APPENDIX

BOARD OF MISSIONS-REPORT NO. 1

Our Conference is aware of the serious situation which confronts the Mission work of our Church. The General Board adjourned its May meeting without making its accustomed appropriations, owing to the lack of funds. It was decided, however, to take the matter before the Church at large and ask for a special offering of \$750,000 to meet the imminent needs, and to report the response to this appeal to an adjourned meeting on December 10th.

Such a situation demands thoughtful attention, and your Mission Board offers the following recommendations:

1. That the North Carolina Conference attempt to secure as soon as possible, a special offering in cash and short time pledges, the sum of \$50,000 for our General Mission work.

2. That the Presiding Elders be requested to direct this work in their respective districts, and that the Board of Missions in Conference with them, determine the basis of distribution of the above amount to the several districts.

3. That F. S. Love be designated from the Board of Missions to assist the Presiding Elders and the pastors in presenting this work to the Churches, and that district meetings be held as soon as practicable after the Conference.

BOARD OF MISSIONS-REPORT NO. 3

James Buchanan Duke

In the passing of James Buchanan Duke, the Methodist circuit rider of the plains, the hills, and the mountains of North Carolina, has lost a friend. This friend has watched with keen interest the fruits of God's gift made through his hands and rejoiced to have the servants of God fare forth upon their life bearing mission.

Your Board of Missions breathes a prayer of thankfulness to God that He gave such a vision and wealth to this benefactor, that the circuit rider will continue to go forth victoriously braving the storms of the coast, the heat of the plains, and the winter blasts of the Blue Ridge to the end that the spirit of the living Christ may permeate the homes and lives of the toilers of the soil whether they dwell on the banks of the Albemarle or in the mountain caves.

It is the desire of your Board of Missions that at this time Bishop Denny be requested to voice the thanks of North Carolina Methodism to God for His blessings upon us through this servant.

The Mission Call

The dividends of missions are declared in the terms of life. When mission work and mission giving ceases, then life becomes atrophid. The command of our Lord to "go ye into all the world" is as living and obligatory for us today as it was for the disciples of old. The mission work of our Church is at the cross roads. Retrenchment after retrenchment has been made until we can no longer retreat. We must at least hold the possessed outposts, and speedily send forth reinforcements to the rescue. The reinforcements asked of the North Carolina Conference are not in terms of men, but in terms of food and clothing for those holding the frontier.

It is especially desired by the General Board of Missions that the North Carolina Conference finance for the coming year our missionaries in Kobe District, Japan, and a group in the Western Mexican Mission. To this end we are asked to make a special offering of fifty thousand dollars, which has been allotted to the districts as follows:

Durham, \$6,400.00; Elizabeth City, \$4,450.00; Fayetteville, \$5,550.00; New Bern, \$5,550.00; Raleigh, \$5,900.00; Rockingham, \$5,650.00; Washington, \$6,450.00; Weldon, \$5,300.00; Wilmington, \$4,-800.00.

The work of securing this special missionary offering has been entrusted to the presiding elders and ministers in charge. It is urged that a special district meeting be held in rotation in each district as soon as practicable after the adjournment of Conference as the results of the meetings shall be reported to the Board of Missions December 10th.

To meet the tasks and demands upon us, the following recommendations are offered:

1. That the Rev. F. S. Love be elected Conference Missionary Secretary to assist in the work of the District meetings without salary.

2. That the fourth Sunday offering for missions ordered by the General Conference is sacredly preserved for the support of our work in Europe, as now directed by the General Sunday School Board.

3. That every Epworth League makes a pledge for the support of Africa, abroad, and Paine College and Arizona, at home.

4. That the assessment for Conference Mission work be increased from \$18,000 to \$21,000 and that the full payments of all assessments be secured.

5. That Mr. M. E. Newsom be nominated as the lay representative, and the Rev. F. S. Love be nominated as the clerical representative, of the North Carolina Conference on the General Board of Missions.

6. That Rev. W. W. Peele be elected to succeed himself as the representative of the Board of Missions on the Board of Directors of the Pastors' Summer School.

REPORT OF BOARD OF EDUCATION

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION MOVEMENT

We recommend that our people do all that they can to close up the Christian Education Movement in 1926 by securing all subscriptions. We ask that next February and March be a time of special effort for this purpose. Inasmuch as Trinity Park School has been discontinued we recommend that the unpaid subscriptions directed to it should be transferred to Duke University.

We ask that H. M. North, L. S. Massey, and John C. Lockhart represent our Church in matters touching Religious Education in tax-supported institutions.

We suggest that the General Board of Education be requested to consider the feasibility of holding two or more Bible Conferences within the bounds of this Annual Conference. W. A. Stanbury is nominated to represent our Board of Education at the Methodist Educational Association.

H. M. North is nominated to succeed himself as one of the managers of the Pastors' Summer School.

DUKE UNIVERSITY

All of us rejoice at the new era which is opening for Duke University. It is with gratitude to God and also to our human benefactor that we note the very large increase in our financial resources. Since our last report Mr. J. B. Duke established a foundation of forty million dollars for Educational and Religious purposes. Thirty-two percent of this is available for Duke University. In his will, recently announced, an additional seventeen million dollars were left to this institution. About four thousand acres of land have been secured for new development. Ten new buildings are now being erected on the old campus. Eleven hundred and sixty-four students were enrolled during the last year. The authorities are expanding the courses to meet the new program. Within the University, three large divisions have been made. the Business Division, the Educational Division, and the Student Life Division. The utmost loyalty of our constituency is asked to make Duke University not only in physical size, but especially in quality, a great institution.

GREENSBORO COLLEGE

Greensboro College has had an increase of forty-six students the past year. We are glad to record the gift of one hundred thousand dollars from Mr. B. N. Duke towards endowment. In addition to this subscriptions for about one hundred thousand on endowment were taken in a local campaign.

Greensboro College met the conditions required for an A-Grade College and entered officially into that relationship last February. The College asks us to renew our endorsement to secure a half million dollars for endowment.

LOUISBURG COLLEGE

It was good to see that Louisburg College has had a twentyfive per cent increase in its student body this year. They are in the midst of an effort to raise a half million dollars for building and endowment. In addition to many small gifts they have two of large proportions. One of seventy-two thousand five hundred dollars from Mr. R. H. Wright, and the other of one hundred thousand from Mr. B. N. Duke. We are asked to endorse a movement on

the part of Louisburg College to raise a fund of a half million dollars outside of the Churches proper, for building and endowment.

CAROLINA COLLEGE

This institution is our youngest and is small in its number of students and faculty, but fine in its spirit and quality of its work and loyalty. Its buildings are good. It maintains the standard of a Junior College as respects the requirements of the Church and of the State. Its especial field seems to be the education of poor girls. An effort is being made to secure an endowment.

REPORT OF BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION

The Board suffered a very grievous loss this year in the death of Rev. G. M. Daniel, a most faithful and useful member.

We find a constantly increasing demand upon this Board for aid, even by the larger Churches. These larger Churches are forgetting this Board was born and exists for the purpose of aiding weak, struggling congregations to build. And this demand has become so large we are forced to turn almost all our rural applications over to the Duke Commission so that we may aid a few of the others. The Duke Commission will meet in a few weeks to dispose of those turned over to it.

Your Board wishes to join with everybody concerned in expressing our thanks to almighty God for the great aid given this cause by Mr. Duke, and to rejoice that he so planned that this aid will grow larger as the years go by.

A resolution was passed by the Board most heartily commending the efforts of the Evangelist Club of Fayetteville to build a Protestant Memorial Church at Fort Bragg, where there are so many Protestant young men, sixty per cent of whom are native born Americans.

We are constrained still to beg that our preachers and other leaders present our great need of an adequate loan fund to those who are able to give, as a fine opportunity to erect our own monuments in memorial funds.

REPORT OF SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD TO N. C. CONFERENCE

Your Sunday School Board submits the following report:

The year just concluded has shown a continuation of the growth and progress of the work throughout the bounds of the N. C. Conference. All the older and better established phases of our work have been carried forward with splendid success, and some new phases have been promoted in a way that offers prospects of lasting good to our Church.

Our employed staff has been quite active; and much use has been made of volunteer workers, including the officers of your Board, district workers, approved checkers, and others. Some idea of the scope of the work done by the Conference Superintendent may be gained from the fact that, in the discharge of the duties of his office, he traveled over 13,000 miles, visited 73 Sunday Schools and Churches, made 166 addresses and talks, supervised 29 training schools, and taught in 17 of them, spending 217 days in the field. In addition he set up and directed the second annual check-up campaign, in which approximately 75 volunteer workers assisted and about 300 Sunday Schools were visited and checked, and gave general supervision to all the work committed to the Board.

The elementary superintendent was quite active, traveling over 6,000 miles, visiting 64 Sunday Schools and Churches, working in 24 Training Schools, promoting Children's Week, and making other valuable contributions to the advancement of our work with children.

Our Training Record

During the year a total of 2.805 training awards were issued in the North Carolina Conference, including:

Some indication of the growth of our training program during the past quadrennium (covering the period of the present Conference Superintendents tenure of office) is the following, being the awards by years:

We conducted this year 29 training schools as against 20 last. Of the 29 schools held, 18 were Standard Schools, 9 Cokesbury, and two non-standard.

Special mention should be made of the Cokesbury Training Course, which has been made available this year. Ministering primarily to workers in small Sunday Schools, as is the prime purpose of this course, the North Carolina Conference has within the few months in which this course has been available, established a record which places our Conference in the forefront of Conferences in Southern Methodism in this type of work, only one other Conference excelling or equalling our record. This emphasis on Cokesbury work has not caused us to let up with reference to Standard Training work. We conducted this year 18 Standard Schools as against 14 last year, 9 in 1923 and 6 in 1922.

Summarizing, we find the following interesting facts concerning training schools:

Counted as enrolled are only those present at least half of the time, and most of those so counted were present for the full period of the school, which extended through six days. Attention is also called to the fact that approximately one-half of our schools were directly served by training schools this year.

Of the 880 listed as earned in colleges, 713 were issued in Duke University, 32 in Louisburg College, 84 in Greensboro, 8 in Rutherford, and the others in miscellaneous institutions outside the state.

During the year 115 preachers earned 174 training certificates. Progress made in this phase of our work is indicated as follows:

Programs of Work

Next to our training work, and deserving to rank with it in importance and emphasis, has been our Program of Work, placing and checking. A total of 329 Sunday Schools have adopted these standards of efficiency, in keeping with paragraph 390 of the Discipline, an increase of 117 over last year. During the period of October 11-25 we conducted our second annual Conference-wide check-up campaign, in which an effort was made to visit each of these 329 schools.

Reports from schools whose reports have been audited show over twice as many ranking schools as the whole campaign showed last year. Approximately 650 seals will be awarded these schools, as against about 400 the previous year.

Wesley Classes

We have reason to believe that our Wesley Class work is in better condition than it has been in recent years at least; perhaps ever. Through our Conference Federation at Sanford, our Program of Work, check-up campaign, correspondence, and personal touch here and there, we have injected some new life into organized class work. We have had encouraging success in securing annual reports, which we consider vital to the interests of organized class work. Records in our office and at Nashville indicate over 500 Wesley Classes registered to date. Many of these have not submitted any report.

Conference-wide Conference

Our second annual Conference-wide Conference, held at Sanford. April 7, 8, 9, 1925, was largely attended. Approximately 500 people were present as delegates and visitors. Immediately preceeding the Conference proper there was a meeting of Board members, presiding elders, district workers, and employed staff in what we call our Conference Council. We think these gatherings proved quite worth-while and should be continued.

Dual Extension Program

We have this year given considerable attention to the subject of missionary education and Sunday School extension. In both Standard and Cokesbury Training Schools, in Programs of Work, and otherwise, we have emphasized this important phase of our work. Our progress, however, has been hindered by the situation in which we found ourselves following the Centenary period.

The Board has adopted a plan recommended by the General Boards concerned, of adjustment of the claims of the Centenary and (which is a part of the agreement) a plan called the Dual Extension Program. Briefly stated in its more important details, the Centenary adjustment plan proposes that Sunday Schools should follow paragraph 392 of the Discipline and observe the fourth Sunday in each month as Missionary Day, and send the offering taken on this day to Mr. E. J. Cheatham, Treasurer, Franklinton, N. C., to be applied (1) 50% to our Church's missionary work in Europe and (2) 50% to Sunday School extension work in rural and missionary territory in our Conference. If, and when, the total amount of item (2) becomes sufficient to cover a budget of approximately \$3,500.00 for this work, the total amount of the fourth Sunday offerings are to go to the work in Eurpore. All moneys directed to this European work will, at the same time, tend to liquidate our Conference Centenary adjusted balance, amounting in March to \$13,432.80. The plan contemplates the putting of a man in the field to carry forward extension work in rural and mission territory.

Miscellaneous Matters

Emphasis from time to time during the year has been given to the proper observance of Decision Day, Children's Week, Sunday School Day, and other special days. We have lost no opportunity, also, to emphasize the importance of the proper arrangement and equipment of Sunday School rooms and departments, and have aided numerous building committees in securing plans in keeping with the requirements of our denomination. The necessity and opportunity of reaching the unreached and teaching the untaught, moreover, have been kept rather constantly on the minds and hearts of our leaders, and efforts have been to extend the membership and fellowship of the Sunday School.

Considerable interest has been shown in some communities during the year in Week-day Religious Education, Daily Vacation Bible Schools and Home and Parent-Teacher Work. We have lent such encouragement and assistance to these enterprises as we were able. We believe that perhaps never has there been more widespread and intelligent interest in religion and religious instruction, and we feel that the time is opportune to go forward to the limit of our abilities and resources.

Recommendations

In order that the work may go forward during the coming year, we submit the following recommendations:

1. That Standard Training Schools be conducted in communities guaranteeing an enrollment that will make it possible to issue a minimum of 50 certificates of credit.

2. That Cokesbury Training Schools be conducted, where practicable, in communities not already served by Standard Training Schools.

3. We, the Sunday School Board, express our gratitude to the presiding elders, pastors, and superintendents for their interest and co-operation in behalf of Sunday Schools, bespeak their continued interest and co-operation, and ask that they join members of this Board in taking for credit annually one or more units of the Standard or cokesbury Training courses.

4. That we recognize the educational value of the official Program of Work for schools, departments, and classes and continue, with renewed vigor, our efforts to make them operative throughout the Conference.

5. That we co-operate heartily with the General Sunday School Board in its Church-wide Sunday School membership campaign.

6. That special stress be laid upon the matter of evangelism in the Sunday School and that we recommend to the pastors and Sunday School officers and teachers the plan outlined by the General Sunday School Board.

7. That we heartily approve and recommend the observance of Children's Week in as many of our Churches as practicable.

8. That an effort be made to secure the observance of Sunday School Day in all Sunday Schools.

9. That we recognize the inspirational and educational value of district, sub-district, and charge institutes, and arrange to hold such meetings wherever practicable.

10. That we go on record as favoring week-day religious instruction properly correlated with the work done on Sunday, and call attention to the special materials for schools undertaking this type of work available from the General Sunday School Board.

11. That we urge building committees to acquaint themselves with the building standards of their Church, available through their Conference Sunday School Board office at Durham, and through the Joint Committee on Church and Sunday School Architecture.

12. That we recognize the importance of the preservation of the Christian home and endorse the Home and Parent-Teacher work of the General Sunday School Board.

13. That we approve the action of the Sunday School Board in adopting the Centenary adjustment plan and Dual Extension Program.

The Sunday School Board feels that its employed workers have given unstitutedly of their physical and mental energy in the promotion of the Sunday School work and is sure that the Conference appreciates the progress which has been made in this work during their tenure of office.

Therefore we are pleased to announce the re-employment of Mr. L. L. Gobbel as Conference Superintendent of Sunday School Work at a salary of \$3,300.00 per annum, and of Miss Georgia Keene as Conference Elementary Superintendent at a salary of \$1,500.00 per annum.

EPWORTH LEAGUE BOARD

Your Epworth League Board submits the following Report:

Much is being said about the standards of life being held by the young people of our day. We desire to affirm our faith in them and declare that it is our purpose to give to them any service that they may be permitted us to the end that they may be enlisted and trained for effective service in the Church.

We are grateful in being able to report that progress is being made in this department of the work of our Church. In the language of our General Secretary, "there are many indications of the continued growth of the League idea in the mind of the Church and the League is obtaining an enhanced valuation on the part of the ministers." As concrete evidence of this there was reported in the minutes of the Annual Conferences for 1924 a net gain in chapters of 478 and in members of 6226, making the aggregate in our Church 7,963 chapters and 260,345 members. The president of our Conference Epworth League likewise reports that many evidences of good work and steady growth are to be found.

We would direct the attention of the Conference to our Summer Assembly. The last session was held at Louisburg College for which 300 or more delegates were registered during the week Sixteen Standard of Efficiency Certificates were issued; ten leagues received Christian Culture Diplomas, one hundred and seventyseven Christian Culture Certificates were awarded and ten of our young people gave themselves for definite Christian service. These facts indicate something of the work being done through this channel. Throughout the Church the sessions of the last summer have surpassed in value all previous ones and the records will probably show an increase in attendance. In this connection we desire to express our appreciation of the splendid work of Rev. T. M. Grant, President, and those associated with him in the work of the North Carolina Conference Epworth League.

Again we would direct attention to the work of our District Secretaries. We regard them as being a vital factor in promoting and sustaining the work of the Epworth League. Only with the sympathetic co-operation of the pastors of our Conference can their work continue to be effective.

Your attention has been called to the Methodist Young People's Convention to be held in Memphis, Tenn., December 31-January 3, 1926. The allotment of delegates from our Conference is one hundred. It is very earnestly desired that we shall send our full quota and to this end we solicit your help. In keeping with the call which has been issued, we ask that you join with other Annual Conferences in prayer in behalf of the Convention.

There is a growing conviction that the work of our young people ought to be so correlated that the duplication of effort will be eliminated. We are offering a memorial to our General Conference which looks to the accomplishment of this end.

We desire to recommend that Aniversary Day be observed in all of the congregations of the Conference.

It is further recommended that the Epworth League officers be installed at one of the regular Church services and that our pastors give such other recognition as will be conducted to the progress of the work.

We desire to co-operate faithfully with our General Epworth League Board, our Conference Epworth League, and our General Secretary.

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN LITERATURE

It is our privilege and pleasure to report most favorably as to these important interests committed to our consideration. Christian Literature, we feel, should command constant concern among our people, because of its purpose and power to increase intelligence, to arouse activities, to encourage energetic efforts, and to stimulate systematic service and sacrifice—all of which are noticeably needed in the different departments of the work of our cherished Church. These facts find proof in the statistical statements submitted by our several Publishing Houses, and the Methodist Board of Publication in this Conference. No literature is so suitable and serviceable to our members as the products of our presses; and we trust our pastors may persistently present, privately and publicly, these products, persuading our people, if possible, to purchase and peruse them.

NORTH CAROLINA CHRISTIAN ADVOCATE

Owing to certain conditions our 1925 campaign was cut short, and there has resulted a regrettable reduction in the circulation of the Conference Organ. We recommend that our pastors make uniform use of the assistants appointed by the Quarterly Conference, as agents, if necessary, with reasonable remuneration. We cheerfully commend the job printing department, which has enjoyed an increase of nearly 25% over last year.

Revs. M. Bradshaw and S. B. Turrentine have been re-elected to succeed themselves as members of the Methodist Board of Publication. Rev. A. W. Plyler, of the Western North Carolina Conference, having been re-elected and re-appointed Editor of the North Carolina Christian Advocate, and Rev. T. A. Sikes having been re-elected Business Manager, we respectfully request Bishop Collins Denny to re-appoint the latter to said position, his salary being \$4,500.00.

BOARD OF TEMPERANCE AND SOCIAL SERVICE

The advocates of prohibition are challenged to preserve their victorious battle of half a century for national prohibition. When the 18th amendment was ratified by forty-seven states, the advocates of a sober nation believed, and had a right to believe, their long fight was at an end, and that they might trust to governmental agencies to carry out the constitution's mandate. While

that amendment has outlawed the saloon and the still and lessened drunkenness, the enforcement has fallen short of what law abiding citizens had a right to expect.

Today, by reason of laches of officials, and by reason of an organized propaganda for a return to the evils inseparable from legalized manufacture and sale of intoxicants, the opponents of prohibition and temperance—one and inseparable—challenge the Church and the advocates of law to make good its reform imbedded in the constitution. Nullification threatens the blessings which a sober nation promised.

As representatives of a Christian Church, which crusaded for national prohibition, we call upon the people to respect the spirit and letter of the law by personal total abstinence, and by holding up the hands of all judges and other officials, who seek to enforce it, and we call upon all ministers and laymen to arouse the conscience and public sentiment to a realization of the hopes raised when the law was enacted. Abstinence in the home should be insisted upon and the Church should unitedly call upon the people and the authorities to hold this and all laws in reverence. The nation cannot live half law breaker and half law observer. The only alternative to law observance is anarchy. We shall see the law respected in the home and enforced in the courts, or the crime wave will engulf us. With that choice presented, the issue will not be in doubt when the good people are aroused to undergird the law their long and courageous advocacy secured. The hour has struck when all officers of the law, from the lowest to the highest, should gird themselves to uphold the majesty of law. Recognizing the need of the continued efforts of the Anti-Saloon League, we recommend the re-appointment of Rev. W. B. North and Robert L. Flowers as our representatives on the Board of Trustees of that militant organization.

Along with stressing the observance of total abstinence, our pastors and people are urged to place emphasis upon the sacred observance of the Sabbath, too often given over to recreations which militate against attendance upon divine service and the reading and contemplation of the Word of God.

The awakened interest in the humane treatment of prisoners, the improvement in care of the poor and defective, and the broadening of the work of social welfare by the state and by the Churches are hailed as proof of the growing influence of Christianity in the lives of the people and the thought of the commonwealth. The aid and the active support of all agencies of humanity is pledged NORTH CAROLINA ANNUAL CONFERENCE

by this Church and this Conference. The day must dawn when no child will lack training and care, no dependent feel neglect, no prisoner be without sympathy and humane treatment and no ear be closed to the cry of those in need either of gentleness or charity.

ORPHANAGE REPORT

The Orphanage Committee begs leave to report as follows:

It is with increased interest that we note the continued growth of the orphanage along all lines, and the manner in which the institution is being conducted.

We desire to mention the following items:

1. The school and Administration Building, given by Brother S. C. Vann, has been completed and is now occupied. This is one of the best orphanage buildings in the South. It cost approximately \$175,000,00

2. We note with pleasure that there are enrolled 257 children at the orphanage, and we now have room for 300.

3. As cur 10% assessment only provides for about 50% of the running expenses of the institution, we urge large specials from

the Sunday Schools of the Conference.

4. We specially urge all our pastors and official Boards to arrange for Thanksgiving offerings in every congregation, on or about Thanksgiving Day, to be sent direct to the orphanage.

5. We hereby express our appreciation for the gift of the late Mr. J. B. Duke, under the Duke Foundation, remembering so generously the orphanages throughout North and South Carolina. We would remind our people, however, that since there is such a large number of orphanages participating in the gift, there will be no great amount available to any one orphanage.

6. Your Committee heartily endorses the plan of the orphanage management in sending out the singing class, and appreciates the splendid reception accorded the class by the congregations visited. We would ask our pastors, generally, to use the class as far as possible.

7. The Jenkins Memorial Church is recognized as the Church home for the orphanage, and the facilities, being inadequate, we recommend that encouragement throughout the Conference be given to the erection of a new building properly located.

8. We commend the work being done at the orphanage by Rev. A. S. Barnes, and we deeply sympathize with him in this hour because of the serious illness of his son, praying that his faith will not fail.

9. We deeply deplore the passing of Mrs. Mattie A. Jenkins, the recognized mother of the orphanage, and realize that her place will be hard to fill.

10. We recommend the confirmation of Mr. A. H. Vann in place of his lamented father, Mr. S. C. Vann, as trustee. Term ending 1927.

11. We recommend the continuation of an amount equal to 10% of pastors' salaries for the ensuing year for the support of the orphanage.

12. We earnestly ask again our people to remember the orphanage in their wills.

13. We recommend the re-appointment of Rev. A. S. Barnes, as superintendent of the orphanage, the salary being \$4,000.00.

Fifth: To co-operate with the Board of Missions in meeting the present crisis, with the Board of Finance in its Special Effort for the Superannuate Endowment, with the Christian Education Movement in the collection of pledges, and with the Hospital Board in its purposes as set out at the last General Conference.

REPORT OF JOINT COMMISSION

The Joint Commission representing the Conferences of the Methodist Protestant and the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, in North Carolina, submits the following report:

For the most cordial and brotherly relations existing between these two members of the great Methodist family, we are truly greatful and would do all in our power to contribute to this fine feeling of fellowship and good will. That we may know the unity of a common task, we offer the following suggestive method of procedure in all the efforts ahead of us here in North Carolina.

1. We would that there might be a more general interchange of pulpits between the ministers of the Methodist Protestant Church and the Methodist Episcopal Church, South. This would be helpful to both preachers and people.

2. We would that there might be an interchange of the preachers in their revival work. Each would have a contribution to make to the other in revival methods and zeal in the work.

3. We would that in this time of enlarged interest in the country Church that every effort be made to readjust the work of the two Churches in those places where the work overlaps so that no loss may result in men or money. The contribution of the Duke Foundation to the work of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, makes it most important that we agree for a readjustment that will be for the good of both of the Churches involved. We would also that similar effort be made to avoid crowding or overlapping where new preaching places are being established in the towns and cities.

4. We recommend that wherever there is an effort to make readjustments between our two Churches that the President of the Methodist Protestant Conference and the Presiding Elder involved be and are hereby constituted a Board of Mediation to act with the parties interested in making the readjustments.

REPORT OF THE DUKE FUND COMMISSION

For ten years Mr. J. B. Duke has been contributing \$25,000 annually for the work of the country Churches of North Carolina. This money has marked a new day for the Churches in many places and has furnished a new impulse for the work.

The Duke Foundation, established the present year, with the provision that a definite amount of the annual income shall go to the work of the Church in the country, has made possible a work undreamed of a few years ago. A big job is before us and a heavy obligation is upon us. We must work to certain definite ends. A few may be mentioned:

1. The efforts of the Rural Life Department of Duke University to secure a map of each county and a survey of each charge, should receive the support of all.

2. The consolidation of Churches properly located in relation to consolidated rural schools; the location of parsonages in the country near these schools, when the rearrangement of Churches takes place; the building of adequate Churches wherever we ought to have a Church, call for wisdom and unselfish action.

3. Churches need not expect financial aid until the site and plans have been approved by competent authority. This will contribute to the building of a church adequate and properly located.

4. A district committee, along with the local committee, and also a representative of this commission, should be able to aid in securing proper location and suitable plans.

5. At the earliest possible day demonstration charges should be provided with trained leadership to show what can be done by a more intensive effort.

The Commission would once more remind all concerned that conditional pledges to Church buildings automatically expire unless the conditions are met within one year after the grant is made, provided, however, that the grant may be extended if a new application is filed with the Commission.

The term of Reverend J. E. Holden, nominated by the Board of Church Extension, expires with 1925.

The number of Churches reported, 742; valued at \$7,345,550.00. The indebtedness on these buildings, \$631,224.00.

There are 9 district parsonages valued at \$87,500.

There are 217 parsonages belonging to pastoral charges. These are valued at \$1,335.50.

The amount of insurance carried on this property is \$3,143,990; premiums paid, \$11,860.00.

One parsonage has been damaged by fire to the amount of \$55.00, and this amount was collected on the claim.

We urge the Trustees of Church Property to see that our property is adequately protected by insurance; we also call their attention to the Methodist Mutual Fire Insurance Co. This company is controlled by our Church, and protects the property at actual cost.

We urge our people to make our Church buildings and grounds as beautiful and attractive as possible.

We would also suggest that our pastors and their families take the best possible care of the parsonages and furnishings, and that they make the surroundings as attractive as possible by planting shrubbery and flowers.

REPORT OF JOINT COMMISSION ON UNIVERSITY METHODIST CHURCH

In selecting the contractor for the University Methodist Church, plans and specifications were sent to several responsible builders for bids. The Jewell-Riddle Co., of Sanford, submitted the low bid of \$156,500 and was awarded the contract, after the committee was assured that this firm was thoroughly reliable and that they did high class work.

The heating contract was awarded to Carolina Heating and Engineering Co., of Durham, for the low bid of \$14,500 and the

electric contract was given to the Durham Public Service Co., for the sum of \$3,740.00.

The work of construction began in January and has advanced satisfactorily. It is the aim of the contractors to push the work to completion by the first of the year. If the pew contract can be let and there be no delay in their manufacture and installation the Church will be ready for Easter services.

There has been collected on subscriptions \$137,229.00, and \$132,-224.00 has been paid on the contracts. There are in unpaid individual notes about \$30,000.00, but before all the bills can be paid it will be necessary to secure \$40,000.00 in new subscriptions. The work, therefore, of taking subscriptions will have to be continued during the year.

The plan to provide the pews is to have individuals pay for one sitting each at a cost of \$7.50. As there are about one thousand to be installed an opportunity is given to a large number to have a part in building this beautiful Church for University students.

Mr. James Gamble Rogers, the architect, said that it was his purpose to make this Church as perfect a work in Colonial architecture as the Harkness Quadrangle at Yale is Gothic.

The great need for this Church has been revealed this fall by the inadequacy of the present Church to minister to the religious life of the eight hundred Methodist students at the University, and its final completion must be constantly pursued.

Duke in his gift to the country Churches of North Carolina, with a genuine belief that the North Carolina Conferences have come into the kingdom for just such an hour as this, when vast possibilities of service and high achievement lie out before us, and with a keen feeling that these opportunities call for the most heroic and efficient leadership, we, the North Carolina Conference in annual session in the city of Fayetteville, N. C., resolve:

First: That we unite with the Western North Carolina Conference in forming a "Council of Rural Agencies" for the purpose of securing the co-operation of all the agencies now operating in behalf of the country Church, in order that larger and more definite results may be realized. Second: That the "Council of Rural Agencies" shall be composed of the chairman and superintendents of the Sunday School Boards, the chairman and secretaries of the Church Extension Boards, and the chairman and secretary of the Boards of Missions of the two Conferences, together with the President of Duke University, and the head of the Department of Rural Life at Duke University, and the Chairman of the Duke Fund Commission.

Third: That the "Council of Rural Agencies" shall not interfere with the activities of the various Boards in the prosecution of their work, but shall seek to correlate the work of all the agencies for more effective service.

REPORT OF BOARD OF MANAGEMENT OF PASTOR'S SCHOOL, DUKE UNIVERSITY

The Pastor's School, June 10-24, 1925, proved to be the best yet. The courses offered and the men who were heard on the platform proved to be most satisfactory. The report submitted by Dean H. E. Spence indicated the number in attendance and the work done:

Women and others taking courses: 9 for total of 17 courses.

Totals: Attendance, 293; undergraduates taking courses. 25; undergraduate credits, 105; courses taken, 196. Total number taking courses, 136; total number courses taken, 301.

GEORGE MILTON DANIEL

By M. T. Plyler

George Milton Daniel, son of George Washington Daniel and Debora Maria Lang, was born in Pitt County, North Carolina, May 25, 1884. On the afternoon of June 22nd, 1925, near Red Springs, while in bathing with a picnic party of his Church and Sunday School, this promising young life went out. The tragedy of it all brought sorrow to a wide circle and left his family broken hearted. "T have fought a good fight, I have finished my course," was the text from which he preached the Sunday afternoon previous to his sudden going on Monday. Though little intended, no better summary could close this all too brief career. For Milton Daniel, all his early years had been a struggle to become well prepared for the work of the ministry and to gain a firm foot hold in the work; the end came when the future gleamed with promise.

A brief reference to forces and influences that entered into the making of this young minister will help us better to appreciate the upward push of his life. Those who have gone before must not be forgotten; the mothers of men must evermore be reckoned with in the estimate of the years.

George Washington Daniel and Debora Maria Lang. father and mother of George Milton Dainel, married October 5, 1862. Both were reared in Pitt County by well-to-do parents who belonged to the slave-holding class. George Washington Dainel, a young Lieutenant of the Confederate army, came home on furlough, married Maria Lang, and took his bride to his father's home in the same community, Pactolus. Following the war, they established a home in that community and lived there until they went to Florida This venture proved to be a dismal failure. in 1886. Tt resulted in financial disaster. Unacquainted with orange culture and equally so with the lumber business, in both of which he invested heavily, George Washington Daniel soon had nothing; in five years all was gone.

A sister of our brother, who now resides at Arcadia, Florida, writes of the family:

"There were three brothers and three sisters older than G. M. (Milton we called him) and myself. The three oldest had finished high school and we were taugh by our mother-an educated Christian woman-there being no suitable school in the community. Later my older sister taught a school in the community. We were very poor and my mother was a very delicate woman. When I was fourteen and Milton nine. God took her home. The oldest brother had gone before. The three sisters were married. so father, Milton and myself lived with them a year or .two, and then father took Milton and went back to North . Carolina and married an aunt of our (father's brother's widow). I remained with my sister here-that is, in Florida. So Milton and I have been separated all these years. He had an awful struggle for an education-and I verily believe that it was all in answer to mother's prayers that he succeeded. She always called him her preacher boy-and taught us to know that the best blood of North Carolina was in our veins and we must make good in spite of poverty. I visited Milton while he was at Aberdeen and was so proud of his success and also of the deep religious fervor within him."

Mrs. T. M. Moore, of Greenville, N. C., a step-sister of this, our brother, bears similar testimony. She writes this of Milton's mother:

"She was one of the sweetest Christian characters that I ever knew. From the day of Milton's birth, she began calling him her 'little preacher.' His father was a Christian. Two years after his mother's death, his father married my mother, Mrs. Mary E. Daniel, and she too called him her 'little preacher.' He made his home with my mother until he went to Trinity College. He was always as a brother and son in the home. Too much could not be said of his two mothers. They were model Christian women. His home influences were the very best a boy could have."

Those who knew G. M. Daniel best will most appreciate

the significance of what has been said of those early forces and influences that have had a part in his making. They followed him through all the after years.

George Milton Daniel entered Trinity College in 1906; was granted A. B., 1910; A. M., 1911. He received his B. D. from Vanderbilt, 1914. He was received on trial into the North Carolina Conference in 1909, but he did not enter regularly into the work of an itinerant minister until he had finished his theological training. He served the following charges: Seagate, Wilmington, 1915; Chadbourn, 1916 and part of '17; Aberdeen, part of '17 and '18; Caledonia, 1919-20; Graham, 1921-24; Red Springs, 1925.

These few brief statements bear eloquent testimony to diligent and unwavering efforts in the face of fearful odds to gain the needed preparation for life's work. A11 honor belongs to this devoted and heroic soul. George Milton Daniel was capable of self-abnegation and failed not to practice it. While at Graham I made the suggestion to him that the charge should have at least \$200 a year from the Board of Missions to bring it up to the level of three or four other charges in the district, made possible by the appropriations granted by the Board. He insisted that this be not done. He would rather do without the money than cripple the spirit of self-help he was struggling to develop. The charge needed, he insisted, some heroic work on the part of both the preacher and the people.

A lady of Graham gives this characteristic incident: "When the superannuate drive was put on that Christmas, the teachers in the Hut gave him twenty-five dollars in gold to buy himself a Christmas present. He kept it for a few days and then brought it down to me and said: 'I want to pay this as part of my contribution for the wornout preacher.' He said: 'I am young and strong and can work and get along—they need it.'"

George Milton Daniel and Adah Vie Alderson, of Lebanon, were married at Lebanon, Virginia, January 23, 1914. Their oldest son, Milton, was born in Wilmington, January 17, 1915, and Charles was born in Chadbourn, May 28,

1918. Father and mother and these two boys made an inner circle that greatly enriched all who came to know it. The father looked with eager expectation to the coming years. How rude the shock and how sore the grief when this circle was broken! The mother, none too robust, and the boys, yet so young, were so much in need of that devoted father's guiding hand and stimulating example. The shadows are deep and heavy.

This devoted father and mother talked and dreamed and planned for these boys. But life's plans have gone to pieces and those early dreams have vanished—save that the mother would make such men of them as the father desired that they be. In this effort, she has the noble heritage left and the fine example set by that father who trusted so implicitly in Him who has a special concern for the widow and the orphan.

The tenacity with which George Milton Daniel stuck to a task, as displayed in his securing three degrees from well known institutions, and in his work in the ministry, even in the face of fearful odds; the loyalty manifest in the interest of friends, of worthy causes, of truth and goodness; and the thoroughness with which he laid the foundations upon which to build life's structure in later years, disclose more than an ordinary soul. His contempt for shams and pharisaical pretense was known to all who could appreciate this good minister of Jesus Christ. He was so genuine and sincere that he spoke home to the hearts of the people and rang true on all the essentials. He never got lost in the letter and had slight concern for the forms and casements of religion. His experience was so genuine and his loyalty to his Lord so pronounced that no one ever thought of him as an echo or as a voice crying in the wilderness. He brought the people a message from God.

Assisted by Reverends G. W. Starling, H. I. Glass, T. G. Vickers, and Walter A. Stanbury, we held the funeral service in the Methodist Church at Graham in the presence of a crowd that overflowed into the yard. Brother ministers, devoted friends, ardent admirers, former pari-

shoners, and neighbors gathered to do honor to one whom they had known and loved. In silence and sorrow we laid the body to rest in a quiet spot of the cemetery over on the edge of town. The crowds do not pass this way, but many will rise up to call him blessed. Though the days seem too few, God will call this a completed task. As many of earth's fairest flowers fade before they are full blown and much of earth's fruit falls before it is fully ripe, so our brother seems to have gone too soon. Did he not speak wiser than he knew, the Sabbath afternoon the day previous to his departure when he said, "I have fought a good fight, I have finished my course?"

REV. WILLIAM A. PILAND

One by one our comrades are falling. Four answered the roll call up yonder last year. Four joined them in the Hallelujah Chorus in the land of cloudless day this year. Soon the Conference that we know and love here will join with that one which meets in the world where no memorial services will be held. There all will be understood, and that which is imperfect will be made perfect. In this temporary world all of us make mistakes, and do that which we are forced to linger at the mercy seat for many weary hours in sack cloth and ashes. Only God knows the burdens that some carry in the secret place of their soul, and they at times have none but God to sympathize with and to walk by their side. Many times if we just had a friend, leval and true, who would say to us, with his heart burning with love and sympathy, "Come, lets walk together, as the Master walked with the heartbroken men in other days," and we could feel the throbbing heart that beats with every pulsation with a love for humanity, what a difference it would make. None but God can understand and none but God ought to sit in judgement.

The Reverend William A. Piland was born and reared near Margarettsville, in Northampton County. His parents were poor, and not over much inclined to sacrifice for the

training of their children. He attended the "old field" school from four to eight weeks during the years of his childhood, and developed a desire for better equipment for life's duties and responsibilities, and read such books as were available, but his means were so limited that he could not prosecute his studies in college.

Brother Piland joined old Sharon Church. Meherrin Circuit, in the old Warrenton District, when a mere boy, and from that time to his death was devoted to his Church and to his God. He was licensed to preach under the ministry of Rev. A. J. Parker, of our Conferenc, in 1894 or 1895, Rev. W. S. Black, of sacred memory, being the presiding elder.

After receiving his license as a minister of the gospel, he spent a few months in the divinity school at Trinity College, under the late Dr. L. W. Crawford, he having felt the call to give his life work to the ministry.

At the session of our Conference held in Elizabeth City in the fall of 1898 Brother Piland knocked at the door and was admitted on trial. He was ordained deacon at the same time, and elder in 1906. His first appointment was Hobgood Circuit, where he remained for three years, 1898-99-1900. His appointments from then till one to the Church above were as follows: Currituck, 1900-03; Carteret, 1904-06; Aurora, 1907; Roanoke Rapids, 1908-09; Pasquotank, 1910-11; Mt. Olive Circuit, 1912-13; Goldsboro Circuit, 1914-17; Snow Hill, 1918; Junior Preacher, Elm Street and Pikeville, 1919-20; Supernumerary relation, 1921; Buckhorn, 1922-23; and Stedman, 1924 till time of death.

On February 26, 1925, while seemingly in his usual health, suddenly and almost without warning this comrade of ours was stricken, and in a short while answered to his name as it was called on high. But, all who knew him believe that he was not taken unaware, but that he was ready to go to be with the Master whom he loved and served to the last.

The last rites of love and respect were held over the mortal remains of this good brother at the parsonage, his last earthly home, at Stedman by Rev. W. L. Maness, Rev.

J. H. Shore and Rev. R. B. John, and the body was carried to Goldsboro where it was deposited to remain till the one to whom he had given his devotions shall come to break the bonds of the tomb and liberate those who sleep in Jesus.

Brother Piland was a good gospel preacher. It nearly broke his heart when he called men to repentence and they refused to yield. He was a man of strong convictions, and if he had faults, and he did, for all men do, it was that he grew impatient because others could not agree with him. He loved his home, and was much concerned about the welfare of his children, yet he ruled them with an iron hand, and could never be at ease when any of them were away from home.

The faults of this good brother, were like the spots on the sun, obscured to a large extent by his goodness and his loyalty to the Church, his Lord, his home and his friends.

In the spirit of love and devotion, my brethren, let's buckle the armor a little tighter, and march together with our faces toward the sunrise of God's eternal day, striving to overcome the faults that we all surely have, and with brotherly love go on till God says, enough, come home. We will then know as we are known.

VIRGIL POWERS SCOVILLE By John M. Wright

The subject of this memoir passed peacefully into the silence Tuesday afternoon, March 10th, 1925, at his parsonage home in Greenville, N. C., after six days' suffering with an unrelenting attack of pneumonia, and of him it may be truly said, "He was a good man, and full of the Holy Spirit and of faith," and through him many scores of souls were added unto the Lord.

Brother Scoville was born at Fort Valley, Georgia, June 7th, 1879. He was a child of consecrated and pious parentage and of prayer.

He was prepared for college in the common schools of

his native community, and entered Emory College, and on leaving there spent some time in Vanderbilt University, pursuing post-graduate work in theology. At the early age of seventeen Brother Scoville began preaching, and for three or four years did evangelistic work as a local preacher, his unusual gifts as a revivalist bringing to him instant and wide notice as a popular and powerful "boy evangelist."

In 1899 he joined the South Geeorgia Conference of the M. E. Church, South, and served charges as follows: 1900, Georgetown; 1901, McKendree Church (Brunswick, Ga.); Missionary to Cuba in 1902-03; Lyons and Collins Circuit, 1904-05; in 1906 he was transferred to the Western North Carolina Conference and served Churches at Mars Hill and Hot Springs, in the mountains of North Carolina.

Having recovered his health he returned to the South Georgia Conference in 1907 and was stationed at Grey Mount. In 1908-09 he served Wigham and Climax Charges; 1900. Pavo; 1911-12; Weaverly Hall; 1913, Reynolds.

In 1914 he was transferred to the North Georgia Conference and was stationed at Rome, Ga.

In Athens, Ga., he served Young Harris Church, for two years, 1915-16; 1917, Commerce Station.

In May of 1918 he was transferred to the North Carolina Conference and was appointed pastor of Trinity Church, Wilmington, where he remained four years, 1918-21.

At the Conference of 1921 he was appointed pastor of Jarvis Memorial Church, Greenville, N. C., and he had entered upon his fourth year as pastor of this great and growing Church when death claimed him.

This is but a bare outline of the times and places of the pastorates of this consecrated, earnest, valuable and valiant servant of God, as a loyal itinerant in the marching ranks of Methodisms' ministry, for in addition to the incessant calls and the arduous and exacting demands of a heavy pastorate, Brother Scoville rendered much and exceptionally effective service to the Church in revival meetings which he conducted for many of his brother pastors.

In these evangelistic services he appeared at his best. While ranking with the foremost among his contemporaries as a preacher of marked ability, yet in revival meetings he seemed to surpass himself, and was never quite so happy as when he beheld penitent sinners kneeling at the mercy seat seeking the Saviours reconciled face and arising with happy hearts, a heavenly halo upon their faces and a new song in their mouths. In these meetings he preached with earnest eloquence, appealing directness, intense feeling, persuasive power, and convincing logic, and rarely was a service barren of spiritual fruitage for he depended upon the scriptures and the co-operation of the Holy Spirit, and himself labored with unflagging zeal and unfailing faith born of a passion for the salvation of undying souls.

In these meetings as well as under his pastoral guidance and counsel many choice young men and women with heavenly vision consecrated themselves to life service and are today by word and deed telling the old story of Jesus and His love to many at home and abroad. It was an impressive moment when at Brother Scoville's funeral a noble young man, a spiritual son in the gospel arose, and with faltering voice, recounted in the ears of the sorrowful multitude there assembled, how, when he was converted at the altar there one short year ago. Brother Scoville put his arm about him and said. "I hope you will carry the torch of God's truth and our Saviour's love after I have been called to lay it down." This young man for some months has been a licensed preacher and is in college preparing himself for the work of the Methodist itinerancy.

During his twenty-five years as a preacher of the gospel Brother Scoville wore the white flower of a blameless life, living without reproach, and gladly and cheerfully going wherever he was sent, having an abiding conviction that he was called of God to preach the gospel of His Grace to all men.

In Wilmington and Greenville, N. C., signal success rewarded his labors. In the former charge a beautiful, costly, commodious, and convenient Church edifice erected dur-

ing his pastorate, and a large and loyal constituency, give witness to his heroic work and wise leadership, while in the latter pastorate a large and well appointed Sunday School building, and a largely increased and loyal membership are marks of his great work there.

An acquaintance formed at the Conference held in Wilson, N. C., a few years ago, soon ripened into a warm friendship, and our frequent association in revival meetings and elsewhere brought to us the abounding joy of an abiding affection. I loved him for his brotherly kindness, his sympathetic heart, genial disposition, his nobility of soul and his integrity of character.

On October 7th, 1907, at Grey Mount, Ga., Brother Scoville married Miss Gladys Winn. To this union were born seven children, John Edwin, Hattie Sue, Rebecca, Warren Candler, Martha Elizabeth, Herbert Winn, and Gladys Jane Scoville. All survive except John Edwin, who died about two and one-half years ago. The loss of this noble and Christian son weighed heavily upon the broken hearted father.

The father sleeps beside the son in Greenville cemetery, but in heaven they walk the streets of gold in happy reunion.

This beloved pastor, faithful friend, devoted husband and father, and kind and helpful neighbor came to the end of his earthly pilgrimage as he had wished, actively engaged in the work of his Lord. He was a sympathetic and diligent pastor, giving himself without stint to the work of the ministry, and he wearied not in well doing.

The reward given to the "Good and faithful servant," is the eternal enjoyment and possession of this gallant knight of the cross. Peace to his ashes.

ROBERT HENRY WILLIS

Robert Henry Willis, son of Rev. Robert A. and Ellen White Willis, was born in Warrenton, N. C., December 1st, 1872 and died in Fayetteville, N. C., January 21st, 1925. "His life was gentle, and the elements So mixed in him, that Nature might stand up And say to all the world, "This was a man."

These words of the master poet apply more fitly to him than to any other whom it has been my privilege to know intimately. All the elements were mixed in him. All the forces which make for good character met in his creation. Heredity? What inheritance could excel those two lines which culminated in Robert A. Willis and Ellen White? And of our brother it has been said that he inherited the best qualities of each parent. Environment? Some foolish ones have avoided or even surrendered the ministry that by more lucrative employment they might give their children "a fairer chance in life." But the history of greatness in commerce, in finance, in the law and in statesmanship, as well as in the ministry, has proven that there is no more favorable nursery for greatness than the manse, the rectory and the parsonage. And no preacher's home combined more truly "simple living and high thinking" than that into which Robert Willis was born. The greatest sermon on "Parental Responsibility" I have ever heard was preached by his father, and what that father preached both he and "Mother Willis" practiced. Then the mystery of the human will?

"Our wills are ours, we know not how;

Our wills are ours, to make them thine."

From early childhood the will of our departed brother was set to do the will of God. He was always obedient to the divine and the human law. His sisters say that even in childhood they never knew him to commit a sin. Truly the Triumphant God, Creator, Redeemer and Inspirer, had freedom of action in our brother's life, and thus was able to produce the highest creature known to us, a Christ-like man.

After graduation at Trinity College, where he made a record which any young man might covet, in the first class which was graduated from the new college at Durham in 1893, he taught in Plymouth and Kernersville. Though the main purpose of his teaching was to secure funds to

prepare himself for the ministry. He gave such service that his name is still as an ointment poured forth in each of these towns. In 1894 he entered the Biblical Department of Vanderbilt University, taking a two year's course. In 1896 he joined the North Carolina Conference at Kinston. He was ordained deacon the next year and elder at the earliest possible time. The vows taken, at entrance and when ordained, by every Methodist preacher bind to the highest life, and it is well that the fathers have bidden us answer: "I will endeavor so to do, the Lord being my helper." Yet high though the obligations be and many sided, I can not lay my finger on one phrase in which this man failed to live up to his vow. By God's good grace, he kept them all.

His appointments have been as follows: South Edgecombe Circuit, 1896-97; Edenton, 1898-1901; Elizabeth City, City Road, 1902; Morehead City, 1903-05; Tarboro, 1906-08; Littleton, 1909-12; Warrenton District, 1913-14; Oxford Station, 1915-17; Elizabeth City District, 1918-21; Fayetteville District, 1922-25. In each of these his success was uniformly great.

I question if anyone would have called him "a great preacher." But he carried no unbeaten oil into the sanctuary; and in teaching, in feeding, and in inspiring to high thought and noble living, I doubt not that his sermons far surpassed many which would be popularly called great. But more effective than what he said was what he did. His organization, his administration, his shepherding of the flock, made his every pastorate a true success. But greater even than what he did was what he was. "The love of God was shed abroad in him." "Men took knowledge of him that he had been with Jesus." "His light so shone that men seeing his good works glorified his Father which was in heaven." As a presiding elder he was painstaking, laborious, sympathetic, a skillful administrator and an inspiring leader, and, as Bishop Denny so truly testifies, "He was a particularly useful man in the Cabinet, for he seemed always to make the interest of the Church the first consideration." He asked no more of

any man that he was willing himself to invest in his Lord's work. Men therefore followed him gladly. Churches and preachers knew that there was no limit to his service except the limit of his ability, and that that limit was enlarged by his constant and trustful dependence on divine guidance. When he lacked wisdom, he asked of God who gave liberally, and few, if any, were the mistakes of his administration.

As a member of the Conference Board of Missions and as its Secretary for many years, he was largely instrumental in increasing liberality in giving and wisdom in expending those sacred funds. He served also as a member of the General Board of Missions. In 1911 he was elected Secretary of the Conference, and retained that office until his death. Quiet, systematic, resourceful, alert, accurate, he was an ideal secretary. The Conference could never estimate nor repay its obligation to him, but it showed its confidence and its appreciation by electing him to serve twice in the General Conference, thus granting him larger opportunity for service.

So through the years ran the widening, deepining river of his service. We had hoped that it would bless us for years to come. But no. It is suddenly lost to our view. But we do not believe that it is swallowed up in the fruitless sands of the desert of death. We believe that it has emerged on Heavenly plains, a river of life eternal. His call came suddenly. There was no opportunity for dying testimony. But none was needed. We all know where to find him. No one can doubt that he has heard the "well done, good and faithful servant." No one can doubt that he has been given heavenly rewards.

In 1907 he was married to Miss Annie Blanchard, of Hertford, N. C., a wife in every way worthy even of such as he. It was my privilege to be the pastor of Mrs. Willis at the time and to watch sympathetically the courtship of my friends. I was the first guest to enjoy the hospitality of that new made home in Tarboro. Through the years I have been associated in many, ways with the family, rejoicing in their joys and sharing their sorrows. Such a

wife is from the Lord. Such a husband few have found. Such a home is a little bit of Heaven here on earth. Only divine grace can comfort the sorrowing survivor, but let us pray that the Heavenly Father may give to her the "peace which passeth understanding." Let his brethren pray also for the three sisters who had come to lean so trustfully on his strength: Mrs. J. P. Kramer, so recently bereft of her husband, now doubly widowed, and Misses Minnie and Emma Willis.

In what I have said or shall say, I would not indulge in unconsidered eulogy or exaggerated praise. But how can one rightly estimate or record the life of Robert Henry Willis without seeming to those who knew him not to be guilty of such exaggeration? Joseph doubtless had his faults, but the Book makes no such record. Robert Willis doubtless had his faults. "To err is human." But neither I, nor some who knew him better than I, ever discovered them. In his private life, in his home and family, in his pastorates, in his district administration, in the larger activities of the Church, he was loyal, faithful, and sympathetic toward those committed to his care; in his labors he was obedient unto heavenly visions, faithful in that which was little or great, alert that he might know and do the will of God, ever looking unto Jesus the Author and the Finisher of his faith, and in life and death more than conqueror through Him that hath loved us.

"Servant of God, well done!

Rest from thy loved employ; The battle fought, the vict'ry won, Enter thy Master's joy."

MRS. JOHN N. COLE

Mrs. John Nelson Cole, Elizabeth Marshall Jones, was born in Mecklenburg County, Virgina, October 7th, 1855. In her early womanhood she married John Nelson Cole of North Carolina, a young itinerant whose career of

high and honorable usefulness in the Methodist Church was at its beginning. To this couple there were born seven children, six of whom are living. John N. and Henry Puryear Cole of New York, Mary and Alice Cole of Richmond, Va., Marsall, now Mrs. R. F. Gayle, Jr., of Richmond, Va., and Lucy, who married Rev. Plato T. Durham, of Atlanta, Ga. A son, Thomas Louis Cole, died in the beginning of young manhood.

The young itinerant and his bride began their work Jan. 1st, 1879, on the Ansonville Circuit and their pilgrimage led them thence to Rocky Mount, Ridgeway, Warrenton, Wilson, Raleigh, Durham, Wilmington, Rockingham and finally back to Raleigh, where in completion of a remarkable record of ministry, they guided the affairs of the Methodist Orphanage. Here Mr. Cole ended his distinguished service to the Church as Superintendent for ten years of the Orphanage and came to the end of his journey in 1915. Ten years later Mrs. Cole followed him, dying while on a visit to her daughter, Mrs. Plato Durham, in Atlanta, Ga. She rests beside her husband and son in the little cemetery in Warrenton, N. C., the home of Mr. Cole's family since colonial days.

In the annals of the itineracy there will perhaps be no more beautiful chapter than that written by Mrs. Cole and her husband. A daughter of the old South, from historic old Mecklenburg, and a gentlewoman by birth and rearing, her feet never faltered in walking the hard way of the circuit rider's wife. There could be no greater contrast than that between the life of such a girl in Virginia and her life as the wife of a Methodist itinerant in those pioneer days. But the record is that Elizabeth Marshall Jones made of this new life a most distinguished success. There are few of the great multitude who bless the memory of Mr. Cole as pastor who do not include in their benediction his beloved wife.

Refinement, gentleness, charm and defference of manner are often thought of as delicate things needing ease and defence for life and expression as a flower needs defence from the winter's breath. But it is not so. It has often been shown that these qualities are as the polish and light upon the steel of a Damascusblade. It was certainly true in the case of Mrs. Cole. One did not know which to admire most, the gentleness or the stamina, the charm of grace or the gift of terrible endurance. She could not be frightened by circumstance.

The mixture of qualities that made Mrs. Cole an outstanding woman was such as to make difficult an analysis. These characteristics were certainly hers: gentleness, religious sincerity and faculty, strength of conviction and fineness of social consciousness.

A certain dignity and distinction of soul went with and held those qualities in a unity. As was quite natural, the blending of these qualities became most apparent in her social gifts of kindness, thoughtfulness for others especially the unfortunate and in a most charming hospitality. In her home one breathed again the old and fine atmosphere of that Virginia that has become a beautiful tradition of the world. And this atmosphere was shot through with the breath of Christian graces.

Tried by every standard, Mrs. Cole was a great mother. These words need no amplification. To be right—fully called a great mother is quite sufficient.

Perhaps the greatest single achievement of this unusual woman was the manner in which she met death so calmly, with such gentle dignity, so fearlessly did she fall asleep that one at her bedside said in his heart "surely, there is no death." Surrounded by her children, thinking and speaking to the last of their well being and comfort, she sank to sleep. The long day was over, the hard journey of the young Methodist itinerant and his bride was ended and the lights of Home flashed at last through the deepening shadows of the great night.

MRS. MATTIE ATWATER JENKINS By Rev. W. H. Brown

On the evening of October 28, at 8:30, just as nine souls were giving their hearts and lives to Jesus, as the result of her request to the writer, "Take the name of Jesus to everyone to whom you can," the spirit of Mrs. Mattie Atwater Jenkins went to heaven to rejoice with the angels over their conversion.

Mrs. Jenkins was born April 15, 1861. She was the daughter of Jehiel and Martha Atwater.

As a young woman she was frail of body, but robust in spirit, and as time passed she became even a greater spiritual being. When she told her brothers that she was going to seek the position as Matron at the Methodist Orphanage at Raleigh, it having just thrown open its doors, they said to her, "You can't stand it. Your health will break down in three months." She replied, "The Lord will take care of me."

She came to the Orphanage in January, 1901, and took charge with only five children for whom to care. In September, 1902, she was married to the Reverend John W. Jenkins, the Superintendent and founder of the institution. From then until the time of the death of Brother Jenkins, the two put their all into the Home for the sake of the children that were and should be there. After his death her sole aim was to spend and be spent for the sake of the orphan children of our Conference.

For twenty-four years, as head matron, she labored unstintedly, unselfishly, and tenderly and lovingly for the children to whom God had called her to be a mother. Some who have been reared there may have spoken disparagingly of some of the other workers, but never have I heard of one thus speaking of her. She was a respected, a revered, a beloved woman by the entire Orphanage family and by all who knew her.

Few women have ever carried the burden on their hearts that this woman carried on hers, and fewer still have ever walked with such a firm and steady step as did she as she carried it. Her perseverance, her hopefulness, her courage, and her faith were of the most superior type. She was one whom her co-laborers always found kind, gentle, sympathetic, and helpful.

May the spirit of our sister ever hover above our be-

loved Orphanage and walk with every child within and without to warn them of impending danger and to guide them in paths of peace and righteousness for His name's sake. And may her memory ever be green in their minds!

ETHEL THOMPSON MERCER By D. E. Earnhardt

Ethel Waldo Thompson was born at Cary, N. C., on August 12, 1878. She was the daughter of Rev. J. E. Thompson, of the North Carolina Conference. Her mother was before her marriage to Mr. Thompson, Jane Bouy. Rev. J. E. Thompson was one of the gentlest and most cultured ministers of his day. His wife was bright and witty. Such a couple made an ideal parsonage home. It was in such a home that Ethel was born. She inherited fine traits of character from both parents. After finishing high school, Ethel completed her education in a Christian college. Like many college women, she entered the teaching profession. Her fine training and great energy made her way popular and successful as a teacher.

She was married to Rev. S. E. Mercer on September 25, 1900, Bishop John C. Kilgo officiating. The first years of her life were given to home making and to service to She entered enthusiastically into all the her Church. works and purposes of the Church and community. There was no cause that was worthy that did not enlist her sympathy, and engage her service. Her fine gifts were always at the disposal of various departments of the Church, when called for. So many things she did well that she drew too heavily upon her strength. After a few years her health became impaired, but she loved to live and work so well that she continued to take an active part in all the activities of the Church. She was anxious always to be of help at every point. For many years she was a semi-invalid and finally a total invalid. Much of her time was spent in variuos hospitals. She came from one of her hospital experiences to take up life on crutches, and a few years later had to depend on a rolling chair. She ad-

justed herself, however, to these handicaps in a wonderful way. She learned to live and work and be happy in spite of her limitations. She often remarked that much of the world's best work was done by those who suffered. Her eager mind was ever on the alert in acquiring more knowledge. Her memory was wonderful. Large portions of the Bible were retained in her mind, and she knew almost all of the songs of our Hymnal, and much of our best literature. She was a fine reader, and enjoyed reading with her children. Frequently she would get one of her children to roll her down to the colored section and give readings to the colored women and children. They always looked forward to those story hours. In this way she did much good, and she was loved by these colored people for the interest she took in them. She did a real home mission work in this way. Her fine sense of humor made her very attractive to the young people, and she loved to work with them. She took an active part in League, Sunday School, Woman's Missionary work, and also various forms of community work until a few months before her death. She belonged to the Shut-in Society. and with her lame hands wrote hundreds of cheering letters to invalids all over the country. She was ever taking the sorrows of others upon her own heart. Her friends sent her many beautiful flowers which she invariably passed on to others. She largely forgot her own sorrows in trying to help others. In the early part of last year, after Mr. Lee, a trained collector of fine ability, had done his best to close the Centenary work. Mrs. Mercer asked the privilege of continuing the collecting herself. In her rolling chair, she surprised the entire Church by the large amount that she collected. She did this for the love of the cause of Missions. This was her closing work. Only once or twice was she well enough to attend Church after this.

The month following was full of pain and suffering. Her faith, courage, and will power continued to inspire others to better living and service. There are a number of missionary societies in the Conference named after her.

Her influence will continue to live on in the hearts and minds of many. Her mind retained its normal mentality until about two weeks before her death, when the rheumatism settled in her brain. Even in those hours of unconsciousness, she continued to talk of her Saviour and His love.

In the early hours of December the fifth, 1924, her soul passed into one of those mansions of which our Saviour tells about. Her tired, worn body was laid to rest in a beautiful spot in Maplewood Cemetery in Durham, N. C. The large attendance and the many beautiful floral offerings at the funeral showed how tenderly she was loved. "Whosoever liveth and believeth in me shall never die."
