### JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

The One Hundred and First Annual Convention of the Diocese of North Carolina was held in Saint Timothy's Church, Wilson, beginning on Monday, May 14, 1917.

Evening Prayer was said by the Bishop of the Diocese, the Rt. Rev. Joseph Blount Cheshire, D.D., assisted by the Rev. Aaron Burtis Hunter, D.D., and the Rev. Milton A. Barber.

After Evening Prayer, the Convention was called to order by the Bishop, the roll was called, and 36 Clergymen and delegates from 10 Parishes and 1 Mission were present and answered to their names. A quorum being present, the Convention was organized, and, on motion of Rev. Julian E. Ingle, the Rev. Morrison Bethea was elected Secretary. Mr. Frank T. Ward was appointed Assistant Secretary.

The Bishop read his Annual Address (see Appendix A), and, on motion of the Rev. Isaac W. Hughes, it was referred to the Committee on the State of the Church.

The Rev. Charles L. Pardee, D.D., spoke on the work of the American Church Building Fund Commission.

On motion of the Rev. Francis M. Osborne, that portion of the Bishop's Address referring to a possible change in the date of holding the Diocesan Convention was referred to a Special Committee, which the Bishop appointed, as follows: The Rev. I. McK. Pittenger, D.D., the Rev. Edwin A. Osborne, Mr. W. A. Erwin, Mr. Chas. E. Johnson, Mr. C. E. Frick.

On motion of the Rev. N. Collin Hughes, Clergymen of the Diocese not entitled to seats, Visiting Clergymen, and Candidates for Holy Orders were invited to seats on the floor of the Convention.

The Convention adjourned after Prayer and Benediction by the Bishop.

#### SECOND DAY

Tuesday, May 15, 1917.

The Convention was called to order at 9:30 a.m. The Secretary called the roll and noted the presence of additional Clerical and Lay delegates (as noted in list of delegates present).

At 10 a. m. Holy Communion was celebrated by the Rt. Rev. Joseph Blount Cheshire, D.D., Bishop of the Diocese, assisted by the Rev. A. Burtis Hunter, D.D., the Rev. I. McK. Pittenger, D.D., and the Rev. Morrison Bethea. The Rev. Isaac W. Hughes preached the Convention Sermon from St. John 17:3—"And this is life eternal, that they might know Thee, the only true God, and Jesus Christ, whom Thou hast sent." The offerings of the Congregation were received for the New York Bible and Prayer Book Society.

At 12 noon the Convention reassembled in business session, and prayers for Missions were said by the Rev. Edwin  $\Lambda$ . Osborne.

The Rev. A. Burtis Hunter, D.D., read the report of the Standing Committee, as follows:

#### REPORT OF THE STANDING COMMITTEE.

The Standing Committee beg leave to report that on June 8, 1916, the committee, elected by the Convention of 1916, was organized by the election of the Rev. A. B. Hunter as President and the Rev. M. A. Barber as Secretary.

Basil Manly Walton was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the diaconate.

On August 25, the Rev. Floyd Stephen Cartwright was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the priesthood.

On September 16, the Rev. Arthur W. Taylor was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the priesthood with a dispensation from Latin, Greek and Hebrew.

The Rev. Clarence Prosperi withdrew his application for dispensation from Greek and for recommendation to the Bishop for ordination to the priesthood.

Consent was given to the consecration of the Rev. Irving Peake Johnson, D.D., as Bishop Coadjutor of Colorado.

Unanimous advice and consent were given that the Bishop should terminate the sentence of deposition of Mr. E. P. Greene.

Approval was given to the Bishop's schedule of appropriations for the white and colored missionary work of the diocese from the sum appropriated by the General Board of Missions.

On September 22, the Rev. Edgar N. LeBlanc, Deacon, was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the priesthood.

Howard Stetter Hartzell was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the diaconate at any time after September 22.

On November 6, Theodore Stroup was recommended to the Bishop to be admitted a candidate for Holy Orders.

On December 1, consent was given to the election of the Rt. Rev. Shelden Munson Griswold, D.D., as a Suffragan Bishop to the Bishop of Chicago.

On January 26. 1917, consent was given to the consecration of the Rev. Granville Hudson Sherwood as Bishop of the Diocese of Springfield.

On January 30, consent was given that the Diocese of Iowa should proceed to the election of a Bishop Coadjutor.

Roma Coxie Fortune, a deaf mute, was recommended to the Bishop to be a candidate for Holy Orders.

On February 12, Roma Coxie Fortune was recommended for dispensation from Latin, Greek and other subjects not strictly ecclesiastical.

On March 16, approval was given to the Bishop's request for renewal of appropriation by the Board of Mission for white and colored work in the Diocese.

On March 24, the application of the Rev. John E. G. Small. Deacon, for recommendation to the Bishop for ordination to the priesthood, was postponed in the absence of knowledge that all required examinations had been passed, and the following resolution was adopted:

"Resolved, that the Standing Committee respectfully requests the Bishop to inform them in every case of the action of the Examining Chaplains on the examinations of every candidate for orders, or that the Bishop request the Examining Chaplains to inform the Standing Committee of their action in regard to the examinations of every candidate for orders, so that the Standing Committee will have this information before them when passing on applications of such candidates for recommendation to the Bishop for ordination."

On April 16, consent was given to the Diocese of Newark to elect a Bishop Coadjutor.

A letter was read from the Bishop in answer to the Resolution of March 24, and a reply to the Bishop was formally adopted.

The Rev. John E. G. Small, having laid before the committee a

written statement from the Bishop that he had passed all required examinations, was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the priesthood.

Cooper and wife, to the Trustees of the Diocese, for a lot on Chestnut Screet in the town of Henderson, on the east side of the property of the Church of the Holy Innocents; dated March 26, 1915, and recorded in Book 65, page 428, in the office of the Register of Deeds for Vance County.
- 2. Deed of T. Plummer Jones and wife, for a parcel of land in the town of Wake Forest; consideration \$200; dated April 20, 1917, and recorded in Book 316, page 285, in the office of the Register of Deeds for Wake County.
- 3. Deed of John D. Grimes and wife, and Thomas S. Grimes and wife, for a lot 3750 square feet of land on the Winston-Salem public road in Davidson County, N. C.; dated April 17, 1917, and recorded in Book 79, page 540, in the office of the Register of Deeds for said County.

The Trustees also report that they have given consent to the members of the Mission of the Holy Cross. Statesville, to put an incumbrance of \$500 on their church building in order to provide for its repair and improvement; the Trustees incurring no responsibility for the indebtedness, for which the members of the Mission expressly promise to provide.

### III. Martin Scholarship Account.

The principal, \$3,000 is invested in the 6 per cent bonds of the Bankers Realty Company of Raleigh. At the last report dividends and interest thereon were held to the amount of \$766.47. On July 1, 1916, this became \$774.13, and the whole was turned over to the Rector. The amount now awaiting a similar call from him is \$271.80.

This statement of the Treasurer is, however, not an exhibit of the financial situation, since the Treasurer administers only such funds as are held by the corporation for general purposes, and the Rector of the School, with the assistance of the Business Manager, administers the finances of the School proper.

The School year now drawing to a close has been in many respects a very favorable year for the School. The attendance has been much above the average, and the work of the teachers and pupils has been earnest and satisfactory. The total enrollment has been 269, of whom 179 were boarding pupils. The average of boarding pupils has been 157: from the Diocese of North Carolina 64, East Carolina 35, South Carolina 9. Asheville 8, Virginia 11 Southern Virginia 11, Georgia 9, Atlanta 9, Florida 4, Scattering 19.

Under normal conditions such an attendance would have meant a satisfactory financial year, and a balance on the right side. we all know in our personal and domestic experience that we are not living under normal conditions, and St. Mary's has felt the pressure of the increasing cost of living. The books for the year cannot be closed before some date in June, but it is apparent that there will be a deficit at the end of the fiscal year. It will probably be not more than \$1.800 or \$2.000, and that in itself is not very serious. But facing the problems of the next year the situation is serious, irrespective of a small balance one way or the other. is quite apparent that with the cost of all necessary supplies increasing, there are difficult questions awaiting the Trustees at their annual meeting, a week or so hence. And to meet the situation, and to enable the Trustees to carry on successfully the work entrusted to them, they must receive the united. generous and sympathetic support of the Clergy and Laity of the Diocese associated in its maintenance.

This brings us to the subject of the very greatest importance at the present moment, the Campaign inaugurated a year ago for raising \$250,000 for the endowment, enlargement, and better equipment of the School, and, more than all, for the payment of the funded debt of \$40,000, which is an *incubus* upon our work, a burden which it ought not to be called on to bear. Relieved of that burden this year's statement will show no deficit, and might possibly show a small balance of profit.

This campaign was begun by the Committee composed of the Rev. Isaac W. Hughes, Mr. Geo. C. Royall, and Mr. Graham H. Andrews, with the Rev. Francis M. Osborne as Special Agent, last Fall. The Church Pension Fund Campaign made it absolutely impossible to bring the matter before most of our Clergy and parishes—but something has been done, and a good beginning has been made. What St. Mary's needs and imperatively demands at this time is that we should all unite in supporting the Committee and Mr. Osborne in this work. Incidentally we must also fill St. Mary's next Fall with pupils. An endowment is a good thing, and enlarged accommodations are good and desirable, but without a school well attended, we cannot convince our people that we need either the one or the other.

Your Trustees therefore ask your earnest coöperation in the work of the Endowment Committee and the Rev. Mr. Osborne, and also your influence in keeping the School before our people that it may be filled with the very best girls, especially from the Carolinas and the neighboring States.

Rev. Edwin A. Osborne read the report of the Board of Managers of the Thompson Orphanage and Training Institution, as follows:

# REPORT OF THE THOMPSON ORPHANAGE AND TRAINING INSTITUTION.

CHARLOTTE, N. C., April 24, 1917.

The thirty-first annual meeting of the Board of Managers of the Thompson Orphanage and Training Institution was held in the Orphanage chapel on the 24th day of April, 1917, a quorum being present, and the Bishop of the Diocese presiding. The Executive Committee reported that after mature consideration they had decided that it would not be expedient to sell any portion of the lands belonging to the Institution on account of the little demand for land at this time, and for the further reason that all the land that we now own is necessary for the support of the Orphanage.

The Board approved of this action of the Committee.

The Rev. Walter J. Smith read his annual report as superintendent, and Mr. Joseph G. Shannonhouse read his annual report as treasurer of the Permanent Fund. These reports are herewith submitted as a part of this report. The general condition of the Institution is satisfactory so far as could be expected from the means at our command, and the sanitary condition is thoroughly good, as shown by the happy and healthy appearance of the children.

The addition of a laundry in the basement of Federation Cottage makes that splendid and substantial cottage one of the most comfortable and satisfactory Orphanage buildings that could reasonably be desired. We need others like it for the children we now have, and for those who want to come. What a noble monument of generosity, and what a beautiful memorial to some loved one would such a building represent?

There are other buildings and improvements greatly needed which cannot be made for want of funds. To meet these and other wants, a committee has been appointed by the Board of Managers to raise the sum of fifty thousand dollars.

Our most urgent needs at present, apart from the lack of suitable cottages are:

- 1. A new barn with equipment for cattle and horses at a cost of some three thousand dollars.
- 2. Improvements and repairs in Bronson Hall at a cost of some six or seven hundred dollars.
- 3. A new and well equipped cottage for small children from two to seven, or eight years old. This is a great want in our Institution, and one that should appeal with peculiar emphasis to all who love little children, and appreciate the importance of early training. At least ten thousand dollars is needed for this purpose.

We would urge the friends of the Orphanage throughout the State to give earnest and sympathetic heed to the warning and appeal of the superintendent in regard to the crisis we are now facing on account of the shortage of funds, and the increasing high price of all food stuffs. This is a subject that demands, and calls loudly for prompt and decided action on the part of this convention.

We would not have our friends think that we are idle at the Orphanage, for we assure them that we are using every effort to help ourselves, and these extra efforts add to the present expenses which we hope may be replaced in the Fall.

Rev. William H. Hardin read the report of the Superintendent of the Thompson Orphanage and Training Institution, as follows:

ANNUAL REPORT OF REV. WALTER J. SMITH, SUPERINTENDENT, THOMPSON ORPHANAGE AND TRAINING INSTITUTION.

To the Board of Managers—Greeting:

In looking back over the past year I feel that notwithstanding the disastrous floods and the high prices of all food stuffs, together with some other drawbacks, we have much for which to thank God, and take courage. The health of the children has been remarkably good, and I think it has been due, in a large measure, to the average supply of nearly a quart of pure milk a day for every child during the entire year. We have had only one case of serious contagious disease, and that was diphtheria, which was promptly treated without any other child taking it. Nearly all the children have been inoculated against typhoid fever, quite a number have had their adenoids and tonsils removed, and one has been operated on for

appendicitis. One has chronic rheumatism and a number of minor ailments and accidents have been treated by our physician.

The larger bills for improvements include in round numbers \$45 for the Chapel, \$85 for the Farmer's cottage, and \$63 for the porch roof to the school room. But for these and other improvements, and the loss of a part of our corn crop we would make a much better showing, and yet we close the fiscal year with a credit balance of \$1,392.60. We ought to have twice this much to begin the new year with, and in normal times I would not be uneasy as to the future, but with the present conditions before us I feel that we are facing a crisis, and we should begin to plan now for the support of the work during the coming year.

On May 10 it will be thirty years since the Orphanage was opened, and it would be a fitting commemoration of the fact if the seventeen thousand communicants in the State would make an average contribution of thirty cents each, and give the five thousand dollars thus raised as a memorial to the Rev. Benjamin S. Bronson who was the real founder of the institution. Mr. Bronson was a man of great learning and a deep thinker, and his learning was equaled only by his great modesty. Having used this property for many years for school purposes he finally turned it over to the Diocese of North Carolina for the establishment of an Orphanage, and he always felt a deep interest in its welfare. The Board of Managers will doubtless take some action at this meeting in honor of his memory.

We made no change in our matrons during the past year, but I regret to say that Miss Field had to give up her position as sewing teacher on the first of April on account of her health. For nine years she did faithful service in her position, and was liked by all the children and workers during that time. Her place was promptly filled temporarily by Mrs. Thornton, who being a sufferer from chronic rheumatism, was not able to hold it, and so we are at present without a sewing teacher. Miss Virginia E. Mooney, of Brentwood, Tenn., and Miss Hansford Patterson of Manteo, Va., have had charge of the school during the year, and for the first time an attempt has been made to follow strictly the graded school system. We hope their work will show good results. Four of our girls have attended the city school during the year, and one has been in King's Eusiness College.

During the year, we have received twenty-one children into the Orphanage, ten of whom came from the Diocese of North Carolina, seven from the Diocese of East Carolina, and four from the District of Asheville. We also let two of the old children come back. Seven returned to their former homes, two went to live with their brother and sister to attend school, one was sent to the Epileptic Colony in Raleigh, and one to the Caswell Training School. The present number is seventy-six, forty-five being from the Diocese of

North Carolina, fourteen from East Carolina, and seventeen from the District of Asheville. We also received a little girl for a few days until the father could make suitable provision for her.

Dr. Wm. Myers Hunter has kindly looked after the health of the children, and I wish to thank him and the other physicians, and dentists for their professional services, and also the city waterworks, the Standard Ice and Fuel Company, and the different railroads for their continued favors.

I herewith append my report as Treasurer.

All Saints Church, Roanoke Rapids, as a Parish.

The above applications were referred to the Committee on New Parishes, which reporting favorably on all four applications, the congregations were duly received into union with the Convention of the Diocese, the delegates appointed were recorded by the Secretary as members of the Convention, and the names were added to the List of Parishes and Missions.

Major John W. Graham read the report of the Committee in regard to the obligation of the Diocese under the devise of Miss Lucy J. Thorp. (After setting forth the devise as found on page 22 of the Journal of 1904 and the clause on page 139 of said Journal; also the report on pages 41 and 42 of same Journal; also pages 19 and 20 of the Journal of 1907; and a copy of the lease on pages 139 and 140 of the

Journal of 1907, together with a copy of the trust and conditions as found on page 140 of the Journal of 1904) The Committee offered the following resolution:

Resolved, (1) That the trustees of the Diocese of North Carolina be authorized to convey to the heirs of Peterson Thorp in fee simple all of the tract of land, about 500 acres, in Granville County, near Goshen, devised by the will of the late Miss Lucy Thorp, for a consideration of \$500, including the 30 acres where St. Paul's Church now stands, subject to the right of the said trustees to use the said Church House and two acres of land around it, as long as said trustees shall see fit to allow the congregation worshiping there the use of said Church, with the right, however, to said trustees to remove the said Church to any other locality, to sell the same, if the Trustees of the Diocese desire to do so. And said sale of 500 acres includes the 30 acres upon which the Church now stands, to be sold under the express condition, as stated in the will of Miss Lucy Thorp, that the said heirs of Peterson Thorp shall keep in reasonable repair and good condition the cemetery fence, as it now is. but not to include any addition to said cemetery outside of said fence.

The above resolution was discussed on the floor of the Convention, a vote was taken, and it was defeated.

Resolved, (2) That as St. Paul's Church near Goshen in Granville County, has failed of sufficient support for the maintenance of religious services therein by a Protestant Episcopal minister, and no other Church building has been erected by, or for the said Protestant Episcopal Church in the neighborhood in a reasonable time, as now determined by this Convention, the Trustees of the Diocese are authorized to sell said Church Building, and discontinue any further attempt to conduct service in said building. That the said sale be made at such time as said Trustees shall determine, and for such price as they deem proper.

The resolution was adopted as read.

The Rev. N. Collin Hughes read the report of the Committee on Elections, which was adopted, as follows:

The Committee on Elections, to whom was referred the case of Mr. Thomas H. Webb and Mr. Cameron McRae, from All Saints. Concord, and Mr. Wm. H. Ruffin, of St. Paul's, Louisburg, are fully persuaded. upon the information that has come before them, that

all these gentlemen are properly approved representatives of the Parishes from which they come, and we recommend that they be seated as delegates of their respective Parishes.

N. C. Hughes, Chairman.

The Rev. Robert B. Owens read the report of the Committee on Canons, as follows:

#### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CANONS

Your Committee on Canons respectfully report that since their appointment last year one of their most useful members has been called from the Church Militant into the rest of the Paradise of God.

Mr. J. Cameron Buxton, Senior Warden of St. Paul's Church, Winston-Salem, was for many years a member of this Convention and one of its most active and useful Counselors. He was a devoted and intelligent Churchman and Christian gentleman, zealous in good works, always willing to spend and be spent in the service of the Master; and we feel that his wise counsel and efficient aid will be sorely missed.

In regard to the Canonical matters entrusted to us, we report as follows:

(1) That inasmuch as one section of Canon XXX. "Of the Church Pension Fund," as adopted by the Convention of 1916 was inadvertently omitted in the printing, we offer the following resolution:

Resolved. That Canon XXX, "Of the Church Pension Fund," be adopted as printed in the Journal of 1916.

This resolution was adopted.

(2) Resolved. That Article IX, Section 6 of the Constitution be amended by inserting after the words "Contingent Fund" in line three the words. "Or shall have failed to observe the conditions of Canon XXX, section 6, on the Church Pension Fund."

This resolution was adopted by a concurrent vote of Orders.

To make the Diocesan Canons conform to General Canon 49: "Of the mode of securing an accurate view of the state of the Church":

(3) Resolved, That Canon XXVI, section 3. "Parochial Reports," be amended as follows: Beginning in second line strike out the words. "At the close of the month of March each year, to report to the Bishop of the Diocese. by such form as shall be from time to time set forth by authority of the Diocesan Convention," and substitute therefor the following: "At the beginning of January each year to prepare upon the blank form adopted by the General Convention,

a report for the year ending December 31st preceding, and deliver the same to the Bishop of the Diocese, on, or before the first day of February. This report shall include the following information."

Also in the last line of Section 3 strike out the words "April 1st and end on March 31st," and substitute therefor the words, "January 1st and end on December 31st."

This report was adopted as above.

To make the Diocesan Canons conform to General Canon 50, "Of business methods in Church affairs":

(4) In Canon VIII, section 6, strike out the words in lines one and two, "The Committee on Finance shall audit the Treasurer's Accounts."

Add to Canon VIII, section 6, the following paragraphs:

"It shall be the duty of the Finance Committee to maintain general supervision of the financial affairs of the Diocese; to secure simplicity and accuracy in the collections and disbursements of all funds, and coöperation between all officers, trusts and boards of the Convention; for which purpose it shall establish its own rules, and keep a record of its meetings, all of which shall be submitted annually to the Convention.

"All accounts having to do with receipts, expenditures and investments of all Church organizations, shall be audited at the close of the year by a certified public accountant: *Provided, however*, if the amount of the income for the year is less than \$3,000. or, if a certified public accountant is not available, the audit may be made by an accountant bookkeeper, who is in no way connected with the subject-matter of the account.

"The fiscal year shall begin January 1st.

"The expense, if there be any, of auditing the account of the Diocesan Treasurer by a certified public accountant shall be paid by the treasurer out of the Episcopal and Contingent Fund, upon requisition by the Chairman of the Finance Committee."

This report was adopted as above.

On motion, a partial report of the Special Committee on Suggested Changes in the Canons was referred to the Committee on Canons.

On motion of Rev. J. E. Ingle, that portion of Rule of Order 17 which refers to the furnishing of printed blanks for nominations by the Secretary was suspended.

The Rev. N. C. Hughes offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

Resolved, That Rev. John L. Jackson and Mr. Frank Wilkes be reimbursed \$17 that it cost them to attend the meeting of the Committee on Apportionments last December, and that the Treasurer be hereby instructed to pay the same.

The Rev. Alfred S. Lawrence offered the following resolutions, which were adopted:

Resolved, (1) That the Convention of the Diocese of North Carolina heartily endorse the recommendations of the Committee on Country Church and Rural Life of the Frovince of Sewanee.

(2) That the present temporary commission on methods of reaching the people in the rural districts be discharged, and that a permanent Diocesan Commission be appointed, whose duties shall be as described in sections 1 and 2 of the above recommendations.

The Rev. R. B. Owens, for the Committee on Canons. offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

Resolved, That Canon XXII, Section 1 of the Canons be amended as follows: At the end of the section add, "But note, that any Parish having twenty or more male members of the age of twenty-one years may adopt the rotating vestry system, and in such case shall elect one-third of the vestry to serve for one year, one-third to serve for two years, and one third to serve for three years, and thereafter shall annually elect from among its qualified members who have not served on the vestry during the past year, one-third of the vestry, whose term of office shall be three years."

### Mr. G. H. Andrews offered the following resolutions:

Be it resolved, (1) That Canon XI, section 1, be amended to read as follows:

Section 1. The salary of the Bishop of the Diocese is hereby fixed at three thousand six hundred dollars (\$3,600) per annum, to be paid by the Treasurer out of the funds in his hands for that purpose.

(2) That this amendment shall be effective from May 1, 1917.

These resolutions were referred to the Committee on Finance, and upon their favorable report were referred to the Committee on Canons, and upon their favorable report were adopted. The Rev. John B. Gibble read the following resolution, which was referred to the Committee on Canons:

Resolved, That Canon XII, section 1, be amended by inserting the words "Jerusalem and the East Mission Fund, Good Friday."

Referred to the Committee on Canons.

The Rev. Gardner L. Tucker addressed the Convention on Religious Education.

The Rev. A. Burtis Hunter, D. D., offered the following resolution, which was adopted by a rising vote:

Resolved, That the Diocese of North Carolina sends affectionate greeting to the Rev. William Walker upon the completion of fifty faithful years in the Priesthood of the Church on January, 27, 1917.

Mr. George Pollok Burgwyn offered the following resolutions, which were adopted by a rising vote:

Whereas. Almighty God, in His infinite wisdom, has seen fit to take unto Himself the souls of three of our most useful brethren and comrades in the Convention—

The Hon. John Steele Henderson, The Hon. William Lord London, The Hon. John Cameron Buxton;

and whereas, their presence at our Convention and their efforts for the good of the Church in this Diocese will be greatly missed.

Therefore, be it resolved, (1) That we bow in humble submission to the will of Almighty God, who doeth all things well.

(2) That the Bishop appoint a committee to draft suitable resolutions to the memory of each of these gentlemen, and that the Secretary is instructed to send a copy of the same to their families.

The Bishop appointed this Committee, as follows: Rev. Warren W. Way, Rev. Francis Joyner, Mr. Charles E. Johnson, Mr. George P. Burgwyn, Dr. R. H. Lewis.

Rev. N. Collin Hughes offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

Resolved, That the Treasurer be instructed to pay the expenses of all those Clergy attending the Convention who are at work in the Diocese but are not yet entitled to seats, and all those Laymen attending this Convention who are giving their entire time to the Missionary work of the Church.

The Bishop appointed the following Committee to draw up suitable resolutions to the memory of the Rev. Benjamin S. Bronson. Rev. Edwin A. Osborne, Rev. Robert A. Tufft, Rev. Morrison Bethea, Mr. H. G. Connor, Mr. Arthur London.

On motion of the Rev. J. E. Ingle, Rule of Order 17 was referred to the Committee on Canons.

The Secretary received the following greeting from the Council of the Diocese of East Carolina:

Diocese of East Carolina sends greetings to the Diocese of North Carolina and assures it of a cordial welcome at the Centennial on the 17th in New Bern.

To which the Secretary replied:

Diocese of North Carolina acknowledges greetings of Diocese of East Carolina, sends cordial greetings and expects to meet with it in New Bern.

On motion, the Convention adjourned to meet at 8 p. m. to consider, as a Committee of the Whole, the missionary work of the Diocese, and to hear the reports of the Archdeacons and the Convocations. • .

### EVENING.

The Convention met at 8 p. m. and, after devotional exercises, was called to order by the Bishop.

Rev. Isaac W. Hughes moved that the Canons be amended so as to leave the Bishop off the Committee on  $\Lambda$ pportionments.

Referred to the Committee on Canons, and, upon their favorable report, adopted.

Mr. B. F. Finney addressed the Convention on the work of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew, and requested that the Clergy report to Brotherhood headquarters in Philadelphia the names of all men entering the Army or Navy with the name of the Regiment, Camp, or Ship.

The order of the day being called for, being the Missionary

Work of the Diocese and the Reports of the Archdeacons, on motion, the Convention went into Committee of the Whole, with Major J. W. Graham in the chair.

The Committee of the Whole rose, and the chairman reported that the Committee, having had under consideration the Missionary Work of the Diocese and the Reports of the Archdeacons, recommended the adoption of the following resolutions:

Resolved, That the Convention approve the tables of apportionments and appropriations made by the three Convocations; but since the Convention has made the fiscal year end December 1, the Convocations are directed to make the apportionments and appropriations for nine months, so as to make the fiscal year end December 31, that we may begin the next fiscal year January 1, 1918.

Resolved. That the Convocations be authorized to make such modification in the apportionment reported as may seem to be demanded in any special case.

The Rev. Edgar H. Goold read the report of St. Augustine's School, as follows:

During the past School year there have been 464 students enrolled in all the departments. The students have paid about \$3,800 toward their board and tuition. An increased number of boarding students, combined with the high cost of living, has made the year a difficult one financially. In other respects the year as been a good one.

St. Augustine's was chartered in July, 1867, and began work on January 1, 1868. It is thus approaching its fiftieth anniversary, which will be celebrated next year.

In connection with the anniversary the Trustees have endorsed a plan to raise a fund of \$100,000. for needed buildings, equipment and endowment. The Rev. A. B. Hunter, Honorary Principal of the School, has been made Treasurer of the Fund and will be glad to answer inquiries and receive contributions.

Mrs. A. B. Hunter, Superintendent of St. Agnes Hospital, reports that during the past year there have been 932 patients and 19.617 hospital days. The patients themselves have paid \$9,034.20; an increase over last year of about \$1.200.

### THIRD DAY.

WEDNESDAY, MAY 16, 1917.

At 7:30 a. m. the Holy Communion was celebrated by the Rt. Rev. Joseph Blount Cheshire, D.D., Bishop of the Diocese, assisted by the Rev. N. Collin Hughes and the Rev. William H. Hardin.

At this service the women made their Corporate Communion and presented their United Offering.

At 9:30 a. m. Morning Prayer was read by the Bishop, assisted by the Rev. Walter J. Smith.

At 10:10 a.m. the Bishop called the Convention to order and the minutes of the first two days' sessions were read and approved.

The Rev. I. McK. Pittenger read a report from the Committee on that part of the Bishop's Address referring to a possible change in the date of holding the Convention, recommending that the Convention meet in February. The recommendation of the Committee was not approved.

The Rev. Alfred S. Lawrence read the report of the Committee on the State of the Church (Appendix E), and offered the following resolutions:

(1) That congregations not paying their Diocesan Assessments be charged interest on the overdue payments. Adopted.

- (2) That the Finance Committee be instructed to take necessary steps to provide means for meeting all apportionments of this Convention for salaries or other purposes promptly when due. Adopted.
- (3) That Canon XIV second paragraph, be repealed and that a reserve fund be established for meeting all expenses of the Diocese during that part of the fiscal year when the Diocesan assessments are not sufficient to meet the same.

Referred to the Committee on Canons by unanimous consent, and adopted.

The Rev. Robert  $\Lambda$ . Tufft read the report of the Committee on New Parishes, as follows:

The Committee on New Parishes having considered the application of the Organized Mission of All Saints, Roanoke Rapids, to be admitted as a Parish into union with the Convention, find that all Canonical requirements in the case have been complied with and therefore offer the following resolution:

That All Saints Mission. Roanoke Rapids, be admitted as a Parish into union with the Convention of the Diocese, and that Mr. George Carmichael be accredited as a delegate from said Parish to this Convention.

We also recommend that the following Organized Missions: St. Andrew's, Rockingham County, St. Paul's, Smithfield, Church of the Ascension, China Grove, having complied with the Canonical requirements, be admitted into union with the Convention and their delegates be duly accredited.

The recommendations were adopted by vote of the Convention.

At 12 noon Prayers for Missions were said by the Bishop. The Rev. Frederick Diehl read the report of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Convention, and the Rev. Julian E. Ingle that of the Branch of the Colored Convocation, which were received by a rising vote. (See Appendix F.)

The Rev. Sidney S. Bost read the report of the Committee on Finance, as follows:

The Finance Committee begs to report as follows:

- (1) Communication from the Rev. Mercer P. Logan, D.D., to say that the Diocese of North Carolina had been apportioned \$160 as our part of the expenses of the Synod of the Province of Sewanee for the current year, *Therefore be it resolved*, That the Treasurer of the Diocese be instructed to pay this sum of \$160. Carried.
- (2) Communication from the Rev. W. E. Gardiner, General Secretary of the Board of Religious Education, requesting the Diocese to pay \$120. Whereas, this amount has been raised heretofore by a Diocesan Committee of which Mr. Wade R. Brown is Secretary, your Committee recommend that the present plan be not disturbed. Adopted.
- (3) The resolution of Mr. G. H. Andrews proposing an amendment to Canon XI, section 1, is approved and the Committee on Canons is requested to draft the Canon accordingly. *Approved*.

The Rev. Edwin A. Osborne read a report from the Special Committee to whom was referred the matter of changing the Constitution by striking out the words "males" and inserting the words "persons." and asked that the Committee be continued with instructions to report at the next Convention. This request was granted.

Mr. Joseph Hyde Pratt offered the following resolution, which was adopted unanimously by rising vote:

Whereas, there now exists a state of war between our beloved country and the Imperial German Government; and whereas, we believe that in entering this present war we do so with no selfish purpose or desire and with no feeling of hatred towards those people with whom we are now at war, but on the contrary with a feeling of sympathy and sorrow for them; and whereas, we believe that it is now our righteous duty to participate in this world war and do all in our power to resist the wrong and maintain the rights of other nations and peoples as well as our own; Therefore, be it resolved.

That we, the representatives of this Church in the Diocese of North Carolina in Convention assembled, while desiring peace, do heartily approve the position taken by the President of the United States and the Administration in the conduct of this war, and will strive in every way possible by our efforts, prayers and influence to bring to a successful finish this world-wide war, to the end that there shall be established a permanent and righteous peace; and to prepare ourselves to lay hold of the wonderful opportunities which will then be offered to extend the Kingdom of God on this earth.

The Convention adjourned.

### Afternoon Session.

The Convention assembled at 3 p. m.

Mr. W. H. Ragland invited the Convention to meet in St. Luke's Church, Salisbury. This invitation was accepted.

Mr. J. S. Holmes offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

Whereas, it has come to our attention that the Brotherhood of St. Andrew is trying to secure the names of all Churchmen entering the Army and Navy; *Therefore be it resolved*. That all our Church people, clergymen and laymen, be requested to send to the Brotherhood of St. Andrew. Church House, Philadelphia, Pa., the names of all those Churchmen whom they may know of as enlisting in the Army or Navy or entering the Officers' or other Training Camps.

Mr. George Pollok Burgwyn offered the following resolution, which was adopted, and the Committee appointed as follows:

Resolved. That a committee of three be named by the Bishop of this Diocese to coöperate with a like committee from the Diocese of East Carolina to consider the wisdom and take the necessary steps to have printed and published the addresses that shall be delivered at New Bern upon the occasion of the joint Centennial celebration. May 17, 1917.

Committee appointed: Rev. Morrison Bethea, Mr. George Pollock Burgwyn, Mr. Hal London.

Mr. F. S. Spruill reported for the Committee appointed to examine the report of the Trustees of the Diocese that they could find nothing to report.

The Rev. William H. Hardin read the report of the Committee on the Carolina Churchman, and offered the following resolutions:

Resolved. (1) That this Convention shall appoint annually, as heretofore, a committee of three who shall select an Editor and Eusiness Manager and act for the Convention in the publication of our Diocesan paper, and that in addition special committees appointed by the Convocations be made a supplementary committee for conference and help in improving and enlarging its circulation. Adopted.

Resolved. (2) That the Diocese appropriate \$400 annually, payable in quarterly installments in July. October. January, and April next. for the support of the Carolina Churchman.

The above resolutions were referred to the Finance Committee, and, upon their recommendation, were submitted to Convention and approved.

The Rev. Thomas L. Trott offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

Whereas, in this time of crisis in our National life the thought of conservation comes forcibly to our minds both as regards our material resources as well as human life; and whereas, it has come to our attention that the authorities in Washington are endeavoring to restrict the sale of intoxicating liquors in the vicinity of the soldier camps: Therefore, be it

Resolved. That the Church in the Diocese of North Carolina, in Convention assembled. heartily endorses every movement that this

government is making to uplift the moral tone of the communities in the vicinity of the Camps, and we pledge our interest and coöperation in the work that is being done to this end.

The Bishop appointed the Committee on Apportionments, as follows: Rev. Charles A. Ashby, Rev. John L. Jackson, Rev. James K. Satterwhite, Mr. J. Frank Wilkes, Mr. William Boylan, Mr. Charles H. Boyer.

The Rev. Robert B. Owens read the report of the Committee on Canons:

- (1) Resolved. That Canon XI, section 1, be amended by striking out the words "Three Thousand" and inserting instead the words "Thirty-six hundred." Adopted.
- (2) We disapprove of the resolution of the Rev. John B. Gibble requiring an offering for the Jerusalem and the East Mission on Good Friday, but we advise that this object be printed among the objects recommended on the cover of the Journal. Adopted.
- (3) Resolved. That Canon VIII, section 1, be amended as follows: Strike out the words "The Bishop and." Adopted.
- (4) We have considered the resolution of Rev. Mr. Ingle proposing a change in Rule of Order 17, and we disapprove of said change and ask to be discharged from further consideration of the same. On motion, the Committee was instructed to bring in an amendment restoring the rule as prepared by the mover.
- (5) Resolved. That Article III, section 2, of the Constitution be amended by omitting in the second line the words "Or Suffragan Bishop, if there be one." Passed this Convention.
- (6) In regard to certain resolutions from the Committee on the Status of Organized Parishes and Missions, referred to us by the Convention, we report that we have examined the same and we recommend that the said Committee be continued and that these resolutions be re-referred to them to report at the next Convention. Carried.
- Mr. C. F. Clayton read the report of the Committee to whom was referred the report of the Thompson Orphanage, as follows:

Your committee note with pleasure the encouraging reports from the Superintendent of the Thompson Orphanage and Training Institution, and from the Treasurer and Trustees thereof, and also the report of the Trustees of the Permanent Fund.

We sympathize with the Superintendent, the Rev. Walter J. Smith,

in the responsibility and care that is upon him. This committee recommends that sufficient funds be provided promptly for the erection of a suitable barn, as this seems to be especially needed; and that other improvements asked for be provided as soon as possible. We recommend that the Clergy call these matters to the attention of their respective congregations, and urge contributions to cover same.

Under present conditions it is necessary for the management to ask merchants to carry their accounts for the summer months. Your committee believes that it would be better business for the board to arrange with the banks for the necessary money to pay cash for supplies.

The Rev. N. Collin Hughes offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

Resolved. That expenses necessarily incurred by the members of the Committee on Apportionments and the Committee on the Pension Fund when performing the duties assigned to them during the recess of Convention. shall be paid out of the Episcopal and Contingent Fund, and the Treasurer is hereby authorized and instructed to pay the same upon requisition by the Chairman of the Committee.

The Rev. Walter J. Smith spoke on the work of the Thompson Orphanage and Training Institution.

On motion of Mr. W. A. Erwin, the action of the Convention on the Thorp report was reconsidered. An amendment to the original resolution was then offered, changing the amount offered from \$500 to \$1,000, and, on motion, the resolution as so amended was adopted.

On motion of Mr. W. A. Erwin, a rising vote of thanks was given to the Rev. Julian E. Ingle for his long and faithful service as Secretary of the Convention, and a purse was presented to him.

It was moved and carried that when the Convention adjourn, after the night session, it adjourn to meet in Salisbury on May 14, 1918.

On motion of Mr. R. D. W. Connor, the Bishop was empowered and instructed to fill the place of any elected Delegate who was unable to attend the Provincial Synod.

The Rev. S. S. Bost read the report of the Committee on Finance:

Resolved, (1) That the basis of assessment for the Episcopal and Contingent Fund for a calendar year be and is hereby made 12½ per cent of the minister's salary and current expenses. Carried.

Resolved, (2) That the latter part of Canon XIV, beginning with the words "And the Treasurer is hereby directed to add to the same," etc., be repealed, and that this resolution be referred to the Committee on Canons with instructions to report favorably on such repeal. Referred to the Committee on Canons.

Resolved, (3) That the Treasurer be instructed, in accordance with the resolution passed at the last Convention on page 52 of the Journal of 1916, to restore to the fund for the work of the Church at Chapel Hill the sum of \$81.55, which appears as the credit balance to this fund in the Treasurer's report of 1916. And further, that all such balances shall be kept in such fund and shall not be diverted to any other fund. Carried.

Resolved, (4) That the Treasurer be instructed to pay to Mr. Wade R. Brown the sum of \$10.40 for expenses incurred in raising the Diocesan appropriation to the General Board of Religious Education. Carried.

Resolved (5) That on account of error of \$20 in calculation and by reason of what seems to your Committee as excessive assessment upon the Church of the Holy Comforter, Charlotte, the Treasurer be instructed to remit \$89 arrearages against said Church, and that the assessment for the next year of twelve calendar months be 12½ per cent upon \$1.440 as the minister's salary, and the same per cent upon current expenses. Carried.

Resolved, (6) That arrearages of \$26.25 against St. Martin's Church, Charlotte, be remitted and that the assessment of 12½ per cent be made upon \$1,500 as the minister's salary, and the same per cent upon the current expenses. Carried.

Resolved, (7) Remit as follows all arrearages against Grace Church, Lexington, and fix the assessment at the rate of \$100 for twelve calendar months. Remit all arrearages against the Church of the Messiah, Mayodan, and fix the assessment at \$75. Remit all against St. Ambrose, Raleigh, and all against St. Saviour's, Raleigh, and fix the assessment at \$2.50. Remit all against St. Thomas, Reidsville, and fix the assessment at \$42. Remit all against St. Luke's, Spray, and fix the assessment at \$25. Remit all against Holy Trinity, Statesville, and fix the assessment at \$20. Carried.

Resolved. (8) That the Treasurer be instructed to pay the editor of the Carolina Churchman \$100 quarterly, payable on July 1, October 1. January 1, and April 1. Carried.

Resolved, (9) That the Finance Committee be instructed to make out a schedule of assessments for nine months beginning April 1. 1917 and ending December 31, 1917. Carried.

On motion of the Rev. Isaac W. Hughes, the following Committee was appointed to cooperate with similar committees from other Dioceses in regard to the endowment of St. Mary's School: Rev. Charles Aylett Ashby, Rev. Frederick Diehl, Mr. Thomas H. Battle, Mr. H. A. London, Mr. Arthur L. London.

The Rev. George W. Lay, D.C.L., and Rev. Francis M. Osborne spoke on the work of St. Mary's School.

The Rev. Warren W. Way read the report of the Special Committee to which was referred the report of St. Mary's School, as follows:

The Special Committee to whom was referred the report of the Trustees of St. Mary's School have carefully considered the report, and urge upon the members of the Convention their coöperation in the serious crisis which now confronts the school; and further, would remind the Convention that it has already given its hearty sanction to the plan outlined in said report for paying the funded debt of \$40,000, and for securing money for an endowment and new buildings.

While the Church Pension Fund will eventaually care for all the Clergy after reaching the age of sixty-eight years, our Association provides a small annuity for the eight years before that pension becomes available, and continues its beneficence to the end of life. 11 a. m. The Holy Communion was celebrated by the Rt. Rev. Joseph B. Cheshire, D. D., Bishop of North Carolina, assisted by the Rt. Rev. Junius M. Horner, D.D., Bishop of Asheville; the Rt. Rev. Thomas C. Darst, D.D., Bishop of East Carolina, preaching the sermon.

3 p. m. There was a Special Centennial Service. Rev. Robert B. Drane, D.D., presiding. Addresses were made by the Rt. Rev. Joseph B. Cheshire, D.D., on "The Church in North Carolina in 1817," and by Mr. Marshall DeLancey Haywood, on "The Men of the First Convention."

8 p. m. The Special Centennial Service was continued with the Rev. Edwin A. Osborne presiding. Addresses were made by the Hon. Francis D. Winston on "The Church in North Carolina During the Past Century," and by the Rev. William H. Milton, D.D., on "The Church in North Carolina, Present and Future."

The Service was closed with a special Commemorative Prayer and Benediction by the Rt. Rev. Joseph B. Cheshire, D.D., Bishop of North Carolina.

# THE REVEREND BENJAMIN SWAN BRONSON

Born at Anson, Maine. April 3, 1829.

Graduated at Yale College 1849.

Studied Divinity under the late Bishop Watson while teaching in North Carolina. Ordered Deacon by Bishop Atkinson in St. James' Church, Wilmington, May 21, 1854. Ordained Priest by the same Frelate in St. Luke's Church, Salisbury, May 31, 1857.

With the exception of a residence of four years in Maryland, his entire ministry was spent in North Carolina. After resigning the rectorship of Emmanuel Church, Warrenton, March 1, 1903, he for some years conducted a private school, and afterward lived in retirement in the same neighborhood until the end of his life.

He passed peacefully away at his home on Saturday in Easter Week, April 14, 1917, at the age of eighty-eight years.

Requiescat in pace.

### APPENDIX A.

### ADDRESS OF THE BISHOP.

Brethren of the Clergy and Laity:

The 24th of April, just three weeks ago, was the one hundredth anniversary of the formation of the Diocese of North Carolina, and of the meeting of our first Diocesan Conven-The Diocese then embraced the State of North Caro-By the erection of the Diocese of East Carolina in 1883, and of the Missionary District of Asheville in 1895, we have become three separate organizations within the limits of our State, though still bound together by common traditions, and by ties of affection and sympathy. I deny myself the pleasure of enlarging upon the many interesting topics suggested by the completion of a century of diocesan existence, because we hope to meet in Newbern on Holy Thursday, immediately upon the adjournment of this Convention, that North Carolina, East Carolina, and Asheville may join in a common service of commemoration and thanksgiving upon this memorable occasion. I think we may truly say, "The Lord hath done great things for us already, whereof we rejoice"; and may He have greater things to do with us in the vears to come!

I must begin my Address by calling on you to join with me in thanking our mereiful God and Saviour for the useful lives and peaceful departure of some of our dear and noble brethren, who since our last meeting have been called to their rest.

The oldest Priest of the Diocese, and in some respects the most notable, the Rev. Benjamin Swann Bronson, fell on sleep April 14, 1917, having completed his eighty-eighth year April 3d. I saw him on the 20th of March preceding, and conversed with him for perhaps an hour. Weak in body, he showed no dimness of intellectual or spiritual faculties. He spoke with entire freedom and composure of his approaching transition, expressing no reluctance to go, but hoping that he might finish out his eighty-eight years, a hope which was fulfilled. The only personal concern of which he spoke had

reference to the discharge of an obligation to a dear and valued friend, who had been very kind to him. I was able to assure him that he need feel no apprehension in the matter. All his other interest seemed to be connected with the present condition and prospects of St. Mary's School and the Thompson Orphanage. He had always felt that the interests of the Church could best be served by building up permanent institutions for Church work, and he had given much of the thought and effort of his life to such objects. He had not been successful in his own attempts, for he was singularly lacking in executive and administrative ability. He was, as we say, visionary, and in his fine inward vision forgot outward detail. But the power of vision is a marvelous power, and the real source of all worthy achievement: "Where no vision is the people perish." He saw what might be, and what ought to be; and he showed the way. He was a great source of help to me. When I followed him in Charlotte, after an interval of three years, I found St. Peter's Church in that city alive with his ideals and purposes and hopes. I tried to take up and carry out some of the designs I thus found ready to my hand. I feel that such work as I may have accomplished there was to a considerable degree by building upon his foundations. Since I have had the care of this Diocese committed to me, I have had much help of the same kind from him. His mind was a mine in which might be found much precious gold of priceless thoughts and ideas. I believe many others have consciously or unconsciously been helped by him, as I gratefully acknowledge that I have been. I believe him to have been a much more useful man than would appear from any work done by himself in its visible results. The Thompson Orphanage, developed and established by the faith and labors of the Rev. Edwin A. Osborne, sprang out of the hopes and efforts of Mr. Bronson, and is today carried on under the provisions of a deed of trust executed by him to the Trustees of the Diocese. The first hospital, as an instrumentality of Christian and charitable wook, in this State, St. Peter's Hospital, Charlotte, had its origin in the same source. The Good Samaritan Hospital for Negroes, the first in the State, was the offspring of St. Peter's Hospital. But I cannot prolong this notice, only I must be allowed to record this slight tribute to our dear brother, however inadequate it may be.

It has not been my custom to dwell upon the death of the lay members of the Diocese. It would be impossible to mention all, and the difficulty of making a just discrimination must be quite apparent. But when in one year we lose from our parochial and diocesan activities John S. Henderson, William L. London, and John Cameron Buxton, it is not possible that I should fail to give some expression to that universal sense of sorrow which I know afflicts the hearts of our people of North Carolina. They were all notable men in their own individual personality; they came of distinguished ancestors who had held the highest positions both in Church and State since we have had civil and ecclesiastical institutions; they had been, each one from his early youth, earnest, active, and useful in the Church, each one the leading Churchman in his own community, and they had all served for many years in our Diocesan Convention, and repeatedly represented the Diocese in the General Convention. It would be a pleasure to me to draw out, so far as my abilities might enable me, their several characters, and to dwell upon their services to their fellows—especially the noble part they have played in our Church life. This, however, is impossible. I must content myself with this brief reference to them. In this our centennial year, they are a noble trio added to the treasures the Church in North Carolina has laid up in the eternal storehouse. While we feel the greatness of our loss, we rejoice in their goodly example: "My song shall be of mercy and judgment: unto Thee, O Lord, will I sing."

Having lost nine and gained seven, our total is reduced by two, and stands now, 1 Bishop, 51 Priests, and 10 Deacons—62 in all.

It should be remembered that the Rev. Edward Philip Green, whom I had deposed in 1901 for causes not affecting his moral character, and who had been for some time residing in Augusta, Georgia. was, upon the request of the Bishop of Georgia. and by due canonical procedure, restored to the exercise of his function October 31, 1916; and was the same day transferred to the Bishop of Georgia and accepted by him.

The Candidates for Holy Orders are: George C. Pollard, Arthur Myron Cochran, George H. W. Bullock, James Reginald Mallett, Roger Edgar Bunn, Theodore Stroup, and Roma Coxey Fortune.

The Postulants are: Edward Gray Joyner and Jadi Levi Martin.

The fields of labor of the Clergy are the same as last year, with the following exceptions:

The Rev. Basil M. Walton, Deacon, is serving under the direction of the Rev. Isaac W. Hughes, his special work being in St. Paul's Church, Louisburg, and St. James' Church, Kittrell.

The Rev. Howard S. Hartzell, Deacon, is serving under the Rev. William J. Gordon, in Leaksville, Spray, and adjacent missions,

The Rev. Sanford L. Rotter, Deacon, is finishing his course in the Virginia Theological Seminary.

The Rev. Reuben Meredith is Rector of Trinity Church, Scotland Neck, and has also under his care Halifax, Enfield, and Ringwood.

The Rev. Frederick Diehl is Rector of the Church of the Good Shepherd, Rocky Mount, and has under his care Battleboro and the new mission of St. Jude's Church, Spring Hope.

The Rev. Dr. Pittenger, having resigned the rectorship of the Church of the Good Shepherd, after twenty-five years of faithful and efficient service, has taken charge of the missions of St. Gabriel's, Selma, and St. John's, Wake County.

The Rev. Charles  $\Lambda$ . Ashby became Rector of the Church

of the Good Shepherd, Raleigh, March 1.

The Rev. R. Maynard Marshall assumed the rectorship of the Chapel of the Cross, Chapel Hill, March 1.

The Rev. Lewis C. Morrison took charge of St. Stephen's Church, Duke, and St. Paul's, Smithfield, March 1. He was transferred to the Diocese April 1.

The Rev. Phillips S. Gilman, of the Diocese of Massachusetts, has accepted a call to become rector of St. Paul's Church, Winston, and promises to take charge the first of next July. In the meantime that parish is fortunate in having the services of the Rev. A. Whitfield Cheatham.

St. Thomas' Church, Reidsville, vacant since the transfer of the Rev. Mr. LeBlane to the District of Asheville, is being eared for at present by the Rev. Mr. Gordon, of Spray.

The Rev. Clarence G. Prosperi, Deacon, April 1, gave up the work at Concord, Mooresville, and St. James, Church, Iredell County, and is for the present assisting in the work in Rowan County, in connection with Trinity Church, Statesville.

The Rev. Lewis N. Taylor has resigned the work at Stovall, Townesville, and St. John's Church, Vance County, and April 1 assumed charge of the important work of All Saints' Mission, Roanoke Rapids, and St. Luke's Church, Northampton County, formerly under the care of the Rev. Henry C. Smith.

Under an arrangement with Archdeacon Hughes, the Rev. Frank B. Ticknor, of Southern Florida, is for the present officiating at Sanford, and also earing for St. Mark's, Gulf, and the Mission at Holly Springs, Wake County. The Rev. Harry O. Nash, of Southern Pines, desiring a change during the heat of summer, will have charge for some months of Stovall, Townesville, and the rest of the field lately served by the Rev. Lewis N. Taylor.

The most important vacancies are High Point, Concord, and Mayodan. At the last named place Mr. J. Reginald Mallett, one of our Candidates for Orders, is very effectively serving as lay reader and catechist for the present, and I hope

within the next few months to have a resident minister in charge. At Concord and High Point earnest efforts are being made to secure permanent pastors.

On the whole the Diocese is well manned. The several important vacancies which have occurred during the year have all been supplied, and the new men who have come to us are a distinct addition to the strength of the Diocese, as well as to their several parishes.

As tedious as this formal report of the conditions of our work must necessarily be, I cannot omit to mention, with more than a passing notice, the resignation by the Rev. Dr. Pittenger of the rectorship of the Church of the Good Shepherd, after twenty-five years of faithful service and most successful administration. Not desiring to retire from active work, but feeling that the demands of the parish were a greater burden than he could well endure, he has taken charge of two missions easily accessible from Raleigh, both of which he had himself been instrumental in beginning some years ago. When he formally tendered his resignation of the parish, to take effect September 15, 1916, he could look upon the fruits of his quarter of a century rectorship, represented by one of the most beautiful churches anywhere to be found, and upon a congregation more than doubled in numbers, well organized, and zealous in all good works. We trust that the Diocese and this Convention may still enjoy the benefit of his services for some years to come.

When I come to speak of the many subjects of interest and importance which present themselves to my mind as I think of what lies before us, I hardly know how to choose those which have the strongest claim to be pressed upon your attention at this time. Our most important diocesan institution is St. Mary's School. I cannot too earnestly urge upon the clergy and people of the Diocese to unite in strong and enthusiastic and generous support of the effort now made by the Board of Trustees to provide for the more adequate support and development of our oldest, most useful, and most successful Church work. It is in every way entitled to all it asks; and I would gladly devote the whole of my space in this Address to setting forth its claims upon us, both on the ground of what it has already accomplished in its past for the Church, and for the incalculable possibilities of its future. I feel, however, that St. Mary's School will be adequately brought to your attention in the Report of its Board of Trustees, and more especially by the Agent and Representative of the Board, the Rev. Francis M. Osborne.

The same may be said of the Thompson Orphanage and Training Institution. We shall have from its Board of Managers and from its excellent Superintendent a full report upon its work and its needs.

I feel that such space as remains to me in this Address must be devoted to one or two matters in which our diocesan affairs are very materially affected by the action of the General Convention of 1916.

#### THE PENSION FUND.

I think I need not enlarge on this subject. It has been brought so effectively to the attention of the whole Church that you all appreciate its importance. It affords a way by which the laity may make some reasonable provision for the disability of its faithful clergy and for their dependent families. But note, that it only establishes a means and a method whereby provision may be made by the laity. laity zealously use the means, and follow the method devised. nothing will be accomplished. It has sometimes been supposed, and erroneously asserted, that the method is purely selfish business, with no element of generous Christian charity, that they who pay much get much, and that they for whom only small payments are made can receive only what those small payments will provide. This is a great mistake. It does proceed on the business principle that if the people will not pay anything, or if they fail to pay the proportion assigned to them, their minister will suffer loss by reason of their failure. But it also provides that where the smallest and weakest parish pays faithfully the small assessment required, their clergyman shall receive a pension twice as large as the maximum granted to any elergyman in my experience by our old method, which simply appealed to an unregulated spirit of charity. So far as I am able to understand the system, it commends itself to my judgment as admirably adapted to meet the end proposed; but I am free to confess that, if to my individual judgment it seemed otherwise, I should hesitate to trust my individual judgment against the mature and deliberate conclusions of some of the best minds and soundest hearts in our American Church.

Our part now is to see that all our parishes, missions, Convocations, and other ecclesiastical and semi-ecclesiastical organizations, which employ the services of a clergyman, pay systematically the required assessment, that none of our deserving brethren be deprived of the benefit of this noble effort for their support and comfort. Immediately upon the going into effect of the Pension Fund system, I called together the Executive Committee of our several Convocations and had arrangements made, and immediately put into effect, for paying the proper assessments on behalf of our diocesan missionaries; and I also brought the matter to the attention of our schools and other institutions. I believe a good beginning has been made by all these diocesan organizations, and I trust that the parishes have done the same. In accordance with the terms of the Canon passed at our last Convention, I appointed a Diocesan Committee on the Pension Fund, as is recorded in our Journal of last year.

In speaking of the Pension Fund I should not fail to acknowledge the services of our own Diocesan Committee, and especially the faithful and efficient work of our Chairman, Mr. Wm. A. Erwin. Called unexpectedly to take the place of Dr. Herty, when the latter removed from the Diocese, Mr. Erwin accepted the position under very considerable disadvantages, and at great personal inconvenience. It was late in the campaign, and even then it was impossible for him to begin his work, on account of previous engagements, until some months had passed. Under these unfavorable circumstances the result achieved was much beyond my expectations, and I am most deeply gratified that the Diocese was able to do so well in this noble enterprise.

#### CHANGE IN FISCAL YEAR, ETC.

An amendment to Canon 49 of the Canons of the General Convention requires all parochial reports to be made annually up to December 31, and a new Canon 50 has been enacted making the fiscal year end December 31, and requiring much greater accuracy and fulness in parochial and other accounts, with specific directions as to diocesan supervision of all accounts and the systematic auditing of the same; all which demand the serious attention of this Convention and some amendments in our diocesan Canons, and the adaptation of our methods to the provisions of these new enactments. I

shall not attempt any exposition of these new rules and methods; they will be sufficiently manifest by an examination of the Canons referred to, and a very full explanation of their purpose has been put out by the eminent layman who is understood to have been chiefly instrumental in framing them, which, in pamphlet form, has been widely circulated during the last few months. I ask the Convention to give their careful attention to this matter, that we may take such action as may be necessary to carry out in our diocesan affairs the methods prescribed by the General Convention.

I venture, however, to make one suggestion for your consideration in this connection. If our reports and accounts must all be made up from January 1 to December 31, it is to be considered whether that will not require some change in the time of holding our annual Convention. If we meet in May, accounts and reports for the year ending nearly five months previous will hardly afford an intelligible basis for our discussion and action. It is a question which should be carefully considered, and I do not advance any very confident opinion on it—but it has occurred to me that it might be an advantage to hold our Diocesan Convention during the month of February, if our financial and statistical reports are all to be made up to December 31st.

I believe that the questions raised by these changes in the Canons of the General Convention are the most important and difficult of any now before us, and I ask that the Convention give them their most careful examination and consideration.

#### A SUFFRAGAN BISHOP FOR THE NEGROES.

In common with most of our Southern Dioceses, we have for some years been pressing upon the General Convention the importance of doing something more effective for the advancement of our Church work among the negroes of the South. Our preference has been for a Racial Missionary District to include the colored clergy and congregations of contiguous Dioceses, with a negro Missionary Bishop, under provisions as to government and representation similar to those now applying to our territorial Missionary Districts. This proposed method of dealing with the negro work has been earnestly and elaborately considered and discussed for at least four General Conventions, and has been as often rejected by that body in favor of the proposal to deal with the negro work by the aid of a negro Suffragan Bishop. I am not prepared to say what

should be done by this Diocese, but I think that loyalty to our highest legislative body, and consistency with our own reiterated professions of interest in the welfare of our colored brethren, and earnestness in support of our Church work among them, require that we should at least consider seriously whether we are in a position to take up the method thus repeatedly recommended by our great national Church Council. I therefore ask this Convention to appoint a Committee of its ablest and most judicious members—clergymen and laymen—with instructions that they consider whether it be advisable and practicable, by the action of our own Diocese, or in cooperation with other Dioceses, to secure the consecration of a negro Suffragan Bishop for the work of the Church among the colored people. This Committee should be authorized to confer with any similar committees which may be appointed by neighboring Dioceses, and to report to our next Convention the result of their labors.

Other matters might be mentioned, but I must make an I have said nothing of the condition of the country and the many sad and solemn thoughts which must weigh upon our hearts and minds as we find ourselves again drawn into war with our Christian brethren of other lands. business in this Convention has no immediate connection with this condition of the country. We thank God that we have a Chief Executive who has shown that he loves peace and would willingly believe all things and endure all things, with every possible exercise of charitable construction and interpretation, rather than involve his country in the horrors of war. And we thank God also that when patience and gentleness were found unavailing to stem the tide of lawless barbarity, he has invoked the power of our country to enforce among the nations of the earth the principles of humanity and freedom. We dare not claim for ourselves any exemption from evil or In many respects we have great sins to repent of, and great faults needing amendment. But in regard to this present war we know that we have no selfish purpose or desires. Our participation in it is only for the purpose of resisting wrong and maintaining the rights of other nations and peoples as well as our own. And in this confidence we send forth our sons at the call of our country; and we humbly and with a clear conscience pray that the God of Truth and Righteousness may be with us, and use us to establish His reign upon earth. Two matters I desire to mention in connection with my accounts of money received and disbursed by me.

- 1. The items of interst mentioned in former accounts as received from the Williams-Belk Co. at Sanford, belonged to a fund held by the Trustees of the Diocese for the benefit of our work at Sanford. This interest has been paid out by me for that work, and has been accounted for in a settlement made with the Rev. N. Collin Hughes. Archdeacon, in charge of the work at Sanford.
- 2. A balance of \$944.86 in the Raleigh Mechanics Savings Bank, of a fund originally raised for building a church at Pinehurst, was temporarily withdrawn from the bank, upon security approved by the Trustees of the Diocese. It has been replaced in the same bank. As a Trustee is entitled to some remuneration for administering trust funds. I thought it not improper to use the interest, while thus withdrawn, on the missionary work of the Diocese.

### APPENDIX D.

### REPORT OF THE CONVOCATION OF RALEIGH

The report to the Convention required by canon is submitted by resolution of the Convocation by the Executive Committee, and the Executive Committee reports through a sub-committee.

For the Executive Committee, the Secretary reports a sustained interest in the work by all the members of the committee and full attendance on all the quarterly meetings, and faithful and efficient work by the sub-committees. The committee mourns the loss of one of its most faithful and efficient members, Capt. Wm. L. London, of Pittsboro. While the Executive Committee suffers the greatest loss in the death of Capt. Wm. L. London, the Diocese and Church as a whole will miss one of its ablest, most devout and faithful members, who was at all times ready and willing to do his full part in the work of the Church. This vacancy in the Executive Committee was filled by the appointment of Mr. Joseph B. Cheshire, Jr., and the full membership of the committee was continued without further break.

Following the suggestion of the Convention of 1915, the committee made the apportionments more nearly in amount the appropriations for the work of the Convocation, and the committee is glad to report success in this method of carrying on the work. At each quarterly meeting the Treasurer has submitted reports from which it appeared that he was at all times able to meet the stipends of the missionaries when due and generally had some balance on hand, while most of the parishes and missions kept up apportionments made upon them.

As stated in the last Convention, these apportionments on the several parishes and missions are in no sense arbitrary levies on them, but a request of the Executive Committee for contribution for the work of the Convocation based upon such sums as the parishes and missions have been giving voluntarily, with some pro rata increase to meet the increased needs of the work. And the committee gratefully acknowledges a generous support from the several parishes and missions and a cheerful acquiescence in the apportionments thus made, only a few frankly stating their inability to pay all asked of them, and paying less.

A table of appropriations, and also of the apportionments for the year ending March 31, 1918, is appended hereto and asked to be considered as part of this report.

At each meeting the Archdeacon, Treasurer, and sub-committees have made reports of the progress of the work of the Convocation, and the committee has thus kept in close touch with the work.

Two innovations are meeting with success so far: the first the Archdeacon's plan of consolidating the smaller and weaker parishes

and missions with stronger ones in groups, and the second the Clerical Conferences, at places and at times appointed by the Archdeacon for discussion of the needs of the work, at the expense of the Convocation.

The Archdeacon's report deals more in detail with these new plans, and also states the various fields and missionaries at work therein and vacancies and prospects of filling same, all of which are closely supervised by the committee as a whole.

Upon the whole, the committee reports most faithful work on the part of the several missionaries and progression in the work of the Convocation, hampered chiefly by the lack of missionaries for the vacant fields.

Reverend Father in God:—The summary of my official acts for the diocesan year, April 1, 1916-March 31, 1917, is as follows:

In July and in March I spent short terms canvassing for funds for the house of worship at the State Farm.

During the year I attended, with the Bishop's consent, at my own expense,

- (1) In April, the National Convention of the Laymen's Missionary Movement, in Washington City;
- (2) In October, as a State delegate appointed by the Governor, the Annual Congress of the National Prison Association, at Buffalo, New York.

Conditions within the Convocation are, upon the whole, encouraging. At present writing, April 24, all of the established parishes and missions are regularly served except the field in Granville and Vance counties, left vacant by the removal of Rev. Lewis N. Taylor to take charge of All Saints, Roanoke Rapids, and St. Luke's, Northampton County, and it is earnestly hoped that this vacancy may be supplied during the summer and permanently filled without much delay.

Early in March Rev. Lewis Chester Morrison, late of the Diocese of Harrisburg, took charge of Duke and Smithfield. More recently

Rev. Frank B. Ticknor came to us from Columbus, Georgia, and is giving regular service at St. Thomas's, Sanford, St. Mark's, Gulf, and to the congregation at Holly Springs. Arrangements are made also by which Rev. Dr. Pittenger gives regular service to St. Gabriel's, Selma, and St. John's Mission, Wake County.

The two clergy conferences formed within the year, namely, the Coast Line Clericus and the Seaboard District Conference, have met quarterly since being formed, and so far seem fully to justify their institution and to give promise of growing usefulness.

Appropriations for our missionaries for the current year have all been promptly paid, and the financial status, not only of the Missionary Fund but of all the missions throughout the Convocation, will show marked improvement.

### REPORT OF THE CONVOCATION OF CHARLOTTE.

To the Right Reverend Joseph Blount Cheshire, D.D., Bishop of North Carolina:

I respectfully submit my report as Archdeacon of the Convocation of Charlotte for the year ending March 31, 1917:

In summing up the work of the past year, we have indeed abundant cause for thankfulness and encouragement. Never, I am sure, has there been greater concert of action on the part of our ever faithful missionaries, and lay people as well, to advance the work of the kingdom. Many of our zealous laymen who have heretofore been standing idle in the market place because no man hath hired them, to use the scriptural phrase, have been pressed into service as Lay Readers and Sunday School teachers, which has increased very appreciably the scope and efficiency of our work, especially in the rural communities. In addition to this, several of our parochial clergy have rendered valuable assistance in maintaining services in near-by missions, notably, the Rev. Mr. Way of Salisbury and the Rev. Mr. Andrews of Lexington, for which we are most grateful.

The Archdeacon has visited as many homes as practicable, distributing tracts and other helpful literature when available.

Special attention has been given to the proper grading of our Sunday Schools and the adoption of a suitable curriculum.

Of the forty-seven apportionments for last year, forty-two were paid in full, the remainder in part; or, to be more definite, of the total apportionment of \$2,300, \$2,289.66 was paid, leaving a balance unpaid of \$10.34. The amount thus realized, together with the generous help of our friends in the way of individual offerings, has made it possible for us to meet our obligations in full and begin the new year with a small balance in the treasury.

At the request of the Bishop, the Convocation has undertaken the collection of the assessments from such missions as are liable, for the Church Pension Fund, until the matter can be taken in hand by the Diocesan Committee. A table of assessments was accordingly prepared, and a statement rendered to the minister in charge and treasurer of each mission. Of the twenty-four missions subject to

assessment, sixteen have made the required payments, including the Convocation, and it is hoped that the remainder will shortly fall in line.

Since the last meeting of the Convention a very substantial brick church has been erected at China Grove, to be known as Ascension Church; also a similar structure in Salisbury to be known as St. Peter's. The latter supplants the old chapel of the same name located a few blocks distant in a less desirable portion of the town, which was removed to a lot near Livingston College given by the late Dr. Murdoch for a colored mission, and now known as St. Philip's. All of these buildings upon completion were fully paid for and have been consecrated.

At present all our missions are supplied with clergymen with the exception of the Mayodan group, which is being most acceptably ministered to by Mr. J. Reginald Mallett, a candidate for Holy Orders, who is acting as Lay Reader and Catechist pending the appointment of a regular worker who we trust may be secured in the near future.

## REPORT OF ARCHDEACON FOR COLORED WORK IN THE DIOCESE OF NORTH CAROLINA.

To the Right Reverend Joseph Blount Cheshire, D.D., Bishop of North Carolina:

I respectfully submit the following as a report of my official acts for the year ending March 31, 1917:

My travels outside of the Diocese have been restricted to my attending the Conference of Church Workers which met in the city of Philadelphia in October, and a visit to the Diocese of East Carolina in April of last year.

We rejoice to meet with you again in convention assembled, and eagerly grasp the privilege of celebrating with you the one hundredth anniversary of the organization of the Diocese in North Carolina; and since it was just fifty years ago on Easter of 1916 that your fathers organized St. Cyprian's Church, New Bern, for the benefit of my people, it is evident that at this time a dual privilege is accorded the colored churchmen of the State. God has abundantly blessed and is continuing to bless the labors of the Colored Convocation; and while the Archdeacon is deprived of the results of a statistical comparison because of one or two reports yet to be received, he is confident that the comparison, when made, will show the same steady progress that has been characteristic of the Convocation's growth. There have been no changes in the workers of the Convocation since the last report, and but one contemplated. The Rev. John W. Perry, senior priest of the Colored Convocation, because of his physical condition, has agreed to resign the rectorate of St. Luke's Church, Tarboro, when a suitable successor may be found, and I have already conferred with a priest who has decided to accept a call this summer. Because of the development of the public school system in Charlotte the Trustees of St. Michael's Training and Industrial School have decided to close that school at the end of the present session. As far as we are able to see, this leaves Prof. A. Myron Cochran, a candidate for the ministry and one of our active workers of the Convocation, without employment.

Through the aid of friends sufficient funds have been secured to

justify our beginning work again on the Thomas Cain Memorial Church in Warrenton. It is our earnest prayer that God may raise up to us more friends to aid us in the completion of this church.

On the 29th of last October the colored churchmen of Greensboro had their opening services in their new church. They were favored with a sermon by their Archdeacon in the morning, and in the afternoon with a sermon by the Rev. Mr. Miller, rector of St. Andrew's Church, and an address by the Bishop of the Diocese. The Church of the Redeemer is built largely of the material of what was St. Cuthbert's Chapel of Proximity Mills, and is now one of the most substantial and beautiful churches of the Convocation.

On the 21st of last December a letter was received from Archdeacon Hardin with the information that through the help of friends he had succeeded in placing a neat chapel, to be known as St. Philip's, on the lot purchased by the late Dr. Murdock for that purpose. This chapel is near Livingston College, Salisbury. On the 28th of January the chapel was received from Archdeacon Hardin, the nucles of a congregation gathered, and the first service conducted in the same.

On the 14th of February a mission was begun and conducted through the rest of the week. The Rev. Mr. King of Charlotte and Mr. Satterwhite of Raleigh assisted in the services, and on the afternoon of the 18th the Bishop of the Diocese consecrated St. Philip's Chapel in the presence of a large congregation composed of the clergy and laity of both races. It is thus that our Convocation, in the short period of less than four months, has realized, through the munificence of the late Dr. Murdock, a property value that must be reckoned in thousands. The Church of the Redeemer alone is valued at \$5,500, and its entire indebtedness will not exceed \$1,050. A campaign is now being conducted to cancel this indebtedness by June 1st.

A severe blow was given the hopes and aspirations of your Colored Convocation in the defeat of the Missionary Jurisdiction Plan. but under God's guidance, being encouraged by the earnest support which you have constantly given us, we have been enabled, Phonix like, to find victory in the very ashes of our defeat. We now pray for a speedy application of the plan which the Church in her wisdom has been pleased to adopt. On last Friday, May the 12th, in Hope, Ark., the Diocese of Arkansas, then in session, elected the Rev. James S. Russell, Archdeacon of Southern Virginia, as Bishop Suffragan for that Diocese. The Rev. Mr. Russell is the first negro to be elected suffragan under action of the last General Convention. May God in His wisdom move the hearts of those composing our Southern Dioceses that they may speedily advance the present plan which they have so earnestly advocated as being the most feasible for their negro churchmen. Plans have been effected for the Convocation to meet its obligations to the Church Pension Fund, and the Treasurer of the Convocation is making his payments quarterly as required by canon. The Treasurer of the Convocation is now prepared to make his report to the Convention.

### APPENDIX E.

## REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE CHURCH.

The Committee on the State of the Church have carefully examined the statistics of the Diocese referred to them by the Secretary. Owing to the fact that some parishes and missions have not reported at all, and that several others have made only partial reports, an accurate comparison with the reports of previous years is totally impossible, except in regard to certain special items. Presumably, the list of baptisms is correct, and we regret to note that there has been a marked decrease from last year. There is also a decrease in the number of communicants, due more probably to inaccuracy in reporting than to actual facts.

In statistics that are probably more accurate, viz., financial statistics, we note several encouraging things. The offerings for Diocesan Missions have increased over last year 10 per cent; those for General Missions 8 per cent; and those for Sewanee over 90 per cent. But one offering is by no means what it ought to be: only \$362 was given for the Colored Convocation, considerably less than last year. The Committee on Apportionments has a resolution to come before this Convention asking for 10 per cent of the missionary offering of each congregation for this work, and we heartily endorse that apportionment, and hope that every congregation will accept it.

Also, we desire to impress on the minds of the treasurers the importance of paying regularly and promptly the small assessments to the Church Pension Fund, as failure to do so results in loss to the beneficiary. The Commission would rather have the payments made quarterly, in advance, when possible.

The minimum amount received is so much more than has been possible to provide heretofore that every parish or mission ought to make a special effort to insure the recipient of the full benefits under the plan.

The failure of the Diocese to make a proper advance in the number of baptisms and confirmations reported should lead us to serious consideration of the question of how well we are employing the means to spiritual ends which are at our disposal. In the midst of our efforts to improve the organization and the financial and material equipment of our parishes and institutions we should not lose sight of the fact that the chief concern of the Church must be to bring human souls into the kingdom and build up the spiritual power of the Church through sacramental means of divine appointment, namely, preaching the Word, faithfully administering the sacraments of baptism and Holy Communion, and leading the people to worship and pray. To further these things at the time when war,

by its sobering influence, turns the hearts and minds of people to the realities of life, the Diocese might well make a concerted effort through a continuance of the preaching or evangelical mission, such as was carried on recently at the suggestion of a Commission of the General Convention. The effort of this Commission of the General Convention has been continued and promises to become a permanent factor in the forward movement of the Church. Doubtless the Diocese can also conserve the value of its recent experience in this connection, and improve its opportunities by a special and concerted effort in this line.

In connection with this matter we should particularly consider the rural districts as a field for evangelical work. It is reported on good authority that only 40 per cent of our country population in North Carolina is even nominally included in the membership of the various Christian communions. Here lies a greatly neglected field. We therefore offer the following resolutions:

Resolved, That this Convention appoint a commission of five to organize and direct in the Diocese of North Carolin a preaching mission or other evangelical work, especially in rural communities.

Your committee notes that Canon 50 of the General Canons looks to the improvement of business methods employed by the Church. This is greatly needed, not only in congregational matters but also in the affairs of the Diocese. We are informed by the Treasurer of the Diocese that there is serious delay of the Diocesan assessment by a majority of the churches, and that there is no penalty attached to such delinquencies however seriously it may affect persons or causes to which the Diocese makes appropriations for salary or support. This habitual state of things your committee believes to be due not only to the carelessness of parochial treasurers in forwarding the quarterly assessments, but also to a certain unbusinesslike looseness in our canonical requirements which suggests, if it does not actually encourage, delinquency. For instance, it may be noted that the Diocese, by turning all its surplus funds into the Permanent E. and C. Fund and making no assessments due until the end of the first quarter (July 1) of the new fiscal year, makes no provision for meeting any appropriation during this first quarter. Many of the congregations fail to pay their assessments at the end of the first, second, and third quarters, and the Treasurer has no means for forcing promptness by any penalty nor meeting any appropriation except from his private funds, all of which is unbusinesslike and unworthy of the dignity of the Diocese.

This same lack of promptness seems to prevail in meeting the apportionments for General Missions even where weekly collections for Missions are taken through the use of the Duplex Envelopes. We therefore recommend that the consideration and correction of these matters be urged upon the Finance Committee of the Diocese.

Many other matters that this committee might touch on are omitted, because they will be dealt with in detail by other com-

mittees. But, in conclusion, we wish to call the attention of this Convention to the Lay Readers' League of this Diocese. Through this league a number of laymen have offered to conduct services in places where there is need of such services. We recommend to the clergy, and especially to the Archdeacons, that they recognize the value of these men in maintaining and extending the Church by using them as much as possible.

### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON APPORTIONMENTS.

The Committee on Apportionments, appointed under the Canon enacted by the Diocesan Convention of 1916, having in December last set out a table of apportionments for General Missions, and having notified the several parishes and missions of the Diocese, do now make the following recommendations in regard to the remaining matters committed to them:

- 1. In the judgment of the committee, all parishes and missions whose rector's salary and current expenses are less than \$200 should only be apportioned for the work of General and Convocation Missions.
- 2. As we are asked to apportion these funds for nine months from April 1 to January 1, 1918,
- (a) We suggest that the same average of 2 per cent be apportioned for the work of the University of the South, being 1½ per cent of the rector's salary and current expenses.
- (b) We find there is a balance of \$129.02 on the Treasurer's books for the University of North Carolina, to which should be added the balance of \$81.55 which was, by resolution of Convention of 1916, to be returned to credit of the University of North Carolina (Journal of 1916). As we need \$450 for nine months for the University of North Carolina, to which is added 5 per cent for Treasurer's commission, making a total of \$475 we need for this work. If we apportion the parishes as suggested, we find that three-fourths of one per cent will furnish \$390, to which we add the balance of \$210, making \$600 to cover the desired \$475. We therefore recommend the apportionment of three-fourths of one per cent.
- (c) We recommend one-half of one per cent for theological education.
- (d) We suggest that every parish which uses the Duplex Envelope give 10 per cent of their missionary funds to the Colored Convocation and other parishes always having offerings for this work.

- 3. We will have placed in rear of the church this morning the apportionments we have made, and all members of the Convention by Canon have the right to increase, decrease, reject, or accept these amounts.
- 4. In conclusion we feel that publicity is of great value, and we urge upon all treasurers to make a monthly report of receipts to this committee, that monthly statements may be published.

We are glad to report that several parishes are carrying out successfully the ideas suggested by Miss Lindley in her new Junior Plan.

Our officers and members have enjoyed unusual advantages during the year. The Blue Ridge Conference, held during the past summer, was very largely attended by members of our Church, the majority of them being Diocesan and Parochial officers of the Auxiliary. Our full delegation was present at the General Convention and the Triennial of the Woman's Auxiliary in St. Louis, and were greatly benefited by these inspiring meetings. In January representatives from the Wake and Granville Districts met in Raleigh where two important conferences were held and addresses made by our Bishop, by Diocesan officers and delegates and by Rev. Dr. Patton, Secretary of the Province of Sewanee. It was here that we sent a loyal greeting to Miss Grace Lindley, our new General Secretary who is so ably filling the office left vacant by our beloved Miss Emery.

Our Diocesan Secretary has been most active in visiting and stimulating the zeal of parish branches; and our Diocesan President, besides her usual work in connection with the Auxiliary and our Diocesan paper, has been doing regular teaching and mission work in her own county.

One encouraging feature of our work has been the gathering of various branches of the Auxiliary into great missionary meetings. In our larger cities these meetings have been held by the several parish branches, and, in some instances the small mission branches have joined forces and received the stimulus which comes from personal contact and united effort.

Following the example of our English sisters we are emphasizing this year, more than ever before the spiritual side of the Auxiliary; and we humbly pray that the Pilgrimage of Prayer, which the women of the Diocese—and of the American Church—have entered into so heartily, may bring a deepening of spiritual life to ourselves and manifold blessings upon our work.

### AMENDMENTS OF CANONS SINCE THE YEAR 1913.

Canon II, Sec. 2, line 7. Certificates of the election of Delegates to the Convention to be mailed to the Secretary at least four weeks before the meeting of the Convention.

Canon XIII, Sec. 1, after line 5 read:

Diocesan Theological Education Fund: The first Sunday in March.

University of the South: The first Sunday in May.

General Clergy Relief Fund: Annually.

American Church Building Fund: The first Sunday in October.

Thompson Orphanage and Training Institution: Thanksgiving Day.

Church Work at the State University: Annually.

Convocation of the Colored People: Annually.

Provided, that where it is not possible to take up a special offering for each of the above objects, or where the Budget System, or some similar system, is followed, an annual contribution for each of the above objects shall be considered to fulfill the conditions of this section.

Sec. 2. It shall be the duty of the minister of each congregation in the Diocese to obtain, with the assistance of the laity, from every member of the same, if possible, an individual subscription, payable weekly (a) to Domestic and Foreign Missions, and (b) to the work of the Convocation to which the congregation belongs: Provided, that in congregations where it has been found impracticable to obtain weekly subscriptions, a quarterly collection for each object through the offertory at a Sunday service may be substituted therefor; and Provided further, that where the Budget System, or some similar system, is in use, it shall be considered that the provisions of this section are satisfied by remitting a contribution from such congregation quarterly to each of the above objects.

Canon VIII, Sec. 1, line 4. For *Education*, read: Theological Education.

Sec. 3, lines 1 and 2. For *Education* read: Theological Education; and for *Education Fund of the Diocese* read: Diocesan Theological Education Fund.

Canon XIX, add as follows:

Sec. 4. Each Convocation shall make, in such manner as may seem best to it, an annual report to the Convention of the work of such Convocation for the year. Such report shall include the report of the Treasurer with a statement of all receipts and disbursements, and shall also include a table of apportionments for the following year. The Treasurer's report shall be audited by a committee of the Convention, unless it is accompanied by a report of the Convocation showing that it has been audited and found correct.

Sec. 5. Each Convocation shall keep a record of its meetings in a book kept for that purpose.

Sec. 6. The financial year of each Convocation shall be the same as that of the Convention.

Canon VIII. To Section 1 add the words: also a Committee on Apportionments, to consist of the Bishop and one clergyman and one layman from each of the three Convocations.

Also add the words:

Section 9. Committee on Apportionments.

The duties of the Committee on Apportionments shall be as follows:

- 1. The committee shall obtain from the proper authorities a statement of the amounts needed for the ensuing year for the several objects authorized by the Convention, except the Episcopal and Contingent Fund, the Church Pension Fund, Diocesan Missions, and the Thompson Orphanage.
- 2. They shall make out tables of apportionments for these required objects and shall submit them to the Ministers and Vestries or Missionary Committees of all the Parishes and congregations of the Diocese sixty days before the annual Convention, giving them the opportunity to accept, increase, decrease, or reject the same.
- 3. They shall cause to be published monthly in *The Carolina Churchman* a statement of the amounts apportioned and the amounts paid thereon by each congregation.

Canon XXVI. To Section 6 add the words:

But the Minister in charge of every congregation shall also report separately, for statistical purposes, as *Actual Communicants* the number of Communicants who, he has reason to believe, have not failed to receive the Holy Communion at least once in the last three years.

Canon XXX. Of the Church Pension Fund.

Section 1. In conformity with the resolutions adopted by the General Convention of 1913, setting forth the principles upon which a pension system for the clergy of the Church and their dependents should be constructed, pursuant to which the corporation, the Church Pension Fund, has been created to carry these principles into effect, the Diocese of North Carolina hereby enters into the system of the Church Pension Fund.

Sec. II. The Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese shall appoint, annually, a committee to be entitled the Committee on the Church Pension Fund, and to consist of one Clergyman and two Laymen. The duties of this Committee shall be as follows:

1. To furnish annually to the Church Pension Fund the canonical roll of the Clergy of this Diocese, and of the clergy canonically belonging to other dioceses or missionary districts who may be licensed to officiate in this Diocese, with a statement of the stipends

received by each of said clergymen from any parish, mission, or other ecclesiastical organization in this Diocese.

- 2. To receive from the Church Pension Fund annually a statement of the premiums necessary to be paid by each parish, mission, or other ecclesiastical organization in the Diocese, in order that the clergymen in receipt of stipends from such parishes, missions, and other ecclesiastical organizations may be entitled respectively to pensions.
- 3. To inform the duly constituted authorities of each parish, mission, and other ecclesiastical organization in the Diocese of the premiums payable by it, and of the time and manner of payment thereof.
- 4. To elect a Treasurer who may or may not be a member of said Committee, who shall be required to give a bond satisfactory to the Committee, and whose duty it shall be to receive quarterly, from all of the parishes, missions, and other ecclesiastical organizations in this Diocese the aforesaid premiums, and to transmit the same to the Treasurer of the Church Pension Fund.
- 5. To inform the Church Pension Fund from time to time of the clergy and the widows and minor orphans of clergy, canonically connected with this Diocese, who may be entitled to receive pensions from the Church Pension Fund.
- 6. In general, to inform the clergy and laity of the Diocese of the pension system created by the General Convention, and committed by it to the operation of the Church Pension Fund, whereby the clergy of the Church are assured of pensions, as of right, to themselves in the event of old age, or disability, and to their widows and minor orphans in the event of death, and to do all things that may be necessary or advisable in the premises, to the end that the moneys necessary to be paid by the parishes, missions, and other ecclesiastical organizations may be fully and systematically paid.
- Sec. III. 1. It shall be the duty of the Diocesan Pension Fund Committee to make all necessary arrangements with the Treasurer of the Diocese or the Finance Committee to provide for the annual payment to the Committee on the Church Pension Fund of the premiums payable on behalf of the Bishop of the Diocese, and also of the Bishop Coadjutor and the Bishops Suffragan, if there be such, and it shall be the duty of said Treasurer to pay said annual premiums to the Committee on the Church Pension Fund.
- 2. It shall also be the duty of the Diocesan Committee on the Church Pension Fund to make all necessary arrangements with the Executive Committees of the Convocations to provide for the annual payment to the Committee on the Church Pension Fund of the premiums payable on behalf of all clergymen receiving stipends from their respective Convocations.
- 3. It shall also be the duty of the Finance Committee to authorize the Treasurer of the Convention to pay, quarterly, to the said Committee on the Church Pension Fund the premiums payable on behalf

of all other clergymen whose stipends are paid entirely or in part by the Diocese, and to make all necessary arrangements to provide for the cost of such premiums.

Sec. IV. It shall be the duty of the Convocations of the Diocese to pay, quarterly, to the said Committee on the Church Pension Fund the premiums payable on behalf of all clergymen receiving stipends from said Convocations.

Sec. V. It shall be the duty of every clergyman receiving a stipend or stipends, and the duty of every parish, mission, or other ecclesiastical organization in the Diocese paying a stipend or stipends, to furnish a statement of such stipend or stipends to the Committee on the Church Pension Fund whenever said Committee shall, in writing, ask for such statement.

Sec. VI. Any parish or mission neglecting for two successive years to pay the full amount of its annual premium shall be deprived of its right to participate and vote in the proceedings of the Convention of the Diocese, according to the Canons in that case made and provided, and shall continue so deprived until the said parish or mission has paid in full the said annual premiums for two successive years, when it shall be restored to all of its canonical rights in the Convention of the Diocese.

Sec. VII. This Canon shall go into effect when the Secretary of the Convention shall receive notification from the Church Pension Fund that such sufficient number of other dioceses, missionary districts, and General Boards or other General Institutions of the Church have, by legislation, provided for entering into the pension system of the Church Pension Fund, as, in the opinion of the said Church Pension Fund, will enable its system to go into operation; provided, that the clergy canonically connected with said dioceses or missionary districts, or whose stipends are wholly paid by said Boards or General Institutions of the Church, shall number not less than two thousand individuals.

- (2) Resolved. That Article IX, Section 6 of the Constitution be amended by inserting after words "Contingent Fund" in line three the words, "Or shall have failed to observe the conditions of Canon XXX, Section 6, on the Church Pension Fund."
- (4) In Canon VIII, Section 6, strike out the words in lines one and two, "The Committee on Finance shall audit the Treasurer's Accounts."

Add to Canon VIII, Section 6, the following paragraphs:

"It shall be the duty of the Finance Committee to maintain general supervision of the financial affairs of the Diocese; to secure simplicity and accuracy in the collections and disbursements of all funds, and coöperation between all officers, trusts, and boards of the Convention; for which purpose it shall establish its own rules, and keep a record of its meetings, all of which shall be submitted annually to the Convention.

"All accounts having to do with receipts, expenditures, and investments of all Church organizations, shall be audited at the close of the year by a certified public accountant: *Provided, however*, if the amount of the income for the year is less than \$3,000, or, if a certified public accountant is not available, the audit may be made by an accountant bookkeeper, who is in no way connected with the subject-matter of the account.

"The fiscal year shall begin January 1st.

"The expense, if there be any, of auditing the account of the Diocesan Treasurer by a certified public accountant shall be paid by the treasurer out of the Episcopal and Contingent Fund, upon requisition by the Chairman of the Finance Committee."

Resolved, That Canon XXII, Section 1 of the Canons be amended as follows: At the end of the section add, "But note, that any Parish having twenty or more male members of the age of twenty-one years may adopt the rotating vestry system, and in such case shall elect one-third of the vestry to serve for one year, one-third to serve for two years, and one-third to serve for three years. and thereafter shall annually elect, from among its qualified members who have not served on the vestry during the past year, one-third of the vestry, whose term of office shall be three years."

(3) That Canon XIV, second paragraph, be repealed and a reserve fund be established for meeting all expenses of the Diocese during that part of the fiscal year when the Diocesan assessments are not sufficient to meet the same.

Resolved, That Canon XIV be amended by striking out all after and including the words "And the Treasurer is hereby directed," etc.

Canon XI. Section 1. The salary of the Bishop of the Diocese is hereby fixed at three thousand six hundred dollars (\$3,600) per annum, to be paid by the Treasurer out of the funds in his hands for that purpose.

Canon XXVI. Section 3. Omit the words, "at the close of the month of March each year, to report to the Bishop of the Diocese, in such form as shall from time to time set forth by authority of the Diocesan Convention," and substitute therefor the following: "at the beginning of January each year to prepare, upon the blank form adopted by the General Convention, a report for the year ending December 31st preceding, and deliver the same to the Bishop of the Diocese, on or before the 1st day of February. The report shall include the following information." In last line of the section, for "April 1st" and March 31st," read January 1st and December 31st."
