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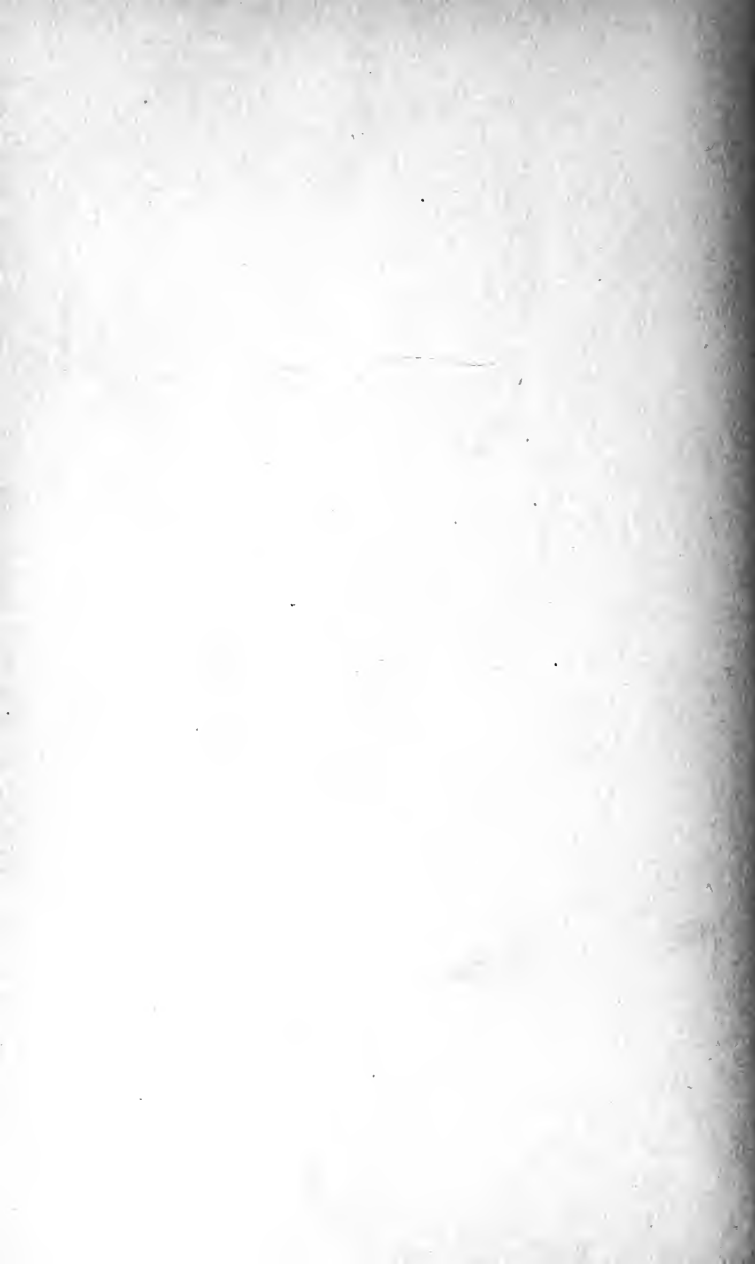

## HISTORICAL STATEMENT

The North Carolina Conference was set off from the Virginia Conference in May, 1836, and in 1850, and again in 1870, North Carolina territory in the South Carolina Conference was transferred to this Conference. In 1890 North Carolina territory in the Holston Conference and in the Virginia Conference, except that beyond the Chowan River, was transferred to the North Carolina Conference, and the Conference was divided into the North Carolina and Western North Carolina Conferences. In 1894 the remaining North Carolina territory in the Virginia Conference was transferred to the North Carolina Conference.

The North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Church was composed of the North Carolina Conference of the former M. E. Church, South, and parts of the North Carolina Conference of the former Methodist Protestant Church and the Blue Ridge-Atlantic Conference of the former Methodist Episcopal Church. The former Methodist Episcopal Church gave to the North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Church 9 preachers, 11 charges and 1,837 members; the former Methodist Protestant Church 23 preachers, 20 charges and 9,152 members; the former Methodist Episcopal Church, South, 273 preachers, 226 charges and 132,735 members.

## Rules of Order and Procedure for the North Carolina Annual Conference of The Methodist Church

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### I. RULES OF ORDER

1. Robert's Rules of Order shall apply to any situation not covered by these Rules.
2. No member who has the floor may be interrupted except for a breach of order, a misrepresentation, to direct the attention of the Conference to the fact that time has arrived for a special order, or to raise a very urgent question of high privilege.
3. No member shall speak a second time on the same question if any member who has not yet spoken desires the floor, nor more than twice on the same subject under the same motion, nor longer than ten minutes unless his time shall be extended by the Conference, except as provided in Rule 4.
4. When the report of a Committee is under consideration and when all have spoken who desire to do so, or when (and after) the previous question has been ordered, the chairman and/or duly authorized member or members presenting the committee's report (and the minority report if there be one) shall be entitled to speak before the vote is taken.
5. A member claiming the floor at any time for what he believes is a very urgent question of high privilege, shall be allowed to indicate briefly the nature of the question, and if it be adjudged by the chair to be such, he may proceed at his pleasure, or until the chairman judges he has exhausted his privilege.
6. Voting shall be by a show of hands unless otherwise ordered by the Conference. A "yea" and "nay" vote, if taken, shall be by signed ballot, which result will be published in the Conference Journal. A count vote may be ordered on call of any member supported by one-fifth of the members present and voting, in which case the delegates shall rise from their seats and stand while they are counted.

### II. ORGANIZATION

1. The Secretary: The Secretary of the Annual Conference shall be elected quadrennially at the first session of the Conference after the meeting of the General Conference; and on nominations arising from the floor.
2. Assistant Secretaries: The Secretary shall nominate his assistants and the Conference shall elect.
3. Statisticians: There shall be a Conference Statistician and an Assistant Statistician. The Statistician shall be elected quadrennially at the first session after the meeting of the General Conference. The Assistant Statistician shall be elected annually upon nomination by the Secretary.
4. The Conference Stenographer: The Conference Secretary shall employ the Conference Stenographer.
5. Compensation: The Commission on World Service and Finance shall determine, subject to the approval of the Conference, the compensation given officers for their services and also the method and amount for meeting expenses of said officers. The Conference Treasurer shall pay these amounts.
6. Boards, Commissions, and Committees: The Bishop and his Cabinet shall determine the size of and nominate the members of all Boards, Commissions, and Committees authorized by the General Conference, the Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference, and this Annual Conference, except in those cases in which the Discipline directs otherwise. The recommendations and nominations shall be subject to the approval of the Conference.

7. The Conference Board of Trustees: The Conference Board of Trustees shall be required to meet at least once a year other than the regular meeting at the session of the Annual Conference.
8. The Conference Treasurer and all others receiving and disbursing funds from our Conference shall be required to make audited statements annually, and to print the same in the Journal.
9. Program Committee: There shall be a Program Committee of the Conference consisting of the resident Bishop, the Conference Secretary, the District Superintendent of the District in which the sessions of the Conference is held, the pastor of the host church, and the Conference Lay Leader. This committee shall determine the compensation and expense for invited speakers and this shall be paid from the Conference expense fund.
10. Committee on Conference Objectives: There shall be a Conference Quadrennial Committee on Conference Objectives. See Paragraph 651—Question 49, page 179, 1952 Discipline.
11. Entertainment Committee: There shall be a Conference Entertainment Committee, composed of three ministers and two laymen. This committee shall be elected at the first session of the Conference following the General Conference, and shall serve for the Quadrennium. This committee shall receive invitations and determine the place and method of entertaining the Conference sessions. The Committee is requested to determine the place of holding the next Conference not later than April 1, if possible.
12. Committee on Memoirs: The Conference Secretary and the District Superintendents shall constitute the Committee on Memoirs. The members of the committee shall be charged with the responsibility of providing for all the details of the memorial service. The Conference Secretary shall be the chairman of this committee.
13. Committee on Daily Minutes: A committee of three members shall be elected each year to examine the daily minutes of the sessions of the Conference and report daily to the Conference.
14. Courtesies and Resolutions: There shall be constituted a Committee on Courtesies and Resolutions, annually, at the first session of the Conference.
15. Committee on Appeals: There shall be appointed, quadrennially, a Committee on Appeals, composed of at least five members, whose duties shall be to hear appeals from the decisions of the several District Boards of Church Location and Building, or any other questions that may properly come before them.
16. American Bible Society: All matters regarding the relation of the Conference to the American Bible Society and its work shall be referred to the Board of Education.

### III. REPORTS AND RESOLUTIONS

1. All reports and resolutions presented to the Conference shall be written (typewritten if possible) in triplicate. Two copies shall be in the hands of the Conference Secretary before the report or resolutions shall be read to the Conference for consideration.
2. Any amendment offered to any paper and all motions of more than a single sentence must be in writing and given to the Conference Secretary.

### IV. LAY DELEGATES TO THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE

1. Lay delegates, regular or reserve, from the pastoral charges to the Annual Conference shall be elected by the Quarterly Conference at least forty-five days prior to the session of the Annual Conference.
2. Each District Superintendent shall complete the list of lay delegates to the Conference, from his District, at least forty-five days before the Annual Conference

session and shall immediately transmit the completed list, in duplicate, to the Conference Secretary.

3. Substitutions for lay delegates to the Annual Conference must be made to the Conference Secretary, in written form, through the District Superintendent of each District.

#### V. PASTORS' REPORTS TO ANNUAL CONFERENCE AND STATISTICS

1. Each pastor shall complete table I of his annual report to Conference and transmit the same to the Conference Statistician at least two weeks prior to the opening of the Conference.
2. Table II shall be completed and turned in at the time of registration, the first day of Conference.
3. Each table of the report shall be filled out by individual churches with totals for the charge.
4. Table II shall be made out in even dollars only.
5. Tables I and II shall be printed in the Conference Journal only by charges.
6. A third table of individual church reports shall be compiled by the Statistician from the pastors' reports. This table shall be printed in the Conference Journal.

#### VI. THE CONFERENCE JOURNAL

1. Editor: The Conference Secretary shall be charged with the responsibility of editing and making contracts for the publication of the Conference Journal, in keeping with the regulations of the General Conference and of the Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference. The Editor shall have full authority to condense reports, memoirs, and other papers when necessary.
2. One complimentary copy of the Conference Journal shall be sent each of the following: The Conference Claimants, the educational institutions, the General Boards, The Publishing House, the lay members of the Conference Boards. Seven copies shall be sent to each pastor without charge. All other copies shall be sold at \$1.00 each, or single copies by mail at \$1.10 each.

#### VII. DISTRICTS

1. The number of Districts shall be nine.
2. A District Conference shall be held annually in each District.
3. Each pastoral charge shall elect annually two lay delegates to the District Conference. These shall be in addition to those named by the Discipline as ex officio members.
4. The District and Associate District Lay Leaders shall be elected annually by the Annual Conference on nomination of the District Superintendents and the Conference Lay Leader.
5. The District Superintendent of each District shall be required to furnish to the Bishop, the Conference Treasurer, and the Conference Statistician, as early in the year as possible, an official copy of the apportionments to the charges for World Service and Conference Benevolences and the amounts accepted by the charges, also the amounts approved by the charges for the several items of ministerial support. The figures furnished the Conference Statistician shall be used by him in making up his report to the Conference. Two of these official copies are to be sent to the secretary of the Commission on World Service and Finance.
6. Each District Superintendent, as early in the year as possible, shall furnish the Bishop, the Conference Treasurer, and the Conference Statistician with a schedule of the salaries of pastors as set by the Quarterly Conferences. The figures furnished

by the District Superintendent to the Conference Statistician shall be used by him in making up his report to the Conference.

7. We call attention of the District Superintendents to Paragraph 432 (1) 1952 Discipline, and state that we believe that a reasonable time for such consultation, before the appointments are to be read, could not be construed to be less than twenty-four hours.

#### VIII. AMENDMENTS

1. These rules of order and procedure may be amended by a two-thirds vote on the next day after a proposed amendment has been presented in writing; provided the rule fixing the number of Districts may be amended by a majority vote; provided, further, a change in the number of Districts may not be made later than the second morning of the Annual Conference session.

#### IX. WHEN THE RULES BECOME EFFECTIVE

1. These rules of order and procedure of the North Carolina Annual Conference shall become effective immediately upon passage by the vote of the majority of the Conference.

**CONFERENCE COMMITTEE ON SURVEY AND LONG RANGE PLANNING:** C. W. Robbins, chairman of Conference Committee on Survey and Long Range Planning, presided. C. D. Barelift spoke. A. J. C. W. Robbins made motion that the committee be granted the privilege of continuing its work, and that the name be changed to the Long Range Planning Committee. It was seconded and carried.

The Bishop stated a special session of the Annual Conference would be held at Edenton Street Church, January 4, 1955, 10:00 a.m., for more careful study of church extension.

At its fourth quadrennial session, held in San Francisco, California, April 23-May 6, 1952, the General Conference of The Methodist Church by more than the constitutional majority of two-thirds (2/3), the vote being four hundred and sixty-six (466) for to twenty-one (21) against, on Tuesday afternoon, May 6, 1952, voted to send down to the Annual Conferences of The Methodist Church for their consideration and action, the following proposed Amendment to the Constitution of The Methodist Church.

Amend Paragraph 20, sub-paragraph 2 of the 1948 **Discipline** of The Methodist Church, which reads as follows:

"2. The Bishops of the Central Conferences shall have membership in the Council of Bishops with vote limited to matters relating to their respective Central Conferences."

by deleting the words "LIMITED TO MATTERS RELATING TO THEIR RESPECTIVE CENTRAL CONFERENCES" found at the close of said sub-paragraph 2, so that the Paragraph when amended will read as follows:

"2. The Bishops of the Central Conferences shall have membership in the Council of Bishops with vote."

Results of vote: For—137; against—none.

At its fourth quadrennial session, held in San Francisco, California, April 23-May 6, 1952, the General Conference of The Methodist Church by more than the constitutional majority of two-thirds (2/3), the vote being four hundred and forty-four (444) for to NONE against, on Tuesday afternoon, May 6, 1952, voted to send down to the Annual Conferences of The Methodist Church for their consideration and action, the following proposed Amendment to the Constitution of The Methodist Church.

Amend Paragraph 7, Article III, of the 1948 **Discipline** of The Methodist Church, which reads as follows:

"Par. 7. Art. III.—The General Conference shall fix the ratio of representation in the General, Jurisdictional, and Central Conferences from the Annual Conferences, with the total ministerial membership in the Annual Conference as a basis, **provided** that each Annual Conference shall be entitled to at least one ministerial and one lay delegate in the General Conference and also in the Jurisdictional or Central Conference."

"Par. 7. Art. Amend Paragraph 24, Article IV of the 1948 **Discipline** of The Methodist Church, which reads as follows:

Par. 24 Art. IV.—The ministerial delegates to the General Conference and to the Jurisdictional or Central Conference shall be elected by the ministerial members of the Annual Conference, **provided** that such delegates shall have been traveling preachers in the constituent churches forming this union, or in The Methodist Church, for at least four years next preceding their election and are in full connection with the Annual Conference electing them when elected and at the time of holding the General and Jurisdictional or Central Conferences.

by inserting the words "OR THE PROVISIONAL ANNUAL CONFERENCE," following the words "ministerial members of the Annual Conference," found in lines three and four, and also inserting the words "OR THE PROVISIONAL ANNUAL CONFERENCE," following the words "and are in full connection with the Annual Conference," found in lines seven and eight, so that the Paragraph when amended will read as follows:

Par. 25. Article IV.—The ministerial delegates to the General Conference and to the Jurisdictional or Central Conference shall be elected by the ministerial members of the Annual Conference OR THE PROVISIONAL ANNUAL CONFERENCE, **provided** that such delegates shall have been traveling

preachers in the constituent churches forming this union, or in The Methodist Church, for at least four years next preceding their election and are in full connection with the Annual Conference OR THE PROVISIONAL ANNUAL CONFERENCE electing them when elected and at the time of holding the General and Jurisdictional or Central Conference.

Take Black Creek from the Fremont Charge in the New Bern District and place with Evansdale in the Rocky Mount District.

Take Calypso from the Mount Olive Circuit in the New Bern District and place it with the Faison Charge in the Goldsboro District.

Take Bethany from the Dover Circuit and place it with the Kinston Circuit.

Make Fremont a station, and take Eureka and Yelverton from the Fremont Charge to form a new charge to be called Eureka-Yelverton. This absorbs the Fremont Charge.

Take Garris Chapel and Piney Grove from the Garris Circuit and place them with

the Seven Springs Circuit, and place Jerusalem from the Garris Circuit with the Wayne Circuit, thus dissolving the Garris Circuit.

Take Hickory Grove, Institute, and Trinity churches from the LaGrange Charge and form a new charge to be called Institute. Make LaGrange a station.

Take Riverdale from the Trinity, New Bern, Charge and place it with the Bridgeton Charge. Make Trinity, New Bern, a station.

Take the Harlowe and Oak Grove Churches from the Newport Charge and form a new charge to be called Harlowe-Oak Grove. Make Newport a station.

Take Beston from the Seven Springs Charge and place it with the Wayne Charge.

Discontinue Schelmerdine as a preaching point on the Vanceboro Circuit and place the membership with Lane's Chapel on the Vanceboro Circuit.

Take the Falling Creek and Providence Churches from the Wayne Charge and form a new charge to be called Falling Creek-Providence.

### Raleigh District

Authorize a new congregation to be organized in Raleigh to be called Highland.

Take the Angier Church from the Kipling Charge and form a station to be called Angier. Take the Kipling and Cokesbury Churches from the Kipling Charge and form a Charge to be known as Kipling-Cokesbury. This absorbs the Kipling Charge.

Take the Macedonia Church from the Apex Charge and form a station to be called Macedonia. Take the Apex and Holly Springs Churches from the Apex Charge and form a new Charge to be called Apex-Holly Springs. This absorbs the Apex Charge.

Take Palmyra from the Scotland Neck Charge, and take Hobgood and Williams Chapel from the Battleboro Charge and form a new Charge to be called Hobgood. Take the McTyeire Church from the Whitakers Charge and place with Battleboro.

Take Evansdale from the Evansdale-Winstead Charge, and take Black Creek from the Fremont Charge, New Bern District, and form a new Charge to be called Evansdale-Black Creek. Take Winstead from the Winstead Charge and form a station to be called Winstead.

Change the name of the Littleton Circuit to Littleton-Tabor.

Change the name of Gaston-Shiloh to Gaston.

Change the name of the Nash Circuit to Nash.

### Wilmington District

Take Federal Point Church from the Carolina Beach Charge and form a station to be called Federal Point.

Take the Fair Bluff Church from the Fair Bluff Charge and form a station to be called Fair Bluff. Take the Cerro Gordo and Olivet Churches from the Fair Bluff Charge and form a new charge to be called the Fair Bluff Circuit.

Take Halls Church from the Roseboro Charge and transfer it to the Fayetteville District to be attached to the South River Charge.

Discontinue the name of "Pembroke Parish" as applied to the Indian work of the District.

## LOUIS EDWARD SAWYER

1872-1953

Louis Edward Sawyer, son of Samuel and Annie Peele Sawyer, was born in the Sladesville community of Hyde County, N. C., on July 7, 1872, and died at his home in Ransomville, N. C., on Friday evening, November 13, 1953, after an illness of two weeks. More than forty-three of the eighty-one years he lived were spent in the ministry of the Methodist Church.



Brother Sawyer was educated in the public schools of his day, both at home and at Pantego. He spent several years as a young man teaching in the public schools before he decided to enter the pastorate of the church. He then entered Trinity College to prepare for the ministry. After serving some years as an Accepted Supply Pastor, he was admitted to the North Carolina Conference in 1903. He was ordained a Deacon in 1900, and an Elder in 1910. Among the charges he served were the following: Hatteras, Tabor City twice, Roper, Ahoskie, South Mills, Roseboro, Belhaven, Garysburg, Marshallberg, and Bath. He retired from the active status of the ministry in 1945, but continued to serve the Bath Charge for another two years as a Retired

Supply. After he retired he made his home in Ransomville, until he was called to that higher field of endeavor that awaits the faithful.

During his first pastorate at Hatteras, he met and married Susanna Peele, who preceded him in death by several years. Two daughters, Lucy Sawyer of Washington, D. C., and Mrs. Mary Morton of Baltimore, Md., together with two grandsons, survive this union. On May 19, 1943, he married Lizzie Roper of Ransomville, who also survives.

It was the writer's privilege to be closely associated with Brother Sawyer during his latter days, having served charges near his, having visited in his home, and having helped him in a number of meetings. Three things were strikingly noticeable in his conversation, even until the twilight of his life. The first was his interest in, and love for, people; the second, his interest in the affairs of the church; and third, his interest in the work of the Masonic Lodge. He would talk for hours about any of the three.

Funeral services for Brother Sawyer were held in historic St. Thomas Church in Bath, N. C., conducted by the Rev. A. C. D. Noe, former rector, and Dr. M. O. Fletcher of Washington, N. C. His body was laid to rest in Asbury Church Cemetery, near Washington, N. C., with the Masonic Lodge performing the rites.

Thus ends the mortal record of our brother, but the true record is not found upon the books of mortals, but upon those records that mortals never handle, nor fully comprehend; for as John Luckey McCreery so succinctly phrased it:

"There is no death! The stars go down  
To rise upon some other shore."

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 MARION TIMOTHY PLYLER

1867-1954

The spirit of Dr. Marion Timothy Plyler, eloquent and helpful preacher, a great thinker, competent church editor and writer of noteworthy books, was transplanted from this world into his Eternal Home on March 24, 1954. Throughout his days he was a diligent student. In his home life he was a devoted husband and father. At the time of his death he was eighty-six years of age, having been born September 14, 1867, in Iredell County, North Carolina. His ministry covered more than a half century and was one of the most influential in the history of North Carolina Methodism. He entered the ministry after his graduation from Trinity College in 1892, having been while in college a famous football player and a distinguished student. For



fifty-four years he received appointments from the North Carolina conference without a break.

Dr. Plyler is survived by his wife, Mrs. Epie Smith Plyler, and by the following sons and daughters: Leroy S., Marion T., Jr., Conrad N., Eppie Duncan (Mrs. Willis Van Wagoner), Mern (Mrs. James R. Anthony), Grace (Mrs. J. A. McLean), and Eleanor K. (Mrs. Wasson Baird). The first two children born into the home, Edle Mern and Ruth died at the ages of four and three respectively.

From the beginning of his ministry, Dr. Plyler had a consuming desire to be a useful Methodist preacher, which constrained him to wish to leave every charge better than he found it. His work as a minister covered many fields. The last eighteen years of his active ministry before retiring were spent, along with his twin brother,

as joint editor and business manager of the *North Carolina Christian Advocate*. In this capacity his exceptionally fine editorials helped to mold the thinking of thousands of men and women, boys and girls.

Dr. Plyler served as presiding elder of three different districts during his ministry; Elizabeth City, Durham, and Raleigh. Other pastorates included Cartaret Circuit, Trinity Church (Wilmington), Murfreesboro, Grifton Circuit, Plymouth, Louisburg, Chapel Hill, and Grace Church (Wilmington).

Dr. Plyler was well trained for the ministry, receiving his A.B. degree at Trinity College and M.A. degrees from both Trinity College and the University of North Carolina. He also spent some time in study at the University of Chicago. He was the recipient of the Doctor of Divinity degree from the University of N. C. in 1931, and from Duke University in 1937.

Something of the administrative ability of this minister of God was revealed in that three times he was elected a delegate to General Conferences of the Methodist Church, where he rendered distinguished service. He was truly a Christian statesman of the highest order.

Duke University was always dear to the heart of Dr. Plyler. For many years he served as president of the Board of Managers of the Pastors' School, which met in June of each year, nearly always at Duke University.

His ministry was characterized by scholarly and helpful sermons, by the exercise of both courage and tact. He always so lived as to demonstrate true love both for God and man.

It was my privilege to have Dr. Plyler as my personal friend for more than forty years. In two of the districts which he served as presiding elder, my father was a pastor. This friend of mine was chairman of the licensing committee which issued me local preacher's license. A close bond of friendship existed between us through the years.

Dr. Plyler could say with the Apostle Paul: "I live, yet not I, but Christ liveth in me," and "for me to live is Christ."

His wonderful Christian spirit was made manifest in his home life, as well as on the outside. His life in the home was characterized by the tenderest affection for his devoted companion who had walked with him so many years and for each of the children of the home. His life was of such nature that his sons and daughters could feel perfectly safe in following in his footsteps. In a most touching manner he often referred to his devoted wife and what she meant to him. It was a home in which first things were put first.

The funeral was conducted in Trinity Methodist Church on March 26 by Dr. C. D. Barclift and Dr. H. E. Spence, and interment followed in Maplewood Cemetery in Durham. Like one of old, he had looked to "that city whose Builder and Maker is God." As he approached life's earthly end, no doubt he felt as did John Wesley: "The best of all is, God is with us." He was justified also in feeling as did Paul who said: "I have fought the good fight, I have finished the course, I have kept the faith; henceforth there is laid up for me a crown of righteousness."

## LEMON HARVEY JOYNER

1863-1954

Lemon Harvey Joyner, the son of Lemon Harvey and Eliza Griffin Joyner, was born in Franklin County, N. C., on July 30, 1863. He died at his home in Jonesboro Heights, Sanford, N. C., on June 7, 1954.



Brother Joyner received his training for the ministry at Wake Forest College. He became a member of the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Church by transfer from the ministry of the Baptist Church in 1892. He was an honored member of our Conference for sixty-two years, thirty-four of which were in the active ministry. During those years he served the following appointments: Pantego, Greenville Circuit, Star, Hatteras, Spring Hope, Stedman, Jonesboro, Oxford Circuit, Merry Oaks, St. Pauls, Person Street in Fayetteville, Vass, and Granville Circuit. After those years of continuous and heroic service, he found it necessary to request superannuation in November 1926, because of ill health. Following his superannuation he lived in Jonesboro where, a few years before, he had already endeared himself to the people as their beloved pastor.

On December 22, 1889, he was married to Millie Gay Pippin, who was also of Franklin County, and who survives him. To them were born five children—three of whom survive: Mrs. Colton A. Godfrey of Sanford, Mrs. Parrott B. Hardee of Durham, and Paul W. Joyner of Fayetteville. Survivors also include a sister, Mrs. D. L. Chappell of Durham, eleven grandchildren and ten great-grandchildren. He was called upon to suffer the loss of two of his sons: L. Horace Joyner, and the Reverend Frank Belton Joyner, who was a beloved and honored member of this Conference until his death on May 15, 1949.

Funeral services for Brother Joyner were conducted by Rev. O. L. Hathaway, Rev. D. L. Fouts, and Rev. W. J. Neese at Jonesboro Heights Methodist Church. Interment was in the Jonesboro Cemetery.

Brother Joyner was humble in spirit, strong and courageous in faith, patient in suffering, pure in thought, upright in conduct, and genuine in his Christian living. He was a preacher who loved his people and who preached the gospel boldly. After his retirement from the pulpit he continued to preach the gospel, by the quality of his Christian living and influence, to all who came into contact with him. He leaves to the world the example of a sincere and useful life. His influence will continue to inspire those who knew him. He endeared himself to his neighbors and friends by his genial and kindly spirit and his wholesome sense of humor. The faith by which he had been supported through years of suffering also gave him support in the hour of death. Death for him was not the end but the beginning of a wonderful life. He believed that he would live forever in the presence of God. These lines of John G. Neihardt seem to express his Christian belief concerning the immortality of his soul:

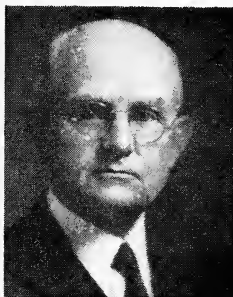
Oh, seek me not within the tomb—

## JESSE MARVIN ORMOND

1878-1954

Jesse Marvin Ormond was born in Greene County, North Carolina, the son of John James and Nancy Jane Ormond. His was a goodly and godly heritage and he lived up to the obligations of that heritage for more than three quarters of a century. His long, consecrated and useful life, as well as his lovable character and unselfish service made him a personality admired and loved by many hundreds of friends, students, and fellow Christians.



Dr. Ormond was an alumnus of Duke University, having received his A.B. degree from Trinity College in 1902. He received his theological training in Vanderbilt University and the University of Chicago. He was awarded the B.D. degree from the former institution in 1910. Randolph-Macon College conferred the degree of Doctor of Divinity upon him in 1939.

Dr. Ormond's work was divided between the pastorate and the schoolroom. His pastorates included the following charges: Leasburg, Hillsboro, Hertford, and First Church, Elizabeth City. He held professorships in Southern Methodist University and Duke University. In the latter institution he was Professor of Practical The-

ology. He also served as director of the rural church work of the Duke Endowment. In this service he was instrumental in guiding the use of Duke Endowment funds to help more than 700 rural churches in building sanctuaries or in making needful improvements. He also supervised the work of more than 1,200 Duke students who served as assistant pastors in the rural field.

As an author, he was also signally successful. Two books, "The Country Church in North Carolina," and "By the Waters of Bethesda," were widely circulated and of great influence. He also contributed frequently to religious papers and magazines.

Dr. Ormond's successful life was due in large measure to the influence and inspiration of his almost lifelong sweetheart and wife, Katrina Kern. Their home was an ideal Christian sanctuary. To them were born the following children who survive him: Reverend J. Kern Ormond, Mrs. Thomas Lide, Mrs. Wannamaker Harden, Mrs. Mine-tree Pyne, and Mrs. Woodrow Venable.

Thus is recorded briefly the salient facts concerning the life and activity of this good man. But the most important things cannot be recorded: the influence of his godly life, the confidence and trust which his fellow ministers had in him, the love which his students had for him, the far-reaching effect of his teaching and preaching, the unswerving faith which he manifested—these escape printer's ink.

I cannot do better than to quote from the funeral eulogy delivered by Bishop Costen J. Harrell, a close friend and colleague of Dr. Ormond:

"Here is a man with a golden heart. Never did he shirk a task which was laid upon him and never did he fail to perform it well. He was by nature a modest and retiring man. He had no liking for the flare of trumpets, and he never counted the applause of men. He was honored for the genuineness of his character; he was esteemed for his faithfulness in every trust; he was loved for the gentleness of his nature; he will be remembered as a good man who made a lasting contribution to his church and his time without advertising himself."

But his work was so genuine and so great that it needed no advertising. Everywhere he went, all persons of all classes recognized the presence of a friend. Everywhere he went men knew that there was one who was a true ambassador of the Christ. No wonder that his fellow-ministers through many years gave expression to their confidence in him by sending him repeatedly to the general conferences and naming him repeatedly on many outstanding committees and commissions. He was a man not only willing to serve but capable of serving. Responsibility was placed confidently upon his shoulders.

He will not soon be forgotten. Hundreds of students whom he taught, hundreds of men and women to whom he ministered, hundreds of friends who found him worthy

of their friendship, will carry him in the shrines of their memories. The vast sum which was raised as a memorial fund will work for the cause which he so long espoused. Hundreds of beautiful church buildings will give mute but eloquent testimony to the breadth of his influence.

In closing his wonderful tribute to Dr. Ormond, Bishop Harrell quoted from Lyman Abbott: "When my time comes to put out to sea, I think I shall be standing on the bow and looking forward with eager interest and hopefulness to the new world to which the unknown voyage will take me." Bishop Harrell added these words in closing: "Then loose the ropes and take the sea, my friend. The Pilot's hand is on the helm and all is well!" Those of us who knew Jesse Marvin Ormond will add our bon voyage to that farewell.

A loved one who watched him die tells of the change that took place upon his tired, pain-drawn face when he passed away. A sudden relaxation, a look of supreme quiet and happiness suffused his face as if he had seen his "Pilot face to face" when he crossed the bar.

Upon his retirement he and Mrs. Lupton moved to Graham where they made their home.



he served them well. Perhaps his most constructive work was in the building up of weaker charges. His devotion reflected itself in the confidence and respect of his brethren. He was most appreciative of the fellowship of his fellow ministers. After his retirement he liked to keep up with what was going on. He found joy in meeting with the ministers in his county.

Brother Lupton, with the able assistance of his faithful wife, had a remarkable home. The parsonage home of the Lupton's was a splendid example of how, under sometimes difficult circumstances, character and stability are developed. Both brother Lupton and Mrs. Lupton found great joy in the success of their children.

Brother Lupton passed away on Sunday afternoon, October 3, 1954, at the Wesley Long Hospital in Greensboro after an acute illness of about two weeks. The funeral service was conducted at the Graham Methodist Church on Tuesday afternoon, October 5, by the Reverend J. H. Lanning, the pastor of the Graham Methodist Church. The Masons had charge of the graveside services in Linwood Cemetery, Graham.

This good minister of Jesus Christ is survived by his wife, four sons, and one daughter. The sons are: Dr. Carroll C. Lupton, of Greensboro, North Carolina, Harvey A. Lupton of Winston-Salem, North Carolina, solicitor of the eleventh judicial district, Dr. Emmett S. Lupton of Alamance, North Carolina, and Major Frederick A. Lupton of Washington, D. C. The daughter who survives is Mrs. Carrie Murrell of New York.

He also leaves nine grandchildren and one brother, Eugene Lupton of Whortonsville, and one sister, Mrs. Perkins Paul, of Pamlico.

The best service that a good minister of Jesus Christ renders cannot be put down in a record, so the above facts by no means tell the complete story of his life and the good that he did. The total impact, however, is well known to his brethren, his family, and all that he served. In the minds of his fellow ministers he was the epitome of stability and dependability and those who knew him were made stronger and better because they had the privilege of knowing him.

At brother Lupton's funeral the grand old hymn "Amazing Grace" was beautifully sung as a solo. Somehow or other that stanza

"When we've been there ten thousand years  
Bright shining as the sun,  
We've no less days to sing God's praise  
Than when we first begun."

seemed to be particularly appropriate for brother Lupton's faith, assurance, and joy.

Earl Cunningham, she came to North Carolina where, in addition to being the gracious wife and hostess of the parsonage home, she carried on her beloved art work by teaching in Rodanthe when her husband served Kinnakeet Charge; later, in Calypso when her husband was pastor at Warsaw.

In 1935 the Rev. Mr. Cunningham was called to the National Board of Education of The Methodist Church with headquarters in Nashville, Tennessee, where he is now serving as the Director of the Department of Leadership Training. Mrs. Cunningham entered at once into active participation in the religious and art life of the city.

Her training in art at the University of Arkansas; the Clark Studio of Muskogee, Oklahoma; Samuel Kay Roller Studio, New York City; the Art Students' League, New

York City; the John Chetcuti Studio, Rockport, Massachusetts; and the Elliot O'Hara Studio, Goose Rocks Beach, Maine, fitted her well for her varied contributions and services in the field of art, where she served as art teacher in public schools, gave art lectures, and taught private classes in art.

In the field of creative art she gained recognition and had the satisfaction of having her paintings exhibited in at least 19 art exhibits from 1939 to 1951. In addition, she won first prize in the Landscape Section of the Tennessee State Art Exhibition held in Nashville in April 1950 and first prize in the Nashville Museum of Art Exhibition of 1951. Her recognition began well, with a recognized exhibit in the University of Arkansas exhibition in 1939 and the same year one of her paintings merited exhibition in the M. Grumbaker Art Show in New York City.

Painting was only one of her art expressions. She was adept at interior decorating, dinner and banquet table decorations, and floral displays. Her skill was much in demand in Nashville for occasions where such art was required. She was also a nationally accredited flower garden and flower show judge and gave much time to this work.

Much she loved art and much she gave to it, but more she loved her home and her church and more she gave to each of them.

When the Cunninghams moved to Nashville they immediately allied themselves with Methodist church life. The first years Mrs. Cunningham served in Belmont Methodist Church in many ways. When Calvary Methodist Church was organized in a section of the city which was much in need of a church, she became the kindergarten teacher beginning with four children. She built the class until it had to be divided into two classes. She moved then to primary teacher and when this department grew large enough she became its superintendent. Illness led to her resignation in 1946. Later she was nursery visitor and chairman of the Flower Guild of the Calvary Church.

When the Women's Society of Christian Service was organized at Calvary, she and Mrs. Roy Short each became a chairman of one of the two circles organized. Ann's circle grew from 19 to 48 in one year which is indicative of her ability as a leader.

Of her a fellow worker could say, "Memory keeps recalling so many occasions when she in her quiet lovely way was responsible for so many happy, joyous experiences for so many people. A life like hers makes a powerful impact upon family, friends, and her generation."

In her home life she was ever the gracious hostess, the homemaker, and the inspiring companion. Her husband could say, "She was ever a great inspiration to me, because of her high standards, her idealism, her breadth of spirit, and her ability to do her own thinking and arrive at intelligent conclusions, and stand by them even when they were not popular.

Mrs. Cunningham died at her home, 2015 Galbraith Drive, June 5, 1954, at the age of 49. Hers was a brief but beautiful life. She has left to all who knew her a stimulating heritage of gracious goodness, kindly helpfulness, and courageous and quiet bearing in illness. Her going is a sad breaking of earthly ties, but her eager and full

life had touched so many people and so many things that the days are full of tender reminders of her happy sojourn among us.

Dr. Willard A. Blue, her pastor, was assisted by Dr. John Q. Schisler and Dr. E. P. Anderson in conducting the memorial services at Calvary Methodist Church, Tuesday, June 8th, and she was laid to rest in Woodlawn Memorial Park in Nashville.

class of 1891, had she not found a young preacher in the Methodist pulpit in Beaufort, N. C., her home, when she arrived for her vacation. It must have been a case of love at first sight for before the fall opening of Greensboro College, she and her pastor had decided that she should grace a parsonage rather than return to college. A wonderful decision that was for the Methodist Church, for I never knew one more fitted for that sacred place. "The heart of her husband did safely trust in her" for her "price was far above rubies" and "her children rise up and call her blessed."

Other than her home as wife and mother, her life was devoted to "raising the fallen and cheering the faint."

Though our ways met only at intervals, we kept in touch with each other and she talked freely to me about her work whenever we met.

One incident in her life's experiences I want to relate as she told it to me in these intervals, for it is a key to her life.

One day a call came to the parsonage where they were serving, that a baby was dying in a home in a district where a preacher was seldom called, and the mother wanted a preacher. Would they go? They did. They found the mother by the cradle for him who never pledged his love to her in marriage. There were several other children besides the baby. She poured out her heart to the preacher and his wife and as they all knelt, beside the little cradle in prayer, the baby's soul took flight. The mother was happily converted. The pastor, his wife, and the undertaker placed the little body tenderly in the grave. By advice, she and her children joined the

church and Sunday-school. The mother was placed in the Woman's Class, but soon the superintendent came to Mrs. Smith saying, "The women in the class were leaving if this woman attended." Mrs. Smith quickly replied, "Get another teacher for my class and I'll join this one, and sit between "the Magdaline" and the others." This was done and the women remained.

The woman refused offers of buying or renting her home, as was, and boarded up the windows and doors. They found a neat cottage in a Christian district where she moved, took in sewing and supported her family.

When Rev. and Mrs. Smith's term was out and they moved to another charge, Mrs. Smith did not forget her protege, but kept in touch by letter. Finally, one letter told her that the mother felt that she should take her family to a new environment and that she was moving to a town in Texas—still the letters passed. One report was they had all joined the Methodist Church—later that she was teaching a Sunday-school class, the girls were singing in the choir, two boys were studying for the ministry, and all were preparing for definite Christian work. The years passed. A letter came telling Mrs. Smith that two of her children were missionaries in foreign fields, one a Methodist minister in Texas, all were in Christian work, and last of all, her hand had been asked in marriage by a Methodist minister, and she had given it after giving him the history of her life. So if she is still living, she is gracing a Methodist parsonage.

If we, who call ourselves Christians, when we are called to "Cross the Bar," can leave such a heritage in good works, there will be no doubt about our hearing the welcome applaud, "Well done, enter into the joy of thy Lord," as she received in January, 1952.

Mrs. Smith left four children: Dr. Frank C. Smith, of Charlotte, N. C.; Miss Geraldine Smith, for years head of Physical Education in Bellevue Hospital, New York City; Mrs. S. L. Corpening, Coatesville, Pa.; Mrs. K. O. Wendell, Colorado Springs, Colorado. Her husband preceded her in death about twenty-five years.

## Section IV REPORTS

### PART I

## Reports of District Superintendents

### DURHAM DISTRICT

There has been solid and substantial, but not sensational, progress in the Durham District in practically every department of work for our Lord and Saviour this year.

In the area of Evangelism our charges generally co-operated in the Church Attendance Crusade, and good and lasting results are reported. The number of additions to the church this year is 1,408, with losses of 1,193. The net gain, 215, is not large. A number of churches which received good numbers still report a loss in total membership due to revision of rolls. We do believe that the reported membership is now perhaps much nearer the actual residential membership than ever before.

In the area of Church Extension there are encouraging features. Within the last month ground has been broken for the construction of first units of buildings for the two newest congregations in Durham, St. John's and Epworth. These two new congregations have been considerably strengthened by some leaders from the older churches transferring membership to these two new churches. The district superintendent has encouraged this in order to provide a larger nucleus of leadership for these new churches. In addition to this, members of other churches in Durham have manifested increased interest in the new churches by making contributions to the building funds over and above that contributed through the Ten Dollar Club.

The response to the Ten Dollar Club has been excellent in some charges and poor in others. A few charges have yet to do anything in the way of membership in the Ten Dollar Club. Other charges have done exceedingly well. Special mention is made here of the charges listed below which have reached or exceeded the goals set for them: Epworth, St. John's and Trinity, Durham; Merritts-Orange; Person Circuit; Long Memorial, Roxboro; Roxboro Circuit; Saxapahaw; Webb Avenue, Burlington; Yanceyville.

In the area of Christian education we are glad to report good increases in Church School enrollment and attendance. In the Christian Workers Leadership Schools throughout the district this year there were 1,003 enrolled in the classes, with 708 earning certificates of credit. The Alamance County school again leads the entire North Carolina Conference with an enrollment of 434 and 352 credits earned. It is well for Alamance County to take this lead for there are more pastoral appointments in Alamance County than any other county in the bounds of the North Carolina Conference.

Two Youth Christian Witness Missions have been held this year in the Durham District. Our workers with youth report that these missions have been most worthwhile and the youth as well as the leaders are enthusiastic about them. These missions have demonstrated that Christian young people are effective evangelists in winning other young people to Christ and His Church. Not least in the results of these missions are the number of youth enlisted in active work in the Youth Fellowship.

The Woman's Society of Christian Service continues to do its usual fine work. The Durham District was well represented at all the conferences and schools of the society. At the school held in August at Duke University, nearly one hundred women from the Durham District were in attendance and sixty-nine received recognition cards.

During the year the following significant events have taken place throughout the district: Dedication of new parsonage at Mebane; erection of new parsonage at Friendship; dedication of Mt. Zion Church on the Mt. Tirzah Charge; erection of Educational Building at Helena, Mt. Tirzah Charge; dedication of Educational Building at Haw River; dedication of Education young Building at Lea's Chapel, Person Circuit; Comple-

tion of new Educational Building at Brookland, Brooksdale Charge; substantial improvements on church property at Saxapahaw; new parsonage at Mt. Sylvan; renovation of church at Branson, Durham; improvement of parsonages at Asbury, Durham, and at Pittsboro; dedication of fellowship hut at Effland, Orange Circuit; erection of Fellowship Hut at Hebron, Orange Circuit; new Educational Building at Trinity, Burlington, entered on Easter Sunday; new parsonage at Mt. Herman under construction.

The following charges have made significant progress in the reduction of debts on churches or parsonages: Rougemont, Bethany, West Burlington, Front Street, Carr, Trinity, Burlington, Yanceyville, Concord, Orange Chapel, and Clover Garden on the Whitney Cross Charge, Salem-Chapel, St. Paul's, Durham, Carrboro, Eno, Roxboro Circuit and Fairview.

The district superintendent of the Durham District is most appreciative of the co-operation of both laymen and pastors throughout the district. Facts and figures cannot fully tell the story of what is accomplished. Our pastors have been faithful in those things that build a better church and strengthen the Kingdom. There is an abundant evidence of consecration and of growing interest. Pray for us that we may serve to the glory of God.

### ELIZABETH CITY DISTRICT

The Elizabeth City District is composed of 35 pastoral charges, 96 churches, 35 pastors, and one associate. It comprises that large area along the Virginia line from Moyock to Murfreesboro, south to Aulander, Windsor, Williamston, Washington, along north side of Pamlico Sound to Mann's Harbor, including both sides of Albemarle Sound, and the islands to Hatteras.

Revivals were held in 32 of the pastoral charges, or in 83 of the 96 churches; 19 churches conducted visitation evangelism campaigns. As a result of these efforts there were 303 additions on profession of faith, 254 transfers from other Methodist churches, and 107 received from other denominations, making a grand total of 664.

Three hundred twenty-nine signers of the \$10 memberships were secured. Sixty-nine Vacation Church Schools were held.

The salaries of our pastors for next year have been increased by \$11,154. In addition to this, churches being helped by the Minimum Salary have increased their giving by \$3,070, making a total of salary increases by churches of \$14,224.

The district has increased its giving on special causes.

\$21,752 has been spent on parsonages and improvements; \$103,628 on church buildings and improvements. **Ahoskie** is beginning a \$100,000 educational plant. **Belhaven** spent \$1,200 on pavement for parking area, repairing steeple, and repairing church. **Creswell** has begun a new educational building; old church building to be renovated, heating plant installed, painting, carpets. **Edenton** has completed her beautiful and adequate educational annex. **City Road, Elizabeth City**, has remodeled church sanctuary at cost of \$10,000. **First Church, Elizabeth City**, redecorated sanctuary at a cost of \$6,216, and parsonage improvements costing \$804. **Riverside, Elizabeth City**, beginning first unit costing \$40,000; have acquired beautiful five-room brick parsonage. **Gatesville** completed educational building and enlargement of sanctuary; Philadelphia Church repaired and painted. **Hatteras** to begin construction of new church and educational plant. **Hertford** installed air conditioning in sanctuary. **Jamesville** completed Sunday School rooms. **Manteo** is retiring indebtedness and is coming off Mission Board. **Murfreesboro** spent \$4,000 on parsonage improvements, is clearing debt on church building, and is now a station. **North Gates: Savages** completed and dedicated Sunday School rooms; **Parkers** completed and dedicated new educational building. **Pasquotank: Mt. Hermon** completed fellowship hall and kitchen. **Perquimans** remodeled parsonage kitchen and bedroom; put heating system in Woodland Church; painted exterior and interior of Epworth Church. **Plymouth** educational plant completed and sanctuary redecorated. **Roper: Pleasant Grove** given new look inside and out; new roof on Mackey's church. **South Camden: five new Sunday School rooms** planned at Perkins. **South Mills: Sharon** remodeling and new Sunday School rooms almost completed;

Trinity foundation laid for recreational building; improvement program at McBride, heating system to be installed soon. **Swan Quarter:** two new Sunday School rooms at Soule; new parsonage to be built in spring. **Windsor:** construction of new church to get underway soon. **Union** has come off the Pasquotank Charge and is becoming a station; parsonage to be built this year. The **Currituck Charge** is building a parsonage, and a parsonage will be given to Harrelsville Church on the **Winston Charge**.

Our WSCS, WSG, Lay Activities, Educational Divisional Leaders, Directors of Evangelism, Missions, Temperance, Education, and all other groups and committees have done splendid work. Our accomplishments for the year have been realized as a result of the faith, devotion, courage, and co-operation of the pastors and laity. With a continuation of such devotion to Christ and His Church, we expect to make the coming year one of growth in our spiritual nearness to Christ, our concern for others at home and abroad, our fellowship and our sacrifice.

### FAYETTEVILLE DISTRICT

Other District Superintendents have labored and I have entered into their harvest. I would like to express to each of them my gratitude, especially to Dr. W. C. Ball, whose planning and work has made this year's report possible.

**Church Extension:** Our district has been busy extending the church. First: We have approximately 1,000 members in the \$10 club for building of new churches. Second: We have four new churches. Third: Seven new charges will come into being through charge divisions: Bonlee, Center, Lovejoy-Macedonia, Glenwood-Trinity, Community, Cumberland-St. Andrews, and South River.

**Spring Lake** was assigned an associate pastor, Rev. T. Fant Steele, Jr., at the last session of the Conference to help Rev. B. L. Davidson, and the Northmount Charge, in establishing the new church. The church was organized January 17, 1954. The first unit of the church building is under construction.

**Southern Pines** was the second place to have a pastor appointed to organize a church. Rev. E. E. Whitley went to the charge June 1, 1954, and on September 12, 1954, the church was organized in a great victory service.

**Hamlet:** Rev. Howard M. McLamb, pastor of the First Methodist Church, and the membership of the church sponsored a new church in the Fairview section. Rev. G. C. Megill was appointed July 1, 1954, and on September 19, 1954, the Fellowship Church was organized with 103 members. At the close of the service First Church presented to Fellowship a deed for the property to build a new church. The property was valued at \$4,200.00, and First Church gave an assurance of continued aid.

**Raeford Road, Fayetteville:** For over a year and a half, a church school has been in operation. This project, sponsored by the Hay Street Methodist Church, was under the direction of Rev. R. Grady Dawson, pastor, and Rev. J. R. Regan, Jr., associate pastor. This work, under the present pastor, Rev. Graham S. Eubank, and Rev. R. Keith Glover, associate pastor, has been enlarged to include regular preaching services. At this Conference, we are asking for a full-time pastor to organize a church.

The above progress has had the full co-operation of Bishop Paul N. Garber and the Board of Missions and Church Extension of the North Carolina Conference. Especially would we express our gratitude to Rev. J. E. Garlington, president; Rev. A. S. Starnes, secretary; Rev. M. W. Lawrence, conference secretary; Rev. Thomas Collins, executive secretary, and Walter F. Anderson, associate secretary, of the Board of Missions and Church Extension.

**Missions:** Every charge made an offering towards the erection of a much needed church at Jacksonville, N. C. Every charge has accepted an Advance Special for the second year. Thanks to Rev. A. S. Parker, our district missionary secretary, for his leadership and help in this great work.

**Outstanding Events:** (1) 420 laymen at the Church Extension dinner meeting at Steele Street Methodist Church, Sanford, N. C. (2) 230 laymen at the Hay Street Methodist Church meeting at Fayetteville. (3) The District Retreat for Pastors at Carolina Hotel, Sanford. (4) Training School for local churches and subdistrict areas. (5)

District Pastor's Meeting for Youth Emphasis at Haymount Church, Fayetteville. (6) The Adult Meeting for Christian Action at Aberdeen. (7) The District Alcohol Workshop at Carthage. (8) Lay representation at Louisburg and Purdue University. (9) Under the leadership of Mr. J. N. Gibson, Jr., district lay leader, we have exceeded our quota of organized Methodist Men's Clubs. (10) The pastors' fall meeting at Aberdeen. (11) 250 church school workers attended the subdistrict institutes. (12) 300 youth and adult leaders participated in the training and visitation opportunity of the Youth Christian Witness Mission, under the direction of Rev. J. A. Auman, district director of youth work.

**District Staff:** The entire program of our church has been presented in our district. The success of our work this year has been through the wise planning and the follow-up, plus the leadership of our pastors and the co-operation of our lay people. In all of our work we have seen the faith of a believing people and felt the Guiding Hand of our Heavenly Father as we have labored in His Kingdom.

### NEW BERN DISTRICT

As we close this church year we would give thanks to our Heavenly Father for His rich blessings upon us, and for the devotion of our pastors and our people as we have served together in the Vineyard of our Lord, and as we have found deep joy in that service. We are happy to report herewith some of the activities of the year:

1. **Membership.** Reports early this month showed 676 members received on profession of faith, 993 by transfer and otherwise, total 1,658. 307 infants have been christened. And new babies have come into ten of our pastor's homes.

2. **The Ministry.** 14 young men have responded to the call of the Gospel and have been licensed or recommended for license to preach.

3. **Youth Evangelism.** Three of our five Subdistrict Methodist Youth Fellowships have conducted Youth Christian Missions, winning 31 young people to Christ and His Church and adding 203 new members to the MYF groups.

4. **W.S.C.S.** The Woman's Society of Christian Service is now organized in all but 9 of our 124 individual churches.

5. **Pastoral Charges.** Fremont, LaGrange, and Newport are becoming full-time stations this month. Falling Creek and Providence churches are forming a two-point charge from the Wayne Circuit. And St. Mark Church has been organized in Kinston this year, giving us now 56 pastoral charges in the district.

6. **New Parsonages** have been built this year at Beech Grove, Camp Glenn, Maury, Oriental, Salem, and Shady Grove. New parsonages have been begun at Eureka and Woodington, and one will be built right away at Institute. Ann Street Church in Beaufort and our church at Grifton have bought new parsonages.

7. **New Churches.** Our congregations at St. Luke in Goldsboro and Westminster in Kinston have moved into the first unit of their new churches. The first unit of St. James Church in Greenville is nearing completion. Construction is now underway on St. Mark Church in Kinston. And ground was broken this month for Trinity Church in New Bern.

8. **"The Second Mile."** In addition to the regular benevolences our people have given this year \$16,690 for Advance Specials—home and foreign.

9. **Church Extension.** Every charge has participated in the program for building new churches across the Conference. 35 charges have secured their quota of \$10 Club members, and 20 of these have gone beyond the quota, giving us nearly 900 memberships in the district.

10. **Methodist Men.** 17 clubs have been chartered and 2 others organized in this rapidly growing movement in our Methodist Church.

11. **Family Life.** Centenary Church, New Bern, chose Mr. and Mrs. William F. Pierce, Jr., as their Family-of-the-Year and sent them to the National Conference on Family Life in Cleveland, Ohio, this month.

12. **Widening Parishes.** Several of our pastors are serving the larger interests of the church as follows: Conference Missionary Secretary, Mark W. Lawrence. Board

of Ministerial Training, John A. Russell, chairman, and W. M. Howard, Jr., secretary. Board of Publications, A. J. Hobbs, president. Supply Pastors School, Leon Couch, Dean. A. J. Hobbs is also a member of the Southeastern Jurisdictional Council. And the young people of our district sent Miss Peggy Howard of Newport to the South-eastern Jurisdiction School of Missions at Lake Junaluska.

### RALEIGH DISTRICT

As I come to the close of my first year on the Raleigh District, I find much for which to thank God and take courage. Through the fine co-operation and splendid work of the preachers, laymen and lay-women, real progress has been made in every area of Kingdom work; and to them I accord the credit. Of course, there is no adequate yardstick to measure the most important advances—those in the realm of the spiritual development and soul-growth of the people. Furthermore, it is not possible in a short report to enumerate all of the achievements in the district this year, but the major areas of work may be summarized under five headings.

#### I. Membership and Evangelism

1. As of October 11th, 814 persons have been received into the membership of the churches on profession of faith, and 936 by certificate, making a total for the year of 1,777.

2. The general program of evangelism has been promoted in all of the charges through revival meetings, visitation evangelism, preparatory classes, the Church School, and the attendance crusade.

3. Special emphasis has been given to youth evangelism through Christian Witness Missions. A Conference-wide Pilot Christian Witness Mission was held in Raleigh, with 14 churches of the Raleigh area and 150 youth, ministers and adult workers from all over the Conference participating. The youth and adults trained in this mission have been conducting subdistrict missions throughout the Conference. In addition to the Pilot Mission, one subdistrict mission has been held in the Raleigh District, and others will follow during the next conference year.

#### II. Christian Education

1. Church School enrollment in the Raleigh District has increased 949 this year, with an increase in attendance of 12%.

2. In the area of training for Church School teachers and workers, six subdistrict Leadership Training Schools and four subdistrict Institutes on Church School Work have been held.

3. The North Carolina Christian Advocate is playing an important role in the total educational program of the district, with 2,036 copies of the Advocate going into our homes each week.

4. We are also giving financial support to our Methodist colleges through the College Sustaining Fund and the United College Appeal.

5. Two couples from our district, Reverend and Mrs. J. W. Lineberger and Reverend and Mrs. Harold Leatherman, attended the National Family Life Conference in Cleveland, Ohio.

#### III. Christian Missions

1. In addition to regular world service giving, our district is supporting in a fine way the program of Advance Mission Specials, with foreign and conference specials to the amount of \$16,241.

2. The Woman's Society of Christian Service continues to be most active and effective in its missions work. Our district has the distinction of being organized 100%, with either a society or district members in every church in the district.

3. The work of church extension is receiving special emphasis and support in the district. We have 707 \$10 Club memberships. One new church, Highland Methodist Church, Raleigh, was organized July 21, and now has a membership of 114, with 160 in Church School.



#### IV. Lay Activities

1. Under the efficient leadership of the District Lay Leader, Mr. B. M. Madison, lay activities are moving forward in a fine way. We have many consecrated laymen who give generously of their time, talents and money to advance Kingdom causes.

2. A large number of our laymen attended the Laymen's Retreat at Louisburg College. We also had a fine delegation of laymen to attend the National Layman's Conference at Purdue University.

3. There has been a decided upsurge of interest in Methodist Men's Clubs. Twelve new clubs have been organized this year, which gives the Raleigh District a total of 23 clubs.

#### V. Buildings and Finance

1. The following new church buildings have been erected this year, or are being built: Longview, Raleigh; Newton Grove; Mount Pleasant; City Road, Henderson; Wesley, Henderson; Stewarts, Dunn.

2. New educational buildings and additional classrooms have been built, or are underway, at Apex; Pleasant Grove; Hayes Barton, Raleigh; Jenkins Memorial, Raleigh; Sanders, Four Oaks Charge.

3. Two lovely new parsonages have been built this year, Edenton Street, Raleigh, and Wesley Circuit.

4. Extensive renovation of the church building has been completed at Benson; Franklinton; Oxford; Millbrook; Gillburg, Vance Circuit; White Memorial, Henderson.

5. Two more churches in the Raleigh District have joined "The Society of Well-Cooled Congregations" by installing air conditioning. They are Fairmont, Raleigh, and First Church, Henderson.

6. Approximately \$250,000 has been raised and expended on these church and parsonage buildings and improvements. For all purposes the churches in the district have raised this year well over \$800,000.

For the good work done in the Raleigh District this year I give thanks to our Heavenly Father, and express appreciation to our faithful ministers and loyal Methodists.

#### ROCKY MOUNT DISTRICT

"When you read the headlines of the newspapers you get the impression that the world is going to the dogs. Then you go out to one of our churches and meet a group of faithful, consecrated Christian people who are spending themselves sacrificially to make their communities fit places in which to live, and praying and giving that their Christ may be shared with the world, and it gives one a renewed faith in his fellow men." So spoke the wife of a district superintendent who goes with him as much as she can on his rounds. One thinks of Jesus turning to his follows and saying: "Ye are the salt of the earth, ye are the Light of the world." Can one find a higher privilege than going and ministering to these churches?

There is no simple rule for measuring the greatness of a church. If we mark a church as great because it is so busy and the program seems so adequate, we must beware for we shall find down the road a little church where so many more have attained the higher spiritual life. The true purpose of the church is attained when its people know and serve God.

There are reports though that mark progress. As this statement is written in early October these reports are incomplete, but there is enough to show that the year in the district has seen progress all along the line of service.

Our men are conscious that the women of the church bear an uneven share of the load. Their work is outstanding. New societies have been organized in the district . . . established groups have been strengthened. The district WSCS leadership proudly reports ninety-nine societies. For their achievements they were awarded the coveted Lillie Moore Everett Study Jewell. We rejoice in their work.

Among our men great interest has been shown in organizing Methodist Men. Four hundred thirty men sat down to eat and work together in Rocky Mount as we began this work in the winter. Subdistrict meetings followed. The quadrennial goal for the district has been reached. Twenty-one groups are organized. We have set a new goal, one for each charge, forty-one clubs. We will easily reach it this year ahead.

Our youth are conscious of the need of building strength in the MYF. Representatives from the district to the Pilot Mission in Raleigh brought back genuine enthusiasm and known how. The first district mission was held in Rosemary in October. It was encouraging. Others will follow at Rocky Mount, Warrenton, Jackson, Enfield, Wilson, etc.

And the year has been one of extensive building. New sanctuaries have been built at Hornes on Elm City Charge, at Winstead on the edge of Wilson, at Weavers on Littleton Circuit, New Hope on Roanoke Circuit, Sharon Church on Seaboard Charge, Spring Church in Virginia on our Garysburg work. At Castalia our young pastor went into the field and put down the church foundations himself. The little church is now under roof. Duke Endowment has approved it, too, and will help generously. At Scotland Neck a miracle has happened. A handsome structure is underway. Methodism is aware of its destiny there. At Severn great improvements in the sanctuary have been made.

New Church School buildings are underway or completed at Tabernacle on the Middleburg work; Red Oak, Rich Square, Roanoke Rapids, Tarboro, Whitakers. At Wilson the new \$300,000 educational structure is well underway. They speak now of the new sanctuary to be. Handsome parsonages have been built at Elm City and Stokes; extensive improvements at Clark Street, Kenly, Rosemary, and elsewhere. This is a story incomplete. The church is marching on.

Preliminary reports suggest consistent advances in church membership and Church School enrollment and attendance. We "thank God and take courage."

### WILMINGTON DISTRICT

Wilmington District Methodism closes the 1953-54 Conference year with a sense of achievement and victory. It is impossible here to indicate the dimensions of the spiritual gains—these are reflected in the sacrifice, devotion, and morale of the Methodist people. Our most significant progress has come in the following fields: church building; parsonage improvements; debt retirement; Christian education; evangelism; lay activities; missions; stewardship; and the general promotion and cultivation of the Methodist program at work.

The following sketch will indicate the scope of the past year's work:

**Church Building.** New churches have been erected at Elizabethtown, Sunset Park, Whiteville, and Wrightsville on Harboro Island. Expansion and renovation projects have been completed or are being completed. A total of \$91,712.00 has been spent on church building and improvements.

**Parsonages.** Several parsonages have been rebuilt, bought, or otherwise improved. New structures are on the way. A total of \$42,712.00 has been spent on parsonages.

**Debt Retirement.** A general program of debt retirement has been promoted. Indebtedness on churches has been reduced by \$45,600.00, while parsonage indebtedness has been decreased by \$11,275.00.

**Christian Education.** There are 125 local Church Schools in the district, with 15,609 pupils enrolled. This represents a gain of 995 over the previous year. Eighty-eight Vacation Church Schools were held. There are 60 Methodist Youth Fellowships with 1,649 members. More than \$800.00 was raised for Church School Rally Day, approximately \$287.00 was raised for Methodist Student Day. The year's receipts on the United College Appeal amounted to \$7,983.00.

**Evangelism.** The Wilmington District held 108 revivals and conducted 55 visitation campaigns. Out of these efforts 674 persons were received into church membership

profession of faith and 606 by transfer, making a total increase of 1,280 members for the year.

**Lay Activities.** The program of lay activities has enjoyed a normal year. There are 7 chartered units of Methodist Men and 553 members of the "Ten-Dollar" Club.

**Missions.** The Wilmington District raised \$25,472.00 for World Service, \$8,796.00 for Advance Specials, \$1,101.00 for Overseas Relief, \$518.00 for Race Relations, and \$1,507.00 for the Week of Dedication. There are 94 organized Woman's Societies of Christian Service.

**Stewardship.** Stewardship as a way of life has received wide emphasis throughout the district. Stewardship studies and preaching have resulted in financial increases along the way.

**Promotion and Cultivation.** Throughout the year there has been a general program of promotion and cultivation. Vacation Church School Institutes, Subdistrict Church School Institutes, Leadership Training Schools, Workshops, and Seminars have been conducted with splendid response from the people.

Best of all, the Wilmington District has a due sense of gratitude to the Heavenly Father for granting us the privilege of sharing in His Kingdom's work.

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## PART II

### Quadrennial Board and Commission Reports

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#### BOARD OF CONFERENCE CLAIMANTS ¶1613

##### Report No. 1

For the support of retired ministers, their widows and dependent children, your board recommends the assessment of an amount equal to 16% of the salaries of the pastors and their assistants from the churches of the conference. We also recommend an annuity rate of \$46.00 per service year for the conference year 1954-55. The board also recommends that the annuity rate for approved supply preachers, retired with not less than ten years of full-time service, be set on an equal basis with the rate for preachers retired from service in full connection.

Your board urges that all preachers with full-time approved supply years make application for credit on these years if you have not done so. This applies to both the approved supply preachers and those in full connection who have served any number of full-time approved supply years.

We wish to recognize and express appreciation to D. M. Sharpe for the efficient and faithful service he has rendered to his conference during the many years as a member of this board. Several of these years have been served as an officer of the board, the last office being that of vice-president. The termination of Brother Sharpe's membership on the board is due to the fact that he has taken a retired relationship in our conference.

J. M. Dozier has been elected to the office of vice-president of the board.

The following Conference Claimants have died during this conference year: Lemon H. Joyner, Frederick A. Lupton, Jesse M. Ormond, Marion T. Plyler, Lewis E. Sawyer, Mrs. J. L. C. Rumley, and Mrs. J. B. Thompson. The name of Mrs. S. A. Maxwell has been removed from the list of Conference Claimants due to remarriage.

The board recommends that the honorarium of the secretary of the board for 1954-55 remain at \$300.00 plus his expense account, which is to be submitted to the Conference Treasurer.

We recommend that in the constitution of the Ministers Retirement Fund paragraph five in the sentence beginning, "These reserve funds . . ." be made to read: "These reserve funds (now known as the dividend fund) shall be invested and any income from their investment and the investment of the general reserve fund shall be added to

the reserve fund until it reaches the sum of \$250,000, at which time the earnings shall be added to the current collections (now known as the current fund) and included in the balance available for crediting to members' accounts as dividends as provided for above." Also in paragraph six it is recommended that the sentence about two-thirds down ending with the words, "has paid personally into the fund," there be added the phrase, "plus any dividends in his account." That accumulated dividends in the accounts of deceased members of the Minister's Retirement Fund which have not been paid out shall be sent, by the Conference Treasurer, to the proper beneficiaries.

### Report No. 2

In keeping with paragraph 1618, Section 2c, and paragraph 1623, Section 6, of the 1952 Discipline we recommend a policy that when a conference member is appointed to an institution, organization, or agency which pays the salary of the appointee, that this institution, organization, or agency make provisions for the annuity during those years. In cases where salaries are paid by other institutions, organizations or agencies which do not have an annuity plan, in order for the appointee to benefit from the conference annuity program it is necessary that such institution, organization or agency pay or have paid into the conference claimants fund an amount equal to twelve times the annuity rate annually. As so specified in paragraph 1618, Section 4, of the 1952 Discipline, we recommend that "special appointments shall be listed in the conference journal as follows: (1) with annuity claim, (a) upon this Annual Conference, or (b) upon a general board, an institution, or an agency of The Methodist Church; (2) without annuity claim upon this Annual Conference."

In accordance with paragraph 1625, Section 3, of the 1952 Discipline, we recommend that the conference treasurer be authorized to pay annuity and relief benefits monthly. Note that this recommendation requires a two-thirds vote of the Annual Conference.

### Report No. 3

After thorough investigation and study, and in accordance with paragraph 1629, sections 2 and 3, and paragraph 1631, section 6, of the 1952 Discipline, we find that several of the members of the conference, in full connection, approved supply preachers and some in retired relation, qualify for full-time approved supply years of service. We further recommend that the following retired preachers be credited with full-time approved supply years, the number here appearing beside their name: E. W. Downum, 2; J. W. Hoyle, 4; J. A. Tharpe, 4; W. J. Underwood, 5; W. N. Vaughan, 2.

The following men, having applied this conference year, are already receiving annuity for the years here listed: K. F. Duval, 3; R. N. Fitts, 14; J. O. Long, 2. In addition to these years being listed in the chronological roll, we recommend that a table similar to that of the "Prospective Distribution for Retired Ministers" be published in the Conference Journal. This table headed "Retired Ministers with Approved Supply Years" is to include the list of the names of the retired men in full connection who have full-time approved supply years to their credit, with the number of years and amount of annuity for these years to be listed beside their names. We suggest that this statement follow the one of "Prospective Distribution of Retired Men" and precede the one, "Retired Approved Supply Ministers."

It is recommended that a column, headed "Approved Years" be added to the list of Approved Supply Pastors in the journal. In this list the number of full-time approved years of service is to be designated. Thus, each full-time approved year thereafter is to be added. (This table will appear in the 1955 Journal.)

#### Report No. 4

#### RECOMMENDATION FOR ANNUITY CLAIM

In keeping with paragraph 1617, section 5, of the 1952 Discipline, which reads: "If retirement takes place before attainment of age sixty-five, for other reasons than personal disability, the right to make an annuity claim from the time of retirement until the ministerial member attains that age shall be granted upon recommendation of the Committee on Conference Relations and a three-fourths vote of the Annual Conference."

It is thus recommended that the North Carolina Annual Conference, on this date, October 30, 1954, grant R. L. Vickery, Sr., now retired, the right to make an annuity claim during his years of retirement until he reaches the age of sixty-five, at which time he may automatically become a conference claimant.

## 2. The Divinity School

Two hundred and forty-five different individuals registered in the Divinity School during 1953-54, and it is expected that practically the same number will be handled during 1954-55.

All the contemplated additions to the faculty have been made. Dr. McMurry Smith Richey has assumed full-time duties as Assistant Professor of the Philosophy of Christian Education. Mr. Andrew Durwood Foster has also assumed his duties as Assistant Professor of the History and Philosophy of Religion.

The Divinity School, as well as Duke University and the North Carolina Conference, suffered a severe loss on June 24, 1954, in the death of Dr. J. M. Ormond, who served for many years as Professor of Practical Theology and Director of Field Work of the Duke Endowment. The North Carolina Conference has created the J. M. Ormond Fund for the promotion of rural church work in the Conference.

The School for Approved Supply Pastors held during the summer of 1954 showed an enrollment more than double that of the previous year. Two hundred seventy-five ministers enrolled in the school, which was directed by Dr. W. A. Kale.

During the summer months the University undertook a complete renovation and repair of the Divinity School building. Additional space for library, office and classroom work was made available and the work of the School will be greatly facilitated.

## 2. Greensboro College

The past year has witnessed visible physical progress at the college. (1) The Hannah Brown Finch Memorial Chapel is almost completed; (2) Thanks to the United College Appeal, the Greensboro Building is on the architect's boards. Estimated at \$400,000, this structure will provide living space for 100 students and dining room facilities for 500. Ability to pay as we go will depend upon the UCA; should there be any shrinkage in these returns, we shall need to borrow approximately \$100,000 from outside sources.

Still high on the list of our physical needs are the following: (1) a gymnasium to provide basic facilities for exercise and physical education. (2) Substantial additions to endowment to increase the salaries of underpaid faculty and staff without adding to the student's cost. (3) Scholarship funds to assist worthy students.

Statistics for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1953, are as follows: officers and instructors, 53; students, 393; part of student body which is Methodist, 81%; value of property, \$2,021,262.40; endowment, \$712,204.91; work scholarships and grants, \$3,-938.00; tuition reduction for ministers' daughters, \$6,500.00; indebtedness, \$20,000.

Greensboro College has defined its task in terms of a quality education for approximately 500 students. Only by continuing the favorable ratio of one teacher per 12-14 students can the personal influence of a carefully selected faculty be felt throughout college life. The Christian program of the campus employs Methodist materials and Methodist procedures, while at the same time promoting a campus unity which successfully crosses all social and religious lines. The success of our program in churchmanship is best seen in the readiness with which our graduates assume their places in Methodist churches all over the state.

## 3. High Point College

The enrollment for the year ending May 31, 1954, was as follows: Summer School, 388; Extension, 57; Regular Session, 761 (including part-time students), making a total of 1,206 (a very substantial increase over the year before). There were 56 faculty and staff members. While the enrollment for the new year is not complete at this writing, it is already considerably larger than last year.

The audit as of May 31, 1954, showed the value of land, buildings, and equipment to be \$1,883,013.11, based on 1954 evaluations, an increase of \$214,806.20 during the year. The audit showed \$564,565.90 in the Endowment Fund. The college closed the fiscal year with no indebtedness and an operating balance of \$991.94.

During the scholastic year the college enrolled 58 ministerial students, 21 children of ministers, and 15 children from orphanages, amounting to \$10,536.00 in concessions to these students. These figures do not include approximately 50 girls who were

majoring in Religious Education but for whom no money was available for concessions. In addition, the college paid 75 students almost \$14,000.00 for work at the college. A total of 245 students received financial assistance through all types of scholarships, grants-in-aid, work, and loans, amounting to \$34,572.71.

Susanna Wesley Hall, a new dormitory for approximately 50 young women students, was occupied and filled to capacity with the opening of school in September, 1953. Memorial Auditorium and Music Hall was completed in time for the commencement exercises at the close of the school year. This building serves as a chapel, auditorium, music and dramatics building, and for certain types of social functions. A new science and home economics building was occupied with the beginning of classes on September 20. New and larger heat lines and much new plumbing have been installed. Many of the buildings have been renovated.

On Wednesday, October 13, the following new buildings and facilities will be dedicated, which each of you helped to make possible. Memorial Auditorium and Music Hall, Susanna Wesley Hall for Women, Science and Home Economics Building, Shop and Maintenance Building, rooms for students on the third floors of Woman's Hall and McCulloch Hall. Each of you is invited to attend this service and to inspect these new facilities on October 13.

The Methodist Student Fellowship has been very active during the year, with our Methodist students showing a keen interest in the activities. This organization is a very important factor in helping the college to discharge its Christian and Methodist functions.

#### 4. Louisburg College

The past year has been one of physical development for Louisburg College. Funds received from the United College Appeal have enabled the college to remodel Pattie Julia Wright Dormitory for Women and equip the building with new furniture. This dormitory now is one of the best and most modern in North Carolina.

In addition, Franklin County Dormitory for Men has been renovated and the rooms equipped with new furniture. Old Main Building is being "dressed up," and the driveway around the front campus of the college is being replaced and made safer. A two-way driveway has been paved with entrances on the east and south sides of the campus.

With other funds coming in from the United College Appeal, it is planned to build a central heating plant and a dining hall. Other projects are also in the future—the near future, it is hoped.

Following the approval of the 1953 Annual Conference, there has been started at Louisburg College a Department of Town and Country Work. Reverend C. Wade Goldston has begun his work with the college, and it is expected that Louisburg will render more and more service to the conference and the church. A good religious program has been worked out, and the religious life of the students is being better provided for.

Statistics for the fiscal year ending May 31, 1954, are: officers and instructors, 22; students, 176; value of property, \$1,135,500; endowment, \$159,900.

The enrollment of the 1954-55 session shows an increase of approximately 25%. With the improvements at the college, it is expected that more of our people will recognize the work that Louisburg College is doing and can do with their support. The institution has the highest accreditation and is accredited by the Southern Association of College and Secondary Schools and by the University Senate of The Methodist Church.

II. In order to inform our Methodist people better about the Sustaining Fund, we recommend that Christian College Day, April 24, be used to inform our people about the needs of our colleges and to solicit their prayerful loyalty.

THE METHODIST COLLEGE COMMITTEE  
(Local Church)

It is the belief of the Committee on Schools and Colleges that the committee in the local church called the "Methodist College Committee" should be responsible, along with the pastor, for the presentation of the opportunities and needs of our Methodist Colleges and for encouraging our Methodist young people to attend these colleges. Early in the conference year this committee should plan its program for the year.

The minimum program for the local church should include the following:

(1) In co-operation with the Commission on Education, plan for the proper observance of Student Recognition Day in December, Race Relations Day in February, and Methodist Student Day in June.

- (2) Plan for the most effective observance of Christian College Day.
- (3) Inform each church about the Sustaining Fund.
- (4) A personal interview by the pastor of each local Methodist high school senior for the purpose of presenting the challenge of our Methodist Colleges.
- (5) Early in the school year, send the names and addresses of all Methodist high school seniors to the executive secretary of the Conference Board of Education and the district superintendent.
- (6) The Methodist College Committee is urged to use its own initiative and imagination in trying to set up a local Methodist Scholarship Fund for worthy Methodist students.

Inform church members about the work of the Wesley Foundations and Methodist Student Movement and enlist their interest in this work.

## Report No. 2

### THE LOCAL CHURCH

We recommend that the Commission on Education, under the leadership of the Assistant Superintendent for Membership Cultivation, work out a definite plan for emphasizing and increasing church school membership and attendance. We encourage the use of approved Methodist literature in each church. We recommend continued emphasis on stewardship, family life, missionary, and alcohol education, and the use of the best evangelistic techniques in winning members of the church school to Christ and the church. We urge churches to give serious consideration to the provision of more adequate church school facilities, building and equipment, and that the churches planning to build or remodel use the best consultative services available. We call attention to the free consultative service provided by the General Board of Education. We further urge local churches to give serious consideration to the possibilities of providing more time for Christian teaching by (a) lengthening the time for teaching in the Sunday School, (b) using Sunday evenings and the Sunday Evening Fellowship, (c) working out extended sessions of the church school.

We call attention to the following special days and urge appropriate observances: (1) World Service Sundays; (2) Church School Rally Day; (3) Race Relations Sunday; (4) Methodist Student Day; (5) National Family Week; (6) Children's Day.

#### Children's Work

Realizing that the church of the future is being formed in the minds of the children of today, we feel that an increased effort should be made to guide children in Christian growth and enlist and train more workers with children. Thankful for all that is being done in this field, we are at the same time mindful of our inadequacies and deeply desire to improve the quality of our teaching and guiding ministry to children.

We recommend the following: That special emphasis be given to nursery work; that children be enrolled in the Home Nursery soon after birth; that parents be visited and supplied the proper literature; that the church school nursery be strengthened. That children be trained not only in Sunday School but also in extra sessions, vacation schools, and special church membership classes; that careful planning be done for the observance of special days with needs of children in mind. Special days such as Thanksgiving, Christmas, Easter, Children's Day, Church School Rally Day. That the Junior Camping program be made more effective by continually improved conference-wide camping and by promotion of day camping. One pilot day camp to be held this year.

#### Youth Work

The purpose of all youth work in the North Carolina Conference is to help our young people to make a full, personal commitment of their lives to Jesus Christ as Savior and Lord; grow in Christlikeness; grow in Christian Faith; grow in Understanding of the Bible; become witnesses for Christ through Christian behavior and active evangelism; become active workers in the church; express the responsibilities of Christian Citizenship; make their vocations Christian in many instances to choose church vocations; develop a feeling for Christian fellowship in the home, church, com-



munity, and the world; be prepared for marriage and the establishing of Christian homes; become missionary-minded in giving, in outlook, and in churchmanship; develop habits of systematic giving for church causes.

To this end we recommend:

(1) That sincere and earnest support be given to the Youth Emphasis with special attention to the following: (a) that every local church participate in a Christian Witness Mission sponsored either on a subdistrict or local level; (b) that every local church put emphasis on the Fall Action Program—"Youth and Their Families"; (c) that every local church encourage their young people to join in the Lenten Reading project—"The Christian Fellowship—The Church"; (d) that subdistrict seminars be held for adult workers with youth; (e) that district and subdistrict Youth Fellowship teams give assistance in organizing new and strengthening weak Methodist Youth Fellowships.

(2) That special emphasis be given to enlisting, inspiring, and training adult workers with youth.

(3) That spring youth rallies be held in every district.

(4) That the program of summer camping and assemblies be extended to provide for more youth who want to attend.

(5) That the Annual Conference session of the MYF be continued because of its valuable contribution to the youth program in our Conference.

(6) That we give encouragement and any desired assistance to the Conference Committee on Christian Vocations in planning a Christian Vocations Conference.

(7) That every local church maintain a close touch with her young people away from home.

(8) That youth and adult leaders take full advantage of Jurisdictional training opportunities such as: SEJ Youth Leadership Workshop at Lake Junaluska; SEJ Leadership School at Lake Junaluska; SEJ Recreation Workshop at Leasburg, Florida; National Convocation of Methodist Youth.

#### Adult Work

We strongly believe that adult Christian education is one of the growing needs of The Methodist Church and our North Carolina Conference. Because adults are the controlling groups in our churches, and because a general advance in our over-all conference program is largely dependent upon adult responsiveness, we make the following recommendations regarding adult work in our Conference.

(1) That we go on record as expressing deep appreciation to Mr. John Meares for the outstanding work he has done as a volunteer Conference Director of Adult Work;

(2) That, beginning with the new quadrennium, the Board employ a full-time Conference Director of Adult Work who shall be a mature and experienced person;

(3) That an adequate amount of funds be requested next year from the Commission on World Service and Finance to pay an adequate salary and provide suitable housing for such a person.

(4) That the local church plan for Bible Conferences, Christian Family Life Education, seminars on Christian Social Action, the formation of prayer groups for adults, and a renewed emphasis on the Home Department.

#### Report No. 4

#### LEADERSHIP EDUCATION

We adopt the viewpoint that any program of leadership education must be oriented in terms of the local church. In preparing this report, we have asked ourselves how we can secure better trained workers, and we have reached the conclusion that the burden must rest primarily with the local church itself. The Conference Board of Education stands ready and willing to advise and assist, but the most effective program originates in the mind and heart of the pastor and is planned within the local situation. The training of workers is the pastor's number one administrative task. On his effectiveness in discovering, enlisting and training his workers depends the success of his total church program.

### Leadership Training

To assist pastors in this work continues to be one of the primary tasks of the conference board of education. During the past year fifty-six standard Christian Workers' Schools were held, with a total enrollment of 5,150, and 3,117 persons receiving course cards of recognition. Additional non-credit schools and classes were held. Eight Small Church Training Schools were held in the Wilmington District in co-operation with the Department of Leadership Education of the General Board of Education.

A three-day Coaching Conference for the training of Leadership School instructors was held in January with fifty in attendance. During the past year 42 persons have been certified to teach 74 courses to increase substantially our faculty of accredited instructors.

We recommend as specific ways of improving our leadership educational program the following:

(1) That the staff of the Board of Education, in co-operation with the district superintendents, work out in each district, as early in the conference year as is practical, seminars designed to assist pastors in their responsibility for developing a local church program for discovering, enlisting, and training workers;

(2) That the following regular church meetings be viewed by the pastor and other responsible persons as opportunities for training workers: the regular meetings of the Commission on Education; the regular meetings of the Workers' Conference; the age-group council meetings and departmental meetings;

(3) That each local church begin acquiring a library composed of books that will be helpful in training workers, making use of the Church Library Service of the Methodist Publishing House;

(4) That the pastor, in co-operation with the Church School Superintendent and the Commission on Education, work out a program for training workers, said program consisting of at least the following types of opportunities: at least one accredited class in each local church or charge; wholehearted participation in special courses for the rural church, when such courses are available (a limited number of these schools can be planned this year); home study courses for individuals or groups which may or may not be accredited; participation in the subdistrict institutes for church school workers; participation in one subdistrict Christian Workers' School; participation in training opportunities offered on district, conference, and jurisdictional levels.

We also recommend that, since, in a very real sense, our Leadership Education Program begins with the Church School Rally Day offering, and since any extension of this program depends upon increased receipts from this offering, an increasing emphasis be placed upon the importance of this offering and the work it accomplishes.

(1) We suggest the third Sunday in September be designated as Church School Rally Day.

(2) We further suggest that each church adopt for itself the goal of an amount equal to 1% of the pastor's salary for the cause. (If that goal is reached throughout the conference, it should net the work of leadership education approximately \$10,000.)

**REPORT ON CAMP DON-LEE, INC.**

A number of improvements have been made at Camp Don-Lee the past year at a total cost of approximately \$16,000.00, all of which have greatly enhanced the value, beauty, and program efficiency of our camp. These improvements are part of the four-year construction program begun in 1952-53 for the completion of our camp. The largest construction project was the completion of a director's or caretaker's lodge which was built and furnished at a total cost of \$13,000.00 (\$4,000.00 of which was paid out last year). A retaining wall costing \$3,000 was constructed to prevent one of the

## REPORT OF THE YOUTH EMPHASIS COMMITTEE

The Youth Emphasis Committee was set up by Bishop Garber to implement the program of youth work which is already being carried on by the Conference Board of Education. It came as a result of the current church-wide quadrennial emphasis on youth. The committee has sought to strengthen the on-going program of youth work now being carried on in the Conference and to point up the responsibility that every layman and minister must assume if we are to hold and make good Christians out of our young people.

Suggestions and projects outlined and carried out by the committee during the past year included the following: District Seminars on Youth Work for Pastors planned and held in each district; a Pilot Christian Witness Mission for Youth and Adult Workers with Youth held in Raleigh June 27-30, sponsored jointly by the Board of Education and Board of Evangelism; Conference goal of 10,000 new members for The Methodist Youth Fellowship and 3,000 new members (young people) for the Methodist Church, was set for this quadrennium; promotion of the use of the Lenten Reading Booklet, "I Believe," in each local church; development of more interest in the Conference camping and assembly activities; setting up of District Youth Emphasis Committees to study the whole district from the standpoint of the MYF and devise a plan of action to meet the youth evangelism goals and plan a Christian Witness Mission for every subdistrict; arousement of every Methodist in North Carolina Conference to the absolute necessity for constructive and vigorous action in the promotion of work among our young people.

### Plans for the Ensuing Conference Year

(1) The Youth Emphasis Committee wishes to stress that each local church continue to arouse its membership to an enthusiastic support of the Youth Emphasis.

(2) Those subdistricts that did not have Christian Witness Missions are encouraged to schedule these at an early date.

(3) We encourage each pastor and local church to follow carefully the guidance which comes to us from the Youth Department of the General Board of Education, and from our Conference Board of Education.

(4) The District Youth Emphasis Committee is encouraged to continue to carry out its work of aiding churches with weak MYF's by using Youth Emphasis teams.

(5) Great stress this ensuing year will be placed on the matter of training adult workers with youth. To this end, there will be seminars on youth work in every subdistrict for adult workers with youth during February.

(6) A special emphasis during November will emphasize youth in their families. Pastors, youth, and youth workers are encouraged to follow regular curriculum materials for further suggestions on this point.

(7) We encourage the use of the Lenten Reading Book for 1955 which stresses the church.

(8) Each local church or charge is urged to hold a Youth Christian Witness Mission during the Conference year 1954-1955.

## INTER-CONFERENCE COMMISSION ON STUDENT RELIGIOUS WORK (WESLEY FOUNDATION)

During the past year the commission suffered a great loss in the death of the chairman, Dr. W. A. Stanbury. This able and consecrated man had been associated with the commission since its beginning, and his influence will live for many years. It will not be possible to replace him, but his work with Methodist students on the several college campuses in the State of North Carolina will continue to receive stimulation from the unfading power of Dr. Stanbury's thought and labor.

Perhaps the outstanding accomplishment in the past year was the employment of a part-time State Director of Student Work. Rev. J. Robert Regan, Jr., a graduate of the Divinity School of Duke University of the class of 1952, has recently assumed his duties. He also serves as Director of Camping for the North Carolina Conference Board of Education. These two responsibilities will not conflict, and it is expected that the student work will be competently directed.

Credited Wesley Foundations continue to operate at Chapel Hill, State and Meredith Colleges in Raleigh, the Woman's College in Greensboro, and Duke University in Durham. Through the collaboration of the Woman's Society of Christian Service of the North Carolina Conference, part-time workers have served at Appalachian State Teachers College, Boone, and East Carolina College, Greenville. Small appropriations have been granted to the work at the following places: Davidson College, Davidson; Catawba College, Salisbury; and Western Carolina Teachers College, Cullowhee.

A new opportunity has opened up within recent months on the Wake Forest College campus. More than 200 Methodist students are now enrolled at Wake Forest, and through the co-operation of the Duke Foundation a worker is giving part-time service, and a Methodist Student Fellowship has been organized. When Wake Forest is moved to Winston-Salem, it is expected that a minimum of 500 Methodist students will be enrolled. This will present a challenge and an opportunity which this commission and the two Annual Conferences cannot ignore.

Because of the financial help from the two Annual Conferences of this state, plans for student buildings are being developed at Woman's College, State, and Duke. The continued support of the conference will be needed for the remaining years of the present quadrennium in order to make these buildings possible. The construction of the building at Woman's College is expected to begin at an early date. No time has been set for beginning work at the other two places. The treasurers of the building fund at the three institutions have reported to the commission regarding the handling of the building account.

Two state student conferences have been planned for the near future. The first one will be held in the First Methodist Church in Salisbury, with Catawba and Livingston co-operating, during the days of October 22-24, 1954. The second one is scheduled for a weekend in February, 1955.

One of the significant trends to which attention is called is the increased interest of college administrators and faculty in the student religious work. Without exception, the colleges are giving full support to what Methodism is now doing, and must continue to do through an ever-expanding program.

Within the next three to five years, Wesley Foundations must be established at a number of institutions where nothing has been done heretofore. We cannot afford to neglect our Methodist young people during their college years, and it is an established fact that Methodists are represented in every student body in the state.

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**BOARD OF EVANGELISM ¶1478**

Your Board of Evangelism desires to co-operate fully with the program of the General Board of Evangelism. We are aware of the ever-pressing need of promoting a full year-round program of evangelism in every local church. To the end that we may give guidance, the following areas are suggested:

**I. Church Membership**

1. Set a goal of at least 10% increase in membership in each local church during the year on profession of faith.

2. Urge all organized groups in the local church to report names of prospective members to the Commission on Membership and Evangelism.

3. In every church there should be a training class for church membership for every preparatory member, for every person received on profession of faith, and for every member not established in the Christian life and in the life of the local church. Full use should be made of the membership manuals.

4. In the program of visitation evangelism the "Four Nights with God" Mission is an organized, simultaneous program to aid the church in accomplishing her major task. The use of this program is recommended.

5. Let every local church roll be carefully studied by the Commission on Membership and Evangelism, removing names of deceased members, and members who have withdrawn, and otherwise adjusting the roll as is deemed necessary in order that conference reports may be accurate.

## II. Development of Spiritual Life

1. Every Methodist should be trained in personal religious habits, grounded on basic Christian beliefs, and prove loyal to local church in devotion, attendance, gifts, and service.

2. We recommend that every member be a devoted follower of the Lord Jesus Christ, a witnessing member with lips and life.

3. Let the promotion of the family altar be an important part of the program of each church. Let each pastor use the family altar as a theme in purposeful visitation, urging the use of The Upper Room and Bible reading.

4. Hold spiritual life and prayer retreats on district level, for ministers and laymen (ministers and laymen meeting separately).

5. Recognizing the importance of mass evangelism, we urge that there be a revival in every church.

## III. Stewardship

1. Promote the practice of Christian stewardship in working, witnessing, and worshipping, not forgetting that "The tithe is unto the Lord."

## IV. Church Attendance Crusade

1. Every church is urged to participate in the National Church Attendance Crusade, January 1 to Easter of 1955. The slogan is "God is Our Strength—Attend Church Every Week—Pray Every Day." This Attendance Crusade will be promoted by Catholic, Jewish and Protestant faiths, and by civic and secular groups.

## V. Youth Christian Witness Mission

1. Some of the districts in our conference have already sponsored this phase of visitation evangelism among our youth. We recommend that the same type program be followed again in those same districts, and that the other districts initiate this phase of evangelistic effort.

2. Every local church is urged to participate in and support the program of the Youth Christian Witness Mission as it is projected on a district or subdistrict level.

## VI. Literature

1. Your Board of Evangelism urges every church to supply all the members of the Commission on Membership and Evangelism with the revised and enlarged manual, and with subscriptions to "Shepherds" magazine, for only an informed Commission will become an effective Commission.

2. The value of The Upper Room is well known, so its use is urged in every home that it might aid in the training of the devotional life.

3. Abundant promotional and devotional materials are available from the General Board of Evangelism and from Tidings. Let every church make the greatest use of these materials.

4. A wider circulation of The North Carolina Christian Advocate and The (Chicago) Christian Advocate is strongly urged.

## VII. Report

1. It is recommended that this report be read and studied by each local Commission on Membership and Evangelism at its first meeting after this session of the Annual Conference.

## VIII. Recommendation

1. We recommend that D. J. Reid be appointed as Conference Secretary of Evangelism, to serve without salary.

**BOARD OF HOSPITALS AND HOMES****Report No. 1****PART I****Recommendations**

1. That Golden Cross be separated from Methodist Retirement Homes, Inc., thus becoming two items in the church budget.

2. That 3% of "total money raised" be apportioned to the Board of Hospitals and Homes. One-third of this money will go for Golden Cross work in the Conference and two-thirds will go to Methodist Retirement Homes, Inc.

3. That Mother's Day 1955 be used as a day of promoting and financing our Retirement Home in Durham. That all money received on this day be above the budget item, and that it go to the Retirement Home.

4. That the Board of Hospitals and Homes be authorized to appropriate a sum not to exceed \$800 for its hospital chaplaincy program at Duke for the current year 1954-55.

5. That when and if matched by the Western North Carolina Conference, \$1,500 annually be appropriated from Golden Cross funds in support of a chaplaincy program at Duke Hospital.

6. That Dr. Russell Dicks, Duke University, Durham, be re-elected as the Golden Cross Director for the North Carolina Conference, and that each District Superintendent be asked to appoint a District Golden Cross Director to work with Dr. Dicks. Also each District Superintendent should appoint a District Golden Cross Committee of three members to pass on Golden Cross applications.

**PART II****Methodist Retirement Homes, Inc.**

Work began on the Durham Retirement Home on June 1, 1954. Work is progressing satisfactorily. It is estimated that it will take 12 to 14 months from the time construction began to complete the first unit, which will house 42 members and 2 members of the staff.

**PART III****Golden Cross****Procedures and Rules Covering the Use of Golden Cross Funds**

Authority for approval for Golden Cross service shall be vested in the hands of the District Golden Cross Committees, except as provided in item 1.

1. Approvals by District Golden Cross Committees shall be based upon evidence of extreme financial need and will be limited to ward cases only. When circumstances warrant an exception, the case may be presented by the district committee to a special board committee composed of Rev. A. L. Thompson, Grace Church, Wilmington, and Mrs. D. S. Coltrane, 1611 Oberlin Road, Raleigh.

2. Appropriate forms to aid the local pastor and the district committee have been designed by the board and should be used when processing Golden Cross cases. The local pastor should complete the form entitled "Application for Golden Cross Assistance" and send it to his district committee. If the committee approves the request it should complete the "Hospital Authorization" form and send it to the appropriate hospital. The secretaries of the district committees will keep a supply of these forms on hand.

3. Initial approvals for Golden Cross service shall be limited to 14 days.

4. An additional 14 days may be granted by the district committees but only in unusual cases. In no event may more than 28 days be approved for the same person within a 6 months period.

5. It is not contemplated that Golden Cross funds will be used for any purpose other than hospitalization. Payment for drugs prosthetic appliances and other medical needs may be approved by the special committee in unusual and particularly needy cases.



6. Approvals shall not exceed \$10.00 per day for each authorized day actually spent in the hospital unless complete ward care is provided for \$14.00 per day.

7. Approvals may be for \$14.00 per day for each authorized day actually spent in the hospital if the hospital will agree to provide complete ward care at this rate.

8. The Conference Treasurer has been instructed to make all payments directly to the hospital and not to an individual. Insofar as possible, arrangements to secure Golden Cross aid should be accomplished before admission to a hospital. If this is not possible, authorizations for payment should be secured before the patient is discharged.

9. Golden Cross funds should not be called on for amounts less than \$12.00.

10. Golden Cross aid is considered a donation, but if at any time the recipient wants to repay Golden Cross, he should be encouraged to do so.

### Report No. 2

## THE METHODIST ORPHANAGE

Your Methodist Orphanage, located in Raleigh, North Carolina, is one of forty-three similar institutions owned and operated by the Methodist Church in America. These homes are constantly serving the needs of thousands of children. Since Christ looked upon the people with compassion, "As sheep not having a shepherd," surely through the medium of such homes as these the Methodist Church is rightly expressing His care for children deprived of parental love, protection, and guidance for one reason and another.

As superintendent of the Home, I express sincere appreciation for the evident accomplishments of my predecessors who have guided the progress of the Home since its establishment fifty-five years ago. The foundations have been laid well for a future of serving.

Two hundred forty-four children and young people, and a staff of thirty-one compose the orphanage family. This is practically the capacity of the home. Most of the housemothers have the maximum load of twenty-four in their cottages. These individuals on whom depends so much are on twenty-four hour duty. Too much cannot be said for their accomplishments, and the sacrificial service they render.

The basic principle in the operation of the Methodist Orphanage is that it be "child centered." Toward this end the entire staff, as well as members of the Board of Trustees, dedicate themselves. In support of this basic idea certain forward steps have been taken in recent months.

Institutional life where so many are involved necessitates a general type of discipline and control which makes the needed individual attention difficult. As a consequence the young ladies who leave the home at the time of graduation have found the transition to the outside fraught with numerous problems. Various efforts are being made to meet this need. One step in this direction is the recently granted privilege allowing nine senior girls to work at Hudson-Belk on Saturdays. Most gratifying compliments have come from the management concerning their efficiency and co-operation.

Another, and more far-reaching, step is in regard to our school operation. For many years the Orphanage School has been run on a half-day basis due to a conflicting work schedule. This limited educational opportunity made outside adjustment difficult, especially when further education was sought. The Board of Trustees met in special session on July 29 to consider this and other associated problems tangent to individual development. By unanimous vote the board decided to sell the farm and dairy, feeling that this was prerequisite to any advancement in the direction of a full day of school. We are glad to report that for the first time in the history of the home this, toward which many have worked for years, has been accomplished. It should also be mentioned that several of our older young people are now enrolled in one or two classes a day in the commercial field at Needham-Broughton High School located just across St. Mary's Street from us.

The farm management and dairymen and our boys have served the Home well in this capacity through the years. However, we lacked the facilities for pasteurizing.

Daily on the tables in the dining room our children are finding the supply equal to what they have had of homogenized-pasteurized milk. The proceeds from the sale of the farm and dairy will be invested as endowment.

We urge you to visit us whenever you can.

Report No. 3

METHODIST RETIREMENT, HOMES, INC.

The conference year 1953-54 has been a memorable one because during that time we have seen the first definite steps taken to provide a home for the aged of our Conference.

We think it would be well to pause and review briefly the steps that have been taken since 1945 to make this happy hour possible.

The Journal of Proceedings of the 1945 session states: "After a year of exploratory work conducted jointly by the board and its executive secretary, and with counsel from Dr. Carl Meister, the executive secretary of the General Board of Hospitals and Homes, your Board of Hospitals and Homes recommends: 1. That the N. C. Annual Conference proceed in its program to inaugurate a system of retirement homes. 2. That this Conference authorize the incorporation of the board of Methodist Retirement Homes."

The charter was granted by the Secretary of State on January 24, 1946.

The 1946 Journal of Proceedings reveals that there was still a determined effort on the part of some to build district homes in preference to a central home.

Th 1947 Journal of Proceedings records, however, that the Conference accepted a tract of land situated in the City of Durham within a half mile of Duke University, which had largely been made possible by the untiring efforts of Rev. W. V. McRae, Rev. Millard C. Dunn, and Mr. Marvin Fowler, all of Durham.

The 1947 Journal of Proceedings also records that the Commission on World Service and Finance recommended to the Conference that a home be erected on said land, the financial obligations of the Conference not to exceed \$100,000.00.

Th 1948 Journal of Proceedings records that the Commission on World Service and Finance recommended that each charge raise an amount equal to one-fourth of the amount of the orphanage apportionment on a strictly voluntary basis.

The 1949 Journal reveals that a definite step was taken for the first time by the Conference to build a central home for the aged. The report reads as follows: We recommend the apportionment to each charge of 2% of the total money raised as indicated in Paragraph 1, or an amount equal to two-sevenths of the amount of the orphanage apportionment, to be remitted to the conference treasurer. The total proceeds of this apportionment to be divided equally and paid to the treasurers of the Golden Cross Fund and the Methodist Retirement Homes, Inc., for the central home for the aged in Durham."

The financial report as recorded in the 1949 Journal showed a balance of \$12,957.02, a large percentage of which was allocated to the several districts to be used in building district retirement homes.

The 1950 Journal of Proceedings reveals that the Commission on World Service and Finance recommended to the Conference the continuation of the 2% apportionment to be divided equally between the Golden Cross and Retirement Homes.

The financial report showed that the Retirement Homes had a balance of \$14,233.64, a gain of \$1,281.62 for the year.

The dawning of a new day for the Retirement Homes' program was ushered in when the 1951 report of the Commission on World Service and Finance recommended a 3% apportionment of the orphanage assessment to be given to Hospitals and Homes, with 2% going to Retirement Homes and 1% to Golden Cross.

The financial report as recorded in the 1951 Journal showed a balance of \$23,260.58, with \$16,084.44 of this amount received from the Conference during the year.

With this new impetus the directors of the Methodist Retirement Homes took on new life during the Conference Year 1951-52 and determined definitely that a central home would be built in Durham, and that with the approximately \$25,000.00 the board would receive from the Conference collection during the year it was felt that it was time to request the Bishop to appoint an executive director who might devote his full time to soliciting contributions from individuals and corporations and, at the same time, assist in working out the many details involved in getting plans ready for the building of our first unit of the Conference Home for the Aged.

The 1952 Journal of Proceedings showed that the Retirement Homes had a balance of \$46,895.05, with \$22,576.31 having been received from the Conference. The report, also, showed that the Commission on World Service and Finance reduced the apportionment from 3% to 2¼%, to be divided one-third Golden Cross and two-thirds Retirement Homes.

Upon the recommendation of the board of directors of the Methodist Retirement Homes, Inc., Bishop Garber appointed Dr. H. I. Glass as executive director of the Methodist Retirement Homes, Inc., to carry out the recommendations of the board of directors.

This was the most forward step yet taken by the Conference and the board of directors toward the fulfillment of the dream of only a few men back in 1945 who conceived the idea of a central retirement home to be built near Duke University and Duke University Hospital.

It should be recorded in the minutes of the Methodist Retirement Homes' board and the Journal of Proceedings of the N. C. Conference the three men who up to this hour have contributed more than others towards keeping the light burning when indecision and doubt were in the hearts of the great majority of the members of the Conference.

We now again wish to record the names of Rev. W. V. McRae, Rev. Millard C. Dunn, and Mr. Marvin Fowler for the contribution which they have made towards the fulfillment of this dream; and, also, the names of Rev. O. W. Dowd and Mr. L. L. Wren who never lost an opportunity to do all they could to keep alive the need for a retirement home for the aged.

There are others, no doubt, who deserve mention in this report but space will not permit.

The proceedings of the 1953 Conference are fresh in our minds and we know that the highlight was the groundbreaking ceremony held on October 30, 1953, with the dedication led by Bishop Garber.

The 1953 Journal showed a balance of \$55,376.95, after the purchase of additional land in order to straighten out our line and to protect us from future encroachment by undesirable elements that might later have purchased the property.

Your directors of Retirement Homes voted to give the necessary land to build a new Methodist Church in a section that has been greatly neglected even though it has a sufficient population to support a new church.

To October 1, 1954, of the Conference year there has been received \$29,585.30 in contributions from individuals, churches and corporations and we have many encouraging reports about additional contributions which we hope to obtain in the near future. This, with the \$34,843.10 received from the Conference during the year, now gives us a total of cash and securities received of \$64,428.40.

The contract for the construction of the first unit was awarded in May, 1954, and the building is now well under construction with a completion date of June 1, 1955.

The first unit will cost approximately \$350,000.00 and will provide adequate space in the dining room, living rooms, recreational rooms and other necessary facilities to accommodate approximately 100 or more guests. There will be 42 individual guest rooms in this first unit.

It is the sincere desire of your directors that contributions will be received in such amounts as to enable the board to continue building until room has been provided for not less than 100 guests, the total number needed to enable the home to operate efficiently and satisfactorily.

We are petitioning the Commission on World Service and Finance to restore the apportionment to 3%, allowing 2% for the Retirement Homes and 1% for Golden Cross for the Conference Year 1954-55.

We are, likewise, requesting that the Mother's Day offering be set aside entirely for the Retirement Homes' program, and we are earnestly soliciting the support of all the ministers in presenting this to their respective congregations so that the offering will be large enough to enable us to continue our building program.

The struggle has been a long, hard one and at times seemed impossible, but through prayer and perseverance a great victory has been achieved. With the completion of the first unit of the home in 1955, the North Carolina Conference, with its wonderful orphanage facilities, the aid it is giving to worthy Methodists through the Golden Cross, and the Retirement Homes for the aged, will be able to take its place in the first ranks of any Conference in America.

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## BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

### Report No. 1

The Board of Lay Activities reports a great interest in lay work during the Conference year. Laymen and preachers have rallied to the cause in very heartening numbers and with gratifying zeal.

The annual laymen's retreat was held at Louisburg College in June with the largest and most enthusiastic attendance in the history of this event. Bishop Garber deserves and hereby receives the thanks of the board for his co-operation in making a success of the retreat. Men who have been attending report that this year was one of the most fruitful.

Earlier in the year, your board assisted in the conference-wide effort to enlist effective support of the Ten Dollar Club. Many laymen attended the district meetings and came to know and appreciate Walter Anderson, T. A. Collins, and Bishop Garber as they never had before. This area of church extension will continue to receive the hearty support of the board.

As the result of plans made much earlier, a series of meetings was held in February—one in each district—at which the board was fortunate in having J. P. Stafford to explain to and inspire laymen about Methodist Men's Clubs. Chartering of new clubs has taken a great move forward in the North Carolina Conference since February. We are happy to report, as of October 1, 1954, that there are 125 Methodist Men's Clubs chartered in this Conference, against a goal of 156 clubs desired by 1956. We especially commend the Wilmington and Fayetteville Districts for their splendid work in this field.

The climax for this year of the work with the Methodist Men's Clubs came when about forty men from this Conference, and from every district, attended the first National Convocation of Methodist Men held at Purdue University in July.

Sheer numbers—either of clubs, or men, or any other unit, can and does mean nothing in and of itself. But behind these figures of growth and enlarged participation in the work of our church are laymen whose zeal and enthusiasm have increased, and whose horizons of possibilities for truly effective Christian living have been widened.

Your board now is engaged in making plans for meetings in every district during the last two weeks of February to generate enthusiasm and support for the stewardship program, which is scheduled to have major emphasis in this year. We request the assistance of all pastors and district superintendents while pledging, on our part, full co-operation with the other boards and agencies of the church working in this important area. Special attention is being given to the matter of lay speaking, and of having laymen certified as lay speakers, in preparation for the five Sundays before Easter, when it is hoped that no preaching place in the North Carolina Conference will be without a service.

## BOARD OF MINISTERIAL TRAINING AND QUALIFICATIONS

## Report No. 1

## Recommendations

The Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications of the North Carolina Annual Conference offers to the conference for study, looking toward its eventual adoption, the permissive rule of the church, paragraph 322 of the 1952 Discipline, as follows: we "designate a Bachelor of Divinity Degree, or its equivalent, from a school of theology accredited by the University Senate, as the minimum educational requirement for admission" on trial into the North Carolina Annual Conference.

We believe that it is time for our Conference to take this action for the following reasons:

(1) We earnestly believe that this action will over the years raise the quality and standard performance of the ministry in the Conference.

(2) We are fortunate in that the Divinity School of Duke University is located within the boundary of our Conference. The availability, therefore, of ministerial training, together with unusual financial assistance for students of that institution, makes it comparatively easy for the average person to work toward a B. D. degree. We recognize the contribution of the work done by the Divinity School in our midst and, therefore, we believe we ought to encourage all candidates for admission into the North Carolina Conference to avail themselves of opportunity for longer usefulness through suitable preparation.

(3) Since our Conference has one of the highest retirement annuities and one of the lowest admission standards, it may result in drawing questionable personnel, indifferently qualified, from every region. The North Carolina Conference seems to be acquiring the reputation of being one of the most advantageous and, at the same time, one of the least difficult Conferences to enter.

(4) Since 1952, 59 men were received into the Annual Conferences of Methodism under the three-fourths rule of paragraph 323.

(5) We recognize that this action in no way abrogates paragraph 323, providing that under special conditions the Annual Conference may by three-fourths vote admit a candidate. It is our considered judgment that the proposed action, if enacted by the Conference, would strengthen said paragraph 323, and prevent any abuse or misuse of it.

(6) In this day of wide general education and increasing specialization among the professions, the Christian minister ought not to suffer by comparison with those whom he serves as pastor, in training and professional competency.

(7) The In-Service Department of the Board of Ministerial Training of the General Board of Education encourages all Conferences to adopt the B.D. degree as the minimum standard for admission. This proposed legislation looks forward to the time when the minimum requirement of the B.D. degree will be adopted by all of our Conferences. We feel that it is time for us to join the ranks of those Conferences who have already adopted this forward looking legislation.

(8) We note that 39 of our Annual Conferences have adopted the B.D. degree as a minimum requirement for admission on trial. We feel that the standards for the ministry of our Conference ought to be equal to those of our neighboring conferences. This is particularly true if we are to recruit for our future Conference membership men of superior gifts and preparation who may, otherwise, be drawn elsewhere.

## BOARD OF MISSIONS AND CHURCH EXTENSION

## Report No. 1

1. The Board of Missions and Church Extension of the North Carolina Conference has had during the past year one of the busiest and most successful years of its entire history.

2. Our Conference Missionary Program has gone forward in a very satisfactory manner under the able direction of the Rev. M. W. Lawrence as Missionary Secretary. Brother Lawrence was reluctant in assuming this responsibility, but upon the insistence of the board, he accepted it and has put himself into the work in a remarkable way. The results have been outstanding, and speak for themselves. We recommend Brother Lawrence for re-appointment to the position of Conference Missionary Secretary, and call on our ministers and laymen to give him their local support. We commend the district missionary secretaries for their fine work in promoting the program of missions in their districts.

3. In the light of present living costs, your Board of Missions recommends that the Minimum Salary Scale be increased \$200 in each category, or: single man, \$2,800; married man, \$3,000; married man with children, \$3,200. Your Board of Missions, which administers the Minimum Salary Fund, is able to meet this increase by reason of the fact that many charges are assuming full support of their pastors, thereby relieving the board in this matter. We wish to commend these charges for their progressiveness, and trust others will follow their example.

4. We recommend that each church conduct a Mission Study Course, using the Mission Study Book, "Crowded Ways," and inspiring their people in their missionary zeal. We all agree that our missionary activity affords one of the finest possible expressions of our genuine concern in spreading the kingdom of righteousness throughout the world.

5. It is encouraging to note the number of churches which have accepted a Mission Special, over and above their regular world service giving. We urge more of our churches to take a mission special, even if it is a small one. To have some definite project that we support through a mission special will kindle the missionary interest of our people.

6. At the Annual Conference last year, this board recommended the appointment of an executive secretary of the board to work toward the establishment of new churches and the promotion of the Ten Dollar Club. The Rev. Thomas A. Collins was appointed to that position, and has rendered a splendid service in this connection. Working with him in camp activities, the promotion of the Jacksonville Christmas offering, the Ten Dollar Club, and new church projects and evangelism has been Mr. Walter F. Anderson, who has rendered invaluable service. His fine Christian spirit has been contagious and our Conference has profited beyond expression by his consecration. We heartily recommend the reappointment of these two brethren to these important places of leadership, and bespeak for them the full co-operation of all of our ministers and laymen.

7. It was suggested in our report last year that we work toward securing a minimum of thirty-five hundred members of the Ten Dollar Club. We are happy to report that we have exceeded this goal and now have forty-seven hundred members. Those who are members of the Ten Dollar Club have been thrilled with the experience of being a part of such a worthy cause which is helping to establish new churches within our Conference. We hereby express our thanks to Bishop Paul N. Garber for his leadership in getting this club started in the beginning of the year. It is our recommendation that during the coming Conference year we endeavor to increase the membership of this club to seventy-five hundred. It can be done and it should be done. We recommend that the fourth Sunday in January, 1955, be observed in each church as Church Extension Day, and that on that day we present the Ten Dollar Club and secure new members.

8. We are glad to report the organization, chartering, or construction of new churches in eleven areas: Spring Lake, Fayetteville; Coats; Raeford Road, Fayetteville; Riverside, Elizabeth City; Trinity, New Bern; Saint Marks, Kinston; Epworth and Saint John, Durham; Fairview, Hamlet; Ridgewood, Raleigh, and Southern Pines. In response

to the two calls made by the Ten Dollar Club, we have received in excess of \$80,000.00. There are still many places where we need a church, and it is our hope that existing churches near these points will become the "Mother Church," or sponsor for these new organizations. We commend those pastors and laymen who have supported the organization of new churches within their territories.

9. Realizing the need for more churches in the rural areas as well as in the urban communities, we have secured the help of the General Board in making an extensive conference-wide survey. This survey will be made in co-operation with the Long Range Planning Committee, the Town and Country Commission, and other interested agencies. We recommend that those who plan to build churches secure and follow competent architectural advice.

10. The Board of Missions is called upon each year to make loans to local churches for repairs, new construction, and other improvements on the local church property. Funds to do this are never adequate, and to help in the most urgent causes, we recommend that the Conference establish in the Board of Missions the "Laymen's Loan Fund." This would be a fund in which laymen would place \$100 or more each year, and the money would then be loaned to local churches for a period of not more than five years, and the local church would pay the Board of Missions in full the loan with interest at the rate of four percent from the beginning of the loan until the loan is paid in full. The laymen who put their money into this project can get same back at any time they desire by giving the Board of Missions thirty days' notice of the withdrawal. The money would always remain the property of the layman who deposited it, and in this manner used to help extend the Kingdom of Christ, and His Church. This would become another way in which the laymen would become a partner with God in helping to carry on the great program of the Methodist Church in the North Carolina Conference.

11. The Woman's Society of Christian Service is one of the strongest missionary influences in the Methodist Church. We congratulate our Conference Society on its splendid achievements, and bespeak for them the full co-operation of our ministers. We recommend that a society be organized in each church, and call upon our women to support it by becoming members. We are glad to note that the Conference Society has had an increase in members and finances during the past year.

12. We urge all pastors to have an active Commission on Missions in the local church, to disseminate missionary information and encourage participation in the program. We call attention to the fact that the Conference Calendar designates the week of January 10, 1955, as the "School of Missions Week," when we should study definitely the cause of missions.

13. We would also emphasize the great need for young people who are willing to volunteer for service in the mission fields. Pastors and W.S.C.S. societies should be on the alert for such young people, and seek to give them such encouragement and assistance as is necessary.

14. Our board is well pleased with the work of the European Caravan. The board launched this project five years ago, and it has rendered fine service. We feel it has been a wise investment, and the results obtained more than justify the expenditure. Reverend J. E. Garlington served as counselor during the past summer.

15. We recommend that the Commission on World Service and Finance provide this board with the sum of \$18,000 to be used for operating and promotion expenses for the Conference year 1954-55.

16. We recommend that the percentage for the item of Church Extension be increased from the present  $2\frac{1}{4}$  to 3 percent of the total money raised, the amount of increase to be used for operational and promotional expenses of the board for the year 1955-56.

17. We recommend that the Minimum Salary percentage be increased from 4 to  $4\frac{1}{2}$  percent of the total money raised, and that the Minimum Salary scale for the year 1955-1956 be set at \$3,000 for single ministers, \$3,300 for married ministers without children, and \$3,600 for married ministers with children. This goal is in keeping with the vote of the Conference at the beginning of the quadrennium.

18. We recommend that the months of January and February, 1955, be set aside as Good Literature months, and that special emphasis be placed on securing a larger

subscription list to our North Carolina Christian Advocate and the World Outlook. It is generally agreed by those who are in a position to know that our North Carolina Advocate is one of the very best published anywhere in Methodism. This being true, we should endeavor to place it in EVERY home if possible. It will prove to be of great assistance to the pastor in promoting the entire program of the church, and it will enlighten and inspire our people to a greater religious zeal. It will be money well spent by the church or by the individual.

19. We recommend and emphasize the Duke Divinity School Foreign Student Fund as an approved N. C. Conference Special this year. It will be a major contribution to the peace of the world to bring students from other nations to America to study in our Divinity School.

20. We recommend Rev. T. M. Vick and Rev. J. W. Lineberger to succeed themselves as members of the Board of Managers of the North Carolina Pastors' School.

21. A list of the appropriations and a copy of the treasurer's report are attached hereto.

### Report No. 2

## PRINCIPLES GOVERNING THE USE OF FUNDS TO BE ADMINISTERED BY THE BOARD OF MISSIONS AND CHURCH EXTENSION

The North Carolina Conference Church Extension and Minimum Ministerial Support Programs have grown to be an immense business. The administration of funds and business details involves many hours and the conscientious concern of the Board of Missions and Church Extension of the Conference. As a means of saving funds, much of the tedious detail work is assigned to the executive committees of the two sections of the Conference Board.

The Annual Conference assigns the task of administering the Church Extension and Minimum Ministerial Support to the Conference Board. To discharge its duties adequately and with equity, the board has developed through practice and evaluation some principles which enable the board to do the work for the Conference in such a way that the new projects are stabilized and encouraged, struggling charges are stimulated and enabled to improve their condition, and charges which need to be divided are helped to make the adjustments which will enable each part of the division to move forward toward self-support.

The board recognizes the principle that, with the aid of the district superintendents, it should so administer its affairs that each charge shall move as rapidly as possible to full self-support.

To enable the Conference board and the district superintendents to carry on their co-operative efforts in understanding, harmony, and for the greatest good for all concerned the following principles and procedures are set forth:

### Aid to Charges

1. All requests for mission aid for charges, whether for aid on pastor's salary, aid in building church, church school building, or parsonage, shall be presented to the Conference Board Secretary by the district superintendent before September 1st of each Conference year. Requests submitted later will not give the board sufficient time to make the needed study and adjustments. Therefore, requests submitted later than September First will not be considered.

2. Mission Aid and Minimum Salary Aid provided by the Conference through the Board of Missions shall not be used to raise the salary above the minimum set by the Conference, except in the establishment of new church extension projects.

3. The marital or family status of the pastor at the time of assignment to the charge shall govern the amount paid the minister for the entire Conference year.

4. Mission funds or Minimum Salary funds shall not be used to increase a retired minister's total income beyond \$3,800. By total income is meant retirement annuity, the salary paid by the charge and mission of minimum salary allowances.

5. Owing to the pressure upon Mission and Minimum Salary funds, we emphasize the necessity of staying within the minimum salary when requesting funds for ministerial support.

6. In considering the salary for a charge, we call attention to the fact that the Board of Missions must count both salary, travel and expenses as salary in making appropriations to charges.

#### Dividing Charges

7. The Conference Board of Missions and the Cabinet, in considering aid when a charge is to be divided, are bound by the action of the Annual Conference in session at Burlington, North Carolina, October, 1952, as recorded in the Conference Journal, pages 148 and 149.

8. When the division of a charge is considered necessary and minimum salary or mission aid is to be requested for either of the new charges resulting from such division, such project shall be presented to the secretary of the board on or before September 1st so that a thorough study of the proposed division can be made. This study shall be made in co-operation with the district superintendent, the Conference Board of Missions and Church Extension, and a representative from each of the proposed new charges, and without such study the board shall not be obligated to provide aid for either of the charges resulting from such division.

9. The board will not approve the division of a charge except and unless each new charge resulting from the division shall provide 80% of the minimum salary and World Service and benevolences in proportion to the established ratio with the pastor's salary.

#### To Avoid Crippling Charges

10. In the division of circuits where one church seeks to become a station, the Board of Missions looks with disfavor upon such division unless the station established can care for its salary and its proportionate share of world service and benevolences, and that the remainder of the charge can be provided with ministerial leadership and adjusted and arranged so that it has opportunity to grow to self-support.

#### Reduction of Aid

11. The board further requires that each charge which has received or shall hereafter receive sustentation or Mission Aid shall have this aid reduced by 25% each year until the charge has accepted full self-support. The district superintendents are to inform all charges receiving or to receive in the future of this regulation. The requirement must be kept in mind in preparing for the 1954 Annual Conference.

#### A New Church as a Charge

12. When a new church is to be established and become a new charge, the district superintendent shall present for study the complete details of the proposed project on or before September 1st. These details shall be presented to the General Board of Missions and to the Conference Board of Missions and to the Conference Board of Missions and Church Extension. Both boards shall carefully evaluate the project and, if it seems a worthy and timely project, the boards shall see that an adequate salary and living quarters are provided for the minister, and the essential steps taken to help provide a place of meeting and worship. It shall be understood that each year the new charge shall accept more of the budget until it becomes self-supporting.

#### Student Pastor Aid

13. The following was set up as a basis for aiding students when they are assigned charges where mission aid or sustentation is required. Mission aid or sustentation can be used to provide a salary of \$1,800 for a single minister, and for a married student, \$2,000. A \$100 allowance will be granted for one child in the family and \$200 for more than one child. In addition, there is to be a travel allowance as follows: When charge is within 25 miles of the school, \$100.00; when charge is beyond 25 miles and within 50 miles of school, \$200.00; when charge is beyond 50 miles and within 75 miles of school, \$300.00; when charge is beyond 75 miles and within 100

miles of school, \$400.00; when charge is beyond 100 miles of the school, \$500.00.

Amend Paragraph 13 of the report on Principles Covering the Use of Travel by the addition to the following:

An approved supply pastor who is serving an appointment, who has less than two years' college work to his credit, and who wishes to continue his education, shall be considered a special case. Each case will be handled on its merits. The district superintendents shall present these special cases to the Board of Missions. When these cases have been approved by the board, sustentation aid may be granted, not to exceed the regular minimum salary scale rather than according to the student pastor's scale. After December 31, 1954, these special cases shall be presented to the Board of Missions by the district superintendents in ample time for action before the students matriculate in school.

#### All Applications for Aid

14. In making application for aid, each charge shall report accurately all amounts paid by the charge or by individuals of the charge such as salary, travel expenses, or bonuses. Failure to so report shall be considered sufficient cause to reject the application or discontinue payments if such failure is discovered after approval of application.

These provisions are herein set forth to aid the district superintendents and the Conference Board of Missions and Church Extension in making adequate distribution of funds, to stimulate and encourage charges to give needed help to ministers assigned to opportunity charges, and to enlist churches and pastors in sharing in the obligation to care for our rapidly growing population.

#### JESSE MARVIN ORMOND

In the passing of Dr. Jesse Marvin Ormond the Board of Missions suffered a distinct loss. Although he had been inactive for several years because of failing health, yet he maintained a keen interest in the work of the board to the last. His heart always rejoiced at any progress made in the advancement of the kingdom through the Board of Missions, for he had given many years of devoted service to its work.

Dr. Ormond served for a number of years as secretary of the Board of Missions, and always kept accurate and neat records of its work. When Methodism became united in 1939 and the Board of Missions and Church Extension came into being as successor of the two separate boards, Dr. Ormond was elected as president of the Board of Missions, and remained in that office until after his retirement from the active ministry of teaching. He retired from the Board of Missions at the conference in Greenville in 1948.

Because of his work on the Board of Missions and his connection with the administration of the Duke Endowment funds for work in the rural churches, Dr. Ormond was recommended by the Conference Board for membership on the General Board of Missions, and was elected to such membership, where he served with distinction and very great usefulness for several years until he retired in 1948.

In the person of Brother Ormond one always found a warm, genial spirit, with a vital interest in whatever served to extend the kingdom of God on earth. In the pastorate, as a teacher and counselor, in the work of the Board of Missions, and everywhere he served he demonstrated a constant concern and loyal support of God's advancing kingdom. He held the respect of all who were associated with him in this cause, and he always tried to conduct the affairs of the board in a fair and impartial manner. His home-going leaves a vacancy in our ranks here, but we rejoice that he can take his place among the faithful who have labored long and well for the cause of righteous. We shall continue to cherish his memory and be inspired by his example.

### BOARD OF TEMPERANCE

The Methodist Church has ever opposed alcoholic beverages; and the North Carolina Methodist Conference, in session in Raleigh, North Carolina, on this October 29, 1954, reaffirms its opposition to the manufacture, sale, and use of beer, wine, whiskey, and all other intoxicating beverages.

This Conference deplors the tragic fact that since the repeal of national prohibition in 1933, and particularly since the legalization of liquor in certain areas in North Carolina in 1935, there has been a continuing increase in the sale of alcoholic beverages and there has been a continuing increase in drinking, drunkenness, and the evils that are caused by liquor.

This Conference calls upon Methodists and all other persons to abstain completely from the use of liquor; it calls upon the voters of North Carolina to elect to the General Assembly persons who will vote against liquor, and to elect as law enforcement officers persons who will enforce the laws against liquor.

Though we believe strongly in the value of education and salvation in promoting sobriety and righteousness, we appreciate the need and value of appropriate legislation in our efforts to combat the evils of the liquor traffic. Consequently, this Conference urges the 1955 General Assembly of North Carolina to enact the following legislation.

1. Since the citizens of our state voted overwhelmingly against liquor in 1908 and also in 1933, and since, therefore, legalization of liquor sales in state was enacted contrary to the expressed will of our people, we urge the 1955 General Assembly to enact a statute to prohibit the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors throughout North Carolina; and, if the General Assembly be in doubt with respect to the wishes of the citizens of this state, we urge the 1955 General Assembly to enact a statute providing for a state-wide referendum on the issue of the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors in this state.

2. Since the purpose of advertising any merchandise is to increase its sale and use, we urge the 1955 General Assembly to enact a statute to prohibit the advertisement of all alcoholic beverages in newspapers or other publications published in North Carolina, and to prohibit such advertisements on billboards on the highways and in all other places in our state.

3. Since a large majority of the counties in our state have demonstrated their opposition to the sale of intoxicating liquors, the 1955 General Assembly is urged to repeal the "gallon law" that legalizes and permits the shipment and transportation of whiskey to the extent of one gallon into dry counties. As a simple matter of common decency and fair government, neither the State of North Carolina nor the United States Government should permit whiskey to be shipped or otherwise transported into counties in which the legal sale of intoxicants is not permitted.

4. As a means of improving instruction regarding the evils of alcoholic beverages, the 1955 General Assembly is urged to appropriate for the State Department of Public Instruction ample funds to provide for the employment of one or more competent persons to supervise effective instruction in the public schools of the state regarding the evils of alcoholic beverages.

5. Since motor vehicle accidents on our highways are increasing to alarming proportions and since a large percent of these highway accidents are caused by liquor drinking, the General Assembly is urged to enact drastic legislation against drunken driving. If a statute were enacted requiring the imposition of a substantial prison sentence on every defendant found guilty of drunken driving, the enforcement of such legislation would decrease and almost stop completely this evil that is causing slaughter and death on our highways.

In addition to work along legislative lines, this Conference urges an intensive educational program. The liquor interests are spending many millions of dollars in glamorous advertisements and other propaganda to create false impressions in the minds of our people. We must explode the foolish falsehoods that beer and other liquors add zest to life, that social drinking is helpful in business, that cocktails give social prestige, and that drinking is a mark of distinction. All of these claims of the liquor interests are ridiculous falsehoods; and we must cause our people to know that the effects and results of drinking are entirely opposite from the assertions of the liquor advertisements. This program of education must be conducted in our homes, in our Sunday Schools and pulpits, in our public schools, in newspaper and magazine messages, in radio programs, and through all other means of instruction. And, as a part of our educational program, we urge that an Alcohol Workshop be conducted in each district under the direction and supervision of the District Secretary of Temperance, and with the support of our Conference Board of Temperance and all other interested agencies and persons.

While we should continue and increase our work against liquor along legislative lines and also along educational lines, we urge increased efforts along evangelistic lines. All pastors are urged to preach often against the evils of intoxicating liquors and to call upon the members of their respective churches to abstain completely from the use of alcoholic beverages and to use their influence and their votes against the liquor traffic. We should have laws against liquor and enforce these laws. We should educate our people regarding the hurtful effects of liquor. But legislation and education will not suffice. We must have salvation. We must influence our people to accept Jesus Christ as their Saviour. A person who is Christ-centered and Christ-controlled will not drink liquor; he will not impair God-given mind and body by drinking liquor.

We urge the district superintendents to support alcohol workshops in their respective districts; and when they arrange their annual program for their district conferences, we urge that they allow time for the District Secretary of Temperance to have this cause effectively presented.

This Conference calls upon pastors and all local churches to give effective and full support to the project of the General Board known as Commitment Day; and Reverend George W. Blount is hereby designated as Conference Director of the Commitment Day Project.

This Conference reiterates its endorsement of the work of the Women's Christian Temperance Union against the manufacture and sale of alcoholic beverages and appeals to all of our pastors and other members to support fully the work of this organization.

This Conference reaffirms its endorsement of the Allied Church League, that has been organized by the churches in North Carolina for the purpose of combatting the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors; and we urge all pastors and other members to give full co-operation and support to the program and work of the Allied Church League.

The successes which have attended the activities of the Alcoholics Anonymous are too convincing to be unappreciated and unrecognized. Underlying their entire program is a very profound spiritual theme. The primary purpose of Alcoholics Anonymous is to help the alcoholic achieve and maintain sobriety. They work on the princi-

ple that recovered alcoholics can reach and assist chronic drinkers seeking help as no one else can. We need to become better informed on those points where they can speak out of a suffering which many of us have never known. Therefore, this Conference recommends that our pastors and our churches co-operate with Alcoholic Anonymous.

One of the distressing factors in the present liquor situation is the growing tendency of our people to acquiesce in the mistaken idea of so-called moderation in drinking. Many splendid persons, even many members of our churches, have become inclined to accept and acquiesce in this so-called moderation idea. This dangerous and mistaken idea is being promoted not only by many persons who desire to justify their drinking, but by many sincere persons who are being misled by certain schools that are engaged in the so-called scientific approach to the alcoholic problems. While we commend all intelligent and sincere efforts along educational lines to solve these problems, we regret that many of the so-called scientific approaches and studies are not helpful in the advancement of Christian ideals with respect to alcoholic problems. And this Conference reaffirms its belief in total abstinence and specifically declares its disapproval of and opposition to the so-called moderation idea in the use of alcoholic beverages. And, in connection with this moderation idea that is spreading in our land, we urge that official leadership in our Sunday Schools and our churches be entrusted to total abstainers, who do not give their influence or their votes in support of the liquor traffic. And, in dealing with this problem of moderation as it relates to official leadership in our churches, we desire to impress our pastors with their responsibilities, as prescribed in Section 207 of the Discipline of the Methodist Church. With respect to the selection of members of the official board of the local church, our Discipline provides, "All lay members of the board shall be members of the local Methodist Church, and, in nominating and electing persons to such membership, the utmost care shall be taken that only morally disciplined persons shall be nominated, with special reference to total abstainers from alcoholic beverages." Thus it is observed that the Discipline of the Methodist Church specifies total abstinence as one of the qualifications for membership on the official board; and this Conference urges that this provision of the Discipline of our church be observed by our pastors.

— Today there are many things that are destroying the influence and threatening the life of our church; and the liquor traffic is one of the forces that is helping to destroy everything for which our church stands. The liquor traffic would destroy the church, if it could; the church could destroy the liquor traffic, if it would. Hence, every person who is interested in the church should use his influence, his means and his vote against the liquor traffic. This Conference appeals to all pastors and all church members that they increase and make more effective their opposition to this nefarious business. As individuals, we Methodists should abstain absolutely from the use of alcoholic beverages. As members of society, we should vote and work to outlaw the liquor traffic. The attitude and the practice of individuals should be total abstinence. The attitude and policy of government should be absolute prohibition. And, to the achievement of total abstinence and absolute prohibition, we appeal to all Methodists and all other citizens in our country.

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## COMMISSION ON TOWN AND COUNTRY WORK

### Report No. 1

#### I. Supply Pastors

1. A booklet has been written by Rev. E. C. Crawford entitled "The Status of the Supply Pastor and His Treatment in the North Carolina Conference."
2. The commission sent three supply pastors to the Southeastern Jurisdiction Supply Pastors' Convocation at Lake Junaluska.
3. We urged the supply pastors who are eligible to become members of the Conference.

## II. Rural Sociology

1. Our Committee on Rural Sociology, Rev. R. E. Walston and Rev. Graham Nickens, has completed an intensive survey regarding the economic, population, and social trends of some of the most strategic areas of our Conference. The result of this study has been published under the title of "Frontier Again."

## III. Church Extension

The commission shared in a joint meeting on April 1, 1954, with the Conference Board of Missions and Church Extension and the Cabinet, at which time our chairman, Rev. Key Taylor, presented an address regarding the needs in the field of rural church extension.

## IV. Minimum Salary

The commission co-operated with other Conference agencies to get the minimum salary raised \$200.00 in each category for the coming Conference year.

## V. Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference on Town and Country Work

We sent our Associate Secretary, Rev. Ralph Epps, to the Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference on Town and Country Work. Others attending were Rev. C. M. Mitchell, Rev. C. W. Goldston, Rev. F. S. Love, Rev. and Mrs. Heywood Harrell, and Mrs. J. H. Cutchin.

## VI. Observance of Special Days

1. **Rural Life Sunday:** We urged the proper observance of Rural Life Sunday as near the date recommended as possible, and by as many churches as possible.

(Note: The following paragraph is included at the request of the commission chairman.)

Rural Life Sunday was observed in the Roseland Church, Aberdeen Charge, of which the Commission Secretary is pastor, on May 23, by having a service of dedication of the soil, the seeds, plants and sowers. Besides the editor of the North Carolina Christian Advocate, the Moore County Farm Agent, his two assistants (one of which was a poultry specialist and the other a 4-H Club leader), the Home Demonstration Agent, and the County Soil Conservationist, all made brief talks regarding their respective phases of work. The church was appropriately decorated with miniature farm machinery and equipment. Shocks of rye and green hills of corn were in the flower vases. Immediately in front of the altar was a two-horse turn plow, back of the wing were standing a hoe, rake and shovel. In front of the plow was placed a bale of hay. Seeds, plants and soil were brought from the various farms and placed on the altar table as a symbol of the dedication of the farms and crops. To show the close relationship of the farms and the church, the soil was thoroughly mixed, and at the close of the service it was scattered on the church lawn by the farmers who brought it and the county agents present. The benediction was given by the Sunday School superintendent, who is also a member of the Moore County Production Marketing Association.

2. **Harvest Day:** We urged all rural churches to have proper observance of this with a spiritual emphasis rather than a financial one.

## VII. Louisburg College

1. We have given our influence to making Louisburg College more effective in its ministry to our rural people.

2. We co-operated with other Conference agencies in establishing a chair of Town and Country Work at Louisburg College, for which Reverend C. Wade Goldston has been selected the first professor.

3. The commission met at Louisburg College Sept. 9 in order to better acquaint the members of the commission with the set-up there.

## VIII. The Town and Country Church Development Program

1. The commission sent information to every district superintendent and every rural preacher in the North Carolina Conference, and urged full participation by the rural ministers.

2. Churches participating according to the office at Emory are as follows: (a) Broadway Church, Broadway Charge, C. J. Tilley, pastor; (b) Morris Chapel, Broadway Charge, C. J. Tilley, pastor; (c) Mt. Pleasant Church, Mt. Pleasant Charge, T. H. House, pastor; (d) Woodington Church, Woodington-Webbs Charge, Walton N. Bass, Sr., pastor; (e) Roseland Church, Aberdeen Charge, W. A. Tew, pastor.

3. We urge a conference-wide participation of rural ministers this coming Conference year.

## IX. The J. M. Ormond Fund

1. This is administered by the Duke Divinity School under the direction of Dr. A. J. Walton.

2. Reports of this fund have been circulated at this Conference and one copy is on file with the Conference Secretary of Town and Country Work.

## Report No. 2

1. The last General Conference adopted the following resolution, with which the Commission on Town and Country Work records concurrence: "Be it resolved that the General Conference of the Methodist Church endorses the Christian Rural Overseas Program, and urges its rural churches and members to support the CROP community programs for commodities, by the provision of leadership, and by participation in the campaigns."

2. In accord with paragraph 1231(4) in the 1952 Discipline, the Commission on Town and Country Work nominates W. A. Tew for the office of Conference Secretary of Town and Country Work.

3. The commission requests the Conference to provide the amount of \$3,000 for the running expenses of the commission for the Conference year 1955-56.

4. Attention of the district superintendents is again called to the matter of insurance on rural churches and parsonages, and reference is here made to 1953 Journal, page 163, paragraph 11.

5. The commission requests the Board of Evangelism to give creative thought and leadership to the Conference with regard to the obviously needed renewal of Wesleyan evangelistic spirit, in the life and work of the Conference.

6. The commission hereby expresses appreciation to the Bishop and district superintendents for the new policy and attitude toward the once prevalent practice of abandoning weak churches. It is seldom necessary to close a church. The reason for closing of so many churches in the past was neglect, in most cases. The population of the North Carolina Conference area is growing, and so we need all our churches, for the present and for the future.

7. Unlike several of the Conference boards, the Commission on Town and Country Work operates without the aid of an executive secretary. The work of the commission is done largely by the membership. The accumulated experience of the membership determines to a considerable degree the value and effectiveness of the commission in the life and work of the Conference. Therefore, be it resolved that the Commission on Town and Country Work be exempted from the provision of resolution 2 under the heading, "Regarding Persons Holding Memberships on Boards and Commissions," 1952 Journal, page 183.

8. In the 1950 Journal, page 156, is found a resolution providing that Eureka Church, then on Pasquotank Charge, be discontinued. Subsequent to this the property was sold. There is some doubt that church law was carefully followed at every point of this procedure. However, there are many Methodist families residing in the Eureka Church (Symons Creek) community who are without a church home. The request is

hereby made to the Bishop, the Cabinet, and the Board of Missions that the Eureka Church situation be carefully investigated, and that steps be taken to reestablish, at an early date, a Methodist Church in the Symons Creek community.

### Report No. 3

Bishop Paul N. Garber in his address, "The Quadrennial Program of the North Carolina Conference," delivered to the 1952 Annual Conference at Burlington, said:

"We would indeed be unwise if we did not endeavor as a Conference to arrange our program to serve our present rural opportunities.

"We are making progress in this field and our Conference is rapidly becoming recognized as a Conference which has a vital rural program. Much more, however, remains to be done in this field."

This much appreciated statement presented the Commission on Town and Country Work an immediate obligation to "put on its thinking cap," in terms of research work and other studies, and under provision of the 1952 Discipline, 1231 (2), to make constructive suggestions to the Conference as to policy and procedure pertaining to the rural church. This the commission plans to do from time to time, and the following is presented in this regard.

#### I. Conference Master Plan of Circuits and Stations

The North Carolina Conference is predominantly a rural conference, and competent sociological studies indicate that it will continue to be so for a long time to come. (See study, "White Population Trends," 1954, by Hamilton).

The backbone of Conference structure and function is the rural circuits. The present circuit pattern has grown up over a period of years, like vines, and needs a systematic overhauling. A very large number of the circuits are illogical in arrangement. A logically arranged circuit pattern would greatly improve the productive efficiency of the Conference. Much good work has already been done in dividing and rearranging a number of the circuits, but this is only patch work which points up the larger need. The time has now come when we should start work on a Conference master-plan of circuits and stations.

The remarkable and commendable work which has already been done in this regard by the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina is now a matter of report and public information.

The Commission on Town and Country Work requests the Bishop and the district superintendents to begin work on a Conference master-plan of circuits and stations as early as practicable in the new Conference year of 1954-55.

It is recognized that the entire readjustment of circuits according to a master-plan will require a process of study, cultivation, and guidance covering a period of several years.

It is also recognized that as we work in the midst of a growing population, a master-plan of circuits and stations will require adjustments through the years. However, a careful study of sociological and economic factors; population data; new church extension opportunities; numerical, spiritual, and stewardship growth in individual churches; and other pertinent factors, would make long-range planning possible. A master-plan of circuits and stations would properly make provision for the anticipations of projective planning.

"Frontier Again," 1954, a book by Walston and Nickens, just off the press, and "Look at the People," 1954, a book by Chambers nearly ready for the press, will be valuable aids in projective planning. Also, a study, "Rural Church Ladder," by A. G. Tyson, will be of great value to those constructing the master-plan of circuits and stations.

A number of factors and facts should be noted in working on a Conference master-plan of circuits and stations, some of which are as follows:

1. Churches which are ready to become stations should be noted and lifted out of the circuit pattern.
2. Circuits should follow natural community lines in terms of school districts, counties, and trading centers—where possible in terms of all three of these basic sociological patterns.
3. Circuits should be geographically compact.
4. Circuits should be worked out on the two or three church pattern. Only in a few cases should there be four-point circuits, and never more.
5. Churches in need of relocation should be noted—followed by immediate studies and steps to this end. The great highway program of the State of North Carolina has changed the orientation of many rural communities and, as a result, many rural churches are left in very poor locations. Many churches can be saved from death by prompt action as to relocation.
6. Closed churches should be noted—followed by immediate steps toward opening. (See 1952 Discipline, 362 (11).
7. Weak churches should be especially noted and grouped so as to receive intensive pastoral attention. (See study, "A Study of Small Circuit Churches in an Effort to Discover the Churches in Decline and Those in Danger of Closing," 1954, by A. G. Tyson).
8. New church extension locations should be noted—followed by prompt steps to organize and build new churches.
9. A number of combinations as to the above points can be made.
10. In many instances it will be found advantageous for there to be give and take of churches as between two or more charges.
11. A Conference master-plan of circuits and stations would require changing district lines at many points, in the interest of logical circuit arrangements.
12. The paper, "Principles Governing Use of Funds to be Administered by the Board of Missions and Church Extension," March 25, 1954 would be needed in the work of constructing a master-plan of circuits and stations.
13. The Commission on Town and Country Work Report No. 4, adopted by the 1952 Annual Conference, would be noted in the procedure of setting up new charges.
14. The newly revised county maps, available at the North Carolina State Highway and Public Works Commission, would be valuable aids in working on logical circuit arrangements.
15. Consolidation of rural churches is recognized as unsound policy.
16. The recently established arrangement of charges in Greene and Pitt counties, namely: Snow Hill, Walstonburg, Maury-Mt. Herman, Hookerton-Rainbow, Farmville, and Wesley Memorial, is cited as an illustration in miniature of an ideal Conference master-plan of circuits and stations.

## II. Consolidation Not Sound Policy

As a matter relating to a Conference master-plan of circuits and stations, the following paper, "A Consideration of Consolidation and Circuits for Country Churches," printed in the North Carolina Christian Advocate, April 1, 1954, is here presented with the request that it be adopted as policy by this Annual Conference.

"The subject of consolidation of rural Methodist churches in the North Carolina Conference has long been discussed, and is sometimes proposed in our day. Those contending for a principle and policy of consolidation say that the program of consolidation of public schools and the paving of rural roads, logically leads us to conclude that a policy of consolidation of country churches is now in order. It is the judgment of the writer that this is a fallacy, and is not sound policy for the following reasons:

### 1.

Consolidation of country churches runs against the grain of the structure of rural community life. Rural people live, work, have fellowship, and worship in simple, natural neighborhood patterns. Much of the genius of the country church lies in its nature as a neighborhood institution.

As the high schools vacate many of the rural communities, the rural churches have increasing opportunity to become the centers of social life of the neighborhoods, and thereby to integrate and strengthen the structure of the neighborhoods and communities. Therefore, each rural church should have not only a sanctuary and Sunday School rooms, but also an adequate fellowship hall and kitchen. Architects who design new rural church buildings and remodel old ones should know this and wisely advise local church building committees.

The new opportunity for many country churches to become the centers of social as well as spiritual life of the neighborhoods, points up one of the strategic principles for rural church development in this generation.

## 2.

To consolidate rural church congregations means in effect to abandon certain churches and many of the people who live around them. This often would result in other denominations entering the abandoned fields. Thus The Methodist Church would be weakened, neighborhoods divided, and denominational tension increased.

## 3.

At one time it was argued that in each small city there should be just one strong central church of our denomination to serve the people. This viewpoint long blinded and delayed us in the needed program of suburban church extension. We have paid a great and, in some cases, permanent price for our error in judgment and policy. It is now apparent to us that we need not only downtown churches, but also suburban churches. New churches should be built in the neighborhoods where the people reside, especially neighborhoods in which young adult residents predominate.

In the North Carolina Conference area, people of child-bearing age live in very large numbers in the suburbs, in the towns, in rural non-farm settlements, and on the farms.

The case with reference to the new suburban church extension policy presents a principle which should help us see the value of shaping town and country church extension policy largely on the basis of neighborhood churches grouped in logically arranged small circuits, rather than consolidation."

## III

### Youth at the Country Crossroads

The recent Church Attendance Crusade, in this Annual Conference, is now a matter of memory, record, achievement and, in many respects, a revelation of unfortunate and unnecessary failure. The reported number of young people in the Methodist Youth Fellowship gives cause for alarm and concerned action.

It can be proved statistically that the future strength of the Annual Conference lies largely in the young people living at present in the town and country communities of the Conference area.

The book, "Look at the People," by Chambers, gives the exact number of young people living in each county of the Conference area. Thousands of these youth are unchurched. Here is an evangelistic field of immense size and significance.

The request is hereby made to the appropriate agencies of the Conference that there be devised practical and effective procedures which will reach increasingly the great multitudes of unchurched youth at the country crossroads. Here is a field in which we should have long-range planning and procedure at its best.

## IV

### Church Extension

#### A.

The long overdue church extension movement in the North Carolina Conference is now under way. It is necessary at this stage of the movement that the financial method be that of Conference-wide partial subsidy. This method probably will be needed for years to come, to a considerable extent.



However, the time should soon come when church extension will begin to flow from within many established local churches—that is to say, new churches should be the children of nearby mother churches. This flowing-from-within procedure in the church extension would bring great improvement in the spiritual health of the Conference, and probably will develop progressively as the Conference experiences spiritual revival.

The Board of Missions and the Board of Evangelism are requested to give creative thought and leadership to the Conference with regard to this obviously needed step in church extension procedure.

#### B.

The white population of the 56 counties embraced by the North Carolina Conference (Se.J.) was 1,270,456 in the year 1950. Of this number 884,928 were classified as rural. "White Population Trends," 1954, by Hamilton, a study in population estimates, indicates that in the year 1980 the white rural population of the Conference area will be 1,000,000. At the same time a large percent of those classified as urban will have been born and reared in town and country communities.

In view of the above population facts, the Commission on Town and Country Work requests the Conference and the Board of Missions to promptly, rapidly, and adequately expand the church extension movement into the rural areas.

For this to be done efficiently, a Conference-wide survey will have to be made. This survey is already in the planning stage. The request is hereby made that this survey be extensive and intensive, using sound research methods, with a view to mapping all present new church extension potential locations, and with a view to discovering population trends in specific localities which would indicate future new church extension potential locations.

Here is a field in which we should have long-range planning and procedure at its best.

#### V

#### Long-Range Planning on the Local Level

The district superintendents are requested to use time in the Quarterly Conferences and other meetings held by them in town and country churches, and at District Conferences, to acquaint pastors and people with the need for long-range planning on the local church level, and to guide the pastors and people as to objectives and methods in this regard.

#### Report No. 4

#### RESOLUTION CONCERNING DR. J. M. ORMOND

When death came June 24, 1954, to Dr. Jesse Marvin Ormond, the nation and the church, and especially the North Carolina Conference and its Commission on Town and Country Work, sustained a very great loss. A memorial covering his life and labors will be submitted by another committee; but this Commission wishes to place on record its indebtedness to Dr. Ormond for his notable service extending across nearly half a century.

It is no exaggeration to say that Marvin Ormond was a statesman in the Church of Christ. He thought clearly and lived courageously. To him every preacher was a brother beloved. His confidence in his brethren lifted them to higher levels of living. He was a good man and goodness was the atmosphere in which he lived and wrought. His interests were as wide as the purposes of the church. To many of us he was a preacher with a great missionary passion. To others he was an evangelist with a "woe is me if I preach not this gospel" burning in his heart. To others he was the teacher who could not be content till men and causes were intelligently undergirded.

He was one of the outstanding authorities on the rural church and he was responsible in no small degree for the quickened interest and modern methods in this field. He prepared the first study book dealing with the rural church, entitled "By the Waters

of Bethesda." The circulation of this book reached approximately 100,000 and its influence continues.

Outstanding also was his work in church extension in the rural areas of the Carolinas, as a result of which scores of churches were erected which would not have been possible save for Dr. Ormond's expert guidance in the co-operation which he secured from the churches themselves and the funds which he administered as supplementary aid.

To all this must be added the inspiration and information which he imparted to his students as a professor in the Duke Divinity School during a quarter of a century. Much of the new interest in the rural church issued from his classroom. New dignity and new values were attached to these appointments.

It is fair to say he was a great man who discharged a great ministry among us. We shall not, we fear, soon have another to serve with equal fidelity the cause so dear to his heart. As our tribute to his memory, therefore, and in gratitude for his service, we have spread these words upon the record of this commission and submit them to this Conference for adoption.

#### Report No. 5

### SPECIAL RESOLUTION BY COMMISSION ON TOWN AND COUNTRY WORK (1952 DISCIPLINE, 1231 [2])

1. The Annual Conference of 1941 adopted the report of "The Special Committee on Adequate Support of the Ministry." (Journal, pages 86-87). Pursuant to this action the sustentation fund was established providing a minimum salary schedule as follows: \$1,200 for unmarried ministers; \$1,350 for married ministers without children; and \$1,500 for married ministers with children.

2. Through the years following, the minimum salary schedule was increased from time to time, and the sustentation fund became the minimum salary fund as to name.

3. It is generally agreed that the minimum salary fund enterprise has been and is a sound financial procedure. It has not only helped the pastors on low-paying charges, but has decidedly lifted the entire financial base of the Annual Conference.

4. The present schedule is \$2,600, \$2,800, and \$3,000, using the original categories. The ensuing Conference year will bring an increase of \$200 in each category, as provided for by the last Annual Conference, which will make the minimum salary schedule \$2,800, \$3,000 and \$3,200.

5. The Annual Conference of 1953 adopted the following recommendation: "The Commission on Town and Country Work requests the Conference to establish during the quadrennium a minimum salary schedule providing \$3,000 for all unmarried full-time pastors, \$3,300 for all married full time pastors with no dependent children, and \$3,600 for all married full time pastors with one or more dependent children." (Journal, page 162).

6. The minimum salary fund, in its administration, has now become highly complex, as it has become interwoven in the financial structure of the Conference. Many factors are involved in or related to the fund, as: new church extension salaries, the dividing of circuits, student minimum salaries, the automatic reduction provision, Duke Endowment Church Maintenance Fund, etc.

7. It is hereby resolved that it is the will and directive of this Annual Conference that the minimum salary schedule for the Conference year 1955-56 be \$3,000, \$3,300, and \$3,600, based on the categories as described in above paragraph 5. Further, that the Commission on World Service and Finance, the Board of Missions, and the Cabinet be requested to jointly study this matter at this Annual Conference. Further, that the Commission on World Service and Finance be requested to present to this 1954 Annual Conference the necessary percentage apportionment to the churches, as to produce the required funds to pay the minimum salary schedule as provided in this paragraph. (1952 Discipline, 826 [4]).

ADJUDGED, ORDERED and DECREED that the last Will and Testament of Ernest M. Aiken, deceased, as admitted to probate and record in Administration No. 84863 in the Probate branch of this Court, shall be construed to require the following:

a. To necessitate the payment of all of the decedent's debts and obligations in accordance with law.

b. To necessitate the payment of any indebtedness of any kind or nature whatsoever constituting a lien or encumbrance upon the title to the C. C. Hughes and B. C. Hughes realty in Granville County, North Carolina, from the Estate of Ernest M. Aiken, deceased, and the conveyance of clear title thereunto to the trustees of the Salem Methodist Church, Granville County, North Carolina, in and upon like trusts, as were set forth in the deed of conveyance from Ernest M. Aiken, now deceased, and his wife, Herminia H. Aiken, of the Breedlove tracts unto the trustees of the Salem Methodist Church, as was recorded January 7, 1950, in the office of the Register of Deeds of Granville County, North Carolina, in Book of Deeds 128, at page 509.

c. That all of the rest, residue and remainder of the assets of the decedent's estate be thereafter held in trust upon conclusion of the administration of the decedent's estate, with the net income derived therefrom applied for the monthly payments provided to be made under the terms of the decedent's will unto Herminia H. Aiken, Melissa Hodnett, B. O. Aiken and W. I. Aiken, for and during their respective lives.

d. Upon the death of the last survivor of the life beneficiaries named in paragraph c. above, the remaining corpus and all accrued income then remaining in said trust to

pass as intestate property unto Nora Millicent Aiken, Phyllis Marjorie Aiken, Benjamin H. Aiken and Herminia Ursula Aiken Mason, as the surviving children of Ernest M. Aiken, deceased, and in the event of the demise of any of them prior thereto, then unto the heirs of any such deceased child of the said Ernest M. Aiken.

e. That William J. Davis and Jesse Edward Aiken, the executors nominated by the last Will and Testament of Ernest M. Aiken, deceased, shall become the trustees of the trust estate herein decreed.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that, in accordance with the construction of the last Will and Testament of Ernest M. Aiken, deceased, as herein decreed, Harry L. Ryan, Jr., plaintiff, as guardian ad litem for Nora Millicent Aiken and Phyllis Marjorie Aiken, minor children of the decedent, be and he is hereby authorized, permitted and directed to execute, acknowledge and deliver the contract and agreement, as set forth in Exhibit B, attached to plaintiff's complaint, and as heretofore executed, acknowledged and delivered by the remaining parties herein, which contract and agreement are hereby ratified and confirmed.

This judgment shall be entered without costs to any party herein.

## COMMISSION ON WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE

Our Conference has experienced steady growth along many lines of endeavor for several years. New opportunities make for larger responsibilities. Your commission believes that the financial objectives herein proposed are necessary to meet the pressing needs in promoting Kingdom work in the total program of our church.

To conform to the 8-month Conference year, the monies below with the exception or some preferred claims in items 12-A have been reduced to two-thirds of the original amounts.

## PART I

## MINISTERIAL SUPPORT OTHER THAN PASTORS' SALARIES

## 1. EPISCOPAL FUND:

The Episcopal Fund is set by the General Conference at an amount equal to 2% of the salary of the pastor and associate pastor under Episcopal appointment for the current year.

## 2. SALARIES FOR DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS:

We recommend:

(a) That the annual salary of each of nine District Superintendents shall be set at \$7,200.00, including expenses attendant to the office.

(b) We recommend the adoption of the report of the Long Range Planning Committee with respect to the appropriation from surplus in the District Superintendents' Fund of \$10,000 each for two new district parsonages. Said sum to be used in part payment and to settle all equities as outlined in the report.

(c) The apportionment to each charge of a sum equal to 5½% of the amount estimated for the current year for the salary of the pastor and any associate pastor under Episcopal appointment.

## 3. THE BOARD OF CONFERENCE CLAIMANTS requests an apportionment of an amount equal to 16% of the salary of the pastor and any associate pastor under Episcopal appointment.

## 4. THE MINISTERS' RETIREMENT FUND requests an apportionment of an amount equal to 1% of the salary of the pastor and any associate pastor under Episcopal appointment.

Items 1, 2, 3 and 4 equal 24½% of salary of pastors and associate pastors.

We recommend the apportionment to each charge of 4½% of "total money raised" (1951-52). See definition below.

7. Church School Rally Day (the goal being an amount equal to 1% of the pastor's salary.
8. Fellowship of Suffering and Service.
9. Advance Specials (both General and Conference).

We recommend approval of the requests of the following agencies for the privilege of soliciting funds throughout the Conference:

1. Wesley Foundation Commission for special gifts for the benefit of special works in state-supported institutions.
2. Inter-Conference Commission on Student Religious Work for Wesley Foundation facilities and buildings at Fairmont, Raleigh, and College Place, Greensboro; also Methodist Student Center at Duke University.
3. The Board of Directors for Methodist Retirement Homes, Inc., for the new Methodist Retirement Home in Durham.
4. The Board of Missions for the promotion of Church Extension Ten Dollar Club.
5. We recommend that the program of the Methodist College Foundation of North Carolina, Inc., have the hearty support of the Conference, and that the purposes and functions of the Foundation as outlined therein be approved.
6. We recommend the effort of the Radio and Film Commission to raise the sum of \$4,243.00 annually for two years.

PART VII

Your Commission recommends Conference approval of the report of the Committee to Study the Basis for Apportionments.

The commission accepts the amendment requesting that the Long Range Planning Committee be asked to study the question of improved efficiency in the administra-

tion of the office of District Superintendent through provision for secretarial help and/or allowance for office expense.

We recommend that columns in Pastor's Reports, reporting amounts paid to the Conference Treasurer, be audited before being published in the Journal so as to reflect the amount received by the Treasurer, plus vouchers for direct remittance to General Treasurer, provided that no change shall be made without pastor's consent.

We recommend that the Conference fiscal year be designated to begin November 1st and to close June 30th.

To charge or church treasurers we recommend that they set up a schedule for remitting at a fixed time each month and to close the year as early as possible, not waiting until Conference week.

We report the issuance of a Fidelity Bond to cover the Treasurer in the amount of \$100,000.00 and to cover the stenographer-clerk in the amount of \$25,000.00.

#### PART VIII

A report of "Outstanding Charges" will be submitted to the Conference.

Also, the summary of budget items for the local church will be published after approval of the report of the commission.

We commend Marvin J. Cowell, Conference Treasurer, for the efficient and faithful manner in which the work of the Treasurer's office has been handled this year.

#### SUMMARY OF BUDGET FOR THE LOCAL CHURCH

Conference year from November 1, 1954 to June 30, 1955

The following items are apportioned on basis of salary of pastor and any associate pastor under episcopal appointment. To arrive at the apportionment for the short year take 2/3 of the usual annual apportionment.

- ITEM 1. EPISCOPAL FUND: A sum equal to 2% of current year salary.
- ITEM 2. DISTRICT SUPTS. FUND: A sum equal to 5½% of current year salary.
- ITEM 3. CONFERENCE CLAIMANTS: A sum equal to 16% of current year salary. We now have 68 retired ministers and 95 widows of ministers.
- ITEM 4. MINISTERS' RETIREMENT FUND: A sum equal to 1% of current year salary.
- ITEM 5. MINIMUM SALARY FUND: 4½% of "total money raised." To raise the minimum salary scale which is set for the current year at \$2,800, \$3,000, \$3,200.
- ITEM 6. ORPHANAGE: 6% of "total money raised." Our Home in Raleigh supports 250 children through age 18.
- ITEM 7. GOLDEN CROSS: 1% of "total money raised."
- ITEM 8. BOARD OF MISSIONS: 3% of "total money raised." To help establish new congregations and churches, and to assist old congregations in emergency situations.
- ITEM 9. COLLEGE SUSTAINING FUND: 7% of "total money raised." That we may train youth in Christian Colleges for leadership in the Church.
- ITEM 10. CAMP DON-LEE BUILDING FUND: 1% of "total money raised." For developing our youth camp at Arapahoe, N. C. Over one thousand youth are benefitted each summer.
- ITEM 11. METHODIST RETIREMENT HOMES, INC.: 2% of "total money raised."

ITEM 12. WORLD SERVICE AND CONFERENCE BENEVOLENCES: A general increase of 15% is needed. Your acceptance as agreed with the District Superintendent. Chiefly for World and National Missions. Also included Conference Board of Education, Youth Work at Colleges and Universities, some Conference Committees, and Expense Funds for Annual, Jurisdictional and General Conferences.

ITEM 13. On remittance form is provided so that the Sunday School may receive credit for amounts paid on apportionments for Item 12.

## Quadrennial Committee Reports

## THE ADVANCE COMMITTEE

The 1952 edition of our Discipline, paragraph 763, provides for the Advance Committee indicating its membership and its scope of work. This committee considers it a very high privilege to be able to present to the members of the North Carolina Annual Conference, in session in Raleigh, North Carolina, October 27-31, 1954, such a fine and progressive report of work done in the local churches during the year. Through the leadership of our faithful Bishop, the District Superintendents, the pastors and members of our churches, we have made achievements of which we are proud. It is not possible to set down on paper all of the worthy things done in the name and through "specials" which have been brought to full fruition. I think it is well for us to look at the progress made in the last few years in accepting "General Specials" in our conference. Only a short while ago it was unusual to see on tabulated form, a charge or a church carrying a "Mission Special." It is now a most unusual thing to see a charge without a "Mission Special." It is our hope that as we progress in this direction that there will not be left a single charge or church in our conference that does not share in this important work. Here is an opportunity for us to go the second mile in our religious experience of giving. We know that much of our work in the Methodist Church would suffer to a great disadvantage if we did not pursue this flexible way of supplementing, through our various channels of special giving, what our World Service and Conference Items does.

Advance Specials by districts and charges for 1953-54 are most encouraging.

Our charges have participated in other specials for the church generally and conference-wide, such as Overseas Offering, Week of Dedication, Fellowship and Suffering, Jacksonville Christmas Offering, and the special offering for the Methodist Retirement Home on Mother's Day, to approximately the amount of fifty thousand dollars.

We must not lose sight of a very great and worthy cause promoted by our whole conference this year, that of building new churches through the Ten Dollar Club. We have secured to date 4,707 members of this club. If each of these members responds to the three calls made for ten dollars, each in a period of 12 months, we will give for the building of new churches in the bounds of our Conference about \$140,000.00. This is magnificent. If we will keep our faith high and ourselves busy about His Kingdom, finally we will come rejoicing, "Bringing in the Sheaves."

At a meeting held in Goldsboro in September, the Advance Committee recommended, for your approval at this Annual Conference, the merging of the Overseas Offering, which normally comes in February, with the Special Korean Offering, which will be taken on Sunday, November 14. We hope you will approve this recommendation. The money received from these two appeals, combined in one offering, is to be pro-rated by our treasurer on a percentage basis for each cause.

## COMMISSION ON CHRISTIAN VOCATIONS

The Commission on Christian Vocations is concerned with guiding the youth of our Conference in their decision about their life work. We are glad to report an emphasis on this all-important work already evident and operating in several phases of our Conference program. For example, at the Louisburg youth assemblies in June, two of the staff speakers very fittingly gave their personal testimonies on "Why I Entered the Preaching Ministry" and "Why I Became a Christian Teacher." In addition, MYF programs on the local, subdistrict, and district levels have at various times throughout the year stressed the Christian approach to one's vocation. The Christian Witness Missions now being held in many areas of our Conference are proving instrumental in securing commitment to Christian vocations as well as to Christ. Also of significance in this field is the work of pastors and district superintendents who have begun to set up in each local church a committee on Christian vocations, as the Discipline provides. We are grateful for all that is being done in the Conference to effect vocational guidance for our young people and hope that this work will be continued and increased.

In August the commission sent three delegates to the Inter-board Committee on Christian Vocations seminar on "Vocational Counseling" at Lake Junaluska: Dr. B. G. Childs, Mrs. H. R. Odum, and Rev. Eastwood Atwater. These persons, now certified to conduct classes for local church workers who desire training for vocational counseling, are available to teach in leadership schools throughout the Conference.

The commission is now planning a Conference on Christian Vocations to be held in early March, 1955, the purpose of which will be to inculcate the Christian philosophy of vocation and to recruit likely youth for church service. Exact dates and place of this conference will be announced during the next few weeks.

Mindful of the fact that a thorough job of Christian vocational guidance and recruitment requires continual keeping in touch with our youth during senior high and older youth years, we propose to set up a record file of current data on each youth who comes to the attention of the commission. Such a file, extensive and kept current, represents a considerable undertaking, but we feel that the project will be justified and propose to work at it during the coming year.

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### COMMISSION ON RADIO AND FILM

During the Conference year 1953-54 our commission has conducted a successful Workshop on Audio-Visual, Radio, and Television media for the local church. This was held at Edenton Street Methodist Church, sponsored jointly by our commission and the Board of Education.

We have five certified instructors in this field in our conference, and we are urging that more courses on the use of audio-visuals in the local church be taught in leadership training schools of our Conference during the new year. Several were included this year. Some churches have broadened their program of audio-visual use during the year through wise training methods.

During the coming year we propose: (a) to train more leaders in this field, with particular reference to establishing a District Director of Television, Radio, and Audio-Visuals in each district, who shall become ex-officio members of the Conference commission; (b) to ask for elected, or appointed, delegates to our commission from the Conference Boards of Missions, Evangelism, and Education, and from the Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service; (c) to sponsor another workshop with the possibility of co-operative sponsorship by the North Carolina Council of Churches, utilizing imported leadership; (d) to make available to the pastors of our conference information about the best in television and audio-visual materials available for church use; (e) to seek to place Methodist programs on radio and television stations of our conference with material available from our church agencies; (f) to continue to co-operate and consult with our General Commission on Radio and Film Work, the Protestant Radio Center of our Jurisdiction, the Visual Education Fellowship in Chicago, and the Central Department of Broadcasting and Films of the National Council of Churches.

To this end we shall work co-operatively with the other boards and agencies of our conference in this highly specialized, and relatively unknown, field of witness in the Christian ministry.

### \*N. C. CONFERENCE BOARD OF SOCIAL AND ECONOMIC RELATIONS

Section I—The North Carolina Conference Board of Social and Economic Relations has just closed a successful year, particularly in view of the fact that the board is only two years old. Your board has been studying in social education. Dr. A. Dudley Ward, Executive Secretary of the General Board, with offices in Chicago, met with your Conference board February 24, 1954, at Goldsboro. Our board was benefitted by his leadership.

A copy of "The Social Creed of The Methodist Church" was mailed to all pastors in our Conference urging them to read the same to each congregation they serve, or use the social creed as they desired to familiarize our people with the position of The Methodist Church in social and economic matters.

Section II—Your Board of Social and Economic Relations recommends to the Conference a continued program of study of the social and economic areas within the bounds of our North Carolina Conference. To do this, we propose to make available materials from the General Board, and other groups producing materials of like nature, to our Conference for the purpose of social and economic education.

Your board proposes to serve as the co-ordinating link in our Conference for all matters relating to social and economic questions.

Section III—"The interest of The Methodist Church in social welfare springs from the labors of John Wesley, who ministered to the physical, intellectual, and social needs of the people to whom he preached the gospel of personal redemption." (Paragraph 2020, the 1952 Methodist Discipline)

In keeping with this interest your Board of Social and Economic Relations declares itself in the following areas:

(1) We uphold the policy of our State of North Carolina against gambling. We believe that gambling in any form is a parasite on the moral stamina of any community.

(2) We deplore the method of war as a method of settling differences among nations. We look to other ways of settlement. Therefore, we join with the Board of World Peace in support of "The Crusade for World Order."

(3) Alcoholism has become an acute national problem. We join with the Board of Temperance in fighting the alcohol traffic.

(4) We stand for the rights of racial groups, and we call upon our people to see that the peoples of different races who are American citizens enjoy all rights belonging to them. We desire the most Christian and brotherly relations between races to exist within the bounds of our North Carolina Conference. As our Discipline reminds us: "Ours is a world church. As such its responsibility is to unite in one fellowship men and women of all races and nations. As Christians we confess ourselves to be children of God." (Par. 2027).

We therefore endorse the statement of our Bishops in their Episcopal Address of 1952: "To discriminate against a person solely upon the basis of his race is both unfair and unchristian. Every child of God is entitled to that place in society which he has won by his industry and his character. To deny him that position of honor because of the accident of his birth is neither honest democracy or good religion."

We commend the steps taken in the armed services, the world of sports, institutions of entertainment, the courts of law, and other secular agencies to put into practice the ideals which we, as Christians and Americans, have long accepted.

We recognize that the Christian Church has played a significant part in the growing awareness of our brotherhood which has made these advances possible. We note

particularly the creative work of the Woman's Society of Christian Service, the Methodist Youth Fellowship, the Methodist Student Movement, and other agencies within our Methodist Church, in preparing the way for improvements in race relations.

But, as our Discipline points out, "it is more immediately our imperative duty to confess our failure to achieve God's will in Methodism and then resolutely to set about achieving a Christian brotherhood in the church that will be free from racial discrimination and segregation." (Discipline, Par. 2027).

The decision of the Supreme Court with regard to segregation in the public schools has presented all of us with a new situation. We recognize that the practical application of this decision in North Carolina involves real difficulties and dangers. But we believe that this decision is a true interpretation of our Christian faith and of our American democracy; and we confess both as a church and as individual Christians that by our failure to face seriously the teachings of the Gospel on the question, we have contributed to these difficulties and dangers.

The Supreme Court has made a clear statement of the basic principle and is providing a procedure that will seek the wisest means of implementing this principle.

We commend the Governor of our state and other state officials for their efforts to find orderly and constructive solutions for the problems involved in the Court's decision.

We call upon the people of our churches to support all constructive efforts of our state leaders to resist attempts to incite racial prejudice.

To aid our members in discovering the Christian way through the difficulties we face in race relations, we urge the Department of Adult Work of the North Carolina Conference Board of Education, in co-operation with the Board of Social and Economic Relations, to set up seminars throughout our conference for study and discussion of our Christian responsibility.

We believe that this procedure is consistent with the high call of our Bishops in their Episcopal Address of 1952: "We face the critical adjustment between the absolute Christian ideal and the human level upon which a retarded and hesitating Christian conscience moves; Christian truth and strategy must reach us where we are and lead us by divine grace to where God would have us be."

## SURVEY AND LONG RANGE PLANNING

In keeping with the mandate in the resolution creating this committee at the 1952 session, the Survey and Long Range Planning Committee for two years now has been endeavoring to study, analyze and diagnose the present structure and function of the North Carolina Conference and to submit a long range program, policy and strategy that will enable Methodism in Eastern North Carolina to serve more effectively during the years ahead.

The task has been much larger than the committee at first realized. For one thing, no member of the committee is an expert in survey and long range planning. We have had to proceed by methods of trial and error. Consequently, we have not made the progress that better trained and more experienced persons could have achieved. Again, each member of the committee has been busy with his or her vocation. No one has been able to give this work the thought and the time required for the best results.

Nevertheless, some progress has been made. The committee itself is more aware of the need for survey and long range planning. It realizes that no organization with a task to do can function without knowing itself, its weakness and strength, its long range opportunities. Any going enterprise in Eastern North Carolina must be aware of the tremendous change and development taking place all around us. The entire territory we occupy is indeed "frontier again." To be unaware of it, to ignore this fact or to fail to devise a long range plan and program is not only suicidal; it is unpardonable. It is not only fatal; it is rank betrayal.

Survey and long range planning are essential. But something else is more essential: Dedication, devotion, self-sacrifice, heroism, self-effacement, co-operation. This Conference must move forward as a man or it will not advance. In community after community in this state Methodism now occupies second place. This is not because

Methodism has no message, or is old and crotchety. It is partly because many preachers have not seen the needs beyond their own parishes and many laymen have been content to wait for the unchurched to come to the churches already established. If this spirit were to prevail we would not even deserve a second place. We would deserve to die. These are searching questions we face: Are we willing now to put a larger service above self? Are we willing to broaden our horizons, to think in terms of the whole Conference and not merely in terms of our own parishes?

Survey and long range planning can reveal a picture of our present situation. It can map a strategy, outline a policy, project a program. But all this will not be worth the paper it is written on unless we have men and women whose hearts are aflame with a passion to carry Christ to every nook and corner in this great Conference. This is our task. May God give us the will and the strength to accomplish it!

The committee has held six meetings during the year. Perhaps the most significant to be held so far was the meeting on July 12 when Bishop Garber presented a message entitled "Some Suggestions Concerning the Future Program of Our North Carolina Annual Conference." Bishop Garber electrified every person present with his statesmanlike message. The committee voted to have Bishop Garber's message printed and made available to preachers and laymen attending this session of the Conference. It follows this report and we earnestly implore every pastor and layman to read this stirring address. Other printed material the committee recommends is the volume "Frontier Again," being released at this session of the Conference, and "Look at the People," which will appear before long. Both of these publications, sponsored by this Conference's Commission on Town and Country Work, give vital information about the area served by the North Carolina Conference.

During the year the committee was asked to consider a suitable time for the holding of the Annual Conference session. The committee recommends that the 1955 session be held the last week in October between Sundays, that is Monday through Friday, October 24-28, 1955. It furthermore recommends that the last week in October be retained as the Annual Conference date until a suitable and satisfactory Spring date can be found and approved.\*

A subcommittee consisting of Dr. W. L. Clegg and Dr. C. D. Barcliff has studied the districts. The study revealed that since 1931, when the districts were reduced from nine to seven, the number of charges per district has increased from 31 to 48. In view of this heavy charge load and the growing prospects for additional churches, the committee recommends that for the increase effectiveness of the Conference two additional districts be added at this session of the Conference.

Realizing that no long range program for the Conference can be projected without taking account of church extension, the committee invited Dr. Roy A. Sturm, director of survey and research of the Board of Missions, to address the group. Also invited to the meeting were members of the Conference Board of Missions, who had been contemplating a church extension survey. It was decided that this committee, in cooperation with the Board of Missions, the Commission on Town and Country Work, and the district superintendents, would undertake such a survey. Plans are already underway. The survey will seek to discover where all of our churches are located, where new churches are needed now, where new churches will be needed within the next ten or twenty years, where there are churches that need to be relocated and the location of abandoned churches, as well as other vital information. It is hoped that the study can be completed during the 1954-55 Conference year. This undertaking will require the full support of every preacher and many laymen.

This committee is unable to complete its work this year. It, therefore, requests that it be continued another Conference year, at the end of which it expects to make its final recommendations. It recommends that since survey is being carried on by another committee that the name of this committee be changed to "Long Range Planning Committee."

## WOMAN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE

The Woman's Society of Christian Service of the North Carolina Conference is a part of the Woman's Division of the Board of Missions of The Methodist Church and, as such, shares in the program of the Woman's Division. This program of service extends into twenty-eight countries where 566 missionaries are at work. In the United States and its territories 288 deaconesses and approximately 1,200 other employed workers are serving.

The Woman's Society of Christian Service of the North Carolina Conference, which includes the Wesleyan Service Guild, is grateful for the progress which has been made during the past year. Of special note is the increase in giving. The per capita giving for Missions was \$5.44, which resulted in a net increase over the previous year of \$14,816.55. Each of the seven districts made an increase in its gifts, which enabled the Conference treasurer to send to the Woman's Division \$165,539.18. The sum of \$178,345.81 was received by the Conference treasurer, and \$135,780.06 was reported spent for Christian social relations and local church activities, making a grand total of \$314,215.87 given for all purposes. This was a per capita giving of \$9.60 for both Missions and Christian social relations and local church activities. The increase over the previous year has permitted a fuller share in the work of the division, and larger fields of service at home.

### Some of the Highlights of the Past Year

**Increase in Financial Strength.** (detailed above)

**Increase in Membership.** The Woman's Society of Christian Service received 2,460 new members and the Wesleyan Service Guild 270, making a grand total of 32,707 members.

**Three Workers Commissioned:** At the Quadrennial Assembly held in Milwaukee in May, Miss Elsie Parker was commissioned a missionary, and Miss Ethelynde Ballance and Miss Alta Nye, deaconesses. Miss Parker sailed for Brazil in July, where she will teach in Bennett College. Miss Ballance and Miss Nye are serving in our Conference.

**Two New Projects.** The following new projects were established in our Conference this year: Rural work at Roberdell in Richmond County, where Miss Ballance is working; and defense work at Havelock, directed by Miss Charlotte Stevenson.

**Other Projects Already Established.** These projects are: Methodist Student Center, East Carolina College, Greenville, directed by Miss Mamie Chandler, deaconess; and rural work at Milton in Caswell County, served by Miss Nye.

**First North Carolina Conference School of Missions.** This school was held at Duke University, August 21-27, and was an outstanding success. This was likewise true of the Spiritual Life Retreat which preceded the school. (For a number of years the retreat and school have been jointly held with the Western North Carolina Conference Woman's Society at Greensboro College). There was a combined enrollment of 445, which was more than the largest enrollment of the jointly sponsored schools. We feel that the outreach of this School of Missions will be felt throughout our Conference.

**Visitation Program.** Much was accomplished in the widening of fellowship through the visitation of the local societies by conference, district, and subdistrict officers. Twenty new societies were organized during the year, and we are steadily working toward the goal of a society in every church.

**Assembly.** Our Conference was represented at the Fourth Quadrennial Assembly of the Woman's Society of Christian Service held in Milwaukee in May by 6 delegates, 2 deaconesses, 1 missionary, 1 retired missionary, 1 Jurisdictional officer, and 1

visitor. The information and inspiration received there will be channeled to our districts through the visits of those who attended the assembly.

This year has been an enriching one for the President, who desires to express appreciation to Bishop Garber, the Cabinet, and all the pastors for their co-operation and interest in enlarging the effectiveness of the Woman's Society of Christian Service of the North Carolina Conference.

The untiring work of the conference, district, subdistrict, and local officers has brought significant accomplishments in every area in which they have worked. The Woman's Society of Christian Service of the North Carolina Conference is working toward the realization of spiritual implementation of every day living in world conditions, as they are found in the day which belongs to our generation.

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## COMMITTEE ON WORLD PEACE

The Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference in session at Roanoke, Virginia, on June 30, 1952, made the following recommendations to the Council of Bishops pertaining to their leadership in the "Crusade for World Order":

"1. That this Crusade be properly recognized as a major project of The Methodist Church during this present quadrennium in accordance with the desires of the General Conference so clearly reflected by its unanimous action on this subject in San Francisco;

"2. That we regard as essential the strengthening of the United Nations. And, in full concurrence with the statement on war and peace adopted by the General Conference, we call for 'revision of the United Nations charter in such a manner as to enable that body to enact, interpret, and enforce world law against aggression and war';

"3. That we are jealous of the sovereignty of this great Christian nation of ours, but we likewise recognize that in a world where there is no international law and order, only international criminals—those seeking conquest and war—possess sovereignty;

"4. That this Crusade for World Order designated for 1953-54—the year just prior to automatic consideration of charter revision by the United Nations—be planned and established as one of action;

"5. That every worthy instrument—mass meetings, church programs, and public education — be employed by the church to acquaint our people with the need of world unity through the United Nations, against international lawlessness, aggression, and war;

"6. That every effective, practical means be utilized by our people in insisting that the Congress of the United States, through proper legislation, assume leadership in this vital charter revision activity by the United Nations to insure a limited world federation dedicated to and powerful enough to enforce world peace."

As Christians we all realize that God is not only a God of love but a God of law and order. We further realize that law and order are opposed to war and chaos. We recognize the fact that as a church we must do all in our power to restore and maintain peace and harmony in the world. The General Conference has made a start in asking the Bishops of our church to lead us in a "Crusade for World Order," but this is only the start. Unless every member of the church works in and through his crusade, it will not be the success that it should and can be.

We, therefore, urge every pastor to acquaint his people with the plans of the crusade and to give leadership to its promotion in his local community.

We make the following requests of our ministers for the coming conference year, realizing, of course, that most of them will follow this course without these requests.

1. That a Sunday near the Fourth of July, a Sunday near the Armistice Day, a Sunday near Memorial Day, and a Sunday near Christmas Day be used to preach sermons pertaining to international peace and goodwill.

2. That at least six Wednesday evenings be used during the year to explain the United Nations Charter and operations, using materials available from Methodist Board of World Peace; any Wednesday evenings most convenient to the individual pastor.

3. That our ministers and laymen, when accepting invitations to speak to civic groups, will use subjects pertaining to international peace and goodwill.

4. That printed materials prepared by our Methodist Board of World Peace, 740 Rush Street, Chicago, Illinois, be distributed frequently to the members of our churches.

5. That ministers and laymen take advantage of seminars which will be conducted by our Methodist Board of World Peace during the conference.

6. That ministers and laymen use their influences to the end that, by international agreement, A-bombs, H-bombs, and C-bombs will not be used in the event of war between any two or more nations.

7. That we discourage the opinion that war in the near future is inevitable and encourage the opinion that "peace and goodwill on earth" can be maintained continuously.

INTER-BOARD COMMITTEE ON ALCOHOL EDUCATION AND CHRISTIAN ACTION

The historical Methodist position regarding the use of intoxicating beverages commits us as a church to abstinence as a wise and Christian way of life. This position can be maintained, however, only as our people are continually enlightened about the personal and social dangers involved in using alcoholic beverages and subtle efforts constantly being made by the alcoholic beverage industries to make it easier to drink than not to drink.

Because the task of education for abstinence is so broad that no one agency is sufficient to do the total job that must be done, the 1953 Annual Conference authorized the creation of your Inter-Board Committee on Alcohol Education and Christian Action. The central task of this committee was established as being the uniting of the efforts of our agencies already charged with the tasks of alcohol education so as to reach every possible segment of our church membership. Thus, the Boards of Temperance, Education, Lay Activities, Social and Economic Action, the Woman's Society of Christian Service, the Methodist Youth Fellowship were to undertake joint projects in alcohol education and Christian action. The Inter-Board Committee, therefore, was established as an instrument of co-operation and not competition with any other board or participating agency. Each agency was to use its own channels of promotion to make such projects of co-operation successful.

In order to define clearly the functions of this new agency and, also, to make its work more efficient, we recommend the following:

1. That the District Secretaries of Temperance be included on the membership of the Inter-Board Committee on Alcohol Education and Christian Action;
2. That the Inter-Board Committee have a planning meeting early in the new conference year to plan its work;
3. That within the districts the district staff shall be considered the District Committee on Alcohol Education and Christian Action, and that projects planned by the Conference Inter-Board Committee, such as seminars, workshops, schools, rallies, etc., to be promoted on a district basis, shall be under the general direction of the District Secretary of Temperance, in co-operation with the District Superintendent.

4. That the co-operating agencies are authorized to use their channels of communication and promotion to reach all organized groups within our churches regarding projects in alcohol education and Christian action.

5. That every local church co-operate with the District Seminars on Alcohol Education already set for early in 1955.

## COMMITTEE TO STUDY THE BASIS FOR APPORTIONMENTS

The committee submits for your consideration, criticism and suggestion the following plan for changing the present system of apportioning Conference items to the various charges to a voluntary method of benevolent giving. We believe that such a plan should be considered for two reasons:

First, after some study we think that no practical and truly equitable basis for apportionments to the charges can be devised.

Second, and more importantly, we think the apportionment method discourages the development of Christian motives and spirit in giving. The apportionments are regarded, perhaps naturally, as a form of taxation. The support of church causes, then, is likely to appear as a burden imposed upon our people rather than an opportunity and a privilege. There results a tendency, evidenced in many ways, for the churches to evade as much of this burden as they can. It is also true that under this system the primary appeal for giving is to pride or other unworthy motives. By contrast, we believe that to place the benevolent giving of the churches on a voluntary basis would appeal to and promote the growth of Christian generosity in our people. To this end we recommend:

I. That all benevolences, as hereinafter defined, be placed on the same basis as has been the case with World Service, the amount for which each charge is obligated to be determined by its acceptance at the beginning of each Conference year.

(1) The term "benevolences" shall be understood to include the following items: Orphange, Golden Cross, Missions and Church Extension, College Sustaining Fund, Camp Building Fund, Methodist Retirement Homes, Inc., General, Jurisdictional, and Conference Administration, World Service and Conference Benevolences, Mission Specials, and all special offerings approved by the General, Jurisdictional, or Annual Conference. In its acceptance, each charge shall designate one amount to include all these items, with the exception of the special offerings. These special offerings may be taken separately for separate causes, combined into one annual offering, or included in the budget.

(2) Items of ministerial support as follows: District Superintendents Fund, District Work, Episcopal Fund, Conference Claimants Fund, and Ministers Retirement Fund shall continue on the present basis of a percentage of the salary of the pastor and associate(s). The Minimum Salary Fund shall continue on the present basis of a percentage of total money raised. These items shall be placed in a separate category, to be designated as "Connectional Expense."

(3) The budget for General, Jurisdictional, and Conference causes shall be fixed as heretofore by the Annual Conference, upon recommendation of the Commission on World Service and Finance. Each cause shall be paid proportionately out of the income from acceptances up to the amount fixed in the budget. Any surplus shall be held by the Conference Treasurer to be expended by the Annual Conference upon recommendation of the commission.

II. That each charge be asked to move as rapidly as possible toward the goal of giving as much to other causes as it spends on its local work. The phrase, "Other Causes," is intended to include items listed as "Benevolences" and "Connectional Expense" in Paragraph I, Sections 1 and 2. It will readily be seen that, if such a goal were achieved, it would mean greatly increased giving by most of our charges. It should be remembered that the purpose of this proposal is not to decrease what we give. Your committee believes that we Methodists are not giving in anything like



the measure that we ought. But we believe that we ought to give more out of a willing heart because of love for Christ and His cause; and that, if the appeal is to this motive, we will give more. The essence of this proposal, then, is that each charge shall determine for itself what shall be the measure of its benevolent giving.

In order that the causes of the church may not suffer, each charge shall be urged to at least maintain its giving to "Benevolences" at the level prevailing when this plan goes into effect.

III. That this plan be adopted to go into operation for the Conference year 1955-1956 with the intervening year to be used for cultivation and preparation. At the last quarterly conference in the year 1954-55, the acceptance will be set for the ensuing year. But in the Conference year 1956-57 and each subsequent year the acceptance shall be set at the first quarterly conference of that year.

1. That the preparation for this change be made a focal point of the Emphasis on Stewardship and the Tithe scheduled for the year 1954-1955. And that this program of preparation be planned and led by the special committee for the Emphasis on Stewardship and the Tithe, the Board of Lay Activities, the Board of Education, the Commission on World Service and Finance, and the District Superintendents. We suggest that among others the following methods of cultivation be used.

(a) Presentation and full discussion of the voluntary plan at each first Quarterly Conference.

(b) Widespread use of lay speakers to present the plan in each church in the Conference, these lay speakers to be enlisted and instructed by the District Lay Leaders and Associates.

(c) Frequent articles in the North Carolina Christian Advocate.

(d) Encouragement of discussion of the plan in all adult Church School classes, the Woman's Society, the Wesleyan Service Guild, the Methodist Men's Fellowship, and the Methodist Youth Fellowship.

IV. The following is a suggested plan of procedure for preparation in the local church:

(1) Recognize and emphasize the fact that the new plan places the finances of the church on a new spiritual basis. Carry out this emphasis in sermons, lay talks, class lessons, etc.

(2) Present the plan to various groups in this order: Budget or Finance Committee, Finance Commission if so organized, Official Board, Quarterly Conference, Congregation.

(3) In presenting local budget, itemize causes included in acceptance for benevolences. For this purpose, the Commission on World Service and Finance is requested to include in its report a statement of the percent of the Benevolent Budget that will be directed to each cause.

(4) Free and full discussion of the budget shall be encouraged by presenting the local budget to small group meetings. Experience indicates that greater participation may be secured by holding meetings in the homes in various neighborhoods. The voluntary principle would suggest that this process of consultation be carried out before the local budget is adopted.

(5) It would be a proper extension of the voluntary principle to ask individual members to pledge a certain percent of their incomes to the church.

The North Carolina Brotherhood is not insurance. It is a fellowship sending gifts to a minister's widow and family immediately after his death. These love gifts are in terms of money instead of flowers to wither—money that comes when it is most needed.

The present membership of the Brotherhood is composed of 44 retired ministers, 164 active ministers, and 209 non-beneficiary members. The non-beneficiary membership is composed of churches, church school classes, WSCS groups, and individuals, paying from \$1 to \$5 per call. The New Bern District has the largest number of non-beneficiary members, and Jarvis Memorial, Greenville, has the most for any church.

Last year our Constitution was amended to allow "any minister of the North Carolina Conference on trial or in full connection, or any Accepted Supply Pastor doing supply work in the Conference," to "become a beneficiary member of the Brotherhood by payment of an initiation fee of \$1 and within thirty days from date of entrance a mortuary assessment of \$3 if the salary be under \$3,000; \$4 if his salary be from \$3,000 to \$4,000; and \$5 if his salary be \$4,000 or above; \$1 for any beneficiary member who becomes superannuated . . . Any person or organization may become a non-beneficiary member upon the payment of \$1 or more and the promise to pay the specified sum on the death of each beneficiary member thereafter."

This amendment was to be in effect for two years. Ministers who have been in the Conference for nine years or more will have to become members of the Brotherhood within the Conference year 1954-1955 if they expect to ever join.

If the 187 active ministers, who at present are not members, and over 200 organizations or individuals will join, we will be able to pay \$2,000 to the widow or family upon the death of a member. If the members will pay immediately upon the receipt of their notices, the widow can be paid the entire amount when she most needs it.

The following committee is hereby appointed to study the provisions of Article 10 and make recommendations to the 1955 business meeting of the Brotherhood:

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### CAMP DON-LEE, INC.

A number of improvements have been made at Camp Don-Lee the past year at a total cost of approximately \$16,000.00, all of which have greatly enhanced the value, beauty, and program efficiency of our camp. These improvements are a part of the four-year construction program begun in 1952-1953 for the completion of our camp. In almost every instance the cost of each project has exceeded the original estimate. This is understandable in view of the rising costs of materials and labor. The trustees of Camp Don-Lee, Inc., have given careful supervision to each construction project in the interest of economy and quality. In every case the construction has been durable and at the same time as economical as possible.

The largest construction project the past year was the completion of a director's or caretaker's lodge which was used as a staff lodge this past summer and which was built and furnished at a total cost of \$13,000.00 (\$4,000 of which was paid out last year). This attractive lodge consists of four bedrooms, a large living room with a fireplace, a fully equipped kitchen, dining room, bath, screened-in back porch with sink and automatic washing machine, front porch, hallway, large closets in each room, and attic storage reached by a disappearing staircase. This building is of cement block construction, plastered on the inside and painted gray, trimmed in white on the outside. The floors are cement covered with rubber tile. The window casing and sash are aluminum.

Mr. T. J. Collier of Bayboro, treasurer of Camp Don-Lee, Inc., supervised the construction of this building and is to be commended for doing such an excellent job. It is a home no pastor would hesitate to live in should the time ever come when it is needed as a pastor-director's parsonage. It would serve most adequately as a caretaker's lodge. It was a tremendous asset to our camping program this summer and will continue to be used as a staff lodge until the permanent staff lodge has been constructed.

The next most costly project was the construction of a retaining wall on the river shore next to the girls' cabin unit at a cost of \$3,000.00. This wall was built to protect one of the girls' cabins which was seriously threatened by the erosion of the river bank. High tides and hurricanes the past few years had almost washed this cottage into the river and soon would have destroyed it. A twelve-foot high retaining wall, one hundred and twenty feet long, was constructed around this cottage. The wall was built of four-inch thick creosote lumber backed up by creosote piling driven into the ground eight feet apart. The wall was tied to creosote piling driven into the bank near the cabin by means of large guy-wire cables. Heavy sheets of metal were bolted to the piling to secure each section of the wall. While this was a costly project and perhaps could have been avoided had the cabin been built further from the river shore, the cabin now has been permanently secured, at least for many years to come, against the onslaughts of repeated hurricanes.

The third most expensive project and one which brought great pleasure to our camping program the past summer was the construction of a new 300 ft. pier on the river front which cost \$1,000.00. Built to replace the very small pier that was destroyed by hurricane "Barbara" in the fall of 1953, this attractive pier, six feet wide with a 11 foot by 16 foot bulkhead at the end, was constructed of two-inch thick cypress lumber. It proved to be a favorite place for fishing as well as a gathering place for cabin units.

Other improvements at a cost of \$1,500.00 consisted of painting the dining lodge, screening the back porch of the kitchen, sowing grass around the swimming



pool, installing an outdoor light at the staff lodge, making certain improvements on sewer system, making certain minor repairs to the buildings and equipment, and purchasing some new equipment.

Additional expenses incurred the past year include director's salary, \$1,000.00; insurance, \$525.00; and miscellaneous items, \$317.00. Total disbursements were \$16,241.97. A complete audit report will be published in the conference journal.

Future plans call for the construction of a combination garage-workshop-storage-crafts building. Plans have already been drawn for this building, which is to be constructed in time for use next summer. Other buildings to be erected as the money is available are fellowship-assembly lodge, health lodge, staff lodge, and kitchen staff lodge.

It is imperative that we complete this construction as early as possible to take care of our rapidly expanding camping program. To this end we urge every local church to pay in full its apportionment for Camp Don-Lee. It is obvious now that one camp can never take care of our camping needs and that we should begin developing a second campsite at the earliest possible moment.

We are most fortunate in being able to secure Rev. J. Robert Regan, Jr., as our part-time camp director. Under his capable leadership we are confident that our camping program will continue to grow both in numbers and in quality of work done.

## COLLEGE BOARD OF VISITORS

The Board has visited Greensboro, Louisburg, and High Point Colleges, spending at least a day on each campus and conferring with administrative officers, faculty and representative students.

We believe that the colleges are making a real effort to provide education which is distinctly Christian. This, of course, is no simple objective and requires continual study and effort. We find that the college leaders are working at this problem and believe that the major contribution of our board lies in stimulating and sharing in such continuing restudy.

As a result of consultations with the trustees of Louisburg College, a chair of Town and Country Work has been established at that institution, and C. W. Goldston is serving as the professor. While minimum support for this chair has been secured, it is important that additional resources be found in order that the work may be strengthened and expanded into a department of the college.

At all the institutions, through the help of the United College Appeal, good progress is being made in improvements and expansion of physical plants. It is important that these funds be entirely raised in order that the projected programs may be completed. There are other needs for physical construction which are not provided for under the United College Appeal. Perhaps the most immediate of these is for a gymnasium at Greensboro College, which is now seriously limited in its physical education program. Our colleges face two other definite problems to which serious consideration should be given:

First, salaries at these institutions are quite low as compared to those at state schools. This board is, in fact, surprised at the caliber of faculty which our colleges have been able to maintain in spite of this differential. Continuing efforts must be made to make available additional resources in order to enable the colleges to secure and keep best possible personnel.

It is evident that at least for the next two decades a rapidly increasing number of young people will be seeking college educations, and Methodism must do its part to provide the opportunity for this. This raises a question of overall education strategy for North Carolina Methodism: shall we undertake to provide these enlarged opportunities by increasing the size of our present institutions, or place our emphasis on small schools which would provide excellent education of a distinctive kind? If the latter, does this present us with the challenge to establish additional schools? To this question the best thinking of our conferences should be directed.

The Western North Carolina Conference at its recent session constituted a committee to work with this board. We hope that as a result of experience this will develop into a joint enterprise of the two conferences.

The facilities of the Foundation office and the energies of the director and staff have been used to make vocal these four phases of the work. The results are encouraging. Great interest is expressed wherever the cause is presented. Enrollment in our colleges is increased over last year, and more than \$300,000 has been paid on U. C. A. pledges and \$203,000 paid on College Sustaining Fund for operational costs.

Encouraging as the response is, it is most important that our people become aware of the crisis we face in our schools and colleges. We have enrolled in our Methodist colleges approximately one-fifth of all the students of North Carolina, and we are having to finance these colleges on a shoe-string support as compared to an average appropriation of \$375 per student per year at all state supported educational institutions. This does not include appropriations made for buildings and improvements.

Our Methodist people must get this heavily upon their hearts and more liberally support these institutions with their money, and send their children and their prayers to these schools in order that the church may do a good job of training for service in the church and in the Kingdom.

Every dormitory room in these colleges should be occupied, preferably with Methodist young people.

Every church should have a scholarship of \$200 or more for worthy students, who cannot go without some financial aid.

Churches and sub-districts should acquaint our young people with what we have to offer them at our Methodist colleges.

If our Methodist homes and churches will get their fine young people committed to Christ and send them to us, our Methodist colleges will get them fitted for service in His Kingdom.

The colleges that make up the Foundation are Brevard, Duke, Greensboro, High Point, and Louisburg. These are your colleges. You are urged to support them with your money now, and to include them in your wills, and thereby insure your continuing support.

## METHODIST STUDENT CENTER

GREENVILLE, N. C.

The program of the Wesley Foundation at East Carolina College has been planned and carried out during the past year within the Program Emphases set by our Methodist Student Movement, 1954. Our specific objectives have been to lead our students to realize their place in the church and to place the message, the program, and the service of the church at the center of their lives. Our theme was that of the MSM Regional Conference held at Lake Junaluska the previous summer: "The Church for Youth doth Wait." Our aim has been to help our students find for themselves, under sympathetic guidance, a sure basis for their Christian faith; to learn the way of Christian discipline; to become a part of the church and its program of evangelism; to answer the call of God to service.

Our worship, in small and large groups; our vesper-discussions; Bible study, program of recreation, and all phases of the program have centered around the theme for the year. Our program of evangelism, carried out through twelve commissions, made contact with every Methodist student, through personal visitation, special notes and invitations, and letters from the director; the Wesley Foundation bulletin, published by the students, and carefully planned social events. Making our Student Center "a home away from home," personal conferences by the director with students, and an atmosphere of friendliness and Christian fellowship, have been a large part of this program of evangelism.

Twenty students attended a class in church membership, conducted by the director during Lent, and one of the three non-members of the church assumed the vows of membership in his home church. Three students and the director attended the Regional MSM Conference at Lake Junaluska. Four students attended the National MSM Conference in Lawrence, Kansas, held during Christmas holidays; two students and the director attended the retreat for conference student leaders at Camp New Hope. Our Wesley Foundation entertained a conference of the N. C. MSM District No. 1 in October.

Our WF Council worked in a splendid way to plan and guide the program of the Center during the year. The students came into closer fellowship with the church, and to a deeper appreciation of the place of the church in their lives. The Wesley Choir sang for evening worship every Sunday night. Members of WF Council met every Wednesday morning at 7:00 o'clock for prayer and meditation, followed by a breakfast of buns and coffee.

We adopted Ewha College, Korea, as a fellow-college. Two large boxes of clothing, valued at \$118.00 (postage \$9.21) and \$50.00 were sent to this college. \$16.00 was sent through MCOE to Korea. Fifty books were collected and sent to Anatolia College, Salonika, Greece, where a former WF student was teaching on a Fulbright scholarship. \$240,181 was paid by students in pledges, \$97.24 freewill offerings—giving our students training in systematic giving through the church. \$30.00 was given to the local church school. \$50.00 was contributed to the Inter-Religious Council at East Carolina College.

A member of our college faculty attended the Conference on Religion in Higher Education, held at Montreat in June. He was selected and his expenses at the Conference paid by the local committee for the Student Center.

The director has been active in the program of the local church. She taught the Bible study—"Jeremiah"—for the Woman's Society of Christian Service of Jarvis Memorial and St. James combined, for Jurisdictional credit. She also gave this Bible course for the chapter of Kings Daughters in Greenville, and a resume for one of the women's clubs. She is secretary of Spiritual Life in the local Woman's Society, and leader of a prayer group in the Jarvis Memorial Church. She assisted the MYF in setting up a course in Bible study and began and closed the period of study which lasted during Lent. This past summer she taught the course "Jesus' Teachings Concerning Women" in the Lincoln Leadership School of the WSCS at Frankfort, Ky., which was an inter-racial school; was a Resource Person at the Southeastern Juris-

diction School of Missions, WSCS, at Lake Junaluska, and attended the N. C. Conference WSCS School of Missions at Duke University.

Enrollment at East Carolina College was: fall quarter, 2,213; winter, 2,095; spring, 1,957. Methodist enrollment 554: men 231, women 323. Freshmen, 177. Sophomores and upper classmen, 377.

419 students made a total of 5,892 visits to the Student Center during the year.

The counselor held 709 personal conferences with students.

179 students attended the class for students, taught by the director, in the local church school, most of them regularly when on campus for week-ends.

82 students of other denominations have visited the class; 9 have attended from colleges outside of Greenville when at home on week-ends, making a total of 270 students attending the class. 30 out-of-town visitors have brought the total attendance for the year to 300.

One of our students who was graduated from East Carolina last May entered Scarritt College for Christian Workers, Nashville, Tennessee, in September to begin graduate study for full-time Christian service. She has been given an educational grant under the Woman's Division of Christian Service, and accepted by the Regional Committee as a candidate for the office of Deaconess.

As we look back over the year we feel that we have reason to thank God and to take courage as we face the opportunity ahead in our student program on the campus of East Carolina College.

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### NORTH CAROLINA PASTORS' SCHOOL AND CHRISTIAN CONVOCATION

The 1954 session of the North Carolina Pastors' School and Christian Convocation was held at Duke University, Durham, North Carolina, during the days of June 8-11, 1954, under the sponsorship of The Divinity School of Duke University, The North Carolina Pastors' School, and the Department of In-Service Training of the Methodist Church. Careful preparations were made by the Board of Managers in collaboration with Dean James Cannon of the Divinity School and the Convocation Committee. Dr. J. Richard Spann, director of the Department of In-Service Training, gave valuable assistance in the selection of the faculty. The class enrollment was 508. Several hundred others attended the special lectures and the night preaching services. Perhaps the outstanding feature of this service was the attractive variations in the program.

The Convocation preacher was Dr. Pierce Harris of the First Methodist Church of Atlanta, Georgia, who gave a series of messages on the theme "Impressions." The James A. Gray Lectures were delivered by Dr. Henry P. Van Dusen of Union Theological Seminary, New York, whose subject was "Spirit, Son and Father: a Re-Examination of the Christian Faith in the Light of the Holy Spirit." Daily chapel services were conducted by Bishop Costen J. Harrell, who used the theme, "Our Quest for the Living God."

The courses offered were: "Pastoral Counseling," by Dr. Oren H. Baker, Dean of Colgate-Rochester Divinity School; "Christian Ethics and Contemporary Problems," by Dr. Waldo Beach of the Divinity School at Duke; "Doctrinal Preaching," by Dr. Andrew W. Blackwood, Jr., pastor of Northminster Presbyterian Church, Columbus, Ohio; "Ministering to an Industrial Community," by Dr. Kermit Eby of the University of Chicago; "The Vacation Church School," by Mrs. Edith Willis Reed, Director of Children's Work, Western North Carolina Conference.

The 1955 school will be held during the period June 7-10, and plans are already being made for another good school. Dean Cannon has announced that the Gray lecturer for 1955 will be Dr. George Hedley, chaplain and professor of sociology at Mills College, Oakland, California. The Convocation preacher will be Dr. James T. Cleland, professor of preaching, The Divinity School, Duke University.

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### APPROVED SUPPLY PASTORS' SCHOOL FOR 1954

With an enrollment double that of the year before, and almost four times as many students as attended in 1952, the Supply Pastors' School of 1954 was declared to be outstandingly successful. Students came from twelve Conferences and represented eleven states. Thirteen instructors were used to teach the required books listed in the 1952 Discipline in both Course I, for men coming into Conference membership, and Course II, for men who are supply pastors. The entire school was planned in accordance with the requirements set up by the Department of In-Service Training of the General Board of Education, Dr. J. Richard Spann, director. Assisting in the advance preparation and in the promotion of the school were members of the Approved Supply



Pastor's School Committee, composed of Dean James Cannon, Dr. A. J. Walton and Dr. McMurry S. Richey. The registrars and other officers of the Boards of Ministerial Training and Qualifications of the several conferences involved gave full co-operation in publicizing the school, and assisting a number of men in their plans to attend. Bishops Garber and Harrell and the district superintendents of the conferences in North Carolina, South Carolina, and Virginia gave excellent support to this project.

Members of the faculty were: Leon Couch, Edgar B. Fisher, W. S. Fitzgerald, O. Kelley Ingram, Barney Jones, William R. Locke, Emmett K. McLarty, H. E. Myers, W. B. Petteway, J. H. Phillips, McMurry S. Richey, Gilbert T. Rowe, and John J. Rudin, II.

In addition to the classwork, a worship service was conducted daily in Duke Chapel with one of the supply pastors presiding and another leading meditation. The music was under the leadership of Reverend E. E. McLarty and Mrs. Maloie B. Lee. Special events included a reception at the University House, a trip through the Liggett and Myers factory, a tour of the Duke campus and Duke Homestead, a picnic in the Duke forest, and a "Fun and Frolic" party held in the Engineering Building on the closing night.

Dr. McMurry B. Richey, professor of the Philosophy of Christian Education of the Divinity School at Duke, has been named Dean of the Supply School for 1955.

## METHODIST BOARD OF PUBLICATION, INC.

In some respects, the fiscal year ending August 31, 1954, has been for the Methodist Board of Publication, Inc., one of the best in recent years. Subscriptions to the North Carolina Christian Advocate have been perhaps at an all-time high, with around 29,000 copies as the weekly average. Advocate income totaled \$55,536.26, plus \$1,935.77 from endowment funds, making a grand total of \$57,472.03. Income from job work grossed \$94,076.08, making a total from both sources of \$149,612.34. Net income from the year's operation amounted to \$8,415.48, plus income from the endowment, which brings the net profit of the year to \$10,351.25. Advocate income averaged about \$2.00 per subscription, while the cost was about \$2.15 a subscription. The difference was made up by the job department.

During the year many churches sent the Advocate to every family, ranging in size from Main Street Church, Gastonia, with 728 subscriptions, and Rich Hill Church on the Warrenville Charges, with eleven families. Many other churches had large subscription lists. However, many hundreds of churches are still doing little to promote the circulation of the Advocate among the members. This, we believe, is bad both for the church and for the Advocate. Informed church members are loyal church members. An investment of three cents a week for each family in the church will bring the inspiring story of North Carolina Methodism into the homes of our people, will keep our members abreast of the times so far as their church is concerned. The Board therefore, appeals to official boards of our churches to consider some means of including the Advocate in the plans of the church.

The Board requests that January and February be designated as Advocate Months. It, however, urges pastors and laymen in churches where subscription lists are low to begin early in the Conference year to promote the Advocate.

The North Carolina Christian Advocate is about to celebrate its 100th anniversary. The North Carolina Conference in 1855 authorized the publication of a Conference organ, and the first issue appeared in January, 1856. The board requests both the Western North Carolina and the North Carolina Conferences to give proper recognition of the Advocate's centennial at their 1955 sessions and that the board be authorized to proceed on a fitting celebration in early January, 1956.

The terms of J. N. Hackney of the North Carolina Conference and Dr. H. G. Allen of the Western North Carolina Conference expire at Conference this year. The board at its annual meeting September 20, 1954, nominated Mr. Hackney and Dr. Allen to succeed themselves and requests their re-election by their respective Conferences. Dr.

H. C. Smith, a member of the board from the North Carolina Conference, resigned at the board's last annual meeting and the board nominated Rev. O. K. Ingram to fill the unexpired term of Dr. Smith, and requests his election by the North Carolina Conference.

The following officers were elected at the annual meeting: president, A. J. Hobbs; vice-president, W. B. Hall; secretary, T. C. Hoyle, Sr.; additional members of the executive committee; C. E. Jordan, L. W. Routh, and Wilson O. Weldon; editor and manager, C. W. Robbins; associate editor-manager, W. R. Thompson.

## INTER-CONFERENCE COMMISSION ON STUDENT RELIGIOUS WORK (WESLEY FOUNDATION)

During the past year the commission suffered a great loss in the death of the chairman, Dr. W. A. Stanbury. This able and consecrated man had been associated with the commission since its beginning, and his influence will live on for many years. It will not be possible to replace him, but his work with Methodist students on the several college campuses in the State of North Carolina will continue to receive stimulation from the unfading power of Dr. Stanbury's thought and labor.

Perhaps the outstanding accomplishment in the past year was the employment of a part-time director of student work. Reverend J. Robert Regan, Jr., a graduate of the Divinity School of Duke University of the class of 1952, has recently assumed his duties. He also serves as director of camping for the North Carolina Conference Board of Education. These two responsibilities will not conflict, and it is expected that the student work will be competently directed.

Credited Wesley Foundations continue to operate at Chapel Hill, State and Meredith Colleges in Raleigh, the Woman's College in Greensboro, and Duke University in Durham. Through the collaboration of the Woman's Society of Christian Service of the North Carolina and Western North Carolina Conferences, part-time workers have served at Appalachian State Teachers College, Boone, and East Carolina College, Greenville. Small appropriations have been granted to the work at the following places: Davidson College, Davidson; Catawba College, Salisbury, and Western Carolina Teachers College, Cullowhee.

A new opportunity has opened up within recent months on the Wake Forest College campus. More than 200 Methodist students are now enrolled at Wake Forest, and through the co-operation of the Duke Foundation a worker is giving part-time service, and a Methodist Student Fellowship has been organized. When Wake Forest is moved to Winston-Salem, it is expected that a minimum of 500 Methodist students will be enrolled. This will present a challenge and an opportunity which this commission and the two Annual Conferences cannot ignore.

Because of the financial help from the two Annual Conferences of this state, plans for student buildings are being developed at Woman's College, State and Duke. The continued support of the Conferences will be needed for the remaining years of the present quadrennium in order to make these buildings possible. The construction of the building at Woman's College is expected to begin at an early date. No time has been set for beginning work at the other two places. The treasurers of the building fund at the three institutions have reported to the commission regarding the handling of the building account.

Two State Student Conferences have been planned for the near future. The first one will be held in the First Methodist Church in Salisbury, with Catawba and Livingston co-operating, during the days of October 22-24, 1954. The second one is scheduled for a weekend in February, 1955.

One of the significant trends to which attention is called is the increased interest of college administrators and faculty in the student religious work. Without exception

the colleges are giving full support to what Methodism is now doing, and must continue to do, through an ever expanding program.

Within the next three to five years, Wesley Foundations must be established at a number of institutions where nothing has been done heretofore. We cannot afford to neglect our Methodist young people during their college years, and it is an established fact that Methodists are represented in every student body in the state.

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**RESOLUTIONS**

**CONCERNING TWO NEW DISTRICTS**

In view of the increased number of pastoral charges, the continuing need for more churches in unchurched areas and the ever-enlarging program of Methodism in the North Carolina Conference, the Conference Committee on Survey and Long Range Planning recommends that beginning with the Conference year 1954-55 two new districts be formed, bringing the number of districts to nine. To set up these two districts, the Committee also recommends that equity in district parsonages of the several charges throughout the Conference be settled by the following plan: That the Conference Treasurer be directed to pay out of the surplus in the District Superintendents' Fund the sum of \$10,000 as a down payment for each of the two new district parsonages. This payment shall constitute a final settlement for those charges placed in the new districts for any equity they may have had in other district parsonages; and, also, that such payment would constitute the equity of any charge placed in any other district in the Conference and be its fair share of equity in the district parsonage of the district in which it is placed.

**CONCERNING ANNUITY CLAIM FOR R. L. VICKERY, SR.**

In keeping with paragraph 1617, section 5, of the 1952 Discipline, which reads: "If retirement takes place before attainment of age sixty-five, for other reasons than personal disability, the right to make an annuity claim from the time of retirement until the ministerial member attains that age shall be granted upon recommendation of the Committee on Conference Relations and a three-fourths vote of the Annual Conference."

It is thus recommended that the North Carolina Annual Conference, on this date, October 30, 1954, grant R. L. Vickery, Sr., now retired, the right to make an annuity claim during his years of retirement until he reaches age of sixty-five, at which time he may automatically become a conference claimant.

## CONCERNING RUFUS MOSELEY, DECEASED

On Sunday evening, September 26, the beloved Rufus Moseley finished his work among us and entered joyously into the new Jerusalem. Brother Rufus, as he was known to the multitudes who heard him gladly, left behind him a mark of influence on The North Carolina Conference that cannot be easily measured; nor will it soon be ended. The wide distribution of his book, *Manifest Victory*, the story of his quest and testimony—the attendance of our ministers and laity at his retreats, and his enriching presence in the local churches has blessed our lives.

Rufus Moseley was educated at the finest of our American and European universities. The highest degrees and scholastic honors were bestowed upon him. He was a gifted teacher and scholar. But at the beginning of a distinguished career at the turn of the century, he underwent a stirring religious experience that changed his sphere of influence. His, thereafter, was the task of ministering to humanity at the lowest plane of suffering and need. He was always obedient to the Spirit, becoming the spiritual advisor to the humble and the great. E. Stanley Jones often referred to him as "the most Christ-like man I've ever known." He called no man to be his disciple—he urged all men to become followers of Jesus Christ.

In a sense, Rufus Moseley was God's troubadour, a Francis of Assisi to our age. But there was also a courage and conviction that he made a tower of strength and a giant of courage in a time of need. He was mystic, not in the seclusion of the cloister, but in the marketplace, on the crowded city street, in the little church by the side of the road, and in the stately cathedral. He came always like a ray of nature's beautiful sunlight to tell us of the love of God.

Rufus Moseley had a great faith in the mission of The Methodist Church. He reminded us that we were not simply followers of Wesley, but that we were to follow the one whom Wesley followed. He believed that if Methodists would dedicate their vast resources completely to Jesus that we could claim the world for the Kingdom of God.

Be it resolved that this conference express its gratitude to Almighty God for this good life, giving thanks for its continuing influence among us, multiplying its blessings by the contagion of goodness and light.

We have examined the books and financial records of Mr. M. J. Cowell, Treasurer of the

NORTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE, SE. J., OF THE METHODIST CHURCH,  
RALEIGH, NORTH CAROLINA

for the 1953-54 Conference Year ended October 31, 1954, and submit herewith our report, consisting of the exhibits and schedules enumerated in the foregoing index, together with the following related comments:

#### ORGANIZATION HISTORY

It was recommended by the Commission on World Service and Finance, and passed by the Annual Conference during its 1953 session, that a central treasurer's office be established to handle all funds of the Conference and to act as treasurer of the various boards and committees of the Conference, the new treasurer to take office effective November 1, 1953. All funds would be transmitted to him instead of the treasurers of the various funds of the Conference. The central treasurer would make proper distribution of the moneys forwarded to him in accordance with the approved report of the Commission on World Service and Finance, or upon proper authorization of the respective board.

This report covers the operations of the Central Treasurer's office in his capacity as Treasurer of the Conference and also as Treasurer of certain individual funds, boards, or committees comprising the Conference Treasurer's office.

#### FINANCIAL POSITION AND OPERATIONS

Exhibit "A," Fund Balance Sheet, presents in detail the financial position of the various funds, and of the boards and committees, the funds of which are handled in the Central Treasurer's office.

The income and expense or distribution of the funds, boards and committees are shown in summary form in Exhibit "B," Income, Expense or Distribution, and Fund Balance, and in detail in Schedules 1 through 11, which present the transactions of the individual funds, boards and committees.

The following is a comparison by districts of the apportionments and income for the year:

#### SCOPE OF EXAMINATION

Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances, some features of which are referred to in the outline that follows on specific items.

Cash on deposit was confirmed directly with the banks. Recorded cash receipts were traced to their subsequent deposit in the bank, and disbursements were audited by examination of cancelled checks and tests of paid invoices. Income from districts was confirmed directly with the ministers of the various charges, and the distribution was verified by reference to the report of the Commission on World Service and Finance

for the 1953 and 1954 sessions of the Annual Conference, and by reference to proper authorization from the various boards of the Conference.

Investments of the Treasurer and the various boards and funds were inspected during our examination.

Cash receipts in transit represent 1953-54 collections received by the Treasurer subsequent to the balance sheet date and were set up from deposits in the bank accounts and apportionments payable were set up from disbursements subsequent to the balance sheet date and by reference to proper authorizations for the distribution of 1953-54 collections.

#### CERTIFICATE

In our opinion, the accompanying balance sheet and related statement of income, expense or distribution, and fund balance present fairly the financial position of the North Carolina Conference, SE. J., of The Methodist Church, M. J. Cowell, Treasurer, at October 31, 1954, and the results of operations for the 1953-54 Conference Year then ended.

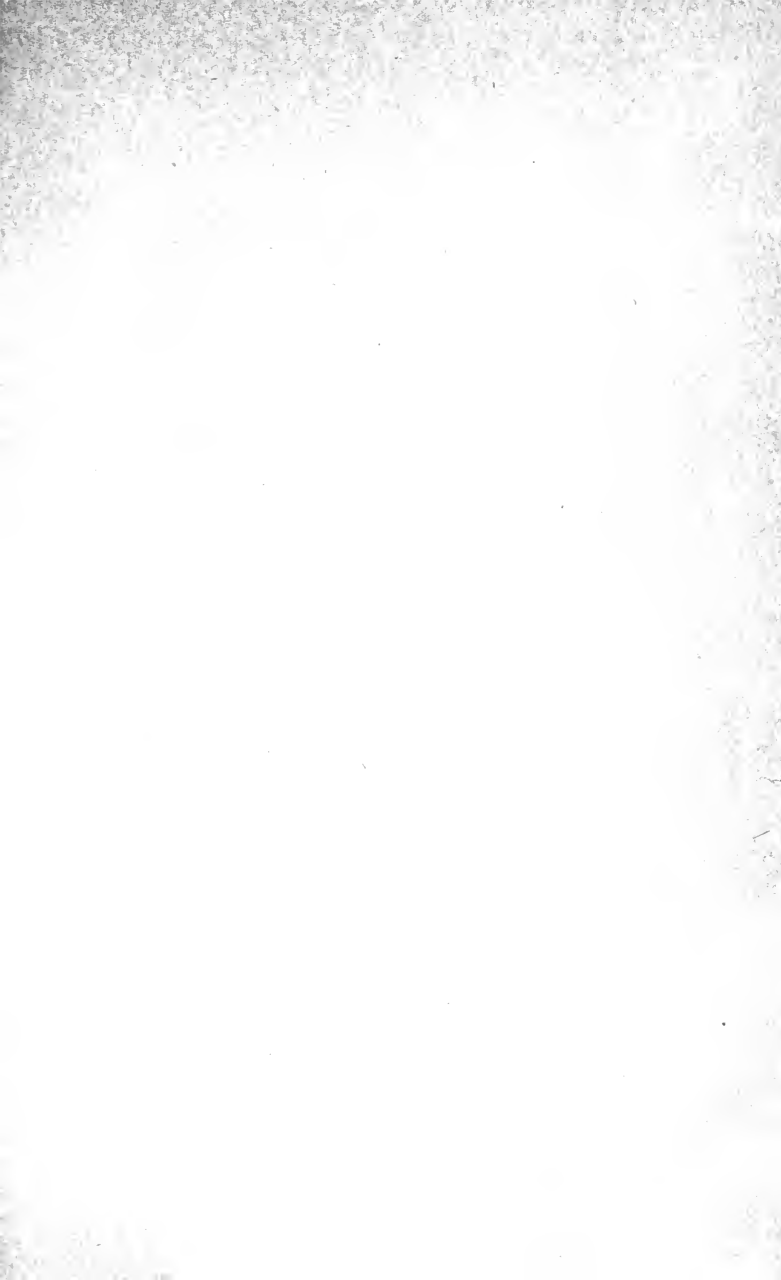

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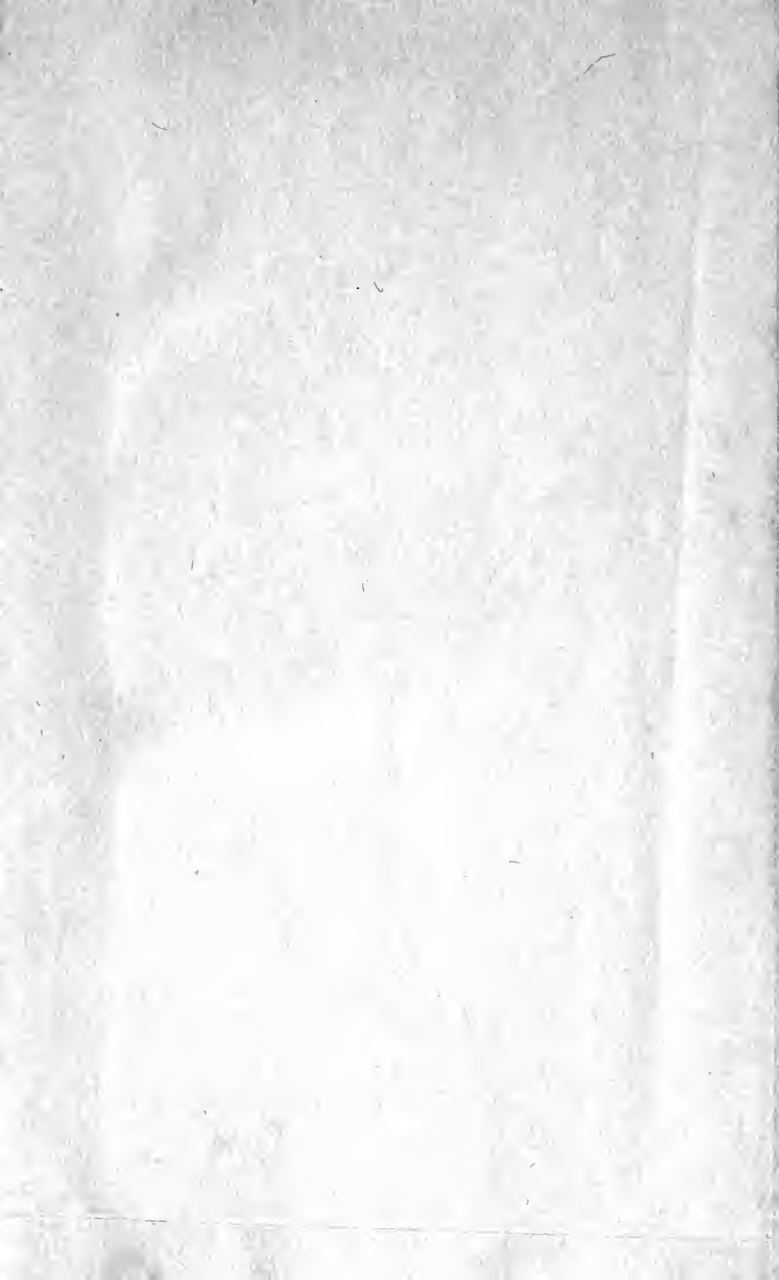














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
