

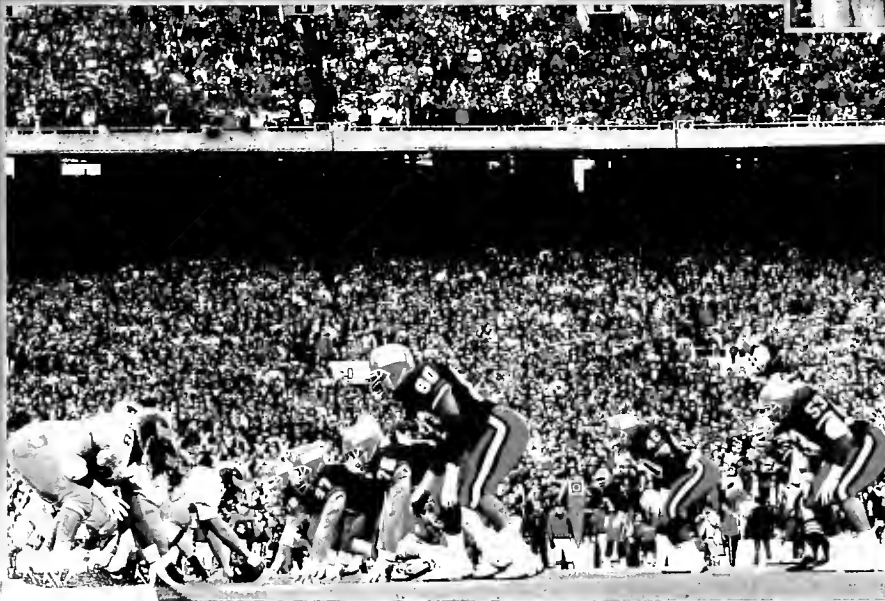
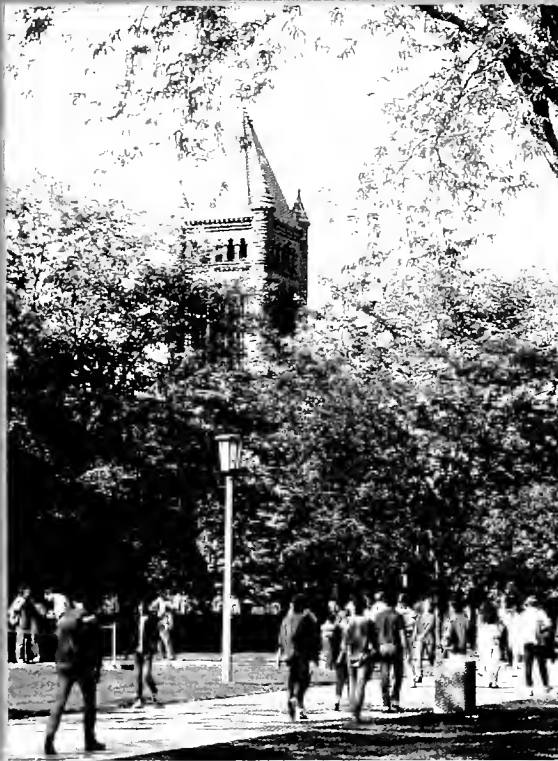
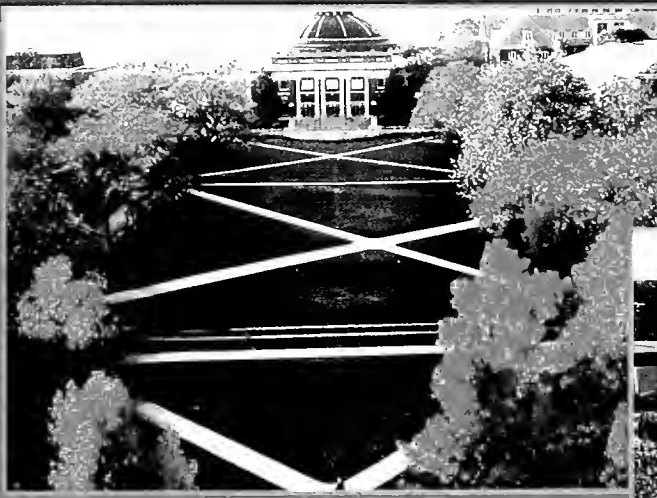

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ACTIVITY AT A GLANCE



Since its founding in 1867, the University of Illinois has been teaching students to transfer advanced knowledge to a new generation.

Every day across the state, people are in touch with the University of Illinois. In the public schools, students and teachers are sharing science information on the College of Education's computerized Science Network; professional engineers are studying advanced techniques through satellite and videotaped instruction offered by the College of Engineering; police officers and fire fighters are putting into practice the skills they learned at the University's Police Training and Fire Service institutes; and legislators and business executives are consulting University experts on issues ranging from consumer safety to capital expansion.

Too often we limit our understanding of the University to "four years in college." Acquiring knowledge is a lifelong process, and much of the teaching and learning takes place off campus. Through the Cooperative Extension Service, for example, the University manages programs in agriculture, urban and rural revitalization, youth development, and more — taking knowledge into homes and work places throughout the state and serving an estimated

700,000 citizens annually. Through the Office of Continuing Education and Public Service, the University offers regular academic courses off campus and via correspondence, and maintains professional development programs with business and industry, social agencies, schools, professional societies, and government officials.

Along with teaching and public service, the University of Illinois focuses on research. Here the traditional sciences and humanities contribute both new discoveries and new interpretations of existing knowledge. One stunning research breakthrough occasionally leads to other discoveries, such as when the theory of superconductivity and the discovery of transistors led to magnetic resonance imaging — technologies pioneered by University professors and now used widely for medical diagnoses and an array of other practical applications. More often the research contributes pieces to a larger puzzle. One answer opens the door to new questions, and less dramatic discoveries accrue over a period of time. A five-year comprehensive study in the 1980s, for example, collected an

enormous amount of detailed data from Soviet émigrés about the Soviet Union; the information is expected to yield results well into the 1990s. As another example, the countless small research advances at the University's College of Agriculture helped place the United States among the world's leading food exporters.

Where it is possible campus facilities serve both academic and public uses. The Krannert Center for the Performing Arts, used for teaching courses in music, theater, and dance, offers more than 300 public performances annually of both student-produced work and national and international artists. The Krannert Art Museum and World Heritage Museum, teaching laboratories for students studying such areas as art and classics, are also open to the public. The University's Willard Airport complex houses the Institute of Aviation and offers air connections from central Illinois to locations throughout the country. And facilities such as residence halls and sports arenas find off-season uses hosting conferences, high

school marching bands, and civic events.

Central to all of the University's work is the Library, a prized campus resource and one of the best library systems in the world. Its size of more than 14 million items and ready access to holdings through the computerized catalog attract scholars from all over the world. Several dozen specialized collections offer students and professors in-depth research support and contain a number of items that are simply not available elsewhere. Only Harvard and Yale have larger collections.

Taken together, the professors and students at the University of Illinois are an impressive knowledge resource. Undergraduates bring fresh perspectives the University as they begin looking at facts and exploring possibilities. About 26,000 highly qualified students enroll in 10 colleges at Illinois. The divisions include the College of Agriculture, College of Applied Life Studies, College of Commerce and Business Administration, College of Communications, College of Education, College of Engineering, College of Fine and Applied Arts, College of Liberal Arts and Sciences, Institute of Aviation and School of Social Work. In a recent freshman class, students in the middle 50 percent had ACT scores between 24 and 28. In addition to their own in-depth studies, graduate students often help teach and advise undergraduates on their concerns, even as they work with more established researchers to deepen their own knowledge. And professors at Illinois, among the most respected scholars in the world, bring the results of their ongoing research into the classroom and make their results known to a wide audience through consulting, lectures, and publishing. A measure of the Illinois faculty's excellence is the number of professors honored by prestigious institutions. More than 70 faculty members belong to the American

Academy of Arts and Sciences, the National Academy of Science, or the National Academy of Engineering. Fifty-six faculty members have received the Presidential Young Investigators Award. Together the students and professors participate in the ancient exercise of transferring knowledge — and at a world-class university like Illinois, they're helping to define the boundaries of knowledge itself.

Since its founding in 1867, the University of Illinois has been teaching students to transfer advanced knowledge to a new generation:

undertaking research to explore the outer edges of human knowledge; and performing public service so that everyone enjoys the results of current scholarship and new discoveries. Over the years, an enormous number of people have played some part in the University of Illinois. That would please the educational and political leaders of the last century, who envisioned a new kind of university founded on the democratic principle that everyone should benefit from access to higher education and from the University's resources.

The University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign has earned a reputation as an institution of international stature. Its distinguished faculty, outstanding resources, breadth of academic programs and research disciplines, and large and diverse student body constitute an educational community ideally suited for scholarship and research.

A major center for the arts, the campus attracts dozens of nationally and internationally renowned artists each year to its widely acclaimed Krannert Center for the Performing Arts. Designed by alumnus Max Abramovitz, and architect of New York City's Lincoln Center, the facility has four indoor theaters and an outdoor amphitheater. Together, they host more than 300 performances each year, including those by major symphony orchestras, classical and modern ballet companies and individual artists, such as Luciano Pavarotti, Jean-Pierre Rampal and Isaac Stern.

The University also supports three major museums: the Krannert Museum, second only to the Art Institute of Chicago among Illinois Public art museums; the World Heritage Museum; and the Museum of Natural History.

Located in east-central Illinois in the two cities of Urbana and Champaign (population 110,000), the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign is the state of Illinois' flagship public university.

PRESIDENT STANLEY O. IKENBERRY



Stanley O. Ikenberry was appointed President of the University of Illinois in 1979. Since then he has advanced the University's triple mission of teaching, research and public service in the pursuit of the goal of making the University of Illinois the best

public university in America. His leadership at Illinois is marked by an exceedingly strong commitment to the human resources of the University and to the humanizing value of the University for society.

Ikenberry has responsibility for all aspects of University operations, including campuses at Urbana-Champaign and Chicago, an enrollment of about 60,000 students, and an annual operating budget of more than \$1 billion.

Ikenberry received his doctorate in higher education research from Michigan State University in 1960. He taught at Michigan State and at West Virginia University before joining the Center for the Study of Higher Education at Pennsylvania State University in 1969. He had risen to senior vice president when he was named president of the University of Illinois. He holds honorary degrees from

Michigan State University, Millikin University, Illinois College and Rush University. He is also an honorary alumnus of Penn State.

A holder of numerous corporate and civic board memberships, he is past chairman of the American Council on Education, the National Association of State Universities and Land-Grant Colleges and the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching. He is a member of the executive committee of the Association of American Universities. Ikenberry led the Big Ten Presidents Council from 1987 to 1990 and is immediate past Big Ten representative to the NCAA Presidents Commission.

Ikenberry lives with his wife, Judith, in the President's House in Urbana. The Ikenberrys have three sons.

CHANCELLOR MORTON W. WEIR



Morton W. Weir became the campus' fifth chancellor in April of 1988. Weir joined the Urbana-Champaign faculty in 1960 and has served in a variety of faculty and administrative posts since then. Before assuming the leadership of the campus, Weir served as vice president for academic affairs, the senior academic officer for both U of I campuses, at Urbana-Champaign and Chicago.

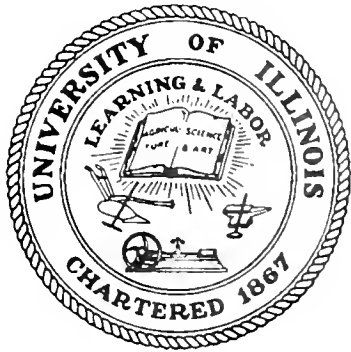
Weir is a fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science and member of the Society for Research in Child Development, Phi Kappa Phi and Sigma Xi. He has served as editor, member or commissioner for a number of professional

journals and organizations, and is past president of the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools. He currently is a member of the Board of Trustees of Knox College.

Weir received his bachelor's degree, with honors, from Knox College in Galesburg in 1955. He earned a master of arts in 1958 and a doctorate in experimental psychology in 1959, both from the University of Texas at Austin. In 1977, Knox College awarded him an honorary Doctor of Laws degree.

Weir is a native of Canton, Illinois. He and his wife, Cecelia, have three children.

The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois exercises final authority over the administration and governance of the University, within limits fixed by the Illinois Constitution and state law.

Trustees are elected statewide by the citizens of Illinois in November general elections. The nine elected members serve six-year staggered terms; three terms expire and are filled every two years. Board members serve without pay.

The governor of Illinois is an ex-officio member of the board. Two students, one from each campus, serve single-year terms; student trustee votes are advisory only. The student trustees for 1992-93 are: Craig M. Lawless (Chicago) and Mark B. Begovich (Urbana-Champaign).

The president of the board is elected annually, in January, from among the elected trustees. The current president is Thomas Lamont.

The forerunner of the Division of Intercollegiate Athletics (DIA), the University of Illinois Athletic Association, was chartered in 1892 as a not-for-profit corporation of the State of Illinois. It was charged with overseeing and conducting the University's intercollegiate athletic programs and associated support services, and operated as a separate entity.

After the state legislature voted in June, 1989 to bring UI athletics within the University proper, the DIA assumed the functions and responsibilities of the Athletic Association. The Division of Intercollegiate Athletics began operations officially July 1, 1989.

The director of athletics is the Division's chief executive officer, and reports directly to the chancellor of the Urbana-Champaign campus. The chancellor has final authority regarding the athletic program in all areas except for budget and major appointments. Those decisions rest with the University of Illinois Board of Trustees.

The Athletic Board serves the DIA in an advisory capacity. It is composed of 18 members, 15 of whom are voting members (eight faculty, four alumni, two students and one trustee); the three non-voting (ex-officio) members are from the University administration.

The faculty and student members are nominated by the Urbana-Champaign Senate and selected by the Chancellor.

DIA revenues are derived from three major sources: gate receipts from football and men's basketball; television and radio rights fees for those two sports; and donations to the Fighting Illini Scholarship Fund. With these monies, the University of Illinois over the years has been able to fully fund the NCAA maximum allowable number of scholarships for student-athletes in each of its 19 sports programs. Additionally, the

University had been able to maintain and upgrade its facilities to stay on par with the best major collegiate programs across the nation.

The DIA has just completed an \$18 million renovation project on Memorial Stadium, which began directly after the conclusion of the 1991 home football season. During the construction, workmen made structural repairs and replaced the entire concrete floors in the upper deck seating areas as well as a major portion of the lower east and west main seating areas. In addition, the ramps in the towers at the corners of the stadium were redone, existing restroom facilities were improved, and additional restrooms were added. University of Illinois Auxiliary revenue bonds paid for the project, which should ensure the structural integrity of the 69-year-old stadium for several more decades.

New artificial turf was installed on Memorial Stadium's Zuppke field in 1989. That, along with the "hubble,"

an air-supported dome which is put in place each December through March, facilitates not only bowl-game preparation and early-spring practice for the football team, but also intramural sports activities and winter baseball practice. Other recent additions to Memorial Stadium include a football training headquarters, featuring one of the nation's largest and most advanced weight-training rooms, a sports medicine area and athlete study halls.

Football is not the only athletic program receiving benefits from new and improved facilities. The most recent addition to the University of Illinois athletic physical plant is the Atkins Tennis Center, a state-of-the-art facility which includes six indoor courts and eight lighted outdoor courts, in addition to a pro shop and locker and team rooms. The tennis center opened in November of 1991.

The baseball and track teams will begin their sixth seasons next spring in their respective facilities. Illinois Field is a first rate 1,500-seat baseball facility, and is targeted for a future expansion to accommodate 5,000 fans. The nationally acclaimed track teams are primed for another year of competition in their \$2.2 million stadium, with future plans which include a press box and seating for up to 12,000 spectators.

The basketball teams play their games at the Assembly Hall, located just south of Memorial Stadium. The Assembly Hall seats more than 16,000 fans for basketball.

Huff Hall, the home of Illinois basketball from 1925-63 when it was known as Huff Gym, is in the midst of a step-by-step renewal process designed to upgrade it as a practice and/or competition site for not only volleyball, which is in its third year there, but also for wrestling, fencing, gymnastics and basketball. Eventually, many of the coaches' offices are expected to be housed at Huff Hall.

DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS RON GUENTHER

Ronald E. (Ron) Guenther, a former student-athlete and administrator at the University of Illinois, was named as the Fighting Illini's eighth Director of Athletics May 14, 1992. He replaced former AD and head football coach John Mackovic who left the UI in December of 1991 to become head football coach at the University of Texas.

Guenther proudly points to his Orange & Blue background, and says that his experiences at the UI as a student-athlete, as a coach and as an administrator underline his dedication to his alma mater.

"I am and always will be an Illini," Guenther says. "Because I've earned two degrees here, I want Illinois to have the best program with the highest degree of integrity that we can put in place. The University of Illinois should be the model for the nation."

Guenther brings a wealth and breadth of experience to the Fighting Illini athletic program.

He assumes the directorship of the DIA following nearly two years with the UI Foundation, where he served from September of 1990 through June of 1992. Guenther's title with the Foundation was Director of Major Gifts.

He was a partner with The Barofsky Association, a Chicago area investments and marketing firm from March of 1989 until he returned to the University.

From June of 1988 to March of 1989, Guenther was UI's Interim Director of Athletics for External Operations, administering the development program, public relations, promotions, tickets, merchandise and summer camps. He was responsible for negotiating Illinois' bid to the 1988 All American Bowl in Birmingham, Ala.

Guenther spent the previous three years as associate athletic director for development, coordinating UI's Campaign for Excellence in Athletics. That campaign provided the impetus towards upgrading the University's athletic plant for the first time in nearly 60 years. Among the facilities that were targeted and ultimately completed were stadia for baseball and track and field, the Atkins Tennis Center, plus construction of the current football office/training complex. Guenther was instrumental in soliciting gift commitments totaling \$15 million.

From May of 1983 to June of 1985, he served as Illinois' assistant athletic director for Chicago operations. Among his achievements were the creation of the annual state-wide caravan for promotion and public relations, and the



tripling of the number of donors to the Fighting Illini athletic program.

Guenther spent eight years at North Central College in Naperville, Ill., including a stint from 1975-79 as director of admissions and also as associate head football coach. From 1979-83, he served as NCC's vice president of development and public affairs. Guenther helped design and implement NCC's successful \$15 million Capital Campaign. As associate head football coach, he helped the Cardinals compile a record of 23-12-2, including the school's first winning season in 15 years.

Before moving to North Central College, Guenther coached at Boston College from 1971-74, developing nine National Football League players during his tenure as offensive line coach.

From 1968-71, he was a teacher and coach in football, wrestling and track for the Evanston Township and Glenbard High School systems in suburban Chicago.

At Illinois, under Head Coach Pete Elliott, Guenther was an all-star offensive guard for the Fighting Illini football team. Among the honors he won during his senior season in 1966 were team Most Valuable Player honors, second-team All-Big Ten laurels, Academic All-Big Ten honors, and the George Huff Award for academic proficiency at the UI. Guenther was also selected as the University's outstanding senior in physical education.

Guenther, born October 3, 1945, earned two degrees from the University of Illinois, a bachelor of science degree in physical education in 1967 and a master of science degree in administration in 1968.

Tepper, assistant head coach under John Mackovic since July, 1990, initially came to UI in 1988 from the University of Colorado. He first served as Mackovic's defensive coordinator before adding the duties of assistant head coach. Tepper coached Fighting Illini inside linebackers the last four years, including three-time

first-team All-Big Ten selection Darrick Brownlow (1988-90) and current star Dana Howard, a second-team all-conference pick this past season.

"My career goal has been to direct a successful major college football program at a prestigious academic institution," Tepper said. "I have been patient and have declined several excellent opportunities because of my desire to make Champaign-Urbana my long-term home. It is my intent to bring the state of Illinois a program which is based on character, academic achievement and enthusiasm."

Tepper has spent 17 of his 24 coaching seasons in the role of defensive coordinator, and was named by *The Sporting News* as the

Lou Teppar, who has engineered one of the Big Ten's best defenses the past four seasons, begins his first full season as head football coach at the University of Illinois.

He directed the Fighting Illini for the very first time in the John Hancock Bowl Dec. 31, losing a hard-fought 6-3 decision to the 22nd-ranked UCLA Bruins.

Tepper became the first on-staff Illinois assistant coach to move into the head coaching position since Ray Eliot took over for Bob Zuppke in 1942. Eliot served as head coach from 1942 to 1959 after serving as assistant coach from 1937-41, compiling an 83-73-11 record and leading Illinois to three Big Ten championships and two Rose Bowl victories.

"I am delighted that we have been able to move so quickly with the appointment of Lou Teppar as head football coach at the University of Illinois," said Chancellor Morton Weir at the Dec. 13, 1991 press conference. "He is a man of integrity, with a strong orientation toward the academic success of student-athletes. I am confident that he will move the program forward, and the philosophy developed over the past four years will flourish under his leadership."

top defensive assistant coach in the Big Ten in 1990. In his first season with the Fighting Illini in 1988, Illinois finished third in the Big Ten and 28th in the NCAA in total defense. In 1989, Illinois ranked first in the Big Ten and No. 10 in the nation in total defense.

The Keystone, Pa., native began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Pittsburgh in 1967. The following year he moved to New Hampshire where he coached under Jim Root, who was chosen National

Coach of the Year during Teppner's tenure. Teppner worked with running backs and linebackers at various times during his four years at New Hampshire. In 1972, he accepted Root's offer as the defensive coordinator at William & Mary, where he coached for six years. The 1976 William & Mary team posted the school's best record in 30 years.

In 1978, Bill Dooley lured him to Virginia Tech to coach the linebackers. Teppner helped build the team into a consistent Bowl contender with a defense that frequently ranked among the nation's top 10.

Teppner coached at Virginia Tech until 1983 when he joined Bill McCartney's staff at Colorado. He remained in Boulder until joining the Illinois staff in 1988. Teppner led the Buffalo defense—ranked No. 100, nationally, in yards allowed prior to his arrival to No. 11 in the nation in total

defense. He earned the title of assistant head coach to McCartney his final two seasons at CU.

Teppner is a member of the American Football Coaches Association and also was recently chosen to serve on the prestigious NCAA Ethics Committee.

He earned degrees in physical education and in English from Rutgers College in 1967. A two-year letterman at Rutgers as a defensive back, Teppner led the team in interceptions as a junior, and in total tackles his senior season. He won the George Cronin Trophy as Rutgers' Most Improved Player in 1965.

Born Sept. 7, 1945, Teppner is an active speaker for the Fellowship of Christian Athletes. He and his wife, Karen, have two children, Matthew and Stacy Ann. They reside in Champaign.

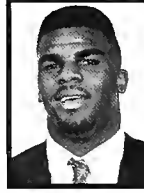

DENNY MARCIN

Defensive Coordinator/Defensive Line Coach
(Miami of Ohio '64)



Denny Marcin joined the Illinois football staff in February of 1988, and enters his fifth season as coach of the defensive linemen. He begins his initial campaign as defensive coordinator, succeeding current head coach Lou Tepper.

Marcin started his coaching profession in 1964 and served as defensive coordinator at North Carolina from 1978-1988, after which he also added the duties of assistant head coach. During his 10 years at North Carolina, the Tar Heels had 24 defensive players move on to the National Football League, including one of Marcin's players, All-Pro linebacker Lawrence Taylor of the New York Giants. At the end of the 1981 season, North Carolina was ranked No. 1 in the nation in total defense.

Prior to his 10-year stay at North Carolina, Marcin was an assistant coach at Miami of Ohio from 1974-77. He served as defensive coordinator in 1977, and departed for North Carolina in 1978.

A 1964 graduate of Miami, Marcin earned a bachelor of science degree in education. He was a member of the Redskins football team, playing on both the offensive and defensive lines. Marcin has also served as a wrestling official at the high school, college and professional levels.

Marcin was instrumental in the development of two former Illinois players who are now in the NFL—Mel Agee, an All-Big Ten performer now with the Indianapolis Colts, and All-America nose tackle Moe Gardner, now with the Atlanta Falcons.

Marcin is a native of Cleveland, Ohio. He and his wife, Betsey, have four children, Jeff, Denny, Melinda and Susie, and reside in Champaign.

TOM BECK

Offensive Coordinator/Quarterbacks Coach
(Northern Illinois '62)



Tom Beck joined Head Coach Lou Tepper's inaugural staff at Illinois in January of 1992. Most recently, Beck commanded a Notre Dame offense which, in 1991, averaged 455.5 yards per game and helped the Fighting Irish to a 10-3 record and a 1992 Sugar Bowl victory.

Prior to his time at Notre Dame, Beck served as a collegiate head coach at three institutions. He took over three losing football programs and immediately turned them into winners. Grand Valley State University in Michigan was 0-10 the season before he arrived. Beck's six teams at GVSU all produced winning records, compiling a 50-18 in his six seasons. He was selected Kodak NCAA Midwest Region Coach of the Year in 1989 when the Lakers went 11-1, and again in 1990 following Grand Valley's 10-2 campaign.

Illinois Benedictine had endured 18 consecutive losing seasons prior to Beck's arrival. During his tenure there, the Eagles went 37-12-1. The football fortunes weren't much better at Elmhurst. The Blue Jays had produced just two winning seasons in the previous 23, but Beck managed to guide them to a 50-22 mark during his tenure.

Beck's career record as a head football coach at the collegiate level is 137-52-1 for a winning percentage of .723, which was third-best among NCAA Division II coaches in 1990 when he moved to Notre Dame.

Beck has also coached at the professional level, spending the 1984 season as offensive backfield coach of the United States Football League's Chicago Blitz.

A Chicago native and a former high school coach at West Leyden High School in North Lake, Ill. and Lake Zurich (Ill.) High School, Beck was the last football player at Northern Illinois University to play both offense (quarterback, halfback) and defense (defensive back). As a senior in 1961, he captained the Huskies (ranked No. 4 nationally in passing), and was named second-team NAIA Little All-America and Academic All-America. He received both his bachelor's and master's degrees from NIU, and served as offensive coordinator for his alma mater in 1975.

Beck and his wife, Joyce, are the parents of two daughters, Kelly and Laura.

Greg Colby, the only University of Illinois graduate on the football staff, starts his fifth year as a Fighting Illini coach.

Colby was a starter for the Illinois football team at the rover position as a sophomore in 1971, finishing as the team's third-leading

tackler. In addition to earning three letters in football, Colby was also a standout on the Illinois baseball team, leading the team in RBI for two years, and serving as captain his senior season.

Following his 1975 graduation from Illinois in physical education, Colby spent two seasons on the Fighting Illini football staff as a graduate assistant. In 1979, he was named head coach at Danville's Schlarman High School and led the Hilltoppers to Class 2A state championships in 1980 and 1981. Following a four-year stint as head coach at Naperville Central High School (where he never had a losing season), Colby served as a graduate assistant at Michigan State for two years, including the Spartans' 1987 Big Ten and Rose Bowl championship season.

Colby is a native of Danville, Ill., where he was a multi-sport athlete, earning honors in football and baseball. He and his wife Janet have two children, Matthew and Michael, and reside in Urbana.

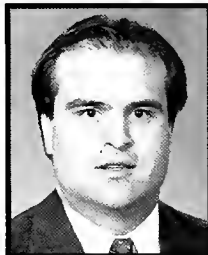

CHRIS COSH

Inside Linebackers Coach
(Virginia Tech '82)



Chris Cosh brings a variety of football experiences to Illinois, even at the young age of 32. A linebacker at Virginia Tech under Lou Tepper, Cosh earned the nickname "Crash" for his intense style of play; he led his team in tackles as a junior. When a recurring neck injury ended his playing

career prematurely, Cosh wasted no time in embarking on his coaching career, becoming a student coach under Tepper his senior year.

After graduating from Virginia Tech, Cosh returned to his high school alma mater, Bishop McNamara in Hillcrest Heights, Md., and led the team to the Metro Conference title with a 10-1 record. It was just four years earlier that Cosh had been selected the Washington, D.C. Metro High School Player of the Year at Bishop McNamara.

While working on his master's degree, Cosh served as a graduate assistant coach at Virginia Tech in 1983 and at Minnesota in 1984.

Cosh spent four seasons, 1985-88, as the defensive coordinator at Wisconsin-Oshkosh. During his tenure there he developed three NAIA defensive All-America players. From UW-Oshkosh, he went on to Southeast Missouri State University as the defensive coordinator, then to the University of Nevada at Las Vegas where he served as the linebacker coach, and finally returned to Minnesota in 1991.

Cosh and his wife, Mary, have a three-year-old son, J.J., and an infant son, Billy. The family lives in Champaign.

Mike Deal enters his fourth season at Illinois as offensive line coach. He came to Illinois after a three-year tour of duty at Kansas State, where he spent his final season as offensive coordinator and offensive line coach. It was a profitable year for both KSU and for Deal, as the Wildcats led the

Big Eight in passing in 1988. Prior to his stint at Kansas State, Deal served as defensive coordinator and secondary coach at Marshall University for two seasons.

Deal began his collegiate coaching career in 1978 at Wabash (Ind.) College where he served as offensive coordinator for five years. During that time, Wabash posted a 42-3-1 record, which included two undefeated seasons. He also spent a season as defensive backfield coach at Davidson (N.C.) College.

Deal was a three-year letterman as a defensive back for Indiana from 1967-69. He participated in the Hoosiers' Rose Bowl win following their 1967 Big Ten championship and also played in the Blue-Gray All-Star game and Senior Bowl at the conclusion of his senior year. He received his bachelor's degree in physical education in 1970, and the following year earned his master's degree in the same field. He played briefly with the Washington Redskins in the early 1970s.

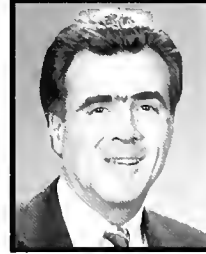

DAN MARTIN

Defensive Backs Coach
(Denver '73)



Dan Martin's ties with Illinois mentor Lou Tepper date back to 1985-86 when Martin was graduate assistant under then-defensive coordinator Tepper on Bill McCartney's Colorado staff. It was there Martin learned the Tepper defensive scheme that has been so successful.

Martin, 41, most recently coached defensive backs at Western Illinois University (1987-91). The 1991 Leatherneck secondary ranked fifth among NCAA Division I-AA teams, yielding only 122 passing yards per game. The overall WIU defense permitted just 266 yards per game, and was ranked No. 6. Martin coached two current NFL players when he was at Western Illinois, All-America strong safety Bryan Cox, now with the Miami Dolphins, and free safety Lamar McGriggs of the New York Giants.

Martin began his coaching career in the prep ranks as an assistant at Northglenn (Colo.) High School. He became the head coach at Thompson Valley High School in Loveland, Colo. in 1976, before returning to Northglenn as an assistant in 1978. Martin joined the NAIA college ranks in 1980 when he became the defensive coordinator at Mesa College (Colo.); he received a master's degree in education at Colorado State the same year. In 1981, he made his third stop at Northglenn High School, this time as the defensive coordinator. Northglenn participated in the Class 4A state playoffs each of the four seasons Martin guided the defense (1981-84), with the '84 club winning the state title.

Martin and his wife, Donna, reside in Champaign with their two children, Danette and Danny.

The 32-year-old McMahon grew up in nearby Rantoul, Ill., and graduated from Eastern Illinois University, where he played free safety from 1978-81, and earned his bachelor's degree in

psychology. During his five seasons at EIU, the Panthers played for the NCAA Division I-AA championship in 1978 and 1980, and made the national playoffs four times. In 1982, McMahon served as a student assistant coach for the defensive backs at Eastern and helped his team advance to the national semifinals.

During 1983-84, McMahon was a graduate assistant coach at the University of Minnesota, serving with current UI inside linebackers coach Chris Cosh. McMahon served in his first full-time coaching capacity from 1985-87 with the receivers and tight ends at the University of North Alabama, where he also earned his master's degree in education. In 1988, he assumed similar duties at Southern Illinois University. Then in 1989, McMahon became defensive backs coach at Valdosta State University (Georgia), coaching one season for the Blazers.

In 1990, McMahon, known for his outstanding recruiting abilities, headed for Nevada-Las Vegas, where he coached offensive tackles and tight ends for two years prior to taking his current position on the Fighting Illini football coaching staff.

SHERMAN SMITH

Tight Ends Coach
(Miami of Ohio '76)



Sherman Smith joined the Fighting Illini football coaching staff in March, 1992, four weeks before the start of spring drills. The 37-year-old Smith, an all-star player for Miami University (Ohio) and with the NFL Seattle Seahawks, came to Illinois after coaching the running backs the past

two seasons at his alma mater.

At 6-foot-4-inches and 230 pounds, Smith was Seattle's first true running threat, leading the Seahawks in rushing in each of its first four seasons in the NFL. He finished his career as Seattle's all-time leading rusher with 3,429 yards and ranked third on the receptions list with 211 for 2,342 yards. Smith also ranked second on the Seahawks' career touchdowns list (38) and third in scoring (288 points).

Smith lettered four seasons (1972-75) at Miami as a quarterback, serving as the starting quarterback his last three years. He led the Redskins to three Mid-American Conference championships and a 33-1-1 record in his last three seasons. Smith's individual statistics as a collegian showed him gaining 2,393 yards on the ground and 1,013 through the air.

Smith was drafted as a wide receiver in the second round by the Seahawks in the 1976 NFL draft, staying with the club through the 1982 season. He played for the San Diego Chargers in 1983 and 1984.

Following his NFL career, Smith worked for six years as an aerobics instructor in Bellevue, Wash., as well as serving as assistant football coach at Redmond (Wash.) High School, and head track and basketball coach at Redmond Junior High during that same span.

A native of Youngstown, Ohio, Smith earned an undergraduate degree in physical education from Miami in 1976 and has earned 115 hours toward a graduate degree. Smith's family includes his wife, Sharon, and two children, Shavonne and Sherman.

LENNY WILLIS

Running Backs Coach
(Ohio State '85)



Lenny Willis joined the Illinois football staff in January of 1992, after serving for five months as assistant to the director of the U of I Office of Minority Student Affairs. Prior to coming to Illinois, Willis served on three different college football staffs coaching running backs.

Willis, 38, served under Earle Bruce at both Ohio State and at Colorado State. In between those two stints with Bruce, he coached the running backs at Boston College from 1988-90.

Prior to becoming a coach, Willis enjoyed great success as a player. A prep star at Theodore Roosevelt High School in Washington, D.C., he first played football at Fairbury (Neb.) Junior College in 1972-73, where he earned junior college All-America acclaim as one of the nation's leading return specialists. From there, he went to Woody Hayes' Buckeyes, where he was a two-year starter at wide receiver and played in two Rose Bowl games. Willis also participated on the OSU track squad, earning All-Big Ten honors as a sprinter.

Willis was then drafted by the NFL's Minnesota Vikings as a wide receiver and return specialist, playing in 1976 and 1977, including the 1977 Super Bowl. He also played professional football for the Buffalo Bills from 1977-81, and later with the USFL's Chicago Blitz (1982-83) and the Arizona Wranglers (1983). Willis earned All-Pro return honors with the Blitz.

A 1985 graduate of Ohio State, Willis earned a bachelor's degree in education. His wife, Arlette, is a professor of curriculum and instruction with the UI's College of Education. Their family includes sons Lenny, Justin and Jacob.

William Cleaver begins his second season with the Fighting Illini coaching staff as a graduate assistant coach. Cleaver works with Defensive Coordinator Denny Marcin concentrating on the defensive line and the scout team offense. Cleaver also prepares defensive scouting reports, breaks down game film, and assists in recruiting. He will earn a master's degree in athletic administration in December.

A 1990 graduate of Taylor University (Upland, Ind.) with a B.S. in physical education, Cleaver earned four letters in football. He was a two-time first-team Academic All-America selection and first-team all-district linebacker, serving as team captain as a senior.

Prior to joining the Fighting Illini coaching staff, Cleaver was assistant football coach and head baseball coach at Collins High School in Chicago, where he worked with quarterbacks, defensive backs, and special teams. His summer camp experience includes the Illinois and Notre Dame football camps.

Cleaver resides in Champaign.

RYAN MIHALKO

Graduate Assistant
(University of Notre Dame '91)



Ryan Mihalko joins the Fighting Illini football staff this fall as a graduate assistant coach. He will work with Offensive Coordinator Tom Beck in coaching and recruiting all offensive positions.

A native of New Hampshire, Mihalko comes to Champaign as a graduate of the University of Notre Dame. He earned a B.A. in psychology from Notre Dame in May, 1991 and was an MBA student last year while completing his final season of eligibility with the Fighting Irish.

Mihalko was a four-year letterman at fullback for Notre Dame, where he was primarily known for his blocking and special teams ability. He was also a member of the Irish track team, captaining the team last spring and setting the school record in the javelin (222-feet-8-inches).

A high school graduate of Pinkerton Academy, Mihalko was the first member of his school to earn a Division I scholarship in any sport.

Constructed in 1923, Memorial Stadium, home of the "Fighting Illini" football team, was built as a memorial to Illinois men who gave their lives for their country during World War I. The men's names appear on 200 columns that support the east and west sides of the stadium.

Donations of approximately \$1.7 million made by more than 200,000 students, alumni and other friends of the University, made the construction possible. The Athletic Association (now known as the Division of Athletics) later allocated \$509,805 to the project for the construction of the south stands and other stadium additions.

The stadium opened November 3, 1923, when Illinois defeated Chicago, 7-0, in a Homecoming victory. The

stadium was dedicated officially October 18, 1924, a day that Illinois not only defeated Michigan, 39-14, for a Homecoming victory, but Harold "Red" Grange accounted for six touchdowns in what remains as the single greatest performance in Memorial Stadium history. In the first 12 minutes of that game, Grange ran for a total of 265 yards and scored four times. He had his hands on the ball only six times and left the field before the end of the first quarter.

In the third quarter, Grange returned and ran 13 yards for his fifth touchdown, and in the final period he passed to Marion Leonard for his sixth score of the day. In 42 minutes of playing time, Grange gained a total of 402 yards, carried the ball 21 times and also completed

six passes for 64 yards. Legendary coach Amos Alonzo Stagg called it "the most spectacular single-handed performance ever delivered in a major game."

Permanent seating capacity of Memorial Stadium is 66,457, but capacity is currently 69,000 including the bleachers at the north end of the playing field. During the 1980s, Memorial Stadium saw 27 consecutive sell-outs. The single-game attendance record is 78,297 for a 1984 victory over Missouri.

Approximately 71 percent of Memorial Stadium seats are between the goal posts with 18,000 in each stand, 10,000 in each balcony and 12,246 in the south stand horseshoe.

Installation of the first artificial turf and a new lighting system was made

possible through a 1974 Golden Anniversary campaign drive. The lights have made games and practices, as well as intramural competition possible after sunset. Even though the field is lit only from the towers on the four corners of Memorial Stadium, the light intensity is easily sufficient for major network telecasts of night games.

Other stadium improvements include the 1967 installation of a press box, located at the top of the west balcony; construction of the Ray Eliot

Varsity Room, a training table and trophy display area at the southeast corner of the stadium that was built with funds donated by friends of the Athletic Association; a million-dollar stadium renovation project in 1972, which included the addition of aluminum seating and other improvements; a 1977 renovation of the varsity locker rooms and trainer facilities; and a computerized message board installed in 1981 at the north end of the stadium.

In April 1985, \$7 million worth of

improvements began. Out of this project came installation of new artificial turf and expansion of the football headquarters in the northeast corner of the stadium. The current artificial surface has the largest vertical drainage system of any synthetic surface in the United States, and is the largest collegiate synthetic playing surface in the nation. The portion of it between the goal lines was replaced in the fall of 1989 after vandals burned a 40-yard swath in the middle of the field in the early-morning hours of Sept. 24. Employees from AstroTurf Industries began removing the destroyed pad and turf on the 26th, and worked around the clock to install a new surface in time for Illinois' scheduled Oct. 7 game against Ohio State.

Memorial Stadium's most recent renovations occurred between November 1991 and August 1992. The \$18 million project included the replacement of all the concrete bleachers in both upper decks, as well as the replacement of the top 25 rows of the main stands. The stadium's electrical and drainage systems were also brought up to code and new restroom facilities, for both men and women, were installed in the corner towers and great halls. The construction decreased the number of seats in the stadium from 70,053 last year to 69,000. The project was financed through the issuance of revenue bonds by the UI Auxiliary Facilities System.

The Memorial Stadium practice dome, more commonly known as "The Bubble," was inflated for the first time in December, 1985, and the Fighting Illini's new locker room facilities opened before the 1986 season.

Illinois' record in Memorial Stadium is 192-146-14 coming into the 1992 season.

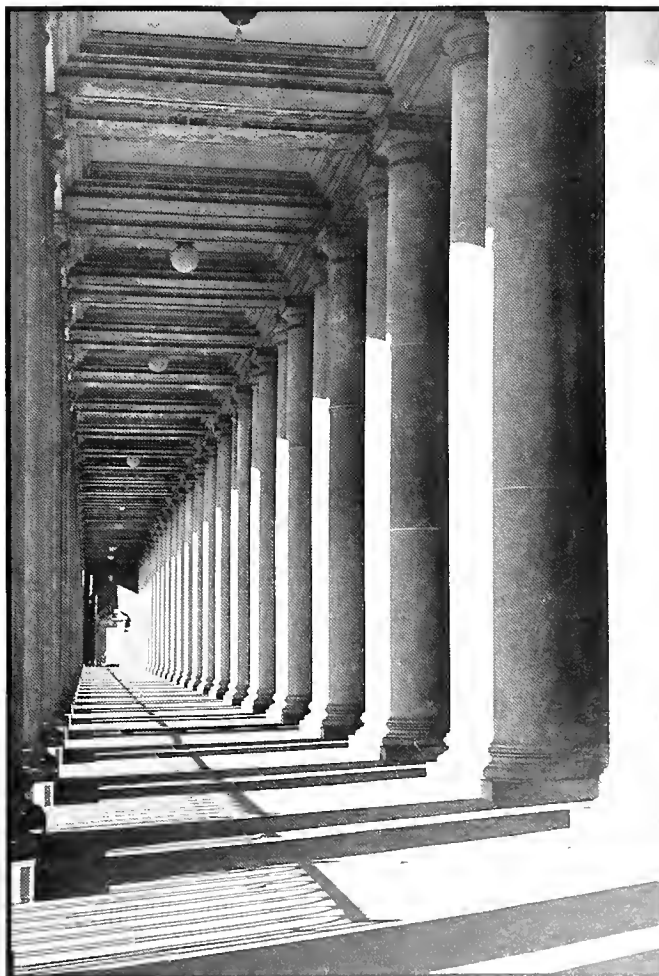


From November 1991 until August 1992, Memorial Stadium underwent an \$18 million renovation.

1992 OUTLOOK

Going into the 1992 fall football drills, new Head Coach Lou Tepper's roster includes only a half-dozen projected senior starters, but that doesn't mean that the '92 edition of Fighting Illini football is inexperienced.

When tallying the 22 projected starters on offense and defense, plus the place-kicker and the punter, more than 80 percent (20 of 24) of the returnees have earned at least one varsity letter at the University of Illinois.

Tepper realizes that most of the college football prognosticators won't list the Fighting Illini among the top five teams in the Big Ten Conference, but he won't be discouraged by those doom-sayers. Just the opposite.

"I am going to be very disappointed if we aren't a real solid factor in the 1992 Big Ten Championship race," Tepper said. "There isn't anyone to whom we will back down or with whom we feel we won't be competitive."

Offense

Offensive Line

Mike Deal, the offensive line coach, will miss departed All-America guard **Tim Simpson** and tackle **Tony Laster**, but three-fifths of the '91 front wall returns in '92. The staff figures senior tackle **Brad Hopkins** (6-4, 291) is the man to build around, much like it did a year ago with Simpson. Hopkins is a legitimate all-star candidate who could eventually play in the professional ranks. Junior **Erik Hayes** (6-8, 258) will battle for playing time behind Hopkins at left tackle. Two-year letterwinner **Greg Engel** (6-3, 289, Jr.) will again get the call to fill the critical center position. Engel served as Curt Lovelace's understudy two

seasons ago, and established himself as a possible all-star candidate with last year's solid performance. **Phil Rathke** (6-5, 270, Jr.) will challenge Engel. The third returning starter is senior guard **Jim Pesek** (6-4, 293). Like Hopkins and Engel, Pesek is a two-year letterman. Senior **Pat Wendt** (6-3, 259), who'll be a main back-up at both guard spots and at center, is one of Deal's most versatile linemen. Redshirt freshman **Charles Edwards** (6-3, 298) is also a top prospect behind Pesek at left guard. Settling on starters for the right side of the line will be Deal's primary focus this fall. Penciled in as the players to beat are **Randy Bierman** (6-5, 293, Jr.) at right tackle and **Jonathan Kerr** (6-3, 278, So.) at right guard. Bierman hasn't earned a varsity letter yet, but the coaching staff is optimistic that he'll do the job. He'll get plenty of pressure from both sophomore **Mike Suarez** (6-4, 270) and

sophomore **Steve Stefanski** (6-7, 277). Kerr earned a letter in 1991, so he has experienced the Big Ten wars first-hand. Jockeying for playing time behind Kerr at right guard will be sophomore **Derek Allen** (6-4, 279) and redshirt freshman **Predrag Jones** (6-3, 278).

Tepper on Offensive Line:

"Several experienced veterans and a sprinkling of talented rookies make the offensive line a solid group with which to work."

All-Star Candidates: Tackle **Brad Hopkins** (All-Big Ten candidate); center **Greg Engel** (All-Big Ten candidate and Academic All-America candidate), and guard **Jim Pesek** (All-Big Ten candidate).

Receivers

Thanks to returning senior flanker **John Wright** (6-0, 192), sophomore letterman **Scott Turner** (5-9, 180), and '91 reserve **J.J. Strong** (6-1, 175) at split end, new Illini receivers coach **Greg McMahon** has three lettermen with whom to work. The graduation of Elbert Turner and Gus Palma, plus Steve Mueller's career-ending injury last fall, leaves the Illini receiving corps a bit thin. A great deal was accomplished in spring drills, as rookies were given enough repetitions to show their skills. One of the biggest surprises of the spring was the emergence of sophomore **Jim Klein** (5-10, 157), who'll begin the fall as Wright's back-up at flanker. Redshirt freshman **Shane Fisher** (6-3, 187) also will challenge for playing time at that position. **Duane Lyle** (6-2, 200) will battle Turner and Strong at wide receiver this coming fall.

Tepper on Wide Receivers: *"John Wright should step forward as one of the Big Ten's top receivers this fall,*



but the others must continue to improve if we're going to have an effective passing attack. Scott Turner and J.J. Strong matured a great deal in the spring, so we're optimistic that they'll help us."

All-Star Candidate: Flanker **John Wright** (All-Big Ten candidate and Academic All-America candidate).

Tight Ends

On paper, this is one of the strongest single positions on the '92 Illini football team. Returning sophomore starter **Ken Dilger** (6-5, 246) won honorable mention on last season's All-Big Ten squad, and possesses the physical skills to eventually become one of the UT's best at this position. Dilger blocks well, runs his pass routes well, and is an excellent receiver. Backing up Dilger is the veteran duo of juniors **Dave Olson** (6-4, 244) and **Kraig Koester** (6-5, 236). Sophomore **Chris Stelter** (6-6, 219) made a successful transition from linebacker to tight end during spring drills.

Tepper on Tight Ends: "The tight end combination of Ken Dilger, Dave Olson and Kraig Koester puts Illinois on a par with most in the Big Ten."

All-Star Candidate: Tight end **Ken Dilger** (All-Big Ten candidate).

Quarterback

As has been the case at Illinois since the early 1980s, a position of great strength for the Fighting Illini is the quarterback. The incumbent is three-time letterwinner and two-year starter **Jason Verduzco** (5-9, 183, Sr.), one of the nation's premier signal callers. Verduzco successfully learned offensive coordinator **Tom Beck's** new system. If No. 10 equals his 3,014-yard performance of a year ago this fall, he'll top Jack Trudeau as Illinois' all-time passing yardage leader. **Jeff Kinney** (6-4, 200, Sr.) has been Verduzco's back-up each of the past two seasons, so he's more than

capable to take over. Embroiled in a QB battle are **J.J. O'Laughlin** (6-2, 199, So.) and redshirt freshman **Johnny Johnson** (6-1, 196).

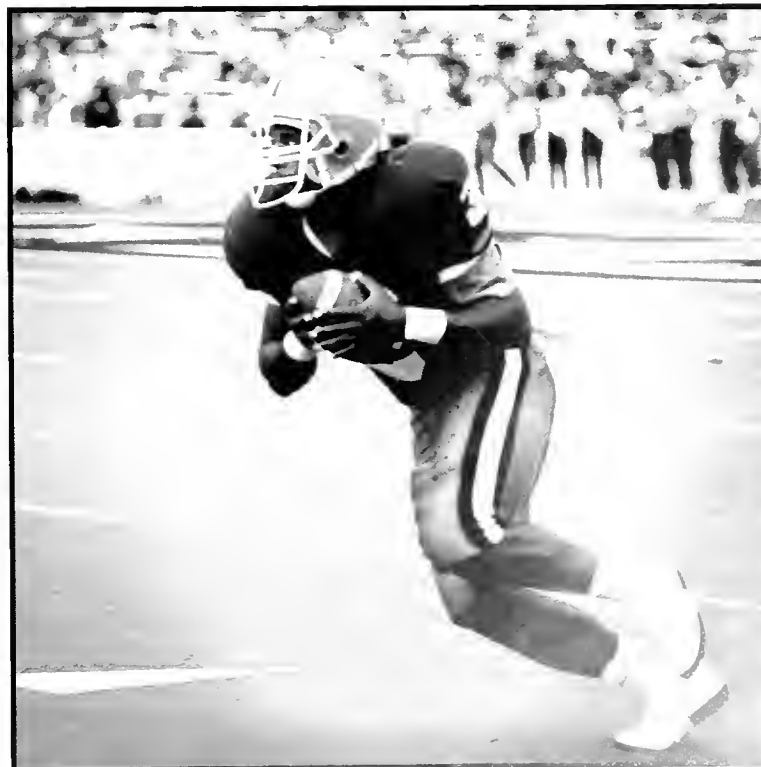
Tepper on Quarterbacks: "I was pleased with how our quarterbacks adapted to our new offense. Their next challenge will be to execute the plays against our opponents. I feel confident that Jason Verduzco will again be one of the Big Ten's best quarterbacks. Jeff Kinney had a very productive spring and our staff feels positive if he is called upon."

All-Star Candidate: Jason **Verduzco** (All-Big Ten and All-America candidate).

Running Backs

Developing a stronger running game was one of Illinois' most important objectives this past spring, and running backs coach **Lenny Willis** feels good about what happened. Kamenno Bell, last year's Fighting Illini MVP, led the team in rushing and receiving in

'91, so he leaves a huge void to fill. **Steve Feagin** (5-10, 19", Sr.) performed well during the second half of the season last year, and appears ready to pick up where he left off. Feagin has earned three letters at Illinois and averaged five yards per carry over the last seven games of 1991. **Clinton Lynch** (5-10, 184, Jr.) and **Darren Boyer** (5-10, 214, Sr.) are both returning lettermen and have displayed versatility: Sophomore **Kevin Jackson** (6-0, 200) dazzled the coaches with an outstanding performance during the spring, and he's poised for increased playing time. **Marvell Scott** (5-10, 206), a redshirt freshman, also is eager to show that he deserves action. At fullback, the coaching staff hopes that two-year letterwinner **Wagner Lester** (6-2, 217, Jr.) will regain his form of two years ago following a season on the sidelines due to a foot injury. "Wags" averaged 4.9 yards per carry during his freshman and sophomore seasons and also caught 53 passes. Battling behind

Lester are 1992 spring Most Improved Offensive Player **Alfred Pierce** (5-11, 216, Jr.), redshirt freshman **Bobby Sanders** (5-11, 215) and sophomore **Steve Mattison** (6-0, 221).

Tepper on Running Backs: "We really hope that our running game will take on more strength and be a stronger dimension for us than it has been in the past. We need to be able to run the ball with more authority. I was pleased throughout the spring by the toughness our running backs displayed."

Defense

Defensive Line

Illinois lost its entire defensive front wall to graduation, so defensive coordinator **Denny Marcin** will need to reload with redshirt freshmen and sophomores. Gone from the scene are starting nose tackle **Mark Zitnik**, and starting tackles **Sean Streeter** and **Jon Gustafsson**, but there's some im-

pressive talent chomping at the bit to show their wares. The man penciled in as the man to beat at nose tackle is senior **Erik Foggey** (6-3, 303), but he'll be challenged by redshirt freshman **Tim McCloud** (6-2, 267). Heading into fall drills, sophomore **Jeff Hasenstab** (6-5, 270) leads a four-horse race at the three technique (tackle), but junior **Michael Cole** (6-3, 242), junior **David Kent** (6-4, 253) and redshirt freshman **Ken Blackman** (6-5, 265) have plans of their own. **Chad Copher** (6-7, 260, So.) flanks Foggey at the five technique (tackle) position, but heralded redshirt freshmen **John Horn** (6-6, 253) and converted tight end **Jason Edwards** (6-5, 251) should also be in the playing mix.

Tepper on Defensive Line: "Injuries to several defensive linemen during the spring left many questions unanswered. I hope we don't have to wait a year on many of our young players, because we need them now. The development of our defensive

line may be the most critical issue for the success of the 1992 squad."

Linebackers: It's a talented group of linebackers who will be lining up for the Fighting Illini, however, due to injuries, it's a position that lacks depth. The starring role belongs to eagle linebacker **Dana Howard** (6-0, 234), a sophomore who earned second-team All-Big Ten honors in his initial season. Converted running back **Melvin Roberts** (6-0, 206), a redshirt freshman, made great strides during spring ball due to his exceptionally quick movement to the ball. **Aaron Shelby** (6-1, 229, Jr.), who stepped in and did an admirable job last season when **John Holecek** (6-2, 237, So.) was injured, is the player who'll man the inside linebacker spot. Holecek is not expected to return to practice until September or October, due to knee surgery. **John Sidari** (6-2, 220, Jr.), a two-year letterman, will likely provide back-up strength at both the eagle and the inside linebacker. At drop linebacker, coaches predict that redshirt freshman **Kevin Hardy** (6-4, 226) will end up with the starting job. Converted tight end **Lashon Ludington** (6-3, 222) made significant progress during spring ball in only one week and should be a youngster to watch. **Todd Leach** (6-2, 240, Jr.), selected by the coaching staff in the spring as the team's most improved defensive player, is listed as the starter at rush linebacker. Another former tight end, **Scott Allen** (6-5, 225, Fr.), showed great potential and could be a big-time contributor. **David Hill** (6-2, 235, Jr.), a two-year letterwinner, can provide excellent depth at both positions. Come the fall, expect to see redshirt freshman **Mikki Johnson** (6-2, 230, Fr.) somewhere in the playing group. One who won't be back is **Drew Daniels**, who will medically rule himself out of future play due to a chronic wrist injury.

Tepper on Linebackers: "If **John Holecek** returns in the fall, we will certainly have an outstanding



group of inside linebackers with quality depth. If he doesn't make it back, then our starters will still be of good ability, but our depth will probably cause us to use some true freshmen next fall."

All-Star Candidate: Dana Howard (All-Big Ten and All-America candidate).

Secondary

Three of the four players who started in the defensive secondary for Illinois against UCLA in the John Hancock Bowl return as starters this fall for new assistant **Dan Martin**. However, the all-star safety tandem of Marlon Primous and Mike Hopkins have respectively departed for pro football and graduate school, so there is some concern about who will step into their shoes. The returning group is headlined by eagle corner **Filmel Johnson** (5-10, 186, Jr.), a definite all-star candidate in 1992. Johnson picked off a team-leading three interceptions in '91, and is ready to become Illinois' next "big-play"

defensive back. Backing up Johnson are sophomore **Rod Boykin** (5-10, 188) and redshirt freshman **Mike Russell** (6-1, 193). The drop corner position is manned by **Robert Crumpton** (6-1, 196, So.), whom coaches predict will be a future Big Ten all-star. Senior **Fred Cox** (6-0, 192) is Crumpton's primary competition at that position and is a dandy special teams player as well. Free safety **Jeff Arneson** (6-1, 208, Jr.), who started for the Illini against UCLA in place of Primous, gets the nod as the front-runner in the fall. Coaches believe that redshirt freshman **Antwoine Patton** (5-11, 189) will give Arneson a battle for regular duty. Two-year letterwinner **Derrick Rucker** (5-11, 215, Jr.) is the starting strong safety, but senior **Mark Qualls** (5-10, 183) and redshirt freshman **Tyrone Washington** (5-11, 189), one of the team's fiercest hitters, are ready to challenge Rucker.

Tepper on Secondary: "I am pleased with the quality of our depth at the corners, but we still

have to identify who our regular safeties are going to be. Overall, I anticipate that we'll ultimately field a strong group in the secondary."

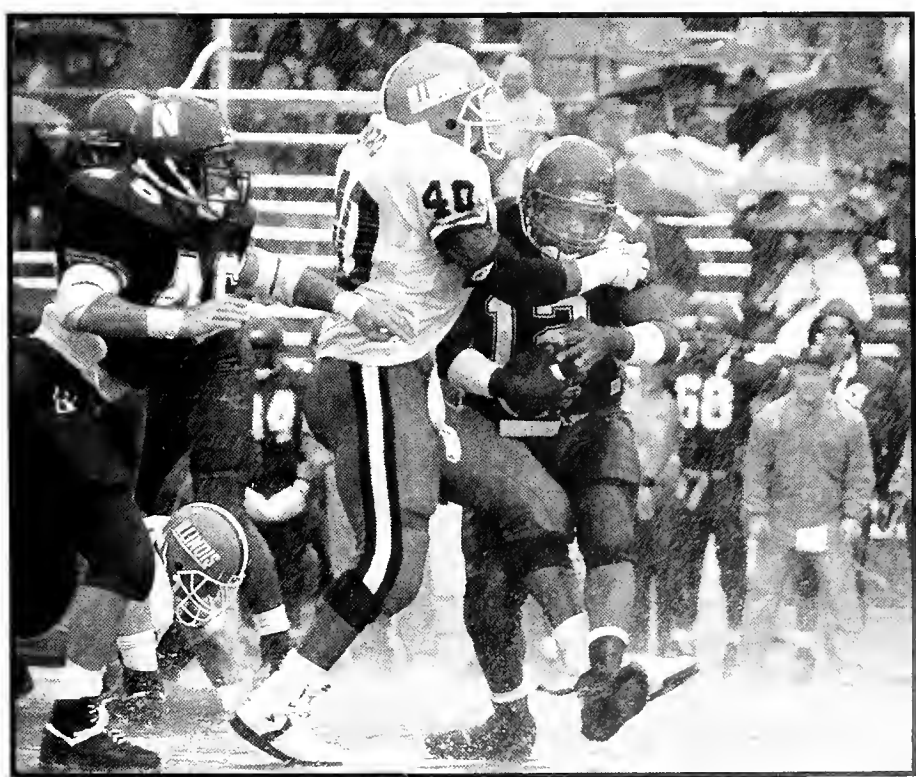
All-Star Candidate: Filmel Johnson (All-Big Ten candidate).

Special Teams

Illinois' kicking game is in excellent shape, as veterans return to claim the starting jobs at both punter and placekicker. **Forry Wells** (6-4, 200, Jr.) improved his consistency last season, averaging nearly 39 yards per punt to rank among the Big Ten's best. **Chris Richardson** (6-4, 249, So.) enjoyed an outstanding season in '91, leading the Illini in scoring with 68 points. He converted 13 of 18 field goals and 29 of 31 PATs. Richardson might even be tested as a punter this fall. Redshirt freshman **Brett Larsen** (5-9, 188, Fr.) will continue to challenge Wells and Richardson as both a punter and as a placekicker. He'll be joined by backup placekicker **Eric Barofsky** (5-11, 213, So.) and reserve punter **Jason Schnack** (6-1, 169, So.). Last year's kickoff-return duo of **Clinton Lynch** (5-10, 184, Jr.) and **Scott Turner** (5-9, 180, So.) return, as does **Filmel Johnson** (5-10, 186, Jr.), who did part-time duty returning punts. There could be some additional juggling done in the return roles by the coaches before the season opener against Northern Illinois.

Tepper on Special Teams: "In special teams play, I feel good about our specialists, with the exception of a consistent punt returner. We'll probably not make a final decision there until well into the preseason drills. I am excited about the attitude this team has fashioned toward the kicking game. Bob Zuppke would have loved their priorities as special-team performers."

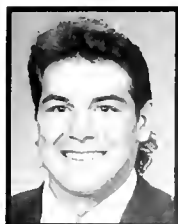

On a humid, late-summer afternoon, Illinois used its vaunted passing attack to pace a season-opening 38-31 victory over East Carolina. It was the earliest game in the history of UI football, but quarterback Jason Verduzco and his receivers looked in midseason form. After an opening-drive one-yard touchdown plunge by ECU quarterback Jeffrey Blake, Illinois kicker Chris Richardson booted the first field goal of his Fighting Illini career to close within, 7-3. Then, following a Filmel Johnson interception and return to the ECU 20-yard line, Verduzco tossed a three-yard TD pass to Elbert Turner. On the next UI possession, Verduzco completed an eight-yard TD pass to tight end Ken Dilger to stretch the lead to, 17-7. After a 50-yard field goal by ECU's Tony Brenner, Illinois fullback Kamen Bell sprinted 55 yards for a touchdown with just 2:21 remaining in the second quarter to give the Fighting Illini a 24-10 lead at the half.

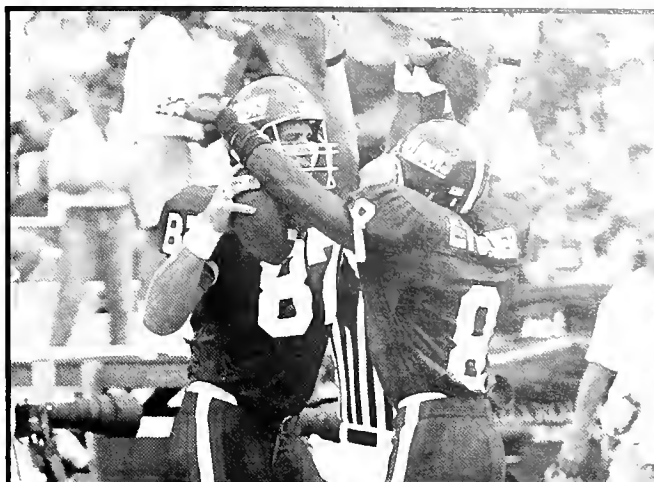
Bell started the second half with his second touchdown, this time on a run of 13 yards. Verduzco came right back with a 21-yard scoring pass to Gus Palma to make the score, 38-10.

East Carolina abandoned its game plan and went exclusively to the pass with Blake hooking up with Dion Johnson for scoring passes of 40 and 80 yards, and with Clayton Driver for 16 yards to bring the final score to, 38-31. ECU recovered an on-sides kick after Johnson's 80-yard reception with less than two minutes remaining, but the UI defense forced ECU to turn the ball over on downs.

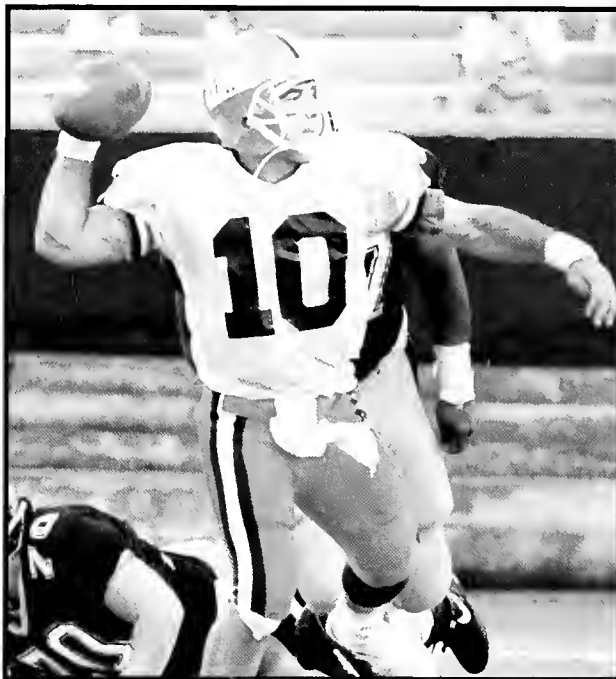

On a hot, rainy afternoon at Faurot Field in Columbia, Mo., where the temperature on the field soared above the century mark, the Fighting Illini let one slip away to the Missouri Tigers. Quarterback Jason Verduzco posted the best passing numbers of his career, completing 31 of 58 passes for 431 yards and one touchdown, but was able to get the ball over the goal line just once all day.

Illinois rolled up 515 yards in total offense, but had six drives stall inside the 20-yard line and had to settle for four Chris Richardson field goals. Trailing, 23-19, with less than two minutes remaining, Illinois failed to score a touchdown from the Missouri 16-yard line on four plays.

Missouri scored more than half of its 23 points in the final stanza on a pair of touchdown passes from Phil Johnson. Johnson hooked up with Kenneth Dunn for 16 yards and found Skip Leach on a 19-yard pass play with 4:26 left in the game to score the game-winning TD.

Receivers John Wright (108 yards) and Elbert Turner (157) both topped the century mark in reception yardage, including a 54-yard TD bomb from Verduzco to Turner.

In front of a split-national television audience on ABC, this contest was supposed to be a matchup between two high-flying offenses. Houston possessed the preseason Heisman Trophy favorite in record-setting quarterback David Klingler, while Illinois had rolled up better than 500 yards in total offense in each of the first two games.

Illinois kept its end of the deal by scoring 51 points and amassing 645 yards in total offense, the fourth-highest total in school history. Jason Verduzco burst into the national spotlight with his third sterling performance in a row, completing 16 of 22 passes for 341 yards and three touchdowns. His effort earned him Offensive Big Ten Player of the Week honors.

The game was never really in doubt. The Illini extend a 7-3 first-quarter lead to 20-3 by halftime and 34-7 after three quarters. Houston's only touchdown was a 15-yard Klingler pass to John Brown with 38 seconds left in the third quarter.

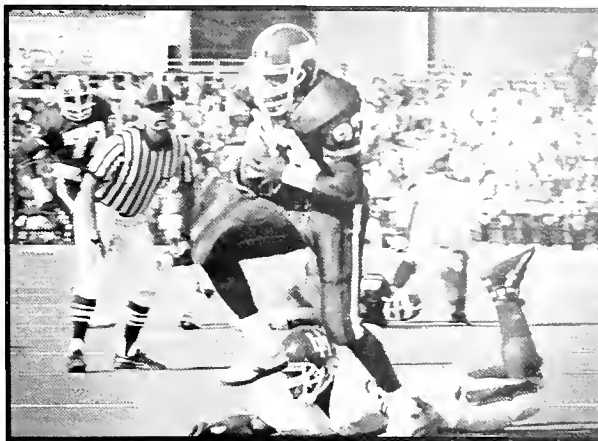
Running back Clinton Lynch saw his first extended action in the backfield and nearly became the first Illinois player ever to top 100 yards in both rushing and receiving in one game by gaining 107 yards on 14 carries and 85 yards on three receptions. Receiver Gus Palma returned from a sprained shoulder suffered on the first series at Missouri to catch five passes for 118 yards and three touchdowns. The Illinois defense held the potent Houston offense to just 10 points, and picked off four Klingler passes.

The entire Illinois defense was honored as Big Ten Defensive Player of the Week. Safety Mike Hopkins earned national Defensive Player of the Week from *The Sporting News* for his nine-tackle, three-PBU performance. Verduzco earned ABC's Player of the Game award for the fourth time in his career.

The University of Illinois celebrated Homecoming for the 81st year by using a strong defensive effort to defeat Minnesota, 24-3, at windy Memorial Stadium.

In front of a national television audience on ESPN, Illinois jumped out to a 10-0 lead on a first-quarter field goal by kicker Chris Richardson, and a five-yard touchdown run by Steve Feagin in the second quarter.

The Gophers' only score of the day came just before halftime when Aaron Piepkorn booted a 38-yard field goal. Illinois running back Kameno Bell scored two fourth-quarter touchdowns to nail down the victory. The strong northerly winds were a factor for quarterback Jason Verduzco, who threw for just 173 yards. The UI running attack out-gained the passing attack, 174-173 yards. Bell ended the day with 208 all-purpose yards, including 85 on the ground, 72 yards on pass receptions, and 51 on punt returns.

The Illinois defense held Minnesota to just 70 yards rushing, and 248 yards in total offense. The Gophers penetrated the UI 35-yard line just once all day.

Better than 70,000 fans enjoyed a key early-season match-up between two Top 20 teams at Memorial Stadium as Illinois defeated Ohio State, 10-7.

Illinois running back Darren Boyer opened the scoring with a seven-yard touchdown run in the first quarter. The day, however, would belong to the defense and special teams. Ohio State entered the game averaging better than 25 points per game, but the Illinois defense rose to the occasion. Linebacker Dana Howard was simply sensational. In front of a split-national television audience on ABC, Howard set an Illinois record with 20 solo tackles, and totalled 24 stops in all.

The Fighting Illini kept OSU off the scoreboard until three minutes remained when OSU quarterback Kent Graham hit receiver Joey Galloway on a 44-yard scoring pass. Illinois quarterback Jason Verduzco, who completed 28 of 41 passes for 272 yards, led the Fighting Illini into field-goal position by completing four of six passes for 31 of the 49 yards. Redshirt freshman Chris Richardson provided the final heroics by kicking a career-best 41-yard field goal into a stiff northerly wind with 37 seconds left on the game clock to provide the final 10-7 margin.

Howard, with his record-setting effort, earned ABC Player of the Game honors and Big Ten Defensive Player of the Week honors. The victory marked the first time in school history that Illinois had defeated Ohio State in four consecutive games.

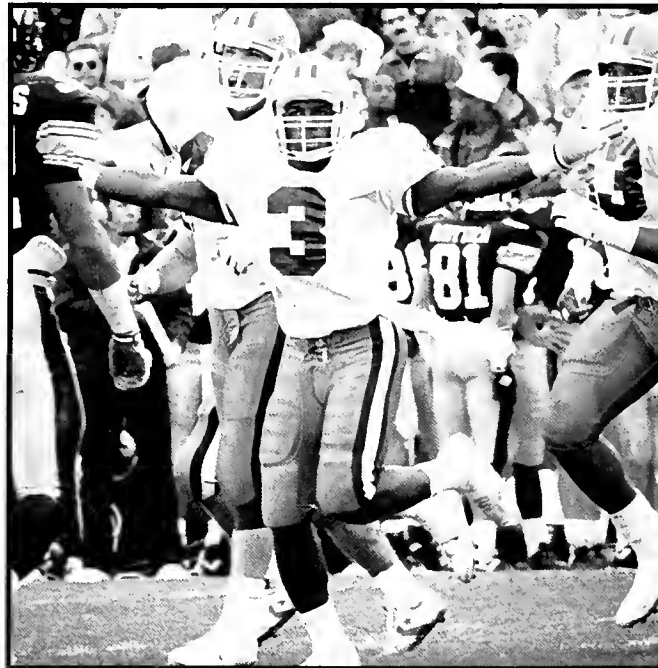
Illinois played one of its best halves of the season in jumping out to a 21-7 lead over the Hawkeyes in front of a sold-out Kinnick Stadium. The problem, though, was that the Fighting Illini couldn't sustain the effort through the second half.

Jason Verduzco opened the game by completing his first 12 passes in leading Illinois to three touchdowns in its first four possessions. After combining for 38 points in the first half, the second half turned into a defensive struggle. Illinois' Filmel Johnson picked off two consecutive Matt Rodgers' passes deep in Illinois territory to stop Iowa drives, but the UI offense was unable to get untracked. The Hawkeyes sacked Verduzco six times, in shutting out Illinois in the second half. Down by four going into the fourth quarter, the Hawkeyes were led by quarterback Matt Rodgers who directed a 6:26 drive that ended with his one-yard scoring run with 2:39 left in the game.

Verduzco completed 20 of 27 passes for 240 yards and one touchdown in winning ABC-TV Player of the Game honors for Illinois. The Fighting Illini also lost promising freshman linebacker John Holecek for the season with a knee injury. Rodgers' touchdown plunge in the final two minutes marked the first time under John Mackovic that Illinois lost a game when the lead changed in the final three minutes.

In the battle for the "Sweet Sioux" Tomahawk Trophy, the Northwestern Wildcats played one of their finest games of the season in defeating the Fighting Illini, 17-11.

In a driving rainstorm at Dyche Stadium, NU quarterback Len Williams led the Wildcats into the end zone on their first possession for a 7-0 lead. With Wildcat confidence growing on each possession, the Northwestern defense rose for a goal-line stand in the final seconds before halftime to preserve the seven-point advantage. Williams dove in from four yards to give NU a 14-0 lead before Illinois kicker Chris Richardson kicked a 40-yard field goal and Steve Feagin crashed in from the two-yard line. A two-point conversion brought Illinois within three points at 14-11. A late NU field goal provided the final margin as Illinois was unable to muster a serious scoring drive.

Verduzco was hampered by the fact that regular receivers Gus Palma and John Wright were unavailable for most of the game due to injuries. Special teams played a major role in the game for both teams. After a Badger punt pinned Illinois on its one-yard line, Steve Feagin fumbled the second snap in the end zone where Wisconsin's Carlos Fowler pounced on a Badger touchdown. The point-after touchdown failed after a bad snap to give the Badgers a 6-0 lead. Snapping would become key for the Badgers, evidenced on a punt attempt with less than 20 seconds remaining in the half. With the Badgers backed deep in their own territory, the snap bounced between the punter's legs and into the end zone where senior Julyon Brown pounced on the tying touchdown. The point after provided the Illini with a 7-6 lead at the half.

A field goal and 10-yard TD pass from Jason Verduzco to Elbert Turner extended Illinois' lead to 17-6, before snapping woes struck again for the Badgers. Again the snap bounced through the punter's hands and into the end zone where the kicker knocked the ball out of bounds for a Fighting Illini safety. A fourth-quarter field goal by Chris Richardson provided the final 22-6 margin.

The Fighting Illini celebrated good weather in sun-kissed Ross-Ade Stadium by steamrolling the Purdue Boilermakers, 41-14. Illinois scored touchdowns on three of its first five possessions, and three of its first four possessions of the second half in jumping out to a 41-0 lead.

Jason Verduzco was extremely sharp in completing 20 of 25 pass attempts for 255 yards and three touchdowns. Darren Boyer came off the bench to replace Kamen Bell, who took a shot to the head on Illinois' first series and sat out most of the game. Boyer rushed for a career-high 74 yards and two touchdowns, while running mate Steve Feagin ran 10 times for 68 yards as Illinois dominated from the outset.

The Illinois pass rush sacked Purdue quarterback Eric Hunter seven times, while the Illinois defense held the Boiler passing attack to just 63 yards. Purdue scored two late touchdowns to break a streak of 19 quarters without scoring a TD against the Illinois defense. The win was Illinois' first road victory in four tries in 1991.

In front of a large television audience on ABC, No. 25 Illinois hoped to use its homefield advantage against the No. 4-ranked Michigan Wolverines. The Illinois defense held Michigan out of the end zone twice early by forcing fumbles, but the Illini offense was unable to sustain any drives of its own.

The Wolverines struck first with a 36-yard field goal by J.D. Carlson. Illinois' Chris Richardson missed an opportunity to tie the score when his 49-yard field goal attempt hit the cross bar, bounced straight up in the air, then fell harmlessly to the ground in front of the goal post. Illinois nearly handed Michigan a score on its next possession when Jason Verduzco couldn't handle the snap from center and the Wolverines recovered a fumble at the 6-yard line. On third down, Michigan quarterback Elvis Grbac hit eventual Heisman Trophy-winner Desmond Howard for a touchdown and the Wolverines took a 10-0 lead in at the half.

Michigan opened the second half with a field goal. Illinois countered by driving down field only to have a touchdown pass called back due to holding. The penalty knocked Illinois out of field-goal range and the Illini were forced to punt. Illinois' Fred Cox picked off a Grbac pass on the next possession and Illinois was once again in business. The Fighting Illini moved to the Michigan 11-yard line when Verduzco threw into the end zone, only to have the ball tipped and intercepted for a touchback. Michigan followed with an 80-yard drive, capped by Howard's second touchdown, this time on a 15-yard reverse.

Ricky Powers rushed for 151 yards as the Wolverines piled up 330 rushing yards. Illinois' Dana Howard earned ABC Player of the Game honors by making 23 tackles, including 16 solos. Illinois had six players with at least 10 tackles, including 17 by Aaron Shelby and 16 by Marlon Primous.

Illinois had a season-high seven turnovers in a heart-breaking 27-24 loss at East Lansing. With a light rain falling most of the game, Illinois fumbled six times, losing four, and threw three interceptions, while the Spartans committed no turnovers. The Fighting Illini dominated most of the game, but couldn't offset the great field position handed to the Spartan offense.

Illinois scored three points on a 42-yard Chris Richardson field goal on its opening drive. The Spartans took the lead on a three-yard Tico Duckett touchdown, then followed with a 42-yard field goal for a 10-3 lead. The Fighting Illini knotted the score at 10 late in the half on a 16-yard scoring strike from Jason Verduzco to sure-handed John Wright. The Spartans struck early in the third quarter when Darrin Eaton scooped up Kamen Bell's fumble of a punt return and ran in from 24 yards. On its next possession, Illinois once again fumbled, and Jim DeVerne kicked his second field goal of the day from 49 yards. On Illinois' following possession, Verduzco threw his second interception, giving the Spartans the ball at their 1+ yard line, where they cashed in to take a 27-10 lead. Verduzco came back to throw two touchdown passes to Elbert Turner to close the score at, 27-24, but another late interception killed Illini hopes.

Linebackers Aaron Shelby and Dana Howard led the UI defense with 16 and 14 tackles, respectively, while rush linebacker Mike Poloskey established an Illinois record for tackles-for-loss when he sacked MSU quarterback Jim Miller for his 21st TFL of the season.

The Fighting Illini were playing their first game under new head coach Lou Tepper, who was named as John Mackovic's replacement a little more than two weeks earlier when Mackovic took the coaching job at Texas. Illinois had finished the season with two consecutive losses and the Fighting Illini were looking to start Tepper's career on a high note.

The Illinois defense certainly came to play on the sun-kissed Sun Bowl floor, holding the high-octane UCLA attack to just 268 yards of total offense, including only 92 yards on the ground. The Fighting Illini offense couldn't fair much better, though, totaling 308 yards of its own in a classic defensive struggle.

Illinois missed an early scoring opportunity when Jason Verduzco's pass from the Bruin 7-yard line was intercepted at the goal line and returned +3 yards. The Illinois defense forced a UCLA fumble six plays later, but then promptly turned the ball back to the Bruins at the UI 2+ yard line after a blocked punt. The Illinois defense stiffened, but Louis Perez booted a 32-yard field goal for the first points of the game.

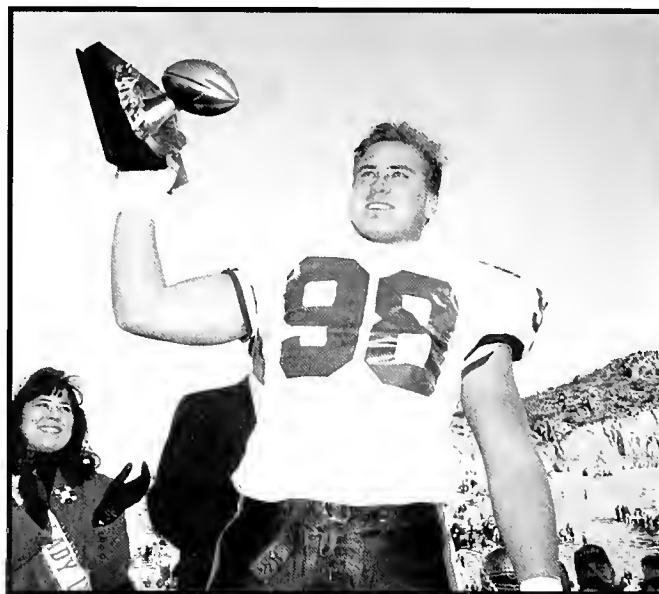
Both teams traded punches until Illinois freshman Chris Richardson kicked a 27-yard field goal after Mike Hopkins intercepted a Tommy Maddux pass at the UCLA 40-yard line. The score stayed tied at, 3-3, until the opening drive of the fourth quarter when Illinois' Filmel Johnson fumbled and lost a UCLA punt at the UI 11-yard line. The Fighting Illini defense kept UCLA out of the end zone, but could not stop a 19-yard field goal by Perez to put UCLA on top, 6-3.

Illinois' last chance was thwarted at the UCLA 29-yard line when Verduzco's pass was tipped and intercepted at the line of scrimmage by Stacy Argo. UCLA took over the ball with 8:41 remaining, and promptly kept control until just 25 seconds remained with the ball at the UI 5-yard line. In a very competitive game, UCLA topped the Fighting Illini, 6-3, to give Tepper a loss in his first game as a head coach. Illinois senior rush linebacker Mike Poloskey earned the Jimmy Rogers Jr. Trophy as the game's Most Valuable Lineman.

Coch Scott Williams

Scott Williams was the man credited with introducing the game of football to the University of Illinois campus. Even though the first college

football game was played in 1869, no one seemed to have heard of the sport when Williams, who played at the high school level in Normal, just 50 miles from Champaign-Urbana, managed to gather and teach enough players to play three games in the inaugural season of 1890. Williams coached, captained and quarterbacked that '90 team, and, by the time he left Illinois in 1893, had played every position on the team with the exception of guard and center.

Coach George A. Huff

George Huff, born on a Champaign, Ill., farm in 1872, first attended the University of Illinois at age 15. He not only played and coached

football at the UI, but coached baseball (for 24 years) and was the athletic director and director of the School of Physical Education. He was also, for a brief time, the manager of the Boston American League baseball team, and later was a talent scout for many summers. Huff had the title of head football coach from 1895-99, but performed most of the duties for just the first two of those five years. In 1897, the year the Intercollegiate Conference of Faculty Representatives (the Big Ten Conference) was formed, Fred Smith, formerly of Princeton, actually took over the coaching reins and remained for two seasons. In 1899, Neilson Poe, another former Princeton player, coached the Fighting Illini. Huff broke tradition in 1913 when he brought in a high school football coach to head up the Illinois football program. That coach was the immortal Bob Zuppke.

 Robert C. Zuppke coached the University of Illinois football team in 225 games over a span of 29 years, the longest term of any

Fighting Illini football coach. Zuppke, who was born in Germany and raised in Wisconsin, coached Oak Park (Illinois) High School to national championships in 1911 and 1912 before coming to Champaign-Urbana in time for the 1913 season. Zuppke was an innovator as a coach; he is credited with originating such contributions to the game of football as the "flea-flicker" play, the screen pass, the spiral snap from center, spring practice, and the huddle. He led Illinois to all four of its national championships — in 1914, 1919, 1923 and 1927. In addition, Zuppke's teams won seven Big Ten championships.

Coach Ray Eliot

Ray Eliot, known to Illinois football fans as "Mr. Illini," held the position of head football coach at the U of I for more years than anyone

else except Bob Zuppke. Eliot was born Raymond Nusspickel at Brighton, Mass., in 1905, and graduated from the University of Illinois in 1932 after lettering in baseball and three times in football as a tackle. After entering the coaching profession at Illinois College in Jacksonville, he returned to the U of I in 1937 as line coach under Zuppke before replacing him in 1942. At Illinois, Eliot produced Big Ten championships in 1946, 1951 and 1953. His teams claimed Rose Bowl victories, 45-14, over UCLA in 1947, and, 40-7, over Stanford in 1952. Eliot, who for years was in demand as a lecturer at football clinics around the nation, was renowned as a motivator. A nine-word motto he uttered, typified his Fighting Illini spirit: "Anything you think you can do, you can do."

Coach Pete Elliott



(7 years, 31-34-1)

Pete Elliott, a native of Bloomington, Ill., became only the third football coach at Illinois in 47 years in 1960. When he was hired, he was the

Big Ten's youngest head football coach at age 33. He had already coached for 10 years — as an assistant at Oregon State and Oklahoma, and as head coach at Nebraska and California. A quarterback on Michigan's 1948 national championship team, Elliott eventually represented three different schools in the Rose Bowl: Michigan (quarterbacking the Wolverines to a 49-0 win over Southern Cal in 1948), California (coaching the Bears in their 1959 38-12 loss to Iowa) and Illinois (coaching the Fighting Illini to a 17-7 triumph over Washington in 1964). His 1963 team, with Dick Butkus and Jim Grabowski, produced Illinois' only Big Ten championship during his tenure.

Bob Blackman was a native of Big Ten country — from DeSoto, Iowa, originally, and later from Chicago. His move in 1971 from Dartmouth to

Illinois, was a move home, of sorts. He had won 104 games in 16 years at the Ivy League school, producing three undefeated seasons for the Big Green. Blackman was the fifth winningest active collegiate coach (with 150 victories) when he arrived on the UI campus as the school's third coach in a decade. It was his job to raise Illinois football fortunes from the lows of the late 1960s. Blackman accomplished that, however, the only winning team he produced was the 1974 squad, which went 6-4-1.

Coach Mike White



(8 years, 47-41-3)

Mike White was new athletic director Neale Stoner's choice to run the UI football program starting in 1980. He had declined Pete Elliott's overtures to join him at Illinois in 1960, but picked up some impressive coaching credentials after learning from some of the game's heavyweights — Bill Walsh, Dick Vermeil, Marv Levy and John Ralston.

White coached California to a Pac-8 championship with a nation-leading offense (459 yards per game) in 1975. Along the way, he had helped to develop such passers as Joe Roth, Jim Plunkett, Steve Bartkowski and Craig Morton, and would add to his list at Illinois with the likes of Dave Wilson, Tony Mason and Jack Trudeau. White's wide-open passing philosophy seemed to be just what the Fighting Illini needed at the time. His teams virtually rewrote the UI record books in the passing department and brought Illinois back to Big Ten contender status. Five of White's eight Illinois teams posted winning records. The 1982 squad (7-5-0) played in the Liberty Bowl against Alabama in the legendary Bear Bryant's final game as Crimson Tide head coach. The Liberty Bowl was Illinois' first bowl game appearance since the 1964 Rose Bowl. The 1983 Big Ten championship team (10-2), which played in the 1984 Rose Bowl, is the only team in Big Ten history to have defeated all nine conference opponents in the same season.

Coch John Mackovic



(4 years, 30-16-1)

John Mackovic became Illinois' 19th head football coach February 3, 1988. Mackovic came to Champaign with a variety of collegiate and

professional coaching experiences and built the Fighting Illini into not only a Big Ten contender, but also a force to be reckoned with nationally. All four of his UI teams played in bowl games (1988 All American Bowl, 1990 Florida Citrus Bowl, 1991 Hall of Fame Bowl and 1991 John Hancock Bowl). Mackovic was the first to have earned the Dave McLain Big Ten Coach of the Year award in each of his first two seasons in the league. His 1989 team tied the school record (set in 1983) for victories with 10 and his 1990 team tied for the Big Ten Championship.

Mackovic, was named athletic director at Illinois December 23, 1988. He retained both the position of athletic director and head football coach until resigning just before the 1991 John Hancock Bowl to become head coach at Texas.

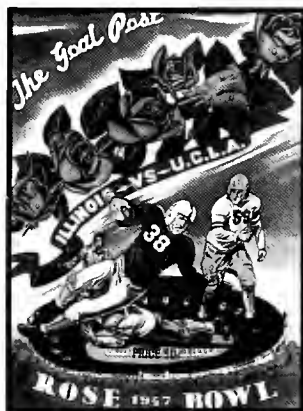

The University of Illinois has compiled a 4-6 (.400) record in 10 Bowl-game appearances dating back to 1947 when the Fighting Illini defeated UCLA, 45-14, in the Rose Bowl, Illinois' first Bowl appearance. In its most recent Bowl appearance, UCLA defeated Illinois, 6-3, in the 1991 John Hancock Bowl. Here's a look at Illinois in Bowl games.

★ ★ ROSE BOWL

Jan. 1, 1947, Pasadena, Calif.

In the Rose Bowl under the Big Ten-Pacific Ten agreement, unheralded Illinois routed highly ranked UCLA, 45-10. Illinois running backs Julius Rykovich and Claude "Buddy" Young rushed for 103 yards apiece. Seven different Illinois players scored a touchdown as the Fighting Illini racked up their first Bowl victory.

For three quarters, Illinois and Stanford battled in what appeared to be a low-scoring, defensive struggle. Late in the third quarter, Illinois scored the first of 34 unanswered points to blow out Stanford. Illinois took the lead on a seven-yard touchdown run by Johnny Karras, then exploded for 27 fourth-quarter points to give Illinois and Head Coach Ray Eliot a second Rose Bowl victory in as many tries. Illinois rolled up 434 yards in total offense, with Mattoon's Don Tate picking up 150 yards on the ground. The 1952 Rose Bowl was the first nationally telecast college football game.

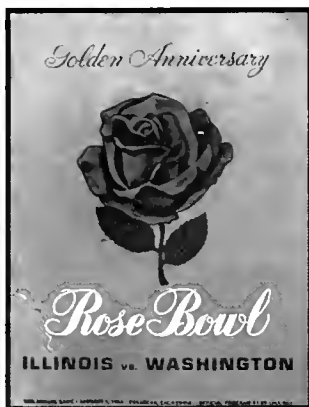

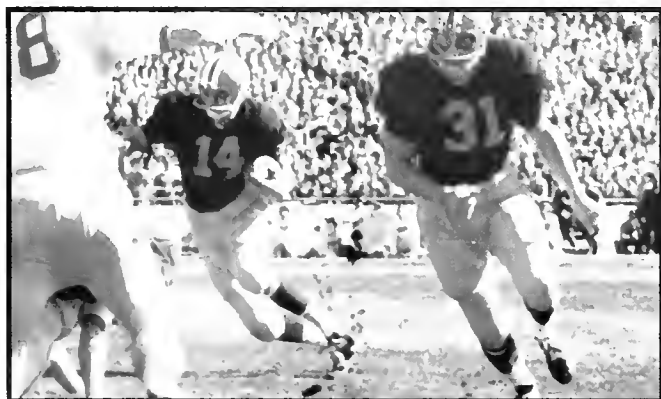

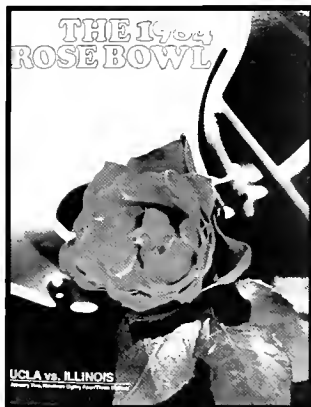

Head Coach Mike White led Illinois to a perfect 9-0 Big Ten Conference record and the first Fighting Illini visit to Pasadena in 20 years. UCLA defeated fourth-ranked Illinois' hopes for a national championship with a 45-9 victory. The Bruins piled up 21 second-quarter points en route to a 28-3 halftime lead. UCLA quarterback Rick Neuheisel enjoyed the best game of his college career, completing 31 passes for 298 yards. The Bruins rushing attack ground out 232 yards to give UCLA 511 yards in total offense. Illinois ended the season with a 10-2 record, only the second Illinois team in history to win 10 or more games, and became the first and only team to defeat all nine Big Ten opponents in the same season.

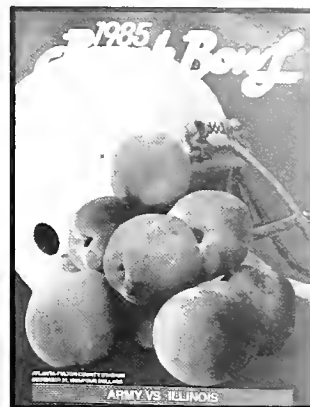

Illinois snapped a 26-year Bowl victory drought with an impressive 31-21 victory over Virginia in the Florida Citrus Bowl on New Year's Day. Illinois jumped on the Cavaliers early, with linebacker Bill Henkel recovering a fumble on the opening kickoff. Five plays later, quarterback Jeff George drilled a 15-yard scoring strike to Steven Williams.



After Virginia tied the game early in the second quarter, George directed Illinois on an 80-yard scoring drive, hitting tight end Dan Donovan on a one-yard play-action touchdown pass. Doug Higgins expanded the Illinois lead to 10 with a 34-yard field goal as time expired in the first half. Illinois opened the second half with an 84-yard drive capped by fullback Howard Griffith's scoring on a three-yard sweep around right end. Early in the fourth quarter, receiver Mike Bellamy made an acrobatic touchdown on a 26-yard aerial from George to clinch an Illinois victory. George earned MVP honors, completing 26 of 38 passes for 321 yards and three touchdowns.

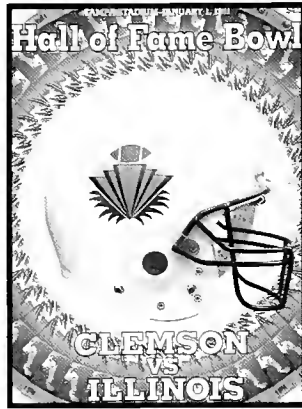

an 18-yard field goal for a 3-0 lead. Things did not start so well for the Fighting Illini when record-setting running back Howard Griffith fumbled on Illinois' first play from scrimmage. On the very next play, Tiger quarterback DeChane Cameron hit Doug Thomas with a 14-yard touchdown pass to quickly give his team a 10-0 lead. Things did not get any better in the second quarter. The Tiger offense tacked on two more touchdowns while the Clemson defense held the Fighting Illini to just 22 total yards in the half. Illinois finally got its offense untracked in the second half with 225 yards, but never could find paydirt. Clemson tacked on two more field goals to set its final margin of victory.

The Fighting Illini were playing their first game under new head coach Lou Tepper, who was named as John Mackovic's replacement a little more than two weeks earlier when Mackovic took the coaching job at Texas.

The Illinois defense certainly came to play on the sun-kissed Sun Bowl floor, holding the high-octance UCLA attack to just 268 yards of total offense. The Fighting Illini offense couldn't fair much better, though, totaling 308 yards of its own in a classic defensive struggle.

Illinois missed an early scoring opportunity when Jason Verduzco's pass from the Bruin 7-yard line was intercepted at the goal line and returned 43 yards. The Illinois defense forced a UCLA fumble six plays later, but then promptly turned the ball back to the Bruins at the UI 24-yard line after a blocked punt. The Illinois defense stiffened, but Louis Perez booted a 32-yard field goal for the first points of the game.

Both teams traded punches until Illinois freshman Chris Richardson kicked a 27-yard field goal. The score stayed tied at 3-3 until the opening drive of the fourth quarter when Illinois' Filmel Johnson fumbled a UCLA punt at the UI 11-yard line. The Fighting Illini defense kept UCLA out of the end zone, but could not stop a 19-yard field goal by Perez to put UCLA on top 6-3.

Illinois linebacker Mike Poloskey earned the Jimmy Rogers Jr. Trophy as the game's Most Valuable Lineman.

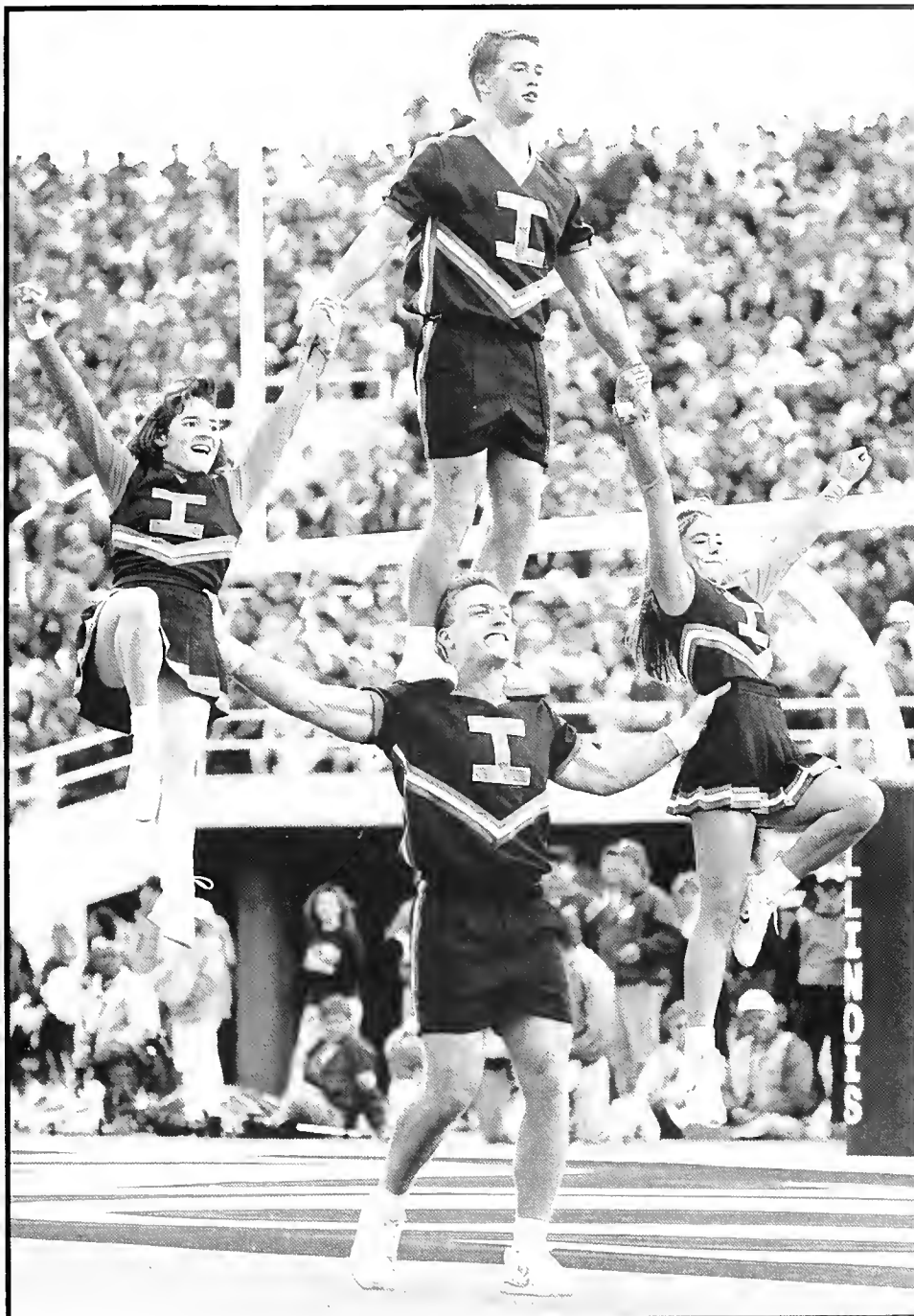

Traditions

THE BIG TEN CONFERENCE

A meeting of seven Midwest university presidents January 11, 1895 at the Palmer House in Chicago, was the first development of what would become one of organized sports' most successful undertakings.

Those seven men, behind the leadership of James H. Smart, president of Purdue University, established the principles for which the Intercollegiate Conference of Faculty Representatives, more popularly known as the Big Ten Conference, would be founded.

At that meeting, a blueprint for the control and administration of college athletics under the direction of appointed faculty representatives was outlined. The presidents' first known action was to "restrict eligibility for athletics to bonafide, full-time students who were not delinquent in their studies." This helped limit some problems of the times, especially the participation of professional athletes and "non-students" in the university's regular sporting events. That important legislation, along with others that would follow in the coming years, served as the primary building block for amateur intercollegiate athletics.

Eleven months after the presidents' meeting, one faculty member from each of those seven universities met again at the Palmer House, and officially established the mechanics of the "Intercollegiate Conference of Faculty Representatives," or "Western Conference" or "Big Ten Conference."

The seven universities were: the University of Chicago, the University of Illinois, the University of Michigan, the University of Minnesota, Northwestern University, Purdue University and the University of Wisconsin. Indiana University and the State University of Iowa were admitted in 1899. Ohio State joined in 1912. Chicago withdrew in 1946, and Michigan State College (now Michigan State University) was added three years later in 1949.

After a 40-year period of con-

stancy in membership, the Big Ten recently expanded to 11 members for the first time. On June 4, 1990, the Council of Ten, comprised of Big Ten university presidents, voted to confirm its earlier decision to integrate Pennsylvania State University into the conference. The Nittany Lions will begin playing football in the Big Ten Conference beginning next season.

At the turn of the century, faculty representatives established rules for intercollegiate athletics that were novel for the time. As early as 1906, the faculty approved legislation that required eligible athletes to meet entrance requirements and to have completed a full year's work, along with having one year of residence. Freshmen and graduate students were not permitted to compete, training tables (or quarters) were forbidden, and coaches were to be appointed by university bodies "at modest salaries."

Football and baseball were the popular sports prior to 1900. Wisconsin won the first two football championships and Chicago claimed the first three baseball titles.

Since then, there have been many different athletic events popularized on Big Ten campuses. Some became extremely popular—football and

basketball, for example. Others, like boxing, fell by the wayside. Today, the Big Ten sponsors 12 championships for men and 11 for women.

Jim Delany, 44, who became conference commissioner in 1989, is only the fifth individual to hold the title. He oversees the operation of the Big Ten Conference office and its 25-member staff, which recently located to the new Big Ten Conference office headquarters and meeting center in Park Ridge, Ill.

From the Conference office headquarters, Delany and his staff manage more than 200 live television events (more than any other sports entity), provide legislative and compliance services to member institutions and their personnel, manage 15 different sport championships, administer in-season schedules for another six sports, provide staff services to more than 400 coaching and administrative personnel on Big Ten campuses and service the media and fans' needs and interests for information on the Big Ten Conference.

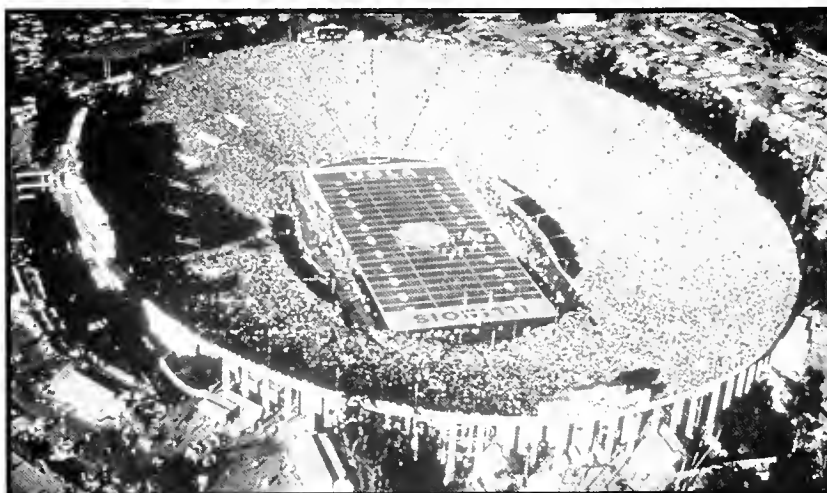
Each year the Big Ten champion earns the right to represent the conference against the Pacific Ten champion in college football's greatest spectacle, the Rose Bowl.

Today's Rose Bowl had its beginnings in 1890 in Pasadena, Calif., a growing southern California city with a population of fewer than 5,000 people, most of whom had been transplants from cities in the East and Midwest. In late 1889, one of the town's leading citizens proposed to a group of fellow Valley Hunt Club members that it would be nice to have a small parade and display of athletic competitions on New Year's Day. The Pasadena natives had long forgotten their snow-covered homes in the East and were anxious to showcase their beautiful California climate.

The parade was a line of flower-adorned carriages, and the games consisted of foot races, tugs of war and jousts among the local citizenry.

The foot races and tugs of war kept the townspeople's interest until around 1902. The suggestion then was made to invite two college football teams to compete in the post-season celebration. The two teams that played in college football's first intersectional postseason game were Michigan and Stanford in 1902. Michigan, led by Head Coach Fielding H. (Hurry-Up) Yost, dominated the Stanford team, 49-0, in a game that was stopped with more than nine minutes remaining. The Rose Bowl had been set back 14 years.

Local residents decided that, perhaps, football's time had not yet arrived and for the next 14 years, the



Rose Bowl gave way to a number of other events.

For many years the main attraction in Tournament Park (the predecessor of the current Rose Bowl stadium) was chariot races, although polo matches attracted equally large crowds. However, in 1912, interest in the chariot races began to decrease following an accident. So, in 1913, two unusual events were scheduled. The first, a race between a camel and an elephant, was tried and was never repeated. The other idea was just as exciting, but never seemed to catch on with the community. That idea was an ostrich race, which proved to be more exciting than originally planned when one of the jockeys was thrown from his mount. In an effort to capture his stray bird, the jockey found

himself kicked across the track. The ostrich races were discontinued.

In 1916, the decision was made to bring back football, and the Rose Bowl has been the "Granddaddy of them all" ever since.

Until 1923, the Tournament of Roses Committee selected the two teams that would compete in the New Year's Day classic. From 1923-1946, the West Coast representative was allowed to choose its Eastern opponent. The decision was made by the Pacific Coast Conference. The Big Ten sent a representative in 1921, when Ohio State lost to California, 28-0. Following that season, however, the Big Ten established a ban on postseason football games that lasted 26 seasons.

The Big Ten lifted the postseason policy Sept. 1, 1946, and a five-year pact was signed between the Big Ten and Pac-10 allowing Illinois to play UCLA in the 1947 Rose Bowl. The agreement was revised in 1962, and since then the two conference champions have played each year on New Year's Day.

The national awareness and attention given to the Rose Bowl is unequalled. Approximately 125 million television viewers watch the Rose Parade each year and more than 90 million view the football game.

The University of Illinois has participated in four Rose Bowl games—1947, 1952, 1964, 1984. The Fighting Illini have won three of the four Rose Bowl games it has played, giving it the best winning percentage of any Big Ten school.

In 1889, University of Illinois student Scott Williams noticed a bulletin board card announcing that anyone interested in playing football should report to campus that afternoon.

That day he arrived to see a group of students chasing and kicking a ball in a manner that barely resembled the game of football that he played at State Normal University, just over 50 miles west of Champaign.

After the boys' workout, Williams assembled the group and gave it instruction on how the ball should be passed and kicked. He also explained the scoring system and other points of strategy. The gang reassembled and played a little while longer with Williams as their leader.

The following year Williams and some teammates approached the heads of the athletic department with the hopes that they could represent the UI in a game of football against Illinois Wesleyan at Bloomington. Anticipating little enthusiasm, Williams suggested that the team pay its own expenses, provide uniforms, and pay its own

train fare. Permission was granted. The first University of Illinois football team boarded a train Thursday, Oct. 2, 1890, to compete in the Illinois Oratorical Association meeting in Bloomington, an athletic competition featuring contests in track, tennis, baseball and football.

With Williams serving as coach, captain and quarterback, Illinois lost

to Wesleyan, 16-0. Although Illinois lost its first football game, it did win the championship cup for the week-ends activities.

Illinois' second game of the season was against Purdue, a team which had been under great preparation for the game. The Boilers defeated Illinois, 62-0, but the young UI II had learned a few lessons from the advanced Purdue team before entering the last game of its first season, a rematch against Wesleyan.

Illinois hosted its first-ever home game Nov. 26, 1890. The contest was met with great anticipation in the community. Nearly 300 fans arrived at the Champaign fair grounds to see W.F. Slater score two touchdowns in a 12-6 Illinois victory, which ended its first season with a 1-2 record.

Scott Williams stepped down as captain and coach after the 1890 season, but remained on the roster as a player on the 1891 Illinois team, winners of all six games and champions of the Illinois Intercollegiate Football League.

TRADITIONAL SERIES TROPHIES

"Illibuck"

(Ohio State—Since 1925)

"Illibuck" is—or was—a turtle, destined for long life, it was hoped. But the wear and tear of traveling between Champaign-Urbana and Columbus was too much, even for a hardy marine reptile. "Illibuck" died in the spring of 1927 and his successor is now a wooden replica. Members of two junior honorary societies, Bucket and Dipper of Ohio State and Sachem of Illinois, annually meet at halftime of the Fighting Illini-Buckeye game to smoke the peace pipe and present the "Illibuck" trophy to last year's winning school.

"Cannon"

(Purdue—Since 1943)

The "Cannon," more accurately known as the Purdue Cannon, made its first trip to Champaign-Urbana in 1905 when a group of Purdue students brought it to fire after a Boiler-maker victory. Purdue won the game, 29-0, but the Cannon was never fired. Illinois student Quincy Hail found the Cannon hidden near the old Illinois Field. Hall and a group of Delta Upsilon brothers confiscated the Cannon and held it until 1943 when they donated it as a symbol of the Illinois-Purdue rivalry.

"Tomahawk"

(Northwestern—Since 1945)

The story of the Illinois-Northwestern trophy dates back to 1945 when the staff members of the two student newspapers conceived the idea of a wooden Indian trophy, "Sweet Sioux."

In September, 1946, "Sweet Sioux" was stolen from a showcase at Northwestern. A Tomahawk Trophy was inaugurated in 1947 to replace the wooden Indian and has been used since. "Sweet Sioux" was found in 1948, but was discarded because of its bulk.

Homecoming, a tradition on just about every college campus in the United States, is celebrated with zest by graduates and former students who return to renew fond college memories—and it all began at the University of Illinois. The fall of 1992 marks the 82nd year for the campus-wide celebration which began the weekend of October 14-16, 1910.

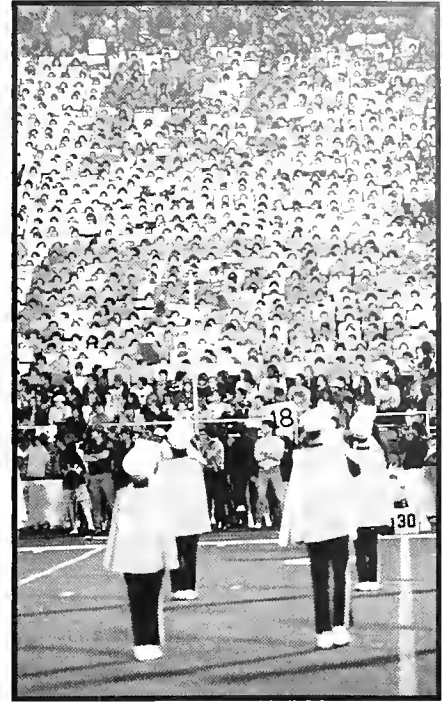
The Homecoming celebration was conceived in 1909 by UI students C.F. (Dab) Williams and W. Elmer Kirkblaw, members of the Shield and Trident senior society. The Shield and Trident Society joined with another senior society, Phoenix, to organize the three-day event and submitted a petition to the University Council of Administrators asking the weekend to be set aside for the First Annual Fall Homecoming. Once the proposal was approved, the senior societies, having instituted the movement, resigned their claims to the Illinois Union, which has organized the Homecoming since that time.

At the center of the weekend festivities was the Illinois-Chicago football game on Saturday, Oct. 15, 1910. Illinois, under the leadership of captain Glenn D. Butzer, scored the first victory over Chicago—by a score of 3-0—on a drop-kick by Otto Seiler. More than 1,500 graduates returned to Champaign-Urbana at the original homecoming, one-third of all its graduates.

The weekend activities included a varsity "Alumni" baseball game, an interclass track meet, a band reunion, a "rooter" section at the game (which later became "Block I") and a Hobo band parade. The Hobo band parade was put on by members of the senior class who paraded from Green Street to Illinois Field. A prize for the most comical costume of the day was given, setting the stage for modern "tailgater" contests and celebrations.

THE MARCHING ILLINI

Perhaps the largest organization concerned with preserving the many traditions of the University of Illinois is the Marching Illini. This 300-piece ensemble performs a halftime show at every home football game, as well as selected away games. This year the Marching Illini will travel to the Ohio State game. Each show combines original music and innovative drills to achieve the exciting form of entertainment that has brought the Marching Illini national and international acclaim.

At the conclusion of every halftime show, the Marching Illini performs the traditional "Three-In-One," a nationally renowned tradition which features the University symbol of dignity, Chief Illiniwek. "Three-In-One" also honors many other traditions, such as the block "I" formed by the band and the traditional singing of the "Three-In-One." The Marching Illini was the first band to form letters and sing on the football field. "Hail to the Orange," the University's alma mater, is also included in the presentation.

In addition to halftime shows, the Marching Illini's performances include parades, pre- and postgame shows and concerts, recording sessions, and an annual concert attended by thousands in the Assembly Hall. This year's concert is scheduled for Nov. 22

The Marching Illini is under the supervision of Director of Bands, James Keene, Assistant Director of Bands, John C. Bordwell and Marching Band Director, Gary Smith.

One of the most dramatic and dignified traditions in college athletics is the performance of Chief Illiniwek at the University of Illinois. Since 1926, this symbol has stirred pride and respect in audiences at Memorial Stadium and the Assembly Hall.

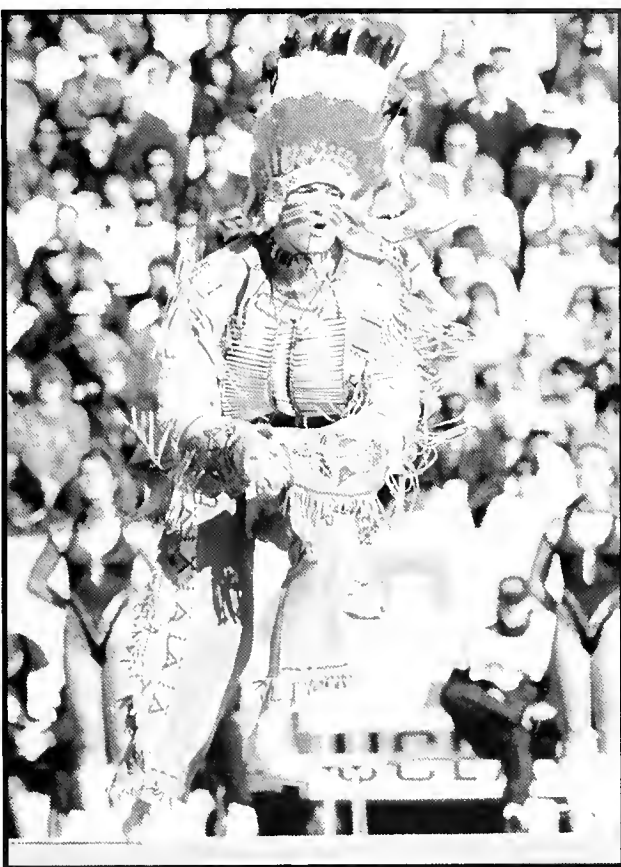
Illiniwek (pronounced "ill-YE-nih-wek") was the name of the loose confederation of Algonquin tribes that once lived in the region. The French changed the ending to "ois" in naming what became the state of Illinois. Illiniwek means "they are men" and former Illinois football coach Robert Zuppke is believed to have suggested calling the UI symbol Chief Illiniwek.

In 1926, Assistant Band Director Ray Dvorak conceived the idea of performing an American Indian dance during halftime of the Illinois vs. Pennsylvania football game in Philadelphia. Lester Leutwiler, a student interested in Indian

lore, was chosen for the role. Leutwiler's performance, done in a homemade costume, was received so well that he was asked to continue his dance through the 1928 season.

Webber Borchers, the second Chief Illiniwek, was the first to appear in authentic American Indian regalia. He initiated a campaign to raise money to replace his homemade outfit with an authentic one, but with the Depression on, he received just \$15 dollars. However, a Champaign merchant stepped in to fund the rest and Borchers was off.

He recalled: "In the summer of 1930, I went, at my own expense, to the Pine Ridge reservation in South Dakota. I hitchhiked out, called an Indian agent and explained my mission. He and an Indian trader called in an older Sioux woman. She and two younger women made the suit."



Chief Illiniwek has been the symbol of Illinois athletics since 1926.

On Nov. 8, 1930, in New York's Yankee Stadium, Illinois faced Army in the seventh game of the season. It was there that Borchers made the first appearance of Chief Illiniwek in that outfit. Since then, five different authentic outfits have been used by Chief Illiniwek. The one used in performances now was purchased in 1983 from Sioux Chief Frank Fools Crow, and is topped by a headdress of turkey feathers.

CHAMPIONSHIP TEAMS

▶ **1914:** Possibly the most dominant team in Illinois football history was the 1914 squad. The squad was only Coach Robert Zuppke's second at Illinois and would be the first of four national championship teams he would lead in his 29 years at Illinois. The Fighting Illini defense shut out four of the season's seven opponents, yielding only 22 points the entire

1914 season. While the defense was stifling any and every team in its way, the offense racked up an incredible average of 32 points per game, including a 51-0 shellacking of Indiana October 10. This team was so good that no one scored a point against it until the fifth game of the seven-game season, October 31. In fact, the closest game of the year,

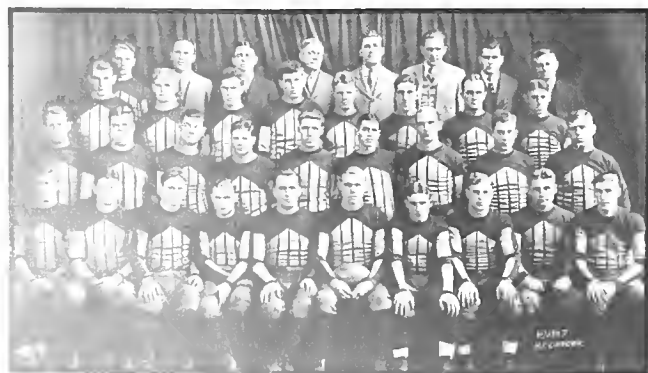
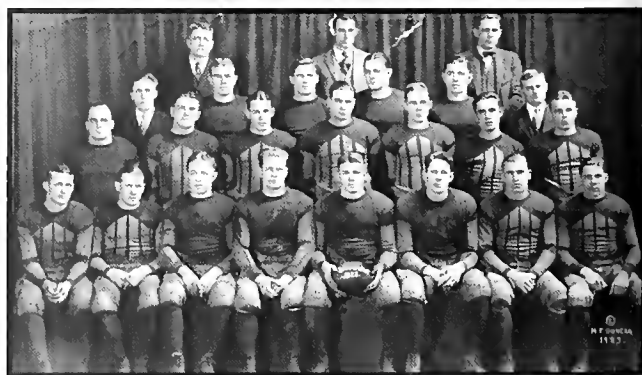
two weeks later, wasn't very close at all, a 21-7 home decision over Chicago. Leading the way for Zuppke's troops was right halfback Bart Macomber. He led the team in scoring, but wasn't even named to the all-conference team. Left guard Ralph Chapman was named to Walter Camp's first team All-America squad, while left halfback Harold Pogue, the team's second-leading scorer, was named to Camp's second-team.



◀ **1919:** The 1919 team was the only one of Coach Zuppke's national championship squads to lose a game. Wisconsin managed to defeat the Fighting Illini in Urbana in the third game of the season, 14-10, to temporarily knock Illinois out of the conference lead. However, Zuppke's men came back from the Wisconsin defeat with three consecutive wins to set up a showdown with the Buckeyes at Ohio Stadium on November 22 to determine the conference champion. Illinois scored first on a first-quarter touchdown and never looked back. The Fighting Illini added a field goal, before allowing a Buckeye touchdown and conversion. With the final score, 9-7, in Illinois' favor the Illini won the conference title and were later named national champions. Right guard Clarence Applegran was named to Eckersall's second-team All-America squad, and left tackle Burt Ingversen and center John Depler were both members of Walter Camp's second-team All-America squad.

▶ **1923:** The 1923 season became a particularly special year in Illinois football history. Not only did Illinois and Coach Zuppke win its third national championship in 10 years, but Memorial Stadium was finally complete. It was unveiled for all to see at the homecoming contest, a victory, vs. Chicago Nov. 3. The 1923 season also meant the arrival of legendary halfback Red Grange, who was to become possibly the most storied college football player ever. Grange was named a Walter Camp All-American scoring 72 points that season. After the win over Chicago, the Fighting Illini finished their undefeated season by shutting out their

last three opponents en route to a tie for the conference crown with Michigan, whom Illinois didn't play. The defense was spectacular, as Illinois held its last five opponents scoreless and outscored its foes, 82-0, to finish the season. In addition to Grange, left guard James McMillen joined the Galloping Ghost on several award teams, including Eckersall's first-team All-America squad.



▶ **1927:** In 1927 Zuppke produced his fourth undefeated team, going 7-0-1. Besides a tie with Iowa State, the 1927 Illinois club was literally unbeatable, yielding only 24 points the entire season, 12 of them coming at the hands of the Cyclones. Besides Iowa State, only Northwestern and Chicago were able to score a single point against this ferocious Fighting Illini team. The Fighting Illini's closest competition for the conference title was Minnesota, who finished 3-0-1 in conference play, but by virtue of not playing Illinois and its tie with Indiana finished second behind 5-0 Illinois. Among those awarded postseason honors were guard Russell Crane and center Robert Reitsch, both of whom were members of Grantland Rice's All-America team.

Dick Butkus remains the standard for which all linebackers are compared. He played two All-America seasons in 1963 and 1964 before enjoying a Hall of Fame career with the Chicago Bears, where he was a six-time All-Pro selection. Butkus finished third in the 1964 Heisman Trophy voting and has college football's annual award for the outstanding collegiate linebacker named after him. He had his jersey, No. 50, retired at Illinois in 1986, joining Red Grange as the only two Illinois players to have their numbers retired. Butkus helped lead the Fighting Illini to a 1964 Rose Bowl victory over Washington. He earned first-team All-Big Ten honors twice and was awarded the 1963 Silver Football Award as the Big Ten's Most Valuable Player. Butkus finished his career with 373 tackles. His 145 stops in 1963 stood as the school record until 1976. He was named the 1964 Player of the Year by the American Football Coaches Association.

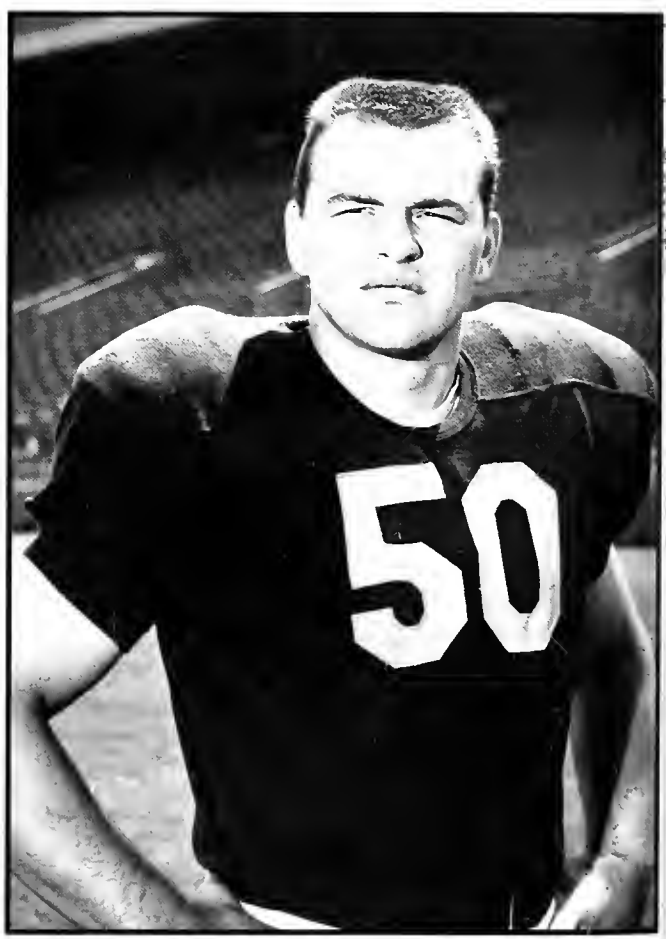
Butkus was named to the Big Ten Diamond Anniversary Team in 1970, The Sporting News College Coaches All-Time Team, the Walter Camp All-Century Team and the University of Illinois All-Century Team. He was elected to the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1979 and to the College Football Hall of Fame in 1983.

1923-25

Red Grange is one of football's all-time greats, and arguably the game's greatest all-time offensive player. He is a charter member of the Pro (1963) and College (1951) Football Halls of Fame. Grange's most memorable performance came Oct. 18, 1924 when he scored four touchdowns in the first 12 minutes vs. Michigan in the Memorial Stadium dedication game. Later in the same game he ran for a fifth touchdown and threw for a sixth. Nicknamed the "Wheaton Iceman" and "Galloping Ghost," he left Illinois to play pro football with the Chicago Bears under former Fighting Illini George Halas. He was named All-America each of his three seasons and won the 1924 Silver Football Award as the Big Ten's Most Valuable Player, the first recipient of the award. He was named to The Sporting News All-Time Team, the Big Ten Diamond Anniversary Team, the Walter Camp All-Century Team and the UI All-Century Team.

Alex Agase

(Inducted in 1963)



An All-America guard at Illinois in 1942 and '46, he holds the rare distinction of earning All-America honors at another school (Purdue) in 1943 while in the Army. He also was selected to Walter Camp Foundation's All-Century Team in 1989. Agase enjoyed a lengthy Big Ten

coaching career, first as a head coach at Northwestern from 1964-1972 and Purdue from 1973-1976. He was also a volunteer assistant coach at Michigan in charge of special teams from 1982-1987. Agase also served as athletic director at Eastern Michigan University from 1977-1982. He is now retired and living in Ypsilanti, Mich.

Bob Blackman

(Inducted in 1987)



Blackman served as Illinois' head football coach from 1971-76 compiling a 29-36-1 record. During his six seasons at Illinois, Blackman coached future NFL stars Scott Studwell, Larry McCarren and Revie Sorey, as well as All-Americans Tab Bennett and Dan Beaver.

Before heading the Illinois program, Blackman enjoyed great success at Dartmouth College, where he compiled a 104-37-3 record in 16 seasons. In 15 years of official Ivy League competition, Blackman's Dartmouth Indians were 79-24-2, won four league championships outright, shared three other championships, had three perfect 9-0 seasons (1962, 1965, 1970) and won two Lambert Trophies, symbolic of supremacy in Eastern college football. Blackman is now retired and living in Hilton Head, S.C. He also serves as chairman of the selection committee for the annual East/West Shrine Game.

Alex Agase earned All-America honors at two Big Ten schools, including Illinois.

Dick Butkus

(Inducted in 1983)



Butkus remains the standard for which all linebackers are compared. He played two All-America seasons at Illinois (1963-64) before enjoying a Hall of Fame career with the Chicago Bears, where he was a six-time All-Pro selection. Gale Sayers called Butkus the

"fiercest tackler of his time." In 1964 he finished third in the Heisman Trophy balloting to Notre Dame's John Huarte. College football's annual award for the outstanding collegiate linebacker is appropriately named after Butkus and is awarded each year by the Downtown Athletic Club of Orlando, Fla. Butkus and Red Grange are the only players to have their numbers retired at Illinois. Butkus' No. 50 was retired during halftime of the Illinois-Nebraska game, Sept. 20, 1986. He was also honored on the 1989 Walter Camp Foundation All-Century team. Butkus is now enjoying a successful acting and entertainment career and resides with his family in Malibu, Calif.

Chuck Carney

(Inducted in 1966)



Tall, slender and sure-handed, Carney was an All-America receiver at Illinois in 1920. One of Head Coach Bob Zuppke's favorite targets, the coach once instructed one of his quarterbacks to "bombard passes in Carney's direction."

After leaving Illinois, Carney served as the end coach at Northwestern, Wisconsin and Harvard. He is also the only Illinois athlete to earn All-America honors in both football (1920) and basketball (1920 & 22). Carney died in 1984.



Athletes Behind the Tradition

Bart Macomber

(Inducted in 1972)



Macomber joined All-America Hal Pogue in the backfield to lead Illinois and second-year Head Coach Bob Zuppke to their first national championship in 1914. That team shut out its first four opponents, before allowing just 22 total points during a perfect 7-0 season. Macomber had also played for Zuppke as a prep at Oak Park High School. The following year Macomber earned All-America honors as a halfback, and was captain of the 1916 team. He was a versatile athlete who could play every backfield position, and did a majority of the team's kicking. Macomber died in 1971.

Bernie Shively

(Inducted in 1982)



Red Grange was led to many of his spectacular scores by an agile, athletic guard who was so quick and powerful for his size that he wrestled for the Big Ten heavyweight championship in 1926. He lost the bout, however, after wrestling George Fisher of Indiana to a draw during regulation and then losing the coin toss to decide the champion. Shively earned All-America honors as a guard in 1926. He joined the University of Kentucky's staff as an assistant football coach, before being named that school's athletic director in 1938, a post he held until his death in 1967.

Former Illinois coach Bob Zuppke is a charter member of the College Football Hall of Fame.



George W. Woodruff

(Inducted in 1963)



Woodruff coached the University of Pennsylvania in its greatest days of college football. He compiled a 12+15-2 record from 1892-1901 at Penn. His 1897 Pennsylvania team was a perfect 15-0 and was recognized as national champions. Woodruff coached one season at Illinois, compiling a record of 8-6 in 1903. He died in 1934.

Claude "Buddy" Young

(Inducted in 1968)



In a college career split by the armed services, the 5-foot-5-inch halfback earned All-America honors in 1944. Young scored 13 touchdowns in his All-America year, while rushing for 842 yards with an amazing 8.9 yards-per-carry average. He rushed for 103 yards in Illinois' 45-14 upset of unbeaten UCLA in the 1947 Rose Bowl and was selected as the game's MVP. A world-class sprinter, Young enjoyed a lengthy pro football career and served as an assistant commissioner in the NFL. He died in 1983.

Robert Zuppke

(Inducted in 1951)



Hired by Athletic Director George Huff as head football coach in 1913, Zuppke held the position for 29 years, the longest tenure of any Illinois head coach. An innovator and trend-setter, Zuppke established many of the current traditions and styles of football today. He is credited with inventing several different formations, the flea-flicker, the huddle and spring practice. He also recruited and coached Red Grange, considered by many as the greatest player in football history. In all, Zuppke won four national titles (1914, 1919, 1923, 1927), seven conference championships, and compiled a record of 131-81-13. The playing field at Memorial Stadium is named after him and is identified by a large stone engraving under the scoreboard in the north end zone. Zuppke died in 1957.

ILLINOIS ALL-AMERICA SELECTIONS

Consensus All-America Selections

In 1950, the National Collegiate Athletic Bureau (the NCAA's service bureau) compiled the first official comprehensive roster of all-time All-Americans.

The compilation of the All-America roster was supervised by a panel of analysts working in large part with the historical records contained in the files of the Dr. Baker Football Information Service.

The roster consists of only those players who were first-team selections on one or more of the All-America teams that were selected for the national audience and received nationwide circulation.

Not included in the NCAA's list are the thousands of players who received All-America mention on second or third teams, nor the numerous others who were selected by newspapers or agencies with circulations that were not primarily national and with viewpoints, therefore, that were not normally nationwide in scope.

The University of Illinois Athlete of the Year was first given in 1940 to Bill Hapac, who played basketball and baseball. The award was given annually until it was discontinued in 1973. There were no awards given until 1982, when the Big Ten began a Conference Athlete of the Year in which each school nominated a male and female athlete. Since 1982, the University of Illinois has recognized a Male and Female Athlete of the Year.

In 1992, the awards were presented at the second annual UI Scholar-Athlete All-Star Banquet, held at Krannert Center. For the first time in history, Co-Male Athletes of the Year were named. Senior All-American offensive guard Tim Simpson shared the award with senior track and cross country All-American Len Sitko. Junior Big Ten Golfer of the Year Renee Heiken earned her second-consecutive Female Athlete of the Year award. She shared the honor with junior All-American track standout Tonja Buford.

Since the award was first given in 1940, 21 Fighting Illini football players have earned the Athlete of the Year award, including Buddy Young, Dike Eddleman, Dick Butkus, and Tony Eason.

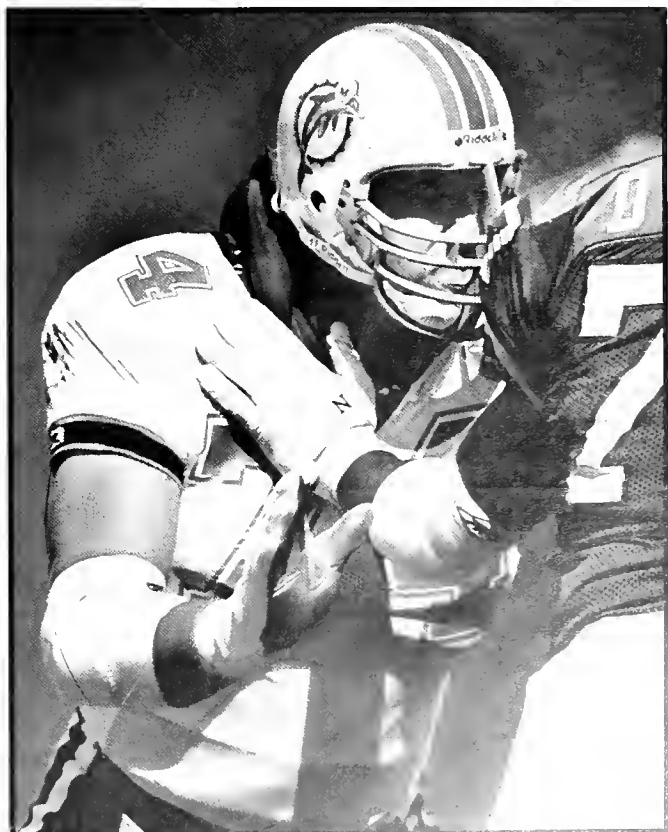

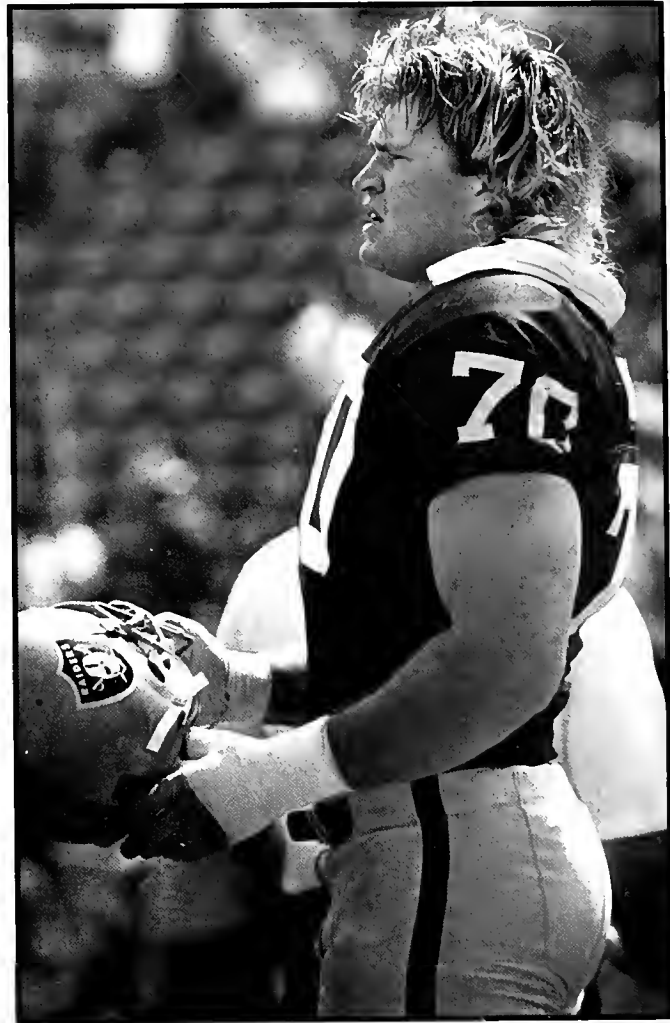

NCAA SILVER ANNIVERSARY AWARD

This award is given annually to six distinguished former student-athletes on their silver anniversary (25th) as college graduates. In 1990, Illinois great **Dick Butkus** '65 was presented the award along with a group that included Dr. Donald Baxter (basketball, Mercer University), Paul Bucha (swimming, U.S. Military Academy), Dr. Archie Roberts (baseball, Columbia, University) and Roger Stautbach (football, U.S. Naval Academy). Following his career at Illinois, Butkus earned Pro Football Hall of Fame honors with the Chicago Bears, and also has distinguished himself as a sports commentator and actor.

NCAA AWARD OF VALOR

Awarded only six times since 1974, the Award of Valor is presented to a coach, administrator, or current or former varsity letterwinner who, when confronted with a situation involving personal danger, averted or minimized potential disaster by courageous action or noteworthy bravery. In 1982, former fighting Illini football player **Timothy J. McCarthy** '71 was presented the award for his actions in an assassination attempt on President Ronald Reagan March 30, 1981. McCarthy served as a secret service agent and was wounded in the line of duty. In that same incident, another UI graduate, presidential press secretary James Brady, was also wounded.

BIG TEN CONFERENCE MEDAL OF HONOR

In 1914, the Big Ten Conference endowed a Medal of Honor, to be awarded annually at each institution to the student demonstrating proficiency in scholarship and academics. Beginning in 1982, a woman athlete from each institution has also been awarded the Conference Medal of Honor.

Mike Hopkins (football) and Kate Riley (basketball) were named 1992 Big Ten Male and Female Medal of Honor recipients at Illinois. Hopkins, a 4.76 astronautical/aeronautical engineering major, was a first-team GTE Academic All-American and four-year letterman after originally coming to Illinois as a walk-on. He is presently studying for a master's degree at Stanford. Riley, a 4.74 marketing major, served as team co-captain and was a three-time Academic All-Big Ten selection as well as four-year letter winner.

In the 76-year history of the award, 13 Fighting Illini football players have earned the award, including quarterback Peter Freund in 1989. There has been one father-son UI Medal of Honor duo, Lee Sentman (track) in 1931 and his son, Lee Sentman III (fencing) in 1958. Gymnast Howard Beck (1974 and 1975) is the only two-time recipient of the award.

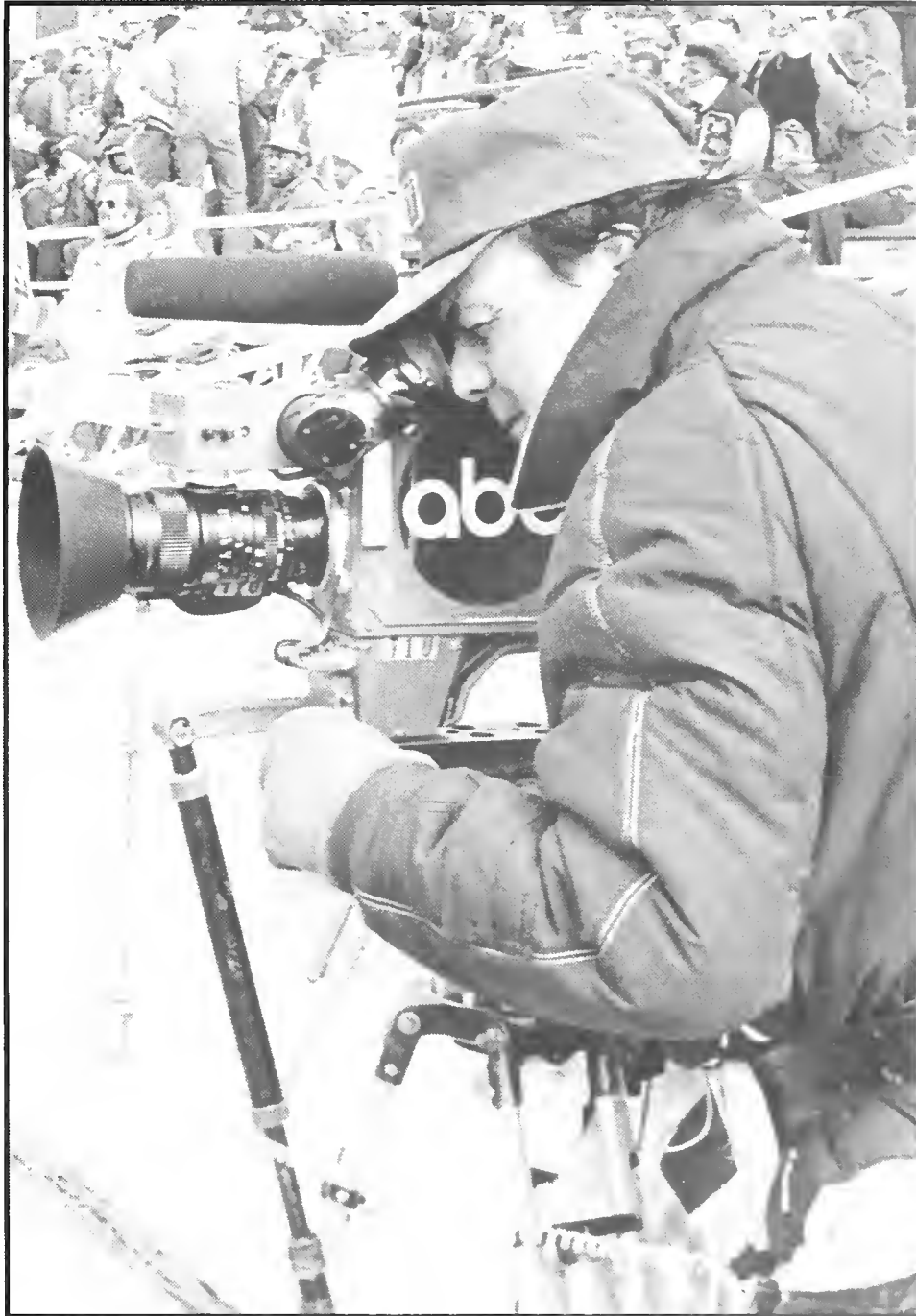

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Entrance to Press Box — Enter the press box via the press elevator located midway at the base of the west side of Memorial Stadium (press box side of the field). The elevator will go to all levels of the press box. Credentials which are not mailed may be picked up at the "Press Will Call" window at the midpoint of the west side of the stadium, not at the press door. No parking passes will be left at the "Press Will Call" window. Persons picking up credentials will be required to furnish positive identification. All credentials are non-transferable.

Press Box Levels — There are three levels in the Memorial Stadium Press Box: 1) Working Press Deck (print media); 2) Photo Deck (photographers, home/visiting radio & TV networks); and 3) Special Guests Booths (also includes booths for home/visiting coaching staffs).

Working Press Deck (level 1) — This level is reserved for print media, non-originating radio and TV reporters, and Sports Information personnel only. Non-workers will not be seated in this or any other area of the press box. Several charge-a-call telephones are located on this level. If you have concerns about meeting tight deadlines, we strongly encourage you to order your own telephone (see "Telephones" section).

Photo Deck (level 2) — This deck offers a spacious area for all broadcast video photographers who are covering the game. This area also will be used for video-taping by each of the coaching staffs. Additionally, the photo deck includes booth space for home and visiting radio and TV networks. This level also contains the food service area for the press box.

Special Guests (level 3) — This level contains individual booths for the University of Illinois' special guests, as well as separate booths for home and visiting coaching staffs.

Sidelines

The University of Illinois follows NCAA and Big Ten rules regarding media representatives on the sidelines. Photographers are not permitted to shoot between the 25-yard lines and they must wear both a sideline credential and a photo armband at all times. Violators of the policy will be escorted from the stadium.

Credentials

Press Box — All members of the media covering the game in a working capacity must secure appropriate credentials in advance from Mike Pearson, UI Sports Information Director. We would appreciate receiving these requests at least two weeks before the date of the game. Requests for working space in the press box, sideline photo passes and parking passes must be made on your affiliation's letterhead stationery. In the event of heavy demand for credentials for a particular game, requests will be prioritized according to published circulation numbers. Be specific when requesting the type of credential needed. Spouses, dates, non-workers, and children will not be permitted in the press box. Media agencies violating this policy will not be issued credentials for future games. The press box is open to the media three hours prior to kickoff.

Sideline Credentials — Photographers with game-day sideline credentials must enter through the press box entrance on the west side of Memorial Stadium. To secure an armband, photographers must go through the west Great Hall into the stadium, down the steps, onto the playing field, and proceed directly to the Photo Lounge located under the south stands. Your game credential alone will not gain admittance to the sidelines. You must have a game armband! Refreshments are available for photographers in the Photo Lounge before each game and at halftime.

Road-Game Credentials — Media credential requests for Fighting Illini road games should be addressed to the Sports Information Director of the host institution. Be specific when requesting the type of credential needed. Opponent SID telephone numbers are listed in the "Opponents" section of this media guide.

Parking

Media parking is located across First Street, just west of Memorial Stadium. Parking credentials should be requested at the same time game-day working credentials are requested. If time permits (at least five working days), both credentials will be mailed. Those who request parking passes the week of the game must pick them up by no later than 5 p.m. Friday at the UI Sports Information Office (115 Assembly Hall).

Hotel Rooms

The Sports Information Office has a limited number of rooms reserved in the Champaign-Urbana area. Please contact SID secretary Janice Revell at least one week in advance to reserve accommodations.

Pregame and Postgame Services

Play-by-play, halftime and complete final statistics, quote sheets, and pregame and postgame notes are all regular services on game day.

Postgame — Coach Lou Tepper and selected UI players will be available approximately 10-15 minutes after the conclusion of the game, and will be brought to the interview room (located on the ground floor of the football facility in the northeast corner of Memorial Stadium). A member of the UI SID staff will escort media members to the Illinois interview area and will leave the press box with approximately three minutes remaining in the game. Those interested in audio-taping grouped interviews should connect their recorders to the distribution amplifier provided. Output from the device is microphone level, terminated in 1/8" two-conductor plugs and jacks, or three-pin standard microphone male connectors.

The visiting SID will lead media down to the visitor's interview area, located on the patio level of the northwest corner of the stadium.

Telephones

Telephone lines in the press box must be ordered at least one week in advance of the game(s) for which they are needed. The orders should be addressed to Tony Mangano of Illinois Bell (312/727-5194, during regular business hours). No telephone lines or instruments are available through the UI Sports Information Office. Several charge-a-call phones are located on the Working Press Deck (level 1). In addition, a pay telephone is located on the second level of the press box.

Coach Tepper Interviews

The best time to interview Coach Tepper is each Tuesday during the season at his weekly press luncheon (Memorial Stadium Varsity Room, 11:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m.). The Big Ten Conference is discontinuing its weekly teleconference call, but Coach Tepper will be available to media for a special teleconference call on Tuesdays. For more information about a specific time for the Tepper teleconference call, please contact the UI Sports Information office.

If you are unable to attend the Tuesday press luncheons, a major portion of Coach Tepper's presentation will be replayed on tape Tuesday afternoon at 3 p.m. CT. For further information or instructions, call Sports Information at 217/333-1391.

Please coordinate all telephone interviews for Coach Tepper through the UI Sports Information office. He is also available for brief comments at the conclusion of daily practice sessions (Monday through Thursday). Requests must be made at least one day in advance.



Media Procedures for Interviews with University of Illinois Coaches, Athletes and Administrators

To facilitate the schedules of Division of Intercollegiate Athletics' (DIA) coaches and administrators and to expedite media requests, the University of Illinois Sports Information Office encourages media personnel to arrange interview requests through the Sports Information staff. Whenever circumstances prevent media personnel the time or opportunity to follow this procedure, DIA coaches and administrators are encouraged to accommodate media requests. Coaches and administrators have the flexibility to establish and maintain relationships with media that accommodate their respective schedules. This interview procedure is designed to enhance the availability of DIA staff members to answer questions from the media at a time which best facilitates each individual's schedule. Telephone calls to the homes of DIA staff members from the media may be made upon consent of the individual coach or staff member.

Interview requests from the media for University of Illinois student-athletes should be arranged through the Sports Information Office. Media personnel are asked not to call the student-athlete at his residence.

In most situations, the most convenient opportunity for media interviews is following the team practice sessions. If this is not a convenient time for the media, return telephone calls from the athletes to the media will be arranged. The student-athletes' academic endeavors are of the utmost importance, and they will not be asked to miss classes for purposes of a media interview. In most situations, student-athletes are not available on the day of scheduled intercollegiate competition until after the event is completed.

UI football players will be available for interviews on Mondays and Tuesdays only, either after practice or by telephone. Monday and Tuesday evenings are reserved for phone interviews with out-of-town media. A note will be left on the player's locker, asking him to return your call. Selected players will be brought to the weekly press luncheon each Tuesday. Media are encouraged to make specific requests.

Players have been instructed not to talk to media who haven't coordinated their requests through Sports Information. The team lockerroom and training room are off limits to media personnel.

Media Luncheons

All media personnel who regularly cover Illinois football are invited to these weekly, usually held at the Ray Eliot Varsity Room in the southeast corner of Memorial Stadium every Tuesday during the football season. Parking is avail-

able in the Assembly Hall parking lot in the northeast quadrant (entering off Fourth Street). Please do not park in the Varsity Room lot as it is a rented lot for other DIA employees. Your vehicle could be ticketed if you choose to park at the Varsity Room lot. Coach Tepper and selected players will be available for interviews, as will opposing coaches (by telephone). The luncheons get underway at 11 a.m. and will normally conclude by 1 p.m. The first Illinois football media luncheon of 1992 will be Tuesday, September 1. Luncheons will not be held during weeks when Fighting Illini games are not scheduled.

Big Ten Satellite Uplink

The Big Ten will provide a 30-minute video highlight service via satellite uplink. Television stations can preview the coming week's Big Ten games each Thursday. For satellite coordinates or more information, please contact either the Big Ten Communications Office (708/605-0110) or the UI Sports Information Office.

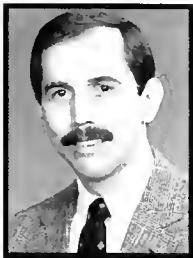
Mike Pearson

information field. He resides in Urbana with his wife, Lynne, and his daughter, Jennifer.

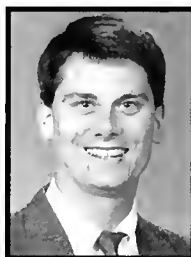
Kent Brown

The goal of each sports program within the Division of Intercollegiate Athletics at the University of Illinois is to strive toward success. The Division of Intercollegiate Athletics has taken a comprehensive approach to the success of the student-athlete. The PACE program (Personal Achievement in Career and Education) is designed to meet the total needs of the student-athlete. Those needs being served by the PACE program are: 1) the student's objectives as a scholar; 2) the student's requirements as an athlete, and 3) the student's personal goals as an individual.

This comprehensive balance of academic excellence, athletic achievement and personal well-being is stressed daily by the administrative staff and coaches. Inevitably, a student-athlete's playing days will end, but with the help of the UI's PACE program, each Fighting Illini athlete will be fully prepared for career and personal challenges ahead.

Among the elements stressed by the academic services department to assure student-athlete success are counseling and tutorial services, a monitoring program and a state-of-the-art computer laboratory.

Athletically, the University of Illinois has long supported a broad-based sports program. Its coaching staff and facilities are among the nation's best. The UI's support units include excellent staffs for recruiting, equipment, facility maintenance, fund raising, publicity and promotion. Its sports medicine staff not only assists student-athletes in strength training and conditioning, but also in personal health maintenance.

As important as the UI's commitment is to the student-athlete's performance in the classroom and on the

field, it also considers the individual's spiritual and emotional needs, and his/her career objectives. Fighting Illini student-athletes are afforded the opportunity to attend a variety of seminars during their collegiate experience, helping them enhance their future following athletics. Among the seminars offered are those in career placement, financial planning, time and stress management, sexual harassment, drug and alcohol education and player/agent relations. The Division of Intercollegiate Athletics also sponsors a student athletic advisory board, which is made up of representatives from all 19 Fighting Illini intercollegiate athletic teams.

The strong relationships built within the vast Illinois alumni networking system provide excellent opportunities for all student-athletes, whether it be for summer jobs, internships or, ultimately, in career placement after graduation. Once the individual's career is established, the DIA asks for his/her participation in a follow-up program that allows current student-athletes to benefit from

their predecessors' experiences. Former student-athletes are asked to return to campus for seminars and discussions that serve to provide guidance and understanding for future graduates.

While at the University of Illinois, student-athletes are encouraged to participate in the DIA's community-outreach program. It is just one part of the complete commitment to success made at the University of Illinois. This commitment to success is not a one-time event for UI student-athletes, but rather an on-going practice.

The University's commitment to providing the richest possible educational

environment is seen throughout the campus, from the nation's third largest academic library, to support for innovations in computer-aided instruction and nationally recognized programs and services for disabled students. The Undergraduate Library offers extensive instructional programs on using the library and its services, including library tours, computer workshops, reference services and term-paper research counseling. The University's progressive residence hall system provides a full range of programs and services designed to support each student's academic pursuits.

The University of Illinois also administers an extensive study abroad program. More than 600 Illinois students study abroad each year in nearly 40 countries, including Japan, Great Britain, Brazil, and China.

Graduation

While the University of Illinois football team has been piling up impressive numbers on the field over the past four years, it also has achieved outstanding marks in terms of its graduation rate. The Fighting Illini's football graduation rate is among the best in the nation.

Since Coach Lou Tepper joined the Fighting Illini staff in 1988, 57 of 66 total players will have earned their diplomas, as of September, 1992.

In fact, the team's 86 per cent graduation rate tops not only the 65 per cent mark by all Illinois athletes combined (those who entered the University of Illinois in 1984-85), but also the 76 per cent rate of all UI students. The graduation rate of UT's last four football senior classes is nearly double the national graduation average by all student-athletes.

Of the nine players who haven't graduated, nearly all of them are only one or two classes away from earning a bachelor's degree.

All 21 members of the 1991 senior class were graduated by the University, including seven men who are currently members of National Football League teams.

University of Illinois football has had its share of outstanding scholars over the past four years, including the only two Big Ten players who were Academic All-America selections in 1991. Mike Hopkins, a recent January graduate, won first-team honors, compiling a 4.76 grade-point average in his aeronautical/astronautical engineering major. John Wright, a 1992 Illini senior, was a second-team Academic All-America pick with his 4.67 GPA in speech communication.

Wright will be aiming to become the University's eighth first-team selection this coming fall.

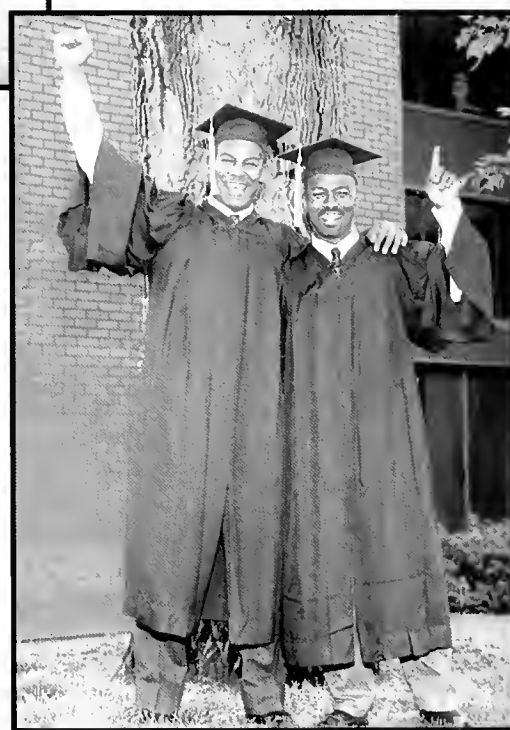

pursing a law degree at the U of I. Both received NCAA postgraduate scholarships to help fund their educations.

tion rate among football players, I won't be completely satisfied until we reach 100 percent. We are more proud about our athletes' accomplishments in the classroom than we will ever be about their feats on the field. Our objective is to strike a balance of excellence in both academics and athletics."

All-America guard Tim Simpson and four-time All-America miler Len Sitko were named co-1992 Illinois Male Athletes of the Year, and Renee Heiken and Tonja Buford were selected as co-1992 Female Athletes of the Year at the second annual Fighting Illini Scholar-Athlete All-Star Banquet last May.

The banquet, attended by nearly 500 at the Kranert Center for the Performing Arts, serves as the annual awards presentation for outstanding University of Illinois student-athletes.

Guests included Chancellor Morton Weir, Big Ten Commissioner Jim Delany, Jim Dawson '67, Robert Bachman '67, Lisa Robinson '82, and more than 150 graduating student-athletes and Marching Illini members.

Dawson and Bachman were honored as the Silver Anniversary recipients of the Athlete of the Year and Big Ten Medal of Honor awards. Robinson was honored as the 10th Anniversary recipient of the women's Big Ten Medal of Honor award.

Simpson earned first-team All-America honors for the Fighting Illini as an offensive guard, and started every game of his career, 48 consecutive games. He graduated in December and was recently drafted by the Cleveland Browns.

Sitko is one of the top middle-distance runners in the Midwest, earning All-America honors in cross country, indoor, and outdoor track. He was the Athlete of the Meet at the 1992 Drake Relays.

Heiken is one of the most decorated women's amateur golfers in Illinois history, winning the state amateur title twice. She won the 1991 Big Ten Championship and finished fourth at the 1992 NCAA Championship. Heiken was named the 1992 Big Ten Golfer of the Year.

Buford, a 12-time Big Ten champion, dominated the 1992 Big Ten indoor and outdoor meets, leading the Fighting Illini to the Big Ten title and earning 1992 Big Ten Athlete of the Championships and Athlete of the Year for indoor and outdoor track. Buford owns UI varsity records in the 55-meter hurdles, 300-meter dash and was the 1992 NCAA 400-meter hurdles champion.

In the Newcomer of the Year category, freshman track sensation Marko Koers and freshman Big Ten golf champion Becky Biehl were honored.

Fighting Illini football co-captain defensive back Mike Hopkins and basketball center Kate Riley were the winners of the 1992 Fighting Illini

Spirit Awards. Hopkins and Riley were also the winners of the Big Ten Medal of Honor, which was presented by Big Ten Commissioner Delany. The Big Ten Medal of Honor has been awarded to students exhibiting proficiency in athletics and academics since 1914, adding the female recipient in 1982.

All awards were voted on by a committee composed of Fighting Illini coaches, administrators, and staff.

Outstanding Scholar-Athlete awards were given to the male and female student-athletes in each class with the highest grade point average. The male recipients were golf's senior Michael Allen (4.72 in chemical engineering), junior Shawn Schleizer (4.47 in kinesiology) from track, and sophomore baseball player Jason Schumaker (4.83 in commerce and business). Female Scholar-Athlete award winners were senior track and cross country standout Laura Simmering (4.84 in education), junior Becky Gaa (4.86 mechanical engineering) from gymnastics, and sophomore basketball player Tonya Booker (4.93 pre-journalism).

The women's cross country team and the men's golf squad were named the school's Outstanding Team Scholars. The women's cross country team, under the direction of Head Coach Marybeth Spencer Dyson, accumulated a cumulative team grade point average of 4.19. The men's golf squad, coached by Ed Beard, also posted a 4.19 team GPA.

Fighting Illini in the Bowl

Postseason play is a common occurrence for the Fighting Illini football team, which has played in 10 Bowl games in its history, including four Rose Bowls. From Pasadena to Tampa Bay and everywhere in between, the Fighting Illini have been part of postseason play and the airwaves in late December or Jan. 1

In the past 10 years, Illinois has played in seven Bowl games. Heading into the 1992 season, the Illini were riding the crest of four-consecutive postseason Bowl trips. The most recent trip was in December, when the Fighting Illini traveled to El Paso, Texas, to meet UCLA in the John Hancock Bowl. The seven-day trip, not only included a football game, but provided an international experience for the Fighting Illini, who experienced Mexican and Southwestern cuisine, scenery and culture on the trip.

"Bowl-trip experiences are unlike anything in college athletics," Illinois Head Coach Lou Tepper said at the John Hancock Bowl. "You talk to Division I-AA coaches and basketball coaches, who have to go through the playoffs, and it's just the same routine all week. Here, we've got a week where our kids are going to learn something about Mexicans. They're going to learn about El Paso; they're going to learn about Texas. They're going to learn a great deal about culture that they would otherwise never experience."

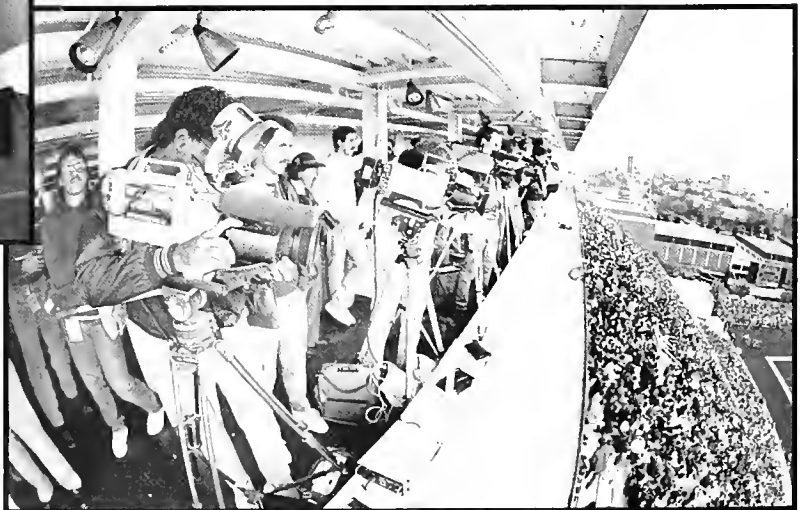

Television Coverage

University of Illinois football and its players receive extensive local and national television coverage. ESPN, ABC, NBC and CBS have all televised Fighting Illini football games. In fact, Illinois appeared in the first college football game to ever be broadcast nationally, when it defeated UCLA in the 1947 Rose Bowl. Last year more than half of Illinois' games were broadcast on national television, including the CBS broadcast of the John Hancock Bowl.

Locally, Illinois players are frequently the subject of television interviews and often appear on sportscasts throughout the state. Fighting Illini players are also featured on a regular basis on the weekly "Lou Tepper" and "Illini Sports Weekly" TV shows.



Walk-ons Play Instrumental Role in Success of Fighting Illini

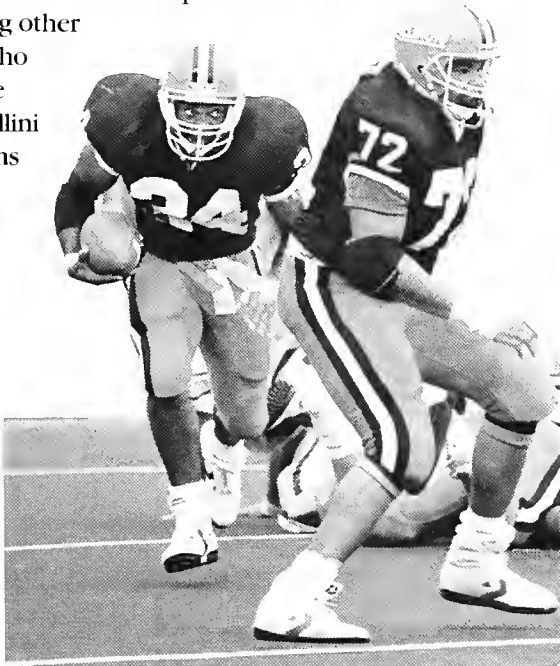
It's a fact that not every football standout in high school earns a scholarship to play for a major college program, but that's not to say that there's a lack of opportunity—especially at the University of Illinois.

Illinois has a thriving walk-on program that has led numerous players to have the chance to ultimately earn scholarships and contribute to Fighting Illini victories.

Several Illini walk-ons have been major successes, including 1991 first-team Academic All-American Mike Hopkins. Hopkins joined the Illini as a walk-on in 1987 and was red-shirted. The following season he saw action on special teams, but for the next three seasons he not only contributed to the success of the team, he starred. On the field, he started four games as a junior and all 12 games his senior season. Last year as an Illini co-captain, Hopkins won honorable mention All-Big Ten honors at strong safety, totaling 95 tackles and seven tackles for loss.

Two running back walk-ons from Chicago have been Illinois' Most Valuable Players the last two seasons. Kameno Bell won MVP laurels last season, leading the team in rushing (664 yards) and receiving (64 receptions for 503 yards). Howard Griffith, the 1990 Illini MVP, was a second-team All-Big Ten selection, leading Illinois in rushing (1,115 yards) and scoring (90 points). Griffith set an NCAA record for touchdowns in a single game by scoring eight against Southern Illinois in 1990. Griffith was drafted by the Indianapolis Colts and currently is a member of the AFC champion Buffalo Bills.

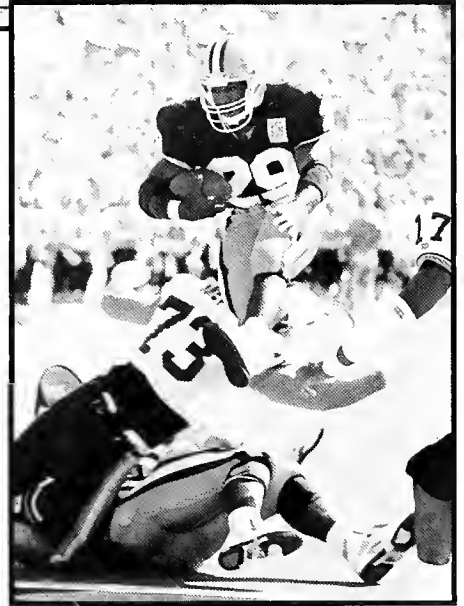

placekickers Chris White, Doug Higgins and Mike Bass, Nos. 1, 2 and 3 on the all-time Illinois scoring list. Yet another, Dave Harbour, an 1980s Illini letterwinner for two seasons after walking on with the team, eventually became a member of the NFL's Washington Redskins.

"Our walk-ons are vital to the success of our program," Tepper said. "There's proof that those who excel have a chance to be rewarded with a scholarship. Two of our current walk-ons, Gavin Pearlman and Alfred Pierce, were given scholarships this past spring. We couldn't be as competitive as we are without them."

Fighting Illini in the NFL

Since 1987, 17 Fighting Illini football players have been drafted by the National Football League, including six in 1991 and three in 1992. Illinois football players also frequently sign as free agents with NFL clubs.

Thirteen Illinois players have been first-round draft choices, including four in the past 10 years. Two Illini were picked in the first round of the 1965 draft, and in 1990, quarterback Jeff George became Illinois' first-ever No. 1 draft pick, when he was selected by the Indianapolis Colts.

Eighteen Fighting Illini were represented on the rosters of 10 different NFL teams in 1991. Fighting Illini have also been represented in 17 of 26 Super Bowls; six Illinois alumni won Super Bowl rings: Darryl Byrd (L.A. Raiders), Jim Grabowski (Green Bay), Ray Nitschke (Green Bay), Preston Pearson (Pittsburgh, Dallas), Jack Squirek (L.A. Raiders) and Calvin Thomas (Chicago). Last year both Henry Jones and Adam Ligner played in Super Bowl XXVI as members of the AFC champion Buffalo Bills.

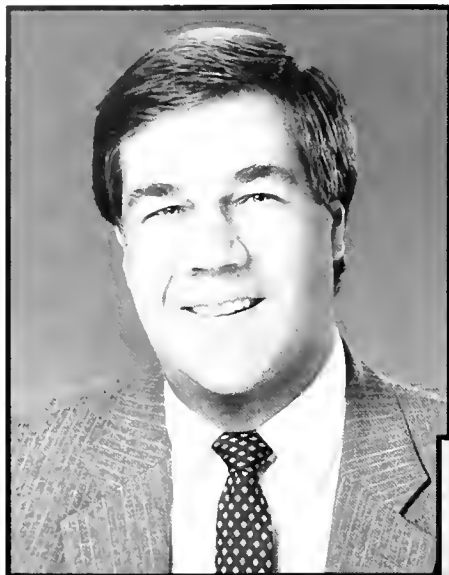

Dennis Swanson, president of ABC Sports and Daytime and Children's Programming, earned both a bachelor's and master's degree at the University of Illinois.



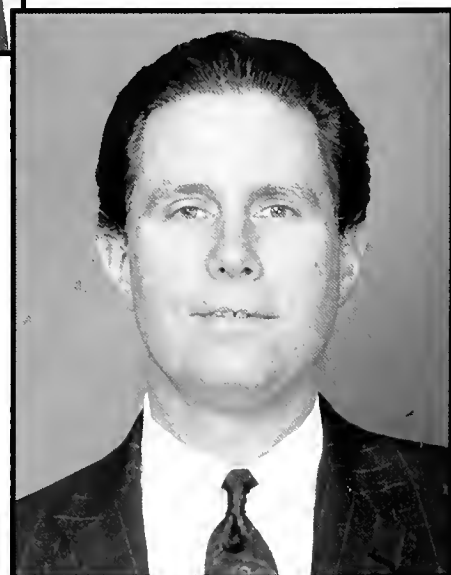
