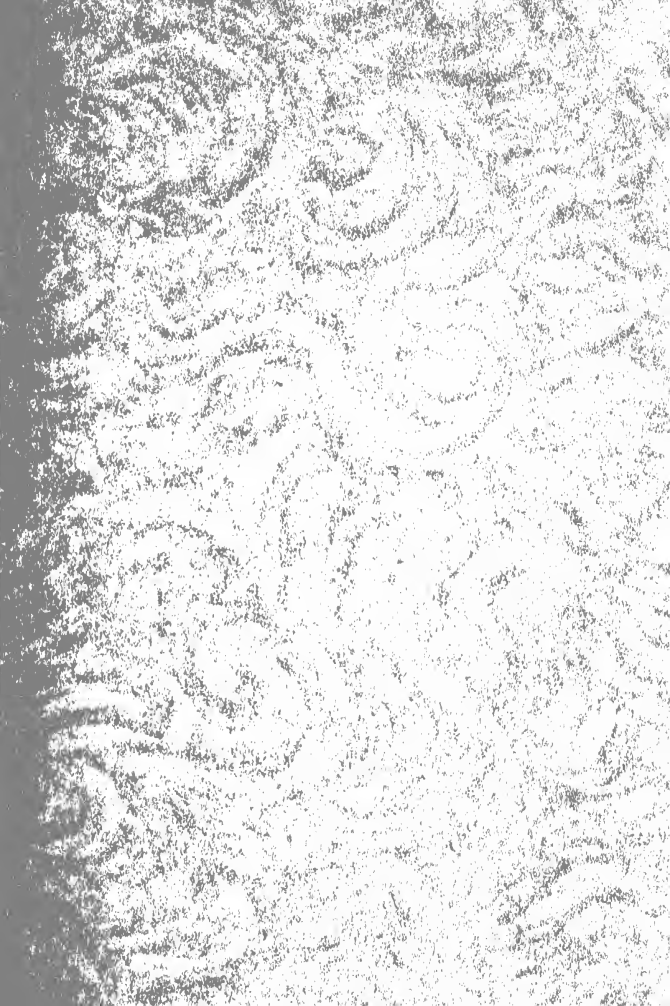

OBJECTIVES

Evangelism is the first and supreme objective of the North Carolina Conference for the coming year. The present responsibility of our Conference is the Crusade for Christ.

That the members of our Conference might achieve this objective your committee urges:

1. Full co-operation with the Board of Evangelism by following their program outlined at this Conference.

2. We urge all of our leaders in Christian education to promote the Crusade objectives by emphasizing evangelism in children's meetings, youth groups, and adult activities. Church school enrollment and attendance should be increased in every church in our Conference.

3. The mission study book for this year, *Christ and our Country*, by Bishop Arthur Moore, should be studied in carefully planned mission study classes in each church of our Conference.

4. The Woman's Society of Christian Service in every church should become an agency of evangelism.

5. We call upon every person in our churches to practice a complete stewardship of life and time and talents and money.

6. We urge our ministers as agents of our church publications to seek to have the *North Carolina Christian Advocate* placed in all of our homes.

7. We urge that the Crusade objective of a new world order be given a continuous emphasis in our preaching, forum groups, and in our prayers.

8. We are determined that a new spiritual life shall be the experience of every minister and member of our Conference during this year. Believing that our objective can be achieved only through the surrender of self to the call of God and the dedication of all our resources to the daily proclamation of the redeeming power of Christ for individuals and society.

Question 50: "Where are the preachers stationed for the ensuing year?" was called.



Rules of Order and Procedure for the North Carolina Annual Conference of the Methodist Church

I. RULES OF ORDER

1. Robert's Rules or Order shall apply to any situation not covered by these rules.
2. No member who has the floor may be interrupted except for a breach of order, a misrepresentation, to direct the attention of the Conference to the fact that the time has arrived for a special order, or to raise a very urgent question of high privilege.
3. No member shall speak a second time on the same question if any member who has not spoken desires the floor, nor more than twice on the same subject under the same motion, no longer than ten minutes unless his time shall be extended by the Conference, except as provided in Rule 4.
4. When the report of a committee is under consideration and when all have spoken who desire to do so, or when (and after) the previous question has been ordered, the Chairman and/or duly authorized member or members presenting the committee's report (and the minority report if there be one) shall be entitled to speak before the vote is taken.
5. A member claiming the floor at any time for what he believes is a very urgent question of high privilege, shall be allowed to indicate briefly the nature of the question, and if it be adjudged by the chair to be such, he may proceed at his pleasure, or until the chairman judges he has exhausted his privilege.
6. Voting shall be a show of hands unless otherwise ordered by the Conference. A "yea" and "nay" vote, if taken, shall be a signed ballot, which result will be published in the Conference Journal. A count vote may be ordered on call of any member supported by one-fifth of the members present and voting, in which case the delegates shall rise from their seats and stand while they are counted.

II. ORGANIZATION

1. The Secretary: The Secretary of the Annual Conference shall be elected annually by the Conference, at its first session; and on nominations arising from the floor.
2. Assistant Secretaries: The Secretary shall nominate his assistants and the Conference shall elect.
3. Statisticians: There shall be a Conference Statistician and an Assistant Statistician both of whom shall be elected annually by the Conference on nomination of the Conference Secretary. The Conference Statistician shall use the form found on pages 95 and 96 of the 1942 Conference Journal in making his report to the Conference.
4. The Conference Stenographer: The Conference Secretary shall employ the Conference Stenographer.
5. Compensation: The Commission on World Service and Finance shall determine, subject to the approval of the Conference, the compensation given the above officers for their services and also the method and amount for meeting expenses of said officers. The Conference Treasurer shall pay these amounts.
6. Boards, Commissions, and Committees: The Bishop and his Cabinet shall determine the size of and nominate the members of all Boards, Commissions, and Committees authorized by the General Conference, the Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference, and this Annual Conference, except in those cases in which the Discipline directs otherwise. The recommendations and nominations shall be subject to the approval of the Conference.

7. The Conference Board of Trustees: The Conference Board of Trustees shall be required to meet at least once a year other than the regular meeting at the session of the Annual Conference.
8. Board Treasurers: All Board Treasurers shall be required to file financial statements, annually, with the reports of their respective Boards. These financial statements shall be published in the Conference Journal.
9. Program Committee: There shall be a Program Committee of the Conference consisting of the resident Bishop, the Conference Secretary, the District Superintendent of the District in which the session of the Conference is held, the pastor of the host Church, and the Conference Lay Leader. This committee shall determine the compensation and expense for invited speakers; and this shall be paid from the Conference Expense Fund.
10. Committee on Conference Objectives: There shall be a Conference Quadrennial Committee on Conference Objectives. See Paragraph 651—Question 46—1944 Discipline.
11. Entertainment Committee: There shall be a Conference Entertainment Committee, composed of three ministers and two laymen. This Committee shall be elected at the First session of the Conference following the General Conference, and shall serve for the quadrennium. This Committee shall receive invitations and determine the place and method of entertaining the Conference Sessions. The Committee is requested to determine the place of holding the next Conference not later than April 1, if possible.
12. Committee on Memoirs: The Conference Secretary and the District Superintendents shall constitute the Committee on Memoirs. The members of this Committee shall be charged with the responsibility of providing for all the details of the Memorial Service. The Conference Secretary shall be the Chairman of this Committee.
13. Committee on Daily Minutes: A Committee of three members shall be elected each year to examine the daily minutes of the sessions of the Conference and report daily to the Conference.
14. Courtesies and Resolutions: There shall be constituted a Committee on Courtesies and Resolutions, annually, at the first session of the Conference.
15. Committee on Appeals: There shall be appointed, quadrennially, a Committee on Appeals, composed of at least five members, whose duties shall be to hear appeals from the decisions of the several District Boards of Church Location and Building, or any other questions that may properly come before them.
16. American Bible Society: All matters regarding the relation of the Conference to the American Bible Society and its work shall be referred to the Board of Education.

III. REPORTS AND RESOLUTIONS

1. All reports and resolutions presented to the Conference shall be written (type-written if possible) in triplicate. Two copies shall be in the hands of the Conference Secretary before the report or resolution shall be read to the Conference for consideration.
2. Any amendment offered to any paper and all motions of more than a single sentence must be in writing and given to the Conference Secretary.
3. Any resolution involving the expenditure of Conference funds shall be presented to (or the approval shall be secured of) the Commission on World Service and Finance. The same rule shall apply for resolutions seeking consent to solicit funds in the several congregations for Conference Schools or institutions; provided that the pastor must be made aware of amounts solicited and secured.

IV. LAY DELEGATES TO THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE

1. Lay delegates, regular and reserve, from the pastoral charges to the Annual Conference shall be selected by the Quarterly Conference at least forty-five days prior to the session of the Annual Conference.
2. The District Superintendent shall complete the list of lay delegates to the Conference, from his district, at least forty-five days before the Annual Conference session and shall immediately transmit the completed list, in duplicate, to the Conference Secretary.
3. Substitutions for lay delegates to the Annual Conference must be made to the Conference Secretary, in written form, through the District Superintendent of each District.

V. PASTORS' REPORTS TO THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE AND STATISTICS

1. Each pastor shall complete table I of his annual report to Conference and transmit the same to the Conference Statistician at least two weeks prior to the opening of Conference.
2. Table II shall be completed and turned in at the time of registration, the first day of Conference.
3. Each table of the report shall be filled out by individual churches with totals for the charge.
4. Table II shall be made out in even dollars only.
5. Tables I and II shall be printed in the Conference Journal only by charges.
6. A third table of individual church reports shall be compiled by the Statisticians from the pastor's reports. This table shall be printed in the Conference Journal.

VI. THE CONFERENCE JOURNAL

1. Editor: The Conference Secretary shall be charged with the responsibility of editing and making contracts for publication of the Conference Journal, in keeping with the regulations of the General Conference and of the Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference. The Editor shall have full authority to condense reports, memoirs, and other papers when necessary.
2. One complimentary copy of the Conference Journal shall be sent each of the following: The Conference Claimants, the Educational Institutions, the General Boards, the Publishing House, the Lay Members of the Conference, the Lay members of the Conference Boards. Ten copies shall be sent to each pastor without charge.

VII. DISTRICTS

1. The number of Districts shall be seven.
2. A District Conference shall be held annually in each District.
3. Each pastoral charge shall elect annually two lay delegates to the District Conference. These shall be in addition to those named by the Discipline as ex officio members.
4. The District and Associate District Lay Leaders shall be elected annually by the Annual Conference on Nomination of the District Superintendents and the Conference Lay Leader.
5. The District Superintendent of each District shall be required to furnish to the Bishop, The Conference Treasurer, and the Conference Statistician, as early in the year as possible, an official copy of the apportionments to the charges for World Service and Conference Benevolences and the amounts accepted by the Charges, also the amounts approved by the charges for the several items of ministerial support. The figures furnished to the Conference Statistician shall be used by him in making up his report to the Conference.

Two of these official copies are to be sent to the Secretary of the Commission on World Service and Finance.

6. Each District Superintendent, as early in the year as possible, shall furnish the Bishop, the Conference Treasurer, and the Conference Statistician with a schedule of the salaries of pastors as set by the Quarterly Conferences. The figures furnished by the District Superintendent to the Conference Statistician shall be used by him in making up his report to the Conference.
7. We call attention of the District Superintendents to Paragraph 432 (1) 1944 Discipline and state that we believe that a reasonable time for such consultation, before the appointments are to be read, could not be construed to be less than twenty-four hours.

VIII. AMENDMENTS

1. These Rules of Order and Procedure may be amended by a two-thirds vote on the next day after a proposed amendment has been presented in writing; provided, the rule fixing the number of Districts may be amended by a majority vote; provided further, a change in the number of districts may not be made later than the second morning of the Annual Conference Session.

IX. WHEN THE RULES BECOME EFFECTIVE

1. These Rules of Order and Procedure of the North Carolina Annual Conference shall become effective immediately upon passage by the vote of the majority of the Conference.

1. That the annual salary of each of the seven District Superintendents shall be set at \$5,000, including expenses attendant to their office.

2. That 6% of a sum equal to the amount estimated for the then current Conference year for the salary of the Pastor and assistant pastor, if any, of each and every charge in the Conference, be apportioned to each charge, said sum to be remitted to the Conference Treasurer, who shall administer it according to the financial plan as stated in said Par. 788.

We recommend that distribution of these district apportionments be made to the several charges by the District Superintendents.

5. **Orphanage:** We recommend the apportionment to each charge of the same amount as the year 1943-44.

6. **Sustentation Fund:** We recommend the apportionment to each charge of the same amount as for the year 1943-44.

7. **Methodist College Advance—5% Fund—**We approve the Methodist College Advance as recommended by the Board of Education in its report No. 1 and we recommend the apportionment of \$18,000, as contained in item 3 (B) on the same basis as the sustentation fund, less 10% on an individual charge basis.

8. **Board of Conference Claimants.** We include the request of said Board per their report, for a total sum equal to 12½% of the salaries of pastors and clerical assistants. We direct the Conference Treasurer to remit 1/25 portion of the proceeds to the Board of Pensions of the Methodist Church of the Missouri Corporation "for the divided annuity fund."

9. We approve the plans of the Board of Hospitals and Homes to provide homes and care for the aged.

Part III

1. Reference is made to a leaflet entitled "A Suggestion about World Service Acceptances," and which has been given wide circulation in the conference. The Commission seeks to set up a Par or a standard for Charge acceptance of World Service askings based on the idea that charges paying greater salaries to pastors should pay to World Service an increasing percentage of the salary. Basic Par is here in after included and may be varied upward or downward when financial conditions change. Par is not the askings for the charge. We hope that it will be accepted as a "floor" for World Service acceptance. Certainly we should put no ceiling on giving and we hold the belief that no charge will reduce acceptance as a result of this new procedure.

Your commission will construe the approval of this report as acceptance of the principle of "PAR."

The following table is arrived at by starting with a minimum base of \$225. or 15% for \$1500 salary and stepping up 1% for each \$100 addition to salary, i.e. \$2000-20%; \$3000-30%; \$3600-36%; \$4500-45%; \$6000-60%; for greater amount follow the same formula.

REPORT NO 1—BOARD OF MISSIONS AND CHURCH EXTENSION

At the Annual Conference of 1941 in Durham what is known as the "Sustentation Fund" was adopted as the method of raising money with which to supplement the salaries of pastors serving mission charges in the Conference. At the same time a "Minimum Salary" scale was adopted as follows:

Unmarried men	\$1,200.00
Married men (with no children)	1,350.00
Married men with children	1,500.00

This plan has worked well, and the board has been able to meet the minimum salary in each case, and in special cases to go beyond the minimum.

It occurs now that the board will be able to increase the minimum salary if the Conference so desires. Therefore acting upon a suggestion from the Commission of Town and Country Work, after some discussion the board recommends that the minimum salaries be stepped up \$200.00 in each category. That would make the salary scale as follows:

Unmarried men	\$1,400.00
Married men (with no children)	1,550.00
Married men with children	1,700.00

This would apply only to men giving full time service and not to student or part time workers.

REPORT NO. 2—BOARD OF MISSIONS AND CHURCH EXTENSION

During the past year the financial phase of the Crusade for Christ has received major emphasis throughout the church. This is as it should be. It has been an inspiration to see the fine response given to this worthy cause. It has stimulated missionary giving in a great way throughout Methodism. However, with that phase of the program largely behind us, the church is now turning its attention specifically to the evangelistic part of this great program. No church has a finer program or a greater challenge in world redemption and rehabilitation than does our Methodism. All too long we have been satisfied to raise budgets and carry out excellent programs, but we have not been as aggressive in reaching the unreached and redeeming the lost as our responsibility would demand. It is the hope of the Board of Missions and Church Extension that the coming year will witness a great ingathering of souls throughout the bounds of our Conference. We realize that methods will vary in this matter and we commend every proper method to achieve the desired end. We especially recommend the visitation method of evangelism as set forth and promoted by Dr. Guy Black, and used so successfully in some of the districts last year. Our efforts should begin with a deepening of the spiritual life of all our ministers and laymen, but it should not end there. While there remains one person unredeemed and out of the church our task is not completed. If we follow our Master in this matter we will go to the most unlikely places and find His lost sheep. Truly this is our missionary responsibility.

It is noteworthy that where city missionary societies have been organized in the larger cities to promote the interests of the church marked progress is in evidence. There are several cities of ten thousand or more inhabitants in the bounds of our Conference where there is only one Methodist church, while other denominations are organizing new congregations and gaining new members. While we rejoice with them in their growth we are anxious that our Methodism shall experience a larger growth and more rapid development. We believe that one way to do this is for churches to be organized and new congregations built. One of the objectives of the year of evangelism is the organization of at least ten new churches. We urge this important matter be given the consideration it deserves by our district superintendents, pastors and laymen. We are happy to know that several new congregations have just recently been organized.

Along with the building of new churches comes the call for the enlistment of many of our young people to give themselves in dedication to God for a life of Christian service.

We appreciate and commend the work of Rev. Leon Russell, Conference Missionary Secretary, and of the several District Missionary Secretaries. Their combined efforts have borne good fruit in the cause of missions, and we bespeak for them the continued cooperation of all our pastors and laymen.

Again this year we are fortunate to have our Missions study book written by Bishop Arthur J. Moore. Bishop Moore is intensely concerned about this subject, and knows first hand the needs of the fields and the opportunities that belong to us. We urge the widest possible use of this book. It is our hope that the pastors will order more copies this year than ever, and organize schools of missions in every church before the end of the spring. This will be a great stimulus to the real spirit of the year of evangelism.

Due to the fine success with which the Sustentation Fund has met, the Board has been able to meet the minimum salary scale in each case, and we are recommending to this Conference that the scale be increased \$200.

We recommend the election of J. M. Ormond and F. S. Love to succeed themselves as members of the Board of Managers of the North Carolina Pastors' School.

We recommend the re-election of Rev. Leon Russell as Conference Missionary Secretary.

REPORT NO. 1—BOARD OF EDUCATION

Methodist College Advance

The 1944 Annual Conference instructed the Bishops and the Boards of Education of the two Conferences in North Carolina to lay the cause of Christian higher education upon the minds, hearts, and consciences of all our people, and to conduct a financial campaign throughout the state under the direction and guidance of the Bishops at the earliest possible time to be agreed upon by the Bishops and the Boards of Education of the two Conferences. Acting upon this mandate the Board of Education of the North Carolina Conference cooperated with the Board of Education of the Western North Carolina Conference and the two Bishops in setting up the General Committee on Promotion of the Methodist College Advance. This committee met a number of times during the year, and employed a group of competent, impartial educational experts to make an exhaustive survey of the needs of the Methodist institutions of higher education in North Carolina. A full report of the work of this committee has been made to the Board of Education with recommendations regarding the type of campaign the Methodist College Advance is to be and the methods by which it can be conducted successfully. The following recommendations from the General Committee on Promotion have been received by your Board and approved and are now recommended to the Conference for adoption:

1. That a campaign for the amount of \$2,075,000, that is, \$830,000 from the North Carolina Conference and \$1,245,000 from the Western North Carolina Conference, be carried through according to the schedule agreed upon in the Durham meeting of February 6, 1945, but leaving each Conference free to adapt the schedule to local conditions.

2. That pledges or contributions be payable December 1, 1945 through May 1, 1948, with the understanding that the general solicitation be not undertaken before September 1, 1946.

3. That goals suggested and accepted by district and churches be based upon the total amount (\$2,075,000) recommended by the Survey Committee, but with the following understandings:

(a) The funds raised in the campaign be devoted first to paying in full the recommendations of \$1,175,000 for buildings and improvements and then to payment of endowments; provided that High Point College may apply its proportion entirely to endowment until its first \$300,000 shall have been raised.

(b) Until the total amount of endowments has been raised, each Annual Conference raise over and above its present appropriations to these colleges through its regular channels—by percentage based upon such of its regular expenditures as it may fix—an amount equal to five per cent of the \$900,000 asked for endowments (to wit, the sum of \$27,000 from the Western North Carolina Conference and \$18,000 from the North Carolina Conference)—this five per cent not to apply to the principal of the endowments.

(c) As the principal sum is raised, the \$900,000 upon which this five per cent is based would automatically be reduced.

(d) Whenever a church has paid its full quota to the \$2,075,000 fund, its contribution to the five per cent endowment fund under these resolutions would cease.

4. That an annual College Advance Day be observed on a date fixed by the Board of Education in each Conference in all churches with more emphasis than we have placed upon it in the past and with adequate preparation by the churches and by the colleges—with special educational offering to be applied to the goals set in this campaign, including item 3 (b) above.

5. That a full-time executive secretary be employed by each Conference for the College Advance.

6. That each district consider the advisability of organizing the district campaign on the county basis, county or charge goals to be fixed by a committee consisting of the District Superintendent, the Executive Secretary of the College

Advance for the Conference, and at least one minister and one layman appointed by the District Superintendent; that the district goals should be fixed on the basis of the Crusade quotas; provided that non-Methodist may be added to the county committees as desirable and that an effort be made to obtain gifts from any friends of education regardless of denominational affiliation.

REPORT NO. 2—BOARD OF EDUCATION

Educational Institutions

Louisburg College: This institution reports that it has been able to improve the condition of the property and increase the salaries of its teachers. Several small donations have been made to the College during the year. The enrollment is much larger this year. There is a small balance on the indebtedness which the officials hope to pay within a few weeks. This College continues to render a great service to the people of North Carolina.

Greensboro College: For the second successive year Greensboro College reports a capacity enrollment. North Carolina furnishes 90.24 per cent of the student body. One third of the graduating class of 1945 majored in religion. Approximately forty who have graduated since 1938 are now in full-time religious work. We are glad to report that Greensboro College is doing an excellent work in the name of the Methodist Church.

High Point College: The total enrollment for the year ending June 1, 1945, was 454. There are now enrolled 466. Of this number 80 are veterans. The valuation of property and equipment is \$860,337.00. The remaining indebtedness is covered by cash and pledges. The report from this college states that those associated with the institution are most hopeful for the future.

Duke University: For the year ending June 30, 1945 the official reports show an enrollment of 4,153 students for the academic year 1944-45 and 1,450 for the summer school of 1944. There are 511 officers and teachers on the staff. The value of the endowment is over \$47,000,000 and the value of plant and equipment is over \$31,000,000. For several years Duke University rendered service in the war effort. In the future it expects to render a greater service in the cause of peace and human progress.

We recommend for the year 1945-46:

1. That College Advance Day be the third Sunday in September, 1946, and that an offering be taken on that day for our College Advance.

2. In compliance with Paragraph 1379 of the 1944 Discipline, the Board of Education of the North Carolina Conference and the Western North Carolina Conference do hereby request the creation of an inter-conference commission on student religious work to be called the Wesley Foundation Commission. The members of the Commission from the Western North Carolina Conference shall be: F. M. Brown, W. A. Stanbury, Claude H. Moser, with Carl H. King, ex-officio. The members from the North Carolina Conference shall be: M. T. Plyler, J. W. Cell, C. S. Hubbard, with J. G. Phillips, ex-officio.

REPORT NO. 3—BOARD OF EDUCATION

Resolution Concerning Race Relations Day

Paine College at Augusta, Georgia, represents the historic efforts of the former Methodist Episcopal Church, South, in helping to provide leaders for the Negro people. Throughout its long history it has served this purpose in a most interesting and constructive way. It is continuing to do this under the difficult conditions prevailing at the present time, serving not only as a training center but also as a laboratory of better relations between the white and colored people.

The work at Paine College is related to the Methodist Church through the Board of Missions and Church Extension. It is also listed as one of the institutions by the General Board of Education of the Methodist Church to receive funds secured through the observance of Race Relations Day. By agreement with this Board, Paine College is to cultivate the North Carolina Conference and, if the Conference approves, receive the offerings raised on this day.

NOW, Therefore, Be It Resolved by the Board of Education of the North Carolina Conference that we urge the pastors of this Conference to observe Race Relations Day, February tenth next, and wherever possible take a voluntary offering for Negro Work; and, further, that the Conference Treasurer in reporting these offerings to the Treasurer of the General Board of Education at Nashville ask that they be directed to the work at Paine College.

REPORT NO. 4—BOARD OF EDUCATION Local Church Section

We appreciate the leadership of our Conference Staff during the year just closed: Rev. J. G. Phillips, Executive Secretary and Director of Youth Work; Rev. L. C. Vereen, Associate Director of Youth Work and Camp Director; Miss Billy Beth Beam, Director of Children's Work; and Mrs. L. C. Vereen, Office Manager and Secretary. We regret the loss of the service of Mrs. Vereen, who has resigned.

A summary of the work of Christian Education in the Conference during the past year indicates gratifying progress in a number of areas.

1. Church School enrollment has increased during the year 5,214, or 6.2%. The average Church School attendance has increased 5,031, or 11.8%.
2. 392 Vacation Church Schools were held, an increase of 57.
3. Three youth assemblies for youth 15-23 years of age were held at Louisburg College with a total enrollment of 788. Six young men dedicated their lives to the ministry, 47 young people volunteered for full-time religious work, and 12 made a profession of faith, with a desire to unite with the church.

Three Intermediate Camps were held. A total of 556 intermediates, ages 12-14, were enrolled. 33 boys and girls made a profession of faith and united with their home churches.

All assemblies for youth had a total enrollment of 1344, (including workers with youth), an increase of 604.

4. The youth of the Conference have become greatly interested in camping. They are bringing pressure upon the Board of Education for a Christian camping area in East Carolina to be operated by the Board.

5. We had a Youth Caravan team in the Conference, which visited seven different churches and communities and made a significant contribution to the local church program. The number of Youth Activities Weeks held increased greatly.

6. In the field of Adult Work 39 Bible Conferences and one Workers' Assembly were held.

7. Ground work has been laid for a revival of leadership education to help meet the great need for more trained leaders.

We recommend the following emphases for the year 1945-46:

1. That the Crusade for Christ be given first place in our work, and that we cooperate with the Board of Evangelism in the program of winning people to Christ.

2. That the local church Boards of Education be active and assume their responsibility for the Crusade for Christ, that they study their task and seek to lead all workers to study the task, plan their work, and improve the quality of the work done.

3. That the goal for the net increase in church school enrollment be 11% for each of the next three years, and that we maintain an average attendance equal to 75% of the active enrollment.
4. That at least one Vacation Church School be held in each pastoral charge.
5. We urge all pastors and church school superintendents to encourage the Youth Fellowship.
6. That during the period of demobilization special emphasis be given to Young Adult Work.
7. That Church School Rally Day be observed in all churches and that the goal of the total offerings be \$3,000, this amount to be used as requested for our training work and extension program.
8. That at least three large leadership schools be held in each District and at least one one-teacher school be held in every Charge.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF HOSPITALS AND HOMES

Section One—The Methodist Orphanage

The Methodist Orphanage is a credit to the North Carolina Conference and to the Methodist Church. Under skillful guidance of the Board of Trustees and the consecrated management of the Reverend A. S. Barnes, approximately three hundred fatherless children are receiving from the Methodist Church excellent physical, material, intellectual and spiritual benefits. No essential phase of child care is being neglected.

Your Board of Hospitals and Homes makes the following recommendations:

1. That the Reverend A. S. Barnes continue his relation as Superintendent at an annual salary of \$4,000, having been duly elected by the Board of Trustees.
2. That the apportionment to each pastoral charge for the support of the Orphanage for the year 1945-46 be an amount equivalent to the amount assessed for the year 1944-45.
3. That each fifth Sunday be observed as Orphanage Sunday for the purpose of keeping the Methodist Orphanage before the minds of our people, and that an offering be made in each church on fifth Sundays such offering to be applied on the regular Orphanage apportionment.
4. That the Board of Trustees of the Methodist Orphanage be permitted and urged to put a more liberal and less literal interpretation upon the word "destitute" as it appears in the by-laws of the orphanage. As now interpreted, this word is made to apply only in the case of those who are financially destitute. Our feeling is that with an increase in the number of homes broken by domestic tensions there has arisen a type of moral destitution which must have consideration in the selection of deserving cases for admission to the Orphanage.
5. That this Conference elect the following members of the Board of Trustees of the Methodist Orphanage, whose nominations are offered by the said Board of Trustees: Term expiring 1947, P. D. Snipes, term expiring 1951, W. C. Chadwick, J. C. Braswell, Dr. R. L. Flowers, D. L. Cozart, Josephus Daniels, Robert W. Bradshaw, Mrs. Alma W. Edgerton, and Mrs. John C. Wooten.

Section Two—The Golden Cross

Receipts for the Golden Cross for the year 1944-45 show a decided increase over receipts for the previous Conference year. While a portion of this increase can be accounted for in the improved economic conditions prevailing throughout the Conference, we believe that largely the increase is a result of the thorough program of cultivation which was sponsored by this Board through its Executive Secretary.

We, therefore, recommend:

1. That a program of cultivation, directed by the Executive Secretary of this Board, be continued. In this connection we bespeak the complete cooperation of the District Superintendents, the Pastors and all Directors of Golden Cross.
2. That all Pastors and Directors of Golden Cross in the local church make generally available information regarding the use of Golden Cross funds in providing hospital care for needy cases.
3. That Mother's Day be designated in the North Carolina Annual Conference as Golden Cross Day, on which day an offering shall be made for support of the Golden Cross.
4. That F. S. Aldridge be confirmed as Conference Director of Golden Cross.

Section Three—Retirement Homes

After a year of exploratory work conducted jointly by this Board and its Executive Secretary, and with counsel from Dr. Karl Meister, Executive Secretary of the General Board of Hospital and Homes, your Board of Hospitals and Homes recommends:

1. That the North Carolina Annual Conference proceed in its program to inaugurate a system of retirement homes. We suggest that the ultimate project include a community of comfortable cottages for occupancy by retired couples and a central dormitory, with necessary provision for dining hall, nursing care, etc. We recommend that the first step shall be the securing of suitable and adequate land for the total project, and the erection of a number of cottages. It is the will of this Board that preference in occupancy shall be given retired ministers of this Annual Conference and their wives.

2. That this Conference authorize the incorporation of a Board of Retirement Homes, such Board to be composed of the District Superintendents as ex-officio members; of one minister and one layman for each district and of seven members from the Conference at large, the elective members to be nominated by the Cabinet of this Conference.

Section Four—Organization

We recommend, further:

1. That the Cabinet of this Conference nominate a clerical member of the Conference to membership on the Board of Hospitals and Homes in place of the Executive Secretary and that the Executive Secretary of this Board shall be an ex-officio member of the Board.

2. That the Executive Secretary of the Board of Hospitals and Homes shall provide reports of progress to the supporting agencies at least annually, and that he stand ready to furnish necessary information when such is desired.

3. That Carlos P. Womack be confirmed as Treasurer of the Board of Hospitals and Homes, such office to be subject to the Conference regulations concerning treasurers of boards.

4. This budget shall be prorated as follows: Salary of the Executive Secretary, \$3000; house allowance for Executive Secretary, \$600; travel and promotional expense, \$1200.

5. That the Reverend W. V. McRae be re-appointed Executive Secretary of the Board of Hospital and Homes.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TEMPERANCE

WHEREAS, the use of intoxicating liquors is admitted universally to be hurtful, both to the persons who use the same and to society generally;

WHEREAS the legalization of beer throughout North Carolina and the establishment of liquor stores in 26 counties in our State have increased drinking, drunkenness and all of the other evils that accompany the liquor traffic, and,

WHEREAS the Methodist Church always has been and still is opposed to the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors and opposed to the legalization of the nefarious business;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED: By the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Church, assembled in Goldsboro, North Carolina, on this 10th day of November, 1945, as follows:

1. That we are chagrined by the fact that the 26 Counties in North Carolina, in which liquor stores are being operated, are all within the confines of our Conference.

2. That we reaffirm our endorsement of the Allied Church League that has been organized by the Churches of North Carolina for the purpose of combating the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors; that we recommend to the 1945 Session of our Annual Conference that \$3,000.00 be appropriated to aid in supporting the work of the Allied Church League; and that all Pastors and other Church Leaders and Church Members throughout our Conference give full cooperation and support to the program and work of the Allied Church League.

3. That we appeal to the citizens of our State to nominate and elect as Members of our General Assembly persons, who will fearlessly and efficiently work in behalf of legislation prohibiting the manufacture and sale of liquor; and that Judges, Solicitors, Sheriffs and other law enforcement officers be elected, who will enforce honestly and efficiently all laws against the manufacture and sale of beer, wine and whiskey.

4. That we urge the General Assembly of 1947 to enact statutes to prohibit in North Carolina the manufacture, transportation and sale of beer, wine, whiskey and all other intoxicating liquors; and, if the General Assembly is unwilling to outlaw the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors, we urge the General Assembly at least to give the people of our State the privilege of voting in a State-wide Referendum for or against the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors.

5. That in order to aid in the development of sentiment against the liquor traffic, we urge that the instruction in our public schools and in our Church Schools relative to the harmful effects of alcohol be made as effective as possible, and that our pastors preach often in behalf of total abstinence, that each year the subject of temperance be allotted a place in the program of our Annual Conference, and that each year the subject of temperance be allotted an adequate place in the program of the annual meeting of each District Conference.

6. That we beseech all Pastors and other Church Officers that they do not recommend, nor approve, for official position in any phase of Church Life, any person, who drinks alcoholic beverages, advertises it, manufactures it, sells it, advocates its sale, or in any other way seeks to promote the liquor traffic.

THE REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE BOARD OF EVANGELISM

It is the belief of your Board of Evangelism that only a mighty outpouring of God's spirit upon His Church and a revitalized Christian ministry can save our church and our country. We are called upon to live in an awful moment of history—the atomic age—an age when civilization is doomed to destruction unless it comes under the redeeming power of Jesus Christ. The greatest need of Methodism in our Country is a revival of the Christian Religion. One of the most horrible wars in History has left our Country torn and bleeding, torn by strife and embittered by revenge. Just as England was saved from a bloody revolution by the preaching of John Wesley and his co-workers, so America and the world may be saved and healed now. We believe that the Crusade for Christ was born of God. It seems providential that the evangelistic phase of the Crusade is being launched at this opportune time.

Your Board of Evangelism fully recognizes that if the Year of Evangelism is to be successful, something must happen to our Christian experience as ministers and lay-members. Only as our religious experience is deepened will we have

the divine compulsion to share it. The power and motive of this Crusade will necessarily come by a renewal of our own Christian experience. This experience can come to us only through long vigils of prayer, by exposing our lives to the wholehearted power of Jesus Christ. The strangely warm heart is our great need.

If the year of Evangelism is to accomplish great spiritual results we must have great preachings. Our preaching needs a new urgency in it. We must preach for verdicts. We must present our case. We must seek a verdict and we must ask for immediate execution of the verdict. We are not in the pulpit merely to inform the mind or to disturb the emotions. The ultimate job of preaching is to move the will, to set it in another course. Yes, we are there to bring the wills of men into tune with the will of God.

Your Conference Board of Evangelism presents the following recommendations with the hope and prayer that they will receive the hearty endorsement of our Conference:

I. We wholeheartedly endorse and accept the "Program of Evangelism for 1946," which has been prayerfully and carefully prepared by the General Board of Evangelism, together with the assistance of other able and consecrated leaders. It is our conviction that we should follow as nearly as possible the total program and complete schedule as given to us by the General Board. We make further recommendations which are not specifically stated in the total program.

II. That each District prepare a ten-year study of its record in Evangelism by churches.

III. That the Board of Evangelism cooperate with the Conference Board of Education in promoting courses in Evangelism in all leadership schools, institutes, and the summer assemblies; that the boards promote jointly "Youth Crusade Week" and conduct prayer clinics for youth.

IV. That a Committee on Visitation Evangelism for the Conference, composed of the following be appointed: Reverends F. S. Love, M. C. Dunn, W. L. Clegg, S. J. Starnes, J. H. Lanning, I. S. Richmond, L. C. Larkin, V. E. Queen, J. H. Overton, Jr., H. A. Chester, T. J. Whitehead, A. P. Brantley, J. G. Phillips, R. G. Dawson, C. F. Heath, M. W. Maness.

V. That a Committee on Public Evangelism composed of the following be appointed: Reverends R. E. Brown, H. B. Porter, E. C. Crawford, C. D. Barclift, J. J. Boone, A. L. Thompson, L. A. Tilley, D. E. Earnhardt, Fred W. Paschall, John C. Glenn, S. A. Maxwell, B. D. Critcher, and W. A. Cade.

VI. We recommend that a school of Visitation Evangelism be held in each district for Ministers and laymen and that a vital program of home visitation Evangelism be promoted.

VII. That we accept the following specific goals for our Conference:

1. Confession of Faith 11,500
2. By Certificates 7,500
3. New Churches 10
4. Abandoned Churches reclaimed 10
5. Life Service Volunteers 35
6. Daily Devotions in Every Home

VIII. That the Reverend John C. Glenn be elected Conference Secretary of Evangelism to serve without salary.

IX. Your Board has requested an appropriation of \$500 to cover the necessary expenses in conducting the work assigned to it.

X. That we wholeheartedly endorse and support the New Life Movement which is being directed by Dr. Albert E. Day; and that we encourage our people to take the "New Life Magazine" and urge our pastors to distribute the evangelistic leaflets prepared by our General Board.

REPORT I—COMMITTEE ON WORLD PEACE

It is clear that the cessation of active warfare descended upon a world unprepared for the astounding climax. Especially in the Orient was this true. The world is like a ship driven and battered in a hurricane of typhonic dimensions, wallowing now in the still heaving billows whose force is far from spent. Between widening rifts in the blanketing clouds gleams of light are breaking through.

Out of sight of land and far from port, upon what power may the anxious mariners call for rescue and repair? As wise men they will not look for a magic power to allay the sea, or a magic wind to drive the ship to heaven. They will understand that recovery must be a long and painful and baffling undertaking. The search for undergirding principles and for methods of elastic rather than of unyielding exactions must be accepted as the moral imperative of the hour.

The bottom-rock foundation upon which alone the structure of peace for all men may be erected is faith in God and belief in men. "There must be a brotherhood of men, devoid of jealousies, greed, and political intrigue." Here the church holds the premiership among all the agencies of peace. She must proclaim the authority of God over all nations, the capacity of all peoples for rebirth into spiritual relationships, and the responsibility of the dominant nations to employ their resources for the emancipation of the human spirit.

It goes without saying that the first pre-requisite for the performance of this urgent mission is freedom to speak, freedom to print, freedom to circulate, and freedom to communicate across and within the boundaries of all the nations of the earth. "Our nation, in its position of dominance in world economic affairs, might effectively insist upon a factual presentation of the news of all nations, with freedom of communication at rates which would impose no tariff discriminations. This established, let the church then take the lead in an exchange of ministers and laymen with like groups from nations concerning whose dependability we might entertain apprehensions, to the end that a common ground of understanding might be found.

Moreover, let the church recommend a similar course to educators, university men, college men and to professional, business and labor organizations. This aim honestly avowed and enthusiastically pursued would gradually abate and ultimately remove those manifestations of fear and distrust which we so positively deprecate and oppose; as for example, the maintenance of armaments, conscription in the time of peace, and the employment of the rapidly unweaving

forces of nature to the end of enslavement and destruction instead of to the end of freedom and development.

One world government, with God over all, and the passion of redemption as our guiding hope will avert world catastrophe. Only world brotherhood based upon this faith will save civilization from the annihilation which science, left to its natural predilections, will bring upon the human race.

REPORT NO. 2—COMMITTEE ON WORLD PEACE

In 1941 through the cooperation of the Selective Service Board and representatives of various churches Civilian Public Service Camps were established for young men of military age who were conscientious objectors to military service. These young men were assigned to work of national importance under civilian direction. Some have served in base camps, while others have been given special assignments to hospitals, scientific laboratories to carry on experiments, and to other worthy projects. Many of these men have rendered valuable service to humanity. They have received no pay for their services. Neither have their families received financial aid from the government. Instead, Civilian Public Service men are expected to pay for their own maintenance, which amounts to thirty dollars per month if they are in a base camp, or five dollars per month if they are on a special project. Most of the Methodist men who have been granted conscientious objector's status have been unable to pay, nor have their families been able to pay this amount. Therefore, the Methodist Church, in accordance with paragraph 2010 and 2017 of the 1944 Discipline, has supported these members by providing funds for their maintenance. The Conference Committee on World Peace through special offerings made at Annual Conferences and through gifts made by individuals has contributed more than \$3000 to this cause. To meet the expense of the four Methodist men who belong to churches in our Conference and now serving in Civilian Public Service Camps the Committee needs \$600 additional funds during 1945.

The Committee on World Peace, therefore, earnestly requests the president of our Conference to authorize at an appropriate time a free-will offering from which it hopes to derive \$200. Moreover, it urges all ministers and laymen who are sympathetic to this cause to make a contribution through the secretary of the Committee during this session of the Conference or as soon thereafter as possible in order that this obligation may be met by the end of this calendar year.

The Committee, furthermore, urges the proper authorities of our nation to devise some plan whereby all men given conscientious objector's status may be discharged as quickly as possible.

REPORT OF THE METHODIST BOARD OF PUBLICATION

This corporation is the property of both the North Carolina and the Western North Carolina Conferences. Its main business is the publication of the NORTH CAROLINA CHRISTIAN ADVOCATE. That paper has a circulation of about 13,000, and this number should be greatly increased and if the Methodist people of North Carolina were sufficiently interested, it would be done.

The assets of the corporation consist of a building on West Gaston Street, Greensboro, North Carolina, and the land upon which it is situate, together with machinery, furniture and equipment and an Endowment Fund. The land and building about 18 years old originally cost about \$92,000.00. The building is in excellent physical condition. The machinery is old, and will soon have to be replaced or additional machinery will have to be purchased.

The Endowment Fund now totals \$42,724.11. We have been trying for several years to raise an endowment of \$100,000.00 and this should be speedily done.

In addition to publishing the Advocate, the corporation does a job printing business on the side in order to make the enterprise as nearly self-supporting as possible. We would appreciate support for this end of the business from Methodist ministers and laymen.

This year has been hard upon all printing businesses. Material has been very high and hard to get. The cost of having printing done has also increased. The expense of operating the corporation without counting depreciation has exceeded the income by \$2200.72. We hope that next year will show an improvement.

The present editors have resigned, effective at the end of their respective Conference years. Dr. A. W. Plyler has been an editor of the Advocate for 24 years, and Dr. M. T. Plyler has been editor for 18 years. Before Dr. M. T. Plyler became editor, he has been a member of this Board for many years and before that he had been a member of the Board which published the Raleigh Christian Advocate. He did effective work in consolidating the North Carolina Christian Advocate and the Raleigh Christian Advocate, thus establishing one paper for both Conferences. These two ministers have done much for North Carolina Methodism and the North Carolina Christian Advocate under their leadership has been recognized as one of the best papers in the Advocate family. We think both Conferences should show proper recognition of this service.

The Board elected Dr. H. C. Sprinkle, Jr., as editor of the Advocate. Brother Sprinkle is a member of the Western North Carolina Conference, and we respectfully request Bishop Purcell to appoint him to that position at the 1945 session of that Conference. We believe we have a most excellent man in Dr. Sprinkle and bespeak for him the cooperation of all North Carolina Methodists and especially the ministry of our Church.

We make the following recommendations:

1. That this Board request the two Conferences to continue the quota of 5% of the pastor's salary for last year for the Advocate Endowment, and that they request that this Endowment Fund be collected early in the year.

2. That the quota of new subscribers continue, as for the past three years; One subscriber for every fifty members of each Church.

3. That this Board arrange to magnify the importance of the North Carolina Christian Advocate as an agency in promoting every interest of our Church and urge that fullest use be made of the Church Paper in our North Carolina Methodism.

We feel that these recommendations are of great importance and we believe that the Conference should heartily observe them.

The term of office of Dr. H. C. Smith, representing the North Carolina Conference and Thos. C. Hoyle, representing the Western North Carolina Conference expired with out meeting on the 4th of October and the corporation nominated these persons to succeed themselves. We respectfully request the North Carolina Conference to elect Dr. H. C. Smith, and the Western North Carolina Conference to elect Thos. C. Hoyle members of this Board for a term of five years each.

The officers for the coming years are: President, Dr. A. J. Hobbs; Vice-President, N. L. Eure; Secretary, Thos. C. Hoyle.

REPORT OF THE WESLEY FOUNDATION COMMISSION TO THE NORTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE

For the first time, each of the three Wesley Foundation organizations sponsored by this Commission has the services of a full time Director. This has been one chief goal in the efforts of the Commission. The attainment of this goal is a real cause for rejoicing. Your Wesley Foundation Commission wishes to thank all whose cooperation and generosity has made this possible.

The funds which the two Annual Conferences in North Carolina have invested in this work with the Methodist Students have been sufficient to encourage the General Board of Education to make substantial investment in the work at Greensboro, Chapel Hill and Raleigh. Without the help of the General Board we would still not be able to employ full time Directors.

At College Place, Greensboro, Miss Louise Panigot continues to lead in the activities of the work for Methodist Students in the Woman's College of U. N. C. At Chapel Hill Mr. Roy Everett, graduate of Randolph Macon and Duke Divinity, is the new Director. He is a Methodist minister and has made a good beginning in the work at the Hill. At Fairmont, Raleigh, Mr. John Hamm is the new Director. He is a young North Carolina Methodist minister and a graduate of Duke Divinity School. These two men Directors have a splendid opportunity for service in ministering to many young veterans returning from the battle fronts of the world.

The usual activities of the Wesley Foundation units have been described in former reports and need not be repeated. Those investing their interest and substances in this student work may be assured that a strong and successful program is being promoted at Greensboro, Chapel Hill, and Raleigh.

At the Wesley Foundation Commission meeting on December 12, 1944, the Commission voted to recommend that the Wesley Foundation Commission be organized for the quadrennium in keeping with paragraph No. 1379 of the 1944 Discipline of the Methodist Church. It is therefore expected that the Boards of Education of the two Annual Conferences will nominate persons who, upon election by the Conferences, will serve for the remainder of the quadrennium as the members of the Wesley Foundation Commission. The financial statement and certificate of audit of the Treasurer is submitted with this report.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON TOWN AND COUNTRY WORK

I

During the year the Commission has sponsored two projects.

1. A small beginning has been made in research. This has taken two directions: (a) A general study of the facts about town and country churches relative to evangelism, stewardship, and church school work as revealed by the Conference Journals of the past several years. Some progress has been made on this study and a fuller report should be available by next Conference. (b) A specific study in one particular rural area of the Conference. This is being undertaken in the Farmville Trading area and surrounding territory. A full report will be available later.

2. A Retreat for Town and Country ministers was held at Seven Springs, August 6-8. This Retreat brought together many of the pastors interested in the

welfare of town and country life. The discussions resulted in a brief statement of beliefs and a number of recommendations. Some of these were modified and adopted by the Commission.

II

1. We believe that the growth of the spiritual life has first claim upon both ministers and laymen.
2. We believe it is imperative that we re-evaluate the entirety of our work in the light of spiritual insights quickened and deepened by fresh revelations from the living Lord.
3. We believe the family-sized, family-owned farm to be the farm system best suited to the development of a Christian rural culture.
4. We believe a ministry dedicated to the rural field for life to be both the need and the hope of the country church.
5. We believe there is urgent need in our Conference for more rural charges with fewer churches and longer pastorates.
6. We believe the supreme and guiding aim of the country church must be the salvation of souls and the growth of a Christian rural culture.

III

1. We urge the development of a new strategy of church administration which will secure closer cooperation between town and country in the interest of reaching all people with the Gospel.
2. We plan to cooperate with the Board of Education in holding a workshop on Rural Church Schools to the end that our smaller churches may enrich their educational work.
3. We plan to sponsor, in cooperation with the Board of Evangelism, a workshop in Rural Evangelism.
4. We expect to hold a spiritual life retreat for ministers in a rural setting.
5. We are cooperating with Dr. J. M. Ormond, of the Duke Divinity School, and Dr. C. W. Lokey, of the Section of Home Missions of the Board of Missions and Church Extension in an experimental approach to more adequate pastoral service to small rural churches through agricultural pastors.
6. We plan to investigate the possibility of helping an appropriate tenant farmer family achieve owner status as an expression of our faith in family owned and operated farms.
7. We give our hearty support to all the experimental projects in the rural areas of our Conference.
8. We request that renewed emphasis be given the welfare of town and country churches in the North Carolina Pastors' School.
9. We request our Executive Committee to investigate the possibility of securing a part time or full time Conference Secretary of Town and Country Work.
10. We appreciate the recommendation of the Conference Board of Missions and Church Extension that the minimum salary schedule be increased by \$200 in each category. We request this Board to investigate the possibility of raising the minimum salary at least another \$100 in each category and to make a report regarding this matter to the next session of the Annual Conference.

Of this number 227 were reached by our student program. 110 were active participants in the program, 148 attended Sunday School during the year and attendance at morning worship in the church on Sundays was excellent. 497 students visited the Student Center during the period from the opening of the fall quarter until Commencement Day in June, making a total of 3,557 visits. 169 of these made only one visit to the Center.

\$107.63 was raised by the students by voluntary pledges to the Wesley Foundation budget. \$30.00 was contributed to the Sunday school of Jarvis Memorial Church; \$10.00 to Methodist Student Fellowship Fund; \$10.00 to Power Reserve Fund; \$10.00 to Japanese-American Hostel Fund; \$5.00 to World Student Service Fund; \$30.00 self-denial offering to Methodist Overseas Relief; \$24.00 toward clothing girl at Methodist Orphanage.

Five issues of the student paper—*The Wesleyj*—were published during the year. 300 copies of *Power*, supplied by Jarvis Memorial Church, were used by the students in daily devotions; 75 subscriptions to *Motive*. The Methodist student group cooperated with the other campus religious organizations in a campaign for clothing for war refugees. Christmas gifts were sent to a Japanese-American Relocation Center, scrap books were sent through the Greenville Service League to service men in hospitals; two students served as leaders in Girl Scout organization.

The most outstanding feature of the year's program, as agreed by the students themselves, was the spiritual cultivation: the two Retreats held in the spring and in the fall for the officers, and the Bible study and Meditation held in the Student Center every Thursday afternoon. This Meditation and Bible Study was the heart of the program, leading to personal conferences with the Student Counselor, and to changed attitudes and life on the part of many students. Most of the Council members attended Meditation regularly and there was one hundred percent attendance at all meetings of Council during the year. The only member of Council who was not a member of the church was received into the church by baptism in May. 701 personal conferences were held by the Counselor.

The Fall Quarter of 1945-46 opened with the Council Retreat held the weekend before college registration. By arrangement with the administration, cards for registration for church affiliation and interest were placed in the college registration envelopes and distributed to the various religious groups on the campus. More than 300 Methodist and Methodist preference enrolled. Freshmen were welcomed by members of Council, introduced to the Student Center and given a cordial invitation to participate in the program. Attendance has been good at Sunday school and church services. The various commissions have been set up and are at work. The students are using the Student Center in large numbers and there is a fine spirit of fellowship and cooperation in the Methodist student program.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CHAPEL HILL WORK TO INTERCONFERENCE COMMISSION ON STUDENT RELIGIOUS WORK OF NORTH CAROLINA

As has been reported to the Commission by the Campus-Church Relations Committee of the local church, plans for the employment of a full-time student pastor and the expansion of the student work program at Chapel Hill have been completed and are now being put into effect. This committee therefore, has given its attention to problems connected with the church building.

Because a building was constructed at Chapel Hill, largely with funds provided by the Conferences and general agencies of the Church and for the purpose of providing facilities for ministry to students, costing approximately five times as much as the local congregation might normally have spent, we believe that this constitutes a special problem which does not exist at other points where work is carried on under the supervision of the Commission. We find that the building is not now being properly maintained and is not being operated as designed. Studies covering the five years between 1939 and 1943 show, however, that the Chapel Hill congregation has consistently been among the top five percent of the churches of the North Carolina Conference as to per capita giving. We believe, therefore, that it is not reasonable to expect the local congregation to carry the entire burden of maintenance and operation of the building. We recommend that the two Conferences recognize that they have a responsibility with regard to the building at Chapel Hill, and that the following steps be taken to discharge that responsibility:

I.

When the Interconference Commission is re-organized under Paragraph 1379, 1944 Discipline, that the Boards of Education delegate to the Commission the duty of discharging this responsibility; and that this special obligation be taken into consideration in appropriations made to the Commission.

II.

The building is in a very bad state of repair and is rapidly deteriorating; so that it is necessary that major repairs be undertaken immediately. Specifications for these repairs and certain needed alterations have been drawn by Mr. H. N. Haines, architect for the Duke Endowment. Preliminary estimates secured by Mr. Haines are attached to this report.

We recommend that these repairs be made as quickly as possible, employing the contractors making the most satisfactory bids and retaining Mr. Haines as supervising architect. And that the cost of the work be divided as follows:

Chapel Hill Congregation	33%
North Carolina Conference	27%
Western North Carolina Conference	40%

That the procedure for securing the share of each of the Conferences be determined by that Conference. Also, that this committee be continued, or a new committee appointed, to represent the Commission in supervising the repairs.

III.

Comparative studies covering the five years mentioned above indicate that the cost of operation at Chapel Hill was, on the average, \$1531 per year greater than that of other congregations of approximately the same size in the North

Carolina Conference. During this period the church was heated only on Sundays, and a part-time janitor employed. In order to operate the building as designed for a seven-day-a-week student program it would be necessary to heat the rear section of the building continuously and to employ a full-time janitor. The heating engineer of the University, who is also chairman of the church building committee, estimates the extra cost of heating that section of the building continuously at \$332.50 per year. Based on the salary scale for University employees, the additional cost of employing a full-time janitor is estimated at \$268.00 per year. Thus, if the building were operated as designed, the cost to the Chapel Hill congregation above that to other congregations of like size would be something more than \$2000 per year. These figures do not include maintenance, which is of course considerably more expensive than that of the average church with a similar congregation.

We believe, therefore, that the Conferences should share in the expense of the maintenance and operation of the building at Chapel Hill. We recommend that the Commission request for this purpose appropriations as follows from the Commissions on World Service and Finance for the Conference year 1945-1946:

North Carolina Conference	\$ 750.00
Western North Carolina Conference	1000.00

Further, that the Commission adopt the following two policies:

1. While appropriations are made for only one year at a time, the Commission should recognize this as a continuing responsibility, and request appropriations for this purpose from year to year in the amounts indicated by circumstances at the time.

2. These appropriations for maintenance and operation of the Chapel Hill Building should be recognized as distinct from appropriations for student work programs, and should not be deducted from Chapel Hill's pro rata share of funds available for student work.

I have just received the completed estimate for work on repairing and modernizing the University Methodist Church. The general break down of work grouping is as follows:

(1) General Repairs	\$ 6,733.00
(2) Roof and Sheet Metal work	
(a) Carpentry Work	8,000.00
(b) Roofing Sheet Metal	4,500.00
(3) Sanctuary Modernization & Decoration	3,300.00
(4) Painting—General Exterior and interior, except Sanctuary..	6,590.00
(5) Miscellaneous & Contingencies	1,000.00
(6) Architect's Fee, including supervision	750.00
 Total Estimated Cost	 \$30,0893.00

These items cover all work to put the building in good condition as well as modernize and definitely improve the worshipfulness of the sanctuary. The amounts in each group are based on present cost levels, and while they are high, the items which represent maintenance and repair work should be undertaken before the general damage increases beyond its present stage.

Some of the items represent original work and so in comparison with the original costs, these estimated costs for maintenance during the past 20 years period have not been excessive.

REPORT ON THE WORK AND PROGRAM OF THE NORTH CAROLINA COUNCIL OF CHURCHES

Through the past ten years the North Carolina Council of Churches has been the co-ordinating Agency for the Protestant churches in our State. The objective of the Council is to serve as a medium of interdenominational cooperation. The Executive Secretary said in his report for 1944-45: "Our purpose is to serve as a medium of interchurch advice and counsel The denominations are the channels through which we work nothing should be done by the Council if the already existing agencies can and will do the same work effectively."

The Council has fifteen active committees at the present time. These committees render service in practically every area of interest in the local church.

One phase of the program has been to promote weekday Religious Education. Today courses are being offered in Bible in more than 150 communities in North Carolina. Each year several public schools add Bible to their courses of study. The Committee on Week-day Religious Education has made a careful study of curriculum and standards in order to carry out an effective and standard program of teaching.

The Council has an excellent press and radio service. This service gives the people helpful information about the program and work of the churches of North Carolina.

We are unable to give information about the work of other communities at at this time. However, we will say that plans are being made for forward steps in Rural Work, Post-war Planning, Youth Work, Evangelism, Visual Education, Narcotics Education, and a number of other fields.

The annual convocation will be held at Charlotte during the week of April 22-26, 1946. A number of outstanding Christian leaders have been secured for this meeting. This should be an outstanding meeting during the next year.

An expanding program calls for increased support. We are requested to give more in order that the Council may continue to grow in usefulness.

Dr. E. L. Hillman, a member of our Conference, is President of the Council for the year 1945-46. This Conference should pledge to him its support and pray that God shall bless him in this great field of Christian service.

RESOLUTION ON PEACE TIME DRAFT

We of the North Carolina Conference agree with Senator Clyde R. Hoey that "if there was ever a time for a draft, it is now past."

Then, too, the Methodist Church is engaged in a Crusade for Christ and not in a Crusade for War and Military Dominance. We stand with the United Nations in an effort for peace and world security. This can never come by a peacetime draft of our boys to learn the arts of war as they are trained to hate and to kill.

Furthermore, President Truman says "we have a fighting strength greater than any other nation," and on Navy Day he declared, "when our demobilization is finished as planned, the United States will still be the greatest naval power on earth." Yet, with such vast power, the President urges Congress to adopt Compulsary Universal Military training for all our boys.

Why this call for more military strength; and to what purpose? Militarists are repeating the old slogan of Adolph Hitler in which he said, "We stand for complete military service for every man," as he set himself to shape the destiny of Europe for a thousand years. Where are Germany and Japan today? And who are our enemies that could overcome our boasted strength on land, sea, and in the air?

Therefore, being convinced that a peacetime draft is unnecessary and also a radical departure from the American way of life, we do most respectfully urge the Congress to lead the nations in the paths of peace, instead of enacting the draft urged by the militarists, and thus save democratic America from the dominance of armies and war lords.

WHEREAS, it is provided, among other devises and bequeaths in said will: "I give and bequeath to the Board of Finance of North Carolina, Conference of the Methodist Church, my house and land and out buildings to be used as a home for Superannate Preachers of the North Carolina Conference. If said Board find it not suitable for a home for said Preachers then said Board may sell the property and apply the proceeds to the Conference Endowment Fund for Superannate Preachers." and

WHEREAS, the Board of Conference Claimants was advised at its Annual Meeting of said gift by will of the home and property of said deceased, which property is located in Masonboro Township, in said County of New Hanover, and the Board deemed the property unsuited for the use of the Superannate Ministers and

WHEREAS, it is provided in said devise that upon said Board finding said property being unsuitable for said Preachers it could sell the said property and apply the proceeds to the Conference Endowment Fund for Superannate Preachers, and

WHEREAS, said Board finds as a fact that said property is not suitable for a home of Superannate Preachers and authorized and directed a sale of said lands, the net proceeds arising from such sale to be credited to the Conference Superannate Endowment Fund, and

WHEREAS, the action of said Conference Claimants was referred to the Executive Committee and the Executive Committee using its best judgment, believed it to be the soundest advice available, concurred in the action of the Conference Claimants and directed a sale of said lands and premises, and

WHEREAS, said Conference Claimants and Executive Committee refers the matter to the Conference for its approval.

NOW, THEREFORE, the North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Church, in meeting duly called and held, approves the action of the Board of Conference Claimants and the Executive Committee and directs a sale of said property; the proceeds arising therefrom to be credited to the Conference Superannate Endowment Fund.

The Conference directs the Board of Trustees of the Conference to execute such deed as may be required to convey said lands and premises in fee simple, or to execute such deed as will correct and convey to a purchaser or purchasers of said lands of any deed heretofore executed for the purpose and intention of conveying said lands and premises.

ERNEST GOLDEN OVERTON

"Amidst the golden rays of the setting sun and on the gentle slopes of the English countryside, with mingled emotion of a deep loss, and yet a sincere admiration, reverently, I laid his body to rest among the scores of his comrades in arms to wait the final great muster of our Heavenly Commander." are the words of the 87th Infantry Division Chaplain, John F. Chalker in writing of the passing of Chaplain Ernest Golden Overton.

Brother Overton died suddenly of a heart attack on November 13, 1944, shortly after his arrival in England. He was buried in the U. S. National Cemetery in Southern England on November 21.

Ernest Golden Overton was born April 27, 1900 in Aurora, N. C., the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Overton. On June 30, 1926 he married his childhood sweetheart, Rena Mae Smithwick of Aurora. He was a student at Trinity Park School and held the A. B. and B. D. degrees from Duke University. He was a member of Lambda Chi Alpha Fraternity and of the Masons. Among his honors while at Duke was the Wiley Gray Medal in oratory and membership in Tau Kappa Alpha, national speech fraternity.

He joined the North Carolina Conference at Wilmington in 1924 and served West Burlington three years; Burgaw three years and began the new church there; Webb Avenue Burlington two years; Swepsonville two years, Moyock four years where he began and completed the new church; Central church, Raleigh where he drew plans for the consolidation of Central and Epworth churches now Trinity Church; Person Circuit one year and was serving Fayetteville Circuit when he entered the chaplaincy in January, 1941.

In the army, Chaplain Overton served at Fort Bragg for one year as Assistant Post Chaplain, at the Port of Embarkation in New York for six months and on transport duty to England, Egypt and Africa. He was assigned to the 87th Infantry Division in November 1942 and spent one year at Camp McCain, Miss., one year at Fort Jackson, Columbia, S. C., and went overseas with the 87th November 2, 1944.

His work in the ministry was highly successful and his service in the army with his cheerful disposition, energetic manner, and interest in his work won for him a host of friends and the reputation of a fine chaplain as vouched for by his commanding general. In his last moments he said, "I do not mind for myself, and I am ready if I must pay the supreme price, but I am thinking of that sweet wife and big boy of mine."

Lt. Col. Russell W. Hibbert, Jr., of the Medical Corps, commanding writes, "The passing of Captain Overton has saddened us all greatly and his loss will be keenly felt by all members of this organization and by all his many friends throughout the division. He was held in high esteem by all who came in contact with him. His devotion to duty was superb and the welfare of his fellow-soldiers, both spiritually and otherwise was paramount in his life. Although the rest of us must go on to the

battlefields of strife without him, his memory and spirit will be constantly with us to inspire us to greater deeds."

Mrs. Rena Smithwick Overton, who survives him, now lives in Durham, N. C. Their son, Ernest Golden Jr., born March 21, 1927, is a student at Duke University.

Brother Overton was a faithful soldier of the U. S. Army and a faithful loyal soldier of the Army of the Cross.

JOHN WATSON AUTRY

One of the great features of an Annual Methodist Conference is that spirit of brotherhood. This year, 1944-45, our ranks have been invaded, and among the fallen we memorialize with sadness the name of John Watson Autry.

On hearing of his death M. T. Plyler said: "I always liked Autry."

Chaplain Ed Earnhardt, his last Presiding Elder, comments: "John Autry had a keen analytical mind. His observations were original and clear and interesting."

Of his home and family he had to say: "One thing that was quite obvious to those who frequented his home, Autry's children were very respectful and kind. They were most considerate of their elders and very gentle in dealing with the aged. This was due in no small measure to the home attitude created by their father. He was exceedingly attentive to his children and spent a great portion of his time hearing their reports on things that had interested them. He gave the impression that their joys and sorrows were his chief concern."

Although he had retired from the traveling relation in 1935, he, just before he died, accepted an appointment which was without a pastor. This he did gladly at his own request.

About the time he received the appointment, then being in Wilmington, North Carolina, he was taken with a heart attack. He was carried to the hospital and there died.

His heart was always without rest away from God and the pulpit. And, so now, November 18, 1944, God gave him his appointment which evermore will report "Everything in Full."

"Sometimes comes to soul and sense
The feeling which is evidence
That very near about us lies
The realms of spiritual mysteries;
That all our sorrow, pain and doubt
A great compassion clasps about,
And law and goodness—love and force,
Are weeded fast beyond divorce."

Brother Autry was born May 28, 1872 and reared in Cumberland County, near Fayetteville, North Carolina, being the son of David Benjamin and Christian Gainey Autry. He was converted at the age of ten, and felt the call to preach in his early high school years. His preparation for college was completed at Trinity Park School.

Prior to, and during his college course, he taught school for five years, and graduated at Trinity College (now Duke) with the class of 1906.

It was my privilege to know him as classmate, roommate and friend. He was pure in heart, clear in thought, and a sincere Christian. He seemed to have had an intuitive perception, somewhat, of the invisible.

"Once upon a time," he related when we were in college, "I was on my way home and noticed a tree ahead. 'Don't pass that tree', something seemed to say. I treated the warning as a mere thought at first, but did obey the repeated warning, and on making a detour, there came a bolt of lightning as out of a clear sky, almost, and tore that tree asunder."

He told of having had to walk five miles to school at one time in his childhood. In college he was a good student and mastered the text books of philosophy and science with a great degree of appreciation. His Christian faith was not harmed by these, but rather his appreciation of religion and God was thereby nurtured and strengthened.

While in college he taught a class of young women in West Durham (now Asbury) Methodist Sunday School, and in his senior year was pastor of mission churches of Durham.

He was ordained Deacon, 1906, at Rocky Mount by Bishop A. W. Wilson; and received his first appointment, having been admitted on trial.

In 1908, at Trinity Durham, he was received into full connection, and 1910, at Elizabeth City, was ordained Elder by Bishop Hendrix.

John Autry always dressed neatly and believed this was due a preacher and the pulpit. He spoke with zeal and felt that preaching the Gospel meant telling good news from God. He continued to pursue his major interests after college. George Adam Smith was a favorite with him on the Bible. Drunkenness and stinginess were evils he severely denounced.

Brother Autry had a good voice for singing, and was never more happier than when leading a song service in a good revival.

On December 26, 1907, he was happily married to Miss Beulah Green of Durham, North Carolina. Murfreesboro was their first parsonage home, 1907-1908.

His appointments and years of service were as follows: Branson Durham 1906-7; Murfreesboro and Winton 1907-8; Bethel 1908-11; Mattamuskeet Ct. 1911-14; Nashville 1914-16; Craven Ct. 1916-18; Magnolia Ct. 1918-19; Haw River Ct. 1919-21; Orange Ct. 1921-23; Tarboro 1923-25; Webb Ave., Burlington 1925-27; South Alamance Ct. 1927-29; Mt. Tirzah Ct. 1929-31; Person St. 1931-32; and Wadeville 1932-35.

For these twenty-nine years, the Conference heard his Presiding Elders say, "Nothing against him," each year.

To him and Mrs. Autry were born three sons and two daughters. John Watson, Jr., has been at Ft. Bragg Exchange as purchasing agent; David Green is at Ft. Bragg as supervisor of the Ordnance; Lt. Paul Geddie graduated at Duke in 1943 and received his commission as Ensign at the U.S. Midshipman School, Chicago, in 1943; and has now advanced in ranks of the U.S.N.R. His ship has participated in six Pacific invasions.

Faye Isabel is a sophomore at Duke. Joan Brooks is a junior at Fayetteville High School where she lives with her mother.

At Camp Ground Church, near Fayetteville, his funeral was conducted by Revs. R. E. Brown, H. C. Smith and W. L. Clegg.

So now, a little mound of earth in the church cemetery there marks the place of a big heart that beat true for his church, his friends and family.

J. G. JOHNSON

James Gabriel Johnson, son of James Hiram and Elender Vinson Johnson, was born in Wayne County, North Carolina, June 2, 1861. He grew to manhood on his father's farm a few miles from Goldsboro, attended the public schools of that community, later attending Woodland Academy, in Wayne County, and from there went to Bush Hill Academy, in Randolph County. He was converted at the age of fourteen, and joined the church at Thompson's Chapel. He joined the North Carolina Annual Conference at Reidsville in 1886, and was sent to Carteret Circuit. At the time of his death Rev. E. H. Davis was the only surviving member of his class. He served the following appointments, Carteret, Marion, Craven, Clinton, Mt. Olive, Mattamuskeet, Battleboro and Whitakers, Garysburg, Littleton, Windsor, Jonesboro, Selma, Princeton, Garner, Laurel Hill, Roberdell, Person Street, Calvary and Buckhorn. Buckhorn was the last charge he served before he was superannuated. He was married to Miss Julia Smith, January 1, 1889. To this union two children were born—Clement Moorman, of Raleigh, and Julia Gladys, now Mrs. W. R. Sutherland, of Laurinburg. He died January 8, 1945, and was buried in the Laurinburg cemetery. Funeral services were held at the Methodist Church, conducted by the pastor, Rev. R. F. Munns, District Superintendent, Rev. W. L. Clegg and Dr. S. H. Fullon, of the Presbyterian church.

He believed wholeheartedly in a divine call to the holy ministry, and always accepted his appointments with a glad heart, believing that God's hand was directing him wherever he was sent. He never sought preferment, but was willing and glad to proclaim the unsearchable riches of God in Christ Jesus his Lord. His ministry was marked by a consuming passion for the conversion of men, women and children. He was never happier than when calling wanderers back to God.

As a good shepherd of the flock he went in and out of the homes of the poor and the rich, and was welcomed and loved by all classes and condition of people. His radiant face and saintly life enriched and blessed all with whom he came in contact. He possessed an unusual amount of common sense and tact, and adjusted himself to all kinds of conditions and situations. His pulpit ministry was marked by a wonderful insight into the Holy Scriptures, and out of rich personal experience and the grace of God in his own heart he edified and strengthened all those who sat under his ministry. His religious experience was contagious, and wherever he went people knew instinctively that he was a minister of the manifold grace of God. Both adults and children felt free and happy in his presence, because there was no guile in his make-up. As he grew in years he grew in favor with God and man, and his pathway through life was a shining light that shone more brightly till he joined the church triumphant. He now rests from his labors, but the good he accomplished, and the holy influences that he set in motion will go on until the end of time enriching and blessing humanity.

Brother Johnson was a devoted husband, and a wise and loving father, and a workman who needed not to be ashamed of his work. Every charge, which he served so acceptably and efficiently was strengthened and built up financially and spiritually. During his long and successful ministry he erected many churches and parsonages throughout the conference. During his declining years, as a superannuate Methodist minis-

ter, he never lost an opportunity to preach from time to time in the power and demonstration of the spirit of God. He visited many schools advocating total abstinence of alcoholic beverages. He believed with all his heart that the liquor traffic is one of the greatest curses that ever beset the race. He was not a fanatic on the evils of strong drink, but he had a deep conviction that whoever is deceived thereby is not wise. There are many young people today who are living lives of sobriety and purity because of his godly admonitions.

A fellow minister, having been born in the same county, and having enjoyed his friendship and love, I can conscientiously say that he was one of God's noblemen. In all my experiences over a period of fifty years, I have never known a more radiant soul, or a more devout and consecrated minister of the gospel of Jesus Christ. His godly life, unselfish service and rich Christian experience have been a constant benediction to me, and to hundreds and thousands of others to whom he ministered. To his beloved widow, son and daughter, and the North Carolina Conference, he has left a rich legacy untarnished and inviolate.

WILLIAM FLOID TRAWICK

Reverend William Floid Trawick, son of Silas Peter Trawick and Mrs. Elizabeth Covington Trawick, was born in Hoke County near Raeford, North Carolina, November 4, 1886. He was fortunate in having been born and reared in a Christian home by godly parents. On the day that Brother Trawick was born his good father gave him to God for the work of the gospel ministry. In this act of dedication his father prayed earnestly that God would make his son a minister. He also took a solemn vow to do all that he possibly could in helping to prepare his son for his life's work. Having been nurtured in the admonitions of God by parents who were both righteous before God, William Floid Trawick grew into the full stature of a useful and devoted minister of the gospel.

Becoming a minister of the gospel was natural with Brother Trawick. It never crossed his mind that God had brought him into the world to do anything else. While only a child he delighted to play "church" with the children of his home and community. He assumed the place of minister, admonishing others in the ways of God and the church. Thus early in life he gave his heart and life to God and united with Bomo Methodist Church, becoming an active member of the same.

Brother Trawick received his education from the schools of Hoke County, attending Raeford Institute, and later graduating from Piedmont School Lawnsdale, N. C.

On January 1, 1915 Brother Trawick and Miss Trula James East, of Hoke County, were happily married. To this union God gave one daughter, Mrs. Elizabeth Trawick McKethan, also one son, William Floid, Jr. Brother Trawick is survived by each of these loved ones and by a grandson, K. A. McKethan, Jr.

While preparing himself for the ministry Brother Trawick was useful as a local preacher having been licensed by the Fayetteville District Conference, in which district he served during the greater part of his ministry.

The high hour of his life came at Oxford, N. C., in the year 1913 when he was admitted on trial by the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South. He advanced rapidly with his work and

was ordained a deacon and admitted into full connection at the session of the Conference at Wilmington in 1915. He was ordained an elder in Jarvis Memorial Church, Greenville, in 1917.

During his twenty four years of active work in the Conference he served faithfully the following charges: Vass Circuit, 2 years; Mount Gilead Circuit, 4 years; Fairmont, 4 years; Ellerbe, 5 years; Raeford, 4 years; and Biscoe, 5 years. While serving on the Biscoe charge he suffered a stroke of paralysis making it necessary for him to retire from the active ministry at the Conference at Raleigh 1937.

But Brother Trawick would not remain an inactive minister. By 1941 he had regained his health sufficiently to do supply work on the Pinebluff charge in the Fayetteville district. In 1942-43 and 44 he supplied Hallsboro charge in the Wilmington district, returning to his home in Raeford in November 1944 for a much needed rest. But again he could not sit idly by while there were not enough ministers to shepherd our churches. At the request of Brother W. L. Clegg, Brother Trawick again accepted supply work on the Pinebluff charge, serving faithfully and effectively from November, 1944 to April of 1945. His last effort to do the work of his Lord was on April 5, when he went to a Golden Cross meeting at Laurinburg, where he became seriously ill and was not able to attend the meeting. On returning home he knew that his work was done. He was carried to Highsmith Hospital, Fayetteville, where at 6:55 on the morning of April 16, 1945, he passed peacefully and triumphantly from us into a better world.

The funeral was conducted from Raeford Methodist Church Tuesday, April 17, 1945, by Reverend W. L. Clegg, District Superintendent; Rev. W. L. Maness, pastor, and Rev. B. P. Robinson, a former pastor. The Raeford Masonic Lodge No. 356, of which Brother Trawick was a member, was in charge of the service at the grave. The funeral was attended by twelve ministers and a large congregation of friends. They knew that Brother Trawick had not only finished his course, but that he had fought a good fight and had kept the faith.

He was buried in Raeford cemetery in the shadows of the long leaf pines, in the community of his former pastorate and childhood days, and beneath an offering of floral designs appropriate and most beautiful.

MRS. ROSA LEE BROOM

Mrs. Chaffin was born in Bladen County, North Carolina, November 16, 1881; married to the Rev. L. M. Chaffin April 29, 1916, and died in Lee County Hospital on November 13, 1944 after a period of gradual declining health.

It was her good fortune to be the child of cultured parents, who taught her the lesson that noble living is never found in self indulgence and worldly vanity, but rather in humility of spirit and unselfish service for others.

Mrs. Chaffin, measured by the highest standards, was a Christian and left the impress of her life upon the heart of the communities in which she had lived. As the wife of an itinerant Methodist minister, she did her part in every good work. Her religious life was not of the showy sort, but it was none the less genuine, rich and deep. Called upon to be active in the various organizations of the church, as is the case with most preachers' wives, she nevertheless kept her hand always upon her home. As a wife and mother, she gave herself without stint to the needs of her family. Her late husband was heard to have said of her, "I have never known a mother who loved her children so completely and tried to do so much for them."

Mrs. Chaffin was a member of the Jonesboro Methodist Church, which she supported loyally until her death. Her funeral was conducted by her pastor, Rev. Leslie L. Parrish, at the Jonesboro Church in the presence of many who knew her and loved her, and her body was laid to rest near that of her husband in the Jonesboro cemetery.

Mrs. Chaffin is survived by two children, the Rev. J. C. Chaffin, pastor of the Swan Quarter Charge, and Mrs. Harold Fowler of Greenville, South Carolina.

MRS. H. M. EURE

"The honeysuckle blossoms drenched with rain
 That lend enchantment to a summer night;
 The purple violet hidden from the sight
 Beside the border of a country lane;
 The jasmine vine, which hangs its golden chain
 Within the forest like a twinkling light,
 Have flourished for a time and taken flight—
 Their ashes have returned to earth again.
 But what of one whose life was like a flower
 Which scatters gentle perfume everywhere,
 Whose face had caught the radiance of the sky
 From looking ever upward till that hour
 When the Great Gardner stripped the branches bare?
 God smells such fragrance from His throne on high."

These lines from the heart of Thomas Kimber might well apply to the sweet and radiant life of Mrs. H. M. Eure, who, on August 13, 1945, was summoned by the Great Gardener to take her place in that garden where the flowers never fade. For seventy-five years He had left her here on earth where the "gentle perfume" of her influence permeated the lives of those who knew and loved her.

Mrs. Eure began her life in Melrose, Iowa, January 17, 1870, as Lillian Estella McCoy. At the age of fifteen she moved to West Plains, Missouri, and a few years later became a teacher in the public schools of Moody, Missouri. While she was engaged in teaching, she met Reverend Hilliard M. Eure, a deeply consecrated servant of God, who in 1889 had left North Carolina in answer to the urgent call for young preachers to join the St. Louis Conference. In 1890 Reverend Hilliard M. Eure and Lillian Estella McCoy were united in marriage. Thus, side by side, with unflinching faith and ready hands these valiant young Christians began their long career of service for Christ whom they so ardently loved. There were hardships during the Missouri days. Mr. Eure was presiding

elder for six years, the churches were widely separated, the salary was meager, the traveling by horse and buggy was slow, and often he was away from his young wife for weeks at a time. Back in the parsonage, however, she was always found following duty with a brave heart and steadfast trust in God.

After ten years of work together in Missouri, Reverend and Mrs. Eure transferred to North Carolina where they served the following churches: Greenville, Beaufort, Carthage, Jonesboro, Red Springs, Williamston, Rich Square and Norlina. Wherever she was called to go, Mrs. Eure proved to be a true pastor's wife. She usually taught a Sunday School class, and she took an active part in the work of the women of the church. When the need for teachers became so great during World War One, she taught for two years in the Williamston Public School. In fact, whether in the home with her husband and children, or in the community, she shed abroad the influence of her strong personality.

On January 8, 1926, Reverend H. M. Eure suddenly passed away, and Mrs. Eure was left to carry on without the steadying support of her faithful partner. She stood the test, however, and for the sake of her boys and girls she kept her courage high and held to the assurance that "all things work together for good to those who love the Lord."

As the years went by, the burden became heavier. During the last three years of her life, Mrs. Eure was an invalid, spending almost all of her time in bed. Although she was deprived of the activity that she loved, she was patient and brave. Her mind was particularly keen. She enjoyed her radio and was often surprisingly quick at finding answers to questions that were asked on various programs. She was deeply interested in the outcome of the war and kept herself informed on current events. A truly fine woman was Mrs. Eure!

She was buried in Alloway Cemetery, Red Springs, North Carolina. Surviving Mrs. Eure are the following children: Numa F. Eure, a stepson, of Beaufort, North Carolina, Mrs. Arthur Hamilton, Red Springs, North Carolina, Mrs. Q. M. Wiggins, Norfolk, Virginia, Hilliard M. Eure, Morehead City, North Carolina and A. F. Eure, Alexandria, Virginia. They will deeply miss the sweet presence of their mother. As they remind themselves that she is in heaven with their beloved father and other dear ones, may their hearts find a deep comfort in the poet's lines:

"Life changes all our thoughts of heaven:
 At first we think of streets of gold,
 Of gates of pearl and dazzling light,
 Of shining wings and robes of white,
 And things all strange to mortal sight.
 But in the afterward of years
 It is a more familiar place—
 A home unhurt by sighs or tears,
 Where waiteth many a well-known face.
 With passing months it comes more near.
 It grows more real day by day,
 Not strange or cold, but very dear,
 The glad home land nor far away,
 Where none are sick or poor, or lone,
 The place where we shall find our own."

There, under the influence and training of a Christian home and the church, Luzie grew up into young womanhood. Her growth and development was not only in body and mind, but also in those finer graces of beauty and culture and the qualities of a strong sturdy Christian character for which she was so well known by her many friends and acquaintances.

On June 10, 1908, she was married to Rev. W. C. Martin, then serving his first year on trial in the North Carolina Conference, and who is

yet an active member of the Conference. To this union were born three sons: William Southgate, Benjamin Franklin and William Christian, who also survive. Sessions of the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Church

The North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Church was composed of the North Carolina Conference of the former M. E. Church, South, and parts of the North Carolina Conference of the former Methodist Protestant Church and the Blue Ridge-Atlantic Conference of the former Methodist Episcopal Church. The former Methodist Episcopal Church gave to the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Church 9 preachers, 11 charges and 1,837 members; the former Methodist Protestant Church 23 preachers, 20 charges and 9,152 members; the former Methodist Episcopal Church, South, 273 preachers, 226 charges and 132,735 members.

NOTE: The Distributing Committee at the 1940 session of the Western North Carolina Conference added three retired ministers of the former Methodist Protestant Church to the roll of the North Carolina Conference. The names of these preachers should have been included in 1939 in the list of preachers coming into the North Carolina Conference from the former Methodist Protestant Church.
