
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

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# HISTORICAL RECORDS SURVEY

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### PREFACE

The Historical Records Survey originated by authority of a Presidential Letter in January 1936 as a nation-wide project of the Work Projects Administration. The Survey began to operate in Rhode Island in April of that year. Prior to July 1939 the project was Federally sponsored but since that date it has been sponsored by the State of Rhode Island under the Office of Record Commissioner, and operated as a State-wide project. The style and arrangement has been approved by the State officials and follows the recommendations of the National organization.

The purpose of the Survey is to inventory, organize, and describe the records in possession of State, city, and town governmental units; also to inventory church records and manuscript collections of historical societies and individuals. The inventories thus prepared are to be made available in volume form to lawyers, historians, officials, students of government, and the public. Because of the present emergency and the redirection of the W. P. A. to work which will make a direct contribution to national defense, further work on town inventories will not be undertaken at this time. The material collected to date will be stored in such a manner that the work on other town inventories can be readily resumed and brought to completion when the opportunity presents itself.

The Inventory of the Town and City Archives of Rhode Island will, when completed, consist of a series, separately numbered for each county in the State. Counties are numbered according to alphabetical position; towns are numbered likewise, within each county. The publications of the Survey are distributed free to State and local officials, and to a selected group of public and institutional libraries. In addition to listing the records of the various town officers, this inventory briefly sketches the historical background of the town of North Providence and describes the organization of the offices whose records are listed. Records are described in formalized entries to give the following information: title of record, dates for which available, quantity, labeling of volumes or containers, information on missing and discontinued records, variant titles, description of record contents, manner of arrangement, indexing, nature of recording, size of volume or contents, and location.

The project gratefully acknowledges the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by the town officials of North Providence and the helpful supeport given by Miss Grace M. Sherwood, Record Commissioner and Librarian of the State of Rhode Island, various State officials, and the advisory direction of Sargent B. Child, National Director of the Historical Records Survey. The cover design was made for the Inventory by the Federal Art Project of Rhode Island, and the binding of the volume done by the State Library Project, State House.

### Explanatory Notes

Title: Exact titles of records are written in solid capitals without parentheses (as in entry 1). In the absence of titles, descriptive titles have been assigned, which are written in solid capitals and enclosed in parentheses (as in entry 2). If a record title is not descriptive of the contents of the record, an assigned explanatory title (or explanatory words), written with initial capitals and enclosed in parentheses, has been added (as in entry 3). The current or most recent title of a record is used as the entry title and title variation is indicated (as in entry 3).

Dates: First and last dates covered by a particular record are shown in the title line of the entry. Continuous records are shown by a hyphen between the beginning and closing dates, as 1765-1874 (see entry 1). Lapses in the records are indicated by commas between the groups of inclusive dates, as 1776, 78, 80-82, 1862 (see entry 1A, line 7). Current dates are indicated by two hyphens, as 1906--. When dates of a record cannot be ascertained, the expression "undated" is used (see entry 114).

Quantity: When two or more types of containers are considered in a single entry, the quantity is shown in chronological order, insofar as possible.

<u>Labeling</u>: Figures or letters in parentheses, following the number of volumes, file boxes, or other type of container, indicate the labeling. If no labeling is indicated, it may be assumed that there is none.

Discontinuance: Where no statement is made that the record was discontinued at the last date shown in the entry, it could not be established definitely that such was the case. Where no comment is made on the absence of prior, subsequent, or intermediate records, no definite information could be obtained.

Abbreviations, Symbols, and Explanatory Notes

Description of Records: The description of the contents of a record applies only to the current or most recent record unless a change in contents is actually shown in a record entry.

Indexing: All indexes to records, unless otherwise stated, are self-contained.

Dimensions: When the dimensions of file boxes, volumes, etc., vary greatly the size of the two extremes is given. When two or more types of containers are considered in an entry, the dimensions item is arranged to correspond with the quantity item to which they amply. Dimensions are always given in inches, unless otherwise indicated, and, therefore, the symbol for inches (") is omitted.

Location of Records: When all or the majority of the records of an office have a common location, the location is indicated in the last sentence of the office essay instead of each individual entry.

Cross References: With the exception of Vital Records, which series is cross referenced by third-paragraph cross references, continuity of a record series may be had only by reference to the subject indexes.

Arrangement: This item is used to show the logical order or planned sequence by which items have been entered in records; it means the internal arrangement of records in volumes, file boxes, or other containers, and not the arrangement of volumes on a shelf. Entries in tabular form are arranged alphabetically by subject matter, and chronologically thereunder. The arrangement, dimensions and location shown at the end of each entry, in the case of an entry in tabular form, apply to the whole entry, and not to individual parts thereof.

### 1. HISTORICAL SKETCH

The town of North Providence was taken from Providence and incorporated as an independent town by an act of General Assembly passed June 13, 1765.

Probably the circumstances leading to the establishment of the town can be best explained by setting forth in detail the original petition urging the division of the town, together with several protests and remonstrances against the separation.

Thus on March 1, 1765, various freemen seeking the division presented the following petition to the General Assembly:

"To the Honorable General Assembly of Phode Island, Sitting at East Greenwich on the 25 Day of February A. D. 1765.

The petition of the Subscribers Humbly Sheweth, that there are upward of four Hundred Freemen, within the Township of Providence, that those who dwell in the compact Part of the Town, are altogether Merchants and Tradesmen, That for the Greater part of your Petitioners, dwell in the remote Parts of Said Township, and are near all Farmers whose Intrest and Business are often Times different from The Interests of Merchants and Tradesmen in the Compact Part, that Town Meetings are and often have been called and held, no less than Seven Last Fall in three Months Time, in the compact part of Said Town, upon Matters and Things which did not, and do not concern Farmers, in the remote Parts, who nevertheless were then and Still are obliged to leave their Business and Attend Said Meetings, to prevent any thing being Noted to their Disadvantage, which Often occasions much Loss of Time, great Uneasiness -- Contention, and Expence which ought to be born by the Merchants and Tradesmen in the compact Part only Wherefore, as a Remedy against Such great Inconveniences Your Petitioners Pray, that Said Township of Providence may be Divided or Sett off as Follows, Viz. Beginning at the new Bridge near Solitary Hill, Thence bounding by the River, Down to the North West Corner of the Towns Land, at the East End of a Place called Forestack Meadow thence Easterly on, a Strait Line to the middle of the Mill Bridge, thence on a due last Line to Seaconk River So Called, thence Bounding Easterly by Said River to Smithfield Line, thence bounding Northerly by Smithfield Line to Johnston Line, thence Bounding Westerly on Johnston Line untill it comes to the aforesaid Solitary Hill, that the Northerly Part of Town Ship, to be So divided and Sett off, Containing about one Hundred and Sixty Freemen, and being about Foure Miles Square, may be Called and Known by the Name --Wenscutt, and that all Town Meetings, to be holden within the Same may be by Law directed and required, to be held at or near the Dwelling House of Capt. Thomas Olney -- where he now dwells, Said Place being agreed upon by your Petitioners, as near the Center, and most convenient.

And your Petitioners as in Duty bound will ever pray &c --

"Colony of Rhode Island

To the Honorable the General Assembly of Said Colony at their Sitting in the month of February A. D. 1765.

We the Subscribers Inhabitants of the Northerly part of the Town of Providence Assembly Shew

That Divers persons Inhabitants of the Same part of the Town of Providence in which we dwell have been instigated and Set on by Crafty and designing Men to desire of this Assembly that the Said Town of Providence May be again divided into two Towns in Such a Manner by Such Boundaries as are directly Calculated to Serve the Interested Views and Sinister purposes of Such instigation And as we Are Very Sure that Dividing the Said Town anew can have no good effect, and is in no Sort Necessary and Are able to Shew the Unreason ableness and illegallity of Such a Division We pray this Honorable Assembly that we may have leave to offer our Reasons why the Said Town Should not be divided and that your Honour would Reject the Petition for Dividing Thereof.

"To the Honorable the General Assembly of the Colony of Rhode Island Sitting at East Greenwich the Second Monday in September, 1765.

The Petition and Remonstrance of the Ancient Town of Providence Humbly Sheweth That a Petition was preferred to Your Honours at the Sessions in February 1765, praying that the Town of Providence might be Divided Which Petition was referred to the next --- Session and in the Mcan Time the Town of Providence Ordered to be Cited to Appear at the Said Session to make Answer to the Same; Yet Notwithstanding the Strict regard Your Honours have paid to the letter of the Law Made in Cases of this Nature by ordering the Town to be Cited so that an oppertunity might be given to the Objectors to offer their reasons why the Town Should not be divided, no such Citation ever Appeared to be Served or to be Returned to the General Assembly by the proper Officer; and Yet after all this Cautious proceeding of Your Honours, At the Close of the Next Session of Assembly we were alarmed on hearing that this Fetition was granted whereby we your petitioners are very much Agrieved and have no way of Redress but by this remonstrating to your Honours wherein we shall With the Greatest Submission and Deference tho' with a firmness equal to the Justice and equity of the Cause we plead. Say That was the Same Caution Observed and the Steps of the Law pursued by Your Honours Throughout the Whole Course of this proceeding as was so Closely Adhered to at the First We Might have had Oppertunity to have been heard and it is easy to Conceive that Were our reasons heard this petition Must have been Rejected Without any Hesitation and have made it's Exit in as Hasty a Manner as it did it's Appearance but However precipitately this petition so Injurious to Us has been Obtained Yet we rely on the Candour and Impartiality of Your Honours in Still Attending to the reasons to be offered by the Objectors which if found of due weight will Govern Your Honours in reversing all former Proceedings and in restoring to us the Privaledges which we are thereby Divisted of. More especially When it is Considered that after all the violent Efforts Made by those Concerned in Bringing this Petition to this Issue No greater a Majority than one vote could be obtained in the Honorable House of Deputies.

In the first place permit us to Assert that Dividing the Compact part of any Town was never done or attempted in any part of the English Nation before the Mischiefs and Happening to both the parts when Separated Must be Obvious to every person of reflection. As many prudential regulations must be Necessary for the well ordering, any Body of People, that Live together in a Compact Town so all such regulations will become ineffectual and usles when Such a Compact Body are Disposed into Two Separate Jurisdictions for then the Same Rules Cannot run through the whole but one will thwart and Counteract the other.

Secondly by this Division the Town of Providence is Left so Small that there is not Land Sufficient for Necessary Publick Uses. But from being the Largest and Oldest Town in the Colony is reduced to about One fourth part of the quantity of Land Contained in the Smallest Town in the Government.

Thirdly the first planters and proprietors of the Town of Providence gave and Established a Convenient Burying Place for the Use of Said Town where they and their Descendants or Hitherto have been Interred, but by the Division of the Town this Burying Place is taken from them and Notwithstanding The Saving Clause in the Act permitting the Town of Providence to make Use of their Own Burying Ground if they will go into another Town for it Yet it is No Alleviation of Hardship how Highly all Civilized people have prized and how earnestly they have Contended for the Sepulchres of their Ancestors is abundently evident from History.

Fourthly the same first Planters and proprietors of the Town of Providence gave several Large Tracts of Land with a fine Stream of Water for the Use of a Grist Mill for the Benefit of said Town to be held and enjoyed on Condition of Keeping the Mill, in good repair and Grinding on the Terms agreed on, but by this Division this Grist Mill falls into another Town which Necessarily Deprives the Town of Providence of the Government and Oversight thereof Agreeable to the Terms of the first grant.

These Reasons with Many Others that will be offered if Your Honours think fit to hear them. We presume will have so much weight with Your Honours as to Determine you to grant the prayer of Your Petitioners which is to disanull and Make Void all Former Proceedings respecting the Division of the Town. And Your Petitions will we Pray &c.

At a Town Meeting held at Providence by Adjournment on Saturday ye 7th Day of September 1765 -- the abovesaid Remonstrance was Unanimously Voted and Past by Said Town.

We, the subscribers, beg leave to protest against the vote of this house, for dividing the town of Providence, for the following reasons, to wit:

First. That the town is already reduced to a small extent of land, so that no inconvenience can arise on account of the distance the freemen are to go, to do the business necessary for the town; and that the court there is more convenient for the reception of the whole town, than any house in the part to be taken off, is to receive the freemen of such part.

Secondly. That the line mentioned in the petition, takes off upwards of forty houses containing about sixty freemen, from the part called, and by the law established to be, the compact part of said town; which number of

freemen are concerned in, and live by, merchandise, by their trades, and by going to sea on wages, as much as the same number of freemen, taken together, in any other part of the compact part of said town; by which it is evident, the interest of these and of the country part, must be as different as the interest of the compact part and the country part now is; and of course, the same. and more difficulties must very soon arise; and the compact part now to be taken off, or the country part, must (by the same reason this division is urged on) soon petition the General Assembly to be set off from the other. Thirdly. That the practice of dividing compact towns is unheard of before. there being no instance in our colony, or in history, to be produced, of dividing a compact town, corporation, or city; but on the contrary, divers instances may be produced of different corporations or towns being united and incorporated into one city; that the precedent, by this vote introduced. may have a tendency to increase and multiply the towns in this colony to a number that may be highly injurious to the public weal; for the reasons offered for dividing this town, are much less weighty than those that may be offered from divers other towns in this colony, whose extent of lands is much

Fourthly. That the proposed line of division takes off the grist mill, the place whereon it stands, together with one hundred and fifty acres of land, which was given by the original inhabitants of the town of Providence, to John Smith, and his heirs, &c., on conditions entered into by the said town and the said Smith, that he, the said Smith, should uphold the said mill useful and sufficient to grind the corn that shall be needful for the inhabitants of the said town or plantation of Providence, under certain regulations; the depriving of the town of which fatherly provision, made and provided for the inhabitants of said town, by their ancestors, so long ago as the year 1646, and confirmed in 1667, and which they have hitherto enjoyed, may, and in our opinion will, be the most grievous and burthensome to the inhabitants of said town; more especially, as there will be no grist mill left in said town, nor any place where water-works can be erected. Fifthly. That the only training field, and public burial place, now belonging to the town, will be taken off into the proposed town, by the line mentioned in the petition where by the old town will be deprived of their ancient grant made them about the year 1700, by the proprietors, and of the monuments of hundreds of their deceased ancestors, whose memories they ought to transmit to the latest posterity. The said grant expresses, 'That the said land shall perpetually lie in common for the uses of a trainfield, and for the use of burying their dead, and for other public uses, as the said town of Providence shall see cause, not damnifying the uses particularly mentioned. Sixthly. As it does not appear that the Town of Providence hath been cited, nor any return of any citation, agreeably to the vote of the Assembly, at receiving the petition, and the standing law of the Colony.

If the foregoing reasons should be thought insufficient, we are humbly of opinion the said town of Providence ought to have liberty to add such other reasons as they shall think proper.

Protests were obviously without effect, however, as the General Assembly on June 13, 1765 passed the following act: " . . . dividing the city of Providence . . " .

"An Act For Dividing the Town of Providence

Whereas, a large number of the inhabitants of the northern part of the town of Providence, preferred a petition, and represented unto this Assembly, that there are within the limits of said township, upwards of four hundred freemen; that those who dwell in the most compact part, are altogether merchants and tradesmen; and that far the greater part of the petitioners dwell in the more remote part of said township, and are near all farmers, whose interest and business often times differ from the merchants; that town meetings have been often called, and held in the compact part, upon matters and things which did not, and do not concern the farmers in the northern and more remote parts of said town; that they, the petitioners, nevertheless, have been, and still are, obliged to leave farming business, and to attend upon said meetings, to prevent things being voted to their disadvantage which hath occasioned much loss of time, contention and expense, which ought to be borne by the merchants and tradesmen; all which, being very inconvenient, they prayed to be set off, erected and made into a township; on consideration whereof, ---

Be it enacted by this General Assembly, and by the authority thereof it is enacted, that the said town of Providence be, and the same is hereby, divided into two distinct and separate towns; and that the bounds of the northern part, hereby set off, begin at the new bridge, near to the hill called Solitary Hill; thence, bounding on Wanasquatucket River, until it comes to the north-west corner of the town's land, at the east end of a place called Forestack Meadow; thence, easterly on a straight line to the middle of the mill bridge; thence, on a due east line until it comes to Seaconck River, so called; thence, northerly, bounding on said Seaconck River, until it comes to Smithfield line; thence, bounding by Smithfield line, until it comes to Johnston line; and thence, bounding westerly, by Johnston line, until it comes to the afforesaid Solitary Hill; that all the lands included within the limits aforesaid, shall be, and hereby are, erected and made into a town-

ship, to be distinguished, called and known by the name of North Providence; that the inhabitants thereof shall choose two deputies to represent them in the General Assembly; and that they shall have, hold, and enjoy all and singular the liberties, privileges and immunities, which the other towns in this colony enjoy, and are entitled to.

And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, that all debts due and money belonging to the town of Providence, before the division thereof, by this act made, shall be divided according to the last tax; and all debts due from the said towns before the division, shall be settled and made in like manner.

And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, that all and every of the justices of the peace, and military officers, that were chosen and appointed for the town of Providence, who live in that part thereof, which is now made North Providence, be, and they are hereby, continued in their respective offices, with as full power and ample authority, in every particular, as they had in consequence of their being chosen into, and commissionated for, the offices by them respectively sustained; and John Olney, Esq., is hereby authorized and fully empowered to issue a warrant, and call the freemen of the said town of North Providence to meet together, at the house of Capt. Thomas Olney, within the same, on or before the 8th day of July, in order to choose and appoint all officers necessary for managing and conducting the prudential affairs of said town, agreeably to the laws of this colony.

And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, that all town meetings in said town, shall be holden at the dwelling house of the aforesaid Thomas Olney; it being agreed upon by the said petitioners, as near the centre and most convenient; and that the said town shall send one grand juror and one petit juror, unto all and every the superior courts of judicature, courts of assize and general jail delivery; and also unto all and every the inferior courts of common pleas and general sessions of the peace, that shall hereafter be holden within and for the county of Providence.

And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, that the town of Providence shall forever have and enjoy the full, constant and free use, privilege and improvement of the burying hill or ground, that is now to be taken off in the town of North Providence, according as it now is stated and laid out by the town of Providence, for burying their dead, making monuments for the same, and also for mustering their trained bands, and exercising their soldiers thereon, as usual, heretofore, to all intents and purposes; any thing to the contrary, in this act, or any part thereof, notwithstanding.

And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, that for the future, the town of Providence shall send one grand and one petit juror to each of the superior courts of judicature, courts of assize and general jail delivery; and one grand and one petit juror to each of the inferior courts of common pleas and general sessions of the peace, that shall be holden in and for the county of Providence.

And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, that the poor be divided between the said two towns in proportion to the taxes and debts.

It is voted and resolved, that Henry Harris, Esq., and Col. William Brown, be, and they are hereby, appointed a committee to run the line between the towns of Providence and North Providence; that they erect such monuments in the line as they shall think necessary; and that they make report to this Assembly, as soon as may be." 6

Portions of the original town were re-united to Providence in 1767, 1873, and 1874; and a large part thereof also annexed to the town of Pawtucket in 1874.

The first census taken in 1774 set the population of North Providence at 830. This number was reduced to 698 in 1782, from which time the population gradually increased until the census taken in 1870 fixed the number at 20,495.

Following the annexation of the more populous sections of the town to Providence and Pawtucket in 1874, the number of persons residing in North Providence was decreased to 1,303. 8 From the division of the town in 1874, the number has progressively increased, the last census (1940) estimating the population of the town at 12,156. 9 North Providence is the smallest town in the state, having an area of only 5.9 square miles. At present the town is bounded on the north by the towns of Smithfield and Lincoln, on the east by the city of Pawtucket, and on the south by the city of Providence, and on the west by the town of Johnston.

Textile manufacturing constitutes the town's principal industry. Small truck farms dot the outlying sections, and the districts contiguous to Providence are for the most part residential.

The town has a high school, eight elementary schools, a town hall, five fire stations and a bridewell.

The principal communities are designated as Allendale, Centerdale, Fruit Hill, Greystone, Lymansville, Marieville, and Woodville. The Woonasquatucket River is the principal river located in the extreme western part of the town.

The following churches are located in the town: Allendale Bartist, Centerdale Primitive Methodist, Church of the Presentation of the Blessed Virgin Mary, school and convent (Roman Catholic), Farmer's Chapel (Baptist), Greystone Primitive Methodist Church, St. Alban's (Protestant Episcopal), St. James (Protestant Episcopal), St. Lawrence (Roman Catholic), St. Mary's Home for Children (Protestant Episcopal).

The government of North Providence is typical of that of Rhode Island towns. Its principal agencies of government are the town meeting, town council, school committee, board of tax assessors, police department and various fire associations. Its essential officers are the town moderator, town clerk, town treasurer, tax collector, and director of unemployment relief, supplemented, however, by numerous minor officials.

### I. TOWN MODERATOR

Probably the first official act of the freemen of North Providence was to select an officer to preside over their town meeting and to maintain peace and good order therein. Thus, the records of the first town meeting held July 8, 1765, contain the following entry: "James Olney is chosen Moderator."

Until 1864 the town moderator was the presiding officer at all meetings, elective, financial or otherwise. During this year (1864), however, the town was divided into districts for voting purposes, and district moderators chosen to conduct all elective meetings. When the town was separated in 1874, from what is now the city of Pawtucket, the new town of North Providence was organized without voting districts, and the town moderator again made responsible for the conduct of all meetings. In 1920 voting districts were again set off in the town, with the consequent re-establishment of the office of district moderator.

Since 1920, the official duties of the town moderator have been restricted solely to the management of the affairs of the financial town meetings.<sup>3</sup>

From 1765 to 1781, the moderator was chosen at each meeting; 4 from 1781 to 1912, annually; 5 and from 1912 to date, biennially. 6

The office has always been elective. 7

The moderator keeps no records.

### II. TOWN MEETING

By the terms of the act establishing the town, John Olney, Esq. was "... authorized and fully empowered to issue a warrant, and call the freemen of the said town of North Providence to meet together at the house of Capt. Thomas Olney, within the same, on or before the 8th day of July (1765), in order to choose and appoint all officers necessary for managing and conducting the Prudential affairs of said town, agreeably to the laws of this Colony." 1 Pursuant to the provisions of this act, the freemen of

Minutes (1)

North Providence met in their first town meeting on July 8, 1765 and organized the government of the newly created town.<sup>2</sup>

Once established town meetings have been regularly held in the town to the present time. However, the nature of the business transacted in the town meeting has been gradually modified since the first gathering, and many of the functions necessary to the proper management and conduct of the prudential affairs of the town have been delegated to less unwieldy agencies, particularly to the town council; and the voting franchise, originally exercised in town meetings, has been transferred to the more convenient district meeting.

Today, about the only function of the town meeting, designated as the financial town meeting, is the ordering of the assessment of taxes, fixing of tax rates, and the appropriation of money for the various expenses of the municipal government.<sup>4</sup>

Regular town meetings are held annually, and special town meetings called from time to time as the occasion requires.<sup>5</sup>

The town clerk is, and always has been clerk of the town meeting, and as such, makes and keeps all records thereof.

All records, unless otherwise specified, are located in the town clerk's office, 2008 Smith St., Centerdale.

### III. TOWN COUNCIL

A town council was elected by the freemen of North Providence at their first town meeting and was composed of six members, namely James Olney (president), Samuel Currie, Jonathan Jencks, Jeremiah Dexter, Thomas Olney, and Nebadiah Angell, who were elected for a term of one year. The town council retained its original membership of six members from 1765 to 1799; from 1799 to 1892 membership varied between seven and five members; and from 1892--, seven members have made up the agency. Members of the council were elected for one year terms from 1765 to 1912 and since 1912 the town council has been elected biennially. The office has always been elective.

The general powers of the town council have varied but little since the creation of the agency. The council today has full power to manage the

affairs and interests of the town and to determine all such matters that shall by law come within its jurisdiction. 5 It also acts as board of health, board of canvassers, board of license commissioners, and sits or may designate not more than three of its members to sit on a board of canvassers and registration on election day.9

The town clerk is clerk of the town council and the various town council agencies with the exception of the board of canvassers and registration; and as such makes and keeps the records of the office.

## IV. PROBATE COURT

From the incorporation of the town to 1868 probate matters were handled by the town council sitting as a court of probate. In 1868 probate jurisdiction was vested in a probate judge, and William W. Blodget named to the office. The council continued to delegate probate authority to a single judge until the division of the town in 1874. Probate jurisdiction was again exercised by the council from 1874 to 1891. From 1892 with the possible exceptions of the years 1893 to 1895 a probate judge has been regularly appointed or elected to the office, annually to 1920, and biennially therefrom to date.

The town clerk is clerk of probate court and as such records its proceedings, wills, administrations, inventories, accounts, decrees, orders, determinations, and other writings which are made, granted, or decreed upon by probate court; and has custody and safe keeping of seal of court and all books and papers belonging to the probate office.

Probate records, 1765-1874, are located in the Pawtucket City Hall, Roosevelt Ave., Pawtucket, and from 1874 to date the records are in the Town Hall. 2008 Smith St.. Centerdale.

At the first town meeting in North Providence, Jabez Whipple was elected town clerk for a term of one year. The town clerk was chosen annually thereafter until 1912, when by a special act of legislature the tenure was increased to two years. The office has always been elective. 3

The town clerk is also clerk of the town council, 4 probate court, 5 board of canvassers, 6 and board of license commissioners, 7 and as such he has official custody of the records of these agencies.

### VI. ASSESSORS OF TAXES

This office was established in the first town meeting, at which time Samuel Currie, Edward Tripp and Col. W. Brown were elected, under the title of "Assessors of Rates" for a period of one year. The title has varied slightly since the creation of the office. The present title has been more or less consistently applied to the office since 1817.

From 1765 to 1873 the number of incumbents has varied from three to seven.<sup>3</sup> Since 1873 three members have made up the agency.<sup>4</sup>

The tenure was changed in 1873, at which time one assessor was appointed for one year, one for two years, and one for three years. <sup>5</sup> Beginning in 1874, one member has been appointed each year for a three year term. <sup>6</sup>

The assessors were elected in town meeting from 1765 to 1849 and from 1852 to 1855.  $^7$  They were appointed by the town council in 1850 and 1851, and from 1856 to date.  $^8$ 

A clerk of this board is appointed regularly by the Board of Tax Assessors, who makes all the records of the agency.

Responsibility for the collection of the taxes in the town was vested in an officer designated as the "Collector of Rates", at the first town meeting. At this time the freemen elected Jonathan Pike to the office and fixed his tenure at one year. Title of the office has varied slightly, the present title identifying the office since 1817.

From the establishment of the office in the town until 1850, the collector was chosen in town meeting; 4 from 1850 to 1877, he was either appointed by the council or elected in town meeting; 5 and from 1877 to date he was chosen by the council. 6

#### IX. TOWN SERGEANT

Among the officers chosen at the first town meeting was a town sergeant, William Arwin. 1

An officer was named annually until 1912, 2 when a special act of the general assembly increased the tenure to two years. 3

The sergeant was regularly chosen in town meeting from 1765 to 1850, 4 and from 1851 to 1892 either by the town council or in town meeting. 5 From 1893 to date the office has been elective. 6

No records have been found.

### X. CONSTABLE

At the first town meeting the freemen of the town chose, among other town officers, three constables, Gorham, Stephen Tucker, and Jacob Woodward. 1

Tenure, originally one year, has apparently remained unchanged to date.<sup>2</sup> The number chosen varied, ranging from one to twenty-three.<sup>3</sup>

Until 1850 constables were chosen in town meeting; 4 by the town council in 1851; 5 again in town meeting from 1852-54; 6 by the council from 1855-61; 7 and for the last time in 1862 in town meeting. 8 From 1863 to date constables have been appointed by the town council.

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### XI. POLICE CONSTABLE

On August 16, 1869, the town council appointed as "police constables without pay", Alvin Kimball, James Townsend, Lorenzo Bosworth, and Jeremiah Rex.

Henceforth, the council has continued to annually appoint police constables, ranging in number from four to as many as 149.

The office has always been appointive.

No records have been found.

### XII. CHIEF OF POLICE

Pursuant to a town ordinance enacted August 10, 1871, the town council on August 27 of the same year appointed a chief of police, Marcus M. Cowing. 1

With the separation of Pawtucket from North Providence in 1874, the office disappears from the records of the latter town until 1886, when the town council appointed Randall Tallman to the office. 2 In all probability the town sergeant acted as chief law enforcement officer during this period (1874-86).

From 1886 to date a chief has been regularly appointed by the town council.3

### XIII. TOWN SOLICITOR

On June 9, 1873, the town meeting passed the following resolution: "That the Town Council be, and they are hereby authorized and directed to employ annually a Town Solicitor to attend to all law business of the Town, at a salary not exceeding One Thousand Dollars." On the following day the town council established the office, and named James C. Collins, Esq. as the town's first solicitor.

Thenceforth, with more or less regularity, the council has continued to annually employ or appoint a town solicitor.

No records have been found.

### XIV. SCHOOL COMMITTEE

In accordance with the terms of an act of the general assembly, establishing public schools, passed in 1828, <sup>1</sup> the electors of the town on June 2 of the same year chose the following thirteen persons to organize and conduct the affairs of the town's first school committee: Richard Anthony, William Chaffee, Henry Stone, Edmund Bailey, James Scott, Benjamin B. Pearce, Lemuel Angell, Elisha Angell, Barney Merry, Shadrach Randall, Luther Woodward, Joseph Arnold, and Otis Tiffany.<sup>2</sup>

Tenure remained at one year until 1882 when it was increased to three years.<sup>3</sup> In 1895 the term of office was made five years by special act of the general assembly; <sup>4</sup> 1897, five, two, and one; <sup>5</sup> 1902, three; <sup>6</sup> 1912, two; <sup>7</sup> 1916, two members for two years and three for four. <sup>8</sup> From 1918 to date tenure has been four years. <sup>9</sup>

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The number of persons chosen to committee membership ranged from three to thirty. 10 At present this body is made up of seven members. 11

#### XV. SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

On June 7, 1847, a vote of the town meeting provided "... That the School Committee be empowered and instructed to appoint an Agent to visit under their direction, the Public Schools in this town with an annual compensation not exceeding One Hundred Dollars." 1 A similar vote is noted in the town meeting records of June 3, 1850. 2 On June 12, 1876, the first appointment to the office under the designation of the present title of Superintendent of Schools was apparently made at this time by the town council. 3

As the extant records of the School Committee date only from 1913, there exists no documentary proof of the appointment of a superintendent from 1877 to 1913. However, the absence of evidence of the appointment of the officer in the records of the town meeting and town council for this period indicate with some degree of certainty that with the exception of the year 1876, the school committee has appointed the superintendent from 1847 to date.

Tenure so far as can be ascertained from the records has always been for one year.

In 1873 the town council appointed a "... Prosecuting Officer Under the Truant Act," and named Randall Tallman as the first officer for a term of one year. The title of the office was changed to Truant Officer in 1890 2 and to Attendance Officer in 1925.

## XVII. SCHOOL CENSUS ENUMERATOR

This office was established by the town council in 1879 at which time Henry F. Brown was appointed for a term of one year "... to take the Census required by Ch. 693 of the Public Laws." One officer was appointed annually until 1920 when the town council increased the number of members to two. From 1921 to date the school committee has regularly appointed either two or three enumerators to take the school census.

No records have been found.

### XVIII. DIRECTOR OF PUBLIC WELFARE

This office was established under the title of Overseer of the Poor, at the first town meeting when the following three persons were chosen to the office: Samuel Currie, Edward Tripp and Col. William Brown. The original title was changed by legislative act in 1925 to Pirector of Public Aid, and in 1936, the present title of Director of Public Welfare was assigned to the office by an act of legislature.

The duties of the Local Director of Aid to Dependent Children have been delegated to the Director of Public Welfare (1937--).

Membership has ranged from one to as many as eight.

The office was elective from 1765 to 1849, 1855-56, 58, 62, 83-84; appointive, 1850-54, 57, 59-61, 63-82, 1855--.  $^4$

In April 1925, it was voted " . . . That the Board of Governors of the District Nursing Association and Overseer of Poor be appointed a Committee on Mothers' Aid". In January of the following year Sarah Sharp was appointed by the town council as "Chairman of Mothers' Aid" for one year. 1

The original title of "Chairman of Mothers' Aid" was changed in 1939 to the present one of Director of Mothers' Welfare. 2 A director has been regularly appointed by the town council since the creation of the office.

# XXI. HEALTH OFFICER

A health officer was chosen at town meeting in 1832 and one Samuel W. Miller named to perform the duties of the office for a tenure of one year. 1

From 1842 to 1849 no recording of the appointment of an officer is to be found in the town meeting or town council records. An officer was elected annually, however, in town meeting from 1832 to 1842 and in the single year 1862. 2 Appointments were made by the town council from 1850 to 1861, and

XXII. (OFFICER TO PROVIDE FOR BURIAL OF HONORABLY DISCHARGED SOLDIERS, SAILORS AND MARINES).

On June 21, 1886, the town council appointed William W. Wright as the "Officer to bury Honorably discharged Soldiers and Sailors, who died without means."

Henceforth, the council has more or less made regular appointments to this office under various titles, occasionally selecting committees for this purpose.<sup>2</sup>

Tenure has always been for one year.3

The town council of North Providence at a meeting held in October 1929, named Benjamin Paley, John Capuano, Clarence H. Broley, Arthur Ward, and Joseph J. Cunningham to act as a Zoning Board of Review to pass on appeals from zoning decisions, etc. One member was appointed for one year, one for two, one for three, one for four, and one for five years. The town council continues to make the appointments to the Board for a tenure of five years.

#### XXIV. FENCE VIEWERS

At the first town meeting in 1765 the freemen of the town elected William Whipple, Edward Tripp, and Daniel Whipple to act as fence viewers for a period of one year. The number of viewers has varied from one to nine since the establishment of the office. At present there are two members regularly appointed to the office. 2

The fence viewers were elected at town meeting from 1765 to 1849 and again in town meeting in 1862. The power of appointment was delegated to the town council from 1850 to 1861 and from 1863 to date.

### XXV. SEALER OF WEIGHTS AND MEASURES

One of the officers to be elected at the first town meeting in 1765 was a sealer of weights and measures. Ephraim Wheaton was chosen the first office holder for one year. The number of members making up this office varied from one to three until 1827 but since the latter date the office has consisted of one member. No recording of the election of an incumbent to the office appears from 1773 until the year 1803.

The sealer was chosen in town meeting until 1850 when the town council for the first time appointed the officer. The town council continued to appoint an officer until 1861 but in 1862 the town meeting again made the appointment. From 1863 to date, however, the town council has been the selecting agency.<sup>3</sup>

No records have been found.

#### XXVI. AUCTIONEER

A "vendue master" was elected at the first town meeting pursuant to the law and charter of the town and Daniel Cahoon was named to the office for one year. The present title of "auctioneer" has identified the office from 1822 to date. Tenure has remained the same since the establishment of the office. The number of members appointed to the office has varied, nevertheless from one to as many as fourteen. From 1887 to date there have been four auctioneers assigned to the office. 2

The town meeting was the selecting agency, for the office from the creation of the office until 1849 when the office became appointive by the town council and continued to be appointive with the exception of the year 1862 when the auctioneer was chosen in town meeting.<sup>3</sup>

Among the nine districts agreed upon by the school committee at this time, and revised by this body in August 1831, was the fifth or "Center Mill" District, bounded as follows: "Beginning at the Smithfield Line on the Woon-asquatucket River, thence with said Smithfield Line until it comes to the line of District No. 4, thence down the Road with the line of District No. 4, until it comes to the Cross Road leading to Fruit Hill, thence across the lots by the dwelling house of Captain Emer Whipple to Zachariah Allen's Woolen Factory, on the Woonasquatucket River, thence up said River to the first mentioned Bound, meaning to include all the inhabitants within said described Bounds." 3

The district system remained in effect in North Providence until June 1885, when the town voted its abolition, and adopted the "town" system of school administration.<sup>4</sup>

Unfortunately, the only district records preserved are those of the fifth district set forth below, and found in the custody of the town clerk.
