Hearing of Appeal, Henry Cowell Lime and Cement Company.

Hearing of appeal of Henry Cowell Lime & Cement Company from the action and decision of the Board of Public Works in overruling the protest of Henry Cowell Lime & Cement Company against the improvement of the north half of Commercial street from the west line of The Embarcadero to a line at right angles with Commercial street and 125 feet 6% inches west of the west line of The Embarcadero, by the construction of full width artificial stone sidewalks, where sidewalks are not now to official grade, and the construction of a retaining wall to support this sidewalk, as set forth in Resolution of Intention No. 96689 (Second Series).

Scaled proposals were received and opened between the hours of 2 and 3 p. m. for furnishing linseed oil, shellar, turpentine, lead, litharge, mineral brown and putty, and referred to Supplies Committee.

Mayor's Veto of Garbage Incinerator.

Consideration of Mayor's veto of Resolution No. 32231 (New Series), adopted March 17, 1930, which purports to authorize the City Engineer to prepare plans, etc., for a garbage incinerator and appropriates \$10,000 to cover cost, etc.

Opinion of City Attorney.

March 27, 1930.

Subject: In re-Incinerator Plans, and who should be called upon to prepare same.

Dear Sir: You have transmitted to me Board of Supervisors' Resolution No. 32231 (New Series), which purports to authorize the City Engineer to prepare plans and specifications for an incinerator and to make certain test borings upon an available site for such incinerator and to present said plans and specifications as well as the result of test borings to the Board of Supervisors. The resolution also purports to make an appropriation of \$10,000 to cover the cost of said plans, borings, etc. You ask if in my opinion the resolution is in proper form to receive your approval.

OPINION.

My answer must be in the negative. The resolution is merely an adopted resolution, and as it carries with it an appropriation in excess of two hundred dollars, it fails to meet the requirements of Section 13, Article 11, Chapter 1, of the Charter, which provides:

"Every bill or resolution providing for any specific improvement, or granting any franchise or privilege, or involving the lease, appropriation or disposition of public property, or the expenditure of public money, except sums less than two hundred dollars, or levying any tax or assessment, and every ordinance providing for the imposition of a new duty or penalty, shall, after its introduction, be published in an official newspaper, with the ayes and noes, for at least five successive days (Sundays and legal holidays excepted), before the final action upon the same."

In view of the fact that the resolution mentioned did not receive the publication required by the section quoted, it is ineffective either to authorize the work mentioned therein or to make the appropriation provided for defraying the cost of same, and therefore, in its present

form should not receive your approval.

In view of the informality with which the resolution was adopted, ordinarily it would not be necessary for me to decide as to whether the Board of Supervisors should have called upon the Board of Public Works instead of the City Engineer for the plans called for in the resolution, but realizing that the question may arise upon the presentation of another resolution, I deem it advisable to do so.

There appears to be a direct conflict in the Charter provisions upon the subject. Section 10 of Chapter I. Article VI of the Charter provides:

"All examinations, plans and estimates required by the Supervisors in connection with any public improvements or utilities shall be made by the Board of Public Works, and it shall when requested to do so, furnish information and data for the use of the Supervisors."

Section 11 of the same chapter and article, which provides for the appointment of a City Engineer and defines his duties, states that

"he (City Engineer) shall do such other surveying or other work as he may be directed to do by said Board (Public Works) or by the

Supervisors."

Hon. Franklin K. Lane, in an opinion rendered to the Board of Supervisors dated January 31, 1902 (see Lane's Opinions, 607), unsuccessfully attempted to reconcile these conflicting provisions, and suggested that he believed that the Charter would be complied with if the Board of Supervisors "directed the Board of Public Works to furnish plans and estimates through the City Engineer." I believe that this is a proper solution of the matter, and the one contemplated by the Charter framers.

In Section 10 above quoted it is definitely set forth that all plans and estimates required by the Supervisors, etc., shall be made by the Board of Public Works, and that it shall furnish data, etc., at the request of the Supervisors. Section 11 is far more general in its terms and provides that the City Engineer shall perform such *other work* as the Supervisors shall direct. Section 10 providing positively that certain things shall be done by the Board of Public Works at the request of the Supervisors, the words "other work" in Section 11 must certainly provide for things which are not covered or referred to in Section 10. In other words, the specific and definite enactment, in so far as matters therein mentioned are concerned, controls the general

I am therefore of the opinion that in the instant case the resolution should call upon the Board of Public Works to furnish plans, estimates and information required, through the City Engineer, and that such a request should be passed as provided in Section 13, Chapter I, Article II of the Charter.

I return the resolution referred to.

Resolution No. 32231 (New Series), as follows:

Whereas, the electors of the City and County of San Francisco did, at the general election held on the 5th day of November, 1929, express and declare as their policy that the garbage collected in the City and County of San Francisco should be disposed of by incineration; and

Whereas, in order to carry out said policy as so declared and expressed, it is necessary that an incinerator be constructed in the City and County of San Francisco for the purpose of incinerating the garbage collected therein; and

Whereas, there is urgent necessity that said incinerator should be constructed without further unnecessary delay; and

Whereas, in order to conserve time, the existing plant being absolutely obsolete, and in view of the fact that plans and specifications are necessary, irrespective of the method of financing; and

Whereas, the City Engineer was authorized by Resolution No. 31004 (New Series), of the Board of Supervisors, approved June 13, 1929, to make a study and report upon the proper type of incinerator for San Francisco; and

Whereas, such report was made by the City Engineer to the Board of Supervisors in August, 1929, carrying definite recommendations as to the method of procedure; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco make an appropriation and authorize the City Engineer to prepare plans and specifications immediately for the proper type of incinerator, including the preparation of foundation data calling for test pit observations, test borings, and test piling, on such site or sites as are found to be available for an incinerator at or near the site of the present incinerator at Fifteenth and De Haro Streets; and be it

Further Resolved, That such plans and specifications cover the type of foundation, the type of building, the approaches thereto, the general arrangement of furnaces in the building, such furnaces to be in accord with requirements set up in Recommendation for Refuse Incineration by the City Engineer, dated August 12, 1929, the method of handling incoming and outgoing materials, and all essential requirements for obtaining an efficient modern incinerator; and be it now

Further Resolved, That the Board of Supervisors does make an appropriation of \$10,000 to provide for cost of obtaining foundation data and preparing plans and specifications, and does authorize the City Engineer to proceed with the work of preparing plans and specifications; and be it now

Further Resolved, That upon presentation of plans and specifications to the Board of Supervisors and the approval thereof by said Board, thereupon said Board of Supervisors will authorize the receipt of bids for the construction of a plant privately built in conformity with such plans and specifications, with the understanding that all bids submitted shall contain a recapture clause whereby the City and County of San Francisco may take over the plant after a term of years at a stipulated price.

The following Bill was passed for printing:

Board of Public Works to Prepare Plans, Etc., for Garbage Incinerator.

On recommendation of Joint Health and Finance Committee.

Bill No. 8234, Ordinance No. ———— (New Series), as follows: Calling upon and directing the Board of Public Works to prepare and furnish to the Board of Supervisors plans and estimates for an incinerator and directing that said Board of Public Works make certain preliminary borings, observations and investigations in order to determine the adaptability of certain sites for the construction thereon of an incinerator.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco as follows:

That, whereas, for the purpose of carrying out the policy, as expressed by the people of the City and County of San Francisco, relative to the disposition of garbage, it is necessary that an incinerator be constructed in the City and County of San Francisco without further or unnecessary delay.

Section 2. That the Board of Public Works be and it is hereby directed to prepare and furnish, through the City Engineer, plans and specifications for an incinerator of sufficient size, and of such type and character as will incinerate each twenty-four hours, at a cost not to exceed \$1 per ton, all of the garbage and refuse as at present collected in the City and County. Said plans and specifications shall include all foundation data necessary for the construction of said incinerator and show specifically the nature and arrangement of chimney, furnaces and approaches in, on or to said incinerator.

Section 3. That said Board of Public Works be and it is hereby further directed to make, through the City Engineer, test pit observations, test boring and test piling on such site or sites as may be available for such incinerator at or near the present incinerator at Fifteenth and De Haro streets, and to report to the Board of Supervisors such observations and tests.

Section 4. That the cost of the work herein directed to be performed shall be defrayed from the moneys heretofore appropriated by Resolution No. 32238 (New Series), heretofore adopted by the Board of Supervisors.

Section 5. That it is the intention of the Board of Supervisors, when plans and specifications for an incinerator are approved by said Board of Supervisors, to accept bids for the construction of said incinerator in conformity therewith, and to grant to the person, firm or corporation who will make the most advantageous offer to the City for the construction and operation of said incinerator, the exclusive privilege of incinerating the garbage and refuse collected in the City for a period of twenty-five years, with the right of the City to recapture the same at an agreed price.

Section 6. This ordinance shall become effective immediately on its passage.

Section 5. In all cases where a public auction sale is held under the provisions of Section 4, the owner or the creditors of the owner must take an inventory of the stock of merchandise on the premises, which is to be sold at said public auction, and must submit said inventory to the Chief of Police at least 24 hours prior to the commencement of the auction sale. The inventory required by this section must show each item of merchandise contained in the stock to be offered for sale in the premises by public auction, and the said owner or creditor of the owner must take and subscribe an oath, to be attached to the inventory, that the said inventory contains a true and itemized account of all the property to be sold at said public auction, and that the same is a bona fide closing out of the business of such owner and that the owner intends to retire from said business. No property or merchandise shall be sold under the provisions of Section 4 except those itemized and shown in the inventory provided for herein.

Section 1. Sections 32 and 65 of Ordinance No. 5132 (New Series), the title of which is recited above, are hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 32. (a) Every person, firm or corporation engaged in the occupation of and doing business as a contractor, sub-contractor, or as a builder, or engaged in the construction or repair of any building, street, sidewalk, sewer, engineering structure, or any engineering operation, or advertising himself as engaged in or superintending building construction, sewer construction, plumbing construction, street construction, or general construction, where the cost or value of the job or the bid tendered exceeds five hundred dollars, shall pay a license fee of twelve and fifty one-hundredths (\$12.50) dollars per quarter.

(b) Every person, firm or corporation so engaged or advertising himself as so engaged in any business or job described as above, where the value or cost of the job or bid tendered is less than five hundred

dollars, shall pay a license fee of five (\$5) dollars per quarter.

(c) Every person, firm or corporation engaged in the business of sign or general painting (except automobile painters) shall pay a license fee of twelve and fifty one-hundredths (\$12.50) dollars per quarter.

(d) Master electricians and master fixture electricians, as described under the provisions of Section 49 of this ordinance, shall pay the license fee provided for in Section 49, and shall thereby be exempt from the license fees imposed in Section 32 of this ordinance.

Section 65. Owners, agents, managers, or keepers of restaurants, cafeterias, or places of refreshment, or persons engaged as caterers, or persons conducting soft drink places, shall pay a license as follows:

Those whose gross receipts are less than three hundred dollars per

quarter shall pay a license fee of five (\$5) dollars per quarter.

Those whose gross receipts are more than three hundred dollars and less than ten thousand dollars per quarter shall pay a license fee of ten (\$10) dollars per quarter, and for every additional two thousand dollars, or fraction thereof, gross receipts per quarter, one (\$1) dollar per quarter.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

San Francisco, California, Acquisition of Pacific Gas and Electric Company Properties. \$45,000,000; Acquisition of Great Western Power Company Properties, \$20,000,000.

We are in receipt of your communication of the first instant relative to the above bonds and have noted contents. We have also received a letter dated March 24th, 1930, from Mr. Warren Shannon, Chairman of the Committee on Public Buildings and Lands of the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco, raising substantially the same inquiries. We have thought it best to write to you direct answering the inquiries which have been raised and are forwarding a copy of this communication to Mr. Shannon.

The inquiries which have been raised by Mr. Shannon are as follows: 1. Would a proposition framed in the alternative to buy or build comply with the requirements of the Charter of San Francisco?

2. In the event that the bond issue is defeated, would the City be liable for the expense of the power companies, under subdivision 97 of Section 47 of the Public Utility Act of California?

The inquiries which you raise are as follows:

What is the present debt limit of San Francisco?

Will it be possible to submit the matter of the acquisition of the properties of these companies either to buy the properties in question or to build other properties?

Inquiries numbers 1 and 4, above set forth, are substantially the same and we shall first attempt to dispose of these. The Charter of San Francisco, in Article XII, confers explicit power on the Board of Supervisors to acquire, construct or complete public utilities. Under these circumstances we think that the City would have full power to submit a proposition to its electors to "acquire, construct or complete" any public utility which the City might desire to acquire, construct or complete, and that the submission of such a proposition would not be a dual proposition, but would be for a single purpose. In this connection we refer you to the decision of the Supreme Court of the State of California in the case of Clark vs. City of Los Angeles, 160 Cal. 30; 116 Pac. Rep. 720. One of the points under consideration by the court in this action was whether or not a proposition authorizing the City of Los Angeles to incur a bonded debt of \$3,500,000 "for the purpose of acquiring or constructing" a certain revenue-producing municipal improvement, was a single or double proposition. In deciding this point the Supreme Court said:

"The words 'acquiring and constructing' do not express the dual purpose of acquiring some improvement of this kind and constructing another with the money obtained. They indicate the single purpose of acquiring all the property that may be found necessary for the proposed works, even including wate, rights and constructing works with said property."

In denying a petition for a rehearing in this action, the court again

said:

"The word 'acquiring' has a broad meaning, including both purchase and construction. The expression does not indicate the purpose of acquiring two systems, one by purchase, the other by construction. In connection with the contest it means the acquisition of but one system, including the purchase of such property and the crection of such struc-

tures as may be necessary to accomplish that purpose."

We appreciate that so far as the acquisition of the properties of the Pacific Gas and Electric Company and the Great Western Power Company is concerned, the City has thus far been pursuing the procedure provided for in the Public Utilities Act of California, which act contemplates that after the railroad commission has fixed the value of the properties of the utilities sought to be acquired, the City must submit a proposition to acquire, under eminent domain proceedings or otherwise, said properties, but we do not believe that there is anything in the Public Utilities Act or in the Charter of the City and County of San Francisco which would invalidate the submission of a proposition to the electors to acquire the properties of such utility if in the same proposition so submitted an alternative proposition should be included authorizing the issuance of the bonds therein provided for, for the construction of a similar utility by the City, in the event that for any reason the City should be unable to consummate the acquisition of the properties of the utility company therein referred to. We believe that such a proposition would be expressly authorized by the decision of the Supreme Court of the State of California in the case of Clark vs. the City of Los Angeles, above referred to, the purpose of the proposition being merely to authorize the City either to acquire the properties of the particular utility company therein referred to, or else, in the event of failure to be able to consummate such transaction, then the City is to be clothed with authority to construct its own electric light system. In other words, all the proposition would do would be to authorize the city either to purchase or construct an electric light system

We appreciate the force of the objections which you have made as to the submission of an alternative proposition, but we believe that they must be considered as practical objections rather than legal objections. It is for the Board of Supervisors to determine, in the last analysis, whether propositions for the acquisition of the properties of these utilities will be endangered through the inclusion of language authorizing alternatively construction of similar properties or systems by the City of San Francisco in the event that the proceedings to consummate the acquisition of the properties of the utility company cannot be carried through. We feel, however, that in so far as legality is concerned, such alternative propositious are authorized under the laws and decisions of the State of California and the only remedy which we can suggest in this connection would possibly be the submission of three propositions, one to acquire the properties of the Pacific Gas and Electric Company, the second to acquire the property of the Great Western Power Company, and the third to be a separate and distinct proposition simply authorizing the construction by the City of works for generating and distributing electricity for the purpose of supplying the City and its inhabitants with heat, light and power, etc. Possibly, if three such propositions were submitted, there would be less danger from a practical standpoint, and possibly, also, legal technicalities that might otherwise arise would be obviated. Of course, the language of the third proposition herein suggested should be so drawn as to clearly show that the authority therein conferred is

only to be exercised in the event the City should be unable to consummate the acquisition of the properties of the Pacific Gas and Electric Company and the Great Western Power Company.

- In answer to the inquiry as to whether, in the event the bond issue were defeated, the City would be liable for the expense of the power companies under subdivision 7 of Section 47 of the Public Utility Act of California, it is our opinion that such liability would depend altogether upon whether or not the railroad commission of the State of California should determine that the City had proceeded diligently in connection with submitting the proposition of the acquisition of the properties of the utility companies to the voters of the City. As we undersand the situation an agreement has been made by the City with the Pacific Gas and Electric Company and the Great Western Power Company, whereby, if the question of the acquisition of these utilities is submitted at the State Primary on the last Tuesday in August of the present year, the City will not be charged with failing to exercise due diligence in submitting the matter to the electors. It would seem to us that such an agreement would estop and bar the utility companies from raising any question as to the exercise of due diligence upon the part of the City, if the propositions are submitted at the State Primary next August. If the utility companies are unable to raise the question of due diligence, our feeling is that it would be most unlikely that the railroad commission of the State of California would make any finding assessing the reasonable expenditures necessarily incurred by the utility companies in the proceeding before the commission against the City of San Francisco, upon any grounds of lack of due diligence. As to this, of course, the discretion in the matter rests entirely with the railroad commission, and it is impossible for us, under the circumstances, to hazard any guess as to the manner in which the railroad commission will exercise this discretion.
- With respect to the present debt limit of San Francisco, we do not believe that merely because the City is unable to levy its full rate of taxation upon certain classes of taxable property, this presents any legal reason why that particular class of property should not be included as a part of the assessed valuation of the taxable property of the City in calculating its debt-incurring capacity under the provisions of the City Charter. Intangible property of the character involved in your inquiry is, nevertheless, personal property. Notwithstanding the limited taxes which can be placed upon this property, we feel that the same must to all intents and purposes be regarded as a part of "the assessed value of all real and personal property in the City and County subject to taxation for City and County purposes." We agree with you that it was undoubtedly the intention of the people, speaking through the Constitutional Amendment, and of the legislators, speaking through the Code Enactment, merely to provide a rate at which a tax on a certain kind of property should be levied and not in any way to change the actual or the assessed value of the property in question.

So far as the outstanding school bonds of the City and County of San Francisco are concerned, such bonds as have been approved by this firm and its predecessors are clearly obligations of the City and County of San Francisco, and we do not see how these can be excluded in computing the debt-incurring capacity of the City. The Charter of San Francisco provides for a complete scheme or system of schools. As stated, the outstanding school bends of San Francisco have been issued as obligations of the City and County of San Francisco and, so far as we can find, there is no authority in the Charter of the City for the issuance of school bonds except by the Board of Supervisors for and on behalf of the City and County of San Francisco, the bonds so authorized being bonds of the City and County of San Francisco and not bonds of any separate school district or other separate corporation or legal entity. We believe there is no other alternative but to include the outstanding school bonds as debt of the City in calculative contents of the city and country of the city a

ing the debt-incurring capacity of the City and County of San Francisco under its present Charter.

Whereas, the maintenance or rental charges on the Pacific Gas and Electric Company's own equipment, where that company installs lights, whether wooden or metal standards are used, is from 6 cents to 12 cents higher per night according to candlepower than if the City owned the equipment; and

Whereas, rates allowed by the Railroad Commission are based on capital investment and the rates would be lower if the City owned the standards; and

Whereas, the Pacific Gas and Electric Company deducts 7 per cent for depreciation for the installation of poles on Market Street erected by the Down Town Association and presented to the Pacific Gas and Electric Company about twelve years ago; and

Whereas, the said 7 per cent depreciation has been deducted annually, nevertheless the Pacific Gas and Electric Company would demand, in the event of sale to the City, 80 or 90 per cent of the original cost of said standards, when in reality their equity equals approximately 15 per cent; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Finance Committee and Lighting Committee of

Resolved, That the Finance Committee and Lighting Committee of this Board of Supervisors give serious attention to the subject of lighting standards to the end that a proper appropriation be made in the coming Budget for installation of standards by the City.



Ordering Ornamental Street Lights on Hyde Street.

The following matter was called up out of the Lighting Committee on motion of Supervisor Roncovieri at last meeting:

Bill No. 8240, Ordinance No. — (New Series), as follows:

Ordering the improvement of Hyde street from Market street to California street by the furnishing and installing of an ornamental street lighting system, approving and adopting specifications therefor; providing for the payment thereof by installments, and outlining the district to be assessed for said improvement.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco as follows:

Section 1. The Board of Public Works, in written communication dated August 2, 1929, and filed in the office of the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors August 6, 1929, having recommended to the Board of Supervisors the ordering of the following street work or improvement, the same is hereby ordered to be done in the City and County of San Francisco in conformity with the provisions of the Street Improvement Ordinance of 1918 of said City and County of San Francisco, said work to be performed under the direction of the Board of Public Works, and to be done in accordance with the specifications prepared therefor by said Board of Public Works and on file in its office, which said plans and specifications are hereby approved and adopted.

That said Board of Supervisors, pursuant to the provisions of the Street Improvement Ordinance of 1918 of said City and County of San Francisco, does hereby determine and declare that the assessment to be imposed for the said contemplated improvements, respectively, may be paid in four installments; that the period of time after the time of the payment of the first installment when each of the succeeding installments must be paid is to be one year from the time of

the payment of the preceding installment, and that the rate of interest to be charged on all deferred payments shall be seven per centum per annum.

The improvement of Hyde street from Market street to California street by furnishing and installing an ornamental street lighting system.

The assessment district is described as follows:

All the lands within the exterior boundary of all those certain lots delineated, designated and numbered, respectively, as follows:

That said Board of Public Works be and it is hereby further directed to make, through the City Engineer, test pit observations, test boring and test piling on such site or sites as may be available for such incinerator at or near the present incinerator at Fifteenth and De Haro streets, and to report to the Board of Supervisors such observations and tests.

Section 4. That the cost of the work herein directed to be performed shall be defrayed from the moneys heretofore appropriated by Resolution No. 32238 (New Series), heretofore adopted by the Board of Supervisors.

Section 5. That it is the intention of the Board of Supervisors, when plans and specifications for an incinerator are approved by said Board of Supervisors, to accept bids for the construction of said incinerator in conformity therewith, and to grant to the person, firm or corporation who will make the most advantageous offer to the City for the construction and operation of said incinerator, the exclusive privilege of incinerating the garbage and refuse collected in the City for a period of twenty-five years, with the right of the City to recapture the same at an agreed price.

Whereas, this gesture of cooperation by power yacht owners of the Southland with San Francisco is such as should be cordially and hospitably recognized by the City of San Francisco, one of the chief interests of which at the present time is the development of facilities in our harbor for pleasure boat berthing and the development of the power boat industry generally; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That Hon, James Rolph, Jr., Mayor of San Francisco, be requested to appoint a committee of citizens, whose duty it shall be to welcome the visiting yachtsmen and crews and present to them the greetings and thanks of the citizenship of San Francisco for their participation, through this race, with the Second Annual Pacific Coast Boat Show.



cisco as follows:

Section 1. The Board of Public Works, in written communication filed in the office of the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors June 9, 1927, having recommended the ordering of the following street work, the same is hereby ordered to be done in the City and County of San Francisco in conformity with the provisions of the Street Improvement Ordinance of 1918 of said City and County of San Francisco, said work to be performed under the direction of the Board of Public Works, and to be done in accordance with the specifications prepared therefor by said Board of Public Works, and on tile in its office, which said plans and specifications are hereby approved and adopted.

That said Board of Supervisors, pursuant to the provisions of Part If of the said Street Improvement Ordinance of 1918 of said City and County of San Prancisco, does hereby determine and declare that the assessment to be imposed for the said contemplated improvements, respectively, may be paid in three installments; that the period of time after the time of the payment of the first installment when each of the succeeding installments must be paid is to be one year from the time of the payment of the preceding installment, and that the rate of interest to be charged on all deferred payments

shall be seven per centum per annum.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco as follows:

Section 1. Sections 32 and 65 of Ordinance No. 5132 (New Series), the title of which is recited above, are hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 32. (a) Every person, firm or corporation engaged in the occupation of and doing business as a contractor, sub-contractor, or as a builder, or engaged in the construction or repair of any building, street, sidewalk, sewer, engineering structure, or any engineering operation, or advertising himself as engaged in or superintending building construction, sewer construction, plumbing construction, street construction, or general construction, where the cost or value of the job or the bid tendered exceeds five hundred dollars, shall pay a license fee of twelve and fifty one-hundredths (\$12.50) dollars per quarter.

- (b) Every person, firm or corporation so engaged or advertising himself as so engaged in any business or job described as above, where the value or cost of the job or bid tendered is less than five hundred dollars, shall pay a license fee of five (85) dollars per quarter.
- (c) Every person, firm or corporation engaged in the business of sign or general painting (except automobile painters) shall pay a license fee of twelve and fifty one-hundredths (812.50) dollars per quarter.
- (d) Master electricians and master fixture electricians, as described under the provisions of Section 49 of this ordinance, shall pay the license fee provided for in Section 49, and shall thereby be exempty from the license fees imposed in Section 32 of this ordinance.

Section 65. Owners, agents, managers, or keepers of restaurants, cafeterias, or places of refreshment, or persons engaged as caterers, or persons conducting soft drink places, shall pay a license as follows:

Those whose gross receipts are less than three hundred dollars per quarter shall pay a license fee of five (\$5) dollars per quarter.

Those whose gross receipts are more than three hundred dollars and less than ten thousand dollars per quarter shall pay a license fee of ten (\$10) dollars per quarter, and for every additional two thousand dollars, or fraction thereof, gross receipts per quarter, one (\$1) dollar per quarter.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Revision of Accounting System.

Resolution No. ———— (New Series), as follows:

Whereas, Section 3 of Chapter II of Article II of the Charter provides that the Finance Committee of the Board of Supervisors shall investigate the transactions and accounts of all officers and departments of the government of the City and County of San Francisco having the collection, custody or disbursement of public money; and

Whereas, it is deemed advisable that there should be a uniform system of accounting in all of said departments; now, therefore be it

Resolved, That the Finance Committee of this Board be and it is hereby authorized to select representatives of the hereinafter mentioned offices to confer with and advise with the Finance Committee for the purpose of revising the present system of accounting in the various offices in the government of the City and County, and establishing a uniform system of accounting for said various offices.

That the following are the offices from which said representatives shall be selected:

From the Auditor's office, 2 representatives;

From the Treasurer's office, 1 representative;

From the Department of Public Works, 1 representative; From the Department of Public Health, 1 representative;

From the School Department, 1 representative.

Be it Further Resolved, That said representatives when selected shall, with the Finance Committee of the Board of Supervisors, the Auditor, the Treasurer and the Purchaser of Supplies, constitute a Committee on Uniform Accounting, to establish a system of uniform accounting in all departments of the municipal government.

Be it Further Resolved, That no additional compensation be paid to any of said representatives over and above their compensation now

provided by law or ordinance.

And be it Further Resolved, That all previous resolutions providing for the investigation of said uniform accounting system be and the same are hereby repealed and set aside.

Board of Public Works to Investigate Water Department Revenues With a View to Reduction of Water Rates.

Supervisor Havenner presented:

Resolution No. --- (New Series), as follows:

Whereas, in the campaign made by the citizens' committee for the adoption of the Spring Valley bond issue, in May of 1928, it was definitely promised to the people of the City and County of San Francisco that the acquisition of the properties of the Spring Valley Water Company by the City would result in a reduction of the water rates to all of the consumers; be it

Resolved, That the Board of Public Works be and it is hereby directed to investigate the present revenues, as well as the revenues anticipated for the fiscal year 1930-1931, of the San Francisco Water Department, and to report to the Board of Supervisors the result of said investigation, and the possibility of putting into effect immediately a reduction in the rates charged for water by said San Francisco Water Department, which said reduction shall apply to all of the water rate-payers in the City and County.

Referred to Joint Committee on Finance and Public Utilities.

Prescribing the Procedure Under Which the Board of Trustees of the War Memorial Shall Have Charge of Construction, Administration, Etc.

The following bill was presented by the Finance and Buildings Committees and passed to print:

Bill No. 8236, Ordinance No. — (New Series), as follows:

Setting forth and prescribing the procedure under which the Board of Trustees of the War Memorial shall have charge of construction, administration, management, superintendence and operation of the War Memorial; providing for acceptance of gifts, devises and bequests; providing for employees and their salaries; providing budget and accounts of said Trustees; providing for purchase of materials, supplies and equipment, and providing for setting up of revolving fund.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco as follows:

Section 1. Direction to Board of Trustees of War Memorial. The Board of Trustees of the War Memorial, in exercising the powers granted to it under Article XIV-D of the Charter relative to the construction, administration, management, superintendence and operation of the War Memorial of San Francisco, shall do so subject to the

provisions of this ordinance. Said Board of Trustees shall be hereinafter mentioned as the Trustees.

Section 2. Construction of War Memorial. The Trustees of the War Memorial shall construct a building or buildings as and for a War Memorial on the real property located in the City and County of San Francisco, bounded by Van Ness avenue, Grove, Franklin and McAllister streets. That said War Memorial shall be constructed by and under the supervision of the Trustees, the cost of which, how-ever, shall not exceed the sum received by the War Memorial bond issue, together with such other and further sums as may be hereafter available, nor shall any contract be entered into for the construction of the War Memorial until the money to be paid under said contract shall be appropriated by the Board of Supervisors, and said Trustees may, and they are hereby empowered, forthwith to open and establish offices for preparing all necessary plans and specifications for the construction of said War Memorial. All planning, construction work, extensions, additions, betterments or replacements done in or about the properties of said War Memorial shall be done under the direction and supervision of the Trustees.

Section 3. Administration, Management, Superintendence and Operation of the War Memorial. That said Trustees shall, subsequent to the construction of said War Memorial and during the construction thereof, administer, manage, superintend and operate said War Memorial

and the grounds set aside therefor, and all of its affairs.

Section 4. Gifts, Devises and Bequests. No gifts, devises or bequests, other than unconditional gifts, devises and bequests of cash, shall be accepted by the City and County of San Francisco, as and for said War Memorial, without the consent of a majority of the Trustees present at a meeting of said Trustees. The Trustees are hereby expressly empowered to receive, on behalf of the City and County, any money or other property from the Regents of the University of California, the University of California, or any Board of Trustees operating under the direct or indirect control of the Regents of the University of California, or from Walter S. Martin, Charles Templeton Crocker, John D. McKee, E. S. Heller, Charles H. Kendrick, Frank L. Kilsby, Milton H. Esberg, Herbert Fleishhacker, William H. Crocker and John S. Drum, or their successors, as Trustees, and said money or property shall be set aside for the use and benefit of said Trustees. Said Trustees are hereby empowered to receive and accept any of said cash or property under the terms and provisions of Section 4, Article XIV-D, of the Charter. Any gifts, devises and/or bequests received by the Trustees, on behalf of the City and County, for any purposes connected with said War Memorial, or incident thereto, shall be set aside in a special fund for the use and benefit of the said War Memorial.

Employees. The Trustees shall engage such employees. Section 5. bonded or otherwise, as may be necessary for the conduct of the prop-

erty and affairs of said War Memorial.

Section 6. Salaries. The salaries, wages and compensation of the managing director and secretary of said War Memorial and of all other employees shall be subject to standardization as provided in Section 14, Chapter 2, Article II, of the Charter. That, pending the standardization of wages, salaries and compensation, there shall be paid to said employees at least the minimum entrance salary, wage or compensation paid for similar services by the City and County of San Francisco, and if there are any positions or places of employment created by the Trustees not common with others in the government of the City and County of San Francisco, then the compensation to be paid to said employees shall be fixed by said Trustees.

Section 7. Budgets. Not later than May 1, in the year 1930, and during the month of March in each succeeding year during the period of construction, the Trustees shall transmit to the Board of Super-

visors a proposed budget for the next fiscal year, which budget shall show in detail the estimated amounts of revenue from all sources to the Trustees, as well as an estimate of the amounts required by the Trustees for all operating purposes. Such estimate of both receipts and disbursements shall be segregated and itemized so as to show the exact purpose of each item therein, and the amounts for salaries and wages shall be itemized so as to show the compensation paid to each class of employees and the number of said employees in each class; provided, however, that in estimating the cost of construction work in the performance of which the employees will not be of a permanent character, the estimated number of employees to be employed thereon need not be set forth. The Finance Committee of the Board of Supervisors shall submit said budget as a part of its annual budget report to the Board of Supervisors, together with such recommendations as it deems proper. The adoption of said budget by the Board of Supervisors and the approval thereof by the Mayor shall be considered an appropriation of the various amounts therein contained for the purposes therein set forth, and thereafter said sum so appropriated may be expended by the Trustees in the manner provided by law for the purposes for which they are appropriated, without further order of the Board of Supervisors. At any time during a fiscal year, in the event of emergency, the Board of Supervisors may appropriate additional funds.

Section 8. Accounts. Subsequent to the completion of the War Memorial the Trustees shall cause to be filed a complete operating statement, showing all the operations, receipts and disbursements of the Trustees for the previous month, and same shall be open for inspection by the public in the office of the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors. Said statement shall show the number of employees of the Trustees.

Section 9. Purchase of Materials, Supplies and Equipment. Subsequent to completion of the War Memorial, purchases of materials, supplies and equipment required by the Trustees shall be made in accordance with the provision of Chapter IV, Article II, of the Charter, and Ordinance No. 5880 (New Series); provided, however, that specifications may be prepared under the direction of the Trustees for all equipment required by said Trustees and for materials or supplies peculiar to said War Memorial operations and not in common use in other departments of the City and County; and the Trustees may designate the particular brand, kind or make of any equipment which may be necessary in the conduct of said War Memorial.

Revolving Fund. For the purpose of paying petty ex-Section 10. penses of the Trustees and/or the War Memorial and for making such other payments as cannot be conveniently paid by demands drawn by the Treasurer and approved by the Auditor, the Trustees shall maintain in a bank or banks designated by said Trustees a fund, not to exceed two thousand (\$2,000.00) dollars, from which fund said petty expenses and other payments that cannot be conveniently paid by demands drawn upon the Treasurer shall be paid by check drawn by such person or persons in the employ of the Trustees of the War Memorial as the Trustees may authorize. The Trustees shall from time to time, and at least once in each month, transmit to the Auditor a demand in favor of said fund for all amounts disbursed from it, to which demand shall be attached receipts for all payments so made, which said receipts shall show the name of the person receiving any payment from said fund as well as the purpose for which said payment was made, and shall be signed by the party receiving said payment. When said demand is approved by the Auditor and paid by the Treasurer, it shall be delivered to the Trustees and deposited to the credit of the Trustees. The Board of Supervisors shall appropriate the said sum of two thousand (\$2,000.00) dollars for such fund and may from time to time make such additional appropriations thereto as said Board of Supervisors shall deem proper. Section 11. Constitutionality. If any section, subsection, subdivision

or provision of this ordinance is for any reason held to be unconstitutional, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining provisions of this ordinance, the Board of Supervisors hereby declaring that it would have passed this ordinance and each section, subsection, subdivision, provision, sentence, clause and phrase thereof irrespective of the fact that any one or more sections, subsections, subdivisions, provisions, sentences, clauses or phrases hereof are declared unconstitutional.

Section 12. Effectiveness. This ordinance shall become effective

immediately upon its passage.

Section 13. Other Ordinances. Any ordinance or part thereof in conflict herewith is hereby repealed in respect to conflicting provisions.

Supervisor Andriano moved a vote of commendation for those responsible for the excellent manner in which the recent army air maneuvers were conducted. Supervisor Power suggested that the Pacific Coast Breeders Association be included.

Motion and suggestion carried.

The Board of Supervisors met in regular session.

His Honor Mayor Rolph presiding.

APPROVAL OF JOURNAL.

The Journal of Proceedings of the previous meeting was laid over for approval until next meeting.

Reception of Visiting Delegation From British Columbia.

THE MAYOR: The delegation that has been touring the State of California, Oregon, Washington, and British Columbia, have stopped in here to pay their respects to the Board of Supervisors and the citizens of San Francisco, and Supervisor Gallagher and Supervisor Hayden would like to present them to the Board and to the people who are present.

SUPERVISOR HAYDEN: Mr. Mayor, would you kindly present the

gentlemen beginning with Mr. Warren.

THE MAYOR: I would like to present to you, first, my fellow citizens, Mr. George Warren of Victoria, British Columbia. He was a young man engaged in business here and I knew him in his teens. We have been warm personal friends for many years, and ever since he has been in Victoria I have received on every Christmas occasion a box of the most beautiful Christmas holly that grows in that country where holly grows best. He is a near and dear friend. You can see how he has grown up in the climate of the North. He was of very short stature and of very light weight when he left here, but he has been successful, he has been prosperous, he looks it. And I want to present my particular friend, my old friend, Mr. George Warren, of Victoria, Vancouver Island.

of Victoria, Vancouver Island.

Now, Mr. Warren, will Supervisor Hayden, or will you introduce your fellow travellers who have done us the honor of visiting our city on two occasions on this trip and stopped off here again to bid us

au revoir on your way home.

MR WARREN: Mr. Mayor, and members of the Board of Supervisors and ladies and gentlemen: In Victoria we say, "Your worship." It has been a pleasure for us to have toured Washington, Oregon, California and Southern California, and we were particularly—speak-

ing about "Southern California," I mean across the United States boundary—we were particularly fortunate in having two members of the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco, Supervisor J. Emmett Hayden and Supervisor Fred Suhr, who were very helpful to us and who assisted the caravan in every way possible in making known to those from the far North the advantages, the attractions and many different things which would appeal to the

traveling public, in your great state.

It is a pleasure for me to present the different members from the British Columbia delegation. This delegation that is here now is a part of the representatives of that caravan who came from British Columbia and visited these three states, and particularly California, to learn of how you progress here, to learn of the action that you take in creating and developing the great tourist trade, and to learn the way that you advertise, and advertise so successfully. Practically the man that is in charge of the Vancouver delegation is Mr. Thomas Dixon, a representative of the Vancouver Publicity Bureau, a past president of the Vancouver Board of Trade and also a past president of the British Columbia Manufacturers' Association, Mr. Tommy Dixon. The next member is Mr. Stephen Jones, the dean of the hotel men of British Columbia and Victoria. The next representative is the manager of the Automobile Club of British Columbia, Major A. E. Craddock. The next representative is the manager of the George Hotel of Vancouver, Mr. Willoughby. The next member is a representative of the British Columbian and the Canadian Press, our good friend, Captain Collins.

Your Worship, Mr. Tommy Dixon of Vancouver would like just one word, to express, if possible, the thanks of Vancouver and the mainland of British Columbia and their appreciation of the courtesies extended

to them on this trip.

MR. DIXON: Mr. Mayor, Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco, ladies and gentlemen: I am bringing you greetings from the Mayor and the Council of the City of Vancouver, the Publicity Bureau and all the semi-public organizations and the citizens at large. It has indeed been a privilege to have been able to accompany this Pacific Coast crusade into this wonderful State of California. We have had a wonderful trip through the southern part this last week. We have seen all your wonders and we have seen what you have wrought out of a desert to make a country that is the envy of the world. So we can take back to our respective communities very pleasant recollections of all those counties and cities to the south of you. And the last, but not the least, the wonderful hospitality that has been showered on us in this wonderful city of yours. And I can only add to the words which Mr. Warren has said, in repeating what a wonderful help for this crusade were those members of your own body that you sent with us, and the many prominent citizens of the City of San Francisco that went with us to help us in this good work.

It is a pleasure to be here and see this wonderful building which you have erected in this city, as a monument to the progress which you people have made. Mr. Worship, I thank you most sincerely for

this opportunity.

SUPERVISOR HAYDEN: Mr. Mayor, I think it would be well, knowing these gentlemen so well now, after a week's sojourn with them, to have Major Craddock speak for the delegation of his impressions of the tour and what it means to California and to San Francisco and the rest of the Pacific Coast.

THE MAYOR: Major, will you do us the honor of having a seat here? Major Craddock, gentlemen of the Board and my fellow citizens. MAJOR CRADDOCK: Your Honor, gentlemen of the Board of Supervisors: It is indeed a pleasant task for me, and one that it would be very difficult to express in words, to say how much I have

appreciated the privilege of being on this crusade, and especially in so far as giving to us, your friends and cousins in the North, an idea as to how things are done and done successfully. It has been a veritable inspiration to us to read, mark and inwardly digest the manner in which you have progressed.

This is my first trip south of Tacoma, and every day and every way I have been finding something anew to admire. I shall carry back most pleasant recollections. And in the days to come, by a coordinated effort across this imaginary 49th parallel, which is purely imaginary, like many of the ills and aches that we seem to have, we will be able to solidify and co-ordinate in a way that will make this

Pacific Coast, without an equal, the world's playground.

I can only assure you, hurriedly and briefly, as I know the duties of your respected offices today require your attention, I can only assure you that I am quite certain, in my mind, that, as far as British Columbia is concerned, it will be 100 per cent with your most wonderful people in this wonderful city. San Francisco to me, while I have seen a good many of the cities in the world, as I have looked upon your city and yesterday had the pleasure and privilege of being up on the Twin Peaks, and then again last night looked around this wonderful vista and glimpsed the results of your splendid handiwork, surely you can command respect throughout the world, and it will stimulate we, your cousins in the northern portion of this wonderful continent, to emulate but not excell.

THE MAYOR: Every member of our Board of Supervisors is an orator whenever inspired by such an occasion as this. And it is very difficult for me, as Mayor, to pick out any one of them who could speak best on such an occasion as this, but I think the honor falls to Supervisor J. Emmet Hayden, having accompanied you on this particular trip. And I am sure that the Board of Supervisors would like Supervisor J. Emmet Hayden to respond to these sweet sentiments which you have just expressed. I present Supervisor

Hayden.

SUPERVISOR HAYDEN: Mr. Mayor, I thank you for the complimentary introduction. Mr. Mayor, and members of the Board, and our distinguished guests of the Pacific Coast crusade: I think that this experience of the Pacific Coast crusade was something that means much to the progress of the whole Pacific Coast. When you see this delegation from the far North, from the City of Vancouver, British Columbia, and from Victoria, starting off on a two weeks' tour to bring a message of good will and cooperation to the sister states of the Pacific Coast, and by their cooperation striving to build up a sentiment that means so much for tourist travel on this Coast, you can appreciate that these men are men of vision and men of progress and men of enterprise. Throughout the whole tour, from the time that we joined them in San Francisco, and throughout Central and Southern California, these men and their messages were a source of inspiration to us at all times. They certainly left a very fine impression upon the minds of the men and women who made up that crusade. They realized that in the far North they have magnificent attractions, they have their Lake Louise, and they have the Canadian Rockies, and alongside of them in Washington there is Mount Baker and Mount Rainier, and all those attractions that we in this part of the state are familiar And their coming down to the central part of California and to the south has impressed upon the minds of the people of the whole Pacific Coast the fact that, while we down here in California and the folks in Oregon and in Washington have their attractions for tourists, that they are willing to reciprocate and coordinate the efforts of the whole Pacific Coast so that we can bring to the attention of the people of the East, and to the attention of the people of the Old World these wonders, by calling to their attention the fact that the Pacific Coast is a great and magnificent playground, where people might come

here to enjoy those points of interest and find the recreation that is here available. And out of it all, Mr. Mayor and gentlemen of the British Columbia delegation, out of it comes population. There is no doubt about that. In this Pacific Coast, with a coast line of 2,000 miles, peopled with less than ten million souls, can we not realize what the future has in store for us in this back area, in the way of building up

population on the Pacific Coast!

Ladies and gentlemen, and members of the Canadian delegation. I feel that this Pacific Coast crusade has made history for the Pacific Coast in the work of the upbuilding of this great Pacific slope, and I am satisfied that this will only be the initial crusade, and repeating my sentiments expressed at the conclusion of the tour, that another crusade will follow and another and another because out of this will be developed coordinating plans that will mean something for the whole Pacific Coast. And these gentlemen here are missionaries of good will, they are missionaries of progress, and they will go home, after their experience, with a better understanding of the States of Washington, Oregon and California, and better able to cooperate, knowing all of the problems and knowing all of the things in the way of tourist development, because, as I say, Mr. Mayor and members of the Board, the problem of tourist development is a great problem indeed when we appreciate the millions of dollars spent by our tourists across the seas in Europe. We believe that, if this crusade is a success, the Pacific Coast will be the Mecca to which will be attracted the peoples of the Old World, who will find here all the joys and comforts of recreation, more so than they can find across the water. Mayor, personally I have never experienced a more delightful trip than I did on this tour. It has been a privilege, an education and an inspiration, and the very fondest recollections that I will have of it are the friendships that I formed with the different members that made up the Pacific Coast crusade, and particularly with this delegation from British Columbia.

SUPERVISOR GALLAGHER: Mr. Mayor, might I be permitted a word?

mit.

THE MAYOR: I was just going to ask for you.

SUPERVISOR GALLAGHER: Thank you. I would like, addressing the gentleman from Vancouver and Victoria, on behalf of a number of members of this Board, to say nothing of our citizens who have been guests within their great Dominion and Empire, to express, through you, and especially to Mr. George Warren, to Mr. Craddock and to the others, who were so kind and courteous to us on our trip, our personal thanks. I would not want to be facetious, but I would say that it would seem to me the limit of courtesy is reached when a man named Gallagher and a man named McGovern can be met by the British Dominion delegation at the border line and welcomed to their country. And that is exactly what they did. They did not wait for us to get into Vancouver. It is a long, long time since the doctrine of "48 or fight" concerning the Oregon boundary has been heard. so much has happened and so many friendships have been formed since then by virtue of these contacts, that it is almost impossible to contemplate that old situation. In Vancouver the entire state traffic force, all of the city agencies and all of the intimate courtesies that go with a welcome, that was not exceeded anywhere for its whole-someness and for its warmth. In Victoria Mr. George Warren took personal charge of the delegation. And here was something that is rarely done for delegations: the homes of the people of Victoria were open to us, freely and gladly, to make use of, to enjoy in every way that we could. For one, I shall never forget our visit to Vancouver and Victoria. Mr. Craddock was the agency through which the arrangements for automobile traffic was perfected. The other gentleman I had not the pleasure of meeting until the other day. But I just would like to speak my personal thanks, I am sure I speak for

Supervisors McGovern, Suhr and Roncovieri when I say that our delegation from San Francisco was treated in a style that was nearly roval.

I would like to recite just one small instance. As chairman of the delegation and representing you, Mr. Mayor, when we got to Vancouver, or was it Victoria-I cannot remember-your representative. Mr. Mayor, was ushered into a room nearly half as large as this, and surrounded by beautiful trimmings, mirrors and all sorts of arrangements that go with an apartment of that kind. And remembering the fact that you are economical and that junkets, so-called, are not popular, I was very much worried about what the damages (prices) might be, and made inquiries (in a careful way) to see if my stay might not be prolonged too long for our purse. Imagine my surprise when I found I was occupying what is called "The Royal Suite." When we went to find out how much San Francisco owed, there was no charge. That was a type of their hospitality. They were fine, they were wonderful. Mr. Hayden speaks by the card. Whoever has not seen that wonderful country has missed one of God's sights, has missed a handiwork of God that we cannot, of course, in a man sense attempt to even imitate. They have wonders, and they are proud of them. They, of course, make the most of them, but are willing to join with San Francisco, with California, with Oregon and with Washington, clear down to the Mexican border, to the end those differences, those jealousies, and problems that are ours in common, can be battered down and solved. With the realization that we have at least one thing in common that we can give to the world, and that is this, that the Pacific Coast can show more in the way of natural wonders than any place, perhaps, in the world, we go forward together to invite the world. When you remember that between the time we meet this delegation today, and within the next few months, over 730,000 people from out of this State, and from Eastern States, coming by way of Vancouver and Victoria through San Francisco, and down across the Tehachapi into Southern California, you have some idea of what has been accomplished. When I stop to remind you that the traffic on the Redwood Empire Highway, which reaches Van-couver, has increased over 230 per cent in the last few years, you will recognize that the work of Mr. Warren, Mr. Dixon, Mr. Craddock and the other gentlemen on their end, as well as the work of our people on this end and further south, has been of tremendous benefit to the Coast. Like Mr. Hayden and yourself, the Board and our citizens, we are all glad to take advantage of this occasion to tell them how well we think of them. After all good will is rare. the opportunity for men and women to come together for the single purpose of shaking hands, of becoming better acquainted, of finding out how they can help each other and of doing what they can to solve each other's problems are rare. And in that spirit this delegation is deeply and doubly welcome-welcomed. Thank you very much for your attention.

THE MAYOR: Gentlemen of the Board: I ask your unanimous approval to present some one at this time to speak from the floor. Through your veins, gentlemen of the British Dominion in the North, through your love of your native land and the entire British Isles, upon which the sun never sets, there is in this gathering today a son of fine noble Scottish people. He, born in California of Scottish parentage, knows the history of the British Isles and all it represents. No one can speak better of where Wallace bled, no one can speak better of the Land of Cakes, no one can speak better of the beauties of Scotland and England and the British Isles than the most gifted orator, most brilliant legal mind that we have in America today, who nominated, in the most brilliant speech that was ever uttered in any convention, the President of the United States. And he is here with us, and no one yet has ever refused an invitation from the Mayor

to make a response when called upon. And I ask Mr. John L. McNab to respond to the sentiments. Mr. McNab, I ask you to respond to the

sentiments of our Canadian cousins.

MR. JOHN L. McNAB: Mr. Mayor, members of the Board of Supervisors, visiting delegation and ladies and gentlemen of San Francisco: I assure you I never was more surprised in my life. If any one in the future shall ever accuse me of being prepared for this occasion, I am ready to meet him in any squared arena in the universe and deny the accusation. However, Mr. Mayor, it is a distinguished honor to appear before this body and to respond to the greeting on behalf of these distinguished visitors. I did not know, when you commenced your elegant speech of introduction, that you were alluding to me. I was thinking of something far different from what I now find myself to be doing, and I am rapidly improvising those elegant thoughts of which you said I was the proud possessor. I wish to say that it is true that I am born of Scottish parentage, but I likewise desire to say, in accordance with all the traditions of the race, that, as a matter of economy alone, I insisted upon being born in this country. Thereby I obviated the necessity for traffic on steamship and other methods of communication.

It is a very distinguished pleasure, gentlemen, to greet representatives from the North, that wondrous country that extends over hundreds of miles of land and river and sea, that land of which it has been so frequently said, "An invisible boundary extends from coast to coast, without the necessity of a gun on the south pointing north or the necessity of a gun on the north pointing south." And I pray to God that through the endless generations of men, wherever the Anglo-Saxon blood shall flow, no necessity shall ever exist for anything but that invisible boundary, unguarded as it is at the present time.

Here in this country, gentlemen, of which I have the honor to be a son, we are born of cosmopolitan blood. A number of years ago, at a great banquet held in New York City, the German Ambassador, the Ambassador of the then Empire of China, and a distinguished American woman were sitting side by side. This German Ambassador was a man of very profound intellect and learning. Finally, the lady turned to the Chinese diplomat and said, "I wonder if there is anything in the world that you can suggest that I can ask of this German diplomat because I am completely at the end of my rope. He seems to be informed on every subject." And the Chinese Ambassador said, quizzically, "Yes, suppose you ask him, what is the fourth largest German city in the world?" The lady turned to the German and he glibly answered, giving the name of one of those glorious centers of population in the Central Empire. And she turned to the Chinese Ambassador and said, "Is the answer right?" And he said, "Certainly it is not right because the fourth largest German city in the world is the City of Chicago."

We are a cosmopolitan nation. We have drawn from the richest strains of all the great nationalities of the world. Into the veins of the American flows the richest, warmest blood of the finest races in the world. But whatever may be said of other races, gentlemen, I think we all must come back to this: That the Anglo-Saxon people must ultimately, in spite of their internal differences, govern the affairs of the world. Unquestionably in these English-speaking races, whatever their internal dissension—and they will be settled in friendly manner between themselves—but whatever dissensions may exist throughout the world, ultimately the peace of the world must depend upon the force and the virility and the vision of the Anglo-Saxon

people.

Whenever you come here, gentlemen, you come into a land of friends. The boundary which you cross, may it always remain invisible, may it be as opaque as the atmosphere of your northern hills, where I so frequently go to violate your game laws. May it always be as it is

now, and may the memory of the boys that went from America to Canada, and the boys that came from Canada to the United States, to march together under a common flag, that liberty might long endure, may that always bind us together with chains of enduring

friendship. Thank you.

THE MAYOR: Has anyone else any courtesy to offer? I will say this: That you have made this a very pleasant afternoon. You are in the finest legislative room that I think you can find anywhere. You are in the finest public building in the United States. You are in a building chosen by the University of France in its award, giving this building the gold medal as being the finest public building in the United States. And when you leave look aloft and see the dome, 16 feet 25% inches loftier than the dome of the Capitol at Washington. And when you leave tonight, watch that dome, brilliantly illuminated in your honor, signifying to you that bond of friendship which Mr. McNab has so beautifully expressed, so that you may carry away with you a warmth of friendship amongst friends which you have and will hold here in San Francisco, and with the blessing and good wishes we send from here to the place to which you go.

SUPERVISOR TONER: Mr. Mayor, I would respectfully suggest that you instruct our Clerk to prepare a transcript of the proceedings that took place here this afternoon and present that to this delegation

so they will have it as a lasting memorial of this occasion.

SUPERVISOR RONCOVIERI: Second the motion. SUPERVISOR HAYDEN: Second the motion.

THE MAYOR: All in favor say aye. (Ayes) So ordered. Mr. Official Reporter, will you please carry out the instructions of that resolution. Send several copies to Mr. Warren at his office in Victoria.

SPECIAL ORDER-3 P. M.

Ordering Ornamental Street Lights on Hyde Street.

Bill No. 8240, Ordinance No. 8740 (New Series), as follows:

Ordering the improvement of Hyde street from Market street to California street by the furnishing and installing of an ornamental street lighting system, approving and adopting specifications therefor; providing for the payment thereof by installments, and outlining the district to be assessed for said improvement.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Fran-

cisco as follows:

Section 1. The Board of Public Works, in written communication dated August 2, 1929, and filed in the office of the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors August 6, 1929, having recommended to the Board of Supervisors the ordering of the following street work or improvement, the same is hereby ordered to be done in the City and County of San Francisco in conformity with the provisions of the Street Improvement Ordinance of 1918 of said City and County of San Francisco, said work to be performed under the direction of the Board of Public Works, and to be done in accordance with the specifications prepared therefor by said Board of Public Works and on file in its office, which said plans and specifications are hereby approved and adopted.

That said Board of Supervisors, pursuant to the provisions of the Street Improvement Ordinance of 1918 of said City and County of San Francisco, does hereby determine and declare that the assessment to be imposed for the said contemplated improvements, respectively, may be paid in four installments; that the period of time after the time of the payment of the first installment when each of the succeeding installments must be paid is to be one year from the time of the payment of the preceding installment, and that the rate of interest to be charged on all deferred payments shall be seven per centum per

annum.

The improvement of Hyde street from Market street to California

street by furnishing and installing an ornamental street lighting system.

The assessment district is described as follows:

All the lands within the exterior boundary of all those certain lots

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Regulating the Keeping of Small Animals, Etc.

Provided, however, that when a permit has been issued for the maintenance of any of the above the same must be kept and fed in coops or enclosures complying with the following requirements, to-wit:

(a) The floor of said coop or enclosure shall be of concrete not less than two (2) inches thick and covered either with a layer of cement not less than one-half $(\frac{1}{2})$ inch thick or asphalt not less than one (1) inch thick.

(b) The said coop or enclosure shall be entirely surrounded by a brick or concrete wall at least five (5) inches in thickness and one (1)

foot high.

(c) The said coop or enclosure shall be entirely surrounded by a galvanized iron wire mesh fence, wall or sides extending at least six (6) feet above the ground, which mesh shall not be greater than one-

half $(\frac{1}{2})$ inch in size.

Provided, however, that said hares, rabbits, guinea pigs, chickens, turkeys, geese, ducks, doves, pigeons, parrots, game birds or other fowl shall be permitted, between the hours of sunrise and sunset, to run at large within the limits of the premises. Said coops or enclosures shall be kept closed during the time that said hares, rabbits, guinea pigs, chickens, turkeys, geese, ducks, doves, pigeons, parrots, game birds or other fowl are so running at large. The said premises to be safely fenced so that said animals and fowls cannot escape therefrom.

Section 2. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to keep or feed, or cause to be kept or fed, or permit to be kept or fed, the following: Hares, rabbits, guinea pigs, chickens, turkeys, geese, ducks, doves, pigeons, game birds, parrots of any species, or other fowl in movable or portable coops in premises which are not rat-proof, unless the said coops are constructed with a metal bottom and metal sides extending to a height of at least one (1) foot, surmounted by a metal cage of one-half (½) inch wire mesh.

Section 3. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to engage in the business of keeping, feeding or breeding any hares, rabbits, guinea pigs, chickens, turkeys, geese, ducks, doves, pigeons, parrots of any species, game birds of any species, dogs, cats, for commercial purposes, within the first and second residential districts as

defined by Ordinance No. 5464 (New Series).

Section 4. It is hereby declared to be unlawful to conduct, for commercial purposes, any establishment in which dogs, cats, hares, rabbits, guinea pigs. chickens, turkeys, geese, ducks, doves, pigeons, parrots of any species, game birds of any species, are kept and maintained in the commercial district, light industrial district and heavy industrial district as those districts are at present defined by Ordinance No. 5464 (New Series) or as may hereafter be defined by the City Planning Commission of the City and County of San Francisco, without first obtaining from the Board of Health a permit so to do.

Section 5. No permit shall be issued by the Board of Health to any person, firm or corporation, to keep or maintain for commercial pur-

poses any of the above-named fowl, animals or birds, within the commercial, light industrial or heavy industrial districts as at present defined by Ordinance No. 5464 (New Series), or as may hereafter be defined by the City Planning Commission of the City and County of San Francisco, unless said person, firm or corporation has complied in full with the following requirements:

First: The premises to be used for the keeping and maintenance of any of the fowl, animals and birds specified above, and specifically kept for commercial purposes, must be situated at least twenty-five (25) feet from the doors, windows and other openings of any dwelling,

apartment house or hotel.

Second: It shall be unlawful to keep or maintain any of the fowl, animals and birds above mentioned in a basement, sub-basement or cellar.

Third: The floors of all such premises must be constructed of water-

proof material properly drained to the sewer.

Fourth: Said premises shall be rat-proof, all openings properly flyscreened, and adequate provision must be made for the elimination of all odors.

Fifth: The walls and ceilings of all such premises must be of hardfinished plaster, painted with two coats of lead and oil paint, light

in color.

Sixth: In all premises where slaughtering of fowl, birds or animals is carried on in connection with the keeping of said fowl, birds or animals, the killing-room must be entirely separate from that part of

the premises occupied by the live fowl, animals or birds.

The floors of said slaughtering-room must be of waterproof material, properly drained to the sewer. The walls and ceilings must be of hard-finished plaster and painted with two coats of lead and oil paint, light in color. Refrigerating equipment must be installed for the reception of the dressed fowl, birds or animals, properly connected to the sewer. Toilet and lavatory facilities for the use of the employees engaged in the handling and slaughtering of said birds, animals or fowl must be installed in conformity with the provisions of the plumbing law.

Section 6. All ordinances or parts or portions of any and all ordinances in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance and Ordinance

No. 384 (New Series) are hereby repealed.

Section 7. Any person, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine of not more than one hundred (\$100) dollars, or by imprisonment in the County Jail for not more than thirty (30) days, or by both fine and imprisonment.

Section 8. This ordinance shall take effect immediately upon its

passage.

Regulating the Handling of Meat and Meat Food Products.

Also, Bill No. 8239, Ordinance No. — (New Series), as follows:

Regulating the handling of meat and meat food products in grocery stores, delicatessens and other establishments where such meat and meat food products are sold or offered for sale; providing for the regulation of vehicles transporting such meat or products, and providing for inspection of all meat and meat products arriving in the City and County of San Francisco.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San

Francisco as follows:

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to expose, sell, or offer for sale any meat food product or products in any grocery, delicatessen or other stores where food products are sold or offered for sale, unless the same is handled in a division separate and apart from that in which groceries, vegetables, and

other general merchandise is handled, such division to be properly equipped with enclosed glass-topped counters to protect such meat or meat products or cooked or uncooked food products from handling or contamination from any other products within the same area; and there shall be separate and proper ice boxes or refrigerators for the preserving and keeping of such products.

Section 2. Any frozen, refrigerated, or cold storage products shall not be sold in the same establishment selling fresh products unless said cold storage, refrigerated, or frozen products are kept in a separate section having a sign in large and readable letters, easily

identified by the public, giving notice of the character of the products that are purchased.

Section 3. Any packaged meats of a frozen, refrigerated, or cold storage nature must be properly stamped, "Cold Storage," in accordance with the provisions of the Cold Storage Act of the State of California, provided said package has been prepared for a period of thirty days

prior to being offered for sale.

Section 4. All vehicles used in the transportation of meat or meat food products shall be appropriately lettered in plain characters showing the name of the dealer and the location of the plant wherein such meat or meat food products are prepared or manufactured for

delivery.

Section 5. All meat and meat products arriving in the City and County from points outside the City and County of San Francisco, shall be presented for inspection by the Board of Health at the Ferry Building or such other place as may be authorized by said Board of Health, regardless of whether such meat or products have been inspected and passed by any other State, City or Federal inspection service.

Section 6.—Any person, firm or corporation violating the provisions of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be punishable by a fine of not less than twenty-five (\$25) dollars nor more than five hundred (\$500) dollars, or by imprisonment in the County Jail for not more than six (6) months, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

Section 7. All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict with

this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Section 8. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Amending Ordinance Providing for Issuance of Certificates of Public Convenience and Necessity.

Bill No. 8240, Ordinance No. ——— (New Series), as follows:

Amending Sections 1, 3, 6 and 7 of Ordinance No. 8637 (New Series), entitled "Providing for the issuance of certificates of public convenience and necessity in connection with the issuance of licenses for the operation of taxicabs, as defined in Ordinance No. 6979 (New Series), and providing for the issuance of certificates of public convenience and necessity in connection with the operation sightseeing buses as said buses are defined in Ordinance No. 5118 (New Series), and providing a penalty for any violation thereof."

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Fran-

clsco as follows:

Sections 1, 3, 6 and 7 of Ordinance No. 8637 (New Series), the title of which is recited above, are hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 1. That no license shall be issued for the operation of any taxicab, as the same is defined in Ordinance No. 6979 (New Series), unless and until the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco shall, by resolution, declare that public convenience and necessity require the proposed taxicab service for which application for a license is made.

Provided, that such declaration of public convenience and necessity

shall not be necessary,

(a) For the licensing of the same number of taxicabs licensed for operation by the applicant under the same name and colors on the day upon which this ordinance shall take effect, or the renewal of the same number of licenses annually thereafter; provided, however, that this exception shall apply only in the event that the applicant was engaged in the actual operation of a taxicab or sightseeing bus business at the time Ordinance No. 8637 (New Series) became effective, and was, at said time, complying with all of the provisions of Ordinance No. 5132 (New Series), and amendments thereto, Ordinance No. 5118 (New Series), and Ordinance No. 6979 (New Series).

(b) For the renewal of licenses to the applicant for the number of taxicabs of the applicant for which the said Board of Supervisors shall have at any time prior to the date of application for such renewal

made a declaration of public convenience and necessity.

Every person, firm or corporation holding a license authorizing the operation of a taxicab under and pursuant to the provisions of Ordinance No. 6979 (New Series) of this City and County shall on or before the 5th day of February, 1930, file with the Clerk of this Board of Supervisors an affidavit setting forth the number of taxicabs which it is then licensed to operate, and shall describe the colors on the same.

Section 3. Any applicant for a license to operate a taxicab in accordance with the terms of Ordinance No. 6979 (New Series) shall make proper application to this Board of Supervisors for its declaration of the public convenience and necessity, on blanks to be furnished by the Clerk of said Board of Supervisors, and immediately upon the filing of such an application said Clerk shall cause a notice to be published in the official newspaper of the City and County of San Francisco, which said notice shall set forth the fact that said application has been filed for a license to operate a taxicab or taxicab business, the name of the applicant; kind of equipment; and number of vehicles to be operated. Said notice is to be published for three successive days. On filing the application the applicant shall pay to the Clerk the sum of \$15 for one vehicle and \$1 for each additional vehicle for which a certificate of public convenience and necessity is desired to cover the cost and expenses of advertising the notice of application and the resolution granting the permit.

All holders of existing licenses for the operation of taxicabs shall thereupon be entitled to file any complaints in protest that said holders may see fit at the time of the holding of the investigation and hearing. The Board of Supervisors shall consider all of the complaints and protests and in conducting its hearing shall have the right to call such witnesses as it may see fit. In all of such hearings the burden of proof shall be upon the applicant to establish by clear, cogent and convincing evidence, which shall satisfy the said Board of Supervisors beyond a reasonable doubt that public convenience and necessity require such operation of the vehicle or vehicles for which the said application has been made, and that such application in all

other respects should be granted.

Section 6. All persons, firms or corporations within the purview of this ordinance shall regularly and daily operate his or its licensed taxicab business during each day of the licensed year to the extent reasonably necessary to meet the public demand for such taxicab service. Upon abandonment of such taxicab business, for a period of ten (10) consecutive days by an owner or operator, the Board of Supervisors shall upon hearing, after five (5) days notice to the said

applicant, thereupon direct the Police Commission of the City and County of San Francisco to revoke its said license which it may have granted to said applicant in accordance with the terms and provisions of the aforesaid Ordinance No. 6979 (New Series), and said license shall be revoked. Such permits as are herein granted shall be transferrable upon written application to said Board of Supervisors and the payment of the fee required of new applicants and consent having been so obtained from said Board of Supervisors, and any and all such certificates of public necessity and convenience and all rights herein granted may be rescinded and ordered revoked for cause, and said Police Commission shall upon notification of said action by said Board of Supervisors revoke any and all such permits.

Section 7. No person, firm or corporation, after six (6) months from date of passage of this ordinance, shall operate any motor vehicle, as herein defined, unless and until such person, firm or cor-

poration shall

- (a) File with the Board of Supervisors a sworn statment showing the ability of said person, firm or corporation to pay all damages which may result from any and all accidents due to the negligent use or operation of such vehicle, and in the event such showing is unsatisfactory said Board may compel said person, firm or corporation to
- (b) File with the said Board security, indemnity or bond guaranteeing the payment by said person, firm or corporation of all such damages, or

(c) Insure to a reasonable amount said person's, firm's or corpora-

tion's liability to pay such damage.

Said person, firm or corporation shall, not later than the first week in July of each year and as often as said Board of Supervisors shall direct, file in writing upon a form prescribed by said Board of Supervisors, financial statement or statements of such insurance or indemnity or bonds or security held or secured by said person, firm or corporation and pay to said Clerk the sum of \$5 to cover the costs and expenses of examining said statements.

Failure to make satisfactory proof of ability to so respond in damages shall be deemed cause for cancellation of any and all permits so to

operate.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Regulating and Licensing of Advertising Balloons.

Bill No. ————, Ordinance No. ———— (New Series), as follows: Regulating the flying, floating, suspending, raising and lowering of kites or balloons for advertising purposes, providing a permit and license for, and inspection of, the same, and a penalty for violation thereof.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco as follows:

Section 1. On and after June 1, 1930, it shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to release inside the limits of the City and County of San Francisco, or to release in such a manner that the same will float over the City and County of San Francisco, or any portion thereof, any balloon or kite carrying any advertising matter thereon, or used for the purpose of advertising any person, firm, corporation or product, or to suspend in the air over the City and County of San Francisco, or any portion thereof, either by ropes, strings, wires or cables, any balloon or kite carrying any advertising matter thereon, or used for the purpose of advertising any person, firm, corporation or product, without first having obtained a permit therefor from the

Board of Supervisors, which said permit shall specify the name of the permittee and the location of the place of business of said permittee.

Section 2. No permittee authorized to do the things set out in Section 1 hereof, shall release or fly any balloon or kite for the aforesaid purposes, within this City and County, without first notifying in writing the Board of Public Works of the location from which said balloon or kite is to be flown, released, attached or suspended.

Section 3. It shall be the duty of the Board of Public Works, upon receipt of the aforesaid written notice from the permittee, to inspect the said kite or balloon and ropes, strings, wires or cables, and the mechanism used in suspending, tying, raising or lowering the kite or balloon for the purpose of ascertaining whether they are of sufficient strength and texture and mechanically proper to permit their operation in safety; but in no instance shall the Board of Public Works allow any kite or balloon for the aforesaid purposes to be used to which is attached any wire, wire cable or metallic substance, or which is painted with a metallic paint.

Section 4. Any person, firm or corporation permitted by the Board of Supervisors to release, fly, float, suspend, raise or lower any kite or balloon as set out in Section 1 of this ordinance, shall pay to the Tax Collector of this City and County a license of ten (\$10) dollars per

quarter per balloon for the privilege of using said permit.

Section 5. Any person, firm or corporation violating any provisions of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be punishable by a fine or not more than five hundred (\$500) dollars, or by imprisonment in the County Jail for not more than six (6) months, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

Prescribing the Procedure Under Which the Board of Trustees of the War Memorial Shall Have Charge of Construction, Administration, Etc.

On recommendation of Finance and Public Buildings Committees.

Bill No. 8236, Ordinance No. 8746 (New Series), as follows:

Setting forth and prescribing the procedure under which the Board of Trustees of the War Memorial shall have charge of construction, administration, management, superintendence and operation of the War Memorial; providing for acceptance of gifts, devises and bequests; providing for employees and their salaries; providing budget and accounts of said Trustees; providing for purchase of materials, supplies and equipment, and providing for setting up of revolving fund.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco as follows:

Section 1. Direction to Board of Trustees of War Memorial. The Board of Trustees of the War Memorial, in exercising the powers granted to it under Article XIV-D of the Charter relative to the construction, administration, management, superintendence and operation of the War Memorial of San Francisco, shall do so subject to the provisions of this ordinance. Said Board of Trustees shall be hereinafter mentioned as the Trustees.

Section 2. Construction of War Memorial. The Trustees of the War Memorial shall construct a building or buildings as and for a War Memorial on the real property located in the City and County of San Francisco, bounded by Van Ness avenue, Grove, Franklin and McAllister streets. That said War Memorial shall be constructed by and under the supervision of the Trustees, the cost of which, however, shall not exceed the sum received by the War Memorial bond issue, together with such other and further sums as may be hereafter available, nor shall any contract be entered into for the construction of the War Memorial until the money to be paid under said contract shall be appropriated by the Board of Supervisors, and said Trustees may, and they are hereby empowered, forthwith to open and establish offices for preparing all necessary plans and specifications for the construction of said War Memorial. All planning, construction work, extensions, additions, betterments or replacements done in or about the properties of said War Memorial shall be done under the direction and supervision of the Trustees.

Section 3. Administration, Management, Superintendence and Operation of the War Memorial. That said Trustees shall, subsequent to the construction of said War Memorial and during the construction thereof, administer, manage, superintend and operate said War Memorial and the grounds set aside therefor, and all of its affairs.

Section 4. Gifts, Devises and Bequests. No gifts, devises or bequests, other than unconditional gifts, devises and bequests of cash, shall be accepted by the City and County of San Francisco, as and for said War Memorial, without the consent of a majority of the Trustees present at a meeting of said Trustees. The Trustees are hereby expressly empowered to receive, on behalf of the City and County, any money or other property from the Regents of the University of California, the University of California, or any Board of Trustees operating under the direct or indirect control of the Regents of the University of California, or from Walter S. Martin, Charles Templeton Crocker, John D. McKee, E. S. Heller, Charles H. Kendrick, Frank L. Kilsby, Milton H. Esberg, Herbert Fleishhacker, William H. Crocker and John S. Drum, or their successors, as Trustees, and said money or property shall be set aside for the use and benefit of said Trustees. Said Trustees are hereby empowered to receive and accept any of said cash or property under the terms and provisions of Section 4, Article

XIV-D, of the Charter. Any gifts, devises and/or bequests received by the Trustees, on behalf of the City and County, for any purposes connected with said War Memorial, or incident thereto, shall be set aside in a special fund for the use and benefit of the said War Memorial.

Section 5. Employees. The Trustees shall engage such employees. bonded or otherwise, as may be necessary for the conduct of the prop-

serty and affairs of said War Memorial.

Section 6. Salaries. The salaries, wages and compensation of the managing director and secretary of said War Memorial and of all other employees shall be subject to standardization as provided in Section 14, Chapter 2, Article II, of the Charter. That, pending the standardization of wages, salaries and compensation, there shall be paid to said employees at least the minimum entrance salary, wage or compensation paid for similar services by the City and County of San Francisco, and if there are any positions or places of employment created by the Trustees not common with others in the government of the City and County of San Francisco, then the compensation to be

paid to said employees shall be fixed by said Trustees.

Section 7. Budgets. Not later than May 1, in the year 1930, and during the month of March in each succeeding year during the period of construction, the Trustees shall transmit to the Board of Supervisors a proposed budget for the next fiscal year, which budget shall show in detail the estimated amounts of revenue from all sources to the Trustees, as well as an estimate of the amounts required by the Trustees for all operating purposes. Such estimate of both receipts and disbursements shall be segregated and itemized so as to show the exact purpose of each item therein, and the amounts for salaries and wages shall be itemized so as to show the compensation paid to each class of employees and the number of said employees in each class; provided, however, that in estimating the cost of construction work in the performance of which the employees will not be of a permanent character, the estimated number of employees to be employed thereon need not be set forth. The Finance Committee of the Board of Supervisors shall submit said budget as a part of its annual budget report to the Board of Supervisors, together with such recommendations as it deems proper. The adoption of said budget by the Board of Supervisors and the approval thereof by the Mayor shall be considered an appropriation of the various amounts therein contained for the purposes therein set forth, and thereafter said sum so appropriated may be expended by the Trustees in the manner provided by law for the purposes for which they are appropriated, without further order of the Board of Supervisors. At any time during a fiscal year, in the event of emergency, the Board of Supervisors may appropriate additional funds.

Subsequent to the completion of the War Accounts. Memorial the Trustees shall cause to be filed a complete operating statement, showing all the operations, receipts and disbursements of the Trustees for the previous month, and same shall be open for inspection by the public in the office of the Clerk of the Board of Super-Said statement shall show the number of employees of the visors. Trustees.

Section 9. Purchase of Materials, Supplies and Equipment. Subsequent to completion of the War Memorial, purchases of materials, supplies and equipment required by the Trustees shall be made in accordance with the provision of Chapter IV, Article II, of the Charter, and Ordinance No. 5880 (New Series); provided, however, that specifications may be prepared under the direction of the Trustees for all equipment required by said Trustees and for materials or supplies peculiar to said War Memorial operations and not in common use in other departments of the City and County; and the Trustees may designate the particular brand, kind or make of any equipment which may be necessary in the conduct of said War Memorial.

Section 10. Revolving Fund. For the purpose of paying petty expenses of the Trustees and/or the War Memorial and for making such other payments as cannot be conveniently paid by demands drawn by the Treasurer and approved by the Auditor, the Trustees shall maintain in a bank or banks designated by said Trustees a fund, not to exceed two thousand (\$2,000.00) dollars, from which fund said petty expenses and other payments that cannot be conveniently paid by demands drawn upon the Treasurer shall be paid by check drawn by such person or persons in the employ of the Trustees of the War Memorial as the Trustees may authorize. The Trustees shall from time to time, and at least once in each month, transmit to the Auditor a demand in favor of said fund for all amounts disbursed from it, to which demand shall be attached receipts for all payments so made, which said receipts shall show the name of the person receiving any payment from said fund as well as the purpose for which said payment was made, and shall be signed by the party receiving said payment. When said demand is approved by the Auditor and paid by the Treasurer, it shall be delivered to the Trustees and deposited to the credit of the Trustees. The Board of Supervisors shall appropriate the said sum of two thousand (\$2,000.00) dollars for such fund and may from time to time make such additional appropriations thereto as said Board of Supervisors shall deem proper.

Section 11. Constitutionality. If any section, subsection, subdivision or provision of this ordinance is for any reason held to be unconstitutional, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining provisions of this ordinance, the Board of Supervisors hereby declaring that it would have passed this ordinance and each section, subsection, subdivision, provision, sentence, clause and phrase thereof irrespective of the fact that any one or more sections, subsections, subdivisions, provisions, sentences, clauses or phrases hereof are declared uncon-

stitutional.

Section 12. Effectiveness. This ordinance shall become effective immediately upon its passage.

Section 13. Other Ordinances. Any ordinance or part thereof in conflict herewith is hereby repealed in respect to conflicting provisions.

Privilege of the Floor.

Assistant City Attorney Dold was granted the privilege of the floor and addressed the Board, explaining the meaning of each section of the foregoing ordinance.

Communication From State Building Trades Council of California in Re Employment of Aliens on City Contracts.

The following was presented and read by the Clerk:

April 26, 1930.

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors.

Gentlemen: We respectfully call your attention to the fact that the Charter law of the City and County of San Francisco, which provides, in part, that persons employed by contractors upon public work being done for the City and County of San Francisco shall be citizens of the United States, or have declared their intention of becoming such, and shall have resided for the period of one year next preceding the date of their engagement to perform labor thereunder in the City and County of San Francisco, is being continuously and flagrantly disregarded upon the street, building and other construction work done for the City and County of San Francisco.

We are sure that your honorable Board desires to see this law enforced, because its provisions are intended not only to protect the resident citizen workmen of San Francisco, but also to protect the commercial interests of our City.

We therefore most earnestly request that your honorable Board take such action as you deem necessary to compel the observance and en-

forcement of the aforesaid provisions of the Charter law.

We are positive that the people of San Francisco, as well as the organizations that we represent, will greatly appreciate your immediate action on this important matter.

Whereas, in an article printed in the San Francisco Examiner April 24, under the caption of "Street Light Monopoly of P. G. and E.," there appeared a calumnious attack against Supervisor William P. Stanton, wherein an attempt was made to link him with an alleged scheme of the P. G. and E. Co. to frustrate the formation of assessment districts formed for the purpose of installing electric lighting equipment paid for by the property owners; and

Whereas, as a matter of fact, Supervisor Stanton, as chairman of the Lighting Committee, initiated the movement for the formation of as-

sessment districts; and

Whereas, Supervisor Stanton, through investigation and research, determined that iron was the most suitable type of material for the construction of electric lighting standards in San Francisco, and recommended that iron be adopted and equipment standardized so that San Francisco would have the best type of material in standards, and such be of uniform character and design throughout the city; and

Whereas, the Board of Supervisors persistently refused to adopt the recommendations of Supervisor Stanton, and thereby obstructed the purposes for which assessment districts were to be formed, and

aid in standardizing the city lighting system; and

Whereas, the Labor Council, Metal Trades Council and affiliated unions, after careful investigation, recommended iron for the construction of standards, because it is the most suitable type of material, and because of the further fact that it will give employment to local mechanics and business to local concerns; therefore, be it

Resolved, That International Molders' Union No. 164 condemns the unwarranted and slanderous attack on Supervisor William P. Stan-

ton; and be it

Further Resolved, That copies of this resolution be forwarded to the San Francisco Labor Council, the Metal Trades Council, the Board of Supervisors, and the press.

Congress to Investigate Activities of Pacific Gas and Electric Company.

Supervisor Havenner presented:

Resolution No. — (New Series), as follows:

Whereas, certain documents brought to the attention of the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco indicate a

definite policy on the part of the Pacific Gas and Electric Company, a corporation which at present enjoys a partial monopoly of the business of furnishing electric power and light to the people of San Francisco, to combat and attempt to defeat all efforts to establish municipal or public ownership of the business of supplying and distributing electric light and power in the City and County of San Francisco; and

Whereas, the Charter of the City and County of San Francisco definitely pledges and commits the municipality to the eventual ownership

and operation of its public utilities; and

Whereas, the act of Congress commonly known as the Raker Act, which grants to the City and County of San Francisco certain important rights to the use of water and land in the Hetch Hetchy Valley of California, definitely and specifically provides that the City and County of San Francisco shall supply and distribute direct to its people the hydro-electric power generated by the City and County on the Hetch Hetchy project; and

Whereas, there have been repeated public declarations by responsible executive officials of the Pacific Gas and Electric Company that that corporation would never consent to the purchase or acquisition by the City and County of San Francisco of the existing facilities and equipment for the distribution of light and power to its people; now,

therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Congress of the United States be and is hereby respectfully requested and petitioned, through its appropriate committees, to conduct an investigation of the activities of the Pacific Gas and Electric Company in opposition to municipal ownership of light and power, for the purpose of determining whether said activities do not constitute a conspiracy to defeat the provisions of the act of Congress known as the Raker Act, with respect to the distribution of power generated on the Hetch Hetchy project; and be it Further Resolved, That the Federal Trade Commission be and it is

Further Resolved, That the Federal Trade Commission be and it is hereby respectfully petitioned to conduct an additional investigation of said activities of the Pacific Gas and Electric Company, for the purpose of determining whether the active opposition of said company to the provisions of the Charter of the City and County of San Francisco with respect to municipal ownership of public utilities does not constitute a violation of the federal laws under its jurisdiction;

and be it

Further Resolved, That copies of this resolution be forwarded immediately to United States Senator Hiram Johnson, United States Senator Samuel Shortridge, Representative Florence Kahn, and Representative Richard J. Welch, with the request that it be presented to the appropriate committees of the Congress and to the Federal Trade Commission of the United States.

"Whereas, the public record of Thomas F. Boyle was an enviable one of unimpeachable honesty and integrity, of unswerving adherence to the Decalogue of the Mount, dictated by the God Who called him, and withal gave a service dedicated to the amelioration of the lot fallen to the man of hire; and

"Whereas, the late Thomas F. Boyle honored himself and the City of his adoption by leaving a good Christian family, and imbued it, and all his friends and intimates, with a love for the better things of life in art and literature, while his genial character lent himself to unmeasured appeals of every kind from divers persons; and

"Whereas, the friendship of Thomas F. Boyle was strong, unfailing, helpful and uplifting, a friendship highly prized by all those who

held it; now, therefore, be it

"Resolved. That the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco deplores the sudden and unexpected death of Thomas F. Boyle, and expresses public sorrow at the loss to San Francisco. and offers to the bereaved children words of sincere sympathy and condolence: and be it

"Further Resolved, That a copy of this resolution of sympathy be spread on the minutes of this meeting of the Board of Supervisors, and that a copy be engrossed and sent to the family of the late Auditor Thomas F. Boyle, and that the municipal offices be closed during the hour of funeral services.'

THE MAYOR: Before that resolution is seconded, may I suggest,

Mr. McSheehy, that the part of the resolution "and that the municipal offices be closed during the hour of the funeral service" could be only whatever number is necessary to keep the offices open, according to law, and allow those who can attend those funeral services tomorrow to do so.

He served this City for twenty-one years, and that is a lifetime of service, and we should show him all the sympathetic thankfulness of a grateful body of legislative men, and thus set the example to the City, that that service is recognized and is remembered. The flags of the City, of course, are at half-mast. I wish the Board to join with me in the suggestion that these offices be closed out of respect to him.

SUPERVISOR McSHEEHY: I gladly suggest that that be incorpo-

rated in the resolution.

THE MAYOR: All in favor of the resolution please rise.

(All members of the Board rise.)

THE MAYOR: Unanimously adopted and so ordered.

(Bringing down the gavel.)

SUPERVISOR RONCOVIERI: Mr. Mayor, I heartily concur with the sentiment you have expressed regarding the closing of the offices in the City Hall. I wish to call your attention to the fact that Mr. Boyle was president of the Board of Education and served on that Board for many years, and, in particular, during the trying time of the calamity of 1906. I was at that time Superintendent of Schools, and without the help of men like Mr. Boyle, the schools could not have reopened as they did in less than three months from the time of the calamity. Mr. Boyle took upon himself the heavy burden of erecting temporary buildings—shacks, if you please—but substantial enough to house the children and induce back to San Francisco those who had left the city at the time of the calamity. And so I would ask you, Mr. Mayor, if you will, to suggest to the Board of Education that all class room exercises stop in the public schools during the brief period of the funeral services. I know that the teachers of San Francisco, and particularly those who served under him, loved him for his kindly and altruistic nature and for his fair treatment of them. Every one who knew "Tom," as we affectionately called him, knows he possessed those indefinable qualities of head and heart which attract and inspire love and respect. He always gave of the best that he possessed, particularly to the unfortunate, and needy. He was ever doing charity, and he was ever doing something for somebody who needed help. I know no man who deserves more of esteem and goodwill at the hands of the people of San Francisco than he, for he served them honestly and efficiently during all his years in public office.

THE MAYOR: I shall transmit your suggestion, in which, I am sure, the Board concurs, to the Board of Education of San Francisco. SUPERVISOR HAVENNER: Mr. Mayor, I would like to add my own expression of grief at the passing, and my own tribute to the memory of Auditor Boyle. It was my privilege to work with him in a closer relationship than perhaps most of my colleagues enjoyed during the years when I was a member of the Finance Committee of this Board. I found him to be a man who devoted his time and his energy and his enthusiasm—an enthusiasm that was really remarkable in the latter years of his life, considering his age-to his duties, a man who was absolutely devoted to the ideals of his office, a man who served San Francisco as well as any other public official I know,

SUPERVISOR SHANNON: Mr. Mayor,

THE MAYOR: Mr. Shannon.

SUPERVISOR SHANNON: A capable, efficient and painstaking public official has been called to the Great Beyond. A chair stands vacant downstairs in the passing of Tom Boyle that is going to be very difficult for your llonor to fill by a man with the same pains-taking attention to public service that Mr. Boyle has shown, not only in his private life, but in his public career. I knew Mr. Boyle forty years ago when he was the cashier for the San Francisco Bulletin, when it had its offices on Montgomery street, a few feet south of Clay. And in those days he was just as careful in looking out for the interests of his private employers as any private clerk could be. And he has followed that career during his latter years, looking out for the interest of the citizens of San Francisco. San Francisco has lost a splendid public official and the family a wonderful father, his wife having predeceased him a short time ago.

THE MAYOR: Mr. Andriano, did you rise?

SUPERVISOR ANDRIANO: Yes, Mr. Mayor, if I may be permitted to join my colleagues in expressing my sincere sorrow at the sudden passing of our City Auditor, Thomas F. Boyle. I do not desire to enlarge upon the beautiful thoughts and sentiments that have already been expressed by the previous speakers. The desire to join in a last tribute to so fine a man and to so fine a public official, Mr. Mayor, is quite natural, for in paying our respects to Mr. Boyle, we are really honoring the City and County of San Francisco, that was able to produce and nurture such a man and such a public official. To me, and to a multitude of other men and women of this City, Mr. Boyle was more than a public official. He was more than a public servant. was more than the Auditor of the City and County of San Francisco. To me and to many others he was the embodiment, the ideal, so to speak, of all that is highest and noblest and the best in political government, and, particularly representative government. When we see a man of the caliber and of the moral status of Tom Boyle, holding office for a score of years and more, and, by virtue of his industry, his attention to details, his integrity, his efficiency and his unsparing service earn for himself the respect and approbation of his fellow citizens, then, Mr. Mayor, our faith in popular government which, at times, is sorely tried, is buoyed up, strengthened and confirmed. Mr. Boyle deserves the tribute of San Francisco, He has left a void in this City Hall and in this City, a void that will be as noticeable as if one of our skyscrapers was suddenly to disappear from the skyline of our beautiful city. And in the hearts of his friends, and their name is legion, he has left a still deeper, a still more noticeable void. I had the honor of being numbered among his friends, and I am sure that I shall ever cherish the memory of Tom Boyle. And, Mr. Mayor, I am glad to have the privilege of joining with my colleagues in a motion to adjourn at the conclusion of this meeting out of respect to his memory.

SUPERVISOR POWER: Mr. Mayor, I wish to join with you and my colleagues on this Board in paying my mark of respect and tribute to a very worthy public official. I, like Supervisor Havenner and others who have served on the Finance Committee, have had the contact with Tom Boyle and learned to know him perhaps better than most of the members of the Board. I heartily concur in everything that has been said of him, and I wish to offer a motion, if it is in order at this time, that a copy of these proceedings be properly arranged and presented to the surviving members of his family.

SUPERVISOR McSHEEHY: I second that motion.

SUPERVISOR HAYDEN: Mr. Mayor.

THE MAYOR: Mr. Hayden.

SUPERVISOR HAYDEN: As the senior member of this Board from the standpoint of service, as a public official, I have been associated longer and been in contact longer with the work that was performed by the late Auditor, Thomas F. Boyle. Everything that has been said in compliment to his memory, and in recounting the many fine qualities of Mr. Boyle as a citizen and as a public official, are all well justified, Mr. Mayor. There is not an iota of exaggeration therein. Like my colleagues, I was shocked at the news of his passing. I had a very intimate friendship with him, I appreciated his advice at all times on matters concerning the affairs of this Board

of Supervisors, and I found, at all times, Mr. Mayor, that he was more than zealous, he was over-zealous and honest in carrying out the responsibility of his office. San Francisco indeed has lost a wonderful public official and one whom it will be very difficult for you to replace.

THE MAYOR: I take this as an occasion where our County Clerk, who has been in the service of the City for twenty-odd years, might like to say a word for his departed companion. Mr. Harry Mulcrevy.

MR. HARRY MULCREVY: Your Honor the Mayor, and gentlemen of the Board of Supervisors and fellow citizens: On an occasion of this kind it is hard to find words to give expression to the sentiments of the heart and of the mind. But that expression has been well uttered by those who have preceded me, and I certainly concur with all that has been said in eulogy of Thomas F. Boyle. He lived a long and useful life, he died in the love and respect and confidence of his fellow citizens. He did not accumulate any great wealth, but he left a heritage greater than coffers and mines of gold, a heritage of an honorable name and a splendid career as a representative of the people. He, in his public life, reflected the character of the people of San Francisco. And all that I can say in conclusion, is to hope that he is resting in peace and is now enjoying the fruits of a life well spent.

SUPERVISOR ROSSI: Mr. Mayor.

THE MAYOR: Mr. Rossi.

SUPERVISOR ROSSI: I, too, want to join with the others in expressing my sincere regret at the passing of Thomas F. Boyle. It seems like yesterday that he was here at the Board meeting, discussing matters concerning the business of the City government. It was my privilege to have known Mr. Boyle for the last thirty or thirty-five years before he entered into public life, and I recall when he was employed or identified with the Bulletin on Bush and Kearny streets, when I was employed right around the corner and had occasion to meet him quite often. As he was in private life, he was in public life. He was always sincere, conscientious, public-spirited and always carried out the responsibilities which were thrust upon him to the very best of his ability. And I want to say that San Francisco has never had a public official who has rendered more conscientious service, who has rendered a greater service, than did the late Thomas F. Boyle, and San Francisco indeed has suffered a severe loss in his passing.

THE MAYOR: Some one has said this afternoon that the vacant seat is unoccupied where the former Auditor of this City has for nearly twenty-one years presided. It becomes the duty of the Mayor to fill that vacancy. It is a great responsibility at all times upon an appointing power to make an appointment. So important is this office that, upon the suggestion of the City Attorney, it was necessary for me this morning, just temporarily, to fill that office by accepting the resignation of my secretary, Edward Rainey, for a day or two, and appointing him, so that the warrants could be signed and the people could get their money. And we had to go through all that formality with haste this morning. Mr. Rainey is not to be the Auditor, but he is filling in there temporarily. It is a great responsible office of this City. That office, with the Treasurer's office, controls the finances of this City. And the duties of the Auditor, under the Charter, are very explicit and are very carefully guarded, as guarded as they could possibly be, by the framers of the Charter, with whatever amendments added thereto. Trouble occurred in the Auditor's office many years ago. The responsibility rests upon the Mayor to see that that office is properly filled. My purpose in talking to you is to let you know that my mind is inclined to a promotion in that office, or finding somebody in this City Hall who can fill that office properly. The world should know that we have brought up men in the employ of the City and County of San Francisco who are equal to any outside certified public

accountant because that is what we have to have, a trained man to handle the business and accounts of this City. And my inclination is to make the selection from the best qualified in that office, or in this building, that can properly handle that office in a manner nearly equal as possible to the way in which Thomas F. Boyle handled it. I am not going on the outside, I am going to try and stay on the inside to make an appointment worthy of that office which has just become If the Board can help with their advice, and make some suggestions as to who they think is the best man to occupy that office I certainly would appreciate it. With Duncan Matheson we went on the outside to get a watchdog of the treasury. We do not need to do that in this case. We want a man who can take care of the accounts and the audits. If the Board will give me its suggestions, or give me an idea whom they think ought to take that place, I will be very appreciative of that advice and that help, because you have to work so much with the office, the various committees have to work with the Auditor, that that is where my inclination lies, for the best good of the City and for the helpfulness of the Board of Supervisors.

I could not, if I talked longer, add more than what has been said to the memory of Thomas F. Boyle. We cannot bring him back. He goes on with the journey, as we all do, but he has left a name here in this City Hall, and in the life of this mighty City, unstained, without a spot, and the great big character of an honest man. And with you I mourn his loss, and tomorrow morning we will all attend his funeral and the city offices will be closed, and if we can get the Board of Education to close the schools for the time of the funeral, we will pay the highest respect we can. And I hope there is a committee of the Board working with the family. Young Mr. Boyle was in to see Mr. Rainey. I think he is making the arrangements. And whatevery this Board can do, and whatever the Mayor can do, we will do. I have been asked to be a pallbearer. Why, this City should unite in its tribute to a man who has served twenty years, with honesty, an honest man. An honest man gone in the death of Tom Boyle. And the City respects his memory.

SUPERVISOR ROSSI: Mr. Mayor.

THE MAYOR: Mr. Rossi.

SUPERVISOR ROSSI: With the permission of the Board, I desire to announce at this time that at the request of the family each and every member of the Board has been appointed an honorary pall-bearer, to be at the St. Vincent de Paul Church, at Steiner and Green streets, tomorrow morning at ten o'clock.

SUPERVISOR GALLAGHER: I think this occasion is extraordinary enough to ask you to see if it cannot be arranged that we be with the Auditor as long as we can. And I personally would like to express the further wish, if permitted, as a member of this Board, in official cloak, to leave the house and probably march to the church. I think if the family would consent, I would very much appreciate that arrangement.

SUPERVISOR ROSSI: Mr. Mayor, the request this morning, in meeting with members of the family, was that all of the honorary pallbearers would meet at the church. I am sure there will be no objection to any one going to the house. It is only a block and a half or two blocks away.

THE MAYOR: The pallbearers are requested-

SUPERVISOR ROSSI (interrupting): To meet at St Vincent de Paul Church tomorrow morning at ten o'clock.

SUPERVISOR GALLAGHER: I am asking Mr. Rossi—and I think the family will consent from what I have been told—if he will try, in the next little while, to tell the family that it is our request that we be permitted, if it is not inconvenient to them, and that the Board expresses the wish that we would prefer to march from the house to the

church as a guard of honor to the Auditor. I think the family will

consent to it.

SUPERVISOR ROSSI: I think that would somewhat interfere with the arrangements that have already been made, because I know there are other pallbearers and they have been requested to meet at the church. If some meet at the house and some at the church, I think that would interfere with the arrangements.

SUPERVISOR POWER: Mr. Mayor, I am going to move that the

Clerk be authorized to send a suitable floral piece.

SUPERVISOR McSHEEHY: Second that motion. SUPERVISOR GALLAGHER: Second that motion.

THE MAYOR: All in favor will please say aye.: (Ayes.) The ayes have it and it is so ordered. Is there any one else who wishes to pay a tribute to the life of the late Thomas F. Boyle? Mr. City Attor-

ney, I think we would like to have you in the record here.

CITY ATTORNEY O'TOOLE: Unfortunately, I was detained in my office, Mr. Mayor and gentlemen of the Board, when the matter of the remarks relative to our Auditor were made by your Honor and Ly the members of the Board and others present. As an elected official of San Francisco I can only say that I, with all of the citizens of San Francisco, mourn the passing of an official of our City who was a credit to the City. Mr. Boyle was an efficient, able and conscientious officer of San Francisco. He carried on the affairs of his office in a broad way. We all know that if we hewed right to the letter of the Charter that there were many things that might have embarrassed us in our dealings with the people outside of the municipality. Our Charter has grown old and has not kept pace with the changes in the business world. Mr. Boyle had that broad insight of affairs that, when he was dealing with people on the outside world and other financial institutions, he looked upon the spirit rather than the letter of the law, and while he lived up to the law, he construed that law in a broad manner, to the end that we were not hindered in our dealings with those having affairs with San Francisco. And during it all he was scrupulously honest, accounted for every penny that passed through his books, and leaves a record behind him that will be a proud heritage to his family through all the years to come and an example to those who may occupy that office in the future, Mr. Mayor, no matter from where you may select his successor. As I say, with this Board, I mourn the passing of so efficient an official of San Francisco, not only an official but a citizen of a lifetime in San Francisco. The City is better because he was one of its citizens, and our municipal affairs are better because he was one of our officers.

THE MAYOR: Is there anyone else who would like to pay a tribute

to appear in this record? What is the pleasure of the Board?

SUPERVISOR HAYDEN: Move the adoption of the resolution by a rising vote, Mr. Mayor.

THE MAYOR: All in favor of each resolution will please rise. (The Mayor and all of the members of the Board of Supervisors

THE MAYOR: The records will record "Unanimously adopted." So erdered.

Resolution of Condolence Upon the Death of John F. Davis.

SUPERVISOR HAYDEN: I have another resolution of memoriam. THE CLERK: Supervisors Hayden and Rossi present the following (reading):

"Whereas, a distinguished career has ended with the death of John

F. Davis, an attorney of San Francisco; and

"Whereas, the said John F. Davis served the people of California as Judge of the Superior Court, as State Senator from Alpine, Calaveras, Mono and Amador counties, as a member of the Board of Fire Commissioners and of the Civil Service Commission of the City and County of San Francisco; and

"Whereas, Judge John F. Davis was a man of remarkable learning, an author of note, an enthusiastic connoisseur of Californiana, an authority on Pacific Coast history, was president of the California Historical Survey Commission and chairman of the Hall of Fame Committee, and was in steady demand wherever the romantic story of the West was enacted; and

"Whereas, the late John F. Davis was an esteemed citizen, an excellent father of a family, and a man whose virtues and qualities both in public and private life were such as to hold the respect and admiration of his fellowman in various walks of life; be it therefore

"Resolved, That the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco does hereby publicly revere the memory of Judge John F. Davis, and openly expresses great sorrow at his loss and offers to the widow and children and relatives sincere sympathy and condolence in this their bereavement; and be it

"Further Resolved, That a copy of this resolution be spread on the minutes of this meeting of the Board of Supervisors; that another copy be sent to the widow of the late Judge as a token of the love and esteem in which John F. Davis was held, and that a third copy be sent

to the Grand Parlor of the Native Sons of the Golden West."

SUPERVISOR HAYDEN: Mr. Mayor, in moving the adoption of this resolution, 1 want to say a few words in memoriam of the late Judge John F. Davis. I am reminded of the words of Shakespeare, that the evil that men do lives after them, the good is oft interred with their bones. I feel, today, Mr. Mayor, that we might paraphrase that quotation and speak of the good that we know lives after the death of the late John F. Davis. Mr. Mayor, I have had the honor of being associated in many ways with the late Judge John F. Davis, fraternally, politically and as a fellow official. He was a State Senator from Calaveras and Modoc Counties. He represented Amador County on the Superior bench. He moved to San Francisco, and, Mr. Mayor, you honored him by appointing him as a member of your Fire Commission, also of the Civil Service Commission. How well he filled those positions you, as Mayor of the City, and we, as members of the Board of Supervisors, know, because of his ability. We know of his reputation as a learned jurist, we know of his attainments in the practice of law, and especially in the direction of mining law. He was an authority in that branch of the law. We knew of him as a good citizen, Mr. Mayor. We knew of him as a good husband, and as a good father, leaving a wonderful family. Judge Davis, Mr. Mayor and members of the Board, was a son of California. He enjoyed the unique distinction of being born on the historic Angel Island, an island that is now in the possession of the United States Government, but, at the time he was born there, had not come under that jurisdiction. He was particularly a lover of the traditions and the history of California. He was honored by the Native Sons of the Golden West by being elevated to the highest position in their gift, the office of Grand President. He was the author of the resolution in that fraternity that made possible the establishment of a fellowship in California history at the University of California, in fact, there are two such fellowships being supported entirely by contributions from the Grand Parlor of the Native Sons of the Golden West. And that work has been carried on now for some fourteen or fifteen years. Those fellowships in California history, Mr. Mayor and members of the Board, have gone far in research, in running down the very early history of the State of California, going back to the archives in Spain and back to the city in Spain where the great Junipero Serra was born, running down his history and all the history that meant so much in the rich tradition and the romance of this, our native State. That was his life work, Mr. Mayor and members of the Board, that was the work that he loved and which he was constantly employed in doing. I believe that there was no man in the State of California that was so eloquent or so learned in the

history of California as the late Judge John F. Davis. We of the Order of the Native Sons of the Golden West felt that he was an inspiration and an education to all of us, and to the people of California, on each and every occasion where he had an opportunity to sing the praises or tell the beautiful story of California's origination. Mr. Mayor, it is really a pathetic happening in his life, in the final moments of the late Judge's life, knowing that his life was fast fading away. Supervisor Rossi, Doctor Leland and myself and our wives made a call at the home last night, and the dear wife, in the moment of sorrow and bereavement, told us that the Judge, with great effort, with his mind wavering, uncertain, ran down the necessary papers and information that was essential to make his last final report on the committee on California's historical fellowships that he must file annually with the meeting of the Grand Parlor. That was the last act of his life, Mr. Mayor, showing his love for the history of Cali-This report that he must make officially every year had been completed almost at the last moment, but a few hours-as he was conscious almost to the last-before he passed away. So that story was completed and forwarded to the proper authorities, to be made a part of the records of the Native Sons of the Golden West and the records of the State of California. He leaves a wonderful family, a family that can be proud of a distinguished father and an intellelectual mother. I indeed feel that the City has lost a great citizen, the State of California has lost a most distinguished citizen, and I have lost a great friend, and the Order of the Native Sons of the Golden West has lost a most wonderful representative, and that it will be hard to fill his place. And we here, in our official capacity, today are here to do reverence to his memory as a former official of this City government. And with a great deal of sorrow, Mr. Mayor, I rise to ask that this resolution be adopted by a rising vote, and not until, of course, other representatives of this Board wish to be heard.

Mr. Mulcrevy, the County Clerk, I asked to come here, knowing how well he knew the Judge, and what a wonderful appreciation he has of his ability. I would ask now, Mr. Mayor, that he be given the

privilege of the floor.

THE MAYOR: Mr. Mulcrevy.

MR. MULCREVY: Mr. Mayor and gentlemen of the Board and my fellow citizens: The good deeds of men have been the nourishment on which the world has progressed in wholesomeness and excellence. And in proportion as good men and good deeds continue will the world progress in wholesomeness and excellence. John F. Davis, for whom this hour has been set aside in memoriam, was the personification of good deeds, always doing good, always doing good for all. John F. Davis was an educated and cultured gentleman, learned in the law, as a dignified and just judge on the bench and as a lawyer was an eloquent advocate of justice at the bar. Judge Davis was profoundly religious. He understood and realized and appreciated, and by his daily life, in public and private, he was the exemplar of those eternal principles, the fatherhood of God and the brotherhood of man and that "I am my brother's keeper." It is well that we set aside our time on an occasion such as this that we might demonstrate to our departed friend and fellow citizen that the same spirit of charity and benevolence pervades our assembly as when he lived on earth and sojourned amongst us. It is well for us to consider that when we attain that degree of brotherly love and when the hour comes for us to depart hence, that we shall be as little children, smilingly stepping from a beautiful garden to a luxuriant meadow, to be there awaited by our faithful and our loving friend, John F. Davis.

SUPERVISOR COLMAN: Mr. Mayor.

THE MAYOR: Mr. Colman.

SUPERVISOR COLMAN: I would like to pay my tribute to the memory of this splendid Californian and personal friend. I cannot

add in sweetness or beauty to the remarks already made. I have had official contact with Judge Davis when he was a member of your Civil Service Commission. During the many hearings held within the past few years on the problem of classification Judge Davis sat in with the Civil Service Committee of this Board. We found him broad in his views, constructive and helpful, and he handled the problems that were presented to him with a spirit of fairness that was most appealing to us. I certainly extend my sincere sympathy to the surviving members of his family.

SUPERVISOR ROSSI: Mr. Mayor, in seconding the motion that was made by Supervisor Hayden for the adoption of this resolution, I will state that my contact with the late Judge Davis was through my membership in the Order of the Native Sons of the Golden West, which dates back for many years. I had occasion, or was elected as a delegate to the Grand Parlor of the Native Sons over a period of twentyfive years, and each and every time I attended the meeting of the Grand Parlor I always looked up with pride to Judge Davis because he always stood for the cardinal principles of the Order of the Native Sons of the Golden West. He was a real leader, he was sincere, and I know that he was loved by every one who ever had the privilege of hearing him on the floor of the Grand Parlor of the Native Sons of the Golden West. As was said here today, he knew California history as much as any other member of the Native Sons of the Golden West. He held public office in Amador County. He held office as a State official, as a State Senator. He held office in San Francisco as one of your appointees, Mr. Mayor. In his passing the State has lost one of its foremost citizens and San Francisco has lost a true and loyal San Franciscan. He possessed a brilliant mind. He was a noted orator. And, indeed, in his passing he leaves many to mourn him, not alone as his friends, but citizens as well as those in public life.

THE MAYOR: I sat this morning in St. Agnes Church at the funeral services for Judge John F. Davis. I thought of the early life of this State, and the lives of men like John F. Davis, John McDougald, James D. Phelan, Lewis Byington, Judge Rust, and a great many others whose names flashed across my mind as the funeral services were being read over the remains of John F. Davis. I was deeply moved when I knew that a group of his old friends from Calaveras had made the long trip from the home village in which he lived in his early days when he presided on the bench in that county seat. They came down to attend that funeral service this morning, which was the greatest tribute paid him there today, from the old friends who supported him, when he and Mr. Davis raised that lovely family up in what they called the "cow counties" or "mountain counties" of this State of California. John F. Davis was a gentleman in every sense of the word. He loved his State, he sung her praises. There are many notable speeches of his on record in the public library of this City, illustrations of speeches that were speeches, studied and put together with a master mind, that can be read by the children of this City in the years to come until his name and memory are lost in the oblivion that must come. I appointed him to two offices: Fire Commissioner, and transferred him to the legal department of the Civil Service Commission. He served this City ably and well. I always bore in mind, when we had that man on the bench of the Civil Service Commission, that it was above reproach, as it is now. But side by side with him in his younger days was Judge Lindley at the county seat of Calaveras, Dick Rust at Jackson, in Amador County, and John F. Davis himself in Mariposa County, 1 think, or I may have the counties confused. But those three county seats occupied by three Superior Judges, all of whom held high and lofty positions in the service of the City and County of San Francisco. They were all lawyers of the old school. They were the gentlemen who came into court every morning, dressed as judges and looking as judges. They conducted themselves as judges, and when you approached them you knew you were looking into the faces of honest judges. Judge Davis' name is linked with the names of men like Hall McAllister, whose monument stands on McAllister street, and other great lawyers of this City and of this State and of this country in the early days when they needed lawyers and honest men to mold the Constitution and the laws and the statutes upon which this government is builded. John F. Davis' name stands right straight out in the front, as it ought to be, for the honor that he made of the bench and the good name that he has left behind him. No truer words were ever said than when Supervisor Hayden said that he has left to his family a heritage worth more than money, and he has left them a good, honest, sterling name. And when we adjourn today we adjourn in that spirit, rising in respect to the resolution now before the Board. And if there is nothing else to be said, the question is in order and duly seconded, and all in favor will please rise.

Amending Ordinance Providing for Issuance of Certificates of Public Convenience and Necessity.

Bill No. 9250, Ordinance No. ——— (New Series) as follows:

Amending Sections 1, 3, 6 and 7 of Ordinance No. 8637 (New Series), entitled "Providing for the issuance of certificates of public convenience and necessity in connection with the issuance of licenses for the operation of taxicabs, as defined in Ordinance No. 6979 (New Series), and providing for the issuance of certificates of public convenience and necessity in connection with the operation sightseeing buses as said buses are defined in Ordinance No. 5118 (New Series), and providing a penalty for any violation thereof."

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Fran-

cisco as follows:

Sections 1, 3, 6 and 7 of Ordinance No. 8637 (New Series), the title of which is recited above, are hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 1. That no license shall be issued for the operation of any taxicab, as the same is defined in Ordinance No. 6979 (New Series), unless and until the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco shall, by resolution, declare that public convenience and necessity require the proposed taxicab service for which application for a license is made.

Provided, that such declaration of public convenience and necessity

shall not be necessary.

- (a) For the licensing of the same number of taxicabs licensed for operation by the applicant under the same name and colors on the day upon which this ordinance shall take effect, or the renewal of the same number of licenses annually thereafter; provided, however, that this exception shall apply only in the event that the applicant was engaged in the actual operation of a taxicab or sightsecing bus business at the time Ordinance No. 5637 (New Series) became effective, and was, at said time, complying with all of the provisions of Ordinance No. 5132 (New Series), and amendments thereto, Ordinance No. 5118 (New Series), and Ordinance No. 6979 (New Series).
- (b) For the renewal of licenses to the applicant for the number of taxicabs of the applicant for which the said Board of Supervisors shall

have at any time prior to the date of application for such renewal

made a declaration of public convenience and necessity.

Every person, firm or corporation holding a license authorizing the operation of a taxicab under and pursuant to the provisions of Ordinance No. 6979 (New Series) of this City and County shall on or before the 5th day of February, 1930, file with the Clerk of this Board of Supervisors an affidavit setting forth the number of taxicabs which it is then licensed to operate, and shall describe the colors on the same. Section 3. Any applicant for a license to operate a taxicab in accordance with the terms of Ordinance No. 6979 (New Series) shall make proper application to this Board of Supervisors for its declaration of the public convenience and necessity, on blanks to be furnished by the Clerk of said Board of Supervisors, and immediately upon the filing of such an application said Clerk shall cause a notice to be published in the official newspaper of the City and County of San Francisco, which said notice shall set forth the fact that said application has been filed for a license to operate a taxicab or taxicab bustness, the name of the applicant; kind of equipment; and number of vehicles to be operated. Said notice is to be published for three successive days. On filing the application the applicant shall pay to the Clerk the sum of \$15 for one vehicle and \$1 for each additional vehicle for which a certificate of public convenience and necessity is desired to cover the cost and expenses of advertising the notice of application and the resolution granting the permit.

All holders of existing licenses for the operation of taxicabs shall thereupon be entitled to file any complaints in protest that said holders may see fit at the time of the holding of the investigation and hearing. The Board of Supervisors shall consider all of the complaints and protests and in conducting its hearing shall have the right to call such witnesses as it may see fit. In all of such hearings the burden of proof shall be upon the applicant to establish by clear, cogent and convincing evidence, which shall satisfy the said Board of Supervisors beyond a reasonable doubt that public convenience and necessity require such operation of the vehicle or vehicles for which the said application has been made, and that such application in all

other respects should be granted.

Section 6. All persons, firms or corporations within the purview of this ordinance shall regularly and daily operate his or its licensed taxicab business during each day of the licensed year to the extent reasonably necessary to meet the public demand for such taxicab Upon abandonment of such taxicab business, for a period of ten (10) consecutive days by an owner or operator, the Board of Supervisors shall upon hearing, after five (5) days' notice to the said applicant, thereupon direct the Police Commission of the City and County of San Francisco to revoke its said license which it may have granted to said applicant in accordance with the terms and provisions of the aforesaid Ordinance No. 6979 (New Series), and said license shall be revoked. Such permits as are herein granted shall be transferrable upon written application to said Board of Supervisors and the payment of the fee required of new applicants and consent having been so obtained from said Board of Supervisors, and any and all such certificates of public necessity and convenience and all rights herein granted may be rescinded and ordered revoked for cause, and said Police Commission shall upon notification of said action by said Board of Supervisors revoke any and all such permits.

Section 7. No person, firm or corporation, after six (6) months from date of passage of this ordinance, shall operate any motor vehicle, as herein defined, unless and until such person, firm or cor-

poration shall

(a) File with the Board of Supervisors a sworn statment showing the ability of said person, firm or corporation to pay all damages which may result from any and all accidents due to the negligent use or operation of such vehicle, and in the event such showing is

unsatisfactory said Board may compel said person, firm or corporation to

(b) File with the said Board security, indemnity or bond guaranteeing the payment by said person, firm or corporation of all such damages, or

(c) Insure to a reasonable amount said person's, firm's or corpora-

tion's liability to pay such damage.

Said person, firm or corporation shall, not later than the first week in July of each year and as often as said Board of Supervisors shall direct, file in writing upon a form prescribed by said Board of Supervisors, financial statement or statements of such insurance or indemnity or bonds or security held or secured by said person, firm or corporation and pay to said Clerk the sum of \$5 to cover the costs and expenses of examining said statements.

Failure to make satisfactory proof of ability to so respond in damages shall be deemed cause for cancellation of any and all permits so to

operate.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Regulating and Licensing of Advertising Balloons.

On recommendation of Police Committee,

Bill No. 9251, Ordinance No. ——— (New Series), as follows:

Regulating the flying, floating, suspending, raising and lowering of kites or balloons for advertising purposes, providing a permit and license for, and inspection of, the same, and a penalty for violation thereof.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco as follows:

Section 1. On and after June 1, 1930, it shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to release inside the limits of the City and County of San Francisco, or to release in such a manner that the same will float over the City and County of San Francisco, or any portion thereof, any balloon or kite carrying any advertising matter thereon, or used for the purpose of advertising any person, firm, corporation or product, or to suspend in the air over the City and County of San Francisco, or any portion thereof, either by ropes, strings, wires or cables, any balloon or kite carrying any advertising matter thereon, or used for the purpose of advertising any person, firm, corporation or product, without first having obtained a permit therefor from the Board of Supervisors, which said permit shall specify the name of the permittee and the location of the place of business of said permittee.

Section 2. No permittee authorized to do the things set out in Section 1 hereof, shall release or fly any balloon or kite for the aforesaid purposes, within this City and County, without first notifying in writing the Board of Public Works of the location from which said

balloon or kite is to be flown, released, attached or suspended.

Section 3. It shall be the duty of the Board of Public Works, upon receipt of the aforesaid written notice from the permittee, to inspect the said kite or balloon and ropes, strings, wires or cables, and the mechanism used in suspending, tying, raising or lowering the kite or balloon for the purpose of ascertaining whether they are of sufficient strength and texture and mechanically proper to permit their operation in safety; but in no instance shall the Board of Public Works allow any kite or balloon for the aforesaid purposes to be used to which is attached any wire, wire cable or metallic substance, or which is painted with a metallic paint.

Section 4. Any person, firm or corporation permitted by the Board of Supervisors to release, fly, float, suspend, raise or lower any kite or balloon as set out in Section 1 of this ordinance, shall pay to the Tax Collector of this City and County a license of ten (\$10) dollars per quarter per balloon for the privilege of using said permit.

Section 5. Any person, firm or corporation violating any provisions of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be punishable by a fine or not more than five hundred (\$500) dollars, or by imprisonment in the County Jail for not more than six (6) months, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

(a) Every person, firm or corporation engaged in the occupation of and doing business as a contractor, sub-contractor, or as a builder, or engaged in the construction or repair of any building, street, sidewalk, sewer, engineering structure, or any engineering operation, or advertising himself as engaged in or superintending building construction, sewer construction, plumbing construction, street construction, or general construction where the cost or value of the job or the bid tendered exceeds one thousand dollars, shall pay a license fee of twelve and fifty one-hundredths (\$12.50) dollars per quarter.

(b) Every person, firm or corporation so engaged or advertising himself as so engaged in any business or job described as above, where the value or cost of the job or bid tendered is less than one thousand dollars, shall pay a license fee of five (\$5) dollars per quarter.

(c) Every person, firm or corporation engaged in the business of sign or general painting (except automobile painters) shall pay a license fee of twelve and fifty one-hundredths (\$12.50) dollars per

quarter.

(d) Master electricians and master fixture electricians, as described under the provisions of Section 49 of this ordinance, shall pay the license fee provided for in Section 49, and shall thereby be exempt from the license fees imposed in Section 32 of this ordinance.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Amendments to Ordinance No. 7691 (New Series), "Traffic Ordinance."

Bill No. 9259, Ordinance No. ——— (New Series), as follows:

Amending Sections 2 of Article II, 21, 24 and 26 of Article IV, 36 and 37 of Article V and 45 of Article VI of Ordinance No. 7691 (New Series), entitled "An ordinance regulating traffic upon the public streets and repealing all ordinances inconsistent herewith," and adding thereto a new section to be known as 37½ of Article V.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Fran-

cisco as follows:

Section 1. Sections 2 of Article II, 21, 24 and 26 of Article IV, 36 and 37 of Article V and 45 of Article VI of Ordinance No. 7691 (New Series), the title of which is recited above, are hereby amended, and there is added thereto a section to be known as 37½ of Article V, to read as follows:

ARTICLE II.

Authority of Police Traffic Signs and Signals.

Section 2. Obedience to Police. Officers of the Police Department are hereby authorized to direct, control, divert and regulate all traffic by means of visible or audible signals, and it shall be unlawful for any person to refuse or fail to comply with any lawful order, signal or direction of a traffic or police officer. It shall be unlawful for any person to direct or attempt to direct traffic unless authorized to do so by order of the Chief of Police.

It shall be unlawful for any person in charge of any vehicle standing along or near the curb in any street within the Central Traffic District or Business District to fail, refuse or neglect to remove such vehicle from said curb when requested to do so by any traffic or police

officer.

Any police officer may remove, or cause to be removed, any standing vehicle or vehicles, whether occupied or not, from any street or alley to the nearest street or alley, to accommodate the necessity for such removal, in the following cases:

(1) When a public emergency requires such removal;

(2) When a vehicle is unlawfully parked so as to obstruct the free and lawful passage of vehicular or pedestrian traffic.

ARTICLE IV.

Rules for Driving.

Section 21. Vehicles shall not be driven or parked on sidewalks or in safety zones. The operator of a vehicle shall not drive within any sidewalk area except at a permanent or temporary driveway, nor upon any portion of the roadway which is designated and marked as a safety zone; nor shall any operator park any vehicle within or upon any sidewalk area.

The Police Department is hereby authorized to establish and maintain by signs, paint marks or other material, safety zones at such street car stops and at such other places as in its discretion require such

safety zones.

Arterial Streets.

Section 24. The following streets and parts of streets are hereby declared to constitute arterial streets for the purpose of this section:

Alemany boulevard from the west line of Bay Shore boulevard to

the midline of San Jose avenue;

Army street from the west line of Third street to the east line of Potrero avenue, and from the west line of Potrero avenue to the east line of Mission street;

Bay Shore boulevard from the west line of San Bruno avenue to the

County line of San Francisco;

Bay street from the center line of Columbus avenue to the east line of Van Ness avenue, and from the west line of Van Ness avenue to the

west line of Fillmore street;

Bernal avenue southerly from the midline of Randall street to San Jose avenue, thence on San Jose avenue to the north line of Sagamore street, and from the south line of Alemany boulevard to the City and County line of San Francisco;

Geary street from the west line of Presidio avenue to Point Lobos avenue, thence along Point Lobos avenue from Geary street to the Great Highway;

Great Highway from Point Lobos avenue to the north line of Sloat

boulevard;

Howard street from the north line of Thirteenth street to the north line of Army street;

Junipero Serra boulevard from the west line of Portola drive to the

City and County line of San Francisco;

Lincoln way from the east line of the Great Highway to the west line of Third avenue, thence on the Kezar Stadium road in Golden Gate Park to the west line of the intersecting roadway, approximately 500 feet westerly of Stanyan street;

Lombard street from the west line of Van Ness avenue to the west

line of Lyon street;

Market street from the west line of Van Ness avenue to Portola drive, thence on Portola drive to the east line of Claremont boulevard, and on Portola boulevard from the west line of Claremont boulevard to the main roadway of Junipero Serra boulevard;

Mission street from the west line of Valencia street to the City and

County line of San Francisco;

Monterey boulevard from the west line of San Jose avenue to Santa Clara avenue, thence on Santa Clara avenue to the south line of Portola drive;

Nineteenth avenue from the north line of Lincoln way to the west line of Junipero Serra boulevard;

Ocean avenue from the east line of the main roadway of Junipero Serra boulevard to the west line of San Jose avenue, from the east line of San Jose avenue to the west line of Alemany boulevard, and from the east line of Alemany boulevard to the west line of Mission street;

Pine street from the east line of Grant avenue to the east line of Van Ness avenue;

Post street from the west line of Van Ness avenue to the west line of Presidio avenue;

Potrero avenue from the north line of Division street to the west line of San Bruno avenue:

Seventh avenue from the south line of Lincoln way to Laguna Honda boulevard, thence on Laguna Honda boulevard to Dewey boulevard, thence on Dewey boulevard to Claremont boulevard, thence on Claremont boulevard to the center line of Portola drive;

Sickles avenue from the west line of Alemany boulevard to Sagamore street, thence on Sagamore street to Alemany boulevard, and thence on Alemany boulevard to the east line of Junipero Serra boulevard:

Silver avenue from the east line of Alemany boulevard to the west line of Mission street, and from the east line of Mission street to the west line of Bay Shore boulevard;

Sloat boulevard from the east line of the Great Highway to the west line of Nineteenth avenue and from the east line of Nineteenth avenue to the west line of Portola drive;

Tenth street from the south line of Market street to the north line of Division street;

Third street from the south line of Channel street to the east line of Bay Shore boulevard;

Twenty-fourth avenue from the south line of Geary street to the south line of Fulton street, thence on the roadway through Golden Gate Park to the north line of Lincoln way at Nineteenth avenue;

Twenty-fourth street from the west line of Dolores street to the east line of Hoffman avenue;

Valencia street from the south line of Market street to the midline of Mission street:

Van Ness avenue from the south line of North Point street to the north line of Market street and from the south line of Market street to the center line of Howard street.

Every operator of a vehicle or street car, cable car excepted, traversing any street intersecting any arterial street, shall bring such vehicle or street car to a full stop at the place where such street meets the prolongation of the nearer property line of such arterial street, or at such other place as may be indicated by a sign erected in accordance with this section, subject, however, to the directions of any stop-and-go signal or police officer at such intersection.

The Police Department is hereby authorized and required to place and maintain, or cause to be placed and maintained, upon each and every street intersecting an arterial street, and at or near the property line of the arterial street, suitable signs bearing the word "Stop."

One-Way Streets.

Section 26. Between the hours of seven (7) a.m. and six (6) p.m. of any day, excepting Sundays and legal holidays, it shall be unlawful for the operator of any vehicle to drive said vehicle in any part of any of the following streets except in the direction indicated herein:

Southerly in Annie street between Market street and Mission street; Southerly in Belden street between Pine street and Bush street; Westerly in Brosnan street between Valencia street and Guerrero

street;

Easterly on Campton place between Stockton street and Grant avenue; Northerly in Capp street between Mission street and Twenty-sixth treet;

Easterly in Clay street between Mason street and The Embarcadero; Southerly in Claude Lane between Bush street and Sutter street; Westerly in Commercial street between The Embarcadero and Grant avenue:

Westerly in Halleck street between Front street and Leidesdorff street;

Easterly in Jackson street between The Embarcadero and Columbus avenue:

Easterly in Jessie street between First street and Ninth street:

Southerly in Leidesdorff street between Clay street and Pine street;

Westerly in Maiden Lane from Kearny street to Grant avenue and easterly from Stockton street to Grant avenue;

Westerly in Merchant street between Front street and Kearny street; Westerly in Minna street between First street and Ninth street;

Easterly in Mint street between Jessic street and Fifth street; Westerly in Natoma street between First street and Ninth street:

Westerly in Oregon street between First street and Ninth street; Westerly in Oregon street between The Embarcadero and Battery street;

Southerly in Quincy street between California street and Pine street; Westerly in Sacramento street between The Embarcadero and Mason street:

Southerly in Spring street between Sacramento street and California treet:

Southerly in St. Anne place between California street and Pine street:

Easterly in Stevenson street between First street and Ninth street; Southerly in Trinity place between Bush street and Sutter street; Westerly in Washington street between The Embarcadero and Montgomery street.

Suitable signs shall be erected and maintained at all intersections of said parts of streets indicating the provisions of this section.

ARTICLE V.

Stopping, Standing and Parking—Stopping Prohibited in Specified Places—Standing for Loading Only in Certain Places.

Section 36 (a.) During the times specified herein it shall be unlawful for an operator to stand a passenger vehicle for a period of time longer than is necessary for the loading or unloading of passengers, provided such loading or unloading shall not consume more than three minutes, except in passenger loading zones; nor for an operator to stand any commercial vehicle for a period of time longer than it is necessary to load, unload and deliver materials, provided that the loading, unloading and delivery of said materials shall not consume more than twenty minutes, in any of the following places:

- (1) In any public alley, other than the north side of Merchant. street between Kearny street and Montgomery street, in the Central Traffic District or in any business district during any hour of the day or night.
- (2) At any place not to exceed one hundred (100) feet from the intersection of any street with the southerly property line of Market street, from The Embarcadero to Van Ness avenue, between the hours of seven (7) a. m. and six (6) p. m. of any day; at any place not to exceed one hundred (100) feet from the prolongation of the northerly and westerly property lines, at intersections immediately adjacent to Market street, of those streets intersecting Market street from the northerly side, from The Embarcadero to Van Ness avenue, between the hours of seven (7) a. m. and six (6) p. m. of any day.
- (3) At any place between the portal of any tunnel and seventy-five (75) feet therefrom at any hour of any day.
- (4) At any place where the grade of the roadway exceeds twenty (20) per cent.
- (5) In any loading zone duly established before the entrances to the following places:

Before the entrance to a hospital, day or night;

Before the entrance to a police station, day or night;

Before the entrance to a hotel, day or night;

Before the passenger entrance to a theater during performances;

Before the entrance to a church during services.

In loading zones other than those above specified, from seven (7)

 a. m. to six (6) p. m. on any day excepting Sundays and legal holidays.
 (b) It shall be unlawful for any operator of a vehicle to stand said (b) It snall be unlawful for any operator of a vehicle to stand said vehicle in a duly established taxicab stand; provided, however, that this provision shall not apply to the operators of duly licensed taxicabs authorized to occupy said stands.

(c) During the times specified in subsection (a) of this section, passenger vehicles shall not stand longer than five (5) minutes in a passenger loading zone, and it shall be unlawful to stand any com-

mercial vehicle in such zone.

Suitable signs shall be placed and maintained by the Police Department to designate the provisions of this section. The Board of Supervisors shall designate the location of loading zones and passenger loading zones as defined by Section 1 of this ordinance, provided that a curb space of not to exceed fifty (50) per cent of the total curb length of any street between intersections may be reserved for loading zones and passenger loading zones. A curb space not to exceed one hundred (100) feet may be reserved temporarily or in an emergency by the Police Department at any place where required by public convenience.

Parking Prohibited on Certain Streets, 7 A. M. to 6 P. M.

Section 37. Between the hours of seven (7) a. m. and six (6) p. m. of any day, excepting Sundays and legal holidays, it shall be unlawful for the operator of a vehicle to stop said vehicle for a period of time longer than is necessary for the actual loading or unloading and de-

livery of passengers or materials in any of the following places:
Annie street, Anthony street, Austin street, Campton place, Cedar street, Clementina street, Cortland avenue on the north side between Mission street and Folsom street, Ecker street, Elm street, Fern street, Hemlock street, Holland court, Ivy street, Linden street, Maiden lane, Minna street, Mint street on the east, south and north sides, Monroe street. Montgomery street between Market and California streets, Myrtle street, Natoma street, Olive street, Pacific avenue on the north side between Columbus avenue and Van Ness avenue, Redwood street, Tehama street, Willow street.

Signs shall be erected and maintained not more than two hundred (200) feet apart in each block designating the provisions of this

section.

Parking Prohibited on Certain Streets, Day or Night.

Section 371/2. It shall be unlawful for the driver of any vehicle to stop the same or park for a longer period of time than is necessary for the actual loading or unloading and delivering of passengers or materials during any hour of the day or night on the following streets:

On the west side of Bernal avenue from the south line of Brook street to the east line of Diamond street, and on the east side of Bernal avenue from the south line of Brook street to a point 500 feet northerly along the curb from the point of intersection of the easterly curb line of Diamond street and the westerly curb line of Bernal avenue;

On the north side of Brosnan place between Valencia street and

Guerrero street:

On the east side of Grant avenue between Bush street and Broadway; On the west side of Grant avenue between Bush and Pine streets;

On the north side of Jessie street between First street and Ninth street;

On the north side of Stevenson street between First street and Ninth street.

ARTICLE VI.

Street Cars.

Section 45. Driving on Street Car Tracks. Passing Safety Zones .-(a) It shall be unlawful for the operator of any vehicle proceeding upon any street car tracks or so to obstruct the movement of any street car to fail to remove said vehicle from said tracks or from in front of said street car as soon as practicable after signal from the operator of said street car. (b) On Market street from The Embarcadero to Van Ness avenue it shall be unlawful to drive any vehicle to the left of any safety zone established at a regular street car stop.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Dunnigan, Clerk, attached is copy of report by City Engineer, April 23, 1930, on the proposed extension of the Taraval street line of the Municipal Railway from Forty-seventh avenue to Sloat boulevard, near the Fleishhacker Pool.

Proposed Extension of Taraval Street Line to Fleishhacker Pool.

April 23, 1930,

To the Honorable the Board of Public Works of the City and County of San Francisco.

I return herewith Petition No. 65680 from the Board of Supervisors, Public Utilities Committee, asking that they be furnished with an estimate of the cost of extending the Taraval street line of the Municipal Railway from its present terminus at Fortyseventh avenue to Sloat boulevard, near the Fleishhacker Pool, and that there also be furnished a statement as to the possible increase in receipts due to such extension.

Such an extension of line was contemplated in the bond issue presented in 1927. It was proposed to run the line from Forty-sixth avenue and Taraval street, along Forty-sixth avenue to Wawona street, on Wawona street to Forty-seventh avenue, on Forty-seventh avenue to Vicente street and on Vicente street back to Forty-sixth avenue and thence to point of beginning. This provided a loop around the block bounded by Forty-sixth avenue, Wawona street, Forty-seventh avenue and Vicente street. The length of this addition would be .88 of a mile of single track.

The estimated cost was \$65,000. To put our regular service over this additional track would require one more street car over the peak hour, or would necessitate removing a car from other service now requiring The additional operating cost would be approximately \$31,000 a

On week days this extension would produce practically no additional traffic. On Sundays and holidays we already carry, on the "L" line, or on the Beach bus line, approximately one-third of the number of people going to the swimming pool. Any additional revenue which would offset the additional expense would have to come from the No. 12 or No. 17 line of the Market Street Railway. The most liberal estimate of this additional income does not exceed \$10,000 per year, which would result in an operating deficit of \$21,000.

Regulating the Keeping of Small Animals, Etc.

On recommendation of Public Health Committee.

Bill No. \$238, Ordinance No. \$748 (New Series), as follows:

Regulating the keeping and feeding of dogs, cats, hares, rabbits, guinea pigs, chickens, turkeys, geese, ducks, doves, pigeons, parrots of any species and game birds of any species; providing penalties for the violation thereof, and repealing ordinance No. 384 (New Series) and all ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict therewith.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco as follows:

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation, keep or feed, or cause to be kept or fed, or permit to be kept or fed,

on premises over which any such person, firm or corporation may have control, the following: Live hares, rabbits, guinea pigs, chickens, turkeys, geese, ducks, doves, pigeons, parrots of any species, game birds of any species, within the first and second residential districts as at present defined by Ordinance No. 5464 (New Series), or as may hereafter be defined by the City Planning Commission of the City and County of San Francisco.

Provided, however, that when a permit has been issued for the maintenance of any of the above the same must be kept and fed in coops or enclosures complying with the following requirements, to-wit:

(a) The floor of said coop or enclosure shall be of concrete not less than two (2) inches thick and covered either with a layer of cement not less than one-half $(\frac{1}{2})$ inch thick or asphalt not less than one (1) inch thick.

(b) The said coop or enclosure shall be entirely surrounded by a brick or concrete wall at least five (5) inches in thickness and one (1)

foot high.

(c) The said coop or enclosure shall be entirely surrounded by a galvanized iron wire mesh fence, wall or sides extending at least six (6) feet above the ground, which mesh shall not be greater than one-

half $(\frac{1}{2})$ inch in size.

Provided, however, that said hares, rabbits, guinea pigs, chickens, turkeys, geese, ducks, doves, pigeons, parrots, game birds or other fowl shall be permitted, between the hours of sunrise and sunset, to run at large within the limits of the premises. Said coops or enclosures shall be kept closed during the time that said hares, rabbits, guinea pigs, chickens, turkeys, geese, ducks, doves, pigeons, parrots, game birds or other fowl are so running at large. The said premises to be safely fenced so that said animals and fowls cannot escape therefrom.

Section 2. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to keep or feed, or cause to be kept or fed, or permit to be kept or fed, the following: Hares, rabbits, guinea pigs, chickens, turkeys, geese, ducks, doves, pigeons, game birds, parrots of any species, or other fowl in movable or portable coops in premises which are not rat-proof, unless the said coops are constructed with a metal bottom and metal sides extending to a height of at least one (1) foot, surmounted by a metal cage of one-half (½) inch wire mesh.

Section 3. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to engage in the business of keeping, feeding or breeding any hares, rabbits, guinea pigs, chickens, turkeys, geese, ducks, doves, pigeons, parrots of any species, game birds of any species, dogs, cats, for commercial purposes, within the first and second residential districts as

defined by Ordinance No. 5464 (New Series).

Section 4. It is hereby declared to be unlawful to conduct, for commercial purposes, any establishment in which dogs, cats, hares, rabbits, guinea pigs, chickens, turkeys, geese, ducks, doves, pigeons, parrots of any species, game birds of any species, are kept and maintained in the commercial district, light industrial district and heavy industrial district as those districts are at present defined by Ordinance No. 5464 (New Series) or as may hereafter be defined by the City Planning Commission of the City and County of San Francisco, without first obtaining from the Board of Health a permit so to do.

Section 5. No permit shall be issued by the Board of Health to any person, firm or corporation, to keep or maintain for commercial purposes any of the above-named fowl, animals or birds, within the commercial, light industrial or heavy industrial districts as at present defined by Ordinance No. 5464 (New Series), or as may hereafter be defined by the City Planning Commission of the City and County of San Francisco, unless said person, firm or corporation has complied

in full with the following requirements:

First: The premises to be used for the keeping and maintenance of any of the fowl, animals and birds specified above, and specifically kept for commercial purposes, must be situated at least twenty-five (25) feet from the doors, windows and other openings of any dwelling, apartment house or hotel.

apartment house or hotel.

Second: It shall be unlawful to keep or maintain any of the fowl, animals and birds above mentioned in a basement, sub-basement or

cellar.

Third: The floors of all such premises must be constructed of water-

proof material properly drained to the sewer.

Fourth: Said premises shall be rat-proof, all openings properly flyscreened, and adequate provision must be made for the elimination of all odors.

Fifth: The walls and ceilings of all such premises must be of hard-finished plaster, painted with two coats of lead and oil paint, light

in color.

Sixth: In all premises where slaughtering of fowl, birds or animals is carried on in connection with the keeping of said fowl, birds or animals, the killing-room must be entirely separate from that part of

the premises occupied by the live fowl, animals or birds.

The floors of said slaughtering-room must be of waterproof material, properly drained to the sewer. The walls and ceilings must be of hard-finished plaster and painted with two coats of lead and oil paint, light in color. Refrigerating equipment must be installed for the reception of the dressed fowl, birds or animals, properly connected to the sewer. Toilet and lavatory facilities for the use of the employees engaged in the handling and slaughtering of said birds, animals or fowl must be installed in conformity with the provisions of the plumbing law.

Section 6. All ordinances or parts or portions of any and all ordinances in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance and Ordinance

No. 384 (New Series) are hereby repealed.

Section 7. Any person, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine of not more than one hundred (\$100) dollars, or by imprisonment in the County Jail for not more than thirty (30) days, or by both fine and imprisonment.

Section 8. This ordinance shall take effect immediately upon its

passage.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San

Francisco as follows:

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to expose, sell, or offer for sale any meat food product or products in any grocery, delicatessen or other stores where food products are sold or offered for sale, unless the same is handled in a division separate and apart from that in which groceries, vegetables, and other general merchandise is handled, such division to be properly equipped with enclosed glass-topped counters to protect such meat or meat products or cooked or uncooked food products from handling or contamination from any other products within the same area; and

there shall be separate and proper ice boxes or refrigerators for the

preserving and keeping of such products.

Section 2. Any frozen, refrigerated, or cold storage products shall not be sold in the same establishment selling fresh products unless said cold storage, refrigerated, or frozen products are kept in a separate section having a sign in large and readable letters, easily identified by the public, giving notice of the character of the products that are purchased.

Section 3. Any packaged ments of a frozen, refrigerated, or cold storage nature must be properly stamped, "Cold Storage," in accordance with the provisions of the Cold Storage Act of the State of California, provided said package has been prepared for a period of thirty days

prior to being offered for sale.

Section 4. All vehicles used in the transportation of meat or meat food products shall be appropriately lettered in plain characters showing the name of the dealer and the location of the plant wherein such meat or meat food products are prepared or manufactured for

delivery.

Section 5. All meat and meat products arriving in the City and County from points outside the City and County of San Francisco, shall be presented for inspection by the Board of Health at the Ferry Building or such other place as may be authorized by said Board of Health, regardless of whether such meat or products have been inspected and passed by any other State, City or Federal inspection service.

Section 6.—Any person, firm or corporation violating the provisions of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be punishable by a fine of not less than twenty-five (\$25) dollars nor more than five hundred (\$500) dollars, or by imprisonment in the County Jail for not more than six (6) months, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

Section 7. All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict with

this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Section 8. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Amending Ordinance Providing for Issuance of Certificates of Public Convenience and Necessity.

On recommendation of Police and Licenses Committee.

Bill No. \$250, Ordinance No. 8750 (New Series), as follows:

Amending Sections 1, 3, 6 and 7 of Ordinance No. 8637 (New Series), entitled "Providing for the issuance of certificates of public convenience and necessity in connection with the issuance of licenses for the operation of taxicabs, as defined in Ordinance No. 6979 (New Series), and providing for the issuance of certificates of public convenience and necessity in connection with the operation sightseeing buses as said buses are defined in Ordinance No. 5118 (New Series), and providing a penalty for any violation thereof."

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Fran-

cisco as follows:

Sections 1, 3, 6 and 7 of Ordinance No. 8637 (New Series), the title of which is recited above, are hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 1. That no license shall be issued for the operation of any taxicab, as the same is defined in Ordinance No. 6979 (New Series), unless and until the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco shall, by resolution, declare that public convenience and necessity require the proposed taxicab service for which application for a license is made.

Provided, that such declaration of public convenience and necessity

shall not be necessary,

(a) For the licensing of the same number of taxicabs licensed for operation by the applicant under the same name and colors on the day upon which this ordinance shall take effect, or the renewal of the same number of licenses annually thereafter; provided, however, that this exception shall apply only in the event that the applicant was engaged in the actual operation of a taxicab or sightseeing bus business at the time Ordinance No. 8637 (New Series) became effective, and was, at said time, complying with all of the provisions of Ordinance No. 5132 (New Series), and amendments thereto, Ordinance No. 5118 (New Series), and Ordinance No. 6979 (New Series).

(b) For the renewal of licenses to the applicant for the number of taxicabs of the applicant for which the said Board of Supervisors shall have at any time prior to the date of application for such renewal

made a declaration of public convenience and necessity.

Every person, firm or corporation holding a license authorizing the operation of a taxicab under and pursuant to the provisions of Ordinance No. 6979 (New Series) of this City and County shall on or before the 5th day of February, 1930, file with the Clerk of this Board of Supervisors an affidavit setting forth the number of taxicabs which It is then licensed to operate, and shall describe the colors on the same.

Section 3. Any applicant for a license to operate a taxicab in accordance with the terms of Ordinance No. 6979 (New Series) shall make proper application to this Board of Supervisors for its declaration of the public convenience and necessity, on blanks to be furnished by the Clerk of said Board of Supervisors, and immediately upon the filing of such an application said Clerk shall cause a notice to be published in the official newspaper of the City and County of San Francisco, which said notice shall set forth the fact that said application has been filed for a license to operate a taxicab or taxicab business, the name of the applicant; kind of equipment; and number of vehicles to be operated. Said notice is to be published for three successive days. On filing the application the applicant shall pay to the Clerk the sum of \$15 for one vehicle and \$1 for each additional vehicle for which a certificate of public convenience and necessity is desired to cover the cost and expenses of advertising the notice of application and the resolution granting the permit.

All holders of existing licenses for the operation of taxicabs shall thereupon be entitled to file any complaints in protest that said holders may see fit at the time of the holding of the investigation and hearing. The Beard of Supervisors shall consider all of the complaints and protests and in conducting its hearing shall have the right to call such witnesses as it may see fit. In all of such hearings the burden of proof shall be upon the applicant to establish by clear, cogent and convincing evidence, which shall satisfy the said Board of Supervisors beyond a reasonable doubt that public convenience and necessity require such operation of the vehicle or vehicles for which the said application has been made, and that such application in all

other respects should be granted.

Section 6. All persons, firms or corporations within the purview of this ordinance shall regularly and daily operate his or its licensed taxicab business during each day of the licensed year to the extent reasonably necessary to meet the public demand for such taxicab service. Upon abandonment of such taxicab business, for a period of ten (10) consecutive days by an owner or operator, the Board of Supervisors shall upon hearing, after five (5) days' notice to the said applicant, thereupon direct the Police Commission of the City and County of San Francisco to revoke its said license which it may have granted to said applicant in accordance with the terms and provisions of the aforesaid Ordinance No. 6979 (New Series), and said license shall be revoked. Such permits as are herein granted shall be transferrable upon written application to said Board of Supervisors and

the payment of the fee required of new applicants and consent having been so obtained from said Board of Supervisors, and any and all such certificates of public necessity and convenience and all rights herein granted may be rescinded and ordered revoked for cause, and said Police Commission shall upon notification of said action by said Board of Supervisors revoke any and all such permits.

Section 7. No person, firm or corporation, after six (6) months from date of passage of this ordinance, shall operate any motor vehicle, as herein defined, unless and until such person, firm or cor-

poration shall

(a) File with the Board of Supervisors a sworn statment showing the ability of said person, firm or corporation to pay all damages which may result from any and all accidents due to the negligent use or operation of such vehicle, and in the event such showing is unsatisfactory said Board may compel said person, firm or corporation to

(b) File with the said Board security, indemnity or bond guaranteeing the payment by said person, firm or corporation of all such

damages, or

(c) Insure to a reasonable amount said person's, firm's or corpora-

tion's liability to pay such damage.

Said person, firm or corporation shall, not later than the first week in July of each year and as often as said Board of Supervisors shall direct, file in writing upon a form prescribed by said Board of Supervisors, financial statement or statements of such insurance or indemnity or bonds or security held or secured by said person, firm or corporation and pay to said Clerk the sum of \$5 to cover the costs and expenses of examining said statements.

Failure to make satisfactory proof of ability to so respond in damages shall be deemed cause for cancellation of any and all permits so to

operate.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Regulating and Licensing of Advertising Balloons.

Also, Bill No. 8251, Ordinance No. 8751 (New Series), as follows:

Regulating the flying, floating, suspending, raising and lowering of kites or balloons for advertising purposes, providing a permit and license for, and inspection of, the same, and a penalty for violation thereof.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco as follows:

Section 1. On and after June 1, 1930, it shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to release inside the limits of the City and County of San Francisco, or to release in such a manner that the same will float over the City and County of San Francisco, or any portion thereof, any balloon or kite carrying any advertising matter thereon, or used for the purpose of advertising any person, firm, corporation or product, or to suspend in the air over the City and County of San Francisco, or any portion thereof, either by ropes, strings, wires or cables, any balloon or kite carrying any advertising matter thereon, or used for the purpose of advertising any person, firm, corporation or product, without first having obtained a permit therefor from the Board of Supervisors, which said permit shall specify the name of the permittee and the location of the place of business of said permittee.

Section 2. No permittee authorized to do the things set out in Section 1 hereof, shall release or fly any balloon or kite for the aforesald purposes, within this City and County, without first notifying

in writing the Board of Public Works of the location from which said balloon or kite is to be flown, released, attached or suspended.

Section 3. It shall be the duty of the Board of Public Works, upon receipt of the aforesaid written notice from the permittee, to inspect the said kite or balloon and ropes, strings, wires or cables, and the mechanism used in suspending, tying, raising or lowering the kite or balloon for the purpose of ascertaining whether they are of sufficient strength and texture and mechanically proper to permit their operation in safety; but in no instance shall the Board of Public Works allow any kite or balloon for the aforesaid purposes to be used to which is attached any wire, wire cable or metallic substance, or which is painted with a metallic paint.

Section 4. Any person, firm or corporation permitted by the Board of Supervisors to release, fly, float, suspend, raise or lower any kite or balloon as set out in Section 1 of this ordinance, shall pay to the Tax Collector of this City and County a license of ten (\$10) dollars per

quarter per balloon for the privilege of using said permit.

Section 5. Any person, firm or corporation violating any provisions of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be punishable by a fine or not more than five hundred (\$500) dollars, or by imprisonment in the County Jail for not more than six (6) months, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

(a) Every person, firm or corporation engaged in the occupation of and doing business as a contractor, sub-contractor, or as a builder, or engaged in the construction or repair of any building, street, sidewalk, sewer, engineering structure, or any engineering operation, or advertising himself as engaged in or superintending building construction, sewer construction, plumbing construction, street construction, or general construction where the cost or value of the job or the bid tendered exceeds one thousand dollars, shall pay a license fee of twelve and fifty one-hundredths (\$12.50) dollars per quarter.

(b) Every person, firm or corporation so engaged or advertising himself as so engaged in any business or job described as above, where the value or cost of the job or bid tendered is less than one thousand dollars, shall pay a license fee of five (\$5) dollars per quarter.

(c) Every person, firm or corporation engaged in the business of

sign or general painting (except automobile painters) shall pay a license fee of twelve and fifty one-hundredths (\$12.50) dollars per

cuarter.

(d) Master electricians and master fixture electricians, as described under the provisions of Section 49 of this ordinance, shall pay the license fee provided for in Section 49, and shall thereby be exempt from the license fees imposed in Section 32 of this ordinance.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Section 1. Ordinance No. 1061, entitled "Regulating the Width of Sidewalks," approved December 18, 1903, be and is hereby amended in accordance with the communication of the Board of Public Works, filed in this office April 15, 1930, by adding thereto a new section to be numbered ten hundred and ninety-three, to read as follows:

Section 1093. The width of sidewalks on Irving street between Eighteenth avenue and Twenty-second avenue shall be twelve (12)

feet.

Section 2. Any expense caused by the above change in walk widths shall be borne by the property owners.

Regulating the Establishment and Maintenance of Hospitals.

Bill No.———, Ordinance No.———— (New Series), as follows: Defining the term "hospital," regulating the establishment and maintenance of hospitals, and repealing Ordinance No. 823, entitled "Regulating the Establishment and Maintenance of Hospitals," and all ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith, and providing penalties for the violation thereof.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Fran-

cisco as follows:

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm, corporation or association to erect, establish or maintain any hospital without per-

mission from the Board of Health,

Section 2. Any building or structure having accommodations for more than three persons, where sick, invalids, infirm, aged, convalescent, mentally ill, feeble-minded, incompetent, decrepit, disabled, lnjured or infected, chronically ill, where a charge is made for taking care of such persons, and whether or not in the care and treatment of any or all of the above-mentioned types of cases it is necessary to use drugs, medicines, surgical, electrical or physio-therapeutical procedures, shall be classed and defined as a hospital.

Provided, however, that any such building or structure having accommodations for not more than five persons of any or all of the abovementioned types of cases, may be of frame construction if the same complies with all of the regulations and laws of the Building Department of the Board of Public Works and the Bureau of Fire Prevention and Public Safety and the regulations of the Board of Health as of the

date of construction thereof.

Provided, further, that no person or persons of any or all of the above-mentioned types of cases shall be housed or cared for in any

attic, basement or cellar.

Section 3. The Board of Health shall have power to issue permits for such hospitals, and every such permit shall specify the name and residence of the person, firm, association or corporation undertaking the care of the class of persons as herein designated. Such permit shall also specify the location of the place earing for such people, the number of inmates thereby allowed to be received or kept therein, and shall be revocable for cause by the said Board of Health in any case where the provisions of this ordinance are violated, or in any case where such hospital is being managed, conducted or maintained without due regard for the health, comfort, safety and morality of the inmates thereof, or without due regard to proper sanitation or hygiene.

Section 4. Every person holding such permit must keep a register approved by the Board of Health, wherein shall be entered the names and addresses, date of entry, date of discharge, of all inmates of any hospital as herein defined, and also the name and address of some

responsible relative or friend of such inmates.

Section 5. Any permit or license granted under the provisions of

this ordinance shall not be sold, assigned or transferred without written permission of the Department of Public Health of San Francisco.

Section 6. The Board of Health, its officers and representatives, and all duly appointed or elected health officers, shall at all reasonable times have the right to enter and inspect the premises wherein such inmates are so received, treated and kept, and to call for and inspect the permit and register and to require compliance with all the terms and conditions of this ordinance and of the Board of Health.

Section 7. Any person, firm, corporation or association who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and, upon conviction thereof, shall be punished by a fine not to exceed five hundred (\$500) dollars, or by imprisonment in the County Jail for not more than six (6) months, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

Section 8. Ordinance No. 823, entitled "Regulating the Establishment and Maintenance of Hospitals," and all ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith, are hereby repealed.

Section 9. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force immediately.

Amendments to Ordinance No. 7691 (New Series), "Traffic Ordinance."

On recommendation of Traffic and Safety Committee.

Bill No. 9259, Ordinance No. — (New Series), as follows:

Amending Sections 2 of Article II, 21, 24 and 26 of Article IV, 36 and 37 of Article V and 45 of Article VI of Ordinance No. 7691 (New Series), entitled "An ordinance regulating traffic upon the public

streets and repealing all ordinances inconsistent herewith," and adding thereto a new section to be known as 37½ of Article V.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Fran-

cisco as follows:

Section 1. Sections 2 of Article II, 21, 24 and 26 of Article IV, 36 and 37 of Article V and 45 of Article VI of Ordinance No. 7691 (New Series), the title of which is recited above, are hereby amended, and there is added thereto a section to be known as 37½ of Article V, to read as follows:

ARTICLE II.

Authority of Police Traffic Signs and Signals.

Section 2. Obedience to Police. Officers of the Police Department are hereby authorized to direct, control, divert and regulate all traffic by means of visible or audible signals, and it shall be unlawful for any person to refuse or fail to comply with any lawful order, signal or direction of a traffic or police officer. It shall be unlawful for any person to direct or attempt to direct traffic unless authorized to do so by order of the Chief of Police.

It shall be unlawful for any person in charge of any vehicle standing along or near the curb in any street within the Central Traffic District or Business District to fail, refuse or neglect to remove such vehicle from said curb when requested to do so by any traffic or polica

officer.

Any police officer may remove, or cause to be removed, any standing vehicle or vehicles, whether occupied or not, from any street or alley to the nearest street or alley, to accommodate the necessity for such removal, in the following cases:

(1) When a public emergency requires such removal:

(2) When a vehicle is unlawfully parked so as to obstruct the free and lawful passage of vehicular or pedestrian traffic.

ARTICLE IV.

Rules for Driving.

Section 21. Vehicles shall not be driven or parked on sidewalks or in safety zones. The operator of a vehicle shall not drive within any sidewalk area except at a permanent or temporary driveway, nor upon any portion of the roadway which is designated and marked as a safety zone; nor shall any operator park any vehicle within or upon any sidewalk area.

The Police Department is hereby authorized to establish and maintain by signs, paint marks or other material, safety zones at such street car stops and at such other places as in its discretion require such

safety zones.

Section 24. The following streets and parts of streets are hereby declared to constitute arterial streets for the purpose of this section:

Bay street from the center line of Columbus avenue to the east line of Van Ness avenue, and from the west line of Van Ness avenue to the west line of Fillmore street;

Bernal avenue southerly from the midline of Randall street to San Jose avenue, thence on San Jose avenue to the north line of Sagamore street, and from the south line of Alemany boulevard to the City and County line of San Francisco;

Bush street from the east line of Grant avenue to the east line of

Van Ness avenue, and from the west line of Van Ness avenue to the east line of Presidio avenue:

Every operator of a vehicle or street car, cable car excepted, traversing any street intersecting any arterial street, shall bring such vehicle or street car to a full stop at the place where such street meets the prolongation of the nearer property line of such arterial street, or at such other place as may be indicated by a sign erected in accordance with this section, subject, however, to the directions of any stop-and-go signal or police officer at such intersection.

The Police Department is hereby authorized and required to place and maintain, or cause to be placed and maintained, upon each and every street intersecting an arterial street, and at or near the property line

of the arterial street, suitable signs bearing the word "Stop."

One-Way Streets.

Section 26. Between the hours of seven (7) a.m. and six (6) p. m. of any day, excepting Sundays and legal holidays, it shall be unlawful for the operator of any vehicle to drive said vehicle in any part of any of the following streets except in the direction indicated herein:

Southerly in Annie street between Market street and Mission street; Southerly in Belden street between Pine street and Bush street; Westerly in Brosnan street between Valencia street and Guerrero

street;

Easterly on Campton place between Stockton street and Grant avenue; Northerly in Capp street between Mission street and Twenty-sixth

Easterly in Clay street between Mason street and The Embarcadero; Southerly in Claude Lane between Bush street and Sutter street;

Westerly in Commercial street between The Embarcadero and Grant

avenue;

Westerly in Halleck street between Front street and Leidesdorff street; Easterly in Jackson street between The Embarcadero and Columbus avenue:

Easterly in Jessie street between First street and Ninth street;

Southerly in Leidesdorff street between Clay street and Pine street; Westerly in Maiden Lane from Kearny street to Grant avenue and easterly from Stockton street to Grant avenue;

Westerly in Merchant street between Front street and Kearny street;

Westerly in Minna street between First street and Ninth street; Easterly in Mint street between Jessic street and Fifth street; Westerly in Natoma street between First street and Ninth street;

Westerly in Oregon street between The Embarcadero and Battery

street;
Southerly in Quincy street between California street and Pine street;
Westerly in Sacramento street between The Embarcadero and Mason

street:
Southerly in Spring street between Sacramento street and California

street:
Southerly in St. Anne place between California street and Pine

street;

Easterly in Stevenson street between First street and Ninth street; Southerly in Trinity place between Bush street and Sutter street; Westerly in Washington street between The Embarcadero and Mont-

gomery street.

Suitable signs shall be erected and maintained at all intersections of said parts of streets indicating the provisions of this section.

ARTICLE V.

Stopping, Standing and Parking-Stopping Prohibited in Specified Places-Standing for Loading Only in Certain Places.

Section 36 (a.) During the times specified herein it shall be unlawful for an operator to stand a passenger vehicle for a period of time longer than is necessary for the loading or unloading of passengers, provided such loading or unloading shall not consume more than three minutes, except in passenger loading zones; nor for an operator to stand any commercial vehicle for a period of time longer than it is necessary to load, unload and deliver materials, provided that the loading, unloading and delivery of said materials shall not consume more than twenty minutes, in any of the following places:

(1) In any public alley, other than the north side of Merchant street between Kearny street and Montgomery street, in the Central Traffic District or in any business district during any hour of the day

or night.

(2) At any place not to exceed one hundred (100) feet from the intersection of any street with the southerly property line of Market street, from The Embarcadero to Van Ness avenue, between the hours of seven (7) a. m. and six (6) p. m. of any day; at any place not to exceed one hundred (100) feet from the prolongation of the northerly and westerly property lines, at intersections immediately adjacent to Market stret, of those streets intersecting Market street from the northerly side, from The Embarcadero to Van Ness avenue, between

the hours of seven (7) a. m. and six (6) p. m. of any day.
(3) At any place between the portal of any tunnel and seventy-five

(75) feet therefrom at any hour of any day.

(4) At any place where the grade of the roadway exceeds twenty (20) per cent.

(5) In any loading zone duly established before the entrances to the following places:

Before the entrance to a hospital, day or night;

Before the entrance to a police station, day or night;

Before the entrance to a hotel, day or night;

Before the passenger entrance to a theater during performances;

Before the entrance to a church during services.

In loading zones other than those above specified, from seven (7) a. m. to six (6) p. m. on any day excepting Sundays and legal holidays.

(b) It shall be unlawful for any operator of a vehicle to stand said vehicle in a duly established taxicab stand; provided, however, that this provision shall not apply to the operators of duly licensed taxi-

(c) During the times specified in subsection (a) of this section, passenger vehicles shall not stand longer than five (5) minutes in a passenger loading zone, and it shall be unlawful to stand any commencial rehials in contents.

mercial vehicle in such zone.

Suitable signs shall be placed and maintained by the Police Department to designate the provisions of this section. The Board of Supervisors shall designate the location of loading zones and passenger loading zones as defined by Section 1 of this ordinance, provided that a curb space of not to exceed fifty (50) per cent of the total curb length of any street between intersections may be reserved for loading zones and passenger loading zones. A curb space not to exceed one hundred (100) feet may be reserved temporarily or in an emergency by the Police Department at any place where required by public convenience.

Parking Prohibited on Certain Streets, 7 A. M. to 6 P. M.

Section 37. Between the hours of seven (7) a.m. and six (6) p. m. of any day, excepting Sundays and legal holidays, it shall be unlawful for the operator of a vehicle to stop said vehicle for a period of time longer than is necessary for the actual loading or unloading and delivery of passengers or materials in any of the following places:

Annie street, Anthony street, Austin street, Campton place, Cedar street, Clementina street, Cortland avenue on the north side between Mission street and Folsom street, Ecker street, Elm street, Fern street, Hemlock street, Holland court, Ivy street, Linden street, Maiden lane, Minna street, Mint street on the east, south and north sides, Monroe street, Montgomery street between Market and California streets, Myrtle street, Natoma street, Olive street, Pacific avenue on the north side between Columbus avenue and Van Ness avenue, Redwood street, Tehama street, Willow street.

Signs shall be erected and maintained not more than two hundred (200) feet apart in each block designating the provisions of this

section.

Parking Prohibited on Certain Streets, Day or Night.

Section 37½. It shall be unlawful for the driver of any vehicle to stop the same or park for a longer period of time than is necessary for the actual loading or unloading and delivering of passengers or materials during any hour of the day or night on the following streets:

On the west side of Bernal avenue from the south line of Brook street to the east line of Diamond street, and on the east side of Bernal avenue from the south line of Brook street to a point 500 feet northerly along the curb from the point of intersection of the easterly curb line of Diamond street and the westerly curb line of Bernal avenue;

On the north side of Brosnan place between Valencia street and

Guerrero street:

On the east side of Grant avenue between Bush street and Broadway; On the west side of Grant avenue between Bush and Pine streets; On the north side of Jessie street between First street and Ninth

street .

On the north side of Stevenson street between First street and Ninth street.

ARTICLE VI.

Street Cars.

Section 45. Driving on Street Car Tracks. Passing Safety Zones.—
(a) It shall be unlawful for the operator of any vehicle proceeding upon any street car tracks or so to obstruct the movement of any street car to fail to remove said vehicle from said tracks or from in front of said street car as soon as practicable after signal from the operator of said street car. (b) On Market street from The Embarcadero to Van Ness avenue it shall be unlawful to drive any vehicle to the left of any safety zone established at a regular street car stop.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.



The Board of Supervisors met in regular session.

CALLING THE ROLL.

The roll was called and the following Supervisors were noted present:

His Honor Mayor Rolph being absent Supervisor Rossi was elected to preside.

APPROVAL OF JOURNAL.

The Journal of Proceedings of the meeting of April 21, 1930, was considered read and approved.

Finance Committee Report.

The following was presented and read by the Clerk:

San Francisco, California, May 19, 1930.

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors:

The Finance Committee recommends the following appropriation in the Budget for the fiscal year 1930-31. The total amount is \$26,835,929, an increase of \$812,342.00.

The additional requirement for interest and redemption on outstanding bonds as of this date is \$300,178. This has been included in the Budget estimate and an additional \$80,000 is recommended in this item for interest on bonds which may be sold in the near future. This is estimated to be sufficient to meet all bond interest requirements. Before the tax rate is fixed in September it will be necessary to determine upon a program for sale of bonds to continue the Hetch Hetchy, Boulevard. Sewer, Hospital and War Memorial projects. The proceeds of the bonds which may be sold in the latter part of the year or the beginning of the next fiscal year will be deposited by the Treasurer and interest on these bank deposits will be credited to the appropriate bond fund, which procedure will make the interest charges for the remainder of the fiscal year a moderate amount of money which will be amply provided for without increasing the tax rate at this time.

The following are some of the important provisions in this Budget recommendation:

propriations (State Law, approved by vote of the People). 66,000 Sharp Park, commitment by Board of Supervisors....... 75,000

Provision has been made in several departments for the compensation of employees heretofore unbudgeted but paid for several years out of various funds.

Repairs and painting of Hospital Buildings and Laguna Honda Home (work which has not been done for 15 years)..... \$ 60,000 Yacht Harbor 125,000 Publicity and Advertising (additional)..... Police Station in Golden Gate Park..... 60.000 First unit Supplies Warehouse..... 80.000 Fire House, Marina District..... 40.000 Industrial Survey 10.000 Additional Lights 25,000 Telegraph Hill Improvement..... 15,000 Aquatic Park 50,000 Fine Arts Building..... 40.000 McLaren Park 75.000Mount Davidson Park (contract)..... 17,000 De Young Museum (additional)..... 30.000 California Palace of Legion of Honor (additional).....

The Playground Commission requested large additional appropriations for baseball activities. Impossible at this time to include these requests, but the Committee, after investigation, believes and recommends that baseball diamonds be provided in

> Balboa Park, Lake Merced Lands (owned by City), McLaren Park,

which will provide this much desired recreational activity.

It is proposed and recommended that the City's proportion of the cost of reconstruction of the Third-Street Bridge be provided for out of the Good Roads Fund, which will be adequate to meet this obligation and permit of immediate reconstruction of the Bridge.

It is also proposed and recommended that provision be made out of Good Roads Fund for the opening of Leavenworth street. It is necessary to buy portion of property this year so that the street may be opened and the construction of the Federal Building proceed.

In due time the Streets Committee will recommend appropriations out of Good Roads Fund for the two projects mentioned, and for maintenance and reconstruction of streets.

Continuing employments and improvements will be made out of County Road Fund and the Boulevard and Sewer Bonds will provide money for continuation of the projects which were approved by the people at the Bond Election.

There is also presented a budget for the San Francisco Water Department as recommended by the Board of Public Works.

The Library Fund is increased by \$20,000, which, with \$50,000 available Library Bonds, will provide Branch Library in the Richmond District.

The Emergency Hospital and Health Center for the Richmond District is to be constructed and paid for our of Hospital Bonds. The Emergency Hospital in the Excelsior District, appropriation made last year, will be constructed; appropriation made in Budget 1930 will remain available and any additional amount required will be derived from Hospital Bonds.

The Charter requires a public meeting on the Budget before It is adopted. Recommend that this meeting be held on Wednesday, May 21st, at 10 A. M. The passage to print must be had not later than

Friday, the 23d, in time to be set up and published in the morning paper of Saturday, the 24th.

FOR MUNICIPAL EXPENDITURES

City and County of San Francisco, California,

For Fiscal Year 1930-1931.

BILL NO. —, ORDINANCE NO. — (New Series).

An ordinance fixing and appropriating the aggregate sums of the items thereof allowed to each department, officer, board and commission for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1931, and making a budget of the same.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco as follows:

- Section 1. The aggregate sums and items thereof hereinafter set forth are hereby fixed, designated and appropriated for the respective purposes set opposite the same, to be expended during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1931, in accordance with the provisions of Article III, Chapter I, of the Charter of the City and County.
- Section 2. No department, officer, board or commission shall expend, or agree to expend, moneys, or to incur liabilities which, in total amount, exceed the total sum appropriated to such department, officer, board or commission by this ordinance, or which may subsequently be appropriated to such department, officer, board or commission.
- Section 3. The amounts appropriated to the various departments, officers, boards and commissions shall be expended and administered by them subject to the following conditions:
- a. No department, officer, board or commission shall expend moneys, or incur liabilities, in excess of the total amount appropriated to such department, officer, board or commission; provided further, that such expenditure shall conform to the provisions of Article III, Chapter I, Section 9, of the Charter.
- b. When a specific appropriation is made to any bureau, division or institution of a department, board or commission, such appropriation shall be known and administered as a main appropriation title, and the main division thereunder of an object of expenditure classification as theretofore adopted shall be known and administered as a specific sub-appropriation thereof.
- c. Departments, officers, boards or commissions desiring to make transfers from one sub-appropriation to any other sub-appropriation embraced within the same main appropriation title shall file with the Finance Committee of the Board of Supervisors a statement in duplicate setting forth the reasons for requesting such transfers, the purpose to which the money is to be devoted, the sub-appropriations from and to which such transfer is requested, the amounts of such transfers, and any other facts which may aid in determining the

merits of such request. Whenever any such transfer is approved by the Finance Committee, the duplicate request shall be forwarded to the Auditor and a notice sent to each department making the request, setting forth the amounts of each sub-appropriation, or budget item numbers affected. In case of disapproval, notice to this effect shall be given to the department making the request.

Whenever any department, officer, board or commission desires to make a transfer from any sub-appropriation or appropriation embraced in one main appropriation title or titles, to any other or the same sub-appropriation or appropriations embraced in or desired to be embraced in any other main appropriation title or titles, said department, officer, board or commission shall file with the Board of Supervisors a statement in duplicate similar to the statement required in condition "C" above and containing, in addition, the main appropriation title or titles from and to which such transfer is requested. If the Board of Supervisors approves the request, notice thereof shall be forwarded to the originating department and the duplicate copy of the request forwarded to the Auditor. Said notice shall contain the main appropriation title or titles affected, the sub-appropriation or appropriations from and to which such transfer is to be made and the amounts thereof. If the Board of Supervisors denies the request, notice thereof shall be sent to the originating department, with the reasons for such action.

Amending Sections 2 of Article II, 21, 24 and 26 of Article IV, 36 and 37 of Article V and 45 of Article VI of Ordinance No. 7691 (New

Series), entitled "An ordinance regulating traffic upon the public streets and repealing all ordinances inconsistent herewith," and adding thereto a new section to be known as 37½ of Article V.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Fran-

cisco as follows:

Section 1. Sections 2 of Article II, 21, 24 and 26 of Article IV, 36 and 37 of Article V and 45 of Article VI of Ordinance No. 7691 (New Series), the title of which is recited above, are hereby amended, and there is added thereto a section to be known as 37½ of Article V, to read as follows:

ARTICLE II.

Authority of Police Traffic Signs and Signals.

Section 2. Obedience to Police. Officers of the Police Department are hereby authorized to direct, control, divert and regulate all traffic by means of visible or audible signals, and it shall be unlawful for any person to refuse or fail to comply with any lawful order, signal or direction of a traffic or police officer. It shall be unlawful for any person to direct or attempt to direct traffic unless authorized to do so by order of the Chief of Police.

It shall be unlawful for any person in charge of any vehicle standing along or near the curb in any street within the Central Traffic District or Business District to fail, refuse or neglect to remove such vehicle from said curb when requested to do so by any traffic or police

officer.

Any police officer may remove, or cause to be removed, any standing vehicle or vehicles, whether occupied or not, from any street or alley to the nearest street or alley, to accommodate the necessity for such removal, in the following cases:

(1) When a public emergency requires such removal;

(2) When a vehicle is unlawfully parked so as to obstruct the free and lawful passage of vehicular or pedestrian traffic.

ARTICLE IV.

Rules for Driving.

Section 21. Vehicles shall not be driven or parked on sidewalks or in safety zones. The operator of a vehicle shall not drive within any sidewalk area except at a permanent or temporary driveway, nor upon any portion of the roadway which is designated and marked as a safety zone; nor shall any operator park any vehicle within or upon any sidewalk area.

The Police Department is hereby authorized to establish and maintain by signs, paint marks or other material, safety zones at such street car stops and at such other places as in its discretion require such

safety zones.

Arterial Strects.

Section 24. The following streets and parts of streets are hereby declared to constitute arterial streets for the purpose of this section:

Alemany boulevard from the west line of Bay Shore boulevard to

the midline of San Jose avenue;

Army street from the west line of Third street to the east line of Potrero avenue, and from the west line of Potrero avenue to the east line of Mission street;

Bay Shore boulevard from the west line of San Bruno avenue to the

County line of San Francisco;

Bay street from the center line of Columbus avenue to the east line of Van Ness avenue, and from the west line of Van Ness avenue to the west line of Fillmore street;

Bernal avenue southerly from the midline of Randall street to San Jose avenue, thence on San Jose avenue to the north line of Sagamore street, and from the south line of Alemany boulevard to the City and County line of San Francisco;

Bush street from the east line of Grant avenue to the east line of Van Ness avenue, and from the west line of Van Ness avenue to the east line of Presidio avenue;

California street from the east line of Grant avenue to the east line of Van Ness avenue, and from the west line of Van Ness avenue to the west line of Arguello boulevard;

Cortland avenue from the west line of Bay Shore boulevard to the

east line of Mission street;

Fell street from the west line of Polk street to the east line of Van Ness avenue, and from the west line of Van Ness avenue to the west line of Stanyan street;

Fulton street from the west line of Franklin street to the east line

of the Great Highway;

Geary street from the west line of Presidio avenue to Point Lobos avenue, thence along Point Lobos avenue from Geary street to the Great Highway;

Great Highway from Point Lobos avenue to the north line of Sloat boulevard;

Howard street from the north line of Thirteenth street to the north line of Army street;

Junipero Serra boulevard from the west line of Portola drive to the

City and County line of San Francisco;

Lincoln way from the east line of the Great Highway to the west line of Third avenue, thence on the Kezar Stadium road in Golden Gate Park to the west line of the intersecting roadway, approximately 500 feet westerly of Stanyan street;

Lombard street from the west line of Van Ness avenue to the west

line of Lyon street:

Market street from the west line of Van Ness avenue to Portola drive, thence on Portola drive to the east line of Claremont boulevard, and on Portola boulevard from the west line of Claremont boulevard to the main roadway of Junipero Serra boulevard;

Mission street from the west line of Valencia street to the City and

County line of San Francisco;

Monterey boulevard from the west line of San Jose avenue to Santa Clara avenue, thence on Santa Clara avenue to the south line of Portola drive;

Nineteenth avenue from the north line of Lincoln way to the west

line of Junipero Serra boulevard;

Ocean avenue from the east line of the main roadway of Junipero Serra boulevard to the west line of San Jose avenue, from the east line of San Jose avenue to the west line of Alemany boulevard, and from the east line of Alemany boulevard to the west line of Mission street;

Pine street from the east line of Grant avenue to the east line of

Van Ness avenue;

Post street from the west line of Van Ness avenue to the west line of Presidio avenue;

Potrero avenue from the north line of Division street to the west

line of San Bruno avenue;

Seventh avenue from the south line of Lincoln way to Laguna Honda boulevard, thence on Laguna Honda boulevard to Dewey boulevard, thence on Dewey boulevard to Claremont boulevard, thence on Claremont boulevard to the center line of Portola drive;

Sickles avenue from the west line of Alemany boulevard to Sagamore street, thence on Sagamore street to Alemany boulevard, and thence on Alemany boulevard to the east line of Junipero Serra boule-

vard;

Silver avenue from the east line of Alemany boulevard to the west line of Mission street, and from the east line of Mission street to the west line of Bay Shore boulevard;

Sloat boulevard from the east line of the Great Highway to the west

line of Nineteenth avenue and from the east line of Nineteenth avenue to the west line of Portola drive:

Tenth street from the south line of Market street to the north line of

Division street;

Third street from the south line of Channel street to the east line of

Bay Shore boulevard:

Twenty-fourth avenue from the south line of Geary street to the south line of Fulton street, thence on the roadway through Golden Gate Park to the north line of Lincoln way at Nineteenth avenue:

Twenty-fourth street from the west line of Dolores street to the east

line of Hoffman avenue:

Valencia street from the south line of Market street to the midline

of Mission street;

Van Ness avenue from the south line of North Point street to the north line of Market street and from the south line of Market street to the

center line of Howard street.

Every operator of a vehicle or street car, cable car excepted, traversing any street intersecting any arterial street, shall bring such vehicle or street car to a full stop at the place where such street meets the prolongation of the nearer property line of such arterial street, or at such other place as may be indicated by a sign erected in accordance with this section, subject, however, to the directions of any stop-and-go signal or police officer at such intersection.

The Police Department is hereby authorized and required to place and maintain, or cause to be placed and maintained, upon each and every street intersecting an arterial street, and at or near the property line

of the arterial street, suitable signs bearing the word "Stop."

One-Way Streets.

Section 26. Between the hours of seven (7) a.m. and six (6) p. m. of any day, excepting Sundays and legal holidays, it shall be unlawful for the operator of any vehicle to drive said vehicle in any part of any of the following streets except in the direction indicated herein:

Southerly in Annie street between Market street and Mission street; Southerly in Belden street between Pine street and Bush street:

Westerly in Brosnan street between Valencia street and Guerrero street:

Easterly on Campton place between Stockton street and Grant avenue; Northerly in Capp street between Mission street and Twenty-sixth street;

Easterly in Clay street between Mason street and The Embarcadero: Southerly in Claude Lane between Bush street and Sutter street;

Westerly in Commercial street between The Embarcadero and Grant avenue:

Westerly in Halleck street between Front street and Leidesdorff street; Easterly in Jackson street between The Embarcadero and Columbus avenue:

Easterly in Jessie street between First street and Ninth street:

Southerly in Leidesdorff street between Clay street and Pine street;

Westerly in Maiden Lane from Kearny street to Grant avenue and easterly from Stockton street to Grant avenue;

Westerly in Merchant street between Front street and Kearny street; Westerly in Minna street between First street and Ninth street;

Easterly in Mint street between Jessie street and Fifth street; Westerly in Natoma street between First street and Ninth street;

Westerly in Oregon street between The Embarcadero and Battery street:

Southerly in Quincy street between California street and Pine street; Westerly in Sacramento street between The Embarcadero and Mason street;

Southerly in Spring street between Sacramento street and California

Southerly in St. Anne place between California street and Pine street:

Easterly in Stevenson street between First street and Ninth street: Southerly in Trinity place between Bush street and Sutter street;

Westerly in Washington street between The Embarcadero and Mont-

gomery street.

Suitable signs shall be erected and maintained at all intersections of said parts of streets indicating the provisions of this section.

ARTICLE V.

Stopping, Standing and Parking-Stopping Prohibited in Specified Places-Standing for Loading Only in Certain Places.

During the times specified herein it shall be unlaw-Section 36 (a.) ful for an operator to stand a passenger vehicle for a period of time longer than is necessary for the loading or unloading of passengers, provided such loading or unloading shall not consume more than three minutes, except in passenger loading zones; nor for an operator to stand any commercial vehicle for a period of time longer than it is necessary to load, unload and deliver materials, provided that the loading, unloading and delivery of said materials shall not consume more than twenty minutes, in any of the following places:

(1) In any public alley, other than the north side of Merchant street between Kearny street and Montgomery street, in the Central Traffic District or in any business district during any hour of the day

or night.

(2) At any place not to exceed one hundred (100) feet from the intersection of any street with the southerly property line of Market street, from The Embarcadero to Van Ness avenue, between the hours of seven (7) a.m. and six (6) p.m. of any day; at any place not to exceed one hundred (100) feet from the prolongation of the northerly and westerly property lines, at intersections immediately adjacent to Market stret, of those streets intersecting Market street from the northerly side, from The Embarcadero to Van Ness avenue, between the hours of seven (7) a.m. and six (6) p.m. of any day.

(3) At any place between the portal of any tunnel and seventy-five (75) feet therefrom at any hour of any day.

(4) At any place where the grade of the roadway exceeds twenty (20) per cent.

(5) In any loading zone duly established before the entrances to the following places:

Before the entrance to a hospital, day or night;

Before the entrance to a police station, day or night;

Before the entrance to a hotel, day or night;

Before the passenger entrance to a theater during performances;

Before the entrance to a church during services.

In loading zones other than those above specified, from seven (7) a. m. to six (6) p. m. on any day excepting Sundays and legal holidays.

(b) It shall be unlawful for any operator of a vehicle to stand said vehicle in a duly established taxicab stand; provided, however, that this provision shall not apply to the operators of duly licensed taxicabs authorized to occupy said stands.

(c) During the times specified in subsection (a) of this section, passenger vehicles shall not stand longer than five (5) minutes in a passenger loading zone, and it shall be unlawful to stand any com-

mercial vehicle in such zone.

Suitable signs shall be placed and maintained by the Police Department to designate the provisions of this section. The Board of Supervisors shall designate the location of loading zones and passenger loading zones as defined by Section 1 of this ordinance, provided that a curb space of not to exceed fifty (50) per cent of the total curb length of any street between intersections may be reserved for loading zones and passenger loading zones. A curb space not to exceed one hundred (100) feet may be reserved temporarily or in an emergency by the Police Department at any place where required by public convenience.

Parking Prohibited on Certain Streets, 7 A. M. to 6 P. M.

Section 37. Between the hours of seven (7) a.m. and six (6) p. m. of any day, excepting Sundays and legal holidays, it shall be unlawful for the operator of a vehicle to stop said vehicle for a period of time longer than is necessary for the actual loading or unloading and delivery of passengers or materials in any of the following places:

Annie street, Anthony street, Austin street, Campton place, Cedar street, Clementina street, Cortland avenue on the north side between Mission street and Folsom street, Ecker street, Elm street, Fern street, Hemlock street, Holland court, Ivy street, Linden street, Maiden lane, Minna street, Mint street on the east, south and north sides, Monroe street, Montgomery street between Market and California streets, Myrtle street, Natoma street, Olive street, Pacific avenue on the north side between Columbus avenue and Van Ness avenue, Redwood street, Tehama street, Willow street.

Signs shall be erected and maintained not more than two hundred (200) feet apart in each block designating the provisions of this section.

Parking Prohibited on Certain Streets, Day or Night.

Section 37½. It shall be unlawful for the driver of any vehicle to stop the same or park for a longer period of time than is necessary for the actual loading or unloading and delivering of passengers or materials during any hour of the day or night on the following streets:

On the west side of Bernal avenue from the south line of Brook street to the east line of Diamond street, and on the east side of Bernal avenue from the south line of Brook street to a point 500 feet northerly along the curb from the point of intersection of the easterly curb line of Diamond street and the westerly curb line of Bernal avenue;

On the north side of Brosnan place between Valencia street and

Guerrero street;

On the east side of Grant avenue between Bush street and Broadway; On the west side of Grant avenue between Bush and Pine streets; On the north side of Jessie street between First street and Ninth

street;
On the north side of Stevenson street between First street and Ninth

street.

ARTICLE VI.

Street Cars.

Section 45. Driving on Street Car Tracks. Passing Safety Zones.—
(a) It shall be unlawful for the operator of any vehicle proceeding upon any street car tracks or so to obstruct the movement of any street car to fail to remove said vehicle from said tracks or from in front of said street car as soon as practicable after signal from the operator of said street car. (b) On Market street from The Embarcadero to Van Ness avenue it shall be unlawful to drive any vehicle to the left of any safety zone established at a regular street car stop.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

BUDGET

FOR MUNICIPAL EXPENDITURES

City and County of San Francisco, California,

For Fiscal Year 1930-1931.

BILL NO. 9261, ORDINANCE NO. — (New Series).

An ordinance fixing and appropriating the aggregate sums of the items thereof allowed to each department, officer, board and commission for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1931, and making a budget of the same.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco as follows:

Section 1. The aggregate sums and items thereof hereinafter set forth are hereby fixed, designated and appropriated for the respective purposes set opposite the same, to be expended during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1931, in accordance with the provisions of Article III. Chapter I, of the Charter of the City and County.

Section 2. No department, officer, board or commission shall expend, or agree to expend, moneys, or to incur liabilities which, in total amount, exceed the total sum appropriated to such department. officer, board or commission by this ordinance, or which may subsequently be appropriated to such department, officer, board or com-

nission.

Section 3. The amounts appropriated to the various departments. officers, boards and commissions shall be expended and administered by them subject to the following conditions:

a. No department, officer, board or commission shall expend moneys, or incur liabilities, in excess of the total amount appropriated to such department, officer, board or commission; provided further, that such expenditure shall conform to the provisions of Article III, Chapter I, Section 9, of the Charter.

b. When a specific appropriation is made to any bureau, division or institution of a department, board or commission, such appropriation shall be known and administered as a main appropriation title, and the main division thereunder of an object of expenditure classification as theretofore adopted shall be known and administered as a specific sub-appropriation thereof.

- c. Departments, officers, boards or commissions desiring to make transfers from one sub-appropriation to any other sub-appropriation embraced within the same main appropriation title shall file with the Finance Committee of the Board of Supervisors a statement in duplicate setting forth the reasons for requesting such transfers, the purpose to which the money is to be devoted, the sub-appropriations from and to which such transfer is requested, the amounts of such transfers, and any other facts which may aid in determining the merits of such request. Whenever any such transfer is approved by the Finance Committee, the duplicate request shall be forwarded to the Auditor and a notice sent to each department making the request, setting forth the amounts of each sub-appropriation, or budget item numbers affected. In case of disapproval, notice to this effect shall be given to the department making the request.
- Whenever any department, officer, board or commission desires to make a transfer from any sub-appropriation or appropriation embraced in one main appropriation title or titles, to any other or the same sub-appropriation or appropriations embraced in or desired to be embraced in any other main appropriation title or titles, said department, officer, board or commission shall file with the Board of Supervisors a statement in duplicate similar to the statement required in condition "C" above and containing, in addition, the main appropriation title or titles from and to which such transfer is requested. If the Board of Supervisors approves the request, notice thereof shall be forwarded to the originating department and the duplicate copy of the request forwarded to the Auditor. Said notice shall contain the main appropriation title or titles affected, the sub-appropriation or appropriations from and to which such transfer is to be made and the amounts thereof. If the Board of Supervisors denies the request, notice thereof shall be sent to the originating department, with the reasons for such action.

Relative to Employment of Milton Marks to Codify Ordinances, Etc.

Western Power Company of California; and

And whereas, in order to enable the City and County of San Francisco to operate said properties, it will be necessary to complete the transmission line of the Moccasin Creek Power Plant from Newark to the City and County of San Francisco, and to make certain other expenditures to enable the City to operate the properties of the said Pacific Gas and Electric Company and Great Western Power Company; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the City Attorney be and is hereby directed to present to this Board, not later than June 2, 1930, two separate ordinances

Initiating the following bond issues:

1. A bond issue in the sum of three million five hundred twenty-five thousand (\$3,525,000) dollars for the purpose of providing funds for completing and constructing the following public utilities:

(a) The construction and completion of the transmission line of the Moccasin Creek Power Plant from Newark to the City and County

of San Francisco.

(b) The necessary changes in the step-down station of the Pacific Gas and Electric Company in San Francisco.

(c) To provide for the inter-system connections between the Pacific Gas and Electric Company and the Great Western Power Company.

(d) To construct a downtown substation to be used in connection with the supplying of the downtown load which is now supplied from the substation of the Great Western Power Company on Bush street.

(e) To provide for the cutting over of the Phelan Station load, which

station is now operated by the Great Western Power Company.

2. To provide funds for the construction of a hydro-electric plant at Red Mountain Bar, to be operated in connection with the Hetch Hetchy system.

Be it further

Resolved, That the issuing of any of the bonds of said three million five hundred twenty-five thousand (\$3,525,000) dollars issue mentioned in subdivision 1 hereof be made dependent upon the approval by the people of either the proposition to acquire the properties of the Pacific Gas and Electric Company or the Great Western Power Company, which will be submitted for approval on August 26, 1930.

Be it further

Resolved, That the City Attorney, in preparing the requisite ordinances to initiate the bond issues described in subdivisions 1 and 2 of this resolution, prepare the same in accordance with this resolution, so the same may be submitted to the electors of the City and County of San Francisco on the 26th day of August, 1930.

BUDGET FOR MUNICIPAL EXPENDITURES

City and County of San Francisco, California,

For Fiscal Year 1930-1931.

On recommendation of Finance Committee.

Bill No. 9261, Ordinance No. 8769 (New Series), as follows:

An ordinance fixing and appropriating the aggregate sums of the items thereof allowed to each department, officer, board and commission for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1931, and making a budget of the same.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco as follows:

Section 1. The aggregate sums and items thereof hereinafter set forth are hereby fixed, designated and appropriated for the respective purposes set opposite the same, to be expended during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1931, in accordance with the provisions of Article III, Chapter I, of the Charter of the City and County.

Section 2. No department, officer, board or commission shall expend, or agree to expend, moneys, or to incur liabilities which, in total amount, exceed the total sum appropriated to such department, officer, board or commission by this ordinance, or which may subsequently be appropriated to such department, officer, board or commission.

Section 3. The amounts appropriated to the various departments, officers, boards and commissions shall be expended and administered

by them subject to the following conditions:

a. No department, officer, board or commission shall expend moneys, or incur liabilities, in excess of the total amount appropriated to such department, officer, board or commission; provided further, that such expenditure shall conform to the provisions of Article 111, Chapter I, Section 9, of the Charter.

b. When a specific appropriation is made to any bureau, division or institution of a department, board or commission, such appropriation shall be known and administered as a main appropriation title, and the main division thereunder of an object of expenditure classification as theretofore adopted shall be known and administered as

a specific sub-appropriation thereof.

c. Departments, officers, boards or commissions desiring to make transfers from one sub-appropriation to any other sub-appropriation embraced within the same main appropriation title shall file with the Finance Committee of the Board of Supervisors a statement in duplicate setting forth the reasons for requesting such transfers, the purpose to which the money is to be devoted, the sub-appropriations from and to which such transfer is requested, the amounts of such transfers, and any other facts which may aid in determining the merits of such request. Whenever any such transfer is approved by the Finance Committee, the duplicate request shall be forwarded to the Auditor and a notice sent to each department making the request, setting forth the amounts of each sub-appropriation, or budget item numbers affected. In case of disapproval, notice to this effect shall be given to the department making the request.

d. Whenever any department, officer, board or commission desires to make a transfer from any sub-appropriation or appropriation embraced in one main appropriation title or titles, to any other or the same sub-appropriation or appropriations embraced in or desired to be embraced in any other main appropriation title or titles, said department, officer, board or commission shall file with the Board of Supervisors a statement in duplicate similar to the statement required

in condition "C" above and containing, in addition, the main appropriation title or titles from and to which such transfer is requested. If the Board of Supervisors approves the request, notice thereof shall be forwarded to the originating department and the duplicate copy of the request forwarded to the Auditor. Said notice shall contain the main appropriation title or titles affected, the sub-appropriation or appropriations from and to which such transfer is to be made and the amounts thereof. If the Board of Supervisors denies the request, notice thereof shall be sent to the originating department, with the reasons for such action.

Bill No. 9262, Ordinance No. — (New Series), as follows:

Determining and declaring that public interest and necessity demand the acquisition, construction and completion of a public utility, to-wit: Necessary lands, power house and all necessary machinery, equipment, materials and supplies for the purpose of developing hydroelectric energy at that certain point in Tuolumne County, California, where the Hetch Hetchy aqueduct of the City and County of San Francisco passes under the Don Pedro Reservoir at Red Mountain Bar.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco as follows:

Section 1. It is hereby determined and specifically declared that the public interest and necessity demand the acquisition, construction and completion of a public utility, to-wit: Necessary lands, power house and all necessary machinery, equipment, materials and supplies for the purpose of developing hydro-electric energy at that certain point in Tuolumne County, California, where the Hetch Hetchy aqueduct of the City and County of San Francisco passes under the Don Pedro Reservoir at Red Mountain Bar.

Section 2. The Board of Public Works is hereby directed to procure through the City Engineer and file with the Board of Supervisors plans and estimates of the cost of acquisition, original construction and completion by the City and County of San Francisco of the public utility described in Section 1 hereof.

Section 3. This ordinance shall be published for a period of fourteen (14) days in the official newspaper and shall take effect immediately.

Acquisition, Construction and Completion of an Electric Transmission Line From Newark, Alameda County, to the City and County of San Francisco.

Also, Bill No. 9263, Ordinance No. ———— (New Series), as follows: Determining and declaring if, when and in the event the people of San Francisco vote to take over the electric generating and distributing systems of the Great Western Power Company of California and/or of the Pacific Gas and Electric Company, that public interest and necessity demand the acquisition, construction and completion of a public utility, to-wit: A double circuit high voltage electric transmission line from Newark, Alameda County, California, to the City and County of San Francisco, and all necessary rights-of-way; to raise the transmission voltage of the Pacific Gas and Electric Company's stepdown station in Visitacion Valley, San Mateo County, adequate to handle the

electric power generated from the plants of the City and County of San Francisco; to regulate voltage, correct power factor, stabilize the lines, and to install necessary synchronous condenser equipment. In the event the people of San Francisco vote to take over the electric generating and distributing system of the Great Western Power Company of California and the Pacific Gas and Electric Company, to make necessary connection between the two systems, including the construction of a new electric sub-station and all necessary machinery and equipment.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Fran-

cisco as follows:

Section 1. It is hereby determined and specifically declared that if, when and in the event the people of San Francisco vote to take over the electric generating and distributing systems of the Great Western Power Company of California and, or of the Pacific Gas and Electric Company, the public interest and necessity demand the acquisition, construction and completion of a public utility, to-wit: A double circuit high voltage electric transmission line from Newark, Alameda County, California, to the City and County of San Francisco, and all necessary rights-of-way; to raise the transmission voltage of the Pacific Gas and Electric Company's stepdown station in Visitacion Valley, San Mateo County, adequate to handle the electric power generated from the plants of the City and County of San Francisco; to regulate voltage, correct power factor, stabilize the lines, and to install necessary synchronous condenser equipment. In the event the people of San Francisco vote to take over the electric generating and distributing system of the Great Western Power Company of California and/or the Pacific Gas and Electric Company, to make necessary connections between the two systems, including the construction of a new electric sub-station and all necessary machinery and equipment.

Section 2. Should a bonded indebtedness be incurred by the voters of the City and County of San Francisco for the acquisition and construction of the utilities described in Section 1 hereof, the said bonds shall not be issued unless the electors of the City and County shall approve a bonded indebtedness to acquire those portions of the electric generating and distributing systems of the Pacific Gas and Electric Company and of the Great Western Power Company, or either of them, which properties are described in "Exhibit A" attached, respectively, to Applications Nos. 9768 and 9767, filed with the Railroad Commission of the State of California on the 11th day of February, 1924, and additions and betterments to said systems from the last-

mentioned date.

Section 3. The Board of Public Works is hereby directed to procure through the City Engineer and file with the Board of Supervisors plans and estimates of the cost of acquisition, construction and completion by the City and County of San Francisco of the public utility described in Section 1 hereof.

Section 4. This Ordinance shall be published for a period of fourteen (14) days in the official newspaper and shall take effect immediately.

Explanation of Vote.

SUPERVISOR COLMAN: I desire to vote no on Number Thirty-one for the reason that after carefully checking it over during the past week I am convinced that the voting of this amount of money will not enable the people of the City and County of San Francisco to go into the electrical power business and that it will take approxi-

mately \$21,000,000 more before the people can embark in the hydroelectric business, assuming that they purchase both plants.

SUPERVISOR ANDRIANO: Well, I desire to vote no also, for the same reasons I gave last Monday. Mr. Chairman, although I do not feel as though I could vote aye on the whole amount asked for by the City Engineer. I believe if the City Engineer had been asked what he recommends temporarily we would have gotten a different set-up from the one that he recommended permanently, but we are asked to vote again on that recommendation of the City Engineer, and if we are I would vote no to the \$21,000,000 figure, because I am satisfied if the City Engineer were to be requested to refer to this Board what ne considers the necessary amount for the time being he would refuse these figures. At the same time, I am satisfied that the amount of \$3,000,000 which is now required by this Board is inadequate. For those reasons I am going to vote no to Number Thirty-one.

SUPERVISOR HAVENNER: In view of these two statements I desire to make a statement. I believe that it has been very clearly established by the expert retained by the City for that particular work, and the man who is the most familiar with the entire condemnation proceedings of the Pacific Gas and Electric Company and the Great Western Power Company of any man with this City, that the City will be, at the time we take over the properties under the financial authority of these bond issues-if they are approved by the peoplewill be able to continue in business without any interruptions or difficulties. And further, if this question had been fairly put to the City Engineer as it should have been put in the first place, and that is, in the negative form and not in the affirmative, I am quite satisfied that his answer would have been different. If the question had been put in this form: If this amount of money were voted by the people and if the bonds were approved and sold and we were to proceed to take over the properties on the first day of July of next year, will it be necessary for the City of San Francisco to stop the service by reason of lack of funds or to in any way curtail such service? And if he had been truthful he would have said no. And that should be the question here now. We all know that in the very near future it is going to be necessary to submit additional amounts of money anyway to extend the system and to provide for the future.

If you will take the original report of the City Engineer himself, you will note that he said that in view of the uncertainty of the action of the people that the thing to be submitted at this time, properly, was the two major questions: "Do you desire to acquire both of these systems or one or the other?" And then wait for the program of additions and betterments, after receiving the votes of the people. Now, the only change we made was, we insisted that in the original proposition there should be included this transmission line which will bring

the electric power from Newark to San Francisco.

It would be absurd to come to the people and ask them if they want to buy these two systems, or either of them, and have no way of trans-

mitting that power to San Francisco.

I am firmly convinced it will not be necessary in the immediate ruture after taking over these properties to discontinue service in any way or to repair the existing system. We put the question to the City Engineer in a very confusing fashion all the way through, and we asked him if these other things ought to be done. Of course they ought to be done and they will be done, they will have to be done in the future, but until the people tell us what they wish to do we cannot submit to them an intelligent program for the future. That is the reason we have had all of this discussion on this proposition. The original suggestion which was made at a meeting in the City Attorney's office, a meeting which I attended, was that we should submit first the two general propositions for the purchase of the Great Western Power and the Pacific Gas and Electric Company, and that we should logically defer the submission of this program of improvements and betterments until it was decided which we were going to take

over, or whether we were going to take both. All of this discussion has arisen because at that time the committee insisted that this transmission line, these transmission lines should be included. That is the whole question here, and it cannot be camouflaged. As far as the necessity for these things is concerned, we can agree with you when you say they are necessary. Yes, we know it, but we don't know how much it will be until the people have rendered their decision. We do insist that it is absurd, a ridiculous thing and that it is not acting in good faith to submit these two propositions to the people for the acquisition of the systems of the Great Western Power and the Pacific Cas and Electric and then have no way to bring the power from those systems into this City.

SUPERVISOR COLMAN: May I briefly-

SUPERVISOR HAVENNER: Now, if there is going to be any discussion on this matter, I insist the Supervisor made his statement and I have made mine, and I am not going to hold that he should

be permitted to have the last word on the question.

SUPERVISOR COLMAN: If you will permit me, I only wanted to refer to some of the statements made, which I think will be of interest to the Board. I did not attend any of the meetings in Mr. O'Toole's office. I did attend the meeting of the committee and the question was directly asked of our chief engineer, practically in the way in which he put it, and the chief's answer was that it would be a makeshift. My stand was then, and is now, that I am opposed to going into business, even if we can do so technically, if we can go into it, I maintain that we could not give adequate service. The sale and distribution of hydro-electric power is a big proposition, it is so big that we must be prepared to give service, and just as good service as the people are getting now, and we must be prepared to take care of them. That is the point. Transmission cuts no figure, because in my opinion we are no better off with the transmission than without it if we have not the proper funds to carry on the business as it should be carried on, and that is quite necessary. point we differ, and that is the whole point in a nutshell.

SUPERVISOR HAVENNER: I merely want to say that I am convinced that the committee acted wisely and that the City will be able, under this setup, to continue service exactly as that service was rendered by the company at the time when we take them over.

SUPERVISOR SHANNON: I would like to ask an explanation of section 2 in Bill Thirty-one.

THE CHAIRMAN: Would you enlighten the Supervisor, Mr. City Attorney?

CITY ATTORNEY O'TOOLE: On what point, Mr. Shannon?

SUPERVISOR SHANNON: I would like to know just what it

means, it isn't quite clear to me,

CITY ATTORNEY O'TOOLE: Well, it means, Mr. Supervisor, that if the people should vote a bonded indebtedness to construct the util-'ty mentioned in paragraph one the issuance of those bonds will be dependent upon the approval of the acquisition of the Pacific Gas and Electric Company or the Great Western Power Company or both of them.

SUPERVISOR SHANNON: That is, the transmission line from

Newark to San Francisco?

CITY ATTORNEY O'TOOLE: Yes, that is the instruction given to

SUPERVISOR SHANNON: Would it be advisable to get that line

whether the major bonds were passed or not?

SUPERVISOR HAVENNER: I personally think it would be advisable, but the majority of the committee contended that inasmuch as we were proceeding under the condemnation proceedings, or rather under the evaluation proceedings, conducted before the Railroad Commission, that the major question to be submitted was whether they desired to acquire these two systems, and that therefore we

should not submit at this particular time an independent proposition which might be voted alone merely for the acquisition of these transmission lines. I do not entirely agree with the viewpoint of the committee, but that is the ground they put it on, that they would submit only the major proposition. That was my contention, but unfortunately they did not agree, and 1 would be glad, personally, to see the transmission line built in any event, but the majority of the committee wanted to stipulate that unless the people approved the bonds for the acquisition of one or both of the properties that the bonds for the transmission line would not be used.

Adopted.

The following resolution was adopted:

Acquisition of a Portion of the Electrical Generation and Distribution System of the Pacific Gas and Electric Company.

Also, Resolution No. 32574 (New Series), as follows:

Reciting that plans and estimates of the cost of the acquisition of those certain parts and portions of the electric generating and distributing system of the Pacific Gas and Electric Company, and the lands, properties and rights incident and appurtenant thereto within and without the confines of the City and County of San Francisco have been filed with the Board of Supervisors by the Board of Public Works, and that the Pacific Gas and Electric Company has failed to make an offer to sell its properties to the City and County of San Francisco, and declaring that the estimated cost of the properties of the Pacific Gas and Electric Company cannot be paid from the annual revenue or other funds derived from taxes levied for that purpose, and that all of said estimated cost to acquire said properties will require the incurring of a bonded debt.

Resolved by the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of

San Francisco as follows:

It is hereby recited that the Board of Public Works, Section 1. on the 14th day of April, 1930, placed on file with the Board of Supervisors plans and estimates of the cost of the acquisition by the City and County of San Francisco of that portion of the electrical generation and distributing system of the Pacific Gas and Electric Company in and adjacent to the City and County of San Francisco. and as more particularly described in that certain document entitled "Exhibit A", which is attached to and forms a part of Application No. 9768, with amendments thereto, filed with the Railroad Commission of the State of California on the 11th day of February, 1924, and estimated net additions and betterments to the said system from the last-mentioned date to and including the 30th day of June, 1931. That the total estimated cost of the properties of the said Pacific Gas and Electric Company is the sum of forty-four million six hundred thousand dollars (\$44,600,000); that said plans and estimates contain sufficient information to enable the Board of Supervisors to take further proceedings to secure the said described public utility and to make the declarations herein contained.

Section 2. The Pacific Gas and Electric Company failed to submit an offer or offers to sell its properties to the City and County of San Francisco, as invited to do so under Resolution No. 32543 (New

Series).

Section 3. It is hereby determined and declared that of the said sum of forty-four million six hundred thousand dollars (\$44,600,000) no part can be paid out of the annual revenue of the City and County of San Francisco in addition to the other necessary expenses thereof or other funds derived from taxes levied for that purpose, and will require the incurring of a bonded debt to the amount of forty-four million six hundred thousand dollars (\$44,600,000) for the purpose herein recited.

Section 4. This resolution shall take effect immediately.

Also, Bill No. 9264, Ordinance No. -= (New Series), as follows: Calling and providing for a special election to be held in the City and County of San Francisco on Tuesday, the 26th day of August, 1930, for the purpose of submitting to the voters of the City and County of San Francisco a proposition to incur a bonded debt of the City and County of San Francisco to the amount of forty-four million six hundred thousand dollars (\$44,600,000) for the acquisition of a public utility, to-wit: The electric generating and distributing system of the Pacific Gas and Electric Company, lands within and without the confines of the City and County of San Francisco, all properties and equipment necessary for the conduct of such system, which properties are more particularly described in that document designated "Exhibit A," which is attached to Application No. 9768, with amendments thereto, filed with the Railroad Commission of the State of California on the 11th day of February, 1924, and all additions and betterments to said system made subsequent to the 11th day of February, 1924, for the purpose of supplying electric energy to the City and County of San Francisco and to its in-

habitants, to be owned and controlled by said City and County.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Fran-

cisco as follows:

Section 1. A special election is hereby called and ordered to be held in the City and County of San Francisco on Tuesday, the 26th day of August, 1930, for the purpose of submitting to the electors

of said City and County the following proposition, to-wit:

To incur a bonded debt of the City and County of San Francisco to the amount of forty-four million six hundred thousand dollars (\$44,600,000) for a public utility, to-wit: The acquisition of the electric generating and distributing system of the Pacific Gas and Electric Company, lands within and without the confines of the City and County of San Francisco, all properties and equipment necessary for the conduct of such system, which properties are more particularly described in that document designated "Exhibit A." which is attached to Application No. 9768, with amoundments thereto, filed with the Railroad Commission of the State of California on the 11th day of February, 1924, and all additions and betterments to said system made subsequent to the 11th day of February, 1924, for the purpose of supplying electric energy to the City and County of San Francisco and to its inhabitants, to be owned and controlled by said City and County.

Section 2. The estimated cost of the acquisition of the public utility herein described was by plans and estimates of the Board of Public Works, procured through the City Engineer and filed with the Board of Supervisors on the 14th day of April, 1930, and was and is fixed by Resolution No. 32571 (New Series) in the sum of forty-four million

six hundred thousand dollars (\$44,600,000).

Section 3. By Resolution No. 32574 (New Series) it was declared that no part of the said sum of forty-four million six hundred thousand dollars (\$44,600,000) could be paid out of the annual revenue of the City and County in addition to the other necessary expenses thereof or other funds derived from taxes levied for that purpose and will require the incurring of a bonded debt to the amount of forty-four million six hundred thousand dollars (\$44,-

600,000) for the purpose herein recited. The method and manner of payment of the estimated cost of said described public utility are by the issuance of bonds of the City and County of San Francisco to the amount required therefor and the application of the proceeds arising from the sale thereof to defray the cost of the acquisition

of said public utility herein described.

Section 4. The special election hereby called and ordered to be held shall be held and conducted, and the votes thereat received and canvassed, and the returns thereof made and the result thereof ascertained, determined and declared as herein provided and according to the laws of the State of California providing for and governing elections in the City and County of San Francisco, and the polls for such election shall be and remain open during the time required by said laws.

Section 5. The ballots to be used at said special election shall be such as may be required by law to be used thereat, and in addition to any other matter required by law to be printed thereon shall appear

thereon the following:

"To incur a bonded debt in the sum of forty-four million six hundred thousand dollars (\$44,600,000) for the acquisition of the electric generating and distributing system of the Pacific Gas and Electric Company, lands within and without the confines of the City and County of San Francisco, all properties and equipment necessary for the conduct of such system, which properties are more particularly described in that document designated 'Exhibit A,' which is attached to Application No. 9768, with amendments thereto, filed with the Railroad Commission of the State of California on the 11th day of February, 1924, and all additions and betterments to said system made subsequent to the 11th day of February, 1924, for the purpose of supplying electric energy to the City and County of San Francisco and to its inhabitants, to be owned and controlled by said City and County."

To vote for the proposition and thereby authorize the incurring of a bonded indebtedness to the amount of and for the purpose stated in said proposition, stamp a cross (X) in the blank space to the right of the word "YES." To vote against the proposition and thereby refuse to authorize the incurring of a bonded indebtedness to the amount of and for the purpose stated in such proposition, stamp a cross (X) in

the blank space to the right of the word "NO."

Bonds issued for the acquisition of the public utility herein described shall bear interest at the rate of 4½ per cent per annum, payable semiannually.

Section 6. Where voting machines are used at said special election the said voting machines shall be so arranged that any qualified elector may vote for the proposition by pulling down a leyer over the word "YES" under or near a statement of the proposed proposition appearing on cardboard, paper or other material placed on the front of the machine, and said act shall constitute a vote for the proposition, and by pulling down a lever over the word "NO" under or near a statement of the proposed proposition appearing on cardboard, paper or other material placed on the front of the machine, shall constitute a vote against the proposition. Said voting machines and the preparation of the same are to be used in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 96 of the Statutes of 1923.

Each cross (X) stamped in the square to the right of the word "YES" appearing on the printed ballot, where printed ballots are used, shall constitute a vote in favor of and to authorize the incurring of a bonded indebtedness for the purpose set forth in the proposition, and each cross (X) stamped in the square to the right of the word "NO" shall be counted as a vote not in favor of, and a refusal to authorize the incurring of a bonded indebtedness for the purpose set forth in the proposition.

Section 7. The election precincts and the numbers, names and boundaries thereof for said special election, and the places of voting, and the officers to conduct such election, and all other necessary proceedings in that behalf, shall be respectively defined, designated, selected, appointed and had by the Board of Election Commissioners of the City and County of San Francisco, and said Board is hereby authorized and directed to procure and provide all supplies that may be necessary

to properly and lawfully conduct such special election.

When the polls are closed the officers of election shall count the ballots cast at such election, and canvass the votes cast, respectively, for and against the proposition herein stated, and make returns thereof in time, form and manner required for the counting, canvassing and returning of votes east at other municipal elections held in the City and County of San Francisco. The Board of Election Commissioners shall, as soon as the said returns and ballots have been received by said Board, canvass said returns and declare the result thereof in the manner provided by law for canvassing returns and declaring results in other elections, and shall also certify said results to the Board of Supervisors.

Section 8. If, at such special election, it shall appear that two-thirds of all the votes cast thereat were in favor of and authorized the incurring of a bonded debt for the purpose set forth in said proposition, then such proposition shall be deemed to have been accepted by the electors, and bonds will be issued to defray the cost of the public utility described therein. Such bonds shall be of the form and character known as "serials." All of said bonds shall be dated July 1, 1931, shall bear interest at the rate of $4^{1/2}$ per centum per annum, payable semi-annually, shall be of the denomination of one thousand dollars each, and the principal and interest thereof shall be payable in gold coin of the United States. Said bonds shall be called "Electric Bonds."

Bonds issued for the purpose stated shall be numbered from I to 44,600, both inclusive, and shall be payable \$1,115,000 thereof five years from the date of said bonds, beginning with the lowest numbers, and \$1,115,000 thereof of the next higher numbers on the same day in each succeeding year until all of said bonds shall be paid.

Section 9. Said bonds and coupons shall be in substantially the

following form:

UNITED STATES OF AMERICA. State of California, City and County of San Francisco.

"ELECTRIC BONDS."

This bond is issued under and pursuant to the Constitution and statutes of the State of California, and the Charter of said City and County of San Francisco, and amendments thereto, and under and pursuant to ordinances and proceedings of said City and County, duly adopted and taken, and a vote and assent of more than two-thirds of all the qualified electors of said City and County voting at a special

election duly and legally called and held for that purpose.

It is hereby certified, recited and declared that all acts, conditions and things required by law to exist, happen and be performed precedent to and in the issuance of this bond have existed, happened and been performed in due time, form and manner as required by law, and that the amount of this bond, together with all other indebtedness of said City and County, does not exceed any limit prescribed by the Constitution or statutes of said State or Charter of said City and County, and that provision has been made, as required by the Constitution and statutes of said State and the Charter of said City and County, for the collection of an annual tax sufficient to pay the interest on this bond as it falls due, and also provision to constitute a sinking fund for the payment of the principal of this bond on or before maturity. The full faith and credit of said City and County are hereby pledged for the punctual payment of the principal and interest of this bond.

This bond may be converted into a registered bond upon presentation to the Treasurer of the City and County of San Francisco, in which event such Treasurer shall cut off and cancel the coupons of this bond and shall sign a statement stamped, printed or written upon the back or face of the bond to the effect that this bond is registered in the name of the owner, and that thereafter the interest and principal of this bond are payable to the registered owner. Thereafter, and from time to time, this bond may be transferred by such registered owner in person or by attorney duly authorized on presentation of this bond to the Treasurer, and the bond be again registered as before, a

similar statement being stamped, printed or written thereon.

This bond is exempt from all taxation within the State of California. The Board of Supervisors met in regular session.

CALLING THE ROLL.

The roll was called and the following Supervisors were noted present:

Quorum present.

His Honor Mayor Rolph being absent, Supervisor Rossi was elected to preside.

APPROVAL OF JOURNALS.

The Journals of Proceedings of the meetings of May 12, 19 and June 2, 1930, were considered read and approved.

SPECIAL ORDER-3 P. M.

Garbage Incinerator.

The matter of the construction of a garbage incinerator, the discussion of which arose from a communication from the Hon. Edmund P. Mogan, Judge of the Superior Court, to the City Attorney, declaring that unless there is a report of definite progress, he will proceed to enter judgment for abatement of nuisance, together with resolution of Supervisor Peyser and motion of Supervisor Colman, was taken up as a Special Order for 3 p. m., in accordance with motion made by Supervisor Hayden at last meeting.

The question being on Supervisor Colman's motion, in accordance with the ruling of the chair, the motion was restated as follows: That the Rossi ordinance of April 14, 1930, together with the report of the Engineering Department on the progress of the work, be sent to the Hon. Edmund P. Mogan for his information.

Supervisor Colman moved the adoption of the motion.

Amendment.

Supervisor Toner offered the following as an amendment:

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Fran-

cisco as follows:

Section 1. That whereas, for the purpose of carrying out the policy, as expressed by the people of the City and County of San Francisco, relative to the disposition of garbage, and in view of the present crisis due to the pending judgment in the Superior Court against the present incinerator, it is necessary that an incinerator be constructed in the City and County of San Francisco without further or unnecessary delay.

Section 2. That the Board of Public Works of the City and County

of San Francisco is hereby authorized to forthwith advertise for and receive bids for the construction and operation in the City and County of San Francisco, for a period of twenty-five years, one incinerator plant complete, of sufficient capacity to reduce to a mineral ash 800 tons in twenty-four hours of the garbage and refuse now or hereafter collected in the City and County of San Francisco. The plant to be erected at the bidder's sole expense, either on the site of the present incinerator or any other site designated and furnished by the City. For the purpose of bidding each bidder to be furnished a map of the boring plat just completed by the City Engineer showing the general nature of the soil in the immediate vicinity of the proposed site. The plans and specifications accompanying the bids to show the type and nature of the foundation and building; also to show the type and nature and arrangement of the chimneys, furnaces and approaches.

Section 3. That each bidder is to file with his bid detailed plans and specifications of the completed plant he proposes to build. The bidders' plans and specifications to conform to the general plans and specifications.

tions prepared by the Board of Public Works.

Section 4. That each bidder is to state in his proposal the price per ton he proposes to charge for destroying one ton of garbage and refuse as collected in the City and County of San Francisco, including the final disposition of the ashes and other residue.

Section 5. That each bidder is to state in his proposal a lump sum price at which the City may recapture or purchase the incinerator plant at any time during the life of the contract and the percentage per year this lump sum price will be decreased on account of depreciation.

Section 6. The plant finally selected by the Board of Public Works

shall be designated the San Francisco Incinerator.

Section 7. That it is the intention of the Board of Supervisors, when the plant is finally selected by the Board of Public Works and the contract is awarded to the successful bidder, in consideration of the person, firm or corporation submitting said successful bid and entering into a contract secured by satisfactory surety bond guaranteeing that the said person, firm or corporation will build, erect and complete the said 800-ton incinerator plant as heretofore called for in this ordinance, the Board of Supervisors will grant to that person, firm or corporation an exclusive franchise to operate the said incinerator for a period of twenty-five years, to destroy all of the garbage, waste or other combustible rubbish collected in the City and County of San Francisco. Provided, however, that the amount to be charged under such operation shall be a maximum of one dollar per ton for each ton destroyed, or such higher legal rate as may hereafter be fixed by referendum ordinance of the Board of Supervisors.

Section 8. Ordinance No. 8738 (New Series) is hereby repealed, and all other ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are

hereby repealed.

Statement of Supervisor Toner.

Whereupon the following was presented and read:

As Chairman of the Health Committee, with the assistance of my colleagues, I have made an exhaustive study of garbage incinerators

for the past two years.

Supervisor Hayden, Supervisor McShechy, Dr. Hassler, Health Officer, and myself made a very extensive trip throughout the entire United States and Canada inspecting various types of incinerators, and I think I am safe in saying that we saw every plant in the United States and Canada that ever made a claim to having merit. This Committee studied not only the various types of incinerators, but also made very thorough inquiries of all the city officials in the cities visited as to the methods they adopted in going about the purchase of their incinerators. In 95 per cent of the cities investigated we found

the same procedure was followed, that is, the city authorities pre pared general specifications authorizing the size and type of plant they wished to purchase and then invited the various incinerator companies to submit their own plans and specifications with their bid to construct the plant. In every instance the incinerator company was forced to be responsible, not only for the design and operation of their furnaces, but also to assume the responsibility of the general layout of the buildings and approaches, together with the methods of getting the materials to be burned into the furnaces

This Board authorized and paid for the expenses of that trip and those three gentlemen, together with myself, returned here and made an honest report of our findings. Based on our investigation, we recommended that the City of San Francisco profit by the experience of other cities and follow the lead of those cities which had been successful in procuring a successful incinerator by the simple process of placing all of the responsibility for the designing, building and operation of the incinerator on the incinerator company receiving the contract.

When this report was presented to this Board certain members of the Board, who frankly admit they have never seen a single incinerator except the old one here in San Francisco, started in to wreck it and block action on it. Their entire claim for justification of this action is based on their purported overwhelming desire to support the Chief Engineer, who frankly admits he has never either designed or built an incinerator or even assisted in the designing or building of an incinerator. On a previous occasion the City's engineer interfered with the design of an incinerator here on Army street and that interference cost the taxpayers of this City over a half million dollars for a failure.

The Chief Engineer has just recently further demonstrated that questionable efficiency when authorized by the Board to go out in the world and secure outside expert advice to assist him in preparing plans and specifications for Sau Francisco's new incinerator, he comes back to this Board and tells us he has employed an engineer whose only claim to knowledge of or experience in designing or building incinerators is the experience he gained several years ago in assisting to design and build the old plant on Army street, which never worked and was an absolute failure.

The City Engineer tells us he is 50 per cent finished with the building plans, but has not started nor has any intention of attempting to make any furnace plans. He is making the plans for a building 400 feet long by 125 feet wide and with a very complicated and expensive system of ramps for overhead storage. This system has been obsolete for years and is condemned by every reputable engineer and incinerator company in the country as being prohibitive in cost of operation. The Chief Engineer is persisting in this design in the face of assurance from several reputable incinerator companies that a building of one-half or less that area would be ample to house an 800-ton incinerator, the size San Francisco wishes to purchase.

It is common practice and common sense employed by every reputable engineering firm in the country in laying out a power plant, pumping station or any kind of factory to first lay out the machinery and equipment in the best possible way and to get economy in operation and then design and build the housing over and around it. The housing or building is of secondary importance and if we had the best building in the world and were unable to economically fit the machinery in it, the building would be useless.

Every large plant in this country, built in recent years, is craneoperated; that is, the materials are carried from the storage bins by machinery instead of being pushed or carried there by hand labor. I don't believe any intelligent person today will argue that hand labor can compete with modern machinery, yet that is just what the Chief Engineer is asking us to do.

When the Chief Engineer's plans are finished it is almost a foregone conclusion that on account of the excessive and unnecessary size of the building and ramps, together with the very expensive method of handling all of the material by hand labor, the bids received will be prohibitive in cost, both of construction and operation, and will have to be rejected, leaving us right where we started, minus \$25,000 more of the taxpayers' money gone to pay for the engineer's experiment.

I have been criticized, both in the press and by individuals, for wanting to take this out of the Engineer's hands, and I have been accused of trying to delay the building of this incinerator plant, I realize this criticism is made by the press and public through lack of knowledge of all of the facts, and I am making this statement in order that everyone may be enlightened.

I am absolutely positive in my knowledge that if this Board will advertise for bids for the various incinerator companies to submit their own plans and specifications, we can get bids in here and have this contract let within thirty days from the date of the advertisement.

Now, let us place this responsibility where it belongs, and if you gentlemen are sincere in your desire for action, let us order the Board of Public Works to advertise for these bids.

Privilege of the Floor.

City Engineer M. M. O'Shaughnessy was granted the privilege of the floor. He was interrogated as to the progress of the work on the incinerator and as to his authority to proceed with a building for the incinerator under the terms of the ordinance.

Supervisor Peyser moved that the Toner ordinance be laid over for consideration until Monday, June 23, 1930, Special Order—2:30 p. m.

Motion carried.

Supervisor Shannon asked for a report from the Board of Public Works at the same time.

Supervisor Colman asked that information be sent to Judge Mogan: Copy of Rossi ordinance, report of City Engineer and copy of Toner bill

Calling and providing for a special election to be held in the City and County of San Francisco on Tuesday, the 26th day of August, 1930, for the purpose of submitting to the voters of the City and County of San Francisco a proposition to incur a bonded debt of the City and County of San Francisco to the amount of forty-four million six hundred thousand dollars (\$44,600,000) for the acquisition of a public utility, to-wit: The electric generating and distributing system of the Pacific Gas and Electric Company, lands within and without the contines of the City and County of San Francisco, all properties and equipment necessary for the conduct of such system, which properties are more particularly described in that document designated "Exhibit A," which is attached to Application No. 9768, with amendments thereto, filed with the Railroad Commission of the State of California on the 11th day of February, 1924, and all additions and betterments to said system made subsequent to the 11th day of February, 1924, for the purpose of supplying electric energy to the City and County of San Francisco and to its Inhabitants, to be owned and controlled by said City and County.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco as follows:

Where voting machines are used at said special election the said voting machines shall be so arranged that any qualified elector may vote for the proposition by pulling down a lever over the word "YES" under or near a statement of the proposed proposition appearing on cardboard, paper or other material placed on the front of the machine, and said act shall constitute a vote for the proposition, and by pulling down a lever over the word "NO" under or near a statement of the proposed proposition appearing on cardboard, paper or other material placed on the front of the machine, shall constitute a vote against the proposition. Said voting machines and the preparation of the same are to be used in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 96 of the Statutes of 1923,

Each cross (X) stamped in the square to the right of the word "YFS" appearing on the printed ballot, where printed ballots are used, shall constitute a vote in favor of and to authorize the incurring of a bonded indebtedness for the purpose set forth in the proposition, and each cross (X) stamped in the square to the right of the word "NO" shall be counted as a vote not in favor of, and a refusal to authorize the incurring of a bonded indebtedness for the purpose set forth in the proposition.

Section 7. The election precincts and the numbers, names and boundaries thereof for said special election, and the place of voting, and the officers to conduct such election, and all other necessary proceedings in that behalf, shall be respectively defined, designated, selected, appointed and had by the Board of Election Commissioners of the City and County of San Francisco, and said Board is hereby authorized

and directed to procure and provide all supplies that may be neces-

sary to properly and lawfully conduct such special election.

When the polls are closed the officers of election shall count the ballots cast at such election and canvass the votes cast, respectively, for and against the proposition herein stated, and make returns thereof in time, form and manner required for the counting, canvassing and returning of votes cast at other municipal elections held in the City and County of San Francisco. The Board of Election Commissioners shall, as soon as the said returns and ballots have been received by said Board, canvass said returns and declare the result thereof in the manner provided by law for canvassing returns and declaring results in other elections, and shall also certify said results to the Board of Supervisors.

Section 8. If, at such special election, it shall appear that two-thirds of all the votes cast thereat were in favor of and authorized the incurring of a bonded debt for the purpose set forth in said proposition, then such proposition shall be deemed to have been accepted by the electors, and bonds will be issued to defray the cost of the public utility described therein. Such bonds shall be of the form and character known as "serials." All of said bonds shall be dated July 1, 1931, shall bear interest at the rate of 4½ per centum per annum, payable semi-annually, shall be of the denomination of \$1.000 each, and the principal and interest thereof shall be payable in gold coin of the United States. Said bonds shall be called "Electric Bonds."

Bonds issued for the purpose stated shall be numbered from 1 to 18,945, both inclusive, and shall be payable \$474,000 thereof five years from the date of said bonds, beginning with the lowest number, and \$474,000 thereof of the next higher numbers on the same day in each succeeding year, and in the final year the sum of \$459,000 until all of

said bonds shall be paid.

Section 9. Said bonds and coupons shall be in substantially the following form:

It is hereby certified, recited and declared that all acts, conditions and things required by law to exist, happen and be performed precedent to and in the issuance of this bond have existed, happened and been performed in due time, form and manner as required by law, and that the amount of this bond, together with all other indebted-

ness of said City and County, does not exceed any limit prescribed by the Constitution or statutes of said State or Charter of said City and County, and that provision has been made, as required by the Constitution and statutes of said State and the Charter of said City and County, for the collection of an annual tax sufficient to pay the interest on this bond as it falls due, and also provision to constitute a sinking fund for the payment of the principal of this bond on or before maturity. This bond may be converted into a registered bond upon presentation to the Treasurer of the City and County of San Francisco, in which event such Treasurer shall cut off and cancel the coupons of this bond and shall sign a statement stamped, printed or written upon the back or face of the bond to the effect that this bond is registered in the name of the owner, and that thereafter the interest and principal of this bond are payable to the registered owner. Thereafter, and from time to time, this bond may be transferred by such registered owner in person or by attorney duly authorized on presentation of this bond to the Treasurer, and the bond be again registered as before, a similar statement being stamped, printed or written thereon.

Grant of Roadway Easement to Alameda County.

On recommendation of Public Utilities Committee,

Resolution No. 32613 (New Series), as follows:

Whereas, the County of Alameda, State of California, by letter dated March 12, 1930, and signed by George A. Posey, as County Surveyor of said county, has requested a right of way easement for the construction, maintenance and use of a public road or highway over a certain parcel of land owned by the City and County of San Francisco, situated in the County of Alameda and now under control of the San Francisco Water Department; and

Whereas, the use of this land for road purposes, under the conditions hereinafter set forth, will not interfere with the use of said land for the purposes of the San Francisco Water Department; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That, in accordance with the recommendation of the General Manager of the San Francisco Water Department, the City and County of San Francisco grant to the County of Alameda a right of way easement for the construction, maintenance and use of a public road or highway over said parcel of land, which is described as follows:

A parcel of land bounded on the north by County Road No. 3099, on the east by the westerly line of Vallejo street, on the south by lands of the City and County of San Francisco, and on the west by the easterly limits of the Town of Niles, containing 0.081 acres.

Said grant shall be made subject to the following conditions, which shall be accepted by the Board of Supervisors of the County of Alameda before said right of way easement becomes effective, viz.:

First: The County of Alameda shall, at its own expense, construct and maintain a public road or highway over and on the lands above described and shall hold the City and County of San Francisco free from any obligation or expense in connection with the construction, maintenance or repair of such road or highway, the necessity for which may result from any cause whatsoever.

Second: The easement of right of way herein granted shall apply solely to the surface of the land hereinabove described, and the City and County of San Francisco hereby expressly reserves the right at all times to construct, place, maintain, use, repair and replace pipe lines, and any and all water works structures, appurtenances, appliances and equipment, including telegraph, telephone and electric power pole and wire lines, under, across, along and or over the said land hereinbefore described, but any and all such structures, appurtenances and lines shall be in such a position that the construction, maintenance or repair of the same shall interfere as little as possible with the reasonable use and enjoyment of the easement of right of way hereby granted.

Third: The County of Alameda shall hold and save harmless the party of the first part from any and all responsibility due directly or indirectly to the construction, maintenance or use of said highway.

Fourth: The easement of right of way hereby granted is for public road or highway purposes only, and no other rights shall be granted by the County of Alameda in said parcel of land to any person, corporation or municipality without first receiving approval of the City and County of San Francisco. Be it

Further Resolved, That the Mayor and the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco are hereby authorized to execute a deed on behalf of the City and County of San Francisco granting said right of way easement hereinabove mentioned to the County of Alameda, subject to said conditions hereinabove set forth.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Fran-

cisco as follows:

Section 1. Section 2 of Ordinance No. 2297 (New Series), the title of which is recited in the title of this ordinance, is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Section 2. The Civil Service Commission is hereby authorized and directed to provide rules and regulations for each office, board or department respecting the granting of vacations and emergency leaves

of absence, subject to the conditions herein presented, viz.:

No deputy, clerk or employee shall be entitled to an annual vacation unless having been continuously employed for at least one year prior to such vacation, nor shall emergency leaves of absence be granted unless the deputy, clerk or employee has been in the employ of the

City and County for at least one month prior thereto.

Providing that in computing the time of employment of any employee of any public utility heretofore or hereafter acquired by the City, which employment has been continued as provided in Section 11 of Article XIII of the Charter, the time of employment with said utility before the same was acquired by the City, shall, for the purpose of entitling said employee to a vacation, be considered employment with the City and County.

Vacations shall not exceed twelve working days in any calendar

year.

No deputy, clerk or employee shall be entitled to an emergency leave of absence when such absence is caused by his own act, omission or misconduct; nor unless such leave of absence is certified to by the head or secretary of the department or office as not being so caused.

All such annual vacations and leaves of absence shall be reported to the Civil Service Commission in writing, giving the name and period of vacation, within one month after the expiration of such vacation or

leave of absence.

All vacations or leaves of absence may be cancelled at any time by the officer or head of the department under or in which such deputy, clerk or employee is employed.

Bill No. ———, Ordinance No. ——— (New Series), as follows:

Calling a special election in the City and County of San Francisco, and fixing a date for said election, for the purpose of choosing a board of fifteen freeholders, which said freeholders, when chosen by the electors of the City and County of San Francisco, shall prepare and frame a new Charter for said City and County, so that the same may be submitted to the electors of the said City and County, all as provided in Section 8 of Article XI of the Constitution of the State of California.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco

as follows:

Section 1 Whereas, the City and County of San Francisco is a city and county in the State of California, containing a population of more than thirty-live hundred inhabitants, as ascertained by the last preceding census taken under the authority of the Congress of the United States; and

Section 2. Whereas, the said City and County of San Francisco has heretofore adopted a Charter in conformity with the provisions of Section 8 of Article XI of the Constitution of the State of California;

and

Section 3. Whereas, more than thirty years has now elapsed since the original adoption of said Charter, and the same is now, as a result of numerous amendments, in many respects confusing, and contains

provisions which are conflicting and obsolete.

Section 4. The Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco does hereby call a special election, to be held in the City and County of San Francisco on Tuesday, the 26th day of August, 1930, and does hereby fix Tuesday, August 26th, 1930, as the date for a special election, for the election and choosing of a board of fifteen free-holders by the electors of the City and County of San Francisco, which said board of freeholders shall prepare and frame a new Charter for said City and County.

Section 5. That said board of freeholders, when elected and chosen, shall frame and prepare said Charter and cause the same to be submitted to the electors of the City and County of San Francisco for their approval, within the time and in accordance with the provisions

of the Constitution of the State of California.

Section 6. Any person to be eligible for election to said board of freeholders must be a freeholder within the City and County of San Francisco and must, for a period of at least five years prior to the date of his or her candidacy for said office, have been an elector of said City and County.

Section 7. This ordinance shall become effective immediately upon

its passage.

Amending Ordinance Regulating Contractors, Etc.

Bill No. 9252, Ordinance No. ——— (New Series), as follows:

Amending Section 32 of Ordinance No. 5132 (New Series), entitled "Imposing license taxes on certain businesses, callings, trades or employments within the City and County of San Francisco."

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Fran-

cisco as follows:

Section 1. Section 32 of Ordinance No. 5132 (New Series), the title

of which is recited above, is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 32. (a) Every person, firm or corporation engaged in the occupation of and doing business as a contractor, sub-contractor, or as a builder, or engaged in the construction or repair of any building, street, sidewalk, sewer, engineering structure, or any engineering operation, or advertising himself as engaged in or superintending building construction, sewer construction, plumbing construction, street construction, or general construction where the cost or value of the job or the bid tendered exceeds one thousand dollars, shall pay a license fee of twelve and fifty one-hundredths (\$12.50) dollars per quarter.

(b) Every person, firm or corporation so engaged or advertising himself as so engaged in any business or job described as above, where the value or cost of the job or bid tendered is less than one thousand

dollars, shall pay a license fee of five (\$5) dollars per quarter.

(c) Every person, firm or corporation engaged in the business of sign or general painting (except automobile painters) shall pay a license fee of twelve and fifty one-hundredths (\$12.50) dollars per quarter.

(d) Master electricians and master fixture electricians, as described under the provisions of Section 49 of this ordinance, shall pay the license fee provided for in Section 49, and shall thereby be exempt from the license fees imposed in Section 32 of this ordinance,

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Section 2. The Civil Service Commission is hereby authorized and directed to provide rules and regulations for each office, board or department respecting the granting of vacations and emergency leaves of absence, subject to the conditions herein presented, viz.:

No deputy, clerk or employee shall be entitled to an annual vacation unless having been continuously employed for at least one year prior to such vacation, nor shall emergency leaves of absence be granted unless the deputy, clerk or employee has been in the employ of the

City and County for at least one month prior thereto.

Providing that in computing the time of employment of any employee of any public utility heretofore or hereafter acquired by the City, which employment has been continued as provided in Section 11 of Article XIII of the Charter, the time of employment with said utility before the same was acquired by the City, shall, for the purpose of entitling said employee to a vacation, be considered employment with the City and County.

Vacations shall not exceed twelve working days in any calendar

year.

No deputy, clerk or employee shall be entitled to an emergency leave of absence when such absence is caused by his own act, omission or misconduct; nor unless such leave of absence is certified to by the head or secretary of the department or office as not being so caused.

All such annual vacations and leaves of absence shall be reported to the Civil Service Commission in writing, giving the name and period of vacation, within one month after the expiration of such vacation or leave of absence.

All vacations or leaves of absence may be cancelled at any time by the officer or head of the department under or in which such deputy, clerk or employee is employed.

Explanation of Vote.

SUPERVISOR GALLAGHER: In re-ltems 109, 110, 111. It I may be permitted, for the sake of the record, because I have recently gone against a statement taken out of the record here that may have been taken two ways and which was intended only one way. I would like to make my position clear: That, in view of the fact that there has arisen an unexpected claim against the City on the Palace of Fine Arts, and it is contended that the City has not the full and legal right of ownership, or deed of gift, or deed rather, for the building itself, and inasmuch as a claim has been set up in the sum of approximately \$75,000 by those who represent themselves as having received a deed of gift from the Exposition authorities, as 1 understand. 1 am in favor, as you are, of paying every bill legitimately contracted, and even for work under way, even though the controversy has started while the work was in progress. I am opposed, however, to any new contracts, whether for moneys set aside in previous budgets or in this manner, until the question at issue is determined.

These people who have done their work, I believe in their being paid. These people who have in good faith undertaken a contract and proceeded with it, I believe it should be fulfilled. These moneys, however, unexpended for contracts yet to be let. I think the spending of

that money should not be undertaken until this controversy is determined and the Board has full information on it.

Amending Ordinance Regulating Contractors, Etc.

Amending Section 32 of Ordinance No. 5132 (New Series), entitled "Imposing license taxes on certain businesses, callings, trades or employments within the City and County of San Francisco."

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Fran-

cisco as follows:

Section 1. Section 32 of Ordinance No. 5132 (New Series), the title of

which is recited above, is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 32(a). Every person, firm or corporation engaged in the occupation of and doing business as a contractor, sub-contractor, or as a builder, or engaged in the construction or repair of any building, street, sidewalk, sewer, engineering structure, or any engineering operation, or advertising himself as engaged in or superintending building construction, sewer construction, plumbing construction, street construction, or general construction where the cost or value of the work done in any one quarter exceeds one thousand dollars, shall pay a license fee of twelve and fifty one-hundredths (\$12.50) dollars per quarter.

(b) Every person, firm or corporation so engaged or advertising himself as so engaged in any business or job described as above, where the value or cost of the work done in any one quarter is less than one thousand dollars, shall pay a license fee of five (\$5) dollars per quarter.

(c) Every person, firm or corporation engaged in the business of sign or general painting (except automobile painters) shall pay a license fee

of twelve and fifty one-hundredths (\$12.50) dollars per quarter.

(d) Master electricians and master fixture electricians, as described under the provisions of Section 49 of this ordinance, shall pay the license

fee provided for in Section 49, and shall thereby be exempt from the license fees imposed in Section 32 of this ordinance.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Calling Special Election for Selection of Board of Freeholders to Frame New Charter.

Bill No. — , Ordinance No. — (New Series), as follows:

Calling a special election in the City and County of San Francisco, and fixing a date for said election, for the purpose of choosing a board of fifteen freeholders, which said freeholders, when chosen by the electors of the City and County of San Francisco, shall prepare and frame a new Charter for said City and County, so that the same may be submitted to the electors of the said City and County, all as provided in Section 8 of Article XI of the Constitution of the State of California.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco

as follows:

Section 1. Whereas, the City and County of San Francisco is a city and county in the State of California, containing a population of more than thirty-five hundred inhabitants, as ascertained by the last preceding census taken under the authority of the Congress of the United States; and

Section 2. Whereas, the said City and County of San Francisco has heretofore adopted a Charter in conformity with the provisions of Section 8 of Article XI of the Constitution of the State of California;

and

Section 3. Whereas, more than thirty years has now elapsed since the original adoption of said Charter, and the same is now, as a result of numerous amendments, in many respects confusing, and contains

provisions which are conflicting and obsolete.

Section 4. The Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco does hereby call a special election, to be held in the City and County of San Francisco on Tuesday, the 26th day of August, 1930, and does hereby fix Tuesday, August 26th, 1930, as the date for a special election, for the election and choosing of a board of fifteen free-holders by the electors of the City and County of San Francisco, which said board of freeholders shall prepare and frame a new Charter for said City and County.

Section 5. That said board of freeholders, when elected and chosen, shall frame and prepare said Charter and cause the same to be submitted to the electors of the City and County of San Francisco for their approval, within the time and in accordance with the provisions

of the Constitution of the State of California.

Section 6. Any person to be eligible for election to said board of freeholders must be a freeholder within the City and County of San Francisco and must, for a period of at least five years prior to the date of his or her candidacy for said office, have been an elector of said City and County.

Section 7. This ordinance shall become effective immediately upon

its passage.



- (b) Every person, firm or corporation so engaged or advertising himself as so engaged in any business or job described as above, where the value or cost of the work done in any one quarter is less than one thousand dollars, shall pay a license fee of five (\$5) dollars per quarter.
- (c) Every person, firm or corporation engaged in the business of sign or general painting (except automobile painters) shall pay a license fee of twelve and fifty one-hundredths (\$12.50) dollars per quarter.
- (d) Master electricians and master fixture electricians, as described under the provisions of Section 49 of this ordinance, shall pay the license fee provided for in Section 49, and shall thereby be exempt from the license fees imposed in Section 32 of this ordinance.

Section 74. For every person, firm or corporation conducting, managing or carrying on or engaging in any of the businesses, professions or occupations hereinafter in this section enumerated, the annual gross receipts of which business amount to less than \$3,000, \$3 per quarter.

\$3,000 and less than \$5,000, \$4.50 per quarter. \$5,000 and less than \$7,500, \$6 per quarter. \$7,500 and less than \$10,000, \$7.50 per quarter. \$10,000 and less than \$15,000, \$11.25 per quarter. \$15,000 and less than \$20,000, \$15 per quarter. \$20,000 and less than \$25,000, \$18.75 per quarter. \$25,000 and less than \$30,000, \$22,50 per quarter. \$30,000 and less than \$40,000, \$30 per quarter. \$40,000 and less than \$50,000, \$37.50 per quarter. \$50,000 and less than \$60,000, \$45 per quarter. \$60,000 and less than \$70,000, \$52.50 per quarter. \$70,000 and less than \$80,000, \$60 per quarter. \$80,000 and less than \$90,000, \$67.50 per quarter. \$90,000 and less than \$100,000, \$75 per quarter. \$100,000 and less than \$150,000, \$112.50 per quarter. \$150,000 and over, \$125 per quarter,

The license provided for in this section shall be paid by every person, firm or corporation conducting, managing or carrying on or engaged in any of the following businesses, professions or occupations:

Advertising counsel, appraiser, architect, attorney at law, auditor, accountant, bail bond broker, chiropodist, chiropractor, civil, electrical or mechanical engineer, dentist, designer or illustrator, drugless practitioner, geologist, hair dressing and manicuring parlor, interpreter, insurance adjuster, landscape gardener, lapidary, midwife, naturopath, optician, optometrist, oculist, osteopath or osteopathist, physician, surgeon, veterinary.

No license shall be issued under the provisions of this section to any person to practice as a physician and surgeon, osteopath, naturopath, drugless practitioner, chiropractor, chiropodist, midwife or veterinary medicine, or any branch thereof, or to practice halrdressing or manicuring in the City and County of San Francisco, unless such person makes affidavit that he possesses an unexpired and unrevoked license entitling the applicant to practice, from the duly anthorized State Board of Medical Examiners of the State of California, California State Board of Chiropractors, California State Board of Veterinarians, California State Board of Cosmetology, or from any other State

board granting certificates to practice the professions or employments enumerated in this section.

The Tax Collector shall, before issuing any license to engage in the business or occupation of a veterinary under the provisions of this section, require every applicant therefor to make affidavit that he is the person named in the license issued by the Board of Examiners in veterinary medicine or the Board of Medical Examiners of the State

of California.

That nothing in this section contained shall be deemed or construed as applying to any person engaged in any of the professions or occupations hereinbefore enumerated, solely as an employee of any other person, firm or corporation, conducting, managing or carrying on any such business, occupation or profession in the City and County of San Francisco.

Section 2. Ordinances Nos. 5930 (New Series) and 7815 (New Series) are hereby repealed.

Garbage Incinerator.

Consideration of proposed ordinance submitted and recommended by the Public Health Committee (Supervisor Roncovieri dissenting), providing that the Board of Public Works call for bids for the construction and operation of an incinerator, with a recapture clause permitting its eventual taking over by the City, and repealing Ordinance No. 8738 (New Series).

Communications.

The following were presented and read by the Clerk:

Communication from San Francisco Center of the California League of Women Voters, opposing action proposing to rescind ordinance of Supervisor Rossi, providing for plans, etc., for garbage incinerator.

Read and filed.

Communication from Board of Public Works, transmitting copy of report of City Engineer on progress and status of work called for under Section 3 of Ordinance No. 8738 (New Series), relating to plans and estimates for a garbage incinerator. Blue print of test borings also transmitted.

Report of Health Committee.

The following was presented by Supervisor Toner, chairman of the Public Health Committee, and read to the Board:

As Chairman of the Health Committee, with the assistance of my colleagues, I have made an exhaustive study of garbage incinerators for the past two years.

Supervisor Hayden, Supervisor McSheehy, Dr. Hassler, Health Ofticer, and myself made a very extensive trip throughout the entire United States and Canada inspecting various types of incinerators, and I think I am safe in saying that we saw every plant in the United States and Canada that ever made a claim to having merit. This Committee studied not only the various types of incinerators, but also made very thorough inquiries of all the city officials in the cities visited as to the methods they adopted in going about the purchase of their incinerators. In 95 per cent of the cities investigated we found the same procedure was followed, that is, the city authorities pre pared general specifications authorizing the size and type of plant they wished to purchase and then invited the various incinerator companies to submit their own plans and specifications with their bid to construct the plant. In every instance the incinerator company was forced to be responsible, not only for the design and operation of their furnaces, but also to assume the responsibility of the general layout of the buildings and approaches, together with the methods of getting the materials to be burned into the furnaces,

This Board authorized and paid for the expenses of that trip and those three gentlemen, together with myself, returned here and made an honest report of our findings. Based on our investigation, we recommended that the City of San Francisco profit by the experience of other cities and follow the lead of those cities which had been successful in procuring a successful incinerator by the simple process of placing all of the responsibility for the designing, building and operation of the incinerator on the incinerator company receiving the contract.

When this report was presented to this Board certain members of the Board, who frankly admit they have never seen a single incinerator except the old one here in San Francisco, started in to wreek it and block action on it. Their entire claim for justification of this action is based on their purported overwhelming desire to support the Chief Engineer, who frankly admits he has never either designed crobuilt an incinerator or even assisted in the designing or building of an incinerator. On a previous occasion the City's engineer interfered with the design of an incinerator here on Army street and that interference cost the taxpayers of this City over a half million dollars for a failure.

The Chief Engineer oas just recently further demonstrated that questionable efficiency when authorized by the Board to go out in the world and secure outside expert advice to assist him in preparing plans and specifications for San Francisco's new incinerator, he comes back to this Board and tells us he has employed an engineer whose only claim to knowledge of or experience in designing or building incinerators is the experience he gained several years ago in assisting to design and build the old plant on Army street, which never worked and was an absolute failure.

The City Engineer tells us he is 50 per cent finished with the building plans, but has not started nor has any intention of attempting to make any furnace plans. He is making the plans for a building 400 feet long by 125 feet wide and with a very complicated and expensive system of ramps for overhead storage. This system has been obsolete

for years and is condemned by every reputable engineer and incinerator company in the country as being prohibitive in cost of operation. The Chief Engineer is persisting in this design in the face of assurance from several reputable incinerator companies that a building of one-half or less that area would be ample to house an 800-ton incinerator, the size San Francisco wishes to purchase.

It is common practice and common sense employed by every reputable engineering firm in the country in laying out a power plant, pumping station or any kind of factory to first lay out the machinery and equipment in the best possible way and to get economy in operation and then design and build the housing over and around it. The housing or building is of secondary importance and if we had the best building in the world and were unable to economically fit the machinery in it, the building would be useless.

Every large plant in this country, built in recent years, is craneoperated; that is, the materials are carried from the storage bins by machinery instead of being pushed or carried there by hand labor. I don't believe any intelligent person today will argue that hand labor can compete with modern machinery, yet that is just what the Chief Engineer is asking us to do.

When the Chief Engineer's plans are finished it is almost a foregone conclusion that on account of the excessive and unnecessary size of the building and ramps, together with the very expensive method of handling all of the material by hand labor, the bids received will be prohibitive in cost, both of construction and operation, and wili have to be rejected, leaving us right where we started, minus \$25,000 more of the taxpayers' money gone to pay for the engineer's experiment.

I have been criticized, both in the press and by individuals, for wanting to take this out of the Engineer's hands, and I have been accused of trying to delay the building of this incinerator plant. l realize this criticism is made by the press and public through lack of knowledge of all of the facts, and I am making this statement in order that everyone may be enlightened.

I am absolutely positive in my knowledge that if this Board will advertise for bids for the various incinerator companies to submit their own plans and specifications, we can get bids in here and have this contract let within thirty days from the date of the advertisement.

Now, let us place this responsibility where it belongs, and if you gentlemen are sincere in your desire for action, let us order the Board of Public Works to advertise for these bids.

Resolution.

The following resolution was read by Supervisor Toner: Whereas, past experience has demonstrated that the present incinerator of garbage owned by the City and County of San Francisco is inadequate to reduce and dispose of garbage collected and that future needs must be eared for: and

Whereas, the people of this City and County have expressed themselves as being in favor of allowing a private party, firm or corporation to build an adequate and efficient incinerator for the reduction

and disposal of such garbage; and

Whereas, it appears desirable that applications and bids for the building of such garbage incinerator for an exclusive franchise be received for said purposes from private parties, firms or corporations:

now, therefore, be it

Resolved, By the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco, State of California, in regular meeting assembled this 23d day of June, 1930, that such applications and bids for said purposes be invited from private parties, firms and corporations, so that an exclusive franchise may be legally granted by said City and County of San Francisco; and be it

Further Resolved, That all such applications and bids be received in accordance with the provisions of the Broughton Act, approved March 22, 1905, and entitled "An act providing for the sale of street railroad and other franchises in counties and municipalities and providing conditions for the granting of such franchises by legislative or other governing bodies and repealing conflicting acts;" and be it

Further Resolved, That such franchise bids and applications be for a period of 25 years and that an incinerator is to be crected at the bidder's sole expense, either on the site of said present incinerator or any other site, to be designated and furnished by said City and County. Said plant shall be sufficient to reduce to a mineral ash 800 tons of garbage within 24 hours; bidders shall have access to and use of all maps and borings possessed by the City and County, and of such maps and information as may be in the possession of said City and County, concerning the general nature of the soil of the immediate vicinity of the proposed site; plans and specifications of said proposed plant shall be furnished by each bidder at no cost to said City and County and said plans and specifications shall substantially conform to general plans and specifications prepared by the Board of Public Works of said City and County; each bidder must in such applications and bids state the price per ton proposed to be charged per ton for reducing and finally disposing of such garbage, and there shall be contained in said application the total amount offered the said City and County for such exclusive tranchise; said applications shall be accompanied by cash or certified check of 10 per cent of the amount so offered for said tranchise; said application shall state the price at which the said City and County shall pay as a recapture or purchase price of said plant and shall contain an agreement that said City and County may, at its discretion, recapture or purchase said plant and that thereupon said franchise may be revoked and cancelled by said City and County without compensation; and be it

Further Resolved, That all applications and bids so received shall embrace the foregoing particulars, and each of them, and shall be filed with the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors of said City and County within thirty days from the passage of this resolution, and said Clerk is hereby ordered to transmit said bids so received to the Board of Public Works of the City and County of San Francisco, and said Board is hereby directed to receive said bids and applications and report thereon to said Board of Supervisors within ten days from the final date allowed for receipt of same, and in said report shall convey such information to said Board of Supervisors as may enable said

Board to so grant said franchise.

Calling a special election in the City and County of San Francisco, and fixing a date for said election, for the purpose of choosing a board of fifteen freeholders, which said freeholders, when chosen by the electors of the City and County of San Francisco, shall prepare and frame a new Charter for said City and County, so that the same may be submitted to the electors of the said City and County, all as provided in Section 8 of Article XI of the Constitution of the State of California.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco

as follows:

Whereas, the City and County of San Francisco is a Section 1. city and county in the State of California, containing a population of more than thirty-five hundred inhabitants, as ascertained by the last preceding census taken under the authority of the Congress of the United States: and

Section 2. Whereas, the said City and County of San Francisco has heretofore adopted a Charter in conformity with the provisions of Section 8 of Article XI of the Constitution of the State of California;

and

Section 3. Whereas, more than thirty years has now elapsed since the original adoption of said Charter, and the same is now, as a result of numerous amendments, in many respects confusing, and contains provisions which are conflicting and obsolete.

Section 4. The Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco does hereby call a special election, to be held in the City and County of San Francisco on Tuesday, the 26th day of August, 1930, and does hereby fix Tuesday, August 26th, 1930, as the date for a special election, for the election and choosing of a board of fifteen freeholders by the electors of the City and County of San Francisco, which said board of freeholders shall prepare and frame a new Charter for said City and County.

Section 5. That said board of freeholders, when elected and chosen, shall frame and prepare said Charter and cause the same to be submitted to the electors of the City and County of San Francisco for their approval, within the time and in accordance with the provisions

of the Constitution of the State of California.

Any person to be eligible for election to said board of freeholders must be a freeholder within the City and County of San Francisco and must, for a period of at least five years prior to the date of his or her candidacy for said office, have been an elector of said City and County.

Section 7. This ordinance shall become effective immediately ${\tt upon}$ its passage.

Section 74. For every person, firm or corporation conducting, managing or carrying on or engaging in any of the businesses, professions

or occupations hereinafter in this section enumerated, the annual gross receipts of which business amount to less than \$3,000, \$3 per quarter.

\$3,000 and less than \$5,000, \$4.50 per quarter. \$5,000 and less than \$7,500. \$6 per quarter. \$7,500 and less than \$10,000, \$7.50 per quarter. \$10,000 and less than \$15,000, \$11.25 per quarter. \$15,000 and less than \$20,000, \$11.25 per quarter. \$20,000 and less than \$25,000, \$18.75 per quarter. \$25,000 and less than \$25,000, \$18.75 per quarter. \$25,000 and less than \$30,000, \$22.50 per quarter. \$30,000 and less than \$40,000, \$30 per quarter. \$40,000 and less than \$50,000, \$37.50 per quarter. \$50,000 and less than \$60,000, \$45 per quarter. \$60,000 and less than \$70,000, \$52.50 per quarter. \$70,000 and less than \$90,000, \$60 per quarter. \$90,000 and less than \$90,000, \$75 per quarter. \$90,000 and less than \$100,000, \$75 per quarter. \$100,000 and less than \$150,000, \$112.50 per quarter. \$150,000 and over, \$125 per quarter.

The license provided for in this section shall be paid by every person, firm or corporation conducting, managing or carrying on or engaged in any of the following businesses, professions or occupations:

Advertising counsel, appraiser, architect, attorney at law, auditor, accountant, bail bond broker, chiropodist, chiropractor, civil, electrical or mechanical engineer, dentist, designer or illustrator, drugless practitioner, geologist, hair dressing and manicuring parlor, interpreter, insurance adjuster, landscape gardener, lapidary, midwife, naturopath, optician, optometrist, oculist, osteopath or osteopathist, physician, surgeon, veterinary.

physician, surgeon, veterinary.

No license shall be issued under the provisions of this section to any person to practice as a physician and surgeon, osteopath, naturopath, drugless practitioner, chiropractor, chiropodist, midwife or veterinary medicine, or any branch thereof, or to practice hairdressing or manicuring in the City and County of San Francisco, unless such person makes affidavit that he possesses an unexpired and unrevoked license entitling the applicant to practice, from the duly authorized State Board of Medical Examiners of the State of California, California State Board of Chiropractors, California State Board of Veterinarians. California State Board of Cosmetology, or from any other State board granting certificates to practice the professions or employments enumerated in this section.

The Tax Collector shall, before issuing any license to engage in the business or occupation of a veterinary under the provisions of this section, require every applicant therefor to make affidavit that he is the person named in the license issued by the Board of Examiners in veterinary medicine or the Board of Medical Examiners of the State of California.

That nothing in this section contained shall be deemed or construed as applying to any person engaged in any of the professions or occupations hereinbefore enumerated, solely as an employee of any other person, firm or corporation, conducting, managing or carrying on any such business, occupation or profession in the City and County of San Francisco.

Section 2. Ordinances Nos. 5930 (New Series) and 7815 (New Serles) are hereby repealed.

Calling Special Election for Freeholders for Charter Revision.

Section 2. Whereas, the said City and County of San Francisco has heretofore adopted a Charter in conformity with the provisions of Section 8 of Article X1 of the Constitution of the State of California: and

Section 3. Whereas, more than thirty years has now elapsed since the original adoption of said Charter, and the same is now, as a result of numerous amendments, in many respects confusing, and contains

provisions which are conflicting and obsolete.

Section 4. The Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco does hereby call a special election to be held in the City and County of San Francisco on Tuesday, the 26th day of August, 1930, and does hereby fix Tuesday, August 26, 1930, as the date for a special election for the election and choosing of a board of fifteen freeholders by the electors of the City and County of San Francisco, which said Board of Freeholders shall prepare and frame a new Charter for said City and County.

Section 5. That said Board of Freeholders, when elected and chosen, shall frame and prepare said Charter and cause the same to be submitted to the electors of the City and County of San Francisco for their approval, within the time and in accordance with the provisions

of the Constitution of the State of California.

Section 6. Any person to be eligible for election to said Board of Freeholders must be a freeholder within the City and County of San Francisco and must, for a period of at least five years prior to the date of his or her candidacy for said office, have been an elector of said City and County.

Section 7. This ordinance shall become effective immediately upon its passage.



Governing the Handling, Keeping, Storing or Using of Nitro-Cellulose Material in the Form of a Sheet Film, or Any Other Form, in or Upon Any Building or Premises in the City and County of San Francisco.

On recommendation of Public Health Committee:

Bill No. 9291, Ordinance No. ——— (New Series), as follows:

Governing the handling, keeping, storing or using of nitro-cellulose material in the form of a sheet film, or any other form, in or upon any building or premises in the City and County of San Francisco.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Fran-

cisco as follows:

- Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to hereafter handle, keep, store or use nitro-cellulose material in the form of a sheet film, or any other form, in or upon any building or premises within the limits of the City and County of San Francisco without first obtaining a written permit therefor from the Fire Marshal. All such nitro-cellulose material shall be handled, kept, stored or used upon conditions and under such regulations as may be required by the Fire Marshal. Nothing in this section shall be construed as applying to:
- (a) Film for amateur photographic use in original packages of "roll" and "film pack" films when kept or stored in retail establishments for sale to the ultimate consumer or when kept, stored or used by a consumer.
- (b) Acetate-cellulose material in the form of a sheet film, or any other form.

(c) Motion picture film regulated by any other ordinance.

(d) Dental X-ray film when handled, kept or stored for purposes other than sale.

Section 2. Provided, however, that after the passage of this ordinance it shall be unlawful for the person or authority in charge of maintaining, operating or conducting any hospital, clinic, dispensary school, college, home, asylum or similar institutions, to bring into, expose or develop or allow to be brought into, exposed or developed in or upon any of the above mentioned premises any nitro-cellulose X-ray film. Any such nitro-cellulose X-ray film that may be in or upon any of the above mentioned premises and already exposed and developed at the time this ordinance becomes effective, shall be handled, kept, stored or used upon conditions and under such regulations as may be required by the Fire Marshal, but none shall be handled, kept, stored or used after July 1, 1935.

Section 3. The Fire Marshal shall have power to revoke or suspend any permit granted under the terms of this ordinance for violations

of any of its provisions.

Section 4. Any person, firm or corporation who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance or fail to comply therewith, or who shall violate or fail to comply with any order or regulation made thereunder, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction thereof, shall be punished by a fine not exceeding five hundred (500) dollars or by imprisonment in the County Jail for not more than six (6) months, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

Section 5. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force imme-

diately.

Regulating the Establishment and Maintenance of Hospitals, Health Institutions or Nursing Homes; Repealing Certain Conflicting Ordinances and Providing Penalties.

Also, Bill No. 9292, Ordinance No. ———— (New Series), as follows: Regulating the establishment and maintenance of hospitals, health institutions or nursing homes; repealing certain conflicting ordinances, and providing penalties.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Fran-

cisco as follows:

Section 1. No person, firm, corporation or association shall hereafter erect, establish or maintain any hospital, health institution or nursing-home without first obtaining a permit from the Board of

Health as herein provided.

Section 2. For the purposes of this ordinance, a health institution or nursing-home is hereby defined to be a building or structure having accommodations for more than three sick, invalid, infirm, aged, convalescent, mentally-ill, feeble-minded, incompetent, decrepit, disabled, injured, infected or chronically ill persons, where a charge is made for the care of such persons, and whether or not, in the care or treatment of said persons, use is made of drugs, medicines, surgical, electrical or

physio-therepeutical procedures.

Section 3. The Board of Health shall have power to and shall issue permits for hospitals, health institutions or nursing-homes hereafter established. The Board of Health shall issue a permit to each hospital, health institution and nursing-home existing at the time this ordinance becomes effective, provided that said hospital, health institution or nursing-home is erected in compliance with existing fire, health and safety laws, and if not so erected, if compliance is had therewith within thirty days after written notice by the Board of Health of the particulars wherein noncompliance exists. Every permit shall specify the name and residence of the licensed person, firm, association or corporation, the location of the structure and the number of persons permitted to be housed or cared for therein. Any permit shall be revocable for cause by the said Board of Health, after hearing before

said Board upon service upon the holder of the permit, not less than ten days before the hearing, of a written notice of time and place of hearing and a written statement of the charges, in any case where the provisions of this ordinance, or of any fire, health or safety law has been violated and said violation has continued for more than ten days after service upon the holder of said permit of a written statement by the Board of Health of the particulars wherein said violation exists.

Section 4. No hospital, health institution or nursing-home hereafter established shall be housed in a structure of frame construction, if said structure is designed to have accommodations for more than five inmates. Any such hospital, health institution or nursing-home hereafter established, and having accommodations for not more than five inmates, may be of frame construction if the same complies with all of the regulations and laws of the Building Department of the Board of Public Works, the Bureau of Fire Prevention and Public Safety and the regulations of the Board of Health, as of the date of application for a permit. No inmate shall be housed or cared for in any attic, basement or cellar.

Section 5. The holder of a permit shall keep a register, in form approved by the Board of Health, wherein shall be entered the names and addresses, date of entry and date of discharge, of all inmates, and also the name and address of the nearest of kin of such inmates.

Section 6. No permit issued pursuant to this ordinance shall be sold, assigned or transferred without written permission of the Board

of Health.

Section 7. The Board of Health, its officers and representatives, and all duly appointed or elected health officers, shall at all reasonable times have the right to enter and inspect the said hospitals, health institutions and nursing-homes, to inspect the permit and register thereof, and to require compliance with this ordinance, and to prescribe such rules and regulations as may be deemed best for the governing of such institutions.

Section 8. Any person, firm, corporation or association violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine not to exceed five hundred (\$500.00) dollars, or by imprisonment in the County Jail for not more than six (6) months, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

Ordinance No. 1061, entitled "Regulating the Width of Sidewalks," approved December 18, 1903, be and is hereby amended in accordance with the communication of the Board of Public Works, tiled in this office June 19, 1930, by adding thereto a new section to be numbered Ten Hundred and Ninety-four, to read as follows:

Section 1094. The width of sidewalks on Thirty-sixth avenue between Lincoln way and Vicente street shall be fifteen (15) feet.

Report on Hetch Hetchy Inspection Trip.

The following was presented, read, and ordered filed:

Gentlemen: I herewith submit the following report on the inspection trip of members of the Board of Supervisors and others over the properties of the San Francisco Water Department and Hetch Hetchy

Project on June 15, 16, 17 and 18, 1930.

The party left the City Hall Sunday morning, June 15, at 9 o'clock, motored over Mission street to Colma; thence over the Skyline boulevara, inspecting San Andreas Gate House. San Andreas Reservoir, Crystal Springs Dam, Crystal Springs Reservoir, and the San Francisco Health Farm; thence via Redwood City, Dumbarton Bridge, Niles Canyon to Alameda Creek Camp, inspecting the water temple at Sunol on the way. From a point of vantage on the road the Irvington Portal Camp was pointed out. At Alameda Camp lunch was served, and after lunch Mr. C. R. Rankin escorted the party into the East Alameda Creek Heading, where an inspection of the 9000 feet of tunnel now driven was made.

The party then motored to Livermore, where they inspected the shops, office and headquarters building. Thence to Modesto for the night. On Monday, June 16, the party motored to Moccasin, where inspection was made of the Moccasin Dam and Moccasin Power House. Lunch was served at Moccasin Clubhouse. After lunch the party motored via Carl Inn and Mather to the O'Shaughnessy Dam, where the dam was inspected and the location of the proposed tunnel on the north side of the Hetch Hetchy Reservoir was pointed out, and also the necessity of starting this work at the earliest possible moment. The party then returned to the San Francisco Municipal Recreation Camp, at Mather for the night, where comfortable accommodations were had.

On Tuesday, June 17, the party motored to Yosemite Valley, arriving in time for lunch and remaining at the Ahwahnee Hotel for the night. The principal attractions of Yosemite were visited during the afternoon and evening. On Wednesday, June 18, the opening of the State Convention of the County Boards of Supervisors was attended. The party left for home at 3 p. m. on Wednesday, June 18, and arrived in

San Francisco at midnight.

On behalf of myself and colleagues I wish to express our sincere thanks and appreciation for the splendid manner in which the City Engineer's office, particularly Mr. Eugene Riordan, attended to all the details of the trip, which was not only an enjoyable one, but very instructive as well, as it gave the Supervisors a splendid opportunity to see the progress that is being made in all branches of the Hetch Hetchy Project.



Amendment of Traffic Ordinance.

On recommendation of Traffic and Safety Committee.

Bill No. ———, Ordinance No. ——— (New Series), as follows:

Amending Section 1 of Article I, Sections 2, 3 and 6 of Article II, Section 9 of Article III, Sections 15, 21, 22, 24 and 26 of Article IV, Sections 36 and 37 of Article V, Section 45 of Article VI, of Ordinance No. 7691 (New Series), entitled "An ordinance regulating traffic upon the public streets and repealing all ordinances inconsistent herewith," adding a new section to be known as 37½ of Article V, and repealing Ordinance No. 8767 (New Series), in effect May 31, 1930.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco as follows:

Section 1. Section 1 of Article I, Sections 2, 3 and 6 of Article II, Section 9 of Article III, Sections 15, 21, 22, 24 and 26 of Article IV, Sections 36 and 37 of Article V, Section 45 of Article VI, of Ordinance No. 7691 (New Series), the title of which is recited above, are hereby amended to read as follows, and there is added thereto a new section to be known as Section $37\frac{1}{2}$ of Article V:

ARTICLE I.

Definitions.

Section 1. Whenever in this ordinance the following terms are used, they shall have the meanings respectively ascribed to them in this section:

Street—Every way set apart for public travel except alleyways, bridle paths and foot paths.

Roadway—That portion of a street between the regularly established curb lines.

Alley—A street with a roadway of less than twenty (20) feet.

Blind Alley—An alley which has only one end available for ingress or egress.

Sidewalk—That portion of a street between the curb lines and the adjacent property lines.

Intersection—The area embraced within the prolongation of the lateral eurb lines or, if none, then the lateral boundary lines of the traversable roadways of two or more public streets or highways which join one another at an angle whether or not one such street or highway crosses the other.

Crosswalk—That portion of the roadway included within the prolongation of curb and property lines at street intersections, and other places marked in accordance with the provisions of this ordinance.

Safety Zone—That marked portion of a roadway preserved for the exclusive use of pedestrians.

Loading Zone—That space adjacent to a curb reserved for the exclusive use of vehicles to load or unload passengers or materials.

Passenger Loading Zone—The space adjacent to the curb reserved for the exclusive use of vehicles to load or unload passengers.

Vehicles—Every device or animal by which any person or property is or may be transported or drawn upon a street, except devices moved by human power or used exclusively upon rails. For the purpose of this ordinance a bicycle shall be deemed a vehicle.

Street Cars—Every device traveling exclusively upon rails when upon or crossing a street, other than devices propelled by steam.

Pedestrian-Any person afoot.

Operator—Any person who is in actual physical control of a vehicle or street car.

Traffic-Vehicles and street cars, either singly or together, while using any street for purposes of travel.

Central Traffic District—That portion of this city bounded by and including the following parts of streets:

Mission street from the east line of First street to the west line of Sixth street: Sixth street from the south line of Mission street to the south line of Market street; the intersection of Sixth street, Market street, Golden Gate avenue and Taylor street; Taylor street from the north line of Golden Gate avenue to the north line of Sutter street; Sutter street from the west line of Taylor street to the east line of Grant avenue; Grant avenue from the south line of Sutter street to the north line of California street; California street from the west line of Grant avenue to the south line of Market street; Market street; First street from the north line of California street to the west line of First street; First street from the north line of Market street to the south line of Mission street.

Business District—The territory contiguous to a street when fifty per cent (50%) or more of the frontage thereon for a distance of three hundred (300) feet or more is occupied by buildings in use for retail or wholesale business, also, any territory contiguous to a street which is immediately adjacent to or a continuation of a street within a business district when such territory is so designated by the Police Department.

Right of Way. The privilege of the immediate use of the street,

Park—To stand a vehicle for a period of time greater than is reasonably necessary for the actual loading or unloading of persons or materials.

Official Warning and Direction SIgns—All warning and direction signs and signals not inconsistent with this ordinance heretofore and hereafter placed or erected under this ordinance or by authority of the Board of Supervisors.

ARTICLE II.

Authority of Police Traffic Signs and Signals.

Section 2. Obedience to Police—Officers of the Police Department are hereby authorized to direct, control, divert and regulate all traffic by means of officers or visible or audible signals, and it shall be unlawful for any person to refuse or fail to comply with any lawful order, signal or direction of a traffic or police officer. It shall be unlawful for any person to direct or attempt to direct traffic unless authorized to do so by order of the Chief of Police.

It shall be unlawful for any person in charge of any vehicle standing along or near the curb in any street within the Central Traffic District or Business District to fail, refuse or neglect to remove such vehicle from said curb when requested to do so by any traffic or police

officer.

Any police officer may remove, or cause to be removed, any standing vehicle or vehicles, whether occupied or not, from any street or alley to the nearest street or alley, to accommodate the necessity for such removal, in the following cases:

(1) When a public emergency requires such removal;

(2) When a vehicle is unlawfully parked so as to obstruct the free and lawful passage of vehicular or pedestrian traffic.

Section 3. Signs—The Board of Supervisors shall by resolution determine and designate the character and location of all official warning and direction signs and signals. The Police Department shall make recommendations to the said Board of Supervisors as to the location of such official warning and direction signs and signals. Subject to this selection, the Police Department is hereby authorized, and as to those signs required hereunder it shall be its duty to cause to be placed and maintained all official warning and direction signs and signals. All signs authorized and required hereunder for a particular purpose shall be uniform.

No provision of this ordinance for which signs are required shall be enforceable against the alleged violator if at the time and place of the alleged violation the sign herein required is not in proper position and sufficiently legible to be seen by an ordinary observant person.

Section 6. Crosswalks—The Police Department is hereby authorized and required to cause to be established and maintained upon the surface of the roadway, by appropriate devices, marks or white lines, crosswalks at all places where in its opinion there is particular danger to pedestrians crossing the roadway.

ARTICLE III.

Pedestrians.

Section 9. Pedestrian's Right of Way at Intersection.

(a) It shall be unlawful for the operator of any vehicle to drive into any crosswalk which is marked as provided in Section 6 of this ordinance while there is in such crosswalk upon the half of the roadway upon which such vehicle is traveling any pedestrian engaged in crossing the roadway until such pedestrian shall have passed beyond the path of said vehicle.

(b) It shall be unlawful for the operator of any vehicle to drive into any unmarked crosswalk while there is in such crosswalk upon the half of the roadway upon which such vehicle is traveling any pedestrian engaged in crossing the roadway until such pedestrian shall have passed beyond the path of said vehicle, when the pedestrian shall indicate his intention to cross by a timely and continuous warning by holding up his hand, palm out toward approaching traffic.

(c) The operator of a vehicle shall stop before entering any crosswalk when any other vehicle proceeding in the same direction is stopped at such crosswalk for the purpose of permitting a pedestrian

to pass.

(d) The foregoing provisions of this section shall not apply at intersections where traffic is being directed by an officer or a traffic stop and go signal, at which intersections the rights of pedestrians and operators of vehicles shall be exercised under the direction of the officer or traffic signals.

ARTICLE IV.

Rules for Driving-Location of Turning Markers.

Section 15. The Police Department is hereby authorized, and as to those intersections mentioned in paragraph 1 of this section it shall be its duty to cause to be placed, turning markers in intersections as follows:

(1) Within intersections where either intersecting roadway is less than sixty (60) feet in width and intersections where streets meet at other than right angles and in intersections where one street terminates in another, a marker shall be placed at every intersection of the medial line of each street, with the prolongation of the curb lines of the intersecting street; or at the intersection of the medial line of the street with the prolongation of the property lines of the intersecting street, or as near the intersecting points of said lines as may be practicable.

(2) Intersections other than those mentioned in paragraph 1 may be marked as provided in paragraph 1, or a single marker may be placed within such intersection at the intersection of the medial lines

of the intersecting streets.

Section 21. Vehicles shall not be driven or parked on sidewalks or in safety zones. The operator of a vehicle shall not drive within any sidewalk area except at a permanent or temporary driveway, nor upon any portion of the roadway which is designated and marked as a safety zone; nor shall any operator park any rehicle within or upon any sidewalk area.

The Police Department is hereby authorized to cause to be established and maintained by signs, paint marks or other material, safety zones at such street car stops, and at such other places as in its dis-

cretion require such safety zones.

Section 22. Traffic Lanes—The Police Department is hereby authorized to cause to be marked traffic lanes upon the roadway where a regular alignment of traffic is necessary. Where such lanes have been marked in accordance with law and signs have been erected instructing the operators to keep in line it shall be unlawful for any operator to fail to keep his vehicle within the designated boundaries.

Arterial Streets.

Section 24. The following streets and parts of streets are hereby declared to constitute arterial streets for the purpose of this section: Alemany boulevard from the west line of Bay Shore boulevard to the midline of San Jose avenue:

Army street from the west line of Third street to the east line of Potrero avenue, and from the west line of Potrero avenue to the east

line of Mission street;

Bay Shore boulevard from the west line of San Bruno avenue to the

County line of San Francisco;

Bay street from the center line of Columbus avenue to the east line of Van Ness avenue, and from the west line of Van Ness avenue to the west line of Fillmore street;

Bernal avenue southerly from the midline of Randall street to San Jose avenue, thence on San Jose avenue to the north line of Sagamore street, and from the south line of Alemany boulevard to the City and County line of San Francisco;

Bush street from the east line of Grant avenue to the east line of Van Ness avenue, and from the west line of Van Ness avenue to the

east line of Presidio avenue;

California street from the east line of Grant avenue to the east line of Van Ness avenue, and from the west line of Van Ness avenue to the west line of Arguello boulevard;

Cortland avenue from the west line of Bay Shore boulevard to the east line of Mission street;

Fell street from the west line of Polk street to the east line of Van Ness avenue, and from the west line of Van Ness avenue to the west line of Stanyan street;

Fulton street from the west line of Franklin street to the east line of the Great Highway;

Geary street from the west line of Presidio avenue to Point Lobos avenue, thence along Point Lobos avenue from Geary street to the Great Highway;

Great Highway from Point Lobos avenue to the north line of Sloat boulevard;

Howard street from the north line of Thirteenth street to the north line of Army street;

Junipero Serra boulevard from the west line of Portola drive to the

City and County line of San Francisco;

Lincoln way from the east line of the Great Highway to the west line of Third avenue, thence on the Kezar Stadium road in Golden Gate Park to the west line of the intersecting roadway, approximately 500 feet westerly of Stanyan street;

Lombard street from the west line of Van Ness avenue to the west

line of Lyon street;

Market street from the west line of Van Ness avenue to Portola drive, thence on Portola drive to the east line of Claremont boulevard, and on Portola drive from the west line of Claremont boulevard to the main roadway of Junipero Serra boulevard;

Mission street from the west line of Valencia street to the City and

County line of San Francisco;

Monterey boulevard from the west line of San Jose avenue to Santa Clara avenue, thence on Santa Clara avenue to the south line of Portola drive;

Nineteenth avenue from the north line of Lincoln way to the west

line of Junipero Serra boulevard;

Ocean avenue from the east line of the main roadway of Junipero Serra boulevard to the west line of San Jose avenue, from the east line of San Jose avenue to the west line of Alemany boulevard, and from the east line of Alemany boulevard to the west line of Mission street;

Pine street from the east line of Grant avenue to the east line of

Van Ness avenue:

Post street from the west line of Van Ness avenue to the west line of Presidio avenue:

Potrero avenue from the north line of Division street to the west line of San Bruno avenue:

Seventh avenue from the south line of Lincoln way to Laguna Honda boulevard, thence on Laguna Honda boulevard to Dewey boulevard, thence on Dewey boulevard to Claremont boulevard, thence on Claremont boulevard to the center line of Portola drive;

Sickles avenue from the west line of Alemany boulevard to Sagamore street, thence on Sagamore street to Alemany boulevard, and thence on Alemany boulevard to the east line of Junipero Serra boule-

vard;

Silver avenue from the east line of Alemany boulevard to the west line of Mission street, and from the east line of Mission street to the

west line of Bay Shore boulevard;

Sloat boulevard from the east line of the Great Highway to the west line of Nineteenth avenue and from the east line of Nineteenth avenue to the west line of Portola drive;

Tenth street from the south line of Market street to the north line of Division street:

Third street from the south line of Channel street to the east line of

Bay Shore boulevard;

Twenty-fourth avenue from the south line of Geary street to the south line of Fulton street, thence on the roadway through Golden Gate Park to the north line of Lincoln way at Nineteenth avenue:

Twenty-fourth street from the west line of Dolores street to the east

line of Hoffman avenue;

Valencia street from the south line of Market street to the midline of Mission street:

Van Ness avenue from the south line of North Point street to the north line of Market street and from the south line of Market street to the center line of Howard street.

Every operator of a vehicle or street car, cable car excepted, traversing any street intersecting any arterial street, shall bring such vehicle or street car to a full stop at the place where such street meets the prolongation of the nearer property line of such arterial street, or at such other place as may be indicated by a sign erected in accordance with this section, subject, however, to the directions of any stop-and-go signal or police officer at such intersection.

The Police Department is hereby authorized and required to cause to be placed and maintained, upon each and every street intersecting an arterial street, and at or near the property line of the arterial

street, suitable signs bearing the word "Stop."

One-Way Streets.

Section 26. Between the hours of seven (7) a.m. and six (6) p. m. of any day, excepting Sundays and legal holidays, it shall be unlawful for the operator of any vehicle to drive said vehicle in any part of any of the following streets except in the direction indicated herein:

Southerly in Annie street between Market street and Mission street; Southerly in Belden street between Pine street and Bush street; Westerly in Brosnan street between Valencia street and Guerrero

street;

Easterly on Campton place between Stockton street and Grant avenue; Northerly in Capp street between Mission street and Twenty-sixth street:

Easterly in Clay street between Mason street and The Embarcadero; Southerly in Claude Lane between Bush street and Sutter street; Westerly in Commercial street between The Embarcadero and Grant

Westerly in Halleck street between Front street and Leldesdorff street: Easterly in Jackson street between The Embarcadero and Columbus avenue:

Easterly in Jessie street between First street and Ninth street;

Southerly in Leidesdorff street between Clay street and Pine street; Westerly in Maiden lane from Kearny street to Grant avenue and easterly from Stockton street to Grant avenue;

Westerly in Merchant street between Front street and Kearny street; Westerly in Minna street between First street and Ninth street;

Easterly in Mint street between Jessie street and Fifth street: Westerly in Natoma street between First street and Ninth street;

Westerly in Oregon street between The Embarcadero and Battery street:

Southerly in Quincy street between California street and Pine street; Westerly in Sacramento street between The Embarcadero and Mason

Southerly in Spring street between Sacramento street and California

Southerly in St. Anne place between California street and Pine

Easterly in Stevenson street between First street and Ninth street; Southerly in Trinity place between Bush street and Sutter street;

Westerly in Washington street between The Embarcadero and Montgomery street.

Suitable signs shall be erected and maintained at all intersections of said parts of streets indicating the provisions of this section.

ARTICLE V.

Stopping, Standing and Parking-Stopping Prohibited in Specified Places—Standing for Loading Only in Certain Places.

During the times specified herein it shall be unlaw-Section 36 (a.) ful for an operator to stand a passenger vehicle for a period of time longer than is necessary for the loading or unloading of passengers, provided such loading or unloading shall not consume more than three minutes, except in passenger loading zones; nor for an operator to stand any commercial vehicle for a period of time longer than it is necessary to load, unload and deliver materials, provided that the loading, unloading and delivery of said materials shall not consume more than twenty minutes, in any of the following places:

(1) In any public alley, other than the north side of Merchant. street between Kearny street and Montgomery street, in the Central Traffic District or in any business district during any hour of the day

or night.

(2) At any place not to exceed one hundred (100) feet from the intersection of any street with the southerly property line of Market street, from The Embarcadero to Van Ness avenue, between the hours of seven (7) a.m. and six (6) p.m. of any day; at any place not to exceed one hundred (100) feet from the prolongation of the northerly and westerly property lines, at intersections immediately adjacent to Market stret, of those streets intersecting Market street from the the hours of seven (7) a. m. and six (6) p. m. of any day.

(3) At any place between the portal of any tunnel and seventy-five

(75) feet therefrom at any hour of any day.

(4) At any place where the grade of the roadway exceeds twenty (20) per cent.

(5) In any loading zone duly established before the entrances to the following places:

Before the entrance to a hospital, day or night;

Before the entrance to a police station, day or night;

Before the entrance to a hotel, day or night;

Before the passenger entrance to a theater during performance;

Before the entrance to a church during services.

In loading zones other than those above specified, from seven (7) a. m. to six (6) p. m. on any day excepting Sundays and legal holidays.

(b) It shall be unlawful for any operator of a vehicle to stand said vehicle in a duly established taxicab stand; provided, however, that this provision shall not apply to the operators of duly licensed taxicabs authorized to occupy said stands.

(c) During the times specified in subsection (a) of this section, passenger vehicles shall not stand longer than five (5) minutes in a passenger loading zone, and it shall be unlawful to stand any com-

mercial vehicle in such zone.

The Police Department shall cause to be placed and maintained suitable signs to designate the provisions of this section. The Board of Supervisors shall designate the location of loading zones and passenger loading zones as defined by Section 1 of this ordinance, provided that a curb space of not to exceed fifty (50) per cent of the total curb length of any street between intersections may be reserved for loading zones and passenger loading zones. A curb space not to exceed one hundred (100) feet may be reserved temporarily or in an emergency by the Police Department at any place where required by public convenience.

Parking Prohibited on Certain Streets, 7 A. M. to 6 P. M. Section 37. Between the hours of seven (7) a. m. and six (6) p. m. of any day, excepting Sundays and legal holidays, it shall be unlawful for the operator of a vehicle to stop said vehicle for a period of time longer than is necessary for the actual loading or unloading and delivery of passengers or materials in any of the following places:

Annie street, Anthony street, Austin street, Campton place, Cedar street. Clementina street, Cortland avenue on the north side between Mission street and Folsom street, Ecker street, Elm street, Fern street, Hemlock street, Holland court, Ivy street, Linden street, Maiden lane, Minna street, Mint street on the east, south and north sides, Monroe street, Montgomery street between Market and California streets, Myrtle street, Natoma street, Olive street, Pacific avenue on the north side between Columbus avenue and Van Ness avenue, Redwood street, Tehama street. Willow street.

Signs shall be erected and maintained not more than two hundred (200) feet apart in each block designating the provisions of this

section.

Parking Prohibited on Certain Streets, Day or Night.

Section 371/2. It shall be unlawful for the driver of any vehicle to stop the same or park for a longer period of time than is necessary for the actual loading or unloading and delivering of passengers or materials during any hours of the day or night on the following streets:

On the west side of Bernal avenue from the south line of Brook street to the east line of Diamond street, and on the east side of Bernal avenue from the south line of Brook street to a point 500 feet northerly along the curb from the point of intersection of the easterly curb line of Diamond street and the westerly curb line of Bernal avenue;

On the north side of Brosnan place between Valencia street and

Guerrero street:

On the east side of Grant avenue between Bush street and Broadway; On the west side of Grant avenue between Bush and Pine streets;

On the north side of Jessie street between First street and Ninth

On the north side of Stevenson street between First street and Ninth street.

ARTICLE VI.

Street Cars.

Section 45. Driving on Street Car Tracks. Passing Safety Zones .-(a) It shall be unlawful for the operator of any vehicle proceeding upon any street car tracks or so as to obstruct the movement of any street car to fail to remove said vehicle from said tracks or from in front of said street ear as soon as practicable after signal from the operator of said street car.

(b) On Market street from The Embarcadero to Van Ness avenue It shall be unlawful to drive any vehicle to the left of any safety zone

established at a regular street car stop.

Section 2. Ordinance No. 8767 (New Series), in effect May 31, 1930. is hereby repealed.

Section 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately,

Bonds issued for the purpose stated shall be numbered from 1 to 1045, both inclusive, and shall be payable \$35,000 thereof five years from the date of said bonds, beginning with the lowest numbers, and \$35,000 thereof of the next higher numbers on the same day in each succeeding year, and in the final year the sum of \$30,-

000 until all of said bonds shall be paid.

Bids Invited for Construction of a Garbage Incinerator by Private Enterprise.

The following matter was presented by Supervisor Toner and, on motion of Supervisor Gallagher, referred to Finance Committee for investigation and report:

San Francisco, Cal., July 7, 1930.

Whereas, Resolution No. 110923 (Second Series) of the Board of Public Works was referred to the Health Committee, requesting that the additional sum of \$15,000 be made available for the preparation of plans and specifications for an incinerator, as called for by Resolution No. 32238, which allowed \$10,000, making a total of \$25,000; and

Whereas, the majority of the Health Committee of this Board are opposed to appropriating this additional sum of \$15,000, as we consider such expenditure would be a positive waste of City funds; and

Whereas, on June 20th the City Engineer made a tentative report to the Board of Supervisors, stating that the building he was designing would be 400 feet long, 120 feet wide and 60 feet high, and that the cost of the same would be approximately \$750,000, the majority members of the Health Committee consider that a structure of such dimensions would be too large, and out of all proportion to the need of the furnaces which will be placed therein. If this procedure is carried out, incinerator companies bidding on this incinerator will be compelled to fit their furnaces to an arbitrarily designed building; and

Whereas, this committee considers that the proper manner in which to handle this project is to have the Board of Public Works call for bids from all reputable incinerator companies, such blds to be accompanied with plans and specifications of their respective plants. These plans and specifications will be drawn by experienced combustion en-

gineers, at no expense to San Francisco.

When these bids, accompanied by plans and specifications, are presented to the Board of Public Works they can be reviewed by our City Engineer and the type chosen that best suits San Francisco's needs. We consider this the sane, sensible, economical and business-like method to pursue; and

Whereas, the cities in the United States that have built incinerators of late years have universally called for bids for incinerators, such bids to include building, foundations, furnaces and incidentals, at no

expense to said cities.

The only city that we know of that has used the Engineer's method of designing a building and fitting the furnaces to this arbitrarily designed structure is Honolulu, and their experiment proved a failure; and

Whereas, the City Engineer of San Francisco has never built an incinerator, has never drawn plans for an incinerator, we, the majority

members of the Health Committee consider this project of too great magnitude at this time, considering the seriousness of the garbage situation, to have anyone other than an expert undertake this serious project. A \$500,000 monument to a former City Engineer's mistake stands at Army and Kansas streets, and this Board should be very careful not to bring about a repetition of this expensive blunder; and

Whereas, \$10,000 has already been expended in making borings and testings, and sufficient information is at hand to give data to incinerator companies wishing to bid; therefore, this committee is unalterably opposed to this expenditure, as it will mean a positive delay in the erection of the incinerator and a waste of public funds; therefore, be it

Resolved, by the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco, State of California, in regular meeting assembled, this 7th day of July, 1930, that such applications and bids for said purposes be invited from private parties, firms and corporations, so that an exclusive franchise may be legally granted by said City and County of San Francisco; and be it

Further Resolved, That all such applications and bids be received in accordance with the provisions of the Broughton Act, approved March 22, 1905, and entitled "An act providing for the sale of street railroad and other franchises in counties and municipalities, and providing conditions for the granting of such franchises by legislative or other governing bodies and repealing conflicting acts"; and be it

Further Resolved, That such franchise bids and applications be for a period of 25 years, and that an incinerator is to be erected at the bidder's sole expense, either on the site of said present incinerator or any other site to be designated and furnished by said City and County. Said plant shall be sufficient to reduce to a mineral ash 800 tons of garbage within twenty-four hours; bidders shall have access to and use of all maps and borings possessed by the City and County and of such maps and information as may be in the possession of said City and County concerning the general nature of the soil of the immediate vicinity of the proposed site; plans and specifications of said proposed plant shall be furnished by each bidder at no cost to said City and County, and said plans and specifications shall substantially conform to general plans and specifications prepared by the Board of Public. Works of said City and County; each bidder must, in such applications and bids, state the price per ton proposed to be charged per ton for reducing and finally disposing of such garbage, and there shall be contained in said application the total amount offered the said City and County for such exclusive franchise; said applications shall be accompanied by cash or certified check of 10 per cent of the amount so offered for said franchise; said applications shall state the price at which the said City and County shall pay as a recapture or purchase price of said plant, and shall contain an agreement that said City and County may, at its discretion, recapture or purchase said plant, and that thereupon said franchise may be revoked and cancelled by said City and County without compensation; and be it

Further Resolved. That all applications and bids so received shall embrace the foregoing particulars, and each of them, and shall be filed with the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors of said City and County within thirty days from the passage of this resolution, and said Clerk is hereby ordered to transmit said bids so received to the Board of Public Works of the City and County of San Francisco, and said Board is hereby directed to receive said bids and applications and report thereon to said Board of Supervisors within ten days from the final date allowed for receipt of same, and in said report shall convey such information to said Board of Supervisors as may enable said Board to so grant said franchise.

Opinion of City Attorney on Veto of Ordinance Calling Freeholders' Election.

The following was presented and read by the Clerk and ordered filed:

July 2, 1930.

Gentlemen: Under date of July 1, 1930, your honorable Board asks: "Does the ordinance providing for election of freeholders to revise the Charter require the approval of the Mayor?"

Opinion.

The authority of the Board of Supervisors to call a freeholders' election to revise the Charter of the City and County of San Francisco is derived from Section 8 of Article XI of the Constitution of the State of California, the material parts of which are as follows:

"* * * any city or city and county having adopted a charter may adopt a new one. * * * * An election for choosing freeholders may be called by a two-thirds vote of the legislative body of such city * * * and, on the presentation of a petition, the legislative body shall call such election at any time not less than thirty nor more than sixty days from date of the filing of such petition."

It will be noted that the election may be called by a two-thirds vote (which is twelve) of the legislative body, and upon presentation of a

proper petition must be called by the legislative body.

The legislative body of the City and County of San Francisco is the Board of Supervisors.

Section I, Chapter I, Article H of our Charter.

The Mayor of the City and County of San Francisco is not a member of our legislative body.

Section 2, Chapter I, Article II of our Charter.

The Mayor of the City and County of San Francisco is the chief executive officer thereof.

Section 1, Chapter I, Article IV of our Charter.

Under Section 2 of the above the Mayor has the right to attend the meetings of the Board of Supervisors and offer suggestions at such meetings, but has no vote therein and has no legislative authority.

Harrison v. Roberts, 145 Cal. 173.

The Constitution of the State of California is the supreme law of our State and takes precedence over the provisions of our Charter and must be strictly construed.

If the Mayor were allowed the veto power of this ordinance, fourteen votes of our legislative body would be required to override such veto and finally pass such ordinance.

Section 16, Chapter I, Article II of our Charter.

Therefore, such veto would have the effect of nullifying the provisions of our State Constitution by requiring two more votes than is

therein required to call such election.

Upon reason, therefore, such veto power must be ruled against. Fortunately, however, our Supreme Court has ruled upon a similar question. The question involved in Harrison v. Roberts, 145 Cal. 173, was, "Do proposed amendments to the Charter of the City and County of San Francisco have to be presented to the Mayor for his approval?"

The Supreme Court therein ruled that the approval of the Mayor was unnecessary; that such amendments were to be passed by the legislative body only; that the Mayor was not a part thereof, and that Section 16 of Chapter I of Article II, requiring ordinances to be presented to the Mayor for his approval or rejection, did not apply.

You are therefore advised that the ordinance passed by the Board of Supervisors calling a freeholders' election does not require presenta-

tion to the Mayor.

Report of Delegates to State Supervisors' Convention.

The following was presented by Supervisor Gallagher, read and on his motion ratified and approved by the following vote:

June 27, 1930.

To the Honorable the Board of Supervisors, San Francisco, California. Gentlemen: As authorized and delegated to represent you, we attended the twentieth annual convention of the County Supervisors' Association, State of California, at Yosemite National Park, June 18, 19 and 20, 1930. The convention was addressed by numerous experts on matters affecting the several counties represented in the convention, among the principal addresses being one by His Excellency Governor C. C. Young, and another by his Honor, your Mayor, James Rolph, Jr.

Among the subjects discussed were "Home Rule for Counties," "Correlation of State and County Highway Programs," "State Water Resources," "Engineer's Registration Act," "Budget Control," "County Planning" and "State Aid to Needy Aged." These subjects were handled by persons who were carrying on the work for the State or for the counties. Another outstanding feature of the convention's work was the address of Mr. C. H. Purcell, State Highway Engineer, who recounted the policies of the State Board of Public Works and its future plans.

Several very important resolutions were introduced, among which was a resolution endorsing Constitutional Amendment No. 21, on the subject of "Taxation," an amendment which your Board has already endorsed. Another resolution was one commending Mr. Don V. Nicholson for his splendid work on behalf of traffic. Another resolution,

which caused much debate and which was finally referred to the incoming committee, was one the object of which was to permit the counties to tax commercial vehicles of a certain tonnage, the complaint being that these vehicles were destructive of permanent roads and the counties had no redress.

Your particular attention is called to the following resolution, introduced by your delegation and unanimously adopted by the convention;

"Whereas, it is in the best interest of all the people of the State of California that all public utilities be owned and operated by and for the people; and

Whereas, there is now and has been for some time a determined and vigorous campaigh waged by certain powerful interests to defeat the

principle of public ownership; now, therefore, he it Resolved, That the County Supervisors' Association of California, assembled in annual convention, does hereby record itself in favor of pullic ownership of utilities essential for the welfare of the people of this State: And be it

Further Resolved, That the chairman of this convention be and is hereby directed to appoint a section, to be known as the Public Utilities Section of the County Supervisors' Association of the State of Califormia, whose functions shall be as follows:

1. To aid and assist in every manner possible, counties, cities and political subdivisions of this State in the acquisition of electric, water

and gas systems:

2. To build up a cooperative organization composed of municipalities represented at this convention for the purpose of assisting them in the proper presentations before the State Railroad Commission with the object of enabling it to fix just and equitable rates;

3 To make a complete and comprehensive study of the public utilities situation in the State of California in all its phases and sub-

mit a complete report to this convention at its next meeting."

We take the liferty of asking that our action in presenting and supporting this resolution be ratified by this Board of Supervisors.

Beg to advise that Supervisor Thos. E. Hurley of San Diego and Supervisor Thos, Maxwell were elected president and vice-president, respectively, and Mr. Stanley Able was reelected to serve as secretary.

The following matters, heretofore passed for printing, were taken up and finally passed by the following vote:

Calling and Providing for Special Election—Transmission Line.

Bill No. 9301, Ordinance No. 8790 (New Series), as follows:

Calling and providing for a special election to be held in the City and County of San Francisco on Tuesday, the 26th day of August, 1930, for the purpose of submitting to the voters of the City and County of San Francisco a proposition to incur a bonded debt of the City and County of San Francisco to the amount of three million five hundred twenty-five thousand dollars (\$3,525,000) for the acquisition, construction and completion of a public utility, to-wit: A double circuit high voltage electric transmission line from Newark, Alameda County, California, to the City and County of San Francisco, and all necessary rights-of-way; to raise the transmission voltage of the Pacific Gas and Electric Company's stepdown station in Visitacion Valley, San Mateo County, adequate to handle the electric power generated from the plants of the City and County of San Francisco; to regulate voltage, correct power factor, stabilize the lines. and to install necessary synchronous condenser equipment; to make necessary connections between the two systems, including the construction of a new electric sub-station and all necessary machinery and equipment, all if, when and in the event the people of San Francisco vote to take over the electric generating and distributing system of the Great Western Power Company of California and/or the Pacific Gas and Electric Company; to be owned and controlled by said City and County.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco as follows:

Section 1. A special election is hereby called and ordered to be held in the City and County of San Francisco on Tuesday, the 26th day of August, 1930, for the purpose of submitting to the electors of said City and County the following proposition, to-wit: To incur a bonded debt of the City and County of San Francisco to the amount of three million five hundred twenty-live thousand dollars (\$3,525,000) for the acquisition, construction and completion of a public utility, to-wit: A double circuit high voltage electric transmission line from Newark, Alameda County, California, to the City and County of San Francisco, and all necessary rights-of-way; to raise the transmission voltage of the Pacific Gas and Electric Company's stepdown station in Visitacion Valley, San Mateo County, adequate to handle the electric power generated from the plants of the City and County of San Francisco; to regulate voltage, correct power factor, stabilize the lines, and to install necessary synchronous condenser equipment; to make necessary connections between the two systems, including the construction of a new electric sub-station and all necessary machinery and equipment, all if, when and in the event the people of San Francisco vote to take over the electric generating and distributing system of the Great Western Power Company of California and/or the Pacific Gas and Electric Company; to be owned and controlled by said City and County,

Section 2. The estimated cost of the acquisition, construction and completion of the public utility herein described was by plans and estimates of the Board of Public Works, procured through the City Engineer and filed with the Board of Supervisors on the 30th day of June, 1930, and was and is fixed by Resolution No. 32764 (New Series) in the sum of three million five hundred twenty-five thousand dollars (\$3,525,000).

Section 3. By Resolution No. 32764 (New Series) it was declared that no part of the said sum of three million five hundred twenty-five thousand dollars (\$3,525,000) could be paid out of the annual revenue of the City and County in addition to the other necessary expenses thereof or other funds derived from taxes levied for the purpose, and will require the incurring of a bonded debt to the amount of three million five hundred twenty-five thousand dollars (\$3,525,000) for the purposes herein recited. The method and manner of payment of the estimated cost of said described public utility are by issuance of bonds of the City and County of San Francisco to the amount required therefor and the application of the proceeds arising from the sale thereof to defray the cost of the acquisition, construction and completion of said public utility herein described.

Section 6. Where voting machines are used at said special election the said voting machines shall be so arranged that any qualified elector may vote for the proposition by pulling down a lever over the word "YES" under or near a statement of the proposed proposition appearing on cardboard, paper or other material placed on the front of the machine, and said act shall constitute a vote for the proposition, and by pulling down a lever over the word "NO" under or near a statement of the proposed proposition appearing on cardboard, paper or other material placed on the front of the machine shall constitute a vote against the proposition. Said voting machines and the preparation of the same are to be used in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 96 of the Statutes of 1923.

Each cross (X) stamped in the square to the right of the word "YES" appearing on the printed ballot, where printed ballots are used, shall constitute a vote in favor of and to authorize the incurring of a bonded indebtedness for the purpose set forth in the proposition, and each cross (X) stamped in the square to the right of the word "NO" shall be counted as a vote not in favor of and a refusal to authorize the incurring of a bonded indebtedness for the purpose set forth in the proposition.

Section 7. The election precincts and the numbers, names and boundaries thereof for said special election, and the place of voting, and the officers to conduct such election, and all other necessary proceedings in that behalf, shall be respectively defined, designated, selected, appointed and had by the Board of Election Commissioners of the City and County of San Francisco, and said Board is hereby authorized and directed to procure and provide all supplies that may be necessary to properly and lawfully conduct such special election.

For value received, the City and County of San Francisco, a municipal corporation organized and existing under the laws of the State of California, hereby acknowledges itself indebted and promises to pay to the bearer on the first day of _______, 19_____, one thousand dollars, with interest thereon at the rate of 4½ per centum per annum, payable semi-annually, January 1 and July 1, on presentation and surrender of the coupons hereto attached as they respectively become due, both principal and interest being payable in gold coin of the United States at the office of the Treasurer of said City and County, or, at the option of the holder, at the fiscal agency of said City and County of San Francisco in the City and State of New York.

This bond is issued under and pursuant to the Constitution and statutes of the State of California and the Charter of said City and County of San Francisco, and amendments thereto, and under and pursuant to ordinances and proceedings of said City and County duly adopted and taken, and a vote and assent of more than two-thirds of all the qualified electors of said City and County voting at a special

election duly and legally called and held for that purpose.

It is hereby certified, recited and declared that all acts, conditions and things required by law to exist, happen and be performed precedent to and in the issuance of this bond have existed, happened and been performed in due time, form and manner as required by law, and that the amount of this bond, together with all other indebtedness of said City and County, does not exceed any limit prescribed by the Constitution or statutes of said State or Charter of said City and County, and that provision has been made, as required by the Constitution and statutes of said State and the Charter of said City and County, for the collection of an annual tax sufficient to pay the interest on this bond as it falls due, and also provision to constitute a sinking fund for the payment of the principal of this bond on or before maturity. In re Resolution Regarding the Death of John W. Rogers.

After the transaction of other business, the following proceedings were had in re the death of the Chief Assistant Clerk of the Board, John W. Rogers:

A resolution drawn up by Supervisors Shannon and Colman in regard to the death of John W. Rogers was read to the Board; Resolution No. 32818 (New Series), as follows:

Whereas, death has suddenly taken from our midst John W. Rogers, for many years Chief Assistant Clerk to the Board of Supervisors; and

Whereas, the death of John W. Rogers has but brought out in strong relief the steady purpose of his life, the quiet manifestation of the virtues required of a Christian gentleman; and

Whereas, the late John W. Rogers did yeoman service in the development of the retirement system of the City and County of San Francisco and the growth of the organization idea among the civil service men, for which two civic benefits the people of this City and County will be forever deeply grateful; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco does hereby publicly revere the memory of its late Chief Assistant Clerk, regrets very much his passing, and extends to his widow sincere sympathy and condolence in this, her bereavement; and be it

Further Resolved, That a copy of this resolution be spread on the minutes of this Board and that another copy be sent to the widow of

the late John W. Rogers, and that this Board adjourn, when it does adjourn today, out of respect to the memory of its Chief Assistant Clerk, John W. Rogers.

SUPERVISOR SHANNON: Mr. Chairman, in moving the passage of the resolution just read, I desire to state, as has been said, "Life is a flower that grows on the edge of the grave." and from the beginning of time, wherever civilization has obtained, the sons of men have bowed their heads in sorrow and in grief over the departed forms of their friends and brothers, and today we how our heads in sorrow and in grief over the passing of a man who has worked in the vinevard with us for almost a decade—John Rogers. Why, the name John Rogers is almost as well known in this building as is the name of Mayor Rolph, and the passing of John Rogers will be felt for many a day. We were all greatly stricken vesterday when the news of his sudden passing came to us, and I think that none of us felt it more than the man who has sat just to his left during all of the period he has been here, Mr. John Dunnigan. Mr. Dunnigan is a man that is used to all kinds of trials and tribulations in his day's work here in the City Hall. I was in conversation with him when the news was received that something was wrong inside, and instantly went to the side of his Chief Clerk. As Clerk of the Public Utilities Committee. over which I had the honor to preside for eight years, Mr. Rogers was a wonderful help. In times when I was at my wits' end as to the best method to handle a situation John Rogers always knew the best way in which to handle it. His methods for handling a bill was the diplomatic and the tactful way and was shown in his sincere interest in everything.

The passage of the pension and retirement bills for the benefit of the employees of the City, who in the past had been permitted to grow old and pass out of the picture without recompense, was invaluable. I think that work will remain as one of the last of monuments to

his name.

We will miss him; his family will miss him, and the City has lost

a faithful servant and the family a wonderful husband.

SUPERVISOR COLMAN: Mr. Chairman, fellow members: It is with sincere sorrow I second the resolution as presented. The nine years I have been on the Board it has so happened that John Rogers has been the clerk of each committee of which I have been a member, first the Civil Service Committee, then the Public Welfare Committee, and now the Public Utilities Committee. It does not seem possible to us that he has gone, and that his alert, intelligent, kindly countenance will be missed from this bench before us. John Rogers was a loyal man, and we who were chairmen of committees for which he was the clerk can bear volumes of testimony to that fact.

Whereas, it was a sudden shock to us, his going so quickly yesterday, perhaps, after all, it is a happy way to go. We all must go. and John went without pain, without suffering, and although the blow was unexpected, we all know that John Rogers was prepared to meet his maker, and that the verdict will be, "Well done, chon

good and faithful servant."

John's work will live for many a day. Reference has been made to his work on the retirement board. A splendid constructive piece of legislation. I recall well the day when I first came on the Board that the Mayor signed the final ordinance and John Rogers handed

the instrument to him for his signature.

I feel deeply his loss and present my sincere sympathy to his family. SUPERVISOR HAYDEN: Mr. Chairman, members of the Board: I have known John Rogers longer than any man on the Board by reason of my long membership. John Rogers was appointed to the position as clerk of this Board some eighteen years ago, and after all. after so many years of association, after our contacts in the performance of our various legislative duties, and in connection with the valuable clerks that must necessarily cooperate with us in carrying out the work of this government there naturally is a tie that binds, and the friendship that grows year after year by reason of these associations. That friendship has grown year by year between John Rogers and myself, and with all of us who daily came in contact with him. He was a clerk of unusual ability, as has been referred to by Supervisors Shannon and Colman.

He was a man of very tender sympathies. I have noticed on occasions here, in the passage of resolutions in memoriam of various distinguished people, and humble people, when I would look across the table I could see tears streaming down the cheeks of John Rogers in sympathy. He had that tender sympathy for his fellow men, and that we appreciate.

He was a master of detail. I left him yesterday at 12 o'clock to go to my lunch, and later he went to his, and when I was conversing with him, he was giving me the details of Constitutional Amendment No. 21, an amendment that will be submitted to the people at the next election, the November election, dealing with the surplus in the State treasury, and that concerns the City and County of San Francisco more seriously than it does any other city and county in the State of California. Mr. Rogers arranged the legislation that was adopted by this Board whereby we are cooperating with twenty-one other counties to bring back a refund from the State of California by which the City and County of San Francisco will benefit to the extent of three millions of dollars. That Constitutional Amendment No. 21 was rather an involved question, but Mr. Rogers knew every detail. He acquainted the Finance Committee with the workings of that amendment; he helped to organize the supervisors throughout the State from the various counties interested, the twenty-one counties, and he was secretary of the campaign committee that is now working to bring to the attention of the people the necessity of voting for this amendment, whereby this City and County and other counties will have a refund of nearly seven million dollars by reason of the surplus coming from the taxation of public utilities throughout the State of California. Mr. Rogers had his heart and soul in that ques-That was the most recent of legislations he was interested in, and how seriously concerned he was in that legislation I know full well. That organization of twenty-one counties will miss him. It is a great loss to me and to all of the members of the Board of Supervisors, and Mr. Dunnigan and his associates will miss him, and I speak with a great deal of sorrow of the passing of John W. Rogers, because I respected him as a very valued citizen and good man and a most trustworthy and reliable official of the Board of Supervisors.

THE CHAIRMAN: The Board has heard the resolution, duly moved and seconded, and 1 will call for a rising vote.

(The resolution was thereupon carried unanimously by a rising vote of all members of the Board present.)

SUPERVISOR GALLAGHER: I move that those members of the Board who may feel able to attend the services of poor John Rogers be so delegated, and I move that the entire Board of Supervisors be delegated, and that the Clerk of this Board be directed to make proper arrangements for an official delegation to attend the funeral services, and further, that the Clerk be instructed to provide a suitable floral piece, and that a copy of this resolution and the remarks thereon be engrossed on the record and a copy thereof sent to the family of John W. Rogers.

elected by the people?

2. Shall the proposed Charter amendment to be submitted to the voters at the election to be held November 4, 1930, providing for the creation of a Public Utilities Commission to control and operate the public utilities owned by the People of the City and County of San Francisco, provide that the members of said Commission shall be appointed by the Mayor, subject to confirmation by the Board of Supervisors?

Traffic Ordinance Amendment.

On recommendation of Traffic and Safety Committee.

Bill No. 9306, Ordinance No. ——— (New Series), as follows:

Amending Section 1 of Article I, Sections 2, 3 and 6 of Article II, Section 9 of Article III, Sections 15, 21, 22, 24 and 26 of Article IV, Sections 36 and 37 of Article V, Section 45 of Article VI, of Ordinance No. 7691 (New Series), entitled "An ordinance regulating traffic upon the public streets and repealing all ordinances inconsistent herewith," adding a new section to be known as 37½ of Article V, and repealing Ordinance No. 8767 (New Series), in effect May 31, 1930.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco as follows:

Section 1. Section 1 of Article I, Sections 2, 3 and 6 of Article II, Section 9 of Article III, Sections 15, 21, 22, 24 and 26 of Article IV, Sections 36 and 37 of Article V, Section 45 of Article VI, of Ordinance No. 7691 (New Series), the title of which is recited above, are hereby amended to read as follows, and there is added thereto a new section to be known as Section 37½ of Article V:

ARTICLE 1.

Definitions.

Section 1. Whenever in this ordinance the following terms are used, they shall have the meanings respectively ascribed to them in this section:

Street—Every way set apart for public travel except alleyways, bridle paths and foot paths.

Roadway—That portion of a street between the regularly established curb lines.

Alley—A street with a roadway of less than twenty (20) feet.

Blind Alley—An alley which has only one end available for ingress or egress.

Sidewalk—That portion of a street between the curb lines and the adjacent property lines.

Intersection—The area embraced within the prolongation of the lateral curb lines or, if none, then the lateral boundary lines of the traversable roadways of two or more public streets or highways which join one another at an angle whether or not one such street or highway crosses the other.

Crosswalk—That portion of the roadway included within the prolongation of curb and property lines at street intersections, and other places marked in accordance with the provisions of this ordinance.

Safety Zone—That marked portion of a roadway reserved for the exclusive use of pedestrians.

Loading Zone—That space adjacent to a curb reserved for the exclusive use of vehicles to load or unload passengers or materials.

Passenger Loading Zone-The space adjacent to the curb reserved

for the exclusive use of vehicles to load or unload passengers.

Vehicles—Every device or animal by which any person or property is or may be transported or drawn upon a street, except devices moved by human power or used exclusively upon rails. For the purpose of this ordinance a licycle shall be deemed a vehicle.

Street Cars-Every device traveling exclusively upon rails when

upon or crossing a street, other than devices profelled by steam.

Pedestrian-Any person afoct.

Operator—Any person who is in actual physical control of a vehicle or street car.

Traffic-Vehicles and street cars, either singly or together, while using any street for purposes of travel.

Central Traffic District—That portion of this city bounded by and including the following parts of streets:

Mission street from the east line of First street to the west line of Sixth street: Sixth street from the south line of Mission street to the south line of Market street; the intersection of Sixth street, Market street, Golden Gate avenue and Taylor street; Taylor street from the north line of Golden Gate avenue to the north line of Sutter street; Sutter street from the west line of Taylor street to the east line of Grant avenue; Grant avenue from the south line of Sutter street to the north line of California street; California street from the west line of Grant avenue to the south line of Market street; Market street; First street from the north line of California street to the west line of First street; First street from the north line of Market street to the south line of Mission street.

Business District—The territory contiguous to a street when fifty per cent (50%) or more of the frontage thereon for a distance of three hundred (300) feet or more is occupied by buildings in use for retail or wholesale business, also, any territory contiguous to a street which is immediately adjacent to or a continuation of a street within a business district when such territory is so designated by the Police

Department.

Right of Way-The privilege of the immediate use of the street.

Park—To stand a vehicle for a period of time greater than is reasonably necessary for the actual loading or unloading of persons or materials.

Official Warning and Direction Sizes—All warning and direction signs and signals not inconsistent with this ordinance heretofore and hereafter placed or erected under this ordinance or by authority of the Board of Supervisors.

ARTICLE II.

Authority of Police Traffic Signs and Signals

Section 2 Obedience to Police—Officers of the Police Department are hereby authorized to direct, control, direct and regulate all traffic by means of officers or visible or audible signals, and it shall be unlawful for any person to refuse or fail to comply with any lawful order, signal or direction of a traffic or police officer. It shall be unlawful for any person to direct or attempt to direct traffic unless authorized to do so by order of the Chief of Police.

It shall be unlaieful for any person in charge of any vehicle standing along or near the curb in any street within the Central Traffic District or Business District to fail, refuse or neglect to remove such vehicle from said curb when requested to do so by any traffic or police

officer.

Any police officer may remove, or cause to be removed, any standing vehicle or vehicles, whether occupied or not, from any street or alley to the nearest street or alley, to accommodate the necessity for such removal, in the following cases:

(1) When a public emergency requires such removal:

(2) When a vehicle is unlawfully parked so as to obstruct the free and lawful passage of vehicular or pedestrian traffic

Section (Signs—The Bland of Supervisors shall by resolution determine and designate the character on 7.7 amon of all official warning and direction signs and signals. Subject to this selection, the Police Lepartment is hereby authorized, and as to those signs required hereunder it shall be its duty to cause to be placed and multitained all official warning and direction signs and signals. All signs authorized and required hereunder for a particular purpose shall be utilized.

No provision of this ordinance for which signs are required shall be enforceable seasons the alleged violator if at the time and place of the alleged violation the sign herein required is not in proper position and sufficiently legicle to be seen by an ordinary observant person.

Section 6. Che-swalks—The Police Department is hereby authorized and required to late 1. It established that maintained upon the surface of the rolling, by appropriate devices, marks or white lines, crosswalks at all places where in its opinion there is particular danger to pedestrians it issuing the readway.

ARTICLE III.

Pedesti ass.

Section & Fedestrian's Right of Way at Intersection

- (a) It shall be unlawful for the operator of any vehicle to drive into any crosswale which is marked as provided in Section f of this ordinance while there is in such presswalk upon the half of the roadway upon which such vehicle is traveling any pedestrian engaged in crossing the madway until such pedestrian shall have passed beyond the path of said vehicle.
- (b) It shall be unlawful for the operator of any vehicle to drive into any unmarked cit-swalk while there is in such crosswalk upon the half of the roadway upon which such vehicle is traveling any pedestrian engaged in crossing the roadway until such pedestrian shall have passed beyond the path of said vehicle, when the pedestrian shall indicate his intention to cross by a timely and continuous warning by holding up his bund, palm (ut toward approaching traffic
- (c) The operator of a webicle shall stop before entering any cross-walk when any other webicle proceeding in the same direction is stopped at such crosswalk for the purpose of permitting a pedestrian to pass
- (d) The foregoing provisions of this section shall not apply at intersections where trains is being directed by an officer or a traffic sto; and go signal, at which intersections the rights of pedestrians and operators of vehicles shall be exercised under the direction of the officer or traffic signals.

ARTICLE IV

Rules for Danag-L. and of Turning Markers.

Section 15. The Police Department is hereby authorized, and as a those intersections mentioned in paragraph 1 of this section it shall be its duty to cause to be placed, turning markers in intersections as follows.

(1) Within intersections where either intersecting roadway is less than sixty (60) feet in width and intersections where streets meet at other than right angles and in intersections where one street terminates in another, a marker shall be placed at every intersection of the medial line of each street, with the probongation of the curb lines of the intersecting street; or at the intersection of the medial line of the street with the prolongation of the property lines of the intersection.

secting street, or as near the intersecting points of said lines as may

be practicable.

(2) Intersections other than those mentioned in paragraph 1 may be marked as provided in paragraph 1, or a single marker may be placed within such intersection at the intersection of the medial lines of the intersecting streets.

Section 21. Vehicles shall not be driven or parked on sidewalks or in safety zones. The operator of a vehicle shall not drive within any sidewalk area except at a permanent or temporary driveway, nor upon any portion of the roadway which is designated and marked as a

safety zone.

The Police Department is hereby authorized to establish and maintain by signs, paint marks or other material, safety zones at such street car stops, and at such other places as in its discretion require such

safety zones.

Section 22. Traffic Lanes—The Police Department is hereby authorized to cause to be marked traffic lanes upon the roadway where a regular alignment of traffic is necessary. Where such lanes have been marked in accordance with law and signs have been erected instructing the operators to keep in line it shall be unlawful for any operator to fail to keep his vehicle within the designated boundaries.

Arterial Streets.

Section 24. The following streets and parts of streets are hereby declared to constitute arterial streets for the purpose of this section:

Alemany boulevard from the west line of Bay Shore boulevard to the midline of San Jose avenue;

Army street from the west line of Third street to the east line of Potrero avenue, and from the west line of Potrero avenue to the east line of Mission street;

Bay Shore boulevard from the west line of San Bruno avenue to the

County line of San Francisco;

Bay street from the center line of Columbus avenue to the east line of Van Ness avenue, and from the west line of Van Ness avenue to the

west line of Fillmore street;

Bernal avenue southerly from the midline of Randall street to San Jose avenue, thence on San Jose avenue to the north line of Sagamore street, and from the south line of Alemany boulevard to the City and County line of San Francisco;

Bush street from the east line of Grant avenue to the east line of Van Ness avenue, and from the west line of Van Ness avenue to the

east line of Presidio avenue;

California street from the east line of Grant avenue to the east line of Van Ness avenue, and from the west line of Van Ness avenue to the west line of Arguello boulevard;

Cortland avenue from the west line of Bay Shore boulevard to the

east line of Mission street;

Fell street from the west line of Polk street to the east line of Van Ness avenue, and from the west line of Van Ness avenue to the west line of Stanyan street;

Fulton street from the west line of Franklin street to the east line

of the Great Highway;

Geary street from the west line of Presidio avenue to Point Lobos avenue, thence along Point Lobos avenue from Geary street to the Great Highway:

Great Highway from Point Lobos avenue to the north line of Sloat

boulevard;

Howard street from the north line of Thirteenth street to the north

line of Army street;

Junipero Serra bonlevard from the west line of Portola drive to the City and County line of San Francisco;

Lincoln way from the east line of the Great Highway to the west line of Third avenue, thence on the Kezar Stadium road in Golden Gate Park to the west line of the intersecting roadway, approximately 500 feet westerly of Stanyan street;

Lombard street from the west line of Van Ness avenue to the west line of Lyon street:

Market street from the west line of Van Ness avenue to Portola drive, thence on Portola drive to the east line of Claremont boulevard, and on Portola drive from the west line of Claremont boulevard to the main roadway of Junipero Serra boulevard:

Mission street from the west line of Valencia street to the City and County line of San Francisco;

Monterey boulevard from the west line of San Jose avenue to Santa Clara avenue, thence on Santa Clara avenue to the south line of Portola drive:

Nineteenth avenue from the north line of Lincoln way to the west line of Junipero Serra boulevard;

Ocean avenue from the east line of the main roadway of Junipero Serra boulevard to the west line of San Jose avenue, from the east line of San Jose avenue to the west line of Alemany boulevard, and from the east line of Alemany boulevard to the west line of Mission street;

Pine street from the east line of Grant avenue to the east line of Van Ness avenue:

Post street from the west line of Van Ness avenue to the west line of Presidio avenue:

Potrero avenue from the north line of Division street to the west

line of San Bruno avenue:

Seventh avenue from the south line of Lincoln way to Laguna Honda boulevard, thence on Laguna Honda boulevard to Dewey boulevard, thence on Dewey boulevard to Claremont boulevard, thence on Claremont boulevard to the center line of Portola drive;

Sickles avenue from the west line of Alemany boulevard to Sagamore street, thence on Sagamore street to Alemany boulevard, and thence on Alemany boulevard to the east line of Junipero Serra boulevard:

Silver avenue from the east line of Alemany boulevard to the west line of Mission street, and from the east line of Mission street to the

west line of Bay Shore boulevard;

Sloat boulevard from the east line of the Great Highway to the west line of Nineteenth avenue and from the east line of Nineteenth avenue to the west line of Portola drive

Tenth street from the south line of Market street to the north line of

Division street:

Third street from the south line of Channel street to the east line of Bay Shore boulevard:

Twenty-fourth avenue from the south line of Geary street to the south

line of Fulton street, thence on the roadway through Golden Gate Park to the north line of Lincoln way at Nineteenth avenue;

Twenty-fourth street from the west line of Dolores street to the east

line of Hoffman avenue:

Valencia street from the south line of Market street to the midline of Mission street;

Van Ness avenue from the south line of North Point street to the north line of Market street and from the south line of Market street to the center line of Howard street.

Every operator of a vehicle or street car, cable car excepted, traversing any street intersecting any arterial street, shall bring such vehicle or street car to a full stop at the place where such street meets the prolongation of the nearer property line of such arterial street, or at such other place as may be indicated by a sign erected in accordance with

this section, subject, however, to the directions of any stop-and-go signal

or police officer at such intersection.

The Police Department is hereby authorized and required to cause to be placed and maintained, upon each and every street intersecting an arterial street, and at or near the property line of the arterial street, suitable signs bearing the word "Stop."

One-Way Streets.

Section 26. Between the hours of seven (7) a.m. and six (6) p.m. of any day, excepting Sundays and legal holidays, it shall be unlawful for the operator of any vehicle to drive said vehicle in any part of any of the following streets except in the direction indicated herein:

Southerly in Annie street between Market street and Mission street; Southerly in Belden street between Pine street and Bush street;

Westerly in Brosnan street between Valencia street and Guerrero street;

Easterly on Campton place between Stockton street and Grant avenue; Northerly in Capp street between Mission street and Twenty-sixth street:

Easterly in Clay street between Mason street and The Embarcadero; Southerly in Claude Lane between Bush street and Sutter street;

Westerly in Commercial street between The Embarcadero and Grant avenue:

Westerly in Halleck street between Front street and Leidesdorff street; Easterly in Jackson street between The Embarcadero and Columbus avenue:

Easterly in Jessie street between First street and Ninth street;

Southerly in Leidesdorff street between Clay street and Pine street; Westerly in Maiden lane from Kearny street to Grant avenue and

easterly from Stockton street to Grant avenue;

Westerly in Merchant street between Front street and Kearny street; Westerly in Minna street between First street and Ninth street;

Easterly in Mint street between Jessie street and Fifth street:

Westerly in Natoma street between First street and Ninth street; Westerly in Oregon street between The Embarcadero and Battery street;

Southerly in Quincy street between California street and Pine street; Westerly in Sacramento street between The Embarcadero and Mason street:

Southerly in Spring street between Sacramento street and California

street:

Southerly in St. Anne place between California street and Pine street;

Easterly in Stevenson street between First street and Ninth street; Southerly in Trinity place between Bush street and Sutter street; Westerly in Westerly in Westerly street street;

Westerly in Washington street between The Embarcadero and Montgomery street.

Suitable signs shall be erected and maintained at all intersections of said parts of streets indicating the provisions of this section.

ARTICLE V.

Stopping, Standing and Parking—Stopping Prohibited in Specified Places—Standing for Loading Only in Certain Places.

Section 36 (a.) During the times specified herein it shall be unlawful for an operator to stand a passenger rehicle for a period of time longer than is necessary for the loading or unloading of passengers, provided such loading or unloading shall not consume more than three minutes, except in passenger loading zones: nor for an operator to stand any commercial vehicle for a period of time longer than it is necessary to load, unload and deliver materials, provided that the loading, unloading and delivery of said materials shall not consume more than twenty minutes, in any of the following places:

(1) In any public alley, other than the north side of Merchant

street between Kearny street and Montgomery street, in the Central Traffic District or in any business district during any hour of the day or night.

(2) At any place not to exceed one hundred (100) feet from the intersection of any street with the southerly property line of Market street, from The Embarcadero to Van Ness avenue, between the hours of seven (7) a.m., and six (6) p.m. of any day; at any place not to exceed one hundred (100) feet from the prolongation of the northerly and westerly property lines, at intersections immediately adjacent to Market street, of those streets intersecting Market street from the northerly side, from The Embarcadero to Van Ness avenue, between the hours of seven (7) a. m. and six (6) p. m. of any day.
(3) At any place between the portal of any tunnel and seventy-five

(75) feet therefrom at any hour of any day.

(4) At any place where the grade of the roadway exceeds twenty

(20) per cent.

(5) In any loading zone duly established before the entrances to the following places:

Before the entrance to a hospital, day or night;

Before the entrance to a police station, day or night;

Before the entrance to a hotel, day or night;

Before the passenger entrance to a theater during performance;

Before the entrance to a church during services.

In loading zones other than those above specified, from seven (7) a. m. to six (6) p. m. on any day excepting Sundays and legal holidays (b) It shall be unlawful for any operator of a vehicle to stand said

vehicle in a duly established taxicab stand; provided, however, that this provision shall not apply to the operators of duly licensed taxlcabs authorized to occupy said stands.

(c) It shall be unlawful at any time during the day or night to stand a vehicle in a passenger loading zone longer than five minutes, and it shall be unlawful to stand any commercial vehicle in such zone.

(d) The Police Department shall cause to be placed and maintained suitable signs to designate the provisions of this section. The Board of Supervisors shall designate the location of loading zones and passenger loading zones as defined by Section 1 of this ordinance, provided that a curb space of not to exceed fifty (50) per cent of the total curb length of any street between intersections may be reserved for loading zones and passenger loading zones. A curb space not to exceed one hundred (100) feet may be reserved temporarily or in an emergency by the Police Department at any place where required by public convenience.

Parking Prohibited on Certain Streets, 7 A. M. to 6 P. M.

Section 37. Between the hours of seven (7) a. m. and slx (6) p. m. of any day, excepting Sundays and legal holidays, it shall be unlawful for the operator of a vehicle to stop said vehicle for a period of time longer than is necessary for the actual loading or unloading and delivery of passengers or materials in any of the following places:

Annie street, Anthony street, Austin street, Campton place, Cedar street, Clementina street, Cortland avenue on the north side between Mission street and Folsom street, Ecker street, Elm street, Fern street, Hemlock street, Holland court, Ivy street, Linden street, Maiden lane, Minna street, Mint street on the east, south and north sides, Monroe street, Montgomery street between Market and California streets, Myrtle street, Natoma street, Olive street, Pacific avenue on the north slde between Columbus avenue and Van Ness avenue, Redwood street, Tehama street, Willow street.

Signs shall be erected and maintained not more than two hundred (200) feet apart in each block designating the provisions of this

section.

Parking Prohibited on Certain Streets, Day or Night. Section 371/2. It shall be unlawful for the driver of any vehicle to stop the same or park for a longer period of time than is necessary for the actual loading or unloading and delivering of passengers or materials during any hours of the day or night on the following streets:

On the west side of Bernal avenue from the south line of Brook street to the east line of Diamond street, and on the east side of Bernal avenue from the south line of Brook street to a point 500 feet northerly along the curb from the point of intersection of the easterly curb line of Diamond street and the westerly curb line of Bernal avenue;

On the north side of Brosnan place between Valencia street and Guerrero street:

On the east side of Grant avenue between Bush street and Broadway;

On the west side of Grant avenue between Bush and Pine streets; On the north side of Jessie street between First street and Ninth

On the north side of Stevenson street between First street and Ninth street.

ARTICLE VI.

Street Cars.

Section 45. Driving on Street Car Tracks. Passing Safety Zones.—
(a) It shall be unlawful for the operator of any vehicle proceeding upon any street car tracks or so as to obstruct the movement of any street car to fail to remove said vehicle from said tracks or from in front of said street car as soon as practicable after signal from the operator of said street car.

(b) On Market street from The Embarcadero to Van Ness avenue it shall be unlawful to drive any vehicle to the left of any safety zone established at a regular street car stop.

Section 2. Ordinance No. 8767 (New Series), in effect May 31, 1930, is hereby repealed.

Section 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Amendments.

The following amendments were proposed and adopted:

Insert in Article IV the following:

Section 21. Vehicles Shall Not Be Driven on Sidewalks Nor in Safety Zones.—The operator of a vehicle shall not drive within any sidewalk area except at a permanent or temporary driveway, nor upon any portion of the roadway which is designated and marked as a safety zone.

The Police Department is hereby authorized to establish and maintain by signs, paint marks or other material, safety zones at such street car stops, and at such other places as in its discretion require such safety zones.

Insert in Article V. Section 36, the following:

- (c) It shall be unlawful at any time during the day or night to stand a vehicle in a passenger loading zone longer than five minutes, and it shall be unlawful to stand any commercial vehicle in such zone.
- (d) The Police Department shall cause to be placed and maintained suitable signs to designate the provisions of this section.

Governing the Handling, Keeping, Storing or Using of Nitro-Cellulose Material in the Form of a Sheet Film, or Any Other Form, in or Upon Any Building or Premises in the City and County of San Francisco.

On recommendation of Public Health Committee:

Bill No. 9291, Ordinance No. 8802 (New Series), as follows:

Governing the handling, keeping, storing or using of nitro-cellulose material in the form of a sheet film, or any other form, in or upon any building or premises in the City and County of San Francisco.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Fran-

cisco as follows:

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to hereafter handle, keep, store or use nitro-cellulose material in the form of a sheet film, or any other form, in or upon any building or premises within the limits of the City and County of San Francisco without first obtaining a written permit therefor from the Fire Marshal. All such nitro-cellulose material shall be handled, kept, stored or used upon conditions and under such regulations as may be required by the Fire Marshal. Nothing in this section shall be construed as applying to:

(a) Film for amateur photographic use in original packages of "roll" and "film pack" films when kept or stored in retail establishments for sale to the ultimate consumer or when kept, stored or used

by a consumer.

(b) Acetate-cellulose material in the form of a sheet film, or any other form.

Motion picture film regulated by any other ordinance.

Dental X-ray film when handled, kept or stored for purposes other than sale.

Section 2. Provided, however, that after the passage of this ordinance it shall be unlawful for the person or authority in charge of maintaining, operating or conducting any hospital, clinic, dispensary school, college, home, asylum or similar institutions, to bring into, expose or develop or allow to be brought into, exposed or developed in or upon any of the above mentioned premises any nitro-cellulose X-ray film. Any such nitro-cellulose X-ray film that may be in or upon any of the above mentioned premises and already exposed and developed at the time this ordinance becomes effective, shall be handled, kept, stored or used upon conditions and under such regulations as may be required by the Fire Marshal, but none shall be handled, kept, stored or used after July 1. 1935.

Section 3. The Fire Marshal shall have power to revoke or suspend any permit granted under the terms of this ordinance for violations

of any of its provisions.

Section 4. Any person, firm or corporation who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance or fail to comply therewith, or who shall violate or fail to comply with any order or regulation made thereunder, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction thereof, shall be punished by a fine not exceeding five hundred (500) dollars or by imprisonment in the County Jail for not more than six (6) months, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

Section 5. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force imme-

diately.

Regulating the Establishment and Maintenance of Hospitals, Health Institutions or Nursing Homes; Repealing Certain Conflicting Ordinances and Providing Penalties.

Regulating the establishment and maintenance of hospitals, health institutions or nursing homes; repealing certain conflicting ordinances, and providing penalties.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco as follows:

Section 1. No person, firm, corporation or association shall hereafter erect, establish or maintain any hospital, health institution or nursing-home without first obtaining a permit from the Board of Health as herein provided.

Section 2. For the purposes of this ordinance, a health institution or nursing-home is hereby defined to be a building or structure having accommodations for more than three sick, invalid, infirm, aged, convalescent, mentally-ill, feeble-minded, incompetent, dec.epit, disabled, injured, infected or chronically ill persons, where a charge is made for the care of such persons, and whether or not, in the care or treatment of said persons, use is made of drugs, medicines, surgical, electrical or

physio-therepeutical procedures.

Section 3. The Board of Health shall have power to and shall issue permits for hospitals, health institutions or nursing-homes hereafter established. The Board of Health shall issue a permit to each hospital, health institution and nursing-home existing at the time this ordinance becomes effective, provided that said hospital, health institution or nursing-home is erected in compliance with existing fire, health and safety laws, and if not so erected, if compliance is had therewith within thirty days after written notice by the Board of Health of the particulars wherein noncompliance exists. Every permit shall specify the name and residence of the licensed person, firm, association or corporation, the location of the structure and the number of persons permitted to be housed or cared for therein. Any permit shall be revocable for cause by the said Board of Health, after hearing before said Board upon service upon the holder of the permit, not less than ten days before the hearing, of a written notice of time and place of hearing and a written statement of the charges, in any case where the provisions of this ordinance, or of any fire, health or safety law has been violated and said violation has continued for more than ten days after service upon the holder of said permit of a written statement by the Board of Health of the particulars wherein said violation exists.

Section t. No hospital, health institution or nursing-home hereafter established shall be housed in a structure of frame construction, if said structure is designed to have accommodations for more than five inmates. Any such hospital, health institution or nursing-home hereafter established, and having accommodations for not more than five inmates, may be of frame construction if the same complies with all of the regulations and laws of the Building Department of the Board of Public Works, the Bureau of Fire Prevention and Public Safety and the regulations of the Board of Health, as of the date of application for a permit. No inmate shall be housed or cared for in any attic,

basement or cellar.

Section 5. The holder of a permit shall keep a register, in form approved by the Board of Health, wherein shall be entered the names and addresses, date of entry and date of discharge, of all inmates, and also the name and address of the nearest of kin of such inmates.

Section 6. No permit issued pursuant to this ordinance shall be sold, assigned or transferred without written permission of the Board of Health.

Section 7. The Board of Health, its officers and representatives, and all duly appointed or elected health officers, shall at all reasonable times have the right to enter and inspect the said hospitals, health institutions and nursing-homes, to inspect the permit and register thereof, and to require compliance with this ordinance, and to prescribe such rules and regulations as may be deemed best for the governing of such institutions.

Section 8. Any person, firm, corporation or association violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine not to exceed five hundred (\$500.00) dollars, or by imprisonment in the County Jail for not more than six (6) months, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

Section 9. Ordinance No. 823, entitled "Regulating the Establishment and Maintenance of Hospitals," and all ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith, are hereby repealed.

The Board of Supervisors met in regular session.

CALLING THE ROLL.

The roll was called and the following Supervisors were noted present:

His Honor Mayor Rolph being absent, Supervisor Rossi was elected to preside.

APPROVAL OF JOURNAL.

The Journal of Proceedings of the meeting of June 30, 1930, was considered read and approved.

In re Motion of Supervisor Havenner Inviting Attendance at the Board of Supervisors' Meeting of Members of the Industrial Accident Commission and the United States Bureau of Mines Relative to Disaster in Hetch Hetchy Tunnel.

Pursuant to a motion made by Supervisor Havenner at the last meeting of the Board of Supervisors, the following members of the Industrial Accident Commission and representatives of the United States Bureau of Mines were present at today's meeting to advise with the Board of Supervisors and discuss ways and means for increasing safety in the working of Hetch Hetchy tunnels: William J. French, chairman of the Industrial Accident Commission; Edward O. Allen, attorney of the Industrial Accident Commission; C. H. Fry, superintendent of safety for the Industrial Accident Commission; J. H. Ash, mining engineer of the United States Bureau of Mines.

There were also present City Engineer M. M. O'Shaughnessy, Assist-

ant City Engineers McAfee and Ost.

After a general discussion of the subject matter, which was participated in by all of the above mentioned and Supervisors Havenner, Hayden, Rossi, Stanton, Power, McSheehy, Colman, Roncovieri, McGovern, Andriano, Toner and Gallagher, the following motion was

made by Supervisor Havenner and adopted:

"That the representatives of the City be asked to meet immediately with the representatives of the State and Federal governments, tomorrow morning, if possible, and return to this Board at the earliest possible moment a recommendation of the things that can be done, and should be done, immediately, with the specific information as to whether they can be done, and until that be done, in so far as I am individually concerned, I do not want to take on myself the responsibility of voting for a continuance of operations in these tunnels under existing conditions."

Section 1. That the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco hereby submits to the voters of the City and County of San Francisco, at the election to be held Tuesday, August 26, 1930, the following questions of policy:

1. Shall the proposed Charter amendment to be submitted to the voters at the election to be held November 4, 1930, providing for the creation of a Public Utilities Commission to control and operate the public utilities owned by the People of the City and County of San Francisco, provide that the members of said Commission shall be

elected by the people?

2. Shall the proposed Charter amendment to be submitted to the voters at the election to be held November 4, 1930, providing for the creation of a Public Utilities Commission to control and operate the public utilities owned by the People of the City and County of San Francisco, provide that the members of said Commission shall be appointed by the Mayor, subject to confirmation by the Board of Supervisors?

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Also, Bill No. 9312, Ordinance No. 8818 (New Series), as follows:

Repealing part of Section 1 of Ordinance No. 8756 (New Series), entitled "Ordering the performance of certain street work to be done in the City and County of San Francisco, approving and adopting specifications therefor and authorizing the Board of Public Works to enter into contract for doing the same."

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco as follows:

Section 1. That part of Section 1 of Ordinance No. 8756 (New Series), the title of which is recited above, and reading as follows:

The improvement of the west one-half of Twelfth avenue from a line parallel with and 150 feet south of the south line of Lawton street to a line parallel with and 175 feet south of the south line of Lawton street, by the removal of sand from the roadway and sidewalk area and the construction of a bulkhead 3 feet in height, is hereby repealed.

Bidder is to name price per lineal foot of bulkhead for this work. Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Traffic Ordinance Amendment.

On recommendation of Traffic and Safety Committee,

Bill No. 9306, Ordinance No. 8819 (New Series), as follows:

Amending Section 1 of Article I, Sections 2, 3 and 6 of Article II, Section 9 of Article III, Sections 15, 21, 22, 24 and 26 of Article IV, Sections 36 and 37 of Article V, Section 45 of Article VI, of Ordinance No. 7691 (New Series), entitled "An ordinance regulating traffic upon the public streets and repealing all ordinances inconsistent herewith," adding a new section to be known as 37½ of Article V, and repealing Ordinance No. 8767 (New Series), in effect May 31, 1930.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco as follows:

Section 1. Section 1 of Article I, Sections 2, 3 and 6 of Article II, Section 9 of Article III, Sections 15, 21, 22, 24 and 26 of Article IV, Sections 36 and 37 of Article V, Section 45 of Article VI, of Ordinance No. 7691 (New Series), the title of which is recited above, are hereby amended to read as follows, and there is added thereto a new section to be known as Section 371% of Article V:

ARTICLE I.

Definitions.

Section 1. Whenever in this ordinance the following terms are used, they shall have the meanings respectively ascribed to them in this section:

Street—Every way set apart for public travel except alleyways, bridle paths and foot paths.

Roadway-That portion of a street between the regularly established

Alley—A street with a roadway of less than twenty (20) feet.

Blind Alley-An alley which has only one end available for ingress

Sidewalk-That portion of a street between the curb lines and the

adjacent property lines.

Intersection—The area embraced within the prolongation of the lateral curb lines or, if none, then the lateral boundary lines of the traversable roadways of two or more public streets or highways which join one another at an angle whether or not one such street or highway crosses the other.

Crosswalk-That portion of the roadway included within the prolongation of curb and property lines at street intersections, and other places marked in accordance with the provisions of this ordinance.

Safety Zone-That marked portion of a roadway reserved for the exclusive use of pedestrians.

Loading Zone—That space adjacent to a curb reserved for the exclusive use of vehicles to load or unload passengers or materials.

Passenger Loading Zone-The space adjacent to the curb reserved for the exclusive use of vehicles to load or unload passengers.

Vehicles—Every device or animal by which any person or property is or may be transported or drawn upon a street, except devices moved by human power or used exclusively upon rails. For the purpose of this ordinance a bicycle shall be deemed a vehicle.

Street Cars—Every device traveling exclusively upon rails when upon or crossing a street, other than devices propelled by steam.

Pedestrian-Any person afoot.

Operator—Any person who is in actual physical control of a vehicle or street car.

Traffic-Vehicles and street cars, either singly or together, while using any street for purposes of travel.

Central Traffic District-That portion of this city bounded by and including the following parts of streets:

Mission street from the east line of First street to the west line of Sixth street; Sixth street from the south line of Mission street to the south line of Market street; the intersection of Sixth street, Market street, Golden Gate avenue and Taylor street; Taylor street from the north line of Golden Gate avenue to the north line of Sutter street; Sutter street from the west line of Taylor street to the east line of Grant avenue; Grant avenue from the south line of Sutter street to the north line of California street; California street from the west line of Grant avenue to the south line of Market street; Market street from the north line of California street to the west line of First street; First street from the north line of Market street to the south line of Mission street.

Business District—The territory contiguous to a street when fifty per cent (50%) or more of the frontage thereon for a distance of three hundred (300) feet or more is occupied by buildings in use for retail or wholesale business, also, any territory contiguous to a street which is immediately adjacent to or a continuation of a street within a business district when such territory is so designated by the Police Department.

Right of Way-The privilege of the immediate use of the street.

Park—To stand a vehicle for a period of time greater than is reasonably necessary for the actual loading or unloading of persons or materials.

Official Warning and Direction Signs—All warning and direction signs and signals not inconsistent with this ordinance heretofore and hereafter placed or erected under this ordinance or by authority of the Board of Supervisors.

ARTICLE II.

Authority of Police Traffic Signs and Signals.

Section 2. Obedience to Police—Officers of the Police Department are hereby authorized to direct, control, direct and regulate all traffic by means of officers or visible or audible signals, and it shall be unlawful for any person to refuse or fail to comply with any lawful order, signal or direction of a traffic or police officer. It shall be unlawful for any person to direct or attempt to direct traffic unless authorized to do so by order of the Chief of Police.

It shall be unlawful for any person in charge of any vehicle standing along or near the curb in any street within the Central Traffic District or Business District to fail, refuse or neglect to remove such vehicle from said curb when requested to do so by any traffic or police

officer.

Any police officer may remove, or cause to be removed, any standing vehicle or vehicles, whether occupied or not, from any street or alley to the nearest street or alley, to accommodate the necessity for such removal, in the following cases:

(1) When a public emergency requires such removal;

(2) When a vehicle is unlawfully parked so as to obstruct the tree and lawful passage of vehicular or pedestrian traffic.

Section 3. Signs—The Board of Supervisors shall by resolution determine and designate the character and location of all official warning and direction signs and signals. The Police Department shall make recommendations to the said Board of Supervisors as to the location of such official warning and direction signs and signals. Subject to this selection, the Police Department is hereby authorized, and as to those signs required hereunder it shall be its duty to cause to be placed and maintained all official warning and direction signs and signals. All signs authorized and required hereunder for a particular purpose shall be uniform.

No provision of this ordinance for which signs are required shall be enforceable against the alleged violator if at the time and place of the alleged violation the sign herein required is not in proper position and sufficiently legible to be seen by an ordinary observant person.

Section 6. Crosswalks—The Police Department is hereby authorized and required to cause to be established and maintained upon the surface of the roadway, by appropriate devices, marks or white lines, crosswalks at all places where in its opinion there is particular danger to pedestrians crossing the roadway.

ARTICLE III.

Pedestrians.

Section 9. Pedestrian's Right of Way at Intersection.

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(a) It shall be unlawful for the operator of any vehicle to drive into any crosswalk which is marked as provided in Section 6 of this ordinance while there is in such crosswalk upon the half of the roadway upon which such vehicle is traveling any pedestrian engaged in crossing the roadway until such pedestrian shall have passed beyond the path of said vehicle.

(b) It shall be unlawful for the operator of any vehicle to drive into any unmarked crosswalk while there is in such crosswalk upon

the half of the roadway upon which such vehicle is traveling any pedestrian engaged in crossing the roadway until such pedestrian shall have passed beyond the path of said vehicle, when the pedestrian shall indicate his intention to cross by a timely and continuous warning by holding up his hand, palm out toward approaching traffic.

(c) The operator of a vehicle shall stop before entering any cross-walk when any other vehicle proceeding in the same direction is stopped at such crosswalk for the purpose of permitting a pedestrian

to pass.

(d) The foregoing provisions of this section shall not apply at intersections where traffic is being directed by an officer or a traffic stop and go signal, at which intersections the rights of pedestrians and operators of vehicles shall be exercised under the direction of the officer or traffic signals.

ARTICLE IV.

Rules for Driving-Location of Turning Markers.

Section 15. The Police Department is hereby authorized, and as to those intersections mentioned in paragraph 1 of this section it shall be its duty to cause to be placed, turning markers in intersections as follows:

- (1) Within intersections where either intersecting roadway is less than sixty (60) feet in width and intersections where streets meet at other than right angles and in intersections where one street terminates in another, a marker shall be placed at every intersection of the medial line of each street, with the prolongation of the curb lines of the intersecting street; or at the intersection of the medial line of the street with the prolongation of the property lines of the intersecting street, or as near the intersecting points of said lines as may be practicable.
- (2) Intersections other than those mentioned in paragraph 1 may be marked as provided in paragraph 1, or a single marker may be placed within such intersection at the intersection of the medial lines of the intersecting streets.

Section 21. Vehicles shall not be driven or parked on sidewalks or in safety zones. The operator of a vehicle shall not drive within any sidewalk area except at a permanent or temporary driveway, nor upon any portion of the roadway which is designated and marked as a safety zone.

The Police Department is hereby authorized to establish and maintain by signs, paint marks or other material, safety zones at such street car stops, and at such other places as in its discretion require such

safety zones.

Section 22. Traffic Lanes—The Police Department is hereby authorized to cause to be marked traffic lanes upon the roadway where a regular alignment of traffic is necessary. Where such lanes have been marked in accordance with law and signs have been erected instructing the operators to keep in line it shall be unlawful for any operator to fail to keep his vehicle within the designated boundaries.

Arterial Streets.

Section 24. The following streets and parts of streets are hereby declared to constitute arterial streets for the purpose of this section:

Alemany boulevard from the west line of Bay Shore boulevard to the midline of San Jose avenue;

Army street from the west line of Third street to the east line of Potrero avenue, and from the west line of Potrero avenue to the east line of Mission street;

Bay Shore boulevard from the west line of San Bruno avenue to the County line of San Francisco;

Bay street from the center line of Columbus avenue to the east line

of Van Ness avenue, and from the west line of Van Ness avenue to the

west line of Fillmore street;

Bernal avenue southerly from the midline of Randall street to San Jose avenue, thence on San Jose avenue to the north line of Sagamore street, and from the south line of Alemany boulevard to the City and County line of San Francisco;

Bush street from the east line of Grant avenue to the east line of Van Ness avenue, and from the west line of Van Ness avenue to the

east line of Presidio avenue;

California street from the east line of Grant avenue to the east line of Van Ness avenue, and from the west line of Van Ness avenue to the west line of Arguello boulevard;

Cortland avenue from the west line of Bay Shore boulevard to the

east line of Mission street;

Fell street from the west line of Polk street to the east line of Van Ness avenue, and from the west line of Van Ness avenue tr the west line of Stanyan street;

Fulton street from the west line of Franklin street to the east line

of the Great Highway:

Geary street from the west line of Presidio avenue to Point Lobos avenue, thence along Point Lobos avenue from Geary street to the Great Highway:

Great Highway from Point Lobos avenue to the north line of Sloat

boulevard;

Howard street from the north line of Thirteenth street to the north line of Army street;

Junipero Serra boulevard from the west line of Portola drive to the

City and County line of San Francisco;

Lincoln way from the east line of the Great Highway to the west line of Third avenue, thence on the Kezar Stadium road in Golden Gate Park to the west line of the intersecting roadway, approximately 500 feet westerly of Stanyan street;

Lombard street from the west line of Van Ness avenue to the west

line of Lyon street;

Market street from the west line of Van Ness avenue to Portola drive, thence on Portola drive to the east line of Claremont boulevard, and on Portola drive from the west line of Claremont boulevard to the main roadway of Junipero Serra boulevard;

Mission street from the west line of Valencia street to the City and

County line of San Francisco;

Monterey boulevard from the west line of San Jose avenue to Santa Clara avenue, thence on Santa Clara avenue to the south line of Portola drive;

Nineteenth avenue from the north line of Lincoln way to the west

line of Junipero Serra boulevard;

Ocean avenue from the east line of the main roadway of Junipero Serra boulevard to the west line of San Jose avenue, from the east line of San Jose avenue to the west line of Alemany boulevard, and from the east line of Alemany boulevard to the west line of Mission street;

Pine street from the east line of Grant avenue to the east line of

Van Ness avenue;

Post street from the west line of Van Ness avenue to the west line of Presidio avenue;

Potrero avenue from the north line of Division street to the west line of San Bruno avenue;

Seventh avenue from the south line of Lincoln way to Laguna Honda boulevard, thence on Laguna Honda boulevard to Dewey boulevard, thence on Dewey boulevard to Claremont boulevard, thence on Clare

mont boulevard to the center line of Portola drive; Sickles avenue from the west line of Alemany boulevard to Sagamore street, thence on Sagamore street to Alemany boulevard, and thence on Alemany boulevard to the east line of Junipero Serra boulevard:

Silver avenue from the east line of Alemany boulevard to the west line of Mission street, and from the east line of Mission street to the west line of Bay Shore boulevard:

Sloat boulevard from the east line of the Great Highway to the west line of Nineteenth avenue and from the east line of Nineteenth avenue to the west line of Portola drive

Tenth street from the south line of Market street to the north line of Division street:

Third street from the south line of Channel street to the east line of

Bay Shore boulevard;

Twenty-fourth avenue from the south line of Geary street to the south line of Fulton street, thence on the roadway through Golden Gate Park to the north line of Lincoln way at Nineteenth avenue;

Twenty-fourth street from the west line of Dolores street to the east

line of Hoffman avenue:

Valencia street from the south line of Market street to the midline

of Mission street;

Van Ness avenue from the south line of North Point street to the north line of Market street and from the south line of Market street to the center line of Howard street.

Every operator of a vehicle or street car, cable car excepted, traversing any street intersecting any arterial street, shall bring such vehicle or street car to a full stop at the place where such street meets the prolongation of the nearer property line of such arterial street, or at such other place as may be indicated by a sign erected in accordance with this section, subject, however, to the directions of any stop-and-go signal or police officer at such intersection.

The Police Department is hereby authorized and required to cause to be placed and maintained, upon each and every street intersecting an arterial street, and at or near the property line of the arterial

street, suitable signs bearing the word "Stop."

One-Way Streets.

Section 26. Between the hours of seven (7) a. m. and six (6) p. m. of any day, excepting Sundays and legal holidays, it shall be unlawful for the operator of any vehicle to drive said vehicle in any part of any of the following streets except in the direction indicated herein: Southerly in Annie street between Market street and Mission street;

Southerly in Belden street between Pine street and Bush street;

Westerly in Brosnan street between Valencia street and Guerrero street:

Easterly on Campton place between Stockton street and Grant avenue; Northerly in Capp street between Mission street and Twenty-sixth street:

Easterly in Clay street between Mason street and The Embarcadero; Southerly in Claude Lane between Bush street and Sutter street; Westerly in Commercial street between The Embarcadero and Grant

avenue:

Westerly in Halleck street between Front street and Leidesdorff street; Easterly in Jackson street between The Embarcadero and Columbus avenue:

Easterly in Jessie street between First street and Ninth street;

Southerly in Leidesdorff street between Clay street and Pine street;

Westerly in Maiden lane from Kearny street to Grant avenue and easterly from Stockton street to Grant avenue;

Westerly in Merchant street between Front street and Kearny street; Westerly in Minna street between First street and Ninth street; Easterly in Mint street between Jessie street and Fifth street:

Westerly in Natoma street between First street and Ninth street;

Westerly in Oregon street between The Embarcadero and Battery street;

Southerly in Quincy street between California street and Pine street; Westerly in Sacramento street between The Embarcadero and Mason street;

Southerly in Spring street between Sacramento street and California

strect;

Southerly in St. Anne place between California street and Pine street;

Easterly in Stevenson street between First street and Ninth street; Southerly in Trinity place between Bush street and Sutter street;

Westerly in Washington street between The Embarcadero and Montcomery street.

Suitable signs shall be erected and maintained at all intersections of said parts of streets indicating the provisions of this section.

ARTICLE V.

Stopping, Standing and Parking—Stopping Prohibited in Specified Places—Standing for Loading Only in Certain Places.

Section 36 (a.) During the times specified herein it shall be unlawful for an operator to stand a passenger vehicle for a period of time longer than is necessary for the loading or unloading of passengers, provided such loading or unloading shall not consume more than three minutes, except in passenger loading zones; nor for an operator to stand any commercial vehicle for a period of time longer than it is necessary to load, unload and deliver materials, provided that the loading, unloading and delivery of said materials shall not consume more than twenty minutes, in any of the following places:

(1) In any public alley, other than the north side of Merchant. street between Kearny street and Montgomery street, in the Central Traffic District or in any business district during any hour of the day

or night.

(2) At any place not to exceed one hundred (100) feet from the intersection of any street with the southerly property line of Market street, from The Embarcadero to Van Ness avenue, between the hours of seven (7) a. m. and six (6) p. m. of any day; at any place not to exceed one hundred (100) feet from the prolongation of the northerly and westerly property lines, at intersections immediately adjacent to Market street, of those streets intersecting Market street from the northerly side, from The Embarcadero to Van Ness avenue, between the hours of seven (7) a. m. and six (6) p. m. of any day.

(3) At any place between the portal of any tunnel and seventy-five

(75) feet therefrom at any hour of any day.

(4) At any place where the grade of the roadway exceeds twenty

(20) per cent.

(5) In any loading zone duly established before the entrances to the following places:

Before the entrance to a hospital, day or night;

Before the entrance to a police station, day or night;

Before the entrance to a hotel, day or night;

Before the passenger entrance to a theater during performance;

Before the entrance to a church during services.

In loading zones other than those above specified, from seven (7) a.m. to six (6) p. m. on any day excepting Sundays and legal holidays.

(b) It shall be unlawful for any operator of a vehicle to stand said vehicle in a duly established taxicab stand; provided, however, that this provision shall not apply to the operators of duly licensed taxicabs authorized to occupy said stands.

(c) It shall be unlawful at any time during the day or night to stand a vehicle in a passenger loading zone longer than five minutes, and it

shall be unlawful to stand any commercial vehicle in such zone.

(d) The Police Department shall cause to be placed and maintained suitable signs to designate the provisions of this section. The Board of Supervisors shall designate the location of loading zones and passenger loading zones as defined by Section 1 of this ordinance, pro-

vided that a curb space of not to exceed fifty (50) per cent of the total curb length of any street between intersections may be reserved for loading zones and passenger loading zones. A curb space not to exceed one hundred (100) feet may be reserved temporarily or in an emergency by the Police Department at any place where required by public convenience.

Parking Prohibited on Certain Streets, 7 A. M. to 6 P. M.

Section 37. Between the hours of seven (7) a.m. and six (6) p.m. of any day, excepting Sundays and legal holidays, it shall be unlawful for the operator of a vehicle to stop said vehicle for a period of time longer than is necessary for the actual loading or unloading and delivery of passengers or materials in any of the following places:

livery of passengers or materials in any of the following places:
Annie street, Anthony street, Austin street, Campton place, Cedar street, Clementina street, Cortland avenue on the north side between Mission street and Folsom street, Ecker street, Elm street, Fern street, Hemlock street, Holland court, Ivy street, Linden street, Malden lane, Minna street, Mint street on the east, south and north sides, Monroe street, Montgomery street between Market and California streets, Myrtle street, Natoma street, Olive street, Pacific avenue on the north side between Columbus avenue and Van Ness avenue, Redwood street, Tehama street, Willow street.

Signs shall be erected and maintained not more than two hundred (200) feet apart in each block designating the provisions of this

section.

Parking Prohibited on Certain Streets, Day or Night.

Section 37½. It shall be unlawful for the driver of any vehicle to stop the same or park for a longer period of time than is necessary for the actual loading or unloading and delivering of passengers or materials during any hours of the day or night on the following streets:

On the west side of Bernal avenue from the south line of Brook street to the east line of Diamond street, and on the east side of Bernal avenue from the south line of Brook street to a point 500 feet northerly along the curb from the point of intersection of the easterly curb line of Diamond street and the westerly curb line of Bernal avenue;

On the north side of Brosnan place between Valencia street and

Guerrero street:

On the east side of Grant avenue between Bush street and Broadway; On the west side of Grant avenue between Bush and Pine streets:

On the north side of Jessie street between First street and Ninth street;

On the north side of Stevenson street between First street and Ninth street.

ARTICLE VI.

Street Cars.

Section 45. Driving on Street Car Tracks. Passing Safety Zones.—
(a) It shall be unlawful for the operator of any vehicle proceeding upon any street car tracks or so as to obstruct the movement of any street car to fail to remove said vehicle from said tracks or from in front of said street car as soon as practicable after signal from the operator of said street car.

(b) On Market street from The Embarcadero to Van Ness avenue it shall be unlawful to drive any vehicle to the left of any safety zone

established at a regular street car stop.

Section 2. Ordinance No. 8767 (New Series), in effect May 31, 1930, is hereby repealed.

Section 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Providing for the Establishment of a Bureau of Fire Prevention.

Bill No. 9313, Ordinance No. — (New Series), as follows:

Providing for the establishment of a Bureau of Fire Prevention, prescribing its duties and penalties for violations thereof; repealing Ordinance No. 5185 (New Series).

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco as follows:

Section 1. There is hereby established within the Fire Department of the City and County of San Francisco a Bureau of Fire Prevention and Public Safety, which shall be under the jurisdiction of the Board of Fire Commissioners.

The Board of Fire Commissioners shall detail from the uniformed force of the Fire Department to the Bureau of Fire Prevention an officer to be in charge of the Bureau, who shall be held responsible for all work in connection therewith.

The Board of Fire Commissioners shall detail from the uniformed force of the Fire Department, in addition to the officer in charge, such other officers and members as may be necessary to act as inspectors for the Bureau and to perform such other duties as the officer in charge of the Bureau may direct.

There is also hereby established in connection with the said Bureau, an Advisory Board, which shall also serve as a Board of Appeals, as hereafter provided. This Board shall consist of the Fire Marshal, the Superintendent of the Bureau of Building Inspection of the Board of Public Works, the Chief of the Department of Electricity, the Health Officer, the Chief of Police, President of the City Planning Commission, the Chairman of the Fire Committee of the Board of Supervisors, the Coroner and the Chief Engineer of the Fire Department, who shall be the Chairman of the said Board. The duties performed by and as members of the Advisory Board shall be in addition to their other official duties and shall be without additional compensation. Regular meetings of the Board shall be held not less than once each month, and special meetings at the discretion of the Chairman or at such times as a written request may be made therefor by three members of the Board. Five members of the Board shall constitute a quorum and decisions shall be by majority vote of those present, except when sitting as a Board of Appeals five votes shall be necessary to overrule an order of the Bureau.

It shall be the duty of the Advisory Board to promote an active cooperation and coordination between the Bureau and the officials constituting the Advisory Board, and to adjust or decide matters pertaining to inter-departmental relations, and it shall be the mutual duty of the Bureau and the Advisory Board, or the members thereof, to provide for the exchange of information pertaining to the work and responsibilities of the several departments represented, to permit access to non-confidential records, papers and data, and to render such

other warranted assistance as may be requested.

Section 2. The officer in charge of the Bureau, with the approval of the Board of Fire Commissioners, shall from time to time make such rules and regulations governing the personnel of said Bureau as he

may deem necessary.

Section 3. The officer in charge of the Bureau shall, not less than once each month, make a written report to the Board of Fire Commissioners, which shall include a statement of all work performed by the Bureau during the period covered. The said officer shall also file a copy of the said report with each member of the Advisory Board.

Section 4. The members of the Bureau arc hereby empowered to enter upon and make inspections of all buildings, structures or premises within the City and County of San Francisco for the purpose of determining if all laws and ordinances of the City and County of San Francisco have been complied with relative to proper, safe and adequate means of egress therefrom, and all laws and ordinances regarding fire prevention, fire protection and fire spread control are being complied with and the proper precautions are being maintained at all times for the protection of lives and property from fire, and they are charged with the duty of enforcing all the above referred to laws and ordinances.

Provided, that the above referred to right of entry shall be exercised only at reasonable hours, and in no case shall entry be made to any dwelling in the absence of the owner or tenant thereof, without the written order of a competent court.

The Bureau shall make like inspections of all buildings, structures and premises for the purpose of noting if all laws and ordinances have been complied with relative to the proper installation of appliances and apparatus for the extinguishment of fires, sounding of alarms and whatever safeguards that might be necessary for the protection of lives and property from fire, and they are likewise charged with the enforcement of the same.

Any condition found to exist in or about any building, structure or premises that endangers life or property from fire, explosion, panic or other calamity, and where there may be no law or ordinance governing the same, is hereby declared to be, and is a public nuisance,

and the Bureau is hereby authorized and directed to cause the abatement of said nuisance.

The Bureau is hereby authorized to take such photographs as may be necessary for the records of the Bureau.

It shall be the mutual duty of the Bureau and the members of the Advisory Board, when violations of law or ordinance are found which are under the jurisdiction of some other municipal department or official, promptly to report said violation to the said department or official.

Section 5. Whenever application shall be made for a permit for the erection, alteration or repair of any building, structure or premises subject to laws or ordinances governing fire-spread control, means of egress, installation of fire-fighting and fire-extinguishing appliances, fire alarms and automatic sprinkler systems, the plans and specifications for such work shall be examined with respect to said laws or ordinances and passed upon by the Bureau. Such examination shall be made in the office of the Bureau of Building Inspection of the Board of Public Works by an authorized representative of the Fire Department, who shall also be a fire warden specifically assigned to this work. Should the plans and specifications fail to comply with the fire laws above mentioned, the changes or additions required for acceptance by the Bureau of Fire Prevention shall be covered in a report to the Superintendent of the Bureau of Building Inspection. If or when the plans and specifications as presented or modified are in accordance with the above referred to fire laws, the approval of the Bureau of Fire Prevention shall be endorsed on the corresponding application for permit.

Prior to or upon the completion of the erection, alteration, repair of any building, structure or premises as described in the preceding paragraph, the Superintendent of the Bureau of Building Inspection shall so notify the Bureau of Fire Prevention, which shall thereupon make an inspection thereof, and if such construction, as respects the fire provisions referred to in the preceding paragraph, is found to be in accordance with the plans and specifications and modifications thereof as approved by the Bureau of Fire Prevention, the said Bureau shall so certify in writing to the Superintendent of the Bureau of Building Inspection. Should the Bureau refuse to give such approval, it shall make a written report on the reasons therefor to the Superintendent of the Bureau of Building Inspection, whose duty it shall be to see that the said construction is in all respects in full accord with the approved plans and specifications and modifications thereof before a certificate is issued.

Section 6. Whenever it may be necessary to obtain a permit or license to conduct any place of assemblage, hospitalization of any character, refuge or detention, or as a hotel, lodging house, rooming house, tenement house, apartment house, restaurant, office, workshop, automobile repair shop, factory, mill manufactory, department store or any establishment wherein any substance of a highly combustible or inflammable nature is stored or is to be stored, kept or held for sale, a written notice shall be sent to the Bureau of Fire Prevention by the department or official authorized by law or ordinance to issue such a permit or license so that an inspection can be made by said Bureau, and as a result of such inspection if any hazardous condition is found, or the business or occupancy is such as would endanger life or property, the permit or license shall not be issued until such time as proper safeguards and appliances have been installed according to law.

Section 7. Whenever any person, partnership, firm, or corporation shall receive any order from the Burean which in his or their opinion is unreasonable or unjust, or when any order issued by, or action of, the Bureau is deemed by any other municipal officer to interfere with or infringe upon his lawful jurisdiction, or when any order or action of any member of the Advisory Board is deemed by the Bureau to

interfere with or infringe upon the lawful jurisdiction of the Bureau, he or they may, within ten days after the receipt or issuance of said order or the occurrence of such act, apply in writing for a review of the said order or act by the Advisory Board, sitting as a Board of Appeals, and such action shall place the said order or act in abeyance pending the decision of the said Board, provided that said decision shall not be deferred for more than thirty (30) days following the presentation of the appeal. Should the appellant be a member of the Board his rights and privileges shall be unaffected by such fact. The said appeal shall be submitted to the Chief Engineer of the Fire Department, as the chairman of the said Board, who shall submit the same to the Board at its next meeting.

Section 8. It shall be the duty of the City or District Attorney, whenever notified by the Bureau of Fire Prevention, to prosecute all cases of neglect or refusal to obey any of the written order or orders of the Bureau issued pursuant to the provisions of the ordinance, and it shall be the duty of the City or District Attorney to aid, assist or defend the Bureau of Fire Prevention in the preparation, adoption and enforcement of all laws and ordinances and written orders of the Bureau relating to the prevention and protection from fires, or in the correction of any other hazardous condition that would endanger life or property.

Section 9. Nothing in this ordinance contained shall be in conflict with or in any way lessen or abrogate the power and authority granted by law to the Fire Marshal or any other official, department or board of the City and County of San Francisco.

Section 10. Any person or persons, firm, company, corporation, or association that violates, disobeys, omits, neglects or refuses to comply with any of the provisions of this ordinance is guilty of a misdemeanor, and, upon conviction thereof, shall be punished by a fine of not less than fifty (\$50.00) dollars nor more than two hundred and fifty (\$250.00) dollars, or by imprisonment in the County Jail for not more than six (6) months, or by both such fine and imprisonment, and every such person or persons, firm, company, corporation or association shall be deemed guilty of a separate offense for every day such violation, disobedience, omission, neglect or refusal shall continue and shall be subject to the penalty imposed by this section for each and every separate offense.

Section 11. Should any section or provision of this ordinance be held unconstitutional or invalid by any court, all other sections and provisions shall nevertheless be deemed as effective as though such unconstitutional or invalid section or provision had never been inserted in this ordinance.

Section 12. Ordinance No. 5185 (New Series) is hereby expressly repealed.

Gentlemen: Please be advised that the appeals from the decisions from the City Planning Commission will come before this Board on

Monday, August 4, 1930, and it is the duty of the Board of Supervisors to determine whether or not said decisions shall be sustained or overruled.

The Industrial Development and City Planning Committee urges the members to familiarize themselves with the particular locations involved so the disposition of these matters can be made on that date.

SUPERVISOR HAVENNER: If I may be permitted, although perhaps out of order, in view of the proceedings leading up to the present situation, the first steps were inaugurated by this Board of Supervisors. The Board, as you know, authorized the preparation of the bills to be submitted to the last session of the Legislature, turning over to the State Government, the State Department of Public Works, authority over toll bridges, and proposing the financing of such toll bridges through the issuance of revenue bonds. These bills were prepared in the City Attorney's office under the authority of this Board, and were subsequently approved by the Governor and State officials, and our representatives in Congress, at a conference in the State Building here, and in view of the fact that this Board joined in a petition to the President to appoint a commission to make a study of the Bay, and the further fact that this Board made a financial contribution to the cost to make the necessary Bay borings—some forty thousand dollars, if I recall correctly—1 would move you that the Board at this time approve and endorse the work of the Hoover-Young Bridge Commission and lend its cooperation to secure early action on the granting of a permit.

(The motion was duly seconded by Supervisor Hayden and carried

without objection.)

Illness of James D. Phelan.

Supervisor Hayden, referring to reported illness of former Mayor and United States Senator James D. Phelan, moved that the Board of Supervisors express its kindly interest in his welfare and its hope for his immediate and complete recovery.

Motion carried unanimously.

Protest Against Conditions of Recent Civil Service Examination.

Supervisor Havenner called attention to complaints made to him relative to conditions under which recent civil service examinations were conducted, and which, it is alleged, militated against applicants who had to wait long hours and were too tired or sick, as a result of such condition, to do their best. He moved that the Civil Service Commission be requested to report at next meeting on said complaints. So ordered.

There being no further business, the Board at the hour of 5 p. m. adjourned.
