REPORT OF THE STANDING COMMITTEE.

The Standing Committee beg leave to report that on June 5, 1915, the Committee elected by the Convention of 1915 was organized by the election of the Rev. A. B. Hunter as President, and the Rev. M. A. Barber as Secretary.

The Rev. Henry Clark Smith, deacon, was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the priesthood.

Consent was given to the consecration of the Rev. Wilson Reiff Stearly as Bishop Suffragan of the Diocese of Newark.

On June 30, 1915. Jacob Frederick Burg was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the diaconate.

Howard S. Hartzell was recommended for dispensation from studies not strictly ecclesiastical until he shall have been ordained deacon.

Consent was given to the consecration of the Rev. Charles Fiske, D.D., as Bishop Coadjutor of the Diocese of Central New York.

On August 21, 1915, consent was given to the consecration of the Rev. Edward Campion Atcheson as Bishop Suffragan of the Diocese of Connecticut.

Howard S. Hartzell and J. Reginald Mallett were recommended to the Bishop to be admitted Candidates for Holy Orders.

On September 9, 1915, approval was given to the Bishop's list of disbursements of money received from the Board of Missions for missionary work among the white and colored people.

The Committee recommended that in the future the old parishes and missions among the colored people be requested to relinquish part of the appropriation in order that more money might be left for the development of new work.

On March 11, 1916, consent was given to the election of the Rt. Rev. Benjamin Brewster, D.D., Bishop of the Missionary District of Western Colorado, to be Bishop of the Diocese of Maine.

On April 22, 1916. Sanford Louis Rotter was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the diaconate, and Roger Edgar Bunn was recommended to the Bishop to be admitted as a Candidate for Holy Orders.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF THE DIOCESE.

The Trustees of the Diocese beg leave to submit the following report:

Since the last Convention of the Diocese they have received and filed the following deeds:

- 1. Deed of Benjamin Morrow to the Vestry of St. Peter's Church. Charlotte, for a parcel of land in the county of Mecklenburg, North Carolina; consideration, \$433.60; dated March 29, 1867, and recorded in Book 5, page 233, in the office of the Register of Deeds for Mecklenburg County.
- 2. Deed of indemnity from B. S. Bronson and wife to Wm. R. Myers; dated April 11, 1874, and recorded in Book 10, page 233, in the office of the Register of Deeds for Mecklenburg County.
- 3. Deed of B. S. Bronson and wife to the Trustees of the Diocese, for a certain parcel of land situated in Mecklenburg County, dated January 1, 1886, and recorded in Book 57, page 243, in the office of the Register of Deeds for Mecklenburg County.
- 4. Deed of W. A. Watson and wife and D. K. Cecil and wife for one and one-half acres of land adjoining the property above mentioned; dated April 13, 1893, and recorded in Book 91, page 343, in the office of the Register of Deeds of Mecklenburg County.
- 5. Deed of B. S. Bronson to the Trustees of the Diocese, giving quit-claim to the property of the Thompson Orphanage, Charlotte; dated June 25, 1915. and recorded in Book 345, page 309, in the office of the Register of Deeds for Mecklenburg County.
- 6. Deed of Miss Ruth W. Hairston to the Trustees of the Diocese for about one-half acre of land in Davie County, to be used as a burial place for members of the Church of the Ascension in Fulton Township; dated March 14th and registered March 16, 1916, in the office of the Register of Deeds for Davie County.

The Trustees also report that in pursuance of instructions of the last Convention (see page 44. Journal of 1915), they did, on the 10th day of January. 1916, give a deed conveying the property of the Church of the Holy Comforter, at Charlotte, held in trust by them for the same, to the Vestry of said Church.

And they further report that the land upon which was built St.

Cuthbert's Chapel, Greensboro, having by the terms of occupancy reverted to the Cone Manufacturing Company, and the Managers kindly permitting the removal of the building, the Bishop, by authority of the Trustees, caused it to be taken down that it might be reërected upon a lot of ground held in trust by them, and assigned it to the use of the Church of the Redeemer, our Colored Mission in Greensboro.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF ST. MARY'S SCHOOL.

On behalf of the Trustees of St. Mary's School, the President of the Board submits the following annual report, as required by the act of incorporation:

On account of the unexpected absence from Raleigh of the Treasurer of the Board, Dr. Kemp P. Battle, Jr., at the time of the preparation of this report, it is impossible to give a summary of the Treasurer's accounts for the year ending April 30th. It can be stated, however, that no considerable or important financial transaction has occurred during the year, nor have any considerable amounts been received or disbursed. The several funds remain substantially as stated in the report made to the last Convention, and the receipts and expenditures have practically been confined to the interest received upon the funds in his hands, and the payment of the small current charges of the salary of the Secretary and Treasurer of the Board and the expense attending the meetings

of the Board. The interest on the \$40,000 funded debt of the Board is not paid by the Treasurer, but by the Rector and Business Manager from the current funds of the School.

The internal management and discipline of the School preserves its high standard of excellence, and the work of the past year, so far as the Board is informed, has been effective and satisfactory. The attendance has not been so great as in some former years, but still remains in advance of anything known before the enlargement of the buildings and the improvement of the equipment.

The total enrollment of pupils during the year has been one hundred and forty-nine (149) boarders and ninety-seven (97) day scholars. As the School year does not end until the last of May, it is not possible at this time to give any summary of the accounts of the School, but the Business Manager thinks that by the aid of a surplus on hand from a former year he will be able to close the current year without debt.

This statement illustrates the very serious situation of this, our most important Church institution. In 1896 this Convention inaugurated a movement to secure the property which for fifty-five years had been rented by the two Doctors Smedes, in connection with which they had built up St. Mary's School; and to establish the School as an institution owned and controlled by the Church. begin this movement the Diocese appropriated towards the purchase of the property diocesan funds amounting in round numbers to something like ten thousand dollars, stipulating that certain scholarships should be created by the Trustees of the School, in consideration of this contribution from the Diocese. In the earnest and absorbing efforts of the Trustees to pay for the property, other funds. from the Diocese of East Carolina and from other sources, were received towards discharging the debt incurred for the purchase of the property, upon the same terms, and additional scholarships were established. But at the time it was seen that the School should not be burdened with these annual obligations for free board and tuition, and it was determined and published, as part of our scheme, and necessary to the success of our enterprise, that we should raise fifty thousand dollars for the purchase of the School property, and another fifty thousand dollars as a permanent endowment, thus providing a fund the income from which should offset the annual expense of the scholarships established in consideration of gifts which had gone into the fifty thousand dollars purchase money. This was the proposition with which I went before our people throughout the State in 1897 and the following years.

That modest beginning towards an endowment has never been secured, and for nearly twenty years the School has been subjected to this drain, amounting to between two and three thousand dollars annually. In addition to this, the interest on our funded debt of forty thousand dollars has to be paid out of the current receipts of the School for board and tuition. So we have the School, in effect,

paying a rent of five thousand dollars, besides having to keep up all repairs and to pay for such permanent improvements as from time to time must be added. We all felt that Dr. Bennett Smedes had done nobly to keep up the School in spite of the competition of free State institutions and others sustained by endowments, when he had to pay an annual rent of twenty-five hundred dollars. We have doubled the rent, and have also required thousands of dollars to be spent by the School for repairs and permanent improvements.

It should be remembered that neither the Trustees nor the Church in the Carolinas have ever supposed that St. Mary's School could be successfully maintained upon any such system. From the inception of the enterprise it was contemplated that an endowment must be created. When the School was less than one-half its present size, the sum of fifty thousand dollars was fixed upon as a minimum to begin such a fund. The Conventions of the Dioceses interested have again and again endorsed the declarations and appeals of the Trustees in connection with this subject. It is of vital importance, and it should not be longer neglected.

In view of the situation thus very briefly indicated, a special meeting of the Board of Trustees was called, by request of the Executive Committee, and the Board met in the library of the School on the sixteenth day of last March. After a full discussion, the Board adopted a number of resolutions, which may be briefly summarized as follows:

A Committee was appointed (the Rev. Isaac W. Hughes, Mr. Geo. C. Royall, and Mr. Graham H. Andrews), authorized in their discretion to appoint auxiliary committees throughout the Carolinas and elsewhere; and charged with the duty of inaugurating and carrying on a campaign to raise (1) fifty thousand dollars to pay the funded debt and to meet the necessary expenses, and further sums of (2) one hundred thousand dollars for an endowment, and (3) one hundred thousand dollars for improvements and additions as they may be Also a suitable person was selected as the Special Representative of the Board for the purposes contemplated in the resolutions; but as the person selected has not, as yet, signified his acceptance of the work, it seems best not to give his name. I will only say that he commands the unanimous confidence of the Trustees, and his name would go a great way with this Convention in encouraging the hope of success should he enter upon the task proposed to him.

This is the situation of our School. It has sustained itself with astonishing success, and has not only been self-supporting, but has paid thousands of dollars upon permanent improvements and given thousands of dollars in free board and tuition to the young women of the Carolinas. The increase in attendance and income has abundantly justified the policy of the Board of Trustees in incurring the debt for enlarging its accommodations and improving its equipment. It is today the largest and most useful School of its class

which the Church has in the United States. And all it asks is to be freed from debt; to be furnished with moderate means of keeping its accommodations and advantages abreast with demands of the times; and to be relieved by a modest endowment from the annual expense of the free scholarships created in paying for the property, so that any profit derived from board and tuition may be expended in keeping the property in good repair and attractive condition.

The Trustees lay before you the condition and needs of your institution, and ask your generous support in the work you have entrusted to them.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MANAGERS OF THE THOMPSON ORPHANAGE AND TRAINING INSTITUTION.

The thirtieth annual meeting of the Board of Managers of the Thompson Orphanage and Training Institution was held in the Chapel of St. Mary the Virgin on the 25th day of April, 1916, all the members being present and the Bishop of the Diocese presiding.

The Rev. Walter J. Smith read his report as Superintendent and Treasurer, which was accepted. Mr. Joseph G. Shannonhouse also read his report as treasurer of the permanent and endowment funds of the Institution, which was also received. and these reports are herewith submitted as part of this report.

The financial showing this year is encouraging as compared with former years, as follows:

The sanitary condition of the Orphanage is good, and the interior condition of Thompson Hall has been greatly improved in comfort and appearance by the expenditure of over eleven hundred dollars of the permanent funds for this purpose, under the direction of the Executive Committee having the matter in charge.

The appearance of the children indicates good health and ample nourishment, kind considerate care, and reflects much credit upon the faithful and untiring oversight of the Superintendent and his kind and efficient coworkers.

The appearance of the farm shows much improvement. The products of the same show that an efficient and skillful farmer has directed this department of the Institution, and Mr. Thornton has proved himself to be such.

Our Superintendent is faithful and unremitting in his duties, judicious and conscientious in his management of the Institution, and in administering the trust committed to him, and well deserves the confidence and respect of all the friends of the Orphanage throughout the State.

If the sum of money expended for the support of the work may seem somewhat out of proportion to the number of children, it should be remembered that the number of employees cannot be reduced without detriment to the work, and that these same employees could take care of more than twice the number of children with but comparatively little more expense, and that the cost per capita would thus be materially reduced. Considering these circumstances, the Board think our expenses compare favorably with similar institutions of the country, and we could soon double the number of children if we had room for them.

We congratulate the Church in the State upon the fact that so far the Orphanage by judicious management and wise economy has been able to keep out of debt. so that each year we are able to begin with a moderate balance to our credit.

As our fiscal year begins in the spring, we need this balance and much more to enable us to tide over the dull and trying season of summer, when contributions are small and expenses must be incurred.

We are greatly encouraged and comforted by the manifestations of confidence, sympathy and interest of Church people and others throughout the State in our endeavors to carry on this blessed and noble charity, and assure our generous friends that we are gladly doing all in our power faithfully and wisely to administer all funds entrusted to us, for the best interests of those homeless ones who have been committed to our care.

There are, and always will be, many calls upon Christian people for large and generous contributions, for our Saviour assures us that we shall "always have the poor with us." And if our people wish to see this Institution come up to their standard of excellence and keep abreast with the times, they will of course provide the

means for that purpose, as we have no other means of doing as they wish.

Among the urgent needs of the work at present we mention the following:

First, a suitable laundry and equipment for the Federation Cottage and Bronson Hall, and some important changes and improvements in the latter building.

Second, a new cottage planned and equipped for the care and comfort of small children from the ages of one or two years to seven or eight. This is a most important demand, for the lack of which our Institution is losing a great opportunity of attaining the best results of its labors by failing to reach and benefit this unfortunate class of helpless and homeless children when they are most capable of receiving and retaining early instruction.

Finally, we are greatly in need of a new barn properly located. This is also a vitally important matter, as, indeed, are all of these items, to supply all of which will require at least eight or ten thousand dollars, contributions for which must not interfere with those that are needed for current expenses.

The great importance of this Institution as an auxiliary and handmaid of the Church in performing her mission as the Bride of Christ cannot be too strongly emphasized, and we commend it to the prayerful sympathy and generous coöperation of all the members of the Church in the State.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE REV. WALTER J. SMITH, SUPERINTENDENT THOMPSON ORPHANAGE AND TRAINING INSTITUTION.

To the Board of Managers—Greeting:

The past year has been marked by many needed improvements in the Orphanage, and we hope that others will follow in the near Thompson Hall has been partially remodeled and nearly all of the inside work repainted. The farm is in better shape and has yielded more than ever before, the value of the total products amounting to over four thousand dollars, of which three items should be specially mentioned, viz., forty tons of hay, five hundred and fifty dollars worth of sainfoin, and five thousand gallons of milk. While our general expenses are a little less than they were last year, our children have been well cared for and seem to be well and happy. The Sunday School offerings amounted to over six hundred dollars, and this fact, together with the increase in the Thanksgiving offerings, enables us to close the fiscal year with a credit balance of \$1,597.87. We had a change in all of our matrons during the year. the present ones being Mrs. Laura K. Poague, of Chicago, Thompson Hall; Mrs. Mildred L. Wooldredge, of Richmond. Va., Bronson Hall; and Miss Marie Andrews, of Willington, S. C., Federation Cottage.

After being in the work twenty years as teacher and matron, Miss Kate Capehart left us in July, and I wish to express my appreciation of her long and faithful service. She was specially interested in the work of the Church, and was for many years organist, and president of the Daughters of the King. Without mentioning all of the workers, I think it is due Mrs. George Ford, of Georgetown, S. C., to say that during her stay with us she put Thompson Hall in better shape than it had ever been before.

During the year we received six children, of whom three came from the Diocese of North Carolina, two from East Carolina, and one from the District of Asheville. Eleven have returned to their former homes, two who came conditionally have been taken away by their mother to be placed with their brother in another institution, and one has been sent to the Caswell Training School at Kinston, leaving sixty-four in the Institution at present. There are several reasons for not having our full quota at this time. In the first place, we wished to avoid crowding while certain improvements were being made; then there were so many boys that applied for admission for whom we had no room, and then again four children left not long before the close of the year. Three have been accepted from East Carolina and one from the District of Asheville. The applications pending will more than fill the few remaining vacancies. cluded in the above statement are two children who came to us from the Associated Charities of Charlotte for a limited time and remained only a week; also another little girl who came for a short time while her mother was at a hospital.

In closing my report I wish to thank our physician, Dr. Wm. Myers Hunter, and the other physicians and dentists of the city for their professional services, freely and cheerfully given, and also the City Water Works, the Standard Ice and Fuel Company, and the different railroads for their kind favors, all of which are much appreciated.

The premium of \$20 shown above and added to the permanent fund was paid on the \$1,000 bond of the Holt-Williamson Co., Fayetteville, as a bonus; the value was put at \$980. and I collected \$1,000.

I formerly held 8 shares stock of the Fourth National Bank of Fayetteville, N. C., valued at \$880, and the bank canceled four of the shares, and the statement to balance shows four shares charged off against the permanent fund and the remaining four shares carried at first value as credited to the fund.

The Fourth National Bank of Fayetteville having failed, it is more than probable that this four shares will be lost and the Orphanage will be assessed \$400 in addition.

These reports were referred to a Committee composed of the Rev. John B. Gibble and James D. Miller; Messrs. D. Y. Cooper, F. P. Haywood and Wm. S. Clark.

The Rev. Edwin Λ . Osborne presented the following report of a Special Committee of the last Convention on a proposal relating to the location of the Thompson Orphanage:

The Special Committee appointed at the last meeting of the Convention to consider and investigate all matters relative to the location of the Thompson Orphanage and Training Institution, and to make an exhaustive report concerning the same, after due notice to all the members, met on the grounds of the Institution on the 20th day of September, 1915, and carefully considered all matters relating to the subject brought to their attention, and especially the following:

- 1. The present site was originally donated to the Church for the special purpose of being used for an Orphanage and Training Institution, and was at that time within the corporate limits of the city.
- 2. The deed of conveyance by which the property was donated to the Diocese contains a condition that "in the event of a sale of the whole property herein conveyed the residue of the proceeds, after paying for the improvements necessitating such sale, shall be

equally divided between the Dioceses of North Carolina and East Carolina, to be held and applied by them respectively as near as can be in accordance with the designs of the said B. S. Bronson as above declared." etc.

- 3. The value of the buildings now on the property suitable only for orphanage purposes, which would be practically lost in case of a sale and removal, and yet would have to be replaced in case the Institution should be removed.
- 4. The character of the land, some seventy acres, which is divided by a large creek, and consists of some thirty-five acres of bottom land undesirable for building purposes, but valuable for trucking and pasturage, the balance, except only a few acres, being hilly and broken and almost entirely surrounded on three sides by negro settlements, and much of it remote from and difficult of access to the city schools and business part of the city, all of which depreciate its market value.
- 5. The Federation of Orphanage Guilds throughout the State have become interested in improving the present property by erecting suitable buildings according to a scheme agreed upon by the Board of Managers, and have erected one splendid and valuable building according to said scheme, and the Board of Managers has also erected a valuable memorial building on the same scheme.
 - 6. The advantages of the present situation:
- (a) It is thoroughly sanitary. During nearly thirty years there has been but very little sickness of any kind, and only a very few deaths among the orphans from disease—one from pneumonia. three from typhoid fever.
- (b) The land being well adapted to pasturage, trucking, and small fruits and berries, and within easy access to the city markets.
- (c) Its nearness to the city schools and business and industrial establishments, where the children can be taught or employed.
- (d) The advantage of being near the city hospitals, churches. physicians, nurses, etc.
- (e) The advantages of city water, lights, gas. police, markets, etc., and facilities for purchasing supplies and selling products.

Against these advantages we have considered the difficulty of procuring a suitable site, the present cost of land, the cost and difficulty of erecting suitable buildings, procuring water, lights, physicians, nurses, and supplies, remoteness from schools, market for produce, etc., loss of publicity and sympathy by being remote from the city, and finally the possibility of incurring litigation in case of a sale of the entire property.

In view of all these and other considerations, it was the unanimous opinion of the Committee that it would be inexpedient and unwise to sell the land or remove the Institution from its present location, and that the welfare of the Institution demands that the further agitation of this subject be discontinued.

We therefore respectfully submit the following resolutions:

Resolved, That we do not sell the Orphanage property as a whole, but that the Institution remain at the present location.

Resolved, that we recommend that the Board of Managers, at as early date as practicable, sell off such a portion of the land as can be spared, with which to erect sufficient and suitable new buildings for the proper care of our orphans and to place the Institution in a first-class and an up-to-date condition.

On motion of the Rev. Dr. Lay, the report was referred to the Committee on the Report of the Managers.

The Rev. M. A. Barber presented the report of a Committee appointed by the last Convention on a proposed Enlargement of the Board of Managers of the Orphanage as follows:

The Committee appointed by the Convention of the Diocese of North Carolina, to consider the enlargement of the Board of Managers of the Thompson Orphanage and Training Institution, and to take such steps as to them might seem necessary in effecting the same, submit the following report:

Since the membership of the said Board of Managers was provided for and their number and method of election definitely fixed by the original deed of donation from the Rev. Benjamin S. Bronson to the Trustees of the Diocese of North Carolina, dated January 1, 1886, a copy of which deed is printed as an appendix to the Journal of said Convention for the year 1892; and as your Committee were advised that the most prudent and proper course, to effect the purpose of their appointment, would be to secure from the said Rev. Benjamin S. Bronson a deed in the nature of a release from the conditions imposed by said original deed of donation:

The chairman of your Committee, on behalf of himself and his associates, communicated with the said donor, and explained to him the desire and purpose of the Convention of the Diocese of North Carolina for the enlargement of said Board of Managers, in order to a better and more adequate representation of the Church throughout the whole State of North Carolina in the support and management of this important Institution. With prompt and generous appreciation of these purposes, the Rev. Mr. Bronson thereupon executed a deed of release, removing the stipulations and restrictions of his original deed of donation, and enabling the Convention of said Diocese to exercise a wide discretion in providing for the government and administration of said Institution. This will fully appear

by an examination of said deed of release, a copy of which is annexed to this report. [See Appendix B.]

This said deed of release was duly executed, and has been properly recorded in the office of the register of deeds of Mecklenburg County, North Carolina.

Subsequently to the execution and recording of said deed of release a meeting of your Committee considered the matters referred to them and agreed unanimously upon the following recommendations, which are respectfully submitted to the consideration of this Convention:

The Chairman was authorized to communicate with the Bishops of East Carolina and Asheville, and to inform them of the desire of the Diocese of North Carolina that their respective Conventions should elect members of the said Board of Managers, as provided in the following recommendations which your Committee beg leave to submit:

- (1) That the number of Managers of the Thompson Orphanage and Training Institution, until further action by the Convention of this Diocese, be fixed at fifteen, in addition to the Bishop of North Carolina, who, by the terms of both the deeds of the Rev. Benjamin S. Bronson. is *ex officio* a member and the Chairman of said Board. Of these fifteen members, nine shall be elected by the Convention of the Diocese of North Carolina, four by the Convention of the Diocese of East Carolina, and two by the Convention of the Missionary District of Asheville.
- (2) That two of the members elected from the Diocese of North Carolina, and one of those elected from East Carolina, shall be women.
- (3) That said members shall be elected as follows: cese of North Carolina, in addition to the present members, there shall be elected by the Convention of 1916 one member for a term of two years, three members for a term of four years, and three members for a term of six years; and thereafter every second year three members shall be elected for a term of six years, to fill the places of those whose terms have expired by limitation. In East Carolina. in addition to the present members, whose terms expire in 1920, two members shall be elected by the Convention of 1916 for a term of six years; and thereafter two members shall be elected for a term of six years whenever vacancies occur by expiration of the term. In the District of Asheville two members shall be elected by the Convention of 1916 for a term of six years; and thereafter two members for a like term when vacancies occur by expiration of the term. Any of these Conventions may at any session elect members of said Board to fill vacancies in their representation caused by death or resignation.
- (4) That five members of the Board, not including the Bishop of North Carolina, shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of all business which might be transacted by a majority of the Board.

(5) That the deed of release of the Rev. Benjamin S. Bronson, executed as above mentioned, be printed as an appendix to the Journal of this Convention of 1916.

Your Committee further report that their Chairman, in accordance with the action of this Convention under the authority of the resolution under which this Committee was appointed, has communicated with the Bishops of East Carolina and Asheville, has informed them of the action of this Committee, and of the authority given it by this Convention; and has requested them to call the attention of their respective Conventions to the privilege accorded them of electing directly by their own action members of the said Board of Managers, and to secure the election of members as above provided for.

Your Committee offer the following resolutions:

Resolved. 1. That the action of the Committee as above set forth is hereby approved.

Resolved. 2. That the recommendations above submitted, and numbered (1), (2), (3), (4), and (5), are hereby adopted as the action of this Convention of the Diocese of North Carolina, and shall stand as resolutions of the same.

Resolved, 3, That the communications made by the Chairman of the Committee, as above specified, are hereby approved and confirmed as the action of this Convention.

All of which is respectfully submitted,

The report was adopted by the Convention.

The Rev. Alfred S. Lawrence, from a Committee of the last Convention on the *status* of certain parishes, presented the following report which was referred to the Committee on Canons:

The Committee appointed to consider the status of certain parishes in the Diocese desire to call the attention of the Convention to the fact that there are fifteen parishes in this Diocese that last year gave less than \$500 for Minister's salary. This fact does not seem to be in accordance with the provisions of Canon XXI, where, when the parish was formed, the Congregation certified "that we have the ability and that it is our purpose to employ and support a regular minister."

Nevertheless, as the lack of funds in some of these cases may be due to temporary conditions, your Committee consider that the case may be best met by an amendment to the Constitution. We therefore recommend the adoption of the following as Section 6 of Article IX of the Constitution, the present article 6 becoming article 7:

"Section 6. Any Parish which is not self-supporting, and which does not for two consecutive years pay at least one-fourth of the salary of the minister serving it, shall be dissolved, and be rated as a Mission."

On motion of the Rev. E. A. Osborne the Convention resolved to exempt the appointment of additional members of the Board of Managers of the Orphanage from the application of By-Law XVII and to submit their nomination to a Committee which the Bishop appointed as follows: The Rev. Francis M. Osborne and Cyprian P. Willcox; Messrs. James H. Webb, Charles F. Clayton, and Ralph Coit.

On motion of the Rev. Henry T. Cocke, an invitation to occupy honorary seats in the Convention was extended to any Clergy of the Diocese present not entitled to vote, also, to all visiting clergymen and candidates for orders.

On motion of Mr. Charles E. Johnson, the Treasurer was authorized to pay the traveling expenses of clergymen present canonically resident in the Diocese but not members of the Convention.

The Archdeacons presented their reports, which were referred to the Committee on the State of the Church. (See Appendix B.)

A message was received from the Bishops, Clergy and Brotherhood men of the Diocese of Ohio extending to the Churchmen of North Carolina a cordial invitation to attend the Thirty-first Annual Convention of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew at Cleveland, from the fourth to the eighth day of October next. The Secretary was instructed to send a suitable reply of thanks, and of acceptance should our attendance be possible.

On motion of Dr. Lay, the Rules of Order were so amended as to transfer the Elections by ballot from the afternoon of the third day to the third place on the afternoon of the second day, and the time for making nominations to follow immediately the appointment of hours of Convention on the afternoon of the first day. Also, to change the title of the Reports of Archdeacons to read, Reports of Convocations, in the order of the first day.

A recess was then taken until 8:30 o'clock, when Evening Prayer was said, the Bishop read his Annual Address, and Dr. Charles II. Herty addressed the Convention on the Church Pension Fund.

The Convention then adjourned.

SECOND DAY.

CHURCH OF THE HOLY INNOCENTS, HENDERSON,

Wednesday, May 17, 1916.

The Holy Communion was celebrated at 7:30 o'clock a. m., by the Bishop, assisted by the Rev. William H. Hardin and L. W. Blackwelder.

At 9:30 Morning Prayer was said by the Rev. Thomas L. Trott and Henry C. Smith. The Bishop took the chair and called the Convention to order.

The minutes of yesterday were read and approved.

The Bishop submitted sundry communications from the General Board of Religious Education, the Social Service Commission and the University of the South, which, on motion, were referred to the Committee on Finance.

The Rev. N. C. Hughes presented an application from St. Thomas' Church, Sanford, to be admitted as an organized mission into union with the Convention. Referred to Committee on New Parishes.

The Rev. Isaac W. Hughes presented the following report:

The Special Commission appointed at the last Convention "to take into consideration the matter of percentage in the raising of the Episcopal and Contingent Fund, with especial reference to the inclusion of rectories at sixteen per cent of the rector's salary as a part of the basis of rating," beg leave to make the following report:

That we have carefully gone over the data in hand relating to the

present basis of rating. We find that, if paid, the amount accruing is more than sufficient to defray the current expenses of the Diocese—expenses which, in the last few years, have markedly increased.

We take it that with the quickened and broadening movement of the Diocese there will be, of necessity, greater obligations resting upon it. That is as it should be. But as parishes and missions grow, through the method of assessment now in use, automatically they adjust themselves, in part at least, to their further liabilities. Any radical change in these must be met as they present themselves.

We have said that, if paid. the amounts accruing by the present basis of rating would be more than sufficient to defray the current expenses of the Diocese.

For the most part, of course, they are paid. But sums which severally are small, by comparison, in the aggregate bulk large.

We do not believe that a merely vertical lift of rating will meet the situation. The body is one. Each part is related to every other part, and to the whole. If one member fails to function, you do not increase the competency of the whole by forcing its service upon the others. On the contrary, it atrophies, while the added strain to the others tends to weaken the whole.

The Diocese is an integral part of the Kingdom of God, which we say is "the mystical Body of Christ." Each parish and mission is an integral part of the Diocese. The Diocese cannot do its best work or render its full service except as each part of it is not only alive to itself, but to its true relationship to the whole Diocese, and corporately functions. The part has no life without the body, the body lives only limitedly in the part.

We would, therefore, most earnestly and seriously urge upon each parish and mission, men and women, each rector and minister in charge, the sacredness of their obligation to the work of the Diocese. Compared with what is expended upon themselves as individuals, or the work locally, that which is the minimum of requirement for the Diocese at large is insignificant. Stress this more and more as of primary importance, as it is, and we believe that not only will arrearages practically disappear, but contingencies and emergencies will lose their too frequently depressive gloom.

As to the second matter for consideration, "the inclusion of rectories at sixteen per cent of the rector's salary as a part of the basis of rating." your Commission find that not only some of the stronger parishes have rectories, but a number of missions struggling upward. and smaller parishes sadly, and in some instances pathetically, depleted by depopulation and shifting local conditions, for which they are in no sense responsible. To lay an extra tax upon these for no reason but their foresight, forehandedness, and tender care for the minister of God who serves them, would seem not only to put an

uncalled for burden upon those who are least able to bear it, discriminate against their wisdom and zeal, but turn what should be a commendable asset into an irritating liability. Your Commission unanimously adjudge it irreconcilable with any principle of equitable assessment.

The Rev. Francis M. Osborne moved to refer the report back to the Committee for further information, but the motion was lost.

The Rev. R. B. Owens presented the following

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CANONS.

The Committee on Canons, to whom was referred by the last Convention certain proposed amendments to the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese, respectfully report as follows:

I. On page 24 of the Journal will be found an amendment of Article III of the Constitution which was referred back to the Committee for consideration in connection with Article IX of the same. Inasmuch as the purpose of the proposed amendment is already provided for in Article IX, we advise that the amendment be not adopted.

[The amendment was not adopted.—Secretary.]

II. On page 45 of the Journal is a Canon proposed by the Rev. Dr. Lay. creating a *Committee on Apportionments*, which having been adversely reported by the Committee on Canons, was referred back to them with instruction to reconsider and report to this Convention. We recommend that a Special Committee be appointed to take the matter under consideration, and to report to the Convention.

[It was so ordered. The Bishop appointed as members of the Committee called for, the Rev. John L. Jackson and Robert E. Roe. and Messrs. James A. Robinson, Walter G. Rogers, and Clarence E. Frick.—Secretary.]

III. On page 49 of the same, the Committee on Canons are directed to report an amendment to Canon XXVI, to bring it into conformity with the ruling of the General Convention as found on said page 49. We therefore offer the following resolution:

Resolved. That Canon XXVI be amended by adding to section 6 the words: But the minister in charge of every congregation shall

also report separately for statistical purposes as actual communicants the number of communicants who, he has reason to believe, have not failed to receive the Holy Communion at least once in the last three years.

[The resolution was adopted.—Secretary.]

IV. The last Convention having referred to the Committee on Canons an amendment proposed by the Rev. M. A. Barber in reference to the Church Pension Fund, we have considered the same and offer the following resolution:

Resolved, That the following Canon, to be numbered Canon XXX. be adopted by this Convention: (See Appendix B.)

[The resolution offered by the Committee was adopted, and the Bishop appointed as members of the Committee on the Church Pension Fund, the Rev. Milton A Barber, Mr. Graham H. Andrews, and Mr. Gavin H. Dortch.—Secretary.]

The Committee further report that they have considered a resolution offered by the Rev. Mr. Lawrence, proposing an amendment of Artivle IX of the Constitution by the adoption of a new section to follow section 5, as follows:

Any Parish which is not self-supporting, and which does not for two consecutive years pay at least one-fourth of the salary of the minister serving it, shall be dissolved and be rated as a Mission.

The Committee recommend that this amendment be not adopted.

[The amendment was not adopted.—Secretary.]

R. B. OWENS. Chairman.

The Rev. S. S. Bost presented the following report of the Special Committee on the Report of the Trustees of St. Mary's School:

The Special Committee to whom was referred the Report of the Trustees of St. Mary's School have carefully considered that report, and find, among other things, the following conditions:

- 1. The School, for several years, has not only been self-supporting. but it has also been required annually to pay out of its current income between two and three thousand dollars for interest on the funded debt, and also between two and three thousand dollars a year for scholarships created by the Dioceses of the Carolinas. That is to say, a drain of about five thousand dollars a year has been made upon the regular income, to say nothing of thousands of dollars which have gone for permanent improvement of the property. Your Committee is informed that within the last eighteen years about one hundred thousand dollars has been spent out of the regular income for improvements, scholarships, etc.
- 2. The profits from the School do not justify and cannot stand such a strain and drain upon its resources. The Church in the Caro-

linas MUST pay off this funded debt of forty thousand dollars and relieve the School of this burden of interest. The situation grows very serious and critical, and calls for deep and serious consideration and decisive action of the Church.

- 3. A sufficient endowment should be raised to take care of the scholarships, and,
- 4. Another endowment which shall guarantee such repairs and improvements as shall be needed from time to time.

Your Committee offer the following resolution:

Resolved. That the Convention of the Diocese of North Carolina adopt in full the report of the Board of Trustees of St. Mary's School, and give its hearty coöperation to the plan outlined in said report for raising (1) the funded debt of forty thousand dollars, and (2) for raising an endowment sufficient for the needs of St. Mary's School.

On motion of the Rev. A. S. Lawrence, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved. That the whole matter of the status of Parishes and Organized Missions and other congregations, and their representation and rights in the Diocesan Convention, be referred to a Special Committee to report to the next Convention.

The Committee was appointed by the Bishop as follows: The Rev. George W. Lay, and Sidney S. Bost; Messrs. Edward G. Muse, William L. Wall, Samuel S. Nash, and Henry A. London.

Mr. William A. Erwin presented the following report:

The Committee appointed to report upon the Report of the Trustees of the Diocese, having carefully considered the same. recommend that it be adopted.

The Rev. E. A. Osborne presented the report of the Committee on a Centennial Celebration of the organization of the Church in North Carolina, as follows:

The Committee appointed in 1914 to cooperate with similar committees from the Diocese of East Carolina and the Missionary District of Asheville, to consider the advisability and practicability of holding a Centennial Convention of the Church in North Carolina in New Bern in 1917, respectfully report:

That at a joint meeting held in Raleigh at the Bishop's residence on the 18th of January, 1916, in which the two Dioceses of North Carolina and East Carolina were represented, the following action was taken:

Resolved, First: That a Centennial Celebration be held in the town of New Bern about the usual time of the meeting of the Conventions of North and East Carolina in 1917.

Resolved, Second: That said Centennial Celebration be held on Ascension Day, 1917, and that each Council or Convention be requested to arrange their business meetings so that they may each attend the celebration.

Resolved. Third: That the Rev. Wm. E. Cox act as a Committee of One to arrange a program and to have general charge of the celebration, and that the Rev. Robert B. Owens be requested to act as an auxiliary, to render such assistance as shall be called for.

Resolved, Fourth: That the Rector of Christ Church, New Bern, be made a member ex officio of all Centennial committees.

Resolved, Fifth: That the Rev. Bartholomew F. Huske and Mr. G. Pollok Burgwyn be appointed a Committee to select and purchase a suitable tablet, procure designs, and decide on inscriptions for the same, etc., etc.

Resolved. Sixth: That the Rev. Edwin A. Osborne act as a Committee of One to communicate with the Bishop and Council of the Jurisdiction of Asheville and convey to them a cordial invitation of this joint Committee, as representing the Dioceses of East and North Carolina, to participate in the proposed Centennial Celebration.

Resolved, Seventh: That the expenses incident to the purchase and preparation of the tablet be met jointly by the two Dioceses of East and North Carolina as Dioceses.

Your Committee therefore offers the following resolution:

Resolved, That the foregoing proceedings of the Joint Committee be approved, and that your Committee be discharged.

Wednesday, May 17, 3 p. m.

The Bishop called the Convention to order.

The Rev. L. W. Blackwelder presented the following report:

The Committee on Unfinished Business beg leave to report that no action has been taken by the Convention on the postponed Report No. 5, as found on page 44 of the Journal of the last Convention, nor on Report No. 7, on page 45.

On motion of the Rev. John B. Gibble, the first of these was referred to a Special Committee with instructions to report to the next Convention. The Bishop appointed as members of this Committee the Rev. E. A. Osborne, R. B. Owens and John B. Gibble; Messrs. Wade R. Brown and Albert L. Cox.

The Rev. R. B. Owens presented the following

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CANONS.

The Committee on Canons having considered the amendment proposed by the Rev. Dr. Lay, approve the same and offer the following resolution:

Resolved. That Article IX, section 6, of the Constitution be amended by inserting after the words "Contingent fund," in line three, the words, or shall have failed to observe the conditions of Canon XXX, Section 7, on the Church Pension Fund.

The resolution contained in the report was adopted, and referred for ratification to the next Convention.

The Rev. Francis M. Osborne offered a resolution authoriz-

ing the Treasurer to borrow funds for certain purposes, and on his motion it was referred to the Committee on Canons.

The Rev. Isaac W. Hughes offered the following resolutions, which were adopted:

Resolved. 1. That the Convention, convinced of the invaluable service rendered to the Church by St. Mary's School, acknowledges its obligation to promote its interests to the fullest extent.

2. That as individuals and as a body, recognizing not only the present needs of the institution, but our responsibility for its future progress and development, we earnestly pledge ourselves in time and money to coöperate heartily with the Trustees in whatever plan they deem wisest and most fit for the bringing about of St. Mary's fullest development.

The Bishop appointed as Tellers of the regular elections the Rev. Theodore Andrews and Mr. Sterling M. Gary, who proceeded to collect the ballots. Mr. F. P. Haywood was allowed to withdraw his name as a nominee for the office of Treasurer, and on his motion the Secretary was instructed to cast the vote of the Convention for Mr. Charles E. Johnson, who was thereupon declared elected.

The Rev. Dr. Delany presented the following memorial from the Convocation of the Colored People of the Diocese:

To the Rt. Rev. Father in God, the Bishop of the Diocese of North Carolina, and Brethren of the Convention in the 190th Annual Session.

FATHER AND BRETHREN IN CHRIST:—Your Colored brethren send greeting in the Lord.

The Convocation of the Colored People would most respectfully invite the attention of this Convention to a consideration of the subject and action thereon again of the "Racial Episcopate." The General Convention of the Church will meet, God willing, in the city of St. Louis next October. In 1913, when the Convention met in New York City, after a failure to get concurrent action of the House of Deputies in what the House of Bishops decided by a majority vote was best for the advancement of the work among colored people, the matter was placed in the hands of a Joint Commission to report at the next sitting of the Convention. The Commission has on its board men who are both for and against the missionary jurisdiction plan, and up to this present time it is not generally known whether or no they will report favorably as viewed from the standpoint of your colored brethren. We desire, therefore, to address you on this sub-

ject, and point out to you the real situation as looked at from our side, and at the same time give such information as will show to you the reasonableness of our contention.

After a half century of freedom the American Negro has proved himself in the land of his adoption a necessary asset in almost every walk of life. In the wonderful development of the Southland during the past two or three decades, Negro labor has been a necessity. He has learned to work, and that fact has aided much in quickening his aspirations, thereby causing him to live alongside of his white neighbor, accumulating property, educating his children, assimilating to a large extent those elements characteristic of the better class of your people; and at the same time remaining just as separate and distinct in things purely social as one's fingers on his hands. But, unhappily for the colored people, the Church's work among them has been very meager. The little part, however exercised by this Church towards evangelization of Afro-Americans has meant much in directing them rightly. There are about 10.000,000 of colored people, and the little efforts so far made are not at all comparable to the opportunities within reach of this Church. of this large number of colored people not more than 25,000 are directly influenced by the Church's teaching. A little more than 50 per cent of the entire Negro population are not directly influenced by any organized Christian body. A large majority of Clergy and laity feel that the crying need is a change of our present system, thereby giving us a larger part and share in the work that means for our good and uplift. Our contention is not uncatholic, as we conceive the practice of the Church in its early days. To quote a recent writer in the Living Church: "This plan has been faulted as being contrary to Catholic polity, making jurisdiction concurrent vet independent instead of territorial. Admitting the fact that in the West at any rate this is an unusual thing and that the ordinary normal method of extending the Episcopate is in the diocesan system, we must not forget that other methods have been used and have not been condemned by the Church as uncatholic. In this case we have a very close analogy in the condition in many places in Apostolic times, where large Jewish and Gentile Christian populations were living side by side. In that case there was not even color to aid in distinguishing one from the other, but any attempt to mix the two led to disaster. There were two races living in the same territory, largely speaking the same language, subject to the same civil authorities, yet absolutely separate in social and religious customs. The Apostolic Church met the issue by committing the Gospel of the Circumcision to St. Peter, and the mission to the Gentile to St. Paul. There was no worry over the fact that they were working in the same place at the same time." But this point needs no argument, as it is generally understood that the Church may make such provision as will give to colored Churchmen a status.

- (a) It is therefore proposed: "That the House of Bishops may establish Missionary Districts upon racial lines, *i. e.*, for a specified race or races, within the bounds of Dioceses and Missionary Districts, authorized in section 1, severally or in such groupings as it may determine: *Provided*, that in case of a Diocese such racial jurisdiction within the Diocesan borders shall first be ceded by the Bishop and Convention of the Diocese.
- "(b) In the interpretation of the Constitution and Canons, the people and churches of such Racial Missionary Districts shall occupy the same relation to the General Convention and have the same rights of representation therein as other Domestic Missionary Districts.
- "(c) No such cession by a Diocese or division of a Missionary District shall carry with it the members of the ceded race who may be or become members of congregations not included in such cession or division.
- "(d) The House of Bishops may from time to time change, increase, or diminish the territory into which such Racial Missionary District extends, in such manner as may be prescribed by canon.
- "(e) Such racial jurisdiction within the bounds of a Diocese may be retroceded by the House of Bishops, if the Bishop and Convention of such Diocese shall consent to receive it."

This plan gives to the Negroes the opportunity of true leadership by the best of their own race, and at the same time will remove all bitterness and apparent social friction. The Church at the same time will be making it possible for a much larger influx of the colored people within her fold. They remain away now largely because of the often repeated utterance: "The Episcopal Church is the white man's Church, and there is no chance for us ever reaching the place of leadership among our people; hence, we will remain for the most part in our own churches, governed and directed by our own leaders." But for us who love the Church and would rather die than leave the object of our first love and devotion, we pity our own flesh and blood, and are contending for their sake and for the sake of generations to come that the Church make it possible for us to reach more largely the rank and file of our people.

In our former memorial we laid especial stress on comparisons between the several departments proposing a Missionary District for the Negroes and the relative numerical strength of these departments in communicants and Clergy.

Since that memorial was presented there has been a readjustment of these departments by the Church into new divisions or provinces. The former Fourth Department is now the Province of Sewanee. Having 7.160 colored communicants, it lacks only 293 of being equal in membership with the Province of Washington, while its 115 congregations surpass by 45 the number of congregations in the former,

and the number of the Clergy, 66, more than double the Clergy, 30, in the Province of Washington.

Thus it is seen that the greatest strength of the Church among the colored people lies within the Province of Sewanee, and the greatest number of our people live within this area, thus making it an ideal territory for the establishment of a Missionary District.

Now, the number of colored communicants throughout the Church of congregations exclusively colored is reported as 25.759; Clergy, 142. This is 6.661 members more than the last official Government census reports, the number therein given being 19,098.

According to the census, the Protestant Episcopal Church shows an increase in every way over the last census. But can we rest satisfied with such a small membership as compared with the denominations? And are we not moved even to greater depths of concern when we compare this small number to the great mass of Negroes who are untouched by the Church?

There were 3,685,097 Negro communicants distributed throughout the various denominations. Note what a small proportion this great Church of ours has gathered into its fold. The Presbyterians, Baptists. Methodists, who have Negro organizations attached, outnumber us in their colored communicants, the Methodists having much the largest number, 308,551, the Baptists 32,639, and the Presbyterians 27,799. And what has surprised us not a little, the Roman Catholic Church has been steadily though quietly gaining a foothold among our people until now they have a membership of 38,235, more than double our number.

Perhaps the most notable circumstance in the statistics of the religious bodies among the Negroes is that the greatest number of communicants belong to those bodies which are exclusively Negro, the total number of such members being 3.207,307. More than 2,000,000 of these are Baptists; 852,315 of them are Methodists, the A. M. E. Church having 494,777; the A. M. E. Z. Church 184,542, and the C. M. E. Church 172,996. These bodies, too, are increasing more rapidly than those that are attached organizations, holding 85.4 per cent of the entire Negro organizations, 87 per cent of all members being enrolled among them; they have 83.2 per cent of all the Sunday School scholars; and hold 67 per cent of all the parsonages and 78.9 per cent of the total value of church property.

This excellent progress is due largely to the opportunities of growth and development in leadership, initiative, and self-dependence.

We sincerely believe that like opportunities opening to our people through the Missionary District plan, with a Bishop or with Bishops of our own race, with representation and voice in the General Convention, will cause a healthy growth in membership such as we have not hitherto experienced.

We would not wish to lose contact entirely with the Christian

brotherhood of the Church. Therefore we ask that this plan be adopted, so that though we may be separate members we may at the same time be inseparable from the main body; while separate branches we may all be united in the True Vine.

- (1) We most earnestly and respectfully, then, desire that this Convention reaffirm its position for Racial Missionary Bishops. taken at the Convention of 1913, and urge the Commission on the Racial Episcopate to report their findings to the General Convention next October in favor of the adoption of our proposed legislation;
- (2) That the following memorial and petition be sent to the Commission on the Racial Episcopate from this Convention, to wit: That it may please the Commission to recommend and urge upon the General Convention, to assemble in St. Louis in October of this present year, that legislation be enacted (as already proposed) by that body to provide that the Negroes resident within the area of the Province of Sewanee. or part thereof, with their lands and properties, may be constituted in a Missionary District of this Church, and a Missionary Bishop of the Negro race may be elected to be the Missionary Bishop thereof:
- (3) And in particular do we request that this Convention will pursue the same course through its Secretary as was done with such telling effect in 1913, viz., that the Secretary of the Diocese be instructed to forward copies of the memorial to each of the deputies to the next General Convention from the various Dioceses and Missionary Districts composing the Province of Sewanee, with the request that they join us in the objects of the memorial.

Finally, your colored brethren will continue faithful in the future to the trust committed to their keeping, as they have endeavored to do in the past; ever confident that He who has begun a good work in us "will perform it until the day of Jesus Christ."

The Rev. Lewis N. Taylor offered the following preamble and resolution, which were referred to the Committee on New Parishes:

Whereas, The town of Williamsboro has been so greatly depopulated that it can hardly be now considered a village; and,

WHEREAS. The once flourishing congregation of St. John's Parish, Williamsboro, has been greatly reduced by many removals; and,

Whereas. Owing to the trend of population away from old St. John's Church towards Townsville, a new church and a new congregation has been built up. and the services of the Church are regularly maintained there, so that St. John's Parish, Williamsboro, is now a misnomer;

WHEREAS, Furtherfore, there are many treasured historic associations belonging to old St. John's that ought not to be effaced, and also many tender memories binding old members of the Parish to the building and the name which ought to be respected, we therefore ask the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved. That the bounds of the Parish, now known as St. John's. Williamsboro, be so enlarged as to include the new congregation and church building at Townsville, and that the former official title of St. John's, Williamsboro, be changed to St. John's Parish, Vance County.

The Rev. John B. Gibble presented the following report:

We, the members of the Committee to whom was referred the Report of the Managers of the Thompson Orphanage and Training Institution, and also that of a Special Committee on the location of the same, commend the resolutions proposed in these reports and move their adoption.

We note with gratification the improvements in the Orphanage property and the increased productiveness of the farm as shown in the report of the Superintendent referred to us, and trust that the time will speedily come when a larger number of children may receive the careful and loving Christian nurture of this most worthy Institution.

The Committee appointed to raise our part of the endowment of the University of the South under the Nelson plan have made no special effort to raise funds this year in view of the fact that the University authorities have chosen this year to make a thoroughgoing effort to raise the debt of the University. However, the Committee are much gratified to note that the apportionment made for Sewanee last year has for the most part been paid; they therefore offer the following resolutions:

Resolved, That the same apportionment for the University of the South be made this year.

Resolved. That this Convention authorize the Treasurer to pay out of the amount raised in this Diocese by apportionment for the University of the South the sum of \$25 towards defraying the traveling expenses of each one of our clerical and lay Trustees who attends the annual meeting of the Trustees at Sewanee, and that this be a standing rule of the Diocese until repealed.

WHEREAS. The University of the South is now engaged in a canvass to raise \$300,000 to pay her accumulated debts, and has asked this Diocese to raise \$18,000 as our share of this amount; therefore, be it

Resolved. That this Convention earnestly endorses this movement and calls upon all who are able to do so to coöperate with the Committee appointed by the Bishop to handle this matter, and to give generously to this fund.

The Forward Movement Committee of the Convocation of Raleigh began active work in October last, and since that time have visited the following eighteen Parishes and Missions. viz.: Good Shepherd, Rocky Mount: St. Matthew's. Hillsboro; St. Philip's, Durham; St. Alban's, Littleton: St. Mark's, Halifax; St. John's, Battleboro; Calvary, Tarboro; Trinity, Scotland Neck; Emmanuel. Warrenton; Grace, Weldon; St. Stephen's. Duke; St. Paul's. Smithfield: Chapel of the Cross. Chapel Hill; St. Peter's, Stovall; Heavenly Rest, Middleburg; Advent, Enfield; St. Timothy's. Wilson; Holy Trinity Mission, Townsville.

The Committee, with the assistance of other persons, have given in all thirty-two days to these places, and have made a total of 56 addresses in the interest of missions.

In almost every instance the result has been most gratifying, and in the Every Member Canvass there has been a notable increase both in pledges for missions and for current expenses.

The Committee wish especially to express their thanks to the Rev. Wm. E. Cox and Mr. G. B. Elliott, of Wilmington, and to the Rev. R. B. Owens and Mr. F. S. Spruill, of Rocky Mount, for their great assistance in carrying on this work.

THIRD DAY.

Church of the Holy Innocents, Henderson, Thursday, May 18, 1916.

The Holy Communion was celebrated at 7:30 o'clock a.m. by the Rev. N. C. Hughes, assisted by the Rev. Henry C. Smith.

The Convention assembled at 9:30 o'clock for Morning Prayer, which was said by the Rev. F. M. Osborne and C. P. Willeox.

The Bishop then took the chair and called the convention to order.

The minutes having been read and approved, the Tellers appeared and announced as the result of the first ballot, the election of the Rev. M. A. Barber and A. B. Hunter as members of the Standing Committee, and that of the Rev. Mr. Barber and Mr. J. C. Buxton as deputies to the General Convention.

On a second ballot Dr. R. H. Lewis was elected for the Standing Committee and Messrs. Wm. A. Erwin and F. P. Haywood for the Delegation to the General Convention; on the third the Rev. S. S. Bost and Mr. J. B. Cheshire were chosen as members of the Standing Committee, and the Rev. A. B. Hunter, I. W. Hughes, and R. B. Owens were elected as clerical deputies, and Mr. Charles H. Herty as lay deputy to the General Convention.

The Rev. John L. Jackson presented the following

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON NEW PARISHES.

1. The Committee on New Parishes having considered the application of the Organized Mission of St. Thomas' Church, Sanford, to be admitted into union with the Convention, find that all canonical requirements in the case have been complied with, and therefore offer the following resolution:

Resolved, That St. Thomas' Mission, Sanford, be admitted into union with the Convention of the Diocese, and that Mr. James Pardo be accredited as a delegate from said Mission to this Convention.

2. The Committee to whom was referred the application of St. John's Parish, Williamsboro, for a change in its official title, having considered the circumstances and finding no reasonable objection to compliance with the petition, offer the resolution proposed in the application.

The resolutions were, on motion, adopted, and Mr. Pardo took his seat as a member of the Convention from St. Thomas' Mission, Sanford.

The Rev. Alfred S. Lawrence presented the following report:

The Commission on Methods of Reaching the People in the Rural Districts held a meeting at the St. Mary's Conference last year, and drew up the following recommendations:

- 1. That we consider that the Diocese has responsibility for pastoral care to every person within its limits.
- 2. That the whole Diocese be geographically divided, and each part be assigned, as far as possible, to some clergyman, who shall be asked, as he is able, to visit every house in that section, to carry there the message of the Gospel, the comforts of religion, and the offices of the Church, as opportunity offers.
- 3. It shall be the object of the Clergy to find all persons with little pastoral care, or with none at all, and to make them feel that the Clergy will be glad to minister to them in all possible ways.
- 4. It is assumed that the Clergy will have the cordial assistance of the laity in this work.
- 5. A careful record should be kept of each family and its members, with postoffice address for communication by mail.
- 6. All communicants and other adherents of the Episcopal Church should be carefully listed, and a duplicate list, with postoffice address, should be sent to the Archdeacon.
- 7. It is desired that some one in each county should furnish the Commission and the Archdeacon with a road map of his county. Roads and houses should be numbered as far as possible, and the corresponding numbers attached to the notes on families.

We ask that this report be accepted by the Convention and printed in the Journal, and recommend the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved. That the Commission be continued, and be empowered to carry into effect, as far as it may be able, the provisions of the foregoing report.

The report was accepted and the resolution adopted.

The Rev. Francis M. Osborne presented the following report of the Committee on Church Work at the University of North Carolina:

The Committee on the Work of the Church at the University of North Carolina have noted with pleasure the progress of the work during the past year. The erection of the Battle Memorial Parish House promises to increase greatly the efficiency of the Church's efforts among the students. This building has been erected without debt except for the amount of about seven hundred dollars in pleages now due but still unpaid.

During the year the Parish at Chapel Hill has had to give up its Rector. Rev. Homer W. Starr, Ph.D., to a prominent South Carolina Parish. Mr. Starr leaves a united Parish and a record of diligent, capable, and helpful influence. In every way Mr. Starr has represented the Church with dignity, and spiritual and intellectual power. With grateful appreciation of his services, we wish Mr. Starr God's blessing in his new field of labor.

It is gratifying to note that the apportionment for the work has been generously and willingly met, and an amount in excess of the Bishop's pledge to the work has been paid. This balance has been turned into the Episcopal and Contingent Fund in this and former years. This your Committee disapproves of. Realizing that this is a missionary fund, and also that it is given fully and gladly because the Diocese is interested in the work among the students of the State University, we think no part of the fund should be diverted from this object. We also realize that the local Parish at Chapel Hill is put to additional expense on account of its aggressive efforts to increase the efficiency of the Church among our sons who go to Chapel Hill and become beneficiaries of the Parish rather than contributors to its life. We therefore offer the following resolution:

Resolved. That the entire amount raised this year just closed and in the future all money raised by apportionment for work at the University be kept by the Treasurer of the Diocese as a reserve for the benefit of this particular work.

The report was referred to the Committee on Finance.

The Rev. John L. Jackson, from the Special Committee appointed for the purpose, offered a resolution proposing an amendment of Canon VIII, which was referred to the Committee on Canons.

Mr. John W. Graham offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

Resolved. That all Parishes and Missions are earnestly urged to pay all assessments and apportionments quarterly in advance, and to pay all amounts now due within sixty days, so that hereafter no arrears shall appear in the Treasurer's Report.

Also, that a copy of this resolution be sent by the Secretary to the Rector or Senior Warden of each Parish or Mission, with the request to read the same to the congregation.

The Bishop offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

Resolved. That Messrs. John W. Graham, A. C. Zollicoffer, and Wm. A. Erwin be appointed a Committee to take into consideration the obligations of the Diocese under the devise in trust of the late Miss Lucy P. Thorp, of Goshen, and to advise the Trustees of the Diocese in regard thereto. And the Trustees of the Diocese are hereby authorized and empowered to make any agreement, conveyance or assurance in connection with the trust above referred to which shall be approved and recommended by the above named Committee.

The Rev. Morrison Bethea, in behalf of the Rector and congregation of St. Timothy's Church, Wilson, extended to the Convention an invitation to hold the next annual session in that church, at a time to be appointed by the Bishop. On motion, the invitation was accepted.

The Rev. A. B. Hunter presented the following

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON FINANCE.

The Committee on Finance offer the following resolutions:

- 1. Resolved. That the assessment for the Episcopal and Contingent Fund for the ensuing year be twelve and one-half per cent on the minister's salary and current expenses.
- 2. Resolved. That a two-per-cent apportionment on the minister's salary and current expenses be made for the work at Chapel Hill, and two per cent for the University of the South.
- 3. Resolved. That the sum of \$160 apportioned to this Diocese for the Province of Sewanee, and, if possible, \$69.54 apportioned for the expenses of the Joint Commission on Social Service, be paid by the Treasurer from the Episcopal and Contingent Fund.
- 4. Resolved. That \$400 be appropriated for the Carolina Churchman, and that it be paid quarterly, if at all possible.

- 5. Resolved. That the Treasurer pay half the expense of the Centennial Tablet to be placed in New Bern from the Episcopal and Contingent Fund.
- 6. Resolved, That any balance in the fund for Chapel Hill be not paid into the Episcopal and Contingent Fund, but that it be held by the Treasurer for the Chapel Hill Fund.
- 7. Resolved, That the assessment of St. Stephen's Church, Duke, be fixed at \$40; for the Church of the Messiah, Mayodan, at \$75, with \$5 each for Chapel Hill and Sewanee; and for St. Mary's, High Point, at \$50.

Resolved. That the request contained in the memorial be approved and endorsed by this Convention, and that the Deputies of this Diocese be instructed to present the same to the next session of the General Convention and ask that such action be taken thereon as may accomplish the desired object.

Resolved. That the Secretary of the Convention be instructed to forward as soon as practicable a copy of the memorial to all of the Bishops in the Province of Sewanee, with a request that they join us in our efforts to carry out the object therein expressed.

Resolved, That the Secretary of this Convention be also instructed to send a copy of said memorial to each of the Deputies of the Dioceses in the Province of Sewanee. with a request that they also join us in the effort to obtain the object sought in the memorial.

The members of the Woman's Auxiliary having entered the church, they were received by the Convention and their annual report was read by the Rev. Henry C. Smith, and that of the Branch in the Colored Convocation by the Secretary. The Rev. Messrs. Willcox and Gibble expressed the appreciation of the Convention for the faithful and efficient service of the women of the Church, after which they retired. (See Appendix B.)

The election of Alternate Deputies to the General Convention being in order, the Tellers collected the ballots.

Mr. G. Pollok Burgwyn offered the following resolution, which was adopted by a rising vote:

Resolved, That the thanks of the Convention are hereby tendered to the Rector and congregation of the Church of the Holy Innocents, and to the citizens of Henderson generally, for their hospitality in entertaining the members of the Convention and the visitors attending upon its sessions; as also to the newspapers for their reports of our proceedings.

To this action of the Convention Mr. A. C. Zollicoffer made a courteous reply.

The Rev. R. B. Owens presented the following

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CANONS.

I. The following resolution was offered by the Rev. F. M. Osborne and referred to the Committee on Canons:

WHEREAS, It is the sense of this Convention that all appropriations made by the Convention for salaries or for regular or special objects should be paid promptly by the Treasurer when due:

Be it resolved. That Canons VII and VIII be so amended as to give the Treasurer and Finance Committee of the Diocese authority to pledge the credit of the Diocese and borrow money to pay the appropriations of the Convention in the amount required.

The Committee recommend that the proposed amendment be not adopted.

[The amendment was not adopted.—Secretary.]

II. The following resolutions presented by the Rev. John L. Jackson from the Special Committee appointed for the purpose, have been referred to the Committee on Canons:

Resolved, That Canon VIII be amended by adding to section 1 the words: also a Committee on Apportionments to consist of the Bishop, and one clergyman and one layman from each of the three Convocations. And further be it

Resolved, That there be added to this Canon a new section, as follows:

Section 9. Committee on Apportionments.

The duties of the Committee on Apportionments shall be as follows:

- 1. The Committee shall obtain from the proper authorities a statement of the amounts needed for the ensuing year for the several objects authorized by the Convention, except the Episcopal and Contingent Fund, the Church Pension Fund, Diocesan Missions, and the Thompson Orphanage.
- 2. They shall make out tables of apportionments for these required objects and shall submit the same to the ministers and vestries or missionary committees of all the Parishes and congregations of the Diocese sixty days before the annual Convention, giving them the opportunity to accept, increase, decrease, or reject the same.
- 3. They shall cause to be published monthly in the *Carolina Churchman* a statement of the amounts apportioned and the amounts paid thereon by every congregation.

THURSDAY, May 18, 3 p. m.

The Convention reassembled, the Bishop in the chair.

The Bishop appointed the Commission on Social Service and the Diocesan Board of Religious Education. (See page 4.)

The Tellers appeared and reported to the Bishop, who announced the result of the ballot for Alternate Deputies to the General Convention, as follows: Receiving a majority of votes cast, Rev. S. S. Bost, E. A. Osborne, I. McK. Pittenger, D.D., and Bertram E. Brown; Messrs. D. Y. Cooper, Λ. H. Bovden and Wm. H. Ruffin.

There being still a vacancy in the lay order, the Secretary was instructed to cast the vote of the Convention for Mr. A. C. Zollicoffer, and he was declared elected.

The Rev. Alfred S. Lawrence offered the follow resolution, which was adopted:

Resolved. That the Commission on Social Service be requested to examine into the whole Orphanage System, calling in whatever expert advice they can obtain, and to report, as soon as they are able to do so, the result of their investigation to the Managers of the Thompson Orphanage, and also to report to the next Convention.

The Rev. Wm. H. Hardin presented the report of the Committee on the Carolina Churchman, as follows:

The Carolina Churchman closes the year with a circulation of 1,050 subscribers, of which number 807 are paying subscribers—an increase of 159 over last year. From this source we may count on \$700 income for the coming year and \$133 from advertisements—after making due allowance for shrinkage and losses. The financial statement of the Business Manager shows an apparent deficit of \$202 in meeting the expense of the paper, and this situation calls for renewed effort to increase the income of the paper through new subscriptions, a slight increase in the Diocesan appropriation, and economy in its expenditure. Eight hundred paid subscriptions in a Diocese of eight thousand communicants indicates that the paper finds its way into only about half the Church homes in our Diocese.

In order that the size and style of the paper may not become inferior through efforts to economize, we suggest that the Convention approve the plan of having ten instead of twelve issues of the paper each year, in its present size and style, combining the June and July numbers and the December and January numbers in "double numbers." as was the case the past year.

Be it resolved. (1) That until the Carolina Churchman becomes more nearly self-supporting it be published in its present size and style ten times during the year at the same annual price of \$1 the year.

- (2) That we call upon every reader of the paper to do what he can to increase the circulation of the paper.
- (3) That this Convention appropriate \$400 to the Carolina Churchman out of the Episcopal and Contingent Fund, to be paid quarterly in July, October, January, and April.

The first and second resolutions contained in the report were adopted, the third was referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion, the Secretary was authorized to have printed a sufficient number of copies of the Journal.

The Rev. Mr. Hunter, from the Finance Committee, presented a resolution offered by Dr. R. H. Lewis, proposing to pay towards the expenses of each Clerical Deputy to the General Convention the sum of \$75, but this, on motion of Mr. W. H. Ruffin, was raised to \$100 and agreed to.

Mr. Wm. A. Erwin addressed the Convention in regard to the University of the South, urging the importance of paying the debt.

On motion of the Rev. Dr. Lay, and with the concurrence of the Finance Committee, the Diocesan Board of Religious Education was authorized to lay upon the Parishes and Missions of the Diocese an apportionment to cover the appropriation of \$120 to the General, and \$20 to the Diocesan Board of Religious Education.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE CHURCH.

The Committee on the State of the Church have very carefully examined the Summary of Statistics for the year ending April 1. 1916, and beg leave to call the attention of the Convention to the following notable increases:

On the whole the report shows a healthy condition of the Church, with no notable decreases and many important increases.

It should be noted that the amount of insurance carried on Church property is less than half the value of the property as given. This is a matter which your Committee feel deserves attention.

While there has been a slight increase in the contributions for the

Colored Work in the Diocese, we are still falling far short of our duty in this matter. We again call attention to the Canon which calls for an annual offering for this work, or a corresponding appropriation on the Parish budget.

The reports of the Archdeacons show that the missionary work of the Diocese is in excellent condition, which calls for congratulations.

The splendid work being done by the Forward Movement teams in the Convocations is already beginning to bear fruit, as shown partly by the reports. Several notable Missions have been held in connection with the Nation-wide Preaching Mission, which have been productive of good results.

From the report of the Board of Managers and Superintendent of the Thompson Orphanage and Training Institution it would seem that the Institution was never in better condition, either financially or otherwise, than at present. It is hoped that our people throughout the Diocese will come to regard this Institution as something more than a place to feed and shelter orphan children; but also as a Church school in a very real sense.

The Auxiliaries throughout the Diccese have rendered active and aggressive service.

Your Committee offer the following resolutions:

Resolved. (1) That the Secretary be directed to publish annually in the Journal, under the heading "Summary of Statistics," the statistics for the Diocese for the current year and for the year preceding, with the amount of increase or decrease, if any.

Resolved. (2) That the Every Member Canvass Committee, as appointed at the last Convention, be continued until every congregation in the Diocese has been visited.

APPENDIX A.

ADDRESS OF THE BISHOP.

Brethren of the Clergy and Laity:

We are happy in the circumstances of our meeting in this vigorous and progressive parish. We observe already many evidences, not only of kindly welcome and entertainment, but also of local enterprise and devotion in the work of the parish, and of earnest sympathy and coöperation of the rector and people in the business and purposes of this our annual council.

The Church of the Holy Innocents, Henderson, for nearly forty years past has made but one change in its rectorship. For thirty years it was administered by one godly, able, and well-learned man, who amid difficulties and discouragements hardly to be avoided in the work of any earnest and conscientious pastor, laid a strong foundation and stamped the principles of piety and of loval churchman-hip upon the hearts and minds of those who came under his influence and instruction. When his work had been well and thoroughly done, the parish was so fortunate as to secure another devoted and loval rector, whom the people have enthusiastically supported in his large and generous plans for advancing the influence and activities of the parish. We see the result of these two rectorships partially represented in the material fabrics of the Church and parish house, and in St. John's Chapel in the northern section of the town. But these material evidences only partly represent the spirit of active interest in the hearts of the people which has its effect in all directions, and puts the parish in the front rank in all departments of our diocesan and general Church work.

This is the one hundredth annual Convention of the Diocese of North Carolina, and therefore begins the year whose completion in the spring of 1917 will round out the first century of our diocesan organization. As some of you remember, an attempt was made to effect a diocesan organization of the Church in North Carolina during the last decade of the eighteenth century; and conventions with this purpose met in Tarborough in 1790, 1793, and 1794. At the last of these the Rev. Charles Pettigrew was chosen to be Bishop, deputies were appointed to attend the General Convention to be held

at Philadelphia in 1795, and a Standing Committee was elected. But the Church throughout the United States was so weak and widely scattered that only during the sessions of the General Convention could three Bishops be gotten together for the Consecration of another Bishop. Mr. Pettigrew was prevented from reaching Philadelphia to attend the General Convention of 1795 by quarantine regulations incident to an outbreak of yellow fever. Before another opportunity occurred his failing health disabled him from undertaking so arduous a work, and his death soon after brought to an end this first effort to effect diocesan organization.

In 1817 there were fewer clergymen and congregations in the state than there had been in 1794, but they were of a more hopeful and confident spirit. Three clergymen and delegates from four parishes met in Christ Church, Newbern, April 24, 1817, and organized the Diocese of North Carolina. It is proposed to observe the anniversary of that first Convention by a meeting in Newbern a year hence. A report will be laid before this Convention providing for such a commemoration. I have no doubt of your cordial coöperation in the plans prepared by your committee in conjunction with the Committee of the Diocese of East Carolina.

Since our last annual gathering one of our brethren of the Clergy has been called to his rest, the Rev. Josephus Mc-Donald, a colored Priest, who died of typhoid fever April 3, 1916, in St. Agnes' Hospital, Raleigh. He was a native of the Island of St. Croix, Danish West Indies, but was educated at St. Augustine's School, Raleigh, and at the Philadelphia Divinity School, where he was graduated in the Class of He was a diligent student and was accounted a good scholar and a man of earnest character and of a pure and devout life. Having been ordained Deacon in the Church of St. Ambrose, Raleigh, June 29, 1913, he served two years as missionary to the negroes in Greensboro and Winston, but only a year ago was ordained to the Priesthood by me, May 9th, and became Chaplain and Librarian of St. Augustine's School. He served faithfully and acceptably in this position, with the respect and affection of all who were brought into contact with him. His death at the age of about twenty-eight years was a loss to the School and to the Church, as well as to his friends and associates.

I turn now to consider the routine of my work during the year ending March 31st, and submit that statement of my official ministrations which the Canons require that I should lay before you at these our annual meetings.

The following is a summary of my official ministrations during the year covered by this report:

- April 1. Raleigh, Chapel of St. Augustine's School, visitation: Confirmed 13 persons; made an address.
 - 2. Good Friday. Raleigh, St. Ambrose Church, visitation: Confirmed 14 persons; made an address.
 - 4. Easter Day. Raleigh: In the Church of the Good Shepherd, administered the Holy Communion. A violent snowstorm, interrupting traffic and travel, made it impossible for me to keep my appointments at Pittsboro.
 - Attended a meeting of the Executive Committee of St. Mary's School.
 - The First Sunday after Easter. 11 a. m. Southern Pines, Emmanuel Church, visitation: Preached. confirmed 5 persons, and administered the Holy Communion.
 - $8~\mathrm{p.\,m.}$ Sanford, St. Thomas's Church, visitation : Preached.
 - 12. Gulf, St. Mark's Church, visitation: Preached.

The Rev. Jacob F. Burg served until March 1st in St. Timothy's Church, Union County, under Archdeacon Hardin. Since that date he has been transferred by the Archdeacon to Hamlet, and is now serving in All Saints' Mission, Hamlet.

The Rev. Josephus McDonald, shortly after his ordination to the Priesthood was transferred from the care of the Colored Missions in Greensboro and Winston, and became Chaplain and Librarian of St. Augustine's School, where he continued faithfully and usefully employed until his lamented death, as

has already been mentioned.

The Rev. Henry C. Smith immediately after his promotion to the Priesthood was put in charge of All Saints' Mission, Roanoke Rapids, where he is developing that interesting work with enterprise and diligence, and with fair prospects of much success and usefulness.

Having a net gain of two over our number last reported, the number April 1 was 64 in all: 1 Bishop, 53 Priests, and 10 Deacons.

The candidates for Holy Orders are George Crummell Pollard, Arthur Myron Cochran, Sanford Louis Rotter, George H. W. Bullock, Basil Manly Walton, James Reginald Mallett, Howard Stetter Hartzell, and Roger Edgar Bunn.

The Postulants are Theodore Stroup, Edward Gray Joyner, William Alfred Grigg, and Jadi Levy Martin.

The Rev. Henry A. Willey's place at Mayodan, has been supplied by the Rev. Edgar VanWright Edwards, received

from the Diocese of Pennsylvania.

The Rev. Morrison Bethea, received from the Diocese of East Carolina, has become rector of St. Timothy's Church, Wilson, vacant by the departure of the Rev. A. Whitfield Cheatham.

I should add that since April 1st the Rev. Homer W. Starr has resigned the rectorship of the Chapel of the Cross, Chapel Hill, and taken letters dimissory to South Carolina, but the formal record thereof belongs to my next annual report.

The Rev. Albert New has resigned the rectorship of Grace Church, Weldon, and the Church of the Advent, Enfield, and is at present working at Waynesville, in the District of Ashe-

ville He has not taken letters dimissory.

The Rev. Francis Joyner has resigned charge of the Church of the Saviour, Jackson, and accepted in lieu thereof St. Bartholomew's, Pittsboro. During some time, at my request, Mr. Joyner gave one Sunday each month to Emmanuel Church, Warrenton.

At present Emmanuel Church, Warrenton, is very acceptably served by the Rev. Edward W. Baxter, a Priest from

the Diocese of New Westminster, British America.

The Rev. Arthur W. Taylor, Deacon, has removed from Mayodan to Mount Airy, and has been assigned to the Missions at Mount Airy, Walnut Cove, and Germanton, under the direction of Archdeacon Hardin.

The Rev. Isaac W. Hughes, of the Church of the Holy Innocents, Henderson, has become rector also of St. Paul's, Louisburg, and St. James', Kittrell, with a view of securing an assistant, to devote himself specially to the two smaller

parishes.

The Rev. Theodore Andrews, of Grace Church, Lexington, has begun an interesting mission at Thomasville, and also, since the transfer of the Rev. Mr. Loflin to Florida, has been giving very valuable assistance to Archdeacon Hardin in the

missions in Rowan County.

On the whole I am glad to be able to report that our field of work is well covered. The two or three places at present vacant will be filled in the near future. I have several promising candidates whom I expect to ordain within the next three or four months, and by some slight changes in our present arrangements I hope to provide for the better adjustment of our forces. By the employment of the newly ordained in suitable stations, under the direction of the older Clergy, our necessities will, for the most part, be adequately supplied. For one or two important points not yet provided for, we have hopes of securing clergymen at an early day. Assuming that we shall be able to fulfill our reasonable anticipations I feel justified in saying that I do not know that the Diocese has been more adequately supplied within my recollection.

I feel that in justice to our people I should also say that our Clergy are generally much more adequately supported, so far as I can judge, than they were a few years ago. Much remains to be done before we can be justified in feeling that we are doing our whole duty in this matter, but I do think that I observe some quickening of conscience among the people, and material results beginning to flow therefrom. This has been especially observed in

THE FORWARD MOVEMENT AND EVERY MEMBER CANVASS.

The Committees appointed to have charge of this movement in the several Convocations have done much faithful work in many parishes and congregations. Wherever the effort has been earnestly made the results have been most gratifying. The unvarying testimony which has come to me has been to the effect that not merely have the contributions of the people to all good works been materially increased, but that, even in a greater degree, personal interest and a sense of personal responsibility have been stimulated, to the manifest increase of spiritual life of the people and the general effectiveness of all Church enterprises. It is to be hopel that these Committees will continue their work until every congregation in the Diocese has been visited, and all our people have been aroused to a more adequate sense of the importance of the work committed to them, and of their individual responsibility for the success of God's good purposes for the world. We have been too much disposed to regard our religious duty as purely a personal interest of each one, and have forgotten that the saving of the world is laid upon us, each one according to his ability having his part of the work to do. Our very reverence for the Church and the Ministry and the Sacraments has too often taken the form of assuming that they, apart from us, were responsible for the work of Christ in the world, forgetting that Church and Ministry and Sacraments are but the expression of the life which is in the whole Body, and have no reality apart from the whole Body of the people. The Forward Movement is an attempt to bring us all to a fuller realization of the solidarity of the Body of which the smallest member is as much a part as the greatest, and to show that the whole Body must move together in harmonious and accordant action, Clergy and people, army and officers, combining in mutual zeal and devotion in the common cause.

THE CHURCH PENSION FUND.

I say that in many ways our people as a whole are manifesting greater life and devotion in the work of the Church. evidence of this we, of the Clergy, should be specially prompt to recognize and to value. The greatest financial enterprise ever undertaken by the Church at large in the United States is the creation and maintenance of the "Church Pension Fund," to secure proper provision for the necessities of our aged and infirm Clergy, and the widows and orphans of deceased clergymen. I will not here attempt any discussion of the details of the plan. There have been abundant opportunities for such consideration and discussion. In my judgment it is the only practical and adequate plan ever proposed; and whatever may be its possible defects, it has been adopted by the Church and by this Diocese, and therefore demands our united and loyal cooperation. It will doubtless be brought before you that you may adopt such methods as may make our cooperation effectual. I can not too earnestly invoke your fullest sympathy and your most generous contributions in behalf of this fund. It is, of course, specially the obligation of the lay men and women of the Church. They must provide the means for taking care of their Clergy in their old age. I need hardly say that the Clergy have, as a rule, no way of laying up for their years of disability and weakness. of you who are most generous to your good pastors will not claim that you give them enough to enable them to support themselves and their families when they can no longer work. If a clergyman by strict economy can keep his life insured for a few thousand dollars to provide a home for his widow and orphan children, he is fortunate indeed. The Church Pension Fund, if we put it into operation, will provide a minimum income of six hundred dollars annually for every clergyman upon his retirement, with a corresponding provision for

the widow and orphans of deceased dergymen and will forever take away a reproach, to which we have long been justly liable, of not providing for the poor and needy.

It is a small thing what people think of us, compared with doing our duty in God's sight, but it is perhaps worth mentioning that nothing in the recent history of our Church has made such an impression upon our brethren of other communions, and upon the most sagacious business men of the country, as this Church Pension Fund. It has been spoken of again and again by eminent men outside of our communion as a most noble and creditable enterprise, and the only truly adequate scheme ever adopted by any Christian body to meet the case of aged and disabled ministers and their families.

Our last Diocesan Convention, under the leadership of our best and ablest laymen, entered enthusiastically upon the scheme as proposed to us at that time. It has now been thoroughly organized, and I have appointed a central committee of leading laymen of the Diocese, with Dr. Chas. H. Herty as chairman, to have charge of the work. They will be calling in others to coöperate with them. I trust they will meet with a sympathetic and generous response from all, and that you will be ready to give your time, your zeal, and your money in aid of this great and necessary work.

OUR DIOCESAN INSTITUTIONS.

We must not, however, forget the claims of our more immediate and diocesan duties. Our parishes and missionaries are, as I have pointed out, fairly well supplied, and our few vacancies we hope to see filled in the near future. Our local Church work is as a rule well attended to. And I believe our Clergy and laity are not unresponsive to the demands coming from outside their immediate cures. It is therefore with confidence that I commend to your attention at this time our two chief diocesan institutions, St. Mary's School and the Thompson Orphanage and Training Institution. Important reports from the governing boards of these will be laid before you, presenting the existing conditions and the urgent needs of both. I will not go into details here, since they will come before you in the proceedings of the Convention, but I will say one thing which applies equally to both: The foundation for success both in our educational and our charitable work is to be laid in the general sympathy and cooperation of our people at large. The interest and help of those of small means is no less needed and is no less helpful than the interest of the rich and prominent. We must as a whole put our heart into all our Church work and sustain all our enterprises by the united and harmonious endeavors of all. may be said that we are in some real degree thus sustaining these two institutions, our School and our Orphanage. Wherever I go throughout the Diocese I see many evidences of the general interest felt by our people in them. And particularly in the case of the Orphanage, which in the nature of the case must depend on the regular and systematic contributions of our people, rich and poor, for its daily maintenance, there is a very general response to its claims, and our Sunday schools, parishes, missions, and guilds, throughout the State unite their weekly, monthly, and annual contributions for its support. But I think that our people have not appreciated the fact that for the enlargement and development of the Orphanage we need from time to time large and generous gifts from individuals. We can sustain the work from day to day, and from year to year, by the present means for gathering money and supplies, but we can make no great advance, we can erect no needed buildings, unless those who can give abundantly shall come forward now and then with some generous donation for a new building, cottage, or barn, or central heating plant, or some other of the greater steps in advance which are needed to bring that institution up to the demands of the work. With the exception of the gift of the late Judge Bynum, of Charlotte, to erect the Chapel, I believe no one has ever given in one donation the money for a building. Year by year we see an increasing number of our people who do not hesitate to spend one, two, three, or five thousand dollars for any personal comfort or convenience which they desire: can not some of these men and women now and then come forward and erect a building to advance the good work of the Thompson Orphanage? We have one building erected by means of funds received under the will of a generous man, the late Mr. Steadman, of Favetteville. Would it not be a happiness worth enjoying in this life to imitate such a noble gift, and to see the good work set forward by a worthy addition to the permanent buildings of our Orphanage?

The same may be said in regard to St. Mary's School. It was undertaken by this Diocese in response, as I believed, to a spontaneous demand from our Church people throughout the State, that a school which had done so much for the

Church in North Carolina and throughout the South, should be made a permanent Church institution, and placed upon an adequate foundation. In response to this call I travelled throughout the State in 1897 and 1898, and others after me helped to extend the appeal, which elicited a wide and general response, and enabled us to effect the desired object, and to secure St. Mary's School for the Church. But in order to carry that design to an adequate development, and properly to secure what has so far been effected, it is necessary that we should receive more largely than we have done up to the present time, the more generous donations of those whom God has enabled to give largely. We have received the general support of our people, and multitudes of small gifts have laid the foundations of St. Mary's, representing the love and loyalty of the many. We now need the greater gifts of the few who are blessed with great ability, and I trust that our great enterprise, the most important Church School of ours in the country, may not fail to receive that large and generous response to its claims which its past history and present efficiency entitle it to expect.

In this connection, and in conclusion, I can not refrain from mentioning the noble and timely gift to the Church of the Good Shepherd in Raleigh, by the last will and testament of that good woman, the late Mrs. Julia Andrews, of Raleigh. It was an illustration of what I have been endeavoring to express in connection with the needs of our School and our Orphanage. The Church of the Good Shepherd, i. e. the parish of that name, had erected one of the most appropriate and beautiful parish churches to be found anywhere in this part of the country. The work had been begun and carried on by the zeal and labor and self-denial of the rector and all I doubt if any church building in this Diocese ever represented a more universal cooperation of all the people of the congregation than that building represents. It was undertaken as a general responsibility of all, and for years all coöperated zealously and unweariedly, and they had accomplished a noble result. But it needed for its adequate success the great gift of one who could give largely, to save it from long years of struggle and difficulty; and by the generous act of one of its earliest and most faithful members, it received what it needed. There is an example which I trust may be followed by many.

I have said but little of what might be said of the work committed to us. May I hope that the zeal and diligence of the able and devoted members of this Convention may more than supply all my deficiencies, and make this a memorable gathering and a pleasant memory in the history of our good Diocese?

Besides the above, in soliciting funds for the church at the State Farm, I have visited nine towns, made eight formal addresses, had a number of conferences with committees, and called on an uncounted number of individuals.

I have attended as delegate, the Provincial Synod at Sewanee, the State Social Service Conference at Charlotte and the Laymen's Missionary Convention at Greensboro.

Speaking generally, the situation within the Convocation is hopeful. Some parishes and missions are still vacant, but there is good promise of having several of these supplied in the near future; and in all the other cases of vacancies the congregations have a live sense of their need, have increased the salaries offered, are making energetic effort to secure ministers.

Our finances, too, are in better shape than usual. Already the campaign of the Forward Movement Committee is bearing fruit. We have a respectable balance in our treasury and the total unpaid on apportionments is comparatively small.

A large debt of thanks is due to the Rev. A. S. Lawrence and the Rev. Milton A. Barber on the part of this Convocation for the unselfish, faithful and effective manner in which they have pushed the Forward Movement Campaign. And we owe a like debt of thanks

to others not of the committee who have generously left their own work to aid us in this campaign, notably Rev. Wm. E. Cox and Mr. Geo. Elliot of the Diocese of East Carolina, and Rev. R. B. Owens and Mr. Frank S. Spruill from our own Convocation.

In the more directly missionary work of the church two laymen have enlisted within the year. First Mr. S. L. Rotter and then Prof. Wm. Hand Browne, both of Raleigh, have been giving during the year three Sunday services a month to St. Gabriel's. Selma, with no other compensation than necessary travelling expenses. This deserves our gratitude and may, I trust, be taken as one of the hopeful signs of the times.

I respectfully submit my report as Archdeacon of the Convocation of Charlotte for the year ending March 31, 1916:

In reviewing the work of the past year there is unmistakable evidence of the fact that God has signally blessed us in the effort that has been made to extend the bounds of His Kingdom in that portion of the vineyard committed to our care. Not only has there been a decided spiritual awakening among our people as a whole, but also that which inevitably follows, a very notable increase in the offerings for the support of the Church's missionary enterprises. both at home and abroad, due largely to the zealous and unremitting labors of the Rev. Messrs. Way and Jackson of our Forward Movement team, coupled with the loyal and practically unanimous cooperation of the clergy and laity; in point of fact, our splendid laymen have never before responded more promptly or generously to

the Church's call for service. Certainly no movement within the Church in recent years has done more to arouse our brethren to a greater consciousness of their Christian stewardship, and to aid her in fulfilling her divine mission to the world.

Of the forty-five apportionments for last year in the Charlotte Convocation, forty were paid in full, and five in part; or to be more definite. of the total apportionment of \$2,013.40, \$1.980.69 was paid, leaving a balance unpaid of \$32.72. However, with the generous help of our friends in the way of individual offerings, we were able to close the year's work without a deficit.

Beginning April 1st, the Rev. Edgar Van W. Edwards, late of Royersford. Pa., became priest-in-charge of the Mayodan group of missions in succession to the Rev. Henry A. Willey, who removed January 1st to La Grange, Ga., Diocese of Atlanta. Mr. Willey wrought an excellent work at Mayodan, and while we were loath to give him up, our sister Diocese is to be congratulated in securing his services.

On April 1st the Rev. Jacob Frederick Burg, late of St. Timothy's Mission, Union County, was appointed minister-in-charge of All Saints' Church, Hamlet, and has taken up his new work with characteristic zeal and energy.

Since the removal of the Rev. Walter L. Loflin to the Diocese of Florida, March 1st, the Rev. Theo. Andrews, in addition to his duties as rector of Grace Church, Lexington, has been assisting the Archdeacon in the Rowan County Missions. All of the Missions included in this group are getting their usual quota of services, and the work is progressing satisfactorily.

The Rev. Clarence G. Prosperi, in connection with his work at Concord and Statesville, is assisting the Archdeacon in caring for the Missions at Mooresville and St. James. Iredell County. The prospect for growth in these Missions was never brighter than at present.

It affords me much pleasure to be able to report that a very substantial brick church is now in process of construction at China Grove, Rowan County, and it is hoped that within the near future work can be opened up at Kannapolis, a growing cotton mill town on the main line of the Southern Railway, sixteen miles south of Salisbury and at Yadkin Narrows, thirty-five miles southeast of Salisbury, on the Winston-Salem Southbound Railway, where one of the largest aluminum plants in America is soon to be established, and it is hoped that our church-folk throughout the Convocation will respond promptly and generously to the recent appeal sent out by our Executive Committee, asking for an increase in the apportionment sufficient to enable us to take advantage of the wonderful opportunity that is awaiting the Church at these really strategic points.

REPORT OF THE CONVOCATION OF THE COLORED PEOPLE.

To the Right Reverend Joseph Blount Cheshire, D.D.,

Bishop of North Carolina:

My Dear Bishop:—As Archdeacon for the Work Among Colored People in the Diocese, I respectfully submit the following as a report of my official acts for the year ending March 31, 1916:

It was with your consent that we left the Diocese on the morning

of September the 19th, to attend the 31st Conference of Church Workers Among Colored People—an organization of which two of your colored clergy are honored officials. The initial session was held in St. Paul's Cathedral, Boston, on the evening of the 21st of September, the remaining sessions were held in St. Bartholomew's Church. Cambridge. In the Conference Address to the Church at Large, are two paragraphs; the former general; the latter, local; yet both are of vital interest to the members of the Colored Convocation, and because of the support which you have given us in the past, and the hope which we cherish for its continuation in the future, we gladly present, for your consideration this development of our plans as seen in paragraphs 5 and 6 on page 8 of the Conference Minutes. It reads thus:

"We would again place before the Church the need of the historic Episcopate as outlined by this conference for the colored people. It is our firm belief that with such Episcopal oversight the mission of the Church would be better fulfilled and men, women and children who now are sitting in darkness would more rapidly be brought into its marvelous light.

"Before closing this public address, we feel it necessary to bring before the mind of the Church the privilege that is ours to erect a memorial to the late Rev. Thomas W. Cain, the first and only colored delegate representing the colored churchmen of this great American nation in the General Convention. This memorial is to be erected in the city of Warrenton, North Carolina, the birthplace of our dear brother."

The prospect of securing a church for the colored churchmen of Greensboro has been recently told through the columns of the *Carolina Churchman*, and we earnestly hope that before we meet in Convention again. St. Cuthbert's Chapel, the gift of the trustees of the Diocese to the congregation of the Church of the Redeemer in Greensboro, may be converted into a comfortable home for the members of that congregation.

As we review the steady growth of the Convocation and observe the support and encouragement that is given it on every hand we take courage and fervently thank Him who has vouchsafed these blessings to us. The Convocation has heartily cooperated with you in presenting the virtues of the Every Member Canvass—the Forward Movement and the Nation Wide Preaching Mission among our people. As a result of these efforts, one of our small missions has sent us a budget that would be worthy of a mission of twice its numerical strength; and the inspiration immediately following a collation was so great that the officers of one of our parishes returned to their rector in a few hours after leaving him with pledges amounting to over \$600.

Our mission services have been more numerous because of the

Church's call, and we believe the spirit of service to be more evident throughout the Convocation. When I tell you that from a carefully compiled report, I find that the members of your Colored Convocation who now seem to number considerably less than 1,000 has reported their contributions for the year to be \$7,416.17, you must admit that they are inclined to the love of giving as well as serving; for it means that in calculating even on the numerical strength of 1,000, that they are giving almost \$7.50 per capita. This calculation does not include your gifts to the Convocation, if so it would possibly exceed \$8 per capita as two members of this Diocese pay not alone the salary of a deserving colored missionary, but the house-rent of another who is equally deserving.

Our schools, like our churches, are doing good work, but it does seem that a school so necessary and well equipped for work as St. Michael's Training and Industrial School of Charlotte should be taken up by the American Church Institute for Negroes and given a better chance for development.

Again have we been reminded that in the midst of life we are in death. On the morning of the 2nd of April the Rev. Josephus McDonald was called from labor to his reward. At the time of his death he was connected with St. Augustine's school where he rendered faithful and efficient service. Being conscious of the honor which, through your liberality you have twice conferred upon our race, in behalf of those whom you have so honored, we again reiterate our thanks to you.

Our Diocesan Branch was represented at the Blue Ridge Conference held during the summer; and a full delegation was present at the meeting of the Auxiliary held in connection with the Synod of the Province of Sewanee.

Following this meeting our Diocesan Branch had a most helpful Institute in Charlotte. There we had the benefit of Miss Tillottson's leadership and also inspiring talks given by visitors from the Diocese of East Carolina and the Missionary Jurisdiction of Asheville.

During the Institute a Drawing Room Meeting was held in the interest of General Missions and of St. Luke's International Hospital, Tokyo.

Our Diocesan President has continued her plan of visiting the branches of the Auxiliary which desire her assistance and of spending part of the summer and fall months in the mission field of the Diocese. She has also continued her work as one of the associate editors of our Diocesan paper, being aided by contributions from other Diocesan officers.

Perhaps the most striking and picturesque meetings held during the year in the interest of missions were the two Missionary Garden Parties given in mid-summer; one at Laura Town, the home of our United Offering Treasurer; the other at the ancient village of Williamsboro. Accounts of these have appeared in *The Spirit of Missions*, and attracted the attention of the editor of *The Missionary Review of the World*. He is publishing them in that review with the hope that other religious bodies may carry out the same attractive idea in presenting their missionary work to the general public.

The most encouraging feature of the year's work would seem to be the increased interest in Mission Study. The program on Prayer, prepared by our Diocesan Secretary and recommended at the Sewanee Meeting for Lenten study throughout the Province, has been of special benefit and inspiration to many of our Diocesan Branches. We earnestly trust that this Prayer and Study may lead us to a greater earnestness in our work for the great cause which we represent.

Trustees of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of North Carolina, and as such successors of Theodore B. Lyman, William E. Anderson, and Richard H. Battle. Trustees hereinafter mentioned, of the second part:

Trustees of the Protestant Episcopal Church in said Diocese of North Carolina, and to their successors, by a deed dated January 1, 1886, and duly recorded among the Land Records of Mecklenburg County, in said State, in Book No. 57, folio 243, a certain tract of land, then adjoining, but now included within, the boundaries of the City of Charlotte, in said State; for the purpose of establishing and maintaining an institution to be known as "The Thompson Orphanage and Training Institution." to be controlled and administered under the authority of a Board of Managers of seven members, to be appointed by the Convention of the said Diocese of North Carolina; all which more fully and particularly appears in said Deed;

And Whereas, by a Deed bearing date January 1, 1887, and recorded among the Land Records of said county of Mecklenburg in Book 22, folio 21, John Wilkes, Hamilton C. Jones, and others. Vestrymen and Trustees of St. Peter's Church, in said City of Charlotte, did convey to the said Trustees of the Diocese of North Carolina, and to their successors, another certain parcel of ground adjoining the land conveyed by the said Deed of Benjamin S. Bronson and Alice, his wife, upon the same trusts as those contained in said last mentioned;

And Whereas, it appears in the said Deed of the Vestrymen of St. Peter's Church, that said Vestrymen of St. Peter's Church, had no absolute or beneficial interest in said property by them conveyed. but upon the payment of the debt mentioned therein, they held the land in trust, to be used and disposed of as the said Bronson might direct; so that the said Bronson was in fact the donor, for the purposes of the trust created, of the second tract or parcel of land, no less than of the tract first mentioned;

And Whereas, it was not the purpose or desire of the said Bronson to make the particular number of managers, or the method of their appointment, of the essence of the Trust created by said Deeds;

And Whereas, the development of the work has shown that the restrictions of said Deeds, as to the number of the managers, and the particular regulations prescribed in said Deeds for their election, by the Convention of the Diocese of North Carolina, are a disadvantage and a hindrance to the growth and development of said Institution, known as the Thompson Orphanage and Training Institution:

Now. Therefore, This Deed Witnesseth, that for and in consideration of the premises, and for the further consideration of the sum of one dollar to him in hand paid, the said Benjamin S. Bronson, reaffirming in all other respects the terms and provisions of said Deeds from himself and the Vestrymen of St. Peter's Church, Charlotte, to the Trustees of the Diocese of North Carolina, doth hereby Release and Relieve the parties hereto of the second part,

and the Convention of the Diocese of North Carolina, from any and all restrictions as to the number of Managers of said Institution and the method of their election; and doth hereby assure and convey the property, described in the two deeds aforementioned, to the said Joseph Blount Cheshire, Charles E. Johnson, and William H. Williamson, Trustees as aforesaid, and to their successors in office, in fee simple, upon the further Trust that the Board of Managers of said Institution, as to the number of Members constituting said Board, the method of their appointment, and the terms of their service, shall be, and the same is hereby, referred to the determination of the Convention of the Diocese of North Carolina, with the special limitation that the Bishop of the Diocese of North Carolina shall always be a member of said Board of Managers, and ex officio Chairman thereof.

In Witness of All which the said Benjamin S. Bronson hath hereto set his Hand and Seal the day and year first above written.

NECROLOGY.

THE REVEREND JOSEPHUS McDONALD.

Born on the Island of St. Thomas, Danish West Indies. December 11, 1886.

Educated at St. Augustine's School, Raleigh, where he graduated from the Collegiate Department with the class of 1910. Graduating from the Philadelphia Divinity School three years later, he was ordered Deacon by the Bishop of North Carolina in the Church of St. Ambrose, Raleigh, on St. Peter's Day, 1913, and ordained priest by the same Prelate in St. Augustine's Chapel, May 9, 1915, having spent the interval in ministering to the Missions at Greensboro and Winston-Salem.

Became Chaplain of St. Augustine's School and St. Agnes Hospital where after a brief but faithful ministry he passed to his rest April 3, 1916.

"He pleased God, and was beloved of Him."

AMENDMENTS OF CANONS SINCE THE YEAR 1913.

Canon II, Sec. 2, line 7. Certificates of the election of Delegates to the Convention to be mailed to the Secretary at least four weeks before the meeting of the Convention.

Canon XIII, Sec. 1, after line 5 read:

Diocesan Theological Education Fund: The first Sunday in March.

University of the South: The first Sunday in May.

General Clergy Relief Fund: Annually.

American Church Building Fund: The first Sunday in October.

Thompson Orphanage and Training Institution: Thanksgiving Day.

Church Work at the State University: Annually.

Convocation of the Colored People: Annually.

Provided, that where it is not possible to take up a special offering for each of the above objects, or where the Budget System, or some similar system, is followed. an annual contribution for each of the above objects shall be considered to fulfil the conditions of this section.

Sec. 2. It shall be the duty of the minister of each congregation in the Diocese to obtain, with the assistance of the laity, from every member of the same, if possible, an individual subscription, payable weekly (a) to Domestic and Foreign Missions, and (b) to the work of the Convocation to which the congregation belongs: that in congregations where it has been found impracticable to obtain weekly subscriptions, a quarterly collection for each object through the offertory at a Sunday service may be substituted therefor, and Provided, further, that where the Budget System, or some similar system, is in use, it shall be considered that the provisions of this section are satisfied by remitting a contribution from such congregation quarterly to each of the above objects.

Canon VIII, Sec. 1. line 4. For Education, read: Theological Education.

Sec. 3, lines 1 and 2. For Education read: Theological Education; and for Education Fund of the Diocese read: Diocesan Theological Education Fund.

Canon XIX, add as follows:

Sec. 4. Each Convocation shall make, in such manner as may seem best to it, an annual report to the Convention of the work of such Convocation for the year. Such report shall include the report of the Treasurer with a statement of all receipts and disbursements, and shall also include a table of apportionments for the following year. The Treasurer's report shall be audited by a Committee of the Convention, unless it is accompanied by a report of the Convocation. showing that it has been audited and found correct.

Sec. 5. Each Convocation shall keep a record of its meetings in a book kept for that purpose.

Sec. 6. The financial year of each Convocation shall be the same as that of the Convention.

Canon VIII. To Section 1 add the words: also a Committee on Apportionments, to consist of the Bishop and one clergyman and one layman from each of the three Convocations.

Also add the words:

Section 9. Committee on Apportionments.

The duties of the Committee on Apportionments shall be as follows:

- 1. The Committee shall obtain from the proper authorities a statement of the amounts needed for the ensuing year for the several objects authorized by the Convention. except the Episcopal and Contingent Fund, the Church Pension Fund, Diocesan Missions and the Thompson Orphanage.
- 2. They shall make out tables of apportionments for these required objects and shall submit them to the Ministers and Vestries or Missionary Committees of all the Parishes and congregations of the Diocese sixty days before the annual Convention, giving them the opportunity to accept, increase, decrease or reject the same.
- 3. They shall cause to be published monthly in *The Carolina Churchman* a statement of the amounts apportioned and the amounts paid thereon by each congregation.

Canon XXVI. To Section 6, add the words:

But the Minister in charge of every congregation shall also report separately for statistical purposes as *Actual Communicants* the number of Communicants who, he has reason to believe, have not failed to receive the Holy Communion at least once in the last three years.

Canon XXX. Of the Church Pension Fund.

- Section 1. In conformity with the resolutions adopted by the General Convention of 1913, setting forth the principles upon which a pension system for the clergy of the Church and their dependents should be constructed, pursuant to which the corporation, the Church Pension Fund has been created to carry these principles into effect, the Diocese of North Carolina hereby enters into the system of the Church Pension Fund.
- Sec. II. The Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese shall appoint, annually, a Committee to be entitled The Committee on the Church Pension Fund, and to consist of one Clergyman and two Laymen. The duties of this Committee shall be as follows:
- 1. To furnish annually to the Church Pension Fund the canonical roll of the Clergy of this Diocese, and of the clergy canonically belonging to other dioceses or missionary districts who may be licensed to officiate in this Diocese, with a statement of the stipends received by each of said clergymen from any parish, mission, or other ecclesiastical organization in this Diocese.
- 2. To receive from the Church Pension Fund annually a statement of the premiums necessary to be paid by each parish, mission,

or other ecclesiastical organization in the Diocese, in order that the clergymen in receipt of stipends from such parishes, missions, and other ecclesiastical organizations may be entitled respectively to pensions.

- 3. To inform the duly constituted authorities of each parish, mission, and other ecclesiastical organization in the Diocese of the premiums payable by it, and of the time and manner of payment thereof.
- 4. To elect a Treasurer who may or may not be a member of said Committee, who shall be required to give a bond satisfactory to the Committee, and whose duty it shall be to receive, quarterly, from all of the parishes, missions, and other ecclesiastical organizations in this Diocese, the aforesaid premiums and to transmit the same to the Treasurer of the Church Pension Fund.
- 5. To inform the Church Pension Fund from time to time of the clergy and the widows and minor orphans of clergy, canonically connected with this Diocese who may be entitled to receive pensions from the Church Pension Fund.
- 6. In general, to inform the clergy and laity of the Diocese of the pension system created by the General Convention, and committed by it to the operation of the Church Pension Fund, whereby the clergy of the church are assured of pensions, as of right, to themselves in the event of old age, or disability, and to their widows and minor orphans in the event of death, and to do all things that may be necessary or advisable in the premises to the end that the moneys necessary to be paid by the parishes, missions, and other ecclesiastical organizations may be fully and systematically paid.
- Sec. III. 1. It shall be the duty of the Diocesan Pension Fund Committee to make all necessary arrangements with the Treasurer of the Diocese or the Finance Committee to provide for the annual payment to the Committee on the Church Pension Fund of the premiums payable on behalf of the Bishop of the Diocese, and also of the Bishop Coadjutor and the Bishops Suffragan, if there be such, and it shall be the duty of said Treasurer to pay said annual premiums to the Committee on the Church Pension Fund.
- 2. It shall also be the duty of the Diocesan Committee on the Church Pension Fund to make all necessary arrangements with the Executive Committees of the Convocations to provide for the annual payment to the Committee on the Church Pension Fund of the premiums payable on behalf of all clergymen receiving stipends from their respective Convocations.
- 3. It shall also be the duty of the Finance Committee to authorize the Treasurer of the Convention to pay, quarterly, to the said Committee on the Church Pension Fund the premiums payable on behalf of all other clergymen whose stipends are paid entirely or in part by the Diocese, and to make all necessary arrangements to provide for the cost of such premiums.

Sec. IV. It shall be the duty of the Convocations of the Diocese to pay, quarterly, to the said Committee on the Church Pension Fund the premiums payable on behalf of all clergymen receiving stipends from said Convocations.

Sec. V. It shall be the duty of every clergyman receiving a stipend or stipends, and the duty of every parish, mission, or other ecclesiastical organization in the Diocese paying a stipend or stipends, to furnish a statement of such stipend or stipends to the Committee on the Church Pension Fund whenever said Committee shall, in writing, ask for such statement.

Sec. VI. Any parish or mission neglecting for two successive years to pay the full amount of its annual premium shall be deprived of its right to participate and vote in the proceedings of the Convention of the Diocese, according to the Canons in that case made and provided, and shall continue so deprived until the said parish or mission has paid in full the said annual premiums for two successive years, when it shall be restored to all of its canonical rights in the Convention of the Diocese.

Sec. VII. This Canon shall go into effect when the Secretary of the Convention shall receive notification from the Church Pension Fund that such sufficient number of other dioceses, missionary districts, and General Boards or other General Institutions of the Church have, by legislation, provided for entering into the pension system of the Church Pension Fund, as, in the opinion of the said Church Pension Fund, will enable its system to go into operation; provided, that the clergy canonically connected with said dioceses or missionary districts, or whose stipends are wholly paid by said Boards or General Institutions of the Church, shall number not less than two thousand individuals.
