The Rev. Dr. Watson read the Report of the Committee on Finance; and moved the adoption of the accompanying resolution,

The Finance Committee respectfully report: That they have examined the Treasurer's accounts, with the accompanying vouchers, and find them correct.

But two applications have been made since the Convention of 1878 for the reduction of Parochial assessments, of which the Committee thought it expedient to grant but one. The assessment upon St. James', Beaufort county, was reduced frum \$30 to \$24.

In the respect of this fund, the Committee are sorry to see so large a deficit as is exhibited by the Treasurer's accounts in the payments of the past year. Out of a total assessment of \$4,893, only \$2,488,65 has been received—about one-half.

The arrearages brought forward from the previous year and remaining unpaid at the date of the Treasurer's report swell the total deficit to more than \$3,500. This is of more moment because of the unexpected failure of some of the securities (in which the Permanent Fund was invested) to yield their customary income. The practical result has been that the balance due upon the Episcopal Salaries, March 31st, of \$1,250 remains unpaid.

The Relief, the Education and the Church Building Funds have all received during the past year diminished contributions.

On the other hand, the ordinary offerings for Diocesan Missions have been in advance of those of last year, though less than those reported in 1877; and yet, although the appropriations from this fund have been less than those of 1877–'78, and have but slightly exceeded those of the two previous years, it will be observed that in order to meet them it has been necessary to overdraw the account \$163,34.

The Committee find pleasure in noticing the contribution this year of nearly \$300 to the University of the South, and they would take this opportunity to commend to the regards of the Diocese and to its liberality an institution in whose support it has voluntarily assumed a part, by providing for its representation in its management.

There is a matter which the Committee feel constrained to bring before the Convention.

There are in the hands of the present Treasurer three notes given by the former Treasurer for balances due by him to the Diocese at the termination of his office. Whereof:

The Committee appointed by the last Convention to revise and publish a new edition of the Constitution and Canons, respectfully report that in order to secure a correct text they have examined carefully all the Journals from the time of the adoption of the present Code in 1859, and that they have come to the conclusion that the mere reprint of the Code, as it at present stands, (which is all they were authorized to procure) would result in an edition so unsatisfactory for future use as to defeat substantially the wish of the Convention. They have, at all events, thought it advisable, that before printing a large edition, the Convention should have the opportunity of passing upon certain supposed errors and, should they see fit to do so, of correcting the text in those respects. They have therefore made a contract with a printing firm to have 150 copies of the Code, as it now stands, struck off for the use of this Convention, and to have the type held undistributed for the present, in order to enable the publication of a larger edition, with such amendments as this Convention might adopt. The Committee therefore ask the adoption of the following resolution :

Resolved, That this Convention approve the action of the Committee appointed by the last Convention for printing a revised edition of the Constitution and Canons.

The Chairman of the Missionary Committee presented the following report :

The Missionary Committee have during the past year made appropriations to twenty-one of the Clergy, and in doing this they are thankful that they have been able to keep up the average amounts heretofore appropriated to each person since the closing of the war. But this is all they have been able to do.

While the regular Parochial contributions to this fund have been greater this year than the last by \$147, the balance on hand at the beginning of the year was about \$600 less, and so notwithstanding a number of special contributions during the year, it is a matter of serious regret, that in order to meet the appropriations made, it has been necessary to overdraw the account by \$163.34.

Out of 117 Parishes and Stations included in the Treasurer's Report, 91 are represented as contributing to this object during the past year. Of these, 52 by regular offering, the rest by collections made at the time of the visitation of the Bishops.

The Committee cannot insist too much upon the importance of this object. The miserably meagre support of a large portion of the Clergy receiving aid from this fund, and therefore largely dependent upon it, is a subject demanding the most carnest attention of the Diocese, both as it regards its own welfare and as it regards what is due to its missionary Clergy.

The Trustees can say from personal experience and observation that this Institution, averse to all extremes on either hand, is in every particular peculiarly adapted to the needs of our people, and must therefore have our prayers, our sympathies, and our alms, if it is to do the work which is set before it and for which alone it was founded.

This Diocese, through its Bishops and its Clerical and Lay Trustees, is equally responsible with the other Southern Dioceses in the management of its aflairs; and is therefore accountable to God for the manner in which it meets its opportunities in this regard; and it should do all in its power to advance the spiritual and temporal interests of that Institution.

Your Trustees do therefore beg leave to offer the following resolution :

Resolved, That the Diocese of North Carolina does acknowledge the claims which the University of the South has upon its care; and that it will do all in its power to further the work which is now being done there by those godly and well-learned men, who, in much self-sacrifice and earnest diligence, are devoting their lives to the sacred purpose of imparting Christian learning to our Southern boys.

Respectfully submitted, GEO. PATTERSON, Chairman.

The election of a Treasurer of the Diocese being ordered, the Rev. Dr. Watson nominated A. J. DeRosset, M. D., and there being no other nomination, the ballot was dispensed with and he was unanimously re-elected.

The Committee to whom was referred that portion of the Bishop's address in regard to the Diocesan Church paper, respectfully report that they do most heartily concur in the opinion that the publication of said paper is a very important work, and may become, under proper management, a source of great benefit to the Church in this Diocese, and they hope that it may receive the hearty sympathy and the active co-operation of the Clergy and Laity of the Diocese. The Committee therefore offer the following resolution :

Resolved, That this Convention hereby express its approbation of the work undertaken by the Rev. W. S. Bynum in the publication of the paper known as the "Church Messenger," and they recommend that the Clergy of the Diocese take such steps as may be proper to bring the matter to the attention of their congregations and to extend the circulation of said paper in the Diocese.

The report was accepted and the resolution adopted.



Bishop's Address, May and June, 1878.

Address.

Dear Brethren of the Clergy and Laity:

Since the adjournment of our last Convention, 1 have been enabled, in the good Providence of God, to perform the duties of my office in the manner, and to the extent which 1 am about to specify.

On the 12th of May, 1878, in St. John's Church, Wilmington, at Evening Prayer, after a sermon by the Rev. C. Stuart Hale, I confirmed eight persons.

13th, I confirmed in private, two sick persons, one belonging to St. James' Church and the other to St. John's Church, Wilmington.

15th, I confirmed one person in St. Paul's Church, Wilmington.

June 6th, I confirmed in private, a sick member of St. Mark's Church, Wilmington.

9th, in the morning, in Christ Church, Rock Fish, Cumberland county, I preached, confirmed eight persons and administered the Holy Communion.

In the evening, in St. John's Church, Fayetteville, I preached and confirmed thirteen persons.

12th, I administered the Holy Communion in private to a sick member of St. Mark's Church, Wilmington.

14th, in St. James' Church, in the same city, 1 baptized an infant.

15th, I confirmed in private, a sick member of St. Mark's Church, in that city.

16th, in St. Paul's Church, in the same eity, I baptized an infant.

20th, I attended the closing exercises of St. Mary's School, Raleigh, and addressed the pupils. It was gratifying to witness the literary talent and taste evinced by them. This school, which has been the prolific source of so many blessings, both to society and to the Church in this State and in several others, will, I trust and have reason to believe, maintain the high character and continue to exert the beneficent influence which distinguished it when under the control of the late lamented Dr. Smedes, and I strongly recommend both to the Clergy and Laity of the Diocese, to do what lies in their power, not only to sustain it, but to enlarge its sphere of usefulness.

On the same day I visited St. Augustine's Normal School at Raleigh, and found it in a very satisfactory condition.

29th, in St. John's Church, Wilmington, I baptized an adult.

30th, in the same church, I confirmed three persons.

July 17th, I preached at Morganton.

21st, at Haw Creek Chapel.

23d, at Beaver Dam Chapel.

25th, at St. Andrew's Chapel.

The three last being Mission Stations in Buncombe county.

28th, at Trinity Church, Asheville, the Rev. Dr. Hall, of the Diocese of Long Island, read Morning Prayer, and Econfirmed three persons. I preached, and received to Deacon's Orders James Cook Atkinson, the candidate being presented by Dr. Buxton.

In the afternoon, at Trinity Chapel, Dr. Hall preached, I confirmed five persons and addressed them.

31st, at Leicester, in the same county, I preached, confirmed three persons and administered the Holy Communion.

August 4th, in Calvary Church, Henderson county, at Morning Prayer, I preached, confirmed two persons and administered the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper.

In the afternoon, I preached in St. James' Church, Hendersonville.

6th, in St. John's Church in the Wilderness, in the same county, I preached and confirmed one person.

sth, in St. Paul's Church in the Valley, Transylvania county, at Morning Prayer I preached and administered the Holy Communion.

After Evening Prayer, I preached at Brevard.

11th, I preached at a school house in Casher's Valley, in Jackson county.

13th, 1 preached at a school house in the new village of Highlands, in Macon county, where a colony from the Northern and Northwestern States has recently settled and seems very prosperons.

15th, in the morning I preached at the house of Mr. Siler, in the same county, and confirmed five persons.

In the evening of the same day I preached at Franklin, in the same county, 17th, at Webster, in Jackson county.

18th, at Waynesville, at Morning Prayer, I preached and administered the Lord's Supper, and in the afternoon-addressed the Sunday School.

19th, in the same place, 1 confirmed in private, a sick person, and on the 20th, in the same place, assisted by the Rev. Dr. Buel, 1 laid the cornerstone of a church, each of us making an address.

25th, at Rutherfordton, after Morning Prayer, I preached, confirmed one person and administered the Lord's Supper. In the evening, the Rev. Mr. Jones, of Spartanburg, S. C., preached.

September 1st, at Asheville, I preached and administered the Holy Communion, and on the 4th, confirmed there one person.

7th, at Morganton, I laid the corner-stone of the building in which the Wilberforce School is to be conducted. On that occasion I made an address,

and was followed in one of great interest by Gov. Vance, who expressed very strongly his desire to see that and similar institutions flourish.

Sth, at the same place, I preached twice, confirmed one person, and administered the Lord's Supper.

9th, at Hickory, I preached and confirmed two persons.

10th, at Newton, I preached and confirmed three persons.

12th. I was to have held service at Lenoir, but the congregation was prevented from assembling by torrents of rain which continued to fall during the day. The next day, however, I was able to preach, and confirmed four persons. On the afternoon of that day, I set off on a visitation to Watauga county, but found the direct road so washed by the flood resulting from the heavy rains of the previous day and night, as to be impassable. I then attempted a more eircuitous route, but the carriage in which I was travelling was overturned in a stream which was ordinarily very shallow, but in which a deep hollow had been dug by the flood of the previous night. I escaped with no worse consequence than a wetting to myself and to my baggage, but I found that further progress up the mountain was impracticable, the road that wound up its ascent being in some places washed away, so as to leave searcely footing for a mule between the cliffs and the Yadkin river. I felt very sincere sympathy with the farmers who saw their crops and fences washed away by the flood. I was, in consequence of it, therefore compelled to return to Lenoir where, however, I found work enough to do.

On Sunday, the 15th, at that place, at an early service, I administered the Lord's Supper. At mid-day I preached and confirmed two persons, and in the evening held a service for the colored people and preached to them.

18th, at Wilkesboro, I preached and administered the Lord's Supper.

19th, at Taylorsville, a place which I visited for the first time, I preached in the Presbyterian Church, and met with a very kind reception from the members of the congregation.

22d, at Statesville, I preached twice, administered the Holy Communion and confirmed three persons.

24th, at St. James' Church, in Iredell county, at Morning Prayer, I preached and confirmed six persons, and in the evening, at Mooresville, I preached in the Presbyterian Church, at the request of the minister.

26th, at Shelby, I preached and confirmed two persons.

27th, at Lincolnton, I preached and confirmed three persons.

28th, I preached in St. Paul's Chapel, Lincoln county.

29th, at Charlotte, I preached twice and confirmed three persons.

30th, at High Shoals, in Gaston county, I preached, confirmed one person, and administered the Holy Communion.

In the evening I preached again at Lincolnton and confirmed one person.

October 17, at Laurel Hill, in Richmond county, I preached and confirmed four persons, and in the morning, at the same place, preached and administered the Holy Communion, and in the evening, at Rockingham, I preached and confirmed four persons.

20th, at Wadesboro, I preached twice, and confirmed eight persons.

21st, at Ansonville, I preached and confirmed nine persons,

23d, at Monroe, I preached and confirmed four persons.

24th, at Concord, I preached and confirmed one person.

26th, I preached in St. Mary's Chapel, Rowan county.

27th, in St. Luke's, Salisbury, I preached twice, administered the Holy Communion, and confirmed five persons.

28th, in St. Andrew's Church, Rowan county, I preached and confirmed seven persons.

29th, in Christ Church, in the same county, 1 preached and confirmed nine persons.

30th, at Lexington, I preached twice and administered the Holy Communion.

31st, at Thomasville, I preached.

November 1st, at Greensboro, I preached twice, administered the Holy Communion and confirmed one person.

3d, at Winston, I had the same services, except that I confirmed no one, but baptized an infant.

4th, at a private house in Yadkin county, I baptized an infant, and at the same house, on the 5th, confirmed a sick person, and afterwards, on that day, at Huntsville, preached, confirmed four persons, and administered the Lord's Supper.

6th, at Germanton, in Stokes county, I preached, confirmed six persons, and administered the Holy Communion.

7th, at Hairston's Chapel, in the same county, 1 preached, and on the 9th, at the Mountain Chapel, in Rockingham county, 1 preached again.

10th, at Leaksville, I preached twice and administered the Holy Communion, assisted in these services by the Rev. Mr. Clark.

12th, at Reidsville, I preached twice, and thence went to Baltimore, where I was detained for some time by the illness of a member of my family, but was able to preach both in Grace Church and St. Peter's, churches once under my pastoral charge, and where many dear friends still worship.

December 18th, in Bladen county, at a house sometimes used for public worship, 1 preached, and afterwards, at a private house, confirmed two persons and administered the Communion to the sick, assisted by the Rev. Dr. Watson.

1879—January 11th, at Raleigh, 1 visited St. Augustine's Normal School, and was pleased with the progress of the pupils.

I afterwards took part in the funeral services of the late D. M. Carter, Esq., an eminent citizen of that city, and in the evening preached at St. Augustine's Chapel.

On the 12th, in Christ Church, Raleigh, I preached, confirmed five personand administered the Lord's Supper.

In the evening, at the Church of the Good Shepherd, I preached and contirmed one person.

13th, in the morning, I visited St. Mary's School and preached in the Chapel, and in the evening I delivered a lecture to the Guild, established by the Church of the Good Shepherd and Christ Church. I did this with the more pleasure, because I so entirely approve of the objects of these institutions: these are to provide, by regular and systematic efforts, for the relief of the destitute, for the care of the sick and the stranger, and thus carrying on Christ's work upon earth in a more efficient way than by individual effort, and by necessary consequences, deepening and strengthening the spiritual life of the members of these Societies. For these reasons, I should be glad to see others like them established elsewhere in the Diocese.

On the same day I baptized an infant in private.

March 9th, I preached twice at Smithville, and administered the Holy Communion.

12th, I preached at Ansonville and confirmed seven persons. The growth of that congregation has been remarkable and certainly very encouraging. In the early part of October last, there were but three members of the church belonging to it. During that month I confirmed nine and, as has just been stated, seven more in March. This increase has been due, under God, mainly to the zealous labours of the Rev. A. H. Boyle, of Calvary Church, Wadesboro, and the effectual aid which he has received from an earnest Christian man living in the village of Ansonville, who, with much worldly business on his hands, yet finds time to labour for Christ and for the good of his fellow-men.

16th, after Evening Prayer, I preached in St. Mark's Church, Wilmington, and confirmed eleven persons.

On the 17th, I confirmed in private, a sick member of St. John's Church, in the same city.

On the 19th, in the evening, I preached at Clinton, and on the 20th I preached at the same place and confirmed three persons.

21st, at Faison, I preached and confirmed one person. The church in this place, which is in the process of erection, is now nearly ready for the purposes of public worship.

22d, at Goldsboro, at Evening Prayer, I baptized an adult.

23d, being the 4th Sunday in Lent, at the same place, I preached twice, administered the Holy Communion and confirmed seven persons.

were held in quite a hand-some church recently erected there, though not vet completed.

19th, in the same town, in a private house, baptized an infant.

20th, first Sunday after Easter, at Woodville, Bertie county, I preached, confirmed one person and administered the Lord's Supper.

21st, P. M., preached at Windsor.

22d, A. M., at the same place, preached and confirmed two persons.

24th, at Jackson, preached twice and confirmed two persons.

25th, P. M., preached at Halifax.

26th, A. M., at the same place, preached, confirmed three persons, and administered the Holy Communion.

27th, second Sunday after Easter, at Weldon, preached and administered the Lord's Supper.

28th, returned home unwell, after a very fatiguing visitation.

May 4th, third Sunday after Easter, P. M., preached at St. Paul's Church. Wilmington, and confirmed five persons.

11th, at St. James' Church, in the same city, I preached and confirmed twelve persons.

The whole number of persons confirmed by me during the year has been two hundred and eighty two, by Bishop Lyman, one hundred and sixty-seven, the aggregate being four hundred and forty-nine.

During the year I have baptized fifteen persons, of whom four were adults and eleven infants.

I have received one person to the order of Deacons and admitted three persons into the Diocese, viz: The Rev. Franklin L. Bush, from the Diocese of Massachusetts; the Rev. T. Jervis Edwards, lately a Clergyman of the Church of England, and the Rev. Zina Doty, from the Diocese of New York.

The Rev. Prince T. Rogers, who although lately living and labouring in Brooklyn, N. Y., still remained canonically a Clergyman of this Diocese, has died since we last met.

The whole number of Clergy belonging to the Diocese is now sixty-six. Their fields of labour have in some instances been changed.

The Rev. Benjamin S. Bronson has resigned the charge of St. Peter's Church, Charlotte, and it is probable that, to the great regret of us all, we shall lose his cooperation in the Diocese by his being transferred to another, although this has not as yet taken place. The Rev. Zina Doty, of the Diocese of New York, has been elected Rector of St. Peter's Church, in the place of Mr. Bronson, and has been transferred to my charge.

The Rev. Neilson Falls has resigned the Rectorship of Grace Church, Morganton.

The Rev. Edward M. Forbes has resigned the charge of St. Mary's Church. Kinston, and has accepted that of St. Paul's, Beaufort, and the Rev. James C. Atkinson, recently admitted to the Diaconate, is performing duty in St. Mary's, Kinston, and likewise officiating in the Church of the Holy Innocents, in Lenoir county, and at Snow Hill, in Greene county.

The Rev. Lucian Holmes has withdrawn from the head mastership of Thompson Hall, in Charlotte, and is performing duty in the congregation of St. Paul's, Monroe.

The Rev. Edmund N. Joyner has resigned the charge of Trinity Church. Statesville, and the Church of the Ascension, Hickory, and has accepted the Rectorship of St. Bartholomew's Church, Pittsboro.

The Rev. William S. Pettigrew has resigned the Rectorship of the Church of the Holy Innocents, Henderson, and now has charge of the Church of the Good Shepherd at Ridgeway and St. John's Church, Williamsboro.

The Rev. Robert B. Sutton, D. D., has resigned the Rectorship of St. Bartholomew's Church, Pittsboro, and accepted that of St. Barnabas', Greensboro, in which he is assisted by the Rev. William S. Bynum, while the two likewise perform missionary duty at Winston, Germanton. Huntsville, Reidsville and the Company Shops, on the North Carolina Railroad.

The Rev. Franklin L. Bush has accepted the Reetorship of St. James' Church, Lenoir, where he is labouring very usefully, and to the great gratification of the congregation.

The Rev. T. Jervis Edwards is now Reetor of St. James' Church, Kittrell, and St. Paul's, Louisburg, and is producing an impression very favorable to the growth of the Church.

The Candidates for Priests' Orders are eleven. They are Thomas B. Haughton, Charles O. Brady, Samuel S. Barber, Walter J. Smith, Benjamin S. Lassiter, Nymphas E. Price, Joseph B. Cheshire, Jr., John Huske, Armand D. Meares, James C. Atkinson and Frederick A. DeRosset.

Of these, Messrs, Haughton, Brady, Barber, Price, Cheshire, Lassiter and Atkinson have been ordained Deacons, and Messrs, Smith, Huske, Meares and DeRosset have not been.

Messrs, B. G. White, William F. Rice, John F. Spivey, Nicholas Collin Hughes, Frederick Nash Skinner and Junius Moore Horner are Candidates for Deacons' Orders.

The number of Postulants is six, viz: John R. Hughes, Henry McDuflie, Hardy H. Phelps, Timothy E. Cutler, John W. Perry and Edward E. G. Roberts.

It gives me pleasure to be able to announce to the Convention generally what indeed many of its members already know, that within the last few days the first number of our long expected Diocesan Church paper has appeared,

and that the quality of that number angurs well for the success of that enterprise. And undoubtedly, if properly sustained, it will furnish us with very valuable aids in our work. It will serve to explain and defend those principles of evangelical truth and primitive order, which it is the special mission of our Church to advance, and which are so often misunderstood and misrepresented. It will be a record of our Diocesan labours and a channel of general religious intelligence of our people. It will be a welcome visitor to the families throughout the Diocese, stirring them up to increased diligence in running the Christian race, and increased zeal in advancing the Kingdom of Christ.

A properly conducted religious periodical can be all this, and it is strongly hoped that the CHURCH MESSENGER will be all this and that it will deserve and receive the general support and patronage of the Church in this Diocese.

We have to regret the death during the past year, of a faithful and an honored Bishop—the late Rt. Rev. Joseph P. B. Wilmer, of Louisiana. He died suddenly, but we have the comfortable assurance that he passed away well prepared for the change.

We have to regret still more, during the same period, the deposition from his high office of one of the oldest of our Bishops. Dr. McCoskry, who until lately presided with honor, with great personal popularity, and with distinguished success, over the Diocese of Michigan. Of this mysterious and painful case I prefer to say nothing more.

Since we last met together, another Conference of the Bishops of the Anglican Communion assembled at the Palace at Lambeth, under the presidency of the Arch-bishop of Canterbury. I had hoped to be present at this Conference, but when the time approached, there were reasons—personal and official—which led me to believe that it was my duty to deny myself this pleasure and benefit, and I was the more ready to do this because Bishop Lyman was willing to attend, and I had entire confidence in his zeal for the best interests of the Church of Christ, in the soundness of his judgment, and in his ability to represent, with effect, the views held by yourselves, by him, and by me.

The meeting was in all respects honorable to the Church and auspicious of its future welfare. The results which were reached appear to have given universal satisfaction throughout the length and breadth of our vast Communion, and we cannot but observe with pleasure, that the Conferences already held appear to have given more solidity to that great body, of which the Church of England, England's Colonial Churches, those of Scotland and Ireland, and that in the United States, are parts, and to have clevated that body in the general estimation of Christendom. It is very opportune that the imterest of Christianity at this time should be maintained and advanced by these means, or indeed by any other which are legitimate, for never have the enemies of the Christian faith been more insidious, and, at the same time, more

bold in their attacks on it, more assured of success, and really more dangerons, than in the present day. The excesses, and with these, the arrogance of ultramontanism, have repelled the educated mind of the Continent of Europe from it, and, supposing it to be synonymous with Christianity, from Christianity itself.

Germany, detesting ultramontanism, is, from other canses, deeply tainted with infidelity.

England, which has been so long the stronghold of the Christian faith, is suffering from the opposition to that faith from a science, falsely so-called, because narrow and materialistic, and which in one of its most popular aspects, degrades man to the level with the brutes.

In our own country we have these evils, and we have some of them in more intense virulence, while we have not certain important counteracting influences. We have not the sacred associations of the past, we have not an educated Clergy posted as sentinels and warriors in every part of the land. We have a very heterogeneous population, we have a government that yields to every impulse of the people, laws often loose in themselves, and still more frequently loosely administered, and the objects of human cupidity, such as wealth and political power, precluded from the hopes of no man, and therefore eagerly and, many times, unscrupulously contended for by almost every man. We have, as a people, however, some very great counter-balancing advantages, especially freedom of thought and freedom of speech. And we as a Church have, in addition to these, the ancient faith and the primitive order of government and of worship. We have then, a very great and difficult work to do, but we have likewise many helps in its effectual performance. -1 very capable observer, not at all of our communion, Father Hyacinthe, has lately expressed his judgment that ours, the Anglo-American Church, is the best constituted upon earth.

Our work then, and our duty is to use this mighty instrument so that it shall be most effectual for the welfare of our fellow-men and the honor of our Lord, and this is to be done not only by preaching sound doetrine and frequenting public worship, but more especially and more forcibly, by showing the good effects of these, in denying ungodliness and worldly lusts, and living soberly, righteously and godly in this present world; by our men resisting the temptations to indolence, to intemperance, to sensuality, to covetousness; by our women exhibiting the qualities which become women professing godliness—by modesty, by purity, by avoiding entertainments and pleasures which are unfavorable to modesty and to purity, by humility and activity in good works.

Such a body of persons can subdue the world. They, more effectually than logicians or theologians, can prove the religion of Christ to be divine—the light that leadeth to the realms of light.

Address of the Assistant Bishop.

Address.

Rt. Rev. Father and Dear Brethren of the Clergy and Laity:

In rendering an account of my official acts for the past year, I cannot refrain, first of all, from an expression of deep thankfulness to Almighty God for the great goodness and the many blessings which have attended me in the long and distant journeyings which have been so successfully accomplished. During my protracted absence in the Old World, I was very highly favoured, not having experienced a single hour's sickness, or any adverse circumstance, to mar the pleasure of a year, which will ever be most memorable.

The only services rendered in the Diocese, prior to my departure for England, were in Christ Church and the Church of the Good Shepherd, Raleigh.

On my way to New York, I spent a Sunday in Baltimore, preaching in the morning in St. Paul's Church, and in the evening in St. Mary's Church, where a very interesting and successful work is carried on among the colored people of that city.

On the Sunday after Ascension Day, June 2d, in Trinity Church, Hartford, Conn., I preached and administered the Holy Communion, and on the afternoon of that day I preached in the chapel of Trinity College.

Thursday, June 6th, I sailed from New York, and among my fellow-passengers I was glad to find the Bishops of Ohio, Albany and Colorado, who were going, as I was, to take part in the Conference of Bishops, summoned by the Archbishop of Canterbury, to meet early in July at Lambeth Palace. We had a short and very pleasant passage, and I landed at Queenstown early on Saturday morning, June 15th. I proceeded at once to Cork, and thence to Dublin, the same day.

On Monday night, I left for Liverpool, arriving early Tuesday morning, and went on directly to Oxford, where I had been invited to take part in a missionary meeting, in the interest of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in Foreign Parts. This meeting took place the next day, and was attended by a large number of Bishops from different parts of the world.

The following Monday, June 24th, in St. Paul's Cathedral, London, I assisted in the consecration of the Bishops of Litchfield, Nassau and Queensland. The Archbishop of Canterbury presided and the occasion was one of peculiar interest.

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Canterbury Cathedral. Lambeth Conference.

Friday, June 28th. I went to Canterbury, to participate the next day in the Anniversary Exercises of St. Augustine's Missionary College, which took place in the morning. On the afternoon of that day, in Canterbury Cathedral, there was a very impressive service, when the Archbishop gave a warm address of welcome to the Bishops from foreign lands, whom he had invited to meet him there on that occasion. The grand old Cathedral, with all its memories of the past; the large stone chair of St. Augustine, in which the Archbishop was seated and from which he gave his address; the long line of white robed choristers, followed by the Clergy and Bishops, all duly vested, and passing in procession up the venerable nave; all combined to make this one of the most imposing, solemn and impressive ceremonials which it has ever been my privilege to witness.

On the following Tuesday, July 2d, the opening service of the Lambeth Conference took place in the Chapel of the Palace. I felt that I was standing on a very sacred spot, when I remembered that it was in this same chapel that the first American Bishops who received English Consecration, were admitted to the Episcopate on the 4th of February, 1787. What a marvellous expansion has been witnessed since that day of small things.

Nearly one hundred Bishops were present at the opening service of the Conference. The sermon was preached by the Archbishop of York, and the Holy Communion administered by the Arehbishop of Canterbury. At the conclusion of the religions exercises, we repaired to the Library of the Palace, where our subsequent sessions were held. Before our final adjournment, the full number of one hundred Bishops were present, and participated in the Conference. Such an assemblage as this may well be regarded as a most important event in the history of the Church. In none of the early councils was there ever a representation, coming from so many, and such widely separated quarters of the globe. And although this Conference did not claim any authority as a duly constituted legislative Synod of the Church, yet it seems quite impossible to deny to such a body great moral weight. And this was very largely increased by the fact that such wonderful unanimity characterized all the proceedings. There was, moreover, a calmness; a dignified moderation; a loving fraternal sympathy, which was conspicuously apparent in all the deliberations. Every subject brought forward, was not only carefully discussed, in the general meetings of the Conference, but was also very critically examined and considered by the several committees to whom the different subjects were confided. During the last week of the Conference, the reports of the several committees were made, in a very full house, and after thorough and careful revision, were unanimously adopted. Λ letter, embodying the results arrived at, was then agreed upon, and published shortly after. Since the rising of the Conference, this letter has been translated into Greek, Latin, French, and several other languages, and is now having a wide circulation in all parts of the world.

It is worthy of observation that many of those in England, who had been quite doubtful as to the wisdom and probable advantages of such a Conference, when proposed and first held more than ten years ago, became thoroughly persuaded of the desirableness and usefulness of such meetings; and that they were likely to be fraught with great blessings to the Church.

Whatever serves to promote a better understanding, and an increase of unity, in all the constituent parts of the wide-spread Anglican Communion, must be a singular advantage. And in thus realizing the blessings of true unity among ourselves, we are naturally led to yearn more anxiously for unity, in God's good time, among all the branches of the One Holy, Catholic and Apostolic Church, and among all who profess and call themselves Christians. Such meetings as that which took place at Lambeth last summer, can hardly fail to exert a powerful influence over the entire body thus represented, in restraining all doctrinal and ritual divergences, in awakening on every side a higher sense of the value of unity, and in deepening, at the same time, the love for those primitive and truly Catholic principles, upon which alone any larger and more wide-spread unity can be effectually established. An earnest devotion to all that is primitive and apostolic, coupled with the glad rejection of later additions, and dangerous novelties; this is the spirit in which we must seek the true and only remedy for existing distractions. It is the faith which was once delivered to the Saints," and the organic arrangements which the Apostles established, for which we should earnestly contend, for surely this is our only hope and refuge, in days of doubt and unbelief, in days of wild fanaticism and reckless disintegration. While thousands of despairing souls, tempest-tossed and shaken, are crying anxiously, "what is truth?" or "who will show us any good?" how gladly should the Holy Church of Christ lift up on high the blessed teachings of primitive times; the Sacred Creeds which embody the "form of sound words" which the Apostles inculcated; and those devout and holy utterances of prayer and praise, which for so many ages, have been the vehicle of communion and fellowship with God.

The Lambeth Conference was brought to a close on Saturday, July 27th, by a most solemn and impressive service, in St. Paul's Cathedral—a service which I am sure will never be forgotten by those whose privilege it was to participate in it.

On the evening of the same day, I went, with several of our Bishops, to Learnington, where we had promised to preach in the several churches, the next day, in behalf of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel. On Monday a large missionary meeting was held in the town hall of that place, at which most of us made addresses. The following day, Tuesday, July 30th, after a pleasant visit together to Warwick Castle and Stratford-on-Avon, I went, by invitation, in the evening to Farnham Castle, the residence of the

Bishop of Winchester. I was warmly welcomed by the Bishop, and met there several of the American and other Bishops who had arrived before me. The next day a most enthusiastic meeting of Bishops, Clergy and Laity was held. by previous appointment, in one of the largest rooms of the Castle, to confer together in regard to the Old Catholic movement. The Bishop of Winchester presided on the occasion, and made a very able and interesting opening address. Several of our own, and of the other Bishops present, took an active part in the discussion. Bishop Herzog, of the Old Catholic Church of Switzerland, and M. Lovson, (Pere Hyaeinthe) of France, made earnest and stirring addresses. I much regretted the necessity which compelled me to leave early in the afternoon, and before the meeting was closed, in order to fulfil a promise made to the Bishop of Bath and Wells to be at his Palace that evening, so as to take part, the next morning, in a Diocesan Missionary meeting, to be held in Wells Cathedral. I met there the Bishop of St. Albans and seven of our own Bishops, all having been invited to spend several days together and share the hospitality of our genial host. The service, in the beautiful Cathedral of Wells, was a very spirited one, and a noble sermon was preached by the Bishop of St. Albans. In the afternoon a large and interesting missionary meeting was held in the Chapter House of the Cathedral, where we were all called on to say a word in connection with the missionary work. I remained five days at Wells, and then, accompanied by my dear friend, the late excellent Bishop of Louisiana, I went to Gloucester and spent two days very pleasantly at the residence of the Bishop of Gloucester and Bristol. After leaving Gloucester, and at the railway station near Great Malvern, I parted from Bishop Wilmer, who remained there for a day to give comfort and consolation to a valued friend, who had lately been sorely bereaved. Little did I think, when parting from my dear brother, that this would be our last meeting on earth. Let me only add that I cannot but esteem it a great privilege to have been thrown, so much as I was, with this pure and holy man, during the time of his sojourn in England. It is indeed a sad loss which the Church has sustained, in what I might almost call his translation to a better world. His wonderful child-like simplicity of character, his singular purity, his largehearted generosity, his genial loveliness, his deep devotion to the Church, and his cloquent advocacy of her claims, won all hearts, wherever he went, during his sojourn in England. Long shall I mourn his loss, as one of the truest and dearest friends of my life.

The following Sunday, August 11th, I passed at Bedford, on a visit to an old friend, now the Vicar of the Parish. I preached twice in the venerable Parish Church. On my way back to London on Tuesday, I visited the grand old Abbey Church of St. Albans, a portion of which was erected in the 12th Century. This large and noble building, which some years since was rapidly

going to decay, is now undergoing thorough restoration, and when completed will prove one of the most attractive of England's grand old churches. And here let me add, that during my sojourn in different parts of England, I was continually invited to visit venerable churches, which during the last few years have been nobly restored and beautified. I really had no conception of the extent to which this important work had been carried on, until this late visit to England. Sometimes, in a single afternoon's drive, I visited not less than three churches, all within a few miles of each other, which had been going to ruin some thirty years ago, but latterly have been thoroughly renovated and put in beautiful repair, often at very great cost. Nothing gave me a clearer idea of the new life, and the re-awakened interest so widely extended through the English Communion than this marvellous work of renovation and reconstruction. And in most instances, the work has been done in the very best taste and with the clearest ideas as to the proprieties of Church architecture. But not only has there been this care for the houses of God. As might naturally be supposed, it has been accompanied by a much deeper interest in the services of the Church and a greatly increased attendance upon its ministrations. True it is, that in connection with this revived interest and activity, there is much to lament in certain quarters, where the silly excesses of a mediæval ritualism have found countenance and encouragement. But on the other hand, it is very cheering and comforting to know that the overwhelming majority of Bishops, Clergy and Laity in England have no sympathy with this unhealthy development, which is so completely alien to the true spirit of the Church of England. Many indeed admire very much the zeal and earnest self-sacrifice and devotion by which many of these men are characterized, but that does by no means blind them to the dangerous tendency of much of their teaching. Nothing is more necessary than that we should always draw a clear line of distinction between men and the principles which they may chance to advocate. Some very good and very earnest men may yet be advocates of very dangerous and destructive principles. Many of the greatest heretics of ancient times were men of wonderful zeal and apparent devotion; and it was this very quality which gave such increased influence and power to their false teachings. When our Saviour said, "By their fruits ye shall know them," He clearly did not allude so much to any blamelessness of life on the part of those referred to, as He did to the legitimate fruits and consequences of their principles.

But to return from this digression. On the following Sunday, August 18th, while on a visit to the beautiful home in Kent, of Mr. Bercsford Hope, I preached and administered the Holy Communion in Kiladoun Church, Goodhurst. The next day I left for Belfast, in Ireland, where I had been invited by the Bishöp of Down and Connor to preach the sermon at the consecration

Holywood Palace. Edinburgh. Argyll and the Isles. [MAY,

on Thursday, August 22d, of the new and beautiful church just crected in the suburbs of the city. I reached Holywood Palace early Wednesday morning, where I met with a very hearty welcome from the Bishop and his family. I greatly enjoyed the few days which I was able to spend in this attractive home. In response to a very kind invitation which had reached me there from the venerable Archbishop of Armagh, I went on Saturday to spend a few days with him in his quaint old Cathedral city. On Sunday, August 25th. I preached in the Cathedral, and after a very pleasant visit to the Primate. left on Wednesday for Glasgow, arriving there the following morning, went on the same day as far as Tarbet, just under Ben Lomond, and the day after to the Trossaeks. From thence I proceeded on Saturday to Edinburgh. where I was the guest of the Bishop, and spent several days very agreeably at his house. He took me, almost immediately upon my arrival, to inspect the noble Cathedral which he is now erecting. The nave was nearly completed when I was there, and being temporarily screened off from the transcepts and choir, was shortly after opened for regular services. The whole building will be completed in another year, and promises to be one of the most graceful, commodious and beautiful churches which has been erected in Great Britain during the last three hundred years. The next day, Sunday, September 1st, I preached in the temporary Cathedral in the morning, and at night in the large Parish Church of St. John.

Nearly every sunday while I was in Great Britain, I was preaching in one or more of the Parish Churches, and I was greatly cheered by the warm and affectionate welcome which greeted the American Bishops in every part of the United Kingdom. It was quite impossible for me to respond favourably to many of the invitations to preach, which I was continually receiving, or to accept one tithe of the hospitality which was so generously tendered. In fact, we were all treated, not like strangers, but as brethren beloved, and we were welcomed with a heartiness and warmth which made us feel more like kindred than as foreigners. I am sure that we have all of us brought away very sweet memories of our sojourn, which we shall never fail to recall with the most grateful emotions.

By special request, I preached several sermons in London and its vicinity, in behalf of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, and by invitation of the Dean and Chapter of St. Paul's, I had the satisfaction of preaching to a vast multitude in that grand and imposing Cathedral.

After leaving Edinburgh, I went, by invitation of the Bishop of Argyll and the lsles, to pay him a visit, and arrived at his home the day before the annual meeting of his Synod, which was held in the neat little chapel adjoining his house. The Bishop invited me to sit by his side, during the meeting of the Synod, and in response to a kind resolution of welcome 1 made a brief address. My pleasant visit was terminated on Saturday, when by invi-

tation of the Earl of Glasgow, I accompanied him and his family in his steam yacht, and after passing through some of the loveliest scenery to be met with in Scotland, we arrived in the evening at the Island of Cambre, where I preached the next day, September 8th, in the Cathedral of the Isles.

On Monday I returned to England, going first to York, and thence to pay a promised visit to Canon Trevor, where I passed several days very pleasantly. I next paid a visit to a Clergyman who had many years before been one of my travelling companions in Egypt and Syria, and who is now the Vicar of Adderbury. On Sunday, September 15th, I preached in his Parish Church, and administered the Holy Communion. After a very cheering visit in this quiet old town, I went, by appointment, to pay a visit to the Bishop of Oxford and preach the sermon at his Autumnal Ordination. I met at the Palace the Regins Professor of Divinity of Oxford, two of the Archdeacons, and a number of young Clergymen and candidates, who were passing their final examinations. Each evening very solemn devotional exercises took place in the private chapel of the Palace, accompanied with earnest and stirring addresses. After the sermon, which I preached on the day appointed, the Bishop admitted nine to the Diaconate, and fifteen to the Priesthood. On the following Tuesday, I went by invitation to participate in the services at the Consecration, by the Bishop of Oxford, of a very beautiful Church at Slough, near Windsor. The day was a very loyely one, and the whole service replete with interest. A fortnight later, I spent a Sunday in the same Parish, and preached in two of the churches. In the interval I paid a very pleasant visit to the Rev. F. Meyrich, Secretary of the Society for making known on the Continent the Principles of the Church of England. I preached for him in the Parish Church of St. Andrew, Blickling, on the 15th Sunday after Trinity, September 29th.

Early in October, I had the satisfaction of being present at the Church Congress in Sheffield, and was very hospitably entertained by one of the leading citizens. When invited, some weeks previous, to take a part in this Congress, I had declined, because I did not then think that it would be possible for me to attend. But an unexpected change of plans enabled me to be present, and I derived much satisfaction from it. A few days later, upon my return to London, I was joined by several members of my family, who had just arrived from New York.

After remaining a few days in London, we went together to Paris, remaining there about a fortnight. While in Paris I preached in the American Episcopal Church, and administered the Holy Communion. Leaving Paris the latter part of October, we spent most of November in Spain; after which we went for a few days to Algeria. From there we proceeded by steamer to Corsica, and crossing the Island in a carriage, we took passage from Bastia to Leg-

horn and thence went on, the same day, to Rome. There I was only able to remain for a week. On Sunday, December 15th, the 3rd in Advent, I preached in the new St. Paul's Church, in that city, confirmed six persons, addressed them, and also at an earlier service, administered the Holv Com-This visit to Rome was one of peculiar interest to me. It afforded munion. me no common satisfaction to officiate in the beautiful church which has been erected there, and to witness the great ecclesiastical changes, since the day when I was ministering in an humble chapel, outside the gates of the city. The noble church which now stands in a conspicuous spot, in the very heart of Rome, has attracted great attention in the city, and at all its services, very considerable numbers of the Roman people are seen, looking on with no ordinary interest. I trust it may not be long before arrangements can be made for conducting a regular Italian service within its walls, for it is only by such a service that the Italian people can be led to see and understand the true position of the Anglican Communion. And there is the greater need of this, because of the multiplied, so called, Protestant services now held in Rome, by many varying sects, advocating, as some of them do, the most extreme and fanatical opinions. If the only ideas of a Reformed Church are to be supplied by such teachers, the very name of Protestant is likely to be brought into contempt.

The sober and dignified services of a historic Church, which is both Catholic and Reformed, cannot fail, under such circumstances, to produce a very salutary effect.

Upon leaving Rome, I went directly to Paris, where I remained two days, including a Sunday, when I preached again in the American Episcopal Church. On Monday evening I left for London, arriving early in the morning of December 24th. I found a kind note awaiting me from Rev. Dr. Tremlett, of St. Peter's Church, Belsize Park, near London, begging me to come at once to his house, and spend my Christmas with him. The experience which I had already enjoyed of his generous hospitality, gave promise of social and intellectual pleasures, which were abundantly realized. Upon my arrival, in the evening, at his attractive home, I found there, as his guests, the Bishop of Easton and family, who had just arrived from America. The next day, the beautiful Church of St. Peter was decorated with remarkable taste, and a large congregation convened to celebrate our Lord's Nativity. I preached the sermon, and administered the Holy Communion, the Bishop of Easton being only able to take a very small part in the service.

At the close of the week, I fulfilled a previous promise, by going to Sheffield to pass the succeeding Sunday, when I preached in the Parish Church, and also in one other of the churches of that city.

On the following Tuesday, December 31st, I embarked at Liverpool for New York, and after a very stormy and tempestuous passage, was landed safely,

early on Saturday morning, January 11th. The next day 1 preached in the morning in Zion Church, and at night took part in the services at a missionary meeting in the Church of the Incarnation. After a day or two, I proceeded on to Baltimore, and on Sunday, January 19th, preached in St. Paul's Church, in that city. I reached my home in Raleigh on Friday evening, January 24th. On Sunday, January 26th, I preached in the morning in Christ Church ; and at night, in the Church of the Good Shepherd, I delivered a lecture with special reference to the Lambeth Conference.

On Wednesday, January 29th, I baptized, in the Church of the Good Shepherd, the infant daughter of the Rector. The same evening, I left for Wilmington, where I passed a few days very pleasantly, the chief object of my visit being to confer with the Bishop, in regard to the interests of the Diocese, and to arrange for the Spring visitations.

Sunday, February 2d, I preached in St. James' Church, Wilmington, in the morning, and administered the Holy Communion. At night I attended a missionary meeting in St. John's Church, where Rev. Mr. Boon, of China, gave an interesting account of our mission work there, and brief addresses were made by Bishop Atkinson and myself. I left the next day, on my return to Raleigh.

Friday, February 7th, I left for Company Shops, where I learned that a mission was in progress, conducted by Rev. Dr. Sutton, and the Rev. Messrs. Rich and Bynum. Immediately upon my arrival, I went to the Evening Service, where I found a very large congregation convened. Rev. Mr. Rich preached, and I followed with an address. Four adults were baptized at this service, and I arranged to return there, in a short time, to administer the Rite of Confirmation. Saturday, in the same place, at a meeting of the children, I made an address. The same evening, I went on to Greensboro, and on the next day, Septuagesima Sunday, February 9th, in St. Barnabas' Church, I instituted the Rev. Robert Bean Sutton, D. D., into the Rectorship of the Parish, and preached the sermon. In the evening I preached again, confirmed two persons and addressed them.

On Monday evening I took the train to Winston, and the next day, Tuesday, February 11th, I consecrated the new Church of St. Paul, the Rev. Dr. Sutton reading the Sentence of Consecration. After Morning Prayer by Rev. Mr. Bynum and Dr. Sutton, I preached, confirmed one person and administered the Holy Communion. Unfortunately for so interesting an occasion, the day proved quite a rainy one, and kept many from the church who would gladly have participated in the services. The success of this important work at Winston is largely owing to the zeal and self-sacrifice of Rev. Mr. Bynum, who until quite lately had the sole charge of this Mission. His resolute determination that what was begun should be successfully accomplished, has secured the result for which he laboured so diligently. The church is a very neat and attractive building, and we have every reason to anticipate for the

congregation a steady and substantial advancement. This is one of the important centres of an associate mission work which promises very encouraging results. Dr. Sutton has been placed at the head of it, in association with Mr. Bynum, and if one or more additional laborers, with the means for their temporary support, could be provided, advantage could at once be taken of many fresh and encouraging openings for the services of the Church. Already there is an urgent demand for services, quite beyond the ability of the present missionaries to supply.

The same evening I proceeded to Salisbury, and thence went to Charlotte, where on Thursday, February 13th, in St. Peter's Church, after Evening Prayer by Rev. Z. Doty, I preached, confirmed four persons and addressed them. The next day I left for Greensboro, and thence continued on to Durham and Chapel Hill.

On Sexagesima Sunday, February 16th, in the Chapel of the Cross, after Morning Prayer by Rev. Mr. Cheshire, I preached and administered the Holy Communion. Preached again in the evening. The very short notice which was unavoidably given of this service, prevented the gathering of any class for confirmation, and I therefore promised to make another visit, if possible, before Convention.

Quinquagesima Sunday, February 23d, 1 visited St. James' Church, Kittrell, and, after Morning Prayer by the Rector, Rev. T. Jervis Edwards, I preached and administered the Holy Communion. Under the efficient guidance of the present Rector, I found very decided improvements in the Church building, which were to be continued still further, and I fixed upon Tuesday, May 6th, for the consecration of the church.

The next day I returned to Raleigh, and on Ash Wednesday, February 26th, preached in the Church of the Good Shepherd.

Thursday, February 27th, I went by the early train to Henderson, being joined at Kittrell by Rev. Mr. Edwards. At eleven o'clock, in the Church of the Holy Innocents, after Morning Prayer by Rev. Mr. Edwards, I preached and administered the Holy Communion. At night the Rev. Mr. Higgs assisted me in the service, and Mr. Edwards preached. The Parish was vacant at the time of my visit, the Rev. Mr. Pettigrew having resigned its charge and removed to Ridgeway.

Saturday, March 1st, in the Church of the Good Shepherd, Ridgeway, after Morning Prayer by the Rev. Mr. Pettigrew, I preached, confirmed two persons and administered the Holy Communion.

First Sunday in Lent, March 2d, in Emmanuel Church, Warrenton, after Morning Prayer by the Rev. Mr. Higgs, I preached, confirmed three persons, addressed them and administered the Holy Communion. Preached again in the evening. It afforded me much pleasure to witness the improvement which had recently been made in the Church building, and its bright and renovated

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aspect. Only a little time before, it met with a very narrow escape from complete destruction by fire, and was only saved by the Providential change of the wind, just as the roof was set on fire, by the fierce conflagration of adjacent buildings. It was certainly a most appropriate thank-offering to God that, after so wonderful a preservation, the building should have been put in better repair, and rendered far more comely and attractive. And here I may remark that there is no surer sign of a proper and becoming spirit, in any Christian community, than when vigorous efforts are employed to preserve the houses of God from dilapidation, and keep them in a condition more worthy the service of Him to whom they have been sacredly dedicated.

The Parish at Warrenton is somewhat reviving, under the faithful and energetic ministrations of Rev. Mr. Higgs, who is about to make that place, instead of Jackson, his residence; and will now officiate there two Sundays in each month, instead of one, as hitherto.

Friday, March 7th, in St. Matthew's Church, Hillsboro, after Morning Prayer by Rev. Messrs. Curtis and Bynum, I preached, confirmed one person and administered the Holy Communion.

Sunday, March 9th, in Union Chapel, Company Shops, Mr. Bynum conducted the service, and I preached, confirmed seven persons, addressed them and administered the Holy Communion. I was much gratified to find the pro-pects of the Church so encouraging here. The faithful and untiring labours of Rev. Mr. Bynum have produced very good fruit, and steps have already been taken for the erection, this Summer, of a church edifice at this place.

Thursday, March 13th, I left Raleigh for Goldsboro, to enter upon my Spring visitation. Rev. Mr. Atkinson, of Kinston, came up to meet me, and the next morning, Friday, March 14th, accompanied me to LaGrange, where, at 11 o'clock, I held a service in the Academy. Rev. Mr. Atkinson read Morning Prayer and I preached and administered the Holy Communion.

We proceeded on to Kinston in the afternoon.

Third Sunday in Lent, March 16th, in St. Mary's Church, Kinston, after Morning Prayer by Rev. Messrs. Forbes and Atkinson, I preached and administered the Holy Communion. At night, preached again, confirmed three persons and addressed them.

Tnesday, March 18th, in the Church of the Holy Innocents, Lenoir county, Mr. Atkinson read Morning Prayer and I preached and administered the Holy Communion. Returned to Kinston immediately after the service, and left the same evening for New Berne.

Wednesday, March 19th, in Christ Church, assisted in the Evening Service.

Thursday, March 20th, at Swift Creek Bridge, after Morning Prayer by Rev. N. Collin Hughes, I preached, confirmed five persons, addressed them and administered the Holy Communion. With the regular services now

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given at this place by Mr. Hughes, the prospects of the Church have become much more encouraging, and I was much pleased to learn that immediate steps would be taken for the erection of a neat church building, which is so much needed there.

I returned to New Berne shortly after the service, and took the train the same evening for Beaufort.

Friday, March 21st, in St. Paul's Church, Beaufort, I conducted the service, preached and administered the Holy Communion. I met several candidates for confirmation, and also the Vestry in the afternoon, and recommended such steps as have happily resulted in the supply of a most acceptable Rector for the Parish. At night I read the Evening Service, preached, confirmed four persons and addressed them. Immediately after the service, I crossed the Sound, and at a very early hour the next morning left for New Berne.

Fourth Sunday in Lent, March 23d, at an early service in Christ Church, I administered the Holy Communion, and preached at a later hour, after service by the Rector, Rev. C. S. Hale. At night I preached again, confirmed four persons and addressed them.

Monday, March 24th, in St. Cyprian's Chapel, after Evening Prayer by Rev. Mr. Forbes, I preached, confirmed three persons and addressed them.

Thesday, March 25th, I crossed the river, and was driven over to Stonewall. Pamlico county. At 11 o'clock, assisted in the service by Rev. Israel Harding, I preached in the Court House at Bayborough, and at night in a school house in Stonewall. There is a very encouraging prospect for the Church in this neighborhood, if it were only possible to make provision for regular and stated services.

The next day I returned to New Berne, and the following morning, Thursday, March 27th, I took the early train for Kinston. Upon my arrival there Rev. Mr. Atkinson met me, and at his request, I went directly to St. Mary's Church, where he had several candidates desirous of confirmation. I confirmed three persons at that time, making six in all, with the three confirmed in the same church a few days before. Immediately after breakfast, I took Mr. Atkinson with me, and drove to Snow Hill, where at eleven o'clock, in the Baptist Chapel, after Morning Prayer by Rev. Mr. Atkinson, I preached and administered the Holy Communion. In the afternoon I drove on to Marlboro.

Friday, March 28th, in a public hall in that place, Mr. Atkinson assisted me in the service, and I preached, and administered the Holy Communion. I was glad to be able to make an arrangement, by which Mr. Atkinson will provide a monthly service at Marlboro. It is much needed, and will be highly appreciated.

Fifth Sunday in Lent, March 30th, in St. John's Church, Pitt county, after Morning Prayer by the Rev. Israel Harding, I preached, confirmed one person and administered the Holy Communion. The day proved a very stormy

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one, but we had quite a large congregation. I was pleased to find very considerable improvements in the church building, since my previous visit, and after still further improvements, which it is expected will be carried forward very shortly, the church will be ready for consecration.

Tnesday, April 1st, at St. John's Church, Durham's Creek, Rev. Israel Harding conducted the services, I preached, confirmed four persons, addressed them and administered the Holy Communion.

Went on to Aurora in the afternoon, where I preached in the evening.

Wednesday, April 2d, went to Beech Grove Academy, South Creek, where 1 found a very large congregation. After Morning Prayer by Mr. Harding, I preached, confirmed six persons, addressed them, and administered the Holy Communion. My next appointment being on the other side of the Pamlico river, I went the next day to Washington.

Friday, April 4th, in Zion Church, Beaufort county, after Morning Prayer by Revs. N. Harding and L. Eborn, I preached, confirmed eleven persons, addressed them and administered the Holy Communion. I found here also a very large congregation, and much interest manifested.

Saturday, April 5th, in St. Thomas' Church, Bath, Rev. Mr. Eborn read Morning Prayer, I preached, confirmed three persons, addressed them and administered the Holy Communion. Went on in the afternoon to Pantego.

Sixth Sunday in Lent, April 6th, in St. James' Church, Beaufort county, after Morning Prayer by Rev. L. Eborn, I preached, confirmed three persons, addressed them and administered the Holy Communion. In the afternoon drove on a few miles to the residence of Dr. Lorain, and in the evening baptized three of his children. On Monday, accompanied by Rev. Mr. Eborn, I proceeded on to Makleysville, Hyde county.

Tuesday, April 8th, in St. John's Church, Makleysville, after Morning Prayer by Rev. Messrs. Eborn and Barber, I preached and administered the Holy Communion. At night, in the Court House at Swan Quarter, Messrs. Barber and Eborn conducted the service, I preached, made an address on the subject of Confirmation and confirmed one person. The building was very much crowded, and great interest was manifested in the service. Mr. Barber is now holding regular services there, with the promise of encouraging results.

Wednesday, April 9th, drove on to Fairfield, and at 11 o'clock, in a large room secured for the purpose, after service by Rev. Messrs. Eborn, Barber and Price, I preached, confirmed one person and administered the Holy Communion. The sad misfortnnes which have overtaken the agricultural interests of that neighborhood during the past two years, have prevented the success of the plan which had been matured for the erection of a church. If this should prove a more favorable season, I have every confidence that the build-

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ing, so much needed, will be completed without further delay. After the service I went on to Lake Landing.

Thursday, April 10th, in St. George's Church, after Morning Prayer by Rev. Messrs. Price, Barber and Eborn, I preached, confirmed six persons, addressed them and administered the Holy Communion. At the same service I baptized three adults and two infants.

The same evening I proceeded on to Swan Quarter, and the next morning baptized a child there.

Easter Day, April 13th, in St. Paul's Church, Washington, after Morning Prayer by the Rev. N. Harding, I preached and administered the Holy Communion. In the afternoon, at the Sunday School Anniversary, which proved a most interesting occasion, I assisted in the service and made an address. At night, after Evening Prayer by Rev. Messrs. N. Harding and Eborn, I preached, confirmed seven persons and addressed them. The day was a most brilliant one and the Church much crowded at all the services. Shortly before my visit, a fine sounding bell had been procured and a suitable tower erected, where it was duly placed.

Tuesday, April 15th, in Trinity Church, Beaufort county, the services were conducted by Rev. Messrs. N. Harding, I. Harding and Hughes, after which I preached and administered the Holy Communion.

Wednesday, April 16th, proceeded on to Greenville.

Thursday, April 17th, in St. Paul's Church, the Rev. Mr. Hughes read Morning Prayer, I preached, confirmed four persons, addressed them and administered the Holy Communion. At night I preached again, confirmed two additional candidates and addressed them.

Friday, April 18th, 1 drove on to Tarboro, and at 5 o'clock assisted in the regular Evening Service.

First Sunday after Easter, April 20th, in the same Church, after Morning Prayer by Rev. Dr. Cheshire, I preached the sermon, and at night preached again, confirmed eight persons and addressed them.

Tuesday, April 22d, in St. Luke's Church, Gaston, after Morning Prayer by the Rev. Gilbert Higgs, I preached, confirmed two persons, addressed them and administered the Holy Communion. I was much pleased by the decided improvement made in the Church building and the evident signs of increased life and activity in the Parish.

The next day, Wednesday, April 23d, in the Church of the Holy Innocents, Henderson, I conducted the service, preached and administered the Holy Communion. I was glad to be able to congratulate the congregation upon the acceptance of the Rectorship of the Parish by an active and efficient Clergyman, who was expected to enter upon his duties about the middle of this month. The prospects at Henderson are full of encouragement. 1879.]

Thursday, April 24th, in St. John's Church, Williamsboro, after Morning Prayer by Rev. Mr. Pettigrew, 1 preached, confirmed two persons and administered the Holv Communion.

Friday, April 25th, at Grass Creek Church, near Sassafras Fork, I preached, after service by Rev. Messrs. Vaughan and Lassiter. I also addressed the congregation in regard to the immediate erection of a church in the neighborhood, and I have good reason to believe that the work will now be pushed forward without further delay. The same evening I went on to Oxford.

Saturday, April 26th, I preached at the Orphan Asylum in that place, after Evening Prayer by Rev. Mr. Vaughan.

Second Sunday after Easter, April 27th, in St. Stephen's Church, Oxford, after Morning Prayer by Rev. Mr. Vaughan, I preached, confirmed two persons, addressed them and administered the Holy Communion. Preached again in the evening.

Tuesday, April 29th, in St. Paul's Church, Goshen, after Morning Prayer by Rev. Messrs. Vaughan and Lassiter, I preached and administered the Holy Communion.

Returned to Oxford the same day, and on the day after went on to Louisburg.

Thursday, May 1st, in St. Paul's Church, after Morning Prayer by the Rev. Mr. Edwards, I preached and administered the Holy Communion. Preached again in the evening.

With this service my long Spring visitation was brought to a close, and I returned to Raleigh the next day, after a continuous absence of over seven weeks. This visitation, although a very laborious and fatiguing one, proved full of encouragement. At almost every service unusually large congregations were present and great interest was manifested. I was particularly gratified to find in very many of the churches a largely increased attendance of colored people. Some years ago, they seemed almost wholly to have abandoned our services. It is quite plain that on every side prejudices are disappearing, and all that is needed is energy, activity and zeal, on the part of both Clergy and people, to secure large accessions to the Church, from all classes of the community. The real position of the Church, and the grounds upon which we rest our faith, need to be more fully explained and enforced, for everywhere the ears of the multitude are open to us, and they are glad to be instructed upon subjects which by so many are very little understood.

On Tuesday, May 6th, in company with Rev. Messrs. J. E. C. Smedes, Bennett Smedes and Rich, I went to Kittrell, and assisted by the above named brethren and Rev. Mr. Edwards, I consecrated St. James' Church. The addition of a recess chancel, front porch and bell tower has greatly improved the building. We had a lovely day for the consecration and a very attentive congregation showed their appreciation of the service. The sentence of conse-

cration was read by the Rector, Rev. T. Jervis Edwards, and Morning Prayerby Rev. Messrs. Bennett Smedes, Rich and J. E. C. Smedes. I preached the sermon and afterwards confirmed a very interesting class of ten persons, addressed them and administered the Holy Communion. We returned to Raleigh in the evening.

Thursday, May 8th, went to Chapel Hill, and on the evening of that day, in the Chapel of the Cross, after Evening Prayer by the Rev. Mr. Cheshire, I confirmed eleven persons, nine of them being students of the University, and addressed them.

Friday, May 9th, in the Chapel of St. Mary's School, Raleigh, after Evening Prayer by the Rector, Rev. B. Smedes, I confirmed eight pupils of the school and addressed them.

This school, I am glad to say, is continuing the good work for which it has so long been distinguished. It is really a very valuable nursery of the Church, and at no time, in its history, has it been more worthy the confidence and generous support of our people, than at the present moment. With a remarkably competent and efficient corps of teachers; with a very kindly but wholesome discipline; with a high measure of refinement and all the soft and genial influences of a thorough Christian home, it will be hard to find, anywhere in our land, a place where better work is done or more satisfactory results secured. There is a fresh life which seems to have been infused into the school, which gives high promise of its future advancement. Let all our Clergy and people do what they can to increase the number of those who may share in its superior advantages.

Fourth Sunday after Easter, May 11th, in St. Augustine's Chapel, Raleigh, after Morning Prayer by Rev. Messrs, J. E. C. Smedes and Cooper, I preached, confirmed seventeen persons, fourteen being pupils of St. Augustine's School, and addressed them.

At night, in the Church of the Good Shepherd, Evening Prayer was conducted by Rev. Messrs, B. Smedes, J. E. C. Smedes and W. R. Wetmore, after which I preached, confirmed fourteen persons and addressed them.

The following is the summary of services for the year: I have baptized four adults and seven infants; have confirmed one hundred and sixty-seven persons; instituted one Rector; consecrated two churches; and administered the Holy Communion thirty-seven times, in connection with my official visitations, besides frequent other oceasions both within and without the Diocese.

Of course my absence from the country, for so many months, prevented me from visiting many of the Parishes, and therefore the number of confirmations is somewhat less than the previous year. But wherever I have been, with very few exceptions, I have seen evident tokens of growth and prosperity 1879.]

and a steadily increasing appreciation of the privileges and blessings of the Church.

Before bringing my address to a close, let me say a word on a subject about which you will naturally expect to hear something, viz: the condition and prospect of the contemplated Diocesan School at Morganton. It has been judged wisest, not to attempt any opening of the school until we could have a suitable building crected for it, on our own grounds. I am glad to say that such a building is now in progress, and it is hoped will be completed by the end of the Summer. It is from a very neat and appropriate design, gratuitously furnished us by Mr. Lind, a prominent architect of Baltimore.

Most of the funds, necessary to cover the cost, have already been secured, and an effort is now making to raise what may be further needed to complete and furnish it. The great importance of the undertaking leads me to hope that there may be a readiness to assist in it, on the part of those to whom an application may be made, so that the school may be opened by the coming Autumn.

In conclusion, let me say that, on the whole, I think we have much cause for encouragement in the general condition of the Diocese. We have now at work in the Diocese a larger number of Clergymen than ever before, including some very valuable accessions during the last twelve or eighteen months.

So far as my own observation has extended, I find a decided increase of life and interest. If there is only a fuller appreciation of the value of the Church, and the privilege of labouring for its maintenance and advancement, we shall soon witness far greater progress, and the cheering tokens of true spiritual prosperity.

Let us all seek then to rekindle our devotions, and go forth to our several spheres of labour, with earnest resolves to "seek first the Kingdom of God." for it is only they who recognize this great duty, who may look with confidence for the Divine blessing even upon their temporal careers.

The time is short, and soon, at the latest, we shall all be summoned to give an account of our stewardship. Let Clergy and people, then, unite together in zealous and faithful labours, and ours it shall be not only to see, on every side of us, the blessed fruits of our labours, but to hear addressed to us in the end that joyous plaudit, "Well done, thou good and faithful servant, enter thou into the joy of thy Lord."

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Diocesan Statistics.

APPENDIX A---II.

Report of Com. on the State of the Church.

The Committee on the State of the Church, from a careful examination of the Parochial Reports and Episcopal Addresses, have gathered the following summary of Diocesan statistics for the past conventional year: Families, 2,554; number of souls, 11,205; infant baptisms, 629; adult baptisms, 150; total, 779; confirmations, 449; communicants, 5,544; marriages, 124; burials, 237; Sunday scholars, 3,039; parochial scholars, 322; contributions, 851,853,92. Three churches have been consecrated; three Clergymen have been received into the Diocese; one canonically connected with the Diocese, but residing out of it, has died, and one Deacon has been ordained, making sixty-six Clergymen at present in the Diocese. There are eleven candidates for Priests' Orders, six for Deacons' Orders and six Postulants.

These figures are only approximately correct, owing to the usual defect in many of the Parochial Reports; defects it seems that a portion of the Clergy will not remedy, though annually reminded of the great necessity of a little more pains-taking care in the preparation of such reports in the manner and according to the form required by canon.

From the above statistics it will be seen that, notwithstanding the very general and continued pecuniary pressure, the Church in this Diocese has made constant and very encouraging progress during the past year, as shown by the increase of communicants (367) and contributions for all Church purposes, \$2,443.73.

Your committee congratulate the Diocese on the near prospect of the opening of the Wilberforce School for boys at Morganton, on the continued prosperity and superior advantages of St. Mary's, Raleigh, and upon the opportunity afforded for the proper training of our own young men for the ministry by the Ravenscroft School at Asheville.

Especially do they regard it as a hopeful sign of the future of the Church in our midst, that we have at length a Diocesan paper, to be conducted under the auspices of our Bishops, worthy of our patronage and efforts for the extension of its circulation.

Episcopal and Contingent Fund. [MAY,

Although the outlook of the Church in this Diocese, on the whole, was never more encouraging, it is greatly to be lamented that the deficits in the Episcopal and Contingent Fund are so large; and that so little attention is paid to the establishment and support of parochial schools.

Your committee, in conclusion, earnestly urge the sacred obligation of the assessments by authority of Convention for the support of the Episcopate.

APPENDIX A-III.

(No. 1.)

REPORT OF COMMITTEE

0N

Revised Edition of Constitution & Ganons.

The committee appointed at the *last* Convention to prepare a revised edition of the Constitution and Canons, having been instructed by *this* Convention to report such changes in the Constitution and Canons as, without altering their substantial meaning, may bring their several parts into more perfect consistency, report that there is an apparent conflict between Canon XIV and Articles III and IX of the Constitution:

(1.) In that Section 2 of Canon XIV permits the organization of a Mission Station by the Bishop within the parochial cure of a minister, without the consent of such minister, provided the Standing Committee advise in favor of such organization, whereas Article IX of the Constitution implies the absolute right of the Rector to prevent such organization.

(II.) In that while Article IX prohibits, by implication at least, the erection, within any already existing Parish, of an organized *Mission*, without the consent of the Rector, Canon XIV, Section 1, permits the erection, within the same limits, of a fully organized *Parish* without the consent of the Rector, provided the consent of the Bishop be given, or against the will of both Rector and Bishop, by the action of the Diocesan Convention.

(III.) In that Canon XIV, Section 2, paragraph 3, provides for each organized Mission the right of representation in the Diocesan Convention, whereas Article III of the Constitution, which regulates the membership of the Convention, provides only for representation from organized *Parishes*.

The committee therefore recommend the amendment of Article III of the Constitution :

1st. By the insertion, after the present Section 4, of a new Section, to be known as Section 5, to read as follows:

SECTION 5. Any Mission Station duly organized under the provisions of the Canon for the organization of Parishes and of Mission Stations, shall be en-

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titled to be represented in the Diocesan Convention by one delegate—chosen subject to the restrictions of Section 4 of this Article—who shall be admitted to a seat in the Convention and to a participation in its deliberations, but without the right to vote.

2d. By changing from "5" to "6" the numbering of the present Section 5.

3d. By inserting after the word "*Parish*," in the *first* and *third* lines of the present Section 5 the words "or organized Mission Stations."

The committee further recommend that Article IX of the Constitution be amended so as to read:

SEC. 1. (As at present.)

SEC. 2. Provision may also be made by canon for the organization of independent mission congregations with the right of representation, but without the right to vote.

SEC. 3. But no new Parish or Mission congregation shall be so organized within the limits of any already existing Parish or Parishes without the consent of the Rector or Rectors of the said Parish or Parishes, or of a majority of the same, or, failing such consent, with the consent and approbation of the Bishop and Standing Committee.

Strike out the present Section 2.

Change the numbering of the present Sections 3 and 4 to 4 and 5, and let them read as at present.

The committee further recommend the alteration of Canon XIV, so as to read as follows:

SEC. 1. In order to the organization of a new Parish and its union with the Convention, it shall be necessary :

(I.) If not within the limits of any already existing Parish.

FIRST: To obtain and present to the Convention the written consent of the ecclesiastical authority of the Diocese.

SECOND: To assume a name and elect a vestry.

THIRD: To subscribe and present to the Convention a certificate, &c., (as in the present Canon).

(11.) If within the limits of any already existing Parish, then in addition to the steps prescribed above in sub-section 1:

To obtain and present to the Convention the written consent of the Rector or Rectors, if there be any, of the said Parish or Parishes, or of a majority thereof.

SEC. 2. Should the consent provided for as above in Section 1, sub-section 2, be denied or withheld, application may nevertheless be made to the Bishop and Standing Committee of the Diocese for the establishment of such new Parish, of which application one month's previous notice shall be given to the Rector or Rectors whose consent is denied or withheld. Should the Bishop and Standing Committee decide in favor of such application, the organization

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desired may take place, notwithstanding the refusal or neglect to consent of the Rector or Rectors as aforesaid, but not otherwise.

SEC. 3. Any Mission Station may be organized by the Bishop at his discretion, on the application of any residents in its neighborhood, &c., &c., as in the present Section 2, paragraph 1.

SEC. 4. The Bishop may appoint, &c., &c., as in present Section 2, paragraph 2.

SEC. 5. The congregation of a Mission Station duly organized under this Canon, may appoint, &c., &c., as in present Section 2, paragraph 3.

The committee call attention to the language of Canon VIII, which, as it stands at present, includes under the head of committees to be annually *elected*, two committees to be *appointed* by the Bishop. They recommend that the word "Committees," in the ninth line, be followed by a period, and that at that point a new sentence be commenced with the words, "There shall also be a Committee on Canons," &c., as at present.

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APPENDIX A-III.

(No. 2.)

CONTEMPLATED

Changes in Constitution and Ganous.

Resolutions introduced by Rev. A. A. Watson, D. D., and on his motion, referred to the Committee on Canons, to report to the Diocesan Convention of 1880.

Resolved, That Article II of the Constitution be amended:

(I.) By striking out the word "nevertheless" from the 3d line of Section 2.

(II.) By striking out the word "Sec. 3," and making the present Section 3 a continuation of Section 2.

(III.) By substituting for the word "*State*," in the 4th line of the present Section 3, the word "*Diocese*."

Resolved, That Article III of the Constitution be amended:

(I.) By inserting after the word "*Diocese*," in the 3d line of Section 3, the words "and actually resident therein."

(II.) By adding to the same section the following words, viz: "Provided that the restriction of actual residence above required shall not apply to Professors, Tutors or Students in the General Theological Seminary or in any University or College maintained and governed in part by the Diocese; or to Officers of the General Missionary Board of the Church, or to Chaplains in the Army or Navy."

(III.) By placing a period after the word "Parish," on the 5th line of Section 4, and substituting for the words which immediately follow, viz: "provided that in case there shall be," the words "Should there be."

(IV.) By inserting after the word "delegates," upon the 7th line of Section 4, the words "not exceeding four."

(V.) By substituting for the words "*publicly declared*," upon the 14th line of Section 4, the word "*pronounced*."

(VI.) By transferring the proviso found at present upon the 16th and 17th lines, so that it may follow immediately the 8th line.

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Thus making the whole Section (4th) to read as follows, viz:

"Each regularly organized Parish, in union with the Convention shall be entitled to be represented at its sessions by one or more delegates, not exceeding four, to be chosen by the Vestry from among the male Communicants of said Parish. Should there be no male Communicant in said Parish, the Vestry shall have power to elect one or more delegates, not exceeding four—qualified as above—from any other Parish or Parishes of the Diocese; provided that no person shall be allowed to represent more than one Parish in the same Convention. And each Vestry shall be entitled to elect in addition, four *alternate* delegates—subject to the same qualifications—who shall be authorized in the order of their election to fill any vacancy that may occur in the delegation originally chosen; provided that no person, Clerical or Lay, under ecclesiastical censure pronounced by a competent tribunal shall be admissible to a seat in the Convention.

(VII.) By inserting as Section 5, the Section on *Mission Stations*, already proposed by the Committee on Revised Edition of Constitution, &c.

(VIII.) By amending the *present* Section 5, by the insertion, according to the recommendation of the same committee, of the words "Organized Mission Stations" upon the 1st and 3d lines of the present Section 5.

(IX.) By changing the numbering of the present Section 5, after the recommendation of the same committee.

Resolved, That Article IV of the Constitution be amended :

(I.) By striking out the present proviso from Section 2.

(II.) By making the present Section 3 a provise to Section 2, instead of a separate Section, so that it shall read "*Provided that this shall not prevent the Convention*," &c., &c.

Resolved, That Article IX of the Constitution be amended:

(I.) By striking out of the second paragraph of Section 3 the proviso.

(11.) By striking out all after the word "case," upon the 10th line of Section 4.

 $(111.)\,$ By inserting a new Section 2, as recommended by Committee on Revised Edition of Constitution.

 $(\mathrm{IV.})$ By amending the present Section 2, as recommended by the same committee, and making it Section 3.

Resolved, That Article XII of the Constitution be amended:

By inserting after the word "Convention," in the 4th line of Section 1, the words "and in separate session."

Resolved, That Article XIV of the Constitution be amended:

(L) By striking out all between the word "*Clergy*," upon the 3d line of the third parapraph of Section 1, and the word "*Parishes*" upon the 4th line of the same.

(11.) By inserting in the place thereof the words "and of all."

1879.] Contemplated Changes in Constitution and Canons.

(111.) By substituting for the word "seats" in the 4th line of the same paragraph, the word "*representation*."

(IV.) By striking out all after the word "Convention," on the last line of the same paragraph, so that the whole paragraph shall read as follows, viz: "Second. The adoption of the proposed alteration or amendment at the next ensuing annual Convention by a majority of all the Clergy and of all the Parishes entitled to representation in said Convention."

Resolved, That Article XV of the Constitution be amended so as to read:

ARTICLE XV. All constitutional enactments shall take effect from and after the adjournment of the Convention at which they shall have been ratified.

Resolved, That Canon VI be amendeded by striking out the last three words and substituting therefor the words "of his office."

Resolved, That Canon VII be amended by adding the words "in his hunds." Resolved, That Canon VIII be amended :

(I.) By assigning to Section 1, two sub-Sections, whereof sub-Section 1 shall be headed "*Permanent Committees*," and sub-Section 2 shall be headed "*Other Committees*."

(11.) By making sub-Section 1 to consist of the present Section 1, with the amendment proposed by the Committee on Revised Edition of the Constitution by placing after the word "committees," upon the 9th line, a period, and at that point commencing a new sentence with the words, "*There shall also be a Committee on Canons*," &c., &c.

(III.) By adding a new sub-Section as follows, viz:

2. The following committees shall also be appointed by the presiding officer as soon as may be after the opening of the Convention, viz: A Committee on Elections, a Committee on New Parishes and a Committee on Unfinished Business, to consist each of three persons, and a Committee on the State of the Church, to consist of five persons.

(IV.) By adding to the Canon six new sections defining the duties of the committees: 1st, on Canons; 2d, on Finance; 3d, on the State of the Church; 4th, on Elections; 5th, on New Parishes; and 6th, on Unfinished Business, whereof those regarding the Committees on the State of the Church and on Finance shall be transferred from the present Canons X and X1.

Resolved, That Canon X be amended by making it a section of Canon VIII. *Resolved*, That Canon XI be amended:

(1.) By striking out all in the 5th line following the word "scale" and inserting "and shall have power to modify the same for the current year, reporting all such applications, and their action thereon, to the Convention."

(II.) By making the Canon thus amended a section of Canon VIII.

Resolved, That Canon XII be amended by substituting "II" for "III" upon the 5th line, so that it shall read "Article II of the Constitution," &c.

Resolved, That Canon XIV be amended in accordance with the recommendations of the Committee on the Revised Edition of Constitution and Canons.

Resolved, That Canon XV be amended by inserting after the word "elect" upon the 6th line of Section 1, the words "or of a refusal of the Vestry elect to serve."

Resolved, That Canon XVI be amended by striking out of the 5th line the words "in such case,"

Resolved, That Canon XIX be amended by striking out of the 4th line of Section 3, the words "who form" and inserting the word "from."

Resolved, That Canon XX be amended:

(1.) By substituting for the words "ages and parentage," upon the 7th line of Section 1, the words "parentage and date of birth."

(II.) By introducing after the word "*Convention*," on the 7th line of Section 3, the word "*exclusive*."

Resolved, That Canon XXI be amended:

(I.) By altering the heading to "Compensations, &c."

(II.) By striking out Section 1.

(III.) By changing the numbering of the following sections to correspond.

Resolved, That Canon XXII be amended by striking out the word "*fiscal*" from the 4th line.

Resolved, That Canon XXIV be amended:

(I.) By substituting for the word "*Bishop*" upon the 2d line of the first paragraph, the word "*Episcopate*."

(II.) By substituting for the words "Bishop's salary" upon the 5th line of the second paragraph, the words "Episcopal salaries."

Resolved, That Canon XXV be amended by striking out the words in parenthesis upon the 3d line of Section 1.

Resolved, That Canon XXVI be amended by omitting all between the word "*Treasurer*" upon the 2d line and the word "*under*" upon line 3.

Resolved, That Canon XXVIII be amended by substituting for the word "*to*" upon the 1st line of paragraph two of Section 1, the word "*shall*," so that it shall read, "Such presentment shall be," &c.

Resolved, That should the Convention determine to make Canons X and XI sections of Canon VIII, the numbering of the succeeding Canons be changed accordingly.

Resolved, That the directions established by the Convention of 1870, (see page 39 of the Journal) for the case of a vote by orders, be made a rule of order to be numbered XIV, and that the numbering of the subsequent rules of order be altered accordingly. Parochial Reports.

I began to hold monthly services in Ansonville, where we have had 18 baptisms, 16 confirmations and a Sunday School of 29 pupils and 7 teachers, but as it has no separate existence, it has been inserted in Calvary Parish statistics. Mr. Smith holds service every Sunday in a rented chapel, where we have an organ, bought this Spring, and all working very satisfactorily.

I had charge of Monroe from May to January, (nine months) where I had 4 confirmations and 2 baptisms. The statistics will be furnished by Mr. Holmes, who took charge in January. The whole work of the year is 43 baptisms and 28 confirmations.

I have visited Rockingham six times, four times on week days and two Sundays. There should be service there twice a month and a church built as soon as possible. I have commenced a subscription list and believe that money can be got to put up a small church without delay. The accommodation in the court house is the worst I have seen. Whatever can be done to assist it by the Board of Missions should be done quickly.

I resigned the charge of the Parish of the Good Shepherd January 28th, 1879. On the 2d day of February, I preached and administered the communion. Since that time I have prepared two persons for confirmation, baptized one and presented them to the Bishop to seal according to the Apostolic rite.

I hope this Church may not long remain without the services of a Clergyman. There is a fine field for work and the people are kind, hospitable and favorably disposed towards the Church.

MISSIONARY STATIONS AT BATTLEBORO, TOIS-NOT AND NASHVILLE.

THE REV. G. W. PHELPS, MISSIONARY.

My mission work since last Convention is as follows:

At Toisnot I have preached three times. But finding after considerable effort very little to encourage me, I have, for the present, suspended the work at this point.

At Nashville, the county seat of Nash, I am persuaded a good work might be done. I have preached here once and the people seem anxious to have our services.

Distant about seven miles from Nashville is the old village of Hilliardston, once important, but having little at present to recommend it, except its pleasant situation in a beautiful section of country. In this neighborhood, February 8th, I buried a worthy member of the Church, Dr. Franklin Hart. The next day (Sunday) I preached in the same neighborhood. I have since been solicited for further services, but have not been able as yet to give them.

Battleboro, which is fourteen miles from Hilliardston and on the Wilmington & Weldon Railroad, is, though small at present,

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a place of growing importance. At this place I have preached four times, and by request addressed the Union Sunday School, which now numbers over eighty pupils. I have received at this place \$22.58 towards the Missionary's salary.

The whole country in which these places are situated affords a fine missionary field. But owing to the preoccupation of this field, much time, patience and care are absolutely essential to the plantation, culture and rooting of the Church in it. No sudden growth can be counted on, nor is it desirable, as a good foundation is all important to the future welfare of our building.

We are unable to make any very encouraging report of the progress of the Church in Weldon. I have little to add to this statistical report. I hold service in this church on the first Sunday of every month and also whenever a fifth Sunday occurs. Our congregations are uniformly good, whenever the weather and state of the roads are favorable. Trinity Church has been able to do but little to build up the Church beyond its own Parish bounds, and but little there. Probably no church within the Diocese has suffered more in a pecuniary point of view than it has done. From being one of the strongest churches in the Diocese, it has become one of the weakest, and will, after this, be unable to support a Clergyman only one-fourth of his time. The services of the church, however, are well attended, not only when the Rector is present, but when they are held by a Lay Reader, and I am happy to be able to state that the church is opened regularly every Sunday and once or twice a week during Lent. It has lost heavily by removal during the last two or three years, and I fear that this process is not yet at an end.

ST. BARNABAS' ASSOCIATE MISSION.

THE REV. R. B. SUTTON, D. D., HEAD OF MISSION.

This Mission was organized in January of this year, and is the result of the long continued and persistent prayers and efforts of the Rev. W. S. Bynum, who has been for the past three years the very efficient Deacon in charge of the Church work in this portion of the Diocese. Under every discouragement, he has surmounted the obstacles both real and imaginary, and we hope now that the Mission is established on a permanent basis. The work is widely spread, embracing the towns on the N. C. R. R., between Company's Shops and High Point, on the Richmond & Danville R. R. and on the Salem branch, and from Winston thirteen miles north to Germanton and eighteen miles to Huntsville, west of the Yadkin river. There is work here for two or three more workers if we had only the means to support them.

GREENSBORO.

This is the centre of the work, and the head quarters of the missionaries. Here, as in the whole field, we labor under the disadvantage of entering late into the work, after the ground has been preoccupied by the various bodies of Christians. We are encouraged in the work here by the measure of success already 1879.]

attained, and the prospects opening before us. The good people have been mindful of the comfort of the missionaries, and by timely gifts and subscriptions, liberal according to their means, are doing what they can for the support of the Gospel.

WINSTON.

This is the most thriving town in the Mission and one of the most prosperous in the State. Through the untiring energy and liberality of the little handfull of Church people who cooperated in the good work, the gifts of good people from other places, and lastly, by the munificent subscription of a lady recently moved to the place, the whole debt was removed, and the church, a neat Gothic building, was consecrated by the Rt. Rev. Bishop Lyman in February. Since then, a liberal member of the congregation has given the money for a Communion service.

COMPANY'S SHOPS.

At this point there is manifested considerable interest in the Church, and its services are well attended. In February a mission was held, and five adults baptized and, at the visitation of the Assistant Bishop, in March, seven persons were confirmed. The money has been subscribed to build a neat church and the plans are in the hands of the builder to make an estimate of the cost Next week we hope to give out the contract, and confidently expect to have the building completed ready for consecration this Summer. This we trust to do without soliciting any contribution outside of the community in which we labor.

GERMANTON.

This is a small hamlet in the midst of a rich agricultural district. It was formerly the county seat of Stokes, but by the division of the county, it lost the Court-house, and dwindled to a very small village. We have a little handful of earnest Church Parochial Reports. [MAY.

people. The feeling in the community causes us to hope that the number may be increased. We worship in a small schoolhouse which is entirely too contracted for our congregations. We expect some time this year to put up an inexpensive church.

HIGH POINT.

Here we have held two monthly services in the Methodist Church, which has been very kindly offered for our use. With the exception of a service in a parlor last Summer, by the Rev. Mr. Rich, these are, as far as I can ascertain, the only services of our Church ever held in the place. The spirits of our few Church people have been revived; some, who in despair of ever listening to the voice of the Church in this place, wandered off, it is hoped to bring back, and others gathered into the fold. We have several candidates for confirmation and there is a general inquiry as to what the Church is, and a demand for Prayer Books beyond our power to supply.

HUNTSVILLE.

A service has been held here, and arrangements made for a monthly appointment. Here was formerly a Parish ready to build a church, but the rayages of the war have scattered most of the Church people and impoverished those who remained.

JAMESTOWN AND REIDSVILLE.

Appointments have been made for both of these places. We propose to visit every town within our boundaries and search out our Church people and supply them with services to the extent of our ability. 1879.]

Contributions to Bishop's fund, \$10; to Diocesan Missionary Society, \$10. Baptisms, children, colored, 7.

We have a very good attendance of colored people, many of whom are sincerely attached to the Church, and are having their children brought up in its instruction. On my way to Stokes county, I preach once a month, on Friday night, at Madison, a small village on Dan river. There are four zealous members of the Church in this place.

One Sunday in the month I officiate at Mountain Chapel. We here have very good congregations. Families belonging to the Church, 4; communicants, 10.

On my way to Mountain Chapel, I preach Saturday night at Stoneville, and on Monday night following, I hold services at Reidsville, a flourishing town on the railroad. There are a few families here, and a very few, but very intelligent and zealous members of the Church. My Sundays being all occupied. I preach at Reidsville, at the Bishop's request, until some better arrangements can be made, in the week.

My other two Sundays are given to the Church in Leaksville. But owing to peculiar circumstances, I have not yet done as much at this Church as I had hoped to do, and as I think I will Clerical Reports. [MAY,

be enabled to do hereafter. Contributions for missionary and other purposes about \$20.

Besides what has been reported, I preach occasionally at Danbury, a pleasant little village perched up on the mountains near the head of Dan river, one of the main branches of the Roanoke.

To meet these different appointments, I ride and visit a good deal, and meet with very much in isolated individuals and at remote places to encourage me in my work and make me glad to preach the Gospel; although as yet I can report but little for the increase of the Church.

Excepting during my absence in the interests of the Wilberforce School, I have held monthly services at Old Fort and Henry's.

The Rev. N. Collin Hughes, Dean of the Edenton Convocation, respectfully reports as follows:

In conformity with the requirement of the Canon on Convoeations, I report to the Convention through you, with respect to the condition of our work, as follows: After several preliminary meetings of a portion of the Clergy in this section of the Diocese, the Convocation of Edenton was at length organized in the town of Edenton, about the last of June. A Constitution and By-Laws were adopted; officers were elected; and the bounds of the Convocational District were determined. Since that time. three sessions of the Convocation have been held: at Washington, Windsor and Williamston, respectively. The number of Clergy in attendance has averaged about one-half of the number residing within the District. We regret the small number of Lay Delegates convening with us, as it indicates a want of that interest in united action which we desire to see awakened. The attendance upon the public services of the Convocation has generally been good. As so brief a period has elapsed since our organization, it is not to be expected that any very decided results of our labors should be manifested. We keep steadily in view, however, joint action, and trust that eventually we shall be enabled to accomplish much which could not be effected under the system of isolated, individual work, which has hitherto prevailed. In particular, there has been great unanimity in the expression of interest in the work of Christian education and in

the desire to have Church schools established in all our Parishes. We have also had under consideration the establishment of a Church paper for circulation especially within the limits of our District. We hope, however, that the effort now making in behalf of a Diocesan paper will render this enterprise unnecessary.

ST. MARY'S SCHOOL.

THE REV. BENNETT SMEDES, A. M., PRINCIPAL AND RECTOR.

St. Mary's School has for thirty-eight years been a nursery of the Church. Her pupils in every Southern Diocese have been earnest co-workers with the Clergy in laying deep the foundations of the City of our God. As to her work in the past, we can appeal to the Bishops and Presbyters of the South. The testimony of our Rt. Rev. Father in God, Bishop Atkinson, to the character of the School *at present*, is contained in his charge to the Diocese, dated May, 1878, in which he speaks as follows:

"Among the evidences of the present welfare and future growth of the Church, I am glad to be able to point out the condition and success of St. Mary's School, at Raleigh.

"When the lamented death of Dr. Smedes occurred, I, in common with the other friends of that institution, felt a good deal of anxiety as to the effect upon it of the loss of so able, so experienced and so efficient a man as its late head had been.

"It gratifies me, however, to be authorized to say, as I do say, that the Rev. Bennett–Smedes, with the valuable aid of Mrs. Kate–DeR. Meares, in its superintendence, and of an excellent corps of teachers, has been able to maintain the high character of the School, not only as a medium of imparting thorough and not–superficial knowledge to its pupils, but for the still higher 1879.]

task of inculating the principles and forming the habits which shall qualify them in the future to adorn society and to render their homes happy,"

Upon the same occasion the Rt. Rev. Bishop Lyman says:

" I visited on Friday, May 3d, the Chapel of St. Mary's School, and after Evening Prayer by the Rev. Bennett Smedes, the Rector of the School, I confirmed sixteen of the pupils, and addressed them. It affords me much pleasure to say that this School is continuing with great efficiency the good work for which it has so long been distinguished. The frequent opportunities which I have enjoyed for observing the condition of the School enable me to say confidently that I believe there has been no time when its whole tone and spirit has been more satisfactory than at the present moment. With a very able corps of teachers, and with a management which aims earnestly at thoroughness in every department, it justly merits now the same confidence and liberal patronage which it has always enjoyed."

Not only has St. Mary's sent out into the vineyard of the Lord zealous and well instructed Church-women; she has also been a liberal contributor to the charities of the Church at home and abroad, and has aided largely in the free support and education of many who were unable to do anything in this way for themselves; thus enabling them to gain their own support and to help others dependent upon them.

All this charitable work—and in the aggregate it has been very great—has been accomplished without one penny of endowment or extraneous help of any kind.

Having carried on the work successfully during the past years of financial distress, we feel encouraged for the future to offer to the daughters of the Clergy of the South free tuition in every department.

The Principal desires to give information of the School to those having daughters to educate and the means to educate Clerical Reports. [MAY,

them, and he would add that his ability to continue the benefactions of the School depends entirely upon the income derived from its pupils.

The Rev. J. E. C. Smedes, Principal of St. Augustine's Normal School, begs leave to present the following report :

RALEIGH, N. C., May 11, 1879.

The current nine months' session, the twelfth annual term, of our school began in October. We have registered one hundred and five pupils, of whom fifty-seven have been boarding scholars. Thirteen of our present boarders are received free of all charges. The rest pay four dollars a month. In aid of the boarding department, the school receives about eight hundred dollars from the Domestic Committee of the Board of Missions.

The range of tuition embraces primary and intermediate branches, and also higher English, classical and mathematical studies. Assisting the Principal in the work of tuition are three salaried teachers, all Communicants and trained in the school. The first assistant, the Rev. Geo. A. C. Cooper is in Deacon's Orders. The refectory and girls' dormitory are under the charge of an efficient matron.

The religious discipline of the school includes daily catechising, the daily Morning and Evening Prayer of the Church, and weekly Communion. Three of the students are candidates for Holy Orders and six are Postulants or expecting to become Postulants. Fourteen of those who were confirmed in St. Augustine's Chapel on the 11th were our pupils. 1879.]



THE CURRENT EPISCOPAL AND CONTINGENT FUND.

The total receipts for this fund from all sources have been 5,177–23, against 6,301–51 the previous year—a falling off of 1,124–28, of which 938–69 is owing to diminished payments by Parishes and congregations on account of assessments and arrears.

Notwithstanding the fact that the current expenses of the Diocese have been 799–14 less than those of the previous year, the receipts have been insufficient to meet all the demands, and a balance of 1,250, due on the Bishops' salaries to March 31st, remains unpaid. By reference to the Tabular Statement it will be seen that the amount of arrears due by the parishes and congregations has increased from 2,152.76 as reported last year, to 3,575–90 at the closing of these accounts.

THE CURRENT FUND FOR DIOCESAN MISSIONS.

The receipts for this fund have been insufficient to meet the stipends appropriated by the Executive Missionary Committee, and a balance of 163-34 has to be carried forward to the debit of the new account.

THE RELIEF, EDUCATION, AND CHURCH BUILDING FUNDS.

The receipts for these accounts show marked deficiencies compared with those of the previous year—the falling off being respectively 44–18, 98–53 and 49–24.

THE UNIVERSITY OF THE SOUTH.

Attention is called to the special contributions which have been received and transmitted for the Theological Department of the University of the South, amounting to 294-59—as appears in the account of the Education Fund. The Treasurer earnestly hopes that these examples of sympathy and liberality will be followed in the future by still larger annual contributions towards the support of an institution having such strong claims upon churchmen everywhere, and especially in the Southern Dioceses which united in establishing it.
