

Rules of Order and Procedure for the North Carolina Annual Conference of The Methodist Church

I. RULES OF ORDER

- 1. Robert's Rules of Order shall apply to any situation not covered by these Rules.
- No member who has the floor may be interrupted except for a breach of order, a misrepresentation, to direct the attention of the Conference to the fact that time has arrived for a special order, or to raise a very urgent question of high privilege.
- 3. No member shall speak a second time on the same question if any member who has not yet spoken desires the floor, nor more than twice on the same subject under the same motion, nor longer than ten minutes unless his time shall be extended by the Conference, except as provided in Rule 4.
- 4. When the report of a Committee is under consideration and when all have spoken who desire to do so, or when (and after) the previous question has been ordered, the chairman and/or duly authorized member or members presenting the committee's report (and the minority report if there be one) shall be entitled to speak before the vote is taken.
- 5. A member claiming the floor at any time for what he believes is a very urgent question of high privilege, shall be allowed to indicate briefly the nature of the question, and if it be adjudged by the chair to be such, he may proceed at his pleasure, or until the chairman judges he has exhausted his privilege.
- 6. Voting shall be by a show of hands unless otherwise ordered by the Conference. A "yea" and "nay" vote, if taken, shall be by signed ballot, which result will be published in the Conference Journal. A count vote may be ordered on call of any member supported by one-fifth of the members present and voting, in which case the delegates shall rise from their seats and stand while they are counted.

II. ORGANIZATION

- The Secretary: The Secretary of the Annual Conference shall be elected quadrennially at the first session of the Conference after the meeting of the General Conference; and on nominations arising from the floor.
- Assistant Secretaries: The Secretary shall nominate his assistants and the Conference shall elect.
- 3. Statisticians: There shall be a Conference Statistician and an Assistant Statistician. The Statistician shall be elected quadrennially at the first session after the meeting of the General Conference. The Assistant Statistician shall be elected annually upon nomination by the Secretary.
- The Conference Stenographer: The Conference Secretary shall employ the Conference Stenographer.
- 5. Compensation: The Commission on World Service and Finance shall determine subject to the approval of the Conference, the compensation given officers for their services and also the method and amount for meeting expenses of saic officers. The Conference Treasurer shall pay these amounts.
- 6. Boards, Commissions, and Committees: The Bishop and his Cabinet shall determine the size of and nominate the members of all Boards, Commissions, and Committee authorized by the General Conference, the Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference and this Annual Conference, except in those cases in which the Discipline direct otherwise. The recommendations and nominations shall be subject to the approva of the Conference.

- 7. The Conference Board of Trustees: The Conference Board of Trustees shall be required to meet at least once a year other than the regular meeting at the session of the Annual Conference.
- 8. Board Treasurers: All Board Treasurers shall be required to file financial statements, annually, with the reports of their respective Boards. These financial statements shall be published in the Conference Journal.
- 9. Program Committee: There shall be a Program Committee of the Conference consisting of the resident Bishop, the Conference Secretary, the District Superintendent of the District in which the sessions of the Conference is held, the pastor of the host church, and the Conference Lay Leader. This committee shall determine the compensation and expense for invited speakers and this shall be paid from the Conference expense fund.
- Committee on Conference Objectives: There shall be a Conference Quadrennial Committee on Conference Objectives. See Paragraph 651—Question 49, page 179, 1952 Discipline.
- 11. Entertainment Committee: There shall be a Conference Entertainment Committee, composed of three ministers and two laymen. This committee shall be elected at the first session of the Conference following the General Conference, and shall serve for the Quadrennium. This committee shall receive invitations and determine the place and method of entertaining the Conference sessions. The Committee is requested to determine the place of holding the next Conference not later than April I, if possible.
- 12. Committee on Memoirs: The Conference Secretary and the District Superintendents shall constitute the Committee on Memoirs. The members of the committee shall be charged with the responsibility of providing for all the details of the memorial service. The Conference Secretary shall be the chairman of this committee.
- 13. Committee on Daily Minutes: A committee of three members shall be elected each year to examine the daily minutes of the sessions of the Conference and report daily to the Conference.
- 14. Courtesies and Resolutions: There shall be constituted a Committee on Courtesies and Resolutions, annually, at the first session of the Conference.
- 15. Committee on Appeals: There shall be appointed, quadrennially, a Committee on Appeals, composed of at least five members, whose duties shall be to hear appeals from the decisions of the several District Boards of Church Location and Building, or any other questions that may properly come before them.
- 16. American Bible Society: All matters regarding the relation of the Conference to the American Bible Society and its work shall be referred to the Board of Education.

III. REPORTS AND RESOLUTIONS

- All reports and resolutions presented to the Conference shall be written (typewritten
 if possible) in triplicate. Two copies shall be in the hands of the Conference
 Secretary before the report or resolutions shall be read to the Conference for
 consideration.
- Any amendment offered to any paper and all motions of more than a single sentence must be in writing and given to the Conference Secretary.

IV. LAY DELEGATES TO THE ANNUAL CONERENCE

- Lay delegates, regular or reserve, from the pastoral charges to the Annual Conference shall be elected by the Quarterly Conference at least forty-five days prior to the session of the Annual Conference.
- Each District Superintendent shall complete the list of lay delegates to the Conference, from his District, at least forty-five days before the Annual Conference

session and shall immediately transmit the completed list, in duplicate, to the Conference Secretary.

 Substitutions for lay delegates to the Annual Conference must be made to the Conference Secretary, in written form, through the District Superintendent of each District.

V. PASTORS' REPORTS TO ANNUAL CONFERENCE AND STATISTICS

- Each pastor shall complete table I of his annual report to Conference and transmit
 the same to the Conference Statistician at least two weeks prior to the opening of
 the Conference.
- Table II shall be completed and turned in at the time of registration, the first day of Conference.
- Each table of the report shall be filled out by individual churches with totals for the charge.
- 4. Table II shall be made out in even dollars only.
- 5. Tables I and II shall be printed in the Conference Journal only by charges.
- A third table of individual church reports shall be compiled by the Statistician from the pastors' reports. This table shall be printed in the Conference Journal.

VI. THE CONFERENCE JOURNAL

- Editor: The Conference Secretary shall be charged with the responsibility of editing and making contracts for the publication of the Conference Journal, in keeping with the regulations of the General Conference and of the Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference. The Editor shall have full authority to condense reports, memoirs, and other papers when necessary.
- 2. One complimentary copy of the Conference Journal shall be sent each of the following: The Conference Claimants, the educational institutions, the General Boards, The Publishing House, the lay members of the Conference Boards. Seven copies shall be sent to each pastor without charge. All other copies shall be sold at \$1.00 each, or single copies by mail at \$1.10 each.

VII. DISTRICTS

- 1. The number of Districts shall be seven.
- 2. A District Conference shall be held annually in each District.
- Each pastoral charge shall elect annually two lay delegates to the District Conference. These shall be in addition to those named by the Discipline as ex officio members.
- The District and Associate District Lay Leaders shall be elected annually by the Annual Conference on nomination of the District Superintendents and the Conference Lay Leader.
- 5. The District Superintendent of each District shall be required to furnish to the Bishop, the Conference Treasurer, and the Conference Statistician, as early in the year as passible, an official copy of the apportionments to the charges for World Service and Conference Benevolences and the amounts accepted by the charges, also the amounts approved by the charges for the several items of ministerial support. The figures furnished the Conference Statistician shall be used by him in making up his report to the Conference. Two of these official copies are to be sent to the secretary of the Commission on World Service and Finance.
- Each District Superintendent, as early in the year as possible, shall furnish the Bishop, the Conference Treasurer, and the Conference Statistician with a schedule

- of the salaries of pastors as set by the Quarterly Conferences. The figures furnished by the District Superintendent to the Conference Statistician shall be used by him in making up his report to the Conference.
- 7. We call attention of the District Superintendents to Paragraph 432 (1) 1952 Discipline, and state that we believe that a reasonable time for such consultation, before the appointments are to be read, could not be construed to be less than twenty-four hours.

VIII. AMENDMENTS

1. These rules of order and procedure may be amended by a two-thirds vote on the next day after a proposed amendment has been presented in writing; provided the rule fixing the number of Districts may be amended by a majority vote; provided, further, a change in the number of Districts may not be made later than the second morning of the Annual Conference session.

IX. WHEN THE RULES BECOME EFFECTIVE

 These rules of order and procedure of the North Carolina Annual Conference shall become effective immediately upon passage by the vote of the majority of the Conference.

BOARD OF MISSIONS AND CHURCH EXTENSION

Report No. 1

In carrying out the purpose of the Board of Missions and Church Extension as expressed in the 1948 Discipline, "to make the Lord Jesus Christ known to all peoples in all lands as their divine Saviour, to persuade them to become His disciples, and to gather these disciples into Christian churches; to enlist them in the building of the kingdom of God; to cooperate with these churches; to promote world christian fellowship; and to bring to bear on all human life the spirit and principles of Christ," our conference Board of Missions has tried to take its task seriously, and is glad to report that real progress has been made. We are indebted to many individuals and agencies for the influence they have exerted in generating a missionary spirit and increasing interest in the churches of our conference. The Woman's Society of Christian Service makes an incalculable contribution along this line. The Conference and District Missionary Secretaries, the ministers and laymen of the various churches all play a large part in this work, and we wish to express to all our abiding gratitude. In this connection we recommend that Sunday, November 9, be designated as "World Outlook Day," and urge our churches and ministers to set before their congregations the importance of subscribing to this splendid Missionary periodical of our church. We also urge that

more emphasis be placed upon increasing the circulation of the North Carolina Christian Advocate and the Christian Advocate of Chicago, the general organ of the church. These publications are indispensable if we are to inform and inspire our people on the opportunity and responsibility of Christian missions.

In order to get the largest possible returns from our missionary money, this board desires to work in close cooperation with the district superintendents in the matter of dividing charges. We feel that better solutions can be discovered and much valuable mission money saved if this is done, and we wish to assure the district superintendents

that any service we can render is at their disposal.

We are happy to report the establishment of four new and promising churches within the past year. The Westminster Church, Kinston, St. James Church, Greenville, Epworth Church, Durham, and Trinity Church, Burlington are all making progress, and give evidence of becoming strong self-supporting churches within a very few years. The money the Board of Missions of our Conference has invested in these new projects has been well spent and will bring large returns in ministering to the spiritual needs of these localities. There are several other strategic places within our conference where new churches are badly needed. It is the hope and prayer of this board that the progress already made can be multiplied many times in the near future. Only a sustained interest in missions and a passion for souls will make this possible. It will be recalled that the conference last year adopted an item in the report of the Commission on World Service and Finance to raise an amount equal to 2 per cent of "total money raised" to be used by the Board of Missions and Church Extension to extend the church in the North Carolina Conference. We are glad to report that this action has given to the board some \$35,000 more with which to meet the increasing demands for assistance. As a result we have already allocated some \$32,000 to building projects. and have need for something like \$400,000 more. This figure was arrived at after a careful survey made by the Board of Missions in conjunction with the District Superintendents. It can readily be seen that we do not have enough to meet the needs at present even with this increased apportionment. We, therefore, heartily endorse the plan of Bishop Paul Garber to raise \$50,000 per year for this quadrennium through interested laymen who would like to make a worthwhile investment in a spiritual enterprise. We request the Bishop to put this plan into operation immediately following this Conference. This money is needed and can be used to advantage in establishing new churches.

There are few more challenging objectives demanding the attention of any of our conferences than Jacksonville. Here we find a community, building on every hand, with the business world meeting the challenge with new and enlarged stores, shops and plants. A community of a hundred thousand souls that is called upon to worship with Methodist facilities capable of caring for a community of eight hundred. It is our thought that when the Five and Ten Cent Stores, such as J. C. Penny and Woolworth, finds cause for faith in the future there, then the Methodist Church should do so likewise, and do it promptly. The harvest is ripe, time must not be lost, the spotlight of need should be focused on this objective, and its prompt attainment should be realized. Let's move in vigorously and promptly. Where business concerns are not able to buy and build, they improvise and lease for a time, but they act at the opportune moment. This is the Methodist opportune moment in Jacksonville, tomorrow may be too late.

All funds coming to this Board have been taken out of World service and put in a separate apportionment, amounting to 2½ per cent of total money raised, less the regular deductions. This is estimated to raise \$54,000, and is not an increase over last year. This money is to be used by the Board of Missions to extend the church in the North Carolina Conference.

With the increased cost of living it stands to reason that the ministers supported by the minimum salary fund should receive consideration. We recommend that the minimum salary scale be lifted \$200 in each category, making it \$2,600, \$2,800, and \$3,000.

The Mission Study book this next year is "Along the African Path" by Miss Dorothy McConnell, one of the editors of World Outlook. We recommend that large use be made of this book in all our churches. We recommend that the week of Novem-

ber 30-December 7 be set aside as the week for holding the Missionary Institutes in all the districts. Dr. Walter C. Gum, of the Virginia Conference will be the speaker

at all these institutes.

We wish to express to Rev. Leon Russell, who has served so faithfully and efficiently as our Conference Missionary Secretary for the past eight years our sincere gratitude for his untiring efforts and wise direction of the mission program of our conference. He has always been alert and active and through his leadership the interest and support in our conference has increased. We thank him for a job well done. We recommend Rev. O. L. Hathaway as Conference Missionary Secretary to succeed Brother Russell, who feels he should give up the work at present. We recommend Reverends T. M. Vick, Jr., and J. W. Lineberger to succeed themselves as members of the Board of Managers of the North Carolina Pastors School.

A list of the appropriations and a copy of the treasurer's report are attached hereto.

BOARD OF EDUCATION

Report No. 1

SCHOOLS AND COLLEGES

1. Duke University

Duke University is one of the truly great universities of the nation, and we are all proud of its origin and relation to The Methodist Church. We are most fortunate that this great university is located within the bounds of the North Carolina Conference. Its president is a member of our Conference Board of Education. He is seeking to keep the university close to The Methodist Church. The religious emphasis on the campus is perhaps unsurpassed by any great university in America.—C. P. Morris.

Report of the treasurer and registrar of Duke University to the Bishop and members of the North Carolina Conference in session at Burlington, N. C., Wednesday, October 22, 1952. Statistics for the year ended June 30, 1952

"You will observe that the enrollment is approximately the same as last year, to be exact 4,734. The net value of buildings and equipment is above our report of last year at \$42,246,376.47. Our total assets at \$71,451,261.27 are likewise more than last year. These figures are due to the splendid results of our Development Campaign, which reached in cash and pledges well over eight and one-half million dollars. In evaluating any financial report from Duke University you will remember always that it does not include that portion of the indivisible corpus of The Duke Endowment, the income of which accrues to Duke University under the terms of the Trust Indenture."

2. Duke Divinity School

The enrollment in Duke Divinity School as of October 1, 1952, totals 250 students. There are 217 candidates for the B.D. degree, 3 candidates for the M.R.E. degree, and 30 candidates for the Ph.D. in religion.

The Divinity School, reperesenting the Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference, conducts each summer a School for Approved Supply Pastors. The dates for this school for 1953 are June 15-30. It sponsors the Christian Convocation held each year at the

University, supplying especially the James A. Gray Lectures. Dr. Charles W. Gilkey is the Gray Lecturer for 1953 and Bishop Fred P. Corson will be Convocation Preacher. A Ministers' Loan Library for the use and benefit of ministers in service is also operated. The Phillips Brooks Club, a study group for ministers in service, is conducted under the auspices of the Divinity School. Extension seminars are conducted each year, one in each of the Carolina Conferences. The seminar for the North Carolina Conference for the present year will be conducted at Kinston, North Carolina, January 22 and 23. The seminar for the Western North Carolina Conference will be conducted at Greensboro, North Carolina, January 19 and 20. The subject for the 1953 Seminars is "Preaching" and the special lecturers will be Dr. Lynn Harold Hough and Dr. James T. Cleland.

3. Greensboro College

With the close of the past academic year on May 26, 1952, the 17-year, constructive administration of President Luther L. Gobbell come to a conclusion. These years saw important developments in the physical facilities of the College and the continuing growth of the intellectual and religious factors which have made Greensboro College influential beyond her numbers through the generations. Dr. Gobbel goes to the presidency of Lambeth College in Jackson, Tennessee. In his place the Board of Trustees has selected Dr. Harold Hutson, formerly Chairman of the Department of Religion at Ohio Weslevan University and a member of the Ohio Annual Conference.

For the past scholastic year Greensboro College had a total of 368 students representing six states and one foreign country. North Carolina furnished 88.7 per cent of the total. Twelve denominations were represented, Methodism leading with 82.2 per cent.

The statistics for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1952, are as follows: Officers and Teachers, 52; Students, 368; value of property, \$1,972,390.21; endowment, \$681,457.34; work scholarships, \$14,681.76; endowment scholarship aid, \$1,107.50; tuition reductions for ministers' daughters, \$5,652.50; no indebtedness.

4. High Point College

The enrollment of High Point College for the year ending May 31, 1952, was as follows: Summer School, 453; Extension, 85; Regular Sessions, 655; making a total of 1,193. Of the enrollment in the regular sessions, 95.3 per cent of the students were from North Carolina. Of the total enrollment, 58 per cent were Methodist students.

The audit as of May 31 showed the value of land, buildings, and equipment to be \$1,506,722.27, based on 1952 evaluations, an increase of \$378,370.48 during the year! The audit shows \$559,430.29 in the endowment fund, an increase of \$11,933.68 during the year. The College closed the fiscal year with no indebtedness, other than current bills. During the fiscal year the College operated at the net surplus of \$392.97.

For the academic year there were 52 faculty and staff members.

During the scholastic year the College enrolled 52 ministerial students, 23 children of ministers, 16 children from orphanages. The College made concession to these groups in the total amount of \$10,292.95. These figures do not include approximately 25 girls who were majoring in Religious Education but for whom no money was available for concessions.

5. Louisburg College

Louisburg College is now in the process of being investigated by the Higher Commission of the Southern Association for membership in that Association. Improvement in the physical plant of the College are being made whereever money is available, and the grade of work being done by the institution is being maintained on a good level.

The statistics for the fiscal year of 1951-1952 are as follows: Officers and teachers, 22; students enrolled, 190; value of property (on basis of independent insurance surey), \$991,982; endowment, \$156,000; indebtedness, none.

LOCAL CHURCH

The Board of Education of the North Carolina Conference expresses its sincere appreciation for the work done during the past year by our Executive Secretary and his Much that has been accomplished has been the result of the leadership of Rev. C. P. Morris. Every phase of the educational program of the church has received careful attention and promotion-children, youth, and adults. The following are revealing figures of the acomplishments in the field of Christian Education for the Conference year 1951-52: 33,333 enrolled in Vacation Church Schools; 568 in Christian Adventure Camps with 157 workers employed; three weeks of Camps for Juniors were held at Don-Lee enrolling 230 campers; approximately 500 enrolled in Senior and older Youth Assemblies at Louisburg College; 50 young adults attended Camp Don-Lee 26 Leadership Education Schools with 2,925 enrolled; 3,262 joined the church of Profession of Faith from the Church Schools: \$840.00 was received for the children's building at Lake Junaluska; \$4,523 was received on Church School Rally Day; \$2,789 was received on Race Relations Sunday; \$1,400 was received for Student Day; \$7,841.00 was raised on the Youth Fund; and \$14,491.00 for Camp Don-Lee.

We recommend that an amount equal to 1% of the pastor's salary be set as the goal for our Church School Rally Day offering in each local church, and that the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance be asked to approve this goal this

year.

We recommend that a Committee consisting of one District Superintendent, two pastors, two laymen, and one lay woman be appointed by the Board of Education to work with the Conference staff in formulating plans for and promoting the observance of Church School Rally Day.

We recommend that either April 19 or September 27, preferably the latter date, be

used for this observance.

CAMP DON-LEE

In view of the fact that the construction of Camp Don-Lee is incomplete and must be completed before it can render the larger service for which it was established, we recommend the continuation of this building project looking toward its completion within the present quadrennium.

We, therefore, recommend that each pastoral charge be asked to accept an apportionment of an amount equal to 1% of the total money raised during the year 1951-52, less the usual deductions. We further recommend that the Christmas Offering for Camp Don-Lee be continued as a means for raising this apportionment.

We recommend approval of the following Trustees, terms to expire in 1955: F. L.

Blount, Bethel; L. R. Foreman, Elizabeth City; F. D. Hedden.

We recommend approval of T. J. Collier, Bayboro, N. C., as treasurer of the Camp Don-Lee Fund.

RECOMMENDATIONS FOR 1952-53

1. Bible reading and study-with special emphasis on the new Revised Standard Version of the Bible.

2. Evangelism—making every church school a growing school; and winning every

pupil to Christ and church membership.

- 3. Missionary education and giving-the observance of World Service Sunday in every Church School each fourth Sunday with an adequate program of missionary education and the entire offering being designated for the World Service budget of the church.
- Stewardship of all life-with special emphasis on tithing as the minimum standard of financial giving.

5. Youth work-bringing more youth into the fellowship of the church; and deepening the commitment of all church youth and adult workers with youth.

6. Leadership training-enlisting and training qualified persons for Christian service; a leadership training class within reach of every church worker.

7. Church School Rally Day-an appropriate observance in every church with program and offering; financial goal, an amount equal to 1% of pastor's salary.

8. Church extension—encourage young adult groups to start new church schools in cooperation with the pastor and district superintendents.

9. An active Commission on Education and Assistant Superintendent for Memberhip Cultivation in every local church.

10. We recommend appointments as follows: Rev. C. P. Morris, Executive Secetary; Rev. Curtis Gatlin, Director of Youth Work; Rev. J. T. Green, Director of family Life Education.

11. The Board of Education has made the following appointments: Board treasrer, Wayne G. Starnes; Director of Adult Work, John M. Meares.

LEADERSHIP EDUCATION

We rejoice in the fact that there has been in our Conference a marked increase of interest in the leadership training program of our church. This is evidenced by the fact that last year there were held 26 Standard Christian Workers Schools with 2925 enrolled and 1800 course cards of credit issued. Further evidence is found in the fact that our Rally Day offering, which is earmarked for leadership training, increased 50% last year to reach the sum of \$4,535.22. This offering could easily be increased if every charge would send an amount equal to 1% of the pastor's salary. This money plus a vital interest in better trained leaders on the part of all pastors and churches would bring much needed leadership training opportunities within reach of every worker in every church of our conference. We recommend, therfore, that we seek to train our leaders in all phases of the work that they may be "workmen that needeth not be ashamed."

REPORT OF SPECIAL COLLEGE COMMITTEE

The Methodist Church is within her traditional emphasis when she asks that her colleges be Christian in fact. Bishop Francis Asbury enunciated a principle, when Cokesbury College was fighting for its very existence, that might well become a pattern in Methodism's higher education, "If we cannot have a Christian school, we shall have none."

In the Episcopal Address at the 1948 General Conference, the bishops of Methodism

re-emphasized the imperative need that Methodist schools be Christian:

"The actual contribution of the educational institutions related to the Church in terms of religion shall be of such a nature as to justify support. The Commission recognizes fully the superb contributions made by some of these institutions; but is of the opinion that in some situations the question of the religious life of the student is not faced with the same concern evidenced in planning the educational life of the student. If the Church is to be called upon for greater support of its institutions, the Church must be convinced that these institutions stand deliberately for something in the field of religion and the practices that religion demands. There is a Christian world view, a Christian way of life, a Christian commitment to the Christian leader. The educational institutions related to the Church, in addition to the educational service, must be evangelistic, in the proper sense of that term. Without apology, the Methodist institution must see to win its students to the Christ. Our schools must be Christian without apology and Methodist with pride. Our faculties must be Christian in fact. Our efforts must be to make the students Christian just as truly as we try to teach them to think, We must seek to graduate Christians as certainly as we graduate doctors, lawyers, musicians. There must be an end to the negative liberalism that glories in non-sectarianism that too often is non-everything in religion and that, in the long run, destroys the reason that justifies the Church's maintaining educational institutions.

Making and keeping a college Christian is not an easily realized fact. In America, secularism, which is just a high sounding world for worldliness, has come to dominate large areas of life "like the air about us." It is indeed a form of practical atheism. Christians of today, as in the early centuries, are a minority in the midst of a pagan society. The important fact observed and stated by Bishop Asbury is an imperative must: "A Christian educational institution cannot justify its existence unless its aims and

purposes are Christian."

Therefore, be it resolved that the special College Committee, constituted by the 1951 session of the North Carolina Annual Conference, concurs unanimously in recommending that the colleges for which the North Carolina Conference is primarily responsible, namely: Louisburg, Greensboro and High Point Colleges re-emphasize Methodism's historic position of joining "vital piety and knowledge."

Our rejoicing as educators is not primarily in buildings nor in funds, but in the Grace of God, which when given opportunity creates in the lives of young men and women evidences of His redeeming Grace, and demonstrates anew that in Christ, Grace

and Truth come to mankind.

The intangible force called campus atmosphere plays a large part in the life of a college. A CHRISTIAN COLLEGE does have an environment which is different from the secular campus. OUR METHODIST COLLEGES must be pattern-makers as regards campus influences. The prevailing social standards are no longer sufficiently Christian to be accepted without question. Is it not reasonable, then, that the North Carolina Annual Conference has a right to expect that its educational institutions give a practical demonstration of their Christian commitment?

Your Committee has carefully weighed the several choices confronting the Conference concerning its colleges, especially Louisburg College. These are: (1) To close;

(2) To merge; (3) To re-locate; or (4) To retain.

Your Committee feels that Louisburg College should be retained at Louisburg, N. C. However, from the standpoint of a population center as a supporting community-constituency, relocation would commend itself favorably. But from the standpoint of the present investment, lack of required funds, and prohibitive construction costs, it seems

wise to retain the college at the present site. We also feel that Greensboro and High Point Colleges should be retained at their present locations.

We, therefore, recommend:

(1) That the North Carolina Conference join the Western North Carolina Conference in the United College Appeal to raise a sum of \$2,500,000 to be allocated as follows:

(2) That the Quotas be set at 60% for the Western North Carolina Conference and 40% for the North Carolina Conference.

(3) That the North Carolina Conference shall raise its \$1,000,000 quota as follows:
(a) The sum of \$400,000 in cash and pledges to be raised on a District-by-District basis beginning with the annual conference year 1952-1953, with all pledges to be paid within a three year period. (b) The sum of \$600,000 to be raised by increasing the College Sustaining Fund from its present 3½% to 7% over a period of ten years; namely, the conference years 1952-1953 to 1962-1963. (The present 3½% College Sustaining Fund is producing an annual amount approximating \$60,000, which is the life-line of our Colleges and must be continued as an operating fund beyond the ten-year period. The \$600,000 is to be realized from the increase from 3½% to 7% which amount is to be used for endowment and building fund.) (c) Any local charge may have the privilege of paying its proportionate share of the \$600,000 in a period of less than ten years; provided further, that any such Charge shall continue to carry the present 3½% College Sustaining Fund.

(4) That the Bishop and his Cabinet be and are authorized to determine the proportions or amounts that are to be allocated of the said \$400,000 to each District. Each District Superintendent, the Executive Director of the Methodist College Foundation, together with three ministers and three laymen to be selected by the District Superintendent are to determine how the District goal is to allocated to the several charges.

(5) That the organization and personnel of the Methodist College Foundation

be used in the campaign.

Your Committee strongly feels that our Methodist Colleges are deserving of the prayers, the faith, and the support of the people called Methodists.

AMENDMENTS OFFERED TO THE REPORT OF SPECIAL COLLEGE COMMITTEE

1. Offered by H. G. Ruark and accepted by the committee (to be inserted between paragraphs 6 and 7):

To this end, we recommend that there be a Board of College Visitors constituted

as follows:

Twelve members from each of the two conferences to be appointed on a quadrennial basis by the presiding bishop upon nomination as follows:

Two by the Commission on World Service and Finance.

Two by the Board of Education.

Two by the Board of Lay Activities.

One by the Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications.

One by the Board of Evangelism.

Two by the Commission on Town and Country work.

Two by the Woman's Society of Christian Service.

*Two by the Board of Missions.

Provided that, in the event the Western North Carolina Conference should not accept this provision, a Board of Visitors of twelve members be constituted from the North Carolina Conference according to the procedure stated above.

Provided that, should action of the forthcoming General Conference materially change the organization of the annual conferences, the procedure for nomination of members of the Board of Visitors may be changed to insure its remaining broadly rep-

resentative.

The duties of this Board shall be to visit at least once each year Louisburg, Greensboro, and High Point Colleges (Brevard College to be included if agreed by the Western North Carolina Conference); to inform itself thoroughly regarding the policy, personnel, program and life of each of the institutions with particular regard to their distinctive Christian character and to report its findings to each regular session of the conferences. The Board shall have no administrative or policy-making authority. Any recommendations it wishes to make regarding policy and program shall be made to the Board of Trustees of the institution concerned, or the Boards of Education of the two conferences, or both. As a matter of information, such recommendations may be reported to the conferences.

2. Offered by E. C. Crawford, not accepted by the committee, and not adopted by

conference vote:

I move that Recommendation No. 3 be amended to read, "That the North Carolina Conference shall raise for our colleges annually \$93,000 for three years, beginning with the annual conference year 1952-1953. That the goal for each charge for each year shall be a sum equal to 2% of the total amount reported by the charge in Conference minutes of 1951."

3. Offered by S. A. Chalk, Jr., Morehead City, not accepted by the committee,

and not adopted by conference vote:

I move that the percentage of 2% suggested in Mr. Crawford's motion be averaged for a period of ten years instead of on a basis of amounts raised in 1951-1952.

4. Offered by R. W. Bradshaw and accepted by the committee:

I move that the following sections be added to Recommendation No. 3: (d) That the persons named in Recommendation No. 4 be authorized to make allocation of quotas for the College Sustaining Fund to churches not in existence at the time the basis for apportionments under section (c) was fixed; (e) That the same committee be authorized to make adjustments in quotas of churches or charges undergoing marked changes in their financial resources during the ten-year period.

5. Offered by B. O. Merritt, not accepted by the committee, and not adopted

by conference vote:

I move that an amount of 4½% of the 1951 budget, less the items deducted in the Orphanage apportionment, be apportioned to each charge each year, and placed in the budget, for the next ten years.

6. Offered by F. S. Love, not accepted by the committee, and not adopted by conference vote:

That the following be added to Recommendation No. 2: Provided, however, that the special college committee shall meet with the Methodist College Foundation and the executive committee of the Board of Christian Education of the Western North Carolina Conference to review the allocations to the two confrences with a view to determining the most equitable division of quotas, and report these findings to the 1952 regular session of this conference.

That the following be added to Recommendation No. 3: In the event that, following the consultation provided in the above amendment to Recommendation No. 2, the total amount allocated to the North Carolina Conference shall be revised, the amounts in this

paragraph shall be revised by a like percentage.

7. Offered by J. W. Page, not accepted by the committee, and not adopted by conference vote: I move that Recommendation No. 3, section (a) become retroactive as of the beginning of the current conference year.

S. I. Starnes moved that the amendment be amended to included two representa-

tives from the Board of Missions. The committee accepted.

INTER-CONFERENCE COMMISSION

on Student Religious Work (Wesley Foundation) of the Western North Carolina and North Carolina Conferences of the Methodist Church for the Year 1951-1952

The Commission is glad to report well-established Foundations at Duke University and at the three units of the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, the North Carolina College for Women at Greensboro, and State College at Raleigh. All are operating with trained and competent directors and have the hearty support of Methodist students in each case. R. Harold Hipps has served as State Director, on a volunteer basis, with small honorarium and provision for travel, postage, etc. Help has also been given, as may be found from the report of the Treasurer of the Commission, at Appalachian State Teacher's College, Boone; East Carolina College, Greenville; Davidson Colege, Davidson; W.C.T.C., Cullowhee; and Catawba College, Salisbury.

We believe no enterprise of the Conferences is more significant or important than this contact which the church makes with college and university students, or will pay larger dividends, in proportion to investment, in terms of church loyalty among

future leaders of church and community life.

The Commission has held its annual meeting. Prior to that meeting, held in May, six or eight meetings of sub-committee were held, at Greensboro, Chapel Hill, Durham, and Raleigh, to make, so far as possible, a comprehensive survey of the needs at the various Foundations. Survey Questionnaires were sent to these and other institutions. After long study the sub-committee reported certain recommendations to the annual meeting of the Commission, which after further study, have become a part of the requests presented to the Annual Conferences through the Commissions on World Service and Finance.

These recommendations embody requests for substantial and yet modest increases in appropriations for annual operation, including small additions to salaries of directors. Furthermore, we have requested an appropriation of \$10,000 each year of the quadrennium for erection of Foundation facilities at Duke; at Woman's College in connection with buildings projected at College Place Church; and at State College in similar manner with Fairmont Church, maing a total of \$30,000.00 per year for the next four years to be divided on a 60-40 basis between the Western N. C. and N. C. Conferences. In each case the constituency of the institution concerned is requested to raise an additional \$60,000 during the quadrennium, thus providing for each Foundation facilities costing approximately \$100,000.

The Commission believes that conditions, needs, and opportunities fully warrant these requests and these plans for the immediate and longer-term service of our young

men and women, and through them of the church and the state and society in general.

It should be said here that all members of the Commission appreciate the support of the Conferences up to this time and confidently hope for larger support, and for increased effectiveness of the work with which our several Foundations are charged.

Report No. 1

For the support of retired ministers, their wives and dependent children your board recommends the continuance of the assessment of an amount equal to 15% of salaries of the pastors and their assistants, against the charges of the North Carolina Conference. Also that an amount of 1% of the salaries of all ministers and their assistants who are members of the North Carolina Conference be assessed against them. These amounts to be sent to the Conference treasurer.

It is recommended that clerical members of the Conference who are serving special appointments without annuity benefit be exempt from the assessment of 1% against their salaries.

We recommend that paragraph ten of the Constitution of the Ministers' Retirement Fund be amended to read:

Any member who is transferred out of the North Carolina Conference shall have the privilege of either (a) Retaining his claim on this fund so long as he contributes 2% of the salary he receives wherever his appointment may be, or (b) Retaining his claim on this fund with additional benefits being paid and dividends credited to his account at one-half the normal rate so long as he contributes after leaving the Conference 1% of the salary he receives wherever his appointment may be, or (c) Be refunded the amount he has contributed to this fund.

The Annual Layman's Retreat of the Board of Lay Activities was held at Louisburg College June 7 and 8, 1952. Many laymen participated in this experience. Your Board still has as its goal the attendance of at least one representative layman from every charge in the Conference, for the benefits derived from participation are most valuable.

Layman's Day in February of this year was more widely observed than ever before. In many multiple-point circuits, services on the appointed day were held by the laymen in every church. The expansion of this one phase of the program of Lay Activities, with its roots deep in the tradition of Methodist testimony, is indicative of the heightened interest of our laymen. We call upon pastors and laymen alike to continue their emphasis on this vital and challenging opportunity. In order to follow closely the World-wide Protestant observance of Laymen's Sunday, every charge is requested for this church year to observe Laymen's Day, so far as practicable, on Sunday, December 7, 1952.

Many new clubs of Methodist Men have been established and chartered during the year. Wherever a strong organization has been effected, pastors and laymen alike report

an increased awareness of the total program of the church. Your Board pledges its asistance to any pastor who desires to form a chartered Methodist Men's Club. A goal of 156 such clubs in the Conference by 1956 has been fixed, and we sincerely hope to

reach the goal before 1956.

The General Conference has provided a somewhat new and different plan of organization for each local church. Your Board reports that definite plans are being formulated for informing our laymen of their increased responsibility and more efficiently bringing into use the tremendous potential power of our laymen under the new plan of organization. Particular stress is to be laid on the matter of stewardship in the coming months.

REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE BOARD OF EVANGELISM

The members of your Conference Board of Evangelism who have served during the quadrennium now closing would like to record their appreciation for the cooperation which they have received in the program of evangelism for the past four years. As we look to the future, we feel that we could do nothing better than to recommend to this Conference for the quadrennium 1952-1956 the program adopted by the General Board of Evangelism during the 1952 session of the General Conference. Therefore, we quote the following:

"THE PROGRAM OF EVANGELISM"

'Inasmuch as the fundamental task of the Church is individual and social salvation, and the present civilization is sick and tottering, waiting for the healing of God upon the individual and this tormented world, be it hereby resolved that in keeping with the action of the World Methodist Council calling all branches of Methodism to a world-wide program of Evangelism and in response to the challenge of the Episcopal Address which revealed the sobering fact that in the United States of America alone there are 18 million homes that do not have a single member in any church, we do adopt the following program of evangelism for the quadrennium 1952-56:

- I. A. Every local church participating in the Worldwide mission of Evangelism:
 - Through intensive evangelistic preparation from Worldwide Communion Sunday October 5, 1952 to Watch Night Service December 31, 1952.
 - Cooperation during 1953 in the year of world-wide evangelism, with one of the high points of emphasis being Pentecost Sunday, May 24, which in the year 1953 is also Aldersgate Sunday.
 - B. Every local church implement its program throughout the quadrennium as follows:
 - A Spiritual Life Mission in every local church annually, to activate the inactive and to deepen the spiritual life of all members.
 - 2. A systematic visitation of all members in the local church.
 - 3. A prayer group in every local church, and the cultivation of a prayer movement.
 - 4. Family worship in every home, including grace at meals.
 - 5. Making and keeping an up-to-date prospect (and constituency) roll.
 - In each local church a group organized for regular and systematic Lay Visitation Evangelism, with every member of the local church a "witness" and personal worker.
 - 7. Every new member trained in church membership and the Christian life.
 - 8. Every member taking his place for Christ in the community life and activities.
 - Every local church cooperating with District or City Board of Missions in organizing new churches and reclaiming abandoned churches.
- II. Every District Cooperating through:
 - I. A United Evangelistic Mission conducted on a District or Inter-District level.
 - 2. A Spiritual Life Mission for preachers and laymen in every District.
- III. Every Conference cooperating through:
 - Seeking to secure at least a ten per cent net gain in membership during the quadrennium.
 - Conducting annually, on a Conference or Area basis, a Youth Work Camp in Evangelism, in cooperation with the Board of Education.
 - 3. Seeking to build up the spiritual tone of the Annual Conference Session.
 - 4. Encouraging the use of every helpful method of evangelism and that full use be made of such technique as radio, television (and audio vision), that, in the spirit of St. Paul we may be all things to all men if by any means we may win some. (page 341 Daily Christian Advocate).

In addition to the above, we strongly recommend full participation in the South-eastern Jurisdictional Evangelistic Missions for which the Bishops of the Jurisdiction are organizing as follows:

Charlotte Area—May 1-May 10. Richmond Area—April 17-April 26.

BOARD OF TEMPERANCE

The Methodist Church has ever opposed alcoholic beverages; and the North Carolina Methodist Conference, in session in Burlington, North Carolina, on this October 25, 1952, reaffirms its opposition to the manufacture, sale and use of beer, wine, whiskey and all other intoxicating beverages.

This Conference deplores the tragic fact that since the repeal of National Prohibition in 1933 and particularly since the legislation of liquor in certain areas in North Carolina in 1935, there has been a continuing increase in the sale of alcoholic beverages and there has been a continuing increase in drinking, drunkedness, and the evils that are caused by liquor.

This Conference calls upon Methodists and all other persons to abstain completely from the use of liquor; it calls upon the voters of North Carolina to elect to the General Assembly persons, who will vote against liquor, and to elect to the General Assembly persons, who will enforce the laws against liquor.

This Conference reiterates its petition that the General Assembly of North Carolina give the people of our State the privilege of voting in a Statewide Referendum for or against the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors.

Since the purpose of advertising the sale of any merchandise is to increase the sale of that merchandise, this Conference appeals to the publishers of newspapers and other publications to refrain from publishing advertisements of beer, wine, whiskey, and other alcoholic beverages; and this Conference urges the General Assembly of North Carolina to enact a Statute to prohibit the advertisement of all alcoholic beverages in newspapers and other publications, published in North Carolina, to prohibit such advertisements in radio and television broadcasts, originating in this State either by initial production or by reproduction by Stations within this State, and to prohibit such advertisements on billboards on the highways and at all other places in our State.

As a means of improving instruction regarding the evils of alcoholic beverages, the 1953 General Assembly is urged to appropriate for the State Department of Public Instruction ample funds to provide for the employment of a competent person to supervise effective instruction in the Public Schools of the State regarding the evils of alcoholic beverages.

Since motor vehicle accidents on our highways are increasing to an alarming proportion and since a large percent of these highway accidents are caused by liquor drinking, the General Assembly is urged to enact drastic legislation against drunken driving. If a statute were enacted, requiring the imposition of a substantial prison sentence on every Defendent, found guilty of drunken driving, the enforcement of such legislation would decrease and almost stop completely this evil that is causing slaughter and death on our highways.

Since a large majority of the Counties in our State have demonstrated their opposition to the sale of intoxicating liquors, the 1953 General Assembly is urged to repeal the "gallon law" that legalizes and permits the shipment and transportation of whiskey to the extent of one gallon into Dry Counties. As a simple matter of common decency and fair government, neither the State of North Carolina nor the United States Government should permit whiskey to be shipped or otherwise transported into Counties, in which the legal sale of intoxicants is not permitted.

This Conference reaffirms its endorsement of the Allied Church League, that has been organized by the Churches of North Carolina for the purpose of combatting the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors; and we urge all Pastors and other Church Leaders and Church Members to give full cooperation and support to the program and work of the Allied Church League.

This Conference urges that instruction in our Public Schools, in our Church Schools and in our Youth Organizations, regarding the harmful effects of alcohol, be made as effective as possible. We urge all Pastors to preach often in behalf of Total Abstinence and we urge that the subject of Temperance be given a prominent place in the program of District Conference and all other Conferences and Meetings of our Church.

This Conference urges our district superintendents, our pastors and all of our churches to cooperate fully in the promotion and prosecution of anti-liquor programs and projects on the Conference level, on the district level, and on the local church level, and in all of our youth organizations and in all of the clubs and societies of our Church.

This Conference appeals to all pastors and all church members that they make effective the opposition of The Methodist Church to this nefarious business. The liquor traffic would destroy the Church, if it could; the Church could destroy the liquor traffic, if it would. Hence, every person, who is interested in the Church, should use his influence, his means, and his vote, against the liquor traffic. Any person, who drinks liquor, or votes to legalize liquor, or in any manner supports the liquor traffic, should not consider himself fit or qualified to hold any office or occupy any place of leadership in The Methodist Church. Our pastors should not recommend or approve for membership on any Official Board, or for service as an officer or teacher in the Church School, or for any other official position in the Church, any person, who manufactures, sells, advertises, buys, drinks, or votes for beer, wine, whiskey or any other alcoholic beverage. Our Church cannot hope to win our battle against this vicious foe of humanity by having in places of leadership persons, who patronize this nefarious business. As individuals we Methodists should abstain absolutely from the use of alcoholic beverages. As members of society, we should vote and work to outlaw the liquor traffic. The attitude and the practice of individuals should be Total Abstinence. The attitude and the policy of government should be Absolute Prohibition. And to the achievement of Total Abstinence and Absolute Prohibition, we appeal to all Methodists and all other CALE K. BURGESS, Chairman citizens in our country.

COMMISSION ON TOWN AND COUNTRY WORK

Report No. 1

To promote the work of the Kingdom of God in the rural areas of our conference during this conference year your Commission on Town and Country Work has done the following:

 Your Commission has continued to emphasize the vital part and place the rural churches hold in in our great Methodist Church. Truly, one of the most encouraging signs of progress in our Conference is the improvements among our rural churches and the remarkable achievements which they have accomplished for God in their respective communities, and through the program of our church, in other parts of the world.

2. Your Commission has continued to advocate the policy of strengthening the work of our church in the Town and Country area by creating new charges by dividing the larger charges; by recognizing the churches whose growth and achievements demand

added services and help for further growth and development.

3. Your Commission is grateful to state that proceeds from the J. M. Ormond Fund are being used to collect helpful information for our conference and at the same time assist worthy students in the Duke Divinity School, Dr. A. J. Walton in his report to this commission states that this year two students are making a survey of the Durham District by means of a scholarship of \$600 each from the Ormond Fund.

Dr. Walton closed his report by saying, "Before this school year is out we probably will be in position to assign to this fund sufficient students to make use of the funds that are now available. However, we do not intend to merely assign students to work on the fund. Our first purpose is to discover those projects that will be of greatest value to the Conference when they are completed and then assign the students on the basis of ability to carry forward such study."

4. Your Commission has advocated the need of Church Extension in the towns and open country, although at the same time it has been aware of a similar need in

ır cities.

5. The Commission supported wholeheartedly the memorial to General Conference that Supply Pastors be given the authority of serving Holy Communion to their congregations.

6. Your Commission is grateful to report that the Garris-Grove Experimental Project is making remarkable progress under the guidance of its faithful pastor, Rev. Haywood Harrell. It appears that by next conference a new brick church with adequate facilities for the religious needs of the community will be completed.

Report No. 2

1. The Commission on Town and Country work concurs with the Board of Missions and Church Extension in the new minimum salary schedule for the ensuing conference year 1952-3: \$2,600 for single mniisters, \$2,800 for married ministers with no dependent children, and \$3,000 for married ministers with one or more dependent children.

2. The Commission on Town and Country Work requests the Conference to establish a new minium salary schedule during the ensuing quadrennium providing \$3,000 for single ministers, \$3,300 for married ministers with no dependent children, and \$3,600 for married ministers with one or more dependent children.

This schedule is a minimum necessity in view of the fact that the cost of living index, as published by the Federal Reserve Board, reached 185.6% in 1951 as compared to 100% for the base year 1940, and inflation is yet in progress and prospect.

As the means of reaching this new minimum salary goal an assessment is recommended of 3% on the total budget, less the usual deductible items, using the 1950-51 base.

The original sustentation fund paper was adopted by the 1941 Annual Conference. The purpose of the fund then was to aid pastors on the less financially able

charges. Since 1941 the fund has undergone an evolution as new conditions have developed in the Conference. Now the minimum salary fund is necessarily called upon to aid pastors on less financially able charges, to undergird the present program of dividing large circuits, to undergird the expanding program of new church extension, and to assist in the developing situation in which an increasing number of student pastors are necessarily being appointed in the several districts.

4. The Commission on Town and Country Work concurs with the Board of Missions and Church Extension in its purpose to greatly increase the program of church extension in the Conference. The Commission confidently expects that rural church extension will be given adequate consideration along with urban and suburban work.

It is the view of the Commission that the Conference policy and program on church extension should be preceded by and undergirded with an adequate and conference-wide work of research and survey, which would indicate birth rates and population trends, analyze significant sociological factors, and otherwise properly discover needs and

prove potentialities.

5. A particular aspect of church extension should here be noted. While it is urgent that we move rapidly to establish churches in newly developed population centers, it should be realized that we have at least 115 churches which list an active membership of less than 50. Many of these churches are declining and many will be closed in time unless proper steps are taken by the Conference. It is necessary to extend and expand through new churches, and it is necessary to conserve and expand through established churches.

6. The Commission on Town and Country Work is now prepared to offer the services of a special Rural Church Work Committee to the District Superintendents, on request, to make studies, diagnoses, and recommendations with reference to rural churches

or charges which may be classified as declining or not progressive.

7. The Commission on Town and Country Work endorses the action of the special session of the Annual Conference with reference to financial support for our church-owned colleges. Each rural charge is requested by the Commission to gladly accept and complete the asking for this long neglected cause.

Rev. Henry G. Ruark and Rev. Key W. Taylor have been nominated by the Com-

mission to serve on the Board of College Visitors.

8. The Commission on Town and Country Work takes this means to thank our conference delegates to the recent General Conference for their effective participation in securing for unordained pastors the right to administer the Communion.

The Commission on Town and Country Work by this means reminds the rural charges that mission special projects are available in the new quadrennium as an oppor-

tunity for fuller expression of the missionary spirit of the congregations.

 Pursuant to paragraph 1231 in the 1952 Discipline the Commission on Town and Country Work nominates Rev. W. A. Tew for Conference Secretary of Town and Country Work.

11. The J. M. Ormond Fund for the Training of Ministers for the Rural Church has now been operative for one conference year. The annual report from Duke Divinity School on the use of the fund has been received and is on file with the Conference

Secretary of Town and Country Work.

12. The Commission on Town and Country Work nomintes and hereby asks Conference confirmation for the Committee on Rural Research, the personnel of the committee to be: the Chairman of the Commission on Town and Country Work, Mrs. J. H. Cutchin, Rev. Henry B. Lewis, and the Conference Secretary of Town and Country Work.

13. The Commission on Town and Country Work requests the Conference to appropriate the amount of \$1,000.00 for research for the new quadrennium, and the amount of \$250.00 for the running expenses of the Commission for the ensuing con-

ference year.

The recent General Conference adopted the following resolution, with which the Commission on Town and Country Work records concurrence: "Be it resolved that The General Conference of The Methodist Church endorses the Christian Rural Overseas

Program and urges its rural churches and members to support the CROP community programs for commodities by the provision of leadership and by participation in the campaigns."

15. The Commission on Town and Country Work nominates and hereby asks Conference confirmation for the Committee on Rural Parsonages, the personnel of the committee to be: Rev. Henry G. Ruark, Rev. M. R. Gardner and Mrs. Pierce Johnson.

16. The Commission on Town and Country Work requests the Bishop to appoint a special committee of at least 15 persons, some of whom would be laymen, who would be asked to make a study in which, (1) a careful analysis and diagnosis would be made of the present structure and function of the Annual Conference, and (2) a detailed proposal having the characteristics of genuine statesmanship would be made as to a comprehensive and long range policy, program, and strategy, both spiritual and institutional, for the Annual Conference.

This could well be a real work of ecclesiological architecture which would bear

fruit for time and eternity.

The committee would be authorized to utilize the services of any resource persons deemed necessary, and to employ any needed secretarial assistance, and to present any necessary expense account to the proper conference agency for payment.

The report of the committee would be made to the next regular session of the

Annual Conference, and would be suggestive in nature.

METHODISM'S MINISTRY TO THE COMMON PEOPLE

Historically, Methodism has been the church of the plain people. Methodistm's emphasis upon the warm heart, upon personal Christian experience, upon Christian good deeds has always found a ready response from the great masses. Early Methodist eaders were passionately concerned about the multitudes who were out of the fold of Christ. Methodist preachers, following the example of John Wesley, went out into the helds, down into the mines and into the factories to preach the unsearchable riches of Christ to the shepherdless workers. The people, to the amazement and consternation of most ecclesiatical authorities, heard them gladly. A revival broke out at the grass oots. Like a mighty flame it swept England and Europe and the new world.

In the new world men on horseback armed with the gospel followed the restless olding people as they moved westward in search of economic security and freedom. Methodism in America from the beginning was destined to be the church of the great middle class, although people of all walks of life felt at home in every Methodist

hurch.

Methodism, by its broad sympathies and its global outlook, has an appeal to all men of good will. So in its membership should be people of every honorable calling. This, we believe, is the case today.

There is a growing feeling, however, that some Methodist churches are moving way from or are losing their grip upon the multitudes. It is a fact beyond dispute hat some people do not feel at home in many Methodist churches. The waning interest n mass evangelism, the emphasis upon an educated ministry without equal emphasis pon regeneration are factors that should give all of us deep concern. The fact that nany small sects and some of the large denominations are reaching multitudes for whom fethodism through the years has felt a solemn responsibility should shock us out of ur lethargy. Our tendency to concentrate and build big churches instead of going out into new areas where the people have been moving has cost Methodism in eastern arolina tremendously. Our emphasis upon programs and activities has left altogether so little time for personal spiritual development and evangelism. We must not forget hat no movement in history, secular or religious, has succeeded long without the suport of the common people. Communism is making rapid progress today because it lentifies itself with the underprivileged and the downtrodden. But communism is not

the answer to the needs and hurts of humanity. The gospel of Jesus Christ is the answer and its is our conviction that God has called Methodism to the kingdom for these times of restlessness and rebellion among the awakening multitudes.

The Methodist Church cannot afford to waver for a moment in its ministry to the great masses. Both the church and the people would be the loser. Multitudes of spiritually hungry and economically needy people would be without hope. Moreover, our

church would find itself without a mission.

We call upon the churches of the North Carolina Conference to bear witness to all people. We should neglect no group, for ours is a message big enough to command a hearing from all men. We deplore the trend in certain circles today to pit class against class, group against group, city against country. But we feel that Methodism has a particular responsibility toward the unreached multitudes. This, we believe, can be done through mass evangelism, through Church School evangelism, and through efforts of every organization in the church to reach those who are outside the fold. In view of the increasing interest in the economic welfare of the people, we call upon the church or grapple honestly and courageously with our economic problems and to seek to define clear, practical Christian principles by which men may find a solution for their economic problems. Jesus was concerned about economic affairs. The church cannot be unmindful of the part poverty is playing in the unrest that exists all over the world today. The church must not only be concerned about improving the economic status of the masses, but in impressing upon all men that we are stewards of life's material blessings.

The influence of the plain people never counted for more than it does today. Certainly, a church that feels its deep sense of mission will want to influence for Christ

the vast multitude in whose hands may lie the fate of nations and continents.

Report No. 4

We recommend that the following be adopted as a set of guiding principles for the division of circuits and the creation of new charges within our Conference:

 There should be a conference-wide policy and strategy, adopted by the bishop and his cabinet after careful study, for the division of circuits and the formation of new charges.

2. A process of education, spiritual, psychological, and financial, should precede

the division of circuits.

This is important if a new charge is to understand and accept intelligently the adjustments and the larger responsibilities involved in its new status. Frequently, the charge is impressed only with the privileges of its proposed new status, but the responsibilities are equally as real.

3. The churches forming a new charge should be, when possible, a sociological and a geographical unit. Such factors as marketing centers, school districts, and county

lines should be taken into account and given due consideration.

4. Generally speaking, small town and open country churches, even though having as many as 200-300 members, should be encouraged to become two-point charges rather than one-point stations.

(a) This is fairer to the many churches which are still on four-, five-, and six-point

charges.

- (b) It is a wiser use of our ministers, as few small town and open country churches will need, accept, or demand a preaching schedule and other programs of activities which justify the full services of a full-time minister.
- 5. Divisions of circuits should be on the basis of mutual agreement by all the churches on the circuit rather than simply from the desire of the larger church to withdraw for its own benefit and advancement.
- 6. If a new charge is to be served by a student pastor, that fact should be given the charge before it agrees to its new status.

7. The disciplinary provision for equity in the existing parsonage, the location of the new parsonage, and other such factors should be fully discussed and agreed upon by the churches involved prior to the division.

8. The following fnudamental and basic questions should be discussed and clearly

understood by the churches contemplating the formation of a new charge:

(a) Is there real need for this new charge, or is the desire for its creation prompted primarily from a spirit of keeping up or of surpassing another denomination?

(b) What are the prospects for numerical growth in the new charge? Is this estimate

of growth based on a religious census or on guess?

(c) Can the new charge become self-supporting within a reasonable length of time? Will it now assume or assume within a reasonable period a budget that will provide not only for the pastor's support but also for the support of Methodism's connectional causes, including World Service?

(d) Does the new charge have a suitable parsonage for the minister, or will it pro-

vide one before a minister is appointed to it?

REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON WORLD PEACE

Report No. 1

Section 1-Report on Crusade for World Order

The Board of World Peace wishes to give hearty endorsement to the most recent pronouncements of both the General Conference, held in San Francisco, and the Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference, held in Roanoke, Virginia, relating to World Peace. Moreover, the Committee would call special attention to the "Crusade for World Order." We thus embody in this report the reports of the two Conferences:

CRUSADE FOR WORLD ORDER

An urgent responsibility rests upon the Church to bring the total power of its spiritual and educational resources to bear upon the task of establishing and maintaining peace with justice. This is both basic to the Christian gospel and necessary to survival in a time of increasing tempo in the threat of further conflict. As in the Crusade for a New World Order, which did much to rally the support which prepared the way for the birth of the United Nations, the Church should now lead its people in the quest of the conditions of just and enduring peace, and specifically in the support of a Charter Revision Conference scheduled to be placed on the agenda of the General Assembly of the United Nations in 1955.

To this end, we request the Council of Bishops, utilizing the existing agencies of the Church, to implement the vital leadership toward peace embodied in their Episcopal Address by further leadership in a Crusade for World Order beginning in the fall of 1953, its objectives to include a study of the specific questions of adequate United Nations Charter revision, and the taking of all affirmative steps necessary to make the United Nations a more effective instrument of peace. We refer the objective Crusade for World Order to the Council on World Servcie and Finance for special consideration from the General Administration fund.

-Action of the General Conference at San Francisco, May 3, 1952.

We rejoice over the General Conference decision for a "Crusade for World Order in 1953-54," involving charter revision of the United Nations.

God is a God of law and order as well as of love. Law and order are opposed to war and chaos. It is incumbent upon us as Methodists to support and to work vigorously for law and order in this world of man . . . that we may have peace, harmony, and world brotherhood in reality . . . rather than just in wishful thinking.

Accordingly, we respectfully commend to the Council of Bishops, entrusted by the General Conference with the privilege and the responsibility of planning and directing this Crusade for World Order.

 That this Crusade be properly recognized as a major project of The Methodist Church during this present quadrennium in accordance with the desires of the General Conference so clearly reflected by its unanimous action on this subject in San Francisco;

2. That we regard as essential the strengthening of the United Nations. And, in full concurrence with the statement on war and peace adopted by the General Conference, we call "for revision of the United Nations charter in such a manner as to enable that body to enact, interpret, and enforce world law against aggression and war";

3. That we are jealous of the sovereignity of this great Christian nation of ours, but we likewise recognize that in a world where there is no international law and order, only international criminals . . . those seeking conquest and war . . . possess sovereignity;

4. That this Crusade for World Order designated for 1953-54 . . . the year just prior to automatic consideration of charter revision by the United Nations . . . be planned and established as one of action;

5. That every worthy instrument . . . mass meetings, church programs, and public education . . . be employed by the Church to acquaint our people with the need of the world unity through the United Nations, against international lawlessness, aggression, and war:

6. That every effective, practical means be utilized by our people in insisting that the Congress of the United States, through proper legislation, assume leadership in this vital charter revision activity by the United Nations to insure a limited world federation dedicated to and powerful enough to enforce world peace.

We believe that the Church must be dynamic and forceful in opposition to war. We believe that the church cannot longer remain inactive in the face of the constant threat of war. We see in a dynamic, forceful Crusade for World Order the answer to any suspicion of lethargy, indifference or inaction.

-Action of the Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference at Roanoke, June 30, 1952.

We urge, therefore, that efforts be made through every local church to acquaint our people with the plans and objectives above that they may direct their interest and energies to the secural of peace and good will among all the sons of men. Section 2—Report on Universal Military Training

We reaffirm the positions taken by previous Annual Conferences opposing Universal

Military Training.

Section 3-Report on Freedom of Communication

We express the conviction that our nation, with all other freedom loving countries, should firmly stand for the principle of freedom by communication, that all the peoples of the world might know the hopes and aspirations for peace inherent in all of us together, and we further urge our people to seek this end wherever and whenever opportunity is afforded.

NORTH CAROLINA PASTORS' SCHOOL

The North Carolina Pastors' School was again held as an integral part of the Duke University Christian Convocation and in connection with the North Carolina Rural Church Institute. Again it is to be noted that there was a very decided increase both in interest and attendance.

Perhaps the outstanding feature of the session was the James A. Gray lectures which were delivered by Dr. Paul E. Scherer, Professor of Homiletics, Union Theological Seminary, New York, Dr. Scherer gave six studies in the Book of Job, his

general theme being "The Ways of God-a Study in the Book of Job."

Regular class room instruction was given in many phases of church work by outstanding instructors. Courses and instructors were as follows: "The New Testament Faith and the Mind of the Church Today," Dr. Robert E. Cushman of Duke University Divinity School; "Christianity and World Mission," Dr. Daniel J. Fleming, Professor of Missions, Emeritus, Union Theological Seminary, New York; "The Minister's Tools and Techniques," Dr. Nolan Harmon, Book Editor, The Methodist Church; "The Vacation Church School," Mrs. W. R. Reed, Director of Children's Work, Western North Carolina Conference; Worship Workshop, Dr. J. J. Rudin, II, of Duke University Divinity School; "The Minister and Public Relations," Dr. James Sells, Executive Secretary, Visual Aids and Rural Church, Atlanta; "Visual Aids," Dr. H. E. Tower, Board of Education, Nashville; "Panning a Church Program," Dr. A. J. Walton, Duke University Divinity School.

Bishop Paul N. Garber made the Alumni address for the Divinity Alumni and delivered an address on "Religion in Europe as I have seen it." This was the Divinity

School Library lecture for 1952.

Preaching and worship services were held each morning in the University Chapel.

The sermons were delivered by Bishop Costen J. Harrell, of Charlotte.

Registration for classes totalled more than 400. Attendance at the general sessions was much larger.

THE METHODIST BOARD OF PUBLICATION, Inc.

Report No. 1

The fiscal year ending August 31, 1952, has been gratifying in many respects. During the year the circulation of the NORTH CAROLINA CHRISTIAN ADVO-CATE has increased 7,000 subscriptions despite an increase in subscription rates. For the year our circulation has had a weekly average of 21,566 copies and stands now at 23,700 copies weekly. This represents a gain of 33% over last year. ADVOCATE income also jumped from \$32,770 in 1951 to \$49,669, representing a 50% increase. Total costs of the ADVOCATE amounted to \$53,777.92, leaving a deficit of \$4,108, compared with last year's deficit of \$12,262. Income on Endowment funds this year brought the deficit down to \$1,620, perhaps the smallest in years.

Our lob Department grossed \$80,965, for an increase of 17% over the previous

year. Total income for the year amounted to \$130,639.85.

Constantly rising overhead costs and depreciation, however, continue to make our operations difficult and precarious. For example, depreciation has jumped from \$1,880 in 1949 to \$5,495 in 1952, an increase of \$3,615. Costs of paper and wages continue to rise. Even so, with increased circulation we have been able to reduce our per subscription cost from \$2.72 in 1951 to \$2.50 in 1952, a difference of twenty-two cents or .8%. Our net profit from the year's operations amounted to \$7,730.92. There is no indebtedness except on the home for the editor, which now amounts to \$3,218.50.

During the year valuable additions were made to our equipment. A new mailing system was installed, making for greater efficiency and economy. A new Miehle

vertical job press was purchased at a cost of \$6,950.

The promotion of the Advocate remains our number one task. Around 25% of our Methodist families now receive the Advocate. Our primary aim is to increase this percentage until every active Methodist family in our two Conferences has access to our

church paper.

At the last session of the North Carolina Annual Conference a special committee was appointed to study the feasibility of sending the ADVOCATE to every family on a conference-sponsored basis. During the year the Rocky Mount District, upon recommendation of the committee, undertook, as an experiment, to place the Advocate in every Methodist home in the District at a trial subscription rate of \$1.50 per family per year to churches that succeeded in placing the Advocate in every home. This project was eminently successful. The District as of September 1, had 4,340 subscribers. Recently, pastors and laymen voted enthusiastically to continue the plan and to recommend it strongly to other Districts of the Conference.

The Methodist Board of Publication, therefore, recommends that two additional Districts in the North Carolina Conference and that two districts in the Western North Carolina Conference set as a goal the placing of the Advocate in every Methodist heme in the District during the Conference year 1952-53 at \$1.50 per family to churches in the District that reach this goal. It further recommends that other subscription rates be continued as follows \$2.50 for single subscriptions per annum; \$6.00 for single subscriptions three years; \$2.00 to pastors; \$2.25 per subscription to churches reaching a quota of seven subscribers for every 100 members; \$1.75 per subscription for every family in the church. The Advocate is sent free to retired ministers and widows of ministers in our two Conferences.

The Board further recommends that January and February be designated as North Carolina Christian Advocate months and that every church in both Conferences use these months or some other appropriate time to engage in a campaign for renewals and

new subscriptions.

The terms of C. E. Jordan of the North Carolina Conference and Wilson O. Weldon of the Western North Carolina Conference expire at Conference this year. The Board at its annual meeting nominated Dr. Jordan and Dr. Weldon to succeed themselves for a term of five years and requests their re-election by their respective Conference. It also nominated Lawrence W. Routh, Greensboro laymen, to succeed N. L. Eure, deceased, and requests his election by the Western North Carolina Conference.

The following officers were elected: A. J. Hobbs, president; W. B. Hall, Vice-President; T. C. Hoyle, Sr., secretary; C. E. Jordan and Wilson O. Weldon, additional members of executive committee; C. W. Robbins, editor and manager; W. R. Thompson,

assistant manager.

Report No. 2

Recognizing the need for a larger circulation of The North Carolina Christian Advocate the 1951 session of The North Carolina Annual Conference authorized the appointment of a special committee to make some recommendations for this purpose. Bishop Carber appointed the following committee: Mrs. J. H. Cutchin, Rev. D. D. Holt, J. L. Horne, Rev. R. L. Jerome, John A. Park, and Rev. C. W. Robbins.

The committee thus constituted met in Rocky Mount on January 22, 1952. The Rocky Mount district was asked to try the experiment of trying to place the Advocate in every home throughout the district. During the year the district was organized to carry out this project with the result that today the district leads all others in the State

with 4,752 subscriptions.

Durham District

This experiment has been so successful that if every district did likewise the Piedmont press would be unable to take care of the printing. For this reason, we are therefore recommending that the Rocky Mount District continue their efforts to put our conference organ in every home and that two additional districts undertake a similar effort during the coming year. Nothing will take the place of interest, enthusiasm, and hard work. We feel that each pastor and church should be left free to determine the exact method of implementing this program. It is our conviction that the North Carolina Christian Advocate in every home will strengthen all the causes of Methodism during the coming quadremnium and that each church should cooperate in this special endeavor to increase the circulation of our church periodical.

As we come to the close of another year of service and seek to evaluate our program, it is with a sense of deep humility and gratitude that we recognize that we have made an advance for Christ and His Church, Evidence of growth and development on the part of our students is seen in their personal Christian experience, in their leadership in the Church and on the campus, in increased attendance at Church services and in participation in the various phases of the program of Wesley Foundation.

The enrollment at East Carolina College during the past year was 2,123. Methoodist students, 542: Men, 222; Women, 319. Freshmen, 221: Men, 81; Women, 140. 501 students made a total of 6.853 visits to our Student Center. Attendance in the College Class in our Church School increased—average attendance 42 for the year. The attendance was from 50 to 90 except on those Sundays when special events took most of the students away from campus on the week-end. This is remarkable because the College was on the five-day-week schedule this year.

We have had good representation at the various state and regional MSM conterences. Our representatives participated in the leadership in these conferences and this training has been of great help in the leadership of our program in the local group. Our Wesley Foundation president, Waylon Upchurch, of Sanford, was president of District No. 1, of the State MSM Conference and presided at the District meeting held in Chapel Hill April 19-20. He was elected president of the Inter-Religious Council on the campus of East Carolina College, in which all Church and campus religious groups have representation. The Counselor was counselor for the Commission on Worship at the Regional MSM Conference held at Lake Junaluska in June. Our students made a real contribution to this program.

Two additional Commissions were added to our program this past year—Vespers and Hospitality. Besides the Vespers on Sunday evenings at the Student Center, Vespers are held on Monday and Wednesday night at 10:00 o'clock. These weekly vespers are led by students and have met with a fine response. Attendance has increased and the leadership has been of a deep spiritual quality. Members of the College Faculty have led discussions at Sunday Vespers. The Fellowship Group, which meets at 7:00 every Wednesday morning at the Center, has increased from six to fourteen members, all members of our Wesley Foundation Council. This group is sincerely seeking to find the Christian way of life and to know God through Jesus Christ. Our Sunday School Lessons have centered around "How to Read the Bible"; "Bases of our Christian Faith"; "Basic Beliefs of Protestantism." Discussions at Sunday Vespers have proved most helpful to our students as they have had an opportunity to ask questions on these subjects, under the leadership of members of the Faculty, our Pastor, Counselor, and leaders of the local Church.

The Alpha Zeta Chapter of Wesley Players carried on a program of activities which stimulated interest in Christian drama and developed our students in the art of interpretation of Christian truth through drama. The Chapter presented dramatic services of worship in the local Church, and a play in the Eastern Carolina Drama Festival held at East Carolina College last spring. One of our students had the leading role in a play produced by the Drama Workshop at the Regional Conference at Lake Junaluska in June. The Chapter produced a series of programs over Radio Station

WGTC during Lent.

Four of our students served in Youth Caravans this past summer. The experience and training received in this service has been evident in their fine leadership in all phases of our Wesley Foundation program this Fall. One of these students served for

the second year in Youth Caravan.

A special effort was made during this Fall Quarter at the beginning of the College year to reach all our Methodist students, and this was done through visits, letters, invitations, distribution of orientation copies of MOTIVE and POWER to all freshmen and transfers, and calendars given by our Woman's Division of Christian Service. Letters were written to all students during the Quarter and every student whose name was

given through the Religious Registration at the College was contacted in some way. Group parties and Open House brought our students in large numbers to their "Home Away from Home," and parties in Fellowship Hall at the Church provided wholesome recreation and made them know that the Church was sincerely interested in them. There has been a spirit of Christian fellowship within the group and many students of other denominational groups have found a welcome and an avenue of service through our program.

A beautiful memorial gift was made to our Little Chapel in the Student Center in memory of one of our students who met death in a motorcycle accident last spring, Levene Midgett, Jr., of Rodanthe. The Woman's Society of Christian Service of Fair Haven Church, where his parents hold membership, gave a beautiful brass Cross, and his two sisters gave the candlesticks to match. Capt. Levene Midgett presented \$100.00 to complete the Chapel furnishings, and the students are setting up the Little Chapel as

a memorial to "Midge," their beloved fellow-student.

One of our former students is now studying at Scarritt College in preparation for full-time Christian service, and another of our former students, active in our Wesley Foundation throughout his college years, is now Instructor in Dramatic Arts at Scarritt College. Letters come continually from our former students expressing appreciation for all that our Wesley Foundation has mean in their lives. Several of our students are ser-

ionsly considering full-time Christian service.

It is through these who have gone from our Wesley Foundation into full-time Christian service and into places of leadership in their local Church, that we are in a measure able to evaluate the service rendered by our program here at East Carolina College. We pray that our new sign over the entrance—the lighted Cross over "Methodist Student Center," may indeed be a symbol of the Cross at the center of our life and program here.

REGARDING PERSONS HOLDING MEMBERSHIPS ON BOARDS AND COMMISSIONS

In keeping with the spirit of the legislation of the 1952 session of the General Conference with respect to membership on general boards and commissions; namely, that no person, except the Bishops, can have membership on but one board at a time and for not longer than eight consecutive years, (and the Bishops can have membership on only three Boards at a time and for only eight consecutive years), and believing that the adoption generally of this principle for membership on our Conference boards, committees, and commissions would be beneficial.

We, therefore, move the adoption of the following resolutions:

 That one can hold membership on only one board, committee, or commission at a time in the North Carolina Annual Conference;

2. That anyone who has served eight consecutive years on any board, committee, or commission as of the 1956 Annual Conference shall not be eligible for membership on that particular board, committee, or commission within four years;

3. That, as far as possible and practicable, all nominations be made equitably

among the districts:

- 4. That the following Boards, Committees, and Commissions be those on which membership is restricted to one Board, Committee, or Commission at a time: Commission on World Service and Finance, Board of Education, Board of Missions, Board of Lay Activities, Board of Hospitals and Homes, Board of Conference Claimants, Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications, Board of Temperance, Board of Evangelism, Commission on Town and Country Work, Committee on World Peace, Board of Social and Economic Relations, Radio and Film Commission, and the Commission on Christian Vocations:
- 5. That ex officio membership on a board or legislative membership from another board or boards shall not be counted as prohibited membership.

Permissive Legislation of the General Conference to be Decided on by the Annual Conference

- Resolved that the district superintendents, district missionary secretaries, the presidents and full-time executives of city or district missionary societies, and the chairman of the commission on Town and Country work be members of the Conference Board of Missions;
- Resolved that the North Carolina Annual Conference establish a Conference Board of Social and Economic Relations;
- Resolved that the North Carolina Conference establish a Radio and Film Commission.

CONDER PARSON JEROME By Dr. M. T. Plyler

This obituary sketch does not allow an adequate summary of the more than ninety years of the earthly sojurn of our dear Brother Jerome who filled so large a place in the North Carolina Conference. Fortunately, he left a most interesting record of his family for three generations.

His grandfather, Thomas Jefferson Jerome, was born in Hartford, Connecticut. He came to North Carolina when a boy and settled in Charlotte. Here, in early life, he married Miss Kate McLarty, daughter of Alexander McLarty.

His father, Thomas Archibald Jerome, married Elizabeth Catherine Conder, daughter of Peter and Caroline Conder. Their first child was born on June 16, 1857, and was named Conder Parson Jerome, bearing the name of his maternal grandfather. The boyhood of Conder P. Jerome was spent in Mecklenburg County, and he never had more than three months of school any year until he was grown.

In 1880 young Jerome entered Trinity College in Randolph County without adequate preparation, but by hard work he managed to

keep along with the class through the junior year.

On December 27, 1882, he married Miss Flora Eugenia Gray, who proved to be a genuine helper and wise counselor. Writing in 'Reminisciences of Conder Parson Jerome' after his retirement, he speaks of his marriage thus: "I consider this the best day's work I ever did." Those who have known Mrs. Flora Jerome throughout the bounds of the North Carolina Conference are in accord with her husband's opinion, for she was a woman having a fine sense of values who ever maintained high ideals and practiced them in her daily living for the edification of her family. Wherever she lived she was admired by the best people of the communities in which she lived. If her parsonage home was not up to the standard of her desires and the salary of her husband was meager in meeting the requirements of her family she was able to supplement these deficiences by virtue of the wealth of her own personality.

Through the early years of their itinerant life they served circuits in eastern North Carolina. Among these were Bladen Circuit, Clinton Circuit, Southport, Fairfield and Mattamuskeet in Hyde County. The four years spent at Fremont were followed by three years on the Gates Circuit where the family was most highly esteemed by all the citizens of the community. Following his stay at Gatesville, he requested his presiding elder to send him to West Durham Church in order that he might enroll his two oldest boys at Trinity College. He acknowledged that this was the only time he ever made a specific request of his presiding elder. His next appointment was Pittsboro, where their youngest child was born. It was here that the happy

occasion of their silver wedding anniversary was celebrated with their nine children present. At the close of this appointment his other assignments were as follows: South Mills, Popular Branch, Kenly, Winfall and Elm Street-Pikeville Charge, residing in Goldsboro. After serving this last appointment, he was superannuated and his son, Robert L. Jerome, was appointed to the same charge. While continuing to live in Goldsboro, his companion died and is buried in Montlawn Cemetery in Raleigh.

In October 1934 he married Mrs. Kate Drew Robeson, whose family he had known while serving in Southport. She was the companion of his old age, and she cared for him tenderly though he out lived her many years. He finally made his home with his daughter, Mrs. R. K. Herring in Thomasville, N. C. Brother Jerome died at the home of Mrs. Herring Sunday, December 23, 1951. A brief funeral was held in Austin Finch Memorial Chapel by the pastor, Rev. Wilson O. Weldon, December 26. Later in the day a service was held in Edenton Street church, Raleigh, and the burial was in Montlawn Cemetery there. At the service at Edenton Street church M. T. Plyler spoke a

few brief, intimate words:

"We have not assembled here on this occasion to pay final tribute to this good minister of the gospel in the silence of defeat, but rather have we come with a triumphant sense of victory at the close of the long and honorable career of this good man-a man who for more than half a century served as a minister to the people of the North Carolina Conference in many communities, living among them as a true minister of the gospel and inspiring them to good works through his own example of righteous living.

I feel privileged to speak since he was the pastor of my wife's family before our marriage, and I know the intimate relationships

of the two families.

The four years that the Jerome family spent in Gatesville while the children were young when they lived in the parsonage next door to the Smith family were indeed times of fine fellowship for both families, since Mrs. Jerome and Mrs. Smith came to know each other in a most intimate and helpful fashion. Both Mr. and Mrs. Leroy Smith were especially interested in the seven and afterwards eight children living in the parsonage. Mrs. Smith was often heard to express her admiration for Mrs. Jerome who could maintain so high a standard in her home and meet the responsibilities of a minister's wife and give valuable aid and encouragement to her husband on a four-point circuit.

Today we pay grateful tribute to this father and mother whose children now have homes of their own, being guided by wise and understanding parents. Memories now crowd upon them and memories dear will linger with them to give courage and strength to

meet the demands of their generation."

Rarely, following a death and in connection with a funeral service are there such an abundance of letters expressing tender sentiments from friends and relatives as those that came pouring in from all points of the compass as on this occasion.

Bishop Costen J. Harrell wrote a daughter, Mrs. R. C. Rapp: "My heart was deeply moved when I learned at this Christmastime of the going of your dear father. He was the last of the dear and intimate contemporaries of my parents left among us. He was my

pastor when I went to college and my devoted friend and helper always. It was a great joy to me to recognize him when he came to the High Point Conference. I will ever esteem and love him and rather than send to you my condolence, I congratulate all his children

on having such a father."

Isaac London, in an editorial in the Post Dispatch, Rockingham, N. C., wrote: "A patriarch in Methodism died December 23, Rev. C. P. Jerome, at the home of one of his daughters in Thomasville. He was 94, and was licensed to preach in 1881. I recall when he was pastor of The Methodist Church in Pittsboro soon after the turn of the present century, and when the new fangled gas buggies were coming to public attention, he singlehandedly built himself one, and it really ran. He stuck to his ministry, but even a small turn of the dial might have changed him into another Henry Ford. He died full of years—only six from the century mark. A fine gentleman, with the gentleness that the term connotes. Five daughters and four sons survive him, with 33 grandchildren and 17 great-grandchildren. "To live long is almost everyone's wish, but to live well is the ambition of few.' Mr. Jerome lived long and well."

The members of this Conference, his colleagues in the service of our Master, say with sincerity: Brother Jerome lived long and well.

JOHN WESLEY HARRELL By C. D. Barelift

John Wesley Harrell was born October 18, 1870, on a farm in Nansemond County, Virginia, a son of Elkanah and Louisiana Harrell. The oldest of seven children—four boys and three girls—he put into practice the daily example of his hard-working, Christian parents, who had great devotion to their Bible, church, and children and to all that was honorable. By the pattern thus set for his life he cut the cioth of the years for the garment of Christian living.

In his early teens he heard God's call to preach. He promptly set about preparing himself for his life's work by becoming more active in his church, in prayer meetings, and more diligent in his studies. And there was never any doubt to him about the Divine call to him

to preach.

He set about to prepare himself academically for his high calling, doing his elementary and high school work wherever he could. In 1895 he graduated from Elon College. However, later he studied further there and at Duke, earning the degree of A.B. and M.A. For faithful and outstanding service in the ministry a college awarded him the honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity.

At Elon College he met Ora Estelle Aldridge, Union Ridge, N. C., whom he married on October 19, 1897, in the county church at Union

Ridge, Alamance County.

Their first charge was the Christian Church, Waverly, Va. From there they went to Portsmouth, Va., where they started a congregation, built a wooden church, then a stone one, during a pastorate of thirteen years. After a good pastorate at Dayton, Ohio, they came back to North Carolina where he was pastor of the First Christian Church, Burlington. While there the present large, beautiful church building was erected.

When the Burlington church was completed, he decided that he could be of larger service to his Master in The Methodist Church (his parents named him for the founder of Methodism). He was admitted into the North Carolina Conference in 1920 and held pastorates at Troy, New Bern, Elizabeth City, Farmville, Roanoke Rapids, Plymouth, Kenly, and St. Pauls. At the end of three years at St. Pauls, due to the illness of his wife, he retired. She died January 14, 1940, a little over a year after his retirement.

After his wife's death he went to California to live with his son, John. Of these years of retirement his son writes: "He was happy with his Bible, his hymnal, his church, his interest in the mission fund he established with the M. E. Mission Board, his memories of a preacher' life—the best life on earth—until called again. December

11, 1951. He was 81."

Dr. Harrell was a good gospel preacher, effectively blending scholarship and religious emotion. The people heard him gladly and redemptively. He was a good administrator, splendid organizer, and a builder of churches both spiritually and physically. Though dead, he still lives through the good deeds he did, the transforming gospel he preached, and the godly influence he exerted.

He is survived by his son, John A., California; two sisters, Miss Elizabeth Harrell and Mrs. Emmett Rogers; one brother, Cham Har-

rell, all of Virginia.

A good appraisal of a parent's life can be found in a sincere testimony of his children who have intimate knowledge of his or her every-day living. The following tribute was paid to Dr. Harrell by his son: "My father was a saint. He was my life. To lose him was to lose much of my life. To want to live without him seems very hard. Perhaps you will say one prayer for me."

"Servant of God, well done! Rest from thy loved employ; Thy battle's fought, thy victory won, Enter thy Master's joy."

FRED FEARINGTON WARREN By Dennis F. Kinlaw

Fred Fearington Warren was born August 24, 1893, in Sampson of Methodist parents. His death came on December 14, 1951, as the result of a tragic automobile accident. His going came as a hard shock to his many friends for "Brother Fred," as he was affectionately called, was widely known.

Fred Warren was a supply pastor who preached the gospel effectively. It was not his good fortune to have the educational opportunities of some. He was, however, one who made good use of those opportunities that he had and was respected by those who knew him for his constant determination to improve himself. Fred was converted early in life and from that time had a deep interest in the work of the kingdom. It seemed to be his greatest desire to lead others to a personal knowledge of the Saviour whom he loved. It was this that led him to spend a good portion of his mature life in the ministry.

In August of 1917 Fred Warren married Miss Olivia Jones, who was to become a devoted helpmate for him. God blessed these two in giving them three children, Helen Bell Warren, who lives in Charlotte, N. C., Melville Frederic Warren, of Morganton, N. C., and Virginia Roselyn Warren, of Wilmington, N. C. After his marriage Fred went with his wife to her church, the Free Will Baptist Church. Here he found a place of service and held several pastorates, doing a lot of preaching in his section of the state. In 1947 Fred came back to The Methodist Church and received a local license. He was appointed to the Clinton Circuit where he served faithfully until his death. He was beginning his fifth year of service there when he was taken.

It was the privilege of this writer to work in two revivals with Fred and to have good fellowship with him for several years. Fred Warren was a clean man, sincerely interested in his churches and his people. He was a man who loved his Bible, his prayer closet, and an opportunity to preach the gospel. Nothing seemed to thrill him more than the thoughts of helping someone become a Christian. This sincere devotion to his work and his Lord made him loved by his church people. He was a good pastor, a good husband and father, and is missed today not only by his family and churches, but also by the host of people who were his friends.

His funeral was conducted in the Faison Church by Rev. C. D. Barclift who was assisted by C. Freeman Heath and Dennis Kinlaw. Interment was in Wayne Memorial Park Cemetery near Goldsboro.

Fred Warren's devotion to Christ was deep and his testimony seemed to be found in the story he often told of the little girl who had forgotten the exact wording of the Twenty-Third Psalm and when called upon to repeat it could only say: "The Lord is my shepherd. That's all I want." This seemed to be true of Fred Warren and this personal satisfaction found in Christ seemed to be the motivation behind his devoted service to his church.

NEILL MALLOY McDONALD By Frank Culbreth

Rev. Neill Malloy McDonald, son of John Willison McDonald and Mary McDuffie McDonald, was born April 29, 1876, in Robeson County near St. Pauls, North Carolina. His education was acquired in the public schools of North Carolina, Buies Creek Academy, and

Emory University.

From 1897 to 1903 he taught in the public schools of Georgia. He was licensed to preach by the Valdosta District, South Georgia Conference, Methodist Episcopal Church, South, at Moultrie in 1899, and was admitted on trial at Sandersville in 1903. He served churches in that conference until 1906 when he transferred to the North Carolina Conference, where he served the following pastorates: Cokesbury Circuit (now Stedman), 1906-1910; (record not available) 1910-1912; located and lived at Stedman with the status of a local deacon, 1912-1914; served Person Street-Calvary as a supply pastor, 1914-1915; was readmitted into the North Carolina Conference in 1915; served Goldston Circuit, 1915-1918; Lillington Circuit, 1918-1920; Duke (now Erwin) 1920-1921. He was ordained a deacon in 1902; elder, 1917; granted the supernumerary relation in 1921, and the retired relation in 1940.

On August 20, 1902, he married Annie Hollingsworth who, with several children, survives. The children are very active and useful citizens in their respective communities. He suffered a stroke on July 13, 1952, and died a few days later in Whiteville, N. C., on July 18, 1952. The funeral services were held in Fayetteville by Rev. Frank Culbreth, Rev. Gene Holingsworth, and Rev. P. F. Newton. He was

buried in Cross Creek Cemetery nearby.

Brother McDonald served twelve active years, but worked for his Lord and the Church during all the other years. His work was greatly limited by a number of physical infirmities, his active ministry being interrupted a number of times by serious operations, poor eyesight, and general physical weakness. He had a winsome and pleasing personality. He was patient, kind, sympathetic, and always spoke advisedly. He came as near, in a helpful way, serving the entire life and interests of all the people within the bounds of his work as any man I have ever known. All classes of people were at ease in his presence. He knew their language and could adjust himself to their situations. People were always glad to see him and to hear him talk because he could talk about their work affairs and could usually tell them much they did not know about farming, sanitation, etc. He served most rural pastorates, and it is safe to say that he made as large a contribution as any other one man to improve farming, sanitation, and living conditions wherever he served churches. He was loved, honored, and respected for his work and life in the pulpit and out of it.

CHARLES A. JONES By O. W. Dowd

Brother Charles A. Jones was born in Moore County May 3, 1869. He was the son of Malcolm and Miley Jones. He received his education at Elon College. His four-year conference course was taken by correspondence. He was twice married. His first wife was Elizabeth Wagner of Thomasville, N. C. To this union two children were born. A daughter died in infancy, and a son survives him. In 1914 he married Ossie Lee Dunlap, of Ansonville, N. C., who with a son and two daughters survive him.

Brother Jones was received into the North Carolina Conference on trial at Goldsboro, N. C. in November 1903. He was ordained

Deacon in 1902, and Elder in 1907.

He served the following charges: Fayetteville, 2 years; Ahoskie, 2 years; Scotland Neck, 3 years; Belhaven, 4 years; Oxford Circuit, 2 years; Elm Street-Goldsboro, 1 year; Warren Circuit, 2 years; Jones, Circuit, 2 years; Goldsboro Circuit, 2 years; Richmond Circuit, 4 years; Rowland Circuit, 1 year; Dover Circuit, 1 year; Tabor City, 4 years; Southport, 2 years; Burgaw, 2 years; Hallsboro, 3 years; St. Pauls,

2 years. Thus he served 39 years in the pastorate, and was retired

in 1942 at the age of 73 years.

At that time he was appointed District Evangelist of the Wilmington District. During the ten years of his retirement he held fortyeight revivals. Brother Jones was at his best in evanglistic work. He seemed divinely fitted for this calling.

Brother Jones passed away Sunday afternoon, July 20, 1952. His funeral was conducted by the District Superintendent, assisted by the local pastor of Fuguay Methodist Church and by Rev. E. S.

Dodd, retired minister of Fuguay.

Having recited these details concerning the life of Charles A. Jones I want to recount some of the outstanding elements and characteristics that marked this noble man and Christian gentleman.

I found in him a friend, tried and true. To know him was to love and appreciate him. I was glad to know him more intimately in his last years. He was a man of genuine and deep convictions. His faith was not in a creed but in the Christ of God. His religion was not a matter of ritual, but of righteousness. He believed in the warm heart religion. As his faith was of large dimensions, so was his love. He loved his Lord without a rival, without a reservation, with all his heart, mind, soul and strength. He loved his fellowman, his church, his home and loved ones. To his long ministry of nearly fifty years he gave his best; he was a faithful dispenser of the word of God, giving to each hearer his portion in due season. He fed the flock, shepherded the sheep, leading them through pastures green, beside waters still. His gospel was not a hear-say gospel, but a gospel of experience. And he was not ashamed of the gospel, for he believed it was the power of God unto everyone that believed, and he was ready to bear witness to and proclaim the message of redeeming love. Those who knew him best as pastor and preacher could truthfully speak of him as God's ambassador. Truly could Brother Jones say: "For me to live is Christ, to die is gain-eternal gain."

He had a good library, but his greatest and most used book was the Bible and by its light he lived, labored, and worked. His was a walk of fellowship, of sincerity, of blessed communion. His was a walk of faith, service, wisdom, watchfulness. He walked in the light and love of Christ, and he continued this walk with Christ till that Sunday afternoon when Christ took him to his blessed reward and eternal Home, and speaking of our ascended brother and of his blessed walk with Christ whom he loved, and who at last took him to dwell in that eternal home that is lovier than daylight, where flowers never fade, where the stars forever shine, I am reminded of one of the great hymns on eternal life. With that hymn I close my tribute of loving esteem to a faithful pastor, a great minister, a

beloved Brother in the gospel.

"The Home-land, O the Home-land, the land of souls-free-born. No gloomy night is known there, but aye the fadeless morn I'm sighing for that country, my heart is aching here There is no pain in the Home-land, to which I am drawing near. "My Lord is in the Home-land, with angels bright and fair. No sinful things or evil can ever enter there. The music of the ransomed is ringing in my ears

And when I think of the Home-land, my eyes are wet with tears.

"The loved ones in the Home-land are waiting me to come Where neither death nor sorrow invades their holy home O dear, dear native country, O rest and peace above Christ bring us all to the Home-land of His eternal love."

And I can well imagine a prayer like this upon his life as they stiffened into eternal silence:

"Higher than the highest heaven, Deeper than the deepest sea. Lord, thy love at last hath conquered Grant me now my soul's desire, None of self, and all of Thee."

JAMES WILLIAM SNEEDEN

James William Sneeden was born March 30, 1876, in New Hanover County, the son of the late Samuel and Mary Elizabeth Sneeden. He died in James Walker Memorial Hospital, Wilmington, New Hanover County, North Carolina, September 25, 1952, after a lingering illness of two years. A charter member of Trinity Methodist Church, that city, his funeral service was held in it on September 27 by Rev. C. D. Barclift, district superintendent, assisted by Rev. H. I. Glass, Rev. A. L. Thompson, and Rev. L. L. Parrish. At the grave in Oakdale Cemetery where that which remained mortal was interred beside his wife who died November 8, 1949, Rev. D. F. Kinlaw and Rev. R. H. Lewis assisted.

On September 4, 1895, he married Miss Pearl Futrelle. To this union four children were born, one of which died in childhood, and the following survive: J. Earl, Wilmington; S. Benjamin, Chicago;

and Miss M. Elizabeth, Washington, D. C.

He was received on trial into the North Carolina Annual Conference at its 1925 session held in Fayetteville. He was ordained deacon in 1927 at Raleigh; elder in 1929 at Kinston; and took the retired relation in 1946 at Henderson. He served the following appointments: Kenansville, 2 years; Bath, 4; Aurora, 3; Belhaven, 2; sabbatical leave, 1; Wanchese, 4; First Church, Mebane, 1; Wanchese (second time), 2; City Road-White Memorial, Henderson, 2; West End (as retired supply), 4. From November 1950 until his death he lived with his sister, Mrs. G. B. Sutton, Faison, N. C.

Before he entered the ministry he served for many years as a court stenographer in Wilmington and Kenansville. Also, he was an instructor in a business college in Wilmington and established a commercial school in Kenansville. Possessing splendid native endowments and a disciplined mind, he rendered most effective service in

these positions.

The conviction that he should preach became strong in him and at the age of 49 he entered the ministry. Wherever he served he was greatly loved, admired, and respected, and he in turn warmly loved his people and was a good shepherd to them. As a minister, his personal life was above reproach and his attitudes and motives were genuinely Christian because he ever sought to possess and impart the spirit that was Christ's.

His sermons were well prepared, thought provoking, spiritually helpful, and simply and earnestly delivered. He had strong convictions about what was right and wrong, yet he tempered these with Christian charity. He always spoke the truth in love. To look after the total program of the church with strict fidelity, with no cause being too small to receive his full attention, was prominent in his church administration.

His people sought his counsel and were enriched by his friendship. They ever desired for him to return where he had served to visit and to preach. He served Wanchese the second time by the pleadings of the people that he be their pastor again. Hundreds are the lives that have been made better by the gospel he preached

and the life he lived.

The poem "He Lived a Life," by H. N. Fifer, fittingly describes the life and labors of Brother Sneeden:

"What was his creed?

I do not know his creed, I only know
That here below, he walked the common road
And lifted many a load, lightened the task,
Brightened the day for others toiling on a weary way:
This, his only meed; I do not know his creed.

"What was his creed? I never heard him speak Of visions rapturous, of Alpine peak Of doctrine, dogma, new or old; But this I know, he was forever bold To stand alone, to face the challenge of each day, And live the truth, so far as he could see—The truth that evermore makes free.

"His creed? I care not what his creed;
Enough that never yielded he to greed,
But served a brother in his daily need;
Plucked many a thorn and planted many a flower;
Glorified the service of each hour;
Had faith in God, himself, and fellow-men;
Perchance he never thought in terms of creed;
I only know he lived a life, in deed!"

SAMUEL ARTHUR MAXWELL By Walter C. Ball

On Monday morning, October 13, 1952, the newspapers said that Sam was dead. In relating the full story there was a description of his eloquent and brilliant sermon in his own pulpit in Smithfield on Sunday morning, October 12, that after his preaching he had gone home for lunch with members of his family. During the meal he was taken ill. He went to bed and then suddenly died. This announcement is only partly true. Many of us never get a full perspective of truth, we take it in parts. Life does have a way of closing off a valve; it also has a way of continuing. His good wife, his children and his close friends share this simple and yet effective philosophy which characterized his own life. We are God's children and

therefore His Heaven in us cannot end until His Heaven Passeth Away. THE SOUL MADE IN THE IMAGE OF GOD AND LIVED IN HIS PRESENCE CANNOT DIE UNTIL GOD DIES. The time and place of our coming into this fullness which God gives us is not ours to choose. However, even the method which God chooses to make this conversion, I am sure, brought to our friend the deepest appreciation. He was in harmony with the poetry of John Neihardt:

"Let me go quickly like a candle light Snuffed out just at the heyday of its glow Give me high noon—and let it then be night Thus would I go."

Sam Maxwell was born of humble North Carolina parents on September 27, 1897, at Pink Hill, in Duplin County, son of J. Frank and Clarissa Jones Maxwell. They endowed him with a great and stimulating mind. From early childhood until his going he never seemed satisfied except to pursue all the truth, both in the realm of the spirit and general knowledge. Samuel Foss has given us a concrete picture of the truth of his search:

"As wider skies broke on his view God greatened in his growing mind Each year he dreamed his God anew— And left his older God behind.

He saw the boundless scheme dilate In star and blossom, sky and clod And as the universe grew great He dreamed for it a greater God."

Because of this unsatifying yearning for the full truth, he prepared himself for this priceless ministry in many colleges and universities. He was awarded the following degrees: Bachelor of Arts, Duke University; Bachelor of Divinity, Asbury College; Bachelor of Sacred Theology, Yale University; Master of Arts, University of Kentucky; Master of Education, Harvard University; Doctor of Reliligious Education, Gordon School of Theology; Doctor of Divinity, Asbury Theological Seminary. With all of this vast knowledge and high honors I never knew him in this field to show any direction other than to be humble. I have talked with him for many hours about religious education and preaching. His knowledge in these two fields was wide and stimulating. Sometimes his wide range of knowledge here caused some of his closest friends to question his answer. But upon self-examination we knew we were wrong, that he was right.

Although Brother Maxwell gave several years of his life to teaching I think his greatest gift lay in the preaching ministry. I quote from The Smithfield Herald: "His sermons were things of beauty, and when his own words failed him he borrowed from poets and scholars and made his people appreciate the charm of the classics." Each summer he spent weeks writing new sermons. For this task he surrounded himself with the works of the greatest minds of the past and present. He, in these sermons brought to bear on everyday living a practical approach to God. He always sought to free those under his leadership from foolish restraints. He felt keenly that when a man says "I believe" he should know why he believes. He once

said to me, in part, that every sermon ought to give something to everyone hearing it. To make this possible his services of worship were so coordinated with the sermon he was preaching that the prayers, hymns and scripture sustained in a magnificent way the whole approach. He believed in the full salvation of Christ in God

and he preached it and practiced what he preached.

During his life Sam had many honors to come to him. In "Who's Who in Kentucky," 1936 edition, nearly a dozen specific honors are listed. Those of us who knew him intimately would say it is enough that he was a brilliant college teacher, a stimulating thought-provoking preacher, an author, a faithful husband, and a worthy father of three daughters. His immediate family consists of his wife, the former Ethel Rich; three daughters, Mrs. W. N. Cosby, Jr., Durham, N. C.; Mrs. Paul Brown Jr., Hamlet, N. C.; and Miss Ludie Maxwell, student at Greensboro College; and two grandchildren: Wayne Lindsey Cosby and James Scott Brown.

His appointments in the field of Christian education were as follows: Founded the chair of Religious Education at Asbury College, Wilmore, Kentucky; Professor of Religious Education, Asbury College; Professor of Religious Education and Old Testament His-

tory, Kentucky Wesleyan College, Winchester, Kentucky.

As a pastor he held these charges: In the Kentucky Conference, at Winchester and Jenkins. In the North Carolina Conference, at Williamston; Aberdeen; Calvary Church, Durham; Hamlet; Oxford;

and Smithfield.

The funeral services for Brother Maxwell were conducted in the Centenary Methodist Church, Smithfield, on Tuesday afternoon, October 14, by Bishop Paul Garber, Rev. R. E. Brown, Rev. D. M. Sharpe, and Dr. Allen P. Brantley. We left his body in its last resting place in the Smithfield Cemetery. I could not think otherwise, as the last words over his grave were spoken, but that now my dear and long time friend, from the top of Mount Clear you have seen the shining Minarets of the Celestial City, but now near and dear you behold it in all of its beauty.

MRS. RUFUS BRADLEY By M. Y. Self

Lillian Esmond Hart was born August 2, 1874, in Boykins, Virginia, the daughter of Mary Harrell Hart, and William McKenzie Hart. She married Rev. Rufus Bradley September 15, 1897. Mrs. Bradley leaves four children: Mrs. Cortney Egerton and Miss Esmond Bradley, Raleigh, N. C.; Mrs. Elmer Troxil, Ahoskie, N. C.; and Mr. Rufus Bradley, Kannapolis, N. C., and an adopted daughter, Miss Hattie Daniels, Littleton, N. C., all of whom reflect the faith of their father and mother. Two sons preceded their parents—James Bradley at the age of seven, and Raleigh Glenn Bradley at the age of thirty-seven. There are three grandchildren: Dr. Courtney Egerton of Bethesda, Md.; Robert Bradley Egerton of Washington, D. C.; and Annette Bradley, Littleton, N. C.

Mrs. Bradley took an active part in all branches of church work while serving with her husband in the North Carolina Conference, extending over a period of forty years. They served the Littleton

Church four years. When Brother Bradley passed to his reward on June 19, 1937, Mrs. Bradley returned to Littleton and was identified with church and community activities. On Tuesday morning, May 20, 1952, while attending household duties, she passed to her reward. Dr. A. J. Hobbs, Rev. J. B. Hurley, Rev. H. L. Davis, and her pastor, Kev. M. Y. Self, conducted the funeral service in the Littleton Methodist Church, Wednesday afternoon, May 21. Her body was placed beside her husband in Sunset Hill Cemetery, Littleton.

The death of Mrs. Bradley is a distinct loss to the Littleton Methodist Church and the community. She maintained a keen interest in the organizations and activities of her church. Often times she made a sacrifice as she placed her love offering upon the altar for the advancement of the kingdom of God. She left a worthy example for the community, and a noble heritage for her children.

Mercer, and Rev. R. E. Brown, the Raleigh district superintendent, conducting the sacred rites. As the strong group of nephews tenderly carried her earthly temple to its last resting place in the Zebulon cemetery, there was a tear in every eye and a noble resolve to renew our faith in the dear Lord she so loved. Her entire life was a call to better things; she seemed always to say, "Come along with me, the best is yet to be." Mrs. Maggie Lee Starling was truly one of God's children.

Sessions of the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Church

The North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Church was composed of the North Carolina Conference of the former M. E. Church, South, and parts of the North Carolina Conference of the former Methodist Protestant Church and the Blue Ridge-Atlantic Conference of the former Methodist Episcopal Church. The former Methodist Episcopal Church gave to the North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Church 9 preachers, 11 charges and 1,837 members; the former Methodist Protestant Church 23 preachers, 20 charges and 9,152 members; the former Methodist Episcopal Church, South, 273 preachers, 226 charges and 132,735 members.

NOTE: The Distributing Committee at the 1940 session of the Western North Carolina Conference added three retired ministers of the former Methodist Protestant Church to the roll of the North Carolina Conference. The names of these preachers should have been included in 1939 in the list of preachers coming into the North Carolina Conference from the former Methodist Protestant Church.
