REPORT NO. 1—BOARD OF MISSIONS

Because of the pressing issues in the work of extending the Kingdom of God throughout the world—at home and abroad—the college of Bishops, in co-operation with the General Board of Missions, proposes to lead our church in a great spiritual forward movement that will re-discover the passion of our Lord for the lost and sensitize the missionary conscience of the church, so that the evangelization of the world will assume its rightful place of primacy in the mind and heart of the church.

This movement will be known as the Bishop's Crusade. We confidently believe that this movement will result in the deepening of the spiritual life of our people, and the extension of the Kingdom of God in the cities and countryside

around the world.

The North Carolina Conference Board of Missions hopes that our Conference will give every possible aid to the Bishop's Crusade, and that Bishop Kern's appointment of F. S. Love, as director of the Crusade in the North Carolina Conference, be confirmed.

REPORT NO. 2—BOARD OF MISSIONS

We wish to thank the members of the North Carolina Conference for the co-operation given your Board of Missions in the work committed to our hands. We also appreciate the aid which the General Board of Missions has given during the past year.

We recognize with gratefulness the co-operation given Bishop Kern in providing for a special Conference missionary who will work in Japan. We think there should be a growing concern and sacrifice for the enlargement of our

missionary work in foreign fields.

We note also an increasing enthusiasm for the evangelization of the multi-

tudes of people in the area of our church in America.

There are enough unchurched people in the rural areas of the fifteen states where our church operates most extensively to equal the entire population of Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, Florida, Alabama, and Mississippi.

In report No. 1 we have referred to the Bishop's Crusade. This movement is one of many signs of an aroused church membership because of the millions of non-church people at the very doors of our long established churches. Everybody who can, should attend the Bishop's conference that will be held in either Raleigh or Goldsboro on January 14, 1937.

The District Missionary Institutes will be conducted soon after the conferencewide meeting and we hope that they will be largely attended and will render a

great service to the missionary enterprise of the Conference.

Dr. H. P. Myers, of the Department of Education and Promotion in the General Board of Missions, is asking that a school of missions be held in every church in the Conference. If the pastors and people will give their best co-operation to this movement the entire church will feel the wholesome effects of it, and the Kingdom of God will be appreciably extended.

The World Outlook is one of the nation's best missionary periodicals, and

deserves the whole-hearted support of the entire church.

The Board of Missions has made provision to carry out the terms of the resolution of last year providing for the payment of the actual expenses of \$12.00 to all pastors whose salaries are less than \$1,500, provided they attend the North Carolina Pastors' School and take at least one course for credit.

REPORT NO. 1—BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Ι

Your board notes with satisfaction the progress of its work under the direction of our new Executive Secretary, Rev. Robert W. Bradshaw. He has demonstrated his ability for effective leadership in this field. We bespeak for him the continued support of our Conference.

We desire to express our appreciation of the work being done by Mrs. H. M. Wade as director of Children's Work. Her ability as a leader in this part of our program has gained recognition. We commend her to our leaders and people.

It is a matter of deep regret on the part of your board that Mrs. Earl W. Brian is severing her connection with our Conference as director of Young People's Work at the end of this Conference year. Her contribution to the cause of Christian education and service to the young people of our Conference cannot be estimated. We would assure her of our abiding love, high esteem, and best wishes.

We would direct attention to the following items in the year's work:

1. Staff Visitation. Believing that there is a definite value in personal visitation in local charges and churches, members of the Conference staff have this year stressed such visitation. Districts were set apart for special emphasis and most of the charges in these districts were reached. During the year 120 charges in the Conference were visited by one or more members of the Conference staff.

2. District Educational Conferences. A district-wide educational conference was held in each district of the Conference, at which the whole program of Christian education was presented. Attendance upon these conferences and interest

manifested in them were very satisfactory.

3. Summer Assemblies. Our summer assemblies were among the best that have been held in our Conference. The Young People's Assembly at Louisburg had a capacity enrolment of 275, and the spirit of the young people attending was most inspiring. Three intermediate assemblies were held with an enrolment of 200, and with many others unable to be accommodated for lack of space. We feel that a fourth assembly will be required to meet the demands of our intermediate group and efforts will be made to have this additional assembly.

4. Vacation Schools. A marked increase is to be noted in vacation school work in our Conference. One hundred and sixty-four vacation schools have been reported, with around 8,000 pupils and 1,100 workers having part in the schools.

An observation Vacation School was held at Duke in connection with the Pastors' School, and its success was a factor in the success of our vacation school work. Plans are being made to make the observation school an even more effective instrument next year.

5. Church School Day. We are glad to note an increase in the numbers of schools observing Church School Day and a small increase in the amount of the

offering on that day.

6. Home and Foreign Missionary Enterprise. There is an increase in the number of church schools having a part in the Home and Foreign Missionary Enterprise, with a small increase in the amount raised for this enterprise.

7. Training Work. One hundred and thirty charges have expressed a desire for training work to be carried on within their bounds during the coming year. We look to a great advance in our training program with far-reaching results attendant upon the same.

8. Childhood and Youth Week. Reports received indicate that Childhood and Youth Week was observed in over 100 charges in the Conference, a marked

increase over previous years. In many places the observance of the week has been followed with an enlarged program of work for the children and young people

in local churches.

9. Methodist Student Conference. The Methodist Student Conference was held at Trinity Church, Durham, November 6-8, under the direction of the Conference staff, with 175 Methodist students from 17 colleges in the state in attendance. A most interesting and helpful program was entered into by the young people that should bear fruit in their own lives and in the college communities which they represented.

10. Emphasis. The emphasis of the Conference staff has been on helping to bring "every person into personal, vital relationship with Jesus Christ." They have tried to keep that note to the forefront in all of their planning and work.

During the coming year this emphasis will be continued.

II

SCHOOLS AND COLLEGES

As your board considers the year just passed, it is grateful for the progress made by our various educational institutions. With improved economic conditions, student bodies have increased and very effective Christian training has been advanced.

LOUISBURG COLLEGE

With an increase in enrollment to 273 students, which is the full capacity of the college, and with the continued development of the self-help plan, which assures even more effective work, Louisburg College is now greatly encouraged. We are glad to note that the college is operating within its income and is, at the same time, able to make payments on some of its past obligations to teachers and employees.

The board recommends to the North Carolina Conference that Louisburg College be permitted to put on a campaign during the next calendar year to raise \$65,000 with which the total indebtedness of the college may be paid in such manner as outlined in the report of the trustees of Louisburg College to the Board of Christian Education of the North Carolina Conference, provided that the plan to be used in this campaign be submitted to and approved by the Board

of Trustees of Louisburg College and the Bishop and his cabinet.

GREENSBORO COLLEGE

The board notes with gratitude the increased enrollment in Greensboro College during the last academic year, having now a student body of 344, the largest in the history of the institution except during the peak years of 1924-29. Improvements in physical equipment and additions to the faculty have been made.

We approve the effort authorized by the trustees to increase the endowment of the college and commend the program now in preparation for observing in 1938 the centennial of the founding of the college.

DUKE UNIVERSITY

Duke University has continued to grow throughout the year. Representatives from almost all parts of the world make up its student body.

Certain statistical data reveal something of the great service which our university renders. The number of students for the academic year, 1935-36, 3,345;

the number of students for the summer school, 1936, 2,274. There are 362 officers and teachers, not including assistants.

The present endowment is \$30,880,031.16, while the plant and equipment

are valued at \$26,472,840.06.

We find that the university has 28 loan funds valued at \$1,561,738.87, 16 scholarship funds valued at \$249,747.51, and 44 miscellaneous special funds, the sum of which is \$188,099.64.

We endorse the efforts being made to increase the endowment, and approve the plans being made by the trustees and faculty for the centennial celebration

to be held in 1938.

PASTORS' SCHOOL

The 1936 session of the North Carolina Pastors' School offered a most beneficial program. It was well patronized, and a considerable number of credits was granted.

The Institute of International Relations, which was in its fourth year, and the Institute for Rural Ministers, in its third year, were both very successful.

APPOINTMENTS

We recommend the following appointments:

Professors in Duke University-H. E. Spence, J. M. Ormond, H. E. Myers, and F. S. Hickman.

President Louisburg College-A. D. Wilcox.

President Scarritt College for Christian Workers-I. L. Cuninggim.

Professor in Southwestern University-C. T. Thrift, Jr.

We recommend the confirmation of the following persons as members of the Board of Managers of the Pastors' School: R. W. Bradshaw, to fill the remaining two years of the unexpired term of the late Rev. J. C. Wooten; Prof. R. L. Flowers and E. B. Fisher for three year terms.

We recommend the election and confirmation of the following as trustees of Greensboro College: Charles S. Wallace, representing the North Carolina Conference, whose term expires December 31, 1936, and Mrs. James Turner Hamlin, Jr., to fill the vacancy occasioned by the death of Junius Wren, whose term

expired December 31, 1935.

We recommend the election and confirmation of the following trustees of

Louisburg College: O. W. Dowd, G. W. Perry, and Dr. W. K. Greene.

We recommend the confirmation of Rev. Robert W. Bradshaw as Conference Secretary of Christian Education and Director of Young People's Work, at a salary of \$3,000, and of Mrs. H. M. Wade as Extension Secretary and Director of Children's Work, at a salary of \$1,500.

The financial statement of our Treasurer, C. K. Proctor, and the certificate

of audit of same by K. W. Parham, C.P.A., are appended hereto.

We express our gratitude to the Conference for its sympathetic co-operation and request its prayers and assistance during the coming year.

REPORT NO. 2—BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

RECOMMENDATIONS

GENERAL

- 1. That the plan of district visitation by members of the Conference staff be continued.
- 2. That we secure the accreditation of a larger number of preachers and local church workers for training classes and schools.
- 3. That in our training program during the coming year we emphasize the holding of one-teacher schools in many areas, and the teaching of training classes in local churches.

YOUNG PEOPLE'S WORK

- 1. That one young people's assembly be held with the enrollment limited to
- the number of delegates who can be adequately provided for.

 2. That at least three, and if practicable, four, Christian Adventure Assemblies be held, with the enrollment in each assembly limited to 60-75 delegates, not including staff and adult workers.
- 3. That there be held at least one Epworth Training Conference in each district of the Conference.
- 4. That continued emphasis be placed upon the organization and functioning of unions in each district of the Conference.
- 5. That the Young People's Mission Special receive such continued emphasis
- that a larger number of young people's divisions may share in this special.

 6. That the chief emphasis in our young people's program for the new year be "Evangelism." It is suggested that each district director should work out carefully in Conference with the Conference staff and district staff a thoroughgoing program of evangelism to the end that every area in our Conference may be reached by this program.

CHILDREN'S WORK

In an effort to reach and help workers with children in every church in the Conference, we recommend:

- 1. The organization and cultivation of area groups within the various dis-
- tricts, continuing last year's plan. 2. The cultivation of district workers through a Conference council or its
- equivalent near the beginning of the Conference year, and a mid-year meeting of district directors during the time of the North Carolina Pastors' School.
- 3. That special opportunities be provided for meetings during the pre-Easter church membership emphasis for the personal enrichment of workers; to study the religion of childhood; and plan ways in which pastors and teachers may work together in preparing children for church membership.
- 4. That Vacation Schools be promoted through institutes for local church and area groups; assistance in conducting schools in strategic places; and through an Observation Vacation School in conjunction with the North Carolina Pastors' School.
- 5. That training opportunities be made available for workers with children through short courses in small churches; specialization courses in the larger centers; and through informal training in institutes and discussion groups.
- 6. That in all our work during the Conference year emphasis shall be placed on the year-round program of evangelism with children, and to helping teachers become increasingly aware of the unreached children in nearby areas, with a view not only of drawing them into immediate church fellowship, but of planning some extension service in their behalf.

ADULT WORK

1. That the Conference staff and district staff members aid in securing our part of the 100,000 new adult members in the Adult Division, set as a goal for our church.

2. That special effort be made to enlist our whole adult membership in the

support of our total church program,

3. That until such time as we can have a Conference director of adult work, the especial co-operation of presiding elders, pastors, and others concerned with district directors of adult work and the executive secretary is earnestly requested.

EXTENSION WORK

I. In small churches, primarily those on circuits and in industrial centers:

1. Help with the organization and functioning of Church Boards of Christian Education.

2. Plan and help to carry out rural charge and local church institutes.

- 3. Secure a larger number of pastors and other workers who can teach the Short-Term Training Courses for Christian Workers, thus being able to provide for a year-round program of training, rather than confining this work to the summer months.
- 4. Use as large a number of the Duke Foundation men as possible as teachers of training classes, and in vacation school work. Arrange for coaching conferences and an observation vacation school to prepare these men for vacation school work.

5. Continue the district visitation and cultivation work in certain selected

districts, working in co-operation with the presiding elders.

6. Continue emphasis on the Home and Foreign Missionary Enterprise through the distribution of literature, personal correspondence, institutes, personal visits, etc.

Promote the distribution and use of our own literature, not simply because it is Methodist literature, but because we feel it will best serve our workers. Help

workers to understand how this literature can best be used.

8. Continue emphasis upon organization and functioning of young people's unions.

II. Work in communities not now adequately served:

1. Organization of church schools in undeveloped areas, and reviving of abandoned schools where practicable.

2. Surveys, with emphasis on "follow up" work.

III. Conference-wide projects:

1. Work with other members of the staff in planning the total program of Christian education for the Conference.

2. Help people of other races, particularly the Negro and Indian races.

3. Help to promote vacation schools in small churches.

4. Work closely with the Rural Life Department of Duke University and Duke Endowment in behalf of the country church.

Visit large churches, district conferences, and other meetings to present the problem and opportunities of the church in rural areas, and to enlist their

support of the Home and Foreign Missionary Enterprise.

6. Place more emphasis on evangelism in an effort to reach and minister to the large number of unreached persons within the area of our Conference, with a view not only of drawing them into immediate church fellowship, but of planning some extension service in their behalf.

REPORT OF BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION

Your Board of Church Extension was edified by the visit of Dr. R. N. Allen, of the General Board, who offered a number of reformatory suggestions in our work. He suggested to our board the urgent necessity of the churches paying promptly and in full their obligations to both the Conference and General boards, and to loan agencies so as not to jeopardize the honor of the church, and that the policy of said boards should be changed from that of paying debts of churches incurred without sufficient money or good subscriptions in sight; and that the new money which annually comes into our hands be applied on new projects, thus extending the work instead of consuming our income upon old fields. Methodism should not struggle merely to maintain the fields already occupied, and thus perpetuate an established circle, but the circle should be constantly enlarged and strengthened.

The custom of many churches has been to borrow from disinterested monetary organizations, and, failing to secure sufficient collectable subscriptions lists to meet their obligations, have jeopardized the property, and oftentimes so compromised their assets that it precludes the Conference board going to their relief. We urgently discourage the borrowing of money from these organizations which have no greater interest than the increase of their own business. Our advice is: touch not nor handle such compromising overtures. We also call the attention of the Conference to the pitiful insufficiency of our annual income to supply the necessities of distressed churches, and we request our Commission on Budget to increase our apportionment to the sum of \$7,500 and that this be on the percentage as of 1935. We urge, if possible, that our division be remitted to our Treasurer during the year as received that we may better estimate our resources in aiding distressed churches.

We also call attention of the Conference to the storm disasters which have befallen almost our entire coastal section, necessitating immediate aid. In some instances the church has been destroyed, and in others the parsonage has been wrecked. Fire completely destroyed one beautiful church.

It seems a tragedy to us that we are not able to aid these distressed people. Your board has made grants as follows:

REPORT OF BOARD OF FINANCE

We desire to express, and to embody in our report, our deep feeling of sorrow on account of the loss of our faithful Treasurer and co-worker, Brother Junius Wren. He was a member of this board for 22 years and never missed a meeting until last year, when he was too ill to attend. For 14 years he was Treasurer of the board and no board ever had a more faithful and efficient officer. He loved his church and was never happier than when he was working and planning for those who had worn themselves out in its service. In the passing of Brother Wren, the board has lost a faithful co-worker and the claimants of the North Carolina Conference a devoted friend.

We regret to have to report that on account of the fact that we received \$1,424.17 less from the Conference Treasurer this year than last, it is necessary to reduce the amount paid per year's service by 15 cents for superannuates and 10 cents for widows. We are paying \$6.15 per year for superannuates and \$4.10 per year for widows.

REPORT OF BOARD OF CHRISTIAN LITERATURE

It is generally recognized that much of the literature now coming from the secular press is purposely written with sex or crime as the item of interest, and is untrue as descriptive of the acts of the great mass of the reading public. The sex and crime literature is demoralizing to the mature and is destructive to the Christian interests of the young. A real protection against the evil influences of such literature is to be found in the wider circulation of literature sound in morals, and true to the life of the great mass of our people. It is a part of the obligation of every church in the North Carolina Conference to urge and to effect the placing of good books and periodicals among our membership.

GOALS SET

In the light of the pressing need for good literature we recommend:

1. That the ministers and the stewards of each church place among their members as many sound, decent books each year as there are stewards in their churches.

2. That the Upper Room be placed in the home of every Methodist family

in the North Carolina Conference.

3. That our North Carolina Christian Advocate be given an equal place with all other institutions of the church in order that education, missions, orphanages and other interests may profit by its larger circulation, this being our one institution that can and does contribute to every undertaking in our two Conferences.

4. That we continue as our goal every board of stewards 100 per cent subscribers. Furthermore, that we procure subscriptions to the North Carolina Christian Advocate from members of the congregations to equal at least twice the number of stewards in each church.

5. That our Boards of Christian Education and Missionary Auxiliaries continue in a very definite way to aid the pastors in the circulation of the church

paper, being assured of its weekly aid to all these causes,

6. That we concur heartily and urgently request each pastor and congregation to avail themselves of the opportunity offered to them by the Board of Managers of the North Carolina Christian Advocate in the circulation of the Advocate by their very generous introductory offer of the Advocate for twelve weeks for 30 cents.

7. We recommend that the Board of Managers of the North Carolina Christian Advocate adopt an extended subscription rate for a more dependable circulation of the paper, thereby reducing the rate for subscriptions extending

for more than a year; namely:

8. We recommend that the presiding elder, at each Quarterly Conference, call the specific question, "What has been done during this quarter in the distribution of Christian literature?"

9. That we procure subscriptions to the Nashville Christian Advocate, 1 for

each 100 members (or fraction thereof) in each church.

10. That we urge the circulation of our church school literature: the Cargo and Epworth High Road in our church schools; The Christian Home for adults; and the Church School Magazine, together with other helpful aids, among our church school teachers.

We recommend that H. C. Smith succeed himself as a member to the Methodist Board of Publication. We also request the Bishop to re-appoint M. T. Plyler

as Editor of the North Carolina Christian Advocate.

REPORT NO. 1—BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

We, the Board of Lay Activities of the North Carolina Conference, beg to

present the following report:

The laymen of our Conference are confronted today with a great task that demands, for its successful accomplishment, a renewal of their faith, an increase in their loyalty and interest, and a re-consecration of their lives. The opportunities and responsibilities that lie close at hand constitute for them a challenge to establish and maintain an active working force in every local church.

We desire especially to emphasize, for the coming year, the opportunities and responsibilities of the local Board of Lay Activities with regard to the

following:

(1) Personal Evangelism; (2) Promotion of the Benevolences; (3) The Golden Cross; (4) The Training of Official Boards; (5) The Observance of Layman's Day; (6) The North Carolina Christian Advocate; (7) The Methodist Orphanage.

PERSONAL EVANGELISM

The social, moral, and spiritual decline in the life of our people can be remedied only by a vigorous attack upon the forces of worldliness and sin. Realizing the need of reviving the waning enthusiasm of men for the church's big business of saving souls, our Conference is placing supreme emphasis upon the cause of personal evangelism.

The meetings of the National Preaching Mission are stirring the hearts of men everywhere. We pray that the tides of this spiritual movement will flow into the personal lives of ministers and laymen alike and deepen the spiritual life of our churches and communities. A rekindling of zeal for the redemption of souls is the most vital and immediate need of the church and the most potential means of winning the world for Christ lies in the field of personal evangelism. We, therefore, recommend:

(1) That the Church Board of Lay Activities make personal evangelism

one of its chief objectives;

(2) That the Church Board of Lay Activities seek definitely to find the fields near at hand that are "rich unto the harvest" and to send its consecrated laymen out into these fields as personal evangelists to witness for Christ;

(3) That the district lay leader co-operate with the presiding elder in providing lay speakers for service in outlying sections for the purpose of reaching

all those unchurched people for whom we are responsible;

(4) That the meetings of the National Preaching Mission in Raleigh, November 26-29, be brought by the church lay leader to the attention of the local Board of Lay Activities and that every encouragement possible be given to the members of the local board to attend.

PROMOTION OF THE BENEVOLENCES

The adoption of the voluntary principle has created a wider vision and a deeper sense of loyalty on the part of laymen everywhere. It is worthy of note, however, that, while the acceptances have been paid in most cases, these acceptances are frequently less than the askings. It is likewise a matter of serious import that the acceptances for the whole church for 1936 were \$29,547 less than the total accepted for 1935, and that the acceptances in North Carolina this year were nearly \$12,000 less than we paid last year. It, therefore, becomes imperative to give serious attention to the problem of how best to lead our local churches to recognize and fulfill their benevolent and missionary responsibility. To this end we make the following recommendations:

(1) That the Annual Conference accept the General Conference askings for general work; and that an equal amount be apportioned for Conference

work;

(2) That a mass meeting of the stewards of each district be held as soon as possible after the session of the Annual Conference; and that the presiding elder, in co-operation with the district lay leader, secure speakers for the program;

(3) That the goal of one-half of the benevolences paid by the session of

the District Conference be continued for 1936-1937;

(4) That a program properly emphasizing benevolences be provided by

the presiding elders and district lay leaders at all District Conferences;

(5) That a goal be set of benevolences paid in full one month before the session of the Annual Conference so that the last month of the Conference year may be devoted to raising the pastor's salary in full, if the salary should be in arrears;

(6) That the presiding elders be requested to arrange a strong program of information and inspiration for the first Quarterly Conference before the

vote is taken on the acceptance of the askings;

(7) That serious consideration be given by each individual church to the adoption of a systematic plan for raising the benevolences apart from the other items of the annual church budget.

THE GOLDEN CROSS

Every church school, missionary society, and Board of Lay Activities is a recruiting station for enlisting members for the Golden Cross. Members may be enrolled at any time during the Conference year; but the week, including the second and third Sundays in May, is Hospital Week. We earnestly recommend that the director for the Golden Cross in each local church be appointed immediately after the opening of the new Conference year and that the local Board of Lay Activities lend him all possible assistance in his efforts to promote the hospital work of our church.

THE TRAINING OF OFFICIAL BOARDS

The development of an efficient, consecrated, and active Board of Stewards in every local church is of vital significance in the realization of the objectives set forth by the Conference Board of Lay Activities. We commend Mr. Morelock for his efficient and creative service in the training of official boards. We cannot hope to secure his services in the conduct of many institutes within the limits of our Conference, nevertheless, we feel strongly that this program of training should be expanded within the Conference. To this end we recommend:

(1) That the holding of institutes for stewards be continued and so expand-

ed as to reach every presiding elder's district within the Conference;

(2) That Boards of Stewards avail themselves of the services of well-qualified laymen within our own Conference in the conduct of institutes and study classes for stewards;

(3) That pastors be urged to discuss with Boards of Stewards important

phases of the lay program;

(4) That Morelock's A Steward in the Methodist Church be used as a basic text for this discussion and that every steward in the Conference be urged to read this helpful and valuable publication;

(5) That the organization of official boards include, with due allowance for variation, the following committees: Executive, Finance, Property and Grounds, Music, Social Welfare, Evangelism, Lay Speaking, Stewardship, Mis-

sionary, and Church Papers;

(6) That each charge of the Conference send the Chairman of the Board of Stewards, or some outstanding member of the official board, as a delegate to the "Conference for Chairmen of Boards of Stewards" to be held by our General Board at Lake Junaluska, July —, 1937.

LAYMAN'S DAY

We recommend that Layman's Day be observed in every charge of the Conference on the third Sunday in May, 1937, or as near thereto as practicable, and that "A Fellowship Church" be the subject for the discussion in the observance of Layman's Day in 1937.

CHRISTIAN ADVOCATE

There is a direct relation between the accomplishment of our objectives and the circulation of our General and Conference organs. We urge the promotion of the circulation of the Christian Advocate (Nashville), official organ of the General Board of Lay Activities. It is especially desirable that it be put into the homes of all the preachers. The North Carolina Christian Advocate is also our organ in this Conference and in the state. Considerable progress was made during the past year in securing 100% subscriptions from official boards. We especially commend the "introductory offer" of the Advocate to new subscribers and urge every layman, not at present a subscriber, to avail himself of this excellent opportunity to make of himself a more effective worker in his church. We stand solidly behind the circulation of this great paper and, therefore, recommend:

 That our goal for the new year be a copy of this paper in the home of every Methodist steward;

(2) That, likewise, our goal be a 100 per cent increase in each district in the number of official boards subscribing 100 per cent for this splendid paper.

(3) That the charge lay leader, or some one designated by him, act in co-operation with the Superintendent of Publicity of the Woman's Missionary Society (wherever such organization exists) to solicit subscriptions to The North Carolina Christian Advocate and that such solicitation continue until an earnest effort is made to place the Advocate in the home of every steward.

THE METHODIST ORPHANAGE

The Board of Lay Activities gives its unqualified endorsement and pledges its whole-hearted support to the Conference program for the Methodist Orphanage. The needs of the Orphanage are considerably in excess of what a fund of ten per cent of the pastors' salaries will supply.

We, therefore, urge our church schools and organized classes, wherever it is possible, to make monthly offerings for the support of the Orphanage. In the case of all other schools and classes we urge the giving of the fifth Sunday

offering.

We further recommend that all our churches and church schools make a

Thanksgiving offering for the benefit of the Orphanage.

We urgently request that no Board of Stewards of any church credit an Orphanage "special" upon its regular ten per cent acceptance of Conference askings for the Orphanage.

We nominate W. K. Greene as Associate Conference Lay Leader and F. S. Aldridge as Secretary and Treasurer. We further nominate the officers of the Conference Board of Lay Activities, together with B. W. O'Neal and A. M. Noble as the Executive Committee of the Board.

REPORT NO. 3—BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

The Methodist Church has set its face steadfastly against the use of alcohol and other habit-forming drugs. It is a cause of shame to Christian people to read in the daily press and periodical publications, reports of vastly increased revenue from the tax of alcohol, and the enormously greater profits accruing to those whose business it is to manufacture and sell this habit-forming drug. The well-organized, evidently profitable, attempt to create alcoholic addicts by brazenly attractive advertising in the periodical press and over the radio can have no

ultimate result other than the impoverishment and debauchery of the American people. The effect of this attempt to increase the consumption of alcoholic liquors, wines and beers is easily read in the record of highway accidents and seen on every hand. The deplorable conditions existing in those counties and in counties neighbor to those in which liquor was legalized, and the deplorable conditions existing in our neighboring states that made the similar mistake of trying to temporize with the evils of alcohol instead of using the force of the law against the alcoholic traffic, are evident to even a casual observer. The boldness of the liquor forces is shown by the fact that they seek to cover up the failure and evils of their local liquor stores by asking for state-wide relaxation of laws against alcohol under the guise of better "control" and on plea of revenue to be derived by taxing drunkenness.

We hold these truths to be evident:

(1) Every step toward relaxing the prohibition laws has resulted in an increased flow of alcohol.

Every promise of the advocates of more liquor has been broken, notably the promises to protect prohibition states from outside liquor and from advertis-

The same forces that now advocate state "control" were, in the main, the forces that put the disgraceful county stores on the statute books.

(4) The enormous sums spent for advertising indicate the hopes of profit to be derived from increased drunkenness among our people. These sums are not evidence of an intent to reduce or "control" the consumption of alcohol.

(5) The attempt to tie up the budget of a county or the state with a liquor tax is an attempt to entrench the vicious traffic by making it appear an indispen-

able source of public revenue.

We believe that the only rationally Christian methods of dealing with the drink evil are personal abstinence and legal prohibition. We enjoin our members to work for these methods and to refrain from accepting the profits of the traffic through such actions as accepting advertisements in newspapers or other properties they may own, renting property for use as a place of sale, accepting fees as attorneys or lobbyists from the beer-wine-liquor traffic, or selling or in any way aiding and abetting in the sale of alcohol. We urge all right-thinking people to do all in their power to fight the putting of either the state or the counties into the liquor business. We deeply deplore any attempt to balance the budget of either from the profits of increased drinking.

County liquor stores are bad and should be abolished; but if the state, without any stake in the revenue from such stores, has shown itself weak in dealing with the problem, how much weaker would the state be if it were to go into the business of selling alcohol for profit? The abuse of the word, "control," in the drive by the liquor forces to put North Carolina into the saloon-business does not conceal the fact that the liquor sponsors, no matter how many high-minded men they may put forward as nominal leaders of their cause, really desire to make the liquor business a part of the state budget. As Christian citizens we are opposed to using the blood money of alcohol to pay any part of our just dues to govern-

ment.

We reaffirm our approval of the stand which has been taken by leaders in our Conference in refusing to appoint to official positions in the local church men who are in any way connected with the sale of intoxicating liquors.

At the present time there are 297 children in the Orphanage while mothers' aid service is extended to 19 others. During the Conference year 358 children have received the services of the Orphanage. We often find ourselves wondering what would become of these children were it not for the Methodist Orphanage and how would our great church and Conference answer at the Judgment without heeding the cry of needy childhood and making adequate provision for their

training and support.

The Orphanage occupies a beautiful campus within the city of Raleigh and with our splendid investment in buildings and equipment, Methodism is indeed

making a home for these happy children.

The Orphanage school is a unit in the Raleigh system in quarters provided on the Orphanage campus. The work being done in this department is of an exceedingly high order. The Orphanage conducts its own Sunday school and gives special attention to the moral and spiritual training of the children, Practically all the children, above the age of 6, are members of our own Jenkins Memorial Church, which is adjacent to the Orphanage campus. The singing class has carried the message of the Orphanage to many a church and Sunday school through the years and has given to our people a first-hand glimpse of the high type of work that is being done.

During the year improvements to buildings and farm have been made con-

sistent with the limited financial resources available.

The calls upon the Orphanage far exceed its ability to render service and at the present time every available space is taken and conditions have been crowded. Realizing this, and in order to house properly the 300 children in residence, the Board of Trustees of the Orphanage voted unanimously for an effort to be made to call upon friends of the Conference and of the Orphanage to secure funds to erect two new buildings in order to relieve this congestion without any increase in the present population. Your committee heartily commends this to the attention of the Conference and of our churches and hope that every assistance

possible will be rendered to secure the necessary funds for this purpose.

The financial situation at our Orphanage is nothing short of distressing and the Superintendent and management and Board of Trustees have labored during recent years under a considerable burden to secure the necessary funds for the continuation of the work. The program has naturally been curtailed and there is no page of heroic devotion among any of our church agencies that will stand above that of the staff of workers at the Methodist Orphanage. At the present time it is necessary for the Orphanage to have \$76,000 annually in order to balance the budget and during the year 1935 the total amount received from the apportionment of the Conference to the Orphanage was \$28,533.57. There was received from specials during 1935 \$11,800.23. Through the kind beneficience of Mr. James B. Duke, the Orphanage received from the Duke Endowment during 1935 \$6,338.76, while \$16,340.45 was received as income from the Methodist Orphanage Endowment Fund. From the fifth Sunday offerings in a Confer-

ence year with approximately 600 Sunday schools there was received the small sum of \$1,394, while many of the Sunday schools in this number made no contribution at all. It is an outstanding fact that if the entire Conference apportionment to the Methodist Orphanage was paid in full there would be only 50% of the annual budget provided for.

It is readily seen how difficult it must be for the Orphanage to set up a program of work or to employ a staff of workers in the beginning of any year

in the face of such an indefinite and inadequate income.

Your committee, therefore, recommends and urges a special Thanksgiving offering from every church, Sunday school and organized class within the bounds of the Conference and that this amount be sent to the Orphanage as a special.

We likewise urge pastors and Sunday school Superintendents to take free will offerings in every church each fifth Sunday in the year and that this amount likewise be sent to the Orphanage as a special. We also urge all pastors to cooperate with the Superintendent and Board of Trustees in an effort to make

special contributions for the support of the institution.

It would mean a considerable help to the Orphanage if our people would emphasize the specials and send them to the Orphanage as such and not apply these amounts to their church apportionments. We urge our brethren to give careful consideration to this especially when the apportionment, if paid in full, would be far less than the amount necessary to operate the Orphanage. We renew our request, made last year, that the churches throughout the Conference raise the 10% Orphanage apportionment as early in the year as practicable. We appreciate the response that was made in regard to this at the beginning of the present Conference year.

There are many items of expense that the average person fails to realize and our Conference must not fail the management of the Orphanage or the large

family to whom we have promised support.

During the year the Orphanage has entered upon another field of necessary service without additional expense. Several of the larger boys and girls have been provided an opportunity for vocational training in several trades in the city of Raleigh. This enables them, when they go out from the Home, to become immediately self-supporting. We especially commend Superintendent Barnes for this forward step in the program of training. We most heartily recommend the re-election of Rev. A. S. Barnes as Superintendent of the Methodist Orphanage for the ensuing Conference year at the salary fixed by the Board of Directors.

We likewise recommend the re-election of Rev. C. K. Proctor as Superin-

tendent of the Masonic Orphanage at Oxford,

We realize that there is no more tender nor Christ-like service rendered by our great church than that of gathering upon its bosom these destitute and homeless children. We urge our people to carry this important matter in their hearts.

Your commission recommends that an amount not exceeding \$2,000 be available for Conference entertainment, and that the Conference Treasurer be directed to send to the Treasurer of the local board where the Conference is to be held, at least thirty days prior to the meeting of the Annual Conference, the sum of \$500.00 of the total (\$2,000), the same to be accounted for in due course, and that the remainder of the funds be accounted for in accordance with the action of this Conference in the year 1932. That the Conference Treasurer also be

directed to pay to the Conference Secretary \$1,400 to cover his salary, incidental expenses, and the printing of the Conference Journal; to pay to the Statistical Secretary \$200.00, and the Conference Treasurer \$600.00 for the expense of the Secretary for the Treasurer, these amounts to be paid out of the Conference funds before figuring any percentage.

The books of the Conference Treasurer were audited by A. M. Pullen and Company, certified accountants of Raleigh, N. C. The report of the audit is entered on the records of the commission.

We recommend the re-election of Mr. C. A. Dillon, of Raleigh, for Conference Treasurer, and that the Conference authorize the Commission on Budget

to elect a Treasurer whenever a vacancy occurs ad interim.

At the request of the Treasurer your commission recommends that the preachers be asked to make their remittances to the Treasurer by check; that they, instead of sending a number of small, individual checks in a remittance, either secure a cashier's check or deposit the individual checks and send their own to cover the remittance.

It is further recommended that the bond of the Conference Treasurer, to the amount of \$50,000, and of the Treasurer of each board, to be renewed in blanket form as required in previous years, the Treasurer of each board to pay its prorata share of the cost. The blanket bond is to be kept by the Secretary of the commission in the vault of the Treasurer of Duke University.

We wish to call attention to the fact that our collections this year, as shown by the report of the Conference Treasurer now before us, is \$10,000 less than it was last year. While giving due praise to charges which have met their apportionments in full, we regard it our duty to appeal to the presiding elders, to the preachers and to the official members of the charges to leave nothing undone in their urgings of the membership of our great church to prove their love for our master in their acceptances for the coming year.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON METHODIST CO-OPERATION

To the Annual Conferences of the three Methodisms in North Carolina, Greetings:
The Commission on Methodist Co-operation held its annual meeting in the office of the Editor of the North Carolina Christian Advocate, Greensboro, N. C., on Friday, October 2. Representatives were present from each of our Methodisms. As a result of our deliberations, the following message is presented for your consideration:

Since our last report the General Conferences of the Methodist Episcopal and the Methodist Protestant Churches have adopted, by overwhelming votes, the Plan of Union proposed by the Commissions on Union of the three Methodisms. It is now being acted upon by the annual Conferences of the two bodies whose General Conferences have passed it down to them. None of the annual Conferences of the Methodist Episcopal Church has opposed the adoption of the Plan of Union. On the contrary the vote has in every case been almost unanimous. As the Commission meets, twelve annual Conferences of the Methodist Protestant Church have voted on the Plan of Union. Nine have voted for it; three against it. But it is unquestioned that more than the necessary two-thirds majority will approve it in their sessions during October and November. Pending the holding of the General Conference, the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, has taken no official action; but the sentiment and attitude toward union is so unmistakably favorable that it is only a matter of the necessary lapse of time until the plan of union will have been adopted by all three churches, and we shall go on to the holding of the Uniting Conference. But this can apparently not be held before 1939.

"The King's business requireth haste," but not too much haste. We would caution our folk in each of the annual Conferences and in all the local churches not to be precipitate; but to prepare themselves for the ultimate union of our forces. This can best be done with each group carrying on its own work, developing and utilizing its own resources, spiritual and physical; but, at the same time encouraging and taking advantage of every possible opportunity for friendly contacts and co-operation. To this end we would suggest:

1. The holding of evening services together wherever practical, alternating, if possible, between church houses, the pastors taking turns in preaching; or making any other arrangements as to services as shall emphasize this sense of unity.

2. That wherever possible the ministers of the three groups assist each other in the holding of revival services. The Commission might assist in securing pastors for this exchange of evangelistic effort.

3. That the pastors of the three Methodisms take advantage of the Pastors' Summer Schools conducted by each group, attending the one nearest them, and

thereby becoming better acquainted with the personnel in the several Conferences. An invitation is extended by the Duke School of Religion and the officers of the Pastors' Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, held at Duke University, for the ministers of the other two Methodisms to attend and share in its benefits. The acceptance of the invitation is, of course, at the pleasure of each group. But the Commission commends it to the brethren as one means of attaining this sense of approaching oneness.

4. That we suggest again to the officers of the Annual Conference Councils of Religious Education, or similar bodies, the advantage of holding group meetings in which the three Methodisms shall be represented wherever possible, for the training of Christian workers, whether in Conference assemblies or in local church groups. If this does not seem advisable at this stage, then we would suggest that wherever one group is holding such schools or assemblies the others

be invited to attend and participate.

5. That we undertake again the holding of joint gatherings for mutual fellowship where the principles and programs, the historic background, the common heritage and task of Methodism may be emphasized. Two such meetings, one at Green Hill's House, the other at High Point College, were held

during last July with encouraging results.

6. The Commission on Methodist Co-operation created by the three branches of the Methodist Church in North Carolina is probably unique. To our knowledge nothing like it exists anywhere in America. It may well be that through its work the approach to union will be much more easily effected here than elsewhere. The success of the union movement will depend much on that approach. The Commission, therefore, asks the hearty support of each Conference, pastor and local church, to the end that its work, when and if union is consummated, may be the more effective in bringing about a real union of our forces in North Carolina; and set an example for the Conferences and churches of the uniting Methodisms in the other states.

REPORT OF THE JOINT COMMISSION ON WESLEY FOUNDATION OF COLLEGE PLACE AND CHAPEL HILL CHURCHES

The Commission has given careful attention to the work of our churches at Chapel Hill and College Place, Greensboro, having held two meetings during the year. The more than 1,300 Methodist students of the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, and of the Woman's College of the University of North Carolina at Greensboro, are our special concern. That the Methodist people of the state may know something of what is being done for the students at our state university we submit the following statement of facts as furnished by the pastors of these two churches:

CHAPEL HILL

We have 700 Methodist students at Chapel Hill. A new department in our church school has been organized, known as the Student Department, a part of the Young People's Division. The leaders, the officers and committees come directly from the student group. While this department is young and just beginning, it is touching some 75 students. The eleven o'clock worship service on Sunday morning has an attendance of approximately 250 students.

The Student Forum meeting on Sunday evening at 7 o'clock is a student organization planned and carried on by students. Programs for student forums are planned a month in advance by the Student Council. The plan for the month is to have a varied program each Sunday evening, followed by a social hour.

By the combined efforts of the church school, the morning worship and the Student Forum, the church at Chapel Hill is touching approximately 400 students weekly. Through the efforts of the pastor, two friends have given a new pipe organ which will enhance the worship services of the church in a very effective way.

By refinancing the parsonage property, the local congregation has been able to pay off \$12,000 of its indebtedness. This leaves a balance of \$5,000 due on the parsonage.

COLLEGE PLACE, GREENSBORO

Of the 1,785 students now enrolled in Woman's College of the University of North Carolina, more than 600 are Methodists. Eighty-four of the 100 counties of North Carolina are well represented. There are students from 18 other states and two from Cuba. More than one-third of the entire student body are Methodists. These students are organized into the Wesley Foundation, which has its headquarters at College Place Church and are under the direction of Miss Idalene Gulledge, student director, aided by the pastor of the church.

The Student Council, composed of 14 members, elected from the Foundation, meets for an hour each Monday afternoon to report the work done during the previous week and to prepare for the week's activities. The programs of the student group are many and varied. These students meet regularly each week at the church school hour, where a joint program of worship is participated in by both local young people and students, members of each group having a part on the program.

At 11 o'clock service these students, with a large number of others who cannot attend at the church school hour, join in the worship service. These hundreds of students are an inspiration, and at the same time afford a great opportunity for the pastor and church to render a service of genuine worth. An hour before the regular evening service, student and young people's hour is held, at which time splendid programs are given by these groups jointly.

In helping these choice young spirits we not only help them as individuals, but they also go back into the communities and churches from whence they come to do the service of the Master. These girls are also to be home-makers of tomorrow.

In order to carry on the work so well begun among our young people at Chapel Hill and College Place Church, Greensboro, after thorough discussion, the Joint Commission asks the two North Carolina Conferences for the following amounts:

REPORT OF THE RURAL WORK COMMISSION

Your Rural Work Commission made definite proposals last year for advancement in rural church work. We emphasize those ten recommendations for further use in the Conference.

We call attention to the new opportunity for constructive study classes in rural churches, under the direction of the Board of Missions. This board now offers a study course in rural church problems and methods. The text book is written by Rev. J. M. Ormond, and entitled, "By the Waters of Bethesda." Any pastor or mission study leader may teach this course with profit in any rural church, no matter how small. Report No. 2 of the General Commission on Rural Work, giving direct helps in rural methods will soon be released. This may be used with Professor Ormond's book in study classes.

The Board of Christian Education of our Conference is prepared to offer the following courses in rural churches:

"The Educational Work of the Small Church."

"The Small Church at Work With Children."

"The Life of Christ,"

"Worship in the Sunday School."

"The Christian's Religion: Its Meaning and Message."

These courses will be taught by members of our Conference staff so far as their time will permit, at negligible expense. Pastors and other leaders may qualify to teach these courses.

Realizing that our work might be improved in some instances by strategic re-grouping of rural churches, we recommend that a committee be appointed by the Bishop to investigate the possibilities of re-grouping rural churches in our Conference, and that this committee submit the information obtained to the cabinet before the next session of the Annual Conference. We further recommend that the chairman of the committee be authorized to organize a committee, with the co-operation of the presiding elders, in each district to assist in securing helpful information concerning the location and possible re-grouping of rural churches in pastoral charges.

House, of the University of North Carolina, in courageously taking the initiative, before the recent Duke-Carolina game, by publicly expressing condemnation of this evil, and by taking effective steps at that time to combat public drinking and disorderly conduct at this game.

DUNCAN AIA FUTRELL

By Walter Patten

To be aware that one has used his opportunities of life in service to God and to his fellowmen, and to have an inner assurance that such services have been acceptable to God, produces a satisfying joy in having lived. Such experience was the lot of Duncan Aja Futrell.

Orphaned at four years of age by the Confederacy, his mother battled with the stringent conditions of Brunswick County that the boy might secure an education as offered by the public school of Southport, N. C. The son of Hosea and Zilla Harvell Futrell, he was endowed with parental integrity and steadfastness of purpose. These native qualities held him to his task of education and to the call of God to proclaim the Gospel story of abundant life.

In 1884 he presented himself for admission into the North Carolina Conference, and for a period of more than forty years served the Methodist Church in the following charges: Onslow, Asheboro, Clinton, Lillington, Rockingham, Asbury, Cokesbury, Burgaw, Bladen, Roseboro, Bath, Hatteras, Pamlico, Newport, Ahoskie, Bethel, Stantonsburg, Currituck, Mattamuskeet, Craven, Swansboro, and Magnolia. This long ministry was fruitful in turning sinners to God and to righteousness, and productive of love and good will in the homes and lives of the people in the communities. Broken in health, he asked for superannuation in 1925, and thereafter made his home in Wilmington, N. C.

His home was established in marriage with Miss Mary Frances Daughtry, of Clinton, in 1888, the year of his being ordanied elder. Gentleness, mutual respect and understanding and daily recognition of God marked the home life. His children live to testify to his spirit of loving devotion and consecration to his Master.

For some years he fought a losing battle against a weakening body and surrendered the conflict December 14, 1935. These years of a pain-racked body were made as comfortable as possible by the loving attention of a devoted wife and thoughtful children. The widow, four sons—Egbert Aja, James Marvin, Herbert Daughtry, and Duncan Lacy—and daughter, Mary Blanche, survive, all of whom live at Wilmington, N. C.

The funeral rites were held at Trinity Methodist Church, Wilmington, December 16, with the following ministers officiating: Presiding Elder Rev. W. A. Cade, Rev. F. S. Love, Rev. H. L. Hendricks, Rev. J. H. Frizzelle, and Rev. Walter Patten. The interment was at Zion Methodist Church Cemetery at Town Creek, N. C., with Rev. J. C. Harmon participating.

"When on my day of life the night is falling, And in the winds from unsunned spaces blown, I hear far voices out of darkness calling My feet to paths unknown,

"Thou who hast made my hope of life so pleasant, Leave not its tenant when its walls decay; O Love Divine, O Helper ever present, Be Thou my strength and stay."

ROBERT ELIJAH PITTMAN By F. S. Love

Robert Elijah Pittman was born August 31, 1867, in Lenoir County, North Carolina, and died at Roxboro, N. C., on January 12, 1936. He was the son of Francis Marion Pittman and Louis Mewborn Pittman. His childhood and youth were spent in the open and invigorating atmosphere of his native county. Here, under the influence of a Christian home and the church, he came to a sturdy manhood. The early years of his mature life were spent in operating a steamboat on the inland waters of the state. Here he came to be known and loved as "Captain Bob." Here he heard the call of the Master and the sailor became a traveling ambassador for God.

Converted in 1880, he became at once an active member of the church, making such contribution as youth could. There is no record of when he was called to preach, but he joined the ranks of the itinerant ministry at Kinston, N. C., at the 1911 Conference. His first appointment was to Ocracoke where he served for two years. His ministry quickly justified the Conference in giving him place in its ministry. For the next four years he was the happy and successful pastor on the Craven Circuit, The remainder of his ministry was spent on the following charges: Mt. Olive Circuit, 1917-20; Mt. Tirzah Circuit, 1921; LaGrange Circuit, 1922-25; in 1926-27 he is again on the Mt. Olive Circuit; Fremont Circuit, 1928-29; Tar River, 1930-33; Brooksdale, 1934 to the final summons that came or the 12th of January, 1936. On that day a good and busy workman turned in the record and went unafraid into the presence of the Master whom he had served. It was the record of a workman that needed not to be ashamed. In the time of his ministry he had led 1,535 souls to Christ and into the church. Every interest of the church was given wise and devoted attention. His reports were the kind in which a preacher rejoices.

Brother Pittman was married to Miss Eugenia Coward, of Grifton, N. C., on December 11, 1890. This union was blessed with seven children, all of whom are active in the church. They are: Mrs. J. B. Frizzelle, Snow Hill; Miss Louie Delle, Durham; Mrs. Wyatt T. Dixon, Durham; Mrs. Alton T. Fields, Durham; Mrs. George Watts Fowler, Durham; Francis Marion, Kinston; Levi Mewborn, Washington, D. C. The character of the children is evidence of the home and the home is the answer to such children. These two servants of the church and the Lord made a great home. To it the children rejoiced to return. Here the stranger, the friend and the brother minister found, beautifully mingled, the elements of the abundant life. Each left this home with a memory that inspired. They had seen here the finest work of the Christian religion.

Words are futile when we attempt the appraisal of a great life. Such a man was Robert Elijah Pittman. He was great in simplicity, great in faith, great in love, and great in service. Quick to sense the needs of men, he was absolutely sure where to lead them and he knew the way. He lived in the great certainties. His was love learned in the school of Christ. His faith was born of knowledge to which he was ever ready to commit himself, his loved ones and his friends. He loved life and he lived it radiantly. His buoyant life was rich in an irrepressible humor but there was never a sting in his kindly repartee. I think he met death as a friend, welcoming it as a door opening into the more abundant life toward which our friend ever moved. Great success as a pastor, preacher and evangelist marked his

pastorates. Men loved him, trusted him and heard him gladly. The church prospered in his hands. His capacity for friendship was very unusual and his every contact added new friends to an ever enlarging list. Where he had been his return was a happy event. We miss him today. We shall miss him across the years. When we think of him, it will be with gratitude that he served with us.

Our brother's body rests in the beautiful Maplewood Cemetery in Durham. A host of devoted and sorrowing friends joined in the sacred service when his body was laid to rest. Two fellow ministers whom he greatly loved, H. B. Porter and H. C. Smith, conducted the services, At the end, R. E. Pittman had realized William Cullen Bryant's idea of the

well lived life, for he had

"So lived, that when the summons came to join The innumerable caravan, which moves To that mysterious realm, where each shall take His chamber in the silent halls of death, He went not, like the quarry-slave at night, Scourged to his dungeon, but, sustained and soothed By an unfaltering trust, approached the grave Like one who wraps the drapery of his couch About him, and lies down to pleasant dreams."

ROBERT HOUSTON BROOM By T. A. Sikes

Easter, 1936, dawned bright and beautiful. The sun shone in all its effulgent glory. The Easter lilies vied with the proud and resplendent orchids in their effort to speak to a world that the Lord was alive for evermore. In an humble home one block away from the church were two hearts that beat in grateful praise as they looked out upon a great world just bursting forth in the glory of its new attire of green grass and bursting flowers.

The church bell pealed forth, calling worshippers to the sunrise service. The preacher, with a holy desire to be present at the Sunday school to teach his class, and in order to reserve his strength so that he could tell a congregation at night of the glory and power of the resurrection of his Lord, said to his devoted companion, "go to church, and I will stay at home." She did. On returning home in about an hour, to be exact: 8 o'clock, she found the home in order, fires made and the man of God diessing for the day's duties and responsibilities. The good woman went about her work. In a few minutes she heard him calling, "Rosa." She hastened to his side, and gently laid him on the bed, and called a physician, but when he arrived the soul of Reverend Robert Houston Broom had taken its eternal flight, "and was not, for God took him." In a short while the word had passed from lip to lip that this man, who was beloved by everyone in Ayden, and wherever he had served, had gone to heaven, and there was a holy hush throughout the town. Strong men brushed the tears from their eyes and the good women sobbed of a broken heart. The noble woman, who had been his strong stay during the last seven years of his life, stood before him and broke away with uncontrollable grief. The children came with their hearts breaking at the thought of separation for a little while, but looked up with satisfaction to the time to meet again.

Brother Broom went, we believe, as he would liked to have gone—suddenly and on the day his beloved Lord burst the bars of death and snatched victory from the grave. He put his house in order in the days of his youth and there was not a day that he was not ready to go. He loved life, not for the sake of just living, but that he might serve his Master, and help some struggling soul to find life and immortality. He lived to bring peach sunshine, glory and hope to those in trouble and to bring peace and joy to their souls, and today as we mourn his going, hundreds of souls are in glory and many more on the way that he touched with his holy life and told them of a risen Lord with power to save to the uttermost all who believed on His name.

It would not be befitting for me to say that this man had no faults, but these, like the spots on the sun, were eclipsed by the radiant splendor

of a godly life.

Brother Broom was a good preacher. He preached the Gospel and cried out against unrighteousness, but possibly he was stronger as a pastor than as a preacher. As such he was dearly beloved in every charge he served. He went into the homes of the meek and lowest, as well as the homes of those more fortunate, and in every home he left the sweet influence of a godly life. He read God's word and prayed in the homes of his people.

As a father he was kind and thoughtful of his children. Out of his meager salary he managed to give all of them an academic training, thus preparing them for their life's work. He rejoiced at the success they were making, and especially that all of them were workers in the church of

God.

As a husband he was kind and considerate, devoted and loving. His first wife slipped away from him a few years ago. He said to the writer then, "O, it is so lonely without her. She was so good and our lives were so happy together." I have never seen two persons more devoted to each other than was he and the companion who walked with him during the evening shades of life. He was an ideal husband to both of the companions that God had given him.

As a friend he was loyal and helpful. His great heart went out in sympathy to any who were in trouble of any kind. During his last days he often spoke of many of his former parishioners, and of his comrades in the ministry, and expressed himself in terms of deepest affection con-

cerning their welfare.

Robert Houston Broom, son of Gassel Dallas and Mary Permelia Porter Broom, was born July 1, 1860, in Union County, North Carolina. At the age of fourteen years he gave his life to God and was ever true to the vows he took at the altar of the church. He was prepared for college in the Monroe High School. He entered old Trinity College in 1879 and took the four years' course in two years, graduating with honors with the class of 1881, being valedictorian of his class. He returned to college in the fall of 1882 in pursuit of his Master's degree, which he obtained that year. For eight years he taught school in Virginia, North and South Carolina.

On December 28, 1887, he was happily married to Miss Sue Council, of Bladen County, North Carolina. To them were born five children: Mary Porter, who died at eighteen months of age; Edith Gertrude; Sue Council, now Mrs. J. Edwards Allen, of Warrenton; Isabelle McAlister,

who lived to young womanhood, but died while Brother Broom was pastor at Hookerton; and Robert Houston, of Raleigh.

His first wife died September 1, 1921. He was married the second time to Miss Rosa Lee Harper, of Ayden, N. C., on December 27, 1928.

To the last union one daughter was born. She died in infancy.

This beloved comrade of ours was admitted on trial into the North Carolina Conference at the session in Greensboro, in 1889. He was ordained a deacon at the session of Conference held in Greenville, 1891, by Bishop Chas. B. Galloway, and elder at Wilmington in 1893 by Bishop W. W. Duncan.

God honored him by allowing him to preach in the active ministry for forty-four years and two and one-half years as a superannuate, which

relation he took at the Conference in Durham in 1933.

Brother Broom served the following charges: Richmond Circuit, two years; LaGrange Circuit, two years; Leasburg Circuit, four years; Mt. Tirzah Circuit, three years; Tar River Circuit, two years; Carthage Circuit, four years; Red Springs Circuit, two years; Littleton Station, one year; Warrenton District, two months; Elizabeth City District, one year; Washington Station, three years; Warrenton Circuit, four years; Morehead City, two years; Hookerton Circuit, two years; Roanoke Rapids, four years; Ayden, three years; Belhaven, one year; Southport, four years; superannuated in 1933.

He went to his eternal home on Easter Sunday morning, April 12, 1936, at 8:15. The last rites of love and respect were held from the Methodist Church, Ayden, North Carolina, where a great concourse of friends and relatives gathered, on Monday afternoon, April 13, by Rev. T. A. Sikes, assisted by Revs, T. M. Grant and L. C. Larkin. His body was taken to Washington, N. C., and laid to rest in the city cemetery

there, Rev. O. I. Hinson assisting in committing the body.

The following poetry was found in Brother Broom's Bible after his death, which reveals the trend of his mind, and experiences of his soul:

> "I met Him in the morning, When the day was at its best, And His presence came like sunrise, Like a glory within my breast. "All day long His presence lingered, All day long He stayed with me, And we sailed with perfect calmness, Over a very troubled sea. "Other ships were blown and battered, Other ships were sore distressed, But the winds that seemed to drive them, Brought to me a peace and rest. "Then I thought of other mornings, With a keen remorse of mind.

When I too had loosed the moorings, With His presence left behind.

"So I think I know the secret, Learned from many a troubled way, You must seek Him in the morning, If you want Him through the day."

R. FRANK TAYLOR

R. Frank Taylor, an honored and highly appreciated minister of the North Carolina Conference, was born in Lenoir County, North Carolina, June 13, 1862, and died at the Sanitorium in Rocky Mount, North Carolina, June 10, 1936. Had he lived three days longer he would have been exactly seventy-four years old at his death. His parents were Richard B. Taylor and Margaret Kornegay Taylor. His mother died three months after he was born and from that time he was largely in the care of his grandmother. Among the data received from the family is a story of a narrow escape from death when he was only six months old. The union soldiers, who were passing through the community looking for Southern soldiers, opened fire upon the home of his grandmother. He was lying in her lap when several rifle balls struck near the infant's head.

This prospective minister of the Gospel spent his childhood days on a farm in Lenoir County, and received such educational advantages as the country public schools and Kinston Collegiate Institute offered. He did not enjoy the privileges of a college and seminary training, but he came

to be a very successful minister.

About the time Mr. Taylor came to young manhood, he was converted and joined the Methodist Church, to whose ministry he was later called. At the age of twenty-two years he married Miss Ada Harrell, of Greene County, who, for thirty-seven years prior to her death, was his devoted companion. He later married Mrs. Julia Thompson Carter, of Fairmont, North Carolina. After ten years of companionship, Mrs. Taylor died. In 1931 he married Mrs. Lucy Hamilton, of Cloverdale, Virginia, who survives him and now lives at Aulander, North Carolina, where she and Mr. Taylor spent the last year of his active ministry and the several years of superannuation experience.

At the age of twenty-seven years Mr. Taylor was admitted on trial in the North Carolina Conference at its annual session at Greensboro, 1889, and was appointed to the Bethel Charge. At the 1891 Conference, held at Greenville, he was ordained deacon and received into full connection by Bishop C. B. Galloway. In 1893, at the Wilmington Conference,

he was ordained elder by Bishop W. W. Duncan.

During the forty-three years of his pastoral service, Brother Taylor received the following appointments: Bethel, 1889; Greenville, 1890-91; Fair Bluff, 1892-93; Brunswick Circuit, 1894; Spring Hope, 1895; Ocracoke and Portsmouth, 1896; Burlington Circuit, 1897-98; Yancey-ville, 1899-1900; Leasburg, 1901-02; Battleboro and Whitakers, 1903-05; Hookerton, 1906-07; Mt. Olive Circuit, 1908-09; Jenkins Memorial and Apex, 1910-13; Four Oaks Circuit, 1914; Rosemary, 1915; Epworth (Raleigh), 1916-17; Goldston, 1918; Duke, 1919; Fayetteville Circuit, 1920; Stedman, 1921-22; Roper, 1923-24; Vanceboro, 1925-26; Aulander, 1927; Chowan, 1928; Glendon, 1929-30; Aulander, 1931. In 1932 he superannuated.

In December, 1935, Mr. Taylor was appointed by the Bishop to the Ocracoke-Portsmouth Charge where he rendered faithful service for three or four months before he had to give it up on account of declining health. He soon had to go to the hospital at Rocky Mount for an operation from which he never recovered. The funeral was held at Rainbow

Church, Hookerton Circuit, Greene County, and was conducted by Rev-

erend T. McM. Grant.

By his consecrated Christian life in the Methodist ministry Brother Taylor rendered a faithful and effective service. He had a very exalted conception of his divine mission as a preacher of the Gospel. Being a Methodist preached was no hardship to him. He enjoyed the work to which he was assigned and always reflected honor upon the ministry by his upright life. Both his character and his speech were free from the strains of an unholy life. He thought that the conversion of sinners was the surest and most convincing evidence of his effectiveness. In his later years he looked with pride upon his record of three thousand additions to the church by profession of faith.

As a pastor, Brother Taylor was possessed of the ability to make friends and to influence the lives of those whom he visited, and it can be said of him that he was a successful shepherd of the flock. He was particularly interested in those who were in distress or pain, or in need

of consolation.

Another evidence of his effective ministerial service was the help he gave young men who were seeking the divine will in the choice of their life work. There were several persons who came under his ministry who felt his keen interest in their problem of choosing the ministry as a life's career.

The work and influence of this good minister have added much to the accumulating ministerial tradition of the years, and will be passed on down to succeeding generations to the honor and glory of the church and our God.

ROBERT JOHNSON LOUGH

Robert Johnson Lough, son of George A. Lough and Mary Elizabeth Lough, was born in Franklin, West Virginia, October 28, 1874. He died in Saint Vincent's Hospital, Norfolk, Virginia, within less than a week

after he was stricken while working in his garden.

He gave his heart to Christ and united with the church at the age of eleven years. Early in life he felt the call to preach and entered Randolph-Macon Academy to prepare for his high calling; but before he had fully finished his preparation, his father died and he gave up the call for a time and began teaching school to help support the family. In the meantime he was a faithful, loyal, and enthusiastic worker in the church.

In 1895 he was happily married to Miss Maude Kiser, who was always a sympathetic and helpful companion. She always encouraged him to enter the ministry, and was a great help to him in his work. To this union were born eleven children; one died in infancy, and the others are living useful Christian lives. One son, John S. Lough, has followed in his father's footsteps, and has entered the ministry, serving in the South

Georgia Conference.

After teaching school several years, Brother Lough accepted a position with the A. C. L. Railroad at Rocky Mount, N. C. It was here that the writer came to know him and to appreciate his worth, and used him in some of his churches. He was never happier than when he was in active service in the churches there and he never lost an opportunity to serve. It was here that he felt again the urgent call to preach and decided to

answer that call. Dr. N. H. D. Wilson was his presiding elder, his wise and understanding counselor, who helped him in his preparation and entrance into the Conference. He served Bath Charge one year and was admitted on trial into the North Carolina Conference in Raleigh, N. C., November 15, 1922. He was admitted into full connection and ordained deacon in Wilmington by Bishop Denny, 1924, and was ordained an elder in 1926 at Durham, by Bishop Mouzon.

In addition to serving Bath Circuit, Brother Lough served the following charges: Grifton, Hookerton, Person Street and Calvary, Carver's Creek, Milton and Currituck. He had served about a half year on the Currituck Charge, was doing fine work and having a splendid response

from his people there when he was called to come up higher.

He gave a life of loyal and devoted service to his church, and fourteen and a half years of faithful, fruitful ministry to his church and his Lord. He loved people, young and old, and commanded their love and respect; he enlisted their interest, activity, and enthusiasm for the churches he served. He was ever diligent as a true under-shepherd, searching out the lost sheep, to bring them into the fold of the Great Shepherd of their souls. He had what is known as "evangelistic passion" for the lost, born of his love for the Lord and his fellowman. He gave a good account of his all too brief ministry to his Commander and Chief. In his brief ministry he added to the churches he served more than four hundred and seventy members, an average of more than thirty-three annually.

He loved life and lived it joyously. The following lines express his

fervent desire:

"Yes, I would live longer some trophy to win, Some soul to lead back from the dark paths of sin; Some weak one to strengthen, some faint one to cheer, And heaven will be sweeter for laboring here."

While Brother Lough died in less than a week from the time he was stricken in the midst of abundant labors, yet he suffered severe pain for several years, the nature of which was never determined. Only his good wife knew, and she only in part, what he really suffered. He did not complain and the people he served never knew his suffering. He said to his faithful companion many times that he was ready to go whenever the summons should come. His attitude is expressed further by these lines:

"But—would I live longer? How can I decide
With Jesus in glory, still here to abide?
O Lord, leave not the decision to me,
Where best I can serve thee, Lord, there let me be."

Brother Lough looked well after every phase of the work of his churches and gave evidence of wise and consecrated leadership. He counted it his highest and holiest privilege to tell the old, wondrous story and proclaim the glad tidings of Christ's redeeming love. He had a warm heart, a sincere love for God and his fellowman, a great faith in and loyalty to his Lord.

He lived happily and died happily, and it can truly be said of him,

"Servant of God, well done!
Rest from thy loved employ:
The battle fought, the victory won;
Enter thy Master's joy!"

LELAND LEROY SMITH

Leland Leroy Smith, the son of Johnny Elizabeth and William Bruce Smith was born in Wayne County, North Carolina, near Seven Springs, September 24, 1889. His early education was obtained in Ayden Seminary of Ayden, N. C., an institution of the Free Will Baptist Church. Later he attended Atlantic Christian College, Wilson, N. C., and Trinity College, Durham, N. C.

At the age of eighteen he entered the ministry of the Free Will Baptist Church. In 1916 he withdrew from the ministry of this church and entered the ministry of the M. E. Church, South, as a member of the North Carolina Conference. During the time he was a member of our Conference, he served very acceptably and very efficiently the following appointments: Pelham, Mount Tirzah, Pinetops (which has been changed to McKendree), Bethel, Beaufort, Mt. Olive-Calypso, and LaGrange.

On February 23, 1916, he was married to Miss Pearl Harris, who survives him together with their four sons, Lyman Beecher, Henry Morri-

son, William Harris, and Leland Leroy.

On November 4, 1936, he died from a heart attack. The funeral service was held in the Methodist Church of Mt. Olive, N. C. T. M. Grant, Brother Smith's presiding elder, was in charge of the service. He was assisted by Rev. O. W. Dowd and Rev. E. R. Clegg. Brother Smith was buried in the cemetery at Mt. Olive, N. C.

The ministry of this good man was characterized by devotion to duty, friendliness of attitude toward men and a consciousness of working with God. These attributes of personality brought him marked spiritual achieve-

ments among the people with whom he worked.

His gifts of spirit gave him distinct success as a Christian diplomat. Many difficult and trying church situations were handled by him in such a masterly way that no bad memories were left and the cause of Christ promoted.

His ability to make friends was of uncommon character. His buoyant and cheerful nature attracted many people who became devoted and admiring friends when intimate association made them acquainted with the abiding greatness of his spirit. Men yearned to know Christ when they knew that Christ made him such a friend to men.

In his home Brother Smith gave evidence of his devotion to Christ and the Kingdom. His family had first consideration: he gave to his wife and children an affection that was throbbing with thoughtfulness, animated by an abiding faith and adorned with unselfish service. His home challenged the best within him, and he answered in such spontaneous happiness that he found in the domestic circle a ready medium for the expression of the soulful life.

It was a pleasure to know L. L. Smith. The world has been made better for his living among us for a few years. May God bless his bereaved wife and children.

JOHN COUNCIL WOOTEN

John Council Wooten was born November 14, 1868, in Speights Bridge Township near Tabernacle Church on the Snow Hill Circuit, Green County, North Carolina. He died in a hospital at Greenville, North Carolina, October 9, 1936, and was buried in Greenville where he had built a home for his family. He was the son of William Isler Wooten and Julia Louise (Speight) Wooten. He grew up in the Green County home. In early manhood he went to Georgia and engaged in business there. In 1894 he felt a clear call to the ministry, returned to North Carolina, was licensed to preach at Jerusalem Church, Snow Hill Circuit, by Reverend F. D. Swindell, and in the fall of the same year entered Trinity College. He was graduated from college in June, 1898, and went at once to Rocky Mount to preach during the summer.

At the Annual Conference in Elizabeth City, December, 1898, he was ordained deacon by Bishop O. P. Fitzgerald, and for the following year was assigned to South Rocky Mount and Marvin Chapel. At the Conference in Washington, December, 1899, he was transferred by Bishop E. R. Hendrix to the Pacific Conference. He was ordained elder in 1902 by Bishop W. W. Duncan at Oakland, California, where he was pastor from 1899 to 1904. He was stationed at Berkeley, 1904-05, and at Hollister, 1905-06. At the end of that year he was transferred to the Western North Carolina Conference and stationed at Central Church in Concord. In 1907 he came to Trinity College where he served as Professor of Biblical Literature until the winter of 1910, when he went to Grace Church, Wilmington, for the years 1910-12; then to First Church, Elizabeth City, 1912-13; and Edenton Street, Raleigh, 1913-15. Succeeding years he spent in the presiding eldership, and these were some of the most fruitful years of his life. He was four years each on the following districts: Durham, 1915-19; Raleigh, 1919-23; New Bern, 1923-27; Durham, 1927-31; Fayetteville, 1931-35. Failing health suggested lighter work for the wayworn traveler and he was given his last assignment, a delightful one it was for him, at Farmville.

While in California Mr. Wooten was married to Mary Leona Poage, who died in Durham in 1910. They had one child that died in infancy. He was married again to Lydia Allison Yates. They had two children, Alice Yates, born October 23, 1913; Julia Speight, born December 30,

1914. The three survive.

Our friend was a faithful Methodist preacher and leaves behind him an outstanding record of service and achievement, notably in education and in ecclesiastical statesmanship. He understood the church as few of us have, its problems, its needs, and the ways and means to meet these needs. He was maturer than the average when he entered college. He promptly became an influential member of the student community and remained throughout his life a force for good to the college and its causes. His formal education did not stop with college graduation but was continued in the Pacific Theological Seminary at Berkeley, California, during his pastorate at nearby Oakland; and from that Seminary, in 1903, he received the degree of Bachelor of Divinity. He taught in Trinity College, He was made trustee of the college in 1915 and became a member of the executive committee in 1916, and served in both capacities until his death. He was a member of the board that set up the university on the foundation of the Duke indenture, signed by James B. Duke, December 11, 1924, and creating the university. No words can express fully the value of his services through these great and formative years in the transition from the Trinity College, that he had known and loved, into the expanded university organization, that we know and admire today.

Both through his father and mother he came of well-established North Carolina families. And through all his life he bore traces of this inheritance. He was a man of robust character with a stern sense of duty and courage to follow his dictates in spite of whatever hardships might be involved. He served for twenty years as presiding elder—as he once said in a moment of pessimism and with considerable exaggeration: long enough to lose him every friend he had. He knew the Conference, he knew the preachers, and he knew how to fit men to situations. As a presiding elder he rendered a great service to the church and the Kingdom of God. Here, as everywhere else, he did his duty and did not flinch under the strain of misunderstanding or harsh criticism. He was a knightly and intrepid soldier of the cross whose sword remained unbroken though his heart must sometimes break.

He inherited a sort of fineness of fibre that made up an essential part of his spiritual constitution and finely related him to life. He was held with tender and beautiful ties to the family into which he was born and the family which he himself established. He had a rare gift for friendship and bound his friends to him with hoops of steel. They were his friends to the end. And as he lay in death at the Farmville parsonage and church he was attended by a host of these who could be present; and his spirit, as it passed "from out our bourne of time and place," was compassed about with a cloud of witnesses both among the living and the dead.

MRS. J. A. DAILEY By H. E. Myers

The life of Matilda Howland Dailey began in a parsonage home of this Conference and by marriage to one of its members continued in vital connection with both the parsonage and the church to the end of her career. Born August 18, 1873, to the Reverend Edward Howland and Adalaide Matilda Futrell Howland, she was, on April 19, 1899, wed to the Reverend J. A. Dailey, the vows being spoken before the Reverend J. H. Shore.

The guidance and inspiration of her devout parents and her close association with the work of the church brought her in early life to assume a vital share in the Christian cause. To the best ideals of noble living she gave herself in faithful and loving devotion to the end of her days.

The achievements of the life of a true Christian are difficult to measure. Perhaps one of the outstanding contributions of this good woman's life was wrought out in her home and family. For more than a third of a century she, with her husband, answered the call of this Conference to labor in places judged most needful of their services. Where they have gone there was set up in the parsonage an attractive, well-managed, hospitable, Christian home. Three children were born to them: James, who now lives in Washington, D. C.; Elsie, who died at the age of ten; Alma, who is now Mrs. Edwin H. Forbes, and, with her husband, resides

with the father. These children came to know the power and inspiration in the life of a godly mother. Illness and death came; and by faith she rose to the demands of the hour. Further need came in prolonged illness of the youngest child, and the mother took the added duties of nurse and teacher. It was perhaps this unreserved giving of herself that so spent her powers that, when illness came upon her, she was found a more ready prey. She exemplified the virtues of a Christian wife, mother, and home-maker, giving cheerfully with no thought of the cost.

The burdens involved in making a true home, an inspiring mother, competent guide and teacher, tireless nurse, and keeping hope in bereavement, demanded a faith that took hold of the eternal verities. Hers was such a faith. From it there came poise and conquest. This achievement of excellence in her own life set a challenging standard of high attainment for those with whom she came in contact, that they too seek life at its

best and work it out in terms of the Master's ideal.

The large demands and splendid labors in her home did not consume all the thought and energies of this servant of the Master. She lived the part of a Christian neighbor; found time for charity; watched the sick; aided in the guidance of youth; inculcated and exemplified a high type of social ideal that raised community morality to the Christian level.

Her physical powers were overborne by disease April 14, 1936. Funeral services were held in Front Street Church, in Burlington, by the pastor, the Reverend Hiram K. King, and the writer. Yet the end of mortality does not measure such a life as was hers. One judges, as he thinks of this fine record of a life fully spent in unbroken loyalty to the high ideals of our common faith, that the Master of all good workmen receives such a one with His: "Well done, good and faithful servant"; and that the Gates Eternal swing ajar to admit the clean, pure soul for assignment to further blessed service in the Vineyard on high.

MRS. H. E. TRIPP By R. F. Munns

Funeral services for Mrs. H. E. Tripp, of Clinton, were held from the Methodist Church, June 21, 1936. The services were in charge of Rev. R. F. Munns, her pastor, assisted by Rev. T. H. King, pastor of

the Baptist Church.

Mrs. Tripp died Saturday night, June 20, 1936, at about 9:30 o'clock. She had reached the ripe old age of 83. Mrs. Tripp was twice married. Her husband was David John Bell, of Morehead City, N. C. She later became the wife of Rev. H. E. Tripp, of the North Carolina Conference, who preceded her to the grave by 12 years. She was born at Pollocksville, Jones County, North Carolina. Surviving her are two sisters, Mrs. F. H. Foy, of Pollocksville, and Mrs. B. B. Barry, of Sanford; also one daughter, Mrs. Claude Holliday, of Clinton, with whom she lived since the death of her husband.

Mrs. Tripp was a faithful and loyal member of the Clinton Methodist Church. She was loyal to her pastor and co-operated with him in the whole program of the church. Mrs. Tripp was quiet and unassuming. Her nature was not to be showy, but true and loyal, and steadfast. She possessed in a rare degree the quality of goodness. Clinton has lost a truly good woman. Those who came in contact with her are better for having touched her

life. We shall miss her greatly.

The North Carolina Conference was set off from the Virginia Conference in May, 1836, and in 1850, and again in 1876, North Carolina territory in the South Carolina Conference was transferred to this Conference. In 1890 North Carolina territory in the Holston Conference and in the Virginia Conference, except this beyond the Chowan River, was transferred to the North Carolina Conference, and the Conference was divided into the North Carolina and Western North Carolina Conferences. In 1894 the remaining North Carolina territory in the Virginia Conference was transferred to the North Carolina Conference.


