JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS.

The members of the Ninety-sixth Annual Convention of the Diocese of North Carolina assembled in St. Philip's Church, Durham, at 10 o'clock, on Wednesday morning, May 8, 1912.

After prayer by the Bishop of the Diocese, the Secretary called the roll of the Clergy and Delegates entitled to seats in the Convention and a quorum was found to be present.

At 11 o'clock the Litany was said by the Rev. John J. Lanier, after which the Bishop proceeded to the celebration of the Holy Communion, in which he was assisted by the Rev. Messrs. W. H. Hardin, E. A. Osborne, and Sidney S. Bost. The sermon was preached by the Rev. N. Collin Hughes, from the texts: St. John xiv:16-17, "He shall give you another Comforter, that He may abide with you forever; even the Spirit of Truth." St. John xvi:13, "When He, the Spirit of Truth, is come, He will guide you into all truth."

The offerings of the congregation were received for the New York Bible and Prayer Book Society.

The Convention assembled at 3 o'clock p. m. and was called to order by the Bishop.

The election of officers being in order the Bishop nominated as President of the Convention the Rev. Frederick II. T. Horsfield, and the Secretary being instructed to cast the vote of the Convention for him he was declared elected.

The Rev. N. Collin Hughes nominated as Secretary the Rev. Julian E. Ingle, and the chair, having been requested to cast the vote, declared him elected.

On motion of the Rev. S. S. Bost it was

Resolved, That the Convention shall meet for Morning Prayer each day at 9:30 o'clock and adjourn at 6 p.m.; and that a recess shall be taken from 12:30 to 3 o'clock.

REPORT OF THE STANDING COMMITTEE.

The Standing Committee elected by the Convention of 1911 met on May 19th and was organized by the election of the Reverend I. McK. Pittenger, D.D., as President, and the Reverend A. B. Hunter as Secretary.

June 24th, consent was given to the consecration of the Reverend Thomas F. Davies, D.D., as Bishop of Western Massachusetts, the Reverend Philip M. Rhinelander as Bishop Coadjutor of the Diocese of Pennsylvania, the Reverend James H. Winchester, D.D., as Bishop Coadjutor of Arkansas, and the Reverend Thomas J. Garland, D.D., as Bishop Suffragan of Pennsylvania. Israel Harding Hughes was recommended to the Bishop to be received as a Candidate for Holy Orders.

The Committee approved the use by the Bishop of \$800 appropriated by the Board of Missions for work among white people in the Diocese in payment on the salaries of the Archdeacons of Raleigh and Charlotte.

August 5th, consent was given to the election of the Right Reverend Frederick Foote Johnson, D.D., Missionary Bishop of South Dakota, to be Bishop Coadjutor of the Diocese of Missouri.

October 2d, appropriations of money received from the Board of Missions as designated by the Bishop and approved by the three Missionary Convocations were approved.

Temporary dispensation from studies not strictly ecclesiastical was recommended to be granted to John Gregory Mabry.

Notice was received of a presentment for trial against the Reverend Clement G. Bradley, and seven presbyters were selected from whom the accused could choose three to constitute a court.

November 10th, consent was given to the consecration of the Reverend William Edward Toll, B.D., as Suffragan Bishop of Chicago. Approval was also given to the election of the Reverend Henry St. George Tucker, D.D., to be Bishop of Kyoto, and to the election of the Reverend Daniel Trumbull Huntington to be Bishop of Wuhu.

January 10, 1912, counsel was given to the Bishop that the sentence imposed by the court consisting of the Reverend Messrs. Isaac W. Hughes, Sydney S. Bost and Harris Mallinckrodt in the case of the Reverend Clement G. Bradley should be carried into effect.

Joseph Hoyle Hudson was recommended to the Bishop to be received as a Candidate for Holy Orders.

A resolution was adopted that the expense incurred by the ecclesiastical court and the witnesses summoned by the presenters are a proper charge on the Contingent Fund of the Diocese and ought to be paid by the Treasurer.

January 11, 1912, a delegation was present from Holy Trinity Parish, Greensboro, representing both parties in the controversy concerning the selection of a site for their new church edifice, and the Bishop asked counsel concerning the action of the Parish.

January 12th, it was unanimously resolved that the committee give counsel to the Bishop that the people of Holy Trinity Parish,

Greensboro, should be advised to agree among themselves upon terms which would keep the people of the Parish united, or failing in this that they agree among themselves upon some equitable terms in accordance with which the minority might withdraw and reorganize as a parish and be restored as far as possible to their former status in regard to parochial property, funds, and so forth, when organized as St. Andrew's Parish.

January 25th, Sanford Louis Rotter was recommended to the Bishop to be received as a Candidate for Holy Orders.

February 19th, Henry Clark Smith was recommended to the Bishop to be received as a candidate for Holy Orders.

April 16th, Henry Alpheus Willey was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Diaconate.

May 3d, approval was given to the election of the Reverend George Biller, Jr., to be Bishop of South Dakota, and to the election of the Reverend Herman Page, D.D., to be Bishop of New Mexico.

Walter Lee Loflin was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Diaconate.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON FINANCE.

The Committee on Finance beg to report that the Treasurer's securities and cash have been duly audited and found to be as shown in his printed report to this Convention.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF ST. MARY'S SCHOOL.

In accordance with the provision of the act of incorporation of St. Mary's School, Raleigh, the following report is submitted on behalf of the Board of Trustees.

The Treasurer of the corporation reports small balances on hand, aggregating \$1,231.57.

Of this, \$58.14 is the balance on general account, and \$1,173.43 is the proceeds of some effort of the Rector of the School, and of a committee of the Board, to raise a fund for buildings, equipment, and endowment. The Treasurer reports in hand a fund of \$3,000, constituting all which has been received from the executor of the late Dr. and Mrs. Martin, of their legacies to establish the "Martin Scholarship." There is also on hand \$121.80, interest upon the \$3.000. These are the only funds in the hands of the Treasurer.

The bonded debt of the School is \$40,000, upon which interest is paid semi-annually at the rate of six per cent per annum. There is also a balance of about five thousand dollars, spent for permanent improvements and equipments, which was not funded, but has been carried on the books of the School, with the hope that the School might be able to pay it off. The School has, therefore, been obliged to meet its proper annual expenses, to pay the interest both on the bonded debt of forty thousand dollars, and on the above mentioned balance of about five thousand dollars of floating debt, and to give annually free scholarships worth twenty-five hundred dollars, which is equivalent to the interest on fifty thousand dollars at 5 per cent. All this the School with great effort and economy has succeeded in doing.

Relieved of this burden of interest and Scholarships, the School would be able to make annually many repairs and minor improvements, with the balance of profits which at the present time the School would really be making.

The total enrollment of pupils during the present year has been 242, of whom 152 were boarding pupils, and 90 day scholars. The discipline of the School has been excellent, the diligence and improvement of the pupils most gratifying, and in every respect there has been a high degree of excellence in the administration of the School, both as to its material interests and its educational work. Of the higher spiritual interests of the pupils it is not so easy, perhaps it is not so proper, to speak. But so far as can be judged by the Chapel services, and the attendance and interest of both pupils and teachers, it is safe to say that St. Mary's shows no signs of declining from its high ideals of the past.

It is the opinion of the President of your Board of Trustees, that we have in St. Mary's School an institution developed to a high degree of efficiency, doing most admirable work in every department, and its entire machinery, to use a common figure, running with smoothness and power, such as has not been surpassed, if at any time equaled, during the experience of the years since the Diocese took it from the hands of Dr. Smedes, the younger. The larg? sums of money expended three years ago in increasing its accommodations and improving its equipment, have made possible this higher development of comfort, convenience, and efficiency in its management. And an increased attendance of pupils has followed upon this improvement in the School. But it has not yet been filled to its

maximum capacity. It could now accommodate a small further increase in the number of boarding pupils. We hope to see that increase when the School opens next September.

In the meantime the friends of the School in the Carolinas should remember that we have made only a beginning in what we must do for St. Mary's. I am saying only what the Trustees of the School have asserted again and again in formal action, and what every one must recognize to be true, if he will but look at the facts in the history and the present state of higher education; namely, that we must furnish the School with its buildings and its equipment, free of any burden of debt; and we must provide it an endowment, if we would assure its permanent success and usefulness. Unless this be done and done promptly, there will be no recourse for the Trustees but to increase the charges of the School, and remove its benefits and blessings further and further from our people of moderate means, that is, from the majority of our people. St. Mary's needs fifty thousand dollars to pay off all indebtedness, and one hundred thousand dollars as the beginning of an endowment.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MANAGERS OF THE THOMPSON ORPHANAGE AND TRAINING INSTITUTION.

The Board of Managers held their twenty-sixth annual meeting in the vestry room of the Orphanage Chapel, on Wednesday, April 24, 1912, at 10 o'clock, the Bishop of the Diocese presiding.

The annual reports of the Superintendent and Treasurer, Rev. Walter J. Smith. and Mr. J. G. Shannonhouse, Trustee of the Endowment Fund, were read and accepted, and are hereby submitted as a part of this report.

It being the occasion of the Bishop's annual visitation to the institution, a recess was taken at 11 o'clock for divine service, at which the Bishop made a most timely address, and confirmed a class of ten children.

Immediately after dinner, the Board of Managers resumed its deliberations.

Upon investigation, it was found that the work of the institution has been most satisfactorily conducted during the past year. While there has been a very appreciable falling off in the gross products of the farm, on account of the excessive drought of last summer, still the financial statement of the Superintendent shows a very gratifying increase over the previous year.

The Board is pleased to report that the health of the children has been, and continues, exceptionally good. The sanitary conditions are satisfactory, and the children appear to be happy and well provided for.

Rev. Mr. Smith and his efficient co-workers deserve the utmost commendation for their zeal and faithfulness to duty.

The report of the Superintendent shows a very marked decrease in the Thanksgiving offering over the previous year. This fact is greatly to be deprecated, and while there may be some excuse for it, due to the short crops prevailing in some sections of the State, yet, even that is by no means sufficient to account for so serious a falling off in the contributions of our people for this noble work, for whatever the differences may have been in the profits of the farm and the various lines of industries throughout the State, there has not been a corresponding diminution in the comforts and luxuries of our people.

It is with satisfaction and pleasure that we mention the fact of the laying of the corner stone of the first of the series of cottages which the Federation of Orphanage Guilds throughout the State has undertaken to build for the institution.

The zeal and faith of the noble women of the State which has been manifested in connection with this good work, can not be too highly commended, and deserves the thanks of the Church, and we hope their efforts may be seconded by the generous contributions of our people everywhere, so that they may be able to accomplish the stupendous task which they have undertaken.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE REV. WALTER J. SMITH, SUPERINTENDENT OF THE THOMPSON ORPHANAGE AND TRAINING INSTITUTION.

To the Board of Managers—Greeting:

Our Institution, the child of faith, is now a quarter of a century old, and we celebrate its Silver Jubilee by the laying of the corner stone of a new building, the result of the prayers and labors of the Federation of Orphanage Guilds in the State.

In looking back over the past twenty-five years, we have much for which to be thankful. The main support of the work has come from the voluntary offerings of our people, gladly and cheerfully given, and with the increase in the cost of living, the contributions have increased, so that we have generally been able to close each fiscal year with a respectable balance on hand.

The total enrollment of children to date has been 462, and the present number in the Orphanage is seventy. We have not made any great efforts to enlarge our capacity, but we have tried to take care of the number we have, without going into debt.

While we have suffered at times from the effects of malaria, the health of the children has been on the whole very good, and during all the history of the Institution there have been only seven deaths, two of which were caused by accidents. With the drainage of the creek and the erection of new buildings, we look for improved conditions in many respects, and so we thank God and take courage.

The past year, too, gives us cause for thankfulness, and yet we have had our discouragements. The long drought during the summer cut short our crops, and while we usually had enough for our own use, we were able to sell very few vegetables after the spring months. Then, again, the low price of cotton and other causes cut off the Thanksgiving offerings, so that our credit balance this year is \$1,325.26 less than it was last year. An opportunity to make up the greater part of this deficit came to us by the great demand for sand in paving the streets. In order to do this work, it became necessary to buy an extra pair of mules and a wagon and set of harness, which partly accounts for the large expenses of the farm. It will be observed, however, that the farm and dairy products sold and consumed exceeded the farm expenses by more than seven hundred dollars.

Our faculty during the year has remained the same, with the exception of the teacher of the primary department. After three years of faithful and efficient service, Miss Tomlin gave up her position at the close of the school year, and was succeeded by Miss Ethel Clare, of Greenville, S. C., who left us, much to our regret, at the end of two months to be married. Her place was filled at once by Miss Eliza Hill, of Weldon, who, in addition to her duties in the school room, plays the organ in the Chapel.

During the year we have received twenty-four children, seven from the Diocese of North Carolina, four from the Diocese of East Carolina, and thirteen from the District of Asheville. Eleven have returned to their friends, three have entered industrial schools, one ran away, and one was expelled. The present number is seventy, thirty-three being from the Diocese of North Carolina. nineteen from the Diocese of East Carolina, seventeen from the District of Asheville, and one from the Diocese of Southern Virginia.

The health of the children during the year has been remarkably good, and notwithstanding the long and severe winter, the colds

have been fewer than usual. We have had three cases of scarlet fever, which were skillfully treated by our physician and nurses, and so the disease did not spread.

It is becoming more and more the policy of orphan homes not to put children into private families, and from my own observation and experience, I think it is best to hold on to them as long as possible, in order that they may be able to take care of themselves when they go out into the world.

The Steadman legacy mentioned in my last report has been turned over to Mr. J. G. Shannonhouse, Treasurer of the Endowment Fund.

In closing my report, I wish to thank our own physician, and the other physicians and dentists of the city, the Standard Ice and Fuel Company, the railroads, and our own attorney, for continued favors. Hereto I append my statement as Treasurer.

The report was referred to a Special Committee consisting of the Rev. Geo. W. Lay, Rev. Samuel M. Hanff, and Messrs. John W. Graham, W. A. Erwin, and John M. Fairley.

The Archdeacons of the Convocations made their annual reports in order: The Rev. Wm. H. Hardin, of Charlotte; the Rev. E. A. Osborne, late Archdeacon of Charlotte; the Rev. N. C. Hughes, of Raleigh, and the Rev. H. B. Delany, D.D., of the Convocation of Colored People.

The reports were accompanied by those of the respective Treasurers of the Convocations. (See Appendix C.)

The Rev. A. Burtis Hunter presented his report as Principal of St. Augustine's School, which, with the reports of the Archdeacons, was on his motion referred to the Committee on the State of the Church. (See Appendix B.)

On motion of Mr. J. C. Buxton the following preamble and resolution were unanimously adopted by a rising vote:

WHEREAS. The members of this Convention have noted the absence, in consequence of failing health, of one of our oldest and most distinguished laymen, the Honorable Richard H. Battle, LL.D., a regular attendant upon the sessions of this body as a delegate from the Church of the Good Shepherd, Raleigh, as well as a Deputy for many years from this Diocese to the General Convention of the Church:

Be it therefore resolved. That a message be sent by the Secretary of this Convention to the Honorable Richard H. Battle, assuring him of our regret at his absence, of our sympathy in his illness, and of our prayers for his restoration to health and years of continued usefulness to the Church to which he has devoted so many years of wisdom and godly living.

The Rev. Sidney S. Bost having presented an invitation from President Few to the members of the Convention to visit Trinity College, it was on motion

Resolved. That the thanks of the Convention be tendered the President of Trinity College for hospitality and courtesies offered, assuring him of our deep interest in his great institution and its work.

Resolved, further, That the Rector of St. Philip's Parish be requested to convey to Dr. Few this message and resolution, and to extend a cordial invitation to the President, Faculty and students of the college to our services and sessions.

On motion of Mr. Charles E. Johnson it was

Resolved, That the Treasurer of the Convention be authorized to make the necessary additional provision for heating the Episcopal residence.

On motion of the Rev. N. C. Hughes, Mr. Arthur W. Taylor and Mr. Herbert B. Cuningham, lay workers in the Diocese by the appointment of the Bishop, were invited to honor-

ary seats in the Convention, and the Treasurer was authorized to pay their travelling expenses in attending the session.

On motion of the Rev. John B. Gibble, the Rev. Albert New, the Rev. Chas. J. Ketchum, the Rev. E. H. Gould, and all clergymen present who were not members of the Convention, were invited to honorary seats.

On motion of the Treasurer he was authorized to pay the travelling expenses of clergymen present, canonically resident in the Diocese but not members of the Convention.

The Rev. S. M. Hanff presented an application from certain residents in Greensboro for admission into union with the Convention as a parish to be named St. Andrew's, and on his motion it was referred to the Committee on New Parishes.

The Rev. John B. Gibble offered the following resolutions which were on motion referred to the Committee on Canons:

Resolved. first, That Chapter III, Canon II, Section 1, be amended as follows: Strike out, after the word "elect," in line 3, the words "from among the baptized members," and insert, "by ballot, by the qualified voters," and after the word "persons," in line 5. insert the words, "that the term of office of one-third of the vestrymen so elected shall be only until the first succeeding annual parish meeting, the term of office of another third of said vestrymen shall be only until the second succeeding annual parish meeting, and the term of office of the remaining third of said vestrymen shall be only until the third succeeding annual parish meeting. It shall be determined by lot, at the first meeting of said vestry after said election which of said vestrymen shall so hold for one year, which for two years, and which for three years.

Resolved, second, That at any annual parish meeting, the parish may increase or decrease the number of its vestry: Provided, that any such change must be so made as to operate equally upon each of the three classes into which the vestry is to be divided, and any such change must further be so made as not to nullify or impair the provisions of resolution one, and not in any wise to prevent or impair the rotation in office which it is the object of these resolutions to secure.

Mr. Albert L. Cox offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

Resolved, That the Trustees of the Diocese be authorized and directed to have placed upon the Episcopal residence a new roof,

preferably of tile; and also to have the room over the Diocesan Library properly ceiled.

Resolved, That the Treasurer of the Diocese be authorized and directed to pay the \cos t of these improvements.

The Rev. Francis M. Osborne moved the following preamble and resolution, which were adopted:

WHEREAS, The whole civilized world has recently witnessed in the heroic death of the men who perished on the steamship *Titanic* such a remarkable and signal example of the principle of self-sacrifice taught by our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ, and set forth by His Church as the way of life:

Be it resolved, That this Convention put on record this memorial of our thankfulness that we have had such an evidence in our day of the growth of His Kingdom in the hearts of men and such testimony to the growth of the spirit of love which leads men to lay down their lives for their brethren; and further

Be it resolved. That we place in the Journal of the Convention this memorial to the strong men of the *Titanic* who willingly gave their lives for the lives of women and children and so "followed in His steps": "Christ present them—God receive them."

The Rev. John B. Gibble, on behalf of the Rector, Wardens and Vestrymen of the Parish of St. Athanasius, Burlington, presented a petition for leave to change the name of the Parish to that of the Holy Comforter. The petition was, on motion, granted by the Convention.

The Convention then adjourned to meet on Thursday morning at 9:30 o'clock.

After Evening prayer at 8:15 o'clock, addresses were made on Pensions and Relief of the Clergy by the Rev. Messrs. Homer W. Starr, Isaac W. Hughes, and Milton A. Barber.

SECOND DAY

St. Philip's Church, Durham, Thursday, May 9, 1912.

The Convention met pursuant to adjournment.

The Holy Communion having been celebrated at an earlier hour by the Bishop of the Diocese, assisted by Rev. Sidney S. Bost, Rector of the Parish, Morning Prayer was said by the Rev. George M. Tolson and Rev. Edmund L. Malone. The Bishop then took the chair and the minutes of yesterday's proceedings were read and approved.

The Bishop read his Annual Address. (See Appendix A.) On motion of the Rev. Frank J. Mallett, the part of the

On motion of the Rev. Frank J. Mallett, the part of the address relating to St. Mary's School was referred to the Special Committee already appointed to consider the report of the Trustees of the School.

On motion of the Rev. Isaac W. Hughes, the part relating to St. Michael's School was referred to a Special Committee which the Bishop appointed as follows: The Rev. I. W. Hughes, Rev. F. H. T. Horsfield, Messrs. Wm. H. Ruffin, W. A. Avant, and G. C. Lamb.

The Rev. Dr. Pittinger presented the following

REPORTS OF THE COMMITTEE ON CANONS.

REPORT I. The Committee on Canons present for the further action of this Convention the amendments to the Constitution of the Diocese agreed upon by the Convention of 1911, as they are set forth in Report 3, pages 37 and 38 of the Journal of that Convention, and move that they be ratified.

[The resolutions contained in Report 3 here alluded to were adopted in a vote by Orders, with the exception of No. 5, which was laid on the table by the last Convention, and No. 6, which was disapproved.—Secretary.]

REPORT II. The following resolution, offered by the Rev. H. T. Cocke, and found on page 43 of the Journal of 1911, was referred to the Committee on Canons:

Resolved, That Article IX, Section 3, of the Constitution be amended by omitting the words, males of the age of twenty-one

years, members of the Parish, and inserting in lieu thereof the words, members of the Parish of the age of twenty-one years.

The Committee having considered the resolution, although not unanimously approving it, move its adoption.

[A vote by Orders being taken on the amendment, it was adopted, and lies over for action by the next Convention.—Secretary.]

REPORT III. The resolution offered by the Rev. John B. Gibble in regard to rotation in the election of vestries, having been referred to the Committee, they considered the same but were unable to agree upon any recommendation, first, because it would seem not to be within the province of this Convention to regulate the methods of election in the different Parishes of the Diocese; and secondly, because the object sought in this resolution, viz, rotation in office in vestries, has already been recommended by the action of the Convention in the year 1910. The Committee therefore offer the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Committee on Canons be excused from the further consideration of this matter.

[The resolution was adopted.—Secretary.]

REPORT IV. The Relief Fund of the Diocese having been merged with the General Clergy Relief Fund, Chapter I, Canon IX, has become inoperative. The Committee therefore offer the following resolution:

Resolved, That Chapter I, Canon IX, of the Canons of the Diocese be rescinded.

[The resolution was adopted.—Secretary.]

The Rev. E. A. Osborne presented the following

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON NEW PARISHES.

The Committee on New Parishes respectfully report that having considered the petition of St. Andrew's congregation, Greensboro, to be admitted into union with this Convention as a Parish to be known as St. Andrew's Parish, find that all canonical requirements have been complied with, and being assured that said congregation is able to support a minister, offer the following resolution:

Resolved, That St. Andrew's Parish, Greensboro, be admitted into union with the Convention of the Diocese.

The resolution was adopted, whereupon the delegates from St. Andrew's Parish, Greensboro, appeared and took their seats in the Convention.

The hour of noon having arrived business was suspended and the Bishop led the house in prayer for Missions.

The Rev. Edward L. Ogilby then presented the following

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON ELECTIONS.

The Committee on Elections respectfully report on the informal certificate of the election of Delegates from the Chapel of the Cross, Chapel Hill, that under the circumstances it is best to accept the certificate and admit the delegates named. They therefore offer the following resolution:

Resolved. That the report of the Committee on Elections in regard to the Delegates from Chapel Hill be adopted by the Convention.

The resolution was adopted and the delegates from Chapel Hill took their seats.

The Convention then took a recess.

THURSDAY, May 9, 1912, 3 p. m.

The Convention was called to order by the Bishop of the Diocese.

The Rev. George W. Lay offered the following resolutions, which were referred to the Committee on Canons:

Resolved, That Chapter I, Canon XIV, Section 1, of the Canons of the Diocese be amended by omitting from the list of Canonical Offerings, "Fund to Aid Candidates for Holy Orders," and "Theological Department at Sewanee."

Resolved. That the Fund to Aid Candidates for Holy Orders, and that for the Theological Department at Sewanee be and are hereby recommended to the clergy as objects for an annual offering; and that the Secretary be and is hereby directed to print the titles of the two objects above named on the last page of the cover of the Journal under "Other objects recommended."

The Rev. John B. Gibble offered the following resolution, which was referred to the Committee on Canons:

Resolved. That Chapter I, Canon XIV, Section 3, be amended by omitting the words or other proper officer in line 3, and inserting in lieu thereof the words who shall remit promptly to the other proper officers.

The Rev. Sidney S. Bost extended to the Convention an invitation from the United Daughters of the Confederacy to attend the Memorial Exercises of the next day, and moved that with a view to an acceptance of the same the Convention should adjourn on Friday afternoon at 12:30 o'clock.

The motion was agreed to.

On motion of the same the Convention accepted with thanks the invitation of Mr. and Mrs. Wm. A. Erwin to attend a reception at their home at 5:00 o'clock this afternoon.

Nominations for the annual election being in order the names of all persons proposed were recorded by the Secretary to be acted upon by the Convention on Friday morning in accordance with the Rules of Order.

The Rev. Geo. W. Lay presented the report of the Special Committee on the Report of the Managers of the Thompson Orphanage, as follows:

Your Committee have examined carefully the report of the Managers, with the appended reports of the Superintendent and of the Trustee of the Permanent Fund.

We are pleased to record our opinion that the Thompson Orphanage is in a flourishing condition, under efficient, economical and kindly management on the part of all concerned, and note with pleasure the completion of its Silver Jubilee, which was signalized by the laying of the corner stone of a new building.

We note that no record is reported of the auditing of the accounts of the Superintendent and of the Trustee of the Permanent Fund, and suggest that such a report of an auditing committee should be included in each annual report of the Managers.

We also suggest that this report should include some estimate of the condition and present value of the securities of the Permanent Fund, and that securities of only nominal value should be so indicated.

The work for the Orphanage is of two kinds, first, to secure funds necessary for its running expenses, and second, to secure other funds for increasing and developing the plant.

The running expenses of the Orphanage are secured by the free will offerings of the people through collections in churches and Sunday Schools, and through the individual parochial Orphanage Guilds. We earnestly ask the attention of the Diocese to the fact that the balance at the end of the past year is less than that for the

previous year by \$1,325.26, showing the falling off in current receipts of that amount for the year. We note with regret the fact that the Thanksgiving offerings fell off decidedly the past year, and we urge upon the clergy the duty and privilege of obtaining as large offerings as possible on Thanksgiving day, as required by canon. We also urge the necessity and importance of calling the attention of the children of the Sunday Schools to the opportunity afforded them of contributing to the support of the Orphanage each month, as requested by this Convention. Careful attention to this matter will lead to largely increased offerings, and will also be of the highest educational value to the children themselves, by increasing their generosity, and by calling their attention to others of like age, but of less fortunate worldly position, who deserve their sympathy and assistance.

The second part of the support of the Orphanage is dependent on the efficient and enthusiastic work of the Federation of Orphanage Guilds, which is tendered the expression of our heartiest appreciation of its efforts that are already resulting in the erection of one new building, to be followed, we hope and believe, by several others in the near future. We suggest that the funds contributed to this Federation and in their hands should be reported to the Managers, and that a statement of such funds should be included in their report to this Convention each year, for the information of the Convention itself and of those members of the Church who have so generously contributed to this very important part of our Diocesan work.

We therefore offer the following resolutions:

Resolved 1. That this Convention urges upon all the clergy the importance of securing from their parishes for the support of the Thompson Orphanage as large contributions as possible, by collections in the church, especially on Thanksgiving day, as required by Canon, and also by monthly collections from the Sunday Schools, as recommended by the Convention.

Resolved 2. That the Managers of the Thompson Orphanage are hereby requested to include in their annual report a statement of contributions and funds in hand collected by the Federation of Orphanage Guilds, which statement they are hereby authorized to request of said Federation.

The Rev. N. C. Hughes presented the following report of the Sunday School Commission appointed by the last Convention

Your Commission have found it impracticable to take any action during the year past, and respectfully ask to be discharged.

On motion the Commission was discharged.

The Rev. Mr. Hughes then offered the following resolutions, which were adopted:

- Resolved 1. That there be elected annually by the Convention a Sunday School Commissioner, who shall have power to take any action not inconsistent with the rights of others, in furtherance of Sunday School work.
- 2. That the said Commissioner be authorized to associate with himself representatives from each Convocation to aid him in the prosecution of the work.
- 3. That he be at liberty to draw on the Treasurer of the Diocese for the expenses of himself and his co-workers to an amount not in excess of \$100 per annum.
- 4. That the Treasurer be instructed to pay this amount out of the current Episcopal and Contingent Fund upon the order of the Bishop.

The Rev. A. Burtis Hunter nominated as Sunday School Commissioner the Rev. Homer W. Starr, and the Secretary being instructed to cast the vote of the Convention, he was declared elected.

Mr. James Ker, Jr., from a Committee appointed by the last Convention to report at this time on a Laymen's Auxiliary to aid in providing additional buildings for the Orphanage, offered the following resolution:

Resolved. That a Committe of four be appointed by the Bishop to form in each Parish and Mission in the Diocese a Committee of five male members to collect funds for the construction of the new buildings for the Orphanage in coöperation with the Federation of Thompson Orphanage Guilds.

On motion the resolution was amended by striking out all after the word Orphanage, and inserting in lieu thereof under the direction of the Managers of the Thompson Orphanage, and in this form was adopted by the Convention.

The Bishop appointed as members of this Committee the Rev. H. T. Cocke, Messrs. James Ker, Jr., Erwin A. Holt, and Richard F. J. Johnson.

The Rev. Dr. Mallett presented the following report:

The Special Committee on the Report of the Trustees of St. Mary's School submit the following report:

We desire to call to the special attention of the Convention that portion of the Bishop's address which deals in a most appealing way with the solution of the serious financial problems now confronting the Trustees of the institution.

St. Mary's has no endowment, and the Trustees have incurred for necessary improvements a debt of \$45,000. Besides this, the School has to provide free scholarships annually at an expense equal to the interest on more than \$50,000. This is a heavy tax on the resources of the School, which in spite of such drawbacks is accomplishing a splendid work for young womanhood.

The State equips its secular institutions of learning—the Church must stand by her own distinctive institutions. And to do this for St. Mary's seems, in God's Providence, to be the duty of the hour.

In view of the pleasing fact that in October, 1913, our beloved Bishop will have completed twenty years in the Episcopate, your committee respectfully offer the following resolution:

Resolved. That this Diocese represented by the present Convention heartily and gratefully recognizing the many blessings of our Bishop's administration, hereby pledges itself to a fitting and adequate expression of its appreciation of his twenty years service by "sympathetic coöperation" in his praiseworthy attempt to liquidate the debt on St. Mary's School, Raleigh, and also provide for the raising of \$100,000 as the nucleus of an endowment fund.

Your committee take for granted that any clergy or laity called upon for aid by the Bishop will cheerfully render such service as he desires.

Isaac W. Hughes, Messrs. J. Cameron Buxton, Thos. H. Battle, Wm. H. Williamson, John S. Henderson, and Wm. L. London.

The Rev. Isaac W. Hughes presented the following report:

The Special Committee appointed to take under consideration that part of the Bishop's address relating to St. Michael's Industrial School, Charlotte, respectfully report that they heartily approve of the action of the Bishop in organizing the Board of Managers of St. Michael's Industrial School, and offer the following resolutions:

Resolved. That the Convention endorses the action of the Bishop and authorizes the present organization to continue its operation until such time as this Convention may deem necessary to take other or further action.

Resolved. That in case of a vacancy in the said Board, such vacancy shall be filled by the Board itself upon nomination by the Bishop.

After Evening Prayer at 8:15 o'clock addresses on Mission Work were made by Archdeacons Hardin and Hughes, Mr. Wm. A. Erwin and Mr. Herbert B. Cuningham.

THIRD DAY.

St. Philip's Church, Durham, Friday, May 10, 1912.

The Holy Communion was celebrated by the Bishop, assisted by the Rev. Sidney S. Bost, at 7:30 o'clock.

At 9:30 the Convention met for Morning Prayer, which was said by the Rev. A. Burtis Hunter and Rev. E. A. Osborne.

The Bishop then took the chair and called the Convention to order.

The minutes of yesterday were read and approved.

The members of the Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary entered the church and the report of their Secretary, Miss Cheshire, was read by the Rev. John B. Gibble, after which the Bishop addressed them and they withdrew. (See Appendix B.)

On motion of Mr. Henry A. London, it was

Resolved. That the members of this Convention hereby express their grateful appreciation of the excellent and gratifying report of the Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary, and bid them God speed in the continuance of their good work.

The Rev. Bertram E. Brown made a verbal statement as Chairman of the Committee appointed by the last Convention to raise funds for the support and endowment of the University of the South.

The Rev. George W. Lay offered a resolution in regard to the matter under discussion, but withdrew it in favor of the following resolutions proposed by the Rev. Homer W. Starr, which, on motion, were adopted by the Convention:

Resolved. That in endorsing the principle of the Nelson plan for the endowment of the University of the South by its action last year, it was not the intention of the Convention to pledge the Diocese to the payment of its proposed share of the fund. Resolved, That it is matter of regret to this Convention that the Committee appointed to raise the sum of \$1,488 in support of this plan during the past year, have not succeeded in accomplishing this result.

Resolved, That a Committee be appointed by the Bishop to endeavor to secure this amount, or so much of it as may be possible, during the year 1912-13.

The Bishop appointed as members of the Committee called for by the last resolution, the Rev. Francis M. Osborne, Rev. Milton A. Barber, Rev. Thaddeus A. Cheatham, Messrs. Albert L. Cox, Finley L. Williamson, and J. Cameron Buxton.

The Rev. F. M. Osborne called for offerings in aid of the University of the South on account of the past year, and received a few pledges.

The Rev. George W. Lay offered the following resolution, which, on his motion, was referred to the Committee on Canons.

Resolved. That the Rules of Order as printed on page 39 of the Journal of 1911 be amended by inserting after "Calling the Roll" the words "A quorum being found present, in accordance with Article V of the Constitution, the Presiding Officer shall declare the Convention duly organized."

The Rev. Henry T. Cocke presented the following:

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE CHURCH.

Your Committee regret that it is impossible for them to make an accurate statement of the condition of the Diocese because of the dilatory way in which the clergy have made their reports. At the time of the sitting of the Committee there are twenty-four reports which have not been made. The Secretary of the Convention is of the opinion that the present Canon governing the making of the reports is partly responsible for the delay. With this in view, a resolution has been introduced as a part of this report, looking to the correction of this so far as any canonical requirement can remedy matters, but all such legislation must depend upon the loyal support of the clergy to be effective.

After comparing the statistics in hand with those of last year, the following results have been found: Increase in baptisms, 47; confirmations, 52; communicants, 304; Sunday-school teachers, 6; Sun-

day-school scholars, 258; Church property, \$42,791. Decrease in families, 117; disbursements, \$6,952.

Although these figures show that there is a forward movement in some of the activities of the Church, yet the Convention must be conscious of the congregations throughout the Diocese which having no settled ministers must depend upon the occasional visits of the Archdeacons for ministrations. In addition to these vacancies many fields within the Diocese are yet unoccupied by the Church. We believe that the interest of the Church could be fostered greatly by securing godly laymen to minister in these vacant Parishes and Missions until such time as a priest can be secured. And where the Mission, for any reason, is unable to secure the services of a priest. some layman should be appointed to do the work with the supervision of the nearest priest and the Archdeacon. This has proven most successful in the case of Mr. LeBlanc and Mr. Cuningham at We commend the State farm and Mr. Taylor at Roanoke Rapids. this to the thoughtful consideration of the Archdeacons, that by this means the Archdeacons may be relieved of much of their present work and have more opportunity of pushing the Church work into the unoccupied fields of the Diocese.

Your Committee wish to call attention to the indifference which is shown by the clergy in taking the proper canonical offerings throughout the year. In the last Convention this matter was presented for your consideration, and it was thought possible to help the conditions by appointing a Committee which should keep the Rectors of the Parishes and Missions informed of the canonical requirements, such resolution reading: "Resolved, That a Committee be appointed, resident at Raleigh, whose duty it shall be to prepare, print, and issue a quarterly statement giving the names of all congregations, and also, in parallel columns, all annual apportionments and the total offerings to date for the year for all purposes required and recommended." So far as your Committee can ascertain, these statements have not been made. Furthermore, for the development and unifying of the work of the Diocese your Committee do not believe that the present methods are adequate. The Episcopal visitation to the several Parishes and Missions, while intended to bring about a bond of union in the Diocese through the recognition of the duly appointed and chosen shepherd of Christ's Church, nevertheless falls far short of the ideal because of the extent of territory and the large number of congregations which the Bishop must visit. The present conditions make it hardly possible for the Bishop to do more than remain in each Parish long enough for the reception of the candidates for confirmation. Therefore, in order that some method be provided whereby the Bishop may be informed more exactly of the efforts of each individual in the Diocese and be enabled to lend aid in such instances as he shall deem his assistance advantageous, and further

that the congregations may feel more vitally their touch with the Bishop and be encouraged in taking their responsibilities systematically for the work of the Diocese, we have appended to this report resolutions which shall require an every-member canvass of the congregations throughout the Diocese for the purpose of pledging the individuals to the support of the entire work of the Church.

And that the Committee above mentioned as having been appointed under the resolution of the last Convention shall be made a permanent Committee of the Convention, designated as the Missionary Apportionment Committee, to which shall be sent annually a tabulated statement from the congregations, exhibiting the results of the every-member canvass and also the relation of each individual to the Parish by such remarks as shall be deemed fitting and proper. These statements should be kept on file that they may be referred to by the ecclesiastical authorities.

While we recognize that the perfecting of this system would require great effort and time, nevertheless it would be far reaching in its effects and greatly develop the effectiveness of the Church.

There is one other subject which should be called to the attention of the Convention. The work among our Colored brethren shows some encouraging features, as is indicated by the increase of 32 confirmations and 242 communicants over the report of last year. But the white congregations of the Diocese have not realized the grave responsibility which is imposed upon them by the existence of so large a number of people outside of the Church fold and yet at your very doors. Your Bishop has asked for the sum of \$200 to aid in this work, a request that is modest enough in all conscience. The amount reported as given during the past year by the white people is less than \$100. We believe that something should be done to place this work prominently before the Diocese. To this end a Special Committee was appointed at the last Convention which presented a resolution calling for an annual address and offering for the Colored work. Only seven Parishes have complied with this resolution. We therefore commend the resolution on the subject, which is appended.

We desire to submit to the Convention the following resolutions:

- I. Resolved, That Canon VI, Section 3, shall be amended by omitting the words not later than April 20th and inserting in lieu thereof the words immediately upon the close of the Convention year.
- II. Resolved. That a Committee shall be appointed annually, to be known as the Missionary Apportionment Committee, whose duty it shall be to promote the "Every-member Canvass" in the congregations of the Diocese, and keep on file tabulated statements showing the result of the canvasses for ready reference for the Bishop.
- III. Resolved, That it shall be the duty of the Missionary Apportionment Committee to prepare, print and issue a quarterly state-

ment, giving the names of all congregations, and also in parallel columns all annual apportionments and the total offerings to date for the year for all purposes required and recommended.

IV. Resolved, That the expenses of printing and mailing be paid by the Treasurer of the Diocese out of the Episcopal and Contingent Fund.

V. Resolved, That the Convention recommends that on one Sunday in each year the Rector of each Parish shall bring the work of the Colored Convocation before the people, and that a special offering be then taken up for the work; and that the Archdeacon of the Colored Convocation be directed to communicate to the Rectors such material pertaining to the needs of the Colored work in the Convocation as may be necessary for the promotion of the work.

The first resolution appended to the report was referred to the Committee on Canons. The first part of the second resolution, providing for the appointment of a Missionary Λ p-portionment Committee, was, on motion, adopted. The second part, requiring the filing of tabulated statements of the work of the committee was laid on the table.

The remaining resolutions were adopted.

The Committee called for by the second resolution was appointed by the Bishop as follows: The Rev. Milton A. Barber, Rev. Geo. W. Lay, Dr. Kemp P. Battle, Jr., and Mr. W. Watkins Robards.

Mr. Wm. L. London offered the following resolution, which was referred to the Committee on Canons.

Resolved, That a permanent Committee on Resolutions be annually appointed by the Bishop, consisting of two clergymen and one layman, and that all resolutions be referred to this Committee without unanimous consent.

The annual elections being in order resulted as follows:

Trustees of St. Mary's School: The Rev. Julian E. Ingle, Messrs. R. H. Lewis, M.D.; D. Y. Cooper, and R. H. Battle.

Managers of the Thompson Orphanage: The Rev. E. A. Osborne, Mr. J. G. Shannonhouse, and in place of the Rev. Wm. E. Cox, resigned, Rev. Chas. N. Tyndell.

The Rev. Francis M. Osborne presented the following report of the Committee on Church Work at Chapel Hill, which was adopted by the Convention:

The Committee of the Diocesan Convention appointed to assist in forwarding the work of the Church among the students of the University of North Carolina, note with gratification the fact that this important work which was a few years ago resting solely upon the shoulders of a weak Parish and the inadequate financial support of one of the Convocations in this Diocese, and, later on, upon the Chapel Hill Parish and the irregular and uncertain income from voluntary individual subscriptions from friends of the work throughout the State, has now become an accepted responsibility of the three Dioceses in the State of North Carolina. Especially is your Committee gratified to note that the apportionment made by our last Convention to take care of our share of the financial support has been cheerfully and fully met by nearly all of our Parishes and Missions, with the result that our Diocesan pledge to the work has been fully met for the past year. The delinquent congregations are all weak Parishes or Missions which have had some good reason for their failure.

At the Convention of 1911 your Committee was forced to report a deficit for the year ending at that time. The Committee was instructed to make solicitations of individual contributions and collect certain pledges made for this purpose in order to remove this deficit. A list of these contributions, amounting to \$55.15, is herewith appended for publication with this report.

In conclusion, we urge upon the Diocese the continued and faithful support of this great and valuable work, which your Committee regards as one of the strongest forward agencies of the Church in the State. We have been most fortunate in having as the incumbent of the rectorship of this Parish the Rev. Homer W. Starr. It would be bad taste, perhaps to speak in unrestrained terms of praise regarding Mr. Starr's fitness for this work, however much this praise

may be deserved. But we feel that it is due Mr. Starr and this Convention (because Mr. Starr is our representative in this work) to put on record our conviction that we have been providentially guided in securing a priest who is not only well fitted for this special field of service, but also devoted to the work to a degree which, under God's grace, insures bountiful results for His Kingdom. For this hope we thank God and bespeak the prayers of all in behalf of the work at Chapel Hill.

Your Committee recommends the appropriation of \$600 for this work for the ensuing year, and the same apportionment as that collected for the year just ended. The Committee asks the adoption of this report.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON FINANCE.

The Finance Committee begs leave to report as follows:

1. At the last Convention this Committee was authorized to make an apportionment upon the Parishes and Missions for Church work at the State University. The amount required was \$600. The apportionment was fixed at two per cent of Minister's Salary and Current Expenses. The result has been gratifying; the full amount has

been raised; and in most cases the Parishes and Missions seem to have responded cheerfully to this method of apportionment, which more and more commends itself to the mind and conscience of the Church. We, therefore, recommend that this Convention empower the Finance Committee to make this year the same apportionment of 2 per cent of Minister's Salary and Current Expenses for Church work at the State University.

- 2. We are looking forward to the time when something less than 12 per cent may be adequate to meet the demands of the Episcopal and Contingent Fund; but, for the present, it seems best not to disturb the normal condition, but to continue the assessment of 12 per cent upon Minister's Salary and Current Expenses for this fund. If Minister's Salary has not been paid in full, 12 per cent of the amount promised: if the Parish or Mission be vacant, 12 per cent of the amount previously promised. To find the basis of assessment for this year, refer to parochial reports in Convention Journal of 1911.
- 3. For special reasons, we recommend that Cuningham Chapel, Person County, Salem Chapel, Fairntosh, and St. Saviour's Chapel, Raleigh, be stricken from the tabulated list, that arrearages, if any, be remitted, and that no assessment this year be charged against these three.
- 4. We recommend that all arrears against Holy Comforter, Charlotte, be remitted, but that their assessment for this year be the usual 12 per cent. Also remit arrears against St. Luke's, Spray, and fix their assessment at \$12.50. Remit arrears against Epiphany, Leaksville, and fix the assessment at \$25. Remit all against Holy Trinity, Greensboro, and make their assessment this year \$121. The assessment upon St. Andrew's, Greensboro, shall be \$61.
- 5. We ask a continuance of the following special assessments: Smithfield, St. Paul's, \$15; Southern Pines, Emmanuel, \$20; Duke, St. Stephen's, \$25; Mayodan, Messiah, \$25; Littleton, St. Alban's, \$24; Roanoke Rapids, All Saints', \$10; Reidsville, St. Thomas, \$22.50; Charlotte, St. Andrew's. \$2.50; Charlotte, St. Mary's, \$5; Raleigh, St. Augustine's, \$25; Raleigh, St. Mary's School (voluntary), \$20; Cooleemee, Good Shepherd, \$12.
- 6. We recommend that the salary of the Secretary of the Diocese be increased to \$200 per year, and that the Treasurer be requested to pay this salary quarterly.

The Rev. J. B. Gibble, from the Committee on Unfinished Business, reported that there was no such business requiring action of the Convention. The Rev. Isaac W. Hughes offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

Resolved. That members of this Convention desire to express their most cordial gratefulness to the Rector and Parish of St. Philip's, their several hosts and hostesses, for the gracious kindness and most abundant hospitality accorded them during this session, and their high appreciation also of the courtesy manifested by the Press.

On motion of Mr. Wm. L. London the Secretary was authorized to have printed 1,000 copies of the Journal of the Convention.

On motion of the same it was ordered that the Convention of 1913 meet on Tuesday instead of Wednesday as heretofore.

Under a resolution of the last Convention, recorded on page 41 of the Journal, calling for the appointment of a committee to prepare a new edition of the Constitution, Canons and Rules or Order, the Bishop named its members as follows: The Rev. George W. Lay, Mr. Francis A. Cox, and Mr. Marshall DeL. Haywood.

The following resolution, offered by the Rev. N. C. Hughes, was referred to the Committee on Finance:

Resolved, That there be paid by the Treasurer of this Diocese to the Treasurer of the Missionary Department of Sewanee \$25 for expenses of the Council; \$125 for the traveling expenses of the Delegates from the Department to the meeting of the Board of Missions, and \$60 for the Department Sunday School Commission.

The Rev. George W. Lay offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

Resolved. That the Bishop be requested, and is hereby authorized. to appoint, at least two weeks before Convention, a Committee of three, whose duty it shall be to take such steps as may be proper and desirable for the more convenient and deliberate conduct of the elections in the Convention.

The Secretary laid upon the table the following report of the Diocesan Association of the Clergymen's Retiring Fund Society:

The Invested Fund of the Clergymen's Retiring Fund Society, which amounted at the last meeting of our Diocesan Association to \$311,500, has since been increased to \$317,000, with a large sum in bank awaiting investment. Of the amount distributed among the annuitants in November last, 5½ per cent came to our Diocese.

The Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese continues its generous contributions to the Fund. Thirty-nine of our clergy are enrolled as members of the Society, of whom sixteen are on the Retired list and receive the annuity.

Resolved. That the Convention recommends to all Christian people in the Diocese the practice of saying a short prayer at noon each day for the missionary work of the Church.

On motion of the Secretary the appointment of the time and place of the next meeting of the Convention was left to the discretion of the Bishop.

There being no further business before the Convention, on motion, the minutes of the day were read and approved, the Bishop closed the proceedings with prayer and the benediction, and declared the Convention adjourned *sine die*.

APPENDIX A.

ADDRESS OF THE BISHOP.

Brethren of the Clergy and Laity:

Eleven years ago we met for our eighty-fifth Annual Convention in St. Philip's Church, Durham; we are now met in St. Philip's Church, Durham, for our ninety-sixth Annual Convention. But how changed is the outward aspect of St. Philip's! The small framed building, which the few, who can remember it thirty-one years ago, regarded as a great achievement for our little band, has given place to this beautiful stone structure; and even this is hardly adequate to the needs of the growing congregation. This change indicates a wonderful increase in numbers and in material resources. and a corresponding increase in the power and opportunity of extended service. I am happy in the belief that this congregation is not wholly unresponsive to their increasing responsibilities, but that rector and people are endeavoring to bear their share in the work of extending God's Kingdom, both at home and abroad. May we all recognize the duty and the privilege of employing our growing strength and resources in developing the influence and work of the Church of God, whose interests we are now met to consider and to provide for.

It is my first duty to inform the Convention of the recent death of two of the oldest of our clergy, who have not of late years attended our meetings, on account of bodily infirmity, and both of whom resided out of the State, though they retained their canonical connection with this Diocese, the Rev. James B. Avirett and the Rev. James H. Williams. Mr. Avirett died at the residence of his son in Cumberland, Maryland, February 16th last, and Mr. Williams, whose residence, since leaving the Diocese, had been in the State of Virginia, died in St. Augustine, Florida, where he had gone to spend the winter, on the 6th of March.

They were both men who lived a good deal in the past, and who could not fully adapt themselves to the tremendous changes which had come after they had reached years of maturity. They had both spent the early years of their ministry in Virginia, though Mr. Avirett was a native of North Carolina, and they came to the work of this Diocese in their old age. But they were deeply attached to the Church, and they

were earnest and devoted laborers, even in their old age. Mr. Williams built the churches at Mayodan, Stoneville, and Mocksville, and was also helpful in building that at Elkin. They worked faithfully in their holy calling, amid many sorrows and trials, but we have every reason to feel assured that they had peace and light at the last. He is faithful who hath promised.

The total number of services in the Diocese for the year is one hundred and fifty-eight. I have administered the Holy Communion forty-three times; preached eighty sermons, delivered twenty-seven addresses, confirmed five hundred and fifty-four persons, consecrated five churches, ordained one deacon, baptized one adult and two infants, and officiated at three marriages and three funerals.

My labors were somewhat curtailed by the necessity of seeking treatment in a hospital upon two occasions, which took me away from the Diocese for about a month in all, and disabled me from active service for some weeks after my return home; though I am thankful to say that my general health has been excellent during the whole year.

My services beyond the limits of the Diocese have been as follows: May 1, 2 and 3. Delivered three lectures before the faculty and students of the General Theological Seminary in New York.

May 4. Delivered a lecture before the faculty and students of the Berkeley Divinity School at Middletown, Connecticut. The same day delivered one of the same course of lectures before the Theological School at Cambridge, Massachusetts.

June 4, Whitsun Day, I spent in Charleston, South Carolina. At 11 a.m., in the Church of the Holy Communion, I delivered the annual Commencement Sermon before the Porter Military Academy. In the evening, in Grace Church, I delivered a lecture on the Church in the Confederate States.

June 12th to 18th I was absent from the Diocese, attending the annual Commencement and meeting of the Trustees of the University of the South at Sewanee.

July 9. The Fourth Sunday after Trinity, at Nag's Head, in the Diocese of East Carolina, I officiated twice, preached, and administered the Holy Communion in private houses, there being no church building.

July 30. The Seventh Sunday after Trinity. In the Chapel of the Cross, Valle Crucis, District of Asheville, I administered the Holy Communion at the early service, and preached at the midday service.

August 13. The Ninth Sunday after Trinity. I preached in All Faith Church, St. Mary's County, Maryland, Diocese of Washington. October 24th and 27th. Delivered three lectures on the Church in the Confederate States before the Philadelphia Divinity School.

October 26th and 27th. Attended a meeting of the House of Bishops in New York.

October 28. SS. Simon and Jude's Day. In the Church of the Advocate, Philadelphia, took part in the services at the consecration of the Bishop and the Suffragan Bishop of Pennsylvania, and joined in the Imposition of Hands upon Bishop Rhinelander.

November 2, 4 p. m. In the Chapel at Ronda, District of Asheville, I held a short service and delivered a lecture.

November 10, 11 and 13. Delivered four lectures on the Church in the Confederate States before the University of the South at Sewanee.

November 14, 15 and 16. Attended the Missionary Council of the Fourth Department in St. John's Church, Knoxville, Tennessee 1912.

On the tenth day of January, in accordance with the sentence of an Ecclesiastical Court, I suspended for six months from all exercise of his ministerial function, the Rev. Clement

G. Bradley, rector of Calvary Church, Wadesboro, thereby dissolving his connection with the parish, *ipso facto*.

The fields of labor of the Clergy of the Diocese continue as

at our last Convention, with the following exceptions:

The Rev. Samuel Paxson Watters, after nearly fifteen years faithful service as rector of St. Matthew's Church, Hillsboro', felt compelled to retire from active service in October, 1911. He retains his canonical connection with the Diocese, but has been spending some months with a kinsman in Spartanburg, S. C. With his excellent wife he commanded the entire respect and affection of his people, and in the tender experiences of their leaving the parish which they loved, they had the happiness of seeing at the very last precious fruits of their life and labors. St. Matthew's, Hillsboro', continues without a rector, but the Rev. Chas. J. Ketchum, of the Diocese of Massachusetts, has been serving temporarily with much acceptance.

The Missions at Mayodan, Madison, Stoneville, and Knowlhurst, left vacant by the removal of the Rev. Mr. Berkeley, are still unsupplied with a permanent Priest in charge. The Rev. Mr. Willey, ordained Deacon April 21st, is

temporarily serving at Mayodan and Madison.

The Rev. Cyprian P. Wilcox, who assisted Mr. Berkeley in that work, is studying in the Seminary at Alexandria, preparatory to applying for Ordination to the Priesthood.

The Rev. Alexander C. D. Noe has taken charge of the

work at Mount Airy, Germanton, and Walnut Cove.

The most important work at Chapel Hill, after the departure of the Rev. Richd. W. Hogue, was taken up by the Rev. Homer W. Starr, who relinquished a very desirable parish in the Diocese of Chicago to come to us. I can not too cordially commend Mr. Starr to the support and sympathy of our people.

St. Timothy's Church, Wilson, vacant since the departure of Mr. Edwards, enjoyed for some months the ministrations of the Rev. I. J. Webber-Thompson, who agreed to remain with them until after Easter. The vestry have recently

called to the rectorship the Rev. Martin N. Ray.

The Rev. Robt. E. Campbell, D.D., received during the year from Southern Florida and transferred to the Diocese of Florida, had charge for a few months of Rockingham, Hamlet, and Laurinburg.

The Rev. Henry O. Nash, who had been serving Pittsboro', Sanford, and Gulf for some months was in July, 1911, transferred to this Diocese, but since the beginning of 1912, he has resigned that work, and is at present in the Missionary District of Spokane.

The Rev. Richd. W. Anderson, received from the Diocese of West Texas, has become rector of Trinity Church, Scotland Neck; serving also St. Mark's, Halifax, succeeding the Rev. Mr. Bradley, who left that field the first of June last.

The Rev. John J. Lanier, received from Alabama, has become rector of Emmanuel Church, Warrenton; serving also Williamsboro', and Middleburg.

The Rev. Jeptha H. Swann, received from Texas, has succeeded the Rev. R. Percy Eubanks as assistant in the parish of Christ Church, Raleigh.

The Rev. Mr. Eubanks has charge of Trinity Church, Statesville, and Grace Church, Lexington.

The Rev. E. Lucien Malone, received from East Carolina, has become rector of St. Paul's, Louisburg, and of St. James's, Kittrell.

The Rev. Winborn L. Mellichampe, returning from the Diocese of Georgia, has been put in charge of St. Paul's Church, Monroe, and St. Timothy's, Union County.

The Rev. William H. Hardin, received from Asheville, assumed with the beginning of the year 1912, the important duties of Archdeacon of Charlotte. Mr. Hardin resides in Salisbury, occupying the spacious dwelling known as the "Harrison House," in the western section of Salisbury, adjoining "St. Paul's Church, Chestnut Hill." This property belongs to the Diocese and by the action of the last Convention was put at the disposal of the Bishop for missionary Besides his general supervision of the missionary work throughout the Convocation, Mr. Hardin has special charge of St. Paul's and St. Peter's, Salisbury, and the very important work in Rowan County, including St. Mary's, St. Jude's, St. Matthew's, and St. Mark's chapels. The work at High Point also, having been given up by the Rev. Mr. Tolson, has been assigned to Archdeacon Hardin. It is my desire and purpose to give Archdeacon Hardin such assistance in this work as may enable him to make this property the centre of missionary activities extending throughout Rowan and into the neighboring counties. It is my hope that we may thus in a measure consolidate and extend the missionary endeavors of the late rector of St. Luke's, Salisbury, and perhaps establish here an appropriate memorial of the missionary zeal and efforts of that faithful Pastor and learned Doctor in the Church, Francis Johnston Murdoch.

And in speaking of the new Archdeacon of Charlotte, I must refer at least briefly to him who so long, so zealously, and so unsparingly gave himself to that work, and thus made it possible for his successor to enter so hopefully into the field. I refer, of course, to the Rev. Edwin A. Osborne, late Archdeacon of Charlotte. It was almost with friendly violence that I had to insist upon his cessation from his arduous labors last summer; and later in the year I accepted his resignation as Archdeacon, hoping that he might be induced to spare himself, and to continue his usefulness, by lessening the weight of his burden. I feel that truth and justice demand that I recognize and make this public acknowledgment of what he has been to the Diocese by his unceasing labors, and to his Bishop by his unfailing lovalty, sympathy, and support. For several years now his brethren of the Convocation have been resisting his efforts to resign his important post, and were won at last to consent by the consciousness that its burdens had become too great for his strength. Though nominally retired from active service he is still busily occupied in work for all about him in and near Charlotte; and especially the Thompson Orphanage is greatly advantaged by his intelligent zeal and unceasing exertions in its behalf.

The Rev. Albert New, an English Clergyman, recommended to me by the Lord Bishop of St. Albans, is ministering very effectively in Grace Church, Weldon, and has also under his charge the Church of the Advent, Enfield. He has not as yet been transferred to me, but is officiating in those churches under my license.

As noted in the preceding enumeration of services, I have during the year consecrated five churches, namely, at Rocky Mount, Smithfield, Ridgeway, Burlington, and Durham. The Church at Ridgeway was built long before the beginning of my Episcopate, and I had supposed until the past year that it had long ago been consecrated. I am not acquainted with the cause of the delay; but at the desire of the congregation I very gladly performed this service, and they joined

with much interest and devotion in the solemn setting apart

of the building to its sacred uses.

The Church at Rocky Mount is the most admirable example of the enlargement and remodeling of an existing building which has ever come under my observation, and the building was so entirely renewed and so enlarged that a service of consecration was thought most suitable, if not absolutely necessary.

The Church at Smithfield is the improvement and adaptation of a structure not heretofore consecrated, and affords a very comfortable and appropriate building for its sacred use.

The churches at Durham and at Burlington are beautiful stone buildings, and add greatly to the effectiveness of the work of the Church in these two important and growing communities. That in which we are now assembled is the fruit of the faithful labors and generous gifts of the parish of St. Philip's, Durham, and a credit to the zeal and liberality of

rector and people.

The beautiful stone church at Burlington, consecrated by the name of the "Church of the Holy Comforter," and presented to the Church by Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence S. Holt, is the first instance we have had in this Diocese of a large and handsome church, erected by the liberality of a single individual, as an expression of his sense of duty to God and to the Church, and a contribution to the permanent life and influence of the Church in the community. As such I desire to emphasize it, as an example of the wise and generous use of the wealth which through many channels has of late years been flowing into our State and Diocese. Of a similar character has been the generous act of a member of this parish of St. Philip's, Durham, in the erection of the beautiful stone chapel of St. Joseph's, to the glory of God and in loving memory of an honored father. These are examples which should excite our grateful admiration, and stir up the hearts of others to like uses of the opportunities afforded by the possession of wealth. Great fortunes and ample means, merely hoarded, and passed down to children, often become the means of enervating, debasing, and destroying those dear ones for whose supposed good they were accumulated. rich man should be content to confine his beneficence to his own family. He should endeavor to leave behind him some permanent memorial of his sense of his obligation to God

and to his fellow men. Churchmen of North Carolina can find many useful and noble opportunities of employing their zeal and liberality in establishing and providing for the maintenance of permanent institutions in connection with our parochial and diocesan work. We have not been without earlier examples of this same generous spirit on a smaller The late Judge Wm. P. Bynum, my old parishioner, at my suggestion, built, and presented to the Church St. Mary's Chapel, near the State Normal College, Greensboro, as with like generosity he had before given to the Rev. Mr. Osborne the money for the erection of the Chapel of the Thompson Orphanage; and he also made liberal bequests both to his parish and the Diocese in his will. It is to be hoped that the liberal gifts of these generous souls may encourage and direct others in the use of the means which God's good providence has enabled them to acquire.

The mention of the Thompson Orphanage reminds me of my recent act in laying the corner-stone of the first of the new buildings in a general scheme of buildings to replace the old and less suitable structures heretofore occupied. This corner-stone was laid April 23d, 1912, at the request of the Federation of Guilds, which has undertaken the erection of the building. The next day at the annual meeting of the Board of Managers order was taken for the erection of another of the proposed buildings. The proceeds of the legacy of the late Mr. Steadman, of Fayetteville, were appropriated for this purpose, and the building will be specially devoted to perpetuating his memory. It is hoped that others may be led to emulate the noble act of this good man, and that the whole scheme of improvements may at no distant day be completed.

There is another matter of importance, connected with the institutional life of the church in Charlotte, which I must bring to your attention, and in regard to which I should like to ask the approval of the Convention upon action which I have ventured to take.

The late Rev. Primus P. Alston developed, in connection with his parish school, an excellent industrial school for colored boys and girls, which has for a number of years been doing most admirable work, and giving the only practical and industrial training for colored youth to be had in that community. For the accommodation of this school he erected a large and excellent two-story brick building, cost-

ing some six or eight thousand dollars, entirely free from debt or encumbrance of any kind, and paid for by funds raised wholly by Mr. Alston's personal exertions and solici-There are six or seven teachers working in this school, the larger part of whose support was, during his lifetime, also raised by him. His sudden and unexpected death in October, 1910, left indeed this noble monument to commemorate his faithful labors, but it brought me face to face with the very difficult problem of providing for the continuance of the work. I could not think of abandoning it, and vet I hardly knew how to provide for its maintenance. I will not trouble the Convention with the details of the arrangements by which up to the present time the school has been kept open, and its admirable work sustained without material diminution. But one very radical measure I must lay before you, and ask your action upon it, that I may either proceed upon the course laid down, or else recall my action, and try some other expedient.

Knowing the high personal esteem in which the founder and late principal of the school had been held by the people of Charlotte in general, and the confidence which they felt in the excellence of his work, I determined to make an effort to place the school, in a manner, under the patronage of the people of Charlotte generally, and while retaining my connection with it as the official head of administration for its general interests and government, to call to my assistance able and influential citizens of Charlotte, interested in its welfare, and willing to cooperate in its support, without regard to their religious associations. I could not wait for action by this Convention, for the crisis demanded immediate decision. I therefore assumed the responsibility of calling together a number of the best and most representative of the progressive business men of Charlotte, some our own Churchmen, others not. I laid before them the situation, stating that the school was the property of the Diocese of North Carolina, the title held by the Trustees of the Diocese, but that the work it had been doing for twenty years or more was, as they well knew, for the benefit of the entire community, and that in no way had there been any religious test, discrimination, or requirement, though religious teaching was part of the regular work of the school. They knew the work it had been doing, and I asked them if they would

be willing to act with me as a Board of Managers for the general direction and maintenance of the school in the interests of both the white and the colored people of the conmunity. They responded most sympathetically to my appeal, and declared that, knowing the work which the school had done, they recognized it as a valuable and much peeded institution, and would gladly cooperate with me in an endeavor to perpetuate and to extend its usefulness. upon I proceeded to organize the "Board of Managers of St. Michael's Industrial School"; and we have been providing as best we could for it, and have so far kept it up. I will have a statement laid before the Convention, with the names of members of the Board above mentioned; and I ask the Convention to consider whether it can not endorse my action, and assent to the carrying on of the school under the arrangement I have made, until such time as it may see proper to take other action in regard to the use of this property, which is vested in the Trustees of the Diocese, and of which the ultimate power of control is in this Convention, subject to the trusts upon which it is held.

There are many other subjects of practical interest and importance upon which I would like to speak to you, and some in regard to which perhaps it is specially my duty to do so. But I must not too far impose upon your patience. I will therefore omit all but one other subject, and upon that I enter with strong reluctance, because I feel so deeply upon it that I am unable to make such a presentation of it as it

deserves and as I desire. That subject is

St. Mary's School, Raleigh.

This is by far the most important institution of the Church in our Diocese and in our State. Next after the University of the South at Sewanee it is the most important church institution in the South. It may not be generally known by our own people even, but it is one of the most important church institutions in our whole country. It is our largest church boarding school for girls in the United States, and on the whole I believe it is the best. It is important for what it has been, and for what it has done, for the characters it has formed, for the noble and ennobling lives which have gone out from it to bless the Church and the community. It is

important for what it is, and for what it is doing, in continuing that supply of cultivated, refined, devoted, godly young women, who every year go out from it, to enrich our home life, and sometimes to pass on the light to other lands. It is important in the mere material value of the property and appliances there accumulated for carrying on that highest and noblest of all work—the nurture and training of God's children in truth and holiness.

And St. Mary's School is prepared for extending and increasing its work as never before it has been. Moreover, it is now doing its work in every way admirably and successfully; and it is doing what very, very few institutions of higher learning ever do, it is supporting itself. The annual income is adequate to the annual expenditure of the school. But we have loaded it down with a debt. We are requiring it to pay nearly three thousand dollars a year interest on a debt incurred to put it in proper condition to do its work; and we also require it to pay several thousand dollars more in free board and tuition, as the interest on money given to found scholarships, which money has been invested in the property and equipment of the school. These expenses are no proper part of the expenses of a school. If we should today give St. Mary's School its equipment just as it stands, and provide it also with an endowment yielding the annual cost of its free scholarships, it would show a profit of three, four, or five thousand dollars on its year's work. is simply the financial situation of our noble school. doing its work admirably, successfully, profitably; but we have weighed it down with a burden which it should not have to bear.

There is first then this debt of forty-five thousand dollars, forty thousand dollars of bonded debt and five thousand of floating debt incurred for permanent improvements and necessary equipment, but carried upon the books as a debt of the school. There is also the annual expense of several thousand dollars in free scholarships, the interest upon money invested in the property and buildings of the school.

The burden of this indebtedness lies on the school, and it lies upon the hearts of many friends of the school. It certainly lies heavy upon the heart of your Bishop. Can we not lift it from our school? As long as it lies there it is not only a burden but a menace. I can not rest while it con-

tinues to threaten the present welfare and the future existence of what we have so worked for, and hoped for, and prayed for.

If God should spare my life until the 15th day of October, 1913, just about eighteen months from this time, I shall have completed twenty years since my consecration as your Bishop. The greatest work done in this Diocese within my day has been the establishment of St. Mary's School as an institution of the Church. I should like to celebrate the twentieth anniversary of my consecration by seeing the debt on St. Mary's School fully paid, or provided for, and one hundred thousand dollars raised as the beginning of an endowment. With the help of the Diocese, and with the sympathetic coöperation of this Convention, I should like to devote myself and my endeavors for the next eighteen months primarily to this work. I believe it can be done. Will this Convention join me in an earnest endeavor to do it?

In God's good providence I may be spared some years longer, or I may not. But when a man has been twenty years a Bishop he must know that his days of efficiency can not be greatly extended. I face this condition. By God's help I would like to do the best thing I can for His Church in the Diocese, where, by His permission, I have been called to serve. This is my mind and my humble, but I trust earnest, purpose. Would that I might have the grace and the power to fulfill it.

Mr. Owens, and the members of his congregation. Experience has shown that the success of the work among our people depends largely upon the care and sympathy received from the Parish of which it is rightly a part.

REPORT OF THE ARCHDEACON OF THE CONVOCATION OF RALEIGH.

To the Right Reverend Joseph Blount Cheshire, D.D., Bishop of North Carolina:

I respectfully submit the following report:

My official acts performed during the year ending March 31, 1912, were these:

The above includes services rendered at Milton, located in the Convocation of Charlotte, as also a few services held and addresses made by men who were acting as my substitutes.

The small number of celebrations reported might seem to imply some depreciation on my part of the importance of that Holy Sacrament. It is far otherwise; but there are local conditions in many of the places that I visit most frequently which have rendered the frequent administration of the Lord's Supper either impracticable or inexpedient.

Again, I would point out that the number of my official acts does not afford any accurate measure of my labors; much of my time and attention and travel has been devoted to the effort of trying to create or stimulate interest in the missionary work of the Convocation.

The situation within the Convocational bounds, as compared with that of the corresponding date last year, is more satisfactory, and the outlook is more promising. All the vacancies then reported have been filled, excepting Weldon and Enfield, and there is good prospect that they will secure a permanent Rector in the near future. Williamsboro has no Rector, but the Rev. Mr. Lanier of Warrenton gives to the congregation there regular, though infrequent, services.

The Rev. Harry O. Nash has left the Diocese, so leaving vacant Pittsboro, Sanford and Gulf. But Pittsboro has the promise of a minister at least for the summer.

Those Missions which have been undertaken since my installation into office are all regularly served. The Rev. Mr. Barber still fills monthly appointments at Clayton and the Rev. Mr. Bost at Holly Springs.

Last August Mr. LeBlanc went from the State Farm to assist the Rev. Mr. Brown in his work in Edgecombe County; but in a short time thereafter Mr. Herbert B. Cuningham took Mr. LeBlanc's place at the State Farm and has labored there with eminent diligence and acceptability.

Not only have many of the prisoners been brought to repentance and baptism, but it is the concurrent testimony of those who are in the various positions of responsibility at the Farm, that the whole tone of living among the prisoners has been notably elevated.

The Rev. Lucien Malone, who during the year has taken charge at Louisburg and Kittrell, has also become responsible for the Mission begun last year at Franklinton, and the congregation there under his leading have purchased a lot for a church.

Roanoke Rapids, which for many years has been appended to the work of other parishes or missions, has now a resident lay reader and catechist. Mr. Arthur W. Taylor, late in charge of the Inasmuch Mission, Philadelphia, has brought to the work in this aggregation of mill settlements considerable experience and great zeal and, withal, a newly wedded wife, who seems in the best sense a helpmeet for him in his labors in the Master's vineyard.

Throughout the past year I have given my personal service, with such regularity as seemed to me practicable, to Wendell, Lillington, Cuningham, and Milton; though my appointment at Lillington is only for fifth Sundays. At all these places the congregations are made up largely of our brethren of other communions. At Lillington and Milton the congregations are notably good, and the genuine cordiality of the welcome they extend is highly gratifying.

The special appeals I have made for financial aid (1) to purchase a horse and buggy for Mr. Nash for the work in Chatham County, and (2) to pay the salary of the Chaplain at the State Farm, have found ready and liberal response. The amount asked for the horse and buggy was paid in full in January, and Mr. Cuningham's salary has been paid to date with some balance still on hand. For this last purpose the several branches of the Woman's Auxiliary have given nearly a third of the whole salary promised.

I respectfully submit my report as Archdeacon of the Convocation of Charlotte, from the time of my assumption of the duties of the office, January 1st, to the close of the Diocesan year.

I have collected and remitted to the Treasurer the sum of \$95.75 for the support of the work of the Convocation, which amount is included in his annual report hereto attached.

While we are entering upon the new Diocesan year with a balance of only \$51.76, yet in going over the field I have endeavored to arouse our people to a keener sense of their individual responsibility in the matter of carrying forward the work of the Kingdom, both at home and abroad, and as an added stimulus to regular and systematic giving, it is my purpose to install the Duplex System in as many Missions as possible throughout the Convocation, and with the sympathetic cooperation of the brethren generally, of which I have been repeatedly assured, together with the personal gifts of our many friends who have so generously aided us in the past, as well as the various Guilds and Auxiliaries, for which we are profoundly grateful, I am optimistic enough to believe that we will not only be able to meet our present obligations, but greatly increase the scope and efficiency of our work.

During the past month a very neat and substantial metal roof has been put on St. Mary's Church, High Point, at a cost of approximately \$200, and as soon as the interior repairs are completed, the beautiful and Churchly little structure is to be consecrated.

The Hamlet congregation, though few in number, are teeming with enthusiasm, and have recently awarded the contract for a house of worship, to be completed within the next ninety days.

The Archdeacon, with the timely assistance of the Rev. Edwin A. Osborne, has been supplying this field—which includes Rockingham and Laurinburg—for the past few months; but it is hoped that a regular minister can be procured at an early date.

The congregation in Monroe are rejoicing over their very attractive new church building, which seems to have given an added impetus to the work.

The Rev. Henry A. Willey has been placed in temporary charge of the Mayodan field, and the work is progressing satisfactorily.

Last, but by no means least, I wish to make mention of the splendid work which is being done in the Cooleemee group of missions by our ever zealous and faithful missionary, the Rev. Simeon J. M. Brown. He has his forces well organized, and a movement is on foot to erect a Parish House at Cooleemee in the near future.

REPORT OF THE ARCHDEACON FOR WORK AMONG COLORED PEOPLE.

To the Right Reverend Joseph Blount Cheshire, D.D., Bishop of North Carolina:

Being appreciative of the guidance and protection of Almighty God during the Diocesan year just closed, I thankfully present to you the following report of my official acts:

I have made 74 visits to the different Mission stations of the Convocation; delivered 126 sermons and addresses; had 52 celebrations of the Holy Communion; conducted, in whole or part, 148 services, and baptized, in all, 10 adults and children. To do this it necessitated my traveling in the Diocese over 100 miles in vehicles and over 5,000 miles by rail, while an additional 1,000 have been traveled out of the Diocese.

From August 23d to 26th attended the tenth annual Convocation of the Archdeaconry for Work among Colored People in this Diocese, which convened in the town of Pittsboro, the proceedings of which have been recently published. Permit me to assure you that these annual gatherings in Convocation are growing in the appreciation of the Colored laity, and are fast proving to be, under your

fostering care, training schools for the Colored clergy in conducting intelligently the business affairs of the Church.

On September 3d preached a sermon within the walls of the State Penitentiary; one month from that day preached the opening sermon of the Colored Conference in Grace Church, Orange, N. J.

The active Mission stations of the Convocation, each of which, with one exception, I have visted from one to ten times, present a spirit of hopefulness that impels action, and notwithstanding the hindrances, more often from within than without, I regard both the temporal and spiritual condition of the Convocation to be better than at any time since I have been chosen to assist you.

With the assistance of the clergy, we have, during the year, conducted successful "missions" at Greensboro, Louisburg, Warrenton and St. Luke's, and it is my earnest hope that we may be able to secure means with which to do more of this form of evangelical work in the Convocation. There is also great need for the preaching of the gospel of sanitation among my people.

All thanks are due to the managers of the Carolina Churchman for aiding us to make known the struggles of the Colored Convocation, not alone to the Diocese, but to the Church at large. From every part of the Convocation I receive letters expressing appreciation for the help that is given the workers of the Convocation by the priests and congregations of the parish churches in whose midst they are laboring. Again are our hearts made glad that through the courtesy of the Principal of St. Augustine's School the Colored Clergy and parish school teachers of the Carolinas and the District of Asheville are invited to a conference at the School, to begin May 29th. For these and all evidences of your interest in us, we thank God and take courage.

REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL OF ST. AGUSTINE'S SCHOOL.

THIRTY-SIXTH ANNUAL REPORT OF ST. PETER'S HOSPITAL, CHARLOTTE, FOR THE YEAR 1911.

St. Peter's Hospital has had a larger number of patients this year than ever before, and the charity cases are also more numerous than for some years.

REPORT OF THE DIOCESAN SECRETARY OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY.

Right Reverend Father in God:

The past year has been an eventful one in the life of our Diocesan Branch of the Auxiliary, and a very busy and interesting one for its Secretary.

The great wave of missionary enthusiasm which for the past few years has been sweeping over the country has extended to our own shores; and in October we were called to Greensboro to unite with the women of other religious bodies in a great Jubilee Missionary Meeting.

In November the call came to attend our Missionary Department Meeting in Knoxville, where the delegates present formed an organization to be called "The Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions of the Fourth Department" (the Department of Sewanee). This was at the request of the Bishops of the Department, with the idea that the missionary work would be increased by further organization. As the next meeting of the Department is to be held in our own Diocese, the Secretary later made a visit to Charlotte; and, acting with the Diocesan President, called the women together and began to lay plans for the Auxiliary part of the great gathering which is to assemble there in the fall.

We feel encouraged by the increased interest of many of the Branches, as shown by their study and offerings.

One of our new departures has been the formation of Branches composed of girls and young married women too old for the Juniors and not identified with the parish Branches usually composed of older women. In Charlotte, Raleigh, Rocky Mount and Tarboro we have these Branches, and their interest and enthusiasm show the success of this movement.

We have laid special stress this year upon four objects on our Pledge List. We have increased the offerings for our Bishop's youngest daughter, who gave herself to the foreign field at the time

of our Silver Jubilee Meeting. We have paid the greater part of the endowment of a bed at St. Agnes' Hospital, Raleigh. We have assisted in the noble work being done by Mr. Cuningham among the prisoners at the State Farm. And we have taken a deeper interest in the beautiful work the Rector of this Parish has undertaken for the deaf mutes. The Secretary made a special visit to Durham in June to attend one of the impressive deaf mute services which are held regularly in this Parish.

We have heard—at our Missionary Department Meetings—that North Carolina is doing more work among the mill people than any other Southern Diocese, and the Auxiliary is especially interested in this work. The Secretary has spent between two and three months during the past year in the mill towns, devoting most of the time to Mayodan, where for half the year there has been no regular minister.

As one of the department editors of the Carolina Churchman, she has been enabled to keep in closer touch with the Branches, and has secured each month articles of interest relating to the various missionary objects for which we are working.

Perhaps the most important work undertaken during the year has been training more than three hundred children for the Mystery Play, which she has presented in Rocky Mount, Tarboro. Spray, Cooleemee, Lawrence, Raleigh, Mayodan, and Charlotte. This not only served to instruct the children and raise funds for the cause of Missions; it was an object lesson to our own people and those outside the Church, showing the beauties of the Christian religion as set forth in the Prayer Book, and also the obligation resting upon us to carry our light to the nations which are still in darkness.

AMENDMENTS ADOPTED 1910-1912.

CONSTITUTION.

Article III, Section 2, to read as follows:

SEC. 2. The Bishop of the Diocese, or in his absence the Bishop Coadjutor. or Bishop Suffragan, if there be one, or any Bishop in charge, as representing the Ecclesiastical Authority, shall, in the order named above, if present, preside at all meetings of the Convention, and shall appoint all committees unless it is otherwise ordered.

Article V to read as follows:

To constitute a quorum for the purpose of ordinary business the presence of one-third of the clergy entitled to vote, and of delegates from ten Parishes entitled to representation in the Convention, shall be necessary. Any less number shall be competent to receive reports and to adjourn.

Article VII, Section 1, to read as follows:

Section 1. The Convention shall elect annually a Secretary and a Treasurer.

Article IX, Section 4, in line 6: Instead of Parochial Clergy read, Clergy present and entitled to vote.

Article XIV, Section 1, line 7. After the word "present," insert "and entitled to vote."

CANONS.

Chapter I, Canon IX, is repealed.

See Journal 1911, p. 37.

After Section 4 add two sections, as follows:

Sec. 5. Any Parish which receives aid from the mission funds of the Diocese, and does not, for two consecutive years, pay its proportion of the salary of the minister serving it, shall be deprived of the right to vote in the Convention until such arrears be paid or remitted by the Convention.

Sec. 6. Any Parish or Mission which shall fail for three consecutive years to pay its assessment for the Episcopal and Contingent Fund, shall be deprived of the right to vote in the Convention until such arrears be paid or remitted by the Convention.

Chapter I, Canon V, amended as to read:

PRESIDING OFFICER.

In the absence of the Bishop of the Diocese and of any other Bishop who is qualified by the provisions of the Constitution to preside, the President of the Standing Committee, as representing the Ecclesiastical Authority, shall act as chairman of the Convention, unless the Convention itself should otherwise provide.

Chapter I, Canon VI, line 7. After the word *President*, insert the words of the Standing Committee.

Chapter I, Canon VII, Section 1. For the word "Trustees," in line 8, substitute "Convention," and after the word "bond" insert "to be approved by the Committee on Finance and."

Chapter I, Canon VIII. Omit first paragraph and change second so that it shall read:

SECTION 1. There shall be appointed annually, by the Bishop, or in his absence by the Presiding Officer of the Convention, a Committee on Canons, a Committee on the State of the Church, and a Committee on Education, each to consist of three clergymen and two laymen; also, a Committee on Finance, a Committee on Elections, and a Committee on Unfinished Business, each to consist of two clergymen and three laymen.

Chapter I, Canon VIII, Section 4. Strike out "Education Committee" and insert "Committee on Education."

Chapter I. Canon VIII. Omit Section 3 and renumber Sections.

Chapter I, Canon X, line 7. After the word "Diocese," strike out five (5) lines and insert in lieu thereof the words: "There shall be elected four alternate clerical and four alternate lay deputies, subject to the same provisions as the deputies above mentioned, to serve if any vacancies occur, in the order of their election."

Chapter I, Canon IX, is repealed and succeeding Canons renumbered.

Chapter I, Canon XII, Section 1. Strike out the words "as here-tofore, at twenty-five hundred dollars," and insert in lieu thereof, "at three thousand dollars."

Chapter I, Canon XIV, Section 1. Strike out line 11 and insert, "General Clergy Relief Fund: Annually."

Chapter I, Canon XIV, line 8. Strike out "Diocesan Education Fund," and insert, "Fund to Aid Candidates for Holy Orders."

Chapter III, Canon VI, Section 4, to read:

SECTION 4. The Parochial Reports, or such parts of the same as the Bishop may deem fit, shall be printed in the Journal of the Convention.

Chapter III, Canon VII. After the word "Vestry," in line 6, read: "Provided, that when there is no Rector or Minister in Charge, the consent of the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese, with that of the Vestry, shall suffice; and if there be no Vestry, the consent of the Ecclesiastical Authority with that of the Minister in Charge must be obtained."
