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

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PREFACE. 1200318

The outline of this history was prepared in 1892 and was prompted by a remark, "Where are my greatgrand parents buried?" No definite answer was given. I at once sought and found the graves of my ancestors, the lives of whom form the foundation of this work, bearing in mind this truthful saying:

"Are we so soon forgotten?"

I made a pencil tracing of the crumbled headstone which presents the crude lettering of early days. It is of flagstone and of short duration. By constantly writing the kindred I have succeeded in giving a complete history, save the family of Elizabeth. In latter years there has been no inclination to keep perfect family records. The grand-children know nothing of their predecessors and no sweeter remembrance exists in the mind of a child than that of being with grand-parents—even words spoken or slight incidents during the lives of the aged people.

Personalities are eliminated which to children might be pleasing but their omission is deemed best, for this volume is but a private work.

Personal descriptions in most instances are from my own recollection, and to be without any would serve to make it less interesting.

I hope that a perpetual record will be kept now that the lineage is prepared for that purpose.



JOHN McCOMBS.

The most definite history we have been able to learn of the subject of this work is from the autobiography of his son John, which is given in full. It appears that all of the children were born at or near Pequa, Lancaster County, Pennsylvania; that John and Elizabeth Marshall, who became his wife, came to this country about the year 1770 from Ireland, but both were born in Scotland, as is evidenced by the customs, songs that were sung by their grandchildren, the traits of character, strict habits—all prove the true type of the Scotsman. The families intimate with the McCombs in Ohio were the Stewarts, Marshalls, McClellands, McFarlands and McKinley, (parents of the President of the United States at this writing.) most of whom came from Washington County, Pennsylvania, with John and his family.

While they lived in Pennsylvania we find that John was an agriculturalist and dairyman of the highest order, possessing the finest blooded stock. The same degree of pride was manifested in Ohio by his sons and grandsons from the year 1800 to 1860, at which time the settlement of the western territories and the civil war from 1861 to 1865 diverted their attention to commercial and professional pursuits and today but very few of the descendants are agriculturalists.

We also find that John has been a soldier in the Revolutionary War of 1776 and received depreciation pay up to the first day of January, 1781, as shown by the records of the State Librarian at Harrisburgh, Pa. This fact entitles the descendants to membership in the societies of Sons and Daughters of the Revolution.

John and his entire family moved from Washington County, Pa., in 1800, to Poland township, Trumbull (now Mahoning) County, Ohio. He and his son William purchased a tract of land, the first taxes in 1803 being 40 cents. John, Jr., purchased another tract at the same time paying the first taxes in the sum of 20 cents. Youngstown, founded by John Young, was the headquarters for making titles to the land then owned by the Connecticut Company, known as the Western Reserve, extending from a line east of the Cuyahoga River thence 68 miles to the Pennsylvania line in the vicinity of Sharon, with a width from north to south of 60 miles.

The best evidence we have that the pioneers of Poland township were zealous friends of education is the knowledge that a school was established at once, and in 1803 a debating society met evenings at the several log cabins in this wilderness, among the participants are the names of William and Robert McCombs, and James Adair, who married Elizabeth McCombs. These meetings justly fitted the young men for public service which was afterwards attested.

John and Joseph were more inclined to commercial affairs, and sought the more thrifty towns. Joseph was in business in Poland in 1812. These two brothers finally located in Pittsburgh, while the rest of the family remained in Ohio as farmers, raising stock, clearing timber, setting out fruit trees brought from Washington County. The soil was the finest in the State. In a few years large barns were erected and the frame work, made of foot-square hewed oak timber, was strong enough to bear the burden of hundreds of bushels of choice winter wheat, barley and oats on one side of the barn, while the other side had a hay mow filled to the clapboards shingles on the roof with timo-

thy hay. Nothing but choice seeds were brought from Pennsylvania. The Rambeau water-core apple was the first introduced, which is a hardy fruit, and there stands today on the high bank of the Meander Creek on the John Battles farm a tree of 2½ feet diameter. The sapling was carried on horseback from Washington County by Mrs. Wm. Dunlap in 1800, and looks as healthy as the sturdy oak. The cellars were well filled with apples, cider and vegetables, the lofts with hickorynuts, walnuts, chestnuts, hazelnuts and butternuts. The loon, spinning-wheel and the accountements at the old homestead of William are evidence of primitive days. The light blue paper in one of the rooms of William's house, where his mother spent her last days, is of an irregular pattern, in short is a brush-made, water-color wall paper.

In stature John McCombs was about 5 feet 6 inches, broad shoulders, medium complexion, brown eyes, strong, well built frame, energetic, positive, systematic and orderly in all of his transactions, and a Presbyterian in his religious belief. Forty-three years ago, at the age of nine, I was in the immediate section originally settled by this family, having a retentive memory, observing, I had opportunity to witness the progressive qualities, and with pride must state that for force of character, honesty and sobriety The NAME McCombs is commendable.

Portraits of John and Elizabeth were never taken, the daguerreotype (M. Daguerre.) was not introduced there until 1840, and then but little used. From information derived from relatives, the picture of William shows a type of the paternal; baldness of hair I never saw in any succeeding families. The forehead, cycbrows, temples and eyes I have found to be prevalent. The picture of Joseph is perfect, but is taken at a more advanced age than that of William. The picture of John is copied from a small photograph which was made at a time when the chemical preparation of paper was defective, not lasting, and the toning improperly set. The perspective does an injustice. I have endeavored, by an enlarged solar type and India ink drawing, to reproduce a more vivid picture, and it should be borne in mind that comparison cannot be made with the others owing to the reasons stated.

As to the spelling of the name there is a diversity of opinion. The word Mac is abbreviated to Mc, and I have seen it written M' but am convinced that it was originally MacComes. People in speaking of a family would say the MacComeses, making a possessive to imply that it was the MacComes' family spoken of. Joseph regarded the final s a mere stroke of the pen and his family abandoned it. Therefore the title to the work is given as a majority write it.

The present garden spot on the original homestead shows the site of the log house and fragments of the tall stone chimney used in the colonial days, and across the road stands the large frame barn.

ELIZABETH (MARSHALL) McCOMBS.

ELIZABETH (MARSHALL) McComes was a tall, large-framed woman, weighing about 200 pounds. She had a cheerful disposition, and during her latter years took great pride in teaching her grandchildren in the art of needle work and knitting and amused them with stories and incidents of her lifetime. To this day these traditional remembrances are vivid to those reared in the midst of her home. The bible was her constant companion, in it her name is written, a volume printed in 1793, about 4 by 6½ inches, the leaves browned with time and the edges worn with constant service. She died at the home of William and had survived her husband 17 years. Both are buried in Poland Presbyterian Church yard directly opposite the entrance. The family lot lies at the foot of the sloping plat near the fence.

WILLIAM McCOMBS FAMILY.

b 1. WILLIAM McCOMBS.

Born December 24, 1772, died in Struthers, Ohio, October 1, 1854.

Was an agriculturalist of great note, occupied several important positions and was an earnest promoter of public and social improvements, being well qualified for doing great good during the early period of the settlement of county and township affairs when there were no civil laws established in that territory. Being the oldest of the children he was naturally instrumental in looking after the affairs of the estate and lived to an age to witness the advancement and prosperous condition of his own family and to care for his aged parents during their last days on earth. William resided on a farm adjoining that of his parents, which will long be remembered as a landmark of the McCombs family who were the first settlers in that wild forest. William and his family were charter members of the Poland Presbyterian Church, the yard of which contain the remains of his parents and immediate family.

Married to SALLIE NELSON, December 9, 1804.

Died June 27, 1863, aged 79 years. This was the first marriage on the Western Reserve. A sister of John and Abram Nelson, of Liberty, Ohio, who came from Virginia about 1803. The descendants of William and Sallie Nelson McCombs hold reunions annually, the one at this writing was held at Girard, Ohio, August 26, 1897. Robert McCombs and John Nelson married sisters, Elly and Margaret (Peggy) Stewart.

In 1880 John N. erected a saw mill and did a large business.

He has pursued a general line of practice and has made a special study of commercial and corporation law in which departments he has no superior and has made for himself a good record, both at nisi prius and chambers. His printed speeches are excellent and his letters descriptive of his travels in Europe prove him to be a literary man of ability. In stature he is 5 feet 11 inches, broad shoulders and dark complexion.

My Dear Sir: In reply to your inquiry of the 28th ult. I find that JOHN McCOMB was commissioned May 10, 1780, Lieutenant of the 5th Company of the 6th Battalion of Cumberland County Militia, commanded by Lieut.-Col. James Dunlop. It seems also a fact that that he must have been in the Pennsylvania Line of the Revolution. January 1st, 1781, as JOHN McCOMB received Depreciation Pay, but neither rank or regiment is given. Yet it is possible that this JOHN McCOMB may be a different man from the first named. I regret that I cannot furnish you more definite information.

In a previous letter it was written McCombs. Dunlop is no doubt a relative of WILLIAM DUNLAP who came from Washington County, Pa., at the same time John McCombs did, for he was also a charter member of the Poland Presbyterian Church. Clerical errors in the enrollment of troops were fully exemplified in the recent civil war from 1861-5. The evidence I have long been seeking is given in the above letter. Sudden calls for troops placed at once in active service did not give time for making descriptive rolls. Pequea, Lancaster County, is on the east side, and Cumberland County is on the west side of the Susquehanna river in the State of Pennsylvania. It might be inferred from this letter that the State of Maryland was in question where the "Pennsylvania Line" is mentioned. When JOSEPH McCOMB, in 1871, told me that his father was an officer in the Revolutionary War, that would be called tradition. I am now satisfied that this is the identical John McComes who is the subject of this volume; and that his male descendants are eligible for membership in the Society of the Cincinnati, organized May, 1783, composed of commissioned officers in the Revolutionary War; for membership in the Society of the Sons of the Revolution, and the female descendants for membership in the Society of the Daughters of the Revolution. These societies form the true spirit of American patriotism, and this little book has been the means of enlisting members into these institutions.

The boat raised and lowered in the locks, the beautiful scenery along the towpath, the primitive method of transportation—all these are vivid pictures never forgotten. Mother was surrounded by the kindred before returning home. A grand quilting party, a dozen or more buggies at the barn; a houseful of chattering, langhing people; a long table filled with the best that the farm could produce—this is the recollection of going to see grandmother.





JOHN McCOMBS FAMILY.

b 3. JOHN McCOMBS.

Born June 13, 1777, died in Pittsburgh, Pa., April 18, 1862.

Was a man of prepossessing appearance, in stature about 5 feet 9 inches, medium weight and quite muscular. He was active and energetic in all his movements, ambitious by nature, inclined toward the progressive side of life. Was strictly temperate in all things, and as a rule enjoyed perfect health throughout his long life. He was not only scrupulously honest in all his dealings with his fellowmen, but was in the truest sense a consistent christian gentleman and commanded the respect of all who knew him. The following is his autobiography:

My father and mother emigrated to this country from Ireland, if I do not mistake, in the year 1770, but were not married until after arrival in this country. They united with the Presbyterian Church of Pequea, Laucaster County, Pa., then under the ministry of Robert Blair, D. D., who, I believe, was the founder of the church in its present location. Dr. Blair also established and conducted a grammar school, designed chiefly to prepare young men for the ministry.

I was born in the month of June [13th], 1777, in Lancaster County, Pa., and grew up to manhood in the same county. In the year 1797 my father removed his family to the west and settled in Morganza, in the neighborhood of Cannonsburgh, and remained there six years [1803]. In the year 1800 there was a remarkable revival of religion in Dr. McMillau's church and throughout that section of country. In the course of that year it pleased God in great mercy, as I trust, to produce some saving religious impressions upon my mind which I have never forgotten, and I hope will be abiding to the end.

In the fall of 1802 I was married to Miss Hannah Morrison of Pittsburgh, and in the following spring removed my family to the town of Pittsburgh, where I resided for many years. About this time I set up the family altar as the worship of God in my house, the number of my family being three, myself and wife and an indentured boy. This service I have been able, in my feeble way, to maintain in my family up to this present time, 1859, and hope to continue it to the end of my pilgrimage; and may God grant to all my children, who become heads of families, grace thus to honor God and bless their households. In the same year, 1803, my family united with a small society associated for public worship and mutual edification, which met in private houses, as they had no house of worship.

The following were among the heads of families composing the society: Mr. James Morrison, Mr. William Semple, Mr. William Barrett, Mr. William Gazzain and Mr. Joseph McCullough, with their families and others. These met regularly on the Sabbath for religious services. This small society, feeling desirous of having the gospel preached to them and to have the way prepared for their being, organized into a church, united in an application to the Presbytery for some supplies. Their ap-

plication was finally granted and they were organized under the name of the Second Presbyterian Church of Pittsburgh. The first sermon preached to this small congregation was by the Rev. Wm. Wiley. The discourse was very solemn and appropriate to the occasion. During the time of the first stated minister the Rev. Mr. Snowden, my wife and I united with the church by a public and open profession of faith in the adorable Redeemer and have continued in connection with the Presbyterian church. In Mr. Snowden's time I was solicited to officiate as clerk, that is, to lead the singing, or, as it is sometimes called, precentor, and I continued to serve the congregation in this capacity for several years after Mr. Hunt succeeded Mr. Snowden. In Mr Hunt's time I was elected to the office of ruling elder in the congregation, but owing to timidity and a conviction of my inability to perform aright the duties of that sacred office, I declined being ordained.

Towards the latter part of Rev. Mr. Swift's pastorate in the Second Church of Pittsburgh, having, in 1834, removed our family to a residence purchased within the bounds of Bethany congregation, we became united with that church under the pastoral care of the Rev. Wm. Jeffery. Here we remained for four years. Towards the end of this time, finding it more to our worldly advantage, as we supposed, we purchased property in the village of New Brighton, Pa., and removed to that place in 1838, where we united with the Presbyterian Church there under the pastoral care of Rev. A. Williams. In 1840 we removed from this place to the village of Canfield, Ohio, transferring our relation from the church of New Brighton to the Church of Canfield, at that time under the pastoral care of my son William. Here we remained during the space of five years. Having made a purchase of property in the vicinity of Pittsburgh, contiguous to where my son Norris now resides [Squirrel Hill], we took up our abode there in 1845. Here the pleasant memories of the past with the Second Church in Pittsburgh, which was at that time under the pastoral care of the Rev. Robert Dunlap, who was shortly afterwards called to his reward, leaving the church for a time without an under-shepherd, W. D. Howard, D.D., having succeeded to the pastoral care of the church. continued to worship for several years with this congregation, in all, if my memory is correct, about nine years. Finding it exceedingly unpleasant to travel four miles to church in all kinds of weather, together with the infirmities of accumulating years, we took our dismissal from the Second Church, with all its hallowed scenes and delightful associations, and united with the church of East Liberty, under the care of Rev. Wm. B. McIlvaine, where we remained until the year 1859, at which time we removed back to New Brighton and again found ourselves in connection with the church of Beaver Falls.

It was a great pleasure for her to read alond of which she never seemed to tire. Her voice was clear, pronounciation distinct, and but few could equal her in this accomplishment. Socially she had many warm and true



About 5 feet 11 inches, 180 pounds, dark complexion. Owned a farm three-fourths of a mile south of his brother Robert, adjoining the farm of William C. McConnell, in Weathersfield township. A small stream called a "run," fed from springs, passed through the farm and flowed to the Mahoning river, whereby James was supplying his brother Robert with a pure stream of ever-flowing water. James built a small still which was for making liquor for medicinal purposes, such as cherry-bounce, boneset and the many remedies used in early times. After his death his son Milo lived on the farm until 1855, when he sold it to a Cleveland firm who built a railroad through it, and mined bituminous coal on this estate. James was exceedingly precise in the matter of family records, and it was from his family bible that I obtained the list of his brothers and sister in 1892. It is in the possession of John N., son of Milo, in Howland, O.

James gives his early history in the following sketch: I came to Columbus, Ohio, to attend the Ohio State School for the Blind in September, 1862, and spent the greater part of the time between that date and 1870 at this school. I studied the common branches and some of the higher ones, also music, in which I took great delight. I regard myself as being strongest as an organist and vocalist, although I do not claim artistic skill in these branches. From 1870 to 1876 I taught music in Trumbull County, Ohio, when, in September of the latter year, I was offered a position as teacher of music in the State School for the Blind which I accepted. I held this place until 1886, when I assumed the directorship of the musical department of the school, which position I now hold.

JOSEPH McCOMB(S) FAMILY.

b 7. JOSEPH McCOMB(S).

Born December 6, 1780, died in Pittsburgh, Pa., February 2, 1885.

Was about 5 feet 10 inches in height, 190 pounds, broad shoulders, medium complexion. I visited him at his home on Squirrel Hill in September 1871, just two weeks before the great Chicago fire, and was accompanied by James, son of Milo McCombs. Joseph is the only one of the second generation I ever met and it was the opportunity of my life, for I had longed to be with a brother of my grandfather, and elicited much information concerning his relatives. The following was partially written by the late Rev. R. C. Colmery, a son-in-law of Joseph:

When Joseph was six or eight years of age his father and family removed to Washington County, Pa., [1789] where he settled on a farm about two miles from Canonsburg on Chartiers creek, near Coe's mill and near what is known as the Morganza farm. While living there the family attended the church of Dr. McMillan, one mile south of Canonsburg. After a residence of six years in this place the family removed to Poland, Ohio, where they again settled on a farm.

During this period Joseph belonged to a military company, and during the war of 1812 the whole company went into the service of their country. When this company had been organized with seven other companies into a regiment Joseph was appointed adjutant by the colonel. The regiment first reported at Cleveland, Ohio, and from there sent to Lower Sandusky (now Fremont). While stationed at this point Joseph was appointed assistant paymaster. From this place they marched during the night on the ice, a distance of some twenty miles, to where Toledo now stands, and the next day started for Fort Meigs where they remained until their six months term of service had expired. While at Lower Sandusky Joseph volunteered to carry a message through from the commandant of that place to General Harrison who was then at Fort Meigs. His journey was during the night though he was exposed to great danger. He remained at Lower Sandusky for three months longer acting as receiving and issuing commissary for the army at that place. Some time during this three months, in the discharge of his official duties, he went on horseback up the Sandusky river to Upper Sandusky and again returned to his post.

After he was honorably discharged from the service he returned to Poland and was employed as a clerk in the store of Judge Kirtland, and remained 18 months, and afterwards was employed by a firm in Pittsburgh for three years to sell goods on equal profits, and finally established a business for himself in Poland, on Yellow Creek, and continued the same until 1822, when he removed to Jeromeville, Wayne County, O., and founded a mercantile business in that village. His marriage to Miss Mary Jane Stone at Beaverpoint, Pa., occurred July 8, 1823, after which they rode on horseback to Jeromeville. Joseph continued in business at that place until 1840 and lived on his farm near this village up to 1859. He then sold his farm and removed to Squirrel Hill, Pittsburgh. His wife died May 28, 1864, after which he lived with his youngest daughters at the same place.

Joseph and family were connected with the Presbyterian churches at Jeromeville and East Liberty. He was a member of the famous General Assemblies of 1837-8, a member of the same body which met at Nashville, Tenn., in 1855. While at Jeromeville it was his custom to ride to Philadelphia on horseback, make his purchases and return in the same manner, which took from five to six weeks to accomplish.

Born in the same year that the Constitution of the United States was adopted, he lived under the administration of every President from Washington to Arthur. When but a small boy attending school at Pequea he witnessed a company of soldiers marching by the school house on their way to Western Pennsylvania to suppress the "whiskey rebellion." His oldest brother was captain of the company. The latter years of his life were uneventful, for he never lost his interest in his fondness for young and sprightly society, nor his scrupulous exactness in money matters. He obtained a pension for his military services and almost to the last presented himself at the pension office on the day payment was due. He carried in his pocketbook a slip of paper which enumerated no less than thirteen narrow escapes from death. The summons came to him at last while seated in his chair, with bowed head upon his breast he slept the last sleep, and it was the final passing away of the children of John and Elizabeth McCombs.

After his marriage he became pastor of the Presbyterian Church at Mt. Vernon, O. He moved to Upper Sandusky, O., in 1875. Was pastor of the Presbyterian Church at that place for several years. A man of high christian character, fine education and literary talent.

Was born in Jeromeville, Wayne County, Ohio. At the age of 13 attended the Ashland (O.) Academy for several years. In 1848 entered the store of R. & I. Askin, at Ashland, as clerk. April 1, 1849, became one of the firm of Askin & McComb and made the first trip to New York to purchase goods. In 1850 this firm went out of business and in 1851 Judson McComb & Co. opened a new store in Ashland which was not a success and was closed out in 1853. In October, 1855, Judson entered as a partner in the firm of I. W. Robb & Co., grocers, at Wooster, O. In 1856 this firm removed to Fort Wayne, Indiana, and opened the first exclusive wholesale grocery house in that city and was very successful under the firms of Judson McComb, McComb & Shoaff and McComb & Co. In 1865 Judson sold his interest to Bulger & Co. and removed to Pittsburgh. He was out of business until July, 1867, when he became Manager of the Pennsylvania Salt Manufacturing Company's store at Natrona, Pa., and is now in the same business at this writing, a period of 30 years continuously.

GENERAL REMARKS.

This book is not the volume I had expected to present as a matter of history. The principal reason assigned for its brevity is, that at the time of its inception but few of the kindred seemed to realize the great and laborious task in such a work, some were not concerned, others gave a few items, but a majority of them have done nobly and entered into the cause with a spirit worthy of commendation. In the matter of recording families in bibles as an official record, which has been held sacred for ages. I have found in researches many discrepancies caused by re-copying from the original to a second bible, which was not verified by two persons to check errors. The ink put on with a quill pen, faded, finger-marked, figures retouched, as 1, with two parallel strokes shows this 0, which was intended for the year 1831. A book containing linen or bond paper is the best for permanent records, using strong, black ink, and should be kept posted when events occur, not later on, for people will forget—writing is a better record than memory.

It has been my endeavor throughout this volume to be impartial in all matters, more particularly should it be so when the writer is in the line as a descendant. Having the facilities in my printing office for conducting this work, I have set every line of type, made up the same into pages for the printing press, for it required my personal attention throughout. Each individual is so fixed in my mind since the group was formed that I feel acquainted with all, and hope to continue this record perpetually by making a substantial book to be kept by historians to whom the kindred may report current events. Any errors found in this work will be noted if reported to me.
