

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THE UNIVERSITY -----AT A GLANCE



The Krannert Center for the Performing Arts is comprised of four individual theaters, which host more than 275 performances each year.

Since its founding in 1867, the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign has earned a reputation as an institution of international stature. Its distinguished faculty, outstanding resources, breadth of academic programs and research disciplines, and large and diverse student body constitute an educational community ideally suited for scholarship and research.

Known internationally for its achievements in research and graduate study, the University enrolls some 9,000 graduate and professional students in more than 100 disciplines, and attracts some \$200 million a year in private, state, and federal grants and contract appropriations. In recent years, a significant amount of this support has been directed toward the creation and development of major centers for advanced research and study, including more than \$100 million for the National Center for Supercomputing Applications and the Center for Supercomputing Research and Development. Together, these two centers have

established the University as a recognized world leader in the fields of supercomputing architecture, design, and applications. In 1989, the University inaugurated the Arnold O. and Mabel M. Beckman Institute for Advanced Science and Technology. The most visible example of the University's commitment to interdisciplinary study, the institute brings together investigators from several disciplines for the study of human and artificial intelligence.

The University's research mission shares prominence with a fundamental commitment to undergraduate education. Nearly 26,000 undergraduate students are enrolled in 10 undergraduate divisions, together offering more than 4,000 courses in more than 150 fields of study. The divisions include the College of Agriculture, College of Applied Life Studies, College of Commerce and Business Administration, College of Communications, College of Education, College of Engineering, College of Fine and Applied Arts, College of Liberal Arts

and Sciences, Institute of Aviation, and School of Social Work.

About 30 percent of the campus' graduates choose to continue their education in graduate or professional schools. Typically, 83 percent of graduates who apply to law school are accepted; 75 percent are accepted to medical school.

Academic resources on the campus are among the finest in the world. The University of Illinois Library at Urbana-Champaign is the third-largest academic collection in the nation, housing more than 13 million items in the main library and 35 departmental libraries. Only Harvard and Yale have larger collections. The library's computerized cataloging system was the first in the world to serve as the primary access to a large academic library. Users can access the library's

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collections from more than 200 computer terminals placed throughout the campus.

In recent years, the University has entered into cooperative agreements with such corporations as IBM, AT&T, Apple, and Zenith, placing 8,000 computer terminals in classrooms, residence halls, and campus libraries for use in classroom instruction, study, and research.

A great deal of teaching and learning takes place off campus as well. Through the Cooperative Extension Service, for example, the University manages programs in agriculture, urban and rural revitalization, youth development, and more — taking knowledge into homes and workplaces throughout the state and serving an estimated 700,000 citizens annually. Through the Office of Continuing Education and Public Service, the University offers regular academic courses off campus and via correspondence, and maintains professional development programs with business and industry, social agencies, schools, professional

societies, and government officials.

Among the University's most significant resources is its talented and highly respected faculty. More than 80 faculty members belong to the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, the National Academy of Sciences, or the National Academy of Engineering. Ten scientists have received the National Medal of Science and 50 have received the Presidential Young Investigators Award while on the faculty.

Another prime indicator of the University's excellence is the success of its alumni. Eight graduates have won Nobel Prizes for the United States, and another 15 have won Pulitzer Prizes.

A major center for the arts, the campus attracts dozens of nationally and internationally renowned artists each year to its widely acclaimed Krannert Center for the Performing Arts. Designed by alumnus Max Abramovitz, an architect of New York City's Lincoln Center, the facility has four indoor theaters and an outdoor amphitheater. Together, they host more than 275 performances each year, including those by major symphony orchestras, classical and modern ballet companies, and individual artists such as Luciano Pavarotti, Jean-Pierre Rampal, and Isaac Stern.

The University also supports three major museums: the Krannert Art Museum, second only to the Art Institute of Chicago among Illinois public art museums; the World Heritage Museum; and the Museum of Natural History.

Other major facilities include the Assembly Hall (16,153 seats), Memorial Stadium (70,053 seats), and the Intramural-Physical Education Building, one of the largest recreational facilities of its kind on a university campus.

Located in east-central Illinois in the two cities of Urbana and Champaign (population 110,000), the . University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign is the state of Illinois' flagship public university.

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President Stanley O. Ikenberry



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Stanley O. Ikenberry was appointed President of the University of Illinois in 1979. Since then he has advanced the University's triple mission of teaching, research and public service in the pursuit of the goal of making the University of Illinois the best public University in America. His leadership at Illinois is marked by an exceedingly strong commitment to the human resources of the University and to the humanizing value of the University for society.

Ikenberry has responsibility for all aspects of University operations, including campuses at Urbana-Champaign and Chicago, an enrollment of about 60,000 students, and an annual operating budget of more than \$1 billion.

Ikenberry received his doctorate in higher education research from Michigan State University in 1960. He taught at Michigan State and at West Virginia University before joining the Center for the Study of Higher Education at Pennsylvania State University in 1969. He had risen to senior vice president when he was named president of the University of Illinois. He holds honorary degrees from Michigan State University, Millikin University, Illinois College and Rush University. He is also an Honorary Alumnus of Penn State.

A holder of numerous corporate and civic board memberships, he is past chairman of the American Council on Education, the National Association of State Universities and Land-Grant Colleges and the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching. He is a member of the executive committee of the Association of American Universities. Ikenberry led the Big Ten Presidents Council from 1987 to 1990 and serves as the Big Ten representative to the National Collegiate Athletic Association President's Commission.

Ikenberry lives with his wife, Judith, in the President's House in Urbana. The Ikenberrys have three sons.

Chancellor Morton W. Weir



Morton W. Weir became the campus' fifth chancellor in April of 1988. Weir joined the Urbana-Champaign faculty in 1960 and has served in a variety of faculty and administrative posts since then. Before assuming the leadership of the campus, Weir served as vice president for academic affairs, the senior academic officer for both U of I campuses, at Urbana-Champaign and Chicago.

Weir is a fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science and member of the Society for Research in Child Development, Phi Kappa Phi and Sigma Xi. He has served as editor, member or commissioner for a number of professional journals and organizations. He currently is a member of the national advisory committee of the Ounce of Prevention Fund and is on the board of directors of Voices for Illinois Children.

Weir received his bachelor's degree, with honors, from Knox College in Galesburg in 1955. He earned a master of arts in 1958 and a doctorate in experimental psychology in 1959, both from the University of Texas at Austin. In 1977, Knox College awarded him an honorary Doctor of Laws degree.

Weir is a native of Canton. He and his wife, Cecelia, have three children. **BOARD OF TRUSTEES**

The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois exercises final authority over the administration and governance of the University, within limits fixed by the Illinois Constitution and state law.

Trustees are elected statewide by the citizens of Illinois in November general elections. The nine elected members serve six-year staggered terms; three terms expire and are filled every two years. Board members serve without pay. The governor of Illinois is an ex-officio member of the board. Two students, one from each campus, serve single-year terms; student trustee votes are advisory only. The student trustees for 1991-92 are: Byron Mitchell (Urbana-Champaign) and Catherine Caporusso (Chicago).

The president of the board is elected annually, in January, from among the elected trustees.

ACADEMICS

The University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign is among the nation's leading public universities, enrolling some 26,000 talented undergraduate students. Its faculty, prominently represented in the most esteemed scholarly academies, is dedicated to the University's founding land-grant mission - providing an education that offers the most advanced technical and professional instruction in the context of a broad-based education in the liberal arts and sciences. Students are admitted to one of the University's 10 undergraduate divisions that, together, offer more than 4,000 courses in some 150 programs of study. Some of the most popular majors at the Urbana-Champaign campus are: accounting, electrical engineering, architecture, biology, psychology and agricultural economics.

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The University of Illinois maintains the oldest agricultural test field in the nation. The Morrow Plots now surrounded by the central campus — have been an experimental corn field since 1876 and have been designated a National Historic Landmark.

The University's commitment to providing the richest possible educational environment is seen throughout the campus - from the nation's third largest academic library, to support for innovations in computer-aided instruction and nationally recognized programs and services for disabled students. The Undergraduate Library offers

Assistance is available to all students to help them make the most of the vast resources. Student-athletes benefit from the special programs of the Division of Intercollegiate Athletic's academic services office, and each receives the attention of a full-time academic counselor. Academic services offers educational evaluation, advising, classroom performance monitoring, scheduled study halls, tutoring and

effective use of the University facilities.

The University of Illinois also administers an extensive study abroad program. More than 600 Illinois students study abroad each year in nearly 40 countries, including Japan, Great Britain, Brazil and China.

Following commencement, University of Illinois graduates are some of the most sought after in the Midwest and throughout the country. More than 95 percent of University of Illinois seniors seeking employment obtain positions within eight months of graduation; nearly 50 percent do so before graduation.

Illinois' Commitment to Success

The goal of each sports program within the Division of Intercollegiate Athletics at the University of Illinois is to strive toward success.

John Mackovic, UI's director of athletics and head football coach, has instituted a new commitment to success for Fighting Illini studentathletes. Among the needs which must be served are: 1) the student's objectives as a scholar; 2) the student's requirements as an athlete, and 3) the student's personal goals as an individual.

This comprehensive balance of academic excellence, athletic achievement and personal well-being is stressed daily by Mackovic, his administrative staff and his coaches. Inevitably, a student-athlete's playing days will end, but with the help of UI's unique program, each Fighting Illini athlete will be fully prepared for career and personal challenges ahead.

Among the elements stressed by the academic services department to assure student-athlete success are counseling and tutorial services, a monitoring program and a state-ofthe-art computer laboratory, which will be in place this fall.

Athletically, the University of Illinois has long supported a broadbased sports program. Its coaching staff and facilities are among the nation's best. The UI's support units include excellent staffs for recruiting, equipment, facility maintenance, fund raising, publicity and promotion. Its sports medicine staff not only assists student-athletes in strength training and conditioning, but also in personal health maintenance.

As important as the UI's commitment is to the student-athlete's performance in the classroom and on the field, it also considers the individual's spiritual and emotional needs, and, his/her career objectives. Fighting Illini student-athletes are afforded the opportunity to attend a variety of seminars during their collegiate experience, helping them

enhance their post-athletic lives. Among the seminars offered are those in career placement, financial planning, time and stress management, sexual harassment, drug and alcohol education and player/agent relations.

The strong relationships built within the vast Illinois alumni networking system provide excellent opportunities for all student-athletes, whether it be for summer jobs, internships or, ultimately, in career placement after graduation. Once the individual's career is established, the DIA asks for his/her participation in a follow-up program that allows current student-athletes to benefit from their predecessors' experiences. Former student-athletes are asked to return to campus for seminars and discussions that serve to provide guidance and understanding for future graduates.

While at the University of Illinois, student-athletes are encouraged to participate in the DIA's communityoutreach program. Expected to be in place later this year is a cooperative effort between UI's student-athletes and the Champaign-Urbana school district. The plan calls for a group of athletes to be assigned to a specific school for the entire year to serve as role models. They might serve as informal instructors in the classroom, or assist teachers on the playground and on field trips. Numerous other community-outreach programs are already in place for UI's studentathletes, including a speaker's bureau.

This commitment to success is not a one-time event for UI studentathletes, but rather an on-going practice.

Campus Life

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Learning and participating are important outside, as well as inside, the classroom. And at the University of Illinois, the opportunities are as limitless in extracurricular arenas as they are in academic arenas.

Housing? First-rate residence halls with good food, the nation's largest fraternity and sorority system, independent housing and a wide range of apartments provide broad choices of where and how to live.

Activities? More than 700 student organizations provide an outlet for every interest, from the philanthropies of Volunteer Illini Projects to the rock music of student radio station WPGU. There are more than 40 student organizations for minority interests.

Sports and recreation? The Intramural-Physical Education Building is one of the largest complexes on any campus, with four gymnasiums, 23 handball/racquetball courts, weight and exercise equipment, indoor and outdoor pools, tennis courts and more. The U of I has one of the most comprehensive intramural sports programs in the nation. If the great outdoors is more to your liking, the university's 1,500-acre Allerton Park includes sculpture gardens, formal gardens and natural woodlands.

Culture and entertainment? The domed Assembly Hall seats more than 16,000 for rock concerts, ice shows, circuses, Broadway musicals and, of course, Illinois basketball. Beautifully restored Foellinger Auditorium on the Quad seats 1,750 for concerts, films and speakers. And the Krannert Center for the Performing Arts, "arguably the best performing arts facilities in the nation," according to the education editor of *Time Magazine*, holds four theaters for plays, dance and concerts by such famed names as the Chicago Symphony and Itzhak Perlman.

Off campus? Champaign and Urbana, with a population of 110,000, offer shopping, restaurants, movie theaters, night spots and many other big-city amenities. Yet, they retain a Midwestern college-town atmosphere.



Division of Intercollegiate Athletics



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The forerunner of the Division of Intercollegiate Athletics (DIA), the University of Illinois Athletic Association was chartered in 1892 as a notfor-profit corporation of the State of Illinois. It was charged with overseeing and conducting the University's intercollegiate athletic programs and associated support services, and operated as a separate entity.

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After the state legislature voted in June, 1989 to bring UI athletics within the University proper, the DIA assumed the functions and responsibilities of the Athletic Association. The Division of Intercollegiate Athletics began operations officially July 1, 1989.

The director of athletics is the Division's chief executive officer, and reports directly to the chancellor of the Urbana-Champaign campus. The chancellor has final authority regarding the athletic program in all areas except for budget and approval of major appointments. Those decisions rest with the University of Illinois Board of Trustees.

The Athletic Board serves the DIA in an advisory capacity. It is composed of 19 members, 16 of whom are voting members (eight faculty, four alumni, three students and one trustee); the three non-voting (ex-officio) members are from the University administration.

The faculty and student members are nominated by the Urbana-Champaign Senate and selected by the Chancellor.

DIA revenues are derived from three major sources: gate receipts from football and men's basketball; television rights fees for those two sports; and donations to the Fighting Illini Scholarship Fund. With these monies, the University of Illinois over the years has been able to provide athletic scholarships for studentathletes in each of its sports programs, as well as to maintain and upgrade its facilities, staying on par with the best major collegiate programs across the nation.

The DIA is in a stepped-up phase of capital development. Recent additions to the athletic facilities include new artificial turf on the Memorial Stadium's Zuppke Field, as well as an air-supported dome to cover the field during the off-season. The "bubble", as it is called, allows Zuppke Field to be utilized year round for such activities as postseason football bowl game preparation, intramurals and winter baseball practice. Other additions to Memorial Stadium include a football/training headquarters, featuring one of the nation's largest and most advanced weight-training rooms, a sports medicine area and athlete study halls.

Football is not the only athletic program receiving a boost from the new and improved facilities. The men's and women's tennis teams will soon compete in the brand new Atkins Tennis Center, located at the east end of the UI athletic complex. The tennis center, comprised of six indoor and eight outdoor lighted courts, is expected to open when classes begin for the fall semester. Baseball will begin its fifth season at the first-rate Illinois Field, which has seats for 1,500 and is targeted for an expansion to accommodate 5,000. The nationally acclaimed track team is also primed for its fifth season in the \$2.2 million track and field stadium. Future expansion for this facility allows for up to 12,000 seats.

The basketball teams play their games at the Assembly Hall, located just south of Memorial Stadium. The Assembly Hall seats more than 16,000 fans for basketball.

On the drawing board is an athletic administration office building, featuring a public gallery, UI Athletic Hall of Fame and offices for numerous Division of Intercollegiate Athletics personnel. Also planned is a 5,000-seat multi-sports competition building, which would provide much-needed space for practice and competition in volleyball, wrestling, fencing, gymnastics and basketball.

He was a member of the 1947 Rose Bowl team, set a Big Ten punting record of 43.4 yards per kick and was also a member of the 1959 Drake Relays Hall of Fame. In 1990 he was selected to the Illinois High School Association's all-time Basketball team. Eddleman is a member of the National High School Sports Hall of Fame and was the 1983 Varsity "I" Man of the Year. He was also selected to the Illinois All-Century Football Team in November of 1990.

Steven Greene Director of Development — Fighting Illini Scholarship Fund

Beginning his first year as director of development is 1976 U of I graduate J. Steven Greene. Kahrs serves on the Board of Visitors for the United States Sports Academy. She received the Distinguished Alumnus Award in Physical Education at Georgia in 1988. She lives in Champaign.



Al Martindale, ATC Director of Sports Medicine

Al Martindale was named head athletic trainer at the University of Illinois in July of 1983. A native of Postville, Iowa, he is now in his 11th year as a head trainer at the Division I level.

Randy Rodgers Recruiting Coordinator

Randy Rodgers assumed the role of recruiting coordinator in April of 1988. In addition to his football recruiting duties, Rodgers oversees recruiting for all 19 varsity sports at the University of Illinois.

A 1969 UI graduate with a degree in physical education, Rodgers was a member of the Fighting Illini football team from 1965-68, lettering in 1968. He earned his master's degree from Illinois in 1971.

As head football coach at the University of Evansville (Ind.) from 1980-84, Rodgers' teams were known for passing, having led the NCAA Division II ranks in attempts in 1980 and yardage in 1982. While at Evansville, Rodgers was named assistant coach for the 1984 Japan Bowl All-Star game. His coaching career started in Champaign with a four-year stint at Champaign's Jefferson Junior High and two years as assistant at Centennial High School.

Rodgers departed Champaign in 1975 to become head coach and director of athletics at Inver Hills (Minn.) Community College, where he remained until 1979. While at IHCC, Rodgers compiled a 25-18 record and earned a conference title and Coach of the Year honors in his final campaign. That team led the nation in passing offense and five of Rodgers' players were named Junior College All-Americans. From 1985 until his return to Champaign, Rodgers served as Coordinator of Health Promotion Programs for Bristol-Myers Co., in Evansville, Ind. He received both his undergraduate and master's degree from Illinois. Rodgers and his wife, Susan, have three sons and live in Champaign.



Dr. Stephen H. Soboroff Team Physician

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"John Mackovic's arrival on this campus signaled a new era in the University of Illinois' dedication to academic excellence in athletics, and his emergence as a dual coach-director is working in terms of upgrading the academic image of the UI." — Champaign News-Gazette

John Mackovic's formula for success has yielded incredible results since he first joined the University of Illinois' Division of Intercollegiate Athletics as its Head Football Coach on Feb. 3, 1988. Consider the following accomplishments since he took over:

 He was named Illinois' Director of Athletics on Dec. 23, 1988, and is one of

only two men in the Big Ten Conference who serves as both Athletic Director and Head Football Coach.

- He led Illinois to a share of the Big Ten championship in 1990 with a conference record of 6-2, the school's first title since 1983.
- He's the only man in Big Ten history to be named the conference's "Coach of the Year" in each of his first two seasons (1988 & '89).
- He's compiled more overall victories (24) and more conference victories (18) over the past three seasons than any other active conference coach.
- Fourteen of his players have been accorded Academic All-Big Ten honors over the past three seasons.

John Mackovic's commitment to excellence in both athletics and academics at the University of Illinois are well documented. Three years ago, he took over an Illinois football program that was coming off back-to-back 4-7 and 3-7-1 seasons, and whose academic image was tarnished. As the 1991 season begins, Mackovic's fourth with the Fighting Illini, both ills seem to have been cured. On the gridiron, Illinois has recorded a three-year mark of 24-11-1, and challenged each year for the Big Ten title. Last year, his squad shared the conference crown, Illinois' first title since 1983. In the classroom, the accomplishments of Mackovic's athletes are equally impressive, as

nearly 90 percent of his players have graduated over that same span. Of Mackovic's 1991 senior class, 19 players graduated while the remaining two men are only a few credits short of receiving their degrees.

Mackovic's 1990 club celebrated the school's football centennial season by capturing UI's 14th Big Ten championship en route to an 8-4 overall record and an appearance in the 1991 Hall of Fame Bowl. Mackovic was forced to juggle the line-up frequently due to a myriad of injuries, against a schedule which included seven teams that participated in postseason Bowl games. Easily the most impressive of Illinois' eight victories was an upset victory at Champaign over eventual national champion Colorado in September. The most memorable, though, to

most fans, will be Illinois' come-from-behind win against Southern Illinois in which fullback Howard Griffith scored an NCAA-record eight touchdowns.

Mackovic's 1989 Fighting Illini squad also rates as one of the most exciting in school history. It tied the school record for most victories in a single season (10), including wins over four teams which played in post-season Bowl games. Its 10-2 overall record included a victory over Virginia in the Florida Citrus Bowl, while its 7-1 record in conference games placed it second in the standings. Illinois' offensive unit, behind the quarterbacking of Jeff George, led the Big Ten in passing, while its defensive 11



paced the league in total defense. Afterwards, Mackovic was named Big Ten Coach of the Year for the second consecutive season.

The 1988 club, Mackovic's first at Illinois, was easily the Big Ten's most surprising unit that season. It recorded a 6-5-1 season mark and went 5-2-1 in league play, finishing in a tie for third in the Big Ten standings. Illinois played Florida in the All American Bowl, and Mackovic was the recipient of the Dave McClain-Big Ten Coach of the Year Award.

As Illinois' Director of Athletics, Mackovic has shown outstanding leadership in developing a top all-around athletic program. He is recognized as a leading spokesman on issues regarding intercollegiate athletics. During his three years as athletic director, 10 Fighting Illini teams have won Big Ten championships and one (men's gymnastics) has captured a national crown. Mackovic's administration also can take credit for the department's aggressive campaign to improve the University's athletic facilities. During the summer of 1990, construction began on one facility while another was renovated. Formal groundbreaking for the 14-court Clinton C. and Susan A. Atkins Tennis Center took place in August of 1990, with the giant structure slated for completion in the fall of 1991. The refurbishing of historic Huff Gymnasium gave the Fighting Illini volleyball team a new home beginning with the 1990 season. Future athletic facility plans include the restructuring of 67-yearold Memorial Stadium (beginning in December of 1991), the completion of the baseball and outdoor track and field facilities, and the eventual construction of an athletic administration building. Mackovic has demonstrated excellent fiscal responsibility, stablizing UI's athletic budget

which has operated in the black for three consecutive years.

One of Mackovic's proudest accomplishments as Illinois' athletic director has been the establishment of a "total person" program for UI's student-athletes. The concept is a commitment designed to nurture Illinois' young men and women not only as athletes and scholars, but also to help them succeed as citizens in the community upon their graduation.

A native of Barberton, Ohio, Mackovic attended Wake Forest, and was a starter at quarterback in a backfield that included his close friend, the late Brian Piccolo. During the 1964 campaign, his senior season, Mackovic led the Atlantic Coast Conference in total offense. An Academic All-American, he also was accorded the ACC's prestigious Medal of Honor for outstanding proficiency in scholarship and athletics.

Following his graduation from Wake Forest in 1965, Mackovic accepted a graduate assistant position with follow Barberton native Glenn "Bo" Schembechler at Miami of Ohio. After completing work on his master's degree in educational administration, Mackovic coached one year at Barberton High School, then served one season as basketball coach at Fort Knox, Ky., with the U.S. Army.

Mackovic returned to coaching football in 1968 when he assisted with coaching the Army's plebe team. During the next eight seasons, he spent time as an assistant at San Jose State, Army (once again), and Arizona. In 1977, he joined Purdue's staff as offensive coordinator, where he was responsible for developing the skills of All-America quarterback Mark Herrmann.

While an undergraduate at Wake Forest, Mackovic started at quarterback and led the ACC in total offense as a senior.

After eight seasons as an assistant coach, Mackovic earned his first head coaching spot, when he returned to his alma mater, Wake Forest. In his second season with the Deacons, he led the team to an 8-3 mark, which produced the school's first appearance ever in the national rankings and a spot in the Tangerine Bowl, only the third Bowl game ever for the Wake Forest team. That 8-3 record still stands as the most victories in a single season by a Deacon football squad.

Following the 1980 season at Wake Forest, Mackovic gave up his head-coaching duties for the opportunity to work under Tom Landry in the Dallas Cowboys' organization as the quarterback coach. Two successful years with the Cowboys produced NFL playoff berths and saw Danny White emerge as a Pro Bowl quarterback.

In 1983, at the age of 39, Mackovic was named head coach of the Kansas City Chiefs. He quickly took a floundering offense that was among the NFL's worst and turned it into one of the league's most prolific attacks, finishing his first season with the third-best passing attack in the NFL. Three rebuilding years paid dividends in 1986 as the Chiefs posted a 10-6 record and earned the team's first NFL playoff appearance in 15 years. In doing so, Mackovic became one of the few coaches in the game today to take losing teams in both collegiate and professional football and turn them into winning organizations.

Prior to accepting the position of head coach at Illinois, Mackovic served as president of the Cypress Professional Development Group, a consulting and training organization targeted to middle and upper-level management. He also founded and established his own company - Yes, Inc. - a service-related organization directed to motivational speaking with radio and television exposure. He currently serves as president of Yes, Inc. Mackovic also has been active in a number of civic and charity events, including the Champaign-Urbana March of Dimes. He also is a member of the Board of Directors of First of America Bank in Champaign.

Mackovic, born October 1, 1943, in Barberton, Ohio, is a talented golfer who sports a single-digit handicap and has recorded two holes-in-one. He and his wife, Arlene, have two children, Aimee and John. The family resides in Champaign.

Miscellaneous Mackovic Notes:

- Over a span of the past 68 years, John Mackovic's .681 overall winning percentage (24-11-1) is better than any other Illinois football coach. Arthur Hall had a winning percentage of .713, 27-10-3, from 1907-12.
- He's guided the University of Illinois to three consecutive post-season bowl appearances over the past three seasons, the first time that's ever happened at Illinois.
- He's helped develop more first-team All-Big Ten players (16) over the past three seasons than any other active conference coach.



Mackovic has compiled more overall victories and more Big Ten victories over the past three seasons than any other active conference coach.

- He became just the third coach in Illinois history to lead the Fighting Illini to at least 10 wins in one season, finishing the 1989 campaign with a 10-2 record.
- Other than two road losses at Michigan, his Illinois teams are undefeated in Big Ten play on the road. Mackovic's three-season Big Ten road record, including those losses, is 9-2-1 (.792 winning percentage). His overall road mark during the last three seasons at Illinois is 11-6-1 (.639).
- Only two Big Ten football coaches Ohio State's Earle Bruce and Michigan's Bo Schembechler - have won more games in their first three Big Ten seasons as Illinois' John Mackovic. Mackovic's 18 conference victories (18-5-1) from 1988 through 1990 are exceeded by only Bruce's three-year total of 21 victories (21-3-0) from 1979-81, and Schembechler's three-year total of 19 wins (19-2-0) from 1969-71.
- John Mackovic has coached an NFL first-round draft pick at Illinois each of the last two seasons. Jeff George, Mackovic's quarterback in 1988 and '89, became the first Fighting Illini player in history to be selected as

Lou Tepper, named assistant head coach in July, 1990, returns for his fourth season at Illinois in the dual role of defensive coordinator and inside linebacker coach.

Tepper's coaching career extends over nearly a quarter century of college football. His leadership and expertise in the game have been recognized wherever he has coached. He has earned the title of assistant head coach not only at Illinois, but also at Colorado and at William & Mary.

There is little doubt that defense is Tepper's forte. He has spent 16 of his 23 college coaching seasons in the role of defensive coordinator. Illinois finished third in the Big Ten and 28th in the NCAA in total defense during his first season (1988) with the Fighting Illini. In 1989, Illinois ranked first in the Big Ten and No. 10 in the nation in total defense. *The Sporting News* named Tepper the top defensive assistant coach in the Big Ten in 1990.

The Derry, Pa. native began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Pittsburgh in 1967. The following year he moved to New Hampshire where he coached under Jim Root, who was chosen National Coach-of-the-Year during Tepper's tenure. Tepper worked with running backs and linebackers at various times during his four years at New Hampshire. In 1972, he accepted Root's offer of the defensive coordinator position at William & Mary, where he coached for six years. The 1976 W&M team posted the school's best record in 30 years. In 1978, Bill Dooley lured him to Virginia Tech to coach the linebackers. It was at VTU that Tepper and current UI defensive backs coach Steve Bernstein became acquainted, and helped build the team into a consistent bowl contender with a defense that frequently ranked among the nation's elite. Tepper remained at Virginia Tech until 1983 when he joined Bill McCartney's staff at Colorado. When he arrived in Boulder, the Buffaloes' defense was ranked 100th in the nation, but his influence paid immediate dividends, as he improved it to the point where it ranked 11th nationally several seasons later.

Tepper earned degrees in physical education and in English from Rutgers College in 1967. He was a three-year letterman at Rutgers as a defensive back, leading the team in interceptions as a junior, and in total tackles his senior season.

Tepper is an active speaker for the Fellowship of Christian Athletes. He and his wife, Karen, have two children, Matthew and Stacy Ann, and reside in Champaign.

Gene Dahlquist begins his fourth season at Illinois with dual responsibilities as offensive coordinator and quarterback coach. Serving in both positions is nothing new to Dahlquist. Cleve Bryant is the newest member of the Fighting Illini football coaching staff. He arrived in Champaign one week into the 1991 spring drills, and quickly became familiar with the Illinois receivers. Bryant has brought some impressive credentials to Illinois.

His football career has been multi-faceted. He was a standout quarterback at Ohio University in the late 1960s. He was named to the All-Mid-American Conference first team in 1967, and was tabbed the league's Player-of-the-Year in 1968. He was drafted by the NFL's Denver Broncos in 1969.

After college, Bryant embarked on a brief career as a financial consultant, and returned to athletics in the mid-1970s. He coached high school cross country, basketball and track in Canton, Ohio, in 1976, and came back to college football in 1977, coaching quarterbacks and receivers at Miami (Ohio) University for a year before accepting a similar position at the University of North Carolina. During his four seasons at UNC, the Tar Heels captured an Atlantic Coast Conference championship and won three post-season bowl games. Those same four seasons were the first of Fighting Illini defensive line coach Denny Marcin's 10-year tour of duty as defensive coordinator at the Chapel Hill, N.C. school.

Bryant moved to the National Football League's New England Patriots in 1982, where he served three seasons as the team's offensive backs coach. Under his tutelage, Patriot backs were second in the league in rushing in 1982, and led the NFL on the ground in 1983. From New England, Bryant returned in 1984 to the college game and his alma mater, where he served as the Bobcats' head coach for six seasons.

Bryant was inducted to the Ohio University Hall of Fame in 1975, and was inducted into the Citrus Bowl Hall of Fame in 1988.

Michael "Bucky" Godbolt begins his fourth season coaching running backs at Illinois. This is the 10th consecutive year that Godbolt has served in that capacity on the collegiate level. Prior to joining the Fighting Illini staff, Godbolt spent the previous seven football seasons as running backs coach with Boston College. In addition to coaching the running backs at BC, Godbolt also served as coach of the special teams.

In 1988, Godbolt helped mold Fighting Illini Keith Jones into a powerful, slashing runner who gained more than 1,100 yards during the regular season. Jones is only the fourth UI back ever to top the 1,000-yard mark, and currently is playing with the NFL's Atlanta Falcons.

Last year, Godbolt's efforts were again rewarded with a record-setting performance by fullback Howard Griffith, the sixth player to have reached the 1,000-yard plateau under his tutelage. Griffith set NCAA records in 1990 for touchdowns and points scored in a single-game by crossing the goal line eight times for 48 points against Southern Illinois. He also set a UI single game rushing record with 269 yards against Northwestern.

A Boston College graduate, Godbolt received his elementary education degree in 1978. He was a wide receiver for the Eagles from 1973-77 and still ranks among BC's top all-time leading receivers. He served as a graduate assistant at Dartmouth College in 1980 before returning to his alma mater as an assistant coach in 1981.

Godbolt is a native of Bethlehem, Pa. He and his wife, Patricia, have four children, Aaron, Veronica, Jordan and Kyle. The Godbolts reside in Champaign.

Denny Marcin joined the Illinois football staff in February of 1988, and enters his fourth season as coach of the defensive linemen. Marcin brought extensive coaching experience with him to Illinois, starting in the coaching profession in 1964. He served as defensive coordinator at North Carolina from 1978 to 1988, after which he was elevated to assistant head coach (in addition to his defensive coordinator duties). During his 10 years at North Carolina, the Tar Heels had a total of 24 defensive players move on to the National Football League, including one of Marcin's players, All-Pro linebacker Lawrence Taylor of the New York Giants. At the conclusion of the 1981 season, North Carolina was ranked No. 1 in the nation in total defense.

Prior to his 10-year stay at North Carolina, Marcin was an assistant coach at Miami of Ohio from 1974-77. He was named defensive coordinator in 1977, but departed for North Carolina that year when Miami Coach Dick Crum was named to the vacant Tar Heel post.

Marcin graduated from Miami in 1964, earning a bachelor of science degree in education. He was a member of the Redskins football team, playing both on both the offensive and defensive lines. Marcin has also served as a wrestling official at the high school, college and professional levels.

During his tenure at Illinois, all of Marcin's senior linemen have graduated. Marcin also was instrumental in the development of All-America nose tackle Moe Gardner, who was the only active player to be named to the UI All-Century Team during last year's Illinois Football Centennial celebration.

Constructed in 1923, Memorial Stadium, home of the "Fighting Illini" football team, was built as a memorial to Illinois men who gave their lives for their country during World War I. The men's names appear on 200 columns that support the east and west sides of the stadium.


Donations of approximately \$1.7 million made by more than 200,000 students, alumni and other friends of the University, made the construction possible. The Athletic Association (now known as the Division of Athletics) later allocated \$509,805 to the project for the construction of the south stand and other stadium additions.

The stadium opened November 3, 1923, when Illinois defeated Chicago, 7-0, in a Homecoming victory. The stadium was dedicated officially October 18, 1924, a day that Illinois not only defeated Michigan, 39-14, for a Homecoming victory, but Harold "Red" Grange accounted for six touchdowns in what remains as the single greatest performance in Memorial Stadium history. In the first 12 minutes of that game, Grange ran for a total of 265 yards and scored four times. He had his hands on the ball only six times and left the field before the end of the first quarter.

In the third quarter, Grange returned and ran 13 yards for his fifth

touchdown, and in the final period he passed to Marion Leonard for this sixth score of the day. In 42 minutes of playing time, Grange gained a total of 402 yards, carried the ball 21 times and also completed six passes for 64 yards. Legendary coach Amos Alonzo Stagg called it "the most spectacular single-handed performance ever delivered in a major game."

Permanent seating capacity of Memorial Stadium is 66,457, but capacity is currently 70,053 including the bleachers at the north end of the playing field. During the 1980s, Memorial Stadium saw 27 consecutive sell-outs. The single-game

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attendance record is 78,297 for a 1984 victory over Missouri.

Approximately 71 percent of Memorial Stadium seats are between the goal posts with 18,000 in each stand, 10,000 in each balcony and 12,246 in the south stand horseshoe.

Installation of the first artificial turf and a new lighting system was made possible through a 1974 Golden Anniversary campaign drive. The lights have made games and practices, as well as intramural competition possible after sunset. Even though the field is lit only from the towers on the four corners of Memorial Stadium, the light intensity is easily sufficient for major network telecasts of night games.

Other stadium improvements include the 1967 installation of a press box, located at the top of the west balcony; construction of the Ray Eliot Varsity Room, a training table and trophy display area at the southeast corner of the stadium that was built with funds donated by friends of the Athletic Association; a

million-dollar stadium renovation project in 1972 that included the addition of aluminum seating and other improvements; a 1977 renovation of the varsity locker rooms and trainer facilities; and a computerized message board installed in 1981 at the north end of the stadium.

In April 1985, \$7 million worth of improvements began. Out of this project came installation of new artificial turf and expansion of the football headquarters in the northeast corner of the stadium. The current artificial surface has the largest vertical drainage system of any synthetic surface in the United States, and is the largest collegiate synthetic playing surface in the nation. The portion of it between the goal lines was replaced in the fall of 1989 after vandals burned a 40-yard swath in the middle of the field in the earlymorning hours of Sept. 24. Employees from AstroTurf Industries began removing the destroyed pad and turf on the 26th, and worked around the clock to install a new surface in time for Illinois' scheduled Oct. 7 game against Ohio State.

Additional improvements to Memorial Stadium will be started at the conclusion of the 1991 season. These will include replacement of some concrete on both the east and west balconies, as well as the east and west main stands, repairs to the ramp systems and construction of additional rest rooms. The \$18 million project is being financed through the sale of auxiliary facilities bonds.

The Memorial Stadium practice dome, more commonly known as "The Bubble", was inflated for the first time in December, 1985, and the Fighting Illini's new locker room facilities opened before the 1986 season.

Illinois' record in Memorial Stadium is 187-145-14 coming into the 1991 season. During six home games in 1990, 364,919 fans visited Memorial Stadium, an average of 60,819 per contest.

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

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1991 OUTLOOK

"Whether we're a contender for the Big Ten title will not be as significant as how well we play." — John Mackovic, Head Football Coach, University of Illinois

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With that simple statement, John Mackovic spelled out his team's objectives for the 1991 football season. August 5, the first day of Illinois' fall practice, Mackovic's challenge begins.

Mackovic's fourth Fighting Illini team, defending Big Ten co-champions, will be much like his first squad back in 1988. His '91 edition will combine an abundance of talented young players with a sprinkling of veterans.

Offense

OFFENSIVE LINE: Counting sophomore center Greg Engel (6-3, 272), who started the season finale against Northwestern and who was a regular during Illinois' final four games when Curt Lovelace was sidelined with a knee injury, four of the Fighting Illini's five offensive linemen return in 1991. Veteran right guard Tim Simpson (6-2, 298, Sr.), a second-team All-Big Ten selection last season and fourth-year starter, anchors Illinois' front wall. Mackovic calls Simpson one of the conference's premier run blockers. Cam Pepper, Ul's right guard in 1990, has used up his eligibility, and James Pesek (6-5, 280, Jr.) appears ready to replace him. Both of Illinois' tackles will be back in '91. Two-year letterman Tony Laster (6-3, 278, Sr.) at right tackle and onetime letterman Brad Hopkins (6-3, 303, Jr.) at left tackle stack up with the best in the Big Ten. Anxious to display their talents this fall are backup tackles Randy Bierman (6-5, 290, So.) and Phil Rathke (6-6, 251, So.), No. 2 center Pat Wendt (6-2, 254, Jr.),

and back-up guards **Derek Allen** (6-3, 265, Fr.) and **Jonathan Kerr** (6-3, 271, Fr.). Others who'll get a chance to move up in the ranks include guard **Steve Bauer** (6-3, 258, Jr.), center **John Gately** (6-2, 265, Fr.), tackle **Erik Hayes** (6-8, 251, So.), and tackle **Steve Stefanski** (6-6, 280, Fr.). Freshman recruits to keep an eye on include **Charles Edwards** (6-3, 260) and **Predrag Jones** (6-4, 290).

MACKOVIC ON OFFENSIVE

LINE: "Our offensive line can be a good unit for us, even with the departure of Curt Lovelace and Cam Pepper. It showed some real growth this past spring. Jim Pesek did a credible job at right guard. Tony Laster has improved his play at right tackle. Greg Engel showed that he can be a standout center as he develops and grows. And I expect that Tim Simpson and Brad Hopkins will be dominant players on the left side of the line."

ALL-STAR CANDIDATES: Guard Tim Simpson (All-America candidate); tackle Tony Laster (All-Big Ten candidate), and tackle Brad Hopkins (All-Big Ten candidate).

RECEIVERS: Four of Illinois' top five wide receivers return to the ranks in 1991, but some work must be done to replace the Fighting Illini's departing talent at the tight end position. Shawn Wax, UI's three-year letterwinner at split end, is the largest void to fill. His 60 catches in 1990 accounted for nearly a quarter of the team's receptions. Split end Elbert Turner (6-0, 162, Sr.), who grabbed 23 passes for 310 yards and three TDs in 1990, and flanker Steven Mueller (5-9, 171, Jr.), who caught 32 passes for 496 yards and one TD, emerged from spring ball as starters at those positions. Turner's backups at

split end should be Gus Palma (5-11, 198, Sr.), who caught three passes in 1990 for 36 yards and one TD, and J.J. Strong (6-1, 175, Fr.), a freshman redshirt. Mueller will be relieved at the flanker position by veteran John Wright (6-0, 187, Jr.) and Forry Wells (6-4, 204, So.), who was converted from quarterback to receiver late last season. Wells also will share punting duties for the Fighting Illini in '91. The coaches will give a good look at redshirt freshmen Brandon Harrison (5-10, 166) and Cedric Moore (6-1, 196) this fall. Incoming freshmen to watch include Shane Fisher (6-4, 190), Duane Lyle (6-2, 185) and Morris Washington (6-1, 175).

At tight end, veterans Frank Hartley and Jeff Finke have used up their eligibility, so Mackovic will have to rely on talented young players to

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step into the fray. Emerging from spring practice as the starter is David Olson (6-4, 231, So.), who caught five passes for 33 yards and two TDs last season. Olson's top back-ups will come from a group which includes Ken Dilger (6-4, 238, Fr.), the team's most improved offensive player last spring, Kraig Koester (6-5, 239, So.), Scott Grodeck (6-4, 240, Sr.) and Scott Poholsky (6-3, 257, Jr.). Mackovic will also watch the progress of freshman tight end recruits Scott Allen (6-4, 220), Kenneth Blackman (6-6, 235) and Lashon Ludington (6-3, 202).

MACKOVIC ON WIDE

RECEIVERS: "This group of wide receivers has the potential to be excellent open-field running threats after they catch the ball. It's a position where some young players could really contribute."

MACKOVIC ON TIGHT ENDS:

"Our tight end play is not as solid as we would like it to be, but, eventually, this group could be a stronger group than we had in 1990."

ALL-STAR CANDIDATE: Flanker Elbert Turner (All-Big Ten candidate).

QUARTERBACK: Perhaps the key position for any football team is quarterback, and, for the Fighting Illini, that's a position of strength. **Jason Verduzco** (5-9, 183, Jr.), the Big Ten's top-rated quarterback in terms of passing efficiency, is a year older and wiser. He was a second-team All-Big Ten selection last season, completing nearly 64 percent of his passes for 2,567 yards and 16 touchdowns. Verduzco's backup will be **Jeff**

Kinney (6-4, 198, Jr.), who showed signs of brilliance at times in 1990. Kinney connected on 55 percent of his tosses for 284 yards last season, and showed great leadership in the game against Southern Illinois, directing his teammates from a 21-7 deficit to a 56-21 victory. Making great strides this past spring was red-shirt freshman signal-caller J.J. O'Laughlin (6-2, 198, Fr.), who should challenge Kinney for back-up duty. The No. 4 Fighting Illini quarterback entering the fall is Jeff Schwarzentraub (6-0, 189, So.). Incoming freshman quarterback Johnny Johnson (6-1, 178) is a talented youngster to watch.

MACKOVIC ON QUARTERBACKS: "In Jason Varduzco and Jaff Kinnar, and haz


Verduzco and Jeff Kinney, we have a pair of proven veterans who have the potential to be highly successful. J.J. O'Laughlin probably showed a little more improvement in his first spring than even Jason` did a few years back, so I'm encouraged about his future."

ALL-STAR CANDIDATE:

Quarterback Jason Verduzco (All-Big Ten candidate).

RUNNING BACKS: There's a good news/bad news scenario for the Fighting Illini at the running back position in 1991. The good news is that six of Illinois' top seven rushers from a year ago return to Mackovic's squad; the bad news is that the only graduate, Howard Griffith, accounted for 64 percent of UI's total net rushing yardage in 1990 (1,115 of 1,737 net yards). Though the Fighting Illini's top rusher from a season ago will be difficult to replace, Mackovic has a number of potential replacements. At the top of the list are senior Kameno Bell (5-11, 219, Sr.), a two-time letterwinner; junior Wagner Lester (6-2, 213), who was the second-leading rusher last year with 253 yards and the fourth-leading receiver with 29 catches for 250 yards; and Steve Feagin (5-11, 183, Jr.), who ran for 232 net yards a year ago.

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Junior quarterback Jason Verduzco led the Big Ten Conference in passing efficiency as a sophomore.

Others who'll get a chance to display their talents are **Darren Boyer** (5-10, 209, Jr., 187 yards); **Clinton Lynch** (5-9, 184, So., 43 yards); **Joe Muti** (5-11, 210, Jr.); **Art Slowinski** (5-11, 216, Jr.); **Tyler Donnelly** (6-0, 221, So.); and redshirt freshman **Steve Mattison** (6-0, 208). Three rookie running backs — **Melvin Roberts** (6-2, 195), **Bobby Sanders** (5-11, 210) and **Marvell Scott** (5-10, 210) should provide support at running back for the Fighting Illini.

MACKOVIC ON RUNNING

BACKS: "We came out of the spring a little undecided as to who will be playing for us at these positions. Several players were injured during parts of spring practice. I'd like for us not to be in a situation, as we've been the past couple of years, of role-playing our running backs, but that will probably be the case if someone doesn't rise to the top."

Defense

DEFENSIVE LINE: Losing all-star defensive linemen such as Moe Gardner, Mel Agee and John Wachter undoubtedly means that some rebuilding will have to be done, and, entering the fall session, Mackovic still is formulating his lineup. Mark Zitnik (6-3, 252, Sr.), who earned his third varsity letter as Gardner's top back-up a year ago at nose tackle, will battle for the starting spot there with Erik Foggey (6-3, 283, Jr.). Gavin Pearlman (5-11, 243, Jr.) is next in line at nose tackle. Sean Streeter (6-3, 261, Sr.) appears to have the edge at the "three tackle" position over freshman redshirt Jeff Hasenstab (6-5, 259). Joe Wall (6-6, 255, Sr.), one of the team's most improved players this spring, is given a slight edge over Chad Copher (6-6, 250, Fr.) at the "five tackle" spot. They'll get challenges

from Michael Cole (6-3, 237, So.), Jon Gustafsson (6-5, 277, Sr.), Mike Suarez (6-5, 259, Fr.) and David Kent (6-4, 244, So.). Mackovic also will be watching the progress of freshman recruits John Horn (6-6, 250), Mikki Johnson (6-2, 230) and Tim McCloud (6-3, 275).

MACKOVIC ON DEFENSIVE

LINE: "There are several questions to be answered about our defensive line in 1991. I don't think we're going to know how good we'll be until we start playing some games. We know that teams are going to attack us every way possible, and we're definitely going to have to play well against the run to have the type of success we've enjoyed in recent years."

LINEBACKERS: As three-time All-Big Ten linebacker Darrick Brownlow moves into the professional ranks, a large chunk of leadership and expertise goes with him. Brownlow's running mates, Bill Henkel and Romero Brice, also have used up their eligibility, but there remains an experienced base of talent for Illinois' defensive coaches to work with this fall. At rush linebacker, three top players from a year ago return in Mike Poloskey (6-2, 263, Sr.), Todd Leach (6-2, 233, So.) and David Hill (6-2, 229, So.). Julyon Brown (6-3, 216, Sr.), Drew Daniels (6-1, 230, So.) and Chris Stelter (6-6, 216, Fr.) will battle it out for the right to replace Brice. And the dogfight for Brownlow's slot will involve Aaron Shelby (6-1, 220, So.) and talented redshirt freshman John Holecek (6-2, 231). Those scrambling for Henkel's position include John Sidari (6-2, 224, So.), Daniels, and redshirt freshman Dana Howard (6-0, 229). Incoming linebacker recruits include Jarrett Hansen (6-2, 220) and Kevin Hardy (6-4, 200).

MACKOVIC ON LINEBACKERS:

"The heart and soul of any defense is its linebackers, and we think that our linebacking corps will be a real hardhitting, active group. Our linebackers will be young, but several of them have

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shown the ability to get to the ball and be explosive hitters."

SECONDARY: Of Illinois' four defensive secondary starters the past few seasons, the only fulltime starter who remains is Marlon Primous (6-3, 216, Sr.). Cornerbacks Chris Green and Henry Jones will both move on to pro ball, as will strong safety Quintin Parker. Primous has been a starter at free safety for each of the last three seasons, winning first-team All-Big Ten honors two years ago and second-team laurels in 1990. He ranks as Illinois' top returning tackler from last season with 84 stops. Mike Hopkins (5-10, 185, Sr.), a starter in four games last season (twice at strong safety and twice at free safety), will be another player who Mackovic can count upon for leadership. Among players given the best chance to earn the starting role at strong safety are senior Steve Nelson (5-10, 193), Brian Samuels (5-10, 203, Sr.) and Derrick Rucker (5-11, 204, So.). There also is excellent competition for the starting spots at the corners. At left cornerback, the combatants are Filmel Johnson (5-9, 188, So.), Mark Qualls (5-10, 181, Jr.) and redshirt freshman Robert Crumpton (6-0, 182). The battle at right cornerback is among Fred Cox (6-0, 185, Jr.), Rod Boykin (5-10, 184, Fr.), and Scott Turner (5-9, 177, Fr.). The incoming freshman DBs include Antwoine Patton (6-1, 180), Michael Russell (6-2, 191) and Tyrone Washington (6-0, 185).

MACKOVIC ON SECONDARY: "1

was very encouraged by how the secondary progressed during spring ball. I'm pleased with their understanding of what we're trying to do. Marlon Primous and Mike Hopkins give us a defensive secondary tandem who will provide great stability and leadership. We have the potential to field a solid defensive backfield in 1991."


ALL-STAR CANDIDATES:

Clinton Lynch (5-10, 184, So.) and either Johnson, Steve Feagin (5-11, 183, Jr.) or Scott Turner (5-9, 177, Fr.) are the most likely candidates to return kickoffs.

TEAMS: "We have experience at most of the key positions in the special teams units, but it is important that we show improvement in this area in 1991."

Verduzco came back to hit Elbert Turner on a 12-yard TD strike just before half for a 21-10 score. Illinois took its first possession of the second half, and moved inside the Arizona 10-yard line again, but had to settle for Higgins' second field goal of the game to move within eight points, 21-13. Higgins kicked his third field goal of the day in the fourth quarter to pull within five, but Arizona retaliated with 14-play, 74-yard drive, that took 6:41 off the clock to cement the Wildcat victory.

and after a UI punt that was returned for 42 yards by Dave McCloughan, Hagan tossed a 32-yard touchdown pass to Michael Simmons as the Buffaloes jumped to a 17-3 lead. In one of the most critical drives of the early season, UI quarterback Jason Verduzco led Illinois on a 71-yard jaunt and hit Elbert Turner with an eight-yard TD pass with just 28 seconds left in the half to pull within seven points. Verduzco started the second-half scoring by tossing a four-yard TD pass to Shawn Wax, who made a great one-handed stab in the corner of the end zone, to tie the score at 17. Buffalo linebacker Greg Biekert tackled UI fullback Howard Griffith in the end zone for a safety and the lead. After receiving the ensuing kick, Harper booted a 26-yard field goal for a 22-17 lead. After several changes of possession, Verduzco again led the Fighting Illini on a sterling drive. This time it was capped by a one-yard Griffith plunge to give Illinois the 23-22 lead and victory. On the game-winning drive, Verduzco completed all five of his passes for 48 yards.



fumble by Verduzco. The Salukis capitalized as Yonel Jourdain blew up the middle from 12 yards to give SIU a surprising 21-7 lead. Things were just beginning to heat up. In the second quarter, Griffith blasted up the middle for a 51-yard TD dash. After a SIU punt, Griffith finished the next drive with a seven-yard TD run. After another Saluki punt, Griffith scored on a 41-yard dash. Griffith had scored three touchdowns on three carries, and four TDs in the first half to tie the Illinios record for TDs in a half. More was to come. Griffith finished the first UI possession of the second half with a five-yard TD run for his fifth score, and an 18-yard run for his sixth to break the all-time Illinois record set by Red Grange vs. Michigan in 1924. On Illinois' next possession, Griffith tied the alltime NCAA record with his seventh TD run, this one from 12 yards out. And with 1:25 remaining in the third quarter, Griffith scored his NCAA-record eighth touchdown from three yards to give Illinois a 56-21 lead. Griffith's eight touchdowns broke a 39-year-old record by Arnold Boykin of Mississippi and his 48 points broke Syracuse's Jim Brown's record of 43 points in 1956.

quarter, Doug Higgins booted a field goal for Illinois to help the Fighting Illini move within four. Late in the half, Ohio State had a chance to go ahead by 11 points, but the Illinois defense stiffened inside the 10-yard line and forced the Buckeyes to kick a short field goal to make the score, 17-10, at the half. UI Coach John Mackovic would later say that defensive stop may have been the turning point of the game. The Fighting Illini came out in the second half and capped the opening drive with a 12-yard Howard Griffith touchdown gallop to knot the game at 17. The Buckeyes countered with a field goal, but Illinois came right back with another touchdown, this time a short one-yard pass from Vercuzco to tight end Dave Olson to give the Fighting Illini the lead, 24-20. Next came the play of the day. With OSU attempting a field goal that would pull the Buckeyes within one point, UI lineman Mel Agee blocked the kick toward the Illinois goal. Junior defensive tackle Mike Poloskey, making his first start, picked up the loose ball and lumbered toward paydirt. Caught after 12 yards, Poloskey lateralled to safety Quintin Parker, who sailed to the end zone to give Illinois a 31-20 lead.

crashed over from the 2-yard line for the early lead. UI quarterback Jason Verduzco would throw for a careerhigh 329 yards and two touchdowns to lead the Fighting Illini attack. Verduzco combined with fellow quarterback Jeff Kinney for 391 yards passing on the day, the eighthbest passing day in UI history. UI split end Shawn Wax caught five passes for 126 yards to mark the first Illinois receiver to surpass the century mark in yardage two consecutive games since two-time All-America Dave Williams in 1984. The Illinois defense, led by linebacker Darrick Brownlow, extended the Purdue touchdown drought against the Fighting Illini to 16 quarters. Brownlow made 15 tackles and recovered a fumble while earning Big Ten Defensive Player of the Week honors. UI All-America nose tackle Moe Gardner had his tackle for loss streak stopped at 17 consecutive games. The win moved Illinois' record to 3-1 overall and 2-0 in Big Ten play.

John Langeloh came back to boot a 21yard field goal to tie the score, before two more Higgins' field goals put Illinois in the lead, 9-3, at the half. In the

third guarter, MSU guarterback Dan Enos scored on a 1vard naked bootleg on fourth down. That marked the first touchdown scored against the Illinois defense in 27 opponent offensive possessions. Higgins kicked his fourth field goal of the day from 27 yards to reclaim the lead at 12-10 with 7:27 remaining in the game. The Spartans then moved 61 yards on 11 plays and ate up 5:46 of the clock to regain the lead, 13-12, on a 35-yard Langeloh field goal with 1:41 remaining. Verduzco, who was hobbled with a sprained left knee for the final three guarters, led Illinois 49 yards in eight plays, aided by a 26-yard hook-up to flanker Steve Mueller on the MSU 32-yard line. Four plays later, Higgins kicked his fifth field goal of the day from 48 yards to give Illinois the 15-13 victory. Higgins' five field goals tied the all-time Illinois record set by Dan Beaver in 1973, Mike Bass in 1982 and Chris White in 1984. The win moved Illinois to 3-0 in the league and 5-1 overall. Despite being hobbled most of the way, Verduzco threw for 238 yards.

in the end zone for the go-ahead touchdown. Indiana knotted the score at 10 with a Scott Bonnell field goal just before halftime. Illinois started the second half with what was supposed to be its starting defensive backfield. It was the first time all season the quartet of Chris Green, Henry Jones, Quintin Parker and Marlon Primous had played together. The UI defense played like it was expected to coming into the season, and the Hoosiers were unable to score in the second half. Howard Griffith took over, rushing for 68 yards and two touchdowns in the second half. Griffith's two scores tied him with Red Grange on the UI career TD list, and with Grange and two others for the single-season record of 13. The key play of the game happened early in the fourth quarter with the Hoosiers driving. From the Illinois 24-yard line, Dyer went around right end on an option play and saw nothing but paydirt. Seemingly out of no where, Green caught Dyer at the 3yard line and stripped the ball from his hands. Linebacker Bill Henkel recovered at the 4-yard line. remaining to spoil the Fighting Illini's trip to Pasadena. A win for Illinois would assure an invitation to the Hall of Fame Bowl in Tampa, Fla., its second consecutive Jan. 1 Bowl trip. Illinois Most Valuable Player Howard Griffith needed 207 yards to reach 1,000 for the season. The Fighting Illini got that and more. Griffith rushed 37 times for an Illinois-record 263 yards and two touchdowns. The touchdowns gave him 33 for his career and 15 for the season, both all-time UI records. It started out easy. Illinois scored touchdowns on its first three possessions for an early 21-0 lead. The Wildcats wouldn't guit, however, and scored three times of their own to pull within 21-17. Griffith scored his second touchdown of the day with 5:35 remaining to put the game out of reach, 28-17. Northwestern scored late to pull within five points, but Griffith ran out the clock on the final series to insure the victory. After the game, Hall of Fame Bowl representatives Bob Sutton and Jim Urbanski invited Illinois to play in the 1991 Hall of Fame Bowl against Clemson.

After a fun-filled week in Tampa, the Fighting Illini took on the dangerous Clemson Tigers in the Hall of Fame BowI. The bowl game would be Illinois' third in as many years under John Mackovic, but it would also be the most disappointing.

The Tigers came right out of the lockerroom and took the opening kickoff and marched 71 yards in 16 plays before All-America kicker Chris Gardocki kicked an 18yard field goal for a 3-0 lead. Things did not start so well for the Fighting Illini when record-setting running back Howard Griffith fumbled on Illinois' first play from scrimmage.

On the very next play, Tiger quarterback DeChane Cameron hit Doug Thomas with a 14-yard touchdown

pass to quickly give his team a 10-0 lead. Early in the second quarter, Clemson again used its surprising passing attack as Cameron hit Howard Hall for a 17-yard touchdown pass to make it 17-0.

Three plays later, Illinois quarterback Jason Verduzco threw a sideline pass intended for Elbert Turner. Clemson's Arlington Nunn stepped between Turner and the ball and returned the interception 34 yards to put the Tigers on top, 24-0. Illinois moved into Clemson territory for the only time in the first half on its next possession, but another Tiger interception halted the drive at the Clemson 40-yard line.

Two second-half field goals by Gardocki pushed the final margin to 30-0. It was a disappointing end to an otherwise outstanding season, a season that saw the Fighting Illini earn a share of the Big Ten championship. Moe Gardner earned All-America honors for the second consecutive year and Darrick Brownlow nearly won the Butkus Award. Howard Griffith scored an incredible eight touchdowns in one game and broke the legendary Red Grange's school records for touchdowns in a game, season and career. The University also celebrated 100 years of glorious football history during a season many won't soon forget.





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

COACH SCOTT WILLIAMS

Scott Williams was the man credited with introducing the game of football to the University of Illinois campus. Even though the first

college football game was played in 1869, no one seemed to have heard of the sport when Williams, who played at the high school level in Normal, just 50 miles from Champaign-Urbana, managed to gather and teach enough players to play three games in the inaugural season of 1890. Williams coached, captained and quarterbacked that '90 team, and, by the time he left Illinois in 1893, had played every position on the team with the exception of guard and center.

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COACH GEORGE A. HUFF



(5 years, 21-16-3)

George Huff, born on a Champaign, Illinois farm in 1872, first attended the University of Illinois at age 15. He not only played and

coached football at the UI, but he coached baseball (for 24 years) and was the athletic director and director of the School of Physical Education. He was also, for a brief time, the manager of the Boston American League baseball team, and later was a talent scout for many summers. Huff had the title of head football coach from 1895-99, but performed most of the duties for just the first two of those five years. In 1897, the year the Intercollegiate Conference of Faculty Representatives (the Big Ten Conference) was formed, Fred Smith, formerly of Princeton, actually took over the coaching reins and remained for two seasons. In 1899, Neilson Poe, another former Princeton player, coached the Fighting Illini. Huff broke tradition in 1913 when he brought in a high school football coach to head up the Illinois football program. That coach was the immortal Bob Zuppke.

Robert C. Zuppke coached the University of Illinois football team in 225 games over a span of 29 years, the longest term of any

Fighting Illini grid mentor. Zuppke, who was born in Germany and raised in Wisconsin, coached Oak Park (Illinois) High School to national championships in 1911 and 1912 before coming to Champaign-Urbana in time for the 1913 season. Zuppke was an innovator as a coach; he is credited with originating such contributions to the game of football as the "flea-flicker" play, the screen pass, the spiral snap from center, spring practice, and the huddle. COACH RAY ELIOT



(18 years, 83-73-11)

Ray Eliot, known to Illinois football fans as "Mr. Illini," held the position of head

football coach at the U of I for more years than anyone else except Bob Zuppke. Eliot was born Raymond Nusspickel at Brighton, Mass., in 1905, and graduated from the University of Illinois in 1932 after lettering in baseball and three times in football as a tackle. After entering the coaching profession at Illinois College in Jacksonville, he returned to the U of I in 1937 as line coach under Zuppke before replacing him in 1942. At Illinois, Eliot produced Big Ten championships in 1946, 1951 and 1953. His teams claimed Rose Bowl victories, 45-14, over UCLA in 1947, and, 40-7, over Stanford in 1952. Eliot, who for years was in demand as a lecturer at football clinics around the nation, was renowned as a motivator. A nine-word motto he uttered, typified his Fighting Illini spirit: "Anything you think you can do, you can do."

COACH PETE ELLIOTT



(7 years, 31-34-1)

Pete Elliott, a native of Bloomington, Ill., became only the third football coach at Illinois in 47 years

in 1960. When he was hired, he was the Big Ten's youngest head football coach at age 33. He had already coached for 10 years - as an assistant at Oregon State and Oklahoma, and as head coach at Nebraska and California. A quarterback on Michigan's 1948 national championship team, Elliott eventually represented three different schools in the Rose Bowl: Michigan (quarterbacking the Wolverines to a 49-0 win over Southern Cal in 1948), California (coaching the Bears in their 1959 38-12 loss to Iowa) and Illinois (coaching the Fighting Illini to a 17-7 triumph over Washington in 1964). His 1963 team, with Dick Butkus and Jim

Grabowski, produced Illinois' only Big Ten championship during his tenure.

COACH MIKE WHITE



(8 years, 47-41-3)

Mike White was new athletic director Neale Stoner's choice to run the UI football program starting in

1980. He had declined Pete Elliott's overtures to join him at Illinois in 1960, but had since picked up some impressive coaching credentials after learning from some of the game's heavyweights - Bill Walsh, Dick Vermeil, Marv Levy and John Ralston - he coached California to a Pac-8 championship with a nation-leading offense (459 yards per game) in 1975. Along the way, he had helped to develop such passers as Joe Roth, Jim Plunkett, Steve Bartkowski and Craig Morton, and would add to his list at Illinois with the likes of Dave Wilson, Tony Eason and Jack Trudeau. White's wide-open passing philosophy seemed to be just what the Fighting Illini needed at the time. His teams virtually rewrote the UI record books in the passing department, and brought Illinois back to Big Ten contender status. Five of White's eight Illinois teams posted winning records. The 1982 squad (7-5-0) played in the Liberty Bowl against Alabama in the legendary Bear Bryant's final game as Crimson Tide head coach. The Liberty Bowl was Illinois' first bowl game appearance since the 1964 Rose Bowl. The 1983 Big Ten championship team (10-2), which played in the 1984 Rose Bowl, is the only team in Big Ten history to have defeated all nine conference opponents in the same season.

COACH JOHN MACKOVIC

(3 years, 24-11-1)

John Mackovic became Illinois' 19th head football coach February 3, 1988. Since then, he has

built the Fighting Illini into not only a Big Ten contender, but also a force to be reckoned with nationally. He enters the 1991 season with a 24-11-1 record after three years at Illinois. All three of his UI teams have played in bowl games (1988 All American Bowl, 1990 Florida Citrus Bowl and 1991 Hall of Fame Bowl). Mackovic is the first to have earned the Dave McLain Big Ten Coach of the Year award in each of his first two seasons in the league. His 1989 team tied the school record (set in 1983) for victories with 10.

Mackovic, who was named athletic director at Illinois December 23, 1988. is a native of Barberton. Ohio. He played quarterback at Wake Forest, and began his coaching career as a graduate assistant under Bo Schembechler at Miami of Ohio in 1965. His other stops along the coaching trail have been at Army, San Jose State, Arizona, Purdue and the Dallas Cowboys as an assistant, and at Wake Forest and the Kansas City Chiefs as a head coach.

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

BOWL GAME HISTORY

The University of Illinois has compiled a 4-5 (.444) record in nine bowl appearances dating back to 1947 when the Fighting Illini defeated UCLA, 45-14, in the Rose Bowl, Illinois' first bowl appearance. In its most recent bowl appearance, Clemson defeated Illinois, 30-0, in the 1991 Hall of Fame Bowl. Here's a look at Illinois in bowl games.

Seven different Illinois players scored a touchdown as the Fighting Illini racked up their first bowl victory.

Late in the third quarter, Illinois scored the first of 34 unanswered points to blow out Stanford. Illinois took the lead on a seven-yard touchdown run by Johnny Karras, then exploded for 27 fourthquarter points to give Illinois and Head Coach Ray Eliot a second Rose Bowl victory in



as many tries. Illinois rolled up 434 yards in total offense, with Mattoon's Don Tate picking up 150 yards on the ground. The 1952 Rose Bowl was the first nationally telecast college football game.

Illinois trailed 7-0 before Jim Plankenhorn's 32yard field goal with one second remaining in the first half put the Fighting Illini on the scoreboard. Illinois came out strong in the second half, grinding out touchdowns in the third and fourth quarters



to wear down the Huskies, 17-7. Grabowski earned MVP honors, gaining 125 yards and scoring one touchdown.

Illinois reappeared on the bowl scene after a 19-year absence, facing Alabama and Paul "Bear" Bryant, who was coaching his final game. Fighting Illini quarterback Tony Eason set a Liberty Bowl record, throwing for 423 yards, but Alabama's bruising ground attack mustered 217 yards and proved to be the difference.






After Virginia tied the game early in the second quarter, George directed Illinois on an 80-yard scoring drive, hitting tight end Dan Donovan on a one-yard play-action touchdown pass. Doug Higgins expanded the Illinois lead to 10 with a 34-yard field goal as time expired in the first half. Illinois opened the second half with an 84-yard drive capped by fullback Howard Griffith's scoring on a three-yard sweep around right end. Early in the fourth quarter, receiver Mike Bellamy made an acrobatic touchdown on a 26-yard aerial from George to clinch an Illinois victory. George earned MVP honors, completing 26 of 38 passes for 321 yards and three touchdowns.



The Fighting Illini took on the dangerous Clemson Tigers in the Hall of Fame Bowl. The bowl game would be Illinois' third in as many years under John Mackovic, but it would also be the most disappointing. The Tigers came right out of the lockerroom and took the opening kickoff and marched 71 yards in 16 plays before All-America kicker Chris



Gardocki kicked an 18-yard field goal for a 3-0 lead. Things did not start so well for the Fighting Illini when record-setting running back Howard Griffith fumbled on Illinois' first play from scrimmage. On the very next play, Tiger quarterback DeChane Cameron hit Doug Thomas . with a 14-yard touchdown pass to quickly give his team a 10-0 lead. Things did not get any better in the second quarter. The Tiger offense tacked on two more touchdowns on a 17-yard Cameron TD pass and a 34-yard Arlington Nunn interception return to take a 24-0 halftime lead. Meanwhile, the Clemson defense held the Fighting Illini to just 22 total yards in the half. Illinois finally got its offense untracked in the second half with 225 yards, but never could find paydirt. Clemson tacked on two more field goals to set its final margin of victory.

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



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THE BIG TEN CONFERENCE

A meeting of seven Midwest university presidents January 11, 1895 at the Palmer House in Chicago, was the first development of what would become one of organized sports' most successful undertakings. Those seven men, behind the leadership of James H. Smart, president of Purdue University, established the principles for which the Intercollegiate Conference of Faculty Representatives, more popularly known as the Big Ten Conference, would be founded.

At that meeting, a blueprint for the control and administration of college athletics under the direction of appointed faculty representatives was outlined. The presidents' first known action was to "restrict eligibility for athletics to bonafide, full-time students who were not delinquent in their studies." This helped limit some problems of the times, especially the participation of professional athletes and "non-students" in the

The Rose Bowl

Each year the Big Ten champion earns the right to represent the conference against the Pacific Ten champ in college football's greatest spectacle, the Rose Bowl.

Today's Rose Bowl had its beginnings in 1890 in Pasadena, Calif., a growing southern California city with a population of fewer than 5,000 people, most of whom had been transplants from cities in the East and Midwest.

In late 1889, one of the town's leading citizens proposed to a group of fellow Valley Hunt Club members that it would be nice to have a small parade and display of athletic competitions on New Year's Day. The Pasadena natives had long forgotten their snow-covered homes in the east, and were anxious to showcase their beautiful California climate.

The parade was a line of flower-

university's regular sporting events. That important legislation, along with others that would follow in the coming years, served as the primary building block for amateur intercollegiate athletics.

Eleven months after the presidents' meeting, one faculty member from each of those seven universities met again at the Palmer House, and officially established the mechanics of the "Intercollegiate Conference of Faculty Representatives," or "Big Ten Conference" or "Western Conference."

The seven universities were: the University of Chicago, the University of Illinois, the University of Michigan, the University of Minnesota, Northwestern University, Purdue University and the University of Wisconsin. Indiana University and the State University of Iowa were admitted in 1899. Ohio State joined in 1912. Chicago withdrew in 1946, and

adorned carriages, and the games consisted of foot races, tugs of war, and jousts among the local citizens.

The foot races and tugs of war kept the townspeople's interest until around 1902. The suggestion then was made to invite two college football teams to compete in the postseason celebration. Michigan and Stanford played in college football's first intersectional post season game in 1902.

Local residents then decided that perhaps football's time had not yet arrived, and for the next 14 years the Rose Bowl gave way to a number of other events, including polo matches and chariot racing.

In 1916, the decision was made to bring back football, and the Rose Bowl has been the "Granddaddy of them all" ever since.

The Tournament of Roses committee selected the two teams that would compete in the New Year's Day classic until 1923. From Michigan State College (now Michigan State University) was added three years later in 1949.

After a 40-year period of constancy in membership, the Big Ten recently expanded to 11 members for the first time. On June 4, 1990, the Council of Ten, comprised of Big Ten university presidents, voted to confirm its earlier decision to integrate Pennsylvania State University into the conference. The Nittany Lions will not participate in conference play in football until 1993, however.

The Big Ten enters its 96th year of intercollegiate football this fall. For 32 of the last 35 years, Big Ten attendance has led the nation. Last year nearly 60,000 fans per game attended Big Ten Conference matchups in 1990, making the conference second only to the Southeastern Conference in average attendance.

1923-1946, the west coast representative was allowed to choose its eastern opponent. The decision was made by the Pacific Coast Conference.

The Big Ten sent a representative in 1921 when Ohio State lost to California, 28-0. Following that season, however, the conference established a ban on post-season football games that lasted 26 seasons.

On September 1, 1946, the antipost season policy was lifted by the Big Ten and a five-year pact was signed between the two conferences allowing Illinois to play UCLA in the 1947 Rose Bowl. The agreement was revised in 1962, and since then the two conference champions have played each year on New Year's Day.

The University of Illinois has participated in four Rose Bowl games (1947, 1952, 1964, 1984). The Fighting Illini have won three of the four Rose Bowl games it has played in, giving it the best winning percentage of any Big Ten school.

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Traditions

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THE FIRST SEASON

In 1889, University of Illinois student Scott Williams noticed a bulletin board card announcing that anyone interested in playing football should report to campus that afternoon.

That day he arrived to see a group of students chasing and kicking a ball in a manner that barely resembled the game of football that he played at State Normal University, just over 50 miles west of Champaign.

After the boys' workout, Williams assembled the group and gave them instruction on how the ball should be passed and kicked. He also explained the scoring system and other points of strategy. The gang reassembled and played a little while longer with Williams as their leader.

The following year Williams and some teammates approached the heads of the attiletic department with the hopes that they could represent the UI in a game of football against Illinois Wesleyan at Bloomington. Anticipating little enthusiasm, Williams suggested that the team pay its own expenses, provide uniforms, and pay its own train fare. Permission was granted. The first University of Illinois football team boarded a train on Thursday, Oct. 2, 1890, to compete in the Illinois Oratorical Association meeting in Bloomington, an athletic competition featuring contests in track, tennis, baseball and football.

With Williams serving as coach, captain and quarterback, Illinois lost to Wesleyan, 16-0. Although Illinois lost its first football game, it did win the championship cup for the weekends activities.

Illinois' second game of the season was against Purdue, a team which had been under great preparation for the game. The Boilers defeated Illinois, 62-0, but the young UI 11 had learned a few lessons from the advanced Purdue team before entering the last game of its first season, a rematch against Wesleyan.

Illinois hosted its first-ever home game Nov. 26, 1890. The contest was met with great anticipation in the community. Nearly 300 fans arrived at the Champaign fair grounds to see

W.F. Slater score two touchdowns in a 12-6 Illinois victory, which ended its first season with a 1-2 record.

Scott Williams stepped down as captain and coach after the 1890 · season, but remained on the roster as a player on the 1891 Illinois team, winners of all six games and champions of the Illinois Intercollegiate Football League.

Traditional Series Trophies

"Illibuck"

(Ohio State—Since 1925)

"Illibuck" is—or was—a turtle, destined for long life, it was hoped. But the wear and tear of traveling between Champaign-Urbana and Columbus was too much, even for a hardy marine reptile. "Illibuck" died in the spring of 1927 and his successor is now a wooden replica. Members of two junior honorary societies, Bucket and Dipper of Ohio State and Sachem of Illinois, annually meet at halftime of the Fighting Illini-Buckeye game to smoke the peace pipe and present the "Illibuck" trophy to last year's winning school.

"Cannon"

(Purdue—Since 1943)

The "Cannon," more accurately known as the Purdue Cannon, made its first trip to Champaign-Urbana in 1905 when a group of Purdue students brought it to fire after a Boilermaker victory. Purdue won the game, 29-0, but the Cannon was never fired. Illinois student Quincy Hail found the Cannon hidden near the old Illinois Field. Hall and a group of Delta Upsilon brothers confiscated the Cannon and held it until 1943 when they donated it as a symbol of the Illinois-Purdue rivalry.

"Tomahawk"

(Northwestern—Since 1945)

The story of the Illinois-Northwestern trophy dates back to 1945 when the staff members of the two student newspapers conceived the idea of a wooden Indian trophy, "Sweet Sioux."

In September, 1946, "Sweet Sioux" was stolen from a showcase at Northwestern. A Tomahawk Trophy was inaugurated in 1947 to replace the wooden Indian and has been used since. "Sweet Sioux" was found in 1948, but was discarded because of its bulk.

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HOMECOMING

Homecoming, a tradition on just about every college campus in the United States, is celebrated with zest as graduates and former students return to renew fond college memories—and it all began at the University of Illinois. The fall of 1991 marks the 81st year for the campus-wide celebration which began the weekend of October 14-16, 1910.


The Homecoming celebration was conceived in 1909 by UI students C.F. (Dab) Williams and W. Elmer Ekblaw, members of the Shield and Trident senior society. The Shield and Trident Society joined with another senior society, Phoenix, to organize the three-day event and submitted a petition to the University Council of Administrators asking the weekend to be set aside for the First Annual Fall Homecoming. Once the proposal was approved, the senior societies, having instituted the movement, resigned their claims to the Illinois Union, which has organized the Homecoming since that time.

At the center of the weekend festivities was the Illinois-Chicago football game on Saturday, Oct. 15, 1910. Illinois, under the leadership of Captain Glenn D. Butzer, scored the first victory over Chicago—by a score of 3-0—on a drop-kick by Otto Seiler. More than 1,500 graduates returned to Champaign-Urbana at the original Homecoming, one-third of all its graduates.

The weekend activities included a Varsity "Alumni" baseball game, an interclass track meet, a band reunion, a "rooter" section at the game (which later became "Block I") and a Hobo band parade. The Hobo band parade was put on by members of the senior class who paraded from Green Street to Illinois Field. A prize for the most comical costume of the day was given, setting the stage for modern "tailgreat" contests and celebrations.

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Traditions

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THE MARCHING

Performing with Chief Illiniwek is the Illinois marching band, the "Marching Illini." This year's edition has more than 300 members, including 252 instrumentalists, a 36member flag corp, 30 Illinettes (a precision dance team), three drum majors and one featured twirler. Auditions were held throughout the spring and summer with more than 600 students competing for positions in the band. The 1991 Marching Illini represents one of the most select organizations in the band's history.

The unique style for which the Marching Illini has become famous represents a combination of tradition of the past and exciting innovations. All music and accompanying drills are written especially for the Marching Illini and have taken the band to the forefront of the great University bands as evidenced by becoming the 1983 recipient of the Louis Sudler Intercollegiate Marching Band Trophy.

The Marching Illini perform pregame, halftime and postgame shows at each Fighting Illini home game, as well as select road games.

The band is under the supervision of Director of Bands James Keene and Marching Band Director Gary Smith.

Hail to the Orange

Hail to the Orange. Hail to the Blue. Hail Alma Mater, Ever so true. We love no other, So let our motto be Victory, Illinois, Varsity.

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One of the most dramatic and dignified traditions in college athletics is the performance of Chief Illiniwek at the University of Illinois. Since 1926, this symbol has stirred pride and respect in audiences at Memorial Stadium and the Assembly Hall.

Illiniwek (pronounced "ill-EYE-nih-wek") was the name of the loose confederation of Algonquin tribes that once lived in the region. The French changed the ending to "ois" in naming what became the state of Illinois. Illiniwek means "they are men" and former Illinois football coach Robert Zuppke is believed to have suggested calling the UI symbol Chief Illiniwek.

In 1926, Assistant Band Director Ray Dvorak conceived the idea of performing an American Indian dance during halftime of the Illinois vs. Pennsylvania football game in Philadelphia. Lester Leutwiler, a student interested in Indian lore, was chosen for the role. Leutwiler's performance, done in a homemade costume, was received so well that he was asked to continue his dance through the 1928 season.

Webber Borchers, the second Chief Illiniwek, was the first to appear in authentic American Indian regalia. He initiated a campaign to raise money to replace his homemade outfit with an authentic one, but with the Depression on, he received just \$15 dollars. However, a Champaign merchant stepped in to fund the rest and Borchers was off.

He recalled: "In the summer of 1930, I went, at my own expense, to the Pine Ridge reservation in South Dakota. I hitchhiked out, called an Indian agent and explained my mission. He and an Indian trader called in an older Sioux woman. She and two younger women made the suit."

CHIEF ILLINIWEK



Chief Illiniwek has been the symbol of Illinois athletics since 1926.

On Nov. 8, 1930, in New York's Yankee Stadium, Illinois faced Army in the seventh game of the season. It was there that Borchers made the first appearance of Chief Illiniwek in that outfit. Since then, five different authentic outfits have been used by Chief Illiniwek. The one used in performances now was purchased in 1983 from Sioux Chief Frank Fools Crow, and is topped by a headdress of turkey feathers.

Dick Butkus remains the standard for which all linebackers are compared. He played two All-America seasons in 1963 and 1964 before enjoying a Hall of Fame career with the Chicago Bears, where he was a six-time All-Pro selection. Butkus finished third in the 1964 Heisman Trophy voting and has college football's annual award for the outstanding collegiate linebacker named after him. He had his jersey, No. 50, retired at Illinois in 1986, joining Red Grange as the only two Illinois players to have their numbers retired. Butkus helped lead the Fighting Illini to a 1964 Rose Bowl victory over Washington. He earned first-team All-Big Ten honors twice and was awarded the 1963 Silver Football Award as the Big Ten's Most Valuable Player. Butkus finished his career with 373 tackles. His 145 stops in 1963 stood as the school record until 1976. He was named the 1964 Player of the Year by the American Football Coaches Association.

Butkus was named to the Big Ten Diamond Anniversary Team in 1970, The Sporting News College Coaches All-Time Team, the Walter Camp All-Century Team and the University of Illinois All-Century Team. He was elected to the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1979 and to the College Football Hall of Fame in 1983.



#77 Harold "Red" Grange

1923-25 Halfback Number retired in 1925 Born: June 13, 1903 Died: January 28, 1991

Red Grange is one of football's all-time greats, and arguably the game's greatest all-time offensive player. He is a charter member of the Pro (1963) and College (1951) Football Halls of Fame. Grange's most memorable performance came Oct. 18, 1924 when he scored four touchdowns in the first 12 minutes vs. Michigan in the Memorial Stadium dedication game. Later in the same game he ran for a fifth touchdown and threw for a sixth. Nicknamed the "Wheaton Iceman" and "Galloping Ghost," he left Illinois to play pro football with the Chicago Bears under former Fighting Illini George Halas. He was named All-America each of his three season and won the 1924 Silver Football Award as the Big Ten's Most Valuable Player, the first recipient of the award. He was named to The Sporting *News* All-Time Team, the Big Ten Diamond Anniversary Team, the Walter Camp All-Century Team and the UI All-Century Team.




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ILLINOIS' ALL-CENTURY TEAM







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HALL OF FAME MEMBERS

Alex Agase

(Inducted in 1963)



An All-America guard at Illinois in 1942 and '46, he holds the rare distinction of earning All-America honors at another school (Purdue) in 1943 while in the Army. He also was selected to Walter Camp Foundation's All-Century Team in 1989. Agase enjoyed a lengthy

Big Ten coaching career, first as a head coach at Northwestern from 1964-1972 and Purdue from 1973-1976. He was also a volunteer assistant coach at Michigan in charge of special teams from 1982-1987. Agase also served as athletic director at Eastern Michigan University from 1977-1982. He is now retired and living in Ypsilanti, Mich.

Bob Blackman

(Inducted in 1987)



Blackman served as Illinois' head football coach from 1971-76 compiling a 29-36-1 record. During his six seasons at Illinois, Blackman coached future NFL stars Scott Studwell, Larry McCarren and Revie Sorey, as well as All-Americans Tab Bennett and Dan Beaver.

Before heading the Illinois program, Blackman enjoyed great success at Dartmouth College where he compiled a 104-37-3 record in 16 seasons. In 15 years of official Ivy League competition, Blackman's Dartmouth Indians were 79-24-2, won four league championships outright, shared three other championships, had three perfect 9-0 seasons (1962, 1965, 1970) and won two Lambert Trophies, symbolic of supremacy in Eastern college football. Blackman is now retired and living in Hilton Head, S.C. He also serves as chairman of the selection committee for the annual East/West Shrine Game.

Dick Butkus

(Inducted in 1983)



Butkus remains the standard for which all linebackers are compared. He played two All-America seasons at Illinois (1963-64) before enjoying a Hall of Fame career with the Chicago Bears, where he was a six-time All-Pro selection. Gale Sayers called Butkus the "fiercest tackler of his time." In 1964 he finished third in the Heisman Trophy balloting to Notre Dame's John Huarte. College football's annual award for the outstanding collegiate linebacker is appropriately named after Butkus and is awarded each year by the Downtown Athletic Club of Orlando, Fla. Butkus and Red Grange are the only players to have their numbers retired at Illinois. Butkus' No. 50 was retired during halftime of the Illinois-Nebraska game, Sept. 20, 1986. He was also honored on the 1989 Walter Camp Foundation All-Century team. Butkus is now enjoying a successful acting and entertainment career and resides with his family in Malibu, Calif.

Chuck Carney

(Inducted in 1966)



Tall, slender and sure-handed, Carney was an All-America receiver at Illinois in 1920. One of Head Coach Bob Zuppke's favorite targets, he once instructed one of his quarterbacks to "bombard passes in Carney's direction." After leaving Illinois, Carney

served as the end coach at Northwestern, Wisconsin and Harvard. He is also the only Illinois athlete to earn All-America honors in both football (1920) and basketball (1920 & 22). Carney died in 1984.

J.C. Caroline (Inducted in 1980)



Caroline led the nation in rushing as a sophomore in 1953 with 1,256 yards in just nine games and was named an All-American. He was called "the best allaround athlete I ever had in 26 years of coaching," by his Head Coach Ray Eliot. He led the Fighting Illini in

rushing again in 1954 before entering the Canadian Football League, and later spent 10 seasons in the NFL with the Chicago Bears. Caroline lives in Champaign, Ill. and serves as a physical education instructor at the Urbana Middle School.

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Harold "Red" Grange

(Inducted in 1951)



Grange is credited with establishing the popularity of professional football as its first legitimate "star." At 5-foot-10inches and 170 pounds, Grange was a three-time consensus All-America halfback at Illinois from 1923-25. After his final game at Illinois, Grange signed

with the Chicago Bears, owned by Illinois alumnus George Halas. During an age when professional football rarely saw crowds of more than a few thousand, Grange attracted 36,000 spectators for his pro debut on Thanksgiving Day at Wrigley Field; 10 days later 73,000 people watched him play at New York's Polo Grounds.

In addition to his feats as a halfback, Grange is sixth on Illinois' all-time career interception list with 11; third in career punt-return yardage; and possessed amazing average-yards-per-carry statistics in interceptions (22.5), pass receptions (18.1) and kickoff returns (30.2) He is also a charter member of both the college and Pro Football Halls of Fame. Former coach Bob Zuppke said, upon Grange leaving Illinois, "I will never have another Grange, but neither will anyone else." Grange's legendary No. 77 was retired after the completion of his final game at Illinois, Nov. 21, 1925. Grange is a member of the Camp Foundation's All-Century team. He died Jan. 28, 1991.

Edward K. Hall

(Inducted in 1951)



Became the third coach in Illinois history from 1892-93. He compiled a 12-5-5 record. It is Hall's off-field contributions to the game of football that earned him his recognition. He is credited with proposing and writing the first football code for the proper conduct of its

players. In an age when the game was often brutal and reckless, Hall's code was adopted and later appeared in the Official Football Guide. Hall is also known for putting the 1892 Illinois team through the most grueling schedule ever thrust upon a college football team. The Fighting Illini, with only 18 players, played six games in just eight days, in three states. Illinois went 4-2 on the trip and finished Hall's first season with a 9-3-2 record. No Illinois team has ever played more games in one season. At the time of his death in 1932, William Bingham, Harvard's athletic director, said, "If Walter Camp was the father of American Football, certainly E.K. Hall was the 'savior' of the game."

Bart Macomber

(Inducted in 1972)



Macomber joined All-America Hal Pogue in the backfield to lead Illinois and second-year Head Coach Bob Zuppke to their first national championship in 1914. That team shut out its first four opponents before allowing just 22 total points during a perfect 7-0

season. Macomber had also played for Zuppke as a prep at Oak Park High School. The following year Macomber earned All-America honors as a halfback, and was captain of the 1916 team. He was a versatile athlete who could play every backfield position, and did a majority of the team's kicking. Macomber died in 1971.

Bernie Shively

(Inducted in 1982)



Red Grange was led to many of his spectacular scores by an agile, athletic guard who was so quick and powerful for his size that he wrestled for the Big Ten heavyweight championship in 1926. He lost the bout, however, after wrestling George Fisher of Indiana to a

draw during regulation and then losing the coin toss to decide the champion. Shively earned All-America honors as a guard in 1926. He joined the University of Kentucky's staff as an assistant football coach, before being named that school's athletic director in 1938, a post he held until his death in 1967.



Former Illinois coach Bob Zuppke is a charter member of the College Football Hall of Fame.

George W. Woodruff

(Inducted in 1963)



Woodruff coached the University of Pennsylvania in its greatest days of college football. He compiled a 124-15-2 record from 1892-1901 at Penn. His 1897 Pennsylvania team was a perfect 15-0 and was recognized as national champions. Woodruff coached one

season at Illinois, compiling a record of 8-6 in 1903. He died in 1934.

Claude "Buddy" Young

(Inducted in 1968)



In a college career split by the armed services, the 5-foot-5-inch halfback earned All-America honors in 1944. Young scored 13 touchdowns in his All-America year, while rushing for 842 yards with an amazing 8.9 yards-percarry average. He rushed for 103 yards

in Illinois' 45-14 upset of unbeaten UCLA in the 1947 Rose Bowl and was selected as the game's MVP. A world-class sprinter, Young enjoyed a lengthy pro football career and served as an assistant commissioner in the NFL. He died in 1983.

Robert Zuppke

(Inducted in 1951)



Hired by Athletic Director George Huff as head football coach in 1913, Zuppke held the position for 29 years, the longest tenure of any Illinois head coach. An innovator and trend-setter, Zuppke established many of the current traditions and styles of football

today. He is credited with inventing several different formations, the flea-flicker, the huddle and spring practice. He also recruited and coached Red Grange, considered by many as the greatest player in football history. In all, Zuppke won four national titles (1914, 1919, 1923, 1927), seven conference championships, and compiled a record of 131-81-13. The playing field at Memorial Stadium is named after him, and is identified by a large stone engraving under the scoreboard in the north end zone. Zuppke died in 1957.


The University of Illinois Athlete of the Year was first given in 1940 to Bill Hapac, who played basketball and baseball. The award was given annually until it was discontinued in 1973. There were no awards given until 1982 when the Big Ten began a Conference Athlete of the Year in which each school nominated a male and female athlete. Since 1982, the University of Illinois has recognized a Male and Female Athlete of the Year.

In 1991, the awards were presented at the first UI Scholar-Athlete All-Star Banquet, held in Assembly Hall. NCAA heavyweight wrestling champion Jon Llewellyn of Burr Ridge earned the UI Male Athlete of the Year award. Big Ten women's golf champion Renee Heiken of Metamora and first-team All-Big Ten women's basketball selection Sarah Sharp earned Female Athlete of the Year honors.

Since the award was first given in 1940, 20 Fighting Illini football players have earned the Athlete of the Year award, including Buddy Young, Dike Eddleman, Dick Butkus, and Tony Eason.

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



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Big Ten Conference Medal of Honor

In 1914, the Big Ten Conference endowed a Medal of Honor, to be awarded annually at each institution to the student demonstrating proficiency in scholarship and academics. Beginning in 1982, a woman athlete from each institution has also been awarded the Conference Medal of Honor.

Aaron Mobarak (track and field) and Lynn Devers (gymnastics) were named 1991 Big Ten Male and Female Medal of Honor recipients at Illinois. Mobarak, a 5.0 finance major, won the 1991 Big Ten triple jump championship. Devers, a 4.97 marketing major, served as team co-captain and won the Big Ten uneven bars title.

In the 76-year history of the award, 12 Fighting Illini football players have earned the award, including quarterback Peter Freund in 1989. There has been one father-son UI Medal of Honor duo, Lee Sentman (track) in 1931 and his son, Lee Sentman III (fencing) in 1958. Gymnast Howard Beck (1974 and 1975) is the only two-time recipient of the award.

NCAA Silver Anniversary Award

This award is given annually to six distinguished former student-athletes on their silver anniversary (25th) as college graduates. In 1990, Illinois great Dick Butkus '65 was presented the award along with a group that included Dr. Donald Baxter (basketball, Mercer University), Paul Bucha (swimming, U.S. Military Academy), Dr. Archie Roberts (baseball, Columbia, University) and Roger Staubach (football, U.S. Naval Academy). Following his career at Illinois, Butkus earned Pro Football Hall of Fame honors with the Chicago Bears, and also has distinguished himself as a sports commentator and actor.

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SCHOLAR-ATHLETE BANQUET

NCAA-champion Jon Llewellyn was named 1991 Illinois Male Athlete of the Year, and Sarah Sharp and Renee Heiken were named Co-Female Athletes of the Year at the first Fighting Illini Scholar-Athlete AII-Star Banquet last May.

The banquet, attended by nearly 400 at the Assembly Hall, serves as the annual awards forum for the University of Illinois' premier student-athletes.

Guests included Chancellor Morton Weir, Dave Downey '63, Jim Grabowski '66 and more than 80 graduating student-athletes. Downey was the event's keynote speaker. Grabowski received the Division of Intercollegiate Athletic's Silver Anniversary Award.

The UI Athlete of the Year Award was first given in 1940 to Bill Hapac, who played basketball and baseball. The award was given annually until discontinued in 1973. There were no awards given until 1982, when the Big Ten began naming a Conference Athlete of the Year, in which each school nominated a male and female athlete.

Llewellyn finished his 1990-91 season with a perfect 33-0 record. He won his third consecutive Big Ten heavyweight championship at the Assembly Hall in March. A three-time All-American, Llewellyn became Illinois' first NCAA wrestling champion in 38 years when he captured the heavyweight title at the University of Iowa March 16.

Other nominees for the UI Male Athlete of the Year included football's Moe Gardner.

Sharp, a senior, earned first-team All-Big Ten honors and was named Fighting Illini basketball Most Valuable Player for the second consecutive year. She was Illinois' leading scorer with an average of 18.0 points per game and led the Big Ten in freethrow shooting at 82.5 percent. Sharp

ended her UI career fourth in scoring (1,516 points), fifth in rebounding (644 boards) and ninth in assists (231 assists).

Heiken, a sophomore, is one of the most decorated women's amateur golfers in Illinois history, winning the state amateur title twice. She is the top-ranked player in the Midwest region and ranked 37th nationally with a 76.3 strokes per round average. She won three tournaments this season, including the Big Ten championships. She placed third, individually, at the NCAA championships in May.

In the Newcomer of the Year category, freshman basketball players Deon Thomas and Mandy Cunningham were honored.

Basketball's Andy Kpedi and sophomore hurdler Tonja Buford were the winners of the Fighting Illini Spirit Awards.

Awards were voted on by the DIA coaching staff.

The evening also included the awarding of the Big Ten Conference Medal of Honor to seniors Lynn Devers (gymnastics) and Aaron Mobarak (track and field).

Outstanding Scholar Awards were given to the male and female student-athlete in each class with the highest grade point average, including sophomore football player Walter Stanwood, who carries a 4.85 gradepoint averager in pre-med.

The women's cross country team and the men's tennis team were named the school's Outstanding Team Scholars. The women's cross country team, under the direction of head coach Mary Beth Spencer Dyson, carried a cumulative grade point average of 4.15. The men's tennis team coached by Neil Adams, posted a cumulative grade point average of 3.96.

The 1992 UI Scholar-Athlete All-Star Banquet is tentatively set for May 7 at the Assembly Hall.

Press Box

Entrance to Press Box — Enter the press box via the press elevator located midway at the base of the west side of Memorial Stadium (press box side of the field). The elevator will go to all levels of the press box. Credentials which are not mailed may be picked up at the "Press Will Call" window at the midpoint of the west side of the stadium, not at the press door. No parking passes will be left at the "Press Will Call" window. Persons picking up credentials will be required to furnish positive identification. All credentials are non-transferable.

Press Box Levels — There are three levels in the Memorial Stadium Press Box: 1) Working Press Deck (print media); 2) Photo Deck (photographers, home/visiting radio & TV networks); and 3) Special Guests Booths (also includes booths for home/visiting coaching staffs).

Working Press Deck (level 1) — This level is reserved for print media, non-originating radio and TV reporters, and Sports Information personnel only. Non-workers will not be seated in this or any other area of the press box. Several charge-a-call telephones are located on this level. If you have concerns about meeting tight deadlines, we strongly encourage you to order your own telephone (see Telephones section).

Photo Deck (level 2) — This deck offers a spacious area for all broadcast video photographers who are covering the game. This area also will be used for video-taping by each of the coaching staffs. Additionally, the photo deck includes booth space for home and visiting radio and TV networks. This level also contains the food service area for the press box.

Special Guests (level 3) — This level contains individual booths for the University of Illinois' special guests, as well as separate booths for home and visiting coaching staffs.

Sidelines

The University of Illinois follows NCAA and Big Ten rules regarding media representatives on the sidelines. Photographers are not permitted to shoot between the 25yard lines and they must wear both a sideline credential and a photo armband at all times. Violators of the policy will be escorted from the stadium.

Credentials

Press Box — All members of the media covering the game in a working capacity must secure appropriate credentials in advance from Mike Pearson, Ul Sports Information Director. We would appreciate receiving these requests at least two weeks before the date of the game. Requests for working space in the press box, sideline photo passes and parking passes must be made on your affiliation's letterhead stationery. In the event of heavy demand for credentials for a particular game, requests will be prioritized according to published circulation numbers. Be specific when requesting the type of credential needed. Spouses, dates, non-workers, and children will not be permitted in the press box. Media agencies violating this policy will not be issued credentials for future games. The press box is open to the media three hours prior to kickoff.

Sideline Credentials — Photographers with game-day sideline credentials must enter through the press box entrance on the west side of Memorial Stadium. To secure an armband, photographers must go through the west Great Hall into the stadium, down the steps, onto the playing field, and proceed directly to the Photo Lounge located under the south stands. Your game credential alone will not gain admittance to the sidelines. You must have a game armband! Refreshments are available for photographers in the Photo Lounge before each game and at halftime.

Road-Game Credentials — Media credential requests for Fighting Illini road games should be addressed to the Sports Information Director of the host institution. Be specific when requesting the type of credential needed. Opponent SID telephone numbers are listed in the "Opponents" section of this media guide.

Parking

Media parking is located across First Street, just west of Memorial Stadium. Parking credentials should be requested at the same time game-day working credentials are requested. If time permits (at least five working days), both credentials will be mailed. Those who request parking passes the week of the game must pick them up by no later than 5 p.m. Friday at the UI Sports Information Office (115 Assembly Hall).

Hotel Rooms

The Sports Information Office has a limited number of rooms reserved in the Champaign-Urbana area. Please contact SID secretary Janice Revell at least one week in advance to reserve accomodations.

Pregame and Postgame Services

Play-by-play, halftime and complete final statistics, quote sheets, and pregame and postgame notes are all regular services on game day.

Postgame — Coach John Mackovic and selected Ul players will be available approximately 10-15 minutes after the conclusion of the game, and will be brought to the interview room (located on the ground floor of the football facility in the northeast corner of Memorial Stadium). A member of the UI SID staff will escort media members to the Illinois interview area and will leave the press box with approximately three minutes remaining in the game. Those interested in audio-taping grouped interviews should connect their recorders to the distribution amplifier provided. Output from the device is microphone level, terminated in 1/8" two-conductor plugs and jacks, or three-pin standard microphone male connectors.

The visiting SID will lead media down to the visitor's interview area, located on the patio level of the northwest corner of the stadium.

Telephones

Telephone lines in the press box must be ordered at least one week in advance of the game(s) for which they are ' needed. The orders should be addressed to Tony Mangano of Illinois Bell (312/727-5194, during regular business hours). No telephone lines or instruments are available through the UI Sports Information Office. Several charge-a-call phones are located on the Working Press Deck (level 1). In addition, a pay telephone is located on the second level of the press box.

Coach Mackovic Interviews

The best time to interview UI Coach John Mackovic is each Tuesday during the season at his weekly press huncheon (Memorial Stadium Varsity Room, 11:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m.). He is available on the Big Ten teleconference call from 12:10-12:20 p.m., central time (see Big Ten Teleconferences for more information).

This year, for the first time, the Sports Information office will arrange a teleconference call on Tuesdays before each of the non-conference games. If you are unable to attend the Tuesday press luncheons or participate in the three non-conference special teleconferences, a major portion of Coach Mackovic's presentation will be replayed on tape Tuesday afternoon at 3 p.m. CT. For further information or instructions, call Sports Information at 217/333-1391.

Please coordinate all telephone interviews for Coach Mackovic through the Ul Sports Information office. He is also available for brief comments at the conclusion of daily practice sessions (Monday through Thursday). Requests must be made at least one day in advance.

Media Procedures for Interviews with University of Illinois Coaches, Athletes and Administrators

To facilitate the schedules of Division of Intercollegiate Athletics' (DIA) coaches and administrators and to expedite media requests, the University of Illinois Sports Information Office encourages media personnel to arrange interview requests through the Sports Information staff. Whenever circumstances prevent media personnel the time or opportunity to follow this procedure, DIA coaches and administrators are encouraged to accomodate media requests. Coaches and administrators have the flexibility to establish and maintain relationships with media that accomodate their respective schedules. This interview procedure is designed to enhance the availability of DIA staff members to answer questions from the media at a time which best facilitates each individual's schedule. Telephone calls to the homes of DIA staff members from the media may be made upon consent of the individual coach or staff member.

Interview requests from the media for University of Illinois student-athletes should be arranged through the Sports Information Office. Media personnel are asked not to call the student-athlete at his residence.

In most situations, the most convenient opportunity for media interviews is following the team practice sessions. If this is not a convenient time for the media, return telephone calls from the athletes to the media will be arranged. The student-athletes' academic endeavors are of the utmost importance, and they will not be asked to miss classes for purposes of a media interview. In most situations, student-athletes are not available on the day of scheduled intercollegiate competition until after the event is completed.

UI football players will be available for interviews on Mondays and Tuesdays only, either after practice or by telephone. Monday and Tuesday evenings are reserved for phone interviews with out-of-town media. A note will be left on the player's locker, asking him to return your call. Selected players will be brought to the weekly press luncheon each Tuesday. Media are encouraged to make specific requests.

Players have been instructed not to talk to media who haven't coordinated their requests through Sports Information. The team lockerroom and training room are off limits to media personnel.

Media Luncheons

All media personnel who regularly cover Illinois football are invited to these weekly, usually held at the Ray Eliot Varsity Room in the southeast corner of Memorial Stadium every Tuesday during the football season. Parking is available in the Assembly Hall parking lot in the northeast quadrant (entering off Fourth Street). Please do not park in the Varsity Room lot as it is a rented lot for other DIA employees. Your vehicle could be ticketed if you choose to park at the Varsity Room lot. Coach Mackovic and selected players will be available for interviews, as will opposing coaches (by telephone). The luncheons get underway at 11 a.m. with the start of the Big Ten Coaches Teleconference, and will normally conclude by 1 p.m. The first Illinois football media luncheon of 1991 will be August 27. Luncheons will not be held during weeks when Fighting Illini games are not scheduled.

Big Ten Teleconferences

These take place each Tuesday, starting September 3, and begin at 11 a.m. central time. Portions of these teleconferences will be heard (starting at 11 a.m.) at UI's Tuesday press luncheons. Full replays of the teleconferences will be played starting each Tuesday at 4 p.m. CT. Coach Mackovic's 10-minute slot on the teleconference is scheduled to begin at 12:10 p.m. CT. Please conference the UI Sports Information Office or the Big Ten Communications Office (708/605-0110) for teleconference access information.

Big Ten Satellite Uplink

The Big Ten will provide a 30-minute video highlight service via satellite uplink. Television stations can preview the coming week's Big Ten games each Thursday. For satellite coordinates or more information, please contact either the Big Ten Communications Office (708/605-0110) or the UI Sports Information Office.

Computer Services

Newspapers in the state of Illinois and around the country may receive Fighting Illini football newsletters on Sunday evening via telephone modem directly into their computer systems. John Mackovic TV Show

This weekly 30-minute television program features game highlights and interviews with coaches, players and others involved in the Illinois football program. Viewers should consult their local listings for the days and times of the telecasts, which are tentatively scheduled to be carried on WCIA, Ch. 3, Champaign, and other stations.

The Illini Today and Illini Legends are weekday radio vignettes which can be heard on some Illini Sports Network stations (see station list for Live Play-by-Play). The Illini Today program features interesting tidbits about football and other University of Illinois athletic events.
