

CARRIER AND CONSIGNEE FOR LOSS OF AND DAMAGE TO GOODS, ETC., WE WOULD

CALL THE ATTENTION OF OUR CUSTOMERS TO THE FOLLOWING:



SOON as goods are delivered in good order and condition in Jersey City or New York, and a receipt taken for same, our responsibility ceases. Should the Transportation Company insist on our signing a release or other document in reference to their liability, we must comply; this will not, however, in any way affect the right of the consignee (who is the real owner) to recover damages for any carelessness or negligence on the part of the carrier. It should be distinctly understood that we, as shippers, have no legal claim on the goods after they are delivered to the Transportation Company properly consigned, as the ownership has passed from us to the consignee. We will, however, endeavor to assist customers in getting claims adjusted.

We make a great variety of Radiators, and many different sizes, and have a great many customers. Hence it is absolutely impossible to remember what kind of Radiator, size, and style of tapping each particular customer may use.

To avoid mistakes in ordering, we would respectfully request our patrons to specify figure and size in our book.

All Regular Steam Radiators are tapped 1" \times 34" Right Hand, unless otherwise specified.

All Regular Hot Water Radiators are tapped 114" × 114" Right Hand, unless otherwise specified.

All measurements in this book are as accurately given as it is possible to get them, but as foundry castings vary in size, even when taken from the same pattern, a fact which all practical men, especially foundrymen understand and appreciate, we wish to state, that we do not hold ourselves liable for damages when the dimensions of the goods vary somewhat from those given. They are the average dimensions and we do not think that users will experience any difficulty in following them.

All claims for corrections or deductions must be made within ten days after receipt of goods.

Terms, Cash in Thirty days unless otherwise agreed upon.

Customers will protect their interests by examining goods to see that they have not been damaged in transit, before signing receipts for them.

Boxing and crating, when required, charged for at cost.

No goods insured, unless so ordered.

Full instructions as to making and shipping, must accompany each order. Where no instructions are given, all goods will be made in the regular way and shipped by the most expeditious route.

Permission must be received from us before any goods can be returned; and unless other arrangements are made, the party returning must in all cases pay freight and expenses, and be responsible for any damage to the goods until same are received by us.

As all parts of the "BUNDY" Radiator are interchangeable, to substitute a loop, base or top, or even change the height of a Radiator, it is not necessary to return the Radiator to our Works, as such change can be made at the building, by giving exact size when ordering required part.

Please observe the following in writing a Cipher message:

FIRST. Begin every Cipher word with a Capital letter.

SECOND. Whenever a blank occurs in a sentence, the word or words supplying such blank must follow the Cipher word of the sentence.

SAMPLE MESSAGE.

IN PLAIN LANGUAGE, 38 WORDS.

Ship via Star Union Line two three by twelve, four two by twenty, ten one by eighteen, all extended surface forty-two inches high, tapped one and one-quarter by one inch left hand iron tops, opposite ends.

IN CIPHER, 13 WORDS.

Hyena two Cattle, four Cargo, ten Calico, all Crumble Dotage Frantic Cupola Future.



T IS a conceded fact that buildings cannot be properly heated by hot air furnaces unless they are entirely surrounded by other buildings, or protected from cold winds in some way or other.

Even when a building is properly heated by a furnace, the quality of air is not that which is most desirable to sustain human life; first, because it is devitalized with metal heated from 1200 to 1500 degrees Fahr., which robs it of all its exhilarating and tonic properties; secondly, because it is almost always charged with dust; and thirdly, it has been rendered impure by carbonic oxide, which is generated in a

furnace whenever there is an insufficient amount of oxygen introduced into it to produce perfect combustion; said carbonic oxide passing through all heated cast iron almost as readily as atmospheric air passes through any textile fabric.

Summarizing these various objections to furnace heated air, we find it under its best conditions devitalizing. Metal heated above even 250 degrees begins to devitalize atmosphere brought in contact with it; what then must be its effect upon air when heated to a temperature of from 1200 to 1500 degrees. We find it frequently charged with dust and fine ashes, and very often poisoned by carbonic oxide, to say nothing of the aptitude of all furnace heated houses to be extremely cold at the point of greatest exposure, on account of the extreme buoyancy of heated air which is overcome by the pressure of cold air of greater density.

Heating by Hot Water or low pressure Steam, has none of the disadvantages mentioned in regard to the furnace heated houses. The metal of Radiators and boilers is never heated by the use of steam to a detrimental degree—namely 250 degrees, unless from 40 to 45 pounds pressure per square inch is resorted to, which is both unusual and unnecessary in the heating apparatus of the present day.

In Hot Water heating, by the open tank system, the pressure is exceedingly small; not more than one pound to every 28.96 inches of vertical water column, and the temperature of the Radiators throughout the house is seldom greater than 175 degrees Fahr.—a temperature 75 degrees below the point where devitalization commences; which point it is impossible to reach in Hot Water Heating.

It has been sometimes argued that houses heated by Direct Radiation are not properly ventilated; this is the case sometimes, but arises from a neglect of the occupants of the building rather than from a radical defect in the system. It is well, (and we always recommend it) to use a certain amount of Indirect Radiation with every system of Steam or Hot Water Heating, as Indirect Radiators are so placed in connection with flues, ducts and registers, connected directly with the outer air as to draw into a house a sufficient quantity of fresh out-door air for ventilation; and if simple outlets in the shape of grates or flues are provided for removing foul air, the ventilation will be constant and sufficient to supply the needs and wants for breathing purposes without being wasteful of fuel; and as Direct Radiators are always placed at the points of greatest exposure, which absolutely insures a thorough diffusion of heat, they do not, as is the case with a furnace, leave the coldest points unprotected.

The objection Fire Insurance Companies have to flues for conveying hot air from the furnace through the wooden partitions to registers, is wholly overcome by the use of Indirect Steam Heat, as the flues are never run from the boilers, but from the Indirect Radiators, which are never near the boiler, and are oftentimes 100 feet away from it, insuring safety from fire and lessening the rate of insurance.

Peating by Steam Direct and Indirect Radiation.



HE amount of Steam Direct or Indirect Radiation required to heat a given space depends on the following conditions, viz: Whether building is protected or isolated; structure, whether brick, stone or wood; if wood, whether sheathed and papered; if brick or stone, whether walls are solid or hollow; points of compass, direction taken by prevailing winds; relative location of rooms to one another; whether room has bay window or not, or has maximum or minimum of glass surface, etc., etc.

Without this information it is impracticable to correctly estimate the amount of Radiating Surface required, and even with it, an Engineer on the premises is better able to judge of the requirements of the case. We are perfectly willing and glad to give advice on this subject or

answer any questions that may be asked us, but we do not hold ourselves responsible for the heating of any building, and wish what we say to be taken more in the light of suggestions given for the benefit of our friends and customers.

We are frequently asked if we know the name of some good book treating on the subject of Steam Heating. We answer these inquiries by recommending a work entitled "Steam Heating for Buildings, or Hints to Steam Fitters," written by a very able Engineer. While it is impracticable to adopt any fixed rule for computing the amount of Radiating Surface necessary to heat a given space, still the following may serve as somewhat of a guide, but please to bear in mind that the figures given are based on New York City climate.

To ascertain the amount of Steam Direct Radiation necessary to heat a certain room, divide its cubical contents, found by multiplying its length, breadth and height together, by 50, 60, 70, or some other figure as the exigencies of the case may make necessary, or for Steam Indirect Radiation by 35, 40, or 50.

FOR AN ISOLATED RESIDENCE. To compute the amount of Steam Direct Radiation necessary to heat a North or West Room, divide the cubical contents by 60; South or East Room by 70; Bay Window Room, Hall. Bath or Living Room by 60; and Sleeping Room by 70.

For Steam Indirect Radiation for the 1st floor, divide the cubical contents by 35; 2d floor, by 40; and 3d floor by 50.

FOR A RESIDENCE IN A ROW. For Steam Direct Radiation for a North or West Room, Bay-window Room, Hall, Bath or a Living Room, divide the cubical contents by 70: Sleeping Room by 80.

For Steam Indirect Radiation, 1st floor by 40. 2d and 3d floors by 50.

FOR A BUSINESS BLOCK. For Steam Direct Radiation for a North or West Room divide by 75; South or East Room by 85, and an inside Room or Hall by 100.

For Steam Indirect Radiation, 1st floor, divide by 40; 2nd floor and above by 50.

FOR A CHURCH OR OTHER PUBLIC BUILDING. For Steam Direct Radiation, divide by 100; and for Steam Indirect Radiation by 50. A good arrangement for heating such buildings is an equal amount of both Direct and Indirect Radiation or two-thirds Direct and one-third Indirect.



Some of the Advantages of Hot Water Heating.



FIRST.-Absolute Safety.

There can be no danger of explosion in a Hot Water Heating apparatus for it is continually open to the atmosphere through the expansion tank and the only possible pressure on it is the weight of the water in the vertical pipes.

SECOND.-Simplicity and Ease of Management.

All that is necessary is to keep a fire in the heater. No more skill is necessary to manage it, than an ordinary kitchen range. The domestic in the house, or a child can do all that is necessary to be done.

THIRD.-Economy in Fuel.

The slow fire which is all that this system requires is extremely economical in fuel, and as water is a most rapid absorbent of heat, very little heat from the fire is allowed to escape unused up the chimney.

FOURTH.-Noiselessness.

The Hot Water in this system is an unbroken column, kept continually in circulation, from the fact that water of a higher temperature, being lighter, rises, and the colder water, being heavier, falls and takes its place, and all is done without the slightest noise of any kind.

FIFTH.-Perfectly Controlled.

The Hot Water circulation can be checked by partially closing the valve, which is always set with each Radiator; or by entirely closing the valve when no heat is required. In either case the circulation in the balance of the apparatus is not affected in the slightest degree. A uniform heat can be secured at all times and no heat wasted.

SIXTH -Healthfulness

No argument is necessary to prove that a uniform temperature is highly conducive to good health and long life, and as a Hot Water Apparatus can be controlled and regulated to a nicety, so as to give a uniform heat at all times, its healthfulness is all-apparent. Ask any Doctor his opinion and he will tell you the same thing, and will, probably add that the air in a house heated by Hot Water has greater humidity and that the occupants are less subject to colds, coughs, catarrh and other diseases of the throat and lungs.

SEVENTH .- Durability.

A good Hot Water Apparatus, such as we offer you, will last as long as any building in which it may be placed, providing it is given ordinary care. It is continually filled with water, which water having been frequently heated, has had all the air driven out of it, and so the apparatus cannot rust, except it be very slightly. We have never known of a single instance where our apparatus has given out except where the most inexcusable and gross carelessness has been exercised. We recommend that the same water which has been in the system during the winter remain there during the summer.

EIGHTH - The Bundy Combination Steam and Hot Water Radiator.

This Radiator can be used for Hot Water Heating in mild weather and Steam Heating in extreme cold weather. The change from Hot Water to Steam or from Steam to Hot Water can be quickly made and any one capable of taking care of either apparatus can do it. Where a building is to be rented this system is a great advantage, for tenants may express a preference for one or the other system and all may be suited in this way, and without additional expense.

Heating by Hot Water Direct and Indirect Radiation.

The amount of Hot Water Radiation necessary to heat a given space depends upon the same conditions enumerated on the preceding page. It may serve as somewhat of a guide to know that the amount of Hot Water Direct Radiation necessary to heat an isolated residence in New York City, is found by dividing the cubical contents of a North or West Room, Bay Window Room, Hall, Bath or Living Room, by 35 and Sleeping Rooms on the 2d floor by 40, and 3d floor by 50.

Indirect Hot Water Radiation should be used discreetly and in most cases for ventilating purposes only. It can often be adopted to good advantage in the Hall, but an Engineer who thoroughly understands his business should be consulted in the matter.

Bundy One Row Steam Direct Radiator.



Fig. 1 represents the Bundy One Row Steam Direct Radiator, which is without exception the most powerful heating Radiator on the market. It is continually surrounded on all sides by freely circulating air, and being marrow, occupying only 5½ inches of floor space in width, it takes up scarcely more space than is required for an ordinary 1 inch pipe cell. In every impartial test of Radiators the Bundy One Row has always come out ahead; sometimes excelling by 40 per cent., and never less than 10 per cent. Bundy Two Row Steam Direct Radiator.



Fig. 2 represents the Bundy Two Row Steam Direct Radiator which has an open base in the form of a loop (see Fig. 34), through which sufficient air passes to the inside surface of the Radiator. A Radiator with small air openings, or none at all, cannot compare favorably with the Bundy which has the largest openings of any Radiator made. When used with feed and return on the same end (see Fig. 30), this radiator is equivalent to a One Row Radiator of double the length, owing to the septum in the base, and with our Partition Base one-half of the Radiator can be in use while the other half remains idle, or the entire Radiator may be used at one time. This is a good Radiator for the Direct-Indirect Box Base System (see Figs. 24, 25 and 36). For different ways of tapping see Fig. 30.







Fig. 35 represents the Bundy One Row Hot Water Direct Radiator, which is, without exception, the most powerful Hot Water Heating Radiator on the market. It is made from the Bundy One Row Steam Radiator, which in appearance it resembles, and is very narrow, occupying in width scarcely more space than the ordinary one inch pipe coil. This Radiator holds the minimum amount of water per square foot of surface, and hence the circulation is more rapid and the drain on the heater very much less than when any other style is used; in fact, the saving in fuel where the Bundy Radiator is used makes it the cheapest Radiator on the market. The ease with which the water, after surrendering its heat, falls perpendicularly and passes from this Radiator should commend its use to all desiring the best apparatus.

The cut shows a Radiator tapped for supply connection in the upper circulating chamber, where it can be furnished without extra charge when the overhead system of piping is used or the Radiator is wanted to set on the same or a lower level than the Hot Water Heater proper, but when goods are wanted tapped this way it should be noted on the order, otherwise the regular tapping in the base will be sent (see Fig. 36).









Fig. 8½ represents the Bundy Column and Circular Steam Direct Radiator of extra large size. When used as a Circular Radiator it has the appearance of Fig. 5 only much larger. This is, without exception, the largest portable Radiator manufactured in the world. The amount of heating surface it contains is very nearly equal to that found in a mile of inch pipe, and it is so arranged that a very large percentage of its surface is in the outer tier of loops, which, together with 41 liberal sized air spaces through the base, surrounds every part of the Radiator with freely circulating air, hence its great efficiency. As there are a large number of loops in this Radiator the base is a special make, having greater depth of capacity and higher legs, being 7" from floor to center of tapping, and the top also is thicker and stronger, so that the same loops that build with the regular base and top Radiators 36" high, with this base and top build 42" high, or instead of 42" they build 48", measuring in all cases from floor to top of screen or marble, whichever is used. When a maximum of heating surface is desired in the minimum space, this Radiator will be found to be just the thing. As in most cases this Radiator is wanted with Marble top, the price given only includes binder for Marble Top, but when wanted with Fret Work Iron Top, add \$60.00 to List Prices, or with a three inch thick Tennessee or Knoxville Marble top, bevel O. 







These closets set directly over the entire radiator, thus securing the desired temperature, and in no other Dining Room Radiator can food be maintained at so high a degree of heat.








Fig. 26 represents a cross-sectional view of a Bundy Steam and Hot Water Direct-Indirect Radiator, as set up for heating and ventilating. The superior points of this Radiator for this kind of work are self evident; the openings for the passage of air through the base are large and free (see Fig. 34), and compare favorably with those of other Padiators of this class which have openings less than one-third the size, and are nearly useless for ventilation for this kind of radiation; while openings for the passage of air through the Bundy loops into the room to be heated are long and narrow with two openings to each loop being 21" x 38 by the length of the loop-thereby giving many more openings than with wrought iron inch pipe Radiators.

Figs. 24 and 25 represent the Bundy Steam and Hot Water Direct-Indirect Radiator, extensively used in large buildings where direct heat, as well as good ventilation is required. The base is made in the form of a box fitting closely to the floor all around as per Fig. 24, when the fresh air is admitted under the Radiator through a hole in the floor, or an opening may be left in the back of the Base, as per Figs. 25 and 26. This latter plan is most adopted and goods are furnished this way, with an opening in the back 4" high and 8" long, when other instructions are not given. Among the many buildings heated with this Radiator are: The Standard Oil Company's Building, the United Bank Building, Public Schools, Nos. 17, 31, and 32 of N. Y. City, State Normal School, Albany, N. Y., and District School, Mt. Vernon, O.

Another advantage is that the base panels on our large Radiators can be removed while adjusting and connecting, or to inspect or clean under Radiator. Our small Radiators of this class are made with skirt and legs detached from base, thereby saving labor and expense in connecting up Radiator to cold air duct, and in adjusting Automatic Damper Regulators to close the cold air duct when the Radiator is cold to prevent freezing, and to open it when the Radiator is warm.

This system is economical and efficient and overcomes the difficulty of ventilating rooms where the air has become vitiated and deoxygenized by a large assembly of people, gas lights, and from other causes, by supplying fresh air that is warmed as it passes through Radiators, thus avoiding draughts of cold air that would come from ventilating by open windows.

The Board of Education of New York City, have recently used this method of ventilating class rooms in the public schools with marked success, thus avoiding the necessity of ventilating by open windows, which ruins the health of children sitting near a draught of cold air. Where no Indirect Radiators are used this plan of ventilation is indispensable.

NOTE.—This form of construction in Radiators is covered by Letters Patent. No. 117,675. Any infringement on the rights secured by this Patent will be subject to prompt legal proceedings.













Bundy Steam & Hot Water Direct Radiator Weasurements.











A BRIEF DESCRIPTION OF THE

Bundy Elite, Bundy Pyro and Bundy Pyro Wall Radiators.

(see Figs. 52 and 53), is a three-pipe construction; in other words each section has three barrels or tubes (patented July 3d, 1877), whereby the circulation is continually in a forward direction, up the central and down the two outside tubes. 

A BRIEF DESCRIPTION OF THE

BUNDY TRIUMPH AND BUNDY DEFIANCE RADIATORS.

THE BUNDY TRIUMPH RADIATOR

is in general form like the Elite as it is a three-pipe construction, but it is a plain Radiator and has a fret-work top.

THE SPECIAL PARABOLIC CURVE

(concave) is used in both Radiators and it very naturally enhances their efficiency. Ninety square feet, and often times less of Triumph and Elite Radiation will do as much work as one hundred feet of other sectional radiation, and when one considers that this means a saving of fuel and attention in proportion to the saving in surface it is very strong argument why the Elite and Triumph Radiators should be used.

THE DETACHABLE AND INTERCHANGEABLE ECCENTRIC TAPPED BUSHING

used in the Elite, Triumph and Defiance Radiators, as well as Climax and Perfect Indirect, allows all the waters of condensation to pass quickly from the Radiator on gravity action. This keeps the surface dry and in the very best condition for greatest efficiency, and should it be desirable to change the size of the piping connecting the Radiator, the bushing can easily be removed and another one used in its place.

THE BUNDY DEFIANCE RADIATOR

(see pages 86 and 87), is designed particularly for use where it is desirable to get in a low Radiator a maximum of surface in a minimum space occupied by the Radiator. It presents a neat appearance when set under a window surmounted by a handsome marble top or when placed in a recess in the wall. Sometimes it is placed behind screens with liberal sized openings through which the air passes into the rooms, and the screens are then decorated in keeping with the room. We know of a library where the screen is painted to represent the backs of books and the effect is very fine.







It occupies scarcely more space than a wall coil of inch pipe, and is by far more efficient, being perpendicular instead of horizontal surface, and so freeing itself of water of condensation much more quickly, is more durable for it is a well known fact that wrought inon rusts out more quickly than cast, especially in coils; and is certainly eleaper when the time consumed in building up coils is taken into consideration, and there are many more joints in coils and hence great hability to leaks.

The Pyro Wall has a handsome design and is just the thing for heating narrow halls and passage ways, and thousands of them have already been used for heating bath rooms where a single section is often times all that is required, and from that up to three or four sections.

There are two sizes of legs furnished with this Radiator, one 5" in diameter and the other 5" in diameter with 1" cut off the rear pertion so as to bring the Radiator closer to the wall, either of which is furnished without extra cost, but when parties wish the latter leg, so as to get the Radiator as close to the wall as possible, occupying less space even than a pipe coil, they should specify, in ordering, this size, otherwise the 5" circular leg will be sent.

The Bundy Defiance Bay Window Radiator when setting in a circle has a wedge-shaped space between all sections, the size of which, of course varies with each circle, and so it is impossible to give a table of specific dimensions suited to all cases. Also in an angular bay window there is such a shaped space at each angle or change of direction, but as a guide in the use of this Radiator please bear in mind that the sections are 4 thick, measuring from outside to outside of base, which includes a uniform space of \$\frac{1}{4}\$ between the front of all sections, whether at angles circles or straight.





Figs. 99 and 100 represent two views of the Bundy Improved Duplex Radiator Base with which the Bundy Two-row Radiator is made equivalent to three distinct sizes. The partition, P, divides the base into separate compartments, regulated and controlled by the valve V. The header D. is used for convenience and economy in connecting up, saving pipe and fitting, and cutting of the floor. To secure the necessary room for the header the high leg Bundy Base has to be used, in which the center of tapping, for any size of hole, is 4½" from floor; this allows ample space for cleaning out under the Radiator, and for free circulation of air.

In point of economy the Bundy Duplex Base saves in fuel alone, many times its slight additional cost in a very few weeks, and its value in preventing over heating of apartments, and the perfect control of temperature it gives, cannot be over estimated. The sudden change of temperature when an entire Radiator is opened or closed, makes it necessary during the moderate weather of the fall, winter and spring, representing fully 75 per cent, of the heating season, to turn on and off the Radiator at short intervals, engendering much loss of time, wear of valves and general inconvenience, all of which the Bundy Duplex Base effectually prevents.

For heating of hotels, business blocks, churches, schools, theatres, residences, and in fact every style of building known to modern architecture, the Bundy Duplex Base will be found of value. It represents an investment, the profits of which are greater than can possibly be secured in any other way. 











Fig. 14½ represents the Bundy Angle Indirect Radiator with loops set at an angle. This form of Radiator has all of the advantages of a vertical tube Radiator in circulation as the air is easily expelled and the condensation has a free passage to outlet. The air to be warmed in passing through a stack of this kind is more thoroughly broken up and warmed than by any other on account of the double pipes. These Radiators are durable and efficient for high or low pressure steam. They were first used in the Hudson River State Asylum at Poughkeepsie, N. Y., in competition with other kinds of Indirect Radiators, where they gave such perfect satisfaction that they were approved and used in the recent additions to the heating apparatus in 1884-5.



All joints are screw-thread connections, iron to iron, no packings, bolts, nuts, rods, washers, etc., being used anywhere; hence leaks of any kind very rarely if ever occur. As all sections are duplicates, they can be easily and quickly made into stacks, and there can be no possibility of a mistake being made in the selection of sections, for with our special tapping, patented in the United States and Canada, June 14, 1887, March 13, 1888, and Feb. 12, 1889, any section may be used as an intermediate, feed or return, and it makes no difference which end of the stack is connected for feed and which for return. The importance of these advantages are at once apparent to the practical man, and as all these features

are fully covered by American and Canadian Patents, which have cost a great deal of money, notice is hereby given that all users of devices infringing on these patents will be promptly prosecuted.

Although heating by Indirect radiation is not quite as cheap as by Direct, it can often be used to advantage where floor space cannot very well be had; and all Architects, Steam and Hot Water Engineers recognize the fact that the use of a certain proportion of Indirect radiation in every house heated by steam or hot water, either in the parlor, hall or dining room, is a valuable accession, for it admits fresh air that is positively heated.

The Bundy Climax Radiator is tested to 100 lbs. hydraulic pressure to the square inch, just prior to being shipped, and where the sections are made into stacks before shipping, and they are often ordered this way, they are tested twice, once in the section and again in the stack, when all joints are found to be absolutely perfect before being sent out. The Radiator is compact, occupying the minimum space, and has from 40 to 60 per cent. more plain surface, as compared with extended surface, than any other Indirect Radiator made. The fins are set "staggered," which together with the high efficiency of the Radiator prevents any air from passing into the rooms to be heated without first being perfectly warmed. The Radiator divides and stratifies the air so perfectly as to be usually adopted wherever a force fan is used to supply the fresh air. A specially designed bearing bar is cast on the under side of each section, running longitudinally, which facilitates very greatly the moving of the stack on the cross bars, as well as in transporting it from place to place.







INSTRUCTIONS FOR MAKING INTO STACKS.

In the accompanying cuts, A are Bundy Climax cast iron sections, B are connecting cast iron nipples, C are two hard wood wedges about 1x8 inches in size at their butt ends, and D are thin connecting strips of iron strengthening the sections to insure perfect casting and safe transportation.

Break the strip or iron (D) with a light blow of a hammer, then lay the section on its side and with the fingers start in the two nipples (B) about half a turn, then place the two wedges (C) one upon the other, as shown, and lay the second section so that the two holes tapped in it shall be directly over the nipples. Now adjust wedges (C) so that both ends shall be equidistant from each other. This being accomplished commence to enter nipples into the second section. and as they make together spread the wedges at the opposite end so that all parts of the second section shall advance toward the first at the same speed.

In screwing up the nipples, care should be used that each are turned alternately, and not more than one-half a turn at a time, thus avoiding any possible binding of the joints.

With two sections connected proceed as before with the third and so on until the stack contains the requisite number of sections.

As all sections are exact duplicates, should the stack in use prove too small, it is an easy matter to add to it another section. If, on the other hand, it is too large, a section can readily be removed.

When one stack is desired to heat two or more apartments and is placed at the base of two or more flues for that purpose, one or more pairs of longer nipples are furnished accommodating the division and subdivision of the stack by the insertion of tin partitions as necessary. This simple arrangement carries to a mathematical nicety the proper proportion of heat to each register and is an advantage fully appreciated by the trade, and of vital importance to the consumer. In this way one stack sufficeth for the heating of two, three and sometimes four or more apartments.





Fig. D. Endrage Bandy Climes Indirect Radiator Coil

PROPER LOCATION OF AIR VALVE.

The location of the air valve depends upon the way the pipes lead to and from the radiator. The accompanying cuts will show the usual methods of piping and the proper location of the air valve in each case.

Too much importance cannot be attached to the use of a good, sensitive and durable air valve, and the one shown is of our own manufacture and highly endorsed. A further description of this air valve is found on a later page in this book under the heading of Automatic Air Valves. They are furnished for both Direct and Indirect Radiators.



St. 23t represents the **Bundy Perfect** Indirect Reliator for heating by High and Low Pressure Steam. For cut of section see Fig 23t. It has larger openings than any other Indirect Reliator, and the sections are connected by 2 nipples. These, with many other advantages which this Reliator possesses, make the circulation in the Bundy Perfect absolutely positive and uniform, unexcelled by any other Radiator on the market. All who have used it or seen it lested are surprised at its perfect operation. The size of connections used in most other Indirect Radiators is 1½, which is wholly inadequate, and it is not an uncommon thing to find a Radiator with even a smaller connection than line. Now when one considers that a 2 nipple has 77.79 per cent. greater capacity than one 1½ in size, it will clearly be seen what advantages are secured by the use of the Bundy Perfect. When heating by low pressure or exhaust steam, or in starting circulation in very cold weather when condensation is very rapid, the liberal size of the connections in the Perfect (2') together with the fact that they are in a fine and a trifle lower than the balance of the Radiator is a very important feature, for it allows a quick and natural exit for the waters of condensation. No smaller connections than 2' can accomplish this result, and a failure to do so causes the vexatious hammering and cracking noises prevalent where an inferior Radiator is used or the piping is not properly done.

ALL SECTIONS ARE EXACT DUPLICATES.

In other words, there are no head or tail sections among them, or right and left intermediates, but all are exactly alike, and so there is no time lost in selecting them or the slightest possible chance of a mistake occurring in assembling the sections into stacks, for such a thing could not possibly happen. The word "inlet" is east on the inlet side of each section, so that when the stack is complete one can tell at a glance which is the feed end and which the return, but it is a peculiar fact and worthy of mention, that practical use and tests have shown that should a stack of Bundy Perfect be fed from the return end that no difficulties would arise therefrom, nor the efficiency of the Radiator be impaired, the only difference being that in part of the Radiator the waters of condensation would flow in an opposite direction from that of the steam, but in a Radiator having such liberal sized openings as the Bundy Perfect is the simplest and most convenient Indrect Radiator made, and that it is impossible for a mistake to be made in connecting it up or setting it to place. Perfect drainage is secured without elevating one portion of the stack more than another, for it is so constructed as to secure this when set level. The waters of condensation flow in the same direction as the steam, its operation throughout being on gravity action. Particular attention is called to the specially designed bearing bar running longitudinally the full length of each section on its under side, which facilitates very much the handling of a stack after it has been made up. The practical Steam Fitter will appreciate this feature, for it enables him to move the stack with perfect ease on the cross bars, as well as to transport it from place to place.

NO PACKED JOINTS, BOLTS, RODS, NUTS, WASHERS, Etc.,

are used in the Bundy Perfect Radiator, all joints being screw thread connections, iron to iron. There is but one connection between sections, therefore they can be very easily and quickly assembled into stacks of any required size, particularly so by following the instructions given with the goods, which explain how this can be done without counting in the threads as is generally the case where right and left hand nipples are used. A stack is also very quickly reduced to sections.

GREATEST DURABILITY AND FREEDOM FROM LEAKS.

The fewness of joints in the Bundy Perfect, together with the fact that all are screw thread connections and are made by the latest and best of machinery, combine to make this the most durable and best radiator on the market for Indirect heating by Steam. Should it be desired to increase or diminish the size of any stack, sections can be quickly and easily added or substracted, a feature highly desirable in any Radiator. This and all other special features found in the Bundy Perfect are fully covered by letters patent in the United States and Canada, dated June 14, 1837, and February 12, 1889. We caution parties not to use goods that infringe on our Patents, for our rights have cost us a great deal of money and we will hold infringers strictly accountable for damages.







Fig. 87 represents the Eureka Window Indirect Steam Radiator which is furnished in four different heights, viz.: 20", 24", 30" and 36". It is set to place on specially designed feet, two inches high in the clear, which are easily and quickly fastened to the end sections.

This Radiator is specially adapted to that class of buildings where fresh air supply is required, and where it is not consistent to carry the flues to upper stories, as with Indirect proper. The Bundy Box Base Direct-Indirect Radiator, shown by figs. 24, 25 and 26, is used for the same purpose.

In front of the Eureka Window Radiator an open work screen of brass or iron can be set through which the heated air passes into the room. It is called a Window Radiator, owing to its special adaptation for use under windows, for which purpose the various heights made makes its very convenient. An opening in the wall or floor back of the Radiator allows for the inflow of fresh air.

Figs. 89 and 90 represent the Bundy Full Opening Improved Radiator Valve. It does not pay to use an inferior valve, for a good one costs but a trifle more and the little difference you may have to pay does not amount to anything compared with the expense and annoyance incident to the use of a poor valve; one that leaks; does not close tightly and gets out of order all the time.

The Bundy Valve is not what is commonly known as a "fighting valve," one made light and cheap to undersell with, but is made as good as is possible to produce them. The metal used is the very best U. S. Government Standard Gun Metal which is the following formula:

Lake Superior Copper	88 parts.
Malacca Tin	
Lead	1 part.
Zinc	1 part.
	100 parts

This composition is guaranteed to not steam cut. Many other makers of valves use house scrap consisting of plumber's cocks, old gas fixtures, railroad scrap, lamp tops and a general assortment of accumulated matter found in most dwelling houses. In such scrap more or less iron is always found and the unfortunate thing about it is, that when the valve is made up and nickel plated, the presence of iron and other inferior matter cannot be detected only by the short life of the valve and the continual trouble it gives by getting out of order. The only safe way is to buy a valve that is known to be good and the Bundy answers that description perfectly.

The Bundy Valve has a full opening allowing for the unimpeded passage of water and steam, and will outweigh most any other valve on the market from 8 to 16 oz., which, in valves, represents very nearly 15 per cent. of their value. The valve seat is raised and nounded so no dirt or sediment can lodge thereonor injure it. The stuffing box is extra large allowing for more packing to be used, and as this is where many valves give out, the Bundy Valve should be used for this if for no other reason. The wood wheel handle is larger and a little higher than what is used in the majority of valves so in opening and closing the valve the danger of burning the palm is largely overcome.

ARCHITECTS.

You will serve your interests best by specifying the Bundy Full Opening Improved Radiator Valves, and insisting on having them used. The word BUNDY in a diamond is cast plainly in the globe of every valve, (see cuts).







DIRECTIONS FOR APPLYING BUNDY BRONZE.

Place the Radiator, if possible, where it is to remain when brozzed and see that it is free from dust, dirt, oil, rust or any unevenness, which may be removed with a cloth, piece of sand paper, or better still, emery paper or file. If convenient, a good method of removing oil from the Radiator is to admit steam when it will soon evaporate.

When the Radiator is thus prepared, give it a priming or sizing coat of very thin paint made of the best standard grade of white lead and turpentine or napth or any other volatile liquid. Mix this to about the consistency of water, and, unless silver bronze is used, stain it with a little yellow ochre. The point is to get as Hille and not as moch paint on the Radiator as possible.

Bundy Bronzing Liquid in the proportion of about one pint of liquid to one pound of bronze, and apply evenly with a fine camel's hair brush, taking care to brush always in the same direction, either up or down, but never both. It convenient have the Radiator just warm while being bronzed and do not apply so much bronze that it will run. Do not mix more bronze than you will use at one time.

Ordinarily one pound of Bundy Bronze with a pint of Bundy Bronzing Liquid will cover 100 to 200 square feet of surface, but this depends upon the skill with which it is applied.

TO APPLY BRONZE WHEN DRY.

Give the Radiator, when barely warm, a medium thick coat of Bundy Maroon Laquer, and before it gets perfectly dry, apply the Bundy Bronze Powder with a Chamois skin or camel's hair brush. Rub the bronze on evenly making as light a coat as possible. This method of applying bronze does not seem to give as general satisfaction as that where the Bronzing Liquid is used, as the latter can be successfully applied by a novice.

This is an important matter, for a finish that reduces the heating power 10 to 25 per cent. would be dear at any cost.

The Bundy Enamels can be used with excellent effect in connection with bronze powder, that is, decorate the body of the radiator with the enamel, touching up the design in bronze. 



Fig. 1 shows the carpet cut on the lines (**F**) exposing to view the hole (**E**) in which the sleeve (**B**) of the Floor Plate rests. The carpet points (**D**) are turned back and lie concealed in the concave part of the Floor Plate. This obviates all damage to the carpets, as the displaced parts perfectly resume their natural position when desired.

The Floor Plate, Fig. 2, is of cast iron and is usually set in one piece, however, when necessary, it can be easily broken by a blow from a hammer, owing to the two slots (A) in its sleeve. When so broken the fracture is irregular and fits so closely as not to be detected, the plate being held firmly in position by plain or nickel plated screws corresponding with its finish. These screws should pass through the holes (C) and lines (F) where the carpet is cut doing it no injury.

The Ceiling Plate, Fig. 3, is also of cast iron and has a set screw (A) which holds it in position. The sleeves (B) in both Ceiling and Floor Plates are of regulation length and thickness and are approved by all Insurance Underwriters.

We have given a general idea as to their color, to assist our customers and friends in their selection of appropriate Tops for different rooms, but Marble will frequently, when cut and pollshed, become darker or highlyter than the one from which our description is taken.

We have the finest line of Marble that has ever been produced by any manufacturer, and baving made special arrangements for importation, we can furnish at a large saving arrangements of Marble Tops not obtainable from any other source. We have made our prices low, believing that larger sales will compensate us for so doing. Flease hear in mind that all Marble is not adaptable for Radiators as they will not stand the heat, and this is strong argument why the Tops should come from us, besides those avoiding any possibility of missits, which in Marble Tops is especially annoying.

Vermont (A) Milk White. Skirting the western slope of the Green Monntains, in the vicinity of Rudand, Vermont, is found a rare specimen of milk white marble interspersed with ine, barely distinguishable, grayish veios and spots. This marble so closely resembles the Italian that only an expert can detect the difference. This Marble is very largely need in the Public Buildings of Paris, and is also extremely popular among the Spanish Nobility.

St. Anne (L) Dark Drab and White. The St. Anne Marble is from the Sambre Quarries, near Liege, Belgium. While all Belgium Marbles are hard, this is the hardest of any, and so is largely need for tiling and flooring purposes in the paluces of foreign countries. Its prevailing colors are dark drab and white. The drah color, which varies in inteedity, is thoroughly intersected by the lines of white. It takes a very high polish and is a magnificent Marhle for any apartment, especially a hall or diniog room.

Napoleon (M) Dark Fawn. The Napoleon Marble is taken from the Rupel Quarry, near Activerp, Belgium. Its color is a dark fawn, interspersed with crystalized white veins and intersecting light lines of blood red and golden yellow. It is a handsomely colored Marble and having a neutral tint is appropriate with any

Joinville (N) Gray. The Joinville Marble which is very rarely seen in this country, being found only in very small quantities in the Joinville Quarry of Belgium, is of a light pays color with intersecting lines of red and white. This Marble should be seen to be appreciated. It is hard and susceptible of a very high finish.

Loraine (O) Light Fawn. The Loraine Marble is found in the footbills of the Pyrences Mountains in Southern France. It has a delicate light faum color, slightly flecked with spots of beautiful pearl and black. As a neural int it can be used with good effect in any room, but its mellow color makes its specially desirable for bed-chambers and kidned apartments.

Belgium Black (P) Black. This Marble is found in the Garonne Quarties, in the southern part of Belgium. It has a rich, velvety black color, which gives it the appearance of elegance and is a good Marble for either Radiator tops or bases, especially the latter. Its rich color is no doubt largely due to the high polish which

Griotte (Q) Blood-red. This Marble is found at the base of Mt. Veauvius, near the city of Naples, Italy. As its name implies the Griotte Marble has a motifed appearance. The principal colors are red and black, while occasionally crystalized white eyes, or veins, may be found running through it. It is one of the handaomest Marbles and takes an extra high polish. The Quarry from which our aupply is taken is conceded to be the best in the world.

Numedian (R) Rose. This is probably one of the oldest Marbles known, as history shows that as far back as B. C. 77 the actient Romans raised a 20 foot column of Numedian to the memory of Cesar in the Forum. The Marble is secret at great hazard, as to reach the quarries some of Africa's most dangerous jungles must be penetrated, which are infested with wild admins of every description. It is certainly a historic Marble and every Top has a story to tell touching on the adventures encountered in its perilous journey. The Marble has a rich and delicate post color, made must beautiful, if possible, with respiculent vine of yellow and chance spots and vine of black lined with a rose tim of lighter hue.

Alpa Green (8) Dark Green. The frowning peak of Mt. Blanc In the Alpa of Switzerland overlooks the quarry from which our supply of Alpa Green is taken. This Marble is sometimes called Vert Alpa and Vert Antique owing to its color and the mountain from which it is cut. It has a dark green color uniformly veined with white, and although a very popular Marble in Europe it has not until now been imported to this country to be used as Tops for Bundy Itadiators. It is an exceptionally now Marble for a green room.

Sienna (T) Gold. All the golden sunshine of suony Italy seems to have en tered this beautiful Sienna Marbie. Discovered accidently by the Good Sisters of Sienna, it was naed by them in building the celebrated Sienna Cathedral, which, when completed standing in the sunlight resembled a golden palace. st. Beaume (U) Gold and Dore. This Marble is taken from the renowned Tortosa Quarry in the Pyrences of France. It takes its name from the Patron Saint Beaume, which was given it by the people who need it largely in building the Ancient Monseteries and Cathedrais of France, which to-day are standing, living monuments of the enduring properties of this magnificent Marble. It is richly endowed with gold and dore colors well mixed, with occasional spots of pink and crystalized white, and light, scarcely noticeable, veins of purple. A Bundy Radiator setting upon a Beighum Black base and surmounted with one of these Tops is well suited for any of the handsomer rooms in our modern houses.

Famosa (V) Dark Purple. Throughout the Rhenish Provinces in Germany is found the Famosa Marble, but the finest specimens, those having the richest color, are taken from the Essen Quarry from whence come our supply. This Marble is used largely in the Palaces of the venerable Kaiser William, hence the popularity throughout all Germany. It is more largely used in the houses of the German Nobility than any other Marble. It is curiously formed, so much so that it is difficult to describe, but its predominant color is dark purple which reminds one of the purple robes worn by the obblity in their regal splendor.

Lavanto (W) Sage Green. Italy is so famous for its bine white Marble that the impression has gone out that it furnishes none other, but situated near the time-hoored city of Florence is the Levanto Quarry producing a most beautiful Marble hearing theeame name. The prevailing color is sage green largely figured with bright cherry spots and interacting white veins. It is an excellent Marble, and although very small quantities of it have been imported to this country, it is used very extensively by the Italiane and throughout all Europe.

Gentlemen: -Agreeable to your request I have made a series of tests under similar conditions of different sized Bundy Radiators manufactured by you, and of a number of Radiators manufactured by other parties, in which vertical iron pipes one inch in diameter are screwed in a base to which the steam and return connections are made. As a general result of the tests it may be stated that I find that the Bundy Radiators circulate more quickly than any form of Radiator constructed of one inch pipes arranged vertically, even though the same be connected at the top with return bends, and that this difference is very marked when comparison is made with that form of Radiator in which the one inch tubes are closed The superiority arises at the top and circulation secured merely by interior diaphragms. evidently from the larger passages provided in the Bundy Loop and the adaptation of the base to the same so as to secure prompt and efficient action. On turning steam on a Bundy Radiator, which has become cold and filled with air, the loops successively fill from the end where steam is supplied, to the other, whereas with the Radiator constructed of one inch pipes there appears to be no regularity in heating up, and much more time is required. This is particularly the case with those constructed with pipes closed at their upper ends, and it is not uncommon for several of these to remain cold until heated by the surrounding pipes, and one or two near the steam inlet may thus be cold for a considerable time after the tubes at the other end of the Radiator have become thoroughly heated. All these points have an important bearing on Radiators for use in dwellings or elsewhere where the pressure is very low, in fact sometimes below the atmosphere, so that air entering through the slightest leaks, or derived from the water in the boiler, stops the circulation in a portion of the heating surface, and an irregular effect is produced. It has still a more important bearing on the use of direct Radiators when the supply of steam to the same is electrically controlled. With such apparatus it is necessary that the steam circulate promptly when it is turned on, as the mean temperature can only be maintained by shutting off and turning on the steam at short intervals.

The second question that arises is as to the efficiency of a given amount of surface in Radiators of different kinds after circulation is fully established. It is customary to make these tests by comparing the amounts of water condensed under similar conditions, and this plan was adopted in this case, unusual care being taken to make the results strictly comparative as is shown hereafter.

When steam, circulating freely, imparts heat through one side of the plate, the amount of condensation which will take place and the quantity of heat imparted will depend upon the degree and time of exposure of the other side of plate to heat absorbing substances, such as fixed bodies receiving heat by radiation or currents of air receiving heat principally by direct contact, and to but a limited extent by radiation.

TRADE BUNDY WARE.

With indirect radiation, the condensation, other things being equal, is chiefly influenced by the quantity of air circulated over the surface. With ordinary Radiators the circulation is only that produced by difference in temperature. The heating surface of a direct Radiator can be divided in two kinds, viz: 1—The direct surface, or that on the outside of the Radiator considered as a whole, which therefore radiates directly into the surrounding space, and is also in contact with currents of air of large volume, and— 2—The "masked" surface. or that on the sides of the several tubes which are turned toward each other so that the heat is radiated back and forth from one tube to another, and only that transmitted which can be absorbed by direct contact with, and a slight radiation to currents of air of limited area passing upward between the tubes. It will be seen therefore that the "direct" surfaces are very much more efficient than the "masked" surfaces, and that that Radiator with a given amount of heating surface will be most efficient which has the least "masked" surface compared to its outer bounding or "direct" surface. For this reason, any Radiator, made up of a single row of pipes or loops of any shape is more efficient for a given surface than one with more than one row, and the loss of efficiency increases with the number of rows as more and more of the surface is "masked" and become relatively less efficient.

I find that your competitors have taken advantage of this state of facts and published results in which a favorable form of Radiators of their manufacture was compared with a less favorable form of your manufacture, thereby showing your type of Radiator to be inferior, and it is interesting to state that I have found, upon reversing the conditions and selecting a favorable form of Radiator of your manufacture and comparing the same with a less favorable form of their manufacture, that I obtained results showing your opponents' Radiators very much inferior to yours. This state of facts will astonish those who have hitherto supposed that differences in result can only be due to the type of Radiator, as the fact that they can be secured by a mere selection of Radiators of the same type containing the same heating surface is not generally known.

Again, in the experiments of one of your opponents, the steam and water connections of the Bundy Radiator were in the same end of the base. It is practically known that a very great difference may be secured in the performance of different Radiators by the way they are graded. In a strictly comparative test the water of condensation should trickle along the bottom of the base from the receiving end to the return end without chance of accumulation. With both connections in the same end of the base, or a base improperly graded, the water may be backed up and discharged intermittently, thereby not only interfering with the regular measurement but preventing the full efficiency of the surface by having a portion of the base covered with water for the whole or a portion of the time, even though the action may not be sufficient to cause interference in the circulation in the tubes.

In the tests made by your opponents, a long, thin Radiator of their own manufacture, was placed along side and relatively near a short, thick Bundy Radiator. It is evident, therefore, that one Radiator partially "masked" the other in the same way that one tube "masks" another, as above explained, on which basis their long Radiator reduced the efficiency of the whole of one side of your short one, while yours on the other hand could



only reduce the efficiency of a part of the length of theirs. By simply reversing the conditions and comparing a Radiator of your manufacture with a return bend Radiator made by your opponents, commercially rated and of almost identically the same actual surface, <u>the experiments showed conclusively a superiority of the Bundy Radiator of 19.17 per cent</u>, when the surfaces were left in the condition they were furnished by the manufacturer, even when the masking of one by the other was prevented by separating the competing Radiators a considerable distance and placing a screen between them. This superiority was reduced 5.7 per cent. when the surfaces were thoroughly covered with thick paint, but with this allowance the Bundy Radiator was still very greatly superior.

It will be observed, also, that the Bundy form of Radiator would suffer less in the natural process of selection than any form of Radiator made up of vertical one inch tubes. Radiators, particularly in small rooms, are necessarily selected to approximately fit a particular place, and therefore those of substantially the same length and height would be used independent of type, and since each of your tubes contains three square feet of surface, and each inch pipe only one square foot, it is evident that in such process of selection, even by parties who did not know the advantage of so doing, your one-row Radiator would be selected, where two or three rows of inch pipe would be required, and your two-row where from four to six rows of inch pipe would be needed to keep within the same length, so that on the average a superior form of your Radiator would be used more often than when the Radiator was made up of small tubes.

There were upwards of two hundred tests made for your information on the general subject by the writer, with the assistance of Mr. H. W. York. The results will be found of great value in suggesting still further improvements in your already excellent designs and proportions, but involved such a mass of detail that it would be difficult to properly edit and publish them in such form as to be useful to the trade. It will, however, be seen that independent of the efficiency of the radiating surface above explained, the Bundy Radiator is superior to the others tested in freedom of circulation, and in the relative amount of direct or effective heating surface, compared with that which is masked or ineffective.

In connection with the experiments, I have carefully measured the radiating surface of two five-loop Bundy Radiators, with the following results:

Total radiating surface with "Standard" loops, - - - 15.11 square feet. Total radiating surface with "Enlarged" loops, - - 17.99 square feet.

CHAS. E. EMERY, M. E., after making 200 competitive tests, using the Bundy with every other type of Radiator manufactured, finds an average superiority for the Bundy of 19.17 per cent.

Also, that the tests made by our competitors who have used a favorite form of their Radiator and a less favorable form of Bundy, have no significance whatever, unless it be a flattering admission of the Bundy's superiority signified by their underhanded attempt to mislead the public.

Also, that after measuring carefully the surface of the Bundy Radiators, he reports that they are actually in excess of what we claim for them, in one case .11 square feet, and another .49 square feet.

Gentlemen:—I have duly received α copy of the Illustrated Catalogue of the Bundy Steam Radiator made by your company.

I know of no better steam heater. I first made its acquaintance on a large scale in the erection of the National Museum in this city, where it is used to heat a building of 328 feet square, containing about 3,000,000 cubic feet of space. I was so well satisfied with its work in that building that I specified it in contracting for the heating of the New Pension Building, also in Washington.

I have heated this building containing 6,179,200 cubic feet of air space, exclusive of cellars, in a building of 3 stories covering a ground plan of 400x200 feet and 150 feet to the ridge of its central roof, since the first of March, 1885. The ratios are for the north rooms 1 sq. foot of Radiator surface to 111 cubic feet of air space. In the south rooms, 1 to 135; in the east and west rooms, 1 to 123, and for the great hall which these rooms surround and enclose to the height of 80 feet, and which itself contains over 4.000,000 cubic feet of space only, 1 sq. foot of radiating surface to 777 cubic feet of air space. The building is daily occupied by about 1,600 persons engaged in sedentary employment, and though the thermometer out of doors during the past winter has been frequently much below zero, no one has complained of being insufficiently warmed, either in room or hall. A better test of the value and efficiency of a Radiator can scarcely be looked for.
