

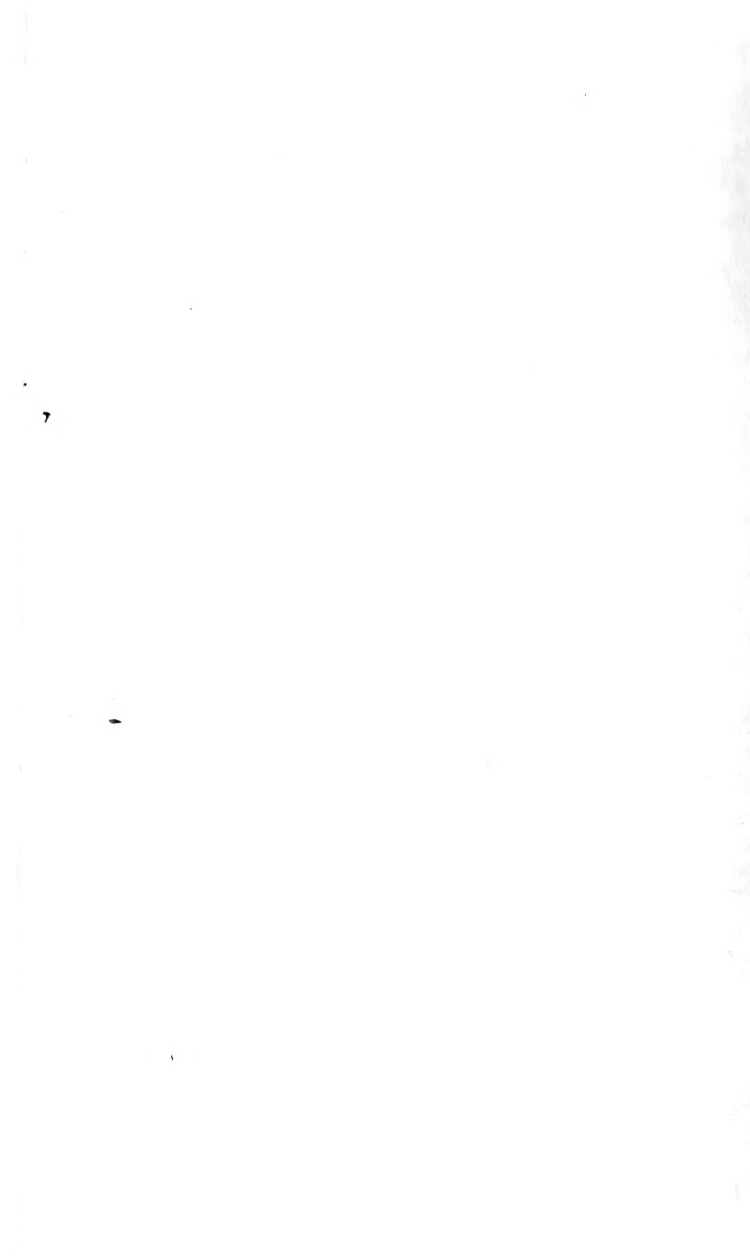

CURRITUCK COURTHOUSE—SEPTEMBER 28, 1972

Joseph Pilmore was born in Tadmouth, Yorkshire, England, on October 31, 1739. He was converted under John Wesley, who assisted with his education at Kingswood School. He was one of Wesley's itinerants in England about four years.

Joseph Pilmore and Richard Boardman were selected as the first pair of English clergymen to be appointed by John Wesley to go to America. Both arrived in 1769 and remained for five years. Pilmore became pastor of historic Old Saint George's Church in Philadelphia. He soon drew large congregations there. In 1772 Pilmore made a southern journey through the colonies preaching and establishing societies as he went. Lovely Lane Church in Baltimore and Monumental Church in Portsmouth, Virginia, are only two of the continuing groups he organized.

In September Pilmore entered North Carolina reporting that the day was hot and the journey was through the woods. After stopping for the night at an unnamed place, he began again in the morning, "and a little before noon arrived at Currituck Courthouse."

"The people gathered sooner than I expected, I began without delay, and declared to Churchmen, Baptists, and Presbyterians, 'He shall baptize you with the Holy Ghost and with fire,' and God made his word like a hammer that breaketh the rock to pieces."

While in North Carolina for about three days, he was entertained by Colonel Hallowell Williams, member of the Congress held at Halifax in 1776 and an active and devoted Methodist. After preaching at a chapel five miles from Williams' the next day, he held another service at Narrow's Chapel which was about twenty-five miles south of Currituck. Then he returned to Tidewater Virginia before continuing south to Charleston and Savannah.

In recognition of this first Methodist sermon preached by an Anglican clergyman under assignment by John Wesley, a statewide celebration was held on September 28, 1972 at Currituck Courthouse marking the two hundredth anniversary. Dr. Frederick Maser, editor of Pilmore's *Journal*, and Bishop Herbert Bell Shaw of the A.M.E. Zion Church were principal speakers in addition to several local histories which were given to comprise the program for the occasion.

Joseph Pilmore's picture is on the cover of the 1972 North Carolina Conference Journal with the date of this historic event. The Reverend C. Franklin Grill, chairman of the Conference Commission on Archives and History presided after serving nearly a year as program chairman of a group of representatives of all Methodist bodies in the state to plan for the event.

A RESOLUTION

John Wesley looked upon the world as his parish.

W. Carleton Wilson has served this entire North Carolina Conference as the larger part of his parish. It was as if God had called him to this special ministry from which he will retire at this 147th annual session in Durham.

Carleton Wilson was born in Hillsborough, June 7, 1900. Fifty years ago, in 1922, he was Licensed to Preach. He was admitted into the Conference in 1922 during the session at Trinity Church in Durham.

That same year he joined the Statistical Staff of the Conference; within the Conference his thoroughness was soon recognized, and in 1937 he was chosen as Conference Statistician.

In 1953 at the Annual Conference session at Duke Memorial Church, Brother Wilson was elected Conference Secretary, a post he has held continuously for 19 and 1/2 years.

In 1956 he was elected as the first Clerical Delegate to the General Conference and began serving on the General and Jurisdictional Conference Secretarial Staffs. In 1968 he was chosen as Secretary of the Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference. He has served the Church through seven General Conferences (56, 60, 64, 68, 72, and special sessions in 66 and 70).

As the parents of four children, Brother Carleton and Sister Essie have brought a significant witness to every parish they have served. After the loss of an infant daughter, they bravely bore the wounds of grief when their son, Bill, a bombardier, was shot down during the II World War over Yugoslavia. Two children . . . Mary Earle Berger, of Roxboro, and L. T. (Ted) Wilson, a member of the N. C. Conference . . . are faithful servants of the church.

As Conference Secretary and Journal Editor, Carleton Wilson has brought to the office a concern to see everyone treated fairly. His thorough, exacting manner has enabled him to work with details emphasizing the need for accuracy. While collecting and preserving records, he has remained an earnest seeker, a sincere man of God. His patience has been put to the test again and again.

As the "Scribe" of our Conference, he has been, as the early scribe must have been, able to "cipher" . . . and from this came the meaning of "secretary." The early Scribes were also the wise men, "the men of understanding," the just men. In post-exilic times they were men of sacred letters . . . in addition they were copyists, editors and guardians of the textual purity of Scripture.

The classic description of the Scribe (or Secretary) is from one of the books of the Apocrypha and befits in many ways this man we honor today:

"He will be filled with the spirit of understanding,
he will pour forth words of wisdom
and give thanks unto the Lord in prayer
He will direct his counsel and knowledge aright and meditate on his secrets.
Many will praise his understanding and it will never be blotted out.
His memory will not disappear, and his name will live thru all generations.
If he lives long, he will leave a name greater than a thousand
and if he goes to rest, it is enough for him."

On this historic occasion before the election of a new conference secretary to follow W. Carleton Wilson, a line from one of the prayers of Augustine befits the man: "The best gift we can give to men and to Thee is the gift of a good life." So praise to the Father, Son and Holy Spirit for this good life!

THE NORTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE OF THE UNITED METHODIST CHURCH (Southeastern Jurisdiction)

I Composition: The North Carolina Conference of The United Methodist Church is composed of:

- (1) The eastern portion of the former North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Protestant Church.
- (2) The former North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Episcopal Church, South.
- (3) The coastal region of the former Blue Ridge-Atlantic Conference of The Methodist Episcopal Church.
- (4) The Eastern District, North Carolina-Virginia Conference, Central Jurisdiction.

II Organization: The organizing dates of the four former Conferences were as follows:

- (1) The North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Protestant Church, 1828, at Whitaker's Chapel in Halifax County, North Carolina
- (2) The North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Episcopal Church, South, 1837, at Petersburg, Virginia
- (3) The Blue Ridge-Atlantic Conference of The Methodist Episcopal Church, 1879, at Greensboro, North Carolina, first named Southern Central Conference; two years later, 1881, renamed Blue Ridge-Atlantic Conference.
- (4) The Eastern District, North Carolina-Virginia Annual Conference was organized at a special session on August 11, 1964, at Bennett College, Greensboro, North Carolina.

RULES OF ORDER AND PROCEDURE FOR THE NORTH CAROLINA ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF THE UNITED METHODIST CHURCH

I. RULES OF ORDER

1. Robert's Rules of Order shall apply to any situation not covered by these Rules.
2. No member who has the floor may be interrupted except for a breach of order, misrepresentation, to direct the attention of the Conference to the fact that time has arrived for a special order, or to raise a very urgent question of high privilege.
3. No member shall speak a second time on the same question if any member who has not yet spoken desires the floor, or more than twice on the same question under the same motion, nor longer than ten minutes unless his time shall be extended by the Conference, except as provided in Rule 4.
4. When the report of the committee is under consideration and when all have spoken who desire to do so, or when (and later) the previous question has been ordered, the chairman and/or duly authorized member or members presenting the committee's report (and the minority report if there be one) shall be entitled to speak before the vote is taken.
5. A member claiming the floor at any time for what he believes is a very urgent question of high privilege, shall be allowed to indicate briefly the nature of the question, and if it be adjudged by the chair to be such, he may proceed at his pleasure or until the chairman judges he has exhausted his privilege.

II. VOTING PROCEDURES

1. Voting shall be by a show of hands unless otherwise ordered by the Conference. "yea" and "nay" vote, if taken, shall be by written ballot, which result will be published in the Conference Journal. A count vote may be ordered on call of any member supported by one-fifth of the members present and voting, in which case the delegates shall rise from their seats and stand while they are counted.
2. Election of delegates to General and Jurisdictional Conferences: Only clerical members in full connection and elected and registered lay delegates may vote. (Alternative lay delegates may not vote except in the absence of the delegate and then only if they are duly registered in lieu of the delegate.) All votes must be cast in the bar of the conference as determined by the conference; votes must be cast upon the official ballots authorized by the conference; ballots shall be placed by individual delegates in ballot boxes; whereupon the bishop shall declare the balloting closed.

The official ballots furnished to the delegates shall be numbered consecutively and the vote shall be valid unless cast upon the ballot bearing the number designated by the presiding officer for such particular balloting. In the event a ballot is defaced, it may be exchanged at the secretary's desk for another ballot bearing the same number. Ballots furnished to lay delegates shall be different in color from those furnished clerical delegates.

III. ORGANIZATION

1. The Secretary: The secretary of the Annual Conference shall be elected quadrennially, at the first session of the Conference after the meeting of the General Conference; and on nominations arising from the floor.
2. Assistant Secretaries: The secretary shall nominate his assistants and the Conference shall elect.
3. Statisticians: There shall be a conference statistician and an assistant statistician. The statistician shall be elected quadrennially at the first session after the meeting of the General Conference. The assistant statistician shall be elected annually upon nomination by the statistician.
4. Conference Stenographers: The conference secretary shall employ the conference stenographers.

5. Compensation: The Commission on World Service and Finance shall determine, subject to the approval of the Conference, the compensation given officers for their services and also the method and amount for meeting expenses of said officers. The conference treasurer shall pay these amounts.
3. Boards, Commissions, and Committees: The Bishop and his Cabinet shall determine the size of and nominate the members of all Boards, Commissions, and Committees authorized by the General Conference, the Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference, and this Annual Conference, except those cases in which the *Discipline* directs otherwise. Near the end of each quadrennium, the Chairman or President of all Boards, Commissions, and Committees shall submit a list of qualified suggested nominees to the Bishop and his Cabinet for their consideration in the formation of new Boards, Commissions, and Committees. The nominees shall be consulted about their nominations. The recommendations and nominations shall be subject to the approval of the Conference. At the beginning of each quadrennium all Boards, Commissions, and Committees shall elect their officers only after all their members have been properly notified of the organizational meeting.
7. The Conference Board of Trustees: The Conference Board of Trustees shall be required to meet at least once a year other than the regular meeting at the session of the Annual Conference.
3. The Conference Treasurer and all others receiving and disbursing funds from our Conference shall be required to make audited statements annually, and to print the same in the Journal.
9. Program Committee: There shall be a Program Committee of the Conference consisting of the resident Bishop, the Conference Secretary, the District Superintendent of the District in which the session of the Conference is held, the pastor of the host church, and the Conference Lay Leader. This committee shall determine the compensation and expense for invited speakers and this shall be paid from the Conference expense fund.
9. Entertainment Committee: There shall be a Conference Entertainment Committee, composed of three ministers and two laymen. This committee shall be elected at the first session of the Conference following the General Conference, and shall serve for the Quadrennium. This committee shall receive invitations and determine the place and method of entertaining the Conference sessions. The committee is requested to determine the place of holding the next Conference not later than January 1, if possible.
9. Committee on Memoirs: The Conference Secretary and the District Superintendents shall constitute the Committee on Memoirs. The members of the committee shall be charged with the responsibility of providing for all the details of the memorial service. The Conference Secretary shall be the chairman of this committee.
2. Committee on Daily Minutes: A committee of three members shall be elected each year to examine the daily minutes of the sessions of the Conference and report daily to the Conference.
9. Courtesies and Introductions: There shall be constituted a Committee on Courtesies and Introductions annually, at the first session of the Conference.
9. Committee on Appeals: There shall be appointed, quadrennially, a Committee on Appeals, composed of at least five members, whose duties shall be to hear appeals from the decisions of the several District Boards of Church Location and Building, or any other questions that may properly come before them.
- American Bible Society: All matters regarding the relation of the Conference to the American Bible Society and its work shall be referred to the Board of Education.

IV. REPORTS, RESOLUTIONS, MOTIONS, AMENDMENTS

All reports to be presented to the conference shall be sent to the conference secretary, typewritten and in triplicate, on or before the date approved for such by the Program Council and published in the conference calendar.

All resolutions to be presented to the annual conference affecting the structure, policy and function of any board or agency of the annual conference, shall be submitted in writing to the conference secretary with copies for all the delegates twenty-four hours prior to consideration by the annual conference, and not later than the second night session of the conference

3. All motions presented to the annual conference, and amendments to any paper shall be in writing (in triplicate) and placed in the hands of the conference secretary at the time of presentation, or immediately following.

V. LAY DELEGATES TO THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE

1. Lay delegates, regular and reserve, from the pastoral charges to the Annual Conference shall be elected by the Charge Conference at least forty-five days prior to the session of the Annual Conference.
2. Each district superintendent shall complete the list of lay delegates to the Annual Conference, from his district, at least forty-five days before the Annual Conference session, and shall immediately transmit the completed list, in triplicate, to the conference secretary.
3. When necessary, substitutions shall be by election of the Charge Conference called upon authorization by the district superintendent. No person will be seated unless duly elected by the Charge Conference as the regular or alternate delegate. Notice change in delegates must be sent to the Conference Secretary at once.

VI. PASTORS' REPORTS TO THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE: STATISTICS

1. Each pastor shall complete Table I of his annual report to the Conference, and transmit the same to the conference statistician at least two weeks prior to the opening date of the Conference.
2. Charge and church treasurers shall make final remittance for the current year to the conference treasurer on or before the date scheduled by the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance, and each pastor shall complete and submit Table II to the conference statistician on or before the opening date of the annual conference.
3. Each table of the report shall be filled out by individual churches with totals for the charge.
4. Table II shall be made out in even dollars only.
5. Tables I and II shall be printed in the Conference Journal with individual church reports and charge totals as compiled by the conference statistician from the pastor reports.

VII. THE CONFERENCE JOURNAL

1. Editor: The conference secretary shall be charged with the responsibility of editing and making contracts for the publication of the Conference Journal, in keeping with the regulations of the General Conference and of the Southeastern Jurisdiction Conference. The editor shall have full authority to condense reports, memoirs, and other papers when necessary.
2. One complimentary copy of the Conference Journal shall be sent to each of the following: The conference claimants, lay members of the conference boards, the educational and church-related institutions of the North Carolina Conference. The conference secretary shall have discretionary authority to send copies to such other institutions and agencies of the General Church as he may deem advisable. Six copies including copy for lay delegate to annual conference shall be sent to each pastor without charge. All other copies shall be sold at \$2.25 each, or single copies by mail at \$2.50 each. Monies accruing from the sale of Journal shall be deposited with the conference treasurer and credited to the Journal account.

VIII. DISTRICTS

1. The number of districts shall be twelve.
2. A district conference shall be held annually, in each district, if authorized by the annual conference.
3. The District President, the Sub-District Presidents, and the local church President of the United Methodist Youth Fellowship shall be delegates to the District Conference. These shall be in addition to those named by the *Discipline* as ex-officio members.
4. The district and associate district lay leaders shall be elected annually by the Annual Conference on nomination of the district superintendents and the conference lay leaders.

6. The District Superintendent of each District shall be required to furnish the Conference Treasurer as early as possible following the completion of the Charge Conferences an official copy of the acceptances of the Single Figure Asking and a schedule of the salaries of pastors as set by the Charge Conferences. The figures furnished by the District Superintendent to the Conference Treasurer shall be used by the Statistician to compile his report to the Annual Conference.

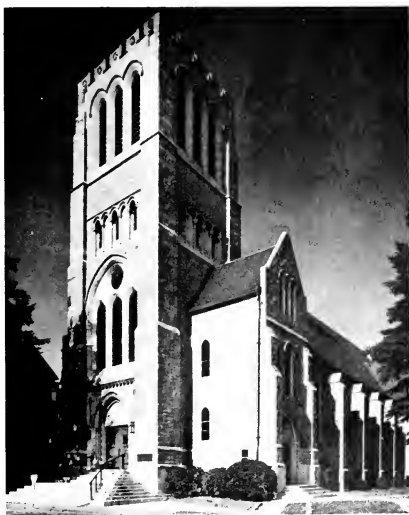
IX. AMENDMENTS

1. These rules of order and procedure may be amended by a two-thirds vote on the next day after a proposed amendment has been presented in writing; provided the rule fixing the number of districts may be amended by a majority vote; provided, further, a change in the number of districts may not be made later than the second morning of the Annual Conference.

X. WHEN THE RULES BECOME EFFECTIVE

1. These rules of order and procedure of the North Carolina Annual Conference shall become effective immediately upon passage by the vote of the majority of the Conference.

Last year, he deeply moved us as he reflected upon the call of the Conference to name a black district superintendent, and in these reflections his words called us to new levels of Christian progress. Many other signs of the quality of his leadership have been given; some well known, others disclosed the privacy of confidential deliberation.

The North Carolina Conference expresses its deep gratitude for all the contributions of Bishop Cannon during this quadrennium just ending. But now, we would honor him for the high quality of hope that he has brought to our task, and for his vision of what we can yet become. We are grateful for the quadrennium that we have been privileged to have him as our Episcopal Leader.

Unanimously adopted by the North Carolina Annual Conference with gratitude, respect, and a standing ovation. We honor him for honoring us with his wise and stalwart leadership.

MINUTES OF THE SPECIAL SESSION OF THE
NORTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE
EDENTON STREET UNITED METHODIST CHURCH
 Raleigh, North Carolina
 October 23, 1971

Opening: The North Carolina Conference of The United Methodist Church, Southeastern Jurisdiction, convened in Special Session at Edenton Street United Methodist Church in Raleigh, North Carolina, October 23, 1971, at 10:00 AM. Bishop William R. Cannon, resident bishop, presided.

Devotional: Hymn No. 27, "Immortal, Invisible, God Only Wise", was sung by the Conference. The Invocation and devotional were given by the Reverend Jack W. Page.

Motions: W. C. Wilson, Conference Secretary, made motions concerning the Bar of the Conference, which were adopted. He moved that the Rules of Order as printed in the 1970 Conference *Journal* be in effect for the Special Session. The conference so ordered.

The Secretary moved that the agenda to be considered would consist of the document mailed to all delegates in October in lieu of the recommendation adopted at Annual Conference.

Point of Order: James H. Coile raised the question that the agenda should conform to the stated call as adopted in June, since the later study was different.

Bishop Cannon ruled that the recommendation presented in June did not actually present the resolution of the Conference Board of Pensions concerning the proposed Pension Plan. The agenda was adopted by the vote of the conference.

Registration: Delegates were asked to sign cards which would constitute the official attendance record.

Tellers: Those tellers who served during the regular session of Annual Conference were asked to serve in the Special Session, if needed. John Meares and Chester Andrews were named as Chief Tellers.

Presentation of Proposed Plan: Bishop Cannon recognized Clifton W. Everett, Chairman of the Conference Board of Pensions, to make the presentation. Mr. Everett stated that in 1964 there was no reserve fund to guarantee future retirement benefits to ministers. Pension costs have doubled since then. The Study Committee, which included representatives of all conference boards, recommended adoption of a funded plan. Further study had been made since June. He called on Norwood L. Jones, Secretary of the Board of Pensions, to present the proposed Plan.

Resolution Read: Norwood Jones read the resolution adopted at the Annual Conference in Fayetteville in June:

"We recommend that the North Carolina Conference adopt a funded pension program within the North Carolina Conference itself."

He then read the report of the Board of Pensions and gave background information concerning the study. After restating the resolution, he moved its adoption. The motion was seconded.

Explanation of Plan: C. W. Everett asked that privilege be given to George Forehand, Merritt Jones, Wade Pierce, and H. Gray Hutchinson to speak to the resolution. Permission was granted to them by vote of the conference.

George Forehand: Laymen have an obligation to all ministers for past, present, and future service. Corporations provide pension and retirement plans for their employees.

Point of Order: Reginald Ponder raised the question that someone should now be allowed to speak in opposition.

Bishop Cannon ruled that this was part of the Board's presentation, and time for discussion and debate would come later.

Merritt Jones: Explained the pension program would provide broader benefits for wives and children of ministers. By the year 2003 all obligation for past services would be met. Money then would be available for other causes. He thought laymen would be willing to spend an extra \$1.50 to provide benefits for ministers and their families.

Wade Pierce: This is the right movement we should make. We have a moral responsibility to our ministers. "Where does the money come from?" Good stewardship is the answer.

H. Gray Hutchinson, member of the firm which made the actuarial study for the Board of Pensions: Declined to make a formal statement, but volunteered to answer any question for clarification.

Questions for Clarification: Bishop Cannon stated that before final action was to be taken, there would be given for questions for clarification, and then time for debate would be allowed.

Robert Morgan: "How will the percentage of increase in the Single Figure Askings be figured?"

N. L. Jones: The Cabinet and Commission on World Service & Finance would allocate each church its amount. Some churches might get a little more or less than 10% increase.

Fred P. Brooks: "Past service obligation has been \$9,000,000.00, but the June figure shows \$11,000,000.00. Why?"

Mr. Hutchinson explained the General Board Plan requires even more. This plan gives the Conference greater advantage.

Alfonso Henry: Asked question concerning the amount per service year. Is 10% increase in addition to amounts other agencies might ask for?

Mr. Hutchinson: The figure is based on present-day figures.

Charles Hubbard: The Pension Funding Plan has nothing to do with askings of other conference groups. This 10% represents cost of the Funding Plan presented by the Conference Board of Pensions--this is as of now. At the present time the total of Single Figure Askings received from churches must have added to its earnings from Central Funds in order to meet present requirements.

William K. Quick: "If churches fail to raise this 10% increase in Single Figure Askings, what alternative plan is there to fund the Reserve Pension Fund?"

C. S. Hubbard: "Salaries and debts have prior claims. What the Conference decides to determine whether the funding of the Reserve Pension Fund will also be a prior claim on the Single Figure Askings. Failure to raise all our askings would cause other programs of the church to suffer."

Mr. Hutchinson: "We must increase the Single Figure Askings tremendously to meet pension needs, or reduce our commitment to our retired men."

Question: "What about transfers in and out of the Conference?"

Bishop Cannon: "The North Carolina Conference is responsible only for those years a minister served in the North Carolina Conference."

Horace Garris: "The Current Income Distribution plan now used is apportioned to 10 churches. Will this be carried as a part of Single Figure Askings, and will the Single Figure Askings be reduced in 2003 A. D.?"

C. W. Everett: "Yes."

Ray Phillips: "Is the minister's contribution to Ministers' Retirement Fund voluntary or compulsory?"

C. W. Everett: "It will continue as it now is -- voluntary."

David Moe: "Will the \$78 per service year rate remain constant?"

C. W. Everett: "The Annual Conference sets the rate. If the rate is increased, the total cost of the pension fund also increases."

E. C. Crawford: "Par. 1379 of *Discipline* provides that the rate per service year be set by the Annual Conference. If the General Conference changes this paragraph to conflict with the Plan, what happens?"

C. W. Everett: "The Conference Board of Pensions has been advised by the General Board that there is no conflict now."

N. L. Jones: "If the General Conference makes changes, we will have to go along with them."

Grady Dawson: "A) Can we take longer than thirty years to pay the Plan? B) Can we discontinue it at any time? C) Can we decide to go to the General Board's Plan? D) Is the Plan flexible to allow for financial difficulties?"

H. G. Hutchinson: "Building up our reserves will make it easier to join the General Board plan later. We can dip into reserves to pay a current year's obligations, but we must eventually make up the deficit or reduce benefits in the future. The immediate liabilities for 1971 amount to \$600,000.00. We must put in a little more than predicted."

A. Clement: "Can we transfer reserve funds of other agencies to apply against this initial payment into the Ministers' Reserve Pension Fund?"

N. L. Jones: "If other groups have funds they are willing to release, we would be willing to accept them. We cannot draw on them."

W. Walker: "14% of the present Single Figure Askings goes for Conference Claimants. Would this 10% increase be over and above that?"

C. S. Hubbard: "This would be 24%, as it is now apportioned by World Service."

C. W. Everett: "The 10% increase for MRPF would remain constant. The 14% for Conference Claimants depends on the rate set by the Annual Conference."

Clarence Warren offered a motion. Bishop Cannon ruled that a motion would be out of order during the question-and-answer period.

W. Smith: "How does our service year rate compare with other Conferences and other denominations? What is their system of funding?"

N. L. Jones: "The General Board sets 1% of average annual salary, which would be \$69.00 per service year. N. C. Conference pays \$75.00 plus Blue Cross-Blue Shield insurance. The Western N. C. Conference pays \$68.00 on an average annual salary of \$8600.00. No figures are available on other denominations."

W. Brown: "So far, 66 Annual Conferences have joined the General Board plan. Are we smarter than they, or do we not know enough?"

N. L. Jones: "There are several unknowns in financing by the General Board plan. The Conference Board felt we could do better for our own particular situation with our own plan."

W. Shoaf: "Can you translate the 10% increase into dollar figures?"

H. G. Hutchinson: "\$270,000.00 is the difference between the Current Income and the Reserve Pension cost. It will be the same for the next 30 years."

W. Ponder: "The outline of the plan gives the figure \$791,856 'for Pension Cost Only'. Will this increase if the per service year rate is increased?"

C. W. Everett: "In setting up the plan, the committee had to use an assumption based on a constant figure. *Past Service* payment is constant. Future payment may be variable."

W. H. S. Garris moved to close the question period and go to debate. Motion carried.

Clarence Warren offered a motion concerning a method of assessing the increase in Single Figure Askings to local churches. Bishop Cannon ruled the motion out of order since the debate was on acceptance of the Plan itself and not on the method of funding.

Delos O'Daniel moved suspension of rules to give everyone an opportunity to speak.

Bishop Cannon: "There are no rules to keep everybody from speaking."

A. Clarke spoke against the Plan. "A major concern is what is not spelled out in the resolution. The \$78 per service year rate is too small. To pass this resolution would have adverse effect on those already retired."

W. H. M. Wilkinson moved the previous question on all that was before the body.

The Motion was defeated.

W. K. Quick offered the following substitute motion for the one presented by the Conference Board of Pensions:

"That the Annual Conference authorize the District Superintendents to share these urgent pension needs of the North Carolina Conference with each Charge Conference within the North Carolina Conference, in a regular or called session, during the 1971-72 conference year, and that delegates to the 1972 session in Durham be prepared to vote on a reserve pension plan."

W. K. Quick stated: "This is the most urgent Special Session since the one in which two new colleges were established. We cannot get this 10% increase raised now. If lay people are made aware of the urgency of this program, they will support this program."

A. D. Byrd offered an amendment to the Quick substitute: "That we ask the Board of Pensions to provide the 80-page study for each delegate within the next thirty days."

The Byrd amendment was defeated.

J. W. Page stated that these charge conferences would have to be held before the Commission on World Service and Finance held its budget hearings December 6. Otherwise, any action on the Reserve Pension Plan would be delayed one year.

W. K. Quick: "The purpose of my motion was to delay action one year in order to provide

time for study. More information is necessary if we are to raise the funds. Hurried approval of the plan means we will come up short of the dollars needed to finance the plan."

C. W. Everett: "This Resolution offered by the Conference Board of Pensions is right. Our obligation is to our claimants. If you agree with the Resolution, when is the time to begin? Every delay makes the additional cost greater. I offer no criticism of the General Board plan, but the N. C. plan will mean a \$2 million over-all decrease in cost. Learning sessions have already been held in each district. Please defeat any effort to delay action."

Point of Order: A. D. Byrd stated that district meetings discussed the General Board's pension plan, not the N. C. plan.

C. W. Everett: "Technically, Byrd is correct. However, the N. C. Plan is almost a replica of the General Board plan. The initial cost and the over-all cost for the next thirty years will be less for the N. C. Plan."

W. K. Quick: "We need to determine if charges will underwrite the program."

J. H. Coile made a statement clarifying the Quick motion.

Fred P. Brooks: Spoke for the Quick motion. Offered an amendment that at Charge Conference "refinements" of the Plan be presented by the Conference Board of Pensions.

The Chair ruled the Brooks amendment out of order.

Previous Question: Frank I. Lloyd moved the previous question on the Quick substitute motion.

The previous question was called.

R. H. Stark asked for a re-reading of the Quick motion.

Point of Inquiry: J. H. Coile asked, "What will a 'Yes' or 'No' vote on the Quick motion do to the Plan itself?"

Bishop Cannon: "Nothing to the Plan. It will ascertain for the Annual Conference in Durham whether the plan has been underwritten by the charges."

W. K. Quick: "We will act in the Charge Conference on all that is before us today."

Bishop Cannon: If Quick's motion is adopted, the Ministers' Reserve Pension Fund Plan will be tabled until Annual Conference.

Clarification: H. B. Lewis asked, "Will the action of the Charge Conferences be binding on the Annual Conference?"

Bishop Cannon: "No. It only delays action of this Conference until Annual Conference in June, 1972."

H. M. Wilkinson called for the vote.

Bishop Cannon stated that after deciding on the Quick substitute, the Conference would still have to vote on the Plan itself.

The Chair called for a count vote on the Quick substitute. A standing vote was taken, and the Quick substitute defeated.

Previous Question: Jack Crum moved the previous question on all before the house. It was approved.

Vote by Orders: Wilbur Jackson moved that voting be done by orders.

J. H. Coile pointed out there was no Disciplinary provision for voting by orders on the Annual Conference level.

The Ministers' Reserve Pension Plan presented by the N. C. Conference Board of Pensions was overwhelmingly approved. (Editor's note - The Plan as adopted is contained under the Board of Pensions Report-Section on the Constitution in Section V of this *Journal*.)

Motion: Clarence Warren asked if the motion he offered earlier would be in order at this point.

Bishop Cannon asked him to submit his proposal to the Commission on World Service and Finance, since the purpose of the Special Session was to consider the plan itself and the methods of funding it.

Point of Order: E. L. Earnhardt stated that an approved Plan had never been submitted to the conference; therefore, the conference could not approve a plan. The Resolution presented today was vague and indefinite. We were voting on the Resolution, not a plan.

C. W. Everett: The proposal is based on \$78 per service year, which makes it a Plan. The Chair concurred.

Motion to adjourn: B. L. Davidson moved for adjournment. It was done.

Personal Privilege: J. W. Page reminded Raleigh District ministers of their meeting.

Closing Remarks and Benediction: Bishop Cannon commended the Conference on the action taken. He then dismissed the Special Session with a benediction.

JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

(Daily Minutes)

FIRST DAY, MORNING SESSION

Monday, June 5, 1972

The Sacrament of the Loard's Supper was celebrated at 10:00 a.m. in Duke Chapel on the campus of Duke University. The celebrant was Bishop William I. Cannon.

The organist of the Chapel, Mr. George Ritchie, played the prelude.

The Processional Hymn, No. 41, "O How Glorious, Full of Wonder" was sung. Bishop Cannon read greetings. William Quick led the prayer of Confession and Pardon.

A duet, "Lord, Thy Mercy" by Johann Sebastian Bach was sung by Susa Long, soprano, and Julian O. Long, baritone.

The Prayer for illumination was read by W.C. Wilson.

Scripture lessons were as follows: Old Testament, E.B. Fisher; Epistle, J.V. Early and Gospel, C.D. Barclift.

Bishop Cannon introduced Bishop Lance Webb, Resident Bishop, Illinois Area. Bishop Webb preached the sermon using the theme "The Sacrament of the Encounter With Christ".

The Affirmation of Faith was led by William Quick, and the Prayers for Others were read by C.H. Mercer.

Bishop Webb led in the Litany of the Holy Communion.

Bishop Cannon and Bishop Webb, assisted by the district superintendent, administered the sacred elements to the congregation.

Bishop Cannon dismissed the congregation.

FIRST DAY, AFTERNOON SESSION

Monday, June 5, 1972

Conference Convened: Bishop William R. Cannon, Resident Bishop of the Raleigh Area, called to order the North Carolina Conference of the Southeastern Jurisdiction of the United Methodist Church at 2:30 p.m., June 5, 1972. This was the one hundred forty-seventh session (twenty fourth since unification of American Methodism in 1939, and the fifth since unification of The Methodist Church and Evangelical United Brethren Church on April 23, 1968) of the Conference. The 1972 session was convened at Duke University, Durham, North Carolina. Trinity United Methodist Church of Durham served as co-host. The Call to Worship was given by Bishop Cannon. The traditional hymn, "And Are We Yet Alive?" was sung. The invocation was given by C.D. Barclift.

Welcome: Bishop Cannon presented Dr. Terry Sanford, President of Duke University, who spoke words of welcome. Bishop Cannon responded. W.K. Quick, host pastor, introduced Mr. Edmund S. Swindell Jr., Church Lay Leader, Trinity United Methodist Church and Durham County Manager, and the Honorable James R. Hawkins, Mayor of the City of Durham. They both spoke words of welcome on behalf of Trinity United Methodist Church and the City of Durham. Bishop Cannon called on C.D. Barclift who also spoke words of welcome. W.K. Quick presented Mr. Paul Vick of Duke University, Office of Special Events.

Rules: W.K. Quick made the motion that the Rules of Order as printed in the 1971 Conference Journal be the rules governing this Conference Session and that the cards as signed at the registration desk be the official roll.

Motion: Reginald Ponder made a motion that the Committee on Parsonage Standards be composed of 6 laymen or laywomen, 3 ministers and 3 ministers' wives. The motion was seconded. Norwood Jones asked that the motion be amended to the effect that those now serving not be considered for reappointment. The amendment was approved. The Ponder motion was approved. The Rules of Order were adopted. The official roll was approved.

Bar of Conference: W.K. Quick made the motion that the main body of Page Auditorium (excluding the balcony) be the Bar of the Conference. It was approved.

Official Program: W.K. Quick moved that the printed program be the official program of the Conference unless changed by the presiding officer. It was approved.

Personal Privilege: The chair asked that W.D. Wilson serve through this Session (since he had made all of the preparations) with whoever was elected Secretary to sit with him and assume full responsibility at the close of the Session.

Personal Matter: W.K. Quick read a statement concerning the long tenure of William Carleton Wilson as Conference Statistician, then as Conference Secretary, since 1953. N.W. Grant read a statement in appreciation of his service. He then presented a gift to the Conference Secretary. Mrs. Wilson and son, Ted, and daughter and granddaughter were asked to come to the platform. Mr. Wilson spoke words of appreciation.

Bishop Cannon asked C.W. Barbee and C.J. Andrews, both of whom have served since 1953 as assistant secretaries, to stand and be recognized.

Resolution: C.H. Mercer presented a resolution for adoption concerning the Conference Secretary and Statistician. It was seconded. H.L. Watson made a motion to table the resolution pending the election of the two officers. The Mercer motion was tabled.

W.M. Wells asked the question as to whether the Conference Secretary could be a minister or a layman. The chair in consultation with the Conference Secretary answered that either could be elected legally, but that a minister could be more desirable because of the particular responsibility involved. Nominations were opened. Kimsey King, James White and John M. Cline were nominated to be Conference Secretary. W.K. Quick moved that nominations be closed. The Conference so ordered. After instructions by Chief Teller, Troy Barrett, the ballot was taken.

Nominations: C.H. Mercer made the motion that nominations on page 31 and 32 in the Book of Recommendations be approved. It was done.

Passing of Character and Official Administration of Preachers: The Bishop read the list of district superintendents, and their characters were passed. The characters of the ministers in the several districts were approved.

Composite Report of the District Superintendents: C.H. Mercer, cabinet secretary, made the composite report for all the district superintendents. The report was adopted.

Result of Ballot for Conference Secretary: Bishop Cannon announced the result of the ballot for Conference Secretary. It was: Kimsey King, 257; John M.

Cline 158; James White, 54. Bishop Cannon declared Kimsey King electe Conference Secretary for the quadrennium 1972-1976.

Board of Pensions: Bishop Cannon called on Clifton W. Everett and Norwood Jones to present the report of the Board of Pensions. Jones presented Report No. 1.

The following was substituted for Section 7 of Report No. 1:

"Any member of the North Carolina Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church serving under Special Appointment many accrue pension credit for any year, if there is paid by him, or in his behalf, the full of the pension for the current year, as determined by our actuary.

"The foregoing action shall not apply to members of the Conference who are employees of the Program Council, Boards or Agencies of the North Carolina Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church who contribute on their behalf twelve times the current annuity rate as fixed by the Annual Conference."

Paul Browning made a motion that action be delayed. It was not delayed.

Section D was presented and approved. Section E and F were presented and adopted.

Report No. 1 was moved and adopted.

Report No. 2 was presented and adopted.

Report No. 3 was presented. J.H. Coile asked that the words, ". . . or special session of the Annual Conference . . ." be inserted at the appropriate place. It was accepted by Jones. The report was moved and adopted. Report No. 4 was presented. C.L. Warren asked a question concerning Blue Cross-Blue Shield coverage in conjunction with other policies. Mr. Bill Cable, insurance consultant, was granted the privilege to speak to Warren's question. He stated that the "coordination of benefits clause" applied only to group coverage and had been a part of the contract. He further stated that the prime carrier pays first and that the determination of the prime carrier is made by the first company to receive the claim and is made under standard laws acceptable to all commissioners of insurance. The purpose is to insure that in families where two people are working and are covered by different group policies that those group policies pay up to, but not to exceed, 100% of the benefit costs. W. A. Seawell asked a question concerning special coverage. W. L. Sabiston asked a question concerning rate increases. Mr. Cable was asked to reply. He stated that the rate increases were in line with those of similar groups. Charles Umstead asked a question concerning group policies. Jones reported that it was already passed. Randall Baker asked a question about child coverage. Jones answered that at age 19 he will need his own personal policy. F. Roderick Randolph asked who determines which company is the prime carrier. Mr. Cable answered again, "The first company to get the claim." R. W. Ponder asked as a substitute motion that the Conference not approve the plan for ministers to pay the increase in Blue Cross-Blue Shield premiums. C. C. Capps asked that the Conference approve the plan as submitted by the Board of Pensions. The Question was called on the substitute and the Ponder motion was defeated. A vote was called on Report No. 1 and the report as presented was sustained. The entire report of the Board of Pensions as amended was moved and adopted by the Conference.

Methodist Publishing House: H. Lee Driggs, representative of the Methodist Publishing House, presented a check for \$8,548.00 to the Conference. Bishop Cannon expressed appreciation and gratitude and then presented Dr. Thornton

Fowler, associate publisher of the Methodist Publishing House, who spoke to the Conference.

Presentation: Bishop Cannon presented Dr. Gordon Thompson, Emory University faculty member, who spoke representing Emory University, and more especially The Candler School of Theology.

Board of the Ministry: Bishop Cannon called on W.A. Seawell to present the report of the Board of the Ministry. Report No 1 was presented. He moved its adoption. It was adopted. W.W. Sherman presented Report No. 2 concerning counseling resources. A.F. Fisher asked a question about what we are adopting. "Is this for implementation or study?" Sherman answered by replying that this is a tentative study not a program to be adopted for immediate implementation. The report was adopted for study.

John M. Cline presented Report No. 3 and Paul W. Boone presented report No.

Motion: M.K. Glover made a motion to vote separately on groups by educational attainment and qualification. W.A. Seawell spoke against the motion. The question was called and the Glover motion was lost.

FIRST DAY, EVENING SESSION

Monday, June 5, 1972

At 7:30 the service of Ordination of Elders was held at Trinity United Methodist Church. For a prelude, the organist played Partitia on "God Is My Strong Salvation" by Johann Pachelbel. Bishop William R. Cannon presided during the Ordination Service.

The liturgist for the service was G.R. McKenzie, who led in the Call to Worship, the invocation, the Call to Confession, the Prayer of Confession, Words of Assurance, the Prayer Our Lord Taught Us, and the Affirmation of Faith. William C. Quick led in the Act of Praise, No. 609, "Blessed Be the Lord God of Israel." For an Offertory Anthem, the choir of Trinity Church sang "Greater Love Hath No Man" by John Ireland.

Reception of the Class into Full Connection: W.A. Seawell read the list of those to be received into Full Connection. They were: Albert Eugene Goldfinch, Jr., Wade Hawkins, Durward Douglas Jessee, Henry G. Jinnette and Henry Robert Warren. These were received into full connection by Bishop Cannon.

The Ordination Sermon was preached by H. Ellis Finger, Jr., Resident Bishop of the Nashville Area.

The Call to Orders: W.A. Seawell read the names of those to be ordained Elders. They were: Albert Eugene Goldfinch, Jr., Wade Hawkins, Durward Douglas Jessee, Henry G. Jinnette and Henry Robert Warren.

The Act of Ordination: The Administration of Orders of Elders was administered by Bishop Cannon. They were ordained by Bishop Cannon, assisted by Bishop Finger.

The hymn, "Go, Make of All Disciples" was sung.

Benediction: The benediction was given by Bishop Cannon.

SECOND DAY, MORNING SESSION

Tuesday, June 6, 1972

Conference Convened: At 8:30 A.M. following the prelude, "Prelude in C Major" by Johann Sebastian Bach, the Conference was called to order by Bishop William R. Cannon. They hymn, "O For A Thousand Tongues to Sing" was sung by the Conference. The prayer was led by C. M. Mitchell.

Program Council: Bishop William R. Cannon, presiding officer, called on N.W. Grant to present the Program Council report. Grant spoke clearly and directly to the issues, calling on the Conference to understand that the program now before them has been derived from the "grass roots" and it is now the Conference at large that decides what we will do as to the program of our Conference. "This is not the decision or action of the clergy or a small group of staff personnel, but of the entire Conference." Grant then presented the first two sections of the report, asked for deletion of Item 1 on page 17 of the Book of Recommendations and called the attention of the Conference to the Restructuring Report which had been distributed the preceding day. He explained the restructuring in terms of General Conference action and the forth-coming Discipline of the United Methodist Church in detail and pointed out that only the Conference could change the charter of the Program Council and that the changes were largely a matter of terminology so as to make our structure conform with all other levels of our Church structure. He explained the Restructuring Report item by item, giving particular attention to the number of members to constitute the various divisions, boards, commissions, and committees. Bishop Cannon placed the Restructuring Report before the Conference for question and discussion. Paul Carruth spoke of his concern about the placement of the Conference Committee on Continuing Education referring to paragraph 5 of the Report of the Executive Committee of the N.C. Conference Program Council concerning Annual Conference Structure, particularly this paragraph:

"We recommend that in keeping with the action of the 1972 General Conference the Conference Committee on Continuing Education become a sub-committee of the Division of Ministry."

Paul Carruth asked for the deletion of the above. The motion was made by A.F. Fisher. Carruth called attention to the report of the N.C. United Methodist Commission on Continuing Education for Ministers on page 19 of the Book of Recommendations which would call for the composition of the Conference Committee to continue as an agency made up of representatives from Annual Conference groups with traditional involvement in continuing education as had been the case in the 1968-1972 quadrennium. He pointed out that officials of continuing education of the General Church had been consulted with respect to the action of the General Conference. Assurance was given that General Conference action on continuing education leaves the Annual Conference free to continue an interboard Committee along the lines called for in the Commission on Continuing Education report. The recommendation of that report as found under section B on page 19 of the Book of Recommendations is:

"B. That the Committee be composed of the following: Five representatives of the Conference Board of Ministry; one representative each from the following Conference agencies: Board of Education, Board of Evangelism, Board of

Missions, Commission on Town and Country Ministries, Board of Managers of the North Carolina Pastors' School; the Duke Divinity School; each Methodist College within the bounds of the Annual Conference; the Director of Continuing Education of the Duke Divinity School; a representative of the Program Council staff; and three members at large appointed by the Bishop."

L. Watson questioned the advisability of taking continuing education from the Division of Higher Education and Ministry.

Paul Carruth pointed out that both under the plan of the present quadrennium, and the plan of the 1972-1976 quadrennium, if the recommendation on page 19 is followed, the Committee on Continuing Education would include 5 members from the Division of the Ministry. This would give clear recognition to the interest and responsibility of that body for continuing education. In addition, other agencies which also have a legitimate concern for the continuing education of the minister would be represented.

Reginald Ponder presented a substitute to the Fisher motion that the Program Council report be amended in item (2) on page five to change "sub-committee" to "committee" so that the Conference Committee on Continuing Education would become a committee of the Division of Ministry, "and then the Committee could be constituted on the basis of the report on page 19 and then the problem seems to be solved, and I move you, sir, that we change the recommendation to be committee instead of sub-committee." The Bishop commented that Ponder had just moved to take out the "sub" before committee in place of deletion of the item. The motion was seconded.

Jack Crum called for clarification as to whether the action called for an interboard group or a group composed only of members of one board. He asked Ponder, "are you saying that it can be interboard as constituted in the Book [of Recommendations]?" Ponder indicated in the affirmative. Crum replied, "All right, if that is understood. I am not sure that would be understood unless it is clearly spelled out that way." Bishop Cannon said, "Brother Grant, do you want to say anything on that, or does it help in any way?" N.W. Grant, "I'll accept the committee's suggestion. I think there is some confusion in the whole matter that I would like to clarify." Bishop Cannon, "He'll accept that. Do you accept that, Carruth?" Carruth responded that while he could accept the motion, he hesitated in view of the fact that the structure in continuing education had been developed in cooperation with the Western North Carolina Conference, the Duke Divinity School and the Duke Endowment. He stated he felt any changes should be made in consultation with them. W.J. Neese spoke asking for trust in the Division of the Ministry. A.F. Fisher withdrew his motion in favor of Grant's acceptance of the wording of the Ponder substitute with the Crum interpretation.

Motion: Dr. Fred. P. Brooks, Jr. moved that under Section I, the Division of Health and Welfare of The Board of Global Ministries be enlarged to include one person elected by and from the residents of the Methodist Retirement Home and that in Section II, The Board of Trustees of the Methodist Retirement Home be enlarged so as to include in each class one person elected by and from the residents of the Methodist Retirement Home. Grant accepted this motion as a part of the report.

Question: E.F. Smith asked a question concerning the interpretation of ethnic

groups in the Restructuring Report as pertaining to our Conference. Grant responded, "We are following the action of the General Conference and the *Discipline* as closely as possible." The Chair gave the approximate ethnic makeup of our Conference. John Meares pointed out that the ethnic guidelines were recommendations and not inflexible rules.

Information: H.L. Watson raised searching questions regarding information concerning continuing Higher Education and the clustering of appropriate divisions and committees under the appropriate board. N.W. Grant responded to each question.

Motion: A.F. Fisher moved "that divisions have the right to make final appeal to the Council on Ministries and the Council on Finance and Administration where the division is in conflict with the decision of the board." The motion was accepted by Grant as a part of the report.

J. W. Lineberger and J. T. Maides asked questions. Grant responded.

Previous Question: W.A. Seawell moved the previous question. The Program Council report and the document on restructuring was adopted unanimously. Bishop Cannon praised the work of the Conference in their swiftness and appropriate promptness of action on the matter of restructuring. Particular praise was given to Grant for his leadership and ability to clarify and delineate structure. Grant thanked the boards and agencies for their understanding and their harmonious cooperation during the past quadrennium which had made this work possible.

Lake Junaluska: Edgar H. Neese, Jr., Superintendent of the Lake Junaluska Assembly and a member of the Western North Carolina Conference, was presented by Bishop Cannon. He spoke to the Conference concerning the unusual success of the Southeastern Jurisdiction and the Jurisdictional Council. He cited the Jurisdictional approach as keeping us from being provincial as individual Conferences. The role of the Lake Junaluska Assembly as a place for leadership to come together and share ideas was stressed as one of our most valuable resources.

Announcements: W.C. Wilson made an announcement concerning the Memorial Service, the order of the day to be held in Duke Chapel at 11:00 A.M. He also made other announcements. N.W. Grant made an announcement. J.W. Page made an announcement concerning Mrs. Horace Jones, who is ill in the hospital. Bishop Cannon asked Page to lead the Conference in prayer. Following silent prayer, Page did so.

Board of Evangelism: Kimsey King was called by Bishop Cannon to preside in the cause of the Board of Evangelism. He submitted the report of the Board. Then he moved its adoption. It was adopted.

Board of the Laity: The report of the Board of the Laity was presented by Grier Garrick, Conference Lay Leader. It was adopted.

Presentation: Charles K. McAdams was called upon to make the Award for the "Outstanding Layman of the Year". The award was made to Dr. J. Ed Legates of Raleigh. Bishop Cannon congratulated the Board on the excellence of their selection and praised Dr. Legates for his dedication and outstanding work.

Board of Missions: E.F. Smith presided in presenting the report of the Board of Missions.

Church of the Year Award: E.F. Smith called on Reginald Ponder to make the "Church of the Year Award". The church so honored was the Ocean View United

Methodist Church, Youpon Beach, M.W. Warren, Jr., Pastor. Bishop Cannon presented an inscribed plaque to the pastor of the church with high praise. Warren introduced representatives of the congregation and responded with eloquence and humility.

E.F. Smith spoke and presented Rufus Stark, Conference Missionary Secretary, who spoke briefly. Stark presented two missionaries on furlough: Clyde I. Dunn and George C. McGill.

Order of the Day: The Chair called for the Order of the Day and with regret asked the Board of Missions to postpone the remainder of their report until the afternoon session in the interest of the Memorial Service to be held in Duke Chapel.

Announcements: Kimsey King made announcements.

Benediction: Kimsey King gave the benediction.

Memorial Service followed in the Duke University Chapel. W.C. Wilson presided during the Memorial Service. The Conference sang the hymn, "The Strife O'er the Battle Done", after which Dewey Tyson led in prayer. Dr. Dilawar Dawkins, Professor, North Carolina Central University, Durham, sang a solo. W.C. Wilson, Chairman of the Committee on Memoirs, called the question: "What ministers have died during the year?" He then read the list: Leon C. Larkin, Dwight L. Petty, French R. Lowry, Charles D. Hicks, Jr., John F. Casey, Robert L. Jerome, and A. A. Friend, John F. McEachin and Walter L. Dawson, Jr.

W.C. Wilson called the question, "What minister's wives have died during the year?" He then read the list: Mrs. E.H. McWhorter, Mrs. J.C. Whedbee, Mrs. W.G. Lowe, Mrs. M.O. Fletcher, Mrs. T.M. Grant, Mrs. H.I. Glass, Mrs. J.E. Monroe, Mrs. W. Dimmette.

Warren B. Petteway delivered the Memorial Address. The hymn, "Crown Him with Many Crowns" was sung.

Commission on Chaplains: Bishop Cannon presented A. Purnell Bailey, a member of the Virginia Conference, and currently the Executive Secretary of the Commission on Chaplains, to read the list of Chaplains attending this session. The following were presented: Corbin Cherry, John Pearsall, John Blue, William B. Barnes, Jim Griffin and Frank Daniels.

Benediction: S.L. Townsend gave the benediction.

SECOND DAY, AFTERNOON SESSION

Tuesday, June 6, 1972

Conference Brotherhood: At 2:00 o'clock the Conference Brotherhood convened its annual meeting under the guidance of James W. Hamilton, president. He led in the prayer. He then spoke briefly about the Brotherhood. Mr. Hamilton stressed that only 300 of 600 eligible ministers are members of the Brotherhood and encouraged others to participate. Wallace Kirby was called on to make the report of the nominating committee. It is as follows: President: James W. Hamilton; Vice President: Norwood Jones; Secretary-Treasurer: J.K. Bostick. The report of the nominating committee was accepted.

Wallace Kirby raised the question as to remuneration for the Secretary-Treasurer. The executive committee was asked to study this and report at

the next Annual Conference. R.W. Ponder and E.F. Smith requested the executive committee propose a feasibility study concerning raising the base on which each member is assessed per call. Their proposal was approved for study, to be reported to the next session of the Annual Conference.

Conference Reconvened: Bishop William R. Cannon called the afternoon session to order.

Report of the Committee on Minutes: Horace Garris made the report of the Committee on Minutes. It was approved.

Board of Missions (Continued from morning session): Rufus Stark made additional statements about the work in the field of missions.

E.F. Smith moved the adoption of the report of the Board of Missions. It was adopted.

Conference Brotherhood: J.K. Bostick, Secretary—Treasurer, presented the financial report of the Conference Brotherhood.

Hymn: The hymn, "A Charge to Keep I Have," was sung by the Conference. R.L. Bame led in prayer.

Commission on World Service and Finance: Bishop Cannon asked Charles S. Hubbard to preside in guiding the Commission on World Service and Finance in making its report. Mr. Hubbard explained to the Conference the process of setting up the Conference budget. The revised Budget was presented. He then asked T.M. Vick, Commission secretary, to make the report. Vick moved the adoption of the report.

M.K. Glover proposed an amendment that we set the salaries of district superintendents at \$10,000 and place this difference on the deficit of \$17,000 which we now have. It was seconded by R.W. Pritchard. Glover then spoke to the amendment. Vick spoke against the amendment. The amendment was lost.

Rufus Stark offered an amendment that the fiscal year be the same as the calendar year, to be achieved by 1974. Hubbard spoke concerning the motion. R.W. Ponder spoke, commending the Stark proposal. Charles McAdams spoke briefly. James White made a substitute motion that the Commission study this and report at the next session of the Annual Conference. The question was called. The White substitute was voted on. It lost. The Stark motion was voted on, and it carried. The World Service report was voted on and was approved.

T.M. Vick presented additional proposals and supplementary appropriations. Reginald Ponder raised a question concerning prior claims on pension funds. Norwood Jones answered the question. It was approved. Vick also presented a recommendation concerning the new district parsonage. It was approved. Another recommendation was made that complementary pastoral subscription help be given to "The North Carolina Christian Advocate" for 1972-1973. The Conference sustained all proposals and supplementary appropriations.

W.D. Sabiston moved "That in setting next year's budget the Commission on Finance and Administration give serious consideration to increasing under the item 'Pastors' Moving Expense' the base rate of \$50 which is now set, to \$100 and keeping the mileage rate at 50 cents per mile." Bishop Cannon ruled that this was in order as a motion for consideration for study and not a directive to the Council. The Commission on World Service and Finance accepted the Sabiston Motion for study and it was approved by the Conference.

The Commission on World Service and Finance Report was adopted in its entirety by the Annual Conference.

Commission on Minimum Salary: Mr. Preston D. Page asked James Bailey to make the report. He made the report and moved its adoption. C.M. Mitchell made an amendment that minimum salary be increased for all categories of ministers equally. Bailey stated that they just did not have the money to achieve additional increases at the present time. Reginald Ponder spoke against the Mitchell amendment. M.K. Glover spoke for the Mitchell amendment. Bailey spoke to clarify the source of minimum salary funds and explained that much money had been coming from the Duke Endowment and that support for local churches was being distributed by the Duke Endowment on a different basis and that Minimum Salary, which in the next quadrennium would be referred to as the Commission on Equitable Salaries, would have to look for new sources of revenue. C.C. Capps spoke against the Mitchell amendment. George C. Smith spoke for better support for ministers and their families and in favor of the Mitchell amendment. J.H. Coile moved the previous question. The Coile motion was approved. The Maness Mitchell motion was read, voted on and was carried. Bailey spoke and moved the adoption of the report of the Commission as amended. The report was approved and adopted by the Conference. Bailey expressed personal gratitude, that of the Commission and of the Conference to Preston Page for his devoted service, his concern for the ministers, and his loyal support and hard work.

Announcements: W.C. Wilson made an announcement concerning Board of Education materials to be distributed today for consideration tomorrow.

Methodist Foundation, Inc.: Mr. Sidney L. Gullede, Jr., made the report of the Methodist Foundation, Inc. It was received as information.

David Cordts, youth delegate, presented a resolution concerning the investments of Methodist Foundation, Inc. funds. It was seconded. He spoke for it. M.K. Glover spoke against the resolution. Bert Fisher spoke for the resolution. F. B. Everett spoke against the resolution. Flynn Surratt spoke for the resolution. Horace Harris called for the question. The call for the question was sustained. The vote was taken and the resolution was approved. (Text appears under Resolutions in Section)

Question 38: "Who have been received by transfer?" Brian G. Gentle, Garland Knott, Dan L. Miller, William C. Simpson, Jr., James C. Stokes, Jr. Robert L. Wilson.

The North Carolina Christian Advocate: C.P. Morris, chairman of the Board of Publications, presented the report of the Board. The report of the Board was moved and adopted.

Bishop Cannon asked James Stokes, a member of the Western North Carolina Annual Conference and editor of the "North Carolina Christian Advocate," to speak to the Conference. He addressed the Conference.

Department of Gifts and Wills: Bishop Cannon asked Mr. I. Lee Parker, Jr. to present the cause of the Department of Gifts and Wills. O.L. Hathaway spoke to the Conference on behalf of the Department. The report was moved and adopted.

Conference Board of Trustees: Mr. E.M. Herndon made the report of the Conference Board of Trustees. He asked that the trustees be permitted to sell the property in Wake County known as the White Plains United Methodist Church. The motion to sell this property was approved.

Another proposal was that Pleasant Plains Church in Harnett County improved through sale of some of its property and the use of proceeds to improve property of its memorial association. It was adopted.

Methodist Ministers Credit Union: C.M. Mitchell presented the report of the Methodist Ministers Credit union.

Duke Endowment and Ormond Research Center: Dr. Robert Wilson made the report of the Duke Endowment and Ormond Research Center. The section dealing with the Duke Endowment is for information only. It was accepted as such.

THIRD DAY, MORNING SESSION

Wednesday, June 7, 1972

Opening: Bishop William R. Cannon, resident bishop, called the Conference to order. The Hymn, "Standing on the Promises," was sung by the Conference. C.W. Goldston led in the morning prayer.

Personal Privileges: E.B. Fisher moved that the resolution presented earlier in this Conference concerning W.C. Wilson, retiring Conference Secretary, be printed in the Conference Journal. The motion was approved.

Ministerial Education Fund: H.S. Garris reported on the Ministerial Education Fund. The report was adopted.

Commission on Enlistment for Church Occupations: Jack L. Hunter submitted the report for the Commission on Enlistment for Church Occupations. The report was adopted.

Joint Committee on Disability: H.B. Johnson submitted the Joint Committee Disability report. The report was adopted.

Board of College Visitors: Kermit R. Wheeler was called on to submit the report of the Board of College Visitors. The report was approved.

Board of the Ministry: Paul Boone gave the second supplementary report for the Board of the Ministry, Lay Pastors Section.

Question 22: "Who are eligible to be appointed as:" (a) Full-time Lay Pastors? B. Helms (change from Introductory to First Year Studies); Charles L. Pollock. (delete the name of Charles Nathan Burgess.) (c) Student Lay Pastors? David Randolph Atwood; Charles Nathan Burgess.

Question 31: "Who have been elected deacons?" Julian Brice Helms, Jr.

Health and Welfare Ministries: Bishop Cannon asked J.F. Coble to submit the report of the Retirement Home Committee. Coble presented the report and moved for adoption. Paul Carruth spoke against the Coble report. W.A. Seawell spoke for the report. M.K. Glover asked the question: "Where is the money coming from to finance this expansion?" Coble answered by saying that much would come through Medicaid and that much is on hand through gifts and wills. Much would come through benevolent work.

George C. Megill moved a substitute motion that we refer this matter to the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance to be studied, and that they bring to us a plan for finances at the next Annual Conference. It was seconded. Coble spoke for his plan. H.L. Watson called for the previous question. His motion carried. Megill spoke and Coble spoke. The Megill motion was voted on and was adopted. The Coble motion was voted on and it carried.

Board of Education: Bishop Cannon called on H.S. Winberry to lead in presenting the report of the Board of Education. He submitted recommendations, including substitution of the Bennett College Appeal for Program Proposal 74, explaining that Race Relations Day as such was to be discontinued. He moved the adoption of the recommendations. They were adopted by the Conference.

Winberry then moved the adoption of the recommendations concerning distribution of College Sustaining Funds and Race Relations Sunday offerings, and the Campus Ministry. Those recommendations were also approved by the Conference.

Henry C. Ferrell presented a resolution concerning trustees in our colleges. It was ruled that his resolution constitutes a recommendation only.

Ed Cunningham was presented a certification as Director of Christian Education. He will serve in the Missouri Conference. Cunningham spoke with affection of his 42 years of service in the North Carolina Conference and expressed regret upon the occasion of his leaving and of necessity of moving his conference membership.

Dr. J.S. Blair presented a resolution concerning opposition to a proposed, Orange County Sanitary Landfill adjacent to Camp Chestnut Ridge. The resolution was approved. (See 1972 *Journal*, Section V)

H.S. Winberry presented Dr. Cameron West, Vice President for Planning, University of North Carolina. Dr. West addressed the Conference. He was heard with great appreciation. Bishop Cannon expressed personal appreciation for Dr. West's frank open challenge to all North Carolina Methodists.

Personal Privilege: Paul Carruth moved that Dr. Cameron West's speech made available to all churches in the Conference. It was so ordered. (See 19 *Journal*, Section V).

Personal Privilege: Charles M. Litzenberger spoke concerning college work.

H.S. Winberry asked Kelly Wilson to present a resolution concerning Methodist Board of Education, Inc. It was adopted. (See *Journal*, Section V).

Winberry moved the adoption of the report as a whole. It was approved.

The Chair: Bishop Cannon asked W.C. Wilson to take the chair and preside. This was granted because this is the birthday of Mr. Wilson.

Continuing Education for Ministers: Paul Carruth was asked to present the report of the North Carolina Commission on Continuing Education for Ministers.

Personal Privilege: Carruth asked first to present the resolution of appreciation for Bishop William R. Cannon that had been read on other occasions. He requested the privilege of reading the resolution again and asking for its official adoption at the Annual Conference. He read the resolution. H.S. Garris asked that the resolution be approved by a standing vote. The resolution was adopted with applause and a standing vote.

Carruth asked Stuart C. Henry, secretary of the Commission on Continuing Education for Ministers, to make the report for the Commission. The report was adopted.

Carruth called on Dr. Paul Mickey, director of the Lay Pastors' School to make the report for the Lay Pastors' School. This report is given as information for the Conference.

Dr. Thomas Langford, Dean of the Duke Divinity School, was presented.

Carruth presented nominations for Pastor's School trustees. They are as follows:
Terms to expire 1976: J.H. Miller, Jr., W.W. Sherman, Jr.; Terms to expire 1977: A.H. Stone, J.H. McCallum, C.P. Morris, Paul Carruth; Terms to expire 1974: H. Winberry, W.H. Kirby, A.F. Fisher, L.C. Vereen.

Personal Privilege: W.C. Wilson spoke words of appreciation to the Conference and all who had contributed to his ministry.

The Chair: Bishop Cannon returned to the Chair. The hymn, "A Charge to Keep I Have" was sung by the Conference. Bishop Cannon led in prayer.

Consecration of Lay Workers: Bishop Cannon asked Troy J. Barrett to present those to be consecrated Lay Workers. They are: Associate in Christian Education, Mary Eugenia Beatty; Director of Christian Education, Carol Ann Tignor; Director of Christian Education, Wanda Gayle Walker. Bishop Cannon led the Service of Consecration of Lay Workers.

Mr. Barrett presented the report of the Committee on Lay Workers and moved for its adoption. It was adopted.

Women's Society of Christian Service: Bishop Cannon presented Mrs. D.K. Fry, president of the Women's Society of Christian Service in the Conference. She then addressed the Conference, giving the Annual Report.

Bishop Cannon presented Mrs. Thomas P. Green, President, Southeastern Jurisdiction Society-Guild, Louisville, Kentucky. Mrs. Green addressed the Conference. The Conference expressed appreciation for Mrs. Green's message by standing ovation.

Announcements: W.C. Wilson made an announcement. G.R. McKenzie asked

that the Conference send words of sympathy to C. Graham Nickens whose brother as died. It was so ordered.

Benediction: J.H. McCallum gave the benediction.

THIRD DAY, AFTERNOON SESSION

Wednesday, June 7, 1972

Opening: The session was convened at 2:00 P.M. in Page Auditorium, Duke University by Bishop William R. Cannon. He praised our song leader, The Reverend N. Burgess, and made reference to an album that The Reverend Mr. Burgess had recorded and that would be available in the Cokesbury display that afternoon. The hymn, "Rise Up, O Men of God," was sung, and prayer was led by W.W. Sherman.

Nominations: Bishop Cannon called on Mrs. Harold Mann to present nominations to various agencies. She read the list as follows: General Council on Ministries: W.F. Anderson, Mrs. Sam A. Dunn, N.W. Grant; Board of Church and Society: John M. Meares, Mrs. Charles Dorsett, J.V. Early; Board of Discipleship: L. Garrick, Mrs. Troy J. Barrett, C.H. Mercer; Board of Global Ministries: J.N. Gibson, Mrs. D.K. Fry, A.F. Fisher; Board of Higher Education and Ministry: Charles K. McAdams, Mrs. L.C. Vereen, W.J. Neese. They were nominated and will be sent to the Jurisdictional Council.

Board of the Ministry: J.H. Miller, Jr. was called on to present the section of the Board of the Ministry report dealing with the retired relation. The list is as follows of those who are retiring this year: Key Taylor, D.T. Goodwin, W.A. Tew, M.K. Glover. (At this point M.K. Glover appealed that he be granted sabbatical leave instead of the retired relation. C.H. Mercer made a statement about Glover's appointments, stating something of his record. The chairman of the Board of the Ministry stated that the Board voted to recommend retirement. Troy J. Barrett moved the previous question. The vote was taken and favored calling the previous question. The Bishop ruled that the clergy would convene at Trinity Church immediately following the service this evening. Barrett accepted this ruling.)

Miller continued the reading of the names of those retiring this year: J.C. Andrews, W.R. Steven, C.W. Barbee, G.W. Crutchfield. All but Glover were voted to retired relationship.

Disability Leave: C.H. Lancaster, Paul V. Evans, William T. Clarke, J. Bruce Turner, Frank D. Salmon, Charles E. Vale, Harry L. Rogers, Thomas H. House. These were voted upon and granted by the Conference.

Supernumerary: Walton N. Bass, Jr., J.W. Lineberger, Jr., Edgar Earl Whitley. These were voted upon and granted by the Conference.

Voluntary Location: W.S. Hopkins, Royce P. Jones, Harold B. Stanley, Joel Spell, Paul C. Gentry, Johnnie Joseph Williams, Jr., W.L. Barbee, H.L. Stauffer. These were voted upon and granted by the Conference.

Involuntary Location: Carson F. Tyson. This action was adopted by the Conference.

Withdrawal: Paul F. Fendt, D.K. Hanks, Larry Rutledge, F.T. Mahla, Harmon Smith, Larry Price. This action was adopted by the Conference.

Withdrawal Under Complaint: H.B. Jones. This action was adopted by the Conference.

Introduction: Bishop Cannon introduced Rev. H.S. McSwain, a member of the Western North Carolina Conference and Director of the Hinton Rural Life Center.

Board of Christian Social Concerns: Bishop Cannon called on Arthur Phillips Jr., to report for the Board. Phillips called attention to sheets of amendments and resolutions handed to members of the Conference yesterday. Goal 89 was moved by Phillips to be amended so as to be in harmony with the Social Principles of the United Methodist Church as adopted by the 1972 General Conference. James Coi raised the question as to whether an Annual Conference can vote on something that is in the Social Principles of the United Methodist Church. The Bishop ruled that this amendment is to correct a statement of our Conference so as to be in line with the Social Principles which are a law of our Church. If this were a resolution, it could be debated and voted upon but the Social Principles are already Church Law and not debatable. Goal 89 was accepted as amended.

Phillips read a statement about gun control, urging stronger laws by legislative action. He moved the addition to be added to Goal No. 89.

Russell Stott moved that item No. 2 be deleted. It was deleted.

Burwell Jackson moved that it all be deleted and that we consider only the statement of that General Conference. The Jackson motion lost. The vote on the report was taken, and the results were: For 177; Against, 194. The Statement was rejected.

Phillips presented a resolution concerning reform programs in prison system which constituted an addition to Goal 97. He moved the adoption of the resolution. H.L. Watson raised a question about the work of the Conference Program Council in allowing certain matters to be voted on. N.W. Grant said this in order. Don Evans suggested that things of this nature should be put in the hands of the delegates before the Conference begins. J.W. Page spoke against the recommendation. Rufus Stark spoke for the recommendation. Frank Lloyd spoke against the proposal. Stanley Smith spoke for the recommendation. The question was called. The calling of the question was sustained. The resolution was adopted by the Conference.

Phillips called on Charles M. Smith to present the section on World Peace. He called attention to the resolution on the war in Indochina to supplement Goal 100. He moved that it be accepted. John M. Cline made a substitute motion relative to the resolution on the war in Indochina. David Harbin spoke against the substitute motion. Brooks Patten spoke for the substitute motion. Robert Johnson spoke against the substitute. Paul Carruth moved that the substitute be amended. Cline accepted Carruth's amendment. The Cline substitute motion was carried. The Cline motion became the report and the Cline resolution was added to Goal 101.

Goals 98 through 104 were adopted as amended and with the resolutions added by the Conference.

Phillips asked the Conference stand and recite the Social Creed of the United Methodist Church to wit:

THE SOCIAL CREED

"We believe in God, the Creator of humanity, the natural world, and society; and in Jesus Christ, the Redeemer of creation."

believe in the Holy Spirit, through whom we receive God's gifts, and we repent of our sin in perverting those gifts to idolatrous ends.

We affirm the natural world as God's handiwork and dedicate ourselves to its preservation, enhancement, and faithful use by mankind.

We joyfully receive, for ourselves and others, the gifts of community, sex, marriage, and the family. We commit ourselves to the rights of women, children, youth, and the aged; to improvement of the quality of life; and to the rights and dignity of ethnic and religious minorities.

We believe in the right and duty of persons to work for the good of themselves and others, and in the protection of their welfare in so doing; in the rights to property, collective bargaining, and responsible consumption; and in the elimination of economic and social distress.

We dedicate ourselves to peace throughout the world and to the rule of law among nations.

We believe in the present and final triumph of God's Word in human affairs and gladly assume His commission to live the Gospel in the world."

Personal Privilege: Bishop Cannon expressed gratitude to the Conference for dinner held in his honor the preceding evening and the resolution honoring him which was adopted while he was out of the Conference and for every courtesy extended him, and for every forward movement during the past quadrennium.

Paine College: Bishop Cannon introduced W.L. Buffington and H.E. Robinson, representatives of Paine College. Both spoke briefly in the interest of the college.

Commission on Religion and Race: Robert L. Mangum was called on to present report of the Commission on Religion and Race. He asked Rose E. Townes to speak to the Conference. The report was adopted. Mangum presented goals 105-124 and recommendations No. 1 and No. 2 on page 39 of the Book of Recommendations. They were adopted. He also presented recommendation No. 3 on page 39 in the Book of Recommendations concerning the use of busing to achieve racial balance in the schools. J.S. Blair spoke for the recommendation. Eddie Stanton spoke against recommendation No. 3. W.A. Seawell moved the previous question. The motion was carried. The vote on the recommendation was 10-1. It was defeated.

Announcements: W.C. Wilson made announcements.

Benediction: T.H. House gave the benediction.

THIRD DAY, EVENING SESSION

Wednesday, June 7, 1972

Conference Convenes: The organ prelude, "Sonata II in C Major" by Giovanni Viviani, was rendered by the organist of Trinity United Methodist Church, with Gayne Cameron as guest trumpet soloist.

The service began at 7:30, with Bishop William R. Cannon as the presiding officer. The processional hymn, "Joyful, Joyful, We Adore Thee," was sung.

A.F. Fisher was the liturgist for the service which included The Confession, The Prayer of Our Lord, and The Act of Praise. W.K. Quick led in the Affirmation of Faith, The Korean Creed. Following the offering the Chancel Choir of Trinity Church sang "Spirit Divine, Attend Our Prayers" by M. Searle Wright.

W.A. Seawell presented those to be received into Associate Membership and a Probationary Members. Bishop Cannon received the groups. Associates: Richard C Hill, James W. Hicks, Jr., Richard F. THIRD DAY, ADJOURNED AFTERNOON SESSION

Wednesday, June 7, 1972

Statement: The session was convened at Trinity United Methodist Church. Bishop Cannon made a statement relative to our present position concerning one of our ministers. Bishop Cannon has asked the Board of The Ministry to bring in a solution.

Bar of the Conference: R.W. Pritchard moved that the bar of the Conference be the sanctuary of the church to include those eligible to vote. It was approved.

Rules: James Coile moved that pages 16-19 of the 1971 Conference *Journal* be the rules of this adjourned session. The motion carried.

J.H. Miller, Jr. was called to state position of the Board. He said he had talked with M.K. Glover to ask if he would accept the supernumerary relation for the next three years when he would be eligible for retirement. Glover said he would not. But he did say that he would accept a student appointment. Bishop Cannon asked Norwood Jones if these years as a student would require pension credit. Jones answered that it would not. The secretary of the Cabinet, C.H. Mercer, stated that the Cabinet would appoint Glover to a student appointment. Seawell said it would be acceptable to the Board of The Ministry. Bishop Cannon stated that he would give Glover a graduate student appointment this year, and as professor when invited by an institution.

Motion: John K. Ormond moved that Dermont Reid be reinstated so that he could be transferred to the Kansas Conference to receive an appointment. W.A.

awell said that the motion was out of order. Bishop Cannon said that if the motion is out of order there is no need to pursue the matter.

A motion was made to adjourn. Bishop Cannon declared the session closed.

FOURTH DAY MORNING SESSION

Thursday, June 8, 1972

Love Feast: Beginning at 8:30 the traditional Love Feast was observed with J. Starnes, presiding. He was assisted by G.W. Blount, E.C. Crawford, T.R. Perkins and E.R. Shuller.

Opening: The Conference convened with Bishop William R. Cannon presiding.

Statement: Bishop Cannon explained that the case of M.K. Glover was resolved and that Glover will be assigned as student.

He also explained the case of a ministerial member who located voluntarily two years ago. The Board of The Ministry did not recommend that this member be reinstated. He stated that the case is not before us now.

Statistician: W.C. Wilson nominated D.D. Traynham for statistician. J.W. Page moved that he be elected by acclamation. It was so done.

Personal Privilege: A.F. Fisher asked Mrs. J.A. Auman to come to the platform. He expressed appreciation and presented her a gift from the Cabinet and W. Grant. Bishop Cannon also spoke words of praise and appreciation.

Nominations: C.H. Mercer presented the nominations for the Boards, Commissions and Committees, making the necessary changes. Mercer moved that should further changes need to be made, the Cabinet be authorized to make them. This was moved and adopted. All nominations were moved and were adopted by the Conference. He also moved that all Commissions, Boards and Committees meet at Methodist College, June 24 for the purpose of organization. The Conference so ordered.

Mercer also nominated Grier L. Garrick as Conference Lay Leader. He was elected by standing vote.

Question 18: What local churches have been: (a) Organized? (See Condensed Minutes) (b) Merged? (See Condensed Minutes.)

Question 19: What changes have been made in the district and charge lines? (See Condensed Minutes.)

Question 48: Who are appointed to attend school? (a) Associate Member? (b) Probationary Member? (c) Members in Full Connection? (See Condensed Minutes.)

Question 53: What changes have been made in the appointments since last Annual Conference Session? (See Condensed Minutes.)

Moving Date: C.H. Mercer moved that the moving date be set as Thursday, June 15, 1972. The motion carried.

Questions 1-17: W.C. Wilson called Questions 1-17. He stated these questions have been answered in previous sessions. They were approved.

Question 39: W.C. Wilson called the names of men transferred out: Allen C. Penour (P), to West Virginia Conference, August 10, 1971; Joseph L. Allen, to

North Texas Conference, March 30, 1972; Justin Haruyama, to New York Conference, May 2, 1972; and Robert D. Bryant, to Kentucky Conference, June 1972. The transfers were approved by the Conference.

Council on Ministries: N.W. Grant made a statement urging all Board and Commission members to be present at the meeting at Methodist College on June 24. In order to provide for a smooth transition in program implementation during the coming year, Grant stated, "I move that the Council on Finance and Administration in consultation with the chair persons of the various Board Divisions and other involved agencies be authorized to re-adjust budget items where necessary, to make possible adequate funds for each for the areas within the new structure."

Health and Welfare Ministries: J.L. Joyce called on James G. White to make the report. Additional nominations for the various organizations were moved and adopted. J.W. Lineberger, Sr. spoke concerning the Methodist Home for Children. Vassar Jones spoke to the Conference about the program SEMAR. (Southeastern Methodist Agency for the Retarded). Goal 125 was moved and adopted. Harvey Johnson made a supplemental report for the Joint Committee on Disability asking that Paul Evans be granted emergency leave and assistance from the Emergency Aid Fund. The report was moved and adopted.

Commission on Ecumenical Affairs: Paul Carruth submitted the report of the Commission on Ecumenical Affairs. Goals 126-131 and the report were adopted by the Conference.

Fund for Reconciliation: N.W. Grant asked for permission to make full report in the *North Carolina Christian Advocate*. It was so ordered.

Parsonage Standards: Stanley Smith presented the matter concerning parsonage standards. He moved that the amendment made in the Monday afternoon session be reconsidered. The Conference voted to reconsider. Smith moved deletion of the Jones Amendment. Norwood Jones spoke against the motion. C. Hubbard spoke for the motion. The vote was taken on the Smith motion. It carried. The original Ponder motion was approved with the deletion of the Jones amendment.

Ponder moved that Bishop Cannon appoint the Parsonage Committee after the Conference. The motion carried.

Commission on Worship: Bishop Cannon asked J. Malloy Owen, III, to submit the report of the Commission on Worship. Programs 132 and 133 were moved and adopted by the Conference. J.J. Rudin made statements concerning the new alternate communion ritual and the Music Conference at Lake Junaluska.

Archives and History: W.K. Quick presented the report of the Commission on Archives and History. C.F. Grill was asked to speak concerning the 200th anniversary of the coming of Joseph Pilmore to North Carolina.

G.R. McKenzie invited all possible to attend the September 28th celebration. George Harrington, lay delegate from Pilmore Memorial Church spoke words of welcome and encouraged large attendance at the celebration. Quick asked for renewed effort to obtain local church histories. The report was moved and adopted. Bishop Cannon responded with gracious words concerning Quick's work across the Church at large.

Personal Privilege: Rufus Stark spoke concerning the history of Grace Church

Wilmington. Ben Ivey gave words of invitation and welcome to attend the 175th Anniversary of Grace Church on October 8.

Personal Privilege: Preston Jones spoke of his call to the ministry, his educational training and his ministry.

Michael Smith made a questioning statement about nominations, recognizing that some persons have been nominated for more than one Board or Agency. C.H. Mercer explained the work of the Cabinet in making nominations.

Motion was made that we reconsider nomination. It was ordered. Preston Jones was nominated to the Commission on Religion and Race. He was elected. Motion was made that the vacancy on Board of Education be filled by the Cabinet. It was so ordered.

Commission on Communications: W.K. Quick and John Hobbs presented the report for the Commission on Communications. Quick spoke of the historic nature of this Conference.

Motion Concerning Conference Secretary: H.L. Watson requested that the Mercer resolution which was tabled Monday be lifted from the table. It was done. Watson proposed a substitute resolution concerning a study of the job function of the Conference Secretary and of the Statistician. He moved the adoption of the resolution. It was adopted.

District Conference Records: John White presented the report of the Committee on District Conference Records. It was adopted.

Committee on Minutes: H.S. Garris made the report for the Committee on Minutes. It was approved.

Registration: Registration for this Annual Conference was: Laymen, 358; Clerical, 612; Total 970. This report was submitted by Hazel Collier and Bill Undermilk, Co-chairmen for Registration.

Conference Statistician: D.D. Traynham, Statistician for the Conference made report (See 1972 *Journal*, Sections V and VII.)

Charles K. McAdams reported that five districts—Burlington, Durham, Lenoirville, Goldsboro and Sanford—have paid 99% or more on the Single-Figure Rating. The Goldsboro and Sanford Districts have paid 100%.

Announcement: W.C. Wilson made an announcement concerning the information card each pastor must turn in within 10 days of adjournment of Annual Conference. He introduced Kimsey King and urged support for him.

Personal Privilege: Harvey Johnson spoke words of commendation to W.C. Wilson for providing the Conference with an Interim Conference Directory and hoped the new Secretary would continue the practice.

Conference Secretary: Kimsey King, Conference Secretary elect, made a brief statement expressing his gratitude for the confidence of the Conference, the ministry of W.C. Wilson, and his personal desire to be of maximum service.

Conference Treasurer: James H. Coile asked the question if the Conference Treasurer had been elected. W. C. Wilson said that it had been done.

Coile also moved that the programs and goals of the Conference as printed in the Book of Resolutions as amended be declared official, particularly those sections through item 140. It was so ordered.

North Carolina Council of Churches: Reverend Sam Wiley was introduced to the Conference. He is Executive Secretary of the North Carolina Council of Churches.

Committee on Conference Entertainment: T.A. Collins called on L. Stac Weaver and Wallace Kirby to issue an invitation for the holding of the 1973 session of the Conference. The invitation was extended for the 1973 session of the Conference to be held at Methodist College, Fayetteville. It was accepted.

Committee on Resolutions and References: J.C.P. Brown presented the resolution of the Committee on Resolutions and References. It was adopted.




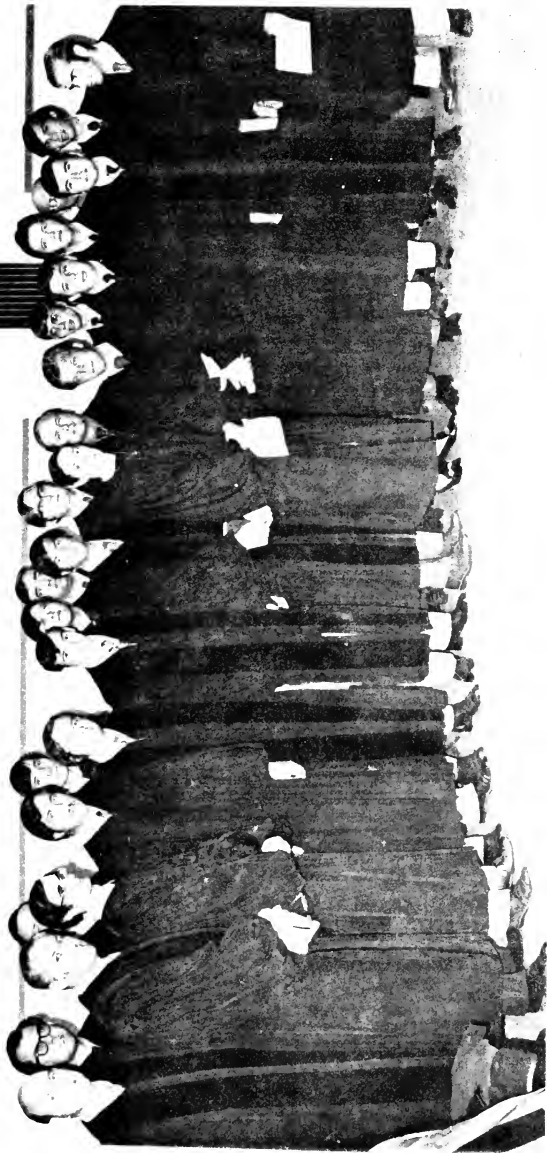

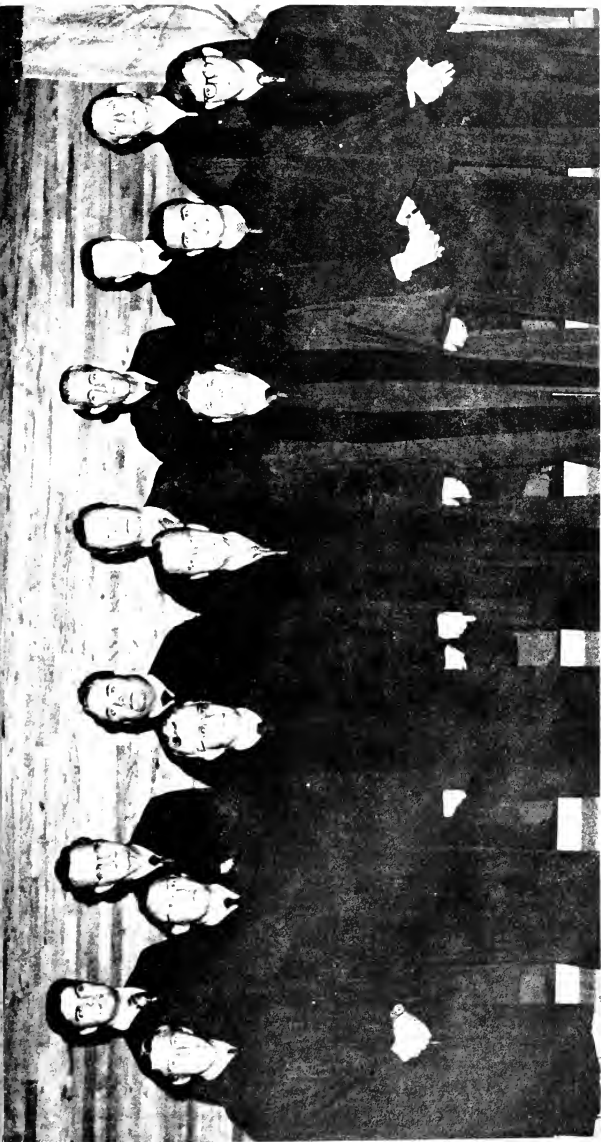

DWIGHT A. PETTY

1889 - 1971

Rev. Dwight A. Petty was born on March 5, 1889, in Chatham County, son of Isaac Newton and Catherine Brown Petty. At an early age his family moved to Durham which became his home town.



He was married to Miss Pearl Griffin of Durham on October 1, 1918. Two sons were born of this marriage. They are Burke L. Petty and Bernard G. Petty. Both are living with their mother in Rose Hill.

Rev. Petty was graduated from Trinity College in 1914 and in December the same year joined the North Carolina Conference, where he served well and efficiently for forty two and a half years. While busy serving the churches Rev. Petty felt a need of higher education, and went to Yale Divinity School, where he received his B.D. degree in 1927. While studying at Yale he served as pastor of Methodist Church at Wallingford, Conn.

During his ministry in the North Carolina Conference three new churches were organized. Two parsonages and three churches were built and several other parsonages and churches were remodeled.

He served the following charges: Bahama Circuit, Burlington Circuit, Piedmont Circuit at East Rockingham, Clark Street, Rocky Mount; Williamston, Swepsonville

Halifax, Erwin, Stantonsburg, and Rose Hill.

With Rev. Petty, faith and works went hand in hand. He gave his unbounded energy to work for Christ's kingdom, and his zeal never faltered. Every charge he served was left improved, spiritually as well as physically. Not only the people of the Methodist Church but all in the community found a friend in him. His sermons reflected his scholarly mind and his deep and sincere communication with his heavenly Father and were preached with conviction that he was speaking God's words.

The happiness he spread along his way left a monument of love in the hearts of each one who knew him. His humility, sincerity and brotherly love brought happiness and cheer to all. The smile on his face, and his cheery greeting evidenced the trust and happiness of the life within.

Whenever friends meet and speak of Mr. Petty, it will be with appreciation of his wonderful spirit.

This warrior of the cross, age 82, passed away suddenly at his home in Rose Hill, on Saturday, June 19, 1971. His funeral services were conducted on Monday, June 21, at 2 o'clock at the Rose Hill United Methodist Church. The Rev. David L. Moe and Rev. W. J. Neese, Wilmington District Superintendent, conducted the services.

Beside his wife and sons, he is survived by a sister, Mrs. Alma J. Alling, of St. Petersburg, Fla.

FRENCH R. LOWRY

1869 - 1971

Reverend French R. Lowry was born to Calvin and Maria Sampson Lowry in Robeson County, North Carolina, on April 11, 1869. He lived one hundred and two years and died July 6, 1971, in the Methodist Retirement Home in Durham, North Carolina. He is survived by three sons, Rev. Talmadge Lowry, W. Q. A. Lowry, and Jesse Edens Lowry; six daughters, Mrs. John Coats, Mrs. John L. Locklear, Mrs. Rosa Raines, Mrs. Annie Pearl Jacobs, Mrs. Herman Hunt, and Mrs. Bertha Lucas; one sister, Mrs. Nancy L. Revels; one brother, Rev. D. F. Lowry; forty-four grandchildren; one hundred and sixty-six great-grandchildren, and fifty great-great-grandchildren.



Funeral services for Reverend Lowry were conducted July 11, 1971, at First United Methodist Church in Pembroke, North Carolina, by Reverend Henry A. Bizzell, Jr., Reverend Julian Ransom, Reverend Graham S. Eubank, Reverend Robert L. Mangum, and Reverend Joseph F. Coble. He was buried in the Hopewell Methodist Church Cemetery near Pembroke.

The son of a proud and resourceful family, Reverend Lowry was educated in the public schools of Robeson County. In addition, he attended the Normal School located at Pate (near Pembroke, N. C.) This Normal School

as developed into Pembroke State University.

During his long life, Reverend Lowry pursued three careers. Following the tradition of his family, he was a farmer. In addition, he taught in the public schools for thirty years. In this profession, Mr. Lowry rendered a valuable service to the Indian people of Robeson County. Nonetheless, he is remembered primarily as a minister. In the later years he often stated that he had proclaimed the Gospel of Jesus Christ for seventy-five years. He served the church in the following connections:

Atlantic Mission Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, Blue Ridge Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, Lumbee Mission Conference of the Holiness Methodist Church, North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Church, and the North Carolina Conference of the United Methodist Church.

In reviewing the basic facts of the life of Reverend French Lowry one is reminded of the words of one of his favorite scripture selections, the Twenty-third Psalm of David:

The Lord is my shepherd; I shall not want.

He maketh me to lie down in green pastures: he leadeth me beside the still waters.

He restoreth my soul: he leadeth me in the paths of righteousness for his name's sake.

Yea, though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil: for thou art with me; thy rod and thy staff, they comfort me.

Thou preparest a table before me in the presence of mine enemies; thou anointest my head with oil; my cup runneth over.

Surely, goodness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life; and I will dwell in the house of the Lord for ever.

Charles Denver Hicks, Jr. was born to Charles and Margaret Hicks on December 23, 1949, in Wayne County. He was graduated from Charles B. Aycock High School, Pikeville, North Carolina, in June of 1968. Upon graduating from high school he enrolled in Mount Olive Junior College, where he became a Dean's List student, receiving an A.S. degree in 1970. At the time of his death, Charles was a rising senior at Atlantic Christian College. He was married to the former Donna Lancaster and from this marriage they had one daughter, Judith Ann.



The life span of Charles Denver Hicks, Jr. was not long, but his contribution to life while he was a part of it was significant. During his early years he was not nurtured in the church. It was through his wife, Donna, during their courtship, that he first started attending Sunday School and Church at Mount Carmel United Methodist Church. Through this experience he became more and more interested in the Christian life. His new interest in the church led him to join Mount Carmel United Methodist Church, and he involved himself in many ways in the life of the church.

Even though he joined the church and entered into many of its activities, he felt himself being called in a more significant manner. This searching culminated in a heartwarming experience one Sunday in which he gave himself totally to Jesus Christ. In his application for License to Preach, Charles wrote about this call in this manner: "Then one Sunday, I gave my life to Christ. I was saved by his grace. Things were never the same after that. Now I had a life of meaning and fulfillment. I realized the things that God had done for me and I also realized how little I had done for Him."

Charles' "heartwarming" experience was followed shortly by his call to the ministry. In June of 1969, he was given a student appointment at Elm Street United Methodist Church, in Goldsboro. His ministry in this church was rich and meaningful. His people loved him and his family. After two years at Elm Street, he was assigned to the South Smithfield Charge, but was there only two months before his untimely death.

Charles' death came about noon on July 23, 1971, in a small farm pond near Smithfield. Again involved with his young people, he had gone fishing with two of the boys from one of the churches on the Charge. The small boat they were using capsized. The two boys were able to make their way to shore, but Charles could not swim, and in his panic he drowned. The tragic accident ended the promising life of a young clergyman.

It was my happy privilege to grant Charles a License to Preach, to participate in his marriage to Donna, and to be his District Superintendent. It was my sad responsibility, along with his pastor, J. Hillary Bryant, to conduct his funeral at the Mount Carmel United Methodist Church, and to accompany his body to its place of burial in the Pikeville Cemetery.

Throughout these brief years, Charles Hicks never seemed discouraged or disheartened. He always had a big smile and a warm heart. He was vibrant, filled with a deep sense of mission, always willing to stand and affirm it. Here was a man who had less than three years in the ministry, but whose contribution cannot be measured in time. For, you see, he was a minister for Jesus Christ and for the brief period of his ministry, he wore the mantle with distinction, preserving the tradition of which he was a part.

JOHN FRANKLIN CASEY

1914 - 1971

John Franklin Casey was one of those rare spirits who reminds us of the words of Jesus from the Sermon on the Mount: "Blessed are the pure in heart; for they shall see God."

John exemplified in a remarkable way the qualities of humility and love, "the fruit of the Spirit," as Paul called them. It could be said of him what was said of an Old Testament saint long ago: "And Enoch walked with God; and he was not, for God took him."



When John was sick in bed, unable to preach, a minister friend of his and mine said to me: "John is a greater blessing to his people lying sick in the parsonage than most of us are preaching every Sunday in the pulpit." During the Conference year of 1970-71, much of the time he was sick, and yet I understand that he led his district in the number of people won to Christ.

His good wife, Miriam who cared for him so lovingly "in sickness and in health," wrote to me of him: "In the thirteen years he was permitted to serve his Lord as a pastor in the church, he suffered much physical pain but never once did he complain. Brother Wade," Miriam continued, "he was a humble man, filled with love for his fellow man, and he loved the Lord."

Born in Stonewall, N. C., Aug. 8, 1914, John graduated from Stonewall High School in 1934. In his early youth he was a member of the Free Will Baptist Church, the church of his parents, but later became a Methodist. He gave his life to Christ at twelve years of age while doing janitorial work in the Stonewall Methodist Church. In October of 1954, at the age of forty, he declared for the first time, "I want to preach." In 1958, he resigned his Civil Service work at Cherry Point, and accepted a pastoral appointment to the Midway-Bethlehem Charge. In order to strengthen his ministry, even at the age of forty-four, he dared to enter Louisburg College, from which he graduated in the spring of 1961. In addition he attended the Pastors' School at Duke Divinity School for four summers. He received his Local Preacher's License in 1957, his Deacon's Orders in 1963, and his Elder's Orders in 1967.

While serving the Midway-Bethlehem Charge a new parsonage was built and furnished and paid for. His second appointment was the Vanceboro Charge, where he preached to each of the three churches on that Charge every Sunday. The Epworth Church built a Fellowship Hall and named it the Casey Fellowship Hall. In 1970, he was appointed to the Myrna Charge which he served until sickness forced him to retire.

John died with cancer at Pitt Memorial Hospital, October 27, 1971. A fitting memorial service was held at Trinity United Methodist Church and his body was laid to rest in the Greenleaf Memorial Park in New Bern, N. C.

John is survived by his wife, Miriam Matthews Casey; three children, eight grandchildren, and two sisters.

There is no finer way to close this memoir than to quote these words of his dear wife Miriam: "John put Christ at the head of his life and he lived to bring honor and glory to his Master. He lived for Christ and now he lives in Christ."

ROBERT LEROY JEROME

1901 - 1971

Robert Leroy Jerome, son of Conder Parson and Flora Gray Jerome, was born in Gatesville, North Carolina, September 26, 1901. He died in Southern Pines, North Carolina, December 3, 1971, following the collision of his car and a truck during a snow storm.

Funeral services were conducted in Page Memorial United Methodist Church, Aberdeen, of which he had been pastor since June, 1969, by Dr. Joyce V. Early, superintendent of the Sanford District, the Reverend Vergil E. Queen of Southern Pines United Methodist Church and Don Roberts, a student pastor, of Duke University Divinity School. From Aberdeen his body was taken to Smithfield, North Carolina, for burial. Graveside services were conducted by the Reverend Vergil E. Queen and the Reverend F. Owen Fitzgerald, Jr., pastor of Centenary United Methodist Church, Smithfield, where Robert and his wife served four years prior to their going to Aberdeen, and where they had purchased a house for their retirement.

Robert Jerome was well equipped in every way for the work to which God had called him, as a good minister of the Lord Jesus Christ. His education was extensive and thorough. In 1926, he received an A.B. degree from Duke University, after being graduated Magna Cum Laude, and

also elected to Phi Beta Kappa, a national scholastic fraternity. In 1929 he received the B.D. degree from Duke University Divinity School, and in 1932 the S.T.M. degree from Union Theological Seminary, New York City.

In his outstanding ministry, he had a most capable, charming, cooperative and loving helpmate, the former Miss Jean Porter of Franklin, North Carolina, to whom he was married in 1935. To this union two lovely and talented children were born: a son, Robert Lyle, and a daughter, Jean Gray.

Robert is survived by his wife, Mrs. Jean Porter Jerome; a son, Lyle Jerome of Hollywood, Fla.; daughter, Mrs. Frank H. Avent, and two grandchildren of Florence, S. C.; four sisters, Mrs. E. S. Bowers of Jackson; Mrs. Gladys J. Herring and Mrs. Robert C. Rapp, both of Thomasville; and Mrs. W. P. Holt, Jr., of Erwin, and one brother, J. T. Jerome, of Raleigh. Robert had the high privilege of being born and reared in a Methodist parsonage. His father, the Reverend C. P. Jerome, served effectively in the Methodist ministry for 47 years. Robert not only grew up in the intellectual and spiritual atmosphere of a Methodist minister's home, with the love and guidance of deeply spiritual and dedicated parents, but also had the unique experience of being appointed to his first charge in 1925, the same year his father retired, and to the same charge from which his father retired—Elm Street, Pikeville. Thus, he and his father together gave 91 consecutive years of service to Christ and the Methodist Church as good ministers. Other charges he served in the North Carolina Conference are: Webb Avenue, Burlington; Enfield-Whitakers; Trinity, Wilmington; Hayes Barton, Raleigh; Centenary, New Bern; First Church, Elizabeth City; First Church, Roanoke Rapids; superintendent of the Elizabeth City District; Centenary, Smithfield, and Page Memorial, Aberdeen.

During these years as pastor and district superintendent, he also served the church as his Lord in many other capacities through the various agencies of the church—as a member of many of the major boards and committees of the Conference, as a trustee of North Carolina Wesleyan College, and as a delegate to the Jurisdictional Conference in 1964. In every post of duty, he served faithfully and effectively, with complete dedication and with the love and respect of both the laity and the clergy.

It has been my privilege, pleasure and good fortune to know and be closely associated with my good friend, Robert Jerome, for more than 45 years. During all these years I always proved to be a man of high integrity, genuine sincerity, loyal devotion, strong faith and deep spiritual insight. He was a good preacher, a compassionate pastor, an efficient administrator, a devoted husband, a loving father, a helpful citizen and a true friend. I knew, loved and served the Lord with joy and gladness, and above all was faithful to



d. He fought a good fight; he kept the faith, and he has finished his course in this world. Our Master said, "Be thou faithful unto death, and I will give thee a crown of life." Robert was faithful even until death. I am sure the Great Master has awarded him the crown of life which he so richly deserves.

1892 - 1972

John F. McEachin exemplified qualities that marked him as a good and spiritual neighbor to all and as a person who stood above the crowd. One of his neighbors said she had never known a man in Hoke County who influenced as many people's lives for good as Reverend McEachin and she doubts that there will ever be another to take his place in her lifetime.



John was born in Blue Spring Township, North Carolina, on September 16, 1892, of Needham and Maggie McEachin. After spending his childhood and youth on a farm with ten other brothers and sisters, he met and married the late Mary Helen Davis. From this union came eleven lovely children. This beautiful union came to an end after fifty-three years of marriage, on June 10, 1966, when his loving wife passed away.

John McEachin's life was his great ministry. He prepared for the ministry by attending seminary school in Greensboro and by having great faith in the Lord Jesus. He is remembered by those who knew and loved him not because he preached great sermons or because he was a great leader of men, but because he lived a beautiful and inspiring life, and because he influenced so many people in so many ways.

He served and worked faithfully at Hoffman and Millers, and the churches on the Red Springs Circuit which included Millers, St. Peters and St. Marks. WALTER LUTHER DAWSON, JR.

1900 - 1972

The Reverend Walter Dawson, Jr. was born February 14, 1900, at Statesville, North Carolina. He attended high school at Rutherfordton, North Carolina, Asbury College at Morehead, Kentucky, and Trinity College. His father, Rev. W. L. Dawson, Sr., was a Methodist minister. In the latter part of 1893, the McWhorters were called to serve in California. Having accepted the call, they made the move with their four-month-old daughter and they lived in California ten pleasant and rewarding years, serving four pastorates, the city of Alameda being their last.

Because of the serious illness of Mrs. McWhorter's father in 1902, they decided to move back to the South. There was no appointment open in Alabama so Mr. McWhorter accepted a call from the Methodist Church in Southport in North Carolina. He served the church for eighteen months and was then moved to Maxton where he served three years as pastor and three years as president of Maxton College.

After Maxton, the McWhorters served pastorates in Tarboro, Morehead City, New Bern, Chapel Hill, Aberdeen, Wilson, Lumberton, Enfield, and Weldon. Upon leaving Weldon they returned to Tarboro where they lived one year at the end of which they returned to their home in Raleigh where they lived for six years until the death of Mr. McWhorter in 1944.

Mrs. McWhorter was a wonderful helpmate and a devoted wife. She loved and made a pleasant home for her family and entertained in a gracious manner. Her friends were always welcome. She made many friends all through the years as a preacher's wife, but her greatest pleasure was to give of her help and strength freely to those who were sick and needy and were in distress.

During the latter years of her life Mrs. McWhorter was remarkably active, mentally alert and keenly interested in community and world affairs. To the end of her life she lived abundantly, cheerfully, and bravely.

Mrs. McWhorter is survived by one son, one daughter, five grandchildren, ten great grandchildren, and six great-great-grandchildren.

Several years later, on December 28, 1920, they were united in the sacred bonds of holy matrimony and lived together and served God until they were separated by her death on January 9, 1972.

Elva Lowe truly traveled with Billy Lowe during his years of service. She added her charm and graced the parsonages at Henderson, Battleboro, and Whitakers, Plymouth, Aurora, Swan Quarter, Winfall, Trenton, Shallotte, Council, Pink Hill, Scott Hill and Oriental.

To this parsonage family our loving Father added the blessings of three children — two by birth and one by adoption. The children's names are Jane Blair Hollowell and Elizabeth Ann Faulkner. The adopted son is Thomas Edward Lowe.



Because of a physical condition, it became necessary for her husband to retire before their years of active service as minister and wife were accomplished. However, for a span of thirty-nine years, our Conference had the devoted service of these two Christians.

Many are the individuals and families who have been blessed by the presence of this soldier of the Cross. Many are the adults today who are enjoying the fruits of the Christian life because Elva Lowe came into their lives, teaching them to know Jesus as their Savior when they were small children.

She was an individual of rare spirit who learned, as did Paul, "to be content in whatever state she found herself." Her pleasure in life was to serve God with the resources at hand. She was always busy planting the seeds of faith, hope, beauty and love in the lives of all with whom she came in contact. It was her pleasure to teach Sunday School classes in most of the churches she and her husband served. She had her part in WSCS activities and used her voice in every choir.

I suppose the following quotation sums up all that could be said about Mrs. Lowe and the life she lived. The paragraph is taken from a letter from Mrs. Jane Hollowell to the writer:

"There are so many fine traits about my mother, I hardly know how to express them. What I loved most about my mother was her devotion to God, family and friends. Her gentle and cheerful spirit, the purity of life, and all the finer things of life. She loved music and would start singing any time she felt like it. One night while she was sleeping in my room with me, I was awakened by her humming one of her favorite hymns."

In 1950 Brother Lowe, Elva and Tommy returned to Aurora where they had served many years before. Here they rented a small home in which to live. However, one of the former members who had always loved the Methodist Church and had a deep, abiding appreciation for Methodist preachers and their families, left a small house to the Aurora Methodist Church. This house was to be used by retired preachers who had served the appointment.

The Lowes were able to spend many happy years together there among friends and neighbors who had shared former years with them. Because of Brother Lowe's physical condition, they were received into the care of the Methodist Retirement Home in Durham, North Carolina, where they continued to express God's faithful love and grace to all the associates, friends, neighbors, and those they chanced to meet.

Failing health and the weight of years confined Sister Lowe to the infirmary and God Angel of Death came for her January 9, 1972.

The funeral service was held in Aurora, North Carolina on January 11th. The ministers were Dr. Joseph F. Coble, Superintendent of the Methodist Retirement Home, and Reverend John W. Yount, pastor in charge of the Aurora appointment.

Thus, Almighty God claimed for Himself and for all eternity one who had lived "beautiful life" for Him.

MRS. MARY COWELL GLASS

1889 - 1972

Mrs. Mary Cowell Glass was born March 17, 1889, in the town of Bayboro, North Carolina, the daughter of John F. Cowell and Sally Baxter Cowell. She attended the local school and upon completion of her studies entered Woman's College, Richmond, Virginia, and graduated with honors. She later taught in the Washington, North Carolina public schools.



On December 28, 1922, Mary Cowell married Henry Iverson Glass and, thereby, began a more active life of service in the Lord's vineyard. Together Dr. and Mrs. Glass shared the challenges, opportunities, and joys of the itinerant ministry of the Methodist Church. Dr. Glass departed this life December 23, 1968.

As the wife of a Methodist minister, Mrs. Glass served both church and community well. Her community activities included service with the Red Cross, the Girl Scout Executive Council, the Executive Committee of the Young Women's Christian Association and regent of Caswell-Nash Chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution, Raleigh, North Carolina.

In her church activities Mrs. Glass served as superintendent of the Children's Division of the Board of Education in the North Carolina Conference, as teacher of adult classes, as member of the executive committee of the

Conference Board of Missions and Church Extension, as member of the Long-Range Planning Committee of Methodist Homes, as trustee of Pfeiffer College, as member of the executive committee of the Methodist College Foundation, as president of the Women's Society of Christian Service of the North Carolina Conference, and as a delegate of both the General Conference and the Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference of the Methodist Church. Truly, she served her Lord through her church.

Mary Glass joined her husband in the land of eternal day February 22, 1972. Funeral services were conducted for her in the First United Methodist Church, Washington, North Carolina, February 26, 1972, by the Reverend Horace S. Garris and the Reverend Howard McLamb. It is unique that her memorial service was held in the same church where in 1894 Henry Iverson Glass was ordained a deacon and admitted into the ministry of the Methodist Church, where she married Dr. Glass in 1922, and where they served as the pastoral family from 1928-1932. Her life touched many of us, and we are the better for it.

In 1956 Mary Cowell Glass, as president of the Conference Women's Society of Christian Service, addressed a meeting of that Conference body. The theme of her message was "Looking Backward — Thinking Forward." She gave a resumé of the work for the quadrennium just ended, and then she showed something of her vision as it concerned the future. Her "forward thinking" in 1956 must be our "forward thinking" in this day. She wrote:

"As we enter a new quadrennium we face unbelievable opportunities and problems . . . Delinquency, both parental and youthful, is already a problem and must claim the attention of Christian women. In the days ahead we shall need a new measure of adventurous faith, some such passion of sacrifice as has made men and women brave and faithful . . . We shall need to stand by our visions, to turn and meet the quick winds that are ushering in a new era. In the Pitti Palace, Florence, Italy, there is a design of an airplane by the great painter, Leonardo Da Vinci. On the margin, written in his own handwriting, is the inscription: 'There shall be wings.' There is a heartening thought for us in these days in this. There shall be wings, not only physical wings, but wings of loyalty, faith, courage; wings of peace, wings to fight prejudice, fear and hatred; wings to fight intolerance and complacency and injustice; wings of religion, prayer and song; wings of love, sympathy and concern . . . 'They who wait on the Lord shall mount up with wings as eagles, they shall not be weary, they shall walk and not faint.'"

This reminded me of the song, "If I Couldn't Say Word, I'd Just Wave My Hand." Finally, the end had come for a dear and wonderful lady. ". . . For I am now ready to be offered, and the time of my departure is at hand; I have fought a good fight, I have kept the faith. Henceforth, there is laid up for me a crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous Judge, shall give me at that day."

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GROUP A: AGENCY ANNUAL REPORTS FOR 1971-1972

THE COMMISSION ON ARCHIVES AND HISTORY

One of the more memorable statements from the Celebration of the Bicentennial of Francis Asbury's Arrival in America, September 3-5, 1971, was the caution: "If we forget those who came before us, we deserve to be forgotten by those who come after us."

A. The Commission on Archives and History during the conference year just ending, has continued to obtain local church histories within the North Carolina Annual Conference. These histories can best tell the story of "those who came before us" and provide the Commission with valuable information about the "history of North Carolina Methodism." Especially do we need the history of local Indian and Black United Methodist churches. As the local history is updated, all ministers and local church historians are requested to send a copy to the historian of the Conference.

B. The 1971-72 year saw some significant historical observances in which the Conference commission members shared. The aforementioned Asbury Bicentennial, chaired by our commission chairman, drew eighty of the more than five hundred delegates to the national observance. A total of 1,800 persons shared in the Labor Day weekend activities at which our own Bishop William R. Cannon was a major speaker. Bishop Cannon spoke on the topic "Francis Asbury: Prophetic Itinerant and Designer of American Methodism." A number of Commission delegates attended from throughout the conference.

The Commission chairman was asked to represent the Southeastern Jurisdiction to speak at the October observance of Asbury's Arrival at Old St. George's in Philadelphia and John Street Church in New York City.

C. In the late fall of 1971, planning began on the observance of the "Bicentennial of Methodism in North Carolina." Invitations were issued to the Western North Carolina Conference Commission to share in joint sponsorship.

Other Methodist denominations were also asked to share in the state-wide observance. Plans were drawn for a day-long celebration at Currituck Courthouse on September 28, 1972 - the 200th anniversary of Joseph Pilmore's first sermon in North Carolina. Dr. Frederick Maser, executive secretary of the World Methodist Historical Society, of Philadelphia and editor of *Joseph Pilmore's Journal* will give the Keynote Address. The major afternoon speaker will be Bishop Herbert Bell Shaw of Wilmington, a member of the executive committee of the World Methodist Council. The Rev. C. Franklin Grill of Scotland Neck was elected as Program Chairman of this planning committee.

D. The Commission continues to sponsor the worship services monthly at Whitaker's Chapel, one of our sixteen national shrines. We have also supported the efforts of the Washington County Historical Society in the renovation of historic Rehoboth Church which was officially opened during the year.

E. The Commission endorsed the project of the Conference Pictorial Directory. The 1971-72 Directory - the first for the conference since the pictures of the ministers of the 1887 Conference - should be periodically updated. It should be a valuable pictorial reference not only for these days but for historical purposes.

F. The Chairman should like publicly to thank the Conference and the Commission members for their interest and cooperation during the quadrennium. We believe that the Conference Commission has made many contributions during the past four years. Our past has been remembered but we have also made history in our own time!

The Raleigh Area is a vital part of the "cradle of American Methodist history."

THE COMMITTEE ON CHURCH ARCHITECTURE

The Committee on Church Architecture, in cooperation with the several agencies of the Annual Conference, has assisted in giving special emphasis to thorough study and programming a prerequisite to architectural designing. "Translating Program into Space" was the theme of the meeting December 14, 1971, in which Mr. Dennis B. Nicholson, architect, made the presentation.

The Annual Joint Meeting on March 6, 1972, gave added emphasis to the significance of thorough planning prior to construction. The Reverend James L. Doom, minister and architect, presided in a presentation of church architecture's challenge to serve the church effectively.

In addition to resource materials, professional counseling services can be made available through the Committee on Church Architecture in cooperation with the District Superintendent.

The Committee calls to your attention the services of the Conference Review Committee, which serves to evaluate preliminary architectural plans and prepare reports for local churches, District Boards of Church Location and Building, the Board of Missions, etc.

As a servant, architecture will continue to play a significant role in the total ministry of the Christian Church as it provides space for worship, nurture, fellowship and service.

An additional emphasis is that of utilization of existing buildings. It is important that investment be made in only the space needed to minister to the needs of the people.

Carver's Creek Church, located in Bladen County, was one of the two churches selected for recognition under the Randolph E. DuMont Design Program. Mr. Frank Ballard, the architect, designed the church in a project of refurbishing the 100-year-old sanctuary designed by Sir Christopher Wren, and in the erection of a new educational building.

Meetings scheduled are Tuesday, December 5, 1972, and Monday, March 5, 1973.

THE BOARD OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL CONCERNS

The Board of Christian Social Concerns furnished scholarships for approximately a dozen persons at the Southeastern Jurisdictional conference on Christian Social Concerns at Lake Junaluska in July, 1971. The president of the board served as a leader at this enterprise.

The board has worked in close cooperation with the Commission on Christian Social Action Ministries of the North Carolina Council of Churches in planning the Church and Community seminar held in cooperation with North Carolina State University in March and in helping plan a series of "engagement-reflection" seminars on welfare and poverty in North Carolina.

Members of the board participated in a task force to study day-care needs in North Carolina and the role of United Methodist Churches in day care. A report was made to annual conference with several recommendations and a statement of United Methodist standards for day care has been prepared.

In September, the vice president of the World Peace Division led an ecumenical, interracial, and inter-generational United Nations - Washington Study tour. This widened horizons and brought people in our conference into direct contact with agencies of the church in their work on national and international levels.

The board promoted the observance of World Order Sunday in October and "Trick or Treat" for UNICEF. The board also was a sponsor of the peace education booth at the North Carolina State Fair.

The board was and continues to be active in the State Council for Social Legislation. The president of the board served as chairman of the council's finance committee during the current year, and a member of our board serves the council as chairman of its legislative study committee.

The board has worked closely with the Council on Youth Ministry and has assisted in the establishment of a youth legislative affairs project. The youth leader in this project has served on the executive committee of our board, represented our board at the State Council for Social Legislation, and attended the General Conference in Atlanta.

The board, last year, called for the establishment of a conference Commission on Religion and Race, and at the time of the establishment of the commission, the board sponsored a "Consultation on Racism" for conference leaders and the members of the commission in cooperation with the General Commission on Religion and Race.

The board has worked closely with the Conference Commission on Religion and Race and sponsored a workshop on racism for the commission.

The board cooperated in the promotion of Race Relations Day, and even though some progress has been realized the past two years, we are distressed at the lack of our commitment to the goals of the Race Relations offering.

The board expressed appreciation to those who have served faithfully the past eight years and who will thus rotate off the board. We express our gratitude to the Rev. Charles M. Smith, our vice president of the Division of Peace and World Order for organizing and leading our U. N. - Washington Study Tour, and to the Conference staff, especially John M. Meares, for effective service in promoting the conference program.

THE NORTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE COMMITTEE ON CONTINUING EDUCATION

The Committee on Continuing Education for Ministers functions within the Annual Conference to assist the ministers of the Conference in the continuance of their preparation for effective ministry. Together with the Western North Carolina Conference, the Duke Divinity School, and the Duke Endowment, the committee cooperates with the statewide Commission on Continuing Education in the development of continuing education opportunities on the statewide level. The area of primary activity for the Conference Committee has been in the offering of continuing education courses in the districts, and in assistance to individual pastors to become involved in their own program of continuing education.

During the past year, a course in preaching with Dr. John Carlton as leader has been held in Elizabeth City, and a course was conducted in Sanford in problems in pastoral care under the leadership of Dr. Paul Mickey.

A number of pastors have been invited and have attended in Residence Reading Programs at Duke University in areas of Contemporary Understanding of Man, Old Testament Studies, and Medical Ethics under the leadership of Duke faculty. The naming of Dr. McMurry Richey as Director of Continuing Education for the Divinity School gives promise of further expansion of opportunities for our pastors. The Conference Committee on Continuing Education is warmly appreciative of this appointment.

The Committee on Continuing Education has approved grants for aiding pastors to attend courses at Scarritt and at Yale University.

During the coming Conference Year, the Committee has projected district courses to be held in four areas. As in the past, some studies will be designed to meet the needs of pastors who have not completed requirements for Conference membership. Other courses will be developed on the *post* Master of Divinity level. In the former category will be courses in Elizabeth City and Jacksonville. For *post* Master of Divinity study, courses will be held in Fayetteville and Durham. Times have to be projected on a weekly basis between September 18 to December 11, 1972, and between January 8, and February 26, 1973. The particular subjects will be determined by a poll of pastors in the several areas.

In keeping with provisions of a resolution approved by the 1970 Annual Conference, the committee is charged with the nominating of persons to serve on the North Carolina Pastors' School Board of Managers. Two persons are to be nominated each year for terms of four years. The committee nominates the following persons for terms to expire in 1976: James H. Miller, et al., and W. W. Sherman, Jr.

A REPORT FROM THE DIRECTOR OF THE COURSE OF STUDY SCHOOL DUKE UNIVERSITY

Our theme for this year is, "Mostly New In 1972." First of all we have a new Divinity School dean – Thomas A. Langford. Second, we have a new Course of Study School director – Paul A. Mickey. Third, we have a new building. A new dean, a new director, and new facilities – along with a new slate of student officers – underscores "newness" for the Course of Study School in 1972, in this our 25th year.

We are restyling some of our teaching methods. For example, in the License to Preach course three faculty members will be involved in team teaching. Each faculty member will conduct individual sessions but will also participate in morning workshop sessions.

Formal and required class work will be confined to the mornings. This will allow students and faculty free afternoons. Workshops in preaching, public speaking, private tutoring, and conversations with the faculty will be available. Some of these activities will be sponsored by faculty; others by students.

There is great interest among the students and faculty to develop a workshop methodology. The heart of the workshop is the case study method. Here students bring in actual problems they encounter. Faculty and students work together on these specific problems. There is another trend: the decrease in the number and the amount of advanced assignments. We believe we can accomplish more, realistically, by concentrating on team-teaching and the workshop approach during the School itself. This would move away from extended and protracted assignments throughout the entire year.

A word about enrollment. We are most encouraged. As of June 7, our enrollment was 143

REPORTS OF THE DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS

A COMPOSITE REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENCY

C. H. Mercer, *Secretary to the Cabinet*

At our last Annual Conference the eleven Districts presented for the first time a composite report rather than following the usual pattern of each of the eleven District Superintendents speaking for the District to which he was assigned. The enthusiastic response to that report indicated the delegates agreed 100% with this decision of the District Superintendents. (In other words, there was the usual response to decisions made by District Superintendents.)

Encouraged by your response we have decided again to present one report. Dr. Graham Eubank, our highly esteemed and articulate colleague, who is president of the Cabinet, was scheduled to be our spokesman. We deeply regret that because of illness he is confined to a hospital in Fayetteville and he is disappointed that he cannot give this report and that he must, after many years in the ministry, miss for the first time a session of the Annual Conference.

This report cannot provide accurate and detailed statistical information. This is true for two reasons. The first one may be difficult to comprehend, but as I studied the reports from the District Superintendents provided me last night, one report had a notation at the bottom of the page which read, "This report is not complete due to the fact that we did not receive a report from one of the pastors." Let me assure you this was not the New Bern District report. I received a report from each pastor, but I will admit four long-distance telephone calls were necessary. The second reason our information is incomplete is the fact that some pastors arrived day with pockets bulging with checks and final reports. This information we will get later in the week from our Conference Statistician. But let me share enough information to indicate some important trends and accomplishments.

We have baptized almost 2500 infants during the Church Year. More than 9000 new members have been received with 3600 of them coming into our churches on profession of faith. After reporting for two consecutive years a net loss in membership within our Conference, we can now report a net gain of about 500 members for this year.

We have also made progress in the area of Christian stewardship. Again we are thrilled to report an increase in giving to the "Single Figure." Not only did the amount of our commitment increase but the recent report from our Conference Treasurer indicated the percentage paid on the "Single Figure" had increased 4.1% over that paid one year ago. The increase in commitments to the "Single Figure" alone for next year is about \$250,000.

It now appears, Bishop Cannon, that the Churches of our Conference will contribute most \$100,000 to the Ministerial Education Fund. All indications are this amount will be even greater next year.

Much has been done to improve our physical facilities. We have either erected or are in the process of erecting:

- 9 new Sanctuaries
- 13 new Educational Buildings
- 7 new parsonages
- 25 new units now being planned.

The Churches of the Durham District alone have spent \$1,000,000 on new buildings, renovations and indebtedness.

All special days have been widely observed, and based upon the fine response of our people, we must conclude they were wisely observed. Many interesting and exciting activities have been occurring in each of our Districts.

In the Elizabeth City District the Circus Tent Ministry at Kitty Hawk continues to flourish and expand. Plans are now underway for the Showboat Ministry designed especially for older adults. Camp sites in Currituck County have regular worship services during the summer months. In the Wilmington District the Cape Fear Area Resort Ministries include Youpon, Carolina, and Wrightsville Beaches. The Bogue Banks Resort Ministries, within the New Bern District, continue to serve the thousands of summer visitors, but are also providing a helpful ministry to the seamen at the Morehead City Port.

Many training programs have been planned by the Districts. In the Goldsboro District a stewardship program was provided with special emphasis on training churchmen to hold Every-Member-Visitation Programs and to come to a better understanding of the "Single-Figure Asking." In the Raleigh District four Every-Member-Visitation Workshops were held and ten Sub-District meetings were held to present the new budget askings for 1972-73. As the editor of this report, I can observe that these meetings must have been very helpful as the greatest percentage of increase in the "Single Figure" for the new year comes from the Raleigh District. A one-day Workshop on Family Counseling was held for the Pastors of the New Bern District. In Rocky Mount a District Workshop was held for Pastors on "Ministry Through Small Groups," the purpose of which was to help small groups function more effectively. The Sanford, Wilmington, and Burlington Districts had District Retreats for ministers and a training opportunity for lay workers. Within the Fayetteville District, the Robeson County Church and Community Center continues a special ministry. Major support is being given this work from agencies of the Conference and the National Board of Missions. A new Rural Church and Community Program has been started in Harnett County. Several Workshops will be held in the Pamlico Parish in the New Bern District during the summer months. Groups of young people and their adult counselors from several states, and from within our Conference, will be spending 10 days each working to improve the homes of some of the

elderly citizens and disadvantaged families. The home owner will provide the materials for repair and the work groups will provide free labor.

Many are familiar with the story related by Mr. Broderick in his book, *Historical Church in the United States*. Some years ago in Swanquarter, high water lifted The Methodist Church from its foundation, moved it without damage to a nearby lot which the Church members had tried without success to purchase as a new site for the Church. However, the owner would not sell. Immediately after the high water moved the Church building, he rushed to the courthouse and transferred the ownership of the land to the Church saying, "I had plans for that lot, but the Lord had plans for it too." As Methodists of the North Carolina Conference, we must acknowledge we have had our own plans, but God had plans for us, too. We are grateful that through us His work has been done.

Your District Superintendents express appreciation to the capable and dedicated pastors and laymen by whom God's plan has been followed. We also express deep affection and sincere gratitude for the brotherly understanding of our Father in the Faith, our Bishop, for his devoted and expert leadership. He has provided for us clear direction toward meaningful goals and has shared the inspiration and encouragement we needed to achieve.

BURLINGTON DISTRICT

Edgar B. Fisher, *Superintendent*

Burlington District has had another good year. Both pastors and people have cooperated in a very fine way. True Christian dedication has been characteristic of many of our people. Emphasis has been given to the entire program of The United Methodist Church.

MEMBERSHIP AND EVANGELISM:

The district has received 211 members on profession of faith and 292 by certificate from United Methodist and other Churches. Twenty-four charges reported a net gain in membership. A revision of a number of church rolls has been made.

CHRISTIAN HIGHER EDUCATION:

The district continues to show an active interest in Christian Higher Education, and more actively support our church institutions.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION:

Many dedicated leaders serve in the cause of Christian Education, working especially in our church schools, vacation church schools, and youth programs.

WOMEN'S WORK:

The district has 74 organizations of the Women's Society of Christian Service and fifty Wesleyan Service Guilds, with nearly 3,000 members. Much constructive work is being done.

LAY ACTIVITIES:

The lay people are quite active. The No-Silent Pulpit program is observed. Much interest is shown in Conference meetings, and more than one thousand attended the Lay Rally in February.

BUILDING AND IMPROVEMENTS:

Concord Church on the Whitney Cross Charge recently was dedicated. The parsonage on the Moncure Charge has been completed, and all indebtedness has been paid; proper dedications soon will take place. Bynum Church plans extensive renovation of its parsonage. First Church in Siler City, is making plans to enlarge its church facilities. Webb Avenue-Trinity, Burlington, is optimistic as it makes plans for its new church structure.

FINANCES:

A good financial record has been made by the district. Nearly all of the charges are paying their obligations in full. Pastors' salaries will show an increase this next year of over \$20,000.

and likewise there will be an increase of more than \$20,000 in Single Figure acceptances. Thirty-five charges increased their Single-Figure acceptances for the next Conference year; twelve remained the same (but seven of these charges already were paying as much or more than the so-called "Fair Share" or "Base Apportionment").

The district superintendent is most grateful to all who have helped to make this year successful and looks to the future with optimism.

DURHAM DISTRICT

Chancie D. Barclift, *Superintendent*

The report of the 54 charges, consisting of 74 churches, of the Durham District for the 1971-72 conference year reveals that progress was made in practically all areas of the work. This summary report reflects the fruit of the faithful work of consecrated pastors, their church affairs, and the more than 23,000 lay members.

MEMBERSHIP: There were 882 members received, including 304 on profession of faith. There was a net gain of 162 in membership, and 149 infants were baptized.

FINANCES. The district has paid 99.5% plus of its acceptance of \$300,055 on the Single-Figure Asking, and the acceptance for the conference year 1972-73 is \$326,338.

THE LAITY. The attendance at the annual lay rally was in excess of 1,100. This event continues to be a bright spot in the larger program of lay activities. The work of the Women's Societies of Christian Service, Wesleyan Service Guilds, and United Methodist Youth Fellowships was characterized by enthusiasm and worthy achievements.

BUILDING PROJECTS: Allensville-Trinity: Trinity Church is in the planning stage of constructing an educational building.

Bahama: Mt. Bethel Church air conditioned the sanctuary and parsonage.

Bethesda Church constructed an outdoor picnic area with shelter and cookout facilities.

Carboro Church enlarged the sanctuary.

Chapel Hill: Amity Church became self-sustaining financially for the first time since organization in 1958.

Chapel Hill: Orange Church acquired four acres of land adjacent to the church property and one-half acre adjacent to the parsonage property.

Concord-Oak Grove: Oak Grove Church dedicated the educational building.

Durham: Asbury Temple Church is in the process of general renovation of the church property, including central air conditioning and heating system, new pews and windows, new walk-ways and drive-ways, and landscaping.

Durham: Bethany Church installed new altar furnishings.

Durham: Calvary Church dedicated the educational building.

Durham: Epworth Church completed new sanctuary and will have the formal opening in September, 1972.

Durham: Maybrook-Massey; Massey's Chapel Church completed extensive renovation of sanctuary, including new pews and altar furnishings.

Durham: St. Paul Church air conditioned the entire church properties.

Durham: Trinity Church consecrated the renovated facilities including construction of a chapel. The entire project cost in excess of \$265,000.

Eno-Palmer's Grove: Eno Church installed new altar furnishings.

Granville-Vance: St. Peter's Church installed central air conditioning and heating system.

Mt. Tabor-Riverview: Mt. Tabor Church completed renovations including erecting a people; Riverview Church completed general exterior renovations.

Mt. Tirzah-Helena: Helena Church is in the planning stage of constructing a new educational building.

Oxford Church - educational building under construction.

Oxford Circuit: Marrow's Chapel Church constructed and dedicated a fellowship hall. Mermon Church installed outdoor bulletin board.

Rougemont Church - educational building in planning stage.

Roxboro: Ca-Vel Church completed renovation of the altar area and purchased additional handbells.

Union Grove Church (Orange County) completely renovated the sanctuary, including new altar furnishings and central air conditioning and heating system, and dedicated same on June 11, 1972.

CHANGES IN DISTRICT BOUNDARIES: The Durham District for the 1972-73 conference year will have 50 charges composed of 70 churches.

In the formation of a new district at Rockingham at the 1972 Annual Conference the boundary lines of the other districts changed. The following nine charges in the Durham District were transferred to the Burlington District: Carrboro; Chapel Hill; Aldersgate; Amity Orange; and University; Eno-Palmer's Grove; Hillsborough; New Sharon; Union Grove; and the following five charges were transferred to the Durham District from the Raleigh District: Henderson; City Road; First; and White Memorial; Rehobeth-Harris Chapel; and Tabernacle.

We have gratitude for the leadership of the Good Lord and the guidance of His Spirit in the work accomplished. We undertake the work of a new conference year with renewed zeal and confidence.

ELIZABETH CITY DISTRICT

G. R. McKenzie, *Superintendent*

This year has seen the very fine cooperation of both pastors and lay persons in all the areas of the work of our Lord's Church. Our report is but a summary; yet it could not be written without giving credit to all those who make it possible.

Our churches report 279 persons received on profession of faith and 203 received a certificate of church membership. There were 184 baptisms during the year. It is with optimism that we report a net gain in membership of 136.

The district response to an increase in the Single Figure was not as good as we had hoped but our churches did accept a 4.46% increase, or \$6,510. We still have much to accomplish since we have accepted only 86.89% of our Asking. It is our prayer that more of our people catch the vision of increased giving for others. The churches have accepted \$8,500 of Ministerial Education and this is an increase over the current year.

Our people continue to provide increased pastoral support, having raised salaries in excess of \$19,000 for the coming year. There is no more meaningful way for the churches to commend the fine work of their dedicated pastors than through increased salary support.

There is continuing emphasis on improving the physical condition of church buildings and parsonages. Sharon Church, Currituck Charge, completed an educational unit this year. The Perquimans Charge has built a new parsonage during the year. In addition, educational units are in the planning stages at Wanchese and at Mt. Hermon on the Creswell Charge. City Road has voted to undertake major repair of both church and parsonage. \$53,000 has been reported as paid on parsonages and \$60,100 on renovation and repair of church buildings.

The District Program Council has continued to function in a fine manner; among the activities it has successfully promoted has been a fine pastor's retreat with Dr. Thomas A. Langford as leader, a pilot project for the Consultation Service for Churches of Small Membership at Pilmoor Memorial church in Currituck, and a Vacation Church School Institute.

The people of the area continue to boast of the fine work being accomplished through the Circus Tent Ministry at Kitty Hawk where each year between 40,000 and 50,000 persons attend its varied activities. A new thrust is being planned for older adults to be known as The Showboat Ministry which, hopefully, can begin in the not-too-distant future. As this "new evangelism" continues to expand, we pray God's richest blessing upon all that is accomplished.

We have had a good year in the Elizabeth City District; there have been some defeats but we can report many more victories, and with this in mind, a grateful thank you is in order as we look forward to an even greater year in the service of our Lord and His Church.

FAYETTEVILLE DISTRICT

Graham S. Eubank, *Superintendent*

This is the final report for the Fayetteville District as constituted for the past eight years, a time when the total membership reported was 18,757. The total membership reported in 1971 was 21,011. The membership at the close of 1971-72 shows an approximate loss of 200 members. Of the losses for the year 1972, 585 were by Charge Conference action. Received of

profession of Faith were approximately 500 and otherwise approximately 600. The total losses were approximately 1,200. This is not intended to be a criticism of any minister or church which has taken seriously a disciplinary requirement to submit a membership audit report annually at the Charge Conference. There may have been some errors, but certainly not intentional ones. I believe that it is good for the charge to have accurate membership reports, and it is a false assumption to believe statistical figures when membership rolls have been carelessly kept and neglected for so long. We should, at present, have an accurate report on local church memberships as of the end of 1971-72.

I appreciate very much the wonderful relationship which I have been fortunate in having with the ministers and churches of this district during the year. They have been wonderful to me – most considerate, most cooperative and helpful, with the exception of three or four. In making my final report for the churches in Robeson County, I am very happy to report that every church included in the 26 charges in the county paid its Single Figure in full, and the majority of other items. Actually the only county in this district of four counties in which a charge did not pay in full was Cumberland County, where I live.

I could write a long report expressing my wonderful experiences with the work in Robeson County. I could write quite a bit about my relationship with Black ministers and churches which I cherish as one of the highlights of my life. My relationships with the Indian ministers and churches have also been most enriching and deeply appreciated, and let me say that I do not include any White minister or church in that county because they, too, have shown real churchmanship. We have had our problems and our controversies, but we have not forsaken our Lord nor His Church in these new relations and new problems which have been created only because, finally, we began to face the Gospel Truth and tried to do something about the failings of Christ and the New Testament as people of God. I was not given a choice regarding the keeping or losing of Robeson County as my responsibility. The decision was made by others. I was not consulted about the loss or keeping of that county. If I had been given a choice, despite the fact that there are 26 charges and almost half the work of the district in that county, I would have chosen to have kept it. I shall miss my friends. I pray God's continuing blessing upon them, and they have my continuing loyalty, love, and support.

I do not mean to neglect Hoke, Cumberland, and Harnett in this report, but since this is written after the decision has been made, I must express these experiences which I will not have an opportunity to state in any future reports.

There has not been much new building in the district during the year. There has been finishing up of some projects and planning of new projects. The major actual building progress has been the Rhyne Memorial in Red Springs. They are completely remodeling and repairing their church, but this is not yet completed. Additions and repairs have also been made at Mt. Olive-Smith Charge (both churches), New Zion, Beauty Spot, Piney Grove, St. George, Miller's, St. Peter's, Salem, Walls Chapel, Mt. Zion, Collins Chapel, and Philadelphus. The Task Force of the Board

Missions has recommended a new church building for Salem and Philadelphus. Woodside Church on the Marners Charge is getting ready to renovate its classrooms and fellowship hall. The Task Force has also recommended parsonages for Indian churches which do not have parsonages: Prospect, Pleasant Grove, Branch Street-Philadelphus, and a new parsonage for Embroke: First with the old parsonage, which is inadequate, being developed for use in the church program and campus ministry. The church in Rowland has begun construction on a new fellowship hall. The church raised during the year the majority of the total cost.

In Single-Figure acceptances of the Fair-Share Apportionment, the following have accepted Fair Share; some far beyond the Fair-Share percentage:

We commend these churches on their financial records and stewardship responsibility accepted. With the exception of a very small number of churches, all others accepted increase and have agreed to accept the full amount of Fair-Share Apportionment asked for 1972-7 within the three-year period included in the Annual Conference Resolution of 1971. The district was second in amount paid to the Ministerial Educational Fund and led in a number of other specials including the Fund for Reconciliation, United Methodist Youth Fund, Methodist Student Day, Worldwide Communion Sunday, and One Great Hour of Sharing. The district was third in Conference Advance Specials. These speak well for the stewardship commitment of the churches of the district.

The total salaries received by pastors for last year were \$475,000, only \$6,000 less than the total salaries of the Raleigh District, which was number one. This information was provided by the Bishop and his committee on planning the Twelfth District. The Fayetteville District's new boundaries include the churches of Sampson County, replacing the churches of Robeson County. Sampson County includes 11 pastoral charges and 21 churches. We now have a total of 48 pastoral charges in the district of Cumberland, Harnett, Hoke and Sampson Counties. The old part of the Fayetteville District, including the District Superintendent, pastors, and laymen extend a welcome without any reservations and with a deep sense of appreciation and total commitment in our Christian unity, cooperation, and support.

Before closing my report, I must commend the special programs in Robeson County including the Robeson County Church and Community Center, community developer in the Prospect Parrish, Black and Indian Caucus funded by the General Commission Religion and Race, and a special program that was begun by Hay Street Church in Fayetteville, which is now an ecumenical program. The newest program in the district is the Harnett County Rural Community Program with a church and community worker assigned last October.

This is not a statistical report, but an expression of who we are, our commitments, and a sincere desire to be the Church of God in our time.

GOLDSBORO DISTRICT

Albert F. Fisher, *Superintendent*

The year 1971-72 has been an exciting and productive year for the Goldsboro District. Many meaningful experiences have been observed throughout the District. We have witnessed the maturing of the District Program Council concept as the programming agency for the District. This Council has been responsible for the major planning for the District for the year. The work of the Program Council has certainly generated a better spirit of cooperation and unity throughout the District.

Of all that has happened during the year, nothing compares to the licensing of five people to preach the gospel of Jesus Christ. At District Conference, three young men were licensed to preach: David Atwood, James McCullen, and Kelly Wilson, III. Two of them are now serving student appointments, and after Annual Conference, the third will begin serving a student appointment. Since District Conference, two others have been licensed by the District Committee on Ministerial Qualifications: Mrs. Gladys Williford and R. G. Gurley. Both of these will assume pastoral appointments at Annual Conference. Mrs. Williford will become a Probationary Member of the Annual Conference this year, and will become the first woman to reach that status in the Annual Conference.

The Goldsboro District has had another excellent year financially. We have paid 100 per cent of the Single-Figure Asking for the Conference year 1971-72. Again, the pastors and laymen of the District are to be commended for their stewardship and commitment to the connectional system. The District also accepted 96.8 per cent of the requested askings — a increase over the previous year.

The churches were not without concern for their pastors' salaries. The total increase for the District was just over 5 per cent, which nearly reached the suggested goal of 5.5 per cent over the salaries paid the previous year.

The District is to be commended for its evangelistic outreach for the year. There was a net gain reported by the pastors of 110 members, with 115 infants having been baptized.

There were two major building programs completed during the year. Mt. Moriah United Methodist Church, on the Hopewell-Mt. Moriah Charge, built a new Educational Building and renovated the Sanctuary at a total cost of \$33,500. This is a very lovely and complete facility.

Other major construction program was a new Educational Building and renovation of the existing Educational Building by Centenary United Methodist Church, Smithfield. The total cost of the project was \$280,256. This plant is one of the best planned and most functional Educational Buildings that we have in the Conference.

One parsonage has been completed during the year. The Clinton Circuit sold the old parsonage and built a new one just outside Clinton. The parsonage will be occupied for the first time by the pastor assigned to the Charge at the 1972 Annual Conference.

While these were the major programs, the other churches in the District were not idle. The churches spent \$153,193 in renovation and repairs. This work continues to upgrade the facilities of the District in both church buildings and parsonages.

During the year, the District Parsonage has received some much-needed landscaping. The work has not been completed, but the major portion has been finished. We continue to have a lovely home that is a credit to the Goldsboro District, whose interest and concern for the District Parsonage family is reflected in the parsonage.

A summary report by the District superintendent would be incomplete without a word of appreciation for the work of the men who have served the churches in the District. Never have they been called upon but that the response was immediate and energetic. After having served three years now as superintendent, I greatly appreciate the kind of unselfish service that glorifies the pastors of the United Methodist Church. As their superintendent, I, along with the churches of the District, have been blessed by their ministry.

A summary report would likewise be incomplete without deep appreciation expressed to the United Methodist people of the Goldsboro District. They, too, have responded in a most generous manner to me and to my requests of them. For their commitment, I am grateful.

This report must not indicate that the work here is finished — really, we have just begun. I fully hope that we have caught a glimpse of the mission to which we have been called. If we have caught a vision, then the year ahead will again be as the last — a year of victories in Christ's name.

GREENVILLE DISTRICT REPORT

Membership and Evangelism

We received 611 members by Easter, 292 being by profession of faith. Our net decrease was 2.

Finance

Pastors' salaries were increased by \$18,350, or 6.5%. Single Figure acceptances increased 3,010, or 5.6%. Single-Figure payments for 1971-72 were 97% of acceptances.

Building Programs

Farmville Church consecrated a new \$600,000 sanctuary in January. Washington: First occupied its spacious educational building about the same time. Rainbow enlarged its sanctuary, almost doubling the seating capacity. A new sanctuary is under construction atifton. Holy Trinity will begin construction of a first unit this summer. That church acquired additional land this year. Trinity of Institute Charge has brick-veneered its sanctuary and educational building. Holly Spring Church on Jamesville Charge has renovated the sanctuary and brick-veneered the building. The educational building at Queen Street has been renovated and a new parsonage constructed and occupied. Bethany of Kinston Circuit has held the groundbreaking for an educational building. Asbury sanctuary has been renovated this year. Res of Washington Circuit has paid off the indebtedness and dedicated its \$95,000 property.

Church Extension.

Chocowinity. Providence Church of Grimesland Charge has been relocated into Chocowinity and the name changed to Chocowinity. A site has been bought, financed by the Board of Missions, and a trailer made for church purposes has been secured. These decisions were made following a census of the Providence and Chocowinity areas by the churches of the Washington area.

North Kinston. A census of the North Kinston area, on U.S. 258, was made last fall by the churches of the Kinston area. As prospects were contacted, 103 members were signed up for a new church. An option was taken on a site of 3.4 acres at \$15,000. The Board of Missions bought the option and is fully supporting the cost of a pastor who will also serve St. Mark Church.

District Society. The Greenville District United Methodist Society was approved by the District Conference in January, 1970, to start new churches as needed and encourage and support older small churches in getting needed facilities. The above listed new churches are projects of the Society. Gifts are being made to Holy Trinity, Holly Spring and Ware's (Jamesville Charge, Soule on Swan Quarter Charge, Bethany on Kinston Circuit, and St. Mark Society gifts, including two Christmas offerings, have exceeded \$20,000.

5. A Sincere Thank You.

We have a wonderful group of preachers and laymen in the Greenville District. We are working together as an enthusiastic team of Christ. We are grateful for the many things that have been done. We believe we are set for more and greater things to be done in the year ahead.

NEW BERN DISTRICT Charles H. Mercer, *Superintendent*

The loyal and competent services of the pastors and laymen of the New Bern District have been rewarded with many results. Some can be recorded through statistical information, but the most significant part of these efforts is recorded in the lives of people whose faith has been kindled, cultivated, and expressed as a result of Our Lord's Ministry through The Church.

During the year, 107 infants have been baptized. We have received 265 persons on profession of faith and 497 by transfer.

The Beech Grove Church has completed a new educational building at a cost of \$50,000. The Richlands Church has begun an educational building which will cost \$170,000.

The Clarks Church and the Harkers Island Church are planning new buildings with architects already at work.

Several meaningful training opportunities have been provided. The Board of the Laymen sponsored a training program for certified lay speakers which was well attended. The District Program Council sponsored a one-day Workshop on Family Counseling for Pastors under the leadership of Dr. David Knox, Professor at E.C.U., a Pastors' Confirmation Lab in the New Bern Sub-District, and Lay Officers' Training Workshops in each Sub-District.

Through the work in the Pamlico Parish we are discovering new approaches to a more meaningful ministry through cooperative efforts and new understandings. Also, the Bog Banks Resort Ministry continues as a joint effort of many denominations to serve the summer tourists and the seamen using the Morehead City Port.

The response to the needs served through the Single-Figure Asking has been the best it has been in several years. This is true of payments for the year closing and commitments already made for the new Church Year.

God has truly used the commitment and talents of the pastors and laymen of the New Bern District. Praise be to God!

RALEIGH DISTRICT J. W. Page, *Superintendent*

The Conference year 1971 - 1972 has been a good year for the Raleigh District; the sixty-five active and dedicated ministers and the 28,918 devoted laymen have made the following report possible. I am deeply grateful to our ministers and our laymen for their cooperation in every phase of the work of the Church: in a very real sense, this is their report.

1. **Membership and Evangelism:** 567 members were received on profession of faith; 1368 were received by transfer for a total net gain of 480. There is increasing devotion in the area of Evangelism on the part of both clergy and laity, and this continuing evangelistic emphasis is a omen of better things to come.

Finances: The Single-Figure Acceptance for the Raleigh District for this year was 74,517.00 and the amount paid to date is \$371,233.00, making a percentage paid of 99.1%. The Churches of the Raleigh District have accepted for the Single Figure for 1972-1973 the amount of \$440,000.00; this represents a \$66,000.00 increased acceptance over the previous year. In addition, the salaries of the ministers have been raised by more than five per cent. Only the Charges failed to pay in full their Single-Figure Acceptance.

During October and November four sub-district Every-Member-Visitation Workshops were held in strategic areas of the district; these were led by O. L. Hathaway, K. L. Braswell and J. W. Page. In January ten sub-district meetings were held in the District to present and to explain the increased asking for the Single Figure; this increase was made imperative by the action of the Special Session of the Annual Conference which adopted a Funded Pension Plan for the Ministers of the Conference. Those persons who were involved in the leadership of these sub-district meetings were: O. L. Hathaway, N. W. Grant, K. L. Braswell, J. Ed Legates, Merritt Jones, Charles McAdams and J. W. Page. The total increase in the Single-Figure Acceptance in the Raleigh District is due largely to the information and the inspiration of these sub-district meetings. For the excellent response of both ministers and laymen I am most thankful.

Raleigh District Program Council: The entire program in the Raleigh District was planned and projected by the District Program Council. This group met regularly during the year; on July 12, 1972 the group met at Westover United Methodist Church for a day of planning for the 1972-1973 Conference year. Each member of the Program Council had done his homework. It was a very meaningful day of planning for the work of the Church for the coming year. My deep appreciation is expressed to each member of the District Program Council for his part in planning the work for the Raleigh District for the new year. Because we took the necessary time to work and plan, the coordination of the Raleigh District Program with the Conference program will be greatly facilitated for the coming year.

Board of the Laity: Under the capable leadership of Dr. J. Ed Legates, Raleigh District Lay Leader, a significant program of Lay Activities was carried out. One of the great experiences in this area was the District Lay Rally in February held at Memorial Auditorium. A youth group from Burlington, THE NEW DIRECTIONS, gave an excellent program; "it was wild and lovely" in a Christian and youthful sort of way, and this did a great deal to bridge both the racial and generation gap. To Dr. Legates and to each Lay Leader in the Raleigh District I say, thanks, for a job well-done."

Miscellaneous: There are many other areas of concern that could be singled out for special emphasis: United Methodist Women, United Methodist Youth Fellowship, United Methodist Men, Christian Education, Social Concerns, Religion and Race, Health and Welfare, debt payment, building improvement, Advance Sepcials, N. C. Christian Advocate, and other special projects and causes. To sum it all up, continuing progress is being made in all areas in the Raleigh District, and I am thankful to God for the privilege of working with the ministers and laymen in this exciting program of our United Methodist Church.

ROCKY MOUNT DISTRICT

Paul Carruth, *Superintendent*

Brick and mortar, lumber and paint are perhaps the most easily identifiable signs of interest and commitment. Our people give evidence of their interest in the church and their commitment to the work of the church in the buildings they construct or acquire.

The support of the people of the Rocky Mount District for the pastor has been demonstrated in the continued upgrading of the parsonages. Central air conditioning is becoming a required feature of the homes of all our people, and the parsonage is no exception. Two congregations have secured new homes for their pastors. these are Weldon, and Winstead of Wilson. Valuable contributions have been made to the parsonage at Woodland.

Construction of the new sanctuary at Scotland Neck is proceeding, and a new church structure is being built by our Shiloh church of Gaston. Additional classrooms are planned for the Fern church of Milwaukee Charge. The architect of Tabor Church of Hawkins-Tabor has drawn plans, and a financial campaign has been carried out for the reconstruction of the sanctuary, with the letting of a contract expected within the near future. Remodeling or refurbishing plans are being developed by New Hope Church of Roanoke, Elm City, and First Church, Wilson.

The development of Christian zeal and a shared life of Christian faith among our people not so easily identified, but there are encouraging signs. The entire Rocky Mount District has given serious attention to the identification of every person, and the accounting of every member appearing on the membership rolls of our churches. The emphasis has or incidentally been to "clean rolls." Basically, the concern has been to mobilize every resident Methodist to participate in Christ's redeeming ministry to the world. The churches of the district added 599 members. A second Confirmation Laboratory for pastors was held in the district to upgrade the quality of this work. A large number of the congregations participated in the study of the COCU Plan of Union, giving evidence of continued ecumenical concern. Because our churches do much of their work in small groups, a district workshop for pastors was held to help pastors to help the boards, classes, committees, etc. in their churches to do their work more effectively.

The Fund for Reconciliation has assisted a program of community help in Rocky Mount by contribution to Contact.

The Rocky Mount District is preparing to participate enthusiastically in the progress of our Conference in the 1972-1973 Conference Year.

SANFORD DISTRICT

Joyce V. Early, *Superintendent*

The Sanford District has had another good year for which we are profoundly grateful! The morale of the preachers and laymen is at a high peak. The spirit of comradeship and teamwork is excellent. Harmony has prevailed at the charge conferences, and a wholesome outlook toward the work of Christ's Kingdom has been evident.

CHRISTIAN NURTURE AND EVANGELISM:

A total of 929 new members have been received, on a goal of 1,000, with almost half these (447) coming by profession of their faith in Jesus Christ as Lord and Saviour. We are especially pleased to report a net gain of 340 new members in the district, while the net gain for the conference was 448. Our pastors baptised 207 infants. A pilot Confirmation Lab was held in February with 14 pastors participating. Membership confirmation classes have been held and Christian nurture stressed.

During the year seven pastors and laymen served as consultants in the ministry to small churches. We are very proud of this work for it has brought hopeful help to eight of our weak churches. Appreciation is given to the faithful consultants for work well done. An overnight spiritual retreat was held for our pastors on November 8, 9, with Dr. Mack B. Stokes as the inspirational leader. Forty-two of our pastors participated.

BUILDING PROJECTS:

Steele Street Church, Sanford, started construction on their long-dreamed-of church home on August 15, 1971, with completion expected in February 1973. This church, re-located in West Sanford, will cost \$1,293,000 when completed, and will be one of the most beautiful and modern churches in the conference. The congregation has voted to change the name to St. Luke United Methodist Church when occupied.

Union Grove Church, Sanford Circuit, is now under construction also. The cost, when completed on July 31, 1972, is expected to be \$40,000. This much-needed church is receiving aid from the Duke Endowment, the \$10 Club, and the Sanford District Fund for needy churches. We are very grateful for this aid.

Buildings Planned:

Polar Springs: sanctuary remodeling and new class-room building.

Candor: Fellowship Hall remodeling and improvement of educational building.

Macedonia: Improvement of sanctuary, and addition of Fellowship Hall, kitchen, and rest rooms.

Star: New sanctuary being planned.

Smyrna: New Fellowship Hall and Kitchen being added.

Bascom's Chapel: New church building being planned to cost \$40,000. (Work will begin probably this summer.)

Center: New class room building.

Ophir (Troy Ct.) Remodeling of sanctuary.

Caledonia: New Educational building plans being completed. (Construction is to start this summer.)

District Parsonage: A total of \$10,128.00 has been paid on principal and interest this year. Present debt is \$14,993.99.

ACCEPTANCES: The Sanford District has led the conference each month since January in the percentage paid on the Single-Figure Acceptances. The district reported to the conference that 100% of the acceptances had been paid on the 1971-72 askings, and \$300,858, an increase of \$10,131, or 8.50% has been accepted for 1972-73. The Sanford District exceeded its Fair-Share quota by over \$5,000! This was made possible because 30 of the 50 charges reached or exceeded their Fair Share for 1972-73! Only four charges failed to accept an increase. The district accepted \$18,596 of the Ministerial Education Fund on an asking of \$20,731, or 90%. Only one charge failed to accept any apportionment. It accepted \$838.50 on an apportionment of \$1140 for the Interdenominational Cooperation Fund, or 75%.

PASTORS' SALARIES:

Pastors' salaries have been increased by \$26,139 for 1972-73. Only six charges did not increase their pastor's income. All but four now pay the pastor's Blue Cross-Blue Shield and life insurance premiums.

The Lay Rally attendance was the largest ever with 595 present. A lay speakers' training session was held with Charles K. McAdams, leader. Also, an officers' training session was held. Bishop William R. Cannon dedicated the Pinebluff parsonage on November 7, 1971. Other parsonages in the district have been improved. The new East Rockingham parsonage, one of the best in the conference, was completed and occupied by the Rev. and Mrs. O. W. Watson in the fall of 1971. At the same time a new Fellowship Hall was completed and occupied.

The Sanford District has had a tremendous year. It has been a very high privilege for me to have been the district superintendent of such dedicated laymen and pastors for the past two years.

WILMINGTON DISTRICT

W. J. Neese, Superintendent

I am pleased to present the following brief account of some of the accomplishments of the United Methodist Church in the Wilmington District. With humble acknowledgement of my indebtedness to the fine pastors and lay persons of the District, I offer my profound gratitude to all those who have served Christ and his Church with great devotion and have given their cooperation in the promotion of the program and mission of the church both locally and globally. As Francis Asbury wrote of the Wilmington Methodists in 1810, so I can say today: "I see the work of God is going on here."

Our people are concerned about evangelism. During the past year, 236 have been received by profession of faith. The total received into the churches of the District by all means is 716. Losses by all means number 651. Our net gain of members this year is 65.

In a year when we advised that government controls would permit only a limited salary increase for each pastor for the coming year the charges of the District have agreed to increase the salaries of the pastors by an amount of approximately \$28,000 over this year.

In the face of a Single-Figure Asking of \$273,530, the churches of the District have accepted a total of \$205,035 of this amount for next year. This means that we have accepted 91.72% of our Single-Figure Asking. Our increase over the 1971-72 acceptance is 8.43%.

The prospect is that a large majority of our churches will pay their Single-Figure acceptance full this year, although a few are not likely to do so.

Buildings dedicated this year include: the parsonage at Chadbourn on October 10, 1971, and the Holy Church on the Riegelwood-Bolton Charge on May 21, 1972. The Coffeehouse and Beach Ministry Facilities at Long-Yaupon Beach, sponsored by Ocean View Church, were dedicated July 31, 1971.

Magnolia Church completed the renovation and redecoration of its sanctuary and held a service of rededication on May 28, 1972. The interior of the Chadbourn Church also has been renovated this year. Extensive repairs and improvements have been made on the basement of the Antenay Church in Harrells.

A new parsonage is being erected by the Singletary Church of the Dublin Charge. It should be completed by early fall.

Plans are being made for the erection of the following building projects in the near future: sanctuary building at Shiloh Church on the Town Creek Charge; and a sanctuary building a class rooms at Ocean View, Yaupon Beach. Also plans are underway to remodel the sanctuary at Wallace at an estimated cost of \$45,000; pledges totaling \$43,095 have been received to date.

In the area of special ministries, a new concern is being shown for our responsibilities on our beaches. The Cape Fear Area Resort Ministries -CFARM- has been formed in the District to promote and coordinate the special ministries at Wrightsville, Carolina, and Long-Yaupon Beaches.

A Methodist Society is being organized in the Greater Wilmington Area to provide a vehicle for inter-church cooperation and to coordinate the United Methodist program and mission in the lower Cape Fear Area. We expect this organization to help us achieve a greater degree of unity and solidarity as United Methodists.

We believe our greatest days are ahead, and we pray for God's guidance and power that we may more wholeheartedly follow the Lord Jesus Christ.

THE DUKE ENDOWMENT

June 1, 1971-May 31, 1972

In cooperation with the local church, district and conference officials, The Duke Endowment shares as a member of the team in the promotion and support of effective programs in churches located in rural communities.

In the North Carolina Conference there are 860 churches, of which over 650 are in the rural communities of no more than 1,500 population. This represents 45 percent of the total membership and 64 percent of the pastoral charges.

Special emphasis is being given to long-range planning based on research and study that encompasses the larger community. Whether the project is the development of a parish structure, the construction of a building, or the establishing of priorities, the prerequisite is effective planning and programming.

THE CONFERENCE COMMISSION ON ECUMENICAL AFFAIRS

During the year, the Commission has emphasized a study in the local churches of "A Plan of Union" in connection with the Consultation on Church Union.

Two of the officers—Drs. T. A. Collins and C. W. Robbins—led in discussions on "A Plan of Union" at the R & R held at Methodist College, Fayetteville, last summer. A number of the members of the Commission have participated in local church ecumenical discussions during the year.

The Commission, in cooperation with Bishop Cannon and Reverend E. R. Porter of the Program Council, conducted a survey of study plans for "A Plan of Union."

Of 296 forms returned, 263 indicated that the study would be held, with 142 stating they would conduct their studies with other COCU communions. Responses indicate that a good cross-section of churches held ecumenical studies in one form or other and that ecumenical cooperation is growing within the bounds of our Conference.

The Commission commends the Conference for its growing support of the North Carolina Council of Churches as well as other ecumenical bodies. At a time when the ecumenical movement is under attack from various quarters, the United Methodist Church holds firm in its commitment to interchurch and interfaith cooperation. All ecumenical bodies need financial support if they are to be a vital force in healing the brokenness of our churches and become a strong influence in healing a broken, warring world.

The Commission wishes to commend ministers and laymen in local churches who are exploring new ecumenical models and finding more ways of working with other communions at the grassroots level.

The Commission met in March and voted to ask the Conference to reduce its membership to 27, the number of representatives to which the Conference is entitled in the North Carolina Council of Churches.

Five from our Conference are related to ecumenical bodies, including Bishop Cannon, who is Methodist representative to COCU; Dr. Robert E. Cushman, who is a member of the General Commission on Ecumenical Affairs of the United Methodist Church; Nelson Gibson, Bill Price and C. W. Robbins, members of the General Assemblies and General Board of the National Council of Churches. Dr. Collins is the past president of the North Carolina Council of Churches.

SECTION A

Committee on General Church School Ministry

1. Report for 1971-1972

- A. One of the areas in which we sense a great need is that of developing more better-informed churchmen. This process has its beginning in the confirmation classes. We have had five confirmation labs for pastors this year to help them better use the fine curriculum we now have. Labs were held in Raleigh, Greenville, Roanoke Rapids, New Bern, and Rockingham. Fifty-five pastors participated in these five day-labs.
- B. At the Southeastern Jurisdiction Leadership and Laboratory School at Lake Junaluska, August 1-13, 1971, we had two persons who completed work for certification as Elementary Laboratory Leaders: The Reverend F. Belton Joyner, Jr. (Elementary V-VI) and Mrs. Roberta Scipio (Elementary V-VI).
- C. In the program for "Developing Ministries in Black Churches," there was a very helpful Black Youth Church Encounter Workshop held October 1-3, 1971, at Camp Rockfish, which reached fifty youth and adults, laymen, and pastors. Also, five Cluster Group Council on Ministries Workshops were conducted by Reverend Willard Williams, Staff Member, Division of the Local Church, United Methodist Board of Education, Nashville, Tennessee. A committee is now at work gathering information on contributions of Blacks to United Methodism in North Carolina to be made available to local church groups.
- D. The most important area of work that we developed this year was the "Service to Churches of Small Membership." Miss Jennie Youngblood from the General Board of Education held three pilot consultation training sessions in our conference. These sessions were held at Camp Rockfish November 12-14, 1971; Pilmoor Church, Currituck, November 16-18, 1971; and Camp Chestnut Ridge November 19-21. A one-day "make-up" session was held in Goldsboro on February 9. As a result of this training, forty-nine consultants are now available to help churches of small membership to more effectively plan their ministries. At least thirty consultants are already assigned to churches. Some of these have completed their four consultation sessions with the local congregation.
- E. There were nine Christian Workers' Schools held in our conference this year with more than seventy churches taking part. This method of leadership development still has a vital contribution to make to the training enterprise.
- F. Eleven workshops involved more than 175 local church leaders in training sessions of from two to five hours. A wide range of subjects of Christian interest were explored.
- G. Two laboratory enterprises were conducted: one in the Durham District and one in the Raleigh District.
- H. We commend the Program Council for the appointment of an Interboard Leadership Development Task Force which has already made plans for orientation, training and organization of the new boards and agencies at Methodist College on June 24, 1972.

SECTION B

Committee on Children's Ministry

E. Clifford Shoaf, *Chairman*

Report for 1971-1972

- a. *Pilot Project to strengthen the Role of the District Coordinator of Children's Ministry* Coordinators were encouraged to establish in-depth relationship with two local churches to explore the possibilities of ways district coordinators could best support local church ministry with children. It was possible to establish such projects in four of the districts.
- b. *Cadre of New Workers* District coordinators were asked to work through the ministers of the district to discover capable persons for leadership roles in children's ministry. One example of the effectiveness of this effort is the fact that some districts had entirely new staffs for Vacation Church School Workshops.
- c. *Vacation Church School Workshops* Over one thousand persons took part in the Vacation Church School Workshops held in all of the eleven districts. More than fifty persons did special preparation to serve as leaders in these Workshops.
- d. *Support of Camping Ministry* In the summer 1971 camping program, 733 elementary boys and girls took part in activities at the conference camps. This is an increase of twenty per cent. Those who had completed the third grade were eligible for the first time and the Council on Children's Ministry evaluated the participation of those children as a good procedure. During the camps, special attention was given to ecological concerns.
- e. *Reaching Children Outside the Church* The Council on Children's Ministry prepared a resource sheet on reaching children outside the church. This material was sent to every local church pastor and to each local church coordinator of children's ministry.
- f. *Children's Music Workshop* Rather than a conference-wide Workshop, there were resources available so districts could have their own Children's Choir Festival. These were held in the Burlington, Durham, Raleigh, and Wilmington Districts. Over 300 persons were involved.
- g. *Curriculum Workshops* Several districts offered workshops for those who teach in the Children's Division. Attention was given to interpreting the philosophy behind United Methodist curriculum resources and helps for using the resources. An estimated 200 persons took part in the various workshops.
- h. *Support of EXIS* Each local church received a mailing about EXIS, the computerized Experimental Information Service. Through the District Coordinators of Children's Ministry, three of the districts bought memberships in EXIS for use by churches in the district. Nationally, the EXIS program is being evaluated now to determine whether or not to continue it. Several good experiences with EXIS in our conference led our Council on Children's Ministry to encourage continuing EXIS.

SECTION C

Committee on Youth Ministry

Samuel D. McMillan, Jr., *Chairman*

Report for 1971-1972

- a. *Trail Hike* Twelve persons took part in last summer's experience; twenty persons have applied for this year's hike.
- b. *Black Youth Participation* Fifty-one persons from the Black churches in our Conference took part in a Black Youth / Church Encounter Workshop. Out of this have developed plans with the Western North Carolina Conference to publish an account of the contributions of Blacks to United Methodism in North Carolina. A task force is at work on this project now with a publishing goal of Conference 1973.
- c. *Camping Ministry* Sixteen participated in Aquatics Camp at Camp Kerr Lake; this experience will be offered again in 1972. Approximately 800 youth were involved in other conference camps.

- d. *A. C. S.* Attendance at the 1971 A.C.S. was 260. The theme "Reach Out" was developed with the help of guest resource leader, The Rev. Howard Hanger of Atlanta.
- e. *United Nations-Washington Study Tour* Forty-one Senior High youth took part in this experience in March. Issues getting special attention were "India and the Sub-continent" and "Invasion of Privacy."
- f. *Explore Week-end* Twelve persons were involved in this vocations week-end opportunity.
- g. *Meeting on the Pastoral Ministry* In April, the Commission on Enlistment for Church Occupations and the Council on Youth Ministry sponsored a One-Day Meeting on the Pastoral Ministry. Seventy-five persons attended this session.
- h. *Group Dynamics for Youth Committee* Members of the Conference Committee on Youth Ministry held a retreat on the Neuse River. The main focus of the retreat was on "how do groups work?" "how can we get our job done?" and "how do I work best in a group?"
- i. *Arts Festival* This suggested program was not offered because the Council on Youth Ministry decided there was not sufficient support for the event.
- j. *Leisure Ministry* A sheet identifying "What Others Are Doing" was prepared and distributed to those who expressed interest in the area of leisure ministry.
- k. *Conference Youth Rally* The theme "God is For Real . . . Are You?" was developed at the 1971 Youth Rally. Two thousand youth met on October 30 at Duke University.
- l. *R & R* The 1971 R & R offered courses in youth ministry. Youth were invited to be part of the early planning for the 1972 R & R. Conference Youth President Flynn Surratt did attend such a meeting, giving some youth voice to the planning.
- m. *Local Church Study Tours* The Conference staff gave help to four groups who were planning their own study tour experiences in Washington and/or New York.
- n. *Scholarship Funds* Camperships are available for camping ministry programs. A small fund was established by some of the staff at Senior High Workshop for use by Black or Indian youth. The Council on Youth Ministry designated \$400 for scholarships for Black or Indian youth for use in the conference summer opportunities.
- o. *Church-wide Studies* Leadership development opportunities were provided at R & R.
- p. *District Coordinators* As recommended by the 1971 Annual Conference, the Conference Coordinator of Youth Ministry made recommendations to the District Superintendents about District Coordinators of Youth Ministry for 1971-1972.
- q. *Counselor-in-Training* The Council on Youth Ministry has recruited the counselors-in-training for the Camps for the Mentally Retarded. There were almost twice as many applicants than could be used.
- r. *United Methodist Curriculum* Contact was made with every local church to determine how the Conference might be helpful in interpreting the United Methodist resources. At various places in the Conference, there were local church consultations, Christian Workers' Schools, laboratory enterprises, resources mailings, and other contacts to try to meet the needs.
- s. *Continuous Membership Training* An emphasis was given to the importance of ongoing membership training. This took place in the various Confirmation Labs (Rockingham, Greenville, New Bern, Raleigh, Roanoke Rapids).
- t. *Junior High Workshop* There were 164 participants in the 1971 Workshop at North Carolina Wesleyan College.
- u. *Senior High Workshop* With the theme "Bridge Over Troubled Waters," there were 209 attending the Workshop at North Carolina Wesleyan College.
- v. *Youth Music Workshop* Seventy-five attended the first Youth Music Workshop at Methodist College.
- w. *Local Church Leadership Development* There were replies from fifty-seven charges when a mailing went to all local churches about their plans for leadership development in youth ministry. Follow-through is continuing for those who requested assistance.
- x. *Nominations and Personnel* There was nothing done in response to the recommendation that all local church committees on Nominations and Personnel be given a list of suggested criteria for nominating adult workers with youth.

- y. *Youth with Responsibilities* Information has been distributed about the new "Youth Involvement Series" prepared by the General Church. Also, effort has been made to work with the youth and young adult delegates to the 1972 Annual Conference, to interpret their role and to assist them in understanding the procedures of the Annual Conference.
- z. *Re-appointment* The Bishop made the staff appointment as recommended.

SECTION D

Committee on Young Adult Ministry

John M. Meares, *Chairman*

Report For 1971-1972

1. Two Young Adult Consultattons were held with United Methodist Churches and Military Personnel in the Fayetteville area. Reverend Lander Beal, Director of Young Adult Ministry for The United Methodist Church, was the resource person for these consultations. A great deal of interest and concern was shown for ministry to service personnel in the area. Approximately fifteen persons attended each of these sessions, with representation from seven local churches and the Military.
2. Proposals for a Young Adult Week-end Laboratory Enterprise in the Fayetteville area were projected. Due to scheduling the Lab has not been held, but is projected for the 1972-73 conference year.
3. Consultation service with several local churches on the churches ministry to Young Adults has been held.
4. There continues a great concern in the area of ministry to young adults and local churches are encouraged to initiate new groupings of young adults for participation in innovative ministries.

SECTION E

Committee on Adult and Family Life Ministry

R. T. Commander, *Chairman*

Report for 1971-1972

1. The announcement of a new adult study, "Our Living Bible Series," has been received with enthusiasm. This series which will be available to local churches in September 1973, is in response to the plea from adults wanting a new, solid, and dependable study of the Bible. Workshops are planned for the introduction of this series to local churches in the spring of 1973.
2. The adult curriculum series, "Christiän Faith in Life," have been received well in this conference, with many groups reporting exciting learning experiences. This series is still available as well as the "Foundation Studies Series." The "Adult Bible Studies" (International Lesson) continues to be the most popular adult curriculum material.
3. The development of adult leaders to work in teaching/learning groups has shown some signs of increased activity. Many local churches and clusters of churches have held training opportunities, using many different designs and hours for the events. One very successful training event was held in cooperation with a Technical Training Institute.
4. Increased interest is being shown in ministries to senior citizens, with several churches developing on-going programs and the development of leadership to work with the aging.
5. A Conference Consultation on Ministries to Senior Citizens was held in Raleigh, with

Miss Virginia Stafford, Director of Ministries to Older Adults, Nashville, Tennessee, as the resource leader. District Coordinators of Adult Ministry, and District Chairmen of Social Concerns participated in this event.

6. Family Camp was held at Camp Don-Lee, July, 10-16, with 214 children, youth and adults in attendance for the two sessions. Registrations for the 1972 session of Family camp have filled to capacity the camp facilities.
7. In addition to the promotion of adult ministries, many consultations have been held dealing with the structure of the church, the Administrative Board and the Council on Ministries.

SECTION F

Committee on Christian Educators and Music Ministry

1. *Christian Educators Section, Wyatt Brown, Chairman*

A. Report for 1971-1972

A total of forty-two workers are now serving in our conference. Three of these are certified Ministers of Education; eleven are Directors of Christian Education; one is an Associate in Christian Education; and twenty-seven are Educational Assistants. Two new workers transferred into our conference from the Holston Conference during the past year: Miss Jean Beaty, Associate in Christian Education, is now serving at First Church in Rockingham; and Miss Carol Tignor, Director of Christian Education, is serving at Highland Church, Raleigh.

These workers are vitally concerned about the total life and ministry of the churches they serve. They also assist other churches in the conference by serving as resource leaders on conference, district, and cluster-group levels.

We encourage more churches to employ full-time workers in Christian education as an effective way of improving their educational ministry. All churches employing education workers should support them in their ministry in every way possible.

B. *Report of Christian Educators Fellowship, North Carolina Conference*

The North Carolina Chapter of the Christian Educators Fellowship has sought in the past and will continue to seek in the future, ways to help congregations understand the role of Christian educators. The chapter is seeking ways to help the educator implement the objectives of Christian Education wherever he works.

The Christian Educators Fellowship has tried to develop ways that the Christian educator can be used in implementing the conference priorities for 1972-1973. We feel that through the use of the expertise of the Christian educator in the educational process, many of the priorities can be met. During the past year, many of the Christian educators have been leaders in the consultation service for churches with small membership with tremendous results and activities beginning to take place in these churches that are so vital to our conference.

The Christian educator wants to be included as a vital part of the leadership of the church. They are volunteering for leadership positions on local, district, and conference councils so that their commitment to Christ and the Church can be used effectively in reaching persons and filling their needs. The Christian educator wants to be concerned about persons and their real needs. The Christian educator wants to be an enabler, a good listener, a supporter of lay workers, and someone that can provide leadership training.

The Christian educator will continue to maintain high standards for its profession with diligent effort being made toward practical training and application that will help persons carry out their commitment to Christ in everyday living.

A. Report for 1971-1972

1. *Youth Music Workshop* Held at Methodist College, the first Workshop had seventy-five participants.
2. *Co-operation in Workshops* It was recommended that we co-operate in music workshops at Atlantic Christian College and East Carolina University. These workshops were not held.
3. *Handbell Festival and Workshop* Ten handbell choirs took part in the Handbell Festival in Raleigh in April. Outstanding leadership was provided by The Rev. James V. Salzwedel, Home Moravian Church, Winston-Salem.
4. *Children's Choir Festivals* Four districts (Burlington, Durham, Raleigh, Wilmington) held Children's Choir Festivals. Almost three hundred persons took part in these workshops-festivals.

7. *Lay Worker Status* Persons eligible for the lay worker status were advised of the advantages of the Lay Worker status. Responsibility for the Lay Worker rests with the Committee on the Lay Worker.
8. *Certification* Each local church musician received a mailing about the recognition of music assistants, associates, and directors and ministers of music. A complete list of music assistants has been prepared for the first time and an effort made to update it just before annual conference. In renewing certification of directors and ministers of music, the Committee on Music Ministry directed its sub-committee on certification to write each applicant for renewal to recognize those strong points in his music ministry and to suggest ways of strengthening his music ministry. These letters were written. The music assistants were advised of the possibilities of becoming associates in music or directors of music.
9. *Leadership in Music* Contacts were made with those responsible for music at annual conference and at R & R to offer the assistance of members of the Fellowship of United Methodist Musicians in planning and implementing the music for these events.
10. *Advocate Program Supplement* The articles on music ministry have been continued in the Program Supplement of the *North Carolina Christian Advocate*.
11. *Luncheon during Annual Conference* Each local church musician has been invited to a luncheon during the 1972 Annual Conference. The group will take a look at the past year and consider the plans for 1972-1973.
12. *Fellowship of United Methodist Musicians* Articles in the *Advocate* have been used to encourage membership in the Fellowship.

SECTION G

Committee on Camping Ministry

Dr. J. S. Blair, Jr., *Chairman*

I. Report for 1971-72.

- A. We, recommended, in addition to the eight weeks of regular resident Camp, special camps for families, mentally retarded, senior high aquatics, local church group, two-week and four-week camps.
 Report: These programs were all conducted in the summer of 1971 with a total attendance of 1584, 100 more than 1970.
- B. We recommended a resident manager at Camp Kerr Lake to supervise the new day use area and coordinate use of the camp.
 Report: Steve and Karen Ruterford were assigned to Kerr Lake for the summer by the Duke Divinity School. Since early fall Henry Grant has been living at the camp and serving as camp manager. It has been a busy and exciting year with 1441 persons using the camp.
- C. We recommended that the Board of Education be authorized to continue to receive funds for the Campership Fund to help disadvantaged persons attend camp.
 Report: The Myra Morris Campership Fund was established as an endowed fund which now has grown to approximately \$4,400.00. In 1971 a total of \$1,690 was spent to help 109 persons attend camp.
- D. We recommended that efforts be continued to develop an inclusive camping program at both the camper and staff levels.
 Report: Staff interview sessions were conducted at twenty college campuses, in eastern North Carolina. The Campership Fund was used to help disadvantaged persons attend camp.
- E. We recommended that possibilities be explored for ecumenical and cooperative approaches to camping.
 Report: An interdenomination regional camp training and planning session was set up for the southeast in April, 1972. A group from our summer camp training staff were sent.

F. We recommended that local churches be encouraged and helped to make better year round use of our four campsites for Day Camping, Retreats, Planning Sessions, Fellowship, Enrichment, Study Setting, etc.

Report: New and improved brochures for each camp were prepared and distributed, showing available facilities at the camps and possible uses. Year-round use has increased noticeably this year.

G. We recommended that work camps and service projects be encouraged and planned for at each of the camps.

Report: This is more feasible now with supervisory staff at each camp. A number of work projects have been held this year.

H. We recommended that \$50,000 be granted from World Service for Camp maintenance for use in 1972-73.

Report: In 1971-72, an indication of a shift in emphasis from property to personnel and supervision was the securing of a resident manager at Camp Don-Lee and Kerr Lake, and the employment of an assistant to the Superintendent of Camps.

I. We recommended that the Committee on Camping Ministry be authorized to proceed with the construction and development of priorities at each camp, based on priorities set by the Camp Committee, as funds become available, without incurring indebtedness.

Report: Major developments this year include:

Chestnut Ridge: New canvass for the wagons and hogans and the addition of some teepees.

Don-Lee: Improvements in the manager's residence, renovation of the kitchen, and replacement of the pier.

Kerr Lake: Opening of the new Family Camping Area this spring; new canvass and cooking equipment for the hogan units.

Rockfish: A new pavilion given by the Chestnut Street Church in Lumberton as part of the Day-Use Area.

J. Budget Summary:

Program: We came through the summer of 1971 with an optimistic program report. Fees for retreat groups and summer camp remain the same this year as last. Although salaries and food costs have gone up, we expect, through increasing year-round use of the camps and diversified summer program, to continue with a balanced budget.

Maintenance: Costs continue to rise as our four camps are improved and as their use increases. The Maintenance Fund will continue to need undergirding by work groups and special projects:

Crusade: This is the final year of the Camp Crusade, undertaken to help meet some of the emergency needs of the camps. Of the \$300,000 goal, approximately two-thirds has been paid in. It is hoped that churches, individuals, and groups who have not done so will make every effort to complete their share of this important part of their church's ministry.

Major projects completed to date through the Camp Crusade include:

Chestnut Ridge: The Staff House and the Mebane Cabin

Don-Lee: The new beach, renovation of kitchen, roofs, beds, improvements in manager's residence.

Kerr Lake: Day Use Area and Family Camp Area

Rockfish: Lodge and six cabins

Some of the critical needs still pending include:

Chestnut Ridge: Dining hall and day use area.

Don-Lee: Dining Hall Renovation, Staff House-Retreat Center.
Kerr Lake: Caretaker's House, a winterized facility.
Rockfish: Swimming pool, staff house.

Summary of Oral Reports of College Representatives to Commission Members

Representatives of conference related institutions of higher education presented oral reports at the Commission meeting on February 22, 1972. The following highlights are summarized from these reports.

Financial difficulties among the colleges are directly related to insufficient enrollment.

Tuition fees are higher than public schools.

Scholarship and loan programs offset a large number of hardship cases, but funds are insufficient to meet the need.

The program of assistance to private colleges by the North Carolina General Assembly will be of tremendous value in the long run.

Cooperative movements among students and alumni can operate to reduce costs of operation, recruitment, and esprit de corps on our campuses.

Methodist people must send their Methodist young people to our Methodist colleges in larger numbers than at present.

The continued operation of colleges that enroll mostly black students can be justified on the basis of the needs of these people in the sociological and ethnic challenges that are unique to them.

The problems of deferred maintenance and capital expenditures are a part of long-range needs. The reduction of capital indebtedness is encouraging but still remains critical in some cases.

The development of community colleges and technical institutes has encouraged the church-related schools to take a close look at their policies of enrollment and transfer.

Each church-related college must be able to state its unique contribution to the religious and educational processes which justify the existence of that institution as a separate entity. "We need to be more unashamedly Christian."

A concerted effort to reduce the attrition of students already enrolled in church colleges could help to maintain enrollment as well as a higher goal to educate students who would lose their opportunity for higher education.

From the Divinity School comes the report that there is a renewed interest in the parish ministry and a concern to bolster the work of the practical fields.

Ministerial education funds came at a time when many divinity schools were in financial difficulty. This fund has been a real blessing to ministerial education both in divinity schools and other training enterprises.

Campus ministries on non-Methodist campuses are working under the limitations of a strict budget. Some new ministries are needed and it becomes more apparent that all new ministries must be ecumenical enterprises.

Communications with the presidents and officials on college campuses point out

the obvious needs and the spirit of cooperation. We must strengthen the ties that make the work of the college and the church a true partnership in mission. Our human resources are now needed to solve problems that are described as financial and spiritual—we must have people!

A Study:

THE FUTURE OF NORTH CAROLINA METHODIST COLLEGES*

Bishop Cannon, Rev. Winberry, members of the Annual Conference, fellow Methodists appreciate very much the opportunity to address the Annual Conference on the subject "Future of North Carolina Methodist Colleges." Please know that what I am about to say co with the general endorsement of your Commission on Christian Higher Education and Campus Ministry and the Conference Board of Education, the specific endorsement of majority of the membership of these two groups, and further, to use John Gardner's phr from "a critical lover."

By definition when this conference considers the future of North Carolina Metho colleges, it includes not only those related in the most direct way—Louisburg, North Caro Wesleyan and Methodist—but also some aspects concerning those related historica Greensboro and High Point. Add to these involvements, an emerging though financially st relationship with Bennett and the historic interest in Duke, now expressed primarily thro limited sustaining support of the Divinity School.

The 1970 Annual Conference asked that a study be made of the relationship of Conference to the colleges supported in part by this Conference. An interim report was sent to the 1971 Annual Conference which indicated that there were too many quest which could not be answered immediately and recommended that the study period be tended.

At that time (in June 1971) there were far-reaching proposals concerning the financin higher education both at the state and federal level which, if funded to any degree, w influence the current and future status of our Methodist related colleges.

In addition the three Conference colleges—Louisburg, North Carolina Wesleyan, Methodist—were all in fund-raising campaigns as well as in the middle of accelerated recrui campaigns for new students.

Then, too, the Conference would in the months immediately following the 1971 An Conference session discuss and act on key issues which have an enormous long-range im upon the total financial structure of the Conference.

Further it was the opinion of a number of the members of the Commission that to b the Conference to any decision regarding the future relationship of the Conference and colleges, no matter how necessary the ultimate resolve, would be premature until the follow questions could be answered:

- (1) What continuing financial support is needed by the colleges?
- (2) What is the role of the Conference college in support of the program of the local church and of the Conference?
- (3) What action will Federal and State governments take in support of private higher education?
- (4) What position will the Council on the Church-Related Colleges, a task force created by the Division of Higher Education of the General Board of Education of the United Methodist Church, take regarding "whether" and "why" *viz a viz* the total involvement of the United Methodist Church in higher education?

Since last June the national task force of the church has published a number of papers, some contradictory to others. National and jurisdictional meetings have been held to discuss findings and alternate positions. In general the answer has been that the church cannot afford to get out of higher education even though many are not convinced that the church can afford to stay in. The papers published so far suggest that the church college in current form is having an increasingly difficult job of defining a way in which it can be appreciated sufficiently enough to attract students and serve the church in traditional ways. In the final report of the national study groups, under the general leadership of Dr. Myron Wicke of the Charlotte office, a strong call has come for maintenance and increased support of Methodist colleges as being vital to the church. Such a call to be effective must be given strong witness at the conference level and in the majority of our local churches.

With regard to federal and state support, the congressional session is still in process, but it is becoming apparent that large scale assistance from Washington is not to be forthcoming this year. While we might expect some increased type of federal intervention over that of the past year, such support, unless fully funded, is not likely to change significantly present conditions and thus current problems, either for private institutions or for students attending private colleges and universities.

The North Carolina General Assembly did increase its loan program for students and passed landmark legislation regarding the State and its relationship with private colleges. Legislation authorizing contracts to provide financial aid to needy North Carolina students attending the 41 private colleges was funded for over \$1 million. The money will be paid to private colleges and universities on the basis of additional North Carolinians beyond a base enrollment in 1970 (up to \$450 per student) and a smaller amount (approximately 25 percent) for each North Carolina student enrolled up to the base figure. Though this amount does not "save" any college, it is a clear expression of appreciation of the contribution of the private college to the State and further recognition that this contribution be continued and expanded if possible.

The legislation establishing the Board of Governors and a redefined University of North Carolina charges the Board with assessing the needs and problems of private higher education so that recommendations can be made to the end that the contribution of private colleges may be continued.

Given, however, the large number of requests from all state agencies to be made to the North Carolina General Assembly, only the most optimistic see much increase in this program for the 1973-75 biennium.

Representatives of your Commission have met with Bishop Cannon, with Dr. C. P. Cannon, and with the presidents of the Methodist colleges on several occasions this past year. The Commission chairman visited each campus located in the Conference in November to discuss at length with the president and members of his administration and faculty the questions that we face and to evaluate the status of the physical facilities.

Following a meeting in late October, Presidents Robbins, Collins, and Weaver outlined a proposed church-college relationship statement which sought to answer the two questions: (1) What do our colleges expect and need from the Conference? and (2) what do our churches expect and need from our colleges? The statement as drafted added a third section defining how this partnership should be achieved.

In all of our meetings and conversations the college presidents were divided upon the need for an in-depth study or updating of the so-called "Decker Report." They were agreed that instead a report of assets was needed. They said that most of the problems came from a basic one—lack of students in general and Methodist students specifically. A consensus gradually emerged from these discussions that what was needed was not a study but instead a positive plan and procedure.

From the discussions with presidents of the three colleges and from many others, pastors and laymen alike, it also became clear to your Commission that the overall relationship between campus and local pastor is not a close one and is not designed nor is it at present to channel students at an appropriate and necessary rate into our Methodist colleges. We note with little exception since 1968 the continuing decrease in student enrollment in Methodist colleges. If we were to examine the number of Methodists and compare the number from this Conference we would see that the aspirations of the late 50's

have been less than realized. This is true even though since 1955 the total enrollment in North Carolina public and private institutions has tripled from less than 50,000 of which (48% private) to nearly 150,000 (33% private). While the enrollment in private colleges has doubled during this time, the public sector has quadrupled. Furthermore, last year when the private colleges increased their enrollment 4%, all but one of the United Methodist colleges in North Carolina reported lower student totals.

Representatives of conference related institutions of higher education presented oral reports at the Commission meeting this past February 22, 1972.

The following highlights are summarized from these reports:

1. Financial difficulties among the colleges are directly related to insufficient enrollment.
2. One factor causing the enrollment problem is that tuition fees are higher than those of public institutions.
3. Scholarship and loan programs offset a large number of hardship cases, but available scholarship and loan funds are insufficient to meet the need.
4. The program of assistance to private colleges by the N. C. General Assembly will be of value in the long run, but to be effective, it must be increased significantly.
5. Methodists must send their young people to our Methodist colleges in larger numbers than at present.
6. The problems of deferred maintenance and capital expenditures are a part of long-range needs. The reduction of capital indebtedness is encouraging but still remains critical.
7. Each church-related college must be able to state its unique contribution to the religious and educational processes which justify the existence of that institution as a separate entity.
8. A concerted effort to reduce the attrition of students already enrolled in church colleges could help to maintain enrollment as well as serving a higher goal of educating students who otherwise would lose their opportunity for higher education.
9. Communications with the presidents and officials on college campuses point out the obvious financial needs and the spirit of cooperation. We must strengthen the ties that make the work of the college and the church a true partnership in mission. Our human resources are now needed to solve problems that are described as financial and spiritual — we must have *people!*

These candid statements reflect an increasing willingness of the college administrators to face the problems and solutions as more than just "money."

In the meetings of the Commission over the past four years, in discussion with those responsible for the nurture of our institutions of higher education, in talking with laymen and ministers who are concerned about the role of higher education in the future of our church, even though at the same time there are those asking "how can we get out of a vast commitment to higher education?", there seems to be a stronger voice saying that we must save our colleges and utilize them for the future of our church *far more effectively* than has been true in the immediate past several years. There is a constant reiteration that the Conference needs much more service from the institutions than is now being received.

It is true that there are many deficiencies some of which I have listed. In addition to the more widely known fiscal problems, there are serious problems of deferred maintenance on our physical facilities and unless more adequate support is forthcoming there will be serious academic deficits. I mention the latter to call attention that we cannot afford to sponsor colleges where the support for programs and personnel are not competitive with comparable institutions in the public sector.

Quite simply our colleges must:

- (1) be academically competitive so that the graduates may find success in further study and vocational pursuit,
- (2) give and emphasize attention to the individual, and
- (3) provide an environment that is unashamedly Christian, however we might define such an atmosphere.

These three principles are expensive but providing less for agencies of the United Methodist church will cost more in both short range and most especially in the long run.

My allotted time this morning is limited and though I could easily and would gladly add here all day and into the night to discuss the issue with you, let me hasten on.

Before moving to specific recommendations to the Conference for the next quadrennium, there are three additional comments.

First, from Duke Divinity School comes the report that there is a renewed interest in parish ministry and a concern to bolster the work of the practical fields. Ministerial education funds came at a time when many divinity schools were in financial difficulty. This aid has been a real blessing to ministerial education both in divinity schools and other training enterprises. It is essential that the fund or its equivalent be continued and enlarged.

Secondly, campus ministries on non-Methodist campuses are working under the limitations of a strict budget. It becomes more apparent that new ministries must be developed if we are to meet the challenge on the public campuses.

Thirdly, there is sincere division over the future of the historic black college, such as Bennett. Many feel that these institutions which have provided practically the only opportunity in the past for developing black leadership for the church should be continued and supported at a greater level. This is the basic position of the church itself as well as the Council of Presidents of twelve Negro colleges related to the United Methodist church. Others feel that this question of the role of black colleges should be kept open for discussion. The question cannot be ignored nor can we discount the need to develop a more compatible society in what will be an increasingly integrated community. Full discussion of the best way to utilize Bennett College and other colleges connected with our church must continue throughout the next four years.

This is my third opportunity to report to an Annual Conference this quadrennium. During these four years, your Commission on Christian Higher Education and the Campus Ministry has tried to face the college issue as your representatives.

In the delightful and instructive story, *Alice in Wonderland*, Alice asks the Cheshire Cat, "Which way shall I go?" And the cat replies, "where are you trying to get to?"

Alice then says, "It really doesn't matter." To which the Cheshire Cat replies, "Well, in that case, it really doesn't matter which way you go."

Dear Friends, your Commission and your Board of Education and many, many others, including your chairman, think that it is important which way we go. We would point out to you as the Cheshire Cat did, that if the answer is only to get to some undefined goal, you are sure to do that if you keep going long enough.

We have come to the distinct conclusion that these colleges represent a marvelous opportunity for the extension of our church and the Christian heritage. Frankly, so long as we view our Methodist colleges as "problems" frustration will continue.

It seems to us that the Conference for good reason decided in the mid 1950's to take an expanded role in educating talented young people in a Christian setting and under the sponsorship of Christian principles. If the decision were not proper in any way, perhaps it is only to the extreme degree of ambition at that time and a vagueness of priority since we have three institutions, each different from the other and in large measure serving separate constituencies. The potential is there to give great service necessary for the viability of the church. We simply are not using these colleges nor are the colleges offering full opportunities to the Conference. There is here a "circle of deficiency" which must be broken by the two-fold process of getting more Methodist young people into the colleges and developing a more direct relationship between the college campus and the local church. We do this, the North Carolina Conference will be a leader—not in higher education but for the greater glory of God and our Savior. *And that, friends, is why we are here.*

Specifically we must develop such a close relationship between these colleges and each local church that service to humanity is brought to its greatest peak of implementation. There is nothing more idealistic nor more practical than this goal. It is a realistic aspiration. Modest expenditures are necessary but the rewards are everlasting. This Conference is in desperate need of leadership training opportunities in ways in which we are not only paying lip service. The colleges need nurture and love from the local church which for the most part is missing.

What are some practical ways by which we can break the circle of non-service, non-appreciation, and non-attendance?

(1) Immediate steps must be taken by Conference officials and representatives of each college located in the N. C. Conference boundaries to develop ways, means, and program to increase, many fold, its service to the Conference and to the local church. The relationship must be so demanding, so enthusiastic, and so influential that the tangible bonds between those of the committed spirit rather than tokenism. Support in the form of students and resource will inevitably follow.

(2) Each campus should employ for a three-year period, beginning this fall, a visiting alumnus to visit in the conference area each church, each pastor, and as many of the Methodist homes as possible to explain the opportunities available at Louisburg, at New Wesleyan, and at Methodist in Fayetteville.

(3) We must raise our sustaining support to higher levels. My personal recommendation is that this figure go to at least \$250,000 annually each for Wesleyan and Methodist \$175,000 for Louisburg and designate these additional funds to support scholarship and loan opportunities and to reduce tuition for Methodist students from this Conference. Consideration should be given to lower tuition charges for Conference members. Additional scholarship and loan funds should be established in each church for its young people attending Conference colleges.

(4) Each college should be encouraged to engage in individual fund-raising campaigns for both current operational support and also to reduce indebtedness.

(5) No new buildings should be undertaken without adequate financing clearly discernible. (There are building needs but these should not be undertaken without funds largely in sight.) Additional self-liquidating projects will add to financial problems, prevent them.

(6) An evaluation must be made of the historic relationship of the Conference with Greensboro and High Point. The Commission has recommended this evaluation to you in the Annual Report.

There are other practical ideas which would evolve from those listed above.

We are at a cross roads or a fork or a U turn; either way, a decision point. Do we withdraw from higher education or does this Conference continue to consider a view of higher education which believes that it is important to our faith and its institutional life.

... The campus, acknowledged battleground for ideas and the place for gaining allegiance of leaders, is more than a place of casual interest for the church. It is here that the climate and mood of the future must be ascertained and the leaders discovered and confirmed if the faith would continue to speak and serve relevantly. It is here that the faith must meet, cope with and master the alien forces or ideas that threaten. The campus, in one sense, becomes the central point of engagement in the ever-existent battle for the world. . . .*

Are our Methodist colleges to be considered "problems" or are they instead to be treated as "opportunities?"

We have about three or four years at the most to discover the answer, some say less. If the recommendations above and others which may follow are not successful, there are those who feel that realistic alternatives by 1975 or 1976 may be to "free" individual institutions to seek other support and sponsorship or to close.

Our church cannot afford to sponsor less than first quality programs within a mission. Unless we intensify and expand the relationship between Conference, local church and college, we should face squarely the realities of the current situation.

We recommend this accelerated activity. If the effort is not forthcoming, if the spirit will are both too weak, three to four years should unmask it. If, on the other hand, the North Carolina Conference is to fulfill its mission of service, outreach, and revival, no activity or spiritual commitment in support of conference colleges will be in vain.

Regional Commission on Christian Higher Education and Campus Ministry
Report for 1971-1972

Dr. Philip L. Shore, Jr., *Chairman*

In a time of unpredictable change it is gratifying to report that the campuses of our state are responding with unusual warmth to the ministries being led by our Methodist Campus Ministers. In the often-reported opinions of these excellent men and women, we are experiencing a time of great opportunity with a generation of open and inquiring students.

During the year, our two cooperating Conferences supported work at A and T University, Greensboro; Appalachian State University, Boone; Duke University, Durham; The Wesley Foundation at Greenville; North Carolina Central University, Durham (ecumenically supported); The Wesley Foundation at Raleigh (two campus ministers); The University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill (one minister, one associate); The University of North Carolina at Charlotte (ecumenically supported); The University of North Carolina at Greensboro; Pembroke State University (part-time); Western Carolina University; The Wesley Foundation at Winston-Salem. Personnel changes this year saw Miss Cathy Carlson installed as campus minister at Duke; Sheryl Scrimsher as associate at Wesley Foundation, Raleigh; and Hugh Stohler as associate at UNC-Chapel Hill.

The Commission is in the process of examining the other state-supported colleges and universities to explore the opportunity for new programs. The University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill is expected to request support of an ecumenical work on that campus.

The work of the Commission has been carried on primarily through the intensive work of committees on Personnel, Program, Finance, Facilities, and Church-Related Colleges/Institutions. The Commission chairman continues to act as State Director. Guidelines for the improved operation of each of the committees have been drawn up and adopted.

In continuing the process of seeking a better expression of The United Methodist Church's commitment to an ecumenical approach to campus ministry (par. 1037, 1968 *Discipline*), the Regional Commission has helped to form a Commission on Campus Ministry consisting of Methodist, Episcopal, and Presbyterian (U.S.) representatives. The initial plans of the group are: (1) to confer on a regular basis; (2) to confer when an opening comes in the ministries supported by any one of the three denominations; (3) to work toward securing a Field Director for overall supervision to the work of these denominations on campus ministry.

The Bishop's Conference on Higher Education (set for June 29-30, 1972) promises to be of benefit to our entire field of higher education and campus ministry. This long-projected conference will bring together a broad representation of the education agencies of the two Conferences; the Regional Commission; college and university administration, students, and faculty; and other persons who can contribute to the strength of the United Methodist Church through higher education. The theme of the conference is "The College-Related Ministry."

Grateful always for the long and faithful support of the two Conferences, the Commission would remind our constituencies that inflation makes new demands upon our tight budget. Further, that new fields of service cannot be entered into (nor a statewide ecumenical program be employed) until additional monies are made available to the Regional Commission. The campus ministry under our care is highly strategic and merits the prayers, the interest, and the support of all Methodists.

The campus ministers currently serving under the programs supported by the two United Methodist Conferences in North Carolina are: Sheryl Scrimsher and Neal McGlamery - The Wesley Foundation at Raleigh; Robert L. Johnson and Hugh Dale Stohler (Program Director) - UNC-Chapel Hill; Mark S. Rose - The Wesley Foundation at Winston-Salem; C. Weekley - Western Carolina University; Henry A. Bizzell, Jr. - Pembroke State University; Manuel Wortman - Appalachian State University; Dave Frye - UNC-Charlotte; Doug Stohler - UNC-Greensboro; Dan Earnhardt - The Wesley Foundation at Greenville; Cathy Carlson - Duke University; William T. Brown - A and T State University.

THE COMMISSION ON ENLISTMENT FOR CHURCH OCCUPATIONS

The Commission on Enlistment for Church Occupations is charged with the responsibility for promoting among youth and adults a philosophy for Christian vocations that recognizes the potential sacredness of all useful work and all opportunities for Christian service. It is further called on by the church to present to youth and adults the opportunities for the pastoral ministry, to inform them of the necessary steps of preparation and to keep accurate, and use the records of each person having indicated an interest in a church occupation. With the above in mind, the Commission on Enlistment for Church Occupations has done the following:

1. Guidance and Testing Clinic was held at Wesleyan College, Rocky Mount, N. C. The clinic was conducted for high school sophomores, juniors, and seniors on October 22-23, 1971, February 11-12, 1972, and March 24-25, 1972.
2. A central filing system is being kept on persons interested in the pastoral ministry or other church employment. This file is kept in the Program Council Director's office and is updated each year.
3. In an effort to promote Ministry Sunday a joint letter from the Commission on Enlistment for Church Occupations and the Board of the Ministry was mailed to every pastor in the North Carolina Conference.
4. A special luncheon was held at Duke University in Old Trinity Room on Monday, June 5, by this Commission and the Board of the Ministry for candidates coming into the connection at the 1972 Annual Conference.
5. Lay Scholarship offerings were received at all Lay Rallies and a number of scholarships were presented to deserving students.
6. A one-day meeting on the pastoral ministry was held at Edenton Street United Methodist Church on Saturday, April 8. Both the Commission and Conference Committee on Youth Work shared in the planning of this meeting.
7. Voluntary Intern Programs were encouraged by the Commission to be held at a number of churches. This program seeks to develop talent to work in local church situations as youth workers, church musicians, children's workers and other church involved programs.
8. This Commission Chairman, as a member of the Interboard Committee on Church Occupations for the national church, attended the Annual Board Meeting in Dayton, Ohio, on October 14 and 15. At this meeting he was appointed to share in the drafting of important legislation to be sent to the General Conference pertaining to the reorganizational structure which would affect the Interboard Committee on Enlistment for Church Occupations.

THE BOARD OF EVANGELISM, INCORPORATED

The late Bishop Ralph Cushman wrote "More of us need a certainty about Christ. Certainly that Evangelism - essential Evangelism - must be sure that this Christ whom Paul pictures as 'Lord' must be exalted as the supreme object of the soul's allegiance . . . to the Apostle Paul Christianity meant Christ the Lord. The Sermon on the Mount did indeed offer the noblest ethical standards that earth had ever known. But the heart of that sermon was the Christ who preached it. Paul was sure of his gospel only because he was sure of his Lord."

As we end this quadrennium of service to our Lord through this Board - a service that has been constant and exemplary by all members of the Board - we recognize that this has been a time of tremendous change within the structure of the Church and our Conference. The change is yet to come. Yet, we rejoice in the privilege we have had to serve.

We now join the recently adjourned General Conference in a common concern that needs to be more genuine and knowledgeable confrontation on a person-to-person basis extending the love of Jesus Christ, His grace, and the opportunity to serve through His Church. To fail to put Evangelism first is to put the cart before the horse. It is an awesome task

use it lulls us into thinking that we can assume the task of Evangelism is done and we can scatter from the church after Divine Worship to share what we do not have. To those who see Evangelism as being the code word for generalized, sugary piousness of another generation, we are brought up short by the startling fact that our membership is generally increasing. While we have been "busy here and there about many things" the essential spirit of Christ may well be leaving the church we love. Dean Kelley, an official of the National Council of Churches, reveals the hard truth backed by honest statistics. In his recent book, *Why Evangelical Churches Are Growing*, Kelley does not find that people are attempting to escape responsibility, avoid social concerns, seek self-determinism and isolation, or evade connectionalism. He discovers that people want to be *sure about Jesus* and they want a whole life and a whole church and whole life-not just a structure and a busy organizational chart. The Board commends The Reverend Ernest R. Porter for his help in co-ordinating our annual program during the past year.

Many churches have followed the suggestions of the annual program and have taught the message in "An Adventure in the Meaning of United Methodist Membership" and followed it with efforts to reactivate inactive members through their rededication to Christ's Church. We praise God for the faithfulness of hard working pastors and faithful laymen.

Members of the District Secretaries of Evangelism have worked hard with the pastors in their districts, with a least six districts having special retreats to emphasize our current goals.

Attendance at Executive Committee Meetings and the Full Board and its programs has been generally good with an excellent spirit and open discussion of mission, purpose, and priority.

We particularly commend our Conference Secretary of Evangelism, The Reverend R. L. Porter, and The Reverend H. M. McLamb for their dedicated work in a pilot Key '73 - type project in arranging and conducting Southern Baptists-Methodists "Regional Evangelism Conferences for Men" which were held in Fayetteville, Durham, and Rocky Mount on October 19, and 21, 1971.

Our members of the Board attended the Candler Camp Meeting and Workshops on Evangelism at Lake Junaluska last summer, June 15-21, 1971.

The summer beach ministries continued to grow and become even more successful. Both the ministry at Kitty Hawk and the Bogue Banks ministry have reached more than 150,000 in various projects and programs.

The Board was represented at the General Board of Evangelism Meeting in San Francisco in July of 1972 by The Reverend E. R. Porter. The entire Board feels honored that our new liaison with the Conference Program Council was elected as the Southeastern Jurisdiction representative to the Fellowship of Program Council Staff Workers in Evangelism. He was also elected as the representative from the Southeastern Jurisdiction to serve on the nominating committee of The National Council on Evangelism.

In March we had an historic Consultation on Evangelism at The Divinity School of Duke University on the 14th and 15th. Participating were leaders in Evangelism from the Western North Carolina Conference, The North Carolina Conference, The General Board of Evangelism and the Divinity School Faculty. The program was conceived by Dr. Thor Hall of the Divinity School and Dr. Chester Custer of The General Board. Position papers were presented and a dialog was found to be an asset in our planning for the future.

One-day Evangelism workshops on Rethinking Evangelism and Models of Evangelism in the local Church were held at St. James Church in Greenville and Haymount Church in Fayetteville May 3 and 4, 1972. Resource leaders included Dr. Custer and The Reverend Mr. Porter.

The Board President offered his services as consultant and preacher as his time permitted and wherever he was invited. He was involved in activities in four districts and at all Program Council functions.

During the year the Conference Secretary of Evangelism along with District Secretaries and Executive Committee of the Board have been working toward programing for "Key '73," a priority item for implementation assigned by the Program Council. The fruits of their labors are exhibited in the recommendations approved by the Program Council for 1972-73.

The Board continued to confirm its affiliation with and support of the Commission on Ecumenical Fellowship by co-sponsoring the Bishop's Meetings with Young Methodists.

During our Meeting of the Full Board on March 9, 1972, we commended the Church to the stewardship of total commitment through local church participation in Key '73 and submitted a proposed program for 1972-73 to the Program Council. In other action, The Reverend Tommy Tyson was recommended to be continued as an "Approved Evangelist" and The Reverend J. H. Kinkle was recommended to the Bishop and the Cabinet for that relationship beginning in June, 1972.

While statistical results alone do not show all that is happening within the Church, we are encouraged about the future, there is a small increase in membership. We do believe that only when we can relate to our fellow man - Christian and non-Christian - and tell him how Christ has changed our lives and given to them eternal meaning, in such a way that is meaningful to our neighbor, can we say that we have done our task. John Wesley said, "I gave them Christ. What greater gift can any Christian give than this gift - an inseparable and imperishable relationship between the disciple and the Lord Jesus Christ! So Paul cries, "Who shall separate us from the love of Christ? . . . For I am persuaded that neither death nor life . . . nor things present nor things to come . . . Shall be able to separate us from the love of God which is Christ Jesus, Our Lord." Amen.

TRUSTEES OF THE METHODIST HOME FOR CHILDREN, INC.

PART I - REVIEW OF THE YEAR

The conference year 1971-1972 has been a time for continued planning for the future and a time of action. There have been no radical changes; rather, the progress has been steady.

In September 1971, the Board developed a campus development plan. This plan includes a map of the campus and the decisions made by the Board in previous sessions for adding an additional cottage to our campus and replacing one of the existing cottages. This plan will guide in the future development of recreation activity areas and the beautification of the various segments of our campus.

The architectural and engineering firm of Adams and Pegram was selected to draw the plans for the proposed cottages and for the remodeling of the Vann Administration Building. The firm is in the process of preparing plans now, but final decisions have not been made.

Revised Personnel Policies were adopted to take effect October 1, 1971. Included are a revision in the salary schedules and a revised Pension Plan for our retired employees. We expect these policies to help in the effort to recruit better qualified staff and to hold them.

The development of the center of our campus for the use of the children as their recreation and activity area has continued. Drainpipes were laid to take care of the surface water. A concrete playing court was laid, surrounded by a fence, to be used for basketball, tennis, volleyball and other court games that could be played out of doors. It is intended to concentrate all of the outdoor recreation activities in this area in the future.

The Groveland House in the Cameron Park area, which had been purchased last year, was put into use in August 1971. The purpose of this facility is to provide a better opportunity for older youth, approaching the time when they will be leaving the Methodist Home, to be prepared for the acceptance of full responsibility for themselves. By separating these students from the campus, we are able to carry on a different program than would be possible on campus. In the Groveland House, the students are much more involved in the decisions concerning their own personal lives and conduct; and in making all the decisions involve operating the house. They have much more responsibility for budgeting their own expenses. During the year, much time and thought goes into planning for what comes after graduation. The Seniors graduated June 2, 1972. As we evaluate this first year's experience, we are sure this has been a helpful experience for these students. We believe that it will be even more helpful for the next group of students because we have learned many lessons through experience.

This year, our children in public school have had their usual share of the problems, and, in addition, they have had the problems that have arisen from having been assigned to different schools than the neighborhood schools they formerly attended. As a result of the new school assignments, most of our children have been transported to and from school in city school buses. It has been necessary to use our own bus part of the time. Most students have taken the aged situation in their stride, but some of them have had difficulty in making the necessary adjustments.

A group of people from a rapidly developing area in North Raleigh became interested in organizing the North Raleigh United Methodist Church. Since there was no meeting place available in their geographic area, arrangements were made for them to use the Monk Memorial Chapel on our campus temporarily for their beginning new church. We are glad that we could use our facilities for this purpose. The new church is anticipating that their building will be ready to occupy in the fall, and they will be able to move to their own quarters.

A fire occurred in the gymnasium on July 21, 1971, as a result of defective wiring. Damage in the neighborhood of \$22,000 and was covered by insurance. In the course of repairing damage we elected also to make some necessary improvements to the building. The result is that the gym is much more adequate for our use now than before the fire. It is a constant center of activity on our campus.

Every year, at Easter, the Alumni of the Methodist Home for Children have their reunion. At their meeting at Easter 1972, the Alumni made a gift of \$1,000 to the Home to be added to previous gifts which are being held in reserve for the Alumni project. Plans are to build a picnic shelter in the new recreation area to take the place of the picnic shelter, presently in poor condition and in great need of repair, which had been originally the gift of the Alumni.

During the year we have had an unusual turnover in our staff. Two members of our staff have been removed by retirement. Several others have resigned and taken other jobs. The result has been an unusually large number of necessary replacements. Because of the age of our present staff, there will be very few retirements in the next ten years.

PART II - PLANS FOR THE FUTURE

The Five-Year Plan of Action 1971-1975, which was adopted by the Board of Trustees in April 1971 and which was reported to the Annual Conference in our report last year, will be a guide for the next four years. The necessary enabling decision has already been made by the Board of Trustees for the construction of one cottage to replace Borden cottage, which is very inadequate for use, as a residence for children. As soon as plans for the cottage can be completed, a contract will be let. Plans are also in the making for providing adequate office space for our staff, but final commitments have not been made. A decision has been reached in agreement with a change in concept of providing health care to the students on campus. For a period of one year, students who are not well enough to go to school, but not sick enough to require hospitalization, will be cared for in their cottages rather than in the Infirmary. The purpose is to find a way to put into practice the recommendation of Dr. Keith-Lucas that seriously sick children be cared for by their own house-parents during this time when a child has such an emotional need. This will eliminate the overnight use of the Infirmary in the cases of illness. The Infirmary will be used as an outpatient clinic. Our Health Staff will continue to look after all the health needs of the children, including their appointments with the doctors. On the basis of this experiment, future decisions will be made about the Health Care program. At such time as a suitable house can be secured, a second off-campus home will be purchased. At additional high school students may have the same opportunity presently provided by the Groveland House.

REPORT NO. 2 THE METHODIST RETIREMENT HOMES, INC.

On September 1, 1955, The Methodist Retirement Home in Durham opened its doors to thirteen charter members with a capacity of forty. Today a 50 bed Health Center, forty-

apartments and added domiciliary facilities give The Home a capacity of 200. The Home has served over 400 retired persons.

Beginning with thirty acres of land donated by the Methodists of Durham and a \$100,000 memorial donation in 1954, The Home has grown to a capital investment in excess of \$2,000,000 without a capital funds drive by the Annual Conference. Also the total appropriations of the Annual Conference over the years is less than the cost of the benevolent work done in the name of The Church by The Home.

In a study to determine the best way to meet the needs of an ever-increasing number of the retired members of our Conference, the Board of Trustees of The Methodist Retirement Homes, Inc., sought the answer to four questions:

IS THERE A NEED FOR ADDITIONAL FACILITIES?

The Home in Durham is now filled to its capacity of 200 with the number of applications increasing rapidly. The number of people sixty five years of age in our population and in our church membership will double within the next fifteen years. This means that to serve the same proportionate number of people the facilities will have to be doubled. Seventy-five percent (75%) of the serious inquiries and applications for admission to The Home are from within a radius of fifty miles of Durham. Two-thirds of the Members are from the Burlington, Durham and Raleigh Districts. This does not mean that the retired members of the other nine Districts do not need or want the services offered by The Home but points out that older people want to remain close to "home" and "family." The facilities will have to be doubled to meet the present needs of the members in the other nine Districts.

Older people try to maintain themselves in their own community as long as possible, but as they live longer, a larger percent are eventually dependent on others for help. It is becoming impossible to hire or to pay for someone to go into a private home to help an older person. Therefore more people are expecting the church to provide a Home in which they may spend their remaining years. A Church Home provides a plus which cannot be obtained in other places.

WHAT KIND OF SERVICES ARE NEEDED?

If our church is truly to meet the needs of its retired people it must make provision to care for more retired "well" persons at homes strategically located within the Conference. These must include facilities for domiciliary care, apartments and cottages along with nursing facilities to care for these when individuals become sick.

Seventy-five percent of the applications for admission to The Home in Durham are from those who are no longer potential "retirement home members" but are already nursing cases because of chronic or critical illnesses. If the large group of chronically ill (long-term care patients) and nursing cases are to be cared for, facilities must be provided to serve these.

Many other Conferences of The United Methodist Church are now building facilities to care for the chronically and critically ill, in addition to their retirement homes now in operation. This is because they are finding a rapid increase in the demand for this service to those who are too sick to be admitted to a retirement home. Can our Conference turn its back on the needs of its retired members?

WHERE IS THE GREATEST NEED?

A North Carolina Medical Care Commission Survey shows that the greatest needs for additional nursing care facilities are in the eastern part of the Conference.

The Home in Durham is not meeting the needs of the Church's members in nine of the twelve Districts.

HOW CAN THE NEED BE MET?

The Board of Trustees feels that with the land and availability of Medical Services in Durham, a Health Care Center or Nursing Facility should be constructed in Durham when funds are available. They also feel that cottages and more apartments should be provided as needed, for these are self supporting.

A Nursing Care Facility should not be built for less than 100 to 150 beds, for economical operation and because there must be at least three levels of care in a nursing home, that is,

skilled nursing care, for short-term patients and the critically ill, care for the long-term chronically ill, and care for those who need close supervision.

Studies show that costs of construction of a new nursing home facility of the quality of buildings we have in Durham will run approximately \$30. per square foot, or \$12,000 to \$15,000 per bed.

Nursing home costs of operation in the Charlotte to Raleigh piedmont section of North Carolina are running from \$18 to \$25 per day while costs in the eastern part of the State are running somewhat less per day.

The Board of Trustees of The Home, however, is convinced in the light of information available, **THAT THE NEXT CONSTRUCTION SHOULD BE ANOTHER HOME STRATEGICALLY LOCATED WITHIN THE CONFERENCE.**

The Annual Conference meeting in June approved the request of The Methodist Retirement Homes, Inc. for permission to begin construction of another Home strategically located further east in the Conference as soon as land can be secured and financial arrangements made. The first unit will include facilities for Skilled Nursing Care to serve The Home's Members when they need its services as well as to accept nursing cases. Additional domiciliary facilities, apartments and cottages will be added as the need arises and these can be financed. The estimated cost for the first unit of 100 to 125 beds with sufficient land for future expansion is \$1,500,000.

The new home should be near a strongly concerned Methodist constituency. The Home derives a large portion of its religious and social programs from the concerned Methodists in the community, for they represent The United Methodist Church to the members of The Home.

There must be available adequate utilities including transportation, skilled and unskilled labor. These are the practical resources from which The Home constructs its program of services to its members.

Adequate medical services must be available, and a hospital, a church, and shopping facilities must be located within a reasonable distance of The Home.

Individuals, families, and groups in the local area should contribute a significant portion of the estimated cost for this demonstrates the readiness of the community to give the new home the kind of support that it must have.

The Annual Conference will not be asked to conduct a capital funds campaign. With the increased resources available to older people through present and proposed governmental social service and health programs, the cost of benevolent work to the Conference should not materially increase, but will allow the Church to increase the number of people served through the benevolent program of The Home.

A new Home offers an excellent opportunity for a living memorial for some individual or family, for The Home will grow and serve for generations. A person or persons making appropriate contributions to The Home may designate the Home or a portion of the Home as a memorial.

THE BOARD OF THE LAITY

Report No. 1

The Conference Board of the Laity met twice at regularly scheduled meetings during the year, plus two special meetings at Annual Conference and at the Methodist Men's Retreat Attendance, as usual, was good at both our Fall and Spring meetings. During the early part of our Conference year organizational meetings were held in each District with the District Boards of the Laity and representatives from the Program Council to discuss program plans for 1971-72.

On August 21-22, we held our Methodist Men's Retreat at Methodist College with 150 Laymen in attendance. The program was conducted by Charles Kellogg and Dwight Newberg from our General Board of the Laity and Harvey Mitchell, our Conference Director of United Methodist Men. The vast majority of the Laymen attending the Retreat expressed a desire that our Retreats be kept Spiritual in nature. The 1971 Retreat fulfilled this wish for most of the

ticipants. It is our desire to continue to program these retreats so as to provide opportunities for Spiritual Enrichment and Christian growth.

As in previous years, the Board of the Laity has encouraged each local church to observe Laymen's Day on October 8., or on some other Sunday that might be more convenient for the particular congregation.

October was also designated as Stewardship month and each District Board of the Laity was urged to encourage participation of congregations within their Districts. We do not feel that this effort of our program met with the success we had hoped for and we are therefore putting renewed emphasis on January as Stewardship month during the coming year.

Lay Officers training schools were held in most Districts under the sponsorship of the District Boards. It is planned that these schools will be continued in the future. However we recognize a need to make the sessions more attractive to the Laity to be trained.

In compliance with a request by the Conference Board of the Laity each District Board held Lay Speaker Training course prior to November, 1971. This training session trained approximately 450 Lay Speakers in time for the Lenten "No Silent Pulpit" program of 1972. The various District Boards scheduled approximately 400 speaking dates for Lay Speakers during the Lenten season. We were especially encouraged by the "new faces" that appeared at the completed Lay Speaker Training Sessions and then volunteered their services for the "No Silent Pulpit" program.

Lay Rallies were held in each District during February and a total of nearly 7000 Laity attended these rallies. This year for the first time ladies were in attendance at all of the rallies and in at least one District attendance increased nearly 40% because of their presence.

Report No. 2

The Commission on Lay Life and Work

The following are our continuing concerns:

Establish settings in each District for conversation between Laity and Clergy in which mutual understanding of the common ministry of witness and service of all Christians is sought.

Involve United Methodist Men through the UMM Retreat designed to inspire and educate our Laymen, interwoven with Christian fellowship.

Assist the Laity in developing their skills for service by improved and trained leadership through seminars and workshops. These sessions would be held on Laymen's Day or some other suitable day and would include training of Pastor-Parish Relations Committee, Administrative Boards, Charge Conferences, Board of Trustees, nominating committees, and those who serve as Lay Leader, Lay Member of Annual Conference and members of Committee on Lay Personnel, and the training of Certified Lay Speakers.

Support the clergy through the Lay Speaker program in supplying Certified Lay Speakers during the Lenten Season and at other times when the clergy needs time away from the local pulpit for retreats, training, and vacations.

Provide assistance in coordinating the most efficient programs in witnessing opportunities for the Laity, through local or district retreats, youth happenings, Lay Witness Missions, and other lay movements.

Report No. 3

The Commission on Stewardship and Finance

Our Conference Commission on Stewardship and Finance is an integral part of the newly created structure of the United Methodist Church, and its duties are "abbreviated," if not spelled out, in the title - "STEWARDSHIP AND FINANCE." The scope of its field, just as its responsibilities, is limited only by the extent of dedication and determination on the part of its appointed members in carrying out their responsibilities, as consecrated Christian laymen themselves are both exponents and practitioners of STEWARDSHIP in the use and sharing of their time, talents and possessions.

During the current conference year, the Commission on Stewardship and Finance has provided leadership and instruction in workshops on the subject, at the United Methodist Men Retreat, and Summer R and R, at Methodist College, in instructional sessions on Lay Speaker

training, before Methodist Men organizations, in worship services at local churches, and he offered its services (and sought advice and assistance) through letters to district directors and chairmen of Stewardship and Finance and Stewardship Education. Much of the successful accomplishment in this field is credited to our dedicated Conference Business Manager and Treasurer for his beyond-the-call service, across our conference, in speaking before groups and lending inspiration and guidance on the subject. Our abiding gratitude is extended to Charles McAdams, and to Walter Anderson and others for their dedicated and unselfish service.

While the Commission Chairman is in nowise content with achievements during the current year, it is well to point out that at least several hundred leaders among the laity in North Carolina Methodism have been "exposed" to instruction and up-date counsel and advice on the subject and, thereby, some good has been accomplished and progress made.

It is hoped a visitation schedule with district leaders across the Conference, in each district may be activated and that, through the use and application of recommended educational materials, a definite and continuing program may be started, in district and sub-district meetings with both clergy and laity, to the end that every local church may be represented and inspired to practice and teach stewardship.

Inspired to the fervent hope and prayer of the Commission that its efforts may serve to re-crea within its members, and in the Board of the Laity and the Conference, a renewed sense of Christian dedication and responsibility sufficient to continue the program set forth by our predecessors and that together we shall come to realize more fully our duties and privileges as Christian laymen in the awareness that God is the owner of all of life, that each individual human being is the Steward of all that God has entrusted to him, and that each person must give an accounting of his Stewardship — his time, his talents, and his material possessions.

To activate the necessary programs and to motivate others to help carry the Word, we need but recall to mind the Scriptural admonition of our Lord and Master when he reminded his followers that "the fields are white unto harvest, but the laborers are few."

The *Discipline* places with the Committee on the Lay Worker the responsibility of advising the Annual Conference of "ways in which lay workers of the Annual Conference may be supported."

The Committee on the Lay Worker calls the attention of the Annual Conference and especially the attention of Local Churches employing lay workers to Par. 507.1; the retirement plan of the Lay Employee Pension Fund (Par. 1377.12); or other such appropriate plan as provided by the Board of Pensions." (This refers to the General Board of Pensions). For the sake of uniformity we recommend that the Pension Plan for Lay Workers in the North Carolina Conference be based upon an annual contribution of 9% of the employee's salary - 6% to be paid by the employing agent and 3% by the employee (or some combination of percentages totaling up to 9%).

We encourage local churches employing lay workers to pay the premiums for the Blue Cross-Blue Shield Insurance plan; and participate, in their behalf, in the Conference program of Group Life Insurance.

The Committee on the Lay Worker also calls upon all local churches within her bounds to provide a pension program, as well as hospitalization and life insurance, for ALL LAY EMPLOYEES - not only those who qualify as lay workers.

As a member of the SPECIAL INSURANCE COMMITTEE, we call to your attention its report and trust you will vote in favor.

We are happy to have some small part in organizing this Committee this Quadrennium, and placing it along as far as it is now.

DEPARTMENT OF GIFTS AND WILLS

We are convinced that our church moves through the gifts of people who love God and wish to honor Him through their gifts. These gifts come from the abundance that people have who wish to extend their Christian lives through their giving.

We have planned more emphasis on giving for Scholarship Funds. We have placed emphasis on Ministerial Scholarship Funds because the church demands educated leadership, and young people who answer the call to be a minister in the United Methodist Church need assistance in getting an education. Eight of our funds set up in the Department of Gifts and Wills have been organized in the past three years. We will see as the years unfold the soundness of our investment in this Department of Gifts and Wills.

We have added two funds to our department this Conference year. The first one is known as the "Myra Morris Campership Fund" and was established by The Committee on Camping and Ministry of the Conference Board of Education. The second fund is the John C. Brauer Trust Fund which was established through the will of Dr. Brauer. Dr. Brauer was one of the first members of the Department of Gifts and Wills. This is the kind of gift from a consecrated Christian leader who will live in the years to come because of his love of God and concern for others. We have been in consultation concerning other Scholarship Funds. This field is a

growing one, in which more people are becoming interested in and are thus, participating in the growth of these funds.

We will have two scholarships from the Pittman-Frizzelle Fund to award this year, and two Ministerial Scholarships for the first time. One of these is from the Cobb-Evans Ministerial Scholarship Fund, and the other is from the Reverend Ralph E. Fowlkes, Jr. Memorial Scholarship Fund. All of our funds have grown this year: we have had additional gifts added to the principal and we have had our best year in our wills. We have been able to assist more people who have sought our help and counsel and were pleased that many of these have placed the church and its institutions in their wills.

We have been fortunate in having Mrs. Gwendolyn Mayes as our secretary to the directors of the Department of Gifts and Wills. She has given to us outstanding service in her contacts and knowledge of people and has supplied information that was needed to make the right approaches for our contact with people. All of us wish to express our love and appreciation for the noble service rendered to each of us.

We are grateful to have had the leadership and talent of Mr. I. Lee Parker, Jr., as chairman of our Department of Gifts and Wills. He is working for his church and its causes. The years will reveal his devotion as our work comes into fruition for the Kingdom of God.

STEWARDSHIP AND TITHING

Stewardship is a spiritual experience. It has its relationship in the beginning with God. We come to our relationship through His gift of life and the sustaining power of life; we have the opportunity to cooperate in this experience of stewardship by our acts of giving as a partnership with Him. We come to share a spiritual responsibility for all of life, and we witness to this spiritual experience by our gifts as well as by our proclamations. There are two beliefs that govern our stewardship. First, is the one I have referred to in our love and responsibilities to our Heavenly Father. The second guiding principle is in the needs of other people. In these two principles many of us are aware of our stewardship. We give out of our love for what God has done for us through Christ and because of compassion for others. The United Methodist Church has asked that we give at least a tithe as an expression of our love for God and our concern for others.

We have mailed the following materials in 1972: January, "Your Guide to Effective Giving 1972;" February, "27 Things the Pastor Can Do to Encourage Bequests;" March, "Stewardship and Effective Giving;" April, "The State Has Made your Will." We have supplied over 10,000 pieces of material this year for use in the local churches. We have continued to find people who are willing to make gifts and to place our interests in their wills.

The Raleigh District under the leadership of Reverend Kermit L. Braswell, the Director of Stewardship for the Raleigh District, secured the approval of Reverend J. W. Page, District Superintendent, and the Raleigh District Program Council, to conduct sub-district meetings on stewardship. The emphasis was "WHAT COULD HAPPEN IF OUR LOCAL CHURCHES FOLLOWED THROUGH ON THEIR EVERY-MEMBER COMMITMENT." The program on stewardship, as was promoted through the Every-Member Commitment at the Westover United Methodist Church under the direction of the pastor, was explained step by step in the Every-Member Commitment for the budget of the church. These workshops were well attended, and we believe that much good in the form of information and inspiration was made available to those in attendance. I was able to work with Mr. Braswell and Mr. Page in these meetings, and I feel that it was a worthwhile project.

Reverend J. W. Page, District Superintendent of the Raleigh District, promoted sub-district meetings to explain the One-Figure Asking for this year with special emphasis on the Pension plan that was adopted at the Special Session of Annual Conference. Mr. Page had the following persons to help him in his presentations: Kermit L. Braswell, J. Ed Legates, L. Merritt Jones, Charles K. McAdams, N. W. Grant and O. L. Hathaway. These sub-district meetings were well attended, and the people were given an opportunity to ask questions concerning the proposed budget for the Raleigh District. There was a great deal of interest in the meetings and a very warm spiritual atmosphere was created by those who participated in the work.

PERCENTAGE GIVING AND THE TITHE

This year our church through the Board of the Laity used the month of October as a time of study for special emphasis on Stewardship and Tithing. A further suggestion was made that

opportunities be given our people in November and December to practice tithing. We have some reports from churches that have worked faithfully towards getting their people to tithe. We believe that our people may be led to give a percentage of their income, and encouraged from year to year to raise their giving until they reach the tithe or more. We should be looking at this as a long-range program, and at the same time moving forward as rapidly as our people will accept the tithe as a minimum gift.

We are indebted to our Bishop, William R. Cannon, the District Superintendents, District Directors of Stewardship, District Directors of Gifts and Wills, and the pastors and laymen who have helped us in meeting these people who are extending their lives through their gifts. We pray for the continuance of this excellent relationship so that we may help you and our people do a better Christian work for the expansion of the Kingdom of God.

THE METHODIST MINISTERS CREDIT UNION

When our Conference held its last session in Trinity Methodist Church back in 1961, the Methodist Ministers Credit Union made the largest headlines in its history. The second section of the *Morning Herald* carried a streamer: "Money Changers In The Temple." A reporter had set up a table in the hallway of the educational building where our Credit Union was doing the best business in twenty-three years.

It was in that hallway that our assets passed the \$10,000.00 mark. It was there that we sold our first Estate Contract or Loan. This was an unbelievable report for some who watched our Credit Union through the years.

Now we are back, changing money in the temple - this time not so literally as before, but for the same purpose - to help our parsonage families practice thrift. Thrift is more than the practice of saving. It is the wise use of credit and the prudent and productive use of that which comes into our possession.

Whereas we were struggling to reach \$10,000.00 in 1961, we are now, eleven years later, reaching for \$500,000.00, and it is within our reach. We closed the month of May with \$5,631.01 in assets, and we are growing in June.

The use of the Estate Loan plan has been a great help in this growth. We invite you seriously to consider using it. On a \$2,000.00 contract, which is the largest we write on any one life, the borrower pays interest of \$190.60 over a period of thirty-six months. This loan is covered by an Estate Loan Protection Insurance Policy, not only against death but also, total and permanent disability without any cost above the interest which is a true 6% APR. The \$2,000.00 in shares purchased with the borrowed funds is matched by \$2,000.00 Life Insurance, which has a \$1,000.00 double indemnity rider and a \$2,000.00 accidental loss of sight and dismemberment rider. This insurance is provided for the shareholder by the Credit Union from its earnings. This in addition to the 4 1/2% per annum dividend that we have paid for several years. Dividends earned at this rate give the Estate Loan holder a profit of \$91.55 in dividends after repaying the loan for all the interest paid on his note. This is a bargain that is too good to miss. This year we added \$8,240.80 to our reserve fund to protect the shares you have bought. This was more than twice the legal requirement. We are stronger, too, because we have been able to repay \$10,000.00 in borrowed money.

There are several firsts we have achieved since last Conference that are worthy of note:

1. On March 9, 1972, our Credit Union moved out of the treasurer's home for the first time. We now have a suite of three rooms at 743 W. Johnson Street, Raleigh, N. C. Come visit us there.

2. Our Credit Union was chosen as the depository for the building funds of one of our United Methodist Churches. We invite you to do likewise.

3. We received the largest gift of our history. One of our retired ministers gave us \$500.00 to add to our loan funds to be used for the good of his brother ministers. This kind of generosity and concern for others is to be praised. Many others have helped in other ways, and a few have done so in the past but never in so large an amount. Thank you, brother.

4. This month is to be used to enroll our borrowers in the new "Credit Disability" program offered by our Credit Union in cooperation with our insurance carrier, CUNA Mutual Insurance Society. This coverage will protect the borrower in case of temporary incapacity

because of illness or injury. It is optional, and the cost is lower than at most other lending agencies in our state.

COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION AND CULTIVATION

The committee seeks to hold before the churches of our Annual Conference the cause of the corporate mission of Christ as He reaches through the United Methodist Church, in order that this cause may be a matter of major priority. To that end the committee has functioned in several ways this year.

1. District Mission Rallies

In November each of our District Program Councils planned a rally at which the personnel of our General Board Staff in New York, along with representatives from our annual conference Board made presentations.

A. Purpose: To build a base of confidence in each other as we share in mission; to provide an opportunity to know first hand General Board Staff Personnel; to provide clear information on the Advance and to encourage response.

B. Personnel:

- Rev. Joseph W. Walker, Director of the Advance of the General Board of Missions
- Rev. Billy Starnes, a Director of the Advance assigned to the Southeastern Jurisdiction.
- Rev. Avery Manchester, Secretary of the General Board of Mission Committee
- Missionary Personnel.

Rev. John Jordan, Executive Secretary of the Office of University World of the National Division of the General Board.

Dr. Richard Nesmith, Executive Secretary of Planning and Strategy for the National Division of the General Board.

C. Results:

1. A total of 1325 attended the eleven rallies.
2. The attendance included a healthy mix of decision makers from local churches with about equal numbers of men and women and twenty per cent youth.
3. The spirit of those attending was open and for the most part enthusiastic.
4. A total of forty-five churches requested specific help in arranging an Advance program. 200 persons joined the Ten-Dollar Club Phase II.

Preparation for Church-Wide Studies.

The District Directors of Mission led the several District Program Councils in effective training for the training of workers in leading the church-wide studies in Africa, Technetics, The Gospel of Matthew. 1404 persons attended sessions for the purpose in ten of our districts.

These studies are important not only to the corporate mission of our church, but to the whole work that we do together.

Itineration.

Itineration of Missions interpreters has been most successful this year. Those participating are:

Rev. George C. Megill, Brazil, in Wilmington and Sanford Districts.

Advance Response.

Advance support of the corporate mission of the church has been made more of a priority this year in our Conference. The Fall Mission Rallies and the Advance work sheets used in each district are already having an effect. As of March 29, \$50,444 had been received on General Advance specials as compared to \$36,110 this date last year. We are encouraged at this trend, but not satisfied. Our potential is much greater than this.

Appreciation.

THE COMMITTEE ON ADVANCE

Advance giving continues to increase under direct promotion by the Conference Missionary Secretary, Rufus Stark, the Program Council, the Cabinet and Bishop, the Board of Missions Members, the Advance Committee, and the District Missionary Chairmen. Also, in order to aid the promotion of the Advance Program, we held Advance rallies in all eleven districts with personnel from the New York office. The North Carolina Conference will become a leader in Advance in the Southeast in the near future. Our perspective broadens yearly in the area of Advance concern. For this we thank God!

On the world scene we are glad to be able to report that all of our missionaries from the North Carolina Conference now have full salary support. We are beginning to help support missionaries from other conferences.

Likewise, we have raised a large amount through the Ten Dollar Club-Phase II for new churches in Salisbury, Rhodesia.

A new Hospital-Dispensary is being built in Botswana, Africa. We are giving \$10,000.00 for that cause.

The new Ten Dollar Club-Phase II is growing. We shall send one call annually to a new church situation overseas. In 1973 the call will go to South America (Brazil). We also aid in building one new church each year in our own North Carolina Conference. Also, we give special help to churches with special need. We now have 1,244 members of the Phase II Ten Dollar Club.

SUB-COMMITTEE ON PARISH DEVELOPMENT AND COMMUNITY SERVICE

Charles E. Owens, *Chairman*

People in churches of small membership tend to become disillusioned and despondent, with no sense of achievement. This situation is caused in part by the inadequate pastoral leadership of the "not-yets, the rejects, and the has-beens." In a time when the mark of success has been for the church to become a station appointment, local church resources have been insufficient to provide adequate monetary support for the pastor, for local church ministry, and for ministry beyond the local church.

We affirm that every Methodist has a right to expect leadership which can help people develop an adequate program in every parish, making available those experiences which will enable Methodist people to grow together in Christ and engage in significant ministry to the community in His name.

We have striven toward this goal through a recovery and understanding of "Parish" (*Discipline*, Par. 106.3), and through cooperative ministries we have made more adequate deployment of lay and pastoral leadership in a few areas of our conference. We must cooperate as Methodist people in order to realize our full potential as the people of God. Cooperation must not be thought of negatively, as a "last-ditch" survival gimmick, but should be forward-looking the banding of the strong and the weak, where each learns from the other as they grow together in love and service in the family of God. Increasingly we must focus our vision horizontally toward neighboring churches, linking resources to meet common needs.

During this Quadrennium we have seen the establishment of the following cooperative ministries:

Pamlico Parish

Salemburg

Moore County

Harnett County

Robeson County Church and Community Center

Each of these efforts is different, and there is no one way to organize for ministry. The important thing is that structure must be responsive to and serve the needs of the people in the situation where they are. Today we have four Church and Community Workers engaged in ministry in our Conference through parish organization.

Through the United Methodist Parish Fellowship retreats each year emphasis has been given toward developing understanding of the parish concept and toward re-training pastors to serve cooperation with other pastors, rather than in competition with them.

SUB-COMMITTEE ON TOWN AND COUNTRY WORK

The work of the Sub-Committee on Town and Country Work during the 1968-72 quadrennium has focused in three primary areas: (1) Recognition of excellent achievement in small churches. (2) Provision of training experiences for ministers and laymen from small churches. (3) Development of a long-range program to encourage laymen and ministers in small churches to cooperate across charge boundaries in the implementation of mission to their areas.

At the Chapel Hill Conference in 1969, seven rural churches were honored for excellent service to their communities with an appropriate certificate and a \$50 award (listed in 1969 *Journal*, pages 128-129). Again, in 1970 at the Greenville Conference, seven rural churches were honored in the same manner (listed in 1970 *Journal*, page 134). In 1972 at the Durham Conference, one outstanding church in the entire Conference will be honored for its outstanding achievement (without monetary award).

Throughout the Quadrennium, the Committee has encouraged laymen and ministers from every district to participate in a wide variety of training experiences designed to equip them skillfully to develop patterns of cooperation across charge boundaries. A large delegation of ministers and laymen were present at the Jurisdiction's Quadrennial Conference on Town and Country Work at Lake Junaluska, August 11-15, 1969. Expenses were paid by the Committee which has sponsored a sizable delegation of ministers and laymen to the Annual Meeting of the Fellowship of Town and Country Leaders of the Southeast at the Hinton Rural Life Center, Hayesville, each year during the quadrennium (October 21-24, 1969; October 21-23, 1970; and October 11-14, 1971). This experience has begun the training of a nucleus of skilled leaders in our Conference who are beginning to provide more excellent leadership in the development of cooperative patterns. In addition, the Committee has assisted the United Methodist Parish Fellowship in the sponsoring of annual retreats (February 3-8, 1969, in Williamston, Hayetteville, and Warsaw; March 30-31, 1970, at Chestnut Ridge, with Dr. Daniel Zeluff from Interpreter's House as leader; February 22-23, 1971, at Raleigh and Kinston, with Dr. Melvin West from Missouri as leader; and February 28-29, 1972, with Dr. Marvin Judy from Dallas as leader). Each of these retreats has provided excellent training opportunities.

The Committee has also assisted in the development of possibilities for specific parishes throughout the Conference. During 1969-70, approximately \$16,000 was set aside in the Board of Missions to be directed toward newly organized parishes. "Guidelines for Parish Development Grants" were established and grants were made to parishes in Pamlico and Wayne Counties. A similar grant was made during 1971-72 to the parish in Harnet County. Close supervision has been given in each of these parishes. Finally, the Committee was instrumental in setting up a Cabinet Consultation with Dr. Marvin Judy on March 1, 1972. Out of this consultation a Committee on Conference Policy for Parish Development was appointed by the Cabinet to provide adequate guidelines and policies during the 1972-76 quadrennium. This committee will finalize these guidelines by the time of Annual Conference on June 5, 1972.

The over-all result of the Committee's work has been the development of wider understanding and acceptance of the need for and necessity of cooperative patterns of work across charge boundaries and the realistic provision of guidelines and policies by which such parishes may be implemented across our Conference during the 1972-76 quadrennium. It has been a joy to serve in the area of our concern.

SUB-COMMITTEE ON URBAN MINISTRIES

In July, 1971, the Conference Board of Missions, on recommendation of the Urban Committee and in cooperation with the National Board of Missions, entered into a contract with Complex, Inc. of Raleigh. Complex was to help urban churches discover creative options for mission and to assist in such missions with resources and training. The committee met with Complex on numerous occasions and tried to relay some of the needs it felt churches in urban areas had. Suggestions were made for surveys, a directory of urban agencies, training events, and other possible actions. It was apparent, after six months, that Complex was not fulfilling any of

these needs. Some work was done in Greenville through the Ministerial Association, in which Complex helped that organization see the need for such things as day-care, food and nutrition and a revised bail system. The committee felt at a loss in directing Complex in its work, and in the interest of stewardship terminated the contract on December 31, 1971.

The committee has had dialogue (as a committee and individually) with men engaged in urban ministries in Greensboro, Charlotte, Birmingham, Memphis, and Atlanta. It realizes that such a ministry must be initiated within the urban area and stands ready to assist such areas as Durham, Raleigh, Fayetteville, Greenville, and Wilmington. The Center City Ministry in Durham and the Contact Ministry in Fayetteville are beginnings.

THE NORTH CAROLINA COUNCIL OF CHURCHES

In the North Carolina Council of Churches we have resisted the temptation, with the whole spectrum of challenges before us, to attempt too much. With a staff of four people one of whom is half-time (not including the Migrant Project) we necessarily have limited ourselves to timely priorities.

The reorganization of two years ago began to take effect in the summer of 1970 with excellent results. The concept of "shared staff" is very effective in the Commission on Christian Nurture and to a lesser degree in the other two commissions. The intention throughout is to involve in our work the key people from our member judicatories in each program area.

Collins Kilburn and Otis Hairston are giving great leadership to the Commission on Christian Social Ministries. The recent Church and Community Seminar must be rated as excellent for program. Splendid responses are being made in the fields of corrections and criminal justice and of welfare reform. State government and legislature and peace education and action are emphases of this commission. Close cooperation is given the Commission on Religion in Appalachia in its Social, Economic, and Political Issues Task Force and the Appalachian Mission Renewal Project.

W. H. Shipes directs the North Carolina Council of Churches Migrant Project which is booming under his leadership. This work relates directly to the Commission on Christian Social Ministries.

John Cobb has given intelligent and faithful leadership to the Commission on Christian Nurture. Among the priorities there the chief ones are child care, youth hostels, aging leadership training, and family life. The Task Force on Child Care, led by William McElveen has drawn together more than thirty experts. The first federated youth hostel in North Carolina will be in operation this summer at Linville.

James Riddle is giving imaginative guidance to the Commission on Christian Unity in a time when some people in the churches challenge not only councils of churches but all organization of religion. I am urging that strong emphasis be put upon local ecumenism—it must be local in order to be real. This commission, in connection with its interest in Faith and Order, is projecting one or more local pilot conferences this year on polarization in church and community.

The Executive Director serves as staff for Christian Nurture and Christian Unity. Other programs coming under the Durham office are finance, the Pastors' Conference and annual Assembly, the Richard Shelton Communications Awards, the Advisory Conference, *The Church Council Bulletin*, the Church World Service Clothing Appeal in North Carolina, and the Migrant Ministry.

It is immensely heartening to see that the annual giving of the Council's member bodies has increased from \$14,000 in 1963 to \$35,000 in 1971, a rise of 150%. This very favorable development, however, has been more than matched by the demands of inflation and a growing program. The asking of the Council of each of its member bodies continues to be only 1/10 of 1% of each group's annual giving to current expenses and benevolences, excluding capital building funds. In 1971 such allocations should have produced over \$61,000 instead of \$35,000, thus requiring special efforts to raise \$9,400 from individual churches and donors. The skeletal budget for 1972 will still require \$7,900 from these special sources. There is a program of gift annuities developed by the National Council of Churches whereby an ecumenical agency such as our State Council may be beneficiary in a plan that provides

continuing income for the donor. One or two generous gift annuities of this sort could make a difference for us in 1972.

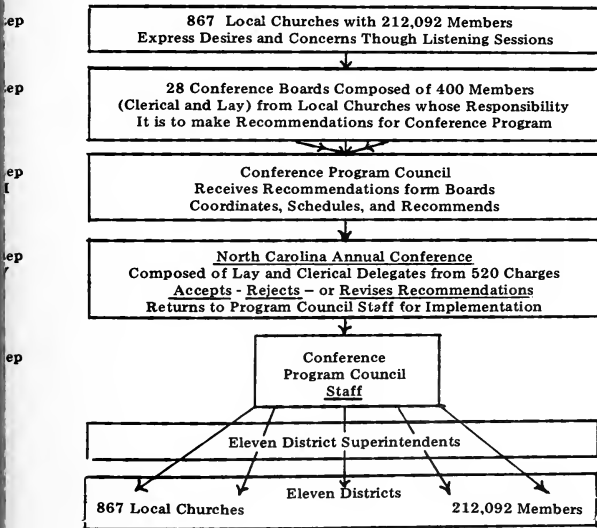
As an economy and efficiency measure the nearly 7000 names on the Council's mailing list have been put on a computer. By resulting reduction in office staff this will make it possible to come within the modest budget of \$50,000 if individual contributions come in.

The President and the Executive Director called together evangelism people from the member judicatories to discuss *Key '73* resulting in plans for continuing state-wide strategy in preparation for next year. This will be brought directly under the Executive Board as a particular concern of the Council through 1972 and '73, with the expectation that strong, tried, and continuing cooperative outreach will be in the churches' agenda at the beginning of 1974.

THE COMMITTEE ON THE NORTH CAROLINA PASTORS' SCHOOL AND DUKE DIVINITY SCHOOL CONVOCATION

The 1971 Divinity School Convocation and North Carolina Pastors' School was held at Duke University, October 25-27. The opening Bishop's Hour Lecture was given by *Bishop Paul Washburn* of the Minnesota Area, and *Bishops William R. Cannon* and *Earl G. Hunt, Jr.* led a

Bishops' Panel to respond to questions and concerns of ministers. *Professor Paul L. Lehmann* of Union Theological Seminary, New York, was the James A. Gray Lecturer. The Convocation Preacher was the *Reverend James M. Lawson, Jr.* of Centenary United Methodist Church Memphis. *Dean Edward H. Patey* of Liverpool Cathedral gave the Frank S. Hickman Lecture on Ministry. *President Cecil W. Robbins* of Louisburg College was the Alumni Lecturer. Other features of the program included the Ministers' Wives Luncheon, the Reunion Class Banquet addressed by *Dr. James T. Cleland*, and the Alumni Association Luncheon, with the new *Dean Thomas A. Langford* as speaker.

The 1972 Convocation and Pastors' School, scheduled for October 30 - November 1, will offer an improved format, with panels and open discussion in response to speakers, a less crowded schedule, and use of new Divinity School facilities, including the Alumni Commons Room. In addition to our *Bishops*, the speakers include *Dr. Edmund A. Steimle*, Brown Professor of Homiletics, Union Theological Seminary, as Convocation Preacher; *Dr. Ray C. Petry*, James B. Duke Professor of Church History, as James A. Gray Lecturer; *Dr. Emerson S. Colaw* of Hyde Park Community Church, Cincinnati, as Frank S. Hickman Lecturer on Ministry; and *Dr. William Arthur Kale*, Professor of Christian Education, as Alumni Lecturer. There will be an Alumni Reunion Banquet for Classes of 1932, 1937, 1942, 1947, 1952, 1957, 1962, and 1967; a Reception for Alumni and Friends in the Alumni Commons Room; the Alumni Association Luncheon; and the Ministers' Wives Luncheon.

The Conference Director of Methodist Information reports the following activities for the 1971-72 Conference Year.

-I-

The 1971-72 North Carolina Conference Pictorial Directory was made possible through the cooperation of the Pictorial Church Directories of America. The Directory was mailed to the company headquarters in St. Louis and although no proofing was done locally and the company was responsible for printing make-up, we believe it is a valuable instrument enabling our ministers to know each other.

We are grateful to PCA for making this Directory available. A minimum number of copies are available for lay leaders and local church libraries.

-II-

The Director has worked during the year in helping to initiate a Committee on Communications. District Directors were appointed to work in the area of communication particularly in assisting local churches. A number of tapes were available to local congregations of Bishop Cannon's statement at the 1971 Annual Conference regarding the creation of the twelfth district and the appointment of a black district superintendent. We asked the local congregations to utilize this tape in helping prepare our laity for this important step. District communications chairmen were also asked to monitor reports of the 1972 General Conference in Atlanta.

-III-

The General Conference in April, 1972, was given special coverage by your Director. All media-TV, Radio, and Press-were alerted and special reports were filed daily.

The 1972 Annual Conference publicity was also planned as was preliminary news coverage for the July, 1972, Jurisdictional Conference at Lake Junaluska.

The Director would like particularly to thank (a) the 74-radio stations of the Tobacco Radio Network; (b) Radio Stations WPTF in Raleigh and WDNC in Durham for their special "extended" news coverage; (c) The Raleigh Bureau of United Press International; (d) the Carolinas Bureau of Associated Press in Charlotte; (e) and the *Durham Morning Herald* for

cellent cooperation in the area of Public Relations and Methodist Information.

Three newspapers - the *Durham Herald*, the *Raleigh News and Observer*, and the *Durham* - provided special correspondents for the Annual Conference session in June.

THE METHODIST BOARD OF PUBLICATION, INC.

Your board has been in continuous operation since 1919 when its certificate of incorporation was issued. Prior to that, the *North Carolina Christian Advocate*, established in 1855, has served the Methodists of the state under several names and in a variety of organizational relationships.

The papers of incorporation of The Methodist Board of Publication state in part:

"The object of this corporation shall be to publish the *North Carolina Christian Advocate* as the official organ of the North Carolina and Western North Carolina Conferences of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and to have control of the publishing interest of the aforesaid Conferences. It may publish one or more newspapers and periodicals by any name desired, and may publish, handle, purchase and sell all kinds of books, tracts, treatises and pamphlets. It shall also have the power and authority to carry on in all its branches a general publishing and printing business."

A further provision states that "the North Carolina and Western North Carolina Conferences shall be and are equal and joint owners of said corporation, and that said corporation shall be under the jurisdiction, control and direction of said Conferences".

The basic provisions of this venerable document still remain as a missional mandate for the Methodist Board of Publication. We are seeking to fulfill this mandate mainly through the continuing publication of the *North Carolina Christian Advocate* and through the operation of general publishing and printing business" under the trade name of the Piedmont Press.

The circulation of the *Advocate* has during the past year maintained a steady average of slightly over 22,000. We are continuing to stress the importance of our local church officials (members of All-Administrative Boards) taking and reading the *Advocate*. We feel that every church official elected to an important office in the church has a responsibility to become a well-informed leader. The *Advocate* is in a unique position to enable such officials to fulfill this obligation. This is especially true in view of the fact that the *Advocate* carries an eight-page supplement once a month giving information prepared by the Conference Program Council on important events and programs coming up. A separate edition of this supplement is provided for the North Carolina and Western North Carolina Annual Conferences. This information as well as much other material carried is of vital importance to local church leaders.

We believe that the local church should assume the cost involved in such an informational program, or at very least that it should work out some plan whereby the members of its Administrative Board become subscribers. We commend the more than 400 churches which are on the plan and urgently request all other churches to set it up for their church officials.

While setting forth the All-Administrative Board Plan as of vital importance, we further commend to our churches that they move one step further and adopt the Every-Family Subscription Plan. An informed and enlightened church will be without doubt a better church. The *North Carolina Christian Advocate* going into every United Methodist home cannot but be a positive asset, and may well be a key factor in lifting the level of that church's life.

We are continuing to improve the facilities and equipment in our printing establishment. During the last four months we have leased cold composition equipment for more rapid typesetting. This is enabling us to produce a cleaner printed page and to do it much more rapidly.

As a non-profit corporation owned and operated by the United Methodist Church in North Carolina, we are not actively soliciting business from the general public. However, we do urge our Methodist institutions, boards and agencies, and local churches to patronize The Piedmont Press for their printing needs. Our present modern equipment and well-trained personnel make it possible for us to offer good quality work a reasonable rates. Moreover, all profits from the operation The Piedmont Press go toward meeting editorial and other expenses connected with the production of the *North Carolina Christian Advocate*. It makes good sense, therefore, for our United Methodist Organizations, where there is no clear reason to the contrary, to give their printing to our own printing establishment.

THE COMMISSION ON RELIGION AND RACE

A Commission on Religion and Race was established during this Conference year.

The purpose of the Commission shall be to become the "Conscience" of the Conference in all matters concerning race. The programs and projects developed by this Commission shall speak to the problems of racism (attitudinal, behavioral and institutional) and minority group empowerment. The Commission will be so organized that there is both flexibility and structure to enable the Conference to deal with these problems as they are expressed in the life of the Conference. Until all members of the United Methodist Church of every race are able to participate fully in all structures, organizations, and decision processes, of the Conference, the word "United" will be a goal rather than a reality. The task of the Conference Commission on Religion and Race is to help make this a reality.

The Commission members attended a Consultation on Race, sponsored by The Board of Christian Social Concerns, led by members of the National Commission on Religion and Race. Additionally, the Commission held a consultation/training session for its members and selected persons at Highland United Methodist Church. The Commission offered its services to the Conference to assist in problems in the area of race relations and in the acceptance of a Black District Superintendent.

The Commission realizes that there is much to be done to reconcile the differing attitudes between races, in acceptance and empowerment of minorities, and has programmed its activities for the year 1972-73 accordingly.

THE CONFERENCE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Meetings were held during the year as follows: June 2, 1971, in Fayetteville; October 1971, and November 23, 1971, in the Methodist Building.

The Conference Treasurer reported that funds totaling \$403,825.44 were held by Board at the end of 1970-71 Conference Year. Distributions were made during the year as follows: Board expense \$18.61; Edgerton Fund dividends \$270.33; Board of Pensions \$8,000.00.

At the June 2 meeting the following officers were elected: Elisha M. Herndon, Chairman; The Reverend Wallace H. Kirby, Vice-Chairman; The Reverend James H. Miller, Jr., Secretary.

During the Conference year extensive maintenance and repair work was done to headquarters parsonages under the supervision of Mr. McAdams. This work has included air-conditioning, painting, interior decorating, lawn work and many other items.

During the year the Methodist Church property at Portsmouth Village on Portsmouth Island was sold to the State of North Carolina for the sum of \$6,500.00. The property will become part of the Cape Lookout National Seashore in the National Park Service. A special permit will be issued the North Carolina Conference of The United Methodist Church so that the conference may retain continued operation of the church with maintenance being handled by the National Park Service. The sale price was arrived at after two independent appraisals were obtained from realtors in the Wilmington-Morehead City areas.

In a separate resolution the Board of Trustees is recommending to the session of the Annual Conference (1972) the sale of a parcel of land in Wake County, Cary Township to James F. Whiting for the sum of \$300. This property was abandoned by the church many years ago.

The Board of Trustees has submitted budget requests to the Commission on World Service and Finance as required to carry on the operation of the Board, Methodist Building, Parsonages and Episcopal Residence.

The audit report of the Board of Trustees will appear in the *Journal* and will show the current status of funds held by the Board of Trustees.

THE BOARD OF COLLEGE VISITORS

The relationships between administration, faculty, and students is wholesome with respect and consideration of each other, and all continue to seek closer ties with their respective communities. The one greatest and unanimously voiced need by these three elements of our colleges is the cultivation and recruitment of Methodist students by local pastoral congregations in the North Carolina Conference.

Finally, we are grateful to our colleges for their achievements and assure them of our support in strengthening their Christian uniqueness and their task of education in our day.

**THE WOMEN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE
AND
WESLEYAN SERVICE GUILD**

Much has happened in the North Carolina Conference Women's Society and Wesleyan Service Guild this year. Several of our women have been honored and nominated or elected to positions in the church. At the Annual Conference in Fayetteville, Mrs. Harold Mann was elected a delegate to General Conference on the first ballot. This was a first for North Carolina for any Conference to our knowledge. Mrs. Mann led the North Carolina delegation to General Conference. In August Mrs. Mann was elected to the World Methodist Council at that meeting in Denver. Mrs. Sam Dunn, former Woman's Society President, was also elected to General Conference. Mrs. L. C. Vereen and Mrs. E. L. Hillman were elected to Jurisdictional Conference.

The Spiritual Growth Conference held in June at Louisburg College and led by Miss Genevieve, lifted our women to great spiritual heights as she developed the theme "Yes Lord? Yes Lord!" Miss Maxwell also led the Spiritual Growth Conference May 23-24, 1972, at Louisburg College. She is a Women's Division Staff person in the Denver Region.

Also in June 1971, thirteen officers of the Women's Society and Guild attended the National School of Christian Mission in Birmingham, Alabama.

Perhaps one of the most thrilling and challenging Annual Meetings we have had was held in Fayetteville in October at Hay Street United Methodist Church. We were honored by the presence of Bishop William R. Cannon and his entire Cabinet at the opening session. We were inspired by such speakers as the Conference Program Director, Dr. Nicholas Grant; Dr. James Langford, Dean of Duke Divinity School; Mrs. J. Boyd Tyrell and Mrs. George Berry, members of the Women's Division, as they spoke to the theme "For The Love of God". The offering to Missions 1972-73 for Women's Society and Guild was \$214,810.00. The candle lit in memory and in honor of persons for the World Thank Offering in the amount of \$8,600.00. Six honorary patron memberships were presented representing a gift to missions of \$10,000.00. A Love Offering for the work of the North Carolina Projects was presented amounting to \$5,124.55. Approximately \$3,000.00 will be given in scholarships to young women attending one of our Methodist Colleges. One scholarship will be for a year of graduate study at Scarritt College. As of December 31, 1971, \$216,716.70 has been sent out of the Women's Society for the mission program.

The Wesleyan Service Guild held their Annual weekend meeting March 18, 19, 1972 at the Hyattsville Hotel in Raleigh with an attendance of more than 200. The keynote speaker was Dr. Robert Bergland of Dayton, Ohio. Also speaking were Mr. Reginald Kamara and Rev. Alexander, returned missionary from Rhodesia.

In March, the entire Executive Committee, including District Presidents and District Guild members attended the Southeastern Jurisdiction Society-Guild Quadrennial Meeting in Winston, S. C. Fifty-eight women from the North Carolina Conference were present. Bishop Hardin challenged us first to be citizens in the Kingdom of God and then to the nation. At that meeting Mrs. John W. Crawford was elected Chairwoman of the Nominating Committee of the Jurisdiction Society/Guild and Mrs. Charles Dorsett of Mount Gilead was nominated to the Board of Missions.

Five Conference officers have attended National and International Conferences this year. We have established a Task Group for Leadership Development in order to help our women realize their full potential as women and leaders. We commend our women for living and working "For The Love of God".

At General Conference in April, Mrs. Harold Mann was elected to the newly created Council on Finance and Administration.

As we follow the General Conference directive to organize ONE new inclusive organization under a new name, we do so with confidence that with God's love to sustain us, UNITED METHODIST WOMEN will continue the endless line of splendor that is our heritage.

B. Annual Conference Structure

In its meeting on May 22, 1972, the Executive Committee of the Conference Program Council voted unanimously to make the following recommendations concerning the structure of the Conference:

1. That The North Carolina Conference restructure its boards and agencies to coincide with the structure adopted by the 1972 General Conference for the General Church Level. In order to achieve this we recommend the following:

- (a) That we change terminology in the naming of our various agencies to the designations used on the General Level.
- (b) That we limit the number of members to be nominated for various boards and agencies.
 - (1) In cases where adequate representation of all groups cannot be secured in the allotted number of members, at-large members shall be added to accomplish the above goal.
 - (2) District Superintendents shall be members of all Program Boards.
 - (3) One Superintendent shall be assigned to each Division of a Board by the Presiding Bishop in consultation with the Director of the Conference Council on Ministries. The Superintendent shall be a member of the Executive Committee of the Division.
 - (4) Extreme care shall be exercised by the Cabinet in making nominations to various Boards, Divisions and other agencies so as to insure adequate representation of the following groups: ethnic minorities, women, youth and clergy.
 - (5) In instances in which two persons are to be nominated from a district to an agency, we recommend that one be lay and one be clergy.
 - (6) In order to insure equal district representation on agencies throughout the quadrennium we recommend that when a pastor is moved from the district which he or she received his or her nomination to a board or agency, he or she will be replaced on the board or agency by another person residing within that district.
 - (7) The above recommendation concerning change of residence does not apply to the elected officers of boards or agencies. Should their residences

changed, they remain as officers; however, the district from which they move will nominate a successor to maintain district representation.

- (8) In district nominations consideration should be given to the possibility of using the District Board or Agency nominee as the representative on the District Council on Ministries.
- (c) That the terminology of the Council Charter be changed to coincide with the above recommendations.

AGE LEVEL COUNCILS

PURPOSE—There shall be organized within the Conference, by the Council on Ministries, Age Level Councils (Children, Youth, Family and Adult) whose purpose shall be to a making possible a wholistic approach to our ministry in all areas of our work.

DUTIES—(1) To serve as a think tank for boards and agencies which make recommendations through the Conference Council on Ministries to Annual Conference. (2) To present to board or agency (for consideration of inclusion in its annual program recommendations) items which pertain to its area of responsibility. (3) To implement any programs related age level when requested to do so by the individual board or agency.

The following organization shall take the place of the existing Age Level Councils.

COUNCIL ON CHILDREN'S MINISTRIES

Membership shall be composed of the following: Board of Church and Society, Commission on Religion and Race, United Methodist Women, Directors of Christian Education, Directors of Music and the following Divisions: Education, Evangelical Worship, Lay Life and Work, Missions, Stewardship, six At-Large Members and Conference Coordinator of Children's Ministries, ex-officio.

Officers—A chairman and such other officers as deemed necessary shall be elected from group. The chairman shall be a member of the Council on Ministries.

Executive Committee composed of eight persons including the Council Chairman with Conference Coordinator, ex-officio, shall be elected to do initial planning for the Council with power to act when the Council is not in session.

Meetings—Not more than two Council meetings and two additional Executive Committee meetings may be held annually.

Funding—Expenses incurred in Council and Executive Meetings shall be paid by Council on Ministries.

COUNCIL ON YOUTH MINISTRIES—*Discipline* Par. 841.6a Annual Conference Council Youth Ministry. "In each Annual Conference there shall be a Conference Council on Youth Ministry composed of both youth and adults. Its purpose shall be to strengthen the youth ministry in the local churches and districts of the Annual Conference. For administrative purposes the Council shall be related to the Council on Ministries.

Membership - No more than one-third of the membership of the Council shall be adults. It is recommended that the Council be composed of fifty per cent minority members. "If ethnic or language conferences overlap non-ethnic conferences, provisions shall be made for the inclusion of members of the ethnic or language conferences to serve on the committees of non-ethnic conferences and vice-versa."

Officers - An adult chairman and such other officers as deemed necessary shall be elected from the Council. The chairman shall be a member of the Conference Council on Ministries.

Meetings - Not more than two Council meetings and two additional meetings of Executive Committee (to be elected by the Council) may be held annually.

Funding - Expenses incurred in Council Meetings shall be paid by the Council on Ministries. Expenses of the Executive Committee are to be paid by Youth Activities Fund.

COUNCIL ON FAMILY LIFE AND ADULT MINISTRIES

Membership shall be composed of the following: District Coordinator of Adult and Family Ministries, one representative from each of the following: Board of Church and Society,

United Methodist Women, Commission on Religion and Race, and one representative from each of the following Divisions: Ecumenical and Interreligious Concerns, Education, Evangelism, Missions, Worship and the Conference Coordinator of Adult and Family Ministries, ex-officio.

Officers - A chairman and such other officers deemed necessary shall be elected from the group. The chairman shall be a member of the Council on Ministries.

Executive Committee - Composed of eight persons including the Council Chairman, with the Conference Coordinator, ex-officio, shall be elected to do initial planning for the Council with power to act for the Council when it is not in session.

Meetings - Not more than two Council Meetings and two additional Executive Committee meetings may be held annually.

Funding - Expenses incurred in Council and Executive Committee meetings shall be paid by the Council of Ministries.

OTHER STRUCTURE AND RESPONSIBILITY RECOMMENDATIONS

Recommend:

- 1) That the Committee on Conference Corporations be dissolved.
- 2) That in keeping with the action of the 1972 General Conference, the Conference Committee on Continuing Education become a Committee of the Division of Ministry.
- 3) That the North Carolina Conference segment of the Regional Commission on Christian Higher Education and Campus Ministry be instituted by and report to the Annual Conference through the Division of Higher Education.
- 4) That the Board of College Visitors be dissolved and this responsibility be carried by the Division of Higher Education.
- 5) That the work of the Department of Gifts and Wills be carried and directed by the Division of Stewardship.
- 6) In order to provide for a smooth transition in program implementation during the coming year the Council On Finance and Administration, in consultation with the chair persons of the various Program Boards, Divisions, and other involved Agencies, be authorized to re-adjust budget items, where necessary, to make possible adequate funds for each of the areas within the adopted structure.
- 7) That Divisions have the right to make final appeal to The Council On Ministries and The Council On Finance and Administration where a Division is in conflict with the decision of a Program Board.
- 8) That The Division of Health and Welfare of the Board of Global Ministries be enlarged to include one person elected by and from the residents of The Methodist Retirement Homes, Incorporated.

The Board of Trustees of the Methodist Retirement Homes, Incorporated is directed to include in each class, one person elected by and from the residents of The Methodist Retirement Homes, Incorporated.

REPORT OF ARCHIVES AND HISTORY

The year 1972 is the Bicentennial Year of Methodism in North Carolina.

The Commission on Archives and History recommends that this year be noted in the local churches of the Annual Conference.

A special celebration is planned at Currituck Courthouse on September 28 to mark the 200th anniversary of the first Methodist sermon preached in North Carolina by Joseph P. Moor.

Cooperating in the celebration are representatives of the Western North Carolina Conference, the United Methodist Church and our historic black Methodist denominations.

Dr. Frederick Maser, the executive secretary of the International Methodist Historical Society and an authority on Joseph Pilmoor, will speak in the morning of September 28.

Bishop Herbert Bell Shaw of Wilmington will speak at the afternoon session on "200 Years Methodism in North Carolina."

Methodists are given a significant opportunity during this Bicentennial Celebration which is being headed by a committee chaired by C. Frank Grill, pastor at Scotland Neck.

Regarding the conference priorities for the year, we recommend that "the stewardship of heritage" include the continued collection of local church histories with special emphasis on the history of our black Methodist Churches.

We recommend the continued relationship with Whitakers Chapel and Rehoboth Methodist Church through the Commission's and Conference participation in their worship services.

REPORT OF THE NORTH CAROLINA UNITED METHODIST COMMISSION ON CONTINUING EDUCATION FOR MINISTERS

The Statewide Commission on Continuing Education for Ministers, representing the North Carolina and the Western North Carolina Conferences of The United Methodist Church and The Duke Divinity School, operates as the coordinator for existing programs, recommends additional projects, and designates responsibilities to participating agencies. The Commission sincerely appreciates the support of the Episcopal leaders, the Dean of The Duke Divinity School, and the Annual Conference Committees on Continuing Education.

The Commission supports the Conference Committee in its specific recommendations to the Annual Conference. We recognize that special emphasis must be given to ways and means of providing released time, short terms as well as sabbatical leaves, for ministers to participate in programs of Continuing Education without jeopardizing their responsibilities in the local parish. If financial support from the local church is needed. Increased contributions to the Ministerial Education Funds, with a larger portion designated for Continuing Education, will provide financial resources in each Annual Conference. An educational program to assist the laity to understand fully the significance of Continuing Education for the Ministry is quite in order.

The Commission rejoices with The Duke Divinity School in the appointment of Dr. Murry S. Richey as the Director of Continuing Education. To this task he will devote a significant portion of his time and energy as well as continue teaching in The Divinity School. Through this office the Director will coordinate the existing programs, initiate new ones, assist the Annual Conferences in their programs, and provide information of other available opportunities. A specific goal is to increase the ecumenical dimension with every available opportunity.

In keeping with the current practice and procedure and on the basis of pp. 355, 356, and 357 (or their equivalent) of The Book of the Discipline, we recommend:

A. That the responsibility for Continuing Education be assigned specifically to an

interboard agency to be known as "The Committee on Continuing Education for Ministers."

B. That the Committee be composed of the following: five representatives of the Conference Board of Ministry; one representative each from the following Conference agencies: Board of Education, Board of Evangelism, Board of Missions, Commission on Town and Country Ministries, Board of Christian Social Concerns, Board of Health and Welfare Ministries, Board of Managers of the North Carolina Pastors' School; The Duke Divinity School; each Methodist college within the bounds of the Annual Conference; Director of Continuing Education of The Duke Divinity School; a representative of the Program Council staff; and three members at large appointed by the Bishop.

C. That attention be given to the selection of the representatives so that existing agencies with specific responsibilities for Continuing Education will have representation on the Committee.

D. That the Committee organization be set up *after* all representatives of the participating agencies and institutions have been selected and notified of the organizational meeting.

E. That the Committee make its reports to the Annual Conference through the Board of the Ministry.

F. That all representatives to the Statewide Commission be active members of the Annual Conference Committee.

G. That for the quadrennium 1972-76 the North Carolina United Methodist Commission on Continuing Education for Ministers be composed of the following:

1. From each of the two Annual Conferences:

The presiding Bishop

The staff person on the Annual Council on Ministries responsible for continuing education for minister.

Five representatives from the Annual Conference Committee on Continuing Education for Ministers, including the chairman, vice-chairman, and secretary; a representative from one of the colleges located within the bounds of the Annual Conference; and a layman.

2. From the Duke Divinity School:

The Dean

The Director of Continuing Education

A representative from the Divinity School Committee on Continuing Education

REPORT OF JOINT COMMITTEE ON DISABILITY

Ministers' Emergency Fund

The Sustentation Fund is to be used for emergency relief in the form of grants to effective ministers and lay pastors serving appointments whose salary is paid by the local church or conference treasurer, and who become disabled to the extent that they are unable to continue their work, and whose income is not adequate to meet emergency needs.

2. Emergency appropriations shall be used to bring the disabled ministers' income up to a maximum of \$4,320 per conference year. If the applicant receives other personal income in excess of \$4,320 such additional income shall be deducted from the emergency grant. In no event shall the emergency funds be used to supplement an applicant's income of \$4,320 or above.

3. Payment of this \$4,320 will be on the basis of \$360 per month. Payment will be made only during those months the applicant qualifies for Emergency Funds. No funds will be appropriated without three-fourths approval of the Joint Committee on Disability.

4. The Joint Committee on Disability secretary must place all necessary forms in the hands of the Cabinet members at the beginning of each conference year.

5. In all cases the applications—the district superintendent, the doctor, and the applicant—shall be completed and forwarded to the chairman of the committee before approval of funds will be made. Any minister expecting to receive Emergency Funds at the beginning of the conference year should make application not later than two weeks before the annual conference convenes.

6. The Joint Committee on Disability may require physiological and psychological examination when deemed necessary by the committee. These will be done by a doctor approved by the committee and results of tests will be sent to the committee. In such a case the committee may share the expense of the examination in an amount not to exceed \$100.

7. Funds will be made payable within thirty days following committee approval.

8. In cases where application for Emergency Funds occur during the session of the annual conference, the applicant's district superintendent, and the applicant, when possible, shall present an oral application to a joint committee of the Cabinet and at least three members of the Joint Committee on Disability. At this time appropriate action will be taken in keeping with the best interest of the applicant and in the spirit of the Emergency Fund. The Written Forms must be completed and placed with the committee within thirty days of this meeting.

9. All cases shall be reviewed at the middle of the Conference year to determine progress made in each case. It shall be the responsibility of each applicant's district superintendent to see that the progress reports—statements from the doctor and the district superintendent—are completed and placed with the committee. Should this review of the applicant's disability reveal that he is capable of reassuming work, it shall be the responsibility of the Joint Committee on Disability to bring this information to the attention of the Cabinet.

10. Should the disability continue beyond one year or through one annual conference we call attention to the fact that the General Board of Pensions makes medical disability payments, based on a man's service years. We also call attention that it is possible that in some cases retirement may offer specific advantages over Emergency Fund aid.

11. Should the disability continue beyond one year or through one annual conference, the Joint Committee will conform to Disciplinary Requirements as found in paragraph 357 which demand annual conference approval.

12. We recommend that expenses of travel, telephone, postage, etc., for committee be paid from the Emergency Fund.

RESOLUTION

Be it Resolved, that the Joint Committee on Disability and the Cabinet work with the agencies and institutions to utilize talents and abilities of disabled ministers. It is recommended that where it is possible to give full or part-time employment by matching a need of the institution, or agency, to that of the disabled minister, it is strongly urged to do so. It is recommended that the administrative head of each institution and agency supply a list of possible positions to the Cabinet and to the Joint Committee on Disability, who will work for mutual satisfaction and placement. The final decision will rest with the Cabinet.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. That the Joint Committee on Disability assume the conference coverage of Group Life Insurance and Health Insurance only for that time that a person is on Disability. This is in addition to the monthly basic grant of \$360, provided no other provisions for such insurance is made.

2. We recommend to the Annual Conference the appointment of three additional members—at-large to the Joint Committee on Disability in addition to the Cabinet representative, the two members from the Board of The Ministry and the two members from the Board of Pensions.

3. The Committee strongly recommends that churches and/or interested individuals recognize the contributions made by the ministers of the Conference by providing rent free houses for those men who are disabled and cannot continue their pastoral work.

4. We recommend to the Annual Conference Paul W. Evans for "Emergency Leave" with Emergency Aid. This recommendation is made in accordance with the Disciplinary Requirement as found in paragraph 357 of *The Book of Discipline*, 1968, which demands Annual conference approval. Done and approved June 8, 1972, by the North Carolina Annual Conference in session.

2. DISTRIBUTION OF RACE RELATIONS SUNDAY OFFERING

We recommend that a decision concerning the distribution of the 1972-1973 Race Relations Sunday offering be deferred and that the Conference Board of Education for the 1972-1976 quadrennium be delegated that responsibility, acting upon the recommendation of the new Conference Commission on Christian Higher Education and Campus Ministry based on General Conference action.

3. STUDY REQUESTED

We recommend that the Conference Commission on Christian Higher Education and Campus Ministry study the relationship of the North Carolina Annual Conference to Greensboro College, High Point College, and the Duke Divinity School with reference to continued support from the Sustaining Funds . . . to be implemented by Conference Commission on Christian Higher Education and Campus Ministry.

4. CONFERENCE COMMISSION ON CHRISTIAN HIGHER EDUCATION AND CAMPUS MINISTRY

In keeping with Paragraph 1114, Section 2, *The Book of Discipline of the United Methodist Church*, we recommend that the North Carolina Annual Conference constitute a Commission on Christian Higher Education and Campus Ministry for the 1972-1976 quadrennium.

5. REGIONAL COMMISSION ON CHRISTIAN HIGHER EDUCATION AND CAMPUS MINISTRY

In keeping with Paragraph 1114, Section 3, *The Book of Discipline of The United Methodist Church*, we recommend that the North Carolina Conference join with the Western North Carolina Annual conference in constituting a "Regional Commission on Christian Higher Education and Campus Ministry" for the continuation of interconference cooperation in such areas as Campus Ministry, relationships involving institutions of higher education in which the two conferences have joint concern, and other aspects of Christian Higher Education in North Carolina of joint interest and concern. We further recommend that the Board of Education of each Annual Conference authorize its Commission or Committee on Christian Higher Education and Campus Ministry, in consultation with its Bishop, to determine its membership on the Regional Commission based on a plan that provides for identical representation from each Annual Conference . . . to be implemented by Boards of Education and Bishops of North Carolina and Western North Carolina Annual Conferences.

STRUCTURE OF REGIONAL COMMISSION ON CHRISTIAN HIGHER EDUCATION AND CAMPUS MINISTRY

Whereas, we begin a new quadrennium in The United Methodist Church this year; and

Whereas, the nominations of members of the Regional Commission on Christian Higher Education and Campus Ministry must be presented to our Annual Conference for election in June, 1972; and

Whereas, a suitable structure within the *Discipline* must be established;

Therefore, Be It Resolved, that the Regional Commission on Christian Higher Education and Campus Ministry for 1972-1976 shall be constituted by the following members from each of the participating Annual Conferences; (1) Resident Bishop; (2) a Cabinet representative; (3) President of the Conference Board of Education; (4) Conference Director of Education or Associate Director—Nurture and Training; (5) Chairman of Conference Commission on Christian Higher Education and Campus Ministry or Chairman of Conference Committee on Christian Higher Education; (6) a president of a Methodist college; (7) a campus minister; (8) the Executive Director of the Association of Methodist Colleges or of the College Coordinating Council; (9) three students to be nominated by the state-wide Methodist student organization if one exists, or by the campus ministers (members to include men and women and ethnic groups); (10) the president (or a person appointed by her) of the Women's Society of Christian Service or its successor organization; (11) eleven members at large, of whom not less than three shall be members of the Conference Commission (or Committee) on Christian higher Education and of whom not less than three shall be members of local boards of campus ministries. The remaining five shall be recommended by the Board of Education and the Bishop in consultation with the Regional Commission. Proper care shall be taken that minorities be represented.

ADDITIONAL RECOMMENDATIONS

a. That Conference Coordinator of Youth Ministry make recommendations to District Superintendents concerning appointment of District Coordinator of Youth Ministry.

b. That Christian Educators be represented on District Program Councils and be invited to attend district meetings of pastors . . . to be implemented by District Superintendents.

c. That Christian Educators be represented on the following conference agencies: Committee on the Lay Worker, Committee on Continuing Education, Council on Children's Ministries, Council on Youth Ministries, and Council on Adult and Family Ministry . . . to be implemented by the proper conference agency.

RECOMMENDATIONS FROM THE BOARD OF HEALTH AND WELFARE MINISTRIES

GOLDEN CROSS COMMITTEE

The Committee recommends the continuation of the Golden Cross ministry.

The Committee recommends that the daily allowances for Golden Cross assistance remain at \$25.00 per day for the 1972-73 Conference year.

The Committee recognizes and commends the work of Chaplain Wesley Aitken and his staff in the chaplaincy program at Duke Medical Center. It is recommended that we continue support of the program in the amount of \$5,500 for the 1972-73 Conference year.

The Committee recognizes the work with alcoholics of the Reverend J.C. Dunn in the God Shepherd Home at Lake Waccamaw, N.C., and recommends that we continue our support in the amount of \$2,500 for the 1972-73 Conference year.

The Committee recommends our continuation in the Blue Cross Hospitalization Program adopted at the 1971 Session of the Annual Conference.

RETIREMENT HOME COMMITTEE

The Committee requests the Bishop to appoint the Reverend Joseph F. Coble to be administrator of The Retirement Home for the 1972-73 Conference year.

The Committee recommends that the Home be given the privilege of solicitation of funds for the purpose of carrying on the work of The Home and the financing of another home within the bounds of the Conference

The Committee joins the Board of Trustees of The Home in recommending "that the new expansion of facilities should be made as soon as possible with a Home more strategically located further east in the Conference and with serious consideration being given to the Greenville-Wilson area. Further, that priority be given to the construction of a Nursing or Health Care facility to not only provide care for The Home's retired members when they become ill but also accept nursing cases."

CHILDREN'S HOME COMMITTEE

The Committee requests the Bishop to reappoint the Reverend J. W. Lineberger, Sr. to be superintendent and the Reverend James M. Waggoner to be chaplain for the 1972-73 Conference year.

The Committee recommends that The Home be approved for privately soliciting and receiving gifts for the purpose of carrying on the work of The Home.

The Committee further recommends that the Thanksgiving Season continue to be reserved as a period for publicizing and promoting the Church's ministry to children through the Methodist Home for Children, and that other interests and causes not be permitted to encroach upon or conflict with this traditional emphasis.

LONG RANGE PLANNING COMMITTEE

The Committee recommends that we continue to be involved in the work of and give our support to SEMAR (Southeastern Methodist Agency for the Retarded) which has as its objectives: (1) To render needed services to handicapped, mentally retarded persons to help them attain their full potential. (2) To develop residential services for severely and profoundly retarded infants and young children. (3) To develop residential day care and rehabilitation for trainable and educatable retarded children and youth. (4) To stimulate local churches to minister to the retarded.

In order that our Conference might consider extending the services and ministries of the Methodist Home for Children and The Methodist Retirement Home to the retarded, the Committee recommends that an in-depth study be made, with the help of SEMAR and other related agencies, and that funding for such a study be provided through the Board of Health and Welfare Ministries.

The Committee commends the work of the Board of the Ministry in their efforts to provide counselling for our ministers and their families and join with them in their recommendations to the Annual Conference.

REPORT OF THE MINIMUM SALARY COMMISSION

1. Recommendations

The Minimum Salary Commission recommends for the Conference year 1972-73 that the minimum salaries for all ministers who are serving pastoral appointments be raised \$600. Special exemption permitting this raise has been applied for by our commission on behalf of the North Carolina Conference. The scale is as follows:

1. Conference Member: One or more dependent children \$7,200; married, \$7,000; single, \$6,800.
2. Associates: One or more dependent children, \$6,600; married \$6,400; single, \$6,200. In the event that a pastor on minimum salary changes status he will not receive any less than he did the previous year.
3. Lay Pastor: One or more dependent children, \$6,400; married \$6,200; single, \$6,000.
4. Student: One or more dependent children, \$5,600 plus travel; married, \$5,400 plus travel; single, \$5,200 plus travel.

Travel allowance is based on the distance of student's parsonage from the school he attends. When the parsonage is 25 miles or less, it shall be \$100; when the parsonage is more than 25 miles but less than 50 miles, it shall be \$200; when the parsonage is more than 50 miles but less than 75 miles, it shall be \$300; when the parsonage is more than 75 miles but less than

miles, it shall be \$400; and when the parsonage is 100 miles or more from the school, \$500 shall be the maximum travel allowance.

5. Retired Supply Pastors: \$3,000 (including travel and utilities).

6. Part-time Supplies: Ministers of any status who are serving part-time will receive aid from minimum salary funds, if any, on a basis negotiated with the church, the pastor, the district superintendent, and the Minimum Salary Commission.

"Being aware of the Scott resolution passed by the 1970 Annual Conference—The Minimum Salary Commission is directed to bring forth an equalized salary scale for full-time lay pastors, associate pastors, and Conference members to begin with the Conference year 1973-1974."*

The Minimum Salary Commission feels that the above report is the fairest it can arrive at, considering fiscal responsibility and educational incentive, and that the lay pastors should be placed in the same relative position.

Principles Governing the Use of Minimum Salary Funds

The Commission urges each charge receiving Minimum Salary funds, its minister, and the district superintendent so to administer the affairs of the charge that it may move as rapidly as possible toward full financial support.

To enable the conference, the commission, and the superintendents to carry on their cooperative efforts in understanding, harmony, and for the greatest good for all concerned, the following principles and procedures are set forth:

1. All requests for financial assistance on pastors' salaries for the succeeding year shall be presented by the district superintendent to the Program Council staff representative to the Minimum Salary Commission not later than the first day of Annual Conference.

2. The family or marital status of the pastor at the time of assignment to the charge shall govern the amount paid the minister for the entire conference year.

3. In considering the salary for a charge, we call attention to the fact that the Commission on Minimum Salary must count salary, travel, utilities, bonuses, and expense allowances as well as in making appropriations to the charge. We stress the importance of reporting all contributions, so that all ministers involved may be treated alike.

4. No charge may receive from minimum salary more than one-third of the total salary received with the exception of newly-established congregations. Charges must be arranged so no more than one-third of the total salary be supplemented from minimum salary funds. Charges asking for more than one-third supplement must make an additional application, indicating the reasons for being given special consideration.

DIVIDING CHARGES

5. The Commission on Minimum Salary suggests that, as a general practice, no appointments be made with a membership of less than 400, if the charge is to expect Minimum Salary aid. Creation of circuits and/or charges should be on the basis of mutual agreement by all churches on the circuit rather than simply from the desire of the larger church to withdraw from its own benefit and advancement.

6. When the division of a charge is considered necessary and minimum salary is to be provided for either of the new charges resulting from such divisions, such project shall be presented to the Program Council not later than May 1, so that a satisfactory evaluation can be made by the Commission. Without its approval the Commission shall not be obligated to provide minimum salary support for either of the churches resulting from such division.

7. In the division of circuits where one church seeks to become a station, it is recommended that such church assume all salary obligations and its proportionate share of single-figure asking.

a. It is recommended that the remainder of the division pay two-thirds of pastoral support, and its share of single-figure asking.

b. The Commission on Minimum Salary further recommends that each charge which has received, or shall hereafter receive minimum salary aid, shall reduce this aid by 10% each year until the charge has accepted full self-support. The district superintendents are to inform all charges receiving, or to receive aid in the future, of this regulation which district superintendents should report. This requirement must be kept in mind in preparing for any requests.

Shell amendment passed by conference.

c. When a charge has been established as a student appointment and desires to be served by a full-time minister, this change may take place at such time as the charge shall provide two-thirds of the amount needed to provide such full-time ministerial support and shall agree to reduce the aid by 10% each year.

d. When there is a division of a charge forming one or more student appointments, the charge must pay two-thirds of said salary.

A NEW CHURCH AS A CHARGE

8. When a new church is to be established and becomes a new charge, the district superintendent shall present for study the complete details of the proposed project not later than May 1. These details shall be presented by them to the Conference Board of Missions and the Commission on Minimum Salary. If such new church is approved by the Board and Commission, the Commission shall provide Minimum Salary assistance and the Board shall supplement the salary to make it adequate, and shall assist the new charge in providing living quarters for the minister and a place to meet and worship. It shall be understood that each year the new charge shall accept more of the budget until it becomes self-supporting. We recommend that each new church shall become self-supporting in a period of ten years or less.

a. Exception will be made if charge has made a reasonable effort to become self-supporting and is willing and able to increase salary at least \$300 annually, increase its one-fifth asking proportionately, and reach full support within five more years.

We also recommend that the minimum salary supplement be stopped at any time when a full-time pastor takes over employment or is not employed full-time and that such a pastor be reinstated at any time during the year that he returns to full-time ministerial status.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF THE MINISTRY

REPORT 1

The Board of the Ministry makes the following recommendations:

1. The Board of the Ministry again recommends a Retreat on the Ministry to be held in each district of the Conference in which the priorities of our servanthood may be examined. We commend those districts in which these retreats were held during the current year, for the beginnings of a total assessment of our life and commitment as ministers of the Gospel. Those retreats yet to be held should focus on the conservation of the ministry, the standards of our profession within the framework of our call to ethics within the church and the community, and ways of developing growth in personal and family life. The dates and places for these retreats are to be set by District Program Councils.
2. Every local church is urged to observe Ministry Sunday on September 17, 1961 (or the nearest convenient date) in order that the Ministry, in its nature and function, might be brought to the attention of our people. It is imperative that all ministers seek to enlist highly qualified persons for church occupations.
3. We look with favor upon the continuing effort being made to recruit seminarian graduates for membership in the North Carolina Annual conference, and we commend our bishop for the establishment of a special committee for this purpose. We pledge our continuing interest and assistance in this effort.
4. The Ministerial Education Fund has proved to be a helpful source of financial assistance for the education of our pastors, and we acknowledge the continuing growth of this fund year by year. We encourage all of our churches to recognize the significance and crucial nature of this fund by accepting and paying their full apportionment for this cause at the earliest possible date.
5. The Board of the Ministry will continue to join the Commission on Enlistment for Church Occupations in sponsoring a recognition banquet honoring the Members received into the Connection each year at the sessions of the Annual Conference.
6. The area of continuing education for ministers is one of the most crucial matters

more us and will be dealt with directly through the Committee on Continuing Education. The people of the church expect their ministers to be aware of and familiar with changing circumstances of our world today, and without some disciplined study on the part of the minister, this is impossible. Paragraph 355 of the 1968 *Discipline* indicates the concern of the general church to the extent of encouraging each congregation to release its minister for regular participation in some form of continuing education in a formal setting. We urge the local churches of our Conference to provide the time, financial support, and encouragement for their pastors to participate in programs planned for their continuing education.

The ministers of this Conference holding special appointments are required to make report to the Conference at least once a year, and the report should include a job analysis. Any change in address or nature of service should be reported to the Conference Secretary immediately. The area of service of each special appointment and its relevance to the church will be reviewed each year. Any minister failing to respond to inquiry of the officially designated committee for a period of two consecutive years will be considered for involuntary location.

The problems that rise from situations throughout the Conference where ministers upon appointment to full-time charges have become involved with secular employment demands much of their working time and energies demand some realistic attention. The study must soon be made and guidelines established for this kind of relationship which involves commitment to the pastoral ministry, minimum salary and corresponding work-load, parsonage life, and parish development.

REPORT II

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON COUNSELING RESOURCES

At the meeting of the Ministers' Wives Association of the North Carolina Annual Conference in Greenville, N.C., on June 4, 1970, Mrs. Bruce Pate, President of the High District Ministers' Wives, made the motion that a committee be appointed to study the need and the possibility of securing a Resource Person for our Conference. A Resource Person would be one to whom the ministers and their families could go for counseling for a nominal fee. There was a second to this motion and it carried. Helen Brodie was named as chairman of this committee.

In the ensuing months Mrs. Brodie and her committee have been in contact with other Annual Conferences and Areas which have developed counseling programs for ministers and their families. At the Annual Conference of 1971, meeting in Fayetteville, the Board of the Ministry in its report made the following recommendations:

In view of the great need for counseling service for the ministers of our Conference and their families, we recommend that the Board of the Ministry join with other conference groups to plan and organize an adequate counseling service for the ministers' families.

Representatives from the Board of the Ministry and the Committee from the Ministers' Wives Association have met together, and having studied the material and information gleaned in other areas, offer the following report:

John H. Emerson in an article, "A Survival Kit for Pastoral Stresses," in the national *Minister Advocate*, September 30, 1971, writes:

In 1969, 481 pastors had their conference relations terminated and 473 more were unappointable due to disability. The disabilities surely include a good number of emotionally "burned out" persons with functional disorders... To a caring Christian Community, sensitive to the needs of its individuals, they are human beings fighting a losing battle for survival in a calling to which they had committed themselves at one time and for which they expended a great deal of time, energy, and money to be professionally trained. How many more still in the ranks of active service are leading lives of "quiet desperation" is a haunting speculation.

Those ministers and their families who are still with us is the concern of this report. We recommend that the Board of the Ministry give immediate implementation to its recommendation concerning pastoral counselling made at the last Annual Conference.

We believe that this can be done by setting up a Conference Committee on Pastoral Care who would in turn employ an Area Counselor. The Committee on Pastoral Care would be made up of four (4) representatives from the Board of the Ministry, two (2) Board of Health and Welfare Ministries, one (1) Department of Pastoral Care of Duke Divinity School, and two (2) from Ministers' Wives Association, as selected by each body.

A tentative Job Description of an Area Counselor follows:

I. The Area Counselor shall be qualified as a Pastoral Counselor. This means that he shall be qualified in two fields:

1. as a psychologist
2. as a pastor

He should:

1. Understand the basic theories of personality development, illness and health counseling in individual and group therapy.
2. Be able to integrate theory and practice and understanding himself sufficiently well so that his needs do not interfere with therapeutic relationships.
3. Appreciate the pressures and problems of the minister and his family so that he is able to respond with empathy to his concerns and difficulties.
4. Value community resources so that he avails himself of the counsel of other professionals and make referrals when appropriate.

II. The Area Counselor is mobile. This does not mean that he calls in the homes of pastors. It does mean that he moves out into the area of the conference so that he may be more accessible to ministers, their wives, and children.

His central office, with secretary, is located away from Raleigh. Patterns for travel to areas of the conference will be established in response to need, and/or invitation; and many vary according to time and circumstance as budget permits.

III. Principal duties and responsibilities:

1. Determine need for, and extent of, testing or therapy at the time of initial or subsequent contact. Integrate psychological findings with insights of, and information from other interested parties. Cases are not screened and include both persons who come for an opportunity to ventilate and persons who are sick and need referral to other agencies. Referrals are by Area Counselor or self-referred as the need is perceived by the individual minister and/or his family. Referral may be made to other centers for counseling when referral seems appropriate.
2. Individual and/or group psycho-therapy, and/or counseling. Summarize in writing therapy progress periodically.
3. Consult with resource people and clinic services regarding specific problem cases, broad problem areas of handling motivation and evaluation.
4. Consult with conference boards and agencies on in-service training, program development, coordination and evaluation when requested.
5. Training. Respond to an invitation to teach a course in an appropriate setting and/or lead a limited number (up to three a year) of short term experience if requested by the Program Council.
6. Research. Formulate hypotheses, develop research designs and write articles based on the material collected by his office. Provide consultation on the activities for other professional personnel and appropriate trainees.

IV. Supervisory controls over position.

The Area Counselor shall be professionally and administratively responsible to the Committee on Pastoral Care of the North Carolina Conference, United Methodist Church.

V. Other significant facts.

1. It shall be understood that the period of vacation is one month. 2. He shall be encouraged to engage in experiences which will continue his education and competence as approved by the Committee on Pastoral Care.

In our investigation of the several counseling programs now in process across the country, we have discovered that the cost of such a counseling service may range from \$21,000 to \$31,000 per year. The director of the Ohio We

Area program states that he believes their program pays for itself. He points out that the leaders of the Episcopal Church estimate that it costs the church about \$47,000 when a man leaves the ministry. This amount is saved in just one year if one man receives adequate counseling and stays in the ministry.

We believe that this service should be set up and that its funding should be from Conference World Service funds, since it will be a direct service of the Church to its ministers and their families.

We believe also that this program shall be administratively free from the Cabinet and the United Methodist appointive system. We also believe that no information is to be given to any person about any person unless that person himself first orders that information about himself released.

7. Interpretation of "Special Appointment".

Paragraph 1379.3 (a) (3) states: "The following years of approved service at an Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church are eligible to be counted as pension credit: . . . under special appointment to an institution, organization, or agency which in the judgement of The Annual Conference rendered to it some form of service *direct or indirect*, sufficient to warrant pension credit . . . provided however that such institution, organization, agency, community church, or evangelist accepts and pays such apportionments as the conference may require, with the recommendation that such apportionment shall be equal to twelve times the annuity rate of the conference . . ."

Any member of the North Carolina Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church serving under Special Appointment, may accrue pension credit for any year, if there is paid for him, or in his behalf, the full cost of the pension for the current year, as determined by the actuary.

The forgoing action shall not apply to members of the Conference who are employees of The Program Council, Board of Agencies of The North Carolina Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church, who contributes on their behalf twelve (12) times the current annuity rate as fixed by the Annual Conference.

Report No. II

HOUSING EXCLUSION ALLOWANCE

INTERNAL REVENUE SERVICE DOCUMENT NO. 5045 (10-67) DECLARES:

"Rental Value of Home Furnished a Clergyman, and cost of utilities paid for him, as of his compensation for carrying out his duties as a clergymen, are not income to him, if he duly ordained, licensed, or commissioned."

"A Rental Allowance to Clergyman, paid as part of his compensation, is not income to the extent he used it, in the year received, to provide a home, or pay utilities for a home furnished him. However, the church, or organization which employs him must have officially designated the payment as a rental allowance before the payment was made."

"The above rules are also applicable to retired clergymen where a rent-free home or rental allowance is furnished him in recognition of past services in carrying out his duties as a clergyman."

REVISED RULING, 63,156, 163-2 CB 79 STATES:

"... the rental value of the home furnished to a retired minister as part of his pension for services is excludable from his gross income under Section 107 (1) of the Code. Also, the rental allowance paid to him as part of his compensation for past services is excludable under Section 107 (2) of the Code, to the extent used by him for expenses directly related to providing a home."

(See Code Sec. 107, Reg. 1.107.1 [1103.01])

Therefore the following resolution is presented to the North Carolina Conference of the United Methodist Church, meeting in Durham, North Carolina:

Whereas, The United Methodist Church has a tradition of providing housing (a parsonage) for its ministers, or in instances where no parsonage is owned by the charge, giving the minister a housing allowance, and

Whereas, Retired Ministers of the North Carolina Conference are entitled to the same benefits as those ministers in the Effective Relationship; and

Whereas, the most practical method of providing housing for the Retired Ministers is by way of rental allowance;

Therefore, Be It Resolved, that the amount of \$2,400.00 per year be set as a fair and reasonable rental allowance for each Retired Minister of this annual conference; that the first \$1,000.00 paid to a Retired Minister each year by The Board of Pensions of The North Carolina Conference of the United Methodist Church and \$1,800.00 of this is designated as the payment for Housing Allowance and \$600.00 for Utility Allowance. The Housing Allowance is specifically designated as compensation to the minister for the cost of renting or providing housing for himself and his family and those costs related thereto, pursuant to the Code as set forth in Document 5045 (10-67).

The Board of Pensions emphasizes that the Retired Minister who uses this Housing Allowance must be able to furnish proof that he made expenditures in the amounts claimed. If the full \$2,400.00 cannot be substantiated as expenditures, then claim should be made only for the amounts which can be verified.

We also remind the minister who uses this allowance, that the amount he claims as a Housing Allowance exclusion must be included as Income in reporting his Social Security. It is our hope that reduced Social Security benefits would offset any claims for the Housing Allowance exclusion. Please consult your Social Security Advisor about this matter.

Further, the Board of Pensions absolves itself of any responsibility in the event the Internal Revenue Service disallows any housing allowance claimed.

REPORT NO. III

NORTH CAROLINA METHODIST CONFERENCE
RESERVE PENSION FUND

CONSTITUTION

The Purpose Of The Fund:

The North Carolina Methodist Conference Reserve Pension Fund is established for purpose of the accumulation of funds on an actuarially sound basis to meet the disciplinary responsibilities of the North Carolina Conference of the United Methodist Church to its able and retired ministers, their wives, widows, and dependent children. The funds received by the Conference Board of Pensions, as hereinafter provided, shall be first used to meet responsibilities of the Conference to those persons presently having claim upon the Conference for benefits and the remainder will be accumulated and invested by the Conference Board of Pensions to assist in meeting the responsibilities of the Conference to those persons who will in the future be eligible to make claim upon the Conference for benefits.

Definitions:

As used herein, the following words and phrases shall have the meaning indicated unless otherwise defined or required by the context:

- (1) "Fund"—Shall mean the North Carolina Methodist Conference Reserve Pension Fund.
- (2) "Discipline"—Shall mean the Book of Discipline of the United Methodist Church or comparable legislation subsequently enacted by the General Conference.
- (3) "Conference"—Shall mean the North Carolina Conference of the United Methodist Church.
- (4) "General Conference"—shall mean the General Conference of the United Methodist Church.
- (5) "Board"—Shall mean the Conference Board of Pensions.
- (6) "General Board"—Shall mean the General Board of Pensions of the United Methodist Church.
- (7) "Approved Service"—Shall mean service approved for pension credit determined in accordance with the Discipline.
- (8) "Conference Average Salary"—Shall mean the average salary of the Conference as computed by the General Board in accordance with the Discipline.
- (9) "Annuity Rate"—Shall mean the per service year rate of annuity as determined each year by the Conference in accordance with the Discipline.
- (10) "Effective Date"—Shall mean the date the North Carolina Methodist Conference Reserve Pension Fund was established, which shall be June 1, 1973.
- (11) "Fund Actuary"—Shall mean the Actuary or Actuarial firm selected by the Conference Board of Pensions to perform the actuarial valuations and to otherwise advise on the administration of the Fund.

The Fund—Its Establishment And Administration:

Assets constituting the present investments of the Board will be used to establish the Fund. The adequacy of the Fund to meet the needs of present and future claimants upon the Conference for benefits shall be maintained through actuarially determined contributions.

The Board shall have the responsibility for having an actuarial valuation performed on or about June 1st of each year, and shall report to the Commission on World Service and Finance for recommendation to the Conference, the amount thus determined for contribution to the Fund. The approved amount of contribution shall then be apportioned to the districts and pastoral charges of the Conference and paid by the charge as provided in the Discipline.

The funds received by the Board, both from payment of apportionments by past charges, and from all other sources as specified in the Discipline, will be first used to meet responsibilities of the Conference to present claimants for benefits, and the remainder will be accumulated and invested by the Board to assist in meeting the responsibilities of the Conference to future claimants for benefits.

The Board has the responsibility for the accumulation and investment of contributions from all sources to the Fund, and for distributions from the Fund to those eligible to receive

ts in accordance with the provisions of the Discipline and the Fund Constitution. All contributions to the Fund shall be received, held, invested, and disbursed by the Board solely for the benefit of claimants upon the Conference for benefits as set forth herein.

The Board may construe and interpret the provisions of this Constitution whenever necessary to carry out its intention and purpose. Any decision and action taken in good faith as the result of such construction and interpretation and any decision and action taken in good faith as the result of the Board's determination of facts in applying the terms of this Constitution shall be conclusive. The Board may engage the services of any person or firm, including legal counsel and advisers, who, in the opinion of the Board, are necessary to assist the Board in the proper administration of the Fund and may rely and act upon the opinion of such advisers in discharging their duties.

The Board of Pensions shall establish uniform rules and procedures to be followed by ministers for benefits in filing applications for benefits, in furnishing and verifying proofs necessary to determine age, and in any other matters required to administer the Fund.

Eligibility For Benefits:

Any ministerial member of the Conference and any other person having the right to make an annuity claim upon the Conference as provided in the Discipline shall be considered to be eligible for benefit payments from the Fund.

Qualification For Retirement:

The Discipline provides that a ministerial member of the Conference shall automatically be placed in the retired relation upon attaining the age of mandatory retirement established by the Annual Conference, with those who are eligible for benefits having the privilege of making an annuity claim.

The Discipline also provides that a ministerial member of the Conference may request to be placed in the retired relation with privilege of making an annuity claim provided that he has attained age sixty-five or completed forty years of full-time, Approved Service.

In addition, the Discipline provides that a ministerial member of the Conference may be placed in the retired relation if he has completed twenty years or more of full-time, Approved Service with privilege of making an annuity claim with payments to begin on his sixty-fifth birthday.

Eligibility For Pension Benefits:

Any ministerial member of the Annual Conference who is placed in the retired relation with the privilege of making an annuity claim, any minister who has transferred to another conference with accrued approved pension credits in the North Carolina Conference and is subsequently placed in the retired relation with privilege of making an annuity claim, and any located minister who has acquired the privilege of making an annuity claim shall be eligible to receive an annual pension based on the Annuity Rate determined by the Conference for each year of Approved Service.

Whenever a minister is placed in the retired relation and pension benefits have commenced, it is provided that he shall continue to be paid throughout his lifetime at the Annuity Rate in effect on the date his pension benefit payments commenced; provided, however, that the Conference in its regular session by three-fourths (3/4) of those present and voting shall have the right to change the Annuity Rate of its retired ministers; provided further, that such change shall not be effective until the Conference without first securing an actuarial opinion from the Fund Actuary as to the cost and other related aspects of the proposed change.

Eligibility For Disability Benefits:

Any minister who is granted disability leave in accordance with the Discipline shall be eligible to receive disability benefits during such periods of disability leave. His benefit shall be the lesser of (a) his accrued pension benefits up to the date of disability, based on the Annuity Rate in effect and his years of Approved Service as of his date of disability, or (b) one-third (1/3) of the Conference Average Salary as of his date of disability. Disability benefits shall not be paid to any minister on approved disability leave who is receiving benefits from the Emergency Aid Fund.

While on disability leave, a disabled minister shall continue to accrue Approved Service for credit up to a maximum of fifteen years, or to age sixty-five, whichever should occur first. At each yearly renewal of his disability leave, the disability benefit for the succeeding Conference year shall be adjusted based on his Approved Service to date and the Annuity Rate then in effect.

If a minister is still disabled and on disability leave when he attains age sixty-five, he shall be placed in the retired relation, and paid a pension benefit based upon his Approved Service as of his date of retirement, including those years accrued while on disability leave, and the Annual Rate then in effect.

Death Benefits For Widows:

In the event of the death of a ministerial member of the Conference with approved pension credits who at the time of death was actively engaged in the ministry, or had been placed on approved disability leave, or had been placed in the retired relation but whose benefit payments had not commenced, the widow of such minister shall be entitled to a pension benefit which shall be the greater of (a) 70% of such minister's accrued pension benefits as of the date of death, based on the years of Approved Service accrued to date of death and then current Annuity Rate, or (b) 15% of the Conference Average Salary as of the date of death.

In the event of death of a minister in the retired relation after retirement benefits have commenced, his widow shall be entitled to a pension benefit which shall be the greater of 70% of his pension benefits, or (b) 15% of Conference Average Salary.

The widow of a located minister shall not be entitled to death benefits from the Fund. A special allowance may be made to her upon a recommendation from the Board and the three-fourths (3/4) approval of the Conference.

Should a widow remarry prior to attaining age sixty-five, her death benefits from the Fund shall cease as of her date of remarriage. Upon the attainment of age sixty-five, such widow shall again be entitled to a pension benefit based upon the Annuity Rate as of her sixty-fifth birthday and the Approved Service years upon which the pension benefits prior to remarriage were determined.

Death Benefits For Dependent Children:

In the event of death of a ministerial member of the Conference with Approved pension credits who at the time of death was actively engaged in the ministry, or had been placed on approved disability leave, or had been placed in the retired relation, each dependent child of such deceased ministerial member shall be entitled to a benefit of 5% of the Conference Average Salary, determined as of the date of death, which shall be paid until such dependent child attains the age of sixteen, at which age the benefit shall be increased to 10% of Conference Average Salary and shall be paid until the dependent child reaches the age of eighteen. Should a dependent child during a period of four years between the ages of eight and twenty-six attend an accredited institution of higher learning, such dependent child shall continue to receive a benefit of 10% of Conference Average Salary until such time as he completes four years of study or attains age twenty-six, whichever occurs first.

Payment Of Benefits:

The effective date of retirement or of disability leave shall be determined by the Conference in accordance with the provisions of the Discipline. Benefit payment shall commence as of the first day of the month coinciding with or next following the effective date of retirement or disability leave.

In the event of death, benefit payment to widows and/or dependent children shall commence on the first day of the month following the date of death, or the next regular date of paying benefits, whichever occurs first.

Legally Incompetent:

If any person who becomes eligible to receive benefits from this Fund is a minor, or the judgement of the Board after consulting competent advisers, judged to be legally incompetent, or personally receiving and giving a valid receipt for any payment due him hereunder, the Board may, unless and until claim shall have been made by a guardian or conservator of such person duly appointed by a court of competent jurisdiction, withhold payment or direct that payment or any part thereof be made to such person or to such person's spouse, child, parent, brother or sister, or other person deemed by the Board or the courts to be a proper person to receive such payment. Any payment so made shall be a complete discharge of any liability of the Conference and the Board for such payment.

Termination Of Conference Membership:

Any ministerial member of the Conference who is located (either voluntarily or involuntarily) and who is not readmitted to the Conference, and, any ministerial member c

ference who surrenders his ministerial office or withdraws from the Conference to unite in another church, shall not be eligible to receive benefits from the Fund.

Amendment Of Constitution:

The Conference shall have the right at any time to modify, alter, or amend the Constitution in whole or in part at any regular session or special session called for that purpose; by three-fourths (3/4) of those present and voting; provided, however, that no modification, alteration, or amendment shall be made without first securing an actuarial opinion from the General Actuary concerning the cost and other related aspects of the proposed changes; and provided further that notice of any amendment and the recommended changes shall be given to official delegates at least thirty days before the Session of the Annual Conference which would be voting on the amendment. No amendment shall cause or permit any part of the Fund assets to be used for, or diverted to, purposes other than for the exclusive benefit of the ministers or their wives, their widows, or dependent children. No amendment shall have the effect of revesting in the Conference any portion of such funds. No amendment shall be in any way contrary to the provisions of the Discipline.

Merger and Continuation Of Fund:

The Conference, upon recommendation of The Board of Pensions shall have the right to merge this Fund or to merge this Fund into any of the funds administered by the General Board of Pensions at any regular sessions by three-fourths (3/4) of those present and voting; provided further that any notice of such recommendation shall be given to official delegates at least thirty (30) days before the session of the Annual Conference which would be voting on the recommendation. In the event of merger of this Conference with another annual conference, a joint Distribution committee shall be formed as provided by the Discipline and the provisions of the Fund shall be applied by this committee as provided by the Discipline.

REPORT IV

INSURANCE COMMITTEE REPORT

The Insurance Committee, with the assistance of its consultant has carefully reviewed the insurance program of this conference. This review enables us to make the following recommendations.

Group Term Life Insurance

We recommend that the present Group Term Life Insurance policy with Fidelity and Guaranty Life Insurance Co. be continued for the conference year 1972-1973. The coverage is to remain the same, and there is to be no change in the premium rates.

Blue Cross Blue Shield Hospital Insurance

- A. We recommend that the present level of benefits provided in the current Blue Cross Blue Shield Hospital Insurance policy be continued without any changes in benefits.
- B. We recommend that the premium rate increase be adopted. The premium rate increases \$7.65 for individual, \$15.36 for parent and child, \$21.42 for family, per quarter.
- C. We call attention to the rate increase for those of the group over age sixty-five. Effective July 1, 1972, the already approved quarterly increase is \$6.45 per individual over sixty-five. We also point out that it is possible there will be an additional rate increase for this group, depending upon the action by the North Carolina Insurance Department.
- D. We recommend that all increased quarterly premium rates be paid by the minister and other individuals insured in this group policy.
- E. We recommend that the Chairman of The Insurance Committee appoint an Insurance Appeals Review Committee to receive appeals from the ministers or other insured persons who there have been certain inequities in their insurance claim payments under the level of benefits provided in the insurance program, and to help establish an understanding with all persons concerned in these matters. Further, the Chairman shall attempt to include on this committee a representative from The Board of The Ministry, a member of The Board of Pensions, a Cabinet representative, a Hospital Administrator or a person named by such an

administrator, and a doctor, who is either a M. D. or a Surgeon. It is further recommended that the present chairman of The Insurance Study Committee serve as Chairman of this Claims Review Committee.

F. We further urge all ministers to cooperate in our efforts to more effectively coordinate benefits where more than one Blue Cross policy is affected, or any other group insurance policy is involved. This means completing a form for this purpose, which will be made available at the first ministers meeting in each district, and return this form to the District Superintendent, who in turn will forward it to the Insurance Committee. One purpose for this recommendation is to keep the premiums from further increase.

Miscellaneous

We of the Insurance Committee are very concerned over the rising cost of the Blue Cross Blue Shield Hospital Insurance. We are aware that premium costs relate to the benefits paid and in our opinion that the members of our group policy need to be provided information as to how to use the group insurance plan to its fullest benefits to the policy holder, but at the same time use the protection discreetly so as to keep the costs from continuing to increase. Therefore, we recommend that each District Superintendent make use of a film about this subject, which is available from Blue Cross Blue Shield. We further recommend that this film be shown as soon as possible, in order that all may be made conscious of their personal responsibility in keeping costs from rising even more.

A RESOLUTION RELATING TO SALE OF PROPERTY ORIGINALLY BELONGING TO METHODIST EPISCOPAL CHURCH SOUTH OF WAKE COUNTY

WHEREAS James E. Allen by deed dated October 13, 1855, granted to the Methodist Episcopal Church South of Wake County, a certain tract of land in Cary Township, Wake County, and

WHEREAS, as a result of the merger of the Methodist Episcopal Church South and the Methodist Episcopal Church in 1939, the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Church became the legal owner of Methodist Episcopal Church South real property, and

WHEREAS, As a result of the 1968 merger, the North Carolina Conference of the United Methodist Church became the legal owner of real property formerly owned by the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Church, and

WHEREAS, the above described property was abandoned by the church at an unknown date, and

WHEREAS, prior to the current title search, no known officer of the United Methodist Church was aware of the fact that legal title to the above described property may be held by the North Carolina Conference of the United Methodist Church, and

WHEREAS, there is no building on the above described property, and

WHEREAS, there is one marked grave, with a burial date of 1891, there is believed to be at least one other unmarked, and there may be other unknown graves on the above described property, and

WHEREAS, the above described property has no right of ingress, egress, and regress to a public highway, and

WHEREAS, James F. Whiting, who has an option on the adjacent property, desires to acquire the above described property for a sum of three hundred dollars (\$300.00), upon delivery of a warranty deed, and

WHEREAS, the United Methodist Church and the purchaser do not wish to disregard a sacred dead; consequently the purchaser will be responsible for moving the remains and marking of the known grave and any other remains he may discover to another burial site after obtaining a disinterment permit, and

WHEREAS, the White Plains United Methodist Church Charge Conference of September 8, 1971, adopts a resolution, requesting the North Carolina Conference of the United Methodist Church, at its next annual conference, to authorize the conveyance of the above described property to James F. Whiting for the sum of three hundred (\$300.00); said conveyance to be made by warranty deed, and

WHEREAS, this action was approved by the Reverend J.W. Page, District Superintendent of the Raleigh District of the United Methodist Church:

NOW, THEREFORE, be it resolved that the Trustees of the North Carolina Conference and they are authorized to convey the property herein described to James F. Whiting for the sum of three hundred dollars (\$300.00); said conveyance to be made by warranty deed.

III.

1. The Single Figure Asking Formula approved by the Annual Conference in 1967 amended in 1971 shall be continued. Further, each church shall be informed at the Conference of the amount which the Fair Share Single Figure formula assigned to it, with churches that are already exceeding the amount being apportioned as much as the previous year or the new Single Figure arrived at by the formula whichever is more and that all churches not giving less than the amount which the formula assigned be urged to increase to the needed amount within a period of two years.

2. The following special offerings shall be taken in each local church and remitted to the conference Treasurer as separate items. They are not to be included in the Single Figure Asking: World Communion, Methodist Student Day, One Great Hour of Sharing, Race Relations Day.

IV.

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS FUND:

(a) The salary of each of the district superintendents shall be set at \$14,250.00 plus \$1,600.00 travel expense. Such part of said salary that is paid out by the district superintendent to cover the actual costs of all those utilities applicable to the operation and maintenance of his district parsonage is hereby assigned as housing expense not to exceed the sum of \$800.00 for heat, water, electrical services and residential telephone. We recommend that all districts assume this expense for these utilities.

(b) Each district shall provide an amount equal to 1% of the District Superintendent's salary and travel to be allocated for the Ministers Retirement fund in lieu of institutional payment, which in the case of pastors, is provided by the charge.

(c) The District shall also provide the institutional payment for group life insurance and group hospital and medical insurance.

The Program Council Director's salary and benefits shall be the same as those provided for District Superintendents.

We approve the use of an amount up to \$4,000.00 to be provided by each district for the district superintendent for secretarial help and promotion of the district program.

No conference agency's budget shall incorporate funds to be appropriated to a non-conference agency, without specific approval of the North Carolina Annual Conference.

Monies paid by charges toward the Single Figure Asking shall be reported to the statistician by the conference treasurer and all other funds paid by the local church shall be reported in the Pastor's Report, Table II.

No transfer of funds shall be made by any agency from one line item in the budget to another without approval of the Commission on World Service & Finance.

We recommend that the Conference authorize the Commission on World Service and Finance to employ the services of a Management-Consultant Specialist to make a full and detailed financial and management study of the North Carolina Annual Conference.

Annual Conference Entertainment. We call attention to the recommendation which was adopted in 1971 which stated that: "Where it is possible to do so, we are asking that the local churches underwrite the expenses for its delegates to the Annual Conference Session beginning with the Annual Conference in 1972."

V.

We recommend approval of the requests of the following agencies for the privilege of soliciting funds throughout the Conference:

1. The Christmas Offering 1972 for district superintendents' program and/or projects. There should be clearly defined in plenty of time to have successful promotion.

2. The Board of Missions for the promotion of the Church Extension Ten Dollar Club.

3. The Board of Education to solicit from church groups and individuals, materials and money for specific projects for the four camps of the North Carolina conference.

4. Interconference Commission on Campus Ministry for the privilege of private solicitation of special gifts for the benefit of special works in the state-supported institutions.

5. Methodist Retirement Homes, Incorporated; Methodist Home for Children; The Rural Church Fund; Louisburg College; Methodist College and North Carolina Wesleyan College for the privilege of private solicitation and receipt of such funds as may be directed thereto with the understanding that such solicitation or private campaign may not be taken into the local churches of the conference.

6. The Methodist Foundation, Inc., as provided in its charter.

VI.

We recommend the continuation of A.M. Pullen & Company as auditors.

We recommend that the president, vice-president and secretary of the Commission on World Service and Finance and the Conference Treasurer shall serve as the executive committee of the Commission on World Service and Finance.

The Conference fiscal year will close May 31, 1973. We shall make every effort to pay 7/12ths of our current conference year financial obligations to the General Conference by December 31 which coincides with the General Conference fiscal year. Payments will actually be made to the General Conference only on the basis of collections through December 31 in amounts not to exceed the General Conference apportionment on the basis of the General Conference calendar year.

We call attention to the fact that the Pastor's salary as set by the Charge Conference is for a conference year, that is, from one session of the Annual Conference to the next session of the Annual Conference. In keeping with the conference fiscal year closing May 31, each charge shall pay the salary promised the pastor for the conference year by the date.

We recommend that in subsequent years the Conference Claimants item in the said budgets of the North Carolina Annual Conference become an item of prior claim.

We recommend that the Conference Treasurer be directed to pay out of Earnings on Central Funds a sum of \$10,000.00 as a down-payment on the parsonage for the newly formed District in our Conference. This payment shall constitute a final settlement for those charges placed in the new district for any equity they may have had in other district parsonages.

~~WHEREAS~~, Camp Chestnut Ridge exists for the purpose of providing a sanctuary for the church's ministry in God's unspoiled out-of-doors, and

~~WHEREAS~~, the presence of such a landfill adjacent to Camp Chestnut Ridge, with a 1,000 foot joint border with the camp, would be inconsistent with the established purposes for the operation of the camp, and

~~WHEREAS~~, accompanying problems of such a landfill would include 1) increased litter and

traffic along the roads approaching the camp, 2) noises from heavy equipment used for clearing the area, delivering and covering waste materials and 3) odors caused by waste in transit and from uncovered waste, and

WHEREAS the effectiveness of the long-range year-round use of Camp Chestnut Ridge will be seriously affected if the County Commissioners exercise their option and locate a landfill adjacent to the camp

Be it therefore resolved that the North Carolina Conference of the United Methodist Church, in session in Durham, North Carolina, this 7th day of June, 1972, hereby expresses its opposition to the proposed location of the Orange County landfill, and urges the Commissioners to seriously consider the possibilities that Camp Chestnut Ridge offers as a wilderness area and nature center in the heart of an increasingly urbanized area of the state, and further urges them to seek a more appropriate location for the county landfill.

Whereas, Annual Conferences are being asked to make some special financial effort on behalf of these colleges either this fall or next spring, therefore

Be It Resolved, that the North Carolina Annual Conference approve and request that a special offering to be known as the "Emergency Appeal for Bennett College, Greensboro, North Carolina" be taken in each local church on Sunday, November 5, 1972, and forwarded to the Conference Treasurer, and that the Conference Treasurer be instructed to send all receipts from this offering to Bennett College.

ADOPTED SUPPLEMENTARY RESOLUTIONS
OF THE BOARD
OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL CONCERNS

We recommend:

"Removal of abortion from the criminal code and placement under regulations relating to other procedures of standard medical practice. The problem of abortion performed by non-licensed physicians would be dealt with in the framework of the law."

(Supplement to Goal 89)

We recommend the following as the policy statement of the North Carolina Annual Conference concerning day-care programs by local churches:

"Our primary concern is to provide high-quality day care for children at minimum cost to parents. All centers will be required to meet standards for State licensing under the law. This calls for two levels, one a minimum and the other including higher voluntary standards. Since these in any case are not very high, we desire that our

churches set standards above those required by state law in terms of facilities, program and expression of the church's Christian concern for children. Personnel should have the highest possible qualifications and training that churches can secure. We recommend that the church establish smaller groupings than the state law requires, especially for children under four years of age."

(Supplement to Goal 96)

3. We recommend United Methodist efforts in support of the reform of North Carolina Correctional Institutions with adoption of the following resolution:

"Whereas the prisons of our State should not be instruments of vengeance, but correction and rehabilitation, and

"Whereas all the inmates of our prisons, regardless of the nature of their offense, are persons with whom Christ has identified and whom He has called us to serve, and

Whereas society is not benefited or successfully protected or crime diminished by prisons which are dehumanizing and which tend to reinforce and encourage the anti-social propensities of inmates, and prisons which are dehumanizing and which tend to reinforce and encourage the anti-social propensities of inmates, and

Whereas the prisons of North Carolina are in fact severely limited in their capacities to rehabilitate, and do in fact tend to make inmates more criminal rather than less criminal, and

Whereas these deficiencies are largely due to the severe lack of resources in terms of personnel and facilities, which lack in turn stems from public ignorance, apathy, contempt, and selfrighteous vindictiveness toward the criminal offender,

Therefore, be it resolved that the North Carolina Annual Conference express its urgent desire for positive change in the prison system so that prisons become centers of help, and healing that churches be urged to inquire into the conditions of prisons and to study the issue of crime and punishment in light of a Christian perspective; and that the Governor and the General Assembly of North Carolina continue to give attention to the needs of the prisons and to provide the resources which are so badly needed to increase their capacities to rehabilitate by the following measures:

- a. Provide more adequate training for all levels of the correctional staff, both basic training at the time of employment and on the job training, and to upgrade the scale of compensation for correctional officers to bring it in line with that of other state law enforcement personnel
- b. to provide educational opportunities, vocational training opportunities, library services, and recreational facilities for prisoners so that every inmate has access to the means of educational advancement, reading and recreation, and vocational training while he is imprisoned.
- c. to increase staff in critical areas such as work with youthful offenders, health care, guidance counseling, education, and diagnosis and classification
- d. to replace or renovate existing prison units to provide single occupancy rooms as rapidly as possible, beginning with facilities for youthful offenders and inmates with behavior disorders which may endanger other inmates
- e. to develop community advancement centers as final rehabilitative step before release and to encourage local mental health centers to work closely with correctional units on mental problems of inmates.

Be it also resolved that churches be urged to participate in the community volunteer program of the North Carolina Correctional System and that comprehensive ministerial services to prisoners before imprisonment, while incarcerated, and upon return to the community be initiated and implemented by task forces or mission groups from cooperating churches in each community.

4. That the charter be amended to include responsibility for and supervision of functions involved in the educational process inclusively designated under the descriptive terms "Local Church Section," and "Camp Section," and "Curriculum Resources Section," and
5. That the by-laws of the corporation be amended to conform to the division of responsibilities herein directed, and
6. That a copy of the amended charter, which is herein authorized, be submitted to the next hereafter Annual Conference for approval.

J., of The United Methodist Church, as of May 31, 1972 for the 1971-72 Conference Year then ended. ACCOUNTANTS' COMMENTS RELATING TO CERTAIN AUDITING PROCEDURES

The scope of our examination is contained in our opening letter. Certain features of the examination are set forth below.

Cash on deposit was confirmed directly with the banks. Cash receipts were traced to their subsequent deposit in the bank on a test basis, and disbursements were verified by test examination of cancelled checks and paid invoices or authorizations. Income from charges, as shown by the Treasurer's records, was confirmed directly with the pastors, and minor differences reported to us of the date of this report were adjusted or satisfactorily explained.

Distribution of income from charges was audited by reference to the report of the Commission on World Service and Finance for the 1971 and 1972 sessions of the Annual Conference and by reference to proper authorizations from the various boards of the conference.

Investments of the Treasurer and of the various boards and funds were either inspected or, if held by an outside agent, confirmed by direct confirmation during the course of our examination.

Cash receipts in transit represent 1971-72 collections received by the Treasurer subsequent to the balance sheet date and were set up from deposits in the bank accounts. Accounts and apportionments payable were set up from disbursements subsequent to the balance sheet date and by reference to proper authorization for the distribution of 1971-72 collections.

Our examination of other assets—Board of Missions, Inc.—included the inspection of documents supporting disbursements and verification of the balances by direct correspondence with the churches on a test basis.
