OBJECTIVES

The continuing objective of the North Carolina Conference is the Crusade for Christ, and during the coming year our chief responsibility shall be the teaching and the practice of Christian stewardship.

That stewardship may vitalize our total program of Christian activity, your committee proposes the following major objectives for this year:

1. A complete acceptance of the goals for our Conference, as outlined by the Board of Lay Activities. This should result in the following:

- (1) Increased attendance upon the worship services of every church.
- (2) An increase in the number of active workers in every church.
- (3) An increase in the number of regular contributors to the church, many of whom shall be tithers, and all of whom shall be proportionate givers.
- (4) New recruits for the ministry and mission fields.
- (5) A more serious acceptance of our responsibility as stewards of all that God has entrusted to us.

2. We urge all of our workers in Christian Education to continue the Crusade for Christ emphasis upon Church School enrollment and attendance, believing that no investment of time, talents, money, or life can be more fruitful than that which is made in Christian Education.

3. We ask the members of the Woman's Society of Christian Service in every local church to promote Christian stewardship to the end that it may become a part of the normal procedure of the church program.

4. That we may be better informed concerning the program of our church, we propose for this year to increase the subscribers to the North Carolina Christian Advocate in our Conference by 100%.

5. One of our objectives shall be a carefully planned and well attended study class in every local church, using the book, "The Fine Art of Using," by Dr. Ralph Sockman.

6. As a practical expression of the stewardship of material resources, we urge every charge in the conference to accept its full responsibility in connection with the Methodist College Advance.

7. Your committee agrees that "Stewardship is the practical expression of one's experience of God," and suggests that the supreme objective of every member of every church in the North Carolina Conference for the new year shall be a closer walk with God.



Rules of Order and Procedure for the North Carolina Annual Conference of the Methodist Church

I. RULES OF ORDER

1. Robert's Rules of Order shall apply to any situation not covered by these rules.
2. No member who has the floor may be interrupted except for a breach of order, a misrepresentation, to direct the attention of the Conference to the fact that time has arrived for a special order, or to raise a very urgent question of high privilege.
3. No member shall speak a second time on the same question if any member who has not spoken desires the floor, nor more than twice on the same subject under the same motion, nor longer than ten minutes unless his time shall be extended by the Conference, except as provided in Rule 4.
4. When the report of a committee is under consideration and when all have spoken who desire to do so, or when (and after) the previous question has been ordered, the Chairman and/or duly authorized member or members presenting the committee's report (and the minority report if there be one) shall be entitled to speak before the vote is taken.
5. A member claiming the floor at any time for what he believes is a very urgent question of high privilege, shall be allowed to indicate briefly the nature of the question, and if it be adjudged by the chair to be such, he may proceed at his pleasure, or until the chairman judges he has exhausted his privilege.
6. Voting shall be by a show of hands unless otherwise ordered by the Conference. A "yea" and "nay" vote, if taken, shall be by signed ballot, which result will be published in the Conference journal. A count vote may be ordered on call of any member supported by one-fifth of the members present and voting, in which case the delegates shall rise from their seats and stand while they are counted.

II. ORGANIZATION

1. The Secretary: The Secretary of the Annual Conference shall be elected annually by the Conference, at its first session; and on nominations arising from the floor.
2. Assistant Secretaries: The Secretary shall nominate his assistants and the Conference shall elect.
3. Statisticians: There shall be a Conference Statistician and an Assistant Statistician, both of whom shall be elected annually by the Conference on nomination of the Conference Secretary.
4. The Conference Stenographer: The Conference Secretary shall employ the Conference Stenographer.
5. Compensation: The Commission on World Service and Finance shall determine, subject to the approval of the Conference, the compensation given officers for their services and also the method and amount for meeting expenses of said officers. The Conference Treasurer shall pay these amounts.

6. Boards, Commissions, and Committees: The Bishop and his Cabinet shall determine the size of and nominate the members of all Boards, Commissions, and Committees authorized by the General Conference, the Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference, and this Annual Conference, except in those cases in which the Discipline directs otherwise. The recommendations and nominations shall be subject to the approval of the Conference.
7. The Conference Board of Trustees: The Conference Board of Trustees shall be required to meet at least once a year other than the regular meeting at the session of the Annual Conference.
8. Board Treasurers: All Board Treasurers shall be required to file financial statements, annually, with the reports of their respective Boards. These financial statements shall be published in the Conference journal.
9. Program Committee: There shall be a Program Committee of the Conference consisting of the resident Bishop, the Conference Secretary, the District Superintendent of the District in which the session of the Conference is held, the pastor of the host church, and the Conference Lay Leader. This committee shall determine the compensation and expense for invited speakers; and this shall be paid from the Conference expense fund.
10. Committee on Conference Objectives: There shall be a Conference Quadrennial Committee on Conference Objectives. See Paragraph 651—Question 46—1944 Discipline.
11. Entertainment Committee: There shall be a Conference Entertainment Committee, composed of three ministers and two laymen. This committee shall be elected at the first session of the Conference following the General Conference, and shall serve for the quadrennium. This committee shall receive invitations and determine the place and method of entertaining the Conference sessions. The committee is requested to determine the place of holding the next Conference not later than April 1st, if possible.
12. Committee on Memoirs: The Conference Secretary and the District Superintendents shall constitute the Committee on Memoirs. The members of this committee shall be charged with the responsibility of providing for all the details of the memorial service. The Conference Secretary shall be the chairman of this committee.
13. Committee on Daily Minutes: A committee of three members shall be elected each year to examine the daily minutes of the sessions of the Conference and report daily to the Conference.
14. Courtesies and Resolutions: There shall be constituted a Committee on Courtesies and Resolutions, annually, at the first session of the Conference.
15. Committee on Appeals: There shall be appointed, quadrennially, a Committee on Appeals, composed of at least five members, whose duties shall be to hear appeals from the decisions of the several District Boards of Church Location and Building, or any other questions that may properly come before them.
16. American Bible Society: All matters regarding the relation of the Conference to the American Bible Society and its work shall be referred to the Board of Education.

III. REPORTS AND RESOLUTIONS

1. All reports and resolutions presented to the Conference shall be written (typewritten if possible) in triplicate. Two copies shall be in the hands of the Conference Secretary before the report or resolutions shall be read to the Conference for consideration.
2. Any amendment offered to any paper and all motions of more than a single sentence must be in writing and given to the Conference Secretary.
3. Any resolution involving the expenditure of Conference funds shall be presented to (or the approval shall be secured of) the Commission on World Service and Finance. This same rule shall apply for resolutions seeking consent to solicit funds in the several congregations for Conference schools or institutions; provided that the pastor must be made aware of amounts solicited and secured.

IV. LAY DELEGATES TO THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE

1. Lay delegates, regular or reserve, from the pastoral charges to the Annual Conference shall be elected by the Quarterly Conference at least forty-five days prior to the session of the Annual Conference.
2. Each District Superintendent shall complete the list of lay delegates to the Conference, from his district, at least forty-five days before the Annual Conference session and shall immediately transmit the completed list, in duplicate, to the Conference Secretary.
3. Substitutions for lay delegates to the Annual Conference must be made to the Conference Secretary, in written form, through the District Superintendent of each District.

V. PASTORS' REPORTS TO ANNUAL CONFERENCE AND STATISTICS

1. Each pastor shall complete table I of his annual report to Conference and transmit the same to the Conference Statistician at least two weeks prior to the opening of Conference.
2. Table II shall be completed and turned in at the time of registration, the first day of Conference.
3. Each table of the report shall be filled out by individual churches with totals for the charge.
4. Table II shall be made out in even dollars only.
5. Tables I and II shall be printed in the Conference journal only by charges.
6. A third table of individual church reports shall be compiled by the Statistician from the pastors' reports. This table shall be printed in the Conference journal.

VI. THE CONFERENCE JOURNAL

1. Editor: The Conference Secretary shall be charged with the responsibility of editing and making contracts for publication of the Conference journal, in keeping with the regulations of the General Conference and of the South-eastern Jurisdictional Conference. The Editor shall have full authority to condense reports, memoirs, and other papers when necessary.
2. One complimentary copy of the Conference Journal shall be sent each of the following: The Conference claimants, the educational institutions, the Gen-

eral Boards, the Publishing House, the Lay Members of the Conference, the Lay Members of the Conference Boards. Eight copies shall be sent to each pastor without charge. All other copies shall be sold at 50 cents each, or single copies by mail at 60 cents each.

VII. DISTRICTS

1. The number of districts shall be seven.
2. A District Conference shall be held annually in each district.
3. Each pastoral charge shall elect annually two lay delegates to the District Conference. These shall be in addition to those named by the Discipline as ex officio members.
4. The District and Associate District Lay Leaders shall be elected annually by the Annual Conference on nomination of the District Superintendents and the Conference Lay Leader.
5. The District Superintendent of each District shall be required to furnish to the Bishop, the Conference Treasurer, and the Conference Statistician, as early in the year as possible, an official copy of the apportionments to the charges for World Service and Conference Benevolences and the amounts accepted by the charges, also the amounts approved by the charges for the several items of ministerial support. The figures furnished the Conference Statistician shall be used by him in making up his report to the Conference. Two of these official copies are to be sent to the Secretary of the Commission on World Service and Finance.
6. Each District Superintendent, as early in the year as possible, shall furnish the Bishop, the Conference Treasurer, and the Conference Statistician with a schedule of the salaries of pastors as set by the Quarterly Conferences. The figures furnished by the District Superintendent to the Conference Statistician shall be used by him in making up his report to the Conference.
7. We call attention of the District Superintendents to Paragraph 432(1) 1944 Discipline and state that we believe that a reasonable time for such consultation, before the appointments are to be read, could not be construed to be less than twenty-four hours.

VIII. AMENDMENTS

1. These rules or order and procedure may be amended by a two-thirds vote on the next day after a proposed amendment has been presented in writing; provided the rule fixing the number of districts may be amended by a majority vote; provided, further, a change in the number of districts may not be made later than the second morning of the Annual Conference session.

IX. WHEN THE RULES BECOME EFFECTIVE

1. These rules of order and procedure of the North Carolina Annual Conference shall become effective immediately upon passage by the vote of the majority of the Conference.

That 6% of a sum equal to the amount estimated for the then current Conference year for the salary of the Pastor and assistant pastor, if any, of each and every charge in the Conference, be apportioned to each charge, said sum to be remitted to the Conference Treasurer, who shall administer it according to the financial plan as stated in said Par. 788.

We recommend that distribution of these district apportionments be made to the several charges by the District Superintendents.

5. **Orphanage:** We recommend the apportionment to each charge of the same amount as for the year 1943-44.

5. **Sustentation Fund:** We recommend the apportionment to each charge of the same amount as for the year 1943-44.

7. **Methodist College Advance, 5% Fund:** We approve the Methodist College Advance as recommended by the Board of Education in its report No. 1, and we recommend the apportionment of \$18,000.00 as contained in item 3 (B) 1945 Conference report on the same basis as the sustentation fund, less 10% on an individual charge basis.

8. **Board of Conference Claimants:** We include the request of said Board per their report, for a total sum equal to 13% of the salaries of pastors and clerical

assistants. We direct the Conference Treasurer to remit 1-26 portion of the proceeds to the Board of Pensions of the Methodist Church of the Missouri Corporation "for the divided annuity fund."

9. We approve the plans of the Board of Hospitals and Homes to provide homes and care for the aged.

10. We recommend Conference approval of the request of the Board of Education for permission to appeal to the churches of the Conference in December 1946, for a special Christmas offering for the purpose of developing Camp Don-Lee in Pamlico County.

Any funds which may be raised under this authorization are to be remitted to George R. Wallace, Treasurer, Morehead City, N. C.

11. Supplementary Budget Items.

(a) The payment of \$400.00 for "The Methodist Hour" Radio Program for the year 1946 is approved, and we authorize the payment of the sum of \$1,052.00 for the same purpose in the year 1947 from funds now in the hands of the Conference Treasurer.

(b) We recommend that the Treasurer be authorized to pay from funds on hand and on approved vouchers any excess in the cost of Conference entertainment above \$2500.00

(c) Also that the Treasurer be authorized to pay from funds on hand the necessary sum for printing and delivery to the local charge of a new leaflet on PAR as outlined later.

1. Guide for Pastors in Setting up New Budget

District Superintendents Fund, 6% on Pastor's Salary basis.

Conference Claimants 13% Pastor's Salary and Clerical Assistants.

Ministers' Retirement Fund, 1% Pastor's Salary basis.

Episcopal Fund, 1 3/4 % Pastor's Salary basis.

Orphanage, Same apportionment as for the year 1943-44.

Sustentation Fund, Same apportionment as for the year 1943-44.

Methodist College Advance, 5% Fund. Same amount as Sustentation Fund less 10%.

World Service, Acceptance as agreed with the District Superintendents. We suggest serious consideration of PAR as a minimum, but not a ceiling.

2. Table for PAR.

This table is arrived at by starting with a minimum base of \$225, or 15% for \$1500 salary and stepping up to 1% for each \$100 addition to salary, i.e. \$2000-20%; \$3000-30%; \$3600-36%; \$4500-45% \$6000-60%; for greater amount follow the same formula.

1. Remittances to Conference Treasurer.

We recommend that all remittances to his office for causes handled by it be transmitted with the official remittance advice form provided for that purpose. Also that such remittances be made not more often than once each month and that charges of more than one church remit through one person, the pastor or some other, to avoid handling of very small amounts as far as possible.

2. We recommend the employment of A. M. Pullen & Company, C.P.A., to audit the books of our Treasurer.

REPORT NO. I—BOARD OF MISSIONS AND CHURCH EXTENSION

The Board of Missions and Church Extension thinks this a suitable time to present to the Conference a brief report showing the condition of the several funds the Board is given the responsibility to administer and calling attention to certain missionary needs within the bounds of the Conference. If the report is adopted it will be listed in the *Journal* as Report No. 1. More detailed reports of the Treasurer and of the Secretary will be brought to the Conference later.

The Sustentation Fund

For several years before the North Carolina Conference adopted the Sustentation plan, funds for supplementing ministers' salaries were pitifully small. The Board of Missions and Church Extension was under the painful necessity of cutting

all askings to desperately low levels. When the plan, including a minimum salary scale, was adopted in 1941 there was not unanimous opinion that the plan would be successful. However, the income has made it possible each year for every member of the Conference and every supply who gave full-time service to receive as much as the minimum salary and in special cases more than the minimum. In addition to paying the full askings made through the several superintendents this fund now has to its credit \$18,000.00 in reserve. The Conference is to be congratulated on the success of the plan and on the appreciable reserve accumulated during the five years; however, it should be observed that within the past year when the minimum salary level was lifted, \$200.00 in each category, more money was appropriated to ministers' salaries than the reserve amounts to. This means that the Conference is not yet as much as one year ahead of its needs.

It seems appropriate at this point to say with thanks that the success of the Sustentation plan is in no small way owing to the large supplement for ministers' salaries supplied by the Duke Endowment. During the five-year period of operating under the Sustentation plan the ministers have received approximately \$57,000.00 of their appropriations from the Duke Endowment. Without this the Sustentation Fund would have no reserve and would have fallen far short of paying the minimum salaries from year to year. The combined resources have put the North Carolina Conference in a high ranking position as pertains to the minimum salary scale and in an even higher rank in average salary for ministers. There are few, if any, Conferences in the country paying higher average salary than is paid in the North Carolina Conference.

The Church Extension Fund

"The Church Extension Fund" came to be one of the administrative obligations of the present Board of Missions and Church Extension at the time of Unification. Before union Church Extension funds were channeled through a separate Board of Church Extension. When the churches united there was a union of several boards operating in the three branches to form the Board of Missions and Church Extension.

The Treasurer's report will show that for the year now closing the Conference provided \$6,000.00 for the purpose of aiding congregations in building churches and parsonages. Among other appeals for aid to buildings was a most urgent one for \$8,000.00. The board was able to make this and several other appropriations only by drawing upon the small reserve in this and other funds.

The Treasurer's report will show a cash balance in this fund of \$11,653.61, but it will not show an item of equal importance, i.e., appropriations made though not yet paid amounting to \$11,391.11. It is seen at a glance that the cash balance and the amount of the unpaid appropriations are almost equal, leaving nothing on hand for future demands except a \$5,000.00 reserve invested in U. S. Government bonds.

Had the churches been limited to the small annual budgets provided each year by the Conference for building purposes it would be difficult to visualize the poor estate of churches throughout the Conference. But again the Duke Endowment has supplied a noble missionary need in the rural congregations throughout the Conference. Within the past year the Duke Endowment has appropriated approximately \$30,000.00 to the North Carolina Conference for this purpose, an amount five times larger than the total sum provided by the Conference for churches and parsonages. Appropriations for this cause, though not always as large as the amount granted this year, have been given annually by the Duke Endowment for the past twenty years. Because of this private benefaction to the two Methodist Conferences in North Carolina local congregations have been stimulated to give liberally in securing adequate church house facilities during the past twenty year period, the result being an increase of rural church house value of approximately eight million dollars. No Conferences in the Methodist Church have anything like as complete and as beautiful rural church building equipment as these two Conferences have.

The General Mission Fund

Another fund, known as "The General Mission Fund," has been necessary to meet missionary needs of the Conference not met by other specified funds; to maintain the Conference program of missionary education and cultivation; and to pay the general expenses in the administration of missions and Church Extension by the Conference and by the Board. This fund thus provides for a great many items of various types.

The Treasurer's report will show that the Conference provided \$4,000.00 during the past year for these causes. Although relatively small annual allotments have been made to this fund there is an accumulation of \$16,000.00, which is invested in U.S. Government bonds. The Conference should enjoy a sense of satisfaction in having this reserve which should be used effectively in extending missionary activities along lines where the needs are great and for meeting current needs in days of financial reverses, if such days should come.

The Conference Loan Fund

In addition to the various funds administered by the Conference Board, the North Carolina Conference has a loan fund available for building churches and parsonages. The fund was established in 1913 with a contribution of \$200.00. Other contributions were made in subsequent years, though nothing has been added in recent years except the interest collected from loans. The older members of the Conference will recall what vigorous emphasis was given to the establishment of a loan fund in the Methodist Episcopal Church, South. Representatives from the General Board of Church Extension attended the Annual Conferences, making strong and effective appeals for the creation of a large loan fund to be administered by the General Board but held in the name of the several contributing annual Conferences. The funds donated by an Annual Conference were to be loaned only upon recommendation of the Conference Board of Church Extension and for needs within the bounds of the Conference.

A recent report from the Kentucky Corporation of the Board of Missions and Church Extension of the Methodist Church shows a capital fund of \$27,351.85 in the name of the North Carolina Conference. Approximately \$6,000.00 of this amount is in outstanding loans against property in the Conference. \$6,000.00 is the present cash balance. \$15,000.00 is invested in U. S. Government Bonds. For obvious reasons this loan fund has not been fully used in recent years. However, the time may come when it will be a great benefit to the Conference.

There is at present within the North Carolina Conference great need for a vigorous extension of missionary vision and energy. At least two such areas of need demand immediate attention. One of these is the vast population in several growing cities who are receiving little or no religious instruction and guidance from the established churches. The Conference is under obligation to see that these groups of people are properly served. In most cases the best way to do this is by the organization of new congregations and the building of new houses of worship. To leave this total responsibility to the ministers and congregations in the several cities does not seem to be wise. They have justifiable loyalties and heavy obligations toward their own local churches. There must be within the bounds of the Conference some fifteen or more cities offering splendid opportunities for the establishment of new Methodist churches.

A second urgent need is that of encouraging and strengthening certain rural churches that have lost their vitality because of the migration of lay leadership to other communities or for other causes. This is a matter far more serious in the North Carolina Conference than is generally recognized. In the great cityward movement of population which has been noted for several decades some local churches should have been abandoned or else relocated. But even a little investigation will show that many local churches are being abandoned which instead should be rehabilitated to serve the densely populated communities in which they are situated. The heroic missionary spirit in this great Conference should be aroused to check a dangerous tendency to move away from communi-

ties which have not the trained leaders they once had leaving the untrained people—and perhaps indifferent people—without the benefit of a Methodist minister and the other services of our great Church.

In order to meet these urgent missionary needs, we recommend that the District Superintendent and the District Missionary Secretary in each of the district co-operate:—first, in making an immediate study of the opportunities for the establishment of new churches and of the need for strengthening weak ones; second, in organizing city Methodist Societies wherever advisable for the purpose of promoting new churches and the greater use of Methodist resources to supply the religious needs of our city population; and third, in forming effective plans for rehabilitating weak rural churches which yet have a mission to perform. One way of meeting this third need is by the organization of county Methodist societies in which the combined resources and wisdom of Methodist ministers and congregations of the entire county can be used to revitalize churches whose strength is waning.

Inasmuch as the cost of living at present is unusually high; and whereas the sustentation fund has some reserve which can be used for such an emergency we recommend that for the year 1946-47 the Conference authorize and increase of \$100.00 in each of the categories in the minimum salary scale.

REPORT NO. 2—BOARD OF MISSIONS AND CHURCH EXTENSION

The Board of Missions and Church Extension is happy to note the splendid success achieved in the "Year of Evangelism" during the past year. This has received major emphasis throughout the conference. Pastors and laymen have received a new thrill as they have given themselves to the task of reaching the unchurched. Figures available at this conference show that this has perhaps been the most productive year in this field that our church has ever experienced. Tabulations show that some 6,354 have been received into the church on profession of faith, and some 7,424 by certificate, making a total of nearly 14,000. We feel the church has challenged us with the greatest program in our history, and it has been an inspiration to see how all have responded to it and the success attending their efforts. We trust we shall not slacken our efforts along this line, but will continue to realize that our first responsibility is to win people to loyalty to Christ and His way of life.

We are now beginning the third phase of the Crusade for Christ, namely the "Year of Stewardship." This of course does not refer only to material values, but the stewardship of all life—time, talent, energy, substance—everything. This board hopes and believes our people will give themselves with equal abandon to this third phase of the Crusade, and we heartily commend it to all. With the completion of the first two phases of the four-year program, namely the raising of some \$27,000,000 for world rehabilitation, and the winning of more than 1,000,000 new members, we are now prepared to enter the year of stewardship with a larger zeal and a greater enthusiasm, believing that the possibility of achievement is almost unlimited. By giving ourselves in consecrated devotion in the year that lies before us, we shall be able to come back to our conference one year hence again sounding the note of victory, and with a new appreciation for the high and holy privilege of what it means to be good stewards of the gospel of Jesus Christ. We are anxious that our conference shall do its full share in leading young men and women to volunteer for full time Christian service in the ministry or mission fields or elsewhere.

The board heartily endorses the suggestion of our Conference Missionary Secretary that churches be encouraged to accept mission specials in addition to their regular giving. We also endorse the plan to hold a district missionary institute in each district sometime next spring. The meetings held during the past year were well worthwhile, but were too few in number.

In "The Fine Art of Using" Dr. Ralph W. Sockman has produced a very important book to be used as the mission study book during the year. It is highly recommended and should be widely distributed and used throughout the church. Orders should be placed for this book at the set-up meetings early in the year, and the course should be put on in every church as early as practical.

We commend the good work of the conference missionary secretary and the several district missionary secretaries in promoting the cause of missions among us. We recommend the re-election of the Rev. Leon Russell as Conference missionary secretary.

We also recommend the re-election of Dr. J. M. Ormond and Dr. H. C. Smith to succeed themselves as members of the Board of Managers of the North Carolina Pastors' School.

REPORT NO I—BOARD OF EDUCATION

Methodist College Advance

In the North Carolina Conference there has been the finest support of the Methodist College Advance on the part of the Bishop, the District Superintendents, the pastors and the members of our churches. The official boards of about two-thirds of the pastoral charges have accepted the goals suggested to their churches, and will be raising them during the next two years. A substantial sum has already been raised in cash. Practically all charges have paid their part of the 5% Endowment Fund the past year. This will provide much needed and effective financial assistance to our colleges at once. It is contemplated that all those charges which have not yet officially accepted their goals will do their part too. It will require wholehearted cooperation and sustained effort on the part of all to attain our Conference goal of \$830,000.00.

We are moving steadily toward our objective of materially strengthening and undergirding our Methodist colleges in the state. We, therefore, make the following specific recommendations:

1. That every church, minister and member do all possible to carry the Methodist College Advance to a triumphant success during the next two years.
2. That all churches, except those that have raised their goals in full, pay the 5% Endowment Fund during the ensuing year.
3. That an annual College Advance Day be observed in every church on the third Sunday in September with a special offering to be applied on the 5% Endowment Fund or the Principal Fund.
4. That Rev. W. A. Cade be appointed to continue his work as executive secretary of the Methodist College Advance.

REPORT NO. 2—THE BOARD OF EDUCATION

The Local Church

We are grateful for the leadership of our Conference staff during the year just closed: Rev. J. G. Phillips, Executive Secretary and Director of Youth Work; Rev. L. C. Vereen, Associate Director of Youth Work and Camp Director; Miss Billy Beth Beam, Director of Children's Work; and Miss Evelyn Cline, Office Manager-Secretary and Director of Methodist Youth Fund. We regret the loss of the service of Miss Beam, who has resigned.

A summary of the work of Christian Education in the Conference during the past year indicates gratifying results in a number of areas.

1. The last complete report of the 169 Methodist Conferences in the nation ranks our Conference among the 12 highest in percentage of increase in Church School attendance and among the 15 highest in percentage of increase of enrollment.

2. In the field of children's work the first laboratory school for workers was held in June with top-rank national leaders, with good attendance and results; workers from 95 church schools were reached in an intensive promotion of Vacation School institutes; and our Conference became among the five highest in the nation in the total number of Methodist pupils enrolled in Vacation Church Schools.

3. The youth program included seven camps enrolling 625 intermediates, 105 of whom made a profession of faith; three senior assemblies reaching 720, with 98 of them volunteering for full-time Christian service; three Youth Caravan teams, reaching 21 communities—1,500 young people, and winning 135 on profession of faith; 145 adult leaders trained in youth work; seven district youth rallies, reaching over 3,000 young people and their leaders.

4. The program of adult work included three meetings of the Young Adult Conference Council with district directors; a record of 48 local church young adult units enrolled with the Conference Council; a separate summer meeting for young adults in the Conference; five district rallies and three sub-district meetings.

We recommend the following emphases for the year 1946-47:

1. That the Crusade for Christ be given first place in our work and that we co-operate with the Board of Lay Activities in the program of stewardship cultivation.

2. That one of the leadership education courses on stewardship be offered in each charge early in the year, preferably in January, to prepare for the intensive period of cultivation.

3. That the goal for the net increase in enrollment of the Church School be 11% for each of the next two years, and that we maintain an average attendance equal to 75% of the active enrollment.

4. In view of the need of better trained leaders in the Church School we recommend that each local church board of education plan a comprehensive program of leadership education and, to assist the boards in this program, that the district staffs conduct sub-district Christian workers' schools.

5. That at least one vacation church school be held in each charge.

6. That Church School Rally Day be observed in all churches with a program and an offering and that the goal of the total offerings be \$3,000, this amount to be used as requested for our training work and extension program.

Educational Institutions

We note an unprecedented increase in the enrollment of our educational institutions. Each institution appreciates efforts being put forth in the Methodist College Advance.

Louisburg College: The institution has been strengthened financially by increased tuition fees, and anticipates further improvements through funds collected in the Methodist College Advance. It is planned to celebrate appropriately in the spring the opening of the college under the original charter in 1787, the erection of Main Building in 1857, and the donation of the college by Mr. Benjamin N. Duke to the North Carolina Conference in 1907. Dr. H. E. Spence is writing a pageant for this occasion. The college has a total enrollment of 365 students, of whom 270 are men and 95 are women.

Greensboro College: For the third successive year Greensboro College reports a capacity enrollment, 406, of whom 337 are living in dormitories and college houses, with a total enrollment of approximately 425 for the year. North Carolina furnishes 86% of the student body, and the Methodist Church 74.44%. More students now major in religion than in any other department.

High Point College: High Point College now has no indebtedness. The enrollment for the year ending June 1, 1946, was: Summer School, 1945, 87; Extension, 99; regular session, 681. 92% were from North Carolina, and 55% were Methodists. There are now enrolled 778. 4% of the men enrolled are ministerial students, and 76% are veterans.

Duke University: For the year ending June 30, 1946, the enrollment for 1945-46 was 4,630, and 904 for the summer school of 1945. There are 511 officers and teachers on the staff. The value of the endowment is over \$47,000,000, and the value of the plant and equipment is over \$31,000,000.

Resolutions Concerning Race Relations Day

Paine College at Augusta, Georgia, represents the historic efforts of the former Methodist Episcopal Church, South, in helping to provide leaders for the Negro people. Throughout its long history it has served this purpose in a most interesting and constructive way. It is continuing to do this under the difficult conditions prevailing at the present time, serving not only as a training center but also as a laboratory of better relations between the white and colored people.

The work at Paine College is related to the Methodist Church through the Board of Missions and Church Extension. It is also listed as one of the institutions by the General Board of Education of the Methodist Church to receive funds secured through the observance of Race Relations Day. By agreement with this board, Paine College is to cultivate the North Carolina Conference and, if the Conference approves, receive the offerings raised on this day.

Now, therefore, Be it resolved by the Board of Education of the North Carolina Conference that we urge the pastors of this Conference to observe Race Relations Day, February ninth next, and wherever possible take a voluntary offering for Negro work; and, further, that the Conference Treasurer in reporting these offerings to the Treasurer of the General Board of Education at Nashville ask that they be directed to the work at Paine College.

Appointments Recommended

We recommend the confirmation and appointment of Rev. J. G. Phillips to succeed himself as Executive Secretary of the Board of Education and Director of Youth Work; Rev. LaFon C. Vereen to succeed himself as Associate Director of Youth Work and Camp Director. We announce the employment of Rev. Troy Barrett to give part-time service as Assistant to the Executive Secretary, the continuing service of Miss Evelyn Cline as Office Manager-Secretary and Director of the Methodist Youth Fund, and Major W. A. Graham as Director of Adult Work, without salary.

"That an amount equal to 13% of the salaries paid to all pastors and their clerical assistants who are members of the North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Church, be assessed against all charges of the said Conference; the 12½% portion of such funds to be sent to the Conference Treasurer who shall administer same as provided by the Discipline; that the ½ of 1% portion of such funds be sent to the Conference Treasurer to be remitted by him to the Board of Pensions of The Methodist Church of the Missouri Corporation "for the divided annuity fund.

REPORT NO. 3—BOARD OF CONFERENCE CLAIMANTS

Be it resolved: That the plan for the Ministers' Retirement Fund as it appears on pages 76-78 in the 1937 Journal and on page 61 in the 1940 Journal, and on page 67 in the 1942 Journal be amended as follows:

1. Pay \$100 additional benefit to those retiring each year provided receipts for that year are sufficient to pay this additional benefit without going into the reserve fund.

2. If after paying the \$100 additional benefit provided for in section 1, additional funds collected during the current year remain, these funds shall be divided in an equal amount and credited to the benefit of those who have been participating members from the beginning of the fund and/or those who have been participating members for ten years or longer. These dividends shall be paid to the beneficiary upon the death or retirement of a participating member. These dividends shall be invested and any income from the investment shall be applied to the General Reserve Fund.

3. Beginning with Conference year 1946-47, supplies may become participating members in this fund by paying annually an amount equal to one per cent of salary received on the following basis:

a. If within five years of becoming a participating member and he is not given work, a supply shall be paid the amount he has paid into the fund plus one half the amount the charges he served paid to the fund during his years as pastor.

b. If a supply has served five years but less than ten years since becoming a participating member and is not given work, he shall be paid the amount he has paid into the fund plus the total amount the charges he served paid to the fund during his years as pastor.

c. Supplies who have served ten years or more may become participating members on the same basis as members of the Conference beginning with Conference year 1946-47 as though they were admitted in full connection as of Conference 1946, provided that this provision shall be retroactive upon the payment of an amount equal to one per cent of total salaries he received since the beginning of this fund. This payment must be made before the end of Conference year 1946-47.

d. The provisions contained in this section shall apply only to those supplies giving full time service to the ministry which shall be certified to the Financial Secretary in writing by his District Superintendent.

REPORT NO. 1—THE BOARD OF HOSPITALS AND HOMES

Section I

Your Board of Hospitals and Homes begs to present to you its plan and its objectives touching our Retirement Homes movement and to recommend your adoption of both plan and objectives, which include the following:

1. A community of Retirement Homes which shall be composed of: (a) Cottage homes for couples able to operate them; (b) a Central Home for disabled couples, the widowed, and the unmarried; (c) an Infirmary for nursing cases and minor sicknesses.

2. The building of this Community of Homes where suitable lands suitably situated can be obtained.

3. The glad acceptance of homes, lands, and other properties anywhere offered us.

4. Priority in service to our homeless retired preachers and their wives and widows.

5. The extension of these services to retired laymen as rapidly as our facilities increase beyond the "priority" provision just stated, and

6. That all persons be assured that the North Carolina Conference proposes steadfast and continuous support of this plan and these objectives.

That funds may be secured for building a sufficient number of cottage homes to meet the present pressing needs, and in order that long-view preliminary planning may be done it is further recommended:

1. That every district of this conference be requested to seek voluntarily to secure funds for the building of one or more cottage homes during each of the next two Conference years, with the laymen leading in this work.

2. That this Conference now in session go on record as requesting our 1948 Conference session and all who have to do with preparing the program of activities for our next official quadrennium, that priority therein be given to the building of our central home and our infirmary.

Section II—The Methodist Orphanage

Your Methodist Orphanage, under the guidance of Superintendent A. S. Barnes and an efficient staff, continues to provide for its 285 children a full service of home-like care, spiritual guidance, adequate educational opportunity and suitable physical and recreational facilities.

Your Board of Hospitals and Homes makes the following recommendations:

1. That the Rev. A. S. Barnes continue as Superintendent at an annual salary of \$4,000, having been duly elected by the Board of Trustees of the Methodist Orphanage.

2. That each fifth Sunday be used for a special emphasis upon the work of the Methodist Orphanage and that an offering be made each fifth Sunday to be applied on the regular Orphanage apportionment.

3. That as much of the apportionment as possible be raised early in the Conference year, preferably at the Thanksgiving season.

4. That the apportionment remain as of last year, but, in view of the increased cost of living, that this apportionment be accepted as a minimum asking. We encourage our churches to go the "second mile" during this period of advanced living costs.

Section III—The Golden Cross

Through a liberalized plan, the work of the Golden Cross has been greatly expanded. Patients may receive aid at hospitals of their choice, provided such aid is first approved by the District Committee on Hospitalization. However, only Duke Hospital and Tayloe Hospital, Washington, offer complete service for the price of ward fees.

We recommend:

1. That Dr. F. S. Alridge be continued as Conference Director of Golden Cross.

2. That Mrs. D. S. Coltrane of Raleigh be treasurer of Golden Cross, and that suitable and adequate bond be provided.

3. That the treasurer of Golden Cross pay all bills by check; that all bills for hospitalization must be approved and countersigned by a district committee on hospitalization before payment is made; that hospital bills be sent to Golden Cross treasurer.

4. That our program of cultivation be continued and intensified, with special emphasis upon the use of Mothers' Day for making an offering for Golden Cross.

Section IV—Organization

Your Board of Hospitals and Homes recommends:

1. That the Bishop of this area shall be ex-officio a member of the Board of Trustees of The Methodist Retirement Homes, Inc.

2. That Mr. C. C. Davis, of Wilmington, be appointed on the "at large" group of the Board of Trustees in place of Mr. Willis Aldridge, resigned, and that the Bishop's cabinet fill other vacancies now existing in representatives from some of the districts.

REPORT II—BOARD OF HOSPITALS AND HOMES

We recommend that the budget of the Board of Hospitals and Homes for the year of 1946-47 shall be \$4,800, such sum to be provided by the Golden Cross Fund.

This budget shall be prorated as follows: Salary of Executive Secretary, \$3,000; House allowance, \$600; Travel and Promotional Expense, \$1,200.

We recommend the reappointment of the Rev. W. V. McRae as Executive Secretary.

REPORT 1—BOARD OF EVANGELISM

God has crowned with success the efforts of the people called Methodists during the Year of Evangelism. In the general church there are 175 districts yet to make their report to the General Board of Evangelism. Reports already in show that 8 Areas, 41 conferences, and 198 districts have gone beyond their goal for additions on profession of faith. More than 900,000 persons have been received into the Methodist Church in America during the year. There are now 680 new or reopened churches.

In our Conference during the Year of Evangelism 375 revivals have been held; 271 churches have put on Visitation Evangelism programs; 6,354 persons have been received on profession of faith; 7,424 persons have been received by transfer (a total of 13,778); 6 new churches have been organized, and 2 abandoned churches have been reopened.

These facts bring great rejoicing to our hearts, and yet the task is not done. There are thousands who are still in "the paths of sin." The Year of Evangelism is only the beginning. The Methodist Church must become a great evangelistic movement. John Wesley's slogan must be ours: Every preacher an evangelist; every church member a witnessing member; every church an evangelistic center.

Educational evangelism is the ageless challenge of the church. The gospel can be fully actualized in personal character only through educational evangelism. It is through the learning process that Christian ideals are most effectively received and by the same process they become habits of character. The work of the teacher as the constant evangelistic agency of the local church must be kept in proper focus. Temporary movements are no substitute for the constant ministry of evangelism through Christian education. To this end

The Board of Evangelism joins heartily with our Board of Education in the work of teaching the gospel to the total membership in the local church. We anticipate with keen delight the fine educational features to be projected by the Board of Lay Activities during the emphasis on stewardship.

Your Board of Evangelism makes the following recommendations:

1. That the purposes and plans for the Year of Evangelism be continued.
2. Each district adopt an evangelistic goal of as many persons for Christ and the Church for the Year of Stewardship as we did for the Year of Evangelism.
3. Every method of evangelism—educational, public, visitation, and personal—be used throughout our conference so that we may win a maximum of souls to Christ and for God's Kingdom.
4. The use of the non-resident card exchange now being used to reclaim non-resident members be continued.
5. Our conference give serious attention to the evangelistic opportunity and responsibility among youth and in rural and industrial areas.
6. The district superintendents and district directors of evangelism put on a school of evangelism in their respective districts and that every effort be made to help all ministers within the district to become more worthy agents in the hand of God for the redemption of man and society.
7. Every effort be made to enlist the enthusiastic devotion of laymen in the evangelistic task.
8. We give enthusiastic endorsement and whole-hearted support to the Year of Stewardship.
9. All pastors familiarize themselves with and use freely all the evangelistic materials coming from the Board of Education, and that the publications of the Board of Evangelism be given whole-hearted promotion.
10. Use all feasible methods for assimilating new members.

REPORT NO. 1—COMMITTEE ON WORLD PEACE

Certainly in no area of its leadership has the Federal Council of Churches rendered more conspicuous and more effective service than in the cause of world peace. This nation, as well as all nations, is under great debt to the Council for its efforts to promote discussion and for its guidance in pointing the way to the establishment of enduring peace. Its insistence upon the dignity and worth of the common man, upon his rights and responsibilities, and upon the unity of all mankind as the principles upon which the peace must be based cannot be evaded. This sound philosophy of peace, however, can never be established without the aid of the local church. The committee on world peace, therefore, takes this occasion to present some practical ways in which the local church may follow the principles which give us hope for lasting peace.

It must be recognized that understanding is a basic requirement of world peace. Inquiry, experiment and fellowship are essential to good understanding. Understanding must begin with those about us—all classes, races and groups. The local church can bring about better understanding by interracial meetings, by arranging for useful services among different groups and races, and by encouraging the appointment of occasions upon which the entire community may be led to acknowledge God in suitable acts of worship.

Again, the church can insist upon the practice of fellowship among the various denominational groups in the community. Study groups and forums that cross denominational lines, projects in community service, spiritual adventuring in winning souls to Christ, festivals of worship, and other methods of creative association may be employed. Moreover, a willingness to co-operate with the government in matters that seem to be in harmony with the ideals of the church is recommended. We urge upon every Christian to pray unceasingly and to give himself unstintedly to the cause of world peace.

In view of the seriousness of these times and the urgency of lifting up the cause of world peace to our people, the committee on World Peace strongly recommends that this Conference go on record as approving that a period be given to the cause of world peace at the District Conferences next spring; and that an evening hour be given at the Annual Conference next fall in which this cause may be presented.

REPORT NO. 2—COMMITTEE ON WORLD PEACE

During World War II many thousands of Methodist young men and women answered the call of country to serve in the armed forces of the nation. About a thousand Methodist young men felt that they could not conscientiously bear arms and, through a program sponsored by the government and the churches, were assigned to work of national importance under civilian direction. These men received no pay. Instead, they were required to pay \$30.00 per month if they were assigned to Civilian Public Service camps and five dollars per month if they were placed on special projects. The three historic peace churches—Friends, Mennonites and Brethren—assumed the responsibility for the financial support of all conscientious objectors. The Methodist Church has aided, but has in no way met the cost of maintaining all Methodist men who were given conscientious objector status. Eight Methodists from the bounds of this Conference were given such a status, and through small annual appropriations from the Commission on World Service and Finance and through contributions by interested ministers and laymen, together with free-will offerings at the Annual Conferences, more than \$3,000 have been raised for their support. There is still an indebtedness of approximately \$450.00 outstanding. This is a moral obligation. The Methodist Church cannot afford to leave this responsibility to

three small denominations whose total membership number only about 400,000. Therefore, the Committee on World Peace earnestly requests the President of this Conference to call for a free-will offering at this time which may be used to help liquidate this moral obligation. To pay this full amount is more urgent in view of the fact that virtually all of the money received by the three churches which assumed financial responsibility for the support of the conscientious objects for this cause is being used for overseas relief.

REPORT OF BOARD OF TEMPERANCE

WHEREAS, the use of intoxicating liquors is admitted universally to be hurtful, both to the persons who use the same and to society generally;

WHEREAS, the legalization of beer throughout North Carolina and the establishment of liquor stores in 26 counties in our state have increased drinking, drunkenness and all of the other evils that accompany the liquor traffic, and,

WHEREAS, the Methodist Church always has been and still is opposed to the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors and opposed to the legalization of the nefarious business;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED: By the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Church, assembled in Henderson, North Carolina, on this 9th day of November, 1946, as follows:

1. That we are chagrined by the fact that the 26 counties in North Carolina, in which liquor stores are being operated, are all within the confines of our Conference.

2. That we reaffirm our endorsement of the Allied Church League that has been organized by the churches of North Carolina for the purpose of combating the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors; that we recommend to the 1946 session of our Annual Conference that \$3,000.00 be appropriated to aid in supporting the work of the Allied Church League; and that all pastors and other church leaders and church members throughout our Conference give full cooperation and support to the program and work of the Allied Church League.

3. That, since the purpose of advertising the sale of any merchandise is to increase the sale of the same, we appeal to the owners and publishers of newspapers and other publications, published in North Carolina, to refrain from publishing advertisements of beer, wine and whiskey; and we urge the General Assembly of North Carolina to enact a statute to prohibit the advertisement of beer, wine and whiskey in all newspapers and other publications, published in North Carolina.

4. That we urge the General Assembly of 1947 to enact statutes to prohibit in North Carolina the manufacture, transportation and sale of beer, wine, whiskey and all other intoxicating liquors; and, if the General Assembly is unwilling to outlaw the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors, we urge the General Assembly at least to give the people of our state the privilege of voting in a state-wide referendum for or against the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors.

5. That in order to aid in the development of sentiment against the liquor traffic, we urge that the instruction in our public schools and in our church schools relative to the harmful effect of alcohol be made as effective as possible; that our pastors preach often in behalf of total abstinence; that each year the subject of temperance be allotted a place in the program of our Annual Conference; that each year the subject of temperance be allotted an adequate place in the program of the annual meeting of each District Conference; that we call on all churches and pastors to observe the first Sunday in June, 1947, as Temperance Sunday and that each pastor preach a temperance sermon during the morning service on this date; and that we ask the presiding Bishop of our

Conference and all of our district superintendents to cooperate to the end that Temperance Day on the first Sunday in June might be made as effective and helpful as possible.

6. That, while we welcome all movements and organizations that are working against the manufacture, sale and use of intoxicating liquors, we are alarmed by the fact that some of these movements are approving and promoting the idea of so-called "moderation" in drinking. Such an attitude or idea is misleading and dangerous. All addicts of alcohol began as moderate drinkers; and, since alcoholic beverages are habit forming, it is dangerous for any person to delude himself with the idea of drinking in moderation. We urge that our churches, our church schools, our public schools and all other institutions teach that the individual should abstain completely from drinking beer, wine and whiskey, and that our government should prohibit the manufacture and sale of these intoxicating liquors. Our position and program with respect to beer, wine and whiskey should be total abstinence by the individual and absolute prohibition by our government.

7. That we beseech all pastors and other church officers that they do not recommend or approve for membership on the board of stewards, for service as an officer or teacher in the Church School, or for official position in any phase of church life, any person who drinks alcoholic beverages, advertises it, manufactures it, sells it, advocates its sale, or in any other way seeks to promote the liquor traffic.

This corporation, the property of both the North Carolina and Western North Carolina Conferences, has assets consisting of a building located on West Gaston Street, Greensboro, North Carolina, the land on which it is situated, together with machinery, furniture, and equipment, and an endowment fund. The land and building, about nineteen years old, originally cost \$92,000.00. The building is in good condition. The machinery is old and needs replacements and additions. The net worth of the corporation excluding its endowment fund is estimated at \$76,527.49. The Endowment Fund which is now managed by the Executive Committee of the Board through the fiscal agency of the Wachovia Bank and Trust Company of Winston-Salem, had a book value of \$55,650.71 on June 18, 1946, when it was audited. During the past year the endowment fund earned a net income of \$5,194.17, including a non-repeating profit from sale of real estate of \$4,435.51. Previously earned income from the endowment fund appropriated to operations during the year amounted to \$2,253.97.

The main business of the corporation is the publication of the North Carolina Christian Advocate. This official organ of the two conferences, a weekly 24-page news magazine, has a total circulation of 11,300, of which about 1,000 copies go to pastors and conference claimants free of charge. This circulation is far too small to serve adequately the purposes of the paper, and is insufficient under

present conditions to sustain its publication in its present form. Income from advertising is limited, and despite an unusually good year's business in the commercial and job printing department, the operation of the board for the year closing August 31, 1946, resulted in a net loss of \$630.35, after taking depreciation amounting to \$1,601.61.

With unusual income from the endowment fund due to a non-repeating profit derived during the year from sale of real estate, the corporation faces the new year in a sound financial condition. It makes no request for appropriations. For the coming year, however, the understanding and active support of pastors and laymen will be required if the North Carolina Christian Advocate is to reach the circulation and endowment goals necessary to make possible the continuation of its essential services without loss.

Because paper continues to be scarce and increasingly expensive, because necessary wage adjustments have had to be made, and because repairs, replacements, and improvements in equipment cannot be postponed much longer, the corporation faces cost increases of several thousand dollars during the coming year without assurance of corresponding increases in income. To avoid incurring indebtedness during this emergency period, the board has decided that while the subscription price of the North Carolina Christian Advocate is to remain at \$2.00 per year, and that its standards of quality is to be improved if possible, certain changes in size and form shall be made in the interest of economy. The number of pages in the paper are to be reduced from 24 to 16 per week for the year beginning January 1, 1947, and such changes are to be made in type and lay-out as may be necessary to take care of the essential news and promotion of Conference programs in the reduced space. This change will make possible a much larger circulation on our present allotment of paper, as well as a reduction of expense estimated at about 20% of the cost of publication. Furthermore, the following recommendations are made to the two conferences with the earnest plea that they may not only be adopted, but that they may be carried out:

1. That the Conference set as the goal for each district and pastoral charge an increase of 100% in circulation during the Conference year. Instead of approximately 3.2% of our active membership being subscribers as at present, this would mean about 6.4%. If all the officers in the local church were subscribers, the goal would be surpassed. For the North Carolina Conference it is suggested that goals of 5,000 new and 4,000 renewal subscriptions be distributed to the charges by the district superintendents.

2. That the Conferences accept as a responsibility of raising during the coming year the already adopted goal for the Advocate Endowment Fund. Many charges have already sent in the full amount which is their share, a sum equal to five per cent of the amount paid the pastor as shown in the Conference Minutes of 1944.

3. That in order to encourage pastors and laymen in the local churches to reach these goals, each charge be asked to set apart one month during the year as Advocate Month, during which intensive effort shall be made on behalf of the circulation and endowment of the North Carolina Christian Advocate. It is suggested that during Advocate Month in any charge which shall secure a total number of new and renewal subscriptions equal to 10% of the number of active members reported in the Minutes of 1946 and which shall have raised its endowment goal in full, a special club rate of \$1.50 for new subscriptions and renewals secured during the month shall be offered. This is not to be regarded as a reduction in the price of the paper, nor is the special price to be accepted for a year's subscription or renewal except during Advocate Month in charges which meet the conditions named. It is to be a special inducement to churches fully cooperating in the drive for a double circulation and a fully paid endowment fund. The payment of the endowment fund quota during some previous year shall be counted as meeting that condition. Subscriptions shall be for a full year, renewals being paid during Advocate Month, regardless of time of expira-

tion, in order to be eligible for the special rate. For the North Carolina Conference, it is recommended that Advocate Month be held in January.

4. That the Conference commend the practice of certain forward looking churches in both Conferences in sending a six months' gift subscription to the family of each new member enrolled in the church; and suggest that the practice be generally adopted and provided for in the church's budget. It will not only help the Advocate, but will give guidance and information to new members of the church.

Mr. Irvin Morgan, Jr., has resigned as a member of the board and Mr. John N. Hackney of Wilson, North Carolina, has been elected to fill out the remainder of his term which expires in September, 1949. The terms of Dr. A. J. Hobbs and W. B. Hall expired with the last meeting of the board, and we respectfully request the North Carolina Conference to elect Dr. A. J. Hobbs for a five year term, and the Western North Carolina Conference to elect Mr. W. B. Hall for a five year term.

Dr. H. C. Sprinkle, Jr., was re-elected Editor of the North Carolina Christian Advocate, and we hereby request Bishop Purcell to appoint him to that position at this session of Western North Carolina Conference. We feel that he has given us a most excellent paper during the first year of his editorship. We bespeak the hearty cooperation of the membership and ministry of both Conferences.

REPORT OF THE WESLEY FOUNDATION COMMISSION

The student work sponsored by the Wesley Foundation Commission of the two Annual Conferences in North Carolina begins its second year with three full time directors serving at Greensboro, Chapel Hill and Raleigh.

Miss Louise Panigot continues as Wesley Foundation Director at College Place Church serving the Methodist students at the Womans college of the University of North Carolina. She is also serving without salary as Director of the Methodist Student Movement in the state of North Carolina. W.C., U.N.C. is crowded with a great post-war student body. The Wesley Foundation Program there continues to be one of the best in the nation.

The Methodist students at State College in Raleigh are served by the Wesley Foundation program of which Rev. John W. Ham is director, beginning his second year. Fairmont Church and Mr. Ham have a big job to do with the post-war student body at State College running up to 5,000 students. This is almost twice the normal student body.

At Chapel Hill also there is a student group far beyond any previous record in enrollment. There are as many Methodist students there as formerly would have been thought of as making quite a large college. Rev. John Robert Nelson is on duty as a new Wesley Foundation Director. He is a graduate of the Yale Divinity School and has just concluded his service in the Navy as a chaplain. Arrangements are proceeding well for repairs to the church building and for some remodeling to make the Chapel Hill Church better suited to the activities of the student group.

There are some of the smaller colleges in our state where support is needed yet where there is not now an organized program in the nature of a Wesley Foundation. The Wesley Foundation Commission has voted to supply the normal amount of \$50.00 to be used by the pastors serving the students in these schools as a discretionary fund for help with student activities. Further assistance will not likely be possible until the commission receives a larger annual income.

The Wesley Foundation Commission recommends to the Annual Conference that it continue its loyal support and prayers on behalf of the Methodist students being served by this agency.

The annual financial statement of the Treasurer, J. G. Phillips, and the statement of the auditor are attached to this report and submitted to the Annual Conference for printing in the Journal.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON TOWN AND COUNTRY WORK

The Town and Country Commission recommends that the Conference adopt the following policy, with provision for its implementation as herein stated.

I—Policy

1. We recognize the fact that the rural areas are the fountain heads of resources in terms of leadership, population, religious and economic life, and that many of these areas are now suffering religious and cultural depletion.
2. This fact calls for an awakened church consciousness of the significance of the rural community, issuing in a growing statesmanship and strategy that will develop religious institutions adequate to create and conserve the religious and cultural values in rural community life.

II—Research

1. A study of birth-rate and population trends.
2. A map of abandoned and declining rural churches.
3. Discovery and charting of unchurched areas.
4. A study of rural culture patterns:
 - a. Absentee ownership of farms.
 - b. Tenancy.
 - c. Tenant migration.
5. A study of the Roman Catholic Expansion program.
6. A study of government area planning.

III—Strategy

We favor the appointment of a full-time Director of Town and Country Work at the earliest possible date, whose responsibility will be to:

- a. Promote Conference and district rural life institutes.
- b. Work in conjunction with the General Board of Missions and Church Extension, the Conference Board of Missions and Church Extension, the Duke En-

dowment, and the Conference Woman's Division of Christian Service, in establishing pioneer rural church projects.

c. Work in conjunction with the Conference Board of Education, the Conference Board of Lay Activities, and the Conference Board of Evangelism.

d. Work in conjunction with federal and state rural life agencies.

e. Organize and develop rural mission societies.

f. Give special attention to the development of strong parishes in predominantly tenant communities.

g. Counsel with pastors and congregations in reference to the erecting and remodeling church buildings.

IV—Church Extension

The Director of Town and Country Work will co-operate with the Bishop and district superintendents and with the proper church agencies in an aggressive program of rural church extension.

JAMES A. DAILEY**By H. C. Smith**

James A. Dailey was born in the northern part of Alamance County, North Carolina, May 23, 1868. He died in Duke Hospital with a heart attack November 18, 1945. He joined the North Carolina Conference at Raleigh in 1897. He organized and served a little church in east Burlington which is now our splendid Webb Avenue church. His other appointments were East Durham, Hamlet, St. Paul, Scotland Neck, West Durham, Carthage, Person Circuit, Pittsboro, Middleburg, North Gates, Newton Grove, Clark Street, Fremont, and Jenkins Memorial in Raleigh. After forty-three years of faithful service he retired in 1940.

Dr. E. B. Chappell once said that he had made it a practice to find out from successful men and women what influences contributed most to making them what they were. He found that the per cent who attributed what they were to the influences of a Christian home were so large that he wondered if anything else mattered. Brother Dailey came from a Christian home. In fact the Daileys around old Prospect Church were among that hard working, God fearing people who made this country what it is. They were the salt of the earth, that power that keeps society from decay.

With that back ground and with such influences about him it was just the natural thing for him to become a Christian and join the church. Nor could it have been much of a surprise when James A. Dailey let it be known that he was going to enter the ministry of his church. It was atmosphere like that which produced preachers. It is still so.

In 1897 he was married to Miss Matilda Howland of Graham. There were three children, two of whom with Mrs. Dailey preceded our brother to the better world. Alma, now Mrs. Edwin H. Forbes, lives in Tucson, Arizona, where she went some years ago for her health. She has suffered with asthma from a child. Brother Dailey spent a good deal of his time with her after his retirement. His devotion to his family was beautiful, he lived for their comfort and happiness.

Brother Dailey had a jolly disposition that made him very popular as a pastor. Old and young looked forward to his visits. He never saw a stranger and had a good word for every one. As a preacher he was perhaps at his best when in a revival. He had a great gift as an exhorter. I have helped him in meetings and he could get folks to make a decision when all my efforts had failed. Thousands of men and women made their first step toward becoming a Christian at the urgent pleas of that good man.

He suffered a great deal during his last days with heart trouble and other ailments due to age. He must have seen many lonely days too with all the family gone but one and being far from her. But he kept his faith. I saw him in the hospital and he said he was all right. We shall miss him at the Conferences. Brothers L. C. Larkin and J. J. Boone conducted his funeral in Front Street Church, and we laid his body to rest in the cemetery in Burlington.

CORNELIUS BLACKMAN CULBRETHBy **W. V. McRae**

August 14, 1876—January 1, 1946.

“His life was gentle,
And the elements so mixed in him,
That Nature might stand up
And say to all the world
“This was a man!””

I write these lines as one who knows that they apply to Neal Culbreth. More than forty years have seen the growth, seasoning and ripening of our friendship, which began in 1903 when he and I went up to the Park School as seniors, and then over to the College for four years more of student life together.

Neal was born of Daniel B. and Emma V. Spearman Culbreth in Cumberland County. At seventeen he became a Texas cowboy. But the heavenly Father had other plans for him than riding the range. At 21 in a little log meeting house at a night service he was converted, his sins were taken away, and he entered upon a new life of companionship with the Lord Christ. And even as he entered upon his life in Christ Jesus the conviction was there that he was called to tell to all his world—“The old, old story of Jesus and His love.” And this story he lived and sang and preached for nearly fifty years. Then one day as he journeyed he came near a gate. For a few minutes he stood nearby and then the portals opened, and he entered. And now he is forever with the Lord his Redeemer and Saviour.

Neal Culbreth was pure gold. Aye, that and more than that! He was gentle with a great strength, for he had the rugged strength of the Scottish hills of his ancestors, and he had the gentleness that came of being bred of a woman of that graceful gentleness that only a gentle woman can possess.

In 1917 he was married, where gentleness was again native, to Miss Georgia K. Slough of Abingdon, Illinois. To them were born four children: Capt. George Gordon, M.D., M.C., U. S. A.; Lieut. Howard Cranford, U. S. N.; Mrs. James M. Leach; and Helen, now a Sophomore in W.C., U.N.C. These are such children as are an honor to their parents—such children as only gifted and gracious parents can rear.

For Neal Culbreth the call to preach was a call to prepare. Though an adult when converted, he refused to be an illiterate. Donaldson Academy, the Park School, Trinity College, and Vanderbilt University, and again Trinity College, saw him ever striving forward and onward and upward. Great teachers he had. Mims, Few, Flowers, Cranford, Kilgo, Dean Tillett, O. E. Brown, Carre and others served his inquiring mind. Nor did his studies cease with days of graduation. He ever continued his reading and his industrious seeking after truth.

Neal was a clean man. In all our more than forty years together I recall no bitter reproaches, no profane word, no obscene jest ever being uttered by him. His words and his deeds were wholesome and

helpful. His life was truly spent in service joyously given to others—to his parents, to his sister and brothers, to his own family, to his parishioners, and to any soul whose path crossed his.

When the blessed summons came he was doubly prepared. He was prepared even for the New Year's service. His notes were found. They were based on the words "Behold, I make all things new." But above that he was prepared by the Lord the Spirit for the call, "Come up higher, thou good and faithful servant, and enter thou into the joys of the Lord."

We who remain here are the ones who mourn his going and cry within ourselves,

"Oh for the touch of a vanished hand,
And the sound of a voice that is still."

As we wait here we think again of Bunyan's words concerning the arrival of Hopeful and Christian at the Beautiful Gate:

• "Now I saw in my dreams that these two men went in at the gate . . . Then I heard in my dream that all the bells in the city rang again for joy . . . I looked in after them . . . and after that they shut up the gates; which, when I had seen, I wished myself among them."

Funeral services were conducted at Benson Church. Burial was in the cemetery at Dunn.

At his funeral Rev. J. M. Culbreth, a kinsman spoke beautiful words of tribute, closing with the following,

"We feel no qualm of fear for him today as we stand on the brink of the vast Silence into which he has entered, and strain our ears to catch an echo of the voice we loved, chanting his seasoned faith in the presence of the angel harvesters:

'I have but Thee, my Father, let Thy spirit
Be with me then to comfort and uphold;
No gate of pearl, no branch of palm I merit,
Nor street of shining gold.

Suffice it if, my good and ill unreckoned,
And both forgiven through Thy abounding grace,
I find myself by hands familiar beckoned
Unto my fitting place.

Some humble door Thy many mansions,
Some sheltering shade where sin and striving cease,
And flows for ever through heaven's green expansions
The river of Thy peace.

There, from the music round about me stealing
I fain would learn the new and holy song,
And find at last beneath Thy trees of healing
The life for which I long.'"

EDWIN C. GLENN**By C. D. Barclift**

Edwin C. Glenn, son of Sampson B. and Hannah Moss Glenn, was born April 3, 1858, near Asheboro, N. C.

He was twice married; first, to Miss Mamie Cherry, Greenville, N. C., and, second, to Miss Fannie Hines, Milton, N. C., who survives him. There were no children given to either union.

He died at his home in Greensboro, N. C. on January 13, 1946. The funeral service was conducted by Dr. E. H. Nease, Dr. A. W. Plyler, and Dr. S. B. Turrentine, and interment was in Green Hill Cemetery in Greensboro

Responding to Christ's call to preach the Gospel of redemption and release, Brother Glenn went to the Moody Bible Institute, Chicago, Ill., for preparation for his life's work. In 1888 he was admitted on trial in the North Carolina Annual Conference at New Bern, N. C. He was ordained a deacon in 1890 and an elder in 1892.

He served the following charges: Greenville Circuit; Elm City; Princeton Circuit; Morehead City; Central Church, Raleigh. He then served twelve years as conference evangelist. Returning to the pastorate, he served Fairfield; Oriental; Faison and Warsaw; Webb Avenue, Burlington; and South Rocky Mount, from which pastorate he retired in 1923.

Brother Glenn was a good pastor and greatly loved by his people, but his most fruitful work was in the evangelistic field. He was a successful winner of souls. His brethren sought his services often for revival meetings. So much so that he served our conference as full-time evangelist for twelve years. As a result of his winsome telling the old story of Jesus and His love, thousands were born into the Kingdom and added to the Church.

When the writer was a lad in his early teens, Brother Glenn held a revival meeting at New Hope Methodist Church, on the Perquimans Charge. At the close of the meeting over one hundred, both young and old, stood around the altar to receive Christian Baptism and to take the vows of church membership. Brother Glenn said that from that group there should come a preacher. Little did the writer think that the mantle could fall on him. But the Spirit of God worked and led to that end, and in 1925, two years after Brother Glenn's retirement, the writer was admitted on trial in his conference. Thus the love and labors of Brother Glenn continue to bear fruit and will so do as others go to work and labor in our Master's vineyard.

Whether during the twenty three years in the pastorate, the twelve years as conference evangelist, or the twenty three years as a retired minister, his life was a blessing and benediction wherever he was. So when the final summons came, he was ready to leave his home near the Greensboro College campus, whose students' lives had been inspired and enriched by his presence, and to enter the "house not made with hands." Doubtless, he could speak of his Home-going in these words written by Studdert Kennedy:

So I looked up to God,
And while I held my Breath
I saw Him slowly nod,
And knew—as I had never known aught else,
With certainty sublime and passionate,
Shot through and through
With sheer unutterable bliss,
I knew
There was no death but this,
God's kiss,
And the the waking to an Everlasting Love.

R. R. GRANT

Rufus Rhodes Grant, son of Adbeal and Henrietta Beale Grant, was born in the Rehobeth community of Northampton County October 13, 1871. He lived a useful life of seventy-four years.

He grew to manhood on the parental farm under the wholesome religious influence of godly parents. He enjoyed the benefits and freedom of the farm, and had the fellowship of six brothers and one sister. The routine of rural life aided the development of the strong, sturdy character which was reflected in the life of Brother Grant in an abundant harvest of religious and social service. In his early youth he united with the Rehobeth Methodist Church and took an active part in its services. He attended the common county school which at that time gave only meager educational advantages. In the year of 1894 he entered Trinity College, now Duke University, and was there through 1898. In the fall of 1899 he became a member of the North Carolina Conference and for forty years served continuously as a minister of the North Carolina Conference, retiring from active service in 1939. The greater part of his ministry was in the eastern and costal sections of the Conference.

With few exceptions, Brother Grant held his appointments for four years. His uncomplaining and affable disposition, his friendly personality and unwavering fidelity to his chosen field of service endeared him to hosts of Christians in the various appointments he held during his life as a Christian minister.

Brother Grant's first marriage was to Laura Elizabeth Carter, of Fairfield, North Carolina, June 17, 1903. She died September 3, 1926. His second marriage was to Mrs. Maude Dawson Spencer, of Fairfield, North Carolina, September 9, 1935.

The last appointment held by Brother Grant was Manteo, and he took the Superannuate relation at the Conference of 1939 which was held in Fayetteville. Declining health, progressive over a period of five years, was climaxed by an attack of pneumonia which brought him to a peaceful death on February 23, 1946, in a hospital at Columbia, North Carolina, while surrounded by those who loved him and whom he loved with a never fading devotion.

Surviving are his three daughters by his first marriage, Etta Beale Grant, Mrs. Elizabeth Carter Lawrence and Mrs. Minnie Spencer Grant; his second wife, Mrs. Maude Dawson Grant, and one stepson, Flave Spencer.

Funeral services were conducted from the Fairfield Methodist Church by the pastor, Rev. J. C. Chaffin, assisted by a former pastor, Rev. C. W. Guthrie. Interment was in the family plot in the Fairfield cemetery. Hosts of friends sent beautiful designs of flowers which were but silent reminders that a useful, Godly life on earth had ended

WILLIAM TOWE

Rev. William Towe, one of the most beloved members of the North Carolina Conference, died at his home in Rocky Mount on the night of May 28, 1946. The funeral was conducted by T. M. Grant, assisted by E. L. Hillman and J. K. Bostick.

Brother Towe was born in Elizabeth City, July 15, 1865; was married to Miss Katherine Crawford November 30, 1887. Mrs Towe died in 1942. Seven children came into the home and all of them survive. They are Robert Leslie, Roanoke Rapids, N. C.; Kenneth Crawford, Greenwich, Conn.; William Thompson, Atlanta, Ga.; Sara Elliot, Rocky Mount, N. C.; Mrs. H. R. Parker, Greensboro, N. C.; Frances Alice, Rocky Mount, N. C.; and James Marvin, Rocky Mount, N. C.

In his young manhood Brother Towe spent several years teaching in the public schools of North Carolina. In 1901 he joined the North Carolina Conference at Fayetteville and served for thirty years charges in this conference in a most acceptable manner. Few men have left behind them a more wholesome and challenging influence. During my service in this conference I have met many people whose lives have been enriched because they came in contact with this good man. In numerous groups I have mentioned his name and always there have been many responses of grateful appreciation of him.

Behind his life were some simple spiritual truths that gave his life the power for good that it had. Among the number were hatred for sin, a love of men, a sparkling and refreshing sense of good humor, and a positive conviction that he was a co-laborer with God.

His abhorrence of wrong doing was clear and definite. At times in preaching his denunciation of sin had in it the power of a prophet. But his words were not anemic because his life did not support them. His living was beautifully simple but it was gloriously pure.

His fervor in the war against sin was never spoiled and weakened by an unfriendly attitude toward men. He hated sin but never the sinner. Whenever he could help men he did it with such gracious affection that men loved him and gave him a big place in their hearts.

His friendliness had an attractive way of expression in the good humor that characterized almost every act of his life. A frown seldom beclouded his countenance, but a smile frequently brightened his face

and words most often were clothed in the garments of joy and gladness.

All these things, and more, are true, but, to my mind, the dynamic of his life was the consciousness that he was a co-laborer with God. He did not do things in a small way because behind every act was the consciousness that he was working with God. To him life was charming and romantic because he worked with the mysteries of personalities together with his Father. The Christian ministry brought him many hours of distressing heartaches, as it does to every good minister of Christ, but it was all covered with a great calm joy and satisfying peace because he knew there was no work comparable to it. He was working with God.

We are glad that he lived and dwelt among us, for the world knows God better because he lived. May the Lord bless and keep his children.

WHITFORD FRANK WALTERS

Reverend Whitford Frank Walters quietly passed on to the Glory Land June 11, 1946 about two o'clock in the afternoon. He was a native of Beaufort county, the son of Mr. and Mrs. W. F. Walters. The date of his birth was Dec. 21, 1887. He attended the county schools, graduated from Ayden Seminary, was a student at Elon College two years, and finished his studies at Gainesville University, Florida. LOY VERNON HARRIS

Loy Vernon Harris, the son of G. C. Harris and Annie Ferrell Harris, was born in Montgomery County, May 2, 1899. He was educated in the school of the county, Trinity College, and Duke Divinity School. He died unexpectedly June 13, 1946, after suffering a heart attack about 1:30 that afternoon. Mr. Harris developed a very serious heart condition as a result of pneumonia suffered while in England in 1944. However, he continued his duties as Chaplain until the summer of 1945, when he was forced to give up his work. Mr. Harris had always been an active person so he found it hard to take time out. Even though physically not up to par he preached and held revivals up until the time of his death.

On the 30th of June, 1924 Brother Harris was married to Miss Elizabeth Lassiter Brookshire, also of Montgomery County, who shared with him the burdens and joys of a Methodist parsonage until his death. Of this union there were born five children: Vernon, Jerry, Marvin, Harold, and Betty Carol.

My association with Loy Harris began when we were both freshmen in college and continued until his death. We were roommates for three years and I never knew him to act in any way except as a gentleman and a Christian. In a peculiar way, I can say Loy Vernon Harris was my friend. And yet I may not claim this to the exclusion of any other, for he was a friend of every man. He had a winsome personality that drew men to him. He was a man’s man in every sense of the term. This is why he made such a good Chaplain in the army and such a good shepherd to all his people. The local paper of his home town says: “He was that type of preacher that rough men in out-of-the-way places of earth used to reverence and adore and loved to call the ‘Sky Pilot.’ Hence, he was of the most adorable and useful type of preacher, who, although thoroughly consecrated and thoroughly uncompromising with evil, yet could understand the weakness and temptations of men hardened by rough environment.” Truly, Loy Harris was the type of minister who could not only “preach from the pulpit but could preach by word and action out on the frontiers, the battle lines, and cess-pools, where preaching isn’t so easy.”

Brother Harris was a good worker in every phase of church activities, but he was first of all a preacher. Wherever he was sent he preached fervently, fearlessly, and effectively. The pulpit was his throne and he knew the Christ whom he preached. He was equal to the very best in our conference. He was primarily an evangelistic preacher, a great revivalist. He was in constant demand by his brethren in the ministry for this type of service,—and his meetings were always marked with great results.

Loy V. Harris joined the North Carolina Conference in the fall of 1924, and served faithfully as long as he lived. He was appointed as pastor of Webb Avenue Church in Burlington his junior year in college, and during his second year there the foundation for the present structure was laid. In the fall of 1925, he was appointed Extension Secretary for the Sunday School Board. After serving one year in this capacity he was appointed to Burlington Circuit in 1926, where he remained until 1931. After serving a successful pastorate in Scotland Neck from 1931 to 1933, he was appointed to serve as Chaplain for the C.C. Camps in North Carolina. After finishing his duties with the C.C. Camps, he was sent by Bishop Kern to finish the year at Main Street Church in High Point, following the death of the Reverend Mr. Moser. From 1934 to 1938 Brother Harris served Conway charge. From 1938 to 1940 he served Ahoskie. From 1940 to 1942 he served Whiteville. It was while he was pastor at Whiteville that World War II broke out. Mr. Harris had accepted a Reserve Chaplain's Commission in 1928, so he was called into service at the very beginning of the war. He served in this capacity for three and a half years, eighteen months of which were spent overseas in the European theatre. After receiving an honorable discharge from the army in December 1945 he was making his home with his family in Mount Gilead. He was looking forward to taking up his pastorate again this fall.

On hearing of the death of Brother Harris, Reverend Henry W. Dennis, pastor of a Methodist Church in Chasetown, England, wrote Mrs. Harris concerning her husband the following: "By his friendliness and geniality he won his way into the hearts of our people here, and whenever our people think of representatives of the U. S. A. they will think in terms of Chaplain Harris. Your beloved husband is symbolic of all that is best in his native land."

Loy Harris was indeed symbolic of the best in this country, and truly he was symbolic of the best in the Christian ministry. His place cannot be filled by another, but thank God his rich life of service will live on in those with whom he labored so faithfully and efficiently.

THOMAS STANLEY COBLE

The facts of a man's life can be recorded with some degree of accuracy, but his spirit of devotion and self-sacrifice is not so easily recorded. Dr. J. H. Jowett once said that a minister's best work never made the headlines. How can we tell the world how much hope a minister gave a discouraged man, or just what comfort was given a sorrowing woman?

Some of the bare facts in the life of Brother T. S. Coble follow:

He was born in Chatham County May 1, 1875, educated at Guilford College, and joined the Western North Carolina Conference in 1907. He transferred to this Conference in 1921, and retired in 1926. He served the following charges: Hickory Circuit, Maiden, Bethel, Flat Rock, Lenior Circuit, Davie, Elk Park, and Dobson. In this Conference he served Youngsville, Bath, Camden, and Hatteras. Bad health necessitated his retiring in 1926. These facts give one a very poor picture of the real life and work of this good man.

I was able to form some picture of his real service by what he did here in Durham after he retired. He had a regular appointment at the county jail. I feel sure the Master welcomed him home with the words, "I was in prison and ye visited me." We shall never know how many unfortunate men he helped in those visits to the jail. Often, too, when they had served a term on the roads he would keep up with them.

The old Methodist preacher was not a book agent, but he would see that the folks had a chance to have good literature in their homes. I recall that many of the good books in my father's home were secured from our pastor. Brother Coble felt that he was preaching when he was placing good books in the homes of the people and he kept that up as long as he could get about.

It came to my attention one Christmas that some one had sent Brother Coble \$15 for Christmas. He might have bought something for himself, but instead he found someone who needed help and gave it away. Only a good man of God would have a heart as self-sacrificing as that. It was a little thing that revealed a great soul.

Mrs. Coble was Miss Ila Elizabeth Harkey. Their children, James B., Edgar M., Thomas S., Jr., Fern, and Elizabeth are all living. Fern married George C. Culbreth, and they live in Augusta, Ga. One could wish and pray for nothing better for the family and for us all than that the fine things in this good man's life should rest upon us like a benediction.

Brother Coble passed away at his home in Durham, June 20, 1946. The funeral was conducted by Dr. J. C. Glenn and the writer in Duke Memorial Church.

CREASY KINION PROCTOR**By H. E. Spence**

The best statement with regard to the life and death of Creasy Proctor was written by himself. I have no reference to the figurative idea that men's deeds make up their obituary, or the more fanciful concept that conduct creates the most fitting epitaph. Creasy Proctor actually wrote the most characteristic thing which could have been said about him, as you will hereinafter see. His statement does not take note of the data of his birth and death, his marriage and work. Nor is there any attempt to evaluate this work. The setting forth of the first is the task of the writer of his memoir. The second has been undertaken by literally thousands of men and women in all walks of life from gardner to governor, from day laborer to university president. The first task is comparatively easy; the second is practically impossible.

However the simple narrations of the facts of Creasy Proctor's life is no small task. So great was the sphere of his influence and so wide-spread his activities that even to give the bare facts of his career would be to utilize more space than his modest soul would be willing to take as his share in this conference journal. For his life, while not long, was filled to overflowing with deeds of service.

"Creasy," as his fellow-ministers lovingly knew him, was born in Durham county, September 4, 1889. His parents were James Sydney Harris Proctor and Margaret Barbee Proctor. He came from a notable family on both sides of the house. From his earliest life he gave evidence of a high character and deep consecration.

He was educated in Trinity Park School and Trinity College. From the latter institution he received his B.A. degree in 1908. Simultaneously with his college career he took a business training at King's Business College in Raleigh. After teaching school two years he returned to Trinity College as an instructor and continued graduate work there.

In 1910 Dr. Proctor became principal of Hookerton Collegiate Institute where he taught for a year. He received the call to preach at this place and immediately began further preparation for that great task. He entered Vanderbilt University in 1911, where in addition to the regular course of instruction, he also took part in student activities and became a member of their famous "Comodore Quartet." He also studied at Union Theological Institute and Columbia University.

Creasy's first regular ministerial experience was in Oklahoma. At that time this section of the country was rather new and unsettled. Some thought of it as a place where those who had made a bad beginning in life went to "start over." Proctor delighted to tell the story on himself that one of his parishioners once said: "Come clean, Parson, what was your real name back east?" His first appointment was at Erick in the West Oklahoma Conference. In succession he served Elk City, Guthrie and Marietta. In all those places he busied himself with the Boy Scout Movement also.

In 1916 Creasy came back home to the folks he so greatly loved and served as his first charge here, the First Methodist Church of

Selma. Here again he was interested in Boy Scout work and also formed a close contact with Masonry. This perhaps was responsible for his becoming later the great leader of the Oxford Orphanage. From Selma he went to Central Church, Raleigh, and then to Kinston, where he served Queen Street Church for three years. He became pastor of First Church, Rocky Mount, in 1925, where he served until he was elected superintendent of the Oxford Orphanage in 1928.

Although he was always a successful pastor and eloquent preacher, and did not allow anything to interfere with the efficiency of his work, yet Dr. Proctor always found time to be of service in a large number of ways outside his regular ministry. His interest in the Boy Scout Movement and in Masonry has already been noted. In addition, he was a member of civic clubs, and president of several groups including the Rotarians and the Chamber of Commerce. He was in constant demand as after-dinner speaker, lecturer, preacher, promoter. He was instrumental in helping win in the temperance elections of his county. His positions and accomplishments in the Masonic Order are too numerous to recount.

Dr. Proctor was not only well-educated, but he took great interest in educational movements and was closely connected with higher institutions of learning. He was a member of the Board of Trustees of both Duke University and High Point College. He was elected to the Omicron Delta Kappa Fraternity from Duke and received the honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity from High Point. He was an influential member of the Board of Education of the North Carolina Conference and served as Treasurer of the Board for many years. He also was a high official in several orphanage organizations throughout the country.

On March 25, 1913 Creasy Proctor and Miss Mattie Culpepper, of Wilson, were united in matrimony. To this union were born two sons, Sidney Kenion and Richard Culpepper. These all survive him.

So runs the record. But the story is not told nor will it ever be completely known until the books of the Recording Angel are open to inspection, giving a true account of men's work and worth. Perhaps no one man in our generation has had more fine tributes paid to him than were paid Creasy Proctor. Never was praise more freely given, never tribute more richly deserved. Statements were made which might have sounded like fulsome flattery applied to most men: when applied to Creasy Proctor they seemed an understatement of the case. From all walks of life they sent in their messages of sympathy and praise. A perfect deluge of regrets and appreciation came from Masons of both high and low degree. Educators and statesmen, ministers and politicians, notables and men of common life, all joined in the appraisal of his work. He was called God's nobleman, a great soul, an exemplary character, a man of integrity and ability. Former governors joined in their words of high praise. University Presidents, Orphanage Superintendents, Educational Executives, all paid tribute to his influence in the educational world.

What more could be done except to multiply words and attempt "to paint the lily?" A giant has fallen in our midst. For he was great in stature as well as in heart and mind and soul. There was something overwhelming about his gentle greatness that commanded respect

and admiration wherever he went. It is doubtful if any man in our State ever knew more men from more different groups than Creasy Proctor. It is doubtful if any man ever had more friends among this wide range of acquaintances. He won and held these friends by kindly interest, thoughtfulness, genial good humor and fairness. He was a member of no faction but trusted by all. He could walk and talk freely with all types of men and yet never lose his dignity nor compromise his character. He could be friendly without familiarity, clever without coarseness, witty without slang. His was the stalwart manfulness of the knight-at-arms; the gentle graciousness of the Lady-in-Waiting.

While Dr. Proctor made a great contribution to the church life of the state, perhaps his greatest work was with the orphanage. His success there is the most distinctive tribute to his personality. He, as one expressed it, substituted reason for the rod and changed the institution into a home. There were no reformatory rooms to keep bad boys in and no padlocks to keep them out. His own personal influence created a sense of moral obligation which was the governing power of the place.

He died June 25 of a heart attack. He was buried with full Masonic rites. His funeral was conducted by the Reverend H. B. Porter, District Superintendent of the Raleigh district and the Reverend D. A. Clarke, Pastor of the Oxford Methodist Church.

Death struck him suddenly but found him ready and unafraid. The statement mentioned earlier in these memoirs shows that he, like the Apostle of old, was ready to be offered up. The statement reads:

In announcing my death—all my accounts with the Lord are settled. He in Christ has done that, and my trust is in Him. There is nothing to worry about—I'll be at home over there.'

My life's record speaks for itself—only a marker is desired at the grave—giving date of birth and date of death, and the word "Others," and a Methodist Preacher—and Superintendent Oxford Orphanage.

We could not add to the effectiveness of that statement; we would not detract therefrom.

Yes, Creasy Proctor will be at home over there. There are religious denominations which believe in an intermediate state between earth and heaven where the soul may be purged of its sins and prepared for heaven. Even if we believed that, we could not think of Creasy staying in the preparatory state long. In his ministry he fulfilled his Master's ideal which he set for himself at Nazareth: "The spirit of the Lord is upon me, for he hath appointed me to preach the Gospel to the poor, to heal the broken-hearted—and to preach the acceptable years of the Lord."

In his work at the Orphanage he also was like his Master in inviting little children to come to him and in their coming be blest.

Fitz-Greene Halleck's words were never more appropriate:

"Green grows the grass above thee,
Friend of my better days;
None knew thee but to love thee,
Nor named thee but to praise,"

ELI BAXTER CRAVEN**By O. W. Dowd**

The Rev. Eli Baxter Craven, son of Samuel Robert Craven and Clementine Craven, was born in Randolph County, North Carolina, December 21, 1875 and died in Rex Hospital, Thursday, August 29, 1946. The funeral services were held the following Saturday in the Garner Methodist Church, conducted by the District Superintendent, Rev. H. B. Porter and assisted by Dr. Harry Smith, Revs. E. M. Hall, N. P. Edens, and O. W. Dowd, and was laid to rest in Mont Lawn Cemetery.

In preparation for the ministry of the Gospel, He attended Elon College and Vanderbilt University. He was admitted on trial into the North Carolina Conference in 1905, ordained Deacon in 1906, and ordained Elder in 1909, serving the Conference thirty-nine years.

The charges and the years of his appointments are the following: Bladen Circuit 1905-1908; Siler City 1909-1912; Raeford 1913; City Road, Elizabeth City 1914; Garner Circuit 1915-1918; Four Oaks 1919-1921; Beaufort 1922-1924; Conway Circuit 1925-1928; Snow Hill 1929-1932; Person Circuit, Roxboro, N. C., 1933-1936; Fuquay Springs Circuit 1939-1942; Garner Circuit 1943-1944. Retired for two years, making his home at Garner.

Brother Craven was married June 27, 1911 to Miss Clara Lambe of Siler City. No minister was ever more blessed in his married life. Mrs. Craven was the devoted, faithful and inspiring companion making possible the noble achievements of her husband.

In addition to Mrs. Craven, the following children survive: E. B. Craven, Jr., Roxboro, N. C., Jack L. Craven, Durnam, N. C., and Mrs. J. R. Lowe, Elon College, N. C. and Raleigh, N. C. These children are monuments to their parents and their church.

Brother Craven preached the old gospel with spiritual insight and power: He preached with conviction and won hundreds of souls to Christ in the charges he served so faithfully and well; His able services as evangelist pastor were much in demand through these decades of zealous and earnest service for his beloved church.

There were certain contributing influences that made this man of God so successful as a Methodist preacher: He had the parental training: He was trained in school and university for his life's work; He was fitted by the school of rich experience of God's saving grace. He had what we used to speak of, a blessed assurance. The note of noonday certainty was in the message he brought to the hearts of men.

He had three things definitely in mind in his pulpit ministry—his subject, a clear-cut purpose to get a verdict, and the audience. The people heard this pastor gladly, because they loved him devotedly.

I could write about his high qualities of friendship, his love of home and church, and of other high loyalties that marked his life. He was brave in his afflictions. I shall not forget my last visits to see him in Rex Hospital. When I waved to him the last farewell, he smiled back one of those radiant, winning smiles as though to say it is well with my soul.

I shall not see him again until me meet in the land that is fairer than day, where flowers never fade, where the stars forever shine.

"In that land of pure delight,
Where Saints immortal reign;
Infinite day excludes the night
And pleasures vanish pain.

There everlasting spring abides
And never withering flowers
Death, like a narrow sea, divides
This heavenly land from ours."

Strange as it may seem to some "Blessed in the sight of the Lord is the death of the Saints."

Well done good and faithful servant. Enter thou into the joys of the Lord.

CHARLIE LAFAYETTE SPENCER

How uncertain is life! I incidentally met up with my good friend, Rev. C. L. Spencer, on the streets of Asheboro and had a brief and pleasant conversation with him. He was in his usual cheerful spirit, and appeared well. In a few minutes after we parted he had a stroke and died. True it is that:

"Death rides on every passing breeze
And lurks in every flower."

Charlie Lafayette Spencer was born and reared near Seagrove, N. C., and is the son of Jordan and Melvena Spencer. His birth date is March 14, 1879. He attended the church and public school of his community, and at nine years of age he joined Fairgrove Methodist Protestant Church. It seemed most fitting that his funeral should be held there and that his body should rest in the church burying ground where his loved ones sleep.

When Brother Spencer was a young man he went to Alabama to live. He married in that state and began his ministry there in The Methodist Protestant Church. His wife, who survives, was Miss Ellen Hudson. The marriage date is 1902, August 10. To this happy union were born two sons, W. J. of Columbus, Ga., and Charlie of Greensboro, N. C., and one daughter, Mrs. Russel Roberts, Weaverville, N. C. In addition to his immediate family, he is survived by one brother, J. L. Spencer, Liberty, N. C., and three sisters, Mrs. O. D. Lawrence, Seagrove, N. C. Mrs. Martin McNeill, Steed, N. C., and Miss Pearl Spencer, Richlands, Va. There are also seven surviving grandchildren.

In 1919 Brother Spencer returned to North Carolina and joined the North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Protestant Church where he remained until the merging of Methodism in 1939. He was an ordained minister for forty years, thirteen of which were spent in

Alabama in The Methodist Protestant Church, twenty in the North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Protestant Church, and seven in the North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Church. Among the charges that he served are Evergreen and Macon in Alabama, and Weaverville, Randleman, Mebane, Graham, Halifax, Granville, Belhaven, Murfreesboro, in North Carolina. He was closing his fourth year at Murfreesboro when death ended his useful and honorable earthly career.

Our departed brother was a "good minister of Jesus Christ." His preaching was earnest and scriptural and he supported it by the testimony of a consistent life. All conference programs and institutions received his full support. He had the happy faculty of endearing himself to the people that he served, as evidenced by the fact that half of his long ministry was spent on four charges. His cheerful, friendly, optimistic, tolerant disposition, and his firm stand against every form of evil, made him a likable man and an acceptable pastor.

The earthly ending of the life of this good man came October 8, 1946, when God took him to the church triumphant. The funeral service was in charge of Rev. G. B. Ferree, pastor of Fairgrove Church. He was assisted by G. L. Curry, J. T. Whitehead, Mark Q. Tuttle, and S. W. Taylor. His body was laid to rest beneath a covering of flowers typical of his eternal resting place. God's blessings upon the memory of His faithful servant, and upon the loved ones who will feel most keenly this earthly separation.

JAMES TOWNSEND STANFORD

"Reverend James Townsend Stanford was a member of the Leland Stanford family, founder of the University of that name in California, and a great grandson of the late U. S. Senator Stanford." These words were a partial account of Brother Stanford's death from a recent newspaper. On October 13, 1946 at five thirty (5:30) A. M. James Townsend Stanford passed from this life to be with God, and to accept the greatest of all appointments, and to hear said: "Come ye blessed of my Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for . . . in as much as you have been faithful over a little I will make you a ruler over much."

The following Tuesday, October 15, at his home in Scotland Neck, where a large number of friends and fifteen brother ministers had gathered, District Superintendent, T. M. Grant, assisted by M. W. Warren and P. H. Fields conducted appropriate services to the honor of a Christian minister and servant of God. The body was laid to rest at the former home of Mrs. Stanford, near Severn.

Having suffered declining health for two years, Brother Stanford's condition became worse very rapidly six months prior to his passing. He suffered much during these two years, but this was greatly alleviated by the tender care and affectionate attention of his devoted wife and daughter, and two step-sons whom he raised.

James Townsend Stanford was born in 1871, September 26, at Mt. Tirzah, N. C., Person county. He was the son of Richard Stanford, a large farmer and building contractor, and Louise Townsend Stanford. One only needed to look at "Jim" Stanford to realize that he was blessed with a noble family heritage. He was endowed with a marvelous physique.

His educational advantages were good. He graduated from Burlington Academy, Trinity College, and attended Vanderbilt Divinity School for one year. He also participated in athletics while at Trinity, an earlier day when this school was among the few recognized for their good football teams. While looking through some of his papers I ran across this certificate; DUKE UNIVERSITY—This certifies that James T. Stanford for meritorious service has been awarded the varsity "D" in football for the year 1892. Signed Wallace Wade, Director of Athletics, W. H. Wannamaker, Faculty Chairman,

Brother Stanford joined the North Carolina Conference in Washington, 1899, and for forty-two years he served faithfully the following charges:

Alamance, Rich Square, Roanoke Rapids, Scitshell, Maysville, Williamston, Benson, Yanceyville, Windfall, Oriental, Ahoskie, Gate Station, Leesburg, Pinetops, Lake Landing, Roper, Tyner.

He retired in 1941.

It was during Brother Stanford's pastorate that the present church at Benson was built, and a parsonage purchased. At Yanceyville, he instigated the selling of two old parsonages and the purchasing of a more adequate home for the preacher and his family. At Gate Station, Brother Stanford led in the building of a splendid brick church and brick parsonage.

An event which took place early in his ministry, and which brought much joy and happiness into his life was when Brother Stanford married Blanche Flythe. They shared forty one happy years together. To them was born a daughter, Nellie Blanche, who has proven a real source of joy and comfort to both her father and mother. She is now teaching in the public school at Scotland Neck.

Until his health began to fail he lived a very active life. Even after having taken the superannuate relation he preached and taught Sunday School at Scotland Neck whenever the occasion afforded the opportunity. "I have lived a full life," he remarked during a service after his retirement.

When he walked down the street the atmosphere seemed to be charged with Christian brotherliness for he had a word of good cheer and kindness for all. Both white and colored enjoyed his pleasant greetings and radiant smile. When he was no longer able to make the walk from his home down town, a colored man told the writer, "We missed him as he would stop and pass a few minutes with us."

"Those traits of character that made him admired and loved were written on his face," as a friend stated concerning this faithful minister. And the writer remembers the first time I felt the impact of Brother Stanford's attractive, Christian personality. At Greenville in 1931, when I joined the conference I was attracted at once to this giant of a man who seemed to tower above everyone else and in whom there was a heart that made Christ appealing and wanted.

To know this good man was to love him. And while he no longer walks among us in the flesh, his spirit is with us and will inspire us and we are richer for the noble life which he lived. To his beloved widow and daughter and to the North Carolina Conference he has left a rich legacy.

After 42 years of devotion to rural churches in the Durham district, the Rev. Samuel F. Nicks died on October 28 at his home in Hillsboro. The Methodist minister was 72 years old at the time of his death. He was born January 21, 1874.

Funeral services were conducted in the Cedar Grove Church on October 30 before one of the largest crowds ever assembled in that church. This final tribute to the Rev. Mr. Nicks came precisely one year after a dinner held in his honor at the same Orange County church upon the completion of his 42nd year in the ministry. At the dinner, which was served to 400 people, there were present fully 90 per cent of the pastors of the district with other distinguished guests and friends from Durham, Orange, Alamance, Caswell and Person Counties, where he had had churches.

The beginning of his ministry to country churches came soon after the Rev. Mr. Nicks' graduation from Trinity College in the class of 1903. He married Miss Emma Woods of the Cedar Grove Community and was ordained in that same year. He preached the rest of his eventful career in that area.

With his bride the young pastor went to Burlington where he began his first charge. Thereafter he served the Burlington circuits, Pelham, Milton, Yanceyville, Leasburg, Hillsboro, Brooksdale and Cedar Grove. He made his home in Hillsboro after his retirement in 1945.

Among the minister's most notable achievements was the part he played in erecting beautiful rural churches. Three of these buildings were constructed of stone and will long stand as monuments to his energy and concentration. Cedar Grove Church was constructed of "Duke University stone." The Walnut Grove and Allensville churches, Person County, are built of white flint rock gathered in the same section.

For 17 years the Rev. Mr. Nicks had one or more of his children in Trinity College or Duke University, and he is accredited with the distinction of sending more young people to Duke University than any Methodist minister in the two conferences in North Carolina. His son, Robert, was received on trial at a Methodist minister at the Conference in the fall of this year.

During the period of 1932-33, the Rev. Mr. Nicks served as State Counselor of the Junior Order of United American Mechanics and at the time of his death he was State Chaplain of the Junior Order of United American Mechanics.

The Rev. Mr. Nicks was surely one who realized fully the vast field of service in rural churches. During his ministry, the beloved preacher conducted more funerals than any other minister in this section and married hundreds of young people.

Born of Christian parents, reared in a religious home, she early found Christ her Saviour and joined Concord Methodist Church. Favored with a long cultural background, and Christian nurture, with unusual opportunities which she made good use of, she embodied the finest and best human and divine attributes. Her life unfolded like a beautiful flower, and continued to give beauty and joy and fragrance to the people and world about her. It is difficult to delineate or give a worthy summation of such a wonderfully fruitful life of devoted service. The poetic appraisal by Solomon of a virtuous woman clothed in strength and dignity and beauty might well have been said of her.

December 20, 1893, she married Rev. John Henry Shore. Three children were born to this happy union: Miss Mary Shore, Mrs. R. L. Coburn, of Raleigh, and a son who died at the age of ten, in Smithfield.

She happily shared the arduous life and duties of her itinerant husband as a true helpmate. Their work carried them over a large part of the State for almost a half century, in days when in obedience to

the itinerant laws of the church changes were at least every four years. Travel was by horse and buggy, and moves were by train. She filled well with tact and diplomacy her difficult place in every relationship, whether as the wife of a circuit rider, a leading station preacher, or presiding elder. Her love of Christ and people, her jovial disposition and sense of humor, her grace and charm, made her a model queen of a parsonage home. Few people have been more widely and deeply known and loved. How well she did her part as a faithful, loving companion through the years is expressed by her husband. "I was so dependent upon her in every way. She managed all the business and domestic affairs. I never even bought the groceries or clothes. She left me free to give myself wholly to my divine calling: That's why we got along so well. All that I have accomplished I owe to my good wife."

Though a saintly woman there was nothing sanctimonious about her. She loved life, was quiet, friendly, modest and retiring. Her leading trait was, to not judge others. Many remember her as a great teacher. At Greenville she taught a large class of college girls. She was especially a good mother. She was a pal with her children. They adored her, and gave themselves to her care with a touching devotion. She practiced the stewardship of life and religiously set apart the tithe as sacred. She gave generously of her substantial means. The fatherless and motherless children were her chief concern.

Ten years ago her husband retired from the traveling connection, and they returned to their log-cabin home among the pines amid the scenes of her childhood. They found great joy in these settled years living quietly and contentedly among many relatives and friends. She continued active and vitally interested in all phases of church and community life.

Her last three years were spent largely in bed, but this did not take away her smile, her winsomeness. Rather she ripened and mellowed as she more fully understood the fellowship of His sufferings and His redeeming love. Christ became the beauty and strength of her life. It was like the aftermath of a beautiful sunset glow. She was strong enough in his strength to carry over a Godly patience and tenderness of heart and understanding and unperturbed peace of mind. It was her lot to be the wife of a Methodist pastor at times and in places where that lot was not always an easy or comfortable one. Yet to her, life was not made for comfort or ease but for service. She was active in the work of the Church, and was a ministering angel in the community in times of sickness and sorrow. But it was her highest earthly ambition to be a good wife and mother, and in this attainment she matched the noblest standards of Christian womanhood. How fitting were the words of Scripture read at her funeral: "Who can find a virtuous woman? for her

price is far above rubies . . . Her children arise up, and call her blessed; her husband also and he praiseth her."

Through the years she had been a devoted follower of the Lord Jesus Christ, and when her earthly course was run she heard her Savior saying: "Well done, good and faithful servant, enter thou into the joy of thy Lord."

CHARLES LEWIS READ

Rev. Charles Lewis Read was born November 15, 1869 at Palmer Springs, Virginia, and died on November 7, 1946, at Durham, North Carolina. He was the son of the late Lewis Henry Read and Sallie Wright Read, one of the old families of Virginia. Their home was near the North Carolina border. Union was the old home Church and its membership was composed of citizens of both states. Charles joined this church in his early teens and cherished strong attachments for it throughout his life. The lofty influences of his boyhood Church and home were ever interwoven in the delicate pattern of his life.

As a young minister he came into the North Carolina Conference where he rendered faithful service from December 1898 until his retirement in 1936. During his 37 years of active ministry he served the following charges: South Edgecombe Circuit 3 years; Edenton 2 years; Epworth, Raleigh, 2 years; Williamston-Hamilton 4 years; Murfreesboro-Winton 1 year; Aberdeen-Biscoe 2 years; First Church, Rocky Mount, 1 year; Washington District 4 years; Kinston 4 years; St. Paul's, Goldsboro 2 years; Rockingham District 4 years; Dunn 1 year; Tarboro, 1 year; Franklinton 3 years; and Zebulon-Wendell 3 years.

Reverend Charles Lewis Read and Mrs. Nan Goodson Howard were united in holy matrimony in 1922. To this union was born one daughter, Nancy. There were two step-daughters: Miss Mary Anna Howard of Memphis, Tennessee, and Mrs. W. M. Whitehurst of Wilson, N. C. Other than these surviving him are members of his family, three brothers, Mr. Horace P. Read, Mr. Fletcher Read, Mr. William. H. Read, and two sisters, Miss Helen Lewis Read of Palmer Springs, Virginia, and Mrs W. M. Kimball of Manson, North Carolina.

Brother Read was educated at Davis' Military Academy, La-Grange, North Carolina, and at Trinity College where he was a member of the class of 1901.

Having joined the North Carolina Conference in 1898, and having concluded his education at Trinity College, he entered upon the duties of a devoted pastor in the several places mentioned above. His was a long period of service of thirty seven years with his retirement coming at the conference in New Bern, November, 1936.

Brother Read was a man of quiet dignity, nobility of soul and purity of heart. He was a good shepherd of the flock as he went in and out among the homes of his people. He was an outstanding minister in the pulpit whose sermons were marked by an unusual insight into the Holy Scriptures. Out of the rich personal experience

of the grace of God in his own heart he edified and strengthened all those who sat under his ministry.

He now rests from his labors, but the good he accomplished, and the holy influences that he set in motion will go on until the end of time enriching and blessing humanity.

He was a devoted and affectionate husband, a wise and considerate father, a workman who need not be ashamed of his work. He was one of God's noblemen. His Godly life, unselfish service and rich Christian experience will be a constant benediction upon all of us who have known and loved him through the years.

To his beloved widow and other loved ones, and to the North Carolina Conference, he has left a rich and noble legacy untarnished and inviolate.

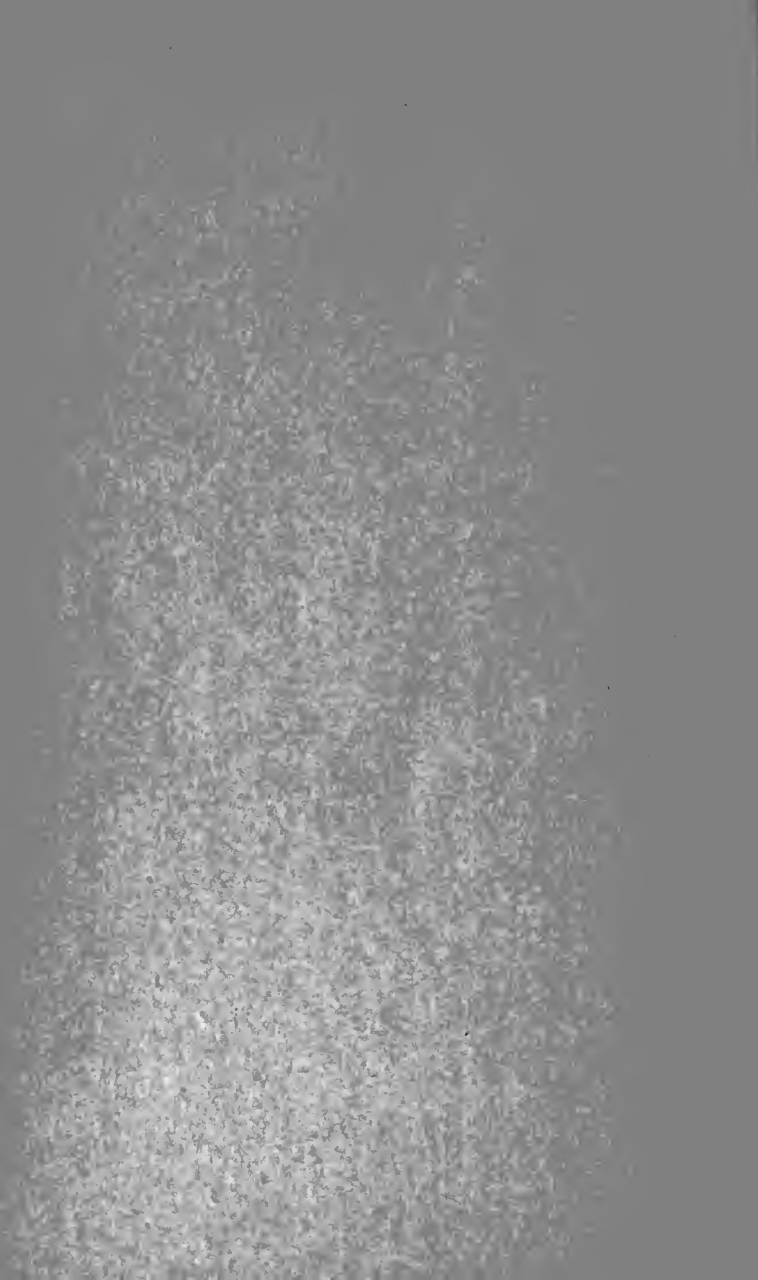

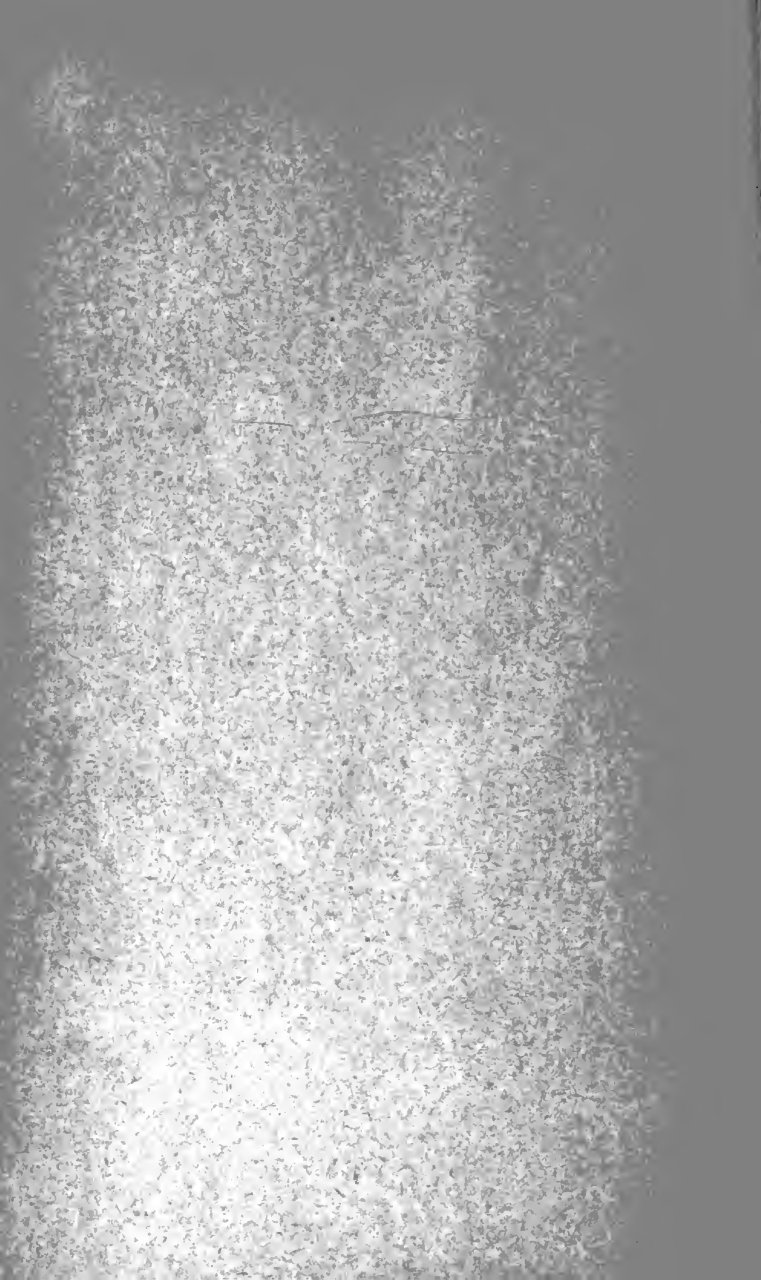


Sessions of the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Church

The North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Church was composed of the North Carolina Conference of the former M. E. Church, South, and parts of the North Carolina Conference of the former Methodist Protestant Church and the Blue Ridge-Atlantic Conference of the former Methodist Episcopal Church. The former Methodist Episcopal Church gave to the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Church 9 preachers, 11 charges and 1,837 members; the former Methodist Protestant Church 23 preachers, 20 charges and 9,152 members; the former Methodist Episcopal Church, South, 273 preachers, 226 charges and 132,735 members.

NOTE: The Distributing Committee at the 1940 session of the Western North Carolina Conference added three retired ministers of the former Methodist Protestant Church to the roll of the North Carolina Conference. The names of these preachers should have been included in 1939 in the list of preachers coming into the North Carolina Conference from the former Methodist Protestant Church.
