HISTORICAL STATEMENT

The North Carolina Conference was set off from the Virginia Conference in May, 1836, and in 1850, and again in 1870, North Carolina territory in the South Carolina Conference was transferred to this Conference. In 1890 North Carolina territory in the Holston Conference and in the Virginia Conference, except that beyond the Chowan River, was transferred to the North Carolina Conference, and the Conference was divided into the North Carolina and Western North Carolina Conferences. In 1894 the remaining North Carolina territory in the Virginia Conference was transferred to the North Carolina Conference.

The North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Church was composed of the North Carolina Conference of the former M. E. Church, South, and parts of the North Carolina Conference of the former Methodist Protestant Church and the Blue Ridge-Atlantic Conference of the former Methodist Episcopal Church. The former Methodist Episcopal Church gave to the North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Church 9 preachers, 11 charges and 1,837 members; the former Methodist Protestant Church 23 preachers, 20 charges and 9,152 members; the former Methodist Episcopal Church, South, 273 preachers, 226 charges and 132,735 members.

Rules of Order and Procedure for the North Carolina Annual Conference of The Methodist Church

I. RULES OF ORDER

1. Robert's Rules of Order shall apply to any situation not covered by these Rules.
2. No member who has the floor may be interrupted except for a breach of order, a misrepresentation, to direct the attention of the Conference to the fact that time has arrived for a special order, or to raise a very urgent question of high privilege.
3. No member shall speak a second time on the same question if any member who has not yet spoken desires the floor, nor more than twice on the same subject under the same motion, nor longer than ten minutes unless his time shall be extended by the Conference, except as provided in Rule 4.
4. When the report of a committee is under consideration and when all have spoken who desire to do so, or when (and after) the previous question has been ordered, the chairman and/or duly authorized member or members presenting the committee's report (and the minority report if there be one) shall be entitled to speak before the vote is taken.
5. A member claiming the floor at any time for what he believes is a very urgent question of high privilege, shall be allowed to indicate briefly the nature of the question, and if it be adjudged by the chair to be such, he may proceed at his pleasure, or until the chairman judges he has exhausted his privilege.
6. Voting shall be by a show of hands unless otherwise ordered by the Conference. A "yea" and "nay" vote, if taken, shall be by written ballot, which result will be published in the Conference Journal. A count vote may be ordered on call of any member supported by one-fifth of the members present and voting, in which case the delegates shall rise from their seats and stand while they are counted.

II. ORGANIZATION

1. The Secretary: The secretary of the Annual Conference shall be elected quadrennially, at the first session of the Conference after the meeting of the General Conference; and on nominations arising from the floor.
2. Assistant Secretaries: The secretary shall nominate his assistants and the Conference shall elect.
3. Statisticians: There shall be a conference statistician and an assistant statistician. The statistician shall be elected quadrennially at the first session after the meeting of the General Conference. The assistant statistician shall be elected annually upon nomination by the statistician.
4. The Conference Stenographer: The conference secretary shall employ the conference stenographer.
5. Compensation: The Commission on World Service and Finance shall determine, subject to the approval of the Conference, the compensation given officers for their services and also the method and amount for meeting expenses of said officers. The conference treasurer shall pay these amounts.
6. Boards, Commissions, and Committees: The Bishop and his Cabinet shall determine the size of and nominate the members of all boards, commissions, and committees authorized by the General Conference, the Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference, and this Annual Conference, except in those cases in which the Discipline directs otherwise. The recommendations and nominations shall be subject to the approval of the Conference.

III. REPORTS AND RESOLUTIONS

1. All reports and resolutions presented to the Conference shall be written (typewritten if possible) in triplicate. Two copies shall be in the hands of the conference secretary before the report or resolution shall be read to the Conference for consideration.

2. Any amendment offered to any paper, and all motions must be in writing and placed in the hands of the conference secretary immediately following its presentation.

IV. LAY DELEGATES TO THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE

1. Lay delegates, regular and reserve, from the pastoral charges to the Annual Conference shall be elected by the Quarterly Conference at least forty-five days prior to the session of the Annual Conference.
2. Each district superintendent shall complete the list of lay delegates to the Annual Conference, from his district, at least forty-five days before the Annual Conference session, and shall immediately transmit the completed list, in duplicate, to the conference secretary.
3. Substitutions for lay delegates to the Annual Conference must be made in written form provided by the conference secretary, and must be approved and signed by the district superintendent. Such substitute delegates may function only in the absence of the regular delegates.

V. PASTORS' REPORTS TO THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE: STATISTICS

1. Each pastor shall complete Table I of his annual report to the Conference, and transmit the same to the conference statistician at least two weeks prior to the opening date of the Conference.
2. Charge and church treasurers shall mail their final remittance for the current year to the conference treasurer on the second Monday preceding the opening date of the Annual Conference, and each pastor shall complete and mail Table II to the conference statistician immediately thereafter.
3. Each table of the report shall be filled out by individual churches with totals for the charge.
4. Table II shall be made out in even dollars only.
5. Tables I and II shall be printed in the Conference Journal with individual church reports and charge totals as compiled by the conference statistician from the pastors' reports.

VI. THE CONFERENCE JOURNAL

1. Editor: The conference secretary shall be charged with the responsibility of editing and making contracts for the publication of the Conference Journal, in keeping with the regulations of the General Conference and of the Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference. The editor shall have full authority to condense reports, memoirs, and other papers when necessary.
2. One complimentary copy of the Conference Journal shall be sent to each of the following: The Conference Claimants, the General Boards, the Publishing House, lay members of the Conference Boards, lay delegates to the Annual Conference, the Educational and church-related institutions of the North Carolina Conference. The conference secretary shall have discretionary authority to send copies to such other educational institutions as he may deem advisable. Six copies shall be sent to each pastor without charge. All other copies shall be sold at \$1.25 each, or single copies by mail at \$1.35 each. Monies accruing from the sale of Journal shall be deposited with the conference treasurer and credited to the Journal account.

VII. DISTRICTS

1. The number of districts shall be nine.
2. A district conference shall be held annually in each district.
3. Each pastoral charge shall elect annually two lay delegates to the district conference. These shall be in addition to those named by the Discipline as ex officio members.
4. The district and associate district lay leaders shall be elected annually by the Annual Conference on nomination of the district superintendents and the conference lay leader.
5. The district superintendent of each district shall be required to furnish to the bishop, the conference treasurer, and the conference statistician, as early in the year as

possible, an official copy of the apportionments to the charges for World Service and Conference Benevolences and the amounts accepted by the charges, also the amounts approved by the charges for the several items of ministerial support. The figures furnished the conference statistician shall be used by him in making up his report to the Conference. Two of these official copies are to be sent to the secretary of the Commission on World Service and Finance.

6. Each district superintendent, as early in the year as possible, shall furnish the bishop, the conference treasurer, and the conference statistician with a schedule of the salaries of pastors as set by the Quarterly Conferences. The figures furnished by the district superintendent to the conference statistician shall be used by him in making up his report to the Conference.
7. We call attention of the district superintendents to Paragraph 432 (1) 1952 Discipline, and state that we believe that a reasonable time for such consultation, before the appointments are to be read, could not be construed to be less than twenty-four hours.

VIII. AMENDMENTS

1. These rules of order and procedure may be amended by a two-thirds vote on the next day after a proposed amendment has been presented in writing; provided the rule fixing the number of districts may be amended by a majority vote; provided, further, a change in the number of districts may not be made later than the second morning of the Annual Conference session.

IX. WHEN THE RULES BECOME EFFECTIVE

1. These rules of order and procedure of the North Carolina Annual Conference shall become effective immediately upon passage by the vote of the majority of the Conference.

JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

FIRST DAY, AFTERNOON SESSION

Monday, June 27, 1955

Opening: The seventeenth session of the North Carolina Conference, following Unification in 1939, was convened at Hay Street Methodist Church, Fayetteville, North Carolina, Monday, June 27, 1955, at 2:00 p.m., by Bishop Paul N. Garber, resident Bishop of the Richmond Area. Hymn 402, "And Are We Yet Alive?", was sung. O. L. Hathaway, Superintendent of the Fayetteville District, led in prayer. A trio from Hay Street sang, "How Lovely Are The Messengers."

Roll Call: The Bishop called on W. C. Wilson, Conference Secretary, to call the roll of the Conference. The Secretary moved that the Registration Cards signed by the delegates become the official record of attendance for the Conference. The motion was adopted.

Our Honored Dead: The Bishop asked the question, "What ministers and ministers' wives have died during the year?" The Secretary read the names of the following: Ministers—S. E. Mercer, J. T. Draper; Ministers' Wives—Mrs. M. T. Plyler, Mrs. F. B. Brandenburg, Mrs. L. B. Pattishall. (Note: The name of Mrs. W. B. North, who died on June 24, was added later and called during the Memorial Service.)

Bar of the Conference: Graham S. Eubank, Conference host pastor, moved that the main floor of the sanctuary be made the bar of the Conference. The motion was adopted.

Program: Graham S. Eubank moved that the printed Program be the official program for the Conference. The motion was adopted.

Conference Rules: Graham S. Eubank moved that the rules of the 1954 session of the Conference become the rules for the 1955 session. The motion was adopted.

Notice of Amendment: Henry G. Ruark gave notice of an amendment to be offered to Rule 6 in the Conference Rules of Order and Procedure on Tuesday.

Statement by the Secretary: W. C. Wilson read the following statement: "The Rules of the Conference require that consideration of amendments to the Rules follow on the day after the proposal of amendment is made. Your Committee on Rules of Order and Procedure calls the attention of the Conference to proposed changes in its Report, and requests that consideration be given tomorrow, Tuesday.

"Anticipating an amendment to Rule 2, Section III, which now reads: 'any amendment offered to any paper, and all motions of more than a single sentence must be in writing and given to the Conference Secretary—your Secretary and his associates respectfully request immediate application of the amended Rule, which will read: 'any amendment offered to any paper, and all motions must be in writing and placed in the hands of the Conference Secretary immediately following its presentation.'"

Bishop Garber stated that compliance with the request is a matter of courtesy and voluntary co-operation until the Rules are actually amended.

Eighteenth Clerical Ballot: The eighteenth clerical ballot was taken.

Anniversary of the Board of Education: The anniversary of the Board of Education was observed with E. B. Fisher, president, presiding. After the singing of the hymn, "I Love Thy Kingdom, Lord," by the congregation, W. S. Potter led the evening prayer. Special music was rendered by an octette from High Point College.

C. P. Morris, executive secretary of the Board of Education, made his report. He then introduced the following members of the Conference staff, each of whom spoke briefly: Miss Elizabeth Johnson, Director of Children's Work; Herman Winberry, Director of Youth Work; John M. Mears, Director of Adult Work.

FOURTH DAY—MORNING SESSION

Thursday, June 30, 1955

Love Feast: The Annual Love Feast was held, beginning at 8:30 a.m., with F. S. Love presiding. Assisting in the service were O. W. Dowd, B. T. Hurley, J. J. Boone, W. A. Cade.

Opening: The Conference convened in regular business session at 9:30 a.m. with Bishop Garber in the chair.

Anniversary of Commission on Town and Country Work: The anniversary of the Commission on Town and Country Work was observed, with Key W. Taylor, chairman, presiding. Dan Meadows read the Scripture. The chairman introduced Mr. George A. Hales of Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, who led the prayer. Hymn singing was conducted by E. G. Purcell, Jr., with Henry B. Lewis at the piano. Walter Anderson introduced Dr. John R. Church of Winston-Salem. A solo was rendered by Lewis A. Dillman. Dr. Church preached on the theme, "The Methodist Revival, Past, Present, and Future." Committee on Memorials to General Conference: J. V. Early, chairman of the Conference Committee on Memorials to the General Conference, presented Robert L. Jerome, secretary, who gave the report of the committee. In this first report, the seven memorials listed below were brought before the Conference. The subject matter and committee action on each is indicated. Memorial No. 7 amended: R. W. Prichard moved that the words "intoxicating liquors" in paragraph 1 be changed to "alcoholic beverages." The amendment was adopted. Henry G. Ruark moved that the word "instructed" in paragraph 2 be changed to "requested." The amendment was adopted. Memorial No. 7, as amended, was adopted by the Conference (See Memorials, Section IV, Part 5).

Commission on World Service and Finance: W. J. Neese reported on the outstanding station and circuit charges in the Conference for 1954-55. Station: Hay Street, Fayetteville, Graham S. Eubank, pastor; Circuit: Gatesville, Henry A. Bizzell, Jr., pastor. Gurney P. Hood spoke concerning the summary of budget for the local church.

Anniversary of Historical Society: The anniversary of the Historical Society was observed, with O. L. Hathaway, president, presiding. He presented Bishop W. W. Peele, who addressed the Conference on the subject, "A Look at Eastern North Carolina Methodism." Bishop Garber paid tribute to, and expressed appreciation for the leadership and service of Bishop Peele. O. L. Hathaway gave the report of the Historical Society. It was adopted (See Reports, Section IV, Part 4). The anniversary program closed with prayer by Paul Carruth.

Result of Twenty-first Clerical Ballot: Key W. Taylor was elected an alternate delegate to the Jurisdictional Conference. This concluded the election of alternate delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference. Bishop Garber expressed his personal thanks, and those of the Conference, to Russell Harrison and all the clerical tellers for their faithful service during the election of delegates.

Question 44: "Who are left without appointment to attend school?" was asked. The answer was: (See question 44, condensed minutes)

Question 52: "What changes have been made in appointments since last Annual Conference session?" was called. The answer was: (See report of changes made in appointments between sessions. This report appears in Journal following Appointments.)

Moving Date Recommendation: It was recommended by the Cabinet

that Thursday, July 7, be moving day for all pastors in new appointments. The recommendation was adopted.

Boards of Church Buildings and Locations: V. E. Queen, secretary of the Cabinet, read the list of District Boards of Church Buildings and Locations. It was adopted.

District Committees on Ministerial Qualifications: V. E. Queen, secretary of the Cabinet, read the list of District Committees on Ministerial Qualifications. It was adopted.

Replacement: V. E. Queen, secretary of the Cabinet, read the name of Millard C. Dunn to replace B. B. Slaughter on the Board of Evangelism.

Greetings: J. Furman Herbert asked that greetings be sent to J. W. Frank, retired.

Pictorial Directory: Kelly Wilson presented resolution concerning a pictorial directory for the Conference. The resolution was adopted (See Resolutions, Section IV, Part 5).

Presentation: O. L. Hathaway presented Chaplain W. F. Meacham to the Conference.

Order of the Day Changed: A. P. Brantley moved that the order of the day set for Thursday afternoon at 4:00 o'clock, be observed at 3:00 o'clock. The change was approved by two-thirds vote of the Conference.

District Conference Records: J. K. Bostick presented the report of the Committee on District Conference Records. It was adopted (See Reports, Section IV, Part 3).

Expression of thanks to Bishop Garber: H. L. Swain moved that the Conference thank Bishop Garber for his efficient dispatch of business, and for his spirit of love and fairness to all members and delegates during this session. The motion was adopted by standing vote of the Conference.

Introduction: O. L. Hathaway introduced to the Conference Chaplain Karl L. Darkey, a member of the Northeast Ohio Conference.

Announcements: Announcements were made by C. J. Andrews.

Benediction: The morning session ended with benediction by Dr. Noland B. Harmon, Book Editor of The Methodist Church.

FOURTH DAY—AFTERNOON SESSION

Thursday, June 30, 1955

Opening: The Conference convened at 3:00 p.m. with Bishop Garber in the chair. After the hymn, "Blessed Assurance," was sung by the congregation, J. Kern Ormond led in prayer.

Order of the Day: Reconsideration of Resolution Concerning Wesley Foundation Work: Bishop Garber presented A. P. Brantley, author of the resolution presented to and adopted by the Conference during the afternoon session on Tuesday (See minutes for Tuesday afternoon). After reviewing briefly the original resolution, he offered the following substitute motion: "That the Bishops and cabinets of the North Carolina and Western North Carolina Conferences, and the Inter-Conference Commission on Student Religious Work of the two conferences be constituted as a committee to make an immediate study as to policy and administrative relationship in situations where Wesley Foundations are housed in Methodist churches. We recommend that this committee take definite steps to establish an administrative policy relative to these Wesley Foundation-Church situations; such

action to take place not later than the 1954-1955 session of the Western North Carolina Conference. We suggest that this committee look into the possibility of making the Wesley Foundation amenable to the pastor and quarterly conference of the local church."

W. M. Howard moved that the last sentence of the substitute motion be deleted. It was seconded by Leon Russell. R. I. Epps asked for an interpretation. It was given by the chair. R. G. Dawson, Leon Russell, W. L. Clegg, W. C. Wilson, J. E. Garlington, R. W. Bradshaw, Paul Carruth, C. S. Hubbard, W. N. McDonald and C. P. Morris spoke concerning the Howard amendment. The Howard amendment to the Substitute Motion was lost.

W. M. Wells moved that the suggested study committee look into the possibility of making the Wesley Foundation amenable to the Quarterly Conference; that the Substitute Motion be amended by changing the last sentence so that it will read—"We suggest that the committee look into the relationship between the Wesley Foundation Director and the local church, and all other pertinent matters." The Wells amendment to the Substitute Motion was lost.

D. D. Holt suggested that a representative of the General Board of Education be included as a member of the study committee. This was accepted by A. P. Brantley.

Brooks Patten moved to amend the Substitute Motion by including a representative from each of the Boards of Directors of the Wesley Foundations concerned. J. W. Page asked that one member of a local church where the Wesley Foundation is located be on the committee. This was accepted by Brooks Patten as a part of his amendment. The Patten amendment was then accepted by Brantley as a part of the Substitute Motion.

Henry Ruark raised the question whether, in the event the committee decided on a course of action by the 1955 session of the Western North Carolina Conference, such action would become effective without being reported to and approved by this Annual Conference. The chair ruled that no action of the committee would be binding without approval by this Conference.

Dr. B. G. Childs moved that the following words be included in the Substitute Motion—"and effective only if the Western North Carolina Conference takes similar action." This amendment was adopted.

Bishop Garber then placed the Substitute Motion offered by A. P. Brantley, as amended and with accepted changes, before the Conference. The Substitute Motion was adopted (See Resolutions, Section IV, Part 5).

Resolution: H. L. Swain presented resolution concerning Church Markers. It was adopted (See Resolutions, Section IV, Part 5).

Presentations: Bishop Garber presented Dr. Noland B. Harmon, who spoke briefly. A. R. White was also presented, and he spoke concerning Dr. Harmon's books, with particular reference to his latest, "Understanding the Methodist Church."

Question Posed: S. J. Starnes spoke concerning the present dating of the Annual Sessions of our Conference. He moved that the Conference Secretary and someone appointed by the Bishop determine the beginning date of the North Carolina Conference. The motion was adopted.

Motion to Reconsider Report of Committee on World Peace: G. C. Megill moved that the report on World Peace be reconsidered. The motion was seconded and carried. He then moved that the following words be

deleted from section 6 of the report—"That our Government recognize the Republic of China," and that the suggestion of the Honorable John Foster Dulles, Secretary of State, be used instead, "that the United Nations Charter be revised to make it universal in scope."

Albea S. Parker made a substitute motion that section 6 of the report on World Peace be deleted in its entirety. The substitute motion prevailed.

The original report, with the deletion of section 6, was adopted.

Committee on Memorials to General Conference: R. L. Jerome, secretary, gave the report of the committee. In this second report, the five memorials listed below were brought before the Conference. The subject matter and committee action on each is indicated. (1) Uniform procedure or formulae in dating the historical beginnings of the several Annual Conferences: concurrence; (2) The Wesley Foundation and the local church: concurrence by committee, non-concurrence by Conference; (3) Use of tobacco: concurrence; (4) Full clergy rights to qualified women: non-concurrence by committee, concurrence by Conference; (5) An improved record system for the Church School: concurrence (See Memorials, Section IV, Part 5).

Question 18: "Who are approved supply pastors?" was called. The answer was: Robert Lee Vickery, Jr. (This question previously called. See minutes morning session, Wednesday.)

Statement: Malloy Owen spoke concerning radio and television. He announced that "The Circuit Rider" is on every Sunday, Channel 9, Greenville.

Resolution: G. C. Megill offered a resolution concerning the United Nations. It was adopted (See Resolutions, Section IV, Part 5).

Greetings: The Conference Secretary brought greetings from several of the retired ministers. R. G. Dawson moved that the Conference Secretary write letters to all the retired members who are unable to attend the Annual Conference. The motion carried.

Committee on Resolutions: E. L. Hillman presented resolutions of appreciation expressing the gratitude of the Conference. Adopted (See Resolutions, Section IV, Part 5).

Offering: D. W. Charlton moved that an offering be taken at the evening session for the janitors of Hay Street Church. The motion carried.

Benediction: The afternoon session ended with benediction by E. L. Hillman.

FOURTH DAY—EVENING SESSION

Thursday, June 30, 1955

Opening: The Conference convened at 7:00 p.m. with Bishop Garber in the chair. The hymn, "Take Time To Be Holy," was sung by the congregation. Graham Eubank read the Scripture. The evening prayer was offered by Clyde Boggs. Hay Street Choir rendered the anthem, "Almighty God of Our Fathers."

Bishop Garber spoke to the Conference concerning the program of evangelism.

Ordination Sermon: Dr. Noland B. Harmon, Book Editor of the Methodist Church, preached the Ordination sermon, using the theme, "Ye Have Not Chosen Me, But I Have Chosen You, And Ordained You."

Service of Ordination: The Conference Secretary called the names of those to be ordained deacons. They were ordained by Bishop Garber. (For the names of those ordained deacons, see Question 31, Condensed Minutes.)

The Conference Secretary called the names of those to be ordained elders. They were ordained by Bishop Garber, assisted by the District Superintendents, Dr. Nolan B. Harmon, Graham S. Eubank, and Clyde S. Boggs. (For the names of those ordained elders, see Question 33, Condensed Minutes.)

The hymn, "Rock of Ages," was sung by the congregation.

Question 53: "Where are the preachers stationed for the ensuing year?" was called. Bishop Garber read the appointments (See Appointments).

Benediction: After one stanza of "God Be With You Till We Meet Again" was sung, Bishop Garber pronounced the benediction, and the 1955 session of the Annual Conference was concluded.

SEYMOUR ESMOND MERCER

1906-1954

The earthly pilgrimage of Seymour Esmond Mercer began in a parsonage in Red Springs, N. C., November 1, 1906, and ended in a parsonage at Zebulon, N. C., November 22, 1954. He filled to the full these forty-eight years with rich living,



faithful preaching, loving service, and a shining example of unusual fortitude and sunniness in the midst of almost constant physical suffering. Never strong physically, being a victim of rheumatoid arthritis since five years of age, yet he toiled courageously and redemptively without murmur or complaint. Indeed, rarely, if ever, has it been given unto us to witness in a life more of consecration and determination to live and serve than that possessed by our friend and brother.

S. E., as he was known to his friends, received a good ministerial heritage at birth. His father, the Reverend Saul Erastus Mercer, a leading member of our Conference, who died in 1928, served as a pastor, college president, and presiding elder. His mother, Mrs. Ethel Waldo Thompson Mercer, who died in 1924, was a person of rare Christian graces and many labors of love, though a total invalid for fourteen years before her

death. His maternal grandfather, the Reverend J. E. Thompson, was an honored member of our Conference for a long number of years. Other kinsmen have been, or are now, members of our Conference. In every manner, S. E. enhanced the splendid preaching heritage that was his!

He was licensed to preach on July 2, 1925, by the Durham District Conference, held at Fletcher's Chapel. He was admitted on trial in Edenton Street Methodist Church, Raleigh, in 1927, where his father was admitted on trial thirty years before. He was ordained a deacon in 1929 and an elder in 1931. During the twenty-seven years of his ministry, he served four pastoral charges, as follows: Elm City, 1927-1931; Stantonsburg, 1931-1936; Franklinton, 1936-1949; Zebulon-Wendell, 1949-1954. He had just begun his sixth year on the Zebulon-Wendell charge when a heart attack closed his earthly labors.

He was a good gospel preacher. His messages were of high quality, illustrated largely from the Bible, and Christ-centered. He did not waste time in the pulpit reviewing current events or in a running account of mundane chitchat. With clarity, forcefulness, and earnestness, he proclaimed the good news of God in Christ. His preaching was for a verdict—for all to accept Christ—and many there were who responded. He spoke truth in love. He denounced social evils. He was a positive foe to the degrading liquor traffic. With unusual winsomeness and attractiveness, he called sinners to repentance. His preparation was both of the heart and mind, and his hearers knew they were receiving fresh news from God.

He was an excellent pastor. His loving pastoral care greatly endeared him to his people. Though he experienced difficulty in getting in and out of his car, and up and down steps, he visited faithfully and consistently in every home of his congregations. By day and by night, he gave himself without reserve to the arduous but rewarding labors of pastoral visiting. He wanted to be with his people in all their experiences. He loved little children and neglected not the aged. Because he was a good shepherd to all, multitudes now call him blessed.

He was an efficient administrator of church affairs. Under his leadership, all Kingdom causes prospered. He gave personal and careful attention to the entire program of the church. Reports from his charges were uniformly good. He left every charge he served stronger in every way than when he went to the charge—new buildings were erected, physical properties were renovated, indebtedness was liquidated, memberships were increased, sinners were converted, and believers were strengthened in their faith and service. He labored faithfully in the fields white unto harvest; and,

at the end, when he reported his stewardship to the Lord of the harvest, he went rejoicing with his arms filled with precious sheaves.

The close friendship that S. E. and the writer sustained for each other is well known in our Conference, a friendship that stemmed from college days at Duke University—from which institution he received an A.B. degree in 1928. We were roommates in college and many times at Annual Conference sessions. We preached for each other in revival meetings and shared in each other's joys and sorrows. For over thirty years we had delightful companionship in the ministry and understanding comradeship of the heart. There were very few times, if any, during all those years that he was free of physical pain, but I never heard him complain about his infirmity or question that life was good. He always met the world with a smile, though he wore a hair shirt of suffering next to his soul. When he would get up or down, or climb or descend steps, which required the bending of joints with accompanying pain, he would always hum or whistle a tune of some great hymn, rather than give vocal expression of suffering. Even the children noticed this fact; and when one asked him why he did thus, he replied, "Sonny, it is easier to whistle than it is to grunt." What a philosophy and stewardship of suffering!

He was numbered among those who allow God to use their sufferings to His glory, their enrichment, and the inspiration of others. Their soul temples daily rise to the music of eternity. Each one of these sings,

"I will hew great windows for my soul,
 Channels of splendour, portals of release;
 Out of earth's prison walls will I hew them,
 That my thundering soul may push through them;
 Through stratas of human strife and passion
 I will tunnel a way, I will carve and fashion
 With the might of my soul's intensity
 Windows fronting immensity,
 Towering out of Time.
 I will breathe the air of another clime,
 That my spirit's pain my cease.
 That the being of me have room to grow,
 That my eyes may meet God's eyes and know,
 I will hew great windows, wonderful windows,
 measureless windows, for my soul."

On March 16, 1935, he married Miss Ruth Stanton of Stantonsburg, N. C., who survives him. She was a most capable and devoted companion in the work of the ministry, an unfailing source of inspiration, and a tower of strength to him as he worked under large physical handicaps.

Funeral services were held on November 24, 2:00 p.m., at the Zebulon Methodist Church by the writer and the Reverend E. C. Durham, with interment following at Stantonsburg, N. C. Hundreds of friends, including many of his brethren in the Conference, were present for the services.

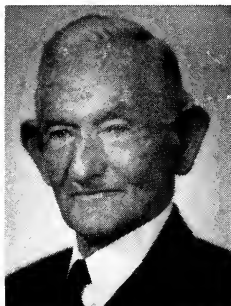

JESSE THOMAS DRAPER

1865-1954

Jesse Thomas Draper was well born. His parents, Arodi Draper and Nancy Rose Draper, were Godly people of Northampton County who knew how to train and mold the life of a beloved son. He arrived on November 12, 1865. In the humble Christian



home Jesse Thomas Draper "increased in wisdom and stature, and in favor with God and man." Throughout his life he remembered very clearly and with an undying appreciation his new birth of the spirit, which he experienced in August, 1878, at the age of 12. When he was eighteen, he made a complete dedication of his life to his Lord. Then in 1885 the voice of God came to tell him of his call to the Christian ministry. He was just an uneducated country boy, but he knew that God would lead the way in the preparation for his life's work. His faith was well founded.

After some years of study at the Jackson Academy and the Suffolk Military Academy, Brother Draper enrolled at Randolph-Macon College. Here he won his Bachelor of Arts Degree in 1890. After teaching for one year, he joined the North Carolina Conference in 1891 to begin a faithful service which was to continue un-

broken for forty-six years. He served the following appointments: Roanoke Circuit; Lewiston Mission; Youngsville; Clayton; Haw River; Hillsboro; Clinton; Whiteville; Roanoke Rapids; Roanoke Island; Troy; Raeford; Fairmont; Warren; Middleburg; Murfreesboro; Caledonia; Garysburg; Aulander.

On December 17, 1896, Brother Draper was married to Miss Annie Bridgers of Northampton County. To this union were born five children. Mary Eliza died in infancy. Others are Dr. L. M. Draper of Corpus Christi, Texas; Mrs. Norman D. Holloway of Henderson; Mrs. A. J. Ellington and Mrs. W. A. Miles, Jr., of Warrenton. They have taken their places as solid and substantial Christian citizens and are rendering fine service to God and man.

Following his retirement in 1937 he and Mrs. Draper moved to Warrenton to spend the evening hours in their little home. Here he stood ready to finish such service as he might be able to give to his Lord and to his church. During these years he gladly responded to frequent calls to teach and to preach. He loved his pastors and his District Superintendent, and enjoyed warm fellowship with them. His association with the lay people was a benediction. Day by day he was a visitor to the drug store for the meeting of the "Lily Club," a little group of which he was the center.

Brother Draper's greatness was best revealed in his relationship to God. His faith was strong; his Lord was supremely real; his love for preaching the Gospel knew no bounds. Even in retirement he made his report to the District Conference with as much enthusiasm as any active pastor. When he died on December 6, 1954, he left among his papers "a sketch," giving the basic facts of his life and ministry. Closing the sketch, he said, "The Lord has been merciful to me and mine through the years of the past, and with the Psalmist we can say, 'Bless the Lord, O my soul, and all that is within me bless His holy name.'"

To review, even in a brief way, the history and character of a life so truly great as was Mrs. North, is both an inspiration and a blessing to anyone. A little more than four score years ago, Emma Stem,

the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John H. Stem, was born December 6, 1872, in Franklin County. She was educated at Littleton College. She took special work in the Southern Conservatory of Music in Durham. She taught voice and piano in Durham and in other parts of the state.

She was married to William Burrous North on January 14, 1892. To this union was born Gladstone Kiener, Paul Henry, and Martha Lee North. The surviving children are Paul Henry North of Columbus, Ohio, and Miss Martha Lee North of Durham, and one grandson, Paul H. North, Jr. Also one brother, Major T. G. Stem, Sr., of Oxford, and one sister, Mrs. M. H. Bragg of Stem.

Dr. and Mrs. North served the church in two conferences with great acceptability and distinction. Eighteen years were spent in Missouri, and twenty-three years in the North Carolina Conference.

She slipped away quietly and peacefully on June 24, 1955 (the anniversary day of the funeral of her deceased husband), at her summer home in Brevard, N. C. The funeral service at Laurinburg was conducted by Dr. E. L. Hillman, Bishop W. W. Peele, and the Reverend H. G. Ruark, the pastor of the Laurinburg Methodist Church, on June the 26th.

Making a just and adequate appraisal of a long and useful life like our dear friend in a few brief paragraphs seems almost if not impossible.

Her gracious influence was felt in many circles. Her light shone brightest and best in the home circle. Her parsonage was more than a Christian institution of the church; it was a home for her beloved husband and children. Her guests received such a gracious welcome they were made to feel at home, away from home. It was a home where God was worshipped, loved and obeyed. But the light that shines brightest in the home circle shinest farthest away from home.

Another circle of her influence was her husband's church. She was the minister's companion who inspired him by her presence, her prayers, and her services in the organized activities and fellowship of the church societies.

Our dear, dear friend was a Christian lady of the old school. Her humility and gentleness made her great, for she was pure in thought, chaste in speech, gentle and gracious in manner, and exemplary in conduct. It was hers by Christian training in the home, in the school, and in the church. Her finest culture was the culture of the soul. Two words best express her culture and refinement, royalty and loyalty, in the best meaning of these words.

What a helper was she in all the departments of the church! The Christian religion was made contagious by her radiant personality. Her faith was not based on a hear-say religion; it was a matter of experience. She could say, I know Him in whom I believe. Her religion had an in-take and an out-let that made her life count in her large circle and community of devoted friends. She could count her friends by the scores, and the circle of her fellowship grew as the years passed. Those she loved, she loved to the end. And for this she will be long remembered.

But our beloved friend has moved out into an area of influence that is as wide as the universe, for the area of the unknown is infinitely greater than the known, and there she will continue to love and be loved by those she had lost a while. And in that God Blessed Country, she will adore, love and worship her Lord forever. Just think of a life without its earthly boundaries and limitatons! For eye hath not seen nor ear heard, neither hath it entered into the heart of man the things which God hath prepared for



them that love Him. For there we shall awake in that eternal dawn, with His likeness and be satisfied. No words of mine can express the richness and fullness of that heavenly life. She was not a denizon of this world with its earthly aims and ambitions, but rather a Christian pilgrim, seeking a better country, a fairer land, a city whose maker and builder is God. This dear itnerant and pilgrim made a most successful journey of more than four score years. From the mountain city of Brevard her spirit entered into eternal rest and peace, where the stars forever shine, where flowers never fade, where the kindred fellowships are unbroken. It takes more than age, pain, sickness, and death to end a life like this. "The stars go down to shine upon some fairer shore, and bright in heaven's jewel crown they shine forever more."

What a Blessed inheritance is hers in that land of love and light and eternal fellowship with Christ and with those she had loved and lost a while. For there is laid up for all that love Him a crown of life eternal. What treasures are there for us beyond anything of which we can think or dream. Think of the love, peace, and joy that surpass all understanding.

For those dear ones left behind, what a heritage in high ideals, in noble living, in sacrificial service? Therefore we must carry on, and do even greater things because of our blessed heritage. So we all shall feel the great responsibility to move onward and upward till we meet again. Suffice it to say in one concluding sentence that Mrs. W. B. North lived victoriously, and died triumphantly, and is safe in the heavenly Father's House of many mansions. Thrice blessed in the sight of the Lord is the death of His saints.

A LOOK AT EASTERN NORTH CAROLINA METHODISM

By BISHOP WALTER W. PEELE

An address delivered during the Anniversary of the Historical Society.

In the brief historical statement in the Journal of the North Carolina Conference is the following: "The North Carolina Conference was set off from the Virginia Conference in May, 1836, and in 1850, and again in 1870, North Carolina territory in the

South Carolina Conference was transferred to this conference. In 1890, North Carolina territory in the Holston Conference and in the Virginia Conference, except that beyond the Chowan River, was transferred to the North Carolina Conference, and the Conference was divided into the North Carolina and Western North Carolina Conferences. In 1894, the remaining North Carolina territory in the Virginia Conference was transferred to the North Carolina Conference." Since 1894 the growth of the North Carolina Conference has been a growth from within and not by the addition of new territory. From the beginning Methodism in Eastern North Carolina has been a solid, dependable, stable, and a spiritually vitalized type of Methodism. There has not been anything flashy or aggressive in its history, but a Methodism facing and moving slowly in the right direction. The conservatism of the farmer, the fisherfolk, and the farm laborer is reflected in the type of Methodism that prevailed. In the main, the people have loved the church and have



been sustained by its ministry and worship. We today have a rich heritage for which we should be truly thankful and which should lead us to a high dedication to the end that Methodism in the North Carolina Conference will be more aggressive, more vigorous, and more spiritual in the years ahead.

We are told that one star differeth from another star. To be fully aware of this difference the astronomer must survey the entire heavens. No star exists separate and apart from other stars. In like manner, to take a look at Eastern North Carolina one must glance at larger geographical units from which currents of influence flow into this particular section.

Now let us take a look.

Naval stores, forest products, and fish; cotton, corn and peas—these were the principal money crops of Eastern North Carolina for many generations. The labor for producing them, until the Emancipation Proclamation, came from an abundance of slaves. Of large plantations, there were many. Smaller farms took, to a considerable degree, the form and pattern of those larger. And under the prevailing economic and social order, there was a considerable leisure class of people, very many of whom patronized the arts and actually enriched a noble culture. The population of all of North Carolina, like that of the rising Republic, was not large; but foundations were laid for a great country, even then in being.

Incident to the Civil War and its tragic aftermath, there settled on Carolina and all of the South the severe hardships of universal poverty—poverty, that is, in everything except the magnificence of the human spirit. Many adjustments had to be made; the adjustment of former masters to their former slaves; the adjustment of former slaves to a world of whose responsibilities they were totally unaware. There were also the adjustments families had to make to losses they had sustained on the battlefield; adjustments to a sorely disrupted economy with repudiated debts and worthless currency and inflated prices; and the far-reaching adjustments in everything social and political that those who lose a war always have to make. The back of the South was broken, but its head was lifted high!

Both before and after the Civil War, it is significant that there was always and everywhere a vital Christian piety and robust faith. The Church carried the responsibility for high school and college education to a considerable degree, because the State had not yet assumed leadership in public education, and church colleges and academies far outnumbered colleges supported by the State. These attest to the vigor and vision of those who led the Church. Without this piety and faith, there is no way to estimate the

effects of the direful miseries that followed and lasted so long after the War. On the basis of this faith and in the strength of the character it sustained, our people grandly endured manifold sufferings and kept aglow their Christian assurance.

As the South began, after some decades, to re-emerge as an important region of our country, there are two key factors that marked and influenced Eastern North Carolina life. One was the flowering of the people's religion into a strong and enthusiastic church (and the Methodists were in this period far out front in membership and influence); the other was the now general growing of tobacco as a source of farm income. We do not need to regard the degree of association here, but only to recognize that featuring the recovery of Eastern North Carolina after the War, there was a very strong, sturdy, firmly established Methodist Church and there was wealth in the golden leaf of the summer's harvest. The Church kept the ideals of the people alive. Tobacco transfused their economy.

So much for the final decades of the last century.

As the new century began, what had marked the previous century's final years, gathered momentum and power. Once more there began to appear, small at first, a wealthy class. The source of this wealth was no longer only the soil or the forest or the sea. These still yielded treasure. But now our state had manufacturing—manufacturing of cotton, of furniture, of tobacco, and of farm wagons and machines. Industry was here—here with an amazing vitality. North Carolina firms won national recognition and patronage. The coming of industry began to transform our rural areas of Eastern North Carolina into thriving towns and cities, and to bring in many new residents from near and far. By the time the First World War had ended, our State could no more be spoken of as an impoverished land trailing in strength over Southern States. We had leaped to the lead and had begun to set patterns of progress in new plant products, in highways, and in public education.

Can you think back through the time when the First World War began and into the "Roaring Twenties?" People who had once had a team and carriage, now had large and pretentious motor cars. Like many other Americans in many places, they rode the tides of prosperity. They left home and began to see the world. People sold their downtown houses and built fine homes in suburbs. With many, moral standards grew lax and we, perhaps unwittingly, began to live on the surface of things. We were prosperous, but we were not vitally religious. Perhaps the period that preceded the Great Depression had been described for us by Goldsmith, when he said of Auburn, "Wealth accumulates and men decay!"

If you look back upon the years that came before the Second World War, you cannot find much convincing evidence of Christian enthusiasm. We were running, to be sure, rather well on religious momentum. When the banks were all closed, we thought we had become seriously interested in matters of the spirit, but even so, we somehow managed to keep the Church and its claims on the fringe of our lives. Our concern for its world program was rather nominal or patronizing, at best. We had very little pride in buildings where the people were called to worship or in homes where the pastor was asked to live. With the exception of a few notable buildings, mostly in the cities and in some cases to replace fire losses, not many new church buildings were erected, and almost no new parsonages at all. Few new charges were formed in the bounds of our Conference. Circuits remained large. The city pastor had to do his work without assistants. And while the church in all this period was undoubtedly deep in the peoples' heart, it would be difficult to say that the Church as such was regularly in the peoples' mind—or plans.

But something new has happened today! Something new and big! Something tremendously significant! Was it the bomb over Hiroshima? Was it the bigger bomb over Bikini? Was it the faint but terrifying rumor of biological warfare? Nerve Gas? Guided missiles? Whatever it is that has happened has happened not to eastern North Carolinians only, but to all the world. Humanity has been jolted, shocked, awakened, and even terrified into facing the realities of its present peril. This is not a sudden awakening only. It is that, but it is far more. It is the steady, inescapable dread of annihilation.

And along with the realization and urgency of this has come, thank God, a new consciousness of an adequate Resource to cope with the peril of our times. That resource, that adequate Resource, is God. Its implementation is the Church our Lord and Savior founded and against which He promised the very gates of hell cannot prevail.

Men and women are searching for an objectivity which, in an age of danger, can satisfy the longing of the heart. They want the bread of heaven because they have been starved by the aridity doled out by scientific research. What is more, men and women are universally afraid. It is always interesting to discover why faith becomes resurgent.

Sometimes persecution lies behind its resurgence. Sometimes suffering. Sometimes high resolution to overthrow its tormentors and despoilers. Sometimes it is the perils that arise when nature goes rampant and wild. A tornado or a hurricane, as we now know so well, has an impressive way of telling people that this is God's world and of showing them aspects of His controlling power. These violences of nature disclose the puniness of man. Modern science has put into the hands of unconscionable men the power to destroy the world—unless all through our common life there is a new and vitally effective use of the spiritual resources whose center is God.

But, as always, man is never more powerful than when he is on his knees. I think I can discern clearly here in our Conference a new and thoroughly complete humility today. We have opened our hearts and we have opened our ears as we turn them toward God. And He is unmistakably calling us to His Church, the one means He so positively established to be the instrument of His grace to cleanse the world. The mind of God created His Church to be the center of every ennobling, as well as of every saving resource. His Church in His plan is the center for every individual response to His will and for every social movement of His will. A Christ-like Church, aflame with His spirit and alive with His program, is not only the only alternative to the horrors of modern war, but it is, moreover, uniquely the hope of the world!

I think I can also discern a sense of mission among our ministers. They want to pioneer in new and hitherto untried fields of endeavor. They are looking for the places of direst need and which afford the greatest opportunity for service. There is a new dedication to the difficult but rewarding tasks of going where their gifts and abilities can be challenged to the utmost. And along with this humility and sense of mission is a spirit of optimism. Defeatism has been defeated. Plans and programs are made not to be buried in the minutes of the conference but to come alive in the membership of the local congregation. "What needs to be done under God can be done" is the voice of this new awakening.

It is, in the light of all this—our perils on the one hand and our new reliance on God, on the other hand, that we see everywhere and in every land where men can be free, a new and thriving concern with religion. This is clearly visible in the North Carolina Conference. Church attendance is greater than ever before. The Duke Divinity School is filled with ministerial students. Circuit churches all over the Conference are saying we want a full-time preacher and more services. New buildings dot the skyline. New parsonages ornament the highways. Expanded facilities and staffs are giving the people more of what they demand and need.

And while we look at the impact of danger that has awakened our people, and while we see the visible evidences of a resurgent faith and a vigorous church, it is now, as it has always been, true that some great spirit takes hold and directs the great stream of the Greater Spirit; some noble personality inspires the response to God's personality. Some administrative genius rises to lead the enterprise that grows out of the human soul as it moves toward the soul of God. There has to be a plan, a working program, a direction, a goal, a leader! God has furnished to Eastern North Carolina Methodism the leader in this new awakening.

It is our very great good fortune to have as our leader one who knows the encompassing peril of the world, one who knows the history and strength of the church, one who knows and has helped develop men with whom he can share the high and holy responsibilities of our times. By his wise, tireless, and sagacious leadership our own Bishop Garber has gathered a gallant host of noble and consecrated laymen and laywomen, young people with vision and enthusiasm, a devoted following of trained and highly dedicated preachers, and they, by the sheer genius of plan, organization, and response, are doing the unbelievable. Our colleges are receiving more adequate support; new voices are heard from the pulpits—the voices of consecrated laymen; missionary specials are carried by almost all of the churches of the Conference; new and renovated church buildings are everywhere in evidence; new parsonages are built and well furnished for the pastors and district superintendents; more adequate tools with which to work are placed at the disposal of our workers; the place of education in the local church looms larger and larger; and a spirit of optimism, co-operation, and democracy permeates the Conference. A few years ago, few people would have believed it possible to have a "Church Extension Club." What little time and means were available were used "at home." Not so today. For God has seemed to match us with this hour. Under Bishop Garber's leadership, our people, obedient to the heavenly vision, have done what our fathers did when they penetrated the frontier and founded in the wilderness a church and a school. We have captured, under his own example and faith, the New Testament faith and spirit. Laymen and preachers are a part with

the hosts of heaven in acclaiming the great advance which we, under God, have made. Surely he is the right man in the right place.

It is interesting, and none the less important, as we review our work and see the glorious fruits of our new awakening, to think about certain basic and intangible significance in our resurgent faith and church. New buildings are important expressions of something always and forever on the inside of man. When a church congregation is alert the people will make the church house a sort of symbol of their vitality. A man's inner life is always the battleground. Here great attacks are made. Here he makes decisions. Here great issues are settled. And the closer we get in our inner life to the spirit of Christ, the less important some of our irritations always are. Our vanities fall away. Our pride and our glory yield to His greater glory. We somehow come to see the outlines of brotherhood and good will. And as we look on these outlines they take the shape of a Kingdom. And we begin to realize that what we are seeing and reaching for is the Kingdom of Heaven about which Jesus said so much. This sort of quest begins to act as a solvent for the tensions of life and life's fears—tensions that arise when we overstress racial problems, fears when we forget the power of God to save what men without Him might so easily destroy. Such emphasis on the inner life, enriched by the grace of God, is in reality the beginning of what our Fathers called Christian joy, or the hope of heaven, or the glory of God. We move in on holy ground to holy experiences and begin to think about that clean world our hands, under God, can make. With a personal joy that is as wonderful as it is indescribable and as full as it is unique, I salute our trusted leader, Bishop Garber, the preachers, the laymen, the laywomen, the young people, and all of the lay workers of our North Carolina Conference and the New Day that is already in the making.

PART I

REPORTS OF DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS

BURLINGTON

Burlington District, being one of the new districts formed last year, has no records of former years to break; however, we believe that we have set a high standard of achievements for these eight months. Our work has not been confined to any one area, for all our connectional interests as well as the total program of the church have been in the forefront of our ministers and laymen throughout the year.

Evangelism

Sensing the need of revitalizing the spiritual life of our church, our ministers have placed special emphasis on evangelism this year. This has been done through visitation evangelism, revival meetings, preparatory classes, church school emphasis, church attendance and emphasis through the Methodist Youth Fellowship. We have received 837 new members this year; 131 preparatory members by baptism, 383 on profession of faith, and 323 by church certificate.

Christian Education

Realizing that our greatest potentialities for growth are in the field of Christian education, our pastors, our commissions on education, our Sunday school superintendents and teachers have greatly enhanced our church school work, by their ardent devotion to, and their interest in Christian education. Every Sunday school in the district has made a remarkable gain in both membership and the quality of work being done by our teachers.

We have had four subdistrict training schools and one more scheduled to open in October, which will have included every charge in the district. So far the total in attendance at these training schools has been 718.

Knowing the value of our North Carolina Christian Advocate as a medium for information and inspiration, our churches have 1,638 subscribers, with seven churches having every family as an Advocate subscriber.

Missions

Our Mission Specials for the Burlington District this year have amounted to \$6,950. Of this amount \$2,355 went to the Korean Appeal. We have 480 members of the \$10 Club.

Lay Activities

Under the excellent leadership of our district lay leader, Mr. James F. Rogers, and his associates, our laymen's work has made excellent progress. One hundred thirty-five certified lay speakers filled the pulpits of our charges where there was more than one church, thereby keeping all churches open for services during the six weeks prior to Easter.

From our stewardship and tithing venture, 859 tithers were enrolled.

Sixteen Methodist Men's Clubs are active and others are in the process of being organized.

Building and Finance

The churches of the Burlington District have raised this year \$117,000 on church indebtedness. Front Street has paid \$48,000, which cleared the church of all indebtedness. Davis Street has paid \$25,000; Trinity, \$7,000; West Burlington, \$3,000; Fairview, \$3,400; Robbins Circuit, \$1,500; and Swepsonville, \$1,300.

Other churches expecting to begin building following Conference are: Graham, with \$108,000 and \$3,500 lot paid for; Mt. Herman, with \$57,000; Belmont, with \$63,000. Other churches having building funds growing rapidly and expecting to get their

buildings started soon are: Webb Avenue—Educational Building; Glen Raven—new church; Mebane—Educational Building.

The following churches have cleared all indebtedness and are to be dedicated soon after Conference: Front Street, Orange Chapel, Concord, and Clover Garden.

Three new churches: Grace Church, Burlington; Grove Park, Burlington; and Trinity Church, Sanford, are ready for appointments at this Conference.

The parsonages at Mt. Hermon and Friendship, and Glen Raven have been dedicated this year. Salem-Chapel and Swepsonville parsonages have been paid for and are ready for dedication.

New parsonages in the process of being built are: Milton, Bonlee, Trinity, Silk Hope, and Center. A new district parsonage has been purchased, costing \$31,000, located at 503 Tarleton Avenue, Burlington.

We think the Burlington District has made notable progress this year, and the credit for this progress goes to the finest group of men with whom I have been permitted to work. It has been through their untiring efforts and extraordinary co-operation we have been able to do the fine work in the Burlington District this year.

DURHAM

The Lord has blessed the labors of the pastors and laymen of the Durham District this "short" conference year, and some substantial progress has been made.

At District Conference, May 17, there were reported 445 additions on profession of faith and 446 by certificate. Others have been added since that date. The net gain this year will be the largest in several years.

Two new churches have been built during the conference year. St. John's Church, Durham, has the distinction of being the first "Ten Dollar Club" church opened for worship. The opening service was held on March 8. Epworth Church, Durham, the second of the "Ten Dollar Club Churches," was opened for worship on May 22.

The Durham District provided 114 lay speakers for the "No Silent Pulpit" program. The results of this undertaking have been most satisfactory both to the men who went out to hold the services and to the churches where they spoke. We are looking forward with eager anticipation to the same type of program during Lent of next year.

The Youth Christian Witness Missions held within the district brought renewed interest and attendance at the Youth Fellowship meetings. Also the youth proved themselves to be effective evangelists by winning numbers to Christ and church membership.

A new educational building has been completed at Helena on the Mt. Tirzah Charge. A new parsonage has been built and recently occupied at Roxboro Circuit.

Leadership training schools this short year have reached increased numbers of workers. Training schools held at Durham, Oxford, Hillsboro, and Roxboro were well attended. The school in Durham was the largest in years.

Two entirely new works are being formed this year. These are at Glen Lennox in Chapel Hill and Aldersgate in the Homestead Heights area just north of Durham. The Aldersgate Church is being formed by the conversion of a dance hall into a church. Contributions from Methodists in Durham enabled us to purchase this property for a church.

Three additional charges are being formed by the division of larger circuits. Andrews-Fletchers is being divided into two charges: one to be Andrews-Soapstone and the others Fletcher's Chapel. The Brooksdale Circuit is being divided to form Brooksdale-Brookland as one charge and Allensville-Trinity the other. Orange Circuit is being divided to form Effland-Lebanon Charge and Chestnut Ridge-Hebron Charge.

It is due to the diligent work of the district leaders in the Woman's Society of Christian Service that in the Durham District there are no unorganized churches in the district.

For whatever progress has been made we give thanks to God for having blessed the labors of the consecrated ministers and laymen of the Durham District.

ELIZABETH CITY

We are happy to make the following report of the work done on the Elizabeth City District. It has been made possible by the faith, devotion, co-operation, and labors of the pastors and lay people of the churches of the district.

Evangelism. Thirty-seven of our churches have held revivals, and thirty-four churches have conducted visitation evangelism campaigns. Two hundred seventy-six have been added to the membership of the churches on profession of faith, and 287 by transfer, making a total of 563. Our losses have amounted to 277. This gives us a net gain of 286 for the conference year.

Pastoral Visitation. It is the feeling of this district superintendent that a pastor cannot minister spiritually to his members unless he knows them as a result of visiting in their homes, praying with their families, ministering to their sick, and strengthening the weak. There are 4,953 Methodist homes in our district. Ten of our thirty-four pastors have visited in every home of their members as well as visiting the sick and the prospective members. Thirty-nine hundred of the 4,953 Methodist homes were visited by our pastors. They made 4,217 sick calls and visited 1,255 prospective members. They made a total of 9,372 visits.

World Service. Our charges were apportioned \$14,949 for World Service, including the fifteen per cent increase. They accepted \$14,853, only lacking \$96 of reaching the total. Four weeks before Annual Conference all of this amount had been collected except \$352, and confidence was expressed by the charges that it would be paid by Annual Conference.

Special Offerings. Every one of our churches responded to the Korean Appeal. They contributed \$2,448.21 to the Korean offering; \$530 to Race Relations; \$771 for Week of Dedication; \$2,026 to General and Conference Advance Specials (\$1,000 of this was contributed by the First Methodist Church of Washington, N. C.). Our people have secured 399 "Ten Dollar Club" memberships, have raised \$737 for Rally Day with many churches to take the offering after the deadline for submitting this report. So far, \$133 has been raised for Student Day.

Woman's Work. We have 73 Woman's Societies of Christian Service. Under the able leadership of their district president, Mrs. N. L. Mixon, they have made an enviable record in the North Carolina Conference this year. There were over three hundred in attendance at their district conference.

Lay Activities. Our district lay leader, Fred W. Ritter, and his associate lay leaders and charge lay leaders, have rendered significant service. There were 350 men in attendance at our stewardship mass meeting in Edenton. Over seventy-five of our laymen filled the pulpits of our charge churches during the period of "No Silent Pulpits." This work was so successful that our people enthusiastically voiced their desire to repeat the program in the next conference year. We now have eleven Men's Clubs. Although there are only 536 listed as tithers, the stewardship program has been evidenced in the raising of our finances during this short conference year.

Pastors' Salaries. Our churches increased the salaries of their pastors \$15,254 over the previous conference year, 1953-54, making a total for the year 1954-1955 of \$110,520. The minimum salaries for the year 1955-56 have been set at \$117,650, which is an increase of \$7,130. We feel this is an indirect result of the stewardship program.

Christian Education. There are 82 local church schools in the district with a total enrollment of 9,835. This represents a gain of 206 over the same period of last year. Thirty-one vacation church schools have been held up to June 9, with a total enrollment of 1,878. Five leadership training schools were held with an enrollment of 327. There are sixty-five Methodist Youth Fellowships with 1,196 members. Four one-teacher rural training schools were conducted by the Conference Board of Education with approximately 120 in attendance. Two pilot Christian missions were held with 62 in attendance. The North Carolina Christian Advocate goes into 1,347 homes in our district. Fifteen churches send the Advocate into the homes of every resident member.

Church Extension. The Riverside Church is in the process of completion and their lot has been paid for; lots were purchased for Grace and Trinity Churches. At this writing, a revival is in progress at Grace Church with the Reverend T. A. Collins as the evangelist. The new tent owned by the Conference Board of Evangelism is being used for this revival. The new pastor, Rev. James R. Couchman, has been appointed to the Grace-Trinity Charge. The Grace Church will meet in a Steelex building as temporary quarters.

New Buildings and Improvements. New church buildings begun, \$71,749; new parsonages begun, \$44,000; new educational buildings begun, \$163,985; cash spent on Grace-Trinity property, \$6,100; debt retirement, \$32,942.

First Church, Elizabeth City, is beginning a new parsonage at a cost of \$34,000; Swan Quarter at \$10,000, and Union at \$10,000.

New educational buildings have been started by Hatteras and Buxton at a cost of \$42,500; Ahoskie at a cost of \$106,000; South Mills at \$15,000. Creswell has completed

an educational building at a cost of \$10,000; Perkins on the South Camden Charge at a cost of \$8,225; Soule on the Swan Quarter Charge at a cost of \$4,200; and Asbury on the Washington Circuit at a cost of \$7,500.

Improvement Program. The Gatesville Church has been beautified and improved at a cost of \$20,000; City Road has spent \$10,000 on major improvements; Halls Creek Church on the Pasquotank Charge has been redecorated and improved at a cost of \$5,000; First Church, Washington, \$5,000. Belhaven, Edenton, Murfreesboro, North Gates, Perquimans, South Mills, and Washington Circuit have had improvement programs on their churches. The Currituck Charge has purchased a parsonage at a cost of \$3,000. The following charges have improved their parsonages during the year: Bath, Belhaven, Edenton, City Road, Harrellsville, Hertford, Kennakeet, Perquimans, Roper, Stumpy Point, Wanchese, and Washington Circuit.

This has been a wonderful year on the Elizabeth City District. We have made progress, and this has been due to the consecration and faithful service of both the pastors and the laity of the churches of the district. We give thanks to God for His guiding spirit.

FAYETTEVILLE

We make this report with a deep feeling of gratitude to Our Heavenly Father and a sense of appreciation to all who have helped to make this an outstanding year of achievements. We have listed here some results for your consideration.

Membership and Evangelism

Additions on profession of faith: 526; additions by certificate: 578. Total additions: 1,104. Lost by death and certificate: 485. Net gain in membership since last November: 619.

A District Retreat for pastors was held at Myrtle Beach, S. C., with Dr. Walter C. Gums, district superintendent of the Richmond District of the Virginia Conference, leader, and Rev. W. E. Howard, District Secretary of Evangelism, assisting him.

Christian Education

Church School enrollment is 14,781, which is an increase of 855 over last year.

Four Christian workers' schools have been held with excellent attendance and many course cards of credit issued.

A seminar on leadership education was conducted by Dr. M. E. Cunningham and Dr. C. P. Morris.

Four subdistrict institutes for adult workers with youth were held under the direction of Rev. James Auman, district director of youth work.

Four hundred four youth and their adult workers attended the annual spring youth rally at Aberdeen.

One hundred forty-five workers attended the vacation church school institute.

Missions and Church Extension

Over \$3,000 contributed to the Bishops' Appeal for Korea.

A survey conducted by pastors revealed a need for 13 new churches immediately and 14 others within 5 years.

Nine hundred fourteen members of the \$10 Club, against a quota of 932 (18 needed). Paid \$11,753 on \$10 Club.

Four subdistrict missionary institutes were held under the leadership of Rev. Clyde G. McCarver, District Missionary Secretary.

New churches have been organized in Fayetteville, Christ Methodist on the Raeford Road, February 13, 1955; and Old Hundred, April 3, 1955.

Salem Church completed a sanctuary this year. Repairs to the sanctuary and additional educational facilities have been provided on the Parkton Charge at Parkton, Marvin, and Cotton churches. The first unit of the Spring Lake Methodist Church was officially opened June 12, 1955. Roberdell Church has a completely new sanctuary and educational plant. The following church school buildings are under construction: Gardners, Vass, Star, Gibson, and Red Springs. Renovations and redecorating have been completed at Hay Street and Parsons Grove. Dedication services have been held at Raeford and Parker Church.

The following churches are in the planning stage for a building program: First, Rockingham; Fellowship, Hamlet; Mount Gilead, Southern Pines; and Christ Church, Fayetteville.

The Raeford parsonage has been dedicated this year, and the following new parsonages have been built: South River, Camp Ground, Glenwood-Trinity, Fellowship, and Hope Mills. The parsonages at Love Joy-Macedonia, West End Circuit, and Calvary are under construction. Stedman plans to build this coming year.

Lay Activities

Our district lay program has gone forward under the excellent leadership of Mr. J. N. Gibson, Jr., who has given generously of his time and substance in promoting the lay work of the Methodist Church. Among the achievements of our laymen are:

A lay planning meeting of the district director and his associates was held with all members present.

Eight hundred twenty-eight laymen at the laymen's meeting at Hay Street Methodist Church.

Seventy-eight laymen holding 112 services in the "No Silent Pulpit" program during Lent.

Nine hundred twenty-eight tithers in the Fayetteville District.

Large representation at the laymen's retreat at Louisburg College, June 11-12.

Twenty-seven chartered Methodist Men's Clubs.

The Advocate

Under the leadership of Rev. L. A. Tilley, we now have 3,107 subscribers to the North Carolina Christian Advocate. Eleven charges and one church are sending the Advocate to every home. These charges are as follows: First Church, Rockingham; Raeford; St. John-Gibson; Southern Pines; Hay Street; Northmount; Hope Mills; Hamlet, First and Fellowship; Troy; West End Circuit; and Zion Church, Mount Gilead.

GOLDSBORO

The Goldsboro District has experienced its first year, and we are glad to report progress and victories for the Kingdom, and a morale among our fine laymen and preachers which we think is indicative of greater things in the year ahead.

Church Extension: We began the year with 40 charges and have 46 charges set up for the new year, made possible by new churches and divided charges. Princeton church is becoming a station.

First Church, Clinton, Dr. D. E. Earnhardt, pastor, sponsored the new Grace Church which was organized Palm Sunday with 69 members, and will pay for the building site at a cost of \$6,000. Rev. Ardell F. McClung is pastor.

Rev. J. R. Regan of Pink Hill led in a movement that resulted in the organization of Sarecta Church on Pentecost Sunday with 66 members. A building site has been given by Mrs. Norwood Smith.

South Smithfield Church was organized June 12 with 29 members, sponsored by Methodist Men of Centenary Church, Smithfield, Sam H. Stallings, president. The club helped raise \$2,000 to pay for the site. Rev. J. V. Early was leader in the movement for the new church and conducted a revival there this month.

A new church will soon be organized in Airboro between Goldsboro and Seymour Johnson Field. Rev. Durwood Wiggins has been serving since March. Miss Bert Casey has donated a site and the Conference Board of Missions paid for the building purchased from Seymour Johnson Field.

Mrs. Ira Whitley has deeded a site for a church in West Smithfield. Rev. J. V. Early led in starting a church school a month ago. Enrollment now exceeds 50.

Rev. J. W. Dimmette and the people of Princeton charge led in taking a census and conducting a revival at Pine Level looking toward a church there. The revival was held by Rev. T. A. Collins and Mr. Roy Turnage. A pastor will be appointed to Pine Level by this conference.

Buildings and Improvements: Newton Grove Church is nearing completion. The enlargement and renovation program at Centenary (Garland Charge) is also nearing completion. Warsaw is launching such a program. New educational buildings have been started at Magnolia, Faison and Ebenezer (Salem Charge). Goshen Church is now free of debt and ready for dedication. Parsonages have been dedicated this year at

Wesley Circuit, Falling Creek-Providence, and Maury-Mount Herman. Institute and Eureka-Yelverton have built parsonages this year. St. Luke parsonage is under construction, and Goshen-Keener is ready to start. The churches have paid \$134,333 for buildings, repairs, and debts.

Missions: We gave \$23,090 for World Service and \$8,125 for mission specials. There are 547 members of the \$10 Club. The new district Woman's Society of Christian Service is off to a good start under the leadership of Mrs. Shelton Boyd.

Lay Activities: Under the leadership of A. C. Edwards, district lay leader, our lay work has gone forward. Laymen had a prominent part in our district conference. There were 550 men at the district stewardship meeting, including 130 lay speakers who were recognized. Methodist Men's Clubs have increased from nine to 17, with a present membership of 618.

Christian Education: We have started five church schools for a total of 99. Enrollment is 14,422. Peak attendance was 11,984, or 83% of enrollment. The Advocate goes into 1,785 homes, including all homes in 21 local churches. There have been 76 vacation church schools with 3,598 enrolled. The 77 Youth Fellowships reporting have 1,704 members.

Salaries: Pastors' salaries for the new year will be \$161,300, an increase of \$9,936 over this year.

Memberships: We are trying to turn the tide and show membership gains. New members total 754, including 354 by vows.

District Staff: We are grateful to the members of our capable and devoted district staff for the good work they have done this year, and to all the pastors and laymen of the district.

May God bless us all as we seek to labor in His vineyard, whose "fields are white unto harvest."

NEW BERN

It has been an inspiration to see how the pastors and people of the New Bern District have responded to the challenge of this short, eight-months year, adjusting themselves with faith and courage to the requirements of the new schedule. I am grateful for the opportunity of working with them, and proud to report herewith some of the fruits of their labors.

Evangelism: Reports early this month showed 481 members received on profession of faith, and 562 by transfer and otherwise, for a total of 1,143. One hundred sixty-two infants have been baptized. A number of evangelistic meetings have been held since these figures were reported.

The Ministry: We now have forty active pastors, one associate, and two retired pastors in the district. Our district conference renewed the license of eleven local preachers, recommended ten supply pastors, and issued license to preach to three candidates for the ministry.

The Tithing Adventure has been a benediction to our people wherever it was earnestly presented. Our pastors report at present 638 tithers, and an average increase in giving of 28%, ranging for the separate charges from 3% to 146%. We believe that a steady development of this program is a vital need of our church program.

The Woman's Society of Christian Service is now organized one hundred percent in our pastoral charges, with a total of 5,490 members, including the Wesleyan Service Guild. We were happy to be hosts at Queen Street Church in Kinston of the annual meeting of the Conference WSCS in April of this year.

Methodist Men: We have twenty Methodist Men's Clubs in the district, and these clubs are sponsoring numerous and splendid projects for the development of their churches. Our laymen responded wonderfully to the "No Silent Pulpits" program for the six weeks preceding Easter, conducting services that were a blessing to them and the people, week after week, in our sixty rural churches. One hundred fifty-eight of our men are certified lay speakers, standing ready for similar services as called on. I wish to acknowledge to able and devoted guidance, in this and all our lay activities, of our district lay leader, Sam B. Underwood, Jr., and his four associates, C. Byrd Wade, Hugh Ragsdale, James E. Thomas, and Roy L. Turnage, as well as that of all the charge lay leaders who have so heartily supported them through the year.

Church Extension: We have attained a maximum this year of 705 members of the \$10 Club for building new churches, against a quota of 759 members. Queen Street Church, Kinston, has led with 156 members. St. Mark Church in Kinston has more than

doubled its quota of members. St. James Church in Greenville and St. Mark Church in Kinston moved into the lovely first unit of their new churches this year. Queen Street Church, Kinston, is sponsoring its third new congregation, and is ready for a pastor to be assigned to the new church now being organized in East Kinston. Jarvis Memorial Church in Greenville has secured a site for a third church in that city, and is sending its associate pastor to begin a new work there. The cornerstone was laid for Trinity Church in New Bern last month. The Straits Circuit is being divided into two two-point charges. On the Camp Glenn Circuit, the Camp Glenn and Salter Path churches are being made stations. And Richlands is becoming a station, leaving the churches of Haw Branch and Gum Branch to form the new Richlands Circuit.

New Buildings: Trinity Church in Jacksonville has begun construction of its newly located and enlarged church plant. The new Sealevel Church is now ready for dedication. The remodeled Pollockville Church with its new educational annex is one of the most beautiful in the conference. The remodeling of the Bethlehem, Camp Glenn, Clarks, and Trenton churches is completed, or nearly so. Lane's Chapel on the Dover Circuit has built a handsome educational annex and is remodeling the church. New church school buildings have been completed, or are under construction, at Ayden, Broad Creek, Chapmans, Rhems, Riverdale, Reelsboro, Sharon, Smyrna, and Straits. Ann Street Church in Beaufort has bought property and pledged \$165,000 for a new educational building. Building repairs and improvements have been made in many other charges.

Parsonages: Pastors and their families have moved into comfortable new parsonages at Oriental and Woodington. New parsonages at Maysville and Swansboro are nearly ready for occupancy. The Camp Glenn parsonage, built last year, is ready for dedication.

Brief Mention of Other Vital Matters: Miss Jo Anne Padley, of Ayden, is being sent jointly by her local church and the Woman's societies of the district as a member of the European Caravan this summer. The district contributed \$1,000 to see one of our Korean pastors, Brother Mah Kyung-Il, through the Duke Divinity School. We have merged our District Retirement Home program with that of the central Retirement Home in Durham, turning over our fund of \$6,100 to that cause. Week-day kindergartens are being conducted by Queen Street and Westminster in Kinston; Jarvis Memorial in Greenville, and our church at Havelock. Queen Street is also conducting first grade classes and Westminster a nursery school. Our pastors have reported an average increase in church attendance of 29%, and in church school attendance of 24%. The North Carolina Christian Advocate is coming into 1,080 of our homes, with Ayden, Camp Glenn, Dover, St. James in Greenville, First Church in Morehead City, and Richlands reporting it in all their homes. One hundred thirty-four of our workers have attended training schools this year.

Finances: The average support for our pastors has increased from \$3,281 last year to \$3,540 this year. Our churches report a total of \$21,276 for Advance Specials. Between \$150,000 and \$200,000 has been raised for church buildings and parsonages.

Conclusion: We believe that our people are growing in the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, in knowledge of His will for them, and in their service in His vineyard. They have wrought well in many things, but they are catching visions of finer things still, and are pressing on to become more worthy as children of God and servants of His Son. We give humble and hearty thanks for the rich blessings that our Heavenly Father has bestowed upon us throughout this conference year, and we face the new year with eagerness and with new appreciation of the Christian bonds of faith, hope, and love.

RALEIGH

At the beginning of this report, I want to record my sincere appreciation for the co-operation and faithful work of the pastors and laymen of the district, especially the district staff. In a very real sense this is their report. Limited space will permit me to list only a few of the major tangible achievements of the year.

Membership and Evangelism: Evangelism has been given effective emphasis this year through revival meetings, home visitation, church school teaching, preparatory classes, and Christian witness missions. As a result, 1,017 new members have been received into the church: 458 on profession of faith.

Christian Education: Church school enrollment and attendance have shown a healthy growth. Much has been done in the area of special training: five subdistrict Christian workers schools, with an enrollment of 600; nine subdistrict workshops for

intermediates and youth; a district workshop on developing workers; and a district institute on temperance education. The North Carolina Christian Advocate goes into 1,228 homes in the district. Through the College Sustaining Fund and the United College Appeal the district has given \$23,349 to our church colleges.

Missions and Church Extension: The district accepted in full the 15% increase in World Service. In addition, the charges have given \$13,548 to Advance Specials, the Korean Appeal, and the Week of Dedication. We have 674 members in the \$10 Club. Through the \$10 Club and the local church budgets, our churches have given \$16,835 to church extension. Four new charges have been formed this year: three by charge divisions, and one new charge. Several subdistrict workshops on missions were conducted by the district missionary secretary. The Woman's Society of Christian Service continues to do an excellent job in the district.

Lay Activities: Under the leadership of Mr. B. M. Madison and his associates, the lay work of the district is showing fine progress. Seven new Methodist Men's Clubs have been organized this year, bringing the total to 27. Over four hundred men attended the district Methodist Men's rally in Raleigh. One hundred and five laymen conducted 195 preaching services during the Lenten season. Methodist Men are on the march in the Raleigh District.

Buildings and Finance: New education buildings have been erected, or are under construction, at Apex, Cary, Elizabeth (Garner Circuit), Zion (Norlina), Cokesbury (Middleburg), and Pleasant Grove. New church sanctuaries are under construction at City Road (Henderson) and Warrenton. New parsonages are being built at Macedonia, Wendell, Ebenezer, and Macon. Extensive renovation has been made in the Norlina Church. Building programs are in the planning and blueprint stages at Louisburg, Fuquay Springs, Garner, First Church (Henderson), Fairmont, Hayes Barton, Highland, Longview Gardens, Trinity, and Wesley Memorial, Raleigh. The sum of \$244,910 has been raised for church and parsonage building this year. In spite of the difficulties created by the short year, 95% of the charges will meet their budgets in full. For all purposes the Raleigh District has raised \$569,127 this short conference year.

Truly God has been good to us, and the people called Methodists have wrought well. Let us give thanks, take courage, enlarge our visions, and face the future with confidence and daring.

ROCKY MOUNT

Andrew in the flush of his own spiritual victory first found Simon and repeated to him the magic words of the invitation, "Come and see." Ever since then the way has been opened for us to bring our friends. This ancient formula has retained its potency this year in our district, for many have gone out alone and two by two on the greatest spiritual mission. Special emphasis has been placed upon visitation evangelism. Many of our churches report successful efforts in this formula. Results have been good if not remarkable. This has been our main job and we really tried to do it well. Though the summer has not yet come, thirty-one churches report visitation campaigns and thirty-five report preaching revivals. The ministers of the district have given fine response to the efforts of the district superintendent to lead in evangelistic effort, and he wishes here to record his deep appreciation.

I believe it is true that the response to the whole program of the church has been excellent. Some pastors might be singled out as more efficient and effective, but as a working group the pastors have labored well. The statistical reports are incomplete as given below, but they are suggestive of success in the task:

Evangelism: Revivals held, 35; visitation campaigns, 31; accessions, 890; professions, 377; transfers, 513.

Women's Work: Organized societies, 87; members, 4,335.

Men's Work: Organized "Methodist Men," 23; members, 757.

Christian Education: Church schools, 96; total students, 14,309; vacation schools, 82; enrollment, 4,056; leadership training schools held, 11; enrolled, 454; MYF groups, 87; enrollment, 1892; Rally Day offerings, \$772.

The N. C. Christian Advocate: Subscriptions in force, 2,235; number of churches sending to each home, 16.

Building Projects: Three new churches begun or completed at a cost of \$101,000. Seven new educational buildings begun or completed at cost of \$196,000. Three new parsonages begun or completed at cost of \$47,500. Ten parsonages, six educational

buildings, sixteen churches improvement programs begun or completed at cost of \$41,500.

The Garrison Fund: Charges contribution this year to the support of our missionary family in Brazil: Every charge.

The Tithing Adventure: Tithers for the period, 659. Additional money raised by the tithing adventure, \$6,801. Estimate of pastors as to how many of these will be permanent tithers: 310.

"No Silent Pulpit" Effort: Certified lay speakers, 172; appointments filled by them, 225; number failing to fill appointment, none.

Some Special Offerings: Korean Appeal, \$3,436; Week of Dedication, \$1,196; Race Relations, \$428.

Temperance: Temperance workshops held, 5; total raised for the proposed temperance film, \$378.

Significant Building or Improvement Programs at Following Charges: Bethel, Elm City, Enfield, Jamesville, Littleton, Nash, Nashville, Pinetops, Rich Square, First Church, Roanoke Rapids, Clark Street, Marvin, St. Paul, Sandy Cross, Scotland Neck, Seaboard, Spring Hope, Stokes, Tarboro, West Halifax, Whitakers, Wilson, Windsor, Winstead.

There is just pride in these reports. Progress, certainly; defeat, never. Is it not true though that our progress is too slow and plodding? True followers of Christ can do better. We so pledge ourselves.

WILMINGTON

Wilmington District Methodists come to the end of another conference year with both gratitude to the Heavenly Father for His guiding providence, and a deep humility rising from the realization that past achievements are but a poor symbol of what might have been accomplished with a little more enthusiasm and dedication. No sensational success has attended our way, but the record indicates that significant progress has been made in areas not reflected in statistics. Yet, the real story is told in figures which make up the record.

The following summary somewhat measures the year's work:

Church Building: Epworth Church, Wilmington, has completed the first unit of its new building, and the congregation has moved to the new site to begin another chapter in its work. A new church is nearing completion at Lebanon on the Waccamaw Charge. Grace Church, Wilmington, has liquidated its debt and was dedicated by Bishop Paul N. Garber on Sunday, May 15th. Altogether, \$67,197.00 has been raised and/or spent for church building, debt payment, and improvements.

Parsonages: The Whiteville Circuit has almost completed its new parsonage. New parsonages are under construction at Clarkton and Council, and a new house is soon to start at Sneads Ferry. Several others are in the planning stage; at least one has a substantial amount of cash on hand for a new parsonage. A total of \$19,789.00 has been raised and/or spent for parsonage building, debt payment, and improvements.

Christian Education: There are 83 church schools in the district. They report a slight increase in enrollment. The vacation church school institute was a great success, and already 64 churches have held or have planned a vacation church school.

Evangelism: Efforts in evangelism have won 669 persons to church membership this year: 378 by profession of faith and 291 by transfer. This represents a net gain of 211 for the eight months. Christian witness missions have been held throughout the district by the Methodist Youth Fellowships and their leaders.

Lay Activities: The outstanding project in lay activities this year was the "No Silent Pulpit" program of lay preaching. Mr. Charles A. Stuck, lay leader of the North Arkansas Conference and a pioneer in lay preaching, was in the district for three sub-district training sessions. More than 200 attended these meetings. Ninety-three lay speakers held 208 services in 60 local churches between March 6 and April 10. There are 436 active members of the \$10 Club. The special stewardship through tithing movement was emphasized throughout the Lenten-Pentecost season.

Missions: The Wilmington District accepted \$12,568.00 for World Service; \$3,390.00 for Mission Specials; \$2,259.00 was received on the Korean offering; \$337.00 for Race Relations; \$1,108.00 for the Week of Dedication; \$736.00 for Church School Rally Day; and the final figures for the Methodist Student Day offering were not available for this report. There are 58 organized units of the WSCS.

Church extension has been studied and emphasized throughout the district. Three new charges are being created by dividing large circuits. Clarkton, a three-point circuit,

has been formed from Elizabethtown; Sneads Ferry, a two-point charge, has been formed from the Scotts Hill Charge; and Lake Waccamaw, a station, has been formed from the Hallsboro Charge. The Seagate Methodist Church has decided to relocate on an excellent site, and a new congregation is being planned for the Devon Park area in Wilmington.

Promotion and Cultivation: There has been a constant program of cultivation and promotion in the district, seeking always to lay the foundation for a sustained loyalty to the Methodist Church and the Methodist way of life. The history, doctrines, Discipline, organization, and program of historic Methodism has been exalted as the finally normative expression of the coming Kingdom of Christ.

PART 2

Quadrennial Board and Commission Reports

BOARD OF CONFERENCE CLAIMANTS

Report No. 1

For the support of our conference claimants during the year 1955-56, we recommend an apportionment on the churches of an amount equal to 16% of the salary of the preachers and their assistants plus appropriations for expense, including travel allowance. We also recommend that the annuity rate be \$46.00 per service year for retired preachers, including the retired approved supply preachers who have served at least ten full-time years.

The names, addresses, and years of service of our conference claimants, including the dependent children, will appear in the conference journal. The conference claimants who have died during the year are: J. T. Draper, Mrs. M. T. Plyler, Mrs. L. B. Pattishall, and Mrs. W. B. North.

Due to the physical incapacity of Miss Nannie Pattishall, who is past sixteen years of age, we recommend her continuance as a conference claimant with a dependent child's annuity. The approval of this recommendation requires two-thirds vote of the annual conference.

We recommend that the secretary of the Board of Conference Claimants be exempt from the resolution restricting membership on a conference board to eight consecutive years. The resolution is on page 183 of the 1952 journal. The paragraph referred to reads as follows: "That anyone who has served eight consecutive years on any board, committee or commission as of the 1956 annual conference shall not be eligible for membership on that particular board, committee, or commission within four years."

The board recommends that the honorarium of the secretary of the Board of Conference Claimants remain at \$300.00 and that his expense account be submitted to the conference treasurer.

In keeping with report number 2 of the Board of Conference Claimants on page 110 of the 1954 conference journal, we recommend the following: in the case of all special appointments to an organization, institution, agency, or as an evangelist, unless provision is made to pay or have paid into the conference claimants' fund an amount equal to twelve times the annuity rate annually, such appointment must be listed in the conference journal, "Without annuity on this annual conference." Unless such provisions are made, we recommend that the disciplinary question, "What Methodist institutions or organizations are approved by the conference for annuity responsibility?" be answered, "none."

We call attention to the fact that the social security program for ministers has no connection with the Pension Program of the Methodist Church. Therefore, there is no obligation on the part of the conference or the churches to support this program. In order for a minister to participate, he must elect to do so and personally assume the financial responsibilities.

We emphasize the fact that, of the 34 conferences represented at the Board of Penions Conference meeting in Memphis this year, 24 conferences reported plans by which their ministers are participating in the conference claimants' program. The amount of contributions ranges from one to three per cent, some with a sliding scale

relative to salary level. We would urge that our conference also begin to look with favor toward such a program in the near future.

Report No. 2

THE MINISTERS' RETIREMENT FUND OF THE NORTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST CHURCH CONSTITUTION

(Revision submitted to Annual Conference, June 1955)

This fund is intended to provide a single, lump sum benefit to be paid at the time of retirement of each member of the fund. The treasurer of the North Carolina Conference shall serve as treasurer of this fund. He shall promote this work, receive reports from the district superintendents, receive funds from pastors and charges, and keep permanent records of collections and benefits paid. The treasurer will obtain the names of all ministers retiring at each annual conference and pay to them promptly any benefit to which they are entitled.

Assessments: Each member shall pay into the fund one percent (1%) of all money he receives each year from charge or conference sources (this includes salary, expense accounts, travel allowances, minimum salary fund payments, Duke Endowment, and missionary sources). Members transferring out of the North Carolina Conference who wish to retain membership in the fund must pay into the fund two percent (2%) of their salaries and other income items received from church sources constituting a usual part of their annual income.

Each charge in the conference shall be required to pay into the fund annually an amount equal to one percent (1%) of what it reports as paid to the pastor and his associates, if any.

Deadline for Receipt of Payments: Each charge and each member of the fund shall submit the required payment no later than the last day of the month following the month in which the North Carolina Annual Conference meets.

Benefits: Benefits shall be paid to members of the retirement fund as follows: If superannuated at the end of one year of membership: \$100.00; if superannuated at the end of two years of membership: \$200.00; if superannuated at the end of three years of membership: \$300.00; if superannuated at the end of four years of membership: \$400.00; if superannuated at the end of five years of membership: \$500.00; if superannuated at the end of six years of membership: \$600.00; if superannuated at the end of seven years of membership: \$700.00; if superannuated at the end of eight years of membership: \$800.00; if superannuated at the end of nine years of membership: \$900.00; if superannuated at the end of ten years of membership: \$1,000.00. The sum of \$100.00 additional benefit shall be paid to members retiring each year provided receipts for that year are sufficient to pay this additional benefit. No money shall be paid from the reserve fund for this purpose.

Dividends: Any funds remaining after retirement benefits have been paid to eligible members (including the additional \$100.00 benefit) shall be divided in equal parts and credited to the accounts of those who have been participating members for ten years or longer and are not in arrears. The total dividends of each member shall be paid to him at the time of his retirement or to his beneficiary in the event of his death prior to retirement.

Death benefits: If a participating member dies while in the active service, the treasurer shall pay to his widow and/or other dependents the sum which the member had paid into the fund and his accumulated dividends plus twenty dollars (\$20.00) for each year of service after the conference year 1941-42 in which his charge paid its assessment to this fund in full or in which he has paid two percent (2%) of his earnings in years in which he served in other conferences.

The maximum death benefit shall not exceed five hundred dollars (\$500.00) unless the member's payment and accumulated dividends are in excess of five hundred dollars (\$500.00). Then the death benefit shall be the actual amount the member had paid into the fund plus any accumulated dividends in his account.

Penalties: Upon superannuation or death of any member who has failed any year or years to contribute one percent (1%) or two percent (2%) in any years in which he served in other conferences, there shall be deducted from any benefits an amount equal

to twice the amount he should have paid during the year or years he did not contribute. If any member of the fund fails to contribute the required percent of his salary for more than a total of three years, consecutive or otherwise, he shall have no claim on this fund beyond the amount he has paid into the fund.

Eligibility for Membership: Each minister of the North Carolina Conference shall become eligible for membership in the Ministers' Retirement Fund in the year following the Conference at which he is taken into full connection. Ministers transferring into the Conference in full connection are eligible to join the fund in the year following the Conference in which their credentials are recognized.

Approved Supply Pastors: Approved supply pastors may become participating members in this fund in the year following the Conference at which they are accepted as Approved Supply Pastors. The following conditions of membership apply to supply members.

1. If within five years of becoming a participating member, an approved supply is not given work, he shall be paid the amount he has paid into fund plus one-half the amount he has served paid into the fund during his years as pastor, and terminate his membership.

2. If an approved supply member has served five years but less than ten years since becoming a participating member and is not given work, he shall be paid the amount he has paid into the fund plus the total amount the charges he served paid into the fund during his years as pastor, and terminate his membership.

3. Approved supply pastors who have served ten years or more may become participating members on the same basis as members in full connection.

4. The provisions contained in this section shall apply only to those approved supply pastors giving full-time service to the ministry.

Investment of Funds: Funds paid in shall be processed and accounted for by the treasurer of the North Carolina Conference. The reserve fund and dividend fund shall be invested at the discretion of the World Service and Finance Commission of the North Carolina Conference in consultation with the officers of the Board of Conference Claimants. Any income from investments shall be added to the reserve fund until it reaches the sum of \$250,000.00, at which time the earnings shall be added to the current fund and included in the balance available for crediting to members' accounts as dividends as provided in this constitution.

BOARD OF CONFERENCE CLAIMANTS

Report No. 3

1. The Board of Conference Claimants asks that the third Sunday in September each year to be designated as "Veterans of the Cross Day."

2. That an education program centered on this day be begun in the current year. That retired ministers living in local communities be invited to attend the services on this special Sunday, and participate in the program. Printed material shall be prepared by the Board of Conference Claimants and circulated throughout the churches of our conference. Specific information about the program of the North Carolina Conference for its retired ministers shall be presented in this material as well as from the pulpit.

3. When the Board of Conference Claimants is convinced that the churches of the conference are properly educated and ready to support wholeheartedly a special collection, a request shall be presented to the Annual Conference asking that such an offering be taken on the "Veterans of the Cross Day." Prior to asking for the collection, specific plans shall be formulated concerning the use to which the money would be put, the method of processing these funds, and any other matters deemed necessary by the Board of Conference Claimants.

2. Duke Divinity School

The Divinity School has been rejoicing in its renovated and enlarged quarters. The University expended almost \$50,000 in changing and adapting the Divinity School building to our needs. The library facilities have been more than doubled and should be adequate for the needs of the school for a number of years. Rearrangement of rooms and redecorations throughout have resulted in a most attractive environment for our work. Only Divinity School classes and activities are now housed in the building.

During the current year 277 persons have been registered as students in the school. Admissions for 1955-56 have been closed since the latter part of March. This is true also of other seminaries of the Methodist Church. The maximum capacity of our staff and facilities is 300 students over a twelve months period, which means about 275 present for duty at any one time.

The Christian Convocation will be held June 7-10. Decision as to whether to continue the convocation will have to be made. A very large factor will be the attendance from the bounds of the North Carolina Conference at this year's convocation. We do not know the full effect upon the convocation of the change in date of the meeting of the conference. Aside from the well qualified faculty of the Pastors' School, Dr. James T. Cleland will be the convocation preacher and Dr. George Hedley will be the James A. Gray lecturer.

The School for Approved Supply Pastors has increased in attendance to such an extent as to be a financial problem. The attendance has more than doubled in each of the past two years. One hundred seventy-five supply pastors were in attendance last summer, and at present indications are for an even larger number desiring to attend this year. This school is financed in part by the Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference, but that provision has become quite inadequate and the schools at both Emory and Duke will appear before the Budget Commission of the Jurisdictional Conference to ask for considerably increased support. We have been forced to reduce the value of the scholarships granted to the ministers and to limit the total number. As one of the three largest participating conferences it is hoped that the North Carolina Conference can considerably increase the amount now given to the scholarships for the Approved Supply Pastor's School.

The General Conference in 1952 voted gratifyingly increased support to the ten theological schools of the church. The amount allocated to the schools was increased from \$300,000 a year to \$800,000 a year. All ten of the schools have been greatly benefited by this increase. Many additional faculty members have been employed and the enrollment in the seminaries has increased. In preparation for the next General Conference the theological schools are making a joint approach to each annual conference urging the adoption of memorials to the General Conference not only to continue, but to increase by 50% the amount now given to the ten schools. I have been asked to make this presentation for all the seminaries to the conference in the Richmond and Charlotte areas, and earnestly hope for the backing of this Board of Education and of the North Carolina Conference. (Report by Dean James Cannon)

A MEMORIAL TO THE GENERAL CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST CHURCH TO BE CONVENED APRIL 25, 1956, IN MINNEAPOLIS, MINNESOTA

Dear Fathers and Brethren:

WHEREAS, twelve hundred men each year during 1952-53 and 1953-54 were separated from active membership in the annual conferences through death, retirement, withdrawal, location, etc., and,

WHEREAS, eight hundred sixty-four Methodist men were graduated from the accredited seminaries of the United States (679 from Methodist schools, 185 from non Methodist schools) in 1953-54, and

WHEREAS, an increase in theological schools enrollment of 50% is necessary if The Methodist Church is to meet the minimum number of ministerial replacements needed with trained ministers, and,

WHEREAS, the ten existing Methodist theological schools are at near capacity with 2,967 students and cannot accommodate the 4,450 men (50% increase) needed in seminary training annually;

THEREFORE, we respectfully memorialize the General Conference of The Methodist Church, now in session, to take immediate steps to make provision for an expanded program of theological education.

II. The Hannah Brown Finch Memorial Chapel was dedicated on May 22, 1955. This chapel is the gift of a dedicated Methodist layman to the memory of his Christian mother, and is used as a center of worship and small recitals.

1. Substantial additions to endowment and sustaining fund so that faculty-staff salaries may be brought in line with other educational institutions.
2. Gymnasium
3. Scholarship funds to assist worthy students.

IV. Sincere appreciation to the North Carolina Conference for its support through the Sustaining Fund and the United College Appeal.

II. Financial Statement:

Since the North Carolina Conference is meeting in June this year, the financial data of the College cannot be given (The auditor's report is due in July). However, the College will close the year without a deficit. The value of building, equipment, and land has increased. The Endowment Fund has increased by approximately \$125,000 during the past year. More than \$40,000 has been added to scholarship funds since September.

III. Religious Activities

1. Student Christian Association: This group has charge of Sunday evening vespers, Religious Emphasis Week, and other campus religious activities.
2. Denominational groups: (1) The Methodist Student Fellowship; (2) Baptist Student Union.
3. The fellowship teams—after a period of training in the early fall, 60 students, organized in 12 teams, made 42 visits to churches, Youth Fellowships and sub-districts. Many opportunities for in-service training have been provided. Some of our students are participating in conference and national summer projects, including work camps, caravans, rural work, and home missions.

IV. Needs:

1. Larger endowment; 2. a new gymnasium; 3. dining room and kitchen; 4. A separate building for infirmary; 5. additional equipment such as a pipe organ for Memorial Auditorium and chapel.

V. Appreciation is expressed to the North Carolina Conference for its support through the Sustaining Fund and the United College Appeal.

5. Louisburg College

Total enrollment at Louisburg College during the 1954-55 session was 224. This represents an increase of 28% over the enrollment of the preceding sessions. Indications

are that the enrollment for the 1955-56 session will materially increase as pre-session enrollment to date is larger than such enrollment for the past seventeen years.

Plans are underway to remodel and refurnish the dormitory rooms that were not remodeled last summer. When this work is done, all dormitory space at Louisburg College will be in excellent shape. It is hoped that construction of a central heating plant will be started this summer.

Statistics for the 1954-55 session are: Officers and instructors, 22; students, 224; value of property, \$1,135,000; endowments, \$160,100.

In order to inform our Methodist people better about the Sustaining Fund, we recommend that Christian College Day, April 22, be used to inform our people about the needs of our colleges and to solicit their prayerful loyalty.

Section C

THE METHODIST COLLEGE COMMITTEE
(Local Church)

It is the belief of the Committee on Schools and Colleges that the committee in the local church called the "Methodist College Committee" should be responsible, along with the pastor, for the presentation of the opportunities and needs of our Methodist colleges and for encouraging our Methodist young people to attend these colleges. Early in the conference year this committee should plan its program for the year.

The minimum program for the local church should include the following:

(1) In co-operation with the Commission on Education, plan for the proper observance of Student Recognition Day in December, Race Relations Day in February, and Methodist Student Day in June.

(2) Plan for the most effective observance of Christian College Day on Sunday, April 22.

(3) Inform each church about the Sustaining Fund.

(4) A personal interview by the pastor of each local Methodist high school senior for the purpose of presenting the challenge of our Methodist colleges.

(5) Early in the school year, send the names and addresses of all Methodist high school seniors to the executive secretary of the Conference Board of Education and the district superintendent.

(6) The Methodist College Committee is urged to use its own initiative and imagination in trying to set up a local Methodist Scholarship Fund for worthy Methodist students.

Inform church members about the work of the Wesley Foundation and the Methodist Student Movement and enlist their interest in this work.

Section D

"The 100 Project"

There is an acute shortage of trained persons for the work of Christian education in the Methodist Church. The church especially needs local church directors of Christian education. The General Board of Education is sponsoring a plan to secure 100 candidates for the degree of Master of Religious Education. These candidates will begin their work in the fall of 1955.

There are three parts to the plan:

1. Finding the candidates
2. Finding the money to help these candidates
3. Finding the right jobs for the candidates after graduation.

In order to do our part in "The 100 Project," the North Carolina Conference Board of Education is requesting the Board of Missions and Church Extension to approve "The 100 Project" as a Home Mission Special. In this way the Board of Education can present this very worthy cause to our people.

Report No. 2

DIVISION OF THE LOCAL CHURCH

Section A

GENERAL CHURCH SCHOOL WORK

The two primary emphases of the Local Church Division of the Board of Education has been and still is evangelism and leadership training.

1. Evangelism

We believe that the church school is the most effective evangelizing agency that we have. Year after year at least seventy per cent of all who join our church come by way of the church school, and practically all have had some background of religious nurture in the church school. We believe that this agency should be used fully in the evangelistic program of our church.

The purpose of evangelism in the church school is to help boys and girls, men and women, to have experiences of Christ and his way so as to lead them to a meaningful acceptance of Christ as Savior and Lord and a commitment of their lives to the doing of His will, that they may become faithful members of the church.

We believe that all church school officers and teachers should be trained for their work in evangelism appropriate to the age group of their pupils. We also feel that it is the pastor's responsibility to see that they are given this training.

We suggest the following approach to this task in 1955-56:

First, that September, October and November, 1955, be designated as a period for a Special Emphasis on increasing Church School Enrollment and Attendance, during which time each local church school will seek to reach all the children, youth and adults in the community for whom The Methodist Church is responsible.

Second, that January to Easter, 1956, be designated as a special period of evangelism through the Church School, during which time each local church school will seek to win each pupil, who is sufficiently mature, to a commitment of his life to Christ and membership in the church. We suggest that this period be divided as follows: (1) January 1-28, period of training church school officers and teachers—class taught by the pastor or his representative to prepare workers spiritually and in the actual interview techniques for decision; (2) January 29-February 18, period for securing decisions—each teacher and assistants seeking to win the unchurched members of his class through visitation interviews; (3) February 19-March 25, classes in church membership for children, youth and adults.

2. Leadership Training

Trained leadership is absolutely essential to the program and growth of any church. One of the greatest needs of the churches of our conference is devoted and consecrated Christians who are informed and skilled workers.

The goals of our program of leadership training in the next conference year are as follows:

First, at least one accredited Christian Workers' School in each subdistrict. The Conference Board of Education will continue to pay one-half of the instructor-honoraria of these schools as approved by the Executive Secretary. We recommend that the Board of Managers make sure that there will be enough pupils enrolled in each class to justify the expense both to the board and the local churches. We further recommend that whenever possible one of the following courses be offered for pastors, church

school superintendents, administrative officers of the church school, division superintendents, and commission chairmen: "Church School Administration," "Developing Workers," "The Work of the Local Church."

Second, One-Teacher Schools for Small Churches and Rural Charges conducted in each district. Carefully selected persons will be trained to teach the course, "The Educational Work of the Small Church," in these schools. The teacher-honoraria for these schools will be paid by the Conference Board of Education, with the host church or charge taking care of the room and board and travel expenses.

Third, Church School Rally Day observed in each local church with a generous offering for our program of leadership training. We recommend that the Third Sunday in September, 1955, or the nearest date thereto as practicable, be observed as Church School Rally Day. We also recommend that an amount equal to 1% of the pastor's salary be set as the minimal goal for this offering in each local church and that \$11,000 be set as our conference goal. It is hoped that many churches will exceed this minimal goal.

Fourth, Subdistrict Institutes for Church School Workers conducted in early October by the district superintendents and district directors on the theme, "Evangelism through the Church School."

Fifth, Leadership Training Classes conducted in many local churches by the pastor or qualified instructor. We recommend that each local church promote home study courses for its workers.

Sixth, An Active Commission on Education and a Functioning Workers Conference in Each Local Church. Larger churches are urged to hold regular departmental council meetings.

3. Church School Literature

We recommend that our district superintendents, pastors, and local church officials seek to get local churches to use only approved Methodist literature and that the staff of the Conference Board of Education continue to give guidance to local churches in choosing and using Methodist literature.

4. Church Extension

We recommend that out-post Sunday Schools be established in areas where new churches are contemplated. The district superintendents are urged to call on the conference staff and the district staffs of the Conference Board of Education for their assistance in this work.

5. New Educational Buildings

We are delighted to see the growing interest on the part of local churches in providing more adequate church school facilities. Many new educational buildings have been erected in recent years and many others are being planned for the near future. We are confident many mistakes could be avoided by local congregations if they would seek the advice of our Conference Board of Education and the General Board of Education when the architectural plans are being drawn for new educational buildings.

6. Maximum Use of Educational Facilities

It is our belief that local churches are not making maximum use of their educational facilities. We urge them to give serious consideration to the possibilities of providing more time for Christian teaching by:

- a. Lengthening the time for teaching in the Sunday School.
- b. Conducting a Methodist Sunday evening fellowship.
- c. Conducting extended sessions of the church school.
- d. Conducting weekday nurseries and kindergartens.

7. Other Emphases

We recommend a continued emphasis on stewardship education, Christian family life education, alcohol education, missionary education, world peace, and social action in co-operation with other conference boards and agencies working in these fields.

8. Special Days and Offerings

We recommend that our Race Relations Sunday offering again this year be directed to Paine College, Augusta, Georgia.

We urge each local church to plan for an effective observance of the following special days and to encourage liberal offerings for the important causes they represent: Church School Rally Day, September 18, 1955

Race Relations Sunday, February 12, 1956

Methodist Student Day, June 10, 1956

9. Camp Don-Lee

It is obvious now that one camp cannot take care of our camping needs. Many boys and girls are having to be turned away from camp this summer in spite of the fact that another camp has been leased for a period of four weeks. We must begin building a new camp in the near future or miss a golden opportunity of providing a Christian camp experience for many of our boys and girls.

Section B

CHILDREN'S WORK

Recommendations and Plans for 1955-56

- (1) That special help be given children's division superintendents in understanding their responsibilities and privileges. To this end the conference director will
 - (a) Attempt to secure the name and address of the children's division superintendent or a teacher of children in each local church
 - (b) Send each one a quarterly newsletter
 - (c) In September send each one the leaflet, "The Methodist Program for the Children's Division," which outlines their duties.
 - (d) Plan a special session for them at the Annual Children's Workers' Conference
- (2) That increased attention be given to a program of co-operation between the home and the church school.
- (3) That workers in the children's division be given greater opportunities for personal spiritual enrichment.
 - (a) Provide these workers with a list of reading materials for personal enrichment. Place as many of these materials as possible in the church library. (Some may be obtained on a rental basis from the board library.)
 - (b) Arrange for these workers to participate in an adult class or in an enrichment course periodically.
- (4) That workers in the children's division be given special guidance in understanding their role in the total program of evangelism—in reaching the unreached and in guiding boys and girls to a commitment to continuous Christian living.

- (a) We recommend that subdistrict institutes be held during the first two weeks in October to launch this emphasis, and that separate sections for nursery-kindergarten and primary-junior workers be provided whenever possible.
- (5) **That workers in the children's division be trained through laboratory schools and classes in Christian Workers' Schools.**
- (a) Encourage workers to attend the SEJ Laboratory School at Lake Junaluska, August 1-12, 1955, and our Conference Laboratory School in July, 1956.
- (b) Encourage workers to attend laboratory classes set up in Christian Workers' Schools.
- (c) Encourage workers to attend subdistrict Christian Workers' Schools and training classes conducted in the local church.
- (d) Encourage workers to attend other district and conference-wide training opportunities.
- (6) **That camping experiences be provided for our junior boys and girls.**
- (a) That local churches provide day camping opportunities for juniors, with the assistance of the board staff. We urge local church day-camp leaders to attend the staff training camp at Camp Don-Lee in June and the Pilot Day Camp when held, and to make printed materials on day camping available.
- (b) That the Conference Board of Education study ways and means of providing additional camp facilities and personnel.
- (c) That a more adequate policy of registration for junior campers be worked out to make possible a wider distribution of campers among the churches of the conference.
- (7) **That a Vacation Church School be held in each local church of our conference.**
- (a) Encourage Vacation Church School workers to attend the one-day District Vacation Church School Institute.
- (b) Conduct a two-weeks school whenever possible.
- (c) Send a report to the board office immediately after the school has been held.
- (8) That the board staff continue to give guidance to local church school workers in the selection and use of Methodist literature and that local churches be urged to use only approved Methodist literature.

Section C

YOUTH WORK

1. Objectives

The three main objectives of the youth program of the North Carolina Conference are:

- (1) **To find and win more young people for Christ and His Church.**
- (2) **To train adults who work with young people.**
- (3) **To improve what the MYF has to offer.**

2. Older Youth

We feel that our older youth are being neglected. It is here that we have been suffering our greatest loss in membership.

- (1) We recommend that each local church give more serious attention to ministering to the needs of service men and women, college students, and working youth at home.
- (2) We urge each local church to attempt to get its college young people to take an active part in the MSF or Wesley Foundation while in college.
- (3) We urge each local church to exert a greater effort toward getting its older young people to attend the Older Youth Assembly at Camp Don-Lee.

3. Christian Adventure Camping

Our camping program for junior high boys and girls under the direction of Rev. Robert Regan, Jr., is growing by leaps and bounds. Last summer six one-week camps for intermediates were conducted at Camp Don-Lee with a capacity attendance of 615. (Our capacity is 100 campers per week.) This year we have scheduled six one-week camps and two ten-day camps at Don-Lee and Camp Caroline, a Disciples of Christ Church Camp, located near Camp Don-Lee. We need longer camping periods for our boys and girls for more effective work.

Because of this unprecedented demand for camping, we are going to have to begin thinking in terms of developing a new camp as soon as possible.

4. Christian Witness

Young people can win other young people for Christ and His Church. This fact was demonstrated by many Youth Christian Witness Missions that were held on a subdistrict and local church level the past year.

- (1) We recommend that local churches and charges conduct Youth Christian Witness Missions, but only after careful preparation has been made.
- (2) We recommend that subdistricts conduct Youth Christian Witness Missions, especially where they have not been held in the past.
- (3) We recommend that a pilot conference-wide Youth Christian Witness Mission be held for the purpose of training a few selected young people from each district.
- (4) We recommend that the Conference MYF send at least one young person and one adult worker with youth to the Regional Christian Witness Mission sponsored by the General Board of Evangelism.
- (5) We recommend that subdistrict institutes for adult workers with youth be held the first two weeks in October to train them in their responsibility in the program of evangelism.

5. Christian Outreach

The Methodist Youth Fund means that others live because youth give.

- (1) We recommend that the MYFund be stressed in every local church, through prayer and study and increased giving.
- (2) That each local MYF do its part in helping to reach our conference goal of \$11,000.00.
- (3) That an MYFund Pledge Service be conducted in each local church.

6. Conference Youth Staff

We recommend that Reverend Herman S. Winberry, Conference Director of Youth Work, and Reverend Robert Regan, Jr., Conference Camp Director and State MSM Director, for their inspiring and competent leadership and recommend their reappointment to these positions for the conference year 1955-56.

Section D

ADULT WORK

1. Emphases For 1955-56

- (1) Hold District Social Action Seminars in co-operation with the Board of Social and Economic Relations.
- (2) Hold conference and/or district-wide meetings for older adults.
- (3) Plan for a conference Adult Fellowship meeting for 1956-57.
- (4) Select and train district and subdistrict directors and other adult leadership in the conference.
- (5) Hold workshops on adult and young adult work on district and subdistrict level.
- (6) Encourage adult leadership courses in Christian Workers' Schools.
- (7) Encourage participation in adult conferences beyond the conference level, such as: Leadership School at Lake Junaluska, SEJ Family Life Conference at Lake Junaluska, SEJ Recreation Workshop at Leesburg, Florida, and Regional Workshop for Young Adults at Lake Junaluska.
- (8) Work with local churches to improve the work of the adult division.

2. Recommendations of the Committee on Christian Family Life

In the belief that the home is the focal point of nurture and training for Christian family living, the committee makes the following recommendations:

- (1) That our pastors make special effort to get parents aware of the fact that the home is the basic crucible in which information, attitudes, inclinations, patterns of action and reaction are fused and formed.
- (2) That our local churches provide family life education programs including definite, continuous emphasis, classes, workshops, use of Family Life literature, such as *The Christian Home*, *Mature Years*, and provide a library in this area.

- (3) That at least two sub-conference workshops on "Christian Family Living" be held during the year.
- (4) That all pastors who can possibly do so attend and share in a conference-wide workshop for ministers on marriage counseling, to be sponsored by the Family Life Department of the General Board of Education and the Conference Board of Education, to be held September 6-7, 1955, at some central point in the conference.

REPORT OF THE YOUTH EMPHASIS COMMITTEE

The members of the Youth Emphasis Committee wish to thank the youth and their leaders in the local church, subdistrict, district, and conference MYF organizations who have faithfully labored to carry forth the quadrennial youth emphasis. The evangelistic and educational interest which has been drawn by all of the various youth groups in the conference has helped to strengthen the lines to stem the tide of loss of youth from our church and MYF rolls.

I. A summary of activities of the past year is as follows:

1. Subdistrict seminars for adult workers with youth, pastors, and parents of youth were held in each subdistrict in the conference.
2. Two delegates were sent to the National Christian Witness Mission in Columbus, Ohio.

Many churches gave some emphasis to the Fall Action Project, "Youth in Their Families."

4. As of Monday, April 25th, some Christian Witness Missions have been held in each district in the conference. Reports from 110 charges are as follows: 1,794 interviews have been made; 171 young people have committed their lives to Christ for the first time; 1,335 young people have been added to the Methodist Youth Fellowship; 480 young people have gone forth as witnesses.

5. The Lenten reading project, "I Belong," was promoted and carried out in most of the local churches. Youth are reading in the field of Christian thought.

6. District and subdistrict fellowship or youth emphasis teams have been used to aid weak MYFs, to help organize MYFs where none had existed.

II. Plans for the ensuing conference year:

1. Christian Witness Missions in every local church.
2. Completion of the plan to have a subdistrict Christian Witness Mission in every subdistrict.
3. A Pilot Christian Witness Mission to be held sometime during the Fall.
4. Subdistrict institutes for adult workers with youth in October, 1955.
5. Continued use of fellowship teams of young people to aid weak MYFs in each subdistrict.
6. Organization of fellowships of adult workers with youth in each subdistrict to meet just prior to the beginning of each quarter's activities, sharing teaching plans together.
7. Encouragement of every MYF to share in the Fall Action Project on "Missions, World Peace, and Overseas Relief."
8. Use of the 1955-56 Lenten reading project on "The Life of Jesus." We desire that every Methodist youth read this life of Jesus.

ANNUAL REPORT OF CAMP DON-LEE, INC.

Several minor improvements in physical facilities have been made at Camp Don-Lee during the short conference year, and further construction is contemplated this summer. The kitchen has been painted and certain renovations made. A small water tank has been installed to serve the new staff lodge. A new pump has been installed in the sewage disposal system at the boys' unit. Two new canoes have been added to our fleet of canoes, being donated by churches in our conference. Certain other new equipment has been purchased. The truck has been completely overhauled.

Blueprints have been drawn for a combination garage-workshop-storage building which we hope to construct this summer. This building will meet a need that has existed from the very beginning of our camping program.

At least three other essential buildings must be built before we complete our construction program at Camp Don-Lee. These will be built as rapidly as the funds are available, and we hope within the next two years.

We are glad to report that Hurricanes Carol and Hazel did very little damage to our camp last fall. Some shingles were blown off the roofs of some of the buildings, but these were repaired by our insurance firm without cost to us. Minor damage was done to the river pier which was not covered by insurance. The retaining wall built last summer on the river shore next to the girls' unit prevented possible serious damage to one of the cabins. We are confident that this wall will protect this cabin for many years to come.

Rev. Robert Regan, Jr., has served as our camp director for the past year on a part-time basis. He has done a marvelous job in conducting the camping program, in looking after the camp facilities, and in promoting an interest in camping in our conference. His success in the latter has become a source of embarrassment in that many more boys and girls are applying for admission than can be taken care of. To help take care of our camping program, and that we should begin developing a second camp site at the Don-Lee, has been leased for four weeks this summer.

It is imperative that we complete the construction of Camp Don-Lee as early as possible. To this end we urge every local church to pay in full its apportionment for the camp. It is obvious now that one camp can never take care of our rapidly expanding camping program, and that we should begin developing a second campsite at the earliest possible moment.

INTER-CONFERENCE COMMISSION ON STUDENT WORK (WESLEY FOUNDATION)

The Inter-Conference Commission has helped in the program of student work at the following colleges: University of North Carolina, Rev. Joel Savell, director; Duke, Rev. Eastwood Atwater, director; East Carolina, Miss Mamie Chandler, director; Woman's College, Miss Jolee Fritz, director; Western Carolina, Rev. and Mrs. Milford Thumm, co-directors; Appalachian State Teachers College, Rev. and Mrs. Everett Lowman, co-directors; N. C. State College and Meredith, Rev. J. H. Overton, Jr., director; Wake Forest, Rev. Leonard Ranson, director; Catawba, Miss Rubie Plant, director; and Davidson, Rev. Jerry Murray, director. In the case of Catawba and Davidson, only a small amount of money has been provided to assist in program emphases. In addition, Rev. J. Robert Regan, Jr., has been employed to serve as half-time State Director of the Methodist Student Movement. The names of the boards of directors of all Wesley Foundations have been filed with the commission and will be given to the conference secretary for printing in the Journal.

During the year, the state director visited 49 of the 60 college campuses in the state. We now have 24 units of the MSM on college campuses, and we co-operate in inter-denominational programs being conducted on 25 other campuses. In all of these colleges, the intercollegiate program of the MSM is emphasized and the projects of the MSM are promoted. It is estimated that there are now approximately 12,000 Methodist college students enrolled in North Carolina colleges and nursing schools.

Two state student conferences were held during the past year, one in Salisbury and one in Charlotte. The first consisted of a workshop on the emphases of the MSM, while the second was more inspirational and allowed for the discussion of vital Christian issues. Approximately 160 attended the first and 215 the second. In addition, a district week-end conference for District III was held with 45 in attendance, and a recreational workshop was held on an April weekend with approximately 75 present. This program of activities was carried out under the direction of the State Student Council, Jim Murr of Davidson College, president. The "Tar Heel Fellowship" is the official organ of the North Carolina MSM. Twelve thousand Methodist students are now in training within this state! This fact places upon the Inter-Conference Commission and all pastors and laymen of the two annual conferences a major responsibility and an unequalled challenge. The future leadership of the church may be found within this group. We dare not neglect them. An expanded program has already been planned and a larger annual appropriation of funds is being requested of both conferences beginning this year.

BOARD OF EVANGELISM

Your Board of Evangelism desires to co-operate fully with the program of the General Board of Evangelism. We know that our General Board stands ready to pioneer in the field of evangelism; and our conference board is ready to project the total program of evangelism in our conference. Inasmuch as the program of evangelism must be on a year-round basis, the following recommendations are suggested:

1. There seems to be a definite feeling of the need for the return of the warm heart to Methodism. Our church was born in the warm heart of John Wesley. If Methodism today is to be worthy of its heritage and name, it must possess the warm heart, made possible by the complete acceptance of Jesus Christ as personal Saviour.

2. Your board feels that the best place for this movement of the warm heart to begin is in the ministry. In view of this, it is recommended that there be held a two-day conference-wide retreat for ministers. It is expected that this shall be a time for prayer and heart searching.

3. Your board is again urging that every church participate in the Church Attendance Crusade, January 1 to Easter of 1956. This emphasis has been of great value in the past two years.

4. One of the most significant undertakings of our Conference Board of Lay Activities during this conference year has been the "No Silent Pulpit" program conducted during the Lenten period. Realizing the great good done and the possibilities that lie ahead, your Conference Board of Evangelism heartily approves this plan and urges that it be continued this next conference year, with special emphasis on lay evangelism.

5. A thorough study made by Bishop Paul N. Garber concerning membership trends in our conference is very revealing. This report shows that in 1954 we had a membership of 172,550, this being only 1,173 more than we had in 1953, or a gain of only .61%. This study also points out that 260 of our 797 churches reported no new members on profession of faith last year; that 137 of our 797 churches reported no new members from any source last year; that 344 of our 797 churches have less members now than in 1950. This study clearly indicates that all methods of evangelism must be used in every local church. Every pastor is urged to labor diligently that people may be brought to our Saviour.

6. March and April of 1956 have been designated for a simultaneous evangelistic effort throughout our conference, that if at all possible a revival meeting be held in every local church, with the pastor either doing his own preaching or securing a visiting minister. It is strongly urged that a program of visitation evangelism be conducted in the local church the week preceding the revival meeting.

7. A tent has been purchased by the Conference Board of Evangelism to be used in any district where deemed wise by the district superintendent. It is desired that constant use be made of this tent, particularly in areas where there is the possibility of establishing new Methodist churches.

8. The cultivation of the stewardship life is very essential. Your board urges that the practice of Christian stewardship be promoted throughout the entire program of the church.

9. The printed word is a valuable asset in evangelism. A wide range of literature is available for the promotion and cultivation of spiritual life in the local church. Let every church make the greatest use of all available periodicals.

10. Your board has appropriated \$200.00 toward meeting the expenses of the European Youth Caravan for this year.

11. Tommy Tyson has been approved by the board for the appointment as a conference evangelist.

12. Realizing the value of prayer, your board urges that every church co-operate in the Prayer Movement promoted by the General Board of Evangelism.

13. We recommend that D. J. Reid be appointed as conference secretary of evangelism, to serve without salary.

Part I

RECOMMENDATIONS

5. That the rules governing the use of Golden Cross funds printed in the 1954 Journal, pages 130-131, be continued.

6. That the name of our home in Raleigh now called "The Methodist Orphanage" be changed to "Methodist Home for Children."

7. That ministers of the North Carolina Conference take group hospital insurance with some insurance agency which can supply us with best coverage at lowest cost.

8. That Dr. Russell Dicks be re-elected as the Golden Cross director of the North Carolina Conference. That the district superintendents appoint a district director for each district to assist Dr. Dicks, and a committee of three to pass on Golden Cross cases.

9. That Golden Cross be used only for the MOST needy people. Golden Cross is now spending more than is being supplied by the conference. Ministers, be cautious in applying for aid.

The Methodist Retirement Home in Durham is almost complete, and ready for use. Rev. J. F. Coble has been elected by the board of trustees as the superintendent. The home will house 42 members and 2 members of the staff.

Report No. 3

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF THE
 METHODIST HOME FOR CHILDREN, INC.

The board of trustees, in their regular meeting, October 1, 1954, charted the course for a number of progressive steps which are in the process of coming to pass.

Section I

In the fall of 1955, the Senior High, tenth, eleventh and twelfth grades will attend Needham-Broughton Senior High School.

A number of years ago such a program was tried, but at that time the farm and dairy made it most difficult to carry through. With the sale of the farm and dairy the work program could be so adjusted as to give the children and young people of the Methodist Home the benefit of a full day of school.

In addition, the Methodist Home elementary school is undergoing some changes. The Lewis School, near the campus, is closing, and one hundred twenty-five of its children will become a part of a new school, known as the Methodist-Lewis School.

We are quite aware that a number of new problems will arise as a result of these changes in the school pattern. At the same time, we are certain that this expanded school program will present our children and young people with many new educational opportunities and privileges. These, we believe, will far outweigh any negative aspects.

We see more clearly now, even than we did before, the wisdom in the sale of the dairy and farm. While many were apprehensive in regard to a work schedule which would challenge and keep busy our boys, yet we had no cause for fear. Of course, "Hazel" left enough wreckage in her wake to provide the necessity of labor immediately. Since then, our maintenance men, and our boys, have been literally deluged with tasks, such as maintenance of boilers, electrical and heating equipment, planting of a sizeable

garden, cultivation and care of the beautifully landscaped campus, painting of buildings, care of shrubbery, work as houseboys, laundry boys, and assistants to housemothers and dietitian. We see no let up during the months ahead, even though the end of school will provide much more work time than we have had. We are years behind in the care of many of our buildings, and much of this can be done by members of the staff and family.

It should be kept in mind that work mentioned above is profitable experience for our boys and young men. Of course, there is plenty for our young ladies to do also.

Section II

When I came to the Methodist Orphanage as superintendent more than two and a half years ago, I felt, along with others, the need of doing something about the name of the institution. Orphanage, which carries the wrong connotation in comparison to the kind of service the Home strives to render. More pressing problems made it necessary to shelve this one for some time. It was not one, however, that could be forgotten. Out of the forty-two child caring institutions in the Methodist Church, only five, of which we are one, continue to use the name Orphanage. Thirty-five use an assortment of names, such as: Methodist Home, Methodist Home for Children, Methodist Children's Home, etc.

It has been interesting to note the reaction of many of our children to the name we have. Their letters to friends and loved ones often carry the name "Methodist Home," not Methodist Orphanage.

An outstanding leader of the church recently wrote: "You have a good point in regard to the name of the Home . . . You are taking care of children of broken homes, rather than orphans. I think you would be doing a good thing to suggest the change of the name at your next meeting of the board."

In the June 2nd meeting of the board of trustees of the Methodist Orphanage, a resolution to change the name of the Home from Methodist Orphanage to Methodist Home for Children, Inc., was passed unanimously. This has also been presented to the Board of Hospitals and Homes in session on May 30th at the Edenton Street Methodist Church in Raleigh, North Carolina. This group also gave an affirmative response.

We are presenting this matter now to the North Carolina Conference with the hope that the conference will recognize the wisdom in this proposal, and will vote in favor of the new name.

Perhaps we should keep before us the fact that the name of such a Home in the Western Conference is The Children's Home, Inc. The name Methodist is not used. "Methodist Home for Children" should be sufficiently different from that of the Western Conference to avoid any confusion.

Report No. 5

METHODIST RETIREMENT HOMES, INC.

Part I

The close of the conference year 1954-55 finds us reaching the goal set a year ago for the completion of the first unit of our Home for the Aged.

We do not propose in this report to repeat the historical sketch given in our 1953-54 report and printed in the Journal of Proceedings of the Sixteenth Session of the North Carolina Conference.

We realize from the interest being shown that the 42 guest rooms which we have provided will not be sufficient to meet the immediate demands of those now finding themselves in need of a Christian home. In this first unit we have provided ample kitchen and dining room space and facilities to provide for more than 100 guests. We also have provided for reception rooms and hobby rooms to take care of future expansion.

We cannot proceed with providing additional guest rooms until we have paid off the indebtedness that will be against the home when it is completed. It is now estimated that this will amount to approximately \$175,000.00. We have faith to believe that our experience in the North Carolina Conference will not be any different from that of the retirement homes of other conferences; therefore, we feel that without any great delay those who learn of our needs will, through their liberal contributions, make it possible within another year's time to retire our indebtedness and proceed then to provide the care we feel is necessary for those who, in the evening time of life, are looking for a Christian home.

Dr. H. I. Glass, executive director of the home, has made a very gratifying contribution during his two years and eight months' work for the home, and we are confident that the seeds which he has sown throughout the conference will continue to bear fruit.

Now that we are ready to begin operating the home, on the recommendation of the majority of the members of the Bishop's Cabinet and with the approval of Bishop Garber, the board has appointed the Rev. J. F. Coble as the first superintendent. Brother Coble will begin his active work with the home on June 1.

Brother Marvin Cowell, treasurer of the home, reports as of May 27 receipts during the conference year of \$69,628.92. In addition to this, we have received 80 shares of stock in a life insurance company. This stock was given with the request that it be held 5 years before being sold.

We have borrowed \$140,000.00 from banks to aid us in our building program, and we have disbursed \$210,233.39 during the year.

The Mother's Day offering receipts as of June 1 totaled approximately \$8,000.00. A more detailed audit of the accounts of the home will be carried in the 1954-55 Journal of Proceedings of the Conference.

The wonderful co-operation which we have received from Bishop Garber, members of his Cabinet, and ministers of the conference, as well as from other Christian people, has encouraged us and given us strength to carry on, oftentimes in the face of discouragement, and we are grateful for their support.

Report No. 6

The Report of the Executive Director

During the past year, as well as during the two previous years, we have moved steadily toward our first goal, namely: the completion of the first unit of our retired homes. We now look toward the opening of our doors for service in July or August of this year.

The Executive Director has continued his service in the field in soliciting funds, preaching on Sundays, conducting the office, and otherwise directing the affairs of the Home.

During the year a One Dollar Roll Call has been conducted in which all the women of our conference were invited to assist in the furnishing of our home. We are deeply grateful for their response and to Mrs. H. O. Lineberger of Raleigh for her splendid leadership in this effort. This was the first activity of our Retirement Homes Auxiliary. We expect the service of the auxiliary to be active in the years ahead.

We deeply appreciate the spirit of co-operation reflected in the action of our conference in continuing the special offering on Mother's Day for this conference year. It is our studied conviction that this special offering should be continued, and we earnestly urge our people to increase it. This urgency, of course, stems from the fact that we are in a building program.

We envision the continuation of our building program. For the sake of enlarging our service to those in need, primarily, and from the point of view of the economical administration of the home, another wing should be added at once. We expect now to have a waiting list.

We draw attention to the fact that funds are urgently needed for the completion of our present plans. We, therefore, earnestly solicit the help of everyone who is willing to share in making this great blessing possible. Gifts may be made in any form desired. Memorials, large and small, may be given.

"We are asking our Commission on World Service and Finance to continue the apportionment of 3% for Hospitals and Homes, with the same division. We hope our conference will approve this recommendation.

The opening of our doors to those who need our help is indeed a very thrilling prospect. We rejoice in the fact that our conference is about to take her place in this field of service, along with sixty-eight other agencies and homes for the aged in our church. To everyone who has co-operated in any way in making this progress possible we express our sincere and hearty appreciation. May we not be satisfied until we have done our full share in helping to meet this urgent need of our day, the caring for the aged among us.

BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES
Report No. 1

During the conference year now closing the Board of Lay Activities has supported the total program of the Methodist Church. special emphasis has, of course, been given to those areas for which the board has had special responsibility.

Layman's Day was generally observed throughout the conference. The nation-wide date in October, because of its proximity to our last annual conference, was not used in many churches, but we are glad to report that ministers and laymen alike held fast to the custom of setting some one day as distinctly a day for and by laymen.

In February, every district held a meeting to lift up and emphasize the stewardship phase of this year's work. Mr. Ray H. Nichols, president of the General Board of Lay Activities, was the speaker for some of the meetings, and Mr. A. G. Jefferson, lay leader of our neighboring Virginia Conference, was the speaker for the other meetings. Bishop Garber regretted, as did we, that he could not attend all the meetings. A total of 4,000 laymen were present, and 1,100 certified lay speakers received their formal certification.

These certified lay speakers undertook the largest project of its kind we have ever attempted in filling every pulpit in the conference which otherwise would have been empty during the six weeks just prior to Easter. The laymen reported that they were greatly blessed by this experience.

Against the goal of 156 Methodist Men's Clubs to be formed here by 1956, we are happy to report now a total of 150 clubs duly chartered. We are confident the goal will not only be reached but exceeded.

A very successful laymen's retreat was held at Louisburg College on June 11 and 12, 1955. Mr. G. C. Hodson of the Southern Illinois Conference; Mr. W. Carl Walton, Sr., lay leader of the Newark Conference; and Rev. Walter C. Gum of the Virginia Conference were our speakers from other conferences. This annual occasion continues to be one of the high points of the year for the work of the board, and this year the board voted to ask every Methodist Men's Club to adopt, as its part of a conference-wide project, the creation of scholarships to be awarded deserving students attending Louisburg College and otherwise recruiting worthy and outstanding students for Louisburg College, the only college exclusively belonging to this Conference.

Bishop Garber and the Cabinet have asked us, and we have accepted the invitation, to carry out the "No Silent Pulpits" program again for the period from February 19 through April 1, 1956. Plans are already being made to make this even more effective than in 1955.

The board has voted to work towards making it possible for a larger number of laymen to attend—hitherto having been limited to about 300 as the maximum number. The place of the Retreat will be announced later.

We wish to thank Bishop Garber and the Cabinet for the untiring and effective leadership which they have given us in the year now closing. Methodism is truly on the march.

BOARD OF MISSIONS

Report No. 1

The Board of Missions and Church Extension has enjoyed another great year of achievement. This is reflected in the reports of the pastors as well as in this general report.

During this conference year we have seen our program of church extension begin twelve new congregations. At conference time ministers will be appointed to initiate thirteen more immediately. Thus it is our anticipation that within the space of less than one calendar year we shall see the beginning of more than twenty-five completely new congregations.

Those which have been activated this conference year include: Englewood, of Rocky Mount; Carolina Pines of Raleigh; South Smithfield; West Smithfield; North Clinton; Sarecta; Old Hundred; Airboro, of Goldsboro; Southeast Kinston; Pine Level; Grace and Trinity, of Elizabeth City.

In this time we have assisted in the construction of seventeen new parsonages with small donations as an incentive. Five of these were parsonages for our new congregations, and the others primarily for new parsonages where charge division demanded accommodations for new ministers in our conference. More than \$15,000 has been contributed in this work.

Twenty-five churches have been granted assistance in building new churches, expanding their present facilities, or rebuilding better churches. These have been helped with grants of more than \$33,000 from church extension funds administered by the Board of Missions.

We request the approval and endorsement of the conference of the action taken by the Board of Missions in the process of incorporation under the law of the State of North Carolina. The Board of Missions requested incorporation under North Carolina law in order to negotiate substantial loans for purchase of new church sites; in order to buy, sell and hold real property; in order to expedite the task of establishing new churches.

We further request that the North Carolina Annual Conference approve the negotiation of a loan in the amount of \$100,000 to be repaid in five annual payments of \$20,000 plus interest. This loan shall become a revolving fund for the purchase of church sites and buildings and shall remain a perpetual fund to enable the Board of Missions to meet more of the needs in the area of church extension. This fund is to be kept intact by repayment of commitments.

This year has also seen the construction of Jacksonville Methodist Church, a new church building which will enable Methodism to serve better a huge military area. The Board of Missions secured grants in excess of \$35,000 from the General Board of Missions, and the Conference special Christmas offering. In addition the Board of Missions underwrote a loan in the amount of \$40,000. Thus Trinity Methodist Church, Jacksonville,

becomes the church which has received more mission assistance than any other Methodist Church in America this quadrennium.

The Rev. Thomas A. Collins and Mr. Walter F. Anderson, as secretary and associate secretary of Church Extension, working under the direction of the Board of Missions have been largely responsible for the establishment of these new churches. We commend them for the fine spirit of service rendered, and wish for them the co-operation of all our pastors in this important work. We recommend their reappointment to these respective positions.

Membership in the Ten Dollar Club has grown, but we need to secure a large number of new members in order to hold our number. We now have 5,100 members, and our goal for the new year is to reach 7,500. We earnestly urge each member to continue as an active member of this club. Membership in the club is on a continuing basis unless the executive secretary is notified. We urge our pastors and local church Ten Dollar Club committee to solicit the people of their respective churches for new members.

We recommend that Sunday, October 9, be designated as Church Extension Sunday, and request the district superintendents to constitute at the first quarterly conference a Ten Dollar Club Committee in each local church to work with the chairman of the Commission on Missions in securing new members of the Ten Dollar Club, and the collection of delinquent payments; and that a member of the WSCS be included on this committee. The names and address of this committee should be forwarded immediately to Rev. Thomas A. Collins, Executive Secretary, 920 Lake Boone Trail, Raleigh, N. C.

The Board has approved as Advance Mission Specials the following: Conference Specials: All new churches organized during this quadrennium, 1952-1956, including the parsonages of these new churches; the Bethany (Portugese) Mission of the Rocky Mount District; Longhurst Methodist Church; the scholarship fund set up to assist in the training of directors of religious education. (If a church is carrying a direct gift special for a local church it should secure the proper blank from Mr. Cowell and fill it in accordingly in order to get credit as a special.) General Specials: The Foreign Student Aid Fund for all our Methodist colleges in North Carolina (Assisting foreign students who come to this country for study) The Caravan Methodist Church of Linz, Austria. The New Alaska College. The Methodist Church in Sorocaba, Brazil, with which Rev. C. B. Dawsey is working. District Specials: Ed Smith, J. W. Garrison, and Linwood Blackburn.

In the light of the many calls upon this board for building, and in view of the limited means with which to meet them, it is recommended that the Commission on World Service and Finance add the amount of one percent (1%) to the apportionment for church extension. This would make the percentage 4% of "total money raised."

We commend the Mission Study Book to be used, "South of the Himalayas," and recommend that a school of missions be held in each local church to acquaint our people with the missionary program and opportunity. We suggest that each church adopt a mission special, either conference or foreign.

We commend the Woman's Society of Christian Service for the fine work they are doing in this field. Their faith in missions is expressed through their deeds. We also commend the several district missionary secretaries in promoting the cause of missions in their respective districts. The board is this year assisting in sending nine young people (one from each district) to the missionary conference at Lake Junaluska, July 15-20.

We heartily commend the good work done by our European Caravan group. For the past several years a different group has visited Europe working with the youth of the various countries. The Caravan Methodist Church of Linz, Austria, is one direct result of this work, along with other splendid achievements. We recommend that this project be continued. In a recent meeting, Dr. Joseph Bartak of Austria stated: "If it were not for the North Carolina Caravan, there would not be a Methodist Church in Austria today."

In the light of an unusual situation in the Havelock military community, where hundreds of children, young people, and adults are seeking a place of worship and religious training, and where our present facilities are hopelessly inadequate, we recommend that a Christmas offering be taken in every church for this cause, and that the conference goal be \$25,000. We believe if our people could visualize the real need there would be no difficulty in meeting this goal. This offering should be sent to the Conference Treasurer, Mr. Marvin J. Cowell, Box 10344, Cameron Village, Raleigh, N. C., marked "Havelock Christmas Offering." Credit will be given as "Advance Special—Conference, Fund 16."

We know of no periodical that means more to the local church in its work than does the North Carolina Christian Advocate, and we suggest the months of January and February be designated "Advocate Months." The ideal toward which we all should work is "the Advocate in Every Methodist Home."

We call attention to the fact that by action of the conference last year the minimum salary scale for the coming year will be \$3,000 for single ministers; \$3,300 for married ministers without children; \$3,600 for married ministers with children. This will meet the goal set at the beginning of this quadrennium.

The North Carolina Conference is greatly indebted to the Duke Endowment for its long and valuable aid given to your Board of Missions for increasing and administering the funds, both minimum salary and church extension. Its directors have co-operated in every way possible in the efficient administration of this important work of our conference.

We recommend that the conference adopt the following as a permanent action: "That the Director of the Duke Endowment shall be a member of the North Carolina Conference Board of Missions."

In accordance with the new plan of the Board of Managers of the North Carolina Pastors' School, we recommend the following as members of the board: Rev. T. M. Vick and Rev. J. W. Lineberger, two-year terms; Mrs. J. H. Cutchin and Rev. L. C. Vereen, four-year terms; Rev. S. J. Starnes and Rev. A. S. Parker, six-year terms.

A list of appropriations is attached hereto.

BOARD OF TEMPERANCE

The sale and use of intoxicating liquors continue to increase in North Carolina with alarming increases in drunkenness and other evils that accompany liquor. Hence, it is imperative that we increase greatly our efforts against liquor along the lines of legislation, education, co-operation, and salvation.

Legislation

Though we realize that the problems and evils caused by liquor cannot be solved fully by legislation, we urge that the liquor traffic be outlawed. Though prohibition will not save all alcoholic addicts, it will prevent many persons from drinking by making liquor more difficult to obtain. Though an addict of alcohol as well as an addict of other drugs will do most anything to satiate his appetite, there are many persons who will not drink liquor if they must obtain it from criminals in dark alleys. Outlawing liquor tends to brand it to be the dangerous evil that it is. To legalize the sale of liquor and install it on Main Street helps to give it a degree of respectability that it does not deserve and tends to remove the feeling of shame from liquor drinking. Therefore, we urge the General Assembly of North Carolina to outlaw whiskey, wine and beer; and we urge all sheriffs, solicitors, and judges to enforce all existing laws against liquor. If the General Assembly is unwilling to assume the responsibility for outlawing intoxicating liquors, we urge that it allow the people of North Carolina to vote on this important issue in a state-wide referendum. We urge the General Assembly to prohibit the advertisement of liquor in newspapers and other publications, published in North Carolina, and in radio and television programs originating in our state, and to prohibit such advertisements on the billboards on the highways and in all other places in our state. We urge the General Assembly to appropriate funds for adequate instruction against liquor in our public schools and to enact more effective laws against public drinking and drunkenness and against drunken driving. And we urge the General Assembly to repeal the "gallon law" and all other statutes that help to advance the interests of the liquor traffic in North Carolina.

Education

In addition to legislation, we urge greatly increased activities along the lines of education. Since laws against liquor or any other evils will not be enforced effectively or retained permanently unless people are informed with respect to such evils, we must utilize every possible means to inform our people regarding the harmful effects of liquor. This program of education should include instruction in our homes, in our schools, and in our Sunday schools. We urge that temperance institutes be held on the college campuses of our state. Also, we must utilize newspapers, magazines, radio, television, and all other means of conveying information to our people. We urge particularly that our Sunday school teachers and our preachers utilize fully their opportunities to give convincing facts regarding the hurtful effects of liquor to the end that they might impress our people with the tragic truth regarding this ancient enemy of the church, the home, and our fellow men. The liquor interests are spending many millions of dollars in glamorous advertisements and other propaganda to create false impressions in the minds of our people. We must explode the foolish falsehoods that beer and other liquors add zest to life, that social drinking is helpful in business, that cocktails give social prestige, and that drinking is a mark of distinction. All of these claims of the liquor interests are ridiculous falsehoods; and we must cause our people to know that the results of drinking are entirely opposite from the assertions of the liquor advertisements.

In our activities along educational lines, we should utilize the several splendid films that have been produced portraying the hurtful effects of liquor. We should conduct institutes and workshops frequently. Last year two of the districts in our conference held temperance institutes. During the conference year that is now closing, five of our districts have held temperance institutes. During our next conference year,

1955-56, we urge that each of our nine districts hold a temperance institute. In addition, we urge that our churches hold temperance institutes and workshops on the local church level. We urge our district superintendents to support temperance institutes and workshops in their respective districts; and, when they arrange their annual program for their district conferences, we urge that they allow time for the district secretary of temperance to have this cause effectively presented.

This conference calls upon all pastors and all local churches to give effective and full support to the project of the General Board known as Commitment Day that is observed on the first Sunday in December in each year. The Reverend George W. Blount is hereby designated as conference director of the Commitment Day project.

We urge all pastors and all local churches to observe World Temperance Sunday on the last Sunday in October of each year.

Co-operation

There are many groups and organizations interested in the fight against the liquor traffic; and it is important that the friends of righteousness and sobriety co-operate effectively. We should co-operate with other churches and other organizations in our local communities. Our churches and our members should co-operate with and support the Women's Christian Temperance Union. It is a great organization with a splendid record of distinguished service extending through several decades. Also, our churches and our members should co-operate with the Allied Church League, an organization that has operated in North Carolina since May, 1943. The league was organized by the Protestant churches of North Carolina; it is financed and supported by several denominations; and we urge all pastors and other members to give full co-operation with and support to the work of the Allied Church League.

There is another very active organization that merits our co-operation and support. Alcoholics Anonymous is doing splendid work throughout North Carolina and America. There are one or more units of Alcoholics Anonymous in practically every community in North Carolina. In many communities, they need a place in which to hold their weekly and semi-weekly meetings; and we recommend that our pastors co-operate in providing meeting places for AA groups. We recommend also that all pastors and other church leaders familiarize themselves with the program of Alcoholics Anonymous; that they invite qualified speakers from this organization to address Sunday school classes and other groups in our churches; and we recommend that our pastors and other members co-operate fully with the local units of Alcoholics Anonymous.

Salvation

While we must increase greatly our activities along the lines of legislation, education, and co-operation, these activities are not sufficient. Activities along legislative and educational lines will help; and we must increase these activities. However, legislation, education, and co-operation will not solve these problems completely; they will not save North Carolina or America from the curse of strong drink. We must supplement legislation, education, and co-operation with salvation. We know that prohibition will keep many persons from drinking and will save many drinkers from becoming drunkards. Also, we know that education will keep many persons from becoming drinkers and will prevent many drinkers from becoming drunkards. However, we also know that legislation, education, and co-operation will not solve our liquor problems completely. Unfortunately, there are many officers who will not enforce prohibition effectively and there are many addicts who will continue to obtain liquor regardless of law. Also, it is unfortunate that there are many persons who will begin to drink and many drinkers who will become drunkards in spite of the most effective program of education. Hence, we urge increased efforts along evangelistic lines. All pastors are urged to preach often against the evils of intoxicating liquors and to call upon the members of their respective churches to abstain completely from the use of alcoholic beverages and to use their influence and their votes against the liquor traffic. We should have laws against liquor and enforce these laws. We should educate our people regarding the hurtful effects of liquor. But legislation, education, and co-operation will not suffice. We must have salvation. We must influence our people to accept Jesus Christ as their Saviour. A person who is Christ-centered and Christ-controlled will not drink liquor; he will not impair his God-given mind and body by drinking liquor.

One of the distressing factors in the present liquor situation is the growing tendency of our people to acquiesce in the mistaken idea of so-called moderation in drinking.

Many splendid persons, even many members of our churches, have become inclined to accept and acquiesce in this so-called moderation idea. This dangerous and mistaken idea is being promoted not only by many persons, who desire to justify their drinking, but by many sincere persons who are being misled by certain schools that are engaged in the so-called scientific approach to alcoholic problems. While we commend all intelligent and sincere efforts along educational lines to solve these problems, we regret that many of the so-called scientific approaches and studies are not helpful in the advancement of Christian ideals with respect to alcoholic problems. And this conference reaffirms its belief in absolute prohibition and total abstinence and specifically declares its opposition to the so-called moderation idea in the use of alcoholic beverages.

Today there are many things that are impairing the influence of our church; and the liquor traffic is one of the forces that is helping to destroy everything for which our church stands. The liquor traffic would destroy the church, if it could; the church could destroy the liquor traffic, if it would. Hence, every person, who is interested in the church, should use his influence, his means, and his vote against the liquor traffic. This conference appeals to all pastors and all church members that they increase and make more effective their opposition to the nefarious business. As individuals, we Methodists should abstain absolutely from the use of alcoholic beverages. As members of society, we should vote and work to outlaw the liquor traffic. The attitude and the practice of individuals should be total abstinence. The attitude and policy of government should be absolute prohibition. And to the achievement of total abstinence and absolute prohibition, we rededicate our efforts and our lives.

TOWN AND COUNTRY COMMISSION

Report No. 1

I. Research

The Commission has in process the following research projects:

The Supply Pastor, by Eugene C. Crawford.

Country Church Ladder, a survey in chart form, with documentation, by Aaron G. Tyson, showing the declining and growing churches.

A Study in Numerical Growth in Small Protestant Denominations and The Roman Catholic Church in North Carolina, by Ralph I. Epps.

Look at the People, by Martin R. Chambers, which is a detailed study of population resources in the North Carolina Conference area.

Look at the Roots, by Key W. Taylor, which is a study looking "Toward a Long-Range Policy and Program of Rehabilitation and Expansion of the Rural Church in the North Carolina Conference."

II. Church Extension

The commission commends Bishop Paul N. Garber and the Board of Missions and Church Extension for their able leadership in this field.

Greatly increased participation in the Ten Dollar Club is desired.

Attention is called to the need of church extension in the rural wide-open spaces of our conference as well as in the urban and congested areas.

III. Minimum Salary

The minimum salary for the conference year 1955-1956 is set at \$3,000, \$3,300, and \$3,600. The commission rejoices with other agencies of the conference in attaining this goal. The members of the commission are happy that they have had a part in this.

IV. Supply Pastors

Supply pastors are urged to continue their education where it is at all possible.

The commission is giving one supply pastor \$75.00 to help defray his expenses at the Bloomington Conference.

V. The National Conference on Town and Country Work, July 22-26, 1955

The commission is sending its secretary. The North Carolina Conference is urged to have a full delegation.

VI. Church Finances

A study is now being made of the unified budget in the light of the new financial policy of our conference.

VII. Co-operation with Social and Governmental Agencies

Rural pastors are asked to avail themselves of the opportunities offered through the social and governmental agencies, such as farm agents, home demonstration agents, granges, Four-H Clubs, welfare, etc. These can well be used in the observance of special days, such as Rural Life Sunday and Harvest Day.

VIII. Rural Directors of Christian Education

There is a definite need for directors of Christian education in the rural areas of our conference, both in country stations and circuits.

IX. Evangelism

The Commission commends Bishop Garber for his most efficient research in this field. This alone is sufficient to quicken our consciences in this area. It is the purpose of the commission to co-operate fully with Bishop Garber, the Board of Evangelism, and with any and all conference agencies in going into the "highway and hedges" and bringing men, women, youth, boys and girls to our Lord Jesus Christ.

X. No Silent Pulpit Program

The Board of Lay Activities and the Board of Evangelism are to be highly commended for their foresight in planning this project. The commission realizes that it was largely the country churches that were touched by this program. These churches were helped by the lay speakers; so were the laymen who gave voice to the otherwise silent pulpits. The commission recommends the continuation and expansion of this program.

XI. The Ormond Fund

Gratitude is expressed to those who have administered this fund and to those who have worked under its administration.

A copy of the Ormond Fund Report is included in the Annual Conference report, and a copy is on file with the Conference Secretary of Town and Country Work.

XII. Louisburg College

Through the newly established department of Town and Country Work at Louisburg College, doors of opportunity for study have been opened for our supply pastors. Through the field work done by the department the influence of the college has been carried directly into many of our rural churches and communities. The commission commends the department, the college, and the conference for making the services of Louisburg College possible.

Report No. 2

1. The last General Conference adopted the following resolution with which the Commission on Town and Country Work records concurrence: "Be it resolved that the General Conference of The Methodist Church endorses the Christian Rural Overseas Program, and urges its rural churches and members to support the CROP community programs for commodities, by the provision of leadership, and by participation in the campaigns."

2. In accord with paragraph 1231(4) in the 1952 Discipline, the Commission on Town and Country Work nominates W. A. Tew for the office of Conference Secretary of Town and Country Work.

3. The commission requests the conference to provide the amount of \$4,000 for conference research work, and the running expenses of the commission, for the conference year 1956-7.

4. The district superintendents are requested to investigate, with the aid of pastors, all rural church and parsonage deeds with a view to discovering (1) that the title in each case is clearly held by The Methodist Church; (2) that the trust clause is in each deed; (3) that the boundary lines in each case are clearly established. Further, the district superintendents are requested to take appropriate action in the interest of The

Methodist Church in each case in which one or more of the above points need correction or clarification.

5. An increasing amount of research is being done, within and outside the Annual Conference, based on our Journal. It is evident that the Journal carries many errors, originating from a variety of sources. The Bishop is requested to appoint a committee of persons competent in research work, one of whom would be the secretary of the Annual Conference, who would (1) carefully study the Journal with the purpose of discovering all deficiencies from the viewpoint of research validity and adequacy of data, and (2) report to the next regular session of the Annual Conference findings and recommendations as to corrective procedures.

(a) That the annual salary of each of the nine district superintendents shall be set at \$7,200.00, including travel.

- (b) We recommend the custom already established in most districts in providing from the district treasury a fund for office expense for the district superintendent not to exceed \$600.00 annually.
- (c) The apportionment to each charge of a sum equal to 5½% of the amount estimated for the current year for the salary of the pastor and any associate pastor under Episcopal appointment.

FUND NO. 3. THE BOARD OF CONFERENCE CLAIMANTS requests an apportionment of an amount equal to 16% of the salary of the pastor and any associate pastor under Episcopal appointment, plus appropriations for expense including travel allowance.

FUND NO. 4. THE MINISTERS' RETIREMENT FUND requests an apportionment of an amount equal to 1% of the salary of the pastor and any associate pastor under Episcopal appointment.

FUNDS 1, 2, 3, and 4 equal to 24½% of salary of pastors and associate pastors.

6. We recommend the effort of the Radio and Film Commission to raise the sum of \$8,486.00 by special offering for the Television Ministry of The Methodist Church, Fund No. 24.

7. That the Methodist Youth Fellowship be permitted to solicit funds on our conference quota for the Paul B. Kern Youth Center at Lake Junaluska.

8. That the Board of Education be permitted to accept funds donated by children's groups, young adult groups, individuals, etc., to begin an additional camp for our conference.

We recommend that the conference fiscal year be designated to begin July 1st and to close June 30th.

We recommend to charge our church treasurers that they set up a schedule for remitting at a fixed time each month and to close the year as early as possible. Final remittances should be mailed on Monday two weeks preceding the opening of Conference.

Report No. 2

The Commission on World Service and Finance recommends the adoption of the following:

WHEREAS, the present investment policy of the commission is limited in the making of new investments to U. S. Government bonds, bank savings, and certificates of deposits and building and loan certificates and savings; and,

WHEREAS, the amount of investment outside of the City of Raleigh is limited to insured accounts not to exceed \$10,000.00 and in the City of Raleigh the same limit applies to savings and loan associations but not to banks; and,

WHEREAS, under this policy it is necessary to accept an interest rate of 2½% to 3% on the bulk of the funds and up to 3½% on a comparatively small amount; and,

WHEREAS, some deem it advisable to make investments in other fields such as real estate first mortgages within classifications approved by the executive committee of the Commission on World Service and Finance, and marketable corporate bonds, preferred stocks, and select common stocks of corporations with a history of regular dividend payment:

WE, THEREFORE, recommend that the conference approve the following investment policy:

1. That we broaden the policy of investment to include the aforementioned types of investments and that an investment committee consisting of the executive committee of the commission together with one representative of the Board of Conference Claimants and one of the Board of Missions may make such investment of central funds not to exceed an amount in the new classifications in excess of 25% of the total amount of central funds available for long-time investments;

2. That we authorize the investment committee to transfer present invested funds or place additional available funds of said boards or agencies in these new investments, i.e., real estate first mortgages, and marketable corporate bonds, preferred stocks, and select common stocks, up to limits agreed with their appointed representatives.

3. That we direct a substantial portion of income on investment of current funds to setting up an investment depreciation reserve as a cushion against possible shrinkage in market values of the investments.

We call your attention to the following: 1952 DISCIPLINE, paragraph 1632, sections 2 and 3:

"No officer or member of an Annual Conference, board, society, or institution shall receive a personal commission, bonus, or remuneration in connection with the purchase or sale of securities or other properties for such board, society, or institution.

"The principle of diversification of investments shall be observed, in order to obtain proper geographical and class distribution of investment commitments."

The Advance Committee considers itself fortunate to be able to present to our people through the session of the North Carolina Annual Methodist Conference in session at Hay Street Church in Fayetteville, June 27-July 1, such a fine and progressive report on specials. Although this report reflects only eight months of a year, our achievements have been exceedingly good.

The conference as a whole, under the wise leadership of Bishop Paul N. Garber, the nine district superintendents, the pastors, and the members of our churches, has been most responsive to calls for general and local specials. It will not be practical to include in this brief report in detail all that has been accomplished, but we do wish to call your attention to these three important phases of the Advance.

3. In building new churches through the \$10.00 Club we now have five thousand and forty-three active members. This is an increase of 336 new members for this conference year thus far. The Advance Committee in session in Rocky Mount on May 7, 1955, voted to ask our Annual Conference to approve as a Mission Special the Alaska Methodist College, and to ask each local church to give for the next five years to this worthy cause the equivalent of ten percent of what the congregation is now paying on World Service. Our district superintendents are asked to promote all these specials on their first round of quarterly conferences.

The committee is also requesting our conference to approve Sunday, November 6, as the time to receive our Overseas Offering in every church.

COMMISSION ON CHRISTIAN VOCATIONS

The Commission on Christian Vocations held a conference on Church Vocations at First Methodist Church, Washington, N. C., March 25, 26, and 27, 1955. Approximately 125 youth from all districts attended. Competent leaders representing all the major church vocations introduced the various fields of service in panel presentations, and gave individual counseling by appointment afterwards. The youth were challenged and inspired to dedicate their lives to Christ in meaningful worship services. Several pastors have reported that their youth were greatly benefited by the conference.

One of our resource leaders at Washington was Dr. Richard G. Belcher, of the Interboard Committee on Christian Vocations, Nashville, Tennessee. On Saturday morning of the conference, he met with the members of our commission and offered valuable suggestions for our work in the future regarding recruitment, guidance, and work with adult counselors, the public schools, and local church committees.

During the coming year the commission plans to have a conference on Christian vocations in each district of the N. C. Conference. Through these meetings we hope to reach all our youth of upper high school age with the Christian philosophy of vocation and show them how they can serve Christ through whatever Christian vocation they choose. The splendid booklet prepared by Dr. Belcher and his staff, "Methodist Service Projects," will be used extensively at the conferences and in several contacts with local church committees on Christian vocations.

COMMISSION ON RADIO AND FILM WORK

It is evident that the use of the audio-visual method as a teaching aid is ever on the increase. The Radio and Film Commission feels a responsibility to the churches of the conference not only at the point of increasing the use, but also at the point of encouraging the efficient use of the audio-visual method.

Therefore, this commission has approved:

1. Underwriting one-half the honorarium of a qualified instructor teaching "The Use of Audio-Visuals in the Church School" in any accredited second series Christian Workers' School in the 1955-1956 conference year. Thus, with one-half the honorarium coming from the Board of Education, the full honorarium will be provided from sources other than the local Christian Workers' Schools.

2. Establishing a filmstrip library which will allow local churches to rent—rather than purchase—the filmstrips needed in their programs. The filmstrip library will be administered by the Radio and Film Commission for the benefit of all the agencies and programs of the North Carolina Conference (education, evangelism, missions, church extension, etc.).

Further, this commission proposes:

1. To promote a special offering on Sunday, January 15, 1956, for the purpose of contributing to the special TV Ministry of The Methodist Church.

2. To encourage pastors and Commissions on Education to invite local television and radio stations to use the productions of The Methodist Church, including the Upper Room Radio Parish.

3. To offer a conference-wide audio-visual workshop in the fall of 1955. The first such workshop was held in Raleigh in 1953. Just this month an audio-visual workshop was held in the Pastors' School at Duke University.

It is our hope that these most effective of all teaching media may be more widely and efficiently utilized in our North Carolina Conference in the years that are ahead.

SOCIAL AND ECONOMIC RELATIONS

At the invitation of the General Board of Social and Economic Relations, the Annual Conference Board officers of the Board of Social and Economic Relations gathered at First Methodist Church, Evanston, Illinois, February 1, 2, 3, and 4. Our conference board was represented by the chairman. Four specific area workshops were held. The Christian in industrial relations, agriculture economics, public welfare, and race relations. Among the speakers during the platform hours were Dr. Harold Bosley, Sir George McLeod of Scotland, the Honorable Archibald Carey, Mr. Samuel Witwer of Chicago, and Dr. Henry Hitt Crane.

On May 9, 1955, at Rocky Mount, the Board of Social and Economic Relations cooperated with the Adult Department of the North Carolina Conference Board of Education in a race relations seminar.

We propose to continue these race relation seminars through the year ahead of us. These seminars are study and discussion seminars, led by outstanding leaders, and no specific resolutions will be drawn up at the seminars. We call upon pastors and laymen to participate in these seminars when the seminars are announced. We believe these seminars afford us the opportunity to discuss our Christian convictions at the grassroots in a brotherly manner.

Our board is planning to sponsor an authority on the Christian's position in industrial relations, and plans to have such a person to visit in our conference. With industry moving into our conference area, we feel we need to understand better the Christian's position in labor-management relations.

We recommend that the North Carolina Conference of the Southeastern Jurisdiction memorialize the General Conference of 1956 to appoint a committee to study the advisability of continuing or discontinuing the Central Jurisdiction and to direct this committee to report to the General Conference of 1960.

WOMAN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE AND WESLEYAN SERVICE GUILD

June 1, 1954 to May 31, 1955

Methodism measures time in terms of quadrenniums. At our recent annual meetings we took cognizance of the fact that there is only one more year left in this quadrennium in which to work toward the quadrennial goals based on the six emphases "That the Kingdom of God May Be Realized," namely: Spiritual Growth, Widening Fellowship, World Church, Peace, Missions, and Discipleship.

We are grateful for progress in every department of our work. Each district has made a substantial increase in finances, resulting in a total increase of \$10,750.88 over last year. During the past three years there was an increase in giving to missions of \$29,187.48. A total of \$189,096.69 was received this year by the conference treasurer, of which \$174,908.47 has been sent to the Woman's Division. A grand total of \$286,878.29 was given for missions and local work.

There has been an increase in membership, and we are pleased to report the organization of 26 new societies. This is the largest number organized in any one year.

Scholarships are carried in Scarritt, Paine, Clark, and Bennett Colleges. The Scarritt scholarship of \$1,000 is a recurring one and during the past year has assisted four girls. In addition to the above, we have just established a scholarship in honor of Miss Sallie Lou MacKinnon, who retired this year after serving her church so magnificently for forty years, and who made a great contribution to world missions. This scholarship will be used in Africa, where our work made much progress under Miss MacKinnon's supervision.

The cause of missions is being greatly strengthened through special gifts made by some of our societies for the support of certain missionaries. Steele Street Society has assumed the support of Miss Virginia Sego, who will soon go as a nurse to India; Edenton Street Society is supporting Miss Elizabeth McManus, a teacher in India; Queen Street Society, a national worker in India, as well as contributing to the Baby-fold in Korea; and the Wesleyan Service Guild is supporting Miss Elsie Parker, a teacher in Brazil. The conference society is assisting a Negro girl from Greenville who plans to enter Clark College soon, preparatory to going to Africa as a missionary.

For sometime we have worked definitely toward recruitment, and at the present time, in addition to the missionaries already named, there are five girls from our conference studying at Scarritt College training for full-time Christian service. Also, we have recently given \$400 to assist in the establishment of a Wesley Foundation at Wake Forest College.

The four conference projects: Student Center, East Carolina College; Urban Work, Havelock; Rural Work, Milton; and Rural Work, Roberdell, have made significant progress. The Student Center has outgrown its present building, and plans are in the making for enlarging this work at an early date. Also, we expect to establish another rural work in our conference in September.

The Christian Social Relations and Local Church Activities line of work is ever on the alert to aid where the betterment of mankind is at stake. During the recent Legislature, thousands of letters were written through this department when it became known that there might be a dog racing bill presented. The Status of Women line of work also worked on this, as well as on other legislation designed to make our state a better place in which to live.

We feel that the marked progress in our work is due in no small measure to the devoted and consecrated women of our conference, and to the 432 prayer groups among our societies. To our bishop; the district superintendents; the conference, district, and subdistrict officers; and the local women we say "thank you." This year of progress reflects your loyal support.

LONG RANGE PLANNING

During this conference year, the Long Range Planning Committee has given attention to church extension, working with Bishop Garber and the Cabinet, the Board of Missions and Church Extension and other agencies of the conference in this vital field. To represent the various boards and agencies a Survey Committee was created to give leadership in this field. Much good has been accomplished. A search for new church locations has been made and much valuable information has been revealed. Several new churches have been started and many more are planned. But perhaps the biggest accomplishment has been the spirit of teamwork and co-operation. The entire conference has been mobilized behind the cause of church extension and a new spirit of oneness has been achieved.

Church extension, so long neglected, is far from finished. Indeed, we are just beginning. If Methodism in eastern North Carolina is to meet its share of responsibility during the significant years ahead, we must establish a Methodist church in every area where there is spiritual need. To this end, we urge the prayers and active support of everyone interested in the extension of God's Kingdom.

During the conference year 1955-56 the Long Range Planning Committee is giving emphasis to evangelism. Plans are already being formulated in co-operation with Bishop Garber and the Cabinet, the Board of Evangelism and other agencies. The Board of Evangelism will give leadership in this field, and is projecting a program. When we realize that for the past several years our net gain in membership has averaged only .54% annually, we are made to realize that this is also a neglected area. Methodism must recover its evangelistic warmth and power. Our people are hungry for the Gospel. We covet the prayers and support of every pastor and layman in the conference as plans for revival are made. During the months ahead it is possible—if we only pray and believe and work—that the new spiritual awakening for which we long may break forth. Without revival we perish. Without revival we become a stiff, formal, spiritless and powerless monument. Through revival Methodism can once more become a dynamic unstoppable spiritual movement redeeming men from their sins and making them purposeful soul-winners for Christ.

A subcommittee consisting of Dr. C. D. Barclift and Dr. W. L. Clegg has studied the matter of co-ordinating the work of the various boards, commissions, committees, and agencies of the conference, and made recommendations which were unanimously adopted by the entire committee. The Long Range Planning Committee recommends the adoption of this report, which is found on the next page.

Members of the Long Range Planning Committee believe that a new day has come to the North Carolina Conference. Our people are rising up to meet the challenge of the hour. It will be the function of the Long Range Planning Committee to discover needs and point out emphases that should be made and seek to mobilize the forces of the conference behind these needs. The committee welcomes suggestions and help from every pastor and layman of the conference.

REPORT OF A SUB-COMMITTEE FROM THE LONG RANGE PLANNING COMMITTEE TO MAKE RECOMMENDATIONS FOR A CO-ORDINATING COUNCIL FOR THE NORTH CAROLINA ANNUAL CONFERENCE

1. Fact of:

We recommend that a co-ordinating council be formed in the North Carolina Conference. This is not to be a super-board with arbitrary powers, but rather a correlating agency.

2. Composition of: We recommend:

a. that the membership of this council be composed of the resident bishop, as chairman; the district superintendents; the conference lay leader; the district lay leaders; the conference president of the Woman's Society of Christian Service; the district president of the Woman's Society of Christian Service; and the officers and executive secretaries of all conference boards, commissions, and committees, as listed in the conference journal.

b. that the council elect an executive committee from its membership.

3. Work of:

We recommend that the work of this council be to counsel with the various boards, commissions, and committees in the interest of achieving closer co-operation; to arbitrate any disagreements that may arise regarding responsibility for work in particular areas of the conference program to unite the efforts of many of these agencies for larger good in a common cause; and to keep conflicts from dates for financial appeals, special meetings, and programs.

4. Meetings of:

We recommend that this council have two stated meetings per conference year and at other times on call of the chairman; the stated meetings to be:

(1) Approximately two weeks after adjournment of a regular session of the Annual Conference.

(2) Not later than sixty (60) days before the convening of a regular session of the Annual Conference.

5. In Place of:

Since this co-ordinating council, if constituted as recommended, would have a larger representation from the different agencies of our conference than the present Inter-Board Council, we recommend that the said co-ordinating council replace the conference Inter-Board Council.

CONFERENCE SURVEY COMMITTEE

The Conference Survey Committee, in conjunction with other sponsoring agencies, participated in the special session of Annual Conference in January which precipitated survey on a scale before unknown in our state.

As a consequence of careful preparation, district and subdistrict meetings unearthed more than 212 areas needing careful study relative to their need for new churches within the bounds of our conference. Many churches which had been closed in recent years were suggested as possible areas needing new study and evaluation. Charge re-arrangement and church re-location were suggested, some with great merit. A new spirit of study and planning is emerging in the thinking of ministry and laity alike as a consequence of this survey.

Beneficial results have become readily apparent as surveys have been made in more than thirty of these areas suggested under the leadership of Rev. Thomas A. Collins and Mr. Roy Turnage, able survey director. Twelve new churches have emerged within this conference year, partly as a consequence of wise survey preliminary to their organization.

The committee has been assigned four Duke divinity students for the summer months who will make careful study of many more of these areas; the study will continue until each area suggested has been carefully evaluated, and its proper time schedule for growth prepared.

Since the work of the Conference Survey Committee is still not completed, we recommend that it be continued effective for the next conference year, 1955-56. The Conference Survey Committee is trying now to integrate its work with the established programs of the Board of Missions and Church Extension and the evangelistic outreach of the Board of Evangelism. In this manner proper advantage can be taken of information gained through its study and survey.

COMMITTEE ON WORLD PEACE

Report No. 1

We believe that it is possible, and practical, for this nation to be at peace with all other nations, and for all nations to be at peace with each other.

We call upon the leaders of our nation to be less critical, and more friendly, toward all nations in their public and private speeches, thereby lessening world tension and diminishing the fears of wars.

We advocate that our Methodist Church, through the Board of World Peace, endeavor to make contacts with Christians in all lands, to assure them of our love and sympathy, to encourage their friendships, and to give material aid, encouragement, and spiritual knowledge; and, further, we commend the work of our Methodist Youth Caravans in Europe, and request that this type of work be continued and expanded to reach other countries.

We believe that our Methodist ministers, in all their public pronouncements, are endeavoring to train the minds of American Christians to forgive and to love our enemies and to believe that through the constancy of the giving of our friendship, we may set the standards of "Peace on Earth and Good Will Toward All Mankind"; we believe that when all nations sincerely trust our motives, and can know that we desire "Peace and Brotherliness" they will lift their banners and march with us to make the years and centuries peaceful, and a reign of brotherliness, as taught by our Saviour, Jesus Christ, will be experienced consistently.

We subscribe to and uphold the following policies of our nation:

1. We endorse the proposal for atom ship touring the world in the interest of world peace.
2. We endorse the proposal that atomic energy be used for the betterment of human life around the world, and that atomic energy for purposes of war be disbarred by all nations by agreement.
3. We rejoice in the continuance of the reciprocal trade agreement act, and we believe that all nations should trade freely and fairly one with another.
4. We endorse the proposal that treaty making powers remain as now provided for in our constitution.
5. We wholeheartedly endorse the United Nations organization and urge the Methodist Church to share in the appropriation for the United Nations Children's Fund.
6. We advocate that the United States take the leadership in encouraging all nations, including our own, to withdraw their armed forces from foreign soils, at the earliest practical date, and consistent with self-defense, and when self-government is assured; and, further, we advocate that the United Nations organization provide protection, and oversight, for governments that are threatened by foreign powers.
7. We believe that peaceful and friendly treaties should be contracted by this nation with all nations, and that the contents of these treaties should be made public in each nation.

**INTER-BOARD COMMITTEE ON ALCOHOL EDUCATION
AND CHRISTIAN ACTION**

The 1953 Annual Conference authorized the creation of the Inter-Board Committee with the view of uniting the efforts of all the agencies of our conference in a co-operative program of alcohol education and social action. In the minds of those who conceived the idea, the committee was to instill co-operation. The work of this group has been hampered by several occurrences over which it had no control.

First, the absence of F. Roderick Dail, who served as chairman and who first saw the need of this group. Secondly, there has been a misunderstanding of responsibility and inevitably certain areas of overlapping efforts on the part of this agency and the Conference Board of Temperance. Third, a canvass of the district superintendents made early in the year showed that the short year would not allow time for the planned district seminars on alcohol education.

After two years of existence, this committee feels that the district secretary of temperance is the "key" person to the conference program. We reaffirm the position that this agency is not competitive to, but rather co-operative with, the Conference Board of Temperance. We look to them for initiating a program and offer the assistance of the personnel of our committee, personal representing nearly all the churches of our conference.

We do believe and affirm that rather than limiting our financial support and our social action program to agencies outside our church and conference, that it would be well for us to make a specific effort to integrate this program into the life of the local church and thereby into the lives of the adults and youth who face this social menace in their homes and communities. We call attention to the fact that in 1953-54, the Conference Board of Temperance expended only \$30.00 in the conference program while the sum of \$3,000.00 was contributed to the Allied Church League for its work. It is our feeling that the work of the conference board would be greatly strengthened if it controlled its own funds and could direct and support a program of temperance within the framework of our own conference structure. We appreciate the fact that our conference Board of Temperance has upheld the historic Methodist position and that it has been a prophetic voice in our midst. We urge its support and strengthening.

What is the Brotherhood? The Brotherhood is a group of Methodist ministers and lay people who want to express their sympathy to the bereaved widow of a Methodist preacher in a way that will be of real assistance when it is most needed. Instead of sending telegrams or flowers, gifts of \$1 by superannuated ministers and lay people; \$3 by pastor members whose salary is under \$3,000; \$4 if the salary is from \$3,000 to \$4,000; and \$5 if above \$4,000. This money is sent by the treasurer as soon as the death is reported to him, and the widow has the needed money to pay funeral expenses even before she receives any money from insurance. This is not an insurance company. It is a fellowship, a brotherhood.

Who Compose the Present Membership? The membership is made up of 52 retired men, 205 active ministers, 230 non-beneficiary members (lay members), making a total of 257 ministers and 230 lay, or a grand total of 487. This means that a widow will receive a little over \$1,000 upon the death of her husband. During the year we have added eight retired ministers, 41 active ministers, and 21 lay members.

Who Are Eligible to Join? Article 4: "Any ministers of the North Carolina Conference on trial or in full connection, or any accepted supply pastor doing supply work in the conference may become a beneficiary member of the brotherhood by payment of an initiation fee of \$1 and within 30 days from the date of entrance a mortuary assessment of \$3 if his salary is under \$3,000; \$4 if his salary is from \$3,000 to \$4,000; and \$5 if his salary be \$4,000 or above. The mortuary assessment on any beneficiary member who becomes superannuated shall be \$1 per call. Accepted supply pastors who have served at least 10 years and who cease to travel because of physical disability, or because there is no more work for them, may continue as beneficiary members. Any person or organization may become a non-beneficiary member upon the payment of \$1 or more and the promise to pay the specified sum on the death of each beneficiary member thereafter."

What Would Happen If All Preachers and 200 or More Lay People Were to Join the Brotherhood now? We would then be able to pay the widow \$2,000. All ministers who are not members should take advantage of the opportunity to join now. Those who join now will not have to pay any more than the amount stated in Article 4 above.

We particularly encourage the young men who are now in the conference to investigate the values of the brotherhood. They may talk to any of the officers or members of the brotherhood. We believe they will want to join and share in the fellowship of the Conference Fellowship.

Part II

CHANGE IN THE CONSTITUTION OF THE CONFERENCE BROTHERHOOD

Article 10

Amendment: Strike out the words in the last sentence following the word "suspended" and substitute the words "until the close of the 1956 session of the Conference."

The amended article now reads as follows:

Article 10. A member of the conference shall not be eligible to membership in the Brotherhood after he has been in full connection for ten years. A supply pastor of the conference shall not be eligible as a member of the brotherhood after he has been supplying a pastorate for ten years. At the time a member joins he shall pay all assessments in arrears from the time he was admitted into full connection or began working as a supply pastor in the conference. That the provisions of Article 10 of the Constitution be suspended until the close of 1956 session of the conference.

COLLEGE BOARD OF VISITORS

Because this conference year was shortened, and since High Point and Greensboro Colleges had been visited immediately before the 1954 session, this board has visited only Louisburg College during the current year. In this visit we were joined by a committee from the Board of Education of the Western North Carolina Conference. This committee planned to make independent visits to the colleges in the western part of the state during the academic year just ended. It is our intention for the two groups to continue to work together during the coming academic year and to visit all the Methodist colleges in the state. During this year we hope also to arrive at a joint recommendation as to how this work should be carried on by the two conferences in the future.

On our visit to Louisburg College we found many indications of progress. Extensive renovation on the campus and three of the main buildings had been carried through. Living and working conditions for the college community have been greatly improved, but there is still need for further improvements and provision for additional facilities. The number of students had increased by about 25% above the previous year; and recent reports point to a considerable increase for the coming academic year. The board was impressed especially by the greatly improved spirit among both students and faculty. We received the impression of a real dedication on the part of the whole college community to building the college into a more effective agency of the church. The new professor of Town and Country Work has made a place for himself in the college life and we believe is making an important contribution to the present progress. It is our belief that as rapidly as possible this department should be strengthened by the provision of additional resources and personnel. The board is working with the college administration to this end, and we recommend full support by the conference in the development of this program and general work of strengthening Louisburg College for a greater contribution to the life of our conference.

THE METHODIST COLLEGE FOUNDATION OF NORTH CAROLINA, INC.

The Methodist College Foundation of North Carolina is the helping hand to the five Methodist colleges related to the North Carolina and Western North Carolina Conferences. These colleges are: Brevard, Duke University, Greensboro, High Point, and Louisburg, and they belong to the Methodists of North Carolina.

Many of our Methodists are probably not aware of what they have in their colleges, nor the importance of the work being done there. The property value and endowment of these five institutions is approximately \$90,000,000. The total enrollment last year was 8,088, which is one-fifth of all students enrolled in all the colleges of the state. There are 857 full-time faculty members. All this is the heritage of the Methodists of North Carolina and is dedicated to the deepening, quickening, and making more vital our Christian faith.

Most of what we now have has been given to us by those who have dreamed, loved, labored, and have passed on. What we do with this trust is bound up with our stewardship responsibilities to them, to God, and to the Methodist young people of today and tomorrow.

We also have a responsibility to the faculty members of these colleges. Our college teachers are probably the lowest paid full-time employees of the church for the service they render. Many of them receive less than high school teachers. Many receive less than directors of Christian education in the local church. Many receive less than the minimum salary for pastors in the conference. This condition must not continue.

Your continued support of the United College Appeal, for capital funds; your increased support of the College Sustaining Fund, for operational costs; and your prayerful consideration when your young people are making their choice of the college they will attend, will reflect, at least partially, your stewardship to God, to the church, and to our fine Methodist youth. Another way you can guarantee the future of these colleges is to name the Foundation or one of these colleges in your will. In this way, you let your will express the Will of God for the youth of tomorrow!

METHODIST STUDENT CENTER

Greenville, N. C.

In our Wesley Foundation program this past year we have kept in mind the program emphases of the Methodist Student Movement:

1. To deepen the personal relationship to God through Jesus Christ.
2. To awaken the campus community to the realization of the need for Christian living.
3. To understand the Christian Church—history, mission, and beliefs—and to realize their possibilities as Methodists.
4. To promote ecumenical understanding and participation in campus communities.
5. To witness to the meaning of study and stimulate students and faculty in their search for truth.
6. To develop local campus fellowships—in which students and faculty can mutually strengthen one another in Christian thinking and living.
7. To consider the implications of a Christian philosophy of vocations; to present as a direct challenge the personal needs of the church.
8. To seek the application of the Christian ethic to campus and community life and political, economic, and social life on state, national and international levels.

At the heart of our program has been personal and group worship. Two early morning meditation groups have met weekly for spiritual cultivation, and group worship has been well planned. The counselor has held 738 personal conferences with students. "Power" has been given to students quarterly. The Little Chapel in the Student Center is kept open at all times for private meditation and prayer.

Contact has been made with the more than 600 Methodist students out of a college enrollment of 2,878, and a sincere effort has been made to bring them into the Christian fellowship in the Student Center, their "home away from home." One hundred eighty attended the Student Class in the church at Jarvis Memorial; four hundred twenty-three students made a total of 7,574 visits to the Student Center. Eighty non-Methodists attended the Sunday school class, making a total of 260 attending for the year. Emphasis was placed upon witness for Christ through personal living in the dorms, in campus groups, and in the classroom.

Our students feel themselves a part of the churches in the community and participate in the programs at Jarvis Memorial and St. James. Some sing in the church choirs, and large numbers attend the morning worship in the sanctuary. Class in the meaning of church membership; the special observance of Lent; and special communion services at the Center, as well as the interest and leadership of our pastors, have brought our students into the fellowship of the church.

The Wesley Foundation adopted Ewha College in Korea as a fellowship college, and contributions have also been made to the Cuba work camp and through the MSFF. A member of the college faculty was sent by our Campus-Church Relations Committee to the Conference on Religion and Education held at Montreat last year, and plans are being made for a Faculty Christian Fellowship on campus. Our WF co-operates with the other church and religious groups on campus through the Inter-Religious Council, and the director meets regularly with the co-ordinator of campus religious activities and directors of other church groups.

A special effort was made in the area of inter-racial relations. Our WF adopted a Negro family, providing for their observance of Christmas through gifts and visiting in the home, making friends with the family and contributing toward their needs throughout the year. The Advent play pointed up the problem of discrimination between white and colored races, and was presented in the Student Class to the Woman's Society of Christian Service at Jarvis Memorial and for the Wesley Foundations of State and Meredith Colleges in Raleigh. Our students have been very interested in a Negro student, inviting her to supper on Sunday night at the Center and to speak at vesper. The director worked with the Bureau of Educational Institutions of the Woman's Division in securing a scholarship for this student.

Special emphasis has been placed upon recruitment for full-time Christian service. Special conferences have been arranged for students with representatives from the Personnel Department, Board of Missions, and the alumni secretary of Scarritt College. Two graduates of 1954 have been awarded educational grants and will enter Scarritt College in September to begin training as deaconesses. A young woman, graduated in June, will be in training this summer for service as a US-2. Two rising seniors are in youth caravan service this summer, one in drama caravan and one in regular youth

caravan. Two students are serving as counselors at Camp Don-Lee. The director is cultivating several students who are interested in full-time Christian service and is keeping in communication with the Department of Personnel concerning them.

We recognize the unlimited opportunities offered us in the increasing enrollment at East Carolina College. Our present Student Center is inadequate to accommodate the increasing number of Methodist students on our campus who are our responsibility. We need a larger building and better equipment to enable us to meet the opportunities of our ever-expanding program.

THE NORTH CAROLINA PASTORS' SCHOOL AND CHRISTIAN CONVOCATION

The 1955 session of the Pastors' School and Christian Convocation was held at Duke University, Durham, during the period June 7-10, 1955. Advance preparations were made by the Board of Managers in collaboration with the Department of In-Service Training of the General Board of Education and the Convocation Committee of the Duke Divinity School, Dean James Cannon, chairman. Dr. J. Richard Spann, director of the Department of In-Service Training, assisted in the selection of the faculty.

The total number in attendance was four hundred and eighty, representing all parts of the state of North Carolina and a few places in Virginia and South Carolina. The number of unregistered guests attending the night preaching service was not estimated.

The preacher was Dr. James T. Cleland, whose themes were "The Majestic Fatherhood of God," "The Effective Ministry," and "Blessed Are the Debonair." The James A. Gray Lectures were delivered by Dr. George Hedley, chaplain of Mills College, Oakland, California, whose subject was "The Minister Behind the Scenes." Daily morning worship was led by Bishop Costen J. Harrell, who used the theme, "In the Secret of His Presence." Bishop Harrell also directed the convocation communion service. A

workshop on preaching was directed by Dr. Cleland. Under the sponsorship of the North Carolina Conference, a new workshop was conducted in audio-visual aids under the direction of a selected committee composed of: Dr. C. P. Morris, and the Reverends T. A. Collins, Jesse H. Lanning, W. C. Walton, Jr., and F. W. Dowd Bangle. This workshop met on two afternoons and one evening and attracted a sizeable group of interested persons.

The following courses were offered: "Pastoral Care," by Dr. Russell L. Dicks; "Worship," by Dr. R. P. Marshall of Lockhaven, Pennsylvania; "Methodism's Message for Today," by Dr. J. O. Smith of Spartanburg, South Carolina; "Pastoral Care in an Industrial Setting," by the Reverend Clifford Peace of Winston-Salem, North Carolina; and "Planning and Administering the Vacation School," by Mrs. Edith W. Reed of Salisbury, North Carolina.

At the end of the school it was announced that the James A. Gray Lectures next year will be delivered by Dr. John Knox of Union Seminary, New York, and the time will be June 5-8, 1956.

APPROVED SUPPLY PASTORS' SCHOOL FOR 1955

The annual Approved Supply Pastors' School at Duke University will follow rather than precede this session of the North Carolina Annual Conference. The dates are July 19-August 5, 1955. More than 175 students are expected to attend from thirteen annual conferences. The majority will come from the conferences under the supervision of Bishops Paul N. Garber and Costen J. Harrell.

The Approved Supply Pastors' School is a joint project of the Duke Divinity School and the Department of In-Service Training of the General Board of Education, Dr. J. Richard Spann, director. It is supported by funds from the Southeastern Jurisdiction, the Department of In-Service Training, and Duke University. Several annual conferences, including the North Carolina Conference, contribute for scholarship aid to their own men.

This school provides opportunity for supply pastors and ministers coming into conference membership to complete their course of study required in the 1952 Discipline. The school is planned, in co-operation with Dr. Spann, by a Divinity School committee consisting of Dean James Cannon, W. A. Kale, A. J. Walton, and McMurry S. Richey. Twelve instructors will offer twenty courses comprising about three-fourths of the course of study. Faculty members this year include three pastors, Leon Couch and O. Kelly Ingram of the North Carolina Conference and Emmett K. McLarty, Jr., of the Western North Carolina Conference; six Divinity School faculty members: John W. Carlton, A. Durwood Foster, Creighton Lacy, H. E. Myers, Gilbert T. Rowe, and John I. Rudin, II; two from the Undergraduate Department of Religion of Duke University; Boyd L. Daniels and R. H. Sales; and William R. Locke of High Point College. The daily services of worship in York Chapel will be conducted by students under the direction of the classes on "Preaching," "Worship," and "Church Music."

The Approved Supply Pastors' School has had the helpful co-operation of the district superintendents and officials of the Conference Boards of Ministerial Training and Qualifications in this part of the Southeastern Jurisdiction, in publicizing the school, securing and approving students, and furnishing supplementary scholarship aid. It is our hope to be of effective service to the conferences and their men in the course of study.

THE METHODIST BOARD OF PUBLICATION, INC.

As it approaches its centennial observance, North Carolina Methodism's official news magazine is enjoying one of its best years in its illustrious history. The circulation of the North Carolina Christian Advocate, averaging almost 31,000 copies weekly, is at an all-time high. Total income from subscriptions and job work is at an all-time high, too. For the first eight months of our fiscal year which began September 1, 1954, income is as follows: Advocate, \$46,972.14; job work, \$68,856.17; total, \$115,828.31. This compares with \$112,470.95 for the same period last year.

This good record, we realize, is made possible by the loyal support of our two bishops, our nineteen district superintendents, our more than 900 pastors, and more than 400,000 faithful laymen. We wish to commend especially our district directors of the Advocate for their good work.

The centennial will begin at the forthcoming session of the Western North Carolina Conference with an address by Bishop Paul N. Garber, and will be climaxed at the 1956 session of the North Carolina Conference.

The plan of sending the Advocate to every family is meeting with increased success in both of our conferences. We urge pastors and official boards to include the Advocate in the budget on the every-family basis. We also recommend that January and February be continued as Advocate months, but we urge churches not to wait until then, except where they already use these months for promotion of the Advocate. To put the Advocate in the homes of our people at the beginning of the new conference year will have large beneficial results.

The term of N. E. Edgerton expires with the present conference year, and the board recommends his re-election for another five-year term by this session of the North Carolina Conference.

It is with deep regret that we announce the resignation of our capable editor, Dr. Cecil W. Robbins, effective July 1, 1955. Coming to the editor's chair almost seven years ago, Dr. Robbins has given us unusual and effective leadership. A writer of challenging editorials, he has interpreted to us the church, her program, her opportunities and responsibilities. Aply and fearlessly, and, at the same time, sympathetically, he has wisely discussed those issues pertinent to our time. Thus he has helped us in our effort to think and to live more like our Master. He has promoted the cause of the church and of Christ, and in doing so he has given us a clearer interpretation of the Christian ideal. His writings have been well balanced, down to earth, and influential. He has ridden no hobbies, but has faithfully presented the whole Christian cause in a manner so positive, plain and convincing that we have one of the great Advocates of the church. His intelligent leadership, both in the editorial and managerial field, has brought the Advocate to an all-time high in circulation and in influence, and in the love and loyalty to our constituency.

As Dr. Robbins takes over the duties of the presidency of Louisburg College on July 1, he will have our earnest prayers and best wishes. For the Advocate his work was well done; for the college we believe his service will bring added strength.

Present reading: Last line—"The Committee is requested to determine the place of holding the next Conference not later than April 1, if possible."

Amend to read: "The Committee shall determine the place of holding the next conference not later than January 1, if possible."

SECTION III. Article 2. Subject: Amendments.

Present reading: "Any amendment offered to any paper, and all motions of more than a single sentence, must be in writing and given to the Conference Secretary."

SECTION IV. Article 3. Subject: Substitutions for lay delegates.

the statistician from the pastors' reports. This table shall be printed in the Conference Journal."

Delete in its entirety.

VI. THE CONFERENCE JOURNAL

SECTION VI. Article 2. Subject: Complimentary copies of Journal.

Present reading: "One complimentary copy of the Conference Journal shall be sent each of the following: The conference claimants, the educational institutions, the general boards, the publishing house, the lay members of the conference boards. Seven copies shall be sent to each pastor without charge. All other copies shall be sold at \$1.00 each, or single copies by mail at \$1.10 each.

Amend to read: "One complimentary copy of the Conference Journal shall be sent each of the following: The conference claimants, the general boards, the publishing house, lay members of the conference boards, lay delegates to the Annual Conference, the educational and church-related institutions of the North Carolina Conference. The Conference Secretary shall have discretionary authority to send copies to such other educational institutions as he may deem advisable. Six copies shall be sent to each pastor without charge. All other copies shall be sold at \$1.25 each, or single copies by mail at \$1.35 each. Monies accruing from the sale of Journal will be deposited with Conference Treasurer and credited to the Journal account.

Therefore, we respectfully memorialize the General Conference of The Methodist Church, now in session, to take immediate steps to make provision for an expanded program of theological education.

A MEMORIAL TO THE GENERAL CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST CHURCH TO BE CONVENED APRIL 25, 1956, IN MINNEAPOLIS, MINNESOTA

Prior to 1939 our great Methodism was divided into three separate and distinct denominations. There were many great and good souls who had hoped and prayed that the time would come when the Methodist people in the United States would again be one, not only in doctrine, but also in organization. Many efforts were made to find a plan of union acceptable to all three bodies, but every plan proposed failed until the commissioners submitted a plan which incorporated the jurisdictional system. This system became the key to reunion, without which unification would have been impossible. This plan was submitted to the General Conferences of the three churches and received the necessary constitutional majority in each. The Plan of Union was consummated and sealed on May 10, 1939, in the Uniting Conference in Kansas City, Mo.

The jurisdictional idea was an integral part of this plan of union. The progress of our church since 1939 has proven the wisdom of this plan. The jurisdictional units are more effectively administered than would be possible in dealing with nearly ten million members as a whole, and they make it possible for the church to keep closer to the people.

The jurisdictional structure affords to each jurisdiction of our United Church, regardless of its numerical strength, the privileges of representation on the councils and the general boards and commissions of the church, and of electing its own bishops, of controlling its own institutions and administering certain of its own affairs subject to the Discipline of the Church.

The constitution of the Methodist Church provides that "All Jurisdictions shall have the same privileges of action within the limits fixed by the Constitution," and it wisely and generously allows more than proportional representation to the smaller jurisdictions.

We believe that the jurisdictional structure of The Methodist Church is in the best interests of all her members and is, in the words of the late Bishop William Frasier McDowell, "a church which God can use."

Therefore we, the members of the North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Church, assembled in Fayetteville, North Carolina, June 27-30, 1955, respectfully memorialize the 1956 General Conference to strengthen the jurisdictional structure to the end that it may be more largely used for the enrichment of the life of the whole church and may more effectively strengthen her arm for service in every part of the world.

Whereas, the approved supply pastor in charge of a pastoral appointment, prior to his appointment, was entitled as a layman to represent his charge in the Annual Conference with full voting privileges;

Whereas, to deprive the approved supply pastor of a vote in the Annual Conference is automatically to deprive the charge he serves of one-half of its voting power in the Annual Conference;

Whereas, no truly democratic state or nation now thinks of depriving a citizen of his right to vote simply because he lacks a certain degree of college training;

Whereas, the chief reason the great majority of the approved supply pastors do not belong to the Annual Conference is their limited educational training and not any deficiency in practical wisdom, faith, or Christian fruitfulness;

Whereas, the approved supply pastor serving a charge is our brother in the Methodist ministry, assuming responsibility for the full program of the local churches under his care;

Therefore, be it resolved, that the North Carolina Conference, in session at Fayetteville, North Carolina, June 27-30, 1955, memorialize the General Conference of the Methodist Church of 1956 to amend paragraph 317 in the 1952 Discipline by striking out the words "but without vote," and substituting in their place the following: "and on order of the Annual Conference shall have the right to vote, provided he has served as pastor in charge for as many as two years and has passed the first two years of the conference course of study prescribed for approved supply pastors."

Thus, as amended, paragraph 317 would read: "An approved supply pastor who is in charge of a pastoral appointment shall attend the sessions of the Annual Conference and shall have the privilege of speaking on any question, and on order of the Annual Conference shall have the right to vote, provided he has served as pastor in charge for as many as two years and has passed the first two years of the conference course of study prescribed for approved supply pastors."

Therefore we would like that a report for the classes of the church school be provided which would include such items as (1) attendance at the school and church; (2) invited others to attend; (3) prepared lesson; (4) tithing income in place of the word "offering"; and (5) daily Bible reading and prayer. This, we feel, will develop a more effective instrument as well as a more adequate index to the effectiveness of our work in the development of the spiritual life of our people.

6. That the tellers be and they are hereby instructed, to make a complete and accurate report to the conference of all ballots cast, distinguishing between "defective" and "valid" ballots, announcing all names of the persons voted for on the "valid" ballots, and the number of votes received by each. No ballot shall be counted as "valid" that contains more or fewer names different than the number to be voted for at the time of such balloting, as announced in advance by the chair.

RESOLUTION REGARDING THE WESLEY FOUNDATION WORK*

Realizing the need of helping our Methodist students in state institutions of higher learning, our conference, through the World Service, has allocated the sum of \$15,000 annually for the program of work and for salaries of the directors at Wesley Foundation Centers in the state.

Realizing also that where Wesley Foundation work is connected and associated with the local church, there has arisen conflictive opinions regarding the work, the attitude and the allocation of duties of the Wesley Foundation director as it relates to the local church together with conflicting use of facilities in the church and that of the local church pastor in charge of the local church.

Therefore, in order to eliminate this apparently increasing confusion which is detrimental to the effectiveness of the work with our students:

"I move that this conference hand down a directive to the Inter-Conference Commission on Student Work the following plan of procedure with regard to the Wesley Foundation.

(a) That beginning with this conference year, the work of the Wesley Foundation, the board of directors and the Wesley Foundation director, be under the direction of and amenable to the pastor in charge and the quarterly conference of the local church.

(b) If this plan of work should meet with disapproval on the part of the General Office of Wesley Foundation Work, then we should sever our relations with the General Office and channel our work and money in and with the Methodist Student Movement.

The work among our Methodist students should not be jeopardized merely for the sake of our connections with an organization which is oftentimes unfortunately alienated from the church by the nature of its work and the personalities connected therewith.

All this is at times unfortunately being done to and for the church while the church itself gives the money and has little or nothing to say regarding the plan of work being done at our Wesley Foundation Centers.

Even though the motives, the aims and the desires on the part of the church is to keep the Methodist students closely related to and tied into the structure and fabrics of our church.

The future workers with our students should be known and designated as associate minister for students.

Since the student work of the state is carried on jointly between the North Carolina Conference and the Western North Carolina Conference, we urge that a similar motion

be submitted to the approaching session of the Western North Carolina Conference for their consideration.

Gentlemen:

We have examined the books and financial records of Mr. M. J. Cowell, Treasurer, of the NORTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE, S.E.J., OF THE METHODIST CHURCH, RALEIGH, NORTH CAROLINA, for the 1954-55 conference year (eight months) ended June 30, 1955, and submit here with our report, consisting of the exhibits and schedules as set forth in the preceding index, together with the following related comments.

FINANCIAL POSITION

The financial position of the various boards and committees, the funds of which are handled in the Central Treasurer's office, is shown in detail in Exhibit "A," Fund Balance Sheet. The following is a comparison of the financial position at June 30, 1955, of all funds handled by the Central Treasurer with a similar summary of the position at October 31, 1954.

Separate reports were rendered as a result of our audit of Methodist Retirement Homes, Inc., and Methodist College Foundation of North Carolina, Inc., at October 31, 1954. We have combined these results of the previous year with the Central Treasurer's for comparative purposes inasmuch as their operations are included in the current report.

RESULTS OF OPERATIONS

The results of operations of the funds, boards and committees are presented in summary form in Exhibit "B," Income, Expense, or Distribution and Fund Balance.

Mr. M. J. Cowell, Conference Treasurer, has prepared statements from his records, for publication in the Conference Journal, comprising the details of the results of operations as summarized in Exhibit "B" of our report. These detailed statements, as prepared by Mr. Cowell and presented under the title of "Treasurer's Statement of Board Operations," have been verified by us.

Exhibit "C," Income from Charges by Districts, presents the income for the various apportioned and special items for the 1954-55 conference year by districts.

SCOPE OF EXAMINATION

Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances, some features of which are referred to in the outline that follows on specific items.

Cash on deposit was confirmed directly with the banks. Recorded cash receipts were traced to their subsequent deposit in the bank on a test basis, and disbursements were verified by test examination of cancelled checks and paid invoices or authorizations. Income from charges as shown by the treasurer's records was compared with reports of the pastors to the Annual Conference. In those instances where there was a difference between the treasurer's records and the pastors' reports, the treasurer wrote the pastor, stating the differences, and requesting that the pastors check their records and advise us as to any corrections which should be made. Distribution of income from the charges was audited by reference to the report of the Commission on World Service and Finance for the 1954 and 1955 sessions of the Annual Conference, and by reference to proper authorization from the various boards of the conference.

Investments of the treasurer and the various boards and funds were inspected during the course of our examination.

Cash receipts in transit represent 1954-55 collections received by the treasurer subsequent to the balance sheet date and were set up from deposits in the banks. Accounts and apportionments payable were set up from disbursements subsequent to the balance sheet date and by reference to proper authorizations for the distribution of 1954-55 collections.

CERTIFICATE

In our opinion, the accompanying balance sheet and related statement of income, expense or distribution, and fund balance present fairly the financial position of the North Carolina Conference, S.E.J., of the Methodist Church, Mr. M. J. Cowell, treasurer, at June 30, 1955, and the results of operations for the 1954-55 conference year (eight months) then ended, in conformity with accounting principles of the conference applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.
