford.†

Mr. Hovey married Mary Lakeman of Ipswich (published April 17, 1725); and died March 14, 1778, at the age of seventyeight.

For fourteen pounds, seven shillings and six pence, he bought a right of one and onefourth acres in the second division in Topsfield, on Ipswich line. and "at or near the place called Wintrops Hills," April 12, 1729.\* For fifteen shillings and six pence, he sold some land in Topsfield Nov. 20, 1751;† and for fifteen pounds, six shillings and eight pence, he sold six acres and one hundred and seven rods of upland in Topsfield April 7, 1756.‡ For seventy-five pounds, three shillings and four pence, he sold forty-one acres of pasture, woodland and meadow in Topsfield March 10, 1758.8 To secure a certain man who had become bound for him, he conveyed to him sixty acres of land in Topsfield, situated on the south side of Pritchard's pond, and north side of Boxford road, Nov. 17, 1761; and this security was released June 3, 1766. 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Ivory Hovey, deceased, and on the southeast side of Pritchard's pond so called, and four lots in the second division of common land in Topsfield, at the northwesterly end of Winthrop's hills, so called, lot 1, two acres and twelve rods; lot 2, one acre and one hundred and twenty rods; lot 4, one acre and thirty rods; and lot 5, one acre and forty rods, seventy-four acres in all, exclusive of one acre in Middle swamp belonging to the heirs of said Ivory Hovev.\*

Luke Hover<sup>4</sup>, born in Boxford, Mass., May 18, 1708. was a yeoman, and lived in the West parish of Boxford. The house stood across the road from the present residence of John Myron Pearl, on the northern shore of Mitchell's pond, so called, the location being high and beautiful. The farm consisted of forty-five acres, and had been devised to him by his father, it having been his father's homestead. His barn was struck by lightning in a thunder shower, July 14, 1772, and burned. The following notice of the fire appeared in the Essex Gazette the next week:-

SALEM, July 21. A large Barn, belonging to Mr. Luke Hovey, of Boxford, was fet on Fire, last Tuesday, by a Flash of Lightning, and entirely confumed, with four Tons of English Hay.

Mr. Hovey belonged to the First church in Boxford until the Second parish church was organized, being dismissed to it in 1736.

Mr. Hovey, for three pounds, bought of Thomas Peabody of Boxford, yeoman, a quarter of an acre of land, in Boxford, on which his house now stands, Sept. 21, 1733.\* For seventeen pounds, he bought eight acres of meadow in Walker's meadow, in Boxford, Sept. 17, 1747;† and, March 8, 1748, with his brothers Joseph and Abijah he received from his father, as a gift, the father's interest in Walker's meadow, in Boxford. For fortysix pounds, thirteen shillings and four pence, he sold ten acres of upland and meadow on the south side of Johnson's pond, in Boxford, Jan. 31, 1764.§

Mr. Hovey married, first, Dorcas, daughter of Thomas and Elizabeth Kimball of Bradford, Oct. 10, 1732. She was born in Bradford Aug. 22, 1711; and died, in Boxford Sept. 16, 1752, at the age of forty-one. Her remains lie in the ancient burial place in West Boxford, and the gravestone above them is in-

scribed as follows:---

Their daughter Salome lived with them during their latter years, Mrs. Wetherbee being incapacitated by paralysis after a life of activity and usefulness. The house was standing and occupied in 1897. Mr. Wetherbee was a "minute-man" in Capt. Ebenezer Bridge's company, Col. John Whitcomb's regiment, and marched from Fitchburg to Cambridge on the alarm of April 19, 1775, serving thirteen days. Rey, Ivory Hovey<sup>4</sup>, born in Topsfield, Mass., July 3, 1714. He was fitted for college under the instruction of Rev. John Rogers of Boxford, and entered Harvard college in 1731. Although but thirteen years old, the great earthquake of 1727 so affected him that he became a Christian, and was admitted to the Topsfield church Sept. 6, 1729. In college he joined a society of students which met Sunday evenings for religious exercises. In addition to the usual temptation of college life, he found great difficulty in meeting the questions that arose relative to the divine sovereignty in sin and redemption. He studied so hard that toward the end of his third year his health gave way, and

he remained at home for nearly a year. Though he was disappointed at his forced retirement, he subsequently believed that his associations with his pastor, Rev. John Emerson, the privilege of private reflection and reading was more beneficial to him than what he would have otherwise gained in his regular studies. In the spring of 1735 he returned to college, and so good was his scholarship that he graduated with his class. He was then glad that he had escaped some of the "pernicious principles which prevailed at college about that time, whereby many were led astray." The next two years he taught a school in Marthorough. He lost a month of that time in consequence of breaking his leg by a fall from his horse. This was also a benefit to him, he said, as it gave him another season of reflection.

His religious character was now so pronounced that he was equently called upon to officiate among the sick and at funerals. He believed in devotional meetings for young people, and drafted a plan of a society substantially like that of the modern Christian Endeavor society, with rules as to membership, time of meeting, order of exercises, behavior, fellowship, absences, fees, offerings,

church lovalty, etc.

While a private tutor in a family in Biddeford, Me., in 1737, he became acquainted with Olive, daughter of Capt. Samuel Jordan of that place, and they were married Feb. 8, 1730. She

was born in 1722.

Mr. Hovey studied divinity with his home pastor, Rev. Mr. Emerson. He wrote out, at this period, for his use, mostly in shorthand, some of Doctor Mather's "Directions to a Caudidate for the Ministry—Manuductio ad Ministerium, or the Angels Preparing to Sound the Trumpets:" and under rules of prudence he wrote: "It is the observation of a very discrete man who said he had often got hurt by eating too much, rarely by eating too little; often got hurt by wearing too few cloathes, rarely by wearing too many; got hurt by speaking, rarely by holding his tongue. . . . Sometimes you will meet with unperswadable people. No counsel, no reason will do anything upon the obstinates. Throw them into the heap of the incurables." He concluded with a list of about twenty-five books for a young student's library.

Mr. Hovey preached his first sermon May 14, 1738, at Tewsbury. Though he was still in delicate health, he preached in Arundel, York and Biddeford during the next winter.

Harvard college conferred upon him the degree of Master

of Arts in 1739.

He continued to preach in various places, until he was ordained, Oct. 29, 1740, at Mattapoisett, the Second parish in Rochester. Eighteen citizens of the town signed an agreement to give him one hundred and four dollars, in sums varying from two to twenty dollars toward his settlement, in addition to the rates. Two men agreed to give him two thousand great shingles, and another four gallons of rum, "if Mr. Hovey builds a house in said precinct, for raising." Mr. Hovey built a house, on the main street of Mattapoisett, water side, about a mile from where it now stands. It is a gambrel-roofed house, and shown in the engraving on the opposite page. The shingles and the rum were probably used in its construction.

Two years later his health had become so poor that he proposed to resign, but the people would not consent, and he con-

tinued their pastor twenty-nine years.

Because of his delicate health he paid much attention to the study of medicine, and he became the physician as well as ministed of the parish. He was finally dismissed, by a council, Oct. 15, 1769; and the next Sunday was invited to preach at Manomet (Sonth Plymouth). He soon had a call to settle there, and accepted it. The salary was fifty pounds a year and the use of a parsonage. He was installed April 18, 1770.

Mr. Hovey kept a diary during his long ministry, being contained in nine volumes, and aggregating seven thousand pages. Most of it was written in shorthand. Some extracts from it were published in the Piscataqua Evangelical Magazine in 1805 and 1807. Many of the entries refer to his spiritual and physical condition.

condition.

He was a small man, and wore the usual knee breeches and shoe buckles of the time.

He sat on most of the ecclesiastical councils that were held in the vicinity; and traveled very little at other times.


It was his practice to devote a tenth of his income to charitable uses.

Mr. Hovey published (1) A letter in the 24th Number of Prince's Christian History; (2) A sermon on the Duty and Privilege of Aged Saints; occasioned by the death of Lieut. John Hammond, of Rochester, Boston, 1749; (3) Farewell sermon at Mattapoisekt, 1769; 2 Cor. xiii: 11: Boston, 1770; (4) A sermon on "Mortality," preached in the Second Parish in Plymouth, June 8, 1794, occasioned by the sudden death of two young persons . . and several aged persons. Isa. xl: 6-8; Boston, 1795; (5) A letter to Caleb Holmes, A. B., Oct. 24, 1803; in Piscataqua Evangelical Magazine, I: 90; also in Alden's Epitaphs, I: 246.

Sixty-three years of his life were spent in the gospel ministry, an experience not only of great length, but excelling in fruitfulness. He died on Friday, Nov. 4, 1803, at the age of eighty-nine. Five days later his funeral was held at the meeting house, and it was attended by a large concourse of people. Ministers from all

the neighboring towns were present. The sermon was preached by Mr. Niles of Abington, Acts xx: 38 being the text. On the eight succeeding Sundays, the ministers who had attended the funeral, carrying out the custom of the times, preached in turn

to his people.

Upon the church records were placed the following words as a testimony to the memory of Mr. Hovey: "The late reverend, worthy, highly esteemed and godly pastor, Ivory Hovey, was installed to the gospel ministry in this place April 18, 1770, decased Friday, Nov. 4, 1803, and left behind as great an example of meekness, patience and Christian perseverance as ever shone perhaps in the character of a finite being, and it may with the greatest propriety as a just encomium to his memory, be said in the cause of Christ he eminently displayed the fortitude of the Christian, and the bravery of the hero."

His remains lie in the oldest burial ground in Manomet, in Plymouth, and his tombstone bears the following inscription:—

In memory of
Rev. IVORY HOVEY
who died Nov<sup>‡</sup> 4. 1803
in y<sup>\*</sup> 90 year of his age.

By faith he lived, by faith he died,
CHRIST was his portion, theme and guide.

Mrs. Hovey survived him, and died in Manomet, his widow, June 8, 1805, at the age of eighty-three. Her remains lie near his, and the memorial stone above them bears the following inscription:—

It is said, that when the news of the Lexington alarm reached Dartmouth, Major Pope and another man were at work in the field, that they dropped their hoes and hurried home to take leave of their families. Mrs. Pope entreated her husband not to go; but he, burning with patriotism, said, "It is no time for tears now;" and, shouldering their muskets, the two men departed for the scene of conflict. He served, first, in Colonel Cotton's regiment, and subsequently with

General Sullivan.

They removed to Wells, Me., in 1779, sailing in a sloop May 4, and reaching their destination next day. The tide being out, she had to mount a horse and then ride four miles to their home. For a while they lived on greens and clams. In a letter to her father she wrote, "There is a Great plenty of woolves in these parts. They have been tract but a few rods from our hous, they have taken sheep out of barn & yards a great many times. The bairs was very plenty last fall. Some people was oblidged to watch their corn-fields Mr. Pope came home for 7 weeks-the all night. longest visit he had since he went into the army, . . We have lived without meat & I have had only ½ bushel of bread-corn for 2 months. I buy a few qts & pay for it in my work. We have bread but once a day. As to clothing I can't buy any, I am meeting with new trials from the family that came with us. You used to say that every trouble is to teach us some lesson, & when we have learned the trouble will be removed."

Major Pope became a member of the Society of the Coicinnati. They were living in 1806. Their son, I. Dominicus\*. married Sally Tarbox.

Their children were born in Manomet (South Plyghed young, 2.— "died young, 3. \*Teory Hovey", born Spet, 21, 1794; finished his schooling at Sandwich, Mass., in 1814; and was appointed first lieutenant of Massachusetts militia Aug. 20, 1817. He moved to New Bedford, Mass., in the autumn of 1819, and was a merchant there, conducting a large whaling and commission business. He was alderman of the city from 1827 to 1851; inclusive; married Betsey Clark June 9, 1814, at Manomet; and died in New Bedford Feb. 6, 1871, aged seventy-six. She survived him, and died there March 31, 1874. They had nine children. Rev. Joseph B. Seabury, Rev. J. H. B. Headley and Ellis Bartlett were grandsons of Ivory Hovey Bartlett and william Lehman Ashmead Bartlett, she headley and members of parliament. Ellis A. Bartlett was knighted by Queen Victoria, and William L. A. Bartlett warried the Baroness Burdett Coutts.

AARON HOVEY<sup>4</sup>, born in Topsfield, Mass., Sept. 14, 1718. He was a yeoman, and lived in Topsfield on his father's homestead, which had been devised to him, on Pye brook.

He married Sarah, daughter of Stephen and Hannah (Coker) Perley of Ipswich Dec. 23, 1740. She was born in Ipswich, on the ancient Perley homestead, Nov. 7, 1719.

With her husband and others, she conveyed land in Newbury which she inherited from Moses Coker of Newbury, yeonan, deceased, March 25, 1756;\* and with several others she and her husband made partition of several lots of land in Newbury June 7, 1756;† With several other persons, she and her husband

sold four-sixths of three acres of land in Newbury, and foursixths of six and one-half acres of salt marsh on Plum island, in Newbury, April 20, 1757.\*

Mr. Hovey died in Topsfield May 4, 1759, at the age of forty; and his remains lie buried in the ancient burying ground in Topsfield. His gravestone bears the following inscription:—

> HERE LIES BURIED THE BODY OF Mr AARON HOUEY WHO DECEASED MAYTHE A D ΙN ŤΗΕ 4 I st YEAR ÒΕ HIS AGE

Administration upon his estate was granted to his widow June 4, 1759. His estate was appraised at £685, 5s., 9d., 3 far. His personal estate amounted to £151, 19s., 1d., 3 far.; and the real estate to £533, 6s., 8d. He had one hundred and fifty acres of land and buildings. His real estate was divided among his heirs March 18, 1765, and, after dower had been assigned to the widow, the remainder was settled upon Stephen, the eldest son of the deceased.

His widow, Sarah Hovey, died in Topsfield Oct. 6. 1792, at the age of seventy-two. She was a woman of some education, and of strong mind and heart. Upon the return of her son Moses from the army, sick with small pox, she took care of him and became ill with the same disease herself. Her petition, given below, is interesting.

Their children were born in Topsfield, as follows:-

Daniel Hovey4, born in Ipswich, Mass., April 7, 1702. He was a husbandman, and lived in his native town until 1721, when he settled in Oxford, where his father was then living. He was a constable of the town in 1738.

While he was living in Ipswich, for fifty-two pounds, he conveved to James Burnam, jr., of Ipswich a common right in Ipswich, April 7, 1724;\* and, for one hundred and twenty pounds, bought of Richard Moore of Oxford, yeoman, one hundred acres of land with meadow and swamp in Oxford, April 25, 1724.7

His father conveyed to him, as a gift, his farm of eightyseven acres of land on Flat and Long hills in Oxford village, April 7, 1735 \$\pm\$ and the latter bought of Nathaniel Jones of Falmouth, Me., gentleman, for forty pounds, twenty acres of land in Oxford, March 4, 1730-40. With his mother, his sister and brother, he released to David Town of Oxford, husbandman, his interest in the real estate of his father April 2, 1742. The house was standing in 1879.

Mr. Hovey married Mehitable, daughter of Benjamin and Elizabeth Bridges of Framingham Nov. 24, 1726. She was born in Framingham Oct. 17, 1706. He died in Oxford April 3, 1758.

Mr. Hovey's will is on file in the probate office at Worcester, and the following is a transcript of the original instrument:-

In the Name of God amen this Seuenth day of december, in the year of our Lord 1757 I Daniel Hovey of Oxford in the County of worcester in the province of the massachusetts Bay in new England yeoman being advanced in years and in a weak low Condition do make this my Last will and Testament as follows: viz. first and principally I Commit my Soul into the hands of Almighty God my Creator, hoping in his mercy thro the merits death & passion and prevailing interession of Jesus Christ my Lord & Saviour: and my body I desire may be deeently literated at the discretion of my Executors hereafter named, in faith of the Resurrection of it at the last day, and Touching Such temporal Estate as God hath betrusted me with (after my Just debts and funeral Charges are paid) I will and bequeath the Same as follows, that is to Say.

I also order and desire that my said wife have the free use & improvement of a horse kept on the said farm when she hath occasion for it, the

ELIZABETH<sup>6</sup>, born June 22, 1744; married Dea, John, son of Samuel and Dorothy (Fenton) Slafter of Mansfield March 26, 1767. He was born in Mansfield May 26, 1739. At the age of sixteen he enlisted in the old French war as drummer boy in the company of Capt. Israel Putnam, in Lyman's regiment; and belonged to a company of rangers under Putnam and Rogers, which performed important services in the campaign for the reduction of Crown Point in 1755. The next year, he enlisted in the First regiment, Sixth company, Connecticut volunteers, commanded by Capt. Aaron Hitchcock; and he continued in the service until 1760, being present at the capitulation of the French at Montreal Sept. 8 of that year. Mr. Slafter made a journey through the forests of New Hampshire, in 1762, to examine the territory and report upon the advantages it might offer as a place of settlement; and in consequence of his favorable report a town was begun at what is now Norwich, Vt. His father transferred to him his right as proprietor in the new town June 7, 1763; and in company with Jacob Fenton, his mother's brother, and Ebenezer Smith, both being original proprietors, he set out for the township. They took with them a horse and necessary implements. His time was consumed that summer by felling trees, burning the wood, and clearing the ground for cultivation. In the autumn he returned to Mans-field. This was repeated successive summers until 1767, when he married and took his young wife to his forest home. The distance was one hundred and fifty miles, mostly through the primitive forest, and the road, for fifty miles at least, was scarcely passable except for footmen and pack-horses. Other families went with them. They went up the Connecticut river in log canoes, leaving Mansfield on Thursday, April 23, and arrived at Norwich May 10. In several places, at that time of year, the rapids, or falls, could not be passed, and they were obliged to unship their goods and carry them and their boats around, and reload, before they could continue their journey. In the place of the rude cabin they found there, Mr. Slafter built, during the summer and autumn, a comfortable and substantial dwelling on the banks of the Connecticut. It was a loghouse, to be sure, but dry and warm. The furniture was equally primitive, the tables and chairs being made of logs split in the middle, with legs.

Mr. Slafter was one of the most prominent town efficers, and deacon of the church. He was selectman, a member of many committees, especially the committee in 1776, and also frequently served as arbitrator. During the time of the Indian raids, he took his wife and two children back to Mansfield, Conn., leaving Norwich July 5, 1776. They reached Mansfield in safety, after their long and perilous journey on horseback, and remained there two years. He served in the Revolutionary war, and was present at the capitulation of Burgoyne Oct. 17, 1777. He also gave land for the benefit of Dartmouth college, which was located across the river.

May 4, 1284, he removed two miles inland, where two years later, June 8, 1786, he raised the frame of the house in which he afterward lived, and which belonged to Peter Johnson in 1809. It's chimney was of great dimensions, having three ovens, in which the family baking was done. About 1850, the chimney was removed, small ones being

erected in its stead, and the roof was changed to a pitch roof. The lofty elm standing near the house was set out by Mrs. Slafter when the house was built. In 1869, it measured, one foot from the ground, sixteen feet in circumference.

Mrs. Slafter died Jan. 6, 1811, at the age of sixty-six; and he married, secondly, her half-sister Priscilla, then the widow Whittaker, Oct. 5, 1815. He died Oct. 8, 1819, at the age of eighty. His wife Priscilla survived him, and died

May 1, 1847, aged ninety-six.

Rev. John Hovey4, born in Cambridge, Mass., June 12, 1707. He graduated at Harvard college in 1725; and taught school a number of years in Cambridge. Mr. Hovey married, first, Elizabeth, daughter of John Muzzey of Lexington, about 1727. She was baptized in Lexington April 23, 1710; and died in Cambridge Dec. 17, 1729, at the age of nineteen. The following is the inscription cut upon her gravestone in the ancient burial place at Harvard square:—

> Here Lyes ye Body of Mrs Elizabeth ye Wife of Mr John Hovey, who When Aged 19 Years & 8 M° Bid Farewell to This World on ye 17th Day of Decembr 1720

He married, second, Susannah, daughter of Joseph Levett of York, Me., in or before 1736.

He subsequently taught school in York; and also preached to the people as early as 1736. A professorship at cambridge was offered to him at this time, but he declined it, and continued his work at York. He was ordained over the church at Arundel, York county, in 1741; and was dismissed in 1768.

Mr. Hovey bought his mother's interest in the estate of his father Nov. 1, 1736,\* and, on the same day, he bought of his brother Ebenezer, for seventy pounds, the latter's interest in the real estate of their father and their brother Thomas.\* For one thousand pounds, he sold thirty acres of mowing, pasture and marsh land, lying on the south side of Charles river and northwesterly side of the county road, in Cambridge, Nov. 12, 1736.† For five hundred and eighty pounds, he conveyed to John Gay of Cambridge, yeoman, one fourth of land and buildings, bounded south and east on highways, Nov. 20, 1736.‡ He bought the interest of his brother James in the estates of their father and brother Thomas Nov. I, 1737.§ For one thousand pounds, he conveyed land in Cambridge, on the northwest side of the road leading toward Roxbury, and on the southwest bank of Charles river, Nov. 20, 1740.

Mr. Hovey's son James was a soldier in the French and Indian war in 1760, and, on his way home from Fort Pownall, was taken sick at Maquoit with the small pox. He was brought home and treated by Dr. Phineas Neven of Georgetown, Me. The doctor brought suit against Mr. Hovey for attendance and medicine, the amount of the claim being £6, 17s., 2d. The writ was dated Dec. 8, 1760. Mr. Hovey asked the province to pay the claim out of its treasury, which was done. For the particu-

lars of James' sickness see his sketch (330).

Mr. Hovey was a man of ability, and beside his work of teaching and preaching nearly all the deeds and other legal papers of his time and region were drawn by him. He was an excellent penman, as well as grammarian.

In returning from a visit to Plymouth, in 1773, he came to Biddeford by water and lodged at the house of Col. Richworth Jordan. Having been in his chamber some time without extinguishing the light, some of the family entered his apartment and found him sitting in his chair, partly undressed, and lifeless, having been dead for some time.\*\* His age was sixty-six. Administration upon his estate was granted Sept. 10, 1773. wife Susanna survived him.

Mr. Hovey died in the service, at Fort Cumberland, Oct. 12, 1759, at the age of forty-one. This instrument was proved as his last will Feb. 18, 1760, and his widow, Margaret Hovey, was appointed administratrix of his estate. He had a house, barn and eight acres of land, in Newton, valued at thirty-seven pounds; and his personal estate was appraised at nine pounds, sixteen shillings and nine pence, the whole estate being £46, 16s., 9d. It was represented insolvent Sept. 30, 1766.

For the maintenance of their mother, who was still living and their father's widow, her son Moses Hovey and daughter Experience and her husband Ebenezer Prentiss, all of Cambridge, conveyed to their brother Caleb their interest in their father's estate April 1, 1795.‡ Mrs. Margaret Hovey died on the fifteenth of that month, at the age of eighty-seven.

This was secured by a bond of the same date!

He was a soldier of the Revolution.

In 1794, engaging in business, tradition relates of Mr. Hovey, that he became involved in debt, and as inprisonment awaited him, he sped to New York state, having first deposited his clothing on the bank of Town's pond, in Oxford, to give the impression that he had drowned himself. Travelling westward he came, after a few days to a town of large size, where a public sale of wild lands in that state was in progress. Although he had not five dollars in his pocket, he made a bid on a large tract of land, and to his surprise it was struck off to him. He obtained a few hours' time in which to make payment, and obtained lodging at Foster's tavern there. In the night he was awakened by some men clamoring for admission. He was alarmed, supposing that some of his creditors were in hot pursuit, and hurriedly dressed himself. Just as he was about to leave the house, the landlord met him, and told him that two men had arrived at the tavern; that they had intended to have been at the auction, but were detained; and that they wished to see him to know if he would sell the lot he had bid off. He replied that he might be induced to sell, if he obtained a sufficient bonus for his bargain. In the morning, he sold the land to them (except a good farm, which he reserved for himself out of the tract) for several hundred dollars more than he had bid. This land was in the new township of

Unadilla, in Otsego county, and there he afterward lived. It is said that his house was the only one between Cooperstown and Oswego.

Gen. Benjamin Hovey<sup>5</sup>, born in Sutton, Mass., March 12, 1758. At the age of seventeen, he responded to the alarm of Lexington April 19, 1775, and served eighteen days. He was also in the company of Capt. Bartholomew Woodbury, in regiment of Colonel Learned, marching from home Dec. 9, 1775. He was also forty-three days in the company of Capt. Jeremiah Kingsbury, in Col. Jonathan Holman's regiment, at Providence, the roll being dated Jan. 20, 1777. He was also useful in procuring beef for the soldiers in the Revolution in 1781.

From 1782 to 1787, he was a deputy sheriff for Worcester county; and in the latter year he was conspicuous in quelling Shay's Rebellion.

Mr. Hovey owned an estate in Oxford; buying first the farm subsequently owned by George W. Gibson, and later the Doctor Learned place at North Oxford. He sold the latter estate in 1785.

In 1785, he was one of the signers of the compact for the formation of the Universalist society in Oxford.

A little before 1700, he removed to central New York, being among the pioneers of Chenango county. He was the first settler of the town to which he subsequently gave the name of Oxford, his old Massachusetts home. He cut the first tree to clear the ground where the village was built. He had purchased the land before he went there, and then started for New York, to lay his plans for the new settlement before the proprietors. He conducted the building of the village, and became the leading man of the region. He was a man of strong common sense and vigor of action and other personal qualities necessary for the arduous labors and hardships of pioneer life; but necessarily of limited education. He built his own log house, in 1790, on the site of Fort hill, so called from an old Indian fort, which overlooked the river. To this dwelling, he removed his family from Massachusetts the following year. The town was incorporated Jan. 19, 1793.

A grand-daughter, living at Syracuse, N. Y., wrote: "They chose with taste, as the Chenango river passes through the town. Grandfather's log hut was directly on its banks. There they fought the Indians, went forty miles to mill in a canoe and to Onondaga county for salt, and had a pioneer life, but men were men in those days, true to their time and men."

The first frame building erected in the town was the academy, an institution organized by Mr. Hovey in 1794, being the third in the state. Mr. Hovey's name headed the list of trustees, and he was their president as long as he remained there, about ten years. The academy held a festival Ang. 2, 1854, at which an address was delivered by W. H. Hyde, esq., from which the following paragraphs are quoted:—

"The shades of evening are gathering; what a sea of georgeousness on the autumn forest! We bear the light dip of paddles in the river and a canoe darts toward the landing on the shore. What strange beings are these? They seem regardless of the ruin that is gradually gathering over the race. Can it be that they do not think of the oncoming destruction that awaits them, while they see the little academy on the Common, the occasional dwelling, and hear the woodman's axe, whose strokes for them Like muffled drums are beating funeral marches to the grave? That tall man with whom they are talking, bartering with at the loghouse, is Benjamin Hovey, the senior trustee of the academy. . . Few men have passed a more eventful life. Having seen the fruition of his labors, and the harvest of his early toil and suffering, in the flourishing village around him, rapidly increasing in population and wealth, he locked for new projects with an ambition fed by its own innate energy and a spirit of enterprise faltering at no point beyond which were seen new fields open for its gradification."\*

Mr. Hovey was general of the militia, and judge of Chenango county. He took the contract for constructing the state road from Unadilla river, at what is now Rockdale to Cavuga lake, near Ithaca.

He was a member of the legislature of New York at the same time that Aaron Burr was a representative, and the two men became great personal friends. He joined Burr and General Wilkinson, in 1804, in a plan for canalling the Ohio river near Louisville, and went to Ohio in prosecution of the design. The restless ambition of Burr, however, led him to seek new objects on the lower Mississippi and amid the untold wealth and romance of Mexico, and the Ohio scheme, in which Mr. Hovey had embarked with ardor and had spent much of his property. was allowed to lapse. As Mr. Hyde stated, in his address, above mentioned, Mr. Hovey "retired at length in disgust . . . to find a grave on the shores of Lake Erie remote from the village he had founded and the friends of his manhood. A life of more romantic reality seldom occurs in the history of man."\*

Mr. Hovey married Lydia, daughter of John and Susanna Haven of Sutton Oct. 24, 1775. She was born in Sutton June 8, 1755. No one knows the spot where Mr. Hovey was buried. She survived him, and died in March, 1827. G. N. Hartman, esq., Pomona, N. Y., has an oil painting of both Mr. Hovey and his daughter Alphena.

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DEA. THOMAS HOVEY5, born in Ipswich, Mass., Oct. 1, 1736. After his father's death, when he was eleven years old, he was apprenticed to a man in Andover, where he attended school. He began to teach school in 1758, in Dracut, and two years later re-

moved there with his wife and negro slave. He had force and good judgment, and was the leading man in Dracut in his time. He was often called upon to draw legal papers, and perform other duties requiring clerical knowledge. He took part in the French and Indian war as a lieutenant and his commission is in the possession of a descendant. He was commissioned captain to raise a company to march into Canada, was town treasurer and selectman during the Revolution, serving thirty years in all, and an active patriot. He was deacon of the church which worshipped in the old yellow meeting house in Dracut for fifty years. Many stories have been handed down showing his efficient work and amiable Christian spirit.

For twelve pounds and two shillings, he bought of Joseph Colburn of Dracut, husbandman, the frame of a house and twenty-seven rods of land in Dracut May 16, 1759.\* He bought of Jonathan Jones of Dracut, husbandman, for twenty-six pounds, thirteen shillings and four pence, five acres of land in Dracut Nov. 9, 1764;† and of Elijah Hildreth of Dracut, gentleman, for fifty-six pounds, thirty-three acres in Blackbird swamp in Dracut June 20, 1766.‡ For seven pounds and four shillings, he conveyed to Jonathan Richardson of Dracut, gentleman, thirty acres of land on the north side of Merrimack river Aug. 21, 1765; and to Samuel Piper of Dracut, housewright, for four pounds and ten shillings, six acres of land in Dracut June 26, 1703.

Mr. Hovey married Mary, daughter of Lt. Henry and Mary (Platts) Abbott of Andover March 22, 1759. She was born in Andover Aug. 13, 1737; and died in Dracut Nov. 26, 1813, at the age of seventy-six. He died in Dracut July 29, 1826, aged eighty-nine. His grandsons, William, James, Horatio, Joshua, George and Cyrus, have placed a window in the church to his memory.

He was a soldier of the Revolution while living here; and continued his home on this island until about 1791, when the family removed to Norwich, Vt., and from thence, in 1704, to East Brookfield, Vt., where he remainded during the remainder of his life.

Mr. Hovey and his wife were admitted to the church in much was Presbyterian in its government, June 2, 1782; and he was chosen a ruling elder Nov. 11, 1784. He was not only a successful farmer, but preached the gospel, never taking anything for his ministerial labors in the way of compensation. After his settlement in East Brookfield, he was connected with the Baptists. Breadth seemed to mark their church relations. The record of dismissal of Mrs. Hovey from the church at Lyme is as follows:—

Mr. Hovey was naturally petulant, but became mild as he advanced in years; and in his old age his head was hoary. As a pastor, he had many admiring friends. Mrs. Hovey died at East Brookfield June 2, 1832, at the age of eighty-four. Her gravestone, standing over her remains in the burying ground on East hill, is inscribed as follows:-

She married, after an engagement of seven years, Gurdon Hibbard, brother of her sister Abigail's husband, Dec. 25, 1808, in Brookfield. He was born in Lebanon, N. H., July 12, 1782. By constant labor as a carpenter, his health was injuriously affected; and his physician pronounced him a hopeless consumptive. He took a journey to Saratoga Springs, N. Y., against the wishes of his family; but there his racking cough and violent night sweats disappeared. After his recovery, he bought fifty acres of land near her father's house, built a barn, and set out an orchard. He then married; and lived in a part of her father's house until he could build a house. Her furniture consisted of two tables, two chests of drawers, six kitchen chairs, rocking chair, two bedsteads, large wheel, linen wheel, quill wheel, reel and swifts, made by her father, a looking glass and some necessary crockery. She had devoted some years to sewing, being a fine needlewoman, and making men's clothing. This was a lucrative employment for young women at that time. She was thus able to furnish beds with bedding, sheets and pillow cases, as well as beautiful he

table cloths and towels of her own handiwork. Her weddining cloak was very long and of scarlet broadcloth, being trimmed with silk velvet ribbon, nearly three inches wide. Her bonnet was of black velvet, with very little trimming. By economy, they were enabled to add to their farm from time to time until it contained between two and three hundred acres, and to build two additional barns and a convenient farmhouse. Mr. Hibbard introduced the first Spanish merinoes into the town, having bought a pair of lambs, for one hundred dollars, of the consul from the United States to Spain. Two spinners were hired two or three months in the summer, and, some years as many as two hundred pounds of wool were manufactured into cloth, Mrs. Hibbard doing the weaving; the cloth, when dressed, compared favorably with imported broadcloth, and brought from a dollar and a half to two dollars a yard. These spinners worked in the room where she and her little daughter performed the household work; and while the work went on beautiful hymns were sung. As the girls grew to womanhood, they took the place of the hired laborers. Mrs. Hibbard, after one day's sickness, folded her tired hands, gently closed her eyes, and slept the eternal sleep. Peleg Wadsworth, esq., of Portland, Me., also recovered judgment against Captain Hovey for sixty-five pounds and six shillings; and one hundred and thirty-four square rods of land on Hog lane, in Ipswich, was set off to Mr. Wadsworth, in satisfaction of his judgment, Oct. 23, 1787.

JOHN HOVEN'S, born in Boxford, Mass., Aug. 29, 1727. He was a yeoman, and lived in Boxford, on the northern side of the road leading from the house of George W. Chadwick to the North Andover line, and near the town line. Mr. Hovey built the house, which was two stories in height, about thirty-two feet long and twenty-eight feet wide, and finished with dado boards. It faced the west, and the chimney was in the middle. The well was about three rods south of the house, near the road.

Mr. Hovey was one of the minute-men of Capt. William Perley's company, and with it marched to Lexington on the morn-

ing of April 19, 1775.

Mr. Hovey married, first, Mercy, daughter of Joshua and Sarah (Abbott) Jackson of Rowley Dec. 4, 1753. She was born in Rowley Feb. 12, 1730-1: admitted to the church of Linebrook parish, in Ipswich; dismissed to the Second church in Boxford May 19, 1754; and died at Boxford, in childbirth, May 19, 1755, at the age of twenty-four. He married, second, Mary, daughter of Samuel and Susanna Cole of Boxford Jan. 11, 1757.

For one hundred pounds, Mr. Hovey conveyed to his sonin-law, William Parker, one-third of his lands in Boxford April

18, 1788.\*

Mrs. Hovey died May 26, 1802, at the age of seventy-one; and Mr. Hovey conveyed all his land and buildings to William Parker, his son-in-law, Oct. 25, 1802. Mr. Hovey died May 8, 1807, at the age of seventy-nine. The farm came into the possession of their only child.

Mr. Hovey's only child was born in Boxford, as follows:-

Aug. 269—1 Mexcv\*, born May 11, 1755; married William Parken of Andower Aug. 30, 1781; he was a ycoman, and they lived on her father's farm in Boxford. After the decease of herself and husband in 1836, the place passed out of their possession. The house was taken down about 1833. Mr. Parker had a remarkable dream, which, unlike most dreams, came to pass. A man appeared to him near the barn and told him that he would lose his entire family, then consisting of himself and wife and tour children, and named them in the order they would die. The dream was fulfilled soon after, and his wife and himself also died, he being the survivor but a few months. Mrs. Parker died March 10, 1826, at the age of seventy; and he died Nov. 23, 1826, aged seventy; two. Their children were born in Boxford, as follows:

RICHARD HOVEY<sup>5</sup>, born in Boxford, Mass., Aug. 3, 1733. He was a yeoman, and lived in West Boxford, on his father's farm, being noted as a bee keeper.

Dec. 25, 1778, he made a partition, with his brother John, of real estate devised to them by their father, and, also, a part of Walker's meadow.\* This included land on Philistine hill, on Walker's hill, in Rough meadow and in common swamp, and the homestead. Richard received fifty-five acres and seventeen rods of the homestead land, and about twenty-two acres of other lands.

Mr. Hovey married Sarah Wood of Andover Nov. 10, 1757; and she died in Boxford Jan. 18, 1818, at the age of eighty-four. The inscription upon her gravestone is as follows: —

THOMAS HOVEY5, born in Boxford, Mass., Nov. 29, 1737. He was a yeoman, and lived in Boxford until about 1770, when he removed to Beverly.

Mr. Hovey married Sarah Carlton July 21, 1762, in Boxford. He died in Beverly Feb. 9, 1820, at the age of eighty-two. His estate was very small, and proved to be insolvent. At that time, the probate papers state, Rebecca Hoyt was his only child living in Essex county. His wife survived him, and died in Beverly, his widow, July 20, 1826, at the age of eighty-three.

NATHAN6, born March 8, 1775, in Beverly. He was a mariner, and at the age of sixteen was mate of the brigantine Hannah, sailing from Newburyport. While on a voyage to the West Indies, he disappeared, in February, 1802, and was supposed to have been murdered. The following affidavit, on record in the Essex County registry of deeds, gives interesting details of the matter :-

Phineas Hovey<sup>5</sup>, born in Boxford, Mass., Jan. 18, 1745-6. He was a yeoman, and lived in Beverly. He served in the army in the war of the Revolution, in Capt. Peter Shaw's company, of Beverly, at Lexington and in the battle of Bunker Hill. With others, he conveyed, for five hunded and ninety-two pounds and fifteen shillings, to Peter Russell of Bradford, gentleman, the homestead of Dea. Thomas Kimball of Bradford, deceased, April 5. 1782.†

Mr. Hovev married Miss Hannah, daughter of Thomas and Rebecca Preston of Beverly July 18, 1775. She was baptized in Beverly June 21, 1752. Mr. Hovey died Oct. 2, 1786, at the age of forty, and she survived him, being his widow, of Beverly, in 1807. For one hundred and ten pounds, with others, she conveyed to Phineas Foster of Boxford, yeoman, one acre of land with the house and barn thereon, and two other lots of land, all in Beverly, being formerly the property of Anna Preston of Beverly, deceased, Nov. 23, 1786.‡ For four pounds and ten shillings, her widowed mother conveyed to her one-fourth of an acre of land and eastern half of the house thereon March 15, 1788.§ For eighteen pounds, Mrs. Hovev conveyed the house, barn and land to Benjamin Foster of Beverly, cabinet-maker, Nov. 26, 1793. Nov. 24, 1803, Mrs. Hovey bought back the

Y., May 25, 1839, aged sixty-two. The children of James and Sarah Leach (Hovey) Brad-

burn were as follows: 1. George, born March 4, 1806, in Attleboro, Mass., having inherited from both parents many of their qualities, which permeated his whole nature. He was educated as a practical machinist, having a talent for that employment, but his inclination to the life of a student caused him to change his vocation, and he became a Unitarian clergyman. He was settled over a church in Nan-tucket; and while there, in 1836, married Lydia, daughter of Capt. Valentine Hussey, a lady of Quaker birth, of rare personal attraction, greatly beloved, and who had received her education at the Friends' college, in Providence, R. I. She died a year after their marriage, and their infant daughter a few months later. These losses shadowed his subsequent life. His second wife, Frances Stackpole Parker, whom he married in 1850, survived him. They had no children. For several years, he represented Nantucket in the legislature, as a Whig; was an editor at Lynn, Mass., and Cleveland, O.; but was best known throughout the North as an anti-slavery lecturer, heing an intimate friend of Garrison. He was a delegate to the World's convention in London, in 1840, and is represented in the celebrated picture, now in London, of this famous anti-slavery gathering. As a speaker, he was witty and eloquent, his oratory being unique, picturesque and impressive. He was frank and sincere, his face and figure were of striking dignity and beauty, and he had courage that feared no antagonism. He died in Melrose, Mass., where he had lived for nearly a score of years, July 26, 1880, at the age of seventy-four. 2. Charles, horn July 16, 1808, in Attleboro; was at first a resident of Lowell, Mass., then became a merchant in Cleveland, O., and always prominent. He married Eliza Stone Jan. 27, 1831, in Lowell. She was born in Chester, Vt., in 1807; and died in Cleveland Sept. 10, 1865. The children conveyed to Daniel Mitchell of Bradford, cordwainer, the homestead in Boxford and pew in the West Boxford meeting house, Dec. 17, 1812, on condition that he "truly and faithfully and decently support" their mother "Hannah Hovey in the place where she now dwells, accidents and casualties by fire excepted, and also provide her with board, lodging and apparel, nursing and medicine in sickness and health; and also furnish her with a seat in that pew in the meeting house in the West parish of Boxford that formerly belonged to Luke Hovey, late of Boxford, deceased; also pay her two dollars annually, and generally to take a prudent care of her through life, and at the close of life give her a decent burial." I Mrs. Hovey died, his widow, in Boxford, March 8, 1831, at the age of seventy-nine.

JOSEPH HOVEV<sup>5</sup>, born in Boxford, Mass., Jan. 23, 1746. He was a housewright, and lived in Boxford. He was a soldier of the Revolution, being a minute-man, and served in the regiment of Col. Samuel Johnson. In 1790, he was the lucky owner of ticket No. 760, in the Fifth class of the State lottery, which drew a prize of one thousand dollars.\* With this money he purchased the farm which was afterward his son, Thomas S. Hovey's, the site of the house being now occupied by the Barker Free school

in the West parish of Boxford, May 14, 1791.\* The consideration was four hundred pounds, and the grantors were widow Mercy Wood, Huldah Wood, singlewoman, and widow Mary Boynton, all of Boxford. The farm contained one hundred acres of land.

For sixty pounds, he bought of Amasa Peabody of Dracut, veoman, twenty acres and five rods of land in Boxford, on Rock brook, May 4, 1790;† and on the same day conveyed one-half of it, for thirty pounds, to John Pearl of Boxford, husbandman.; He bought of Asa Cole of Boxford, yeoman, for seventeen pounds and ten shillings, four acres and twenty-one rods of salt marsh in Newbury, on the northeast side of Long Point creek, Oct. 29, 1793.†

Mr. Hovey was called "gentleman" the latter part of his life. He married Mary, daughter of Moses and Mary (Chadwick) Porter of Boxford March 17, 1773. She was born in Boxford July 20, 1754; and died in Boxford May 31, 1819, at the age of sixty-four. Mr. Hovey died in Boxford Nov. 27, 1820, at the age of seventy-four. His inventory shows a considerable library. His son Thomas S. Hovey was appointed administrator of his estate Feb. 6, 1821.

Joseph\*, born Oct. 31, 1776, was taught the trade of a clock and watch maker, but being fond of reading he acquired a taste for classical knowledge, and at maturity set about devising means to obtain a liberal education. He studied with his pastor, Rev. Peter Eaton, and subsequently attended Phillips Academy at Andover, of which Mark Newman, esq., was then principal. Mr. Newman was friendly to him, treating him with great delicacy, and making his situation as pleasant as possible. Though Mr. Hovey suffered on account of his age, he persevered and made fair progress. He entered Harvard college in 1800, and there won the respect and confidence of the few who really knew him, being retiring and modest, and easily confused. He graduated in 1804.

After graduation, he taught school for a year or more, and then entered the office of John Abbott, esq., a lawyer in Westford, but soon removed to Haverhill, pursuing his legal studies there with Hon. John Varnum until his admission to the Essex bar in 1808. He opened an office in Haverhill, and began his professional career. Mr. Varnum was his friend, furnishing him with means of subsistence in such a delicate and kindly manner that it could not be refused or noticed. The society of Haverhill was social, intelligent and refined, and in it Mr. Hovey was as happy as his nature, disposition and habits permitted.

He had a good classical education, and excelled in mathematics and metaphysics, having a fondness for books which required mental exercise. His chief delight was in works of cloquence, poetry and able essays, quoting from them readily. But the more he read and the better he understood them the less he seemed qualified to speak himself. The sight of an audience withered all his faculties and dulled his brain, being spellbound before a small number of hearers even.

He wrote verses of merit, always chaste and delicate, but wanting in force and passion. He played the flute with some skill, and found consolation in music; when fretful and moody, his flute and little harosichord were successfully

used "to charm away the fiends."

In his religious belief he became an Episcopalian. Although many of his views of society were probably erroneous, his observations on characters were generally shrewd, learned and novel, frequently tinctured with corrosive and sickly impressions incident to chafed spirits. If his remarks were sometimes bitter, he had no permanent malice in his nature. His sarcasms were only the feverish breath of the moment, and passed away like the vapors of the morning.

He had read law with diligence, and was well acquainted with its principles, but he had no readiness in practice, hesitating, reflecting and doubting, until his client lost all confidence in his knowledge. Still, he was a safe counselor. Had he acted as well as he reasoned he would have had much

to do

Morbidness conjured for him evils which in reality be never had to bear. He was a friend and admirer of ladies, but fear of rivalry caused him to withhold advances; and in every amusement or entertainment a death's head rose before him.

In person he was tall, thin and pale, and was singularly abstenious, fearing that he should be plethoric by indulgence,

while he was wasting away in a settled consumption.

In the summer of 1815 he was scarcely able to walk; but he was not in the slightest degree disturbed by the approach of death, and his nature seemed to wholly change. All soreness left him, all wounds of pride were healed. The disease of his disposition and fancy passed away. A pure serenity of soul—high and holy, philanthropic and devotional—beamed from his sunken eye, and was made manifest in every aspiration. All his emnities were forgotten, and injuries forgiven. His friends glowed with new life. As the hand of death pressed harder upon his brow, hope and joy beamed brighter in his countenance, free from all doub or fear. He died May 6, 1816, at the age of thirty-nine; and his remains lie in the ancient burial place in West Boxford.\* Asox\*, born Feb. 3, 1778. See family numbered "96.5.

CAPT. IVORY HOVEY, born in Boxford, Mass., July 14, 1750. He was a yeoman, and lived in West Boxford. For one hundred pounds, he bought his brother Thomas' interest in the estate of their father June 23, 1788,\* and in 1802, of his brother Amos the Hill lots, so called, in Boxford, and salt marsh. In the latter part of his life he was called "gentleman" and "esquire." He was a captain in the militia, and orderly sergeant in the Revolutionary war, being in the hottest of the fight in the battles at Bunker hill, Trenton and other places. He was a pensioner.

Mr. Hovey married Lucy, daughter of John and Mary (Chadwick) Peabody of Boxford July 23, 1772. She was born in Boxford March 23, 1753. Captain Hovey and his wife and her sister, for ninety pounds, conveyed their interest in that part of the estate of their father, John Peabody, that was set off to his widow Dec. 4, 1781.†

Captain Hovey died in Boxford Aug. 27, 1832, at the age of eighty-two. In a petition to the probate court, his widow, Lucy Hovey, stated that she was "married to him in July, 1773, and lived with him as his lawful wife until the day of his death which was the twenty-seventh of August last, and that he was a pensioner of the United States, having been a sergeant in the army of the Revolution."

The following notice of his death appeared in the Salem Gazette:—

In Boxford, August 27, Capt Ivory Hovey, aged 82. An ardent patriot and revolutionary soldier—who was in the hottest of the battle of Bunker Hill—sustained the office of orderly Sergeant under Capt. Robinson in the trying scenes in New Jersey and Long Island—was in the battle of Trenton and distinguished himself at sundry times by many fearless and heroic deeds-was a man of noble and generous heart-an obliging personal friend, and an active friend of humanity.\*

Captain Hovey lived on the paternal homestead; and a few years after his death there remained no vestige of the home but the narcissus of the old garden, which still springs up near the brook.

Mrs. Hovey survived him, and died, his widow, in Boxford, Jan. 2, 1835, at the age of eighty-one.

While living in Boxford, for one hundred and thirty pounds, he bought of Seth Ring a shop in Salem, standing on land of Joseph Chipman, April 26, 1783,7 and sold it to William Phippen of Salem, trader, for thirty pounds, May 17, 1786.‡ On the latter date, Mr. Phippen conveyed to Mr. Hovey a shop for seventy-three pounds and ten shillings.§ Mr. Hovey disposed of land in Boxford in 1802 and 1800.

The petition of Ivory Hovey in behalf of his Constitiants, humbly prays, (that where as Powder Cannot be Obtained to fix out priviteers in the Eastern settlements, at the Expence of the Colony at present), your peti[o]ner therefore prays that the Committees appointed by this Honourable Court for the Eastern districts may may be directed to take into their Cair, the vefsel or vefsels that are allready Detaind in their districts, by this Honourable Court, and that thay be authorized (If thay Can procure the Necessaries at their own Expence to fix them out as priviteers, your petitioner forthermore pray as it will be attended with a great expence to send up to their Honourable Court, If they Should fix said vessels out), that your Honoures would be pleas to grant him, Two Commissions to be laft a Blank, that the Committee may appoint Commander[s], whome thay Shall think most Capable, & worthy, of such a Trust, forthermore your petiti[o]ner would be glad, of your written Orders, that is to say, weather the Commanders, of the Vefsels. shall take all British, nova scotia, or Newfoundland, Bottoms, assisting our unnatural Enimies with supplys, that the Commanders may Justly know how far their Commissions extend your petiti[o]ner, prays that your Honours would be pleased to dispach him with their orders as Soon as may be; which he will Strictly Obey and your petiti[o]ner as in duty bound will ever pray

IVORY HOVEY

Your Petitioner farthermore prays that either of his Constituants may have Liberty of sending where they may think proper for Powder provided He, or they first obtain a permit from the Committee whom your Hon" have appointed in the eastern Districts.

This petition was entered Oct. 5th., and it was ordered that

it "lie till ye Como on Armed Vefsels report."\*

Doctor Hovey served as surgeon in the Revolution, and was stationed at Fort Miller, Ticonderoga, having been appointed surgeon of Colonel Scammul's battalion April 12, 1777. A letter to his father, written by him at Fort Miller and dated July 27, 1777, says: "I am naturally a Great Coward, and all that quiets me is I am in the way of Duty."

Dr. Hovey married, first, Mary, daughter of William and Elizabeth Hight, who died Nov. 7, 1770, at the age of twenty-five. Her remains lie in the old burial place at South Berwick, and the epitaph upon her gravestone is "Blessed are the dead who die in the Lord." He married, second, Frances ----, who died Feb. 3, 1816, aged sixty-eight. He is also said to have married.

A. C. Stearns of Watertown, Mass., has in his possession an interesting paper of Doctor Hovey. It is an agreement made with John and Alexander Cambell of Tobago, in 1789, that Doctor Hovey shall send in the brigantine Tryall, a cargo of boards, joists, scantling, staves, clapboards, shingles, beef, cod fish, horses, etc., to be exchanged for rum.

Doctor Hovey died in Wiscasset, Maine, Oct. 17, 1818, at the age of sixty-nine. His children were born as follows:-

Her ferene temper, amiable disposition, and active virtue, were eminently calculated to delight as a daughter and to blefs as a SISTER. As her life was purity, her death was peace. She supported a long and tedious illnefs, with the composure of philosophy, and met the last struggle with the fortitude of christianity.

"Here refts what once was beauty, once was grace, Here rejts want once was occurs, once was grace, Grace, that with tendersels and ferje comboil d, Here refts what once was beauty, once was grace, To form that harmony of foul and face, Where beauty fhines the mirror of the mind. While friendthip's eye diffills the copious tear, Faith lends her aid to edge affliction's load, Mortals may weep upon her hallowed bier. Chriftians muft yield an angel to her GOD."

He was a lieutenant in Captain Town's company, and marched on the Lexington alarm. With Ebenezer Shumway he purchased sixteen acres of land in Oxford, with the brickyard and clay pits, for thirty pounds, Jan. 25, 1773: and they carried on the brickyard as long as Mr. Hovey lived. It was located northward of Town's pond.

Mr. Hovey married Content Ramsdell of Abington Dec. 31, 1759, in Abington; and died in 1776, his widow, Content Hovey, being appointed administratrix of his estate Feb. 6, 1777. The inventory of his estate amounted to £528, 16s., 4d., of which £382 was real estate, and the balance, £146, 16s., 4d., personal.



The father thought that the province should bear the charges of James' sickness, and the outcome was a suit brought by the

doctor against the father Dec. 8, 1760, and the latter petitioned the general court for relief the next February. The claim was duly allowed, and paid from the province treasury.

Mr. Hovey became a sea-captain, securing two commissions, from the continental congress, as captain in the privateer service. He was the commander of the schooner Swallow of ten guns and sixty men.\*

He owned three vessels. He sailed from Stratford, Conn., in August, 1784, on the day of birth of his eldest son, was shipwrecked and absent from home six years. He had a vessel built of mahogany, and returned in it, entering the port of New Haven, Conn. This is said to have been the first vessel, built entirely of mahogany, to enter that port.

He lived at Huntington and Stratford, Conn.; and married Hannah, daughter of Joseph Tomlinson of Huntington April 9, 1783. She was born in Huntington in 1763. He died at Stratford June 15, 1829; and she died there in 1831 or 1832, both being aged.

MAJ. THOMAS HOVEY, born in Newton, Mass., Aug. 14, 1770. He was probably brought up in Watertown, and lived there until 1762, when he moved to Cambridge, and settled in Brighton in 1776. He taught school in Brighton for about twenty winters, and also in Watertown and Newton. He was in the Battle of Bunker Hill, and subsequently served in Washington's army as a major drummer. He died in Brighton May 8, 1807, at the age of sixty-six. He died of consumption, and from Thanksgiving day in 1806, until he died, because of the peculiar nature of his disease, he could not lie down. If he tried to secure rest in that manner a severe coughing would ensue. All his sleep was obtained by some one rubbing his head. Often he remarked, "How good that bed looks. Oh! if I could lie down but one hour, but that is impossible, it distresses me. No one can tell but myself." At first he was irreconciled to leaving this attractive world, not that he was afraid to die, but his love for his family was so strong he could not bear to break the tie. He looked upon his wife with most lamentable sighs, saving, "How can I leave you; how can I leave my dear children. This world looks beautiful and pleasant to me. and I know that I am attached to it and my family." "Oh!" said he, "if it could be consistent with the Lord to spare me a few years longer, that I might see my children settled around me, it would be exceedingly pleasant, but if God has otherwise determined, I hope and pray that I may be reconciled." He truly saw that happy day and often said, "Forever, oh! Lord, thy word is settled in Heaven." A few minutes before he died he was asked where those words were that he so often repeated, and replied, "You will find them in Psalms, 119, v. 89."

His wife joined the Baptist church in Newton after the death of her husband; and she died Jan. 14, 1821, in Rutland. Mass., at the age of seventy-four. Her death was peaceful and happy. Rev. return a terrific gale was experienced. They immediately began their dangerous tour in the dreadful midnight darkness and the roar of the storm. The waves dashed high and violently, and amid the avfall tiously up and up toward the top-gallant yard arm, which was finally reached and the task accomplished. Some of the rigging then gave away, and Stephen fell upon the deck, and a moment later was lifeless. This was on Christmas day, 1796, when he was twenty-two. Bryan for a voyage from said winsor to Lisbon, and entered into articles of agreement with the said Blount Clark and Bryan to charter said Schooner after she should be discharged at said Lisbon, for a return eargo to the United States, if the supercargo who went out in said Schooner and returned in her, should require it—that accordingly we took on board at Winsor aforesaid, a cargo of corn, staves, peas and naval stores, and sailed from Oerccock in the month of May, and arrived with the same at Lisbon, the third day of July following and delivered he said cargo there to Mr Kenneth Clark the said supercargo, all in good order who paid me the freight, but not according to Charter party, having kept from me about one hundred and eighty dollars: after the schooner was unloaded, I agreed with se Clark to take on board a cargo of salt, on their account, sufficient for ballast, as it would save us the expence of buying ballast: after we took the salt on board, we agreed with st Clark to take on board one hundred merino sheep, at two dollars each, and he was to find their living, and provide every thing for them, and fix the vessel to receive them on board; and I agreed to let him have a black man, which we had on board, to take charge of them; and take the necessary care of them on the voyage, Clark to have liberty to put them in such part of the vefsel as he thought proper: accordingly we took on board eighty four sheep one of which died the next day, and sailed from Lisbon the nineteenth or twentieth of August following bound for North Carolina; the sheep were stowed in the hold of the Schooner by Mr. Clarks exprefs direction; he had at first determined to place them on deck and build suitable places for them there, but enquiring for lumber he found it scarce and dear, and concluded to put them under

deck; I made only a verbal agreement for the freight home, as the Charter party shew the cargo out to be on their account and a condition to load home if required—before we left Lisbon I had the Schooners upper works caulked and her bottom cleaned, and when we sailed she was in good order, and continued so on the voyage until the 23<sup>d</sup> September, when we experienced a heavy gale of wind, in which we lay too fourteen hours, after which she leaked a little but not to do any damage; afterwards about the tenth of October we experienced another Gale of wind; in one of these gales a part of the hay which was stowed loose in bulk and in the bows of the vefsel, was injured; and the sheep suffered considerably, for we had to keep the hatches down, which increased the heat in the hold;—in one of the gales the hatches were closed twenty four hours—after we left Lisbon, and about a week after we left the Port, the sheep began to die, and it appeared to me were diseased: I cut several after they were dead in the back of the neck, and found them filled with worms; more or lcis, died almost every day for about thirty days, after which they appeared to be very well; I am not able to recollect how many died, but I think twenty-five or twenty-six in all-After the gales they were kept on shorter allowance than usual, and as well before as after were managed entirely under said Clarks direction-On the 23d of October we were driven on shore in a gale of wind on Currituck, and the Sea breaking over the Schooner, Mr Clark requested the hatches should be closed, and they were accordingly kept closed until the sheep were taken out and set on shore-I think fifty six or eight were landed alive—after the sheep were landed, and the materials saved, and the vessel and the sheep were sold, a difficulty arose with the supercargo, and he seized our effects — we were strangers in the place, and had with us ten or eleven hundred dollars only—considerable of which was due to the people for wages-All this was attached by a writ at Clark's suit, but afterwards given up, all but one hundred dollars, which he said he would retain to pay the expences; I consented to this to save the remainder from their hands and to get away; about thirty six hours after the schooner was driven on shore she bilged, and about a third part of the salt was wet and lost-the remainder of the salt and lemmons were got on shore and sold-the lemmons were much rotten -when we had saved all we could, I advised with Mr Clark about what was necessary to be done, and he told me I must proceed according to Law, and that he had nothing more to do about it I accordingly applied to Samuel Salyer Esq. wreck master, and had all sold under his direction, and Esq. wreck master, and had an sold under ins direction, and paid over to said Clark his proportion, after deducting ex-pences—I noted my protest the day after we got on shore, or shortly after, before a Justice of the Peace; the proper Officer as I understood lived at a distance of twelve miles; the Justice gave me a certificate, and I went with it and carried with me all the crew, except one, to his residence—at a place called Notts Island, in order to extend it—but he had gone to Norfolk I was therefore obliged to wait until I could go to Norfolk to extend it, which I afterwards did on the eleventh of November

Daniel Hovey<sup>6</sup>, born in Sutton, Mass., Oct. 29, 1778. He lived in his native town, owning the old red house, which had a long back roof and a back basement. The house afterward became the property of his brother Benjamin Hovey; and it was taken down by S. H. Stockwell about 1876. Mr. Hovey subsequently lived in the house he bought of Joseph May 27, 1811. This house was originally built as a parsonage by Rev. John McKinstry about 1720. In 1876, it was occupied by Mr. Hovey's son Marius. Mr. Hovey was a very enterprising business man, conducting at one time a store at the end of the long shed at the tavern.

He married, first, Susanna, daughter of Jonas and Lydia (Rice) Sibley July 3, 1808. She was born in Sutton June 27, 1786; and died Aug. 25, 1811, at the age of twenty-five. He married, second, Miss Susan Jacobs of Millbury Nov. 10, 1813. She was born Dec. 15, 1793; and was one of the most worthy of women.

Mr. Hovey died in Sutton Jan. 10, 1839. His wife Susan survived him, and died March 25, 1850, aged fifty-six.

Mr. Hovey's children were all born in Sutton, as follows:-768-I.

Jonas Augustust, born Sept. 16, 1809. He was a fine looking man; and in early life kept a little store, subsequently becoming one of the most enterprising, wealthy and successful of the cotton manufacturers of Sutton. He married Miss Fidelia, daughter of Elijah and Lydia (Whittemore) Waters of Sutton, and then lived for several years in Millbury. He then removed to Ballston, N. Y., where he owned several factories, and built a mansion house, costing, it is said, when finished and furnished, one hundred thousand dollars. Afterward, he had unfortunate litigation concerning some of his titles, and this, together with the severe pressure of the times, fell heavily upon him, somewhat reducing his wealth. But his perseverance was wonderful. His business took him frequently to New York and other cities, and in the daytime he attended to business, but depending upon sleep obtained at night while traveling in sleeping cars for his chief rest. From this practice, he became insane, and finally died, in an asylum, where he had been under treatment for a few weeks, Jan. 22, 1875, at the age of sixty-five. Daniel Hoveys, born in Windham, Conn., July 24, 1764. He removed to Lyme, N. H., with his parents in childhood. Near the close of the war of the Revolution his father was drafted into the army, and although little more than a boy Daniel was accepted in his father's place. Oct. 16, 1781, while acting as a scout, with four others, from a fort in Corinth, they were fired upon in Jericho by a party of sixteen tories, some of whom were acquainted with Daniel and had partaken of the hospitality of the family. One of the scouts was mortally wounded and died the next day. The scouts jumped into some high brakes and thick bushes and hid. Four of them were soon discovered. Three of them stated that their number was four, but one of them, more honest than the three said that there were five. Thereupon search resulted in the discovery of Daniel, whom the leader of the tories recognized, taking him by the hand, and inquiring after the health of his father, and said if he had him there he would treat him. It appeared that this tory was supposed to be a patriot, and had so learned of the contemplated expedition of the scouts. They were taken to Onebec and imprisoned, for eleven months, in the same cell with an educated Englishman, who took pleasure in instructing Daniel in arithmetic and surveying. Sometimes, when he had no ink, he used blood from his wrist for writing out

mathematical problems. His papers, written in blood, are in the possession of his grandson Fred Hovey Allen of Boston, and the writing in blood is bright, though that written with ink is much faded. This new-formed friend awakened in Daniel a thirst for learning; and he determined to pursue his desire when he was exchanged, after eleven months' imprisonment. He started for his home on foot, leaving his teacher friend and the charitable lady who had occasionally sent in to them food dainties. He become extremely foot sore, and about a day's journey from home his father met him on horseback. Daniel rode the remainder of the way, while his father walked by his side. In due time Daniel began to study with Rev. Dr. Burton of Thetford, Vt., with a view of entering Dartmouth college, but was prevented by the failure of his health from securing a liberal education.

Mr. Hovey lived on the river road in Lyme, near the Hanover line, during the remainder of his life. He received a pension from the government on account of his services in the war,

and this was continued, after his decease, to his widow.

He taught school for twenty-five years, during the winter; and held many offices of honor and trust. He was active in establishing a circulating library; and frequently settled estates and disputes of his neighbors and friends. Though not joining the church until late in life, he always had family worship, and was among the first Sunday-school superintendents in New Hampshire. He remained, as superintendent or teacher, in the Sunday-school as long as he lived. His love for children increased with his years, and they were as fond of him. He was one of the first in his region to become a total abstainer from the use of intoxicating drinks. He was honest, good, just and unselfish, and his memory is precious.

He was short in stature, having dark brown hair and blue eyes, unassuming in his appearance, though a man of more than ordinary ability. He was known as "Master Hovey," because of

his long service as teacher.

Mr. Hovey married Beulah, daughter of Sylvanus and Mary (Sawyer) Pingree of Hanover Feb. 18, 1789, in Lyne. She was born in Coventry, Conn., Feb. 1, 1769. Mr. Hovey died in Lyme March 2, 1850, at the age of eighty-five. Upon his monument, in the cemetery at Lyme, is the following inscription, prepared in accordance with his wish:—

Roger Hovey<sup>6</sup>, born Feb. 20, 1759, in Mansfield, Conn. He twice enlisted as a soldier of the Revolution. The first enlistment was in February, 1776, at the age of seventeen years, when he marched on foot to join the army encompassing Boston. As he used to tell his children: "It was a downfall to be told to cut beappoles. I could have done that at home. But a soldier must obey orders. Thousands of beanpoles were stacked near

the old church in Roxbury ready for use." Then came that eventful night of March 4th, when three hundred wagons, loaded with those beanpoles, were hauled up Dorchester Heights, amid dead silence, except as broken by the crunching of the wheels over the frozen ground, and the brisk cannonading from another quarter to divert the enemy's attention. The poles were bound into fascines and with other materials were made into impregnable redoubts held by two thousand men. The "evacuation of Boston" followed on March 17th, and when Roger Hovey saw the British transports, crowded with eleven thousand red coats, sail away for Halifax, he said to his comrades, "Those 'beanpoles' drove them out." Mr. Hovey's second enlistment was for one year, during which he fought at the Battle of White Plains and elsewhere. He was granted a pension in his declining vears.\*

Mr. Hovey married Martha, daughter of Edmund and Martha (Otis) Freeman, Feb. 6, 1783, in Hanover, N. H.; of which town her brother, Col. Edmund Freeman, was the first settler. Mr. Hovey was the only blacksmith in the colony, and the legend is that he bought his first stock of iron with the continental money paid as his wages in the army. He not only shod horses and oxen, but did more ornate iron-work, and made all the hinges, latches, bolts and bars of old Dartmouth Hall, relics of which are treasured by his descendants. The fac-simile of his signature is taken from an indenture dated June 18th, 1801. binding Chester Bixby to him as

an apprentice during minority. It is a formidable document, and well

preserved.

In 1813, Mr. Hovey removed with his family to Thetford, Vt., where he built a house and shop and bought a farm of 160 acres. He spent his old age with his eldest son, Frederick, at Berlin, Vt., where he died, May 19, 1839, at the age of eighty years. His wife survived him and died at Berlin, April 6, 1841, aged eightytwo years. While at Hanover, N. H., they were members of the Presbyterian church, of which Dr. Eden Burroughs was pastor, by whom all their children were baptized.

Mrs. Hovey was the youngest daughter of Edmund Freeman of Mansfield. Conn., to whom, as a reward for services, the Hanover charter was granted, July 4th, 1761, conveying to him and ten others by the name of Freeman and others a tract of land including twenty-two thousand and four hundred acres, for which,

December 25th of each year, each settler was to pay to the Crown, if demanded, one ear of Indian corn.\* Edmund Freeman was the fifth in succession to bear that name, each being a deacon in his church.† Mrs. Hovey's mother, Martha Otis, as a daughter of Nathaniel Otis, son of Hon. John Otis, for twenty-one years member of His Majesty's Council at Plymouth; and her uncle, Col. James Otis, divided with Patrick Henry the distinction of setting in motion the American Revolution. Her maternal grandmother, Abigail (Russell) Otis, was the daughter of Rev. Jonathan Russell of Barnstable, son of Rev. John Russell of Hadley (who shielded the Regicides for ten years), and his wife, Martha (Moody) Russell, was the daughter of Rev. Joshua Moody, son of William Moody, who came to Ipswich in 1634-5, and was one of the first settlers of Newbury.‡

REV. AARON HOVEY6, born in Mansfield, Conn., June 22, 1774. His boyhood days were passed upon the farm; and he was educated at Dartmouth college, from which he graduated in 1798. In his early days his conduct was unusually regular, and in college he was orderly, obedient to authority and diligent in his studies. He was early interested in religious matters, but did not unite with the church of his boyhood until the summer after he graduated from college. He taught school a year at Northampton, Mass., and entered the law office of Hon. Thomas R. Gold at Whitesborough, N. Y., as a student. He was soon convinced that the legal profession was not what he would care to adopt. His talents, tastes and feelings were more adapted to the

ministry; and, in 1801, he began the study of theology with Rev. Charles Backus, D. D., of Somers, an eminent theologian, who had directed the studies of many candidates for the ministry. There were, at that time, no theological seminaries in the country. In 1802, he was licensed to preach by the association of Windham county, and supplied vacant pulpits, but declined several invitations to settle. In the autumn of 1803, he was engaged in the Second society of Saybrook (now Centerbrook), Conn., where "by reason of the advanced age of the pastor," Rev. Richard Elv, the people were disposed to employ a candidate to assist him and "should his services be acceptable to settle him as colleague pastor." According to the custom of those prudent times he preached several months, finally receiving a call. He was ordained as colleague with Mr. Ely Sept. 5, 1804. Mr. Ely immediately removed, and the full duties of pastor and preacher devolved upon Mr. Hovey, who loved his work and devoted his life to the service of the people. His sermons were sound in doctrine and correct in argument and style, though he attempted no display. In the early years of his ministry he instructed a large number of young people in literature, science and navigation, and fitted several of them for college. The prominent attribute of his mind is said to have been good sense, which enabled him not only to discern what was right but what was expedient. Discretion marked his domestic arrangements, his pastoral visits and his actions on all occasions. Few were as cautious in avoiding everything in conversation, writing and conduct by which the ministry might be blamed, and few were as studious of peace and order. As a counselor he excelled. For thirty-four years he was registrar of the Middletown (Conn.) Association. He was interested in general affairs, and was chaplain of the Seventh regiment of militia in Connecticut, having been appointed by Col. Joseph Hill Aug. 22, 1809.

Mr. Hovey married Mrs. Huldah (Ely) Hayden, daughter of Rev. Richard Ely and widow of Uriah Hayden, of Essex, Conn., Sept. 9, 1804. She was born in Lyme, Conn., July 21, 1772; and was a woman of character, eminently domestic and devoted to her family. She was generous to the poor, conscientious in all her life, noble, faithful and affectionate.

He died Sept. 9, 1843, on the anniversary of his wedding day. His funeral was held on Sunday, when the churches of the Episcopal, Baptist, Methodist within the limits of the Second society of Saybrook, and the Congregational church at Deep River were closed that the people might attend the funeral services. His remains were buried in the family lot in the Centerbrook cemetery. His tombstone represents a full-sized pulpit, in marble, with an open bible upon it, on the face of which is carved the

text of the last sermon he preached to his congregation: "Peace I leave with you, my peace I give unto you; not as the world giveth give I unto you. Let not your heart be troubled, neither let it be afraid."\*

Mr. Hovey's wife survived him and died Jan. 22, 1844, at

the age of seventy-one. She lies buried at his side.

He was of an inconstant disposition, desiring to move about and changing his business, but, through the influence of his wife, finally settled down to farming. He went in debt for his farm, worked hard, ran a large dairy. raised cattle and sheep, and paid for it.

Mrs. Hovey died in Thetford July 5, 1837, at the age of forty-five. After her death, Mr. Hovey sold the farm, and engaged in other pursuits.

The residue of his estate amounted to about sixty-five thousand dollars; and relative to this he made the following provision: "I direct my said trustees to hold all the rest and residue of my estate, real, personal and mixed, in special trust, for the following purposes, namely, to pay over, out of the interest and principal of said special trust, a sum of not less than eight thousand dollars annually, until the same shall be exhausted, to said Wendell Phillips, William Lloyd Garrison, Stephen S. Foster, Abby R. Foster, Parker Pillsbury, Henry C. Wright, Francis Jackson and Charles H. Whipple and their survivors and survivor, for them to use and expend, at their discretion, without any responsibility to any one, for the promotion of the anti-slavery cause, and other reforms; such as woman's rights, non-resistance, free trade and temperance, at their discretion; and I request said Wendell Phillips and his said associates, to expend not less than eight thousand dollars annually by the preparation and circulation of books, newspapers, employing agents and the delivery of lectures that will, in their judgment, change public opinion, and secure the abolition of slavery in the United States, and promote said other reforms. Believing that the chain upon four million slaves, with tyrants at one end, and hypocrites at the other, has become the strongest bond of the Union of the States, I desire said Phillips and his associates to expend said bequest by employing such agents as believe and practise the doctrine of 'Non union

with slave holders, religiously or politically,' and by circulating such publications as tend to destroy every pro-slavery institution.

At the end of this interesting will Mr. Hovey requests that "No prayers be solicited from any person and that no priest be invited to perform any ceremony whatever, over or after my body. The priesthood are an order of men, as I believe, falsely assuming to be reverend and divine, pretending to be called of God; the great body of them, in all countries, have been on the side of power and oppression; the world has been too long cheated by them; the sooner they are unmasked, the better for humanity."



Rev. George Lewis Hovey7, born Aug. 20, 1810, in Lyme, N. H. When he became of age, in 1831, he joined the Congregational church in his native town. Having commenced studies at Thetford Academy, in Vermont, and felt a strong desire to be a clergyman, the claims of the West in 1832 being pressed upon the Eastern churches, calling for their young people to go there as teachers and preachers, Mr. Hovey was drawn toward the work, and he went to Oberlin, O., to attend the new college there, in the autumn of 1833. The colony then consisted of a half dozen log houses and one frame building, all being located in a dense forest, some six miles from any town. In 1837, while a member of the theological class, he was licensed to preach, by the Loraine County Association; and the next year was ordained as a missionary by the same body. In November, 1839, in company with his wife and several friends, he went as a missionary to the emancipated negroes on the island of Jamaica, in the West Indies. They were not sent by any society, but depended for their support upon the people to whom they ministered. His wife died Feb. 1. following, and in July, 1842, he returned to the United States, worn out by his labors in that climate, but hoping to return after a season of rest. For the next four years, he was able to do but little, except to present the case of his people to the churches and individuals. In 1846, he received an appointment from the American Missionary Association to raise six thousand dollars for the Jamaica Mission; and in the fall of the next year he became an agent of the Foreign Evangelical society, in connection with Doctors Baird, Kirk and others, having his office in Boston. In May, 1850, the Foreign Evangelical Society united with the American Protestant Society and the Christian Alliance, under the name of the American and Foreign Christian Union; and he remained from that time till the fall of 1871 with the society as its agent or district secretary, for New England, though in 1851 he spent six months in Europe and twice made extensive tours through the South in the interest of the society. In 1871, his health having again broken down, he went to Bricksburg, N. J., and subsequently for a short time acted as agent for Lincoln university. In 1878, he was financial agent of the American and Foreign Christian Union, with special reference to raising money for its evangelical work in France.

Gov. ALVIN PETERSON HOVEY, born in Mount Vernon, Ind., Sept. 6, 1821. He always lived in his native town; and was a distinguished citizen. He was a delegate to the convention which framed the new constitution of the state of Indiana, in 1850: judge of the circuit court for the judicial circuit comprising Posey and ten other counties in the southwestern part of the state, from May, 1851, to May, 1854; and judge of the supreme court of Indiana from May, 1854, to 1855. He next served as United States district attorney for the district of Indiana, from 1856 to 1858, when President Buchanan removed him because he supported Stephen A. Douglas for president.

When the Civil war broke out, Mr. Hovey became colonel of the Twenty-fourth Indiana regiment of volunteers; and was promoted to brigadier-general of volunteers April 13, 1862, and afterwards. July 9, 1864, to brevet major-general of United States volunteers "for distinguished and meritorious service during the present war." He commanded at the celebrated battle of Champion Hill, which was the key engagement of the Vicksburg campaign, opening the way to the capture of Vicksburg; and General Grant gave him great credi for the conduct of the battle. In May, 1864, he was brigadier-general in command of the First Division Twenty-third Army Corps, in Tennessee, and it was in that position that he won the promotion to brevet major-general.

General Hovey was appointed Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary of the United States to the government of Peru, South America, Aug. 12, 1865, and resigned in 1870. Afterwards, he became a member of congress, which position he 1416--L

resigned to become governor of Indiana, dying in the office of governor Nov. 23, 1801, at the age of seventy.

Governor Hovey married, first, Mary Ann, daughter of Hon. Enoch Randolph and Esther (Lowry) James Nov. 24, 1844, in Mount Vernon. 

REV. EDMUND OTIS HOVEY, D. D.7, son of Roger Hovey (573) and Martha Freeman, was born July 15, 1801, at Hanover, N. H., the ninth in a family of ten, five of them dying in childhood, and the other five living to be more than 70 years of age. All of them were baptized by Dr. Eden Burroughs, pastor of the Presbyterian church in Hanover. The family removed to Thetford, Vt., in 1814, but Edmund remained a while longer at

Hanover as the pupil of his uncle Jonathan Freeman. When he rejoined the family he found plenty to do on his father's farm of 100 acres; but time enough was taken for family worship, and after six days of farm-work and shop-work always came a quiet unbroken Sabbath. Much reading was done in the long winter evenings by the firelight or the dim illumination of dip candles. Standard works of history, travel and science were preferred to lighter literature. The American Journal of Science and Art found here a group of eager readers and gave to Edmund his first impulse toward a scientific career. For a while he went to a school taught by a Mr. Hubbard; but later to the Thetford

Academy, of which Rev. John Fitch was the principal.

In 1821 Edmund joined the Congregational church of which Dr. Asa Burton was the pastor, who relied on him to help bring forward the hundred or more converts of the great revival marking that year. His mind being turned toward the ministry the church adopted him as its beneficiary, "boarding him around," buying his text-books, etc., and the "Ladies' Cent Society" undertook to clothe him. His father did not really approve of all this; but finally "gave him his freedom" and ten dollars; while his uncle Otis gave him a calf that was sold and the money applied to his tuition. So zealously did the young man apply himto study that his health gave way and his physician advised him to take a long journey on horseback. Accordingly he went first to Saratoga, and thence to Sandwich, on Cape Cod, where he was for six months the guest and patient of his uncle, Dr. Nathaniel Freeman, who had been a member of Congress and a general in the Revolutionary army, and was the father of twenty children, vet generously made room for his invalid nephew.

Having regained his health Mr. Hovey entered Dartmouth College in the spring of 1825, and was graduated in 1828, being aided financially by Judge Joseph Reed and others. He was made a member of the Phi Beta Kappa Society by reason of his degree of scholarship. In his junior year his devotion to a classmate, Horace Ezra Carter, who died of typhoid fever, led to an acquaintance with Mr. Carter's sister Mary which later ripened into a marriage engagement. With another classmate, Caleb Mills, a friendship was formed that lasted through life. Other classmates were strong men who made their mark on the age: and more than half of them entered the ministry. Mr. Hovey worked his way through Andover Seminary by his skill as a boxmaker and by vacation mission-work in Vermont and Canada. His license is dated Nov. 27, 1830; and he was duly ordained Sept. 26, 1831, by the old Presbytery of Newburyport, at East Bradford (now Groveland), the parts being taken by Rev. Messrs. Perry, Hunt, Dana, Storrs and Phelps. The record is that on that day seven young men were ordained "to go into the Western

country"; namely, Messrs. Hovey, Larabee, Blood, Chapin, Tenney, Bowtell and Folsom.\*

On Oct. 5, 1831, Mr. Hovey married Miss Mary Carter, daughter of Ezra Carter, Esq., principal of the Peacham Academy, an alumnus of Dartmouth, and a relative and friend of Daniel Webster. Her grandfather, Ephraim Carter, was an ensign in the Revolutionary army and "Constable of Canterbury." Her great-grandfather, Ezra Carter, was both a physician and a magistrate; hence the inscription on his tomb, "Dr. Ezra Carter, Esquire." He married Ruth Eastman, daughter of Capt. Ebenezer Eastman, who commanded a company at the taking of Louisburg, June 16, 1746.† The immigrant ancestor of the name was Thomas Carter, one of the early settlers of Ipswich, then of Newbury, and in 1640 of Salisbury, Mass.‡ On the maternal side Miss Carter came from the families of Ellsworth, Edwards and Stoddard, names illustrious in colonial annals.

As soon as the marriage ceremony had been performed by Dr. Leonard Worcester, the wedded pair started for the West, with "a roving commission," like Abraham, "not knowing whither they were going." Crossing Lake Champlain by boat, they went by canal to Troy and Buffalo, spent a day at Niagara, and took the steamboat "Henry Clay" for Detroit, then a village of 3,500 inhabitants. According to their diary "railroads were, as yet, a subject of contemplation." Mr. Hovey started the first temperance society in Michigan, enlisting for its support Hon. Lewis Cass, then governor of the territory, but made that year Secretary of War under Jackson, and by his order "grog" was banished from the U. S. army. After a short stay at a village of Pottawattomy Indians, they went by ox-cart to the Maumee rapids, and thence by pirogue to Fort Wayne, where they met Judge Hanna, who advised them to go to a small town just started at the foot of Lake Michigan, a "right smart place of 300 inhabitants and no minister; they call it 'Chicago.'" But by this time their hearts were set on doing mission work in Indiana. Floating down the Wabash in a canoe they were stranded on shoals one night. Curling for sleep on the boxes aboard, they sang, "Thus far the Lord hath led us on," and waited till with daylight help came to set them affoat again. At Logansport they met friends with whom Mrs. Hovey remained while her husband, with the Rev. James Carnahan, "rode and tied" to Lafayette, where the latter had a parish.

Fountain county attracted Mr. Hovey, where there were 10,000 people and no minister, no meeting-house, no school-house or newspaper. Returning for his wife, they began to keep house in a log-cabin near Rob Roy, with a log floor, a stick chimney, and near by a log stable that sheltered "Barney" a reformed racehorse that carried his missionary-master 2,000 miles the next two years, never letting him miss a single appointment. Mr. Hovey started four churches, several Sunday schools, day schools and temperance societies, and promoted the first newspaper in the county. He helped form the Wabash Presbytery, covering sixteen counties, whose four ministers and eight elders once met in the Hovey cabin and at night lodged on the straw-strewn puncheon floor of its single room.

A new chapter was opened on Nov. 21, 1832, when five ministers and four elders met at Crawfordsville, in Montgomery county, in the only brick house within fifty miles, and voted to found a college. The ministers present were Rev. John M. Ellis. who presided; Mr. Hovey, who was secretary, James and John Thomson, and James A. Carnahan. Hon, Williamson Dunn gave them a forest lot of fifteen acres, where they drove the corner stake for Forest Hall, and kneeling in the newly fallen snow they solemnly dedicated the institution to God, and then voted to secure Caleb Mills as its first principal. The charter name was "Wabash Manual Labor College and Teachers' Institute" afterwards abridged to simply "Wabash College." With it Mr. Hovey became identified for life.

First, he took an appointment as its financial agent. Embarking at Covington he descended the Wabash to its mouth, then went up the Ohio to Louisville, Cincinnati and Pittsburg. Few encouraged him. Dr. Lyman Beecher "frowned on the infant weakling of a college." Appeals were in vain at Philadelphia, New York, Boston, Hartford and New Haven. At the latter city he reported himself as "with an empty purse, no hope and every door closed." He wrote resigning all connection with the college, and signed his letter, "Yours at the point of desperation." Had that letter been sent the college would have perished; but it was not sent and the college lived and finally became one of the strongest of the interior colleges. The faculty of Yale College spoke words of encouragement to the agent and advised an appeal to the smaller towns in New England. The first effort in this direction was at Amesbury, where \$50 were given. A visit to Newburyport was rewarded by gifts of money and supplies amounting to \$425. The crisis was past. Several thousand dollars were obtained. Then, one day, Mr. Hovey introduced himself to the most successful minister in New York City. saving, "Dr. Baldwin, you are asked to be the first president of Wabash College." The map of Indiana was spread out and the claims of the new state, "as large as all New England, aside from Maine," were urged, till consent was gained, and the Hoosier agent returned home with \$40,000 and the promise of a president. After the death of Dr. Baldwin, in 1840. Mr. Hovev secured Dr. White as his successor; and again, after White's death, he obtained Dr. Tuttle to follow him. Other officers of the college were secured by Mr. Hovey. His services as treasurer enabled him to turn over to his successor in that office the sum of \$100,000. He personally superintended the erection of Forest Hall. South Hall and Centre Hall. He bought of Major Whitlock the grounds for a new campus, selling at auction what was not needed for a college reserve. The Major was a hard-money man and refused payment unless in coin. Mr. Hovey went to Cincinnati and brought home, by "mud-wagon," the sum of \$6,000, in six boxes, each box containing \$1,000 in silver. A tenant of the college named Tom Kelly took the precious boxes by wheelbarrow through the public streets to the Major, who counted the contents, dollar by dollar and then gave his receipt for the sum. The new campus was densely covered by a virgin forest. Allowing the best trees to stand, the less desirable were felled and the underbrush cleared away, mainly by the professors and students, and in the clearing a building was erected that was burned before it was finished; but the recitations were hindered for only one day, and the rebuilding was begun at once.

At the outset Mr. Hovey was offered the chair of the Natural Sciences, which, after some deliberation he accepted and retained till his death. From first to last he was a trustee; for several years he was the librarian. He is said to have had at various times classes in everything taught in the college curriculum. His professorship was amply endowed by the late Chauncey Rose, of Terre Haute, who also entrusted large sums to him to be spent in acts of benevolence.

On a lot of the college reserve the Hovey house was built in 837, which remained in the family till it was recently sold as a site for a fine presidential mansion; the old dwelling being removed and used for occupancy by the curator of the campus. Within its hospitable walls were welcomed scores of youth who were treated like sons and who carried forth with them impressions felt for life.

Amid such diversity of duty Mr. Hovey found scant time for special studies or for authorship. He amassed a cabinet of 25,000 specimens, 10,000 of which were numbered and catalogued. He made a few contributions to scientific periodicals, published a few sermons, and wrote a history of Wabash College in 1857. Frequently he occupied the pulpits in the vicinity, and always won fixed attention, though his appeals were intellectual instead of emotional. At its centennial celebration Dartmouth College gave

him the degree of Doctor of Divinity. Public-spirited, patriotic, upright and conscientious in all things, he wrought out faithfully the problems that fell to his lot. The end came suddenly, March 10, 1877, and after commending his spirit to his Maker, his expiring words were "God bless Wabash College." Over the main window in Centre church, which he helped to found, a memorial window has been placed in his honor, and a monument of Quincy granite marks his final resting-place in the Oakhill cemetery at Crawfordsville, with the simple yet sufficient legend, "Faithful in the Lord." Mrs. Hovey survived him, ending her useful and beautiful life July 12, 1886, at the age of seventy-seeve.\*

Mary Freeman, born at Crawfordsville, Indiana, Sept. 28, 1838, and died there, June 4, 1897, of heart-failure. Her girlhood education was by private tutors, followed by a course at the Ohio Female College, near Cincinnati. Soon after the founding of the Agricultural College at Manhattan, Kansas, the chair of English Language and Literature was offered to Miss Hovey, who is said to have been the first lady in America to hold a college professorship. After occupying this place for several years she resigned in order to care for her venerable parents; and accordingly opened a school for young ladies at Crawfordsville, where, first and last, she instructed more than 250 young women. After her father's death, in 1877, she taught in the public schools of New Haven, where her brother then resided, and with whom she and her widowed mother made their home till in 1880, when they returned to Crawfordsville, where her school for young ladies was resumed, in which she continued with occasional interruptions till the work was relinquished on account of impaired health. Miss Hovey joined the Centre Presbyterian church at an early age and remained in its fellowship through her life. She was a tireless religious worker and was for many years president of the Ladies' Missionary Society. She also belonged to the Athenian Literary Society, to which she made frequent literary contributions. She most tenderly cared for her parents in their declining years, and aided her father in cataloguing the college cabinet, and in compiling a voluminous scrap-book of college history. She was never married. Her remains rest beside those of her parents at Crawfordsville. By will she left \$500 to the Presbyterian Board of Home Missions, and the remainder of her estate to her brother and his family.\*

CAPT. HENRY RUSSELL HOVEYT, son of Rev. Aaron and Huldah (Elv) Hovey, was "a collateral descendant" of Rev. John Russell of Hadley, Mass., who secreted the regicides, Goffe and Whalley.\* He was born in Saybrook (now Centerbrook), Conn., Jan. 27, 1816. His brother-in-law was Capt. Henry L. Champlin of Essex, Conn., at that time in command of one of the clipper ships of the "Black X" line, sailing between New York and London, to whom he was much attached, with the result that, at the age of eighteen, he made a passage with Capt. Champlin as cabin boy. At twenty-one he had become first mate; but, feeling that his education was not complete, he left the service and for two years attended the Colchester, Conn., seminary, making a special study of navigation. At twenty-three he followed the sea again, and at twenty-four was in command of the ship "President"; and he successively commanded the "Philadelphia," the "Westminster," the "Devonshire" and the "Amazon," all of the "Black X" or, as it was then known, the Morgan Line,

The "Amazon" was burned in the English Channel in 1863. Some "infernal machine" was probably shipped in her cargo. In this year the privateers "Alabama" and "Tallahassee" were fitted out in Europe for the purpose of destroying United States shipping. Captain Hovey's estate, some years later, proved their claim and participated in the "Alabama Award."

On returning to America, Captain Hovey became part owner and commander of the steamer "Lodona" of the Mallory line, sailing between New York and New Orleans, which was lost on the Florida coast August 16, 1871. Captain Hovey was among those who perished.

Several rescues at sea were made by him: notably of the passengers and crew of the steamer "Helena Sloman," bound from Hamburg for New York, which had lost her rudder and was leaking badly, having been in that condition for eight days. Captain Hovey, of the ship "Devonshire," answered her signals of distress, and transferred to his ship fifty-four cabin and eighty-six steerage passengers and the crew of forty men, the sinking vessel being left to her fate;† Fir this timely rescue, Captain

Hovey had the thanks of two continents, and many testimonials of esteem.

The mayor and common council of the City of New York sent him, in token of their high appreciation, the following finely engrossed resolution:—

By the Corporation of the City of New York-

Resolved, That the thanks of the Common Council be, and the same are hereby tendered to Captain Henry R. Hovey, of the ship Devonshire, of New York, for his humane and daring efforts in rescning from imminent peril, and safely conveying to this port the crew and passengers, numbering 175 persons of the steamer Helena Sloman, Captain P. U. Paulsen, of Hamburg, fallen in with at sea on the 28th of November, 1850, in a sinking condition; also that a grateful recognition is due to the heroic services of his gallant officers and crew, of whom his third mate, John C. Johnson, of this city, and three seamen, nobly perished in their endeavors to save others from the fate which they themselves so suddenly experienced. Also, that as a further mark of appreciation of the City of New York of the noble conduct of Capt. Hovey, a Gold Box, suitably inscribed, be presented him.

This testimonial is now in the family collection of Henry Russell Hovey of Hartford, Conn.

The box is of fine gold, about four inches long by two and one-half wide and about an inch thick, and bears on the outside of the cover the inscription, "HOVEY," and inside the following:—

"Presented by the Corporation of the City of New York to Capt. Henry R. Hovey, of the ship Devonshire, of the same place, as a testimonial of their appreciation of his heroic conduct on the occasion of his rescuing the crew and passengers of the steamer Helena Sloman, at sea, on the 28th Nov., 1850."

This relic is now owned by Mrs. W. S. Lines, a daughter of Captain Hovey, of Hartford, Conn.

A gold medal was also presented to Captain Hovey by the senate of Hamburg. On one side is a view of the harbor of Hamburg, on the reverse, the Exchange, the Bank, the Berlin railway station, the Opera house, the building of the Patriotic Society, Music hall and Theatre. The medal was in a box, superbly ornamented with silver mountings. On the lid is the following inscription:—

THE SENATE OF HAMBURG
To Capt. Henry R. Hovey, for
the gallant rescue of the
passengers of the
Hamburg Ship
Helena Sloman,
Nov. 29,
1850.

This medal is now in the possession of Roger Huntley Hovey, of Hartford, Conn., a grandson of Capt. Henry Russell Hovey.

The following correspondence passed between the consul of Hamburg and Captain Hovey:—

# Consulate of Hamburg, 4 William-st., April 16, 1845.

DEAR SIR—II affords me great satisfaction to renew my correspond-ence with you, and in referring to my note of 7th December last, to have it in my power to say, that the government of Hamburg has not only approved of my having expressed to you officially my thanks for the assistance rendered to the passengers and crew of the Hamburg stramship "Helena Sloman," but has also directed me to express to you the high appreciation with which has been viewed by the Senate of the free and Hanseatic city of Hamburg, your humanity and gallantry, and the courage and devotion displayed by the officers and crew of the noble ship, Devonshire, under you on that lamentable occasion, lamentable on account of the loss of life sustained in the act of transferring passengers to your rescue ship.

In mistructed to present to you and to Mr. Moore, your efficient I fim instructed to present to you and to Mr. Moore, your efficient softeer, a memorial of the acknowledgments of the city of Hamburg, consisting of a gold medal in an ornamented case, and to pay the sum of one hundred dollars to the families (if in needy circumstances) of the late third mate, Mr. John G. Johnson, and the three seamen of the ship Devonshire; also, to distribute the some of other hundred dollars among the other part of the crew at that time under your command; and in the hope that you will lend me your assistance in the carrying out of these instructions as far as practicable, I request you to grant me an interview on board of your vessel tomorrow (Thursday) afternoon, and to induce Mr. Moore to be present at that time, also, in order to meet me.

This testimonal will recall to me and mine an occasion in which Providence enabled me to aid my suffering fellow-creatures and will remind us of the generous appreciation of my conduct at that time, in such a manner as to incite to new efforts for others.

I did no more than my duty, and trust that the notice which has been taken of the rescue of the passangers of the "Helena Sloman," may stimulate others of my profession to still greater exertions for those who are in danger.

A superb silver speaking trumpet was given to Captain Hovey by cabin passengers on the rescued vessel. It weighed forty-two ounces and was inlaid with gold, having on it an embossed representation of the act of rescue and the loss of the mate, three seamen and five passengers by the upsetting of the boat which they were in. The trumpet bears the following inscription:—

Presented to Captain Henry R. Hovey of the ship Devonshire, by some of the cabin passengers of the steamer Helena Sloman and others, as a token of esteem for saving the passengers and crew of said steamer while in a sinking condition on the twenty-eighth November, 1850.

This relic is owned by Henry Russell Hovey of Hartford, Conn.

As an indication of the esteem in which Captain Hovey was held by the passengers of the ship "Devonshire," very interesting letters are on file with the family, testifying to the constant courtesy and elegant hospitality of the commander, as well as the superior order kept on board his vessel. His reply to these words of thanks and appreciation is also on file.

Captain Hovey was a devout christian. Even as a boy his mid was trained to religious thought; but it was not until he had seen something of the world and become convinced that, while "in the world" he was "not of it" that he confessed Christ and joined the church of which his father (Rev. Aaron Hovey) was pastor. When ashore he always attended church meetings and the writer of this sketch (Henry Russell Hovey, jr.) has been present at many prayer meetings in which he took part,—always in prayer and always (as was customary then) kneeling during its offering. His death, at the age of fifty-five years (August 16, 1871), was an event that called for elaborate notices from pulpit and press of two continents, as may be found from a perusal of New York and London papers of that date. It was truly said of him: "Here was a man, a nobleman."

Captain Hovey married Mary Emma Kutz, daughter of Erasmus A. Kutz, for forty years (1810-1850) a manufacturer of nautical instruments on Water street, in New York. She was born in Brooklyn, N. Y., November 24, 1818, and died in Hartford, Conn., August 10, 1906. They were united in marriage May 4, 1841, in Broolyn, N. Y., by Rev. Melancthon Jacobus, father of Rev. Melancthon W. Jacobus, the present dean of Hartford Theological Seminary. It is worthy of note to quote the lines written by Doctor Jacobus and given "His beloved Miss Mary," at the time he married them:—\*

Bonds, sweet and lasting may these be, In unalloyed felicity; And in this hallowed blest estate, Long live the CAPTAIN and his MATE; Aiding each other o'er life's sea, To reach a safe eternity.\*





REV. ALVAH HOVEY, D. D., LL, D., S. T. D., born in Greene, N. Y., March 5, 1820. His early years were passed on a farm in Thetford, Vt. He fitted for college at Brandon, Vt., and entered Dartmouth at the age of nineteen, leaving at the beginning of his junior year to become principal of Derby academy. After two years he returned to college, entered the senior class and was graduated in 1844. He then taught a private academy in New London, N. H., one year and three months; and entered Newton Theological Institution, at Newton Centre, Mass., in 1845, for the study of theology. At this Baptist institution, his teachers were Doctors Sears and Hackett. He graduated in 1848, and preached for a year (June, 1848, to June, 1849) in New Gloucester, Me., was ordained Jan. 13, 1850, and then returned to the Newton Theological Institution, where he was tutor in Hebrew for five years, librarian for three years, professor of Church History two years, and professor of Christian Theology forty-six years.

Doctor Hovey visited Europe in 1861-2, and Egypt and Palestine in 1807. He was elected president of the Newton Theological Institution in 1868, and remained its head until June 1, 1000, when he resigned, on account of ill-health. He had been professor of General Introduction and Apologetics since the previous year, and continued to occupy that chair until the year of his death.

He was a trustee of Worcester academy and the New England Conservatory of Music; vice president and trustee of Wellesley college; fellow and trustee of Brown university; a corporate member of the General Theological Libray of Boston; member of the board of managers of the American Tract Society. Victoria Institute of London, the Theological Club "C. C.," the Harvard Biblical Club, the Theological Circle and of the Neighbors of Newton Centre, and an honorary member of the Boston Social Union. Besides being its president, he was a trustee of the Newton Theological Institution; and a member of the executive committee of The American Baptist Missionary Union for fifteen years, eight of which he was the chairman. He duly received the degrees of S. T. D., D. D., and LL. D., from Brown University, Richmond College and Denison University.

Dr. Hovey published "The Life and Times of Isaac Backus, A. M.;" "The State of the Impenitent Dead;" "Miracles of Christ;" "Biblical Eschatology;" "God with Us;" "Religion and the State;" "Commentaries on the Gospel of John" and "The Epistle to the Galations" in the "American Commentaries," of which he was the general editor; "Manual of Christian Theology;" "Studies in Ethics and Theology;" and several other volumes, beside numerous articles in various periodicals,

Doctor Hovey married Miss Augusta Maria Rice of Newton Centre Sept. 24, 1852. She was born there Feb. 19, 1831. They celebrated their golden wedding anniversary Sept. 24, 1902. The next summer, he received a paralytic shock, and, failing in health rapidly, died at his home, 91 Summer street, in Newton Centre, Sept. 6, 1903, at the age of eighty-three. He learned to set type at the age of twelve, and worked on the Detroit Free Press as compositor. He also worked in the office of the Livingston Journal, at Genesee, N. Y., and of the Niagara Courier, at Lockport, N. Y.

He settled in Pontiac, Mich., being a pioneer, in the spring of 1836, and was first employed in the printing office of Samuel N. Gautt, editor of the *Pontiac Herald*. When he arrived at the age of twenty-one, in 1838, he became managing editor of that paper. He then formed a partnership with S. S. Denton, and published the *Pontiac Jacksonian*, which they continued to issue until the spring of 1844, when the firm of Denton & Hovey sold the paper and office.

Mr. Hovey then abandoned the newspaper business, and engaged in the drug trade, which he carried on for forty years, in Pontiac. For many years he was associated with a Mr. Dean, under the firm name of Dean & Hovey. Mr. Dean died some years later, but Mr. Hovey continued the business under the old firm name as long as he remained in the trade. He sold out, in 1883, to his clerk, Peter Schmitz.

Mr. Hovey was an ardent Democrat, and cast his first vote for Martin Van Buren, but his last for William McKinley, uniting his influence with the sound money Democrats in crushing out free silver.

Through his mother, he had some French characteristics, and possessed many sterling traits. He was thoroughly honest and of unquestioned integrity. A man of few words, he was seldom deceived in his estimate of a person, and with wonderful directness could detect sham, however genteelly it was concealed, and noble qualities of manhood, though clothed in tattered garments.

He held many positions of honor and trust. He was clerk of the house of representatives of Michigan in 1844, 1846, 1847, 1848 and 1849, and for three years was a member of the Pontiac school board. In 1852, he was made superintendent of the poor, and held the position more than thirty years. He was also the county purchasing agent.

For many years, Mr. Hovey's rotund figure made him a conpicuous person. He reduced his weight of three hundred pounds or more to less than two hundred by force of his will controlling his appetite, and this contributed to his health and comfort in his latter years.

WILLIAM ALFRED HOVEY7, born in Boston, Mass., Dec. 21, 1841. He was educated in the public schools of Boston,—the Phillips grammar school and the English high school. Upon his graduation from the high school, in 1860, he went to Europe, and spent nearly two years in Italy, Germany and France, improving his time in the study of languages and general culture. In this experience was the foundation of his delightful and instructive conversational ability. Upon his return to this country he became associated with the Sanitary Commission, through a visit to the Army of the Potomac, and filled many positions of responsibility in the field and in various offices in Washington, rising to the position of assistant secretary. The excellence of his work and the value of his reports and general services were often commented on by his superiors in the Commission, and by the many army officers with whom his duties brought him into official relations.

At the end of the war, Mr. Hovey drifted to Pennsylvania, where, for several years, he was connected with coal mines in the capacity of engineer and also of superintendent. There, he became interested in journalism and wrote articles for several newspapers in that state on political and general economic subjects. He returned to Massachusetts, and established, in Chelsea, a weekly paper which proved to be a financial failure. In 1872 he became managing editor of the Boston Commercial Bulletin. and remained in that position until 1875, when, on the death of Daniel N. Haskell, he succeeded to the editorship of the Boston Evening Transcript. He continued his connection with this paper for six years, and his position brought him into contact with a large circle of men and women who recognized his integrity of thought, his fearlessness of opinion, and that general intelligent point of view of all large and important questions which stamped him a remarkable man among men.

In the Transcript, Mr. Hovey established a column entitled "Causerie," in which he was "delightfully dogmatic, brilliantly epigrammatic, extravagantly emphatic, and on all questions of ethics, politics and society gloriously democratic. . . A gentleman in the full old-world sense, no man's heart ever beat truer for equal rights or warmed with wrath quicker at sight of any social oppression. Naturally, along with this sort of feeling went an intense detestation for the petty frauds of custom, religious shams, the pretentions and affectations of society."\*

He was a prince of good fellows, with great sense of humor and a fund of stories accumulated in smoking rooms with congenial spirits on land and sea. He was a founder of both the Papyrus and St. Botolph clubs, and became influential and widely esteemed within the membership of each.

He was twice invited to deliver a course of lectures on

scientific subjects before the Lowell Institute. The last twenty years of his life were passed in serving the

American Bell Telephone Company with his wide acquaintance, his encyclopedic information and his general abilities.

He received the honorary degree of M. A. from Williams

college in 1880.

Mr. Hovey married Frances Goodridge, daughter of Lowell Goodridge and Caroline Knox Morgan, Dec. 16, 1868, in Pennsylvania. She died in 1896. He died at Chestnut Hill, in Boston, Feb. 18, 1906, aged sixty-four.

Rev. Henry Emerson Hoveys, born in Lowell, Mass., Nov. 23, 1844. He prepared for college in the public schools of Lowell, and graduated at Trinity college, in Hartford, Conn., in 1866, at the head of his class, and from the General Theological seminary, at New York City, in 1869. He was ordained a deacon the same year, and shortly after went abroad, passing much of his time at Oxford, England. During the period of his deaconate he was rector of St. John's church, Fort Hamilton, New York harbor. He was ordained a priest of the Episcopal church in

1870; and was rector of the Church of the Ascension, at Fall River, Mass., the next two years. He was then rector of the new parish of St. Barnabas, Brooklyn, N. Y., from 1873 to 1883, leaving the parish firmly established and a centre of power and influence in that ward.

In 1880, he spent a vacation on the continent of Europe, and, in 1882, received calls simultaneously to the rectorship of the American Episcopal church in Geneva, Switzerland, and to St. John's and Christ churches in Portsmouth, N. H. He chose the latter churches, and entered upon his duties in February, 1883. During his rectorship at Portsmouth, St. John's church was largely restored and beautified and the Portsmouth hospital founded.

In 1884, Mr. Hovey delivered the address of welcome in behalf of the citizens of Portsmouth to the Greeley survivors on their return from the Arctic region; and in 1885 he gave the civic oration at the local commemoration of the death of General Grant.

In 1885, he was elected a trustee of the Home for Aged Women in Portsmouth, and was its president from 1886. He was a trustee of St. Mary's Diocesan school of Concord from 1886, and from 1887 of the Portsmouth Board of Instruction. He held many other local positions of trust and responsibility.

He was president of the New Hampshire Society of the Sons of the Revolution, and much interested in its work and progress.

Mr. Hovey was a man of wide reading, of strong convictions and generous sympathies, an accurate scholar, admirable organizer, staunch churchman and an affectionate rector. As a preacher, he was unusually simple, direct and logical. His sermons were graphic, tender and earnest.

He married Sarah Louise, daughter of Charles James and Sarah Carmen (Downing) Folsom of New York City April 19, 1871, in St. George's church. She was born in New York City Aug. 23, 1844.

He was of strong, vigorous constitution, but in the year 1908 valvular disease of the heart developed, and on August 6. 1909, Feast of the Transfiguration, he passed away while seated in his chair at the rectory. REV. HORACE CARTER HOVEY, D. D.8, born in a log cabin near Rob Roy, in Fountain county, Indiana, Jan. 28, 1833, was the son of Edmund Otis Hovey and Mary (Carter) Hovey. His father was for 47 years identified with Wabash College as founder, trustee and professor. (See No. 1051.) Mr. Hovey was graduated from Wabash College in 1853, and was subsequently honored by election to the Phi Beta Kappa society. He joined the Centre Presbyterian church of Crawfordsville, Ind., when twelve years of age, and was a teacher in its Sunday school, and for several years a member and then a director of its large chorus choir. For two years he was a tutor in college. He served one summer as Sunday school missionary in Fountain county, where he organized twenty schools and devised a method of Sunday school map-making that has since been generally adopted throughout the country. While fitting for the ministry at Lane Theological Seminary, from which he was graduated in 1857, he taught music in the public schools of Cincinnati, and directed a chorus choir in what is now known as the Third Presbyterian church of that city. He was ordained by the Presbytery of Madison, April 16, 1858, within whose bounds he labored for three years as a home missionary, followed by a year as field secretary of the American and Foreign Christian Union in Indiana. Michigan and Wisconsin. Declining a call to the pastorate of a church at Coldwater, Michigan, and also an offer to serve as chaplain in the U. S. Army, Mr. Hovey accepted as his first settled pastorate the care of the Florence Church of Christ, in Northampton, Mass., where he remained from 1863 to 1866. While there he served for two terms of two months each, as a delegate of the U. S. Christian Commission. The first term he did what was styled "battlefield duty" amid the perils of the Wilderness, North Anna and Cold Harbor. The second term was more quietly spent amid the hospitals at Washington, and after the fall of Richmond in aiding its starving citizens.

Dr. Hovey held several other pastorates as follows: Second Presbyterian Church, New Albany, Ind., (1866-69); Fulton Street Presbyterian Church, Peoria, Ill., (1869-73); First Prespetrian Church, Kansas City, Mo., (1873-75); Pilgrim Congregational Church, New Haven, Conn., (1876-83); Park Avenue Congregational Church, Minneapolis, Minn., (1883-87); Park Street Congregational Church, Bridgeport, Conn., (1887-91); South Church, Middletown, Conn., as supply, (1892); First Presbyterian Church (Old South) Newburyport, Mass., (1893-1909). On resigning the latter charge, at the age of seventy-five years, and after more than fifty years of active service, he retired from public life in order to devote himself to special literary, scientific and theological pursuits, though frequently answering

invitations to occupy the pulpit or the platform.

Dr. Hovey received in course the degree of Master of Arts from Wabash College in 1856; and the honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity, first from Gale University, Wis., in 1883, and again from Wabash College in 1007. He is a fellow of the A. A. A. S., a member of the Geological Society of America, and of the International Geological Congress, of the National Geographic Society, of La Societe de Speleologie (France), a charter member of the Conn. S. A. R., has been for fifteen years president of the Merrimac Bible Society, is an honorary member of the local G. A. R., and was one of the founders of the Daniel Hovey Association, of which he has been the president since its inception in 1900. He has also held numerous offices in the ecclesiastical bodies with which he has been connected. In 1897, with his son, Dr. Edmund Otis Hovey, he attended a meeting of the International Geological Congress at St. Petersburg; previous to which, with a select party, they made explorations in European Russia and across the Ural mountains into Asia, and later made an excursion into Finland. Subsequently Dr. Hovey returned to Paris and accompanied members of the Societe de Speleologie on an exploring tour through the caverns and canyons of the region of the Causses and gorges of the Tarn, Jonte and Durbais, with remarkable results.

Although not claiming to be a professional geologist, Dr. When but nine years old he found the first of all the myriads of Crawfordsville crinoids that have since been sent by Corey, Bassett, Springer, and others beside himself, to the leading museums of America and Europe; and the original crinoid-bank known as Corey's Bluff is still owned in the family. In the summer of 1854 made an independent reconnaissance of the geological features of southern Indiana, and was among the first to call attention to the marble quarries and coal fields of that state. During that year he explored a number of Indiana caverns, including the famous Wyandotte Cave, which he mapped, and of which he

published an account at the time in the New York Tribune and the Indianapolis Journal. He has since explored many other caves and grottoes, and is a recognized authority on the subject. He has lectured in the principal cities of the United States and Canada on his travels and on popular science. He has been a frequent contributor to the leading magazines, and more than a hundred articles from his pen have appeared in the Scientific American. Articles by him have been published in the Ninth, Tenth and Eleventh editions of the Encyclopaedia Britannica. He is the author of "Celebrated American Caverns" (1882); "Guide-Book to Mammoth Cave" (fifteen editions); "Mammoth Cave Illustrated," jointly with Dr. R. E. Call (1897), and a new edition of the same greatly enlarged by him (1912); "On the Banks of the Quinnipiac," an historical poem, (1889); "The Origin and Annals of the First Presbyterian Church of Newburyport" (1897); and a new "Hand-book of the Mammoth Cave," with new maps, (1909); and more than thirty of his sermons and addresses have been published in pamphlet form. A complete Bibliography of works about Mammoth Cave has been prepared by him and will shortly be published in Spelunca. a scientific magazine issued in Paris, France.

Dr. Hovey married, Nov. 18, 1857, Helen Lavinia Blatchley, of New Haven, Conn., a daughter of Samuel Lope Blatchley, descendant of William Blatchley, an early merchant in Boston and Hartford; and on her maternal side she came from Ebenezer and James Robinson, both Revolutionary soldiers, and through them from the Spelman family, famous in early English annals. (See Spelman Genealogy, published by Frank Allaben, 1910.) She was born at North Madison, Conn., and was a teacher at New Haven, and in both the Cincinnati High schools until the time of her marriage. Dr. and Mrs. Hovey celebrated their golden wedding, Nov. 18, 1907, and a large delegation from the Daniel Hovey Association were among the many guests. He was professor of Latin, Greek and Hebrew. After his graduation, he began teaching in small schools in Vermont and later held several positions in Central New York. He left the Ontario Female Seminary in Canandaigua, N. Y., to enter upon the principalship of the high school at Newark, N. J., where he remained for twenty-nine years. He brought the Newark high school from a very small school to a large size and of the highest standing. He also had charge of the normal and training school at Newark. Upon the twenty-fifth anniversary of his position at Newark many of the leading men of the state

gathered at a banquet, at which a solid silver tea service was presented to him.

Doctor Hovey was a member of the New Jersey State Teachers' Association, the Teachers' Provident Association of the United States, the High School Teachers' Association, the New York Alumni Association of Madison University and a number of other similar organizations, in all of which he held office at various times. He also belonged to the Bureau of Associated Charities, the Essex Art Association, of which he was a director, and the Harmonic Singing Society.

He was a member of St. John's lodge of freemasons, and deeply interested in the Masonic secret ritual. He often took part in conferring degrees and frequently made addresses at

Masonic gatherings.

Doctor Hovey joined the Baptist church in New York in 1843, being baptized in mid-winter in the Black river, near A!bany, when the weather was so cold that a hole had to be cut through the ice for the immersion. In Newark, he was admitted to the First Baptist church, and was deacon of it for four years. In 1897 he was admitted to the South Baptist church of Newark, and was deacon of that church at the time of his death. He was a man of optimistic temperament, literary in his tastes, nearly six feet in height, courtly in manner, with blue eyes and dark hair.

He married Julia Bennett, daughter of James Calkins and Laura (Wood) Huntley Dec. 29, 1858, in West Winfield, N. Y. She was born in Plainfield, N. J., Feb. 18, 1835. He died in Newark Feb. 23, 1902, at the age of seventy-two; and she died

RICHARD HOVEY8, born in Normal, Ill., May 4, 1864. His childhood was passed chiefly in Washington, D. C., the summers being spent at the old Spofford place, in North Andover, Mass., then owned by his grandfather, Farnham Spofford. His constitution was so delicate that he was not sent to school, but prepared for college privately. He was graduated at Dartmouth college in 1885; and was one of the speakers at the commencement and class poet. He took honors in English literature; and secured prizes for dramatic speaking in 1884 and 1885. He was a Phi Beta Kappa man, and a member of the Psi Upsilon fraternity, being its delegate to the convention at Hartford in 1885. He was editor of The Dartmouth in his freshman, sophomore and junior years, and managing editor of the 1885 Aegis. He, also, wrote the sophomore history of his class, under the title, "Hanover by Gaslight; or, Wavs that are Dark."

He spent the years 1885 and 1886 in Washington, studying drawing and painting in the Art Students' League of that city. In 1886, he studied Hebrew at Professor Harper's summer school of Hebrew at Newton Centre, Mass.

In 1886 and spring of 1887 he was a junior at the General Theological Seminary of the Episcopal church at Chelsea Square, N. Y., being at the same time an assistant of Father Brown at the Church of St. Mary the Virgin; but at the end of the school vear he left the seminary, by the advice of the bishop, to pursue his studies under the bishop's direction. Mr. Hovey said that "practical necessity" compelled his attention in other directions, and he gradually drifted away from the career of a clergyman.

In the summer of 1887 he was again at Newton Centre; and then met Tom Breford Meteyard, the painter, and Bliss Carman, the poet, who became his dearest friends, and were associated with him in the "Songs from Vagabondia." That fall he lived in Boston and did some newspaper work. He also then and there made his first appearance on the stage as a "super" in the production of "Tulius Cæsar," by Booth and Barrett.

He returned to Washington that winter, and the next spring, as he was coming away from a lecture on "Sappho" at the Columbian University, he heard some one shouting behind him, "Hi! Halloa, there!" Turning around, he saw Hon. Horatio King (postmaster-general under President Buchanan) running after him and gesticulating incomprehensibly. Mr. Hovey was not acquainted with Mr. King, but stopped until he came up, when the latter said that Mr. Hovey looked like Giotto's portrait of Dante, and that he wanted to meet him. Mr. Hovey returned with Mr. King, met Mr. Davidson, and was engaged that day to lecture for him the next June at his summer school of philosophy at Farmington, Conn. The lecture was on Mephistopheles of Goethe and Marlowe. At Farmington, he met the widow of Sidney Lanier, who presented to him a wreath of laurel which she had just received from the south. This was the occasion of his writing "The Laurel." In the summer of 1889, he lectured again at the same school, on the "Relations between Ethics and Aesthetics.'

In the spring of 1890, he went on the stage, primarily to complete his education as a playwright. His first part was with Mary Shaw in "A Drop of Poison," as "Counsellor Fabricus," a diplomatist at the court of Berlin.

In 1891, he went to Europe and spent a year in England and France, the greater part of his time being spent among the impressionistes and symbolistes painters in France, etc.

Mfr. Hovey began to write poetry when a mere child, and at the age of eleven he printed and bound some of his verse. The first recognition of merit in his writings was received from Prof. C. F. Richardson, on the occasion of printing in The Dartmouth some of his sonnets to Swinburne. He was the author of a famous song,—the strongest belonging to any American college, entitled

THE MEN OF DARTMOUTH,

Men of Dartmouth, give a rouse
For the college on the hill!
For the Lone Pine above her
And the loyal men who love her,—
Give a rouse, give a rouse, with a will!
For the sons of old Dartmouth,
The sturdy sons of Dartmouth—
Though round the girdled earth they roam,
Her spell on them remains;
They have the still North in their hearts,
The hill-winds in their veins,
And the granite of New Hampshire
In their mussles and their brains.

They were mighty men of old That she nurtured at her side, Till like Vikings they went forth From the lone and silent North,—And they strove, and they wrought, and they died. But—the sons of old Dartmouth,—The laurelled sons of Dartmouth,—The mother keeps them in her heart And guards their altar-flame;
The still North remembers them,
The hill-winds know their name,
And the granite of New Hampshire Keeps the record of their fame.

Men of Dartmouth, set a watch
Lest the old traditions fail!
Stand as brother stands by brother!
Dare a deed for the old Mother!
For the sons of old Dartmouth,
The loyal sons of Dartmouth—
Around the world they keep for her
Their old chivalrie faith;
They have the still North in their souls,
The hill-winds in their breath;
And the granite of Avew Hampshire
Is made part of them till death.

Mr. Hovey's Stein Song, the most popular college song in existence, has a lilt and a swing to it that satisfies the college youth as few songs do. The music was written by Frederic Field Bullard. The words are as follows:—

#### A STEIN SONG

Give a rouse, then, in the Maytime
For a life that knows no fear!
Turn night-time into day-time
With the sunlight of good cheer!
For it's always fair weather
When good fellows get together
With a stein on the table and a good song ringing clear

When the wind comes up from Cuba

And the birds are on the wing,
And our hearts are patting juba
To the banjo of the spring,
Then there's no wonder whether
The boys will get together,
With a stein on the table and a cheer for everything.

For we're all frank-and-twenty
When the spring is in the air,
And we've faith and hope a-plenty,
And we've life and love to spare;
And it's birds of a feather
When we all get together,
With a stein on the table and a heart without a care.

For we know the world is glorious And the goal a golden thing, And that God is not censorious When his children have their fling: And life slips its tether When the boys get together,

Mr. Hovey was intensely human. He worshipped comradeship, loyalty, brotherhood, with a profound faith that is an in-spiration. Sham and hypocrisy irked him beyond endurance. To his alma mater he gave his frankest loyalty and love. The following lines are characteristic of his jubilant spirit, which knew no bounds:-

HANOVER WINTER-SONG.

Ho, a song by the fire! (Pass the pipes, fill the bowl!)
Ho, a song by the fire!
—With a Skoal!

For the wolf wind is whining in the doorways,

And the snow drifts deep along the road, And the ice-gnomes are marching from their Norways,

And the great white cold walks abroad.

(Boo-oo-o! pass the bowl!) For here by the fire

We defy frost and storm. Ha, ha! we are warm And we have our heart's desire; For here's four good fellows

And the beechwood and the bellows, And the cup is at the lip
In the pledge of fellowship.
Skoal!

In the spring of 1893, he read a poem at the Psi Upsilon Fraternity reunion in Hanover, which is instinct with his own love of the college. These opening lines quicken one with their exultation:-

> Again among the hills! The shaggy hills!

The clear arousing air comes like a call Of bugle notes across the pines, and thrills

My heart as if a hero had just spoken. Again among the hills! The jubilant unbroken

Long dreaming of the hills! Far off, Ascutney smiles as one at peace;

And over all
The golden sunlight pours and fills
The hollow of the earth, like a God's joy.

Again among the hills! The tranquil hills

That took me as a boy

And filled my spirit with the silences!

The poem reaches its climax in the parting lyric:-

Comrades, pour the wine to-night, For the parting is with dawn. Oh, the clink of cups together, With the daylight coming on! Greet the morn With a double horn, When strong men drink together!

Comrades, gird your swords to-night, For the battle is with dawn. Oh, the clash of shields together, With the triumph coming on! Greet the foe And lay him low, When strong men fight together.

Comrades, watch the tides to-night, For the sailing is with dawn. Oh, to face the spray together, With the tempest coming on! Greet the sea With a shout of glee, When strong men roam together.

Comrades, give a cheer to-night,
For the dying is with dawn.
Oh, to meet the stars together,
With the silence coming on!
Greet the end
As a friend a friend,
When strong men die together.

Richard Hovey's "Seaward" was an elegy on his friend, Thomas William Parsons, an American poet, "The hermit thrush of singers," who gave thirty years to the study and interpretation of Dante. The Independent said it excelled any elegiac verse since John Milton. A few selected stanzas as specimens of the forty-five that make up this marvelous monody follow:—

The tide is in the marshes. Far away
In Nova Scotia's woods they follow me,
Marshes of distant Massachusetts Bay,
Dear marshes, where the dead once loved to be.
I see them lying yellow in the sun,
And hear the mighty tremor of the sea
Beyond the dunes where blue cloud-shadows run.

The fanfare of the trumpets of the sea
Assaults the air with jubilant foray;
The intolerable exigence of glee,
Shouts to the sun and leaps in radiant spray;
The laughter of the breakers on the shore
Shakes like the mirth of Titans heard at play,
With thunders of tumulutous uproar.

Playmate of terrors! Intimate of Doom! Fellow of Fate and Death! Exultant Sea! Thou strong companion of the Sun, make room! Let me make one with you, rough comrade, Sea! Sea of the boisterous sport of wind and spray! Sea of the hout. I know what thou wouldst say.

Poet thou hast adventured in the roar
Of mighty seas with one that never failed
To make the havens of the further shore.
Beyond that vaster Ocean thou hast sailed
What old immortal world of beauty lies
What land where light for matter has prevailed!
What strange Atlantic dreams of Paradise!

Then the author of the elegy fancies Parsons as being greeted by numerous other poets in order to lead the new arrival "To the eternal company of song." Mightiest among them emerges Dante from the shades to greet his best and latest interpreter:—

His feet are in thy courts, O Lord; his ways
Are in the City of the Living God.
Beside the eternal sources of the days
He dwells, his thought with tineless lightnings shod;
His hours are exaltations and desires,
The soul itself its only period,
And life unmeasured save as it aspires.

About his paths the tall swift angels are,
Whose motion is like music but more sweet;
The centuries for him their gates unbar;
He hears the stars their Glorias repeat;
And in high moments when the fervid soul
Burns white with love, lo! on his gaze replete
The vision of the Godhead shall unrol.

A biographical sketch of Richard Hovey was prepared in 1912 by Herbert D. Foster, secretary of the class of 1885; to which was appended a bibliography by Harold Goddard Rugg. Nineteen separate volumes by Mr. Hovey are catalogued, including four that were published after his death. The first in the list was a book of poems for which Richard, in his boyhood, set the type, did the printing and binding, and had it copyrighted before even his parents knew about it.

Among his published works may be especially mentioned, "The Laurel," in 1889; "Launcelot and Guenevere," in 189, "Seaward, an Elegy," in 1895; "Songs from Vagabondia," with Bliss Carman, in 1894; "Maeterlink's Plays" (translated) in 1894; "The Marriage of Guenevere," in 1895; "More Songs from Vagabondia," in 1896; "The Birth of Galahad," in 1898; "Along the Trail," in 1898; "The Quest of Merlin," in 1900; "Taliesin, a Masque," in 1896 and again in Poet Lore in 1900.

Mr. Rugg gives the titles of ninety of Mr. Hovey's poems and sketches that appeared in various literary magazines and a list of his songs that had been set to music. He also lists the more prominent book reviews of his works; and gives a list of the portraits of the poet, from which Mrs. Hovey has selected

the one found in this volume as the best.

Mr. Hovey married Mrs. Henrietta Russell Jan. 17, 1803, in Boston. From the time of their marriage until 1806 they were in Europe, living most of the time in London. After their return to America, they lived in New York and Washington, where he was engaged in literary work. He was subsequently lecturer on literature in Columbia college and professor of English literature in Barnard college, New York City. About Feb. 10, 1900, Mr. Hovey entered the Post Graduate hospital, at Barnard college, to prepare for a serious operation which was performed successfully a few days later. A week after the operation he was up and walking about the building, and was suddenly stricken with appoplexy, while walking in one of the wards, Feb. 24, 1900, dying almost immediately. His age was thirty-five. Mrs. Hovey lived in New York City until 1909, when she removed to Los Angeles, Cal., where she now resides. She was the leading representative of the philosophy and art teaching of Francois Delsarte; having sutdied with the younger Delsarte in Paris, where she was his assistant.





He prepared for college at Hillhouse high school in New Haven, from which he was graduated in 1880; and graduated with honor at Yale in 1884. He taught in the evening schools of New Haven from 1882 to 1884; was principal of the high school and superintendent of schools at Janesville, Minn., in 1884-5, and at Elk River, Minn., in 1885-6. He returned to Yale in the fall of 1886 to take up graduate work, majoring in geology, with chemistry and mineralogy as minor subjects. He was assistant in the mineralogical laboratory, Sheffield Scientific school, at New Haven, 1886,1887, assistant-principal of the high school in Waterbury, Conn., 1888-1889, and its principal in 1891-1892. He received his degree of Doctor of Philosophy in June, 1889, his thesis being "Observations on the Trap Rock Ridges of the East Haven-Branford (Connecticut) Region."

In the summer of 1890, Dr. Hovey was one of Professor W. M. Davis' assistants in the United States geological survey work in the New Haven region; and that fall he went to Heidelberg (Germany) University where he studied two semesters under Professor H. Rosenbusch, the leading petrographer of the world. The vacation seasons were spent in geological and other excursions in central Europe. Returning to this country in the fall of 1801, Dr. Hovey was elected principal of the Waterbury high school, a position which he resigned at the end of June, 1892, to become assistant on the State geological survey of Missouri in charge of the assembling and installation of the state mineral exhibit at the Chicago Columbia exposition. Finishing this work in July, 1803, he returned to New Haven. Jan. 1, 1894, he entered the service of the American Museum of Natural History as assistant curator of the Department of Geology and Invertebrate Paleontology, under the curatorship of the noted paleontologist Robert P. Whitfield. Jan. 1, 1901, Dr. Hovey was advanced to the grade of associate curator, and Jan. 1, 1910, was made curator of the department, Mr. Whitfield having been retired on account of old age. He was an assistant on the United States geological

survey in 1890, 1892 and 1902-1906 (mineral resources).

Dr. Hovey's principal publications have been on the geology of the New Haven region, on the type specimens of fossils in his department at the museum (in collaboration with R. P. Whitfield), on the geology and petrography of the western Sierra Madre of Chihuahua, Mexico, on meteorites and particularly on the 1902-1903 eruptions of Mt. Pele, Martinique, and the Soufriere, St. Vincent. He was editor of the American Museum Journal, 1902-1910, contributing many pages of its text. Samuel Hovey was an Antipedobaptist preacher at Newton, N. H., who visited Weare, N. H., in 1766, and was so well pleased that he began his settlement, on Barnard hill, and came to reside there April 19, 1768. He, together with Elder Smith and Elder Greenleaf and others, organized the Second Baptist church in the state (the first Baptist church was formed at New-

ton in 1755).\* Rev. Samuel Hovey had some difficulty with some of the brethren and led a second party to form a new covenant. He often preached sermons two hours long. People carried their dinners and had their noonings, after which they held meetings for conference and prayers. August 1, 1773, Elder Hovey preached a sermon which came upon the people "like a thunderbolt from a clear sky." The result was a church meeting on August 6, followed by another, Sept. 12, when the church voted not to allow "Hovey's followers to commune or act with it as members in good standing, because they held that it (the church) has got the Devil's counterfeit gospel." The church met again October 31, and ex-communicated all of "Hovey's followers." The schism which broke the church in pieces was as to whether "sinners should be exhorted to repent and believe whether they did or not." Elder Hovey taught that "the true Gospel proclaims justice fully satisfied, and God fit to be trusted." He held that it was "safe to exhort all mankind to act toward God, to trust in Him and be ready for every good work." The historian remarks: "Thus we see that Elder Hovey was a remarkably bright man and had a large share of common sense."

Those who are descended from this extremely interesting and picturesque personage, have always regarded him as a descendant of Daniel Hovey of Inswich and there seems to be no sufficient reason for calling in question this family tradition.

HAMBLIN LEVI HOVEY, born June 17, 1838. When six months old, his father died, and with his mother he went to East Weare to live with her parents. He then went to live with his uncle Daniel Gove Currier in Waltham, Mass., where he attended the high school. He became a clerk in his uncle's retail clothing store and subsequently with Bean & Clayton and later with J. W. Smith, Dock square, in Boston. He was a quiet boy with studious tastes and early became a member of the Everett Literary Society, which was composed of some of the best young men in the town, with whom he formed some close friendships which continued through life.

In 1861 he enlisted in Company M., of the First regiment of Massachusetts cavalry, and went with the regiment to Hilton Head, S. C.; was made corporal; and was discharged on account of ill-health in 1863. In the autumn of that year he went to Springfield, Ill., where he engaged in the commission business until the "Fall of Richmond," Va, in 1865, when he went thither. After a few months in the office of the Special Treasury agent of the United States he became one of the founders of the Powhatan Granite Company in Richmond, Va. He remained there until October, 1867, when he returned to Waltham, and entered the office of I. W. Parmenter, coal, wood and brick dealer.

He married Harriet Adelaide, daughter of his employer Jonas Willis and Harriet (Kingsbury) Parmenter June 3, 1868. in Waltham. He succeeded Mr. Parmenter in the business upon the latter's retirement in 1870 Although not a communicant he was a constant attendant of Christ Church in Waltham, and served it for many years as a vestryman. He was a life member of the Monitor Lodge of Free Masons, a member of the F. P. H. Rogers, Post 29, G. A. R., of the Pencil and Brush Art Club and of several social clubs in Waltham and of the Middlesex and Home Market Clubs of Boston. He was a staunch Republican in politics, but never desired office. He was a chairman of the board of water commissioners for a number of years, and an original member of the sewer commission. He was a trustee and chairman of the investment committee of the Waltham Savings Bank for many years, and a director of the Newton and Watertown Gas and Electric Light Company for twenty-five years and its president for twelve years, until its consolidation. when he declined to hold the office longer. He was a director of the Waltham National Bank for twenty-five years, and its president the last ten years of his life. He served as treasurer of the

Leland Home for Aged Women for many years, and as its presdent the last six years of his life. He was president of the Waltham Crayon Company for several years, and vice president of the Waltham Hospital. Mr. Hovey had a pure, cheerful, helpful nature, his presence spreading sunshine wherever he went; and he was always interested in and freely supported every thing that was for the social, religious and public welfare of the community. Mr. Hovey died suddenly, May 12, 1904.

His wife survives him and resides at 542 Main street in Waltham, Mass. Both Mr. and Mrs. Hovey were among the earliest members and most generous supporters of the Daniel Hovey Association; and they contributed largely to the success

of this volume.
