

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PREFACE.

In presenting our first issue to the public, some what later in the season than we at first proposed, prefering to present the desired information in a correct form, which necessarily caused some delay.

Our intention, at first, was to have the work ready for delivery about the first of April, difficulties attending this as will naturally occur in compiling a work of this kind, we was necessarily compelled to delay its publication until the present time. We feel confident we have discharged our duty, and with the hope it will receive the approval of a generous public, we place the work before you for a deliberate perusal.

The citizens have in this instance acted liberal, we allude especially to our advertisers, for to them, we look for assistance, and in whom we have been equally interested, in displaying their cards to the best advantage, as well as their names, in the Business Mirror. And we return our, sincere thanks for your support, hoping entire satisfaction will exist among all, we respectfully solicit a continuance of your patronage in our next issue.

Our intention is fixed upon publishing an annual Directory for Indianapolis, and in this, we expect the assistance of the citizens, with it a work can be made valuable, without it useless. Some trouble existed in canvassing for names which in future we hope to obviate, a large portion of our foreign citizens not speaking the English language, inaccurate names, will unavoidably be inserted.

In reference to our annual contributors we would here allude to the advantage of advertising. As it will be our highest aim to please all and have their cards conspicuously displayed, as well as their names in the Business Mirror, which we hope will be sufficient inducement to ensure a hearty support. Non supporters will be confined to small type, under a general head, merely giveing their names without designating their place of business.

PREFACE.

We found it necessary to omit some matter proposed in our prospectus, owing to the unreliable accounts procured, and deemed it advisable to omit entirely, than to present statistics in an inacurate form. Some discrepencies will naturally occur in arrangeing such a work, and doubtless some have occurred since our canvassing. However, as some persons may expect of us, (what has never been accomplished) to publish a work free from errors, to such we ask their indulgence, and in future with their support, and our energies we hope to meet their approbation.

A great difficulty which our city labors under, and we express surprise at the Council not taking more permanent steps in placing the names of the different streets, conspicuously on every corner throughout the city, and place proper numbers on dwellings and business houses, to enable strangers as well as citizens to designate without inquiry. This matter has recently, been timidly approached, and we hope the authorities will take proper steps and have this difficulty remedied, as it is an utter impossibility to give localities accurately.

The outline map accompanying was engraved expressly for the work, which we believe accurate in every point, giving the city as it now is, the heavy lines show, the outlines of the old plot and donation, the dotted ones show the parts settled at different periods.

The historical matter which follows the map has been arranged after some trouble in ascertaining statistics accurately. In it will be found matters of interest, and valuable statistical matter for future reference, it being the only history written of Indianapolis since its settlement, and shows a striking difference from its first, and early history, with that of our present flourishing city.

In conclusion we would here add, that the work is now complete, and can with propriety refer to the correctness of the volume, but one typographical error occurred, and that would have been remedied had it been discovered previous to the distribution of the form.

This occured in page 73, where half of the names were unaccounably transposed to 79, we mention this, more for the benefit of persons whose names does not appear in the former page, who will find them in the latter, and in the next annual we hope to be able to present it without errors, as more time will be allowed in preparing it for the press.

IV.

Historical Sketch of Indianapolis.

INTRODUCTION.

The history of Indianapolis is yet to be written. The material exists for a full and instrucive work on the subject; but it has never been collected and arranged for that purpose. Much valuable information to be derived from the early settlers will soon be lost, unless some effort is made to perpetuate it. The writer would suggest that the old settlers adopt some plan at their annual meetings to perpetuate names, dates, events and all other facts of a historical character.

The writer does not pretend to give a full, or even an accurate history of the city, in the limits of the following sketch. The want of space and want of time prevented full examination, and cut off opportunities for information. Much has been omitted, and mistakes have doubtless been made in its compilation, but it is still the most complete and accurate sketch of the history of the city yet published.

The want of space compelled the writer to dwell more on the early history of the city than on the more recent events, and to give the statements of facts in short paragraphs.

HISTORICAL SKETCH OF INDIANAPOLIS.

INDIANAPOLIS, the capital of Indiana, is situated upon a beautiful plain, on the east bank of the west fork of White river, in north latitude 39° 55', west longitude 86° 5'. It is two miles north-west of the geographical center of the State, and one mile south of the center of Marion county, of which it is the county seat. The plain on which it stands extends for miles in all directions, and was formerly covered by a dense growth of timber. The surface soil is a dark fertile loam, the sub-soil is a compact clay, resting upon deep beds of drift gravel and sand. Until 1818, the central part of the State was an unbroken wilderness, inhabited by the Miami, Delaware, and Shawnee Indians. The whole country was covered by a dense growth of heavy timber, comprising, oak, ash, elm, beech, walnut, hickory, maple and other hard woods ; and in-addition to this, the city site was, overgrown by a dense thicket of prickly-ash and spicewood. The spice brush often served the early settlers in lieu of tea. This thicket was subsequently destroyed by the cattle browzing upon it, but portions of it existed in protected spots until a comparatively recent date. It afforded a fine covert for game of different kinds, and for several years after the first settlement it was 1

easy to find deer and bear in the vicinity. The river bottoms, and creek valleys were favorite resorts of the early hunters, who seldom returned from the chase empty handed. That game was cheap and plenty, is very evident from the prices it bore as late as 1822, when saddles of venison sold for 25 to 50 cents, wild turkes at 10 to 124 cents, and a bushel of pigeons for 25 cents. The Indians were much attached to this region, because of the abundance of fish in its streams, and of game in its forests; and they very reluctantly yielded its possession. Many of them lingered in the vicinity long after the cession at St. Mary's, and frequently visited the cabins of the settlers. Although they had no permanent village here, they often pitched their hunting and fishing camps on the city site, or in the region immediately north of it, and pursued the chase with signal A traveler who ascended the river a few years prior to success. the settlement, says that the banks were then dotted with wig-wams, and its surface often parted by the Indian canoes. The scene at night was especially interesting, when parties of the natives were busily engaged in "fire hunting" or "fire fishing."

By treaty, at St. Mary's, Ohio, on the 2d of October, 1818, between Lewis Cass, Jonathan Jennings and Benjamin Park, commissioners, and the Delaware tribe of Indians, the latter ceded all their territory in Indiana to the United States, covenanting to deliver the possession of it in 1821. This region was afterward generally designated as "the New Purchase." Its reported fertility and beauty greatly excited the frontier settlers, and without waiting for possession according to treaty stipulations, they immediately entered the country and made settlements at various points. William Conner, a trader among the Delawares, had built a cabin many years before the treaty, at a Delaware village on the bank of White river, four miles from the present town of Nobleville. This, with other circumstances, drew the attention of others to the same stream. and in 1819, two brothers, named Whitzel, emigrated from the neighborhood of Wheeling Va. or Zanesville O., and settled in "the New Purchase," at the bluffs of White river, sixteen miles below this These men were brothers of Lewis Whitzel, an Indian scout. city. well known in the border annals of Ohio and Kentucky. Lewis Whitzel visited the bluffs, and after remaining a short time at that point, went to Louisiana. Immediately after the treaty at St. Mary's a number of persons from Fayette and Wayne counties penetrated the wilderness to this vicinity. The attempt was somewhat hazardous, for the Indians were illy disposed, and yet in full possession of the country. In 1818 Dr. Douglass ascended White river from the lower countries, tarrying at the bluffs for a short time, and Col. James Paxton descended it from its head waters, reaching this place in January or February, 1819. He again returned in 1820, and made some preparations for settlement, but never completed them. The honor due to the "first settler" belongs to John Pogue, who came from Whitewater, and settled here on the

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2d day of March, 1819. His cabin stood by a large spring, close to the east bank of "Pogue's run," near the present residence of W. P. Noble. Its ruins were visible until within a few years, and perhaps exist at this time. Pogue was killed by the Indians in April, 1821. His horses were missing one morning in that month, and as some disturbance had been heard among them during the night, he concluded the Indians had stolen them, and armed himself for pursuit. "When last seen he was near the Indian camp, and as his horses and clothes were afterward seen in their possession, little doubt remained as to his fate. His death greatly excited the settlers, but their numerical weakness prevented an effort to avenge it. The little stream which once pursued a very tortuous course through the south-east part of the city, alarming the few inhabitants of that section by its high floods, but which is now so changed that its old character is utterly lost, was named after Pogue, and will be a memorial of him as "the first settler" of Indianapolis.

In February, 1820, John and James McCormick built a cabin near the present river bridge. In the early part of March, John Maxwell and John Cowen built cabins in the north-west corner of the donation, near the Michigan road/ Fall creek bridge. In April, 1821, Mr. Maxwell was appointed a Justice of the Peace by Gov. Jennings, and was the first Judicial officer in "the New Purchase." He retained the office until June, and then resigned. The citizens held an informal election, and selected James McIlvain, who was thereupon appointed a Justice by Gov. Jennings, in October, 1821. A number of amusing anecdotes are told of his "Courts," which he held at his cabin, in the woods, near the intersection of Pennsylvania and Michigan streets, sitting "pipe in mouth," in the cabin door, with a jury ranged in front on a fallen tree, and the first constable, Corbley, standing guard over the culprits; who, nevertheless, often escaped through the woods.

In the latter part of March, and in April and May of 1820, a number of emigrants arrived, and at the end of the latter month there were fifteen families on the donation. Among them were Messrs. Davis, Bahhill, Corbley, Wilson, Van Blaricum and Harding. Emigrants now began to turn their faces toward the infant settlement, and it slowly and steadily increased for a year afterward.

The eagerness of the settlers to appropriate lands in the New Purchase, found its counterpart in the action of the State, concerning the location of the new seat of government. The act of Congress, of April 19, 1816, authorizing the formation of a State government, donated four sections of the unsold public lands to the State, for a permanent seat of government, giving, the privilege of selection. The subject was considered immediately after the treaty at St. Mary's, and on the 11th of January, 1820, the Legislature, by law, appointed George Hunt, John Conner, John Gilliland, Stephen Ludlow, Joseph Bartholomew, John Tipton, Jesse B. Dugham, Frederick Rapp, Wm. Prince, and Thomas Emerson, com-

missioners to select a site for a permanent seat of government; directing them to meet on an early day of the ensuing spring, at Wm, Conner's house, on White river. They ascended the river, making examinations as they went, and met as directed, at Conner's house, where, after some very serious differences of opnion as between sites at the bluffs, at the mouth of Fall Creek, and at Conner's, they selected the present site. The experience of future years justified their selection. Three of the commissioners were for this site, and two for the bluffs, and there dissension for a time was a warm one. On the 7th of June, 1820, they reported that under the act of Congress, they had selected as the site of the permanent seat of government for the State, sections one and twelve, east and west fractional sections numbered two, east fractional section numbered eleven, and so much of the east part of west fractional section numbered three, to be set off by a line north and south as will complete the donation of 2,560 acres, in township fifteen, range three east. The selection of the site gave the place instant reputation, and in the spring and summer and fall of 1819, it rapidly increased in population. Morris Morris, Dr. S. G. Mitchell, J. and J. Given, Win. Reagan, M. Nowland, J. M. Ray, James Blake, Nat'l Cox, Thomas Anderson, John Hawkins, Dr. Dunlap, David Wood, D. Yandes, Col. Russell, N. M. Charty, Dr. Coe, D. Maguire, and many others arrived, and the cabins rapidly increased in number along the river bank.

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On the 6th of January, 1821, the Legislature, by law, confirmed the selection of the site, named it Indianapolis, and provided for the election of three commissioners to lay off a town thereon. They were directed to meet on the site on the first Monday of April, 1821, to lay off the town, and to make plats or maps of it, one for the Secretary of State and one for the Agent. They were also to advertise and hold a sale of the lots as soon as possible, reserving the alternate lots from sale. The money received at the sale was to be applied to the erection of the Public Buildings.

Christopher Harrison. James Jones, and Samuel P. Booker were elected commissioners under the act. Harrison, however, was the only commissioner who performed the duties assigned him. Alexander Ralston and Elias P. Fordham were selected as the surveyors, and Benjamin J. Blythe, as clerk of the commissioners. William Blythe became a resident of the place and died but a short time since. Of Fordham but little is known. Ralston was a Scotchman; a man of very marked talent, and when quite young, had assisted in laving off Washington City. He/afterward joined Burr in his Western enterprize, and on the failure of that adventurer he remained in the West. After completing the survey he became a resident of the new town, and was much loved by the inhabitants for his virtues and intellectual powers. To his talent and skill we are indebted for the regular plan, wide streets and spacious squares of the city.

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Immediately after the organization of the party, the survey commenced. The four sections were marked out and selected on the east bank of the river, except a fractional section on the west bank, to preserve regularity in form and to take the full amount donated. The town plat-was laid out in the middle of the donation, and was one mile square. In the center a circular park of three or four acres was placed, surrounded by a circle street 80 feet wide. From the corners of the four blocks surrounding it, four avenues 90 feet wide were drawn to the corners of the town plat and donation. The remaining streets were 90 feet wide, except Washington, now the main business street, which was 120. These streets crossed at right angles and ran to the cardinal points. The city was divided into 89 squares, 420 feet on the fronts, and divided by two alleys crossing at right angles, one being 15 and the other 30 feet wide. Besides these, there were six fractional squares, and three very large irregular tracts in the valley of Pogue's run. The donation lands outside of this town plat was divided into large outblocks and irregular The commissioners little tracts with few and narrow streets. dreamed that the town would ever extend beyond the town plat, and made no provision for such an event. All the "sub-divisions" have since been made in this donation, and the" additions" are entirely outside of it. The city has now extended in some places nearly a mile beyond the nonation limits, and is now four or five miles in its extreme length and width. In these subdivisions and additions the streets and squares have been regulated in size and shape at the pleasure of the owners, and as a natural consequence the newest parts of the city are the most irregularly involved and unsightly portions of its map. The accompanying map gives the greater part of the city as it now is. The heavy lines show the outlines of the old plat and donation. The dotted lines show the settled part of the city at different periods. It will be seen that the early settlement on the river bank was outside of the town plat, but in the donation. The settlement afterward moved east, the unparralelled sickness of 1821 convincing the settlers that a residence away from the river was the best for them. A fine grove of tall straight sugar trees stood on the "Governor's Circle." On Sunday's the early settlers assembled there to hear preaching by Rev. John McClung. They sat on the logs and grass about him in Indian style. This gentleman was probably the first preacher in the place, and preached the first sermon on this spot in the summer or fall of 1821. Other authorities say that the first sermon was preached this year where the State House now stands, by Rev. Risen Hammond.

The joint corner where the four sections donated by the government, is situated in the alley south of the Palmer House, about ten feet west and five feet south of the south-east corner of the lot on which the Palmer House stands. In laying off the town, the surveyors found that if the center of the town corresponded

with the center of the donation it would place the central part of the town in the valley of Pogue's run. In making their examinations they discovered the natural elevation now included in the Governor's Circle, and at once resolved to make it the center of the town. The ele town plat is therefore considerably north-east of the central point in the donation.

The act prescribing the duties of the commissioners also provided for the election of a State Agent, who was to serve three years, and receive an annual salary of \$600 ; and reside at Indianapolis. Gen. John Carr was elected the first agent under the act, and came to the settlement in the course of the summer. The commissioners meantime had finished the survey (advertised the sale, and made all the arrangements required, and on the second Monday of October, 1821. the sale began. The first day was cold and raw; a high wind prevailed, and a man in attendance at the sale came near being killed by a falling limb. The town was very much crowded. Strangers from various quarters had come to settle in the new place, or to secure property. The three "taverns," kept by Messrs. Hawkins, Carter, and Nowland, were erowded, and in many cases the citizens were called on to share their homes with the new comers till the latter could erect cabins. The squares to be sold were divided into twelve lots, each 674 feet front by 195 feet deep, and each containing onethird of an acre. The commissioner and agent reserved the alternate lots in each square, commencing the reservation with lot numbered one. The bidding at the sale was quite spirited, and considering the position and advantages of the settlement, high prices were obtained in a number of cases. The lots sold best in certain localities, and although the greater part of the settlement was west-of the canal and south of Washington, yet prices ranged highest for lots east and north. This was due to the general sickness of the preceding summer, driving settlers eastward. Three hundred and fourteen lots, mostly situated in the central and northern part of town, sold for \$35,596 25. Under the conditions of the sale one-fifth of the purchase money was to be paid at time of sale, and the remainder in four equal annual instalments. To induce purchasers to meet the deferred payments promptly, the State engaged to rebate interest and eight per cent. of the principal. The sales continued for a week, and the amount realized by the State at the time was \$7,119 25. The lot on Washington street, west of the Court House Square sold highest, bringing \$560. The lot on Washington, west of the State House Square, sold for \$500. The intervening lots sold for from \$100 to \$300 each. Some of these lots are now worth thirty or forty thousand dollars; and out-blocks, afterward sold for ten, twenty and thirty dollars, are now worth more than as many thousands. One hundred and sixty-nine lots purchased at this sale were subsequently forfeited by their owners, or the payments which they had made on one lot were transferred to another. under the provisions of an act passed a year or two later for the

relief of purchasers of lots in Indianapolis. These forfeited lots and the reserved lots, were once or twice afterward offered at public sale, and kept open for purchase all the time. Prices becamedepressed, hewever. Money became scarce; the sickness in the settlement caused general despondency, and for several years after the winter of 1821-2, there were but few lots sold. The amount actually received by the State for donation lands, up to the year 1842, when all were sold, was about \$125,000. This amount under the law, was made a Public Building Fund. The State House, Court House, "Governor's Circle." Treasurer's House and Office were afterward erected by the money from this fund. The real estate within the donation is now assessed at \$3,500,000, and its actual value is near \$6,000,000. This is a vast difference; but it is not uncommon in Western history; and strikingly illustrates the prosperity of the country.

Gen. John Carr attended the sale as the first agent. He received the money for the lots and made the deeds. He lived in a cabin, on Delaware street, nearly opposite the western entrance of the Court House Square. The sessions of the Courts and the elections were held at his house until the completion of the present Court House. The salary of the agent had been fixed at \$600, and his duties specified at the time of the creation of the office. The Legislature, at the next session, increased the duties, and reduced the salary. Gen. Carr said he had sacrificed health and money in the office, and therefore, declined a continuance under such circumstances. The citizens were much dissatisfied with Carr and his temporary successor, James Milroy, who also resigned a short time after his appointment, because neither of them became residents of the place, and the late buyers were incommoded in making payments on their lots. He resigned and was succeeded, Dec. 6, 1822, by Bethuel F. Morris, who lives at present on the southern border of the city. Benjamin J. Blythe, the former clerk of the commissioners, succeeded Mr. Morris. He was elected in 1824. Ebenezer Sharpe was elected in 1828, and was succeeded by Thos. H. Sharpe in 1835. Mr. Cook then held the office for a short time, and it was then transferred to the Secretary of State.

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On the 8th of January, 1821, the Legislature, then sitting at Corydon, addressed a memorial to Congress, stating the location and position of the new Capital, and praying that the location of the great National road, which at that time was to run fifteen miles south of this point, should be so changed that Indianapolis might be a point on the line. The inhabitants of the new town, separated by forty or fifty miles of trackless wilderness from the nearest settlement, were justly anxious to secure this result, and its final achievement produced general rejoicing. Their hopes were ultimately disappointed. The enterprize was abandoned in JS39, just before the road was completed to this point, and the town remained entirely isolated and mud-bound until the 1st of October, 1847.

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Prior to 1820, the central and northern portions of the State were comprised in the bounds of Delaware county, which for Judicial purposes was attached to Fayette and Wayne counties respectively. The courts of the latter counties had concurrent jurisdiction over the "new Purchase," and the settlers were often harrassed by suits at Connersville, or other points in the White river country. The costs of suits thus conducted, at a place fifty or sixty miles from the settlement, were often greater than the debt, damages or fines, and the system was found to be so troublesome that the settlers rebelled against it. Some conflicts took place, and much ill-feeling was engendered. To remedy the evil the Legislature, on the 9th of January, 1821, passed an act authorizing the Governor to appoint two Justices of the Peace, for new settlement, who should continue in office till Delaware county was organized, and have jurisdiction co-equal with its limits. All appeals were to be taken to the Bartholomew Circuit Court. In pursuance of the act. Gov. Jennings. in April, 1820, appointed John Maxwell a Justice of the Peace for the new settlement. Mr. Maxwell resigned, however, in June or July, and the people met and held an informal election, which resulted in the choice of James McIlvaine, who was consequently appointed by the Governor in October following. We have already spoken of this gentleman and his courts. Calvin Fletcher, Esq., who now lives just north of the city, was then the only attorney at law in the new settlement, and the ultimate Judge in all knotty cases. There was no jail nearer than Connersville, and the culprit sentenced to imprisonment, had to be conveyed by the constable and his posse, on horseback through the woods to that place. This involved much time, trouble and expense, and the shorter plan was afterward adopted to scare them away. An instance occurred on Christmas day, 1821. Four Kentucky boatmen, who had "whipped their weight in wild-cats," came from "the bluffs" to "Naples" (as they called the town), to have a jolly Christmas spree The "spree" began early, and the settlers were aroused before the dawn, by a terrible racket at Daniel Larkens' grocery. A hasty reconnoissence revealed the four heroes busily engaged in the laudable work of "taking it down." A request to desist provoked strong expletives, attended by a display of large knives, which demonstration caused the citizens to "retire" to consult. They were interested in the grocery, and besides that, such lawless proceedings could not be tolerated. they therefore determined to conquer at all hazards. James Blake volunteered to grapple the ring leader, a man of herculean size and strength, if the rest would take the three others. The attack was made at once. The party conquered, and marched under guard through the woods to Justice McIlvaines's cabin. They were tried and heavily fined, and in default of payment ordered to jail. They could not pay, and it was deemed impossible to take them through the woods, to Connersville at that season of the year. Α guard was therefore placed over them, with the requisite instructions,

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and during the night the doughty heroes escaped to more congenial climes.

The Courts of Fayette and Wayne counties, however, still retained jurisdiction over the settlement, and the annoyance stillcontinued. Doubts also existed concerning the constitutionality of Justices Maxwell and McIlvaine's appointments. A meeting of the citizens was held at John Hawkins' large log tavern, built by him in the fall of 1821, on the spot where the Capitol House now stands, to adopt some method to rid the settlers of further trouble. They demanded the organization of a new county, and elected James Blake and Dr. S. G. Mitchell to represent them as "lobby members" at the next session of the Legislature.

The population of the town had increased very rapidly since its first settlement, and especially in the summer and fall of 1821. In May, 1820, there were perhaps fifteen families on and near the This number had increased to thirty or forty by the donation. month of July 1821, at which time the sale of lands in this and the neighboring counties took place at Brookville. These lands had been surveyed late in 1820 and in 1821. From this time to the close of the year the population increased with extreme rapidity and there were probably 500 inhabitants on the donation at the close of the year, Obed Foote, Calvin Fletcher, Caleb Scudder, George Smith, Nat'l Ralston, and other well known citizens, arrived during the fall of 1821. In 1820, the inhabitants enclosed a "caterpillar deadening," perhaps one hundred and fifty acres in extent, situated in the north-west part of the donation near the site of our new city Hospital. With but little labor, a large field was cleared there, and cultivated in corn and garden vegetables, for several years, in common, by the people. An ample supply of the finest fish and largest game was easily procured. The common field yielded corn and vegetables abundantly, and in 1820, the settlers lived happily, notwithstanding the sickness which prevailed. Affairs became very gloomy, however, in 1821. Toward the end of summer, and during the fall, epidemic, remittant and intermittant fevers and agues assailed the people, and scarcely a person was left untouched. The few healthy ones were employed day and night in ministering to the wants of the sufferers, and many instances of generous and devoted friendship occurred at this time. The recollection of their bitter sufferings bound the early settlers together in after life. No one can recur to that period without singular emotions. The new comers might well be appalled at the prospect before them; and it is no wonder that, extravagant stories circulated concerning the sickness at Indianapolis. Although nearly every person in the settlement was more or less assailed, and several hundred cases occurred during the prevalence of the epidemic, not more than twenty-five terminated fatally. As winter approached, the health of the community improved, and by the end of the year it was entirely restored. No cause was discovered for the unparalleled

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visitation, which the old settlers hold to this day in vivid remembrance; nor was it possible to stay its ravages.

at After escaping death by disease, the people were threatened with starvation. In consequence of sickness, the influx of people and the small amount of grain raised, the supply of provisions in the settlement became very meagre in the fall and winter of 1821. No roads had been opened to the town, and all goods and provisions had to be packed on horseback, fifty or sixty miles through the woods, or brought up the river in keel boats. The latter method was adopted in 1822, and the arrival of each boat was greeted by a concourse of "the whole people," and duly announced in the "Indianapolis Gazette." Coffee was worth 50 cents a pound; tea \$2,00; corn, \$1,00 per bushel; flour, \$4,00 to \$5,00 per hundred; coarse muslin, 45 cents per yard, and other goods in proportion. To relieve the people and prevent starvation, flour and other articles were brought from the White Water Valley, and corn was purchased at the Indian villages up the river and boated down to the town. The nearest mill was Goodlandin of Whitewater River, and the arrival of a cargo of meal and flour, or of other articles from that quarter, produced general joy in the settlement. The settlers generously relieved each other's distress in this case, as in the preceding sickness, and many pecks of meal, sacks of flour, parcels of fish, meat, and other articles of food, were distributed to some more destitute neighbor.

After the October sale of lots, the weather, which during the summer had been very wet and changeable, and in the fall cold and gloomvochanged, and a long and beautiful Indian summer began. The sick quickly recovered their health, strength and spirits. The settlement rapidly tended to the East, for the sickness had been worse near the river, and the new comers and older settlers built their cabins along Washington street much farther from it than before. The dreary appearance of the settlement during the fall, no longer clung to it, and notwithstanding the threatened famine, the hopes of the settlers rose higher than ever. Washington street was the first street cleared, and during the fall of 1821, was completely blocked up by felled trees and prickly ash bushes. John Hawkins built a large log tavern where the Capitol House now stands, using logs cut from the site and adjoining street in its erec-The main settlement was still west of the Canal, near the tion. spot now occupied by the Carlisle House. A group of cabins in this vicinity, was dignified by "Wilmot's Row," from a man of that name who kept a store in the vicinity, and who was one of the first merchants of the place. The first merchant was a man named Nicholas Shaffer. He had a little store on the high ground, South of Pogue's Run, commencing in the Spring of 1821. He was the first person who died on the donation. He died in May or June, 1821, and was buried in Pogue's Run Valley, near the present site of the sixth ward school house. Later in the summer, J. & J.

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Given, and L T. Osborne, kept stores on the river bank, and Wilmot in "Wilmot's Row. Still later in the fall, and during the winter of 1821-22, after the sickness had driven the population eastward, several stores were established along Washington street. Luke Walpole, kept one on the south-west corner of the State House Square. Jacob Landis, then a young man, kept one on the South East corner of the same square. Jerniah Johnson, kept one on the lot where A. F. Morrison now lives, opposite Robert's Chapel.

The first marriage, the first birth, and the first death in the settlement \mathbf{o} curred in 1821.

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The first marriage took place in the summer, between Miss Reagan and Jøremgah, or as he was usually called, "Jerry Johnson." He walked to Connersville and back, 120 miles, for his marriage license, and others did the same till the county was organized. He died very suddenly on the 5th day of April, 1857. Woah Harding was the first person born on the donation, and James Morrow, was the first born in the limits of the then town. The first death was was that of Mr. Shaffer, before spoken of. Mrs. Maxwell, the wife of John Maxwell, was the first woman who died here; she died on the third of July, 1821, and was buried on the fourth.

The names of the pioneers in the different trades and professions, and the periods at which they arrived in the settlement are here given.

John McClun, a Christian new-light minister, who came in the spring of 1821, and preached to the citizens in a maple grove, on the site of the Governor's Circle, was the first preacher. The first Methodist Minister was James Scott, who came in October, 1822. The first Presbyterian minister was O. P. Gaines, who came in August, 1821. The first Baptist minister was John Water, who came in the fall of 1821. The first Physician was Isaac Coe, who came in May 1821. The first Attorney and legal counsellor was Calvin Fletcher, who came in September, 1821. The first Merchant was Daniel Shaffer, who came in January, 1821, and kept store on the high ground east of the Madison and Indianapolis Railroad Depot. The first carpenter was James B. Hall, who came in the winter of 1820. The first brick-maker and mason was Matthias Nowland, who came in November, 1820. The first tailor was Andrew Byrne, who came in November, 1820. The first shoemaker was Isaac Lynch, who came in the fall of 1821. Wm. Holmes, who came in the spring of 1822, was the first tinner; Michael Ingals, who came in the fall of 1820 ; Wikes Reagan, who came in the spring of 1821, was the first butcher and auctioneer; John Shunk, who came in October, 1821, was the first hatter; Amos Hanway, who came in June, 1821, was the first cooper; Conrad Brussel, who came in the fall of 1820, was the first baker; Milo R. Davis, who came in the winter of 1820-1, was the first plasterer; George Norwood, who came in the spring of 1821, was the first wagon maker ; John McCormack, who came in Febmordican

ruary, 1820, was the first tavern keeper; George Myers, who came in the fall of 1821, was the first potter; Caleb Scudder, who came in October, 1821, was the first cabinet-maker; Henry and Samuel Davis, who came in the fall of 1821, were the first chair-makers; Isaac Wilson, who came in March, 1820, was the first miller, and built the first grist-mill, on Fall creek, north-west of Blackford's addition, in the summer of 1821: George Pogue, who came in March, 1819, and who was killed by the Indians, as before related, was the first blacksmith; James Linton, who came in the summer of 1821, was the first sawyer, and built the first saw-mill on Fall creek, at the crossing of the Crawfordsville road, in September or October, 1821; Nathaniel Bolton and George Smith, who came in the summer of 1821, were the first Printers, and the latter was also the first Bookbinder; Joseph C. Reed, who came in the spring of 1821, was the first school teacher; the first school-house in the town stood just north of the State Bank, and west of the Palmer House, near a large pond ; The first foundry man was Mr. Grover ; the first painter was Samuel Rooker, who came in the fall of 1821; the first militia colonel was James Paxton, who came in 1822; the first lieutenant colonel was Samuel Morrow, who came in 1820; the first major was Alexander W. Russell, who came in the spring of 1821 ; Henry and Samuel Davis, were the first chair makers in the town. John Pogne, was the first blacksmith. Isaac Coe, the first physician. Calvin Fletcher, the first lawyer. John McClung, the first resident minister. ____ Lawrence, the first teacher. Amos Hanway, the first cooper. The first carpenter, James Linton. The first miller, Isaac Lynch.) D. Yandes, the first tanner. (Miles Reagan, the first butcher the first barber was David Mallory, an old mulatto, formerly well known among thecitizens.

The first Market House was built in May or June, 1822, in the maple grove, on the Governor's circle, and the first market was held there in the early part of June. Wilkes Reagan sold meat at these markets to the citizens. 18:20

The first brick house was built in the summer of 1822, by John Johnson, on the lot east of Roberts' Chapel. It is still standing in comparatively good repair.

The first frame house was built by James Blake, in the fall of 1821, and winter of 1821-2, on the lot east of Masonic Hall; it was also the first plastered house. The timber had been cut on the donation in the summer, by James Paxton, and sold by him to Mr. Blake. During the same winter, Thomas Carter, erected a "very commodious" (for so he advertises it), ceiled frame tavern, eighteen by twenty feet, and two stories high. This house stood on the site of the store, at 40 west Washinton street, and was long known as the "Rosebush Tavern," from the rude picture on its sign. It was removed to the vicinity of the canal, on Washington street, and is yet standing, and occupied by negroes. The first saw

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mill was built in this year, on Fall Creek, at the crossing of the Crawfordsville road, by James Sinton. He also built the first large frame dwelling house, two stories high, in the spring of 1822. The house stood on the ground now occupied by the wholesale grocery, at 76 west Washington street. It was burnt a number of years ago, and the present house was erected in its room. The first grist mill was built on the bayou, near Fall Creek in the fall of 1821, by James Sinton, Before its erection, the nearest mill was Goodlanders, on Whitewater River, and regular expeditions were organized to convey flour and meal to the settlements.

Until March, 1822, there was no Post-Office in the town, nor post-routes leading to it. The nearest Post-Office was at Connersville, and the mails came over at long intervals. The people were seriously incommoded on account of it, and determined to hold a meeting. This was their favorite method of redressing grievances. It was steadily resorted to, until within a few years, and even yet has not lost its power. On Wednesday, the 30th of January, 1822. they assembled at Hawkius tavern, and resolved to have a private mail, Aaron Drake was selected as Postmaster. He immediately issued a circular to the Postmasters of the Union, stating his appointment, and directing them to send letters for Indianapolis to Connersville. He returned from the first trip shortly after nightfall, the lowd blasts from his horn were heard far through the woods; and the whole people turned out in the bright moonlight, to greet him and hear the news. His efforts aroused the government, and in February or March, Samuel Henderson was appointed the first Postmaster by President Monroe. He entered on the duties of the office on the 7th day of March, and on the 3d day of April, the first list of letters was published. The list contained five letters, one being directed to David Mallory, the old negro barber, so well known among the old residents.

As the winter of 1821-2 rolled on, and the settlers became better acquainted and better fixed, they grew more merry and convivial. A regular round of dances, quiltings, parties, frolics, and sprees, continued through the season. A mania for marrying/ took possession of the young people, and scarcely a bachelor was left in the settlement. Great good humor prevailed, for it was known that the county would soon be organized, and candidates were very numerous. An old lady declared that there were no voters left in the country, for all the men had become candidates. The general desire to do the best they could under the circumstances lightened the burthen for all, and the winter passed pleasantly, notwithstanding the sickness, the famine, and the cold. The latter was extremely severe and protracted. The snow was deep, and large logs were hauled by oxen over the ice bridge on White River. The dense forest around them supplied plenty of fuel, and with large fire-places, great "back-logs," roaring fires, and warm hearts, the inmates of the rude cabins, bid defiance to the weather.

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The question having been raised, whether the survey and allowances made, the surveyors and commissioners were valid, because Harrison was the only one engaged in it, the Legislature on the 28th of November, 1821, legalized his acts, and the subsequent sales. On the 31st of December, an act was passed authorizing Gen. Carr to lease to McDonald & McCartney, a mill-seat and forty acres of land, rent free for ten years.

On the same day an act was passed, organizing Marion County; the organization to be complete on the first of April, 1822. The act made square 58 (our present county square), the seat of justice for the County. It provided for the erection of a brick Court House thereon, fifty feet square, and two stories high, and appropriated \$8000 from the lot fund to build it. It was to be commenced in one and completed in three years, from the passage of the act. It was to be used by the Federal, State and County Courts forever, and by the Legislature for fifty years, or until a State House was built. Two per cent of the lot fund was devoted to the purchase of a County Library, after deducting the expense attending the erection of a State Prison at Jeffersonville. The voters of the County were to meet at Indianapolis within one year, to choose a President and Trustees of the Library. (A large tract of country to the north of the County, was attached to it for judicial purposes, until the Court House was completed, the sessions of the Courts and the elections were to be held at Gen. Carr's house. A large territory, comprising Johnson and Hamilton, and a large part of Boone, Madison and Hancock Counties, was atttached to Marion County for election and judicial purposes.

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On the same day, an act was passed, organizing the 5th Judicial Circuit, comprising Lawrence, Monroe, Morgan, Green, Owen, Marion, Hendricks, Rush, Decatur, Bartholomew, Shelby, and Jennings Counties. The Legislature elected Wm. W. Wick, President Judge of the Circuit, and Gov. Jennings, appointed Harvey Bates, the first Sheriff of Marion County. These gentlemen were from Whitewater, and their arrival in the spring of 1822, was duly annonneed in the columns of the Gazette.

On the 3d of January, 1822, the Legislature directed the agent to lease the unsold squares in the town; requiring the lesse₄ to clear them in four months. He was also directed to sell two acres in any part of the donation for a brickyard, and to lease the ferry for three years. The donation land west of the river, was to be leased in lots of from five to twenty acres. Many roads were ordered to be opened, and nearly \$100,000 were appropriated to affect it. This action greatly encouraged the settlers, who were still shut out from the world by intervening wilderness. On the 10th of January, an act was passed, allowing persons who made improvements on the unsold blocks, forty days time to remove their improvements after the sale of the blocks. On the 8th of January, an act passed, organizing Hamilton county from Marion, and di-

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recting Commissioners to meet at Conner's Station, to select and lay off a county seat.

On the 28th of January, the first number of the Indianapolis Gazette was published at a cabin, south east of the Carlisle House, and west of the canal. This paper, the first in the town or in the new purchase, was edited and printed by George Smith and Nathaniel Bolton. The first number were printed with a composition of tar ink. The paper appeared at irregular intervals. The second number was published on the 11th of February, the third on the 25th, the fourth on the 6th of March, the fifth on the 18th, the sixth on the 3d of April, the seventh on the 4th of May, after which period it was issued weekly. The editors apologized for the irregularity, by saying that the mails were infrequent, they could not get matter to fill their columns. Several post routes were opened, however, in April and May, and this difficulty was measurably obviated. The paper was published weekly, until 1832, when it was discontinued. On the 3d of May, 1823, B. F. Morris became its editor. On the 27th of April, 1844, Smith and Bolton dissolved partnership.

In February, the Gazette says, much improvement had taken place in the town. Forty dwellings had been built. Several workshops had been erected, and one grist and two saw mills were in operation. Several additional mills were nearly ready to commence operations. There were thirteen carpenters and joiners, four cabinet makers, eight blacksmiths, four boot and shoe makers, two tailors, one hatter, two tanners, one saddler, one cooper, four bricklayers, two merchants, three grocery keepers, four physicians, one teacher, one preacher, three lawyers, and seven taverns and tavern keepers. This enumeration will give us nearly the whole adult male population, which probably did not exceed eighty or ninety, many of these were unmarried men.

On the 25th of February, Harvey Bates issued his proclamation, directing an election for two Associate Judges, a Clerk, a Recorder, and three Commissioners for the new county. The following precincts were fixed at Gen. Carr's house in Indianapolis; John Finch's, near Conner's Station; James Page's, at Strawtown; John Berry's, at Anderson's town, and Wm. McCartney's, on Fall Creek. The election took place on Monday, the first day of April, and the returns were forwarded to the Sheriff by the following Wednesday.

Party excitement grew very strong as the day of election approached. Many candidates were placed in nomination, and the friends of each were very active in their support. For Associate Judges, James McIlvaine, Robert Patterson, James Page, John Smock, and Rev. John McClung, were nominated. For Clerk, James M. Ray, Milo R. Davis, Morris Morris, Thos. Anderson, and John W. Redding. For Recorder, Alex. Ralston, James Linton, Joseph C. Reed, Aaron Drake, John Livens, John Hawkins, Wm.

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Vandegriff and Wm. Townsend. Twelve or fifteen persons were nominated for County Commissioners. The names of these nominees were published in the "Gazette," and their friends worked for them with great zeal and resolution, nominating conventions and party caucuses were then unknown. National policy did not control the primary elections. On the contrary, local issues often determined the selection of legislators, representatives in Congress, and United States Sentors. Personal popularity was required, and the best electioneer was generally selected. Local prejudices, however, sometimes governed the elections. This was the case for a long time in this county. The emigration from Whitewater and Kentucky was nearly simultaneous, and the settlers from each section brought their political notions and their candidates along. The community naturally divided into the "Whitewater" and "Kentucky" parties. James M. Ray was the leading candidate of the former, and Morris Morris, of the latter. The electioneering was most thorough. Party strife rose, as the day drew nigh, and both parties were confident of success. Everything was in confusion on the day of election. Gallons of whiskey were distributed to "the dry," and nearly every man in the settlement was more or less intoxicated. Staid and sober citizens in the excitement of victory, or the grief of defeat forgot themselves momentarily, and joined in the spree. A large number of Kentuckians were not entitled to vote, not having resided a year in the State. This gave the Whitewater men the advantage, and being also ably managed, their party carried the election. The Kentuckians, however, ultimately out-numbered, out-generalled, and out voted them. James McIlvaine and Eliakim Harding, were elected Associate Judges. James M. Ray, Clerk; Joseph C. Reed, Recorder, and John T. Osborne, John McCormick, and Wm. McCartney, County Commissioners.

Three hundred and thirty-six votes were cast in this County, which then included Hamilton, and part of Boone, Madison, Hancock and Johnson. Twenty-one thousand votes are now polled in the same territory. The highest number of votes for one person was 217 for James M. Ray/ 224 votes were cast at this precinct. Of this number, nearly one half were voters residing on the donation.

In the course of the year, the town gradually extended along Washington street to the eastward. The buildings were somewhat better, and the settlement assumed a more thifty and permanent appearance. The population slowly increased, and at the end of the year it amounted to perhaps in hundred persons. Many persons had left for homes in the country, or for the Ohio and Whitewater Rivers. The stories told by these persons, gave the town an unfavorable reputation as to health, and one which it did not deserve, for the sickness of 1821 was more general and deadly in many other places in the Mississippi Valley than here. This reput-

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tation, however, effectnately hindered the advance of the town in population or wealth, for at least ten years. The value of property really depreciated, and in 1831, there were 1900 acres of unsold land in the donation, worth on the average not more than ten or fifteen dollars per acre. In that year a sale took place, at which the greater part of these lands were sold. Some lots, however, remained unsold until the year 1841.

Heavy and continuous rains fell during the months of March and April, and the whole country was deluged by water. The streams rose much higher than usual, shutting off communication with other other places. The editors of the Gazette were away when the freshet came, and wes- delayed four weeks before they could get home. They alleged this in excuse for the suspension of the paper, during their forced and prolonged absence. The old settlers assert that it rained far more frequently and heavily in the early settlement than now, and the country at times was one vast marsh. The unparalled sickness of 1821, and the general sickness of this year was justly ascribed to the quantity of water which deluged the country. (It is said that during the months of \ June, July and August, 1821, it rained hard every day. The clouds would suddenly clear off, the sun's rays would descended the utmost power, fairly steaming the drenched herbage, and not a breath of air to carry away the miasmatic exhalations. Still but little sickness prevailed in the settlement till after the 10th of Au-On that day Mathias Nowland had a raising, and nearly all gust. the men in the settlement assisted him. Sickness commenced from that day, and by the end of the month nearly the whole settlement was down. It is said that but two persons escaped; these were Thomas Chinn and Enoch Banks. Although the sickness was so general, the mortality was not so great as in other western towns; not more than twenty-five persons died during its continuance, and/ these were principally children, who had been too much exposed.

On the 15th of April, 1822, the newly elected County Commissioners, divided the County into Fall Creek, Anderson, White River, Delaware, Lawrence, Washington, Pike, Warren, Center, Wayne, Franklin, Perry, and Decatur townships. Washington, Lawrence, Pike, Waynen Decatur, Perry, Franklin, Center and Warren, were united for the want of population

In the spring of 1822, the trees and undergrowth on Washington street, were still so dense, that it was impossible for a person at John Hawkins "Eagle Tavern," which stood where the Capitol House now is, to see Isaac Lynch's house and shoe shop, which stood on the ground now occupied by the buildings Nos. 5 and 7 West Washington street. The settlers thought they were making a rapid advance, when they were able to take a wagon over the zig zag path, cut along and near Washington street in the spring of 1822. The fallen timber was fired, and night after night the red flames along the line of the street illumined the dense bordering for-

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ests. The <u>settlers</u> worked hard to clear the street, and often labored at it till a late hour of the night.

In May and June plaus were submitted to the County Commissioners for a Court House. That of James Paxton and John E. Baker was approved, and after advertising for proposals, the contract for the building was awarded to them early in September. The erection of the house began in the summer of 1823. It was completed in the fall of 1824, at a cost of \$14,000.

On the 25th of May an election, at Gen. Carr's house, for three Justices of the Peace for Centre Township, resulted in the choice of Wilkes Reagan, Obed Foote, and Lismund Basye, who shortly thereafter resumed their offices.

The increase of the population and the organization of the courts rendered a jail necessary. By order of the Commissioners, Hervey Bates advertised for bids for clearing the Court House square, and for the erection of a jail. The square was to be cleaned in two months, and the jail built by the first of August. The jail was built in June, July and August. It was a hewed log house, and situated in the north-west corner of the square, and was used for prison purposes till 1833, when it was burned by a negro who was imprisoned in it, and who came near sufficienting ere he was rescued. The ruins of this jail was visible 'until three or four years since. The old brick jail, east of the Court House, was built in 1833 and used till 1845, when the hewed log jail just north of it was finished. Both these buildings were torn down in 1855, on the completion of the new stone prison, which was built in 1854-5.

Before the Court House square was cleared, James Blake induced the County Commissioners to order the reservation of two hundred of the forest trees which densely covered it. The intention was to reserve the young maple trees, but no specific instructions were given to the contractor, and he left two hundred of the largest trees on the tract. As soon as the forest was cut around the square, the fierce and frequent storms prostrated many of these trees, and the Commissioners were compelled to cut them all away. Mr. Blake also induced Judge Harrison to lay off North, South, East and . West streets, and "the old burying ground." The old town plat originally joined the remainder of the donation. Mr. Blake suggested that forty or fifty years from that time it would be a pleasant drive of four miles, always a half mile from the center of town, if streets were laid off. Judge Harrison approved the suggestion, and the streets were laid off. He also assigned a spot near the river, since known as "the old burying ground," for burial purposes, and on the 31st of December, 1822, the Legislature granted the ground to the town for that purpose. In the meantime a number of persons were buried there, the first being Daniel Shaffer, the first merchant of the place, who was buried about the 25th of August, 1821. *

The Gazette notices the arrivals, on the 29th of May, of keelboats Eagle, of 15 tons, from Kanawha, with salt, whisky, dried

He was first hund in Porsia, Pen. Salley near the Whard School provide, In Mayor I are 21 fruit and tobacco; the Boxer, of 33 tons, from Zanesville, with merchandise and printing materials, for Luke Walpole, then one of the leading merchants, and keeping store on the Court House square.

On the 17th of June a citizens' meeting took place at John Hawkins' tavern, to make arrangements for the first celebration of the Fourth of July in the new town. This celebration took place at the intersection of West and Washington streets. The order of exercises had been settled at the meeting, and were as follows : the Rev. John McClung preached a sermon from Proverbs x1v:34. Mr. W. Wick then read the Declaration of Independence, prefacing it with a few remarks on the revolutionary struggle, and the character of the men engaged in it. Obed Foote read Washington's Inaugural Address, prefacing it with some remarks concerning sectional issues and parties. John Hawkins read Washington's Farewell Address, prefacing it with a few appropriate remarks. The exercises closed with prayer and benediction by Robert Brenton. A bountiful repast was prepared for the hungry. A pit had been dug near a large elm tree, and in it a deer was barbecued for the crowd. The deer had been killed the preceding night on the north part of the donation, by Robert Harding, and was dedicated to the public. A long table was placed under the trees when supper was served. Speeches were made by Dr. K. G. Mitchell and Major John W. Redding. The festivities concluded with a ball at J. R. Crumbaugh's house, just west of the canal.

On the 20th of June a meeting was held at the school house to make arrangements for a permanent school; trustees were appointed. Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence were selected as teachers, and the school was supported for a considerable period. The school house had been built in 1821, north of the State Bank and near a large pond of water. Joseph C. Reed was the first teacher, but several others taught at intervals prior to the establishment of the permanent school.

On the 5th of August the State election took place. William Hendricks, the candidate for Governor, received 315 out of 317 votes cast, at the Indianapolis precinct. Hervey Bates was elected Sheriff, and George Smith, Coroner, for the new county. They were the first regularly elected incumbents in each of these offices.

The Marion Circuit Court commenced its first session on the 26th day of September, 1822, at Gen. John Carr's cabin, opposite the western entrance of the Court House square. Wm. W. Wick was the President Judge, James McIlvain and Eliakim Harding, Associate Judges; Hervey Bates, Sheriff, and James M. Ray, Clerk. As soon as the court convened, it adjourned to Jacob R. Grumbangh's cabin, on lot 11 square 51, north side of Washington street just west of the canal. The second session commenced at Gen. Carr's on the 5th of May, 1823, and adjourned instanter to the Washington Hall tavern, where the Wright House now stands Tale ?

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The third session commenced at Gen. Carr's on the 3d of November and adjourned instantly to James McIlvain's cabin, on lot 11 square 46, just north of the Governor's Circle. The fourth session began at Gen. Carr's on the 12th of April, 1824, and instantly adjourned to John Johnson's house, on lot 11 square 44, just east of Roberts' Chapel. Mr. Johnson's house was the first brick house built on the donation. It is yet standing, and is now owned by Oliver W. Johnston. The fifth session of the court began at Gen. Carr's house, on the 11th of October, 1824, and immediately adjourned to the Court House, which had been constructed, and was then ready for occupancy.

The first sessions of the court were attended by all the prominent lawyers of the State. Many of them avowed their intention to become residents of the place, but its isolation, the sickness among the settlers, and the disadvantages connected with life in a small backwoods village, frightened them out of the notion.

During September and October the roads provided for at the previous session of the Legislature, were located, and some of them partly opened. They were in charge of Commissioners, who directed the work upon them, and governed the expenditure of the appropriations. Several of them were badly managed, and years elapsed, in some cases, ere the roads were passable. The roads to the White Water country were among the first opened.

During the fall this region was invaded by an army of grey squirrels. The little animals were marching westward, in countless numbers, and crossed the river at several points near town. Their number and voracity made them very unwelcome visitors, and the fields of corn in their path were, in many cases, almost totally destroyed. This movement, or migration, of these animals was often witnessed in this section. One took place about twelve years since, during which the squirrels came into the heart of the town.

The first camp-meeting in this vicinity began on the 12th day of September, 1822. The writer from lack of time has been unable to find its location, the names of attending ministers, the time it lasted, or any other facts connected with it.

Gen. Carr having resigned the agency at Indianapolis, the Governor appointed James Milroy to fill the office. The appointment of another non resident irritated the citizens and caused them to dislike the agent. The Legislature, on the 6th of December, elected Bethuel F. Morris, who became a resident of the place, and now lives on the southern border of the city. Mr. Morris subsequently held the office of President Judge of the Fifth Judicial Circuit, and was long the cashier of the Branch Bank.

On the 2d day of December the citizens met at Carter's tavern to make arrangements for a weekly mail from Vernon to this point, during the session of the Legislature. This object was subsequently effected. On the 7th of December the first sale of lots for taxes took place. The list of delinquencies was comparatively a long

one, and indubitable proved the existence of "hard times." The highest amount against any one lot was $\$2\ 87\frac{1}{2}$, and the amounts generally ranged from 25 cents to one dollar.

Christmas brought once more a round of merry makings and festivities. The settlers were now better situated and more comfortably housed. A great deal of sickness had prevailed during the summer, but it was far less general than in the summer of 1821, and this fact led the settlers to hope more for the future. Provisions were plentiful and cheap. The country around the town was being gradually settled, and the population of the town itself was still on the increase.

Early in December it was proposed that the town should be incorporated, but the citizens generally opposed it, and the project was abandoned.

On the 7th of January, 1823, the Legislature removed the ban under which the people of the New Purchase had labored, and gave them a representation in that body. The citizens had often complained of the want of representation. This just measure naturally gratified them, and they were prompt in availing themselves of it. The claims of candidates were actively canvassed from this time until the August election, and their merits were duly paraded in the two papers. In addition to the Gazette, which had been published about a year, the town now boasted a second paper, "The Western Censor and Emigrant's Guide," the first number of which appeared in March, 1823, edited and printed by Harvey Gregg & Douglass Maguire.

Thus far no house of worship had been erected in the town. The settlers were compelled to listen to sermons in some dwelling house, or in the maple grove on the Governor's Circle. No church organization yet existed, and no regularly salaried ministers officiated. On the 6th of March, 1823, the Presbyterians in the settlement met at the school house to determine the size and cost of a meeting house, and to organize a church. A committee was appointed to obtain subscriptions. The church was framed and raised during the summer, but it was not fully completed until the ensuing summer. It was situated on the lot just north of Major A. F. Morrison's residence, and cost, with the lot, about \$1200. It was regarded as a very fine church, and a very expensive one for the congregation and the town It is still standing on the same spot, and now forms part of a carriage manufactory.

The congregation met on the 22d of March to elect trustees. The building was raised in May and June, and the church was organized immediately afterward. Rev. David C. Proctor was the first minister. He had been acting as a missionary at this place in 1822, and left the town sometime in August or September, 1824. He was succeeded in the ministry, on the 6th of September, by the Rev. George Bush, since widely known as a theologian. For five years after the organization of the church, the average attendance did not exceed one hundred persons.

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The unsold donation lands were rented by the agent, on the 23d of March, and in April he sold two lots of two acres each, for brickyards, at \$65 75 per acre. This was thought to be a high price, and their value subsequently declined.

The second camp meeting was held on James Givens' farm, just east of the donation, beginning May 23d and continuing one week.

On the 1st of June the first woolen machinery was put into operation, at Isaac Wilson's mill on Fall creek, by Wm. Townsend and Earl Pearce.

The first sabbath school was organized on the 6th of April, 1823, in Caleb Scudder's cabinet shop, on the State House square. The enterprise was forwarded by members of all the churches, and was strictly a Union sabbath school. It was completely successful. By the fourth sabbath more than seventy scholars were in attendance, and at the close of the first year, one hundred were present. After the completion of the church, the school met in it and continued to do so for several years. It would be interesting to trace the history of the Sabbath Schools of our city, but want of space and time forbids it. We may say, however, that Dr. Isaac Coe labored most zealously and effectively in this cause, and its success was mainly owing to his energy and perseverance.

The Fourth of July was celebrated with becoming fervor. The celebration took place at Wilkes Reagan's cabin, in the woods, near the intersection of Pogue's Run and Market street. The exercises began with prayer, by Rev. D. C. Proctor. Daniel B. Wick then read the Declaration, Morris Morris delivered an oration, and the exercises closed with prayer and benediction by Rev. Mr. Reed. A barbeene had been prepared by Wilkes Reagan, and the "crowd," including Capt. Curry's militia rifle company, were duly fed. The banquet was enlivened by the usual toasts and speeches.

Political feeling grew spong as the August election approached. The first Senator and representative were to be elected, and the friends of the different candidates were actively working for their interest. The canvass was an active one. Two hundred and seventy votes were cast in the county. James Gregory, of Shelby county, was elected Senator from this District. James Paxton was elected Representative.

In September, the "Western Censor," established the population at six or seven hundred persons, and asserted that the health of the town had been far better during the summer than it has been reported abroud. It speaks of the envy and prejudice entertained by other towns against the Capital, and warmly condemns it.

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Early in October, Thomas Carter moved into a large frame tavern, which he had built during the summer, opposite the Court House' Square, and on the 26th of October, the first sermon by a Baptist minister, was preached there. This tavern burned up severl years afterward, during the session of the Legislature. The people were highly excited, and between the fire and the destructive ten-

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dencies of the citizens, Carter lost nearly all his property. During the fire several individuals determined to save "the new sign," and procuring an axe they chopped it down. As a matter of course the fall crushed the "sign" to fragments, much to their astonishment.

During 1823, the improvement and clearing of the town site had steadily progressed, and by the close **ef** of the year the timber had been generally felled along and near Washington street, and in isolated spots a short distance north and south of it. The populated part of the town was mainly along that street however.

During the fall and winter of 1823-4 the[®] Washington Hall," a two-story frame tavern which formerly stood where the Wright House now stands, was built by James Blake and Samuel Henderson, and opened with a great Ball on or about the 12th of January 1824. This was for many years the leading Hotel in the place, and the head-quarters of the politicians of the time. It was removed to the lot just east of its former position and the Old Washington Hall, now the Wright House, was built in its stead in 1837. A part of it is yet standing at 35 East-Washington street, and is now occupied as a clothing store. $\frac{4}{36}$

The Senators and Representatives of the counties in the new purchase having taken their seats in the Legislature, greater deference was paid to the wishes of the people in this region, and on the 20th of January an act was passed making Indianapolis the permanent seat of government for the State. The public offices and public documents were to be transferred to the new seat of government by the second Monday in January, 1825. The Legislature was to meet on that day, in the Court House, which had just been completed. The act provided that the Court House should be used by the Legislature for the term of fifty years, or until a State House should be erected ; it was also to be used by the Supreme, Federal and County Courts forever. Samuel Merrill, then Treasurer of State, was directed to supervise the removal of the public offices. The removal took place late in the fall, and although the distance was but 125 miles, such was the condition of the weather and the roads, that ten days passed ere the journey was accomplished.

About the middle of February the Agent leased 157 acres of the improved lands on the donation at \$2 to \$3 per acre. This was thought so good a price that the papers jocosely advised the State to rent rather than sell her grounds.

On the 20th of February the citizens gave a complimentary supper at the Washington Hall, to Messrs. Gregory and Paxton, their Senator and Representative, as a testimonial of their approval of their Legislative efforts. The toasts and speeches indicated an excess of gratitude, and betrayed the hopes which the removal of the capital had ereated.

On the 10th of March a Citizen's meeting was called to devise ways and means to improve the grave yard, which up to this time was heavily timbered and densely overgrown by bushes. Forty or

fifty persons had been buried in it up to this time. It was resolved to enclose it and to cut the timber and brush off of it. The spot then used as a cemetery is now known as the "Old Burial Ground," and is nearly filled with graves.

On the 22d of March a number of Indians were murdered at their camp on Fall creek, 30 miles above this place, by five white men and two boys. The whites were Bridges and his son, Sawyer and and his son, Hudson and Harper; the last named person was the instigator of the outrage. The Indian party belonged to the Shawnee tribe, and consisted of three men, three women, two half-grown girls and two small boys. They had spent the winter in trapping and hunting on Fall creek, and had collected such a store of furs that Harper's avarice was aroused and he determined to secure them. He got his party drunk, made them believe that the Indians had been stealing horses, and then proposed that they should murder The whites went to the Indian camp and asked the three them. men to assist them in hunting cattle. After going a short distance, two of the Indians were shot, but the third escaped, despite the bullets which were fired after him. The whites then returned to the camp and murdered the women and children, badly mutilating them to induce the belief that other Indians had killed them. The children were killed by dashing their heads against the trees, and all the bodies were thrown into a pond. One of the women, however, was not killed out=right, and was found next day still breathing. 'The wretches divided the property of the Indians, and its division They were arrested and confessed the crime, but betraved them. by the assistance of friends escaped from confinement : all were re-arrested but Harper, who traveled 80 miles on foot in 24 hours, and finally escaped. The elder Bridges, Sawyer and Hudson were executed in the winter and spring. The young Sawyer was also sentenced to be executed, and his grave and coffin were prepared by order of Gov. Ray, who dressed in uniform and carrying a drawn sword, then mounted a platform and announced his pardon to the spectators, in a long speech. The execution of the leaders satisfied the Indians, and they adopted no retaliatory measures, but at first the murder terribly excited the settlers, who all fled to the mills at Pendleton for protection, and many families left the country permanently, from the fears of an Indian war. One of the Indians killed was an old chief, by the name of *Logan*. The trial took place at Anderson, in November, 1824, before Hon. Wm. W. Wick, President Judge of the Circuit.

The census of the town taken in the first week of April, 1824, by the Sunday School visitors, and published in the Censor, shows that there were then one hundred families on the donation. There were 172 voters, and 45 single ladies over 15 and under 45 years of age. The number of children was not mentioned.

During the month of April and the early part of May, heavy rains prevailed, and White river rose to the greatest height it was

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ever known to attain. The bayous through the town, the creeks and the surrounding country were deluged by water, and the roads were absolutely impassable.

The first quarterly meeting of the Methodist church in this vicinity began in the Presbyterian church, which was now nearly finished, on the 15th of May. Rev. James Scott was the first regular preacher of that denomination who located here. He had been sent by the Conference at St. Louis, in the fall of 1822, and arrived in October of that year, after experiencing the greatest difficulty in finding the town.

The papers on the 22d of May announced the arrival of the keel boat Dandy, 28 tons, with a cargo of salt and whiskey—the_A "staples" ranked among the "necessaries of life" in the new Purchase, and a very large quantity of each was consumed in proportion to the population.

The anniversary of our Independence came this year on Sunday; the celebration, therefore, took place on the 3d, with the customary formality and patriotism. The rifle company paraded, and with the great mass of the population repaired to a grove near Wilkes Reagan's honse, where Gabriel J. Johnston and John W. Redding, delivered orations; the former to the citizens and the latter to the "milishy." Obed Foote then read the Declaration of Independence. Wilkes Reagan prepared a barbacue for the crowd, and the exercises ended.

The annual election took place on the first Monday of August. Four hundred and thirty votes were polled in the county, being an increase of 160 votes over the poll of 1823. The contest was mainly for Sheriff. Alexander W. Russell and Morris Morris were the principal opposing candidates; the former receiving 265 votes, and the latter 148. At the Presidential election in November, 328 votes were cast. Henry Clay received 213 votes, Gen. Jackson 99, and John Quincy Adams 16. The "Great Commoner" was almost idolized in the new town, and always received a sweeping vote.

The poll was nearly one hundred less than at the August election. It is now difficult to assign the reason for the decrease in the retto; but it probably arose from the fact that some of the settlers moved into the country in the intervening time. This was common in the early settlement.

The old settlers assert that the storms which occurred during the early settlement of the country, far exceeded those of the present time, in both fury and frequency, and that the electrical displays at that time equalled, if they did not surpass the wildest storms in the tropics. The country was often flooded by the water, which fell to the earth in the course of a few hours, and every river and creek would rise over its banks, compelling travelers to swim the streams or wait for their subsidence.

There was a slight increase in population of the town in 1824. Many persons came to the settlement, but they soon afterwards vote

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moved into the country. The improvements, however, were more permanent, and some good brick and frame houses were erected. The Court house, a school house, and a church had been built, and preparations were made for the erection of the buildings for the accommodation of the officers of State. The settlement gradually extended on each side of Washington street, and a great part of the town plat was cleared of the timber. The settlement

The revenue derived by the State, for the year 1824, from the taxable property of every description in Marion county, amounted to \$154 25. The amount now realized is about \$25,000, with perhaps \$20,000 more for School, Library and Sinking fund purposes.

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In 1824-5, the Indianapolis Legislature was formed, and continued its sessions for a number of years. Its Constitutions was in all respects, similar to that of the body it copied, and the subjects of debate and public measures before each body were the same. Many talented men were enrolled as members, and assigned to different counties, and it is not saying too much to aver, that in many instances, the mock representative displayed far more ability and represented his county more efficiently than the bona-fide reprepresentatives in the Legislature. The messages from the Governor were generally witty, and frequently very able documents. The Governor was elated whenever the members wanted a new inaugural. The messages and proceedings were often published in the papapers. The proceedings in the Indianapolis Legislature, often guided and sometimes controlled similar measures in the bona fide Legislature, and exercised no small influence on the politics and public measures of both parties.

On the 2d Monday of January, 1825, the seat of government was permanently located, and the officers established at Indianapolis. The removal of the latter through the wilderness from Corydon, had taken place a few days previously, under the supervision of Samuel Merrill, then Treasurer of State, and the agent appointed by the Legislature for that purpose. The session of the Legislature began on the 11th of January, in the new Court House, which was still unfinished in some respects. The Senate met in the upper story, and the Honse in the lower, or Court room. The sessions of the Legislature were held in the Court room, until the winter of 1834-5. The State House was then completed, and the Legislature met there for the first time.

The members of the earlier Legislatures, fully earned the mileage which they obtained. The roads were almost impassable, and travellers ran some risk in attempting to follow them, For several days prior to the commencement of the session, the members arrived on horseback, singly, or in small companies, and stopped at the taverns. The crowd of strangers, the arrival of the members, and the opening of the session, created much excitement, and for several days a large concourse of the natives witnessed the Legisla-

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tive proceedings with great interest. The hardships and reverses experienced in 1821-2, had materially diminished the hopes hopes of the settlers, but they became more confident after the removal of the Capitol. The influx of strangers gave a new impetus to business. The value of town property became steadier, and the decline formerly noticed in it was checked. No actual advance, however, took place in real estate, until the speculation era of 1834-5-6. From this time, until 1846 or '47, the annual sessions of the Legislature were regarded with great interest. The expenditure of twenty or thirty thousand dollars in the town during the winter, by members and strangers, gave new life to trade, and excited the envy and jealousy of other villages in the State. As the time for the session approached, the citizens would anxiously await the arrival of the members. For many years the members reached the Capitol by mud wagons, or on horseback. Saddle bags were then as indispensable, to the legislator, as boxes now are to hold his stolen books.

On the 12th of February, 1825, the Legislature by-law, directed the agent to sell the reserved lots on Washington street, as well as a few others in different quarters of the town. He was also directed to lease the ferry for a term of five years. The valley of Pogue's run was also to be cleared, if the expense attending it did not exceed fifty dollars. Twenty additional out lots were also to be laid off and sold. These directions were complied with by Mr. Blythe, the agent, with the exception of clearing of Pogue's run valley. A part of which was still covered by forest, as late as the year 1843, and a few of the old forest trees are yet standing.

The Methodists, in the summer of 1825, purchased a lot, and a hewed log house on the south-side of Maryland street, near the intersection with Meridian. The house stood near the present Baptist church, and services were continued there until 1829, when the congregation increased beyond the capacity of the church, and a large brick edifice was then built on the corner of Circle and Meridian streets. This church was used as a place of worship until 1846, when it became unsafe, and Wesley Chapel was erected on its site. In 1842, a division of the charge was made, and Roberts Chapel was erected in 1844, at the corner of Market and Pennsylvania streets, in "the eastern charge." Since that time, Asbury, Strange, North street, and several other church edifices have been erected. The German Methodists have several churches, and the African Methodists have a church. The first Methodist church together with the lot, cost only about \$300. The first brick church cost about \$3,000. Wesley and Roberts Chapel, cost probably about \$10,000 a piece. No very expensive church edifices have been erected in Indianapolis.

The winter of 1825-6, was at times quite severe, but the wwere milder than they have been of late years. There was more rain, and the country often became one vast sea of mud, through which

unhappy travellers on horseback or in mud wagons floundered, in despair of reaching their destination.

On the 13th of January, 1826, the Legislature ordered the erection of a ferry honse on the river bank. The house to be built of brick, eighteen by thirty feet, and two stories high. This house was built by Asabel Dunning, during the summer of 1826, and is yet standing near the mill race, on the south side of Washington street.

The hard times, and the prevailing sickness in the settlement, and the whole country during the years 1821–2–3 and 4, had prevented the holders of property in the new town, from complying with their engagements. On many lots but one payment had been made, while on others, but a very small portion of the stipulated price had been paid. To give relief to those who were thus situated, the Legislature on the 20th of January, passed an act, extending the time for payment, and allowing those purchasers of several lots to surrender a part, and apply the down payments on the surrendered lots to the liquidation of their indebtedness on those they retained.

This measure greatly relieved the lot buyers, and they soon surrendered lots and transferred the payments to others. Land in the western part of the town, rapidly declined, and the settlement came eastward. From this time, until after the completion of the State House, and the inauguration of the internal improvement scheme, the main part of the town existed along Washington and Market streets, between the State House Square and the Court House. Tt is curious to note the changes in the general tendency of the settlement, since it first began. The first and oldest part of town is situated on the bank of the river. In 1822-3, the population moved eastward, and until 1834-5, this tendency was not checked. In that year, however, and until 1840, the contrary direction was observed, and business and population tended westward. From 1840 till 1847-8, the center of trade and population remained nearly stationary. It then tended rapidly southward, then to the east, The present indications are, that this and now to the north-east. will continue to be the tendency hereafter, but the experience of the past does not confirm it.

During the month of June, the citizens had been notified that Lorenzo Dow, the wandering preacher, noted for his oddity in dress, and manner, and his blunt eccentricity of speech, would preach to them, and they repaired to a grove near the present site of the M. & I. R. R. Depot, for that purpose. Mr. Dow preached a second time in the Court House, and attracted the attention of the citizens more by his peculiarities, than by eloquence.

On the 25th of January, 1827, the Legislature directed the agent to convey to a company, for a nominal price, seven acres of the donation lands, near the present river bridge, as a site for a steam mill. On the 17th of January, 1828, N. McCarty, James M. Ray, Wm. Sanders, N. Noble, Daniel Yandes, and others, were incorporated as the "Indianapolis Steam Mill Company," with a

a capital of \$20,000, in \$50 shares. Subscription books were to be opened, directors elected, buildings erected, &c., The mill was built in 1830, by the company, and for a number of years was regarded with great pride by the citizens. It was afterwards abandoned, but was repaired and used as a woolen factory, till 1856, when it was fired by an incendiary and utterly destroyed. The flames greatly endangered the neighboring bridge, which was saved by strenous exertions on the part of the firemen.

On the 26th of January, the Legislature appropriated \$500 to build on Court House Square, a one story brick house of two rooms, for the clerks office of the Supreme Court. This building was erected during the following summer. It stood just west of the present county clerks office, and was torn down in 1855. The same act appropriated \$4,000, to build a residence for the Governor on the Circle. It was to be of brick and two stories high. It was erected during the summer, at a cost of about \$6,500. The contract was signed on the 17th" of March, by B. J. Blythe, and Samuel Merrill, on the part of the State, and Austen Bishop, Robert Culbertson, Wm. Smith, and Wm. Speaks, as contractors. It was solidly built of brick, two stories high, and had four large halls in each story. The agent was required to enclose the Circle with a rail fence, by the first day of May. At the session of 1829, it was proposed to build wings on the east and west ends, and use it as a State House, but the project was killed and never revived. It was never used as a residence by the Governor. The Judges of the Supreme Court, the State Engineers, several old bachelors, and latterly the clerk of the Supreme Court have occupied its rooms until a recent date. At the last session of the Legislature, it was ordered to be sold. This was done on the 16th of April, 1857, for \$665, and at present the old building is being rapidly demolished. Many of the old settlers attended the sale of this old mark of the early settlement of the town.

On the 26th of January, 1827, the Legislature directed the agent to offer for sale, all unsold and reserved lots. Certain alleys were vacated. Square 22, was set apart for a State Hospital, and Lunatic Asylum, and Square 25, was designated as the site for a State University. The intention at that time was to erect large buildings on the Square at a future day, and found a University on the English plan. The Square, however, is now claimed by the University at Bloomington, which at that time was a mere State College, never designed as a substitute for the Central University to which the ground was given.

But few events of importance, occurred during the winter of 1827-8, or during the following year. The town continued very slowly to improve. The morals of the people were gradually growing more settled. The Washingtonian reform was spreading and attracting the attention of the western people. The necessity for the existence of such a society at this place was at once recog-

nized, and in the fall of 182S, one was organized. The leading men in this pioneer temperance society, were the same who led in the organization of the Sabbath Schools, and their efforts were successful in this, as in that instance. Several of the leading members of the Society were members of the steam mill company, and when the building was raised several years afterwards, no liquor was used. The circumstance excited some remark at the time, and the question arose, whether so large a building could be raised, unless by the aid of whiskey.

On the 22d of January, 1829, the Legislature allowed the purchasers of out-lots further time to make the deferred payments upon them, and declared that no forfeitures under the former law should be operative or accrue for past delinquencies.

The first Sabbath School eelebration of the National Anniversary, took place on the 4th of July, 1829. There were but two town schools, the Presbyterian and the Methodist, but five schools from the surrounding country, also joined in the exercises. The procession formed on the circle, attended by many persons from the town, and surrounding country, and marched to a grove just east of the town, where the children were seated, and a hymn was sung by the Assembly. Judge James Morrison delivered the address, and Ebenezar Sharpe read the declaration ; bread and water were then given to the children, and the procession returned to the town. James Blake, Marshall, led the procession, which contained five hundred Sabbath Sahool teachers and children, and eight hundred adults, and so satisfactory was his management, that with only one or two exceptions, he has, "by general consent," been selected ever since for that post, and now holds it proscriptively for life. Thus terminated the first Sabbath School celebration of the Fourth It was a union of all denominations and all schools, and of July. the eustom has been continued until the present time. Of late years, however, all the schools have not participated, the number of children being so great that it is difficult to manage them. It would be well however to get them all together once more.

The first celebration by the Sabbath School was so successful, that for two or three years afterwards no other was attempted, and complaints were sometimes made that it should be so. Other celebrations were then attempted, but the Sabbath School eelebration is even yet the great event in this city on the Fourth of July. The processions now contain several thousand teachers and children, and stretch through many of the streets in marching to their destination. The exercises at these celebration have always been of the same general character, and are now what they were in 1829.

A statement was published in the paper some time in the fall of this year, 1829, giving the receipts and expenditures of the county up to that date. By this statement it appears that in 1822 the receipts were \$\$55,00; in 1823 \$730,29; in 1824 \$689,60; in 1825 \$\$45,93; in 1826 \$915,91; in 1827 \$1,157,87; in 1828

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\$1,918,69. The receipts for the present year will probably reach seventy or eighty thousand dollars.

In the month of March, Indianapolis lost one of the greatest men she possessed, in the person of Rev. George Bush, Pastor of the Presbyterian Church, who left for the East on the 9th of the month. Some differences existed between him and bis Congregation for some time prior to his departure. He was accompanied on his way for several miles by a number of friends.

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By a report made by the officers of the Sabbath School Union, and published in the papers in April or May, 1829, it appears that there were then two Sabbath Schools, a Presbyterian and a Methodist, in the town, and that during the past year, 313 children had been enrolled in the Sabbath Schools. The Presbyterian School contained 157 scholars, with 87 in regular attendance. The Methodist School contained 11 teachers and forty-six scholars. In April, 1880, the Methodist school contained 27 teachers and 167 scholars.

At the general election on the 4th of August, 923 votes had been polled in centre township, and early in the fall, a Sunday School visiting committee, while canvassing the town for scholars, took a census of the inhabitants, which showed that 200 families, comprising 1085 persons, were then residing on the donation.

The lettings of contracts for building the National Road took place at Indian¢polis in September and October of this year. The people were much pleased at the prospect of a short and well improved route to the east, and the papers of the time talked confidently of the rapid completion of the road.

During the years intervening between 1829 and 1835, but little change took place in the town, either in its extent, its population or the character of its improvements. Nearly all the houses at that time were of wood, and even yet a large majority are of that material. A death-like calm pervaded the place, only broken for a short time during the winter by the arrival of the Legislators, and the temporary activity given to trade by the presence of a number of strangers. The roads leading from the place were at times almost impassible. A number of buildings were erected, and the population slowly increased, but the rapid advance of 1822-3 was now unknown. The town seemed finished ; no clearing was done, other than to procure fire wood, or to make occasionally a new field; the settled portion of the town was mainly on Washington Street, between New Jersey and Illinois, and on Market, South Meridian and North Pennsylvania streets. Extensive clearings had been made out-side of these limits, but the settlers' houses were few and far between ; large forest trees were standing in many places within two squares of Washington street, and in a great part of the First Ward, now the most populous in the city, they continued standing until 1846. During muddy weather, the streets of the town became semi-fluid to unknown depths, but in places they were better than at present, because the natural drainage of the ground was often better than that

now adopted by our city Engineers. Large ponds then stood in many places; these were covered in the summer by a thick coating of green scum, and tenanted by countless frogs, whose music in the summer evenings often soothed the senses of the tired inhabitants; small game was still plentiful in the neighborhood; partridges, rabbits, squirrels and wild turkeys were killed in localities now thickly populated. There was but little probability at that time that this state of affairs would be changed. It only changed when the feverish excitement of 1836 induced men to make efforts and improvements beyond their means. After the subsidence, the town, although larger, was still more dull than before, and thus it remained until 1847.

A brief summary, only of the principal local events occurring in the period above spoken of, will be given.

During the spring of 1830, a new paper, called the Indiana Democrat, devoted to the interests of the administration, was issued by A. F. Morrison. In the fall the Gazette was discontinued, and the Indiana Democrat was published in its stead; the Democrat was published until 1841, from an office in a little one story brick house, where "Temperance Hall now stands. In that year the establishment was purchased by G. A. and J. P. Chapman, who opened an office in a one story frame house, where Blake's Commercial row now stands, and commenced the publication of the Indiana State Sentinel. It has ever since borne that name, and has been regularly issued, until the recent ruin of the office by the explosion of the boiler. The first daily published in the town was issued from the Sentinel office, by the Messrs. Chapman, in 1842. It was an experiment merely, and was soon discontinued. In 1844, Messrs. Chapman removed the Sentinel establishment to a new brick building on Illinois St., where it was published for several years. In 1849 or 1850 the paper was sold to Wm. J. Brown, who edited and pubblished it from an office at No. 8 W. Wash. St., until 1853, when the office was moved to 32, E. Washington. The establishment was sold in 1854 to Walker & Cottam. The establishment has since been owned by Larrabee and Cottam, by Larrabee, Bingham & Co., and by Bingham and Doughty, its present owners and publishers. The present daily edition was first issued in 1843-4, and has been issued regularly until April 9, 1857. The office had just been removed to the old Capitol House building, and the engine put in motion for the first time, when at 15 minutes after 10 p.m., the boiler exploded, utterly demolishing the east wall of the building, ruining the job office, killing a boy, and wounding several persons in different parts of the house. The paper was discontinued in consequence of this disaster until the 23d of April, when it again made its appearance before the public.

At the August election in 1830, Center township polled 1,068 votes, and in October following, the population of the town, as shown by the census, amounted to 1094. The voters constituted a

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relatively large proportion, however, of this number. The settled portion of the town was still mainly along Washington, Market, and South Meridian streets. The place had improved but little, and few additional houses had been erected. The trees had been cleared off the donation as far north as New York street, and south to the valley of Pogue's Run. A beautiful walnut grove covered many acres in the north part of the 1st and 2d wards until 1836–7, and in places it remained until 1845.

In March, 1823, Harvey Gregg and Douglass Maguire published the first number of the "Western Censor and Emigrant's Guide," from an office on Washington street. Mr. Gregg was nominally connected with the paper till November 2d, 1824, when he retired from the firm, and on the 16th John Douglass assumed his place. On the 11th of January, 1825, when the seat of government was removed to this point, the paper was enlarged to super-royal size, and called the "Indiana Journal," a name it has ever since retained. Its publication continued weekly, by Douglass & Magnire (with a brief interval as to the latter) until October 13, 1835, when Mr. Maguire sold his interest to S. V. B. Noel, by whom and Mr. Douglass the paper was published till 1843, when Mr. Noel became sole proprietor, and Mr. T. J. Barnett, Editor. In 1845, Mr. Noel sold the paper to J. D. Defrees, who edited and published it till October 20, 1854. It then passed into the hands of a company, who have since published it. The first semi-weekly edition was issued on the 10th of December, 1828. The second on Dec., 1829. The first tri-weekly edition of the Journal was published in 1838. Daily editions were issued for several years, during the sessions of the Legislature, the first beginning on the 12th of December, 1842, and ending February 15, 1833. The present daily began on the 7th of October, 1850, and has been published regularly till the present time. On the 20th of October, 1854, its name was changed to the "Indianapolis Journal." The paper is now issued from an office on Pennsylvania street, opposite the Bank, and is the leading journal in the State.

The winter of 1830-1 passed without any occurrences of interest. The season at times was severe, but the weather was generally milder than of late years. It rained very frequently, however, and by the combined action of frost and water, the roads became almost impassable.

On the 6th of January, 1831, an act was passed, allowing further time to purchasers of out-lots to pay for them. On the same day, the Steam Mill Company were authorized to delay the erection of the mill for another year, and on the 7th of January authority was given them to cut any timber they needed on the lots held by the State.

On the 2d and 3d of February, the Lawrenceburgh and Indianapolis, the Madison and Indianapolis, the Lafayette and Indianapolis, the Harrison and Indianapolis, the New Albany, Salem

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and Indianapolis, and the Ohio and Indianapolis Railroad Companies were chartered. Several of these roads received State aid a number of years after, and thousands of dollars were spent, but all were abadoned except the Madison and Indianapolis.

On the 9th of February, the Agent was directed to lay off the donation land around the town plat into lots, and to have the same appraised and a minimum price fixed upon them. On the first Monday in May he was to offer the lots at public auction, receiving one-fourth of the purchase-money in hand, and the remainder in three annual instalments. In pursuance of the act, the Agent offered 1,900 acres of land at-auction, a part of which only was sold, the average minimum price being fixed at \$10 per acre.

On the 10th of February, the Legislature appointed James Blake commissioner to superintend the commencement of a State Honse on the State Square. He was to procure before the second Monday of May, 1832, 360 perches of stone, and \$3,000 were appropriated for that object. He was to offer \$150 for the best plan of a building, and report the same to the next Legislature. The building was not to cost over \$45,000. The building was to contain a Rpresentatives' Hall large enough for one hundred members, and a Senate hall large enough for fifty, with twelve committee rooms, a Supreme Court, and a State Library room. The commissioner went forward with the work, and procured a part of the material subsequently used in the building.

At the August election the whole vote of the county was 1,046. In the preceding March, the vote of Center township was 774.

On the 26th of January, 1832, the Agent was instructed to lease square 25 to the Trustees of the Marion County Seminary for the term of thirty years, on condition that they should fence it, and return it in good order at the expiration of that time. They were authorized to erect Seminary buildings upon it, but if the State wished to use it before the expiration of the term, one-half acre, containing the improvements, was to be sold or set aside for the Trustees. The Trustees took possession, and a year or two afterward erected the old Marion County Seminary, which is yet standing on the south-west corner of the Square, and now used as the City Central High School building. This Seminary was for many years the leading school in the central part of the State, and when under the care of Messrs. Kemper, Safford and Lang, from 1842 to 1852, was deservedly celebrated. Many of the present active business men of the city were wholly or partially educated within its time-honored walls, and they look back to that period with peculiar emotions. It would be well for "the old Seminary boys" to have annual reunions, and review in the present some of the sports, joys and recollections of the past.

On the 20th of January, 1832, James Blake, the commissioner appointed to receive plans and obtain materials for a State House, reported a plan submitted by Ithiel Town and S. J. Davis, of New

York city. The plan was approved by the Legislature, and the prize of \$150 ordered to be paid to them.

On the 2d of February, 1832, Noah Noble, Morris Morris, and Samuel Merrill were appointed commissioners to superintend the erection of the building according to the plan. They were instructed to employ an architect as superintendent, and to make use of the materials accepted by the former commissioners, in the new building. The house was to be completed before the 1st of November, 1838, and was to be examined and approved by a committee of five members of each branch of the Legislature, before its acceptance by the State.

Thus instructed, the commissioners went actively to work. The construction of the building began in the summer of 1832, and rapidly approached completion. It was completed in December, 1836, and received from the contractors and occupied by the Legislature of that year. The house was built on the square designed for it, on the lower end of Washington street. The ground at that point was quite low, and after the house was finished, the lot was filled up around it as much as nine feet. The large trees now growing on the square were planted on this made ground a year or two after the completion of the house. The style of the house is Doric, a large dome rising over the rotunda, supports a cap ornament, modeled after the tomb of Lycidas. The building is of brick, covered with stucco in imitation of sandstone. Its cost was about \$60,000, and at the time, it was proudly regarded by the people of the State as a monument of taste and munificence. It, as well as the Governor's Circle and the Court House, was built from the fund derived from lot sales in the town. It has rapidly gone to decay, however, on account of its situation, materials, and negligence in its preservation, and at present is a disgrace to the State. It is time a State House was built, one that the citizens will take pride in showing. and one whose materials and solidity will enable it to withstand bad treatment from the people or from time.

No very important events occurred in the place during the years 1833-4 and 5. It advanced very slowly in population, wealth and trade until the excitement of 1835 and 6 wholly changed the current of affairs. The excitement began in 1834-5. The Indianapolis and Montezuma railroads, occupying the same general line now occupied by the Illinois and Indiana Central railroad, was chartered on the 7th of February, 1835. The surveys were made, but nothing of consequence was effected by the Company, and the project dropped after the crash of 1839.

On the 7th of February, in view of the near completion of the State House and the risk of fire on the State property, a joint resolution was adopted, directing the Treasurer of State to procure 20 fire buckets and ladders sufficiently long to reach the top of the State House. He was also directed, in case the citizens subscribed onehalf the purchase-money for a fire engine, to subscribe the other half

on the part of the State. During the summer the citizens held meetings on the subject. Great efforts were made, and at last the requisite amount was subscribed. The honored "old Marion" engine, still in good plight and ready for efficient and instant service, was purchased in 1836, and on the 20th of February, 1838, Nicholas McCarty, Benjamin J. Blythe, Calvin Fletcher, and their associates and successors, to the number of 300, were incorporated as "the Marion Fire Eugine Company." The register of the Company contains the names of almost all the old and prominent citizens, who, in the early settlement, turned out and "run with the machine" with equal, if not greater alacrity than that displayed by newer comers. Prior to the purchase of the engine, the citizens supplied themselves with leather buckets, and ran to the fire/on the call of the church bells.

At present there are five well organized fire companies in the city, possessing six very handsome and effective engines, and each company having a two-story brick engine house, well furnished, and surmounted by bell towers. There are also five hose companies attached to the respective fire companies, and one hook and ladder company, which possesses a house and full set of apparatus. Cisterns have been placed at the intersection of a number of the streets in different parts of the city. There are, perhaps, twenty-five cisterns, each holding 300 to 500 barrels of water. They were built by a tax, authorized by a vote of the people in 1853. The tax was ordered by a majority of three only, and the cistern plan experienced much opposition at the start. Its benefits are now universally admitted.

In the year 1834, a census of the place proved that it then contained 1,600 inhabitants. The settled parts of the town were but little more extensive than in 1830, and the timber yet stood on much the larger part of the town plat.

During the years 1834 and 1835, the attention of the community was being turned to the internal improvement scheme, and by the winter of 1835 they were advocating many enterprises of the most doubtful expediency.

The bill providing for an extended system of internal improvements, passed on the 27th of January, 1836, and was hailed with delight by the citizens; congratulations where every where extended, bonfires were built, rockets fired, and the town illuminated. The bill provided for the construction of several important channels of trade and travel in different directions from the town, and if they had been completed, the joy of the citizens would have been well founded. The whole system was abandoned howere in 1839, after large sums had been spent or squandered on different lines. Among the improvements thus abandoned, the Madison and Indianapolis Railroad, and the Central Canal were the most important and advanced toward completion. The first was surrendered to a company in 1843, and completed to the city in 1847. The latter, after an expendi-

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ture of \$1,600,000, and its near completion to the Wabash, was abandoned and suffered to go to ruin. It was commenced in 1837, and work suspended on it in 1829. Large camps of Irish laborers were placed along its lines, and at one of them near town, a terrible fight occurred in 1838, between the Corkonians and the Fardowners. The highest anticipations prevailed among the citizens concerning the Central Canal, and much preparation was made for the business to be done upon it. Lots along the canal and around the two basins, on opposite sides of Washington street, sold for fabulous prices. A number of boats were built, and placed on the completed section of the canal, from Broadripple to the town, and wood, flour and other articles were boated down in considerable quantities. The mill sites on the line of the canal were improved, and two paper mills, two grist mills, one woolen mill, one cotton mill and two saw mills erected upon the canal, in the western, and north western part of the town. The power however was not as great as the engineer of the canal had predicted; he had not gievn the canal fall enough to induce a sufficient current of water; still the mills went to work, and have since vastly benefitted the town. For a number of years the millers complained every summer that the State did not keep the canal free from grass and other obstructions, and supply them with The Commissioner would then let the water out of the water. canal to clean it; this always created great complaints among the neighboring people, who sickened in great numbers. Thus beggered by the millers and people, and finding the canal far more expensive than profitable, the Legislature on the 19th of January, 1850, ordered its sale, It passed into the hands of a company, who kept it in indifferent repair, and at present it is owned by a single individual. Propositions have been made at various times in the City Council, for filling it up, and abating it as a nuisance, and it is probable that this course will ultimately be adopted.

On the 9th of February, 1836, the Legislature by joint resolution memorialized Congress on the subject of the location and construction of the Central Canal, and prayed the assistance of the general government on its construction, and instructing our Senators and Representatives to urge its passage in Congress.

The White River Bridge Company, with a capital stock of \$15,000, in \$25 shares, was incorporated in February, 1834, for sixty years. The Company was organized shortly afterwards, but nothing was effected under its charter. The national government built a bridge over the river several years afterwards, near the contemplated sight of the Company's bridge, and the lattrr enterprise was surrendered.

On the 5th of February, the town of Indianapolis was incorporated. Prior to that time, and since 1830, it had been governed by a Board of five Trustees, elected by the citizens. The incorporated limits were those of the donation, but no power was given to raise taxes outside of the old town plat. The election for five Trustees

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was ordered to take place on the first Monday of April. Upon their election the trustees were to meet and organize, and elect a President from their own number, and a lister, a collector, a clerk, and a marshal to transact the business of the corporation, and aid in preserving the public peace. The town continued under this government until February, 1838.

During the years 1837 and 1838 many persons came to the town; the spirit of speculation engrossed the whole community, and public works of real or imagined utility were projected to different points. Property rapidly advanced, and soon reached extravagant figures; the work on the Central Canal was rapidly pushed forward; the section between Broadripple and the town was put into operation; a number \notin foats were built, and a thriving trade began. The merchants sold a great many goods; merchants were busy in erecting houses, and all rendered trades prosperous.

During the year 1836, the Washington Hall, now the Wright House, was bailt on the ground formerly occupid by the old Washington Hall, a frame building which was removed to the adjoining lot. The new Washington Hall was built by a company, and cost about \$30,000. At the time of the erection it was thought to be one of the largest and finest Hotels in the western country. It was controlled for many years by Edmond Browning; R. F. Browning succeeded him, Henry Achey succeeded Browning, and at present Burgess & Townley are the lessees. For several years past it has been known as the Wright House.

During the year 1837 an accurate survey of the town proved that there was a mistake in the original survey, by which the general government still held the title to a part of the donation and town plat. This part embraced about eight acres of the ground which had been laid off, appraised and sold in 1831. At the succeeding session, the Legislature memorialized Congress on the subject, asking a donation of the eight acres ; this was afterwards done, and the title secured.

At the August election in 1837, 1473 votes were polled in centre township; the rapid increase, was to some extent, owing to the presence of many Irishmen who were working on the canal. The vote in 1834 was 1134; in the following year, 1839, it was 1405, and in 1840 it was 1232.

On the 14th of February, 1838, the Marion Guards were incorporated. This Company, commanded by Captain J. A. Morris, was for a long time a very excellent disciplined, efficient corps, and when on parade attracted universal admiration. It included many of our best citizens; its organization was continued for many years.

On the 17th of February the town was incorporated by the Legislature, and its Trustees were made Councilmen. An election was ordered to be held the last Saturday of March for a President and six Trustees, one Trustee to be elected for each ward. The Trustees

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were given full power for the government of the town, but the annual income of the corporation was limited to the sum of \$4000. The town was divided into seven wards. The Council was authorized to borrow money for the improvement of the town. The power to raise revenue, extended only to the territory within the old town plat. North, South, East and West streets were made public highways, and the Council was ordered to open them. The Council was empowered to appoint a collector and marshal, a clerk, a lister, a treasurer, a supervisor of streets and a clerk of the markets, who should serve until the election of the regular officers in March.

On the 13th of February, 1839, the State officers were directed to purchase a house for the Governor's residence. In the following spring they accordingly purchased the house and lot where the Governor now resides, on the corner of Illinois and Market streets, which has since been the executive mansion.

On the 15 of February, 1837, the town council was prohibited from spending the tax collected in West Indianapolis, east of the river. On the 22d of February 1840, the act of incorporation was so amended that Councilmen were to be elected for two years, and were to have \$24 salary; house holders only were eligible for councilmen. On the 3d of February, 1841, the office of Marshal was made elective. On the 13th of February, the portion of town west of the river was cut off and exempted from the act of incorporation, and on the 15th of January, 1844, all town officers were made elective.

In this year, the financial difficulties of the country occurred, causing the abandonment and ultimate stoppage of the public works. The monetary pressure and the general stagnation of business produced their full effect here. Property fell more rapidly than it had advanced, building ceased, many persons left the town, and for several years afterward but little improvement was visible in the place.

The bitter political contest of 1839-40, and the visits of two prominent political leaders, varied the monotonous period. In the summer of 1840, Col. R. M. Johnson, of Kentucky, arrived, and was warmly welcomed by a large assemblage of his friends. He made a speech to the crowd in a walnut grove, just north of the present blind Institute. In the summer of 1842, Henry Clay visited the place, and was greeted by from thirty to fifty thousand persons. A Barbacue was prepared on Gov. Noble's farm—a stand was erected, and he addressed the multitude for two hours. The crowd nearly equalled the crowds gathered here during the last canvass, and when the facilities of travel are compared, it was proportionally much larger.

At the session of 1842–3, the first legislative attempt to alleviate the condition of the insane of the State was made. It was the pioneer effort to establish our present State charitable institution.⁵ Charities the more honorable, that they were bestowed when the

State was oppressed with debt, and the community yet laboring under the effects of a great financial revolution.

On the 13th of February, 1843, a tax of two mills on the dollar, 5 was levied by the Legislature, to support and educate the deaf and dumb of the State, and building an asylum. In the spring of 1843, William Willard, a mute teacher from Ohio, came here to begin a school. This school began in October, 1844, and sixteen pupils attended during the first year. At the beginning of the second session, in 1844, this school became a State Institution. On the the 15th of January, 1844, the Governor, Treasurer, and Secretary of State, H. W. Bicher, P. D. Gurley, P. H. Jamison, L. Dunlap, James Morrison, and Matthew Simpson, were appointed Trustees. They were instructed to rent a room, and employ teachers for the school. The Governor was instructed to receive proposals for the location of the Asylum Building at any point in the state. On the 13th of January, 1845, the Governor was authorized to appoint five Trustees in place of those previously appointed.

In the summer of 1845, the Commissioners rented the Kinder building on east Washington street, and the Asylum remained there untill the present permanent building east of the city was completed. On the 19th of January, 1846, the Asylum was located permanently at Indianapolis, and the Trustees were directed to purchase thirty acres of ground near the city as a site for the building. Three thousand dollars were appropriated for the purchase of the site. On the 5th of December, 1848, the tuition in the asylum was made free all citizens of Indiana. The deaf and dumb asylum was the pioneer asylum of the State, and as the political tenets of the Superintendants have been less regarded than their competency, the institution has been better conducted than the other asylums.

On the 31st of January, 1842, a joint resolution was adopted by the Legislature, directing the Governor to correspond with the superintendents of Asylums in other States, and procure the best plan for a hospital. These plans were to be communicated to the next Legislature, with such suggestions concerning the erection of a hospital as the Governor thought fit to make. On the 15th of January, 1844, a tax of one cent on the \$100 was levied for the purpose of erecting an asylum for the Insane, and on the 13th of January, 1845, John Evans, James Blake, and L Dunlap, were appointed Commissioners to select a site, of not less than one hundred acres, near the city. This was done in the following spring, and the present site selected. The Commissioners reported their action in the premises, together with a plan for a building, to the Legislature at the next session, and on the 19th of January, 1846, they were directed to erect an Asylum according to the plan presented. The hospital block was ordered to be sold, and \$15,000 were appropriated to carry on the building. These Commissioners were L. Dunlap, E. J. Peck, James Blake, C. Fletcher, and J. S. Bobbs. John Evans was the first Superintendent, and the originator of the

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Institution. On the 25th of December, 1843, he delivered an address before the Legislature on the subject of a State Asylum, and induced that body to take definite measures on the subject. Dr. R. J. Patterson succeded Dr. Evans in the superintendency, and was in turn succeeded by Dr. Athon, the present incumbent. The Asylum building is situated two miles west of the city, north of the National road, and when completed will be of great size. Its cost, thus far, is about \$\$150,000.

During the session of 1844-5 a number of pupils from the Kentucky institute for the education of the blind, gave an exhibition of their attainments before the Legislature. The exhibition induced that body to order a tax of two mills on every \$100 worth of taxable property, for the maintenance and education of the blind. At the session of 1845-6, J. M. Ray, Geo. W. Mears, and the Secretary, Auditor, and Treasurer of State, were appointed Commissioners to superintend the application of the fund. They appointed Mr. Wm. H. Churchman, a blind gentleman, afterward the first and most efficient superintendent of the Institution, as a lecturer to place the subject properly before the people, and to ascertain the number of blind persons in the State. On the 27th of January, 1847, Calvin Fletcher, Geo. W. Mears, and J. M. Ray were appointed Commissioners to make arrangements for a school, and to erect asylum buildings. Five thousand dollars were appropriated for a site, furniture, &c. for the Institution. The institution was opened on the first October, 1847, and on the 4th, nine pupils were present. Thirty scholars were in attendance at the first session. During the second session, the school was removed to the brick house on the asylum grounds now used as a workshop, and continued there until the summer of 1854, when the present building was completed, at a cost of about sixty thousand dollars. (The Institution has been badly managed, since Mr. Churchman retired from the superintendency

From this period, until the close of the year, 1847, few events of importance occurred. The population increased more rapidly, and from 2692 in 1840, it had swelled to 4000. The settled portion of the town was considerably enlarged. It had reached North street in some places, and was gradually going eastward, but a large part of the present, first, seventh, fifth, sixth and second wards, was still either in woods or cornfields.

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The Legislature on the 31st of January, 1842, extended the time given to late purchasers five years. This period was afterwards still further extended, in some cases. The pressure in monetary affairs prevented men from meeting even the small payments due on their donation lands.

The Swamp formerly existing three miles north-east of the city, whenever an unnsual quantity of rain had fallen, discharged the surplus water by two bayous, which passed through the town, and into Pogue's run and the river. These bayous were often so full, that a

horse would have to swim in many places, when crossing them. They were generally dry in summer, and full during the winter. Since the streets have been graded and filled, the channels of these bayous have been lost. On the 15th of January, 1844, the council was directed to drain the swamp, to prevent floods in the bayous. This was afterwards done; but in January, 1847, during the great flood in White River, the banks of the drain were broken, and a flood of water poured down the two bayous, much to the astonishment of the new comers

On the 15th of January, 1844, the books of the agent were transferred to the Auditor of State, and the few transactions of the office after this period, were under the latter officers control. A list of patents for lots in the town, was ordered to be made and laid before the two houses.

The first number of the Locomotive was established on the 16th of August, 1845, by John H. Ohr, Daniel B. Lenlls, and J. R. Elder, appretices in the Journal office. Its publication was suspended at the end of three months. On the 3d of April, 1847, John H. Ohr, J. R. Elder & Co., revived the Locomotive, and again published it for three months from the Journal office. Its size thus far was seven inches by ten, and the weekly issues for each three months, constituted a volume. On the 1st of January, 1848, Douglass & Elder, recommenced its publication, and it has regularly appeared every Saturday since that time. The paper was enlarged to 81/2 by 131/2 inches. On the 1st of September, 1847, it was enlarged to 104 by 16 inches, and after two subsequent enlargements, it is now printed on a sheet 23 by 31 inches. It has published the list of letters since the first of July 1849, and its proprietors have claimed the greatest circulation in the county since that time. Elder & Harkness, became proprietors on the 30th of March, 1850, and still continues as such. Until the Presidential contest of 1856, the Locomotive, professed neutrality in politics. Its qualified support was then extended to Mr. Buchanan.

The Legislature at the session of 1846-7, had passed a city charter, and on the 27th of March, the election by the citizens to decide its acceptance or rejection was held, as directed in the act. The Charter was adopted by the following vote. In the first ward, there were 112 votes for the charter, 5 against it : in the second 78 for, 3 against ; in the third, 49 for, 1 against ; in the fourth, 65 for, none against ; in the 5th, 110 for, 1 against ; in the sixth, 35 ; 9 against ; total, 449 for the charter, 19 against it. alle

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On the 24th of April, the first election for city officers was held, and at the same time the question whether a tax should be imposed for the support of free schools, was submitted to the voters. About 500 hundred votes were polled in the six wards, as follows. In the first, 108; in the second, 85; in the third, 122; in the fourth, 35; in the fifth 37, in the sixth, 41; in the seventh, 66. The vote for a free school tax resulted thus: 406 votes for the tax, 29 against it.

Samuel Henderson was elected the first Mayor of the city, and immediately assumed his official duties. On the 24th of April, the Council passed an ordinance fixing the boundaries of the city along the donation lines. A marshal was appointed at a salary of \$150. A Secretary was appointed at \$100. A Treasurer at \$55. A lister, at \$75. A collector, with a per cent compensation. A supervisor of streets, at a salary of \$100. Clerks for the markets, at \$50, and messengers for the Good Intent, and Marion fire companies, at \$25 each. The members of Council received \$24 per annum. The new city started thus bravely, with a sufficient number of salaried officers. Although the full amount of tax returned on the duplicate for the fiscal year, 146–7, was only \$4,226 00, and \$865, of this sum were delinquencies brought forward from former years/ The new council and new officers went to work to improve the streets, and give the town a city appearance and reputation.

In 1842, the Legislature passed an act transferring the public works to private companies, and in February, 1843, the Madison and Indianapolis railroad was surrendered to a company for com-The first year the distance run was 33 miles, passengers pletion. 23 per day, and the receipts \$22,110. In 1844, the distance run was 42 miles, passengers 30 per day, receipts 39,031. In 1845, the distance was fifty-one miles, passengers fifty per day, and receipts \$60,052, in 1846, the distance was fiftymiles, passengers seventy per day, receipts \$83,122, in 1847, the distance was seventy-one miles, passengers 125 per day, and the receipts \$158,803, in 1848, the distance was 86 miles, the passengers 200 per day, and the receipts \$235,000. From this time until the completion of the Bellefontaine and Cincinnati road/ the business of this line steadily increased, and great profits were made by the company. This prosperity, ended, however, with the completion of more direct routes.

A radical change was immediately wronght by the completion of the Madison and Indianapolis road. The town had been shut out from the world from the time of its early settlement, by an almost impassable expanse of mud. No business had been transacted other that that of supplying the wants of the few inhabitants of the town. Strangers seldom visited the town, and the effort and risk of reaching it, was sufficiently great to appal many travellers. A deathlike quiet pervaded the place. The best business locations were worth only \$50 to \$100 per foot, and out lots were held at very low rates. The buildings even on Washington street were generally poor frames. Many of which we are sorry to say, are yet standing. Despite, "war, pastilence, blood and fire?" the outlets and additions since laid off and densely built upon, were then open fields, woods or pasture.

A vast change has since taken place. The population then was less than 4,000. In August, 1849, it had risen to 6,750. In June, 1850, to 8,100. In the summer of 1855 to over 16,000, and at

present its population, estimated from the city vote, is about 25,000. This is still rapidly increasing. The quiet of the former village has given way to the noise and hurry of the rapidly growing city. More buildings have been erected every year since 1847 than in any ten years preceding it, and the population has increased each subsequent year by a number almost as great as the population at that time. The growth of the place, caused by the completion of the pioneer railroad, quickly induced other schemes, and many town meetings were held in 1847, 8 and 9, to organize railroad companies, and induce stock subscriptions. A railroad fever commenced. It did not end, however, until eight lines had been completed, and though individuals may have suffered, the city is largely the gainer from the railroad excitement of 1847-8. From 1847, when the Madison railroad was completed, until the Peru line was finished, seven lines of road were finished and opened. These were the Louisville, the Terre Haute, the Lafavette, the Peru, the Cleveland, the Central, and the Cincinnati roads. Several of these lines have since done a heavy business, and as the country improves, all must become remunerative.

The most gratifying result of the railway system perfected here during the above period is the rapid increase of our manufacturing establishments, and the consequent extension of our trade. From 1847 to 1850, several saw and grist mills, two foundries, steam engine and machine shops, a peg and last factory, a planing mill, several slaughter houses and other establishments, were built and put into successful operation. A large district in the southern part of town was laid off into lots, sold, and built upon by men of small means. A large district in the East or first ward was settled very densely by Germans.

In addition to the manufactories above named, the following have since been erected : A car factory, several saw and grist mills, three planing mills, two woolen factories and carding machines, a large foundry and machine shop, five or six railway, engine and machine shops, two barrel factories, two boiler factories, four chair and cabinet factories, three carriage and wagon factories, a bell and brass foundry, two large slaughter houses, and other establishments. A large iron rolling mill is now being built, and will soon be in operation¹

A great improvement has also taken place within the same period in the number and beauty of the public buildings, business houses, hotels and private residences of the city. Three large State Asylum buildings have been completed and occupied; eight or nine large Churches, several of them being tasteful and costly edifices, have been wholly or partially erected; a Grand Masonic Hall; a Grand Lodge Hall for the Odd Fellows; a large building for the North Western Christian University; two Female College buildings; several banking houses; eight or nine large Hotels, three or four of them large and costly structures; a City Hospital; an Orphan Asy-

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lum; a county prison; two market houses; five city engine houses; seven large free school houses, and nearly three thousand business and dwelling houses-many of each being large, tasteful and costly.


Numerous additions and subdivisions have been made of late years. The tewn has extended in places to a considerable distance beyond the donation line, and in some directions is four miles in length. This part is not included in the city government. The city is governed by a Mayor and 14 Councilmen, two being elected from each ward. The other officers are an Assessor, a Treasurer, a Clerk, a Superintendent and three Trustees for the city schools, a City Engineer, a Marshal and Deputy Marshal, a Captain of police, and seven policemen. The number of the police was originally 14 men, with a Captain. The ordinance was subsequently repealed, and the department abolished. The police force has been lately revived, but the number of men has been diminished.


The expenditures of the city for its government, the fire department, and street improvements, now annually amount to nearly \$35,000, a large proportion being paid in salaries to the officers. The financial affairs of the city for the past four or five years have been illy managed. A debt of about \$20,000 has been hanging over it until quite recently, and city orders have been sold at a heavy discount. The recent fraud upon the city by the agent appointed to sell the City Bonds, has not improved the financial reputation of the City Council, however much it may have advanced that of the agent.)

In 1853 the city was lighted by gas. The gas works were erected in 1851-2, by a company who hold the monopoly for thirty years. Since that period, portions of several streets have been fitfully lighted at long intervals.

We have briefly and cursorily mentioned some of the principal events in the history of the town, from its first settlement to a recent period. The time and space allotted to the work necessarily caused it to be hurried, and consequently far from satisfactory. No effort to collect information on this subject has ever before been made. Mistakes have doubtless been made, but if the attempt causes them to be rectified, and fuller information given on the facts herein alluded to, the writer's object will be attained, and the future historian will be gratified.

Manufacturing Interests, Mants, and Facilities.

AT a late meeting of the BOARD OF TRADE OF THE CITY OF INDI-ANAPOLIS, the special Committee on Manufactures submitted the following report, which was read and referred back to the Committee, with instructions to request its publication in the city papers; and also to cause to be printed two thousand copies in pamphlet form, for distribution.

REPORT:

Your Committee, appointed at the last meeting of the Board of Trade, to whom was referred a resolution, requesting information with regard to such additional branches of Manufacture as may be profitably and successfully established in this City, would submit the following report:

For the purpose of obtaining advice from the best informed sources, your Committee addressed a circular to a number of the leading Manufacturers and business men of the City, soliciting their co-operation, and are under obligations to several of these gentlemen for important facts and suggestions.

The advantages possessed by Indianapolis for profitable investment of capital and labor, in every department of industry, bear favorable comparison with those of any other City in the West. Although our present Manufactures are rapidly becoming extended, and new ones introduced, still our market is not, and cannot be 52

glutted, by too abundant production in any of the Mechanic Arts. A population of at least three millions, residing in Indiana and adjoining States, look to us for the supply of many articles of every day use, and already the Manufactures of Indianapolis are beginning to add comfort to the homes, and productiveness to the farms of settlers, in Illinois, Iowa, Missouri and Kansas.

Indianapolis has peculiar facilities for becoming a large manufacturing City. No other Capital City on the continent is so much *a centre* as our own.

It is at once the Commercial Metropolis, largest City, and geographical centre of a State containing twenty-two million acres of productive land, four hundred million dollars in taxable property, and one million four hundred thousand inhabitants.

Indianapolis is "the place where the ways meet," and is more a centre of transit by Railroads than any other inland town in the world.

All the Political, Judicial, Social, Religious, Educational, Monetary, Commercial, and Industrial Interests of the State centre here. Americans are proverbially a gregarious people, and Indiana is by no means behind her sister States in all those movements that are carried on by associated action. Owing to the facility of access to this City, State conventions, in the interest of the various societies and parties, are held here, almost weekly, during the year. It is estimated that not less than a quarter of a million visitors assembled in Indianapolis during the last year to attend these gatherings. Even the elements are propitious to us. We do not depend for subsistence on a dry or frozen river; and, being situated in a mild "mediterranean region," our Railroads are not obstructed by snow or ice; and our markets are abundantly and cheaply supplied, from every point of the compass, with the earliest and the latest fruits, vegetables and other products of the season. Even during the late long winter of famine to the poor of other Cities, where the price of fuel was starvation, the value of wood, coal, and provisions remained here at about the summer rates; and thousands of bushels of coal were daily sent by our citizens to the ice-bound markets of Cincinnati, Louisville and other river towns.

Indianapolis is handsomely laid out: the streets, varying from ninety to one hundred and twenty feet in width, are tastefully embellished with forest and other ornamental trees. Diagonal avenues afford easy access to every section of the city.

More than one thousand houses, including several first class business blocks, were built in this City last year; and the prospect is that building will be largely extended the present season.

Wealth is more equally distributed than is usual in cities of this size, and a large majority of our mechanics, business men and laborers have a real estate interest in the City. The houses are *the homes*, and not simply the tenements of the people.

In addition to the above, we have in abundance all the *direct* aids that are needed to make manufactories profitable. The Central Canal and Fall Creek afford available water power sufficient for one hundred additional run of stone; and these two streams, together with White River, offer a convenient and abundant supply of water for those branches of manufacture that are not in need of water power. Wood is cheap and abundant. Inexhaustible beds of coal, quarries of stone, and mines of iron ore, each of excellent quality, are opened within two or three hours' ride of the City. Coal can be furnished, delivered at from 8 to 12 cents a bushel, and contracts for coal can be made for from two to three dollars a ton.

We would now call attention to such branches of manufacture as are most needed, and will pay the best profits on the investment.

MANUFACTURES OF IRON.

1. A ROLLING MILL, for the manufacture of Railroad Iron, is imperatively needed, and would yield at once a handsome return. Sixteen hundred miles of Railroad are now in active operation in Indiana, aside from switches and side tracks. One hundred tons to the mile would give one hundred and sixty thousand tons of railroad iron in use in the State. All of this iron must be renewed about every ten years. This will require an average of sixteen thousand tons of new rail annually.

The present freight on this amount to and from the nearest mill cannot be less than \$8.00 a ton, making the sum of \$128,000 a year. This amount may be considered a clear saving, above ordinary profits, to a mill located at Indianapolis, or to the Railroad interests in the State. A mill established here would not, however, be limited to supplying the wants of Indiana. Four thousand miles of Railroad in this and other Western States, would find the cheapest market for the exchange and renewal of iron here, and a well conducted mill would be called on to renew not less than forty thousand tons of old iron annually.

Another important consideration in favor of a Rolling Mill at this point is, that it would require but a small amount of raw material to keep up a constant supply of the manufactured iron, as the old iron brought to the mill to be worked over would be sufficient, with the exception of waste, or the amount required for new roads and side tracks, to keep the mill in constant operation. If a considerable amount of raw material should be required, it can be obtained here as cheaply as at any other point in the West. Iron ore is abundant within the State, and capital is already largely and successfully invested in the manufacture, from the ore, of this, the most precious of all metals.

2. LOCOMOTIVE ENGINE MANUFACTORY, with all the incidental branches of repairing Locomotives. It is evident, in view of the facts noted above, that the establishment of works of this character would supply an immense demand that is constantly increasing. Four thousand miles of Railroad already completed, with thousands of miles of road South and West yet to be built and equipped, with equipments involving the expenditure of hundreds of thousands of dollars annually, would certainly profitably sustain engine works of the largest class at this most important railroad centre.

- 3. Iron and Car Wheel Manufactory.
- 4. Cutlery: Knives, Forks, and Pocket Cutlery.
- 5. Steel Manufactory.
- 6. Locksmiths; good ones are much needed.
- 7. Axe and Scythe Factories.
- 8. Wire and Wire Railing.
- 9. A general Edge Tool Factory.

The following are carried on here, some of them largely; but additional capital and labor may be invested with the certainty of finding the demand greater than the supply:

10. Boiler Manufactories.

- 11. Machine Shops, and Steam Engine Works.
- 12. Stove and Grate Foundries, and general Castings.
- 13. Sheet Iron and Tin Works.

14. Saw Factories.

MANUFACTURES OF WOOD, AND WOOD AND IRON.

Indianapolis being situated near the western edge of the HEAVY HARD WOOD FORESTS of the Mississippi valley, must become permanently the seat for the manufacture of articles and implements of wood and iron for the prairie markets. They can be manufactured more cheaply here than at any other point, West, or East.

Two hundred and fifty thousand farmers in Indiana, Illinois, Missouri, Iowa and Kansas, could be advantageously supplied by our manufactories with wagons, carriages, agricultural implements, and other articles of which wood and iron are the staples. If these branches of industry were carried on here with sufficient capital, employing machinery in all the parts where it can be brought to bear, there is every reason why the citizens of the great prairie States and territories should come to this market for their supplies. The timber of Central Indiana is admitted to be better suited to the manufacture of the articles mentioned below than it is at any point west of Indianapolis.

1. CAR BUILDING, including Trucks, Freight and Passenger Cars. A heavy business is already done in this department, but it might be profitably and largely extended.

2. Carriage making, for the Western markets.

3. Wagon making, common Farm, and Road Wagons, for the Western markets.

4. Plow making, the different varieties of Plows.

5. Agricultural Implements of all kinds.

6. Bucket, Tub, Churn and Wooden Ware.

7. Planing Machines, several are established here, but there is room for more.

8. Door and Sash Factory, very much needed.

9. Pump, and Pump and Block makers.

10. Lath and general Wood Sawing establishments.

11. Broom Manufactory.

12. Brush Manufactory.

13. Willow Basket Ware.

14. Cabinet Ware, in all its varieties, for the home and Western markets.

MISCELLANEOUS MANUFACTURES.

It is believed that all of the following would become remunerative as soon as established. The demand for most of them is very great, and in many cases our citizens would insure their success.

1. Cotton Factories. The raw material can be had here on easier terms than in many places where Cotton Mills are in successful operation. The demand is sufficient to sustain at least two large establishments.

2. Woolen Factories. Wool can be purchased here cheaper than in any place East of this. The value of the wool produced in the State last year was \$422,000. A great portion of this is sent East to a market, and returned to us in fabrics. It would be better to manufacture more of it at home.

3. Starch Factories. A man with a moderate capital could make a profitable investment in this business. The grain of which our Starch is made, is much cheaper here than it is in the markets where the starch we use is manufactured.

4. A Rope and Cordage Manufactory.

5. Paper Mills. A larger number of these could be successfully established. The paper used in this city alone would keep two more good mills in successful operation.

6. Flouring and Saw Mills. An increase of these is absolutely necessary.

7. A Spice and general Grinding Mill.

8. A Linseed Oil Mill could be handsomely supported, in addition to the one now in operation.

9. A Sugar Refinery.

10. Milk, Butter and Cheese Dairies, in the vicinity.

11. Soap Factories, both for toilet and common use. An enterprising man could make an easy fortune in Soap.

12. Potash, Pearlash and Saleratus.

13. Plumbing could be largely extended.

14. Silver Ware and Silver Plating. A large business in both could be done.

15. Upholsterers could command a fine business.

16. A City Bathing Establishment is very desirable.

17. A City Laundry.

18. Book Publishing.

19. Lithographing.

20. Engravers in Wood and Copper are needed.

21. Pottery and Stone Ware of all kinds.

22. Brick, Lumber, Stone and Wood Yards. Additional capital invested in building material for sale, would induce much more building.

23. Gun and Pistol Factories.

24. Harness and Saddle Factories. The demand is greatly in excess of the supply.

25. Type and Stereotype Foundries, and Printing Materials.

26. Lead and White Lead manufactories.

27. Morocco and Lining Skin Factories.

28. Lard Oil Mills. There is no better point for establishments of this kind.

29. Star and Stearine Candles. The demand for these is great and constantly increasing, and the raw material is cheap and abundant.

30. Boot and Shoe Factories.

31. Japanned Tin Ware.

32. Blacking and Ink Factories.

33. Oil Cloth Factory.

These additional branches of industry seem to be demanded by the present actual wants of our citizens and the adjacent country. A number of those mentioned in this list are, it is true, in progress here, but in such cases the necessities of the market demand a much larger supply.

INDIANAPOLIS: ITS MANUFACTURING INTERESTS,

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The concentration, which we are rapidly acquiring, in Indianapolis, of the production and manufacture of the great leading articles in general use, will draw to our City the bulk of the interior trade of the West. This will give encouragement to other industrial pursuits; and mechanics, from the lanes and alleys of densely populated cities, will come here to breathe a purer air in our park-like streets, and acquire competence and wealth in the Western Metropolis of Manufacture and Trade.

The members of the Board of Trade of the city of Indianapolis, take this method of calling public attention to Indianapolis as a manufacturing and business point. Indianapolis, the Capital of Indiana, is situated in the midst of one of the most beautiful and fertile regions of the West, and is within five miles of the geograpical centre of the State, and more than one hundred miles from any large city. Formerly its position was completely inland; but the completion of the Madison and Indianapolis Railroad, in the fall of 1847, marked a new era in its history. The population at that time was about 4,000, and the town possessed scarcely any manufactures or trade. Now her inhabitants number full 24,000, and the hum of machinery in her rapidly increasing manufactures can be everywhere heard; eight Railroads terminating at Indiananapolis, comprising 1600 miles of track, have been completed; and a number of others are under contract, which will be completed at an early day. Of roads already finished, the Bellefontaine, Central, Cincinnati, and Terre Haute, are parts of the Great Central Through Routes, (uniting at this point), from the Eastern Cities to St. Louis, now completed, and destined to extend to the Pacific. Of the Railroads to our City that are unfinished, those of the great-

est magnitude are the Indiana and Illinois Central, and the Evansville and Indianapolis Roads. The former, when completed, will open up to Indianapolis an immense additional trade and travel from the West and North-West—as far as to St. Joseph, Mo., and to Dubuque, Iowa. The latter, when finished, will bring to the City a very large additional trade and travel from the South and South-West.

The completion of the above roads, will not only increase the business and the proserity of Indianapolis, but will be the means of placing our City still more permanently on the great highways of the world. Seventeen different Railways, including connections, comprising 2,800 miles of track, and having 12,000 miles of connections, directly centre here, making this point the greatest railroad centre in the world. They bring all parts of this and neighboring States within a few hours' ride of this City, and connect with all the important routes of trade and travel in the West. To give the reader an ilea of our immense railroad advantages, we need but refer him to the Map accompanying this report and say, that the citizens of 80 of the 91 Counties in the State. can leave their homes in the morning, visit Indianapolis and attend to their business, and return the same day. The citizens also, of many of the Counties of the adjoining States, can visit Indianapolis and attend to business and return the same day. It is estimated that from three to five thousand persons visit our city every twenty-four hours, and that nearly one hundred different trains pass in and out of the city daily.

Railroads being of recent origin, are revolutionizing inland commerce, and are turning trade and travel from their former channels. That which is best calculated to make a city a place of business, is *quick*, *cheop*, *uninterrupted and abundant communication*, and it is an undeniable fact, that Railroads—take them the year round—furnish the most *constant*, *prompt and reliable* modes of internal communication. It is well known, that during the past winter, when the Western Lakes and Rivers were frozen up, and the commerce of the towns and cities situated upon them was, for the time, comparatively stagnant, business at Indianapolis was brisk, railroad communication to and from the same not being for a single day interrupted. Again, in summer, when the Rivers are nearly dry

and impassable by steamboats, and in winter, when Northern communication is obstructed from snows and the severity of the climate, hundreds of locomotives, night and day, are constantly moving on the iron tracks leading to and from our City, making business at this point at all times lively and active. Such being the case, who can say what this age of steam and of Railroads is not to do for our favored city? More than two millions of consumers can be supplied from this point with goods or manufactured products *quicker* and as *cheaply* as from any other point in the country; such being the manifest fact, it is evident, that Indianapolis is destined to become one of the greatest manufacturing and business centres of the North-West.

The different Railroads that centre here, traverse regions unsurpassed in agricultural and mineral resources; and while they afford ready facilities for transporting goods and the products of the workshops and factories of this City to those who need them, they also supply the means of bringing hither the raw material requisite for their production. The admitted principle in political economy, that the producer and consumer should be brought as near together as possible, must act with increasing force for years to come, in building up manufactures here in the very centre of the great producing interest of the North-West. No State in the Union with equal extent of territory excels Indiana in natural resources. Her rich virgin soils, magnificent forests of timber, pure streams of neverfailing water, together with her inexhaustible beds of coal, iron, marble, stone, &c., place her in reliable sources of wealth among the very first States of the Union. The City is improving with great rapidity. Capital expended in building, invested in real estate, and in all classes of manufactures, yields large and certain returns. As a point at which to pack pork and beef, it possesses peculiar advantages. Great inducements for farmers exist in the central parts of the State-fine lands being still obtained at very reasonable prices. Mechanics of all kinds are much needed, and great numbers can obtain immediate employment. White River, Fall Creek, and the Central Canal furnish good water power within and immediately on the borders of the City, which can be easily and successfully employed. Our climate is mild, and our City and country healthy. For the reasons above enumerated, we think this place

will not only become a great manufacturing point, but must also, in consequence of its unrivalled facilities for communication, become one of the principal *commercial* and *wholesaling* cities of the West. As a place of residence, it is very desirable, being located on a dry and beautiful plain. The whole City is underlaid with the choicest gravel, which is used to great advantage in graveling and improving the streets. Owing to the porous and gravelly nature of the soil, cellars can be dug from twelve to fifteen feet in depth, and remain perfectly dry during all seasons. In this particular Indianapolis far excels Chicago and most other Western Cities.

The streets of the City are broad, laid out at right angles, and are well shaded. The public squares are large, and the City is adorned by a number of very fine public buildings. The benevolent institutions of the State for the insane, deaf and dumb and the blind, are located at this place, and are an ornament to the City, and to the State which so liberally supports them.

This place is noted for its magnificent depots, especially for its main passenger station, where all the Railroads leading to the City connect. It is distinguished for its sobriety, for the prevalence of the best social feeling, and the number of its Churches and Sabbath Schools, end other moral and religious institutions. It has a larger portion of children in Sabbath school in proportion to number than any other City in the Union. It has a system of *free graded schools*, wherein all the youth of the City may obtain a good education; besides these, a number of well conducted *High Schools* and *Colleges* exists.

Other reasons might be mentioned, but we think the importance of the matter sufficiently obvious; and we close by earnestly inviting the reader's aid in developing at this point the resources of the giant West.
