JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

The Ninety-seventh Annual Convention of the Diocese of North Carolina assembled in Calvary Church, Tarboro, on Tuesday, May 13, 1913.

Morning Prayer was said at 10 o'clock by the Rev. S. J. M. Brown, Rev. Harris Mallinckrodt, and Rev. W. L. Loffin.

The roll of Clergy and Delegates was then called by the Secretary and a quorum found to be present.

At 11 o'clock the Rt. Rev. Joseph Blount Cheshire, D.D., Bishop of the Diocese, celebrated the Holy Communion, in which he was assisted by the Rev. J. E. Ingle and Rev. I. McK. Pittenger, D.D., the Rev. Milton A. Barber preaching the sermon from the text, Acts iv, 19, 20: "But Peter and John answered and said unto them, Whether it be right in the sight of God to hearken unto you more than unto God, judge ye. For we can not but speak the things which we have seen and heard."

The offerings of the congregation were received for the New York Bible and Common Prayer Book Society.

The Convention assembled for business at 4 o'clock p. m., when it was called to order by the Bishop.

On the nomination of the Rev. Isaac W. Hughes, the Rev. Julian E. Ingle was elected Secretary of the Convention. The Secretary announced the appointment of Mr. Frank T. Ward as Assistant Secretary.

On motion, an invitation to honorary seats in the Convention was extended to all persons present who were Candidates for Orders, Postulants, or Lay Missionaries working in the Diocese under the direction of the Bishop.

The Rev. Dr. Pittenger presented the following

REPORT OF THE STANDING COMMITTEE.

The Standing Committee elected by the Convention of 1912 met on Wednesday, May 29, 1912, and was organized by the election of the Rev. I. McK. Pittenger, D.D., as President, and the Rev. A. B. Hunter as Secretary.

July 1st. Consent was given to the election and transfer of the Rt. Rev. Peter Trimble Rowe, D.D., to be Bishop Coadjutor of the

Diocese of Southern Ohio; for the Consecration of the Rev. Frank Arthur McElwain, D.D., as Suffragan Bishop of the Diocese of Minnesota; and to the Consecration of the Rev. Henry Sherman Longley, D.D., as Suffragan Bishop of the Diocese of Iowa.

September 2d. Mr. Frank T. Ward was elected a member of the Committee in place of Dr. Richard H. Battle, deceased. Edgar M. LeBlanc was recommended as a Candidate for Holy Orders with dispensation from all branches of learning not strictly ecclesiastical until his admission to the Theological Seminary which he shall attend or to Deacon's Orders, in accordance with the Canons, with the understanding that such studies shall be pursued along with his theological course. At an earlier meeting of the Committee consent was given for the election of a Bishop Coadjutor for the Diocese of Texas.

September 18th. Clarence G. Prosperi was recommended as a Candidate for Holy Orders with dispensation from the study of Greek until after his ordination to the Diaconate. William Hoke Ramsaur was recommended as a Candidate for Holy Orders. Approval was given to the appropriations made by the Bishop of money granted by the Board of Missions. The following resolution was adopted: "It is the sense of the Standing Committee that St. Andrew's Church, Greensboro, being reëstablished as a Parish of the Diocese, should, as far as possible, be placed in the position occupied before the union of the two parishes in 1910, and therefore the said Parish of St. Andrew's has the right to erect a church building upon the lot in Ash street purchased for that purpose a year or two before the said union."

November 29th. Consent was given to the Consecration of the Rev. William Farrar Weeks as Bishop Coadjutor of the Diocese of Vermont.

December 31st. Consent was given for the Bishop to authorize the Vestry of the Church of the Good Shepherd, Raleigh, to annul a mortgage for \$25,000 on its property, and to issue instead a mortgage for \$18,000.

January 2, 1913. Consent was given to the Consecration of the Rev. Theodore Ingram Reese as Bishop Coadjutor of the Diocese of Southern Ohio.

February 20th. Lewis N. Taylor was recommended to the Bishop for ordination to the Diaconate.

March 12th. The Committee gave their advice and consent to the Bishop for the ordination of Lewis N. Taylor to the Diaconate at any date not earlier than Easter Day, March 23d, of the current year.

April 19th. Israel Harding Hughes was recommended for ordination to the Diaconate, and recommendation was made to the Bishop to shorten the time of his Candidateship so that he might be ordained during the coming summer.

April 30th. Consent was given to the consecration of the Rev. Samuel Gavitt Babcock as Suffragan Bishop of the Diocese of Massachusetts.

The Bishop presented the following

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF THE DIOCESE.

The undersigned surviving Trustees of the Diocese of North Carolina have some difficulty in making the customary report to the annual Convention of the Diocese, on account of the death, in May last, of their co-trustee, Mr. Richard H. Battle, whose loss we all so deeply feel. He had for many years been Trustee of the Diocese before either of the surviving Trustees; and when they became associated with him in this position, they found that he was the custodian of all the papers and documents and the keeper of the records of the Trustees. Quite naturally and properly he continued in that relation to their work. How diligently and faithfully he performed his work as Trustee, the annual reports of the Trustees, prepared and presented by him to every annual Convention, and printed in our Journals, for more than a quarter of a century, amply testify. The protracted period of bodily weakness and disability which preceded his lamented decease, made it impossible for him to prepare a report to the Convention last year; and, the papers being all in his possession, it was not possible for his co-trustees to prepare one.

The undersigned submit below a compendious statement of their action as surviving Trustees since the death of Mr. Battle, and they call the attention of the Convention to the necessity of choosing some proper person in the place of Mr. Battle, to complete the number required by our Canon.

We venture to suggest that it might be desirable to make a small annual appropriation from the Contingent Fund for the employment of a secretary or clerk to the Trustees of the Diocese, whose duty it should be to keep an accurate record of all acts and proceedings of the Trustees, and also to make and keep an accurate list of all deeds and other documents in their possession.

The surviving Trustees have taken action during the past year in the following matters:

1. They have had a new roof covering of asbestos tiling put upon the Episcopal Residence, as ordered by the last Convention, but the work ordered to be done in the room over the Diocesan Library has not yet been attended to.

2. At the unanimous request of the Board of Managers of the Thompson Orphanage and Training Institution, and in accordance with the terms of the deed of trust under which the Trustees of the Diocese hold the title to the real estate of that institution, the surviving Trustees joined with the members of said Board of Managers

in making a deed, on the 30th day of October, 1912, to A. G. Brenizer for nine and twelve one-hundredths acres, part of the tract of land on which said Orphanage is situated, the consideration of said deed being the sum of \$6,000, paid to the Treasurer of the Thompson Orphanage and Training Institution.

3. On the 14th day of March, 1913, they executed a deed in fee simple to Mr. R. E. Lee, of Laurinburg, for part of the lot in Laurinburg on which St. David's Church is situated, in consideration of the execution by the said R. E. Lee of a similar deed in fee simple to said surviving Trustees for other lands adjoining said church lot. This exchange of property was of advantage to both parties, as it considerably enlarged and improved our church lot, while it increased Mr. Lee's frontage on a desirable street; and was earnestly desired and recommended by the minister in charge, by the members of the congregation, and by Mr. Mark Morgan, the generous donor of both the original lot and the church building.

4. On the 25th day of March, 1913, they conveyed the church lot in Sanford (reserving the right to remove the church building) to the "*William Belk Co.*," in consideration of the net sum of \$3,500, one thousand dollars being paid in cash and the remainder being secured by a note and mortgage on the lot. This was done at the request of Archdeacon Hughes, who is in charge of the church, and with the full approval of the local members.

5. On the 25th day of March, 1913, they purchased and received a deed in fee simple for another lot in the town of Sanford, from W. B. F. Johnson and wife, of Chatham County, for the sum of four hundred dollars of the purchase money of the lot sold as above stated. They also authorized the Treasurer of the Diocese to place the remaining six hundred dollars of last mentioned purchase money in the hands of Archdeacon Hughes, to be used by him in removing the church building from the old lot and reërecting it upon the lot just purchased.

The undersigned respectfully submit the following resolutions for the consideration of the Convention:

1. *Resolved*, That the action of the surviving Trustees of the Diocese, as set forth in the above report, be, and the same is hereby, approved and confirmed by this Convention, in each and every particular as therein set forth.

2. *Resolved*. That the Treasurer of the Diocese be authorized and directed to pay annually, upon order of the Trustees of the Diocese, the sum of twenty-five dollars from the Contingent Fund for the services of a clerk to said Trustees of the Diocese.

The resolutions appended to the report were, on motion, adopted, and the report was referred to a Committee consisting of Messrs. E. G. Muse, J. R. Donnell, and James Ker, Jr.

In the absence of the Treasurer of the Convention, his printed report was presented by the Secretary. (See Appendix C.)

The Rev. Sidney S. Bost presented the following

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON FINANCE.

The Finance Committee beg leave to report that the vouchers and securities of the Treasurer have been examined and verified according to his printed report—except with reference to the first item under head of Securities, which should be “Receipts from Bankers Realty Co.,” \$2,000.

The Treasurer’s report, rather more than usual, shows a gratifying and healthy condition. Under ordinary circumstances, it might be possible this year to reduce the assessment for the Episcopal and Contingent Fund to a basis of 10 per cent of Minister’s Salary and Current Expenses. But this is the year of the meeting of General Convention. It has been our custom to appropriate a sum to each of the four clerical deputies, in part payment of their expenses at General Convention. For this reason, it seems best to continue the assessment at 12 per cent of Minister’s Salary and Current Expenses. We recommend that this be done.

The report was, on motion, adopted.

The Bishop having, in accordance with a request of the last Convention, appointed a Committee, consisting of the Rev. Geo. W. Lay, Rev. R. P. Eubanks, and Mr. C. F. Clayton, to take such steps as might be proper and desirable for the more convenient and deliberate conduct of the elections in the Convention, the chairman submitted the draft of a new rule of order, as follows:

On the first day of the Convention, as soon as possible after it assembles, forms for nominations for all elective positions, except President and Secretary, shall be furnished each member on a printed blank. These blanks shall be collected on the afternoon of the first day of the Convention. All names of persons so nominated shall be reported to the Convention by the Secretary on the morning of the second day’s session in the form of a ticket on which they shall be printed in alphabetical order. After each list of nominations

there shall be left as many blank spaces as there are persons to be elected. These blanks may be used by any voter. The voter shall mark an X opposite the name of each person for whom he votes. On the first ballot these tickets only shall be used, and also in all subsequent ballots except when otherwise ordered by the Convention. If under any particular head more names are marked than there are places to be filled under that head, that part of such ticket shall not be counted, but such mistakes shall not invalidate the vote under the other heads on that ticket. If there is a failure to elect all the persons necessary on the first ballot, another ballot may be taken in the same manner. After the deputies to the General Convention have been elected, the alternate deputies shall be elected by ballot from those already nominated for deputies, and from such other names as may be proposed, using the printed ballot if convenient. The collection of ballots shall be called for by the presiding officer at such time as he may see fit, but the business of the Convention shall proceed while the ballots are being made out, and while they are being counted by the tellers. The report of the tellers shall be in order at any time when ready.

The rule of order was, on motion, referred to the Committee on Canons, who reported in favor of its adoption, and it was adopted.

The Rev. Geo. W. Lay, chairman of the Committee appointed in accordance with a resolution of the last Convention to prepare a new edition of the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese, making such verbal changes as should be found necessary to effect the orderly presentation of the Code, presented a printed list of proposed alterations, as follows:

In Article I, for *this Diocese*, read: the Diocese of North Carolina.

Article XII, section 1. Omit: *or Assistant Bishop*.

Chapter I, Canon X, line 5. Omit the words: *in accordance with Article II of the Constitution of the General Convention*.

Chapter I, Canon X, lines 10-12. Omit the words: *to serve if any vacancies occur*, and insert instead: *who shall succeed to vacancies in the original deputation*.

Chapter I, Canon XII, Section 2, line 5. Omit the words: *and of the Executive Committee*, and insert the word *and* after *Finance Committee*.

Chapter III, Canon III, line 1. Instead of *Wardens and Vestry*, read: *Wardens and Vestrymen*.

A copy of the revised form of the Constitution, Canons, and Rules of Order, as prepared for the press, but subject to

further amendment by the Convention, was laid upon the Secretary's table. The proposed alterations were, on motion, referred to the Committee on Canons, together with certain other amendments in both the Constitution and Canons which will appear in the report of that Committee.

Dr. Richard H. Lewis presented the following

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF ST. MARY'S SCHOOL.

The President of the Board of Trustees of St. Mary's School, Raleigh, submits the following annual report for the year ending April 30, 1913:

The funded debt of the School remains at forty thousand dollars, the interest on which is paid semi-annually out of the current funds

of the School, and therefore is not included in the above statement of the Treasurer. The balance of about five thousand dollars for permanent improvements mentioned in the report last year has since been paid from current funds of the School.

The internal administration and history of the School during the current year have been most satisfactory. The work of the School has gone on smoothly, effectively, and successfully. The health of pupils and of teachers has been good, and the rigid enforcement of sanitary regulations has warded off danger, threatened by reason of the prevalence of some minor contagious diseases, such as measles, etc., in the city of Raleigh. On the whole, we can congratulate ourselves and the Rector and officers of the School upon a most satisfactory year and the promise of continued prosperity.

The attendance during the year has been the largest in the history of the School, and even our increased accommodations were unable to meet the demands made upon them. After receiving all whom he could possibly provide for, the Rector had to decline applications for admission. The enrollment during the year has been 301 in all, of whom 187 were boarding pupils and 114 were day scholars. The average attendance of boarding pupils during the year has been 172; of day scholars 103. This is an increase of about twenty per cent over the attendance during the previous year, both in boarding pupils and in day scholars. It is believed that this year's experience fully justifies the policy of the Rector and the Board of Trustees in the expenditures made within the last few years in increasing the accommodations and improving the equipment of the School, even though in doing so it became necessary to incur the very considerable debt above mentioned. We can not but believe that the many friends of St. Mary's School and the members of the Church generally in the associated Carolina Dioceses will see the necessity and the great utility to the Church of coming forward promptly and generously and enabling the Trustees to provide for the speedy payment of the debt, and to make some adequate beginning in raising an endowment for the permanent establishment and security of so invaluable an instrumentality in the Church's work.

Perhaps the President of the Board should say on his own behalf that he has not been able to accomplish all he had hoped to do for the School during the past year. This has been more from his own inability to give his time to the work than from lack of sympathy or response on the part of those whom he had hoped to interest. He has received gratifying evidences of interest from most of those whom he has approached, and he trusts that he may yet be able to do something toward improving the financial condition of our institution in whose permanent welfare and success he is so deeply interested. He expresses not only his own feelings, but the earnest desire of all his associates on the Board of Trustees, in urging upon

the clergy and laity of the Carolinas the importance of general and generous sympathy in the work of St. Mary's School, and generous gifts for its maintenance and extension. We have in many respects the best and most successful Church school for girls in the United States, and we should take a proper pride in affording it every means and opportunity for further development and increased and permanent usefulness to the Church and to the country.

REPORT OF THE MANAGERS OF THE THOMPSON ORPHANAGE
AND TRAINING INSTITUTION.

The annual meeting of the Board of Managers of the Thompson Orphanage and Training Institution was held in the new residence of the Superintendent, Tuesday, April 22d, the Bishop of the Diocese presiding.

The annual reports of the Superintendent and Treasurer, Rev. Walter J. Smith, and Mr. J. G. Shannonhouse, Trustee of the Endowment Fund, with auditor's certificates attached, were read and accepted.

Rev. Edwin A. Osborne, having been appointed a committee of one to sell a portion of the land belonging to the Institution, reported that he had, with the consent of the Executive Committee, sold a lot of land on the lower southwest corner of the tract, for six thousand dollars cash, which is accounted for in the report of the Treasurer of the Endowment Fund, and will be used for the improvement of the property, according to the terms of the deed of trust under which the property is held.

He also reported that he had, with the concurrence of the Building Committee, procured the building of a residence for the Superintendent, at a cost of \$6,671.43.

From the Superintendent's report it appears that the Drainage Committee has completed a fine drainage canal through the entire property from north to south, which greatly enhances the value of the bottom land for farming purposes, and also the health conditions of the entire community.

It further appears, from the same report, that the financial condition of the Institution is most satisfactory. This arises from the

fact that the contributions from various sources during the year have been unusually liberal, and also from the further fact that, notwithstanding some untoward circumstances, the financial results from the farm have been larger than usual.

The Superintendent's residence, which has just been completed, is a handsome and substantial structure, thoroughly equipped with all modern conveniences.

Work on the first of the six cottages is progressing satisfactorily, and it is hoped that the building will be ready for occupancy in the near future.

The sanitary conditions are excellent, and the children appear to be happy and well provided for.

The Rev. Mr. Smith and his efficient co-workers deserve the utmost commendation for their zeal and faithfulness to duty.

It further appears from the report of Jos. G. Shannonhouse, Endowment Treasurer, that the permanent investments of this Institution amount to \$16,487.47.

The report was referred to a Special Committee consisting of the Rev. Bertram E. Brown, Rev. E. Lucien Malone, Messrs. Isaac H. Smith, and Wm. L. Wall.

The Archdeacons of the Convocations read their annual reports in order: The Rev. Wm. H. Hardin, of Charlotte; the Rev. N. Collin Hughes, of Raleigh; and the Rev. Henry B. Delany, D.D., of the Convocation of Colored People.

On motion of the Rev. A. B. Hunter, who presented the reports of the Principal of St. Augustine's School and of St. Agnes' Hospital, these reports, with those of the Archdeacons, were referred to the Committee on the State of the Church. (See Appendix B.)

The Editor and Business Manager of the *Carolina Churchman* made his annual report, as follows:

The Convention of the Diocese of North Carolina appointed a Committee to make plans for the continuation of the publication of the *Carolina Churchman*, which previous to that time had been the joint undertaking of the Dioceses of North Carolina and East Carolina and the District of Asheville. At the St. Mary's Conference in June, 1911, the Committee met with the Bishop and appointed the present incumbent to the combined office of Editor and Business Manager. The appointee received his instructions to proceed with the publication of the paper, which he did, and in August, 1911, the paper appeared under the new management, the time for the publication of the July number having passed before he received his appointment.

The Committee appointed seemed to come to an agreement on three things: (1) That the paper was to appear monthly and cost one dollar for the year; (2) that the Editor and Business Manager should receive a proper compensation for his services, and (3) that the Convocation of Charlotte, the Convocation of Raleigh, and the Thompson Orphanage be jointly and equally responsible for the financial support of the paper. Feeling that this assumption of financial responsibility by the two Convocations and the Orphanage called for a report to these institutions, the Editor and Business Manager made a financial report in October last, covering the period of his appointment, namely, fourteen months. In response to this report the two Convocations above mentioned fixed the salary of

the Editor and Business Manager at \$12.50 a month, and suggested that if, after six months, receipts should justify the step, that it should be made \$25, declared the paper as now run to be satisfactory, made appropriations to meet the financial deficit, instructed the Editor to make an annual report to this Diocesan Convention, and gave directions regarding the auditing of the books of the Business Manager.

In compliance with the above mentioned direction with reference to a report annually to this Diocesan Convention, a financial and statistical report of the paper for the twenty-one months which it has been under our management is herewith appended. The report covers twenty-one months, inasmuch as no report has been made to this Convention since its action in 1911, in providing for the carrying on of this publication.

[The Financial Statement having been audited and found correct, its insertion here is not deemed necessary.—SECRETARY.]

The Editor and Business Manager ventures to suggest that he occupies a rather anomalous position in that he is the appointee of one body (the Diocesan Convention) and financially responsible to three others (namely, the Convocations of Raleigh and Charlotte and the Thompson Orphanage). This matter could be adjusted by making the office one of annual appointment by a standing committee of the Diocesan Convention and providing for an annual appropriation by the Diocese for its support. Such a method would better insure the quality of the paper published and also guard against the possible failure of any one of the three financial constituents to support the paper, and relieve the Editor of the responsibility of having to settle the whole question of expenditure and policy.

The Editor has been trying by many methods to increase the circulation of the paper, but has made little progress in this matter, mainly, he believes, because it must be done largely through the clergy, and our clergy have so many things to push forward that little time can be given to this. Such work must be done by a special agent or representative. The condition of our finances does not now justify advancing the Editor's salary to more than the present \$12.50 a month, but if a special agent could be secured for a month or six weeks to work up delinquents and secure new subscriptions, the Editor believes that this expense would be justified by its results.

Finally, the Editor wishes to acknowledge his appreciation of the help of the editors of the various departments of our paper and the special contributors who have been mainly instrumental in making the *Carolina Churchman* what it is. It is not possible to mention all the special contributors, but the departments of our paper are being edited as follows: The Convocation of Raleigh—the Rev. N. Collin Hughes; the Convocation of Charlotte—the Rev. Wm. H.

Hardin; the Convocation of Colored Work—the Rev. Henry B. Delany, D.D.; the Sunday School Work—the Rev. Homer W. Starr; the Woman's Auxiliary—Miss Kate Cheshire; the District of Asheville—Rev. Theodore Andrews; the Thompson Orphanage—Rev. Walter J. Smith.

The Editor begs that a committee be appointed to consider this report.

The Rev. N. C. Hughes offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Deputies of this Diocese to the approaching General Convention be instructed to present to the House of Bishops a memorial from this Convention, requesting them to give to the Church an official interpretation of the final rubric in the Order of Confirmation.

On motion of the Rev. Geo. W. Lay, the resolution was laid upon the table.

The Convention then adjourned to meet at 9:30 o'clock on Wednesday morning.

After Evening Prayer at 8 o'clock, addresses on Mission Work in the Diocese were made by the Rev. Dr. Delany, Rev. Henry A. Willey, and Messrs H. S. Hartzell, Arthur W. Taylor, and Dr. J. H. Pratt.

SECOND DAY.

CALVARY CHURCH, TARBORO,

WEDNESDAY, May 14, 1913.

The Convention met pursuant to adjournment.

The Holy Communion having been celebrated at an earlier hour by the Rev. Wm. H. Hardin, assisted by Rev. Harris Mallinckrodt, Morning Prayer was said by the Rev. Walter J. Smith and the Rev. R. P. Eubanks.

The Convention was then called to order by the Bishop.

The minutes of yesterday were read and approved.

On motion of Mr. G. Pollok Burgwyn, the Treasurer was instructed to pay the traveling expenses of Messrs. Arthur W. Taylor and Howard S. Hartzell, lay mission workers in the Diocese, in attendance on the Convention.

The Rev. Mr. Starr presented the following

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON ELECTIONS.

The Committee on Elections offer the following resolution:

Resolved. That the following lay delegates, whose election did not conform to the technical requirements of the Canon, be, for reasons satisfactory to the Committee, recognized as delegates and admitted to seats in this Convention: Messrs. Bennett Nelme, of All Saints, Ansonville; O. C. Klingman, of St. Andrew's, Greensboro, and J. L. Martin, of the Church of the Messiah, Mayodan.

HOMER W. STARR,

The resolution was adopted, and Messrs. Klingman and Martin appeared and took their seats.

The Bishop read his Annual Address. (See Appendix A.)

The Rev. Dr. Pittenger presented the following

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CANONS.

Amendments to the Canons, coming over from the last Convention:

REPORT No. 1. *Resolved.* That Chapter I, Canon XIV, Section 1, of the Canons of the Diocese, be amended by omitting from the list of Canonical Offerings, "Fund to Aid Candidates for Holy Orders" and "Theological Department at Sewanee."

The Committee on Canons have considered carefully the amend-

ment proposed in the above resolution, and do not think the change expedient.

[A vote being taken on the resolution, the amendment was lost.—SECRETARY.]

REPORT No. 2. *Resolved*, That Chapter I, Canon XIV, Section 3, be amended by omitting the words *or other proper officers*, in line 3, and inserting in lieu thereof the words: who shall remit promptly to the other proper officers.

The Committee on Canons are unanimous in the opinion that the amendment proposed in the above resolution would be inexpedient and unwise.

[The resolution was not adopted.—SECRETARY.]

REPORT No. 3. *Resolved*. That Chapter III, Canon VI, Section 3, shall be amended by omitting the words, *not later than April 20th*, and inserting in lieu thereof the words: Immediately upon the close of the Convention year.

The Committee on Canons are of the opinion that this amendment would not accomplish the object sought by the mover, and offer the following as a substitute:

Resolved. That Chapter III, Canon VI, Section 3, be amended by substituting for *not later than April 20th*, the words: at the close of the month of March.

[The substitute was, on motion, adopted.—SECRETARY.]

REPORT No. 4. *Resolved*, That the Rules of Order as printed on page 39 of the Journal of 1911 be amended by inserting after "Calling the Roll," the words: A quorum being found present, in accordance with Article V of the Constitution, the Presiding Officer shall declare the Convention duly organized.

The Committee on Canons unanimously recommend the adoption of the proposed amendment.

[The resolution was, on motion, adopted.—SECRETARY.]

REPORT No. 5, a resolution offered by Mr. W. L. London.

Resolved. That a permanent Committee on Resolutions be annually appointed by the Bishop, consisting of two clergymen and one laymen, and that all resolutions be referred to the Committee without unanimous consent.

The Committee on Canons have carefully considered the above resolution and are clearly of the opinion that while the object of it was to expedite the business of the Convention, the effect would be to retard or obstruct it.

[The resolution was not adopted.—SECRETARY.]

REPORT No. 6. The following verbal changes in the Constitution and Canons are proposed by the Committee of Revision:

CONSTITUTION.

Article I. For *this Diocese*, read: the Diocese of North Carolina.
Article XII, Section 1. Omit *or Assistant Bishop*.

CANONS.

Chapter I, Canon X, line 5. Deputies to the General Convention shall be elected *in accordance with Article II of the Constitution of the General Convention*. Omit these words, which are no longer applicable.

Chapter I, Canon X, lines 10-12. Alternate Deputies are elected *to serve if any vacancies occur in the order of their election*. Change this so as to read: who shall succeed to vacancies in the original deputation in the order of their election.

Chapter I, Canon XII, Section 2, line 5. Omit the words *Executive Missionary Committee* and adjust the sentence, as the Committee no longer exists.

Chapter III, Canon III, line 1. Instead of *Wardens and Vestry*, read: Wardens and Vestrymen.

The Committee on Canons unanimously recommend the adoption of these amendments in the Constitution and Canons.

[The amendments being separately considered and voted on, were approved and adopted, the changes in the Constitution being subject to the action of the next Convention.—SECRETARY.]

OTHER AMENDMENTS OFFERED BY THE COMMITTEE ON REVISION.
CONSTITUTION.

REPORT No. 7. Article III, Section 2. The Bishop of the Diocese, or in his absence, the Bishop Coadjutor, or Suffragan Bishop, if there be one, or any Bishop in charge, as representing the Ecclesiastical Authority, shall, in the order named above, if present, preside at all meetings of the Convention, and shall appoint all Committees unless it be otherwise ordered.

Change this so as to read: The Bishop of the Diocese shall have a seat and vote in the Convention, and shall be its presiding officer. The Bishop Coadjutor, if there be one, shall also have a seat and vote in the Convention, and in the absence of the Bishop of the Diocese shall preside. If there be no Bishop or Bishop Coadjutor of the Diocese in attendance upon the Convention, a President *pro tempore* shall be elected by ballot from among the clerical members of the Convention.

The Committee on Canons unanimously disapprove of the proposed amendments.

[A vote being taken by the Convention, the amendment was not adopted.—SECRETARY.]

REPORT No. 8. Article III, Section 4. Omit the words: *Provided*, that in case there shall be no male Communicants in said Parish, the Vestry shall have power to elect one or more delegates, not exceeding four, qualified as above, from any other Parish or Parishes of the Diocese.

The Committee on Canons deem the amendment inexpedient.

[The amendment was not adopted.—SECRETARY.]

REPORT No. 9. Article X, Section 2, line 7. The Rector is entitled to call meetings of the Vestry or congregation; "when present, to preside in the same, and in case of a tie, to give the casting vote." Change this so as to read: and when present to preside and vote in the same.

The Committee on Canons deem the proposed amendment inexpedient.

[The amendment was not adopted.—SECRETARY.]

CANONS.

REPORT No. 10. Chapter I, Canon V. "In the absence of the Bishop of the Diocese and of any other Bishop qualified by the provisions of the Constitution to preside, the President of the Standing Committee, as representing the Ecclesiastical Authority, shall act as Chairman of the Convention, unless the Convention itself shall otherwise provide."

Resolved, That Chapter I, Canon V, be repealed.

This amendment was offered in case the amendment to the Constitution proposed in Report No. 7 should be adopted. That amendment having failed of adoption no action on this one is necessary.

REPORT No. 11. *Resolved*. That Chapter I, Canon VIII, be amended by the addition of two new sections, as follows:

SEC. 7. *Committee on New Parishes*.—All applications for the admission of Parishes or Organized Missions into union with the Convention of the Diocese shall be referred to the Committee on New Parishes, whose duty it shall be to ascertain whether they conform to the requirements of the Canons; and on their report that such is the case, the Parish or Mission so applying may be received by vote of the Convention, and its delegates admitted to seats.

SEC. 8. *Committee on Elections*.—It shall be the duty of the Committee on Elections to report to the Convention on all matters referred to them in regard to the claims of delegates to seats and votes in the same.

The Committee on Canons unanimously recommend the adoption of the above proposed amendment.

[The resolution was, on motion, adopted.—SECRETARY.]

REPORT No. 12. *Resolved*. That Chapter III, Canon I, be amended by adding at the end of line 2 the words: for any number of persons, including at least ten communicants, who intend to be supporters of the Parish—.

The Committee on Canons unanimously recommend the adoption of this amendment.

[The amendment was adopted.—SECRETARY.]

REPORT No. 13. The following amendment of the Constitution, adopted by the last Convention, is presented by the Committee on Canons for ratification:

Resolved. That Article IX, Section 3, of the Constitution be amended by omitting the words, *males of twenty-one years, members of the Parish*, and inserting in lieu thereof the words: Members of the Parish of the age of twenty-one years.

[A vote by Orders on the resolution resulted as follows: Clergy—ayes 17; nays 23. Parishes—ayes 8; nays 8; divided 2. The resolution therefore failed of adoption.—SECRETARY.]

The Convention then took a recess.

WEDNESDAY, May 14, 1913, 4 P. M.

The Convention resumed its session, the Bishop in the chair.

The Rev. J. B. Gibble offered several amendments to the Constitution and Canons, which, on motion, were referred to the Committee on Canons.

Mr. Chas. H. Boyer, in behalf of the Colored churchmen of the Diocese, presented to the Bishop and Convention the following Memorial:

To the Right Reverend Joseph Blount Cheshire, D.D., Bishop of the Diocese of North Carolina, and to the Clergy and Laity in Diocesan Convention assembled, the Colored Churchmen send greeting through us, their representatives:

(a) WHEREAS, the efforts of the Church are more and more directed towards the necessity of a greater interest manifested for the salvation of the nearly ten million (10,000,000) negroes in this our country;

(b) AND, WHEREAS, the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America realizes fully what the moral, religious and educational standard should be, for the betterment of the colored race;

(c) AND, WHEREAS, the Church is contemplating seriously what is the best thing to do in order to set forth her true position, and at the same time to maintain her catholic spirit with respect to the apparently perplexed situation in dealing with the colored people;

(d) AND, WHEREAS, we, the colored churchmen in the Diocese of North Carolina, deplore any effort looking toward severing that friendly and godly relation which has always existed in this Diocese, and which has been fostered from time to time by this Convention, and further cemented by the disposition of our beloved Bishop and Father in God, the Right Reverend Joseph Blount Cheshire, he having strenuously defended our cause when we were helpless to defend ourselves;

(e) AND, WHEREAS, we, the colored churchmen in the Convocation of this Diocese, feel keenly the disposition of white churchmen in general throughout the greater part of the Southland in their dealings with colored churchmen, to separate them from the corporate body of the Church;

(f) AND, WHEREAS, the Seventh Missionary Department, comprising the States of Texas, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Kansas, Missouri, and Arkansas, has decided to petition the General Convention next October, requesting that body to set apart the colored work in that vast territory as a *Missionary Jurisdiction* for the colored people, and the appointment of a colored priest as Bishop;

(g) AND, WHEREAS, we feel that such a step taken by the General Convention at the request of one or more of the missionary departments, would in a few years prove of the utmost satisfaction to the whole Church, yet, in the said Seventh Department, we feel that the result would be a failure for the following reasons:

(1) In that vast district there are only *nine* colored ministers, and the difficulty of exerting the Church's influence in any marked degree would be of too long standing to warrant the Church's continuation of her fostering care.

(2) Success would be more immediate if either the Third or Fourth Missionary Department could be set aside for the trial jurisdiction. In the former there are thirty-three (33) colored clergymen, and in the latter fifty-two (52) clergymen. One of these departments is the logical and most reasonable place for a trial, if, in the judgment of the Church it is thought advisable.

Therefore, be it resolved. That we, the colored churchmen in the Diocese of North Carolina, in consideration of the facts above stated and the accompanying statistics, do earnestly and respectfully request our Bishop and this Convention to advocate the setting apart of a Negro Jurisdiction in the Fourth Missionary Department, and that they take the initiative in securing the coöperation of the other Bishops in this department, notably the Bishops of East Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, Atlanta, and Mississippi, and that you and they ask the General Convention assembling in New York next October to set apart the colored work in the said Fourth Department as a Missionary Jurisdiction, with the consecration of a Negro clergyman as Bishop.

COMPARATIVE STATISTICS OF THE THIRD, FOURTH, AND SEVENTH
MISSIONARY DEPARTMENTS.

It has been proposed to make the Seventh Department a Missionary District for the colored people of the Church.

The Seventh Department has 9 ministers, 18 congregations, and 1,124 communicants.

Taking the southern section of the Third Department, consisting of Virginia, Southern Virginia and West Virginia, there are 14

priests and deacons and 1 archdeacon; in the northern section, including Washington, Delaware, Maryland and Pennsylvania, there are 17 ministers and deacons and 1 archdeacon.

There are:

The Fourth Department has 47 ministers and deacons and 5 archdeacons, and communicants distributed as follows:

These figures would be materially increased if this year's annual reports were all in and available.

Now it would seem that the best place to put this very important and vital plan on trial would be in the place where the Church is strongest. In comparing the Seventh Department with the lower section of the Third Department, the Virginias, there are 6 more ministers and 1,059 more communicants than are in the Seventh. If the entire Third Department be taken into account, there are 24 more ministers and 4,910 more communicants than are in the Seventh.

As to the Fourth Department, there are 43 more ministers and deacons—among whom are 5 archdeacons—and 5,308 more communicants than there are in the Seventh Department.

Again, the Seventh Department is a much weaker field in that its 1,124 members are spread over a territory 201,530 square miles

larger than is the territory of the Fourth, which contains 5.7 times as many communicants. Besides this, the great bulk of the Negro population lives in the Fourth Department.

Therefore, as the greatest numerical strength of the Church among Negroes lies in this department, and as the masses of the people whom it is desired to reach live in this territory, it would seem that the most logical field for the establishment of a Missionary District is the Fourth Department.

Therefore, beloved Bishop, and fellow members of this Convention, both clergy and laity, we earnestly request you to favor this movement and to use your kindly influences in the General Convention next October to accomplish this purpose, which we do most sincerely believe will work great good for the growth of the Church among our people.

The Committee on New Parishes beg leave to report that having considered the applications of St. John's Mission, Wake Forest, and St. Luke's, Spray, to be admitted into union with the Convention as Organized Missions, they find that all requirements have been complied with, and offer the following resolution:

Resolved, That St. John's Mission, Wake Forest, and St. Luke's Mission, Spray, be admitted into union with the Convention of the Diocese.

The resolution was adopted, and Mr. Priestly H. Mangum, of St. John's, Wake Forest, thereupon appeared and took his seat as a delegate from the Mission.

The Rev. N. C. Hughes presented the following report:

The Committee to whom was referred the report of the Editor and Business Manager of the *Carolina Churchman*, upon consideration of that report and in consultation with the Rev. Mr. Osborne, respectfully submit the following resolutions:

1. That the *Carolina Churchman* be hereby recognized and accepted as the Organ of the Diocese.

2. That there be annually appointed by the Convention a standing committee of three, consisting of one clergyman and two laymen, who shall be empowered to appoint the Editor and Business Manager of the paper, and also to have charge of all matters pertaining to the proper conduct of the paper.

3. That the Diocese assume in the last resort financial responsibility for the support of the paper, and that the Treasurer of the Diocese be and is hereby instructed to pay out of the Episcopal and Contingent Fund, from time to time, any accrued deficit in the cost of publication, not in excess of \$500 per annum, upon the order of the said Committee.

Dr. C. H. Herty made a statement in regard to the General Clergy Relief Fund, and moved the appointment of a Committee of five who should promote its interest in the Diocese. On motion of Dr. R. H. Lewis, Dr. Herty was made chairman of this Committee, and the Bishop appointed to serve with him, Messrs. Thos. H. Battle, Finley L. Williamson, Dr. R. H. Lewis, and F. M. Shannonhouse.

The Rev. A. B. Hunter presented the following report:

The Special Committee to whom was referred the report of the Trustees of St. Mary's School, beg leave to report as follows:

They congratulate the School upon the largest attendance in its history, upon its good health and good discipline.

The Diocese will remember that the Bishop last year proposed as a commemoration of his twenty years in the Episcopate to raise a fund which should cancel the \$40,000 debt of St. Mary's School and pro-

vide the beginning of an endowment fund. Your Committee are of the opinion that with his many cares this task should not be placed upon the Bishop, even if self-imposed. To cancel the debt and raise an endowment fund is a most urgent duty for the Diocese to undertake, and this duty ought to be undertaken by laymen who are deeply interested in the progress of the School. Your Committee would therefore recommend the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That a Committee be appointed by the Bishop to undertake the raising of a fund to cancel the debt of St. Mary's School and to begin an endowment fund, as a commemoration of the blessings attending the labors of our beloved Bishop in connection with the acquisition of the St. Mary's School property in 1897 and its progress since that time.

The Bishop presented to the Convention the following statement and resolution:

WHEREAS, there has been some uncertainty as to the persons properly elected Managers of the Thompson Orphanage and Training Institution from East Carolina; and,

WHEREAS, the Bishop of East Carolina has nominated the persons named below for Managers of said Institution: therefore,

Resolved, That the Rev. Wm. E. Cox and Mr. F. R. Rose be declared duly elected Managers of the Thompson Orphanage and Training Institution for the term ending in the year 1914.

The resolution was adopted.

The Convention then adjourned to meet on Thursday morning at 9:30 o'clock.

After Evening Prayer at 8 o'clock, the Rev. R. W. Patton, Secretary of the Fourth Missionary Department, made an address, and the Bishop administered confirmation in Calvary Church.

THIRD DAY.

CALVARY CHURCH, TARBORO,

THURSDAY, May 15, 1913.

The Holy Communion was celebrated by the Bishop, assisted by the Rev. Messrs. Walter J. Smith and Isaac W. Hughes.

The Convention met at 9:30 o'clock for Morning Prayer, which was said by the Rev. Francis M. Osborne.

The Bishop took the chair and called the Convention to order. The minutes of yesterday were read, corrected and approved.

The Secretary presented communications from the General Board of Religious Education, and the Joint Commission on Social Service, which were referred respectively to the Sunday School Commission and to a Committee consisting of the Rev. A. B. Hunter, Rev. Frank J. Mallett, and Mr. Thos. H. Webb.

The following report was presented by the Sunday-school Commissioner and, on motion referred to the Committee on Finance:

In accordance with the action taken by the Diocesan Convention which met in St. Philip's Church, Durham, the reorganization of the Diocesan Sunday-school Commission was effected by the appointment of the following to serve as associate members of the Commission; Rev. F. J. Mallett, Rev. Isaac W. Hughes, Mr. Thos. H. Webb, and Mrs. C. L. Hunter.

Before the adjournment of Convention, the reorganized Commission met and drew up the following tentative program of possible lines of activity in the coming year:

1. To conduct a thorough investigation of the Sunday-schools of the Diocese with a view toward acquiring such an understanding of existing conditions, needs, and problems as would enable the Commission most intelligently to offer its assistance.

2. To publish a monthly article on some phase of the Sunday-school work in the *Carolina Churchman*; and to distribute pamphlets, descriptive circulars, and other literature published by the General Board of Religious Education, text-book publishers, and Sunday-school supply houses.

3. To establish a circulating library, by means of which the Sunday-school workers of the Diocese might have the use of standard books dealing with all phases of the Sunday-school, without personal expense.

4. To provide sample text-books and teachers' assistants of all the standard courses now available, and to arrange for their convenient examination by those interested.

5. To offer a course of lectures on Teacher-training and Sunday-school Management, to be given in each Parish which might request this form of assistance.

6. To arrange for the holding of a Sunday-school Institute at each meeting of the Convocations, and on one evening in connection with the Diocesan Convention.

It is a matter of gratification to the members of the Commission that all of these suggested lines of activity have been more or less successfully carried out, except that it has not been found possible to arrange for a Sunday-school Institute in connection with this Convention. Thanks to the very general responsiveness of the clergy, the Commission now has fairly complete statistics in regard to present conditions and problems. Some practical use of the information thus gained has already been made. Through the kindness of the publishers, the Commission has been supplied with samples of all the more important courses of instruction, and throughout the year a package of these sample publications has been circulating among the clergy of the Diocese for their examination. The circulating library has proved a real help to many who could not afford to buy the books which have been freely lent through it. It is hoped that the use of this library will become even more general in the future. Sunday-school Institutes were held at Warrenton and Winston-Salem; courses of lectures were given by members of the Commission at Charlotte, Raleigh, and Mayodan; and single lectures were given by the Commissioner at Henderson and Oxford. The Commission was unable, however, to arrange for lectures at a number of places where they were requested, the individual members of the Commission not finding it practicable to take the necessary time from their local work. In our judgment, it would be well for the Commission to extend this line of service as far as possible this year. The Commissioner has conducted an extended correspondence with many rectors and Sunday-school officers, and has given, as best he could, suggestions for the improvement of the work.

Since the last Convention, teacher-training classes have been organized in eight parishes or missions; about the same number of schools have adopted the graded system in classes and subjects; new types of text-books have been introduced in several places; and at least one school has been given a more adequate financial support by the action of a vestry in assuming the obligation of its current

expenses. It is probable that the same step has been taken by some other schools, not yet reported to the Commission, which are known to have had this matter under consideration.

Conspicuously successful work has been done in the Primary Department of the Sunday-school of St. Peter's Church, Charlotte, under the leadership of Mrs. C. L. Hunter, an associate member of the Commission. Those who are especially interested in the work of the primary department in the Sunday-school are urged to avail themselves of the assistance which may be secured from Mrs. Hunter's lectures or by correspondence.

The members of the Commission have been greatly encouraged by the evidences found of a general interest in the work of the Sunday-school throughout the Diocese, and of a sense of its extreme importance for the future welfare of the Church. They are also profoundly grateful for the readiness and cordiality with which their offers of assistance have been received, being at the same time humbly conscious of their inability to render as great a service as is both needed and desired. If the matter of expense could be solved, and a suitable man could be secured, the Commission would strongly recommend the appointment of a well-trained Diocesan Sunday-school Field Secretary, who would be able to devote his whole time to the work now so imperfectly being done by your Commission. We believe that the Sunday-school workers of the Diocese are ready to welcome and cooperate with such a leader, and that the benefits which would be gained by the Church at large from such an appointment would in the end amply justify the expense involved. We do not ask for action on this suggestion at the present time, but we feel that it is well to direct your attention to it now, with a view to the ultimate adoption of this plan whenever in your judgment such action could be wisely taken.

We have examined the report of the Trustees of the Diocese and

find it correct in every particular and wish to make the following recommendations:

1st. That the Treasurer of the Diocese be, and is hereby, instructed to set aside a sum not exceeding \$200 per annum, for repairs to the Bishop's residence, said amount to be taken from the Episcopal and Contingent Fund.

2d. That the Treasurer be instructed to set aside \$25 per annum to pay for the services of a clerk for the Trustees of the Diocese.

3d. That the repairs already ordered by the last Convention be executed, the cost not to be taken out of the \$200 recommended to be allowed annually for repairs.

REPORT No. 14. The following resolutions have been referred to the Committee on Canons, on motion of the Rev. John B. Gibble:

Resolved, That Chapter III, Canon I, Section 3, line 3, be amended by striking out the word *adults*, and substituting therefor the words: baptized adults of the age of twenty-one years.

The Committee recommend the adoption of this resolution.

[The resolution being put to vote, was lost.—SECRETARY.]

REPORT No. 15. *Resolved*, That Chapter III, Canon II, Section 1, be amended in line 3 by inserting after the word *elect*: By ballot, by the qualified voters; and to strike out the words, *baptized members of the Parish*, and substitute therefor: baptized male members of the Parish of the age of twenty-one years.

The Committee on Canons unanimously recommend the adoption of the proposed amendment.

[The resolution was, on motion, adopted.—SECRETARY.]

REPORT No. 16. *Resolved*, That Chapter III, Canon XII, Section 2, be renumbered 3, and that Section 2 shall read as follows: The salary of the Treasurer of the Diocese is hereby fixed at \$275 per annum; to be paid out of the current Episcopal and Contingent Fund.

The Committee on Canons unanimously disapprove of the amendment proposed in the above resolution.

[The resolution was not adopted.—SECRETARY.]

REPORT No. 17. *Resolved*, That Article IX, Section 3, of the Constitution be amended by inserting after the word *but*, in line 2, the word: baptized.

The Committee on Canons unanimously disapprove the above amendment of the Constitution.

[On being put to vote, the resolution was lost.—SECRETARY.]

The Rev. Sidney S. Bost presented the following supplementary

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON FINANCE.

(1) For the past two years the Diocese has paid \$600 each year toward the support of the Church's work at the University of North Carolina. This amount has been raised by an apportionment of two per cent upon Minister's Salary and Current Expenses. The method has been successful in every respect; and the Finance Committee recommend that the same two per cent be levied this year to meet this obligation of \$600 for Church work at the State University.

(2) On page 47 of the Journal of 1912 we find this resolution, which was referred to the Finance Committee: "*Resolved*, That there be paid by the Treasurer of the Diocese to the Treasurer of the Missionary Department of Sewanee \$25 for expenses of the Council; \$125 for the traveling expenses of the delegates from the Department to the meeting of the Board of Missions, and \$60 for the Department Sunday-school Commission." Your Committee recommend that \$50 be allowed for expenses of the Council, and that the Treasurer of the Diocese be instructed to pay to the Treasurer of the Department this \$50 for general expenses and \$60.25 for the Department Sunday-school work.

(3) We recommend that arrearages against the following Parishes and Missions be remitted: St. Jude's, St. Mark's, St. Mary's, and St. Matthew's, all in Rowan County; also all arrearages against All Saints, Hamlet, and make the assessment this year \$10; make the assessment against St. David's, Laurinburg, \$10; against Holy Trinity, Greensboro, \$150; and against St. Andrew's, Greensboro, \$75.

(4) We ask a continuance of the following special assessments: Smithfield, St. Paul's, \$15; Southern Pines, Emmanuel, \$20; Duke, St. Stephen's, \$25; Mayodan, Messiah, \$25; Littleton, St. Alban's, \$24; Roanoke Rapids, All Saints, \$10; Reidsville, St. Thomas, \$22.50; Charlotte, St. Andrew's, \$2.50; Charlotte, St. Mary's, \$5; Raleigh, St. Augustine's, \$25; Raleigh, St. Mary's School (voluntary), \$20; and Cooleemee, Good Shepherd, \$12.

(5) We further recommend that upon the conclusion of the General Convention in October of this year, the Standing Committee of the Diocese determine what reasonable allowance should be made for

the expenses of the four clerical deputies to the General Convention, and certify the same to the Treasurer of the Diocese, who shall reimburse the deputies in such amounts as the Standing Committee may determine.

The Rev. Francis M. Osborne presented the following report:

Your Committee on Church Work at the University of North Carolina beg leave to make the following report:

After special and diligent inquiry among those who are personally acquainted with the work of the Church at Chapel Hill, the seat of our State University, we are happy to report that this work is in a most satisfactory and promising condition. Our minister at Chapel Hill, the Rev. Homer W. Starr, is proving himself, under God's help, to be the man for the place. The Vestry and Parish of the Chapel of the Cross are giving to him their heartiest coöperation, not only in the ordinary parish agencies and duties, but especially in that work which is the special interest of the Convention, namely, the boys who go as students from all parts of this Diocese, State, and country.

The Committee feel that the Church in the State of North Carolina is very fortunate in the conditions at Chapel Hill, which increase and encourage the efficiency of our work. In probably no other State in the country is there a closer coöperation and identification of the interests of the residents of the Parish and the interests which pertain to the spiritual care of the students in a State educational institution.

There is now under way a plan to improve the material equipment of the Chapel Hill Parish. This plan is in the hands of the Vestry of the Chapel of the Cross, and contemplates the renovation of the church and the erection of certain buildings at an expenditure of about ten thousand dollars. In these plans the congregation of the Parish unanimously concur. Of the amount needed, the members of the Chapel Hill Parish have already raised over \$3,000, and the Parish owns unused property which may be sold for \$3,000 or more. This leaves about \$3,000 to be provided for. In consideration of the possible increase of efficiency of our work among the students, your Committee recommend this cause to the generous support of the people of the Diocese.

For the further support of the work, we move the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That the present method of securing the financial sup-

port of this work by an apportionment made and collected by the Diocesan Treasurer be continued on the same basis as heretofore.

First. We approve and endorse the request of the Colored Convocation as contained in the Memorial.

Second: We recommend that this Diocese initiate the movement for the setting apart of the Work among the Colored People in the Fourth Missionary Department as a Missionary Jurisdiction, and the consecration of a Negro clergyman as Bishop thereof.

Third. We recommend that the Secretary of this Diocese be instructed to forward copies of the Memorial to the Bishops in the Fourth Missionary Department, with the request that they join us in its objects and aid in the efforts to secure this advance in the work.

Fourth. We recommend that the Secretary of this Diocese be instructed to forward copies of the Memorial to each of the deputies to the next General Convention from the various Dioceses and Missionary Districts composing the Fourth Department, with the request that they join us in the objects of the Memorial.

The Rev. Bertram E. Brown presented the following report:

The Special Committee appointed to consider the annual report of the Managers of Thompson Orphanage beg leave to report that, having examined the report of the Managers, with accompanying reports of the Superintendent and Trustees, they are pleased to record their opinion that the Institution is in good condition, under the most efficient management of all in authority.

We note the addition to the property of a residence for the Superintendent; the completion of a fine drainage canal through the property, which adds greatly to its value and to the health of the community; and that one new cottage is in process of erection and will soon be ready for occupancy.

It further appears from the report that the financial condition of the Institution is most satisfactory, the contributions from various sources during the year have been unusually liberal, and the profits from the farm have been larger than usual. There is now six hundred dollars more in hand than at the same time last year, the balance on hand amounting to the good sum of \$1,482.

The Superintendent reports fourteen children received during the year past, sixty-seven being the number at present in the Institution.

It is gratifying to note that the receipts from the parishes of offer-

ings taken on Thanksgiving Day were very generous this year, and that over two hundred dollars was contributed by the Sunday-schools.

We urge upon the clergy that they emphasize the needs of the Orphanage to their people on Thanksgiving Day, and that they impress upon their Sunday-schools the request of this Convention that a monthly offering from the Sunday-school be devoted to the Thompson Orphanage.

In behalf of the ladies of Calvary Parish, Mr. S. S. Nash invited the members of the Convention to attend at 5:30 o'clock a reception to be given to them and to the members of the Woman's Auxiliary. The invitation was accepted with thanks.

In behalf of the Rector and congregation of the Church of the Good Shepherd, Raleigh, Mr. Albert L. Cox extended an invitation to the Convention to hold the annual meeting of 1914 in their Parish church. The invitation was accepted with thanks, and by resolution, the date of the meeting was left to the discretion of the Bishop.

The Rev. Francis M. Osborne presented the report of a Committee appointed at the last Convention, as follows:

The Committee appointed by the last Convention to raise an endowment of the University of the South are glad to report that they have had a year of encouraging activity in the matter of raising the part of the endowment of the University of the South which has been apportioned to this Diocese under the "Nelson Plan." Acting under the impulse of the impetus given to this work by our last annual Convention, your Committee have been soliciting contributions to this endowment fund. Every member of the Committee of five which has this matter in charge has shown an active interest in the work, and either by his personal contribution or his personal service, or both, has helped forward the work. In addition to this, the Committee have also had valuable help from Mr. David Shepherd, the Organizing Secretary of the University of the South, who came at our invitation to help us.

Thirty persons have subscribed \$3,586, of which \$931 has been paid in cash. In addition to this, \$1,000 has been promised conditionally by two persons who have already subscribed that amount. This statement we consider encouraging, but we do not think that it ade-

quately indicates the work the Committee has done nor the response which we confidently expect as a result of our efforts. In every larger parish in the Diocese this cause has been presented, and a large number of influential and able laymen have been solicited for contributions. In only two or three instances did your Committee meet with individuals who declined to admit the claims of this work upon their interest and sympathy. In almost every case the people of the Diocese have been deeply interested and solicitous for the welfare of the University of the South, and by the impression made by the visits of Bishops Gray and Reese and Rev. W. S. Claiborne our people are feeling the responsibility of providing for the support of our great institution at Sewanee, Tennessee. For the first time in our Diocesan history we have been called upon to help provide a necessary endowment fund for this University, and we believe it is the purpose of our people to meet their responsibility. It is really remarkable how quickly our people have shown their interest, and we think the ground is prepared for a rich harvest.

We therefore recommend the continuation of the work of the Committee and ask the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved. That the work of the Committee in charge of raising our part of the endowment of the University of the South under the "Nelson Plan" be continued by a larger Committee, to be named by the Bishop and commended to the generous support of the people of the Diocese.

The Secretary presented the following report of the Diocesan Association of the Clergymen's Retiring Fund Society:

The past year has been the most prosperous one in the history of the Clergymen's Retiring Fund Society, in a financial way. The Permanent Fund has, by the addition of \$30,000, reached the sum of

\$341,500, to which is to be added a legacy of \$40,000, which, however, may not be paid before the close of the fiscal year.

Within our own Diocese we have lost three of our members by death and one by removal. Eleven new members have been added to the roll, for whose maintenance in the Society it is hoped that largely increased contributions will be made by the people of the Diocese.

Our present number is 47, of whom 14 are annuitants. Their annuities received last year amounted to \$1,000. Our contributions were \$298, due chiefly to the generosity of our constant friends of the Woman's Auxiliary.

The Bishop appointed as such Committee the Rev. Dr. Pittenger, Rev. M. A. Barber, and Rev. E. A. Osborne. (See page 135.)

Mr. Geo. Pollok Burgwyn offered the following preamble and resolution:

WHEREAS, in many parishes and missions the services of the Church are read only occasionally, and generally only the Order for Morning Prayer in which no specific mention is made in the "Prayer for the President of the United States and all in Civil Authority," of the Governor of this State, as in the Order of Evening Prayer: now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Clerical and Lay Delegates from this Diocese to the next General Convention be and are hereby requested to ask that the Prayer for the President of the United States and all in Civil Authority in the Order for Morning Prayer in the Book of Common Prayer be amended by inserting, after *the President of the United States*, the words: "Governor of this State," or such words as conform to the civil executive head of the State, Territory, or Possession in which said prayer is read.

The resolution was adopted.

On motion of Mr. Wm. L. London, the Secretary was au-

thorized to have printed 1,500 copies of the Journal and 2,000 copies of the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese.

In the absence of the chairman, the Rev. N. Collin Hughes read the following:

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE CHURCH.

None with the data before them which have been presented to your Committee, can fail "to thank God and take courage."

More reports than ever before, so far as we have been able to learn, have been sent approximately within the time limit. Yet there was a delay in some, sufficient to make the work of your Committee unnecessarily tedious, besides taking up time that might have been spent much more profitably in the proper functions for which they come to the Convention. We can but emphasize to the Clergy that the making of these reports, and *their prompt transmission*, besides a necessity for the proper and accurate knowledge of what the Church is doing, is a *positive duty and obligation* resting upon them as *faithful men* as well as *conscientious stewards*. And we *vehemently* urge upon each of them to see to it that in future not *one* shall fail to be forwarded within the period *demand*ed by the Canons, *obedience to which they are under SACRED BOND!*

Statistically, in almost every department the movement has been forward.

Over last year the increase in Baptisms has been 63, in Communicants 322, Sunday-school Teachers 25, Scholars 617, Church Property \$84,393, and Disbursements \$48,312. The latter increases are due chiefly to a number of new chapels built and notable church improvements.

Vigor, earnestness, and zeal have characterized the whole working body. The educational institutions have shown marked progress, and at no time have proved themselves more efficient.

The wisdom of the use of consecrated laymen has fully vindicated itself, as notably in the cases of Mr. Taylor at Roanoke Rapids, and Mr. Hartzell at Spray, and would indicate the justification of continued discreet employment of such service where exigency may demand it.

While there has been, indubitably, "the strengthening of the stakes," there has not been the proportional "lengthening of the cords." The work is undermanned, wofully so. Several parishes are without rectors, while it is almost impossible to push forward frontier lines. The manifold blessings bestowed are evidence of the responsiveness to service rendered. On every hand are indications of an awakening consciousness to the value of that which the Church has to give, and a willingness to receive it. The opportunities for strong, aggressive action are many, and golden. Surely with strong

crying we should pray to the Lord of this great harvest to "send forth laborers into His harvest"!

They can not, however, go "except they be sent." "The laborer is worthy of his hire." The real needs are *men* and *money*! Upon the consciences of all this should rest, and by prayer and consecrated effort all should labor toward the supplying of these needs.

Within the Colored Convocation are to be found the same devoted service and vigorous activities. This work is the Church's work, and the Church, *as a whole*, ought not only, as in duty bound, but as loyal servants of the common Lord and Master, more and more pronouncedly give itself to it.

We earnestly call the attention of the Clergy to the resolution passed by the Convention last year:

"That the Convention recommends that on one Sunday in each year the rector of each parish shall bring the work of the Colored Convocation before the people, and that a special offering be then taken for the work."

We urge the strictest compliance.

In the past year a marked stimulus has been given to a more careful observance of the Church's way, and a deeper spirituality of worship, to both Clergy and laity, by means of our revered Bishop's Charge to the Clergy and Pastoral Letter to Clergy and people, upon the general topic of "Public Worship in the Church." The beneficent effect has been and will be far-reaching.

With this brief *résumé* before them, your Committee submit the following resolutions:

Resolved, That at least once a year each clergyman of the Diocese speak to his congregation, or congregations, upon the high calling of the sacred ministry, and the pressing need for increase in its ranks.

Resolved, That at least once a year each clergyman of this Diocese set forth to his congregation, or congregations, its organic relationship to the Diocese, and urge upon them their obligation to its work as a whole.

Resolved, That three hundred copies be printed of the Bishop's Pastoral Letter on "Public Worship in the Church," and that the same be placed at his disposal for such purposes as he may deem fit.

APPENDIX A.

ADDRESS OF THE BISHOP.

Brethren of the Clergy and Laity:

We are met for the Ninety-seventh Annual Convention of the Diocese of North Carolina in a parish which may claim to be in a manner the oldest in our present Diocese. Edgecombe is the oldest County of this Diocese, and a parish, organized in the town of Tarboro' as Trinity Church, was admitted into union with the Convention of the Diocese in 1819, immediately before similar action on behalf of St. John's Church, Williamsboro'. In 1833 the congregation, made up almost entirely of the same families who had formed the parish in 1819, was reorganized under the Rev. William Norwood, as Calvary Church, and under this new designation was readmitted into union with the Convention in 1833. It seems rather unfortunate that the parish had not been called St. Mary's, after the Colonial parish embraced within the bounds of the County of Edgecombe immediately anterior to the Revolution; especially as some of those concerned in the formation of Trinity Parish in 1819, and in its reorganization as Calvary Parish in 1833, were connected personally, as well as by ancestral associations, with old St. Mary's Parish.

But the present is of more immediate concern to us than the past; and we are happy in the many evidences of life and of useful activity, which this old parish shows. It is not inferior to our newest congregations in our most pushing modern communities in all that relates to the vigorous prosecution of the work of our Divine Master in renewing and developing the lives of the people.

One other matter of retrospect must not be omitted before we pass on to the consideration of our present work. We miss some faces which for years we have rejoiced to see at these annual meetings, and there are gaps in our ranks which, to the human hearts of the older of us, shall never seem to be quite filled up. The past year has been marked as has no other year of my Episcopate by the passing onward and upward, beyond our earthly view, of men and women long

and eminently associated with the life of the Diocese. In this Parish one whose connection with it covered the whole period of its existence since the reorganization of 1833 rests from her labors, and her works do follow her. Others hardly less to be honored, by me at least, have, during the year, passed on to their rest. I can not name them all, nor do you need that I should; but there is one, whose eminent public service to the Church, and to the community in which she lived, irrespective of my personal relationship or regard, seems to require that I should mention, however briefly, in this my annual address to you. Mrs. Jane Wilkes, of Charlotte, was a woman of extraordinary efficiency and usefulness. It was by her efforts that our Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary was formed, of which she was for years the actual leader, and then the honorary head. She was the real founder, and sustainer up to the time of her death, of the Good Samaritan Hospital for Negroes in Charlotte; and although she did not stand in quite the same relation to St. Peter's Hospital, Charlotte, yet I believe her most eminent associates in that noble work gladly yield to her the credit of having done more than all others in developing that institution and in bringing it to its present condition of eminent success and usefulness. And those visible and public activities were supplemented by an equal activity and devotion in all departments of more private and personal duty and beneficence.

In the same way I feel bound to mention for eminent devotion and service to the Church, not forgetting others dear to us all and honored by all, the late Richard H. Battle, of Raleigh. He and I began our connection with this Convention at the same session, that of 1874; but he as a man who had already won a place of honorable distinction; and he became almost at once one of the leading laymen of the Diocese. A man of singular purity, sincerity and courage, of sound judgment and cultivated intellect, of high position at the Bar and in the estimation of his fellow-men, he crowned the whole with a consistency of Christian character, an assiduity in pious and charitable works, and a simplicity of personal faith and devotion, which made him, I think I may say, the model man of this Convention and of this Diocese. The records of this body and of the General Convention pre-

serve the history of his public activity in the Church. I feel it my duty to say here that his prominence in the outward life and in the legislative assemblies of the Church was only an inadequate expression of real Christian character, which had its higher development in the inner life and daily walk of one who visited the fatherless and widows in their affliction, and kept himself unspotted from the world.

During this same year we have lost four of our brethren from the ranks of our Diocesan Clergy: The Rev. Richard W. Anderson died June 9th, 1912; the Rev. Samuel Paxton Watters, November 23d; the Rev. Matthias Murray Marshall, D.D., October 22d, and the Rev. Edward Leslie Ogilby March 30th, 1913.

The Rev. Mr. Anderson had but recently come to us from the Diocese of West Texas, having been rector of Trinity Church, Scotland Neck, since October, 1911, and was known to but few of us. His short term of service gave little opportunity for showing what he might have accomplished, but was long enough to impress all who came to know him, with the purity and devotion of his Christian character, and the generous warmth of his love for his brethren. His death was felt to be a sad loss to his people, who had already learned to love and to trust him.

Of the Rev. Mr. Ogilby it may also be said that our people generally were but little acquainted with him, though he had been longer in the Diocese. The later years of his life were marked by a gradual failure of his powers, which, though hardly realized at the time, we can now see to have been the cause of his lessening influence and labors. But those who knew him earlier, and those to whom he ministered when he first came to us in 1904, remember him as an excellent preacher, a diligent pastor, and an effective administrator of an important parish in Philadelphia. His ministrations in Charlotte are most affectionately and gratefully remembered by many members of St. Peter's Parish.

The Rev. Mr. Watters was a native of North Carolina, but, after an absence of some years, came to us in 1897 from the Diocese of Florida. The whole of his ministry, from that time until his retirement from active work in October, 1911, was spent in St. Matthew's Church, Hillsboro'. At the time of his death he had been residing for some months

in Charlottesville, Virginia. Mr. Watters entered the ministry in middle life. He was an attractive example of much that was best in the social culture of the older days in North Carolina. Devotedly attached to the Church and to his people, his daily life and conversation impressed them more than they realized at the time. The bond between them remained unbroken even after he began to feel himself unable fully to perform his duties; but realizing that he should suppress his personal feelings in the interests of Christ's Kingdom, he laid the matter before his Bishop, and asked only to be told what he ought to do. I can not refrain from mentioning this instance of a difficult problem met and solved to the credit of both Priest and people. The parting was painful on both sides, and drew both only nearer together in respect and mutual affection, and was visibly blessed in the spiritual life of the parish. The last month was one of the most fruitful and happy, in its many manifestations of religious interest and of personal affection, of any which he had passed in his ministry. And having finished his work his Master soon called him to rest.

In the death of the Rev. Dr. Marshall we lose from our Clergy List the name of one of the most notable of those who have served the Diocese in my generation. I was intimately and affectionately associated with him for years before I became Bishop, and after my removal to Raleigh our relations became only more confidential and kindly. The one or two matters of difference which did arise between us afforded opportunity for me to realize more fully his tenderness of heart, and generous responsiveness to every appeal to truth and friendship. He was a man gifted with rare charm of manner, sensibility, and social attractiveness. He had a handsome presence and a fine talent for public speaking and reading. But his most prominent quality as a clergyman was shown in his devotion as a pastor to his flock. It has often seemed to me that his absorption in the life of his own parish had prevented his attaining a wider reputation abroad, and perhaps higher positions in the Church. All that his Diocese could do for him as its honored Presbyter, it did. I believe he held every position of prominence in the Diocese. President of the Convention, President of the Standing Committee and Deputy to the General

Convention, he was for years. But still his heart was in his pastoral office, and his most satisfying position was that of Rector of Christ Church, Raleigh. The last years of weakness and inability are now past, and we thank God for his blessed release, and for the peace and rest which he now enjoys.

My services, for the year covered by this report, began with the Ninety-sixth Annual Convention of the Diocese held in St. Philip's Church, Durham, May 8th-11th. The evening before the Convention assembled I presided at an informal meeting of clergymen and laymen, held in the parish house of St. Philip's, at which an address was made by the Rev. Frank M. Crouch, Secretary of the Commission on Social Service.

The total number of my services within the Diocese has been 168, with 42 celebrations of the Holy Communion, 92 sermons, 27 addresses, and 549 confirmations. I also baptized 8 infants and officiated at 7 funerals and at 2 marriages.

There are a number of parishes and missions in the list printed in our journal which do not appear in the enumeration of my visitations above given. This has been because I was providentially hindered in some cases; in some the ministers in charge have requested a postponement of my visitation, and in others there seemed no special need. Most of the Churches have been visited, and all where my presence was specially needed or desired.

My services outside the Diocese have been as follows:

June 7th to 12th, I was absent from the Diocese, attending the services and other proceedings in connection with the annual meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of the South at Sewanee, Tennessee.

June 23d, *the Third Sunday after Trinity*. At Nag's Head, in the Diocese of East Carolina, in a private house, I administered the Holy Communion at 7:30 a. m., and said Morning Prayer at 11 a. m.

June 30th, *the Fourth Sunday after Trinity*. In the same place I administered the Holy Communion at 7:30 a. m., and at 11 a. m. said the appointed services for the day, and preached.

July 7th, *the Fifth Sunday after Trinity*. In the same place, officiated at 7:30 and 11 a. m. as on last Sunday.

July 14th, *the Sixth Sunday after Trinity*. In the same place, officiated at 7:30 and 11 a. m. as on last Sunday.

September 8th, *the Fourteenth Sunday after Trinity*. In St. John's Church, Hot Springs, Missionary District of Asheville, I preached and administered the Holy Communion.

September 13th, at a private house in Asheville, the parish church having been destroyed by fire, I baptized an infant in presence of a congregation, using the office of Public Baptism.

February 16, 1913, *the Second Sunday in Lent*. In St. Martin's

Church, Chestnut Hill, Philadelphia, I took part with the rector at the forenoon and afternoon services; preached at the former, and made an address at the latter.

February 21st, in the Chapel of the Berkeley Divinity School, Middletown, Connecticut, I made an address to the students on the work in this Diocese.

February 23d, *the Third Sunday in Lent*. In St. John's Church, Rockville, Connecticut, I assisted the Rev. J. Frank George, formerly of this Diocese, in the service, and preached for him.

My total services outside the Diocese have been fourteen, with seven sermons, six celebrations of the Holy Communion, and one baptism. The aggregate for the year has been 182 services. I have baptized 8, confirmed 549, preached 99 sermons, made 27 addresses, administered the Holy Communion on 49 occasions, officiated at two marriages and at seven funerals. During the year I have lost more time from my work by reason of sickness than during any previous year, though, except during acute attacks, my general health has been good.

The Rev. Edgar H. Goold is Vice-Principal of St. Augustine's School.

The Rev. Albert New is rector of Grace Church, Weldon, and has under his charge also the Church of the Advent, Enfield, and St. Clement's Church, Ringwood.

The Rev. Martin N. Ray, transferred to me by the Bishop of Rochester, England, in July, 1912, served as Rector of St. Timothy's Church, Wilson, until after Easter, but then resigned, and has left the diocese, though he has not yet taken letters dimissory.

The Rev. Alfred S. Lawrence became rector of St. Matthew's Church, Hillsboro', in July, 1912.

The Rev. James D. Miller, having returned to the Diocese, has become rector of St. Andrew's Church, Greensboro', his old parish.

The Rev. Samuel M. Hanff, having served the missions at Duke and Smithfield most faithfully for six years, became rector of Calvary Church, Wadesboro', in September, 1912, and has charge also of All Souls', Ansonville.

The Rev. James E. King, for eight years in charge of St. Ambrose Church, Raleigh, resigned in September last that

he might take charge by my appointment of the Church of St. Michael and All Angels, Charlotte.

The Rev. Winborn L. Mellichampe has been compelled by ill health to resign his work in Monroe and Union County.

During the year I have consecrated three churches, St. Matthew's Church, Rowan County, on *St. Crispin's Day*, October 25, 1912; St. Mary's Church, High Point, Sunday, October 27th, and St. Paul's Church, Chestnut Hill, Salisbury, October 28. On the afternoon of the last named day I dedicated the "*Murdoch Memorial Mission Hall*" on the lot adjoining St. Paul's Church, Chestnut Hill. This is a large and substantial brick dwelling house, standing upon ample grounds, heretofore known as the "Harrison House." Originally secured by the late Dr. Murdoch for a school which he had projected, it subsequently became the property of the Diocese, as the records of our Convention sufficiently record, and by the action of our Convention of 1911 the Bishop was given the use of the house and so much of the ground as he might think necessary for purposes of a missionary character. It seemed to me, and to others of our clergy and laity whom I consulted, most fitting that this property should, in its missionary use, be dedicated to the memory of the late Rev. Francis Johnston Murdoch, Priest, Missionary, and Doctor in the Church, one of the ablest, most devoted and most efficient Clergymen ever bred up in this Diocese and serving at her altars. I therefore proceeded, on the *Feast of SS. Simon and Jude*, October 28, 1912, in the presence of divers of the Clergy and a congregation of Christian people, to set apart this building to the service of God as a centre and home of our missionary work in this section of the Diocese, by the name of the "*Murdoch Memorial Mission Hall*." The Hon. John S. Henderson, an old and intimate friend of Dr. Murdoch, delivered an able and most interesting address upon the life and character of Dr. Murdoch. This Memorial Hall is the residence of the Archdeacon of Charlotte, and is the centre of the Missionary work of that Convocation.

I should further mention that the new St. Matthew's Church, Rowan County, consecrated, as has been mentioned, the preceding Friday, is a beautiful and substantial brick Church, replacing a small framed structure; and it was

erected wholly at the cost of the widow and the sister of Dr. Murdoch, as a tribute to his zeal and interest in the building up of the Church in Rowan County.

During the past year it has seemed to me that I have observed many evidences of faithful work and a spirit of hope and humble confidence throughout the Diocese. We are not without our troubles and difficulties, and some sad dissensions here and there, but the general spirit of the Diocese seems to me to be loyal and zealous and hopeful, and the movement forward. We have some important posts vacant, and many of our missionary points inadequately supplied, but even so we have a larger clergy list than any Diocese south and west of Virginia, with one exception, and one of the most encouraging aspects of our work is the number of able and efficient young men coming forward to seek for Holy Orders, that they may give themselves to the work of service.

I do venture to believe that our people generally have for some years past been coming to have a deeper sense of the realities of Christian life, and to coöperate more zealously with their pastors in the proper work of the Church, in bringing its influence to bear upon the hearts and lives of all about us. And in this belief and hope I delivered last October a Charge to the Clergy, and issued a Pastoral Letter to Clergy and people, upon the general topic of "Public Worship in the Church," hoping thereby to do something to stimulate the work and progress of the Church. Our spirit of devout worship, private and public, is the vital breath of the Christian and of the Church. While, in what I then addressed to you, I had somewhat to suggest concerning outward details, since worship is outward as well as inward, yet I trust no one could fail to see and to feel that my real effort was to help our people to a deeper inward apprehension of the blessedness and the power of prayer and praise, and the service of God in spirit and in truth. I have been much gratified at the reception given to my suggestions, both in our own Diocese and elsewhere, and I desire at this time to acknowledge the loving and loyal spirit in which you, my brethren, received my offered counsels. I trust that you will keep that charge and letter by you, and endeavor to make it helpful to you and your people. The more I go over it in my mind the more I am persuaded that our Public Worship is next after the read-

ing and living and publishing the Word of God, our greatest means of doing our work for God. Indeed it is one most important method of living and publishing the Word of God. We must all endeavor to enter more deeply into the spirit of private and of public worship, and we must with renewed diligence instruct and lead our people in the worship of God, with reverence and godly fear, yet with intelligent appreciation of the privilege and blessedness of joining in prayers and praises, and thus setting forth before men the gospel of love.

And when we have attained to a true spirit of worship we shall more fully appreciate our duty to the aggressive work of the Church. It was when the first Christians at Antioch ministered unto the Lord, and fasted that the Spirit said unto them, Separate me Barnabas and Saul for the work whereunto I have called them. We have before us in this Diocese noble opportunities for serving the cause of God by ministering to His people. These opportunities lie around us on every side, but the special phase of our present social and industrial development, which offers us our broadest and richest field, is in the new industrial communities springing up everywhere in this State. I have often spoken of this duty, and I am proud of the record of the Diocese in this work. Our good brother, so long Archdeacon of Charlotte, the Rev. Edwin A. Osborne, first among us appreciated the critical importance of these new communities, and our duty in regard to them. In them are gathered thousands of our people, and many of the best elements of our population. All things considered we have done good work in ministering to these brethren of our new towns and aiding them in maintaining the influences of religion in their new life with its changed conditions and its untried difficulties and dangers. No Diocese in the South can compare with ours in this kind of aggressive work. But we have done far less than we should do. Only one or two of these important and growing communities have anything approaching an adequate provision for doing the work. At Mayodan and at Duke, by the generous coöperation of some of our zealous laymen, and the self-denying service of the devoted missionary, we have some reasonable accommodations for the work and at Cooleemee we are fairly well established. But at Roanoke Rapids we

have no adequate means provided to enable our faithful missionary to do his work—as I found on my visit a few days ago to administer confirmation to a most interesting class; and when I went last September to confirm a class of over thirty for the Rev. Mr. Gordon, at Spray, I found that he had been preaching out of doors for three or four months because his chapel would not hold more than the Sunday School. I had to hold my Confirmation service out of doors. It seems to me that we ought at once to take in hand this part of our work with greater zeal and liberality than ever before, and at least supply our self-denying and hard-working clergy with buildings to house their congregations, and to enable them to gather in the young people for effective Sunday School instruction and training. We need expensive churches and parish houses and organs, and handsome appointments. They are all well enough in their way, but more than all these we need to support the preachers of the Gospel who go out to spread the news and to convert the impenitent; and we should supply our missions with such things as are absolutely necessary for carrying on their work. Can we not at this Convention raise what is so urgently needed for those two important missions, Spray and Roanoke Rapids? Let us do that this year.

I need say less about our important institutions, St. Mary's School and the Thompson Orphanage, because the reports of their respective Boards will bring them before you. There is much to be said about both, much that is encouraging and interesting, and they both make great demands upon us all, and demands which we should carefully consider and generously meet.

Another matter I will mention connected with our Missionary work, and that is the obligation of our white people to do more than they have recently been doing to support our Church work among our colored people. This Convention has repeatedly called on all our congregations to give at least an annual offering for the work of our Colored Convocation. A number of them have responded to this appeal of the Convention, but I believe most of them have not. Let me beg you all to remember this cause during the coming year. I wish our white clergy and people might show more personal interest than they usually do in this work, and make a rule to

visit our colored churches and schools from time to time. If they would acquaint themselves with our colored work and our colored workers they could not fail to feel a greater interest in both, and their own inclinations would lead them to help on the good work. I would especially direct the attention of our people to our very important institutions for the benefit of the colored people, St. Augustine's School, with its fine and spacious St. Agnes Hospital, the largest and best equipped hospital for colored people in the whole country south of Washington City, as I am informed, and St. Michael's Training School, and the Good Samaritan Hospital for negroes, in Charlotte. You, my brethren, do not sufficiently know and appreciate these institutions and the good work which they are doing. In each of these hospitals, the first hospitals in North Carolina specially for colored people, there is an excellent Nurses' Training School, and many of our white families can bear grateful testimony to the efficiency of the young colored women trained as nurses in these hospitals. We stand first in our own State, and in all adjoining States, so far as I know, in this form of Christian work for our colored brethren. I wish that the people of the Diocese might more generally know of these good works, and show greater interest and coöperation in them.

But I must not prolong this address. It is impossible to say all I should like to say upon the many topics of interest in connection with the increasing work which lies before us. Much as I feel our deficiencies I also experience a glow of exhilaration and hope when I consider the many opportunities for work in the field of our Diocese; and when I thus look into the faces of so many faithful workers, clerical and lay, men and women, I feel that God hath done great things for us already, whereof we rejoice, and He has greater things in store for us. Therefore be strong, ye priests and servants of the Lord, and be strong ye people of the land, and work, for the Lord is with us.

I respectfully submit my report as Archdeacon of the Convocation of Charlotte, for the year ending March 31, 1913.

I have collected and remitted to the Treasurer the sum of \$304.72, for the support of the work of the Convocation, which amount is included in his annual report hereto attached.

In reviewing the work of the Convocation for the past year, there is abundant evidence of a generous outpouring of the Holy Spirit upon the labors of our faithful workers, both clerical and lay. As time goes on, our people seem to be taking a firmer grasp on the keeping power of Christ, and are realizing, as perhaps they have never done before, their individual responsibility in the matter of carrying forward the work of the Kingdom of God.

Since the last meeting of the Convention, the Hamlet congregation has erected a very neat and substantial place of worship at a cost of \$2,000, every dollar of which has been fully paid, and the building is to be consecrated in the near future. Hamlet is an important railroad center, and a splendid field for well directed missionary effort.

At St. Matthew's Mission, six miles west of Salisbury, on the Statesville road, a beautiful brick church has been built on the site of the old frame structure, as a memorial to the late Francis Johnston Murdoch, D.D., by his wife and sister. Dr. Murdoch established this Mission twenty-six years ago, and it is one of the most promising of the Rowan group.

St. Paul's Church, Chestnut Hill, Salisbury, and St. Mary's, High Point, have undergone some much needed repairs, and together with St. Matthew's, were consecrated last fall.

At the same time, the spacious dwelling known as the "Harrison House," adjoining St. Paul's Church, Chestnut Hill, was dedicated by the Bishop as the "Murdoch Memorial Mission Hall," in memory of Dr. Murdoch. Aside from being a permanent residence for the Archdeacon, it is our ultimate purpose to make this building the

center of missionary activities extending throughout Rowan and into the adjoining counties.

It affords me great pleasure to state that, owing to the diligent efforts of our Treasurer, coupled with the splendid coöperation of our clergy and laity, we have been able to pay all stipends in full, to date, and have a balance to our credit of \$252 with which to begin the new Diocesan year.

The Duplex System has been adopted by a considerable number of our Missions, and is doing much to stimulate regular and systematic giving.

The Rev. Jephtha H. Swann will assume charge of the work at Monroe, Rockingham and Hamlet, on or about June 1st, and it is hoped that the other vacant Missions can soon be supplied.

REPORT OF ARCHDEACON FOR WORK AMONG COLORED PEOPLE.

To the Right Reverend JOSEPH BLOUNT CHESHIRE, D.D.,
Bishop of North Carolina.

RT. REV. AND DEAR SIR:—In submitting to you my report as Archdeacon of the Colored Work in the Diocese of North Carolina, though

conscious of the fact that much more might have been done, we are nevertheless glad that our efforts have not been classed as failures. I have made in all sixty-six visitations to the different stations of the Convocation, beside making frequent visitations to the four stations that are under my immediate supervision. In all of these, taken collectively, I have conducted, in whole or in part, 135 services; delivered 118 sermons and addresses; had 44 celebrations of the Holy Communion; baptized 8 persons; and buried, privately, one infant. I have traveled, in all, 6,000 miles, 5,000 of which were in the limits of the Convocation. In addition to the above, we have conducted our usual series of Mission Services at Charlotte, Louisburg, Warrenton, and Wilson, and they are of incalculable good—not alone in enabling our clergy to reach the masses but to have the people witness and compare the beauty and dignity of such a service as the Church has to offer them. Permit me here to illustrate this. A few weeks ago, in one of our small towns where pandemonium is said to reign supreme among my people during the instances of revivals and weddings, I was requested to marry a couple in our church. It was to be an experience, and I had been prepared for the worst. Almost an hour before the time the church was filled to its utmost capacity; as there was some delay, during the interval, I addressed the congregation on the sacredness of the ceremony as well as the house of God; and so profound was the silence afterwards that one could have heard the dropping of a pin near him in any part of that church during the ceremony, notwithstanding that crowded congregation. This is, in my opinion, another plea for the adaptability of the Church to the spiritual needs of the Negro. The demand for the satisfying of the spiritual necessities of the Convocation is great, and the few associated with me are untiring in their labors. It would be hard to find a set of men more devoted to the cause, or more willing to make any reasonable sacrifice for the work's sake.

Obedient to the mandate of this Convention, I sent a letter to each Parish and Mission of the Diocese, soliciting its aid in behalf of the Convocation, and while the response was not as great as we had hoped, we, notwithstanding, received some liberal donations and several very helpful letters. It may not be known that our Convocation has raised this Diocesan year \$5,497.73, thus making considerably over six dollars per capita. The congregation of St. Michael and All Angels, Charlotte, has purchased a rectory for their priest, and the congregation of St. Ambrose, Raleigh, has had a similar plan under advisement. The basement walls of the Thomas Cain Memorial Chapel, at Warrenton, are now four feet high and daily moving upward. Lots have recently been purchased in Greensboro and Rocky Mount. Extensive repairs are planned for St. Mark's, Wilson. Our schools, too, are being felt in the communities where they are

located, and are generally well attended. St. Michael's School, Charlotte, has an enrollment of 295 students. The Parish School of Tarboro, under the oldest priest of the Convocation, still holds its reputation for the quality of its work. The Mission School at Louisburg, in charge of Mr. George C. Pollard, has grown to such an extent that it is no longer possible to run it with safety without additional room; it has 176 students this year. We have desired to enlarge and thoroughly repair the building, making it a memorial to the late Archdeacon Pollard, but without funds our desire must perish.

The services of interest which we were privileged to witness during the year are grouped as follows: The Diocesan Convention in the city of Durham; the closing exercises of St. Augustine's School, made memorable by the students of every department of the School, headed by their band and followed by the Clergy, marched in procession to the gate of Oakwood Cemetery, and after an appropriate service, unveiled a monument erected by themselves to the memory of the late Dr. J. Brinton Smith, the founder of the School. The closing of the School also marked the organization of our St. Augustine's Conference. Other services of note were the triple anniversary of the Rev. Jas. E. King, then Rector of St. Ambrose Church, Raleigh; the meeting of the Colored Convocation in St. Stephen's Church, Winston-Salem; the Conference of Church Workers Among the Colored People in the city of New Bern, at which time that body was pleased to honor two members of our Colored Convocation; the instituting of the Rev. Jas. E. King as Rector of St. Michael's Church, Charlotte; the delivering of an address during the Missionary Council of the Department of Sewanee in the city of Charlotte. At an opportune time and after an absence of eighteen years, I made a visit to my old home at Fernandina on Amelia Island in Florida, where I enjoyed a short stay among relatives and friends that proved both restful and helpful.

Permit me, through you, to thank every member of this Convention who has in any way contributed to the aid of this Department of the Church's work. We need their constant sympathy and prayers. The enormity of the situation, at times, almost appalls us, but He who has bidden us serve will, in His own time, send relief.

The signs of the times are pregnant with issues that bespeak a better day for the weak of God's heritage; the voice, and what is mightier, the pen, of the world's most gifted and saintly are being freely used in behalf of the millions now groping at our doors; and what we need be most thankful for, is the fact that the initiative is now being taken by the most influential of our own Southland. For all of this we thank God and take courage.

REPORT OF THE DIOCESAN SECRETARY OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY IN THE CONVOCATIONS OF RALEIGH AND CHARLOTTE.

RT. REV. FATHER IN GOD:—Many things have happened during the past year to stimulate the interest of the members of the Auxiliary in their work for Missions and to make it a notable year in the history of our Diocesan Branch.

The Council of the Fourth or Sewanee Missionary Department met in Charlotte during the month of October, and in connection with it was held the first regular business session of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Department. It was characterized by deep earnestness and spirituality, and we feel that the strength which came through union and the pleasure which came through personal intercourse will be of lasting benefit to each member who attended its sessions.

Sorrow has come to us many times during the past year. Mrs. John Wilkes, our honored President; Mrs. Robert Winston, one of

our Convocational Secretaries; Miss Bella Parker, and Mrs. William Martin, two of our oldest and best beloved parochial officers, and Miss Rose Farley, a devoted United Offering Missionary, have all entered God's higher service.

The St. Agnes Endowment Fund is now complete, and will take the form of a memorial to Mrs. Wilkes, her birthday being chosen as the especial day to be endowed.

Our number of Diocesan officers has been increased by the appointment of an Educational Secretary, Miss Claudia Hunter. Her earnest and efficient work has shown itself in the greater number of study classes which have been organized. Thirty-five parish branches now report a Mission Study class, as well as a number of Junior branches, while twenty-three branches have observed the Intercessory Days of Prayer.

NECROLOGY.



THE REV. RICHARD WARNER ANDERSON.

Born at Pantops Plantation, near Charlottesville, Virginia, May 12, 1857.

Graduated from the Theological Seminary of Virginia in 1882.

Ordained Deacon by Bishop Whittle in 1882 and advanced to the Priesthood by Bishop Peterkin in the following year.

He served successively in the Dioceses of Virginia, Kentucky, Georgia, Mississippi, Arkansas, South Carolina, and West Texas, from the last of which he came to North Carolina in October, 1911, accepting the rectorship of Trinity Church, Scotland Neck, and the Church of the Advent, Enfield, and after a brief but fruitful ministry of but a few months he fell asleep at the Rectory of Scotland Neck, June 9, 1912, and was buried by his people before the door of his parish church.



THE REV. MATTHIAS MURRAY MARSHALL, D.D.

Born at Pittsboro August 13, 1841.

Entered Trinity College, Hartford, Conn., December, 1858.

Enlisted in the Confederate Army in 1861. Ill health requiring his retirement from the service, he entered the University of North Carolina and graduated in 1863, taking his Master's Degree in 1865.

Ordered Deacon by Bishop Atkinson at Warrenton, December, 1863, and became chaplain in the Army, serving both in the field and at Kittrell Springs, where he was in charge of St. James' Mission.

Ordained Priest September 3, 1865, he became Rector of Christ Church, Elizabeth City; of Emmanuel Church, Warrenton, in July, 1867; and of Christ Church, Raleigh, in 1874.

In the same year he received the degree of D.D. from William and Mary College, Virginia.

After thirty-three years of faithful and efficient service, in failing health he resigned his charge, and after a lingering illness fell asleep at Morganton, October 22, 1912, and was laid to rest in Oakwood Cemetery, in Raleigh.

THE REV. SAMUEL PAXSON WATTERS.

Born at Wilmington, November 2, 1833.

Educated at the Virginia Military Institute, from which he graduated with the class of 1855.

Served as lieutenant with the Mississippi troops in the Confederate Army.

Afterwards entered the General Theological Seminary, from which he graduated in 1880, having been ordered Deacon by Bishop Horatio Potter of New York in 1879.

Ordained Priest by Bishop Clark of Rhode Island in 1880, he became Assistant Minister in Trinity Church, Newport.

Rector of Grace Church, Morganton, N. C., from 1882 to 1889, when he removed to Culpeper, Virginia, and afterwards to Appalachicola, Florida.

Returning to North Carolina, he spent fifteen years in charge of St. Matthew's Church, Hillsboro, and in 1911 retired in failing health, passing away at Charlottesville, Virginia, November 23, 1912. His mortal remains were taken to his native city and buried in Oakdale Cemetery.



THE REV. EDWARD LESLIE OGILBY.

Born at Stamford, Connecticut, November 27, 1848.

Educated in Philadelphia and Chicago. Graduating from the Philadelphia Divinity School, was ordained Deacon and Priest by the Bishop of Pittsburgh in 1889.

Curate at Christ Church, Philadelphia, 1889-1891.

Rector of St. Barnabas' Church, Haddington, 1891-1898.

Rector Church of the Advent, Nashville, Tennessee, 1898-1900.

Rector of St. Barnabas' Church, Kensington, Philadelphia, 1900-1904.

Rector of Trinity Church, Statesville, N. C., 1904-1907.

Rector of St. Athanasius' Church, Burlington, 1907-1910.

Rector Emmanuel Church, Southern Pines, 1910-1913.

Died at Southern Pines, Sunday, March 30, 1913, and was buried in Oakwood Cemetery at Raleigh.
