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# Sweet Bliss 

$\bigcirc$S. Senater Elazaherth Dole spoke to an audience of 4,000 , including a record too graduates, Juring an muthoor Commencement ceremony on Saturday, Nay 8. It was the first ourdour commencement at UNCP since Bill Cosby spoke in 1998. Also offering greetings to the graduates were UNC President Molly Corbett Broad; [). Dudley Ford, a member of the UNC Board of Governors; Gervais Oxendine, chair of the UNCP Board of Trustees; Dr. Thomas Dooling, chair of the General Faculty; Alphonza Thomas, vice president of the Student Government Association; and Hal Sargent II, president of the Ahumni Association.

Sen. Dole encouraged graduates of The University of North Carolina at Pembroke to he passionate in the fursuit of their goats. "If you are truly passionate about what you are doing, the sky is the limit," Sen. Dole saicl. "I do know what it is like to face challenges." In 2002, Sen. Dole was the first woman elected to the U.S. Senate from North Carolina. "There will ahways be daunting chatlenges, and when they say it can't be done, I can't wait totry," Sen. Dole said.

There are several issues that Sen. Dole is passionate ahout today: One of those issues is dear to the hearts of many who attended graduation at the University that was founded in 1887 as the nation's first state supported institution of higher education for American Indians. "I :mp passionately pursuing the recognition of the Lumbee Indians," she said. "I metroduced this as my first legislative intiative in the United States Senate because it is the right thing to do - it is the fair thing to do."

A buyout of federal tohaces allotments is another difficult batte that Sen. Dole is parsionate ahour. She was speaking in the heart of tubacion country: "I don't need to tell you afl why a tobacco quota buyout in essential for North Carolina, hut unfortunately I have to convince a lot of folks from places like Maine and Minnesota," she said.

In his closing words to the graduates, Chancellor Allen C. Meadors urged graduates to keep their dreams in focus. "Let jour experience here at UNCP strengthen you for the journey ahead," Chancetlor Meadors said. "Have clear and focised grals and make your

Jiang He, Yanqui Wang and Gang Wu are administrators at CUMT and received Master of Public Administration degrees. "We were very excited to see our teachers again," saidGang Wu. "They were very kind to us and gave us much scholarly wisdom."

Another group of 23 Moore County school teachers traveled to Pembroke to pick up Master of Elementary Education degrees. UNCP's School of Education took the program to them at Sandhills Community College in Southern Pines, N.C. "I'm happy to be here," said Emily Brady. "For some of us this is our first visit to UNCP."

The keynote speaker was Dr. Patricia Valenti, one of UNCP's most distinguished scholars and instructors, who served as grand marshal by virtue of winning the UNC Board of Governors 2004 Award for Teaching Excellence. Dr. Valenti told the graduates that research has shown that college graduates earn more, have better marriages, and live longer, healthier and more productive lives. But there is far more to a college education, she said. "This semester I asked my students to write about the value of an education," she said. "One very wise young man wrote: 'putting a price on education is like putting a price on a beloved family member; they both are priceless." "In the words of John Henry Newman, you have obtained through higher education 'a habit of mind that lasts through life,"' Dr. Valenti said. "Those of you who are about to graduate have acquired a habit of mind that is curious and inquiring, a habit of mind that replaces fear of the unknown with curiosity and questions." "There is nothing more delicious than the taste of genuine success," she said.

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## Moving Along

The men's basketball team has had an exciting year here at UNCP. Despite substantial challenges, the team managed to break records and start programs to help children. The squad picked up their first win of the 2004-05 season by downing visiting Coker College by a 7460 score. Sophomore guard Frank Foster paced the Braves with 13 points and six assists, while Arne Danielsen came off the bench to help UNCP erase a late five-point deficit with two bombs from behind the arc. Jabarr Adams and Adam Shepherdson also scored in double figures for UNCP, turning in 12 and 10 points, respectively. Rollie Boone pulled down eight boards. UNCP also knocked down seven of fourteen attempts from the three-point line.

In one of the season's most exciting games, the men defeated Johnson and Wales University in overtime, 76-72. The Braves were led by Frank Foster, who had four assists and scored 23 points, including five threepointers. The first half was an even battle; the Braves were a perfect 12-12 from the charity stripe and went to the locker room on an 8-0 run to make the score 39-37. The Braves held the Wildcats scoreless for the first five minutes of the second half and broke out to a ten-point lead, but costly turnovers helped Johnson and Wales go ahead at 4:34. UNCP trailed by six with 1:40 to play but after a timeout, Foster drained a three. The Braves got the ball back and, with 51 seconds on the clock, Jabarr Adams sank a field goal, drew the foul, and tied the score 64-64 with the free throw, sending the game to overtime and the Braves' second victory.

On Feb. 9, 2005, sophomore Jarrell Hunter broke the UNCP record of seven three-pointers and helped break a fourteen-game losing streak in the process as the Braves defeated Peach Belt Conference rival Francis Marion by one point, 68-67. Unfortunately, this was the final win of the season, which ended with the Braves going 3-25 overall, 1-15 in the conference.

During the season, the men's basketball team also sponsored the "Take a Kid to the Game" program. Children were able to participate in fun halftime activities, spend time with caring adults, and take home free promotional materials.

The Lady Braves basketball team kicked off the 2004-05 season by knocking off Queens University of Charlotte by a 50-41 score in the Jones Center. On December 4, the Lady Braves defeated Allen University by a score of $88-54$, beginning the game with a 17-0 run.

After a slow start in Peach Belt play, the women picked up their second straight conference win, downing regionally-ranked Clayton State by a $54-46$ score. In front of over 400 fans, the Lady Braves celebrated 2005 Homecoming festivities with a hardfought 57-51 win over North Florida. Danielle Richardson and Lindsay Bartholf combined for 31 of UNCP's 57 points.

They next downed Francis Marion by a 57-51 score, ending the game with a 9-0 run to steal the victory, only the second for UNCP in the last 17 meetings between the local PBC rivals.

## New Heights

The wrestling squad ended their season with the highest national finish in school history, taking seventh place at the NCAA Division it tournament in Omaha. Seniors Curry Pickard and Dwayne Coward earned National Runner-Up status; they were also named 2005 All-Americans along with teammates Derek Brunson and Aaron Gunning.

The Braves had wrapped up their home schedule with a $37-16$ win over Newberry College and improved to 7-4 in dual meet action for the 2004-05 season. Seniors Dwayne Coward, Aaron Gunning, Curry Pickard, and Lewis Polley all won matches in their last home meet. Pickard was ranked first in the nation in the 133 -pound weight class, while Coward stood at \#4 nationally at 165 .

In earlier dual meet action, after narrowly defeating West Liberty State 25-24, the squad dropped its first two dual matches of the season at the East Coast Duals. They fell to No. 7 Pitt-Johnstown 32-16 and Gannon 2521 before bouncing back to pick up a huge victory over 8th-ranked Mercyhurst College, led by All-American Curry Pickard, who went 4-0 over the course of the tournament. UNCP then finished 1-2 at the National Wrestling Coaches' Association Duals Tournament held January 21st and 22nd in Cleveland, Ohio, with a two-point win over Central Missouri State. They returned home and kicked off this year's Homecoming activities with an exciting 26-16 win over Limestone College; over 200 spectators were on hand to witness the home team improve their dual meet record to 6-4 overall.

The Braves also fared well in tournament action this season. Senior Dwayne Coward and junior Derek Brunson both won their respective

# Ticket to the Final Four 

THe men's soccer team achieved many new goals this season, finishing with an overall record of 16-3 and nationally ranked fourth in the NCAA Division II. Their only two losses during the regular season came against non-conference rivals Methodist and Queens as the Braves were on a roll in Peach Belt Conference matches.

The Braves stood their ground against Frances Marion's Patriots. Both teams fought for the goals but it was UNCP who scored first. Pembroke's Sascha Gorres crossed a ball which was picked up by sophomore Trond Myrland, who then was in possession and scored a goal against FMU's goal keeper. The Braves led 1-0 for the rest of the game. After the well earned victory over the Patriots, UNCP could say for the first time since joining the Peach Belt Conference that they were champions. The Braves then continued to dominate in the Peach Belt, winning their firstever Peach Belt Conference Tournament Championship in school history by defeating the USC Upstate Spartans by a 3-1 score. The Braves followed up on their conference championship by winning the NCAA Division II regionals and going on to the national semifinals.

Five UNCP soccer players were named to the National Soccer Coaches Association of America's (NSCAA) All-Southeast Region squad, including Sascha Görres, who also received All-American recognition. Görres and Trond Myrland were named to the All-Region first team, while Thomas Lindal, Graeme Little, and Sinan Tümkaya made the second team. These players produced what was needed to send the team to the playoffs and then the Final Four.

## Reaches Out

Dr. Collie Coleman has led a life full of extraordinary accomplishments as a world traveler in the Peace Corps and president of an accredited university. These events have brought him to UNCP as Associate Vice Chancellor for Outreach. Coleman's ultimate goal is for the average citizen in the region to say, "I'm glad UNCP is in the country because I can appreciate what it has done for the academic and economic development of our region."

Coleman is committed to excellence and sees life's experiences as an educational tool to teach that life is a continuing learning experience. His learning began as a small town boy with aspirations that were broader than the county line of Nash County. He grew up in the small rural town of Bailey, N.C., graduated from high school, and earned his undergraduate degree from Shaw University. During his last year at Shaw in 1966, he talked to a Peace Corps recruiter and was selected to travel to Nigeria to work for two years. In Nigeria,
he had an enormous responsibility to create a neighborhood atmosphere from large farm settlements owned by local farmers. This task gave the small town farm boy from Nash County a strong moral and ethical foundation for future achievements.

Coleman returned from Nigeria and earned a Ph.D. at Ohio State University. Years later, the opportunity to be president of Allen University would present itself. Following an illustrious decade at Allen, he was vice president for academic affairs at Shaw University and then served as executive vice president and chief academic officer for Voorhees College.

On Jan. 6, 2003, Coleman began heading the UNCP Outreach Program to address the region's struggling economy and lack of educational resources. UNCP plays a very important role in meeting the needs of the people by connecting education and the work force development. "The purpose of Outreach is exactly its inverse name-Reach out," Coleman said.
