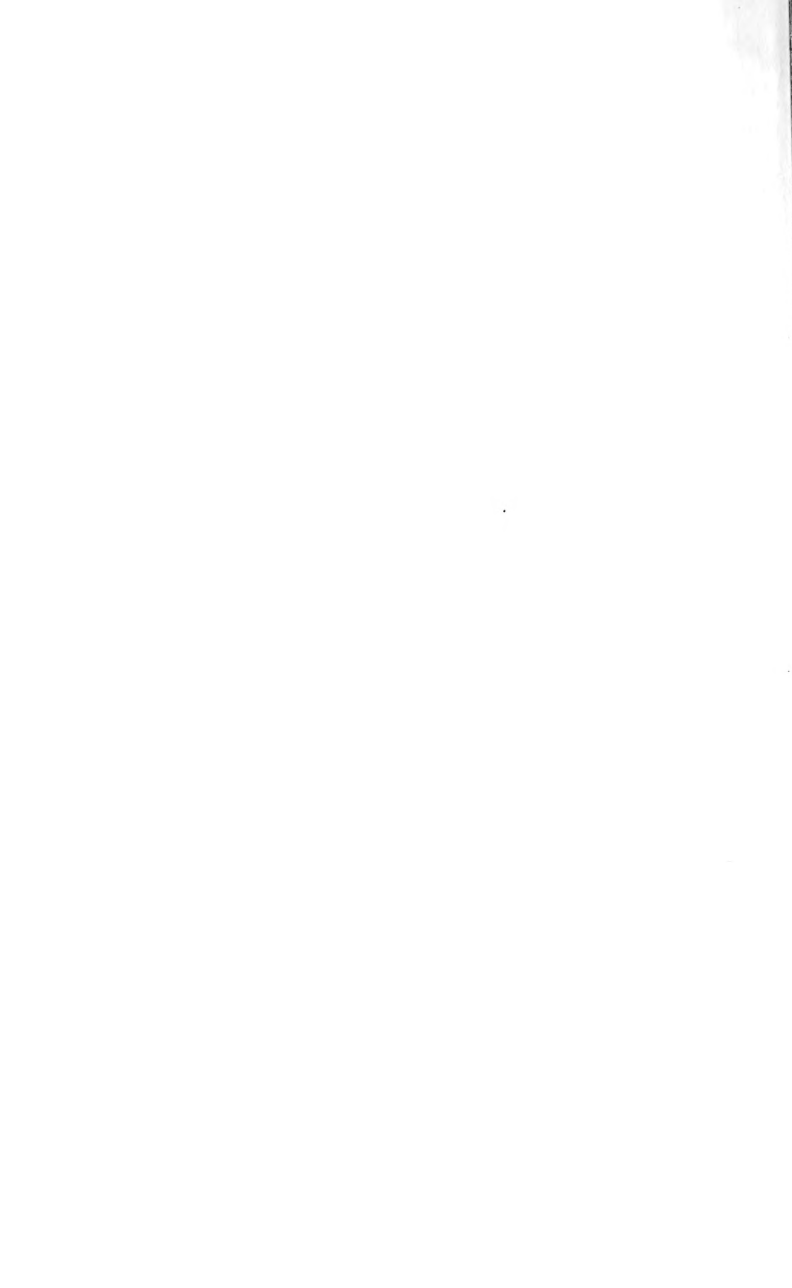

Historical Statement

I. COMPOSITION:

The North Carolina Conference of the United Methodist Church is composed of:

- (1) The eastern portion of the former North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Protestant Church.
- (2) The former North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Episcopal Church, South.
- (3) The coastal region of the former Blue-Ridge-Atlantic Conference of The Methodist Episcopal Church.
- (4) The Eastern District, North Carolina-Virginia Conference, Central Jurisdiction.

II ORGANIZATION:

The organizing dates of the four former Conferences were as follows:

- (1) The North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Protestant Church 1828, at Whitaker's Chapel in Halifax County, North Carolina.
- (2) The North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Episcopal Church, South, 1837, at Petersburg, Virginia.
- (3) The Blue Ridge-Atlantic Conference of The Methodist Episcopal Church, South, 1879, at Greensboro, North Carolina, first named Southern Central Conference; two years later, 1881, renamed Blue Ridge-Atlantic Conference.

- (4) The Eastern District North Carolina-Virginia Annual Conference was organized at a special session on August 11, 1964, at Bennett College, Greensboro, North Carolina.

Rules of Order and Procedure

Section 1: Rules of Order

1. *Robert's Rules of Order* shall apply to any situation not covered by these rules.
2. A member may speak out only once on any one motion until all who desire to speak have done so; and then he may speak only one additional time.
3. The chairperson of an agency (or someone designated by him) shall be allowed to speak last on his report even though the previous questions have been ordered.
4. Speeches shall be limited to ten (10) minutes except by consent of the conference.
5. If any part of these rules conflict with the *The Book of Discipline of the United Methodist Church*, the *Discipline* shall prevail.
6. The Rules of Order and Procedure for the North Carolina Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church shall apply to the Annual Conference as regularly scheduled and to all called sessions of the conference.

Section II: Voting

1. Voting shall be by "yes or no" or by a "show of hands" or by "standing" at the discretion of the chair.
2. A count vote may be ordered or called by any member of the conference supported by one-fifth (1/5) of the members present and voting. The results of a count vote shall be printed in the Journal. The chair may call for a count vote if he is in doubt as to the outcome of the vote.
3. All votes shall be cast in the bar of the conference. The bar of the conference shall be determined by the conference at the beginning of the first session.

Section III: Election of Delegates to General and Jurisdictional Conferences

1. The election of clerical delegates shall be by the "Roman Ballot." (Each person eligible to vote shall write his selection of names to the number of names ordered by the chair on a secret ballot, without prior nomination, with balloting to continue until a majority is received by sufficient persons to fulfill the needed number of delegates.)
2. Any local church may, by action of its Administrative Board, nominate at most one person for lay delegate. It shall forward a biographical sketch and statement, both together not to exceed one typewritten page, to the Conference Secretary, who shall distribute copies thereof in or with the *Conference Program and Recommendations*, or in a manner to be determined by the Council on Ministries.
3. The election of lay delegates shall be by the "Roman Ballot," as above. Electors may vote for any eligible person, whether nominated as above or not.
4. All votes shall be cast upon the official ballots authorized by the conference.

5. Ballots shall be numbered consecutively and only ballots with the number announced by the chair shall be valid. Defaced ballots will not be valid. (If a member defaces a ballot, he may exchange it for a new one at the secretary's desk.)
6. Each member will place his own ballot in the ballot box held by a teller.
7. Different colored ballots will be provided for lay and clerical members.

Section IV: Conference Structure

1. The Bishop and Cabinet shall determine the size of and nominate the members of all Boards, Divisions, Commissions, and Committees authorized by the General Conference, the Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference, and this Annual Conference, except in those cases where the *Discipline* or the Annual Conference directs otherwise.
2. Near the end of each quadrennium, the heads of all Boards, Divisions, Commissions, and Committees shall submit a list of qualified, suggested nominees to the Bishop and Cabinet for their consideration in the formation of new Boards, Divisions, Commissions, and Committees.
3. Recommendations and nominations shall be subject to the approval of the Annual Conference.
4. At the beginning of each quadrennium all Boards, Divisions, Commissions, and Committees shall elect their officers only after all their members have been notified of the organizational meeting. A member of the Cabinet or the Conference Staff (designated by the Cabinet) shall serve as the convening officer for the organizational meeting. Tenure for membership for all persons on boards, agencies, divisions, commissions, and committees shall be 8 years, with exception of the Board of Laity where tenure shall be six years for members and four years for The Conference Lay Leader. (The Conference Lay Leader may serve also the unexpired term of his predecessor.)
5. The Conference structure is that which was determined by the 1969 Annual Conference (Pages 212-217) and as amended by the Special Session of February 21, 1970 (Pages 110-117), the 1972 Annual Conference (Pages 308-311), and the 1976 Annual Conference.
6. The offices of Conference Secretary and Statistician shall be as determined by the 1973 Annual Conference (Pages 289-290).
The Secretary: The secretary of the Annual Conference shall be elected quadrennially, at the first session of the Conference after the meeting of the General Conference; and on nominations arising from the floor.
Assistant Secretaries: The secretary shall nominate his assistants and the Conference shall elect.
Statisticians: There shall be a conference statistician and an assistant statistician. The statistician shall be elected quadrennially at the first session after the meeting of the General Conference. The assistant statistician shall be elected annually upon nomination by the statistician.
Conference Stenographers: The conference secretary shall employ the conference stenographers.
Compensation: The Council on Finance and Administration shall determine, subject to the approval of the Conference, the compensation given officers for their services and also, the method and amount for meeting expenses of said officers. The Conference Treasurer shall pay these amounts.

7. Committees and Boards:

- a. The Conference Board of Trustees shall be required to meet at least once a year other than the regular meeting at the session of the Annual Conference.
- b. There shall be a Program Committee of the Conference consisting of the Resident Bishop, the Conference Secretary, the host District Superintendent, and the pastor of the host church, and the Conference Lay Leader, the Conference President of the U.M.W., the U.M.Y.F., and the Director of the Conference Council on Ministries. They shall determine the compensation and expense for invited speakers and this shall be paid from the conference expense fund.
- c. There shall be an Entertainment Committee composed of three ministers and three laypersons. The Committee shall be elected at the first session of the Annual Conference in the quadrennium. The Committee shall receive invitations and recommend to the Annual Conference the place and the method of entertaining the Annual Conference.
 - (1) The Annual Conference will be held at Methodist College and N.C. Wesleyan College on alternating years (held at Methodist College until Wesleyan has an auditorium) except as such times that a local church or other institution wishes to host Annual Conference as a part of a special celebration in the life of the Church.

The cabinet will designate a district each year on a rotating basis as the host district which will be responsible for ushers, flowers, and other related items of hospitality.
- d. There shall be a Committee on Memoirs composed of the Conference Secretary, and the District Superintendents. They are charged with the responsibility of providing for all details of the memorial service. The Conference Secretary shall serve as its Chairperson.
- e. There shall be a Committee on Daily Minutes elected each year to examine the daily minutes of the sessions of the Conference and report daily to the Conference.
- f. There shall be a Committee on Appeals appointed quadrennially, composed of five members whose duties shall be to hear appeals from the decisions of the several District Boards of Church Location and Buildings, or any other questions that may properly come before it.
- g. There shall be a Committee on Rules which shall provide to the Conference a document of Rules of Order and Procedure and the policies and standing rules and structure that the Conference from time to time shall adopt for its functioning. This document shall be presented to each Annual Conference.
- h. There shall be constituted a Committee on Courtesies and Introductions annually, at the first session of the Conference.

Section V: Financial Administration

1. The Conference Treasurer and all others receiving and disbursing funds from our Conference shall be required to make audited statements annually, and to print the same in the *Journal*.

2. The Council on Finance and Administration shall present their report to the Annual Conference only after all other committees, commissions, divisions, boards, and agencies having claims on the budget have presented their report.
3. Each District Superintendent shall furnish the Conference Treasurer as early as possible following the completion of the Charge Conferences an official copy of the acceptances of the Single Figure Askings and a schedule of the salaries of pastors as set by the Charge Conferences. The Conference Treasurer shall furnish this information to other agencies who have need of it. The Statistician shall use this report in compiling his report to the Annual Conference. (See also Section VII, Paragraph 2).

Section VI: Reports, Resolutions, Motions, and Amendments to Report

1. All reports, recommendations, and resolutions to be included in the Book of Recommendations shall be sent to the Conference Secretary, typewritten and in triplicate, on or before the date approved for such by the Council on Ministries and published in the conference calendar.
2. Resolutions presented to the Annual Conference affecting the structure, policy, and function of any board or agency of the Annual Conference shall be submitted in writing to the Conference Secretary with copies for all the lay and clerical members of the Conference. The resolution shall be presented to the Annual Conference on one day and considered the next day. No resolutions shall be distributed later than the second night of the Annual Conference. None can be considered later than the third night of the Conference.
3. Motions presented to the Annual Conference and amendments to motions shall be in writing (in triplicate) and placed in the hands of the Conference Secretary prior to or when presented or immediately following.

Section VII: Pastor's Report to The Annual Conference: Statistics

1. Table I and Table II shall be submitted to the Conference Statistician one week following the close of the financial books of the Annual Conference.
2. Final remittances for the current calendar year shall be made to the Conference Council on Finance and Administration.
3. Each table of the report shall be filled out by individual churches.
4. Table II shall be made out in even dollars only.
5. Tables I and II shall be printed in the Conference *Journal* with individual church reports and charge totals as compiled by the Conference Statistician from the pastor's reports.

Section VIII: The Conference Journal

1. The Conference Secretary shall be charged with the responsibility of editing and making contracts for the publication of the Conference *Journal*, in keeping with regulations of the General Conference and of the Southeastern Jurisdic-

tional Conference. The editor shall have full authority to condense reports, memoirs, and other papers when necessary.

2. One complimentary copy of the Conference *Journal* shall be sent to each of the following: the conference claimants, Lay members of the Conference Boards, the educational and church-related institutions of the North Carolina Conference, and Lay Delegates to Annual Conference. The Conference Secretary shall have discretionary authority to send copies to such other institutions and agencies of the General Church as he may deem advisable. Three copies shall be sent to each pastor without charge. All other copies shall be sold at \$5.00 each. Monies accruing from the sale of the *Journal* shall be deposited with the Conference Treasurer and credited to the *Journal* Account.
3. That the Conference return to the policy of publishing a one volume *Journal* of the North Carolina Annual Conference each year.

Section IX: Districts

1. The numbers of districts shall be twelve.
2. Any change in the number of Districts shall be approved at one Annual Conference to take effect at the next Annual Conference. A majority may change the number of Districts.
3. A district conference may be held annually in each district when authorized by the Annual Conference.
4. The District President, Sub-district presidents, and the local church presidents of the United Methodist Youth Fellowship shall be delegates to the District Conference, in addition to those named by the 1972 Discipline.
5. The district lay leaders shall be elected annually by the Annual Conference on nomination of the District Superintendent and the Conference Lay Leader.

Section X: Amendments

These rules of order and procedure may be amended by a two-thirds vote on the next day after a proposed amendment has been presented in writing, provided that the rule governing the manner in which the number of districts may be changed cannot be amended until the next Annual Conference.

Section XI: When the Rules Become Effective

These rules of order and procedure of the North Carolina Annual Conference shall become effective immediately upon passage by the vote of the majority of the Conference.

*(Daily Minutes)***EXECUTIVE SESSION**
Monday, June 1, 1981

Bishop William R. Cannon, resident bishop of the Raleigh Area, called to order the Executive Session of the North Carolina Annual Conference of the Southeastern Jurisdiction of The United Methodist Church at 1:15 p.m.

Bishop Cannon called for the singing of Hymn No. 5, "Come, Ye That Love the Lord." The singing was led by Robbie Carruth. The ministers sang the familiar Isaac Watts hymn a cappella.

Bishop Cannon read from the New Testament, the Gospel according to St. Luke the sixth chapter verses 12 and 13, and gave an exhortation, discourse and instructive homily on the nature of divine service, the ministry, the appointive system of United Methodism and the historical background of that system. He exhorted the ministers to pay special attention to the disciplinary provisions for the Board of Ordained Ministry and called upon each member of the Board of Ordained Ministry to come to the stage and continued detailed instructions to all of the ordained ministers present, speaking of their particular and grave responsibilities.

Bishop Cannon led in prayer for the Board of Ordained Ministry and for all ministers who shape the work of the Church through the Conference and the historic organizational structure.

Passing of Character and Official Administration of the Ministers: The Bishop called the name of each District Superintendent in turn and their character and official administration were duly passed. The superintendents reported on the ministers in their several districts and requested that their character and official administration be found without blemish. It was so discerned and found and was approved by the Conference in session.

Report of the Board of Ordained Ministry: Bishop Cannon recognized G. Robert McKenzie, Chairperson of the Board of Ordained Ministry and spoke warmly of his devoted work along with that of the entire Board. He invited McKenzie to take the

podium, present the report of the Board and call the questions.

McKenzie did so and, after brief introductory remarks, he paid special tribute to William W. Sherman, Jr., Staff Coordinator for the Board, "without whom all of this would have been difficult to gather together and present with clarity." Sherman was given a round of applause.

Question 30 was called, "Who are elected as ministerial Members in Full Connection?" McKenzie called the names and Bishop Cannon requested that each person come to the stage and be introduced so that the members of the Conference might question and examine them and inquire as to their willingness to undertake the responsibilities of the ministry they were about to assume. All fourteen were duly examined and unanimously elected to Full Membership. (For a complete list of the names and information see the Condensed Minutes following the Journal of Proceedings and/or the full report of the Board of Ordained Ministry in Section V of this JOURNAL.)

Sherman called Question 26, "Who are elected Associate Members?" One candidate was presented and accepted. (See Condensed Minutes.)

Recognition of Probationary Members: Question 27, a and b, "Who are elected Probationary Members?" was called. As McKenzie read their names Bishop Cannon called them to the stage for examination. They were unanimously elected, whereupon the Bishop gave them certain historic questions and charges to which all responded in the affirmative with enthusiasm. (For list of names see Condensed Minutes.)

McKenzie directed attention to III under Miscellaneous Matters and called the names of Ministers from other Annual Conferences seeking Affiliate Membership. Those present were introduced and received the required two-thirds vote. All were accepted. (See Report of the Ordained Ministry, Section V, JOURNAL.)

Question 20, "Who have received the certificate of candidacy for ordained ministry?" was called by Chairperson McKenzie. The list was read and adopted as amended. (See Condensed Minutes.)

Question 21, "Who have completed the studies for the license as a local pastor, but are not now appointed?" was called and approved. (See Condensed Minutes.)

Question 22 a, "Who are approved and appointed as Full Time Local Pastors?" was called, read by Chairperson McKenzie, and approved. (See Condensed Minutes.)

Question 22b, "Who are approved and appointed as Part-Time Local Pastors?" was called, read by Chairperson McKenzie, and approved. (See Condensed Minutes.)

Question 22 c, "Who are approved and appointed as Student Local Pastors?" was called, amended and approved by the Conference. (See Condensed Minutes.)

Questions 23 a, "Who have been discontinued as Full Time Local Pastors; b, Part-Time Local Pastors; c, Student Local Pastors?" was called. The report was amended by various of the District Superintendents and accepted unanimously by the Conference. (See Condensed Minutes.)

Chairperson McKenzie called Question 24 b, regarding Paragraph 419.2 of the DISCIPLINE, and the minister was approved for service by the Conference. (See Condensed Minutes.)

Question 25 was called by Chairperson McKenzie and the answer was, "None."

Question 28 a, "Who are continued as Probationary Members?" was read and amended. These students in approved schools of theology were approved for continuance. 28 b was called and the answer was, "None." 28 c was called and amend-

ed. These graduates of approved schools of theology serving under Full Time appointment were approved with the proviso that certain graduates were to be understood as being graduates of schools of theology still under consideration by the University Senate of The United Methodist Church for approval. With proviso the list was adopted. (See Condensed Minutes.)

Question 29, "Who have been admitted from other Christian denominations?" was called. The answer was, "None."

Question 31 was likewise called with the answer, "None."

Question 32 b, "Who are readmitted as Members in Full Connection?" was called and adopted. (See Condensed Minutes.)

Question 33 b, "Who are returned to the effective relationship after voluntary retirement?" was called and approved. (See Condensed Minutes.)

Question 34, "Who have been received by transfer?" was called and amended. Those coming into the Conference were introduced by Bishop Cannon and accorded a round of applause as the recommendations were adopted. (See Condensed Minutes.)

Question 35 was asked with the response, "None."

Question 36 b, "Who have been elected and ordained deacons as Probationary Members?" was called. The list was read and approved unanimously as was Question 37, "Who have been elected and ordained elders as theological graduates?" Both groups were approved. (For names see Condensed Minutes.)

Question 38 and 39 were answered, "None."

Question 40, "Who have been transferred out?" was read for information. (For names see Condensed Minutes.)

Chairperson McKenzie then called various questions pertaining to ministerial status, including Question 41, "Who are discontinued as Probationary Members?" (The report of the Board of Ordained Ministry was accepted by the Conference without dissent.) (For names see Condensed Minutes.)

Question 42, "Who have been granted honorable location?" (The report of the Board of Ordained Ministry was accepted by the Conference without dissent.) (For names see Condensed Minutes.)

McKenzie called Question 43, "Who have been granted administrative location?" The name William Fred Cox, Jr., effective 6/1/81, was read. Bill Jeffries questioned this action. Chairman McKenzie explained that Mr. Cox had been offered all remedies offered by the Church and to date had declined them. Charles Davis asked a further question at which point Sidney Stafford called for a Point of Order, asking if Mr. Cox was in the Conference. He was not. Therefore, Mr. Stafford reasoned that, since the man was not present, no further questions needed to be asked nor reasons required. The chair sustained the Point of Order. McKenzie called for resolution of the issue. Bishop Cannon called for a vote and the necessary majority was attained. While not unanimous, the Board of the Ministry report was upheld.

Question 44 b, was called for information, "Who have had their Conference membership terminated by surrender of the ministerial office?" The report was accepted. (See Condensed Minutes.)

Before Question 45 concerning deceased members was called, Bishop Cannon asked that the Conference stand in silent respect for those Associate Members (45 a), Members in Full Connection (45 c) and Local Pastors (45 d). Chairperson McKenzie read the list. The Conference standing expressed respect during the time of silent prayer closed by a formal prayer by Chairperson McKenzie. (For names see

Condensed Minutes and Sections IV and V of the JOURNAL.)

Question 46, regarding Leaves of Absence, and 47, regarding Sabbatical Leave, and 48, b, c and d, regarding Disability Leave status, were called, amended and unanimously approved. (See Condensed Minutes.)

McKenzie called Question 49, "What Members in Full Connection have been retired?" Bishop Cannon explained that retirement was in several categories and he wished to recognize and commend the service of those retiring, even though there would be a special program for this propose during the regular session of this Annual Conference in the ensuing week. 49 a, Mandatory Retirement at age 70. Two members were recognized. 49 b, c and d, were all recognized. (For list of names see Condensed Minutes.)

Questions 50 and 51 were called and the answer was, "None."

McKenzie called attention to the remaining information under Miscellaneous Matters, I: Appointments beyond the Local Church; and II: Conference Members seeking Less Than Full Time Appointments. A number of the members of the Conference rose to various Points of Order and Chairperson McKenzie called upon W. W. Sherman, Jr., to address these matters. Sherman requested the indulgence of the Conference as these were issues that had not been fully studied by the Board of Ordained Ministry and suggested approval for Disciplinary reasons pending a more intensive study to be presented at the 1982 session of the Annual Conference. Bishop Cannon requested that the persons involved in these appointments stand and be recognized so that he, the Cabinet and the Board of Ordained Ministry might see those who had expressed their interest through attendance. The vote was called on both matters and each passed with the necessary two-thirds vote. (For names see Secion V of the JOURNAL.)

McKenzie indicated this concluded the report of the Board of Ordained Ministry at this time with the exception of one matter of personal privilege requested by Board secretary William Simpson. Simpson read a brief asking the Bishop for an Episcopal decision regarding a brief concerning a matter of constitutional intent and, if necessary, an appeal to the Judicial Council regarding the matter. The brief concerned the question as to whether Cabinet representatives assigned to the Board of Ordained Ministry should or should not have full voting rights and privileges of membership. Bishop Cannon discussed the matter informally and asked the Conference Secretary and others to research the matter fully so that he might arrive at a proper decision and thus follow an appropriate course of action.

Prior to the benediction Bishop Cannon congratulated McKenzie, Sherman and all members of the Board of Ordained Minstry for a splendid job that was well prepared, and commented on how wonderful it was that all our dear brothers and sisters elected to Probationary Membership and Full Connection and those to be ordained Deacon and Elder would now be able to receive ordination on the holy day of Pentecost. He thanked the Conference for having its Executive Session this early so that these might have this experience on so meaningful a day, since such an event occurred so seldom during the time of Annual Conference.

Bishop Cannon called upon the Conference Secretary for announcements. Secretary L. T. Wilson announced that the roll would be taken by the registration cards and reminded all those present to be sure and turn them in. He made several other announcements regarding procedure.

Bishop Cannon called for the singing of a closing hymn and then pronounced the benediction, adjourning the Conference at 4:00 p.m., until Sunday afternoon, June 7, 1981, when the full Conference would meet in regular session. He reminded

those present that all of Sunday would be given to the ordination and the first business session would begin promptly Monday morning, June 8.

FIRST DAY, AFTERNOON SESSION

Sunday, June 7, 1981

At 4:00 p.m. a service for admission of Ministerial Candidates into Probationary Conference Membership and Associate Conference Membership and for the Ordination of Deacons was held at Haymount United Methodist Church, Fayetteville, NC. (See North Carolina Annual Conference Ordination and Worship Bulletin, 1981.)

FIRST DAY, EVENING SESSION

Sunday, June 7, 1981

At 8:00 p.m. a service for admission of Ministerial Candidates into full Conference Membership and for the Ordination of Elders was held at Haymount United Methodist Church. (See North Carolina Annual Conference Ordination and Worship Bulletin, 1981.)

SECOND DAY, MORNING SESSION

Monday, June 8, 1981

Prelude: Organist for the morning session was William Hilderbrandt, organist and choir director of First United Methodist Church, Henderson. Hilderbrandt played "Trumpet Tunes" by Powell.

Love Feast: The Love Feast was opened by Bishop William R. Cannon, led by Bishop Cannon, and assisted by George W. Blount of Raleigh. This traditional service is explained in detail on page 12 of the North Carolina Annual Conference Ordination and Worship Bulletin, 1981.

The Reverend Dr. Reginald Ponder, Host District Superintendent, called for the singing of the traditional Conference Hymn No. 336, "And Are We Yet Alive?" The Conference joined in singing the hymn. Ponder presented Blount to the Conference to further preside over the Love Feast. Blount expressed appreciation for having the Love Feast so early in the Conference and described it as a means of expressing our gratitude for our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ and our mutual love for one another. He called for the participants to distribute the traditional bread and water as symbolic elements. As the elements were distributed, Blount gave a discourse on the historic development of the Love Feast and emphasized the aspects of Christian love. Blount gave his own personal testimony and called for brief testimonies from members of the Conference assembled. Several members of the Conference arose to give testimonies of their personal experiences. The spontaneous singing of hymns and the reading of scripture were interspersed between the testimonial statements. After many wonderful and inspiring testimonies, Blount closed the Love Feast with prayer of thanksgiving and for the Conference itself that was soon to enter into its deliberations.

Conference Convened: Bishop William R. Cannon, Resident Bishop of the Raleigh Area, called to order the North Carolina Conference of the Southeastern Jurisdiction of The United Methodist Church at Methodist College in Fayetteville, North Carolina. Following the singing of the traditional Conference Hymn No. 336, "And Are We Yet Alive?" Bishop Cannon called upon the Conference to remain standing and then called upon Dr. Paul Carruth to give the prayer of invocation.

Bishop Cannon assumed the podium and called the Conference to order and expressed appreciation to Methodist College for being the host for the ninth successive year. He then introduced Dr. Richard Pearce, president of Methodist College, for words of welcome.

Welcome: Dr. Richard W. Pearce brought his usual gracious greetings on behalf of the trustees and staff of the college and gave special words of appreciation to Bill Lowdermilk for his hard work in preparation. He gave further honor to the maintenance staff that had provided such splendid and well kept facilities. He further gave thanks to Ray Gooch, Mike Safley and Dennis Adams and the secretarial staff under the supervision of Conference Secretary Ted Wilson. Pearce explained the new computerized energy saving system installed at Methodist College and stated that it was all in the interest of trying to hold the bills down for the college and asked the indulgence and patience of all conference participants. He also explained that there would be some long lines at the cafeteria and urged people to space their time of going for meals. He indicated the message center in front of the auditorium and also the overhead projector desk.

Introduction: Dr. Pearce presented the Honorable Beth Finch, Mayor of the City of Fayetteville, who brought greetings from the city.

Greetings: Mayor Finch thanked the Conference assembled for their warm welcome and Pearce for his gracious words of welcome and introduction. Finch paid tribute to United Methodism in North Carolina and asked that all present take home a sense of dedication so that the Church might continue to be the moral guidelight in every individual community. Finch gave her own Christian testimony and emphasized the responsibility of all churches. She closed asking people to have a good time in Fayetteville and try to get to see some of the community when the Conference was not in session.

Host District: Reginald Ponder brought greetings from the 30,000 members of the Raleigh District that was designated as host for the Annual Conference. Ponder expressed his sincere hope that preparations had been made in such a way that the Conference session would be both a comfortable and meaningful experience. He asked the Conference to look first to Bill Lowdermilk and then to the lay persons and pastors of the Raleigh District.

Bishop Cannon expressed appreciation to Dr. Pearce, Mayor Finch and Reginald Ponder.

Point of Personal Privilege: Rev. H. Langill Watson was recognized for a point of personal privilege to extend to Bishop Cannon special greetings as he presided over the 1981 session of the Annual Conference and returned to North Carolina. Watson expressed the affection of the Conference for the next quadrennium with Bishop Cannon. Watson's point of order for the Bishop was greeted with a rousing round of applause as the Conference rose to its feet welcoming the Bishop back "home".

Bishop Cannon gave a response to Watson and his tribute and pointed to the fact that this Conference had helped to form his episcopacy as it began and now afforded him the Conference to serve in his last official quadrennium.

Organization of the Conference: Bishop Cannon called for the Conference Secretary Ted Wilson to present certain motions. Wilson requested that all the motions be read as a body and then voted upon. The following motions were read:

I move that the Rules of the Conference be those rules printed on pages 13-18 of the 1980 Journal.

I move that the registration cards signed at the registration tables by the lay and

clerical members of the Conference be designated and declared the official role of the Conference.

I move that the main floor and the stage of Reeves Auditorium be the Bar of the Conference.

I move that the program contained in The Conference Program and Recommendations 1981 and the Business Sessions brochure enclosed in the members' packets (as amended by the presiding bishop) be designated and declared the Official Program of the Conference.

I move that the material printed in and published in The Saddlebag be declared presented to the Conference, when distributed to the members, to satisfy the 24-hour rule.

I move that all those persons appearing on the program of the Conference be granted the privilege of the floor. Some of those on the program are not members of the Conference and this motion will enable them to speak without a specific motion for each individual.

The six motions as printed above were presented and adopted unanimously by the Conference.

The State of the Church: Bishop Cannon brought the annual State of the Church Address. (For text see Section V of the JOURNAL.)

Bishop Cannon called attention to the legal involvements in the Pacific Homes settlement and the willingness of the North Carolina Conference to come to the aid of a sister conference, not for legal reasons, but of Biblical concern. He spoke of how all of our agencies could, under certain circumstances, face some of the same problems. Cannon next presented his views concerning the new Pension Program of the Church which would be discussed later. The Bishop praised the Conference and God for the loyalty and devotion of the people as there was tremendous financial stability within the North Carolina Annual Conference. Bishop Cannon gave a call for an open itinerancy, relating its historic precedence and the leadership given by the United Methodist Church in this matter. Bishop Cannon concluded his address as the Conference stood and accorded him a rousing round of applause.

Nominations for Annual Conference Committees: Bishop Cannon recognized Dr. Richard W. Pearce, Chairman of the Committee on Nominations to present certain nominations for Conference Boards and Agencies to be voted on at the 156th session of the North Carolina Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church. Copies of the nominations were distributed to the members assembled. The nominations, which would become effective because of resignation, death or transfer, as amended were, upon motion of the Conference, presented as a whole and adopted unanimously.

The Composite Report of the District Superintendents: The Bishop introduced Rev. R. T. Commander, Secretary of the Cabinet, who presented the report on behalf of Rev. Clyde McCarver, Cabinet President, who, for health reasons had requested that Mr. Commander present the report. (The text of the entire report will be found in Section V of the JOURNAL, 1981.) Commander expressed appreciation for having Bishop Cannon again as our episcopal leader and was accorded applause. Bishop Cannon expressed appreciation for the report.

Report of the Conference Lay Leader: The Bishop called upon Dr. Pearce for his report and Pearce responded, expressing appreciation for the cooperation from the Council on Ministries staff. (A complete text of the report of the Conference Lay Leader will be found in Section V of the JOURNAL 1981.) Pearce's report was well received by the Conference.

Report of United Methodist Women: Bishop Cannon presented Mrs. T. Marvin Vick, Jr. to make the report. She brought out the theme for the year: "Love is Something You do." Mrs. Vick described the annual meeting of United Methodist Women with emphasis on the procession of banners. She described the new filmstrip on the United Methodist Women in North Carolina and emphasized that a copy was available in each district so that all might know what United Methodist Women did and were prepared to do. (The full text of the report appears in Section V of the JOURNAL 1981.)

Report of United Methodist Men: Bishop Cannon presented Dr. J. Allen Norris, Jr., Conference President of United Methodist Men, who reported that there was a continuing steady growth and renewal of activity within United Methodist Men of the Conference. We have 182 new charters and now rank fourth in the number of units of United Methodist Men among the various conferences. (Full text of the report appears in Section V of the JOURNAL 1918.)

Report of United Methodist Youth: Bishop Cannon presented Miss Joy Wilkins to present the report. Miss Wilkins spoke of the strength of the Youth Ministries program within the entire Conference. She listed a variety of programs which had met the diverse needs of virtually all of the youth of the Conference. She spoke of the district rallies in which the Youth Service Fund slide show was presented and how much this had meant to the participants in those rallies and to the Youth Service Fund. She pointed out that the Youth Service Fund was the only specific outreach program that the youth had. Wilkins received a round of applause for her report. (The complete text will be found in Section V of the JOURNAL 1981.)

Vote on Constitutional Amendments: Bishop Cannon called on Secretary Ted Wilson to present the matters and explain the vote. The amendments are listed on page 16 of THE CONFERENCE PROGRAM AND RECOMMENDATIONS 1981. Since the amendments were not of a controversial nature, it was agreed the vote would be taken by standing. Wilson explained that an accurate count had to be taken on each separate amendment. James Coile rose to a Point of Order and reminded the Chair that there had to be a report on abstentions as well as positive and negative votes. Bishop Cannon thanked Coile for his comment and directed that it be done. Constitutional Amendments 1980-10, 1980-21, 1980-22, 1980-23 and 1980-24 were called. The vote was 555 for and none against and no abstentions on all five amendments.

Ministerial Education Fund: Owen Fitzgerald brought the report for the Ministerial Education Fund Committee. Fitzgerald encouraged continued support of the Ministerial Education Fund at the present level and pointed to a slight drop in the past year. He indicated how college tuition was constantly going up and the cost of a Seminary education was beginning to be out of the reach of many persons. (For complete text of the report see Section V of the JOURNAL 1981.)

Joint Committee on Disability: Owen Fitzgerald, Chairperson, presented the report for the Joint Committee on Disability and described its perimeters. (The text of the report will be found in Section V of the JOURNAL 1981.) It was moved, seconded and adopted by the Conference.)

Report of the Study Committee on Ministers Moving Expense: Owen Fitzgerald presented the report and called attention to the printed report in THE CONFERENCE PROGRAM AND RECOMMENDATIONS 1981, page 76 and 77. Fitzgerald read Item III which represented a change regarding the method of payment of claims. Fitzgerald was questioned by Cameron West of Hayes-Barton Church, Raleigh. Fitzgerald answered his question. Russell Stott asked for a matter of clarification in regard to the term "bid" and he wondered if this should be "estimate." Fitzgerald

responded that "estimate" was an acceptable word. Stott did not have a motion and his question was answered by Fitzgerald who stated that he would stick by the word written "bid." Fitzgerald indicated that this entire report would become effective in June of 1982. The question was called and the report was adopted.

Report of the Conference Statistician: Bishop Cannon called upon the Rev. D. D. Traynham to present the report which appeared in THE CONFERENCE PROGRAM AND RECOMMENDATIONS 1981, pages 78-79. Traynham spoke to the reports and indicated there would be some changes because not all final corrections had been made on reports. He indicated the revised statistics would be printed in Section V of the JOURNAL 1981. He indicated that this was the first year that statistics had been entered into the Conference computer and wanted to thank those officials of the Conference who had helped in this matter.

Report of the Council on Finance and Administration: Bishop Cannon recognized Randolph Few who presented the report as found in THE CONFERENCE PROGRAM AND RECOMMENDATIONS 1981 on page 80 - 82. Few indicated that Section I would not be considered until later. Section II, Items 1-8 were moved. Wallace Kirby rose to a question. Kirby moved that cash sent to the Conference Treasurer by United Methodist Women be included in the exclusions, under Section II, Item 1. The Kirby amendment was accepted. Items 1-8 were adopted. Section III was moved by Mr. Few. The Bishop called for a vote and it was adopted. Section IV was moved, seconded and adopted. Section V was presented for information and it was so received. In the addendum, Section VI, a substitute to paragraph 9 Section II was made by Mr. Few and an addition to the first correction, that "the rate of pay for all of the above shall be twenty (20) cents per mile for miles traveled," was to be added. This was adopted and both the correction and the addition in Section VI were adopted by the Conference. Bishop Cannon expressed his appreciation for the report. (For the complete text see Section V of the JOURNAL 1981.)

Board of Diaconal Ministry: Richard J. Williams, Chairperson, presented the report. The report appears on pages 39-43 of THE CONFERENCE PROGRAM AND RECOMMENDATIONS 1981. (For complete text of the report see Section V of the JOURNAL 1981.) The Diaconal Ministers were approved and the report was adopted.

Report of United Methodist Musicians: William J. Weisser presented the report. Weisser spoke on the work of United Methodist Musicians, particularly in leadership jobs and listed some of the items that had been accomplished during the year. (Complete text of the report will be found in Section V of the JOURNAL 1981.) The report was moved and adopted by the Conference in session unanimously.

Committee on Pastoral Care: Albert Shuler brought the report of the Committee. Shuler referred the Conference to pages 37 and 38 of THE CONFERENCE PROGRAM AND RECOMMENDATIONS 1981. (The entire text of the report will be found in Section V of the JOURNAL 1981.) The report was moved and adopted by the Conference in session unanimously.

Committee on Continuing Education: Charles Michael Smith presented the report of the Committee. He expressed the need for the necessity of continuing funding for Higher Education events. He brought to the attention of the Conference the action of the 1980 DISCIPLINE concerning the fact that Continuing Education was no longer optional but mandatory and hoped that the individual churches would be responsive. The report was remanded to the Board of the Ministry for further study of this matter. The report was adopted.

Board of Ordained Ministry Matters: G. Robert McKenzie brought certain supplemental matters which were to be approved. They were approved by the Conference and will be found in both the Condensed Minutes and under the report of the Board as amended in Section V of the JOURNAL 1981. McKenzie called on Judi Smith to report on the Subcommittee on the Conference Committee on Evaluation. She gave a progress report on the work of the Subcommittee. McKenzie introduced Bill Simpson to bring the report of the Task Force on Open Itinerancy. He directed the attention of the Conference to pages 52-53 of THE CONFERENCE PROGRAM AND RECOMMENDATIONS 1981. Simpson introduced the other members of the Task Force and asked them to stand. The report and resolutions were discussed. Simpson made a correction to the resolution — a change to include pastors of churches with ethnic minority background under a portion of the resolution. The resolution was placed before the Conference. Rufus Stark had a question. Stark proposed an amendment to Item 1: "to make a deliberate and particular effort in the appointment-making process to ensure that ethnic minority pastors and women pastors of whatever ethnic background of skill and leadership be given the same opportunities for appointment in keeping with demonstrated gifts and graces for ministry as those afforded white male clergy." The Stark motion was accepted by the Committee. The resolution was adopted as amended. (For full text see Section V of the JOURNAL 1981.)

Point of Order: James Coile rose to ask for interpretation as to which day the Conference this was so that papers that might change the structure of the Conference and similar motions might be presented today for consideration later. The Bishop concurred that this afternoon a time would be set aside for that.

Benediction: Bishop Cannon called upon Charles Michael Smith to offer the benediction. It was given and the Conference was adjourned until the afternoon session.

SECOND DAY, AFTERNOON SESSION

Monday, June 8, 1981

Following the playing of the Prelude by the organist of the day, Bishop Cannon called the Afternoon Session of the North Carolina Annual Conference to order with the singing of Hymn No. 1, "O For a Thousand Tongues to Sing." Bishop Cannon called upon Reginald Ponder to give the prayer of invocation.

Introduction: Bishop Cannon told of a high moment in the life of our great Church as the Governor of our State, the Honorable James B. Hunt, comes to speak to us concerning matters of interest both to the state of North Carolina and to the United Methodist Church. Bishop Cannon presented Governor Hunt to the Conference. He received a rousing standing ovation. The house was completely full, even the aisles.

Remarks by the Honorable James B. Hunt, Governor, State of North Carolina: Hunt commented on the careful planning for the Annual Conference and further stated that while he was Presbyterian now, he was born a Methodist, which brought applause and good humor from the Conference. Governor Hunt told an anecdote about his family, specifically concerning Moses Jackson Hunt and his relationship to the Methodist Conference in many years past. Governor Hunt stressed the need for the strengthening of the Christian home and indicated that there are still many who were abused in their younger years and were caught up in crime. He stated that crime statistics in the state should be of great concern to all of us. Last year 17,600 children 15 years old or younger got into trouble with the law. He pointed out that we must think about the fact that these children will have many

problems to face in the future, but we also should not forget the victims of the crimes. He suggested that this was a challenge to all of us, and the people of the state, if we are to do something about crime and the hurtful things that crime brings about. Government is short on resources and often acts too late to the extent that, frequently, the government does not act until it is a matter of punishing. Governor Hunt stated that we need to find ways of preventing crime and not by just adding more law enforcement officers. He emphasized the program of establishing relationships with young people, insuring that they create a caring relationship with an adult, working one-on-one with the children in their formative years, and particularly through adolescence. An adult who develops a caring relationship with a child and commits himself to a long term relationship of that sort is better than all the law enforcement officers or all the courts available. Governor Hunt described the Partners Program which is the essence of crime control. It is modeled like one that the Governor stated he had seen operate successfully in Denver, Colorado. He also talked about the Friends Program in New Hampshire where an older friend works with a juvenile in need for an average of 11 to 12 hours a week. The founder of that program, Rich Maxson, was recruited by Governor Hunt and persuaded to come to North Carolina and initiate the program throughout the State. The Governor requested that the North Carolina Conference of The United Methodist Church take on this program and make it a special project of our Church. He emphasized that this is not a **government** program but a **people** program. Any church answering this call will be supported by the resources available, including the personal services of Rich Maxson, in order to get things going within any given local community or congregation. Governor Hunt states his personal belief is that working with people so as to avoid hurt is what all of us should be about in life. He strongly emphasized the request that United Methodists all over North Carolina take the initiative and respond to this direct request by himself, speaking both as an individual and as Governor of the State of North Carolina.

As the Governor's address was concluded he again was accorded a standing ovation, a round of applause and of appreciation, and Bishop Cannon indicated to the Governor that he could see the response of our people which he took as a pledge of support and help. Bishop Cannon recognized Reginald Ponder for a motion.

Motion: Ponder moved the following: "I move that we endorse in principle the program presented by Governor Hunt and refer it to the Council on Ministries for program implementation." It was seconded and adopted unanimously. Bishop Cannon gave thanksgiving for the Governor and wished him Godspeed in this program and all of his work for our State of North Carolina.

Point of Personal Privilege: James Coile rose to a Point of Personal Privilege. He gave a quick biographical sketch of Moses Hunt.

Recognition of Bill Simpson: Bishop Cannon called upon Bill Simpson to make his statement. Simpson made a statement regarding the request for an Episcopal Ruling that he had made at the Executive Session on the Monday prior. Simpson stated his position. He withdrew his request for an Episcopal Ruling and moved "that the Annual Conference create a committee, the membership of which shall be appointed by the Bishop, to consider the question of the status of Cabinet representatives appointed to the various Boards and Agencies of the Conference, the relationship of these Boards through the Conference Council on Ministries, and any points of potential conflict between existing policy and practice, as well as the Conference Rules, and the BOOK OF DISCIPLINE." Simpson stated that he regretted any confusion that his original request had caused and expressed his high personal

regard for Dr. Paul Carruth and said he hoped that there had been no misunderstanding about that. The Simpson motion was seconded and adopted.

Introduction: Bishop Cannon introduced Bruce Hargrove and Sue Henry to make the report from the Methodist Publishing House.

Report of the General Board of Publications and The Methodist Publishing House: Bruce Hargrove, a member of the General Conference Board, spoke to the issue of the Publishing Division and specifically to the Cokesbury Book store in Raleigh and how fine it was. He paid high respect and appreciation for the work of Sue Henry, manager of the Cokesbury Store in Raleigh and so introduced Sue Henry.

Sue Henry addressed the Conference and brought greetings from the Cokesbury Store in Raleigh. Henry introduced a number of items and gave samples to Bishop Cannon for use within the Conference. She then presented the prorata share of funds provided by the Board of Publications for Conference Pension Funds. This year the check is for \$12,491.41. The check was presented to Bishop Cannon along with other articles. Bishop Cannon responded to Henry's presentation and gave thanks to the Methodist Publishing House for helping our Pension Funds with this sum.

Report of General Council on Ministries: Bishop Cannon recognized Dr. J. Allen Norris, Jr., to bring the report. Norris explained the purpose of the GCOM and his responsibility in relating the North Carolina Annual Conference to the GCOM and particularly reporting back and forth the progress on the missional priorities. He promised further reports at a future date.

Report from the Southeastern Jurisdictional Council on Ministries: Bishop Cannon introduced copies of the Southeastern Jurisdiction newspaper which gives the actual report and, with hopes that each person would read this material, simply filed his report and brought greetings from SEJ Council. (For extension of report see Section V, JOURNAL 1981.)

Report of the Methodist Ministers Credit Union: Maness Mitchell brought the report. Mitchell spoke of the 1.3 million dollars that was now invested in the Credit Union. He called attention to the new members of the Credit Union and the larger service being offered by the Credit Union. (For a complete text of his report see JOURNAL, Section V.)

The Conference Council on Ministries Report: Bishop Cannon called on James Miller to present the report. In turn he called on the various members of the Council to come to the stage and introduced the newest member of the Conference Staff, the Rev. Helen Anne (Beanie) Brown, who stated she was looking forward to working in the field of Communications. Brown takes the place of Barbara Wilkinson who is moving with her husband to Detroit, Michigan. She was welcomed by the Conference with applause. Miller requested the privilege of making a composite report for the Conference Staff. (For a complete text of the report see Section V, JOURNAL 1981.)

Miller noted the recommendations on page 26 of THE CONFERENCE PROGRAM AND RECOMMENDATIONS 1981. Page 26 adopted and the names of Conference Agencies were duly ordered changed as suggested. Miller then presented pages 19-25, the Revised Charter of the North Carolina Conference Council on Ministries. It was placed before the Conference.

Point of Order: Grier Garrick rose to a Point of Order and requested in accordance with commonly held procedure, that the president of United Methodist Men should be added under Item 5 on page 21. Miller said that it was an oversight,

thanked Mr. Garrick, and accepted its addition.

Motion: James H. Coile offered the following amendment to the Charter of the North Carolina Conference Council on Ministries:

I move to amend the charter of the North Carolina Conference Council on Ministries by adding the following at the end of the Paragraph entitled STAFF (Page 20 of the Program and Recommendations Book):

- A. Beginning with the 1982 Annual Conference Session, the Council on Ministries Staff shall consist of three Associate Directors in addition to the Executive Director.
- B. The Council on Ministries, through its appropriate committees, shall have authority to change job descriptions of the staff to best carry out the work of the Council on Ministries.
- C. Between the 1981 and 1982 Annual Conferences, the Conference Council on Ministries, through its appropriate committees, shall engage in concentrated study of staff personnel responsibilities and draw up job descriptions for the staff in order to meet the responsibilities of the Council with the new number of staff personnel.
- D. Following the 1982 Annual Conference, paragraphs C and D and these words from paragraph A, (Beginning with the 1982 Annual Conference Session), of this amendment shall be deleted from the Charter.

James H. Coile, Member in Full Connection

The motion was seconded and the Bishop ruled that it must be held over for 24 hours since it involved a change in the structure of the Conference and therefore the entire matter, pages 19-25, would have to lay on the table until another day.

Motion: Paul Carruth offered a motion to change the number of members of the Committee on Council Staff personnel from 10 to 8. This was nullified as Miller accepted the change.

Question: Robert McKenzie asked a question of Miller regarding the Lay Personnel Committee and Miller said the Subcommittee had not yet met. McKenzie stated that he felt there should be a Lay Personnel Committee for the Conference Council on Ministries Staff.

Motion: A motion was made by Joy Wilkins to change item on page 24 that the Conference Council on Ministries should pay expenses of the Executive Committee of the Council on Youth Ministries rather than having these expenses paid by the Youth Activities Fund. The motion was accepted by Miller. All changes except the report as a whole were adopted until the Coile amendment can be considered. Miller moved the discontinuance of the Committee on Church Architecture. It was seconded and passed. Miller moved that 30 percent of funds raised for ethnic minorities be retained for use within the Conference and it was approved. Miller moved that mileage reimbursement to Agency personnel be 18 cents per mile beginning January 1, 1982. Ruth Cade spoke in opposition, stating that their expenses were as high as those of paid staff and proposed an amendment to increase to 20 cents per mile the mileage paid for Agency meetings. The motion as amended was adopted unanimously.

Miller referred to 1982 Program Recommendations, pages 28-38, THE CONFERENCE PROGRAM AND RECOMMENDATIONS 1981. Editorial corrections were

made and approved by the Conference. Page 27 of THE CONFERENCE PROGRAM AND RECOMMENDATIONS 1981 was moved, seconded and adopted. New Programs to be Considered for implementation were presented and, with the addition of the Adoptive School program suggested by Harvey Estes, were placed before the Conference. Robert Pullman made a recommendation (page 29, I.C.3.) "that each local church shall consider encouraging contributions to Chapels for Mentally Retarded at State Centers through a publicized offering or through other means. (Church and Society.)" It was accepted by Miller. The seventeen proposals were placed before the Conference and they were adopted. The Continuing Programs were placed before the Conference. They were adopted.

Miller presented the Chairperson of the Conference Division of Missions, Julia Williams.

Report of the Division of Missions: Julia Williams brought the report. (For complete text see Section V, JOURNAL 1981.) The report was accepted with appreciation.

Jesse Bone continued a further section of the report of the Division. He spoke to the need for Advance Specials and indicated recommendations on pages 36 and 37 of THE CONFERENCE PROGRAM AND RECOMMENDATIONS 1981. He suggested that each church pledge that it would have a part in the outreach of Advance Specials by giving at least five dollars per church to every area available for Advance Specials. Section E on page 36 and 37 was moved, seconded and adopted.

Church of the Year Awards: A. Clay Smith represented the Board of Missions in presenting the Rural Church of the Year Award to Gillburg United Methodist Church in the Raleigh District and asked all present to come forward to be recognized and receive the award. In receiving the award the pastor, Charles A. Pullins, spoke with appreciation of the Gillburg community and presented Miss Poythress who had been a member of the church for 75 years. Individuals were commended and the church received a round of applause from the conference.

The Urban Church of the Year for 1981 is Edenton Street United Methodist Church, Raleigh. Wallace Kirby, pastor, and other members of the staff and members of the church were asked to come to the stage to receive the award. A large group came to accept the award.

Board of Church Extension — Recognition of New Congregations: A.P. Hill, Jr., brought the report and gave a report on all the new congregations opening and that have already opened within the past year. He emphasized support of the Ten Dollar Club and expressed the devout hope that more people would become members and help our new congregations. On this occasion he recognized the newest church, The South Cary United Methodist Church, and its new minister, J. Cameron West. West spoke about the new church and expressed his sense of excitement at being appointed to establish this new congregation. He spoke of a vision of a truly evangelistic and evangelical church and noted the Bishop' attention to the work of evangelism. (See Report, Section V)

Return to the Conference Program and Recommendations 1981: Miller resumed the podium and directed the attention of the Conference to page 30 and moved the adoption of Section II, A. It was adopted. Section II, B was moved and adopted. On page 32, III, A was moved and adopted by the Conference. Section III, B, 1-15 was moved.

Request: James Coile asked that the word "considered" under III, B, be changed to "authorized," and it was accepted by Miller. The Section was adopted.

Section III, C was moved, seconded and adopted. Section III, D was moved, seconded and adopted by the Conference. Miller retired from the podium after

presentation of this segment of the report of the Council on Ministries.

Motion: G. Robert McKenzie moved an "amendment to Committee on Council Staff Personnel, page 23: after 'an other compensation' add this sentence: 'This Committee shall also function as a Personnel Committee in relation to the Council Support Staff.'" The motion was accepted by Miller.

Ethnic Minority Local Church Task Force: Mrs. T. Marvin Vick brought this report. Mrs. Vick gave reference to Report #7 in the Agency Reports to Annual Conference 1981 and expanded on it through personal comments. (For complete text of these and all Agency reports see Section V, JOURNAL 1981.) The report was moved and adopted.

Hunger Task Force: Bishop Cannon presented Robert Mangum to give the report of the Hunger Task Force. Mangum referred to Report #11 in the Agency Reports 1981. He magnified the concerns, indicating that, while they were no longer a mis-sional priority, the need was still there and there was a challenge to keep these needs before us through Advance Giving. (A further report will be found in Section V, JOURNAL 1981.) The report was adopted by the Conference.

The Division of Evangelism: Bishop Cannon called upon Sidney Huggins III, to present the report for the Division. Huggins referred the Conference to Report #8 in the Agency Report 1981. He expanded upon the report. Huggins lifted up the goal of winning 19,000 persons by 1984. He concluded his report by asking all Conference members to stand and commit themselves to Christ and to winning at least one person to Jesus Christ in the coming year. He prayed a moving prayer as the Conference members stood. Huggins recommended the reappointment of Tommy Tyson and John Hobbs as Approved Conference Evangelists. The report was adopted.

Presentation of Guests: Reginald Ponder presented Bishop F. Joseph Gossman of the Raleigh Diocese who is our guest and will be our speaker tonight. The Conference accorded him a standing round of applause and where upon he returned the greetings.

The Division of Christian Unity and Interreligious Concerns: Bishop Cannon recognized Ralph Fleming to present the report which #2 in the Agency Reports to Annual Conference 1981. Fleming then presented Collins Kilburn to make a report of the North Carolina Council of Churches. Kilburn announced that Mrs. Mildred Fry is the new president of the North Carolina Council of Churches. Kilburn continued by mentioning major emphasis of the NC Council of Churches — Refugee Resettle-ment, work on equality between the sexes, particularly the ERA, a Christian witness for social justice in the public sector, and much more. (For complete text of the report see Section V, JOURNAL 1981.) After Kilburn's report Fleming introduced Ed King who is head of the CROP Agency, an ecumenical endeavor to help with the problem of hunger within North Carolina. The report was accepted by the Conference.

Point of High Privilege: Bishop Cannon asked that Joseph B. Bethea and Mrs. Ruth Cade escort Mildred Fry to the stage in honor of her new role as president of the North Carolina Council of Churches.

The Board of Church and Society: Frank Lloyd brought the report for the Board. He referred to Report #3 in Agency Reports to Annual Conference 1981. (The extension of his remarks will be found in Section V of the JOURNAL 1981.) He referred to the papers on page 58-63 in *THE CONFERENCE PROGRAM AND RECOMMENDATIONS* 1981. Lloyd asked the members of the Division to stand and gave particular thanks to Rev. James H. McCallum for his special Staff assistance. The report was placed

before the Conference. Malloy Owen asked the privilege to speak and he did so, commending the Board members for being pluralistic in their approach.

Robert Pullman asked a question and Lloyd answered. The report was adopted. Lloyd then directed the attention of the Conference to page 73 of *THE CONFERENCE PROGRAM AND RECOMMENDATIONS 1981* which required special action and a special vote. This item was a Resolution on Private or Church School Standards. Robert Brainerd from St. Marks spoke in opposition to the resolution. Steve Hickle spoke in favor of the resolution. The question was called and the Resolution on Private or Church School Standards passed. Lloyd moved the adoption of a policy matter contained under IV, B, on page 35 of *THE CONFERENCE PROGRAM AND RECOMMENDATIONS 1981*. Malloy Owen was recognized to ask what these "networks" are. Bill Jeffries was called upon to answer the question. Jeffries stated the reports were largely an ecumenical listing of legislative issues on which the various churches could get together. One of the chief items, according to Jeffries, was World Hunger. Collins Kilburn told of the State "network" legislative newsletter. The Conference adopted the policy of Church and Society on page 35 of *THE CONFERENCE PROGRAM AND RECOMMENDATIONS 1981*.

Motion: Mrs. R. B. Guthrie of St. Luke Church, Sanford, moved "that copies of the resolution on Private and Church School Standards be sent to the Governor, the Lt. Governor, members of the General Assembly and to all the media in North Carolina." It passed.

The Bishop called for any other resolutions or changes in structure that needed to come before the Conference this day.

Resolution: The following Resolution was brought by Doris McAdams of Asbury Church, Durham:

Whereas: The 1981 North Carolina Conference of the United Methodist Church affirms allegiance to the Prince of Peace; and

Whereas: We are a people who love our Lord so much that we do "unto the least of these" as unto our Lord Jesus Christ;

Therefore: *Be It Resolved*, that we call upon our elected representatives to give more consideration to the needs of the poor and elderly and less to the buildup of weapons of destruction.

The Conference received the resolution and will act upon it later.

Announcements: The Conference Secretary gave several announcements concerning meetings of youth and young adult committees. The Sacrament of Holy Communion will be observed on Tuesday and Wednesday mornings at 8:00 in Hensdale Chapel. Pastors were urged to keep their appointments for pictures for the Pictorial Directory.

The Bishop announced the appointment of the committee to study the resolution brought by Bill Simpson. The committee is as follows: Albert F. Fisher, Richard Pearce, Mrs. Ruth Cade, Samuel Townsend, Milton Mann, Langill Watson, Kimsey King, John M. Cline And Wallace Kirby.

Benediction: The benediction was given by Dr. John Bergland of the Duke Divinity School.

SECOND DAY, EVENING SESSION

Monday, June 8, 1981

The Service for the Consecration of Diaconal Ministers was held at 7:30 p.m. at Methodist College. (See North Carolina Annual Conference Ordination and Worship Bulletin, 1981.)

THIRD DAY, MORNING SESSION

Tuesday, June 9, 1981

Prelude: Roger Searles, Director of Music and Organist, St. Paul United Methodist Church, Goldsboro, played "Petite Prelude" by Jongen and "March Royale" by Lully.

Conference Called to Order: Bishop William R. Cannon called the Conference to order and directed the singing of Hymn No. 3, "Come Thou Almighty King." The Conference stood and sang with fervor. Bishop Cannon then introduced Dean Jameson Jones of the Duke Divinity School and asked that he lead in the morning prayer. Bishop Cannon introduced Dr. Jim Fleming to present the first of two Bible studies. Dr. Fleming is the distinguished Bible scholar and the Director of the Jerusalem Center for Biblical Studies.

Bible Study: Dr. Fleming proceeded with the Bible Study and gave some of the characteristics of Peter and helped us more clearly understand him through illustrated talk and described him as being very important because so much of our Biblical literature was doubtless supplied by Peter. Dr. Fleming's study was most innovative and well received and he was accorded a long round of applause at the conclusion. Bishop Cannon expressed thanks for his fine presentation.

Point of Personal Privilege: Bishop Cannon recognized Joseph B. Bethea for a Point of Personal Privilege. Bethea mentioned the names of John Campbell, Kenneth Locklear and Jerry Lowry who were preparing themselves to begin their ministry and on their way home from a Lay Pastors' School, all were involved in a serious accident but now are on the road to recovery. They need our prayers for their continued recovery. The Conference Secretary was instructed to send letters of warm wishes and prayers to each of them. Bethea led in prayer for these brethren.

Motion: Joseph B. Bethea moved that the Conference instruct the Conference Board of Church and Society to bring to this Session of the Conference, for consideration and adoption, statements regarding the murders in Atlanta and the resurgence of the Ku Klux Klan." The motion was seconded and passed.

Continuation of the General Report of the Conference Council on Ministries: Bishop Cannon called on Belton Joyner to present the report for the Division of Education.

Division of Education: Belton Joyner spoke to the report. He outlined many of the educational opportunities, particularly emphasizing the necessity to build up the Sunday School. Report #6 of the Agency Reports to Annual Conference 1981 concerns the Division of Education. (For a full text of the report see Section V of the JOURNAL 1981.)

Joyner presented Bill Cottingham, the Coordinator of Scouting in our Conference, who appeared before the Conference in full scout regalia, and lifted up the emphasis that United Methodism has placed on the scouting program. Bishop Cannon was called upon to make recognition to the leaders in scouting, Jim Robin-

son, and to Troop 392 of Westminister Church in Kinston. The Scouting Award went to that church in the Greenville District. Troop 942 of St. Luke Church, Sanford, also received an award. These Bishop's Awards of Excellence were presented in the form of banners and plaques.

Joyner resumed the podium and expressed appreciation for the Council Staff in the Methodist Building and asked to present the six policy statements under IV, C, on page 35 of *THE CONFERENCE PROGRAM AND RECOMMENDATIONS 1981*. They were moved, seconded and adopted by the Conference.

Report of the Division of Higher Education: Bishop Cannon recognized Sam McMillan to offer the report. He introduced those who had specific responsibilities with the Division and spoke briefly to the needs of Higher Education and specifically to our Conference colleges. The report of Higher Education and Campus Ministry is Report #10 in the Agency Reports to Annual Conference 1981. (An extension of these remarks will be found in Section V of the *JOURNAL 1981*.)

Sam Brown reported for the Blackburn Scholarship Committee. The recipient the year is William Kenneth Hall, Jr., son of the Rev. and Mrs. Hall of the Dublin Charge. The recipient was presented to the Conference, spoke a brief word of thanks, and was accorded a round of applause. McMillan called attention to *THE CONFERENCE PROGRAM AND RECOMMENDATIONS 1981*, page 44, with two names added under Methodist College. All Trustees on pages 44 and 45 were moved and adopted as amended. (The full list will appear in the *JOURNAL 1981*.)

The college presidents were presented. First, Dr. J. Allen Norris, Jr., spoke on behalf of Louisburg College. He gave a report on the dynamic things happening at Louisburg, and indicated that there was a waiting list for students to achieve admission for the fall semester. (For extension of the Norris report see Section V, the *JOURNAL 1981*.)

Dr. Richard W. Pearce spoke on behalf of Methodist College and gave a superb report on the growth of the college and its continuing ability to retain fiscal integrity and build a substantial endowment. (His report was filed and will appear in Section V of the *JOURNAL 1981*.)

Dr. S. Bruce Petteway was recognized to speak on behalf of North Carolina Wesleyan College. He spoke of the record enrollment and the financial needs of the college. He indicated that the capital debt had been reduced but the efforts of keeping the college solvent are becoming increasingly difficult because of the mounting costs of inflation. (The report will appear in Section V of the *JOURNAL 1981*.)

Bishop Cannon expressed deep appreciation to the college presidents for their hard work and diligent stewardship. Sam McMillan resumed and expressed appreciation to Bennet, Greensboro and High Point Colleges. He asked if representatives were present. They were not. McMillan concluded by speaking warmly of the work done by those institutions which we also support.

North Carolina State Commission on Campus Ministry: McMillan presented H. Langill Watson to give the report. Watson gave a brief and succinct report. He gave expressions of appreciation to the North Carolina Conference for support of the work of campus ministry. (For extension of remarks see Section V of the *JOURNAL 1981*.)

Black College Fund: Sam McMillan presented Lina H. McCord to bring the report. Mrs. McCord addressed the Conference and presented her report. She gave her personal testimony speaking from her heart regarding the causes of Black Colleges and the needs for continued support. (For an extension of her remarks see Section V

of the JOURNAL 1981.)

Bishop Cannon thanked McMillan for the good report as the report of the Division of Education was concluded.

Question: Mrs. R. B. Guthrie of St. Luke Church, Sanford, asked that the Conference address the indebtedness on the colleges. McMillan gave a reply, stating that provision was made for consistent repayment. McMillan reiterated that each college Board of Trustees was addressing itself to this problem and this question.

Question: Robert Marsh from the Albemarle Charge expressed an ongoing concern about the colleges and the fact that, if we were in a financial bind now concerning indebtedness, and looking down the road to a time when there would be fewer students, he requested plans be made so that the colleges would not wake up on morning bankrupt. The Bishop responded that the Conference was a careful watchdog over this matter.

Motion: Robert Pullman "that all institutions or agencies presenting the names of trustees to be voted on by the North Carolina Conference at its 1982 session (1) provide a written explanation of the process by which these trustees are selected and (2) provide a brief explanation why each particular trustee is chosen." It was seconded. Pullman spoke to his motion. McMillan responded to the Pullman motion, stating that the information was available but that since the Division had the full information available, it was not necessary to go into this much detail. Grier Garrick spoke against the motion. The Question was called and the vote was taken. The Pullman motion was adopted. The Bishop remarked on a trend indicating that, if we are responsible for certain things as a Conference, we need to know specifically what we are responsible for. The Bishop commended this as a good attitude. Bishop Cannon recognized Rufus Stark who responded to the question concerning indebtedness on Methodist College. Stark indicated concern that we support our Methodist institutions and recognize that, frequently, if our people would apply, they might find that the cost of the church-related school is no greater than the cost of a state supported school.

Methodist Board of Publication, Inc.: Bishop Cannon introduced Al Simonton to bring the report for the Board. Simonton pointed out that we had nearly doubled our subscriptions within the last 5 years and expressed the desire that the trend will continue. Simonton asked Langill Watson to present the official report of the Board of Publication. Before he came to the podium Bishop Cannon praised Al Simonton as being an exceptionally fine editor of a religious publication. Bishop Cannon's enthusiasm was so evident that it brought forth a round of applause from the Conference for Simonton and the North Carolina Christian Advocate. Watson moved the adoption of the report and it was adopted. (See Section V of the JOURNAL 1981.)

The Duke Endowment: Al Fisher gave the report for the Duke Endowment. The report was well received. (The text is printed in Section V of the JOURNAL 1981.) Bishop Cannon remarked on the report of the Duke Endowment and stated what a difference it made in this Conference. He expressed appreciation for the work of Al Fisher with the Duke Endowment.

United Methodist Television Presence & Ministry: Bishop Cannon recognized H. W. Scoates to bring the report. Scoates emphasized our need to move into the field of television in an effective manner. He stated that the important difference in this programming would be, not to solicit funds, but to solicit people to go back to their local church and work there. Scoates described his report as simply a progress report and indicated that much work was yet to be done.

Division of Lay Life and Work: A. J. Davis III was presented by Bishop Cannon to give the report. He addressed the area of evangelism in particular and even more particularly lay evangelism. Charles Sauls from Rockingham presented the Lay Person of the Year Award. The winner was Miss Dotsy Reynolds. Joseph B. Bethea escorted her to the stage and Miss Reynolds was given a standing accolade in applause. Miss Reynolds is a member of First United Methodist Church, Rockingham, and has a long history of total involvement. Bishop Cannon read the plaque and presented it to Miss Reynolds. She received the award with dignity, humility and gratitude.

Commission on the Status and Role of Women: Bishop Cannon recognized Helen G. Croftwell to give the report. Ms. Croftwell wanted to celebrate the 25th Anniversary of ordination of women in the United Methodist Church. She utilized the time allocated for the report to introduce the ordained women of our Conference. She requested that the report beginning on page 49 of *THE CONFERENCE PROGRAM AND RECOMMENDATIONS 1981* should be read and accepted. One by one the women ministers introduced themselves and gave a brief description of their background and their current field of service. Carrie Parrish gave a summation of the history of the Status and Role of Women and its progress through the generations. The report was received with a round of applause and standing ovation for the women clergy. Bishop Cannon commented that this was the finest report on the Status and Role of Women that he had ever heard. He expressed pride in the women clergy and the fact that we need them. (For text of the report see Section V of the *JOURNAL 1981*.)

Announcements: Secretary Ted Wilson made announcements.

Benediction: Bishop Cannon called on Helen Croftwell to give the benediction. It was given and the Conference stood adjourned for the noon hour.

THIRD DAY, AFTERNOON SESSION

Tuesday, June 9, 1981

Prelude: Organist for the afternoon was William E. Hilderbrandt, Organist/Choir Director, First United Methodist Church, Henderson. For the prelude he played "Trumpet Tune" by Johnson and "Procession" by Lange.

Conference Convened: Bishop Cannon reconvened the Conference for the afternoon session and called for the singing of Hymn No. 38, "Joyful, Joyful, We Adore Thee." The Conference stood and sang the hymn. Bishop Cannon asked Dr. J. V. Early to offer the prayer for the afternoon session. The Bishop introduced Dr. Don Saliers, Dean of Academics for the Candler School of theology and Emory University. He spoke, at the Bishop's invitation, and told of his appreciation for the overall support for theological schools and commented specifically on the fact that the William R. Cannon Chapel at Emory and the Candler School of theology was nearly complete. He then spoke on behalf of the United Methodist Seminaries. Cannon expressed appreciation and then introduced Bishop and Mrs. W. T. Handy who had just arrived. Bishop Handy is the speaker for the evening worship service.

Presentation of Chaplains: Bishop Cannon asked that the chaplains come forward and be recognized. Each was invited to come forward and introduce himself and explain what he did as a field of ministry. Each one did so in turn.

Call for the Order of the Day: Bishop Cannon brought to attention the fact that the cause of Pensions must now be discussed and take precedence over all other

items. In calling for the Order of the Day he introduced Norwood L. Jones, Chairperson of the Board of Pensions.

Report of the Board of Pensions: Norwood L. Jones made preliminary remarks and addressed the issue in detail setting out the existing Pension Program and the one that has been passed for us by the 1980 General Conference. Jones presented William Sherman, Staff Coordinator, and Susan Cameron, member of the General Board of Pensions, as a representative. Sherman moved under Report A of the Board of Pensions Annual Report 1981, "General Recommendations," the adoption of 1. It was adopted. He moved the adoption of 2. It was adopted. Maness Mitchell rose for an amendment to Section 3 under Report A, extending the appropriations for Charles I. Umstead. It was seconded. Jones responded that, if the Conference ordered, the Board of Pensions would consider it in due channels. The motion was referred to the Board. Item 3 was adopted. Items 4, 5, 6, 7 and 8 noted. Bishop Cannon requested that those under Item 8, regarding retirement, be recognized. They were called to come forward and be greeted by the Bishop. The wives were presented orchids and the ministers were given certificates of their service. After recognition all were accorded a standing round of applause and given an opportunity to speak to the Conference. (For a list of these names see Condensed Minutes.) The four remaining items passed. (For complete text see report of the Board of Pensions in Section V of the JOURNAL 1981.)

Item 9 concerned the Pension Funding Crusade. Sherman recognized Wallace Kirby to give the report. Kirby indicated that 57 percent of the 4.4 million pledge had been paid and the remainder needed to be collected between now and next Annual Conference. Item 10 was presented for information. Item 11 with the names of Local Pastors Recommended for Pension Credit was accepted. Items 12, 13 and 14 were items for information. Section D-2, on the housing allowance exclusion was taken up and the second and third paragraphs were amended to indicate that 100 percent rather than \$5,000.00 be set aside as a fair and reasonable rental allowance for each retired minister. Similarly in paragraph 3, where it says, "if the full \$5,000.00 cannot be substantiated," put "if the full 100 percent cannot be substantiated. . . ." Report D was adopted. Next Sherman presented Report B, the Pension Plan, which has been presented in training sessions in all districts during the last month. Sherman indicated that he hesitated to read the entire matter, although he was sure there were some present who were not at the training sessions and indicated that he would be open to questions. First he briefly explained, by giving a synopsis, the basic pension programs now covering and to be covering the ministers. Section F of the Pension Plan regarding current coverage for past service liability was adopted.

Question: Ed Earnhardt started to make a speech and the Bishop interrupted him, asking for a specific motion. Earnhardt wished to present a statement stating that he felt that the matter was against the DISCIPLINE, the Bible and the Will of God. Earnhardt quoted Scripture and certain sections of the DISCIPLINE to uphold his views concerning the unconstitutionality of the proposed plan. The Conference voted to cut off debate by Earnhardt and allow him a cast a vote against the plan if he saw fit.

Amendment: Wade Pierce rose and made the following amendment: "I move the following amendment regarding Ministerial Pension Plan implementation for year beginning January 1, 1982: that the contribution base be set at actual compensation (as defined in the Plan), limited by the denominational average compensation (DAC)." Pierce spoke to his amendment. The Pierce amendment was defeated.

Henry Goodwin of Trinity, Southport, rose to a Question. After an interchange of comments between Goodwin and Jones, Goodwin offered a substitute motion.

Motion: Henry Goodwin moved "that the funding by the NC Conference of the Ministers Pension Fund be raised on a apportioned basis, based on the same system of apportionment on which the Single Figure Asking is based." Reginald Ponder spoke in opposition to the Goodwin substitute. The Goodwin amendment failed. Maness Mitchell rose to ask a question. Jones responded. Stan Smith rose to ask two questions of Jones. Jones responded. Jack Hunter rose to make a statement regarding the nature of the term "denominational average." Hunter's statement tended to answer further the questions posed by Stan Smith. Robert Marsh of the Albemarle Charge brought up the needs of the very small church with limited resources and Jones answered his questions as posed. James Coile rose to ask a question. He was ruled out of order by the Bishop. Both Charles Mercer and Robert Brainerd moved the previous question on all that is before us. Implementation of the Pension Program was moved and adopted. Section C of the report was adopted. This concluded the adoption of the entire report. Bishop Cannon thanked the Board of Pensions members for their diligent work.

Call for Order of the Day: Bishop Cannon stated that according to the Rules of the Conference the Coile amendment as presented the preceding day of the Annual Conference would now have to be considered. Coile rose and read his resolution as printed in the SADDLE BAG. Coile spoke of his amendment.

Substitute Motion: Rick Commander brought a substitute motion: "that the Executive Committee of the Conference Council on Ministries study the Coile proposal, as well as the present structure and others, then present the results to the full C. O. M. and with their approval bring back to the 1982 Annual Conference a Conference C. O. M. Staff Structure for our approval." The substitute by Commander passed and, after a call for the question by Robert McKenzie, the substitute became the amendment, the question was called and the substitute prevailed. This had kept the Charter from being adopted. Therefore the vote was taken and the Charter as revised and contained in *THE CONFERENCE PROGRAM AND RECOMMENDATIONS 1981* was adopted.

Report of Conference Board of Trustees: Bishop Cannon called upon Clifton Everett who brought the report for the Conference Board of Trustees. The report was received.

Resumption of the Report of the Board of Church and Society: Frank Lloyd took the podium to bring an answer to the request of Joseph B. Bethea that morning to add a resolution regarding the Atlanta Killings and the Ku Klux Klan. (For complete text see Section V in the 1981 JOURNAL.) The Resolution on the Ku Klux Klan was overwhelmingly adopted. The resolution of the Atlanta Killings was adopted.

Division of Health and Welfare Ministries: Bishop Cannon called upon Bob Wallace to bring the report of the Division. Report #9 in the Agency Reports to Annual Conference 1981 was presented and remanded to the Conference. On page 36 of *THE CONFERENCE PROGRAM AND RECOMMENDATIONS 1981*, Section B was moved and adopted. On page 48 of the same publication the trustees of the Children's Home and of the Methodist Retirement Homes, Inc. are listed. Trustees for the Children's Home were nominated and elected by the Conference. The Methodist Retirement Homes, Inc. nominations were moved and elected by the Conference. Wallace spoke to the fact that Reginald Ponder is a member of the General Board of Health and Welfare Ministries and a concern that people attend the regional workshops describing the legal settlement of the Pacific Homes case to

be held in another state early next year. Ponder then introduced other operating areas of segments over which the Division has oversight. Ed Elliott was presented to the Conference. He spoke regarding the work of the Children's Home describing his own personal excitement over the Partners Program outlined by Governor Hunt yesterday. (For extension of his remarks see Section V, JOURNAL 1981.) Elliott announced the appointment of Douglas Byrd as a partner in Service in developing a plan of promotion, outreach and deferred giving. The Bishop commended Ed Elliott on his work.

Report of the Division on Worship: J. Cameron West presented the report #18 of the Agency Reports to Annual Conference 1981 and submitted that report for publication in Section V of the JOURNAL 1981. West asked that the other members of the Division stand and be recognized. The report was received.

Order of the Day: Bishop Cannon called for Order of the Day. The session was adjourned to prepare for the Memorial Service. The Bishop called on Cameron West to offer a benediction for the afternoon business session. It was done.

MEMORIAL SERVICE: At 4:30 P.M. the Conference was reassembled for the Memorial Service with Bishop William R. Cannon presiding. Following the prelude, "Priere" by Franck, played by Mrs. W. L. Aycock, Haymount United Methodist Church, Fayetteville, the Bishop called for the singing of Hymn No. 48, "How Firm a Foundation." Secretary L. T. Wilson read the Roll Call of our Honored Dead, ministers and ministers' wives. (For names see Condense Minutes.) Reginald Ponder read Hebrews 11:1-13, after which Susan P. Levis sang, "Eternal Life," by Dugan. James A. Auman led in prayer.

The Memorial Address, "Faith an Fulfillment," was given by Warren B. Petteway. After the singing of Hymn No. 151, "Faith of our Fathers," the benediction was pronounced by Bishop Cannon. Mrs. Aycock played as a postlude, "G minor Fantasie" by Bach.

THIRD DAY, EVENING SESSION

Tuesday, June 9, 1981

THE BLACK WORSHIP EXPERIENCE: The Black Worship Experience opened at 7:25 p.m. with inspirational singing by the combined choirs from Black United Methodist Churches from throughout the Conference. Reverend Samuel L. Townsend presided. Other leaders in the service included Miss Doris Bluitt, Dr. Joseph B. Bethea, Rev. James Cummings and Bishop William R. Cannon.

Bishop Cannon introduced the speaker, Bishop W. T. Handy, Jr., episcopal leader of the Missouri Area of the United Methodist Church. Bishop Handy brought an inspiring message.

Mr. Bruce Hargrove of Wilson Temple, Raleigh, was given the award as BMCR Layperson of the Year. Reverend Robert A. Fairley, Pembroke Circuit, received the BMCR Pastor of the Year award.

The service closed with the singing of the black National Anthem, "Lift Every Voice and Sing," by James Weldon Johnson, and the benediction by Bishop Handy.

FOURTH DAY, MORNING SESSION
Wednesday, June 10, 1981

Communion Service: The Sacrament of Holy Communion was celebrated in Hensdale Chapel on the Campus of Methodist College at 7:30 a.m. under the direction of the Division of Worship.

Conference Called to Order: Organist for the morning session, William Hilderbrandt, organist and choir director at First United Methodist Church, Henderson, played the prelude. Bishop Cannon called the Conference to order and called for the singing of Hymn No. 66, "Praise, My Soul, the King of Heaven." The Conference responded, singing with great enthusiasm. Bishop Cannon called upon Wallace Kirby to bring the invocation for the morning as the Conference bowed in prayer.

Bible Study: Bishop Cannon introduced Dr. Jim Fleming for the second of two Bible studies which have been so well received and appreciated by the Conference. Dr. Fleming spoke with great scholarship concerning his conclusion of the biography of Peter as expressed through a description of slides, maps and a scholarly interpretation of the Scriptures in a manner that was understandable by all.

Bishop Cannon expressed appreciation for the splendid series of two studies led by Dr. Fleming.

Presentation: Bishop Cannon introduced Bill Rock and his son of the Western North Carolina Conference as representative of Bible Lands Educational Opportunities. They were recognized and accorded a round of applause.

Recognition: The Bishop recognized Ed Morrison for a statement concerning the serious accident that had occurred yesterday to Robert Jordan IV, past president of the Conference UMYF. Morrison moved "that the Conference Secretary send a message of love and concern to Robert Jordan IV concerning his injury." It was so ordered. Morrison then led in prayer.

The Divinity School, Duke University: Bishop Cannon presented Dean Jameson Jones for greetings from the Divinity School and for a concerted emphasis on the necessity for continued giving to the Ministerial Education Fund. Dr. Jones also addressed the matter of the **School for Local Pastors** and indicated that it would again be provided every day for four weeks this summer. Jones continued to emphasize the relationship between the Divinity School and this Conference. Bishop Cannon underscored the remarks of Dean Jones by exhorting and commending the Conference to receive favorably the suggestions that he had presented. Cannon also emphasized the need for continued support. He spoke warmly of Dean Jones' remarks at the Duke Banquet last night and expressed his appreciation for having been there.

Bishop Cannon further exhorted the Conference by stating he understood that many of the small churches were depressed over the obligation that the new Pension Program had placed upon them. He reassured them by saying that it would not be nearly as difficult as it may appear from the report. He emphasized that the Church is always in mission and that we would be blessed as we undertook to fulfill the mission that God assigns — that he will give us the power to fulfill it. He called attention to the great progress in the last three quadrenniums and encouraged churches not to be worried or depressed but to take it a step at the time without looking too far into the future. We must realize that this will take care of itself and we must have trust and faith and go home united with a glad heart and the full realization that we can take care of our total budget and do as God wills. He asked

for God's blessings upon all the churches as they endeavor to bring to successful fruition this enterprise at hand. He expressed his confidence in every church in doing this.

Continuation of the Report of the Division of Health and Welfare Ministries: The Bishop recognized the report of The Methodist Retirement Homes, Inc., and W. Donald Penley, the Executive Director, who recognized in turn the administrators Kimsey King of the Durham Home and La Fon Vereen of the Wesley Pines Home, Lumberton; and Chaplain Kelly Wilson of the Corporation. He also presented the chairman of the Board of Trustees, Carr Gibson. Penley gave the report. (For full text see Section V, JOURNAL 1981.) Penley's report was greeted with applause and accepted by the Conference.

Question: Rufus Stark questioned the establishment of the Endowment Fund. Penley explained that the new Endowment Fund will supplement but not replace what the Conference is doing through its Fair Share Apportionment. Bishop Cannon echoed the love and support for the Home that he felt very strongly and continued to encourage the Homes to fulfill their goals and be as great as they already are.

Golden Cross: Jean L. Hood presented the report for Golden Cross, explained the program and gave a profile of the typical person served. (For complete report see Section V, JOURNAL 1981.)

The Commission on Religion and Race: Charles D. Myers brought the report for the Commission and stated the basic purposes and principles of the Commission and what the Conference had done in response to this particular need in mission. He indicated the progress in the colonization and bringing together of the Conference with all ethnic groups. He pointed to the service of the evening before as an example and indicated how well the Conference was responding to this particular call of Christ that we all be one in Him. (For extension of the remarks see Section V of the JOURNAL 1981.) James McCallum was presented for special remarks of addendum. (For extension of remarks see Section V of the JOURNAL 1981.)

Question: Cameron West asked a question concerning the appointment of Affirmative Action Coordinators and wondered why there had been no further response concerning the training event. He was answered with the fact that the training event was planned for this fall. The report was adopted.

Matter of Personal Privilege: Reginald Ponder requested that personal greetings be sent to Mrs. Margaret Bradley, secretary of the Raleigh District, who is hospitalized. He also asked that Kermit Braswell, who had become ill during Conference and had to go home, be sent appropriate greetings. They were approved by the Conference and the Bishop directed that greetings be sent.

Report of the Division of Stewardship: C. Franklin Grill brought the report for the Division. He directed the attention of the Conference to Report #17 of the Agency Reports to Annual Conference 1981. Grill spoke of the detailed work of the Division and showed us the resource compact which is available through Cokesbury which gives all of the resources that are needed to present the Stewardship Program for the local church. Grill spoke to the need to increase our per capita giving so that it at least equalled and preferably exceeded the national average. He suggested we talk less about dollars and more about ministry and put God first and then people will give. Grill recognized members of the Division of Stewardship as they stood in the Conference. Grill also recognized A.P. Hill, Jr., of the Conference Council on Ministries Staff as being one of the most valuable resources. The report was moved and adopted. (For extension see Section V of the JOURNAL 1981.)

Committee on Communication: Billy Seate brought the report for the Committee and directed the attention of the Conference to Report #4 of the Agency Reports to Annual Conference 1981. He asked that we continue to support and utilize the Walton Memorial Media Center, the Budget News Sheet and the new Video Ministry available in the Conference. Video experts of the Conference were introduced — Don Settle and Robert Smith. They were accorded a round of applause by the Conference. Seate expressed gratitude for the work of Barbara Wilkinson who had helped establish some of the innovative ideas of the Committee on Communication and welcomed the advent of Beanie Brown as the new contact person for Communications within the Conference. The report was adopted by the Conference.

Commission on Archives and History: Steven A. Hickle presented the report for the Commission and directed attention to Report #1 of the Agency Reports to Annual Conference 1981. He made corrections to the report (which will appear along with extended remarks in Section V of the JOURNAL 1981.) He introduced James McCallum for a presentation regarding the historic publishing of the history of Black Methodism in North Carolina. McCallum expressed gratitude for the history which had been made possible and was now available to all who would read. McCallum presented Bishop Cannon with an autographed copy of the book and he received it with pleasure and commended it to all United Methodists of North Carolina. Hickle gave appreciation to Lawrence Lugar for his prior service and his representation through the Southeastern Jurisdiction; to Malloy Owen, Conference Cabinet representative; and to Morris Barber. The report was moved and adopted by the Conference.

Report of the Conference Brotherhood: Kelly Wilson, Jr., brought the report. He directed the attention of the Conference to page 18 of THE CONFERENCE PROGRAM AND RECOMMENDATIONS 1981 which gave a report of the Conference Brotherhood's financial condition. It was seconded and adopted by the Brotherhood members. The Bishop indicated that this was not Conference business but was an informal brotherly organization. Kelly Wilson, Jr., called on John Cline as Chairman of the Nominating Committee to present nominations for officers for the coming year. President: James C.P. Brown; Vice President: J. Donald Phillips; Secretary-Treasurer: J.K. Bostick; Trustees for 1987: Ralph I. Epps and Rachel P. Moser. The officers were duly elected for the next year. Kelly Wilson, Jr., expressed appreciation for having had the opportunity of serving eight years as president of the Brotherhood and indicated that J.K. Bostick should be recognized for further expressions of the financial operation of the Brotherhood. He did so. (This information will be found in Section V, JOURNAL 1981.) Bostick concluded by expressing appreciation for the work of Kelly Wilson, Jr.. Wilson was accorded a standing round of applause by both the members of the Brotherhood and the Conference.

Report of the Committee on Minutes: Robert L. Bame reported that all the Minutes through this morning have been read and found to be accurate and correct. He moved their adoption. The Conference adopted the Minutes.

Point of Personal Privilege: Malloy Owen reported that the first new church to break ground in this Conference in ten years would break ground in the New Bern District in Jacksonville this Sunday afternoon. The pastor of the church is Charles Sparks. The church is located at Pine Valley.

Point of Personal Privilege: Ruth Cade was recognized by Bishop Cannon and spoke about the World Methodist Conference to be held in July in Honolulu. She requested that everyone stand in honor of bishop Cannon who had been elected as

president of the World Methodist Council. She expressed that this was a high honor for both Bishop Cannon and our Conference and wished that more of our North Carolina Methodists could be present at the Conference this summer. Bishop Cannon responded with gracious words of appreciation and accepted the accolade offered by the Conference with similar humility. He indicated that the word was "nomination" and not "election" and he would feel safer after the experience in Honolulu was past and he was actually elected.

Point of Personal Privilege: Barney Davidson recognized S.J. Starnes, one of the oldest members of our Conference, who had been at more Conferences than virtually any other minister present and was still active in attending Conference and serving on various special occasions in his 87th year. Davidson escorted him to the stage where he was warmly greeted and embraced by Bishop Cannon. Davidson also introduced Mrs. Davis, Starnes' daughter who was here as a lay delegate from Davis Street Church, Burlington, and also son Bill who was in attendance at the Conference. Cannon commented on the work Starnes had done for the **Advocate** in years past.

Point of Personal Privilege: Lloyd Edge brought words of concern about Tracy Maness, one of our chaplains whose family was undergoing severe sickness and physical trauma. Bishop Cannon called upon Edge to lead the Conference in prayer for Tracy and Jackie.

The Commission on Equitable Salaries: Grier Garrick was recognized to bring the report. Garrick in turn recognized Maness Mitchell. Mitchell wanted to recognize Will Chadwick for being a pioneer and initiator of the idea of Equitable Salaries, particularly for the minimum salary. The Bishop suggested and Mitchell concurred that greetings and words of appreciation should be sent from the Conference Secretary on behalf of the Conference to Brother Chadwick. Garrick resumed the report and directed the attention of the Conference to pages 74 and 75 of THE CONFERENCE PROGRAM AND RECOMMENDATIONS 1981. The report was placed before the Conference and it was moved for adoption.

Motion: James H. Coile moved to "delete in I.A. 'Full Connection, Associate, Probationary' and delete the line item on Local Pastors including the dollar amount." Coile spoke to the motion stating that the 1980 DISCIPLINE indicated all of these people as members of the Conference and he felt that there should be no difference in the minimum salary between local pastors and other Conference members. All serving minimum salary churches should be equitable. Rufus Stark spoke in favor of the Coile amendment with some reservation as concerning Coile's argument. He indicated that he felt equality should be because this was a subsistence or floor level that should be accorded all who are serving full time and that that alone be the rationale. Garrick spoke to the issue and agreed to leave it to the vote of the House. Wade Goldston spoke in favor of the Coile amendment. James Bailey spoke against the amendment. Maness Mitchell spoke for the amendment. Cameron West asked whether there were funds available to cover this increase. Jack Hunter rose to make a substitute motion.

Motion: Jack Hunter moved "that the motion be referred back to the Commission on Equitable Salaries for study and a report to be given at our next Annual Conference." Bill Jefferies spoke against the substitute. Maness Mitchell asked if he might question Randolph Few of the Council on Finance and Administration. Wade Goldston rose to ask a question. Willie Teague called for the Previous Question on all that was before us. It was called. The Hunter substitute lost.

The Coile amendment prevailed: For: 274; Against: 234.

Motion: J. Nelson Gibson moved "that the ministers' salaries and travel remain the same for 1982 as for 1981." Neal Salter spoke against the Gibson amendment. Harvey Estes spoke in favor. Others spoke for and against the amendment. Clay Smith spoke against. The previous question was called. The Gibson amendment lost. The report as amended by Coile was moved, seconded and adopted by the Conference.

Report of the Methodist Foundation: The report was brought by S.L. Gullledge, Jr. He presented an encouraging report regarding the increase in the fund and the monies that were realized on net gains. He listed the total assets as in excess of ten million dollars, a substantial increase over the 1980 year. (For complete text of the report see Section V of the JOURNAL 1981.) The report was adopted.

Insurance Committee: The report of the Committee was brought by Norwood Jones. The report was adopted by the Conference. Jones stated that the matter concerning supplementing Charles Umstead had been resolved and proper supplement would be provided.

Board of Managers, NC Pastors' School: James Bailey brought the report of the school. Bailey described the previous year's program. He gave an outline of next year's program. Bishop Cannon thanked him for the report and pointed out that Bailey had written a book on the Parables and it was commended to the Conference. The Class of '85 of the Board of Managers for the Pastors' School includes A.F. Fisher and W.W. Sherman and they were approved. The report was adopted.

Announcements: Secretary Wilson made announcements regarding the submission of the green attendance cards and cards to supply information for the Conference Directory. The Bishop declared the Morning Session adjourned for lunch with the Conference requested to be back in attendance by 1:30.

FOURTH DAY, AFTERNOON SESSION

Wednesday, June 10, 1981

Conference Convened: Following the playing of the prelude by the organist for the afternoon Bishop Cannon called the Conference back into session for the concluding session of the Conference. Bishop Cannon called for the singing of Hymn No. 69, "There's a Wideness in God's Mercy." The Bishop called on Langill Watson to lead in prayer for the afternoon session.

Report of the Episcopal Committee: Langill Watson presented the report. Watson spoke of the newness of the Committee and the fact that with the particular episcopal leadership that we have had no difficulties and therefore he reported that the Committee found the episcopal leader blameless on all points and worthy of all laudatory praise which the Conference gave by a rising accolade and applause. This was the acceptance of the report.

Committee on Conference Entertainment: Dr. Allen Norris brought the report of the Committee. The desire to meet at Methodist College in 1982 was reaffirmed and recommended. The report was adopted by the Conference.

Task Force to Study the Needs of the Church with Smaller Membership: Clay Smith brought the report which had been distributed to the Conference earlier. (For full text of the report see Section V of the JOURNAL 1981.) The report was adopted by the Conference.

Announcement: Council on Ministries Chairman James H. Miller announced that materials have been written for guidelines for the organization and operation of small membership churches. These materials will soon be distributed and hopefully

these will be distributed throughout the entire Church.

Task Force on Crises in the Family: Michael Hale brought the report of the Task Force which is found on page 54 of THE CONFERENCE PROGRAM AND RECOMMENDATIONS 1981. The report was adopted by the Conference. (See Section V of the JOURNAL 1981.)

Council on Finance and Administration: Randolph Few moved the 1982 Budget for adoption. A question was asked about where the Pension monies were for the District Superintendents and staff personnel. Terry Bryant of St. Pauls, Burlington, moved suspension of the Rules. The motion lost. Wallace Kirby asked about the College Sustaining Fund, college debt retirement and Campus Ministry. Langill Watson and Jimmy Miller answered Kirby's question. Kirby asked how much was being loaned to the Pacific Homes. The answer was \$43,000.00. He then asked where the money was coming from. It was answered by Charles K. McAdams — it was coming from the Reserve Funds.

Question; Bob McKee stated that he had not received an answer from the Council on Finance and Administration regarding the ability of churches to borrow appropriate money for new programs. The Bishop responded that this would have to go before the Council on Ministries. McKee responded that it had not been considered on the Council on Ministries as yet. Coile rose to give the Disciplinary answer to the question of the pastor from Windsor.

The adoption of the Budget was called for and it was adopted by the Conference.

Miscellaneous Business: Conference Secretary Ted Wilson stated that he wishes to declare that all Disciplinary Questions are answered by the 1981 Annual Conference.

Resolution: Walter Linville presented the resolution on page 17 of THE CONFERENCE PROGRAM AND RECOMMENDATIONS 1981 regarding resolutions and position papers received by delegates to Annual Conference. He moved the resolution. Linville commended the report to refer just to materials concerning the Board of Church and Society. This was seconded. Bill Jeffries spoke against the resolution. It was voted and the resolution failed.

Resolution: Conference Secretary Ted Wilson presented the Doris McAdams resolution concerning Peace. This resolution had been before the body for more than 24 hours. Robert Chadwick moved to amend the resolution in reference to accepting the position paper of the Board of Church and Society on the same topic as a resolution. Coile spoke in opposition to the substitute.

Olin Beaty, Trinity Church, Wilmington, proposed the following amendment: "Therefore: Be it resolved that we call upon our Conference to give all consideration possible to the needs of the poor and elderly without damaging our defence posture."

The substitute lost. The amendment lost by a close margin.

The McAdams resolution was adopted.

Moving Day: R.T. Commander presented a motion that Thursday, June 18, 1981, be the official moving day. Responsibilities for the new charge begin on moving day. Commander also recommended the reelection of the Class of 1981 of the Conference Board of Trustees to succeed themselves. This was done by the Conference.

Point of Personal Privilege: Paul Carruth brought up the matter of pastors being out of their parsonages in time for the new pastor to move in and reminded once again that the pastor's salary is paid through May 31 and the June salary goes to the new pastor, not to the pastor who is moving out. Carruth expressed the hope that it would not be necessary to announce this again.

Committee on Resolutions and References: Thomas A. Collins gave the report. He read the report regarding courtesies in its entirety to the Conference. (The text of that report will be found in Section V of the JOURNAL 1981.) The report was adopted with thanks.

The Conference was prepared for the Service of Holy Communion and for the reading of the appointments. During this time answers to the Disciplinary Questions 16 and 17 were offered to those who wished to have them and they are being published in the JOURNAL. (See Condensed Minutes.) The answers to all Disciplinary Questions have already been declared completed.

Opening of the Service: Reginald Ponder opened the service by calling for the singing of Hymn No. 328, "How Happy Are Thy Servants, Lord." Ponder led in the Ritual for the Lord's Supper, No. 830 in the Hymnal. At the appropriate place in the sacrament Bishop Cannon read Scripture and preached the Word to the Conference assembled. The Sacred Service of Holy Communion continued.

Bishop Cannon read the ritual and served communion to all the District Superintendents. He then announced that he would read the appointments, district by district and asked the people of those districts, or any who wished to come, to come at that time and receive the Holy Communion.

Reading of the Appointments: Bishop Cannon as part of the Communion concluded the work of the Conference by calling Question 67 and 68, "Where are the preachers stationed for the ensuing year?" Copies of the appointments were distributed to the Conference. There was an impressive meaning as the ministers took the Sacrament as their names were called for their appointments.

Following the reading of the appointments the ritual of the Sacrament was concluded.

Announcements: Ted Wilson, Conference Secretary, made announcements.

Closing Hymn: "God Be With You Til We Meet Again" was sung.

Benediction: The Benediction was given by Bishop William R. Cannon, bringing to a close the 1981 North Carolina Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church. This was the 156th session and the first year of the second episcopate of Bishop William R. Cannon as Bishop of the Raleigh Area, SEJ.

HORACE CARROLL JONES
1891-1980

Horace Carroll Jones, son of Charley Y. Jones and Cyrena Violet Adams, was born September 15, 1891 in Graves County, Kentucky.

He attended elementary and high school in Graves County, Kentucky. After completing high school he attended Ruskin Cove College in Nashville, Tennessee. Here he met Martha ("Ellie") Ellender Wilks, an accomplished pianist who was studying pipe organ and voice. They were married in Nashville on June 14, 1919.

From Nashville they moved to Atlanta, Georgia in 1921, where Horace and Ellie both continued their education. Horace studied theology at the Candler School of Theology, Emory University. He also enrolled in architectural classes, having been building homes, barns and other structures for years. He built a number of large homes (one for his family) and many for faculty members of Emory University.

A daughter, Martha Carroll Jones (Allen) was born in 1922. Later, when Horace was preaching and living in Monroe, Georgia, their son, Horace Creighton Jones, was born in Atlanta in 1930. While a member of the North Georgia Conference, Horace served the Brooks, Stilesboro, Monroe and Rucker circuits. They remained in Georgia until Horace and family moved back to Tennessee in 1934 as pastor in Memphis Conference, where he served the five circuits of Saltillo, Bethel Springs, Hollow Rock, East Clinton and Calvert City for eleven years. Horace built or remodeled churches and/or parsonages in almost every parish he served. However, he never neglected his pastoral work, personal devotional life, teaching his own children to know the Lord, and the preparation of his sermons, while spending many hours meeting, planning, drawing plans, estimating costs and supervising carpenters, even doing much of the carpentry himself.

In October, 1945, Horace transferred to the Holston Conference, where he was pastor at Ewing, Benhams, Emory and Trinity-Bristol charges, all within the State of Virginia.

In October, 1949, Horace and Ellie moved to North Carolina, where they affiliated with Trinity Methodist Church of Raleigh. Later, in 1952, Horace transferred his membership from the Holston to the North Carolina Conference, where he served as pastor at Millbrook (1952-57) and Jenkins Memorial (1957-59) churches.

Upon retirement in 1959, Horace continued to be active in the ministry and in building until he was 83 years of age. He served as supply pastor of St. Mark's Church for nine months and as assistant minister at Garner for thirty months.

Ellie died June 24, 1972 and was buried in Restlawn Memorial Gardens of Raleigh. Horace was remarried to Lottie Lee Nice in September of 1973, just prior to his 82nd birthday.

Horace Jones remained faithful to his Lord until his last breath on May 27, 1980. He requested, during his terminal illness, not to be kept on this earth by heroic medical acts. His words were, "I'm ready; please let me go home to my Father". His wishes were honored, ending his service here on earth — with both of his children at his side, thankful to God for their Christian parents and heritage.

Funeral services for Horace Jones were conducted at Hayes Barton United Methodist Church, Raleigh, by his pastor, F. Owen Fitzgerald, Jr., on May 29, 1980, with burial following at Restlawn Memorial Gardens, Raleigh, by the side of his wife of 53 years.

GEORGE BADGER EUBANKS
1926-1980

George Badger Eubanks was born in Lenoir County on October 24, 1926. He spent his early years in Jones County and at the age of 16 enlisted in the United States Navy. After four years in the Navy he returned home and on August 13, 1947, he married Lina Elizabeth West. God blessed their union with five children.

The early years of their marriage were spent on the farm near George's and Lina's parents. Following his father's death in 1955, George worked a short time with DuPont in Kinston. It was during this period that he experienced the new birth and felt a definite "call to preach".

George worked for a while in the Pentecostal Free Will Baptist Church and did much preaching in the community. At the age of 38, George felt the Lord leading his family into the United Methodist Church. They joined the Northwoods United Methodist Church in Jacksonville. It was a short time later, in 1965, that he received his first Student Supply appointment at Sea Level. While at Sea Level he attended Lenoir Community College.

His second appointment was Brodnax, Va., 1966, and while serving in the Virginia Conference, he received his A. A. Degree from Louisburg College in Louisburg, N.C. The third appointment was to Amherst, Va., in 1969, and while there he received his Bachelor of Arts Degree from Lynchburg College in Lynchburg, Va.

In 1971, George came back to North Carolina and was appointed to Jamesville. He became an associate member of the North Carolina Conference and received his deacon's orders in 1974.

Other appointments in the North Carolina Conference were Washington Circuit 1975, Harkers Island 1977, and Midway-Bethlehem 1979.

On May 28, 1980, George suffered a massive heart attack and was hospitalized in Morehead City. Two weeks later, on June 13, 1980, he was carried into eternity by God's grace and mercy.

His funeral service was held on Sunday, June 15, 1980 by the Reverend J. Malloy Owen, New Bern District Superintendent, and the Reverend Reginald W. Ponder, Raleigh District Superintendent.

George Eubanks was a man who preached his convictions and he strongly believed in the full gospel message. In all of his appointments he was noted for his outstanding pulpit ability. His congregations supported him and his churches grew and prospered. He was many times told he was the best preacher they ever had. George was also noted for his work in the community and was well respected, not only by his own members, but members of the other churches, and non-church people.

He is survived by his wife, Lina W. Eubanks; five children, Ronnie Lee, Georgie Elaine, Cathy Earle, Michael O'Brien, and Stephanie Dawn; his mother, and one sister, Helen Eubanks; three grandchildren.

All of George's family live in the Kinston-Trenton area. His youngest son, Michael, is following in his father's footsteps and is a candidate for the United Methodist ministry. He will receive his A. A. Degree from Lenoir Community College in June, 1981.

George B. Eubanks is a very special memory to many and his ministry will never cease in the hearts of his loved ones.

FORREST W. PURSLEY
1898-1980

"The steps of a good man are ordered of the Lord, and he delighteth in his way" (Psalm 37:23). These words describe the direction of a good man's life, and why he is able to achieve eternal life. His steps are sure and steady because God directs them. A "steady" man is the cement of any society, and his secret is that he walks with a steadfast God. Such a person was Rev. Forrest W. Pursley who like Enoch, "walked with God and was not to be found for God took him". He died suddenly at his home in Hamlet, N.C., on August 8, 1980.

A native of West Virginia, he was born a son of William and Ella Goodwin Pursley on November 5, 1898. He is survived by his wife, the former Elva Norton; one son, James Pursley of Hamlet; one daughter, Mrs. Bob (Eileen) Toepser of Denville, N.J.; four grandchildren; five great grandchildren; and one sister Ufa Strader of Kingsville, Ohio.

Funeral services were conducted from the Snead Grove United Methodist Church, Scotland County, N.C., by the pastor, the Rev. Ralph Waters; Rev. Dr. B. Joe Bethea, and the writer of this memoir. The interment was in the Snead cemetery.

Life was not always easy for Brother Pursley. His parents were dedicated Christians but they did not live to see him to maturity. He had to quit school and work for a living. This did not discourage him for the misfortunes of the righteous are never final. In his autobiography, he states that his whole life was a miracle. His birth was miracle; his survival of dreaded diseases of diphtheria, pneumonia, and others was a miracle of God.

Mr. Pursley went to work for the Postal Service in 1923 in Akron, Ohio, from which position he retired 36 years later. It was during this period that he received his call to preach but was unable to fulfill it for lack of education. However, he kept the thought in mind that he should enter the ministry. Thus, in 1969, he enrolled at Duke Divinity School for a five year course of study which led to the status of Approved Lay Pastor in the United Methodist Church. He was ordained to the office of Deacon in 1972 at age 74, and appointed to the Trinity-Beaver Dam Charge. This was his only appointment, serving there for five years. He supplied Troy circuit for two months prior to this. As a pastor, he faithfully carried out the privileges of that high office. He and his devoted wife made a perfect pastoral team.

He was a very generous man giving of his time, talent, and of his means to help Christ's Kingdom to advance. He returned most of his salary to his church. The Educational Building at Trinity Church, Rockingham, was dedicated in honor of Forrest and Elva Pursley. His congregations loved him for what he was, for what he stood, and for the Gospel of Christ which he proclaimed. To all who knew him he was the embodiment of the truth which he preached. He was big and generous in soul as well as in body and mind. He knew in whom he trusted, and where his true possessions lay. To be in his presence was to be in the presence of a truly Christian gentleman of the highest order. He was a good, gently, loving, kindhearted person, who was loved by his people and by all who knew him. This saintly man always possessed a winning smile, and easy manner, which made him a friend never to be forgotten. Many hundreds of people can testify that he touched their lives, ministered to their needs, and enriched them spiritually again and again. He cared for all people and their needs.

Mr. Pursley had a particular interest in history and genealogy, and counted five bishops of the United Methodist Church in his family history. Twice his life history was written up in local papers as the outstanding senior citizen of his community. He was a very unique, unusual person of strong Christian character. He left a heritage, an example, an influence, and a mark upon other lives which cannot be erased. He was a great man because he was a good one. His steps were ordered by the Lord who took delight in his way. These steps led him into avenues of true worth, value, and service for his fellowmen. They led him to his Heavenly Father's House not made with hands. There we can find him.

"Now the laborer's task is o'er, Now the battle day is passed;

BERNARD TALMAGE HURLEY
1883-1980

The Reverend Bernard Talmage Hurley was born in Wadeville, Montgomery County, North Carolina, August 29, 1883, the son of Tabitha Jane Bruton and John Bradley Hurley. Closely related to the Church from his earlier years, he was baptized August 9, 1895 by the Reverend V. A. Sharpe and joined the Wadeville Methodist Episcopal Church, South, on Profession of Faith, March 5, 1892.

Turning toward special service in the ministry of his Lord, Brother Hurley was licensed to preach July 27, 1906 at the District Conference held at Troy, North Carolina. He was Admitted on Trial into the North Carolina Conference at its annual session held in Elizabeth City, 1910. He was ordained as a Local Deacon by Bishop E. R. Hendrix, and appointed to Branson Church, Durham. The whole of Brother Hurley's life and ministry was spent within the bounds of the North Carolina Conference. He was graduated from Trinity College, receiving the Bachelor of Arts degree, June 7, 1911. Shortly before his graduation, following the death of the minister of the North Alamance Circuit, he was appointed to that Charge, to which he commuted until graduation.

On December 27, 1911, Brother Hurley was married to Ruth Tate Franklin in the home of Mr. and Mrs. S. A. Vest, of Haw River, with Dr. R. C. Beaman, Presiding Elder, officiating. The Hurley's were blessed with four children: Dorothy Bruton, now Mrs. W. C. Morse, Jr. and living in Elizabeth City; Ruth Summerlin, now Mrs. B. F. Grimes and living in Smithfield; Bernard Talmage, Jr., now living in Chattanooga, Tennessee; and Marion Franklin, now Mrs. George Robert Graham and living in Red Springs.

Brother Hurley was admitted into full connection at the conference held in Fayetteville, 1912. He received his ordination as Elder at the Conference in Washington, 1914, with Bishop R. G. Waterhouse presiding.

Now as the writer of these memoirs, I would share a few more personal remembrances. I have known Brother Hurley since the beginning of my ministry, when we served our Lord in the Elizabeth City District. But the real blessing came to me when I was appointed to Red Springs in 1969, and was enabled to come into a more intimate and highly inspiring fellowship with both Brother and Sister Hurley. They made me certain that being "Soldiers of the Cross" was a most rewarding experience. After Mrs. Hurley's death and funeral, which I was privileged to hold, Brother Hurley continued to live in Red Springs. But after a while, with his years adding up, he chose to come to the Methodist Retirement Home in Durham. And do you know, he came with the strong notion of continuing his ministry to those in the Home. He had a lovely bass voice, and was soon singing in the Home Choir, sharing his joy in music with all those around him. He played the harmonica well, and often, when alone, was to be heard enjoying his own music.

Moreover, Brother Hurley was always a genteel, grandly dignified person, a fitting example of a "good servant of his Lord." He possessed a sweetness of spirit that made your heart sing in knowing such a good man. His was a capacity for great love, which he bountifully shared with his loved ones, but it was never restricted — he loved all mankind. He was always the good shepherd of his flock, no matter where, because he knew the Good Shepherd. He stood tall, morally and spiritually, because he knew God.

Brother Hurley died August 18, 1980 at the Retirement Home in Durham. He was buried in Red Springs, where his earthly remains rest beside those of his much beloved wife.

BURRELL DUKE CRITCHER
1894-1980

MARTHA COTTEN CRITCHER
1903-1980

Early September 12th the Heavenly Father dispatched an angel to Driftwood Manor in Raleigh to escort Duke Critcher to his eternal home. It was a short distance. He was ready. Twelve days after his death Martha Cotten Critcher slipped away to join him so the two might be together with the Lord. They had not been separated that long in over fifty-six years. She died at Rex Hospital in Raleigh.

Burrell Duke Critcher was born June 13, 1894, in Nash County to Roger S. and Mildred P. Critcher. He was one of five sons and two daughters. The family moved to Williamston, N.C., while he was a child. He graduated from Wake Forest College and entered Law. For many years he was the youngest man to pass the Bar Examination in North Carolina; a record he may still hold. He practiced law in Williamston for nine years with his brother, Burrus.

Martha Cotten Crawford was born in Williamston on July 5, 1903, to Ben and Rosamond Crawford. She was their only child. Her mother died when she was seven. Loving relatives received her as their own. They, plus a loving father, cared for her every need. She grew up in a care-free atmosphere in Williamston and attended Salem College for a year before her academic interest paled in favor of a young lawyer. He had all the gifts and graces for an exciting life.

On November 14, 1923, Duke and Martha Cotten were married. It was the social event of the season in Williamston. It seemed that riches and good fortune had been ordained for their lives. Little did they know they would be trading in their gracious living for the life of a parsonage.

Two years later Duke came under deep conviction during the preaching of the Gospel at the Layman's Revival in Williamston. He responded to God in true repentance and was called into God's Service. He offered himself without hesitation although many townspeople wondered about the sudden and drastic change. He was later to say, like Paul, "I have not been disobedient to the Heavenly Vision."

The Methodist Church had need of Duke's services immediately. He was asked to fill a vacancy-by-death at Red Springs in June of 1925. At Annual Conference five months later he received his first appointment to Garysburg. Other appointments were: Whitakers 1926; Oxford Circuit 1928; Red Springs 1931; Snow Hill 1935; Enfield 1939; Davis Street: Burlington 1943; Asbury: Durham 1948; Ann Street: Beaufort 1952; Fifth Avenue: Wilmington 1953; Divine Street: Dunn 1957; Retirement 1961; Retired Supply Parker's Grove: Linden 1961-1976. Fifty-one years of continuous service, but that in itself in no way tells the whole story.

Sacrifices and hardships were recounted years later but not in bitterness. They were for our Lord Jesus Christ: they paid the price for the prize of His High Calling.

Duke's walk with the Lord started out like a burning fire. Instead of cooling off, his zeal burned brighter and brighter until it was aglow with the Spirit.

Duke received his experience of forgiveness and call to preach through an evangelistic service. His ministry reflected it. He preached and worked evangelistically. He enjoyed a good measure of success in that area. He was among the first advocates of Visitation Evangelism and served a term on the Jurisdictional Board of Evangelism.

The salvation of souls and the nurture of the church were uppermost in the heart of this gallant warrior. Being fundamental in his doctrine, he preached the glorious treasures of heaven and the atoning benefits of the Cross. He never preached from notes although his sermons were meticulously organized and delivered. He experienced an overwhelming portion of God's Grace and Love, such as was promised by Jesus to his disciples in Acts 1:5. He never lost the thrill of the Gospel nor experienced any loss of joy for his salvation. The joy of the Lord was with him more in his latter years than ever before.

After the second retirement, Duke and Martha Cotten moved to Raleigh near a daughter and son-in-law who was pastor at Westover United Methodist Church in Raleigh. There he was called on to preach regularly, lead a weekly Bible Study, and teach courses. He did so for four years to the enrichment of the church and many in the surrounding area. Fifty-five years of service and the ending was better than the beginning.

The marriage of Duke and Martha Cotten was blessed with three daughters: Rosamond Pope, Mrs. Kenneth Sexton; Martha Cotten, Mrs. Stanley Potter, Jr.; and Anna Edna, Mrs. Jimmy Benson. Each of them loved the Lord and served Him in some conspicuous capacity: D.C.E., Choir director, organist, soloist, Church secretary, etc. It was no accident that their family loved and served the Lord. It was a way of life for them all. Duke had hoped the Lord would give him a son to follow in his footsteps and continue his ministry from generation to generation until time was no more. He had no son but he laid claim on his son-in-law and lived to see his grandson ordained and serving an appointment. They are survived by three daughters, five grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

Martha Cotten gladly received her status in the shadow of her husband, but she in no way allowed him to have her religion for her. She knew herself to be a full member of the Kingdom of God, born-again, and filled with the Holy Spirit. She received a great experience of God while reading on the porch of the Old Terrace Hotel at Junaluska. As of that day she had a close personal walk with the Lord. He satisfied her soul and met the longings of her heart.

Martha Cotten served the Lord as fully as anyone could. She was a good companion to her husband. His ministry was as vital and important to her as it was to him. She was loyal and supportive. Her love for God, His Word, and Jesus never diminished. She had a love for people, a witness for them, and time to pray for them. Her ministry was one of goodwill and prayer. She gathered many friends from everywhere, and she always stayed in touch with them.

Martha Cotten had more to bear than most people. While she rejoiced in the Lord, she also bore the pains of arthritis in her body. As time wore on, it became more intense, yet her family would witness to the fact that she braved the storm of ill health with a smile. Total strangers would comment or give her an affectionate hug because of her countenance. Her exuberant joy was not artificial, it was real praise to God.

After many battles with ill health and just as many victories, the loss of her companion changed everything. The next attack found her willing to go home to the Father. She reached out for eternity and Jesus helped her across the stream.

The Funeral Service for Duke was held in Westover United Methodist Church, Raleigh, by the Reverend Tommy Tyson and Dr. Wallace Kirby on September 14th. It was a celebration of the greatness of God's Love and Power. When a soloist sang ". . . Jesus is Lord", everyone knew it was true. Burial was in Raleigh Memorial Park.

To me he was a true man of God. He was a born-again Christian, filled with the Holy Spirit, firm in the Faith, and a noble example of a Christian minister. He was my friend and family. He deserved and held the love and respect of all who knew him. We will miss his silvery-white hair, his noble demeanor, and his distinctively loud laughter, but God's plan included more than we can witness from our vantage point. Jesus said, "I have yet many things to tell you but you cannot bear them now."

Like her husband, she, too, was buried from Westover United Methodist Church. Dr. Wallace Kirby and Dr. Reginald Ponder shared the service on September 26th. There was a celebration of victory. The choir raised their triumphant voices. She was already at home where she wanted to be. Interment was at Raleigh Memorial Park beside the fresh grave of her husband. The two were together again.

An inscription on the burial plaque was carefully selected. It reads, "Walking In Glory With Our Lord Jesus".

JOHN HENRY PARRISH
1906-1980

John Henry Parrish was born on October 16, 1906 in Raeford, North Carolina, one of ten children who were reared on a farm in the Seventy-First community of Cumberland County. Because of the heavy farm work load, he often was able to go to school only three months of the school year, but he was a good student, and always managed "to make his grade", with good marks. He graduated from Seventy-First High School and at the age of 17 was ordained a minister in the Baptist Church.

Concerned that he needed more education, and realizing his limited finances, John Henry enrolled at Holmes Bible College, Greenville, S.C. (later became Furman University), where he could work at various jobs and attend college.

In 1927, he was married to Leola Elkins and from that marriage two sons were born: Harold C., now living in Spokane, Washington, and Bill H., of Chapel Hill. They were a happy family, with John Henry preaching in the Baptist Church and employed in various jobs in Fayetteville and Greensboro. However, deep in his heart, the "part time preacher" was not satisfied — he wanted to be a "full time preacher". During World War II, while working at Fort Bragg, John Henry committed himself to full-time Christian service, and join the Methodist Church. He enrolled in the summer Course of Study at Duke and Emory Universities, working diligently to meet the qualifications for the Methodist ministry. He earned his Deacon's orders in 1950 and Elder's orders in 1953.

In 1945, he received his first appointment to preach in the Methodist Church, when he was assigned to the Mt. Gilead Circuit. He was 45 years old, and it is true that he was a latecomer to full-time ministry, but in the next 30 years, he contributed as much time and energy as if he had served since his youth. He was a winner of souls and a strong pulpit preacher.

His appointments included Mt. Gilead Ct., Siler City Ct., Robbins Ct., Rowland, Longhurst-Grace, and Fair Bluff. In 1969, he retired but was appointed to Calvary Church, Fayetteville, where he remained for three years. Mrs. Parrish died in 1970, and shortly thereafter John Henry married Pearl Brock Sutton, a childhood friend.

In 1972, John and Pearl moved to Wilmington, bought a home near Wrightsville Beach so John would be near his "beloved fishing ground", and accepted an assignment to Devon Park Methodist Church where they served in the retired relationship for the next eight years. Ill health forced his retirement a second time in 1980, and soon after Annual Conference, his health rapidly declined. He died on September 24, 1980. Funeral services were held at Wrightsville Beach United Methodist Church, with District Superintendent James A. Auman officiating, assisted by the Reverends Robert Redmond and Clayton Price. Interment was in Lafayette Cemetery, Fayetteville. His fellow-ministers were casket bearers. Mrs. Pearl Parrish continues to live in their Wilmington home at 121 Stokley Drive.

Fondest memories of John Henry remain among the younger ministers of the Wilmington District for he always had a word of encouragement for them and was eager to share the joys he had experienced in his Master's service. During a brief memorial service at the Wilmington District Conference, December 2, 1980, the congregation sang a most fitting hymn, as they remembered the loyal service of John Henry Parrish. It is No. 288 in The Book of Hymns:

"Servant of God, well done!
The glorious warfare's past;
The battle's fought, the race is won,
And thou art crowned at last."

CLYDE PRUITT PEARCE, SR.
1907-1980

Brother Clyde Pruitt Pearce was born in Franklin County, near Youngsville, North Carolina, on October 31, 1907, the son of Seth and Eura Pearce. He died October 6, 1980. At the time of his death he lived in his home between Youngsville and Wake Forest. His Funeral Service was held in the Wake Forest United Methodist Church, with the Rev. William M. Jeffries, Pastor, officiating; the Rev. Dr. Clyde McCarver, Superintendent of the Sanford District, representing the Cabinet; and the Rev. Jeral Fountain, a local Baptist minister whom he loved, assisting. Several other United Methodist ministers were also in attendance.

Clyde Pearce became a member of the Methodist Church in Youngsville at the age of twelve, later was a member of the Oak Grove Baptist Church for several years while he lived with an uncle and aunt, and then returned to the Methodist Church.

He was married in 1933 to the former Kate Elizabeth Holmes of Franklin County, the daughter of John Joseph and Sarah Elizabeth Whitt Holmes. He was a member of Carr Methodist Church in Durham, carrying on a television sales and repair business (he sold the first TV set sold in Durham) and rearing his children, when he answered the call to preach. He studied for the ministry at Campbell College, Louisburg College, and Southeastern Seminary, and attended Pastors' School at Duke University. He was ordained Elder at Burlington in June, 1964.

Brother Pearce served the Whiteville Circuit, the Perquimans Charge, St. Paul-Trinity in Sanford, Marshallberg, Cobb Circuit in the Burlington District, Byrum, and Newton Grove. He took early retirement in 1974 because of ill health, then served one more year as Retired Supply Pastor at Holly Springs, until poor health forced him to retire fully.

He is survived by his wife, Elizabeth; two children, Clyde, Jr., of Redding, California, and Mrs. Jean Holmes Creech of Whiteville, both of whom are active United Methodists; and eight grandchildren.

During his preaching career, Clyde Pearce preached in Revival Services, worked with the young people of his churches, and, always a lover of children, usually taught in his churches' Vacation Church Schools.

In his closing years, though in continuing poor health, he was a friend of ministers, children, and neighbors. His grand-nephews would often come to visit "Uncle Clyde".

His favorite hymns were "Sweet Hour of Prayer" and "How Great Thou Art"; the latter was sung at his funeral by the Congregation. Mrs. Pearce also recalls his

fondness for these words:

Beyond the sunset, O blissful morning
When with our Savior Heaven is begun.
Earth's toiling ended, O glorious dawning,
Beyond the sunset when day is done.

After a life faithfully lived and a call nobly answered, we are reminded of our Lord's words, "Well done! thou good and faithful servant; you have been faithful over a little, I will set you over much; enter into the joy of your master." (Matthew 25:23)

HORACE STANFORD GARRIS
1910-1980

The Reverend Horace Stanford Garris, age 69, died on Tuesday, November 25, 1980. At the time he and his wife, Helga, were living in Warsaw, N.C., their home since retirement.

He is survived by his wife, Helga; son Victor of Fayetteville; sisters, Louise Chanter of California, Bernadean Lovick of Kinston, and Ruth LaZore of Jacksonville.

Born on December 24, 1910, he was a native of Grifton, N.C., but left there early in life to work in New York. It was there that he met and married Helga. Upon receiving a call to the ministry, he and Helga moved West, serving Methodist Churches in both Montana and Utah. In 1953, he came back to North Carolina and completed his education at Atlantic Christian College, Wilson, N.C. and Duke Divinity School, Durham, N.C. While in school he served as pastor of the Mattamuskeet Charge in Hyde County. His passionate concern for an effective, well trained ministry led him to membership on the Board of Ministry. For several years he served as chairperson of the Ministerial Education Fund.

His funeral service was conducted at the Warsaw United Methodist Church on Wednesday, November 26. Those participating in the service were Bishop William R. Burial followed on Friday, November 28, at St. James Episcopal Church Cemetery, St. James, New York.

DWIGHT LANG FOUTS
1899-1981

The Reverend Dwight L. Fouts ended his earthly ministry to God's people on January 4, 1981. While brother Dwight had officially retired from the full time ministry in 1966, he had continued to work, preach, and teach whenever called upon. His faithfulness is the stuff of which legends are made and his integrity without question. He died even as he was born: God's man. Death occurred at Lexington Memorial Hospital. Dwight and Frances Fouts had made their retirement home in Lexington, North Carolina, with their affiliation in the First United Methodist Church of Lexington. Final services were held on January 6, 1981, at the Church with Dr. Earle Haire officiating. Burial was in the Lexington City Cemetery.

Dwight was born in Thomasville, North Carolina, on December 31, 1899, the son of the late John W. and Martha Beck Fouts. He is survived by Elizabeth Frances Fouts and a brother, A. Odell Fouts of Lexington. He was a graduate of Thomasville High School, Duke University, and the Divinity School of Duke University.

He was a member of the North Carolina Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church, being admitted into membership in 1934 and ordained Elder in

1939. In addition to serving six years as Director of Christian Education at First United Methodist Church of Wilson, he served pastorates in Scotland Neck, Sanford: Jonesboro Heights, Whiteville, Weldon, Hertford, Plymouth, Mt. Olive: First, Beaufort: Ann Street, and following his retirement in 1966 he served as Minister of Membership of the First United Methodist Church of Lexington for four years.

Following a triumphant service of the affirmation of his life conducted by the Reverend Dr. Haire, Brother Fouts' earthly remains were laid to rest in the City Cemetery on January 6, 1981.

In addition to being a soft spoken and hard working pastor with many diverse skills and imaginative touches to his ministry, Brother Dwight managed to serve his Conference in many ways. He was Secretary of the Board of Education, a member of the Commission on Town and Country, a leader in the Crusade for Christ Council, a leader in The Methodist College Foundation, Chairman of the Board of Ministry, member of the Conference Coordinating Council, member of the Inter-Board Council, a member of the Commission on Vocations, a member of the Bishop's Committee on the Study of the Ministry, and gave service on district committees on ministerial training qualifications, youth work, general Church School work, committees on Building and Location, District Missionary Secretary, and District Director of Christian Vocations as well as Youth Camp Committee official.

Dwight was supported and lifted up constantly in his work in the pastorate and the Conference by his loving and devoted wife, Frances, who survives him and is now a Member of The Methodist Retirement Home in Durham. Dwight and Frances were both deeply interested in a full scale ministry that involved every facet of the individual and his relationship to Jesus Christ. Thus, he was a certified teacher of many courses in Christian Worker's Schools including Church School administration, the development of Christian workers, and Christian stewardship. Other specialties are too numerous to mention.

To know Brother Dwight Fouts was to meet a man whose personal security and staunch Christian faith moved his brethren in a most salutary way to seek to follow his example. Everywhere he went he not only lived and preached the Gospel but promoted the total program of the Church—including the financial program even in hard times with success—by precept and example. He looked upon the younger ministers of the Conference as his special concern and spent endless hours in counseling and guidance attempting to elicit the very best in ministry from those with whom he served. In so doing he added direction to many lives and thus gave of himself in a manner that will have a positive effect on the ministry of the Church in North Carolina for years to come. Many ministers serving today completed their Seminary education and continue their service because of the quiet and loving counsel of Dwight Fouts. The span of Dwight's life and ministry saw many changes in both world and American history as well as the nature of work and society. Dwight thought on these things as have many others but he saw the one unchanging thing as being the Gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ and the nature of the ordained ministry as preacher, teacher, evangelist, counsellor, and the visitor of the sick. And even though he had some periods of declining health in his latter retirement years he was again and again renewed for usefulness by "the Angel of God, whose I am, and whom I serve".

At the end of his memoirs, this stanza from the pen of Charles Wesley seems appropriate:

"Servant of God, well done! The battle's fought, the race is won,
Thy glorious warfare's past; And thou art crowned at last."

HORACE GILBERT QUIGLEY
1920-1981

On January 30, 1920 in Edgecombe County, North Carolina, God gave Theodore Quigley and Bessie James Quigley a son, who they named Horace Gilbert Quigley. This child grew to be a man so filled with Christian love and warmth that his love spilled over to all who knew him. He loved the beautiful person and the homely person. He had compassion for the overweight person and the extremely thin person. He loved the strong person and the weak person. But, most of all he loved his Lord.

On March 16, 1940, Horace and Annliza James were married. According to Horace, this was one of the most important days in his life - the day he married Annliza, whom he adored almost to the point of worshipping her.

Horace graduated from Atlantic Christian College in 1947, having graduated from Rocky Mount High School in 1936. In 1957, he graduated from Duke Divinity School and transferred from serving as a minister of Disciples of Christ Church to service as a Methodist minister. His first pastorate was the Richland Circuit beginning in 1957. In 1962, he began serving Angier, in 1968 - Daniel's Memorial, in 1973 - Evansdale-Black Creek, in 1976 - Asbury-Dover, and in 1978, he began serving Riverside United Methodist Church, New Bern, North Carolina, which he was serving at the time of his death on January 9, 1981. He spent a total of 23 years serving the Lord in the North Carolina Conference.

"Preacher" tried so hard to recover from his last illness, but his heart could not stand the strain, and on Monday, January 12, 1981, his funeral service was conducted by Reverend J. Malloy Owens, III, Reverend Billy Seate and Reverend J. C. Loy, with interment being in Martin Memorial Gardens, Williamston, North Carolina. He left surviving him his beloved wife, Annliza; his son, Gilbert, of Fredericksburg, Maryland; his mother, Bessie Turner, of Rocky Mount, North Carolina; five brothers - James Quigley, of Rocky Mount, Malcolm Quigley, of Fayetteville, Waylon Quigley, of Houston, Texas, Larry Quigley and Sherrell Quigley, of Chester, Pennsylvania; his sister, Mary Catherine Wheatley, of Booth Wayne, Pennsylvania; and four grandchildren.

Horace Quigley ministered to the people of Riverside even after his heart attack in July of 1980 until one week before his death. During the last week of his ministry, just two weeks before his death, he visited many shut-in members of his church, and he gave gifts of money to persons, who were truly in need. During his ministry at Riverside, he formed a bond of love between the members of the church strong enough to hold the church together until a new pastor could be obtained.

Actually, most of the mechanics of the pastorate had to be carried on by members rather than the pastor, under his direction, from July 1, 1980 until his death. The church has grown stronger by the challenge, and with God's help it will be the church Horace Quigley would have had it to be.

It has been said that they are the true disciples of Christ, not who know most, but who love most. Horace Quigley was an intelligent man with a tremendous sense of humor and the ability to share the love which he felt for his fellowman. Our world is a better place by his having passed this way. As Reverend J. C. Loy stated during the memorial service for "Preacher", we can only say "well done thy good and faithful servant".

JAMES MICHAEL BROWN, Jr.
1934-1981

The Reverend James Michael Brown, Jr. of Shannon, N.C., died Tuesday, March 17, 1981 at the Veterans Hospital, Fayetteville, N.C.

He was the son of Lena McPhatter Brown and the late James Michael Brown, Sr., and was born on October 22, 1934 in Wakulla Community near Red Springs in Robeson County, N.C. He entered school at Mount Zion School, now the site of Mount Zion United Methodist Church. The family moved to Shannon while he was still young and he attended school there. He graduated from high school at Peterson High School in Red Springs. Upon graduating, he joined the United States Air Force. After completing his tour of duty, he entered Howard University School of Liberal Arts and Religion, Washington, D.C. He later entered Fayetteville State University, Fayetteville, N.C.

Reverend Brown joined Prospect A.M.E. Zion Church in Shannon as a youth. He later served as a pastor in the A.M.E. Zion Church after accepting the call to the ministry in the early 1960's. In the A.M.E. Zion Church he pastored churches in Gettysburg, Pennsylvania, Washington, D.C., and Bethlehem, Pennsylvania.

Reverend Brown returned to Shannon three years ago and became active at the Mount Zion United Methodist Church. He later joined Mount Zion. At the time of his

death he was serving as pastor of the Smith Chapel United Methodist Church, Bolton, N.C. This church is part of the Rockingham District under the leadership of Dr. Joseph B. Bethea.

Reverend Brown was very active in the community where he lived. He had an ardent love for children and youth. He spent many hours involved in activities with the youth for their human and spiritual development. He was also actively involved in civic and community concerns. He was currently serving as Public Relations Chairperson and Corresponding Secretary of the Robeson County Black Caucus. He was also president of the Red Springs Branch of the NAACP and columnist for the Robesonian and Red Springs Citizen. His columns were read across Robeson and surrounding counties and became known for their boldness and truth. These writings will be missed by those of us who looked forward to reading them.

If Reverend Brown could have planned his own funeral, he would have carried it out just the way it was. It was a joyous occasion that we will never forget. It was a time with great rejoice, for we knew that a servant of God had been told "well done". The Eulogy was delivered by Dr. Joseph Bethea. Dr. Bethea brought the word from Philippians 1:21 with the text being "to live is Christ, but to die is gain". He preached the work with mighty triumph. The Reverend James H. McCallum gave words of comfort in prayer. He concluded with the astounding words, "Reverend James Michael Brown, Jr. may have served in Uncle Sam's Air Force, but he served a more important army as a soldier of God". The Reverend E. B. Turner, pastor of First Baptist Church, Lumberton, represented the Black Caucus. His remarks could very well have been a sermon. Reverend Brown would have been proud! The pastor of Mount Zion United Methodist Church, the Reverend Jesse Brunson, made remarks and officiated at the funeral. Others helping with the funeral were the Reverend Dewitt Womack, pastor of St. James A.M.E. Zion Church, Red Springs, and the Reverend William Cummings, pastor of Rhine Memorial United Methodist Church. There were many other ministers there to share in the "home going" of James Brown. The U.S. Air Force participated by providing military rites. One of the final highlights included the singing of Reverend Brown's favorite song, "One Day At A Time". It was so beautifully done by Mrs. Pauline Murphy and Mrs. Katie Jones. The interment was at Prospect Cemetery in Shannon.

If I could use words to describe the Reverend Brown, these would be appropriate:

"As a runner, he'd win the marathon;
As a soldier, he'd lead the battle;
As a Christian, he'd fight the sin;
As a preacher, he'd preach the Word;
As a leader, he'd surely lead;
But at his death, he'd surely gain
For he'd live as much like Christ
As he could, and do all
The things a Christian should."

Reverend Brown may be gone from this earth, but he has gained his place by God's side. We will miss him at Mount Zion Church. The community will miss him also. His enthusiasm was like the sun's rays after a long cold winter.

Reverend Brown, rest in peace with Jesus.

ALLEN C. LEE
1903-1981

Allen C. Lee was born November 25, 1903 in Dunn, North Carolina. He was blessed with the love and fellowship of a large family. There he grew and increased in wisdom and stature and in favor with God and man until he went off to college. His education was received at Asbury College and Princeton Theological Seminary. Along with his beautiful and competent bride Mildred, he pastored with distinction, love and commitment the following churches: Hatteras, 1932; Fairfield, 1934; Pasquotank, 1936; Scotland Neck, 1940; Red Springs, 1944; Louisburg, 1948; Durham: Calvary, 1951; Hamlet: First UMC, 1954; Farmville, 1958; Wilmington: Trinity, 1962, Roanoke Rapids: Rosemary, 1966; St. Pauls, 1968; Associate Lumberton: Chestnut Street, 1969-74.

Recently Allen was presented the President's Medallion when he gave the graduation address at Methodist College. The President Dr. Richard W. Pearce said of Allen in the Presentation: "Into a world of beauty, you have injected an energy and curiosity. Little in this mortal life escapes your watchful eye; not religious books of rare vintage nor recipes of gourmet dishes; not books of poetry nor music of the violin; not gravestone epitaphs nor garden plants. You are a connoisseur of tangible life, sifting through to the beauty of all things."

Allen Lee was a *Christian Scholar*. He was so sure of the reality of God that he had no fear that further inquiry could uncover anything less than discover more proof of God's reality and truth. God's people have always been called "The People of the Book". That described Allen. He loved the Bible more than anyone I have ever known and spent a life time studying it. His private collection of English translations of the Bible was one of the best private collections in this country. Recently he gave this valuable collection to Methodist College so that persons in Eastern North Carolina would be inspired to do serious Bible study. He included with this collection his careful notes and research on each translation so as to make it more meaningful. Allen shared his love and understanding of the Scripture with me and so many other ministers. There was a "childlike" quality demonstrated in his curiosity and pursuit of truth and knowledge. He walked so much in the "Light of revelation and enlightenment" that his countenance glowed and his smile cast a warmth over everyone he met.

Twelve years ago Allen gave me Young's poem, *Into the Sunset*, that he said expressed his attitude of life and death:

Let me die working!
Still tackling plans finished, tasks undone.
Clean to its end, swift may my race be run.
No laggard steps; no faltering; no shrinking!
Let me die working!

Let me die working!
Let me fare forth still with an open mind,
Fresh secrets to unfold, new truth to find;
My soul undimmed, alert, no question blinking.
Let me die working!

Let me die laughing!
No sighing o'er past sins; they are forgiven.
Spilled on this earth are all the joys of heaven;
Let me die working!

Let me die giving!
The substance of life for life's enriching;
Time, things, and self on heaven converging,
No selfish thought, loving, redeeming, living.
Let me die giving!

Allen was a lover of all God made. Many people have been unable to love God because they could not love or accept all that God had made, but Allen loved all God made! Consequently, he love astronomy, poetry and everything that praised God's creation. He had a special love and interest in people. This was reflected in his enthusiastic inquiry about every person he met. He wanted to know where you came from, to whom you were kin, etc. Allen was a sincere effort to find a closer relation between you and him. Allen gave me the best difinition I ever heard of Social Concerns when he defined it as "your pain in my heart." But most of all, Allen loved God and was true to Him and served Him all his years. His love and expert knowledge of astronomy was inspired by his admiration of the vastness of God's creation. He loved the translatio of John 14:2, "In my Father's universe there are many worlds, and I am going to prepare a place for you; if it were not so, I would not have told you."

On April 7, 1981, Allen "dropped his body" and his spirit moved on out into the further realms of what God had created for him. His memorial service was conducted at Thyme Memorial Church in Red Springs by his pastor, Al Morris, Reverend Clyde Dunn and myself, James H. Bailey.

He is survived by his wife, Mildred Mernie Lee, two sons, Lloyd Mernie Lee and Thomas Allen Lee, and one granddaughter, Elizabeth Mernie Lee; and four brothers and two sisters.

Allen's hope of the future can best be summed up with the words of an unknown poet:

"The stars look down on the ocean,
the stars look down on the sea.
The stars shall shine for a million years,
a million years and a day,
But Christ and I shall live and love
when even the stars have passed away."

BESS WIDENHOUSE HAYMAN
1889-1980

Bess Lucretia Widenhouse was born December 20, 1889 to William Martin Widenhouse and Lavinia Melinda Furr. Her father was a farmer and merchant in the Mt. Pleasant-Concord area of North Carolina. She was the sixth of seven children — a dutiful daughter, a loving sister, and a good student. She graduated from high school in the Mt. Pleasant area and then entered Trinity College, Durham, N.C., where she majored in languages. She was President of her senior class at Trinity, graduating in 1913 with an excellent record.

It was at Trinity that she met Louis DeMaro Hayman, a young ministerial student from Dare County, N.C. Following graduation from Trinity, she taught at Blackstone College, Virginia. The young Methodist minister wooed and won the fair Bess, and in August, 1915, they were married. They began their life together in Windsor, N.C., where their first child—a daughter, Beryl, was born in 1916. Dorothy appreciated and loved her home, the people, and geography of North Carolina. Though often traveling to Maryland to visit her daughter, Dorothy Louise Clegg Harper, and her son, David Pierce Clegg, in Burlington, North Carolina, or making exciting trips overseas to visit and enjoy other nations and cultures, she was always glad to be "home again". Home was either at 1408 Alabama Ave., Durham, N.C., or at the Clegg Cabin, Upper Browns Creek Rd., Celso, N.C. How fitting it was that on the morning of October 16, 1980, she died peacefully in her earthly home to be at home in God's Kingdom, to be with her loved ones there.

Psalm 116 was God's Word to Dorothy, providing understanding, giving comfort and offering hope. During the later years of her life she often turned to this Word. She loved God because He knew her voice and listened to her. Yes, suffering and death confronted her here on earth. There was much distress and anguish. She was born May 12, 1901 and as a child of eight experienced the death of her father; as a young minister's wife in Durham there was the tragic death of her eleven year old son, "Billy"; as a co-worker in the District Parsonage in Burlington she was crushed

After Lem's death, Dorothy spent many busy and creative years living in Durham, working in the Methodist Retirement Home, traveling, and shepherding many young students in Duke Graduate School to a more meaningful life and a more mature faith.

Dorothy loved, taking great joy and pride in, her grandchildren: Suzanne Clegg of Burlington, North Carolina; and William David, Carol Louise, and Timothy Clegg Harper of Towson, Maryland.

LESLIE GRAHAM RUSSELL
1887-1980

"She loved me. She really did love me!" These gentle words of assurance spoken by a young churchwoman are indicative of Leslie Graham Russell's relationship with the people of her church. Often we know when we love someone. Less often are we sure they love us. However, this minister's wife, mother, and teacher left no question of her affection in the hearts of the people who knew her.

Born in Montgomery County on September 4, 1887, Leslie Graham was the first child of Thomas and Emma Graham. Having her roots in a church-going family, she attended an unfamiliar church alone as a child when her mother needed to remain home with younger children. Once there, she felt overcome by the crowd of busy adults who seemed unaware that this child was new, frightened, and alone. At that early time she decided she would never let a child in her presence experience what she was feeling then. She aggressively set about preparing for life with a focus on teaching and loving children.

From Greensboro College she received her preparation for teaching. From all her contacts she received her preparation for living, refusing to be discouraged by hardship and always pulling some good from misfortune.

While a school teacher, she met John Armstrong Russell, a young Methodist minister from Montgomery County. They were united in holy wedlock by The Reverend J. H. Stowe on September 9, 1914. United by their faith in God, John and the wife he affectionately renamed "Miss Polly" left for a honeymoon that led them to a "lifetime of devotion and love".* They touched the lives of the young and the aging on the Chowan Circuit, at Brooksdale, Four Oaks, Snow Hill, Carr Church in Durham, Divine Street in Dunn, First Church in Hamlet, the New Bern District, Grace Church in Wilmington, and finally at Centenary Church in New Bern from which they retired in 1957.

While John remodelled the old home place on the family farm just outside Troy, Miss Polly began her flower garden that, like her life, became a vibrant source of inspiration and beauty. She nurtured tiny seedlings like she nurtured little children, helping both to grow with strength and direction. From parsonage garden to parsonage garden she had carried plants that were gifts from friends. Likewise, in every town she left remembrances from her gardens as she shared bulbs, cuttings, and seedlings, always refusing to let a living thing wither from lack of attention and care.

Standing on her convictions with a keen awareness of personal limitations, Miss Polly was known to address a young woman (who complained to her about her

church time and time again) with a heel-stomping, "You're coming to me when you ought to be going to God!" But even then this fiesty but friendly lady did not let the young woman leave without offering her love and guidance.

Young women of the town turned to Miss Polly for guidance and reassurance until her death October 17, 1980 at the age of 93. Although physically weakened several weeks before her death, Miss Polly remained spiritually strong and close to God—humming until her last day the melody of our hymn "How Firm A Foundation."

A funeral service for Miss Polly was conducted at Shiloh Church the morning of October 20, 1980 by The Reverends Clyde McCarver and Vernon Tyson who, just six months earlier on another beautiful morning, had held a service at Shiloh for her beloved John. A memorial service was held that afternoon at Trinity Church in Troy by The Reverends McCarver and Everette Eason.

Miss Polly's survivors are: two daughters, Miriam Lane Russell of Troy and Mildred Russell Smith of Raleigh; a granddaughter, Miriam Elizabeth Jicha; and two great grandsons, Gregory Russell Jicha and Karl Armstrong Jicha of Chapel Hill. She is also survived by two sisters and a brother.

After meeting William Hoyt Cheek and both being "born again" into God's family in 1939, they were married on December 14, 1940. While Hoyt was serving in the U.S. Navy, God called him into the ministry.

Leona was a "help mate" fit for Hoyt. "And the rib, which the Lord God had taken from man, made he a woman, and brought her unto the man." God took a rib from man when he created woman but Leona gave to Hoyt a second "spiritual" backbone.

She faithfully served her Lord and husband wherever the Lord led. Beside her duties as wife and mother, once when Hoyt served three churches simultaneously, she sang in three choirs, served in three UMW's, and worked at a full time job away from home.

She sang beautifully and used that talent to sing His praises. She sang duets with her husband, in a trio with her husband and daughter, Janey, and with the choirs of the churches they served. She not only sang His praises but glorified Him with verbal testimony and witnessing. You had only to talk with her to know she had a wonderful personal knowledge of our Lord and His Word.

Leona taught Sunday School and was very active in the United Methodist Women where her husband ministered in the following Methodist churches in North Carolina: Union, Elizabeth City; Jefferson, Goldsboro (organized by Hoyt); Glenwood-Trinity, Rockingham; Seaboard Charge, Seaboard; South River Charge, Autryville; Conway in Conway; South Rosemary-New Hope, Roanoke Rapids; Bellemont, Burlington (where they encouraged a wonderful musical program using drums, guitars, and electric piano, xylophone, and chimes (besides the organ) along with duets, trios, quartets and the choir which still blesses hearts and praises God today); Lemon Springs; and Longhurst, Roxboro.

Although Leona had not felt well the week of their Fall Revival at the Longhurst United Methodist Church where they were currently serving, she had faithfully attended each night and it was only after returning home the last night that she had a heart attack. Three days later on November 9, 1980 at the Duke Medical Center, Durham, N.C., the Lord called her home.

As the Lord commanded, "Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself," and even in death, Leona reaches out with love for her neighbor. It was her wish that her body be left to medical science at the Duke Medical Center, Durham, N.C., and being absent from her body (and present with her Lord) she still serves her fellowman.

Her memorial service was held November 11, 1980, at the Longhurst Church in Roxboro, N.C. The services were conducted by Dr. Charles H. Mercer, Superintendent of the Durham District and the Rev. Samuel Wood, Minister at Concord United Methodist Church, who was the visiting preacher for the revival services held when Leona became ill.

Leona is survived by her husband; her mother; her daughter, Janey Cheek Davis of Burlington, N.C.; a son, Wesley Baxter Cheek of Martinsville, Va.; three brothers, Jesse Lee Cornell, Jr. of Graham, N.C., Herman Edward Cornell of Columbia, S.C., and Willard Dean Cornell of Wakasha, Wisconsin; and two grandchildren.

". . . . For thou has created all things and for thy pleasure they are and were created." (Rev. 4:11) Leona Cheek must have been one of God's greatest pleasures! Jesus Christ in Leona truly glorified God.

MARTHA ROBERTA WOMBLE DURHAM
1892-1981

Martha Roberta Womble Durham was born July 27, 1892 in Lee County. She was brought up on a farm between Sanford and Moncure owned by her father and mother, Rufus P. and Lula Atwater Womble. She had two brothers, Floy and Guy. She graduated from Woman's College in Greensboro and taught school for a few years before marrying the Reverend Ernest C. Durham in 1914. They had four children—Ralph Kilgo, who died at seventeen months of age, Dwight Womble, Ruth Arden (now Mrs. Edwin Green), and Nell Marie (now Mrs. Martin Lyles). Their ministry during the next thirty years was shared with the people of the following charges: Mebane, Vandemere, Stonewall, Goldsboro, Vanceboro, Cedar Grove, Burlington, Clinton, Warrenton, Carthage, Creedmoor, Fuquay, and Tarboro.

Roberta Durham was a sweet, gentle, kind and loving Christian lady in every sense of the word—I have never heard her say an ugly word about any person nor did she gossip. She did not lose her temper and she was completely unselfish. She was a firm disciplinarian with her children, but always showed so much love to them that their feelings toward her was one of respect and love. They had fun with her and the relationship between them was wonderful. As they got older, she had that great quality of being able to let them live their own lives and make their own decisions, but was always there should they want advice or help. When they married, she never came between them and their spouses, and I can truthfully say that, as a mother-in-law, she was a great success—her sons-in-law and daughter-in-law adored her.

She was a good wife and her husband loved her, not only for the home atmosphere she created, but also for the support she gave him as a minister's wife. She visited the members of the church with him, helped comfort the bereaved, and was always sitting in the congregation when he preached—sometimes hearing the same sermon three times a Sunday in three different churches. She filled in for him on occasion when he was unable to preach because of sudden illness. She taught a Sunday School class in almost every town they lived in and was known to be one of the best teachers many people had ever heard. Through the years she held many other positions in the church—circle leader, president of the Women's Society of Christian Service, devotional leader, etc. She did not do these things once, but many times in many churches.

In 1944, Mr. Durham retired and he and Mrs. Durham moved to Raleigh and bought the first house they had ever owned at 1316 Mordecai Drive. They attended Trinity United Methodist Church, and for many years Mrs. Durham continued serving the church as Sunday School teacher for the adult women's class. She also serv-

ed a term as circle leader and that of president of the Women's Society of Christian Service. Her greatest joy in life was going to church and she never missed a Sunday unless she was ill.

In 1973, after Mr. Durham broke a hip and Mrs. Durham became unable to do her housework due to conditions brought on by hardening of the arteries, they moved to an apartment operated by Kintons Nursing Home in Fuquay-Varina, N.C. It was a lovely place with friendly personnel and they were very happy. One year later, Mr. Durham died, and although her children begged her to live with them, Mrs. Durham refused and continued to live in her apartment where she had maid service and registered nurses on call. She often made the statement that she never knew she would be able to find such a perfect place to live in her last years. She attended Fuquay Springs United Methodist Church there, where her husband had once served as minister. After five years, she became very senile, partly deaf, and partly blind, and she was moved to a room in the Nursing Home. After nearly three years there, her family moved her nearer to them to Glenwood Hills Nursing Home in Raleigh. Her condition continued to deteriorate and three months later she died on January 18, 1981. Her funeral service was conducted by the Reverend Eric Carson at Trinity United Methodist Church in Raleigh on January 20th, and she was buried beside her husband in Montlawn Memorial Park. Surviving are her three children, five grand-children, and six great grand-children.

Mrs. Duval received her education in the public schools of Chatham County and upon completion she attended Trinity College, Durham, North Carolina. While in Durham she met her husband who was the minister at Branson. They were married June 12, 1910, and to this union were born two daughters—Mrs. Dorothea Reaves

and Mrs. Julia Aiken. She is survived by her daughters, four grandchildren and five great-grandchildren.

STATE OF THE CHURCH ADDRESS, 1981

Every year, shortly after Congress convenes, the President of the United States delivers what is known as the address on the State of the Union.

Our first two presidents delivered their addresses in person. The third president, though he had written **The Declaration of Independence** and is recognized as perhaps the best writer of prose ever to occupy the White House, his only rival being Abraham Lincoln, had grave difficulty in public speaking. He was slow and halting and was so nervous behind the podium that even breathing became laborious to him when he tried to speak in public for any length of time. He could write a good speech, but no one realized it was good once he undertook to deliver it. Consequently, Thomas Jefferson abandoned the practice of coming in person before Congress. Instead, he sent his annual State of the Union Message, and somebody else read it for him before the Senate and the House of Representatives. Since he was a strong president and helped therefore to determine so many of the practices and traditions of our nation, no president after Jefferson came any more

in person to deliver a State of the Union Address, but merely sent one to Congress, until Franklin Delano Roosevelt broke the Jeffersonian tradition and reverted back to the practice of Washington and Adams and delivered his own State of the Union addresses. He was a strong president, too, and all subsequent presidents have continued Roosevelt's custom. Therefore, many of you have known no other custom, but some of us are old enough to remember how it was under Herbert Hoover and Calvin Coolidge.

At General Conference the bishops invariably prepare and one of them delivers an Episcopal Address, which attempts to do for the church what the President does in his State of the Union address for the nation. This same practice is followed at Jurisdictional Conferences, at least in our Southeastern Jurisdiction, and I presume it is in the others as well. Now, more recently, almost as an innovation, many bishops have introduced it at the annual conference level. The first bishop to make an episcopal address to the General Conference was Bishop William McKendree. Our first three bishops, Asbury, Coke, and Whatcoat, had never done this. In fact, Bishop Asbury, who evidently had not been consulted in advance by his younger colleague, took offense at McKendree's address. As soon as McKendree finished delivering it, Asbury leaped from his chair as presiding officer, took the podium, and complained to the conference: "This is a new thing. I never did business in this way, and why is this new thing introduced?" But McKendree remembered the Scriptural admonition: "A soft answer turneth away wrath, but grievous words stir up anger." He responded, "You are our father. We are your sons; you never had need of it. I am only a brother, and have need of it." Nonetheless, McKendree's address made such a good impression on the conference that even Asbury himself delivered two episcopal addresses before he died, and all subsequent bishops have observed McKendree's custom to the present time, so that every General Conference opens its business session with the episcopal address.

My illustrious predecessor, Bishop Robert M. Blackburn, introduced this practice to the North Carolina Conference, and I began this custom in the Atlanta Area during my second term there. Therefore, it seems advisable that I give my impressions on the state of the church at this session of our conference. We are a connectional church, and what happens in one conference or part of our denomination has effects everywhere else. "For as the body is one, and hath many members, and all the members of that body, being many, are one body.... And whether one member suffer, all the members suffer with it; or one member be honored, all the members rejoice with it," so writes the Apostle Paul. (1 Corinthians 12:12,26)

Today the truth of this apostolic dictum is confirmed by what has happened to the Pacific and Southwest Conference in the bankruptcy of its retirement complex known as the Pacific Homes and in the litigation that has ensued. Though the Pacific Homes was a corporate entity with its own charter and board of trustees, with its capital assets and income from various sources, nonetheless, when it went bankrupt, its parent body, the Pacific and Southwest Conference, was made liable in lawsuits by the plaintiffs, as well as the entire United Methodist Church of which the Pacific and Southwest Conference is a part.

To be sure, the lawyers for the church contended that no religious denomination should be held liable for the deficiencies of organizations and institutions which one of its parts or entities may at one time or other have established but over which it now has no control, since such institutions and organizations are independent and autonomous and operate under their own state-granted charters with boards of governors separate and distinct from the governing bodies of the church. Most of us

ere in North Carolina did not even know of the existence of Pacific Homes until disaster befell and it achieved notoriety through the news media and the press. How of course everybody knows about it, but we Methodists are sorry we do.

We, through our lawyers, contend that the denomination as a whole cannot be sued. Our brief states: "The United Methodist Church is a spiritual connection of millions of individual persons and thousands of representative church units which are collectively incapable of being sued as a jural entity." We are convinced that to subject them, that is, our entire denomination to jurisdiction would violate the First Amendment of the United States Constitution.

But, unfortunately for final settlement, this case was never successfully adjudicated. The costs were too high, the process was too long. Legal fees were running into the millions. So the bishop and leaders of the Pacific and Southwest Conference settled out of court with the plaintiffs and their lawyers. The settlement amounted to \$20,000,000. That poor little annual conference assumed fiscal responsibility. To meet its obligations it borrowed as much as it could from the Board of Global Ministries and the General Council on Finance and Administration of our church, then set out on a massive and unprecedented effort to raise within itself the huge sum of \$12,000,000. After that, it asked its sister conferences throughout our denomination to lend it \$2,000,000 more.

At the present moment, more than half the annual conferences of The United Methodist Church have responded positively to this appeal. None of them assumes any obligation whatever for the liabilities of Pacific Homes. But all of them gladly and graciously have extended a helping hand to a sister conference in dire need. I am proud to preside over an annual conference that was among the very first to respond to the S.O.S. from the west coast. We were asked to lend as much as 8% of our annual World Service appropriation. This we did through earnings on our undesignated capital investments. Thus we lent the Pacific and Southwest Conference the sum of \$43,735. "But whoso hath this world's goods," writes the Apostle John, "and seeth his brother have need, and shutteth up his bowels of compassion from him, how dwelleth the love of God in him? My little children, let us not love in word, neither in tongue, but in deed and in truth." (1 John 3:17-18). And our Divine Lord himself said: "Give to him that asketh thee, and from him that would borrow of thee turn not thou away." (Matthew 6:42).

There is always the possibility that what happened in California through Pacific Homes to the Pacific and Southwest Conference could happen to us in our own North Carolina Conference. After all, we have three colleges that belong entirely to us and look to us for support. Besides these three, we have an interest in at least two others outside our bounds and also a black college which depends to a degree on our benevolence. The Methodist Home for Children is our ward, and the Methodist Retirement Homes are our offspring. In times of financial stress, when the economy is weak and inflation is rampant, we have seen businesses which were sound and safe in themselves wrecked by their subsidiaries and also prosperous subsidiaries fail when the corporations to which they belonged have gone bankrupt. Therefore, it behooves us to exercise extreme care over the affairs of all our institutions. We should insist that they operate in the black, that capital funds be protected against being used for current operations, and that reserves be accumulated in good days to help our institutions withstand bad days.

I pay tribute to this great Conference—the only one of its kind in the whole of Methodism—where so much of our connectional and benevolent monies are raised one year in advance, are put out to interest, so that we are paying this year's expenses out of last year's collections. In this regard, we as a conference excite the

amazement and perhaps also the envy of our sister conferences and of the whole church.

At this session of the North Carolina Conference we are to consider the proposed plan from our Board of Pensions for raising the money to pay for the new pension system adopted by the last General Conference of The United Methodist Church. The old system also remains in force, for we must pay the pensions of our ministers who have already retired. The new system is designed to take care of the pensions of those who are still in harness. It is a pay-as-you-go plan, so that what the brothers and sisters receive in retirement will come out of present earnings and contributions, all of which will be wisely invested by our General Board of Pensions, so that they will be guaranteed their retirement benefits regardless of what the church might give or fail to give toward pensions after they have retired. This new plan will be comparable to those in industry and the professions. It is not a plan that we ourselves have propounded locally. It is one prepared by the General Board of Pensions and adopted by the General Conference for all the conferences. It is, therefore, not optional but mandatory.

We are not here to vote on the plan itself or its system of operation. What we are to decide is the method and means of funding it. Our own Board of Pensions has wisely collaborated with our Conference Council on Finance and Administration and with the Cabinet, and what will be proposed here is the joint effort of all three of these conference agencies. We do not consider pensions as benevolences. Pensions are deferred income and belong properly to ministerial support. Each charge will therefore pay its proportionate share as it pays its minister's salary. The details of the plan for raising the money to finance the pension program will be forthcoming later in the conference, through the report of the Board of Pensions. My purpose here is but to commend the new system and to say that what might have been a staggering increase in the Outreach Ministries-Fair Share Budget to more than 50% has through wisdom and ingenuity come to be less than 5%.

The denomination as a whole still does reasonably well financially. The North Carolina Conference does exceedingly well. We always pay our World Service claims 100%. God be praised for the faithfulness, loyalty, and devotion of our people. I honor you in eastern North Carolina for your great works' sake. I am proud to be the resident bishop of an area whose record of giving, benevolent giving, is such as yours is. "Every man according as he purposeth in his heart," writes the Apostle Paul to the Corinthians, "so let him give, not grudgingly, or of necessity: for God loveth a cheerful giver." (II Corinthians 9:7). And the Apostle also says in his farewell speech to the elders at Ephesus: "I have shewed you all things, how that so laboring ye ought to support the weak, and to remember the words of the Lord Jesus, how he said, It is more blessed to give than to receive." (Acts 21:35).

The United Methodist Church and her forbears—The Methodist Church and The Evangelical United Brethren Church—have always shown a vital concern for social issues. The Social Creed of the Methodist Episcopal Church was a pioneer document, for it helped to form the social conscience of Protestantism both in this country and in the English-speaking world. It has been revised several times since it was first propounded at the close of the first decade of this century, and in the minds of many in our denomination it is an ethical treatise comparable to The Articles of Religion in the field of doctrine and theology. The Evangelical United Brethren Church early gave ordination to women, and the Methodist Church in 1956 was the first major denomination in Christendom to take this bold step. I was a delegate to the General Conference in Minneapolis when this was done, and I shall never

forget the ovation that body gave Georgia Harkness, who had been fighting for this cause for years. The struggle for peace, for justice, and for human rights, now espoused and supported by Christian denominations everywhere and so much a part of the work of the World Council of Churches, very early found a clear, convincing, and vital voice in the Methodist Church, so much so that the Board of Social Concerns, now the Board of Church and Society, through its pronouncements, seemed to determine the conscience of the whole church.

The Methodist Church was the very first major denomination in a predominantly white society to place people from ethnic minorities into the highest governing and bureaucratic positions in the church. To be sure, the Roman Catholic Church had black and Asiatic bishops, but they served in Africa and Asia, not in Europe and the United States. Today, the Methodist practice and accomplishment, so significant and apparent in this country after the abolition of the Central Jurisdiction, is gradually being emulated by sister denominations, especially in the United States, though still more conservatively and on a much smaller scale than in our church. We are the only major denomination in Christendom to have a woman as one of its bishops.

The North Carolina Conference has never been remiss or backward in its concern for social issues and in its efforts to improve the lot of the poor and the oppressed. It was among the very first conferences in the Southeastern Jurisdiction to effect merger of blacks and whites. When I served this Area and the Richmond Area between 1968 and 1972, I had the privilege of appointing the first black district superintendent in both the North Carolina and the Virginia Conferences. My successor, Bishop Robert M. Blackburn, appointed the first Native American to the staff of the Conference Council on Ministries. There is no problem, as I see it, in appointing a Native American clergy with appropriate education and experience to any church or charge in the conference to which he or she might be eligible, so that in this regard I think open itineracy will be a reality. However, in regard to black ministers, open itineracy is still only an ideal. The same is probably true of women clergy as well, so these are goals toward which, by the grace of God, we strive. We have admitted, in proportion to our size and strength, more women clergy than most other conferences, certainly in this jurisdiction, and we are proud of these achievements and accomplishments. We have twelve in full connection, thirteen in fact, since we added one more last night. We also have thirteen as probationers. Only four of these, however, are pastors of local charges, or churches. There are in our church membership only 1,972 Native Americans and 4,007 blacks. We have eleven churches whose congregations are Native Americans, and thirty-four whose congregations are blacks. Unfortunately, there are only seven black ministers in full connection in our conference. Without open itineracy or large increases in membership in black churches, the prospects for the future of black ministers is bleak, and we cannot expect to attract young, well educated, enterprising black ministers to this conference. The commitment to strengthen the ethnic minority local church has peculiar and emphatic relevance for the North Carolina Conference.

Through our Conference Board of Church and Society we are prone to make public pronouncements and issue what we call position papers. Perhaps it would be better to take to heart the admonition of the Apostle James: "If a brother or sister be naked, and destitute of daily food, And one of you say unto them, Depart in peace and be ye warmed and filled; notwithstanding ye give them not those things which are needful to the body; what doth it profit? Even so faith, if it hath not works is dead, being alone." (James 2:15-17).

The Methodist Church in the United States showed a net gain in membership throughout its entire existence as a denomination until very recently. Indeed, before the migration from Central and Southern Europe in the mid-nineteenth century, it was the largest denomination in the United States. These migrations gave preponderance to the Roman Catholic Church. Nonetheless, in 1966, with the merger between Methodists and Evangelical United Brethren, the United Methodist Church was the largest Protestant denomination in this country.

Not any more! Every year without any exception we have lost membership. Those losses are staggering. It seems that we lose in membership the size of a small annual conference every year. Our annual losses run approximately sixty-five thousand to one hundred thousand people. For example, between 1976 and 1979, we lost 200,763 members. These are not mere statistics. Each member represents a human being, a person for whom Christ died.

My predecessor, Bishop Robert M. Blackburn, told me that this conference had lost members only two of his seven years until this last year, his eighth, and the beginning of my first, when it lost again. Indeed, we sustained a net loss of three hundred twenty-nine members. Seven of our twelve districts—Burlington, Elizabeth City, Greenville, New Bern, Raleigh, Rocky Mount, and Rockingham—fortunately, showed a net gain in members. But this gain, unfortunately, was not able to offset the losses in the other five districts. One district, for example, lost four hundred ten members, while another lost one hundred thirty-seven members. The highest gain, in contrast, was only one hundred eleven members. This was made by the Elizabeth City District, which is the smallest numerically of our twelve districts. It may at this rate become the largest very soon.

Everything we hope to accomplish as a church hangs on our success in evangelism. If we fail in evangelism, if we continue to lose members in such disastrous numbers, soon we will cease to exist a church. Therefore, no matter how splendid our social program are, no matter how grandiose our schemes for human betterment, if we have no people to implement them, they are good for nothing. During the eight years of my episcopate in the Atlanta Area, we made net gains in membership, bringing that Area to first place as the largest in membership in the Southeastern Jurisdiction. Indeed, during those years we showed the largest net gain of any episcopal area in the entire church. Let us, by the grace of God, unite, ministers and laity, to do this in the Raleigh Area. The state is growing in population. We will be faithless in our Christian commitment and unprofitable servants unless we keep pace in growth in church membership with the growth in population. Let it never be said of us that we did well financially, important as that is, but that we did poorly evangelistically; that we are rich in things, but poor in soul. If we put evangelism first, if we make it our perennial priority, as it should be, then these other concerns will take care of themselves. Remember the words of our Lord: "Seek ye first the Kingdom of God and his righteousness, and all these things will be added unto you." (Matthew 5:33).

Display Case Completed:

A display case for historical materials has been built and installed in the lobby of the Methodist Building by the Reverend George Johnson, Garner. The case will house rotating displays of historical materials.

Church Histories Encouraged:

1984 is the 200th anniversary of Methodism in America. Local churches are urged to use that as a target date for compiling, writing, and updating histories, and depositing a copy in the Conference Archives, the Methodist Building.

Southeast Jurisdiction Historical Society:

The 1980 meeting was held at Lake Junaluska around the theme, "American Methodism: A Missionary Movement." The 1981 meeting will be held July 6-9, as a joint meeting with the North Central Jurisdiction, at Bellarmine College and St. Paul United Methodist Church, Louisville, KY.

North Carolina Conference United Methodist Historical Society:

The Society is a way to broaden the scope of historical work in the conference. The following officers were elected in 1980: The Reverend Morris Barber, President; Mrs. Kathryn Royster, Vice-President; The Reverend Ben Rouse, Secretary-Treasurer. A newsletter is edited by Mrs. Mary Louise Butler Edwards. Items of historical interest may be sent to her for publication at 2320 Westdale Drive, Fayetteville, NC 28303. Membership in the society is renewable at Annual Conference.

Bibliography Of Historical Materials Within The Bounds Of The Conference:

The diverse and dispersed materials of historical value are deposited in a number of locations across the conference. A subcommittee is seeking to identify those sites. Deed Abstracts:

Mr. Joseph Watson heads a research project seeking to abstract the deeds of all United Methodist churches in the conference. Of the 56 counties, 49 are now completed. Copies of the abstracts are in the Conference Archives, the Methodist Building, Raleigh.

Meetings Held:

The commission met for its regular semi-annual meetings at Trenton, in Jones County, and at New Hope, in Perquimans County. The quadrennial organization meeting was held at St. Paul's Church, Goldsboro. The following officers were elected: The Reverend Steven A. Hickle, Chairperson; The Reverend Jack Benfield, Vice-Chairperson Mrs. Betty Barrett, Secretary.

Bishop Cannon, our brother historian, and delegates to the Annual Conference: In the closing months of 1980, we anxiously awaited the arrival of the book entitled: **To Be Faithful to Our Heritage: A History of Black United Methodism in North Carolina**. It was available soon after Annual Conference last year, so we present it this session. It is the fruit of the joint labor of the Western Conference and our own, and is co-authored by Dr. James H. McCallum and Mrs. Linda Addo of Bennett College. I invite Dr. McCallum to the state for a word of comment and presentation:

We give thanks for Mac's work with the Commission. Copies of the book are available in the lobby and at Cokesbury for a \$1.00 savings under mail order, now yours for just \$10.00.

The Commission will soon begin displaying historical materials in the new case at the Methodist Building. Persons or churches with collections or items for donation or loan may contact the Rev. Frank Grill, our conference historian.

During 1980, the tenure of the Rev. Lawrence Lugar lapsed, and we give thanks for his work. He now helps us maintain our connection with the SEJ Historical Society, which he serves as treasurer. He returns to our commission this year.

Lawrence is also serving on the SEJ steering committee for "Celebrate Methodism - 1984." Significantly, that steering committee is ably chaired by Bishop Cannon.

Concerning the 1984 bicentennial of American Methodism, the commission urges every church to write its history, and deposit a copy of it in the Conference Archives. This can be done. We invite the support of Bishop Cannon and the cabinet.

In closing, I want to uplift the work of the N.C. Conference United Methodist Historical Society. It is a program of the commission, and a means expanding the scope of the historical endeavor. Memberships in the society may be begun or reserved in the lobby. Information is also available there.

A most significant step has been taken by the Society as it has undertaken the sponsorship of a yearly competition in the writing of monographs or papers concerning places, events or persons within the present bounds of the conference. All entries must be submitted by August 1 of each year. A \$100.00 prize will be awarded the winner, and he/she will be required to present the work at the November meeting of the Society. All work must be new, previously unpublished and un-presented. For full information, contact the Rev. Morris Barbor, President, or the Rev. Ben Rouse, Secretary.

REPORT TO THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE

THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

The annual meeting of the Board of Trustees was held at 1 p.m., June 9, 1981, at Methodist College during the Annual Conference Session.

The financial statements for the calendar year 1980 were presented and reviewed by Charles McAdams, Conference Treasurer. These statements included: The Trustees Fund, Methodist Building Account, Staff Parsonages and Episcopal Residence Accounts, all of which will appear in the **1981 Conference Journal**.

The Trustees, through the Treasurer-Business Administrator, have endeavored to properly maintain the staff parsonages, Episcopal Residence and Methodist Building. The Methodist Building is fully leased. The largest and longest-tenured tenant, U.S. Fidelity and Guaranty Insurance Company, is moving from the building on June 26, 1981, due to their need for additional space. The area which they are vacating has already been leased to one of our tenants, College Foundation, Inc., who will now occupy the entire rental area of the Methodist Building.

All of the staff parsonages are now debt free and the debt on the Episcopal Residence has been reduced to \$15,277.18.

Considerable time and several meetings of the Board of Trustees during the past year have been devoted to implementing the resolution passed by the Conference last year authorizing the Trustees to purchase a portion of the Methodist Home for Children property. This has finally been resolved by the Home for Children Trustees resolving to retain the parcel under consideration plus another small parcel, all of which will be retained for use by the Home or the Conference as the need may arise.

THE NORTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE BROTHERHOOD

The North Carolina Conference Brotherhood is a group of United Methodist ministers and lay people who express their sympathy to the bereaved widow of a Methodist minister in a way that will be of real assistance when it is needed most. Instead of sending flowers, telegrams, or other ways of expressing sympathy, a gift of money is sent to the widow or beneficiary.

Any minister of the North Carolina Conference, Probationary, Associate, or Full Connection, or any Local Pastor serving a charge in the Conference may become a beneficiary member of the Brotherhood by payment of an initiation fee of \$2.00 and one mortuary assessment. Each mortuary assessment shall be one-tenth of one percent of the total salary received, including the apportionment for travel and utilities. The maximum payment shall be \$10.00 per call.

The beneficiary will receive \$3,000.00. This is non-taxable and is available at the death of the minister.

All ministers under the age of 50 are invited to join the Brotherhood.

Any lay person or church group is invited to join the Brotherhood as a non-beneficiary member. These persons pay from \$1.00 up per call. They choose the amount they wish to pay.

The more members we have the more the benefits will be.

DIVISION OF CHRISTIAN UNITY AND INTERRELIGIOUS CONCERNS

One of the major events of this Conference Session for the Division of Ecumenical and Interreligious Concerns is that it will probably cease to exist. In its place will come the Commission on Christian Unity and interreligious Concerns with newly appointed membership and elected leadership. We are especially proud that our new Bishop William R. Cannon, a national and world leader in ecumenical circles, is one of the new Directors of our Methodist General Commission of Christian Unity and Interreligious Concerns. Our own Ruth Cade of Fayetteville, N.C. also serves on the General Commission and is an active member of our Conference Commission. Following are some of the activities of this commission:

"QUEST" Study Booklet

Every minister in our Conference has received a copy of the new Consultation on Church Union booklet, **"In Quest of a Church of Christ Uniting,"** which was affirmed and approved for study and response by United Methodists at the recent 1980 General Conference. It is hoped that local church Work Areas on Christian Unity will encourage study and response to this important theological consensus statement. Our goal is to recruit 50 representative local churches as "study and response churches" to provide the General Commission by October 30, 1981 with responses from N.C. Conference churches. Thus far, we have only 6 churches from our Conference involved in this church-wide process. Any Methodist individual, or group can send in a response. The "Quest" study booklet costs only \$1.00 and is available from the Service Center, Cincinnati. Study and response materials to assist groups or teams in this project are available free. Further information will be sent to all ministers and Work Area Chairpersons.

SEJ Event

Our N.C. Conference Commission on Christian Unity was represented and actively involved in the Southeastern Jurisdictional Cooperative Event at Lake Junaluska, N.C., January 7, 8, 9, 1981.

January Workshops

At the recent January Workshops this Commission joined forces with the Council on Ministries and the Division of Lay Life and Work in the sponsoring and planning of 11 District Workshops on Christian Unity.

National Workshop

The Chairperson of this Commission, the Reverend Ralph Fleming, Jr. represented our Conference at the major national ecumenical event in America, The National Workshop on Christian Unity held this year at Boston, May 4-7. This joint Protestant, Catholic, Orthodox is an important ecumenical experience as well as a primary training event for Conference Chairpersons. This year's Workshop theme was "One Spirit-Many Gifts-One Body."

"Week Of Prayer For Christian Unity"

"The Week of Prayer for Christian Unity" was promoted again this year January 18-25, 1981. The date for 1982 is January 17-24. We urge promotion of this important ecumenical week in as many ways as possible in our Conference, especially

urging its observance in local churches and communities. This week continues to provide unique opportunities for ecumenical experiences with Christians in other churches, Protestant and Catholic, and a primary means of building ecumenical commitments. Order materials from Graymoor Ecumenical Institute: Garrison, N.Y. 10524.

"What Is An NCCC?"

We have distributed throughout the Conference copies of the new leaflet, "What Is An NCCC?," an interpretive piece about the National Council of Churches of Christ in the USA and plan to distribute through the Coordinated Mailing copies of Bishop Earl G. Hunt's updated article, "Linked in Ministry," in which a Methodist Bishop examines the work and record of the National Council of Churches.

N.C. Council Of Churches

The North Carolina Council of Churches continues to be one of the major ecumenical involvements of our Conference. The witness and work of the Council include most major main Protestant denominations as well as Roman Catholics of our State. Through the years our Conference has demonstrated its ecumenical commitment by its steadily increasing financial support. For the year 1981 we are contributing \$9600.00 and for 1982 we have budgeted \$10,000.00. The amount of \$11,000.00 has been set for 1983. We welcome the Reverend Collins Kilburn, Executive Director of the Council who will report to this Conference Session.

Methodist - Roman Catholic Dialogue

Plans for a Methodist - Roman Catholic Dialogue Session are still on the drawing boards for 1981. Our Commission is in conversation with the Commission on Christian Unity of the Diocese of Raleigh and its Chariman, Dr. Edward P. Mahoney of Duke University. Tentative plans call for reports led by Bishop William Cannon and Bishop Joseph Gossman on the current status of Methodist - Roman Catholic Conversations at Rome.

Interdenominational Cooperation Fund

In cooperation with the Conference Committee on Communication and its Director, Barbara Wilkinson, we have been engaged in promotion of the Interdenominational Cooperation Fund, through which our Conference churches support a number of important ecumenical programs including the National Council of Churches, the World Council of Churches, Religion in American Life, Consultation on Church Union, and the General Commission on Chaplains. Our Conference support for this Fund is raised by local churches voluntarily accepting Conference askings, and it has been slowly increasing. Promotional materials for this Fund have been distributed to ministers and are available from Untied Methodist Communications, 1200 Davis Street, Evanston, Illinois, 60201. Articles interpreting this Fund and the ecumenical causes it supports are currently being carried by the N.C. Christian Advocate.

"Religion And Politics"

This Commission has distributed among key Conference lay and clergy leadership 50 copies of the magazine "Face to Face-an Interreligious Bulletin" special issue "Religion and Politics," which presents from Protestant, Catholic and Jewish

perspectives a discussion and critique of the American Religious Right and its challenge to our national cultural and religious pluralism. This is published by the Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith, 823 United Nations Plaza, New York, N.Y. 10017.

"Ecumenical Ideabook..."

Copies of "The Ecumenical Ideabook-A Directory of Ecumenical Experiences" prepared by this Commission reporting on local — grassroots activities in the area of Christian Unity in our Conference, is still available from the Reverend James McCallum at the Methodist Building. It is an interesting compilation of ecumenical reports from over 100 of our churches.

Our Task

(7) Continue a ministry to migrant workers. (8) Support of and recruitment for the UN-Washington Study Tour. (9) Listing resources available for the elderly. (10) Resettlement of refugee families. (11) A Conference-wide workshop on the United Nations during the fall of 1982. (12) Local church should be informed on state and national issues by joining the Legislative Information Action Network and the National Impact Program of the Genrai Board of Church and Society.

Other Activities

The Division has made an honest effort to carry out the "Carroll Motion," of last year's Annual Conference. We have asked both the Cabinet and the Conference Council on Ministries to help us interpret the intent of the Carroll Motion. It was felt that the intent was to "poll the churches" on the 1980 positions and resolutions of the Division of Church and Society presented to that session of Annual Conference. We sent a questionnaire in the Coordinated Mailing requesting local pastors to poll their membership. Even though the response was minimal, we feel we have dealt with the intent of the motion, and have taken into consideration the constant feelings of the Annual Conference about the Division Reports as stated in paragraph #1 under Position Papers, etc.

In other action, the Division of Church and Society voted to not support financially the coalition for ERA in North Carolina. (Other official groups within our Conference do support this coalition financially.)

During the 1981-1984 quadrennium, there is a special program "PEACE WITH JUSTICE." On the national level it will provide resources and assist us to become better informed and to develop our own personal interests and commitments. It provides an opportunity for United Methodists to share in the continuous building of peace in a world where justice is too often neglected. The program will depend on your giving as a World Service Special Gift.

During the next Conference year, your Division of Church and Society, along with all other agencies will be working on a program for strengthening the EMLC.

We have a growing desire to represent the UM of the NC Annual Conference; to be true to our calling; to emphasize the traditional thrust of Methodism: of Evangelism and the Social Gospel; to submit ourselves to the highest calling of Christian ideals, and the historic positions of the United Methodist Church. We would call attention to paragraphs 67-76 of **The Book of Discipline of The United Methodist Church**, 1980, and footnote number 2 on pp. 182-185.

Bishop, members of the cabinet, distinguished guests, members of the N.C. Annual Conference, and visitors:

THE TASK OF CHURCH AND SOCIETY IS SPECIFICALLY OUTLINED IN THE 1980 BOOK OF DISCIPLINE.

- .. "To provide for church and society functions...
- .. To provide for the connectional relationship...
- .. Develop and promote programs on Christian social concerns in the conference...
- .. Project plans and programs that challenge the members of the UMC...to analyze the issues which confront us... and to encourage Christian lines of action...
- .. To seek the implementation of the Social Principles...
- .. To recognize the freedom and responsibility of all Christians to study, interpret, and act on any or all recommendations in keeping with their own Christian calling..."

The Board of Church and Society has continually been made aware of the pluralistic composition of the UMC in our Annual Conference. With this in mind, we have tried to act responsibly. Our Board, itself, has not agreed with all the positions we have discussed. We have presented a majority report, which has been modified by the minority. Yet we realize it is our responsibility to confront the membership of the UMC on all social issues, even those we have disagreed upon. It is our thought that these pronouncements in the Book of Reports, on pages 58-73, are an honest effort to be inclusive and at the same time consistent with our responsibilities. We urge the N.C. Annual Conference to accept these papers in the spirit that they are given, as suggestions coming from your Board after much labor and debate to be studied by the local churches, and we ask you to act on any or all of these recommendations in your local churches in keeping with your own Christian calling. The one exception is the resolution on page 72, on private or church school standards, which will need to be voted on separately, as it is a resolution.

We are presenting one policy recommendation, found on page 35, under IV. Policy B. Church and Society, Division of. The local church consider joining the Legislative Information/Action Network of the N.C. Council of Churches, and the National Impact Program of the General Board of Church and Society. Each is a subscription to a Newsletter presenting the bills and positions of our legislatures on the state and national level. There will be a conference wide study, Nov. 14, 1981 at St. Pauls UMC in Goldsboro at 9:30 am until 3:00 pm. The theme will be Agriculture in a World of Scarcity."

Frank Lloyd, Chairperson

The Board of Church and Society continues to examine the social issues confronting our society and to make suggestions to consider for Christian action in response to these issues. We highly appreciate what churches are doing in the area of "social services," but there is need for more involvement in legislative and "social action." Therefore, the Board of Church and Society has prepared these papers and resolutions for your consideration.

RIGHTS OF MIGRANT FARM WORKERS

A responsibility of the Board of Church and Society is "to relate the gospel of Jesus Christ to the members of the church and to persons and structures of the communities and world in which they live." (Discipline paragraph 1202).

In relating the gospel of Jesus Christ (the parable of the Good Samaritan, Luke 10:30-37), we are called to express healing for the 50,000 migrant farmworkers who come to North Carolina for six to eight months each year to harvest some of our crops - peppers, cucumbers, tomatoes, squash, watermelons, sweet potatoes, apples and tobacco. These migrant farmworkers are the prime factor in keeping the cost of fresh produce inexpensive for many states.

Migrant farmworkers live in 700 camps with approximately 25 in each camp at one time. In some of these camps, the dwellings are in poor condition with no heat or indoor toilets, without water or heated plumbing for the showers, and with 11 beds in a room that measures 15 by 15 feet. (On the other hand, some farmers have applied for a one percent loan under the Farmer's Home Administration program and these camps contain housing made of cinder block with a large kitchen and bathrooms for men and women.)¹ All camps with 11 workers or more are inspected before occupancy, and certification is to be withheld if the camps do not meet minimum requirements; OSHA, the North Carolina Department of Labor, and the Employment Security Commission inspect these camps. In one reinspection by OSHA, after the Employment Security Commission had cleared them for occupancy 43 of 53 camps were found to be in violations of the standards for lack of adequate sleeping space and lack of toilets and poor drainage. These conditions were not corrected prior to occupancy.²

The Fair Labor Standards Act of 1938, as amended, requires that agricultural workers be paid the current applicable minimum wage and that farmers keep accurate records of the earnings, hours worked and other information. The law allows reasonable cost for lodging, food and other facilities provided by the farmer to be included in computing wages. The Farm Labor Contractor Registration Act of 1963, as amended, requires that any person, who, for fee, recruits, hires, or transports agricultural workers (within a state or across state lines) must register with the United States Department of Labor, and among other regulations, maintain payroll records and give each worker a statement of earnings, withholdings, and give payroll information to the farmer.²

In spite of these regulations, some farmworkers work from 10 to 11 hours per day; they pay \$35.00 a week to the crewleader for meals of beans, rice, green bread, pig's ears and occasionally chicken. In the camps where they are not allowed off the ground, they sometimes pay the crewleader one dollar for a package of cigarettes and twice to three times the going price for wine, beer or liquor. In some of the camps, the minimum wage had become thirty cents a bucket for what

worker picks. After receiving pay tickets with all sorts of deductions they do not understand and never agreed to, they may have 15 or 20 dollars to call their own, and if they decide to leave, the crewleader often threatens them and refuses to pay them any more of their money; he may even tell them they will be turned over to the police because they owe him money for transportation, food, cigarettes, and beer. Labor's Wage and Hour Division annually has a 95 percent violation rate, but its spokesmen admit little if anything is done about violations.³ (In the past two years (1979-1980), four crewleaders have been convicted of kidnapping and seignage).⁴ The Wage and Hour Division, within the United States Department of Labor, is responsible for enforcing the Fair Labor Standards Act and the Farm Labor Contractor Registration Act.

In the introduction to his report to the Division of Policy Development of the North Carolina Department of Administration, in June, 1980, Dr. Josh Reichert, a Congressional Fellowship recipient wrote, "Despite the infamous reputation which North Carolina has achieved and the constant stream of critical reports which have been issued over the years, virtually nothing has been done to ameliorate the situation. Whereas various attempts have been made to enact laws which would protect farmworkers from the widespread abuses from which they suffer, such efforts have been repeatedly stymied by powerful agricultural interests and a series of administrations, which for reasons of political expediency and self-interest, have headfastly refused to support needed reform. As a result, agricultural workers in North Carolina are systemically excluded from almost every labor statute designed to insure fair wages, safe working conditions and a decent standard of living . . ."⁵ Subsequent to this report, an investigator from the United States Department of Labor has recommended legal action to obtain nearly \$650,000 in back wages for migrant farmworkers in Sampson, Johnson and Wilson Counties.)⁶

There are some "Good Samaritans" who continue to be advocates for migrants and other farmworkers and among these are: the North Carolina Council of Churches; Church Women United; The Ministry for Migrant Affairs of the Diocese of Raleigh, North Carolina; The Florida Rural Legal Services; State Advisory Committee on Services to Migrants; The Triangle Friends of the United Farmworkers; Farmworkers Legal Services of North Carolina and the Migrant and Seasonal Farmworkers Association. They have advocated the inspection of migrant camps with 10 or less farmworkers and a public hearing before the adoption of child labor regulations by the United States Department of Labor. They are advocating full and equal minimum wage benefits, including overtime; coverage by workmen's compensation; equal protection for children in agriculture as in other industries; stricter enforcement of OSHA housing regulations and better housing; maintaining the present Farm Labor Contractor Registration Act; and the appointment of an ombudsman in the Governor's Office to speak for migrants and other farmworkers.

Suggested Actions for Local Congregations

- 1. Become more informed about the health, safety, welfare and pay of Migrant Farmworkers. (The advocacy groups may be contacted for this information.)
- 2. Write to our Congressmen and Senators requesting their aid in enforcing housing regulations and minimum wages for Migrant Farmworkers.
- 3. Call 1-800-662-7952, Office of Citizens Affairs, and ask that an ombudsman be appointed to speak for the Migrant Farmworkers in the Governor's Office.
- 4. Invite Migrant Farmworkers to participate in worship, community affairs, and to share recreation facilities in our Methodist Camps.

POSITION PAPER ON THE FAMILY

From the outset of humanity, emotional and physical survival has been dependent on the family structure. Within the family is a built-in system of support and care that cannot be matched by nursing, retirement, religious, or employment institutions. As United Methodists we believe "the family to be the basic human community through which persons are nurtured and sustained in mutual love, responsibility, respect, and fidelity."¹ Today, in the United States, inflation has forced many mothers to seek employment outside the home. A career-conscious mind set has sent men and women into jobs that demand more time and pressure. Women who desire to stay home for family care and are financially able (some are financially handicapped) to do so are becoming in the minority.

Shared Responsibility

With the influx of mothers into the employment scene, there is a greater need for fathers to take an increasingly more active role in child care. Psychologists have shown that children respond positively emotionally and physically to increase contact with their fathers. We urge all fathers to make more concerted efforts in the upbringing of children and caring for the household. We further urge them to consider this as their God-given duty rather than service above and beyond the call of duty.

Single Parent Families

We recognize that an increasing divorce rate and increasing rate of violent deaths among young adults have reduced many families to single parent families. In cases where divorce leaves father and mother in close vicinities, we advocate all possible efforts for children to have equal access to both parents. Where divorce leaves great geographic distance between parents, or death robs children of one or both parents, we advocate that children be provided with strong role models and all possible love.

Employment and Family Priorities

American divorce rates have been, for most of this century, the highest among civilized nations. Among the professions that demand more than the forty hour work week, one particular source of stress within marriage was a lack of time and privacy for family living.² We advocate that businesses and churches respect the

rights of fathers and mothers to establish family priorities - even when those priorities supersede business and church priorities. We further urge parents to refrain from abusing the family priority as an excuse for lack of productivity or questionable loyalty.

Conclusion

In the 1976 General Conference Resolution on the family, the stress of economic pressures, family life education, and sex education topped the list of concerns. We urge churches to rise above all other aspects of society in creating opportunities for family enrichment and education. We urge the Coordinators of Family Ministries on conference, district, and local levels to assume new importance and energy in enabling churches to supply adequate family opportunities. Former President Carter's statement to the White House Conference on the Family ended thus: "It will be good to remind all of the churches that if they deal with family life, their ultimate goals are much more likely to be realized."³

A CALL FOR CHRISTIAN AFFIRMATION OF PUBLIC EDUCATION

A Working Paper for the N.C. Division of Church and Society

A basic teaching of the Gospel of Jesus Christ is that every person is important — a person of infinite worth in the sight of God. This understanding of human nature has strongly influenced the development of life in this land. Our system of public education results from the impetus of this teaching. Our nation has sought to provide a system of education open to every person, and recognizing the ability of every person, to contribute to the public good.

It is precisely because the schools are so open that some persons find them objectionable. Some seek a system that is more restrictive as to who may attend or what may be taught, thus implying that some persons are of more worth than others. We Methodists oppose any retreat from open public education that does damage to the teaching of the Gospel affirming the worth of every person.

Christians rightfully feel responsibility for the system of public schools. They must express that responsibility in a Christian way. Some insist on prescribed prayers and religious ceremonials in the public schools. However, the aims of the Gospel will be better served if Christians insist that public schools operate openly upon the premise that every person is of infinite worth in the sight of God.

Therefore, we call upon the Churches of the North Carolina Annual Conference and all Christians everywhere to affirm the worth of every person. We support teachers and administrators in our schools as they seek to be fair and open to every student. Our schools must engender in the whole of society the attitude of openness and acceptance. We affirm without apology the worth of every person in the sight of and under the law.*

*NOTE: The body of this position paper is from the resolution "A Call for Christian Affirmation of Public Education" which is pending action in the House of Delegates of the North Carolina Council of Churches.

From the time of creation, God has given men and women stewardship over the earth, including its bountiful natural resources. In time of dramatic technological and industrial growth, involving equally dramatic demands upon earth's resources, Christians need to be especially concerned about two increasingly important issues related to the responsible use of our environment.

The first issue is the production of energy. How can modern society produce the energy it needs safely and economically in a way that will also foster conservation and restoration of energy sources? Of particular concern in this decade's energy debate, prompted by steady increases in the price and decreases in the supply of imported oil, is the role of nuclear power.

A second emerging social issue is the effective disposal of hazardous wastes. How can society effectively rid itself of such wastes without endangering its citizens and disastrously polluting the environment?

The Division of Church and Society raises these issues about the responsible use of our natural resources before the North Carolina Conference of the United Methodist Church as topics for study and prayerful reflection by individual congregations. As the church, and society, face these emerging issues, we need to confront some basic considerations before we even attempt to draw conclusions and propose solutions to the problems we face as stewards of God's earth.

ENERGY USE

A major question is where society get the energy it needs to maintain our current standard of living. This question becomes increasingly important as the nation faces the need to wean itself from imported oil as its present energy foundation.

Modern society runs on oil, which supplies 50 percent of the United States' energy consumption, according to figures released by the Energy Information Administration of the U.S. Dept. of Energy. Other energy supplies are natural gas (25 per cent), coal (18 per cent), hydroelectric (three percent), and nuclear (four per cent). The nation's total energy consumption in 1979, according to government figures, consisted of an equivalent of 38.5 million barrels of oil per day, of which 8.4 million barrels consists of imported oil.

The essential question is not only how to relieve American dependence on foreign oil, but also what resources can Americans best utilize to provide needed energy without depleting the earth's resources or harming the environment.

We recognize that the biggest resource of modern society is conservation. Studies show that energy conservation measures can translate into savings of millions of barrels of oil per day, providing through prudence a significant amount of America's energy needs. The heart of this conservation is simply curbing our seemingly insatiable, and often unnecessary, appetite for energy.

But conservation is not enough. Any Christian concern for energy must also concentrate on alternate forms of energy production. Choices must be made, and we must responsibly weigh the advantages and disadvantages of each energy resource.

The pioneering development of new energy resources, such as synthetic fuels and solar energy, offers only long range promise. While these avenues need to be aggressively explored as potentially unlimited sources of energy, limitations fo

present technology do not make these alternatives major contributors to short-term energy needs. They cannot be relied upon even for long-term needs until further research proves their technological and economic feasibility. Environmental considerations also remain an unknown.

Problems especially exist for solar energy, perceived as a popular energy panacea by many. While sunlight is cheap, plentiful, and environmentally clean, the technology to harness the sun's energy, such as the production of solar batteries, may be neither inexpensive nor benign. Many questions need to be answered before Christians jump on the solar or synthetic fuel bandwagon.

With the steady depletion and environmental hazards of fossil fuels, and the unavailability of synthetic fuels and solar energy as major energy resources in the near future, the controversy over nuclear power becomes especially important.

Nuclear power already is an essential energy provider to this country. In early 1980, according to an energy study conducted by the Harvest Business School, about 70 operational nuclear power plants in the U.S., with a generating capacity of 50 million kilowatts of capacity, were under or ready to begin construction. An additional 40 plants have been ordered. North Carolina utility companies make use of nuclear power. Eliminating nuclear power would be a major blow to this country's energy program.

But the development of nuclear power in America is stalemated because of a growing debate among scientists and the general public over the pros and cons of nuclear power.

But serious questions also must be resolved. What is the public risk of a nuclear plant accident — are nuclear power plants safe enough? How is the spent nuclear fuel, highly radioactive, to be stored permanently? Are nuclear plants subject to sabotage and nuclear theft? Will nuclear power lead to a proliferation of nuclear weapons? Does the complexity of federal regulations and the inflationary costs of constructing a nuclear plant negate the economic viability of nuclear power? What is the future role of thermonuclear fusion in the nuclear energy program?

The questions of public safety and radioactive waste disposal especially concern the American public, but all these questions must be examined and resolved before nuclear power is embraced as a responsible energy source of the future.

But fears of nuclear energy go deeper than the scientific debate. Many Christians oppose any use of nuclear power as a matter of conscience. We believe, instead, that nuclear power is a legitimate natural resource we can harness responsibly or unleash disastrously. Our obligation of stewardship requires us not to abandon nuclear power but to examine the questions it raises in private study and public forums, looking for answers that will help society safely and effectively use the atom for peaceful purposes.

HAZARDOUS WASTE DISPOSAL

A second major issue confronting modern society is the disposal of hazardous and low-level radioactive wastes. As God's stewards, Christians must be especially concerned about the threat raised by the improper disposal of such wastes upon the environment. The presence of the toxic chemical PCB along North Carolina highways is a dramatic reminder of how easily modern society can poison the earth and its inhabitants.

Concern over hazardous wastes is relatively new, but the problem has long been with this industrial society that increasingly relies upon chemicals. About 35,000

chemicals used in the U.S. have been classified by the Environmental Protection Agency as hazardous or potentially hazardous to human health. According to the EPA, the U.S. generates 77 billion pounds of hazardous chemical wastes a year, with only 10 per cent being handled in a safe manner. North Carolina is the country's 11th largest generator of toxic chemical waste and the fourth largest generator of low-level radioactive waste.

Modern society depends upon its chemical compounds, which produce such products as pharmaceuticals, plastics, insulation, textiles, and good additives. The same North Carolina facilities that produce 200,000 cubic feet of low-level radioactive waste a year provide health care, research, medical diagnoses, electricity, and other industrial products and processes. Eliminating toxic chemicals and radioactive materials from society would take major changes in modern lifestyles and create massive social and economic disruption.

At the same time, society must find a way to dispose of wastes from such processes safely. Improper dumping or storage poses two dangers. There is, first, the danger of direct exposure of toxic or radioactive materials. Secondly, there is the danger of dumped or buried chemicals contaminating the nation's water supply.

The first danger poses an immediate threat to human and animal life. The Love Canal incident in New York, where 1,200 homes and a school were located on a chemical landfill, provided a dramatic example of the cancer, birth defects, and other medical problems that can result from exposure to toxic chemicals. Reported explosions and fires in chemicals dumps around the country add more reasons for Christians to support increased research and more stringent controls on hazardous waste storage. More study is also required in ways to improve the safety of transporting hazardous wastes from the factory to dumping sites.

A more subtle but more dangerous problem to the environment is the contamination of the soil by toxic chemicals. Many chemical compounds do not decay but, when discarded casually or improperly, filter down through the ground into the nation's groundwater supply. Fifty per cent of all Americans depend on underground rather than surface water for their drinking supply. Polluted underground water, scientists warn, is almost impossible to clean up once it is contaminated. The health and survival of whole communities can be threatened by such poisoning of the groundwater.

We encourage increased research into the design and construction of environmentally safe landfills and liquid waste lagoons. We encourage increased research into alternatives to simple dumping, such as incineration and recycling processes.

We also applaud efforts by the state and federal government to come to terms with this serious problem. The U.S. Congress late last year created a \$1.6 billion "superfund" to help clean up chemical contamination caused by improper hazardous waste disposal in the past. Earlier this year, North Carolina began consideration of recommendations from the Governor's Task Force on Waste Management outlining a comprehensive strategy for hazardous and low-level radioactive waste management.

The problem of hazardous waste disposal is a problem not only for the present but for future generations. We believe it is the responsibility of all Christians, as protectors of the environment we enjoy and leave to our posterity, to seek technological solutions and encourage responsible action towards living safely with the toxic chemicals we have created.

Some simple rules for sensible TV reviewing.

1. Do not turn on the TV at random. Have a purpose and goal in mind.
2. Do not turn on the TV until you have first finished other obligations with due consideration for the following:
 - a. spending adequate time with each member of the family
 - b. having a time of prayer and Bible reading (Family Devotions)
 - c. involving yourself in some act of kindness or mission
 - d. finishing your household chores
3. Limit the number of hours you will watch TV each week. Have a family council and select the programs you will watch and the number of hours you will watch.
4. Turn the program off that you have selected, if it does not meet a minimum Christian standard predetermined by your family council. (i.e. dress, language, violence, redeeming qualities, educational, entertaining, sex, drinking, etc.)
5. Write to the sponsors of programs that you find offensive and state why you find the programs offensive.
6. We suggest that these rules be published, studied, and distributed in every local United Methodist Church.
7. Your response to these simple rules will tell you a lot about yourself, your family, and how much TV controls your life. Are we rearing a generation of United Methodist Christians or TVians?

POSITION PAPER ON A CHRISTIAN APPROACH TO U.S. FOREIGN POLICY

Whether or not we will live at peace with our neighbors depends upon the quality of our relations with those neighbors. Therefore, let us use Christian principles in foreign policy to enhance our relations, to improve chances for peace and, thus, make all more secure.

Let us love the children of one Father. Just as we recognize the truth of God's universality, our concern for the welfare of persons must extend to all, even those that are at enmity with us.

Policies must be based upon justice, rather than merely selfish considerations or ideological polarization.

We must not seek to be genuinely helpful.

Self-determination is one translation of the Golden Rule: each nation should be free to make its own policies and make its own mistakes. If we seek to impose our own will upon others, we shall deserve, and we shall get, their enmity and will likely push them into dependency upon other power blocs, making things more dangerous for ourselves.

Law and order are essential on the world scene. Our support for the United Nations and related agencies must be unstinting. More policies must be made through the U.N. Whether or not the U.N. agrees with our policy on certain issues, it is in our interest to strengthen the international decision-making process.

We must willingly criticize ourselves, and avoid criticizing other nations. Self-righteousness is as deadly to nations as to individuals. We must not condone in ourselves that which we condemn in others.

Our supreme international effort must be to support development in poorer nations, and not an arms race. Our attention, energies, research, and money must be used to build up, not to prepare to destroy.

Persuasion and mediation to find and pursue mutual interests must be used internationally, rather than violence, force, and threats.

We must support freedom in other nations. Some liberation movements may deserve our unarmed support. To oppose all liberation movements simply for ideological reasons forces them more into violence and drives them farther away from peaceful solutions and from our own positions.

Reconciliation and tension-reduction mandate that in crisis situations principal parties must take immediate measures to reduce tension and danger, and to induce the beginnings of trust. The more frequent and consistent such unilateral, goodwill initiatives, the more beneficial will be their effect.

All nations must be content with what is rightfully theirs. Each nation must not make unreasonable demands upon the resources of others. Economic domination is equally as abhorrent as physical domination. All nations must realize that total self-sufficiency is a 17th and 18th century philosophy which created havoc - not peace. We must seek reasonable interdependence, paying reasonable rates - not dominating markets, denying resources, or exacting monopoly profits.

Conclusion: We seek for our country the best, most Christian policies; therein lies the way to peace and security.

THE USE AND ABUSE OF LEGAL DRUGS

Humans throughout history have used medication to adjust to their environment. The legal system has defined which drugs can be lawfully prescribed to assist in this adjustment. Society has given the medical system the freedom and the responsibility to prescribe these drugs. The most often abused medications are the tranquilizers, sedatives, stimulants and analgesics.

All such medications obtained via prescriptions have a therapeutic potential. The use of legalized drugs are indicated under specific circumstances for which they are prescribed. It is not the judicious use of these drugs with which the church is concerned but rather the abuse of these medications. The church needs to speak to the variety of opportunities for abuse of these drugs.

1. The most lethal abuse is the combination of legalized drugs, illegal drugs and alcohol which often leads to severely impaired health and/or death. The above is never indicated for anyone at anytime.
2. The more common combination of legalized drugs and alcohol also has the potential for causing impaired health and death. This practice is hazardous and is not warranted under any circumstances.
3. The use of these drugs is rarely if ever indicated for children and young people. Special care should be taken by both parents and physicians to prevent these drugs from falling into the hands of children and young people. The two major sources of supplies for these drugs are: (1) Unsupervised and unregulated parental supplies, and (2) Street blackmarket.
4. The use of medications prescribed for another individual is never indicated.
5. The appropriate usage of these drugs often leads to the abuse of these medications. An individual may like the effect of the drug, and he/she may then pressure the physician to continue prescribing the drug. The physician may not think in terms of problem solving but only in symptomatic relief and sometimes acquiesces to the request for additional drugs. It is suggested that persons taking these drugs for more than a few months should assess their own reasons for taking the drugs and should question the physician concerning his/her motivation for prescribing them. If the individual is not satisfied with the answers to the questions, then a second physician's opinion should be sought.

Both long term and short term use of drugs are therapeutic in specific cases. It is not this use to which the church manifests its concern. However, all these drugs have addicting potential much like alcohol; therefore, the abusive use of these drugs should be discouraged. Furthermore, many individuals use these drugs to the exclusion of finding alternative methods for stress coping. One apparent difficulty is that neither individuals nor the physicians are trying to think of terms of non-chemical methods for relief from stress and discomfort. The development of other coping methods should be developed by individuals. The coping methods should include: (1) Creative use of leisure, (2) Appropriate expression of emotions, (3) Productive work, and (4) Purposeful activities that lead to relaxation.

The church is unique in its opportunity to assist individuals in the development of these skills.

Suggestions For The Local Church

1. Arrange for a doctor in your community to speak to adult and young people's groups on this problem.
2. Plan a study series on "Coping With Stress," enlisting the help of the local mental health agencies and physicians.

POSITION PAPER ON THE AGING

During the most of our lives, we have been surrounded by those gentle adults that so many times have given us vital advice about life. These people are very proud of their knowledge, but feel somewhat frustrated and shut-out by the problems that have pushed them aside.

As youngsters and growing adults, we often went to the older members of our family for counsel and advice. In the extended family unit, the older members are considered wise and knowledgeable. They reflect upon past experiences and suggest solutions to present day problems or concerns. This is the traditional role of the elderly, but our society somehow has changed it.

Today, our aging people are looked upon as being a problem. But the real problem relates to the inadequacy of senior citizen services. Since our society dwells upon materialism and professional gain, we have slowly pushed our elderly into a corner. They are without adequate housing or the income to maintain a household. Most homes for aging are overcrowded and expensive, so where are they to go? Many spend most of their limited monthly allowances on medically related bills.

Health, of course, is a priority need. The health care system is not addressing the various problems that our aging people encounter. These problems include the cost of health care, alcoholism (derivative from frustration/neglect) and the little knowledge of available services.

Another concern for the aging might be called a "dying resource." The older adults hold so much knowledge but is reluctant in delivering it. They are confronted with the question of where they fit into our society. It seems as though we have lost respect for a very special age group of people. There might come a day when we will lose respect for one another.

So let us look at the problem of inadequate housing, health care a "dying resource." Why do we isolate a vital part of our society? Why have we taken our older people for granted? Everyone needs to be loved and respected. Babies alone cannot survive without the touch and caring of other individuals. So we recommend that church members look at these problems and others with much intensity. Let us open our minds and hearts as a Church, a Christian body and as caring people, to a source that provided answers from the past for present day questions.

Therefore, we request the Local Church Council on Ministries become acquainted with programs that are available in your county for the aging and make this information available to the aging in your local church.

What The Local Congregation Can Do

1. Cooperate with your Chairperson on Council on Ministries in carrying out the request mentioned above.
2. Local church can have a workshop on aging.
3. Contact Social Services.
4. District workshops on aging.

DEFENSE, AND WHAT IS ENOUGH

In a perfect world, freedom necessarily entails duty and responsibility in order to maintain freedom. This freedom was not obtained easily or without costs. Americans have the awesome responsibility to insure to our children that same freedom our ancestors won for us. Such a responsibility makes hard decisions.

United Methodists are peace-loving people. The United Methodist Church opposes violence in any form for conflict resolution; however, "Christian realism leads us to be skeptical of any social plan or ideal that promises to remove violence from life." (Shinn, *Wars and Rumors of Wars*, p. 250)

The phenomenal developments of high technology in humanity's ability to wage war coupled with continued armed conflicts, particularly in the Middle East, gives pause to all Christians. These developments call for action, re-evaluation and restatement of positions related to defense.

We recognize the potential danger of a mercenary armed force to everyone's freedom, as evidenced by numerous recent military coups in other nations and, therefore, believe that an adequate armed force of concerned Christians is necessary to reduce this danger.

We call on all concerned United Methodists to support our elected officials, remind them of their duty to provide for the common defense and assure them that we, as God-fearing, freedom-loving people, will support them in this endeavor.

We call on United Methodists to join together to:

1. Call for an adequate defense system for our nation to insure the freedoms our ancestors established when they founded this nation.
2. Support our government in its charge to provide this defense.
3. Reaffirm our recognition of the right of conscientious objection as stated in the *United Methodist Church and Peace, 1968 General Conference*.
4. Support peacetime registration if this be the best course of action for our defense.
5. Consider supporting peacetime conscription if this be the best course of action for our defense.

Too often, pride, superiority, arrogance, and callousness, coupled with overkill potential, sophisticated war machines, chemical and germ warfare, tend to reduce

the ability to communicate between nations with concern for worth of individuals or societies.

Our United Methodist *Discipline* of 1980 (Par. 75C, in *The Social Principle*) states: "Human values must outweigh military claims as governments determine their priorities; ...the militarization of society must be challenged and stopped; ...the manufacture, sale, and deployment of armaments must be reduced and controlled; and ...the production, possession, or use of nuclear weapons (is to be) condemned."

As nations seek security in armaments and as fear builds between potential adversaries, defense preparations grow to grotesque proportions. Our 1980 General Conference Resolution on "The United Methodist Church and Peace" enunciates these principles:

"One hard fact must be stated bluntly: the arms race goes on, the momentum of the race never slackens, and the danger of a holocaust is imminent. Meanwhile, millions starve, development stagnates, and international cooperation is threatened. Increasingly sophisticated weapons systems accelerate arms spending and heighten anxieties without adding to the security of the nations. . .

"True priorities in national budgeting are distorted by present expenditures on weapons. Food health, social service jobs, and education are vital to the welfare of nations. Yet the availability of all these is constantly threatened because of the overriding priority given by governments to what is called 'defense.'

"If humanity is to move out of this period of futility and constant peril, the search for new weapons systems must be halted through comprehensive international agreements. The vast stockpiles of nuclear bombs and conventional weapons must be (mutually) dismantled under international supervision, and the resources used for arms must be diverted to programs designed to affirm life rather than destroy it.

"The goal of world disarmament, demanding a radical reordering of priorities and coupled with an effective system of international peacemaking, must be kept constantly before the peoples and governments by the Church." (1980 *Book of Resolutions*, pp. 212-213)

Both the U.S. and the U.S.S.R. already have arms sufficient not only to render our adversaries helpless but to exterminate all forms of life within their territory. When we could already do this many times over, nothing could be gained in security by obtaining more strategic arms. Inasmuch as neither could not inflict an unacceptable "death blow" with its remaining weapons, further missile buildups and sophistication are both futile and terribly wasteful, as well as inflationary.

Our church seeks to encourage government to try to further efforts to limit, reduce, and eliminate nuclear weapons. General Conference States: "We support the SALT (Strategic Arms Limitation Treaty) process in the hopes that future agreements will reduce the level of world armaments. . .

"In view of the delay in the SALT negotiations, we call upon the governments of the U.S.A. and the U.S.S.R.:

1. To make strenuous efforts to reestablish the SALT process.
2. To strengthen SALT II, amending it to include a mutual moratorium on all further testing, production, and deployment of new nuclear strategic weapons, and to prohibit the deployment of additional nuclear arms beyond present levels.
3. To conclude agreements requiring large and continuing reductions in Soviet and U.S. nuclear arsenals; and
4. To seek similar reductions in the nuclear weaponry of all nations as others join in the talks.

5. To institute a moratorium on all research and deployment of nuclear weapons systems during the SALT process." (1980 *Book of Resolutions*, pp. 196-197)

What Can We do?

1. Get informed. Read, study, get your local church to conduct studies and discussions. Ask your pastor to implement the materials in the special mailing from the C & S Board on the Quadrennial Program on Peace with Justice.
2. Inform others. Discuss these matters in your class and in other groups in your church. Write letters to the editors of newspapers, and us radio call-in shows.
3. Act. Write and visit your Congresspersons. Join the national IMPACT Program, and establish your own network in your local church and community. (Wirte IMPACT, 110 Maryland Ave., N.E., Washington, D.C. 20002. Telephone (202) 544-8636.

WAR, TERRORISM AND CRISIS RESOLUTION

To Christians everywhere, war, terrorism, and crisis resolution by force is intolerable. We deplore the situations of force, whether they be Palestine, Afghanistan, Iran-Iraq, racial, inner-city, or attempts to call attention to perceived injustices.

We call upon the nations of the world to utilize the existing United Nations or other international tribunals for the resolution of conflict rather than resorting to violence or threats of violence; and, further to repeal nationalistic reservations and limitations which impede or limit the scope and/or effectiveness of the United Nations and international courts.

We call upon the nations, individually, to develop or implement tribunals for the expression and solution of internal crisis without resort to force.

We call upon the nations, individually, to develop or implement tribunals for the expression and solution of internal crisis without resort to force.

We call upon the nations of the world, jointly and severally, to institute measures to limit the manufacture and export of arms designed for war, to the end that the manufacture, distribution, exportation and importation of such arms shall be ultimately and finally banned.

At the same time we call upon all Christians and all other persons of similar persuasion to recognize the futility of force, war, terrorism and lawlessness as a means of solving social, economic, political, or religious problems. We urge all to join United Methodists pledging every effort to use peaceful methods of solving crisis so that truly swords and spears can be beaten into plowshares and pruning hooks to feed the hungry of the world.

REPORT OF TASK FORCE ON CHURCH OF SMALL MEMBERSHIP TO 1981 ANNUAL CONFERENCE

Theological Statement

Being faithful to the gospel and fulfilling the theological purpose of the church are two functions that do not require a crowd. Based upon scripture and our United Methodist Heritage, we therefore affirm the church of small membership as a significant place of ministry and service.

Recommendations:

1. That consultations on the Church of Small Membership be held in four different locations throughout the Annual Conference on the four Saturdays in February, 1983, for pastors and laity of those churches with discussion on each issues as the following:
 - a) the joys and successes of the COSM
 - b) the appointive process and pastors in the COSM
 - c) the role of COSM persons in the Annual Conference
 - d) the District Superintendent and the COSM
 - e) financial criteria for COSMTo be planned, implemented, and funded by the Town and Country Committee of the Division of Missions in consultation with the Cabinet, CCOM, and the NC Parish Fellowship. A report from the consultations is to be referred to the Town and Country Committee for appropriate follow-up.
2. That the Bishop appoint a committee to evaluate existing policies relating to charge realignment and establish guidelines for implementation of the policy. The Committee is to be composed of equal representation from the Cabinet, the Town and Country Committee, Equitable Salaries Commission, and pastors and laity of COSM. This committee is to report back to the 1982 Annual Conference with recommendations for a Conference Policy and Guidelines. (after concurrence by the Cabinet, T & C Committee, and Equitable Salaries)
To be funded through the Town and Country Committee
3. That there be one Christian Workers School per year, specifically, for the Churches of Small Membership in each district. To be implemented by the DCOM.

4. That the January Workshops include at least one class each year for leaders of the Church of Small Membership.
5. That the Conference Leadership School provide at least one course each year for leaders of the COSM.

COMMITTEE ON COMMUNICATION

Conference Moves Into Video

In December 1980, the Conference Council on Ministries approved \$31,466 for the Committee on Communication to purchase video tape equipment. The equipment will enhance the ministries of our conference as a new tool to share the Good News of Jesus Christ and the United Methodist Church. The equipment provides the capabilities for developing video programs to report and interpret the work of the church. Each district can receive a \$375 grant, half the cost of a video player (1/2" VHS) for the conference distribution system of video resources.

At the March 1981 Committee on Communication meeting "Conference Video Priorities and Policies" were approved. Training will be held throughout the conference for Video Staff (specially trained persons with expertise in video).

The conference equipment has two formats, both are color; 3/4" tape format—broadcast/cablecast quality; and 1/2" tape format for "shoot and play," coverage of events and workshop use. The Rev. Robert K. Smith, Rocky Mount District Coordinator, chairs the committee's Video Task Force and is an equipment expert.

Committee Responsibilities Outlined

The Committee on Communication is composed of representatives from each district and three at-large members with communication expertise. We meet at least twice a year. Barbara J. Wilkinson, Communications Coordinator for the N.C. Conference, provides excellent leadership for our committee. We commend her dedicated service.

The work of the committee is in the following general areas:

1. Walton Memorial Media Center — audio visual resource library
2. Public Media — including news service
3. Communications training — video workshops, newsletter workshops, writing workshops; consultation is available for communication problems.
4. Communications within the Annual Conference — publication and distribution of interpretive information
5. Interpretation of benevolences of the General Church and Annual Conference — publication of "Budget News Sheet"
6. Liaison with the Methodist Board of Publication, publishers of the "North Carolina Christian Advocate."

CONFERENCE LAY LEADER'S REPORT

Bishop Cannon, members and guests of the North Carolina Annual Conference — it has been my pleasure to serve as your Conference Lay Leader during this past year.

I have attempted to meet all meetings that I have been expected to attend, with some exceptions which occurred as the result of conflicts.

I attended five District Lay Rallies, getting to know more lay persons around the conference. I represented laity at conferences and agency meetings, and generally tried to support lay involvement throughout the conference.

I have had full cooperation with all the Conference Council on Ministries staff. Any suggestions made to the Bishop and Cabinet have been well received and acted upon.

The Conference Lay Leader relates to the United Methodist Men, United Methodist Women and United Methodist Youth in a support role. United Methodist Women and Youth are well organized. All they need from a Conference Lay Leader is moral and verbal support. United Methodist Men have begun to pick up steam in their organizing efforts at conference and district level under the capable leadership of Dr. Allen Norris. It has been my pleasure to assist him whenever I could, and to take part at district and conference meetings. All the district lay leaders join me in strong and active support of United Methodist Men.

Our Lay Rallies were successful again this year. Early this Fall, District Lay Leaders will meet to plan for next year's activities. We will stress good planning, more involvement and establishment of annual awards and programs. At the suggestion of the Cabinet, and support of the Division of Lay Life and Work, we will be planning Lay Rallies next year so that they will not conflict with each other and the possibility will exist for an outstanding speaker to speak at each of the Lay Rallies.

In Addition, the District Lay Leaders will be considering a program of Lay Leadership Training stressing organization, program and history of the United Methodist Church. This is projected to be a complement to the existing program of training lay speakers.

This year, the Lay Rallies and the Laity have made an improvement in the number of Ten Dollar Club Members. The North Carolina Conference is still far short of a realistic number of Ten Dollar Club Members. This Conference ought to have 10,000 members. We must do more than talk about church extension in our district. I urge every lay member of the conference to go back to his or her church and actively promote membership in the Ten Dollar Club.

There is a second area in which we Laity have fallen short.

The Methodist Church is a democratic church. It appoints committees, commissions and boards and, usually, gives equal representation to Laity and Clergy on these various agencies. As I go to meetings of various boards and agencies, I find to my dismay that oftentimes our lay representatives are not present. I realize that there are complications of family and employment. The Conference agencies need input from their lay members. The Laity of this conference need an understanding of the agencies that comes from lay participation at the meetings and then a willingness to go back to your home church and explain the program and organization of your agency to that church.

The Laity of the North Carolina Annual Conference need to prayerfully consider our future role in Proclamation Evangelism. Proclamation Evangelism was not intended as a program for one year or a quadrennium. It was created many years

ago by the great commandment when Christ said to his followers "Go Ye into all the world." Proclamation Evangelism is not new — it is not a project of the church — it is the function of the church. We will be commencing a follow-up role in Proclamation Evangelism. This is called the next step — EACH ONE BRING ONE. It could not be better named.

In this modern world of high technology, specialized training, and the division of labor among specialists, it seems to me that we have come to believe that the Evangelism role of Church is assumed to be carried out by the specialists called Ministers, District Superintendents, Bishops and Evangelists. Noting could be further from the truth. They are the leader, and we are the army that eventually must win the kingdom.

Last summer at the SEJ Laity Rally at Lake Junaluska, one of the speakers stated that 60% of the church members had never shared their faith with any one. Let me say that another way — the average church member today — will not share their faith with another. This is the need for, and the basic of, "EACH ON BRING ONE."

Far too many lay persons are passive churchgoers — not active in an evangelistic manner. We must make lay evangelism a personal commitment expected of every Christian.

Across Methodism, it is accepted that Lay People are in ministry, called to Lay Ministry. Lay Ministry is to a large extent, Lay Evangelism. We have lost sight of the fact that a most effective evangelism is Lay Evangelism.

We tend to build lives seeking not to become involved. Yet becoming involved is the essence of Christianity. A recent survey indicated there are sixty million unchurched persons in these United States. Altogether too often, we live next door to an unchurched family and never invite them to attend our church. We work with unchurched persons in our employment and never consider inviting that person to our church. We go to clubs with unchurched fellow members, and we never think to invite them to our church. Lay Evangelism can be as simple as inviting a friend or an unchurched person to come visit in your Sunday School Class, Men's Club, Youth meeting, or to worship with you and in your church. When you invite that unchurched person to your church, you are actively in Evangelism. You are one of a team for you have the support of the minister, the choir, the program of the church, the officers, the leaders of your church who all stand with you. Your minister is happy to have visitors to church. Remember, it is that initial contact by a lay person bringing a visitor to church that makes the pastor's job of evangelism more effective.

We talk about a decline in church membership and, yet, I remember the words which rang in my ear at Lake Junaluska: "60% of the Church members never communicated their faith to another person."

Let not Lay Persons criticize any decline in the Methodist Church until we have invited someone to come with us to our Church. This is Proclamation Evangelism. There must never be another time when a member of the Methodist Church can stand up and say to a Methodist Lay group that 60% of you will never speak to another person of your faith.

When we realize that it is as easy as inviting someone to share the strength and faith our church, then we shall begin to realize how effective Proclamation Evangelism can be. Let us practice what we lay Persons talk about in Evangelism.

Let us go home from this Conference as Lay People committed to the fact that Proclamation Evangelism is our Lay Proclamation and our Lay Evangelism.

Let us return here next year to celebrate a successful Evangelistic — A lay Evangelistic Year.

CHARTER OF NORTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE Council on Ministries

In The North Carolina Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church an Annual Conference Council on Ministries shall be organized which will be referred to hereafter as The Council. **PURPOSE** - The purpose of The Council shall be: (a) to receive program recommendations from local churches, district agencies, Annual Conference agencies, and the Jurisdictional and General Council on Ministries; (b) to develop these recommendations into a coordinated program to be recommended to the Annual Conference for consideration, amendment, and adoption as the Annual Conference program, and (c) to provide implementation for and administration of the coordinated program as adopted by the Conference.

MEMBERSHIP - The membership of The Annual Conference Council on Ministries shall consist of the presiding bishop; the district superintendents; representatives of Conference agencies as determined by the Conference; The Conference Secretary; two representatives of the Conference youth organization; two representatives (one to be the president) of the United Methodist Women; the Conference Lay Leader; two representatives of the Conference United Methodist Men, one of whom shall be the president or his designate; two young adults; one representative

of the United Methodist Campus Ministers, one lay person from each district, members of General Council on Ministries and such additional members as the Annual Conference may determine.

The following agencies shall be represented in the Conference Council by the chairperson:

- Board of Church and Society
- Board of Diaconal Ministry
- Board of Education
- Board of Evangelism
- Board of Health and Welfare Ministries
- Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry
- Board of the Laity
- Board of Missions
- Board of Ordained Ministry
- Board of Pensions
- Board of Stewardship
- Board of Trustees
- Board of Worship
- Commission on Archives and History
- Commission on Christian Unity and Interreligious Concerns
- Commission on Equitable Salaries
- Commission on Religion and Race
- Commission on Status and Role of Women
- Commission on Budget
- Commission on Communication
- Commission on Council Staff Personnel
- Council on Children's Ministries
- Council on Youth Ministries
- Council on Young Adult Ministries
- Council on Adult and Family Life Ministries
- Methodist Foundation

OTHER MEMBERS - The following shall be members of The Council without vote: Salaried and volunteer Annual Conference Staff, Conference Treasurer - Business Administrator, Chairperson of The Council on Finance and Administration, Conference Missionary Secretary, Executive Director of the Methodist Home for Children, and Executive Director of the Methodist Retirement Homes, Inc.

OFFICERS — The officers of The Council shall be a Chairperson, a Vice-Chairperson, and a Secretary. They shall be elected by The Council.

THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE shall be composed of the following: Chairperson of the Council on Ministries, Vice-chairperson of the Council on Ministries, Secretary of the Council on Ministries, Bishop, Director of The Council, one Superintendent, Member(s) of General Council on Ministries, Lay Leader, President of United Methodist Women, President of United Methodist Men, President of Conference United Methodist Youth Fellowship, the Chairperson of the Committee on Budget, the Chairperson of the Committee on Council Staff Personnel, and two At Large Members to be appointed by the Bishop. Approximately one-half of the members of the Executive Committee shall be lay persons.

The Executive Committee shall be amendable to The Council and shall exercise ad-

ministrative, counseling, and research and planning functions for The Council. The Chairperson of the Executive Committee may appoint any of The Council Staff Members to serve in a counseling relationship with any Board or Agency responsible to The Council.

COMMITTEES - The Council shall institute the following Committees: Committee on Communication, Committee on Budget, Committee on Program Coordination, Committee on Council Staff Personnel, and four Age Level Councils. It may institute other committees as may be deemed essential to the effective discharge of its responsibilities.

DIRECTOR - The Council shall elect, upon nomination by the Bishop and District Superintendents, an executive officer, to be known as the Conference Council Director. The Director shall be in consultative relationship to the Conference Cabinet on matters relating to correlation, implementation, and administration of the Conference Program and other matters as the Cabinet may determine.

STAFF - All Annual Conference Program Staff shall be employed by, and amenable to The Council, and shall be known as the Conference Council Staff. The staff shall be under the supervision of the Council Director. Ordained ministers on the staff are subject to being appointed by the presiding Bishop. The council shall be authorized to employ adequate and qualified personnel to implement the work of The Council on Ministries.

RELATIONSHIPS - The Council shall have the following relationships, including the amenities indicated.

1. All Annual Conference program boards and agencies shall cooperate with and be amenable between sessions of the Annual Conference to the Council on Ministries of the Annual Conference in matters relating to the development, implementation, and administration of the program.
2. All Annual Conference agencies shall submit the elements of program which are to be promoted in, supported by, or implemented by the local churches of the Conference to The Council for consideration, coordinating and calendaring prior to presentation to the local churches. The Council may request District or Annual Conference agencies to implement a program for the entire conference.
3. The Council staff shall be responsible, in cooperation with the district superintendents, for the implementation of the Conference program.
4. The Council may develop and carry out a program of Conference Advance Special Giving.
5. For the purpose of having the most effective leadership at strategic administration levels each District shall have a District Council on Ministries composed of the following: the District Superintendent, District Lay Leader, District President of United Methodist Women, District President of United Methodist Youth Fellowship, District President of United Methodist Men coordinator (for Adult and Family Life, Young Adults, Youth, and Children's Ministries), Work Area Chairperson, District Representative on Conference Council on Ministries, and others deemed necessary who shall be selected by the District Superintendent unless otherwise provided for by The Discipline. These persons shall be expected to work closely with the District Superintendent in providing effective leadership for the entire Conference and district Programs as they relate to District promotion and cultivation.

6. Adequate secretarial service for staff functions shall be provided by The Council. However, even though a secretary is assigned to a particular office, all secretaries are employees of The Council, not a particular Board or Staff Person.

FUNCTIONS - The functions of the Annual Conference Council on Ministries are:

1. To study the mission of the Annual Conference and the local churches of the Conference, and to determine program emphases which will assist the Conference and the local churches to perform their mission.
2. To describe, coordinate, and organize opportunities to serve within the mission.
3. To receive program recommendations from the local churches, the District and Annual Conference agencies, and the Jurisdictional and General Councils on Ministries; to evaluate these recommendations; and to formulate a coordinated Conference program to be presented to the Annual Conference for consideration.
4. To provide for implementation and administration of the program adopted by the Conference.
5. To provide program resources and assistance in program planning and implementation for local churches.
6. To provide staff personnel for implementing and administering the Conference program.
7. To promote principles of good communication within the Conference to provide two-way channels of communication between Annual Conference agencies, District Councils on Ministries, and local churches, and to lead the Conference in making creative use of communications and opportunities offered by modern mass media, including Conference and General church periodicals and resources and to offer counsel in public relations and conduct public relations activities for the Conference.
8. To provide communications training opportunities for leaders in the Annual Conferences and the local churches.
9. To interpret the programs of the General church and the Annual Conference to the local churches and to promote all General and Conference benevolent causes in cooperation with the standing General Commission on Communications.
10. To give leadership in research and planning for the Conference and to cooperate with other research and planning agencies.
11. To cooperate in ecumenical projects and events which have been approved by the Conference.
12. To study and coordinate the budget askings of the Conference agencies as they relate to the Conference program and to make recommendations regarding the same to The Council on Finance and Administration.
13. To interpret the Conference program to the local churches with a view toward gaining the financial support needed in order to implement that program.
14. To provide for relationships with the media within the Conference, including newspapers, radio and television; take initiative in television programming at the Conference level, and give counsel to districts and local churches concerning television, utilizing the resources of the General Commission on Communication; provide for the use of videotape or videodisk within the Conference; perform public relations functions for the Con-

ference and assist in the public relations of agencies and institutions of the Conference.

15. To provide guidance and training for district leaders and groups to support their various tasks with local churches and in their district and/or Annual Conference responsibilities.
16. To inform the general program agencies of the names of those Annual Conference agencies that provide for program responsibilities related to the objectives and scope of the general program agencies.

MEETINGS - The Council shall meet at least two times during the church year with such additional meetings as may be called by the Chairperson or Executive Committee.

Meetings of the Executive Committee shall be held as deemed necessary by the Chairperson or the Council Director.

COUNCIL COMMITTEES

A COMMITTEE ON COMMUNICATION, composed of a representative from each district and three at-large members with expertise in communication, shall be organized by and amenable to the Conference Council on Ministries.

This Committee shall assist the Council in the functions listed above: 7, 8, 9, 13, and 14. The work of the Committee falls into the following general areas: the Walton Memorial Media Center; Public Media, including a news service; communication training; communication within the Annual Conference; interpretation of benevolences; and liaison with the Methodist Board of Publication.

Funds for this Committee shall be provided by the Conference through the Council on Ministries budget.

A COMMITTEE ON BUDGET of six members with the Director ex officio shall be organized by and amenable to the Conference Council on Ministries.

It shall receive budget askings from boards and other agencies for program implementation and after coordinating them shall make recommendations to the Council on Ministries concerning budget askings. The Committee shall submit the Budget as approved by the Council on Ministries to the Council on Finance and Administration. After receiving and considering staff salary recommendations from the Committee on Council Staff Personnel, the Budget Committee shall recommend to the Council on Ministries at its last meeting of the calendar year a salary schedule for the staff for the following calendar year. In the case of new staff persons the salary must be approved by the Budget Committee in consultation with the Cabinet. Upon recommendation of the Director of the Council on Ministries, the Committee shall consider and set the salaries of the support staff.

Funds for this Committee shall be provided in the budget of the Council on Ministries.

A COMMITTEE ON PROGRAM COORDINATION composed of a representative from each of the Board, a representative from Commissions on Religion and Race and the Status and Role of Women, the District Superintendents, and the Council Staff. It shall be organized by and be amenable to the Conference Council on Ministries.

Meetings - Not more than two Council meetings and two additional meetings of an executive committee (to be elected by The Council) may be held annually.

Funding - Expenses incurred in Council meetings shall be paid by The Council on Ministries. Expenses of the Executive Committee are to be paid by COM.

A COMMITTEE ON COUNCIL STAFF PERSONNEL - A Committee on Council Staff Per-

sonnel shall be composed of eight persons, of whom two shall be district superintendents, named by the Bishop. The Council Director shall be ex officio without vote.

The Committee shall confer and counsel with the Council Staff to make effective ministry possible. It shall receive reports concerning the work of the Council Staff Personnel and shall evaluate their effectiveness. It shall make recommendations to the Council concerning the delineation of areas of responsibility of the staff members in consultation with the Director. It shall make nominations for staff positions to the Council on Ministries annually. where staff members are subject to episcopal appointment, the Committee shall confere with the Bishop and the Cabinet concerning their nomination. It shall present its recommendations to the Budget Committee after consultations with the Council Director and individual staff members. It shall consider other items of staff support and concern, such as vacation, housing, continuing education, and other compensations. This committee shall also function as a Personnel Committee in relation to the Council Support Staff.

Funds for this committee shall be provided in the budget of the Council on Ministries.

AGE LEVEL COUNCILS

Purpose - There shall be organized within the Conference, by the Council on Ministries, four Age-Level Councils (Children, Youth, Young Adults, Adult and Family Life) whose purpose shall be to aid in making possible a wholistic approach to ministry in all areas of work.

Duties - (1) To serve as a think tank for boards and agencies which make recommendations through the Conference Council on Ministries to Annual Conference. (2) To present to each board or agency (for consideration for inclusion in its Annual program recommendations) any items which pertain to its area of responsibility. (3) To implement any programs related to its age level when requested to do so by the individual board or agency.

COUNCIL ON CHILDREN'S MINISTRIES - Membership shall be composed of one representative from each of the following agencies: Church and Society, Education, Evangelism, Missions, Stewardship, Worship, Christian Unity and Inter-religious Concerns, Health and Welfare Ministries; one Director of Christian Education; one Director of Music; the conference Coordinator of Children's Ministries; and the Coordinator of Children's Ministries from each District.

Officers - A chairperson and such officers as deemed necessary shall be elected from the group. The chairperson shall be a member of the Council on Ministries.

Executive Committee composed of eight persons including the Council chairperson and the Conference Coordinator shall be elected to do initial planning for the Council.

Meetings - Not more than two Council meetings and two additional executive committee meetings may be held annually.

Funding - Expenses incurred in Council and Executive Committee meetings shall be paid by the Council on Ministries.

COUNCIL ON YOUTH MINISTRIES - There shall be a Conference Council on Youth Ministries composed of both youth and adults. Its purpose shall be to strengthen the youth ministry in local churches and districts of the Annual Conference. For administrative purposes, the Council shall be related to the Council on Ministries.

Membership shall be composed of the following: The 12 District Coordinators of

Youth Ministries; the five elected Conference youth officers; seven at-large members chosen by the five elected Conference youth officers; one person from each district elected at district caucuses at ACS; four junior high chosen by participants at Jr. High Events.

Officers - A chairperson and such other officers as deemed necessary shall be elected from the group. The chairperson shall be a member of the Council on Ministries.

Meetings - Not more than two Council meetings and two additional meetings of an executive committee (to be elected by The Council) may be held annually.

Funding - Expenses incurred in Council meetings shall be paid by The Council on Ministries. Expenses of the Executive Committee are to be paid by COM.

COUNCIL ON YOUNG ADULT MINISTRIES

Membership shall be composed of the following:

The District Coordinators of Young Adult Ministries, and either one lay person or one clergyperson from each district so that there will be one lay person and one clergyperson from each district. (one of whom shall be a young adult), to be nominated by the District Superintendent.

Officers - A chairperson, a secretary and such other officers deemed necessary shall be elected from the group. The chairperson shall be a member of the Conference Council on Ministries.

Executive Committee - Composed of six members including the Council Chairperson and the conference Coordinator of Adult Ministries.

Meetings - Not more than two Council meetings and two additional meetings of the Executive Committee may be held annually.

Funding - Expenses incurred in Council and Executive Committee meetings shall be paid by the Council on Ministries.

COUNCIL ON ADULT AND FAMILY LIFE MINISTRIES

Membership shall be composed of the following;

A District Coordinator of Adult and/or Family Life Ministries from each District; one representative from each of the following: United Methodist Women, United Methodist Men, Commission on Religion and Race; Commission on Status and Role of Women, Church and Society, Christian Unity and Interreligious Concerns, Education, Evangelism, The Laity, Missions, Worship, and the Conference Coordinator of Adult and Family Life Ministries.

Officers - A chairperson and such other officers deemed necessary shall be elected from the group. The chairperson shall be a member of the Council on Ministries.

Executive Committee - Composed of eight persons including the Council Chairperson, with the Conference Coordinator, shall be elected to do initial planning for the Council.

Meeting - Not more than two Council meetings and two additional Executive Committee meetings may be held annually.

Funding - Expenses incurred in Council and Executive Committee meetings shall be paid by the Council on Ministries.

1. That the local church shall consider developing children's stewardship awareness programs. (Stewardship)
2. That each local church consider a one evening family study on the biblical basic for Christian Stewardship. Material for this study can be secured through the Conference Division of Stewardship. (Stewardship)
3. That each local church COM shall consider developing a plan for increasing enrollment in Church School at children, youth and adult levels. (Evangelism)
- EMLC 4. That each local charge Pastor-Parish Relations Committee shall consider how they can prepare to receive pastors without regard to race, ethnic origin, sex, or color; consistent with the commitment to open itinerancy. [Paragraph 527, 1980 Book of Discipline] (COSROW)
- EMLC 5. That each local church shall consider studying the History of Black and Native American United Methodists using the books "To Be True To Our Heritage," "The Only Land I Know," and "To A Higher Glory."

13. That each local church encourage its members to contribute to Chapels for Mentally Retarded at State Centers through a publicized offering, or through other means. (Church and Society)
14. That each local church shall consider writing and/or updating its church history by January 1, 1984, the bicentennial year of American Methodism and sending a copy to the Conference Office on Archives and History. (Archives and History)
15. That the local church shall consider electing a local church historian and designating that person as an at large member of the Administrative Board, if not already a member in another capacity. (Archives and History)

D. CONTINUING PROGRAMS TO BE CONSIDERED FOR IMPLEMENTATION

1. That each local church shall consider supporting the speaking contest on World Peace in the local High Schools. (Church and Society)
2. That the local church consider having a Vacation Church School and consider evening classes for youth and adults as well as children. (Education)
3. That the local church consider leading the congregation in ministry in local jails and correction centers, with consideration given to the Yokefellow program. (Church and Society)
4. That the local church consider ministering to area migrants using the services of the Migrant Farm Workers Association in Raleigh, and the Migrant Law Project. (Legal Services of North Carolina, P.O. box 6505, Raleigh, N.C. 27628) (Church and Society)
5. (a) That the local church shall consider having one or more of the recommended church-wide studies for 1982 either alone or with a cluster grouping of churches with cooperation between the Work Area on Missions Chairperson and the Coordinator of Global Concerns of United Methodist Women. (Missions)
(b) That the local church consider mission studies for children and youth using the mission study materials in conjunction with the church-wide study or at some other time, i.e., Sunday School hour, Vacation Church School, etc. (Missions)
6. That the local church consider accepting at least one project in the following categories of the Advance: World Division, National Division, UMCOR, and Conference Advance Specials for support and adopt a time schedule for rendering this support. (Missions)
7. That the local church consider observing a College Awareness Day in November for the purpose of making high school students aware of the opportunities available for continuing their education at United Methodist related colleges and universities in North Carolina. That each District Council on Ministries consider the need for and the means of establishing a new ethnic minority congregation in the district following the guidelines for establishing new churches adopted by the Annual Conference. To be implemented by the District Council on Ministries. (Ethnic Minority Local Church)
6. That each District shall consider having a 3-hour Visitation Team Training Event to train at least 6-8 teams of youth in the district and one team of adults from each local church how to share their faith through visitation evangelism, with these teams then to train others in their respective local churches. To be held in March, 1982. To be implemented by the District Council on Ministries in cooperation with the Division of Evangelism. (Evangelism)
7. That the District Council on Ministries consider having a District Spiritual Life Retreat involving both clergy and laity. To be implemented by the District Committee on Lay Life and work in cooperation with the District Council on Ministries. (Lay Life and Work)
- B. CONTINUING PROGRAMS TO BE CONSIDERED FOR IMPLEMENTATION
1. That the District Council on Ministries consider having a Mission Saturation Event, Operation Understanding, or a district program to explain the denomination's benevolence program and opportunities for involvement in mission. To be implemented by the District Council on Ministries, with assistance from the Committee on Communication and the Division of Missions. (Missions - Advance)
2. That each District shall consider holding a Benevolence Interpretation/Stewardship Event for the purpose of promoting an interpreting the Conference Outreach Ministry — Fair Share Askings; these events to be held in each district during late July, August, or September, 1982. 3. That the District Council on Ministries consider having workshops, seminars, or classes which focus on one or more of the following family concerns: Marriage and Family Enrichment, Child Abuse, The Church's Ministry to Families in the 1980's, Resources for Children, Youth, and Family (locally and through the Methodist Home for

- Children), Planning for Aging Parents, Abuse of the Elderly. To be implemented by the District Council on Ministries and the Council on Adult and Family Life. (Health and Welfare Ministries)
4. That the District Council on Ministries shall consider having a workshop on the three current church-wide studies in the early fall of 1982 for the purpose of training local church leaders. Arrangements for the workshops shall be made by a District Mission Committee composed of the District Missions Secretary as Chairperson, the District UMW Coordinator of Global Concerns, the District Coordinator of Communications, the District Superintendent, and other District Coordinators whose area may be related to the current church-wide studies. To be implemented by the District COM. (Division of Missions)
 5. That the District Council on Ministries consider promoting the resettlement of a refugee family, perhaps using a cluster of local churches. Information can be obtained from the Refugee Sponsorship Development Coordinantor, North Carolina Council on Church, Box 6637, College Station, Durham, N.C. 27708. To be implemented by the District Council on Ministries. (Church and Society)
 6. That the District COM consider having a Young Adult Weekend on Simplified Lifestyles in the fall. To be implemented by the District COM in cooperation with the Conference Council on Young Adult Ministries. (Division of Education)
 7. That the District Council on Ministries shall consider continuing workshops for summertime models for ministries with children to be implemented by the District Council. (Education)
 8. That the District Council on Ministries consider organizing Lay/Clergy Work Teams in the district to help repair houses of people in need. To be implemented by the District Council on Ministries. (Idea from Rockingham DCOM) (Lay Life and Work)
 9. That the District Council on Ministries consider having a Lay Rally. To be implemented by the District Committee on Lay Life and Work with assistance from the District Council on Ministries. (Lay Life and Work)
 10. That the District Council on Ministries consider providing basic and advanced training for lay speakers. To be implemented by the District Committee on Lay Life and Work in cooperation with the District Council on Ministries and with assistance from the Conference Division of Lay Life and Work. (Lay Life and Work)

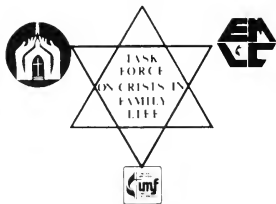

This professional assistance is available through referral or on a voluntary basis, with a portion of the cost to be assumed by the Committee on Pastoral Care. The Committee will assume a total of \$250.00 per family, per calendar year, which will include up to \$30.00 for the first visit and up to \$25.00 for testing. The remainder of the amount from the \$200.00 or \$250.00 limit is to be used to pay one-half of the cost of each additional visit until the appropriate limit is reached. The names of those receiving this help will be anonymous with the submitted bills stating only that "a minister" (and/or his/her family) has been to the agency or the individual counselor.

That Pastors and their families having financial problems be encouraged to seek professional help (at no cost) through Consumer Credit Counseling Service in Raleigh or Wilmington.

REPORT OF THE TASK FORCE ON THE CRISES IN FAMILY LIFE

We recommend that The Task Force on the Crises in Family Life be established for the 1980-84 quadrennium. The Task Force shall:

1. Investigate areas of need within the North Carolina Annual Conference by developing a means of need assessments which can be utilized by the local church. Assess also the various ministries which are already being utilized by local churches, districts and conference, in the area of family life.
2. Provide resources which would be utilized by local churches including public and private resources of materials and personnel as well as design resources and ministries which can be implemented by local churches, districts and conferences.
3. Provide leadership development for ministers and lay persons which will enable them to utilize resources and implement ministries in local churches, districts and the Conference.
4. In accordance with the 1980 General Conference *Ethnic Minority Local Church Missional Priority* we can take advantage of resources in our local conference ethnic minority local churches to develop special family life ministries, including investigating needs, leadership development, and resources designed for the EMLC.
5. In accordance with the 1980 General Conference emphasis on *Strengthening the Local Church for Evangelistic Mission in the World*, we can design and implement ministries which will help the local church emphasize and strengthen its ministry in the area of family life and its evangelistic mission. The 1980 *Book of Resolutions* states, "A Christian family, as a form of the church in the world, becomes a source for the churches ministry to the world. As a part of the Christian community, family members, individually and collectively seek to fulfill their mission by witnessing and serving in a variety of ways in the community, state, nation and world. Families need the church to help them recognize and improve the many ways in which they witness to what God has done for them in Christ, as well as what God can do for others and for society."
6. In accordance with a petition submitted by the United Methodist National Youth Ministry Organization to the 1980 General Conference stating, "our concern for the family also extends to family and worship, premarital counseling, human sexuality, family violence, divorce and interpersonal relationships. . ." we can investigate needs, develop leadership, design and implement ministries and resources that would speak to our youths' concern about family life.

BOARD OF DIACONAL MINISTRY

Lay persons who work full time, twenty-one hours or more per week, for the church, who have met the educational and personal standards, can become Diaconal Ministers in The United Methodist Church. It is the ultimate commitment of a lay person called into full time service to the church.

At the present time, there are 18 Diaconal Ministers in the North Carolina Conference. Four persons will be recommended at the 1981 meeting of the Annual Conference.

We are pleased to be recommending the second Native American in the United Methodist Church to be consecrated into Diaconal Ministry. He is Harold Jacobs who holds certification in Music and Education and is the first Native American to have made this achievement. Other persons to be recommended are: David Anthony Argo, Leslie Ann Castle, and Barbara Eve Estes.

The Board of Diaconal Ministry has had a most successful year maintaining the certification of 15 Directors of Music, 14 Directors of Christian Education, 2 Associates in Christian Education, and one Minister of Education.

This Committee has worked closely with each of these persons maintaining high levels of professional work and spiritual growth. We have also given support to persons in the certified areas of Business Administration and in the United Methodist Home Administration.

Ms. Pamela Baker Lineberger is being recommended as a Director of Christian Education.

JOINT COMMITTEE ON DISABILITY

The Joint Committee on Disability acts as the advocate of those ministers in the North Carolina Conference who are forced by physical or emotional disability to seek temporary or permanent relief from their appointment. The committee is given the responsibility to study the problems of disability within the Conference, to provide a continuing personal ministry to those who are disabled, and to make recommendations to the appropriate agencies of the Conference for each minister seeking Disability Leave, including the source of their disability income.

The following recommendations are presented to the 1981 Session of the North Carolina Conference:

1. The Joint Committee on Disability will make available upon request the necessary forms for any minister to make application for Disability Leave. In all cases the applications must be completed by the minister, the physician, and the district superintendent before the request for Disability Leave can be acted upon. It is the recommendation of the Joint Committee on Disability that such requests be presented before May 15 for inclusion in the committee's report to the Annual Conference Session.
2. The Joint Committee on Disability may require physiological and psychological examinations when deemed necessary by the committee. These will be done by a physician approved by the committee, and in such a case the committee may share the expense of the examination in an amount not to exceed \$100.00.
3. The Joint Committee on Disability will study each application for Disability Leave submitted by ministers of the Conference to determine the recommendation of the minister's physician and district superintendent, particularly as it reflects the anticipated length of the minister's disability. We recommend the payment of support funds for those ministers deemed temporarily disabled (or able to return to their appointment within the Conference year) from the Emergency Relief Fund and those who are deemed permanently disabled from the disability provisions of the Board of Pensions. Any minister receiving funds from the Emergency Relief Fund and recommended to be continued on Disability Leave for a second year will then receive support payments from the disability provisions of the Board of Pensions. Beginning in January, 1982, disability benefits will be paid through the new Comprehensive Protection Plan.
4. We recommend that appropriations from the Emergency Relief Fund, continuing with the 1981-82 Conference year, be the same as those from the Board of Pensions; that is, based on one-third of the average salary of the North Carolina Conference through December 31, 1981. Beginning on January 1, 1982, the appropriation will be 40% of Denominational Average Salary. In addition to the basic support funds, the cost of the minister's coverage under the Conference insurance program, hospitalization and life insurance, and appropriate pensions costs, will be paid in full, and an interim monthly grant of \$250.00 will be made for the first five months a minister is granted Disability leave, or until Social Security benefits become effective, whichever is first. Support payments from the Emergency Relief Fund will become effective on the date the minister is granted Disability Leave by the Bishop and are payable at the end of each month.

5. The Joint Committee on Disability will review the progress of each minister on Disability Leave at least annually. This review will include both recommendations from the minister's physician and district superintendent as well as opportunities for continuing fellowship with the minister to develop further possibilities of assistance in his/her disabled circumstances. Those receiving aid from the Emergency Relief Fund will be reviewed at the end of their first six months of Disability Leave.
6. We recommend that the expenses of travel, telephone, postage, and other materials for the committee be paid from the Emergency Relief Fund.
7. We recommend that the North Carolina Conference enter into the Ministers Reserve Pension Fund of the General Board of Pensions under Plan 1-B for the period July 1, 1981 through December 31, 1981, and support the North Carolina Conference Board of Pensions action in this matter. The smaller cost of protecting the needs of our disabled ministers through participation in the Disability and Survivor Benefit Fund of the General Board of Pensions is critical as we look forward to full participation in the Comprehensive Protection Plan after January 1, 1982. This recommendation will cost approximately \$75,000 to fund benefits that actuarial determination has set at nearly \$500,000, but will be covered by funds already on hand in the North Carolina Board of Pensions account.
8. We recommend the following ministers to be placed on Disability Leave for the first time:

It is further recommended that housing needs and other special problems of our disabled ministers be considered by these congregations and communities in the light of the contribution made to our United Methodist Church by those on disability during their years of service.

We can all become better stewards of the gift of life and skill as we share in this ministry of caring and concern.

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S COMPOSITE REPORT FOR 1980

The members of our esteemed Bishop William R. Cannon's Cabinet present this composite report of our pilgrimage through 1980. As the writer of Hebrews stated in the eleventh chapter: "We are pilgrims and strangers on the earth seeking a better country, that is, a heavenly one." This is the significance of all the blessed events that have occurred this past year. We are walking hand in hand with God as we direct our paths toward our eternal habitations: the Kingdom of God. The Kingdom begins now, however, as we make Christ King of our lives. Over and over again this past year our dedicated pastors and laypeople have accomplished splendid tasks for King Jesus.

Listen to our shared successes for Christ our Lord: new parsonages have been completed at Davis St. Church in Burlington at a cost of \$110,000, University Church in Chapel Hill (\$115,000), South Camden (\$57,000), Wrightsboro (\$50,000), Sharon in the Wilmington District (\$50,000), as well as the Cavel Church in Roxboro. Additions or renovations were made at Mann's Harbor, Brogden-Falling Creek, Carthage, Robbins, Williamston, Robersonville, and Vanceboro Circuit. Dedication services were held for the \$48,000 parsonage at Jefferson Church in Goldsboro, and the \$68,000 parsonat at Gillburg. There are plans for the purchase of a parsonage on the Tyrrell Charge.

New church buildings were constructed at Friendship in Burlington at a cost of \$425,000, East Rockingham (\$¼ million), Sandy Plains (\$150,000), St. Luke in Laurinburg (\$110,000), and St. Paul in Rocky Mount relocated their church at a cost of \$350,000. Churches were also built at Hubert and St. Luke in Burlington, and Pin Valley in Jacksonville will hold its groundbreaking service on June 14, 1981.

Educational buildings and/or fellowship halls were built throughout the Conference during 1980 with a cost of close to \$2 million. They were built at First Church in Cary, Center in the Sanford District, Moyock, Black's Chapel in the Fayetteville District, Franklin Memorial at Morehead City, Providence on the Warren Charge, Zora Chapel, Flat Rock on the Vance Charge, Shiloh in the Burlington District, Salem in the Greenville District, New Zion at Pembroke, Tabernacle in the Rockingham District, Smith in the Rocky Mount District, Epeorth in the Wilmington

District, Calvary Memorial at Snow Hill, and a \$640,000 building at St. Mark's in Raleigh. A most progressive move was made in the relocation of the Aldersgate Church in Durham.

Many renovations and remodelings have taken place in our church buildings including the three churches on the Sanford Circuit, Bell Arthur, Hampstead, Selma, Smith's in the Rocky Mount District, Washington: First, Rhems on the Beech Grove Charge, Pleasanton, Newland, St. John's on the Kinnakeet Charge, Wanchese, and Providence on the Warren Charge.

Debts have been retired and dedication services held for sanctuaries and educational buildings at Erwin (\$½ million), Chapel Hill: Amity (\$¼ million) as well as Siler City, Center in Sanford District, Grace Church in Clinton, Graham: First, and Cotton Church in the Fayetteville District, where the church members did most of the construction work. Wesley Memorial Church in Wilmington retired its debt of \$300,000. A fellowship hall was dedicated at Indian Springs, and Camp Ground Church in Fayetteville dedicated a \$300,000 educational building.

New organs have been purchased at Warsaw, St. James in Tarboro, and Wesley Memorial in Wilmington at a cost of \$125,000.

Many innovative programs have succeeded in our Conference with special mention to the sponsoring of a Vietnamese Refugee family in Edenton, Native American exceptional ministries at Coharie Mission and at Calvary and Trinity Churches in Fayetteville. A mobile home is now being used for the Lighthouse U.M. Church Ministry Worship Center in Aberdeen. The Rocky Mount District had a Pastor-Spouse Retreat at Camp Willow Run with the theme: "Burn-Out." Marvin Church instituted a tape ministry. A Native American Council was organized in the Rockingham District to develop and strengthen Native American churches. A Black Church Development program was also strongly implemented in that district. The Rockingham District likewise had a Leader Project which engaged twenty pastors in four training events to enhance their knowledge, skills and attitudes. The Raleigh District organized ten cluster groups of ministers and spouses for fellowship. The Greenville District sponsored a clergy work team retreat in Lumberton to repair flood-damaged homes through the Robeson County Church and Community Center. The New Bern District hired a program consultant to work with small membership churches for planning and training events. The Raleigh District had a work project which enlisted 17 ministers to paint and stain Cokesbury Church. Eleven ministers also painted "The Ark" which is the Center for the Raleigh Area Ministries.

Financially we paid the largest amount ever for Outreach Ministries Fair Share, as well as the highest percentage of payments of askings: \$4.6 million with a 96.4% payment. We have averaged a \$1 million per year for the pension program the last two years, and have raised very close to \$1 million more in 1980 than 1979 in total money raised.

Although our Conference showed a net loss of 329 members in evangelism; we were heartened to see that we received 316 more persons on profession of faith than last year. We likewise are encouraged by Bishop Cannon's emphasis on evangelism. Bishop Cannon states that "we **must** take seriously our loss." We are under orders from on high to win human souls to Christ — that is Christ's **urgent** appeal to pastors and laypeople.

The members of the Cabinet join me in expressing our appreciation for the wise and superb leadership of our world-renowned Bishop William R. Cannon. He has blessed clergy and laypeople alike with his wit, his friendship, his warmth, and

his keen intellect. "Bishop Cannon, it's a joy and a delight to have you as our episcopal leader!"

We began our report speaking of our pilgrimage through life with God. We pray that the gifts of time, offerings, and talents that we return to God somehow express to God our deep love and thanksgiving to Him for his boundless goodness to us, and especially for the gift of Christ our Lord. "Thanks be to God for His inexpressible gift." Amen and Amen.

THE DUKE ENDOWMENT

Less than two years after the death of James B. Duke, the founder of The Duke Endowment, a writer by the name of John Wilbur Jenkins published a book entitled *James B. Duke, Master Builder*. In his book he makes the following reference to Mr. Duke's concern for religion: "Lastly, he made provision for what he considered 'a very fertile and much neglected field for useful help in religious life' — assisting aged ministers and the widows and children of clergymen, and aiding in the building and maintenance of churches in rural districts. 'Indeed, my observation of the broad expanse of our territory makes me believe,' he said, 'it is to the rural districts that we are to look in a large measure for the bone and sinew of our country.'"

In the fifty-seven years since Mr. Duke's death, the Rural Church Division of The Duke Endowment has been at work to fulfill that commitment in rural United Methodist Churches in North Carolina. The purpose of this report is to indicate very briefly some of the areas, particularly new areas, in which The Duke Endowment has endeavored to fulfill concerns of Mr. Duke as expressed in the Indenture.

In the fall of 1980, representatives from the Rural Church Division invited the Cabinets from the North Carolina Conference and the Western North Carolina Conference to come and spend one and one-half days in Durham to meet with representatives from The Duke Endowment and Duke Divinity School to explore how The Duke Endowment might better serve the two Annual Conferences. The Bishops also used part of the time to hold regularly scheduled Cabinet meetings. These sessions proved to be extremely beneficial to all involved.

For some time it has been a concern of the Trustees of The Duke Endowment, and particularly the Rural Church Division, that rural churches across the state did not really understand The Duke Endowment or how its programs might benefit them. Out of this concern a plan was devised by which representatives from the Trustees and staff members of The Duke Endowment would hold District Meetings across the two Annual Conferences to talk about the work of The Duke Endowment. Representatives with responsibilities in various areas try to share what they do with the rural pastors and lay people, and encourage the churches to avail themselves of the services. By the end of 1981 representatives from rural churches in all of the districts of the two Annual Conferences will have had an opportunity to hear this presentation.

For more than ten years before the Indenture was signed, Mr. Duke had made money available each year to be distributed to what he called "worn-out" preachers, and widows and children of deceased ministers. This procedure was incorporated in the Indenture, and each year in December the retired pastors and widows and children of deceased ministers receive a gift based on the number of

years the pastor served in the Annual Conference. In recent years that amount has been somewhere between \$17 and \$18 Per Service Year. Recognizing the inadequacy of retirement benefits for clergy, the Trustees of The Duke Endowment in December 1980 increased the Per Service Year grant to \$21.

A significant pilot program has been initiated this past year in Caswell County. It represents the work of a consortium of the Z. Smith Reynolds Foundation, the Kate B. Reynolds Health Care Trust and The Duke Endowment. This project is designed to assist the elderly with access to health care services available to them in their county and community through the development of a caring network of volunteers who will help these elderly people know where to go for services, provide transportation for them to get there, and in other ways assist elderly people to receive health care benefits at home without having to be placed in a retirement home.

More Persons Are Involved In Local Church Christian Education

For the fifth consecutive year, local churches in our Conference in 1980 showed an increase in the number of persons involved in Christian education opportunities. Although attendance at Sunday School dropped by two percent, the number of persons in short-term classes was up six percent and the number of persons in other ongoing classes and groups for learning gained two percent. The total persons in average attendance in all these settings is now almost 100,000.

Four Conference Camps Offer A Variety Of Opportunities

Camping activities were set back by unexpected school snow make-up days at the beginning of the summer season. Even so, the total attendance at all camps was 10,606. Camp Rockfish and Camp Kerr Lake showed increases in usage (Rockfish up 34%!) On a year-round basis, Camp Chestnut Ridge was used more than any other camp; Camp Don-Lee enrolled the majority of the summer program.

Leadership Development Reaches Increased Number Of Persons

Leadership development opportunities for persons in educational ministry ranged from three workshops on children's work with Australians Stan Stewart and Pauline Hubner to Youth Ministry Enrichment Teams in local churches. The number of persons involved went up by 34 percent to 2930; the number of contact hours went 18 percent higher to 11,731. Nine hundred and fifty persons attended six Christian Workers' Schools. In the January Workshops, 1343 workers took part in courses designed to strengthen educational ministries. Over 200 people were in education-related courses at the Conference Leadership School. The Division helped fund six Conference-wide youth events with a total participation of 734.

EMLC TASK FORCE

The EMLC Task Force of the North Carolina Conference Council on Ministries has tried to be responsive to the CCOM and at the same time responsible for the implementation of the Missional Priority.

Definition:

"A missional priority is a response to a critical need in God's world with global implications which calls for UMC's massive and sustained effort through primary attention to ordering and reordering program and budget at every level of the church and adopted by the General Conference or in accordance with **Par. 1006.1 of the 1980 Book of Discipline**. The need is evidenced by research or other supporting data, and the required response is beyond the capacity of any single agency or annual conference.

Ethnic Minority Local Churches are composed primarily of Black, Hispanic Native, Pacific and Asian American persons with a history of being exploited, oppressed, and neglected, but who have a rich heritage of culture.

The EMLC Task Force of the N.C. Conference has functioned as a support group assisting, in the main, Black and Native American congregations in their struggle to fulfill their ministries.

Some of the tasks that have been planned, supported and/or implemented by the task force are as follows:

1. A workshop on ministerial recruitment and enlistment of ethnic ministers and Christian education workers.
2. A workshop on worship in the local church.
3. A workshop on Christian education.
4. Affirmed and supported the goal and process of getting two Christian education workers related to Black and Native American congregations.
5. Affirmed and supported building programs among the ethnic minority congregations.
6. Supported ways and means of getting the priority across to all the local church members through cooperative efforts of all the agencies, committees and boards of the conference.
7. Planned for slide promotion at annual conference.

ETHNIC MINORITY TASK FORCE REPORT

The report of the Ethnic Minority Task Force will be found on page 7 of the Agency Reports to the Annual Conference. I should like to speak for the Task Force and add to what is found there. In the 1977-80 quadrennium the Ethnic Minority Local Church was **one** of the Missional Priorities, in 1981-84 it is **the** Missional Priority.

All of us know what a priority is. The needs of the Ethnic Minority Local Church are in a crisis stage today. The majority of the churches in our denomination must face up to the unconscious racism manifest in neglect of ethnic minority churches. This neglect became obvious in our small response to the \$3.5 million advance challenge in the 1977-80 quadrennium.

In this quadrennium a \$5 million yearly goal has been recommended by both the General Council on Ministries and the General Council on Finance and Administration. The money raised in the Annual Conference for this fund will be divided between conference and general church programs. Thirty percent of the funds received will be used within our conference. What happens here in N.C. depends on the response of our local churches. We realize that an important financial matter will come before this conference but we must not let that keep us from fulfilling our commitment to this Missional Priority.

The ethnic minority churches in our conference are Black and Native American churches and for the most part they are located in one geographical area. They are communities of people who historically have been oppressed, exploited and neglected. Some of us do not have ethnic minority United Methodist churches in our districts and therefore we have not felt a keen responsibility to these churches in our conference.

The Native American and Black leadership in the NC Conference have come together this year to set goals and objectives for each group. These come basically under 7 areas which highlight their needs. Let us examine them.

1. **Evangelism and Church Growth:** There is a need to increase membership and attendance in the local churches and to have a comprehensive program of

evangelism. New congregations should be established, at least one new black congregation annually. The people are there. Every district can have some input at this point.

2. **Nurture:** There is a need to strengthen the age level ministries in the local church through workshops and seminars to train the local leadership.
3. **Worship:** Worship services in the NC Conference can be enriched by the creative contributions which come from the heritage of both the Black and Native American churches.
4. **Outreach Ministries:** There is a need to enable the minority leadership to become sensitive to the community needs and to develop ways to study, understand and respond positively to those needs. At this point in time it is especially essential that we find ways to provide needed community services.
5. **Ministers:** There is a need to secure adequate financial help for the training and support of the ministers, both ordained and non-ordained; to increase opportunities for continuing education so that full time pastors may be developed; to provide salary supplements; and that within the NC Conference we implement and achieve an intentional policy of open itineracy. The last part of this goal does not call for money but it calls for a change that money cannot buy. It can only be found in the hearts and minds of United Methodists as we develop an attitude that will permit the ordained leadership to be moved about freely wherever their gifts and calling would indicate.
6. **Organizations:** This goal relates to representation on Boards and Agencies and leadership roles within the conference. If we are serious about being an inclusive church, meetings should be held when minority persons can attend. Most are employed and it is necessary to lose pay or take vacation time in order to be present. As a conference we need to be aware of this problem and make every effort possible to hold meetings at times when ethnic minorities can attend without being penalized.
7. **Church Development and Buildings:** There is a need to improve facilities and equipment of the churches and parsonages.

These goals will be presented in depth to the Council on Ministries when it meets later this month.

Because the Ethnic Minority Local Church is **THE** Missional Priority for this quadrennium, because there is a need for it to be an ongoing concern and because we are related to the Council on Ministries, upon recommendation of the Task Force, I would like to move that the EMLC Task Force cease being a task force and become the EMLC Committee of the Council on Ministries.

COMMISSION ON EQUITABLE SALARIES

I. Recommended scheduled of Minimum Salaries for 1982:

A. Salary Schedule

Conference Members under full-time appointment:

(Full Connection, Associate, Probationary)

Salary and Utilities

\$12,700

(Utilities to be specified by Charge Conference)

Local Pastors under full-time appointment:

Salary and Utilities

\$11,500

(Utilities to be specified by Charge Conference)
Students (Local Pastors or Conference Members):

Salary and Utilities

\$ 9,300

B. Travel Allowance

Although travel is considered a portion of the minister's expense that is to be reimbursed by the local church and is not set as part of the minimum salary structure, it is expected that each charge would set at least \$1,500 as compensation for its ministers' travel. A charge receiving equitable salary support may provide this \$1,500 travel allowance, but any larger travel allowance in excess of \$1,500 will result in a reduction of equitable salary support.

C. Less than full-time appointments:

Ministers of any status who are serving in an appointment that is less than full-time, except those who are serving as students, will receive support from equitable salary funds, if any, on a basis negotiated with the church, the pastor, the District Superintendent, and the Equitable Salary Commission.

II. Principles Governing the Use of Equitable Salary Funds

The Pastor's salary is the responsibility of the charge; therefore, the charges should be so arranged as to be able to assume full salary support. The Commission urges each charge receiving Equitable Salary funds, its minister, and the District Superintendent responsible for that charge to administer the affairs of that charge to the end that it may move as rapidly as possible toward full financial support. To enable the Conference, the Commission, and the District Superintendents to carry on their cooperative efforts in understanding, in harmony, and for the greatest good for all concerned, the following principles and procedures are set forth:

A. The pastor's dependents at the time of assignment to the charge and as of January 1 shall govern the amount paid the pastor.

B. In considering the salary for the charge, all income, including salary, bonuses, and other benefits not specifically excluded, are included as salary in determining appropriations from the Equitable Salary Fund.

C. Charges must be arranged so that no more than one-third of the total salary will come from the Equitable Salary Fund. Charges asking for more than one-third supplement must make an additional application, indicating the reasons for being given special consideration. Newly established congregations will be given special consideration.

D. When the division of a charge is desired, Equitable Salary funds will be used only upon the recommendation of the Bishop, "Bishop's Task Force on the Division of Circuits," and the approval of the Cabinet.

E. In the division of a charge in which one church seeks to become a station church, it is recommended that such church assume all salary obligations and its proportionate share of apportionments and askings.

1. It is recommended that the remainder of the charge in such a division pay two-thirds of pastoral support and its proportionate share of apportionments and askings.

2. When there is a division of a charge forming one or more student appointments, each newly created charge must pay two-thirds of the salary established by the division.

- F. The Commission on Equitable Salaries further recommends that each charge which has received, or shall hereafter receive, Equitable Salary aid, shall reduce this aid by ten (10) percent each year until the charge has accepted full self-support. The commission on Equitable Salaries wants to be clear at this point that this recommendation means that the charge will accept in full whatever increases are made each year in the minimum salary for the pastor of that charge and receive ten (10) percent less in aid from Equitable Salary funds than granted the previous year. The District Superintendents are to inform all charges receiving aid or expecting to receive aid in the future of this requirement.
- G. Any Equitable Salary supplement will be terminated immediately upon the pastor's taking full-time secular employment. Such a pastor may be reinstated at any time upon returning to full-time ministerial status. Exceptions to this rule may be permitted by approval of the Executive Committee of the Commission on Equitable Salaries on the recommendation of the District Superintendent of the pastor who is seeking for emergency reasons to be employed outside of his/her ministerial responsibilities.

MINISTERS' MOVING EXPENSE

I. ELIGIBILITY

- A. Pastors, District Superintendents and ministerial staff under appointment within the Conference.
- B. Ministers who retire from serving appointment or who assume or return into active service from approved disability leave.
- C. Widows or widowers of ministers upon moving from place of appointment to new residence.
- D. Ministers moving into the North Carolina Conference to assume full time appointment.

II. REQUISITION FORMS

- A. The Conference treasurer will provide District Superintendents with requisition forms for moving expense. The District Superintendents will distribute the forms to eligible persons assigned appointments within their District as soon as possible after adjournment of Annual Conference.
- B. The applicant will complete the form which will be returned with appropriate proof of claim receipts to the District Superintendent for verification. Upon approval of claims, the District Superintendents will forward requisition forms and proof of claim receipts to the Conference treasurer for payment.

- C. When changes in appointment occur between sessions of the Annual Conference, the same procedure will be followed.
- D. Retiring ministers, widows and widowers will be furnished requisition forms by the Conference treasurer and will return their moving expense requisition forms and proof of claim receipts to the Conference treasurer for approval and reimbursement.

III. PAYMENT OF CLAIMS

- A. Base Payment of \$100 will be granted to all ministers, widows and widowers who are eligible to make claim.
 - B. In addition to the \$100 Base Payment, each recipient may elect reimbursement for moving expenses by either one of the two plans listed below.
 - 1. The minister may elect to secure two bids from reputable moving firms. Upon submission of paid statement and a copy of the second bid, the Conference treasurer will pay 75% of the cost of the lower of the two bids up to a maximum of \$750
- OR
- 2. The minister may elect to use another method of moving, for which the Annual Conference will pay up to \$500 with the submission of itemized proof of claim receipts.
 - C. "Plan 2" above will apply to all ministers moving from outside the bounds of the Conference to assume full time appointment within the Conference.
 - D. Retiring ministers, widows or widowers will receive 100% reimbursement of itemized claim with receipts up to but not exceeding \$1,400, in addition to the \$100 Base Payment.
 - E. No additional claim can be made against a local church, District, or the Conference for payment of moving expenses.

IV. REVIEW COMMITTEE

- A. There will be a Review Committee consisting of two persons appointed by the chairman of the Council on Finance and Administration, one District Superintendent appointed by the Bishop, and the Conference treasurer.
- B. The Review Committee will consider and have final authority over any questionable or disallowed claim or special claim for reimbursement beyond allowances set in the reimbursement plan elected.

Statistical Indicators, Trends

Conference Membership declined by 329 in 1980 (but persons joining on Confession of Faith was **highest** in four years — 3230). Five hundred three churches received at least one person on Confession of Faith; three hundred forty-six received none. Of the UMC's goal of 1 million new members by 1984, our Conference's net gain goal now stands at 19,329. The Elizabeth City District led the way in 1980 by reaching 11% of its goal. **Lay Witness Missions** in our Conference increased from 10 in 1980 to 30 on schedule in 1981. Our two **Conference Evangelists** (Tommy Tyson, John Hobbs) held 83 meetings in 1980.

Strengthening The Local Church For Its Evangelistic Mission In The World

This is one of five special programs adopted by General Conference for 1981-1984. Accordingly, our Division is attempting to provide resources that address stated or obvious needs in the local church, e.g., the last Conference Convocation on Missional Priorities pinpointed the need for: (1) District-wide **Studies on "How to be a Witness"** (a topic of Sept., 1981, District Workshops).* (2) Emphasis on the **spiritual growth** of individuals (two church-wide Bible studies are scheduled for this Quadrennium by General Conference action, to be led by our bishops). (3) **Evangelism Visitation Committee** in each local church (only about 6% of our churches have Lay Visitation Teams, yet studies show growing churches usually do have such teams. We are recommending District Workshops on the establishment of such teams in March, 1982). (4) **Counsel new members** in terms of commitment and involvement in local church. (In recent years only 36% of our local churches have had Confirmation Classes. We are recommending Tri-District Workshops on Confirmation Training in the Fall of 1982.)

*Our Division has a goal to train 3,000 laypersons by 1984.

"Proclaim The Word: Next Steps" To Focus On Local Church

This Jurisdiction-wide program for 1981-1984 emphasizes **mobilizing our laity** (an effort to involve 1 million laypersons in one-to-one evangelism) with special emphasis on Lent, 1983, **strengthening worship** services, **developing warmer, more caring fellowship**. Organizationally, this is to be coordinated in each local church by a **Committee on Renewal Through Evangelism** (CORE), with detailed materials and guidance to be provided in District Workshops this September.

Local Church Leaders Respond To Evangelism Training

The 1980 Conference Leadership School courses on Sharing Your Faith, The Interior Life and Living Prayer were among the five best-attended. Attendance in Evangelism class in January Workshops for 1981 totalled 248.

September, 1981, District Workshops To Address Local Church Concerns

Three classes will be offered; How To Witness One-to-one, Proclaim the Word: Next Steps, Evangelism and the Church School. (65% of persons received on Confession of Faith in 1980 came through the Church School.)

Celebration Sunday, June 7

Churches participating in "Each One Reach One" will celebrate the presence of new church members, June 7.

Bishop Cannon, Members of the Annual Conference,

The Conference Division of Evangelism is taking with great seriousness the command of our Lord to make disciples. We are trying to do this within the framework of needs you have expressed and larger goals set by the Church. To set our work in context, several things have to be considered.

First, you have affirmed in the past the goal of the United Methodist Church to gain one million new members by 1984. Our Conference portion of that goal is 19,000 persons. Our Conference in the first year of that effort has won 3,230 persons to Jesus Christ on Confession of Faith, the highest number in 4 years. While 7 of our districts showed a net membership gain, led by the Elizabeth City District with a net gain of 111, as a Conference we experienced a net membership loss in 1980 of 329 persons. This loss is only partially explained by the unusually large number of persons removed by charge conference action that year.

The fact is that we are not winning nearly as many persons to Jesus Christ and discipleship in His church as we should or as we could. We are **called** to be, foremost and intentionally, fishers of men. This call is rooted in God's command to make disciples, our own yearning as a church to be on the cutting edge of God's redemptive activity in our time. This call is also rooted in the despairing cry of our generation for identity, forgiveness, direction and love. (Indeed, the Good News of the Gospel is **news** to many persons in our secularized generation. It is **news** to many to learn that God loves them to the extent of a Calvary, that sin is that serious, that a person is put right with God thru repentance and faith in Jesus Christ.)

A task as important as evangelism needs to be not sporadic but ongoing and comprehensive, involving all believers all of the time. The task of evangelism also calls for boldness and realism. But that realism, rather than being a code word for low expectations, needs to be a realism rooted in Calvary, Easter, Pentecost — an attitude, immersed in the purposes and power of God Himself.

Our Division asks you to consider where we are and where, in God's power, we can be. Extensive consultations have been entered into with church members and church leaders from the local to the national level. And, surprisingly, a clear consensus has emerged. It is this: The United Methodist Church will start winning more persons to Christ when we decide we really **want** to win more persons to Christ. We do not lack methods. But while we need basic training to enable our people to witness with confidence and competence, we primarily need across the board motivation. Motivation to be receptive to the fresh Pentecost ever available to the person of faith and obedience. The difficulty we face in evangelism is not how but whether; not a confusion as to method, but the need for singleness of purpose. Put differently, we do not appear to be in one of those waiting periods of history when we are waiting upon God. Rather, God is waiting for us.

E. Stanley Jones once said that every Christian and church needs among its goals at least one goal that cannot possibly be reached unless God is with us in a mighty way.

In our effort to have a net gain of 19,000 persons by 1984, we **have** such a goal. It is attainable only if we allow God Himself to be with us in a mighty way. (This type of goal will keep us consciously dependent upon God. That dependence upon God, that openness to God, will allow Him to work in us as only He can)

A second premise of our evangelistic taste is that it must involve a **mobilization of our laity**. "Proclaim the Word: Next Steps" focuses on mobilizing one million lay persons in the Southeast in evangelism. One venture that illustrates what could

happen is targeted for Lent, 1983. During Lent, each participating lay person would pray daily for **five** non-churched persons. During Holy Week, the lay person would visit those five individuals and invite them to Christ and the Church. Do you realize what this would mean if $\frac{1}{3}$ of United Methodist lay persons in the Southeast participated? It would mean that five million persons would be visited during Holy Week by one million United Methodist lay persons, undergirded by 35 days of focused prayer. To assist in this regard, District-level Seminars will begin this September in our Conference to help train 3,000 lay persons to feel confident and competent in witnessing verbally to their faith.

Third, we must focus our attention anew on evangelism in the **local church**. The major emphasis of "Proclaim the Word: Next Steps," in addition to mobilization of our laity, are the development of caring fellowships in our churches and the enriching of our worship services. Here we must build on our strengths while isolating and addressing our weaknesses. Numerous studies of **growing churches** reveal common characteristics: a deep **desire** for growth on the part of pastor and laity; lay visitation teams; a strong church school; a warm, caring fellowship; worship services where **Christ** is exalted, truths of the Christian faith are celebrated, hope and the possibility of new life in Christ is proclaimed.

George Sweazey in a recent book has reminded us that the **local church** is God's primary instrument of evangelism. The 1980 General Conference has lifted up "Strengthening the Local Church for its Evangelistic Mission in the World" as one of five special programs.

Since less than 50 charges in our Conference presently have lay visitation teams, training will be offered next spring to move toward the goal of at least one Lay Visitation Team in **every church**. Excellent helps are being offered for our church schools including District-wide Seminars this fall. Much can be done and is being done in many local churches toward development of warm, caring fellowships and even more meaningful worship services.

I ask you and myself, as leaders of the church, where are we in our motivation? Are we trying to exchange "Here I am, send me" for "There he is, send him?" Have the truths of the Gospel that exploded upon the human scene 2,000 years ago become so "old hat" to us that we have lost our wonder and awe? Or do we sense strongly the wonder of God's grace — a wonder voiced by a confirmation class member, when upon reviewing with the class what Jesus did on the cross, exclaimed, "Wow!"

Two questions and an invitation:

Question 1: What more than a Calvary will it take until our motivation to share the Gospel is full and strong? Such strong motivation comes from deep within the hearts of persons who know that the way of the Cross leads home. It may be that we need to gaze long and meditatively upon that Cross again.

Question 2: Are we willing, even NOW, so to open our lives to the guidance and power of God that He can reach persons thru us. Are we willing to say, "Here am I: send me?"

I want to invite us all to make a new commitment to God in evangelism right now. If you will join me in a commitment to strive, in the power of God's Spirit, to lead at least one person to Jesus Christ in the next 12 months, I'm going to ask you to stand for a prayer of commitment.

O God,

We praise you for your seeking love. We affirm that you are the Great Evangelist. And we rejoice in our calling to be fishers of men with you.

Forgive us where we have failed. Pour your Spirit afresh upon us and upon every local church of this Annual Conference.

Thank you especially, our Father, for every person, who has come to know, live and serve you thru Jesus Christ this past year.

We now dedicate our lives afresh to you. So work thru us this year that each of us will help at least one person to come to Jesus Christ and become part of a church that cares.

We offer this prayer thru Jesus Christ our Lord, Amen.

Our Division of Evangelism is pleased to recommend by unanimous vote the reappointment of the Rev. Tommy Tyson as Conference Evangelist (for his 26th year) and the re-appointment of Rev. John Hobbs as Conference Evangelist (for his 4th year).

RECOMMENDATIONS FROM THE COUNCIL ON FINANCE AND ADMINISTRATION

- I North Carolina Annual Conference Tentative Budget To be Raised January 1, 1982-December 31, 1982.

- II
 1. The Outreach Ministries Fair Share Apportionments for 1982 shall be based on the formula adopted in 1979 which computes the apportionments from the average of the total monies disbursed by each charge in the three years immediately previous to the apportionment year less the appropriate exclusions each year. The current exclusions are: Payments on Outreach Ministries; principal and interest on indebtedness; buildings and improvements; local benevolences paid directly by the local church; General and Conference Advance Specials; Ten Dollar Club; up to \$2400 travel paid by local church for each pastor; One great Hour of Sharing; World Wide Communion; Human Relations; Methodist Student Day; Pension Funding Crusade.
 2. Allocations to the charges shall be made by the Council on Finance and Administration based on the current formula for the Fair Share Apportionments. Each cause shall be paid proportionately out of the income from acceptances up to the amount fixed by the Annual Conference upon the recommendation of the Council. In the event collections shall fall short, all items shall be paid pro-rata or proportionate excepting prior claim items: (Fixed obligations on conference owned property; salaries paid directly from the Conference Treasurer's Office: Pensions, General World Service; General Administration Fund). In the light of possible unforeseen and emergency need within the Annual Conference, the Council on Finance and Administration is authorized to make supplementary appropriations between sessions of the Annual Conference. Such supplementary appropriations shall be made only from available undesignated funds and shall be reported to the Annual Conference for purposes of information.
 3. The Lake Junaluska Development Fund shall continue based on a minimum goal of 50 cents per member per year (\$2.00) over the four-year period 1981-1984 inclusive. This is based upon the membership at the close of the calendar year 1978 as reported in the 1979 JOURNAL.

4. The following special offerings shall be taken in each local church and remitted to the Conference Treasurer as separate items. They are not to be included in the Fair Share Apportionments: World Communion Sunday, United Methodist Student Day, One Great Hour of Sharing, Human Relations Day, SeJ. T.V. Ministry.
5. Fair Share Apportionments will be delivered from the Treasurer's Office to the District Superintendents by July 15. The District Superintendents will then, at their discretion, distribute the apportionments, without adjustments, to the charges. *Any request from the charges for adjustments must be made to the Council on Finance and Administration on or before August 31 of each year. No request for adjustment will be considered after this date.*
6. No Conference agency's budget shall incorporate funds to be appropriated to a non-conference agency, without specific approval of the council on Ministries for program budget items or the Council on Finance and Administration for all non-program budget items.
7. Monies paid by the charges on apportionments and all other monies paid out by the local churches shall be reported to the Statistician by the pastors at the end of the year on Table II, Financial Report.
8. No transfer of funds shall be made from one line item in the Conference Budget to another without approval of the Council on Finance and Administration.
9. Travel allowance for the District Superintendents beginning in 1982 shall be \$4,000 per year with payment being made upon submission of monthly travel voucher to Conference Treasurer. Travel for all other Conference staff paid from Conference Treasurer's office shall also be on the basis of the submission of travel voucher. The rate of pay for all of the above shall be twenty (20) cents per mile for miles traveled.
10. We recommend that the percentage of 3% of each annual current Conference operating budget as adopted in 1973 to maintain the Conference Emergency Fund be lowered to 2% and that the Fund be maintained at a maximum of \$125,000.

III Approval is given to the requests of the following agencies for the privilege of soliciting funds throughout the District or Conference.

1. Christmas Offering 1981 for District Superintendents' program and/or projects. These should be clearly defined in plenty of time to have successful promotion.
2. The Division of Missions for the promotion of the Church Extension Ten Dollar Club.
3. The Division of Education to solicit from church groups and individuals, materials and money for specific projects for the four camps of the North Carolina Conference.
4. The Regional Commission on Higher Education and Campus Ministry for the privilege of private solicitation for special gifts for the benefits of special works in the state-supported institutions of higher education.
5. Methodist Retirement Homes, Incorporated; Methodist Home for Children, Louisburg College; Methodist College; and North Carolina Wesleyan College for the privilege of private solicitation and receipt of such funds as may be directed there to with the understanding that such solicitation or private campaign may not be taken into the local church.

ches of the Conference through solicitation in classes or other groups or by the use of membership list of entire churches which might be provided, and that solicitation not be made through the North Carolina Christian Advocate.

6. The Methodist Foundation, Incorporated, as provided in its charter.

V The Council on Finance and Administration will continue to use A.M. Pullen & Company as auditors unless otherwise advised.

The President, vice-president and secretary of the Council on Finance and Administration and the Conference Treasurer shall serve as the executive committee of the Council of Finance and Administration.

The Conference Treasurer will include in his monthly financial reports, for any given month, all monies received in his office by 8:30 A.M. on the 5th day of the following month except when the 5th day falls on Saturday or Sunday the report will include the funds received by 8:30 A.M. the following Monday.

It's good to be with you today to talk about a concern I know we share — a concern about our children.

As the father of four children, I well know the tremendous experience and responsibility of raising children from birth until they are productive, caring adults.

But unfortunately, what begins as a blessing for some people turns into an unbearable burden. There are many parents who can't or won't "train up a child in the way he should go." There are many children who refuse the instruction of their mother and father and choose to live rebellious lives.

These young people range from the tough and mean; to the shy, withdrawn and lonely; to the bright, articulate and affluent.

They are strangers. And they are the kids next door. They are our own children.

They get caught up in crime. They lead unfortunate lives.

One of the most disturbing statistics you will ever hear is that one percent of our state's population is under the jurisdiction of the Department of Correction. And when you include the families of those who are in trouble with the law, you can see what a dramatic impact crime has on this state. Add to that the victims of crime.

Last year, nearly 17,600 children, 15 years old or younger, got in trouble with the law. Some of their offenses were minor; others were deadly serious.

About 10,000 of these children will stand before a court of law. If convicted, they face probation, detention homes or training schools. Children as young as six years old have been incarcerated.

Some of these children never had a chance. Many have been abused and battered all of their lives. They're wrecks as human beings — and no wonder.

They represent a great challenge to us — to the state and to the church.

What can we, as Christians, do to help these troubled youth? Yes, government has a role. But we can't leave it all up to government.

What do these children need? They need what our kids had. Parents who care. Someone who can lead them, help them.

They need one-on-one help. Government can't provide that.

My dream, my vision, is to see that every child in North Carolina who is either already in trouble with the law or appears headed in that direction be matched up with a caring adult.

We need to establish a program — like Partners, Volunteers to the Court. In the best of these programs, volunteers spend five to ten hours a week with his or her child, doing all of those things good parents do for their children — teaching, counseling, listening, playing.

These young people need a friend. To be sure, you can't make them choose a different lifestyle — not right off anyway.

It's not easy. Some of these children are like stray dogs. Some will jump all over you at the slightest sign of attention — wanting more and more of that which they never had.

My goal is to establish a program in each of our 100 counties, reaching every child who needs help. We may fail with some, but love and caring will conquer most.

We are providing leadership at the top to get this program going. I have established an Executive Cabinet on Juveniles, which I personally chair, to take a hard look at how good a job the agencies in government are doing. And to ge

citizens involved. This cabinet consists of the top leaders of the departments and agencies who work with young people and who work to fight crime.

I have asked Rich Maxson from Concord, N.H., my Special Assistant on Juvenile Affairs, to coordinate this program. He is here today, and I hope many of you will have the chance to meet him. He can work with you and others interested in helping us in this effort.

You may be wondering how you can find the children who need our help. How you can pull together the resources needed for an ambitious program like this.

That's why we're here. We'll help you and guide you. Rich can help you find the necessary resources and help you develop this program, or build on programs you might already have in your communities.

Together, with God's help, we can steer and love our youth away from a life of crime.

Our present approach to crime is not adequate. We must concentrate on prevention, not just punishment. I am convinced this program can make the difference. But we must have your help.

Together, as good citizens and good Christians, we can steer our young people away from a life of crime, and that is what I think God wants us to "be about" on His earth.

DIVISION OF HEALTH AND WELFARE MINISTRIES

Coble Health Care Center Research

For two years research has been going on at the Coble HCC in Durham. The purpose is to **develop a device which will 'catch' a person as they begin to fall and lower them to the floor gently without injury.** Called 'Dr. Stead's Project', the device consists of overhead track and a spool of cable with one end attached to a 'garment' worn by a person who is subject to fall.

One of the greatest causes of injury requiring hospitalization for older persons is falling and fracturing a hip or limb. Dr. Eugene Stead, former Medical Director at the Methodist Retirement Home developed this idea as a means of reducing injury while at the same time, freeing a person to walk without constant supervision.

Although industry and the entertainment fields have used safety cables for years, no one has ever developed such a device for the special use of the elderly. **This pioneering research** has resulted in several new patents, and it promises to be an important invention likely to be widely used by institutions and individuals in their homes.

The experimental model is presently installed in one patient room with track allowing a person to move anywhere in the room, including the bathroom. A large loop of track is also installed in the Physical Therapy room for therapy and exercise.

Greenville Retirement Home (A Progress Report)

In May, 1980, the MRH Trustees selected Greenville as the next site for a new retirement home; the 1980 Annual Conference approved. Presently, site selection is in process; an architect has been secured, and the hope is that construction will soon begin on the first part — a 125 unit facility combining apartments, rooms, and support areas.

All Retirement Home Units Certified

The Certification Council of the General Division of Health and Welfare establishes standards and reviews the services provided by UM Health Care Institutions.

All three units of the Methodist Retirement Homes, Inc. have been certified! This remains in effect for five years and is renewable upon review. The United Methodists of eastern North Carolina can be proud that our retirement homes have been found to meet the standards set by the Certification Council of the United Methodist Church.

Golden Cross

Golden Cross helps United Methodists in extreme need with medical bills and helps support two other ministries: the Chaplains Service at Duke Medical Center (\$5,500) and the Good Shepherd Home for Alcoholics at Lake Waccamaw (\$3,000).

During 1980, 34 persons received grants to assist with medical bills (maximum grant is \$600). Information about Golden Cross and application forms can be secured from Rev. Jean L. Hood, P.O. Box 8, Roseboro, N.C. 28382.

Methodist Home For Children

The Methodist Home for Children continues the transition from a campus-based to a community-based child care facility. During 1980, 75 youth and 100 parents in 60 families have been served through the currently operating program areas of the home: **Residential Services**, **Foster Family Services**, and **Family Counseling Services**.

Over 16,000 days of care have been provided to youth in residential and foster care, and more than 1,000 counseling sessions have been held with families of children and youth. Currently, there are 34 residents in six youth homes (capacity of 36); four foster homes are licensed, and one child is in one of these homes; 15 youth in post-high school education are receiving financial and vocational counseling through the home.

Pacific Homes Settlement

The six lawsuits against the Pacific Homes have been dropped and a plan of reorganization has been approved.

The plan provides for the Pacific and the Southwest Annual Conferences to make \$21 million available to the Homes by 1986 to get matters on a sound financial basis. The Pacific and SW Conferences have made austere cuts in their budgets, secured loans, and have begun fund-raising efforts.

Two million dollars is being sought through voluntary contributions across the whole church.

Methodist Retirement Homes

The three facilities of the retirement homes provides for a total capacity of 411 persons: 205 in Durham, 123 in Health Care Center, and 90 at Wesley Pines Lumberton.

The total number of persons served in 1980 in all facilities was 490!

Not all persons admitted to the homes have enough income or assets to cover their total care costs; in fact, 150 persons (in 1980) were assisted through the appropriations which came through the Fair Share apportionments.

First Seminary Chair In Health And Welfare Established

The General Division of Health and Welfare in cooperation with an interested United Methodist has set up a Professorship of Health and Welfare Ministries in a Seminary. This is the first of its kind, and was made possible by a special gift for this purpose.

This Professorship will focus on making a contribution to the Church by focusing on programs for the aging. The St. Paul School of Theology in Kansas City, Mo. was chosen as the recipient for this grant. (Proposals were received from nearly all seminaries in the United States).

INSURANCE COMMITTEE REPORT

I. Blue Cross - Blue Shield Insurance

Medical insurance continues to be a concern to us. Last year there was a substantial rate increase in premiums. We have been advised that for the first four months of 1981, Blue Cross - Blue Shield has paid out almost \$7,000 in claims **more** than has been paid in premiums. Thus another increase in premiums is very probable.

We have made an informal comparison with other companies in terms of cost for benefits comparable to the cost of Blue Cross - Blue Shield. There is a very little difference in the costs for the same defined benefits. Recently we have made a specific comparison between our Blue Cross - Blue Shield insurance and the same benefits offered by the Travelers Insurance Company through the General Board of Pensions.

We recommend that the North Carolina Conference continue its hospital medical insurance with Blue Cross-Blue Shield.

We further recommend that the Insurance Committee be permitted to continue making a comparison between the cost, benefits and service of Blue Cross-Blue Shield and that of other well known companies.

We recommend that after the comparisons are made, if a change in the insuring company appears to be in the best interest, that the Insurance Committee, and the Cabinet be empowered to take whatever action seems to be in the best interest of the ministers and their families. In the event any change are made, they would become effective January 1, 1982, and all relevant information as to changes and/or costs are to be available in time for Charge Conference to know of the decisions.

II Group Term Life Insurance

The recommendations of the Insurance Committee is that the North Carolina Conference continue the Group Life Insurance, and that the charge to which eligible ministers are appointed pay the cost of the premiums. We are aware that under the Comprehensive Protection Plan of the New Pensions

Program there is a Death Benefit Provision — This Death Benefit provides excellent benefits to families of a minister who dies under age fifty-seven. Since the benefits are based on a descending benefit percentage of the Denominational Average Compensation for ministers — those ministers over age fifty-seven do not have adequate benefits for their families. Thus this recommendation.

GOLDEN CROSS REPORT

Golden Cross is part of the Outreach Ministries of our Conference. This program gives financial assistance to United Methodists who are in need because of medical expenses which are beyond their ability to pay. It is a concrete way we fulfill our Lord's directive to care for the sick and needy in His name. Here is a typical example of the people you assist.

The applicant has been a member of the United Methodist Church for twenty-two years. She states: "My husband has been unable to work since 1950, due to an automobile accident. He receives no help from Social Security or V.A. I have worked for the past twenty-seven years, but make barely enough to keep us going. I would greatly appreciate your help."

The applicant makes \$400.00 a month, owns house valued at \$4,000.00, and a 1969 Chevrolet automobile. They owed over \$1,275.00 in medical bills. Golden Cross assisted them with \$600.00, the maximum.

The applicant responded by saying, "My husband and I are very grateful for the Golden Cross help. I am hopeful that someday I will be able to donate something to the Golden Cross Fund so that others may receive the same help that I have. Thank you!"

During 1980, twenty-four people in seven Districts received assistance that averaged \$488.00 per applicant. In addition, we contribute \$5,500.00 per year to the Chaplain Program at Duke Hospital.

You can all be proud of the part you have in the Golden Cross Fund.

We have been able to shorten our waiting list during the past year and while we still have a substantive one at all facilities, we encourage all that are interested to come and examine the Homes and the facilities available and make early application for membership. As we expand we will see that all who seek and who are qualified will be served in the manner that will fulfill the expectations of the ministry that you help provide.

Since loving, caring and providing for the highest possible quality of life is what your ministry through The Methodist Retirement Homes, Inc. is all about, we want to be sensitive to your thoughts, suggestions and expectations.

It is through your gifts and prayers that we have been able to grow to our present potential and allow us to continue to provide a high quality of life for all of our Members and Residents.

As in other years, we reiterate how inadequately we are able to express through words our appreciation for the funds that The Homes receive through the outreach ministries fair-share apportionment of our Church. Highlights of the year's work include:

- Construction of ten apartment units at the Wesley Pines facilities.

- The celebration of our 25th Anniversary and Open House on October 15th.
- The employment of a licensed Nursing Home Administrator to understudy The Homes' corporate structure and prepare for services needed in the Greenville facility.
- The acceptance of gifts of additional land to supplement prior gifts to form the basis of memorial apartments to be built at the Durham facility at a future date.
- The continued hard work by the Decorating Committee of the various facilities in making the public areas of our facilities places of beauty and service.
- We will soon dedicate a large flag pole for the front of the Durham Home and a memorial kitchenette near the Assembly Room in the Durham Home.
- A memorial gift has provided office space for the Chaplain in the Durham Retirement Home facility with adequate room for both study and counselling.
- The Long Range Planning and Building and Grounds Committees seek to bring to a satisfactory conclusion the negotiation with Greenville, the Jarvis Memorial Church and the citizens of the community in securing a clear deed to the property upon which to build our next retirement facility. A marketing and interest survey is already underway to determine the extent of the need and potential in that service area.
- An ongoing certified technician course for patient assistants by Durham Technical Institute to up-grade the quality of our patient care.
- The passing of the half-million dollar mark in The Methodist Retirement Homes, Inc. Pooled Income Fund — an IRS approved fund which provides a life-time income combined with a charitable investment in the future for everyone interested in The Homes.
- Installation of an overhead tract and device in the Health Care Center to aid patients with hip and bone fractures by Dr. Eugene Stead, Jr. Such developments are a portion of the on-going research program of your Homes.
- A continuation of encouragement to each Church and organization within the Church to set aside Mothers' Day as a special time during which the needs of our work may be explained to every Methodist on our Conference. Bulletin inserts are provided each local Church and pastor with the request that the work of The Home be explained from the pulpit.

Your Homes' desire to fill you with Christian pride at the quality of these extension ministries that you continue to offer through this particular series of facilities under the auspices of the Church.

We want to reassure you that we are financially able and stable and therefore offer to send you a copy of our Annual report and provide copies of our Annual audit in the office of the Conference Treasurer, in the offices of the Executive Director and each of the Administrators. You are invited to visit our facilities and review these documents at your convenience.

Still, all of this would not be possible were it not for the countless hours of time spent by members of Local Committees, the Board of Trustees, scores of volunteers, and people such as you who have a deep and abiding concern for the aging segment of our population.

We welcome the challenges we face in the coming years because they will demand of us continued excellence in care and service. THE REPORT OF THE METHODIST HOME FOR CHILDREN

Governor's Speech Highlights Needs

Governor James B. Hunt, Jr. stressed the need for programs to help troubled children in his recent speech to the Annual Conference. He said that many of the state's children have been abused and neglected and have never had a chance. "One percent of the state's children are under the jurisdiction of the Department of Correction and 17,600 children under the age of 15 years are in trouble with the law." Governor Hunt outlined a program of prevention to help these children and youths, which included his state-wide volunteer program called The Partner's Program. This is a program in which adults volunteer five or more hours per week to work with a "high risk" young person. He said that the way to prevent crime among youths is for mature adults to develop a "deep, caring, loving, and long-term relationship with youths—the one-on-one relationship."

Youths Benefit from Partners Program

I am very excited about Governor Hunt's commitment to the children and youths of North Carolina. The Methodist Home for Children is moving in the same directions which the Governor outlined in his speech. In fact, our children have already benefited from his Partner Program which is very active in Wake County. Recently two of our children, ages 10 and 11, were featured in a 30 minute channel 5 television program on the Partners Program. Another example is seen in the story of two brothers ages 14 and 16 years, who had been at the Home for three years. The County Department of Social Services had terminated the parental rights of their natural parents. These boys were now ready for a more permanent placement in an adoptive home or in a foster home. A husband and wife joined the Partners Program and made a commitment to spend five or more hours per week with these two brothers. As you can imagine, this couple fell in love with these two boys over a period of time and wanted them to come and live with them. Last month this couple became foster parents in our foster family program and now the boys are living with them. This couple hopes to be able to adopt these boys in the near future.

New Programs Stress Prevention

The above heart-warming story is an example of the Home's new emphasis on prevention and permanency planning. Through family counseling we assist families who are having problems with their children while the children are still living at home. Our main goal is keeping children with their families if this is at all possible. If children must be removed from their homes, then we will seek to serve them in the next "least restrictive environment" which is a foster family home. If the troubled youths need an even more structured setting, then we will meet their needs in a community-based group home.

In our youth homes on our present campus we are developing a sophisticated treatment model called "The Teaching-Family Program." In this model a teaching-parent couple works intensively with six youths in a family-styled setting in one home. They are assisted by another mature adult called an alternate teaching-parent. When we develop our group homes throughout the Conference, this model of care and treatment can be easily transferred to these group homes.

Services Provided in 1980

The Methodist Home for Children served 75 different children and 100 of their parents and relatives who were a part of 60 families in 1980. These children were served in the three program areas of residential services, foster family services, and family counseling. The Home provided over 16,000 days of care to children in residential care and foster family care and over 1,000 counseling sessions to their families. As a part of the family counseling services, the Home provided vocational counseling and financial help to 15 former residents who are continuing their education in colleges and technical schools. This financial help is possible through the Home's scholarship fund to which persons have contributed over the years.

Director of Public Relations and Planned Giving Appointed

Rev. Byrd has been a pastor in the Conference for 24 years, serving five churches. He comes to the Home from the Ann Street Church in Beaufort where he has served for the last six years. His presence will make it possible for me to devote more of my time to the administrative responsibilities and decision making associated with our expanding program and the transferring of our present campus programs to other locations throughout the Conference.

CONTINUING EDUCATION STANDARDS

Paragraph 423.1 of the 1980 DISCIPLINE states:

"Growth in competence and effectiveness through continuing education is expected of conference members. These are professional responsibilities which ministerial members are expected to fulfill and which represent a fundamental part of their accountability and a primary basis of their guaranteed appointment. These shall include...c) Annual participation in continuing education programs. THE BOARD OF ORDAINED MINISTRY SHALL SET MINIMAL STANDARDS AND SPECIFIC GUIDELINES FOR CONTINUING EDUCATION PROGRAMS FOR MEMBERS OF THEIR CONFERENCE, AND INSURE THEIR AVAILABILITY (emphasis mine)."

The North Carolina Annual Conference Board of Ordained Ministry met on May 20, 1981 and adopted the following minimal standards for our conference members:

1. Financial grants, with a maximum of \$150 for a one-week event and \$300 for a two-week event, will be considered for events which meet the following criteria:
 - a. The event must take place in an organized setting with responsible sponsorship and qualified instruction;
 - b. The subject of study shall be directly related to enhancing the professional practice of ministry;
 - c. The event must involve some definite measure of intensive study by the participant and offer at least one Continuing Education Unit (CEU) accor-

ding to the recognized standard of one CEU being granted for each ten contact or classroom hours (see the booklet on The Continuing Education Unit published by the Commission on Colleges, Southern Association of Colleges and Schools, 795 Peachtree St., N.E., Atlanta, GA 30365).

2. The Continuing Education Committee, through its Subcommittee on Certification and Grants, must approve all events, indicating Continuing Education Units (CEUs) to be accepted, before any application for grants will be approved.
3. All applications for grants must be filed on the appropriate form furnishing complete information about the event and bearing the signatures of the applicant, the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee chairperson, and the district superintendent. The maximum grant for one year is \$300.
4. Each minister is encouraged to diversify his/her growth by participating in several types of educational experiences on a variety of ministerial concerns.
5. A minimum of eight CEUs, or an average of two per year, should be earned in each quadrennium (overnight events usually give one CEU, four-day events yield two or more CEUs).
6. A form shall be prepared and distributed to each pastor prior to Charge Conferences this fall helping them to answer the following questions required by paragraph 441.3 of the 1980 DISCIPLINE:
 - a. What is the pastor's program of continuing education for the year?
 - b. How shall the local church support it with money and time off?The form will be signed by the pastor and Pastor-Parish Relations Committee chairperson and copies distributed to the district superintendent, the Charge Conference secretary, the P-PRC chairperson, and the pastor. This form will constitute a permanent, official record of the pastor's continuing education.
7. Each charge will be requested to provide at least \$200 annually for the pastor's continuing education, available through voucher for events attended, and allowed to accumulate if desired by the pastor over several years toward a possible longer and more expensive continuing education event. These funds shall not be considered as salary by the pastor or the church.
8. A brochure detailing these standards will be printed and distributed shortly to all ministers through the Coordinated Mailing.
9. Questions and applications should be sent to Grants Chairperson Ben Rouse.

Interpretation To Churches

January Training Workshops in 1982 should include a session for pastors and Pastor-Parish Relations Committee members on continuing education for ministry. The importance of continuing learning for the clergy will be emphasized along with what this means for the whole church. Special attention will be given to the congregation's role in supporting and financially undergirding this emphasis.

These should be preceded in the fall of 1981 with a letter from the district superintendent to each charge's Pastor-Parish Relations Committee chairperson calling attention to paragraphs 423 (mandatory continuing education) and 441 (congregational support) of the 1980 DISCIPLINE and requesting that each charge budget no less than \$200, available through voucher for events attended, for this purpose annually.

The Duke Endowment

This marvelous resource often helps fund continuing education events for ministers **and their wives or husbands** who serve churches in communities of less

than 1,500 population. Their requirements are more stringent than ours in that they will fund events consisting of at least **twenty** contact hours over at least two nights and that have been given prior approval by the Director of Continuing Education of The Divinity School of Duke University. Persons eligible for this assistance will usually receive grants from this source rather than from Conference funds.

Eligibility

All persons under episcopal appointment to charges, Conference staff positions and district superintendencies shall be eligible for grants from Conference funds provided that grants shall not be made for programs which lead to advancement from one level of Conference relationship to another or programs leading to the acquisition of advanced degrees with the exception of those programs designed to enhance parish ministry.

Some events which are not eligible to receive financial assistance from Conference or Duke Endowment funds could be funded from the charge's line item for the continuing education of its pastor.

Study Tours

The maximum grant for approved Study Tours will be \$100 per year.

Multiple Funding

Funding of continuing education events should be seen as the responsibility of the participant, the congregation, the sponsoring institution, and the Annual Conference working together. It will be impossible and would not be desirable for the Annual Conference to assume major responsibility here. The pastor and the congregation must share in this expense in order to feel ownership in the process of continuing education for ministry.

Each pastor and Pastor-Parish Relations Committee should work toward having their charge accept in full the asking for Ministerial Education Fund, one-fourth of which remains in this Annual Conference and a portion of which is used for grants for continuing education of ministers.

A sub-committee has been appointed to study the possibility of establishing permanent endowment to provide additional funding for the continuing education of our members.

BLACK COLLEGES REPORT

Bishop Cannon, The Reverend Sam McMillan, Members of the Commission on Higher Education, Council Directors, District Superintendent, Members of the North Carolina Conference, and Friends. It is with a great sense of joy and a privileged stand before you this morning.

I bring you greetings from the General Board of Higher Education and Ministers from the Division of Higher Education, the Council of Presidents of the historical Black Colleges and the thousands of young people who benefit from the Black Colleges.

I want to take the opportunity to thank you for the support and contribution you have made to the Black College Fund.

Two months ago, I had the privilege of traveling with Bishop Skeete in two districts of the New York Conference. He told an interesting story that I want to share with you this morning.

Prior to his election to the episcopacy in 1980, he was pastor of a large church in New York City, Salem United Methodist Church. It is an inner-city church with a tremendous ministry, which has involved and ministered to persons in the community.

In one of the programs, there was a young boy that needed his attention above and beyond the call of duty. He was always involved in unusual activities such as small fights, picking up items that did not belong to him and a number of boyish pranks. Because of his unusual activities he became very close to the pastor—now Bishop Skeete.

After the Bishop's election he returned to the church to clear out his office in preparation for the move to his episcopal assignment. The young fellow came by. He said, "Preacher I hear you ain't gonna have a church no more." Bishop Skeete replied, Oh yes! I am going to have many churches—600 or more in Pennsylvania and Puerto Rico. He looked up at the Bishop and said, "**I don't believe you're gonna make it.**"

This statement has been made so often about our Black Colleges. I am here to say "**Our Colleges Are Going To Make It.**"

I am a witness for what Black Colleges have meant in my life and what they continue to mean in the life of Black young people.

Many years ago when my parents were making the decision about my college life, without speaking of race, my parents encouraged me to go to college so that I could prepare myself for the future. Nobody ever talked about segregation per se. And I am sure avoidance was a conscious decision.

There were not many options to me. It was either a church related college or a state supported institution—both black.

The choice was very simple. There were two of us in college at the same time. We were preachers kids—and could attend at a special rate "two for the price of one": It was to one of our colleges that I was sent.

It was at that institution that I met teachers who inspired me, encouraged me and made the difference in my life. It was the caring more than the curriculum that caused me to aspire. They were persons who understood the real basics: the concerns, aspiration and yes the burdens of students and their families.

Years later when the same discussion came up for my daughter, the time was different, but the basic considerations were the same. Four years prior to her graduation from high school, the public schools were opened up at all grade levels. Prior to this time her mind was set on a predominantly white college where they had co-ed dormitories. It was those four years of high school that made the difference.

The first year of total integration, she was going through picket lines of adults who were saying, "Go Home, Black Child, you don't belong here." Wherever there was a student disagreement, someone yelled racism.

A part of the agreement was for each child to have the same position at the new school as they held in their former school. She had been elected a cheer leader. The new school did not have a uniform for her, she had to return to her former school for a uniform, all at her own initiative. It was different from the others; kids ridiculed her and asked why the uniform was different. Her response was, "I am the leader."

The total emotional involvement continued throughout her high school experiences. At the end of that period, she no longer wanted to fight racism for education—at least she did not feel that she wanted to be consumed by it. She wanted to be free.

Black students elect Black institutions for important social and psychological reasons. They want to be free to develop as an individual rather than to be seen, a different—either inferior or elite. The absence of social and racial pressures is a significant inducement for many Blacks to attend historical Black Colleges.

- (1) I have seen all these schools become fully accredited by their regional accrediting agencies.
- (2) I have seen the enrollments increased steadily.
- (3) I have seen the alumni move out to make tremendous contributions in the nation, church and the world.
- (4) I have seen these institutions go from having exclusive rights on educating Black students to a more competitive stance with non-white institutions. What I am saying, students now have an opportunity to go to the colleges of their choice. Before, there was hardly any place else to go.
- (5) I have seen total integration of public schools.
- (6) The financial support moves from once a year offering of slightly \$500,000 for the 12 Black Colleges to a national fund that results over \$4 million per year.

The General Conference of 1980 reaffirmed its support of Black Colleges through the Black College Fund. Receipts from the fund are used in various ways—for student aid, faculty development, library materials, instructional supplies and equipment, building renovation and construction. The fund provides from 4-12 percent of the institutions budget.

In this period of austerity and double digit inflation, where government is talking about cut backs, and the realities are calling for more of everything, including trained human resources, who can question the validity of the Black Colleges.

Local church and conference support to Black Colleges through its designated apportionment demonstrates the total church commitment to the continued vitality of these historic schools.

Your contribution to the Black College Fund allows the colleges to continue to provide the kind of quality education which assures our young people an opportunity, and one which they are proud, to assume responsible roles in the church and communities across this nation.

Future

The exact shape of things to come in higher education is not apparent. When it is apparent, it will reflect the patterns and needs of the larger society. Our Black Colleges will continue to find their place in this pattern if they can respond creatively to changes of times.

- (1) Our Black Colleges will continue to provide trained leadership for the Church.
- (2) Our Black Colleges will continue to work creatively with "educational deficiencies" of students whose training has made it difficult for their abilities to receive maximum expression.
- (3) Our Black Colleges will relate to the larger community in such a way that they will become a part of the mainstream of higher education in America.
- (4) Our Black Colleges will share the same standards and responsibilities as do other colleges of a similar size and nature.

The missional priority of development of Ethnic Minority Local Church is clear evidence that our historic concern for opportunities for all persons. Not only is our commitment to the Black College Fund a promise, expectation and survival factor for the Black Colleges, but it is a blessed trust for the strong to care for the weak. Supporting the fund will not only help make the quadrennial emphasis successful, it will help aspire quality leadership for the future.

HUNGER REPORT

Bishop, Delegates and Guests, please note our agency report to Conference and our brochures on "World Hunger Special Programs" for you to receive and study.

Our Lord Jesus Christ said: "I was hungred and ye fed me."

The Hunger Task Force is commissioned to raise the level of awareness to hunger needs and to stimulate greater response, to also publicize good and great examples of response throughout this conference area.

Our Bishops are concerned that hunger concerns are now receiving less attention and funding through Advance giving because Hunger is not now a specific quadrennial emphasis. So that every Annual Conference would lift the Hunger Advance opportunities and challenges to giving, the brochure to which I have referred

was and is made available to help us to gain the commitment of every local church to a Hunger Advance Project. We also urge distribution of these brochures to every member of our local congregations that they may be given opportunity to give directed personal gifts through the local church treasurer, to the conference treasurer, and then to UMCOR.

We must continue to support and participate in ministries that help alleviate both immediate hunger and the long range root causes of hunger.

The Hunger Task Force is also concerned that creative Hunger ministries be conceived, proposed and applications submitted to appropriate granting agencies of our denomination, and other denominations, and Hunger Funding agencies so that special needs may be properly addressed and served in North Carolina also.

The Hunger Task Force is now developing District Task Forces on Hunger from representation to the District Councils on Ministries. The four persons from Missions, Religion and Race, Church and Society, and the United Methodist Women will be trained by the Central Board of Discipleship in the fall of 1981. We believe these District teams are necessary to help our Conference Task Force on Hunger to have optimum effectiveness in interpreting hunger concerns and stimulating maximum response.

DIVISION OF LAY LIFE AND WORK

Lay Rallies were held in each of the twelve districts. The speakers included Bishop William R. Cannon, Bishop Kenneth Goodson, The Reverend Maxie Dunham, Sir Allan Walker, Dr. John Bergland, Dr. William Starns, The Reverend Kermit Braswell. Certified lay speakers were recognized and offerings for college scholarships were taken. The District Lay Rallies continue to be a vital force in our Annual Conference.

January Workshops were held in each of the twelve districts with 3,341 persons attending. That was the third highest attendance ever and several districts showed large increases in attendance. These workshops continue to be our best and most economical means of training. The cost this year was approximately \$1.10 per participant. Our thanks to the more than 100 persons whose work made these events so effective.

Lay Speaker Training continues to be a major emphasis of our division. As the role of lay speaker has changed the division has sought to lead in the area of interpretation of the role and providing training. Several training events have been held

in the districts this year as well as at Conference Leadership School. The Lay Speaker Program is designed to increase the knowledge and skill to the lay leadership of our churches and as such it could have a major effect upon the United Methodist Churches in eastern North Carolina.

Conference Leadership School: Seven hundred sixty two persons attended the twenty one courses offered at the 1980 Conference Leadership School. The school is scheduled for July 31 through August 5, 1981 at Methodist College in Fayetteville. We look forward to another good school this year with nineteen courses being offered and "The Ethnic Minority Local Church — It's Contributions and Hopes" being the theme. See you at Methodist College in August.

Report of the Editor

As editor of the *North Carolina Christian Advocate*, I am pleased to report excellent progress in increasing our circulation. As of this writing in mid-March we have 28,079 subscribers with 695 additional subscriptions in the process of being added to our list. We are still receiving daily new subscriptions from the North Carolina Conference which is just now completing its annual subscription campaign. The present breakdown in subscriptions between the two conferences is 17,369 subscribers in the Western North Carolina Conference, and 10,710 in the North Carolina Conference. This means the Western Conference alone now has 3,569 more subscriptions than both conferences had in the fall of 1976 when our total list was 13,800 subscribers. Thus, the *Advocate* has more than doubled its circulation in 4½ years. However, our current circulation figures will in all likelihood be reduced somewhat as we are presently in the process of sending renewal notices to our December, January and February subscribers. A large percentage of our subscriptions are due for renewal in these three months. In talking with other editors it seems publications like ours can expect a 10% to 15% rate of expirations annually. Some subscribers die, some move out of state, some transfer to other denominations, and some just fall by the wayside. For instance, we recently received a nice letter from a subscriber thanking us for not cancelling her subscription. She renewed after we had sent her three notices. Had we not sent the third notice we would have lost her as a subscriber. But there is a limit to the number of renewal notices it is practical to send out. We have instituted a new procedure asking local church *Advocate* representatives to assist us by telephoning their subscribers and renewing them for us before we begin sending renewal notices. We believe this will greatly reduce the number of expirations.

We are encouraged that our two conferences will be holding simultaneous special subscription campaigns in February 1982. It is imperative that we reach local church *Advocate* representatives, as well as our ministers, with vital information about renewal procedures, new-subscription solicitation, news writing and photography. We are asking that each district hold a special *Advocate* workshop for this purpose.

I have been delighted with the enthusiastic support both the clergy and laity have given the *Advocate*. We are receiving news in a quantity that will force us to

consider seriously the challenge of publishing 12 pages a week. The increased number of pages would give me, as editor, a much better opportunity to publish special-interest feature stories to catch the interest of our once-a-month church members as well as keep our flow of local church news from stacking up and waiting several weeks before we can work it into our publishing schedule. We do not presume that our subscribers will read the paper from cover to cover, although many tell me they do, however, in order to reach the widest possible number of subscribers, we must print a wide variety of news and feature articles. If we carried our full 10% advertising allowance (U.S. postal regulations for non-profit publications), the extra revenue generated by the advertising on the additional pages would come within approximately \$7,700 of offsetting the cost of printing and mailing the additional four pages. We believe our present staff could handle this extra work load at least to launch the project and gauge reader response. The more varied and interesting the paper becomes the easier it is to increase its circulation which in due time would offset the additional expense of the extra weekly pages.

With annual conference approval we are hoping to mount a major drive for endowment funds. When these funds are in hand, the *Advocate* will not only have a more secure financial future, but should be able to continue innovations in both its editorial and circulation departments.

The *Advocate* is a family newspaper in every sense of the word. It has articles of interest for every member of the Christian family, and also is the product of our wider United Methodist family. The paper is a composite of all of our efforts. We welcome suggestions from everyone. This is your newspaper. We want it to meet your needs as United Methodist ministers and church members. We have been, and will continue to be, responsive to your ideas and suggestions, never resting on our laurels, but with Paul push on in the high calling of God in Christ Jesus our Lord.

METHODIST BOARD OF PUBLICATION, INC.

We recommend that:

1. A special subscription campaign for the *North Carolina Christian Advocate* be held in February 1982 for both the North Carolina Conference and the Western North Carolina Conference, including at least one meeting in each of the 26 districts set aside specifically to train local church *Advocate* representatives and pastors in renewal procedures, new subscription solicitation, news writing and photography. February 28, 1982 is suggested as *Advocate* emphasis Sunday.
2. Each local church accept as its minimum goal of *Advocate* subscriptions 10% of its membership. For example, a church with 500 members would be expected to have a minimum of 50 families and/or individuals subscribing to the *Advocate*.
3. The price of an individual *Advocate* subscription will be \$6.00 a year in 1982 for a 50-week publication schedule, making the single copy price 12¢ each. The *Advocate* will not be published the first week in January or the second week in July.
4. There will be an All-Administrative Board subscription plan available to local churches at \$5.25 each per year in 1982. This continuation of the same price

for All-Administrative Board Plan subscriptions in 1982 as in 1981 represents a major move by the Board of Publication to encourage local churches to consider much more seriously this method of insuring that church leaders receive the *Advocate*. All additional subscriptions in All-Administrative Board Plan churches may be entered at the special \$5.25 rate.

5. Churches having all resident families subscribing to the *Advocate* be allowed to enter these subscriptions for \$4.50 each per year in 1982. These churches will be known as All-Family Plan churches. This continuation of the same price for All-Family Plan churches in 1982 as in 1981 represents a major move by the Board of Publication to encourage local churches to consider much more seriously this method of insuring that all of our church families receive the *Advocate*.
6. Each local church be prepared to report to the 1981 fall Charge Conference its willingness to participate in the Special February 1982 subscription campaign, reporting progress to date on reaching the minimum 10% of its membership subscription goal.
7. The Methodist Board of Publication, Inc. be authorized to seek endowment funds for the *Advocate*.
8. Each local church nominate to the 1981 fall Charge Conference the name of a person to be its *Advocate* representative and that this person be a member of the Administrative Board of that church.

METHODIST FOUNDATION, INC.

This past year, our 26th, again reflects a very favorable performance for the Methodist Foundation, Inc. For our year ending December 31, 1980, net dividends paid to unit holders was \$847,484 compared with \$565,894 for the previous year — an increase of \$281,590. Our net growth in assets for the year was \$2,364,643. This growth represented \$1,473,044 from sale of new units (principally from Pension Crusade proceeds); \$657,946 from the reinvestment of dividends paid to unit holders; and \$233,653 net realized gain from security and market transactions. Our total net assets had a year-end market value of \$10,179,540 — compared to \$7,799,866 at the beginning of 1980.

The Foundation is ever mindful of our responsibility for investment of funds, of all agencies of the Conference, but are especially aware of the fact that over 85% of the assets of the Foundation, or \$7,879,910 are units held by the Board of Pensions and the Ministers' Retirement Fund.

The Board of Pensions has kept the Foundation informed of the various alternatives that may be chosen as our overall Ministers' Pension program is improved in accordance with our General Conference guidelines. We are pleased to report that during the past year the earnings level and liquidity of assets of the Foundation are such that we anticipate no difficulty in meeting the cash requirements of the General Board of Pensions for the current year as approved by the action of this Conference yesterday.

The Trust Department of Wachovia Bank & Trust Company continues to manage the total investment portfolio (exclusive of mortgage loans) within guidelines set by

the Investment Committee. This arrangement, now two years old, has proven to be very satisfactory. Our earnings have again exceeded the actuarial criteria set as a minimum by the Board of Pensions.

On January 1st, 1979 the Foundation assumed responsibility for the Office of Deferred Giving. During the past year this effort has been relatively inactive due to lack of funding for a marketing program.

The Foundation is prepared to direct and supervise an Active Office of Deferred Giving when appropriate funding can be justified, but only after special approval of this conference.

A preliminary audit by A.M. Pullen & Co. for the year ending December 31, 1980 is attached and considered to be a part of this report.

There is reason to believe that the current year will reflect continued progress in the overall performance of the Methodist Foundation, Inc.

METHODIST MINISTERS CREDIT UNION

Four years ago you heard that a "Million Dollar Baby" would be born here on this campus. Many of you remember that it happened. All of us were happy that we were together to celebrate when Methodist Ministers Credit Union reached One Million Dollars in Assets.

Most of the people present were not aware that it was a premature birth, but it was, for \$225,000.00 of the million was borrowed money. The important thing at that time was that it arrived well and scrambling to reach the second million and great feats of service.

Today we want to make a progress report. The notes payable have been repaid, and yet the assets were \$2,313,219.24 at the close of business on June 5. This means a net growth of \$638,219.24 in four years. This net gain is more than the total assets just six years ago. The past 370 days have encompassed a growth of more than 22% in assets, or \$237,155.31.

Naturally every member of the credit union is excited and proud of this growth, for it is more than a collection of dollars—it means the ability to serve more people in more ways.

The growth has not been without problems. What child has ever matured without experiencing some problems? The big problems at your credit union have been:

- a. Delinquent loans
- b. Bankrupt members
- c. High cost of money (inflation)
- d. Volatility of the money market
- e. Heavy work load of office staff
- f. Spread in size of share and deposit holdings
- g. Increase in interest rates charged on loans

There have been bright days along the way, too. Liquid reserves are now almost \$200,000.00, in lieu of \$225,000.00 in notes payable. This is a tremendous change in liquidity and is especially significant in this troubled economic environment. Deposits have grown from \$279,877.44 to \$502,720.63 since May 31, 1980. Shares

have increased by over \$27,000.00. Net income was almost twice as much on May 31, 1981, as it was May 31 a year ago. You may find other bright spots in the comparative balance sheet below.

Now let me share some of the ways we can serve you:

I. **Members**

There are two ways for members to save:

- A. **Shares** (\$25.00 each) earn anticipated dividends (currently 5.5% per annum compounded quarterly). These insurable shares earn a bonus of life insurance. The amount of insurance is determined by the age of the member at the time of investment. Double indemnity and accident benefits are in force to age 60.
- B. **Deposits** (Golden and Silver) — These funds must be new money. Funds in other credit union accounts cannot be transferred to either of these accounts. After investing all insurable shares, members may open a Golden or Silver Deposit. Silver Deposits have \$1,000.00 minimum and earn 1% (100 basis points) below money market certificates. Golden Deposits have a minimum of \$5,000.00 and earn ½% (50 basis points) below money market certificates. The rate is pegged in relation to the money market rate in effect on the first day of each calendar quarter. The quarter per cent differential on the \$10,000.00 minimum deposit disappears when the money market rate drops to 9%. The rate of money market certificates will be matched as it drops below 9%, point for point, until they reach 7.75%. At that point the rate on deposit accounts stops dropping.

Any change in this policy cannot be made until every depositor is given thirty days' written notice before the beginning of the next interest period (calendar quarter). These funds are relatively fluid. They do not have attached the "substantial penalty" required on money market certificates by Federal Regulation. With thirty days' written notice before the end of a calendar quarter, all or part of the deposited funds may be withdrawn on the first day of the quarter without any penalty. With ten days' written notice, any part of the deposit may be withdrawn with a 2% reduction in the rate applied to the portion moved, provided the minimum is maintained. The part remaining on deposit continues to earn at the guaranteed rate. These accounts may be added to in any amount at any time. If the investment is made on or before the fifth of the month, it earns interest from the first. If invested later, it earns from the first of the next month.

Loans of two types are now available:

A. **Consumer Credit**

Loans are made at reasonable rates. Rates may be increased or decreased without notice, but are fixed for the duration when the note is signed. All members pay the same interest rate for the same type of loan. All insurable loans are insured with death coverage and total and permanent disability protection, without fee paid by the borrower. This is a significant saving to the borrower here in North Carolina, where loan protection insurance rates are so high. One member recently found that a small loan at another source would cost in payments the equivalent of 20%, although both the credit union and the other financial institution quoted

the same 15% APR. Insurance and other fees passed on to the borrower at the other source made the difference in total cost.

B. Estate Loans (to buy shares only) — 11% APR

Today members may borrow to save a lower rate than in 1938, when the lowest APR was 11.78%. Every eligible member or potential member should take advantage of this tremendous bargain. This is the way it works:

Borrow \$3,000.00 at 11% APR. Invest this in your credit union share account. Repay at \$98.22 per month for thirty-six months. You pay in a total of \$3,535.92. Your shares earn dividends at 5.5% annually, compounded quarterly. In thirty-six months your share account grows to \$3,332.46. This means the net cost to the borrower is \$3.46 for this bundle of protection. Where else can you buy such a bargain? The shares are then yours, and the life insurance on the shares remains the same as at the time the investment was made. You can make the loan in any amount you wish up to \$3,000, in order to make the monthly payment fit your budget.

Saving at your credit union brings another benefit. 100% share-secured loans are made at the lowest rate available on consumer loans.

All shares and deposits are insured by North Carolina Savings Guaranty Corporation in the aggregate of \$100,000.00 in each owner's account or accounts.

Who are eligible to become members?

"The resident bishop, ministers of or serving in the North Carolina Annual Conference, United Methodist Church, spouses of aforesaid ministers and members, and children, natural born and adopted, of any of these. Full-time employees of churches, institutions, and agencies of or related to the North Carolina Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church, the spouse and children, both natural born and adopted, of the eligible employees."

II. Non-Members (Lay and Clergy)

Silver and Golden Deposit programs, detailed above, are available to individuals or organizations on the same terms, except non-members are not required to invest in shares first. Only members can buy shares.

III. Churches or Organizations within churches

These groups can open Silver and Golden Deposits on the same terms as individuals who are non-members. This is a good way to let your surplus money earn a high yield, yet be available for use on short notice without a great loss in penalty.

We invite all of you to have a part in building Methodist Ministers Credit Union to the size that will permit it to serve all its members in every possible way, including the financing of homes on terms our retired or retiring ministers can afford. Better service from Methodist Ministers Credit Union can mean a better life style for many of our members. Indeed, it can be the means of saving some of our members for service in the conference.

A word of heartfelt thanks to all who have had a part in making this progress report possible. Let us go forward together to serve.

DIVISION OF MISSIONS

NEW describes the Division of Missions with a large percentage of its membership serving for the first time as we begin a new quadrennium. The "old" members have assisted the Division in taking a NEW look at where we have been, where we need to go, and specific changes and plans we need to initiate to reach new goals. It has been an exciting and productive year.

NEW insights into specific areas:

MISSION STUDIES — Chairperson Laura Wilson and the Committee are exploring ways to make this leadership study program more attractive so larger numbers of N.C. Methodist will study in preparation for their role as "world leaders." A large number of churches participated in Latin American Studies.

MISSION EMPHASIS EVENTS — like the Goldsboro District had with 367 events going on all over the district for a weekend promoting mission, has taken place in several districts.

MISSION INTERPRETATION — has been defined by the Committee to promote the use of coordination of mission interpreters throughout the conference. The Committee and the Board of Global Ministries with the desire to provide more easily accessible assistance is preparing a complete list of contact persons and missionaries available "close to home," The Reverend Roger Elliott, Chairperson.

VOLUNTEERS-IN-MISSION — through its Committee and an active group called together as Advisors under the leadership of Chairperson Mary Whanger, has made tremendous progress. Jamaica was designated as our focus for this year. Three N.C. Conference teams, including a District team of 12 ministers, have gone to Jamaica to work with the Jamaican church through building and Evangelism. This has been arranged under the direction of the S.E.J. Office for Volunteers-In-Mission. Seed money was given to the N.C. Conference Youth to initiate their plans for an in-country workteam in the U.S.A. A brochure and Volunteers-In-Mission stationary were prepared to give visibility to this program in which there is a high degree of interest and participation.

THE ADVANCE — due to the economy and a marked difference in gifts to hunger this year, after last year's highly successful Cambodian campaign, the Advance reflected a 30% decrease in the last year of the quadrennium and a 20% decrease so far in 1981. As a conference we need to remember that when we are feeling economic stress, that means the rest of the world is suffering even greater than before. The Advance reflects our concern for the deepest needs in our world. The Chairperson of the Committee, The Reverend Tom Holtsclaw, reports NEW promotion and NEW materials specifically related to our conference needs is in preparation. The Advance projects list is available through your church office and includes specific projects in which our conference has a special interest.

CHURCH EXTENSION — Chairperson David Brownlee — A highest of this committee report is the \$10 Club. Reports from A.P. Hill reflect increases in a program successful due the excellent promotion and the response of persons to specific needs. We expect the \$10 Club to continue to increase. Ten new churches is the goal of this Committee in this decade.

ETHNIC MINORITY—LOCAL CHURCH — is the Missional priority designated by the Board of Global Ministers because of the board need it reflects across the world. A task force in our conference is responsible for guiding this emphasis. It is the priority in each Committee of the Division as each seeks to reflect active responsibility in this area of global citizenship.

CHURCH AND COMMUNITY — The committee, under the leadership of The Reverend Clay Smith, has personally visited, reviewed grants and applications and recommended support for 19 projects in our conference supporting the Ethnic Minority Local Church, missional priority in many of them. They have also recommended four additional projects to the National Board for support. The emphasis of the Committee is to seek ways to assist these projects to work toward self-sustaining programs.

A work of this Committee is the new CHURCH OF THE YEAR guidelines with Mission emphasis added as a criteria for selection.

THE WORK OF THE DIVISION — is done in the Committees and brought to the Executive Committee and Full Board after thorough study and consideration. In an effort to responsibly use our funds, the Administration of the division has taken steps to cut costs of meeting by shortening the full meetings from two days to one day

and the full use of the telephone instead of gasoline. I want to thank the Division and the support it gets from across the conference. The work and concern reflect that we know the reason why the Church of Christ exists and seek to make it known.

DIVISION OF MISSIONS - Church Extension

Guidelines for Establishing New Congregations North Carolina Conference

(See 1980 JOURNAL)

Goals For The Quadrennium:

To KNOW our work well in order to define clearly the global concerns of Christians, to WORK closely with all the congregations of the conference, to STRENGTHEN the framework through which persons and congregations respond, to HELP shape new priorities and commitments that reflect growth towards global citizenship and responsibility.

The Missional Priority:

A missional priority is defined in THE BOOK OF DISCIPLINE as "a response to a critical need in God's world calling for massive and sustained effort; a need so broad that it cannot be met by a single agency of the church."

Ethnic Minority Local Churches

Has been designated as the missional priority — the Black, Native American, Hispanic, and an increasing refugee population. Developing new congregations and strengthening them to enable them to fulfill their ministries is a priority work of all the committees of the Division of Missions. They are not "objects of mission" but a presence of leadership to help us seek together what is required of us as we discover what global citizenship and responsibility mean.

THIS YEAR the work of the Division has focused on an honest evaluation of WHERE WE ARE in Mission. A relatively "new" Division has looked closely at every area of responsibility, evaluated our strengths and areas of concern, and made plans for the next steps in meeting our goals.

THE DISCOVERIES we have made have been challenging:

1. Our Advance giving was down 30% in the last year of the last quadrennium, reflecting the economy and prompting plans for a new type of Advance promotion.
2. The interest in personal involvement in Mission is very high. The number of persons and congregations involved in Volunteers-in-Mission is growing steadily and quickly. A team of ministers from our conference went to Jamaica; three additional conference teams did evangelistic and work projects with the Jamaican United Methodist Church.
3. Participation in the \$10 Club is increasing.
4. The call to help the hungry in Zimbabwe was very inadequate.
5. Our leadership role as North Americans requires STUDY of what is happening in global terms. Mission studies are poorly attended. New forms of mission study are being investigated.
6. The major work of the Division is done in committees and through district missionary secretaries. We are seeking ways to strengthen the Division through expectations of REAL participation and leadership from every member of the Division.
7. Administration costs of the Division have been cut by doing the major work in committees and limiting the full board meeting to one day.

WE ANTICIPATE that the Mission program of the conference will be the "heart beat" of congregations across the conference — giving strength, new energies and LIFE to each individual and church as only LOVE IN ACTION can do. WE EXPECT creative responses to the needs of the world in the North Carolina Conference.

NORTH — ROCKY MOUNT — This new congregation is growing and are in the process of finding a suitable site. This new congregation will be on the January 1982 call from the Ten Dollar Club.

LIGHTHOUSE — ABERDEEN — The Division of Missions have provided a mobile unit to provide a permanent place of worship.

We are happy to announce our newest congregation to be located in **South Cary — Raleigh District**. I am happy to present to you the organizing pastor the Reverend J. Cameron West.

We added 500 new members to the Ten Dollar Club this year. We desperately need new members if we are to meet the challenge of Church Extension. If you are not a member we invite you to share with us this great challenge of the Church.

Bishop Cannon, members of the Cabinet, and fellow members of the North Carolina Annual Conference:

It is with great excitement and deep gratitude that I will accept the appointment to establish a new congregation in Cary. I promise to you to help the laypeople of Cary begin a community of faith which draws on the best of the Wesleyan and United Methodist heritage.

The lessons for the Third Sunday of Easter point the way to a church which is truly evangelical. One of those lessons is from Acts, chapter 2. It describes the kind of church which will be established in south Cary. Saint Luke writes that after the Day of Pentecost, the first Jerusalem converts "devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers." Teaching, fellowship, the breaking of bread, prayers: these are the marks of a truly evangelical church, not a narrowly defined evangelical church founded on fear or founded on methods better left in the past, but a church evangelical in the historic Wesleyan and Methodist sense.

We are a church, first, of teaching and preaching. "Unite the pair so long disjointed, knowledge and vital piety," goes a line from Charles Wesley's hymn, "Come, Father, Son and Holy Ghost." Indeed, without good teaching and preaching, we have nothing to offer the world in God's name for the world to hear.

We are, secondly, a church of fellowship. Wesley's class, band and society meetings were part of his evangelical genius. Through these means, the early Methodists sought to care for one another and pursue the spiritual life in a way which the Church of England would not encourage at the time.

Thirdly, we are a church of prayer, supporting each other and the world and seeking to discover the will of God for our lives. Our Love Feast this morning is testimony to the central place of prayer in our heritage.

And lastly, we are a church which breaks bread together joyfully in corporate worship and home. The frequent and constant celebration of the Lord's Supper, in conjunction with and supporting the preaching of the Word, is central to the Wesleyan and United Methodist tradition. The frequent celebration of the Lord's Supper, in conjunction with and supporting the preached Word, was one of the cornerstones of John Wesley's theology and personal devotional practice. The frequent celebration of the sacrament, in conjunction with and supporting the preaching of the Word, will be central to the worship life of the new South Carolina congregation, as it should be.

And so I pledge to you that I will be faithful to the charge given us by Saint Luke in Acts 2 for the life of our congregations. I will seek to teach and preach faithfully. I will seek to promote the fellowship of Christians in Cary by visiting house to house and by promoting the development of cluster groups for spiritual growth and informal social life; I will continue to pursue the disciplined spiritual life as a model for the congregation and as a means of deepening my own life with our Lord. And I will be faithful to the charge given us by our Lord and by our spiritual forefather John Wesley; I will celebrate the Lord's Supper frequently. As Saint Luke wrote in chapter 24 of his gospel: "He was known to them in the breaking of bread."

Asked once about success in the ministry, John Calvin responded that the ordained minister has only one task: to proclaim the Gospel faithfully. The success would be for God to judge. Bishop Cannon, I pledge to you that I will be faithful to my tasks to teach and preach, to encourage fellowship, to be a model of prayer in my life, and to break bread sacramentally in the name of the Lord. I will consult you and my Superintendent often in my labors. And I ask for the prayers of all of you that God will grant us success in our new labors in Cary.

NORTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE VOLUNTEER-IN-MISSION REPORT

I feel that my report to a group such as you should be very graphic and should give you some facts, and should especially stay in your hearts and spirits, to help you make decisions after you leave this place.

I've been asked to report with a story from the N.C. Conference Mission Workteams. Two of the workteams from the Conference Volunteer-in-Mission Program have worked in the community of Trinidad, Bolivia. Part of our work was with a small group of lepers left destitute in the abandoned outbuildings of a condemned

nd hospital. Their food was brought in on a tray and left once a day. Their total rejection by the general population there was very difficult for us to bear. One leper's name was Marcello. He lived in a rickety cot covered with a patched and repatched mosquito net. His total worldly possessions were in a small wooden box under his cot. His nose was gone, part of his fingers and part of his toes were gone. He had cataracts on his eyes so that he could only dimly see. He crawled to the door to meet us every afternoon when we went to be with them. His joy and sense of mission were such an inspiration to everyone who met him. He greeted us with cheer and concern and he constantly brought to our attention the needs that he knew about in the world around his small cot. One of our work team members, a young man named Walt, asked if he could interview Marcello to see where his joy came from. He went over one morning to interview Marcello, the leper. He said to Marcello, "How long have you had leprosy?" Marcello said, "Twenty eight years." He asked, "How did you feel when you got leprosy?" Marcello said, "I was very angry. I did everything in the book to show my anger." Walt said to him, "Well, you are so full of joy now. What happened to you?" Marcello said, "Young man, you may not believe this, but one night I was asleep on my cot and I woke up in the middle of the night and Jesus was standing there beside my cot. Jesus said to me, 'Marcello, USE WHO YOU ARE.'"

The Division of Missions is the part of our church that enables us to USE WHO WE ARE. To follow those words of Jesus who said them to Marcello, the leper. The Division of Missions enables you to use who you are by supplying you with information. Every lay person here, when you go home, ask your preacher every few weeks about the Conference mailing and what it has got in it for you so that you can get that information. We have mission studies in all of our conferences. This year it is on Latin America to give the people a sense of purpose and the ability to more intelligently access some of the issues that we read about daily in our newspapers. Last Sunday here in Fayetteville, St. Andrews and Wesley Heights Churches met at a session for four hours. One Monday they met to write letters to people in Washington about the human rights in our foreign policy. The social issues of our own Conference is presented in the Hinton Papers which are absolutely excellent. I'd like to say personally that I think the Board of Church & Society's report in our **Conference Program** is one of the best calls of Mission that I have ever seen.

The Division of Missions enables us to USE WHO WE ARE to redeem some of the awful sins that we have perpetuated in our Society. We've learned in the last quadrennium that the Ethnic Minority Local Church's issue was only barely touched. Decades of systematic information could not be erased in a quadrennium of good feeling and program packages. It is an issue that needs the whole family of God — and that's us, folks — USING WHO WE ARE means acknowledging this as a priority of our spiritual energies, our resources and our dreams in the North Carolina Conference.

The Division of Missions also enables us to USE WHO WE ARE to reach out and touch our fellow man in interdependency. The Volunteers-in-Mission Program this year sent two teams to Jamaica. We had a team of ministers, twelve from the Raleigh District, to go. This summer we had youth teams to go to a community in Alabama that had been ravished by tornadoes.

Dr. Isa Grant died this week. She was one of the first North Carolina Conference Volunteers-in-Mission. Her father was a beloved minister of our Conference. We are so grateful for her involvement, year after year. Even after she discovered she had cancer, she personally sent a Person-in-Mission to work on the teams in South America.

The Division of Missions enables us to USE WHO WE ARE by alleviating hunger. Next Sunday I am going to speak at Camp Church in the Wilmington District. I am so excited That small church has just sent \$20,900.00 to alleviate hunger. A small church with a large sense of mission.

The Division of Missions enables us to USE WHO WE ARE to shape Society. My daughter-in-law was mugged two weeks ago in Virginia Beach by a drug-crazed young man. One of those that Governor Hunt wants us to help. Some time ago a handicapped child was brought to my school. Handicapped beyond hope by a baby formula that is banned in our country and now is being sold all over the world. There is a lot for us to do!

When I asked Marcello, the leper, "What would you like for us to do for you?" He answered, "Senora, I would like for you to bring me some binoculars so that I can see farther." I took them last year but he had died ten days before I got there. But he LIVES! And I pass on to you his gift of life to us in the North Carolina Conference and our challenge for the next year — his dream for a greater vision and the words of Jesus spoken to him — go back home to your churches and USE WHO YOU ARE. The Division of Missions report will reflect that next year.

THE BLACK CHURCH DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM

1. Evangelism and Church Growth

- A. We recommend that the annual conference approve and underwrite a comprehensive program of Evangelism in Black churches taking into consideration the traditional methods of Evangelism in Black churches.
- B. We recommend that the annual conference adopt a goal of establishing one new black congregation annually and that all of the resources of the conference be made available for surveys and studies of Black population trends to determine the feasibility and location of these congregations.

2. Nurture: Adult Ministries

We recommend that the annual conference continue to support workshops and seminars for the training of Black laypersons for ministry. Such training should include Bible study, theological reflection, Christian education, stewardship and training in United Methodist organization and governance.

Youth Ministries

We recommend that the annual conference shall survey youth ministry needs among Black churches, locate effective models and train leaders in youth ministries. Establish interethnic youth programs to get at attitudes, myths, stereotypes and creative aspects of ethnic culture enabling youth to express themselves in evangelism, nurture, worship, stewardship and outreach.

3. Worship

- A. We recommend that the annual conference approve and underwrite a workshop on worship in the Black church to be held during the quadrennial to study the rich heritage of Black worship, to encourage the creativity of Black leaders in their celebrations and to find means of sharing the contribution of the Black worship tradition with the total church.

4. Outreach: Community Services

- A. We recommend that the annual conference approve and underwrite one or more workshops to train Black church leaders in ways to study, understand and respond creatively and positively to the needs of the Black community. We urge the conference to create human and financial support systems which will sustain outreach ministries of Black churches.

5. Ministers: Enlistment, Training, Support, and Deployment

We recommend to the annual conference:

- A. That there be one conference consultation and four regional consultations on recruitment for ministry in Black churches during the 1981-84 quadrennial.
- B. That the conference boards of the ministry establish priorities which will increase opportunities for continuing education among Black clergy,

focusing primarily on lay pastors and associate members.

- C. That salary supplements above and beyond minimum salary be made available to Black ministers where such support is justified.
- D. That the conference adopt and implement an international policy of open itineracy.

6. Organization: Representation and Ecumenism

We recommend to the annual conference:

- A. That the bishops, cabinets, nomination committees and units coordinating the Missional Priority in annual conferences shall recruit adequate Black representation.
- B. That the bishop and the cabinet insure that there shall always be Black representation in the cabinet.
- C. That the North Carolina Conference exert leadership in the election of Black persons to the chairmanship of boards and agencies and to the episcopacy.
- D. That the annual conference promote and support Black ecumenical ministries, especially with other Black denominations.

7. Church Development and Buildings

- A. We recommend that the annual conference continue the special provision for the building of Black parsonages. We envision the need of at least five new parsonages for Black churches in the near future.
- B. We recommend that the annual conference increase its appropriation for the improvement of the facilities of Black congregations.

The following churches should be involved in upgrading their facilities during the quadrennial: Cool Springs, Millers, Zora, Mt. Zion, Cedar-Grove, Galilee, Piney Grove, Salem, Philadelphia, Mt. Olive (Lumberton), St. Peter (Wagram), Hargrove, Fletcher's Chapel and Smith's Chapel.

REPORT OF UNITED METHODIST MUSICIANS

Bishop Cannon, members of the cabinet, and delegates to the 1981 Annual Conference Session of the North Carolina Conference, it gives me great pleasure to stand before you today to report to you about the activities of the Fellowship of United Methodists in worship, music and other arts.

We are a self-sustaining body deriving our funds from fees collected or budgeted amounts from Annual Conference agencies, specifically the Division of Education. Activities which we sponsor include: Youth Music Workshop, The Conference Handbell Festival, Children's Choir Camp, Annual Conference Music, Conference-wide workshop-meetings, and district choir events.

As president of this group, it is my duty to see that each of these activities are planned and successfully carried out.

First, Youth Music Workshop was held for the tenth year last June, 1980. Dr. Walker Breland, Professor of Music and the University of Tennessee at Chattanooga was our guest conductor. We met for 4 days on the campus of Methodist College and then embarked on a 4 day tour to Wilmington, Myrtle Beach, Florence, South Carolina, Conway, South Carolina and returned for our homecoming concert at Edenton Street United Methodist Church in Raleigh. We toured areas of interest in Wilmington and Myrtle Beach. We stayed in homes of members of the churches in which we sang a full concert of sacred music. Leadership was provided by members of our Conference chapter with Roger Searles as Chairperson. Reverend Ed Morrison provided special Leadership for this and all Conference events.

Second, the Conference Handbell Festival was again held on the Campus of Methodist College during March, 1980. For the first time in several years, a guest conductor not in our conference chapter was selected. Mr. Clyde Patterson from First Baptist Church in Wilson was our guest Conductor. 15 choirs packed into the Student Center for the two-day event. Mr. Bill Lowdermilk sees to it that this and Youth Music workshop are carried out without any hitches. Parents and friends attended the final concert of massed ringing selections and solo pieces played by individual choirs. Leadership was provided by members of our conference chapter with Laura Davenport as Chairperson.

Third, Children's Choir Camp was held for the third year at Camp Don-Lee in August 1980. 35 children from our conferences churches came to Don-Lee to learn about handbell ringing, orff instrument playing and singing anthems in a choir. All the fun activities of Don-Lee were used to their fullest and a special "Thank You" to Rev. John Farmer and the Don-Lee staff for providing leadership for these activities. Parents and friends attended a final concert at Don-Lee. Leadership was provided by member of our conference chapter with myself as chairperson.

Fourth, all the music at the 1980 Annual Conference Session has been provided by Diaconal Minister of Music and members of our conference chapter. All organ music, choirs and soloists were scheduled by Bill Hilderbrandt who is chairperson for this event.

Again this year we scheduled three meetings of our chapter. Last fall we met at Shady Grove UMC in Kinston, with Mrs. Elizabeth Moore as host. At these meetings, which we make workshop sessions we try to cover areas of selecting childrens, youth and adult choir music, youth musicals, appropriate organ or piano music, voice production, conducting, choral diction, handbell ringing techniques to name a few. We are trying to gear these meetings to meet the needs of the small-membership churches. We hope that more persons will take advantage of these meetings.

Our winter meeting was held at St. Paul UMC in Goldsboro and our third meeting is held at Annual Conference.

Leadership for the Bishop's Seminar on Preaching is also provided by members of our conference chapter. An Avery and Marsh Workshop was scheduled in February 1980 in cooperation with the Division of Worship. It was cancelled, however, due to lack of registrations.

Of all the activities which our chapter provides, however, the most important is service to the local church. 52 weeks a year our churches are served by more than 800 dedicated Christians who serve as Directors, Organists, Singers, Ringers and Instrumentalists and strive to inspire our worship services through the ministry of music.

Grant that what we sing with our lips, We may believe in our hearts,
And what we believe in our hearts, We may show forth in our lives,
Through Jesus Christ, our Lord.

BOARD OF ORDAINED MINISTRY REPORT

Ordination Service For Deacons And Elders

At every Annual Conference Session the ordination service for its ministers is a very special time. A new schedule for the 1981 Annual Conference provided for the ordination services to be held on Sunday afternoon and evening in the sanctuary of Haymount United Methodist Church in Fayetteville. The Board of Ordained Ministry presented a total of 16 men and women to be ordained a Deacon and 14 to be ordained an Elder. At the Executive Session of the Annual Conference 19 persons were presented for Probationary Membership, one for Associate Membership, and 14 for Full Connection. Along with persons being recommended for the Local Pastor relationship, these conference membership recommendations represent a large amount of interview time spent by the 30 members of the Board of Ordained Ministry. Guidance and support for a number of other persons in the process of preparation for ordained ministry through both the Board of Ordained Ministry and the several District Committees on Ordained Ministry seek to provide the North Carolina Conference with a adequate supply of prepared and committed persons to serve our pulpits in future years.

Continuing Education

Every United Methodist minister is now required to take time during each church year to be involved in a program of growth and stimulation to enhance his/her ministry. The Board is appreciative of the financial support that most local congregations now provide in their budgets to assist their pastor to accomplish this requirement. Spring and Fall Institutes at the Duke Divinity School, Pastor's Week (or similar programs) at many other seminaries, the Seminar on the Ministry held in the spring, and programs offered by our conference colleges and at Lake Junaluska are providing opportunities for a variety of learning experiences. Financial aid is being provided to some opportunities at Duke through the Duke Endowment and other funds in the Divinity School, while grants of up to \$125.00 have been provided for individual study and training opportunities through funds of the Board of ordained Ministry.

Ministerial Education Fund Assistance

The Ministerial Education Fund remains the major source of support for theological education in The United Methodist Church for the 1981-1984 quadrennium. When the local church remits the Ministerial Education Fund to the Conference Treasurer, it is divided two ways. The larger portion (75%) is sent on to the Division of Higher Education and Ministry in Nashville to be divided among the United Methodist seminaries for their operating expenses and for scholarship help

to minority and special students. The remaining 25% portion is retained by the Board of Ordained Ministry in the North Carolina Conference.

The Board of Ordained Ministry may use its funds to provide scholarship assistance for ministerial education, for continuing education, and for recruitment. However, the amount of funds available during the past few years and the number of students seeking to prepare for ordained ministry have made necessary the use of almost all of the funds for scholarships for ministerial candidates.

Grants to students eligible for full scholarship were based on 35% of the actual educational cost (tuition and fees and an annual \$200.00 book allowance). For students at Duke Divinity School this was \$1,000.00 for full-time (four courses) students and \$768.00 for student pastors (three courses) annually. At Southeastern this was \$332.00 for full time students and \$250.00 for less than full time students annually.

The need to continue our support of the Ministerial Education Fund at the present level, and to increase where possible, is borne out by these statistics of our present group of students preparing for ministry and the need to move further into continuing education opportunities for the ministers already in the field.

Pastoral Care

The Pastoral Care Committee has a two-fold purpose: 1) To make available the counseling and enrichment experiences for ministers and their families at approved centers, providing financial aid in such a way that the names of those receiving help are kept entirely anonymous; 2) To encourage enrichment weekends for district or multi-district groups and to suggest and finance leadership for these weekends.

During the year, the committee helped to finance retreats in the Rocky Mount and the Wilmington Districts. Under the leadership of Mrs. Betty Lou Stark, a booklet on Parsonage Living was put together and sent to all ministerial families of the North Carolina Conference. We have succeeded in finding another counseling agency—The Tidewater Psychiatric Institute, Norfolk, Virginia. Over 35 families have been involved in counseling sessions supported financially by the Committee on Pastoral Care.

In response to the evident and growing frustration of pastors coping with the many demands on their time, the Pastoral Care Committee recommends the following:

1. To help pastors deal with the increasing pressure upon their schedules and upon commitment to their ministry, workshops in each district dealing with time management and priority setting are strongly urged for the fall of 1981.
2. Since those needing this help the most may be the most reluctant to attend, special consideration should be given to ways to encourage or even require attendance. It is hoped that these workshops will help ministers to evaluate and improve the effectiveness of their use of time, and through making judgements on what things should take priority to be strengthened in commitment to their faith and ministry. Dr. James A. Hyde, Director of the Fayetteville Family Life Center, may be helpful in planning these workshops for the pastors.

Even as we seek to minister, every one of us at times face crises—or ruts—in which we need to be ministered to. If you know of ways this Pastoral Care Committee can more effectively provide such ministry, please contact any member of the Committee.

Pastoral Evaluation

A joint committee of persons from the Cabinet and Board of Ordained Ministry have been meeting for the past six months to begin the development of means and methods to provide evaluation of pastoral leadership and effectiveness. Methods of self-evaluation for the minister as well as group evaluation by Pastor-Parish Relations Committees and supervisory evaluation by District Superintendents have been a part of the agenda. At this time the committee has no recommendation to present to the Annual Conference. It will continue its study and be prepared to offer leadership in the development of a program that will strengthen and encourage the pastoral leadership of the North Carolina Conference in the years ahead.

Psychological Testing And Evaluation

There is substantial evidence of a need for a program/process to assist the candidate for ordained ministry in identifying and exploring the meaning, origin, and implications of the sense of calling, in effectively assessing his/her gifts and graces, and in comparing the capacities needed for ministry with those discovered in one's self. There is equal need to assist the candidate in dealing constructively with those areas that are or could become problem areas which would hinder effective ministry. The Church has the continuing responsibility to take the lead in the process of enabling Her ministers to become the most skilled, capable, and effective servants of God possible.

To this end, the Board of Ordained Ministry has established a Committee on Psychological Testing and Evaluation that will begin with those candidates seeking a membership relationship in the North Carolina Conference in 1982 to provide an adequate program of testing and evaluation.

North Carolina Pastors School

Each year during the Duke Convocation and Pastors School a number of opportunities are presented for the further growth and development of ministers in the North Carolina and Western North Carolina Conferences. Planning for these activities is done by the Board of Managers, composed of an equal number of ministers from each conference. The following nominations are presented for membership on the Board of Managers from the North Carolina Conference:

TASK FORCE ON OPEN ITINERACY

Statement of Purpose and Report to the 1981 North Carolina Annual Conference

The Task Force on Open Itineracy represents a concern for the appointment of ministers with the singular consideration of gifts and graces to meet the needs, characteristics, and opportunities of pastoral charges. Commitment to open itineracy seeks the removal of all impediments and hindrances arising from unrighteous attitudes and prejudices which restrict any minister from consideration for any appointment. The Task Force acknowledges that there are a multiplicity of factors, circumstances, and conditions which affect the process of appointment-making and seeks to affirm those procedures which are equitable and just. The work of the Task Force has focused on two major areas of concern, the appointment of ethnic minority pastors and the appointment of women pastors. This should not be interpreted as ignoring other conditions or factors which wrongfully limit the itineracy process. It recognizes, however, that the issues involved in the appointing of ethnics and women occur at the point of critical awareness and often challenge the commitment of the church to both scriptural inclusiveness and witness to the transforming power of the gospel.

Open itineracy affirms the word of scripture which says, "There is neither Jew nor Greek, there is neither slave nor free, there is neither male nor female, for you are one in Christ Jesus." (Galatians 3:28) Barriers preventing the servants of God from ministering to people cannot be of God. The words of Jesus strike to the very heart of the matter in his prayer for the church, "I do not pray for these only, but also for those who believe in me through their word, that they may all be one." (John 17:20)

The 1980 General Conference of the United Methodist Church has spoken decisively to the issue of open itineracy. A detailed statement on the position of the church may be found in the *Book of Discipline*, in the section entitled, "Appointment-Making" (paragraph 527). The Conference Task Force was mandated by action taken in the 1980 session and placed under the Board of Ordained Ministry. In pursuing its task and developing this proposal, it has worked closely with the Cabinet committee dealing with the same matter. It has also been in consultation with the Task Force of the General Church, chaired by Bishop James Armstrong.

In presenting this report for action, the Task Force affirms that a commitment to open itineracy will not only strengthen our ministry but will enrich and broaden the missional understanding of the church. It is not just a matter of equity for the clergy

but a necessary witness where the church is most visible. The Task Force acknowledges that the process of appointment-making is often very difficult, involving a degree of care and understanding not always evident to the church at large. The Task Force affirms the policy of consultation in appointment-making and calls upon all persons prayerfully to affirm solutions to problems and to exercise reason in every instance where the Bishop and Cabinet are asked to bring the best leadership to a particular situation. Open itineracy should touch the full range of appointments, in terms of membership, salary, and potential, to ensure equity at all levels. The principle of reason and fairness dictates that the criteria involved in fixing the appointment include personal faith, skills and ability, academic background, professional experience, proven leadership, and age. A more detailed expression of these factors is found in the *Book of Discipline*, in the section entitled, "Criteria" (paragraph 530). It does not serve the interest of the church to appoint unqualified or undeserving persons simply to demonstrate a noble principle. The needs of the church are served only when ministers are prepared to deal with the exigencies of the situation to which he or she is appointed. In seeking to implement the principle of open itineracy, the Task Force offers this resolution:

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, the scriptures call all followers of Jesus Christ to oneness in his Spirit and wholeness of fellowship and service; and

WHEREAS, the witness of faith leads to an understanding that the ministry of the Church of Jesus Christ shall not be restricted or hindered;

BE IT RESOLVED, by this 1981 Session of the North Carolina Annual Conference, The United Methodist Church, that we strongly support the Bishop and Cabinet of this Annual Conference in taking the following action as soon as possible:

1. To make a deliberate and particular effort in the appointment-making process to ensure that women of skill and leadership be given the same opportunities for appointment in keeping with demonstrated gifts and graces for ministry as those afforded male clergy.
2. To engage in consultation with a church, historically serving a white constituency, which is considered to be an appointment of opportunity and leadership within the Conference, and to pursue the early appointment of a pastor background and whose experience and qualifications would serve the needs of the congregation well and convey the witness of the gospel of the community. We support a goal of accomplishing this intent no later than the end of this quadrennium.
3. To engage in dialogue with pastors and leaders of ethnic minority local churches and churches of small membership to proceed in such a manner that the leadership of these churches is not deprived by open itineracy but rather strengthened.
4. To prepare all pastoral charges for open itineracy (without respect to size of membership or salary support) through the sharing and exchange of information in such forums as District Lay Rallies, January Workshops, Summer Leadership School, etc. The guiding principle in this undertaking shall be the strengthening of pastoral leadership and the effectiveness of the ministry of every congregation.

Ordination Service For Deacons And Elders

At every Annual Conference Session the ordination service for its ministers is a very special time. A new schedule for the 1981 Annual Conference will provide for the ordination services to be held on Sunday evening in the sanctuary of Haymount United Methodist Church in Fayetteville. The Board of Ordained Ministry will present a total of 16 men and women to be ordained a Deacon and a similar number to be ordained an Elder. There will be 19 persons presented for Probationary Membership, one for Associate Membership, and 16 for Full Connection. Along with persons being recommended for the Local Pastor relationship, these conference membership recommendations represent a large amount of interviewing time by the 30 members of the Board. Guidance and support for a number of other persons in the process of preparation for ordained ministry through both the Board of Ordained Ministry and the several District Committees on Ordained Ministry seek to provide the North Carolina Conference with an adequate supply of prepared and committed persons to serve our pulpits in future years.

Continuing Education

Every United Methodist minister is now required to take time during each church year to be involved in a program of growth and stimulation to enhance his/her ministry. The Board is appreciative of the financial support that most local congregations now provide in their budget to assist their pastor to accomplish this requirement. Spring and Fall Institutes at the Duke Divinity School, Pastor's Week (or similar programs) at many other seminaries, the Seminary on the Ministry held in the Spring, and programs offered by our conference colleges and at Lake Junaluska are providing opportunities for a variety of learning experiences. Financial aid is being provided to some opportunities at Duke through the Duke Endowment and other funds in the Divinity School, while grants of up to \$125.00 have been provided for individual study and training opportunities through funds of the Board of Ordained Ministry.

Pastoral Care

An area of assistance provided by the Board that continues to grow both in use and usefulness is financial support, provided on an anonymous basis, for those parsonage families or family members who may need skilled professional counseling. Over 35 families have benefited from this aid during the past year. Many pastors and their families are looking in another direction as well as they participate in marriage enrichment opportunities provided by their districts or other sources. Several districts will hold marriage enrichment seminars during 1981.

Ministerial Education Fund Assistance

Contributions from local churches to the Ministerial Education Fund during 1979 increased to nearly \$186,000. The North Carolina Conference retains one-fourth of this fund to provide scholarship assistance for college and seminary students preparing for ordained ministry. During the 1980-1981 school year, 73 students were given grants from the Ministerial Education Fund, 8 on the college level and 65 on the seminary level, to a total of \$47,807. These grants provided 35% of the indicated educational expense of the student (tuition, fees, and books), but did not

provide assistance for food, housing, and other living expenses. Additional monies were made available to the Committee on Continuing Education (\$2,500) for programs of training and study for those ministers who have already completed their formal educational process.

MINISTERIAL EDUCATION FUND

The Ministerial Education Fund remains the major source of support for theological education in The United Methodist Church for the 1981-1984 quadrennium. When the local church remits the Ministerial Education Fund to the Conference Treasurer, it is divided two ways. The larger portion (75%) is sent on to the Division of Higher Education and Ministry in Nashville to be divided amongst the United Methodist seminaries for their operating expenses and for scholarship help to minority and special students. The remaining 25% portion is retained by the Board of Ordained Ministry in the North Carolina Conference.

The Board of Ordained Ministry may use its funds to provide scholarship assistance for ministerial education, for continuing education, and for recruitment. However, the amount of funds available during the past few years and the number of students seeking to prepare for ordained ministry have made necessary the use of almost all of the funds for scholarships for ministerial candidates.

Grants to students eligible for full scholarship were based on 35% of the actual educational cost (tuition and fees and an annual \$200.00 book allowance). For

students at Duke Divinity School this was \$1,000.00 for full-time (four courses) students and \$768.00 for student pastors (three courses) annually. At Southeastern this was \$332.00 for full time students and \$250.00 for less than full time students annually.

The need to continue our support of the Ministerial Education Fund at the present level, and to increase where possible, is borne out by these statistics of our present group of students preparing for ministry and the need to move further into continuing education opportunities for the ministers already in the field.

ANNUAL REPORT BOARD OF MANAGERS NORTH CAROLINA PASTORS' SCHOOL

The 1980 North Carolina Pastors' School was held at Duke University, October 7-29, 1980. The theme was "The Mission of the Church in the '80s: New Beginnings in a New Decade." The Gray Lecturer was the Reverend Jose Miguez Bonino, Professor of Systematic Theology and Ethics at the Protestant Theological Seminary, Buenos Aires, Argentina. The Hickman Lecturer was the Reverend R. Maurice Boyd, Senior Minister of Metropolitan Church in London, Ontario, Canada. Dr. Harrell Beck, of Boston University, was preacher.

In addition, workshops led by leaders of the church were available.

The Board of Managers received \$1,000.00 each from the North Carolina Conference, the Western North Carolina Conference, and the General Board of Higher Education and Ministry, Division of Ordained Ministry, Nashville. Additional funding is provided by the Gray Fund, the Hickman Fund and Duke Divinity School.

Over five hundred ministers from the two North Carolina Annual Conferences registered for Pastors' School in 1980.

The 1981 Pastors' School will be held at Duke University on October 26, 27, and 28. The Gray Lecturer will be the Reverend Geoffrey Wainwright of Union Theological Seminary in New York. Also featured will be Dean Jameson Jones, and other outstanding leaders of the church.

REPORT A

General Recommendations

The goal represents funds that will help to fund our participation in the new pension program in a more substantial way than is possible through the Outreach Ministries — Fair Share apportionments. The more capital funds (cash) that we have on hand to assist our entrance into the new program (which is really only a continuation of our efforts to fully fund the present system), the less it will require in the years ahead to complete our funding.

The Board of Pensions would express its appreciation to all of the faithful participants in the Pension Funding Crusade for their helpful assistance in this aspect of our pension program. You have shown that you care about the welfare of our retired ministers, both now and in the future, and those who will receive these benefits are truly grateful.

PENSION PLAN

With the advent of the new pension plan adopted by the 1980 General Conference, all ministers who are members of the North Carolina Conference on January 1, 1982, will be involved in three phases of retirement benefits:

1. **Past Service** — which will be determined by the years of creditable service, multiplied by the per service year rate.
2. **Ministerial Pension Plan/Comprehensive Protection Plan** — the new program which is based on the minister's cash income. This program regards the derived benefits as deferred compensation rather than a pension as such.
3. **Minister's Personal Account** — the 3% of cash income contribution made by the minister.

The basic reasons for the adoption of the new pension plan are:

1. To provide a better balance between the income of active ministers and those who are retired.
2. To place funds aside on a regular basis in a specific church account for each minister.
3. To relate the deferred benefits to the actual income of an active minister.
4. To conform to all guidelines established by the Employees Retirement Income Security Act (ERISA) in the event church plans are removed from the present exemption from the Act.

I. Past Service Liability

- A. **Past service will continue to be paid on the defined benefit** concept (per service year rate) for all service rendered to the North Carolina Conference through December 31, 1981. This plan is expected to continue until all persons with past service benefits and their surviving spouses have died.
- B. Goal of defined benefits (per service year rate) has always been 1% of the Conference Average Salary.

Take Cash Income (salary plus utilities)	\$15,000.00 (for ex.)
Add Housing Allowance (20% of cash income)	3,000.00
	\$18,000.00

Use this set of figures for all **full time** conference members (Full, Associate, and Probationary) and derive the average. This becomes the Conference Average Salary. The 1981 CAS for the North Carolina Conference is \$14,219.00.

- C. Current rate is \$105.50 per service year with a projected increase to \$110.00 on July 1, 1981. This leaves our present rate \$32.00 behind the normative goal.
- D. Prior to 1972 we raised monies for pensions one year and spent it the next. The only reserves that were accumulated came by way of planned benefits not being paid because of the death of the recipient.
- E. In our present funded program an increase of \$12,500.00 annually is required to make an increase of \$1.00 in the service rate. This is also accomplished by a one-time payment of \$125,000.00 into the pension fund. To make the increase from \$110.00 to \$142.00 would require either an increase in Single Figure commitments of \$400,000.00 per year

for the next thirty years or a single payment of \$4,000.00 into the pension fund now. To increase the rate without any payment into the fund creates an additional unfunded liability of \$4,000,000.00. We still have unfunded liabilities for the present pension program that would require about fifteen more years of payment at the present rate. We have reduced the original plan of 30 years by about seven years due to increased earnings.

- F. For a rate of \$142.00 to be fully funded on January 1, 1982 would require a payment to the General Board of Pensions on December 31, 1981, of about \$20,000,000.00.
- G. Participation in the new Ministerial Pension Plan **requires** that an Annual Conference continue to increase its past service rate as the Conference Average Salary increases, to at least 0.9% to continue to participate in the new pensions program fully. We propose that the past service rate in 1982 be \$142.00 per year. Further increases will be presented to Annual Conferences in the future as the Conference Average Salary increases.
- H. To fund the past service rate with the General Board will require

An initial payment of 15% of unfunded liability —	\$2,952,946
An annual payment to fund unfunded liabilities —	\$ 975,189

 This is a forty (40) year program.
- I. To increase any past service rate will always involve accepting an unfunded liability that must be satisfied by either a single cash payment, a series of planned payments, or a combination of both.

II. Ministerial Pension Plan (MPP)

- A. Service on and after January 1, 1982 will be funded on a new concept, called a **defined contribution** plan. This plan is basically deferred salary, and creates no unfunded liability because it builds an account of funds for a specific minister as his/her salary is paid.
- B. Funding is based on a percentage of Plan Compensation. Plan Compensation is calculated as follows:

Take Cash Income (salary plus utilities)	\$15,000.00 and
Add Housing Allowance (20% of cash income)	3,000.00
Plan Compensation will be	\$18,000.00

 - No travel funding is ever used in Plan Compensation calculations as this is considered by the General Board of Pensions to be an item of local expense.
 - The utility allowance of a pastor is not considered to be more than 10% of the total Cash Income, regardless of the amount set by the local church at its Charge Conference.
 - For the 1982-1986 quadrennium, the funding formula will not include an amount for utilities. This means that only 90% of the Cash Income will be the base for Plan Compensation.
- C. The cost of the Ministerial Pension Plan for a 9% contribution of actual Plan Compensation is \$844,346.00 in 1982.
- D. The Ministerial Pension Plan contribution from the local church is to be paid monthly to the Conference Treasurer for transmission to the General Board of Pensions.
- E. These contributions are placed in the individual minister's Church Ac-

count to be available for benefits when the minister becomes eligible for payment in the retired relationship. The following options are available at that time:

1. A life annuity with 100% to the surviving contingent annuitant.
 2. A life annuity with 75% to the surviving contingent annuitant.
 3. A life annuity with 50% to the surviving contingent annuitant.
 4. A single-life annuity with ten years certain.
 5. A single-life annuity with five years certain.
 6. A single-life, (no refund) annuity.
- F. Each minister who is eligible for benefits will be required to designate beneficiaries for the benefits he/she is qualified to receive.

III. Comprehensive Protection Plan (CPP)

- A. This part of the new program contains provisions for a death benefit, disability income, and funding for the peerage portion of the Ministerial Pension Plan. In addition to a new provision of a death benefit for the surviving spouse of a minister, the comprehensive plan also includes educational benefits for the children of a deceased minister. This part of the new plan is only available to those ministers serving full time.
1. Death benefits provide 150% of Denomination Average Salary as the benefit paid on the death of a minister through age 46, dropping on a graduated basis to 105% at age 55, 70% at age 62, and 20% upon retirement at any age.
 2. Disability payments are based on 40% of the Denominational Average Salary.
 3. The peerage program provides for a contribution from the Comprehensive Protection Plan to the minister's Church Account of a sufficient amount to provide the minister with a total contribution for the year based on the Denominational Average Compensation. This would provide every minister in the North Carolina Conference under appointment to a full time charge (Conference Member and Local Pastor) with an annual Church Account accumulation of 9% of Plan Compensation based on the Denominational Average Salary.
- B. The cost of the Comprehensive Protection Plan for a 4.1% contribution of Plan Compensation is \$344,765.00 in 1982. The minister will be required to pay 1% of the 4.1% as provided in the Comprehensive Protection Plan, and the church or charge will pay the additional 3.1%.

IV. Minister's Personal Account

- A. The new pension program provides that a minister who participates in the Ministerial Pension Plan shall contribute 3% of Plan Compensation annually to his/her Personal Account.
- B. These funds would be available in a lump sum or in a variety of other options when the minister reaches age 60.

V. Implementation of the Program

The pension program of The United Methodist Church is designed to be deferred compensation, benefits earned by the minister to be used at a later time for his/her retirement income. The plan being presented to the 1981 Session of the North Carolina Conference seeks to implement the long-standing goal of providing 1%

of the Conference Average Salary as the per service year rate for its ministers, to continue funding that past service responsibility in a determined fashion, and to move into the new Ministerial Pension Plan as rapidly as possible to achieve the basic 12% goal established by the General Conference.

The new benefit program seeks to provide a wider range of support for the minister's family through death benefits for every member of the family, disability income for the minister in times of great stress, educational benefits for children of deceased ministers, minimum annuity benefits for surviving spouses, and the build-up of contributions to the church Account of those ministers whose compensation is below the Denominational Average Salary.

- A. Costs of the past service pension program would be transmitted to the local church through the Outreach Ministries — Fair Share Goal.
- B. Costs of the Ministerial Pension Plan/Comprehensive Protection Plan will be borne by the local church as an item of ministerial support according to the Plan Compensation of the minister and the category of the church.

Full Time (Conference Member or Local Pastor) — 12.1% of Plan Comp.

Student (Conference Member or Local Pastor) — 9% of Plan Compensation.

Less than Full Time (Conference Member or Local Pastor) — 9% of salary.

- C. Monthly payments from the local church for the Ministerial Pension Plan/Comprehensive Protection Plan **MUST** be paid to the Conference Treasurer monthly so the Conference Treasurer can make his monthly payment to the General Board of Pensions as required by the Plan. Failure of the local church to make these monthly payments will jeopardize the minister's participation in the Plan and diminish his/her future benefits.
- D. The minister will make regular payments to the Conference Treasurer for his/her portion (1%) of the Comprehensive Protection Plan.
- E. The minister will make regular payments to the General Board of Pensions for his/her Personal Account (3%).
- F. Funds for the initial payment for past service liability will come from a number of sources: (1/1/81 - 2/31/81)

The budget request for 1982 is the same amount as is carried in the 1981 budget.

VI. Summary

With the adoption of these recommendations, the North Carolina Conference will enter the new Ministerial Pension Plan/Comprehensive Protection Plan of The United Methodist Church as a full partner with the other 73 conferences of the denomination. For the first time there will be a uniform pension program for the whole church.

Although some of the ideas presented in the Ministerial Pension Plan may seem to be new, particularly the idea that the local church will be responsible for its pastor's pension through a particular percentage of his/her cash income, it is a return to the plan in effect prior to the adoption of the "Single Figure" concept of conference funding. In 1967, the last year that the Conference Claimants apportionment was directly related to the pastor's income, the amount of 16% of salary and utilities (but not travel) was the prescribed figure. The following year the Board of Pensions requested the total pension budget be included in the Single Figure apportionment to the local church, and so it has continued.

Ministers in The United Methodist Church have received their retirement benefits for many years as deferred salary, although it has never been described in that particular fashion with any frequency. Retirement income from the Ministers Reserve Pension Fund (under which we have operated since 1972) is taxable by both federal and state tax laws. Additionally, ministers have been considered by the federal Internal Revenue Service to be self-employed persons and pay the entire costs of their Social Security tax. For this reason, the General Board of Pensions has not suggested that ministers participate in the Church Account of the new Ministerial Pension Plan, but do offer the option (which we have elected to follow) that the minister pay a portion of the Comprehensive Protection Plan.

This new program will help to improve the benefits to the minister at retirement in the future, and it will also prevent the continuing accumulation of unfunded responsibility that would require Pension Funding Crusades or other methods of capital fund collections.

REPORT C

Disability Responsibility

One of the new provisions of the Comprehensive Protection Plan is the support of those ministers on Disability Leave, including both the payment of monthly benefits and the assumption of payment of their pension responsibility in the Ministerial Pension Plan.

For those Annual Conferences who are already participating in the Ministers Reserve Pension Plan of the General Board of Pensions, the new Comprehensive Plan will immediately cover all persons on Disability Leave, both currently and in the future. For those Annual Conferences like ours who are not currently in the Ministers Reserve Pension Plan only those who are placed on Disability Leave after January 1, 1982, will be covered by the Comprehensive Protection Plan. We would be responsible for providing funds to the General Board of Pensions to take care of these disability responsibilities for those persons currently on Disability Leave. Our actuary, Hutchison and Associates, computed our responsibility for these persons on January 1, 1982 to be \$581,686, which would include the payment of their monthly benefits and pension responsibility until their retirement.

The General Board of Pensions is providing an opportunity for all Annual Conferences not currently participants in the Ministers Reserve Pension Fund to enter on July 1, 1981, through a six month plan of participation. This plan requires the payment of 9% of the Conference Average Salary (\$14,219) for each of the 515 ministers currently receiving pension credit, divided 7% to the ministers' service annuity accounts and 2% to the pooled Disability and Survivor Benefit Fund. The actual amounts are \$256,297.00 to the ministers' accounts and \$73,227 to the Disability and Survivor Benefit Fund.

To accomplish this end, the following resolution is recommended:

WHEREAS, after study of the new Ministerial Pension Plan and Comprehensive Protection Plan, adopted by the 1980 Conference, and in which ministers of all Annual Conferences are to participate beginning January 1, 1982, it is the judgement of the Board of Pensions of the North Carolina Conference that it would be advantageous to this Conference to enter the new plans from the Ministers Reserve Pension Plan rather than from the present Current Income Distribution Plan of this conference; therefore

BE IT RESOLVED, that the North Carolina Conference does hereby enter into the Ministers Reserve Fund, under Plan I-B for Current Service participation, for the period July 1, 1981 through December 31, 1981, in accordance with the following provisions:

1. All associate, probationary, and full connectional members who are receiving conference pension credit shall, during that six-month period, be participating members of the Ministers Reserve Pension Plan.
2. A Conference Contribution equivalent of an annual rate of 9% of the Conference Average Salary of \$14,219 shall be made by the North Carolina Conference to the Fund on December 31, 1981, on behalf of each participating member for the stated period of six months, the equivalent of 7% of the average salary to be credited to the ministers' Service Annuity accounts to provide a portion of their pension from the Conference, and the equivalent of 2% of the Average Salary to be credited to the pooled Disability and Survivor Benefit Fund with the General Board of Pensions.
3. Participating members may voluntarily make monthly personal contributions to their own accounts with the Fund, such amounts to accumulate at interest and provide such persons with retirement benefits in addition to pensions to be provided by the Conference.
4. Participation of this Conference in the Ministers Reserve Pension Fund shall be subject to the Rules and Regulations of that Fund.

REPORT D

Housing Exclusion Allowance)

INTERNAL REVENUE SERVICE DOCUMENT NO. 5045 (10-67)

DECLARES:

"Rental Value of Home furnished a Clergyman, and cost of utilities paid for him, as part of his compensation for carrying out his duties as clergyman, are not income to him, if he is duly ordained, licensed, or commissioned."

"A Rental Allowanced to a Clergyman, paid as part of his compensation, is not income to the extent he used it, in the year received, to provide a home, or pay utilities for ahome furnished to him. However, the church, or organization which employs him must have officially designated the payment as a rental allowance before the payment was made."

"The above rules are also applicable to retired clergymen where a rent-free home or rental allowance is furnished him in recognition of past services in carrying out his duties as a clergyman."

A REVISED RULING, 63, 156, 163-2CB 79 STATES:

". . . the rental value of the home furnished to a retired minister as part of his compensation for services is excludable from his gross income under Section 107 (1) of the Code. Also, the rental allowance paid to him as part of his compensation for past services is excludable under Section 107 (2) of the Code, to the extent used by him for expenses directly related to providing a home." (See Code Sec. 107, Reg. 1.107. 1-113.01)

Therefore, the following resolution is presented to the North Carolina Conference of the United Methodist Church, meeting in Fayetteville, North Carolina:

Whereas, the United Methodist Church has a tradition of providing housing (a parsonage) for its ministers, or in instances where no parsonage is owned by the charge giving the minister a housing allowance;

Whereas, Retired Ministers of the North Carolina Conference are entitled to the same privileges as those in the Effective Relationship; and

Whereas, the most practical method of providing housing for the Retired Ministers is by means of rental allowance;

Therefore, Be It Resolved, that the amount of \$5,000.00 per year be set as a fair and reasonable rental allowance for each Retired Minister of this annual conference; that of the first \$5,000.00 paid to a Retired Minister each year by The Board of Pensions of the North Carolina Conference of The United Methodist Church, \$3,000.00 of this is designated as the payment of this Housing Allowance and \$2,000.00 for Utility Allowance. The Housing Allowance is specifically designated as compensation to the minister for the cost of renting or providing housing for himself and his family and those costs related thereto, pursuant to the Code as stated in Document 5045 (10-67).

The Board of Pensions emphasizes that the Retired Minister who uses this Housing Allowance must be able to furnish proof that he made expenditures in the amounts claimed. If the full \$5,000.00 cannot be substantiated as expenditures, then claim should be made for only those amounts which can be verified.

We also remind the minister who uses this allowance, that the amount he claims as a Housing Allowance exclusion must be included as Income in reporting his

Social Security. It is possible that reduced Social Security benefits would offset any claims for the Housing Allowance exclusion. Please consult your Social Security Advisor about this matter.

Further, the Board of Pensions absolves itself of any responsibility in the event the Internal Revenue Service disallows any housing allowance claimed.

COMMISSION ON RELIGION AND RACE

Commission Follows Up On Affirmative Action Requirements

At its orientation in August at Camp Rockfish, the Commission on Religion and Race drew up a letter which was sent to all conference boards and agencies requesting that each **elect a Coordinator of Religion and Race** who would lead in a commitment to racial inclusiveness through an affirmative action program.

There have been eight responses and the following Coordinators have been elected: Kathryn Royster (Archives and History), Charles Sauls (Education), Bruce Taylor (Evangelism), Rebecca Harvin (Status and Role of Women), Katie Webb (Stewardship), and Nancy Best (Worship).

In November six teams visited conference institutions for the purpose of discussing with heads of these institutions what is being done at all levels **to increase racial representation**. Report forms have been received from the two retirement homes, the Methodist Home for Children, and our three colleges.

Ethnic Minority Representation

We note that 12 out of 34 youth at the Children's Home are black, At Methodist College 26% of its student body is of an ethnic minority background.

Training And Communication Across Racial Lines

The Commission sponsored *Empathy Workshops* in September at Camp Chestnut Ridge and at St. Andrews College (30 and 23 persons attended respectively). They were led by O. Kelly Ingram, Cheryl Smith, and John Meares. Total cost: \$2,349.55. In March we sent minorities on the **UN/Washington Study Tour**.

Classes for local church Coordinators of Religion and Race were offered at all 12 district **January Workshops**. Average attendance was 6. Laity repeatedly said they wanted to go beyond awareness programs which stress our United Methodist ethnic pluralism; they wanted ways that **local churches can get involved** with minorities! One new Methodist expressed for many a pride in being a part of **a church that has inclusiveness as a priority**.

Funding To Assist The Ethnic Minority Local Church

The Commission has received requests to fund a **Convocation on the Black Church** set for May 22, 1981 at Bennett College; to fund a council for the **youth of Native American churches** in Robeson County; to fund the Offender Aid and Restoration Society, Salisbury Street, Raleigh.

The Commission on Religion and Race wishes to remind the Annual Conference that the Conference voted in 1980 to require affirmative action programs within the agencies of the Conference and that other efforts be taken to ensure racial inclusiveness.

An affirmative action program is a commitment to racial inclusiveness according to which an agency agrees regularly and systematically to review racial representation at the level of administration, membership, and service.

An affirmative action program will set inclusion objectives and develop plans to reach those objectives.

In the coming months your Commission on Religion and Race will continue to work toward the fulfillment of these requirements as set forth in 1980:

1. That every conference agency be required to adopt an affirmative action program appropriate to its responsibilities and circumstance;
2. That every district be required to have on the DCOM a Coordinator for Religion and Race;
3. That every conference division, board, and agency be required to elect along with its other quadrennial officers a Coordinator for Religion and Race whose responsibility it shall be to lead the division, board or agency in the development and implementation of an affirmative action program;
4. That early in the new quadrennium there be a meeting of the Commission on Religion and Race with all Coordinators of Religion and Race for the purpose of training them in giving leadership in the development and implementation of programs of affirmative action;
5. That there shall be two programs in which people will have an opportunity to experience communication across racial lines;
6. That the Commission on Religion and Race meet with the Board of Trustees of Methodist Retirement Homes, Inc., to explore alternative ways of caring for ethnic minority elderly;
7. That the Commission on Religion and Race sponsor a meeting of the Bishop and Cabinet with selected laypersons for the purpose of studying ways in which the conference may move toward open itinerancy.

RELIGION AND RACE REPORT TO CONFERENCE

Mr. Chairman, Members of Conference, and Guests, the mandate of your Commission on Religion and Race is in part to review our institutions concerning their practices of racial inclusiveness in clientele and employment.

Like the 70 disciples whom Jesus sent out, members of your Commission went out to report on our 6 institutions.

To the presidents and administrators of these our colleges and homes, we extend our great appreciation and admiration. Appreciation for the enthusiastic reception that you gave our committees and their work; an admiration for the real efforts you have made to provide services to Blacks and Native Americans.

Here are the facts concerning racial inclusiveness:

At Louisburg College, out of 748 students, 85 are Black and 4 are Native American.

At Methodist College, out of 794 day students, 132 are Black and 3 are Native American. Also, 71 are of Asian or other ethnic background. Here, the administrator of SAGA Food Services, Mr. Holmes, is Black. There is 1 Black secretary.

At N.C. Wesleyan College, out of 870 students, 175 are Black. There are 6 Black secretaries.

At the Retirement Home in Durham, the administrator of the Coble health care facility, Dr. Bullard, is Black. There are 4 Black patients and 2 Native American patients.

At Wesley Pines in Lumberton, there are 2 Black patients and 5 Native American patients.

In Raleigh, out of 34 resident youths at our Children's Home, 12 are Black.

Now here is what our administrators tell us: At our colleges, federal cut-backs in student aid will hurt, yet our colleges are and will continue to be open to students with financial need. Our colleges can definitely compete with State institutions for the ethnic minority student, with assistance even up to 100% in some cases is available.

As for Black or Native American teachers, this is an unsolved problem. Qualified ethnic teachers can command salaries in the \$20-30,000 range — our schools just can't pay that. Nevertheless, Methodist College made a recent but unsuccessful attempt at having a Black on its faculty. Perhaps here is an occasion to appeal across Methodism for ethnic persons-in-mission to consider our 3 colleges as mission opportunities. I think of the prospects of someone like Ron Schook who is in Algeria teaching at one of our colleges. Black and Native American students need at least one of their kind to counsel and inspire them at each college!

Now turning to Durham and our health care facility, space and service is available to Blacks and Native Americans NOW. Dr. Bullock says that this facility belongs to all the churches of our conference. "Let's keep it filled".

Dr. King and Dr. Penley have made extraordinary but unsuccessful efforts to enlist minorities for our retirement facility. yet the notion that Blacks and Native Americans do not need retirement facilities is a myth.

In the future more and more will consider this life-style and we must be ready by exploring alternative ways of caring for the ethnic elderly of our local churches.

In Raleigh we see our Children's Home launching out with exciting new services. Surely one of the new homes will be more accessible to Native Americans. As teaching parents are hired and foster parents accepted, some of these need to be Black or Native American to meet the identity needs of the ethnic youth.

Our Lord: 70 disciples have reported with joy that even the devils were subject to Jesus' name. Some devils of racism have banished from our great conference. Others remain. Your Commission on Religion and Race will continue to lift up your commitment to affirmative racial action. Please read our reminder on page 51 of the Book of Recommendations and our Agency Report to the Conference.

In addition we are proud of our part in the recent convocation on the Black Church which was held at Bennett College. I have asked our Conference Staff Representative Dr. James McCallum to say a word about this bi-conference convocation and this, Mr. Chairman, will conclude our report.

THE REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTION AND REFERENCE

The 156th continuous annual session of our North Carolina Methodist fellowship was noteworthy as it marked the return of Bishop William R. Cannon as the episcopal leader of the North Carolina Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church.

This session of conference was enriched by his leadership in worship and personal sensitivity. He challenged the deacons and elders at their ordination with a ringing challenge to remember that success in evangelism must be the yardstick of our success in the ministry. He commended the conference for leadership in our financial programs, and urged upon us all a renewed emphasis on evangelistic witness and outreach.

Our Conference sessions noted a new beginning this year. The ministerial members were convened by Bishop Cannon on Monday, June 1st for an afternoon session. At this time all members of the conference were reviewed relative to ministerial credentials, and the classes for ordination were approved as recommended by the Board of Ordained Ministry.

Because of this one day session, we were able to receive the class of ordinands at significant worship services on opening Sunday at Haymount United Methodist Church. This was a particularly meaningful service because this was Pentecost Sunday.

Bishop Cannon instructed the ordinands to remember that "God owns you, you are His investment. You have the gospel on your lips at all times, and in your hands are the sacraments of the Church." A distinguished retired minister of this conference proclaimed this to be the "finest ordination sermon I have heard in more than fifty years as a member of this conference." All were moved and challenged.

Another distinction was added to our conference sessions when the Honorable James Hunt, Governor of the State of North Carolina, chose to come and address conference delegates on Monday afternoon.

He used the North Carolina Annual Conference as a platform to launch his program of "Partners", urging adults across the state of North Carolina to become a "friend", one on one with youthful offenders, or with problem youth seeking strength to stay out of criminal involvement. He urged us to help achieve "my dream that every child in North Carolina, in all 100 counties, is matched with a caring adult. You Methodists care and can help lead the way."

Reports of successful years work were offered by the Reverend Richard T. Commander, Greenville District Superintendent, reporting for all the Superintendents. He highlighted conference accomplishments, headed by the achievement of \$4.6 million in Outreach Ministries payments.

Others who gave excellent progress reports were Dr. Richard Pearce, Lay Leader, Mrs. Catherine Vick, President of United Methodist Women, and Joy Wilkins, President of United Methodist Youth.

Recognized for distinguished attainment were two churches, Gillburg Church in Vance County as Rural Church of the Year and Edenton Street United Methodist Church as Urban Church of the Year.

The ecumenical highlight of our conference was two-fold. Bishop Joseph Gossman, Bishop of the Raleigh Diocese of the Catholic Church, preached the Monday evening sermon celebrating the Holy Spirit, and relating our two religious traditions more closely. Dr. James Fleming, Director of the Jerusalem Center for Biblical Studies and the Israeli Board of Tourism, gave two inspirational Bible Studies Tuesday and Wednesday mornings.

A lengthy and detailed report from the Board of Pensions was approved with enthusiasm after limited debate. The thoroughness with which it had been prepared, explained, and presented, along with the necessity of bringing our Conference program in accord with General Conference recommendations helped to make the decision easier.

16 ministers retired at this annual conference, and they were recognized with grateful appreciation. The largest number in memory were recognized during the inspiring memorial service. We recognized thirteen ministers lost by death and fourteen ministers spouses lost by death during the conference year. Bishop Cannon presided as Dr. Warren Petteway gave the memorial address, "Faith and Fulfillment."

Again this year the conference was moved and inspired by the Black Experience of Worship, featuring the inspiring and stimulating sermon by Bishop W.T. Handy. The service was enriched by the excellence of the music of the massed choirs.

A new feature of this conference was the coverage of business sessions by the Committee on Communication. Highlights of Annual Conference sessions were recorded by the new video equipment, and the business sessions were shown on monitors in the North Lobby, often to large and appreciative overflow audiences. The committee hopes to expand the service to include videotaping of Conference highlights for local church use next year.

We are constantly indebted for the good and fair coverage which the media representatives give to our conference sessions. We express appreciation to Al Simonton, editor of the North Carolina Christian Advocate, noting the great growth and vitality of our conference Journal. Its subscription lists have doubled in the five years of his leadership. We appreciate the time service of reporters from the Fayetteville Times, the Fayetteville Reporter, the Raleigh News and Observer, from WRAL-TV in Raleigh, and other representatives who have shared with us at times during the week. COMMISSION ON STATUS AND ROLE OF WOMEN

Responsibility

The United Methodist Church gives to the Commission on the Status and Role of Women the responsibility to "challenge the United Methodist Church . . . to a continuing commitment to the full and equal responsibility and participation of women in the total life and mission of the Church's life." (See Discipline par. 2202 and 730)

To fulfill this purpose it is essential that we work with and through other agencies in our church. We celebrate and affirm the openness of these agencies to share in this charge which offers to the church the vast resources of talent, ability, and dedication of the women who are members of the United Methodist Church.

Women Ministers in the North Carolina Conference

In 1972, Bishop William Cannon ordained the first woman as deacon in our conference. In 1975 Bishop Robert Blackburn ordained two women as elders. After the service of ordination at the 1980 Annual Conference, we have twelve women who are members in full connection; nine probationary members; one local pastor, and ten in the candidacy program. Of this group, seventeen are appointed to serve in a local church, one is under appointment beyond the local church, and four are appointed to attend seminary.

Appointment of Women Ministers to Local Churches

Those pioneers-in-faith churches (the ones who have been the first to have a woman appointed as their minister) have responded with strong affirmation. These

responses encourage other churches to look forward to the privilege of having a woman as their pastor and affirm the women whose obedience to God leads them to the ordained ministry.

Dual Career Families

In cooperation with the Continuing Education Program of Duke Divinity School and other related agencies, COSROW will sponsor a seminar to study issues related to couples who are professionally employed, one of whom is a United Methodist Pastor.

Issues of Continuing Concern: Women in All Levels of Leadership

We affirm the awareness of the N.C. Conference of the valuable resources offered by women which is evidenced by the quality leadership being provided by women in all areas of the church.

Women in Non-Traditional Roles

In cooperation with other groups, we will develop a study to help us understand how the Bible and our Christian faith supports the movement of women into new responsibilities to which they are being called in this present time.

Church's Responsibility for Child Care

We call the church to an awareness of its responsibility to be an advocate for child care, and, when necessary, to become the provider of such care.

Non-Ordained Women at Work in the Church

We call on churches whose staff includes non-ordained persons (secretaries, musicians, custodial staff) to be faithful to the responsibilities given by the Discipline (P 266, f1 & 4) to the Staff-Parish Relations Committee, thus ensuring that these persons are responsibly employed in relation to "fringe benefits" (health insurance, sick leave, vacation time, retirement plans).

Ethnic Minority Priority

To make specific our support of the General Conference Priority, especially as related to ethnic minority women, we will develop a resource bank of ethnic minority women for use by the Nominating Committee of the conference; we will plan a meeting with the women ministers and ethnic minority ministers of this Conference. The time and location of our meetings will be planned so as not to automatically exclude (or make it difficult) for certain groups of people to participate. COSROW has asked one of our members to "monitor" our work in relation to this church wide priority.

Bishop Cannon, in 1972 you ordained the first woman as a deacon in this conference — a historic occasion. This year when you return we celebrate the 25th anniversary of the ordination of women in our church. (We note that our EUB heritage as always ordained women.)

Our commission would like to use the time allotted to us to introduce to you and our other friends the ordained women of this conference. In limiting this to the ordained ministry, we will not get to meet those women serving as local pastors and those who are in the candidacy program.

To know how we as a Commission are being faithful to our disciplinary charge to be committed to help bring about "the full and equal responsibility and participation of women in the total life and mission of the church, please read our report beginning on page 49 in the program book. Today we focus on women in the ordained ministry; you will note in this report that the scope of our work is more inclusive.

In 1981 — our 25th anniversary, our conference has 14 women who are in full connection; 11 who are probationary members — a total of 25; one for every year!

After we have introduced ourselves, Carrie Parrish, who also serves on the Commission on the Status and Role of Women, will reflect on this celebration.

Before beginning our introductions, I would like to give special thanks to Willie League, our staff person, for his dedicated help, and to Reggie Ponder, the DS on our Commission, for his creative leadership.

25TH ANNIVERSARY OF ORDINATION OF WOMEN

As we celebrate today the 25th anniversary of the ordination of women in our great church, we also reflect upon a much longer effort by women to rightly receive the credentials for the ministry of word, Sacrament and Order. Such a reflection reminds us that this effort is rooted in the contributions of women who served as lay preachers in the United Brethren Church, the Methodist Protestant Church, and the Methodist Episcopal Church in the mid-1800's.

In the Methodist Protestant Church, women served as itinerant preachers from the 1830's. Indeed, in the Western Conferences, they were pressed into service because of a lack of male clergy. It was that church, also, that in the 1830's and 1840's, Hannah Pierce Reeves and William Reeves served outstandingly as a clergy couple.

In the Methodist Episcopal Church, Maggie Van Cott, licensed in 1869, was the first such "woman preacher;" yet, she did not gain the right without great controversy. Efforts were made to prevent her being relicensed, but that effort failed, and Maggie Van Cott—powerful preacher that she was, and having led over 2000 persons to Christ in 1868—went on to greater ministry in 1870.

Women as lay preachers was one thing. Women ordained was quite another. The year 1880 marked the beginning of the most critical 19th century debates over what was commonly called "the woman's issue." That year, two licensed women preachers—Anna Oliver and Anna Howard Shaw—bearing excellent credentials

from Boston University School of Theology, formally applied for ordination at the Northeast Spring Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church. Both were examined and reported fit for ordination.

However, Bishop Edward Andrews refused to accept their names on the floor of the conference, and informed them that there was nothing left for them to do but to get out of the church. Anna Oliver determined to stay; Anna Howard Shaw felt compelled to try elsewhere, saying "I do not want to fight my church, but I am called to preach the gospel. If I cannot preach it in my own church, I will certainly preach it in some other church."

She was subsequently ordained in the Methodist Protestant Church in the fall of 1880, only to have her ordination ruled illegal by that General Conference in 1884. Nor was the issue resolved in the 1888 General Conference, when a petition was rejected which would have allowed the ordination of women missionaries, so that they could offer communion and baptize women—especially dying women—in foreign lands.

That same conference ruled that women were also ineligible to serve as lay delegates to General Conference. The 1892 General Conference seemed to nail the door shut with its ruling that the terms "laymen" and "lay delegates" applied only to males. With tongue in cheek, some women asked "If we are not to be regarded as clergy, and now no longer as laity, what indeed are we" This particular language issue was not resolved until 1906.

It was not until 1920 that the Methodist Episcopal Church began once more to license women as local preachers. In 1956 our Church ordained its first woman.

It has been 101 years since that fateful General Conference in which women lost their hope of ordination and their previous right to hold a license to preach. Maggie Van Cott, Anna Howard Shaw, Anna Oliver and other women forged the way toward a new day and a new understanding of God's prerogative to call women to preach. Clergymen, like William Reeves, Mark Trafton, Lyman Davis, William F. Warren, stood tall, often in fact of ugly rebuke from their male colleagues, to support these dedicated, committed, called women.

The struggle is not over. The need for communication, understanding and acceptance of each other is great. Today we do indeed **celebrate** the steps which have been taken, by men and women, to affirm each other in the ordained ministry. And we celebrate our deepening understanding of that great truth: in Him "there is neither Jew nor Greek, slave nor free, male nor female, for we are all one in Christ Jesus."

On behalf of these clergywomen whom you have met today, and on behalf of the Commission on the Status and Role of Women, I express deep appreciation to our Bishop for his affirmations, to members of the Cabinet who treat us with equality, dignity and respect, to clergymen in our conference who believe in us and stand with us as advocates, and to lay persons throughout our conference who receive us and join hands with us to serve the Lord Jesus Christ.

DIVISION OF STEWARDSHIP

"And this they did — but first gave their own selves to the Lord, and unto us by the will of God." II Corinthians 8:5.

Paul reported that the Corinthian Christians received the grace of God and out of their poverty responded liberally to others' needs. They ministered to the needs of other Christians through a financial gift. But, first, in order to prepare for this act of generosity, they gave themselves.

It is easier to give pennies than personality. We often give money without involving ourselves. The biblical basis for service is to first give ourselves to a need and then assist financially. This process is also affirmed as good stewardship.

Your Conference Division of Stewardship exists in order to educate our people in the correct style of life and attitude of giving. It is to this end that we have given ourselves to serve the members of the local churches.

Organizing The Division

The first step was to organize ourselves (40 persons) so as to operate efficiently to carry out our mandate to serve the members of the local church.

An Executive Committee composed of ten persons was created with the following concerns within stewardship assigned to specific persons.

Stewardship Education	Planned Giving
Proportionate Giving and Tithing	Funding the Local Church
Time and Abilities	Christian Life Style
Christians/Financial Planning	Economics and Management

Task forces from within the Division have been assigned to each program recommendation for the local church to provide immediate assistance.

Training In Stewardship

Several training experiences are provided for each level of programming in order to raise the level of expertise.

These include: **January Workshop** for training local church treasurers and financial secretaries in 1980; **January Workshop** for training local church chairpersons in stewardship in 1981; **Emerald Isle retreat to train members of the Division**; **Lake Junaluska** workshop for District Director; **Conference Leadership School**, Dare to be Stewards of God's Grace, for the general public.

Administrative Procedures Within The Conference

How to get programs implemented in the local church is the major concern of the Division. To expedite this process some lines of support were established to bring aid and resources to the local level at their request.

Task Forces are named to respond to local church requests for implementation of programs.

District Directors are trained to seek out needs and respond to local church requests.

COM Staffperson in Methodist Building will coordinate assistance for the local church. (Call The Reverend A.P. Hill at 832-9560).

Stewardship Focus For 1981

Some special efforts, events, and emphasis are being highlighted this year for special consideration by the Conference and the local church. These include:

Time Management Seminar for pastors;

Effort to effectively use Conference funds;

Preparation of materials for a local church study on the biblical and theological bases for stewardship in a one night setting;

Ethnic Minority Stewardship Workshop in Fayetteville

Encourage the implementation of a Conference program on Wills and Deferred Giving;

Financial/Interpretation Workshops in each district;

Stewardship Education especially designed for Children;

Tithing Cells organized in local churches

Report to the 1981 Annual Conference

The United Methodist Men of the North Carolina Conference continue to strengthen in number and in service in the local churches and at district and conference levels. The past year has seen a real renewal in activity, with 182 charters certified by the General Board of Discipleship and our conference climbing to a rank of fourth among the various conferences. This growth indicates that our men perceive fellowship within the church to be an important priority as we weigh how we will spend our time today.

At the October Rally in Goldsboro, Bishop Cannon challenged us to serve the church, and that has been our primary emphasis through the year. Annual reports of local groups relate projects of all kinds, but most of them pertain clearly to advancing causes for which the church stands.

Conference organization has received prime attention, as we have adopted a new Constitution and Bylaws to govern our activities. A major goal has been to implement these new procedures effectively, and progress toward this end has been realized. We yet need to work out the best means of financing our district and conference activities, since the lack of funds has been a deterrent to involvement. Also, we are trying to initiate a conference newsletter to improve communication and knowledge of what is happening in United Methodist Men.

Pending events include the Congress of United Methodist Men at Purdue University July 10-12, and some twenty men from our conference have registered to attend. Those who have attended previous Purdue convocations attest to the uplifting program and fellowship. An important event this fall will be a conference-wide retreat to be held at Camp Don Lee the weekend of October 17-18. Our theme will be "Prayer in Men's Lives", and the inspirational speaker will be Bishop Kenneth Goodson. We hope the men will mark the date on their calendars and will register to attend as soon as registration materials are mailed later in the summer. We are limited only by the capacity of the camp, and we look forward to two days of spiritual growth and fellowship.

At this point in our growth, we call on each local church to organize a new fellowship or move to strengthen an existing one as we unite in mission.

REPORT OF UMW TO THE 1981 NC ANNUAL CONFERENCE

The UMW of the NC Conference have selected as their overall theme for the quadrennium "Love Made Visible". For 1981 the specific theme is "Love Is Something You Do." Let me share with you some of the things UMW have done this year to make God's love visible.

The Annual Meeting held here at Methodist College the first week in October was attended by over 700 women. The session opened with a parade of banners. Made by local women in each district, they bore a symbol of the Christian Church and the name of the district and were carried by the district president. Along with

the conference banner they formed a back-drop for the entire session and are now used in each district. During lent they were displayed in Duke chapel. A film strip entitled, UMW in the NC Conference was introduced to interpret who we are and what we do. A copy is available in each district for use in the local units. A song book compiled by the Conference Coordinator of Christian Personhood was made available so that songs, sung in conference meetings, can be used in local units. UMW have been concerned about the lack of Mission Study in local churches. As a result we have reactivated this Conference Study Jewel which I am wearing and which was presented in 1928 by Mrs. J. Le Grand Everet, who had the same concerns at that time. It will be awarded at the next Annual Meeting to the district reporting the highest % of studies completed. We hope this will encourage local people to become informed and challenged with the mission program of the church. A Special Mission Recognition tie tac was presented to Bishop Cannon who delivered the opening message. A series of workshops challenged us with concerns of Women in Crisis Situations and follow up workshops have been held in the districts. The Sanford District was awarded the Membership banner for the most units with a 10% increase in membership.

During the year the district and conference leadership were exposed to several new experiences. Some attended a World Development Workshop which lifted up the problems of hunger and economics that face the developing countries.

A Financial Workshop gave the theological basis for giving, explained the financial program of UMW and helped develop ways to interpret the program to local units. Last year UMW sent \$365,598 to the Women's Division for the mission program of the church.

A Legislative Training Event was held with the district and conference leaders of the Western NC Conference to confront women with the political and legislative process and the need for their involvement in it.

Two women attended a Consultation on Women as Consumers and will lead a similar event to make women in our conference aware of their christian responsibility as consumers. We have supported the weekly vigil for ERA and Human Rights at the State Legislative building, and have been deeply concerned about the families and children in Atlanta.

A Christian Personhood Retreat led by Mrs. Gwen White took us on a Journey Inward and a Journey Outward" and similar retreats were held on district and local levels.

There have been district "39 and Under" events to challenge the young women in the conference. District and local training sessions have been conducted.

Through Church Women United and the World Federation of Methodist Women we developed our ecumenical relations. Our support of the migrant work as well as the 4 missional projects within the conference has continued. The Purpose of UMW has been lifted up in KEDE, the quarterly newsletter to local units, on the Women's page of the NC Christian Advocate, by use of **Response**, and in the promotion of the Reading Program and the Conference Program packet.

We have lost two conference officers since January, Peggy Hill by death and Louise Peterson for health reasons. We are grateful for their commitment to Missions as they really made love visible.

United Methodist Women have attempted to carry out their purpose to know God and become whole persons through Jesus Christ by being a Supportive Fellowship and Expanding Concepts of Mission. As they have shown that "Love is Something You Do," they have "Made Love Visible."

This year has been marked by success in the on-going programs sponsored by the Conference Council on Youth Ministries as well as by participation in programs and decision-making at various levels in the church.

With such week long opportunities as the U.N. Washington Study Tour, Jr and Sr Hi Workshops, Music Workshop, Appalachian Trail Hike and ACS for Youth, the diverse needs of youth were met and their spiritual lives were enriched. Shorter opportunities such as Jr Hi Thing, Sr Hi Weekend and Conference Rally Day proved to be a great time for all participants. But the conference did not sponsor the only rally day, because every district had a rally day of some kind too! It was at many of these district rallies that the Youth Service Fund slide show was seen. I believe that YSF awareness has increased across the conference because of the widespread use of the YSF slide-show and because of the support of district superintendents, local ministers and UMYF counselors. This is the kind of support that must continue so that the three-year climb in YSF giving will continue. YSF is the only direct mission outreach program the youth have and proper emphasis needs to be placed on this worthy and very exciting mission ministry. YSF in our conference, and the various youth opportunities are part of the exciting youth ministry we enjoy; but also, we have enjoyed and become enthused about branching out and growing within the national church. The voice of youth is being heard when decisions are made in the meetings of boards and agencies as we enjoy representation under the new organization this quadrennium, and as we participate in activities such as Southeastern Jurisdictional Caucus where we sent two youths in June of last year; and the National Convocation in Sioux City, Iowa, in August of this year, where we will have five attending from our conference—I will attend as a member of the NYMO Steering Committee; two other youth delegates not yet named; Mike Safely, Chairperson of CCYM; and Ed Morrison, Conference Coordinator, as a member of the Project Review Committee of NYMO. Our week in Sioux City is shaping up nicely. I am pleased about representing our conference. I know the other delegates will help show others that ours is truly a superior conference for youth and youth ministries!

In conclusion, I want to speak for all the youth of our conference, whom the discipline describes and affirms as "full laity and participants in all activities of the church." We are glad to be a part of such a fine Annual Conference, and equally proud to serve by means of this—our very comprehensive, growing Youth Ministry.

DIVISION OF WORSHIP

Worship At Conference-wide Events

The Division of Worship played an active role in planning and assisting in the leadership of worship services at many conference-wide programs in the last year. The Reverend Milton Gilbert and the Reverend Cameron West worked closely with officials of the **Conference Leadership School** in planning five worship services in the Wesleyan tradition. The Reverend Nancy Best has already begun working on the worship experiences for 1981 Leadership School. Cameron West served on the committee which prepared the **Welcoming and Affirmation Service for Bishop Cannon**, and he assisted Bishop Cannon in preparing the ordination services and the Monday night Service in Celebration of the Holy Spirit at **Annual Conference**. Mr. William Weisser, Director of Music at Edenton Street Church, Raleigh, directed the mass choir at the Welcoming and Affirmation Service, and will direct the mass choir at the Monday night Annual Conference service. The Reverend Dr. Robert Pullman and the Reverend John Harwood are responsible for preparing and leading early morning Services of Holy Communion at Annual Conference.

Continuing Education For Clergy And Laity

The division believes one of its major tasks is to work with other conference agencies in providing continuing education opportunities for both clergy and laity. Ms. Betty Colclough, Director of Music at Mount Sylvan Church, Durham, Ms. Hazel Bryant, the Reverend Ed Morrison, William Weisser, and Cameron West taught **January Training Workshops** for local church Worship Work Area chairpersons. Robert Pullman prepared the guide to Year A of the ecumenical lectionary, **Celebrating the Church Year**. Cameron West served on the planning committee for the **Bishop's Seminar on the Ministry**, which focused this year on the trial worship resources authorized by 1980 General Conference for use in local congregations. The Division of Worship provided scholarships for clergy and laity to attend the Raleigh District workshop, **"Children and the Lord's Supper,"** held in Atlantic Beach, April 28-30. In addition, the division prepared a back page article for the North Carolina Christian Advocate on creative worship ideas. Hazel Bryant spearheaded this project.

Bishop's Meetings With Confirmation Classes

Bishop Cannon met with confirmation classes from across the conference on two separate dates: March 21 at Jarvis Memorial Church, Greenville; and April 11 at Edenton Street Church, Raleigh. Ms. Irene Gattis and Ms. Mary Jane Pierce planned and coordinated these events. They were assisted by Ms. Laura Davenport, Director of Music at First Church, Wilson, and by the Reverend Hugh Cameron, the Reverend Vernon Tyson, Robert Pullman, and Bill Weisser. Special thanks go to the Reverend Carol Goehring and the Reverend Gayla Estes, who helped coordinate the Greenville meeting.

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS
The Bishops of the United Methodist Church**

The 1980 session of the General Conference held in Indianapolis, Indiana, April 15-25, proposed by more than the required two-thirds vote the following constitutional amendments and ordered their presentation to the Annual Conference for vote:

- 1980-20 That in paragraph 36, Article I, line 6 of the 1976 Book of *Discipline* after the words "the conference lay leader," there be added DISTRICT LAY LEADERS.
- 1980-21 That in paragraph 36, Article I, line 6 of the 1976 Book of *Discipline*, after the words "the conference lay leader," (or "leaders" if 1980-20 is approved) there be inserted the words THE PRESIDENT OR EQUIVALENT OFFICER OF THE CONFERENCE YOUNG ADULT ORGANIZATIONS.
- 1980-22 (1) That in paragraph 42, Article I, lines 3-15, the states be listed alphabetically in each jurisdiction.
(2) That in line 6, after "Columbia" delete AND: and after "Puerto Rico" insert AND THE VIRGIN ISLANDS.
(3) That in lines 14-15 after "Alaska" add,; delete AND before "Hawaii"; delete all after "Hawaii" then add AND THE TERRITORY OF THE UNITED STATES IN THE PACIFIC REGION.
- 1980-23 (1) That in paragraph 54, Article V, line 2, after the word "Jurisdictional" add OR CENTRAL.
(2) That in paragraph 66, Article III, line 1, after the word "jurisdictional" add OR CENTRAL.
- (1980-24 (1) That paragraph 21, Article VII, be deleted.
(2) That in paragraph 39, Article IV, line 6, the words IN THE CONSTITUENT CHURCHES FORMING THIS UNION OR be deleted.
(3) That paragraph 41, Article VI, be deleted.

The vote for the 1981 North Carolina Annual Conference was 555 for and none against and no abstentions on all five amendments.

RESOLUTION ON PRIVATE OR CHURCH SCHOOL STANDARDS

WHEREAS we recognize that the institutions of church and state are both established by God and subject to his will and rule, and that both institutions should complement each other—the church by proclaiming to society the prophetic guidance and judgment of the law of God, and the state by maintaining law and order, protecting constitutional rights, and promoting the general welfare of all citizens; and

WHEREAS both institutions, while often interacting in areas of common interest, such as education, must be free to pursue their own proper interest without dominating or undermining the other, recognizing that the state has the responsibility and the right to guarantee religious freedom for all and the church has the responsibility to support the state in fulfillment of the duties of just government; and

WHEREAS the state has the responsibility, under God's ordinances and the Constitution, to set, regulate, and enforce certain minimal standards for matters such as health, education, and safety; and in particular, the Constitution of North Carolina guarantees and promises the children of this state a quality education, which is clearly in society's interest to provide; and

WHEREAS the 1979 session of the N.C. General Assembly passed legislation prohibiting the state from setting standards for teachers or curricula in private or church-related schools, thereby failing to assure that children in all schools are provided a quality education by qualified teachers; and whereas the legislation, furthermore, has made no contribution to religious liberty since existing statutes already properly prohibited the state from regulation of religious teaching in church-related or private schools; and

WHEREAS we believe that private or church-related schools in North Carolina, while free to pursue higher educational standards than those offered in public schools, should provide, at a minimum, standards equal to those of public schools to be considered by the state as a legitimate alternative to public schools;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the North Carolina Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church encourages the N.C. General Assembly to enact legislation to require that private and church-related schools establish standards for teachers and curricula no less stringent than those regulating public schools.

We note with great concern the reported incidents that reflect the resurgence of the Ku Klux Klan and other organizations such as the American Nazi Party, and the Communists Workers Party, that resort to violence. As Christians and as United Methodists we are called to the moderation of social conflict by the offering of ministries of mediation and conflict resolution. We are called to help in opening channels of communication, furnishing acceptable options for action, and working conscientiously toward establishing a climate of trust, understandign, and love, and the end to physical violence as a means of resolution. We stand for peace based on justice, which we pray will emerge from arousing the public conscience, creating responsible discussion, and encouraging good faith negotiations in conflict throught he use of the church's resources, both human and material. We call upon our Annual Conference to adopt the suggestions of the General Conference reported in the Book of Resolutions pages 191-192.

1. "Embark on a serious program of education in the church and elsewhere on the current resurgence of the Ku Klux Klan (and other such organizations) and their challenge to us as witnesses of the Christian Gospel.
2. Continue to express our abhorrence of the values and practices espoused by such organizations.
3. Support and work in coalition with groups that are already working on this issue.
4. Call upon federal, state and local governments to use resources to implement positive educational programs about the dangers of racism in a democratic society.
5. To call upon federal, state, and local governments to exercise the most vigilance and to bring to justice pepretrators of practices such as cross burnings and destruction of personal property and life; and to

6. Give energy to building a sense of community in those situations where tension is apparent. To become personally involved in reconciling actions to resolve conflicts.
7. Support morally and financially those who are under attack.
8. To resist the temptation to compromise the gospel of Jesus Christ by supporting extremists like the Ku Klux Klan, and other such organizations.
9. To strengthen the ministry of the local church to lonely and alienated youth that are targeted by such groups for their own membership.
