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
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# THE

The Towne longgid to one Caridinham, a Man of great Fame; and he gave it to Tywartraith Priorie, of the which fum fay that Cardinham was Founder, fum fay Campernulph of Bere.

But at this Gift Fawey was but a fmaul Fischar Toun.

The Paroch Chirch of Fawey is of S. Fimbarrue, and was impropriate to the Priorie of Tywartraith.

Plynntown Mary ftondith not spon Plyns River; for it is diftant almost half a Mile from it. But it fondith on Torey Brooke by the Eft Ripe of it, wherby the lower and first Buildinges of the Court of the Priorie be almost clene chokid with the Sandes that Torey bringgith from the Tynne Workes.

One Prior Martine the 3. or 4. Prior of Plymtons buildid the Substance of the Chirch that there a late stoode.

There is kept a Fair at Phynosom Marie on S. 'Joba's Day at Midfomer.

Plymerous Thomas is a Quarter of a Mile from Plymerous Marie, to caullid of Thomas Bekes : but now the Chirch there is of S. Meurician, Knight and Martyr.

In the fide of this Town is a fair large Caftelle and Dungeon in it, wherof the Waulles yet fronde, but the Logginges within be decayed.

Baldainus Roduer/2, Erle of Devenskire, was Lord of this Toun and Caftelle.

And after Ifubella de Portibue, the last of that Familie, was Lady of it. Many Geneilmen hold their Landes of this Caltelle.

This I/abella gave great Privileges to her Town of Plymton, wher yet is a pratic Market.

The constancis, Erles of Devenskir, were fyns Lordes of this Town.

From Plymtoun Thomas to Le Bridge of ftone of a. \* Archis.

This Bridge frondith on Taubae Water, and a 2. Miles lower on it is Innine Bridge. and a Mile lower it poith to the Se, a q. Miles, as I effeme, by South Eft from the Main Mouth of Plym Water.

From Ivy Bridge to Modbury a 2. Miles.

The Ground is fertile of Corne and Pafture, and fum good Wooddes betwixt Plymtonn Thomas and Modburie.

The Tounlette of *Modbury* is privilegid, and hath diverfe Hamlettes longging onto it.

Sum fay that the Russes, fum fay that the Oxtens were Lordes of Mudbury.

Campernulph is now chief Lord there: and he told me That Oxton was Lord of it immediately afore the Campernulphes: But he contendid that the Campernulphes were Lordes of it afore the Oxtons.

Campersulphe of Modburies Graundfather maried the fole Doughter and Heyre of \* Childerle of Devon/hir by Excefter : and had 80. li. Land by her.

Ther was a nother House of the Campernulphes more auncient, caullid Campernulphe of Bere. The last of this House left a Doughter and Heire caullid Blanch, and the was first maried onto Copession of Devombir: and after devorcid and maried onto the Lorde Brooke, Steward onto Henry the vij. and he had by her a 700. Markes of Land by Yere.

There dwellith one Prideaux in Modburi, a Gentilman of an auncient Stoke and fair Landes, ontil be chaunce that one of his Parentes killid a Man: wherby one of the Courteneis Erle of Devon/bire had Colum Jobs and other Landes of the Prideaux.

Prideaux Ifle in Modbury Chirch. Hille 2 Gentilman in Modburi Paroche. This Name role by 2 Lawier and Juge that left onto his Heires 2 300. Markes of Land.

The Grand Father of Hille now lyving fold an 110. li.Land.

Ther is one of the *Fertecues* dwelling in *Modbury*, whos Father had to Wife the Mother of Syr *Philip Chaumburue* now lyving.

Ther was a Houfe of Monks Aliens of the French Order at Modbyri. The fite of their Manfion is yet feene on the North fide of the Chirche. The Founder was ther feant knowen. I take it that Russ or Oxten were Founders of it.

Mr. Stoure House a litle beyonde this Ford on an Hille fide, Awne and Arme Rivers go to the f.....

From this Forde to Roffbridge a 2. Miles, wher I passid over a Brooke caullid communely Harburne Water : but it is written, as I lernid, Hurbertown.

This Ryver cummith out of a Welle a 2. Miles by North Eft above Rostbridge, and goith from Rostbridge a 2. Miles lower to Bowbridge in the Valley betwixt Astroprentous and Cornewortby. And a litle lower is a Creke of Salt Water breking into 2. Crekes or Armes at the Hedde, wherof the one receivith Hurberton Water, the other castith up toward Cornewortby.

From Refteridge to Totenes a 2. Miles. Al the Ground betwixt Modeyri and Totenes plentiful of good Greffe, Corn and Woodde.

The Towne of *Totenes* lyith along from the Toppe of an High Rokky Hille by Welt onto the Roote of it by Eft.

This Toun hath beene waullid : but the Waulles be now clene downe.

A Man may fee wher the Foundation was of them.

Ther be yet 3. Gates by West, Est and . .

The Caftelle of Totenes stondith on the Hille North West Fol. 27. of the Towne. The Castelle Waul and the stronge Dungeon be maintainid. The Logginges of the Castelle be clene in Ruine. Many Gentilmen hold their Landes by Gard and Service to this Castelle.

The Lordes Zouches were long Time Lordes of this Town and Castel. now Eggecombe by Gift \* of Atteindure of Zouche.

The Town of Seton is now but a meane Thing, inhabited Fol. 42. with Fifchar Men. it hath bene far larger when the Haven was good. The Abbate of Sbirbarne was Lord and Patrone of it.

Ther longgid and doth yet a Chapelle to *Seton* caullid *Bereword* nere the Shore, and ther is an Hamlet of Fifchar Men.

Ther is a fair Chapelle of Eafe in this Town. Netberly is the Paroch Chirch to it: and Bemiftre is a Prebend to the Chirch of Saresbyri.

Bemistre is but 4. Miles from Crookesborn, a Market in Somersession by North from Bemistre.

Hoke Park having an auncient Maner Place on it is but a Mile dim. by Eft South Eft from Bemifere.

Shirburn is 6. Miles toward the Eff from Beniftre.

The Ryver goith from *Bemiftre* a Mile lower to *Netherbiry* an Uplandich Toun, leving it on an Hille on the farther Ripe toward the Weft. Heere be 3. Prebendes togither longging to the Chirch of *Saresbyri*.

Then I rode a Mile farther by Corn, Pafture and Wood.

And after a 3. Miles most by Morisch but good Pasture Ground for Brede of Catelle onto Everflor, a right homble and poore Market Toun.

And fo a Mile to Milbyri by very good Ground.

Mr. Strangegnaife hath now a late much buildid at Mylbyri \* quadrate, avauncing the inner Part of the House with a loftie and freich Tower.

The most common opinion is, That Frome rifith in a great Pond in Hoke Park and thens goith to

Thens to Miles to Bradeford stonding on the fame Ripe of Frome.

Thens 2. Miles to Dorchefter.

Fordington Bridge off Stone is a litle beneth Dorchefter Town. About a 2. Miles lower is Woddeford Castelle on the lift

At this Uphil on the right Hond as I cam is the very Hedde of Way Ryver, that of fum ys caullid Wile.

Heere 1 cam into the way that ledith from Derchefter to Waymouth 3. good Miles diltant from this Place, by al the which way I rode as yn a base level Ground.

Dorchefter is 8. Miles from Waymouth.

Ther is a Townlet on the hither fide of the Haven of Waymouth caullid \* Miltown beyng privilegid and having a Mair.

This Toun, as it is evidently seene, hathe beene far bigger then it is now. The Caufe of this is layid onto the French-Men that yn Tymes of Warre rafid this Towne for Lak of Defence. For fo many Houfes as be yn the Town they be welle and strongly buildid of Stone.

Ther is a Chapelle of Eafe in Milton.

The Paroch Chirch is a Mile of : a manifest Token that Milton is no very old Town.

Ther was a fair House of Freres in the Est Part of the Town: and the chief House of the Rogers in Derset/bir was Founder and Patrone of it.

Milton stondith as a Peninfula by reason of the Water of the Haven that a litle above the Toun spreddith abrode and makith a Bay: and by the Bay of the mayne Se that gulfith in on the other fide.

The Ryver of Way or Wile rifith not 4. Miles ful above Waymouth by North Weft at Upkil in the fide of a great Hille.

The Se ebbith and flowith up aboute a 2. Miles beyond Waymouth.

Ther is a litle Barre of Sand at the Haven Mouth.

There rennith up by the right Hond of the Haven a great Fol. 49. Arme of the Se : and fcant a Mile above the Haven Mouth on the Shore of this Arme is a right goodly and Warlyke Caftel made having one open Barbicane.

This Arme rennith up farther a Mile as in a Bay to a

A litle above *Abbates-Byri* is the Hed or Point of the *Chifil* lying North Weite, that from thens † ftreach up 7. Miles as a maine narow banke by a right Line on to South Eft, and ther buttith on *Portland* fcant a Quarter of a Mile above the new Castell in *Portland*.

The nature of this Bank of *Chifil* is fuch that as often as the wind blowith ftrene at South Eft fo often the Se betith it and lofith the Bank [and brea]kith thorough it. fo that if this Winde might molt continually blow there this Bank fhould fone be beten away and the Se fully enter and devide *Portland* making it an Ifle, as furely in tymes paft it hath beene as far as I can by any conjecture gather.

beene as far as I can by any conjecture gather. But as much as the South Eft Wind dooth bete and breke of this *Chiflle* Bank, fo much doth the North Weft Wynd again focor, ftrengith and augmentith it.

On the farther Point of the Trajectus into Porteland cumming from Waymouth is a Point of Land like a Caufey al of Pible and Sand caft up by Rages of the Se. Wheron I went fcant a Mile to the lowest Part of the Rotes of the High Ground of Portland, wher a late a right strong and magnificent Castel is buildid.

And from this Castelle to the very South Est Point of the *Cbifil* is but a litle way: and the Arme of the Se that goith up to *Abbates-Byri* gulfith in bytwixt the South Est Point of the *Cbifil* and the Castelle.

The Soile is furnished from: and the Shore very Rokky. The Ille is fruteful of Corn and Greffe: and hath plenty of Sheepe.

There be at this prefent Tyme about a 80. Housis in the

The Paroche Chirch that is but one at this tyme in the Isle is longe and furnish low buildid in the Hangging Rootes of an Hille by the Shore.

This Chirch and Paroche is about a Mile dim. to go the next way to it from the Kinges new Castelle in the life : and to go to it by Cumpace of the Shore it is 3. Miles or more. Sum fay that in tymes past ther was a nother Paroch Chirchs in the life : but I there lernid no certente of it.

There be very few or utterly no Trees in the Isle, faving the Elmes about the Chirch.

Ther wold grow more if they were ther plantid; yet is the Isle very bleke.

The People bring Wood thither out of Wight and other Places.

They brenne also Cowe Dung dryed with the Hete of the Sunne.

The People of the life lyve most now by Tillage, and furnishing.

The People be good th[ere in] \* flyngging of Stonys, and: use it for defence of the life.

The People ther he politique inough in felling their Com- Fol. 51. moditees and fumwhat avaritiofe.

The Perfonage fette in the High Streat is the best building in the life.

The Bishop of Winchefter is Patrone of the Chirch.

The Newborows Sepulchres were at Byndon Abbay wherof they were Founders.

The laste of that Name, whos doughter and Heyre was maried to Syr Henry Marney, dyid in Effax or Southfolk, and ther was byried.

There stondish a Tumbe in Est Lilleworth Chirch that was erected for his Buryal.

The General code of the Newborows and the Name of Heires General that they maried with be yn Glaffe Windows in a Parlow in the Maner Place at Eft Lilleworth.

The length of the Toun litthe almost fulle by North Fol. 33and South.

The Key for the Shippes fundith South Eft.

Ther is a fair Toun House of Stone by the Kay.

King Richard the 3. began a pece of a Tourn' Waulle at one ende of the Kay; and promifid large thinges to the Town of Pole.

I can gather no otherwise, but wheras of old tymes Shippes cam furnished wares, and fyrines Shippes loft their Rede ther for lak of Depth of Water Shippes kept and reforrid neres to Pole Toun, and so it by a little encreased, and Warebam felle clene to ruines. Howbeit Warebam was ons fore ratid in the Dames Warres.

Ther is a fair Chirche in Pole.

Ther lyith agayn the Kay a Point of Land as a Carley after the Falcion of a brode Swerd with a flamp. The Point is agayn the Town: the brode part hang

The Water of Pools Haven gullith in on bothe fiel of this Caule or Point of Ground.

Thens to Juliane Bridge of Stone at the one Ende of Twinburne, and half a Quarter of a Mile lower to Aleyn Bridge of xij. fair Archis at the other Ende of Twinburn.

Thens to Iver Bridge of Stone a vj. Miles lower.

Thens 2. Miles to Chrifte-Chirch Twimbam.

Christes-Chirch is communely countid to be viij. Miles from Winburn.

The Toun of *Winburn* is yet meatly good and reasonably welle inhabitid. it hath bene a very large Thing, and was in price in tyme of the *Weff-Saxon* Kinges.

Ther be in and about it diverse Chapelles that in tymes paste were, as I have lernid, Paroche Chirchis of the very Toun of Winburne.

The *Saxon* Kinges had hard by the Toune a Caftelle now caullid *Badbyri*, but clerely down. The Diches, Hilles, and Site ther of be yet evidently feene.now Conyes borough in it.

Ther hath beene fins a fair Maner Place caullid Kingefton-Haul, and this is also now in a manner clerely defacid. It berith in Wrytinges the Name of Kingestown Lascy. Wherapon I gather that one of the Lasys, Predeceffors onto Henry Lascy Erle of Lincoln, buildid this House. and I gather therby also, That the Lascys were Lordes of Winburne. and by hym it cam to John of Gaunt Duke of Lancestre, to the Fol. 55. which Duke[dome] it yet longgith. And the Courtes for Winburn be yet kept at Kingestow.

There lyith in a goodly large Tumbe of Marble in the South Isle by the Quire one Barok or Berwike, † as I hard fay". There Lady Margarete Mother to Henry the vij. foundid and endowid a Grammar Schole in Winburne.

The Ministers of the Chirch of Winburne hath a praty House or College to inhabite.

The Deane hath a fair House.

#### The Courfe of Winburn River.

Winburn risith 2 3. Miles by Estimation above S. Giles Winburne, and to cumming by North Eft by S. Giles Winburne, wher Mr. Afficheley hath his Maner Place and Park, descendith a 6. Miles lower to Wadeford Bridg of 4. Archis [of Stone in the] . . . [Ende] of Winburne Town, Fol. 56. and fo goith down half a Quarter of a Mile lower, and breking vnto 2. Armes rennith thorough 2. Bridges of 3. Archis a peace in the very Town of Winburn, caullid I/ebroke Bridges, one beyng nere the other : and strait cumming into one Botom goith a litle lower to a Mylle, and a litle lower goith into stour by Eft South Eft not much above Aleyn Bridge.

From Winburn to Horton 4. Miles much by woddy Ground. This was fumtyme an Hedde Monasterie, fyns a Celle to Shirburn. The Village was now a late brent.

There rennith a fleting bek thorough it, and a paffid down thorough the Streat felf on the Right Hond. I gellid it to reforce to Harten, but I am not fure of that.

Here was furnityme an Hedde Abbey, after made a Celle to Tewkesleyri by an Erle of Glocefter.

From Crowdorn I pellid about a 2. Miles or more, al by playne Champain Ground, loving Blandon the Kinges great Park hard on the lift Hond.

Thens a 6. Miles by like Ground to Houington a good Village.

In the botom of this Toun goith a great Water, and ther I pallid over a Bridge of a 3. Archis, and foc Saresbyri at by Champayn Ground a 2. Miles.

Miles from shaftesbyri yn the way betwixt Saresbyri and it a Mile from the High way in a borom on the left Hond, riding from Saresbyri to Shaftesbyri, and thens to Honington cum-Fol. 57. mith thys Ryver, that is about a xij. Miles from the Hed of

Chalkbourn Water. and a 2. Miles dim. byneth Honington it goith into Aven about a Mile byneth Harnham Bridge.

And, as I remembre, Mr. Beynton hath a Place on this Water, wher his Father was wont to dwelle.

The Toun of Now-Sareshyri with the Suburbes of Harnham Bridge and Fillebertown is to good Miles in Cumpace.

They be many fair Streames in the Cite of Saresbyri, and effectially the High Stream, and the Caftel Stream, to caultid by caule it lyich as a way to the Caltelle of Old-Sareshury. Al the Streater in a maner of New-Saresbyni hath little Streame-51 lettes and Armes derivyd out of Auon that renaith thorough them.

There be but 2. Paroche Chirchis in the Cyte of Saresbyri, wherof the one ys by the Market Place as in the Hart of the Town, and is dedicate to S. Thomas.

The other is of S. Edmunde, and is a Collegiste Chirch of. the Fundation of Delawile Bisthop of Saresbyry. This Chirch frondith at the North Welt Ende of the Town hard by the Town Diche.

This Diche was made of the Tounes Men + as fuch tyme as Simon Bisthop of Saresbyri gave Licence to the Burgeles to ftrengthen the Town with an embarelid Waulle.

This Diche was thoroughly cafte for the Defence of the Fol. 58. Town to far as it was not fufficiently defended by the mayn Streame of Avan: But the Waulle was never begon ; yet, as I remembre, I faw one Stone Gate or 2. in the Town.

Harnham Bridge was a Village long afore the Erection of New-Seresbyri. and there was a Chirch of S. Martine longging to it.

There fundith now of the Remain of the old Chirch of S. Martin a Barne in a very low Medow on the North fide of S. Nice/as Hofpital.

The Caufe of the Relinquisching of it was the Moystenes of the Ground often overflowen. For this Chirch was ther a new dedicate to S. Mortine in a nother Place that yet flandith.

Licens was get of the King by a Bisthop of Saresbyri to turn the Kingges High way to New-Soresbyri, and to make a mayn Bridge of right Paffage over Auon at Harnham.

The Chaunging of this Way was the totale Caufe of the Ruine of Old-Saresburi and Wiltown. For afore this Wiltown had a 12. Paroch Chirches or more, and was the Hedde Town of Wildbir.

Ther was a Village at Fisherton over Avon or ever New-Sarasbyri was buildid, and had a Paroche Chirch ther as it vet hath.

In this Fiffchertoun, now a Suburbe to New-Saresbyri, W48 fins the Erection of the New Toun an Houfe of Blake Freres buildid not far from *Fis/herton* Bridge.

Ther was also an House of Gray Freres withyn the Toun of Saresbyri of the Fundation of . . . Bisshop of Saresbyrk

The Cite of Old-Saresbyri standing on an Hille is distant Fol. 59. from the New a Mile by North Welte, and is in cumpace half a Mile and more.

Sum think that lak of Water cauffid the Inhabitantes to relinquifch the Place, yet were ther many Welles of fwete Water.

Sum fay, That after that in Tyme of Civile Warres that Caftelles and waullid Townes wer kept that the Caftellanes of Old-Saresbyri and the Chanons could not agre, infomuch that the Caftellanes apon a tyme prohibited them cumming home from Procession and Rogation to re-entre the Toun. Wherapon the Bisshop and they confulting together at the

last began a Chirch on his own propre foyle: and then the people refortid strait to New-Saresbyri and buildid ther: and then in continuaunce were a great numbre of the Houses of Old-Saresbyri pullid down and set up at New-Saresbyri.

Ofmund Erle of Dorcheftre and after Bisshop of Saresbyri erectid his Cathedrale Chirch ther in the West Part of the Town: and also his Palace. Where f now no token is but only a Chapelle of our Lady yet standing and mainteynid.

Ther was a Paroch of the Holy Rode befide in Old-Saresbyri: and an other over the Lit Gate wherof yet fum tokens remayne.

I do not perceyve that ther were any mo Gates in Old-Saresbyri then 2. one by Eft, and an other by Weft. Withoute eche of these Gates was a fair Suburbe. And yn the Eft Suburbe was a Paroch Chirch of S. John: and ther yet is a Chapelle standinge

The Ryver is a good Quarter of a Mile from Old-Saresbyri and more where it is nereft onto it, and that is at Stratford Village South from it.

There hath beene Houses in tyme of mynd inhabitid in the Eft Suburbe of Old-Saresbyri: but now ther is not one House nether [with]in Old-Saresbyri or without in[habite]d.

Ther was a right fair and ftrong Caftelle within Old-Saresbyri longging to the Erles of Saresbyri effectially the Longesflees.

I reede that one Gualterns was the first Erle after the Conquest of it.

Much notable ruinus Building of this Castelle yet ther remaynith.

The Diche that environid the Old Toun was a very deepe and ftrong Thynge.

There is also in the West South West Part of the Toun a fair Hospitale sumtyme crockid by *Petrus de Rupidus* Bisshop of *Winebester*, where a late xij. poore Men, and yet vj. be yn it.

I lernid in the Town that the 2. Towers in the Haven Mouth were begon in King Hawarde the 4. tyme, and fette forewarde yn Building by Richard the 3. Kyng Henry the vij. endyd them at the Procuration of Fox Bisshop of Winnbester.

King Heary the vij, at his firste, Warres into France crectide in the South Part of the Towne 3. great Bruing Houses with the Implementes to sorve his Shippes at such tyme as they shaul go to the Sé in tyme of Warre.

One corporter a Riche Man made of late Tyme in the mydle of the High Streate of the Town a Town Houfe.

The Toun of Portesmonth is bare and litle occupied in time of Pece.

King Henry the vij. of late tyme lette in Portefittel Capitaines, and certen foldiours in Garrison.

The Town of Portefmuth Handhelli in a Corner of an Ille bering the Name of Portefmuth.

This life is in Lenght a vj. Miles and a 3. Myles in Bredth. This life bench good Corn and Graffe.

The Ground is made an Ille by this meete: There brekinh out an Arme of the Mayn Haven about a 3. Miles above *Portefmuth*, and goith up a 2.
