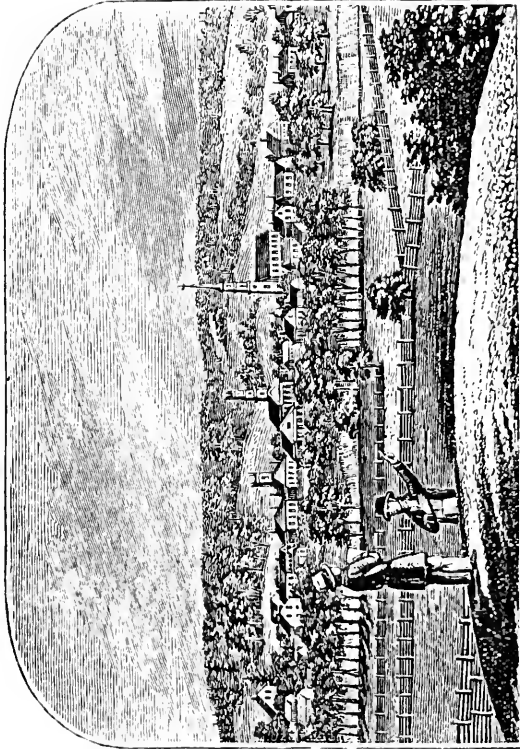

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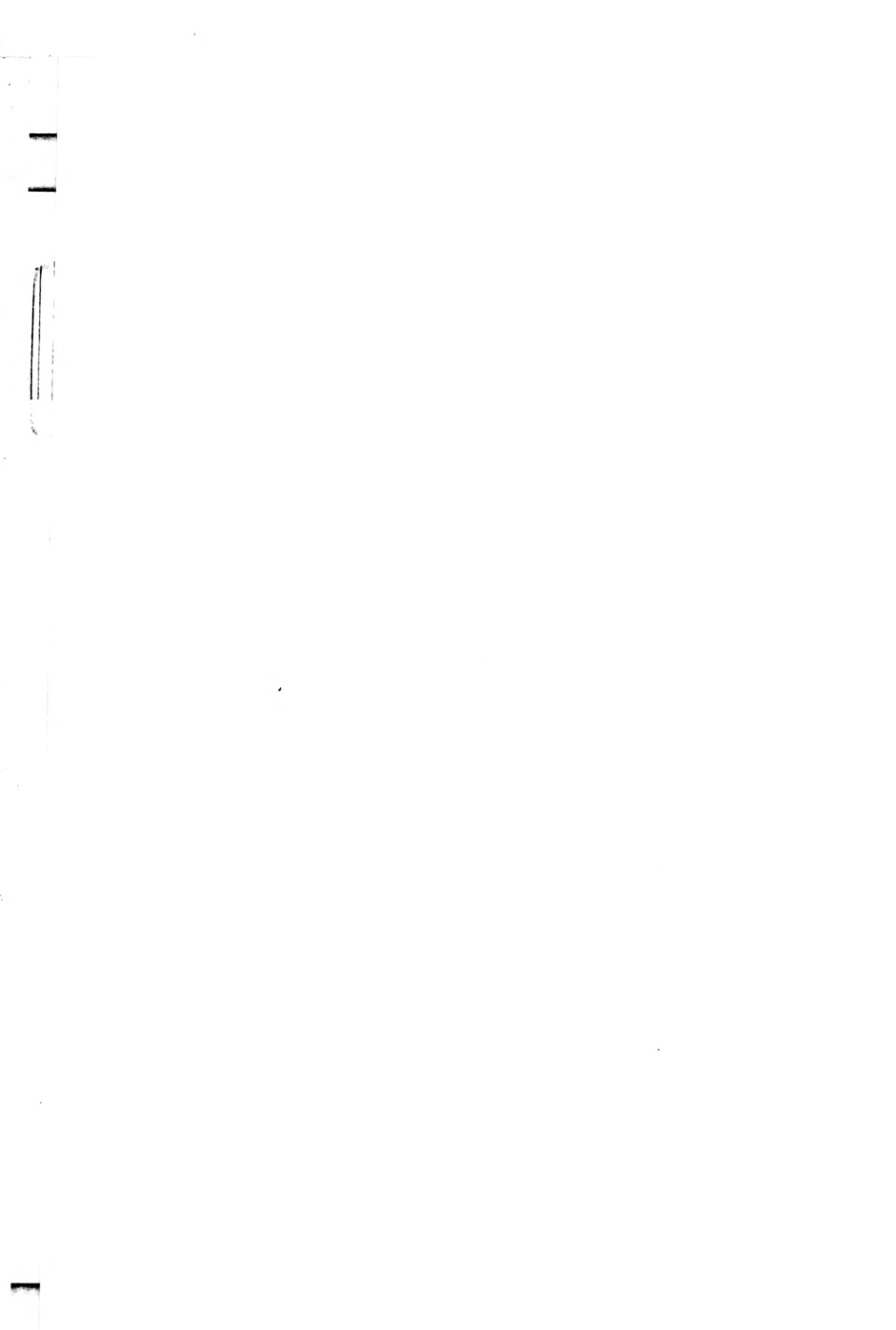

GENEALOGY OF THE DESCENDANTS OF JOHN LEE.

Communicated to the Historical and Genealogical Register for October, 1874, by the
REV. SAMUEL LEE, of New-Ipswich, N. H.

AMONG the early emigrants to New-England there are several,—six or seven at least,—of the name of Lee. John Lee, of Farmington, Connecticut, came to this country in 1634. I find the following notices of him :

In the "Book of Rolls," so called, in London, there is a list¹ of a company who sailed from Ipswich in the ship Francis, John Cutting, master, bound for New-England "the last of April, 1634" (In an official paper containing the above list, the date is "the Tenth day of April"), in which we find the name of "John Lea," aged 13, in the care of William Westwood. Westwood was 28 and his wife, Bridget, 32 years of age.

In the "Records of the Colony of the Massachusetts Bay" we find the following notices of Westwood: He took the freeman's oath March 4, 1635; is "sworn Constable" of the plantation at Connecticut, Sept. 5, 1635. On the 3rd of March following he is made a member of a "Commission" "to govern the people att Connecticut." He was among the original proprietors of Hartford. May 22, 1661, he is called "Mr." and made a member of a commission for Hadley, and with authority, not given to other members, "to join persons in marriage at Hadley."

In Stuart's "Hartford in the Olden Time" we find the following: William Westwood was a native of Essex County, in England; he settled in Newtown, now Cambridge, and moved to Connecticut in 1635; was present at the first court held in Connecticut, April 26, 1636, and at every subsequent court during the continuance of the commission. He was a deputy from Hartford for several years,—the last time in 1656. In or about the year 1658 he removed to Hadley, Mass., where he spent the remainder of his life.

John Lee, of course, was under the care of Westwood, and went with him from Boston to Hartford. In 1641 a colony from Hartford settled the town of Farmington. John Lee was one of them. His house was where is now Miss Porter's school for young ladies. It is a common tradition among his descendants that he came from Colchester,—whose nearest port was Ipswich,—and the name, Lee, is a very common one in the records of that town. Among the first proprietors of Farmington was Deacon Stephen Hart, and young Lee may have had special reasons for emigrating with Deacon H. He afterward married his daughter Mary.

The following are such facts as the writer has been able to obtain in relation to our family :

JOHN¹ LEE, the emigrant, born in England, about 1620; came to New-England, 1634; removed to Hartford, Ct., 1635; one of the original settlers of Farmington, 1641; married Mary Hart, 1658; himself and wife joined the church, Aug. 15, 1660; his inventory, £359, dated Oct. 30, 1690. In the old cemetery in Farmington is his tombstone, with the following inscription. It is a coarse unhewn slab, some two feet in height and eighteen inches wide, that must have been broken out of the stone by a dull tool driven lengthwise and leaving the letters jagged :

Mary, the widow of John¹ Lee, married for her second husband Jedidiah Strong, of Northampton, Mass., Jan. 5, 1692, to which place she removed, taking with her the two youngest children. She died Oct. 10, 1710. The cause of her death was the falling of the horse on which she was riding, while on her way with her husband to visit their children in Coventry, Conn. She was over 70 years of age. Her husband went to reside with his children in Coventry, and died there May 22, 1753, aged 96.

2. JOHN² LEE (*John*¹) resided in Farmington, and was annually appointed to offices of honor and trust in the town. He was street and land surveyor, and was one of the committee appointed by the proprietors to treat with the Sachem Marsakepe, and to obtain his signature to a deed conveying to them the tract of land named Farmington. He joined the church Nov. 24, 1686; his wife, Jan. 3, 1687. He married, Dec. 27, 1682, Elizabeth (b. in 1664), daughter of Thomas Loomis, of Windsor, Conn. Her mother was Mary, daughter of Deacon Thomas Judd, of Farmington. John² Lee died April 24, 1773. Their children were:

3. STEPHEN² LEE (*John*¹) was a physician, and one of the first settlers in that portion of the original tract of land which is now called New Britain. He received a grant of five roods of land from the town in January, 1689, on the westerly side of the highway (provided it doth not hinder former grants) and the watering place, he building on it within four years, or else it is to return to the town again; and in March following "the Court" was applied to, to lay out Stephen Lee's lot as near as they can according to grant. Kensington was made an independent society about 1708, the church was organized in 1710, and the Rev. Mr. Burnham settled over the society in 1712. At the time of his settlement there were but four-teen families in the place, and the church consisted of ten members, seven males and three females. Stephen Lee and wife stand at the head of the list of the original members of this church, having united with the church in Farmington, Oct. 5, 1709.

NOTE TO THE READER.

IN numbering generations, John, the emigrant ancestor, is considered the FIRST generation, his children the SECOND generation, his grand children the THIRD, and so on. Under every generation, except the first and second, are included parents and children; but the *number* of the generation refers only to the children. The numbers prefixed to the names of children, and repeated in larger figures when the children become parents, are for the purpose of tracing a line of ancestors backward, and a line of descendants forward, and also for reference.

John Lee had four sons who left posterity; each one has been placed at the head of a branch, and his descendants, generation after generation, numbered separately, as being easier of reference than if all were numbered together.

Of Mary, the eldest daughter of John, we are able to give only the names of her children.

Tabitha, the youngest child of John, who married a Strong, and her descendants, are so fully carried out in the "Strong History," that we have not thought it best to go farther than the TENTH generation, that being the extent of material we had ourselves collected.

INTRODUCTION.

LEES OF ENGLISH HISTORY.

THE name first appears as Lega, DeLee, gradually taking the present form, Lee. In the "Doomsday Book," "Lega," and "Lee" are often used to denote the same family. The word "Lee" signifies "meadow, pasture, or grass land." Previous to the use of surnames, persons were designated by the place of their residence, or some epithet descriptive of their personal character. The family of Lee is one of the most ancient in the records of English history. In the eleventh century, the name of Launcelot Lee is associated with William the Conqueror, and is of Norman origin, and in the divisions of the estates by that chieftain, a fine estate in Essex was bestowed upon him.

LIONEL LEE "raised a company of gentlemen cavaliers," at the head of which he accompanied Richard Cœur de Leon in the third crusade, A. D. 1192. For gallant conduct at the siege of Acre he was made "Earl of Litchfield," and another estate was given to the family, which was later called "Ditchly." They were devoted followers of the Stuarts, and distinguished for their loyalty to the Crown, and for their acts of valor received various honors and distinctions. Two of the name have been Knights of the Garter, and their banners, surmounted by the "Lee Arms," may be seen in St. George's Chapel, Windsor.



The "Lee Arms" consist of a shield, bend sinister, battled and embattled: crest, a closed visor, surmounted by a squirrel, holding a nut, with the motto, "*Non incautus futuri.*"

Sir HENRY LEE, of "Quarenden Bucks," was created "Earl of Litchfield," May 22, 1611. He was succeeded by his son, Sir EDWARD HENRY LEE, in 1674, and he by his son, Sir GEORGE HENRY LEE, Feb. 13, 1716.

An old volume of English history, which gives the derivations of names, mentions that the family of "JOHN LEE, of Lee Hall," Parish of Wibenbury, County of Chester, sometimes spelled the name Lee, Lea and Leigh.

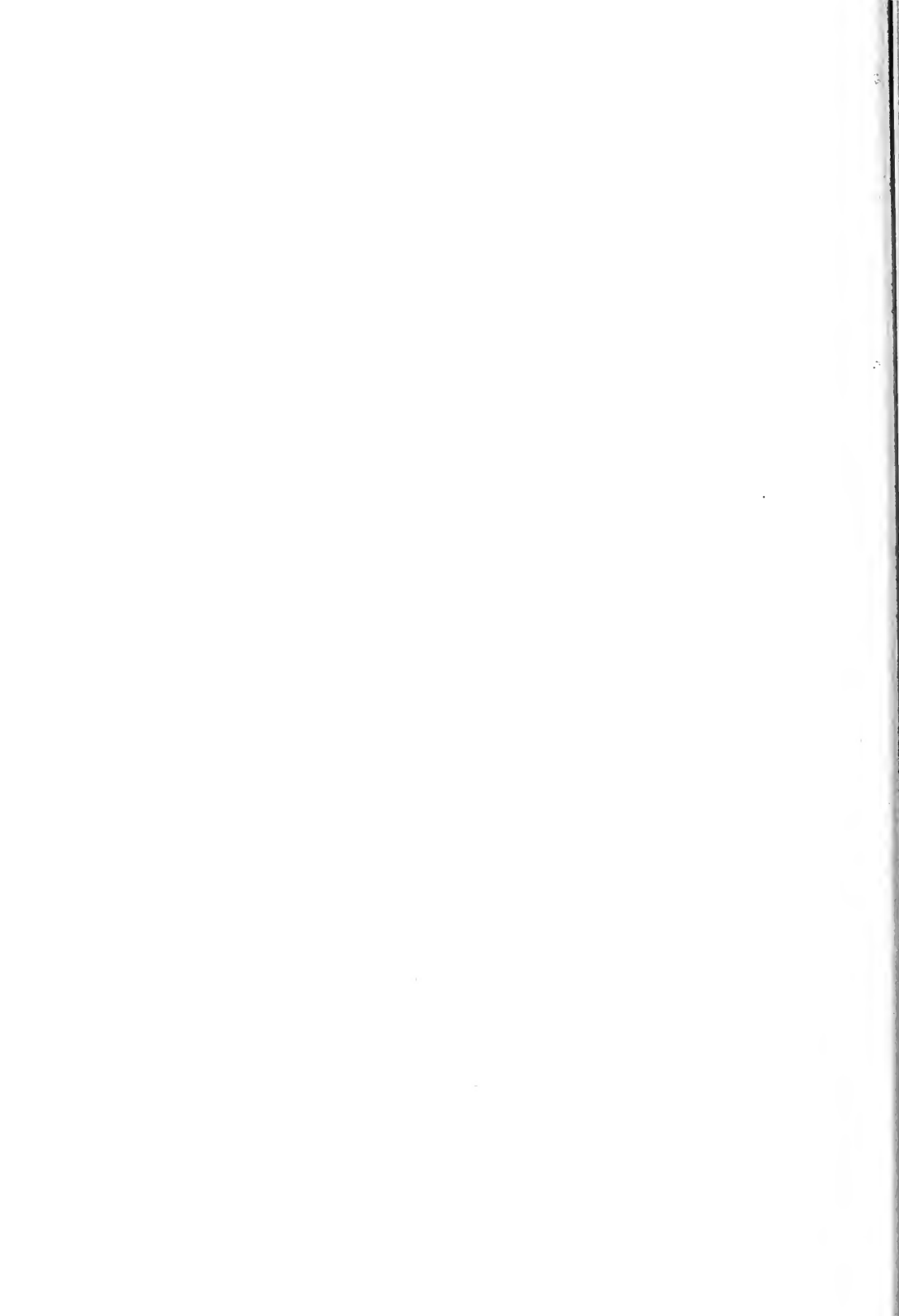
We find that a John de Lee, Knight of Essex, was sent to Parliament, A. D. 1307.

THOMAS, son of John Lee, bequeaths to his eldest son the paternal estate near "Pebenhull," an ancient village in Shropshire, now extinct. John, or Johannes Lee, is mentioned frequently in parliamentary writs of Edward II.

RICHARD LEE, third son of Launcelot Lee, of Cotton, emigrated to America about the year 1641. This Richard is the ancestor of the Virginia Lees.

The tradition and circumstances of our ancestor, John, and Richard, both being from Essex County, England, one emigrating in 1634, the other in 1641, are the only reasons that can now be assumed that they were of the same origin.

A correspondent of one of our family in London, Rev. Frederic George Lee, a distinguished clergyman of the Church of England, has interested himself in our efforts to obtain something authentic as to the birth place of our ancestor, and has kindly furnished us with many interesting facts as to the family name in England. He has in his possession, upon parchment, in Latin, the pedigree of his



family from a very early period, down to 1629. This can be found in the *London Genealogist*, April, 1876, and is copied in this work from one sent by the above named gentleman to Mr. Wm. H. Lee, of New York. The link wanting to connect our ancestor with the English family must be found—if found at all—in the years from 1620 to 1634.

The uncertainties of such researches are best expressed in the words of Mr. Albert Welles, President of the "American College of Heraldry," in his introduction to the Welles Genealogy, and is as follows:

"It is stated among the Librarians and officers of Historical institutions in the Eastern States that *ten per cent.* of the inquirers succeed in establishing the *connection* between their ancestors here and the family abroad. Most of the emigrants fled from religious persecution, and, instead of promulgating their derivation or history, rather suppressed all knowledge of it, so that their descendants had no direct traditions. On this account it becomes necessary to give the descendants, *separately*, of each of the original emigrants to this country, with a general account of the family abroad, as far as it can be learned from history, without trusting too much to tradition, which, however, is often the only source of information on these matters."

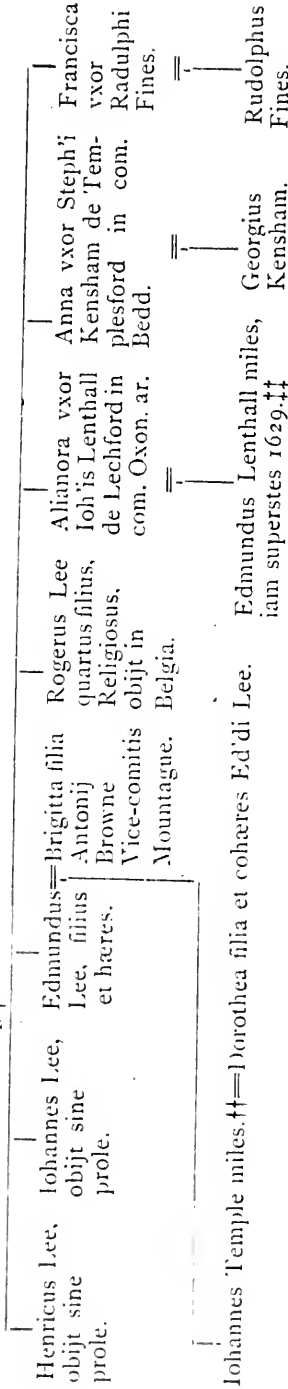

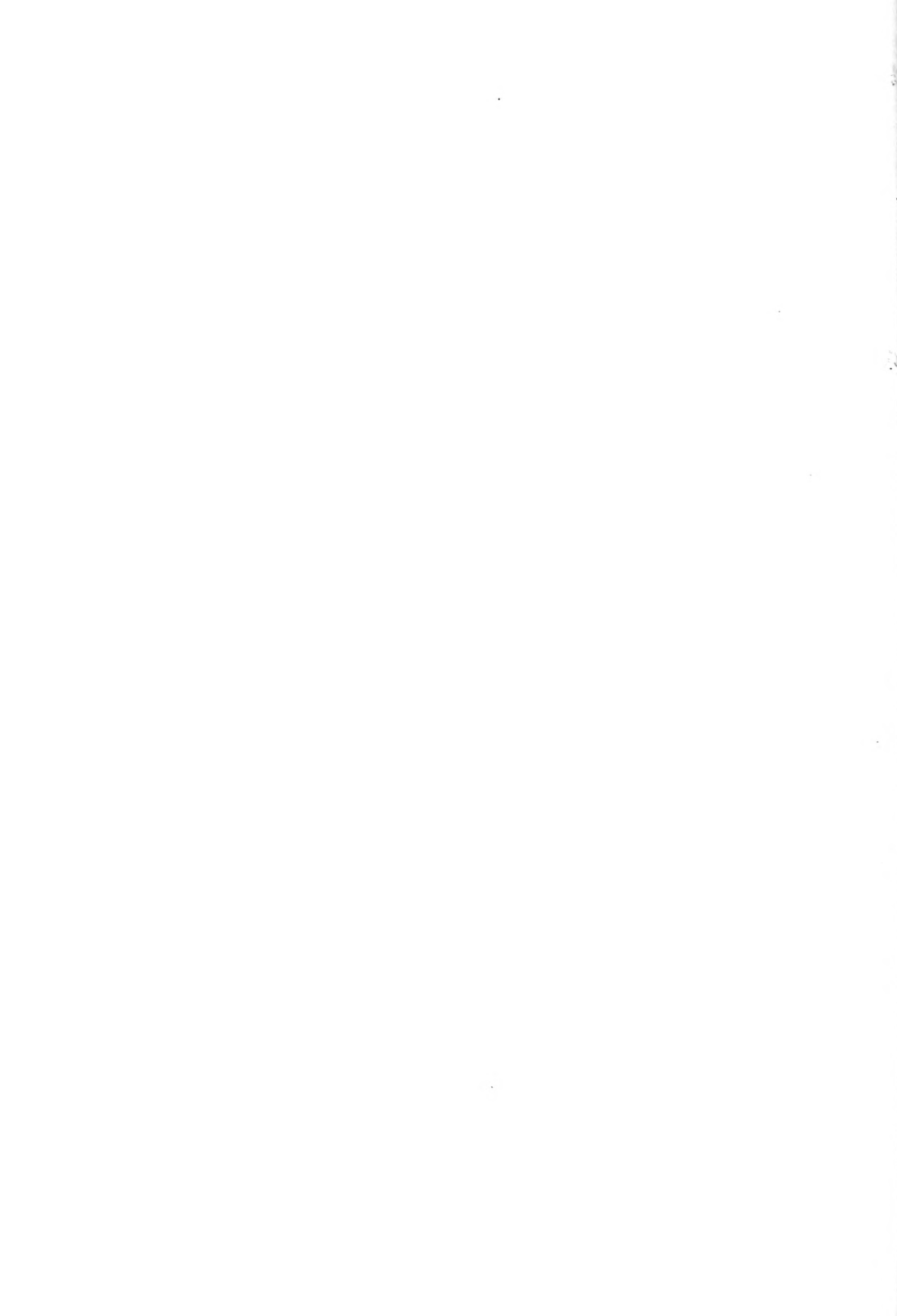

From the city records of Leyden, Holland, among the lists of names, mostly natives of the eastern coast of England, especially Essex County, and Colchester, there were Samuel and Bridget Lee, the latter a daughter of Joos Lee.* These came to New England and settled there.

There is no evidence that either the Pilgrims from Leyden, or those that left for St. Christopher's and the Barbadoes, were in any way related to our ancestor, John Lee. But is it not probable that of the emigrants to these islands many found their way to New England, where they could enjoy religious liberty, and that from these men have come some of the families of the name of Lee in other parts of Connecticut, and in Massachusetts, Vermont and New Jersey? It is historical that many of the emigrants to the West India Islands finally settled in New England.

VIRGINIA LEES.

IN 1640-1, RICHARD LEE, third son of Launcelot Lee, came out to Virginia as Secretary of the Colonial Governor, Lord Fairfax, and finally settled at York, on the James River, in 1647. He was among the pioneers of the Lees of Virginia; was, as he wrote in his will, "late of Strafford-Langton, County of Essex, England," and of the Lee family of Cotton, near "Bridgworth," the seat of Launcelot Lee. There is no satisfactory documentary evidence to show a family connection of the Hartford County Lees with those of Virginia; but it is clear that they were both from Essex County, England, and it has always been a tradition that they were the same in their English origin. There were very different motives in the emigrants leaving for Virginia and those settling in New England.

The New England Pilgrims were Puritans and Non-conformists, who came for the purpose of finding religious liberty and freedom. The Virginia Lees were both adherents of the Stuarts and Churchmen; and the emigrant, Richard Lee, left for America under a commission from the Crown.

In order to understand fully the character of the Pilgrims who were leaving their homes, many, indeed nearly all, males just entering upon manhood, and but few past the meridian of life, it is necessary to become familiar with the persecutions and sufferings they endured in the wars of Charles I., and the severity of Laud, Archbishop of Canterbury, in his hatred of heretics. Essex County, and especially Colchester, was the stronghold of dissenters from the days of Wickliffe, and particularly so in the sixteenth century.



It is not purposed in this memorial to pass judgment upon the religious parties, all of whom had adherents from every rank and station in life, but simply record the facts as they are now received and understood.

In a publication called "King and Commonwealth," by Corderey & Phillpots, (London, 1875,) there is given much that is new from the archives of recently discovered evidence. Especially does it show that in the wars of that eventful period the three religious bodies, viz: Churchmen, Presbyterians and Independents, were the distinctive divisions in the thirty years' conflict, and not the Royalists, as against those in rebellion to the Crown.

In the above memoranda, and considerations as here set forth, we design only to put in this work something suggestive, as the result of searches made, in hopes that it may be put into a better shape by abler hands, and perhaps stimulate others interested in the name to endeavor to find evidence of their origin, and so to trace the connection; if any, of the different settlers of that name and period.

It is with great satisfaction that in the exhumed and simple inscription found upon the rough stone originally placed over the grave of John Lee, in the burial ground at Farmington,* corresponding as it does with the church and family records extant, we have the very best proof of not only the place of his burial, but also conclusive testimony of the date of his departure from his native land, and of his subsequent abode, from the time of his arrival in his adopted country, to the date of his death. There is, therefore, good reason to believe, there are undiscovered records and headstones of some of the others of the name, which the "book of rolls" of the British archives, record as having left for New England and the West India Islands, and hence these names are put in this work.

In all genealogical researches, going back to the time of the set-

tlement of New England by the Pilgrims, there is much that can be only conjecture. The Parish Records of England in the war were imperfect, and often destroyed, and in the thirty years of devastation a whole generation passed away, and another nursed in strife and warfare, took their places. Very few of the original settlers were possessed of much, or any property, and had but little to expect of those they left behind; so that of those in the war of the Revolution who became eminent, like Washington, Adams and Jefferson, there is but little known of their English parentage or history.

The Lees, from the time of the Norman conquest, were distinguished in their various callings; and we have, perhaps, as satisfactory an account of our English ancestors as almost any family emigrating as early as 1634.

When JOHN LEE left his home for the new world, the city of London was a city of renown and commerce, but with a population of only 500,000; and the next city in numbers was Bristol, with a population not much exceeding our own Norwich, at this date. Sheffield, with a population of 2000, Leeds, 3000, and Manchester, 5000, were just coming into importance as manufacturing towns, respectively, of cutlery, woolens, cottons, etc.

Education, so as to read, write, etc., was the exception, not the rule. But few of the streets of London and the great thoroughfares were paved, and then only with the smallest of cobble-stones. Coaches had just come into use. In judging of the men of those days we have to take into account the condition of society at the time, the conventional rules and habits of the people, and the want of the advantages common to all now; and then we can have a better appreciation of our forefathers.

NEW ENGLAND LEES.

AMONG the early emigrants to New England there are several of the name of Lee, who are not connected, as we can find, with the Farmington family.

1. JOHN LEIGH, "a younger son of an ancient and honorable family of Bruton St. London," described "as a person of good natural and acquired abilities, and in the bloom of life." In the "difficult times in 1635," he came to New England and settled in "Agawam," now Ipswich, in Essex County, Mass. He married, and had sons and daughters. He died at Ipswich in 1671. "His two sons, John and Joseph, by agreement began, in 1677, to write their names Lee," and from this it is inferred they spelled their name both ways. A branch of this family settled in Barre, Mass. The late Gideon Lee, ex-mayor of New York, was an honored descendant of this family.

2. WALTER LEE appears on the town records of Westfield, Mass., as early as 1660, and the name continues for more than a century, and then disappears. This Walter is supposed to be the one who was made a "freeman" at Hartford, in May, 1654.

3. Another family are descended from THOMAS LEE, of Boston, Mass., who married in 1700, Deborah Flint. His mother's name was Martha Mellowes, a grand daughter of Oliver Mellowes, one of the first settlers of Boston and Braintree. This Martha Mellowes Lee

married, for her second husband, Deane Winthrop, son of the Governor. The Lees of Boston, Salem, Cambridge and Beverly, belong mainly to this branch.

4. THOMAS LEE, with his family, and the father of his wife, a Mr. Brown, left England in 1641; he died on the passage to this country, and his wife and children landed at Saybrook, Conn. From the sons of this family the Lees of Lyme, Guilford, Saybrook, etc., are descended.

FARMINGTON LEES.

JOHN LEE left home a youth thirteen years of age, a ward of William Westwoode, who, with his wife Bridget, settled first at Cambridge, then Newtown, Mass., and later in Hartford, Conn. Westwoode was at once placed in important public offices, and was a man, for his time, of talents and position; and John was without doubt in some way a relative of either Westwoode or his wife; and receiving instruction from his guardians, remained a member of the family until he removed to Farmington, and his alliance with the Hart family.

William Westwoode, together with his wife Bridget and wards, John Lea and Grace Newell, left Ipswich, Eng., in the ship "Francis," the "tenth day" of April, 1634, he aged 28, his wife 32. In the "records of the Colony of Massachusetts Bay," we find that he took the "freeman's oath," March 4, 1635; was sworn constable of the "Plantation of Connecticut," Sept. 5, 1635. On the third of March following he is made a member of a "Commission to govern the people 'att' Connecticut." He was one of the Hooker company that removed to Hartford in 1636, and was one of the six who composed the first court holden there April 26, 1636. His home lot, of three acres, was next Stephen Hart's. He became one of the wealthiest and most prominent of the first settlers of Hartford. He is made a member of a "commission for Hadley," May 22, 1661, and is called Mr., a title given only to persons of distinction, and with authority not given to other members "to join persons in marriage at Hadley."

He removed to Hadley in the year 1659, where he died, April 9,

1689, aged 83. His wife died May 12, 1676, aged 74. They had one child, Sarah, born in 1644, at Hartford. She married Aaron Cook, of Hadley, son of Aaron, of Northampton, May 30, 1661. She died March 24, 1730, aged 86 years.

The preceding sketch shows the character of the man under whose care our ancestor was placed; and we may infer what John Lee was, from the prominent characteristics of his posterity, as we shall see them in these pages, being earnest and efficient supporters of religious institutions. Further research may bring to light his early history, his parentage and home; but it is pleasant to know that our ancestor was associated with the true and good men who laid the foundations of one of the most thriving and pleasant towns in Connecticut, and which has sent out, to bless the land, her portion of reliable and distinguished men in the various departments of life. By patient industry on a farm, he acquired a handsome property for those days; professed the religion of the gospel; presented his children in baptism, and made himself useful in the sphere of life where God, in his providence, had placed him. His descendants, numerous and widely scattered, have been distinguished for enterprise, industry, liberality and success in business; respect for the laws and readiness to bear their portion of the burdens of society, civil and religious.

Farmington, where our ancestor made for himself a home, is ten miles from Hartford, the State capital of Connecticut. It was originally called "The Plantation of Tunxis," from the Tunxis Indians, of whom the land was purchased. The township was fifteen miles square. In 1645, the town was incorporated and called Farmington, or, "ffarmingtonne," and the Tunxis River in its boundaries changed to Farmington River. The town was divided among the eighty-four proprietors, according to their respective interests.

The Congregational Church, with Roger Newton as Pastor, was organized Oct. 13, 1652. In 1658, he was dismissed, to accept a call to the older and larger Church at Branford. In July, 1661, his successor, Rev. Samuel Hooker, was installed. He was the son of Rev. Thomas Hooker, of England, and Hartford. He continued Pastor of the Church until his death, in 1697.

Stephen Hart, the father of our maternal ancestor, was chosen Deacon of the Church at its organization. He is supposed to have come from Braintree, England, with the company that settled Braintree, Mass.; that later he removed to Cambridge, (then Newtown). In 1634, he was there admitted as a "freeman." He was one of the original members, and one of the Deacons of Rev. Thomas Hooker's Church, formed at Cambridge, Mass., preparatory to the emigration of a large body of settlers to Hartford. He died at Farmington, in 1683.

DESCENDANTS OF JOHN LEE,

OF

FARMINGTON, CONN.

I. JOHN LEE, the emigrant, was born in Essex County, England, about 1620; came to New England in 1634; removed to Hartford, Conn., in 1635. He was one of the second company from Hartford, that settled Farmington in 1641. He married, in 1658, Mary, daughter of Deacon Stephen Hart; born in 1635. He and his wife united with the Church at Farmington, July 15, 1660. He died Aug. 8, 1690. His estate inventoried £359.

Mary, his widow, married, Jan. 5, 1692, Jedediah Strong, son of Elder John Strong, of Northampton, Mass., to which place she removed, taking with her the two youngest children. She was the third wife of Jedediah Strong; he was born May 7, 1637. She died Oct. 10, 1710, from injuries received by the falling of the horse on which she and her husband were riding, on their way to visit their children at Coventry, Conn. Her husband went to reside with these children, and died at Coventry, May 22, 1733. The "Strong History" says: "he lived with his first wife 19 years, his second wife 7 years, and his third 9, and spent 33 years a widower, and 61 unmarried."

In the old cemetery at Farmington, a few years since, the tombstone of John Lee, was brought to light. It is a coarse, unhewn slab, some two feet in height and eighteen inches wide; the inscription must have been broken out of the stone by a dull tool, driven lengthwise, leaving the letters jagged. William H. Lee, of New York City, with a generosity worthy the name he bears, has had erected in its place a beautiful monument, "executed in Glasgow, Scotland; it is of dark gray Scotch granite, highly polished, standing seventeen feet high upon a base four feet square. The inscription on the old stone has been carefully reproduced on one side of the monument. The name, John Lee, in large block letters on the base is surmounted by the die, upon which are the inscriptions, and above which is the main shaft, of obelisk proportions."

At an adjourned Court held at Hartford, November 5th, 1690.

An Inventory of the estate of JOHN LEE was exhibited in Court, and oath made that there was a true presentment of the estate to the appraisers, so far as at present

known, and if more comes to knowledge it shall be added to the Inventory. The Court grants Administration on the estate, to the Widow, and Thomas Porter; we nominate and appoint, Esquire Tho. Hart and John Hart, to be overseers to the estate, widow and children; and divide the estate to the widow a third part of the real during her natural life, and a third part of the personal estate to be at her disposal forever. And to the eldest son a double portion, and to the rest of the children, single portions; and if any decease before they be of age, their portion to be divided between the survivors. Tho. Hart and Thomas Porter we allow to distribute the estate according to law.

John Lee died April 24, 1723. His will is dated 1722. He "commits his soul to God, his body to the dust; nothing doubting that he shall receive the same again, by the mighty power of God at the general resurrection. He gives to his wife Elizabeth, one-third of his property for use while she lives. To Jonathan his son 3 s. only, having given him his share of the property already. To his son Samuel he gives lands. To his daughters Mary Newell, Elizabeth Lankton and Ruth Lee, the sum of £40 in addition to former gifts; and to his daughter Elizabeth Lankton, his great brass kettle, toward her part. To his grandson Nathan Newell, one of his 'Carlashes.' Hezekiah, his youngest son then with him, he makes the executor of this, his last will and testament; and to him he bequeaths to his heirs and assigns forever, the remainder of his estate, real and personal, and at the decease of his wife, all her life interest in his estate." The will was proved in 1723.

FOURTH GENERATION.

In the Name of God, Amen.

The last Will and Testament of HEZEKIAH LEE, of Harwinton, Litchfield County, Colony of Connecticut, in New England.

I, Hezekiah Lee, being under indisposition of body, but in sound mind and memory, and sensible of my own mortality, do make this, my last Will and Testament, that is to say:

IMPRIMIS. I do give my soul to God, who gave it, and my body to the earth, to be decently buried by Christian friends, not doubting of the resurrection of it at the last day.

And as touching such worldly estate as God has blessed me with, I dispose of the same in manner following:

First. I do give to my well-beloved wife, Sarah Lee, one-third part of my moveable estate, to be hers and at her disposal forever. I give her, also, the benefit and improvement of one-third part of my land in Harwinton, with the use, also, of one-third part of the buildings thereon, during her natural life.

Secondly. I give to my son Hezekiah, all my lands lying in the township of New Hartford, to be his and his heirs forever. I give him, also, one-fourth part of my books, my great Bible excepted—my wife being to have one-fourth part in her thirds of the moveables.

Thirdly. Having given already to my daughter Sarah, who is now deceased, all that portion that I designed to give her, which I suppose to have amounted to four hundred pounds, old tenor, I therefore proceed and say: I give to my daughter Mary Williams, thirty pounds in bills of public credit in Connecticut, besides what I have already given her; also, one-fourth part of my books, my Bible excepted.

Fourthly. I give to my son Samuel, the remainder of my land in Harwinton, and the buildings, also; and the whole thereof after my wife's decease, to be his and his heirs forever. I give him, also, my great Bible, and all the remaining part of my moveables.

And now having lands in Goshen, with buildings thereon, not yet disposed of, my will is that the executors of this, my Will, do sell the same and therewith pay my lawful debts; and if there be money left of the sale after my debts are paid, my will is that it be laid out to purchase land in Harwinton, for my son Samuel, so as to make him have one hundred acres in Harwinton, if sufficient to purchase so much; and if there should afterwards be any money left, to be in the hands of the executors to dispose of as they shall think fit.

Having, also, lands in Farmington not disposed of in this my Will, I give it into the hands and power of the executors to dispose of as they shall think may be best.

Moreover, I do constitute and appoint my well-beloved wife Sarah, and my son Samuel, executors of this, my last Will and Testament, hereby revoking all and other Wills and Testaments, declaring of them

null and void, and pronounce this to be my last Will and Testament, made and dated in Harwinton, the fourth day of July, A. D. 1762.

CAPT. LATHROP was descended in a direct line from Rev. John Lathrop, Pastor of the first Independent Church in England, who came to New England in 1634; was the first minister of the Church at Scituate, Mass., and later at Barnstable. The grandmother of Capt. John was Mercy, daughter of Samuel Baker, of Barnstable, whose mother was Fear Robinson, of Leyden. The mother of Capt. Lathrop was Sybil Backus, daughter of Rev. Samuel Whiting, the first minister of the Congregational Church at Windham, a son of Rev. John Whiting, of Hartford. Mrs. Whiting was the daughter of Rev. Wm. Adams, of Dedham, Mass.; her mother was Alice, daughter of Deputy Governor William Bradford, son of Governor Bradford, of the May Flower; so it can be truly said of him and his descendants that they have a good share of the best Puritan blood in New England.

72. SAMUEL, eldest son of Dr. Samuel Lee 30, of Windham, was a physician and surgeon, practicing with, and succeeding his father. He was the patentee of the "Genuine Lee's Windham Bilious Pills, or Family Physic," an invention of his father's. He obtained a patent signed by Geo. Washington. This was the first medicine of the kind patented in this country, and to this day is extensively known and appreciated as one of the best compounds in use for bilious affections. Dr. Lee, like his father, was a generous, self-sacrificing man; honored in his profession; securing the lasting good will and friendship of all his acquaintance. He married, March

A sketch of the life and character of Deacon Lee, to whom we are so largely indebted for this Memorial of our family, will not be out of place.

His father died when he was fourteen years of age. After spending a year or two at the "Westfield Academy" in Mass., residing with his uncle, Dr. Joshua Sumner, he was placed in the store of Col. Tinker, at Vernon, Conn., a leading business man in the eastern part of the State. He remained there, gaining a thorough knowledge of mercantile life, until he went into business for himself as a merchant in his native town. In 1822 he commenced the manufacture of cotton yarn, in a mill built by himself on the Willimantic River, in what is now, 1878, the large and flourishing borough of Willimantic. He was the pioneer of manufacturing, and the founder of that pleasant village.

Rev. Dennis Platt, of South Norwalk, Conn., in his "Reminiscences of Deacon Lee," says: "when, in the summer of 1827, I went to Willimantic, with a commission from the 'Home Missionary Society of Connecticut,' to labor in that village, I found Deacon Lee earnestly engaged in his business of manufacturing, and leading all the public improvements then going on. How he managed to superintend his large business, and yet preserve that settled calmness, which was his prominent characteristic, was to me a matter of special wonder. When the labors of the day were ended, he threw off all care, and was as genial in his family, and as sociable with his neighbors, and as ready for the evening meeting—in which he always took part—as

if he had nothing to trouble him; indeed, so perfect was his self-command, that he could sleep at night, after a day's harassing business, as most men do who have nothing to think of but their daily tasks. He had a sound mind in a sound healthy body, and was admirably fitted for the position he occupied as leading manufacturer and prominent member of society. At this time he was an active member and also Deacon of the Congregational Church at Windham; his services there were much needed and highly appreciated; he had his horses and carriage and could take his family the three-and-a-half miles with little inconvenience; but he saw the wants of the people around him, and felt the necessity of religious ordinances at Willimantic, not only for his own people, but also for those belonging to the other manufactories that had sprung up around him. Without a moment's hesitation, he threw his whole energies into the work, and never faltered or grew discouraged until the thing was accomplished. There was at that time no 'meeting house' in the place; no organized Church of any denomination, not even a Sabbath School; but there were two school-houses open to religious services.

"Arrangements were made for using these on alternate Sabbaths; a congregation was soon gathered, and after a few months a Congregational Church organized, of which Deacon Lee was the first deacon.

"Then it was proposed to build a house of worship. Deacon Lee gave the land, adding a generous subscription, and by his persevering, earnest efforts, the work was accomplished. The result of these two years of labor, and of self-sacrifice, was a Church of fifty members, a flourishing Sabbath School, and a large congregation. Deacon Lee has gone to his rest. If he looks back from the 'blessed shore,' to review the history of his labors, he must see that his two years of labor in founding the Church at Willimantic were the most productive of his life."

The prostration in the manufacturing business, consequent upon the financial crisis of 1826, led him to abandon the business in which he was engaged at Willimantic, and remove to Norwich in the spring

of 1831. He was first, book-keeper for the firm of Gilman & Ripley, Druggists, and later, secretary of the "Chelsea Manufacturing Co.," whose paper works were at Greenville, continuing in that office until about three years before his death, when the corporation ceased to exist. In 1842 the firm of Lee & Osgood, Druggists, was formed, of which he was senior partner. "As a business man Deacon Lee was upright, straightforward, and honest; very methodical and precise, with a clear head and most excellent judgment. An infirmity in his hearing debarred him from taking part in public gatherings, but he was very warmly interested in all that pertained to the welfare of the nation or the general good of society; exercising, in his earnest, quiet way, an influence that was felt by all around him. As a friend and neighbor he was warm-hearted and sincere; his genial manners, and unobtrusive kindness of heart, made those his strongest friends who knew him best. As a Christian, he was revered and honored in all the Churches with which he was connected.

At an early age he was "hopefully converted to God," and united with the Church in Vernon, commencing at once to labor for his Master, and ceasing not from such labors until he "entered into rest;" his Christian character growing brighter and brighter as he neared the "other shore." His deafness prevented him from hearing the voices of his Pastor and brethren in the Church, but his seat was never vacant in the "house of God," or in the prayer meeting, except by reason of sickness or absence from home; he was in all respects a worthy descendant of good Deacon Hart, and John Lee. He died at his home in Norwich, Oct. 25, 1865, aged 75 years.

In June, 1810, his mother married Nathan Boardman, of Westfield, taking with her to her new home this son; there he lived until he entered Yale College, in 1823. He graduated in 1827, going directly from the academical to the theological department, in the same institution. From the Seminary he went to Sherburne, Mass., where he was ordained Pastor of the Evangelical Church, Nov. 4, 1830. He was called to the Church in New Ipswich, N. H., on the mere strength of his reputation, they having never seen him; he visited them, accepted the call, and was installed May 5, 1836. In 1861, worn out by excessive toils, and the pressure of crushing responsibilities, he resigned his pastorate. After some years of relaxation, and out door life, he so far regained his health that he gave employment to his pen. The results are given to the public.

Of Mr. Lee, in his professional capacity, two prominent characteristics may be named. The first, his power of easy and compact extemporaneous preaching. As a consequence he was employed very extensively by his brethren in protracted religious meetings. It is doubted if any other Pastor in New England performed an equal amount of such labor, and this with the care of his own large Church and parish on his hands. These labors were often attended with marked success. Under one sermon, preached at Rindge, N. H., forty persons were hopefully converted to God.

Second, his style, and his themes, as an author. In the earlier period of his ministry he wrote often for the periodical press. Among these productions of his pen were several articles in the religious quarterlies: "The Old and New Testaments Compared." "The Bible Doctrine of Divorce." "The Functions of Ministerial Associations." Several pamphlets on doctrinal and other subjects, as "The Sinner Directed Quite to Christ," a sermon preached before the "General Association of Massachusetts." A "Historical Discourse," preached at the Centennial of the Church in New Ipswich. At a later period he published two volumes, the results of a more careful study of the Bible, and synthesis of its truths. The first volume, "Eschatology,"

referred to the Resurrection and its cognate truths. The Resurrection is the life after death. The Judgment is the verdict which the gospel of Christ is passing upon us continually. *Matt.* 25: 31-46. Referring to Christ as administering his gracious government over the human race: the coming of the "Son of Man" is the appearing of the Messiah to establish that government, and to be distinguished from the "Appearing of the Lord," by which is denoted the manifestation of the glorified Saviour as effected by the constitutional change in the believer at death. "Eschatology" has been made a text book by Prof. (now President) Porter, of Yale College, in the Theological department. A few years later he published a volume named "The Bible Regained."

Early in life Mr. Lee consecrated himself to God, on the theory that religion was *service* rendered to Him who is saving the world. He united with the Congregational Church in Westfield, Nov. 21, 1817. His studies, from the first, had reference to the Christian ministry. In the discharge of the duties of the sacred office, he evinced his "ruling passion."

Rev. Mr. Lee married, Nov. 3, 1834, Emily, daughter of Deacon Samuel Fiske, of Natick, Mass., born Sept. 22, 1810, died March 5, 1843. He married, Jan. 14, 1846, Lydia Coggswell, daughter of Hon. In March following, "the Court" was applied to, "to lay out Stephen Lee's lot, as near as they can, according to grant." He built his house on East Street, next north of the one afterward built by his son, Deacon Josiah. This house was taken down in 1834. The house of his son, Josiah, is still standing, 1877. Kensington was made an independent Society about 1708. A Church was organized in 1710, and in 1712, Rev. Mr. Burnham settled over the Society. At the time of his settlement there were but fourteen families in the place; the Church consisted of ten members. At the head of the list stand Stephen Lee and wife; they having united with the Church in Farmington, Oct. 5, 1709. Stephen was a farmer, all the middle and last of life called Captain. He married, October 1, 1690, Elizabeth Royce, of Wallingford, Conn., daughter of "Isaac and Elizabeth Lathrop, his wife." He died June 7, 1753, aged 87. A red sand-stone, in the old cemetery at "Great Swamp," marks his last resting place. At the time of his death, his name stood at the

WILL OF CAPTAIN STEPHEN LEE.

He gives his wife, Elizabeth, "one-third of my moveable estate, and one-half of my house; one-third of my barn and cow-house; and the service of my negro, Richard, so long as she remains my widow and bears my name, during her life, after which, my youngest son, Josiah, shall have the liberty to purchase said negro, provided he shall pay to my executors so much as said boy shall be appraised by honest and judicious persons, mutually chosen by the parties.

"ITEM. I give to my eldest son the north-half of my lot on which my house stands.

"ITEM. I give my second son, Josiah, above named, the south-half of my house, and half of my home-lot, and half of all my lands.

"ITEM. I give my daughter, Hannah, so much in 'Bills of Credit' as to be equal to seventy-four ounces of silver.

"ITEM. I give to my grandson, Stephen Root, three pounds, old tenor. I give my four surviving daughters, viz: to Sarah, wife of John Lankton; to Martha, wife of Noah Hart; to Mary, wife of Benjamin Beckley; and to my youngest daughter, Hannah, the balance of my estate."

The Will was "exhibited by his executors, Elizabeth, his wife, and Isaac, his oldest son, in 1753, and proven."

Dr. Isaac Lee, of Middletown, on the first of February, 1755, deeded to Farmington, "for a highway, three pieces of land: one piece butting east with the highway that runs past the house where my son, Stephen, now dwells; south, on land conveyed to the Town by my brother, Josiah; north, on my own land, and from said highway one-half a mile and six rods long, and one rod wide." "This is half the lane past the burying ground." His brother, Josiah, deeded the other half for a double purpose: to lead to the meeting house, and to the "burying yard." The meeting house was not

built until 1756, though the land had been set apart for that purpose. "The oldest grave in the yard is 1756."

Dr. Isaac Lee and his wife, Susannah, after their return from Middletown, sold, for £61 10s. 10d., and, "for love, gave to their sons, Isaac and Stephen, the home they (Dr. Isaac and wife) now possess and live in, with the buildings; also, all our real estate in Farmington, to be so divided as to make them equal, reserving to myself, during life, the equal one-half of the house and barn and the land between the meeting house yard and the mowing pasture, with half of the orchard, and grass enough to keep a horse and cow."

About the commencement of the Revolutionary War, Deacon Lee moved to Lenox, Mass. In 1791, he and General Patterson, his son-in-law, moved to Binghamton, N. Y., where he died in 1797. Child:

THE OLD LEE HOUSE.

CARPENTERS FIND THAT MUCH OF THE TIMBER IS DECAYED.

The old Lee house at the head of Main street, directly across from St. Mary's church, has been undergoing repairs and the stories the carpenters tell are to the effect that much of the timber in the old house is in the last stages of decay. They found in one room that one floor had four thicknesses of boards, all were decayed and the sills and joists beneath were in just as bad condition.

The house is probably the oldest in town, it having been built along about 175 years ago, and for many years was the home of Colonel Isaac Lee, from whom it takes its name. The appearance of the house suggests its great age. Its style of architecture is quaint, fashionable enough, perhaps in its day, but decidedly unique among the new buildings of the present. People who pass by it every day must have noticed that the house is not parallel with the street, but rather runs from the northwest to the southeast. When the house was built there was no Main street in New Britain. That portion of the street which runs up by No. 3 engine house came down straight by the Lee house and ran over to East street and the house was erected to face on that street and not the Main street which it faces now.

The name of Colonel Lee, from early manhood, is prominently found on the records of the Town, Church and State. No one in the town exercised more influence in shaping its civil and religious affairs, and for years they were largely entrusted to his care. He was the principal magistrate for thirty years, and administered with wisdom and impartiality. Controversies among the people were submitted to his judgment, and so great was the confidence in his intelligence, unswerving integrity and uprightness, his decisions were universally acquiesced in; in fact, had almost the force of law.

Col. Lee's influence was not confined to his native town, but was largely felt in the councils of the Colony and the State. With the exception of four years, he was a member of the Colonial Assembly from 1761 to 1775; was a representative in the General Assembly of the State from its first session, in 1776, until 1791, with the exception of the years 1779, '82. He was a member of the Assembly which, headed by Gov. Jonathan Trumbull and other officers of the State, met in Hartford, October, 1776, and took the "Oath of Fidelity of Allegiance" to the new government of the United States; and, upon the adoption of the Constitution, he was a delegate from the town of Berlin to the convention that met at Hartford, January, 1788, for its ratification. During all this important epoch in our

Colonial and State history Col. Lee held relations of friendship and intimacy with the leading patriots of the day, and shared with them the labor and responsibility of moulding our civil institutions. Col. Lee was also identified with the military organization of the Colony, receiving his commission as Captain in May, 1767; the record being: "This Assembly do establish Mr. Isaac Lee, Jr., to be Captain of the Thirteenth Company of the Train Band, in the Sixth Regiment, in this Colony." In October, 1767, he was appointed Lieutenant Colonel; and in March, 1775, Colonel of the Fifteenth Regiment. In 1776, at the age of 60, he resigned his commission, asking the Assembly not to reappoint him.

Col. Lee was for many years a Deacon in the Congregational Church and contributed largely to its prosperity. In 1754, a portion of the town of Berlin became a separate society, and Col. Lee gave to it the name of New Britain, in honor of Great Britain, the home of his ancestors.

The manners of Colonel Lee were courtly and dignified; his presence, tall and commanding; and his dress that of the dignitaries of Colonial times, viz: a cocked hat, white wig, blue coat with metal buttons, white cravat, black velvet breeches with silver knee-buckles, white silk stockings and shoes with large silver buckles. "He was one of the two men in New Britain—Rev. Dr. Smalley being the other—who were treated with the utmost reverence. When he was approaching or passing, all hats were doffed, even by men laboring in the fields some distance from the road."

In the early part of his life feats of strength, and performances showing great agility and powers of endurance were the pastimes and customs of the times. Young Lee was of herculean strength, and gained a wide reputation for his successes with the champions of the day.

"He died in 1802, leaving a name of which his descendants may justly be proud, and a patrimony unusually large for that time."

OBITUARY.

"Died at Worcester, on the 29th ult., at the residence of Dr. Woodward, Dr. THOMAS G. LEE, Physician and Superintendent of the 'McLean Asylum for the Insane,' at Charlestown, in the 28th year of his age. In consequence of this painful event, a special meeting of the Trustees of that institution was called on Sunday last, when the following votes, expressive of their feelings, were unanimously adopted :

"*Voted*, That the Board, while submitting in sorrow to the dispensations of Providence, cannot but feel deeply the loss which the institution under their care, and the public, have suffered in the lamented death of Dr. LEE. They had known him long enough to appreciate his talents, his attainments in his profession, his remarkable and entire devotion to the pursuit in which he had engaged, the beautiful purity of his character, the elevation of his views, and the propriety of the means by which he sought to attain the most worthy objects. They have often been struck with the soundness of his judgment, and the kindness of his manners; and have perceived in the institution, of which he was the Superintendent, the happy influence of his professional skill, combined with the cheerfulness of his deportment, and the piety which was the habitual guide of his life. After an association of nearly two years of an intimate character, they can say with truth, that they have nothing to regret, in their intercourse with him, but its premature close. They had hoped to see the McLean Asylum long increasing in usefulness under his care, and to witness the extension of his well-earned reputation for many years; and they can not suffer him to pass to the grave without paying a just tribute to his many admirable qualities, and his peculiar fitness for the station in which he was placed.

"*Voted*, That the thanks of the Board be presented to Dr. Woodward and family for their kindness and assiduous attention to Dr. LEE, during the illness which terminated in his death.

"But a few weeks since Dr. LEE seemed the child of a happy and prosperous fortune. We know no one upon whom the present was bestowing more of enjoyment, or the future was opening with brighter and surer hopes of honorable fame and usefulness. Elevated at the early age of twenty-six to the responsible station of Superintendent and Physician of the McLean Asylum for the Insane, near Boston, enjoying the fullest confidence of the friends and Trustees of that institution; by the extended usefulness which his more successful treatment of mental disease gave to its operations, gathering, already, a rich harvest of professional reputation; by his success in one its most difficult departments of practice; happy in the love and esteem of a large and enlarging circle of friends, and thrice happy in his domestic relations, he seemed altogether fortunate in the enjoyment of worthy objects upon which to exhaust the fulness of his enthusiastic mind and soul. But death has surprised him in the midst of his usefulness and happiness, and laid low the object of our pride, our hopes, and our love.

"Feeling somewhat indisposed, and hoping to shake off any disease by a temporary suspension of his labors, he left Charlestown to visit his father, Judge Lee, in Berlin, and his friends in this city. He spent the Sabbath of the 16th of October with his friend, Dr. Woodward, at Worcester, and was well enough in the morning to accompany him in his daily visit through the hospital. In the evening he retired to bed with decided symptoms of typhus fever, which in thirteen days terminated in his death.

"From the first, Dr. Woodward apprehended the fatal result, and summoned to his bedside his wife, from Charlestown, and his brother, Dr. Lee, from New Britain. If medical skill, and the gentle ministering of unsleeping and unwearyed love could have availed anything to arrest the progress of disease, Dr. LEE would have been restored to the theatre of his usefulness, and the arms of his kindred and friends. But it was otherwise ordered

by an over-ruling Providence; and with the most serene and composed frame of mind, and in unshaken faith in a bright and blissful immortality beyond the grave, and of an inseparable reunion with those whom he loved best, he descended into the dark shadows of the Valley of Death.

"In deploring this severe dispensation of Providence, we do not use the language of individual, exclusive sorrow. The public have lost a gifted, enthusiastic and successful laborer in a large field of benevolent duty. The institution whose usefulness he has extended by the introduction of a more salutary mode of treating insanity will not as easily find one who can bring as varied resources and accomplishments to the station which his death has left vacant.

"The profession in which he had already given pledges of rare eminence, the faith which he illustrated by the purity of his life, and the serenity of his death, have lost an ornament and a champion.

"But how shall we speak of the affliction which this stroke has carried into his own, and his parental home? We dare not intrude upon the sacredness of their sorrow who mourn the death of such a husband, and son, and brother. Those only who knew the refinement, and delicacy, and enthusiasm of his attachments; how zealously he strove to discharge the duties of kindred and friendship, and how tenderly he was beloved in return, can appreciate how coldly the shadows of the tomb must rest upon their hearts. And she, who shared his lofty enthusiasm of duty; who sympathized in his highest aspirations after an honorable fame; and watched with unsleeping devotion round his sick bed, where can she find consolation for her bruised spirit and shattered hopes, but in the purity of his life, the sweetness of his memory, and his faith in an immortality beyond the grave?

"We shall not attempt here an analysis of Dr. LEE'S character. Its many beautiful traits are indelibly impressed upon the hearts of those who knew him.

"His treatment of insanity was substantially the same as that introduced and practiced so successfully by Dr. Todd, at our Retreat for the Insane; with whom, in that institution, as assistant physician, he was many years associated. Dr. LEE was the first to introduce religious exercises among the insane, and the experiment has been attended with the happiest results. He was

cut off in the midst of a bright career of usefulness; but not until he had matured the plan which has done so much for the sons and daughters of affliction.

" 'Blessed are the dead who die in the Lord;' and many a blessing has doubtless followed this benevolent man—this 'beloved physician'—from those who experienced the kindness of his heart, and received the benefits of his skill."

APPENDIX.

TO THE DESCENDANTS OF JOHN LEE.

THE common belief that JOHN LEE, the ancestor of us all, was a native of Colchester, England, has heretofore been founded much upon tradition; and there being no difference of opinion as to his being a native of Essex—the county in which Colchester is situated—we have, in the body of this book, given his nativity as of Essex, hoping that in the awakened interest in getting together all that our fathers had left to be transmitted to their descendants, we should have all doubts removed as to his native town.

Mrs. Willard in her poem, (in 1840), read on the occasion of the two hundredth anniversary of the settlement of Farmington, and who had availed herself of the means then at her command of consulting with those whose authority could not be questioned, felt authorized to write, referring to Colonel Isaac Lee :

“ His ancestors, true men of fame,
From Colchester, in England, came ;
And his descendants claim the honor
To trace their line to Bishop Bonner.”

Our hopes have not been in vain, and we are now able, after the work has been put in the hands of the printer, to furnish authentic and conclusive evidence that JOHN LEE was from Colchester.

Through the agency of Mr. William Wallace Lee we have a family record and genealogy, prepared by his ancestor, Seth Lee (15), a great-grandson of the settler, who was twenty-three years of age when David (6), the youngest son of John (1), died. The paper, in its original manuscript, is mostly genealogical items of that branch of the family, and from the quotations given below, it becomes apparent was written for posterity.

"KEEP SACRED THE MEMORY OF YOUR ANCESTORS."

SOME ACCOUNT OF THE LEES OF FARMINGTON, TAKEN DOWN ABOUT 1777,
BY SETH LEE, A. M., AND RE-COPIED BY MILES LEE.*

"JOHN LEE (1) was sent by his father from Colchester, England, to America with the early emigrants to this country. His father designed following with the rest of his family, but, for some reason, never came, and it is said John never heard much of them.

"Perhaps he may have come to America as early as 1630, or before, and to this town, (Farmington) in 1634 or '32.†

"His homestead,‡ after his death, was inherited by his son John (2), who lived there during his life, when it descended to Hezekiah (13), youngest son of John (2). Hezekiah then sold the 'Lee House,' about 1750 or '60, to Elijah Cowles, who now occupies it; removing with his family to Goshen, Litchfield County, where he died in 1762."

Then follows a record of his marriage, and the succession, in a disconnected form, all of which is in its proper order in this book.

The question of his nativity being settled, there remain the two following queries, of great interest to us all, and which, if solved, will give new matter to whoever may undertake to complete this imperfect genealogy:

*Who was born 1700.

†He left England in 1633 or '34, and settled in Farmington in 1641.

‡The house stood where is now, 1878, "Miss Porter's School for Young Ladies."

First, John (1) was a ward of the Westwoodes, and lived with them until he removed to Farmington. The circumstances all go to show his relations were those of consanguinity; but this can only be called inferential, and not now susceptible of proof.

Second, Who were his parents and family, and what relation does he bear to those of his name who emigrated from Essex about the same period of time, and of whom brief mention is made in this work?
