APPENDIX

REPORT NO. 1 OF THE BOARD OF MISSIONS

Your Board of Missions desires to report the larger aspect of Missions before entering upon consideration of our own conference missionary work.

We have heard with pleasure reports coming from the General Board. It is a story of achievement and progress, indicating wise leadership and breadth of vision. The outstanding achievement of the quadrennium has been the intensive cultivation, during January and February of each year, both of interest and offering. The results of this policy are well known. It freed the church of a crushing burden of debt. It has stopped the annual deficit in our missionary budget. By it we have been enabled to send out a corps of new missionaries to fill out the depleted ranks. It saved our work in the hour of seeming disaster. At the same time it is stimulating the missionary spirit and increasing the missionary knowledge of the church in a remarkable degree. During these periods of cultivation more than four hundred thousand missionary books have been placed in the homes of our people. A report unapproached by any other denomination in the nation. Each year the study book has carried a peculiar message of that year to the entire church. The literature of missions, through the district missionary institute and the schools of missions, was brought directly to the people.

This policy has demanded of every pastor more definite work. At times it has not been easy, but it has advanced the Kingdom of the Lord throughout the world, and surely we are ready to gird ourselves once again for this great

service.

A distinct product of the educational program of the Board of Missions has been the enlargement and improvement of the Missionary Voice. This has come to be the most attractive and informative missionary periodical issued by any denomination and merits enthusiastic support of the whole church.

Your Board of Missions would, therefore, propose the following resolutions

for your consideration and recommend their adoption.

First—We are profoundly grateful to God for the success of the missionary movement during the past three years, and we congratulate and thank the Presiding Elders, pastors and people whose self-sacrificing work made such success possible.

Second—We pledge our hearty sympathy to the movement during the coming year. We also pledge ourselves to work heartily for the success of the study period, and to endeavor to raise the full share of our conference apportionment in the free will offering, and that we accept as our share the sum of \$55,000.00.

Third—We respectfully ask our Presiding Elders to hold our missionary institutes as provided for in the Discipline, early in January and to make this wholly and distinctly missionary, and that they name the exact date and place for this institute before the adjournment of this conference.

Fourth—That we undertake to secure 1,000 new subscribers to the Missionary

Voice.

Fifth—We recommend as nominees from this conference for membership on the General Board of Missions, Rev. F. S. Love and J. C. Braswell.

We would recommend the most earnest efforts for an increase in collections on benevolences. The constantly decreasing percentage of collection is necessitating an annual cut in appropriations where the appropriations make a vital dif-

ference in the living of the pastors.

We would express our appreciation of the sympathetic attitude of the Presiding Elders and their assistance in the work of the board.

Your board is asking that Rev. W. V. McRae raise by voluntary contributions from our churches the sum of \$300.00 for the chaplain at Oteen.

We would call to the attention of the conference the unusual opportunity offered for a study of the missionary program of the church and to the educational and spiritual values to be had in the annual meeting of the General Missionary Council, which is to be in Raleigh on the 10th, 11th and 12th of

December of this year.

We recommend that Rev. F. S. Love be appointed as Conference Missionary

Secretary without salary.

BOARD OF EDUCATION

To the North Carolina Conference, M. E. Church, South, in session at Queen Street M. E. Church, South, at Kinston, N. C., the Board of Education of said conference desires to submit the following report:

The increased emphasis on education has shared the interest of our church. The part that our conference is having in this is a source of pride to all of us. Our church has always emphasized Christian education and we are seeing the need of an ever increasing emphasis on this subject. The institutions of learning of our church within our conference stand at the forefront of this movement. Provision is being made also in one of our institutions for the continuance of higher education as well as training in the the outstanding professions under

Christian influence.

We have sustained a distinct loss in the death of two outstanding friends of education within the bounds of our conference this year. The contributions of Messrs, B. N. Duke and R. H. Wright cannot be estimated in value to the cause of Christian education. It is with sadness that we record these names in the list of the deceased.

GENERAL

The Board of Education recommends that our churches continue to emphasize Christian education day in the local church with a sermon on education by the pastor. We call attention to the need of a better trained ministry and urge the co-operation of the brethren with the General Board of Education as well as with our colleges in their efforts to increase loan funds and also urge faithful observance of the present law requiring two years of college training for Admission on Trial. We urge our pastors and Presiding Elders to emphasize the Junaluska Conference on Religion and Education and we would call your attention to the volume of these addresses, which is now being published.

DUKE UNIVERSITY

The North Carolina Conference pledges itself again to its continuous support of Duke University. This university is rapidly assuming its place as one of the great universities of America and the leading university in the field of Christian education in the South. It has stood in the past for the highest in ideals and attainments and we are persuaded that in its future problems these ideals and attainments will be maintained on the highest Christian standards.

It is the expectation of the University to remove in part at least to the new campus in September, 1930, and leave the old campus with its eleven new build-

ings for the uses of the Woman's College of Duke University. Most of the buildings on the new campus are either in progress or now definitely projected. The increase of the total enrollment of students over last year is about ten per cent and of the more than 1,200 who applied for enrollment in the freshman class, about 600 were selected. The process of selected admission is careful and thoroughgoing. The School of Religion has increased to 110, all of whom are graduates of approved colleges. There are about 75 undergraduates who expect to enter the ministry; thus making a total of 200 preachers now living on the campus. In the graduate schools there is a total of 423 students who are being trained for fields of higher education or for scientific and literary careers. Adequate facilities are being provided for both faculty and students and steps to engage in all forms of athletic exercise. Playing fields are being built, adequate gymnasium facilities secured and a new and beautiful stadium, with seating capacity of 35,000, was dedicated on October 5. There is every evidence of a fine spirit of hope and aspiration on the part of both faculty and students at Duke University. The enrollment of last year, including summer school, was 3,025. The faculty, not including assistants, is composed of 133.

The plant and equipment is valued at \$14,015,771.30. The value of the endowment is \$21,017,966.46. The total amount of the loan fund is \$600,144.51.

Unexpended building fund, \$7,409,300.97.

We recommend the confirmation of the following names of trustees, who have been nominated to succeed themselves: Dr. Albert Anderson, Col. J. F. Bruton, J. A. Long and C. W. Toms.

GREENSBORO COLLEGE

In the field of Christian education our church has also made adequate provision for taking care of Christian education of young women. The report from Greensboro College is steadily encouraging and shows signs of unmistakable progress. A more adequate faculty has been provided and there is a steady increase in the endowment funds.

We gratefully acknowledge the donation of Rev. E. C. Glenn and wife of

their property in Greensboro through the Annuity Plan.

The various activities of the students of the college have also received special comment in view of their successful attainments in practically all lines.

The faculty is composed of 31 teachers with a student enrollment of 353. The value of the property is estimated at \$585,909.00, with endowment of \$360,5+1.00. The total indebtedness of the college is estimated at \$31,201.00.

The annual income of the institution for last year was \$199,228.00.

We recommend the election and confirmation as members of the Board of Trustees, Dr. Peter John, of Laurinburg, for a term of six years, beginning December 31, 1929, to represent the North Carolina Conference.

We recommend also the election and confirmation of Mr. Junius Wren, of Siler City, N. C., as trustee, to succeed himself at the expiration of his term, December 31, 1929, as the representative of the Alumnæ Association.

LOUISBURG COLLEGE

Louisburg College, through its history, dating back through the years, has made a tremendous contribution in the field of Christian education. It appears to be doomed to many struggles. During the year it has lost a staunch friend and supporter in Mr. R. H. Wright and also a liberal and interested supporter in the person of Mr. B. N. Duke.

A disastrous fire occurred at the college in December last, which practically destroyed the main building and the West Wing. As a result of this, the college

was suspended with considerable loss both to the college and to the girls occupying the dormitories. By special effort and by utilization of a part of the funds secured from fire insurance, the Franklin County Building was put in shape so that the college could re-open by the middle of January. There was, of course, a loss in the students.

During the year Mr. A. W. Mohn, who for many years has been president of the institution, resigned, and we rejoice in the selection of Rev. C. C. Alexander as his successor. Brother Alexander has assumed his new duties and has entered into the work in a painstaking and commendable manner. The college at the present time seems to be facing one of the greatest crises in its history and we recommend sympathetic and full co-operation with the present administration in its efforts to maintain this splendid college, which is devoted to the task of education as a Junior College.

We recommend the appointment of a commission of five composed of the following: J. F. Bruton, of Wilson; R. L. Flowers, of Durham; Willis Smith, of Raleigh; W. A. Stanbury, of Durham; and C. K. Proctor, of Oxford, be appointed to co-operate with the Board of Trustees of Louisburg College in working out a financial plan for meeting the present problems of said college.

We recommend the confirmation of the following trustees for the class of 1932: R. H. Wright, Jr., F. S. Love, W. L. Knight, J. H. Shore, W. E. White and W. N. Boyd, to succeed John E. Evans, resigned

Your Committee would respectfully urge upon our preachers and laymen that they observe carefully the amount of loans rescinded, both to churches and to parsonages, namely: \$9,500.00, there being only \$500.00 of this amount that was voluntarily turned back to us. In a word, \$9,000.00 of the \$9,500.00 that was rescinded was rescinded because the churches and parsonages could not qualify for the loans. With these facts before us, it seems to the committee that it were an imperative of the most practical nature, that when we are ready to venture upon some building enterprise, we take up again our book of Discipline and read that we are required to have three-fourths of the money, or its equivalent, in hand before we proceed.

We recognize that the church's money is a trust fund, and it must be administered with due regard to the safeguards which have been placed about it.

We desire to state that the General Board of Church Extension has now at Duke University one of its architects. We, therefore, urge upon the ministers and laymen, when contemplating the building of churches and parsonages, to consult or submit plans to the board's architect for criticism and suggestions, in order that our buildings may be in conformity with the standards of our church.

Furthermore, your Board of Church Extension requests that all charges contemplating the erection of churches and parsonages, which may at any time have to seek help from the Conference Board, submit their plans to the Executive Committee of the Conference Board of Church Extension.

We would call the attention of the brethren again to the importance of protecting our churches and parsonages with adequate insurance.

REPORT OF SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD

Your Sunday School Board begs leave to submit the following report: Sunday school work in the North Carolina Conference has proceeded, mainly, along the following general lines:

Training of workers and prospective workers; 2. Placing and interpreting Programs of Work for schools, departments, and classes;

Holding of institutes and conferences;

Cultivating, through correspondence, publicity, and otherwise, our church's program of missionary education and extension;

Encouraging the use of appropriate literature;

- Promoting plans for increasing and maintaining our Sunday school membership; and
- Emphasizing, in as many ways as possible, the work of evangelism in the Sunday school.

Specifically, we have conducted 50 training schools-15 Standard and 35 Cokesbury-and through these and other agencies employed we have issued 3,152 certificates of credit. We have made a good beginning in the introduction and interpretation of the new Programs of Work, conducted institutes and conferences visited Sunday schools, and, through correspondence and otherwise, have assisted officers and teachers in coming to a finer appreciation of their task and in preparing themselves in more effective ways of performing it.

In further evidence of our marked success we point to the increasingly high percentage of additions to the church from the Sunday school on profession of faith. This seems a most important indication of the abiding nature of our work. Our records show that in 1919 50.9% of those joining our church on profession of faith came through the Sunday school. Investigation of our records for 1928 shows that 80.7% of those joining the church on profession of faith were Sunday school pupils. Although the Sunday school does not presume to claim that it is solely or even, in every case, largely responsible for these additions, it must be gratifying to those who have the evangelization of the world at heart to note this tremendous increase in the number of those who at least are assisted by the Sunday school in finding God.

In whatever success may have been ours we recognize our debt of gratitude to our preachers and laymen and hereby express our appreciation of their faithful and efficient service. Our need for your united and vigorous support is apparent, and we bespeak your hearty co-operation in the promotion of the established lines of work which your board is undertaking. Especially do we ask your assistance in carrying out our plans for making our schools more thoroughly evangelistic and for increasing and maintaining our Sunday school enrollment. The world is still our parish, and we must do our part in reaching and saving all those who are as yet unreached and unsaved.

In accordance with these ideals we are making untiring and special effort to extend the influence of our work in the sparsely settled rural districts as well as in sections where our work is well established. The work of your board would be greatly assisted by the wider observance of Sunday School Day and the regular observance of Missionary Day, with the proper direction of the offerings secured

on these occasions.

We are pleased to report that the sixth annual Conference-wide Sunday School Conference held at Centenary, Smithfield, was an unqualified success. We recommend that we accept the invitation of Jarvis Memorial, Greenville, to hold our next session of this conference in Greenville, April 24-25, 1930.

We further recommend that we continue our policy of working out, through District Sunday School Councils, the details of our program in keeping with

the general policies of the General Sunday School Board.

Your board announces the re-election of Mr. L. L. Gobbel as Conference Superintendent and of Miss Georgia S. Keene as Elementary Superintendent, their respective salaries to remain the same as last year. Rev. J. O. Long has resigned as Extension Secretary, and the selection of his successor has been left in the hands of the Executive Committee of the board.

REPORT OF THE EPWORTH LEAGUE BOARD

In the name of the Divine Head of the Church, we, the Epworth League, with the motto: "All for Christ," rejoice in the rich spiritual fellowship and emphasis being placed by our conference upon this vital principle of our Epworth League work.

Our officials, including the District Secretaries, are serving in a most loyal

and efficient manner.

The annual Summer Assembly held at Louisburg College, June 24-28, was the most successful in the history of the North Carolina Conference Epworth League. The consecration service resulted in twenty-two life service volunteers, and the seriousness of purpose of all the young people present was manifest in their pledge to seek a fuller life through surrender to Jesus as Lord of all life.

At this Assembly a resolution was adopted creating the office of Special Field Secretary, to be under the direction of a committee composed of the president, vice-president, and dean of the Summer Assembly. We endorse this resolution and confirm this office, and bespeak on behalf of our Special Field Secretary, Rev. Philip Schwartz, your support and co-operation.

Special emphasis is to be placed on Missions, and Anniversary Day, and our preachers, laymen, and laywomen are urged to co-operate with the young people in their work, but only to the extent of acting as their counselors and guides,

in order that these young people may continue to be a self-governed body of youth enjoying Christian freedom of service and development in Christ that is peculiar to our Epworth League organization.

REPORT OF BOARD OF CHRISTIAN LITERATURE

From reports of our publishing interests submitted to and considered by us we feel that we have earnest reason for sincere rejoicing and heartfelt gratitude, as these vital concerns of our beloved Methodism were never attended by larger profit nor more gratifying promise. It is heartening that there is constantly increasing demand for the products from our presses, and we are confident that the ever-enhancing quality of our Christian Literature will continue fully to justify such demand. A more intelligent church membership would surely mean a more efficient and liberal-handed membership; and we, therefore, plead with our pastors patiently and perseveringly to present all our periodicals to our people, and that at frequent intervals.

PUBLISHING HOUSE

Improvement has been the worthy order, not only during this conference year, but also throughout this quadrennium, in all the various enterprises of our Publishing House. This is conspicuously true as to our Sunday school periodicals, which are now entirely adequate for all demands in schools, whether large or small. Surpassing literary merit is being maintained in the preparation of the Methodist Quarterly Review, the Epworth Era, the Juniors, and the Christian Advocate; and it is our great pleasure heartily to commend such excellent reading.

In its publishing department our Publishing House is now known as the Cokesbury Press, and already ranks in America as one of the outstanding publishers. Each year it publishes many of the most important of religious books. Even many other denominations accept as standard our Teacher Training and Bible Study Textbooks; and the New Cokesbury Hymnal will probably excel in use any other songbook ever issued by the Publishing House. As to the cost of this superior literature, it sustains a favorable comparison with that named by other publishing concerns.

A revival of interest in the doctrinal teachings of our great church is assured by the diligent and liberal distribution of the timely tracts furnished *gratis* by our progressive Publishing Agents. We urge that pastors and other Christian workers thoroughly try out this system of tract-sowing among the people during the ensuing year.

Further, a most healthy financial exhibit is made, the quadrennial sales having reached approximately two million dollars, and the present appropriation 2 Conference Claimants being \$105,000.00, \$30,000.00 more than the previous year. This fact should compel growing interest in the patronage deserved by our Publishing House. Next year the 75th Anniversary of our publishing interests to be celebrated, preferably with our own Conference Organ Diamond Jubilee in time for our 94th annual session.

NORTH CAROLINA CHRISTIAN ADVOCATE

In the report by the Methodist Board of Publication to the North Carolina Conference we are pleased to note some very interesting features. Beginning with the first issue of the North Carolina Christian Advocate for 1928, this

paper, our conference organ, was changed from 16 to 32 pages; and since such improvements as illustrated cover page, church and individual cuts, and certain other features have been added. This good journal has met with much favor, the 1929 objective of 2,500 new subscribers having been exceeded by 280. The last distribution of the paper included 14,800 copies. Receipts excel expenditures \$3,569.07. Book-making has been enterprised, and the hope of gains appears to rest with the job department.

The crowning event just ahead is the Diamond Jubilee which is to be duly celebrated during 1930, when we shall review the 75 years of unbroken service, employing as our slogan, "The best and biggest paper in our Southern Methodism." We would, therefore, recommend that this conference order the following:

1st. That the Diamond Jubilee Campaign be put on early.

2nd. That every pastor see that the Advocate is presented in every church. 3rd. That the preachers and laymen, with hearts in the work, unite with the Advocate office in securing the full quota in all the pastoral charges.

4th. That all Methodists come to know that this is our business, and that

the success of this extraordinary celebration shall largely depend on us.

5th. That an hour, to be shared with our General Organ, the Christian Advocate, in a joint Diamond Jubilee be a part of the time of our next conference session.

Rev. M. T. Plyler's re-appointment as manager and associate editor, with a salary of \$5,000.00, including house rent, is hereby requested.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE AND SOCIAL SERVICE

Peace, world-wide and permanent, has always been the goal of the followers of the founder of the Christian Church whose birth was announced by the pledge of peace on earth and good will toward men. The only thing that won its blessings upon America's part in the World War was the faith that the promise that it was a war against war would be fulfilled. The postponement of the guarantees of peace has disappointed ardent hopes. During the year that is closing the ratification of the treaty looking to the outlawry of war has heartened peace lovers all over the world. The recent friendly conferences between President Hoover and Premier MacDonald looking to an end of naval competitive armament likewise cheer all who long for the coming of the day when peace shall cover the earth as waters cover the sea. We send greetings to all in authority who hold peace near their hearts, and tender our sincere approval of every measure that substitutes understanding for force.

Sobriety is the rock upon which national virtue and national prosperity must rest. After years of education and striving the influences of righteousness succeeded in securing an amendment to the Constitution forbidding the manufacture, sale and transportation of intoxicants. It has been strengthened both by congressional and state measures in the line of obtaining concurrent enforcement. We stand for the enforcement of these laws in the state and the republic. We renew our faith in prohibition as a principle and urge our membership and the citizenship to observe and respect the law. We call upon all men and women to exert their influence, public and private, to the enforcement of the law. We commend the effort of all officials from the lowest to the highest in the performance of the duties imposed by the 18th Amendment and laws enacted to carry it into effect. We commend our state legislators and executives and judicial officers who

have upheld the law and likewise commend all federal officers who are sincerely

seeking to uphold the statutes against the liquor evil.

Our preachers are urged to emphasize the truth that total abstinence is the true universal rule of action and to stress the ills of the purchase and use of intoxicants. "Touch not, taste not, handle not" should be the slogan of all Christians and other good citizens.

Rejoicing in the lessening of drunkenness under national prohibition and the economic blessings that have followed the enactment of the 18th Amendment, we deplore the disrespect for law that exists, and the encouragement of the moonshiner and bootlegger by a portion of the citizenry, and register our earnest appeal for personal observance of the law. It is our unwavering belief that prohibition as a law has come to stay. The duty of the hour is to gird our loins in the contest against nullification.

Meeting in the shadow of recent lawlessness growing out of industrial disputes, we record our distress that North Carolina has been shamed by crimes of violence, some of which as yet have gone unpunished. We declare that government and industry cannot serve humanity unless shot through with the spirit of Jesus Christ. The Golden Rule is the only solvent for the ills that disturb this commonwealth. No Christian Church can be silent when injustice and wrong are administered to the weak, or there is danger of one law for capital and another for labor, when the killing of an official is followed by just punishment and the same penalties are not promptly meted out to the slayers of workers and the humble mother of children whose only apparent offense was the exercise of the indefeasible right of travel upon the public highways. We commend the Governor for his action in commissioning a Superior Court judge to go to the bottom and fix responsibility for the death of the mill working woman in Gastonia and declaring for the equal administration of justice in North Carolina.

We solemnly declare that a fair day's wage for a fair day's work is essential to industrial peace and stability. We beg both employer and employee in the spirit of the Carpenter of Nazareth to join hands, minds and hearts in securing a better industrial order, whereby all shall prosper. For the benefit of all who toil, for the preservation of the home, for the improvement of the product and for the stabilization of industry we urge all who labor and all who employ labor to unite to secure the gradual and complete elimination of night work for women and children.

We deplore any teachings seeking to undermine faith in the Christian religion and any practices inconsistent with the teachings and life of Jesus Christ. His religion is based upon brotherhood, consideration of the poor, freedom from violence and dependence upon orderly government.

Sound economy has demonstrated that cheap labor is dear labor in the long run. Labor is entitled to its fair share of the rewards of the industry in which it is engaged. Capital and labor have equal right in organization. The preservation of personal rights and property rights are the corner stone upon which our civilization rests. Co-operation is the beginning and foundation of industrial peace and diffused prosperity.

Christianity and civilization and humanity demand exclusion of children from and the protection of women and children in industry. We commend the state legislation already enacted to prevent child labor and urge the strict enforcement of the present laws and the enactment of more modern statutes for the

protection of women and children in industry.

Recognizing that conditions in the textile industry in one commonwealth are affected by those existing in neighboring states, we join the Western North Carolina Conference in urging our Senators and Representatives in Congress to use their best effort to obtain a non-partisan and non-sectional survey of the entire industry in the United States and urge upon our Governor and other state

authorities to supplement the Federal survey with a study of the employment of women and children in North Carolina. The need is to ascertain the true facts

through governmental agencies.

We concur with the Western North Carolina Conference in recommending Duke University to establish a chair of Industrial Relations. We urge upon all educational institutions and all religious and civic organizations to co-operate with all agencies seeking to bring about industrial understanding, industrial justice and industrial peace, undergirded by the spirit of brotherhood.

REPORT OF BOARD OF FINANCE

Your Board of Finance submits the following:

The Special Effort Campaign is now closing its sixth year and we regret that we are far from the goal set for the church. On a quota of \$431,786.92 our conference had paid to March 1, 1929, the sum of \$157,758.00, leaving an unpaid balance of \$274,028.92. To March 31 of this year only 10 charges had paid in full. To these we express our sincere thanks. Forty-seven charges had paid less than \$100.00 and 4 charges had paid nothing. Fifty-three charges paid nothing last year.

These last figures are rather disheartening and should stir each of us to

greater effort for this most worthy cause.

This movement has been vigorously carried on during the present year with encouraging results. We earnestly request that this cause be presented to every congregation in the conference and an offering taken. Under the plan of the General Board the clean-up campaign has yet one year to operate. Therefore, we earnestly request that this conference re-commit itself unreservedly to this movement.

We request our Bishop to appoint Rev. T. M. Grant Conference Director of Superannuate Endowment, and we ask that he be given the hearty co-operation of every member of the conference in this work.

We request that each Presiding Elder provide in his District Conference program an opportunity for the director, or his representative, to present this

cause.

On the first day of the meeting of the annual conference, before figuring any percentage, the conference treasurer is directed to pay to the treasurer of the local church, where the conference is held, the sum of \$3,000.00 for conference expense; he is also directed to pay to the conference secretary \$1,600.00 to cover his salary, incidental expenses and the printing of the Conference Journal; to the statistical secretary, \$200.00, and to the conference treasurer, \$300.00 to cover his salary.

Your Commission recommends that out of all the amounts collected from the grand total of \$227,970.00 the distribution shall be made by the conference treasurer on the following basis: 60.74 per cent to the conference work and 39.26 per cent to the General Conference work.

The books of the conference treasurer were audited during the past year by W. T. Dixon, Certified Accountant, of Raleigh, N. C. The report of the

auditor is entered on the records of the Commission.

The bond required of the conference treasurer is \$5,000.00. Your Commission recommends that this bond shall be increased to \$10,000.00.

The law of our church requires the treasurer of the several boards to be

secured by an adequate and solvent security company's bond.

The secretary of the Commission is directed to call attention of the several treasurers of this law and inform them that they are expected to comply in the event any one has failed.

The attention of the several boards of this conference is directed to the expense incident to premiums paid for the bonds of the conference treasurer and treasurers of the boards. It is believed that an appreciable saving may be effected by the purchase of a schedule bond covering the duties of the several treasurers serving this conference.

The secretary of the Commission is requested to secure information whereby the treasurer of the conference and the boards may come together in the purchase of a bond like this. The boards are requested to keep this in mind.

ORPHANAGE REPORT

Your committee desires to make the following report:

There are 331 children in our orphanage at present, which is 40 more than we had a year ago. The total cost for running the orphanage per year is \$100,276.00, which is about \$302.95 per capita. This is a much lower rate than prevails at other institutions of its kind. Of this amount, \$42,000.00 is received from assessments and the Duke Endowment, leaving \$58,276.00 to be raised by specials. The orphanage suffered a loss of \$12,000.00 from collections last year, and the distressing reports coming in from our pastors this year indicate an even greater loss for the coming year. In view of this situation, it is very important that our pastors give a greater attention to specials next year. We ask that the pastors make much of the Thanksgiving season by holding Thanksgiving services in each of their churches and taking a special offering for the orphanage. On circuits, we advise that these services be distributed through four or five Sundays around this period until every church has been visited and a collection taken. It is also urged that monthly offerings from Sunday schools and organized classes be taken and that these, together with the Thanksgiving offerings, be sent immediately to Brother Barnes as specials, and not applied to the budget of the church.

Glenwood Avenue has been paved during the past year at a cost of \$14,000, adding to the beauty and attractiveness of our orphanage property. The cost of

this paving must be provided for over a period of ten years.

The annual revival at the orphanage this year was conducted by our beloved superintendent, Brother Barnes. Forty-nine boys and girls were added to the membership of Jenkins Memorial Church as a result of this meeting. It is also gratifying to report that all the children in the orphanage now above six years of age are members of the church.

We wish to extend our thanks and appreciation to the North Carolina Christian Advocate for the liberal space it has given in its paper to the orphan-

age and the interest it has manifested in its work.

We desire to call the attention of our pastors to the radio message to be delivered by the Governor of our state near Thanksgiving Day, and ask that they call it to the attention of their people so that those who have radios may

tune in and hear his message.

There is a growing feeling among your committee that it is asking too much of the superintendent of our orphanage to secure more than half of the funds for the running expenses of the orphanage from the outside, in addition to his regular duties. That within itself is a big task for one man. An increased endowment, therefore, becomes imperative in order to relieve him of this arduous duty. We recommend the writing of the orphanage in our wills; the purchasing of annuity bonds; and the taking out of insurance policies with the orphanage as the beneficiary. We urge our pastors to single out persons in their congregations who can and would contribute through these means to an increased endowment, and put Brother Barnes in touch with them.

We ask that the conference confirm all trustees whose terms have expired

and who have been re-elected to succeed themselves.

We also ask that the ten per cent assessment in the budget be continued.

We recommend the appointment of Rev. A. S. Barnes as superintendent of the Methodist Orphanage at a salary of \$4,000 fixed by the Board of Trustees, and the appointment of Rev. C. K. Proctor as superintendent of the Oxford Orphanage.

BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

The General Conference has placed upon the Board of Lay Activities an important responsibility in the church's life and program. Experience has demonstrated that this responsibility is being met and real results achieved where men of ability and consecration are enlisted in the service. Therefore we earnestly request our Presiding Elders and pastors to give every possible attention to the selection of district, associate, charge and church lay leaders of outstanding ability and consecration in those districts and charges where the work has suffered for lack of vital and aggressive leadership. In any situation, we plead for these important positions of service in the church.

The section of country covered by the North Carolina Conference is mainly agricultural. It is the sense of your board that the session of the annual conference should not be held earlier than November 15. The farmers are unable to realize on their crops before that time and it is therefore hard for them to

meet their financial obligations.

We recommend that the collection of benevolences be begun in the very beginning of the conference year and that the Presiding Elders strongly stress this at the first quarterly meeting.

It is further recommended that we make it the goal of each and every charge to have at least one-half of the benevolences by the time of the meeting of

District Conference.

We wish to call attention to the Methodist Layman as the official organ of the Board of Lay Activities and as lay leaders we pledge to try to secure at least as many as thirty-six subscribers in each district, including both new subscriptions and renewals.

We nominate Dr. W. P. Few as Conference Lay Leader and F. S. Aldridge

as secretary for the ensuing year.

We are gratified with the progress that is being made by our church in the field of hospitals. We rejoice with our sister conference, the Western North Carolina, over her good fortune in being able soon to own a hospital.

W. H. Brown, the representative from this conference to the meeting of the Hospital Association of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, in New Orleans last April, stated that he did not see any real good to come to this conference from sending a representative to the association and he did not think the money necessary for such a trip should be spent that way so we are not sending any one this year.

We hereby ask that the conference authorize the General Hospital Board, until further notice, to hold in the treasury any funds that may be received from

this conference.

We further ask that you recommend that the Budget Commission grant the Conference Board the sum of \$75.00 for the carrying on of its work in the conference.

W. H. Brown was elected Conference Golden Cross Director.

We request that all our pastors, before sending off their Golden Cross funds, look at this report in the minutes and see that they are to send them to R. A. Brown, Conference Treasurer.

HOSPITAL COMMISSION

We, your Hospital Commission, appointed at your last session to take under consideration a proposition of the owners of Thompson Memorial Hospital at

Lumberton, submit the following report:

On February 14th we met in Lumberton and made a detailed inspection of the hospital, having with us by invitation in an advisory capacity, Dr. C. C. Jarrell, secretary of the Hospital Board of the M. E. Church, South. Detailed figures as to indebtedness and stock represented were presented by Mr. Dickson McLean, and there was a free discussion of the entire matter.

The Commission felt that it was not prepared to vote at this time, but later voted to reject the offer of the owners. Still later, at the request of the owners,

the matter was left open for consideration by this conference.

REPORT OF JOINT COMMISSION

The Joint Commission of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and the Methodist Protestant Church of North Carolina, submits the following report:

1. We are glad to note that the sending of Fraternal Messengers from the Conferences of one denomination to those of the other has brought about a better understanding between the denominations, and has also aided in creating a closer Christian fellowship. So far, so good. But your Committee feels that the time has come when these two denominations operating in the same territory, fighting a common foe, and striving in the same way to build up the Kingdom of Jesus Christ in North Carolina, should begin a closer and more active coperation in a few communities in this state. This, we believe, can be done to the glory of God and to the advancement of His Kingdom.

After careful consideration at two meetings of this Joint Commission, it was agreed to recommend to our respective Conferences the elimination of one Methodist group in communities where each of the churches represented on this Commission has a small following, and where neither can have satisfactory growth. If this plan should not be acceptable, then we recommend a co-operative

effort in keeping with the plan proposed a year ago.

The plan of this elimination is for one group to join the other, and the church thus demembered to be closed and the property disposed of in harmony

with the law of the church involved.

We, furthermore, recommend that this plan be tried out in two communities where similar conditions maintain, and that this Commission, together with the Presiding Elder involved and the President of the Methodist Protestant Conference, be authorized to choose these communities, and to put the plan into operation.

We, also, recommend that with the approval of this plan by the Conference, the Commission proceed in the communities selected to make effective the plan

proposed.

The Commission understands, of course, that full co-operation is hardly to be expected in the local churches where the plan may be tried. There will be those with strong local and denominational attachments, who, perhaps, will not be able to adjust themselves to this new order. The Commission understands, too, that church membership is not a matter in which coercion can or should be used. Each individual has a right to settle this for himself. If some prefer to go into other Methodist Churches in other communities, they would have that privilege. Others, perhaps, would elect to join the churches of other denominations; they

would be perfectly free to follow that course. However, it is our hope that the majority of our members would join the merger. Though, in any event, it is our opinion that we would be better off in the end with only one Methodist Church in these communities than we are or can be under the present conditions.

The Commission proposed a fair, and equitable, and Christian adjustment between the two denominations in working out this scheme. If the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, yields the territory in one community the Methodist Protestant Church will give way in another community of equal strength and opportunity. There will be no scheming for advantage. The aim will be to promote the interest of each church; and above all, the progress of the Kingdom.

In this spirit, and as the result of our deliberations and best judgment, and in obedience to what we understand to be the purpose of this Commission, we submit this proposal to our respective Conferences for their deliberation, and we do it with the earnest prayer that their conclusions may be in harmony with the spirit and purpose and glory of Him who is the great Head of the Church.

2. We commend most heartily the effort to wisely consolidate rural churches

where it can be done to the advantage of Kingdom interests.

3. Following the agreement of a year ago, that the term of office of two members of the Joint Commission, representing each of the two denominations should expire each year, J. F. Kirk, of the Western North Carolina Conference, and C. B. Culbreth, of the North Carolina Conference, were nominated by the group of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, for the election by their conferences, respectively, the North Carolina Conference and the Western North Carolina Conference. The matter of electing two members by the Methodist Protestant Conference was referred to the Nominating Committee of that conference.

COMMITTEE ON SPIRITUAL STATE OF THE CHURCH

experience. Without this all else is dead.

Therefore, be it resolved by the North Carolina Conference:

First, That as a conference we commit ourselves, beginning now, to the Holy Spirit and to the principles of this triumphant era of the Gospel.

Second, That we and our whole church wait upon God with renewed expectancy and prayer for that baptism of the Holy Spirit, which we now so sorely need.

Third, That Bishop Edwin D. Mouzon be requested to call the ministers and laymen of the North Carolina Conference together at such time and place as he may deem advisable for meditation, prayer and testimony in order to prepare our leadership for the most fruitful observance possible of this anniversary in our churches.

UNIFICATION OF BOARDS

The committee considered the paper and memorial signed by Daniel Lane, J. A. Russell, H. E. Myers, W. A. Stanbury and T. G. Vickers, and recommends the adoption of the following:

urge the creation of the Board of Christian Education as provided for in the report of said Commission and that there be granted to said board large powers of discretion in working out the merger of the several boards into the new organization.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE TO FORMULATE A PLAN FOR THE LIQUIDATION OF DEBT ON CHURCH AT CHAPEL HILL

At a conference called by Bishop Mouzon to consider ways and means to raise funds with which to pay off the indebtedness on the Church at Chapel Hill, the following laymen of the N. C. Conference were present: Messrs. L. R. Wilson, J. C. Braswell, Junius Wren, J. A. Staten, W. P. Few, C. G. Morris, J. P. Gibbons, W. A. Graham, T. A. Person, F. B. McKinne, E. N. Ricks and C. F. Harvey. Dr. M. T. Plyler met with the committee and gave information in reference to the amount of the indebtedness.

After some discussion, it was moved, seconded and unanimously carried that the plan adopted at the recent session of the Western North Carolina Conference be recommended to the North Carolina Conference now in session for adoption, this plan being as follows:

1. A committee of three laymen from each of the conferences to be appointed by the Bishop as a General Committee to perfect an organization for the purpose of liquidating the debt on the Church at Chapel Hill, N. C.

2. This committee to be authorized to employ a field man, and said com-

mittee to have authority to fix salaries and expenses.

3. The General Committee to select a suitable layman for each district, who in turn will select an outstanding man from each pastoral charge, as a point of contact for the field man.

4. It will be the duty of these committees to furnish the District Chairman a list of persons in each pastoral charge who will assist the Field Secretary in

raising the necessary funds.

5. All moneys collected to be turned over to the treasurer of the Joint Commission, M. E. Hogan, Chapel Hill, N. C., to be kept in a special fund

and paid out only upon order of this General Committee.

6. The Treasurer of the Board of Missions of each conference to be authorized to advance as a loan not to exceed \$1,000 from each conference for the purpose of defraying organization expenses; any borrowed money to be repaid from the collection of funds by the Field Secretary.

7. This plan is not to vitiate any previous plans, agreements or guarantees made by the Conference Boards of the North Carolina and the Western North

Carolina Conferences,

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SOUTHERN ASSEMBLY

NORTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE

The North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, has received with interest the proposal of the stockholders and commissioners of the Southern Assembly to convey the ownership and administration of the Assembly to a Board of Trustees to be elected by annual conferences east of the Mississippi River.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED: First, That the North Carolina Conference accepts said proposition and will co-operate in the proposed plan on the basis set forth.

Second, That this Conference endorses and commends to our people an appeal for voluntary contributions for the enlargement and better equipment of the Assembly that it may serve the interests of the church in the most efficient way.

Third, That this Conference does not assume any liability for any financial obligations of the Southern Assembly, nor is said Conference either financially or morally obligated for any present or future indebtedness of the said Assembly. We hope and believe that it will be amply sustained by the thousands who shall benefit by it and by those who habitually support the great and worthy institutions of our church.

Fourth, That the Board of Trustees created by this Conference, in co-operation with other Annual Conferences, is hereby authorized and empowered to secure incorporation under the laws of the State of North Carolina whenever in its discretion incorporation may be necessary or desirable for the better dis-

charge of its trust.

Fifth, That Rev. H. C. Smith be elected a trustee of the Southern Assembly to serve one year, and that Dr. W. P. Few be elected to serve as trustee for two years, and as their terms expire, one trustee shall be elected for a term of two years at each session of this conference hereafter: on condition that said Board of Trustees as a whole shall record, levy or seek to levy on this conference no assessment for the Southern Assembly and that in case of such levy or attempt to levy an assessment, our acceptance of this said proposal shall be void and of no effect.

Sixth, That the Board of Trustees shall submit annually to each of the co-operating conferences a full report of the condition and operations of the Southern Assembly together with such recommendations as the board may deem advisable.

Seventh, That the above acceptance on the part of the North Carolina Conference shall not be effective until at least nine other annual conferences east of the Mississippi River have accepted this proposal on similar terms.

DANIEL LUTHER EARNHARDT

By J. H. Shore

Daniel Luther Earnhardt, the son of Silas and Caroline Goodman Earnhardt, was born in Rowan County, N. C., April 22, 1854, and left earth for heaven, from his home, near Durham, N. C., December 13, 1928. He was married to Miss Helen Frances Ayers in Christ Church, Rowan County, February 4, 1877, Rev. H. M. Brown officiating. Surviving are his widow, and twelve children, five sons and seven daughters: L. S. and J. W. Earnhardt, Mrs. C. K. Harvey, Durham, N. C.; A. P. Earnhardt, Huntington, West Virginia; G. N. Earnhardt, Tarboro, N. C.; Rev. D. E. Earnhardt, a member of the North Carolina Conference, and now serving Fifth Avenue Church, Wilmington, N. C.; Mrs. W. C. Worrell, Rich Square, N. C.; Mrs. C. R. Aycock and Mrs. W. M. Peel, Fremont, N. C.; Mrs. L. W. Flythe, High Point, N. C.; Mrs. J. O. Gay, Severn, N. C.; Mrs. H. E. Lance, wife of Rev. H. E. Lance, Timberlake, N. C.

Brother Earnhardt was born of Lutheran parentage and joined that church in 1876, and in the year 1878 he united with the Methodist Episco-

pal Church, South.

He was licensed to preach in February, 1878, and joined the North Carolina Conference the same year at its session in Charlotte. He was ordained a deacon in 1880, and ordained an elder in 1883. He served the following charges during his long ministry: Salisbury Circuit, 1879; Concord Circuit, 1880-81; Davie Circuit, 1882; Davidson Circuit, 1883-86; South Fork Circuit, 1887; Leasburg Circuit, 1888-89; Burlington Circuit, 1890-91; Mt. Tirzah Circuit, 1892-93; Snow Hill Circuit, 1894-96; Jonesboro Circuit, 1897-1900; Ridgeway Circuit, 1901-02; Fremont Circuit, 1903-06; Camden Circuit, 1907; Garysburg Circuit, 1908-09; Rich Square Circuit, 1910-12; Conway Circuit, 1913-14; Chadbourn Circuit, 1915; Clinton Circuit, 1916-19; Plymouth Circuit, 1920.

At the Conference held at Rocky Mount at the close of that year, Brother Earnhardt was granted a superannuate relation. He retired to his home, where he spent his last days in cultivating his little farm, but he was always ready to preach when opportunity offered, and his brethren were

glad to use him, and the people heard him glady.

He taught a men's Bible class in the Sunday school near his home until he became too feeble to attend. There he "waited on the banks of the river" men's the state of the stat

river," until the call came to join the great Conference above.

The funeral service was held at Bethany Church, where he had worshipped during his last days, conducted by Rev. J. C. Wooten, presiding elder of the Durham District, Rev. H. L. Hendricks, pastor of the church, and this writer. His body was then borne to the cemetery in Durham, where it awaits the sunrise of the resurrection.

Brother Earnhardt was recognized as a strong preacher by all the thoughtful people in every charge that he served. He was blessed with a strong body, endowed with a splendid mind, and possessed a type of spiritual life that was very attractive in winning souls to Jesus Christ. All who ever knew him were charmed by his fine sense of humor, which was sanctified by grace, and made very effective in his approach to men in the work of the pastorate. As a preacher he never dealt in platitudes, but he constantly searched the word of God for a deeper setting of the things of the kingdom.

He was an original thinker, always bringing out of the bottomless depths of infinite truth "things old and new." He was no "scrap-book preacher," but in every sermon dealt with the few fundamentals of the Gospel, sin, repentance, faith in Jesus Christ as the only Savior of men,

regeneration and the witness of the Spirit.

The gospel that he preached grew out of the experience of his own life, and he never prostituted his ministry by seeking to gratify the "itching ears of man" for the cheap emotionalism, that ministers only to popular entertainment, with results as evanescent as the morning vapor before the rising sun. We had no man among us who sought with greater fidelity to keep his ordination vows than D. L. Earnhardt.

He was never a self-seeker, but lived the injunction of Paul, "in honor preferring one another." During his long itinerant ministry as a Methodist preacher, from the hills of Western North Carolina to the lowlands of the East, wherever he placed his feet, every track that he made was clean.

In looking over the diary that he kept through all the years, he never failed to place the chief emphasis of his ministry on the salvation of sinners, and he numbered them by hundreds and hundreds. He has left to the church, his large family, and to the world the legacy of a life that

will live and speak through all the years to come.

The peculiar and intimate relation of the writer of this memoir to Brother Earnhardt is the only apology for this personal reference. I was his junior preacher on the old Leasburg Circuit the first year of my ministry in the Conference, and God forbid that I should ever cease to remember what he meant to my life in this formative period. He and his wife received the young, timid, inexperienced preacher to their hearts, and to their parsonage home, more as their own boy than just a junior preacher sent to be his associate on the charge. He was a wise adviser and a sympathetic counselor and knew just how to commend and encourage, to bring out the best that was in a beginner in the ministry. Eli was never more unselfish in his attitude to young Samuel, than he was to me, in doing everything possible to open the hearts and the confidence of the people to this young preacher.

Sometime when I meet him in the "land that is fairer than day," and there amidst the splendors of the celestial city, I shall tell him in the language of the redeemed, what his life meant to me in this world.

His was the greatest eulogy that can be paid to the life of a follower of the "Man of Galilee," "He was a good man." Daniel Luther Earnhardt has a place near the throne, and those whose lives he touched and blessed, will look for him as they pass over through the coming years. The stars of his rejoicing will multiply, and shine with an increasing radiance in all the eternities to come.

Farewell, friend and brother, 'till we strike hands on the shores of immortality.

On Thursday, September 5, many thousands of people throughout our state, and especially in the eastern half of it, suffered a great shock and felt that they sustained an irreparable loss. For the news went out that I im Daniel was dead.

Sometime in the early morning hours, before the day broke and before his neighbors had awakened from their sleep, he passed from this world. He was alone, except for the company of the Great Companion, and his going was unknown till his young son, James, entered his room to call him for breakfast. He had been somewhat less than well for a few days, but no one thought his illness critical. So little alarmed was he for his own condition that he declined the offer of neighbors and friends to stay with him during the night. That he should have gone from among us so quickly and so without warning passed belief, but it was so. Dazed, dumb and broken, his friends had perforce to face a fact they could not interpret. Of only one thing they were certain: one of the truest men they had known would greet them and comfort them and encourage them no more in this world.

To appraise his work and worth is a task not to be undertaken with confidence. One's emotions out-run one's thoughts, and measurements are lost in the dimness of tears. And yet, even so, a few things are clear.

He was a man of sure and discriminating judgment and far sight. In his pastorates, in questions concerning the larger affairs of the church, in policies to be adopted and carried out by his Alma Mater and the alumni of Duke University, his opinions were eagerly sought and not seldom followed. In the business matters belonging to local churches and to the erection of buildings, and in the settlement of those difficulties which inevitably arise in any congregation or community, he knew how to manage with tact and wisdom and courage. Men, sometimes men who were a little suspicious of ecclesiastical leadership in general, followed him confidently. When the call of the superannuate came, it was to him that those in charge of the work turned for leadership in the North Carolina Conference. It was a choice approved by all. Untiringly he labored, unstintedly he gave himself for this cause which lay so close to his heart, and some of the last work he did was in its behalf.

But it is of him as our friend that we involuntarily and chiefly think, an undesigning, sincere, and helpful friend. From early youth and with increasing effectiveness as the years passed he was a master in the art of making friends. Wherever he moved up and down our state the multitudes claimed him as their friend. There might be disparity in age or station between him and them, but he was known to them and among them as "Jim." Somehow men never thought to give him formal address, always it was just "Jim." There is no sincerer tribute that men pay to another than that.

Friend of all within and without the circle of his own charges, regardless of religious affiliation, he was peculiarly the friend of those who needed friends. Who can number those who sought him out for advice and encouragement and replenishment of hope? The discouraged, the sinning, the broken, the poor, the helpless intuitively turned to him, and never turned in vain. Then, too, he was the friend of youth. Young men and women, boys and girls in their teens, looked to him and counted on him and confided in him and loved him. Not often do we have in this

world a man who is so universal a friend.

Perhaps part of the wealth of friendship which he lavished upon those about him and somewhat of the irresistible warmth of it may be accounted for by the way in which he bore his own deep sorrows and acted the part of both father and mother to his motherless children. In a letter to a friend, speaking of the burden which he carried and of the heart-ache he suffered, though he was mostly reticent about such things, he said, "I am trying to learn to accept it as the Father's will." A strong man who can say that will have something to give other people and they will seek him out without altogether knowing why.

Taken at the flower and summit of his years, full of many duties, and stirred by many visions of better things for the church to which he had devoted all, he has left us incalculably richer for his life and stricken

in great and unfeigned sorrow on account of his departure.

James Martin Daniel was born October 22, 1875, near Warrenton, North Carolina, the eldest child of Stephen A. and Emma Gilliland Daniel, both of whom were natives of Virginia. At the age of twelve years he became a member of Providence Church in Warren County. From this time on he took a very active part in the Sunday school, becoming in early young manhood superintendent. While thus engaged, he felt his call to the ministry. His mother, a very devout woman, said that her prayers were answered when her boy decided to be a Methodist preacher.

In the fall of 1901 he entered Trinity Park School, and in September, 1903, was enrolled as a student at Trinity College. He dropped out of school for one year, and was graduated in the class of 1908. In 1905, while still a student, he was admitted to the North Carolina Annual Conference. He served the following charges: 1906-09, Duke (now Erwin); 1910-13, Selma and Princeton; 1914-17, Jarvis Memorial, Greenville; 1918-20, Dunn; 1921-24, Wilmington District; 1925-28, St. Paul's, Goldsboro; 1929, Rockingham. On January 19, 1910, he was married to Miss Ellen Lynch Garrett, who died November 2, 1926, leaving two children, Helen and James Martin, Junior, aged at present sixteen and fourteen, respectively.

Brother Daniel had served at Rockingham since last November, making a success quite remarkable for so short a time. Friends from many quarters assembled with members of his grief-stricken congregation to pay their tribute of grief and love at eight o'clock Friday morning, September 6. Services were conducted in the church by Reverends H. C. Smith, J. C. Wooten, L. B. Jones and W. A. Stanbury. At five o'clock the same afternoon the body was laid to rest in the cemetery at Warrenton beside the grave of Mrs. Daniel. A great host of former neighbors and friends, along with a large number of his brethren of the North Carolina Conference, stood about the grave while Brother Smith and Reverend B. P. Robinson spoke the last words of the burial service.

The North Carolina Conference is poorer and innumerable hearts are

lonelier without Jim Daniel in this world.

ROBERT LEE DAVIS

Robert Lee Davis, preacher and crusader, was born September 10, 1870, at Warrenton, N. C. He was the son of Col. William S. Davis and Bettie Jones Davis. The father was chaplain in the Confederate army and

a Methodist preacher, and the father was prophecy of the son.

In 1891 he entered Trinity College as a ministerial student, and three years later graduated. While a college student his interests were sufficiently wide to embrace athletics, and he was a member of the famous Southern championship football team. In 1894 and 1895 he did graduate work at Vanderbilt University, and at the end of that year took up active work as a minister in the N. C. Conference, Just as he was entering his ministerial life he was happily married to Miss Marriot Blake Betts, the daughter of Rev. A. D. Betts. She proved to be a gracious complement to the life of her militant husband. Their lives continued in happy association until two years previous to the death of Brother Davis, when she passed away. To this union were born seven children, two girls and five boys, these being W. Alexander, Robert Lee, Jr., Oscar F., Bryan G., David B., Mrs. Harvey Maness and Miss Mary Elizabeth. These children survive.

As a pastor in the N. C. Conference Brother Davis held the following appointments: 1895-96, Nashville; 1897-98, Swan Quarter; 1899-1900, Halifax; 1901-03, Bertie; 1904-05, Camden; 1906, Perquimans. In these eleven years of his active pastorate, Brother Davis received into the Methodist Church twelve hundred and ninety-three members, three hundred and twenty-five of them being on profession of faith. His total assessed salary for the eleven years was \$7,397.00, and he spent \$2,316.00 in building programs for the church. At this time Brother Davis was called to be state organizer of the Anti-Saloon League, in which capacity he served for one year. In 1908 he became superintendent of the Anti-Saloon League, and it was here that he most perfectly expressed himself as a servant of the church and humanity.

When R. L. Davis became superintendent of the Anti-Saloon League he visioned a state free from the ravages of the liquor traffic. To the realization of this dream he gave himself without reserve. The intensity with which he invested himself led those of us whose lives were not so completely centered on this one thing to think of him as not always discreet, but none ever doubted his sincerity. The victory won was for him but a base from which to operate for the achievement of other victories. He lived to see North Carolina voted complete prohibition by an overwhelming majority. He saw, too, even before his strength had failed, our nation outlaw the demon rum which he had so consistently and earnestly fought. It was in these days of happy realization that disease laid hold upon his body, and his fine physical life began to break under the disease and burdens he had carried. When the earthly association broken by the death of his wife came, already his vigorous mind was weakening, and gradually but surely the shadows thickened until in the quiet hour of the evening of September 4, 1929, he breathed his last, surrounded by the children to whom he had given unsparingly of his life and devotion. At two o'clock on the afternoon of September 5 in Edenton Street Church many of his fellow pastors and friends gathered to pay tribute. The service in the church was conducted by the writer, Rev. W. A. Stanbury, Rev. A. S. Barnes and Rev. R. W. Bailey. The body was then carried back to the place of his birth, and as the sun went down we laid him to rest in the beautiful old cemetery at Warrenton. In the hush of the evening and amidst the reverent attitude of those who had gathered, these words were fittingly said:

"Servant of God, well done!

Thy glorious warfare's past,
The battle's fought, the race is won,
And thou art crowned at last."

"Let faith exalt her joyful voice, And now in triumph sing; O Grave, where is thy victory? And where, O Death, thy sting?"

Thus we left him, the spirit released and the tired body at rest, awaiting the call of the Resurrection Morn.

V. A. ROYALL

Rev. V. A. Royall has gone to his reward. Another faithful and beloved itinerant preacher has come to the end of the long road, his labors on

earth ended, and his spirit returned to the God who gave it.

Valerius Addison Royall was born in Sampson County March 15, 1860. His father was Isham Royall, a prominent, influential and upright citizen, a leader in education and a school teacher for many years. The maiden name of his mother was Miss Rachel Carroll, an elect Christian lady. She is still living and has passed her 92nd mile post in life. Of this marriage there were ten children—six girls and four boys. All of the daughters became school teachers. Two of the sons are Baptist preachers and one an influential citizen of Johnston County, and the other son, the subject of this memoir, a Methodist preacher. It is clearly seen by these statements that the home life of Brother Royall was one of culture and refinement and his early environment such as to produce a strong, noble character. And there was in him a nobility of soul, a love for the finer and better things of life that tell of his early home training.

In early life, when a mere boy, Brother Royall united with the Baptist Church near his home, and was a member for several years. But like many others, drifted away, withdrew from the church and plunged into the awful life of sin. For many years he drank the bitter dregs of sin and knew its dreadful meaning in some of its worst forms. Later on in life, when about thirty years old, he was genuinely converted and powerfully saved. This great event took place out in his field while he was at work. He had seen several of his neighbors and relatives die an awful death of sin, and his favorite child, a little boy, had been taken away. This child was so bright and talked so much about Jesus that the contrast of his happy death with others who had gone, put the father to thinking, and while at his work he began praying and just fully and completely surrendered to God. His conversion was as real and clear as that of St. Paul on the road to Damascus. He left off every bad habit, his thirst for strong

drink was taken away and he became a new man.

For some time before his conversion he felt that God wanted him to preach, and that if he was ever saved he would have to preach the Gospel. He, like many others, did not want to preach and fought the idea.

But after that great experience in the field that day, this question of preaching was settled and he was ready to say, "Here am I, send me."

He at once began this work very earnestly and enthusiastically, and for six years did special evangelistic work, and had great success in winning souls for Christ. He said later that after he began preaching, he found that he was preaching the Methodist doctrines of Regeneration, Sanctification, etc., so he joined the Methodist Church. And I believe no man among us was really and genuinely more in full accord with the polity and doctrines of the Methodist Church than Brother Royall, although all of his people were Baptists. He really loved her "sweet communion, solemn yows and her hymns of love and praise."

At the earnest request of friends he applied for admission into the North Carolina Conference and was received on trial at Goldsboro in 1903. At the Conference in Henderson in 1904, he was ordained a deacon by Bishop W. A. Candler, and was ordained an elder by Bishop C. B.

Galloway at New Bern in 1907.

His appointments were not of the class of the high steeple church nor did he ever receive a big salary. But as a loyal, faithful Methodist itinerant he gladly went to his appointment and considered it but another opportunity to preach the unsearchable riches in Christ Jesus and to serve his day and generation.

His appointments were as follows: 1903, Jacksonville and Richlands (he had served this charge as a supply before joining the Conference); 1904-07, Fayetteville Circuit; 1908-11, Pittsboro Circuit; 1912-14, Pasquotank Circuit; 1915-18, North Gates Circuit; 1918, appointed to Jonesboro Circuit, but after the death of his wife early in January, 1919, he exchanged with Rev. C. R. Ross and went to the Cary Circuit and finished the year there; 1920-24, Creedmoor Circuit; 1925-29, until his death, the Youngsville Circuit.

As a preacher Brother Royall was fluent, plain and inspiring. He preached the gospel in its purity and simplicity and the message usually reached the hearts of his hearers. His great theme was Christ crucified for a lost world, as the hope of a lost and sin-cursed world. He was distinctively a man of prayer and had power with God and man. On one occasion he felt the need of a deeper consecration, shut himself up in an upper room, refusing to eat or drink anything until he could obtain this new experience. Late in the afternoon the Spirit came in great power and he was so completely overwhelmed that he cried, "Lord, stay thy hand, I can contain no more." His greatest work was in the revivals and he seemed to have had special evangelistic gifts. On many of the charges he served, the one great feature of his work was the revival. On the Creedmoor Circuit he held a great revival for nearly a month and scores of people were converted, and only eternity will tell the results of this meeting.

Brother Royall was twice married. His first wife was Miss Lizzie Barbary of Sampson County, but at the time of their marriage was Mrs. Monk, a widow with one daughter. She suddenly fell asleep at the parsonage in Jonesboro in January, 1919. Of this marriage there were four children, but only two are living. They are Mrs. J. S. Sherwood of Raleigh and Mrs. J. P. H. Blanchard of Gates County.

While on the Cary Circuit, he married Miss Lucy Reavis of Cary, who still survives and tenderly ministered to him in the last illness and did all that loving hands could do. She says that it was the greatest joy and pleasure of her life to wait upon him during his sickness.

It was the great desire of Brother Royall to die in the service. He wanted at once to cease to work and live. He preached at Youngsville on Sunday night under great difficulty on the subject of the "Witness of the

Spirit," then drove to his home near Franklinton.

This proved to be his last sermon for he took his bed and gradually grew weaker until the end came and he peacefully fell asleep on Monday

night, April 15th, 1929.

He was confined to his bed for about a month, yet he had suffered and been in declining health for a long time. He suffered intensely yet bore it patiently and was wholly resigned to the will of God. He said to me a few days before he crossed over the River that his work was done, yet he was not worrying but simply trusting in Jesus for he had committed

it all into His hands, and everything would be all right.

He gave full directions about his funeral and burial even to the selection of hymns, scripture lesson and everything; and this was carried out as far as possible. Rev. W. C. Ball of Franklinton was to have charge of the services in the home. He was assisted by his presiding elder, Dr. M. Bradshaw, Rev. E. M. Carter, pastor of the Christian Church in Youngsville, and the writer, on Wednesday morning, April 17, at 9 o'clock. Immediately after this he was carried to Jonesboro and the tired body was laid to rest in the cemetery by the side of his first wife. Here the services were in charge of Rev. O. I. Hinson, assisted by Rev. L. H. Joyner and Rev. C. E. Rozzelle. Here he sleeps until the great Resurrection morning when the dead in Christ shall rise. We can truly say of him:

Servant of God, well done,
Rest from thy loved employ,
The battle fought, the victory won,
And thou art crowned at last.

NATHAN L. SEABOLT

When the news spread throughout our Conference that N. L. Seabolt had died on July 14 of this year, it was not unexpected but it brought sadness to many who were glad to be known as his friends. Often he had gladdened our hearts with his good cheer and triumphant faith. We knew that the end was possibly near, but nevertheless, when he did go there came to us the sense of a great loss.

The church, too, will miss him for he was among our most successful pastors. His progressive spirit always supported the program of the church and he was always leading in the improvement of the houses of worship of his people. He built many churches. Among the number were Epworth and Macedonia on Vanceboro Circuit, Andrews on Millbrook Circuit, Pee Dee and Roberdel on Richmond Circuit, and East Lumberton on Lumberton Circuit. He repaired as many more, with the remarkable record of never leaving in debt, as much as fifty dollars, any church that he built or repaired.

Through his ministry not only was physical equipment looked after, but he did not forget the souls of men. His was the gift of knowing how to introduce men to Jesus Christ.

The real test, however, of a man's success in the ministry sometimes depends upon his ability to train those within the church to know better the Master and His Kingdom. In this work Brother Seabolt was a master workman. Delicate situations seemed, under the tenderness, the purity and courage of this great soul, to become very easy and simple. Therefore, he was known as a man who usually remained four years or longer with the churches that he served. On one charge he remained five years and he would have been very acceptable to others for just as long a period.

Behind this very successful minister's life, no doubt were many very positive causes but, as I remember him, there were one or two that always

seemed to me to be the reason for this good man's success.

He had the power to present Jesus Christ. His sermons were vibrant with the fervent idea of a living Lord as the central figure of our religion. His relations with and his attitude toward men were glorified with the spirit of his Master. Jesus was his Friend and when men lived with N. L. Seabolt they caught the vision that Christianity was not a creed, was not the submission to the dogma of ecclesiasticism but it was the fine communion with Jesus, the Saviour and Redeemer of mankind. He did not rest his religion upon the arguments of theologians but upon his simple but very genuine experience with the Man of Gallilee.

Together with his simple and saving faith in Jesus Christ, was a passionate love for man. He could be positive, but never bitter. He could be courageous but never discourteous. There was always inbred in the real gentility of the man a fine appreciation of his brother, and while sometimes there was a difference of opinion, yet his heart ran out in genuine compassion to all men and in a special way to those who came within the sacred circle of an intimate friendship with him.

Growing out, no doubt, of his experience with Christ and his love for men, was a cheerful attitude toward life, in general, which made his ministry most acceptable. The Christ was introduced to men in terms of joy and peace and not in ideas of judgment and punishment. This happy disposition adorned his home, glorified his friendships, and gave to his

church the testimony that Christ dwells within men.

In his itinerant ministry he served only in the North Carolina Conference. In 1890 he entered our Conference and served the following churches during his ministry among us: Prospect Circuit, 1890; Ocracoke and Hatteras, 1891; Vanceboro Circuit, 1892-93; Grimesland Circuit, 1895-98; Millbrook Circuit, 1899-1902; Brookland and Macedonia Circuit, 1903; Richmond Circuit, 1904-07; Pekin Circuit, 1908-11; Lumberton Circuit, 1912-15; Roper Circuit, 1916-17; Montgomery Circuit, 1918-22; Lumberton Circuit, 1923-26; Seven Springs Circuit, 1927; and Hemp Circuit, 1928.

Brother Seabolt was born in Randolph County January 22, 1864. He died in Randolph County July 14, 1929, and was buried near the place of his birth. Besides his widow, he leaves seven children—three daughters, Mrs. Fred Frostick, Misses Louise and Ruth, and four sons, John, Jasper, Marvin and Eugene. To all of these we extend our deepest sympathy.

Doubtless God could have made a better man but doubtless God never

did.

Margaret Ann Northcott was born in Randolph County near Ramseur, N. C., June 27, 1864, and died in the Methodist Parsonage at Laurel

The funeral service was conducted in the Methodist Church at Laurel Hill on the following Tuesday morning at nine o'clock by Reverend H. C. Smith, presiding elder of the Rockingham District, assisted by Rev. N. M. Wright of the Richmond Circuit and Rev. A. J. McKelway, pastor of the Presbyterian Church at Laurel Hill. The body was carried immediately to the family plot in the city cemetery at Wadesboro, N. C., where Rev. W. B. She lacked one day being twenty years old when she promised to share the joys and sorrows of married life with George H. She converted Ladies' Aid Societies into Missionary Societies in every case where possible, and often carried the work forward herself.

A good, noble, loving, true Christian wife and mother has gone, hearts are broken and home is lonely and sad.

"She was a mother good and kind,
A truer wife you ne'er will find.
She was a pal to all, you see,
But the greatest pal she was to me;
Her friendship was extended bold
To the young, middle-aged and old.

"Many burdens did she carry,
But never on life's road did tarry.
Her way was rough, racy and rugged,
But so is that of God's beloved;

Jane Elizabeth Little was the daughter of John P. Little and his first wife, Sara A. Covington. She was born at their home, Little's Mills, Richmond County, on September 8, 1848. In this home, the Methodist preacher was ever a most welcome guest. In 1875 Elizabeth Little married Joseph Wheeler who served on the circuit. Mr. Wheeler, a Christ-like man, was the son of Reverend Thomas Wheeler of the South Carolina Conference. This union was most happy. Endowed with an unusual mind and having had exceptional advantages—three home teachers, Mrs. Burrill's School for Girls, Charlotte, and at St. Mary's, Raleigh, Mrs. Wheeler was

well equipped as companion and assistant in the work of a Methodist minister. She entered with zeal into all of his life, including the hardships of the itineracy, as it was in those days. After Mr. Wheeler's death in 1889, she devoted part of the time to teaching, giving the benefit of her training and experience with characteristic enthusiasm. As far as a frail physical condition permitted, she took part in church activities and for many years had taken a very special interest in distributing the Bible, to which it was her constant habit to turn for help, throughout the inevitable vicissitudes of a long life. The last year of her life was spent in the Ellen Fitzgerald Hospital, Monroe. Here the hospital life furnished diversion and loving care made her very happy. After a few days confinement to bed, on May 23, 1929, she passed quietly from sleep to the House of Many Mansions.

A service was held at the home of her cousin, Mrs. Blakeny, conducted by the Methodist minister, Dr. Chappell, and her good friend, Rev. J. D. Hart, of the Baptist Church. Attended by brothers, sisters, nieces and nephews, with a few friends, she was carried to Charlotte, to rest beside her husband in Elmwood Cemetery.

The North Carolina Conference was set off from the Virginia Conference in May, 1836, and in 1859, and again in 1870, North Carolina territory in the South Carolina Conference was transferred to this Conference. In 1890 North Carolina territory in the Holston Conference and in the Virginia Conference, except that beyond the Chowal River, was transferred to the North Carolina Conference, and the Conference was divided into the North Carolina and Western North Carolina Conferences. In 1894 the remaining North Carolina territory in the Virginia Conference was transferred to the North Carolina Conference.
