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

Historical Statement

THE NORTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST CHURCH (Southeastern Jurisdiction)

I Composition: The North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Church is composed of:

- (1) The eastern portion of the former North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Protestant Church.
- (2) The former North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Episcopal Church, South.
- (3) The coastal region of the former Blue Ridge-Atlantic Conference of The Methodist Episcopal Church.

II Organization: The Organizing dates of the three former Conferences were as follows:

- (1) The North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Protestant Church, 1828, at Whitaker's Chapel in Halifax County, North Carolina
- (2) The North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Episcopal Church, South, 1837, at Petersburg, Virginia
- (3) The Blue Ridge-Atlantic Conference of The Methodist Episcopal Church, 1879, at Greensboro, North Carolina, first named Southern Central Conference; two years later, 1881, renamed Blue Ridge-Atlantic Conference.

THE RALEIGH AREA

Following adjournment of the regular session of the North Carolina Annual Conference in Burlington, N. C., June 22-25, 1964, and before publication of the 1964 Conference Journal, the Raleigh Area was created by action of the Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference, meeting at Lake Junaluska, N. C., July 8-12, 1964. The North Carolina Conference and the Virginia Conference which composed the Richmond Area were separated. The Virginia Conference now composes the Richmond Area, and the North Carolina Conference now composes the Raleigh Area. (Editor)

RULES OF ORDER AND PROCEDURE FOR THE NORTH CAROLINA ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST CHURCH

I. RULES OF ORDER

1. Robert's Rules of Order shall apply to any situation not covered by these Rules.
2. No member who has the floor may be interrupted except for a breach of order, a misrepresentation, to direct the attention of the Conference to the fact that time has arrived for a special order, or to raise a very urgent question of high privilege.
3. No member shall speak a second time on the same question if any member who has not yet spoken desires the floor, nor more than twice on the same subject under the same motion, nor longer than ten minutes unless his time shall be extended by the Conference, except as provided in Rule 4.
4. When the report of the committee is under consideration and when all have spoken who desire to do so, or when (and after) the previous question has been ordered, the chairman and/or duly authorized member or members presenting the committee's report (and the minority report if there be one) shall be entitled to speak before the vote is taken.
5. A member claiming the floor at any time for what he believes is a very urgent question of high privilege, shall be allowed to indicate briefly the nature of the question, and if it be adjudged by the chair to be such, he may proceed at his pleasure, or until the chairman judges he has exhausted his privilege.
6. Voting shall be by a show of hands unless otherwise ordered by the Conference. A "yea" and "nay" vote, if taken, shall be by written ballot, which result will be published in the Conference Journal. A count vote may be ordered on call of any member supported by one-fifth of the members present and voting, in which case the delegates shall rise from their seats and stand while they are counted.

II. ORGANIZATION

1. The Secretary: The secretary of the Annual Conference shall be elected quadrennially, at the first session of the Conference after the meeting of the General Conference; and on nominations arising from the floor.
2. Assistant Secretaries: The secretary shall nominate his assistants and the Conference shall elect.
3. Statisticians: There shall be a conference statistician and an assistant statistician. The statistician shall be elected quadrennially at the first session after the meeting of the General Conference. The assistant statistician shall be elected annually upon nomination by the statistician.
4. Conference Stenographers: The conference secretary shall employ the conference stenographers.
5. Compensation: The Commission on World Service and Finance shall determine, subject to the approval of the Conference, the compensation given officers for their services and also the method and amount for meeting expenses of said officers. The conference treasurer shall pay these amounts.
6. Boards, Commissions, and Committees: The Bishop and his Cabinet shall determine the size of and nominate the members of all boards, commissions, and committees authorized by the General Conference, the Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference, and this Annual Conference, except in those cases in which the *Discipline* directs otherwise. The recommendations and nominations shall be subject to the approval of the Conference.
7. The Conference Board of Trustees: The Conference Board of Trustees shall be required to meet at least once a year other than the regular meeting at the session of the Annual Conference.

8. The Conference Treasurer and all others receiving and disbursing funds from our Conference shall be required to make audited statements annually, and to print the same in the Journal.
9. Program Committee: There shall be a Program Committee of the Conference consisting of the resident Bishop, the Conference Secretary, the District Superintendent of the District in which the session of the Conference is held, the pastor of the host church, and the Conference Lay Leader. This committee shall determine the compensation and expense for invited speakers and this shall be paid from the Conference expense fund.
0. Committee on Conference Objectives: There shall be a Conference Quadrennial Committee on Conference Objectives. See Paragraph 651—Question 47, page 198, 1960 Discipline.
1. Entertainment Committee: There shall be a Conference Entertainment Committee, composed of three ministers and two laymen. This committee shall be elected at the first session of the Conference following the General Conference, and shall serve for the Quadrennium. This committee shall receive invitations and determine the place and method of entertaining the Conference sessions. The committee is requested to determine the place of holding the next Conference not later than January 1, if possible.
2. Committee on Memoirs: The Conference Secretary and the District Superintendents shall constitute the Committee on Memoirs. The members of the committee shall be charged with the responsibility of providing for all the details of the memorial service. The Conference Secretary shall be the chairman of this committee.
3. Committee on Daily Minutes: A committee of three members shall be elected each year to examine the daily minutes of the sessions of the Conference and report daily to the Conference.
4. Courtesies and Resolutions: There shall be constituted a Committee on Courtesies and Resolutions, annually, at the first session of the Conference.
5. Committee on Appeals: There shall be appointed, quadrennially, a Committee on Appeals, composed of at least five members, whose duties shall be to hear appeals from the decisions of the several District Boards of Church Location and Building, or any other questions that may properly come before them.
6. American Bible Society: All matters regarding the relation of the Conference to the American Bible Society and its work shall be referred to the Board of Education.

III. REPORTS, RESOLUTIONS, MOTIONS, AMENDMENTS

1. All reports to be presented to the conference shall be sent to the conference secretary, typewritten and in triplicate, on or before the date approved for such by the Coordinating Council and published in the conference calendar.
2. All resolutions to be presented to the annual conference affecting the structure policy and function of any board or agency of the annual conference, shall be submitted in writing to the conference secretary with copies for all the delegates twenty-four hours prior to consideration by the annual conference, and not later than the second night session of the conference.
3. All motions presented to the annual conference, and amendments to any paper, shall be in writing (in triplicate) and placed in the hands of the conference secretary at the time of presentation.

IV. LAY DELEGATES TO THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE

1. Lay delegates, regular and reserve, from the pastoral charges to the Annual Conference shall be elected by the Quarterly Conference at last forty-five days prior to the session of the Annual Conference.
2. Each district superintendent shall complete the list of lay delegates to the Annual Conference, from his district, at least forty-five days before the Annual Conference

session, and shall immediately transmit the completed list, in triplicate, to the conference secretary.

3. Substitutions for lay delegates to the Annual Conference must be made in written form provided by the conference secretary, and must be approved and signed by the district superintendent. Such substitute delegates may function only in the absence of the regular delegates.

V. PASTORS' REPORTS TO THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE: STATISTICS

1. Each pastor shall complete Table I of his annual report to the Conference, and transmit the same to the conference statistician at least two weeks prior to the opening date of the Conference.
2. Charge and church treasurers shall make final remittance for the current year to the conference treasurer on or before the opening date of the annual conference, and each pastor shall complete and submit Table II to the conference statistician on or before the opening date of the annual conference.
3. Each table of the report shall be filled out by individual churches with totals for the charge.
4. Table II shall be made out in even dollars only.
5. Tables I and II shall be printed in the Conference Journal with individual church reports and charge totals as compiled by the conference statistician from the pastor's reports.

VI. THE CONFERENCE JOURNAL

1. Editor: The conference secretary shall be charged with the responsibility of editing and making contracts for the publication of the Conference Journal, in keeping with the regulations of the General Conference and of the Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference. The editor shall have full authority to condense reports, memoirs, and other papers when necessary.
2. One complimentary copy of the Conference Journal shall be sent to each of the following: The conference claimants, the general boards, the publishing house, lay members of the conference boards, lay delegates to the Annual Conference, the educational and church-related institutions of the North Carolina Conference. The conference secretary shall have discretionary authority to send copies to such other educational institutions as he may deem advisable. Six copies shall be sent to each pastor without charge. All other copies shall be sold at \$1.75 each, or single copies by mail at \$2.00 each. Monies accruing from the sale of Journal shall be deposited with the conference treasurer and credited to the Journal account.

VII. DISTRICTS

1. The number of districts shall be eleven.
2. A district conference shall be held annually, in each district.
3. Each pastoral charge shall elect annually two lay delegates to the district conference. These shall be in addition to those named by the Discipline as ex officio members.
4. The district and associate district lay leaders shall be elected annually by the Annual Conference on nomination of the district superintendents and the conference lay leaders.
5. The district superintendent of each district shall be required to furnish to the bishop, the conference treasurer, and the conference statistician, as early in the year as possible an official copy of the apportionments to the charges for World Service and Conference Benevolences and the amounts accepted by the charges, also the amounts approved by the charges for the several items of ministerial support. The figures furnished the conference statistician shall be used by him in making up his report to the Conference. Two of these copies are to be sent to the secretary of the Commission on World Service and Finance.

6. Each district superintendent, as early in the year as possible, shall furnish the bishop, the conference treasurer, and the conference statistician with a schedule of the salaries of pastors as set by the Quarterly Conferences. The figures furnished by the district superintendent to the conference statistician shall be used by him in making up his report to the Conference.
7. We call attention of the district superintendents to Paragraph 432 (1) 1960 **Discipline**, and state that we believe that a reasonable time for such consultation, before the appointments are to be read, could not be construed to be less than twenty-four hours.

VIII. AMENDMENTS

1. These rules of order and procedure may be amended by a two-thirds vote on the next day after a proposed amendment has been presented in writing; provided the rule fixing the number of districts may be amended by a majority vote; provided, further, a change in the number of districts may not be made later than the second morning of the Annual Conference session.

IX. WHEN THE RULES BECOME EFFECTIVE

1. These rules of order and procedure of the North Carolina Annual Conference shall become effective immediately upon passage by the vote of the majority of the Conference.

MINUTES OF THE SPECIAL SESSION OF THE NORTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE

Edenton Street Methodist Church, Raleigh, N. C.

Tuesday, November 19, 1963

Morning Session

Opening: The North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Church, Southeastern Jurisdiction, convened in special session at Edenton Street Methodist Church, Raleigh, North Carolina, November 19, 1963, at 10:00 a.m., with Bishop Paul N. Garber, resident bishop, presiding.

Hymn No. 162, "O For A Thousand Tongues to Sing," was sung. Graham S. Eubank, host district superintendent, led in prayer.

Roll of the Conference: W. C. Wilson, Conference Secretary, made announcement concerning attendance registration. Cards for registering attendance were distributed.

Purpose of Special Session: Bishop Garber stated that the purpose of this special session was to consider the mission of the ministry. He then read excerpts from the brochure, "The Bishops' Mission on the Ministry," prepared by the Council of Bishops. The agenda for the day was announced by Bishop Garber.

Bishop Garber presented Bishop Eugene Slater of the Topeka Area, who spoke on the theme, "The Challenge of Our Parish Ministry."

Bishop Walter Earl Ledden, retired, who was presented to the Conference by Bishop Garber, addressed the assembly on the theme, "To Be Supplied." Bishop Ledden is now Professor of Worship at Wesley Theological Seminary, Washington, D. C.

Bishop Garber presented as the third speaker of the morning session Dr. Norman L. Trott, President of Wesley Theological Seminary. He addressed the Conference on the topic, "The Intellectual Training of the Ministry."

Registration Cards: W. C. Wilson asked that attendance registration cards be collected. W. C. Wilson, T. M. Vick, Jr., host pastor, and Bishop Garber made announcements.

Benediction: Bishop Garber gave the benediction.

Afternoon Session

Group Meetings: During the afternoon session, which convened at 1:20, the Conference divided into three groups. The ministers, under the leadership of Bishop Garber and Bishop Slater, met in one group to consider the topic, "What is the Role of the Minister in Ministerial Recruitment?" The ministers' wives, under the guidance of Bishop James K. Matthews, met in another group. The third group, led by Dr. Norman L. Trott, was made up of the laymen and laywomen attending the special session.

Recommendation: Bishop Garber called on A. H. Stone to present a recommendation that ministers and laymen of the North Carolina Annual Conference make contributions to the Lenora Auten and Lloyd Dunn Scholarship Fund at Methodist College. This to be done to perpetuate the Christian ideals and love of the late Millard C. Dunn, superintendent of the Fayetteville District at the time of his death on November 6, 1963. This plan has the hearty approval of Bishop Garber and the district superintendents.

Closing Address: Bishop Garber presented Bishop James K. Matthews of the Boston Area. Bishop Matthews addressed the Conference on the theme, "The Glory of the Parish Ministry."

Benediction: After the singing of one stanza of "God Be With You Till We Meet Again," Bishop Garber gave the benediction, and the special session of the North Carolina Conference adjourned at 4:00 p.m.

FIRST DAY, AFTERNOON SESSION

Monday, June 22, 1964

At 1:15 the organist of Front Street Methodist Church, Burlington, Mrs. Wilbur N. Cooper, presented fifteen minutes of organ music consisting of "Trumpet Tune" by Henry Purcell.

Conference Convened: The 1964 session of the North Carolina Conference of the Southeastern Jurisdiction of The Methodist Church was called to order at Front Street Methodist Church, Burlington, North Carolina, by Bishop Paul N. Garber, resident bishop of the Richmond Area, at 1:15 on the afternoon of June 21, 1964. This was the one hundred and thirty-ninth session (twenty-sixth since unification in 1939) of the Conference. SECOND DAY, MORNING SESSION

Tuesday, June 23, 1964

At 8:15 the organist of Front Street Methodist Church rendered a fifteen minute organ prelude entitled "Our Father Who Art In Heaven" by Mendelssohn.

Opening: The conference convened at 8:30 a.m. with Bishop Paul N. Garber as the presiding officer. After the singing of Hymn Number 381, "The Church's One Foundation," H. M. McLamb led the morning prayer.

Commission on Worship: Bishop Garber recognized J. J. Rudin, Chair-

man, who gave the report of the Commission on Worship. The chairman then presented Dr. W. R. Cannon, Dean of the Candler School of Theology, Emory University, Atlanta, Ga. Dean Cannon spoke to the conference on the general theme, "Let Us Recover Our Methodist Heritage in Worship." He gave emphasis to the content and greater use of the New Methodist Hymnal and the New Book of Worship, both approved by the recent session of the General Conference. The chairman moved the adoption of the report. It was adopted.

Announcement: J. H. Waldrop made announcement concerning tickets to the High Point College banquet.

Commission on World Service and Finance: Bill Price, chairman of the Commission on World Service and Finance, presented the report of the commission, and moved its adoption.

C. W. Robbins moved for the deletion of paragraph 5, section II, of the report which reads as follows: "The Commission recommends that no conference agency's budget incorporate within it funds to be appropriated to a non-conference agency, without specific approval of the Commission on World Service and Finance." The motion was seconded. The chairman, Bill Price, spoke against the motion. The motion was adopted, and paragraph 5, Section II, was deleted.

O. L. Hathaway moved that the fund of \$2,100, appropriated for the C. Council of Churches, be set up as a separate item in the budget of the local churches. C. W. Robbins spoke against the motion. Ralph Fleming spoke against the motion, and asked the author of the motion to explain why he made the motion. O. L. Hathaway explained that he felt the people should be able to say where their money is to be spent. R. E. Gishman spoke against the motion. O. L. Hathaway spoke for the motion. V. M. Jeffries spoke against the motion. H. G. Ruark moved the previous question (the Hathaway motion). His motion carried. The vote was taken on the Hathaway motion. It was defeated.

C. H. Mercer moved that the following statement be substituted for paragraph 5, Section II, of the Report: "The commission recommends that no conference agency's budget incorporate within it funds to be appropriated to a non-conference agency, without specific approval of the Annual Conference." The Mercer motion was seconded and approved.

H. G. Ruark moved for a reconsideration of the Mercer motion. It was defeated.

The report of the commission was then adopted as amended.

R. S. Pullman presented a resolution concerning special offerings as follows: "Whereas many churches in the conference include the special offerings as set amounts in their budget, and Whereas the financial need of each cause varies from the others, Be it therefore resolved that the Commission on World Service and Finance prepare as a guide a suggested formula for distribution to each special offering from the total amount a church may wish to give to these special offerings and report the same at the 1965 session of the Annual Conference."

J. W. Page spoke against the resolution. The resolution was defeated.

Paine College: Bishop Garber presented E. C. Calhoun, president of Paine College, who spoke to the conference. He expressed thanks to this conference for its support toward the chapel fund at Paine College.

Memorial Service: Bishop Garber read appropriate scripture selections for which the organist of Front Street Methodist Church presented the

organ prelude, "Hark, A Voice Saith All Men Are Mortal" by J. S. Bach. Hymn Number 170, "Crown Him With Many Crowns," was sung and was followed with a prayer by H. M. Howard. Mrs. Robert Fonville sang "I Know that my Redeemer Liveth" (The Messiah) by Handel.

SECOND DAY, AFTERNOON SESSION

Conference Brotherhood: The Annual meeting of the Conference Brotherhood convened at 2:15 with K. R. Wheeler, president, presiding. Dr. David McAdams rendered a violin solo. Hymn No. 267, "Rise Up, O Men of God," was sung. J. M. Cline led the prayer for the Brotherhood. N. L. Jones, secretary-treasurer, made the report for the brotherhood and moved the adoption of this report. The report was adopted.

Opening: The afternoon session convened at 2:50 p.m., with Bishop Garber in the chair.

Anniversary of the Board of Hospitals and Homes: Bishop Garber called on B. F. Musser, president of the Board of Hospitals and Homes, to preside during the anniversary program. Hymn No. 416, "Blest Be the Name that Binds," was sung after which H. E. Spence led the prayer.

Report No. 1 of the Board of Hospitals and Homes was presented by K. R. Wheeler. Report No. 1 was adopted. Report No. 2 was presented and adopted. Report No. 3 was presented and adopted. Report No. 4 was presented and adopted.

J. W. Lineberger, superintendent of the Methodist Home for Children, presented the section on the work of the Home. Frank Daniels presented a group from the Home, directed by Mrs. Frank Daniels. They gave a coral reading. Miss Lillian Pruitt brought greetings from the Home, and then sang "His Eye is on the Sparrow."

J. F. Coble presided during the presentation of the section on the Methodist Retirement Homes, Inc. He told the conference of three men who had meant so much in the establishment of the Home, namely, W. W. Fowler, M. C. Dunn, and W. V. McRae. Committee on Conference Relations: C. E. Vale made the report for the Committee on Conference Relations. It was adopted. Earl Meekins and C. R. Olson were retired.

Committee on Church Architecture: C. D. Barclift made the report for the Committee on Church Architecture. It was adopted.

Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications: The Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications recommended Theodore Joseph Collier for Deacon's orders and admission on trial.

Question 31: "Who have been elected elders?" was called. The answer was: Samuel Lee Wood and Hugh Lawrence Bond.

Announcements: L. C. Vereen made announcement concerning parking. J. A. Auman announced the present attendance as: Ministers, 592; Laymen, 298; and Visitors, 50.

Benediction: D. L. Fouts gave the benediction.

SECOND DAY, EVENING SESSION

Tuesday, June 23, 1964

At 7:15 the organist of Front Street Methodist Church presented an organ prelude: "Chorale and Adagio" (Sonata No. 2) by F. Mendelssohn.

Opening: The evening session convened at 7:30 with Bishop Garber as the presiding officer.

Presentation: Bishop Garber greeted and presented Dr. Charles D. White, Secretary of the Western North Carolina Conference, and the Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference. He also presented Charles D. White, Jr.

Anniversary of the Board of Lay Activities: The anniversary of the Board of Lay Activities was observed with Roy L. Turnage, Conference Lay Leader, presiding. The choir presented two anthems: "Sing Unto God" by Gordon Young; and "Cherubim Song Number Seven" by Bortniansky.

The evening prayer was led by Joe W. Holmes, lay leader of the Burlington District. The Hymn 287, "A Charge to Keep I Have," was sung A solo, "The Stranger of Galilee," by Morris, was sung by Mr. Robert Wooten of St. Paul Methodist Church, Goldsboro.

Methodist Foundation: S. L. Gullidge presented the first part of Report No. 1 of the Methodist Foundation. It was adopted. M. J. Cowell presented the second part of Report No. 1. It was adopted. F. Olin Hunt presented Report No. 2. It was adopted.

In-Service Training Committee: W. K. Quick presented the report of the In-Service Training Committee. It was adopted.

Local Church Emphasis Committee: Key W. Taylor presented the report of the Local Church Emphasis Committee. It was adopted.

Board of Managers, North Carolina Pastors' School: Paul Carruth made the report of the Board of Managers, North Carolina Pastors' School. It was adopted.

Announcement: W. M. Howard made announcement concerning committee on Conference entertainment.

Benediction: Bishop Garber gave the benediction, and the conference adjourned.

THIRD DAY, MORNING SESSION

Wednesday, June 24, 1964

At 8:15 the organist of Front Street Methodist Church presented an organ interlude entitled, "Jesus Makes My Heart Rejoice" by Robert Schumann.

Opening: The Conference convened at 8:30 with Bishop Paul N. Garber in the chair. Hymn No. 12, "Joyful, Joyful, We Adore Thee," was sung by Malloy Owen III, led the morning prayer. A solo, "O Lord Most Holy," by Cesar Franck, was sung by Mrs. Robert Fonville.

Television, Radio and Film Commission: R. S. Brodie, chairman, presented the report of the Television, Radio and Film Commission. He moved the adoption of the report. It was adopted.

Special Appointment: The conference approved the appointment of W. M. Jeffries to the position of Peace Education Secretary, American Friends Service Committee, Southeast Region.

Anniversary of Board of Education: The anniversary of the Board of Education was observed. In the absence of the president, Leon Russell, because of illness, Paul Carruth, vice-president, presided during the anniversary program. He presented Dr. Leon M. Adkins, General Secretary of Board of Education, Nashville, Tenn., who addressed the conference on the theme, "Christian Education in a New World Context."

Conrad Glass, Conference Director of Youth Work, presented Jimmy Creech of Goldsboro, who spoke to the conference on the subject, "What the Senior High Migrant Work Camp Meant To Me."

C. P. Morris, Executive Secretary of the Board, made a statement, asking that the Board's report be studied in the local church.

O. K. Ingram presented a resolution that the charter of the Board be amended (see report of Board).

He also moved to amend section B, report number II. (See Report of Board.)

Ingram offered a resolution to add Section F, report number II, concerning the charter of Methodist College Foundation; and to add Section G, report number II, concerning Charter of the North Carolina Wesleyan Foundation (see report of Board).

A. P. Brantley offered a substitute motion concerning the college sustaining fund: "That the College Sustaining Fund be distributed as follows: Duke Divinity School, \$21,000; Greensboro College, \$10,000; High Point College, \$10,000; Louisburg College, \$112,200; Methodist College, \$138,000; North Carolina Wesleyan College, \$138,000; for the office of the College Crusade, \$6,800; total, \$436,000. It was seconded. C. P. Morris spoke in favor of retaining help for High Point College. J. Nelson Gibson spoke in favor of the substitute motion. Paul Carruth spoke in opposition to the substitute motion. M. W. Lawrence raised question: "Are the colleges making provision for the person appointed to raise the \$2 million already pledged?" A. P. Brantley answered by saying that the colleges would pay only the salary of the man, but not the office expenses. J. W. Page spoke in favor of the substitute motion. Key Taylor moved to amend the Brantley substitute motion so that vote would be taken seriatim—item by item. The Taylor amendment was carried. A. F. Fisher raised the question as to who would be responsible for money raised by the college appointee. Bishop Garber, Paul Carruth and T. A. Collins answered. It was stated that combined effort will be made by the three colleges to collect all unpaid pledges. The special man will not be responsible for the collection of pledges but will be responsible to cultivate the best interests of Christian Higher Education among the churches in the conference.

O. K. Ingram spoke against the substitute motion.

C. S. Boggs moved previous question (Brantley substitute). It was sustained. Paul Carruth spoke.

The vote was taken on the Brantley substitute motion item by item as ordered: Duke Divinity School, \$21,000 (same recommendation as Board of Education approved); Greensboro College, \$10,000, defeated; High Point College, \$10,000, defeated; Louisburg College, \$112,200, defeated; Methodist College, \$138,000 defeated; North Carolina Wesleyan College, \$138,000, defeated; College Crusade office, 6,800, defeated.

J. W. Page moved to amend the Report as follows: "That the granting of these increased funds to High Point College and Greensboro College be made contingent upon the granting of a like sum upon the part of the Western North Carolina Conference to Methodist College, North Carolina Wesleyan College, and Louisburg College.

Harvey Johnson spoke.

A. F. Fisher spoke.

Jack Crum moved the previous question. The previous question was sustained. Vote was taken on Page amendment. It was lost.

The report of the Board of Education was adopted.

A. P. Brantley moved that the present office of Christian Higher Education located in the Methodist Building, Raleigh, N. C., and all its equipment become the office of the College Development Crusade and that it be made available to the Executive Director of the Association of Methodist Colleges of the North Carolina Conference.

W. M. Wells spoke. J. Nelson Gibson inquired: "Who gets money from the sale of any surplus items in the office?" Carruth answered by saying that it would go to the colleges.

Motion was made for previous question. The motion was carried.

The Brantley motion concerning the transfer of office and office equipment was adopted.

Duke Divinity School: Bishop Garber presented Dr. Robert E. Cushman of the Duke Divinity School. He spoke to the conference.

The Duke Endowment: Bishop Garber presented Dr. M. Wilson Nesbitt, who gave the report of the Duke Endowment. He moved that the report go to the record.

J. M. Ormond Fund: M. Wilson Nesbitt presented the report on the J. M. Ormond Fund. He moved that it be placed on the record.

Personal Privilege: J. W. Page asked for a special privilege to explain his motion about High Point College and Greensboro College. It was granted.

Anniversary of Historical Society: Bishop Garber recognized A. F. Fisher, president of the Historical Society, who presided during the anniversary program. A. F. Fisher introduced Bishop T. Otto Nall of the Minnesota Area, Minneapolis, Minnesota. Bishop Nall addressed the conference on the theme, "Crises and Changes Since Unification."

A. F. Fisher, president, presented the report of the Society. He moved its adoption. It was adopted.

Presentation: Bishop Garber presented Bishop and Mrs. James W. Henley of Jacksonville, Florida, to the Conference.

Anniversary of the Deaconess Board: Bishop Garber presented Miss Ethelynde Ballance, president, to preside. She called on Miss Louise Sparrer to lead in prayer. Miss Ballance presented the report of the Board, and moved its adoption. It was adopted.

The president of the Board introduced Miss Betsy Ewing, Dean of Students, Scarritt College, Nashville, Tennessee, who addressed the conference. Hymn number 458, "We Thank Thee, Lord," was sung.

Announcement: Bishop Garber made announcement concerning a meeting of the Board of Christian Social Concerns.

Benediction: V. E. Queen gave the benediction.

THIRD DAY, AFTERNOON SESSION

Wednesday, June 24, 1964

Beginning at 2:15, the organist of Front Street Methodist Church used for a prelude "Benedictus" by Max Reger.

Opening: The Conference convened at 2:30 with Bishop Paul N. Garber as the presiding officer.

Message: J. N. Gibson moved that the Conference Secretary send a message to Leon Russell, host pastor, who is not able to attend this session of the Conference because of illness. The motion was adopted.

Presentation: Bishop Garber presented Rev. Herbert S. Southgate of the Virginia Conference, now associated with Protestants Organized for the Separation of Church and State. He spoke to the Conference.

Commission on Christian Higher Education: Bishop Garber called on V. E. Queen, Chairman of the Commission on Christian Education, to preside. Dr. L. Stacy Weaver, President of Methodist College, Fayetteville, was presented. He addressed the conference.

A. P. Brantley presented the report for the Commission. G. S. Eubank moved that a statement of appreciation be drafted by the Commission for the unselfish services of A. P. Brantley who has served this last conference year without salary, and that this become a part of the report. The motion was adopted.

Reports No. 1 and 2 were adopted.

Anniversary of the Board of Christian Social Concerns: The anniversary of the Board of Christian Social Concerns was observed with James H. Bailey presiding. The prayer was led by Vernon Tyson. A solo, "The Good Shepherd," by B. Vandewater, was sung by Mrs. Earle Silver.

Bishop Garber presented Dr. Albert P. Shirkey, pastor of Mount Vernon Place Methodist Church, Washington, D. C. Dr. Shirkey addressed the Conference, basing his message on the two great commandments of Jesus. His subject was: "Social Implications."

The report of the Board was given by James H. Bailey. He then presented an amendment to the report of the Board, that item 6 be added to the section entitled "The Division of Temperance and General Welfare:" Item 6. "Join the brethren of the Western North Carolina Conference and the historical position of the Methodist Church to urge trustees of Duke University to reconsider its policy on the permissiveness of alcoholic beverages in the student dormitories." The amendment was adopted.

J. H. Bailey also amended the report: Item 4, The Division of Human Relations and Economic-Welfare, to read: "To encourage the observance of the laws of our land in all areas especially in regard to the Civil Rights Act." Also to delete the sentence, "We further urge all our Methodist people to refuse acceptance of any act rejecting the laws of our nation or state." These amendments were adopted.

The chairman moved for the adoption of the report. It was seconded. Leo C. Thompson presented the following amendment to the report to replace paragraph labelled "Recommendation I" (Book of Reports, page 20): "A Resolution Concerning the Report of the 'Commission of Thirty-Six'."

"Whereas, The General Conference of the Methodist Church, meeting

in Pittsburgh, Pa., re-affirmed the principle of voluntarism in its "Plan of Action for the Elimination of the Central Jurisdiction," and

"Whereas, The Delegation of the North Carolina Conference, SEJ, overwhelmingly supported the legislation adopted,

"Therefore, be it resolved, That the North Carolina Conference, SEJ, in session at the Front Street Methodist Church, Burlington, N. C., June 22-25, 1964, pledge its full support to the implementation of the "Plan of Action" proposed by the "Commission of Thirty-Six" and adopted by the 1964 General Conference of the Methodist Church. Be it resolved further, that the North Carolina Conference, SEJ, establish a Commission as requested by the "Plan of Action," to wit: "That each Annual Conference designate a Committee or Commission to meet with the designated group from the other Conferences involved to discuss and work out together the problems and adjustments involved in the transfer of Central Jurisdictional Conferences into the *regional jurisdictions* ("Plan of Action," etc., page 30; italics added).

1. This Commission shall be called "The Commission On Inter-jurisdictional Relations, North Carolina Conference, SEJ."

2. It shall be composed of thirty (30) members as follows: The Bishop, one (1) representative from the Bishop's Cabinet, the Conference Lay leader, the President of the Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service, two (2) members of the General Conference Legislative "Committee on Conferences" from the North Carolina Conference, the President and one (1) layman appointed by the President of each of the following Boards and Agencies: Board of Education, Commission on Christian Higher Education, Board of Evangelism, Board of Hospitals and Homes, Board of Lay Activities, Commission on Minimum Salary, Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications, Board of Missions, Board of Pensions, Board of Christian Social Concerns, Commission on Town and Country, Commission on World Service and Finance.

3. The Commission shall be given adequate financing by the Commission on World Service and Finance to carry out fully and efficiently the responsibilities assigned to it.

4. The Commission shall meet for the purpose of organization immediately upon adjournment of this conference and shall present a Progress Report and its Recommendations for further action to each Annual Conference of the 1964-68 Quadrennium.

The following signatures were affixed: Thomas A. Collins, Robert E. Cushman, Ralph L. Fleming, C. Wade Goldston, Mark W. Lawrence, C. Morris, Cecil W. Robbins, Key W. Taylor, Leo C. Thompson, Mrs. H. C. Turlington, Roy L. Turnage, Vernon C. Tyson.

It was seconded. Leo Thompson then spoke to the amendment.

J. H. Bailey asked Leo Thompson a question: "What is the difference between this amendment and the report submitted by the Board?" Leo Thompson answered in substance as follows: "The substantial difference is at two points, I think. First of all, the substitute motion pledges our Annual Conference to the full implementation of the Plan of Action over the period of the 1964-1968 Quadrennium. Secondly, the crucial difference is in the Committee which is to be constituted. It is the feeling and conviction of those who have signed it that we need a very broadly representative Committee in order to get this job done. Now, every Board, every Agency will be directly affected in its own life by the implementation of

this action. Every Board and every Agency needs to be adequately represented on this Committee if the job is to be done effectively and well. These are the two crucial differences which I see."

The amendment was adopted.

J. H. Waldrop made amendment to the section "The Division of Human Relations and Economics Affairs," No. 2. This section to be replaced by the following: "The North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Church, sensitive to the racial crisis facing the nation, and in token of its commitment to the ideals and practices of the Methodist Church, hereby acknowledges and accepts its responsibility for the principles of Christian love and racial justice as adopted by the 1964 General Conference of the Methodist Church, and as stated in para. 2126 of the *Methodist Discipline*, namely that "we are all one in Christ," that "the house of God must be open to the whole family of God," that membership and Holy Communion be offered to all without regard to race. (Cf. paragraphs 1, 2, and 3 of the Report of the Committee on Christian Social Concerns, *The Daily Christian Advocate*, p. 120. We also humbly join with the Bishops of the Methodist Church, confessing "with deep penitence that our performance has not kept pace with our profession." Therefore, in token of our contrition and obedience, we hereby accept the call of the General Conference and the *Discipline* of the Methodist Church, to "maintain local Church service and activities and local Church membership, open to persons of all races, with equal opportunity for all to participate fully in every aspect of local Church life," and to "endeavor to eliminate racial segregation in all public and Methodist Schools everywhere." (Cf. paragraphs 6 and 14 of the Report of the Committee on Christian Social Concerns, p. 120 f. of the *Daily Christian Advocate*.)"

Robert Osborne spoke. J. H. Waldrop then spoke on his amendment. C. S. Hubbard moved that the vote be by orders. The motion was carried. Reginald Ponder spoke against the Waldrop amendment. W. M. Jeffries spoke for the amendment.

Jack Crum moved that the Waldrop amendment be tabled. It was tabled.

O. K. Ingram made motion relating to paragraph 3, Recommendation II: That word "urges" be deleted; and that the phrase "within the prescribed period of three years" be deleted, and then presented a resolution as follows: "Resolved, that our N. C. Conference shall vote to implement the action of the General Conference by voting immediately to approve the transfer of the N. C. Conference (CJ) along with other Conferences of the Central Jurisdiction that lie within the boundaries of our jurisdiction into the Southeastern Jurisdiction."

He then spoke to the resolution. H. L. Swain spoke against the resolution. The Ingram motion was voted on by standing vote. The result was: For, 167; Against, 178.

T. M. Vick moved the previous question and all that was before us. The motion was carried.

The entire report of the Board as amended was approved.

J. H. Bailey made an announcement.

Citation: C. S. Hubbard asked that Mr. and Mrs. D. S. Coltrane come to the front. Mr. Coltrane was presented a Citation for distinguished services in the field of Christian Social Concerns. He responded graciously, and was given an ovation by the Conference.

Committee on Conference Entertainment: W. M. Howard presented the report of the Committee on Conference Entertainment. Question 48, "Where shall the next session of the Annual Conference be held?" W. S. Potter extended invitation for Dr. Wendell Patton, President, that Conference be held at High Point College. T. M. Vick issued invitation for the 1965 Conference to be held at Edenton Street Church in Raleigh. The Conference voted to meet at Edenton Street Church next year.

Visitors: Rev. Wilson O. Weldon and Rev. J. E. Carroll of the Western North Carolina Conference were recognized as visitors.

Appreciation: C. W. Goldston moved that a word of appreciation be sent to High Point College for their invitation. The motion was carried.

Benediction: Bishop Garber gave the benediction.

HERMAN BRANDON BAUM

1897 — 1963

Herman Brandon Baum was born in Princess Anne County, Virginia, on May 28, 1897, the son of Edward Mion and Gertrude Baum. After completing his elementary and high school education in local county and Norfolk city schools, he worked as a traveling salesman and saw military service during World War 1 in the Army Medical Corps.



After the war, in response to the call to preach, he entered Randolph-Macon College; upon graduation, he went to Emory University for graduate study. After graduating from the seminary, he became Director of Religious Education in First Methodist Church, Wilson. While serving at the post he was admitted to the North Carolina Conference and ordained deacon in 1927; in 1931 he was ordained elder. In the meantime, he did two very important things: he became a pastor in the itinerant ministry of the North Carolina Conference and he married Miss Lota Leigh Drauhon of Whitakers in 1929.

For the next thirty-four years this dedicated couple worked enthusiastically together in local church, district, and conference enterprises. Two daughters came to bless their home: Mrs. Harold Gene Barbour of Newton, North Carolina, and Mrs. Bill Taylor, Jr., of Huntsville, Alabama. These thirty-four years were spent serving the following pastorates: South Camden, Currituck-Kitty Hawk, Four Oaks, Cary, Millbrook, Selma, Kipling, Norlina, and Ebenezer. The first two of these pastorates are in the Elizabeth City District. All the others were located in the Raleigh District at the time he served them. His retirement in 1963 ended twenty-nine years of continuous service in that district, but it did not end his preaching ministry. Almost every Sunday found him in the pulpit.

On August 25, 1963, while preaching in Rocky Mount's St. Paul, he suffered a stroke which ended his earthly life a few hours later. Funeral services in Whitakers Methodist Church on August 27 were conducted by the Reverend J. F. Thompson, Jr., pastor, and the Reverend W. D. Wise, pastor of St. Paul Methodist Church where brother Baum was stricken the previous Sunday. The grave committal service was conducted by President Charles Thrift of Florida Southern College, a long-time friend of the family.

The outstanding thing about Herman Baum was his great love for people. He had a deep and compelling desire to see souls saved and to see persons living happy and abundant lives in the church. Dedicated to this high purpose, he became the channel through which God's redeeming grace and love flowed into many lives. In the church at large, he had a dual interest: education and missions. Indeed, he postponed retirement a year to give guidance to plans for constructing an education building at Ebenezer Church just outside Raleigh. The church has appropriately named the building for him. Every congregation which he served was always aware of opportunities to serve beyond their community. Aided by the good wife, who had been at his side throughout his pastoral ministry, he initiated many projects in which a North Carolina Methodist congregation extended a helping hand to mission congregations overseas.

Joyously he lived; and the final act of his ministry was to demonstrate to those in his last congregation that one may be calm and confident and unafraid as death approaches. He is one of those about whom it may be truly said:

More homelike seems the vast unknown
 Since they have entered there;
 To follow them were not so hard,
 Wherever they may fare.

They cannot be where God is not,
 On any sea or shore;
 Whate'er betides, Thy love abides,
 Our God, for evermore.

GROVER CLEVELAND KINLAW

1911—1963

The Reverend Grover Cleveland Kinlaw was born September 25, 1911, in Robeson County, North Carolina, a son of Emory Mitchell and Sally Parnell Kinlaw. He received his elementary education from the schools of Robeson County and was a graduate of Smith's High School near Lumberton. He graduated from Wake Forest College in 1940. He was married to Miss Annie Dew of Lumberton in the spring of 1932.



Brother Kinlaw was ordained a minister in the Missionary Baptist Church in 1941. He applied for admission into the ministry of the Methodist Church and was admitted into the North Carolina Conference at Wilson in 1942. He served faithfully the following charges: Oriental, Bynum, Goldston, Murfreesboro, Moncure, Gaston, and Glenwood.

It was while he was serving his third year as pastor of Glenwood in Rockingham, North Carolina, that he was called to the life beyond on September 17, 1963. Funeral services were held in Glenwood Church, September 19, conducted by Rev. C. W. Wooten, pastor of Fellowship Methodist Church, Hamlet; Rev. C. D. Roettger, pastor of West Rockingham Methodist

Church; and Rev. McDonald McLamb, Community Church, Rockingham. He was buried in Brookwood Cemetery in Lumberton, N. C.

Brother Kinlaw is survived by his wife, Mrs. Annie Dew Kinlaw; two daughters, Mrs. Bruce Harrington, of Raleigh, and Miss Doris Sandra Kinlaw, of the home; two sons, Grover Kinlaw, Jr., a medical specialist with the U. S. Army, at Fort Bragg, and Alton E. Kinlaw, of the home; his mother, Mrs. Sally Parnell Kinlaw, of Robeson County; and one grandchild.

When Brother Kinlaw asked for his first appointment in the ministry of the Methodist Church, he had only one request—a place to serve and preach the gospel of Christ. He did not exalt himself. He was an humble soul, and that was a great asset to any preacher.

Grover's one desire was to be a good minister of Jesus Christ. He remembered the words of Jesus, "He that humbleth himself shall be exalted." Also, "Take my yoke upon you, and learn of me; for I am meek and lowly of heart; and you shall find rest unto your souls."

Grover served to the limit of his ability and hath entered into that rest which remaineth for the people of God.

JOHN DeVON CRANFORD

1893—1963

The Reverend John DeVon Cranford was born in Davidson County, North Carolina on June 24, 1893, the son of Allison Cranford and Hannah Holton Cranford. After attending high school in Farmer, North Carolina, he served in World War I.



He began his ministry by joining the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church in Greensboro in 1925. Continuing his education through the Conference Course of Study and at High Point College, he was ordained an elder in 1928.

He will be remembered by the people he served for his dedication to the cause for which he labored on the following charges: Weaverville, 3 years; Kernersville, 2 years; Lincolnton, 3 years; Vance, 4 years; Perquimans, 6 years; Faison, 3 years; Alamance, 3 years; Glen Raven, 1 year; and Shady Grove, 1 year.

It was following the untimely death of his wife and helpmate Eula M. Cranford, March 1, 1952, while they were serving at Glen Raven, that Mr. Cranford's health began to fail. He was unable to continue his work in the ministry which he had served so well for twenty-eight years.

His friends and church members described him as a modest, humble man, even-tempered and agreeable, with good disposition and personality. He enjoyed preaching the Gospel and was an excellent pastor. He loved the people he served, and was loved by them. He enjoyed the great outdoors, especially horseback riding, hunting and fishing. He felt the presence of God at all times and sought to share this presence with others.

In 1959 Brother Cranford came to the Methodist Retirement Home in Durham to live. Although illness had impaired his reason, and robbed him of his vigor, he continued to attend the Home's religious services and could sing from memory the old hymns of the church. His face seemed to glow once again during these services, as though he were recalling the happy days of his ministry.

When Mr. Cranford applied for admission to the Home a life long friend wrote, "I have known the applicant since early childhood. He grew up in a poor, Christian home and I have always admired him for his decision to enter the ministry. He has rendered a commendable service."

Final services were conducted at the McClure Funeral Home in Graham, North Carolina by the Reverend H. L. Watson. He was buried in the Denton Cemetery, Denton, North Carolina.

Mr. Cranford is survived by one son, John V. Cranford of Norfolk, Virginia; two brothers, Carson of Farmer, North Carolina; Oscar of High Point, North Carolina and three grandchildren.

MARION CHARLES HENDERSON

1896—1963

The Reverend Marion Charles Henderson was active until a few hours before his passing on October 20, 1963, when a heart attack brought his earthly life to an end. His life of sixty-seven years was filled with struggle, hardship, victory and splendid accomplishment.

The life of Marion Charles Henderson began in Bessemer, North Carolina, May 5, 1896, the son of William and Dora Rhyne Henderson. He attended Rutherford College,



and High Point College and took extension courses from the Westminster Theological Seminary. Joining the Methodist Protestant Conference in 1925, he was ordained elder in Winston-Salem in 1928.

In 1914 he married Allie Maude Love. To this union three children were born, Marion Charles, Jr., of Raleigh, William R. of High Point, and Ruth (Mrs. Harry C.) Price of Myrtle Beach, South Carolina. All of these survive him along with 7 grandchildren.

During the 37 years of his ministry, Mr. Henderson touched the hearts of people in Democrat; Denton; Bess Chapel; Greenville, South Carolina; Stallings; Asheboro; and Saxapahaw in the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church, and West Burlington, Person Street in Fayetteville, Person Circuit at Roxboro, Carthage, East Rockingham and Kipling,

where he served as a Methodist minister. He retired in 1962, moving to Raleigh, North Carolina.

The final rites were conducted at Hayes-Barton Church by the Reverend Graham Subank, his district superintendent, the Reverend Paul Carruth, and Rev. A. S. Parker. Burial followed in Oakwood Cemetery in Concord, North Carolina.

Brother Henderson had two loves: his work as a Christian minister and his family. He gave himself unreservedly to both these causes. His religion was intensely personal. A hymn verse, "As in thy sight to live" would have expressed fitly his attitude.

His was a simple yet a sublime faith. He preached the Gospel of Jesus Christ with a passion. His highest moments came at the altar of the church where following his challenging evangelistic sermons and inspired altar calls he saw many make their profession of faith. In at least one year of his ministry he led the Conference in members received on profession of faith. His work of personal evangelism had power. He could kneel with a sinner in the field, as well as at the altar of a church, and lead him to a saving relationship with his Master.

He was a man of unusual gifts. He was endowed with an acute mind and a magnet personality, causing him to fill a large place in the program of the Kingdom of God.

Second only to his work in the ministry was his family. His family was a gift from God and no ancient patriarch ever assumed more the attitude of responsibility toward his sacred trust than he. During family illnesses and the financial burdens of securing an education for himself and his children, he kept an abiding faith in the goodness of God.

He had a sense of humor that was encouraging to himself and charming to his fellowman. At the same time, he had a humility that gave depth to his spiritual life and power to his preaching. As a preacher, he was truly a workman that need not to be ashamed, for he loved the word of God and he loved to preach. He was a prophet, a pastor, evangelist, a man with passion and a fruitful ministry.

I should like to add this personal word of testimony. He was truly my elder brother in the ministry. My love for him grew as I saw the results of his evangelistic fervor. He had a faith that bred optimism. His were the great Christian certainties.

I felt that with Paul he could say: "For I know whom I have believed, and I am persuaded that He is able to keep that which I have committed unto Him against that day." Like Paul he was ever conscious of the presence of the living Christ and felt that he could do all things through Christ who gave him strength.

The Reverend Marion Charles Henderson may never go down in the annals of recorded history, but he will always be remembered by the thousands he touched and led to God. That host of people will make heaven even brighter for him as they

rise up and call him blessed. In every respect he lived up to the faith expressed by Charles Wesley in his immortal lines:

A charge to keep I have,
A God to glorify,
A never dying soul to save
And fit it for the sky.

MILLARD CHARLES DUNN

1902—1963

Millard Charles Dunn, the son of Lloyd and Lenora Auten Dunn, was born in Mecklenburg County, N. C., on September 25, 1902. He joined the Pleasant Grove Methodist Church at the age of fourteen. Millard, as a young man, studied to be a



medical missionary, attended Rutherford College in Burke County and graduated from Duke University with an A.B. degree in 1928. He then taught science and coached athletics at Willie P. Mangum High School in Bahama, N. C., where he took an active part in church and civic affairs. While at Bahama, he met and married Lucy Noell Tillett of Timberlake, N. C., also a member of the faculty of Mangum School. Resigning from the teaching profession in the spring of 1933, he entered the School of Religion of Duke University that fall and received his B.D. degree in June, 1937. He joined the North Carolina Conference at Washington, N. C., in the fall of 1933 and was appointed to the Bahama charge in 1934—the community in which he had been teaching and living for six years. He held this pastorate for seven years, completing extensive building programs in all four churches of the charge.

In November, 1941, Millard was appointed to Carr Church in Durham where he remained until 1952. While at Carr, the building of a beautiful sanctuary was a major project, but he found time for service as secretary of the Durham Methodist Society; exerted great influence in securing land for and the building of the Methodist Retirement Home; served on the Durham City Board of Education and devoted much time to work with Alcoholics Anonymous and other church, conference and civic matters. In love and appreciation, his church sent him to Europe in the summer of 1951. In 1952, he was privileged to lead the N. C. Caravan of Methodist Youth to Europe.

He was appointed pastor of Trinity Church in Wilmington in 1952, and served until 1959, at which time he was appointed district superintendent of the Fayetteville District, a position he filled until his death on November 5, 1963.

Millard's health was long a deterrent to his physical ambitions but his spirit and enthusiasm never weakened. His brotherly spirit and his keen sense of humor made him welcome in every group he entered.

In 1961, Millard established a scholarship at Methodist College, Fayetteville, N. C., in memory of his mother and father. Since his death, numerous contributions have been made to this fund by his many friends. A part of him will continue to live in the lives of those young people who are the recipients of his scholarship—thus he used his life for something which has outlasted it.

Millard is survived by his wife, Lucy; three sons, Millard Charles, Jr., Indiana University; Ernest Lloyd, Duke University, and Thomas Phillip, N. C. State; a sister, Mrs. F. B. McCall, and two brothers, W. P. and S. S. of Charlotte.

Funeral services were held at Hay St. Church, Fayetteville, November 6, 1963.

with Bishop Paul Neff Garber officiating, assisted by Dr. C. D. Barclift. Burial was in the Mt. Tirzah Cemetery in Person County.

Millard was a diligent and faithful member of the conference, always a booster for growth and progress and always keeping the Kingdom of God as his vision. His sincerity of dedication and purpose won his way into the hearts of his people and drew them closer to Christ. His long service in each pastorate is a standing memorial to his life and service as a minister.

After serving as Director of Public Relations of the Methodist University of San Antonio, he joined the North Carolina Conference in 1953 and served at Murrensboro, LaGrange and Edenton. He retired in 1963

at the conference in Greenville.

He was educated in the public schools of Amherst County, Virginia. He received his B.A. degree from Teachers Professional College, Washington, D. C. He took some graduate studies at the University of Virginia, and received his degree in Theology from Southern School of Divinity, Dallas, Texas.

Brother Crawford was a beloved pastor. The love of his people for him was a great tribute to his Christian character and ministry. An earnest student of the Bible, he conducted successful Bible studies in his churches. Possessed of an inquiring spiritual mind, he read religious books and reviewed Fleming H. Revell's religious books or magazines and newspapers. He held many effective revivals for his brother pastors. His faith in life, humanity and God is expressed in one of his poems, "Life's Quest:"

"LIFE'S QUEST"

To find in hours of deepest trial
The thought of glorious conquest



After a while;
 To show in all life's stern denial
 The harbinger of life's greatest quest—
 A contented smile
 To share with others who walk life's way
 With us, such strength, such vision, love
 Finds the way,
 And lends to weary souls a gracious hint
 Of an all-beneficent and ever-biding love
 Not far away.
 To come and go with life's teeming throng,
 And build with him, in other's lives
 A resting place.
 To fill not their lives with cold despair,
 But to install that courage which revives
 Until they see His face!

ANDREW JARVIS HOBBS

1892 — 1963

In the Acts of the Apostles, Chapter 13, verse 36, we find these words: "For David after he had served his own generation by the will of God, fell on sleep, and was laid unto his fathers." These words are most applicable to Andrew Jarvis Hobbs, our departed loved one, colleague and brother, for truly Brother Hobbs served his own generation and he rendered this service always by the will of God and in daily association with our Saviour, Jesus Christ.



Andrew Jarvis Hobbs was born at Hertford, North Carolina, on August 13, 1892. His parents were Andrew Jackson and Rhodema Newland Copeland Hobbs. Even as a young man, he decided to enter the Methodist ministry; accordingly, he prepared for this most important calling. He received his Bachelor of Arts degree from Duke University, his Master of Arts from Emory University, and his Bachelor of Divinity degree from Yale University. He received the Doctor of Divinity degree from High Point College in 1944.

Jarvis Hobbs joined our North Carolina Conference in November 1920, and at his death in Raleigh, North Carolina, on November 23, 1963, he had rendered forty-three years of active service as a faithful member of our North Carolina Conference. His appointments were as follows: Milton Circuit, 1920-22; Epworth, Wilmington, 1922-23; Federated Church, Redding, Connecticut, 1923-25; Pamlico Circuit, 1925-26; Trinity, Red Springs, 1926-29; Centenary, New Bern, 1929-34; First, Wilson, 1934-38; district superintendent, Durham District, 1938-42; pastor, Edenton Street, Raleigh, 1942-47; district superintendent, Rocky Mount District, 1947-52; St. Paul, Goldsboro, 1952-56; district superintendent, New Bern District, 1956-62; Executive Secretary, Board of Missions of our North Carolina Conference, 1962-63.

On November 11, 1920, Brother Hobbs and Miss Edith Eure Savage, of Corapeake, North Carolina, were married. To them were born three children: Robert Thomas Hobbs, of Burlington, North Carolina; James Copeland Hobbs, of Aiken, South Carolina; and Nancy McRae Hobbs (Mrs. Myron C. Banks) of Raleigh, North Carolina.

The funeral service was held at Edenton Street Methodist Church, Raleigh, on Monday, November 25, 1963. The service was conducted by the following clergy-

men: Bishop Paul Neff Garber, Rev. T. Marvin Vick, Jr., Rev. Graham S. Eubank, and Rev. James A. Auman. Brother Hobbs is survived by his wife, three children, eight grandchildren, and three sisters: Mrs. L. J. Hyland, of Baltimore, Maryland; Mrs. C. R. Myers, of Franklin Lakes, New Jersey, and Mrs. C. C. Alexander, of Lakewood, Ohio.

In line with the words of the text, Jarvis Hobbs truly served in his long and fruitful ministry; moreover, in the language of the text, he served his own generation. He did not live in the past, and in my close association with Brother Hobbs, I do not once recall hearing him talk about the good old days of the past. He, of course, always dreamed of a better church, state, nation, and world; however, Brother Hobbs realized what all of us should know, that our service to mankind must be rendered to the people with whom we serve and at the time that we are in their midst. Jarvis Hobbs served North Carolina Methodism from 1920 to 1963—that was his own generation. He had respect for the lessons of history throughout the past; he dreamed always of the greater future, but his service was rendered in his own generation.

But to be more specific, what were some of the services that we remember as we pay tribute to a noble colleague? First, Jarvis Hobbs was a true friend to all of us. He was loyal and faithful to his friends. I bear personal testimony to the friendship of Brother Hobbs which began in 1924 when I first came to Duke University, or from 1924 to 1963 Jarvis was my true friend. I shall ever be indebted to him for his encouragement and wise advice to me in my work. I cherish the letters which Brother Hobbs wrote to me. I prize the talks which we had together and the many wonderful visits in his home. I am not alone in this testimony for there are thousands of preachers and laymen who join with me in testifying that our lives are brighter because Jarvis Hobbs was our friend.

He was always blessed with a keen sense of humor which helped him to find his way into the closest friendships of those with whom he worked. His insights and judgments were always of a high order. As a leader, he displayed fairness and dignity and provided wise, forceful, and foresighted leadership. In whatever position he occupied, he was given to looking after every detail, and no effort was spared in seeing that the work of the church and the kingdom were promoted in the finest way possible.

Jarvis Hobbs enjoyed working with people, and his leadership ability was recognized by each group who knew him. He served as President of the Duke University Alumni Association, as well as president of Kiwanis and Rotary Clubs; he was a member of Sigma Chi fraternity. He maintained his interest in youth, serving on the faculty of the Young People's Assembly, Louisburg College, for many summers. For 26 years he served as a trustee of Greensboro College. For 12 years he was the assistant secretary of the North Carolina Conference.

Second, Jarvis Hobbs served his own generation because he was always optimistic. How much we need today to have his spirit and optimism. To Jarvis Hobbs the Methodist ministry was a thrilling opportunity and experience, and in his personal life and from the pulpit he radiated optimism. You never heard Jarvis Hobbs talking about how bad conditions were or that we have gone about as far as we can go or that we are living in the post-Christian era. No, Brother Hobbs knew that regardless of temporary discouragements and even dark outlooks, God was still the ruler of the universe and that divine resources given through the life, the message, and the death of our Saviour were as valid from 1920 to 1963 as they were in the first century, the tenth century, or the sixteenth century. It was very difficult to be blue when one was with Jarvis Hobbs, for he always retained through his long ministry the optimistic radiance that comes from contact with the Almighty God and our Saviour, Jesus Christ.

Third, Brother Hobbs served his own generation because he rendered his service through the channels of the church. He made that promise when he entered the ministry, and there was not a field of work in our North Carolina Conference that did not have the full support of Brother Hobbs. He believed in evangelism and

wherever Jarvis Hobbs served, many people were brought into the membership of the church. Jarvis Hobbs believed in the union of religion and education, and for many years he served as president of the Board of Education of our Conference. He gave loyal support to the historic colleges of our Conference; namely Duke University, Louisburg College, Greensboro College and High Point College, and in the past years Brother Hobbs has been one of the leaders in the founding of our two new Methodist colleges, North Carolina Wesleyan College and Methodist College. Largely through his efforts, both of these colleges were begun.

One of his greatest services has been that of leadership in the program of our North Carolina Christian Advocate. One of the greatest contributions to our North Carolina Methodism was his part in the election of Brother Cecil W. Robbins and Brother S. J. Starnes as editors of our Advocate. Jarvis Hobbs was always a leader in the missionary and church extension programs of our North Carolina Conference, and at the time of his death was the executive secretary in this most important field of service. Brother Hobbs was truly a conference man, and he served his conference by giving dynamic and faithful leadership in a practical, not a theoretical, manner. Jarvis Hobbs always believed that continuous hard work in a noble cause was of far greater value than the adopting of paper resolutions concerning the same.

The service of Brother Hobbs to our Methodism did not stop with the boundaries of our North Carolina Conference but extended to other parts of our world Methodism. Jarvis Hobbs represented our North Carolina Conference at General Conferences and Jurisdictional Conferences. He became a charter member in 1944 when the Southeastern Jurisdictional Council was organized and for many years served as a member of the executive committee of the Council. In 1952 Brother Hobbs represented our North Carolina Conference as a delegate to the World Methodist Council held at Oxford University, England. Our Jurisdiction will be a better jurisdiction and The Methodist Church will be a finer church because of his life and the contributions he made in the on-going of the life of the church.

Fourth, A. Jarvis Hobbs served his own generation by bringing into his own generation the tested verdicts of the past. He knew that history had proved that democracy and freedom were good not only for Americans but for all mankind. By precept and example he endeavored to carry on in his own generation the historic principles of democracy and freedom, including religious freedom. He believed with Thomas Jefferson that all men are created equal and are endowed by their Creator with certain inalienable rights, among which are life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness.

Brother Hobbs knew the value of a Christian home, for he had the heritage of noble ancestors. In their home, Jarvis and Edith Hobbs carried on the noble tradition of the Hobbs and Savage families. In this home religion played a vital part for Jarvis and Edith loved our Methodist Church; they gave their time, their resources, and their thoughts to the church. The Hobbs home was always open to their friends and all of us who entered that Christian home were blessed by love and hospitality extended by Jarvis and Edith. Three wonderful children, Tom, Jim, and Nancy, can always point with pride to worthy parents who have added through their own homes additional distinction to a noble family name and tradition.

The text from Acts of the Apostles refers to the fact that after David had served his own generation, he fell on sleep, and that is what has happened to our colleague and brother. A. Jarvis Hobbs has fallen asleep in this world, but he lives today in another home which has been prepared for him. Jesus said, "In my father's house are many mansions; if it were not so, I would have told you. I go to prepare a place for you." Since these are the words of our Saviour, we need not question the doctrine of immortality. Jarvis Hobbs, as a young man, placed his life in the hands of our Saviour, and our Saviour walked and talked with Brother Hobbs during his earthly days. We know that in the world beyond, Jarvis Hobbs continues to live in continuing contact with our Saviour. Brother Andrew Jarvis Hobbs lived by faith in our Lord; he died in the same faith; and he lives now in the same faith in the building of God; "an house not made with hands, eternal in the heavens."

IVEY TALMADGE POOLE

1891—1963

Ivey Talmadge Poole was born in Burke County, near Morganton, North Carolina, August 26, 1891, the son of William Poole and Susan Connelly Poole. He was granted local license to preach at Morganton in 1909. He graduated from Rutherford College in 1911 and from Trinity College in 1915. He joined the North Carolina Conference in 1915 at Wilmington, North Carolina. He was ordained deacon in 1915 and ordained elder in 1919. He retired in 1957 after forty-two years of service in the conference. After his retirement he moved to Durham where he resided until his death on December 17, 1963.

Brother Poole served the following appointments: McKendree Circuit, North and South Rocky Mount, Aurora, St. Paul Circuit, Stantonsburg, Jonesboro, Yanceyville, Northampton, Jacksonville-Richlands, Swepsonville, Bailey, Vance, Benson, and Warsaw. In these fourteen charges he was pastor of more than fifty rural churches. Because of his outstanding leadership in this field in the Conference, he was elected a delegate to the General and Jurisdictional Conferences of the Methodist Church in 1947, being at that time the second rural minister in the history of the North Carolina Conference to be elected to the General Conference and the only rural minister that ever headed the General Conference delegation. In all the charges he served he either constructed new church buildings or made major repairs and enlargements of the old buildings.

His first marriage was to Miss Ethel Donahoe who died in 1926. He later married Miss Louise Godwin of Smithfield, Virginia, who survives. Other survivors are two daughters, Mrs. Mary T. Guthrie of Graham, North Carolina, and Mrs. Evelyn Gorham of Springfield, Virginia; and one son, I. Talmadge Poole, Jr., of Durham.

Funeral services were conducted at the Duke Memorial Methodist Church on December 19, 1963, with interment in the new Maplewood Cemetery in Durham. The officiating ministers were Rev. Robert W. Bradshaw, pastor of Duke Memorial Church, and Rev. O. L. Hathaway, district superintendent of the Durham District.

Words of Scripture take on added meaning when we find them embodied in the life of one of God's chosen servants. My own human thought with reference to the life of this devoted servant, loved one, and friend is simply: He lived life like it is suppose to be lived—as a child of God. It takes just a moment to come to the better expression from God's own word: "The steps of a good man are ordered by the Lord and He delighted in His way. The Lord upholdeth him with His hand."

Sometimes hymns also take on added meaning when we find their embodiment in one who becomes dear to us. The following hymn is one that presented the challenge from God that his whole life seemed to be trying to answer:

"Rise up, O men of God! Have done with lesser things;
Give heart and mind and soul and strength To serve the King of Kings.
Rise up, O men of God! The Church for you doth wait,
Her strength unequal to her task; Rise up, and make her great!
Lift high the cross of Christ! Tread where His feet have trod;
As brothers of the Son of Man, Rise up, O men of God!"

He was done with "lesser things." He sought to make the church "great." He did lift high the cross of Christ" and walked where "His feet have trod."

What more can any man do?

ARTHUR LOUIS GREEN STEPHENSON

1901—1963

Arthur Louis Green Stephenson, affectionately called "Bud" by his closer associates, ceased this mortal life and received the immortal body on Tuesday, December 24, at 11:00 a. m. Those privileged to be with him at his moment of victory, though distressed and broken-hearted at the thought of separation, shared with him in his last prayer the faithful promise of eternity and God's willingness to receive and care for His own.

A. L. G. Stephenson was born in James City County, Williamsburg, Virginia, August 29, 1901. His father, Arthur Louis Green Stephenson, was a teacher and newspaper publisher. His mother, the former Frances Bryan, was concerned to be only a Christian mother and homemaker. It is to her prayers and spiritual admonitions which "Bud" often attributes his spiritual awakening.

"Bud" attended grammar school at Williamsburg and Virgilina, Virginia. His High School days were spent at Wakelon High School, Zebulon, North Carolina. Following graduation from high school he attended King's Business College at Raleigh, North Carolina.

Upon leaving King's Business College he entered the employ of his father, who was at that time publishing a weekly newspaper at Zebulon. His desire for a trained mind soon prompted him to enter Trinity College, Durham, North Carolina. Because of financial difficulties he soon found it necessary to leave Trinity College and return to work with the newspaper. His work was now at Littleton and Aulander, North Carolina, where he continued to work until he returned to school (now Duke University, Durham), where he received his Bachelor of Arts degree in 1942.

While working with the newspaper at Aulander, "Bud" met Miss Geraldine Early, a lovely young member of the Aulander Baptist Church. "Bud" and Geraldine, or "Little Lady" as she was to become, were mutually attracted to each other and Geraldine waited patiently until "Bud" proposed marriage. On December 27, 1928, they were married by the Reverend Lonnie Sasser in the Aulander Baptist Parsonage. Of this union four fine children were born. They were James Arthur, who died in infancy; Louis Early, now serving with the United States Coast Guard at Yorktown, Virginia; Emma Frances, now in her junior year at High Point College; and Cecelia Anne, who is presently with her mother at Aulander.

While at Aulander "Bud" served as superintendent of the Methodist church school. He entered the ministry of The Methodist Church in 1942. His first charge was at Tyner, North Carolina. This charge was composed of Anderson, Bethany, Center Hill and Evan's churches. "Bud" served Chowan charge five years. His next appointment was to the Camden charge consisting of Camden, Perkin's and Old Trap Churches. After a five year tenure at Camden "Bud" was assigned to Dare Charge composed of Shiloh, Stumpy Point, Carmel and East Lake churches. After six years on the Dare Charge he was then appointed to the Marvin Methodist Church at Rocky Mount, North Carolina. Marvin was to be his next to last appointment and "Bud" served faithfully and well until his last appointment, four years later, to the Gaston Methodist Church. He came to Gaston in July 1961 and served until his "gracious calling of the Lord" on December 24, 1963.

Funeral services were held in the Gaston Methodist Church on Thursday, December 26, at 2:00 p. m. Brother ministers officiating were J. W. Page, district superintendent of the Rocky Mount District; W. Hoyt Cheek, T. H. House and W. J. Neese. The eulogy for "Bud" was delivered by his superintendent, J. W. Page. Brother Page with great propriety and feeling called attention to "Bud's" deep humility and sincere love of God and mankind.



"Bud" loved his Lord and served the Church faithfully and well. He was always gracious, kind, and humble, believing that all persons were worthy of his prayers and efforts in their behalf.

His ministry made its lasting impression upon all who knew him and without exception he is accorded to have been a true and faithful minister of the gospel of Jesus Christ. His love for people and the church was exceeded only by his love for Christ. "Bud" was a minister of strong and shining faith. On one occasion when urged by "Little Lady" to visit a physician for an examination "Bud" replied, "Little Lady, me and the Lord are taking care of this situation so don't worry about it." He was not being facetious or foolhardy, but suspected the malign condition of his body and, realizing nothing much could be done about it, threw himself, as always, fully upon God's power to keep and sustain.

Notwithstanding the cold hand of death, "Bud" was not disappointed in his trust and in spite of severe physical pain and distress his daily life continued to praise God in all things. The last Scripture which he heard, read to him by his son Louis, was the beautiful second chapter of Luke's Gospel, the Nativity of Our Lord. His last audible prayer was the Lord's Prayer which he said only moments before his death with great joy and fervency. Truly "Bud" lived and died with a single eye and a single mind looking only unto Jesus, the giver and sealer of his faith. Truly Arthur Louis Green Stephenson has not lived in vain.

Funeral services for Hicks E. Lance were conducted on Wednesday, March 25, 1964, at Memorial Chapel, Lake Junaluska Methodist Assembly, by Dr. J. W. Fowler, superintendent of the Assembly, assisted by Rev. Mr. Aughinbaugh, Presbyterian Minister of Waynesville, and Rev. H. P. Myers, Methodist minister of Waynesville. Interment was in the Avery's Creek Methodist Cemetery in Buncombe County, among his people who were charter members of the church at that place.

He was a dedicated servant of his Lord, and was filled with good will for all mankind. His life's creed was "to think well of all, to be cheerful with all, to patiently learn



to find the good in all," with thoughts dwelling upon all that were pure and unselfish. He died as sweetly and as peacefully as he had lived.

"And so he passed over, and all the trumpets sounded for him on the other side," and surely the Master took him by the hand and said, "Come, ye blessed of my Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world."

RALPH BAIRD

1921—1964

Ralph Baird was born in Halifax County, North Carolina, on March 25, 1921. His death occurred on Good Friday and his funeral was conducted on Easter. Death came to him in Richmond, Virginia, while awaiting a delicate heart operation, just two days after his forty-third birthday.

For quite a few years, Ralph had been employed as a maintenance man at No. 1 plant of J. P. Stevens Company at Roanoke Rapids, North Carolina. For many years, he had been a faithful layman in his church, Shiloh Methodist Church in Gaston, N. C. He served his church in many capacities including church school superintendent and chairman of the official board and church lay leader. In all he proved himself a faithful and dedicated leader. Ralph was always an enthusiastic supporter of the pastor and the program of the conference. He had a strong interest in the missionary efforts of the church. And he was often used in local churches as a certified lay speaker during the "No-Silent Pulpit" program and on other occasions.

With the enthusiastic support of the Quarterly Conference, he was granted a local preacher's license by that Conference. Bishop Paul N. He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Pauline Wood Baird, and one son, Larry Wayne Baird who is an airman second class in the U. S. Air Force stationed at Seymour Johnson Air Base, Goldsboro, N. C.

Funeral services for Ralph Baird were conducted on Sunday afternoon, March 29, 1964, Easter afternoon, in the church he had served as layman and as pastor, with Rev. Robert H. Eason officiating, assisted by The Reverend Jack Page and The Reverend Junius Neese. Burial was in the burial ground just behind the church.

No one can ever say of Ralph what Elton Trueblood attributed to "most alleged Christians;" for he says they "do not now understand that loyalty to Christ means sharing personally in His ministry, going or staying as the situation requires." Ralph believed as Trueblood docs that "all Christians must be in the ministry, whatever their occupation, because the nonwitnessing follower of Christ is a contradiction in terms." It was no problem and certainly no difficulty for Ralph to change his role from layman to preacher-in-charge. He had always been an active participant in "The Company of the Committed."

MRS. MINNIE ANN HATLEY HETHCOX

1889—1963

Mrs. Minnie Ann Hatley Hethcox, wife of the late Reverend Robert Lathan Hethcox, was born in Concord, North Carolina, July 13, 1889. She was a daughter of Wilman and Elaine Furr Hatley, and on December 29, 1909, married our brother in this ministry, R. L. Hethcox. They had five children: Walter H. Hethcox of Burlington, Edna (Mrs. R. L.) Bernhardt of Burlington, Ruth (Mrs. Sam S.) Woodley of Columbia, Louise (Mrs. Charles D.) Webster of Clayton, and Ila (Mrs. Karl) Householder of Sanford, Florida.



She survived her husband by less than nine months. At Annual Conference in Greenville last year it was my privilege to assist her grandson in almost bodily lifting her into the Sanctuary of Jarvis Memorial Church for the memorial service for Lathan and the others who died that year. "She lived to get to that service," one member of the family observed later. Within a week she too had slipped out of her house of clay and into eternity. They were very close, this parsonage couple. In their last years they expressed their love for one another often in the form of humor about their long years together. Refreshing and enjoyable was their company. Even severe suffering never quite got them down so far as their friends could tell. Both of them suffered much, but both of them took it well, as "good soldiers of Jesus Christ."

Their fiftieth wedding anniversary, I remember well, we observed on our Sunday television broadcast "The Circuit Rider" from Raleigh by presenting them both and having Brother Hethcox read scripture and lead in prayer. Often the traveling companions of my wife and me in attending district and conference affairs, this couple was never stuffy or depressing, but always gave evidence of that spark of life that continued deep within them even down through old age.

A faithful and good church member in her own right, Miss Minnie was always kind to her pastor, even after that office was no longer officially held by her sweetheart and companion. Often she came that block from their attractive little house to the church when she scarcely felt like sitting up, as a witness or to stand by Lathan or to represent him when he could not attend.

They served pastorates in the Methodist Protestant Church at Pleasant Hill, Greenville, the Greenville Charge, Asheboro, Mocksville, and Fallston. After unification they served on the Mt. Hermon Charge, at Newton Grove, Clayton, and Oriental. In 1957, they selected Clayton as the place of their retirement. The people of Clayton loved and respected them and are still stunned by their deaths, occurring as they did in such swift succession. A good sport, Minnie lived and served in a day when parsonages were not what they are now and when hard times affected everyone. The gracious sense of humor she shared with her husband saw them happily through what otherwise would have been many an unpleasantness. Such devotion between two human beings is seldom seen and will always live to bless those of us who knew them. Her loneliness for her lover became almost unbearable after he was gone and toward the last she said somehow she had the feeling that Lathan was going to come by for her shortly. Perhaps he did. What a glorious provision our Saviour has made for the reunion of old comrades in the Father's House! After her passing June 24, 1963, her funeral was conducted from Home Memorial Methodist Church in Clayton and burial was in Maplewood Cemetery there, by Lathan's side. Truly they were one; she was in the ministry too.

MRS. BLANCHE HOLLAND KING

1892—1963

Blanche Holland King began her earthly pilgrimage in Waxahachie, Texas, August 11, 1892, the second of seven children of Thomas Monroe and Loula Campbell Holland. Her heavenly pilgrimage began on Friday, August 2, 1963, at Duke Hospital in Durham when her brave spirit quietly returned to the God who gave it. For eight months she gallantly struggled with the dread disease, cancer.



Mrs. King graduated from Waxahachie High School and Trinity University, now at San Antonio, Texas, and did graduate work at the University of California. As a young woman she saw Jesus with arms outstretched toward a multitude of people. None moved toward the beckoning Christ, but Blanche said, "I will go." She was one of the first volunteers for service in Southern Methodism's great Centenary Program in Central Europe. Bishop William B. Beauchamp assigned her to teach in "Les Marronniers," our girls' school in Brussels, Belgium. Thus she became one of our first workers to bring to the young girls of that valiant land the warm influence of our Methodist faith.

While in Brussels she met the Reverend Hiram K. King, the first ordained minister of our Church in this field. Following a romance of several months, they were married in our Methodist Chapel in Brussels in October, 1921, and then went to Poland. There they served in the ancient capital city of Warsaw and in Lwow, or the old Austrian city of Lemberg. Mrs. King was a constant strength to brother Hiram. She also organized and guided the first Woman's Society of Methodism in our European work. For four years the Kings labored in Europe and then returned home on furlough.

Mrs. King suffered a severe illness while visiting her family in Texas and the two-year convalescence ruled out the return to Europe. Her doctors emphasized the importance during this period of being close to her people, so her husband transferred temporarily to the North Arkansas Conference. They served Fisher Street, Jonesboro; Wilson, and then as presiding elder of the Batesville District. After tenure on the district, Brother Hiram returned to Jonesboro as pastor of First Methodist Church.

From this pastorate the Kings were sent by the General Board of Missions on a two-year assignment for Christian Education in the Orient—China, Japan and Korea.

In 1935 the Kings returned to North Carolina. Blanche was the constant support and inspiration of her husband as he labored in his home Conference. In every church he served, she ministered too, generally as a teacher or superintendent of the Primary Department. But she was also beloved leader of the Young Women's Circle for four years at First Church, Elizabeth City; gifted teacher of the Women's Class for five years at Centenary Church, Smithfield; a deeply felt influence in the Spiritual Life Group at Centenary Church, New Bern, which presented her with a Life Membership in the Woman's Society of Christian Service; and the "Blanche King Circle" at our Church in Laurinburg was named in her honor. For forty-two years she was the unfailing helper and inspiration of her husband, both as a pastor and a district superintendent. Following Mr. King's retirement in Raleigh, she was an active and esteemed member of the Woman's Society at Edenton Street Church.

Wherever she went, Mrs. King was recognized as a consecrated Christian and acclaimed as a lovely and gracious person. Our lives were enriched by hers as we came to serve in our first full-time appointment. Her magnetism and charm came from an inner soul where our Lord lived. She was a devoted wife, a wise and loving mother, and a wonderful home maker. What a gifted person! Her quiet winsomeness

brought blessings to countless others. Her love of beauty, so eloquently and exquisitely expressed in her home and its grounds, stemmed from the beauty of her soul. Her love of good music was complemented by her own beautiful soprano voice.

To think that such love and beauty should die is beyond any concept of the Christian heart. "Neither life nor death shall separate us."

Afflicted by cancer in October, 1962, she displayed a courage and perseverance and witness that typified the Apostle Paul. Even in her suffering she would exchange good humored banter with her doctors. Her deeply spiritual nature was revealed in that illness. She had memorized a particular verse of Scripture which had special meaning for her for every letter in the alphabet. Weak in body, confined to a bed at home or in the hospital, she would call to mind any of these words of God when she felt the need.

"Only one thing is needful and she hath chosen that good part, which shall not be taken away from her."

At Edenton Street Methodist Church in Raleigh, on Monday morning, August 5, her funeral service was conducted by Dr. F. Olen Hunt of The Methodist Foundation and the Reverend A. Kimsey King, Jr., associate minister of the church. In Raleigh Memorial Park that afternoon her temple of clay was laid to rest!

Survivors include her husband, Dr. Hiram K. King, one daughter, Mrs. Carolyn King Standerwick, wife of Major Robert L. Standerwick of the U. S. Air Force, and three granddaughters. One brother, Harry M. Holland of San Antonio, Texas, and four sisters, Mrs. Henry M. Barton and Mrs. Walter L. Seaman, Nashville, Tennessee; Mrs. Ralf Gould, Albuquerque, New Mexico; and Mrs. Jay Smith of Little Rock, Arkansas, survive. She is also survived by hundreds of others whose lives she touched and inspired.

In response to a request from her life companion we quote the title words of a song she sang in the Methodist Chapel service in Brussels, Belgium, the Sunday they began their lives together,

"Lord, Teach Me How to Live"

and these words from the Book of Life:

"And I saw the Holy City.
And I heard a great voice out of heaven saying,
'God shall wipe away all tears from their eyes;
and there shall be no more death,
neither shall there be any more pain.'
And they shall see His face:
and they shall reign forever."

Thy work shall not be lost, dear friend! Yea, it lives—and your love and example continue to exert their powerful influence! We are confident that your thirst for eternal Life is now fulfilled by the God who doeth all things well!

SECTION V

REPORT OF DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS

BURLINGTON DISTRICT

T. B. HOUGH, *Superintendent*

The 53 ministers and the 24,000 lay members made the record which the Burlington District presents to the Annual Conference this year.

Membership and Evangelism: To date, May 7, 1964, the pastors report the following facts as evidence of the fruits of their labors: received on profession of faith, 444; by certificate, 427; babies baptized, 224.

The District Director of Evangelism, in cooperation with the Conference Director of Evangelism, has endeavored to promote the program of evangelism in every manner known to him. Several pastors have taken the business of evangelism seriously and, realizing that the church could not consistently report a net loss in membership without risking the loss of a place for some preacher to preach, have given themselves without reservation to the effort of evangelism in their charges.

Christian Education: The district staff, in cooperation with the Conference Board of Education, has spared no opportunity to reach and teach all who work in the church school. Special sessions have been held in each subdistrict to prepare teachers and department officers for the new educational material that comes into use in the new church school year. Christian Workers' Schools have been held so as to make them easily accessible to every church in the district.

Lay Activities: Mr. Joe Holmes and his associate lay leaders have gone the second mile in recruiting laymen for promoting the total program of the Methodist Church. A training school was conducted over a week-end at Chestnut Ridge for the lay speakers who were to be certified. For the first time since lay speakers began to supply the open pulpits during Lent, the speakers went out with some idea of unity of purpose in their effort to accentuate the gospel that declares the death and resurrection of our Lord. Further evidence of the interest of the men of the district was shown in our Lay Rally. We had a fine delegation of men at the Lay Retreat at Louisburg College; and wherever there is work to be done, some laymen are ready to help with it.

Woman's Division of Christian Service: Mrs. J. E. Davis has led the women of this district to new heights in almost every area of Christian service. This refreshing and optimistic band of wholesome women are gaining new heights every year. Now that Mrs. Davis is assuming the duties of a Conference officer, we congratulate her for her heroic effort on the district level, and we wish for her her finest years in a service that is dear to her heart. As we lament the going of Mrs. Davis, we rejoice that Mrs. P. F. Newton takes the office of District President amidst the splendor of her own achievement in many areas of the church in which she has excelled.

Building and Improvements: St. Luke's Church has completed its first unit of fellowship hall and educational building. Shiloh has completed a very fine parsonage. Bellemont and Bonlee have dedicated their parsonages. Pleasant Hill is beginning a new educational building that will cost about \$60,000. Pittsboro has built an educational building and is enjoying its spacious luxury after being crowded for several years. Mt. Vernon, on the Silk Hope Charge, has completed an educational building this year. Shady Grove, on the Cobb Circuit, will dedicate an adequate and well-arranged educational building the last of this month. Smyrna is making preparation to build an educational building. Lemon Springs, on Springs-Chapel Charge, has completed its educational building and is now enjoying it. Orange Chapel, on the Whitney Cross Charge, is preparing to build an educational build-

ing. High Falls, on the Glendon Charge, is completing the first unit of a new church plant. Jonesboro Heights, in Sanford, is preparing to build a new sanctuary.

Steele Street, in Sanford, is continuing to increase its building fund and looks toward the time when it will begin a major building program. \$102,705.01 has been contributed on building and repairs this year.

Finances: The people of the Burlington District are becoming better stewards all the time. Last year we paid 98% of our world service acceptances. As for now, we seem to be doing as well this year. Most churches accepted all or part of the increase asked this year, and equally as important is the payment, which we have reason to expect. The increase that has been accepted is \$11,446.54. Many of the churches have raised the standard of living for the pastor and his family. Salaries and expenses have been increased \$7,118.50 for the coming conference year. The response to the Alaska Relief appeal has been most gratifying. We contributed \$2,384.73. To date we have paid approximately \$100,000.00 on the College Crusade, and our District Special for this year amounts to \$733.00.

My ministry has been made richer by sharing with the pastors and laymen of the Burlington District.

DURHAM DISTRICT

O. L. HATHAWAY, *District Superintendent*

"And Jesus said to them all, if any man will come after me, let him deny himself and take up his cross daily, and follow me."—Luke 9:23. The pastors and lay people of the Durham District have been challenged to carry on the work of Christ in the Methodist churches and we would like to share our report with the members of the conference.

Membership and Evangelism: The report for May 15 reveals the fact that we have added 1285 and lost 823, giving us a net gain of 462 members. We have baptized 181 infants.

Christian Education: Christian workers schools were held in Durham, Bahama, and Roxboro. District and subdistrict meetings for the preparation of the people for the new literature for the children in Methodist churches were held in the fall. Youth rally for the young people was held at the University Methodist Church.

Christian Higher Education: Our people are paying on their pledges toward the support of our Methodist colleges.

Lay Activities: The program of lay activities under the direction of James T. Patrick continues to move forward. We had a larger attendance at the Lay Retreat at Louisburg College. We had a new record in attendance of 1050 persons at our Lay Rally held in February. The Lay speaking program has improved this year. The Methodist Men are becoming more active.

Woman's Society of Christian Service: Mrs. J. C. Wingate, the president has given outstanding leadership to the 78 societies and 3,469 members. Plans are formulated to increase the attendance and the membership in the coming year.

Buildings and Improvements: Duke Memorial is completing the Educational Building in the summer. Merritt's Chapel continues in their building program. Calvary has completed the third floor of their education building. One of the awards for the Randolph E. Dumont Design Program was presented to James A. Ward, architect for the Salem Methodist Church. Planning for new building continues at Allensville, Carrboro, New Bethel, Warren's Grove, McMannen, Fletcher's Chapel. Dedication service has been held at Union Grove for the new Education building. Brooksdale Methodist Church is ready for Dedication.

Parsonages: Chestnut Ridge Methodist Church has built a new parsonage. Dedication services were held for the parsonage at Oxford, Banks Chapel. Major repairs have been completed at Butner.

Land: Asbury Methodist Church has purchased four lots for parking space. Branson Methodist Church purchased a house and lot for parking space. Parkwood Methodist

Church has purchased a church site. Calvary Methodist Church has provided additional parking space. Epworth has completed a complete landscaping of their church property. We have spent on building and parsonage and paying off obligations to the amount of \$513,627.00.

The Durham District has a new opportunity in the growth that is coming to this section of our state. We are praying and working that we may meet the needs of our people for Christ in the Methodist Church. I count it a great privilege to have an opportunity to be a part of the fellowship of the Durham District.

ELIZABETH CITY DISTRICT

ROBERT L. JEROME, *District Superintendent*

As we close the year on the Elizabeth City District I am glad to report some of the accomplishments of our faithful pastors and loyal laymen. These 44 pastors are serving 87 churches. One of them came to us in the middle of the year. Four of our parsonage homes have been blessed with the addition of new babies, and our missionaries in Korea report the birth of a baby boy. Our District Conference in Ahoskie was a delightful occasion and manifested the spirit of optimism and dedication. We plan to reunite Mann's Harbor with the Stumpy Point-East Lake Church to form the Dare Charge next year. Two of our churches have had significant celebrations this year—the Parkers Church on the North Gates Charge celebrated their 150th anniversary, and Trinity Church on the South Mills Charge celebrated their 75th anniversary.

Membership and Evangelism: Our pastors have conducted 64 revivals and have been busy with visitation evangelism and as a result have received (by May 10) 549 persons into the church (261 on profession of faith). They report over 21,000 visits. They have baptized 162 babies.

Education: Our church schools have an enrollment of 10,408 with an average attendance of 6513. We have 1346 young people enrolled in 61 MYF groups. Last summer we had 61 Vacation Schools with 2461 pupils enrolled. We have had a number of training opportunities during the year for our pastors and laymen, including three Christian Workers' Schools, workshops for training teachers in the use of the new curriculum for children, institutes, two schools for training lay speakers, a District Youth Rally, and other training opportunities. The mission study book, OUR MISSION TODAY, was taught in 54 churches. The filmstrip, WHEN WE KNOW, WE CARE: WHEN WE CARE, WE SHARE, was used by 34 churches. We have 429 subscribers to the N. C. Christian Advocate, 142 to Together, 169 to World Outlook, and 1400 to the District News.

Lay Activities: Our laymen have been active during the year under the splendid leadership of John N. Turner, District Lay Leader, and his associates. They have filled many pulpits during the No Silent Pulpit period and helped out at other times when needed. We had one of our best District Lay Rallies at Hertford with about 400 present. We had two schools for training lay speakers and 25 men attended. We have only 12 active groups of Methodist Men but hope to increase this number soon.

Women's Society of Christian Service: We have 75 societies with 2604 members and our Wesleyan Service Guilds with 134 members. Mrs. C. R. Miller is the District president and is leading the women in a wonderful way. They have had nine subdistrict and one district meetings. The District WSG entertained the Conference Wesleyan Service Guild at Washington.

Finances: The economy of our District does not lend itself to large increases in finances, but some of our churches are planning some increases in pastor's salaries and about half are planning increases on World Service and Conference Benevolences. We have raised \$6783 on special offerings and over \$18,000 for the College Crusade.

Building Projects: During the year we have dedicated the Grace Church near Elizabeth City, one of our Ten Dollar Club churches, and three educational buildings, at Ahoskie, Savage on the North Gates Charge, Anderson on the Chowan Charge, and Woodland on the New Hope-Woodland Charge. We have bought a new District par-

sonage for \$30,000 after selling the old parsonage and a house and lot in Plymouth owned by the District. The Wares Chapel Church is building a new church costing \$80,000 that will be adequate for worship, study, and fellowship. Wanchese is making extensive improvements on their sanctuary, Stumpy Point is making changes in theirs, and the churches on the South Camden Charge are improving their sanctuaries. There are 11 others making minor improvements. A new educational building is under construction at Newland Church (\$19,000), and a new building has been built at Savage Church on the North Gates Charge (\$5,253). The educational building at Stumpy Point is still under construction. The new parsonage at Ahoskie (\$33,000) has been occupied by the pastor, a new parsonage at Kitty Hawk (\$16,526) is in use, an old house completely renovated (\$8,000) has been purchased for Wesley Memorial, Columbia, a new parsonage at Bath (\$10,000) will soon be ready for occupancy, and a new parsonage for Moyock (\$20,000) is planned for the immediate future. Parsonage renovations have been made at Chowan, Creswell, City Road, and Plymouth, as well as minor repairs at six others.

FAYETTEVILLE DISTRICT

BARNEY L. DAVIDSON, *District Superintendent*

As I come to the close of a conference year on my first effort to serve the Fayetteville District, I am most grateful for the opportunity I have had working with the 66 pastors and over 24,000 fine laymen and laywomen of the district. The death of Rev. M. C. Dunn was a great loss to the Fayetteville District. It has been very difficult to try to take over the work of such a dedicated leader in the middle of the year. Yet, thanks to an excellent staff and the cooperation of ministers and laymen, progress has been made. It is to them that I give the credit and offer thanks to the heavenly Father for His guidance and blessings.

Christian Higher Education: Many churches have paid their college pledges up to date. A majority of the churches had accepted their quota and are earnestly endeavoring to meet this great need.

Membership and Evangelism: The report as of May 9th indicates that we have added 1318 members and lost 925, giving us a net gain of 393. Of those joining, 519 were by profession of faith and 799 by letter or otherwise. One hundred and sixty-four babies were baptized. The general program of evangelism has been promoted in the district through visitation evangelism, revival meetings, church membership classes, church school classes and other means.

Woman's Society of Christian Service: There are 88 organized societies and a large number of Wesleyan Service Guilds. The combined membership is 4045 members. Mrs. J. S. Hiatt has given outstanding leadership in the district. The giving for the causes of the church has increased through the efforts of the WSCS.

Christian Education: The enrollment in our church schools is 16,558 for the 100 churches. There have been subdistrict leadership training schools and workshops. All phases of the work of the church schools have been emphasized and there is an increasing response on the part of both the teachers and students in the church school.

Gifts and Wills: Under the excellent leadership of Dr. Olen Hunt, several meetings were held throughout our district in this important area. The response and results were very good.

Missions and Church Extension: A Missionary Institute was held on *Our Mission Today*, and a Missionary Rally was well attended. Our people responded in a tremendous way to the appeal to support a native Methodist pastor in India. Over \$1,000 was pledged to his support.

Over \$17,700 was received in a special offering for Alaska Earthquake Appeal.

Lay Activities: We have had excellent lay participation this year. Under the leadership of Raymond E. (Buddy) Luper and his associates, a full program was carried on by our laymen. We have over 140 registered lay speakers and a very effective No-Silent Pulpit program was carried out by the lay speakers. We had a number of our laymen to attend the Lay Retreat at Duke in August.

Buildings and Improvements: The old district parsonage has been sold and shortly after conference a new one will be completed. It will be a lovely and comfortable home. The congregation of the Haymount Methodist Church recently moved into one of the best sanctuaries in our conference. The total cost was over \$400,000. Trinity, Troy, completed and paid for its new education building at a total cost of \$103,579. Page Memorial at Aberdeen dedicated its \$28,000 parsonage recently. The congregation at St. Paul's completed their new \$25,000 parsonage. The St. Paul-Trinity Charge in Rockingham purchased a fine parsonage. The Salem Methodist Church is planning to build a \$24,000 parsonage and has installed an air-conditioning plant for their church at a cost of \$18,640. A new \$22,000 parsonage is planned and will be constructed for the Marvin Church. The Pee Dee congregation rebuilt their education building and sanctuary at a cost of \$50,000. The First Methodist Church in Laurinburg is having plans drawn for a \$60,000 sanctuary. Lyon Memorial in Fayetteville is having plans drawn for a \$35,000 education building. The St. Andrews congregation plans to either build a new sanctuary on their present site or on a new location. The Asbury Church in Fayetteville is relocating and getting plans to build an education building and fellowship hall. The Hope Mills Church moved into a beautiful \$127,000 church plant. Camp Ground is completing its \$75,000 sanctuary. Cumberland plans to get under way shortly with an \$80,000 education building. Victory Church completed an \$18,000 addition to its education building. A new \$11,000 education building was completed at Lovejoy. Plans are being drawn to build a new education building at Bethabara on the South River Charge. Cokesbury at Stedman dedicated its sanctuary and education building last month. Beaver Dam on the Pinebluff Charge completed its new \$25,000 church plant. Mt. Pleasant Church on the Ellerbe Charge is renovating its sanctuary. Vass is completing its \$25,000 education and fellowship building. Wesley Heights spent approximately \$8,000 renovating and enlarging its parsonage and has air-conditioned its sanctuary. The Zion Methodist Church of Rockingham completed an educational building valued at \$17,000. New churches and parsonages valued at \$940,000 were completed (or will be shortly), and buildings costing \$875,000 are planned for the near future.

Stewardship: The churches of the Fayetteville District are to be commended for their response to the increase in benevolences. As of May 9 it was anticipated that an increase of over \$21,000 would be accepted. Forty-two churches increased their pastors' salaries for a total increase of \$13,380.

GOLDSBORO DISTRICT

M. W. LAWRENCE, *District Superintendent*

The Goldsboro District has had one of its finest years. The 61 ministers and more than 21,000 laymen have written a record of achievement by their faithful and devoted service.

Evangelism: Real gains in evangelism have been made with 1,012 people uniting with the churches; 470 of these were on profession of faith. The net increase for the district was 394, giving the district over 21,000 members. There were 104 revivals, 85 membership classes, and 84 programs of visitation evangelism used are achieving these results. One hundred sixty-seven babies were baptized.

Missions: There were 67 schools of missions held. More than \$1,500 was given for the Indian ministers; \$2,633 for the Alaska Relief Fund, and more than \$6,600 in Adversity Specials. Under the leadership of Mrs. L. H. Lanes, district president of the Women's Society of Christian Service, two new societies were organized—one at Westwood and the other at Wesley on the Sarecta charge.

Education: Our church school enrollment is over 17,000, showing a decline of 48 as compared with a loss of 338 the previous year. Our schools are preparing for the new literature for children. There are 1,671 members of the Methodist Youth Fellowship.

Lay Activities: Under the leadership of Robert C. Rose the lay work of the district is making progress. One thousand one hundred eighteen Methodist men are members of the 37 Men's Clubs. There were 600 at the Lay Rally and a scholarship fund of \$388.00

was raised to help some young person preparing for full-time Christian service.

Christian Higher Education: To date our district has paid more than \$77,000 on the College Crusade Fund. This amount represents about 24% of the total pledged. The matter is kept before the people, and we hope to make better progress in the next year.

Buildings and Improvements: Five new parsonages have been built or purchased during the year: LaGrange (\$22,012), Sanders (\$14,000), Princeton (\$16,500), Fremont (\$19,000), and Asbury (\$12,000). Also constructed was a sanctuary at Corinth for \$36,000. Educational buildings were erected at Nobles (\$7,000), Woodland (\$17,000), Rainbow (\$18,000), Providence (\$35,000). Two rooms were added at West Smithfield. Planned for the new year are educational buildings at St. Paul (\$300,000), Mount Olive (\$110,000), Saulston (\$20,000), Unity (\$10,000), Trinity (\$17,000), Epworth (\$17,000), and Pikeville (\$20,000). Sanctuaries will be built at West Smithfield (\$50,000) and Pink Hill (\$50,000). Walstonburg will build a parsonage costing \$18,500.

Dedicated during the year were the educational buildings at Falling Creek and Princeton and the parsonages at Micro-Fellowship and Browning-Smith.

One new church was organized, Walker Memorial, on Highway 111 between Goldsboro and Seven Springs. A new church will be organized in Sampson County among the Indians.

The spirit and morale of our ministers and laymen are good. We shall have about 75% acceptance on World Service for the new year and expect very close to 100% payments on all obligations this year. Salaries have been increased substantially for next year.

It has been a real pleasure to work with these people for the past year and we are looking forward to other years of service with them.

NEW BERN DISTRICT

R. GRADY DAWSON, *District Superintendent*

It is a pleasure and privilege for me to make this report for the pastors and laymen of the New Bern District. It is through their faithful and loyal service to Christ and the church that this report is made possible. To them I gladly give the credit. Limited time and space make necessary a brief report, in which only a bare outline of the major areas of work can be given.

Evangelism: In the area of membership and evangelism, the pastors and laymen have labored faithfully, and their labors have been rewarded. At the writing of this report 1,428 persons have been received into the membership of 92 churches in the district—605 on profession of faith and 823 by transfer and otherwise, with a net gain of 454, which is an increase of 23% over last year. During the year 241 babies have been baptized. The general program of evangelism has been promoted in the district through visitation evangelism, revival meetings, church membership classes, church school classes, and the other activities of the local church Commission on Membership and Evangelism. Our Conference Director of Evangelism, Rev. C. F. Heath, and the District Secretary of Evangelism, Rev. W. G. Wegwart, have been most helpful in promoting the work of evangelism. During the year 77 revivals, 60 periods of visitation evangelism, and 67 church membership classes have been held.

Christian Education: The church schools in the district are in a healthy condition, but have not shown as much growth as the churches have shown in church membership. However, there has been an increase in both enrollment and attendance. Our pastors report an increase of 336 in church school enrollment for the year. This is not a phenomenal increase, but shows an upward trend. In all of our Quarterly Conferences, I have been giving special emphasis to the work of the church school. In the area of leadership training, four area Christian Workers' Schools and two Bible Conferences have been conducted in the district.

Our people are still very much interested in Christian higher education and our Methodist colleges. As an evidence of this fact, the churches of the district have contributed \$77,843 to the College Crusade Fund this conference year. This is not enough, but it is a vast improvement over what was being done for our colleges fifteen years ago.

Christian Missions: Our people continue to evidence their concern for Christian missions both at home and abroad by their increased giving to World Services and Conference Benevolences. At this time it appears that the churches of the New Bern District will accept \$165,000 of the \$170,000 asked on World Service and Conference Benevolences. This amount reflects an increase of about 12%. In addition to their regular World Service giving our people are giving some \$12,000 to \$15,000 in Advance Specials. They responded in a fine way to the special Alaska call by contributing \$2,405.

I want to say a word of thanks and commendation to the women of the district for their splendid work through the Woman's Society of Christian Service. In their faithful work, diligent study and generous giving they continue to be an inspiration to all of us. In the district we have 84 societies with 3,760 members.

Christian Social Concerns: Although the Commission on Christian Social Concerns is a relatively new commission in a number of our churches, it is becoming active and doing some constructive work. Our people are becoming increasingly aware of the importance of the work of this commission in the kind of world in which we live today. Certainly the time is here for the church to speak out and move forward helpfully and constructively in the important areas of temperance, human relations, world peace, and human welfare. All of us have a responsibility to help our people grow in their concern for and understanding of these vital areas of life.

Lay Activities: The laymen of our district continue to be active in the work of the church. We have a fine group of lay speakers—177—in the New Bern District who give freely of their time to fill vacant pulpits during the Lenten season and at any other time they are needed. In the district we also have 46 active Men's Clubs.

Building and Finances: The churches of the New Bern District are in a building mood, as you will note from the following building projects now in process in the district. New sanctuaries with education facilities at Atlantic Church, St. James Church (Greenville), Queen's Creek Church (Hubert), Trinity Church (New Bern), Beulaville Church and Swansboro. New educational units at Tabernacle Church (Belgrade-Tabernacle), Northwoods (Jacksonville), St. Mark (Kinston), and Salter Path.

New parsonages at Griton and Stonewall, and a new organ at Ann Street Church (Beaufort). These buildings will be constructed at a cost in excess of three quarters of a million dollars.

Finances: The churches of the New Bern District have raised this year for church and parsonage buildings, debts, and improvements, nearly a quarter of a million dollars, and for all purposes have raised in excess of one million dollars. They have also accepted raises in pastors' salaries in excess of \$10,000.

Group Ministry: In East Carteret County we have begun an experience in Group Ministry. Ten churches in the lower end of the county are participating in this project. Already several helpful programs have been initiated, and others are in the planning stage. This new venture already shows signs of success, and is rendering a helpful and constructive service to the communities and churches involved.

These are a few of the accomplishments of the churches in the New Bern District which bear eloquent evidence that religion is not dead in the New Bern District. To the faithful pastors, laymen, and women of the district I extend my heartfelt thanks for their cooperation and loyalty, and to my heavenly Father I offer my deepest gratitude and praise for His love, guidance, and protection.

RALEIGH DISTRICT

GRAHAM S. EUBANK, *District Superintendent*

In making my final report as district superintendent of the Raleigh District, I must reiterate what I said in my initial report for the district in 1959. At that time I said: "My report is truly a report for the pastors and the lay people of the Raleigh District." Through my six years with them they have thrilled me with their support and cooperation. This report is a victory report, and I count it a real privilege to be able to tell you of the victories won in the Raleigh District.

Church Extension: Again the Raleigh District has been at the forefront in Church Extension. Benson Memorial Church on the Creedmoor highway has been organized with approximately 60 charter members. At this session of the Annual Conference, a pastor will be appointed to organize a new church between Raleigh and Garner in the Greenbrier Estates area. There are many families in this area who are not now being served adequately by the Methodist church. One of the most gratifying experiences as district superintendent has been to see the organization and development of new churches. To show its support of Church Extension, the Raleigh District has contributed \$11,500 to the \$10 Club as of May first. This comes from 500 members of the \$10 Club in the Raleigh District. In addition to this support, the churches in Raleigh have paid approximately \$1 a member to the Raleigh Board of Missions for Church Extension in the Raleigh area.

Membership and Evangelism: For the first time in the history of the North Carolina Conference, a district has reached a membership of 30,000. The churches of the district have received 644 people on profession of faith and 1,107 by transfer of letter. This gives a total of 1,751 additions this year. After losses for all causes, we now have a membership of 30,044 in the Raleigh District—a net gain of 575. The district superintendent is indebted to all those who have contributed to the realization of this goal which was set six years ago.

Christian Education: The church school report for the district is not as good, but a number of churches have made large adjustments in their rolls. Even with these changes, we still show a net increase of 48 when there seems to be a downward trend throughout the nation.

College Crusade: The Raleigh District has worked hard at solicitations for the college campaign this year. In the current campaign the Raleigh District has paid \$107,599. This does not include the amount given by 15 churches through local foundations. The churches have paid a total of \$52,363 to the crusade this year. There is still a long way to go, but the people of the district will see that their commitments are met.

Stewardship: Financially, the Raleigh District has a marvelous report to make. The total money raised for all causes was \$1,630,928. This amount includes two special appeals made to our people. The district gave \$3,470 as salary supplements for the India pastors, and gave \$2,608 for the Alaska earthquake appeal.

Buildings and Improvements: In spite of the many commitments already made, several churches entered extensive building programs for both church buildings and parsonages. Seven new buildings were constructed during the year. At Dunn, a \$200,000 sanctuary was finished. This included extensive renovation of part of the physical plant. At Millbrook, a \$100,000 sanctuary was finished, also including renovation of part of the existing plant. The newly-organized White Plains Church has under construction its initial building costing \$64,500. New educational buildings have been constructed at Franklinton (\$36,000), Ebenezer (\$58,000), and St. James (\$14,942).

Renovations have been carried out in a number of churches. Lillington has renovated its sanctuary at a cost of \$42,000, as has Horne Memorial in Clayton at a cost of \$45,000. Other renovations include Trinity, Franklin County (\$25,000); Hayes Barton (\$7,013); Benson (\$4,000); Edenton Street (\$25,000); and Kipling (\$4,000). Lesser amounts have been raised for improvements at numerous other churches.

Two new parsonages were completed during the conference year: Millbrook (\$26,500), and Garner (\$27,500).

The past six years have brought me to a new awareness of the great fellowship of which all of us are a part. The love and fellowship that abound in the Christian church make all things possible. I thank God that I have had this opportunity to serve Him.

ROCKY MOUNT DISTRICT

J. W. PAGE, *District Superintendent*

The following report has been made possible by the devoted ministers and laymen of the Rocky Mount District. Without the cooperation, loyalty and understanding of both ministers and laymen this report would not have been made.

Membership and Evangelism: Our year in evangelism had a good beginning with the retreat at North Carolina Wesleyan College in August. Our pastors, under the leadership of Rev. W. Junius Neese and Rev. C. Freeman Heath, have carried out a comprehensive program of evangelism in the local churches. Over 400 members have been received into our churches on profession of faith, and over 450 have come into church membership by transfer. The members of the local church Commission on Membership and Evangelism have given of time and devotion to visitation, personal, and preaching evangelism.

Christian Education: A well-rounded program of Christian Education has been promoted in the district. Reverend Robert H. Eason is the district director of General Church School Work, and he has had the able assistance of Reverend E. M. Thompson in Adult Work, Reverend Robert L. Baldrige in Youth Work, and Mrs. O. V. Elkins in Children's Work. A number of Christian Workers' Schools have been held in strategic points in the district. Special mention is hereby made of the fine work done by Wesley Brogan, Mrs. O. V. Elkins, and Mrs. L. P. Jackson in presenting the new literature for children in six subdistricts. The Methodist Youth Fellowship has had an active year on the local, sub-district and district levels. Many of our young people participated in camping activities and youth assemblies. The Reverend and Mrs. W. Junius Neese are the leaders for the North Carolina Conference European Caravan this summer. While we have completed a good year in the field of Christian education, it is my prayer that the coming year will bring increasing efforts on the part of both ministers and laymen and teachers so that the church school may come to its full usefulness.

College Development Crusade: The people of the Rocky Mount District are being kept aware of the need for regular and systematic support of our colleges. The follow-up on the pledges made in the College Development Crusade is being constantly brought to the attention of both ministers and laymen. Our Methodist institutions of higher education are of such quality, and there will be an increasing demand on the part of young people for admission to college, to fail to properly support our colleges would be to deny our own Methodist educational heritage. The first class has graduated from Methodist college and from North Carolina Wesleyan, and with increasing enrollment at all of our colleges, the people called Methodist are summoned to the unfinished task of a sound financial girding of all our institutions of higher education.

Missions and Church Extension: Under the careful leadership of Reverend R. L. Crossno, Rocky Mount District Missionary Secretary, and with the cooperation of the ministers the whole program of missions has been promoted: World Missions, National Missions, Conference Missions, MCOB and World Service and Conference Benevolences. Our Youth delegate and Mr. Crossno attended the Missionary Conference at Lake Junaluska last summer, and plans are under way for other representatives to attend the Missionary Conference this summer. The study course for the Churchwide School of Missions on "Our Mission Today" by Tracey Jones was given in nearly every charge on the district.

Stewardship and Finance: Pioneer promotional work has been done this year by our Conference Commission on World Service and Finance in providing an excellent filmstrip and brochure entitled *When We Know, We Care; When We Care, We Share*. With these two excellent promotional devices our people have been able to see vividly the great needs of our church, and there has been a very fine response. Our World Service and Conference Benevolence acceptance has been increased by over 12 percent. In addition to this, many pastors' salaries and other budget items have also shown a marked increase.

Christian Social Concerns: Race relations is only one phase of the work of this Commission, and while race relations claims the spotlight, the other phases of the program of Social Concerns—alcohol and temperance, delinquency, narcotics, pornography, poverty, broken homes, etc.—these also are of deep concern to all. In the area of race relations the ministers and laymen of the communities of Williamston and Enfield are to be commended for their coolness and common sense in the face of a very tense and explosive situation. It is our prayer that God will continue to guide all of us in the difficult days ahead. Under the leadership of Reverend Eugene Tisdale, Reverend James Bailey

and Reverend Charles Hubbard a comprehensive program has been carried out in the area of Christian Social Concerns.

Woman's Society of Christian Service: No single group in the Rocky Mount District deserves more praise for a job well done. The Woman's Society of Christian Service of the Rocky Mount District is second in the North Carolina Conference in giving to Missions. Its influence is being felt in the other agencies of the church, and it is my conviction that this influence accounts for much of the increased acceptance on World Service and Conference Benevolence. The following three women have given excellent leadership: Miss Camille Staton of Bethel is the immediate past president of the Woman's Society of Christian Service in the Rocky Mount District, and she is the new North Carolina Conference vice-president; Mrs. L. G. Hooks of First Methodist Church in Rocky Mount is the new district president, and Mrs. S. A. Dunn of Enfield is the new Conference president. Under the leadership of these fine women the work of the Woman's Society of Christian Service has shown marked progress.

Laymen's Activities: David Speir of Bethel is the dynamic district lay leader, and under his leadership a full program of lay activities has been carried out. With the help of Roy Turnage a program of lay leadership training was held at North Carolina Wesleyan College. The laymen of the district have stood by to help not only in the "No Silent Pulpit" program, but they have helped to supply pulpits when the preachers were sick. It is not possible to praise too highly the fine work of our laymen in the Rocky Mount District.

A Tribute to a Fine Layman, Ralph Baird: At the death of his pastor, Rev. A. L. G. Stephenson of Gaston on December 23, Brother Ralph Baird, a layman and local preacher, volunteered his services to the church for the remainder of the conference year. His own church and his own people unanimously asked that this arrangement be made, and with the permission of Bishop Garber, he was appointed to Shiloh Church at Gaston. Out of the great love that Ralph Baird had for his minister, Brother Stephenson, Mrs. Stephenson was to be allowed to remain on in the parsonage until Annual Conference. Ralph Baird received only one hundred dollars a month for his services, and the remainder of the salary went to Mrs. Stephenson. Even the salary that he did receive went into a special account to be used by the church in the event that the church did not meet all of its conference obligations. Brother Ralph Baird served his church, his people and his Lord during the months of January, February and a part of March. He died in the Hospital of the Medical College of Virginia in Richmond on Good Friday and he was buried on Easter Sunday afternoon. Ralph Baird was a good and humble man, and his life will continue to be a benediction to all who knew him.

Building and Repairs: The following charges are involved in or have completed major repairs, new additions, redecoration: St. Francis on the Aulander charge, Bethel, Corinth on the Calvary charge, Elm City, Zion on the Milwaukee charge, Conway, South Rosemary on the Roanoke charge; a new sanctuary is being erected at Englewood, and a new parsonage has been completed at Nashville. In many of our charges substantial sums have been raised for the payment of debts on churches and parsonages.

WILMINGTON DISTRICT

CLYDE S. BOGGS, *District Superintendent*

It has been a signal pleasure to work with the district staff and the very fine laymen and laywomen of this district. I thank each for the help given to make this a fruitful year.

Christian Education: Every church in the district has had a part in keeping our attendance high and increasing the average attendance to a very high percentage above last year. Our district directors have provided training schools, rallies, and set-up meetings for our new materials and procedures.

Buildings and Improvements: The following churches have completed educational units: Bethesda, \$120,000; Lake Waccamaw, \$80,000; Sharon, \$60,000; Verona, \$12,000; Asbury, \$12,000; Whiteville, \$15,000; and Wrightsboro, \$19,000. New parsonages: Ocean View, Fifth Avenue, and Carolina Beach. Shallotte Camp added to the parsonage and

built a garage. Most churches have improved their property in some way. Boiling Springs gave a large lot for a new church. A new lot has been bought in Pender County and a silver chapel has been erected.

Membership and Evangelism: Our district director has led us in district and subdistrict meetings. We have received 265 on profession of faith; 456 by certificate; 116 infants baptized. We removed 86 members.

Lay Activities: Wade Pierce and his subdistrict leaders have been on the job and helping in every possible way. They are moving forward in their rallies, lay speaking program, and stewardship emphasis. The Woman's Society of Christian Service, under the fine leadership of Mrs. A. E. Goldfinch, is giving above average account of service and mission information.

Missions: Our director keeps before us many opportunities of helping others with our material resources. Our churches have donated liberally to the ministers of India and the churches of Alaska.

The wonderful Wilmington District is optimistic about the future and the forward movement of her churches.

The enrollment by courses was: Introductory, 45; Fourth Year, 33; Third Year, 31; First Year, 30; Second Year, 27; License to Preach, 7; Special, 3.

The full Methodist Course of Study was offered, including the Studies for License to Preach. Members of the faculty were A. Purnell Bailey, David Bradley, Robert W. Bradshaw, Boyd Daniels, Thor Hall, O. Kelly Ingram, W. A. Kale, Robert T. Osborn, J. H. Phillips, McMurry S. Richey, John J. Rudin, Bernard C. Russell, and Harmon L. Smith.

Information and materials are shared with architects and ministers toward this end.

At Annual Conference, 1963, the following Resolution was adopted:

"RESOLVED, that a committee chosen by the officers of the North Carolina Conference Brotherhood be authorized to figure out a more equitable schedule of assessments paid by pastors on the death of a member of the brotherhood. Due consideration shall be given to the differential in the salaries received by the pastors. This committee shall report back to the next session of the North Carolina Annual Conference."

It was recommended that Article 10 of the Constitution of the Brotherhood, which reads: "Any minister of the N. C. Conference on trial or in full connection, or any accepted supply pastor doing supply work in the Conference, may become a beneficiary member of the Brotherhood by payment of an initiation fee of \$1, and within 30 days from

the date of entrance a mortuary assessment of \$3, if salary is under \$3,000; \$4, if salary is from \$3,000 to \$4,000; and \$5, if salary is \$4,000 or above; provided that, if he has served as a clerical member one year or more . . ." be changed to the following:

"As of July 1, 1964, each mortuary assessment shall be one-tenth of one percent of total salary paid, including the apportionment for travel. This shall be \$1.00 per \$1,000, to be rounded off in the following manner: from \$1,000-\$1,500, \$1.00; \$1,501-\$2,050, \$2.00; \$2,051-\$3,050, \$3.00; \$3,051-\$4,050, \$4.00; \$4,051-\$5,050, \$5.00; \$5,051-\$6,050, \$6.00; \$6,051-\$7,050, \$7.00; \$7,051-\$8,050, \$8.00; \$8,051-\$9,050, \$9.00; and all above \$9,051, \$10.00. Any salaries paid by Minimum Salary Fund or other sources shall be included in this rate of payment.

"All connctional men shall make payment on this same scale. Any funds which they receive that are designated for "housing" or "secretarial help" shall not be included in the salary total.

"All retired ministers shall pay a mortuary fee of \$2.00 per call. Any retired minister, serving as an Approved Supply, or in a connectional office shall pay one-tenth of one percent of salary paid, per call, in lieu of the \$2.00 indicated for retired men. The maximum payment per call shall be \$10.00."

With the adoption of this scale of payment, widows will be paid \$1,800.00 per call. Our goal is to increase membership so that by next Conference we will be able to pay \$2,000.00 per call.

We urge that each member of the Brotherhood strive to enroll one or more non-beneficiary members in the local church or charge that he is serving.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL CONCERNS

Its purpose and relative fulfillment in the North Carolina Conference, SEJ

The *Discipline* of the Methodist Church, Paragraph 1516, Chapter XI, Section I, states the purpose of the Board of Christian Social Concerns as:

"To lift up before the members of the church and also the secular world the Christian concern for personal, social, and civic righteousness, to analyze the issues which confront the nation and the world as well as the local community and the person, and to propose Christian lines of action."

There are 36 areas of concern, study, and action assigned to this board which are classified under three general divisions. A description of these will follow this introductory statement.

While it would be impossible for the board to fulfill its responsibilities in all thirty-six areas in any one conference year, it has made diligent attempts with appreciable progress in the following projects during the 1963-1964 Conference Year:

1. Financial support of the Mobile Medical Clinic to the migrant ministry in Carteret County. This was the first of such a ministry in the United States. Jack Mansfield, one of our ministers, organized and operated this clinic.

2. A Conference Rally on Human Relations was held at Edenton Street Methodist Church on January 16, 1964. This was an all-day rally with such speakers as Bishop J. O. Smith of Atlanta, Georgia; Dr. Shelton Smith, Dr. D. Trigg James, and ministers from our own conference.

3. A representative from the board was sent to the National Conference on Human Relations held in Chicago.

4. A statewide convocation on Christian Social Concerns including the three North Carolina Conferences was held in Greensboro. Forty-three persons from our North Carolina Conference attended this two-day meeting.

5. Most of the district directors and executive committee members attended the Annual Southeastern Jurisdictional Briefing Conference on Christian Social Concerns at Junaluska.

6. The board cooperated with the Board of Education in securing two speakers for

the Annual Conference Session of the North Carolina Conference Methodist Youth Fellowship held at Duke University. The two speakers were Lloyd Wright, Peace Corps Chief of Public Affairs, of Washington, D. C., who spoke on "Service in the Peace Corps" and Inspector Ed Kemper of the Federal Bureau of Investigation of Washington, D. C., who spoke on "Crime, Morality and Youth Today."

7. The board was also a co-sponsor along with other North Carolina institutions and organizations of the Fifteenth Annual World Affairs Institute held at Black Mountain, N. C., in which 200 North Carolinians participated.

8. "Moral Man and Moral Society" was a special local church study by the National Board of Christian Social Concerns. Most churches conducted the study using the five booklets provided by the board.

9. Two filmstrips were contributed to TRAFECO. The two films are related to the study "Moral Man and Moral Society," and have been extensively used.

10. Peace Study Tour of Europe and Russia. Three members of the board, Charles V. Bryant, Vernon C. Tyson, and Jack Crum, who traveled and studied in nine countries including three Soviet satellites in the summer of 1962, continued to give slide presentations in some seventy-five churches during this conference year.

11. Ralph Fleming, Henry Ruark, Bill Jeffries, and Charles V. Bryant are recognized as certified teachers for Christian Workers' Schools in the area of Christian Social Concerns and have conducted such courses during the year.

12. Charles V. Bryant, pastor of Grace Methodist Church in Burlington and Jack Crum, director of Christian Social Action for the State Council of Churches who are members of the board, were featured speakers in three special district youth rallies on Christian Social Concerns sponsored by the Burlington and Durham District Methodist Youth Fellowship.

13. Charles S. Hubbard, pastor of First Methodist Church, Wilson, addressed the National Alcoholic Beverage Control Association at their annual conference at Miami Beach on the subject "The Responsibilities for Alcohol Control in a Free Country."

DIVISION OF PEACE AND WORLD ORDER

This Division has the responsibility to deal with the following issues: Foreign Policy, United Nations and related organizations, Disarmament and Nuclear Weapon control, space control, economic aid and technical assistance, tariffs and trade, immigration and naturalization, military policy and conscription legislation, conscientious objectors and the draft, and Christian overseamanship.

1. This year's major Christian Social Concerns study is on the theme, "The United States and the New Nations." This joint study, sponsored by the Commission on Christian Social Concerns and the Woman's Society of Christian Service, should be held in every local church. This is the annual Christian Social Relations study of the Woman's Society and should be set for Fall, 1964, or Spring, 1965. Top priority should be given to this study in local church Christian Social Concerns planning sessions.

Copies of filmstrips for this study will be available through the Conference TRAFECO office, The Methodist Building, Raleigh, N. C. Refer to *The Methodist Story*, June, 1964, Planning Issue for further details and materials.

Some basic resources for this study are:

a. Text—"The U. S. and the New Nations," by Vera Deans.

b. "Study Guide for the U. S. and the New Nations," by Dr. Creighton Lacy, Duke Divinity School.

c. Special study theme issue of *Concern* (May 1, 1964).

d. An excellent movie, "The Only War We Seek," produced by the U. S. Agency for International Development, focuses on the role of foreign aid in newly developing nations. This is available through any N. C. public library or through the Audio-Visual Library of the Extension Division of the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill.

2. THE SOUTHEASTERN WORLD AFFAIRS INSTITUTE, July 24-26, 1964, at Blue Ridge Assembly, Black Mountain, N. C., is again being jointly sponsored for the fourth consecutive year by our Conference Division of Peace and World Order, the West-

rn N. C. Methodist Conference Division, and other N. C. religious and civic organizations. This year's institute theme is "World Issues Facing the Voter in 1964." Featured speakers and leaders include Byron Johnson, Director U. S. Agency for International Development; Senator George McGovern of South Dakota; Dr. Arthur Waskow, Peace Research Institute; Dr. Herman Reissig, Council for Christian Social Action of the United Church of Christ; and Rev. Rodney Shaw, Director, Disarmament Education, Division of Peace and World Order, Methodist General Board of Christian Social Concerns. Mr. Joe Talley, a N. C. Conference layman and attorney from Fayetteville, will serve as general chairman. Interested Methodists are urged to attend. Get details from the Peace Division chairman or write to YMCA, Blue Ridge Assembly, Black Mountain, N. C.

3. ONE DAY UNITED NATIONS "OPEN" SEMINARS will be available regularly for individuals and groups in New York for the World's Fair. Additional facilities at the new Methodist Church Center for the U.N. make it possible to handle more effectively an increasing number of UN Seminars. These seminars are invaluable in helping Christians gain first-hand acquaintance with the U.N. as a political instrument of God's will in building brotherhood and peace in the world community.

4. ALL PASTORS and interested Commission leaders are urged to secure from the Methodist Publishing House copies of Dr. J. Wallace Hamilton's new book of sermons on Christian Social Concerns entitled *The Thunder of Barefeet*. This popular Methodist preacher presents constructive, positive Christian answers to the challenge of world revolution and world communism.

5. *The Christian Faith and War in the Nuclear Age* is a new booklet by a study commission of the 1960 General Conference of The Methodist Church. This presents a very useful analysis of our most difficult social problem with some constructive suggestions for the responsibility of the church and of individual Christians. Here is a resource for study and reading by a local commission on Christian Social Concerns and all interested Methodists. Order from the Service Dept. for \$1.00. The leader's guide for the book is 80¢.

6. WORLD ORDER SUNDAY, October 25, 1964, should be observed in every local church using materials which will be mailed by the General Board of Christian Social Concerns to every pastor and Commission chairman. Distribution to local church families of the new Methodist statement on Peace and World Order which was adopted at the recent General Conference is recommended as one way of observing this special day. THE DIVISION OF TEMPERANCE AND GENERAL WELFARE

1. The Division of Temperance and General Welfare has been charged with responsibility in the areas of alcohol problems; addiction to injurious habits such as use of tobacco and drugs; gambling; pornography; juvenile delinquency and crime; penal system and rehabilitation; mental health and medical care; problems associated with aging, population, planned parenthood, and traffic safety. Our task is to carry on a program of study, education and action centering around these concerns.

2. The Division led the conference in observing Commitment Day on the first Sunday in December.

3. The Division provided a scholarship of \$100.00 to the Reverend Charles E. Owens Burgaw to help him attend Rutgers School of Alcoholic Studies.

4. The Division has given \$250.00 to support the Christian Action League in its work in high schools and churches throughout the state in the area of alcohol education. The executive director is the Reverend D. P. McFarland.

5. Program for the Conference Year 1964-1965:

a. Commitment Sunday will be observed November 8. In connection with this observance we recommend that our local churches support the Good Shepherd Home of Lake Waccamaw in its ministry to alcoholics. Information and promotional materials may be obtained from the Reverend J. C. Dunn, Lake Waccamaw, N. C.

b. The Division will provide leadership to local church commissions as they study the area of gambling. Materials for the program, "Focus on Gambling," may be ordered

from the General Board of Christian Social Concerns, 100 Maryland Avenue, N.E., Washington, D. C. 20002.

c. The Division will continue offering \$100.00 scholarships for persons to attend the Rutgers School of Alcoholics Studies. Interested persons should contact the chairman of the Division on Temperance and General Welfare.

6. Join the brethren of the Western North Carolina Conference and the historical position of the Methodist Church to urge the trustees of Duke University to reconsider its policy on the permissiveness of alcoholic beverages in the Students' Dormitories.

THE DIVISION OF HUMAN RELATIONS AND ECONOMIC AFFAIRS

The *Discipline* states that it shall be the responsibility of the Division of Human Relations and Economic Affairs to conduct a program of research, education, and action centering around the following Christian social concerns: race relations, civil liberties, public policy on education, church and state relations, civic responsibility, labor-management relations, agriculture, conservation, government and private economic policy and practice, technological change, unemployment, housing, and such other concerns as the board may specify. The general policies shall be established by the division, subject to the approval of the board.

The crucial question that confronts us is not "Who is my neighbor?" but, to whom can I be neighborly? True neighborliness is not curious where the boundaries run; it seeks not for limit, but opportunities. We therefore urge the members of the North Carolina Annual Conference of the Methodist Church to take the following opportunities:

1. To familiarize themselves and the people of their local church with the policies of the Methodist Church and especially the Social Creed of the Methodist Church (*Discipline* 2020).

2. To be loyal to the policies of the Methodist Church to which we have pledged our loyalties.

3. To cooperate with the Good Neighbor Council of our state and to pledge our support to its cause and work.

4. To encourage the sacred observance of the laws of our land in all areas and especially in regard to Civil Rights.

5. To carry out a meaningful program and observance of Race Relations Sunday in their local church. (Every local church will be provided with a suggested program for this special day in 1965 by the Conference Commission of Christian Social Concerns.)

Suggested Program for the Conference Year 1964-1965

1. CONFERENCE CONVOCATION ON CHRISTIANITY AND COMMUNISM will be held Monday, March 1, 1965, at Edenton Street Methodist Church, Raleigh, N. C. Nationally known church and government leaders will discuss the Christian answers to the Communist challenge. Complete details of this major Conference-wide social concerns event will be sent to local church leaders. All pastors, laymen of our Conference, and the general public will be invited.

2. We recommend that each local church commission study the Supreme Court decision on the ruling in regard to prayer in the public schools. The 1963 session of the North Carolina Annual Conference requested our commission to study the Supreme Court decision on prayer in the public schools. We report that study was made but no action taken or policy formulated. We recognize the complexity of this issue and recommend that our Commission on Christian Social Concerns plan further study under the direction of qualified resource persons.

RECOMMENDATIONS

Recommendation I

Whereas, The General Conference of the Methodist Church, meeting in Pittsburgh, Pa., re-affirmed the principle of voluntarism in its "Plan of Action for the Elimination of the Central Jurisdiction," and

Whereas, The Delegation of the North Carolina Conference, SEJ, overwhelmingly supported the legislation adopted,

Therefore be it resolved, That the North Carolina Conference, SEJ, in session at the Front Street Methodist Church, Burlington, N. C., June 22-25, 1964, pledges its full support to the implementation of the "Plan of Action" proposed by the "Commission of Thirty-six" and adopted by the 1964 General Conference of The Methodist Church. Be it resolved, further, that the North Carolina Conference, SEJ, establish a Commission as requested by the "Plan of Action," to wit: "That each Annual Conference designate a Committee or Commission to meet with the designated group from the other Conferences involved to discuss and work out together the problems and adjustments involved in the transfer of Central Jurisdiction Conferences into the *regional jurisdiction* ("Plan of Action," etc., page 30; italics added).

1. This Commission shall be called "The Commission on Interjurisdictional Relations, North Carolina Conference, SEJ."

2. It shall be composed of thirty (30) members as follows: The Bishop, one (1) representative from the Bishop's Cabinet, the Conference Lay Leader, the President of the Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service, two (2) members of the General Conference Legislative "Committee on Conferences" from the North Carolina Conference, the President and one (1) layman appointed by the President of each of the following Boards and Agencies: Board of Education, Commission on Christian Higher Education, Board of Evangelism, Board of Hospitals and Homes, Board of Lay Activities, Commission on Minimum Salary, Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications, Board of Missions, Board of Pensions, Board of Christian Social Concerns, Commission on Town and Country Work, Commission on World Service and Finance.

3. The Commission shall be given adequate financing by the Commission on World Service and Finance to carry out fully and efficiently the responsibilities assigned to it.

4. The Commission shall meet for the purpose of organization immediately upon adjournment of this Conference and shall present a Progress Report and its Recommendations for further action to each Annual Conference of the 1964-1968 Quadrennium.

Recommendation II

Whereas the 1964 General Conference urged "that each Annual Conference of the regional Jurisdiction, other than the Western, vote by record to receive into its Jurisdiction the Annual Conference or Annual Conferences of the Central Jurisdiction which lie within the boundaries of the Jurisdiction, as provided in Amendment IX;"

Therefore, the Board of Christian Social Concerns:

1. Urges our Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference meeting at Junaluska on July 8-2 to develop a Jurisdictional plan for the elimination of the Central Jurisdiction;

2. Urges the Central Jurisdiction to realign its annual conference boundaries so that they may not overlap boundaries of the regional jurisdictions; and

3. Urges our North Carolina Conference to implement the action of the General Conference by voting within the prescribed period of three years to approve the transfer of the North Carolina Conference (Central Jurisdiction) along with other Conferences of the Central Jurisdiction that lie within the boundaries of our Jurisdiction into the Southern Jurisdiction.

REPORT OF THE INTERCONFERENCE COMMISSION ON COLLEGE AND UNIVERSITY RELIGIOUS WORK

The past year has seen forward steps taken in several directions by the Interconference Commission and the Methodist Student Movement, which it sponsors. Responsible churchmen who are teachers, preachers, Woman's Society workers, and others, have given endless hours in committee meetings and study groups to help improve our campus ministry.

Efforts are being made to achieve longer tenures for professional workers. Attention also is being given to the matters of parsonages, further graduate study, retirement, vacations, and sabbatical leaves. Because of gradually-increased appropriations, salaries of directors have been increased accordingly. In the past it has been hard to meet the basic requirements of an accredited Wesley Foundation, which include a director with a B.D. degree, and preferably with pastoral experience. Such a man usually could make more money by receiving the minimum salary as a pastor from conferences which pay minimum salaries. But some have been willing to sacrifice by serving with extremely low salaries and without parsonage allowances. For the coming year, we have been able to approach a man with several years' experience about serving as a campus minister, beginning on a salary which is slightly above the minimum for his conference. A small allowance is included for housing. An increasingly responsible campus ministry depends in large part upon the interest, concern, prayers, and financial gifts, of our church.

Students are showing more interest. They are serving on Annual Conference Boards and Commissions and are anxious to participate in the meetings, whenever possible. Several Memorials from student groups were sent to the General Conference. Some Methodist student groups had study sessions on issues faced by the General Conference. Several students have shown in a variety of ways their concern for dignity and racial equality. Giving from North Carolina through the Methodist Student Movement Fund was the highest in history during the past year. The Fund is for missions and education. Worship, study, lectures, drama, social action, and informal recreation characterize many local meetings of the Methodist Student Movement.

Local units of the MSM are advised and guided by Boards of Directors or Campus-Church Relations Committees whose members are elected by the Annual Conferences. Increasingly, the Boards and Committees are becoming more responsible. The Interconference Commission has requested that every Board and Committee have regular, stated meetings and that the State Director of the Methodist Student Movement be included as an *ex officio* member, without vote, on every board and committee. This will promote a regular and a more direct relationship between the local groups and the Interconference Commission.

The Interconference Commission is recognizing the need of financial help for our Methodist student groups on our Methodist college campuses. During the coming year three such groups will be receiving funds from the Commission.

One of the highlights of the year was the opening of the new Methodist Student Center at Appalachian State Teachers College in Boone. It was built by gifts from capital funds campaigns. Through the years this building will attract visitors from elsewhere, as well as students and faculty from the college.

Soon work will be under way on a new building for the Wesley Foundation at Chapel Hill. With approximately 2,000 Methodist students at this school, the largest concentration anywhere in the state, an ever-broadening and deepening ministry is required. Our main effort in the months ahead will be aimed at Chapel Hill.

The annual statewide Methodist Student Conference has developed into a meeting of quality in the fields of lectures, sermons, drama, seminars, and other ways of communicating with each other. The session this past year was held at Centenary Methodist Church, Winston-Salem, with the Reverend James Lawson of Memphis, Tennessee, as main speaker. More and more pastors are indicating their interest by visiting some of the sessions of the Methodist student conferences and retreats.

During the year a spiritual life retreat was held with Dr. D. D. Holt, president of Scarritt College, as speaker. A spring leadership training conference was held under the

dership of the state student council with inspirational addresses given by Elmer Hall, mer missionary to Malaya and a past president of the Methodist Student Movement of rth Carolina.

The 1965 Methodist Student Conference will be held at West Market Street Method- Church, Greensboro, February 5-7, with the theme: "Our Unquenchable Quest: The ve That Lives."

We have come far, but the job is far from done. With more than 15,000 Methodist dents attending colleges in our state, most of them at schools outside the jurisdiction our denomination, there is an increasing need to minister to them where they are. This is for buildings—but even more, for additional personnel.

SUMMARY REPORT FOR 1963-1964

Church School Membership and Attendance

We regret to report a decrease in church school membership and attendance in the year 1962-1963. Church school membership dropped 1.8%, average attendance dropped 0.6%, while the Methodist Church dropped 1.2% in church school membership and 0.3% in average attendance. This is the second year since 1960 in which our Conference has had a decrease. Most major Protestant denominations have experienced either a decrease or a slow-up in increase in church school membership in recent years. The Methodist Church had a gain of 16.3% during this period, while the thirteen denominations together had a gain of 49.8%. The U. S. population gain for this period was 22.5%.

The executive secretary attended a consultation in Nashville, Tennessee, in late January to study the causes for this decline. This study revealed that this decline is symptomatic of more basic problems that require sustained, long-range efforts for solution. Some of the factors contributing to this decline were identified as middle class identification, neglect of the teaching ministry by pastors, poor quality of church school program, failure to replace "revivalism" with an effective technique of evangelism, failure to involve the laity, failure to minister to the basic needs of persons, intellectual revolt against contemporary religion, lack of unity in the church's ministry, failure to follow shifting population, poor record-keeping and reporting, increase in leisure time and weekend mobility, increase of negative image of the church, lack of concern for persons.

Our conference participated in a *Lenten Emphasis on Increasing Church School Membership and Attendance* conducted throughout the Methodist Church. We hope the report for 1963-1964 will show an increase. At the same time we realize that sustained, long-range efforts are necessary.

Leadership Training

During the past year thirty-eight Christian Workers' Schools were held, with an enrollment of 2,942, and 1,966 Course Cards of Recognition issued. A larger number of Laboratory Observation courses were held in connection with these schools. In addition, our one-teacher schools were conducted in small churches. Thirty-eight persons attended the Leadership and Laboratory Schools at Lake Junaluska. One person attended the

Seminar for Prospective Laboratory Instructors. Six or eight delegates from our conference attended the Church School Administrators' Conference, and a like number attended the Institute of Church Music. A Coaching Conference for Prospective Leadership Education Instructors was held at Camp Chestnut Ridge in September. Forty-four persons were enrolled in four courses and twenty-five of these have completed their work for certification.

Approximately twelve local church consultations were conducted in the various districts. The conference staff conducted eight local church consultations on "Church School Building and Equipment." Numerous other weekend labs, planning retreats, etc., were conducted by the conference staff. District and conference-wide training enterprises included: camp staff training sessions, orientation workshop for new pastors (an interboard project), vacation church school institutes, children's curriculum seminars, regional consultation on administering laboratory schools, regional consultation on adult work, retreat for directors of Christian education and education assistants, planning conference with study feature on "Ministry of the Laity."

Proposals for 1964-1965

In more than a figurative sense the church is a continuation of the Incarnation. We are called to be His Body, obedient to the same Spirit that motivated the historical Jesus. The knowledge of our crucial role in being priests to our neighbors constrains us to view with great seriousness any indication of our ineffectiveness as witnesses. Our attention has been called to the alarming decline in church school enrollment and attendance, and to the failure of church membership to keep pace with the national population growth. It has been observed, probably correctly, that the largest decrease has been in the home department, that faulty reporting may be the reason for some of the evident decline, and that more rigorous methods of record-keeping may be responsible to some extent. Some churches are too diligent in "cleaning up their rolls" of the church school. There seems to be little question but that we need to give more careful attention to the recognized standards for keeping church school records. However, we feel compelled to acknowledge that there are more significant reasons for the decline such as those identified by the Nashville consultation listed above. In order to alleviate these problems, the Board proposes a renewed and increased effort in leadership education.

Leadership Training

1. We call upon each subdistrict to conduct a Christian Workers' School. The pastors are requested to give attention to the increased necessity for well-prepared leaders and to assume the responsibility for planning these schools. It is recommended that these schools be conducted in two sessions, one offering enrichment courses and the other methods. Laboratory Observation courses are commended as being especially helpful method of communicating techniques.
2. Small churches are encouraged to take advantage of the special provisions made for one-teacher schools. Any accredited course may be offered in such schools.
3. We call the attention of pastors and local church leaders to the "Local Church Consultation Service" whereby a trained consultant will come to the church to advise with concerned persons about problems they are facing in their church school.
4. Local churches are urged to send some of their workers to the Leadership and Laboratory Schools, August 2-7 and 9-14, and the Church School Administrators Conference, August 14-16, 1964, at Lake Junaluska.
5. A Coaching Conference for Prospective Leadership Education Instructors for selected Children's division courses will be held at Camp Chestnut Ridge, September 1-3, 1964.
6. Subdistrict Institutes for Church School Workers will be conducted by the district Christian education staffs in early November, 1964.
7. Each local church is urged to develop its own leadership development plan. The executive secretary is available to assist local churches in this.

8. The Conference Board of Education is ready to cooperate with other conference boards and agencies in sponsoring training opportunities for local church commissionaires.

Pilot Projects

In keeping with the quadrennial emphasis on local church self-analysis and in order to provide for forty pastors and forty laymen, the opportunity for a period of concentrated study and discussion on "The Renewal of the Church," the following pilot projects are being planned:

1. Ministers' Conference on The Nature and Mission of the Church, April 22-23, 1965, at Camp Chestnut Ridge.
2. Laymen's Conference on The Ministry of the Laity, April 23-25, 1965, at Camp Chestnut Ridge. (In cooperation with the Conference Board of Lay Activities.)

Releasing Methodism From Its Middle-Class Identification

We are aware of the sociological fact of the increased identification of The Methodist Church with the upper-middle class and our corresponding failure to minister effectively to either the lower or higher socio-economic groups in our society. That our church may more effectively minister to all persons, we propose the following:

1. Each local church is urged to discover those groups of persons living at the bottom of human need in their community and to provide some presence among them and ministry to them. Eventually outpost classes might be established to which they could be brought.
2. The Conference Boards of Education and Missions are urged to collaborate in the establishment of one outpost Sunday school in an area of very great economic need and social disorganization. The two agencies are encouraged to make creative and adventurous use of personnel and resources in an effort to discover possible new and more effective forms of ministry to those who have been normally beyond the reach of our Methodism. It is recognized that such a project will require the financial support and the leadership assistance of other agencies of the North Carolina Annual Conference.
3. We encourage our lawyers to attend the Methodist Lawyers' Conference, July 2-5, 1964, and our medical doctors to attend the Methodist Physicians' Conference, July 16-18, 1964, at Lake Junaluska. We further recommend that pastors and the Conference Board of Education staff investigate the possibility of establishing study corps through the conference for professional groups designed to assist them in investigating the relevance of the Christian ethic for their professional responsibilities.

Central Jurisdiction

We recommend that members of our Central Jurisdiction churches located within the bounds of our conference be invited to participate in our Christian Workers' Schools and other leadership training enterprises. We request the executive secretary to supply each pastor with a list of these churches together with the names and addresses of their pastors.

Special Days

We recommend that each local church observe the following special days with appropriate and meaningful programs:

1. Promotion Sunday In The Church School, August 30, 1964.
2. Christian Education Day, September 27, 1964, a special offering for "Leadership Training."
3. Christian Education Week, September 27-October 4, 1964.
4. Student Recognition Day, December 27, 1964
5. Race Relations Sunday, February 14, 1965, with a special offering for Paine College.
6. National Family Week, May 2-9, 1965
7. Methodist Student Day, June 13, 1965, with a special offering for Student Loan and Scholarship Fund.
8. World Service Sunday in the Church School, each fourth Sunday.

Christian Education in the Local Church Month, September, 1964

We recommend that September, 1964, be designated Christian Education Month in the Local Church, in the North Carolina Annual Conference.

1. That special classes for parents of children be planned in each local church during the Sunday school hours for the following studies:

September 6: Opportunities for Parents to Share in the Use of "Christian Studies for Methodist Children."

September 13: The Use of the Bible in "Christian Studies for Methodist Children."

September 20: Theological Concepts in "Christian Studies for Methodist Children."

September 27: Evangelism and Missions in "Christian Studies for Methodist Children."

2. That each local church start at least one new adult class.

3. That an organized effort be made to reach drop-outs and to reach more persons with Christian teaching.

4. That Christian Education Day be observed in every local church September 27.

5. That Christian Education Week be observed in every local church September 27-October 4.

Service of The Conference Staff

We call attention to the field services available to local churches by our Conference Board of Education staff. Increasingly churches are calling upon members of the staff for advice concerning renovating or building educational facilities, counseling with church school workers concerning their needs and problems, etc. A brochure is available from the Board office describing this service which is limited only by time and schedule.

The executive secretary is requested to investigate the possibility of making the entire staff available to one or more district superintendents for a week for intensive consultations in small churches.

We commend the staff in general and Rev. Wesley G. Brogan and Rev. J. Conrad Glass, Jr., in particular for the pioneer work that has been done and is being contemplated in the areas of the "Mentally Retarded" and "Senior Migrant Work Camp," respectively.

We acknowledge the wise and irenic leadership, the rich resourcefulness born of long experience in the field, and the passion for the objectives of Christian education which characterize his services, and respectfully request the bishop to reappoint Dr. Clarence Poe Morris as executive secretary of the Board of Education of the North Carolina Annual Conference.

Section B

COMMITTEE ON CHILDREN'S WORK

E. C. SHOAF, *Chairman*

PROGRESS REPORT FOR 1963-64

The Committee on Children's Work has given emphasis to the following areas of need during the conference year 1963-64:

1. Ten Vacation Church School Institutes were conducted to give guidance to teachers from local churches. A total of 1270 persons attended the institutes.

2. During the year, five laboratory courses for Children's Workers were conducted. Of the 42 persons enrolled in these courses, 33 received Course Cards of Recognition. One weekend laboratory course was held in a local church for teachers and prospective teachers.

3. One hundred ninety-eight persons enrolled in Children's Workers' courses in eight Christian Workers' Schools. Of this number, 150 fulfilled the requirements of the course and received Course Cards of Recognition.

4. As a part of the plan for introducing *Christian Studies for Methodist Children* the following courses were taught in Christian Workers' Schools:

Understanding the Bible, 12 schools; Foundations of Christian Teaching, 14 schools

Life and Mission of the Church, 13 schools; with a total enrollment of 1,063 and 870 Course Cards of Recognition.

5. Forty-four subdistrict meetings were conducted for the church school administrative personnel to help them prepare for the organizational changes that will come about with the introduction of *Christian Studies for Methodist Children*.

6. Introductory sessions for pastors were held in each district to acquaint them with some of the undergirding educational and theological ideas of the new curriculum materials for children.

7. The committee has continued supervision and planning in the area of the ministry to mentally retarded children. A resident camp for 54 mentally retarded children was held August 18-23, 1963, at Camp Don-Lee. We are continuing to pursue plans for the establishment of special church school classes for mentally retarded children and a ministry to the families of these children.

8. Work in the area of Methodist Week-Day Kindergartens has continued with evaluations of established schools and guidance in organizing new schools.

9. Supervision of additional regular areas of work has continued, including leadership-development and teacher-training in workers' schools, weekend clinics, church-building consultations, camping and others.

Recommendations for 1964-65

A review of our work with children leads us to recommend the following emphases for the coming year 1964-65:

1. That further efforts be made to assist local church personnel in preparation for the use of *Christian Studies for Methodist Children*.

a. June 5 and 6 a training session to be held at North Carolina Wesleyan College, Rocky Mount, N. C., for all district staffs of children's workers.

b. During the month of July, subdistrict curriculum workshops to be held for local church teachers.

c. July 26-30, a conference laboratory school to be conducted at Rocky Mount, N. C., in which will be used new curriculum materials for children.

d. November 8-13, a series of subdistrict meetings held as a follow-up to the first quarter use of *Christian Studies for Methodist Children* and preparation for use the next quarter.

2. That the ministry to the mentally retarded be continued in the following ways:

a. August 16-22, a resident camp for 56 mentally retarded children be held at Camp Don-Lee.

b. October 9, 10, 11, a weekend retreat for families of mental retardates be held at Camp Don-Lee.

c. That a retreat for older mental retardates be held in the fall of 1964.

d. Continue efforts to establish additional Sunday school classes for these children.

3. To meet the increasing demand for leadership in Christian Workers' Schools, and help the present leadership meet the need for re-certification as brought about by the change in children's curriculum materials, a coaching conference will be held at Camp Chestnut Ridge, September 1, 2, 3, 1964.

4. That with the beginning of a new quadrennium and the subsequent organization of a new Committee on Children's Work for the Conference Board of Education, a training and orientation session for the committee be held at Camp Chestnut Ridge, October 15 and 16, 1964. In addition to studying the function and role of the committee, a minimum of six fifty-minute periods shall be given to the study of the Leadership Course 211, *Teaching Children*.

5. In cooperation with other concerned groups, we urge that in each district there be conducted, during the month of October, 1964, a Missionary Education Institute. The purpose of the institute to be that of helping local church teachers prepare to teach the recommended Mission Study Units. We suggest the use of the world theme, "The Church's Mission Among New Nations."

6. That Christian Workers' Schools include a course or courses on the role of the Counseling Teacher and the Division Superintendent(s).

7. That in keeping with the renewed emphasis on the ministry of the laity and the need for the Conference Board of Education to maintain a close fellowship with local church teachers, serious consideration be given to securing subdistrict directors of children's work for the conference year 1965-66. That at the planning meeting, in the spring of 1965, a report defining the responsibilities of the subdistrict directors be returned by the following committee:

Mr. Wesley G. Brogan

8. That a committee composed of Mrs. Mildred Auman, Mrs. Elma Stevens, and Mrs. Peggy Byrd prepare a list of standards for Methodist Week-day Kindergartens in the North Carolina Conference. That this same committee give serious study to a procedure by which these schools may be approved by the North Carolina Conference Board of Education. The report of this committee will become a part of the 1965 report of the Children's Work Committee to be presented to the Board for consideration.

9. That Vacation Church School Institutes be held in 12 areas of the conference during the period, March 22 to April 6. We further recommend the use of the Vacation Church School units of study which form a part of *Christian Studies for Methodist Children*. We recommend that the institutes be conducted from 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m.

10. That a Conference Laboratory School be held July 11-15, 1965.

11. That a Convocation of Children's Workers be held July 15-16, 1965.

12. We feel that the reported decline in church school membership attendance stems in part from the lack of communication between church and home. We recommend three actions to open communication and improve cooperation between church and home:

a. That home visitation by local church school teachers be encouraged.

b. That a suggested letter be sent by the Conference Director of Children's Work to each local church that they, in turn, may use to send to parents.

c. That local churches conduct parents' meetings during the month of August 1964. The purpose of these meetings to be the introduction of *Christian Studies for Methodist Children* and guidance in use of the pupil material in the home.

13. We recognize that our conference, its churches, and teachers of children, and the boys and girls themselves would be poorer indeed without this continuing leadership of Wesley G. Brogan, our director of Children's Work. We especially call to your attention the fine experimental and creative work he has done recently in developing a pilot program for mentally retarded children, and leadership training through the use of short-term laboratory and teaching clinics in local churches. We, therefore, respectfully request his reassignment.

Section C

COMMITTEE ON YOUTH WORK

W. ALBERT GRAHAM, *Chairman*

PROGRESS REPORT FOR 1963-64

Enrollment in the Youth Division decreased 533 to a total of 28,602 for a decrease of 1.8%.

Recognizing that youth have varying needs and interests, the Youth Committee and the Youth Council have been operating on the philosophy that a varied program need to be offered to the Senior Highs in our conference. Last year the Conference Board offered the following ministries: Workshop at North Carolina Wesleyan College, Work Camp at Morehead City, Recreation Lab at North Carolina Wesleyan College, More Concerns Conference and Senior Camp at Camp Don-Lee, Annual Conference session at Duke University, and the United Nations-Washington tour of Peace and World Order. We can report that 1,030 persons participated in these experiences as compared with

943 in 1962-63 and 722 in 1961-62. Of the total 1,030, 527 persons attended the Twelfth Annual Conference session at Duke in August, which was the largest participation on record. We trust that this continued rise is an indication that this philosophy of a youth ministry is a valid one. We hope and pray that those participating are being challenged to "be the church in the world."

One part of last summer's program must be lifted out for special mention. This is the work camp, which was held among the migrant workers in the Carteret County area. The intention of this service project was to serve the following functions: (1) to make possible practical demonstrations of Christian faith and commitment, with focus on the needs of persons; (2) to serve as a witness for the Christian faith and church in the community; (3) to make significant contributions to the everyday life of the migrants; (4) to acquaint seniors with social, economic, racial, political, and other problems of the community and world; and (5) to indicate, in some small way, to a part of the migrant community, that a part of the white teen-age community does care and has compassion to give a little of themselves in order to help the migrants help themselves. We feel that in some measure these goals were achieved. We can say that those seventeen who participated experienced, perhaps for the first time, a sense of what it means to be a part of a Christian community. The work campers came to respect all persons as children of God. All who took part in this experience are now "changed persons."

This coming summer's proposed program for Senior Highs will again offer experiences for differing interests and needs. In addition to the Senior Workshop and Annual Conference session, another Moral Concerns Conference will be held. After two conferences on the moral concern of "The Role of Sex in Christian Living," this year's weekend experience at Camp Don-Lee will deal with the moral concern of the Christian and Human Relations, with particular emphasis on Race Relations. Two new programs are offered this year. One of these is the Study Seminar at Duke University. The seminar is for the young person who is willing to set aside a week of serious study on theological questions. This program, which will be directed by one from the Divinity School faculty, has been compared to the advanced science courses offered in the summer for advanced students. The other new program added to the summer ministries is a week of camping at Camp Chestnut Ridge for one small group of seniors interested in a rustic camping experience.

We can report that 533 Junior Highs and 80 Senior Highs attended camp sessions last summer. Thirteen participated in the Older Youth/Single Young Adult Appalachian Trail Hike.

In the area of leadership education, we can report that fourteen courses were offered in Christian Workers' Schools with 256 persons enrolled and 161 receiving credit cards. This report included three Senior High Labs, one of which provided training for adults in using the new undated unit entitled, "Sex and the Whole Person."

Last summer one person from our conference attended the Junior High Lab and Seminar at Lake Junaluska as preparation for certification as a laboratory instructor.

During the week of April 5-18, twelve consultation seminars were held throughout our conference in an effort to determine the needs, problems, and concerns of the local church teachers and counselors and to determine in what ways we, as a Board, may be of help to them. Some of the suggestions have prompted recommendations which will appear later in this report.

As of February 29, \$7,945.74 has been raised for the Methodist Youth Fund. This is a decrease of \$251.27 over the same period last year.

The special MYF Study Commission is still working at its demanding, but exciting, task of studying and evaluating the work of the Methodist Youth Fellowship in North Carolina. Dr. Leo Rippy, Jr. and his research assistant, Miss Phyllis Hale, after many hours of work, prepared and chose the instruments to be used in local churches. These tests are now being marked by the young people in the sample churches throughout our conference. Dr. Rippy has set a target date of September 8-9, for his report of the findings, to the full Study Commission. Dr. Rippy will be accompanied, at this meeting, by two persons from the General Board staff, Mr. Rene Pino and Miss Ruth Emory. As most persons are aware, this research project is a joint effort through the sponsorship of our

Conference Board of Education, the General Board of Education, and Scarritt College. We are also pleased to report that some financial aid was recently given to the project by the Ormond Fund.

While Dr. Rippy has been busy, the members of the Study Commission have been divided into two sections with one group working on "the theological foundations of the youth work" and the other giving its efforts to "understanding the youth and his world."

Following Dr. Rippy's report in September, the Commission will be concerned with the task of evaluating and recommending the program, to be followed by experimentation in local churches. The final result, we trust, will be a more fruitful ministry to the youth of North Carolina. We are grateful to the tireless efforts of Dr. Rippy and Miss Hale.

Plans have been finalized for the Convocation of Adult Workers with Youth to be held at North Carolina Wesleyan College the weekend of September 11-13, 1964. The theme for the convocation will be "You'h—Their World, Their Dreams, Their Faith, Their Gospel."

Dr. Leo Rippy, Jr. has been secured as our main resource leader. It is hoped that local churches will provide the resources for sending many of their youth teachers and counselors to this convocation.

We offer special thanks for the time, energy, and work of the district directors of Youth Work. Their contributions to the youth ministry is invaluable.

Recommendations for Youth Work 1964-1965

1. That the work of the special MYF Study Commission be endorsed as it continues its task of studying, evaluating, and recommending programs for all levels of the Methodist Youth Fellowship.

2. That each local church be urged to sponsor adult teachers and counselors to the Convocation of Adult Workers with Youth, September 11-13, 1964, at North Carolina Wesleyan College.

3. That a third Senior High United Nations-Washington Study Tour be held March 20-26, 1965.

4. That the Youth Council consider the possibility that all the senior summer program be open to any Methodist Youth of the Central Jurisdiction within the geographical bounds of the North Carolina Conference.

5. That the Youth Council consider the possibility of forming a special committee for the purpose of confronting our young people with the Methodist Youth Fund as an expression of their commitment to Christ.

6. That a committee be formed to evaluate the subdistrict in order to determine its role and purpose in the youth ministry.

7. That the Annual Conference Session Committee of the Youth Council again consider the possibility of having a training session for adult workers with youth as a part of the Annual Conference Session Rally Day.

8. That training sessions for the new adult workers with youth be held in subdistrict institutes, November 8-13, 1964.

9. That the Youth Council consider the possibility of having a weekend conference on the theme of "Christian Strategies in Social Change."

10. That the Youth Council consider the possibility of a weekend conference on the theme of "Youth and Their Commitment."

11. That, recognizing the need for a more effective ministry among older youth/young adults, a committee explore, with General Board personnel, the possible approaches to this age group, possibly leading to pilot projects.

12. That a pilot project be attempted in the following year, if possible, with older youth/young adults in an effort to help them recognize their responsibility to be "the church in the world."

13. That the possibility for a statewide Methodist Youth Assembly be explored.

14. That, recognizing that youth are a part of the church, all conference boards and agencies hold their meetings at a time when the youth members may attend.

15. That a youth mission study be held in each local church using the study materials, "Spanish Americans" or "The Church's Mission Among New Nations."

16. That, in order to help each youth and each MYF to grasp the full meaning of Christian community," each local MYF do a study on "The Life and Mission of the church."

17. That courses for adult workers with youth be included in all Christian Workers' schools and, where possible, a laboratory course be offered.

18. That the Youth Committee study the report of the Study of Public School dropouts to the end that the church may better understand the reasons for the dropouts' non-participation in the youth program of the local church and that the local church MYF's and Commission on Education investigate the extent of and causes for dropouts from the youth program and initiate appropriate steps to remedy the situation.

The Youth Committee wishes to commend the Reverend J. Conrad Glass, Jr. for his continuing forward thinking and diligence in carrying out the youth program. We feel that the increased attendance at all the summer activities is a direct result of his enthusiasm and willingness to involve himself in an ever-widening range of opportunities for youth to grow in the Christian faith.

We respectfully and enthusiastically recommend that he be reappointed to his position of leadership and guidance of the youth of the North Carolina Conference.

Section D

COMMITTEE ON ADULT WORK

PROGRESS REPORT, 1963-64

Enrollment in the Adult Division decreased by 1,344 to a total of 60,521 (1962-63). This is a decrease of 2.17% over 1961-62.

Only three Adult Division courses were offered in Christian Workers' Schools, with a total enrollment of 58, and 44 cards of recognition. One Adult Laboratory was scheduled but had to be cancelled because no qualified instructor was available.

The Young Adult Assembly at Camp Don-Lee, June 7-9, 1963, was attended by 29 delegates. The Assembly was devoted to helping young adults understand the nature and purpose of the church in changing times and to comprehend how they can be the church in these changing times.

The fourth annual Spiritual Life Retreat at Camp Chestnut Ridge, September 27-28, 1963, had 22 participants. The retreat was developed around the theme, "Serving With My Lord."

Young Adult Week was observed in many local churches during the week of January 1964. Suggested activities for this observance from the Conference Young Adult Council and director of Adult Work of the Board of Education were mailed to all local churches. Suggestions for new avenues and opportunities of study and new resource materials were presented to pastors and adult division superintendents of local churches through timely mailings from the Board of Education office.

Some progress has been made in recruiting capable new leaders to become certified courses in the Adult Division and to become certified laboratory instructors. At present we have no certified adult laboratory instructor in our conference.

QUADRENNIAL GOALS — 1964-68

1. Renewal of life in the church through the ministry of a committed laity.
 - a. Planning and execution to involve all men, women, and older youth of the church.
 - b. The proposal is to be a continuing emphasis, implemented from the conference level through district and subdistrict organizations and ultimately throughout every local church within the conference.
 - c. To explore and provide new avenues of ministry to the older youth-young adults that are not now reached by existing activities of our churches.

a. Make use of existing studies and discoveries from the pilot seminars projected by the General Board of Education.

b. Plan, in cooperating with the Youth Council, specific projects in key areas of need in both urban and rural areas.

3. A continuing emphasis toward developing each adult church school class into a redemptive fellowship where true learning takes place.

4. To encourage direct involvement of every adult in the church school in serious and deep Bible study, resulting in a clear concept and interpretation of its eternal message and its application in the world today; a special effort to be made to meet the needs of adults who are unable to read and write, in cooperation with existing agencies already working with the needs of these people.

5. To promote the effective organization and function of the Adult Council and/or the Commission on Education in each local church. Emphasize use of *Local Church Consultation Service* in providing leadership for training local church leaders.

PROGRAMS AND RECOMMENDATIONS FOR 1964-65

1. We recommend two training sessions on the conference level for key leaders of each district for the purpose of presenting the new *Adult Bible Course* series and more effective methods of teaching.

a. These leaders in turn, along with key resource persons, are to conduct district and/or subdistrict training sessions to train key leaders and teachers from all local churches to help persons in the local church begin a systematic study of the scriptures acquainting them with the ways of studying the scriptures and with resources to guide their inquiry.

b. These two training sessions on the conference level are to be held preferably at Kinston and Sanford during Christian Education Week, September 27-October 4, 1964.

2. We recommend that the Committee on Adult Work cooperate with the Committee on General Church School Work in establishing pilot projects for laymen and for ministers in the area of the renewal of the church through the ministry of a committed laity.

3. We recommend that district directors of Adult Work and pastors of local churches encourage young adults in each local church to participate in the Spiritual Life Retreat at Camp Chestnut Ridge September 25-26, 1964, and the Young Adult Assembly at Camp Don-Lee June 4-6, 1965.

4. We recommend that each local church observe a special Older Youth-Young Adult Week and make use of the special unit entitled "Four Faces of Me" in the June 1964 issue of the *Adult Student*.

5. To make their teaching more effective, we recommend that all teachers of adult classes in the local church attend a district and/or subdistrict training session in the use of the new *Adult Bible Course* series and that they read the following book: *The Birth of the Latt*, by Howard Grimes.

6. We urge the inclusion of an Adult Laboratory in all Christian Workers' Schools in which basic adult courses have recently been taught and that every Christian Workers' School include at least one course in the Adult Division, beginning with 410, "Understanding Adults," and 411, "Helping Adults Learn," and then moving into more specialized areas, such as 412.1, "Young Adult Work in the Church," and the course, "Working with Older Adults in the Church," and finally planning for an Adult Laboratory.

7. We recommend the reappointment of the Reverend John H. Sutton, Jr., as conference director of Adult Work and Camping.

COMMITTEE ON CHRISTIAN FAMILY LIFE

PROGRESS REPORT FOR 1963-64

The seed-bed of life is the home. From it may spring either evil fruits or love fruits. The church must assume the privilege of nurturing Christian seed in the home into full fruition of love fruits in Christ's kingdom.

The challenge of our present technological world to the Christian family is frightening. But our church has the message and the answer. Our task is to discover ways and means of channeling this message and answer into the total home life.

From our homes filled with Christ and His love our children can grow into the kind of persons who will transform our society into a nearer likeness of the heavenly society. We must work to make our homes and our churches the instruments through which God may redeem His world.

Two Family Camps at Camp Don-Lee July 13-16 and 16-19 were attended by a total of 22 families composed of 42 adults and 64 children.

Only two courses in the area of Family Life were taught in Christian Workers' schools, with a total enrollment of 70 and the granting of 43 cards of recognition.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. That we establish Pastoral Care and Counseling Centers within the bounds of our conference.
2. That the local church recognize the needs and utilize the talents of retired persons.
3. That district directors of Family Life become accredited in at least one course in the family life curriculum.
4. That a committee be appointed by the chairman of the Conference Family Life Committee immediately following Annual Conference session to set up pilot projects in family life education and undertake them in the coming year.
5. That a committee be appointed by the chairman of the Conference Family Life Committee immediately after Annual Conference Session to explore the possibility of a conference for Engaged Couples in cooperation with the Conference Youth Committee, to be held as soon as practicable.

Family Camps: Two camps at Don-Lee, July 11-14 and July 14-17. Families may attend both, if room permits, since there is no duplication in study program.

Two camps at Chestnut Ridge, August 15-18 and August 18-21. Families may attend both sessions, if room permits.

Pastors' and Wives' Retreat: July 20-22, at Methodist College, with Reverend Leon Smith of Nashville, Tennessee, leading. Theme: "Enriching Parsonage Family Living."

Section F

COMMITTEE ON MINISTERS AND DIRECTORS OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION
AND MUSIC

Christian Education Section

Directors of Christian education and educational assistants are now serving the cause of Christian nurture in forty local churches in our conference. Of these ten are certified directors of Christian education and thirty are educational assistants. These professional persons are not only rendering effective service in their own local churches but are also assisting in subdistrict, district, and conference-wide programs which benefit our whole conference. The Conference Board of Education has been diligent in staying in contact

with the directors and educational assistants and keeping them informed of up-to-date development in programs, materials and training opportunities.

In cooperation with the N. C. Directors' Association, the Board sponsored a one-day meeting at the Methodist Building in Raleigh on April 9th to acquaint directors and educational assistants with the services and materials provided by the Board staff. Twelve persons attended the meeting. The Board also is being host to the ministers and directors of Christian education and music and educational assistants during the Annual Conference in June, 1964.

Plans are progressing for the biannual meeting of the North Carolina State Association of Methodist Ministers and Directors of Christian Education and Educational Assistants, Western North Carolina Conference and North Carolina Conference, to be held at Edenton Street Methodist Church, Raleigh, N. C., November 2-4, 1964. The theme for this workshop will be "The Life and Mission of the Church." Dr. Howard Grimes, noted author and scholar and professor of Christian Education at Perkins School of Theology, Southern Methodist University, Dallas, Texas, will be the resource leader.

The committee recommends the following means of support for persons serving as directors of Christian education and educational assistants for the coming year:

1. That the Board of Education encourage every local church employing a director of Christian education or educational assistant to make it possible for their director to attend the biannual meeting of the North Carolina State Association of Ministers and Directors of Christian Education and Educational Assistants offering financial assistance, and that the Conference Board of Education supplement the financial needs of this meeting.

2. That the Board recommend to each local church employing persons in Christian education to provide at least one week with financial assistance to enable their director to attend one of the following training opportunities at Lake Junaluska this summer:

- a. SeJ Leadership and Laboratory Schools, August 3-8 and August 9-14.
- b. SeJ Church School Administrators' Conference, August 14-16.
- c. SeJ Workshop for Directors of Christian Education, August 17-21.

3. That the Board, in cooperation with the North Carolina Conference Directors' Association, sponsor a one-day meeting of directors and educational assistants in February or March, 1965, for the purpose of briefing them concerning the services of the Board staff and discussing their mutual problems.

4. That, in the light of the shortage of qualified and certified directors of Christian education, the Board:

- a. Call on pastors and local church committees on Christian Vocation to encourage and recruit prospective leaders in this area through emphasis on the needs in the local church program and through career days in the school in their area.

- b. Request the Conference Commission on Christian Vocations to place emphasis on the need for recruitment in the area of Christian education as well as the pastoral ministry.

- c. Request the Conference MYF to give emphasis to this need in the Conference Youth program.

- d. Call upon those with responsibility in Christian education in our colleges to encourage undergraduate students in Christian education to continue in graduate study so that they may meet the requirement of a masters degree for certification.

5. That in the light of the rapid turnover of directors serving in our conference and the loss of many of them from the field, which is cause for real concern, the Conference Board of Education make a thorough study of the causes for such rapid turnover and loss and take the necessary steps to help correct this situation.

6. That the Board of Education plan a one-day consultation on "The Work of Directors of Christian Education in the Local Church," for pastors of churches who have employed persons in Christian education, pastors who are looking for directors, and other interested pastors. Leadership for this meeting should be secured from the General Board and the lunch provided by the Conference Board of Education.

7. That the office of the executive secretary of the Board of Education serve as the agent for procurement and placement of ministers and directors of Christian education and educational assistants. Churches planning to employ a person in Christian education and directors seeking a change in employment are encouraged to use this service.

Music Section

The Sixth Annual North Carolina Conference Music Workshop, sponsored by the Board of Education, was held at North Carolina Wesleyan College at Rocky Mount, on Monday, February 24, 1964, with an attendance of approximately 75 persons. Resource leaders were Dr. William K. Burns of Maplewood, New Jersey, and Miss Virginia Caruthers of Graham, N. C. The planning committee for the workshop was headed by Dr. Carl Hjortsvang of East Carolina College, Greenville, N. C. The North Carolina chapter of NaFomm of which Mrs. W. D. Miller is president, met in conjunction with this workshop.

Courses in the area of music were taught in four Christian Workers' Schools with a total enrollment of 97. Two music workshops were held at East Carolina College as a part of the music training program of the North Carolina Conference. Dr. Carl Hjortsvang arranged and conducted these workshops. A total of 160 persons were enrolled. In conjunction with East Carolina College, a Junior Choir Festival was held on Saturday, May 9th, with 36 junior choirs participating involving 700 children.

A Music Workshop for church pianists was held in the Burlington District at the Swepsonville Methodist Church on April 19, 1964. This workshop was led by Miss Virginia Caruthers, district music representative. A local church music workshop was conducted by Rev. Bruce Pate at Bethany Methodist Church, Durham, N. C., in March, 1964.

Recommendations for 1964-65

1. That each district music representative enlist the aid of a sub-chairman in various areas of their districts to help promote workshop attendance by telephone and personal contacts.

2. That district music representatives by arrangement with the district superintendent, obtain from ministers at a ministers' meeting, the names of all music personnel in their churches and to enlist their support of the music workshops.

3. That two N. C. Conference music workshops be held—one for inexperienced choir directors and accompanists on Tuesday, March 2, 1965, and another for experienced directors and accompanists on Tuesday, March 9, 1965, at Edenton Street Methodist Church, Raleigh, N. C.

4. That a special conference-wide music rally (a day of hymn-singing) be planned to present the new Methodist Hymnal at St. Paul Methodist Church, Goldsboro, in the fall of 1965.

5. That district workshops for the introduction of the new Methodist Hymnal be conducted in the spring of 1966.

6. That *Music Ministry* magazine be promoted at all conference and district music workshops.

7. That every eligible Methodist musician seek certification as a Methodist director of music. Information and application forms may be secured from the North Carolina Conference Board of Education, P. O. Box 10957, Raleigh, N. C.

8. That the Conference chapter of NaFOMM prepare three worship services for use at the Christmas season and three for use at Easter, one of these to be based on the Cokesbury Hymnal, one on the Methodist Hymnal and one on Anthems.

9. That the Youth Committee of the Conference Board of Education, in cooperation with the Committee on Ministers and Directors of Christian Education and Music, plan and conduct a summer music workshop for youth and adult workers with youth.

10. That each local church observe "A Great Day of Methodist Singing," November 8, 1964.

11. That local churches make use of the "Hymn of the Month" program as recommended by the General Board of Education.

12. That the local church musicians be encouraged to attend the Church Music workshops under the direction of Dr. Carl Hjortsvang, at East Carolina College as follows:

- Saturday, October 10—Workshop for directors of children's choirs
- Saturday, November 7—Workshop for organists and church pianists
- Saturday, January 9—Workshop for choir directors and choir singers
- Saturday, May 8—Children's choir festival

COMMITTEE ON CAMPS AND CONFERENCES

BROOKS PATTEN, *Chairman*

PROGRESS REPORT FOR 1963-64

At one time camps and conferences were looked upon as a fad or something apart from the ongoing ministry of the church. Today they are very much an integral and very important part of the total ministry.

It may come as a surprise to some to realize that 6,376 was the total attendance at North Carolina Annual Conference camp facilities in 1963. This is not surprising when we learn through the Department of Research and Survey of the National Council of Churches it is estimated that at the present rate of development the Protestant churches of America will invest some \$100,000,000 in camp and conference facilities during the 1960-1970 decade. Why will this be so?

The answer to this is that a new method has been born in Christian education. This method, camping, demands the use of the out-of-doors. Church camping is living together in and related to the out-of-doors under the auspices of the church.

Philosophy and Objectives

In camping, the core curriculum is *living*. Basically, two things can happen in an outdoor experience that may not happen as well anywhere else. First is the community living made possible in a sustained experience of planning, working, studying, playing and worshipping together. These are experiences of oneness which bring persons to deep levels of understanding which are essential to Christian growth. Often understandings cannot be achieved in the casual relations that often exist in a local church. The ability to forget oneself and enter into the lives of others is basic to all Christian love, service and forgiveness.

Second, in the out-of-doors a group can come to a new appreciation of the unity of all life and of our dependence upon God, the supreme force at work in the universe. This is far more than an esthetic appreciation of the beauties of nature. As Dr. Virgil Foster (editor, *International Journal of Religious Education*) describes it, it is an exposure of oneself to the workings of creation where mysteries lie close to the surface, where we have room to stretch our spirits and at the same time have an unique experience of comradeship with others. We go, therefore, to a camp, where we can be together as a Christian community long enough to discover something of what that community is all about. This kind of camping, then, is more than just living, or the learning of skills. It is living *together* in Christian relationships. It calls for small groupings so that each camper can get in on this living as he faces directly the problems of food, shelter, sanitation, rest, restoration, recreation, worship.

It is at this point that the Christian camp counselor appears. Children need counselors who can guide them through the solving of these problems together, to live with them and become a close companion. Hence, the concern of your committee to provide counselors who are thoroughly Christian in their love and relationships. We are concerned about a low ratio of counselors to campers, that the very highest of educational standards may be maintained. It gives us some satisfaction to observe that our program of church camping offers experiences and standards for a very modest cost which correspond to the objectives of some of the most expensive camps in the country.

This is made possible by the dedication of laymen and clergy, youth and adults, individuals and groups who build, direct, and staff a program of depth and purpose. It is important that the people of the conference understand these objectives.

New Program Features

CAMP CHESTNUT RIDGE—Highlight of the year was the dedication of the new Crane Lodge and four winterized cabins. These have been in continuous use year-round. A beautiful nine-acre lake has become a reality, thanks to the MYFs of the Burlington and Durham Districts. New canoes will await the campers this summer. For the first time one week of Senior High camping is being offered. Two two-week Junior High camps will meet a growing need for longer term camping. In all, twelve resident camps offering a total capacity of 488 campers, will be held this summer. The facilities are constantly in demand and by retreat groups year-round.

KERR LAKE CAMP—More and more local churches and family groups are taking advantage of this beautiful acreage for week-day and week-end camping. Individual family camp sites are being added this year. Together, with three small group camp units with hogans and covered wagons (16 sleeping spaces each) an opportunity for undisturbed camp experiences is made possible for the churches and individual families across the conference. Reservations are made through Mr. Robert E. Reed, superintendent of camps.

CAMP ROCKFISH—Completion of the Master-Plan by Dr. Charles Stott of North Carolina State College has made possible initial steps of development. Working closely with a committee from the Fayetteville District, the Camp Committee has employed an architect to design the camp buildings. Already, a dragline has been at work in develop

g swimming areas and a boat basin. Access road and parking area have been laid out, along with utility designations. Architectural drawings are now in process for the first unit lodge and cabins. This basic initial development is being carried out this summer.

CAMP DON-LEE—By normal wear and tear through long years of use, the kitchen equipment is being completely replaced and the kitchen renovated. This renovation is mandatory, and will involve, alone, a cost of approximately \$13,000. Due to exceptionally severe winter storms the beach at the camp has gradually been washing away. One cabin is already lost to water encroachment. A study of beach and bank erosion has been made by competent engineers and will become a major problem of stabilization in the very near future.

Camp Don-Lee continues to fulfill a far-reaching need in all areas. Last year 2,737 campers made use of its facilities. This summer in addition to the Moral Concerns Conference a one-week camp will be held for Seniors. Three two-week camps, two ten-day camps, and three one-week camps are offered for Junior Highs, with two Junior camps. A new outpost of 23 acres is under lease, a fine asset for the sailing program. A camp for the mentally retarded, successfully held for the first time last summer, will provide camping experience for 56 campers. Two family camps are also scheduled, as well as the Young Adult Assembly.

Future Needs

From the above, it is seen that a varied and enriched program of camping experiences is sought for all ages and types of groups, from the needs of the retarded child to the individual family and local church groups. Day-camping, trip-camping, retreats—these have special places in the needs of our people. Just as the Great Smoky Mountain Rail Hike has now become a highlight for the more experienced campers, so we hope to expand in the area of providing camping trailers for families on a rental basis. To continue the program of construction and maintenance of our new camps the financial factor ultimately determines how fast this program can be moved ahead. For instance, Camp Rockfish, alone, a program involving \$200,000 in facilities is clearly envisioned. Compared to approximately \$10,000 annually left available for use in new capital facilities at all camps from the committee's budget, it is apparent that we must look to increased appropriation and outside monies to do the job. The support of individuals, churches, and groups is urgently needed and recommended.

Section I

RESOLUTION

(adopted by Methodist Board of Education, Inc.)

RESOLVED, that it is for the best interest of the corporation, in order to cause its charter to more nearly conform to the Discipline of The Methodist Church, to amend its charter in the following manner, to-wit:

- (1) By inserting as the first paragraph in Article III the following:
"This corporation is under the jurisdiction, control and direction of the North Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction, The Methodist Church."
- (2) By amending Article III, subparagraph (e), to read as follows:
"(e) To supervise, coordinate, promote, guide and aid the Methodist Student Movement and Wesley Foundation within the State of North Carolina and to cooperate with other annual conferences of The Methodist Church in North Carolina in connection therewith."
- (3) By striking out Article V and substituting in lieu thereof the following:
"The members of the corporation (sometimes herein referred to as the 'Board') shall be composed of:
"(1) Those persons elected or appointed as members in conformity from time to time with the Discipline of The Methodist Church.
"(2) Those persons who in conformity from time to time with the Discipline of The Methodist Church are members of the Conference Board of Education by virtue of their office."
- (4) By striking out Article VI and substituting in lieu thereof the following:
"The Executive Committee shall consist of the President, Vice-President, Secretary, and Chairmen of all Standing Committees of the Board, the Executive Secretary of the corporation (without power to vote), and such other additional members as the Board shall elect, which Committee shall transact all business of the Board between meetings of the Board."
- (5) By adding at the end of the first sentence of Article VIII the following:
"and in accordance with the Discipline of The Methodist Church."
- (6) By adding a new Article IX as follows:
"The Board shall have, and it is hereby specifically given full power and authority to alter or amend the Certificate of Incorporation in any and all respects, with the proviso that any alteration or amendment shall have been approved by the North Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction, The Methodist Church."
- (7) By renumbering Article IX as Article X.
- (8) By renumbering Article X as Article XI.
- (9) By striking out Article XI and in lieu thereof substituting Article XII as follows:
"The registered office of the corporation in this State is located at The Methodist Building, 1307 Glenwood Avenue, Raleigh, Wake County, North Carolina. The name of the registered agent of the corporation at such address is The Reverend C. P. Morris, D.D."
- (10) By renumbering Article XII as Article XIII.

Section D

CERTIFICATE OF AMENDMENT TO THE CHARTER OF LOUISBURG COLLEGE

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of Louisburg College, finding that the Charter of the Corporation contains provisions that are obsolete and unsuitable for present day operations, and it is necessary to revise said Charter so as to render it applicable and operative, and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of Louisburg College does declare that it is advisable that the Charter be amended as hereinafter recited:

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Trustees of Louisburg College, in a meeting duly called and held in accordance with law at Louisburg College on the 17th day of April, 1964, that, all statutes hereinbefore enacted by the General Assembly of North Carolina relating to the the Charter of Louisburg College and all prior Certificates of Amendment to the said Charter heretofore issued by the Secretary of State of North Carolina be and they are hereby amended so that the Charter of Louisburg College shall read as follows:

REVISED CHARTER OF LOUISBURG COLLEGE—SECTION ONE

That the name of this corporation is Louisburg College, Inc.

Section Two

This corporation shall have no capital stock. Through its Board of Trustees, hereinafter provided, this corporation shall be conducted and operated as a non-profit corporation. The purpose of the corporation is to maintain a school of high caliber for the intellectual, moral and religious development and training of youth and adults under the name and style of Louisburg College, and in that name may sue and be sued, contract and be contracted with, acquire, hold and convey in its corporate capacity property, personal and real, and exercise all acts in relation thereto incident to the ownership of personal property and real estate, and to perform all acts which may be deemed necessary or expedient for the proper and successful prosecution of the objects for which this corporation is formed. The name of the agent therein and in charge thereof upon whom process against said corporation may be served shall be the President of Louisburg College.

Section Three

That this corporation is the owner of all property formerly owned by Franklin Academy, Louisburg Female Academy and Louisburg Female College and Louisburg College, Inc., and its predecessors, save and except such property as may have been legally disposed of by deed or otherwise.

Section Four

The location of the principal office shall be at Louisburg, Franklin County, North Carolina, and Louisburg College may operate educational institutions or schools of collegiate or of less than collegiate rank in Louisburg or elsewhere in North Carolina.

Section Five

The corporation shall be operated in trust for The Methodist Church, and shall be under the jurisdiction, control and direction of the North Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction, of The Methodist Church.

Section Six

The period of this corporation is unlimited. In the event, however, of the dissolution of the corporation, or in the event the corporation ceases to perform the objects and purposes for which it was incorporated, all properties of the corporation shall become the property of the North Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction, of The Methodist Church, subject to the debts of the corporation, and subject to such trusts

may have been created and subject to such reversionary interest as may have been created in said corporation.

Section Seven

Subject to the ultimate control of the North Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction of The Methodist Church, the business affairs and all operations of this corporation shall be managed, administered and conducted by a Board of Trustees, which shall have perpetual succession, and may have and use a common seal.

Section Eight

The officers of the said corporation shall be a president, vice-president and secretary-treasurer, elected by the Board of Trustees from its membership, which said Board shall consist of thirty-six members, more or less, a majority of whom shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business and all of whom shall be elected by the North Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction, of The Methodist Church, at its annual sessions and shall hold office for the term of four years.

Section Nine

The number of trustees of this institution may be increased or decreased, and the term of office of the trustees fixed by the North Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction, of The Methodist Church, and all new trustees as well as the successors of those whose terms of office expire by limitation or ended by death, or removal, or otherwise, shall be elected by said Conference upon nomination by the Board of Trustees, provided that said Board of Trustees by majority vote may elect trustees to fill vacancies occurring when said Conference shall not be in session, such trustees so elected by said Board, to serve only until a meeting of said Conference, and the election of their successors as hereinbefore provided and said Conference may remove any member of the said Board of Trustees upon request, when such request shall be made by a majority of the Board of Trustees.

Section Ten

All bequests and donations of property, personal and real, made to Louisburg College and all property purchased by the Board of Trustees in the name of and for Louisburg College shall vest in and be the property of the corporation, but no conveyance or mortgage of the real property vested in said corporation shall be made without the consent and permission of the Executive Committee, Board of Education, North Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction, of The Methodist Church.

Section Eleven

That the said Board of Trustees shall have exclusive right to elect a president of said Louisburg College and, on nomination of the president, such professors, teachers and officers as they shall think proper.

Section Twelve

That the president and other administrative and staff officers whom the president may designate and teachers of said Louisburg College shall be the faculty thereof, and shall recommend to the Board such persons as they deem fit to receive diplomas or other marks of academic distinction.

Section Thirteen

That the Board of Trustees shall have power to grant diplomas and other marks of academic distinction, upon recommendation by the faculty.

Section Fourteen

The Board of Trustees of said corporation shall have the power, by vote of the majority of all of said trustees, to formulate and adopt, alter, amend and rescind, rules, regulations and by-laws not in conflict with law or the expressed provisions of this charter, for the good government of said Louisburg College and the management of the property and funds of the corporation.

Section Fifteen

The Board of Trustees shall have, and it is hereby specifically given, full power and authority to alter or amend this certificate of incorporation in any and all respects, with

the proviso that any alteration or amendment shall have been approved by the North Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction, of The Methodist Church.

Section Sixteen

All provisions of the original charter and the original charter, heretofore amended, shall henceforth be null, void and inoperative.

Be it Further Resolved, That, the foregoing, when made legally effective, be referred to as the Revised Charter of Louisburg College, and appropriate action is authorized and directed to make it legally effective following approval by the North Carolina Annual Conference of the Methodist Church, Southeastern Jurisdiction.

Section E

COLLEGE SUSTAINING FUND 1964-1965

We call for a continuation of the policy of increasing the College Sustaining Fund \$40,000 each year until the goal of \$500,000 annual support for our colleges is attained.

We recommend the following distribution of the College Sustaining Fund for 1964-1965:

Duke University (Divinity School)	\$ 21,000.00

North Carolina Wesleyan College	137,000.00

We further recommend that these funds be paid to the colleges quarterly from current receipts.

Note: Since we are not recommending an increase in the appropriation to the Divinity School of Duke University, we urge the Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications, the district superintendents and our local churches to work for full participation in the Southeastern Jurisdiction 1% Fund for Theological Education.

Assignment of Responsibility for Promoting and Supervising the Conference Program of Higher Education

Since the responsibility for promoting, coordinating and supervising the work of Christian Higher Education is assigned to the Board of Education, and in order to avoid ambiguity in the assignment of leadership,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED,

1. that we recommend that all the work in the field of Christian Higher Education be assigned to the Committee on Christian Higher Education which shall be amenable to the Board of Education;
2. that all persons responsible for promoting the Conference's Program of Higher Education shall be engaged only with the approval of the Board of Education and such persons shall be amenable to the Board of Education;
3. and that payments on pledges in the College Development Crusade be received by the Conference Treasurer and that the expense of handling and recording such funds shall be borne by the Conference Treasurer's office.

Section F

AMENDMENT TO THE CHARTER OF METHODIST COLLEGE, INCORPORATED

"RESOLVED: That the Charter of Methodist College be amended by adding thereto Article XVII to read as follows:

'In the event of the dissolution of this corporation, or in the event the corporation ceases to perform the objects and purposes for which it was incorporated, all properties of the corporation shall become the property of the North Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction, of The Methodist Church, subject to the debts of the cor-

poration, and subject to such trusts as may have been created and subject to such reversionary interest as may have been created in said corporation.”

Section G

AMENDMENT TO THE CHARTER OF NORTH CAROLINA WESLEYAN COLLEGE, INCORPORATED

“RESOLVED: That the Charter of North Carolina Wesleyan College, Incorporated, be amended by adding to Article XV which currently reads, ‘The period of the existence of this corporation is unlimited,’ the following: ‘In the event, however, of the dissolution of this corporation, or in the event the corporation ceases to perform the objects and purposes for which it was incorporated, all properties of the corporation shall become the property of the North Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction, of The Methodist Church, subject to the debts of the corporation, and subject to such trusts as may have been created and subject to such reversionary interest as may have been created in said corporation.’”

Section H

LOUISBURG COLLEGE DORMITORY BONDS OF 1962 SERIES A AND SERIES B

Resolution of the North Carolina Annual Conference of The Methodist Church

WHEREAS, by resolution adopted at the One Hundred Thirty-sixth Session of the Annual Conference of The Methodist Church, Southeastern Jurisdiction, held in the City of Durham, North Carolina, on June 28, 1961, the North Carolina Annual Conference authorized the issuance by the Trustees of Louisburg College of \$290,000 principal amount of Louisburg College Dormitory Bonds of 1961 to be secured by Trust Indenture dated as of the 1st day of May, 1961, conveying certain lands belonging to Louisburg College described in said resolution, and

WHEREAS, said bonds were issued and sold to the United States of America (Housing & Home Finance Administrator), and,

WHEREAS, it thereafter became desirable for Louisburg College to issue an additional \$300,000 principal amount of Louisburg College Bonds to secure funds to be used in the construction of a new woman's dormitory housing approximately 96 students, and

WHEREAS, the One hundred Thirty-seventh Session of the North Carolina Annual Conference of The Methodist Church, Southeastern Jurisdiction, held at Queen Street Methodist Church, Kinston, North Carolina, June 18-21, 1962 authorized the execution and delivery of \$300,000 principal amount of bonds, the proceeds whereof were to be used for the erection of a new woman's dormitory housing approximately 96 students; and authorizing the conveyance in trust by the Trustees of a tract of land on the campus of Louisburg College designated by the Board of Trustees of the College as a site for said new dormitory, together with a right of way thereto not exceeding 100 feet in width, and

WHEREAS, for convenience and ease in handling, and in order to provide sufficient revenues, from the properties conveyed in trust, to pay the interest on and principal of the bonds, the Housing & Home Finance Agency required that the issue of bonds aggregating \$290,000 known as Louisburg College Dormitory Bonds of 1961 be changed for \$290,000 Louisburg College Dormitory Bonds of 1962 Series A; and required the issuance and sale of \$300,000 Louisburg College Dormitory Bonds of 1962 Series B, to be used in the construction of said new woman's dormitory; and further required that said Series A bonds and Series B bonds be secured by the same Trust Indenture dated as of May 1, 1962, and

WHEREAS, said issue of Louisburg College Dormitory Bonds of 1961 have been changed for an equal principal amount of Louisburg College Dormitory Bonds of 1962 Series A, and Louisburg College Dormitory Bonds of 1962 Series B aggregating \$300,000 have been issued and both issues secured by Trust Indenture dated as of May 1, 1962 and Trust Indenture dated as of May 1, 1961 has been cancelled, and

WHEREAS, it is desirable that the combination of said issues of bonds heretofore approved by the North Carolina Annual Conference of The Methodist Church be ratified and confirmed,

Now, therefore, be it resolved:

1. That the North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Church, in a Session of said Conference duly called and held in the City of Burlington, State of North Carolina, on the 24th day of June, 1964, does hereby ratify and confirm the action of the Trustees of Louisburg College in issuing \$290,000 principal amount of Louisburg College Dormitory Bonds of 1962, Series A in exchange for \$290,000 Louisburg College Dormitory Bonds of 1961; and in issuing \$300,000 of Louisburg College Dormitory Bonds of 1962 Series B and in securing said Bonds by the conveyance of the lands hereinafter described to First Citizens Bank & Trust Company as Trustee, said Bonds and Trust Indenture being dated the 1st day of May, 1962. The lands of the College conveyed as security for said Bonds being described as follows:

BEGINNING AT a point on the campus of Louisburg College (said beginning point being located the following courses and distances from the intersection of the center line of College Street and the center line of North Main Street, to-wit: Beginning at said intersection and running thence along the center line of College Street north 57 deg. west 400 feet to a point, thence north 33 deg. 00 min. east 103 feet to the point of Beginning) thence north 57 deg. 00 min. west parallel to the center line of College Street 337 feet to a point in the east line of a driveway; thence north 33 deg. 00 min. east 274 feet to a point; thence south 57 deg. 00 min. east parallel to the center line of College Street 212 feet to a point; thence north 33 deg. 00 min. east 199.14 feet to a point in the southern line of a driveway easement; thence south 60 deg. 54 min. east 492.81 feet to a point in the western line of North Main Street said point being 30 feet from the center line of said street and 50 feet south of an iron stake in the southern line of the A. W. Person property; thence south 30 deg. 50 min. west parallel to the center line of North Main Street 119.9 feet to a point thence north 57 deg. 00 min. west parallel to the center line of College Street 370.68 feet to an iron stake; thence south 33 deg. 00 min. west 387 feet to the point of Beginning; being the lands occupied by a new men's dormitory, Franklin Building, Wright Building, and the Project according to a map and survey made by Wm. B. McIntyre, July 3, 1963, said map being entitled "Women's Dormitory Tract and Men's Dormitory Tract, Louisburg College."

The right to use perpetually for the purpose of ingress and egress, to pass and repass, by foot, with animals, with vehicles, and with any and all loads, and for any and all purposes, by the grantee-trustee, its successors and assigns, its servants, agents, employees, tenants and invitees, in common with the College, that certain driveway adjacent to the above tract of land described as follows:

BEGINNING AT an iron stake in the A. W. Person Line and in the west property line of North Main Street, said iron stake being 30 feet from the center of said street, runs thence north 60 deg. 54 min. west along the south line of A. W. Person 702 feet; thence south 33 deg. 6 min. west 50.1 feet; thence south 60 deg. 54 min. east 704.41 feet to the west property line of North Main Street; thence along the west property line of North Main Street north 30 deg. 50 min. east 50 feet to the point of Beginning; being a strip of land lying along the northern property line of the property of Louisburg College and east of the new cafeteria building site, all according to map and survey by Wm. B. McIntyre, July 3, 1963, entitled "Woman's Dormitory Tract and Men's Dormitory Tract, Louisburg College." and

RESOLVED FURTHER that this ratification, consent and permission be evidenced of record by an instrument in writing from the Board of Trustees of the North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Church, Incorporated, which is hereby authorized and empowered to execute and deliver said instrument to the First Citizens Bank & Trust Company as Trustee under said Indenture from Louisburg College, dated as of May 1, 1962 and securing \$290,000 of Series A Bonds and \$300,000 of Series B Bonds as described in said Indenture, said instrument quitclaiming any interest superior to the Indenture securing said Bonds,

COMMISSION ON CHRISTIAN HIGHER EDUCATION

Report No. 1

The two new colleges, established by the North Carolina Annual Conference six years ago, Methodist College at Fayetteville, N. C. and North Carolina Wesleyan College at Rocky Mount, N. C., had their first graduating class this year. At Methodist College fifty-three seniors graduated with thirty-four receiving A.B. degrees and nine receiving B. degrees. At North Carolina Wesleyan College thirty-seven graduated receiving A.B. and B.S. degrees. These two colleges have had their first four full years of scholastic work and have completed these four years with efficiency and excellence. Five hundred twenty-five students were enrolled at Methodist College and 495 students were enrolled at North Carolina Wesleyan College. At Methodist College eleven buildings are now completed, which include the library. The contracts for two new dormitories have been let and work on them will begin soon. At North Carolina Wesleyan College ten buildings have been completed and the Physical Education Building is now under construction and will be ready for use when college opens in the fall. More than 600 students will be enrolled at each of these colleges for next year.

Louisburg College has had a very successful year with 630 students enrolled. A new dormitory for girls was opened this year along with the renovation of another building on the East Campus which is now used for the Administration Building. With the new buildings and the added campus facilities, Louisburg College takes its place among the best junior colleges of the South. More than 700 have already enrolled for the opening of college in September.

These three colleges are destined to play a large part in the development of the North Carolina Conference now and in the years ahead. Therefore, it is incumbent on our part that we support these institutions with every possible means that we have. Our churches will constantly be in need of efficient leadership who have been educated in the framework of the Christian influence. The church colleges will be our stabilizing influence which will keep our church progressive, our nation free and our homes Christian.

Our chief concern now is for the payment of the church pledges made two years ago during the crusade for our college development program. The colleges are tremendously handicapped by not having our crusade pledges paid to date. We call upon the ministers and the lay members of our churches to rally to the support of these colleges by paying their pledges and keeping them paid to date.

Your Commission is recommending that the third Sunday in November be observed as College Day in all our churches. This will be on Sunday, November 15, 1964, at 11:00 a. m.

The commission is planning district rallies in the fall to go into each district with a message we hope will inspire our people to reactivate their interest in the colleges, and to increase payments on their church pledges.

Our most urgent need at the present is the building of a library on each campus and retiring the present indebtedness.

Report No. 2

Christian Higher Education has made remarkable progress in the North Carolina Conference in the last eight years. Two new colleges have been established and both colleges had their first graduation class this month. You, who have been members of the Conference for the last eight years have seen two new campuses acquired and twelve buildings erected on each campus. You have seen the administration begin to work on each campus with remarkable success. Four years ago you saw the first student body of 240 grow to 1,035 this year just closed. Already the two new campuses will be overflowing with more than 1200 students next year.

You have seen two local communities around these two new colleges pledge \$203,469.00 and to date have paid \$2,780,551.00 and the churches in the North Carolina Conference pledged \$5,260,022.00 and to date have paid \$3,057,325.00.

Eight years ago you saw Louisburg College start from a student body of 160 increase to 630 students this year, and with an anticipated student body of 700 next year. The campus of Louisburg College has been enlarged by the addition of eight

acres of land and the two spacious buildings once used by the High School. These buildings are now completely refurnished and rebuilt. Two new modern dormitories and a new cafeteria and all other buildings on the campus have been completely modernized.

You have seen the College Sustaining Fund increase from approximately \$75,000.00 to \$430,000.00 for this year ahead. All this has been accomplished by the North Carolina Conference and friends of Christian Higher Education.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EVANGELISM

No. I

THE PAST YEAR

The Program of Evangelism for the conference year, 1963-1964, was planned to "Deepen the Spiritual Life" of the churches in order that our conference might go forward in the work of evangelism by finding, cultivating, winning, and assimilating prospects and reviving indifferent church members.

Our Board cooperated with five other Conference Boards in the Orientation Work

op for Pastors New to the North Carolina Conference, August 19-21, at Camp Chestnut Ridge. The Reverend Kimsey King was the dean.

The Pastors' Conference on Evangelism was held at North Carolina Wesleyan College, Rocky Mount, August 27-29, in cooperation with the Conference Commission on Town and Country Work. The theme of the conference was "Evangelism Through the Church School." Bishop Paul N. Garber, Dr. G. Ernest Thomas, Dr. G. Byron Deshler, and Dr. Walter Towner were the speakers. The Reverend Al Simonton was dean, and the Reverend Kimsey King was associate dean.

Immediately after the close of the Pastors' Conference, a meeting of the pastors of the conference was held under the leadership of Bishop Garber. The Program of Evangelism was presented by the Conference Executive Director and each district selected sites for Subdistrict Training Sessions of "Evangelism Through the Church School."

A training session on Evangelism for these district leaders, who in turn were to train subdistrict leaders, was held September 4, in the Methodist Building, Raleigh. Dr. James H. Warren and the Reverend Kimsey King were the instructors. The subdistrict training sessions were held during the week of September 15-20.

Realizing that the work of evangelism must be accomplished in the local church under the leadership of the pastor and his lay leadership, we strive to point up certain evangelistic opportunities in the hope that some of these will be adapted to the local situation. These opportunities are given under Report No. II, "The New Year," and we hope these will be considered as essential for an effective annual program of evangelism for every year.

Believing that one of the best ways to interest pastors and churches in specific programs of evangelism is to let them see what others are doing, we have been publishing "The Good News" for the past six months. This mimeographed newsletter reports what individual pastors have been doing in their churches in the hope that others will take these plans and adapt them for use in their respective churches. The response from the pastors has been most gratifying.

The Conference Board of Evangelism is convinced that the executive director needs to get into the local church, meet with the commissions, the church school teachers, the social board and other organizations if his work is to be most effective. He has gone to churches on invitation to conduct one-night workshops, five-night workshops, and "Sunday for Evangelism" or "E-Day." He has preached 47 sermons and has spent 128 hours in Workshops on Evangelism with teachers, commissions and other church officials in 18 local churches.

The district directors of Evangelism have made their services available to the charges in their respective districts.

The Board has helped local churches through correspondence and through personal interviews in the office in Raleigh, and also through the distribution of materials, literature, charts, and the rental of two 16mm films, "Conversion Plus" and "Worship, a Family's Heritage."

At the close of the half year the net gain in church membership for our conference was more than the net gain for the entire year of 1962-1963. Reports for this year will be found in the Statistical Reports of the pastors for 1963-1964.

No. II

THE NEW YEAR

The Conference Board of Evangelism realizes that whatever gain is made in evangelism in the North Carolina Conference must be the combined gains made in the local churches. Any program of witnessing for the cultivation, recruitment, training, assimilation of non-church members, and the reclamation and spiritual growth of indifferent church members must first be a concern in the mind and heart of the pastor in charge. The concern must be infused into the minds and hearts of the local church leadership before it can become a reality in the local church as a whole.

With the conviction that our leadership and membership need spiritual enrichment we effectively carry out in this modern day the Great Commission given by Jesus to His Church, the Conference Board of Evangelism,

First, invites the pastors to join the Pastors' Conference on Evangelism, where there will be opportunities for soul-searching and rededication in small groups or retreats;

Second, that laymen join the Lay Retreat at Louisburg under the sponsorship of the Board of Lay Activities;

Third, that pastors in each district join with their brother pastors in further soul-searching and planning under the direction of the Holy Spirit;

Fourth, that laymen take advantage of the Annual District Lay Retreats;

Fifth, that a Retreat for Local Church Leaders be held in each local church, under the direction of the pastor and lay evangelist.

We feel that this spiritual undergirding will enable leaders to get the true sense of direction and find the needed spiritual power to guide them in doing their work for the Master.

The Board offers the following "Evangelistic Opportunities for 1964-1965" to help pastors and local church leadership in building an effective evangelistic program.

Evangelistic Opportunities for 1964-1965

Again and again the question is asked, "What is the best evangelistic program?" Really, the question is not answered by naming a method but by discovering that the best evangelism is that which results from a church being constantly concerned for persons.

Week by week, month by month, there are evangelistic opportunities to challenge any church. The variety of possible activities guarantees the Commission on Membership and Evangelism a chance to use an ever-increasing number of persons in meeting the needs of year-around programming.

Personal spiritual growth results from shared evangelistic activities of all kinds. The following is a list of month-by-month activities to guide the local Commissions on Membership and Evangelism. These activities are highlighted in the "Your Church" section of *The Methodist Story*. Local churches are urged to call upon the Conference Executive Director of Evangelism or the District Secretary of Evangelism in their respective districts, if they desire guidance in adapting any of the following evangelistic opportunities to meet the needs of their local church situations.

No. IV

AMENDED ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF

THE BOARD OF EVANGELISM, INCORPORATED

We, the undersigned, in order to form a corporation for the purposes hereinafter stated, under and pursuant to the provisions of the laws of the State of North Carolina as contained in Chapter 55A-36 of the North Carolina Non-Profit Corporation Act, do hereby certify as follows:

I

The name of this corporation is The Board of Evangelism of the North Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction of The Methodist Church, Incorporated.

II

The principal office of this corporation is located in The Methodist Building, 1307 Glenwood Avenue, Raleigh, Wake County, North Carolina.

III

This corporation shall be under the jurisdiction, control, and direction of the North Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction of The Methodist Church.

IV

The object for which this corporation is formed is to promote The Methodist Church through Evangelism, by preaching and teaching the Christian gospel, and witnessing for Jesus Christ in the interest of winning people to Christ and The Methodist Church.

V

In order to properly prosecute said object, this corporation shall have full power and authority to purchase, lease and otherwise acquire, hold, mortgage, sell, convey and otherwise dispose of all kinds of property, both real and personal; to borrow money, to construct, equip and maintain buildings; and generally to perform all acts which may be deemed necessary or expedient for the proper and successful prosecution of the object for which this corporation is formed.

VI

This corporation shall have no capital stock. Through its Board of Trustees, as hereinafter provided, this corporation shall be conducted and operated as a non-profit corporation.

VII

The period of existence of this corporation is unlimited. In the event the corporation ceases to perform the objects and purposes for which it was incorporated all properties of the corporation shall become the property of the North Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction of The Methodist Church, subject to the debts of the corporation, and subject to such trusts as may have been created in said corporation.

VIII

Membership in the corporation shall consist of all those who are members of the Board of Evangelism of the North Carolina Annual Conference of the Southeastern Jurisdiction of The Methodist Church.

IX

The Board of Trustees shall be composed of the President, Vice-President, and Secretary of the Board of Evangelism, a District Superintendent of one of the districts of the North Carolina Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction of The Methodist Church, who shall be appointed by the Bishop of the North Carolina Conference, and the Executive Director of Evangelism of the said North Carolina Conference. The President, Vice-President, and Secretary of the said Board shall be elected quadrennially by the Board of Evangelism. The Executive Director of Evangelism of the North Carolina Conference shall be elected annually by the Board of Evangelism, at its annual meeting immediately preceding the Annual Conference. The District Superintendent serving as trustee shall be appointed annually by the Bishop of the North Carolina Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction of The Methodist Church.

The Board of Trustees shall have full power and authority to alter or amend the certificate of incorporation of this corporation and shall likewise have full power and authority to make, alter, amend or repeal any and all articles of incorporation or by-laws, so long as any amendment, alteration or change shall have been approved by the North Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction of The Methodist Church.

The Board of Trustees shall fix the time and place of holding their annual or other meetings, and shall annually elect the following officers of this corporation, namely, a President of its Board of Trustees, a Secretary-Treasurer, and such other officers as it may determine.

Three (3) trustees shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business at any regular or called meeting of the Board of Trustees; and it shall be the duty of the said Board of Trustees to make all contracts and agreements necessary to the business and management of the corporation.

Should there exist a vacancy by death, resignation, or otherwise of any trustee, the same shall be filled for the unexpired term in the same manner described above for the election of trustees.

X

The names and addresses of the incorporators of said corporation, who shall constitute the initial Board of Trustees until their successors be elected, are as follows:

XI

This corporation is authorized to solicit, acquire and receive real estate and personal property by purchase, gift, devise or otherwise, and to hold and to administer such property for the benefit of the Board of Evangelism of the North Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction of The Methodist Church, Incorporated, in accordance with the uses and trusts, if any, declared in any and all conveyance or other instrument under which such property is acquired. Specifically, this corporation is authorized to succeed to and own all property, real, personal, and mixed, tangible and intangible and hold the title thereto, and to succeed to and own all rights, privileges and power necessary to administer all funds upon the uses and trusts declared in any will, deed or other instrument, and this corporation shall assume and be liable for the payment of all debts and liabilities of the Board of Evangelism, Incorporated, to the full extent authorized and provided, and conferred upon this corporation by Chapter 55A of the General Statutes of North Carolina, as amended, provided, however, that the Board of Trustees shall not in any way or manner be personally liable for any debts, obligations or liabilities of the said Board of Evangelism, Incorporated.

XII

The Board of Trustees is given the authority to place with the Methodist Foundation Incorporated, a creature of the North Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction of The Methodist Church, such funds as it may deem proper for the purpose of investment by the Foundation. The Methodist Foundation, Incorporated, serving as an agent of the Board of Trustees of the Board of Evangelism, of the North Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction of The Methodist Church, Incorporated, shall be required to keep an accurate accounting of all the funds held and invested for the Board of Evangelism, Incorporated. Further, a financial report shall be placed in the hands of the President and Secretary of the Board of Trustees once each quarter, indicating the investment transactions during the period, the valuation of all funds of the Foundation, and showing specifically the funds held for the Board of Evangelism, Incorporated. A certified copy of an annual audit performed by a certified public accountant shall be placed in the hands of the Secretary of the Board of Evangelism, Incorporated, annually. The Methodist Foundation shall have as a fully qualified and voting member one representative elected by the Board of Evangelism, Incorporated. Finally, any funds of the Board of Evangelism, Incorporated, for investment must be payable to the Board of Evangelism of the North Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction of The Methodist Church, Incorporated, on demand, as its equity appears.

REPORT OF BOARD OF HOSPITALS AND HOMES

No. I

METHODIST HOME FOR CHILDREN, INC.

The past year has been a busy and eventful one for the Methodist Home for Children. The Board of Trustees has met three times during the year. In the interim between meetings, the Executive Committee has met at least monthly and sometimes more frequently in order to carry on the administration of the Home.

The Monk Memorial Chapel has been completed with the exception of another coat of paint on the interior. This painting will be done when the woodwork has had ample time to adjust. The first service in the Chapel was held on Palm Sunday. The dedication will be held after all the final details are complete.

At the last Annual Conference, the Reverend Frank Daniels was appointed chaplain of our Home. He and Mrs. Daniels are giving excellent leadership to the religious program on our campus. Each Sunday evening the children and staff gather for a Vesper service. The Junior High and Senior High MYF meet afterwards. Our children attend Sunday School and Morning Worship at Edenton Street Methodist Church. Daily family worship is conducted in each of the cottages under the leadership of the houseparent. Eight of our children were received into full membership of Edenton Street Church on Palm Sunday. The chaplain's duties include counseling with our children and carrying a considerable case work load. We are highly pleased with the results of this program. It is contributing to the development of Christian attitudes on our campus and to the acceptance of Christian standards of behaviour.

All of our children are attending public schools in the city of Raleigh. We expect four seniors to graduate from high school this year. In addition to public school, our education program includes a good library and a tutoring service for children who need it.

Through loans and scholarships, we are assisting nine of our graduates who are presently enrolled in colleges.

Our fiscal year ends September 30. At the end of our last fiscal year, we had 121 children in the institution and one in the Mother's Aid Program. During the year, there were 26 admissions and 36 discharges. The population fluctuates because of this rapid turnover. Our total capacity is 150 children. All of our children are school age. Applications are received from within the bounds of the North Carolina Annual Conference. Children are admitted when a careful study of their needs has indicated that our Home is in a position to meet their needs.

Along with the slow, but steady rise in the cost of living in general, the cost of child-care continues to rise in all institutions as well as in private homes. So long as this is true in general, there seems to be no way to prevent it in our Home. In addition to this, the needs of the children for whom applications are being received require the services of personnel whose previous training and experience fit them for this specialized service. It will be necessary in the future to pay larger salaries in order to secure qualified personnel to care for our children. Most of our employees could earn much higher salaries in other institutions or in other types of work than we are able to pay. The resulting high turnover in our staff cripples our program. In some way, we will be forced to meet this necessary requirement for additional funds for staff salaries.

We are grateful for the many gifts that have come to the Home this year to supplement the support furnished by the Annual Conference. About 60% of our operating income is received from the Annual Conference through "Conference Benevolences." Approximately 30% comes from the income of our Endowment Fund. The remainder comes from a variety of sources. The local church Woman's Society of Christian Service and other groups sponsor our children for clothing, school lunches and other expenses. Small amounts for individual children come from relatives, Social Security and the Veterans Administration. The Duke Endowment makes a considerable gift based on the orphan and half-orphan children cared for. Many small gifts are received as memorials and as personal contributions.

Several large gifts have been received during the year, to be used for Capital Improvements or added to the Chapel Fund. Investments valued at \$50,840.00 were received through the bequest of the late Mr. William E. Springer of Wilmington, North Carolina. A bequest of \$4,000.00 was received through the will of the late Mrs. Pattie Burwell White. Mrs. G. G. Allen made a gift of \$1,000.00 to be added to the Mrs. G. G. Allen Fund. We have been notified of a bequest estimated to have a value of approximately \$40,000.00 contained in a will of the late Mrs. Madeline W. Eskridge whose will, in this case, is being contested. Mr. and Mrs. Wright Tisdale have made a gift of a valuable piece of property in Richmond, Virginia, to a number of institutions. The Methodist Home for Children has a 2/63rds interest in this gift, estimated to have a value of approximately \$2,000.00. Negotiations are under way now for the sale of the property.

We are grateful for the gifts, both large and small, for they help us to expand the service which the Methodist Home for Children can render to the children committed to its care. We are hopeful that other interested people will remember our children in their wills and their gifts.

According to the rotation plan, the following trustees must retire this year: Sydnor Cozart, Albert Goldfinch, Ralph Hardee, Rev. P. H. Layfield, Rev. W. J. Neese and James F. Rogers. Mr. Harold Veasey, whose term expires in 1958, has resigned.

We wish to commend these devoted friends of our Home for their untiring service and their great contribution to the progress that has been made. In conformity with the action of the Annual Conference, nominations for trustees are not being made by the Board of Trustees, but rather by the Board of Hospitals and Homes.

REPORT OF THE METHODIST RETIREMENT HOMES, INC.

I

The real meaning of life at any age is found in man's relationship with God, and this relationship gives meaning to all human values. The goal is not to keep the aging busy but to help them find in every moment an opportunity for greatness. In the Retirement Home, members are helped in meeting this goal.

A well-rounded, happy life is found in a religious environment with Christian companionship and an opportunity to be needed and wanted. The members find this in the Home along with security and adequate provision to meet their physical, social, and spiritual needs.

The Home serves a twofold purpose. Besides giving needed care through its Benevolent Program it offers the finest facilities available for retirement in eastern North Carolina. The apartments offer privacy plus protection. Every service of the Home is available to apartment residents.

The basic requirements for admission are a minimum age of 65 (62 for apartments), a life of service to the church and community and a need for the services offered by the Home. Members are received on a monthly boarding basis or on a life contract. Each case is considered on its own merits. No one is turned away because of lack of finances, while those who are financially able are expected to make contributions to the Home.

The average monthly rate of \$159 provides room, board, laundry, the services of the Home's physician, the medicine prescribed, the nursing and geriatric care, and the religious and social life of the Home. Only sixty percent of the members pay as much as the cost of their care, while thirty-five percent are Old Age Assistance recipients. The Home can continue to accept members like these only through a liberal Mother's Day offering and through special gifts made for this purpose. The average monthly cost of operation is \$152 exclusive of depreciation and interest on investment. When these are added the total cost is \$220 per month per member.

The apartments offer "retirement at its best," for the apartment members have all the

privacy found in their own home. Members desiring apartment living make a capital gift of \$10,000.00 to the Home which gives a couple the privilege of occupying an apartment as long as they are members of the Home. However, they may move into the main building on doctors' orders or on request. They make the same monthly payment as members living in the main building and receive the same services. You should investigate the apartments if you are considering retirement.

Support for the Home comes from many sources: (1) Payments by members; (2) the general giving by the churches of the Conferences (used for debt retirement); (3) the Mother's Day offering in the churches of the Conference (used for the benevolent work of the Home); (4) gifts from individuals and groups (the furnishing of a room and other memorials are available in recognition of appropriate gifts to the Home); (5) Wills; and (6) memorial contributions sent upon the death of a friend.

The charter of the Home is being changed in accordance with the action of the 1964 Annual Conference.

The Home has continued to expand its facilities to serve more people. It opened in 1955 with the second unit and the first four apartments completed in 1959. There are now twenty apartments. With land, buildings, and equipment valued at \$1,325,000 there is an indebtedness of \$460,000. The Home's equity is \$1,185,000.

Future Plans

The Home requests the continued privilege of receiving a special offering in the churches of the conference on Mother's Day.

The apartments will eventually be paid for by the capital gifts made by the members living in these apartments. New apartments will continue to be constructed as long as there is a demand.

The Home is filled with 136 members, ranging in age from 65 to 95 with an average age of 80, and there is a long waiting list of people who need the care the Home offers. Many of the most needy applications come from the chronically ill whom the Home is not equipped to serve.

Recognizing the increasing need for providing adequate facilities and services for our retired and chronically ill people, the Board of Trustees of the Home is requesting the Methodists of the North Carolina Conference to accept this challenge. Funds are urgently needed to retire the indebtedness on the present buildings and for the construction of facilities for the care of the chronically ill.

The Board of Trustees in April authorized the construction of eight additional apartments at an estimated cost of \$140,000. They also authorized the architect to present to the board meeting in September, plans for an addition of twenty-four to thirty rooms to the main building.

Realizing that many individuals, families, and churches are vitally interested in the care of our retired people, the trustees of the Home will welcome the offer of money and land for the expansion of facilities for the care of retired people in appropriate location within the bounds of our conference. Though the Home's assets are limited, the trustees have voted to offer money on a matching basis for another home at a strategic location (to be selected by the trustees) within the bounds of our conference. The initial facilities are to have a capacity of not less than 40 members. A retirement home will mean much to your community and district.

You and your fellow Methodists make this possible through your prayers and financial support.

Amendments to Charter

In accordance with a letter dated March 25, 1964, from Bishop Paul N. Garber, Bishop of the Richmond Area of The Methodist Church, pointing out the official action of the 1960 Annual Conference which stated that all corporations controlled by and auxiliary to the North Carolina Annual Conference must make changes in their charters bringing them in line with the official action of the 1960 Annual Conference, the Board of Trustees of The Methodist Retirement Homes, Incorporated, at a regular meeting convened of the Board of Trustees of the Corporation, on the 14th day of April, 1964, unanimously voted that the articles of incorporation and amendments thereto of the Charter of The Methodist Retirement Homes, Incorporated, be amended to include the following provisions in its charter, to wit:

1. This corporation shall be under the jurisdiction, control and direction of the North Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction of The Methodist Church.

2. The period of existence of this corporation is unlimited. In the event, however, of the dissolution of this corporation, or in the event the corporation ceases to perform the objects and purposes for which it was incorporated, all properties of the corporation shall become the property of the North Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction of The Methodist Church, subject to the debts of the corporation, and subject to such trusts as may have been created and subject to such revisionary interest as may have been created in said corporation.

3. The Board of Trustees shall have, and it is hereby specifically given, full power and authority to alter or amend this certificate of incorporation in any and all respects, with the proviso that any alteration of amendment shall have been approved by the North Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction of The Methodist Church.

The trustees of the Methodist Retirement Homes, Incorporated, respectfully request that the North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Church, Southeastern Jurisdiction, session in Burlington, North Carolina, on Tuesday, June 23, 1964, approve the action of the Board of Trustees of the Methodist Retirement Homes, Incorporated, as above outlined and authorize the Articles of Incorporation and Amendments thereto of the Charter of the Methodist Retirement Homes, Incorporated, to be thus amended.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON IN-SERVICE TRAINING FOR PASTORS

The In-Service Training Committee for pastors in the North Carolina Annual Conference has met to perfect plans for pilot projects in the New Bern and Goldsboro Districts during 1964-65.

Following a detailed report from R. Grady Dawson and M. W. Lawrence, district superintendents of the aforementioned districts, the Curriculum Sub-Committee presented the pastoral needs outlined by ministers and laymen in these districts.

The in-service training needs expressed by *ministers* were:

- (1) Help in preaching and sermon-building
- (2) Church administration, e.g., aids in programming and work with the official board and commissions
- (3) Personal evangelism
- (4) Pastoral counseling with particular emphasis on pre-marital, alcoholism
- (5) Personal devotions and personal enlistment
- (6) Public relations, e.g., the art of getting along with laymen in church and community.

The pastoral needs of the ministers as expressed by the *laymen* included:

- (1) Preaching aids. Most laymen polled agreed that here the need was greatest
- (2) Leadership. A common criticism indicated "no grasp of the church program."
- (3) Pastoral functioning needs to be improved. Laymen called for more pastoral visitation.
- (4) Priestly functions. Help in conducting worship services, the Communion service indicated.
- (5) Personal needs.

The committee reviewed the needs and reports the following to the Annual Conference:

A. A grant of \$3,000.00 from the Duke Endowment has been received and will be used to financially support pilot projects in the New Bern and Goldsboro Districts.

B. Following the requests of ministers and laymen polled, the committee has agreed that priority in the In-Service Training program for pastors will be given in the area of preaching. Personnel from the Duke Divinity School faculty and ministers in the North Carolina Annual Conference will be asked to serve as resources for these pilot projects.

C. The superintendents of the New Bern and Goldsboro Districts will schedule this program of In-Service Training during the fall of 1964 on dates suitable to each. The program will be voluntary for the ministers of the district although all will be encouraged to take advantage of the opportunity.

D. A schedule for covering the cost to ministers of this In-Service Training has been adopted by the committee and will include travel, meals and the textbook.

E. The committee further requests that it be continued for the 1964-68 quadrennium

(NOTE: This committee was authorized by the 1962 Annual Conference and appointed August 1, 1962, by Bishop Paul N. Garber.)

REPORT OF BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

After seven years of serving as chairman of the Conference Board of Lay Activities it became necessary, for health reasons, for Mr. J. Nelson Gibson, Jr., to resign this position at the annual meeting of the board held in Greenville, June 18, 1963. His superb leadership and devotion challenged us to carry on in his stead with a renewed zeal and deep sense of mission to our trust. In the accomplishments this year we have merely built upon the firm foundations laid in former years.

Early in the conference year the theme was chosen to be CHRISTIAN STEWARDSHIP—OUR CHALLENGE. This became the battle cry at Louisburg where over 350

laymen gathered on the weekend of August 24-25 for the Conference Laymen's Retreat. Mr. J. Nelson Gibson, Jr. gave the keynote address on *Christian Stewardship*. This was followed at a later session by the conference address delivered by Dr. F. Olen Hunt speaking on *Man, the Steward*. The program on August 24 also afforded opportunity for laymen to attend one of several discussion groups on various aspects of Christian Stewardship.

The services Sunday morning, August 25, were conducted by members of the Cabinet, with Bishop Paul N. Garber bringing the sermon of the hour. An offering of \$500 was received during this service on behalf of the Jasper Smith Scholarship Fund. This was later designated for the benefit of supply pastors attending Louisburg College.

On Sunday afternoon, December 8, there was held simultaneously in every district of the conference a training session for local lay officers, the purpose being to provide for our laymen an opportunity to learn more about their local church responsibilities. Workshops were held for the following: 1) Church lay leaders; 2) Methodist Men officers; 3) Official Board chairmen. Pastors were urged to attend and serve as resource persons in one of the groups.

The large majority of our charges observed Laymen's Day sometime during the month of October. The official date for the past several years has been the third Sunday in October. This has been changed to the *second* Sunday to conform with action taken by the 1964 General Conference.

Beginning on Monday, February 10, and continuing through Friday, February 21, the 11th Annual District Lay Rallies were held. The theme of the rallies this year was, "The Call to Christian Stewardship." Mr. Matt D. Howell of Waynesville, N. C., brought the evening message on "What it Means to be a Christian Steward." The total attendance to the 1964 lay rallies was nearly 5,500.

As a follow-through on the Special Annual Conference Session held at Edenton Street Church in Raleigh on November 19 for the Bishop's Mission on the Ministry, and also, to honor our own Bishop Garber, an offering was received in each district rally to be used as an undergraduate scholarship to one of our conference colleges. These offerings totaled over \$4,000, and are to be designated for some young person entering the full-time Christian ministry.

During the afternoon of the lay rallies the board worked in close harmony with the Commission on World Service and Finance in presenting the stewardship theme, "When We Know, We Care — When We Care, We Share." Discussion groups were held on the following: 1) Tithing; 2) Every Member Visitation; 3) Commission on Stewardship and Finance; and 4) Local Church Financing.

Associate Conference Lay Leader Appointed

In order to provide leadership in special areas of lay activities it was decided early in the church year to appoint key men as associate conference lay leaders in the field of Methodist men, lay speaking, and lay evangelism. The board feels there is a great need for a conference director of stewardship to be added to this list to give special attention and cultivation to this field. The chairman attempted to fill this need this year, but we are still searching for someone to lead us in this area of vital concern.

METHODIST MEN: To head this work, Mr. Charles L. McCullers of Dunn, was selected as conference director of Methodist Men. On the district level nine other men were asked to serve as district directors. Training sessions for local Methodist Men officers were held in each district with the district directors leading in these sessions. These men, together with the conference director, have driven thousands of miles and written hundreds of letters on behalf of our Methodist Men's work in the North Carolina Conference this year. Several new clubs have been organized and many others revived through their efforts, for which we are deeply grateful.

LAY SPEAKING: The board was fortunate to enlist the services of Mr. James F. Rogers of Burlington to direct its activities in the field of lay speakers' training. Over the years through the annual No-Silent Pulpit program, and other opportunities, the certified lay speaker has come to be recognized as an important part of the total church witness. Through various district lay speaking training schools offered this year hundreds of our

lay speakers were officially certified. For this work we are certainly indebted to our conference director and his associates who have made these significant forward steps possible in the area of lay speaker training.

LAY EVANGELISM: In recognition of one of the great needs of the church being an effectual witness the office of conference director of Lay Evangelism was conceived with attention directed mainly toward the following: 1) Visitation Evangelism; 2) units of "The Twelve;" 3) local lay retreats, and 4) lay revivals. Due to interest and success in this area for a number of years, Mr. Robert C. Rose of Goldsboro was called upon to serve in this important field. Under his direction several units of "The Twelve" have been established. Local retreats and lay revivals have been successfully held in a number of our churches throughout the conference. The board is pleased to announce that a close cooperative effort in this work is being planned with the Conference Board of Evangelism for the new church year.

The Board of Lay Activities constantly is aware that our efforts are in vain without the support of the many good pastors and laymen of our North Carolina Conference. The privilege of working with them in helping to build the kingdom of God has been our greatest joy and satisfaction.

To the members of the Cabinet, and our beloved bishop, who have cooperated in every way to help us in the work this year we offer our heartfelt thanks and appreciation.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON LOCAL CHURCH EMPHASIS

(See *Journal*, 1963, p. 23)

I

The 1956 General Conference provided for "The Local Church Emphasis" study and work. (See *Discipline*, 1956, par. 2017). Pursuant to this, the North Carolina Annual Conference constituted the quadrennial Committee on Local-Church Emphasis. The Annual Conference continued the committee for the 1960-1964 quadrennium.

II

In accordance with the General Conference provision in the 1956 *Discipline*, paragraph 2017, the North Carolina Annual Conference undertook a large research work (nine volumes) to statistically examine the local churches. The name of the research work, "Production Story," came from the 1956 *Discipline*, paragraph 2017, page 694. The researcher was Martin R. Chambers.

The research was financed mainly by the Ormond Fund of Duke Divinity School, was produced by the research office of the Commission on Town and Country Work and was published by the Committee on Research and Survey of the Board of Missions.

III

An inter-agency meeting on the local church was convened in Raleigh on November 28, 1961. Bishop Paul N. Garber presided, assisted by Cecil W. Robbins as chairman of the Committee on Research and Survey of the Board of Missions.

The "Production Story" data, summarized on 22 charts, was presented and considered. The presentation was made by Martin R. Chambers and Key W. Taylor.

At the end of the meeting, a motion was adopted which led to the constituting of the Committee on In-Service Training for Pastors. (See *Journal*, 1963, p. 22; *Journal*, 1963, pp. 232-233; *Journal*, 1963, p. 226).

IV

The publication, *Local Church Production Story Supplement 1959-196 and 1960-1961, North Carolina Annual Conference, Se. J., The Methodist Church*, 1962, continues the "Production Story" study for two years and condenses the statistical data into one volume. Martin R. Chambers was the researcher.

This smaller statistical study was financed by the Ormond Fund of Duke Divinity School, was produced by the research office of the Commission on Town and Country Work and was published by the Committee on Local Church Emphasis.

V

The Committee on Local Church Emphasis has in process *Local Church Production Story Supplement II*. This is being financed by the Ormond Fund of Duke Divinity School, and is being produced by the research office of the Commission on Town and Country Work. Reginald W. Ponder is the researcher.

This statistical study is timely, in view of the Annual Conference church school enrollment decline in recent years. The church school enrollment decline is a symptom of deeper problems of the local church. The deeper problems call for analysis and solutioning.

REPORT OF LONG-RANGE PLANNING COMMITTEE

I

At the end of a busy quadrennium the Long Range Planning Committee wishes to express appreciation to Dr. C. D. Barclift for his able and statesmanlike leadership through the past eight years. His resignation was accepted with a letter of appreciation for this fine service as he became a member of the World Service and Finance Commission earlier this conference year.

The Annual Conference of 1963 recommended that Long Range appoint a Redistricting Committee to draw up a proposal for geographical lines of the approved eleven districts for the bishop's consideration. The committee, composed of Thomas A. Collins, chairman; Graham S. Eubank, J. Nelson Gibson, Vergil E. Queen, W. Jasper Smith and Key W. Taylor, has prepared extensive studies and presented them to Bishop Paul N. Barber for enactment.

Pursuant to the resolution adopted at the Special Session of the Annual Conference, Raleigh, September 12, 1962, seeking long range needs of our educational institutions for higher learning, a committee studied these needs. We offer the following recommendations:

1. That the North Carolina Annual Conference continue its policy of increasing its annual appropriation to the College Sustaining Fund at the rate of \$40,000 until the goal of \$500,000 annually has been reached and stabilized.

2. That the North Carolina Annual Conference and its financial agencies make further Capital Fund commitments until the current unfinished campaign for \$3,000,000 has been completed, and that this goal be pursued with all due haste and diligence.

A sub-committee has made extensive study of the resolution relating to moving expenses for ministers, and will bring in a specific recommendation at this session of the Annual Conference.

After careful study of the matter of Methodist information and public relations programs for the conference, we offer the following recommendations:

1. We recommend that a committee on Methodist Information be re-established as a standing committee of the North Carolina Annual Conference of The Methodist Church.

2. That this committee be constituted by the appointment of a quadrennial chairman and eleven district Methodist Information officers to comprise the Committee on Methodist Information of twelve persons. We further recommend that the Reverend William Quick become the first chairman by virtue of previous experience and intense interest in the promotion of the North Carolina Annual Conference of The Methodist Church.

3. We recommend that the World Service and Finance Commission make available to the Methodist Information Committee thus constituted the sum of \$1,000 during the Annual Conference year 1964-65. The proposed use of these funds would be \$50.00 per district available to each district information officer to promote the program and activities through seminars and informational releases. The balance of such funds would be available to the chairman, Mr. Quick, for photographic and news publicity in behalf

of the total conference program at annual conference sessions and throughout the year.

It is our belief this would immensely strengthen the informational services of our conference and initiate programs which have long been needed to advance the causes of Methodism. It would foster understanding among our membership and other churches of the fine creative accomplishments of this conference.

As our closing act for the quadrennium we would offer sincere words of appreciation for the unparalleled leadership of Bishop Paul N. Garber. The advances made this quadrennium only continue the program which has characterized his dynamic and inspirational episcopal supervision of this conference since 1952.

REPORT OF SUBCOMMITTEE ON MOVING EXPENSES

Adopted June 25, 1964

Having considered the need of pastors for assistance with moving expenses, the subcommittee makes the following report to the Long Range Planning Committee:

1. That the North Carolina Annual Conference establish a fund to be known as the "Pastors' Moving Expense Fund."

2. That a standing committee, to be known as the "Committee on Pastors' Moving Expenses" be constituted to administer this Fund. Further, that this committee be composed of one person from each of the following agencies, either the chairman of the agency or his appointed representative:

- a. The Board of Lay Activities;
- b. The Board of Missions;
- c. The Commission on Town and Country Work;
- d. The Commission on Minimum Salaries;
- e. The Woman's Society of Christian Service.

3. That the base pay to a pastor who is moving be \$40.00 (forty dollars), plus 50c (fifty cents) per mile, or the actual moving expense, whichever amount is less.

4. That the following procedure be followed in making payments to pastors:

a. The Conference Treasurer's office shall provide the district superintendent with requisition forms for this purpose;

b. The receiving district superintendent shall get these forms to all eligible pastors as soon as possible after the adjournment of each Annual Conference;

c. Each pastor shall fill out the form provided, to attach the receipted bill for his moving expense, and send it to his district superintendent for his signature—be forwarded by the district superintendent to the Annual Conference Treasurer's office for payment;

d. The Conference Treasurer shall pay the pastors according to the Conference regulation as early as possibly after receipt of the forms from the district superintendents.

5. That the plan include moves only within the bounds of the North Carolina Annual Conference.

6. That the plan include all pastors serving pastoral charges:

a. Pastors moving from one pastoral charge to another pastoral charge; and district superintendents going to a pastorate.

b. Pastors who are retiring: This Fund shall pay the expense from the place of the last appointment to the place of retirement residence within the bounds of the North Carolina Annual Conference; or to the boundary of the Conference.

c. Assistant pastors and/or associate pastors who are members of the North Carolina Annual Conference, who are moving from one pastoral charge to another pastoral charge;

d. Approved supply pastors who are moving from one pastoral charge to another

e. Widows of pastors who die while serving a pastoral charge, payments are to be made to widows on the same basis as to pastors.

7. That unusual cases may be submitted for consideration to the Committee on Pastors' Moving Expenses by the district superintendents involved.
8. That interpretation of these rules be made by the Committee on Pastors' Moving Expenses, on request of a district superintendent.
9. That the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance make careful study of the amount of money needed to operate this plan successfully, and that this Commission be authorized to devise ways and means of raising the money.
10. That the report of the Commission on World Service and Finance to the 1965 Session of the North Carolina Annual Conference include provision for financing this plan.

REPORT OF METHODIST FOUNDATION, INC.

The Methodist Foundation has continued to produce effective earnings for our conference causes. The report of the Investment Department reflects a sound fiscal position and a conservative schedule of investments. The total market value of your Foundation's investments at the end of the reporting period exceeded \$2,000,000 for the first time. Annual earnings of more than \$90,000 have been realized for the causes of our conference. It should also be noted that capital gains of \$26,689 have been realized during the period which is nearly four times the gains of the same period for the previous year.

Financial success and fiscal shrewdness no matter how useful are not ends in themselves. Your Foundation members chosen from various conference agencies are concerned with the needs of the conference and are aware that they are workers together in His kingdom. In order to make certain that all conference causes are represented in Foundation deliberations, a special committee was appointed to review its membership designations. The conference is asked to approve that committee's recommendations which have been approved by the Foundation. The report follows:

"By reason of expanding interest for representation on the Foundation, it is requested that certain amendments be made in the membership requirement which must be done by action of the Annual Conference.

Reference is made to Conference *Journal* 1960, pages 211 and 212:

It is requested that certain additions be made, viz:

1. The Resident Bishop of the North Carolina Annual Conference.
2. One additional member elected by the Commission on World Service and Finance from the conference-at-large based upon recognized ability in investments (thus making four instead of three as now provided.)
3. One member elected by the Conference Board of Evangelism.
4. One member of the Cabinet elected by the Bishop and the Cabinet.
5. One member elected by the Board of Trustees of Louisburg College.
6. One member elected by the Board of Trustees of Methodist College.
7. One member elected by the Board of Trustees of North Carolina Wesleyan College.

We quote from the charter:

"Membership shall expire as soon after the quadrennial meeting of said North Carolina Annual Conference as a successor has been elected, except members elected by the membership on the happening of a vacancy shall expire upon the election of a successor, which may be done at the next regular meeting of the Board or Commission charged with the election of such member."

Therefore, we respectfully direct attention to the necessity for action by the agencies involved and we respectfully suggest that such action might be accomplished at the time of the reorganization for the new quadrennium for the several groups.

With revisions, the membership shall be constituted as follows:

(a) The resident Bishop of the North Carolina Annual Conference (Southeastern Jurisdiction) of the Methodist Church.

(b) That person holding the office of treasurer of the North Carolina Annual Conference (Southeastern Jurisdiction) of The Methodist Church.

(c) That person holding the office of president of the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance.

(d) Three members elected by the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance from the membership of the Commission on World Service and Finance.

(e) Four members elected by the Commission on World Service and Finance from the conference-at-large based upon their recognized ability in investments.

(f) That person holding the office of Conference lay leader.

(g) That person holding the office of president of the Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service.

(h) One member elected by the Conference Board of Pensions.

(i) One member elected by the Conference Board of Missions.

(j) One member elected by the Conference Board of Trustees.

(k) One member elected by the Conference Board of Education.

(l) One member elected by the Conference Commission on Christian Higher Education.

(m) One member elected by the Conference Board of Hospitals and Homes.

(n) One member elected by the Methodist Home for Children, Incorporated, Raleigh, N. C.

C. (o) One member elected by the Methodist Retirement Homes, Inc., Durham, N. C.

(p) One member elected by the Conference Town and Country Commission.

(q) One member elected by the Conference Commission on Promotion and Cultivation.

(r) One member of the Cabinet elected by the Bishop and the Cabinet.

(s) One member elected by the Conference Board of Evangelism.

(t) One member elected by the trustees of Louisburg College.

(u) One member elected by the trustees of Methodist College, Fayetteville, N. C.

(v) One member elected by the trustees of North Carolina Wesleyan College, Rocky Mount, N. C.

The total portfolio contains only 34.9% of "equity" securities or common stocks and this the Directors and Moody's Investors Service consider to be a good defensive position.

Our holdings of equities alone showed \$164,000 of market appreciation as of March 31 or 24% above our book values. The rate of return from dividends and interest alone was 4.47% on book value.

DEPARTMENT OF GIFTS AND WILLS

F. Olen Hunt, Director

Five years ago certain farsighted members of the Methodist Foundation recognized the need for a department of gifts and wills, and immediately set the wheels in motion bringing this to a full realization.

In briefly reviewing this period of time, we very modestly enumerate a few of the more pertinent results of the programs launched by this department.

1. We have written confirmation of the establishment of a Wills and Legacy Committee in 339 churches in our conference, and we have verbal word that there is such a committee in every church in the conference.

2. We have received written confirmation on but very few wills, but there is an ever increasing number of verbal commitments made indicating the writing of wills leaving something for the churches and conference causes, with the knowledge that many of our churches and institutions have already been the recipient of sizeable sums as the result of wills.

3. Gifts have been made to institutions and agencies, and scholarships established in several of our colleges.

4. Published a Newsletter which has sponsored programs of the various boards, agencies, and institutions, and distributed approximately 250,000 copies to Methodist families throughout the conference, and to others.

5. Published a large brochure portraying our institutions, boards and agencies that would benefit through gifts and wills, and other booklets containing information and helpful ideas on will-making. These have been widely distributed in our conference and in others.

6. A district director has been appointed in each district of the conference by the district superintendents to work with the local committees and pastors.

7. Arrangements for over 50 dinner meetings on a subdistrict level were worked out with the district superintendents, district directors and pastors in all nine districts, and attendance for these meetings was close to 3,000.

The department of gifts and wills along with the Methodist Foundation, feels justly proud of its achievements the first five years of operation. We feel that we are now out

of the pioneering stage, that our roots are firmly planted, and we are off to a good start. With persistent and careful planning and the continued use of educational programs, the next five years should produce excellent results. Our program has gone into hundreds of churches and been heard by thousands of people, through sermons, meetings, addresses, and distribution of literature. In addition, I have been invited to speak many times in other conferences.

The fact that we receive a great many letters from conferences all over America asking for information on how to start such a program, and saying to us they have been told that we are a leader in this area of Methodism, makes us believe more strongly that our "growing is showing."

The fall program will be planned with district directors and local church directors of gifts and wills for a continuing program of wills information, and a canvass for wills at the local level.

REPORT OF THE METHODIST STUDENT CENTER

Greenville, North Carolina — 1963-64

It is my privilege to report to you again concerning the program of the Wesley Foundation at East Carolina College. In order to be as brief as possible, only major aspects of the program will be brought to your attention at this time.

Eighteen members of the Wesley Foundation Council participated in the Spring Retreat last May which met at Camp Don-Lee for three days. At this time we discussed the basic purpose of our mission as the church through the Wesley Foundation. A constitution was also formulated to serve as a guide for the administration of the local program. The Wesley Foundation was represented this past year by council members at both the Regional MSM Conference at Lake Junaluska and the Spiritual Life Retreat at Camp Chestnut Ridge, N. C. One of the more significant gatherings was the Student-Faculty Seminar sponsored by the Inter-Religious Council of East Carolina over a two-day period in September. Here, both faculty and students led by Dr. Sam Hill of UNC, discussed the church's mission "For the Life of the World."

Assisting us with our local program this year in the area of human rights were two guest Wesley Foundation directors and the chairman of the General Board of Social Concerns for the American Baptist Convention. The Rev. Bill Brown of A. & T. College in Greensboro encouraged a serious study of the Central Jurisdiction problem which will come again before General Conference this year. Several students recently participated in a panel discussion at York Memorial (AME Zion) Church here in Greenville at the invitation of their pastor. It was agreed upon by the panel that exchange programs of this type provide us with a better understanding of the race problem than a paper or speaker. Those who attended State Conference appreciated the dynamic and provocative presentation by Rev. James Lawson on this subject.

Another major program emphasis is the participation in small groups of study and worship open to any student who is interested in examining with consistency and seriousness a study curriculum which calls into question all of our presuppositions concerning the Christian faith. These groups periodically re-evaluate their purpose and their relationship to the church at large. This program is sustained at large by the State Ministry which meets periodically in worship and study. Readings this year have included *Dynamics of Faith* (Tillich), *Letters and Papers from Prison* (Bonhoeffer), *To Be a Man* (Spike), and *After the Fall* (Miller).

The more popular and certainly a most important aspect of our program is fellowship. Wednesday night this year has been the designated time for our fellowship supper. We usually follow this with a presentation and discussion. Principal guest speakers this quarter were Professor Wyatt Brown of the History Department; Dr. Clinton Prewett, director of the Psychology Department; Dean of Men James Mallory; Professor Jack Gross, co-ordinator of Religious Activities at East Carolina College; Rev. Bill Quick c

James Methodist Church; and Drs. George and Lily Anjilvel, natives of India, who are currently doing work in pathology and surgery in New York City.

Dr. H. D. Bollinger of the General Board of Education has recently informed the Board of Directors and other interested persons that by the action of the Commission on Standards for Wesley Foundation and Interdenominational Student Work (*Discipline*, p. 1367) the Wesley Foundation at East Carolina College is now fully accredited.

Our Commission recommends for the conference year 1964-1965 that the minimum salaries of our ministers who are serving full time be as follows:

It is recommended that the conference move toward a minimum salary goal for men with five years or more service in the North Carolina Conference on the following schedule: a salary of \$3,800.00 for a full-time single man; \$4,100.00 for a full-time married man; and \$4,500.00 for a full-time married man with one or more dependent children, to be effective by or before the last year of the next quadrennium.

The Commission also recommends for divinity school student pastors serving pastoral appointments in our conference that their minimum salaries shall be as follows:

BOARD OF MINISTERIAL TRAINING AND QUALIFICATIONS

Report No. I

GENERAL STATEMENT

During the quadrennium now closing the Board has endeavored to do its work with a deep sense of moral responsibility to the conference and the church as well as to the candidates for the ministry in upholding the standards for the ministry.

The Board has studied its task diligently with the purpose of strengthening the ministry. In December of each year a meeting has been held for the purpose of studying the task, evaluating and improving work done, and planning for the future.

The organization set up to carry out the program includes a division of the Board in two sections—Approved Supply and On Trial—with a registrar and chairman for each section and committees on Student Work, Psychological Tests, the Christian Faith

and the Methodist Church, the One Percent Plan Scholarship Committee, and Procedures.

The Committee on Psychological Tests has administered the Minnesota Multiphasic Inventory to all candidates for the ministry coming before the Board. The Scholarship Committee has awarded scholarships according to procedures and standards approved by the Board. The Committee on Student Work has endeavored to keep in touch with students to aid them. Through correspondence it has suggested to all the effective ministers of our conference a variety of opportunities within the conference for continuing education. It is offering to help develop ministers' prayer and study fellowships in sub-districts. A written doctrinal statement and answers to a number of questions concerning the candidate's ministry in the Methodist Church have been required. New procedures have been developed for the interviewing of candidates designed to save time and better serve the interests of both the Board and each candidate for the ministry.

Whatever progress has been made may be attributed in large measure to the dedication and cooperation within the membership of the Board and the assistance and cooperation of the bishop, cabinet, and district committees on ministerial qualifications.

Spring Meetings

Spring meetings for interviewing candidates will be held two days at St. Paul Church, Goldsboro, March 29-30, 9:30 a.m.; and at Duke Memorial Church, Durham, for students, March 31, 1965, 9:30 a.m.

Books in Courses of Study

The Department of Ministerial Education has authorized the use of the present books in the Courses of Study Program in the Correspondence Work of each conference until the annual session in 1965. The new books and the new students' Handbooks will be available after the session of the annual conference in 1965.

Recommendations

1. That each district committee on ministerial qualifications continue to require "Studies for License to Preach" to be taken through the Correspondence Department of Ministerial Education, Nashville, Tennessee, or in summer school.

2. That a concerted effort be made toward securing highly qualified men and women for full-time Christian service, and that each minister give special attention to this most important matter.

3. That all candidates for the ministry endeavor to attend and pursue their studies in colleges and theological schools related to the Methodist Church.

4. That all candidates in the Courses of Study be encouraged to attend the Approved Pastors' Schools at Duke and Emory and that financial assistance be continued as funds are available.

5. That all ministerial candidates seeking admission on trial and full connection, especially those under thirty-five years of age, be urged to obtain the B.D. degree or its equivalent from schools of theology related to the Methodist Church and accredited or approved by the University Senate. That those who drop out of seminary for unsatisfactory reasons be delayed in being recommended for full connection.

6. That Ministry Sunday be observed in every local church, the Sunday of or preceding May 24 (Aldersgate Sunday).

7. That the Orientation Workshop for Pastors new to the North Carolina Conference be continued and held in August, and that the Commission on World Service and Finance be requested to make provision for financing it through the Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications, as it is a responsibility of the Board.

8. That each local church be urged to make an annual appropriation equal to one per cent of its operational budget (based on the previous year) for the One Per Cent Plan—the fund for ministerial education.

9. Concerning scholarship aid under the One Per Cent Plan, that the restriction which limits aid to those student families whose income is less than minimum salary be deleted from the Constitution of the One Per Cent Plan.

Loans are limited by law. No member may borrow more than 10% of the total shares. Signature loans are limited to a maximum of \$750.00. All insurable loans are covered by Loan Protection Insurance against death and permanent disability as a service to the members who borrow. The Credit Union pays the premium.

Life Savings Insurance is provided as a service to the members who buy shares. Again the Credit Union pays the premium as an extra bonus for saving, over and above the regular dividend (4% last year). This insurance in most cases doubles the savings up to \$2,000.00 for the survivor. The Table of Coverage follows:

The Board of Directors, Credit Committee, Loan Officers, and Supervisory Committee have had a busy year keeping up with the work of this fast growing service agency. All of these officers serve without pay, enabling the Credit Union to render greater service than could be afforded otherwise.

We are very proud of our record of not having charged off any debt against the reserve fund in the history of the Credit Union, and the present percentage of delinquency is very low. This is a tribute to the integrity of the ministers in the North Carolina Annual Conference. We urge each member to strive to keep this record clean.

We are justly proud of the service rendered in the past. To those of you who are not members, we extend an invitation to join and help create a greater future of service to all members of our conference who will participate.

In order to improve the service rendered to its members, the Methodist Ministers' Credit Union, upon the recommendation of the Board of Directors, has elected the Reverend C. M. Mitchell as the full-time executive director of the Credit Union, effective July 1, 1964. We appreciate the fine work he has done, the interest he has demonstrated, and we believe a growing service will result from his leadership.

GENERAL STATEMENT

We express our thanks to the several district superintendents for the participation and enthusiastic support of our labors. We recognize a great debt of gratitude to the

district secretaries for their leadership in the program. Mrs. H. C. Turlington, past president of the Woman's Society of Christian Service, has been a continual influence in helping us project the program of missions in our conference. We commend our leaders in the Woman's Society for their cooperation. We welcome, and anticipate with joy, the working with Mrs. S. A. Dunn of Enfield, the new president of the Woman's Society of Christian Service.

WORLD MISSIONS

World Service: When a church loses the vision beyond her borders, that church is dead! Methodism has ever considered the world as her appointed mission and parish. It is a God-given opportunity that we have to extend the kingdom into all corners of the earth. World Service is the avenue through which the saving power of Almighty God is channeled to the "dark places of earth's human races."

Your Conference Board is keenly aware that once again each local church must call its people and officials to open their eyes to the great harvest which awaits us. We respectfully urge every local pastor and Commission on Missions to see that every church accepts the full "askings" for World Service.

Audio-Visual Aids: Attention is called to the marvelous help available through RAFCO at the Methodist Building in Raleigh or from Cokesbury Store in Richmond. We urge a larger use of these aids and tools.

Missionary Conference: The Southeastern Missionary Conference at Lake Junaluska is one filled with opportunities for inspiration, information, and motivation. We urge each church to seriously consider sending the chairman of the Commission on Missions to this meeting, July 23-29. The Youth and Missions Conference is held at the same time. District secretaries of Missions are delegates and are expected to attend. It is urged that they bring two youth delegates with them.

European Caravan: Under the leadership of Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Neese, at this hour choice youth from our conference are representing Christ and us. The result of the Caravan is beyond measure. We commend those who have led the Caravan in the past, and recommend the continuation of this program.

HOME MISSIONS

Church Extension

The demands for Church Extension grow with the movement of people in our state. During the conference year 1963-1964 we have secured new sites for new churches. To meet the created needs, we must acquire more land, even though real estate becomes more difficult to purchase.

Since the beginning of the conference year the following new churches have been organized: Westview, Wilmington District; Benson Memorial, Raleigh District; Pineview, Wilmington District.

TEN DOLLAR CLUB

The story of the Ten Dollar Club in the North Carolina Annual Conference is a thrilling one! The demand for Church Extension is a continuing one. Throughout the years of the Club being in existence, we have given encouragement and money to newly-organized churches. They are given hope, a sense of loyalty, and a deeper faith in the cause of Methodism. The Ten Dollar Club warrants the support of all the congregations and individuals of our conference. We need hundreds more new members who will share of their abundance to the further success of this endeavor within the conference.

Since the beginning of the conference year, we have given assistance in the amount of \$45,000.00 to the following:

Our pastors and laymen across the conference are urged to keep the flame of enthusiasm burning brightly. It is our sacred responsibility and our God-given privilege to meet this glorious opportunity in our day.

Churches and Parsonages

At the September meeting we will approve churches to receive aid. This year we have assisted 16 churches in the amount of \$11,267.00 and 14 parsonages in the amount of \$10,250.00.

When You Build Remember

In order to make a request for a donation from the Board of Missions, the pastor or some official of the church must secure an official application from the executive secretary, LaFon C. Vereen, The Methodist Building, 1307 Glenwood Avenue, Raleigh, North Carolina. This application must be completed and in the hands of the executive secretary not later than May 1, annually. The applications are then processed and donations granted at the time of Annual Conference. The funds granted on these applications will be available to churches, parsonages and other buildings within the ensuing conference year.

We recommend that each church follow the rules of the *Discipline* of the church (1960) and the laws of the state in all of its building programs. Any building to cost as much as \$10,000.00 must have the approval of the Commissioner of Insurance, and plans for any building to cost as much as \$20,000.00 should be drawn by a competent licensed architect. We recommend that all plans be presented to the District Board of Church Location and Building, to the Conference Board of Missions (if aid is requested) and to the National Board of Missions, Board of Architecture, for review and improvement if needed.

Missionaries from The North Carolina Conference. More of our churches are urged to support specific missionary families. If, and when, you are ready the executive secretary will discuss the matter with you and help you receive complete information.

Alaska Methodist College. This is one of our National Mission Specials, a most worthy project for any church. We urge every church to continue to support this institution, recalling that about \$12,000.00 has been sent for the recent emergency there.

Pastors' School. The Board of Missions cooperates with the Board of Education in sponsoring the Pastors' School at Duke University each year.

Division of National Missions. Our Board is most grateful to the Division of National Missions for Pastors' Salary Aid and gifts and loans from the section of Church Extension. Visits by Dr. H. L. Johns and Dr. Allen B. Rice are most helpful. The Division continues to serve and inspire our Conference Board of Missions.

IV

AID TO CHURCHES

The Board of Missions, North Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction of The Methodist Church, Inc., was chartered by the State of North Carolina to facilitate the expansion of Church Extension within the bounds of the conference.

The Board has made six construction loans for the building of churches. The Board has helped nine churches to secure loans from the Division of National Missions for the construction of churches located in the nine districts. The Board has helped to secure two sites for new churches.

All our Church Extension work is helped by the Board of Missions, Inc. and the Ten Dollar Club. We request your continued support and endorsement of our efforts.

V

MISSION RALLIES

District Missionary Rallies were held this year in eight of the nine districts. Stress was laid on the work of the Ten Dollar Club by Dr. A. J. Hobbs in these meetings. The Reverend Ed F. Smith, former missionary to Africa, spoke on the subject of the church-wide mission study, *Our Mission Today*.

The total attendance in these rallies exceeded 1,700 persons. Churches represented at these rallies accepted Advance Specials for subsidy to pastors' salaries in India for a conference total of over ten thousand dollars.

Your Board of Missions submits this report recognizing the fact that you of the conference have made it possible. We are especially indebted to Bishop Paul N. Garber for his dynamic leadership in this, and all areas, work of extension of the kingdom of God in the earth.

RECOMMENDATION

The Board of Missions, North Carolina Annual Conference, Southeastern Jurisdiction of The Methodist Church, Inc., unanimously recommends Dr. J. E. Garlington to the Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference as our nominee to membership on the General Board of Missions.

REPORT OF THE NORTH CAROLINA PASTORS' SCHOOL

The annual Christian Convocation and North Carolina Pastors' School, together with the James A. Gray Lectures, was held at Duke University, October 28-30, 1963.

Bishop Nolan B. Harmon of the Charlotte Area and Bishop Fred Pierce Corson of the Philadelphia Area of the Methodist Church were the Pastors' School lecturers. Bishop Harmon's address, "Consciences Murmuring Faiths Under Forms," dealt with the his-

tory and current revision of the Methodist ritual. Bishop Corson spoke on "Ecumenicity and the Second Vatican Council" and "Ecumenicity and the World Confessional Bodies."

Dr. Chester A. Pennington of Hennepin Avenue Methodist Church, Minneapolis, was the Convocation Preacher. General theme of his sermons was "Can the Church Be Renewed?" Professor Joseph Sittler of the Divinity School of the University of Chicago delivered the Gray Lectures on the theme, "Reflections on Nature and Grace." Dr. A. Purnell Bailey, superintendent of the Richmond District, was the fourth annual Alumni Lecturer.

Chairman of the Board of Managers of the Pastors' School is the Reverend Leon Russell of Burlington. The Reverend Julian A. Lindsey of Lexington is vice-chairman. Convocation chairman is Dean Robert E. Cushman of the Divinity School. Professor James T. Cleland is chairman for the Gray Lectures. Dr. McMurry S. Richey is director of the Convocation and Pastors' School, and Dr. Harmon L. Smith is assistant director.

The 1964 Convocation and Pastors' School is planned for October 26-28. The Gray Lectures on the Second Vatican Council will be given by Father Godfrey Diekmann, editor of *Worship*, Professor of Liturgiology and Doctrine at St. John's Abbey, Minn., and consulting expert to the Commission on Liturgy, Second Vatican Council; and by Dean Robert E. Cushman, Professor of Systematic Theology, Duke Divinity School, a Protestant observer at the Second Vatican Council.

The Convocation Preacher is Dr. Samuel D. Proctor, associate director, United States Peace Corps, formerly president of North Carolina Agricultural and Technical College, Greensboro. The Pastors' School Lecturer is Dr. Eugene L. Smith, general secretary of the Division of World Missions of the Board of Missions of the Methodist Church. The Alumni Lecturer is President R. Wright Spears of Columbia College, South Carolina.

Along with other vital information, this book contains suggested floor plans. However, working plans are not available, but the book lists firms which you may contact if you find one which satisfies your needs.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF PENSIONS

For the support of the Conference Claimants during the year 1964-65, we recommend an apportionment on the churches of an amount equal to 16% of the salaries of the preachers. We recommend an annuity rate of \$60.00 per service year for Retired Preachers and also Retired Approved Supply Preachers who have served not less than four consecutive years of full-time approved service in the Annual Conference. Any period of less than one full year of service in the conference may not be counted (1960 Discipline 1631,1).

Special or relief appropriations are recommended as follows: Miss Nannie Pattison, an amount equal to a dependent child's annuity for 28 service years; Mrs. J. W. Smith, \$600.00 and James E. Mahoney, one years service \$60.00. The list of Conference Claimants, their records of service and annuity will be published in the 1964 Conference Journal under the heading, "Statement of Prospective Distribution, Conference Year 1964-65." We recommend an annual honorarium of \$400.00 plus expenses for the Secretary of the Conference Board of Pensions.

The Claimants who have died this year are: Herman B. Baum, Van T. Crawford, John D. Cranford, Marion C. Henderson, Hicks E. Lance, Ivey T. Poole, Mrs. Rose T. Draper, Mrs. Robert L. Hethcox, Mrs. Hiram K. King, Mrs. J. J. Lewis and Mrs. F. R. Lowery. Our sympathy and prayers continue with those who feel so deeply the loss of these loved ones.

We again call attention to the fact that Special Appointments from which salaries are not received from conference funds and from which twelve times the annuity rate for the appointed year is not paid into the Conference Pension Fund will not qualify for annuity credit. We recommend that these appointments be listed, "Without annuity claim on the conference."

Your Conference Board of Pensions continues its concern over the number of churches which are listing an excessive travel and expense appropriation for their preachers. This tends to cut back considerably on the causes which are dependent on a percentage of the preacher's salary, the Pension Fund being the greater portion of this amount. We urge that the Commission on World Service and Finance seek to devise some plan by which the conference may eliminate this problem.

We are of the opinion that the intent of the provision for churches to list and designate utility allowances included in the pastor's salary is for the purpose of personal income tax deduction only. Therefore, we recommend that the salary on which percentages are figured include the amounts allowed for utilities and that the District Superintendents personally promote this recommendation.

The report of the Hospital and Medical Expense Program is as follows: The program was instigated at Annual Conference in June 1961 to begin July 1st of that year. All of our Conference Claimants including retired ministers, their dependent ministers' widows and their dependents, are covered. This program is carried through the General Board of Pensions and underwritten by the Traveler's Insurance Company. The cost of premiums per month, paid from conference pension funds, has been \$7.75 for retired ministers alone or widow alone, \$16.00 for ministers and dependents and \$10.25 for widow and dependents. The maximum coverage began with an amount of \$2,500 for each one under the program.

Since the beginning of the program July 1, 1961, the maximum per insured has risen to \$7,500 with no increase in premium rates. Since its beginning in 1961 until January 1, 1964, the HMEP has cost \$66,101.25 with claims paid in the amount of \$36,763.30. Our General Board of Pensions has notified us that, due to increase in hospitalization and medical expense, the premiums would, of necessity, be increased for conference year of 1964-65. Thus, the premium will be \$10.09 for minister alone or widow alone, \$20.83 for minister and dependents and \$13.34 for widow and dependents. This represents an increase of about 30%.

It is with a great deal of satisfaction we are able to report that the Methodist Board of Publication is on a sound basis and is self-supporting. Especially in view of the fact that many, if not all, of the other Conference publications receive a subsidy from the conference we are happy that our *North Carolina Christian Advocate* is able to pay its own way. Not only is this true but a reserve fund is being established to meet any further emergencies which might arise.

The subscription list has held up well. However our people are not supporting their church paper as well as they should. With the membership in North Carolina Methodism reaching some 467,000, we should have many more regular subscribers to the church paper. Many of our pastors and laymen are giving more emphasis to this, and the list is growing, we are glad to say. It is our hope that the coming year will find the church paper going into many more homes and we are convinced that if this is true, we will have a better informed church, and therefore a more active church.

The Piedmont Press, subsidiary of the *Advocate*, is doing well in the field of commercial printing. We ask that more of our conference agencies give their work to this operation. Profits from this source go to offset the deficit in the *Advocate* operation. We are endeavoring to give our North Carolina Methodism the best *Advocate* possible, and we solicit the support of all our ministers and laymen to this end.

We appreciate the able and devoted leadership of our Editor-manager, the Reverend S. J. Starnes, and all associated with him.

The death of A. J. Hobbs, long-time member of the Board from the North Carolina Conference, was a distinct loss. The Reverend Barney L. Davidson has been chosen to fill the unexpired term of Dr. Hobbs.

T. C. Hoyle, Sr. has served on the Board longer than any other present member. He requested to be relieved of service. He has been elected an honorary life member, and is succeeded by T. C. Hoyle, Jr., attorney of Greensboro.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON PUBLISHING INTERESTS

The Methodist Church observes a significant moment in its history in the calendar year 1964. One hundred seventy-five years ago at the John Street Church in New York City, Bishop Francis Asbury presided over Methodism's historic conference there. The bishop had often said that the propagation of religion knowledge by means of the press is next in importance to the preaching of the gospel. The year was 1789, only five years after the Methodist Church was founded in America. John Wesley had urged that "every society be duly supplied with books." Frontier America yearned for good literature. Alert to these needs was the secretary of that conference: John Dickens, a highly respected Methodist minister and scholar. Bishop Asbury's interest and John Dickens' contribution of \$600—his savings of a lifetime—combined to change a hope into a reality. John Dickens was the first Book-Steward or manager of the Book Concern.

Methodism's publishing roots are then deep and strong. And the fruits of 175

years of careful stewardship are abundant. In the quarter-century since unification have come: *The Interpreter's Bible*, a new church bulletin service, *Together*, a children's book department, college-seminary textbook department, audio-visuals, modernized printing plants and distribution service centers, Cokesbury retail stores, *The Interpreter's Bible Dictionary*, improved church school periodicals, electronic data processing, proposed Hymnal and Book of Worship revisions, and soon a one-volume *Interpreter's Bible Commentary*.

Throughout its long history the Methodist Publishing House sets aside proper funds for the operation of the business and then appropriates the remaining income to the "worn-out preachers, preachers' widows and orphan children." Last year \$700,000 was appropriated toward the support of Conference Claimants. Throughout the years pastors and their families have benefited in the sum of \$21,000,000 contributed as a by-product of the Publishing House at work.

The Publishing House can expect to continue gifts to this Conference Claimants' fund only as the Church and its people use the services of the Publishing House.

To give our support to this arm of the church as it begins its next 175 years of service to the Methodist Church, the North Carolina Conference Committee on Publishing Interests urges:

1. That churches and ministers earnestly stress the use of the Publishing House services as regularly and as often as possible. Prices and quality at our Cokesbury stores are as reasonable and as good as you can find anywhere.

2. That laymen begin to use its services, too. Accounts from laymen may be opened by an individual and used twelve months of the year.

3. That all Methodists of the North Carolina Conference take special note of the great service rendered to Methodism by our publishing agencies. The combined net sales in 1963 more than \$28,700,000. That is \$476,300 above the record for the preceding year.

If the circuit rider of frontier Methodism could return today, he would perhaps be most at home in the publishing division of the Methodist Publishing House. Here he would find the church's publisher still playing its traditional role in calling into being "books, tracts, and periodicals." Where in 1789 one man was employed as chief of staff of the enterprise today the circuit rider would find 2,300 persons engaged in the enterprise of Methodist publishing. The list of its publications would be to him endless, but he would find their message familiar.

Our Methodist Publishing House is part of our witness; part of our commitment to carry to all men the word of God.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SUSTENTATION FUND Ministers Emergency Relief Fund

1. The Sustentation Fund is to be used for emergency relief in the form of grants to effective ministers, and approved supply pastors serving appointment, who become disabled to the extent that they are unable to continue their work, and whose income is not adequate to meet emergency needs.

2. Emergency appropriation shall be used to bring the disabled minister's income up to a maximum of \$4,000 per conference year. If the applicant receives any other income in excess of \$4,000, such excess shall be deducted from the emergency grant. In no event shall emergency funds be used to supplement an applicant's income of \$4,000 or above.

3. Aid shall be granted only for the period of disability within the conference year in which the grant is made. All grants terminate at the end of the conference year. Applications for renewal shall be subject to full mandatory review by the committee.

4. Application for aid shall be made in writing by the district superintendent of the disabled minister involved, and shall be sent to the chairman of the committee. Full and complete details shall be given as to the nature of the disability, present income and the amount of aid needed.

5. A certificate as to disability of applicant from a qualified M.D. or Psychiatrist shall accompany each application for aid.

6. All cases shall be subject to review by the committee every six months.

7. We recommend that the Ministers' Emergency Relief Fund be continued as an appropriation equal to 1 per cent of the pastor's salary in connection with the Ministers' Retirement Fund.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON TOWN AND COUNTRY WORK

PROMOTIONAL SECRETARY'S REPORT

Since the beginning of the 1963-64 conference year our time has been equally divided between the Commission on Town and Country Work and the Board of Lay Activities. This arrangement was made with the consent and satisfaction of both of these church agencies. By reason of necessity and opportunity the large

majority of our total time has been spent with the town and country church. Instead of a conflict of interest as some may have feared there has been a harmonious relationship between the two agencies; each undergirding the other in effort and purpose.

It has been my privilege to converse with him on numerous occasions throughout the year. Speaking personally, and on behalf of the commission, we shall forever be indebted to him for his genuine sense of commitment to the life of the Town and Country Church in the North Carolina Conference. His example will cause us to be more vigilant in our effort and more dedicated in our spirit. May those of us who follow him be as committed to the task.

Radio is an effective means for reaching the masses with the gospel message. The radio avenue to the masses should be used much more than it is by The Methodist Church.

The North Carolina Annual Conference needs a radio voice which could well be named "Evangelistic Voice of Methodism."

The Board of Lay Activities, the Television, Radio, and Film Commission, and the Board of Evangelism are hereby requested to jointly give careful study to this need. (The Board of Lay Activities would take the initiative in calling the first meeting.) These agencies would report to the next regular session of the Annual Conference, giving conception of this proposed ministry to the multitudes and recommending ways and means for its effectuation.

CITATION OF DR. CHARLES HORACE HAMILTON

Methodist Layman, Sociological Scholar, Servant of Humanity

C. Horace Hamilton is a native of Texas and was educated at Southern Methodist University (A.B.) and Texas Agricultural and Mechanical College (M.S. in Rural Sociology). In 1932 he received his Doctor of Philosophy degree in Sociology at the University of North Carolina.

Dr. Hamilton joined the faculty of North Carolina State in 1931 as Assistant Professor of Rural Sociology in the Department of Agricultural Economics. In 1940 he was appointed the first head of the Department of Rural Sociology at North Carolina State. Professor Hamilton served in this capacity in a distinguished manner until 1960 when he retired as the head of the Department of Rural Sociology. He was then appointed to the William Neal Reynolds Distinguished Professorship in Rural Sociology, the position he now holds.

In 1958 Professor Hamilton was given the highest honor that can be conferred upon a member of the faculty of the Consolidated University of North Carolina when he was selected as the recipient of the O. Max Gardner Award. This is an

annual award given "to that member of the faculty of the Consolidated University of North Carolina, who, during the current scholastic year, has made the greatest contribution to the welfare of the human race."

For more than a quarter of a century, Dr. C. Horace Hamilton has been a national leader in the disciplines of sociology and demography. His honors and distinctive contributions to mankind in the state of North Carolina, the Southeast, and the nation are many and great. He has applied his knowledge to the needs of men in the areas of health care, population analysis, education, industry, and religion.

His singular efforts in guiding the various research projects of the North Carolina Annual Conference have made the Conference a leader in the area of sociological research for The Methodist Church. The contributions of Dr. Hamilton have made the Church more aware of the values of sociological research and have given the Church greater insight into the characteristics of the society it serves in the name of Christ.

Dr. Hamilton has long been a member of The Methodist Church and has given to the Church and Christ a lifetime of noble service as a "steward of society" in an age of complex social change.

The North Carolina Annual Conference, Se.J., The Methodist Church, meeting at Burlington, North Carolina, this twenty-fifth day of June, nineteen hundred

and sixty-four, cites Professor Charles Horace Hamilton for his tireless efforts to better society through the study of sociological patterns and changes and the application of his knowledge to the needs of men. His life has truly embodied the words of our Lord, "Whoever would be great among you must be your servant."

RURAL CHURCH GROUNDS BEAUTIFICATION AND RURAL CHURCH IDENTIFICATION

Rural Church Grounds Beautification

In the North Carolina Conference, there are some rural churches which have attractive grounds. These church grounds help to develop reverence for the places of worship. Attractive church grounds help to create interest in the churches.

There are many church grounds that are not attractive. The indifference of many church members to the unattractive appearance of the church grounds is unfortunate. The beauty of many of the fine old churches and some of the new churches is spoiled because the grounds have been neglected or left undeveloped. Some churches have no lawn, but only eroded, bare ground. Overgrown plants are a common sight around churches in the Conference. The appearance of some cemeteries is disgraceful. As attractive church yards are so important, all rural churches should have beautiful church grounds.

With good planning and a little expense, church grounds can be greatly improved in appearance. Once plans are made, they should be followed. Church grounds can be developed gradually if necessary for financial reasons.

The brochure, *Landscaping Church Grounds*, 1954, by John Harris, is an excellent guide for planning and improving rural church grounds. This may be obtained by writing to any county agricultural agent in North Carolina. Other good materials may be obtained by writing to *The Progressive Farmer*, Birmingham 2, Alabama, and requesting materials on the beautification of rural church grounds.

Rural Church Identification

All rural Methodist churches should be identified by good signs. Some have poor signs. Many have no signs.

The Cokesbury catalogue, 1963-64, offers several church signs. The "Steel Church Marker for Lawn or Wall," listed on page 41, is not satisfactory because it is made of inferior materials and deteriorates rapidly. The "Baked Enamel Road Marker," listed on page 38, is unsatisfactory because the lettering is hard to read and the colors fade.

The best solution to the on-the-site rural church identification problem is to have signs made locally. The signs should have good design, good materials, and good workmanship. They should be properly placed and properly lighted.

REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

The Conference Board of Trustees met in its 1963 Annual Conference Session on June 18, 1963, in Greenville, North Carolina. The financial statement submitted by the Conference Treasurer of the funds of the Conference held by the Board of Trustees was carefully reviewed. It was noted that \$14,980.47 had been earned from funds invested with Methodist Foundation, Inc. and that the total assets held for the Conference were valued at \$298,951.11.

The Secretary reported that a study of the records of the Board of Trustees was in progress to determine the source of the funds held by the Board for the Conference. The Board indicated particular interest in determining what if any restrictions and obligations existed for any funds held. The records being studied dated back to 1848. The Board instructed the secretary to continue this study and to report at the earliest opportunity its results.

The question of the Board of Trustees' responsibilities for the new Methodist Building was discussed at the Board meeting. It was noted that the loan papers had been executed by the Trustees and the Secretary was instructed to seek clarification about continuing fiscal responsibility for the Building operation.

The sum of \$3,500 was transferred from current funds of the Board to the Board Pensions as requested by them.

The Board of Trustees voted to place the old Minute Book of the Board in the study of the Duke University Library for safekeeping. This Book contains minutes and financial records from 1848 through 1957.

J. L. Horne, Chairman, J. W. Page, Vice-Chairman, and J. M. Dozier, Secretary, were re-elected as the Board officers.

The attention of the Conference is called to the Report of the Conference Treasurer which contains a statement of the funds held for the Board of Trustees.

REPORT OF BOARD OF COLLEGE VISITORS

Members of the Board of College Visitors of the North Carolina Conference, the Methodist Church, were extremely gratified to view the progress made since their visit to the three Methodist schools: Methodist College, Fayetteville, North Carolina; Wesleyan College, Rocky Mount; and Louisburg College, Louisburg.

On March 9, 10 and 11 the Board met with administrative officials, faculties and students at each of the schools and was shown physical improvements at each. Board members were particularly impressed with the steady progress made toward the goals set up several years ago for these institutions. New building, both complete and under construction, increases each month the effectiveness of the educational program of The Methodist Church in this Conference.

Equally impressive was the high caliber of faculty members at the three schools, indicating an emphasis on scholastic excellence to balance the physical surroundings.

The Board was pleased to learn that over 50% of the faculty members have their doctorates and that others are in the process of securing them.

At Methodist College the Board went through the newly completed dormitories, which are a credit to the institution. President Stacy Weaver carried us through the library which will be completed by the next session.

At Rocky Mount the Board found the North Carolina Wesleyan campus undergoing similar construction. We were shown through the two new dormitories and the new infirmary that has just been completed.

At Louisburg the Board was glad to see the fine new woman's dormitory completed. President Cecil Robbins conducted the group on a tour of the entire campus and informed us that plans are under way for a new library building.

Your Board of College Visitors has been impressed with the fact that each of our colleges are different, and that each is fulfilling a distinctive need in the North Carolina Conference. We were deeply impressed with the good relationship between the students and faculty, which is a major asset of our Methodist colleges.

REPORT OF COMMISSION ON CHRISTIAN VOCATIONS

In a sentence, the over-all goal of this past quadrennium reads: "The program adopted in the local church, will center around three basic considerations: deepening the spiritual disciplines of youth and adults to accept Jesus as Lord; development of pastoral and parental encouragement in helping individuals to understand the meaning of vocation and respond to the needs of service; and conservation of decisions already made for church-related vocations through effective programs and an active organization in each local church and in counseling and guidance."

During this quadrennium, 1960-64, we have sought to carry out these goals:

(1) by encouraging each local church to organize and activate the Committee on Christian Vocations, working with the pastors and chairmen, on how to organize and activate, and following this with report blanks to be filled out and returned to the Quarterly Conference. By recommending the use of current youth materials, filmstrips, etc., and by purchasing some of these filmstrips and placing them in our TRAFICO library. We commend The Methodist Church for sending "The Methodist Story" to each local church chairman and trust that this will be continued.

(2) by seeing that pastors received the booklet, "Church-related Vocations and Service Projects," each year; by encouraging them to observe Ministry Sunday in May; by encouraging each pastor to counsel with his young people about their vocation as well as their college.

(3) By encouraging rallies and programs on Christian Vocations in the sub-district and district, with special emphasis on church-related vocations and particularly the ministry.

(4) By holding tri-district rallies on church-related vocations with over 1,000 youth and 400 adults in attendance, Bishop Roy Short & Jack Wilson, speakers.

(5) By holding a conference-wide church-related vocations conference in Raleigh with 150 youth and adults in attendance, Dr. Mack Stokes, speaker.

(6) By cooperating with the N. C. Conference MYF and other agencies in their emphasis, especially on vocations. We commend the Bishop's Mission on the Ministry and have sought to follow this up with reports from each local church. We wish to express our appreciation for the lay rally offerings for pre-ministerial students, and trust that these offerings may be continued. We commend Duke University for its week-end conference on the ministry and trust that these may be continued.

(7) With four of our Commission in attendance at the regional vocations seminar in Atlanta in 1962.

(8) With speakers at our Annual Conference observance on Christian Vocations, including: Dr. Richard Bauer, Dr. D. D. Holt, Dr. Roger W. Decker, Dr. Arthur Kale, and this year, Dr. Elton Trueblood who will speak Monday, June 22, at 4 p. m. on, "Our Vocation," and at 5:30 p. m. banquet on "Our Other Vocation."

As we look forward to the new quadrennium we would like to suggest the following recommendations for the commission:

(1) Further follow-up on local church reports of the Committee on Christian Vocations; more active and constructive work on the part of the local church committee with training sessions by each district director.

(2) Better use of the regular youth materials and those filmstrips found in our TRAFICO library; we recommend the new "You and Your Lifework" booklet series.

(3) Subdistrict, district and conference rallies and seminars on Christian Vocations in general, church-related vocations in particular, and the ministry, especially.

(4) Training sessions for our District Directors of Christian Vocations, beginning with the seminar at Lake Junaluska, August 3-8, "Recruitment and Counseling for Christian Vocations." The Commission will help with the expenses of each director.

(5) Other church-related vocations conference for youth and students.

(6) Other Bishop's Convocations on the Ministry.

(7) Continued cooperation with The Methodist Church on its emphases, with other agencies such as the lay rally offering for pre-ministerial students, the observance of Ministry Sunday in May and career days in the local public schools with an emphasis on church-related vocations.

Our sincere appreciation is expressed to Bishop Garber, Rev. Grady Dawson, our representative, and the entire cabinet as well as the pastors and laymen who are truly living their vocation and encouraging others to do the same.

REPORT OF THE WOMAN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE AND THE WESLEYAN SERVICE GUILD

In the closing days of this quadrennium a review of the work of the Woman's Society and the Guild shows an advance in some areas. An opportunity has been given to all of us to examine and evaluate our faith and to discover whether or not we are fulfilling God's mission for us in these days of rapid change. Are we really witnessing our belief that JESUS CHRIST IS LORD?

Our chief emphasis has been that of trying to interest and involve all Methodist women in the missionary efforts of the church through membership in the Woman's Society of Christian Service and the Wesleyan Service Guild with the idea of deepening their spiritual lives and presenting them with the opportunity of contributing their service, their prayers, and their gifts to the building of Christ's Kingdom.

The observance of the 25th Anniversary of the Woman's Society of Christian Service was launched at the Annual Meeting in March. The Woman's Division has set three goals for each conference: (1) a 25% increase in membership; (2) a 25% increase in pledge-giving; and (3) the recruitment of at least four women—one deaconess, one US-12, one overseas regular missionary, and one overseas short-term mission-

In order to accomplish our Silver Anniversary membership goal each district president of the Woman's Society together with the district secretary of Promotion, the district secretary of the Wesleyan Service Guild and the district superintendent has enlisted the assistance of the local societies and guilds in making a further survey of the potentials of our conference. Visiting teams have been formed to cultivate and help organize societies and guilds wherever the need is indicated and interest manifested. We hope this endeavor will continue until every Methodist woman is a member of either the Woman's Society or the Guild.

It is difficult to make any report concerning finances at this time, for the district treasurers are just sending in their final reports for the fiscal year which closes April 30th. All indications point to increase in giving over last year. Pledge for 1964-65 has been increased—in fact, it has been increased since the pledge service at Annual Meeting, for some districts have voluntarily raised their pledge. A report can be made for the Scholarship Committee. Woman's Society of Christian Service scholarships of \$500 each have been awarded to a senior at North Carolina Wesleyan College, a senior and a freshman at Methodist College; a \$200 scholarship to a senior at Pfeiffer College. Each year a \$250 scholarship is given to Bennett College and a \$200 one to Paine College. There is a \$1,000 scholarship for Scarritt College for which no application has been made.

As for membership figures the last report show that there are 758 Societies, 84 Guilds, and 29 district members—approximately 35,000 members. The number of unorganized churches has increased, for no longer are churches counted organized if they have a district member. Interest seems to be growing in the Spiritual Life Retreat in June and the School of Missions, for last summer the largest number of women yet recorded attended each.

Recruitment of missionary personnel remains our most important problem. New areas of work are opening up and asking for workers. It is easier to secure the required funds for the salaries than it is to find the qualified personnel. During the past year one worker retired and a special term missionary has returned to the United States. A new worker has come to the Pembroke Area and a former one has returned for part-time work. A special term missionary has gone to Africa and a regular missionary is working in Laredo, Texas, until her visa comes through. A young woman from this conference has also been commissioned a deaconess. The Woman's Society is still involved in the work at the Student Center in Greenville, and has a special term worker in Japan and a native worker in Korea and in Africa.

Many changes have come in the organization of the Woman's Society and in its work and others will come, for women are SUMMONED to a NEW AGE. Whatever the challenge, whatever adjustments must be made the women of the societies and

guilds will seek to strengthen the local churches, to witness in local communities, to see the world about them through eyes of concern and love, alert to discover new fields of service, to seek to know the Master's will for their lives and this organization.

REPORT OF COMMISSION ON WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE

Nineteen Sixty-four is truly a year of decision in North Carolina Methodism. It is a time when we should look forward with determination and a full measure of faith to four more exciting years; and, yet, without resting on our laurels, look back to these four eventful years of the past quadrennium, reflecting as they do dynamic growth of the 'Garber era.'

In retrospect we view the opening of our two new colleges, and the vitality and growth associated with Louisburg. We point with equal pride to our accomplishments in the field of Church Extension! A fifty percent increase in our giving to World Service in the quadrennium is now a reality! All this is fitting tribute to our Methodist heritage—but our ideals and past actions are not matched by our individual financial commitment to the present benevolence program of our Methodist Conference. "Our Treasure is burdening our hearts."

Yes, there are many needs! There were in Jesus' time. There will be tomorrow. With our new four-year program abuilding, this Commission calls attention to World Service. Increases passed down by the Council on World Service and Finance amount to \$84,281. Four years ago, our Conference voted to take a similar increase, but spread it over three years. There were many who lamented not accepting it all in a single step. Today, in better times, this Commission is recommending this entire increase be accepted.

The needs of our colleges—our youth—are self-evident. We are recommending another \$40,000 increase in College Sustaining funds. During this quadrennium our goal, set in 1956, of \$500,000 per year will be attained; but, by this time our student load will be such as to see wise counsel recommend raising the limits of these monies to undergird this "emphasis on education."

Your Commission has listened to, and observed continually, a need to be met in our care for the aged—that of a chronic illness section adjacent to our Retirement Home. Our desires should be to see such a building become a reality, and one-half million dollars could start such a program.

And so it goes. Children, youth, young adults, adults, oldsters, and senior citizens here and abroad, throughout the world—all need and deserve the best we have. Many of these needs, and their corresponding challenges, are vividly portrayed and set forth for all Methodists, in the splendid filmstrip and brochure, "When We Know We Care; When We Care, We Share!" Each was compiled this spring for use throughout our conference at Every Member Visitation time. However, as Conference week approaches, this Commission recognizes the great new emphasis and vital growth that will surely become reality for our Methodists of the North Carolina Conference with the beginning of a new quadrennium. This growth with its commensurate financial stewardship responsibility for each one of us, means that our willingness to support Methodist World Service with nearly \$100,000.00 of increased funds, starting now our colleges with \$500,000.00 a year sustaining funds; an enriching conference benevolent program—all during this quadrennium—calls for a new awareness and education in Christian stewardship.

We, as a Commission, after studied review of our total projected program, are recommending that the Bishop and his cabinet call a special one-day session of our Annual Conference in the early fall of 1964, if our first quarterly receipts closely parallel those of present quadrennium. This session would interpret to the people our entire financial program, educate each member as to the need and current program of each Committee, Commission, and recipient agency, and attempt to evaluate our

ethodist stewardship program, thereby creating an atmosphere of tithing, together with an enhanced appreciation of God's great goodness.

"Inasmuch as you have done it unto the least of these ye have done it unto me!"

TITHE! Give until your heart is strangely warmed.

Allocations to the charges shall be made by the district superintendent, for both Column A and Column B. Fund No. 7 Benevolences shall be distributed thus: Each use shall be paid proportionately out of the income from acceptances up to the amount fixed in the budget. Any surplus shall be held by the conference treasurer to be expended by the Annual Conference upon recommendation of the Commission. If the event collections under Item No. 7 Benevolences shall fall short to an extent which cannot be bridged by the Contingency Fund, the Commission recommends that the actual amount of receipts shall be paid to each agency participating in Fund No. 7 in the percentage ratio that such receipts bear to the amount budgeted.

AMENDING AND SUPPLEMENTING PROVISIONS RELATING TO THE BUDGET

1. (a) The salary of each of the district superintendents shall be set at \$9,600.00 including travel and utilities (water \$60, heating \$300, electricity \$180, residential telephone \$60, up to a total of \$600).

(b) We approve the use of an amount up to \$3,000 to be provided by each district for the district superintendent for secretarial help and promotion of the district program.

(c) To provide for Cabinet Meeting expenses.

(d) We recommend the allocation of the sum of \$10,000.00 per district for each of two new districts payable to the District Trustees to be used by them as an equity in the purchase of new district parsonages. Said total sum of \$20,000.00 to be paid from the conference fund for District Superintendents' salaries.

2. The Commission recommends that each person who has authority to draw checks against an account of a conference agency be required to present annually to the full membership of his agency a complete list of all checks drawn, justifying all checks with the budget approved by his agency.

3. The Commission recommends that each agency whose accounts are not audited in the Treasurer's office be required to have an annual audit made and furnish this commission with a copy of it.

4. (a) Under the Church Extension Fund the first \$50,000.00 is earmarked to be paid to Board of Missions, Inc., for the revolving fund to be used for loans to build churches and/or acquire choice sites for churches for new congregations or to repay money borrowed by Board of Mission, Inc.

5. The Commission recommends that no conference agency's budget incorporate within it funds to be appropriated to a non-conference agency, without specific approval of the North Carolina Annual Conference.

III

The Commission recommends approval of the following Specials to be arranged by Special Offerings or included in the local church budget. If budgeted, the amount should be liberal. Remit to conference treasurer.

Advance Special (General) World Missions and National Missions
Advance Special Conference

Christmas Offering 1964, for District Superintendents' program and/or projects.
Special projects should be clearly defined in plenty of time to have successful promotion.

Christian Education Day for Leadership Training
The Television Ministry of The Methodist Church
Fellowship of Suffering and Service (World-Wide Communion)
Race Relations Sunday (Paine College)
One Great Hour of Sharing (Fund No. 15)
Methodist Retirement Homes Special (Mother's Day)
Methodist Student Day

Thanksgiving Offering (Special for Methodist Home for Children as an addition or supplement to the operating budget)

Ministerial Education through the 1% Plan (Fund No. 8)

IV

We recommend approval of the requests of the following agencies for the privilege of soliciting funds throughout the conference.

1. Wesley Foundation Commission for special gifts for the benefit of special works in the state supported institutions.

2. The Board of Missions for the promotion of the Church Extension Ten Dollar Club.

3. That the Board of Education be authorized to solicit from churches, groups, and individuals, materials and money for specific projects for the camps of the North Carolina Conference.

4. Methodist Retirement Homes, Incorporated for the privilege of promoting Mother's Day offering for the Home and the receipts of a special Mother's Day offering in the churches for the benevolent work of the Home.

5. The Methodist Home for Children for the privilege of private solicitation and receipt of such donations as may be directed thereto.

6. The Methodist Foundation, Inc. as provided in its charter.

7. The Town and Country Commission, Rural Church Fund, for the privilege of private solicitation and receipt of such donations as may be directed thereto.

V

We recommend to charge or church treasurers that they set up a schedule for remitting at a fixed time each month and to close the year as early as possible. Final remittance should be mailed on Monday two weeks preceding the opening of Conference. We recommend that local churches remit in 10 installments commencing on the 1st Sunday in August and terminating the 1st Sunday in May. They can be exactly or approximately equal. It simplifies the work of the local Treasurer for these periodical remittances to include one or several items in whole or in part rather than to remit one-tenth of each and every item.

The pastors bear responsibility to check with their local treasurers for full remittance of all budgeted items and all funds collected as specials and to harmonize their reports to Annual Conference with Conference Treasurer's acknowledgments both received and pending.

We report the issuance of a Fidelity Bond in Employers Mutual Casualty Company of Des Moines, Iowa, to cover the conference treasurer in the amount of \$100,000.00 and to cover the assistant to the treasurer in the amount of \$25,000.00; others to a minimum of \$10,000.00 in said office. Also to cover others handling funds: Superintendent of Methodist Retirement Homes, Inc., \$50,000.00, Business Manager of

Methodist Retirement Homes, Inc., \$25,000.00 and others to the amount of \$10,000.00 at various offices.

We recommend the continuation of A. M. Pullen & Company as auditors.

The Commission nominates Marvin J. Cowell for the office of conference treasurer.

REPORT OF CONFERENCE COMMISSION ON WORSHIP

Four years ago, with the rallying cry "Jesus Christ is Lord," the Bishops of our Church called for "the recovery and reaffirmation of our theological inheritance" and for "a deeper understanding of worship as the heart of the Christian life." Simultaneously, they requested study and use of a revised Book of Worship, and they authorized revision of the Methodist Hymnal.

Now they urgently call every pastor and congregation to "One Witness in One World," and to evaluation and to renewal of our common life that we may witness and work in our neighborhood and the world.

Is it only coincidence that they also present to us a revised Book of Worship, a virile new Psalter and a new Hymnal? Or must all renewal of pastors and people center in grateful worship of Almighty God? Your Commission but follows New Testament and Wesleyan experience when we assert that all authentic renewals of churches and of persons must center in our communion with God in worship, personal and corporate. For in every generation it is primarily through this liturgical work of the congregation "offered to God that the Holy Spirit is pleased to forgive, renew, illumine and empower his faithful people for life and witness."

We therefore invite every pastor and congregation to earnest study and employment of these fuller means of grace, and we believe that the same Spirit who so generously honored the Reformers and the Wesleys will honor us.

(1) Let every pastor establish in every local congregation a Commission on Worship, that we may officially place our relationship with God at the heart of our Christian life, recognized as central and crucial. Let this commission lead in the evaluation of our corporate life of prayer and praise and of witness. Your Conference Commission offers assistance with literature and personal counsel.

(2) Let every pastor lead his Commission on Worship and his people in diligent study and frequent participation in the revised Service of Holy Communion, recover-

ing the Supper of the Lord as a joyful and evangelistic sacrament, not only confirming the faithful but offering Christ to the uncommitted. The revised Service has been received by congregations with surprising appreciation: the Wesleyan revival was a sacramental revival; God renews and edifies his obedient people gathered about His table. We offer to every pastor copies of the Revised Service, we invite you to the Annual Conference Communion Services, and in February, 1965 will sponsor a series of ministers' district study-seminars.

(3) Let every pastor study, preach and teach the essentials of the personal and corporate devout life, emphasizing personal and family prayer and Bible-study, and reverent, regular and intelligent attendance at divine worship as communion with God and as our "bounden duty and service," without which there can be no authentic Christian life and witness. Let us conduct prayer and study groups, especially during the Lenten season and following the annual revival.

(4) Let every pastor study and adapt his morning service of divine worship in the pattern appearing in **The Book of Worship**, that every congregation may engage each week in adequate and Christian corporate communion with God. Let us especially study and recover the Biblical experience of Adoration, Confession, and Forgiveness, through which the Holy Spirit will renew us daily and weekly and without which we fall into works-righteousness. Here your Commission recognizes with gratitude the concern of laymen and ministers for evangelism, and points to the need in every Sunday Service for this full Gospel note of repentance and renewal. In thus recapitulating our Christian experience we may recover in both worship and evangelism the note of reality needed in all our witness and work. This reshaping of the Service needs discussion and counsel; your Commission offers aid.

(5) Let every pastor study and employ the Order for the Sacrament of Baptism, faithfully following the rubrics calling for thorough instruction before its use, and for administration in the service of worship no earlier than after the Offering. And let us restore the congregational responses. For every such occasional service should lead to the renewal of the whole congregation in the Christian life as all join in praise and prayer celebrating the powerful love of our Almighty Father.

(6) Let every pastor likewise study, instruct his people and faithfully use the Order of Confirmation and Reception into the Church, endeavoring to lead all such services more thoughtfully, more unhurriedly, more reverently and more corporately. Let us include in our membership training classes strong emphasis on the devout life and the meaning and means of worship. And let us receive transfer members more graciously and more adequately, renewing their vows and ours in the Church of Jesus Christ. As we thus celebrate the gracious love of God, we shall till the seedbeds of evangelism.

(7) Let every pastor seek to recover the simple, Christ-centered themes of the Christian year as a guide to corporate prayer, praise and preaching. Let each begin by restoring the Gospel Reading to central position in every service of worship. Let us study the passage and read it thoughtfully deliberately and reverently as an act of thankful remembrance of the life and ministry of our Lord, and as a witness of the glad news of fellowship and renewal in Him. To aid us in this evangelical reformation, the Conference Calendar will list the biblical sources for each Sunday of the year from the revised lectionary of **The Book of Worship**, and your Commission will supply literature upon request.

(8) Let every pastor and Commission on Worship begin to plan now for the purchase and use of the revised Hymnal as soon as available, that all our congregations may be strengthened in personal, family and corporate life by the hymns of the faith, by a new and virile Psalter and by the revised Occasional Services. In the meantime, let us employ more diligently the Aids to Worship in our present Hymnal.

(9) Finally, our pastors and people can be renewed only as we find in our numerous and competing conference agencies our real centers of unity and power and as we faithfully cooperate in each local church and in our conference. That our power and unity are in our common relationship with Christ is taken for granted. Let us no

nger take this gracious relationship for granted; let us cooperate prayerfully in all concerted efforts in renewal of our Church; let it begin for each pastor with personal dedication to the ministry of praise and prayer and communion with God.

Your Commission will continue to offer aid to ministers and people; teach classes; provide ministers' study meetings; cooperate with the Board of Education and with church musicians, and with all agencies which seek to renew our life of faith, worship and witness. United, let us accept the task of evaluation, of renewal and of witness set before us by the Lord of the Church; the renewal of which Church was John Wesley's singular ministry; to which ministry we are called.

RESOLUTION CONCERNING A STUDY OF THE WORK OF CONFERENCE AGENCIES

Be it resolved that Bishop Garber appoint a committee of ten to study the work of our Conference Boards, Commissions, and other Agencies employing salaried personnel to ascertain the number of employed personnel which would promote the causes of our Conference with greatest efficiency and economy.

The committee of ten shall be composed of an equal number of pastors and laymen or laywomen and shall come both from rural and city churches.

The committee shall report to the 1965 session of the North Carolina Annual Conference and necessary expenses shall be provided by the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance.

SCOPE OF EXAMINATION

The scope of our examination is contained in our opening letter. Certain features of the examination are set forth below.

Cash on deposit was confirmed directly with the banks. Cash receipts were traced to their subsequent deposit in the bank on a test basis, and disbursements were verified by test examination of cancelled checks and paid invoices or authorizations. Income from charges, as shown by the Treasurer's records, was confirmed directly with pastors, and minor differences reported to us as of the date of this report were adjusted or satisfactorily explained.

Distribution of income from charges was audited by reference to the report of the Commission on World Service and Finance for the 1963 and 1964 session of the Annual Conference and by reference to proper authorizations from the various boards of the Conference.

Investments of the Treasurer and the various boards and funds were either inspected or, if held by an outside agent, confirmed by direct confirmation during the course of our examination.

Cash receipts in transit represent 1963-64 collections received by the Treasurer subsequent to the balance sheet date and were set up from deposits in the bank accounts. Accounts and apportionments payable were set up from disbursements subsequent to the balance sheet date and by reference to proper authorization for the distribution of 1963-64 collections.
