





#### More than EC









### REQUIRED COURSES MAKING THE GRADE

Life is all about "falling into place." We all spend our lives learning and hopefully finding what it is that makes us feel like we have fallen into place. Life is about finding the friends, lovers, peers, and career that makes us feel content. Eckerd helps you find your place in life. Believe it or not, many of the requirements at Eckerd are helpful in your quest to fall into place.

Many of the requirements for graduating from Eckerd are academic based, but others are based on other important aspects of learning, the social and cultural aspects. There is the overall requirement of 32 courses but this is broken down into specific requirements depending on the major. Out of those 32 courses you must complete perspectives form various areas of study, such as, aesthetics, global, and environmental. This requirement requires a student to take courses he or she may not otherwise take. Although this may seem unnecessary, it can really help you realize what field you would like to study. 











# Scoring Success



'When you measure success as far as the way the team dealt with


















