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JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS.

FIRST DAY.

Wednesday, December 10, 1873.

The North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, convened in the Methodist Church, in the town of Goldsboro, N. C., at 9½ o'clock, A. M., Dec. 10, 1873.

Bishop J. C. KEENER, President.

The Conference was opened with religious services, conducted by the Bishop.

By direction of the Bishop, B. Craven, Secretary of the last Conference, called the clerical roll of the Conference.

The districts were then called, and the roll of Lay Delegates was formed and called.

M. O. Sherril and J. A. Claywell alternates from Shelby District were substituted for R. L. Abernethy and J. C. Harper.

On motion of T. P. Ricaud, B. Craven was elected Secretary.

On motion Ira T. Wyche was elected Assistant Secretary.

On motion of Dr. Burkhead the Presiding Elders were constituted a committee to nominate the Standing Committees of the Conference, viz: On Education, Sabbath Schools, Books and Periodicals, Church Property, Memoirs and the Bible Cause.

On motion of Dr. Moran, the Committee on Nominations was instructed to constitute all the committees, ex-

cept that on Memoirs, of one preacher and one layman from each district.

On motion of Dr. Moran, the Presiding Elder of the Newbern District, the stationed preacher at Goldsboro and Dr. J. F. Miller, were appointed a Committee on Public Worship.

On motion of R. O. Burton, it was ordered that the daily Sessions of the Conference shall begin at 9½ o'clock,

A. M., and close at 1½ o'clock, P. M.

The Joint Board of Finance was completed by the ap-

pointment of the following members:

On motion of Dr. Moran, the bar of the Conference was fixed at the third column of the church.

On motion of Dr. Moran, it was ordered that the examination of character shall be conducted with open doors.

A communication from Rev. Dr. Redford, Book Agent, was received, read and referred to the Committee on Books and Periodicals.

A communication was received from Rev. Dr. Mc-Ferrin, Missionary Secretary, was read, and referred to the Board of Missions.

A communition was received from Rev. Dr. Abbey; it was read, and on motion of Dr. Moran, was laid on the table for the present.

The committees were then announced and the Conference adjourned with the benediction by the Bishop.

SECOND DAY.

Thursday, December 11, 1873.

Conference met at $9\frac{1}{2}$ o'clock, Bishop Keener in the the Chair, and was opened with religious services conducted by Henry Gray.

The roll of the Conference was called.

The Journal of the first day was read and ${\tt approved}.$

R. F. Hacket, alternate from the Salisbury District, was put in the place of W. G. Woods as a lay delegate.

Rev. Dr. Bennett, Editor of the Richmond *Christian Advocate*, was introduced to the Conference.

On motion of R. O. Burton, H. T. Hudson and M. H. Hoyle were appointed a Committee on Post-offices.

Rev. James L. Fisher, of the Virginia Conference, was introducted to the Conference.

Question 10th was taken up, "What local preachers are elected deacons?"

S. H. Whitaker of Rolesville Circuit, D. G. Meekins and P. M. Farrow of Portsmouth and Ocracoke, having

been recommended by their Quarterly Conferences, according to discipline, were elected to deacon's orders.

Question 14th was called, "What local preachers are elected elders?"

Wm. S. Hester of Granville Circuit, having been recommended by his quarterly Conference, according to discipline, was elected to elder's orders.

Question 1st was taken up, "Who are admitted on trial?"

L. J. Holden of Hillsboro Station, Nehemiah G. Whittington of Guilford Circuit, J. Reece Scroggs of Statesville Station, N. S. Norton of Alexander Circuit, Lucius E. Stacy of Morganton Circuit, Christie E. Gault of Dallas Circuit, James M. Lumley and Marcus W. Boyles of Happy Home Circuit, P. F. W. Stamey of South Fork Circuit, Wm. N. Conoley of Monroe Station, Wm. H. Watkins of Wadesboro Circuit, Levi W. Pigott of Beaufort Station, W. H. Cunninggim of Neuse Circuit, having been recommended by their Quarterly Conferences and approved by the Committee of Examination, were received on trial.

Rev. Dr. Bennett addressed the Conference in reference to a matter of finance, touching the Virginia and North Carolina Conferences.

A communication from Rev. Dr. Redford, Book Agent, was read; Dr. Redford the addressed the Conference upon our Publishing interest, and specially in reference to the proposition, that each preacher should buy one hundred dollars worth of books from our Publishing House.

On motion of Dr. Closs, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That so soon as we shall arrive at the appointment which we shall receive at the Conference, we will visit our people and try to sell one hundred dollars worth of our publications; and that we will transmit, if possible, at least the above

amount within thirty days, or at farthest, within ninety days after we shall reach our destination.

Rev. Mr. Bernheim, pastor of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Wilmington, was introduced to the Conference.

B. Craven presented the report of Trinity College.

N. H. D. Wilson read a report from the Trustees of Greensboro Female College, and B. Craven read a report from Rev. T. M. Jones, D. D., President of Greensboro Female College; also from Rev. W. M. Robey, President of Davenport Female College, and a report from the Trustees of the last named institution.

All these reports were referred to the Committee on Education.

On motion of Dr. Moran, the following petition to the Congress of the United States was adopted:

To the Honorable Congress of the United States:

We, the ministers and lay-representatives of the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, sitting in Goldsboro, N. C., Bishop J. C. Keener presiding, respectfully petition your honorable bodies in behalf of the Southern Methodist Publishing House at Nashville, Tennessee, in the matter of its claim against the United States, for its property used and consumed by the army of the United States in 1864 and 1865, and previously.

You are informed by petition and testimony now before you, of the existence and merits of said claims. We, therefore, as an integral portion of the Church under whose general supervision said House operates, deem it necessary only to express our hope that you will regard this as a matter of much more

than mere private or local importance.

Largely more than a million of people of the United States, including our Church members and Sunday Schools, white and colored, besides other millions who are in friendly sympathy with us, are looking anxiously for the speedy adjustment of this matter, that the House may push forward its legitimate business farther and farther. We respectfully request that the testimony submitted may be examined, and the amount lawfully due may be promptly paid.

We also most respectfully and earnestly plead that the mat-

ter be taken up and disposed of at your earliest possible convenience.

This can be regarded but as an act of simple justice, while it will exhibit the honor and integrity of the Government, and its kindness and sympathy toward a very considerable portion of its citizens.

THIRD DAY.

FRIDAY, December 12, 1873.

Conference met at $9\frac{1}{2}$ o'clock, Bishop Keener in the Chair, and was opened with religious services conducted by Dr. Closs.

On motion of B. Craven, the calling of the roll was

discontinued for the session.

The Journal of the second day was read and approved. Question 8th was taken up, "What traveling preachers are elected deacons?"

R. F. Bumpass, James Wilson and F. D. Swindell passed the examination of character, were approved by the committee, and were elected to deacon's orders.

J. T. Bagwell having passed the studies of the second year, at last Conference, stood on the third year, and was approved by the committee.

Phillip Greening and Jesse H. Guinn passed examination of character, but failed to stand their examination

and were continued in the second year.

B. F. Dixon passed examination of character, and was discontinued at his own request.

Question 12th was called, "What traveling preachers are elected elders?"

- J. T. Harris, F. L. Reid and W. D. Lee passed the examination of character, were approved by the Committee of Examination, and were elected to elder's orders.
- J. J. Renn passed the examination of character, was approved by the Committee on Examination, and passed the studies of the fourth year.
- T. P. England and James Mahony passed the examination of character, but failed to stand their examination, and were continued in the third year.
- A. K. Murchison passed the examination of character, and was located at his own request.

Question 20th was taken up, "Are all the preachers blameless in their life and official administration?"

The elders on the Raleigh, Hillsboro and Greensboro Districts passed the annual examination of character.

- A. A. Bosshammer passed the examination of character, was approved by the Committee of Examination, and was passed to the fourth year.
- W. F. Clegg and W. W. Alber, on motion of N. H. D. Wilson were placed in the superannuated relation.
- Rev. D. P. Wills, President of the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church, was introduced as fraternal messenger from that body.
- Rev. N. Z. Graves, pastor of the Presbyterian Church in Goldsboro, was introduced to the Conference.
- B. B. Culbreth, Agent of Trinity College, and L. L. Hendren, Agent of Greensboro Female College, read the reports of their agencies, and the reports, on motion of C. C. Dodson, were referred to the Committee on Education.
- J. L. Keene passed the examination of character, and was discontinued at his own request.

Question 4th was then taken up, "Who are admitted into full connection?"

James Wilson, B. F. Bumpass, J. T. Bagwell and F. D. Swindell, having been approved by the Committee on Examination, were examined in open Conference by the Bishop, were approved and were received into full connection.

A letter was received from Bishop Doggett in reply to the telegram sent him in reference to preaching his Memorial Sermon on Bishop Early, saying that in consequence of indisposition he could not comply with the request of the Conference.

The Conference then adjourned with the benediction by the Bishop.

FOURTH DAY.

SATURDAY, December 13, 1873.

Conference assembled at $9\frac{1}{2}$ o'clock, Bishop Keener in the Chair, and was opened with religious services conducted by C. H. Phillips.

The Journal of the third day was read and approved.

Question 20th was resumed, "Are all the preachers blameless in their life and official administration?"

The elders on the Salisbury, Shelby, Charlotte, Fayetteville, Wilmington and Washington Districts passed the annual examination of character.

M. L. Wood asked the appointment of a committee to investigate the case of C. Plyler, in not attending to his appointment during the past year.

On motion of Dr. Moran, the Conference requested the re-appointment of Dr. Deems to the Church of the Strangers in New York.

On motion of S. D. Adams, I. H. Hill was placed in the Supernumerary relation.

Question 2d was called, "Who remain on trial?"

- J. Sandford, W. C. Norman, and T. A. Coon passed the examination of character, were approved by the Committee on Examination, and were continued in the second year.
- J C. Smith passed the examination of character, failed to be examined by the committee, and was continued in the first year.
- R. T. Leard and J. T. Gibbs passed the examination of character, and were discontinued at their own request.

Question 7th was taken up, "Who are the deacons of one year?"

- L. H. Gibbons, A. M. Long, H. F. Wiley and W. R. Fergerson passed the examination of character, were approved by the Examining Committee, and were passed to the studies of the fourth year.
- W. B. Maness and R. M. Brown passed the examination of character, failed to be examined, and were continued in the third year.
- W. T. McClellion passed the examination of character and was located at his own request.

On motion of N. H. D. Wilson, J. P. Moore and J. A. Cuninggim were elected Trustees of the Conference.

The Bishop appointed P. J. Caraway, J. B. Martin and O. J. Brent a committee on the case of C. Plyler.

The Conference then adjourned with the benediction by the Bishop.

FIFTH DAY.

Monday Morning, December 15, 1873.

Conference met at 9½ o'clock, Bishop Keener in the Chair, and was opened with religious services conducted by 1ra T. Wyche.

The Journal of the fourth day was read and approved.

J. W. Jenkins was excused for the remainder of the session on account of family affliction.

The consideration of the 20th question was resumed, and the elders of the Newbern District passed the annual examination of character. This completed the call; all the elders of the Conference except C. Plyler having passed the examination of character.

E. Howland passed the examination of character, failed to be examined, and was continued in the third year.

R. O. Burton presented the credentials of J. S. Long, which were surrendered to the Conference.

The Bishop reported that on yesterday he ordained deacons as follows:

Traveling Preachers—R. F. Bumpass, James Willson and F. D. Swindell.

LOCAL PREACHERS—Wm. Wine, John A. B. Kirkpatrick, S. H. Whitaker, D. G. Meekins and P. M. Farrow.

Also that he ordained elders as follows:

TRAVELING PREACHERS—J. T. Harris, F. L. Reid and W. D. Lee.

Local Preachers—J. M. Jordan, Redding Moore, C. W. Westbrooks, Wm. H. Cuninggim and W. S. Hester.

On motion of B. Craven, it was resolved that when we adjourn, we will adjourn to meet at $3\frac{1}{2}$ o'clock this afternoon.

On motion of J. E. Leggett, it was resolved that the

election of delegates to the General Conference be the order of the day this afternoon at 31 o'clock.

J. W. North presented a petition from the Salisbury. Shelbly and Charlotte Districts, which was read and laid on the table for the present.

On motion of W. H. Bobbitt, the chairman of the Joint Board of Finance was authorized to draw on the Treasurer of the Conference Trustees for \$262.

Leave of absence was granted to J. J. Garrett and B. W. Brown.

The Conference then held the Memorial Service for our deceased brethren, viz:

Wm. Holmes, Alfred Norman, Wm. Barringer and Numa F. Reid.

The Memorial Sermon was preached by Rev. N. H. D. Wilson from 2 Tim. 4: 6, 7 and 8, and the following memoirs were read and adopted:

REV. WILLIAM HOLMES.

REV. WILLIAM HOLMES was born in Princes Ann county, Va., June 18, 1798; was licensed to preach in Suffolk, Nov. 15, 1823, by Benjamin Devaney, Presiding Elder of the Norfolk District; joined the Virginia Conference at its session held in Petersburg, March, 1824,—ordained deacon at Norfolk, 1826, by Bishop McKendree—ordained Elder at Raleigh, 1828, by Bishop Soule. In 1824 he was on Suffolk and Surry Circuit; in 1825 on Sussex; in 1826 on Yadkin; in 1827-'28 on Caswell; in 1829 on Charlottesville; in 1830 on Granville; in 1831, on Tar River; in 1832 again on Granville, which was his last effective appointment, as he was placed on the Superannuated list, and was never afterwards effective. He was never very robust, and at the time he received a superannuated relation it was thought he was sinking rapidly with consumption, but he survived for forty years, frequently able to preach, which he did occasionally until a few years previous to his death.

He died in Henderson, on the 8th of June, 1873, from injuries received two days previously, by being caught between a car and the platform at the depot, where he had just gone to settle a freight bill for some shingles just received to put on

our church there.

He labored efficiently in the Sunday School for many years, where his services will be much missed. He was able to give wise instruction, as he was well read in theology and familiar with the doctrines and history of the church. For nearly halt a century his name has been regularly heard at the roll call of our annual sessions. It has been done for the last time. It has been transferred "to the general assembly and church of the first born, which are written in Heaven," and "numbered among the saints in the life everlasting." He leaves a widow and several children. May they and we all meet him in the "better land."

REV. ALFRED NORMAN.

Rev. Alfred Norman was born in Washington county, North Carolina, on the 22d of April, 1804. In the year 1823, at the age of 19, he sought and obtained pardon from God, and united with the Methodist E. Church; he began at once to labor for the salvation of souls. In that year he was licensed as an exhorter. Next he obtained license to exercise his gifts as a local preacher. He joined the Virginia Conference at its session in Raleigh, N. C., in the year 1828. When asked "Where do you wish to be sent?" he replied, "Send me where there are sinners."

His first appointment was as junior on the Portsmouth and Ocracoke Circuit; in 1829 he was junior on Black River Circuit; in 1830 he was senior on Trent Circuit; in 1831, while laboring on banks and islands he was attacked with typhoid fever, from which he suffered for fourteen weeks and narrowly escaped from death. His appointments were as follows: 1832, Stokes; 1833, Randolph; 1834-'35, Camden; 1836, Gates. At the separation of the Virginia Conference he remained in the Carolina division, and was sent in 1837 to Tarboro; 1838, Duplin; 1839, Guilford; 1840, Raleigh Circuit; 1841, Chatham; 1842-'43, Franklin, Va. In this year, on the 27th of November, he was married to Miss Mary L. Rucker, who shared the toils and triumphs of his future ministry with beautiful devotion, and in July, 1873, only six weeks before his own departure, she peacefully finished her course and ascended to her eternal rest.

In 1844 he was sent to Caswell; 1845, Patrick; 1846-'47, Davidson; 1848, Tar River; 1849, Stokes; 1850-'51, Franklin, Va.; 1852-'53, Pittsylvania; 1854-'55, Granville; 1856-'57, Halifax, Va.; 1858-'59, Wentworth; 1860-'61, Leasburg. In the latter part of this year, under the fearful excitements of the war superadded to his unsparing labors, he was stricken

with paralysis of the face, and at the instance of his friends reluctantly retired from active work. He then purchased a home and settled in Caswell, county, N. C. His health having improved, he resumed his labors in 1867, serving Alamance Circuit in 1867–'68. In 1869 he was appointed to High Rock Mission, where he toiled with trembling limbs and a martyr's heart till he was overcome by his last sickness. He fell asleep on the 20th of August, 1873, and was buried with the honors of Masonry by the side of his sainted wife, in Caswell county.

For fifty years he was a watchman on the walls of Zion. For forty years he received the annual appointment of the Bishop. Whether we view his character or his labor, we must exclaim, "Well done, good and faithful servant." Genuine integrity was the foundation of his character. True humility, sincerity, simplicity, honesty and moral courage were signally revealed in his walk and conversation. He was tender and devoted in all the sweet relations and offices of home life. No one ever doubted his piety. He was eminently spiritual in his religious experience. He was no slave to the world with its bribes and temptations. He rose and remained above its vain ambition. He moved through life with the firm, yet placid mein that bespoke a quiet conscience and an assurance of the smiles of God. He was a good man and a devoted christrian.

Now think of the long roll of his appointments, and consider that every appointment marks a twelve months' campaign in lowland or midland or mountains, with weary marches through sunshine and storm, in health and sickness, with frequent conflicts with the passions and prejudices of the world and the principalities of hell. He was sure, when possible, to be at his post. He was cheerfully fond of his arduous duty, and unmurmuringly obedient to the authorities of the church. He received his appointments as a good soldier receives his orders. He was peculiarly earnest in his manner in the pulpit. He was full of exalted zeal when amid the scenes of revivals.

He was a missionary in spirit. "Send me where there are sinners," was the motto of his entire ministry. He felt it his duty to the last to carry the gospel to the people and not wait for them to seek it. He never wavered through all his difficulties, trials and privations. His preaching was owned of God. His sermons were plain, pointed, practical, clear and convincing, glowing with evangelical fervor, and sometimes full of overwhelming power. His intellect was of superior order. He was one of the most successful revivalists of his day. He measured the path of his circuits with a chain of Apostolic triumphs, whose golden links were glorious revivals. He counted his spiritual children by thousands. He was specially instrumental in the conversion of several of our min-

isters, I. F. Keerans, L. S. Burkhead, N. H. D. Wilson and Numa F. Reid. Who can calculate the value of such a life! How vast its influence for good on earth and glory in the eternal world!

His death was not sudden. For weeks he watched its slow approach. To the last his intellect was unclouded. While suffering intense pain he exclaimed, "If it is the will of the Lord that I should suffer I would not, if I could, have my suffering lessened." Even in his last hours he arranged his temporal affairs with most impressive calmness and precision. With him faith was clear, unwavering, triumphant. It rose with the dread demands of the momentous ordeal. At one time he raised his arms and cried, "Will that Gospel that I have so often preached to others sustain me in this trying hour? Yes, it will, it does sustain me."

Looking in the weeping face of his son, he said, "Tell my brethren of the North Carolina Conference that I died prepared, and tell my brethren everywhere that I died as I lived, in the faith of the Gospel of Christ." Again he said, "It may be that before I expire I shall be unable to speak, but I tell you now that you may known then while you look at me speechless, bear in mind that all is well." How such words in such an hour ring with the melody of Heaven! What grand testimony to the truth and glory of our religion! Yes, it is all well with

the faithful old veteran of the Cross-all well forever!

REV. WILLIAM BARRINGER.

WILLIAM BARRINGER, son of General Paul Barringer, was born in Cabarrus county, N. C., February 18, 1816. After taking the usual academic course he pursued his studies at Chapel Hill. He then entered the mercantile business at Concord. About the year 1842 he attended a camp meeting, near Concord, where he was deeply convicted, and a few days after, while sitting in his counting room engaged in meditation and prayer he was most powerfully converted. He soon felt that it was his duty to preach. He yielded to the call and prepared for his life-long work.

He lived within the bounds of the South Carolina Conference, which he joined December, 1844, at Columbia. He was appointed to Wadesboro Circuit under Rev. Samuel Leard. He served the following appointments, viz: 1845, Charlotte Station; 1846, Charlotte Circuit, under Rev. C. H. Pritchard; 1847, Cheraw Station; 1848-'49, Presiding Elder on Fayette-ville District; 1850, transferred to the North Carolina Confer-

ence and Presiding Elder on the Wilmington District; 1851, '52, '53 and '54, Presiding Elder Greensboro District; 1855-'56, Presiding Elder Salisbury District; 1857-'58, Agent for G. F. College; 1859, Yanceyville Circuit; 1860, '61 and '62, Presiding Elder Raleigh District; 1863-'64, Presiding Elder Trinity College District; 1865, '66, '67 and '68, P. C. Greensboro Station; 1869, '70, '71 and '72, Presiding Elder Hillsboro District.

After his return from the last Conference at Fayetteville, he entered upon his work with great zeal and hope, and completed the first round of quarterly meetings. He had been confined to his house for about a week with influenza, which had somewhat enfeebled him. On the 11th of March, he was superintending the work on Greensboro Female College, when passing out of the window of the third story to the gangway his foot slipped and he fell about twenty-eight feet. His right thigh was broken, and his right arm and face considerably bruised. The fall produced concussion of the brain, which eaused his death. He was conscious for several hours on the day of his fall, and about one hour on the 16th. He did not apparently suffer much except occasional paroxyisms of pain. During his lucid moments he gave satisfactory evidence that he was fully ready to depart and be with Jesus, which he did at ten minutes past 7 o'clock, P. M., Monday 17th.

His funeral was preached on the 18th, and he was buried by the side of his dear wife, who had preceded him about seven years. He leaves five sons and one daughter, and a large cir-

cle of relations and friends to weep over his death.

He has left them a rich legacy in the pure and faithful life which he lived. Experimental religion was his great theme. and he exhibited it as the controlling power in all the relations of life. In every field of labor he was very laborious, acceptable and successful. He thoroughly comprehended, and devotedly loved the doctrines held and the usages practiced by the church of his choice. And his church loved and honored him. He was elected to every General Conference as a delegate or reserve since 1842. He was prominently connected with all the important interests of the Conference, and was ever faithful to the interest committed to him. He was wise in counsel, solid in his piety, transparent in his principle of action, hence he won the respect and confidence of the multitude with whom he mingled. A good and great man is gone. Let us follow him as he followed Christ. Let us pray God's blessing upon his dear children who are doubly orphaned. And may all who lament his loss profit by his pure example, be warned by his sudden death, and like him be ever ready.

REV. NUMA F. REID, D. D.

Numa Fletcher Reid was born in Rockingham county, N. C., July 3, 1825. His parents were Rev. James Reid of sainted memory in the North Carolina Conference, and Martha Reid, daughter of Rev. George R. Edwards. N. F. Reid was the second of nine children, and survived all of them but one. When a boy he was remarkable for unyielding integrity, genial affection and attachment to home, and especially to his mother; nor did these amiable qualties cease with childhood, but became stronger and still more beautiful as they adorned graceful, gifted, useful manhood. In early life his educational advantages were confined to the small public and private schools, common in that section of the country. At the age of thirteen he entered Emory and Henry College, where he remained 3 years; he left the institution without graduating, though he had accomplished most of the academic course of study. He was a hard student at college, and so continued to the end of his life; he was eminently a scholar in mental discipline, mental development, knowledge of the scholars's resources and their use. clear conception of systems of thought, and an unusual comprehension of men, opinions and tendencies. He saw quickly and clearly, discriminated wisely, argued with directness and force, and rarely on any occasion was wanting in information, arrangement of ideas, or facility of expression. Mentally he was a greater man than the work he did, and his works are worthy any man or any church. Physically he was delicate from childhood, was often prevented from protracted study, or great efforts; and never experimentally knew or enjoyed the immense advantage of vigorous, mind-sustaining health. His body was never at all equal to his soul's wants and needs, and many a sermon did he preach, and many a duty perform on the Conference floor when nothing but indomitable energy kept him from confinement to his bed. He once said that experience had proved to him that prayer was as beneficial to his body as to his soul, and that without prayer his body would not have lasted till his thirtieth year.

At the age of seventeen he commenced a school at Thompsonville, in Rockingham county, the Rev. James H. Brent being at that time one of his pupils. Afterwards he taught at Salem Church, near Reidsville, and in 1846, in connection with Mr. F. L. Harris, he opened an Academy at Wentworth. Mr. Harris withdrew at the end of the first year, but the school was continued five years by Dr. Reid with great success. During this period he had some inclination to study law, and was strongly urged thereto by gentlemen of the bar residing in that

county, who knew him well, and predicted that he would attain

great distinction in that profession.

While teaching at Wentworth he received the degree of Master of Arts from Randolph Macon College, and in 1866 the University of North Carolina unanimously bestowed upon him the degree of Doctor of Divinity. These and other honors he appreciated becomingly, sustained nobly, and wielded all for

the glory of God.

In 1847 he was licened to preach, and traveled the Wentworth Circuit two years as a supply. In 1851 he joined the North Carolina Conference at Salisbury, was ordained deacon the same year, and elder in 1853. The labors of his ministry were as follows: 1852-'53, Tar River Circuit; 1854, Front Street, Wilmington; 1855-'56, Raleigh Station; 1857, Greensboro Station; 1858-'59, Presiding Elder of Salisbury District; 1860, '61, '62 and '63, Presiding Elder of Greensboro District; 1864, '65, '66 and '67, Presiding Elder of Raleigh District; 1868, '69, '70 and '71, Presiding Elder of Raleigh District; 1872, he was appointed Presiding Elder of Raleigh District, but his health becoming greatly impaired, with the consent of the Bishop, he exchanged work with Rev. Wm. H. Bobbitt on the Greensboro District, and continued on that District till his death

He was four times elected to General Conference, and three

times headed the list of delegates.

In 1846 he was married to Ann Eliza Wright, eldest daughter of James Wright, Esq., of Wentworth. Eight children were born to him, seven are still living. His wife died April 15, 1869. He was married a second time, Sept. 3, 1872, to Sallie

L. Wright, sister of his first wife.

In all the relations of life he was a model man, and everywhere by his actions fully and forcibly commended the Gospel which he preached. As a preacher he preached the Gospel with learning for the understanding, with logic to convince, and with a divine unction to move the heart. As a presiding officer he was courteous, though decided, looking carefully after all the interests of the church, and was eminently successful in always having them in good condition. As a member of Conference he was genial, diligent in business, and fair to all; in social life he was lively and pleasant, somewhat fond of well polished repartee, but was never known to use or countenance rough jesting or coarse allusions.

He was in an especial manner interested in our educational enterprises, and was connected with every movement made for their establishment and advancement. He was a Trustee both of Trinity College and of Greensboro Female College; he attended all meetings and was a chief man in devising and maturing all plans. To Dr. Reid, more than any other man, is Greensboro Female College indebted for its existence. In all respects all our Colleges owe much to Dr. Reid; he loved them,

and labored for their good.

Our Advocates, through all their varied fortunes, he sustained by speeches before the Conference and the public, by contributions to their columns, and financial help from his own resources. He firmly believed in sustaining all Conference enterprises, his motto being that we live for the Church and our families, the two being identified in all their interests.

He was an honored member of the Masonic Fraternity, had much influence among Masons, and was greatly respected by them. One of the finest productions of his life was his address at the Centennial Anniversary of the Grand Lodge of North

Carolina.

Such were some of the virtues of our deceased brother. Not many such men, so gifted and so useful to the church and pub-

lic, are given to any one age of history.

At the Charlotte Conference, 1871, he contracted a cold from which he never finally recovered. At the close of the last Conference his health was greatly injured by fresh cold. He attended his appointments till February, and struggled hard to continue on but could not. He then proposed to the brethren to resign his district, but they dissuaded him from that step. In march he told the writer of this that his work was done. He said, "I should like to preach a few more times, I would call for penitents every time I preached. I could tell the people better about eternal things. I am waiting by the river, and feel and know the reality of what I have loved and preached. If I never go to Conference again tell the brethren I loved them better and still better at the last, and bid them good-bye till we meet in Heaven."

He continued still able to walk about the house till June 4th, when he was confined to his bed, and lingered there till 8 o'clock Friday morning, June 6th, when he died peacefully and triumphantly. For the last two days he rejoiced almost continually; his mind was clear and his faith strong. He told them not to give him stimulants, he wanted to face death with an unclouded mind a and christian's faith. His last words were, "Frank, I shall see your mother and my mother."

His funeral was preached at Wentworth on the next Sabbath before such a mulitude as has not often assembled in any State. All the people loved Dr. Reid. His fame and good works are in all the churches, and his memory is a rich legacy to the

whole country.

The following resolutions were read by Dr. Deems, and adopted by the Conference:

WHEREAS, Our Heavenly Father has during the past year removed from us our beloved brother, Augustus W. Steele, Esq.,

of Favetteville, therefore be it

Resolved, By the North Carolina Annual Conference, that in the death of Mr. Steele our Church and the whole Christian Church in North Carolina has lost a brother beloved, a man of clear intellect and true heart and unblemished life; that the Conference has been bereaved of a staunch friend and faithful colaborer, and the community of an exemplary and most excellent citizen.

Resolved, That in memory of our appreciation of our beloved and lamented brother this action be entered on our Journal, and a copy sent by the Secretary to the family of Mr.

Steele.

CHARLES F. DEEMS, ROBERT S. MORAN, E. W. THOMPSON, JOHN C. SLOCUMB, JOHN W. LEAK, E. J. LULLY.

The Conference then adjourned with the benediction by the Bishop.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

Conference met at $3\frac{1}{2}$ o'clock P. M., Bishop Keener in the Chair, and was opened with religious services conducted by J. W. Lewis.

The Journal of the morning session was read and approved.

The committee on the case of C. Plyler reported, recommending that the character of C. Plyler pass, and that he be located at his own request. The report was adopted.

The Conference then proceeded to elect delegates to the next General Conference. J. W. Lewis and P. J. Caraway were appointed tellers for the clerical vote, and O. W. Carr and Wm. Paylor for the lay vote.

FIRST BALLOT.

One hundred and fourteen votes were cast; fifty-eight being necessary to election, B. Craven received 79, W. H. Bobbitt 73, W. S. Black 59, and were declared elected.

For lay delegates twenty-five ballots were cast; thirteen being necessary to election, E. J. Lilly received 23, Rev. T. M. Jones 18, F. C. Robbins 13, and J. W. Hays 15, the same being elected.

SECOND BALLOT.

On the second ballot for clerical members one hundred and six ballots were cast; fifty four being necessary to election, N. H. D. Wilson received 76 and L. S. Burkhead 59, and were elected.

For lay delegates twenty-five ballots were cast; Dr. T. C. Smith received 13 votes, and was elected.

On motion of B. Craven, it was resolved that when we adjourn, we will adjourn to meet at 8 o'clock this evening.

The Conference then adjourned.

EVENING SESSION.

Conference met at 8 o'clock, Bishop Keener in the Chair, and was opened with religious services conducted by J. P. Moore.

The Conference then proceeded to complete the election of delegates to the General Conference.

THIRD BALLOT.

On the third ballot there were one hundred votes; fifty-one being necessary to a choice, S. D. Adams received 64, and was elected.

For a lay delegate there were twenty-four votes; W. D. Rountree received 15, and was elected.

The Conference then elected alternates. From the clerical members E. A. Yates and J. W. North were elected; for lay alternates, Dr. J. B. Beckwith, William Paylor and W. J. Parker.

On motion, leave of absence was granted to C. M. Anderson.

On motion, it was resolved that John Tillett may have the use of a scholarship belonging to the Conference at Randolph Macon College.

On motion of Dr. Deems, the Committee on Education was instructed to insert in their report how many scholar-ships this Conference has in Raudolph Macon College, and that any preacher desiring to use such scholarship shall have a certificate from the Chairman of the Committee on Education, that he is entitled to use the same.

On motion of B. Craven, the further consideration of the above interest was postponed for the present.

The Conference then proceeded to determine where the next Conference shall be held, Raleigh, Greensboro, Mocksville and Newbern were nominated. Raleigh was selected.

The Conference then adjourned with the benediction by the Bishop.

SIXTH DAY.

Tuesday, December 16, 1873.

Conference met at 9½ o'clock, Bishop Keener in the Chair, and was opened with religious services conducted by T. P. Ricaud.

The Journal of the afternoon and evening sessions of the fifth day was read and approved. Question 14th was called, "What local preachers are elected elders?"

R. L. Abernethy having been duly recommended by his Quarterly Conference, according to discipline, was elected to elders orders.

On motion of R. G. Barrett, S. D. Adams and J. E. Mann were appointed fraternal messengers to the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church, to meet at Enfield, N. C., some time in 1874.

On motion, leave of absence was granted to W. D. Rountree, T. H. Edwards, R. S. Moran, W. S. Chaffin, Wm. Paylor, S. R. Trawick, T. B. Reeks, M. C. Thomas, M. J. Hunt and R. T. Gray.

T. W. Guthrie read the report from the Committee on the Bible Cause, also a minority report from the same committee.

On motion of Dr. Moran, the minority report was laid on the table.

The majority report was adopted.

Question 5th was taken up, "Who are re-admitted."

J. P. Simpson having been recommended by the Quarterly Conference of Pineville Circuit, was re-admitted.

Question 1st was again called, and David P. Goode, of Happy Home Circuit, having been recommended by his Quarterly Conference, according to dicipline, was received on trial.

J. R. Griffith read the report of the Committee or Sabbath Schools, which was adopted as follows:

REPORT ON SABBATH SCHOOLS.

The Committee on Sabbath Schools are happy to report a growing interest in this important department of the Church. If there is any fact that characterizes more than another the advance movement of the Church of the present day, it is the increasing appreciation of the Sabbath School enterprise. Combining as it does all the appliances of the Gospel, and

concentrating them upon the mind and heart when most susceptible of impression. No field of usefulness offers a more plenteous harvest to the active and earnest workers. The faithful men and women who labor in our Sabbath Schools are the "standing army" of the Church, and to them she anxiously and hopefully looks for organized and determined efforts against vice and immorality. The committee beg leave to submit the following:

Resolved 1, That an increased effort be made by the ministry of our Conference to stimulate the systematic growth and pros-

perity of this important department of the Church.

Resolved 2, That our pastors be instructed to impress upon their people the vital importance of continuing these schools through the winter, thereby keeping up connection in our uniform lessons, and rendering them more effective.

Resolved 3, That superintendents and officers of these schools be instructed to impress specially upon the children the great duty of Christian benevolence, and to this end we recommend

the penny system of contribution.

Resolved 4, That we heartily endorse our Sunday School Periodicals, the Magazine, the Visitor and Our Little People,

and recommend them for use in all our schools.

Resolved 5, That this Conference, through their delegates, do memorialize the General Conference that assembles in Louisville, Ky., May, 1874, to enact a law for the election of Sunday School Superintendents. 2. That in the opinion of this Conference Sunday School Superintendents should be nominated by the preachers in charge, and elected by the Quarterly Conference annually.

REPORT ON BOOKS AND PERIODICALS.

In submitting their report, the Committee on Books and Periodicals deem it almost superfluous to remind the Conference and the Church that the printing press, in its power to evangelize the world, is unrivaled by any other agency except the living ministry. From the days of Mr. Wesley to the present, the Church has used it with a success too marked to have been

unnoticed by the most careless observer.

This powerful agency for moulding public opinion and shaping the lives of men has been seized upon by the wicked and prostituted to the destruction of thousands. Day and night as a fountain of evil, it is sending forth its streams of bitterness through the earth, poisoning the minds and corrupting the hearts of the learned and the ignorant, and those who occupy high places as well as low. In our judgment the Church should take hold of this formidable weapon with a stronger grasp and wrest it from the hands of her enemies, or at least neutralize its power by turning it against them.

A sound religious literature, such as is being sent forth by our Church, is an invaluable blessing to those among whom it is circulated, and therefore an increased circulation of it is greatly to be desired by all who love virtue and desire to see scriptural holiness spread over these lands. Other churches are doing much in this direction, but instead of decreasing it augments the responsibilities that are upon us. While we set up no pretensions and exclusive claims, still we have distinctive doctrines and denominational peculiarities, which make us widely to differ from all the other churches about us. In our own literature these doctrines are taught, and here only are they defended; and to make our people intelligent christians of the Methodist type, our own literature must be read by them. Resolved 1, That our preachers and pastors are hereby requested to make all suitable efforts to have our houses of worship and parsonages properly cared for by the trustees, and improved by having all necessary repairs made whenever practicable.

Resolved 2, That all the preachers in charge of circuits and stations be required to bring up a full statement of church property, embracing the number and value of churches and parsonages in their respective charges, and report the same to the next annual Conference.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

The Committee on Education presented their report, which was adopted, as follows:

REPORT ON EDUCATION.

The Committee on Education submit the tollowing report:
The committee feeling the transcendent importance of diffusing the rich blessings of a thorough and christian education,
and the imperative necessity of harmonious action in order to
wield all the effective elements of the church in this direction,
has worked earnestly, patiently and laboriously to recommend
such measures as will promote the highest educational prosperity through the strength of united efforts.

GREENSBORO FEMALE COLLEGE.

It is well known to us all that this institution of learning is completed, furnished, and in successful operation. To make its wide spread fruitfulness of good perpetual, we have only to take care of its financial interest, which up to the present time has been judiciously managed by the Board of Trustees.

A few men have nobly stepped forward and taken upon their shoulders the pecuniary burden of the College, and this they have done at the peril of their individual estates, but are willing to take risks and carry them until the Conference can relieve them, in order to put the institution upon the footing of active usefulness. The duty, therefore, of the church to inaugurate all possible measures and operate them with the greatest possible dispatch and united efforts to collect funds for their relief is beyond all question, most sacred and imperative. And we believe that the christian honor and faithfulness to pledges assumed on the part of the church is such as will fully meet the confidence so generously placed in her by these gentlemen in and out of our church, without whose pecuniary aid, our noble institution of learning would still be sleeping in her ashes with but little hope of ever being rebuilt. The Committee, therefore, heartily endorse the measures of the Trustees, and recommend the passage of the following resolutions:

Resolved 1, That we exert our influence to increase the

patronage of the College.

Resolved 2, That in accordance with the request of the Board of Trustees, we request the Bishop to appoint Rev. L. L. Hendren, Agent for the College, and that we do heartily co-operate

with him in his work of securing funds.

Resolved 3, That we accept the proposition of the Board of Trustees, viz: That we endeavor to raise fifty thousand dolars in donations, to pay the indebtedness of the College, and thereby secure a fee simple title thereto, and that the said sum of fifty thousand dollars be considered a permanent fund invested in the College building or property, and the interest thereon at the rate of 6 per cent. be annually and in perpetuity paid in board and tuition in the education of the daughters of the ministers of the North Carolina Conference; and should a less sum than fifty thousand be raised as aforesaid, then the interest upon any sum so raised shall be applied in the manner as aforesaid.

Resolved 4, That the Conference confirm the nomination of Rev. S. D. Adams, as recommended by the Board of Trustees.

TRINITY COLLEGE.

The Committee being deeply impressed with the vital necessity of furnishing such ample facilities as will give our sons in this age of seductive infidelity, the highest order of a finished and thorough christian education, take pleasure in recommending the passage of the following resolutions:

Resolved 1, That we do all earnestly desire to unite all practicable influence in North Carolina to enlarge, endow and build up Trinity College, so that it may take its place among the

very first denominational institutions of learning in America. Resolved 2, That we do most sincerely recommend Trinity College to the patronage of our people, and earnestly commend all parties concerned, and the public of North Carolina generally, to confide in the Board of Trustees and co-operate with them in all necessary measures to achieve this most desirable result.

Resolved 3, That the interests and the success of Trinity College require the continuance of the agency for the coming Conference year, and we request the Bishop to appoint Rev. B. B. Culbreth as agent, and our people everywhere to assist him in his work.

The Committee recommend that the Conference confirm the election, as Trustees of the College, of the following gentlemen, nominated by the Board of Trustees, viz: Bros. W. S. Black, M. L. Wood, J. E. Mann, Dr. W. E. Freeman, Hon. A. S. Merrimon and T. H. Gatlin.

DAVENPORT FEMALE COLLEGE.

Resolved 1, That we heartily recommend Davenport Female College as an institution whose faculty, former career of usefulness, and present elements of prosperity, merit the continued

confidence and patronage of our people.

Resolved 2, That in order to aid in the continued success of this institution we recommend, in compliance with the petition of the Board of Trustees, the re-appointment of Rev. T. J. Gattis as agent, and that we will welcome him as such throughout our Conference.

MISSIONARY SOCIETY OF THE METHODIST EPIS-COPAL CHURCH, SOUTH.

This Society was organized at the General Conference of 1846, with Edward Stevenson, D. D., as Secretary. In 1850 E. W. Sehon, D. D., was made Secretary, and served until the General Conference of 1866, at which two Boards were organized —one having control of the Foreign and the other of the Domestic Mission work. E. W. Sehon, D. D., was elected Secretary of the Foreign Board—which position he resigned in 1868 and was succeeded by W. E. Munsey, D. D.—and J. B. McFerrin, D. D., of the Domestic Board. The General Conference of 1870 discontinued this arrangement, and again placed the Missionary operations of the Church under the management of the Board, with J. B. McFerrin as Secretary.

CONFERENCE INSTITUTIONS.

The North Carolina Conference owns and controls three Colleges, now in active and successful operation, viz: Trinity College, Greensboro Female College and Davenport Female College. At Trinity the whole Conference have free tuition for all their sons for as long time as they may choose to remain in the Institution. Arrangements are in progress to effect equivolent advantages for their daughters at Greensboro and Davenport.

TRINITY COLLEGE.

This Institution is located five mile from High Point, on the North Carolina Railroad. For health, general culture and morals, and facility of access, no location could be better. The College was founded in 1854, and now has about one hundred and sixty alumni.

OOURSE OF INSTRUCTION.

The whole Course of Instruction is embraced in eleven Schools, viz: Latin, Greek, Mathematics, English Literature, Natural Science, Mental and Moral Philosophy, Modern Languages, Theology, Engineering and Architecture, Analytical Chemistry and Law. Theology or Law may be studied exclusively; in all other departments the student may make his own selection, but take at least three Schools.

DEGREES AND MARKS OF HONOR CONFERRED. %

In addition to the usual *Honorary Degrees* conferred by colleges and universities, the Degrees conferred are:

- 1. Certificates of Proficiency, given for satisfactory attainments in any School. In all, except this, regular Diplomas are given.
- 2. Graduate in a School, conferred upon those who have completed the studies in any School, and have passed a satisfactory examination.

- 3. Bachelor of Science, conferred for approved examination upon all the studies in the Schools of Mathematics, Natural Science, Engineering and Architecture, and Analytical Chemis-
- 4. Bachelor of Arts, conferred upon those who have graduated in the Schools of Latin, Greek, Mathematics, English Literature, Natural Science, Mental and Moral Philosophy, and French; or in either Latin or Greek, Mathematics, English Literature, Natural Science, Mental and Moral Philosophy, French and German; and Engineering and Architecture, or Analytical Chemistry.
- 5. Master of Arts, conferred upon those who have graduated in Latin, Greek, Mathematics, pure applied, English Literature, Natural Science, Mental and Moral Philosophy, French and German. An Essay on some subject selected by the Faculty, must be prepared by the students for Commencement Day.

COURSE OF STUDY.

For admission into the Freshman Class the applicant must be approved upon Latin Grammar and Prosody, Latin Reader, Casar, six books of the Enied, Greek Grammar and Reader, Arithmetic and Algebra to Equations of the Second Degree, Geography and English Grammar. Note.—Those who take the German Course may omit the Greek.

The usual expenses in the Literary Societies and for Commencement are about \$10 00 per annum. There are no other items of expense. When money is furnished the President in advance, according to our published estimates, he will, at all times, give a receipt in full for the term.

All payments to be made in currency; board, monthly in advance; tuition, half in advance, the remainder at the middle of the term. Any departure from this rule must be by previous arrangement. Checks and drafts can be sent by letter; money should be sent by Express.

Trinity is a Money Order Office. Post Office Orders on Trinity can be obtained at all the principal offices in the country. These may always be sent at our risk. All funds should be sent to the President, and by him receipts will in all cases be given.

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The BOARDING DEPARTMENT is under the personal supervision of the President's lady.

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The scholastic year is divided into sessions of 20 weeks each.

The Spring session begins on the THIRD THURSDAY in January, and closes on the FIRST THURSDAY in June-Commencement Day.

The Fall Session begins on the LAST WEDNESDAY in July, and closes on the third Wednesday in December.

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
