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


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NOTICE.





RULES OF ORDER.

- 1. The daily sessions of the Convention shall be opened with Divine Service, beginning at 10 o'clock A. M.
- 2. The Convention, upon its first assembling, shall be called to order by the Bishop, or if there be no Bishop, or if he be absent, by the President of the Standing Committee or by some member of that body appointed by those of its members who may be present.
- 3. When the President takes the chair every member shall take his seat, and remain uncovered until he shall have left the Convention.
- 4. The names of the Clergymen entitled to seats shall be called over by the Secretary of the last Convention, or in his absence by someone appointed by the Bishop, or other person who called the Convention to order. The said call shall be made from a roll furnished by the Bishop or other ecclesiastical authority of the Diocese, which roll shall be evidence of the right of such Clergymen to seats until the Convention shall have formally acted upon that question. The Secretary shall then call a provisional roll of Lay delegates, prepared from the certificates which have been received from the vestries. The Lay delegates whose certificates have not already been forwarded to the Secretary shall then lay their certificates upon the table, with the declaration subscribed as required by the Constitution. The Secretary shall then call these additional names, if required by the Chair, or by any member. In calling the roll of the Clergy and Lav delegates the surname only—with the prefix of "Mr."—shall be called, except when there may be two, or more, of the same name, in which case they shall be designated by the addition of their Christian names. If a quorum of both orders appear, the presiding officer shall announce the fact, and declare that the Convention is organized and ready for business.

(xxxiii)

- 5. In case of the absence of the Bishop, or of a vacancy in the Episcopate, the person who called the Convention to order shall announce that there is a quorum present. The Convention shall then proceed to elect a President, according to the seventh article of the Constitution; who shall, so soon as his election is completed, take the chair and declare that the Convention is organized and ready for business.
- 6. The first business after the declaration is made, either by the Bishop or the President, shall be the election of a Secretary. The Chair shall then appoint an Assistant Secretary and the Committees mentioned in the Order of Business (No. III). The Chair shall also appoint all other Committees for the appointment of which no other provision is made; unless otherwise ordered by the Convention.
- 7. When any member is about to speak or deliver any matter to the Convention, he shall arise, and, with due respect, address himself to the President.
- 8. If two or more members shall arise at the same time to speak, the President shall decide who shall speak.
- 9. No member shall speak more than twice in the same debate, nor longer than fifteen minutes at one time, without leave of the Convention.
- 10. No motion shall be debated until the same be seconded, and, if desired by any member, reduced to writing and read by the Secretary.
- 11. When a motion is made and seconded, no other motion shall be received, except to adjourn, to lav on the table, to postpone to a certain time, to postpone indefinitely, to commit or to amend; and motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order herein named. If a motion to lay on the table an amendment be carried, the matter before the Convention shall be proceeded with as if no such amendment had been offered. The motions to lay on the table and to adjourn shall be decided without debate. The motion to adjourn shall always be in order, if the mover has the floor.

- 12. When a proposed amendment is under consideration, a motion to amend the same may be made. No after amendments shall be in order, but a substitute for both amendments may be received, which, if adopted, shall operate as an amendment to the original proposition. No proposition on a subject different from the one under consideration shall be received under color of an amendment or substitute.
- 13. If a question contains several distinct propositions, the same shall be divided at the request of any member, and a vote taken separately, except that a motion to strike out and insert shall be indivisible.
- 14. All questions of order shall be decided by the President, without debate; but any member may appeal from such decision, and on such appeal no member shall speak more than once, without express leave of the Convention.
- 15. When any member arises to a point of order, the member who has the floor shall take his seat until the point of order is decided by the Chair.
- 16. A question being once determined, shall stand as the judgment of the Convention, and shall not be again drawn into debate during the session, except with the consent of two-thirds of the Convention, upon a motion to reconsider made by a member who voted with the majority and seconded by a member who also voted with the majority.
- 17. No question shall be taken on any report unless upon a motion to print or recommit it; but reports shall, as of course, lie upon the table If a Committee deem any action of the Convention desirable, it shall be its duty to present in writing such Resolutions, Acts or Canons, as it may think it should adopt; which only shall be subject to the action of the Convention. Every act which divides a Parish, or in any way affects Parish boundaries, shall distinctly set out the new boundaries which it is intended to establish. The Convention will not act upon any proposed Resolution, Act or Canon which is not conformed to the provisions of this rule.
- 18. All elections shall be by ballot, unless otherwise ordered; the votes of the Clergy and Laity shall be received

and counted separately; but the vote shall be regarded as a joint one, and the election shall be decided by a majority of the whole number of votes taken together, except where a vote by orders shall be required under the provisions of the Constitution.

- 19. When a joint ballot is taken, the procedure shall be as follows: The President shall appoint two tellers on the part of the Clergy and two on the part of the Laity. The Secretary shall then call the roll and the tellers shall collect the votes. After the clerical and lay votes shall have been counted by the respective tellers, the teller first named by the Chair shall combine them in one joint ballot, which he shall present to the Convention, reading out the names of the persons voted for, the number of clerical and lay votes for each separately, and the sum total of votes received by each person. The Chair shall then state to the Convention the result of the joint ballot.
- 20. The Convention, after Evening Prayer, on the first day of each annual session, shall consider the subject of Diocesan Missions. The report of the Committee of Missions shall be read, and the estimated income and expenditures for the coming year shall be discussed, and so far as practicable, determined.
- 21. A majority of two-thirds of the members present shall be required to suspend any Rule of Order or make any change in the Order of Business; but "Orders of the Day" may be intercalated in the Order of Business by a majority vote.
- 22. "Roberts' Rules of Order" shall be the parliamentary guide in all cases not provided for in the foregoing rules.
- 23. The foregoing Rules of Order, together with the Order of Business hereto annexed, shall be deemed the Rules of Order for all future Conventions until altered or rescinded, and the same shall be published in the Journal of each Convention.

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Journal of Proceedings.

THE ONE HUNDRED AND TWENTY-THIRD ANNUAL CON-VENTION of the Protestant Episcopal Church of the Diocese of Maryland assembled in Emmanuel Church, in the City of Cumberland, on Wednesday, the thirtieth day of May, A. D. 1906.

The service began with the Office of the Holy Communion, which was said by the Bishop, the Epistle being read by the Rev. William Cleveland Hicks and the Gospel by the Rev. Edward M. Jefferys.

The Holy Communion was administered by the Bishop, assisted by the Rev. Edward M. Jefferys, the Rev. William Cleveland Hicks and the Rev. Edward T. Helfenstein.

Divine service being over, the Bishop called the Convention to order.

The Secretary of the last Convention then called the roll of Clergymen entitled to seats in the Convention from the list furnished by the Bishop, and fifty-three answered to their names.

The names of the Lay Delegates, who had previously presented certificates of election to the Convention and who had signed the Declaration, being then called, fifty-two answered to their names.

A quorum of both Orders being present, the Bishop declared the Convention duly organized and ready for business, and that the first business in order was the election of a Secretary.

The Rev. Robert H. Paine nominated Mr. A. de Russy Sappington, and, on motion, the ballot was dispensed with, and he was elected Secretary.

The Bishop appointed the Rev. William Bruce McPherson Assistant Secretary.

The Bishop then appointed the following Committees:

- 1. On the Rights of Clergymen to Seats.—The Rev. Benjamin B. Lovett, the Rev. William Dallam Morgan and the Rev. Robert S. W. Wood.
- 2. On Elections, or Rights of Laymen to Seats.—Mr. Armstead M. Webb, Mr. J. Smith Orrick and Mr. Alfred W. Lucas.
- 3. On Canons and Other Business.—The Rev. Arthur Chilton Powell, D.D., the Rev. Joseph P. McComas, the Rev. G. Mosely Murray, Mr. Daniel M. Thomas and Mr. Edward N. Rich.
- 4. On Auditing Accounts.—Mr. John A. Tompkins, Mr. Conway W. Sams and Mr. Robertson Taylor.
- 5. On the Admission of New Parishes and Congregations.—The Rev. Robert H. Paine, the Rev. R. Heber Murphy, the Rev. Charles A. Hensel, Mr. H. Marcus Dennison and Mr. James M. Garnett.

The Bishop then delivered his address and presented the record of his official acts. (See Appendix.)

Mr. Packard offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That the sessions of the Convention be from 10 A. M to 1 P. M., and from 2 P. M. to 5 P. M., and again at 7.30 P. M.

The Rev. Peregrine Wroth offered an amendment, by which the time of closing the afternoon session on Wednesday was fixed at 4.30 P. M., which was carried, and the resolution as thus amended was adopted.

Mr. Joseph Packard, with unanimous consent, offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

Resolved, That the Order of Business be so amended, to be effective during this meeting of the Convention, that the election of the Standing Committee shall take place at 10.30 A. M., instead of at noon; and that any other business appointed for the second day may be taken up on the first day, if time shall permit.

The Rev. Arthur Chilton Powell, D. D., presented the following Report of the Standing Committee:

REPORT OF THE STANDING COMMITTEE.

The Standing Committee begs leave to report, that after its election at the last Diocesan Convention, it organized by choosing the Rev. J. Houston Eccleston, D. D., to be its President, and the Rev. Arthur Chilton Powell, D. D., to be its Secretary.

In the past conventional year the Standing Committee has held nine meetings.

It has recommended to the Bishop of the Diocese, for admission as candidates for Holy Orders, Eugene Sebastian Pearce, Henry Vaughan Saunders, Benjamin Duval Chambers, Lionel Bligh Perry-Ayscough, Louis H. Ewald and Joseph T. Singewald; and for admission to the Sacred Order of Deacons, Hugh White Sheffey Powers, Ernest Albert Rich, Richard Johnston Campbell, George Griffiths and Charles Ledyard Atwater; and for admission to the Sacred Order of Priests, Hugh White Sheffey Powers and T. Getz Hill.

The Standing Committee has given consent to the consecration of the Rev. Frederick Foote Johnson to be Missionary Bishop to assist the Missionary Bishop of South Dakota, and of the Rev. Charles David Williams, D. D., to be Bishop of Michigan, and of the Rev. Edward Melville Parker, to be Bishop-Coadjutor of New Hampshire, and of the Rev. William Walter Webb, D. D., to be Bishop-Coadjutor of Milwaukee, and of the Rev. John Newton McCormick, D. D., to be Bishop-Coadjutor of Western Michigan.

Owing to his removal from the Diocese, the Rev. William Howard Falkner resigned his membership of the Standing Committee in February last, and the Rev. Percy Foster Hall was elected to fill the vacancy. Respectfully submitted, on behalf of the Committee,

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON NEW PARISHES AND CONGREGATIONS.

To the Convention of the Diocese of Maryland:

The Committee on the Admission of New Parishes and Congregations respectfully report, that they have had delivered to them, by the Bishop, papers from the Church of the Holy Cross, Baltimore, and the Church of the Epiphany, Baltimore County, asking to be admitted into union with the Convention, and papers from persons living in Roland Park and vicinity, asking leave to organize a separate congregation; that they have examined these papers and find them to be in regular form, according to Canon VII, and they recommend the adoption by this Convention of these resolutions accompanying this report, as provided by form Nos. XI and VII, pp. 77, 75, of the Compilation.

I. Resolved, By the Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church of the Diocese of Maryland, That the new congregation formed in Baltimore City, under the name of the Church of the Holy Cross, Baltimore, be, and the same is hereby, admitted into union with this Convention, and shall be entitled to all the rights secured to congregations organized according to the provisions of the Constitution and Canons of the Protestant Episcopal Church in this Diocese.

II. Resolved, By the Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church of the Diocese of Maryland, That the new congregation formed in Baltimore County, under the name of the Church of the Epiphany, Baltimore County, be, and the same is hereby, admitted into union with this Convention, and shall be entitled to all the rights secured to congregations organized according to the provisions of the Constitution and Canons of the Protestant Episcopal Church in this Diocese.

III. WHEREAS, A petition has been presented by Thomas Marsh Smith and others, for leave to organize a new Congregation in St. Paul's Parish, Baltimore County, to be called St. David's Church; and it has been made to appear to this Convention that the requisite preliminaries have been complied with; therefore, be it

Resolved, By the Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church of the Diocese of Maryland, That leave be, and same is, granted for the organization of said Congregation, as prayed for.

Two members of the Committee on Elections, or Rights of Laymen to Seats, having been found to be absent, the Bishop then appointed Mr. Robert R. Henderson in the place of Mr. Armstead M. Webb, and Mr. Conway W. Sams in the place of Mr. Alfred W. Lucas.

The Rev. Arthur Chilton Powell, D. D., offered the following Report of the Committee on Canons and Other Business:

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CANONS AND OTHER BUSINESS.

The Committee on Canons (with which Mr. Joseph Packard and Mr. J. Wirt Randall were requested to assist in the preparation and publication of the new edition of the compilation) respectfully reports that it has not performed the duty with which it was charged, for the following reasons:

That owing to the changes made, both in the matter and the arrangement of the Canons of the General Convention, by the General Convention of 1904, many changes will have to be made in the Canon of the Diocese of Maryland, to bring them into harmony with the General Canons, the Committee is of the opinion that it would be wise to defer putting out the revised compilation until such changes shall be made by the Diocesan Convention.

The Rev. Peregrine Wroth presented the following Report of the Committee appointed at the last Convention "to adopt such measures as may be deemed expedient to raise any sum that may be apportioned to the Diocese for Domestic and Foreign Missions:"

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON DOMESTIC AND FOREIGN MISSIONS.

The Committee appointed at the last Annual Convention to "adopt such measures as it may deem expedient to excite and increase interest in Domestic and Foreign Missions," begs to report, that, in pursuance of the duty laid upon it, the Committee organized in due time and manner, and after an investigation of the amounts contributed by the several Parishes and Congregations, as reported in the publication of the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society for the year 1905, especially as compared with the previous year, took steps looking to the furtherance of its work.

At the invitation of a Sub-committee of the Committee of Missions, it invited, in an appeal to the Clergy and Congregations of the Diocese, and made arrangements for holding a Mass-Meeting in the interest of Missions early in the Epiphany Season at Ford's Opera House, in the City of Baltimore. Tickets of admission to this meeting were eagerly sought, and the attendance left nothing to be desired. The speakers on the occasion were the Bishop

of the Diocese, the Bishop-Coadjutor of the Diocese of Springfield, and the Rt. Rev. Frederick Courtney, D. D., of New York City. Mr. George C. Thomas was to have spoken, but was most unfortunately detained by illness. This unhappy circumstance marred the program and more or less impaired the proper balance of the subjects for discussion.

Though great interest was manifested in this large gathering, as attested by the presence of Clergy and representative Laymen, it seemed to be generally conceded that the results were not commensurate with the preparations made and far from the realization of hopes and expectations. There seems to be something lacking on our part in the availment of great opportunities. We are sure we have yet much to learn in conducting successfully great popular assemblages.

The Committee has but lately addressed a short statement and appeal to the Rectors of the Parishes and Congregations of the Diocese, commenting upon a gratifying increase in the contributions reported by the Treasurer of the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society, as compared with the same date last year, and urging to further exertions in the effort to reach the amount apportioned to the Diocese. Mr. Frederick M. Colston presented the following Report of the Committee on Ways and Means:

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON WAYS AND MEANS.

The Committee of Ways and Means, to whom the matter of the proceeds of the sale, in June, 1900, of certain property (\$2,434.55), was referred by the last Convention, report that they have examined it, and find that the funds received, with other monies, were simply voted by Convention in the ordinary course of business for the payment of necessary and unusual expenses, without special knowledge of the source from which the funds in question were derived.

Under the circumstances, it being impossible to pay such an amount without increasing the Diocesan Assessment, the Committee suggests that it might be well to direct the amount be taken from the Keerl Fund and be appropriated by the Convention to any Missionary purpose that it approves—or else abandon the whole matter-altogether and let the Keerl Fund rest for future service.

The Rev. R. Heber Murphy presented the following Report of the Committee on Metes and Bounds of Old Parishes:

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON METES AND BOUNDS OF OLD PARISHES.

The Committee to whom was assigned the duty of looking into the Metes and Bounds of certain old Parishes, in order for the "clear defining of the boundaries" of the same, report as follows:

Looking carefully into this matter, and after consulting those learned in canon law, your Committee concluded that, according to Act of Assembly of 1798, Section XXXIII, reading as follows: "It shall be lawful for the Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the State to divide or unite parishes, as occasion may require, and to alter bounds;" the Convention has full authority to define by resolution such boundaries as are uncertain.

We, the Committee, therefore propose the following resolutions, defining the boundary lines which are uncertain:

First, Resolved, That the line separating St. Paul's Parish, Baltimore County, and St. John's Parish, Baltimore and Harford Counties, be, and is hereby declared to be, a straight line running from Middle River Station, on the Philadelphia, Baltimore and Washington Railroad, to the eastern point of St. Thomas' Parish, on the Old Court Road, distant some two miles from the Gunpowder River at the point where the said Old Court Road intersects the Harford Turnpike.

Second, Resolved. That a slight change be made, and is hereby made, in the line of Sherwood Parish for the more clearly defining of the same, altering the ninth course thereof to read as follows after "Phænix Factory:" "Thence southeasterly, following the County Road to the intersection of the Phænix Road with the Sweet Air and Paper Mill Road; thence nearly due east to the point where the Jarrettsville Turnpike diverges from the Old York Road."

Third, Resolved, That the line separating St. James' Parish, Baltimore and Harford Counties, from St. John's Parish, in the same counties, be, and is hereby declared to be, a straight line running from the furthest eastern point of Sherwood Parish, where the Jarrettsville Turnpike diverges from the Old York Road, to Bynum Station, on the Maryland and Pennsylvania Railroad.

Fourth, Resolved, That the line separating St. James' Parish, Baltimore and Harford Counties, from Deer Creek Parish, Harford County, be, and is hereby declared to be, the line of the Maryland and Pennsylvania Railroad from Bynum Station, on the Maryland and Pennsylvania Railroad, to the Pennsylvania line. And, Re-

solved further, That the western line of St. James' Parish be limited by the lines of Immanuel and Western Run Parish and the line of Carroll County.

Fifth. Resolved, That the line separating Severn Parish and St. Peter's Parish, Anne Arundel County, be, and is hereby declared to be, the Little Patuxent, from the mouth thereof unto the Baltimore and Potomac Railroad where it crosses the same, then following said railroad to the village of Severn, near which is the divisional line of Trinity and St. Peter's Parishes.

Sixth, Resolved, That the northern and western lines of Queen Caroline Parish, Howard County, be, and are hereby declared to be, the county road running from Trinity Chapel, in Trinity Parish, in a northwestern course, to the village or town of Columbia, on the Ellicott City and Washington Turnpike; then following said turnpike in a southerly direction to where it crosses the Big Patuxent.

Seventh, Resolved, That the west line of St. Margaret's Parish, Anne Arundel County, be, and is hereby declared to be, except where it is bounded by St. Peter's and Trinity, the boundary lines of Baltimore and Howard Counties.

Resolved, That your Committee be allowed to hold over, to report further at the next Convention.

Mr. DeCourcy W. Thom offered the following resolution, which was duly seconded:

Resolved, That the sum of twenty-five hundred dollars (\$2,500) be appropriated from the income of the Keerl Fund for the use of the Vestry of St. Andrew's Church, of Baltimore City, Maryland, for the completion of the said church.

Mr. John M. Glenn moved that the above resolution be referred to the Committee of Missions, with the power to act, which was lost.

The resolution offered by Mr. Thom was then considered, and lost.

Mr. Edward N. Rich offered the following resolution, and moved that it be made the special order at 2.15 P. M. today:

Resolved, That the sum of twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000) be, and is, hereby donated from the Keerl Fund for the purpose of making the improvements to the Hannah More Academy, which the

Trustees thereof have reported are imperatively needed; and that the Treasurer of the Convention, the Trustees of the Keerl Fund and other proper officers be, and are hereby, authorized to pay the same sum at any time hereafter on the order of William Keyser, Jr., Treasurer of the Hannah More Academy.

Rev. George F. Bragg, D. D., presented the following resolution, which was adopted:

WHEREAS, At the last meeting of the General Convention, held in Boston, the whole subject of Missionary Districts and Negro-Bishops for the Colored Race was referred to a Special Commission, "to gather information, to ascertain the mind of the Church, and to propose to the next General Convention such legislation as they may think desirable to meet the conditions;" and,

WHEREAS, It was further requested that "this matter be brought before the respective Councils and Convocations with a view of having it fully discussed; and that they transmit to this Joint Commission as soon as may be convenient the action which may be taken by them;" therefore, be it

Resolved, That a committee of four clergymen and three laymen be appointed to consider the subject, and to report to the next meeting of this Convention what action, in their judgment, should be taken by this body touching the question.

The Rev. F. Ward Denys presented the Report of the Trustees of certain property for St. Mary's Church, Hampden, which was ordered printed. (See Appendix.)

The Rev. William Bruce McPherson presented the Report of the Trustees of the Episcopal Fund, and of the Treasurer of the same, which were ordered printed. (See Appendix.)

Mr. Frederick M. Colston presented the Report of the Trustees of Church Charities, and the Treasurer of the same, which were ordered printed. (See Appendix.)

Resolved, That a loan of the sum of twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000) out of the Keerl Fund be made to the Trustees of the Hannah More Academy, under an agreement from the said Trustees to repay, at least, one thousand dollars (\$1,000) per annum upon the loan, and to pay in addition thereto interest at the rate of four per cent. per annum on the amount of the unpaid balance of the loan due from year to year.

By unanimous consent the words "at least" after the word "repay" were inserted in Mr. Penniman's substitute.

Mr. Penniman's substitute was then considered, and it was adopted by a vote of seventy-two in the affirmative and twenty-two in the negative.

The original resolution as amended by the said substitute, was then considered and adopted.

Rev. William Bruce McPherson then offered the following resolution which was adopted:

Resolved, That four hundred copies of the Bishop's Address be printed, and that a copy of the same be forthwith transmitted to each Clergyman of the Diocese.

Rev. Joseph P. McComas offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That the report of the Committee on Metes and Bounds of Old Parishes be referred to a new Committee to report at the next Convention of the Diocese because of the indefiniteness of a part of the report offered to this Convention.

Rev. Edward W. Wroth moved to amend the foregoing resolution by referring the matter back to the original Committee.

Mr. J. Wirt Randall moved as an amendment that the whole matter be referred back to the original Committee with the Bishop added thereto as a member, which motion was carried; and the original resolution, as amended by Mr. Randall, was then considered and adopted.

The Rev. Arthur Chilton Powell, D. D., presented the Report of the Treasurer of Warfield College, and the same was ordered printed. (See Appendix.)

Mr. Conway W. Sams presented the Report of the Committee on Donations and bequests, with the resolutions accompanying the same, which was ordered printed. (See Appendix.)

The resolutions accompanying the same are as follows:

Resolved, That the Trustees of Church Charities be, and they are hereby, requested and authorized to apply so much as may be needed of the rent derived from the dwelling No. 607 North Charles Street, devised to the Convention by the late Mrs. Margaret A. Snyder, to the payment of the collateral inheritance tax upon the said property and other expenses that may be incident to the transfer of the property.

Resolved, That the Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church of the Diocese of Maryland agrees to join with the executrix of the late Mrs. Margaret A. Snyder in the petition to the Circuit Court of Baltimore City for the appointment of a receiver for the real estate belonging to the estate of the said Mrs. Margaret A. Snyder for the purpose of collecting the rents and otherwise to administer the property pending the disposition of the caveat that has been filed against the said will, and hereby designates A. deR. Sappington as Solicitor, to represent the Convention in the proceedings in the Circuit Court of Baltimore City.

The first resolution accompanying said Report was then considered and adopted.

The second resolution accompanying said Report was then considered and adopted.

Mr. Henry D. Harlan then offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

Resolved, That the Trustees of the Keerl Fund and other officers of this Convention shall have power to sell or mortgage any part of the property in which the fund is now, or shall be, invested for the purpose of raising money for the loan to the Trustees of the Hannah More Academy, as authorized by this Convention.

The Rev. John G. Sadtler presented the Report of the Committee on Diocesan Libraries and the Report of the Treasurer of the same, which were ordered printed (see Appendix), and the resolution accompanying the same was adopted.

The resolution is as follows:

Resolved, That the sum of twelve hundred dollars (\$1,200) be appropriated for the maintenance of the Diocesan Libraries for the ensuing year, nine hundred dollars (\$900) of this amount to be paid from the income of the Keerl Fund and three hundred dollars (\$300) from the Convention Fund.

The Bishop, with the consent of the Convention, appointed the following Committee on Diocesan Libraries, viz.: (The Bishop, ex officio), the Rev. Robert H. Paine, the Rev. Edward T. Lawrence, the Rev. John G. Sadtler, Mr. John Glenn, Jr., Mr. Frank V. Rhodes, Mr. Herbert M. Brune, Mr. James A. Dunham.

Mr. James M. Garnett moved to suspend the rule of order and the resolution fixing the hour of 10 A. M. for the opening of the Convention, which was carried, and the Convention then fixed 9 A. M. as the hour of meeting the second day.

The hour of 4.30 P. M. having arrived, the Convention took a recess until 7.30 P. M.

EVENING SESSION.

The Convention reassembled at 7.30 P. M.

After evening prayer, which was said by the Rev. John G. Murray and the Rev. William Cleveland Hicks, the Bishop having pronounced the absolution, the Bishop took the Chair.

Mr. Charles W. Michael presented the Report of the Committee of Missions, which was ordered printed. (See Appendix.)

The following preamble and resolutions accompanying the same were offered and seconded:

WHEREAS, The Bishop has announced his wish to appoint a General Missionary for the Diocese; therefore,

Resolved, That the Committee of Missions be, and is, hereby authorized to apportion and appropriate \$13,500 for the Missionary work of the Diocese for the ensuing year.

Resolved, That the several parishes, congregations and missions be requested to contribute, beyond the amount suggested to them in their apportionment, an amount equal to fifteen per cent. of the same, to be used in increasing insufficient salaries.

Mr. Samuel J. Hough presented the Report of the Treasurer of the Committee on Missions, which was ordered printed. (See Appendix.)

Mr. John M. Glenn, the Bishop, the Rev. Arthur Chilton Powell, D. D.; the Rev. Henry Fields Saumenig, the Rev. John I. Yellott, Jr., and Dr. Robert Atkinson made addresses on the subject of Diocesan Missions.

The first resolution accompanying the Report was then considered and adopted.

The second resolution accompanying the same was also considered and adopted.

The Rev. Hiram R. Hulse, as the representative of the Board of Missions, New York, then addressed the Convention on the proposed Thank Offering to be presented at the General Convention of 1907.

The Rev. Percy F. Hall then offered the following resolutions, which were adopted:

Resolved (1), That a Committee be appointed by this Convention, to consist of three clerical and three lay members, to adopt measures, as it may deem expedient, to excite and increased interest in Domestic and Foreign Missions.

Resolved (2), That the Committee be empowered to suggest to the various parishes and congregations the sums they may be reasonably expected to contribute to enable the Diocese to meet its apportionment.

The Convention then, at 10 P. M., adjourned until 9 o'clock Thursday morning.

SECOND DAY.

THURSDAY, May 31st, 1906.

After Morning Prayer, which was said by the Bishop, assisted by the Rev. Upton B. Thomas and the Rev. E. B. Nash, the Bishop took the Chair.

The minutes of the previous day's session were read, and, after several corrections, approved.

The Secretary then called the names of the Clergymen and Lay Delegates who were absent or not called yesterday, when several answered to their names.

The Bishop then appointed the following Committee on Domestic and Foreign Missions, viz.: The Rev. Peregrine Wroth, the Rev. Douglass Hooff, the Rev. Percy Foster Hall, Robert Atkinson, M. D.; Mr. Thomas Hill and Mr. J. Wirt Randall.

The Bishop then appointed the following Committee, called for by the resolution offered by the Rev. George F. Bragg, D. D.: The Rev. William M. Dame, D. D.; the Rev. Robert H. Paine, the Rev. George F. Bragg, Jr., D. D.; the Rev. Upton B. Thomas, Mr. Joseph Packard, Mr. Samuel J. Hough, Mr. John M. Glenn.

The Rev. Arthur Chilton Powell, D. D., presented the following resolution, which was adopted:

Resolved, That the Committee on Canons and Other Business, assisted by Mr. Joseph Packard and Mr. J. Wirt Randall, be instructed to suggest to the next Convention such changes in the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese of Maryland as may be necessary to conform to the Constitution and Canons of this Diocese to the Canons of the Church.

Mr. Henry D. Harlan offered the following resolutions, which were adopted:

- 1. Resolved, That the sum of two hundred and seventy-five dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, be paid by the Treasurer of the Convention to the Rev. William Cleveland Hicks, to meet the expenses of the Committee on Hospitality.
- 2. Resolved, That the thanks of the Convention be tendered to the Rector and Vestry of Emmanuel Church, Cumberland, and to the former Rector, for the use of their Church building during the services of this Convention, and that the sum of fifty dollars be appropriated to the Rector for the special expenses in connection therewith.
- 3. And Resolved, further, That the thanks of this Convention be also tendered to the Pastor and Congregation of the Presbyterian Church, to the Young Men's Christian Association, and to the Board of Governors of the Potomac Club for courtesies extended, and to the people of Cumberland, the Congregation of Emmanuel Church and especially to the ladies thereof for their warm-hearted, delightful and bounteous hospitality to the Delegates during their stay in the Queen City of the Alleganies.

The Rev. Horace W. Stowell stated that he desired, on behalf of Christ Church, Baltimore, to say that his church was in favor of the increased appropriation for Diocesan Missions.

Mr. Robert R. Henderson stated that the Vestry of Emmanuel Church, Cumberland, while thanking the Convention for the appropriation of two hundred and seventy-five dollars, would present it to the Committee on Missions as an additional gift.

Mr. James M. Garnett offered the following preamble and resolution, which was adopted:

WHEREAS, The three hundredth anniversary of the first permanent settlement of English-speaking people on this continent will be celebrated next year in the Jamestown Exposition, and the founding of the first Anglican Church in this country will be commemorated by the restoration of the old church at Jamestown, Virginia, now in process of construction by the Association for the Preservation of Virginia Antiquities, and in view of the ancient relations existing between the Churches in the Provinces of Mary-

land and Virginia, it is proposed that the Church in the Diocese of Maryland take part in this commemoration by the donation of a suitable window in the Church at Jamestown; therefore

Resolved by the Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church of the Diocese of Maryland, That it heartily commends this movement to erect a memorial window in the Jamestown Church, and that the Bishop be and is hereby requested to appoint a Committee of two clergymen and three laymen to collect, by private subscription, the funds necessary for this purpose and to present this window in the name of the Diocese of Maryland to the Association for the Preservation of Virginia Antiquities, which has so patriotically undertaken the restoration of the old Jamestown Church, as a memorial of this early missionary enterprise, and especially of the labors of the noble and self-sacrificing clergymen who gave up their lives in the initial effort for the establishment of the Anglican Church in this country.

Rev. R. Heber Murphy presented the following Report of the Committee on the Records of the Diocese:

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE RECORDS OF THE DIOCESE.

The Committee on the Records respectfully reports that after the sad and sudden death of our late Librarian, Mr. George J. Coe, Mr. Laurence C. Wroth entered upon the work, and as keeper of the Records has shown a readiness to do the work quite as acceptably as his predecessors. He reports accessions during the year as follows: one book containing the Vestry proceedings of Trinity Parish, Charles County, Maryland; one volume of Vestry Records and one of Parish Records of St. John's, Western Run; two volumes of a private record kept by Bishop Paret of his baptisms, marriages, etc., from 1852 to 1881; two volumes of minutes of the Standing Committee, extending from 1804 to 1846, given by Mr. Powell, as Secretary of that Committee; the confirmation reports for the year, and the Convention Journals of nearly all the Dioceses.

The volume containing the Vestry Proceedings of St. John's, Harford and Baltimore Counties has been bound and repaired. The Parish Register of Christ Church, Calvert, was rebound—as much of the original parchment as possible, however, being retained as part of the cover. The confirmation reports were bound as usual. The total cost of binding for the year was \$4.25. Your attention is respectfully called to the fact that many old and valuable parish records are sadly in need of rebacking and similarly preservative attentions. Steps have been taken looking to this end.

An effort has been made to procure the Convention journals lacking to complete our collection. Five or six missing ones of recent date have been received, and one that had long been looked upon as impossible to find.

The use of the records for reference purposes has been constant and gratifying. Confirmations have been verified, genealogical material has been sought for, and in some cases found, and the historical manuscripts have been used frequently in aid of biographers and historical writers.

The vault, it may be said with certainty, has dried out completely. No mould appears on the books kept there, and other tests for dampness show that little, if any, exists.

The amount of cash to the credit of the Committee in the Savings Bank of Baltimore is \$265.70.

Late fires suggest again to your Committee the advisability of placing old Vestry and Parish Record Books in the hands of this Committee for safekeeping in the fireproof vault. The Historical Society are ready to make careful copies of all such volumes.

GEORGE ARMISTEAD LEAKIN, R. HEBER MURPHY, G. HERBERT BOEHM.

The Rev. William Meade Dame, D. D., moved that the order of the day be changed so as to proceed immediately to the election of the Standing Committee. Objection having been made, the motion was withdrawn.

On motion of Mr. Joseph Packard, Mr. Edgar G. Miller was nominated for Treasurer of the Convention, and, the ballot being dispensed with, he was unanimously elected.

On motion of the Rev. Arthur Chilton Powell, D. D., the Rev. Joseph Fletcher was nominated as one of the Trustees of Warfield College, in the place of the Rev. William Howard Falkner, and, the ballot being dispensed with, he was unanimously elected.

The Rev. John I. Yellott, Jr., nominated the following as the Committee of Missions, viz.: The Rev. Edwin B. Niver, the Rev. Robert S. Coupland, the Rev. Percy Foster Hall, Mr. Samuel J. Hough, Mr. H. Irvine Keyser and Mr. Norman James. The ballot was dispensed with, and they were unanimously elected.

Mr. Packard nominated Mr. Joseph R. Foard and Mr. Arthur Boehm as Trustees of Church Charities of the Third Class. The ballot was dispensed with, and they were unanimously elected.

Mr. Henry D. Harlan nominated Mr. Randolph Barton, Jr., and Mr. B. Howard Griswold, Jr., as Trustees of the Episcopal Fund. The ballot was dispensed with, and they were unanimously elected.

The Secretary presented the following Report of the Committee on the Bequest of Eleanor C. Thomas:

The Rt. Rev. William Paret, Bishop of Maryland, and the Convention of the Diocese of Maryland:

The undersigned Committee respectfully report that the legacy bequeathed to the Diocese by the will of Miss Eleanor C. Thomas consists now of the sum of four hundred dollars, less a collateral inheritance tax on that sum, and a further collateral inheritance tax on a judgment of eighteen hundred and twenty-three dollars, which is included in the legacy. The Orphans' Court required the executor to pay the tax on the judgment, although it is doubtful whether that judgment can be collected. Your Committee obtained the passage of an Act of Assembly authorizing the refunding of the tax paid on the judgment. As soon as that is done the sum of four hundred dollars will be paid by the executor to the order of the Convention. In the meantime an effort will be made to collect the judgment.

The ballot was then taken, and the tellers retired.

The Rev. James L. Siniley offered the following preamble and resolution:

WHEREAS, There is a widespread disregard of the Sabbath principle, and thousands of toilers are being deprived the apportionment of rest prescribed by the Fourth Commandment; therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church of the Diocese of Maryland do hereby express a most earnest protest against the practice of employing men's services for more than six days per week.

Resolved, That we urge upon all Church members the paramount duty of observing this Fourth Commandment in every sphere of life—personal, domestic and official.

Resolved, That we recognize the fact that corporations and municipalities are directed largely by Christians, Jews and other Sabbatarians, and stock therein is held in great measure by religious persons and organizations; and that, therefore, the responsibility for the correction of this evil devolves chiefly upon the Churches.

Resolved, That a Committee be appointed by the Bishop, to be known as "The Sabbath Defense Committee," and to consist of three clerical and three lay delegates, at least two of whom shall be gentlemen learned in the law, to study this question thoroughly, and to take such wise and effective action as the situation demands.

Mr. J. Wirt Randall moved that the resolution be laid upon the table, which was carried by a vote of forty-one in the affirmative and seventeen in the negative.

Mr. Joseph Packard offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

Resolved, That this Convention earnestly commends to the attention of the Clergy and Lay Delegates the Missionary Thank Offering appointed by the General Convention for the year 1907, and urges upon the Laity full and hearty co-operation therein.

The Bishop called the attention of the Convention to the fact that in the past there was an officer known as the Historiographer of the Diocese, and offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

Resolved. That the Bishop be authorized to appoint some person to be the Historiographer of this Diocese.

The Bishop then appointed Mr. J. Wirt Randall as Historiographer of the Discesse.

The Bishop appointed, under the resolution introduced by Mr. James M. Garnett, the following Committee:

The Rev. George W. Dame, the Rev. Robert S. Coupland, Mr. James M. Garnett, Mr. Thomas Hill and Mr. J. Noble Stockett.

THE BISHOP'S ADDRESS.

The Lord be with you, dear brethren; may His gracious help be with us, as we meet today to study the way in which we have done our duty in the past year, and the way in which we can better do it in the year to come, in winning souls to the blessings of the Gospel in His Church.

I must begin by expressing my own glad gratitude for the continuance of health and strength for my work, much beyond what I had dared to hope. You will remember that at the last meeting of the Convention, I gave it as my judgment that "in consideration of my own advanced and advancing age," the Diocese should have the help of a Bishop-Coadjutor. But I yielded to your loving protests, which moved me greatly, and I did not make the formal request. With your consent I sought relief by changing my system of visitations, so that the rural parishes, instead of being visited every year, as heretofore, should be visited only once in two years. I have tried to follow that rule; but, judging by numbers, it does not seem to have had much effect. The number of visitations has been almost the same as last year, and the number of persons confirmed even greater.

Yet, a change in method has given relief in another way. I have been able to take longer periods of rest. There are several weeks in midwinter, and several in midsummer, when the clergy generally tell me that visitations from the Bishop would be untimely. And by taking those weeks for absence and rest, while still continuing, by the mails, all other Diocesan business, I have been able so to husband my strength as to be better fitted for the work at other times; and I feel that the Diocese has not suffered by these temporary absences.

Of the 87 parishes and incorporated congregations, and 20 Diocesan Missionary stations, I have visited 87, and confirmed 1,396 persons, a number larger than that of last year or of the year before. I have preached 92 times and given 64 addresses, and have administered the Holy Communion 38 times. I held three ordinations, have consecrated two Churches, have laid one cornerstone, have held one service for the dedication of a Parish (27)

House, have baptized one infant, and solemnized seven marriages. The more minute record of these acts will be published in the Journal as a sequel to this address.

It is not often that I can report, as I now do, that during the year no name has been taken by death from our roll of clergy. We number now in all 133; one Bishop, 126 Priests, and six Deacons. Seven have been transferred to other Dioceses by Letters Dimissory, namely:

And as Deacon, candidate for Priests' Orders,

The Rev. Thomas Getz Hill.

In our study of the condition of the Diocese, I name first the fact that there are seven parishes at this time without Rectors, and that in some of them the vacancy has been long and continued. May I give some counsel upon this matter? It has been sometimes urged that greater power here should be given to the Bishop; and even that he should have authority to appoint. I do not think that the Bishops wish any such power. I, for one, do not. The Missionary Stations, which are not incorporated, and have no vestries, do indeed come under the Bishop's immediate supervision, and he has, and uses in such cases, his power of appointment. But in an organized parish, or congregation, with its own vestry, I am sure that the relation between pastor and people can be more happily established and maintained when the Rector is the choice of the parish, after careful deliberation.

The new Canon on this subject is supposed, by some, to add largely to the Bishop's powers; but it does not. It gives him no authority to veto, or to control, but only opportunity to advise. The vestry, having come to agreement as to the one whom they wish to call, must submit his name to the Bishop, and wait a certain time (a month, if necessary, but not more) for the Bishop to communicate with them. It may be that the Bishop has no special advice to give; and in that case he would promptly say so. Or it may be that he has grave reasons for not approving the choice; and in that case, while his advice would be entitled to, and would no doubt receive, respectful consideration, the vestry would still be free not to follow it, should they so determine. And upon the vestry that responsibility must rest. It is not the congregation that elects, but the vestry, to whom the congregation has, by the laws of the Church, entrusted that power. It is always a fruitful source of parochial dissension, when that decison is left open for the canvassing of the whole congregation; and worse still when, by a harmful usage (now I am glad to say, almost entirely abandoned) clergymen are permitted to preach as candidates. Each little group will at once have its favorite choice, and the open discussion of the merits will impair the full hearty acceptance of the one finally chosen.

Far better that the vestry should act strongly upon the power legally entrusted to them, and keep the names of those whom they may be considering, as far as possible to themselves, and out of public discussion. And it is important that they should act promptly and unanimously; promptly, because the longer the vacancy, the greater the danger of parochial dissension. And

unanimously, because a new Rector needs the full support of his vestry. If there be but one member who believes the man proposed not suited to the place and work, and cannot give him his vote, let that name be at once dropped, and a new one be considered. Let the vestries recognize their full responsibility, and act upon it, not in the fear of the congregation, but in the fear of God.

I must again speak of the difficulty of providing for the services and work in our weaker parishes and missions in the country parts of the Diocese. Instead of six deacons, we ought to have twenty, whom the Bishop, as the Canons empower him to do, could send where they were most needed. And we ought to have a goodly number of laymen able and willing to do missionary duty; ready not only to read prayers, but, with the Bishop's license, to give exhortation and addresses. Unless we can do something of this kind, I fear we shall not helpfully reach the scattered sheep, who, not living near a church, must be sought and ministered to by cottage services. I beg clergy and parents to be earnest in looking for young lads and men for Gospel work. I do not think it is the scantiness of salaries that stands in the way. We have men in Maryland parishes who have, for Christ's sake, cheerfully endured that hardship. And I thank them, and I know God blesses them for their courage and their patience.

But it is hard and discouraging for a young man to begin his ministry with a work which, if not dying, has little or no prospect of growth. There is little to awake enthusiasm or earnestness. And in many of our country parishes the steady flow cityward is continually draining parish strength. The American longing for progress shrinks from this. Yet in England there are great numbers of men admirably qualified, who are willing, for Christ's sake, to abide in the quiet pastorship, and minister to a feeble flock, whose souls are as dear to the Lord as those in any of the strongest churches. I think of the Rev. Dr. Tait, who afterwards became Archbishop of Canterbury, who spent the first years of his ministry among a handful of rude people at the mouth of a coal mine, and felt that he was doing the Lord's work there as truly as when he ministered in the grand Cathedral.

Among things deserving notice in the history of the Conventional year, I name, first, the Longwell Bequest. By the will of Miss Sallie Longwell of the City of Westminster, her mansion house with 15 acres of land, and \$10,000 in money, was

left for establishing and maintaining under the auspices of the Protestant Episcopal Church, "an institution for benevolent, charitable, or educational purposes only." Should I decline to accept it, it was to pass to the Presbytery of Baltimore, for the same uses. And should they also decline, the property was to be sold, and the proceeds to be divided between the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society of the Protestant Episcopal Church, and the Board of Foreign Missions of the Presbyterian Church. Having had some unhappy experience in trying to sustain church institutions upon inadequate endowments. I sought the advice of our Committee on Donations and Bequests, and then proposed to the Presbytery that both parties should agree in declining, and so permit the property to be divided. The Presbytery, however, answered that they could not agree to my proposal. Whereupon, convinced that it would require to maintain the institution a sum of money very much larger than what had been provided. I formally notified the executor of the estate that I could not accept the bequest as proposed.

I have to report as matters of encouragement, that during the year two substantial Missionary Churches have been built and completed. One at Annapolis, for the use of the congregation of colored people, of St. Philip's Mission; and one at Highlandtown, one of the suburbs of Baltimore. In both instances we were largely helped from the income of the Keerl Fund. By action of the Convention, all of such income, not otherwise appropriated, was placed at the disposal of the Committee of Missions. And that Committee wisely determined that it should be used only for new, or bolder, or more aggressive Missionary work.

In the Mission at Highlandtown we have found strength and encouragement in the zeal of one of our stronger city churches. The Rev. Mr. Coupland, Rector of the Church of the Ascension, asked that some Mission might be placed under their working care. He would undertake not the money support, but the supply of the services, and the Sunday School and visiting work of a band of his own earnest Church workers. I gladly so assigned to him the care of the Highlandtown Mission.

The Rev. Mr. Lee, Rector of St. Thomas' Church, Homestead. is helpfully carrying on a new Mission near Loch Raven in Baltimore County, where a building formerly used by another Christian body has been placed at our disposal. The Rector of the Church of St. Michael and All Angels, having strongly established his Mission work at the Chapel of the Guardian

Angel, has, with the consent of the neighboring clergy, begun a new Mission in the far northeastern part of the city.

The Rector of Holy Trinity Parish, Sykesville, is strongly conducting services at a new point in his parish.

And at St. Helena, in Baltimore County, the work of the Laymen's League has been so effective that lots for building have been secured, and steps are being taken for building a chapel. And at Roland Park, by the energetic action of the people themselves, ground has been procured and work begun for building a church.

It may be well to remember and use these facts in answer to an objection, sometimes urged, but wrongly, that our missionary funds are used chiefly in upholding worn-out churches. Here are seven instances within the year of new forward movement.

I have much more to say to you about our Diocesan Missionary work; but I purposely keep that for our Missionary session this evening, where I have asked the privilege of being one of the speakers. But I must here indicate two things about which I wish then to speak more fully. The first is the need of a change in the work of our rural parishes, by a much larger use of cottage services, neighborhood Sunday Schools or classes, and like methods for reaching the scattered people. In the few instances in which, under the Bishop's urging, these methods have been earnestly tried, the result has been even larger than we dared to hope.

Another point of which I wish to speak more fully this evening is the employment of a General Missionary for the Diocese. If the right man can be had, and the money needed can be supplied, I am sure it would wonderfully strengthen and increase our work.

And now I feel that I must depart from my usual method, and ask your attention to something of interest beyond our Diocesan lines. I have steadfastly said "No" to the many requests that I should permit the introduction of some matters which at the time were much in the people's thought, or that I should allow the representatives of certain institutions or societies to present and plead their claims. But I have felt that there were other times and ways in which such things could be better done, and that the Convention of the Diocese of Maryland existed for, and met to consider and act upon, the work of the Church in Maryland; and that the more closely it confined itself to its own proper business, the more effective it would be.

But there comes now a call in which I want Maryland as a Diocese, and every Churchman in it, to take earnest part. In

October of next year the great General Convention of our Church is to meet at Richmond in Virginia; and quite near that place is Jamestown, where 300 years ago, in 1607, the first permanent settlement was made in this land by English-speaking people; and from that place and year we date the beginning in this land of the American branch of the Holy Catholic Church as it was planted in England in early Apostolic days. The Church has authoritatively determined to have at that coming Convention a service and offering of thanksgiving for that event from which have grown this great Nation, with its liberties, civil and ecclesiastical, and the prosperity which has followed our Church and made it rich with God's blessing. I beg that all the Churchmen of Maryland may put their enthusiastic zeal in this effort, and let their deeds express their thankfulness. At proper time during our session I will ask your hearing for a fuller statement from those prepared to make it.

With these suggestions, and in good hope of God's blessing on our effort to carry on the growth in the Church life of Maryland, we will turn to the duties immediately before us.

CONVENTION REPORTS.

Report of the Committee of Missions

For the year ending April 30, 1906.

To the Convention of the Diocese of Maryland:

Your Committee of Missions asks to submit the following report:

The Convention of 1905 authorized the Committee of Missions to apportion and appropriate the sum of \$11,000.00 for the missionary work of the Diocese for the year then ensuing.

Your Committee has apportioned that sum to the Archdeaconries as follows:

Annapolis, \$880.00, or \$10.00 in excess of last year's apportionment; Baltimore, \$7,370.00, or \$570.00 in excess of last year's apportionment; Cumberland, \$880.00, or \$80.00 in excess of last year's apportionment; Towson, \$1,870.00, or \$340.00 in excess of last year's apportionment.

Your Committee has appropriated to the Archdeaconries the following sums:

Annapolis, \$2,935.00, an increase of \$250.00 over last year; Baltimore, \$3,275.00, or an increase of \$1,125.00 over last year; Cumberland, \$2,515.00, a decrease of \$275.00 under last year; Towson, \$2,100.00, a decrease of \$50.00 under last year; reserving \$175.00 for emergencies.

By resolution of the Convention of 1905 the several parishes, congregations and missions were requested to contribute beyond the amounts suggested to them in their apportionments, an amount equal to one-fifth of the same to be used in pastoral aid to increase salaries. How far this resolution has been heeded will appear as this report continues.

THE ARCHDEACONRIES.

The Archdeaconry of Annapolis added to its apportionment the sum of \$144.00, making in all \$1,024.00; and has paid in \$962.43, which sum is \$82.43 greater than the apportionment of the Committee of Missions. In the matter of the fund for in(53)

creasing salaries this Archdeaconry did not reach the amount collected last year by the sum of \$70.60. The Archdeacon complains of the delay in the time in which these payments are made, but hopes that the whole amount promised will be paid. He states that there are four vacancies in the Archdeaconry, but hopes these will be filled in reasonable time. He reports that the work at Solomon's Island is very encouraging, and he also reports the opening of a most encouraging mission at Brooklyn, Anne Arundel County, and also pledges to secure the payment of the mortgage debt upon the rectory at Curtis Bay.

The Archdeaconry of Baltimore was apportioned the sum of \$7,370.00, being \$570.00 in excess of its apportionment for last year. It accepted as its apportionment \$6,982.00. The amount paid in up to April 30 was \$6,237.27, which is larger by \$1,162.17 than the amount paid in at the same time last year. All of the appropriations for this Archdeaconry have been called for by the beneficiaries under them and paid to them. Thirteen churches have paid \$720.37 for the fund for increasing salaries, whereas last year only eight churches contributed, and the amount contributed was only \$468.59. The Chapel at Highlandtown has been completed, and the services there will be under the direction of the Church of the Ascension. The Chapel of the Nativity has been started by the Church of St. Michael and All Angels, on Montebello Avenue and Twenty-third Street. The Laymen's League conducts services at St. Helena, South Charles Street Mission and at Bayview. Twelve members of the League are acting under the direction of the Archdeacon. The services at all these places are without expense to the Archdeaconry. The Archdeacon reports that the movement in the whole Archdeaconry has been forward all along the line.

The Archdeaconry of Cumberland added to its apportionment the sum of \$73.50, making in all \$953.50, and has paid in \$955.18, being \$1.68 greater than its own apportionment and \$75.18 greater than the apportionment of the Committee of Missions. In the matter of the fund for increasing salaries this Archdeaconry was not so fortunate, and it fell short of the sum received last year by \$64.50, but the Archdeacon thinks this amount will be made good. The Archdeacon reports that all of its appropriations for Diocesan Missions were not used in consequence of some vacancies in that Archdeaconry. He also states that in that Archdeaconry only one stipend for a married priest is below \$825.00. He also notes a number of repairs and

improvements to church buildings, and the marked improvements in the missionary work at St. Peter's Church, Lonaconing, and Holy Cross at Cumberland, and in the interest of the clergy in maintaining services where required in other parts of the Archdeaconry. He gives it as his opinion that the Church is making progress in the towns, but that it is losing ground in the rural parishes.

The Archdeaconry of Towson was apportioned the sum of \$1,870.00, being \$340.00 in excess of its apportionment for last year. The amount paid in up to April 30 was \$1.615.12, which is larger by \$190.63 than the amount paid in at the same time last year. Some of the payments have been delayed, but the Archdeacon thinks that these obligations will be fully met. The amount received to April 30 for the fund for increasing salaries is \$244.75, which is \$4.75 in excess of the amount received at the same time last year. The amount appropriated to this Archdeaconry has all been used and there have been no vacancies at any missionary point.

THE KEERL FUND.

There was a balance of this fund on hand at the beginning of the year of \$1,389.80, and the receipts for the current year were \$2,780.46, making a total of \$4,170.26. Of this sum there has been paid to the Bishop for the work at Highlandtown, \$2,789.80, and there is still held for this work, \$1,380.46, total \$4,170.26, which closes that account for the year. But your Committee has appropriated the sum of \$2,000.00 for the Church of the Epiphany, on Ready Avenue, upon certain conditions, said amount to be taken from the income of the Keerl Fund for the coming year. At the suggestion of the Bishop, it has been made a rule of your Committee that the income of the Keerl Fund is to be used for new and aggressive work only.

THE FUND FOR INCREASING SALARIES.

The attempt of your Committee to carry out the purpose of the second resolution offered by your Committee and passed by the last Convention has resulted in the collection of \$1,192.52 and the payment of the sum of \$909.00 to eleven clergymen, the purpose being to supplement the salaries of clergymen, so that the standard of salaries mentioned in the report of the Committee of Missions for last year "of \$750.00 for unmarried priests

and \$850.00 and a rectory for married priests" shall be maintained. The failure of your Committee to meet the requirements of the resolution, and the low standard then set up, rests solely, in the opinion of the Committee from carelessness or indifference on the part of those whose duty it is to clearly make known to the people, both the necessity for the assistance required and the very small sacrifice on the part of the people necessary for the accomplishment of the purpose. This duty, in the opinion of your Committee, rests upon both the clerical and lay representatives which compose the Convention. It is a matter of common knowledge that objects sought to be accomplished by the Convention are but little known amongst our people. It has come to the knowledge of this Committee that a Treasurer of one of our parishes did not know that his parish was expected to contribute to Diocesan Missions.

SUPERANNUATED AND DISABLED CLERGY FUND.

Eight clergymen have been aided from this fund, receiving in all the sum of \$3,683.33, each beneficiary receiving from \$400.00 to \$600.00 per annum. There seems to be an increasing interest in this fund on the part of the people of the Diocese, and the fund is gradually approaching the amount that ought to be paid for retiring pensions.

MISSIONARY MEETING.

The Committee on increasing interest in Diocesan Missions reported in writing that in co-operation with the Committee of the Convention to increase interest in Missions, Domestic and Foreign, a mass meeting was held in Ford's Theatre on Sunday, January 7, 1906. The theatre was filled with an audience of about 2,200 people. Addresses were made by the Bishop of Maryland, Bishop Osborne, of Springfield, and Bishop Courtney. An offering was made, amounting to \$327.00 in cash and about \$400.00 in pledges. We think the meeting was a great success, especially in giving evidence of the real interest of the Church people of Baltimore in Missions.

A careful examination of the work which has devolved upon the Committee of Missions will show, your Committee believes, a steady growth both in the amount of work accomplished under its supervision and in the interest manifested in the work by the people themselves; and there are signs that can hardly be mistaken that this growth will continue, especially in the towns and cities. The problem of missionary work in the country, however, presents some difficulties which are hard to be overcome and call for the most careful study and attention. The country people are still flocking to the cities and towns, thus strengthening the city work; and your Committee thinks that this circumstance creates a corresponding obligation on the part of our city people to extend a helping hand to the rural outposts. But while your Committee looks forward to the future with much hope, yet it does not believe that the Church is doing by any means all that it can or ought to do for the cause of Missions.

A mere glance at the Report of Mission work from the several Archdeaconries, and which will appear in the Journal of the Convention with this report, and a comparison of those expenditures with the various parishes and congregations, for purposes other than for Missions, as exhibited by the Parochial Reports (to both of which classes of reports the attention of the Convention is directed), will show that we are regarding the missionary work of the Diocese as one of the least important of the duties which have devolved upon us, instead of looking upon it as one of the very greatest. From these and from other sources of information your Committee is convinced that a larger and bolder work ought to be done in Baltimore City and elsewhere, but it will require more money than is now received from the parishes. Indeed, the Bishop now thinks that if a city missionary could be appointed and sustained, new and hopeful missions might be opened and many neglected souls might be brought in. There are many places in the Diocese of Maryland in which men and women are more needed to do the missionary work of the Church than there is need for money. Many of our Sunday Schools are doing but half-hearted work because they need helpers both by way of teaching and administration, as well as by that sympathetic influence which can be exerted only by personal interest and presence of those who make up the community in which the Sunday School is situated (an influence too often exerted against, rather than in favor of, those who are engaged in the work). This quiet kind of work can and does exert an amount of influence for good which it would be hard to estimate, especially in our rural parishes, and this duty should be urged upon the laity of the Church by the clergy both by precept and example.

But after all, the plan for missionary work is not a matter of the first importance. We spend much time in making plans and working out theories by which we expect great things to be accomplished. But the whole missionary scheme is in its last analysis an intensely personal matter, for if our people by some means are not led to believe that missionary work is not only a part, but a very great part, of that salvation which each one of us is to work out with fear and trembling, the particular scheme by which the missionary work is sought to be accomplished will matter but little; but when, on the other hand, each member of the Church is made to perceive his duty in this regard, the time will be at hand when we shall no longer be troubled with plans to raise means to further missionary enterprise, but rather to make plans whereby the great accumulation of funds may be expended to the best advantage.

The Committee recommends the adoption of the following preamble and resolutions:

WHEREAS, The Bishop has announced his wish to appoint a General Missionary for the Diocese, therefore—

Resolved, That the Committee of Missions be and is hereby authorized to apportion and appropriate \$13,500.00 for the missionary work of the Diocese for the ensuing year.

Resolved, That the several parishes, congregations and missions be requested to contribute, beyond the amount suggested, to them in their apportionment, an amount equal to fifteen per cent. of the same, to be used in increasing insufficient salaries.

There was apportioned to the Archdeaconry of Baltimore for the year beginning May 1, 1905, and ending April 30, 1906, the sum of \$7,370. Of this apportionment there was accepted by the different congregations of the Archdeaconry the sum of \$6,982. Of this sum there has been paid at the time of making this report (May 10, 1906) the amount of \$6,267.27, leaving a deficit between promise and performance of \$714.73. This amount is \$253.78 in excess of last year's contributions for the same purpose. There was only one beneficiary of the fund in the Archdeaconry, the Rector of the Chapel of the Holy Evangelists, to whom was paid the sum of \$106.67.

Generally speaking, the missionary work of the Archdeaconry has been vigorously prosecuted with the agencies available. The full opportunity of this work, however, can only be met and its possibilities be realized by the appointment of a Missionary, who could in the discharge of his duties combine the office of Archdeacon of Baltimore with that of General Missionary, pushing the work of the city eight months of the year, and that of the rural Archdeaconries during the four summer months. The necessity of the appointment of such a man is supreme for the successful prosecution of the work of the Church in a missionary way in the City of Baltimore.

The Laymen's League was organized by the Rev. William Howard Falkner, former Archdeacon. It comprises twelve members who are faithfully and successfully conducting services every Sunday at Bayview, South Charles Street Mission, and St. Helena. At this latter place the erection of a suitable church building is contemplated in the near future, the ground for same having already been secured and paid for.

New work established during the year consists of the Chapel of the Nativity under the auspices of the Church of St. Michael and All Angles in the northeastern part of the city, and St. Philip's Chapel at Highlandtown, where services are conducted under the supervision of the Church of the Ascension. This latter Chapel was built by the Archdeaconry, the location of it being selected by former Archdeacon Falkner, and the Rev. Edward L. Kemp, Rector of the Church of the Holy Evangelists at Canton.

Services are held in all the public institutions where provision is made by the authorities in charge for the proper conduct of the same, the Franklin Square Hospital being again included in the number.

It is not too much to say that in the Archdeaconry as a whole, the movement has been forward all along the line during the year, and we have every inspiration for a bolder march during the year upon which we are just entering.

REPORT OF THE ARCHDEACONRY OF TOWSON,

Including Baltimore, Carroll and Harford Counties,

For the year ending April 30, 1906.

REV. HOBART SMITH, Archdeacon.

The amount apportioned to this Archdeaconry to be raised was \$1,870. The total amount raised up to the date of this report is \$1,663.51, with the prospect that nearly the full amount will be paid by June 1. In addition to this, \$244.75 has been contributed to the "Fund for Increase of Salaries."

The appropriation to the Archdeaconry was \$2,100, all of which has been expended in maintaining and advancing the Church work; every mission and Parish being manned throughout the year by faithful and energetic men.

St. Clements' Chapel, which had been closed, was reopened in July by the Rev. Joseph Baker, the mission at Rossville, and services held without interruption every Sunday afternoon.

At the Church of the Holy Comforter, Rossville, the year has been one of quiet, earnest work, seven having been confirmed, and the Church more and more appreciated by the people. Two of the most useful men have recently died, and their loss will be seriously felt.

The missionary for the northwestern part of Baltimore County, the Rev. R. Heber Murphy, has faithfully done his work at St. John's, Western Run, St. Luke's, Harrisonville, and the Freelands; and though there have been discouragements through removals and deaths he has kept the Church alive in these most difficult fields by his house-to-house visitation.

At Grace Church, Mt. Winans, the Rev. G. S Fitzhugh has paid off an old indebtedness, spent \$65 for repairs, all paid for; has added five to the Church by confirmation, received two by letter, besides five other communicants, who have recently identified themselves with the work, making a total addition of twelve. The Sunday School has twenty-five children under the superintendency of Mr. Van Meter, who is also a lay reader.

The Church of the Transfiguration, West Arlington, Rev. William Rollins Webb, has been strengthened by the addition of some valuable and influential families, and the outlook there is encouraging on account of the increasing permanency of the population by the ownership of their homes. St. Mary's, Franklintown, under the same Rector, is reported to have a more favorable outlook, by the proposed extension to that point of the electric cars.

St. Andrew's Chapel, under the care of the Rev. Henry B. Lee, Rector St. Thomas' Church, Homestead, reports substantial progress. Six have been added by confirmation and the congregation has grown from six or eight regular attendants to about thirty-five. The Sunday School, which had only eight or ten scholars, now numbers thirty, besides three teachers. The Chapel has been painted on the outside, the chancel renovated and electric lights installed. Mr. Lee gives large credit for the development to the energy of Mr. Eugene S. Pearce, lay reader, a student from the Theological Seminary of Virginia, who has

devoted Sundays to this work, but who will, in his vacation, live near the Chapel. A promising mission has also been started, by the same Rector, near Loch Raven, where he has ministered on Sunday afternoons to a congregation averaging fifty.

The Rev. Mr. Lee deserves great credit for his work at these two points, in addition to his successful work at Homestead.

St. Matthew's Church, Sparrows Point, the Rev. L. B. Browne, continues to grow in its congregations, its Sunday School and its financial contributions. As an instance of the last item, its Easter offering this year was \$360, compared with \$81 in 1898, the first year of the present incumbent. Mr. Brown, in addition to his work at Sparrows Point, has given interesting illustrated lectures on Diocesan Missions at many points in the Diocese.

The space allowed for this report will not permit further details of growth in the Archdeaconry, except to mention Epiphany Chapel, Ready Avenue, Rev. Carroll E. Harding, where, despite many disheartening delays in perfecting the title for their new lot, the enthusiasm and faithfulness of the congregation have increased, and the Sunday School has been developed by its laymen. Nearly \$5,000 has been promised towards the new Church, which will be built as soon as the title of the ground is cleared.

As usual, the Parishes and Congregations in the Archdeaconry of Annapolis went beyond the amount named by the Committee of Missions (\$880) and accepted a total of \$1,024, and promised \$155 for the Fund for Increase of Salaries. Up to April 30, the receipts on Apportionments amount to \$972.43, and on the Fund for Increase of Salaries \$110.40. Of the amount still unpaid \$40 is owed by a parish which has been vacant for nearly a year, while the balance will undoubtedly be paid before the opening of the Convention. While it is thus true that eventually the full amount of the accepted Apportionment is paid, yet it is unfortunate that payments are deferred until so late in the Convention year, which makes it especially hard to collect the Apportionment if the Rector or Missionary resigns towards the close of the year.

To the Archdeaconry the Committee appropriated in bulk the sum of \$2,935, which was appropriated by the Archdeaconry to ten points and was all called for save a few dollars.

For the coming year we will need a slightly smaller sum (\$2,850), as St. Mary's Church, Jessup, is now under the care of a student from the Virginia Seminary. Seven of our clergy have received aid from the Fund for Increase of Salary. The fact that there were so many of our faithful missionaries receiving less than \$825 yearly, who were thus aided towards a living salary should be gratifying to those contributing to this Fund.

There are now four vacancies within the limits of the Archdeaconry, an unusual state of affairs, but it is hoped that they will shortly be filled and the work be successfully prosecuted as before. In all directions we see evidences of faithful work,—work which cannot be tabulated and made to appear to the casual observer, and it is difficult when all are laboring faithfully to speak of particular fields.

The Rev. L. A. Wye's work at Solomon's is most encouraging and funds have been raised and pledged for a parish building for the use of the oystermen and others. The Rev. Mr. Shears reports larger congregations and increased interest at the Chapel at Scrabbletown. I can testify to the excellent Lenten congregations at Davidsonville. The Rev. Mr. Fitzhugh is holding his own at Curtis Bay, has secured pledges towards the payment of the mortgage debt on the Rectory. He has started a most encouraging Sunday School at Brooklyn. The attendance is good and they have proved their interest in Diocesan Missions by voluntarily paying to the Missions Fund the sum of \$7.

The work at Alberton is at present most discouraging, owing to the many removals of families of mill operatives.

While we cannot materially decrease the amount asked for the coming year, it must be borne in mind by the members of the Convention that we are sending our best blood into the city life, and the many transferred to our cities and towns should convince our city Rectors and laymen that it is the truest and wisest policy to keep alive, and well alive at that, our rural parishes for our increasing loss means their gain. We are feeding them.

The Archdeaconry of Cumberland accepted for the year 1905-6 an apportionment of \$953.50, or \$73.50 more than was asked of it by the Committee of Missions. At the close of the year, April 30, \$955.18 had been received, every parish having paid its apportionment in full. This showing is particularly creditable in view of the fact that several parishes were without Rectors during a portion of the year. The Archdeaconry also pledged \$167 towards the Increase of Salaries Fund, and on April 30 \$119 had been received from thirteen churches, leaving a balance of \$48 due from four churches, almost all of which will have been received, it is believed, by the date of the Convention.

At present only one parish in the Archdeaconry is without a Rector, and only one married Rector is receiving a salary of less than \$825 and a Rectory.

Various improvements to the Church fabric have been made during the year at St. Matthew's Church, Oakland; St. Peter's Church, Lonaconing, and St. Thomas' Church, Hancock. The improvements in St. Peter's Church, Lonaconing, costing several hundred dollars, were made while it was under the charge of Mr. Louis Ewald, lay-reader, whose fourteen months' work there was very successful. Mr. Ewald has recently assumed charge of Holy Cross Church, Cumberland, and improvement in its work is already perceptible.

The clergy of the Archdeaconry have been most faithful in providing administrations of the Holy Communion in the several churches served by deacons or lay-readers, and services have also been maintained by them in parishes temporarily vacant. The general situation in the cities and towns in the Archdeaconry is felt to be satisfactory; the Church is there steadily growing.

The situation in the country parishes is less satisfactory, owing to the fact that little or no gains offset the steady drain of losses through death and removal. When a city parish loses a member the gap is filled, more or less quickly and effectually, by those who are daily being added to the Church; when a country parish loses one of its leading members the loss is usually irreparable. Under such conditions it is impossible for the country parishes to relinquish much or any part of their appropriations from the Diocesan Missions Fund. Rather it requires very careful management of finances to enable them to continue with the appropriations unchanged from year to year.

Since the adjournment of the last Convention there have been two meetings of the Board—one held on Tuesday, the 16th of January, 1906, at which Mr. Wilton Snowden was appointed Trustee of the Second Class in the place of Dr. Charles C. Shipden, deceased; and the other held on the 24th day of May, 1906, the day of the date of this Report. At the last mentioned meeting Mr. John N. Since their last annual report, for the year ending April 30, 1905, the Trustees have collected the income from the investments in their charge, as appears in the statement herewith. They have received from Mr. Edgar G. Miller, Treasurer of Convention, the sum of \$2,322.42, being the balance of the proceeds of sales of land in Baltimore County, near Towson, belonging to the Keerl estate. The Diocese of Washington is entitled to one-third of this sum, and also of several similar sums now on hand.

Under the resolutions of Convention the income collected by the Trustees has been paid over as follows: To Mr. F. V. Rhodes, Treasurer of Committee on Episcopal Library, \$1,000, and to Mr. Samuel J. Hough, Treasurer Committee of Missions, balance of \$2,752.66.

There is now on hand in the Baltimore Trust and Guarantee Company the sum of \$5,837.21, and in the Savings Bank of the Title Guarantee and Trust Company the sum of \$41.06, all of said sums being principal, and a considerable part of which will be paid to the Diocese of Washington.

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REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON DIOCESAN LIBRARY.

(Journal, p. 16.)

The Committee on the Diocesan Library has again to report a change of librarians during the conventional year. Mr. George Jarvis Coe, after serving as librarian for a little more than six months, died suddenly in the first week of August. He was succeeded October 1st, by Mr. Lawrence C. Wroth, who is performing the duties of the office in an earnest and efficient way.

The accessions to the library by purchase have numbered 50, about the same as last year. The accessions by donation number 551 bound volumes and 133 pamphlets, about six times as many as last year. The increase is largely due to a notable donation of 450 volumes from the Reverend Dr. J. S. B. Hodges, rector emeritus of St. Paul's Church, Baltimore.

The cataloguing of the books has gone ahead steadily. The works recently made more accessible through this means are in the Dalrymple Collection in the second room of the first story of the building. They include many valuable historical and biographical works, books of travel, and a rare and interesting collection dealing with sorcery and witchcraft.

The circulation of the books has not been encouraging. Only 369 books were taken from the library for home use during the year, as over against 498 the year before.

Your Committee is extremely anxious to see a larger use of the many valuable books contained in this library of more than 30,000 volumes.

To this end we would like to direct the attention of those who can personally visit the library, to the large and constantly increasing card catalogue of both authors and subjects, and to assure them of the librarian's readiness to show them the resources of the library in any department in which they may be especially interested. We would like also to remind those living at a distance, of the provision made to facilitate their use of the books. The library will pay the transportation one way of any books such persons desire to take out. Three books may be ordered at one time, and, unless unusually large, can be sent almost anywhere in the State for 25 cents. Anyone who writes to the librarian asking for books on a particular subject, will be sent the latest and best the library has on that subject, or, if he prefers, a suggestion list from which to choose.

The use of the reading room with its church publications and papers, and the use of the library for purposes of consultation have been very much more satisfactory than the circulation of the books.

In the last week of December, on the occasion of a reception given by the Bishop and Mrs. Paret, to the American Historical Association, the Bibliographical Society of America and the American Association of Political Economists, an exhibition of rare books was held in the library. The specimens selected for display were chiefly incunabula, or works printed in the infancy of the art, early printers' marks and early collection of American colonial laws, especially of Maryland. The exhibit was highly commended, and the resources of the library in this way brought to the notice of some of the foremost historians, bibliographers and librarians of the country.

It was estimated at the last meeting of the Committee that, owing to a vacancy of two months in the office of librarian, an appropriation of \$1,200 from the Convention would enable us to meet the expenses of this coming year. We submit, therefore, the following resolution:

Resolved, That the sum of \$1,200 be appropriated for the maintenance of the Diocesan Libraries for the ensuing year, \$900 of this amount to be paid from the income of the Keerl Fund and \$300 from the Convention Fund.

REPORT OF COMMITTIEE ON DONATIONS AND BEQUESTS.

(Journal, p. 15.)

To the Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church of the Diocese of Maryland:

The Committee on Donations respectfully report that the bequest of \$5,000 made by the late W. Graham Bowdoin to the Convention for the benefit of the Superannuated and Disabled Clergy Fund has recently been paid, the sanction of the Legislature to the said bequest having previously been obtained.

The Committee was recently informed by Mr. Albert C. Ritchie, counsel for the executrix, of the devise to the Convention by the late Mrs. Margaret A. Snyder of the lot and improvements situated on the east side of Washington Place, Baltimore City, and known as 607 N. Charles Street, the devise being for the benefit of the Fund for Superannuated and Disabled Clergy.

On being notified of this devise, the Committee on Donations adopted the following resolution, and also requested the Chairman to arrange with Mr. Ritchie the practical details in connection with the transfer of the property.

Resolved, by the Committee on Donations of the Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Maryland, That the devise made by the late Mrs. Margaret A. Snyder of the property known as 607 N. Charles Street to the Convention for the benefit of the Fund for Superannuated and Disabled Clergy be, and the same is, hereby gratefully accepted in accordance with the terms expressed in the will of the testatrix.

No deed is required, as the title passes under the will. The property is appraised at \$11,000, and the collateral inheritance tax of $2\frac{1}{2}\%$ amounts, therefore, to \$275. The property is now rented at \$800 per annum, and it was thought wise to recommend to this Convention that the rent of the property be applied to the payment of the collateral inheritance tax and to any other incidental expenses connected with the transfer of title, so that the property would become revenue-producing only after such necessary expenses had been paid. Mr. Albert C. Ritchie has kindly consented to act as agent for the Convention in the collection of rent and the payment of these charges until the latter shall be disposed of. A resolution drawn for the purpose of carrying out these suggestions is submitted herewith for adoption by the Convention.

Shortly after the will of Mrs. Snyder had been admitted to probate there was filled a caveat on the part of the heirs-at-law and next of kin of her husband, the late Joseph R. Snyder. Pending the disposition of this case, it is thought necessarry that there should be a receiver appointed to collect the rent and otherwise care for the property. Mr. Ritchie, counsel for the executrix, therefore requests that this Convention shall unite with the executrix in a petition to the Circuit Court of Baltimore City for the appointment of a receiver for the property pending the disposition of the case. A resolution is herewith submitted authorizing the Secretary of this Convention to unite with the executrix in the petition for the appointment of a receiver for the purposes named.

The sanction of the Legislature was given to all the donations and bequests reported at the last Convention. Sanction to the devise of Mrs. Snyder cannot be obtained until the next session of the Legislature, in 1908, and therefore whatever disposition the Convention may decide to make of the real etsate, no sale of the property could apparently be made until after that sanction is obtained; for, until then, the title of the Convention is not absolute.

Mr. Edward N. Rich, one of the surviving trustees under the will of the late Richard Clarence Hall, wrote to the Chairman of this Committee under date of May 5th, calling attention to a legacy of \$5,000 contained in said will, the amount of which after the extinction of certain lives in being is intended to pass to the Convention, to be held by it in trust for the benefit of St. John's Church, Huntington. The surviving trustees inquire whether the Convention would be willing to accept the trust immediately, subject to the estate of the life tenants or annuitants. As this bequest is not to the Convention, but is made in trust ultimately for the benefit of a particular parish, the Committee deem that the questions concerning it should be referred to the Convention-namely, first, whether it would be expedient to accept the trust at all; and, second, if so, whether it would be expedient to accept it at this time and undertake the payment of the annuities which, being charges upon the fund, no benefit will accrue to St. John's Parish until these annuities are extinguished by the deaths of the annuitants.

In the judgment of the Committee this entire devise in trust is one that could be as well or better administered by some trustee other than the Convention, and the voluntary assumption of the fund at this time, subject to the payment of the annuities, would perhaps be beyond the corporate powers of the Convention.

Sappington as solicitor to represent the Convention in the proceedings in the Circuit Court of Baltimore City.

ELEVENTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF WARFIELD COLLEGE.

The Trustees of Warfield College regret exceedingly to report that this Diocesan institution has been closed during the past year owing to the inability of the Trustees to secure a competent headmaster to conduct the school. Several meetings have been held and the interests of the school thoroughly considered. Your Trustees are not without hope that this institution may yet be revived, under good auspices, and continue the good work it accomplished in the early years of its history. Toward this end thought and energy will be directed, and even now the future begins to brighten with hopeful prospects.

The goodly sum of \$1,331.08 has accumulated in our treasury, which will be sufficient to put the buildings in thorough repair when-soever the school may be reopened.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF HANNAH MORE ACADEMY.

(Journal, p. 10.)

During the present school year there has been an enrollment of ninety-nine pupils, with an average attendance of eighty-five. The school, therefore, has been much crowded, and twelve or more applications for admission have been declined for want of space.

The pupils represent nineteen Dioceses. Maryland very properly has sent thirty-seven, a larger number than any other Diocese. Two pupils have been baptized and nine have been confirmed during the current year; and there are now fifty-six pupils who are communicants.

The health of the Academy has been remarkably good. The staff of teachers has remained unchanged through the session, with but one exception, the teacher of French and German having resigned in order to accept a much larger salary from the school authorities of Baltimore City. The work of the school has gone on quietly and thoroughly without interruption, accident or unpleasant incident.

Considerable additions have been made to the school work by the purchase of reference books and books of standard literature. There is, however, a great need of a laboratory and gymnasium.

The Trustees have appointed a Special Committee to endeavor to secure a donation at this session of the Convention of the amount needed by the Trustees for improvements at the Academy, which are imperatively needed, and the Trustees earnestly ask that the Convention will give a favorable consideration to the request of this Committee.

This institution of the Church has been doing its beneficent and charitable work for more than forty-five years. Recently it has been enlarged to nearly double its former capacity. It has two distinct characters and lines of work, that of a

CHURCH HOSPITAL,

where those requiring surgical or medical attendance can, at reasonable rates, obtain comfortable rooms, careful nursing, and the service of any physician whom they may engage; and it is also

A HOME FOR THE AGED AND INVALID,

where they may enjoy the comforts and the privileges of the Church. There are daily services in the Chapel, and in the Home there is a Resident Physician. The Church Home is supported in the following way:

- 1. Partly by Churches in Baltimore, who engage to contribute a certain sum for the year, and who have the right to place a patient in the wards for every \$200 annually contributed. In this way some Baltimore Churches keep one, or two, or five, or even ten, beneficiaries in the Home.
 - 2. Partly by Endowment and Income from Invested Funds, and
 - 3. Partly by Receipts from Pay Patients.

The Bishop is Visitor of the Church Home.

The CHARGES in the Wards are \$4 a week, or \$200 a year. Single rooms, according to situation, etc., are higher.

Any Church or Congregation may make use of the opportunity thus afforded to provide for the care of the sick, for a longer or shorter time.

The Church Home opens its doors freely to the Clergy of Maryland who may need its care. Bishop Lay was nursed here in his last illness in 1885. Since then one Priest of the Diocese of Easton and four of the Diocese of Maryland have been cared for in their last illness.

Clergymen, Churches and individuals may aid in this good work:

- 1. By making the existence and advantages of the Church Home known, so that those who may have come to the city for surgical care, etc., may avail themselves of the advantages it offers.
- 2. By sending the sick and the aged, and providing for their support.
 - 3. By an occasional offering in Church, or private donation.
- 4. By engaging to support a Free Bed, at a cost of \$200 a year, with privilege of nominating the patient.
- 5. By testamentary bequests to "The Church Home and Infirmary of the City of Baltimore."

The Convention of the Diocese of Easton has requested an Annual Offering for this institution from every Congregation in the Diocese.

Will not some of the Congregations in Maryland do this without request of the Convention?


