


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The Meaning behind the Mosaic



April 2007- Plans were announced to design a memorial prayer chapel to remember the five lives lost in the April 26, 2006 accident.





ontinuing a tradition of service, over 700 students, faculty and staff participated in the annual Community Plunge. The day began at Rediger Chapel where teams met and were shuttled to many different locations including Upland United Methodist Church

and Helping Hands. The tasks performed varied from gardening to sorting clothes to cleaning. Volunteers also helped out with Taylor sponsored programs such as Adopt-A-Highway program, which is led by Stewards of Creation.

The group of volunteers who went to Upland United Methodist Church finished their job of painting and cleaning in only 20 minutes, but for the most part, the work was done in shifts of two hours. Airband 2006 on repeat

From hip-hop to oldies and from swing to techno, the 11 individual acts of Airband 2006 combined to create a unique mosaic of entertainment –two times in a row. After the accidental duplicate printing of tickets, thus, the overselling of nearly 400 tickets, Airband played twice. The first show hosted a packed house of parents, faculty, students, and alumni while the second show played for an audience of around 750 students.

The theme, Fast Forward, imagined what Taylor's campus would be like in the future, somewhat in pun of the changes the campus is projected to undergo throughout the next 10 years. The commercials largely consisted of overthe-top humor, though Marylou Habecker's baton/lightsaber twirling will be remembered for ages.

First Bergwall and Third South English won the first show, judged by the traditional selected panel of judges, by performing a Four Seasons medley. The medley included the famous songs, "You're Just too Good to be True," "Walk



Like a Man," and "Who Loves You." Bill Heth, professor of biblical studies, sang and danced alongside the group in the song, "Walk like a Man," which, for many, stole the show. The Brotherhood won the Student Choice Award in the second show, which was judged by the loudness and the length of applause by the audience. They performed a mix called "Tunak," consisting of monk

chants from the movie, "Monty Python and the Holy Grail," the Oompa Loompa theme song from the original motion picture "Charlie and the Chocolate Factory," and "Tunak," an Indian song and video that can be found online.

Other favorites included the second place television show medley performed by Second Center and South English, featuring theme songs from "Gilligan's Island," "Saved by the Bell," "Andy Griffith," "I Dream of Genie," and "Friends." Second West Olson placed third with their performance of Ella Fitzgerald's "Miss Otis Regrets."

Second East Wengatz added creativity with their incorporation of black lights, disco, and techno to their "The Club is Closed" performance. The seniors, in their "So You Think You Can Dance?" medley, danced to songs such as "Sing, Sing, Sing, Sing" by Benny Goodman and "Canned Heat" by Jamiroqui. The off-campus juniors tributed their performance to Betsy Smith as they joyfully danced to her favorite songs. Other acts included Third West Olson's "Space Jam," Third and Fourth Bergwall and Penthouse's boy band medley, Sammy II and Third East Olson's tango remix, and First West Olson's "Evolution of Dance" medley.















- ▼ InterVarsity Christian Fellowship in the United States and Canada partner to host Urbana.
- ▼This student missons convention, held every three years, originally began in Toronto, Canada, but moved to the University of Illinois, where it got its name, and most recently to St. Louis, Missouri.
- ▼ Over 22,250 people, including staff and exhibitors registered for and attended Urbana 06.
- Attendees could participate in various seminars categorized into 16 majors and 4 residential tracks including Arts, Media, and Culture, Evangelism, Crossing Cultures: Beyond Tolerance, an international student track and an Open for Business track.




Spiritual Renewal and World Opportunities Week

Come missionaries go out into the world, and others wear the world. George Verwer is one man who does both. Having spent 40 years of his life filling the role of founder and international director of Operation Mobilization, Verwer has traveled around the world several times; however, he also wears the world in the form of a geographically stunning zip-up jacket. His ancestry is also nearly as interesting as his jacket. Verwer claims that his Dutch, Irish, English and Scottish heritage is "basically toxic." This exciting ancestral combination is indicative of the enthusiasm and energy for global evangelism that he brought to Taylor during World Opportunities Week (WOW).

The back of Verwer's business card lists "seven types of people lying on the side of the road," including children at risk, abused women, the extreme poor, and HIV/AIDS patients. A "Good Samaritan" ministry, says Verwer, is one in which social action is married to gospel proclamation. Using Matthew 9 as justification for his purpose, Verwer explained that Jesus is a person of action. "Let's deal with this myth that American missionaries are no longer needed," he said, "American missionaries are needed as much as ever before and that's true of every other nation in the world where the church exists."

Verwer presented students with a more accurate view of the world and provided tables of books addressing the seven people on the side of the road. He graciously devoted time before and after sessions, as well as at meals, to talk with students one-on-one.

Spiritual Renewal Weeks also challenged students in their faith. Pastor, author, and radio preacher Dr. Crawford Loritts, gave five messages based on the theme "First Things First" in the fall. Dr. Ajith Fernando, National Director of Youth for Christ in Sri Lanka, spoke on joy and suffering in Christian life during the spring semester. Fernando said, "Suffering for Christ is a normal part of Christianity and it's not a big deal...when you're committed to people, you suffer so that [they] will learn to commit themselves to their calling...and pay the price for that." \(\nbbar\) Christianna Luy




Silent Night and Holipalooza bring anticipated fun before finals





66 T Tow can film be used in ways that will matter to the Kingdom of God?" That was the question posed by Atlanta Iministry Legacy of Truth when they hired Taylor's University's Communication Arts and Business Departments to produce an apologetics DVD. Legacy of Truth helps high school students critically analyze the truth claims of Christianity. and they wanted to use film to teach apologetics to teens and young adults.

Students in Kathy Bruner's fall Producing for Clients class created four film parables designed as discussion starters for the topics of Truth, Science, Morality and Ethics. Students in John Bruner's J-term Advanced Multi-camera Live Production class produced six television studio segments featuring both Legacy of Truth spokesperson, Peter Bocchino and Taylor's Director of Student Programs, Steve Austin.

Professor Jody Hirschy's fall marketing class and spring advertising class had groups working on strategies for sales and distribution of the DVD. Before the school year ended, Taylor students had written, shot and edited a pirate film, two dramas and a film noir "whodunit," and nearly 165 Taylor students, faculty, and staff had been involved in some way in the Legacy of Truth project.

A "Behind The Scenes" link on the DVD will show the extent of Taylor involvement. "Working on a professional DVD project was quite an experience," said Tamara Shaya who served as student coordinating producer for the project and director for the behind the scenes material. "I've learned to trust God for strength and have faith that He can use my communication gifts in a way that pleases Him." Project Manager for one of the four films and overall DVD editor Trevor Kight said, "The Legacy project was a great opportunity to take what I was learning in the classroom and apply those things in a real-world setting. I'm really proud of the product we were able to create, and I know that it will have a lasting impact." The DVD will be titled "Rooted." Professor Kathy Bruner




