JOURNAL.

FAVETTEVILLE, WEDNESDAY, May 28th, 1873.

The Fifty-Seventh Annual Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the State of North Carolina met in St. John's Church, at 10 o'clock, A. M., as appointed.

The Bishop opened the Convention with prayer.

The Roll was called. There were present of the Clergy, Rev. Messrs. R. W. Barber, A. A. Benton, C. T. Bland, B. S. Bronson, D. H. Buel, J. Buxton, D. D., J. B. Cheshire, D. D., C. J. Curtis, J. A. Deal, L. Eborn, N. Falls, E. M. Forbes, A. M. Flythe, E. Geer, I. Harding, T. B. Haughton, H. G. Hilton, N. C. Hughes, J. C. Huske, J. W. Larmour, M. M. Marshall, J. A. Oertel, Geo. Patterson, R. B. The Secretary reported that 30 Clergymen were present, and that twenty-two Parishes were represented.

The Bishop declared the Convention duly organized.

On motion, the Convention adjourned for Divine Service.

Rev. N. Collin Hughes preached the Sermon.

A collection was made for the Prayer Book Society.

The Holy Communion was administered.

After Divine Service, the Convention was called to order for business.

The Bishop announced the Committee on Elections, viz.: Rev. R. W. Barber, Rev. J. W. Larmour and T. B. Hill.

Rev. Dr. Watson offered the following, which was adopted:

WHEREAS, The Convention of 1868 took from Calvary Church, Henderson County, and Christ Church, Rockfish, their right of representation, and those Churches have sent delegates to this Convention;

Resolved, That the certificates of delegation from those Churches, and all informal certificates, be referred to the Committee on Elections.

On motion, the Convention proceeded to the election of President and Secretary.

Rev. George Patterson nominated Rev. E. M. Forbes for President.

On motion of A. J. DeRosset, balloting was dispensed with, and Rev. Mr. Forbes was unanimously elected.

Rev. Dr. Watson nominated W. N. Tillinghast for Secretary.

On motion of Rev. E. Geer, balloting was dispensed with, and W. N. Tillinghast was unanimously elected.

On motion of J. C. Huske, the Convention adjourned, to meet at 9½ o'clock, A. M., to-morrow.

THURSDAY, May 29th, 1873, 9½ o'clock.

The Convention met according to adjournment.

The Roll was called.

The following Clergymen and Lay Delegates, not before present, answered to their names, viz.: Rev. Messrs. F. J. Murdock, E. R. Rich, A. Smedes, D. D., and C. O. Brady, and Messrs. T. W. Patton, T. M. Ferrell, H. S. Frizell, J. F. Foulkes, Thomas White, L. J. Haughton, B. I. Howze, K. P. Battle, W. R. Cox, W. H. Wetmore, J. S. Henderson, W. B. Meares, J. H. M. Jackson, S. L. Fremont, J. W. Watson and DuBrutz Cutlar.

The minutes of the proceedings of yesterday were read.

Rev. Geo. Patterson moved that the Secretary be instructed to add to the minutes, as read, a record of the religious services of Wednesday evening

On motion of W. R. Cox, the resolution was laid on the table. The minutes were accepted.

On motion of W. R. Cox, the Secretary was allowed to have an assistant. The Secretary requested Rev. Israel Harding to assist him.

On motion of Rev. J. C. Huske, it was

Resolved, That visiting Clergymen from other Dioceses, and Clergymen residents of this Diocese, but not entitled to seats in this Convention, and Candidates for Holy Orders, be invited to take honorary seats in this Convention.

Rev. R. W. Barber read the report of the Committee on Elections.

The Committee on Elections beg leave to report that they have examined the certificates of Lay delegaces, from Christ Church, Rockfish, Cumberland, and Calvary Church, Henderson county, and find them to be in due form, certifying the action of vestries of regularly organized parishes in union with the Convention;

Resolved, therefore, That the delegates elected by these parishes be admitted to seats in this Convention.

They have also examined the certificates from St. Paul's Parish, Beaufort and find it wanting an official signature; but being assured that the signature, though wanting an official form, comes from the proper authority, they offer the following resolution:

Resolved, That the delegates elected by St. Paul's Parish, Beaufort, be admitted to seats in this Convention.

They have also examined the certificate from Chapel Hill, and find it irregular, stating that a delegate had been appointed without intimating that a vestry had acted or even exists, furthermore it is signed by the Warden, instead of the Secretary of the vestry.

R. W. BARBER, Ch'm'n.

The resolutions offered by the Committee on Elections were severally adopted.

On motion of Rev. Dr. Watson, it was

Resolved, That the Hon Wm. H. Battle be admitted as a delegate from the Parish of the Chapel of the Cross, Chapel Hill, notwithstanding the irregularity of the certificate which has been reported to this Convention.

The Bishop announced the Regular Committees, as follows:

The Bishop read his Annual Address.

DEAR BRETHREN OF THE CLERGY AND LAITY:

Our present Annual meeting is likely to be one of unusual interest and importance to the Diocese, and I am glad that I shall be able to give as a preliminary to our discussion an encouraging view of the condition of things among us during the past year.

My official acts have been as follows:

June 2d. At Salisbury, after the Convention, I confirmed four persons, and celebrated the Lord's Supper.

4th. I preached at Christ's Church, Rowan county, and confirmed ten persons; and in the evening another in private.

5th. At St. James', Iredell county, I preached, and confirmed five persons.

6th. At Salisbury, I preached and held a special confirmation of two persons.

7th. At Lexington, I preached and confirmed one person.

9th. At Pittsborough, I preached twice, celebrated the Lord's Supper and confirmed four persons.

10th. At St. Mark's, Deep River, I preached.

18th. At a special confirmation at St. John's, Wilmington, I administered that rite to one person.

July 14th. At St. Mark's, Wilmington, I confirmed five persons.

July 28th. I baptized an infant in private in Wilmington.

August 7th. In St. Matthew's Church, Hillsboro', I received into the Diaconate, Charles Jared Curtis. The candidate was presented by the Rev. Geo. Patterson. The Rev. Messrs. A. Smedes, D. D., Marshall and Joyner took part in the services. I preached the sermon.

10th At St. Stephen's Chapel, in Lincoln county, I delivered a sermon to a newly organized congregation, which the zeal and energy of the Rev. Wm. B. Wetmore have recently established there.

11th. At Lincolnton I preached twice and confirmed nineteen persons. In connection with my narrative of the services in this parish, I beg leave to call the attention of the Clergy to the good effects of the system which has been adopted by Mr. Wetmore at Lincolnton, and Dr. Buxton at Asheville, in the establishment of little chapels in the country around the villages in which their churches are situated. I have thus obtained access to a body of people who would otherwise never attend our services, and who, in many instances, are destitute in a great measure of religious instruction of any kind.

12th. At High Shoals Chapel, in Gaston county, I preached, confirmed five persons, and administered the Communion.

18th. In the morning, at Shelby, I preached and baptized an infant. In the evening I preached at the Cleaveland Springs.

21st. I preached twice at Rutherfordton.

25th. At Asheville, in the morning I preached and administered the Holy Communion. In the afternoon I preached at Haw Creek Chapel, and confirmed two persons; and in the evening preached again at Asheville, and confirmed seven persons.

27th. At Leicester, Dr. Buxton read prayers, and I preached in a church recently erected, but not yet completed nor consecrated.

29th. At Waynesville, after morning prayers by Mr. Buxton, I baptized six children, preached, confirmed two persons and administered the Communion.

Sept 1st. At Calvary Church, Henderson county, I preached, baptized an infant, and administered the Holy Communion—and in the afternoon after a sermon by the Rev. D. H. Buel, I confirmed one person.

3d. At Hendersonville I preached and confirmed two persons.

4th. At the Church of St. John's in the Wilderness, Henderson county, I preached.

8th. At Asheville, I received to Priest's orders the Rev. John Archibald Deal—the candidate being presented by the Rev. Jarvis Buxton, D. D., who, with the Rev. Messrs. Buel, Morris and Drayton, united in the laying on of hands. The sermon was preached by me. In the afternoon I visited the Chapel at Beaver Dam and, after a sermon by the Rev. Mr. Buel, I addressed the congregation.

15th At Morganton I preached twise, baptized an infant, confirmed four persons and administered the Communion.

16th. At Lenoir, I confirmed two persons in private and on the 17th, I preached and confirmed three persons.

18th. At the Grove Chapel, in Caldwell county, I preached. 20th. At Statesville, I preached twice. Here we have a new Church, but not yet consecrated because still in debt.

22nd. At Charlotte, I preached twice and confirmed five persons.

24th. At Salisbury, I preached, confirmed six persons and administered the Communion.

26th. At Leaksville I preached and confirmed one person.

27th. At the Mountain Chapel, in Rockingham county, I preached, baptized an infant, and confirmed one person.

29th. At Greensboro', I preached twice and administered the Communion.

Oct. 1st. In a Church recently crected at Kittrell's Station, in Granville county, I preached, baptized two infants and confirmed one person. From this point I was called to Raleigh by the sudden and mysterious death of the Rev. J. Brinton Smith, D. D., which occurred that morning. In this case there is reason to believe that a foul crime has been committed,

though its author, or authors, have not yet been detected, and punished. Unjust suspicions were at first directed towards some persons who, if guilty, would have been criminals of the deepest dye, but who, on investigation, were proved to the satisfaction of the whole community—as previous to that investigation, they had been by all who knew them, fully believed to be—entirely innocent of so horrible a crime. In Dr. Smith the Church has lost a minister of decided ability, of varied knowledge, of great energy, and who was more and more favorably appreciated every year in the community in which he lived.

6th. I preached at Oxford and confirmed eleven persons.

7th. At Williamsborough, I preached and confirmed one person in church, and another in private.

Sth. At Warrenton I preached, and confirmed three persons.

10th. A Gaston, I preached and celebrated the Lord's Supper.

12th. At Weldon, I preached, confirmed one person and administered the Communion.

13th. At Jackson, I preached, confirmed two persons and administered the Communion.

14th. At Halitax, I preached and confirmed one person.

15th. At Battleboro', I preached, baptized an adult and confirmed the same person.

16th. At Rocky Mount, I preached, baptized an adult, confirmed two persons and administered the Communion.

18th. At Wilson, I preached twice.

20th. At Clinton, I consecrated the Church, preached, con firmed eleven persons and administered the Communion.

Nov. 1st. At St. James', Wilmington, I confirmed one person.

6th. I confirmed another member of the same congregation in private.

17th. At Goldsboro', in the morning, after a sermon by the Rev. E. R. Rich, I administered the Holy Communion, in the evening preached and confirmed five persons.

24th. In the morning, in Christ Church, Raleigh, I preached and confirmed five persons, and in the afternoon at St. Mary's Chapel, after a sermon by the Rev. J. E. C. Smedes, I confirmed eleven pupils of the School. It gives me particular pleasure to witness the continued prosperity of that admirable Institution, so well merited as it is, by the unwearied labors, the singular tact and judgment, the firmness, tempered by gentleness and affection, and the large hearted liberality of its distinguished Principal—the Rev. Dr. Smedes. If I were called upon to say what individual has exerted for many years, and is now exerting, the most beneficial influence upon the people of this State, I should feel bound to express the conviction that it is not this or that statesman, or this or that seldier, or this or that preacher, but the man who has successfully trained up so many maidens and so many matrons to be themselves useful and happy in their respective spheres and to diffuse around them the incalculable benefit of womanly intelligence, refinement and piety. While many excellent persons have labored for this end, and with gratifying success, he who, in my judgment at least, has accomplished the most, is the Principal of St. Mary's School, Raleigh; and I therefore feel it my duty, as I trust, dear brethren, you feel it to be yours, to extend as widely as possible these beneficial influences by recommending to the attention of parents, and others who have the charge of young girls, that school in which so many admirable women have heretofore been trained for usefulness in this life and happiness in eternity. On the evening of Nov. 24th, I preached in St. Augustine's Chapel.

Nov. 25th. I preached at Louisburg.

26th. I baptized a sick member of that parish.

28th. At. St Paul's, Wilmington, I baptized an infant.

Dec. 1st. At Wadesboro', I preached twice, and confirmed four persons.

2nd. I preached at Rockingham.

1873. Feb. 9th. At Smithville I preached twice, administered the Communion and baptized an infant.

16th. I preached at Flemington, in Columbus county.

March 6th. At Ridgeway, in a Church just built, I preached and confirmed one person.

8th. At St. Mary's, Orange county, I preached.

9th. At Hillsboro', I preached twice, administered the Communion and confirmed ten persons.

11th. At Greensboro', I preached, baptized an adult and confirmed five persons.

16th. At St. Paul's Church, Wilmington, I preached and confirmed four persons.

29th. At Enfield, I preached and baptized an infant.

30th. At Trinity Church, Scotland Neck, I preached and confirmed eight persons.

31st. At Hamilton, I preached and confirmed four persons, one being in private.

April 1st. Preached, confirmed two persons and administered the Communion at Williamston. There I had the pleasure of seeing the minister, the Rev. Mr. Haughton, established in a comfortable rectory, recently given to the parish by Miss Helen Slade, one of the earliest, as she is one of the most devoted members of the church in that village. It is much to be desired that her example should be followed by many others; for the want of a rectory is the most frequent cause of those removals of clergymen from parish to parish which a Bishop so often witnesses, can so little prevent, and yet must so deeply deplore, as tending to destroy the pastoral relation, to blight the prospects of feeble congregations, and to impoverish the means and impair the influence of the clergy themselves.

2nd. At Jamesville, I preached, confirmed two persons and administerad the Communion.

3rd. I administered the last office to a sick peason in private near Williamston.

4th. At Greenville, I preached twice, baptized two infants and celebrated the Lord's Supper.

April 6th. In a new Church, used for the first time, in St. John's parish, Pitt county, I baptized an adult and two infants, preached, confirmed two persons and administered the Communion.

April 8th. At Snow Hill, I preached and celebrated the Lord's Supper.

10th. At the Church of the Holy Innocents, in Lenoir county, having previously baptized an adult and an infant in private. I preached, confirmed three persons and administered the Communion.

11th. At Kinston, I preached twice, baptized an infant, confirmed one person and administered the Communion.

12th. At Newbern, I preached and confirmed twenty-six persons.

13th. Being Easter Sunday, at the same place, I preached twice, administered the Communion, and confirmed two additional candidates. These services took place in the Church which has been raised up from the ruins of that destroyed by fire some two years ago. The work of restoration is not yet quite completed, the permanent windows and seats not yet having been provided; but that so much should have been done in the present impoverished condition of the congregation, and that a church decidedly superior to the one destroyed should now be nearly ready for consecration, are circumstances very gratifying in themselves and which reflect great credit on the zeal and energy both of the minister and the people.

15th. At Beaufort, I preached twice, baptized an infant, confirmed six persons and administered the Communion.

18th. At. St. John's, Durham's Creek, Beaufort county, I baptized an adult and an infant, preached, confirmed twelve persons and administered the Communion.

19th. At Trinity Church, Beaufort county. I preached, confirmed nine persons and administered the Communion.

20th. At Washington, preached twice, administered the Communion and confirmed seven persons.

22nd. At Zion Church, Beaufort county, preached, confirmed four persons and administered the Communion, and in the afternoon confirmed a sick man in private.

23rd. At Bath, preached, confirmed fifteen persons and administered the Communion.

25th. At St. James's Beaufort county, preached, confirmed eight persons and administered the Communion.

April 27th. At Plymouth, preached, administered the Communion and confirmed five persons.

29th. 'At St. David's Church, Washington county, preached and confirmed nine persons.

30th. At St. Luke's, in the same county, preached, confirmed three persons and administered the Communion.

May 2nd. Preached at Elizabeth City. I was gratified to find that during the past year the congregation had built a handsome and convenient rectory, in place of one that was older and much less comfortable.

3rd. Preached at Woodville, Perquimans county.

4th. At Hertford, preached, administered the Lord's Supper and confirmed two persons.

5th. Preached at Edenton.

6th. Preached again at Edenton and confirmed fifteen persons.

9th. Preached at Murfreesboro'.

11th. Preached twice at Woodville, Bertie county, and confirmed one person.

13th. Preached at Windsor and confirmed four persons.

16th. At Tarboro', preached twice and confirmed ten persons.

20th. At St. James's Church Home, at Wilmington, confirmed two persons.

22nd. At St. Mark's Church, Wilmington, the minister and congregation of which are colored, I confirmed, after a sermon by the Rev. Geo. Patterson, seven persons. It gives me great pleasure to be able to say that under the energetic and judicious ministration of the Rev. Mr. Brady, this congregation goes on to prosper.

23rd. At St. Paul's, Wilmington, I held a special confirmation and preaching confirming one person.

25th. In the morning, at St. James's, in the same city, I preached, and confirmed fourteen persons. In the evening, at St. John's, after a sermon by the Rev. Mr. Buel, I confirmed eight persons.

The whole number of persons confirmed by me during the year has been 365.

It is proper to apprise the Convention that, acting under the requirement of section 1, canon 4, Title I, of the Digest of Canons of 1871, I have appointed six examining Chaplains in this Diocese; making the number so large because of the territorial extent of the Diocese. They are: for the Eastern Division, the Rev. Dr. Watson and Mr. Patterson, of Wilmington; for the Center, Drs. Mason and Smedes, of Raleigh; for the Western Division, Dr. Buxton and the Rev. Mr. Buel, of Asheville.

The changes among the Clergy during the past year have been as follows: we have lost by death the Rev. J. Brinton Smith, D. D., to whose untimely and deeply deplored end I have already referred. I have transferred the Rev. John H. Tillinghast to the Diocese of South Carolina, and Rev. Wm. F. Floyd has been received into the Diocese of Connecticut, by Letters Dimissory. On the other hand, we have gained by ordination to the Diaconate, the Rev. Charles Jared Curtis, now serving very acceptably the Church at Hillsboro', and I have received into the Diocese by Letters Dimissory from Virginia, the Rev. John Johns Norwood, now Rector of Trinity Church, Scotland Neck; the Rev. Gerard W. Phelps, at present Rector of St. Timothy's Church, Wilson, and the Rev. Thomas M. Ambler, who has been chosen Rector of St. Paul's Church, Wilmington. From the Diocese of Florida, I have received by Letters Dimissory the Rev. John E. C. Smedes, who is now officiating as Principal of the Normal School at Raleigh; and from the Diocese of Western New York, the Rev. Lucius Sweetland, who has been chosen Rector of St. James's Church, Kittrell's Springs. The whole number of our Clergy has been increased by three; and now amounts to fifty-The changes in the location of the clergy, besides those already mentioned, have been as follows; the Rev. Francis J. Murdoch has accepted the charge of St. Luke's Church, Salisbury; the Rev. Israel Harding has resigned the cure of St. Paul's Church, Beaufort, and accepted that of Trinity Church, Beaufort county, with the Missionary district adjacent thereto. The Rev. S. W. Kennerly has resigned the charge of St.

John's Church, Pitt county, and is at present sojourning in Georgia. The Rev. Thomas A. Morris has, because of ill health, resigned the Rectorship of Calvary Church, Henderson county, although still resident within the parish and hoping to be able before long to resume his labors.

The following persons are candidates for Priest's Orders in this Diocese: Thomas B. Haughton and Edward R. Rieh.

The following are candidates for Deacon's Orders: Edmond Joyner, Nathaniel Harding, Nymphus Edgar Price, George W. Bell, Alexander Overby, Robert Brent Drane, Edwin A. Osborne, Alexander Bass and Prince Rogers.

I have stricken from this list the names of several young men who have been heretofore candidates, because they have failed to report to me their progress in their studies, and I have had reason to suppose that they have ceased to prosecute those studies. In one instance the name of a candidate has been omitted at his own request.

I have received under Canon 2, Title I, of the digest of 1872, the following persons as Postulants, to wit: John Huske, John Robert Hughes, W. Beaumont Clarkson, Brooke Gwathney White, Walter J. Smith, and Edwin A. Osborne, of whom the last has been advanced to the position of a candidate for Orders.

The Church has had occasion to lament the death of several of her honored Bishops since we last met in Convention.

After a long illness, entirely disabling him for several years from active duty, Bishop Upfold, of Indiana, was removed from among us during the last summer, leaving behind him a high character for ability and steadfast devotion to duty.

Since that time, Bishops Eastburn, of Massachusetts, and McIlvaine, of Ohio, have died, both men of pure and lofty character and highly esteemed by their Brethren as well as by the Church at large, and the latter especially distinguished for eloquence in the pulpit and in debate, and for the vigor and brilliancy of his published works, because of which he has received many marks of honor in Europe as well as in our own country.

Before concluding, I will briefly recapitulate the result of my Episcopal work for the last year within the limits of the Diocese. I have visited, during that time, ninety-two parishes or missionary stations, including, however, in three or four instances, visitations made more than once to the same parish, and excluding the many occasions in which I have officiated in Wilmington, without performing any strictly Episcopal act.

In every visitation I believe I have preached once, frequently twice, and sometimes oftener.

On these occasions I have confirmed 365 persons.

I have baptized six adults and twenty-three infants.

I have ordained one Deacon and one Priest.

I have consecrated one Church, and officiated in four for the first time, they having been recently erected, but not yet being ready for consecration.

The labors of my office are increasing every year, and I rejoice to believe are likely to increase much more rapidly in the future than in the recent past; as the condition of the country is improving and as the religious feelings of the people of the State are more and more directed to our Church, in the belief that in its Communion, and by its ministration, those feelings can be best cultivated. Under these circumstances, it is abundantly clear that more Episcopal services are needed in this Diocese than I, or perhaps any man, can render. To provide for this want, a division of the Diocese would be the best expedient, the most primitive, the most effective, and, the most satisfactory, to the different persons concerned; but that, under our existing legislation, is for the present time impracticable.

The only remedial measure which we can now adopt, is that of the election of an Assistant Bishop, a consent to which I am glad to learn has been obtained from a great majority of the Dioceses in our Communion.

To this subject I am sure you will give your most earnest and conscientious consideration; it is your business rather than mine, and I shall not interfere in it except so far as you may desire information or counsel from me. These it will be my duty to give, if you feel that I can in any way aid you.

I will merely say this, that any man whom you elect ought to be of blameless life and conversation; capable and willing to labor, not unaccustomed to self-denial, and while attached to the doctrine and discipline of the Church, not addicted to extravagant Ecclesiastical theories or practices. A man objectionable in any one of these particulars will not, I think, be generally and cordially welcomed in the Diocese of North Carolina.

On motion of Rev. G Patterson, that part of the Bishop's Address relating to the election of an Assistant Bishop was referred to a committee of five.

The Bishop appointed Rev. A. Smedes, D. D., Rev. N. C. Hughes, Rev. Geo. Patterson, W. H. Battle and A. J. De-Rosset.

On motion of J. S. Henderson, the Address of the Bishop was referred to the Committee on the State of the Church.

Rev. J. C. Huske presented the application of a new congregation called St. Joseph's Church, Fayetteville, to be admitted into union with the Convention, which, on his motion, was referred to the Committee on New Parishes.

Rev. Dr. Smedes read the report of the Standing Committee:

The Standing Committee of the Diocese of North Carolina respectfully report their proceedings for the past Canonical year:

On the 20th of November last the assent of the Committee was duly given to the consecration of the Rev. John G. Auer, as Missionary Bishop for the territory of Cape Palmas, Africa; and of the Rev. Wm H. Hare, as Missionary Bishop of the Indian jurisdiction of Niobrara.

On the 1st of August last, a certificate for Priest's Orders was given to John A. Deal; and on March 19th, a certificate was given for Priest's Orders to Edward R. Rich.

On the 17th of July a certificate for Deacon's Orders was given to Charles Jared Curtis.

On the 20th of November a certificate in due form was given to Edwin A. Osborne, recommending him to the Bishop for entrance on a course of preparation for the Holy Ministry.

On the 19th of March last, it appearing to the Committee from an examination of the records and votes before us, that a majority of the Bishops and Standing Committees of the Dioceses in the United States had given their assent, in due form, to the application made by the Bishop and Secretary of this Diocese (in pursuance of resolutions of the last Convention) for the election of an Assistant Bishop, the Chairman was directed to give due notice thereof to the Secretary of the Convention.

S. L. Fremont, of the Committee appointed by the last Convention "to revise, amend and improve the Rules of Order," read their report, as follows:

The Committee appointed by the last Convention to revise and improve the Rules so as to expedite business, ask leave to report:

That in consequence of the death of Rev. Dr. Smith, one of its members, the Committee has not been convened, and though a large mass of information has been collected, (being the Reports and Rules of Order and Order of Business of twenty Dioceses,) but as the surviving members have not had sufficient time to mature such amendments to the Rules of Order of this Convention as they deem necessary, they submit the following additional Rules of Order, and ask the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That the following Rules of Order be added to the existing Rules:

- 1. Each Parish being entitled to one vote by the Constitution and Canons of this Diocese, in voting by ballot each order shall vote separately and the Secretary shall call the list of the Clergy and then the list of the Parishes entitled to vote. When the names are called the proper representative shall present the vote to the appropriate inspectors of the election, who shall receive the same, making a poll list, and count the ballots and announce the result to the Convention. Should there be no election, the balloting shall be continued according to this form at the discretion of the Convention, or until the election is effected.
- 2. To facilitate taking the votes of Parishes, the delegates of each Parish should be seated near to each other, and select one of their number to act as Chairman, who will, on each question submitted, collect the sense of the delegates, and announce the result when the Parishes are called: *Provided*, That any delegate voting in the minority in his delegation may have his name recorded and his vote stated.

On motion of A. J. DeRosset, the resolutions were laid on the table temporarily.

W. H. Battle, Chairman of the Committee appointed at the last Convention "to draft the form of a Deed for the conveyance of property to the Church," read their report, as follows:

The Committee appointed at the last session of this Convention to draft the form of a deed for the conveyance of property to the Trustees to hold property for the Diocese, by which such property shall be secured from the danger of alienation from those who profess and practice the doctrine, discipline and worship of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America, and make report thereof to the next ensuing Annual Convention, have had the same under consideration, and ask leave to submit the following report:

They believe there is very litsle, if any, danger that the property which is conveyed to the Trustees to hold it in trust for the Diocese will be alienated from those who profess and practice the doctrine, discipline and worship of our Church.

The Trustees in this Diocese are the Bishop and two other members of our Communion, and the supposition that they will be faithless to their sacred trust is hardly admissible. The only instances of such diversion of Church property from the true purpose for which it was conveyed, have occurred in other Dioceses than our own among the Wardens, Vestry and Congregations of particular Parishes, and it is with regard to them that the danger is to be provided against.

The Committee, therefore, recommend the following as the proper form of the deed, where property, real or personal, is to be conveyed to the Wardens, Vestry and Trustees of a church of the Protestaut Episcopal Church in the Diocese of North Carolina.

This recommendation is believed to be within the spirit if not the letter of the resolution under which the Committee is acting:

FORM OF A DEED.

 the Trustees appointed to hold property for the Diocese of North Carolina, their heirs and successors in office, forever. And the said party of the first part, for himself and his heirs, doth covenant and agree with the said parties of the second part, their heirs and successors, to warrant and defend the same to the said parties of the second part, their heirs and successors forever.

In testimony whereof, the said party of the first part hath hereunto set his

hand and affixed his seal, the day and year first above written.

Signed, sealed and delivered in the presence of

On motion of Mr. Battle, the report was referred to the Committee on Canons.

The Treasurer of the Convention, A. J. DeRosset, read his report. (See Appendix B.)

On motion of the Secretary, the report of the Treasurer was referred to the Committee on Finance.

Rev. Dr. Watson read the report of the Committee on Finance, as follows:

The Committee on Finance respectfully report, that they have endeavored to give attention to the general financial interests of the Diocese, but that their attention has been specially directed to the state of the current Episcopal and Contingent Fund.

It is well known to the Convention that this fund has been for some years in a restless and unsatisfactory condition, owing mainly to the complaints made by many Parishes of the *difficulty* experienced in raising the amounts assessed upon them, and to the actual failure in many cases to make the collection.

Before the war there were levied upon the Parishes then in connection with the Diocese, three assessments—one for the current Episcopal and Contingent Fund, one for Diocesan missions, and one for the relief of disabled elergy and of the widows and orphans of deceased elergy.

During the last year before the war (that of 1860) the amounts realized upon these assessments were: Contingent Fund, \$2,668.78; Diocesan missions, \$3,410.92; Relief Fund, \$737.78; in all, \$6,817.48.

These assessments continued nominally the same during the war, though out of regard to the depreciation of the currency, the amounts actually paid were greater.

The close of the war found the Diocesan resources almost annihilated. Even the securities in which the permanent funds had been invested had been in some instances ruined. In 1867 it was found that the Diocese was in arrears to the Bishop on account of his salary \$3,199.72. To meet this deficiency, a loan was authorized to the current Episcopal and Contingent Fund from that Permanent Fund, which last, though sadly diminished, had not been altogether lost.

At the same Convention, (that of 1867) it was further determined that with

a view to repair the damage thus done to the permanent fund, as well as to provide for the honest payment of the Bishop's salary and of the actual expenses of the Convention, an increased assessment should be levied for the benefit of the Current Episcopal and Contingent Fund, and in order that this might be practicable that the assessments for Diocesan Missions and for the Relief Fund should be suspended, and those objects left to be supported by collections. The new assessment was fixed at the rate of two dollars for each communicant in each parish. It was at the time definitely declared, however, that this was not an individual or per capita tax, but a tax on whole and undivided parishes, apportioned among the parishes in accordance with the only general rule which could be known to the Convention, viz: their comparative numerical strength, as evidenced by the number of communicants; in other words, of persons professing to take an active interest in the parish affairs.

It was thought that the assessment would not be very difficult to raise, seeing that it was to be for the time the *only* one, and it was hoped that in this way enough might be annually raised, not only to pay the Bishop's current salary and meet the current expenses of the Diocese, but in addition, to leave each year a surplus whereby to re-imburse the permanent fund for the loan made from it; and furthermore, by means of this surplus, by gradual and slow yet steady accretion to raise the permanent fund, at least to such proportions as might enable it to assume the whole support of the Episcopate, and release the assessments to meet the other necessities of the Diocese.

But that hope has been but moderately realized, the amounts actually received upon the assessment having failed, until this past year, to do much more than pay the Bishop's salary, and the other expenses of the year. In some instances, even the current obligations of the year have not been met by it.

To what extent this is true, let the following statement show:

This is not all. Small as the amount actually received upon the assessment has been, and far below the proposed work, there have been in addition great and constant complaint made of it, as too heavy.

In order to deal with this question more effectively, the Finance Committee has for two years been made permanent, and invested with ad interim power to reduce, for any current year, any assessment complained of, if to the Committee the complaint should seem just; referring the case, however, for final settlement, to the next ensuing Annual Convention.

During the past Conventional year no such modification has been made by the Committee. The Committee were instructed, morover, to open a correspondence with the several parishes, with a view to reach if possible, some assessment which might have the consent, if not approbation, of all.

This they have been endeavoring to do for the past two years. Within the past year a circular has been issued to all the Clergy of the Diocese: 1st, Whether the several parishes and congregations under their charge could meet the regular assessment made in proportion to the number of communicants; and 2nd, If that were impracticable, what was the largest fixed sum which could be raised and pledged by them.

This circular was but partially answered, many of the clergy having made no reply whatever,

Of course the Committee consider themselves the servants of the Convention, but they submit to their brethren, that acting as they did for the Convention, and under its authority, and by its express direction, that they were entitled, at least, to replies from all.

It is impossible to do the work put upon them, unless their brethren will aid them.

In one instance in which a reply was received, it was accompanied by a parish resolution, that the vestry could not consent that the parish should be held responsible by the Diocesan Convention for a larger sum than the one named by the said vestry, and which was less than the regular assessment.

In this case the deficiency was not very great

But the Committee desire to call attention to the principle involved, and to submit to the Convention, whether or not the payment of the assessment is so entirely optional with the parishes.

In the opinion of the Committee, law made by a Church Legislature is just as obligatory, morally, as any State law can be; and though the power of physical enforcement may not exist as in the State, yet in their opinion the moral obligation is not thereby at all diminished. That a parish might not be able to pay a certain assessment, and in that way be under no moral obligation to pay it, the Committee can easily understand, but that any parish, after binding itself to submit to the laws of the Dioeese, as each parish upon its admission does bind itself, can yet of its own mere will limit its own obligations, the Committee seriously question. In the opinion of many, not only has the Legislature of the Dioeese the right to lay taxes upon the several parishes, but that right ex tends to individuals, and would justify a per capita tax, should the Convention think that desirable.

Whatever form or proportions the assessments may take, the Committee would, with all respect to their brethren, express their conviction of the right of the Convention to assess, and the moral obligation upon the parishes and upon individuals in them, to comply with the assessment, so far as God may give them the power to do so.

Of the parishes and congregations with regard to which replies have been received to the circular of the Committee already referred to, ten, whose aggregate assessment is \$1,676, are in favor of retaining the present assessment. These parishes are: Trinity, Asheville, St. Barnabas', Greensboro', St. Mat-

thews', Hillsboro', Christ's Church, Raleigh, St. Mary's School, Raleigh, St. Clement's, Ringwood, St. Luke's, Salisbury, St. James', Wilmington, St. John's, Wilmington, and St. Paul's, Wilmington, 51 parishes, or congregations, have proposed fixed sums, amounting in all to \$2,320. From a very nearly equal number of congregations, no reply has been received.

Estimating the ability of the latter by their actual offerings in this or former years, we may hope to receive from them the additional sum of about \$400, making in all \$4,216.

But it must not be forgotten, that the contingent assessment is not for the Bishop's salary alone, but for the expenses of the Convention also. These expenses amount annually to from \$1,000 to \$1,300. Wherefore the Contingent Fund simply to hold its own, and meet these general expenses, as well as pay the Bishop's salary, must amount to \$3,500 to \$3,800 per annum.

It is true, that the interest from the Permanent Episcopal Fund, which has lately been increased to about \$736 per annum, may be used to increase the assessment. But the Committee submit that it would be well to allow the interest upon that fund to accumulate, in order to raise it as speedily as possible to a condition in which it may be able by itself to support the Episcopate.

The Committee do not desire to be blind to facts which are favorable. Whether the change be due to the stimulation supplied by the action, ad interim, of the Finance Committee, it is a fact, that for the last two years, there has been a material increase in the receipts on behalf of the current Episcopal Fund.

And it is to be remarked, that the actual payments on behalf of this fund, during the conventional year just closed, have amounted to more than \$4,000.

The Committee have had under consideration, several plans of change, viz:

1st. To reduce the scale of assessment to \$1.50 per communicant.

2nd. To reduce it to \$1 for each communicant.

3rd. To reduce the proportional assessment to \$1 for each communicant, but to assess an additional fixed sum upon parishes pecuniarily more able than others.

4th. That of abandoning all proportional assessments, and making the assessments a fixed sum.

An assessment of some kind is unavoidable, so long as the Permanent Fund remains insufficient to bear the whole burden.

But inasmuch as the actual increase of revenue has accrued under the system adopted in 1867, the Committee submit to the Convention whether it would not be better to continue the present system a little longer.

While upon this subject, the Committee would submit to the Convention the question, whether the present Episcopal salary is such as should satisfy the Diocese. The Committee would propose that it be increased to \$3,000 per annum.

The Committee would call the attention of the Convention to the fact that premiums due upon the life policy of \$5,000 given by the late Treasurer as security for money, borrowed by him, expired upon the 28th of this month, and has not, to the knowledge of the Committee, been renewed; and would enquire

of the Convention, whether it is the pleasure of the Convention to assume the payment thereof when neglected by the assignor. The amount of the pre mium is §131.75 per annum.

The Committee would close by submitting the following resolutions, (not so much as an expression of eny very decided judgment of their own, as to supply a formal basis of debate):

Resolved, 1st, That the present scale of assessments be changed, so as to impose a uniform proportional assessment throughout the Diocese of \$1 per annum, and that there be added a special assessment of fixed sums upon such parishes as may be able to bear it.

Resolved, 2nd, That the salary of the Bishop be increased to \$3,000 per annum.

Resolved, 3rd, That the Treasurer be authorized to drop from his accounts securities definitely ascertained, to be worthless.

Resolved, 4th, That, in order to the ascertainment of such items, the matter be referred to a Committee of three laymen to report to this Convention.

Resolved, 5th, That no change in the system now in use, for the support of Diocesean Missions, be at present adopted.

A. A. WATSON, Chairman,

On motion of Rev. Dr. Watson, the resolutions was made the special order for this afternoon's session.

Rev. Dr. Watson read the Report of the Executive Missionary Committee, as follows:

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE MISSIONARY COMMITTEE.

The Executive Missionary Committee respectfully report, that during the past Conventional year the receipts by ordinary Parochial Collections for Diocesan Missions have been \$1,189.19.

In addition, collections have been made by the Bishop upon his visitations to the amount of \$771.83.

There have been contributions and receipts from other sources, mostly external to the Diocese, of \$100.

Making the total receipts of the year for this object \$2,061.02.

If to this be added the balance to the credit of the Missionary Fund from the previous year (\$321.72) it will be found that the total amount at the disposal of the Committee during the past year has been \$2,382.74.

Appropriations to the amount of \$1,650.00 have been made to 18 of the Diocesan clergy, leaving a balance in hand available for the coming year of \$732.74.

The Committee take pleasure in the fact that the receipts for this purpose, though much less than before the war, and though very nearly stationary, have yet been for some years upon the whole rather increasing, and they are encouraged to hope that it may speedily be in their power, either to increase the missionary stipends, or the number of stations aided.

Respectfully submitted,

Rev. Geo. Patterson read the following report from the Committee on New Parishes:

The Committee on New Parishes beg leave to report, that they have examined the papers submitted to them in behalf of St. Joseph's Parish, for colored people in Fayetteville, and have found them correct.

They therefore offer the following resolution:

Resolved, That St. Joseph's Parish, Fayetteville, be admitted into union with this Convention.

The resolution was adopted.

A certificate of Lay Delegates from the new parish was handed in, and John S. Leary and James Williams named therein took their seats.

Rev. Geo. Patterson read the report of the Education Committee, as follows:

Rev. B. S. Bronson offered the following:

Resolved, 1st, That the Bishop of the Diocese be requested to appoint one or more persons in each parish, who shall act in behalf of the Church Building Committee, in the collection of funds; and shall report their action and transfer the funds collected by them to the Bishop on his annual visitation.

Resolved, 2d, That a Committee, composed of the Bishop or Bishops, two Clergymen and two Laymen, be appointed, who shall take such steps as may seem to them expedient towards securing properties to be owned by the Diocese as schools for girls.

Resolved, 3d, That the Bishop be requested, at his annual visitation, to call the attention of the Vestries of the Parishes receiving aid from the Diocesan Missionary Fund, to the amount of such aid granted them.

Resolved, 4th, That the Vestries of the Parishes of the Diocese shall report to the Bishop, at his annual visitation, the general condition of the Parish, and especially the amount of salary given to its Rector.

The first resolution was rejected and the second passed.

The consideration of the third resolution was suspended.

On motion of Rev. J. C. Huske, the report of the Committee on Finance was referred to the Committee on the subject of an Assistant Bishop.

A. J. DeRosset offered the following resolutions, which, on his motion, were referred to the Committee on Canons:

Resolved, 1st, That it be referred to the Committee on Canons, to enquire and report to this Convention whether the clause (See Canon XIV) and the brackets enclosing the same, in the second paragraph of third section of Article IXth of the Constitution, were intended to constitute a part of said Article, or whether their insertion has been accidental or unauthorized, and further, that the said Committee report such action as may be deemed necessary to exclude the said clause and brackets from all future publications of the Constitution—if in their opinion such exclusion is necessary or desirable.

Resolved, 2d, That Canon XIV entitled "Organization of Parishes," be amended by striking out from the last paragraph, the words "Article X, section 4," and inserting in place thereof "Article IX, section 3."

Resolved, 3d, That it be referred to the Committee on Canons to enquire and report to this Convention whether Article XV of the Constitution should be altered, amended or repealed.

A. J. DeRosset offered the following, which was, on his motion, referred to the Committee on the State of the Church:

Resolved, That it be referred to the Committee on the State of the Church to enquire and report whether or not, in their opinion, proceedings should now be taken to enforce the penalty prescribed by the Ninth Article of the Constitution against any parish or parishes of this Diocese, for ceasing to be represented in the Convention for two or more successive years, or for resisting the authority of the Convention.

On motion, the Convention adjourned to meet at 4 o'clock, P. M.

FOUR O'CLOCK, P. M.

The consideration of the resolutions offered by the Rev. Mr. Bronson was resumed, and the third and fourth resolutions were voted on separately and did not pass.

Rev. N. Falls presented the papers of a new congregation desiring admission into union with the Convention as the Parish of "the Ascension," Catawba county; which, on his motion, were referred to the Committee on New Parishes.

Rev. M. M. Marshal presented the papers of a new congregation seeking admission into union with the Convention as the "Chapel of the Good Shepherd," Ridgeway, Warren county, which, on his motion, were referred to the Committee on New Parishes.

Rev. A. A. Benton, Chairman of the Committee on Unfinished Business, read the following report:

The Committee on Unfinished Business respectfully report that there is no unfinished business to report.

The special order for the afternoon session—the Report of the Committee on Finance—was taken up.

Rev. N. Falls moved to substitute for the first resolution of the Committee,

Resolved, That the present mode of assessment be retained during the current year.

The substitute was adopted, and the resolution passed in that form.

The Bishop objected to the adoption of the second resolution (increasing his salary to \$3,000), and on motion of W. R. Cox, it was laid on the table temporarily.

The third resolution was adopted.

The fourth resolution was passed, and the Bishop appointed A. J. DeRosset, S. L. Fremont and R. Strange as the Committee.

The fifth resolution passed.

The consideration of the resolutions offered by the Committee appointed by the last Convention "to revise, amend and improve the rules of order," was resumed.

J. G. Martin moved, as a substitute for the whole, to add to the of Rules Order,

Rule XIX. When a vote by Orders is called for, the Lay vote of each Parish shall be cast by one delegate to be selected by the delegation; Provided, that any delegate voting in the minority may have his vote recorded.

The Committee accepted the substitue.

On the question of its final adoption the Lay delegation of St. John's Parish, Wilmington, called for a vote by Orders.

The substitute was lost by the following vote:

The Committee to whom was referred that portion of the Episcopal Address which relates to the election of an Assistant Bishop, recommend the adoption of the following resolutions:

Resolved, 1st, That this Convention proceed to the election of an Assistant Bishop.

Resolved, 2nd, That the salary of the Assitant Bishop be two thousand five hundred dollars per annum.

Resolved, 3rd, That this Convention meet to-morrow at 9 o'clock for morning prayer, to be followed by the Holy Communion; after which the clergy shall meet at some place to be provided by the Rector of this Parish, for the purpose of making a nomination for the office of Assistant Bishop.

Resolved, 4th, That this nomination by the clergy shall be submitted to the laity sitting with closed doors.

A. SMEDES. Chairman.

The first resolution passed unanimously.

S. L. Fremont moved to strike out of the second resolution the words "two thousand five hundred" and insert "two thousand," which did not pass.

The second, third and fourth resolutions were then severally adopted.

Rev. Geo. Patterson read the following report from the Committee on New Parishes:

The Committee on New Parishes respectfully report, that they have examined the petition of a congregation under the title of "The Chapel of the Good Shepherd," Ridgeway, Warren county; and also a petition from "Ascension" Parish, Catawba county, praying to be received into union with this Convention. The Canon in each case having been complied with, the Committee recommend the adoption of the following:

Resolved, 1st, That the congregation of "The Chapel of the Good Shepherd," Ridgeway, Warren county, be admitted into union with this Convention.

Resolved, 2d, That the congregation of "The Ascension," Catawba county, be admitted into union with this Convention.

The resolutions were severally adopted. On motion of S. L. Fremont, it was

Resolved, That the Secretary be directed to contract with the lowest bidder for printing the Journal of the Convention within the Diocese; Provided, It shall be done as well and upon as favorable terms here as elsewhere.

Rev. Dr. Smedes read the report from the Committee on Canons:

The Committee on Canons, to whom was referred the report of the Special Committee, appointed at the last Convention, to draft a form of a deed for the conveyance of property, respectfully report, that they have examined that report, approve the same and recommend the following resolution:

Resolved, That the report of the Committee appointed at the last Convention "to draft a form of a deed for the conveyance of property, &c., is hereby accepted, and the form of a deed by them reported is adopted by the Convention, and recommended to all the vestries in the Diocese.

The Committee on Canons, to whom was referred the resolutions of Dr. A. J. DeRosset, respectfully report, that they have examined the same, and recommend the following resolutions:

Resolved, That the brackets and words "see Canon XIV in section 3, Article 9th, of the Constitution," were not intended to constitute a part of said Article and that they be omitted in any future publication of the Constitution.

Resolved, That Canon XIV, last paragraph, be amended by striking out "Article X, sec. 4," inserting in place thereof the words "Article IX, sec. 3."

ALDERT SMEDES, Chairman.

The resolutions of the Committee on Canons were severally adopted.

On motion, the Convention adjourned, to meet at 9 o'clock, to-morrow.

FRIDAY MORNING, May 30th, 1873.

The Convention met pursuant to adjournment.

Morning prayer was said, and the Holy Communion was admintered.

The clergy then retired to select a candidate for Assistant Bishop, to be nominated to the laity for confirmation.

At half past twelve o'clock, (P. M.) the clergy returned to the Convention for the purpose of ballotting for a candidate in the presence of the laity.

On motion, the roll was not called and the reading of the minutes of yesterday's proceedings was postponed.

Rev. Dr. Buxton and Rev. Mr. Marshall were appointed tellers.

Nominations were called for.

Rev. Mr. Forbes nominated Rev. A. A. Watson, D. D.

Rev. Mr. Sutton nominated Rev. Theodore B. Lyman, D. D.

The roll of clergy was called, and each clergyman deposited his ballot in a vase, placed in front of the chancel, as his name was read.

The first ballot resulted as follows: Rev. Dr. Watson re ceived 15 votes, Rev. Dr. Lyman 5, Rev. Dr. Perry 3, Rev. Dr. Seymour 1, Rev. Dr. Leeds 1, Rev. Mr. Rankin 3, Rev. Mr. Huske 1, Rev. Dr. Thompson 2, Rev. Mr. Buel 1, Rev. Dr. Wingfield 2.

The names of Rev. Dr. Perry, Rev. Dr. Seymour and Rev. Dr. Thompson were withdrawn by the gentlemen who proposed them.

On the second ballot, Rev. Dr. Watson received 16 votes, Rev. Dr. Lyman 14, Rev. Dr. Leeds 1, Rev. Mr. Rankin 2, Rev. Mr. Huske 1.

Rev. R. B. Sutton moved to adjourn until $4\frac{1}{2}$ o'clock, P. M., which was lost.

The name of Rev. Dr. Leeds was withdrawn.

Rev. J. C. Huske moved to adjourn until 4½ o'clock, P. M., which was lost.

A. J. DeRosset appealed from the decision of the chair.

On motion of W. H. Battle, the Convention adjourned until 5 o'clock, P. M.

Rev. N. Falls nominated the Rev. W. S. Perry, D. D., of Geneva, N. Y.

29th Ballot. Dr. Watson 12, Dr. Lyman 6, Dr. Perry 15.

Rev. Dr. Watson withdrew his name, saying that he would have done so before but for the solicitation of his friends.

30th Ballot, Dr. Perry 17, Dr. Watson 12, Dr. Lyman 3.

K. P. Battle moved to adjourn until 9 o'clock to-morrow, which did not prevail.

31st Ballot. Dr. Lyman 18, Dr. Watson 8, Dr. Perry 6, Dr. DeKoven 1. Three gentlemen who voted for Dr. Perry were allowed to change their votes to Dr. Lyman.

32d Ballot, Dr. Lyman 22, Dr. Watson 8, Dr. Perry 1, Dr. Stevens 1, Dr. Dix 1, Blank 1.

33d Ballot. Dr. Lyman 22, Dr. Watson 9, Dr. Perry 2.

34th Ballot. Dr. Lyman 23, Dr. Watson 9, Dr. Perry 2.

Thereupon the Bishop cast his vote for Dr. Lyman, making 24 votes in all and a majority of all the clergy in the Diocese entitled to seats in the Convention.

It was then announced that the Rev. Theodore B. Lyman, D. D., was the choice of the Clergy for Assistant Bishop of this Diocese.

The nomination was then submitted to the laity, and was concurred in by them, twenty-seven parishes voting for, and five parishes against concurrence.

Rev. Dr. Watson moved to make the nomination unanimous, which was not agreed to.

On motion of Rev. Edw'd Wootten it was

Resolved, That a Committee of two clergymen and two laymen be appointed to prepare the necessary testimonials and to notify the Bishop elect of the action of the Convention.

The Bishop appointed as such committee, Rev. A. A. Watson, D. D, Rev. B. S. Bronson, William R. Cox and A. J. De-Rosset.

After singing the Gloria in Excelsis, and the Benediction by the Bishop, the Convention adjourned to meet Saturday morning at 9 o'clock.

On motion, balloting was dispensed with in the election of the Standing Committee, and the following were elected, viz: Rev. R. S. Mason, D. D., Rev. A. Smedes, D. D., Rev. J. C. Huske, William H. Battle and Dan'l M. Barringer.

On motion, ballotting was dispensed with in the election of the Executive Missionary Committee, and the following were elected, viz: Rev. A. A. Watson, D. D., Rev. J. C. Huske, A. J. DeRosset, Robert Strange, and S. L. Fremont.

On motion, ballotting was dispensed with in the election of the Education Committee, and the following were elected, viz: Rev. Geo. Patterson, Geo. Davis, and A. H. VanBokkelin.

The Church Building Committee was elected in the same way, viz: Rev. J. B. Cheshire, D. D., Rev. M. M. Marshall, Rev. Luther Eborn, Wm. R. Cox, and Geo. V. Strong.

A ballot was held for Deputies to the General Convention. The following were elected, viz: Rev. R. S. Mason, D. D., Rev. A. A. Watson, D. D., Rev. A. Smedes, D. D., Rev. N. C. Hughes, W. H. Battle, R. H. Smith, A. J. DeRosset, and J. G. Martin.

On motion, balloting was dispensed with in electing Alternate Deputies to the General Convention, and the following were elected by resolution, viz: Rev. Jarvis Buxton, D. D., Rev. E. M. Forbes, Rev. J. C. Huske, Rev. Geo. Patterson, William Eaton, Kemp P. Battle, J. W. Atkinson, Jas. F. Foulkes.

The Committe on New Parishes made the following report:

The Committee on the admission of New Parishes respectfully report, that they have examined the application of St. Martin's Parish, Hamilton, Martin County, and find it in conformity with the requirements of Canon XIV, and Article IX of the Constitution.

Resolved, therefore, That the congregation of St. Martin's, Hamilton, be admitted into union with the Convention.

The resolution of the Committee was adopted. On motion of Rev. R. B. Sutton, it was

Resolved, That the Secretary be instructed to publish and distribute twelve hundred copies of the Journal of this Convention.

On motion of W. N. Tillinghast, five hundred copies of the Constitution and Canons were ordered to be printed.

W. H. Battle called the attention of the Convention to the changes in the Constitution of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States, recommended by the General Convention of 1871.

Rev. D. H. Buel offered the following:

Resolved, That this Convention hereby dissents from the resolution of the General Convention, changing Article V of the Constitution.

On motion of Rev. F. J. Murdoch, action on the resolution was postponed until the next Convention.

Rev. E. M. Forbes read the report of the Committee on the State of the Church:

The Committee on the State of the Church respectfully report, that as some of the Clergy have failed to send in their reports they are unable to give a correct view of the Church in the Diocese.

From the information placed before them, they find that the following are the statistics of the Diocese, to-wit:

There are four Postulants and nine Candidates for Orders.

The Committee have cause for joy that the Church is increasing her influence and numbers in the Diocese, and they believe that she would make much more rapid progress if greater efforts were made to train the children in the principles of the Faith.

They would call especial attention to that part of the Bishop's address, in which he speaks so highly of the Diocesan School, at Raleigh, under the care of Rev. Dr. Smedes. They do most heartily recommend this School to the patronage of every Churchman in the State, being well assured that the children of the Church can be as thoroughly educated there, as at any school in the United States.

They rejoice to know that Parochial Schools are increasing, and would recommend that every Rector make especial and strenuous efforts to establish a Church School in his parish.

They would again call especial attention of the Laity to the sad deficiencies in the salaries of the Clergy, and would urge upon them to see that those salaries, small in themselves, are fully and promptly paid.

As the resolution, referring to what action should be taken against those parishes ceasing to be represented for two or more years to the Convention, or for resisting the authority of the Convention, was brought before the Committee two late for action upon it, your Committee are of opinion that the matter should be postponed till the next Convention.

E. M. FORBES, Chairman.

Kemp P. Battle, Chairman of the Permanent Episcopal Fund Committee, asked and obtained leave to make an informal report, stating that it was impossible to render one more formal, because the reports of some of the sub-agents had just been handed in.

Mr. Battle stated that the Committee requested Clergymen in various parts of the Diocese to canvass the parishes in the neighborhood of their respectives cures. Three, viz: Rev. Dr. A. A. Watson, of St. James' Church, Wilmington, Rev. Benj. S. Bronson, of St. Peter's Church, Charlotte, and the Rev. James A. Weston, of the Church of the Holy Trinity, Hertford, consented to act and did zealous and effective work, receiving therefor only their necessary expenses. Rev. Dr. Watson visited likewise Raleigh and Fayetteville. Subscriptions were taken in cash, in notes running one or more years, and in notes to be paid conditionally, i. e., if \$40,000 in the total shall be raised within a limited time. The Committee stated that Rev. Dr. Watson had collected \$1,522 in cash, \$4,148.29 in unconditional notes and scrip, and \$2,085 in conditional Rev. Mr. Bronson had collected \$245 in cash, and \$1,580 in unconditional notes. Rev. Mr. Weston \$321.50 in eash, \$1,970 in unconditional notes, and \$600 in conditional The results of the labors of these three agents vary in amount because of the difference in the wealth of parishes assigned to each. \$145 in cash was paid directly to the Committee.

A small amount of the cash payments was on notes reported to the last Convention.

From the above it appears that in the aggregate \$2,088.50 has been collected in eash, of which about \$2,000 is new subscriptions; \$7,698.25 procured in unconditional notes and scrip, and \$2,685 in conditional. In the aggregate within the last two years there have been raised about \$9,800 in eash and notes and scrip, unconditional, and \$2,685 in conditional notes.

The Committee having just received two of the reports of the agents have been compelled to make such rapid examination of the items that they cannot be entirely confident of the perfect accuracy of the figures. They propose to make a full detailed statement to the next Convention, giving names of donors and subscribers, the dates of the notes, time of payments, &c. The Committee on the Permanent Episcopal Fund was continued.

On motion of K. P. Battle, it was

Resolved, That the Convention shall elect a Clergyman to canvass the State to solicit contributions to the Permanent Episcopal Fund.

Rev. Dr. Smedes nominated Rev. N. C. Hughes, and he was unanimously elected.

Kemp P. Battle resigned as a Trustee of the University of the South, and Wm R. Cox was elected to fill the vacancy.

The Committee appointed to prepare the Testimonials of the election of the Rev. T. B. Lyman, D. D., as Assistant Bishop, presented the proper forms, which were duly signed, the roll of the Clergy and of the Lay Delegates being called for the purpose.

On motion, the Convention adjourned to meet at $4\frac{1}{2}$ o'clock, P. M.

Saturday, 4½ o'clock, P. M.

The Convention met pursuant to adjournment.

Rev. Dr. Watson read a report from the Committee on Finance, as follows:

The Finance Committee respectfully report, that they have examined the Treasurer's accounts, and the vouchers accompanying them, and find them correct.

The Committee would take this opportunity to call the attention of the members of the Convention to the increased necessity, which has arisen from the election of an Assistant Bishop, for the regular and full payment of the assessments. In no otherwise can the Diocese count upon being able to keep faith with its Bishops.

That the Diocese will do this, the Committee is encouraged to hope, not only from what has been accomplished during the past year, but from the interest exhibited in the election of the Assistant Bishop, and the promptitude with which his support was assumed by this Convention.

Resolved, That the fiscal year of the Convention shall end with the 31st day of March of each year, and the assessments required shall be paid quarterly to the Treasurer.

On motion of Rev. Dr. Watson, it was

Resolved, That the Treasurer be authorized to pay the expenses necessarily incurred by the Committee on Finance.

The minutes of the day were read and accepted.

The Gloria in Excelsis was sung, the Bishop pronounced the Benediction, and the Convention adjourned sine die.

It gives me pleasure to state that I have been able to keep up the service regularly throughout the past year. The church has not been closed very often, and then only when duty called me elsewhere. In addition to the above record and account of my work, I have held or assisted in holding two hundred and twenty-one services. I have celebrated the Holy Communion 19 times publicly, and twice in private, preached 54 sermons and delivered 10 lectures or addresses. Outside of my own Parish, I have married one couple, baptized one adult, and buried one person. As opportunity offered I have administered the Holy Communion for the Deacon in charge of the Church of the Holy Innocents, in Lenoir county. And on one occasion I performed the same service in St. Matthews', Hillsboro'.

I can say very little as to the state of my Parish. I trust that it is in a more favorable condition than it was last year. I am under many obligations to my people for their continued kindness to me. The ladies of the congregation are worthy of especial mention—for the willingness with which they do all in their power to advance the work of the Church.

This Parish now makes its first Parochial Report, and applies to the Convention, at its present session for admission into union with that body. In July last it was regularly organized and its first vestry elected. Previous to that time, for about eighteen months, services were held at the Ridgeway Hotel, only in the afternoon of one Sunday in each month. The congregation now worship in the morning of one, and in the afternoon of another Sunday, in each month, in a beautiful chapel of brick, Gothic, measuring 28x44, with recess chancel, erected at a cost, in its present condition, of \$2.873, 27 and entirely free from debt.

This encouraging state of things is, under God, owing mainly to the kindly personal interest in the work, liberality and active exertions of Dr. W. J. Hawkins. It is but a matter of simple justice to this gentleman to state that he has not only personally superintended and directed the construction of the chapel, but has also himself contributed more than \$2,000 to the work, besides having obtained for it, through personal friends, about \$800 more.

It is not meant to disparage the active interest and exertions of others of less means, who have gladly done what they could in contributions of time, money, material of all kinds, hands, hauling, &c.

An excellent (Prince's) Cabinet Organ is the gift of Mrs. J. D. North, of Ridgeway, and Mrs. Allen Dodworth, of New York. A beautiful and valuable Communion service is the gift of Mrs. Weldon N. Edwards, of Ridgeway.

Two alms basins were presented.

The Vestry has been well furnished with a cassock, surplice and stole, by the little daughters of Dr. Hawkins, and an excellent bell with fixtures, obtained by Mrs. W. J. Hawkins, through friends, will be put up in a few weeks.

The Chapel, with two lots measuring each 100x300 feet, has been enclosed.

But we are still very much in need of pews and furniture, and books for the chancel. May we not reasonably hope for a little aid from friends to supply these imperative wants? The person reported "confirmed" belongs to the Parish of Emmanuel Church, Warrenton, as do a majority of the communicants who worship here as yet, hence the absence from the statistics of this report of many items otherwise to be expected.

There have been in all 19 confirmations since the last annual report; but 14 of that number having been at the Bishop's last visitation, (made since March 31st, when, by Canon XIX, the Parochial Reports are closed) only 5 are reported for the past year.

There have been also, 6 additional Baptisms, and 2 Burials since March 31st, which for the same reason are not included in the above report.

Several numbers in the first table are only proximate, e.g. those of Baptized persons, and of Sunday and Parochial School pupils, the fluctuations of attendance rendering any exact statement impossible.

The institution known as St. James' Home has been maintained with advanced organization, and, we hope, with increased efficiency. It has been in charge of three ladies, communicants of the church, and resident in the building, of whom one is, under the Rector, its head. The day school is conducted by two of the number. During the year 93 children have been admitted to a course of gratuitous education in all the ordinary English studies. There have been 103 children upon the roll of the Sunday School.

There has been in operation in connection with the Home, for some months, a Hospital or Infirmary Department, in which the sick have been treated, under the superintendence of the Home Physicians, and the care of the ladies

resident. In this way, persons from a distance, by the payment of a moderate board, have been enabled to secure constant medical attendance, skilful nursing and the requisite medicines, together with the spiritual advantages resulting from the religious character of the institution. But thus far the work has been cramped for want of larger means, there being no endowment and the whole support of the institution being derived from the Parish of St. James. Should it please God to send us the means, and to bless our work, we hope to extend it, and not only to enlarge our Infirmary and our local work among the poor, but to add a boarding school, in which that desideratum of our age may be attained, viz: a sound, thorough religious education at a moderate expense.

The Fifty-Eighth Annual Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the State of North Carolina, will meet in St. John's Church, Wilmington, on the *Third* Wednesday in May, 1874.

LAYMEN'S CLERICAL AID SOCIETY.

St John's Church, Fayetteville, N. C., May 31st, 1873.

At a meeting of the Laymen, now in attendance upon the Convention, to consider the plan informally presented at the morning session of the Conventien by Mr. H. A. London, Jr., for the organization of an association to provide a fund for the support of families of deceased Clergymen, Hon, W. H. Battle was appointed Chairman and Mr. H. A. London, Jr., Secretary.

Upon motion of Gen. W. R. Cox, the accompanying Constitution was adopted for the organization, and in accordance with its provisions the following efficers were elected, viz: Hon. W. H. Battle, President; J. W. Atkinson, Vice-President; Mr. H. A. London, Jr., Secretary; and Col. W. E. Anderson, Treasurer.

On motion, the Secretary was requested to have printed copies of the Constitution, and forms of subscription for distribution, and to prepare and send to each Parish a circular explanatory of the object of the Society. On motion, the meeting adjourned.

CONSTITUTION.

I. This Association shall be known as the "LAYMEN'S CLERICAL AID SOCIETY," of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of North Carolina.

11. Any member or contributor to the support of the Protestant Episcopal Church, in the Diocese of North Carolina, may become a member of this Association on application to the Treasurer or to any assistant Secretary, and paying an Initiation fee of one dollar, to provide the means for payment of the expenses of the organization.

- III. An annual meeting of the Association shall be held at the place where the Diocesan Convention meets, on the evening of the second day of the session. At each meeting the following officers shall be elected, to-wit: a President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer, who shall hold their offices for the term of one year, and until their successors are appointed, and shall together constitute the Board of Trustees of the Association.
- IV. In each Parish in the Diocese an Assistant Secretary shall be elected by the Vestry, which appointment shall be reported to the principal Secretary.

V. Upon receipt by the President, of satisfactory evidence of the death of a Clergyman, both canonically and actually resident in the Diocese at the time of his death, leaving a family, that is, a wife or child, or dependent father or mother, he shall cause the Secretary to give notice to each Assistant Secretary, or in Parishes where such Assistant Secretaries are not reported, to the Rector, Wardens or Vestrymen, who shall forthwith notify the members of the Association in his Parish, and collect from each member the sum of two dollars, and forward the same to the Treasurer.

And the funds so collected shall be paid by the Treasurer, under the supervision of the Board, to the family of such deceased Clergyman; *Provided*, that if for any cause the proper fund for the payment of the necessary expenses of the organization shall be inadequate, the same may be paid out of such assessment.

VI. The Board of Trustees shall have power to make such By-Lews, not inconsistent with this Constitution, as they may deem necessary, and may procure the incorporation of the Society.

VII. The Trustees shall annually make and cause to be published a report of their proceedings and the condition of the Association.

VIII. This Constitution may be amended on written motion, and by a two-thirds vote of the members present at any annual meeting.

IX. Any person on becoming a member of the Association, may designate one dollar as the payment to be made by him, or her, on the death of a Minister, instead of two as specified in section five of this Constitution, and in such case one instead of two dollars shall be collected on calls of the Secretary.

X. Distribution of the amount payable to the members of the family of a deceased Clergyman, under the provision of section five of this Constitution, shall be made to each of said members, in such proportion to each as the Trustees shall think just and right; and in case of difficulty or doubt, if they shall think proper, the Trustees may refer the matter to the judgment of the subscribers at their annual meeting.

XI. All officers of this Association shall serve without compensation.
