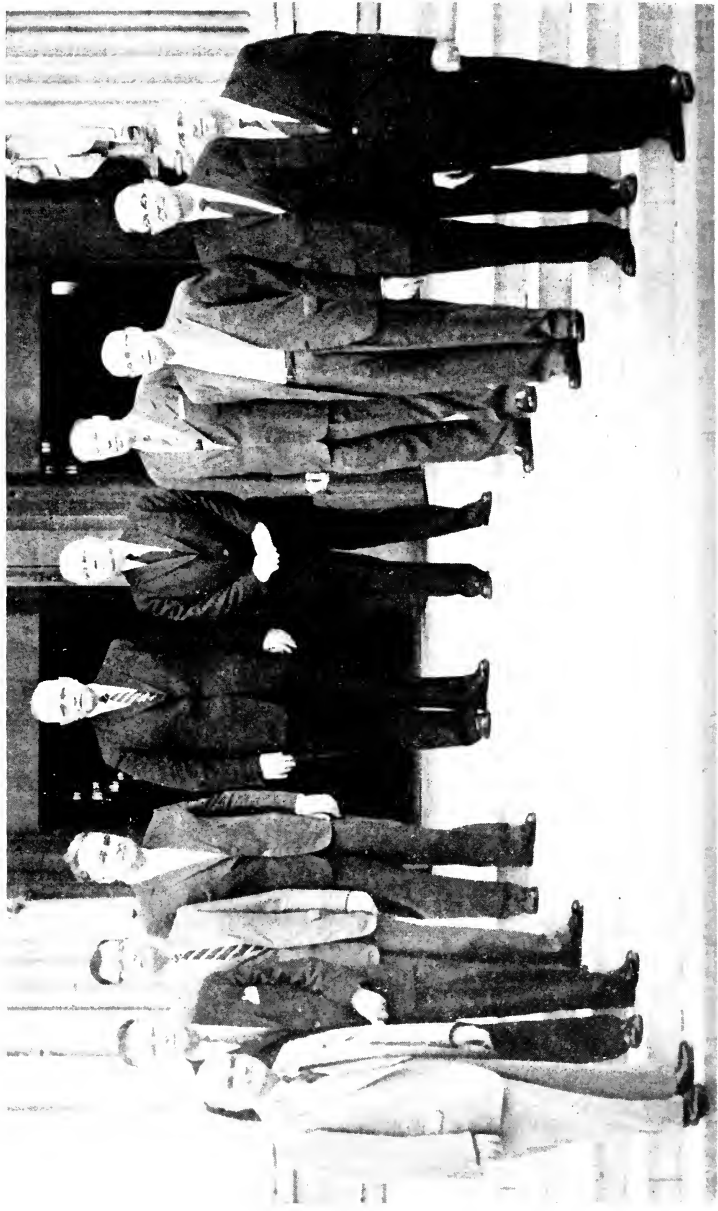

HISTORICAL STATEMENT

The North Carolina Conference was set off from the Virginia Conference in May, 1836, and in 1850, and again in 1870, North Carolina territory in the South Carolina Conference was transferred to this Conference. In 1890 North Carolina territory in the Holston Conference and in the Virginia Conference, except that beyond the Chowan River, was transferred to the North Carolina Conference, and the Conference was divided into the North Carolina and Western North Carolina Conferences. In 1894 the remaining North Carolina territory in the Virginia Conference was transferred to the North Carolina Conference.

The North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Church was composed of the North Carolina Conference of the former M. E. Church, South, and parts of the North Carolina Conference of the former Methodist Protestant Church and the Blue Ridge-Atlantic Conference of the former Methodist Episcopal Church. The former Methodist Episcopal Church gave to the North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Church 9 preachers, 11 charges and 1,837 members; the former Methodist Protestant Church 23 preachers, 20 charges and 9,152 members; the former Methodist Episcopal Church, South, 273 preachers, 226 charges and 132,735 members.

Rules of Order and Procedure for the North Carolina Annual Conference of The Methodist Church

I. RULES OF ORDER

1. Robert's Rules of Order shall apply to any situation not covered by these Rules.
2. No member who has the floor may be interrupted except for a breach of order, a misrepresentation, to direct the attention of the Conference to the fact that time has arrived for a special order, or to raise a very urgent question of high privilege.
3. No member shall speak a second time on the same question if any member who has not yet spoken desires the floor, nor more than twice on the same subject under the same motion, nor longer than ten minutes unless his time shall be extended by the Conference, except as provided in Rule 4.
4. When the report of the committee is under consideration and when all have spoken who desire to do so, or when (and after) the previous question has been ordered, the chairman and/or duly authorized member or members presenting the committee's report (and the minority report if there be one) shall be entitled to speak before the vote is taken.
5. A member claiming the floor at any time for what he believes is a very urgent question of high privilege, shall be allowed to indicate briefly the nature of the question, and if it be adjudged by the chair to be such, he may proceed at his pleasure, or until the chairman judges he has exhausted his privilege.
6. Voting shall be by a show of hands unless otherwise ordered by the Conference. A "yea" and "nay" vote, if taken, shall be by written ballot, which result will be published in the Conference Journal. A count vote may be ordered on call of any member supported by one-fifth of the members present and voting, in which case the delegates shall rise from their seats and stand while they are counted.

II. ORGANIZATION

1. The Secretary: The secretary of the Annual Conference shall be elected quadrennially, at the first session of the Conference after the meeting of the General Conference; and on nominations arising from the floor.
2. Assistant Secretaries: The secretary shall nominate his assistants and the Conference shall elect.
3. Statisticians: There shall be a conference statistician and an assistant statistician. The statistician shall be elected quadrennially at the first session after the meeting of the General Conference. The assistant statistician shall be elected annually upon nomination by the statistician.
4. Conference Stenographers: The conference secretary shall employ the conference stenographers.
5. Compensation: The Commission on World Service and Finance shall determine, subject to the approval of the Conference, the compensation given officers for their services and also the method and amount for meeting expenses of said officers. The conference treasurer shall pay these amounts.
6. Boards, Commissions, and Committees: The Bishop and his Cabinet shall determine the size of and nominate the members of all boards, commissions, and committees authorized by the General Conference, the Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference, and this Annual Conference, except in those cases in

- which the Discipline directs otherwise. The recommendations and nominations shall be subject to the approval of the Conference.
7. The Conference Board of Trustees: The Conference Board of Trustees shall be required to meet at least once a year other than the regular meeting at the session of the Annual Conference.
 8. The Conference Treasurer and all others receiving and disbursing funds from our Conference shall be required to make audited statements annually, and to print the same in the Journal.
 9. Program Committee: There shall be a Program Committee of the Conference consisting of the resident Bishop, the Conference Secretary, the District Superintendent of the District in which the sessions of the Conference is held, the pastor of the host church, and the Conference Lay Leader. This committee shall determine the compensation and expense for invited speakers and this shall be paid from the Conference expense fund.
 10. Committee on Conference Objectives: There shall be a Conference Quadrennial Committee on Conference Objectives. See Paragraph 651—Question 47, page 185, 1956 Discipline.
 11. Entertainment Committee: There shall be a Conference Entertainment Committee, composed of three ministers and two laymen. This committee shall be elected at the first session of the Conference following the General Conference, and shall serve for the Quadrennium. This committee shall receive invitations and determine the place and method of entertaining the Conference sessions. The Committee is requested to determine the place of holding the next Conference not later than January 1, if possible.
 12. Committee on Memoirs: The Conference Secretary and the District Superintendents shall constitute the Committee on Memoirs. The members of the committee shall be charged with the responsibility of providing for all the details of the memorial service. The Conference Secretary shall be the chairman of this committee.
 13. Committee on Daily Minutes: A committee of three members shall be elected each year to examine the daily minutes of the sessions of the Conference and report daily to the Conference.
 14. Courtesies and Resolutions: There shall be constituted a Committee on Courtesies and Resolutions, annually, at the first session of the Conference.
 15. Committee on Appeals: There shall be appointed, quadrennially, a Committee on Appeals, composed of at least five members, whose duties shall be to hear appeals from the decisions of the several District Boards of Church Location and Building, or any other questions that may properly come before them.
 16. American Bible Society: All matters regarding the relation of the Conference to the American Bible Society and its work shall be referred to the Board of Education.

III. REPORTS AND RESOLUTIONS

1. All reports and resolutions presented to the Conference shall be written (type-written if possible) in triplicate. Two copies shall be in the hands of the conference secretary before the report or resolution shall be read to the Conference for consideration.
2. Any amendment offered to any paper, and all motions must be in writing and placed in the hands of the conference secretary immediately following its presentation.

IV. LAY DELEGATES TO THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE

1. Lay delegates, regular and reserve, from the pastoral charges to the Annual Conference shall be elected by the Quarterly Conference at least forty-five days prior to the session of the Annual Conference.
2. Each district superintendent shall complete the list of lay delegates to the Annual Conference, from his district, at least forty-five days before the Annual Conference session, and shall immediately transmit the completed list, in duplicate, to the conference secretary.
3. Substitutions for lay delegates to the Annual Conference must be made in written form provided by the conference secretary, and must be approved and signed by the district superintendent. Such substitute delegates may function only in the absence of the regular delegates.

V. PASTORS' REPORTS TO THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE: STATISTICS

1. Each pastor shall complete Table I of his annual report to the Conference, and transmit the same to the conference statistician at least two weeks prior to the opening date of the Conference.
2. Charge and church treasurers shall mail their final remittance for the current year to the conference treasurer on the second Monday preceding the opening date of the Annual Conference, and each pastor shall complete and mail Table II to the conference statistician immediately thereafter.
3. Each table of the report shall be filled out by individual churches with totals for the charge.
4. Table II shall be made out in even dollars only.
5. Tables I and II shall be printed in the Conference Journal with individual church reports and charge totals as compiled by the conference statistician from the pastors' reports.

VI. THE CONFERENCE JOURNAL

1. Editor: The conference secretary shall be charged with the responsibility of editing and making contracts for the publication of the Conference Journal, in keeping with the regulations of the General Conference and of the South-eastern Jurisdictional Conference. The editor shall have full authority to condense reports, memoirs, and other papers when necessary.
2. One complimentary copy of the Conference Journal shall be sent to each of the following: The Conference Claimants, the General Boards, the Publishing House, lay members of the Conference Boards, lay delegates to the Annual Conference, the Educational and church-related institutions of the North Carolina Conference. The conference secretary shall have discretionary authority to send copies to such other educational institutions as he may deem advisable. Six copies shall be sent to each pastor without charge. All other copies shall be sold at \$1.25 each, or single copies by mail at \$1.35 each. Monies accruing from the sale of Journal shall be deposited with the conference treasurer and credited to the Journal account.

VII. DISTRICTS

1. The number of districts shall be nine.
2. A district conference shall be held annually, in each district.
3. Each pastoral charge shall elect annually two lay delegates to the district conference. These shall be in addition to those named by the Discipline as ex officio members.

4. The district and associate district lay leaders shall be elected annually by the Annual Conference on nomination of the district superintendents and the conference lay leaders.
5. The district superintendent of each district shall be required to furnish to the bishop, the conference treasurer, and the conference statistician, as early in the year as possible an official copy of the apportionments to the charges for World Service and Conference Benevolences and the amounts accepted by the charges, also the amounts approved by the charges for the several items of ministerial support. The figures furnished the conference statistician shall be used by him in making up his report to the Conference. Two of these copies are to be sent to the secretary of the Commission on World Service and Finance.
6. Each district superintendent, as early in the year as possible, shall furnish the bishop, the conference treasurer, and the conference statistician with a schedule of the salaries of pastors as set by the Quarterly Conferences. The figures furnished by the district superintendent to the conference statistician shall be used by him in making up his report to the Conference.
7. We call attention of the district superintendents to Paragraph 431 (1) 1956 Discipline, and state that we believe that a reasonable time for such consultation, before the appointments are to be read, could not be construed to be less than twenty-four hours.

VIII. AMENDMENTS

1. These rules of order and procedure may be amended by a two-thirds vote on the next day after a proposed amendment has been presented in writing; provided the rule fixing the number of districts may be amended by a majority vote; provided, further, a change in the number of districts may not be made later than the second morning of the Annual Conference session.

IX. WHEN THE RULES BECOME EFFECTIVE

1. These rules of order and procedure of the North Carolina Annual Conference shall become effective immediately upon passage by the vote of the majority of the Conference.

JOURNAL OF THE SPECIAL SESSION

North Carolina Annual Conference

Hay Street Methodist Church, Fayetteville, N. C.

Monday, November 4, 1957

Morning Session

Opening: The North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Church, South-eastern Jurisdiction, convened in special session at Hay Street Methodist Church, Fayetteville, North Carolina, November 4, 1957, at 10:00 a.m., with Bishop Paul N. Garber, presiding. The Hymn, "A Charge to Keep I Have" was sung. The prayer was led by O. L. Hathaway.

Motions: Bishop Garber called on W. C. Wilson, conference secretary, for certain motions:

W. C. Wilson moved that clerical and lay delegates register their attendance by signing cards. The motion was carried.

W. C. Wilson moved that main floor be the bar of the conference. The motion was carried.

W. C. Wilson moved that the conference rules adopted in the session of the Annual Conference meeting at New Bern, June 24-27, 1957 be the rules to guide us today. The motion was adopted.

Welcome: Mayor George B. Herndon of the City of Fayetteville gave words of welcome.

Announcement: G. S. Eubank, host pastor, made announcement concerning facilities of the church and arrangements for lunch.

Motion: O. L. Hathaway made motion that conference secretary send words of sympathy to the family of Daniel Lane, whose funeral was being held at Waynesville this morning. It was adopted by observing a quiet moment, and followed by a prayer by Bishop Garber.

Statement by Bishop Garber: Bishop Garber made statement concerning the purpose of this special conference, and read a paragraph in the conference journal pertaining to this special session.

Report of Commission on Christian Higher Education: V. E. Queen presented the report of the Commission on Christian Higher Education. (see report). He moved the adoption of the report. It was seconded. He then spoke to the report on the theme: "What the Report Intends to Accomplish".

Paul Carruth spoke to the report on the topic: "The Approach of the Commission on Christian Higher Education in allocating Goals".

W. L. Clegg spoke to the report on the theme: "The Unity of Our Task in Christian Higher Education".

Resolution: W. E. Perry of Warrenton read a resolution concerning the registration of students of all races at these new colleges. (see resolutions). Bishop Garber read a statement concerning the resolution. He ruled the resolution out of order, as it does not pertain to the main purpose of this special session.

Report of

COMMISSION ON CHRISTIAN HIGHER EDUCATION

The General Conference of The Methodist Church, in its 1956 Session, meeting in Minneapolis, Minnesota, saw the full implication of our historic heritage in Christian higher education, and adopted a far reaching program intended to mobilize the leadership and the resources of the great Methodist Church to meet the contemporary crisis in higher education.

It directed that there should be created in each Annual Conference a Commission on Christian Higher Education which should be charged with the responsibility of strengthening the bonds that bind our institutions of learning to the church, to lead our schools and colleges to a thorough commitment to Christian standards and ideals, and to lead the church in an effort to undergird them with adequate moral and financial support.

For a decade, there has been a growing concern for this important area of

the life and work of the Church. From the initial work of the College Advance to the pioneering acceptance of the responsibility to build Methodist College and North Carolina Wesleyan, the North Carolina Annual Conference has demonstrated a rapidly developing awareness of the crucial nature of this work with students.

A review of the legislation of the North Carolina Annual Conference during the past five years reveals the consistent development of its commitment to the work of Christian Higher Education.

In a Special Session meeting on March 4, 1952, at Edenton Street Church, Raleigh, the Conference took the following action:

- (1) That the North Carolina Conference join the Western North Carolina Conference in the United College Appeal to raise a sum of \$2,500,000.
- (2) That the quotas be set at 60% for the Western North Carolina Conference and 40% for the North Carolina Conference.
- (3) That the North Carolina Conference shall raise its \$1,000,000 quota as follows:
 - (a) The sum of \$400,000 in cash and pledges to be raised on a District-by-District basis beginning with the Annual Conference Year 1952-1953, with all pledges to be paid within a three-year period.
 - (b) The sum of \$600,000 to be raised by increasing the College Sustaining Fund from its then present 3-1/2% to 7% over a period of ten years, namely, the Conference years 1952-1953 to 1962-1963.

On May 14, 1956 in Special Session, the North Carolina Annual Conference meeting at St. Paul Church, Goldsboro, took the following official action:

“(First) That the North Carolina Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction, The Methodist Church, accept the report of the Long Range Planning Committee with reference to the proposal that a Senior (four-year) Co-educational Methodist College be established at Fayetteville, North Carolina; (Second) That the North Carolina Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction, The Methodist Church, accept the report of the Long Range Planning Committee with reference to the proposal that a Senior (four-year) Co-educational Methodist College be established at Rocky Mount, North Carolina; without the proviso that Louisburg College be moved to Rocky Mount; (Third) That Louisburg College be continued at its present location as a Junior College.”

The North Carolina Annual Conference in Regular Session June 25-28, 1956, at Jarvis Memorial, Greenville, took the following action:

1. Approved Certificates of Incorporation for colleges at Rocky Mount and Fayetteville, and elected the members of the Boards of Trustees.
2. Adopted the following recommendation of the Commission on World Service and Finance:

“We recommend that Louisburg College be included in the forthcoming campaign for Capital Funds for Colleges in the amount of \$450,000 to be conditioned upon their fulfillment of a community commitment of

- (a) \$50,000 for renovation of the Davis Building;
- (b) Provision of \$10,000 annual continuing support to the college;
- (c) Upon their securing a government loan to build a new cafeteria;
- (d) That they set aside in the Methodist Fund, Incorporated, from the \$450,000 capital funds a sufficient amount for the income to retire the government obligation, after allowing for the income from the cafeteria;

- (e) Remainder may be used for capital expenditures at the discretion of the Board of Trustees."

The North Carolina Annual Conference in its regular 1957 Session at Centenary Church, New Bern, approved the following request of the Commission on World Service and Finance. "We request authority for the Board of Education and/or the Commission on Christian Higher Education to initiate the Conference Colleges Capital Funds Campaign at such time as it may deem suitable and desirable."

The Annual Conference also adopted the following:

"That the Annual Conference authorize a Capital Funds Campaign to be launched when, in the discretion of the Committee, proper cultivation has been made, with the further provision that a detailed blueprint outlining and defining such a campaign be presented for approval at the forthcoming special session of the Annual Conference."

The Commission on Christian Higher Education has taken the following steps to effectuate the Capital Funds Campaign:

1. It has carefully surveyed the field of fund-raising counselors, and has selected the firm of Ward, Dreshman and Reinhardt, Inc., to assist in the Campaign.
2. Upon the recommendation of Ward, Dreshman and Reinhardt, Inc., a goal of \$5,000,000 was set for the Campaign.
3. As the responsible agency of the Conference, the Commission has heard the presentation of the needs of our several institutions.

Recognizing that our present Campaign will only partly meet the total needs of our colleges, the Commission on Christian Higher Education was faced with the necessity of evaluating the present responsibilities of the North Carolina Annual Conference. It carefully considered the several factors that press for attention. These include: the major and compelling goal of getting our two new colleges opened for instruction; strengthening our Junior College at Louisburg; and the fulfilling of our conditional commitment for \$450,000 to Louisburg College; the tremendous contribution made to the North Carolina Conference in the training of her pastors by the Divinity School of Duke University; the need to recognize our concern for High Point and Greensboro Colleges; the strengthening of Wesley Foundation.

After careful and unhurried deliberation pursuant to the action of the 1957 Session of the Annual Conference authorizing the Commission on Christian Higher Education to initiate a Capital Fund Campaign, the Commission recommends a Capital Fund Campaign of \$5,000,000 with the following allocations:

1. After payment of campaign expenses, the first \$2,225,000.00 shall be allocated: \$1,000,000 to Methodist College; \$1,000,000 to N. C. Wesleyan College; \$225,000 to Louisburg College.
2. The balance of the income from the campaign shall be allocated: \$1,000,000 to Methodist College; \$1,000,000 to N. C. Wesleyan College; \$225,000 to Louisburg College; \$100,000 to the Divinity School of Duke University; \$150,000 to Wesley Foundation; \$50,000 to Greensboro College; \$50,000 to High Point College.

The Commission on Christian Higher Education presents this report with the confident expectation that the North Carolina Conference will find the College Capital Fund Campaign worthy of its best effort and loyalty. The Campaign is

designed to unite our people in a glad response in which our debt to the past will be paid by placing the future in our debt. In this quadrennium of Christian Higher Education Emphasis throughout the Methodist Church, we of the North Carolina Annual Conference dedicate this campaign to bringing the mind of North Carolina to the mind of Jesus Christ our Lord.

 - 100,000 Duke Divinity School
 - 150,000 Wesley Foundation*
 - 50,000 Greensboro College
 - 50,000 High Point College

*To the Inter-Conference Commission on Student Religious Work for their building fund.

This Commission approved the request of the Commission on Christian Higher Education to borrow money to finance the Capital Fund Campaign not to exceed the amount of \$200,000 and for them to hypothecate pledges and collections to

Statement by Bishop Paul Neff Garber at North Carolina Annual Conference Special Session held at Hay Street Methodist Church, Fayetteville, November 4, 1957.

It is the duty of the presiding officer to rule on whether amendments, motions and resolutions are in order or if they are germane to the matter before the house. Before making my ruling on the matter before us I wish to make the following statement.

First, the matter of integration in our two new colleges and our already existing institutions has never once been mentioned or discussed in a meeting of the Commission on Higher Education or in any meeting of the Board of Trustees of

Methodist College, Fayetteville, or North Carolina Wesleyan College at Rocky Mount. The matter of integration is now being presented as a theoretical matter and is not based upon any action or statement on the part of the Boards of Trustees. I can understand and you can understand that there is tension today in America over racial matters but this special session of our North Carolina Annual Conference was called for the launching of the financial campaign for our two new colleges, Louisburg College, the Divinity School of Duke University, High Point College, Greensboro College and our Wesley Foundation and Methodist Student program. The time for the discussion of racial matters and related subjects is at the regular session of our Conference or at a special session of the Conference called for a discussion of racial matters and related subjects. Our Methodist Discipline and Roberts Rules of Order provide that in a special session only such matters can be discussed that were mentioned in the call of the special session.

Second, the resolution is out of order because in Methodist educational institutions matters relating to faculty, curriculum, admission of students and similar items are in the control of the Boards of Trustees. These trustees are elected or approved by our North Carolina Annual Conference or by both the North Carolina and Western North Carolina Conferences in case of joint ownership of an institution. The charters of our colleges, which are granted by our State of North Carolina, clearly designate that the Boards of Trustees control the details of administration such as the matter of admissions. I do not know of an Annual Conference in American Methodism where the annual conference in session drafts regulations relating to Methodist colleges of the type mentioned in the resolution which has been offered.

And along that line let me assure all members of this Conference that we have able men and women who are the trustees of all our colleges and Wesley Foundations of our North Carolina Conference. They are our own brothers and sisters; they know how our people feel about the problems before them; they are not isolated from us. We can trust them.

Now I have read this lengthy statement because I regret always to rule a motion or resolution out of order and I know that no person or group likes to be ruled out of order. I must however be true to parliamentary regulations when I preside in any meeting and you expect me to follow parliamentary procedures.

I must however rule the resolution out of order—first, this is a special session of our Annual Conference called for a special purpose which does not include the matter of integration or related racial matters; second, the matter of admission of students mentioned in the resolution comes under the control of the Board of Trustees and not under the control of the Annual Conference and therefore the resolution is out of order.

But after making this ruling let me state that Brother Perry and the Methodists who adopted the resolution have redress if you permit me to use a legal term. This resolution can be presented direct to the Board of Trustees of our colleges. Second, I will be happy as bishop to meet with any group in our Conference for an informal discussion on any matters including racial matters. I really wish you would allow me to come and give what light I can shed on the matter rather than listening to outside agencies some of which are really hostile to us Methodists and would love to see us waste time and energy on this matter and thereby block the progress of Methodism in Eastern North Carolina and elsewhere. Third, at our Annual Conference in June we survey all phases of the program of our Conference and a resolution covering the subject mentioned this morning will be in order

and will be open to debate and action by our Conference. Ruling the resolution out of order in this special session does not rule the subject out of order at the proper time and place.

At the first session of the first Methodist Annual Conference ever held in the world John Wesley asked this question, "Need we be afraid of reviewing any old plan or idea?" and the noble answer was "No, if they are false the sooner they are overturned the better, if they are true they will stand the strictest examination." In like manner we North Carolina Methodists are not afraid to discuss any plan, or idea, old or new, but this examination must be made at the proper time and place and within the parliamentary regulations of our Conference.

North Carolina Annual Conference

FIRST DAY, AFTERNOON SESSION

Monday, June 23, 1958

At 1:15 p.m. the organist of First Methodist Church, Wilson, Mrs. E. T. Stallings, presented a fifteen minute prelude of organ music consisting of "Ave Verum" by Mozart, "This is My Father's World" by Sheppard, and "Largo" by Handel.

Opening: The one hundred twenty-third session of the North Carolina Conference (twentieth since unification in 1939) was convened at First Methodist Church in Wilson, N. C., Monday, June 23, 1958 at 1:30 p.m. by Bishop Paul N. Garber, resident Bishop of the Richmond Area. Hymn 402, "And Are We Yet Alive" was sung, followed by the Apostles' Creed in unison. Walter C. Ball, Superintendent of the Rocky Mount District, led in prayer. Mrs. Fred Hurley sang, "The Prayer Perfect."

Roll Call: The Bishop called on W. C. Wilson, Conference Secretary, to call the roll of the Conference. The Secretary moved that the registration cards signed by the delegates become the official record of attendance for the Conference. The motion was adopted.

what the Endowment has done. He presented A. J. Walton, the administrator of the Endowment, who spoke on the work. He called attention to the J. M. Ormond Fund, and pointed out what that Fund is doing. A. J. Walton presented V. E. Queen of the North Carolina Conference and Wilson Nesbitt, of the Western North Carolina Conference, recently appointed to the Duke Divinity School Faculty and work with the Duke Endowment.

Bishop Garber presented Bishop Fred P. Corson, of the Philadelphia Area. He addressed the Conference on the theme of Christian Higher Education.

Paul Carruth presented the report of the Conference Quadrennial Commission on Christian Higher Education. He moved the adoption of the report. It was adopted.

C. P. Morris reported on the work of the Conference Board of Education staff. He introduced Mrs. V. E. Queen, who has been serving as Conference Director of Children's Work. She will be replaced at this Conference session by W. G. Brogan, who was presented to the Conference by C. P. Morris. G. R. McKenzie, Jr., Conference Director of Youth Work, was presented. Harold D. Minor, Conference Director of Adult Work, was presented. The Report of Progress was discussed, and various groups in the Conference were asked to evaluate the report. C. H. Mercer reported for the Children's Work. A. J. Walton reported for the Youth Work. Bill Price, of Burlington, reported for the Adult Work. David Bradley also reported on Adult Work. A. L. G. Stephenson reported for General Church School Work. Alison Simington, Jr. reported for Christian Family Life.

W. M. Wells, Jr., Director of Methodist Student Work, was presented and reported on his work.

The first section of the report dealing with the Local Church was adopted.

Announcements: Bishop Garber announced plans for Conference sessions on Wednesday. L. C. Vereen made announcements.

Benediction: Wilson Nesbitt gave the benediction.

THIRD DAY—MORNING SESSION

Wednesday, June 25, 1958

At 8:15 a. m. the organist of First Methodist Church, Mrs. E. T. Stallings, presented a fifteen minute prelude consisting of "Holy, Holy, Holy!", by Stults; "My Jesus, I Love Thee", by Gordon; and "My Faith Looks Up to Thee", by Mason.

Opening: The Conference convened at 8:30 a. m. with Bishop Garber in the chair. After the singing of Hymn No. 245, "O Sometimes the Shadows Are Deep", D. F. Lowry led the morning prayer.

Anniversary of the Board of Temperance: The anniversary of the Board of Temperance was observed with D. W. Charlton, president, presiding. He presented the report of the Board, and moved the adoption. J. R. Regan, Jr. spoke briefly. It was adopted.

A member of Alcoholics Anonymous addressed the conference on his experience as a member of Alcoholics Anonymous.

D. W. Charlton made an announcement, and then introduced J. R. Regan, Jr.

Resolutions: H. G. Ruark presented two resolutions: First: Concerning this Conference giving deed of trust to the lending agency, First Citizens Bank and

Trust Co. for land on which new student union building at Louisburg College is to be located, plus the driveway to the building. It was adopted. Second: Concerning trustees at Louisburg College. It was adopted.

Chair: Bishop Garber asked Bishop Peele to take the chair and preside during the anniversary of the Board of Pensions.

Anniversary of Board of Pensions: The anniversary of the Board of Pensions was observed with John M. Dozier, of Durham, president, presiding. He presented Barney L. Jones, who addressed the Conference.

Privilege: W. T. Lamm, Jr., of First Church, was recognized for a personal privilege. He escorted Mrs. Paul N. Garber to the platform and presented her to the Conference. She spoke briefly. Bishop Peele responded.

W. R. Stevens presented the report of the Board of Pensions. Section No. 1 was adopted. J. M. Dozier spoke concerning Section 2, and presented two representatives of the Presbyterian Ministers Fund, namely, James Mollenaver and Wesley Martin. Mr. Mollenaver was called to answer questions.

C. L. Warren made substitute motion that we delay action on Section 2 which deals with group insurance plan for Conference members until present study is completed. It was seconded. The vote was 96 for the substitute motion and 96 against it.

C. L. Warren moved to amend provision 4 in the report. It was that if ministers so desire they may participate in group insurance program. The amendment was lost.

C. S. McCoy raised the question of the legality of using pension funds for group insurance. The chair ruled that it was legal according to the Discipline, Par. 1630, sections 10 and 11. M. W. Lawrence and W. M. Jeffries spoke against section 2 of the report. M. J. Cowell spoke for the report. The vote was taken and the vote was 96 for and 124 against, thus section No. 2 was lost.

Bishop Garber received a check in the amount of \$80.00 representing the payment due the North Carolina Conference from the chartered Fund of the General Board of Pensions.

Announcements: Announcements were made by J. M. Dozier and R. W. Bradshaw.

Question 21: "Who are the approved Supply Pastors?" was called. W. M. Howard, Chairman of the Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications, recommended that J. E. Mahoney, a student approved Supply Pastor in school, and John Wesley Langley, a full time Approved Supply Pastor, be placed on the list of Approved Supply Pastors.

Question 29: "Who have been elected deacons?" was called. The answer was: (a) Theological students: George William Johnson, Peleg Dameron Midgett, III, and Edwin Lee Roach.

Question 48: "Where shall the next session of the Annual Conference be held?" was called. Leon Russell spoke briefly and presented Julian Aldridge of First Methodist Church, Rocky Mount, who issued an invitation to meet at First Methodist Church in Rocky Mount. E. E. Atkins, of Rocky Mount, endorsed the invitation.

J. V. Early extended an invitation to meet in 1959 at Grace Church, Wilmington. J. E. Garlington spoke for the invitation. W. J. Neese and M. C. Dunn also spoke.

The vote was taken, and the Conference voted to go to Grace Methodist Church, Wilmington, in 1959.

L. A. Watts spoke against the resolution

J. R. Regan, Jr., spoke for the resolution

A. J. Walton raised a point of order which was sustained by the Chair—that a Report (Memorial) was being considered on the floor of the Conference before going to the proper committee (Committee on Memorials) for study.

T. J. Whitehead moved that part two of the resolution be referred to the Conference Committee on Memorials to the General Conference. (Committee to be appointed by the Cabinet at the 1959 Session of the Annual Conference.) The motion was seconded.

Vote: The vote was taken on referral of part two, and the motion was adopted.

Amendment withdrawn: W. M. Jeffries withdrew his amendment to delete "General Conference" from the resolution.

Vote: The vote was then taken on the Whitehead resolution as amended, and it was adopted.

Board of Social and Economic Relations: T. J. Whitehead, speaking for the Board of Social and Economic Relations, reported that from the session of that Board held last evening it was thought best to continue further study with the presidents and trustees of the several colleges concerned.

Harmon Smith spoke for the recommendation. W. L. Clegg spoke for the recommendation. It was adopted.

Bishop's Committee on Architecture: C. D. Barclift presented statement concerning Church Architecture, and included the committee, The Bishop's Committee on Architecture, named for work in this field. He recommended that it be printed in the Conference Journal. It was approved. (The Committee is listed under Organizations, Section II.)

Question 1: "Who are elected for the quadrennium?" was called. Secretary, W. C. Wilson; Statistician, D. D. Traynham; Treasurer, M. J. Cowell.

Question 2: "Is the Conference Incorporated?" was called. The answer was "No."

Question 3: (a) "What officers handling funds of the Conference have been bonded, and in what amount?" was called. The answer: The Conference Treasurer, in the amount of \$100,000.00.

Question 4: "Have the Conference Boards, Commissions, and Committees been appointed and elected?" was called. The answer was: "Yes."

Question 5: "Have the secretaries, treasurers, and statisticians kept their respective records upon and according to the forms prescribed by the Methodist Church?" was called. The answer was: "Yes."

Resolution: E. C. Crawford presented resolution concerning reports. W. C. Wilson spoke, stating certain problems involved in printing the reports.

E. C. Crawford spoke for the resolution.

W. C. Wilson spoke again.

The resolution was not adopted.

Committee on Minutes: J. D. Young presented a report on minutes. It was adopted.

Resolutions: C. G. Megill presented resolution concerning memorial to General Conference with reference to lay representation being equal to that of clerical. It was adopted and referred to Committee on Memorials to General Conference to be appointed at 1959 Session of the Annual Conference.

Announcements: L. C. Vereen, W. C. Wilson, and Mr. A. R. White made announcements.

Offering: An offering was received.

Committee on Resolutions: J. V. Early gave the report of the Committee on Resolutions expressing gratitude to the members of First Methodist Church and people of the city of Wilson. It was adopted.

Infant Baptism: Rev. and Mrs. C. M. Mitchell presented their daughter, Mary Anne, for Christian baptism. The rite was administered by Bishop Garber.

Question 51: "Where are the preachers stationed for the ensuing year?" was called. Bishop Garber read the appointments. (See appointments.)

Benediction: After the singing of one stanza of "God Be With You Till We Meet Again", Bishop Garber pronounced the benediction, and the 1958 session of the North Carolina Annual Conference was concluded.

****PRESTON DEWITT WOODALL**

1872-1957

Preston DeWitt Woodall was born to John and Emily Eldridge Woodall in Johnston County September 25th 1872. He attended the public schools of Johnston County and then went to Trinity College and was in the class of 1902. He later went to Boston University for a specialization course in public speaking.

Brother Woodall was admitted into the North Carolina Conference at Washington, N. C. in the year 1899. He was received into full connection in 1903. He served the following appointments: Windsor, Edenton, Epworth-Raleigh, Zebulon, Jacksonville, Pittsboro, Whiteville, Rowland, Middleburg, Fayetteville Circuit, Stantonsburg. In 1939 he retired on account of failing health.

In April 1913 Preston Woodall and Miss Elizabeth Brinkley of Wilmington, N. C. were united in matrimony. The children from that union were John Burwell Woodall of New York City and Preston Woodall, Jr. of Wilmington, N. C.

Woodall was regarded by all of us as a most excellent preacher. He really knew the meaning of "words fitly spoken". It did not take him long to preach a sermon but when he had finished, the people were unanimous in pronouncing it good. There was no possibility of any man questioning the absolute sincerity of the preaching of this man of God.

All too often we talk about men suffering from overwork. In the case of Brother Woodall it was true. This applied especially in his pastoral work. He rejoiced with those who were happy, but he was nearly always bearing the burdens of the people who were in trouble. People in prison, sick, stricken with grief, burdened with sin, or lying hard by the gates of death, all of them in his reach felt the warmth of his bleeding heart.

The only criticism of the ministry of Preston Woodall was that he spent too little time in relaxation and rest and too much of his time with people who were sick. This was the thing that led to his breakdown and finally his retirement. He would have preached and lived longer had he given more thought to his own welfare, but there are many people in heaven now who would have missed the way had it not been for this pastor whose heart bled and broke over them.

Following a prolonged illness, Preston Woodall died in a hospital in Durham, July 11, 1957. He was buried in Oakdale Cemetery at Wilmington, N. C. In heaven he found the relaxation and rest that so many people coveted for him.

ROBERT GRANDISON LEE EDWARDS

1890-1957

Robert Grandison Lee Edwards, son of Dr. Grandison Christian Edwards and Sally Frances Brown, was born on October 16, 1890, in Hookerton, N. C. He attended Ormond High School, Trinity Park School, and Trinity College, receiving an A.B. degree from Trinity College in June, 1912. On October 12, 1915, he was married to Miss Annie Clyde Parker, daughter of the Reverend A. J. Parker, who for many years was a faithful minister in the North Carolina Conference. To this union one daughter, Clyde, was born.

Bob was a good husband and father, a good friend and neighbor, a good citizen and fellow-countryman. But the finest thing that can be said of him is that he was a good minister of Jesus Christ. His whole life was given to the Methodist Ministry. He received his license to preach in New Bern, N. C., in 1911, and the same year was admitted on trial into the North Carolina Conference, meeting in Kinston. He received Deacon's Orders at the session of the North Carolina Annual Conference meeting in Oxford, N. C., in 1913, and Elder's Orders in Wilmington in 1915.



For 46 years, Preacher Bob, as he was affectionately known, preached faithfully and effectively the Gospel of our Lord and Savior. During that time he served 18 charges in the North Carolina Conference: Graham, Youngsville, Mebane, St. John's (Goldsboro), La-Grange, South Mills, Tabor City, Ahoskie, Plymouth, Parkton, Branson (Durham), Troy, Whiteville, Fuquay Springs, Tar River, Garner, Bailey, Layden Memorial (Raleigh). On these 18 charges he touched, blessed,

and enriched thousands of lives. He was a faithful and hard worker, and his ministry has borne a rich and abundant harvest of souls.

The record of his ministry is written not only in the many lives he has touched and blessed, but it is also written in the Journals of the North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Church, where it can be read tomorrow and a hundred years from now. It is a good record. Every year he reported a fine number of people led to Christ and brought into the membership of the church. There were no barren years in his ministry. During his ministry he received more than 1600 people into the membership of his churches, and nearly 1000 of them were on profession of faith. These figures do not include the hundreds of people he led to Christ in the revival meetings he held for his brother ministers. What a great host of people there will be to gather around him in that heavenly land, and to thank him for leading them into the way everlasting

Bob was also a church builder. Wherever he went he not only increased the membership of his churches, but he also improved the physical properties of the charge. Even after he retired in 1954 (and he retired upon the advice of his doctor), he did one of the best pieces of work of his ministry. In 1954, he accepted an appointment to a church where there was no church—only a name and a community in which to work. There were no members, no church building, not even a lot upon which to erect a building, and no available building in which services could be held. But that did not discourage him. With his characteristic spirit of faith, optimism, cheerfulness, and persistent effort, he brought into being a church, a good church—the Layden Memorial Church, Raleigh, N. C. When on the 28th of June, 1957 he gave up his pastorate (again upon the insistent advice of his doctor), he left to his successor a well organized church of 109 members, an adequate temporary building equipped for Church School and worship services, located on a beautiful lot, and a completed set

of blueprints and specifications for the first unit of the permanent building. That was no small achievement for three years as a retired minister.

On July 20, 1957, while he and his wife were visiting a friend in Hazelhurst, Georgia, he suffered a heart attack and died instantly. Funeral services were conducted in Mitchell Funeral Home, Raleigh, by Dr. Howard P. Powell, and his district superintendent, Rev. R. Grady Dawson. His body was laid to rest in the peaceful, shady Oakwood Cemetery in Raleigh, N. C.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Annie Parker Edwards of Garner, N. C., one daughter, Mrs. D. L. Gore, and two grandchildren of Rockingham, N. C., one sister, Mrs. Henry C. Tyson of Farmville, N. C., one half-sister, Mrs. Christine Gullander of El Paso, Texas, two half-brothers, A. C. Edwards of Hookerton, N. C., and Herman Edwards of Washington, D. C.

We shall miss Bob, with his cheerful smile, his fine sense of humor, his happy, friendly, brotherly disposition; but we shall cherish many fond memories of him, and be grateful for the privilege of knowing him and working with him.

If we listen closely, I am sure we can hear the words of the Master saying, "Well done, good and faithful servant", and those other words of the author of Revelation, "Blessed are the dead who die in the Lord, for they rest from their labors, and their works do follow them."

DANIEL LANE

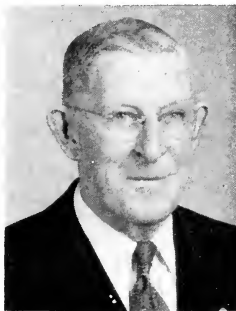
1888-1957

The Reverend Daniel Lane, for forty years an active and faithful member of the North Carolina Conference, was born near New Bern, May 18, 1888. He died at his home, "Lane Haven", at Lake Junaluska, N. C., Saturday morning, November 2, 1957; having attained age sixty nine.

Brother Lane was the son of the late Daniel Lane and Vanie Rice Lane. Their's was a truly christian home in Craven County near New Bern, N. C. Beach Grove Methodist Church was his spiritual home and inspiration during his childhood and youth. Having the heritage of such creative influences, it was only natural that he should hear God's call to the ministry and have in his heart the qualities of a good minister of Jesus Christ.

He was admitted on trial, along with this writer, to the North Carolina Annual Conference in 1913. He served the following pastoral charges: Ayden; Caswell Street, Kinston; Camden Circuit; Stantonsburg Circuit; City Road, Elizabeth City; Northampton Circuit; Louisburg; Wallace-Rosehill; Clinton; Roanoke Rapids, First Church; Aberdeen-Vass; Person Circuit; Fairmont and Eastover. He responded to the call of duty and danger, and served as chaplain, U. S. Army, in World War I.

Dan Lane had an alert and questing mind for knowledge and truth. He attended the Trinity Park School, graduated from Trinity College in the class of 1913; received the B.D. degree from the Duke Divinity School in 1939; and took graduate work at Sorbonne University, Paris, while serving in the chaplaincy. He was civic minded, and enjoyed membership in civic clubs where he might enlarge his community acquaintances and service. His compassionate heart prompted him to visit the sick and assist many to obtain hospital care who otherwise would have gone without such care.



As is true of most good men, his home and family were his pride and joy. In this he had the fortunate and blessed comradeship of a loving and faithful wife, Juanita Dixon of Ayden, N. C., who survives him. They were married July 15, 1918; and to this union were born three daughters and a son: Mrs. Clyde M. Taylor of Redwood, Cal., Mrs. William T. Simmons of Charlotte, N. C., Mrs. Robert E. Allison of Waynesville, N. C., and Daniel Lane, Jr., a graduate student in Chicago University. These, together with several grand-children, will cherish the memory of his love and fulfill his paternal dreams and sacrifices for them.

Due to a heart condition, he found it necessary to retire at the conference of 1953. In anticipation of this, he had acquired a home at Lake Junaluska which he and Juanita named "Lane Haven." To them this was the place next to heaven as indeed it came literally to be on Saturday morning, November 2, 1957 when the final summons and appointment came. Like his great exemplar, St. Paul, he knew the time of his departure was at hand. He was ready and unafraid. Having finished his race and kept the faith, he was confident of his heavenly coronation. Funeral services were conducted in Waynesville, N. C., Monday morning, November 4, 1957.

Farewell, dear friend, class-mate both in college and the conference, and brother minister of Jesus Christ! For us, as with Jesus our Lord, death is but an interlude from this earthly and temporal life, and home to the house not made with hands, eternal in the heavens. "Thanks be to God, who gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ."

NATHAN BRADLEY STRICKLAND

1878-1958

The period December 24, 1878—June 9, 1958 was the lifespan of Nathan Bradley Strickland. The fifth born of the twelve children of Robert Strickland and his wife, the former Cornelia Jane Lee, of the Antioch church community in Johnston County, his rearing and nurture were in a most devout home. His education was in the local schools, with his more advanced training in Turlington Institute in Smithfield. Near the age of twenty, he began the vocation of teaching which he continued for fourteen years. February 25, 1903 he married Alma Gray Sanders, who was a pupil in his class in the school he served as teacher and as principal. November 24, 1911 he was admitted on trial in the North Carolina Conference and served during the following thirty-eight years as a traveling preacher in the Conference. When he retired because of failing health in 1949, he made his home in Lumberton. The last years were spent in the Methodist Retirement Home in Durham.

Brother Strickland's father was a minister and farmer. The godly father and mother reared to adulthood eleven of the twelve children born to them. One of the eight sons died at an early age. Three of the sons became ministers.



Both Brother Nathan Strickland and his devoted wife, Alma Gray were blessed with good lineage and exceptional religious environment which formed the foundation of their lives and the home they realized together. Five children were born to them. The first, Emma Blanche, died when only one year of age. The youngest, Willis Kilgo, met a tragic death in 1940 at the age of twenty-five. A son, Colonel Roy Wharton, two daughters, Mary Cornelia (Mrs. W. M. Avent), and Margaret Rebecca (Mrs. P. E. Fisher) survive. Sister Strickland passed to her reward March 19, 1957. Other surviving close relatives are two sisters, Mrs. Emma

Allen and Mrs. Lucy Upchurch; three brothers, the Reverend C. B.; J. B.; and W. R.; and five grandchildren.

Funeral services were held at ten o'clock Thursday morning, June 11 in St. John's Methodist church in Durham by the Reverends J. F. Coble, L. M. Hall and Morris L. Husted; and at three o'clock in the afternoon at Antioch Methodist Church by the Reverends R. L. Baldrige, James R. Hailey and W. R. Stevens. Pallbearers at St. John's were his brother ministers; J. J. Boone, A. L. Chaplin, H. B. Lewis, W. B. Petteway, I. T. Poole, and D. M. Sharpe. For the service at Antioch, his nephews were the pallbearers. Interment was in the family plot in the Antioch cemetery.

When Brother Strickland answered the call to preach he and his good wife sought to prepare more adequately for the work to which both had committed themselves, spending a period as students in Nashville, Tennessee enrolled in Moody Bible College. Their first appointment in 1911 was to the Straits charge in the New Bern District, to which they were assigned again in 1927. Other appointments were Hope Mills, South Alamance, Rocky Mount, Oxford, Fremont, Spring Hope, Bladen, Lumberton, Pamlico, Mount Gilead, Goldston, and Hallsboro circuits. The last appointment was Junior Preacher, Chestnut Street, Lumberton.

Thinking of the discipleship and ministry of Brother Strickland the passage in John 15:5 is apt and accurate as a summary:

"I am the vine, ye are the branches:
he that abideth in me, and I in him,
the same beareth much fruit: for apart
from me ye can do nothing."

He was a truly committed and consistently consecrated follower of Christ. There was never any severing of the ties of love loyalty given this union with the "Vine". The fruits borne of this union were as "wells of living water" springing up within in the fountain of faith; the outer fruits were rich and varied, defying total tabulation. Some fragments of these rich yields appear in the yearly reports he made to the Conference and were incorporated in the Journals.

Fitting for such a life is that memorable passage in II. Timothy 4:7-8:

"I have fought a good fight, I have finished my course, I have kept the faith: Henceforth there is laid up for me a crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous judge, shall give me at that day: and not to me only, but also to all them that have loved his appearing."

1883-1958

Mrs. Sarah Cady Patten was born in Providence, R. I., June 9, 1883, the daughter of William A. and Mary Read Cady. She grew up in a Christian home and received her Bachelor of Arts Degree from Pembroke College, Brown University in Providence, R. I. in 1905. She was active in campus activities and popular with the other students. She was instrumental in the organization of the Kappa Alpha Theta Sorority, being one of the charter members at Pembroke. Later she became a province president and was instrumental in establishing other chapters of her sorority in colleges of the south.

On October 20, 1908, Sarah K. Cady married a young ministerial graduate of Wesleyan University, Middletown, Ohio by the name of Walter Patten and began a career of wife, mother, and companion in the ministry of Jesus Christ. The paths of the Pattens lead them to the North Carolina Conference where they began a long, dedicated and useful ministry to many diversified types of churches and people. These pastorates included small circuits such as Oriental, large towns as Fayetteville and Greenville, university centers as Chapel Hill and administrative duties as a Presiding Elder. From the field of the pastorate they were called to serve Louisburg College as the president. While there her husband died in the service of Christ, His Church and the Methodist Youth of the state. Through all these varied activities, Mrs. Patten was always the gracious, friendly, lovable, helpful mistress of the parsonage, and at the same time lent many a helping hand in the communities

DOUGLAS O'DELL GUTHRIE

1923-1957

Douglas O'Dell Guthrie was born September 17, 1923 in Troy, N. C., son of the Reverend and Mrs. C. W. Guthrie. He received his public school education in several schools, graduating from the Smyrna High School in Smyrna, N. C. in 1941.

Douglas was married to Maude Rains Parish of Pikeville, N. C. on December 23, 1944. To them were born four boys: Charles Henry, September 16, 1948; Douglas O'Dell, Jr., December 31, 1952; Jack Nance, April 7, 1955; and William David, September 12, 1956.

Douglas served four years in the Air Force in World War II, 1942-1946. After his release from the service he attended Worsham School of Mortuary Science, Chicago, Illinois, from which he received the Key of Pathology.

He was employed by Johnson Funeral Home of Rocky Mount as Embalmer for three years. In the early part of 1954 he spoke to his parents about going into the ministry. He felt that God had called him to preach. After talking with his pastor and praying over the matter for months, he went before his Quarterly Conference and requested that he be recommended for license to preach. This was done and at the Annual Conference of 1954 which met in Raleigh he was made an Approved Supply Pastor and was appointed to the Currituck Charge in the Elizabeth City District.

Douglas made friends easily, loved people, visited them in their troubles and sorrows. The people came out in numbers to hear him preach. His churches enthusiastically requested that he be returned to them for another year.

In the second year of his happy ministry, he developed a serious kidney ailment, and was told by several physicians that he would have to give up the active ministry if he expected to live.

After months of prayer and thought, he reluctantly gave up the ministry, reentering his former profession with the Twiford Funeral Home in Norfolk, and took advantage of every opportunity to preach.

The feeling persisted that God wanted him to preach. He talked this over with his District Superintendent. In case a vacancy should occur anywhere in the Conference, he wanted to be considered. When a vacancy came on the Dublin Charge in the Wilmington District, he was appointed as pastor on October 1, 1956.

In a few months after his appointment his old trouble returned. He kept working as long as he could. On July 25, 1957, he entered a hospital in Fayetteville, N. C., where he was a patient until his death on September 2, 1957.

His funeral was held in the Singletary Methodist Church of Dublin by his beloved District Superintendent, Dr. J. E. Garlington, assisted by Rev. O. L. Hathaway and Rev. H. L. Davis.

Douglas loved his people dearly. They loved him. Many of his members said that his presence in the community meant so much that they wanted to keep him as their pastor as long as he lived, even though he was not able to preach again.

In the brief period of his two pastorates he won the hearts of his people and those of other denominations. He was certain that God wanted him to preach. That certainty was so strong that threatening sickness and death could not keep him from proclaiming the "Good News". Perhaps his patient acceptance of suffering and his



faithful devotion to Christ and His church in the midst of pain were even greater preaching than sermons would have been.

His ministry was brief, unselfish and colorful. His body was weakened by illness, but this same illness increased his faith, intensified his devotion to Christ, and strengthened his spirit. He accepted the call of the heavenly Father to come Home with the same certainty that he accepted the call of Christ to be the "Shepherd of My Sheep."

JAMES KARY WORTHINGTON

1877-1957

Near the little coastal town of Shallotte was the farm home of James W. and Winnie Leonard Worthington. Into this devout Christian home was born a son Feb. 22, 1877, whom they named James Kary Worthington.

Kary grew up on the farm and attended the public school of Shallotte, N. C. In 1896, at the age of 19, he married Miss Margaret Register and to this marriage was born one son, O. Fred Worthington. His wife died in 1912 and in 1913 he married Miss Berta Sellers. To this marriage was born another son, James Hilliary Worthington.

It was not until 1917 that Kary answered the call to the ministry and secured his license to preach. His farming and fishing activities took most of his time in these early years but he found time to be active in his church. He was rendering a good service in his home community but the Lord had greater things for him and Kary was never satisfied until he made the decision to give his full time to Christ and his church. So, he asked the conference to give him a charge and in 1920 he was assigned to Ocracoke where he stayed two years.

This was the beginning of a long and fruitful period of service in the Methodist churches in eastern North Carolina. He served such charges as Hallsboro circuit, Scotts Hill circuit, North and South Henderson, Troy circuit and Swansboro circuit, each of which he served from four to six years. One year was spent on the West Halifax charge. He retired from active service in the ministry in 1953, after having spent five years as pastor of the Swansboro circuit, and went to Wilmington to live with his son, Fred, at 1601 Castle Street.

Less than three years later he returned to Swansboro to spend his final days among friends who loved him dearly, staying in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Olai Underseth. His second wife had died at Swansboro in 1948 and the people of Swansboro had been so good to him that he had come to love them and feel at home among them.

Because of failing health Brother J. K., as he was affectionately called by his fellow ministers, was taken back to Wilmington by his son Fred, Oct. 10, 1957, where he died little more than a month later, Nov. 21. The funeral rites were conducted from the Coble Funeral Home by Rev. E. R. Shuller and Rev. Laurie J. Atkinson (Baptist), both of Swansboro. His body was laid to rest in Gurganious Cemetery, Shallotte, N. C. The grave-side service was conducted by Rev. W. J. Neese, pastor of Fifth Avenue Methodist Church, Wilmington and Dr. J. E. Garlington, District Superintendent of the Wilmington District.



Brother J. K.'s educational opportunities were limited and because of that fact he was never admitted into full connection in the North Carolina Conference but continued to serve his church well in the capacity of an approved supply pastor. He made every effort to prepare himself for more effective service in the church and was, after a few years of service, ordained a local elder. He was a deeply spiritual man, a good preacher and a good pastor. His love for people led him out among men who needed the church most and often he brought them into the Christian fellowship. His consecration and faith were like that expressed by Charles Wesley, thus:

Thy Presence, Lord, the place doth fill,
My heart is now thy throne,
Thy holy, just and perfect will
Now in my flesh is done.
My steadfast soul, from falling free,
Doth now no longer rove,
For Christ is all the world to me
And all my heart is love.

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REPORTS OF DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS

BURLINGTON DISTRICT

Allen P. Brantley, District Superintendent

The fine work which has been accomplished on the Burlington District is due to the consecrated leadership of the 43 pastors and 21,000 members. They have excelled previous years in these areas:

Evangelism: Every charge has participated in the Christian Evangelistic Mission, including visitation evangelism. As a result 704 have been received on profession of faith; 609 by certificate; a total of 1313, which gives us a net increase of 828. The Rites of Holy Baptism was administered for 222 infants.

Christian Education: The Sunday School enrollment and average attendance have greatly improved over last year. Vacation Bible Schools were held on every charge. We had five Sub-District Christian Workers Schools with an enrollment of 820. We have 1150 subscribers to the North Carolina Christian Advocate and 396 subscribers to "Together", with seven churches sending it to every family.

Lay Activities: We have 25 Methodist Men's clubs with 680 members. 165 Certified Speakers participated in the "No Silent Pulpit campaign". The W.S.C.S. is 100% organized with 80 societies and 4001 members. Five Wesleyan Service Guilds with 231 members.

Church Buildings And Improvements: GRACE CHURCH, Burlington, has completed the first unit costing \$75,000 and occupied it just before Christmas. ST. PAUL, another new church in Burlington, finished their new church just before Conference at a cost of \$100,000. GLEN RAVEN has begun the erection of a new church on West Davis St., Burlington. SALEM CHURCH on the Leasburg Charge, has built a new church and educational building at a cost of \$70,000. WEST END, Siler City, has occupied the first unit of a new building costing \$40,000. PLEASANT HILL, on the Pittsboro Circuit has completed a new church and educational building costing \$45,000. HAW RIVER is now in the process of a remodeling program for the entire sanctuary, costing \$25,000. WEBB AVE., in Burlington, has completed a new educational building costing \$70,000. MEBANE CHURCH has completed a new educational building costing \$100,000. MERRONEY'S CHURCH, on the Bonlee Charge, and CARBONTON CHURCH on the Glendon Charge have both enlarged their educational facilities by the addition of extra Sunday School rooms. UNION on the Union-Hebron Charge has re-decorated the Sanctuary and installed new pews.

Churches now planning their building program for this year are Pittsboro new church and educational building; Concord, on the Whitney Cross Charge new sanctuary; Sapling Ridge, on the Silk Hope Charge, new educational building and Trinity Church, Sanford, a new church building.

Fairview Church has completely renovated their parsonage and added new furnishings. Moncure Parsonage has been redecorated and reconditioned.

We have dedicated Center Church on the Silk Hope Charge, and Moncure Church on the Moncure Charge. A total of \$182,500 have been raised this year on church debts and improvements.

A new camp site, to be known as Camp Chestnut Ridge, has been bought jointly by the Burlington and Durham Districts to be presented to the Conference Board of Education for the erection of a new Conference Camp.

DURHAM DISTRICT**C. D. Barcliff, District Superintendent**

Progress continues to be made in all areas of the work of the church in the Durham district. Pastors and laymen have been faithful in Kingdom labors and the blessings of our Heavenly Father have been abundant.

Membership And Evangelism. Over 1400 new members have been received, divided approximately 600 on profession of faith and 800 by transfer, with a net increase of over 600.

New Churches Organized. Three new churches have been organized in the district since last Annual Conference: Bethesda, Durham, August 25, 1957; Wellons Village, Durham, September 29, 1957; and Amity, Chapel Hill, April 6, 1958. Each of these new churches was organized with a small but enthusiastic membership and has experienced encouraging growth since.

Christian Education. There is a small increase in the number of persons enrolled in the church schools, the number now being 14,456. Christian Workers' Schools have been held in Bahama, Durham, Oxford, and Roxboro with good attendance and interest. Practically all churches in the district have Vacation Church Schools. The district Youth Rally at Roxboro had a record attendance.

Lay Activities. With a membership of over 600, there are 16 Methodist Men Clubs, of which four were organized this year: Aldersgate, Durham; Hebron on Orange circuit; Marrow's Chapel on Oxford circuit; and Stem on the Stem-Bullock charge. 135 certified lay speakers took part in the No Silent Pulpit program this year. The program was uniformly good. Under the direction of Dr. Frank W. Hanft, district lay leader, the laymen of the district are raising money to purchase jointly with the Burlington district land for the Chestnut Ridge Camp.

Woman's Society of Christian Service and Wesleyan Service Guild. The 73 societies and 6 guilds have a membership of 3,827. These gave \$21,703.72 to missions, an average of \$5.67 per member.

NEW BUILDINGS:

CHURCHES—A lovely first unit has been constructed at Aldersgate, Chapel Hill, at a cost of \$60,000. Chestnut Ridge church on the Orange circuit will start construction this summer on a complete church unit.

EDUCATIONAL BUILDINGS—The following units have been completed this year: Calvary, Durham, \$167,000; Shady Grove on Gray Rock circuit, \$15,000. Also, University Church, Chapel Hill, has broken ground for a \$275,000 building; and, Bethany, Durham, will start construction this summer on a \$60,000

PARSONAGES—Amity, Chapel Hill, (purchased) \$17,300; Orange on Chapel Hill circuit, \$15,000; Wellons Village, Durham, \$17,500; Fletcher's Chapel, \$15,000; New Sharon on Hillsboro circuit, \$15,000; Ca-Vel, Roxboro, (donated by the Collins-Aikman Corporation); and Union Grove on Chapel Hill circuit will start construction this summer, estimated cost \$12,000.

Benevolence Acceptance. It now appears (May 25, 1958) that the charges of the Durham district again will accept the requested increase for the seven benevolences.

ELIZABETH CITY DISTRICT**C. Freeman Heath, District Superintendent**

We are happy to make the following report of work done on the Elizabeth City District. It reflects the faith, devotion, cooperation, and courage of the pastors, the laymen, and the laywomen of the Elizabeth City District.

Membership and Evangelism. Our Commissions on Membership and Evangelism have worked closely with our pastors. All of our charges took part in the simultaneous revival effort. 83 churches in the district held revivals and 48 churches conducted visitation evangelism campaigns. 459 persons have been received into the membership of our churches on profession of faith and 312 by church certificate, making a total of 763 additions for the year. 197 babies have been baptized. We have worked hard this year to win someone to Christ in each of the 86 churches. At Annual Conference last year we reported 24 barren churches. We are reporting, as of today, May 25, only 14 barren churches.

Christian Education. We have a Sunday school enrollment of 11,032, which is a slight increase over last year. 62 Vacation Church School were held during the past year, with an enrollment of 3,335. There were over 150 workers in attendance at the District Vacation Church School Institute, which should be an indication of more and better Vacation Church Schools this summer. We have had four Sub-District Christian Workers' Schools, two Sub-District Bible Conferences, and one Family Life Institute. \$948 was raised on Rally Day. There are 66 Methodist Youth Fellowships in the district with a membership of 1,261. There are 1,043 subscribers to the "North Carolina Christian Advocate", and 481 subscribers to the national church paper, "Together."

Missions. \$4,107 has been contributed to Mission Specials; \$2,209 to other specials; \$7,320 through the Ten-Dollar Club members. \$94,040 has been accepted for the seven Benevolences, an increase of \$3,025 over the askings for last year.

Lay Activities. There are 14 Methodist Men's Clubs in the district, with a total membership of 633. Two new Clubs were organized this year, one on the South Mills Charge and the other on the New Hope-Woodland Charge. Our district is one hundred per cent organized by the Woman's Society of Christian Service. There are 74 Societies with a membership of 3,434 and five Wesleyan Service Guilds with a membership of 158. The combined missionary pledge of the W.S.C.S. and W.S.G. is \$10,829. The District Woman's Society of Christian Service won the Study Jewel of the Conference for one-half of the conference year.

Buildings and Improvements. \$16,000 was paid on principal and interest on newly constructed church buildings. \$46,535 was spent on improvement of church buildings. \$55,061 has been raised for new educational buildings and for principal and interest on educational buildings, while \$30,900 has been spent on improvements of educational buildings. \$6,934 has been spent on parsonage lots and principal and interest on newly built parsonages. \$9,600 has been raised for improvement on parsonages, making a grand total of \$165,030 raised in the district for all buildings and improvements.

Miscellaneous. The pastors of the district have made a total of 27,360 pastoral visits to date, May 25, an average of 760 visits per pastor. Pastors' salaries for new year have been increased by \$5,908 over the conference year just closing. The Currituck Charge will be a self-supporting charge this coming year.

FAYETTEVILLE DISTRICT

O. L. Hathaway, District Superintendent

We are grateful for the achievements in our District this year. Our pastors and lay people have been working together and Our Father has blessed us in His Work.

1. Membership and Evangelism: Additions on Profession of Faith 656, by transfer 468, from other denominations 166, making a total of 1,290. We have lost by death 135, removal 63, to other denominations 63, transfer 335, making a total loss of 589. A net gain of 701, in membership. Infants baptized 299.

The Secretary of Evangelism, Rev. C. G. McCarver, helped in the cooperative Evangelistic Mission of the District and Conference. We are striving to make every church a fruitful one.

2. Christian Education: Church school enrollment has increased 639. We have held five Christian Worker's Schools with an enrollment of 710. We had 22 young people and 11 adults for the Christian Vocations Conference at Raeford. A Vocational Guidance Workshop was held this year for pastors and chairmen of vocations from each local church. Bible Conferences were held at Rockingham and Fayetteville. A Family Life Institute was held at Laurinburg and a Vacation Church School Institute and an Alcoholic Workshop.

3. Missions and Church Extension: 605½ active members in the Ten Dollar Club, 325 persons attended the missionary rally at Aberdeen.

The following Churches are in the planning stages for a building program: First, Rockingham, Green Lake, Wesley Heights, Culbreth, Hope Mills, Maxton, Little River, Biscoe, and Marcus.

Building programs are going on at Doub Chapel, St. Pauls and Mt. Gilead.

Church School units have been completed at St. Johns, West End, Pleasant Hill, Concord, and Salem.

Dedication services have been held at Vass, Gibson, Gardners Chapel, Wesley Heights, Ellerbe, West End.

Plans for dedication services are being made for Sardis and Star.

Renovations and redecorations have been made at Caledonia, Wadesville, Melton Grove, Grace, Hoffman, East Rockingham, and Cordova.

Parsonages have been built at Pee Dee, Person Street, Vass, Pinebluff, Norman, Candor and Aberdeen.

Additional land has been secured for parsonages and church property: Aberdeen, two acres; a lot at Maxton; two acres at Green Lake; two acres at Little River. We are finishing the payments on the 400 acre Camp Site.

A parsonage has been purchased for our Spring Lake Church.

A new pastor has been appointed to establish a new congregation at Bonnie Doone.

The Woman's Society of Christian Service is active in every Church but two of the new churches.

4. Lay Activities: Mr. Terry Sanford, our District Lay Leader, has given excellent guidance in our work. Some of the achievements are seen in the gathering of 812 men at the Annual Lay Rally at Hay Street Church, 124 Lay Speakers in the "No Silent Pulpit Program", 164 in attendance at the planning session, and five new Methodist Men's Clubs.

Our laymen will be represented in all the summer opportunities.

GOLDSBORO DISTRICT

H. M. McLamb, District Superintendent

The Lord has been with and blessed the pastors and laymen of the Goldsboro District in another year of service and achievement for Christ and His Church. We are truly grateful to our people for their dedication to the great cause and to God for blessing their efforts.

1. Membership and Evangelism: During the year 1,232 new members have been received—719 by vows and 513 by transfers. The district membership is 19,159, a gain of 186. We have made this a year of evangelism, using the community census, simultaneous revivals, membership classes, Easter emphases, and visitation evangelism. Two years ago our district had 25 barren churches. Last year the number was 18. This year we have 15. The number will be decreased considerably by conference. There were 198 infant baptisms.

2. Missions and Church Extension: We have continued to stress the \$10 Club, and almost 100 new members have been secured. We are grateful to First Church, Clinton, for securing 20 new members of the \$10 Club and committing itself to raise \$1,000 as a mission special for the new Salemburg church which plans to erect its educational building this fall.

Two new churches have been organized this year. New Hope has a charter membership of 49 and a church school enrollment of 100. Jefferson has acquired an ideally situated two-acre building site at a cost of \$15,000 and a new parsonage at a cost of \$13,000.

Two new churches will be appointed at conference: Selma Chapel, which will be sponsored by Edgerton Memorial Church, and Brogden (on Mount Olive Highway). The quarterly conference of Falling Creek-Providence Charge has voted to "extend an attitude of love and best wishes" to Brogden Church.

We have found the finest spirit yet in discussing and increasing the seven benevolences. Most charges accepted increases, totaling approximately \$6,579.

The 10 new churches of the district have received 170 members this year.

3. Christian Education: Leadership training classes have been held in the five sub-districts and vacation church schools in most local churches. Attendance at the vacation church school institute was about 250.

4. Woman's Society of Christian Service: Mrs. S. B. Boyd, president, has led the societies in a program of studies, local church activities, and giving for missions.

5. Lay Activities: A. C. Edwards, district lay leader, and his associates, have vigorously promoted a program of lay activities. Five Methodist Men clubs have been organized, bringing the total to 34 clubs and 1,115 members. Attendance was 700 at the district lay rally, the largest ever. There are 190 certified lay speakers.

6. Building and Improvements: New facilities occupied this church year: Salem (Garland Charge), an educational building; Sarecta, a \$31,000 sanctuary and educational building; Providence a \$54,000 sanctuary; Daniels, a \$50,000 educational building; Fremont, a \$50,000 educational building; Warsaw, sanctuary renovation and enlargement, \$40,000. Bishop Garber has dedicated the new educational building at Magnolia.

New parsonages occupied this year: Jefferson, Airboro, Goshen-Keener, Four Oaks, and Grace. Parsonages planned: Hookerton-Rainbow and Stantonsburg.

Educational buildings planned: Salemburg, Raleigh Highway, Pine Forest, Falling Creek, Farmville, Corinth, Trinity (Institute Charge), Selma, Centenary (Smithfield), Wallace, Smith, Bethel (Mt. Olive Ct.), Rones, and Princeton.

7. Visitation: As a former pastor and one now working with the laymen, we know the value of regular pastoral visitation of the people and their appreciation of the same. We have 6,665 families. The pastors have reported visiting about 6,000 of these families one or more times.

NEW BERN DISTRICT

A. J. Hobbs, District Superintendent

More and more our New Bern District pastors and laymen work together as a team. Laboring together, they have wrought well for Christ and His Church. Here I would record my gratitude and appreciation for their cooperation, their loyalty, their love.

Membership and Evangelism. We have received 1,633 new members; 822 came by profession of faith. But we lost 1,178, due mainly to the revision of rolls. Net gain is 455. As of May 26, we had only seven barren churches. 300 infants were baptized.

Christian Education. Church School enrollment is 15,784. Vacation schools were held in nearly all churches. One Bible conference and several Christian Workers' Schools contributed to the effectiveness of our educational program.

The North Carolina Christian Advocate goes into 1,212 of our homes.

Missions. Missionary concern is indicated by the response of our people for Church School Rally Day, Fellowship of Suffering and Service, TV Ministry, Race Relations, Week of Dedication, Mothers' Day Special, Methodist Student Day, \$10 Club.

The membership of the Woman's Society of Christian Service numbers 4,048. In 84 societies those servants of God continue to challenge the Church to ever increasing service.

Lay Activities. Four new Methodist Men's Clubs have been organized, giving us a total of 35, with a membership of 1,190. Under the guidance of our District Lay Leader and his associates, our 192 lay speakers conducted services of worship during the no-silent pulpit period. 500 men attended our District Lay Rally.

NEW BUILDINGS. Churches: Vanceboro Church was dedicated. Jarvis Memorial Church, Greenville, completed at a cost of \$300,000, was opened for services February 2, 1958. Saint James Church, Newport, broke ground for a \$60,000 sanctuary. Riverdale, Bridgeton Charge, is building a \$40,000 church. Saint John, Kinston, purchased a church building for \$20,000. It was formally opened December 8, 1957.

Education Buildings: At Grifton we have erected an education building at a cost of \$40,000. Education buildings have been dedicated at Bayboro, Camp Glenn, Williston, and at Sharon on the Kinston Circuit.

New Parsonages: Asbury, \$15,000; Belgrade (Pollocksville Charge), \$12,000.

Miscellaneous. Improvement to our church buildings, \$68,000.

New Churches Planned: A new church is planned for Beulaville. Pastors will be appointed at this conference to two new churches in the Jacksonville area: Northwoods and Tarawa Terrace.

Division of Charges: The Dover Charge and the Grimesland Charge are to

be divided, to form two additional charges. Thus we are to have four new pastoral appointments.

New Property: In the New Bern Country Club area we have purchased very choice property to be used as a site for a new church to be built at a future date.

Benevolence Acceptance. For the 1958-59 Conference year our churches have accepted the proposed increase for the Seven Benevolences, plus \$618.

RALEIGH DISTRICT

R. Grady Dawson, District Superintendent

The blessings of our Heavenly Father and the cooperation and good work of the faithful pastors and the loyal lay people of the Raleigh District have made it possible for me to make the report given below. To them I express my deep appreciation. The past year has been a fruitful year in the life of the church and the work for the Kingdom in the Raleigh District, as revealed by a few of the outstanding achievements which I now list.

Membership and Evangelism: The churches and pastors of the Raleigh District have given a fine account of their labors in the area of Evangelism. This is evidenced by the following statistics: 95 revival meetings, 72 special periods of Visitation Evangelism, 66 membership classes, one full week of Prayer Vigil in which all the charges participated, and unnumbered hours of personal work and prayer—with the result that 1808 persons have united with the church: 745 on Profession of Faith and 1063 by transfer. Hayes Barton Church, Raleigh, has received the largest number of members, 182, and has the largest net gain in membership, 121. The loss in membership this year has been rather heavy, 1172, but there is still a net gain of 636. Fifteen of our choice young people participated in a Tri-District Christian Witness Mission. During the year, 352 babies were baptized, with Edenton Street and Longview Gardens having the largest number. As of this writing, we have only three barren churches in the Raleigh District. By the meeting of the Annual Conference, we expect to report "No Barren Churches."

Christian Education: Church School enrollment and attendance continue to increase in most of the churches. The work of Leadership Training has been promoted through district staff meetings, three area workshops on the Commissions, 5 for District Christian Workers Schools, District Youth Council Meetings, Vacation Church School Institutes, Summer Assemblies for Youth and Junior camping. Most of the churches conducted successful Vacation Church Schools. The **North Carolina Christian Advocate** goes into about 1000 homes in the District and **Together** subscriptions are in excess of 400. The district will contribute about \$40,000.00 this year to our Methodist Colleges.

Local Church Emphasis Program: The pastors and laymen of the Raleigh District continue to work at the task of improving the local church and the local church program. Considerable progress has been made in this area, especially in the organization and work of the Commissions. Most of the churches have made the self-study and have set up definite goals. In many churches the Commissions are much more active and effective.

Missions and Church Extension: This year the district has contributed over

\$30,000 to Mission Specials. We are proud to report that Edenton Street Church, Raleigh, has the distinction of being the second largest contributor to Mission Specials of any church in the nation.

The women of the district continue to do an excellent job in their work. There are 86 Societies with something over 5,000 members. The district is organized 100%.

In the area of church extension, our district is doing a fine job. The Raleigh Board of Missions and Church Extension continues to be of great help in strengthening and caring for the new churches in the Raleigh area. Through the Ten Dollar Club, the regular budget and the City Board of Missions, the District has contributed in excess of \$35,000.00 to church extension. We have not organized any new congregations this year, but one abandoned church has been reopened and reorganized (Mt. Carmel) with 61 members (5 on Profession of Faith) and a Church School enrollment of 63.

Lay Activities: In spite of the bitter cold weather and a competing basketball game, on February 18, over 400 laymen attended a district Methodist Men's Rally. This is characteristic of the fine loyalty and work of the laymen in the district. Three new Men's Clubs have been organized this year. We now have a total of 36. One hundred sixty-five lay speakers participated in the "No Silent Pulpit" program. One of the finest projects of the laymen this year has been the raising of \$5,000 to begin the development of a youth camp on Kerr Lake.

Buildings and Finance: The Raleigh District is still on the march in the matter of church and parsonage building. This year, the district has raised over \$675,000.00 for new buildings and debt payment.

The following buildings have been completed and officially opened this year: Edenton Street, sanctuary; Highland, first unit of their permanent building; Elevation (Benson), sanctuary and Church School rooms; Fairmont, Raleigh, educational building; Longview Gardens, Raleigh, educational building; First Church, Henderson, educational building; Cary, parsonage, educational building, enlarged and renovated sanctuary; Clayton, parsonage; Franklinton, parsonage; Wake Forest, parsonage; Wesley Memorial, Raleigh, educational building.

New buildings have been begun and are now in the process of construction in the following places: White Memorial, Henderson, sanctuary and educational building; Louisburg, educational building; Cool Springs (Mamers), sanctuary and educational building; Bailey, parsonage; Sims, sanctuary; Piney Grove, Church School rooms; Pleasant Grove, parsonage; St. Mark's, Raleigh, first unit of their permanent building.

The following churches have plans and blue prints for new buildings on which construction is expected to begin during the coming year: Garner, sanctuary and educational building; Granville, educational building; Lillington, educational building; Mt. Ariel (Mamers), educational building; Layden Memorial, Raleigh, first unit of their permanent building.

The total money raised in the district this year for all purposes has been in excess of \$1,500,000. Next year there will be an increase in pastors' salaries of approximately \$10,000 and an increase in benevolences of about \$7,000.

The story of the achievements of the pastors and laymen of the Raleigh District has been only partially told, but it is truly a thrilling one. We give thanks to God for these consecrated pastors and dedicated laymen who not only give us cause to rejoice over past achievements but also enable us to face the future with courage, confidence and great expectation.

ROCKY MOUNT DISTRICT**Walter C. Ball, District Superintendent**

I wish to acknowledge in the very beginning of this report my sincere gratitude to every Pastor serving with me in the Rocky Mount District and all members of the Churches helping to make this report. A report on paper seldom, if ever, can give full recognition to everyone for all that has been accomplished. This is the report of the Pastors and the members of the Churches of the Rocky Mount District.

When the figures for this report were compiled, I went back to compare them with the last Conference Year. I am glad to report that in every phase of our work there has been progress and good results.

(1) **Evangelism:** Into the membership of our Churches, we have received on profession of faith and by certificate approximately 1200 persons. Some more than 250 babies have been baptized. Our Pastors and our laymen have been most diligent in this field of work and we are hopeful that at the end of this Conference Year there will be a few barren churches left in our District.

(2) **Education:** We have had a trend upward in all phases of Christian Education, especially in our Training Schools and in our increase in membership in the local Sunday Schools. There is also a noticeable gain in the number of persons in our Sunday Schools who this year have joined the Churches.

(3) **Missions:** We have supported in full this year the Reverend and Mrs. J. W. Garrison as Missionaries in Brazil. We have also carried a number of General and Conference Specials.

(4) **Finances:** At the time of this report, we are in the midst of Quarterly Conferences, at which sessions, the Benevolences for items 1 to 7 are accepted, as well as the minimum salary for 1958-59. The Churches of the Rocky Mount District are located in parts of nine counties, of which farming is the principal economic income. With the exception of the City of Roanoke Rapids, we have almost entirely a background and a dependability on farming. In face of the difficulties confronting the farm people of this section now, the acceptances on Items 1 to 7 for 1958-59 will show a considerable increase. This is commendable on the part of all of our people.

(5) **The Woman's Society of Christian Service:** The work here under special consecrated leadership has moved forward during the whole year. We have been especially pleased with the increased interest and attendance at public meetings on both our District and Sub-District levels. The reports at all of these meetings show an increase in all of the phases of the work of the women.

(6) **Laymen:** The laymen of our District have shown this year helpful progress in all the causes of our Great Church. At our Lay Rally last February, we would say there was approximately a 30% increase over last year's attendance. The Men's Clubs in the District show definite interest in the progress of the whole program of our Church.

In building, repairing and renovating our Church property, there is unusual interest. At Gaston there has been the completion of a Fellowship Hall. Jamesville has a new Parsonage; and at Castalia two new Sunday School rooms, general repairs and new furniture for the Sanctuary. The Pinetops Church has completed a new and beautiful Educational Building and on the same Charge the Conetoe Church has been redecorated. Red Oak has a new Parsonage, which has been paid

for in full this year. The Rosemary Church is now air-conditioning its entire Sunday School Building and raising money for an Annex to the Sunday School Building. First Church in Rocky Mount is in the full process of building a beautiful new Sanctuary and additional educational facilities. This project is to be completed by the end of this Calendar Year. Sandy Cross has completed and paid for in full its new Educational Building. The Scotland Neck Church has made unusual progress this year in completing the Fellowship Hall of its Educational Building, which is used as the Sanctuary at present, and also the completion of most of the rooms on the second floor. Also, extensive repairs have been done on the Parsonage and a heating plant installed in it. On the Stokes Charge, new pews have been added to the Stokes Church and some of the other Churches improved. In Weldon, a new Educational Building is being completed for First Church, and a complete rebuilding and renovation of its Sanctuary is being done. This intensive program of both building and repairs is to be completed by the end of 1958. On the Wesley Memorial Charge, payment in full on the Parsonage has been made and it has been dedicated. At White Oak Church on the Windsor Charge, new Sunday School rooms have been added and the Windsor Church has purchased a new lot and is now making plans for a complete new Church building. Speight's Chapel is finishing now five Sunday School rooms.

WILMINGTON DISTRICT

J. E. Garlington, District Superintendent

We are grateful to our Heavenly Father for allowing us the privilege of working in such a wonderful place with so many choice ministers and fine laymen.

Stewardship: A program of stewardship of the tithe was launched in our district with some thrilling experiences resulting. Because of the tithing program charges have been divided and churches strengthened. Over 1,000 individuals have pledged to tithe. We hope to add 5,000 more to this number.

Membership and Evangelism: Until all people are reached for Christ we can never be satisfied with the result achieved during the year. This does not mean that we are not thankful for the fine work of our ministers and laymen in reaching 753 people on profession of faith, 449 transfers from other Methodist churches, and 128 from other denominations. Although we lost 408 by transfer to other Methodist churches, 87 to other denominations, and 122 by death our net increase was 713. As this report goes to press we have 5 barren churches. Our belief is that by Conference we will not have a single barren church.

New Parsonages: Over \$125,000 has been spent for parsonages at the following places: Burgaw, Devon Park, Elizabethtown, Southport, Snead's Ferry, and Wrightsville. In each of these areas the minister and laymen deserve high praise.

New Churches: Churches have been organized at Oleander Drive, Riegelwood, Wrightsboro, and Yaupon Village. The church at Oleander has been completed and occupied while the Riegelwood building is under construction. Wrightsboro has a temporary building on two lots which were recently purchased. Yaupon Village has a building lot worth \$8,000, and hopes to begin building this fall.

New Sanctuaries: A lovely new church and parsonage have been built at Camp Shallotte, at a cost of \$80,000. This was a tremendous undertaking for a membership of 130. Evergreen has completed a \$30,000 building which will soon be ready for dedication.

Educational Buildings: Fairmont has recently moved into an educational building at a cost of \$115,000. First Church, Pembroke, has completed a new educational building. Class rooms have been added at Buie, Herring's Chapel, Jordan's Chapel and Regan's.

Benevolence Increase: The charges have accepted an increase in benevolences of more than \$4,600. Salaries have been increased by approximately \$16,000 over last year.

REPORT OF APPROVED SUPPLY PASTORS' SCHOOL

The tenth annual Approved Supply Pastors' School at Duke University will be held July 15 through August 8, 1958. This school is sponsored jointly by the Divinity School of Duke, the Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference, and the Department of In-Service Training of the General Board of Education of the Methodist Church. During the four weeks of the school supply pastors and traveling preachers taking the conference course of study can complete a full year of the conference course, as required in Paragraphs 2044—2048 of the 1956 **Discipline**. In the summer of 1957 209 students were enrolled. It is anticipated that the number for 1958 will be slightly larger.

The majority of the students come from the two conferences in North Carolina, but a large delegation comes from conferences in Virginia, South Carolina, Tennessee, and other southeastern states.

In addition to the required courses, the school features preaching opportunities in the daily chapel services, workshops in pastoral care, worship, Christian education, and church administration. A program of recreation provides good balance to the spiritual and mental exercises of each day.

The Brotherhood is a group of Methodist ministers and lay people who want to express their sympathy to the bereaved widow of a Methodist minister in a way that will be of real assistance when it is most needed. Instead of sending telegrams or flowers, gifts of \$1 by superannuate ministers and lay people; \$3 by pastor members whose salary is under \$3,000; \$4, if the salary is from \$3,000 to \$4,000; and \$5 if above \$4,000. This money is sent by the Treasurer as soon as the death is reported to him, and the widow has the needed money to pay funeral expenses even before she receives any money from insurance. This is not an insurance company. It is a fellowship, a brotherhood.

The membership is made up of 319 beneficiary (ministers) and 229 non-beneficiary (lay) members, a total membership of 548. We would like to express our appreciation to the lay people who are members of the Brotherhood. Their support has meant much to the Brotherhood and we hope many more will join.

The following calls were made this year: 159—Rev. R. G. L. Edwards; 160—Rev. Daniel Lane; and 161—Rev. James K. Worthington. Call 158—Rev. C. B. Harris came at the close of last year, but too late to be recorded in the **Journal**. Each widow or family received a sum of \$1400. We are hoping that many more ministers and laymen will join the Brotherhood so that the amount each widow or family will receive will be \$1500 or more.

Article 10 of the Constitution of the Brotherhood states: "Any minister of the N. C. Conference on Trial or in Full Connection, or any Accepted Supply Pastor doing supply work in the Conference, may become a beneficiary Member of the Brotherhood by payment of an Initiation Fee of \$1, and within 30 days from the date of entrance a Mortuary Assessment of \$3, if salary is under \$3,000; \$4, if salary is from \$3,000 to \$4,000; and \$5, if salary is \$4,000 or above; provided that, if he has served as a clerical member one year or more, the initiation fee and mortuary assessment shall be as follows:

**REPORT OF THE
 NORTH CAROLINA COUNCIL OF CHURCHES**

Your North Carolina Council of Churches continued its service to the churches and people of our state in the following ways during 1957-1958:

An outstanding Pastors' Conference held January 27th in First Methodist Church, High Point. Dr. Andrew W. Blackwood; Dr. Waldo Beach, and Dr. Clarence W. Cranford brought superb messages.

At the Council's Annual Meeting January 28th in High Point, Dr. W. A. Kale, Professor at Duke Divinity School, was elected Council President. Dr. Cecil W. Robbins, President of Louisburg College, was elected a member-at-large on the Executive Committee.

Over 68,000 pounds of clothing was collected and shipped to areas of greatest need over the world.

Through the Christian Rural Overseas Program (CROP) food was sent to

feed the hungry in refugee camps, areas devastated by floods or hurricanes, and lands where not enough food can be produced.

An excellent workshop on Family Life Counselling was held in Durham this April 21st. Harold Minor, Conference Director of Adult Work, is chairman of this committee.

A Conference on Ministering to Troubled Persons was held April 30th at State Hospital, Raleigh, under sponsorship of the Council's Institutional Ministry Committee. This program was well received and will be continued.

The Council's TV Committee produced "Credo", a series of sixteen half hour television programs this Spring over WUNC-TV. Several members of the N. C. Conference took part in this series, including a special program on Christian Colleges featuring Paul Carruth. Five of these programs, including the one named, were filmed for later use.

The Ministry to Migrants, reaching North Carolina's 15,000 Migratory workers with a fully rounded religious program, begins its eighth year in June. Main concentrations of workers are around Elizabeth City and down the coast, with other groups in the Mt. Olive area and in the West. A staff of ten full-time workers carried on this program last year both in the camps and in two child care centers—one in the Elizabeth City area. This is a vitally necessary Christian service to some of our most neglected citizens.

In addition to these programs, your Council worked in numerous other areas of interest to our churches. A full scale program of Women's work and Youth work is included.

This growing, cooperative Christian work urgently calls for full support of all its member bodies in order to be of greater service to each.

REPORT OF THE CHURCH EXTENSION RESEARCH PLANNING AND SURVEY COMMITTEE

The Conference Church Extension Research Planning and Survey Committee has performed a distinct service to the conference which has justified its creation. A summary of its progress reflects credit upon those who projected its establishment.

Since its inception four years ago, the Conference Survey Commission has recruited Mr. Roy Turnage as a full time employee of the North Carolina Annual Conference. For two years he served with real distinction as Director of Conference Survey. With a burden upon his heart for the weakest of our Methodist Churches, he began to work jointly with this Committee and the Town and Country Commission of our conference and develop that ministry now known as 'The Interboard Ministry to Weaker Churches'.

So keenly has he been interested that Mr. Turnage is now employed full time as the Director of Field Work of the Town and Country Commission and he has been effective in the redemption of numerous churches which had already closed their doors for public worship services. Numerous others at the danger line have been reactivated under his guidance. We commend Mr. Turnage to the Conference for the fine leadership he continues to offer through this agency of the conference.

Established first to make a thorough survey of the Church Extension needs of our conference, this committee has performed yeoman service at this point. A

survey was made which blanketed the conference revealing more than 210 areas which needed more careful study and planning for eventual Church Extension.

In this four year period more than sixty-five community surveys have been made under the leadership and guidance of Mr. Roy Turnage and Rev. Thomas A. Collins. Twenty-six Duke Divinity School students have been used in these surveys. This was made possible through the cooperation of Duke Endowment program support, and numerous local church Adult groups have shared in these community surveys.

From the results of these sixty-five surveys, thirty-seven new Methodist congregations have been organized, and eight more are at the point where sites have been secured and an organization will soon be effected.

As a by-product of their sharing in this program of survey and research we are happy to report that three young men have made their decision to enter the active ministry of the North Carolina Annual Conference. These young men otherwise would have been employed in the Lord's work in some other area of our nation.

For these and numerous intangible reasons we believe the work of this committee should be continued and expanded. **The Methodist Discipline** makes provision for a committee such as this to operate under the jurisdiction of the Annual Conference Board of Missions (Paragraph 1304). We believe this work can best be expanded and continued in such a relationship.

For this reason we recommend that the North Carolina Annual Conference of The Methodist Church, S.E.J., at its Annual meeting in Wilson, N. C. approve the consolidation of the Conference Survey Committee with the Board of Missions. We further recommend that all present members of the Conference Survey Committee become members of the Board of Missions except as they are members of another major Board or Commission of the Conference. We further recommend that this committee become a standing committee of the Board of Missions, amenable to said Board, and that its chairman retain his leadership in this area under the guidance of the Board of Missions.

*We further recommend that all assets and funds of the Conference Church Extension Research, Planning and Survey Committee be transferred to the Board of Missions, to continue the survey program begun by this committee. For this purpose we designate all funds currently assigned to this committee and funds budgeted for receipt in the new Conference year according to the budget of the World Service and Finance Commission as previously approved.

With this consolidation we believe the work of survey, research and planning in the area of Church Extension will continue and flourish to the glory of God and the enlargement of the witness of The Methodist Church in North Carolina.

Sara McCracken, still on extended leave, Durham, has rendered volunteer service in the local church and with the Woman's Society of Christian Service on the local, district and Conference level. Miss Jennie Congleton, Greenville, and Miss Elizabeth R. Davis, Rocky Mount, are the retired deaconesses within the bounds of our Conference.

The Board presents Miss Charlotte Whitfield and Miss Olene Civils for consecration as Deaconesses and for appointment by the Bishop at this service of the Annual Conference. Both have completed the training for the Office of Deaconess and both have Master's Degree in Religious Education from Scarritt College for Christian Workers, Nashville, Tennessee. Miss Whitfield has served this past year as Director of Christian Education, First Methodist Church, Siler City, N. C. Miss Civils has served as Director of Christian Education, Central Methodist Church, Spartanburg, South Carolina.

Your Deaconess Board recommends:

That the Pastors of local Churches and all agencies working with Youth offer the members of this Board the opportunity of presenting to our young people the relationship of the Deaconess to the Church and the call to Christian service through Church-related vocations.

That, in accordance with the request of the Commission on Deaconess Work, a study be made of the employment of women in local churches and in church-related projects within the Conference, in order that the Board may more fully understand the needs within the Conference, help the Commission in its over-all program, and stimulate an increased recruitment for Church-related vocations.

COMMITTEE ON GENERAL CHURCH SCHOOL WORK

REPORT OF PROGRESS

The Committee on General Church School Work of the North Carolina Conference Board of Education realizes the constant duty and continuing task of the Church to provide leadership and guidance in the monumental task of Christian Education through the local church. We commend our Executive Secretary, Dr. C. P. Morris, and his competent staff for the vigorous and effective work that has been done.

Progress is being made in our conference in the field of Christian Education. Each year for the past several years we have been able to report an increase in Church School membership and attendance, a more effective program of leadership training, a growth in the use and understanding of our Methodist literature, greatly improved educational facilities, increased giving to World Service and special causes, an increase in the number of churches employing Directors of Christian education, and a greater understanding of and deeper commitment to the goals and purposes of Christian education.

We are pleased to report an increase of 3.1% in church school membership in the Conference Year 1956-1957. This is considerably larger than the 1.7% increase for the Methodist Church as a whole. During this same period average attendance increased 1.3%, Fourth Sunday World Service giving increased 22%, 76% of those who joined the church on profession of faith came from the Church School, and five new church schools were organized.

In the area of leadership training we are able to report as follows for the year 1957-1958: 5743 persons reached in 38 subdistrict Christian Workers' Schools; eight local church one-teacher schools; three special schools for small churches; 31

subdistrict Institutes for church school workers reached 972 persons; 21 persons attended the SEJ Leadership School at Lake Junaluska; 53 persons attended the three-day Coaching Conference for Prospective Instructors to prepare themselves to teach leadership training courses; 22 attended the one-day Coaching Conference for Deans of Christian Workers' Schools; and many local churches conducted informal training classes for their workers. The Conference Board of Education in cooperation with the Conference Boards of Missions, Evangelism, and the Town and Country Commission sponsored a special Inter-Board Ministry to the weaker churches.

All of these leadership training projects and other age-group training enterprises were financed by the Church School Rally Day offering. It is imperative that this offering be greatly increased to take care of this expanding program of training.

BASIC ELEMENTS IN A PROGRAM OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION FOR THE LOCAL CHURCH

Scope: The Church School is concerned with every phase of human life. Its goal is to help persons "understand, accept, and share the Christian gospel." Its program attempts to meet people's everyday need for worship, study, play, and service. Its work does not start and stop on Sunday morning. It continues all through the week in (1) Sunday School, (2) The Methodist Sunday Evening Fellowship, (3) Home and Extension Service, and (4) Week-day Activities.

Any sound program of Christian Education in the local church will include the following basic elements:

1. **An Effective Organization**

a. **A Functioning Commission on Education.**

b. **An Effective Workers' Conference.**

c. **A Properly Graded Church School.**

2. **An adequate and continuing Program for Recruiting and Training Officers, Teachers and Workers.** The Commission on Education should select a committee on leadership education to provide for the recruiting and training of church school workers.

3. **Continuing Emphasis on Increasing Church School Membership and Attendance.**

a. Get the whole church interested and at work; b. Size things up and set goals; c. Agree on and use a recruitment plan; d. Improve what the church school has to offer; e. Have a complete home members plan; f. Start new classes; g. Visit in homes to cultivate prospects; h. Follow up absentees.

4. **An Effective Program of Evangelism in the Church School.**

Evangelism and Christian education have identical ultimate goals. Evangelism tends to emphasize motivation, commitment, and personal decisions—emphases which are shared with Christian education at its best. Christian education tends to emphasize guided growth toward commitment, perceptive understanding, gradual development in accordance with the laws of learning—emphases which are shared with evangelism at its best. (From *Evangelism of Children* by Margaret Clemens McDowell.)

5. **Adequate Rooms and Equipment.**

Each local church should make a careful study looking toward renovating

and making the most effective use of present facilities; consider the advisability of providing additional new classrooms and/or equipment.

Churches planning to build or remodel church school facilities are encouraged to take advantage of free consultation service on church school buildings and equipment offered by the General Board of Education and to call on the Conference Board of Education staff for guidance. All projects should be cleared through the District Board of Church Location and Building.

6. **A Functioning Methodist Sunday Evening Fellowship**, including meal, fellowship, study, and worship for all ages.
7. **Careful Plans for Special Days and Observances.**
 - a. Church School Rally Day, September 28, 1958. It is imperative that careful plans be made for the promotion of a special free will offering to be taken for the support of the program of Leadership Training in the conference. Our total program of leadership education across the conference is dependent upon this offering. We call attention to the fact that vastly increased funds are needed for this purpose and respectfully urge each local church to participate and increase its giving over the previous year.
 - b. Christian Education Week, September 28—October 5, 1958.
 - c. Race Relations Day, February 8, 1959, Special Offering for Paine College.
 - d. Children's Day, May 3, 1959.
 - e. National Family Week, May 3-10, 1959.
 - f. Methodist Student Day, June 14, 1959.
 - g. World Service Sunday, each fourth Sunday with total offering applied to World Service budget of the church.
8. **Participation in Opportunities Beyond the Local Church**
 - a. SEJ Leadership and Laboratory School, Lake Junaluska, August 4-15, 1958.
 - b. Institute of Church Music, Lake Junaluska, August 3-8, 1958.
 - c. SEJ Church School Superintendents Conference, Lake Junaluska, August 15-17, 1958.
 - d. Directors of Christian Education Workshop, West Market Street Methodist Church, Greensboro, N. C., November 3-6, 1958.
 - e. N. C. Conference Seminar for Leadership Instructors, January 19-21, 1959.
 - f. Subdistrict Christian Workers' Schools, one in each subdistrict, sponsored jointly by the Conference Board of Education and the local Board of Managers. The Conference Board continues its policy of paying one half the honoraria of instructors of all schools approved by the board.
 - g. Southeastern Recreation Workshop, Leesburg, Florida, April 1-8, 1959.
 - h. Special Opportunities for Small Churches. One-teacher training schools on "The Educational Work of the Small Church" should be held in the very small church. The conference Board of Education provides the instructor for these schools. We urge the pastors and District Superintendents cooperation with the board in the promotion of these opportunities.
 - i. District Curriculum Seminar for Pastors, Church School Superintendents, and Administrative Officers, to be held in connection with the Vacation Church School Institutes, March 2-5, 9-12, 16-19, 1959.

LOCAL CHURCH EMPHASIS

We rejoice that the Conference Commission on Local Church Emphasis has agreed to emphasize "Expansion" during the 1959-1960 Conference Year, and pledge our support to the District Superintendents as they lead us in this program designed to:

1. Start church schools in churches that have no church school.
2. Strengthen church schools where help is needed.
3. Organize church schools in newly organized churches.
4. Start church schools and classes in communities where an organized church is not practical at the present.

RESOLUTION

Whereas, currently there is no group or committee charged specifically with the development and promotion of an adequate program and philosophy of recreation, be it therefore resolved that the North Carolina Conference Board of Education set up a special Committee on Recreation to study and to recommend an effective program of recreation and the Christian use of leisure time, and to assist the local churches in planning and promoting such a program. The Executive Secretary and the conference Directors of Children's, Youth, and Adult Work, shall be ex-officio members of this committee. The committee shall elect a chairman and an executive committee from the total committee. The committee shall make an annual report to the Conference Board of Education and at such other times as requested.

CHRISTIAN HIGHER EDUCATION

We pledge the support of the Committee on General Church School Work to the task and program of the conference on Christian Higher Education.

RECOMMENDATION

We recommend and urge the reappointment of Dr. C. P. Morris as Executive Secretary of the Conference Board of Education.

Section B

COMMITTEE ON CHILDREN'S WORK

Progress Report for 1957-1958

Our North Carolina Conference is deeply indebted to Mrs. V. E. Queen for her splendid work as Conference Director of Children's Work. Her leadership has meant much to the District Directors and other church leaders in carrying on their work more easily and more effectively. We thank her sincerely for her untiring devotion, her magnificent leadership, and her "full-time" service in a "part-time" task, which she was persuaded to undertake when we found ourselves without a conference Director, due to the resignation of Miss Elizabeth Johnson.

The Committee on Children's Work continues to emphasize that a Vacation Church School be held in every local church. These Schools were attended by 5,258 boys and girls in the Conference year, 1956-'57. Very successful District Vacation Church School Institutes were held in each of the nine Districts, the first two weeks in March. These one-day sessions reached 1,558 persons, which was an increase in attendance over the previous year. The Institutes were led by the District Directors of Children's Work, assisted by outstanding instructors in each age group.

Nine District Junior Camps were held with 635 boys and girls in attendance. Each District Camp was directed by a minister, assisted by counselors recruited from local Methodist churches. There was a growing interest in Day Camping in local churches, and several churches reported successful Day Camps during the summer. A special training session was held at Camp Don-Lee in April for District Directors and counselors responsible for the Junior Camps and for those interested

in Day Camping. This four-day training was under the leadership of Miss La Donna Bogardus from the General Board.

We commend the Committee on Campsites and the laymen of the Conference for providing additional camps which will make possible the expansion of Junior Resident Camping and Day Camping.

Five Sub-District Institutes were held in each District to introduce new materials and to promote the year's program in Children's Work.

The most effective way of training workers with children is through Christian Workers' Schools. During the past year, fifty-four courses in the area of children's work were taught in thirty-five schools. These classes reached 1,151 workers, with 651 receiving Course Cards of Recognition. Alamance County, Beaufort-Morehead Area, Durham Area, and Raleigh Area Schools included Observation-Laboratory courses in which eighty-four teachers were enrolled, fifty-five of which received Course Cards.

There has been a substantial increase in enrollment in the children's department of the church schools, with a total enrollment of 44,760. We have emphasized the importance of the Nursery Home Department and can report much progress.

Twenty-two persons attended the three courses for children's workers presented in the Coaching Conference for Leadership School Instructors which was held in Durham in January.

Missionary education of children has been encouraged by working with the Woman's Society of Christian Service in promoting Special Missions Units and by promoting the Children's Service Fund.

We are looking forward to an active program in the area of children's work during the next Conference year under the direction of a full-time Director of Children's Work.

Recommendations for Children's Work

1. Vacation Church School
 - a. That there be a Vacation Church School held in every church in the Conference.
 - b. That the first three weeks in March, 1959, be reserved for Area Vacation Church School Institutes and that there be twelve such Institutes.
 - c. That the Vacation Church Schools held during the summer of 1958 be reported at Conference, 1959.
2. Camping
 - a. That more extensive promotion be made of the program of Day Camping in the local churches.
 - b. That resident Junior Camps be supported on a district basis.
 - c. That a training session be held in early summer for those interested in Junior Resident and Day Camping.
3. District Directors
 - a. That the District Directors be used as resource persons by local churches for introducing and planning the year's work.
 - b. That specific suggestions be made available to every local church through the Superintendent of the Children's Division.
4. Nursery Home Department
 - a. That we strengthen the work of the Nursery Home Department by providing training opportunities for the Nursery Home Visitor.
 - b. That we urge regular contact with parents of children too young to attend the nursery class.

- c. That parents be instructed in the meaning and purposes of the baptism of infants.
 - d. That parents be encouraged to present their children for this sacrament.
5. Parents of Pre-school Children
- a. That a guidance sheet for observation be prepared and distributed to parents who visit in the nursery and kindergarten groups.
 - b. That there be a program of study offered during the Sunday School hour or at another suitable time for parents of pre-school children, this program to deal with the literature and plans of the Methodist Church for nursery and kindergarten children.
6. Cooperation between the Woman's Society of Christian Service Secretary of Children's Work and the Superintendent of the Children's Division
- a. That the Secretary of Children's Work work closely with the Divisional Superintendent in promoting work with children in additional sessions in the local church and clarifying proper channeling of the Children's Service Fund.
 - b. That the Secretary of Children's Work in the local church be a worker in the Children's Division.
 - c. That the District Secretary of Children's Work and the District Director of Children's Work cooperate in promoting Christian Education of children in the Districts by the exchange of ideas and materials.
7. That the local church Commission on Education set up standards for all teachers in the church school, using as their guide the recommendations of the General Board of Education in leaflet no. 8282-BC. The title of the leaflet is "Friendly Methodist Church School Teachers." (Order from the Methodist Publishing House, Richmond 16, Virginia, for 25¢).
8. Church-sponsored Weekday Nursery Schools and Kindergartens
- a. That a survey be made of the number of church-sponsored weekday nursery schools and kindergartens and that we study the advisability of a training program for leaders of these weekday projects.
 - b. That churches sponsoring a weekday program if religious education encourage their leaders to take advantage of the training opportunities and that they affiliate themselves with a recognized Association of Childhood Education.
9. The Minister and Children
- a. That the minister establish a personal relationship between himself and the children.
 - b. That ministers take every opportunity to be with the children of the church.
 - c. That the teachers look to the minister as a resource person available to assist in some units of the church school material.
 - d. That district seminars for ministers be held, these to deal with the nature of children, needed space and equipment, and literature.
10. Special Days
- a. That children's workers cooperate in every possible way with the total program of Christian Education.
 - b. That they lead out in the observance of Children's Day, Church School Rally Day, Promotion Sunday, and National Family Week.
1. Plans for Observation
- a. That classes in church schools over the Conference be carefully selected and offered as observation centers for church school teachers.

- b. That the teachers in these observation classes be given special training in the techniques of conducting an observation class.
- c. That those observing be prepared for observing and evaluating such classes.

General Recommendations

12. That in conjunction with the Membership Training Class (**Discipline**, paragraph 29), a Guidance Session be held for the parents of the children joining the church to familiarize them with the purpose of this class.
13. That more men be encouraged to enter the program of Christian Education in the Children's Division of the local church.
14. That churches planning to build or remodel their educational facilities consult with the Conference Board of Education as to suitability of plans.
15. That a Conference for Children's Workers be planned in the Conference year of 1958-1959 with resource people to give help in the field of local teaching situations and teacher problems, and also an inspirational speaker.
16. That a Conference Laboratory School be planned for the summer of 1959 and that we continue the practice of a Conference-wide Laboratory School until that time when all districts can have these on district and Sub-district levels.
17. Recognizing the need for expanding the educational facilities for higher education in the North Carolina Conference, the Conference Committee on Children's Work pledges its full cooperation to the current financial campaign and urges the children's workers in the local churches to fully cooperate.

Section C

COMMITTEE ON YOUTH WORK

Graham S. Eubank, Chairman

The Committee on Youth Work in your Conference believes that a great responsibility has been placed upon its shoulders as it seeks to help prepare our Methodist Youth to assume their rightful places as Christian individuals and competent adult church men and women. It is, therefore, with a deep sense of our dependence upon the grace of God that we undertake to continue our valuable work. The Committee on Youth Work is happy to make the following report to the Annual Conference. Some of the areas where we have been at work are listed below.

REPORT OF PROGRESS

1. Summer Opportunities
 - a. The Senior Youth Assemblies at Louisburg College were well-attended and enjoyed a high quality of work. Four hundred and eight persons attended the first two weeks; one hundred and eighteen persons attended the third, or Workshop, Assembly. This is a fairly new venture in our Conference and is receiving wide acclaim from all who attend. Its specific purpose is the training of local church MYF officers.
 - b. Sixty-five young people attended the Older Youth Assembly at Camp Don-Lee in July. (1957)
 - c. The Sixth Annual Conferences Session for Youth was held on the campus of Duke University last August. Four hundred and fifty persons were in attendance. They were joined by some 1500 additional youth and their adult leaders for Rally Day.

2. Special Training Opportunities

- a. Two hundred and forty-six young people attended the District Alcohol Workshops sponsored by the Conference Board of Temperance. Dr. Cardine R. Hooten of the General Board was the speaker.
- b. Several of the Districts carried out successful District Vacation Conferences
- c. Vacation Church School Institutes were conducted by the District Directors of Intermediate Work, with one hundred and ninety-one persons attending.

3. Evangelism

- a. MYF membership moved from 24,707 in 1955-1956 to 25,935 in 1956-1957. This is a gain of 1,228 and the largest in the past eleven years.
 - b. The Board of Evangelism and the Conference MYF jointly sponsored a most successful Tri-District Christian Witness Mission in Goldsboro in April. Youth from the Wilmington and Raleigh Districts joined with young people in the Goldsboro District to win fifty-one youth to Christ by profession of faith and three by transfer. The group made a total of one hundred and seventy-three visits and won one hundred and five new members for the MYF.
4. The Methodist Youth Fund last year made a good gain over the previous year with \$12,059 being contributed by the young people of our Conference.
 5. District Youth Rallies were conducted by the District Directors of Youth Work with excellent attendance reported.
 6. A Conference-wide MYF Prayer Day was observed in many of the churches the first day of Lent, February 19, 1958.
- ## 7. Investment in Youth Leadership
- a. The Conference MYF sent one delegate to the Southeastern Recreation Workshop at Leasburg, Florida.
 - b. The Conference MYF sent its President, Phil Carlton, to the National Conference of Methodist Youth.
 - c. One young person was sent to the National School of Alcohol Studies.
8. A National Caravan composed of three young women, one young man, and an adult counselor visited six churches. A Duke Divinity School Caravan composed of two young men worked in ten churches.
 9. A Coaching Conference for Leadership School Instructors was held at Duke Memorial Church in Durham. Twelve adult workers worked in the course, "Understanding Youth." Ten of these leaders became certified to teach this course in our Christian Workers' Schools.
 10. Fall Institutes were held in each District by the District Directors of Youth Work, at which time emphasis on materials and resources for youth was given.

RECOMMENDATIONS FOR 1958-1959

For the Youth Division of our church we recommend the following:

We desire our program to be so geared that the Capital Funds Campaign for our Conference Emphasis on Christian Higher Education will have full priority.

1. Training Program for Adult Workers with Youth

- a. We recommend that a course in leadership training be offered in the first two Assemblies at Louisburg.
- b. We recommend that an emphasis be given to the organizing of Fellowships of Adult Workers with Youth on the Sub-district level. It is hoped that groups can be organized in at least three of our District a year.

- c. We recommend that a weekend training period guided by trained leadership from our General Board be held to which adult leaders could be invited.
 - d. We recommend that Fellowship Teams be made available to churches that have greater possibilities for growth. The District Superintendents and District Directors of Youth Work are asked to determine the churches which have need of these teams.
 - e. We recommend that courses on youth work be included in every Christian Workers' School, particularly for Intermediate work, and that more teachers be secured for youth courses in Christian Workers' Schools.
 - f. We recommend that an opportunity be given to several District Directors of Youth Work to attend the Leadership School at Lake Junaluska.
2. District and Sub-district Cultivation
- a. We recommend that Sub-district and District officers be elected in the spring and installed in the fall, thereby giving time for the old and new officers to work together during the summer.
 - b. We recommend holding a District Retreat soon after ACS, for which adequate preparation will be made by the adult workers and the youth officers. This retreat is to be a means whereby the material gathered at ACS may be taken to the local MYF's.
 - c. We recommend that District Directors of Intermediate Work meet early in the year to set up plans for their work.
3. District Rallies
- a. We recommend that at least one District Rally be held, preferably in the spring of the year, and that the Rallies be made as outstanding an occasion as possible.
 - b. During the District Rallies we urge the stressing of our summer opportunities sponsored by the Conference Board of Education.
 - c. We recommend that for the Rallies in the spring of 1959, the emphasis be "Christ and Our Mission," the third emphasis of our Quardrennial Theme.
4. Summer Opportunities
- a. We wish to commend the Board of Education for its outstanding program of Christian Adventure Camping at Camp Don-Lee. We urge continuing support of this fine enterprise for the training of our Intermediate Youth. We further commend the Board for its forward-looking approach to the area of camping as they undertake to develop three additional campsites. We wish to direct the attention of the entire Conference to this outstanding program of Christian Camping.
 - b. We stress continued support by pastors and lay people of our long-standing program of Youth Assemblies at Louisburg College each summer. Each local church is urged to send many delegates to this good work. Louisburg Assemblies exist as one of our best areas of recruiting for full-time church vocations.
 - c. We urge continued support for the Older Youth-Single Young Adult Assembly, which meets each summer at Camp Don-Lee, as one means where by we can assist the often neglected phase of our youth program.
 - d. We recommend the strengthening of the Youth Annual Conference Session at Duke University by means of the following:
 - (1) Having the District Directors of Youth Work attend all Sessions.
 - (2) Inviting a counselor from each Sub-district to attend ACS.
 - (3) Requesting the Bishop to attend the Rally Day at ACS to give greater meaning of ACS.

(4) That we compliment the Youth Council on the fine work which they are doing in our Conference and urge the pastors to assist the youth program by sending a delegate from each local church to ACS.

5. Wesley Foundation and Methodist Student Movement.

a. We approve the work that is being done in our Wesley Foundation on the state-supported college campus, and we further urge continued support for each of our local churches. A part of our Capital Funds Campaign will be given to support the further work of our Wesley Foundations.

b. We deplore the absence of Methodist Emphasis on Methodist campuses and strongly urge the organization of Methodist Student Groups on each of our Methodist College campuses, and we further urge that a vital Methodist emphasis be presented without apology in organizing, supervising, and supporting Methodist Student Groups.

6. We recommend continued support of the Conference Committee on Christian Vocations, and we wish to commend its work this Conference year. We urge a close cooperation between the District Directors of Youth Work and the District Directors of Christian Vocations.

7. We commend the undergirding of the spiritual life of the young people of our Conference by participation in the Conference-wide Prayer Day on Ash Wednesday, February 11, 1959.

8. We urge that the new MYFund maps be used in the promotion of the MYFund at the Louisburg Assemblies and ACS. We urge that each local MYF pledge to the MYFund in June. We urge that each individual member of the MYF pledge in the amount of \$2.00 a year to this Fund.

9. We recommend, in cooperation with the Conference Board of Evangelism, the holding of another Tri-District Youth Christian Witness Mission.

10. We recommend emphasizing the local program for Intermediates, so Intermediates will not feel the need to attend regular District and Sub-district meetings. The attendance of Intermediates at the District and Sub-district meetings is discouraged since it is impossible to formulate a program that will appeal to both groups. An occasional inspirational meeting for Intermediates on the Sub-district level is suggested to assist in working out this problem. We further urge the General Board of Education in Nashville to seriously reconsider the age groupings as they now exist in the Youth Department to the end that a more realistic approach can be determined and used.

11. We wish to express our appreciation to Robert McKenzie, Jr., for the splendid work he is doing with the youth work of our Conference, and we urge and recommend his reappointment as Conference Director of Youth Work.

Section D

COMMITTEE ON ADULT WORK

Leon Russell, Chairman

"No higher charge is laid by democracy upon its teaching institutions than this—the free citizen is to be given the utmost help and encouragement in learning how, and why, to control the decisions by which he agrees to be controlled. This means both inquiry and action, and always by and in groups, under the best professional leadership we can muster. It means constantly increased and deepened channels of communication, such as adult education knows how to open. It

means expenditure of time, energy, creativeness, and money; and never will education confront a better bargain."

1. Quadrennial Goals for Adults in North Carolina Conference

- a. Create a consciousness of the unique importance of adults in the life of The Methodist Church and of their need for continuing spiritual, mental, and social growth.
- b. Create an awareness of the Adult Division as a part of the local church organization, and stimulate the formation of Adult Councils in local churches.
- c. Help to increase understanding and mutual appreciation between members of various economic, social, and racial groups both inside and outside the church.
- d. Foster an increased knowledge of the Bible, and the desire to relate it to contemporary life.
- e. Help local adult classes to become Redemptive Fellowships, to increase active participation by nominal church members, in the life of the church.
- f. Improve teaching procedures so as to involve class members in learning situations and help each person to assume leadership.
- g. Strengthen marital relationships and enrich family life.

2. **Report for 1958-1959.** Among the adult activities beyond the local church for 1957-1958 were 12 Bible Conferences, 17 adult methods courses in Christian Workers' Schools, 3 Family Life Institutes, 2 Mental Health Institutes, 1 Social Action Seminar, 2 Adult Rallies, 9 active Subdistrict Young Adult Fellowships, 30 Subdistrict Institutes for Superintendents of Adult Divisions, 24 Subdistrict Institutes for local church Family Life chairmen, and 182 days of Field Service by the Conference Director of Adult Work.

3. Recommendations to Local Churches

- a. **Activate the Adult Council**—a quarterly meeting of teachers and president of adult classes, and leaders of other adult organizations, to plan for complete ministry to adults. The Conference Director, upon invitation by a local church, will arrange help to assist in such activation.
- b. **Study and cooperate in the Campaign for Christian Higher Education**—Adult classes have an opportunity for participation, by engaging in a study of the needs and possibilities of Christian colleges, and by pledging full support to the campaign.
- c. **Evangelize through Adult Groups** making each group an evangelistic arm of the church. Adult groups should offer teams for visitation in cooperation with the Commission on Evangelism, and the Superintendent of Membership Cultivation. Each teacher should be teaching for a verdict of Christ.
- d. **Organize Additional Adult Classes and Study Groups.** Some men's and women's classes should combine to make room for younger adult classes. Other classes could divide with advantage. Some short term interest groups could be held, with students retaining membership in present classes.
- e. **Experiment in Adult Groups with New Methods of Teaching**—Research has shown that group discussion, followed by group decision, has from four to ten times the effectiveness of lecture and explanation, both in immediate change of practice and in duration of change.
- f. **Select Curriculum Materials in Each Class**, using "Resources for Adult Groups," the new guidebook. We especially urge consideration of the **Basic Christian Books Series**, first available for Fall Quarter, 1958.

- g. **Provide the "Adult Workers Living Library"** for use of Adult Teachers, and others interested.
 - h. **Plan and carry out an effective Young Adult Week, January 18-25, 1959.** This observance led to a re-vitalizing of the Vanceboro Church last year.
 - i. **Encourage Adults to Seek Inspiration and Leadership Training,** both in and beyond the local church. We call especial attention to the Adult Convocation at Duke, August 8-10. For teachers, officers, and members of Adult classes, Commission Chairmen, Older Adults, Family Life Chairmen, and Superintendents of Adult Divisions.
4. **Recommendations for District and Subdistrict Program**
- a. **Strengthen the Bible Conference Program,** by holding a minimum of two Bible Conferences in each District. Some Christian Workers' Schools omit the Bible course in favor of a Bible Conference held at a different time.
 - b. **Include a course on Adult Work in every Christian Workers' School.**
 - c. **Conduct Mental Health Workshops** in cooperation with local community resources, including a discussion of the contributions of the pastor.
 - d. **Offer Clinics for Teachers of Adult Classes**—to guide teachers in the experience of making a teaching plan involving group procedures.
 - e. **Cooperate in areas of social concerns,** with Boards of World Peace, Temperance, and Social-Economic Relations. We urge local churches to face social issues with courage, in the spirit of love.
 - f. Organize a Subdistrict Young Adult Fellowship in each urban center of the conference. We believe that Subdistrict YAF's would welcome a study of contemporary social concerns.
5. **Recommendations for Conference Program**
- a. **Give guidance and assistance** in developing local church, district, and sub-district program.
 - b. **Send to each pastor** the list of "Needs of Adults That Should be met by Local Churches," compiled by the Bishop and Cabinets in the Area Consultation on Adult Work. This list should be considered by the local church Adult Council.
 - c. **Evaluate the Summer Opportunities for Adults** in terms of quality, attendance, and results, and plan for indicated changes for 1959.
 - d. **Request clarification of policies** and more comprehensive promotional materials dealing with the persons who are 18-23, from the youth and adult departments of the Divisions of the Local Church, General Board of Education.
6. We commend the Reverend Harold Minor for his effective and consecrated leadership as Conference Director of Adult Work, and recommend his re-appointment for the Conference Year, 1958-1959.

Section E

COMMITTEE ON CHRISTIAN FAMILY LIFE

Jesse H. Lanning, Chairman

We believe that Christian Family Life Education is an imperative necessity in the church because the basic experiences which develop Christian attitudes, motives, and behavior are entrenched in the relationships between members of the family group. Our ideas of God, Christ, Sin, Salvation, and moral values are more firmly established by our families than any other group. This makes the

effort to develop Christian families one of the basic aims of the local church.

EVALUATION OF THE 1957-'58 PROGRAM

1. For the first time, District Directors of Family Life Education were appointed in each district and began their work under the supervision of the Conference Director of Adult Work. These Directors met in Greenville in the fall and outlined their work.
2. The District Directors began developing a mailing list of family life workers in the local churches and made contact with them by mail and visits. The directors also met with local church family life workers in the District Church School Institutes in the fall.
3. Family Life Institutes were conducted this year in Ahoskie, Laurinburg, and Rocky Mount.
4. Many of the Christian Workers' Schools included courses on Making Your Home Christian.
5. A highly successful Family Camp was conducted at Camp Don-Lee, August 21-24. Two Family Camps will be held in 1958—August 17-20, August 20-23.
6. Several of our ministers and laymen participated in the North Carolina Family Life Council's annual Conference at East Carolina College in Greenville last September. The next annual meeting will be held at the Sir Walter Hotel in Raleigh, October 26-28, 1958. The public is invited.
7. There has been increasing evidence reported this year that there is a growing concern among the pastors for the problems being expressed by families. This deepening concern is an indication that greater efforts and better programs in family life education may be forthcoming.
8. A group of our pastors were invited this year to improve their skill in dealing with family problems by attending the North Carolina Council of Churches' Institute on Marriage and Family Counseling in Durham; and the Institute on Counseling Troubled Persons at Dix Hill Hospital in Raleigh.
9. A number of representatives from the North Carolina Conference attended the Family Life Conference at Lake Junaluska last summer.
10. Some very valuable information on family problems was presented on the television program "Credo" which was produced in WUNC-TV, channel 4, in Chapel Hill by the North Carolina Council of Churches in May of this year.
11. We commend the Conference Director of Adult Work, Harold Minor, for his vision in recruiting District Directors of Family Life in each district, and for his continuing efforts to improve our family life education program.

RECOMMENDATIONS FOR THE 1958-'59 PROGRAM ON

THE CONFERENCE LEVEL

1. That the Conference Director of Adult Work nominate, and the District Superintendent approve, a District Director of Family Life Education in each district who will work as a member of the District Church School Staff.
2. That where possible pastors and laymen develop family life programs in cooperation with other appropriate community agencies, such as the P. T. A., Family Service agencies, Child Guidance Clinics, Mental Health Clinics, the Public Health Department, the Public Welfare Agencies, and others.

3. That the Family Camping program be continued and that the three new campsites be utilized for expanding the family camping program for the summer of 1959, if feasible.
4. That a training workshop to develop teaching skills for leading Parent discussion groups in local churches be provided for pastors and layworkers as soon as possible.
5. That delegates be sent to the Jurisdictional Family Life Workshop at Lake Junaluska, July 17-20, by local churches and the Annual Conference.
6. That a plan be devised to select delegates from this Conference to attend the National Family Life Conference in Chicago, October 17-19.
7. That a Conference-wide Follow-up program be conducted on the theme of the National Family Life Conference; this may be arranged during the year 1959-'60.
8. That Board of Managers for Sub-district and area Christian Workers' Schools be urged to include in their schools courses on the Christian family.
9. That every means be used to urge pastors to avail themselves of all opportunities for advanced training in counseling with families. Especially do we urge local churches to send their pastors to the North Carolina Council of Churches' Institute on Family Counseling; and where possible to subsidize their fee and travel expense.
10. That the TRAFCO T. V. program series, "Talk Back," which is to be produced on local T. V. stations this year be widely publicized, and that local churches be assisted in developing a listening audience and in forming "Talk Back" discussion groups.
11. That our Conference Staff assist in developing and sending out a calendar showing the program schedule of the various family life education agencies in North Carolina.

—ON THE DISTRICT AND SUB-DISTRICT LEVEL:

1. That the District Director of Family Life Education select one local church in his district and help develop a complete and efficient program on family life there, with the agreement that this church's program may be used as a laboratory for observation and training for other churches in that area.
2. That each District Superintendent have a local church Director of Family Life elected in the Quarterly Conference of each local church, and that a list of these persons be sent to the Conference Board office along with the list of other church school officials.
3. That a Family Life Institute be held in each district, sub-district, or area, where desired.
4. That clinics to train leaders of parent discussion groups be held where possible in the district or sub-district.

—ON THE LOCAL CHURCH LEVEL:

1. That each local church elect a Director and/or a Committee on Family Life Education to plan and conduct its program. Conference and District resource persons are available to give assistance in this.
2. That a study course on Christian Family Life be taught in many local churches. A one-teacher workers' school might be devoted to this subject. The Conference staff will recommend a qualified teacher.

3. That the new adult curriculum material, "Basic Christian Books Series," which will include a text and study guide on Christian Family Living, be used in adult classes beginning in October as a basis of study in family life. These books are available from the Methodist Publishing House and will be listed on the regular church school literature order blank this fall.
4. That local churches offer a Parents' Study Class using the special study material prepared for this purpose in the "Christian Home Magazine." This periodical may be ordered with the other church school lesson materials.
5. That where possible local churches be encouraged to develop their own family camping program. The Conference Camps and other resources will be available on a limited basis for these projects.
6. That the Methodist Sunday Evening Fellowship program, which is being developed in many of our churches, be used for additional family life study. If a church fellowship cannot meet each week, it is recommended that meetings be held at least monthly.
7. That local churches plan to encourage and give financial assistance to delegates from their church to the National Family Life Conference in Chicago, October 17-19.
8. We urge local ministers and laymen to encourage local public school officials to include programs on pre-marital education in their school curriculum. We believe that such action is imperative because the increasing number of high school students having serious sexual and pre-marital problems can be served best in this way.
9. We call to the attention of local churches that packets of materials which will help them develop a family life program are available FREE from the Department of Family Life Education, The General Board of Education of the Methodist Church, Box 871, Nashville 2, Tennessee.

Section F

COMMITTEE ON DIRECTORS OF EDUCATION AND MINISTERS OF MUSIC

The Committee on Directors of Christian Education and Ministers of Music is a new Standing Committee of the Conference Board of Education. The organizational meeting was held May 6, 1958. At this meeting the following recommendations were made:

I. Directors of Christian Education

1. That the Board of Education encourage the continuance of the Annual Seminar for Directors of Christian Education and Educational Assistants (heretofore carried out jointly with those of the Western North Carolina Conference.); that the Board of Education encourage local churches to send their Director of Christian Education or Educational Assistant to this annual seminar, and that the churches finance their director's attendance.
2. That the Conference Board of Education office promote the Seminar for Directors and Educational Assistants through mailings to the churches that have Directors or Educational Assistants.

3. That local churches send their Director of Christian Education or Educational Assistant to the annual Southeastern Jurisdiction Workshop for Directors at Lake Junaluska, and to the Leadership School (one or two weeks) if possible; that the local churches finance their director's attendance.
4. That the following persons be certified Directors of Christian Education at the 1958 Annual Conference:

3. That local choir directors and accompanists, whether or not certified Ministers of Music, be encouraged to affiliate with NAFOMM, and to attend the NAFOMM meeting at Boston University, July 13-18, 1958.
4. That the Board of Education sponsor a one-day conference-wide meeting of local choir directors, accompanists, and other interested persons during March, 1959, for the purpose of organizing a Fellowship of Methodist Musicians; that the fellowship provide in service training; that Dr. Bliss Wiant, Director of Music, Division of the Local Church, General Board of Education, be invited as resource leader.
5. That the Conference Board of Education office compile a mailing list of musicians in local churches.
6. That the committee collaborate with the Conference Commission on Worship in an Institute of Music and Worship for Ministers of Music, choir directors, pastors, etc.
7. That the following persons be certified Ministers of Music at the 1958 Annual Conference:

Section G

1. Committee On Camps

Brooks Patten, Chairman

This is the second year of work for the Camping Committee. Last year the major emphasis was given to analysis and long-range planning for a comprehensive program of camping for the Conference. This year the first steps have been taken to accomplish some of these goals.

The need for more camping facilities is vividly shown by the record of camping for the past year. Twelve hundred and five campers attended camp at Camp Don-Lee. The committee also rented three different camps for Junior Camping, for a total of 609 persons in attendance during the summer. For the summer of 1958, twenty-two periods of camping have been scheduled at these facilities.

Three new camp sites are in the process of being secured for our camping program. Camp Rockfish, a 400 acre site on Rockfish Creek, 13 miles southwest of Fayetteville, near Parkton and Raeford, is being presented to our Conference Board of Education by the laymen of the Fayetteville District. These laymen are completing an \$8,000 campaign during the month of May. A Local Development Committee has been set up, to work under the direction of the Camp Committee. We look forward to initial construction to begin this fall.

Camp Chestnut Ridge, a 300 acre camp site in Orange County near Efland, N. C., is being secured by the Burlington and Durham District laymen at a cost of \$6,000. A campaign to raise these funds is being completed in May. Initial development is to be started this summer.

Kerr Lake Methodist Camp comprises 140 acres on Kerr Lake seven miles north of Henderson, N. C. This property is held under a renewable lease of 22 years from the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers by the Raleigh Board of Missions and Church Extension, Inc., and has been made available to the Camp Committee for the development of a camping program. A campaign is currently under way in the Raleigh District sponsored by the laymen to raise \$5,000 for initial development, including road, sanitary facilities, and a picnic area. A local development committee has been appointed, of which Mr. W. D. Payne, of Henderson, is the Chairman.

In order to enrich and expand our camping program the committee has constructed a "chuck wagon" trailer, fully equipped with all necessary camping facilities for fourteen campers and three counselors. The "chuck wagon" will be put to immediate use this summer in weekly side trips for advanced campers from Camp Don-Lee to Fort Macon and other points of historical interest in the Morehead City Area. Also the trailer will be used in helping with initial construction at the new camp sites, with counselor training and requisition by local churches during the year.

To facilitate carrying out its functions, the Camping Committee has eliminated its subcommittee on sites and transferred these duties and functions to the Ex-

ecutive Committee. These functions are to recommend camp sites to be acquired; to analyze program needs; to study camp standards; to draw up master plans in consultation with landscape architects and camping specialists; to present master plans to the Committee for approval; and to supervise camp construction. The Executive and Program Committees will continue their respective functions as outlined in last year's report.

The Program Committee set up the following summer program of camping to be carried out by the Conference Camping Director, the Conference Director of Youth Work, the Conference Director of Adult Work, the Conference Director of Children's Work, and nine District Junior Camp Directors: two periods of staff training, six one-week and one ten-day Intermediate camps, an Older Youth Assembly, a Young Adult Assembly, two Family Camps, and nine one-week District Junior Camps. All except the Junior Camps will be held at Camp Don-Lee. The Junior Camps are scheduled at Camp Caroline, Camp New Life, and Camp Monroe.

Looking forward to the all important task of developing the new camps, the committee has recommended that Mr. Robert E. Reed be employed to direct this work on the basis of six months of his time during the conference year 1958-1959. It is the hope of the committee that the development program will advance to the point that Mr. Reed will be a full-time employee during this next conference year.

The committee by unanimous resolution wishes to express its deep appreciation for the devoted leadership given its work by Mr. Bill Price who until recently has been Chairman of the Committee. Special word of thanks and gratitude is extended to those many directors and counselors who have given of their time and energy to carry forward into an enlarging program of camping within our conference. Also, the committee's appreciation goes to the many laymen and ministers who join hands in the task of the local development committees for the new camps, and to the laymen of the various districts who have worked faithfully to make the new camp sites possible.

We re-affirm our belief that camping offers the Church the finest opportunity for leading children, young people, and adults in Christian growth since the Church School was added to the Church program. Church camping gives the plus to all Christian education and is the ideal way for the church to teach what it considers most important.

2. Camp Don-Lee, Inc.

L. Roscoe Foreman, President

The construction program at Camp Don-Lee was completed in the spring of 1957 and the camp was formally dedicated by Bishop Paul N. Garber on Saturday, May 17, 1957. Its facilities, consisting of twenty cement block buildings and furnishings, a fresh-water swimming pool, a boat and fishing pier, and approximately fifty acres of land along the shore of the beautiful lower Neuse River, are valued at more than \$175,000. There can be no doubt that this is one of the most beautiful and best equipped church camps of eastern Carolina.

A full program of camping was carried on during the summer of 1957. Approximately twelve hundred persons attended the formal camp sessions during the months of June, July, and August. These sessions included a Staff Training Camp, a Young Adult Assembly, an Older Youth Assembly, a Family Camp, eight Junior High Christian Adventure Camps, and one District Junior Camp. Many additional local church retreat groups and picnic groups made use of the camp facilities during the spring and fall months as well as on week-ends during the camping season.

Following the resignation of Rev. Robert Regan, Jr., as our Camp Director at the end of June, 1957, Rev. Warren Bishop of Bynum, N. C., served as the camp director for the remainder of the summer camping program. We are pleased to announce that Rev. W. N. McDonald of Louisburg College, Louisburg, N. C., will serve as the Camp Director at Camp Don-Lee for the summer of 1958. A capacity camping program for the full summer is anticipated.

Under the watchful eye of Mr. T. J. Collier, treasurer of the camp, the buildings have been kept in a good state of repair. Minor repairs have been made this spring and no major repairs are anticipated in the near future.

Alfonzie Cox, who has served the camp so faithfully for the past few years as cook, was employed as caretaker in February, 1958. He has done a good job repairing and painting boats and equipment, keeping up the grounds, looking after the buildings, and serving as the cook for local church week-end retreat groups. Since he lives a short distance from the camp we have found this arrangement to be most satisfactory. It is our feeling that this arrangement should be continued.

We rejoice in the prospect of securing and developing additional camp-sites in our conference. These facilities are needed to take care of our growing camping needs.

2. Duke Divinity School

This has been another good year in the Divinity School. The quality of the students has improved and the work this year has been better than ever. Enrollment for 1957-58 shows 275 students. These fall into the following categories: 243 candidates for the B.D. and M.R.E. degree, 25 students enrolled in the Department of Religion in the Graduate School of Arts and Sciences who are candidates for the M.A. and Ph.D. degrees in Religion, and 7 students enrolled in the 1957-58

Summer Session (without duplication). The Faculty and Staff of the Divinity School totals 37 of whom 27 are engaged in instruction. We are proud of the high caliber of the Faculty.

There has been a slight increase this year in the amount of aid allocated to the Divinity School from the World Service Fund of the Methodist Church. The generous support of the summer preaching program by the Duke Endowment has enabled us to raise the amount of aid to students working this coming summer to \$700 for ten weeks' work. The charges to which these students are assigned furnish board, lodging, the necessary incidentals and travel expenses. We will have three grants-in-aid from this source in the amount of \$1,000 to be used for men who have large families. We receive support annually from the College Sustaining Fund in each of the North Carolina Conferences.

Because of changes in the date of meeting of several annual conferences in this area there has been a change in the schedule of summer activities in the Divinity School. The Ministers' Convocation and North Carolina Pastors' School is scheduled this year August 4-8. This will overlap the last few days of the school for Approved Supply Pastors. The attendance at the Supply Pastors' School runs around two-hundred and renders increasing service to the Methodist Church in North Carolina and the Southeastern Jurisdiction. There are also students in this school from other denominations and from outside the Southeastern Jurisdiction. The chief support of the school comes from the Methodist Board of Education, Department of In-Service Training, North Carolina Conferences. It is the purpose of the Divinity School and of Duke University to stay very close to the Methodist Church and to work with all its agencies.

By generous gifts of sixteen members of the Board of Trustees of the University a handsome wall-to-wall carpet has been installed in York Chapel along with a public address system. The Dean hopes to find some source that will give \$7,000 to install a large stained glass window in York Chapel behind the altar. We have had here for thirty years only a velvet drape.

The pressure for student appointments in the adjacent areas of the Methodist Church increases every year, and we appreciate the hearty cooperation of the adjacent conference in making the appointments available. A large majority of the Divinity School students now are married and many have families.

The Divinity School is receiving an increasingly large number of applications from foreign students. All of these require more extensive assistance than there are funds for them. We would like very much for individuals and churches to send us money for the Foreign Student Scholarship Fund.

3. Greensboro College

We express thanks to you and the whole North Carolina Conference for the fine way in which you are carrying forward the program in Christian Higher Education. Under the leadership of the Commission on Christian Higher Education, a new relationship will be established between the Conference and its colleges; we believe that the Church and its colleges will understand each other's work in a way not before possible.

Our needs, as established by the General Board of Education's study of last year, call for a gymnasium and a men's residence hall to be built as soon as financially possible. Extensive improvement of existing structures should be carried forward at the same time. An additional \$2,000,000 should be secured for endowment, so that income may be used to maintain and further improve the quality of instruction and personnel. Increased sustaining funds from the Conference will

serve as living endowment, to help at the College's most critical point. Gifts from individuals, alumni, and corporations are on the increase.

The following statistics for the year 1957-58 are subject to correction when the outside audit is completed at the end of the fiscal year: officers, assistants, and instructors, 63; students 487; value of property, \$2,724,000; endowment, \$1,090,000; endowment scholarship aid, \$2,900; work awards to students, \$17,000; other scholarships and grants, \$6,000; tuition reductions to ministers' children and to ministerial candidates, \$6,000.

Again our thanks for your enlightened guidance and support in the past and our hope that you will see fit to increase assistance at this critical juncture in our history when we are getting ready to serve a student body of over 600 students!

4. High Point College

The enrollment for the year ending May 26, 1958, was as follows: Regular Session, 1017 different students; Summer School, 624 different students; making a total of 1641. We had enrolled the second largest number (in the 80's) of pre-ministerial students among the 50 four-year Methodist colleges in the United States as reported by the General Board of Education. A large number of young women are preparing for full-time Christian service. There were 74 faculty and staff members. Approximately 50 per cent of the teaching faculty held the appropriate earned doctor's degree, compared with approximately 40 per cent for all of the four-year colleges and universities for the entire United States. We had 958 selected students enrolled during the Fall semester, 60 per cent of whom were Methodists. With the completion of a new girls' dormitory by the opening of school in September, we will be able to permit our enrollment to reach approximately 1,000 selected students of high quality.

Since our fiscal year closes May 31 and since the annual audit will not be available until the middle of July, we cannot give financial data for the year's operations. Suffice it to say that in an operational budget of almost \$850,000 the College will close the year without a deficit. There is no indebtedness.

We are happy to be able to report the occupancy of a new spacious gymnasium and Physical Education building with a seating capacity of approximately 3200, and the remodeling of the old gymnasium as an adequate and spacious cafeteria, dining hall, and kitchen, with the inclusion of 21 additional spaces for men resident students. The former cafeteria and kitchen have been remodeled into additional classrooms, faculty offices, film room, and toilet areas. An additional 400 horse-power boiler, with a building to house it, has been installed to provide the needed additional heat to the new buildings that have been added in the past few years.

Student religious activities continue to play an important part in the life of the College. Faculty leadership for these activities heads up in the Department of Religion and Philosophy, consisting of four full-time faculty members.

High Point College is in desperate need of additional funds from the College Sustaining Fund of both Conferences. For the fiscal year closing May 31, 1957 (the most recent year for which complete data are available) we received \$51.78 per full-time student from the North Carolina Conference Sustaining Fund (total of \$45,052.60) and \$47.50 per full-time student from the Western North Carolina Conference (total of \$41,321.89—a short conference year), or a total of \$99.28 per student from both Conferences. As of March 31, we had received \$28,009.96 from the North Carolina Conference and \$58,095.57 from the Western North Carolina Conference since June 1, 1957, with additional payments expected by May 31.

Without knowing the exact corresponding figures for Louisburg, Greensboro and Brevard Colleges, but knowing that they need all the funds they are receiving, and more, the amount appropriated by the two Conferences to each student at High Point College is no more than one-half, or perhaps less, of the amount appropriated by the two Conferences to each student at these other colleges.

Since High Point College has a larger number of commuting students, it has been claimed by some that High Point does not need as large an appropriation per student as a college with few day students. This is entirely erroneous. It costs as much to teach a commuting student as it does a dormitory student. The accrediting agencies require the same amount to be spent on teaching a commuting student as a dormitory student.

Just a word about our most immediate needs. Our operating funds need to be doubled either from a greatly increased endowment, greatly increased sustaining funds from the Conferences, or a combination of both. This is our greatest need.

5. Louisburg College

Statistics: Total enrollment, 400; faculty and staff, 34; property evaluation, \$1,600,000; endowment, \$188,000; indebtedness, \$69,000; budget for year, \$315,000; received from College Sustaining Fund, \$53,732; received from United College Appeal, \$20,320; received from endowment and N. C. Foundation of Church-related Colleges, \$13,951.

Building Projects: The Davis Building has been remodeled during the year at a cost of \$75,000. A student union-cafeteria building, to cost \$200,000, is under construction with a loan of \$180,000 from the Housing and Home Finance Agency. Other building needs include a library and an auditorium at a cost of over \$400,000.

Endowment: The college needs to increase its endowment fund by at least \$500,000.

6. Methodist College

The President of Methodist College began his duties on September 1, 1957. The first matter to be undertaken was the planning of the building program. The architectural firm of Stevens and Wilkinson, Atlanta, Georgia, had already been employed before the President's arrival, but no planning had been done for any buildings and only a preliminary study had been made looking toward use of the site. The past months have been spent in site planning, engineering studies and locating of all buildings, including those presently to be undertaken and those for future construction and expansion. Detailed floor plans have been drawn for seven

buildings in the instructional group. Planning is beginning on floor plans for the residence area. The architects have about completed working drawings on the first building in the instructional group and it will probably be ready to let to contract by the time this report is made.

The President has also been engaged in cultivation and promotion of the church campaign throughout the churches of the Conference at every available opportunity. This work continues and shall be our chief interest until the successful completion of this endeavor.

7. North Carolina Wesleyan College

As a result of the efforts of the part of the Rocky Mount Area Wesleyan College Foundation, the following progress report is possible:

In addition, the 200 acre site has been deeded to the college and a 12" water line has already been laid to the campus.

The building plans have rapidly progressed, and we expect to let a contract covering the heat and hot water plant and the various utilities very soon. Our Trustees have approved the site plan and the detailed working plans and specifications for the first phase of the building program. The road system is currently being built, and the undesired underbrush throughout the wooded area is being cut out. In an effort to make our building program coincide with hoped for and expected income, we have divided it into three phases and will contract only on a basis of the funds in hand at a given period.

We purchased the Library of Black Mountain College consisting of some 14,000 volumes.

Our plans now call for the selection of a president within the next few months. Much study is being given to this matter by our Personnel Committee.

Section B

COLLEGE SUSTAINING FUND, 1958-1959

We recommend that the College Sustaining Fund be increased by \$40,000 over the year 1957-1958, for a total of \$290,000.

We recommend that the appropriation for the Conference Commission on Christian Higher Education be made a preferred claim against this fund and made available by the Conference Treasurer, as needed.

We recommend that the policy of distributing the Sustaining Fund currently be discontinued after this year. Under this plan Sustaining Fund money collected during the Conference Year will be distributed at the end of the Conference Year.

We recommend that this fund be distributed quarterly from current receipts as follows:

*We recommend that the increase of \$7,100 for Louisburg College be continued upon the raising of \$5,000 by the Louisburg area and Alumni for operating expenses during the Conference Year 1958-1959.

**In allocating the Sustaining Fund amounts for 1958-1959 to Greensboro College and High Point College, the North Carolina Conference Board of Education has been guided by the following considerations.

1. A commitment to the education of all Methodist youth in North Carolina.
2. The desire to bear our full share of the responsibility for the maintenance of our colleges to the limit of our abilities.
3. A judgment that the equal sharing of the educational responsibility in North Carolina involves a major commitment by the North Carolina Conference to the work of Methodist College and North Carolina Wesleyan which at this time are supported by the North Carolina Conference alone.

The above allocation of funds to the institutions supported jointly by the North Carolina Conference and the Western North Carolina Conference is made to enable these institutions, in so far as possible, to meet their present commitments for the ensuing year. In view of the fact that the North Carolina Conference is committing itself to the challenging opportunity to more adequately meet the needs for Christian Higher Education through two new colleges, which it is now supporting alone, it is obvious during this period of building and readjustment, at least, further substantial reductions will have to be made in the allocation of funds by the North Carolina Conference to those institutions now jointly supported by the North Carolina and Western North Carolina Conference. We hope that our sister conference which has been associated with us in the joint support of these institutions will expand its sustaining support to meet the growing needs of these two fine institutions. Attention is again called to the resolution of our North Carolina Board of Education passed in June 1957 which called for an approach to our educational responsibilities on a state-wide basis.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON CHRISTIAN HIGHER EDUCATION

During this Conference year the surpassing concern of the Commission on Christian Higher Education has been the development of our College Capital Fund Campaign.

During the year the Commission has employed the services of Ward, Dreshman and Reinhardt, Inc. of New York City as fund raising counsel.

On the recommendation of our counsel, the Annual Conference set the Campaign goal at \$5,000,000.

*The office of the Executive Director has been opened in Durham where preparations are being made for the intensive phase of our Campaign, and for the work which will follow. This involves the receiving of payments on pledges which will be made, and the continued cultivation of our people in the understanding and appreciation of our institutions of higher learning as a part of the life of the Church.

It is the judgment of the Commission that the Campaign for Christian Higher Education represents the greatest opportunity and challenge which has come to our Conference during our lifetime. We believe it deserves the whole-hearted, unreserved and enthusiastic support of all our pastors and laymen. For the development of our church, the progress of North Carolina, the providing of a proper opportunity for our youth and for the advancement of the Kingdom of God among us, we call for the dedicated commitment of our people to the high goals of this Campaign.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EVANGELISM

Our great purpose has been to help our churches to become permeated with the true spirit and the fruitful works of Evangelism. In pursuing this purpose we have sought (1) To inspire and assist our pastors in the whole ministry of Evangelism; (2) To deepen and develop the spiritual life of the churches; (3) To undergird and strengthen the total task of the Church in all its varied ministries. We believe that real progress has been achieved in this purpose and through these efforts. In particular we are glad and grateful to mention the following activities of the year:

Prayer Life

In the Christian life individually and in the Christian Church collectively we know that there is no conquest for Christ without communion with God through Christ. The districts have responded well to our call for district-wide Prayer Vigils for Evangelism, with varying plans, from a united 24-hour Prayer Vigil in one district to a continuous week of prayer in another district. And who can measure the results of such a time of prayer across the Conference—in evangelistic effort and in the growing prayer life of churches and individuals?

Local Church Commissions

In the Commission on Membership and Evangelism the Local Church has means of untold possibilities for the spiritual life and evangelistic achievement of its members. One of our goals is "A Functioning Commission in each Local Church."

Church." For the second year we have traveled toward that goal by leading in District and sub-District Workshops for the pastors and the members of the Commission. And we have reason to believe that there is a steadily growing number of active and effective Local Church Commissions.

Visitation Evangelism

As our Lord commissioned His followers to carry on His work He "sent them out two by two." So we call for a continuous program of "two by two" Visitation Evangelism. Thus, another of our goals is a Fisherman's Club, Couples Club, or a group by another name, committed to the work of Visitation Evangelism. And we rejoice to record that whereas last year the pastors reported 41 such groups, this year they have reported to date 124 such groups. Moreover, more than sixty pastors report that they will try to form such a group. We are confident that this steady growth in Visitation Evangelism is responsible for much of the fruits of Evangelism in our Conference the past year.

Conference Evangelistic Mission

Following months of careful planning and preparation our churches entered into a Conference-wide Evangelistic Program this Spring, with simultaneous evangelistic services, by districts, throughout the conference; with an exchange of pastors between districts, but with visiting preachers from outside the conference where desired by the local pastor. Our bishop, the district superintendents, the pastors and our people entered into this program in a wonderful way. And when the results are all known we believe they will be a joy to everyone. According to reports from the district superintendents early in May our net increase in membership at that time over the net increase of all last year was approximately 40%.

Youth Evangelism

We face the tragic fact that, whereas roughly half the people of our nation are at least professed Christians, only one out of four of the young people of the land count themselves so. Three out of four non-Christian, and these four young people are the nation of tomorrow! Will our nation of tomorrow be Christ's or Satan's? Does not the answer lie with those three out of four? Or does it lie with what we do about those three? Hence, another goal of our Board is a Youth Christian Witness Mission annually in every Pastoral Charge. This year again The Board of Education, through its Youth Division, led by the Reverend Robert McKenzie, and the Board of Evangelism together have held a tri-district Youth Mission in which our young people received training in evangelism by actually winning other young people to Christ. Last year 19 teams went out in one week-end and won 24 others. This year 25 teams went out and won 54 others. Now we have nearly a hundred of our finest young people ready to help in other Youth Missions as rapidly as our pastors can plan them.

School of Evangelism

If our Church of today needs to recover its original evangelistic vitality, a whole hearted gathering of our pastors to study the best means of meeting this need should certainly be a great help. And our experience has proved this to be true. Last Fall, in cooperation with our Town and Country Commission, we held a School of Evangelism and Week of Preaching, led by Dr. Harry Denman, of our General Board of Evangelism, and with an attendance of 225 of our pastors. It was so well received that the pastors asked that it be continued this Fall on the Conference level, and broken down to a tri-District level next year if possible.

Pastors Retreat

We held in December our second annual Pastors Retreat, with Bishop Paul N. Garber, Bishop Ralph S. Cushman, Dr. G. Ernest Thomas, and Dr. W. Arthur Kale as visiting speakers, and with a score of our Conference ministers taking leading parts on the program. Even with the handicap of a Christmas week date the Retreat was attended by 125 pastors. We are planning now to combine the next years Retreat with the School of Evangelism and Week of Preaching.

Ministry to the Smaller Churches

Our Board has cooperated with three other conference agencies (Board of Education, Board of Missions, Town & Country Commission) in an Inter-Board Ministry to the small, weak churches in the Conference. Many of these are declining or barren churches, not winning others to Christ and His Church. For this program thirty pastors have been selected and trained to conduct a three-day Preaching-Teaching Mission in these weaker churches. This program has helped more than one barren church to become a fruitful church, and we believe it merits our full support. 18 churches have been served, and the Preaching-Teaching Mission is scheduled for 7 other churches to date.

Plans for the Coming Year

For the new Conference Year we recommend the continuance and development of these emphases:

1. Prayer Vigils for Evangelism and other specific causes.
2. District and sub-District Workshops for Local Church Commissions.
3. Cultivation of Fisherman's Clubs, setting goals of a definite number of calls by the laymen.
4. Tri-District Youth Mission for the three districts not already reached, and a Youth Mission in each local church as rapidly as possible.
5. The School of Evangelism and Week of Preaching combined with the Pastors Retreat, postponed until the Fall of 1959 because of the College Campaign this Fall.
6. Our full support, in every way possible, of the vital campaign for the two new colleges to be established in our Conference.

Also:

We commend the Board of Lay Activities for their growing use of our laymen, through the "No Silent Pulpits" period and in other programs, and we urge them to follow a program of training the laymen for Evangelism, offering our services to them wherever desired.

We commend to the pastors the Duke Foundation plan for Duke Divinity School students to work in the summer on pastoral charges desiring their services.

We recommend the reappointment of the Reverend Tommy Tyson as Conference Evangelist.

We recommend that our pastors give greater attention to the baptism of babies and their enrollment as preparatory members of the churches.

We recommend to our pastors the recommittal of the whole Congregation to the Membership Vows of the Church the first week in January, or as near thereto as possible. The idea is to plan this as an inspiring event for the first service of the New Year in each Local Church.

We recommend the issuance to all pastors of a Quarterly Newsheet or Brochure on Evangelism.

We recommend that the pastor and one or more of his laymen, wherever possible, attend the Methodist CONVOCATION on Local Church Evangelism to be held in Washington, D. C., July 3-6, 1958.

We recommend the following Regulations for a Conference Evangelist in the North Carolina Conference:

1. He shall devote the majority of his time to evangelistic work within the North Carolina Conference.
2. He is asked to preach for decisions for Christ and for enlistment in the membership of the Church.
3. He shall include in his Annual Report to the Board the number of persons won to Christ in his services and the number uniting with The Methodist Church.
4. Wherever he is to hold evangelistic services he shall have a conference with the pastor ahead of time to plan the details of the services.
5. No service or meeting is to be held in any church without the consent of the local Pastor and his Official Board.

This, of course, is in addition to the provisions of the discipline and of the General Board of Evangelism.

The report of the Society, as contained in the book of reports, was adopted.

A special committee, composed of the officers of the Society and Rev. W. L. Clegg and Rev. G. S. Eubank, was elected to confer with a similar committee from the Historical Society of the Western North Carolina Conference to give consideration to the publishing of Professor B. G. Childs' book, "History of North Carolina Methodism."

The Reverend Herman S. Winberry was advanced from first vice-president to president; the Reverend Dwight L. Fouts was advanced from second vice-president to first vice-president; the Reverend Leon Russell was advanced from third vice-president to second vice-president; and the Reverend J. Paul Edwards was elected third vice-president. The Reverend C. D. Barclift was re-elected secretary.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF HOSPITALS AND HOMES

I

Your Board of Hospitals and Homes is anxious that the work of our benevolent, charitable, and service organizations and institutions be ever kept before our people. We are grateful for the fine work being done through our Methodist Retirement Homes and our Methodist Home for Children. The Board wishes to express appreciation to The Reverend J. F. Coble, Superintendent of the Retirement Home, and The Reverend R. L. Nicks, Superintendent of the Children's Home, for their work and cooperation with the Board.

Through the Golden Cross Fund of our Conference, hospitalization has been made available for many needy persons. Expenditures for Golden Cross aid, however, have been exceeding by about \$10,000 the annual Golden Cross appropriation from the Conference of \$26,000. The Board of Hospitals and Homes asks, therefore, that the Conference consider an appropriation of \$36,000 to support the Golden Cross work.

The Board urges that a more uniform adherence to the rules of Golden Cross be followed by the pastors and district directors.

It is recommended that Dr. Russell L. Dicks be re-elected as Golden Cross Director for the Conference, and that the district superintendents appoint a district director for each district.

For the work of our Retirement Home it is recommended that the Conference appropriation be set at \$60,000 in order that adequate support be given its program, and that the Mother's Day offering be continued as a special for the Home.

It was heartening for our Board to hear the Administrator of Duke Hospital speak of the high value of the Conference Chaplain program now being carried out in the hospital. He termed it a very inspiring program the value of which could not be counted in terms of dollars and cents.

The Board, therefore, asks for continued support of the Conference Chaplain Program at Duke Hospital. The Reverend Paul Wesley Aitken, a member of this Conference, is now serving as Chaplain.

The Board appointed Dr. Earl W. Brian to be its representative on the Methodist Fund. This Fund represents the needs of the various Homes of our Conference.

Again this year the Board urges that all traveling preachers and approved supply pastors without hospital insurance give serious consideration to taking out group hospital insurance for themselves and their families through our Conference plan worked out with the Hospital Care Association, Inc., of Durham, N. C. Mr. M. S. McKibben, Sales Director for the Hospital Care Association, states that at present there are 276 ministers covered on the program. He further states that since the original group went into effect on October 1, 1955, dues received have amounted to \$42,315.77 and benefits have been paid in the amount of \$42,367.27. These figures include income and payments through December 31, 1957. Since January, February and March are always the highest cost months from a claims standpoint, it is almost a foregone conclusion that the benefits will always exceed the dues paid during those months.

Mr. McKibben reports further that those who are now covered on the Blue Cross program, as well as those who are interested in enrolling on the program, will be pleased to know that there will be no change in the rates or benefits in the next Conference year which begins July 1, 1958.

The Board asks that pastors, teachers, and other leaders place continued emphasis upon the opportunities available to our youth for vocational service in such fields as nursing, medicine, dietetics, and laboratory technicians.

II

The Board of Hospitals and Homes commends and pledges cooperation in the program recommended by the Commission on World Service and Finance and approved by the Conference for creating the Sustentation Fund for disabled ministers as authorized in paragraph 828 in the discipline.

We desire to express appreciation to the Conference Board of Pensions for providing the necessary funds for current needs.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

I

"The purpose of the Board of Lay Activities shall be to deepen the spiritual life of the lay members of the church and to cultivate among them an increasing loyalty and interest that they may become an active working force in each local church."—Paragraph 1490, DISCIPLINE, 1956.

In carrying out this purpose our Board has tried to work closely with the Bishop, the District Superintendents, and the ministers in promoting all phases of the church program.

There have been a few activities carried out particularly by the Board. The first during the year was attendance at the Second National Conference of Methodist Men at Purdue University, July 19-21. Forty laymen and one minister attended. We were honored in that five of our laymen had been selected to lead discussion groups.

Our Laymen's Retreat was held at Duke, August 17-18 and was one of the most successful and enthusiastic retreats that we have had. Five hundred laymen and ministers attended. Our speakers were Bishop Garber and Dr. Carl J. Sanders, Superintendent of the Richmond District. In line with the Quadrennial Emphasis on Strengthening the Local Church, discussion groups were held on matters of particular interest to laymen and their participation in local church activities.

Progress continues to be made in organizing Methodist Men's Clubs. This year 22 new clubs have been organized giving us a total of 251. It is our goal for each church to have a club. Recognizing that officers of clubs need guidance, a discussion group was held at Retreat for club officers. It will be continued this year and plans are being made for District Training Schools. Clubs are urged to elect officers in June to take office in September in order that officers might have the benefit of the training at Retreat before assuming direction of the club.

Laymen's Day on October 20th was observed by almost all churches. Our No Silent Pulpit program was again carried out with 1,200 Certified Lay Speakers, the largest number in any Conference in Methodism. More ministers are calling on Lay Speakers to fill their pulpits when they cannot be present from time to time throughout the year. It is hoped that the time will come when no pulpit will be silent on any Sunday in the year. District training sessions were held this year for the Lay Speakers and will be continued.

Dr. F. Olin Hunt of the National Board of Missions was our speaker for the District Lay Rallies held in February. He brought inspiring messages on Stewardship to 5,000 of our laymen. These rallies have become an institution of our Conference and are helping to make our laymen feel more keenly their responsibilities to the church.

A vivid example of this growing interest is the purchase of camp sites for new youth camps by the laymen. The Durham and Burlington Districts laymen have purchased for \$6,000 approximately 300 acres of land for a new camp—Chestnut Ridge. The Raleigh District men are in the process of providing \$5,000 for the initial development of Camp Kerr Lake. The Fayetteville District men have provided a 400 acre site costing \$8,000 for Camp Rockfish. These are no district camps but are being provided for the whole Conference.

Your Board of Lay Activities pledges its utmost efforts for the coming campaign for our colleges and places its members at the disposal of the leaders of the campaign. We shall likewise continue to work under the guidance of the clergy for the building of the Kingdom of God.

QUADRENNIAL COMMITTEE ON LOCAL CHURCH EMPHASIS

Theme: *“Christ and Our Mission”*

“You shall be my witnesses . . . to the end of the earth.” Acts 1:8

1. Your committee recommends that every pastor and every church cooperate with the Commission on Higher Education in its campaign for funds for the building of our colleges. We believe that a successful campaign conducted in all of our churches will not only provide funds for the building of our colleges, but will also strengthen the spiritual life of our people.

2. We recommend that all boards and commissions of our Conference devise and employ fresh measures for the Christian witness in every place where people live within the bounds of our Conference.
 - a. That a more dynamic program of evangelism be developed which includes an evangelistic emphasis applicable to this space age, one which employs new devices and techniques and which involves the total experience and concern of modern man.
 - b. We recommend that a greater emphasis be placed on personal evangelism.
 - c. That fresh measures be devised and employed to develop and train a stronger lay witness.
 - d. That more of our lay people be utilized in all our evangelistic efforts.
 - e. That a stronger evangelistic emphasis be incorporated in our program of Christian education, and that the training of a lay witness include church school workers.
 - f. We recommend that all of our pastors and our churches seek to eliminate barriers to Christian fellowship, that our Christian witness may be more effectively extended to low economic and social groups.
3. We recommend that our emphasis on church extension be continued.
 - a. That local churches organize outpost Sunday Schools and new congregations where needs are assured.
 - b. That local churches assist in providing physical plants and equipment for newly formed congregations.
 - c. That the Board of Education continue to cooperate with the Board of Missions in the organizing and training of church school workers in newly organized churches.
 - d. That the Woman's Society of Christian Service continue to assist in the organizing and training of the women in these newly formed congregations.
4. We recommend a continuing emphasis on participation in the Ten Dollar Club and mission specials—foreign, national, and conference.
5. We recommend that our Conference emphasize the importance of downtown churches. We believe that it is imperative for the church to have a strong Christian witness on main street and that a more adequate program must be developed for the changing city.
6. We recommend that the Board of Lay Activities continue to assist the district superintendents in developing a strong lay staff on the district level to assist the district superintendent in the successful promotion of the causes of Christ and His church; and that adequate funds be provided the district superintendent to carry out the ever-increasing work of his office.
7. We recommend the incorporation of the program for emphasis and expansion of the church school into the fourth year of the quadrennial local church emphasis.

"Be it resolved, that a newly appointed pastor is responsible for the service in his new appointment the first Sunday immediately after the Annual Conference adjourns."

3. It is recommended that a Conference Headquarters be established in the City of Raleigh on property offered by the Methodist Home for Children.

It is also recommended that the Annual Conference approve the following resolutions adopted by the Committee:

BE IT RESOLVED:

1. That the details of financing the conference headquarters be referred to the Commission on World Service and Finance and/or the Methodist Fund, Inc.
2. That a special committee be appointed by the Chairman of the Long Range Planning Committee and the Chairman of the Commission on World Service and Finance and that this Committee be charged with the following responsibilities:
 - a. To arrange with the Trustees of the Methodist Home for Children the exact and specific site for the Conference headquarters building.
 - b. To work out the details for site, arrangement and allocation of space in the headquarters building.
3. We recommend that title to conference headquarters be vested in the Conference Board of Trustees.

REPORT OF THE METHODIST HOME FOR CHILDREN, INC.

I

The Methodist Home for Children, Inc. has had a good year in many respects. Interest throughout the Conference has been manifested in a wholesome manner.

For the first time in the history of the Home, a case worker and secretary have been employed to carry on the social service program of the Home. Rendering service to the child and to the families in this particular manner is an added service of our Home. In this particular area, the need is urgent for a larger number of workers. Also, service should be rendered for boys and girls unsuitable for institutional or group care who come to us for help. It is hoped that in the near future, our Home may render boarding and foster home care, and be able to have our own program for adoption.

The Infirmary was our major project of our repair program. It was given a complete renovation including: new wiring, bathroom fixtures, water lines, walls replastered, downstairs floors covered with new tile, upstairs floors sanded and refinished, new equipment in the examining room, washer and dryer, new heating system, and some new furniture throughout the building. This has served us well during two flu epidemics this year. A new cafeteria rail was installed in the dining hall, which eliminated the girls having to miss so much of the school day. For the first time our girls enjoyed the lunch meal as the town boys and girls do. We now have on order new beds and mattresses for the McGee and Cole Cottages.

This fall our boys and girls from grades one through twelve will be going to school off our campus. Going to school the natural way as in any home—going off to school in the morning and coming back home in the afternoon. Grades one through six will attend the Myrtle Underwood School. Grades seven through nine will attend Hugh Morson School. Grades ten through twelve will attend Needham Broughton School.

Our staff has had the advantages of expert services in child care by Mr. Alton I. Brotten of the University of North Carolina and Miss Lena J. Martin, Director of Child Care of the National Board of Hospitals and Homes. Both persons conducted a week each in-service training for our personnel.

At the request of our own Board of Trustees and the Commission of World Service and Finance that the Bishop and his cabinet institute studies in the field of child welfare (through an impartial and independent committee) to determine:

- (a) Policy as to possible change in methods or emphasis in our work in the field and our future needs for plant.
- (b) The long range value of acquiring new land less central in location for development in a modern plant better adapted to present and future needs and
- (c) an additional study and long range plans looking to the development of the present campus for income purposes by use of Endowment Fund in commercial buildings—apartments or shopping center as need and trends may indicate.

I hope that a report concerning this study may be made in report No. 2.

It is hoped that as a result of this study our Home for Children may be better able to serve God and His Church by way of improved services for our children.

II

As superintendent of the Methodist Home for Children, I want to thank you for your continued support and confidence in me. I have a very difficult but challenging task and it is made much easier by knowing that I have your loyalty and trust.

I am very pleased to report that upon the request of the Commission on World Service and Finance and the Board of Trustees of the Home, we have been privileged to have had a very thorough and illuminating study made of the various aspects of the program of our Home.

We welcomed the three very fine experts in the field of child care on our campus and feel sure that their report will serve as a helpful guide for our use in continuing to improve the services to our children.

Those experts were: Miss Lena J. Martin of Chicago, Director of Child Welfare of our National Board of Hospitals and Homes, Mr. William I. Lacy of Lakeland, Florida, Consultant in Child Welfare of our National Board of Hospitals and Homes, and Dr. F. Reid Isaac, Executive Director, Board of Child Care, Baltimore, Maryland.

The following committee (who are members of the Board of Trustees of our Home) has been appointed to make a study of this report: The Reverend Leon Russell, Chairman, Mrs. E. Y. Speed, Mr. Guy Barnes, Mr. Walter Biggs, and Mrs. Charles Young. This committee has already met and divided the report into sections to be analyzed. They will report back to the Board for action to be taken.

It is our desire to keep you well informed as to what progress we feel can be made. It is my sincere belief that the children in our Home are beginning to accept their new "step father" and that they are really grateful for the care that we try to give with understanding and love.

We have had some very fine citizens who are products of our Home. This is our desire that all of the children who come to our Home may grasp a little of the love of Jesus that will carry them throughout all of life.

REPORT OF THE METHODIST RETIREMENT HOMES, INC.

I

The Methodist Retirement Home is one of the North Carolina Conference's finest efforts in its program of meeting the needs of people in the Master's name. The Home stands as a monument to those who accepted the need as a challenge and gave of their time, talents, and money to bring a dream into reality.

The Home opened two and a half years ago and was soon filled to capacity. In the membership are thirty-eight women and six men. Approximately one-third the membership are ministers, their wives, or widows. Ages of the members range from 65 to 92, with an average age of over 80. So universal is the need that every District in the Conference is represented by a minimum of two. There is a long waiting list with applications coming in weekly.

The Home is not a nursing home, but a retirement home. It does not accept nursing cases, although it does provide medical and nursing care for those who are members, and is prepared to keep them for life.

A minimum age of 65, a life of service to the church and community, and need for the services offered by the Home are the basic requirements for membership. Preference is given to Methodists within the bounds of the North Carolina Conference, though others may be admitted.

Because of this continuing and growing need, construction was begun in January of this year on an addition to The Home which will raise the capacity to 125. This new unit will be occupied by Conference 1959. News of new construction has brought an increase in applications for membership.

To make the new construction possible, the Home has secured a long term loan in the amount of \$600,000. This loan is for a maximum of forty years, but we hope to retire the indebtedness in twenty years or less. Though we now owe \$160,000 on the present building, we anticipate prior to the opening of the new building, that this will be reduced to \$60,000, and that the \$540,000 cost of the new building added to this will be covered by the loan.

To meet the immediate needs, along with construction of the new addition to the physical plant of the Home proper, a number of small apartments on The Home's grounds are to be completed this summer. These are a part of The Home's long-range plan, which calls for the eventual building of 50 cottages and an equal number of apartments.

Under the provision of such a plan, a couple may move into a cottage upon retirement, and there have a maximum of comfort and privacy, along with the service and security offered by The Home organization.

When closer companionship and more service are found desirable, the apartments grouped around the main building will provide this. If circumstances make infirm care necessary for husband or wife, the other will be able to move into the main building and thus be near the loved one and have security and care. Upon the passing of husband or wife, the other may move into the main building.

The North Carolina Conference has been most generous in its support of The Home, both through a part of the General Giving and as a Special Offering on Mother's Day. Other sources of income for The Home are special gifts, memorial and wills.

All the money that comes through the Home's part of the General Giving

ne churches will be applied to interest and the retiring of the indebtedness. That which comes as special gifts will go for furnishings, leaving the Mother's Day offering to be used for the benevolent work of The Home, that is, to pay the way of those who cannot pay for their keep.

An opportunity to serve the Home in a personal way is offered through the activities of the Home's Auxiliary. Information may be obtained by contacting Mrs. Carl Bunting, President, in care of the Home.

The Home is prepared to recognize as memorials, gifts such as contributions in lieu of flowers at the passing of a friend. The family is appropriately notified of such a gift. The furnishing of a room, or a substantial contribution for the naming of a building or any part of a building as a memorial will be recognized by an appropriate plaque.

Through the budget of our churches, a liberal Mother's Day offering, and gifts from interested persons, we can share with God and accept the challenge of Christ on the Cross, to look after His mother, by making available a Christian home for those who have given their lives in services to the church.

Manly Glenwood Mann

1889-1958

Outstanding among those who have brought the dream of a Retirement Home in The North Carolina Conference into reality is M. G. Mann, first President of the Board of Trustees. He was Chairman of the Board of Directors during the construction of the first unit. It was through his vision and under his leadership as President of the Board of Trustees that plans were made and finances secured for the present addition which is under construction. When the task of securing financial help seemed impossible to many, it was his wisdom and his belief that the needs must be met in the name of Christ, that persisted.

One of the District Superintendents expressed the feeling of the people of our Conference about the leadership of Mr. Mann when he said, "In the passing of Mr. M. G. Mann, our Home has lost a real and good friend. We are all grateful for his love and help in every way to the people of North Carolina and The Methodist Church."

**REPORT OF THE
METHODIST STUDENT CENTER**

Greenville, N. C.

Report I

The program for Methodist students at East Carolina College is carried on through the two Methodist Churches in Greenville. The Pastors are pastors to the students; they visit the Student Center, give leadership in worship and discussion, administer Holy Communion in the Little Chapel, and are available for counsel and help to both students and Director. The Pastors and Congregations of both Jarvis Memorial and St. James churches welcome the students into participation in the program of the Church and make available to them the facilities of their buildings. The Secretaries of Student Work of both Women's Societies cooperate in a fine spirit with the Director, assisting in every way possible with the program carried on through the Methodist Student Center, and enlisting the support of the women of the two churches through their service and gifts.

The aim of the Wesley Foundation this year has been to give our students a better understanding of the place of the student in The Methodist Church and to find and train the best possible leadership for our expanded program next year in our new and adequate building. Students have been encouraged to make pledges to the program of the Wesley Foundation and to pay these pledges regularly through the use of envelopes provided for them. Classes for students were held every Sunday in both Churches in the Sunday School. The Vesper program had as leaders the two Pastors, adult members of the Churches, the Superintendent of the New Bern District, pastors of other Churches in the Conference, and Faculty members from East Carolina College. Subjects for Vesper-Discussion: The Wesleys, The Methodist Church, The Mission of the Church, Relationship of the Student to the Church, The Mission of the Church, Sacraments of the Church, Personal Religion, Church-Related Vocations.

Lists of prospective students were given to both Pastors in the summer. Letters were sent to them from the Director and a program of the Churches and Wesley Foundation. Freshmen were visited in the dormitories and in town on their first

night on campus by members of the WF Council. Open House was held at the Student Center on Thursday night after registration, attendance one hundred. Buns and coffee, were served to Methodist students in the Y-Hut on Sunday morning; cars called to take students to St. James Sunday School and upper classmen welcomed them to the Class of Jarvis Memorial held at that time in the Y-Hut and accompanied them to Morning Worship in Austin Auditorium. (Held on campus because of Jarvis Memorial building program.) That evening a Buffet Supper was served at the Student Center to which all Methodists were invited—81 students were guests—Secretaries of Student Work of both Woman's Societies were hostesses and the Pastors were present. Immediately after supper Vesper was conducted in the Y-Hut, at which service the new WF Council was commissioned by the Rev. W. M. Howard, Jr., Pastor of Jarvis Memorial Church.

300 copies of POWER, gift of Jarvis Memorial Church, were distributed to Methodist students every quarter. Twenty-five students subscribed to MOTIVE through pledges of \$5.00 or more to the Wesley Foundation program. Students were members of Church Choirs in both churches, presented programs in Women's Societies and SS Classes.

The opportunities for service in Church-related vocations were given special emphasis throughout the year, through special vesper programs, showing slides and movie,—REPLY TO REALITY,—special report on Annual Meeting of Board of Missions and Woman's Division at Buck Hill Falls, which the Director attended as a guest; visits of Miss Sola Smee of the Personnel Department, Board of Missions, and Miss Charlotte Whitfield, a candidate for the Office of Deaconess, a former student at East Carolina and Wesley Foundation alumna.

Alpha Zeta Chapter of Wesley Players presented dramatic programs in the Church, in community organizations, on campus and over the campus Radio and TV. The outstanding production was A CHILD IS BORN, by Stephen Vincent Benet, in which thirteen students took part, and which was directed by two students. The students made costumes and props for this play, and these were later loaned to a Drama group of Trinity Methodist Church, Sumter, S. C. for their production of the same play and counsel and advice was given them by the Director and students of our Methodist Student Center. The Annual Initiation Banquet was held at Jarvis Memorial Fellowship Hall and both Pastors were special guests.

A special project of the Wesley Foundation was support of a Negro girl at Paine College for her Freshman year. All expenses were paid except for a work-scholarship from Paine and \$200.00 which the student contributed from a summer job. Clothing was given by our students and books purchased for her. This girl is a resident of Greenville, N. C., and a member of York M. E. Zion Church.

Small groups of students met at the Center for meditation and prayer on Wednesday and Thursday mornings. These meetings provided the Director with opportunity for group counseling and guidance. The Director also held 717 personal conferences with individual students.

All Methodist students were contacted by visits, letters, invitations, special issues of the student bulletin—WESLEYJ—weekly bulletins, all distributed in dorms and mailed to town students.

REPORT OF THE MINIMUM SALARY COMMISSION

I

The program of Minimum Salary assistance in the North Carolina conference has been widely recognized as one of the finest in Methodism. We have attained to a basic minimum salary which is reasonable minimum support level for the dedicated men serving the churches of our conference.

We would like to express our appreciation to the World Service and Finance Commission and to the Board of Missions for their cooperation in clarifying the use of funds to the end that now all funds designated for Minimum Salary shall be used for that purpose alone.

We are happy to report that we are still moving forward in this program of ministerial supplement for next year. We recommend that the salary be supported at the following minimum levels:

\$3,100 for a single minister serving full time.

\$3,400 for a married minister serving full time.

\$3,800 for a married minister with dependent children serving full time.

For student pastors we recommend that the salary be supported at the following minimum levels:

\$1,800 for a single minister serving as a student pastor.

\$2,000 for a married minister serving as a student pastor.

\$2,200 for a married minister with one dependent child serving as a student pastor.

\$2,400 for a married minister with two or more dependent children serving as a student pastor.

In addition to this support for student pastors, their salary shall be increased by an allowance relative to the distance of their charge from the school they attend. When the charge is within 25 miles of the school, it shall be increased by \$100.00. When the charge is between 25 and 50 miles from the school, it shall be increased by \$200.00; when the charge is beyond 50 miles and within 75 miles of the school, \$300.00; when the charge is beyond 75 miles and within 100 miles of the school \$400.00; and when the charge is beyond 100 miles, \$500.00 as a maximum increment.

Beyond this current plan, the preparatory work has been done to raise this figure for those ministers serving full time by approximately \$100.00 in each of the three basic categories during each of the two succeeding years until we reach a basic minimum salary support approximately \$4,000 for a married man with dependent children serving full time during the conference year 1960.

In order to achieve this goal, we encourage the wholehearted support of each pastoral charge now receiving minimum salary support to raise the level of ministerial support by the church or churches now served. As this support increases, more funds will be freed to raise the general level of salaries. Unless this general promotion is followed, the goal cannot as readily be reached as now planned.

We wish to commend the work of our District Superintendents who have assisted in making possible this advance. We encourage them to continue this progress which has meant so much to our entire conference. We earnestly expect that the principles shall be studied and followed carefully by each charge. Particular attention should be given to the portions which regulate the division of charges.

We wish to express our appreciation to the Duke Endowment and to Dr. A. J. Walton, its administrator at the Duke Divinity School. Their assistance and their gifts have made possible this continued advance in Minimum Salary support. Our entire Conference owes to this fine agency a deep debt of gratitude.

II

PRINCIPLES GOVERNING THE USE OF MINIMUM SALARY FUNDS

The commission recognizes the principles, that, with the aid of the pastor and the District Superintendent, it should so administer its affairs that each charge shall move as rapidly as possible to full self-support.

To enable the Conference, the commission, and the superintendents to carry on their cooperative efforts in understanding, harmony, and for the greatest good for all concerned the following principles and procedures are set forth:

Aid to Charges

1. All requests for mission aid to charges on pastor's salary shall be presented to the Commission Secretary (Rev. Thomas A. Collins, 920 Lake Boone Trail, Raleigh, North Carolina) by the District Superintendent before June 1, of each conference year. Requests submitted later will not give the Commission time to make the needed study and adjustments. Therefore, requests submitted later than June 1 will not be considered.

2. Minimum Salary aid provided by the Conference shall not be used to raise the salary above the minimum set by the Conference.

3. The family or marital status of the pastor at the time of assignment to the charge shall govern the amount paid the minister for the entire conference year.

4. Mission funds, or Minimum Salary funds, shall not be used to increase a retired minister's total income beyond \$3,800.00. By total income is meant retirement annuity, the salary paid by the charge, and mission or minimum salary allowances.

5. Owing to the pressure upon Minimum Salary funds we emphasize the necessity of staying within minimum salary when requesting funds for ministerial support.

6. In considering the salary for a charge, we call attention to the fact that the Commission on Minimum Salary must count both salary, travel, and expenses as salary in making appropriations to the charge.

Dividing Charges

7. The Commission on Minimum Salary and the Cabinet, in considering aid when a charge is to be divided are bound by the action of the Annual Conference in session at Burlington, North Carolina, October 1952, as recorded in the Conference Journal, pages 148 and 149.

a. There should be a conference-wide policy and strategy, adopted by the Bishop and his cabinet after careful study for the division of circuits and the formation of new charges.

b. A process of education, spiritual, psychological and financial, should precede the division of circuits. This is important if a new charge is to understand and accept intelligently the adjustments and the larger responsibility involved in the new status. Frequently the charge is im-

pressed only with the privileges of its proposed new status, but the responsibilities are equally as real.

- c. The churches forming a new charge should be, when possible, a sociological and geographical unit. Such factors as marketing centers, school districts, and county lines should be taken into account and given due consideration.
- d. Generally speaking, small town and open country churches, even though having as many as 200-300 members, should be encouraged to become two point charges rather than one point stations.
 - (1) This is fairer to the many churches which are still on four-five-six point charges.
 - (2) It is a wiser use of our ministers, as few small town and open country churches will need, accept, or demand a preaching schedule and the other programs of activity which justify the full services of a full time minister.
- e. Divisions of circuits should be on the basis of mutual agreement by all the churches on the circuit rather than simply from the desire of the larger church to withdraw for its own benefit and advancement.
- f. If a new charge is to be served by a student pastor, that fact should be given the charge before it agrees to its new status.
- g. The Disciplinary provision for equity in the existing parsonage, the location of the new parsonage, and other forces should be fully discussed and agreed upon by the charge involved prior to the division.
- h. The following fundamental and basic questions should be discussed and clearly understood by the churches contemplating the formation of a new charge:
 - (1) Is there a real need for this new charge, or is the desire for its creation prompted primarily from a spirit of keeping up, or surpassing another denomination?
 - (2) What are the prospects for numerical growth in the new charge? Is this estimate of growth based on a religious census or on a guess?
 - (3) Can the new charge become self-supporting within a reasonable length of time? Will it now assume, or assume within a reasonable period of time, a budget that will provide not only for the pastor's support but also for the support of Methodism's connectional causes, including World Service?
 - (4) Does the new charge have a suitable parsonage for the minister, or will it provide one before a minister is appointed to it?
8. When the division of a charge is considered necessary and minimum salary, or mission aid, is to be requested for either of the new charges resulting from such division, such project shall be presented to the secretary of the Commission on Minimum Salary on or before June 1st, so that a thorough study of the proposed division can be made. This study shall be made in cooperation with the District Superintendent, the Commission on Minimum Salary, and a representative from each of the proposed new charges. Without such study the Commission shall not be obligated to provide aid for either of the charges resulting from such division.
9. The Commission will not approve the division of a charge except and unless each new charge resulting from the division shall provide 80% of the

minimum salary for the pastor to be assigned to said charge.

- a. Where circuits are divided, any churches involved in the division that must receive minimum salary may, upon the consent of the district superintendent, pay their proportionate share of the former items based on pastoral support, plus an additional 20% of this amount. This shall be increased by at least 20% of the original base annually until they achieve the then current base of established charges, in a period not to exceed four years.

To Avoid Crippling charges

10. In the division of circuits where one church seeks to become a station, the Commission on Minimum Salary looks with disfavor upon such division unless the station established can care for its salary and its proportionate share of the World Service and Benevolences, and that the remainder of the charge can be provided with ministerial leadership and adjusted and arranged so that it has opportunity to grow to self-support.

Reduction of Aid

11. The Commission on Minimum Salary further requires that each charge which has received, or shall hereafter receive, sustentation or Minimum Salary aid shall have this aid reduced by 25% each year until the charge has accepted full self-support. The district superintendents are to inform all charges receiving or to receive aid in the future, of this regulation. This requirement must be kept in mind in preparing for any requests.

- a. When a charge is established as a student appointment and desires to be served by a full time minister, this change may take place at such time as the charge shall pay 80% of the amount needed to provide such full-time ministerial support.

A New Church As A Charge

12. When a new church is to be established and become a new charge, the district superintendent shall present for study the complete details of the proposed project on or before June 1st. These details shall be presented to the General Board of Missions, the Conference Board of Missions, and to the Commission on Minimum Salary. All shall carefully evaluate the project, and if it seems worthy and a timely project, the Board shall see that an adequate salary and living quarters are provided for the minister and the essential steps taken to provide a place to meet and worship. It shall be understood that each year the new charge shall accept more of the budget till it becomes self-supporting. We recommend that each new church shall become self-supporting in a period of five years or less.

Student Pastor Aid

13. The following was set up as a basis for aiding students when they are assigned charges where mission aid, or salary supplement is required. Mission aid, or minimum salary aid, can be used to provide a salary of \$1,800 for a single minister, and for a married student pastor, \$2,000. A \$200 allowance will be granted for one dependent child in the family and \$400 will be granted for more than one dependent child. In addition, there is to be a travel allowance as follows: when the charge is within 25 miles of the school attended, \$100; when the charge is beyond 25 miles and within 50 miles of the school, \$200; when the charge is beyond 50 miles and within 75 miles of the school, \$300; when the charge is beyond 75 miles and within 100 miles of the school, \$400; and when the charge is beyond 100 miles, \$500.

Wherever possible, when a student pastor is graduated at mid-term in January, we recommend that he shall be recompensed at the rate of a full time pastor for the remainder of the conference year. This shall be done for each pastor unless there is too wide a discrepancy between the amount his church is paying as a student pastorate and full time Minimum Salary supplement. Full time minimum salary support cannot be given where the charge is and must clearly remain a student appointment because of the limited nature of its pastoral support. We hope this will be borne in mind before the appointment is made of a man who will be a student pastor for only half of a conference year.

"Louisburg Student" amendment to this paragraph

An approved supply pastor who is serving an appointment, who has less than two years college work to his credit, and who wishes to continue his education, shall be considered a special case. Each case will be handled on its own merits. The district superintendent shall present these special cases to the Commission on Minimum Salary. When these cases have been approved by the Commission, sustentation aid may be granted, not to exceed the regular minimum salary scale, rather than according to the student pastor's scale. These special cases shall be presented to the Commission on Minimum Salary by the district superintendent in ample time for action before the students' matriculation in school.

Beginning with the Conference year 1957-58, the only students, who shall qualify under this rule must attend Louisburg College. However, when any hardships occur due to unusual distance to travel, special consideration may be given to attend another school after the superintendent has conferred with the Commission on Minimum Salary. Those now attending another college and previously approved under this provision, may complete their two years of work at the school in which they are presently enrolled. If a change is to take place in their college, they must complete their work at Louisburg College.

It is further decreed that such a student may be approved for a maximum of three conference years to complete the two years of academic work at Louisburg College. This should be enough to encourage completion of their work.

All Applications for Aid

14. In making application for aid, each charge shall report accurately all amounts paid by the charge or by individuals of the charge as salary, travel expenses or bonuses. Failure to do so shall be considered sufficient cause to reject the application or discontinue payments if such failure is discovered after approval of applications.

15. These amounts fixed as the minimum salary allowances in all categories listed shall apply to all ministers serving charges provided each one is a conference member or an approved supply. If one shall not be an approved supply, he shall be considered as a special case, and the minimum salary rules do not of necessity apply. After consultation before such an appointment, such a minister may be approved for the appropriate minimum salary sum if in the judgment of the Commission on Minimum Salary it is a meritorious and necessary appointment.

16. The current minimum salary scale for full time ministers will be \$3,100.00 for single ministers, \$3,400.00 for married ministers without dependent children; and \$3,800.00 for married ministers with dependent children serving full time.

a. This shall be the minimum salary scale provided the charge follows the principles governing the use of Minimum Salary Funds.

These provisions are herein set forth to aid the district superintendents, the

Conference Board of Missions, and the Minimum Salary Commission in making adequate distribution of funds to stimulate and encourage churches to give needed help to ministers assigned to opportunity charges, and to enlist churches and pastors in sharing in the obligation to care for our rapidly growing population.

RESOLUTION NO. 1: Concerning Approved Supply Pastors and Local Preachers

Whereas numerous complaints have reached the Board of Ministerial Training and Qualification concerning the training of some men who have been recommended by the North Carolina Annual Conference and sent to minister to Methodist congregations:

Whereas (in spite of our knowledge that some unlettered men have wrought wonders for the Kingdom of God); yet, in a day of advancing education and training we are acutely aware of the intellectual and emotional needs of the Methodist minister.

We, therefore, present this resolution setting forth what we consider to be some minimum requirements:

First, we recommend that ordinarily no person be given an Approved Supply status who is over forty years of age;

Second, we recommend that no man without a High School diploma, or its equivalent, be recommended for Approved Supply status;

Third, we suggest to District Committees on Ministerial Qualification that no person without a High School diploma be given local preacher's license.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MISSIONS

I

The "Call to Witness and Decision" issued by the Board of Missions of The Methodist Church has been heard with crystal clearness in North Carolina.

The Conference Board of Missions has shared this Call to Witness and Decision through emphasis upon the four lanes of service of The Methodist Mission program.

The missionary seminars sponsored by the Board of Missions were conducted in each district during the month of January 1958. The ten district seminars drew an attendance of more than 2500 persons.

Under the leadership of our Conference Missionary Secretary, Rev. M. W. Lawrence, our speakers at these Missionary Institutes set before us these challenges. Miss Elizabeth Lee reminded our conference of the significance of the program of The Methodist Committee for Overseas Relief. She told of the urgent needs throughout our world for emergency gifts in lands of critical decision. Our area and Methodism in the gifts for the Christmas Offering for Hungarian Relief a year previously, and many of our churches have responded with special gifts for I.C.O.R

The World Mission program of our church was highlighted by the messages of Rev. Linwood Blackburn and Rev. Ed Smith. These young men had gone to Africa as missionaries from our conference. They shared with us the needs for Christ in our world, and numerous world mission specials have been added to our budget as a consequence of their witness.

The Rev. Mr. Lawrence reminded us of the needs in the area of National Missions. Our conference was vitally interested in the work of Missions in Puerto Rico with a special emphasis given to the work of one of our missionary families, Rev. and Mrs. William Garrard of the Vieques Mission. This Mission was accepted as one of our Mission Specials during the current quadrennium.

Also, under the leadership of the Division of National Missions, the cause of a new Alaska Christian College was promoted. We urge each local church to place in its budget a continuing special gift on behalf of the new Alaska Christian College.

Dr. H. L. Johns and the Rev. Thomas A. Collins continued to emphasize the fourth lane of service—the witness in the area of Church Extension.

We wish to commend our Conference Missionary Secretary, the Rev. M. W. Lawrence, for the fine work he is doing in the promotion of our mission program. We add to this our appreciation for the fine work of the District Missionary Secretaries: Rev. Robert Wallace, Rev. Kenneth Sexton, Rev. Chester Andrews, Rev. W. R. Stevens, Rev. L. C. Vereen, Rev. R. L. Crossno, Rev. R. E. L. Moser, Rev. R. L. Jerome, and Rev. J. T. Maides.

Our conference has benefited annually by the excellent training afforded by the Southeastern Missionary Conference at Lake Junaluska each July. This year we had a 100% sharing in this conference from our conference officers and our District Missionary Secretaries.

For nine years our conference has sponsored a Caravan of Methodist Youth to Europe to further cooperation and understanding among our Methodist churches and friends. This work has made possible a growing and virile church in Austria and other areas visited. This year Rev. and Mrs. James Auman are leading the European Caravan. At this time they are in Europe working with our Methodist churches and youth groups in Switzerland, Austria, Italy, Germany and England. We commend this fine program and recommend that it be continued.

The Woman's Society of Christian Service has done and continues to do an excellent work in the field of Missions. We commend them to each pastor and charge. We urge cooperation to the end that a Woman's Society be established in each local church within the bounds of our conference.

In order that the people may be well informed of the cause of Missions, we encourage the circulation of World Outlook. We are encouraged by the way many of our people are putting into operation the Commission on Missions in the local church. We encourage each Commission to inform the people of the Mission program; to plan an annual School of Missions; to promote the cause of World Service and the benevolent program of the church; to secure Mission specials; and to aid in the recruiting of full time Christian Workers.

There is an excellent film strip prepared showing the work of the Commission on Missions. This may be secured from the District Missionary Secretary or from the conference Audio-Visual Library. We recommend that this be shown annually to the local church commission or even the entire church membership.

The work of Church Extension continues to be one of the highlights of the Mission program of our conference. The continued expansion of our state has called for careful planning to achieve a sustaining program of church extension to keep pace with our growing responsibility.

During this quadrennium, we have set as our goal one new Methodist church a month. Thus far in this conference year 11 have been established and organized. We believe that yet others will be established with appointments at Annual Conference.

The new churches this year are: Bethesda Methodist Church near Durham, Wellons Village Methodist Church of Durham, Amity Methodist Church of North Chapel Hill, Nags Head summer congregation of the Nags Head beach community, Jefferson Methodist Church, Goldsboro, New Hope Methodist Church near Goldsboro, Selma Chapel Methodist Church in Selma, Yaupon Village Methodist Church between Southport and Long Beach, Oleander Methodist Church of Wilmington, Riegelwood Methodist Church of Riegelwood-Acme, and Castle Haynes Methodist Church of Wrightsboro.

We wish to thank the many faithful ministers and laymen who have made our Ten Dollar Club the finest in Methodism. The gifts to the Ten Dollar Club have given the incentive to more than fifty new Methodist congregations—27 first permanent units have been built with gifts by members of the Ten Dollar Club and 27 new congregations await continued gifts to make possible their first unit.

Church Extension is also promoted as large circuits are divided to better provide ministerial leadership for each resultant charge. This necessitates new parsonages to make these charges as strong as possible. During this year the Board of Missions has assisted in the construction of 26 new parsonages. Four of these parsonages were for new churches and the remainder for established charges or newly divided charges. More than \$22,000.00 has been contributed to make these new homes possible.

Thirty-four churches have been assisted by the Board of Missions in building programs this conference year in addition to gifts from the Ten Dollar Club. Some have added church school facilities; enlarged present plants or have begun new buildings. More than \$38,000.00 has been donated to make possible this expansion that our established churches may better serve their community and their membership.

We encourage our pastors to support and expand the Ten Dollar Club in their local churches. The membership may be expanded through the agency of a Ten Dollar Club committee in the Commission on Missions. Sunday School classes, Circles, Men's groups as well as individual members of the church can be won to the support of this thrilling venture if we but share the good news and offer them the opportunity to share in this program.

A slide series entitled "The Story of Church Extension" has been prepared by our Executive Secretary, the Rev. Thomas A. Collins. This has been revised and expanded to show in color slides this thrilling story. This film is available through our District Missionary Secretaries, our Executive Secretary or our conference Film Library. We recommend that it be shown one or more times in each church in our conference during the new year.

To further the promotion of the Ten Dollar Club, we have named Sunday, January 18, 1959, as Church Extension Sunday. We solicit the earnest support of each pastor in the conference to promote membership in and knowledge of the Ten Dollar Club.

Even though our conference has attained an enviable position in the conferences of American Methodism in the amount of Mission Specials, we must maintain and increase the number and amount of these. The Board of Missions approves as Mission Specials the following: All new Methodist Churches organized since 1952, including the parsonages of these churches; the purchase of a site for a proposed

church; the Ten Dollar Club; tuition scholarships for directors of Christian Education; the Methodist Student Center at East Carolina College; the Alaska Methodist College; the Bethany Mission of the Shiloh Charge, Rocky Mount District; the work of all our Missionaries in other lands; the Caravan Methodist Church of Linz, Austria; the work of Methodism in the European Area; the Lands of Decision (Belgian Congo, Bolivia, Korea and Sarawak in Borneo); Soo Chow University in Hong Kong; Sunset Park Methodist Church; the foreign student aid fund to assist these students in studying in Methodist Colleges in North Carolina; the Wesley Foundation, N. C. College; John Wesley Methodist Church (C.J.) of Fayetteville; Galilee Methodist Church (C.J.); the Vieques Mission of Puerto Rico, and the mission work in the area served by Bishop Barbierrri in Argentina and Uraquay in South America.

The members of the Board of Managers of the North Carolina Pastors' School at Duke University elected by the Board of Missions are: Mrs. J. H. Cutchin and Rev. L. C. Vereen, terms to expire in 1959; Rev. S. J. Starnes and Rev. A. S. Parker, terms to expire in 1961; Mr. G. P. Hood and the Rev. J. W. Lineberger with terms to expire in 1963.

We recommend that the North Carolina Annual Conference of The Methodist Church, SEJ, at its annual meeting in Wilson, North Carolina, June of 1958, approve the consolidation of the Conference Committee on Church Extension Research Planning and Survey with the Board of Missions. We further recommend that all present members of the Conference Church Extension Research Planning and Survey Committee become members of the Board of Missions except as they are members of another major Board or Commission of the Conference. We further recommend that this Committee become a standing committee of the Board of Missions amendable to said Board and that its chairman retain his leadership in this area under the guidance of the Board of Missions.

We further recommend that all assets and funds of the Conference Church Extension Research Planning and Survey Committee be transferred to the Board of Missions to continue the Survey program begun by this committee. For this purpose we designate all funds currently assigned to this committee and funds budgeted for receipt in the new conference year according to the budget of the World Service and Finance Commission as previously approved.

We wish to express the deep gratitude of the Board of Missions of the North Carolina Annual Conference to the Duke Endowment for its long and valuable aid given to the Board of Missions, to the work of Church Extension in our conference, and to the assistance given through Minimum Salary supplement within our conference. The directors have cooperated in every way possible in the efficient administration of the important work of our conference. We particularly commend the excellent work of Dr. A. J. Walton, Administrator at Duke Divinity School.

We wish to express our appreciation to each pastor who has cooperated in the program of Missions within and beyond the bounds of our conference. With our gratitude, we encourage their continued support and expansion of this program.

II

The Board of Missions, North Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction of The Methodist Church, Incorporated was chartered by the North Carolina Conference for the purpose of furthering the work of church extension within the bounds of this conference.

We are happy to report that on the loan of \$100,000.00 approved June of 1956, we have made repayment of \$40,000.00 and plan to make a third such payment in July of 1958 plus interest to date.

The money from this loan has made possible the purchase of 31 sites for our new churches. Some of these have been repaid. The cost of others will be repaid to the Board of Missions, Incorporated after the establishment of a new congregation or the construction of a first unit of their permanent church. In addition, seven celox buildings have been purchased that are being used as temporary organizational quarters for these new churches.

This \$100,000.00 sum then will constitute a revolving loan fund for church extension within our conference. We should like to report that this sum has grown until at the present time the principal sum of this loan is now in excess of 120,000.00.

As this grows, our ability to grow as a conference is increased. We solicit the cooperation of the Conference to the end that this agency of service be supported and expanded.

REPORT OF THE NORTH CAROLINA PASTORS' SCHOOL

(Board of Managers)

Since the days of World War I Methodist pastors have assembled each June on the campus of Duke University in Durham to enjoy a variety of profitable activities, including study, worship, relaxation and rest. In the early days the school operated for a period of two weeks, and in addition to the preaching services and public lectures, it offered courses for "credit" under the Methodist Board of Education. Ministers taking the conference course of study were required to attend. In a later period, after the length was reduced to one week, the Pastors' School met simultaneously with the Rural Life Institute and the Institute of International Relations, with joint worship, preaching services, and special lectures. In recent years the Pastors' School has been combined with the Christian Convocation, a program sponsored by the Duke Divinity School, featuring the James A. Gray lectures and the Convocation preaching services, and the length of the school has been reduced to four days. Throughout the entire period of more than forty years the relationship of the Pastors' School to all the related enterprises has been cordial, and the programs of the separate groups have been strengthened because of the combination of thought in planning and promotion. It has been repeatedly observed that almost all the leading personalities in Protestant Christianity for four decades, representing America, Great Britain, and other parts of the world, have appeared on the program of the North Carolina Pastors' School.

Vitality and Relevance

Year by year the several courses and lectures have reflected the theological atmosphere, the ecclesiastical and sociological issues, and major concerns of the church. Those ministers who have attended regularly have found the school a warehouse of fresh information in the traditional disciplines and source of reliable data concerning the pioneer movements of our times. As evidence of the vitality of the school and the relevance of its program, one could point to the discussions and debates that have followed many annual sessions and to numerous sermons that were stimulated by some course or lecture.

Fringe Benefits

The extracurricular activities of the school have always been appealing. Through the courtesy of the Methodist Publishing House a display of books, church equipment, pulpit robes, and a variety of supplies annually provides the setting for conversation and note-taking regarding the "latest and best." In dormitory and around the campus tall stories are repeated at all hours of the day and night. Sports of many kinds are enjoyed, including golf, tennis, swimming, horseshoes and croquet. In one period of several years croquet was regarded as the major sport of the Pastors' School and the sound of mallet against ball was heard throughout each day, beginning at the earliest appearance of dawn.

It has been traditional that important committees and boards have regularly met during the sessions of the Pastors' School, and some of the actions of both annual conferences in North Carolina have had their origin in a discussion in some classroom at Duke. Several bishops have held cabinet meetings and have even discussed pastoral appointments and made plans for their annual conferences.

Attendance

The round figures of five hundred has appeared regularly in the reports of attendance, but the number climbed above six hundred a number of times. In a few lean years the number dropped to about three hundred. Prior to 1956 the North Carolina Conference always enrolled more than the Western North Carolina Conference. In the past two years the latter Conference has led in attendance. Also, in the past two years a larger number of pastors have come from the neighboring states of Virginia and South Carolina.

Administration

The affairs of the school have been in the care of a Board of Managers, elected by the two Conferences in North Carolina, upon nomination by the Boards of Education and Missions. Three men have served as directors of the school, H. E. Spence, J. M. Ormond, and W. A. Kale.

Change of Date

The summer of 1958 will likely be a date to remember in coming years. It will indicate the first time the school has been attempted in mid-summer. Since the annual conferences are now scheduled for the month of June, it is not possible for the Pastors' School to be scheduled at the traditional time. Instead, the date of August 4-7 has been selected. Opinions are divided as to the likely number who can and will attend at that time. The Board of Managers and the Director have made careful plans in the expectation that at least five hundred pastors and others will enroll. The challenge of Christ comes to us in this generation, and the Church, as God's agency, must teach the gospel of Christ where ever people are found to be living. The command of Christ, "Go into all the world", rings with greater urgency than ever before. We have no alternative but to obey this command and hasten to every nation, lest we are too late to save the millions that are suffering in ignorance of God's love and purposes.

3. We believe that the cause of war may be found in these conditions:

1. The intense interest on the part of every nation in the matter of national defense, which results in an expensive race on the part of each nation to re-arm with the newest and most destructive weapons.
2. The fact that more people live in huts of mud and straw than in any other kind of shelter.
3. The fact that more people travel on their own two feet than on all the mechanized means of transportation.
4. The fact that more people have a life expectancy of under 30 years than over 30 years of age.
5. The fact that more mothers watch their children die in infancy than see their children reach mature years.
6. The fact that more people do not know what it means to vote than there are people who have cast a single ballot.
7. The fact that more people live with out medical aid than there are people who know the attention of Doctor or Nurse.
8. The fact that more people are hungry, ill-clad and poorly housed, than in 1900, and tomorrow the story will be worse.
9. The fact that many nations interpret the military expansion of the United States and Russia to mean that both nations are seeking to dominate all nations in the future.

4. The United States, more so than any other nation, is in a position to give moral, spiritual, economic, and technical assistance, to all the world. We must grasp this opportunity.

1. We must first set our own house in order. There should be a constant appeal from every Church and Pulpit, from every School and Teacher, from Leaders of Government, from leaders in business, finance, farming, and the professions, that the people in our nation turn to God with sincere repentance.
2. Our markets of food and clothing must be available to all the nations on earth. This nation must become "the bread basket" and "the clothing closet" of the world. We must manufacture and grow until every person has sufficient food and clothing.
3. Our knowledge, skills, and Way of Life, must be made known in all nations as rapidly as possible.
4. We can rest assured, that, if we do not place more emphasis upon spiritual regeneration and improved moral conduct at home and abroad, if we do not use our resources to aid those who are suffering and, if we

are not willing to accelerate our efforts to build God's Kingdom, God will hold us accountable:—we will be “weighed in the balances and found wanting”, and our God-given prosperity will be destroyed in the folly of sin, to our destruction and eternal punishment.

5. We offer these suggestions:

1. That our Church and Nation join with Dr. Linus Pauling, and 9,000 scientists from 42 nations, in petitioning The United Nations to use its influence to stop nuclear tests, and, regardless of what others may do, that our nation will discontinue the tests.
2. That our Church join in, and give wide publicity to the celebrating of the tenth anniversary of the signing of The Universal Declaration of Human Rights on December 10, 1958.
3. That the Congress of The United States **not** renew the act providing for the drafting of men for military service which expires in July 1959, and the military depend upon voluntary enlistments rather than conscription.
4. That our Government urge the unification of Korea by elections under the United Nations, the neutralization of Formosa, and representation of mainland China in the United Nations.
5. That a middle east Development Authority be established by the United Nations to arbitrate all disputes that arise in that area.
6. That our Government support a plan for the unification of Germany.
7. That the agreement between the United States and the Russian Government for an expanded program of exchange of scientists, teachers, students, athletes, and artists, be wholeheartedly supported by the Church.
8. That The Methodist Church, through the Board of World Peace, open and maintain an office and full-time staff of workers in Russia.
9. That our ministers continue to preach on the subject of World Peace as often as possible.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON PROMOTION AND CULTIVATION

The members of the Commission on Promotion and Cultivation wish to express our gratitude to every agency of the church for the privilege of sharing with them in the work of the Methodist Church.

We rejoice in the progress made in the financial cultivation of World Service, Advance Specials, Week of Dedication, Fellowship of Suffering and Service, The Television Ministry, Special Days, The Quadrennial Program for Educational Institutions, and the Interdenominational Fund.

We wish to commend Mr. Marvin J. Cowell, Conference Treasurer, for the preparation of "What Every Methodist Should Know About The Financial Program of the Annual Conference". We wish to thank the Commission of World Service and Finance for the production and distribution of over 105,000 copies to our people.

There is a need for help in the cultivation of the Benevolences of our Conference. We will undertake to furnish materials that will help our people to understand and support the great causes of our Church.

We share with the Television Ministry the great opportunity of presenting "Talk Back", a new television series of 13 programs. Each of the programs will use a film and a "Live" presentation from the TV studio to relate the Christian Faith to the problems of daily living.

We feel that every Methodist Church should observe every "Special Day" with the use of cultivation materials and the taking of an offering to be used to strengthen these special causes of the Church. To this end we hope to provide help to our pastors and people.

We report the growing use of the Fourth Sunday leaflets. Two million copies monthly are now required in comparison with one-third that number two years ago. We urge our pastors to use these materials for the cultivation of our people.

"The Methodist Story" our publication for the guidance of the leaders of the local church are made available at the rate of nine per church. Again, we urge our pastors to see that these are being received and used in the local church.

We join with the Commission on Christian Higher Education in the campaign for five million dollars and pray that we may be equal to the opportunity of providing for the future of young men and women of Eastern North Carolina.

REPORT OF THE METHODIST BOARD OF PUBLICATION

The past year has been a difficult one for the **North Carolina Christian Advocate**. In spite of a reduction in editorial expenses, we have had to spend more money for salaries in the printing plant, and other expenses have increased to an all-time high. The cost of publishing the **Advocate** has always exceeded the subscription income. This year, because of the special price of \$1.50 which has been charged for Every-Family subscriptions, we have lost approximately \$20,000 in subscription revenue.

Despite the difficulties of the situation this year, we believe that next year will be much better. The new price of \$2.00 for the Every-Family plan will not pay all the cost, but the fifty cents gained will help. Many churches which have been on the plan have now discontinued it, with the result that our subscription list has dropped to the lowest point in some years, but shows signs of rising again. We would lose less money with a smaller subscription list, but we do not believe we should be content to reach only a very small percentage of our people with the Church paper.

We believe the solution to our problem now lies in the hands of the pastors and superintendents. During the past year very few pastors have put on an **Advocate** campaign. Many have not sent in a single subscription. If we are to serve the Conference, we must have the cooperation of all our friends. We realize that this has been a terrifically busy year, with special campaigns and offerings. But these campaigns depend upon the **Advocate** for publicity, and this it cannot give unless the paper is widely circulated.

We make these specific recommendations: First, that the district superintendents help us to put on the subscription campaign next year by promoting the **Advocate** in their districts. Second, that January be set aside as **Advocate** month in the North Carolina Conference, when each pastor will present the cause of the church paper and receive subscriptions. Third, that each district accept quotas based upon ten percent of the membership, and that pastors be asked to report to the district superintendent when they have reached their quotas.

The **Advocate** can continue to put out a paper each week for the benefit of the loyal subscribers who each year renew their subscriptions without urging. It can cut its expenses to fit its pocket, and continue to survive with a small and select subscription list, as it has done for many years. But we do not believe that the Methodists of North Carolina want to have it said that they are behind all other sections of the church in their interest and support of the church paper.

The **North Carolina Christian Advocate** has an honored history of 103 years of service. It has had many bad times and has often come near to defeat, but it has survived without the aid of subsidies or other financial assistance. It is the only Church paper in the nation which has such a record.

We do not ask for a subsidy; we expect to make our own way financially. But whether we continue on a minimum basis, or do the job which you would like us to do, depends upon the support which is given our subscription campaign next year. If we are to promote the causes of the Church, push the College campaign, inform our people about the news of Methodism, and offer interesting and religious reading matter for our people, the Conferences will have to give us their hearty support.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF SOCIAL AND ECONOMIC RELATIONS

I

The Methodist Church has always been vitally interested in the moral and social needs of the people to whom it has ministered. In this period with such strong pressures that all people are undergoing, our church needs to be able to give some of its best council. Within the North Carolina Conference, our ministers and laymen need to develop a deeper concern regarding the social and economic relations of our people. We need more active programs in these areas of concern.

Your Board of Social and Economic Relations recommends the following program of action for 1958-1959:

1. That we request the district superintendents to call for the organization of a Commission on Christian Social Relations as provided for in paragraphs 144, 176.4, 219, 276 at their first round of quarterly conference;
2. That all chairmen of the commission in local churches be urged to report to the quarterly conferences on the new official form (Form QC-71) which has been prepared for this purpose;
3. That a section be provided in the district schools of instruction for commission members for the training of the members of our new commission—The Commission on Christian Social Relations;
4. That courses related to the social concerns be included in Christian Worker's Schools whenever possible;
5. That our pastors be urged to give strong pronouncements on all matters of social concern in their ministry to the people in their local communities.
6. That attention be directed to Paragraph 2026.4 of the 1956 **Discipline**.
"That bishops, district superintendents, pastors, and lay leaders seek

new ways for the implementation of better fraternal relations between the Central Jurisdiction and other jurisdictions where they are adjacent, by closer co-operation at Annual and District Conferences, and at local church levels."

Therefore, we urge our District Superintendents in the North Carolina Conference to obtain, where possible, a fraternal delegate from a Central Jurisdiction church within the geographical bounds of their districts, to bring a brief message of brotherly greetings from the churches of Central Jurisdiction, to their District Conferences each year.

II

**The amendment to the report of the Board of Social and Economic Relations regarding admission policies at our Methodist institutions has been considered by your board. We are deeply concerned about the problems presented in this amendment, and will support the trustees of our colleges as they seek to implement Christian principles in their admission policies. It is the feeling of your board that there should be prayerful, thoughtful, heart-searching, continuing study and discussion of his matter by the board and boards of trustees of our respective Methodist institutions.

THE INTER CONFERENCE COMMISSION ON STUDENT RELIGIOUS WORK

The objectives of the Methodist Student Movement are: "to lead students to Jesus Christ; to stimulate Bible study; to deepen Christian faith; to further understanding of the Church; to provide warmth of Christian fellowship; to develop ecumenical understanding; to foster Christian education; to offer projects of service; to interpret Christian vocation; to promote religion in higher education; to encourage participation in a university Christian movement, and to develop a sense of world Christian community." Ministering in these ways to the Methodists of the colleges and universities located within North Carolina is the task of the Inter-Conference Commission on Student Religious Work.

During the year A TRAINING SESSION for Workers with Students was held in Chapel Hill, sponsored by the Commission. This was attended by a Bishop, 2 leaders sent by the General Board of Education, 2 visitors from South Carolina, an Executive Director of a Conference Commission on Christian Higher Education, members of the Inter-Conference Commission, and workers with Methodist students on several campuses. An expanded session of the same is planned for next year.

These projects were sponsored directly by the Methodist Student Movement of North Carolina:

A **Fall Retreat** at Camp Betty Hastings. This was for the "full council", and its purpose was to acquaint them with their tasks and to implement projects which had been planned at a retreat the preceding May. Leaders included: Dr. Harold Hutson, President of Greensboro College; The Rev. Gunter Sommer of Germany; and local campus directors.

Two **District Conferences**, at Winston-Salem and at Cullowhee. Speakers for these were Dr. E. O. Wilson, Associate Dean of Wake Forest College, and the State Director of the Methodist Student Movement.

A **Church Vocations Conference** at Salisbury. Leaders included 2 persons from the General Board of Education in Nashville, a representative of

the Methodist Publishing House in Nashville, a representative of the General Board of Missions in New York, and qualified persons in our own state. Youth received counseling in the fields of: Hospitals, Homes, and Social Agencies; the Pastorate and Chaplaincy; Missions (National and World); Publications and Communications; Teaching, Counseling, Student Work, and Administration of Educational institutions; and Christian Education and Deaconess Work. It is planned to hold a Vocations conference bi-annually.

A United Nations Model Assembly. This attracted students from eleven schools, including three which had not been represented in our state-wide work this year. They came from eleven different home countries and represented twenty countries in the Assembly. The meeting was interdenominational and interfaith, with persons from twelve religious bodies attending. Feeling was unanimous that another Assembly should be held next year, to further our knowledge of and appreciation for the United Nations.

Here is some condensed information about our Methodist work at some of the schools in North Carolina:

Appalachian State Teachers College, Boone, The Rev. Robert Barefield, Director of the Wesley Foundation. Enrollment, 1782; Methodist preference, 452; affected by Methodist group, 350. During the year Sunday evening activities were expanded. A lot on College Street in the center of the campus was bought. Now there is the need to build on this well-located lot a Methodist Student Center to house the Wesley Foundation which now meets in the basement of Boone Methodist Church.

Davidson College, Davidson, The Rev. Russell Montfort, Pastor and Counselor of the Methodist Student Fellowship. Enrollment, 850; Methodist preference, 152, affected by Methodist group, 80. During the year the pastor led in raising money toward a new wing for the Davidson Methodist Church. This wing will include facilities for students and a meeting place for the Methodist Student Fellowship.

Duke University, Durham, The Rev. Arthur Brandenburg, Chaplain to Methodist students. Enrollment, 5000; Methodist preference, 1460; affected by Methodist group, 700. During the year much emphasis was placed upon study groups and ministry to committed students. A stimulating and independent theological journal in mimeographed form is written and distributed by the students. There is need for money to equip and maintain the new Methodist Student Center which is the home of the Methodist Church at Duke University.

East Carolina College, Greenville, Miss Mamie Chandler, A Deaconess, Director of the Wesley Foundation. Enrollment, 3947; Methodist preference 722; affected by Methodist group, 313. Under the auspices of the Woman's Division of Christian Service, a new Methodist Student Center has been built on Fifth Street. All Wesley Foundation activities will originate from there next year.

Pembroke State College, Pembroke, Miss Marjorie Kanable, Counselor of the Wesley Fellowship. Enrollment, 331; Methodist preference, 79; affected by Methodist group, 79. In this school many persons are trained who become leaders in near-by churches. Through this year's meetings, activities, and outreach, students' horizons were widened. The Wesley Fellowship which meets in a classroom of the college needs a regular meeting place of its own and funds for program.

The Wesley Foundation of Raleigh with The Rev. Neal V. McGlamery as

Director, ministers to Methodist students at **North Carolina State College, Meredith College, Peace Junior College, Rex Hospital, and State Hospital**. The combined enrollment of these institutions is 6768; Methodist preference, 1565; affected by Methodist group, 275. Recently the Wesley Foundation moved into new and newly-furnished quarters in a wing of Fairmont Methodist Church.

The University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, The Rev. Robert Johnson, Director of the Wesley Foundation. Enrollment, 7300; Methodist preference, 1700; affected by Methodist group, 650. During the year a spacious lot was bought, located just behind the Carolina Inn. The old house now there, to be known as "Wesley House", will be used for offices and some activities during the coming year. There exists the urgent need of building a Methodist Student Center to house a Wesley Foundation that can minister to a greatly increased enrollment. The Foundation now has cramped quarters in University Methodist Church.

Western Carolina College, Cullowhee, The Rev. and Mrs. Milford Thumm, Pastor-Director and Associate Director, respectively, of the Wesley Foundation. Enrollment, 1129; Methodist preference, 255; affected by Methodist group, 210. During the year the level of student concern was deepened. Plans were drawn for a new wing to be added to the Cullowhee Methodist Church. One floor of this wing will be used almost exclusively by the Wesley Foundation, which is now housed in a basement room of the Church.

The Wesley Foundation at Winston-Salem, The Rev. Robert W. Younts, Director, ministers to Methodist students of **Wake Forest College, Salem College, and Baptist Hospital**. The combined enrollment of these institutions is 2680; Methodist preference, 616; affected by Methodist group, 213. During the year car-pools were used effectively to transport students from the three institutions to the new quarters in Maple Springs Methodist Church, located on Reynolda Road just off the Wake Forest College campus. It is anticipated that this group, now recorded as "a unit of the Methodist Student Movement", will become a fully-accredited Wesley Foundation during the coming year.

The Woman's College of the University of North Carolina, Greensboro, Miss Mauriel Shipp, Director of the Wesley Foundation. Enrollment, 2305; Methodist preference, 630; affected by Methodist group, 370. During the year the program was expanded to include discussion groups and prayer cells, as well as the "Friday Fellowship" supper and program meetings. The Foundation is housed in College Place Methodist Church.

REPORT OF THE TELEVISION, RADIO AND FILM COMMISSION

Substantial progress has been made during the current year in achieving the quadrennial goals established for the Television Radio and Film Commission.

During this year the Audio Film Library has expanded in titles and in services. The Library now has in excess of 300 titles with more than 400 Filmstrips plus a few movie and slide series. During the peak seasons of Easter, Christmas and Vacation Church Schools, well over 150 bookings a month are experienced. There is an over-all average of about 100 bookings a month. The Library is accomplishing its primary goal of extending the use of Audio-Visual into even the smallest churches and in addition is making a large Library of excellent materials available to the large churches that have been using Audio-Visual but on a less frequent basis.

An Audio-Visual catalogue was issued this year and has been used extensively. The next issue of the catalogue will include a brief description of the content of each Filmstrip within the alphabetical listing of Filmstrips in the catalogue. This summary will be in addition to such listing of materials.

The need is becoming increasingly apparent for an Audio-Visual Workshop on conference and district levels. It is the hope of the Commission that an appropriate time may be found during which a series of Audio-Visual Workshops may be offered in the various districts of our conference. If practical, the spring of 1959 may be the best date, otherwise, we shall seek to offer them during the conference year 1959-60.

In the meantime, ways will be studied in which our people may be stimulated to use Filmstrips more widely. Special emphasis will be given to their use during the morning sessions of our Church Schools and during our Christian Workers Schools.

For a more effective approach in the proper use of all Audio-Visual and the promotion of same (including the Television Ministry of The Methodist Church) an Audio-Visual coordinator is needed in each local church. This is necessary for each church whether they now use Audio-Visual mediums or not.

"Talk Back" will soon hit the conference promotional program. For this there will be needed an Audio-Visual coordinator within each local church. When the "Talk Back" Workshops are scheduled, this person will do the promoting and receive the training and share it with others in the local situation.

We believe that the Filmstrip Library is well on its way to being firmly established in the life of the conference. Its business practices and routines are fairly well established. Therefore, it is believed that there will be a changing emphasis from the Library to the promotion of the Television Ministry within the conference. The first full scale effort in this program will occur in January, 1959 when the "Talk Back" series is released in North Carolina.

With reference to the Television Ministry we wish to emphasize the need of attaining our goal of 10¢ per member for the support of the Television Ministry offering.

The Commission recommends that Dr. Landis Bennett of Raleigh and Rev. Harold Minor, the conference Director of Adult Work, be elected by this conference session as members of the Television Radio and Film Commission by virtue of special talents and interests they possess.

The Television Radio and Film Commission wishes to express its appreciation to the Rev. W. C. Walton, Jr., for the excellent leadership he has extended in this quadrennium. We commend him heartily as he goes to his advanced assignment in the General Television Radio and Film Commission. We are certain that not only our conference but all of Methodism shall profit from his expanded ministry.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TEMPERANCE

In our report to the Annual Conference, we would like to give a brief review of the year's activities. Outstanding in our efforts were the two and one-half hours' programs, the Workshops on Alcohol Education, conducted across the Conference during the first week in March. Dr. Caradine R. Hooton, Executive Secretary of the General Board of Temperance, gave the educational approach to the subject, covering the first hour of our schedule, and led a discussion group with the youths during the second period. Reverend Paul Wesley Aitken, Chaplain of Duke Hospital and Keeley Institute, led the counseling part of our program, which was designed to help adults in dealing with alcoholics.

Dr. Hooton covered succinctly the four areas of the Methodist Temperance program: (1) Education, (2) Legislation, (3) Commitment, and (4) Rehabilitation. In our well-balanced program, all phases of our work have been emphasized.

Following the action taken at our Annual Conference last year relative to

the banning of high pressure advertisements of alcoholic beverages, letters were written to the President and Vice-President of the United States, Senators, etc., urging them to support legislation now before Congress, Langer S 582 and Siler Bill H R 4835. Favorable replies were received from our correspondence.

Some five hundred cards were mailed to our pastors in May, reminding them of this pending legislation, and expressing the hope that they would give their immediate support to the above bills.

We have also continued our interest and participation in the State Allied Church League.

Looking forward to another year's activities, we wish to call attention to the disturbing moral situation in the nation. The Federal Bureau of Investigation recently reported that boys and girls under the voting age account for 61% of the car snatchers, 49% of the burglars, 35% of robbers, 33% of thieves, 15% of murders. Two million of our young people have been infested with social diseases, and thousands of young girls under fourteen years of age have gone astray morally.

Trashy comic books, cheap television programs, loose shows and movies are undermining the moral and spiritual health of our young people. The disrupting influences of liquor, literature, license, and lust should be confronted with a positive, constructive program of wholesome amusement.

In Cumberland County some of the ministers observed that the advertisements of movies were sordid, shoddy, and sexy. We felt that something should be done about it, and a committee was appointed to make an investigation, and to report back at a subsequent meeting.

We discovered that one of the managers was particularly interested in improving the quality of movies and their display ads. He took the initiative in forming a Theatre Managers Association in the county, and he told the group that "we want to conduct our business with good taste". He suggested that such words as "For Adults Only", "Uncensored", and "Raw Sex" be eliminated in promoting the pictures.

Recommendations

(1) We urge that a Temperance Committee, or a Christian Social Relation Committee be organized or activated in every church or charge, for promoting and advancing the cause of an alcohol-free nation.

Such committee should be formed or activated by the first Quarterly Conference.

(2) An adequate educational program should be carried forward in every district, including the sub-district and local church level. Alcohol education should also be promoted in our public schools. The use of films, and turn-over charts, which are colorful and illustrative, would be effective in the educational approach.

(3) We commend the custom of electing and aiding delegates financially to attend schools on alcohol for both youths and adults.

(4) The observance of Commitment Day, first Sunday in December, should be continued, with careful preparation and a followup effort. According to our Commitment Day Chairman, Rev. E. L. Earnhardt, less than one-half of the churches observed the occasion. We are anxious to have the full participation of all the churches.

(5) We denounce the aggressive invasion of the American home by liquor advertisers, who seek to induce even our children to use alcoholic beverages, through every modern media. Following a glamorous television program, a child was recently heard crying for beer.

Again, we appeal for continued support of Congressional Legislation to ban the interstate transportation of alcoholic beverage advertising materials, specifically Langer Bill S 582, and the Siler Bill H R 4835.

(6) We wish to commend the Clinical Training in Pastoral Care Program, which is opening at Keeley Institute in July. Here the pastors can have a firsthand contact with alcoholics, under the general supervision of a trained and experienced staff. We are providing some scholarships for men who are interested in the counseling of alcoholics.

(7) Finally, in our concern for the public morals, we declare ourselves against all sordid forms of amusements, and urge that positive, constructive effort be put forth to promote the public welfare through wholesome entertainment.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON TOWN AND COUNTRY WORK

I

A PHILOSOPHY OF WORK

FOR THE

COMMISSION ON TOWN AND COUNTRY WORK

NORTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE, SE.J.

Relative to **Discipline**, 1956, par. 1231, the Annual Conference is requested to adopt the following interpretation and implementation:

(1) The Commission on Town and Country Work is the one specifically grass roots board in the Conference, by name and by definition of **Discipline**, 1956, par. 1231. The existence of the Commission is recognition that the rural church is a problem and opportunity area of conference work.

One of the major tasks of the Commission is to analyze the rural church problem, find solutions, and get the solutions adopted and implemented. In this procedure creativity and craftsmanship of a high order are called for.

The state of North Carolina has a growing population, an expanding economy, and a developing culture. The work of the Commission has to do not only with the problem of rural church rehabilitation, but with expansion. It is normal that new life impulses should rise from the roots.

(2) The population of the North Carolina Conference area is predominantly rural and will be so for a long time to come. Life rises from the roots. So, the state of health of the rural (root) churches determines to a considerable degree the spiritual vitality and institutional strength of the Conference. The Commission is the guardian of the roots. Therefore the Commission's husbandry is of immense importance to the life and work of the Conference.

(3) It is evident that one of the functions of the Commission is to help remedy the ailments of the rural church, but one of the major works is to help cure the causes of the ailments. Methodism is a connectional and not a congregational system. Most of the problems from which the rural church suffers reside in the system, or are in the power of the system to correct. Therefore the Commission should not operate merely at the margins of Conference activity, but would wisely work mainly where policies are set and programs are formulated.

(4) The conference leadership has long had an urban mind-set. This is unfortunate and improper in a conference which is predominantly rural. However, there is evidence that the urban mind-set is being modified in some measure. The Commission is responsible to provide a character and calibre of leadership which will cause the conference policy makers to think and plan in total terms.

(5) The rural church, collectively, is a submerged group, and in the North Carolina Conference is, paradoxically, a submerged majority. The Commission is the voice, the agent, and the servant of the submerged pastors and people of the rural church.

(6) The Commission by definition of **Discipline**, 1956, par. 1231, is mainly a research and resource board, and has limited administrative authority.

(7) American Methodism was established with an episcopal form of church government. Gradually the boards have grown up alongside the episcopal system, and have grown in strength and number. So now there is a dual system of church government, and the **Discipline** does not clearly define the spheres of authority of the respective systems. The Commission would wisely be aware of this unresolved problem.

(8) There is evident need for a resource service to the local rural churches, comparable in nature to that rendered by the county agents to farmers and rural communities.

However, in view of the problem stated in above paragraph # 7 it is not clear by whom the service should be rendered. Perhaps in time **Discipline**, 1956, par. 1231, will be revised as to clarify the matter, or probably the Annual Conference could decide the issue.

(9) The rural church is caught adversely in the operation of two opposite lines of force.

(a) The social process operates in the manner of an up-bound escalator carrying population, leaders, economic wealth, religious and other values from country to town and city communities. Thousands of youth, just entering their productive years, move annually from rural communities and churches to urban communities and churches. Thus the rural church is constantly drained.

The Methodist Church originally was rooted in the masses of plain people. Most of the rural people in eastern North Carolina are plain people. For some time within The Methodist Church there has been a trend away from the masses and to the middle and upper classes. The trend is ongoing. This trend, whatever its causes, is coexistent with and adds to the effect of the up-bound escalator line of force.

It seems that The Methodist Church across the nation has been and is slowly experiencing a "going to tops" process. For example, a vast bureaucracy is being built up, some of it necessarily on the General Conference level at the financial expense of the local church. At the same time, development of the local church, and church extension, are not receiving adequate attention. This "going to tops" process, if a fact, is coexistent with and adds to the effect of the up-bound escalator line of force.

(b) The paternalistic down-direction thrust of Methodist polity, policy and procedure, long operating without counter-balance, has been a considerable cause of local church initiative being impaired to a point approaching paralysis in many respects.

(c) Thus, the rural church is caught adversely in the operation of these opposite lines of force. Herein lies one of the reasons for the Methodist rural church problem.

The Commission is responsible to provide a quality of statesmanship in conference work which will help resolve this problem.

Resources comparable in value to those received must be returned to the country churches by the town and city churches, and the Conference must be led to learn to work from the roots up, as in the vegetable kingdom.

The return by the town and city churches to the country churches of resources comparable in value to those received is a moral obligation. Also, it is a practical necessity as it is a matter of "feeding the cow being milked."

The return of resources to the country churches should not be done paternalistically, but should be done with a well studied and well managed process of "plowing back" of resources needed. A precedent in this regard has been set by federal and state agricultural agencies serving farmers and rural communities.

(10) Historically, the plain people have been the human source from which the great creative spiritual movements have come. This was a significant factor in the Wesleyan revival. The plain people live in large and increasing numbers in the rural communities of eastern North Carolina. These people are not being reached adequately by Methodism. The Methodist Church is tending to become a middle and upper class church. The Commission has as one of its major concerns the inclusion of the masses of plain people in Methodism's mission.

(11) The church is both body and soul. The health of each is important for the church to be a redemptive and transforming force. So, the Commission is properly concerned to help solve institutional problems, and to help give creative thought and leadership in the interest of recovering the Wesleyan evangelistic spirit.

The rural church may become the scene and source of spiritual revival in the North Carolina Conference. It is little realized the life potential resident in the roots (rural churches) which could be released.

(12) It is recognized that the above "philosophy of work" is subject to revision as time goes on, as the Conference is a growing and changing body.

II

LOGICAL CIRCUIT DIVISIONS

The circuit system served The Methodist Church well in the earlier years, but under conditions of today, circuits, especially large ones, are wasteful of the energies and opportunities of the Conference.

The program of circuit divisions is one of the major achievements of the present progressive period in Conference work. Much more remains to be done. Some of the circuit divisions have been improperly done and need to be repaired.

The long delay in getting started on the program of circuit divisions has been costly to the Conference in dissipated possibilities, and continues to be costly in impairment of potential. As in the field of church extension, ground lost can never be regained.

The need for circuit divisions increases as time has been lost, there is general population growth and economic expansion, and parish administrative work grows heavier by the year. And too, other denominations are operating largely with station churches.

The authority to make circuit divisions is one of the "duties and powers" of a bishop. (**Discipline**, 1956, par. 433)

The actual work of dividing circuits is done by the district superintendents, with derived authority from the bishop.

Usually the Commission on Minimum Salaries is involved in the procedure of circuit divisions. Sometimes the Board of Missions, and the Duke Endowment,

are involved in helping to provide needed expansion of building facilities.

The desire for circuit divisions must arise from the circuit churches needing to be thus involved. Pastors and district superintendents can do much to develop the desire.

The station-circuit pattern of the future should be "1-2-3", that is, stations where possible, two-point where necessary, and three point at the most.

A circuit should always be wholly within a given county and within a section of the county in which the people are sociologically homogeneous.

Also, circuits should be geographically compact, making for greater efficiency in pastoral work, economy of pastors' travel, and making possible having Sunday morning services at 9:45 and 11:00.

The Conference has a large and increasing number of student pastors. A carefully worked out pattern of student stations and student two-point charges, with adequate and properly located parsonages, should be developed around Durham, Louisburg, Rocky Mount, and Fayetteville, and possibly other educational centers.

The procedure in making logical circuit divisions is sometimes simple and sometimes complex, more often the latter.

Master-plan procedure is widely and profitably used in many areas of constructive endeavor.

In proper circuit division procedure, care and skill are required in dealing with the generally complex factors. The need for master-plan procedure is seen in the following Commission on Town and Country Work report to the Annual Conference of 1954.

Conference Master Plan of Circuit and Stations

The North Carolina Conference is predominantly a rural conference, and competent sociological studies indicate that it will continue to be so for a long time to come. (See study, "White Population Trends," 1954, by Hamilton).

The backbone of Conference structure and function is the rural circuits. The present circuit pattern has grown up over a period of years, like vines, and needs a systematic overhauling. A very large number of the circuits are illogical in arrangement. A logically arranged circuit pattern would greatly improve the productive efficiency of the Conference. Much good work has already been done in dividing and rearranging a number of the circuits, but this is only patch work which points up the larger need. The time has now come when we should start work on a Conference master-plan of circuits and stations.

The remarkable and commendable work which has already been done in this regard by the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina is now a matter of report and public information.

The Commission on Town and Country Work requests the Bishop and the district superintendents to begin work on a Conference master-plan of circuits and stations as early as practicable in the new Conference year of 1954-55.

It is recognized that the entire readjustment of circuits according to a master-plan will require a process of study, cultivation, and guidance covering a period of several years.

It is also recognized that as we work in the midst of a growing population, a master-plan of circuits and stations will require adjustments through the years. However, a careful study of sociological and economic factors; population data; new church extension opportunities; numerical, spiritual, and stewardship growth in individual churches; and other pertinent factors, would make long-range plan-

ing possible. A master-plan of circuits and stations would properly make provision for the anticipations of projective planning.

"Frontier Again," 1954, a book by Walston and Nickens, just off the press, and "Look at the People," 1955, a book by Chambers, nearly ready for the press, will be valuable aids in projective planning. Also, a study, "Country Church Ladder," by A. G. Tyson, will be of great value to those constructing the master-plan of circuits and stations.

A number of factors and facts should be noted in working on a Conference master-plan of circuits and stations, some of which are as follows:

1. Churches which are ready to become stations should be noted and lifted out of the circuit pattern.

2. Circuits should follow natural community lines in terms of school districts, counties, and trading centers—where possible in terms of all three of these basic sociological patterns.

3. Circuits should be geographically compact.

4. Circuits should be worked out on the two or three church pattern. Only in a few cases should there be four-point circuits, and never more.

5. Churches in need of relocation should be noted—followed by immediate studies and steps to this end. The great highway program of the State of North Carolina has changed the orientation of many rural communities and, as a result, many rural churches are left in very poor locations. Many churches can be saved from death by prompt action as to relocation.

6. Closed churches should be noted—followed by immediate steps toward opening. (See 1952 **Discipline**, 362 (11))

7. Weak churches should be especially noted and grouped so as to receive intensive pastoral attention.

8. New church extension locations should be noted—followed by prompt steps to organize and build new churches.

9. A number of combinations as to the above points can be made.

10. In many instances it will be found advantageous for there to be give and take of churches as between two or more charges.

11. A Conference master-plan of circuits and stations would require changing district lines at many points, in the interest of logical circuit arrangements.

12. The paper, "Principles Governing Use of Funds to be Administered by the Board of Missions and Church Extension," March 25, 1954 would be needed in the work of constructing a master-plan of circuits and stations.

13. The Commission on Town and Country Work Report No. 4, adopted by the 1952 Annual Conference, would be noted in the procedure of setting up new charges.

14. The newly revised county maps, available at the North Carolina State Highway and Public Works Commission, would be valuable aids in working on logical circuit arrangements.

15. Consolidation of rural churches is recognized as unsound policy.

16. The recently established arrangement of charges in Greene and Pitt counties, namely: Snow Hill, Walstonburg-Tabernacle, Maury-Mt. Herman, Hookerton-Rainbow, Farmville, and Wesley Memorial, is cited as an illustration in miniature of an ideal Conference master-plan of circuits and stations. (**Journal**, 1954, pp. 152-3)

The following data show the station-circuit structure of the Conference, and progress made since 1951 in circuit divisions:

III

DECLINING RURAL CHURCHES

The General Conference of 1956 constituted an "Interboard Committee on Ministry to Neglected Areas." (*Discipline*, 1956, par. 1289 and par. 2124) A variety of responsibilities are given to this committee. Relative to declining rural churches the *Discipline* states: "This committee is authorized and directed: (1) To study neglected - - rural areas - - - (c) revive and support dying and abandoned churches - - -"

The following article is relative to this matter:

To Aid 'Neglected' Churches

Methodist leaders are planning to revitalize churches in many "neglected" metropolitan and rural areas. By fall they expect to pinpoint and study these areas, and list weak spots (recommended by bishops and district superintendents) on which to start immediate work. By that time Methodist boards and agencies are expected to be ready to lend their strength to the project.

Heading up the program is the new, 25-member Interboard Committee on Ministry to Neglected Areas, Bishop Roy Short, Nashville, chairman.

The committee was formed at the 1956 General Conference when Methodists asked such questions as: Is the Protestant church ministering mainly to one strata of society? Does it appeal primarily to the socially, economically, and culturally successful? Is it in danger of continuing a caste system?

General Conference assigned the committee to study neglected areas, develop plans to organize new churches, revive and support abandoned and dying churches, and enlist the help of laymen and women.

The committee has recommended that each district expand work in two neglected areas each year.

Members say exceptional opportunities exist in housing developments, shoe-string housing along interurban highways, dying city centers, scattered mountain farms, and areas beyond the suburbs.

Additional plans will be blueprinted at an executive committee meeting Sept. 11-12 in Indianapolis, and at a full committee session after Easter, 1958. (*Together*, July 1957, p. 73)

Country Church Ladder, 1956, by Aaron G. Tyson, a publication of the Commission on Town and Country Work of the North Carolina Conference, shows that the Conference has 207 declining country churches. Of these 34 are so weak as to be in danger of closing, and 88 are almost as weak.

The Director of Field Work for the Commission on Town and Country Work, Roy L. Turnage, Jr., gives assistance to rural churches which are in danger of closing, in cases requested by the district superintendents. Also, Mr. Turnage is engaged in the work of reopening closed rural churches. He has recently successfully reopened several.

The Board of Education of the North Carolina Conference initiated procedure which resulted in the organization of the "Interboard Ministry to Declining Churches." Planning on this was well underway before it was known that the General Conference had taken action with reference to the same field of need. So far as declining rural churches are concerned, the objectives of the General Conference and North Carolina Conference enterprises are the same. The purpose, nature, and method of the North Carolina Conference work are given in the Board of Education report to the Annual Conference of 1957. (*Journal*, 1957, pp 143-5)

The Interboard Ministry to Declining Churches, the chairman of which is the Conference Director of Evangelism, began its work in September, 1957.

Effort has been made to ascertain from the General Conference level as to what information and resources are available for doing effectively this work of urgent importance. It is evident that the North Carolina Conference will need to continue to use its initiative in the work.

IV

NO-SILENT-PULPIT PROGRAM

The no-silent-pulpit program of the Annual Conference Board of Lay Activities for the pre-Easter period, has been operative several years. It has much actual and great potential value. It is a timely resource.

The Commission on Town and Country Work, in a report to the Annual Conference of 1957 stated: "Appreciation is hereby expressed to the Board of Lay Activities for the "No Silent Pulpit" program. It is respectfully requested that an adequate training program be established for the lay speakers used, and that no speaker be employed who has not properly participated in the training program." (*Journal*, 1957, p. 227)

The Board of Evangelism, in a report to the Annual Conference of 1957 stated: "LAY PREACHING—To encourage and help train the great body of our laymen who, as Certified Lay Speakers of the Church, stand ready for this high service." (*Journal*, 1957, p. 175)

Also, the Board of Evangelism report stated: "Lay Preaching: The Board of Evangelism heartily commends the 'No Silent Pulpit' program, especially for its evangelistic appeal, and wishes to offer its wholehearted cooperation to the Con-

ference Board of Lay Activities in its Training Program for Lay Preachers." (*Journal*, 1957, p. 176)

The Board of Lay Activities, in a report to the Annual Conference of 1957, recounts initial endeavors in training lay preachers, and concludes the subject with the following statement: "It is the opinion of your Board that this program should be expanded and made available to all Lay Speakers throughout the Conference." (*Journal*, 1957, pp 179-80)

In view of the above expressed interest and concern for a well conceived and developed training program for lay preachers, the Board of Lay Activities is requested to consider convening as soon as practicable a naturally concerned group of Conference agency representatives who would study, formulate, establish, and operate a proper training program serving all districts.

It is suggested that each of the following, and possibly other, agencies be asked to provide a representative to the above group: Board of Lay Activities, Board of Evangelism, Board of Education, Commission on Christian Vocations, Long-Range Planning Committee, Board of Missions, Woman's Society of Christian Service, Louisburg College, Methodist College, North Carolina Wesleyan College, Cabinet, and Commission on Town and Country Work.

Also, it is suggested that the above group select a descriptive name, such as, "Conference Lay Preacher Training Board."

Also, it is suggested that this Board be established by action of the Annual Conference with listing in the *Journal* under the heading, "Commissions, Boards, and Committees."

And too, it is suggested for the No-Silent-Pulpit program that there be selected annually a theme, which would direct concerted effort toward some important objective. The No-Silent-Pulpit program as such meets a need. It could be used effectively to meet other needs.

There are certain other areas of work in which lay workers would be especially effective, as stated in *Discipline*, 1956, par. 1289. The *Discipline* proposes: "To devise methods and procedures for enlisting local churches and lay men and women in support of the foregoing activities with their means and services."

As above stated in a quotation from the Board of Evangelism report, the No-Silent-Pulpit program has evangelistic potential. This program could well be directed to the barren church problem.

Of late there is growing realization that American Methodism is moving away from the masses of plain people. Methodism must institute a turn and a trend to the plain people, or further serious consequences will be suffered by the plain people and The Methodist Church. The No-Silent-Pulpit program could effectively reflect a concern for action in this area.

The Board of Lay Activities is requested to consider including the additionally stated areas of opportunity in which lay preachers and workers would be utilized, with proper training given.

V

DEEDS

I

Church deeds and property boundry lines can become very important matters of concern almost overnight.

Many church deeds were imperfectly written in earlier days. Sometimes they were not recorded. Some church properties are without deeds or other conveyances. Many deeds are without the trust clause.

The failures of the past in this regard can be corrected in most cases with some effort, and with competent legal assistance.

II

The 1956 **Discipline**, par. 362, lists the duties of a district superintendent. Certain duties are noted as follows:

(7) To see that all charters, deeds, and other conveyances of church property in his district conform to the **Discipline** and to the laws, usages, and forms of the county, state, territory, or country within which such property is situated.

(11) To prepare and deliver to his successor, and to the conference secretary, to be permanently recorded by him: (a) a list of all abandoned church properties and cemeteries within the bounds of his district;

(12) To report annually to the Annual Conference an accurate record of all financial transactions pertaining to abandoned properties.

III

The Annual Conference of 1955 adopted a report (**Journal**, 1955, pp. 155-6) which includes the following:

The district superintendents are requested to investigate, with the aid of pastors, all rural church and parsonage deeds with a view to discovering (1) that the title in each case is clearly held by The Methodist Church; (2) that the trust clause is in each deed; (3) that the boundry lines in each case are clearly established. Further, the district superintendents are requested to take appropriate action in the interest of The Methodist Church in each case in which one or more of the above points need correction or clarification.

IV

Pursuant to the above the bishop and the district superintendents are requested to have in each district, within the ensuing conference year, a one-day "Institute on Deeds."

To this Institute each pastor would bring certified copies of all deeds or other conveyances to all real properties under the jurisdiction of his Quarterly Conference.

Also, to the Institute each pastor would bring a list of any and all abandoned church properties (with or without buildings), and abandoned cemeteries, within the bounds of his Quarterly Conference area and between his Quarterly Conference area and those adjoining if there be space between. Certified copies of all deeds or other conveyances to all such properties would be brought.

An attorney who is a member of The Methodist Church, and licensed by the State of North Carolina, would be present at the Institute as a consultant.

Each deed or other conveyance would be examined with a view to finding and promptly correcting any deficiencies.

Properties having unrecorded deeds, or not having deeds or other proper conveyances, would be discovered and appropriate action would ensue.

Deeds not having the trust clause (**Discipline**, 1956, par. 174) would be given remedial attention. There is a standard Declaration of Trust form available from the Division of National Missions, 1701 Arch Street, Philadelphia 3, Pennsylvania. A copy or copies can be secured by writing, care of Dr. B. P. Murphy, and requesting same. With the use of this form the trust clause can be made a part of a fee simple deed.

The Halstead legal opinion on how to put trust clauses in old deeds, already made available to the district superintendents, would be of value in cases of deeds

needing some corrective work before the above mentioned Declaration of Trust could be used.

V

It is requested that district superintendents ascertain that certified copies of all deeds and other conveyances be kept in bank safe deposit boxes.

Also, it is requested that each "Institute on Deeds" be repeated one year later for purposes of discovering progress made, and work not completed, and if necessary repeated annually thereafter until all work is completed.

VI

RESOLUTION CONCERNING

OWNERSHIP AND CONTROL OF ANNUAL CONFERENCE PROPERTY

A part of the genius of American Methodism is its polity, inherent in which is organic and functional connectionalism which makes for unity, efficiency, and effectiveness. It may be that, through the years, there have been in some instances failures properly to connect and in other instances improper disconnections, with reference to agencies and institutions of the Annual Conference.

Referring to **Discipline**, 1956, par. 711, the Board of Trustees of the Annual Conference is requested to include in its report to the next regular session of the Annual Conference, information as follows: a clear and concise statement regarding each Annual Conference agency and institution holding real property and/or other assets by name or subsidiary, and/or receiving money or other assets by appropriation or approval of the Annual Conference Commission on World Service and Finance, as to ownership and control of such property or properties by the Annual Conference.

This refers to all Annual Conference agencies and institutions within and outside the bounds of the Annual Conference and to property jointly owned with any other Annual Conference.

The provisions of deeds, wills, charters, by-laws, certificates of incorporation, trust agreements, partnership agreements, contracts, and any other such instruments pertaining to Annual Conference agencies and institutions, and relevant Annual Conference actions, would be carefully considered.

Included would be the provisions for nominating and electing trustees and their required qualifications, duties, powers, limitations, of powers, and tenure of office.

Included would be any other information pertinent to the interest of effective Methodist connectionalism.

It is assumed that the Board of Trustees of the Annual Conference has the above information on file or readily available.

A modern business corporation would not and could not be without such information concerning its properties. The Annual Conference should equal or excel any business corporation in efficiency of management and operation.

The Secretary of the Annual Conference is requested to send copies of this request to the Chairman and Secretary of the Board of Trustees of the Annual Conference.

VII

MISCELLANEOUS

1. In accord with **Discipline**, 1956, 1231 (4), the Commission on Town and Country Work nominates Ralph I. Epps for the office of Conference Secretary of

Town and Country Work, and hereby expresses appreciation for his efficient and effective work.

2. Appreciation is hereby expressed for the consecrated, competent, and creative services during the conference year now closing, of Mr. Roy L. Turnage, Jr., Director of Field Work, Commission on Town and Country Work. The Commission has approved the continuance of Mr. Turnage in this office, and has voted that his field of work be expanded.

3. The matter of securing a building site of adequate size is of great importance for new churches, and churches which are relocating. **Discipline**, 1956, par. 722) From three to five acres are essential to meet basic needs, and more acreage is desirable. Ample space is needed for the following reasons: (1) To provide for proper set-back of buildings to protect from noise, to allow for possible highway widening, and to protect from encroachment by certain disturbing commercial establishments; (2) To provide for possible building expansion needs; (3) To provide for beauty of landscaping; (4) To provide ample parking space for the present and future; (5) To provide a site for the parsonage; (6) To provide adequate playground space in the interest of the church being the social as well as the spiritual center of the neighborhood.

4. The attention of the district superintendents, pastors, and laymen is called to the constant need for procedure in local long-range planning. The paragraph on this subject in **Journal**, 1954, p. 155, is noted.

5. The attention of the district superintendents, pastors and laymen is called to the policy adopted by the Annual Conference on the subject of consolidation of rural churches, in **Journal**, 1954, pp. 153-4. The consolidation concept is a fallacy, for reasons given in the adopted policy paper.

6. The suggestion, and request, is hereby made that the Board of Missions, Board of Education, Conference Long-Range Planning Committee, Commission on Local Church Emphasis, Duke Endowment, and Commission on Town and Country Work, in cooperation with the district superintendents and pastors, jointly take an inventory of all rural church (census definition) building facilities and related matters. A duplicate record sheet for each church would be used, and filed with the Board of Missions, and the Duke Endowment.

Several items would be included, such as: (1) location of church site with respect to present community orientation; (2) adequate size of site; (3) age and condition of building or buildings; (4) number of class rooms exclusive of sanctuary; (5) fellowship hall and kitchen facilities; (6) indoor rest rooms; (7) heating equipment; (8) sanctuary equipment; (9) basic educational equipment; (10) valid deed or deeds; (11) clearly established property lines; (12) fire and wind insurance; (13) church sign; (14) highway directional sign or signs; (15) landscaping; (16) audio-visual equipment; (17) facilities for daytime as well as nighttime use of audio-visual equipment.

The Board of Missions is requested to be the initiator in the above proposed inventory endeavor.

7. The attention of the district superintendents, pastors, and laymen is called to the following statement in **Journal**, 1953, p. 163: "- - - it is the part of wisdom to note the churches in decline and to take proper constructive steps to turn them to growth, rather than to let them come to closing before getting the attention or the Annual Conference. The Conference would be wiser to be a physician rather than an undertaker, in this respect."

REPORT OF THE COLLEGE BOARD OF VISITORS

Beginning on April 15, 1958, six members of the Conference Board of College Visitors made the annual visit to three of our Methodist Colleges. Louisburg College was visited on April 15, High Point College April 16 and Greensboro College April 17.

In every case we were cordially received and welcomed as servants of the Church and of the Conference. The presidents of the three institutions had planned well for our coming. In each case, we met with members of the Administration, with faculty members and with student representatives and leaders of all campus organizations.

The findings of the Board were both encouraging and challenging. We sought first of all to discover or determine whether or not our colleges are distinctively Christian. Our method was that of direct questioning of faculty members and students. We believe that leaders of these institutions are men and women devoted and dedicated to the task of making our Colleges Christian. We believe their intention and purpose is that of sending out young men and women who will take their places in our Churches and society as Christian leaders.

Steady progress was noted in physical improvements on the three campuses. A new dormitory for men will soon be under construction at Greensboro College and plans are shaping up for the new chapel and student union at Louisburg College. The splendid new gymnasium at High Point College is now in use.

Our findings at the colleges lead your board to recommend and strongly urge that our pastors and churches cooperate with the Commission on Higher Education in its campaign for funds for the building of two new colleges.

We further believe that our continued support of High Point and Greensboro Colleges is necessary if they are to continue to meet the educational needs of the young people of our conference. We therefore recommend that the College Sustaining Fund appropriation from our Conference for these institutions remain the same as the present year.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON CHRISTIAN VOCATIONS

"A Minister From Every Local Church"

Realizing that a fruitful church is one that has sent some young person into a Church vocation and a barren church is one that has not, your Commission calls this conference to face its responsibility for recruitment.

This year a District Vocations Institute was held in each of our districts with Dr. Harold Porter and Dr. Marcus J. Birrell of Nashville serving as outside resource persons. About 500 ministers and laymen attended these institutes.

Church Vocations (week-end) conferences were held in the Fayetteville, Goldsboro, and Raleigh districts. Over 100 young people were reached by these.

We also cooperated with the State Methodist Student Movement in a statewide Vocations Conference for college students. This was held Feb. 8 & 9 in Salisbury, N. C.

Our plans for the new conference year include a conference-wide Church Vocations Conference to be held the week-end of March 6, 7, & 8, 1959 in a centrally located place.

We have re-scheduled the "Bishop's Rallies" for the fall of 1959. These are to be tri-district meetings calling together those young men and women in high school who are interested in the ministry and who may have questions about the ministry.

We recommend the following for the new conference year:

1. That on March 8, 1959 a "Call to Prayer" be issued in each local church at which time we would pray that more of our young men and women would answer the Call of God to enter a Church Vocation.
2. That during our special evangelistic services we have a youth night when an invitation be given for those who would enter a Church vocation.
3. That our churches offer scholarships to help those who are planning to enter a church vocation. We commend those who have already made provisions for these in their budgets.
4. That TRAFICO purchase and make available the following filmstrips:
 - a. Look At The Ministry
 - b. Look At The Missionary
 - c. Look At The Women's Church Vocations
 - d. Look At The Director Of Religious Education
 - e. Adventure In Service

We want to express our appreciation to our District Superintendents who have made an honest effort to organize and activate the local Commission on Christian Vocations. We urge that this be an active group in every church.

We would also thank our District Directors who have carried a large work load this year in our work. They are: N. L. Jones, J. Paul Edwards, J. A. Auman, R. L. Bame, H. R. Jordan, R. H. Eason, Brooks Patten, R. W. Bradshaw, and C. F. Grill. Each of these has a file and has maintained some contact with our youth who have made decisions for church work.

REPORT OF THE WOMAN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE AND WESLEYAN SERVICE GUILD

No report could be given this year without strong overtones from the Fifth Quadrennial Assembly held in St. Louis, Missouri, May 6-9, and the Guild Weekend May 9-11. Of special interest is the fact that our conference had full representation for the first time—3 from the conference, 9 from the districts and 1 youth delegate. In addition to the delegated group, the representation included 1 jurisdiction officer, 1 deaconess, and a number of unofficial visitors.

An outstanding event from our standpoint was the commissioning of three girls from the North Carolina conference: Charlotte Whitfield as deaconess, Oline Civils, deaconess, and Sarah Frances Hamilton, missionary. Two of these fine young women will be consecrated by Bishop Garber at the present conference. Miss Mary Bethea was commissioned at Buck Hill Falls in January, and is now serving as Dean of Women at Pfeiffer College.

The Methodist Student Center at East Carolina College in Greenville, which has demanded much of our time and thought and financial support, will be completed in ample time for the opening of the fall semester. The building with its imposing appearance and excellent facilities is a credit to our conference and we look forward to a continuation of the fine work which has been done, and we believe that we have a right to expect added impetus as a result of this new and inviting Center. Miss Mamie Chandler, deaconess, is the guiding spirit in this work, and her influence is felt far and wide.

In addition to Miss Chandler two other deaconesses have assignments in the conference—Miss Ethelynde Ballance, Roberdell Area, Miss Alta Nye, Pembroke Area, and a rural worker, Mrs. Willa Dean Lindsay Smith in the Glendon Area. Mrs. Smith's resignation will be effective the last of August, and we are hoping to have a U S 2 to take her place. We regret losing her.

Twelve new societies have been organized thus far this year, and the district secretaries of Promotion and Presidents continue to strive for 100% organization.

The conference treasurer reports \$205,247.39 received for Missions during the year, with an amount of \$138,665.03 spent for local work, making a total of \$343,912.42.

We are half-way in the quadrennium. The theme, "The Spirit of Christ—For All of Life", continues to be in our thinking as we seek to exemplify this, not only in our individual lives, but throughout the various channels of our work. We endeavor through missionary education and service and through Christian social relations to better understand our world and its needs, and our place in the Christian mission. Realizing that the strength of the nation and certainly the future of civilization lies in the coming generations, stress is placed upon the nurture and development of children, youth and students, and efforts made to enlist young people in full-time Christian service. Importance is given to woman's place in today's world and the necessity of keeping informed both through the secular press and also through the vast wealth of publications issued by the Woman's Division and the Methodist Church in general.

Our ultimate goal is that through promotion and cultivation we may enlist every woman in the church in the Woman's Society or the Guild, believing that

through these avenues she is better able to utilize her time and abilities and means in the ongoing program of missions, and to sustain and undergird the world-wide mission of the church.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE

I.

The budget hearing for the Conference year 1958-1959 was held on last December 12-13 in order that the Askings and apportionments for the following year might be in proper shape for presentation to the Fourth Quarterly Conferences by the District Superintendents. This plan appears to have been well received and we express our appreciation for the cooperation which has been manifested.

In keeping with the emphasis decreed for this quadrennium by our General Conference, and in accordance with the decision of our North Carolina Annual Conference, we move forward to the task of building and maintaining our new Colleges and strengthening the support of our existing institutions. Viewed in the short perspective of only two years, this leadership on the part of our General Conference and the resultant action of our North Carolina Conference, seem almost prophetic. The greatly increased interest in higher education and the evident demand for the facilities which our Conference is undertaking to provide, make our task not only more challenging, but more rewarding. Our people have an opportunity in this area of Christian endeavor that does not come to many generations.

The new budget reflects the annual increase of \$40,000.00 in the College Sustaining Fund, raising this item to \$290,000.00. Other than that, increases have been held at a minimum. We note marked increase in Christian Stewardship cultivation and recommend continuation and broadening of this cultivation through all districts of this conference.

We list the total Askings for each of the 9 districts under Fund # 7, Benevolences:

The total funds received from the acceptances for the combined BENEVOLENCES shall be distributed thus: Each cause shall be paid proportionately out of the income from acceptances up to the amount fixed in the budget. Any surplus shall be held by the Conference Treasurer to be expended by the Annual Conference upon recommendation of the Commission. Provided, however, in the event collections under Item # 7, Benevolences, should fall short to an extent which can-

not be bridged by the Contingency Fund, the Commission requests authority within its discretion to pay in full certain items in the budget (World Service, General Administration, Interdenominational Cooperation, Jurisdictional Conference Budget). The remaining sum available will be paid proportionately to the remaining budget items.

Limiting and Supplementing Provisions Relating to the Budget

1. Apportionments against pastor's salary are defined to include the salary of the pastor and associate pastor under Episcopal appointment.
2. (a) The annual salary of each of the 9 District Superintendents shall be set at \$8,400.00 including travel.
(b) "We approve the use of an amount up to \$3,000 to be provided by each District for the District Superintendent for secretarial help and promotion of the District program."
3. The Commission recommends that each person who has authority to draw checks against an account of a Conference Agency be required to present annually to the full membership of his Agency a complete list of all checks drawn, justifying all checks with the budget approved by his Agency.
4. The Commission recommends that each agency whose accounts are not audited in the Treasurer's Office be required to have an annual audit made and furnish this Commission with a copy of it.
5. The Commission would like to call the attention of the Conference to the increased amount of travel expense and request that the various agencies be diligent in holding it to the minimum necessary to properly perform their service.
6. Under the Church Extension Fund the first \$25,000.00 is earmarked to be paid to Board of Missions, Inc. for the revolving loan fund.
7. The distribution of the College Sustaining Fund shall be in accordance with the direction of the Board of Education.
8. The increase to the Board of Education, Local Church Division, applies to their Department of Children's Work.
9. Wesley Foundation Building Fund. From this fund the sum of \$5,800.00 is earmarked for Methodist Student Center at Greenville in continuance of current commitments.
10. We recommend continuation of the approval of request of Methodist Retirement Home, Incorporated for privilege of private solicitation and receipt of such donations as may be directed thereto.
11. We recognize the need for additional support for the Ten Dollar Club and suggest that it may be sought and achieved through stimulation of the Ten Dollar Club membership.
- *12. With reference to Conference Survey Committee, we cite paragraph 1304 in the DISCIPLINE and point out that this committee is to be appointed by the Board of Missions and we recommend that the funds currently credited to the Committee be transferred to the Church Extension Section of the Board of Missions and it is assumed that the Board of Missions is taking over this function as part of its natural Church Extension responsibilities.
13. We commend the Minimum Salary Commission on their long-range planning for Minimum Salary for pastors of this Conference.
14. The District Superintendents will establish suitable apportionments for new churches, and adjust apportionments where other charge changes occur; provided also where circuits are divided any church involved in the division that must receive minimum salary, may upon the consent of the District Superintendent, pay their former proportionate share of the items based on pastoral support and total money raise, plus an additional 20% of this amount the first year of division. This shall be increased by at least 20% of the original base annually until they achieve

the then current base of established charges, in a period not to exceed four years.

The Commission recommends approval of the following SPECIALS to be arranged by Special Offerings or included in the budget. IF BUDGETED, the amount should be liberal. Remit to Conference Treasurer.

We recommend approval of the requests of the following agencies for the privilege of soliciting funds throughout the Conference.

1. The Capital Funds Campaign for our colleges.
2. Wesley Foundation Commission for special gifts for the benefit of special works in State supported institutions.
3. The Board of Missions for the promotion of Church Extension Ten Dollar Club.
4. That the Board of Education be permitted to accept funds donated by children's groups, young adult groups, individuals, etc., to begin an additional Camp for our Conference.

We recommend that the Conference fiscal year be designated to begin July 1st and to close June 30th.

We recommend to charge or church treasurers that they set up a schedule for remitting at a fixed time each month and to close the year as early as possible. Final remittance should be mailed on Monday two weeks preceding the opening of Conference.

The Pastors bear responsibility to check with Treasurers for full remittance of all Budgeted items and all funds collected as specials and to harmonize their reports to Annual Conference with Conference Treasurer's acknowledgements both received and pending.

We report the issuance of a Fidelity Bond in Employers Mutual Casualty Company of Des Moines, Iowa to cover the Conference Treasurer in the amount of \$100,000.00 and to cover the Stenographer-Clerk in the amount of \$25,000.00; others to a minimum amount of \$10,000.00 in said office. Also to cover others handling funds in Methodist Retirement Homes, Inc., Board of Education, Methodist Youth Fund, Camp Director, Methodist Youth Assemblies, Treasurer Camp Don Lee, Treasurer Methodist Youth Center, Greenville.

We recommend the continuation of A. M. Pullen and Company as auditors.

Reference is made to report # 2 (to be prepared) for additional items of business.

***RESOLUTION CONCERNING THE SUSTENTATION FUND, REPORT I**

A present necessitous case calls for the designation of a committee which we propose to be known as the Sustentation Committee, and to be comprised of

- (a) The President of the Board of Hospitals and Homes
- (b) The Secretary of the Board of Pensions
- (c) The Chairman of the Committee on Conference Relations

This Committee is authorized during the new Conference Year only to meet emergency needs by negotiating loan of funds from other Conference Boards, in amount not to exceed \$2,000.00.

The Committee is also requested to work out with the Conference Board of Pensions rules of procedure governing the meeting of the needs in cases of disability of ministers to determine the assistance to be rendered by each group, i. e. The Sustentation Committee and/or The Board of Pensions.

HEADQUARTERS BUILDING: We also recommend that the Conference Trustees be directed, once a deed has been recorded to them for a headquarters site, to execute a note and Deed-of-Trust in such amount as may be required by the Committee charged with the management of the project as being necessary to cover all construction costs for such funds as may be borrowed.

We also recommend approval for the Conference Treasurer to make the above loan to the Conference Board of Trustees from Central Funds in such amount at such interest rate as the Investment Committee of Methodist Fund may approve, to be secured by the note and Deed-of-Trust as mentioned above.

We recommend authorization for the payment of such necessary expenses relating to conference headquarters—survey, engineering, architecture, construction, furnishing—as may be approved by the Committee (of whatever name) for

steering the Conference Headquarters project. These advance payments shall then be consolidated with construction costs in the loan set forth above.

It being contemplated that planning and construction shall be tied in with good long-term leases on sufficient portion of the construction to assure liquidation of the entire cost in a period of years satisfactory to the Investment Committee of Methodist Fund, Incorporated.

We recommend that dictating machines be provided for District Superintendents who will make good use of them and that they become the property of the Office of the District Superintendent. The cost should be held within \$400.00 each and may be charged to the District Superintendents Fund. The details should be cleared through the office of the Conference Treasurer.

III

We recommend the transfer from the conference reserve of interest earnings on Central Funds to the new department of Methodist Fund Incorporated, known as the Department of Gifts and Wills, for a broad program of cultivation in this field, a total amount not to exceed \$10,000.00, for use in producing and distributing promotional materials. And, a combined total not to exceed \$25,000.00 in case the services of a full time director should be employed.

Funds to be made available as needed when the program is set in motion. Provision for this program was made in the Charter of the corporation, November 23, 1955, and is currently being activated.

Gifts and wills of real estate, securities or cash to be used as Endowments may be directed to Methodist Fund, Incorporated, Raleigh, North Carolina and have the income channelled to chosen Conference Agencies. We have under study the

procedure by which we may effectively bring to the attention of our people the opportunity to make gifts or wills for the benefit of our Annual Conference and whereby they may choose the cause or causes they wish to favor.

The Fund is directed and managed by selected personnel elected by the Conference Agencies, as a mutual investment fund. Our securities investments are under the guidance of Moody's Investors Service. We feel their services have been very beneficial.

The Investment Department of Methodist Fund, Incorporated has made progress during the period since our last report. Our investments at the present time are producing at the rate of 4.66% income and additional irregular income in the form of stock dividends substantially has offset all expenses of the Fund.

The members of the Fund have recommended a dividend of 4.5c per capital unit payable on July 23 to unit holders as of June 30, 1958. We ask Conference approval of this dividend.

III

A MOTION RELATING TO METHODIST FUND, INCORPORATED

Acting under and by virtue of authority conferred by the Certificate of Incorporation of Methodist Fund Incorporated (#76304) under Article IX of said Certificate, the North Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction of The Methodist Church does hereby direct that the members of the Corporation shall be until and unless the North Carolina Annual Conference, (Southeastern Jurisdiction) of The Methodist Church otherwise directs:

(a) That person holding the office of Treasurer of the North Carolina Annual Conference (Southeastern Jurisdiction) of The Methodist Church:

(b) That person holding the office of President of the Commission on World Service and Finance of the North Carolina Annual Conference (South-

eastern Jurisdiction) of The Methodist Church;

(c) Three members elected by the Commission on World Service and Finance of the said North Carolina Annual Conference from the membership of the commission on World Service and Finance.

(d) One member elected by the Conference Board of Pensions of said North Carolina Conference;

(e) One member elected by the Board of Missions of said North Carolina Annual Conference;

(f) One member elected by the Board of Trustees of said North Carolina Annual Conference;

(g) One member elected by the Board of Education (said person to represent the interest of the several colleges) of the North Carolina Annual Conference;

(h) One member elected by the Board of Hospitals and Homes (said person to represent the interest of the several Homes) of the North Carolina Annual Conference;

(i) One member elected by the Methodist Home for Children, Incorporated, of Raleigh, N. C. Upon the unanimous consent of the present members of the Fund, the Methodist Home for Children may elect two members under this provision instead of the one as herein provided.

(j) Three members elected by the Commission on World Service and Finance from the conference at large based upon their recognized ability in investments.

The members elected by the various Boards may or may not be members of such Boards.

Other provisions of Article IX are quoted for information:

"Vacancies occurring in the membership shall be filled by the membership by majority vote.

"Membership shall expire as soon after the quadrennial meeting of said North Carolina Annual Conference as a successor has been elected, except members elected by the membership on the happening of a vacancy shall expire upon the election of a successor, which may be done at the next regular meeting of the Board or Commission charged with the election of such member.

"The North Carolina Annual Conference (Southeastern Jurisdiction) may provide other and different qualifications for membership in this Corporation."

We, the undersigned, move the adoption of the foregoing for the purpose of obtaining broader representation in this our own investment corporation by Conference agencies having permanent funds for investment.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON WORSHIP

The Annual Conference Commission on Worship was created by action of the 1956 Session of the North Carolina Annual Conference in Greenville, North Carolina.

Although not a required Commission of the Annual Conference, the leaders of the organization felt it expedient to create a Commission of duly authorized persons who would serve as a Resource Group ready to provide guidance, information, training, and encouragement to all persons, groups, or churches anywhere in the Conference who might be concerned with the task of recovering our historic traditions in Methodist Worship. The Commission is especially concerned with the restoration of corporate worship to its proper place in the framework of our evangelical Protestantism.

It is the contention of the Commission on Worship that, our contemporary Methodism has lost the fine art of corporate worship; moreover, the Commission feels that the Church has deserted the historic norms and usages characteristic of historic Methodism. It should be observed that Methodism uniquely combines both form and freedom in worship within the framework of a theological emphasis on evangelism, personal religious experience, and the sacramental life. The aim of the Commission is not to dogmatize, propangandize, or agitate; rather, it wishes to provide a leaven of intelligent leadership and a source of information for those who wish to help in improving our common worship.

The Commission on Worship hereby calls attention to the following basic principles of worship which ought to be sought and understood by ministers and laymen alike:

1. The consciousness of the living God should determine the relevancy or irrelevancy of everything that is done in a public service of worship.
2. Public worship is directed toward the living God as an objective reality outside of and beyond ourselves; it is "unto Him." Its primary reference is not to man but to God.
3. The congregation should participate actively in worship.
4. Worship is activity within which preaching is to be regarded as a distinct function.
5. The arts, especially architecture and music, have a distinct function in aiding worship.
6. The final test of effective worship is the Christian effect upon the everyday life of the worshipper.

To this end, the Commission on Worship suggests the following practical steps toward the recovery of effective Christian Worship.

1. A Commission on Worship in every local church.
2. The General Board of Education should be encouraged to create adequate Courses on Christian Worship in its Leadership Training Curriculum.
3. The Vacation Church Schools and Confirmation Classes should give wide emphasis on training for worship.
4. Every local church should plan a Christian Workers' School with a Course on Christian Worship.
5. The Methodist Hymnal should be regularly used in every local church with a strong emphasis on the Wesleyan Hymns.
6. Each pastor should preach annually a series of Sermons dealing with the fundamentals of corporate worship.
7. Every pastor and every local church should re-emphasize Methodism's high

view of the Sacraments—Baptism, and Holy Communion. (The Commission deplors the notion of the baptism of children as a mere christening, dedication, or as a training for parenthood).

8. All pastors should encourage frequent celebrations of the Holy Communion by shifting from the essentially Reformed idea of periodic Communion to the traditional schedule of Methodist ones.
9. All new church buildings should be designed by Architects who know and appreciate the requirements for Christian Worship.
10. The Commission strongly urges every pastor and every local church to emphasize the high significance of the morning service of worship. This can be accomplished by remembering that the church School is the church **at study**; morning service is the church **at worship**.

The Commission offers its service to the Conference in the humble hope that it may be of some help in guiding persons and congregations in the pursuit of scriptural holiness and its witness in the sacramental life of the Christian community.

RESOLUTION CONCERNING LOUISBURG COLLEGE

'RESOLVED, that the North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Church in session of said Conference duly called and held in the City of Wilson, N. C., on the 23-26 days of June, 1958, does hereby consent and give its permission to a conveyance by Louisburg College, to the First Citizens Bank and Trust Company, Trustees, by Trust Indenture dated as of the 1st day of January, 1958, securing \$180,000 principal amount of Louisburg College Student Union Bonds of 1958 of those two certain tracts of land, a part of the property of Louisburg College located in the City of Louisburg, Franklin County, North Carolina, described as follows:

First

The following described land and premises with all the buildings, additions and improvements now or hereafter located thereon and with the easements, rights, ways and appurtenances thereunto belonging or appertaining, situate and being in the City of Louisburg, Louisburg Township, Franklin County, State of North Carolina, the same being described and bounded as follows:

BEGINNING AT A POINT IN A. W. Person's line, the said point being 702 feet from the west edge of the sidewalk of North Main Street; thence a new line south 32 deg. 45 min. west 288.5 feet to a railroad spike in the ground; thence north 75 deg. 20 min. west 225.8 feet to a railroad spike in the ground; thence north 29 deg. east 271.4 feet to a stake in A. W. Person's line; thence along the A. W. Person line south 61 deg. 15 min. east 241 feet to the point of Beginning, as shown by survey of Phil R. Inscoc, Registered Surveyor, July 2, 1957; map of said survey entitled "Map of lot extracted from the original Louisburg College Campus as the site for building a new cafeteria"; said tract and the building to be erected thereon being herein referred to as the Project.

Second

The right to use perpetually for the purpose of ingress and egress, to pass and repass, by foot, with animals, with vehicles, with any and all loads, and for any and all purposes, by the grantee Trustee, its successors and assigns, its servants, agents, employees, tenants and invitees, in common with the College, that certain driveway adjacent to the above tract described as follows:

BEGINNING at a point on the west property line of North Main Street, the southeast corner of the property of A. W. Person; runs thence north 61 deg. 15 min. west along A. W. Person's line 702 feet to a stake, the northeast corner of the new cafeteria lot, as surveyed by Phil R. Inscoc, Registered Land Surveyor, July 2, 1957; runs thence south 32 deg. 45 min. west along the line of the new cafeteria lot 50 feet to a point; runs thence south 61 deg. 15 min. east 702 feet, more or less, to a point on the western property line of North Main Street; runs thence in a north-eastern direction along the western property line of North Main Street 50 feet to the Beginning; being a strip of land lying along the northern property line of the property of Louisburg College and east of the new cafeteria building site.

RESOLVED FURTHER, that this consent and permission be evidenced of record by an instrument in writing from the Trustees of the North Carolina Annual Conference of The Methodist Church (who are hereby authorized to execute and deliver the same) to the First Citizens Bank and Trust Company, as Trustees

under said Indenture hereinbefore referred to, granting on behalf of the Conference the consent and permission to make said conveyance to the Trustees, and quitclaiming any rights which the Conference might have in the lands therein described insofar as said Trustee, its successors and assigns are concerned.'"

RESOLUTION CONCERNING NUMBERING SYSTEM OF INDIVIDUAL CHURCHES

Over a period of years, we have discovered the individual churches of the North Carolina Annual Conference are frequently changed from charge to charge and even district to district. Numerous churches bear the same name even within the same county, thus making the process of absolute identification even more difficult over this period of years.

In order that each church in the North Carolina Annual Conference of The Methodist Church may be perpetually identifiable, we recommend that the North Carolina Annual Conference in session at Wilson, June 23, 1958, endorse the following Numbering System as the official identifying classification number for each church within the bounds of the conference. As these numbers are recorded in subsequent Journals, no matter where a church may be situated with regard to charge or district, that specific church and its record can be readily located by research students within or outside of the annual conference.

This system has been carefully studied by the Board of Missions, the Town and Country Commission, the Conference Secretary, the Conference Statistician and the Conference Treasurer. It is our firm belief that such an endorsement would make possible a substantial improvement in the statistical reports of our conference, at least as it relates to long-range planning and study.

For these and other reasons, we recommend that this system be accepted by the conference and made official by its actions at this session.

1. A Statement by the Conference Treasurer

The report of funds received from the Conference year is indeed gratifying when we consider the trend of general business during the greater part of the Conference year. The reversal of the trend and the present outlook for farm production and crop prices offer the prospect of our economy being better than even our optimists had anticipated.

The total payment of apportionments and Benevolence acceptances was 96.3%—about 1% less than the preceding year. All benevolence funds received full payment by making transfers of about \$3200. from funds on hand. We regret the non-payment amounting to 3.7% of the total and suggest that in some instances the officials of the churches involved may wish to make delayed remittance of these items to fully discharge their obligation. We also suggest that plans be made to meet future commitments in full so that our Conference reports may closely approach 100% of full payment.

Our giving in many instances represents sacrifice but it helps us to grow in grace. Our appreciation goes to all who have participated.

Also to be remembered are the people, both laymen and ministers, who are sharing time and money with the Church in the conduct of Conference activities and the financial program. We appreciate their faithful service. Their work more than ours is responsible for the progress made in the management of our Conference finances. To all such persons including the members of our staff we say sincerely, Thank you and may God Bless you.

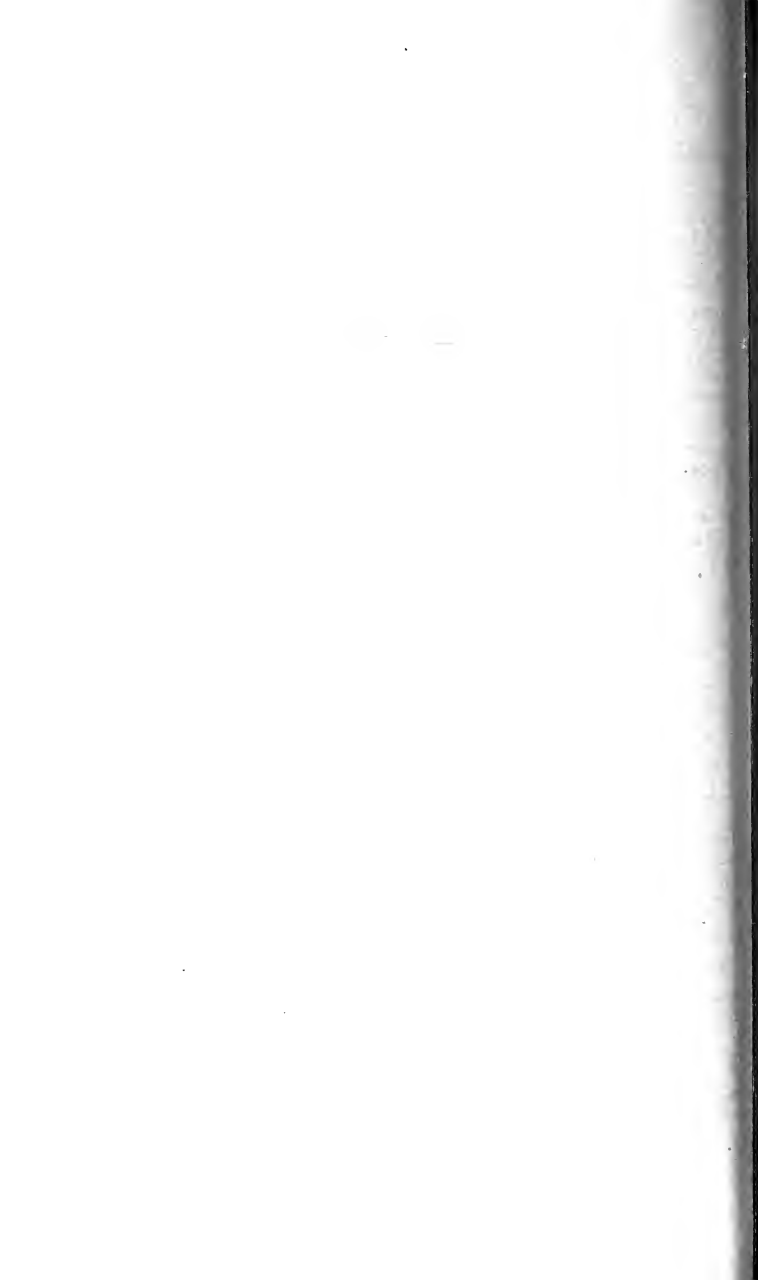

SCOPE OF EXAMINATION

Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances, some features of which are referred to in the outline that follows on specific items.

Cash on deposit was confirmed directly with the banks. Recorded cash receipts were traced to their subsequent deposit in the bank on a test basis, and disbursements were verified by test examination of cancelled checks and paid invoices or authorizations. Income from charges as shown by the Treasurer's records was confirmed directly with the pastors by use of the negative type confirmation.

We examined all replies and determined that necessary adjustments were made. Distribution of income from charges was audited by reference to the report of the Commission on World Service and Finance for the 1957 and 1958 session of the Annual Conference and by reference to proper authorization from the various boards of the Conference.

Investments of the Treasurer and the various boards and funds were either inspected or, if held by an outside agent, confirmed by direct confirmation during the course of our examination.

Cash receipts in transit represent 1957-58 collections received by the Treasurer subsequent to the balance sheet date and were set up from deposits into the bank accounts. Accounts and apportionments payable were set up from disbursements subsequent to the balance sheet date and by reference to proper authorization for the distribution of 1957-58 collections.

CERTIFICATE

In our opinion, the accompanying balance sheet and related statement of income, expense or distribution and fund balance present fairly the financial position of the North Carolina Conference, S.E.J., of the Methodist Church, Mrs. M. J. Cowell, Treasurer, at June 30, 1958, and the results of operations for the 1957-58 Conference year then ended, in conformity with accounting principles of the Conference applied on a basis consistent with that of the previous year.
