## APPROVAL OF JOURNAL.

The Journal of Proceedings of the meeting of December 20, 1943, was considered read and approved.

## Communication.

The following communication was presented, read by the Clerk, and acted on as noted:

From Manager of Utilities, transmitting copy of two certified resolutions passed by the Public Utilities Commission, approving two contracts between the City and County of San Francisco and the United States of America, one in behalf of the United States Army and the other in behalf of the United States Navy. The contracts referred to provide in general for the transfer to the Federal Government of Treasure Island, in return for which various improvements to be constructed by the Army and by the Navy, at a cost of some \$10,000,000 will be turned over to the City and County of San Francisco.

## UNFINISHED BUSINESS.

### Final Passage.

Amending Ordinance 2374 (Series of 1939), Providing for Removal of Certain Street Car Tracks by Substituting the Amount of \$115,855.24 in Lieu of \$90,000.

(Series of 1939)

Bill No. 2681, Ordinance No. 2556, as follows:

Amending Bill No. 2329, Ordinance No. 2374 (Series of 1939), entitled "Providing for the Removal of Certain Street Railway Tracks of the Market Street Railway Company Due to the Substitution of Auto-

mobile Buses in Lieu of Street Car Service on Twenty-fourth Street, Fourteenth Street, Guerrero Street, San Jose Avenue, Thirtieth Street, First Street, Divisadero Street, and Fillmore Street, and Designating the Work to Be Done and Apportionment of Expense in the Removal of Said Street Railway Tracks, the Manner and Times in Which Said Street Railway Tracks Shall Be Removed and the Disposition Thereof in the Interest of Production for the War Effort and the Repaving in Connection Therewith, and Providing for Track and Pavement Repair in Certain Track Areas on McAllister Street, Mission Street, Fourth Street, Townsend Street, Eighth Street, Folsom Street, Sansome Street, Bush Street, Second Street, and Brannan Street."

by amending Sections 2 and 14 thereof and substituting in said sections the sum of \$115,855.24 (One Hundred and Fifteen Thousand, Eight Hundred and Fifty-five Dollars and Twenty-four Cents) in lieu of \$90,000, as originally provided in said sections.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco, as follows:

Section 1. Sections 2 and 14 of Bill 2329, Ordinance 2374 (Series of 1939) the title of which is recited above are hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 2. The City and County of San Francisco and the Market Street Railway Company are to share equally the costs for all rail removals in all track areas described in said Exhibit "A" and for all further work in connection therewith. The total of such costs, together with the costs of inspection by the city, shall not exceed the sum of \$115,855.24 (One Hundred and Fifteen Thousand, Eight Hundred and Fifty-five Dollars and Twenty-four Cents). The Department of Public Works shall maintain a separate accounting of all of the costs incurred in connection with the work set forth in Exhibit "A".

Upon the completion and acceptance of said work, the Department of Public Works shall prepare a statement setting forth the total costs and deducting therefrom the actual amount received from the salvage of the steel rail and appurtenances referred to in Section 1 thereof, and the remainder shall represent the costs which shall be shared equally by the City and County of San Francisco and the Market Street Railway Company.

If the amount to be assumed by the Market Street Railway Company as its share of the costs is less than \$57,927.62 (Fifty-seven Thousand, Nine Hundred and Twenty-seven Dollars and Sixty-two Cents) which, under the provisions of Section 14 hereof the Market Street Railway Company has advanced for the purpose of providing for said costs, then said excess advanced shall be refunded to the Market Street Railway Company within 15 days after the net costs have been determined as in this section provided.

The term "costs incurred in connection with the work" as used in this section is hereby defined to mean all direct costs incurred for the performing of the work plus an amount of \$2,630 (Two Thousand Six Hundred and Thirty Dollars) to cover the cost of inspection.

Section 14. This ordinance shall not become effective unless and until the Board of Supervisors shall adopt an ordinance providing for the financing of the cost of doing the work set forth in Exhibit "A" of this ordinance and appropriating the sum of \$115,855.24 (One Hundred and Fifteen Thousand, Eight Hundred and Fifty-five Dollars and Twenty-four Cents) which is the estimated cost of doing the work scheduled and set forth in Exhibit "A," \$57,927.62 (Fifty-seven Thousand Nine Hundred and Twenty-seven Dollars and Sixty-two Cents) of said appropriation to be made from the surplus existing in the Special Road Improvement Fund and an equal sum to be advanced by the Market Street Railway Company and paid into the Treasury of the



City and County of San Francisco and thereupon to be appropriated for the purpose of defraying the cost of doing said work.

**Appropriating an Additional Sum of \$12,927.62 to the \$45,000 Heretofore Appropriated as City's Portion of Cost of Certain Track Removal and Consequent Street Reconstruction.**

(Series of 1939)

Bill No. 2682, Ordinance No. 2557, as follows:

Providing for the financing of the cost of Exhibit "A" incorporated in Ordinance No. 2374 (Series of 1939) of the Board of Supervisors, and amended by Bill No. 2681 by appropriating the additional sum of \$12,927.62 from the surplus existing in the Special Road Improvement Fund to the credit of Appropriation 248,949.00, representing the City's portion of the estimated cost of said schedule, and providing further for the amount to be advanced by the Market Street Railway Company as its portion of the estimated cost and appropriating the same for such purpose.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco, as follows:

Section 1. The sum of \$12,927.62 is hereby appropriated and set aside from the surplus existing in the Special Road Improvement Fund to the credit of Appropriation 248,949.00, being the City and County of San Francisco's additional portion of the estimated cost for track removal and replacing of streets as set forth in Exhibit "A" incorporated in Ordinance No. 2374 (Series of 1939) by the Board of Supervisors and as amended by Bill No. 2681. The estimated cost of doing the work under the reference Exhibit "A" is \$115,855.24.

Section 2. This ordinance shall not be effective for encumbrance or expenditure unless and until the Market Street Railway Company shall have deposited with the Treasurer of the City and County of San Francisco an amount equal to 50 per cent of the estimated cost of doing all of the work provided for under said Exhibit "A."

Section 3. When said funds are deposited by the Market Street Railway Company as herein provided such funds are hereby appropriated for the purposes herein specified.

Section 4. At the time of the passage of Ordinance No. 2374 (Series of 1939) by the Board of Supervisors, it was estimated that the cost of work set forth in Exhibit "A" would be approximately \$90,000. On November 24, 1943, bids were received covering this work and the low bid as submitted, together with the cost of inspection, brings the estimated total cost to \$115,855.24, necessitating an additional appropriation by the City and County of San Francisco, and an additional deposit by the Market Street Railway Company.

**Authorizing Lease of Certain City-Owned Land in Stanislaus County.**

(Series of 1939)

Bill No. 2683, Ordinance No. 2558, as follows:

Authorizing lease of certain City owned land in Stanislaus County.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco, as follows:

Section 1. Pursuant to Section 93 of the Charter of the City and County of San Francisco and in accordance with the recommendation of the Public Utilities Commission, the Director of Property is hereby authorized and directed to arrange for leasing certain City owned real property situated in the County of Stanislaus, State of California, as follows:

Those certain 110 foot strips of land described in deed dated July 18, 1923 and recorded July 18, 1923 in Book 27 at page 330, Official Records of Stanislaus County; also

Those certain tracts of land described in deed dated July 18, 1923 and recorded July 18, 1923 in Book 29 at page 203, Official Records of Stanislaus County.

Excepting the portions thereof conveyed to the State of California for highway purposes by deed dated September 22, 1938.

Section 2. The above mentioned real property may be leased as a whole or subdivided. The City and County of San Francisco, a municipal corporation, as lessor, reserves the right to use such portions of said 110 foot strips of land as may be necessary or convenient for the construction, reconstruction, maintenance, operation, patrol and repair of its existing or future structures located or to be located thereon. The lessor shall not be responsible for any damage to crops of the lessee occasioned by the exercise of such reserved rights.

Bill No. 2685, Ordinance No. 2560, as follows:

Creating San Francisco Water Department Revolving Fund in the sum of \$30,000, repealing Section 13 of Ordinance No. 8691 and appropriating the sum of \$30,000 for the purpose of this ordinance.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco, as follows:

Section 1. There is hereby created a San Francisco Water Department Revolving Fund in the sum of \$30,000 for the purpose of paying expenses incident to the conduct of the San Francisco Water Department which cannot be conveniently paid by warrants drawn by the Controller upon the Treasury of the City and County. All expenditures from the said San Francisco Water Department Revolving Fund shall be made in accordance with rules and regulations of the Public Utilities Commission and of the Controller.

Section 2. The San Francisco Water Department Revolving Fund shall be maintained in such bank or banks as may be designated by the Public Utilities Commission, and disbursements therefrom shall be made by checks signed by a representative or representatives designated by the Public Utilities Commission.

Section 3. The Manager of Utilities shall cause a full, true and correct account to be kept of all moneys received for or disbursed from said revolving fund, and shall, at least once during each month, render to the Controller a full, true and correct account of all disbursements made from said fund, together with proper vouchers supporting said disbursements, and upon said disbursements being approved by the Controller, the Controller shall draw his warrant in favor of said revolving fund for the aggregate amount of said disbursements.

Section 4. Section 13 of Ordinance No. 8691 is hereby repealed.

Section 5. From the surplus existing pursuant to above Section 4 in the funds heretofore provided for the Water Revenue Fund there is hereby appropriated the sum of \$30,000 for the purposes of this ordinance as hereinbefore recited.

Bill No. 2687, Ordinance No. 2562, as follows:

Creating Hetch Hetchy Pay Roll Revolving Fund in the sum of \$1,000, repealing Ordinances Nos. 15.0321 and 15.0322 and appropriating the sum of \$1,000 for the purposes of this ordinance.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco, as follows:

Section 1. There is hereby created the Hetch Hetchy Pay Roll Revolving Fund which fund shall be maintained in the Bank of America, Sonora, California, in a sum not to exceed \$1,000, for the purpose of paying salaries and wages not to exceed sixteen days compensation to persons employed on a temporary basis in the conduct of the work of the Hetch Hetchy project which employments may be terminated between the dates of established pay-days and payments for which cannot be conveniently made by warrant approved by the Controller and drawn on the Treasurer; provided, however, that all expenditures from said fund shall be made in accordance with rules and regulations of the Public Utilities Commission and of the Controller.

Section 2. Payments out of the Hetch Hetchy Pay Roll Revolving Fund shall be made by checks signed by a representative or representatives designated by the Public Utilities Commission.

Section 3. It shall be the duty and responsibility of the department head to withhold from the earnings of the temporary employees aforesaid such amounts as may be required by law to be withheld and to account therefor as pay roll deductions in accordance with established time roll and pay roll procedures and to do all things as by law may be required to be done.

Section 4. Ordinance No. 15.0321 and Ordinance No. 15.0322 amending the first mentioned are hereby repealed.

Section 5. From the surplus existing pursuant to above Section 4 in the funds heretofore provided for the Hetch Hetchy Project Operating Fund, there is hereby appropriated the sum of \$1,000 for the purposes of this ordinance as hereinbefore recited.

Whereas, the Director of Property, the Park Commission and the Library Commission have recommended that said property be leased to the Acorn Petroleum Company; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That said offer of the Acorn Petroleum Company be and is hereby accepted; be it

Further Resolved, That the Mayor and the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors be and they are hereby authorized and directed to execute the necessary lease on behalf of the City and County of San Francisco as Lessor.

Whereas, General Petroleum Corporation of California, a corporation, offered to lease said property for a period of twenty years, subject to the terms and conditions set forth in the proposed lease on file in the office of the Director of Property and to pay the City and County of San Francisco a cash bonus of \$8,800 upon execution of the lease and a one-sixth royalty of the oil, gas and other hydrocarbon substances produced from said land; and

Whereas, the General Petroleum Corporation of California was the highest responsible bidder and all other bids were rejected by the Director of Property; and

Whereas, the General Petroleum Corporation of California has paid the City a deposit of \$880 in connection with this transaction; and

Whereas, the Director of Property, the Park Commission and the Library Commission have recommended that said property be leased to the General Petroleum Corporation of California; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That said offer of the General Petroleum Corporation of California be and is hereby accepted; be it

**Amending Section 108, Article 2, Part III, of the San Francisco Municipal Code, Providing for the Licensing of Circuses and Wild Animal Shows.**

(Series of 1939)

Amending Section 108, Article 2, Part III, of the San Francisco Municipal Code, providing for the licensing of circuses and wild animal shows, by adding the word "operator" to those who shall obtain a

license; by amending the definition of a circus and repealing that of a wild animal show; and by providing for certain data to be set forth in the permit required from the Chief of Police.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco, as follows:

Section 1. Section 108, Article 2, Part III, of the San Francisco Municipal Code, is hereby amended to read as follows:

**SEC. 108. Circuses.** Every owner, lessee or operator of a circus, as hereinafter defined in this Section, shall pay a license fee for each and every day any exhibition or performance is given therein according to the following schedule:

(a) Where the seating capacity is not more than thirty-five hundred (3,500) persons, the sum of One Hundred (\$100) Dollars for the first day and the sum of Seventy (\$70) Dollars for each additional day thereafter.

(b) Where the seating capacity is more than thirty-five hundred (3,500) persons, the sum of Five Hundred (\$500) Dollars for the first day and the sum of Three Hundred (\$300) Dollars for each additional day thereafter.

(c) For each side show in connection with or belonging to a circus, where a separate admission fee is charged or collected, the sum of Ten (\$10) Dollars a day.

(d) Where the circus is given in or about the Municipal Auditorium located at the Civic Center, and said auditorium is rented or leased at the regular rates usually charged therefor, the sum of Fifty (\$50) Dollars each day, with no additional license fee for any side show.

No additional license shall be required of such owner, lessee or operator of a circus for any team, wagon, truck, automobile, freight or passenger car or equipment that is a part of such circus and in actual use.

For the purpose of this Section, a circus is hereby defined to be an exhibition or entertainment at which feats of horsemanship, acrobatic feats, and trained or wild animals are exhibited or displayed, or any combination of same, for which exhibition or entertainment an admission fee is charged, and which exhibition or entertainment is conducted by a person having no regular established place of business in the City and County of San Francisco for the exhibition or display thereof. Provided, however, that the definition of a circus shall not include a rodeo exhibition or show which is licensed under the provisions of Section 84 of this Article, nor shall it be held to include pictorial representations or theatrical performances.

The Tax Collector shall not issue a license under the provisions of this Section unless the owner, lessee or operator of said circus shall obtain a permit to conduct the same from the Chief of Police and present to the Tax Collector such permit duly certified by the secretary of the Chief of Police. Said permit shall set forth the seating capacity of the circus, the date or dates of the year on which the exhibition or entertainment are to be held, and the number of side shows in connection with or belonging to such circus.

The Superintendent of Laguna Honda Home may, under procedure established by the Purchaser of Supplies as to purchases and sales, and in accordance with fiscal procedures established by the Controller and rules and regulations of the Civil Service Commission governing employments, purchase contractual services, materials and equipment for the Laguna Honda Home Workshop and employ and pay inmates for services rendered therein and dispose of the products of said shop.

Section 4. The Workshop Fund shall be used for (1) payment of salaries to inmates working in said shop; (2) contractual services, materials and supplies and equipment for said shop, and (3) such things as may be for the general welfare of the inmates of Laguna Honda Home which are not provided for them by other appropriations, when such expenditures are approved by the Director of Public Health.

Consideration Continued on Notice of Motion to Reconsider.

Election of Edward Kenney as Director of the Golden Gate Bridge and Highway District.

(Series of 1939)

Resolution No. . . . . , as follows:

Resolved, That the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco does hereby elect Edward Kenney as a Director of the Golden Gate Bridge and Highway District for the City and County of San Francisco for the unexpired term of Edward G. Brown, resigned.

#### Point of Order.

Supervisor Brown raised a point of order, stating that the foregoing resolution was before the Board out of order. The resolution was referred to committee on November 29, and thirty days not having elapsed when it was called out of committee by Supervisor Shannon on December 20th, in accordance with the rules of the Board, it was not properly before the Board. However, the thirty days now having elapsed, it would be in order to call the resolution out from committee at this time for consideration at the next regular meeting of the Board.

Supervisor Shannon, thereupon, announced that he had inquired as to the status of the resolution on December 20th, and that the Chairman of the Public Utilities Committee had announced that the resolution was still under consideration in committee. Whereupon, Supervisor Shannon had announced that if the committee did not have a report by January 3d, the last day upon which he would have an opportunity to vote on the resolution, of which he was the author, he would notify the President of the Board that he would call the matter out from committee. The President of the Board then ordered the matter on the Calendar. No objection was made at that time, and the resolution was, in his opinion, properly before the Board.

Supervisor Brown, in further reply to Supervisor Shannon, stated that in committee an amendment to the resolution had been proposed. The committee had been unable to make a recommendation, since he favored one candidate and Supervisor Meyer favored another candidate,



and the third member of the committee, Supervisor Roncovieri, had not attended any committee meeting. He believed the committee should have further opportunity to deliberate on the matter. The Board of Supervisors, as it will be constituted after January 8, should have the opportunity to decide on the director to be appointed. If his point of order should prevail, that opportunity would be afforded.

Supervisor MacPhee declared that in his opinion, the point of order was not well taken, basing his views on the words in Rule 39 of the Board providing that a member of the Board could call a matter out from committee after thirty days "unless ordered by the majority of the members present" to be reported earlier. Inasmuch as a majority of the Board was present on December 20th, when Supervisor Shannon announced his intention to call the matter out from committee for the meeting of January 3d, and the President of the Board had ordered the matter on the Board's Calendar, and that no objection to the order was made, the resolution was on the Calendar by order of the Board.

The Chair, thereupon, ruled the point of order not well taken.

The President, Supervisor Colman, in explanation of his ruling, and in expressing his own views of the matter, announced that he believed in according to every member of the Board all possible consideration and courtesy. However, in the final analysis, January 3d would be Supervisor Shannon's last meeting of the Board. The conduct of the bridge is a matter for the future, and accordingly, the future Board, which must deal with the Board of Bridge Directors, should have a voice in the election of those directors. The two newly elected Supervisors should have a voice in the matter. He would vote against the election of Mr. Kenney as bridge director because he favored Mr. Vayssie for that position. If the majority of the Board should decide against Mr. Vayssie, he would, before the result of the vote was announced, change his vote and give notice that he would move for reconsideration at the next regular meeting of the Board.

Thereupon, Supervisor Mead questioned the President as to his intention of changing his vote and moving for reconsideration.

The President agreed that his purpose was to delay final action in order to permit the new members of the Board to express their views.

Supervisor Mead thereupon objected to the views expressed by the President. He believed that the selection of the new director was a matter for consideration of the present Board—not for a future Board.

#### Appeal From Ruling of the Chair.

Supervisor Brown then announced that while ordinarily he would concur in the ruling of the Chair, he could not in this case, because he believed the Chair had erred. He would, therefore, appeal from the ruling of the Chair.

*Appeal died for want of a second.*

Thereupon, Supervisor Shannon, seconded by Supervisor Mead, moved adoption of the resolution appointing Mr. Edward Kenney as Director of the Golden Gate Bridge and Highway District.

In seconding the motion, Supervisor Mead held that members leaving the Board should be entitled to perform their duties. He repeated his previous statement that the election of a director was the duty of the present Board, which the present Board had not yet performed, and he urged the Chair not to insist on reconsideration. He feared that there must be some "shenanigans" going on, otherwise there would not be such insistence on delay.

Supervisor Brown, thereupon, announced that there were some "shenanigans," to which he would not be a party. Any time members of the Board would commit themselves a year in advance, he stated,

there must be some "shenanigans" going on. He would not be a party to such "shenanigans."

Supervisor Mead, in reply, stated that there had been no commitments.

After the presentation of the Journal of Proceedings of the meeting of February 23, 1943, and the reading of portions thereof, Supervisor Mead announced that his statement in regard to commitments was in error.

Thereupon, Supervisor Shannon renewed his motion for adoption of the resolution under consideration. Motion seconded by Supervisors Mead and Green.

#### Amendment Proposed.

Supervisor Brown moved to amend the resolution, by substituting the name of Mr. Vayssie in lieu of the name of Mr. Kenney. Motion seconded by Supervisor Colman.

#### Explanation of Vote.

Supervisor Mead, in explanation of his vote on the proposed amendment, announced he would vote "No" on the amendment. He did not know Mr. Vayssie nor did he know anything about him. He could not vote for him.

#### Amendment Refused Approval.

Thereupon, the roll was called and the amendment *failed of passage* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Brown, Colman—2.

Noes: Supervisors Gallagher, Gartland, Green, MacPhee, Mead, Meyer, Shannon—7.

Absent: Supervisors Roncovieri, Uhl—2.

#### Explanation of Vote.

Supervisor Brown then stated that he had no personal opposition to Mr. Kenney; he had supported Mr. Vayssie because he believed that he would make a good director of the Bridge and Highway District. Since his name had been refused by the members of the Board, he would vote for Mr. Kenney.

Whereupon, the roll was called on the original resolution, as follows:

Ayes: Supervisors Brown, Gallagher, Gartland, Green, MacPhee, Mead, Meyer, Shannon—8.

No: Supervisor Colman—1.

Absent: Supervisors Roncovieri, Uhl—2.

#### Notice of Motion to Reconsider.

Before the result of the foregoing vote had been announced, Supervisor Colman changed his vote from "No" to "Aye" and served notice that he would move for reconsideration at the next regular meeting of the Board.

The vote then stood:

Ayes: Supervisors Brown, Colman, Gallagher, Gartland, Green, MacPhee, Mead, Meyer, Shannon—9.

Absent: Supervisors Roncovieri, Uhl—2.

Subsequently during the proceedings, Supervisor Mead announced that it would be necessary for him to be absent from the meeting of January 10, 1944, and from the following meeting, also, and he re-

quested that no action be taken on motion for reconsideration until his return three weeks later.

Whereupon, Supervisor Colman announced that at the meeting of January 10, 1944, he would move that action on his motion for reconsideration be postponed until Supervisor Mead's return.

**Appeal From Court Decision in Re Cases Callahan et al. v. City and County of San Francisco, and Murray et al. v. You will recall that on June 21, 1943, a petition for a writ of mandate was filed by Robert Callahan (active) and John Bencich (pensioned), members of the San Francisco Fire Department, on behalf of themselves and the other active and pensioned members of the Fire Department, against the City and County of San Francisco, Angelo J. Rossi, as Mayor, the members of the Fire Commission, Albert J. Sullivan, as Chief of the Fire Department, the members of the Civil Service Commission, Kathleen Dolen, as Secretary of the Civil Service Commission, Harold J. Boyd, as Controller, Thomas McCarthy, as Treasurer, and all the members of the Board of Supervisors, as respondents.

This petition was filed for the purpose of compelling an increase in the salaries and pensions of active and pensioned members of the Fire Department from January 11, 1943, to July 1, 1943. The people voted on the charter amendment at the November 1942 election. The date of the ratification of the charter amendment by the Legislature, providing for an increase in the salaries and pensions of members of the Fire Department, was January 11, 1943.

Shortly after the filing of the petition for writ of mandate a stipulation was entered into by this office with petitioners and an order was based thereon which provided that Harold J. Boyd, Controller, should be restrained from transferring 1942-1943 unexpended funds in the amount of \$222,000 into the 1943-1944 general fund, pursuant to the charter. Thereupon said money was placed in a separate fund pending the outcome of the litigation. It is now held in such separate fund, and will be so held until this matter is finally determined and disposed of.

There is no question about salary and pension increases after July

1, 1943. They are conceded to be legally sound and have been regularly paid.

The instant case involves the construction of the language of the charter provision with respect to the effective date of the increase in compensation of active and pensioned members of the Fire Department. A similar matter is pending with regard to members of the Police Department, involving about the same amount of money. The proceeding involving members of the Police Department involves another and separate charter provision, but one of the same general nature.

It was the contention of respondent, at the time of the trial, that the members of the Fire Department were not entitled to payment of any salary or pension increase until July 1, 1943, because no appropriation had ever been made by the Board of Supervisors to cover the period from January 11, 1943, to July 1, 1943. The charter requires appropriations by ordinance before expenditures can be made. An appropriation was regularly made for the period subsequent to July 1, 1943, pursuant to the charter. The language which has caused the dispute reads as follows:

"This amendment shall become effective when the joint legislative resolution approving such amendment is filed with the Secretary of State, and the increased salaries provided for herein shall be payable only when the proper appropriation has been made to meet said salaries but not later than July 1, 1943."

The case was tried before Judge Theresa Meikle. She gave judgment in favor of petitioners. There was no written opinion, consequently the reasons for deciding in favor of petitioners are not known. Undoubtedly, within the next few weeks written findings of fact will be presented to the court and thereafter a judgment will probably be signed. Respondents have sixty days after entry of judgment within which to appeal.

The question now arises as to whether an appeal from the judgment of the trial court should be taken by this office on behalf of the respondents in order to finally determine the matter. Since you are one of the respondents, it is necessary that we be advised by you with regard to your desires.

You will recall that on June 21, 1943, a petition for a writ of mandate was filed by Wesley F. Murray (active) and John J. McCarte (pensioned), members of the San Francisco Police Department, on behalf of themselves and the other active and pensioned members of the Police Department, against the City and County of San Francisco, Angelo J. Rossi, as Mayor, the members of the Police Commission, Charles W. Dullea, as Chief of Police, the members of the Civil Service Commission, Kathleen Dolen, as Secretary of the Civil Service Com-

mission, Harold J. Boyd, as Controller, Thomas McCarthy as Treasurer, and all the members of the Board of Supervisors, as respondents.

This petition was filed for the purpose of compelling an increase in the salaries and pensions of active and pensioned members of the Police Department from January 11, 1943, to July 1, 1943. The people voted on the charter amendment at the November 1942 election. The date of the ratification of the charter amendment by the Legislature, providing for an increase in the salaries and pensions of members of the Police Department, was January 11, 1943.

It is now held in such separate fund, and will be so held until this matter is finally determined and disposed of.

### Discussion.

Following the presentation and reading of the foregoing communications by the Clerk, Supervisor MacPhee explained the matter briefly, stating that the question before the Board was to determine whether or not the Board desired the City Attorney to take an appeal from the decision that has been rendered by Judge Meikle. The Police and the Fire Commissions have both recommended that no appeal be taken. Under the language of the charter amendments approved by the voters and ratified by the Legislature, Supervisor MacPhee continued, he doubted whether an appeal would succeed in reversing the decision of the court.

Thereupon, Supervisor Mead moved that the Board of Supervisors go on record as concurring in the recommendations of the Police and the Fire Commissions.

Supervisor Shannon announced that he believed that the Board should, by resolution, request the City Attorney not to take an appeal from the decisions of the court in the two cases mentioned.

Supervisor Colman, in discussing the matter, stated that it seemed to him that there was another important question involved aside from the question of appropriation of money; that was, as he understood it, the security of both the appropriation ordinance and the budget. Had anyone announced that a claim for retroactive compensation would be made, he would have understood the situation. It was not his intention to have money made available before the end of the fiscal year. He believed that before a precedent of this sort should be established, increasing salaries in the middle of a fiscal year, the Board should have an opinion from the highest court. As to the money involved, some \$460,000, it was the duty of the Board, as the guardians of the taxpayers' money, to safeguard taxpayers' money as well as to look out for the rights and privileges of the members of the Fire and Police Departments. It was not up to him to determine whether or not the members of the Fire and Police Departments were entitled to the \$460,000 which they were seeking, but it was his duty to safeguard the rights of the taxpayers, and to make it perfectly certain, in view of the fact that there is a difference of opinion as to the justice of the claim, whether the City and County is liable, under the law, to pay the retroactive salary increases. The Board should apply the same principles of caution in expending the taxpayers' money as the members should apply in expending their own money. No immediate great injustice would be done to the members of the two departments if an appeal were to be taken. A speedy hearing and a speedy verdict can be expected. He believed an appeal would be extremely good business. He moved that the Board take no action in the matter until Judge Meikle's written decision had been filed.

Supervisor Mead opposed the proposed delay. It would mean only a delay for the purpose of finding out the reasons for the court's decision.

Supervisor MacPhee was opposed to postponement. While he believed there was merit to Supervisor Colman's stand, he felt that the Board should take into consideration the fact that it had approved the charter amendment for submission to the electors, and to say that it did not realize that there was a possibility that the effective date for payment of increased salaries might be taken into court would be the same as saying that it did not know the provisions of the charter amendment itself. The effective date of the charter amendment is very clear; the amendment reads:

"This amendment shall become effective when the joint legislative resolution approving such amendment is filed with the Secretary of State, and the increased salaries provided for

therein shall be payable only when the proper appropriation has been made to meet said salaries, but not later than July 1, 1943."

Apparently the Judge had only one decision to render in the case. As much as he was in sympathy with Supervisor Colman's suggestion, he was afraid there was nothing that could be done in the matter.

Supervisor Green believed that Supervisor Colman's request for postponement until the Board had received written decision from Judge Meikle was out of order; the court does not have to give any reasons for a particular decision. Judge Meikle has done everything required of her in the matter. However, if Supervisor Colman's motion to postpone action pending receipt of written decision from the Judge, to what date will the matter be postponed.

Supervisor Colman, in reply, answered "until the time a written opinion is rendered."

Thereupon, the roll was called and the motion to postpone action was *defeated* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Brown, Colman—2.

Noes: Supervisors Gallagher, Gartland, Green, MacPhee, Mead, Meyer, Shannon—7.

Absent: Supervisors Roncovieri, Uhl—2.

Supervisor Colman, in speaking of the main question, opposed resolution presented by Supervisor Shannon. Involved in the matter were questions of the security and the sanctity of the appropriation ordinance and the budget, and the safeguarding of a sizeable sum of the peoples' money. No harm can come if an appeal is taken, and the expense of such appeal would be nominal. He would vote against the resolution.

## MAYOR'S ANNUAL MESSAGE

OFFICE OF THE MAYOR  
San Francisco

January 3, 1944.

To the Honorable  
The Board of Supervisors  
City and County of San Francisco.

Gentlemen:

The final sentence in the first paragraph of Section 25 of the Charter reads as follows:

"He (the Mayor) shall, at the first meeting of the Board of Supervisors in January of each year, communicate by message to the Supervisors a general statement of the condition of the affairs of the city and county, and recommend the adoption of such measures as he may deem expedient and proper."

In my judgment it would be neither proper nor expedient for me, now, to recommend the adoption of any measures.

With propriety I believe I may make a general statement of the condition of the affairs of the City and County as they are today, and—with equal propriety—contrast the present-day condition with the conditions as they existed at the start of my administration thirteen years ago.

Few men in the city's history have had the varied experience that I have had in the past quarter of a century. Service as a Commissioner, as Foreman of the Grand Jury, as a Supervisor, and as Mayor qualify me to speak on municipal affairs.

Only one other person, the late James Rolph, Jr., served longer as the city's Chief Executive.

Not one of the thirty-two men who preceded me as Mayor of San Francisco served during such a period of stress, of crisis, and of urgent need as have been the daily lot of public officials everywhere during the past dozen years.

Every thinking adult knows what we have all had to face and endure and struggle through since 1931: World-wide economic upheaval, and the most destructive depression in this nation's history; world-wide industrial strife and unemployment; world-wide labor unrest; and, finally, world-wide warfare, with dislocations reaching into the daily, intimate, personal life of every man, every woman, every child in the civilized world.

Each year found the problems changing, and the plans and the policies of one year were found to be of little avail the next year.

Not one of the thirty-two men who preceded me as Mayor in San Francisco's ninety-seven years as an American city had to contend with so many problems of such magnitude.

Now that I am about to lay aside my responsibilities as Mayor, I think I am justified in submitting a statement as to how I discharged my duties.

Let me begin by discussing the Charter. The present Charter became effective on January 8, 1932, twelve years ago. Since that date—and this may surprise even you gentlemen of the legislative branch of government—NINETY-FOUR Charter amendments have been submitted to the people for their consideration. FIFTY-FIVE of the ninety-four submitted were approved by the voters. In other words, 58 per cent of the proposals met with public approval. The various Boards of Supervisors are to be commended for their willingness to recognize that the Charter was not a perfect document, as well as for their realistic recog-



nition that the times through which we were passing created special problems which called for specialized legislation.

The present Charter came into being primarily because of defects in the Charter which it replaced. The 1900 Charter had not provided, among other things, specific checks, and balances, and controls, and as a result public finances had become sadly muddled.

A reading of the Charter shows that although under it the Mayor has tremendous additional responsibilities, including the review and submission of the annual budget, as compared to former Charters, yet its limitations of authority on the Mayor are such that the check, balance and control system, though fundamentally sound, is, on matters of public policy, at times unwieldy.

That there always have been and always will be differences between the legislative, administrative and executive branches of local government is frankly admitted. Such differences are inevitable in a democracy. However, it must be recognized that there are times when those differences are political in origin. To refer to the Charter of 1932 as a "Strong Mayor Type of Charter" is a misnomer. If the phrase is intended to mean that the Mayor has unlimited or even unusual powers, it is in conflict with the facts.

In truth, the Charter confers "Strong Mayor" powers on the Chief Executive only under the emergency clause of Section 25, which reads as follows:

"In case of a public emergency involving or threatening the lives, property or welfare of the citizens, or the property of the city and county, the Mayor shall have the power, and it shall be his duty, to summon, organize and direct the forces of any department in the city and county in any needed service; to summon, marshal, deputize or otherwise employ other persons, or to do whatever else he may deem necessary for the purpose of meeting the emergency."

The present Charter was approved by vote of the people on March 26, 1931. I had been appointed to the Office of Mayor in January of 1931 when James Rolph, Jr., resigned to become the Governor of California.

Almost my first responsibility, following the adoption of the present Charter, was to determine what the fiscal position of the city actually was. Here was the picture, as finally developed: On July 1, 1931, the municipal deficit was practically a million and a half dollars (\$1,444,750); the deficit in the General Fund alone was \$842,333.

Bear in mind that the Charter which was to become effective on January 8, 1932, provided that governmental operations must be on a cash basis.

Let me make clear, at this point, that I am not claiming that I, as Mayor, alone and unaided, solved that problem, but let me make it equally clear that the problem was solved. Let me point out that at the start of the current fiscal year, July 1, 1943, in place of a deficit of a million and a half, we have a Cash Reserve Fund balance of three and a half million dollars (\$3,643,627). I repeat—I make no claim for exclusive personal credit for this accomplishment; I do claim that the elimination of this deficit and the creation of this surplus during the thirteen years in which this occurred is evidence of sound municipal management.

On the other hand, you recognize, as I do, that it would not have been possible to transform a deficit of a million and a half into a surplus of three and a half million dollars if I had not enjoyed—and endeavored to deserve—the wholehearted cooperation of most of my fellow public officials during the past thirteen years.

The Charter was written in 1930, presented to the people in 1931, and became effective in 1932. By that time the depression was entering its most desperate era. It is interesting, now, to note that the Charter made no specific provision for any department of municipal govern-

ment to care for the problems which the depression was creating. Quite naturally, because in 1930 the general opinion seemed to be that the privately operated charitable agencies could adequately meet the added depression-born problems. Of course, this was proven wrong, and presently Municipal Government had to take over the burden, and then it grew too great for the municipality, and the State came into the picture, and ultimately in 1933 the Federal Government assumed a share of the burden.

From the 1st of July, 1931, to the 30th of June, 1943, the cost of humanitarian activities to the taxpayers of San Francisco—that is to say, moneys raised by taxation of property in San Francisco—was seventy million dollars (\$70,741,853.90). In addition to this, the State and the Federal Governments granted us \$34,388,576.19; local bond issues provided nine million dollars, and the employees of the City and County of San Francisco made voluntary contributions from their salaries of a million and a half. In all, there was expended \$111,609,283.26. We had to borrow over \$2,000,000 from the State of California (of which amount we still owe a little more than a half million dollars); we still have to redeem four and a half million dollars worth of bonds authorized in the first three years of the depression, and, of course, we must also pay the interest on those bonds.

Let me repeat, for the sake of emphasis, that San Francisco taxpayers provided \$70,741,853.90 directly during the thirteen-year period covered by this report.

Included under this general title of "Humanitarian Activities" are expenditures for relief of the needy and unemployed, the poor in institutions, care of children, hospitals, insane in hospitals, relief of the needy aged, relief of the needy blind, aid to dependent children, the general administration of the foregoing, the burial of the indigent dead, the county jails, the juvenile court and detention home, the Adult Probation Board, and the generally related activities.

This great expenditure of tax funds for these purposes is, of course, unprecedented in the history of our city. It is interesting to think of the tremendous public improvement program we could have completed had these moneys been available for such improvements instead of having been used for these unexpected though all-important humanitarian activities brought about by the depression.

#### **Bond Issues and the Cost of the Bond Issue Method of Financing Municipal Projects.**

Before discussing the bonded debt of the city, I want to mention the interest payments on the debt. From July 1, 1931, to November 30, 1943, we have paid interest on public service enterprise bond issues in the amount of \$48,757,172.29 and on general City and County obligations of \$26,520,482.22, or a total of over SEVENTY-FIVE MILLION DOLLARS (\$75,277,654.71).

Now, as to the bonded debt itself: First, let me deal in grand total figures for the purpose of comparison. The outstanding bonded debt of San Francisco on January 8, 1932, was \$152,372,300; the outstanding bonded debt on January 8, 1943, was \$121,966,100; thus—there has been a *net reduction* in bonded debt of \$30,406,200. That net reduction figure, however, does not tell the whole story. During the same period bonds were sold to the extent of \$52,958,000, so that the actual debt retirement was \$83,364,000. Add to that figure the sum quoted in the preceding paragraph as paid for interest and you have a total paid out in a dozen years of \$158,641,854 for bond interest and redemption.

The present bonded debt is:

For Public Service Enterprises.....	\$ 89,849,000
General City and County.....	32,117,000
	\$121,966,000

Insofar as the bonded debt and the interest costs for the public service enterprises are concerned, I want to make several observations:

Municipal Railway bonds have been issued in the amount of .....	\$5,481,000
Municipal Railway bonds have been redeemed in the amount of .....	4,581,000
Municipal Railway bonds are now outstanding in the amount of .....	900,000

This has been accomplished on a five-cent fare which has been maintained for the past ten years without tax subsidy. In addition, \$5,131,660 in Municipal Railway improvements have been made out of earnings on that same five-cent fare. The presently existing cash surplus available in the Municipal Railway fund for extensions, equipment and betterments, as soon as Federal restrictions on materials are lifted, is \$2,815,845. In addition to the above, the maintenance of the five-cent fare has represented a saving of millions of dollars to the car-riding public.

San Francisco Water Department bonds have been issued in the amount of.....	\$53,095,000
San Francisco Water Department bonds have been redeemed in the amount of.....	20,471,000
San Francisco Water Department bonds are now outstanding in the amount of.....	32,624,000

In addition to this, the San Francisco Water Department, under public ownership, has made five water rate reductions with an aggregate saving to consumers of \$10,333,657 while at the same time making extensions and improvements out of earnings in the amount of \$6,258,246.

#### Observations on credit rating of San Francisco:

The interest rate on bonds sold in 1931 was 4½ per cent.

The interest rate on the last bonds sold in 1942 ranged from ½ of 1 per cent to 2 per cent.

The tax delinquency rate as of June 30, 1931, was 1.64 per cent.

The tax delinquency rate as of June 30, 1943, was .769 per cent.

Even at the depth of the depression, 1933, our tax delinquency was only 5.37 per cent whereas in other major cities the delinquency went as high as 50 per cent.

I make these observations solely and only for the purpose of establishing the fact that the fiscal affairs of the City and County of San Francisco are in sound condition.

#### Major Additions to Property.

For me to list here the public improvements carried through to completion during my administration would be to risk the accusation that I am endeavoring to transform my final report into a campaign document. Such is not my intention, but I am under direction, by virtue of the provisions of Section 25, to report to you on the condition of affairs of the City and County, and the report would not be complete unless mention were made of the major additions to our plant.

Construction of a new junior college and twenty-two other school buildings at a cost of fourteen millions of dollars cannot pass without a word. Neither can the expansion in parks, playgrounds and recreation centers of over four million dollars; and a street and highway improvement program of twenty-two million dollars; to say but little of the increased hospital facilities, our new zoological gardens, one of the best and busiest airports in America, Union Square Garage, the additions and improvements to Laguna Honda Home, and the new libraries which have been constructed. Additions to property have been completed to a total of \$111,000,000.

Let there be no misunderstanding about this subject, generally. Be-

ginning with 1933 and continuing until 1941 the Federal Government, through the Public Works Administration, made liberal grants to municipal governments which were in a position to finance their part of a program of public works. San Francisco was able to do this. Further, of course, the Works Progress Administration of the Federal Government carried through to successful conclusion "make-work" programs which provided improvements of a permanent nature for San Francisco, and which our children, and our children's children, will enjoy.

Great things have been accomplished for San Francisco during the past thirteen years despite the fact that they were years of stress, of crisis and of urgent need. During all these years, despite our obstacles, we have maintained the lowest tax rate and have enjoyed the lowest tax delinquency of any city of comparable size in the country. While I claim no personal credit for these things, it is a matter of satisfaction to me that I am turning over to my successor not a run-down plant with a bankrupt treasury, but a going business in good operating condition and with a surplus of capital.

### The Merit System.

The present Charter, as originally written, provided certain corrections in connection with Civil Service. Since the adoption of the Charter the voters extended Civil Service to take in certain divisions of government which were excluded from the merit system in the Charter as originally written. Today the employees of the Park, the Airport, the two Museums, and the Libraries, and the institutional workers in the Health Department have the protection of Civil Service, and the freedom from political pressure that the spoils system might permit. I claim no credit for these accomplishments, but I am glad indeed that the merit system was thus extended during my administration. The merit system makes for better service governmentally.

Every growing American city has continuing problems. Our ordinary problems have become increasingly aggravated since the advent of the war. A tremendous increase in population, the greatest concentration of military activity in the history of the Pacific Area, the Federal restrictions on materials, equipment and supplies—these and innumerable other facts have created conditions unique, not only in San Francisco, but in our entire country.

Let's discuss some of these problems, not for the purpose of starting a controversy, but just for the record.

### Transportation.

San Francisco's always difficult transportation problem was recognized even before the advent of the Rolph administration in 1912 when the then Board of Supervisors in August, 1911, approved the employment of Bion J. Arnold, an eminent transportation and traffic engineer of Chicago, to make a study of the transportation facilities of San Francisco, and to make recommendations thereon.

Mr. Arnold filed his report on March 31, 1913—a report which cost, I am informed, some \$50,000. That report is still available at the Public Library.

Mr. Arnold made many recommendations; to my mind the most important being unification of all streetcar systems.

From time to time the duly elected officials of the city have submitted to the electorate proposals designed to unify our transportation systems. All these were voted down.

In 1942, we had an opportunity to remove most of our difficulties by acquiring, out of earnings and without effect on our tax rate, the properties of the Market Street Railway Company.

After extensive negotiations which commenced in 1940 this plan was submitted to your honorable Board by the Public Utilities Commission, with my approval, in May, 1942. The basic price finally agreed upon

was \$8,350,000, which was to have been paid over a period not to exceed seven years, but which could have been paid as early as funds were available. In addition to the regular annual payments, interest was to have been paid at the rate of 3.56 per cent on the reducing balance, and besides certain other expenses such as insurance, taxes, etc., were to have been paid by the city. These items increased the total payments to be made on account of the purchase to \$11,534,415, based on a period of seven years for full payment.

However, the revenues of the combined companies from July 1, 1942, to December 31, 1943, based on a seven-cent fare, as proposed, would have been sufficient to have purchased these properties over a period of twenty-one months, during which time the people would have enjoyed the benefits of unification. Figures submitted to me by the Manager of Utilities, a copy of which is attached, show that the combined operations of the Municipal Railway and the Market Street Railway to December 31, 1943, on the foregoing basis, would have resulted in a net profit of \$8,158,049 available for reconstruction, replacement, or payment on debt. This is after deducting all operating expenses, including bond interest and redemption, and the entire sum could have been applied to the purchase of the Market Street Railway properties. Calculating the interest payable on a period of two years instead of seven years, and calculating the other expenses such as insurance, taxes, etc., on a two-year basis likewise, the total to be paid on the purchase would have amounted to \$9,365,890 on a two-year basis. After deducting the amount that would have been available on the above basis during the past eighteen months of \$8,158,049, there would have been a balance of only \$1,207,841 due and payable to date, and this could have been paid off within the next three months at that rate of profit.

Let us check to see just what has happened since the original lease-purchase out of earnings proposal was rejected. Two bond issues for the purchase of the Market Street Railway properties were submitted to the electorate. Both were voted down. It is most difficult for the city to properly inform all the voters of the merits of a bond proposal because public funds cannot be used for such purposes. Be these facts as they may, it is incontrovertible that all these proposals had the same ultimate purposes in mind—namely, a solution to our transportation problem by unifying the existing systems under one management, one fare, uniform wage and a universal transfer. Since these proposals have been defeated, it is regrettable to note that the Federal Government has stepped into the picture to attempt a solution. It should be of more than passing interest to note that the recommendations of the O.D.T. recognize the same fundamentals as necessary to even a partial, and admittedly less complete, solution to the problem. Enforced pooling and flexible use of existing facilities, elimination of competing lines—both efforts at unification under a dual instead of unified management, under a dual instead of a single wage structure, enforced equalization of traffic load through increased fare to Municipal Railway patrons, and reduction to private company's passengers, when all profits could have been used for acquisition of the private system by the city; universal transfer privileges which my administration has been advocating for years; these and many other points prove that the Federal Government is to attempt to do by Federal order that which teamwork and cooperation could have accomplished in 1942.

According to Mr. Bion J. Arnold's report in 1913, the answer was then, and the answer is now, unification, with one management, one fare, one wage structure, the universal transfer, with all these operating for the benefit of the city and not a private corporation.

#### San Francisco Airport—(Treasure Island).

The site of our Golden Gate International Exposition, Treasure Island, became of strategic importance to the United States Navy upon declaration of war against the Axis powers. On April 17, 1942, the

Federal Government filed a declaration of intention to take title to this property under eminent domain proceedings, for use by the Navy.

The Federal Government at the same time deposited \$44,881 in this proceeding, alleging that this sum represented the total monetary interest of the City and County of San Francisco in Treasure Island. Extended negotiations followed and in May of this year I visited Washington in an endeavor to end the Treasure Island controversy and secure greatly needed improvements for San Francisco Airport. Mr. Leland W. Cutler, president of the 1939 Golden Gate International Exposition, having been delegated an official representative of the city by the Public Utilities Commission, had preceded me and had arranged conferences with the House and Senate Naval Affairs Committees. Mr. Cutler participated in all the conferences. I can best sum up the results of those meetings by quoting from Mr. Cutler's report to the Commission of June 18, 1943:

"Mayor Rossi's trip, in my opinion, brought about the possibility of obtaining \$6,000,000 to \$8,000,000, and such a sum would not have been considered without the Mayor's presence in Washington and the opportunity afforded by the Naval Affairs Committee for a presentation of San Francisco's case."

I am happy to advise that there has just come before me a proffered agreement of the United States Government to expend this sum of money in improving the San Francisco Airport, and a stipulation on the part of the Government that these improvements shall belong to the city upon the cessation of hostilities or when the Secretary of the Navy so states in writing.

I trust that this agreement will be executed as soon as possible. But I likewise trust that Mayor Lapham, with the aid of the Public Utilities Commission and the Board of Supervisors, may find a way of securing from the Government a similar stipulation with respect to Treasure Island so that when the Navy has no further use for it that Island may be an airport for San Francisco as originally intended. No single airport can serve all the needs of any large metropolitan area. San Francisco needs Treasure Island as well as Mills Field and will need other airports when suitable sites can be found and developed. In securing such a stipulation we would be fulfilling our obligation to the State of California which deeded the shoals to us for airport purposes, to our citizens who have the right to expect an airport, and to our National Government which allotted W.P.A. and P.W.A. funds for that specific purpose. All of this is summed up by Secretary of the Navy Knox in his letter to me of December 3, 1940:

"Confirming the statements made in conferences between yourself and representatives of the Department, it is understood that the temporary occupation of parts of Treasure Island by the Navy will be without prejudice to the ultimate development of the Island as a municipal airport and further that the Navy will use its good offices to obtain Federal assistance for the immediate development of such parts of the Airport project as can be undertaken without mutual interference between the Navy and the Airport development. The Navy Department is prepared to certify that the ultimate development of Treasure Island as a municipal airport is a project of importance to the National Defense."

I commend to Mayor Lapham an earnest exploration of this matter.

#### Juvenile Delinquency.

In my last message I reported on the steps being taken to combat juvenile delinquency. This problem, which increased as a result of the war, has continued to be aggravated during the past year by the continuing influx of juveniles from other states and cities.

Despite the handicap caused by the loss of experienced personnel to

the armed forces and war industries, all municipal agencies concerned with the problem of juvenile delinquency have worked unceasingly and with a marked degree of success to keep ahead of this problem, and they are to be commended on their enlightened programs, which have been recognized throughout the country as outstanding.

All appropriations requested by these departments in developing their programs have been approved by me and adopted by your honorable Board.

#### Women's Court for Sex Offenders.

In my report of last year I mentioned that a separate Women's Court for sex offenders had been established, with a centralized headquarters in which would be coordinated the activities of the Police Department, Health Department, District Attorney and Adult Probation Department. The Honorable Clarence W. Morris was appointed Judge of this Court and has continued there during 1943.

Now that sufficient experience has been had to evaluate the efficacy of this new venture, all departments concerned are emphatic in their approval and in their belief that it should be continued, and its activities expanded. Chief of Police Charles W. Dullea states that with the establishment of the separate Women's Court San Francisco made one of its most valuable contributions toward the war effort.

Dr. J. C. Geiger, Director of Public Health, states that the separate Women's Court has, in his opinion, served a very useful social function in handling a problem that was seriously endangering an adequate venereal disease control program in the City and County of San Francisco.

This method of procedure has won the unqualified approval of the Federal Security Agency of the United States.

#### Housing.

Since the Pearl Harbor incident, the great influx of war workers and the families of those in the armed forces who are assigned to this area has, as we all know, created a very definite housing shortage.

At the outset we should bear in mind the fact that the lack of housing facilities is not peculiar to San Francisco. This is not only a nation-wide but a world-wide problem born of the war. Prior to the commencement of hostilities our population was 635,000. Since that time it has been variously estimated as being from 750,000 to 850,000. As the theater of major operations in the war changes toward the Pacific Area, we can anticipate a greater increase.

My information causes me to conclude that there is not a major city in the country that has provided either a permanent or even a temporary solution to this problem. Federal restrictions make it impossible to obtain materials and supplies. We can build only as many units as Washington will allow. I am firmly convinced that the only temporary panacea we can expect is the pouring into our area of sufficient funds by the various Federal Housing agencies to construct temporary quarters for the people involved.

As to the post-war housing situation, one can only speculate. Any post-war plan for San Francisco must, of course, include provisions for the replacing of substandard dwellings with modern homes.

#### Civilian Defense.

The Director of Civilian Defense will be prepared to report on January 8, 1944, in detail, on every phase of this problem. For the purpose of my report to you gentlemen of the Board there are but three points which I wish to make.

A complete plan for civilian participation in defense and in the war effort was ready in August of 1941, three months before Pearl Harbor. The plan was implemented and activated immediately after December 7, 1941. That is Point No. 1.

Point No. 2 is that, despite the fact that no funds had been specifically

provided in the 1941-42 budget for this purpose, it was possible, due to the cooperation of department heads, the Board of Supervisors, and the administrative officials of the City and County, to finance Civilian Defense expenditures for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1942, to the extent of \$407,609.07, and, in addition thereto, contractual commitments were entered into to the extent of \$203,416.63. A detailed report on this subject was filed with the Board of Supervisors. Also, of course, the Board is familiar with the Civilian Defense appropriations as budgeted for the fiscal year 1942-43, totaling \$1,907,963, and the 1943-44 appropriation totaling \$1,738,373. High Federal officials have said that San Francisco's Civilian Defense is second to none in the nation. This I believe to be the fact.

May I say here in passing that it is my sincere hope that the City of San Francisco, civilian defense volunteers, and others as well will continue on in the splendid work they are doing. We cannot afford, even for one moment, to relax our vigilance. Reports of victories by our sterling armed forces should not cause us to be found unprepared in the event of a sneak or token attack by our ungodly enemy. Remember that they were not expected at Pearl Harbor. Let's be prepared for anything these madmen may attempt.

The third and final point has to do with the services available for the men of the armed forces. First—long before Pearl Harbor—San Francisco provided "Hospitality House" for the men in training who might visit San Francisco. The site and the materials for the building were paid for by the city; the Building Trades Council, on a voluntary basis, handled the erection of the structure; operating and maintenance costs since its opening have been paid for by public funds.

I wish to thank the nearly 600 clubs, organizations and corporations in this city which have participated in the operation of Hospitality House and have donated over \$50,000 for refreshments and smoking materials, served without charge, since Hospitality House was opened in August, 1941. I wish particularly to thank the hundreds of ladies who have so graciously worked unbelievably long hours in serving food and distributing smoking materials to the members of our armed forces who visited the House.

With regard to providing beds for the men of the armed forces, through subsidizing of existing agencies and by dormitory construction we have made available 3,000 beds nightly. These are provided to men of the armed forces at a price of 50 cents. Few cities in America have equalled this record.

The American Theatre Wing sent the chairman of its board—Mr. Brock Pemberton of New York—to San Francisco, and by virtue of the cooperation of the San Francisco Municipal Government with him and Mrs. Ina Claire Wallace there was opened "Stage Door Canteen"—one of the six now in operation in the United States—which is providing outstanding entertainment and food for the men of the armed services under the able chairmanship of Mrs. Paige Monteagle.

#### City Planning Commission.

The City Planning Department is now well organized and functioning smoothly as an important part of the machinery of government in San Francisco. The time and effort of the Commission and its technical staff are being devoted largely to the preparation of a Master Plan. This is the primary duty of the Department, according to the Charter. It is a responsibility assigned to no other agency in the City and County of San Francisco.

The growing interest of the people in the work of this Department spells progress for San Francisco. The need for a Master Plan is understood; its value to the city becomes more evident as the uncertainties of the post-war period are considered. It will be an essential instrument in the development of the grand strategy by which this city prepares to meet the crisis of demobilization and the shift from war to peacetime activity.



### Conclusion.

I bespeak for my successor, Mayor-elect Roger D. Lapham, the whole-hearted cooperation of every person in the municipal service. It is my hope—my sincere hope—that every municipal official, every departmental or divisional head, every municipal employee will give to the new Mayor the very best that is in them.

We are San Franciscans—that is to say, we are Americans. Under our form of government, the government belongs not to the officials, nor the employees of government, but to the people. Let's all work together for the good of San Francisco; if Mayor Lapham's administration is a success we, as San Franciscans, will all benefit.

As I prepare to leave the office of the Mayor, I do so with a deep and abiding satisfaction because it has been my privilege to have contributed to some degree at least to the progress of the city we love so dearly. As I leave the office I cherish the hope that my successor and those others who will succeed us, some of whom are yet unborn, will enjoy the true and lasting friendships that are mine.

Had serious illness not come upon me I would have been able to personally thank the men and women of the municipal service who served with me during the past quarter of a century. I want them to know, and I take this official means of telling them, that I am grateful to them for their cooperation.

It is my ardent wish that in the years to come this city by the Golden Gate will achieve that which I believe to be our destiny—that is, that San Francisco will be the hub of the commercial and business life not only of this great Western Commonwealth, but of the entire Pacific World as well.

Gentlemen of the Board, if, in the days and years to come, any of the experience and knowledge I have gained during my stewardship will be of value to you, I want you to know that I shall consider it a privilege and an honor to work with you for the continued advancement of the City of St. Francis.

## DEPARTMENTAL REPORTS

### CITY ATTORNEY

During the calendar year 1943, the City Attorney represented all departments of the municipal government and attended to all of the litigation incident to the several departments.

The bulk of the litigation came from accidents which occurred in the Municipal Railway Department, or by reason of dangerous and defective conditions on the streets of San Francisco.

Naturally the increased transportation on the Municipal Railway System increased the number of accidents and without going into any itemized statement as to the number of accidents it can be safely said that any increase in the payment of claims for accidents was not disproportionate to the increased traffic on the Municipal Railway System.

#### Dangerous and Defective Conditions.

The state law imposes a liability upon the city where the city permits a dangerous and defective condition to exist on any street, park or public square with knowledge to the officials of the city who have the power to remedy the condition. Practically, this means that the Department of Public Works is responsible for street conditions, the Park Department for park conditions and the Recreation Department responsible for recreational conditions, for the reason that the courts have held that after a period of time, irrespective of whether or not

the particular department has had knowledge of the dangerous and defective conditions, the law presumes that they have had knowledge and, therefore, it is incumbent upon these departments to see that the streets, the parks and the recreational departments are sustained with due regard to the safety of the public.

Records in this office are at all times available to show the number of cases prosecuted against the city and the disposition of the same.

During the present year there were two outstanding pieces of litigation which meant much to the City and County of San Francisco. One was the action brought by the Transbay Construction Company against the city to recover damage for the alleged delay in the construction of the 85-foot addition to the Hetch Hetchy Dam. The United States District Court decided this action against the city but we promptly took an appeal to the United States Circuit Court and the Circuit Court reversed the decision of the District Court. Thereupon the plaintiff made an application to the United States Supreme Court for a writ of certiorari which would have given the latter court the right to review the judgment of the United States Circuit Court of Appeal. The Supreme Court of the United States refused to grant this writ and this office was of the opinion that the litigation on this particular subject had been concluded. However, the plaintiff has seen fit to endeavor to reopen the case by the filing of an amended complaint. This matter is still pending in the United States District Court. All of this litigation, with the exception of the original trial which was handled by myself, has been handled by Mr. Dion Holm, Chief Counsel of the Public Utilities Commission, and we have every hope that the litigation which now involves almost a million dollars, will be decided ultimately, in favor of the city.

The other important matter which was taken care of by this office was the matter of the condemnation of Treasure Island. This litigation was originally handled by my Chief Deputy, Walter A. Dold, but after all the pleadings were completed it developed that certain negotiations were necessary between the city and the Army and Navy Departments of the United States. Our Mr. Holm spent some six weeks in Washington negotiating an agreement which would settle the controversy between the city and the Federal Government in regard to Treasure Island. While the proposed settlement did not take into consideration the payment of any specific amount of money for the city's rights in Treasure Island it did provide for the performance of a certain amount of work at the Mills Field Airport which would compensate the city for the loss of Treasure Island. This agreement is now being considered by the Public Utilities Commission and I hope that the matter may be adjusted to the benefit and satisfaction of the city at a very early date.

In addition to the above matters there has been considerable litigation regarding the right of the city to execute local laws in regard to the production and disposition of milk. Thus far we have been able to sustain the city's rights.

#### **Federal Eminent Domain.**

Naturally during the past two years the Federal Government has had to take over a great deal of city property for war purposes. We have had every cooperation from the representatives of the Federal Government but we cannot let this opportunity pass without calling attention to the fact that when the Federal Government takes over local property, taxes can no longer be levied against it, which is a very serious loss to the city. At the present time the city is losing thousands of dollars in revenue which it formerly received from properties now taken over by the Federal Government, and the city should look forward to the hope that the Constitution of California will be amended so that government property would not be exempt from taxation but that the same could be taxed whenever the Federal Government itself would consent to such taxation.

## CONTROLLER

The accounts of the Controller, in conformance with Section 68 of the Charter, were audited by Ernst & Ernst by direction of the Board of Supervisors.

In accordance with provisions of Section 66 of the Charter, audits of departments were made by the Controller's audit staff, with the exception of the following audits, which were made pursuant to the provisions of Ordinance No. 9,0621 by certified public accountants: Water Department, Hetch Hetchy, Board of Education, Municipal Railway, Retirement System.

The various audit reports, as well as statistical information, are in the process of being printed and will be included in the Controller's Annual Report.

## COORDINATING COUNCIL

The rapid wartime growth in population of this industrial area has increased the scope of activities of the Coordinating Council of San Francisco, as well as the various departments that are integral parts of the Council.

Thousands of itinerants and families of migratory workers have poured into San Francisco during the last two years from all parts of the continent, including some more rural and backward sections, bringing with them their sectional problems and adding to ours.

The presence of children and teen-age youths who lack parental control and discipline and war conditions have given rise to a sharp increase in juvenile delinquency. The efforts of the Coordinating Council have been directed to correction of this evil.

### Delinquent Parent School.

The most important innovation in this direction was the establishment on May 3, 1943, of a delinquent parent school.

Parents found wanting in their duty toward their children are sent to this school by the courts. The school is held in the auditorium of the Health Center Building, and the Council has obtained instructors from the Department of Public Health, School Department, Recreation Department, Police Department, District Attorney's Office, Community Chest, United States Employment Service and churches of various denominations.

Since its inception more than 200 delinquent parents have attended the eight weekly courses and the school has received national recognition in magazines and over the radio. Inquiries have been received from some twenty-five major cities.

Through a system of questionnaires, an evaluation of the effect of the school is being taken from those who have attended its courses. The responses thus far have been highly encouraging.

### Hunter's Point Problem.

The Government built a large housing project to accommodate thousands of workers needed by the Navy Department at Hunter's Point Dry Dock. Workers, hundreds of them teen-age, were recruited from all over the nation and housed at the new project. The Council gave closest attention to problems created there.

### Japtown Problem.

The Coordinating Council played an important role in bringing to light the deplorable conditions arising in the so-called "Japtown" section. This section, old and dilapidated to begin with, is the area from

which the Japanese population was moved by the early wartime exclusion orders.

### **Junior Coordinating Councils.**

During the last year the Council has undertaken the organizing of Junior Coordinating Councils in the various neighborhoods. They are set upon the same basis as the District Coordinating Councils and are governed by the youth under adult supervision and direction. The Junior Central Council is functioning and the Ingleside-Taraval Council is in the process of completion. It is planned to establish junior councils throughout the city.

### **In-Service Training.**

The Council again this year organized a course of In-Service Training for the School Department which was well attended and favorably received.

### **Curfew Law.**

The Coordinating Council cooperated with the Police, Juvenile Court, War Council, City Attorney and Parent Teacher Association in the preparation of a Curfew Ordinance, designed to curb juvenile delinquency.

All other activities reported on the previous year, save those which have accomplished desired purposes, still are functioning. The Council is composed of the Director of Public Welfare, the Superintendent of Schools, the Chief of Police, the Chief Probation Officer, the Director of the Bureau of Child Hygiene, Department of Public Health, the Superintendent of the Recreation Department, the Chief Supervisor of the Public Dance Hall Committee and three representatives from the Community Chest.

## **GOLDEN GATE BRIDGE**

The sixth fiscal year of Golden Gate Bridge operation, July 1, 1942, to June 30, 1943, caught the full impact of wartime restrictions on civilian travel, gasoline and tire rationing, industrial expansion in metropolitan San Francisco and northbay Redwood Empire counties, and a greatly increased military activity without impairment to the financial condition of the Bridge District.

Reduced civilian traffic has been replaced by war industry workers, with net operating income of the Bridge District for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1943, approximately \$303,000 more than the previous year.

Total revenue was \$2,579,981.91, compared with \$2,292,945.10 for the fiscal year previous. Average toll revenue per day was \$7,068.44; lowest day's revenue was \$4,786.40, on Thursday, January 21, 1943; highest day's revenue was \$13,274.03 on Sunday, July 5, 1942.

Free Government traffic continues to represent about 15 per cent of the total traffic. Enactment of legislation currently pending in Congress will eliminate approximately 50 per cent of this free Government traffic.

The Golden Gate Bridge serves in increasing importance the nation's military effort as a direct and speedy connecting link between vital Army and Navy depots.

Efficient administration of the Board of Directors of the Golden Gate Bridge and Highway District is reflected in minimum operating and maintenance costs consistent with proper safeguarding of property and efficient operation of the Bridge.

Future toll revenues will result from policy of Bridge District officials in cooperating with State and Federal highway engineers and officials in construction and improvement of highways serving Bridge

approaches. Particular emphasis is being placed on post-war highways, including the Sausalito Lateral Approach, which directly and indirectly serve routes leading to the Golden Gate Bridge.

The United States Office of Censorship has requested the District to refrain from publication of statistics concerning the number and types of vehicles crossing the Bridge.

### SAN FRANCISCO-OAKLAND BAY BRIDGE

Notwithstanding the extensive curtailment in gasoline and tires, the San Francisco-Oakland Bay Bridge continues to hold its large daily traffic of automobile and interurban passenger transportation. This is undoubtedly due to the intense national defense efforts and the increase in population in the Bay Area. The safety record continues to be good in spite of the large volume of traffic.

There has been a considerable loss of bridge personnel because of enlistments or induction into the armed forces. However, every reasonable effort is being made to obtain satisfactory replacements and to maintain the best possible service to the public. It has been necessary to employ a number of women as toll collectors at the gates, an innovation which has proved very satisfactory.

This year's report indicates no traffic statistics, as requested by the Office of Censorship at Washington.

### FEDERAL PROJECTS

New San Francisco Appraisers Building, under contract with Clinton Construction Company, is now about 90 per cent complete, and is expected to be ready for occupancy about May 15, 1944.

In connection with blackout and dimout regulations, the Protective Construction Unit of the Federal Works Agency has inspected all Federal buildings in San Francisco and also all office buildings having Federal leased quarters, and contracts have been let for the required work, the total expenditure for which is not yet available. An engineering position has been established in the District Engineer's office of the Public Buildings Administration, Federal Works Agency, for the purpose of analyzing and effecting economies in connection with space assignments and leases for Government activities. In this connection the Congress had made available the sum of \$500,000 for the advance planning of Government buildings for a post-war program.

**BOARD OF EDUCATION.**

The close of the second year of our participation in the war finds the San Francisco Public Schools geared to an accelerated program at all levels of the education field—elementary, junior and senior high, junior college, and day and evening schools for adults specializing in war production training courses.

With the appointment by the Board of Education of Dr. Curtis E. Warren as superintendent of schools on July 1, 1943, San Francisco has secured one of the nation's outstanding school administrators, as well as leading educators, to direct its educational system during the ensuing years.

To meet the wartime demands of industry and to make available additional manpower, a nursery school and child care program to assist working mothers was inaugurated under the supervision of the San Francisco Unified School District on May 17, 1943. In operation at the present time are five nursery schools and six child care centers, located in various sections of the city, with an enrollment of approximately 250 children ranging from two and one-half to sixteen years of age. As the need arises additional centers will be opened by the school department.

The secondary schools of San Francisco have continued the adjustment of their curricula to the war situation begun last year, but are already looking forward to an even more serious adjustment to the post-war period.

The first secondary curriculum study committee appointed by the superintendent of schools and composed of teachers, principals and department heads, has just completed their over-all survey of the needs of San Francisco boys and girls of adolescent age and have laid the foundations for future curriculum development in a publication titled "Curriculum Foundations for the San Francisco Schools." Following this study a new reading program for the junior and senior high schools has been developed by curriculum study groups appointed for this purpose.

The physical education program for girls and boys has been expanded and developed to provide for an extensive body building program.

This year the schools have become a much needed source of labor supply. At the present time there are almost six thousand senior high school boys and girls working part time in industry, government offices, and the service trades. A placement program has been organized in cooperation with the Junior Division of the United States Employment Service. Eight persons working under the direction of this agency and the school system spend their full time in finding jobs, making placements, issuing clearances, and counseling students and parents. Over eight thousand placements have been made since this program was inaugurated in April, 1943.

The San Francisco school system contributed greatly to the harvesting program this summer by maintaining a continuous recruitment service throughout the harvesting season and working with the local and national agencies who were responsible for the carrying out of this important wartime project. More San Francisco boys and girls were placed in organized camps in the harvest areas than by any other city in the state.

Many summer activities were included in the summer school calendar. A large summer school was maintained for senior high school students in the Mission High School building. The enrollment was over three thousand. By maintaining such a school, students were able to accelerate their normal school program and graduate earlier, thus permitting early entrance into industry or the possibility of going to college for a year before they were drafted.

The secondary schools have participated in many community activities in addition to the regular classroom work. Three hundred and thirty thousand Christmas cards were made recently by the junior high schools for the Red Cross to send to soldiers overseas. Hundreds of tons of paper, rags, and metal have been collected on various drives. Scrap books and games have been sent overseas by the hundreds. Many articles have been made for servicemen in the sewing classes of the schools. Hundreds of gift sets have been sent to sailors and soldiers in other areas.

Adding to its commendable participation in the war effort, the school department expanded its apprentice training program by establishing the Hunter's Point Apprentice School on July 6, 1943, in cooperation with the United States Navy. This program, designed to develop the highly skilled craftsmen needed for naval construction and repair work, offers sixteen-year-old boys both classroom instruction and employment in the skilled trade of their choice, with the opportunity of receiving their high school diploma and journeyman status in their trade.

Apprentices attend school full time one week in every five and receive instruction in English, history, mathematics, science, trade theory, and blueprint reading. Each four weeks in the shops, apprentices work on production jobs under the supervision of skilled mechanics. Apprentices are paid both while in school and on the job.

Approximately 225 apprentices are at present enrolled in this program, including the following skilled trades: blacksmith, boatbuilder, boilermaker, coppersmith, joiner, inside and outside machinist, molder, painter, patternmaker, pipefitter, rigger, sailmaker, sheetmetal worker, shipfitter, shipwright, and electrician. Plans have been completed for enrolling a new group of approximately 75 apprentices for the program shortly after the first of the year.

War Production Training courses, conducted under the auspices of the San Francisco Public Schools, have enrolled and trained 53,461 men and women for jobs in war industries since the inauguration of the program on January 13, 1941. Courses are being given in all phases of the aircraft and shipbuilding industries and are particularly designed to meet the specific needs of the many occupations concerned. New classes are started as the need demands. Many San Francisco war industries are now assigning all new inexperienced employees direct to these courses in order that they may qualify for skilled jobs and take a greater part in aiding in the war effort. These War Production Training courses offer free training to both men and women during the day and evening hours and are located in eighteen convenient locations throughout San Francisco.

An Elementary School Survey Committee, appointed by the Superintendent of Schools, and consisting of three university professors and three elementary school principals, now has in the process of publication a report on the curriculum as it pertains to the elementary schools of San Francisco. In a preamble to its report the committee stated:

"It is apparent that dissatisfaction with the schools and the attainment of the pupils which we hear expressed in many parts of the country these days is not new. It is apparent, also, that the criticisms have reiterated the idea that the faults in the school are due to 'modern' theories and practices and that the remedy is to return to the 'good old days.' The fact that criticisms of modern methods are perennial suggests that they grew out of a failure to understand the purposes and the significance of modern methods.

"We cannot advise a return to previous methods, however, just because they are old, any more than we can accept blindly the newer ways because they are new. It is necessary to evaluate the newer procedures and to interpret the performance of the pupils in the light

of their total attainments. We must seek to understand the aims of the present-day education and the attainments of the pupils both in the more traditional subjects and in the newer activities. We must look at this evaluation in the light, also, of the changed conditions.

"The committee has conceived its task in this **comprehensive form**. It has reviewed the principles underlying present-day education, particularly in the elementary school. It has taken account of the fact that education has become practically universal throughout the high school. It has examined the curriculum in San Francisco and the performances of the pupils both in the fundamentals and in the broader fields of study and has evaluated the curriculum in San Francisco on the basis of this examination."

The San Francisco Junior College has modified its offerings in accordance with the wartime needs of the community. Pre-induction courses have been offered to men students attending college prior to their entry into the Services; and the counseling program has been expanded to meet the needs of young men and women today. Great emphasis is being placed on the College's adult program. An Evening Extension Division for adults has been opened, and a citywide victory gardening program has been inaugurated by the Floriculture Division. Several hundred families have grown their own vegetables in gardens on the campus and in other areas under College supervision, and many other families have canned fruit and vegetables in the College kitchens under College direction. Office personnel has been trained for various public agencies and for branches of the Armed Services in classes held in off-campus locations most convenient for trainees, and cooks and bakers have been trained for the Merchant Marine in the only West Coast training school of this type.

### POLICE DEPARTMENT

We have come to the close of a war year, which like the one which preceded it, presented a challenge to a Police Department sorely handicapped by a lack of personnel. The problem was successfully answered by the added vigor and energy of the members of the department who by their unstinted effort maintained our high standard of law enforcement for which we are justly proud.

#### Major Crimes.

The statistics on the major crimes involving attacks upon property and persons indicate an increase which is unavoidable in view of the following factors: (a) the tremendous increase in population; (b) the City and County of San Francisco is a port of embarkation; (c) dim-out areas have provided a natural setting for the commission of such crimes as robbery, burglary and theft; (d) the demands made upon our manpower by the armed forces and higher paying defense industries created a shortage of personnel. This void in the ranks made necessary the utilization of limited tenure police officers.

Maintaining the high standard set in the year 1942, there were no successful bank holdups to mar the perfect record of the San Francisco Police Department. There was an isolated instance of an attempted bank holdup which was frustrated by the prompt and efficient action of police officers.

#### Commendations for Meritorious Conduct.

Commendations for bravery in this department were awarded during the year 1942 as follows: Commendation "A," which is given by the Chief for an act performed intelligently in the line of police duty, or for any important arrest involving elements of initiative, intelligence or bravery, was given to nineteen members of this department. Commendation "B," which is given by the Board of Police Commissioners for the performance of acts unquestionably involving bravery and risk



of life, and with knowledge of risk assumed in the performance of police duty, was given to ten members of the department. These commendations were based upon instances wherein those officers commended succeeded in apprehending gunmen under exceptional circumstances; or, with knowledge of the risk assumed, faced gunfire or saved lives at the risk of their own.

### **Traffic Accidents.**

Records indicate a decrease in non-fatal and property damage accidents, while the number of fatalities due to the operation of motor vehicles was greater than that of 1942. This increase can be attributed in the major part to the combined existence of a dim-out area, dimmed-out headlights and the customary dark clothing worn by pedestrians.

### **Junior Traffic Patrol.**

The value of the Junior Traffic Patrol was clearly brought out by the fact that no child of school age was killed in the past year at school crossings during school hours. The untiring efforts of those concerned with this method of accident prevention has produced 100 per cent results.

### **Police Academy.**

Modern police service has become a profession which demands the best material available, men of physical character and moral excellence, animated by the highest conception of duty and public service. The Police Academy was of great value in training inexperienced limited tenure police recruits. Without the opportunity to attend technical courses and to learn the methods, practices and technique of police procedure, these men would have been of little value to the Police Department.

### **Auxiliary Police.**

One of the major problems confronting the San Francisco Police Department was the combating of an increase in crime with a depleted force. The Civil Service list which ordinarily supplied the required manpower to the department became exhausted and it therefore became necessary to advertise for limited tenure police recruits. This was met with a weak response. It devolved upon the auxiliary police to aid in stemming the rapidly growing void in manpower and the attendant increase in crime. The many and varied details assigned them were efficiently and expertly carried out. The burden of traffic duty which normally makes heavy demand upon the manpower of the department was to a great extent lightened by the voluntary and unsacrificing effort of these men on the home front. When the request was made for police aid the response thereto was immediate and unquestioned. Our records reflect the many instances wherein the auxiliaries covered themselves with honor by their efficient and courageous apprehension of criminals. With the close of the year 1943, the auxiliaries will have been in existence for a period of two years. The experience they have gained during this time has been of great value to themselves as well as to our city. Continuous courses in instruction have been afforded them in order that they might further perfect themselves in their patriotically chosen careers.

## **FIRE DEPARTMENT**

During the first eleven months of the calendar year 1943, the San Francisco Fire Department responded to 10,133 alarms, an increase of 1722 over the same period of the previous year.

In view of the vast increase of our population and of our greatly

expanded war activities, the increased number of alarms can be considered as normal, and it is particularly gratifying that, due to the constant and careful vigilance on the part of the Fire Department, no really serious or disastrous fires occurred during the year.

In the Hunter's Point area, where numerous new housing projects have been established in territories which formerly were undeveloped and required no special fire protection, a new chemical company has been established in the quarters of Engine Company No. 11 at 1632 Oakdale Avenue.

In full accord with Army, Navy, Coast Guard and the State Harbor authorities, a rigid control and constant surveillance has been maintained along our harbor front and shipping, and this hazardous area has been particularly free from fires on this account.

The regular equipment and rolling stock of the department has been maintained at full capacity, and while the present war has prevented the continuance of our accepted policy of replacing a certain percentage of our obsolescent fire apparatus each year, by reason of the fact that their manufacture has been stopped for the duration, the acquisition of considerable quantities of auxiliary fire equipment from the 1942 Fire Protection Bond fund has provided an adequate margin of safety in this respect.

Not quite as favorable is the manpower situation in the department. Of the 196 officers and members who joined the armed forces, 30 have been honorably discharged, and three have been reported as killed or missing in action, leaving a balance of 163 now in military service. Deaths and retirements by reason of disability or full time of service have added another 44 vacancies, which brings the total of vacancies to 207. Against these we have been able to obtain 47 limited tenure firemen and 24 temporary non-civil service firemen, or a total of 71 men, thus leaving a balance of 136 unfilled vacancies at this time.

It is hoped that a general leveling off of all war activities, which is now taking place, will bring some relief, or at least will prevent this situation from becoming much worse.

In the maintenance of the Auxiliary Fire Service, the regular department has continued to exert every possible influence to maintain this branch of civilian defense at its full capacity, although there has been a marked falling off of attendance at the regular drills. This has been caused by the recent relaxation by the Army authorities of the dim-out regulations and a general reduction in civilian defense activities.

The records of this service, as of December 1, 1943, show:

The morale of these forces, on the whole, is excellent, interest is keen, and a healthy spirit of friendly rivalry has been fostered by the conduct of several city-wide competitions, which have demonstrated the remarkable efficiency of this service.

The auxiliary fire equipment is being maintained at high efficiency and in constant readiness for immediate service. Four hundred fifty-six units are quartered in regular and auxiliary firehouses throughout the city and the remaining units are kept in pools, equipped and ready for service in the two leased garages at 330 Larkin Street and at 915 Northpoint Street.

The number of auxiliary firehouses has been increased to fifty, and two vacant gasoline service stations have been leased to serve as auxiliary stations.

## CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION

The Civil Service Commission has met, with good judgment and excellent planning, the many difficult problems arising out of the war emergency. The manpower shortage has been very evident in the city service and in order to alleviate the condition the commission has established a part time rule allowing city employees, not only to work in outside employment after their regular hours of business, but also to work in other classifications in the city service.

The limited tenure examination procedure approved by the people at the last election was put into effect by the Civil Service Commission in February of this year and provides for a non-competitive examination and the immediate filling of vacancies; 148 limited tenure examinations have been held to date; 8,032 persons interviewed and approximately 5500 appointments have been made under this limited tenure procedure.

Even in view of the labor shortage in the city service, the commission has been fully cognizant of the need to divert to the war effort skilled persons who can be spared or replaced with persons of lesser skills. In January, 1943, the commission undertook to survey the city service to ascertain how many persons had the 62 essential skills urgently needed in the war effort. The results of the survey were tabulated and a complete report issued indicating all of the persons with these skills who were not using such skills in the city service. Appointing officers were asked to release as many of these employees who cared to be released whose services could be dispensed with for the duration, or whose jobs could be filled by persons of lesser skills. Two hundred and nineteen employees are now on leave for non-military service in the war effort. There are also 1171 employees on military leave.

The Civil Service Commission has just completed a salary survey covering about 7000 positions in the city service. In addition to recommending salary schedules in accordance with those paid in private employment and other governmental jurisdictions in this state, the commission has recommended to the Board of Supervisors that there be a standard work week in the city service; that a minimum number of holidays be granted all employees; that seniority increments be based upon anniversary of employment; and that overtime payments be made on a sound basis, and it is my opinion that all of these recommendations are for the betterment of morale and service, and will be an effective aid in recruiting the highest type persons for the city service. The Civil Service Commission is to be congratulated on its attempt to improve standards and working conditions in the city service and it is my hope that some day in the not too distant future the municipal government can be looked upon as a model employer and a leader in modern personnel practices.

## EMPLOYEES' RETIREMENT SYSTEM

The Retirement System included 13,177 employees at June 30, 1943. During the fiscal year ending on that date, 201 members were retired because of age or disability or qualified for monthly allowances as widows of firemen or policemen whose deaths resulted from injury received in performance of duty, and 110 active members died. Many of the positions thus vacated were not filled. During 1942-43, 129 retired persons died, and on June 30, 1943, there were 2177 persons receiving allowances under the Retirement System, this number including aged and disabled members retired from the several departments and also retired firemen and policemen, and their widows, where retirement allowances were continued to them or death resulted while in performance of duty.

The administration of the State Compensation Insurance Law, as it

affects all city employees, is centralized under the Retirement Board. Reports of all injuries among approximately 13,000 employees are made to the Retirement Office and claims are adjusted and benefits paid in accordance with the State law and Charter, the City and County acting as self-insurer in relation to all employees. During the fiscal year 1942-43, 1017 compensation cases were handled, under which either weekly benefits or medical expenses were paid. Approximately 1572 additional cases were handled which were not of sufficient severity to qualify for compensation benefits other than medical care by the physician regularly employed by the Retirement System. The investments of the Retirement Fund at June 30, 1943, totaled \$33,122,345 as against \$30,717,014 as of June 30, 1942.

### ASSESSOR'S OFFICE

Assessor Russell L. Wolden and his staff have maintained the high standard of efficient operation for which the San Francisco Assessor's Office has received wide recognition.

The building valuation increase, due mainly to new industrial structures in the Potrero and Bayview districts and the uncompleted Metropolitan Life Insurance Company project, Park Merced, was offset by a decrease in land valuations in the Western Addition. However, the heavy increase in intangible personal property resulted in a grand total which exceeds last year's figure by \$76,780,342.

Despite the difficulties of working under war conditions, Assessor Wolden and his staff are continuing their valuation studies to maintain all assessed values on a fair and equitable basis.

### TREASURER

The Treasurer's Office, Thos. K. McCarthy, Treasurer, is conducted under the provisions of the Charter of the City and County of San Francisco, the laws of California, and the Federal Reserve Act.

The annual audit for the fiscal year of 1942-1943 of the Treasurer's Office was made by the Auditing Department of the Controller's Office, and found all accounts correct.

James O. Sully, Certified Public Accountant, under the supervision of Harold J. Boyd, Controller, audited the securities held in the joint custody vault of the Treasurer's Office, in the name of the San Francisco City and County Employees' Retirement System. Bonds in the amount of \$31,154,700 were found to be correct.

Cash on hand at the close of business June 30, 1942, \$20,714,044.05. Cash received fiscal year 1942-1943, \$91,358,894.04. Cash disbursed \$86,184,433.55. Total cash handled \$177,543,329.59. Cash on hand as of June 30, 1943, \$25,888,504.54.

Number of City and County of San Francisco warrants paid during the fiscal year 1942-1943, 689,584. 266,160 coupons paid for a total of \$5,988,592.33. 8089 bonds paid for a total of \$8,083,600.

Collections for inheritance tax, \$1,472,150.12. Inheritance tax receipts issued, 977. Safe deposit box examinations and contents listed, 1665. Inheritance tax certificates issued in connection with the transfer of securities and bank accounts, 9431.

The Treasurer, by virtue of his office, is the Treasurer of the Islais Creek Reclamation District, which is located wholly within the City and County of San Francisco.

The National City Bank of New York is the designated fiscal agency of the City and County of San Francisco, and pays matured bond interest and bond redemption.

## SHERIFF

Daniel C. Murphy, Sheriff of the City and County of San Francisco, outlines his activities for 1943, as follows:

### Receipts.

County commissions, fees and mileage, \$26,563.84; cash receipts under writs of attachment, executions, fee deposits by plaintiffs, and cash deposits by defendants in lieu of undertakings on release of attachments, etc., \$205,807.92; sales of personal property after deduction of county commission and fees, \$11,721.99; sales of real property, \$5,893.97; total, \$249,997.72.

### Process and Papers Filed and Issued.

A classified list of all process and papers filed and issued for this same period is as follows: Bonds (personal and surety), 11; claims of exemption, notice of preferred claims, releases, third party claims, 920; claims and delivery and writs of replevin, 53; miscellaneous, 587; notices, 167; orders of arrest, 10; orders of examination, 8; orders to show cause, 275; subpoena, 121; summons (civil actions) 3,074; writs of attachment (personal property), 5,624; writs of attachment (real property), 49; writs of execution (personal property), 4,702; writs of execution (real property), 51; writs of possession, 161; certificates (issued), 27; deed (issued), 6; releases, 3,636; total, 19,482.

Under and pursuant to such writs of attachment and writs of execution, most of the personal property levied upon consists of garnishments. However, under that type of writs, including claim and delivery and writs of replevin, the following personal property sales were consummated:

**Number of Sales, 38; Amount \$11,731.99.**

The process under and pursuant to which these so-called evictions are made is termed "Writs of Possession," and will hereinafter be

referred to by that name and will be enumerated under the classified list of process captioned: Writs of possession received or filed, 160; possession to plaintiff, 77; unexecuted, 40; number of forcible evictions, 43.

#### County Jails—Numbers 1, 2, 3 and 4.

The monthly average population of inmates confined in all San Francisco County Jails for fiscal year July 1, 1942, to June 30, 1943, both dates inclusive, is 857.35; the total for the twelve months, 10,288.

There were 1091 Federal male and 33 Federal female prisoners received during this period with a daily average of 60.

The amount (total) received from the United States Government for maintenance and subsistence of Federal prisoners for the fiscal year, July 1, 1942, to June 30, 1943, was \$17,516.20.

During the calendar year of 1943 there were 574 male patients and 521 female patients transported from the Detention Hospital to various state institutions.

From our County Jails, 190 male and 16 female prisoners were transported to state penitentiaries and other correctional institutions during this same period. The transportation of these persons is under the direct supervision of the Sheriff and follows the procedure authorized on January 13, 1936, of Ordinance 7.062, Bill 890. All surplus money received from this source is deposited with the Treasurer of the City and County of San Francisco by the Sheriff. While under the law the Sheriff could retain this surplus money, he believes it should be used for the benefit of the taxpayers of the City and County of San Francisco. This new procedure adopted by the Sheriff has resulted in a saving to the City and County of San Francisco of \$4,731.56 during the last fiscal year.

At the request of the Sheriff, Ordinance 7061, Bill 860, was drafted and approved on January 13, 1936. This ordinance established County Jail stores to be maintained for the convenience of prisoners, and under this procedure, should there be any profit, it would be deposited with the Treasurer for the benefit of the taxpayers of the City and County of San Francisco. These stores are under the direct supervision of the Sheriff, and with minimum prices on all commodities sold in the stores, the profit for the last fiscal year amounted to \$7,242.85.

### PUBLIC UTILITIES COMMISSION

In spite of greatly increased costs of labor and supplies, manpower shortages and the scarcity of critical materials, the revenue producing properties operated by the Commission enjoyed the greatest net incomes in their history during the year. Particularly was this true of the operations of the Municipal Railway and of the San Francisco Water Department. Meanwhile, non-revenue producing utilities continued to extend their services to new customers, further exemplifying the advantages of public ownership of utilities. More detailed reports of these various operations follow:

#### Municipal Railway of San Francisco.

On December 31, 1943, the Municipal Railway had completed its thirty-first year of operation, the last two years since December 8, 1941, being under war conditions which created tremendous demands for vital wartime transportation. Due to the military requirements for the conduct of the war, it became increasingly difficult to obtain sufficient operating personnel, materials and equipment to meet the abnormal transportation needs.

The past year has been the most outstanding in the railway's history, and revenues received, profits earned, and service operated estab-

lished record figures. The volume of travel which has been consistently and progressively increasing has taxed the management of the railway to the utmost to provide the required transportation with present equipment and facilities.

To indicate the progressive nature of the increasing travel, a tabulation of the daily average passenger receipts for the past thirty-six months is given below:

The increase in the daily average passenger receipts in the month of December, 1943, over December, 1941, amounts to \$7,066 per day, or 63.04 per cent.

In November and December, many week-day passenger receipt totals were in excess of \$19,000 per day, and on some days reached the record figure of over \$20,000.

Gasoline rationing which went into effect December 1, 1942, greatly curtailed the use of private automobiles and forced large numbers of additional people to use street cars and motor coaches. Further cuts in the gasoline allowances to drivers of private automobiles have been proposed and if placed in effect will result in additional transportation demands upon the railway.

As the fullest use of all existing street railway transportation facilities was demanded to handle the wartime travel requirements, and in consideration of the many benefits of unified operation, it was decided to resubmit the proposal to purchase the operative properties of the Market Street Railway Company and to consolidate that system with the Municipal Railway system under city management. A similar proposal was defeated by some 6,000 votes in an election held on November 3, 1942. Accordingly on April 20, 1943, a charter amendment was submitted to the voters of San Francisco authorizing the purchase of the Market Street Railway Company's operative properties for the sum of \$7,950,000. This purchase was to be financed by the issuance of revenue bonds, principal and interest to be paid solely from the revenues of the Municipal Railway after consolidation with the Market Street Railway Company.

Estimates of financial results of operation after unification were prepared, and these estimates indicated that on a uniform fare of six cents with a free transfer privilege all operating costs and other charges, including bond interest and redemption, could be paid and a balance

would be available for reconstruction, replacements, and deferred maintenance of approximately \$1,400,000 annually.

Plans were submitted to utilize to the maximum all existing equipment and trackage of the two systems and to make extensions, revisions and re-routings of present lines to more advantageously use present transportation facilities. This was in accord with the desires of the Office of Defense Transportation.

Full publicity was afforded in the press, and favorable support given by most civic bodies and leaders. The amendment, however, failed to gain a majority vote, the result being 53,619 for and 88,418 against.

On October 5, 1943, the Office of Defense Transportation submitted recommendations for transit adjustments in San Francisco, vitally changing the existing service of the Municipal Railway and the Market Street Railway Company. Studies of these recommendations by the Municipal Railway management and many interested civic bodies resulted in an almost unanimous opinion that the placing of these recommendations into effect would have a disastrous effect on Municipal Railway operation, would fail to improve the overall transportation problem, and would cause still further transportation difficulties.

Conferences were held locally by the Office of Defense Transportation with the various railway managements, and objections to many of the recommendations were made. A hearing in Washington was held which was attended by E. G. Cahill, Manager of Utilities; Wm. H. Scott, Manager of the Municipal Railway; Dion Holm, Assistant City Attorney; Dewey Mead, member of the Board of Supervisors, and Rodger D. Lapham, Mayor-elect. As a result of this meeting, a postponement of the proposed transit program was obtained looking toward a re-examination of the problem and a possible voluntary operating agreement among the transit agencies involved.

Total operating revenue for the year amounted to \$6,249,860, an increase of \$1,357,143 or 27.74 per cent over the previous year and the highest figure in the Municipal Railway history. Operating expenses totaled \$4,501,157, an increase of \$781,152 due principally to increased service operated and to wage increases to platform men and other employees.

After providing the amount of \$563,121 for depreciation, \$202,496 for accidents, and \$49,583 for bond interest, the railway had a net income of \$940,503, an all-time high in its history. It should be noted that this net income resulted after increasing the charge for depreciation to \$563,121, an increase of \$149,523, over the previous year.

Car and coach hours operated for the year amounted to 1,252,565 hours, an increase of 132,255 hours, or 11.81 per cent over the previous year and the highest ever operated by the railway.

No major changes were made in the established car or coach routes during the year.

Passengers carried during the year totaled 157,267,410, an increase of 30,638,430, or 24.20 per cent over the previous year and an all-time high for the railway. Street cars and coaches traveled a distance of 11,891,750 miles, which is an increase of 1,195,858 miles, or 11.18 per cent over last year and the greatest mileage operated in any previous year by the railway.

The arrangement for a free interchange of transfers with the California Street Cable Railroad Company's lines, which went into effect on December 1, 1942, was discontinued on August 8, 1943, at the request of the California Street Cable Railroad Company. The rate of fare on the Municipal Railway lines remained at five cents during the year, and on the California Street Cable Railroad Company at six cents. The fare on the Market Street Railway Company's lines, which has been seven cents, was ordered reduced to six cents by the State Railroad Commission in an order issued on November 30, 1943, and effective on or before December 21, 1943.



Track roadway and equipment have been maintained in excellent condition, the sum of \$551,922 having been expended for this purpose. Included in this maintenance work was the overhauling and painting of thirty-nine street car bodies and fifteen motor coaches. Priority restrictions due to the war have made it increasingly difficult to obtain certain critical materials, and it has therefore been necessary to utilize all materials to the fullest extent to maintain operation and to cooperate in the war effort.

Expenditures for new construction, equipment, and replacements amounted to \$72,346. This is a greatly reduced figure from normal years and is due mainly to war conditions restricting the use of critical materials and equipment and to the shortage of labor, with the result that replacements have been confined mainly to small jobs absolutely essential to the operation of the railway.

Purchase orders for twenty-three motor coaches in the amount of \$283,000 were drawn in the early part of 1942, some twenty months ago, and though every effort has been made to secure federal approval; it has not been given, and this much needed equipment cannot be obtained. In addition to the above, funds have been set up in the amount of \$180,000 for the purchase of fifteen more motor coaches and in the amount of \$280,000 for the purchase of twenty trolley coaches. This makes a total provision for the purchase of thirty-eight motor coaches and twenty trolley coaches. Funds are also available in the amount of \$160,000 for the construction of a new motor coach garage, but must await more favorable conditions for construction as must over \$500,000 of track replacements for which funds have been set up.

During the year, under track maintenance and replacements 1800 feet of single track was reconstructed, 240 thermit weld joints were installed, 50,490 square feet of concrete base seven inches deep was renewed, and 293,374 square feet of asphalt paving was replaced. The total cost of asphalt paving for the year was \$43,446.

On December 1, the sum of \$100,000 in bonds of the railway was retired from earnings so that there now remains an indebtedness of only \$900,000 against the railway properties, which are conservatively valued at \$10,000,000.

At the close of the year, the cash balances in the various Municipal Railway funds amounted to over \$3,500,000. During the first six months of the year, due to the large number of employees leaving for military service and to others accepting employment in the war industries, it was difficult to obtain sufficient street car and coach operators to maintain required schedules. The increase in platform wages on July 1, 1943, of five cents per hour to street car operators, the rates being 85 cents to 92½ cents per hour, and the increase of 10 cents per hour to coach operators, the new rates being 90 cents to 97½ cents per hour, greatly relieved the shortage of platform employees.

The requirement of employees obtaining employment releases, the provision for limited draft deferments, the employment of women, and the extensive advertising campaigns for platform employees conducted in newspapers and on the radio for which the amount of \$16,165 was expended, all tended greatly to relieve the shortage of operating personnel.

The Municipal Railway training department was required to train 838 street car and coach operators during the year. Of this number 615 completed training and qualified for regular employment. The number completing training amounted to over 54 per cent of the total number of platform employees required for operation, which figure was 1,133 at the close of the year and included 160 women.

The past year has been a trying one for the railway management and personnel, and all indications are that still further efforts must be made as wartime activities increase in the Pacific area, concern being felt as to the ability of the railway to provide the necessary increased transportation service with present trackage and equipment.

**San Francisco Water Department.**

The year 1943, the fourteenth under municipal ownership, marks another year of profitable operation of the San Francisco Water Department.

Although the increase in the number of active consumers accounts and of new services is small as compared with previous years, due to War Production Board restrictions, an exceptional gain was made in water sales as a result of the influx of defense workers and the greatly expanded wartime industries.

Water consumption for the entire system during the year averaged 83.0 million gallons daily, an increase of 9.0 million gallons daily over the preceding year. Of this total 73.4 million gallons daily were used in the city proper and 9.6 million gallons daily in the suburban area.

This is the greatest gain in consumption experienced in the history of the system either under city or under Spring Valley operation.

Also for the first time, the 24-hour peak demand of the system exceeded 100 million gallons. This occurred several times during the year; the maximum draft, occurring on September 21, amounted to 109,384,000 gallons.

Reflecting the increased consumption, water sales for the year amounted to \$8,576,046 and net income from operations was \$4,094,063 as compared to \$3,532,271 for the preceding year, or an increase of \$561,792.

This increase is the net result of an increase in water sales amounting to \$647,489, an all-time high, a decrease of \$51,367 in miscellaneous income, an increase in operating expenses of \$121,222 and a decrease in other expense, principally bond interest and redemption of \$86,892.

The water sales increase of \$647,489 represents a gain of \$588,040 in revenue and an increase of \$59,449 in water furnished to non-paying municipal accounts.

This increase in revenue was accounted for by a 6.6 per cent increase amounting to \$446,994 for San Francisco and by a 24.4 per cent increase amounting to \$141,046 in the suburban districts.

In keeping with the nationwide movement to encourage planting of Victory Gardens, the Public Utilities Commission by resolution on January 25, 1943, and amended June 28, 1943, authorized special rates applicable to water used for such gardens within the limits of the city.

The plan provided for a total credit for the season equivalent to 15 cents per 100 cubic feet for a volume of water equal to a 2-foot depth over an area not less than 100 square feet actually planted to vegetables; no applications to be accepted after December 31, 1943, and no credits applied after March 1, 1944.

Through the year, applications covering a total area of approximately 293 acres were received for these special rates, the number of allowances made was 25,958 and the value of credits applied to bills amounted to \$38,372.27.

By resolution of the Public Utilities Commission, on September 16, 1943, a 15 per cent reduction in water rates was ordered, effective December 1, 1943, for domestic, commercial, industrial and other uses within the limits of the City and County of San Francisco.

This rate reduction will result in the saving to consumers of approximately \$1,000,000 per year.

Restrictions of the War Production Board practically stopped all new home construction and imposed severe limitations on main extensions. The number of active consumer accounts in San Francisco increased to 129,107 a gain of 1515 for the past year, as compared with a gain of 1038 for the preceding year.

Eight hundred and ten new service connections were installed, which approximates the 829 installed during the previous year.

Less than two miles of new mains were added to the distribution system in the city as compared to nearly six miles for 1942.

Existing transmission and distribution facilities continue to be taxed to capacity to meet the increase in consumption in the higher level districts.

The newly constructed Baden and Alemany pumping plants and the 44-inch crosstown line can, temporarily, take care of normal increases in these districts by augmenting present deliveries from San Andres reservoir with water pumped from Crystal Springs.

In connection with increased storage for the higher level districts, the War Production Board denied, in 1942, a preference rating for the construction of a new tank at Forest Hill. However, acting on a request for reconsideration, the board on June 30, 1943, granted an adequate priority rating.

The tank, a prestressed reinforced concrete structure with a capacity of 300,000 gallons, is now under construction and should be completed early in the year.

To permanently relieve those higher level districts a construction program has been laid out. The plan calls for a new San Andres reservoir outlet shaft and tunnels; a new 60-inch pipe line from this tower to Sunset reservoir and a new reservoir in Sutro Forest, with connecting pipe lines.

Although funds are available for the construction of the first unit, the San Andres outlet shaft and tunnels, the limited preference rating from the War Production Board was so severe as to preclude undertaking the work last year. However, under date of October 16, 1943, the Board, after reconsideration, granted an adequate rating, and plans and specifications are being prepared for the construction of the shaft and tunnels. Bids will be called for at an early date. Lands and rights of way for this construction have been acquired.

The construction of the Lake Merced Auxiliary Steam Pumping Plant for which the electorate, on June 9, 1942, approved a bond issue of \$1,250,000 to finance the project, is still in abeyance. Under date of July 15, 1942, the War Production Board declined to recommend a preference rating on account of the amount of critical material involved in the project. A new application has been submitted to the Board, for reconsideration, and the question of an adequate rating is still under discussion.

Strategic points of the water system continued to be policed throughout the year. The State Guard was assigned this work and carried on until June 4, when the last of the guard was withdrawn and replaced by civilian guards of the Department.

Officials and employees of the Department continued to take an active part in the city's Civilian Defense organization, to maintain and to protect the water supply in any emergency. Repair supplies and equipment are located at established centers throughout the city. All Water Department crews in Alameda and San Mateo counties are organized to report to their respective headquarters in the event of any wartime requirement.

Due to the demands of the military and the high wages paid in industry, it was increasingly difficult to maintain the required personnel and to secure temporary employees for the necessary seasonal work.

Eighty-two Water Department employees are now in the military service of their country.

The past winter's rainfall on the Peninsula watersheds was approximately 8 per cent below normal, while at Calaveras it was 21 per cent below normal. However, at the end of the runoff season all reservoirs were near the point of overflowing.

During the first seven months of this year the Hetch Hetchy system delivered an average of 37 million gallons daily, most of which was used as an emergency precaution to maintain a maximum practicable storage in Crystal Springs reservoir or to supply suburban consumers served direct from the Bay Crossing pipe lines during periods of excessive turbidity of Calaveras water.

Local storage at the close of 1943 was approximately 42 billion gallons, or the equivalent of 500 days' supply.

A résumé of the financial results of the city's operation of the Water Department from March 3, 1930, to December 31, 1943, shows a gross income of \$99,720,335 and operating expenses of \$58,222,081. The net income of \$41,498,254 was used for:

In addition to this net income the Water Department has furnished water free of charge to various other city departments to the amount of \$5,689,552 and through a series of rate reductions, has saved water consumers \$8,800,000, as compared to rates under the former private ownership.

## Hetch Hetchy Water Supply, Power and Utilities Engineering Bureau.

The Hetch Hetchy Water Supply, Power and Utilities Engineering Bureau has complete charge, under the Public Utilities Commission, of the Hetch Hetchy water supply and power system, and performs engineering services as required for the Municipal Railway and San Francisco Airport. During the year 1943 most of its activities outside the field of routine operation and maintenance have arisen from one phase or another of wartime necessity, as noted in the following paragraphs on the several utilities.

### Hetch Hetchy Water Supply.

October 18, 1943, completed the ninth year of service of the Hetch Hetchy Water Supply in delivering Tuolumne River water into the San Francisco system for local storage and distribution. As in previous recent years, the quantity of water delivered to the Water Department during the year 1943 was below the average of the nine-year period, because of better-than-average rainfall conditions causing the local watersheds to contribute a larger part of the total water requirement. Under a Raker Act provision, the city may not divert beyond the limits of the San Joaquin Valley more water than is necessary, in addition to the supply from local sources, for the domestic and other municipal purposes of the city and any municipalities or water districts associated with it in the use of water. Therefore, the Crystal Springs reservoir, which receives the flow of the Hetch Hetchy aqueduct, is not maintained constantly full, but is drawn down by a few feet during the latter months of each calendar year to develop capacity to retain the winter and spring runoff from the adjacent watershed.

The field activities of the Hetch Hetchy Water Supply were, as in 1942, limited almost entirely to operation, maintenance and protection of the works, and surveys for future extensions. Wartime restrictions on procurement of materials, with limitations on labor supply, prevented undertaking any new construction work.

In the suit of Transbay Construction Company against the city for additional payment for the enlargement of O'Shaughnessy Dam under Water Supply Contract No. 149, which the United States District Court had decided in favor of the contractor, the United States Circuit Court of Appeals reversed the District Court decision, and the Supreme Court refused a writ of certiorari.

Surveys and planning for the Cherry River development, begun in 1940, were further prosecuted in 1943, so far as the limited manpower available in office and field would permit. It is hoped that this project will be accepted as a major item of the city's share in post-war work.

The Coast Range tunnel section, which extends twenty-five miles from the San Joaquin Valley to Alameda Creek, was inspected from end to end by a party of engineers of this bureau, and the concrete lining was found to be in first-class condition throughout. Such an inspection is a matter of annual routine, but this time it was of more than usual interest on account of the occurrence, a few weeks earlier, of a series of earthquake shocks which were sharply felt in the region from Livermore to San Jose. This section of tunnel, on account of the geologic formations through which it passes, is considered more susceptible to earthquake damage than any other part of the Hetch Hetchy aqueduct, and it is gratifying to report that no evidence of any such damage has been detected.

The Hetch Hetchy Water Supply was able to assist during the year in affording relief to some of the cities whose water supply plants have become overloaded due to wartime expansion of population. A section, 14.7 miles in length, of the Corral Hollow pipe line, which was not in use and without any prospect of being put in use by the city in the near future, and some pump station equipment that was to have been used in connection with the pipe line, were sold to the Federal Works Agency, which parceled out these items to three hard-pressed cities.

Other equipment was sold for use in a navy yard and in plants producing material for war use.

### **Hetch Hetchy Power.**

A new market for the output of the city's two power plants materialized this year. The aluminum reduction plant at Riverbank, power for which had been contracted last year, was completed. Delivery of energy began in April, with a second unit doubling the load in September. The third and final unit has been installed but not yet placed in service.

This plant, owned by Defense Plant Corporation, was built by and is operated by the Aluminum Company of America, producing aluminum for the war effort. The two units now in operation supply sufficient load to utilize the capacity of the Hetch Hetchy power plants, plus a minor amount of supplementary energy purchased from the Pacific Gas and Electric Company over the city's transmission lines. However, the second unit was not ready by July 1, when a District Court injunction was to go into effect banning delivery of our surplus energy to the power company. Under the circumstances, the city obtained a stay of execution of this order for another year, thus permitting the marketing of this surplus energy in the interim.

Hetch Hetchy power is now being utilized to the fullest extent in the war effort. Plans should be made for marketing our power after the cessation of hostilities, as continued operation of this aluminum plant is not assured. The raw material (alumina) used comes from eastern refineries, with a long haul that places the Riverbank product in an unfavorable competitive position for the reduced post-war business. Efforts were made to obtain W.P.B. approval for a refinery to develop California aluminum-bearing clays, but without success. The problem of a permanent market for Hetch Hetchy power is still to be solved.

Energy production was normal during the year, except for an accident when a Navy plane flew into the high voltage transmission lines, causing appreciable damage and interruption to power service. The Navy Department was willing but legally unable to reimburse the city for the damages incurred. The city's claim has been presented to Congress by Representative Richard Welch in Bill HR 3590.

Efforts were continued during the year to interest Federal agencies in aiding in the construction of the Red Mountain Power Plant. Scarcity of critical materials has been the principal reason for delaying work on this project.

### **Municipal Railway Engineering.**

The Utilities Engineering Bureau furnished plans, specifications and inspection for some reconstruction and replacement work and painting on the Geary Street car barn, and for construction of a small waiting station.

This bureau also furnished cost estimates, appraisals, studies of operating revenues and expenses, and exhibits necessary in connection with the proposal that the city acquire the Market Street Railway Company property; and later prepared exhibits for use in connection with the Office of Defense Transportation proposal for the re-routing and curtailment of service of street cars and buses.

### **Airport Engineering.**

The bureau designed and supervised airport construction work performed at city expense, the principal items of which were additions and improvements to the administration building, a small but important piece of road and bridge construction, and the installation of a new beacon on the control tower. Similar engineering service was rendered at the request and expense of the United Air Lines Transport Corporation in connection with the further development of their west-

ern operations base on land leased from the city, the initial construction of which was completed in 1942. The Army has added to the taxiway system. The Navy is building a naval air transport station on land north of the Coast Guard Air Station and the seaplane harbor, taken from the city under condemnation. The engineers of this bureau have collaborated in this Army and Navy work by furnishing information as to ground conditions and surveys. Plans and estimates have been made, in consultation with or at the request of the Airport Manager, relating to the proposed ultimate development of the airport and to the much-desired relocation of Bayshore Highway passing the airport.

### Treasure Island.

This bureau has furnished cost estimates and plans to the Public Utilities Commission and the Airport Department for use in discussion and negotiations with federal officials in the endeavor to reach a fair settlement in the matter of Treasure Island.

### Bureau of Light, Heat and Power.

The effect of the war has been severely felt by the Bureau of Light, Heat and Power. Because of the scarcity of strategic materials, few additions have been made to the street lighting system, while the restrictions on lighting have materially hampered efficient use of existing facilities. The resulting inconvenience to the public and the increased number of accidents have been of great concern to the department. The lifting of the dimout on November 1, 1943, has to a degree improved the condition, as certain lights previously inoperative have been put back into service and the dimout shields on others are being removed as far as available manpower and other limitations permit. Thus there were 24,053 street lights in service at the close of the year, an increase of 174 over the previous year, while 871 lights still remain out on account of war restrictions.

Use of gas and electricity for light, heat and power has greatly increased during the year. Most of the increase must be attributed to various war activities, such as the Board of Education's war production and marine training program, civilian defense and rationing. Various governmental agencies and the armed forces have occupied much municipal property and continue to secure utility services through existing facilities, sharing the cost with the city. The city has been reimbursed for this cost through the efforts of this bureau, which collects from the federal agencies in the name of the affected department.

The war has thus added many functions to this department, but it has also limited others. Expansion of the street lighting system to meet the city's growth has been impossible, due to lack of necessary materials. When the war is over or when these materials are available for civilian use, much work must be done to provide again adequate and safe street lighting for our citizens, as has been the practice in San Francisco.

### San Francisco Airport.

As the world-wide air war now being waged continued through another year, the paramount importance of the swift movement of men and supplies continued to manifest itself as a dominant factor in modern warfare. Correspondingly, the importance of adequate aircraft operational bases likewise assumed greater importance. That the citizens of San Francisco have provided such a base is substantiated by the fact that the San Francisco Airport has been utilized continuously for military aircraft operations as an integral base for flights to and from all parts of the world. Although specific information concerning the extent to which the San Francisco Airport is being utilized for military purposes cannot be divulged at this time, it can be stated that military aircraft operations during the past year more than doubled

those of the previous calendar year, and that the operations conducted included various types of aircraft ranging from the small fast fighters frequently seen over San Francisco to the great four-engined air transports which gross some 65,000 pounds when loaded for trans-Pacific passenger and cargo services.

The Federal Government through the various aeronautical branches of the Civil Aeronautics Administration has provided and operates extensive facilities at the San Francisco Airport which are required for the safe and efficient operation of military and civil aircraft. These include the radio range station, intercontinental communication system control office, weather bureau, airport and airway traffic control facilities, all of which form an integral part of this great air network under development throughout the world.

Although statistics on scheduled air carrier activities indicate substantial increases, the upward trend that prevailed before the outbreak of war has been held up temporarily due to the lack of air carrier equipment. This shortage of air carrier equipment developed early during the war when the government found it necessary to take over approximately 50 per cent of the air carriers' airplanes for more urgent needs, but toward the close of the year the shortage was slightly alleviated when the government returned some of the airplanes to air carriers for essential air mail operations. The traffic tabulation is as follows:

Domestic air carrier operations records indicate that the revenue passenger load factor of schedules operating in and out of the San Francisco Airport ranked with the highest throughout the United States.

Statistics also disclosed that the operating efficiency of scheduled air carriers, including United Air Lines Transport Corporation and Transcontinental and Western Air, Inc., were among the highest in the United States. Although no comparative tabulation is available from other airports at this time, we should be proud of the fact that of some 13,000 scheduled arrivals and departures, 12,740 were completed for an actual operating percentage of 98 per cent. It is doubtful whether any other major city's air terminal can produce such an efficient record, and with San Francisco situated in such a strategic location in regard to future trans-oceanic air carrier operations, we may well look forward to the future for a tremendous expansion in air transportation.

Already, the number of civilian employees based at the San Francisco Airport, employed by lessees for aeronautical activities, has increased considerably, and at the close of the year, more than 1600 employees were receiving salaries totaling in excess of \$4,000,000 annually. Further increases appear inevitable as the plans of many of the largest interests in domestic and international air commerce are revealed.

Both United Air Lines and Transcontinental and Western Air, Inc., two of the four largest domestic air carrier organizations in the United States, have signed long-term property and operation leases with the city. In addition thereto, Western Air Lines recently received authorization from the Civil Aeronautics Board to operate in competition with United Air Lines between San Francisco and Los Angeles, and is negotiating with the city for space for the services they plan to inaugurate at an early date. The international aspect of the great future of the airport is definitely assured by the fact that a huge \$3,500,000 Pan American Airways System trans-Pacific operations base is now under construction there. Upon completion of these facilities, Pan American



Airways System will move from their Treasure Island base to this new location. Some 1000 employees will be involved in the relocation which will provide Pan American Airways with both landplane and seaplane facilities.

The Matson Navigation Company has made application to the Civil Aeronautics Board for permission to inaugurate trans-Pacific air service between San Francisco and the Hawaiian Islands. That the Matson Navigation Company has recognized the advantages that the land and seaplane facilities of the San Francisco Airport offer can be substantiated by the fact that this organization purchased property immediately adjacent to the San Francisco Airport for their proposed development of facilities, and plans to use the airport for its practical operations.

San Francisco Airport, developed by San Franciscans for peacetime air transportation, has proved a good investment of tremendous value to our protection and to the war effort, and, in addition, serves as the base of operations for the greatest concentration of air carrier operations on the Pacific Coast. We may well look forward to the post-war era when the present facilities of the airport and the air carriers will undoubtedly undergo a tremendous expansion for the accommodation of passengers and cargo to and from all parts of the world. Far greater use and extensive development of the airport is inevitable.

### PARK COMMISSION

The Park Department, under the jurisdiction of the Park Commission, includes in addition to Golden Gate Park, the San Francisco Zoological Gardens, Lincoln, Harding and Sharp Park Golf Courses, Yacht Harbor, Aquatic Park, Fleishhacker Playfield, McLaren Park and fifty-three smaller parks and squares, affording every district of our city a well-kept recreational unit.

Park Department operations for the past year, in compliance with the wartime policy of deferring construction work, have been confined, for the most part, to maintenance and rehabilitation. Roads and paths have been repaved and park buildings and convenience stations repaired; the usual maintenance of trees and shrubs has continued and new lawn and meadow areas have been planted.

Children's Playground, Golden Gate Park, was completely rehabilitated and transformed into a most colorful and attractive recreational area. The addition of a miniature model farm and the acquisition of the merry-go-round heretofore operated by a concessionaire, proved popular with the children, greatly increasing the attendance.

Interest and participation in the Victory Garden program was stimulated by the Park Commission by the creation of three model gardens to serve as a guide for the participants in this activity. Approximately 400 garden plots were laid out in Golden Gate Park and turned over to the general public for the growing of vegetables. The Victory Garden program met immediate and enthusiastic response from the public. Due to the wartime shortage of fresh vegetables the Park Department established its own vegetable garden in Balboa Park and provided the Park restaurants and the San Francisco Zoological Gardens with this commodity.

Boating was resumed at Stow Lake and proved popular. Fleishhacker Pool was reopened to the public after a year of Army occupation and enjoyed a successful season.

The Park Commission cooperated with the War Department in furthering the war effort by leasing to the United States Army sixteen separate parcels of park property for military installations and purposes.

The Civic Center was made available to the San Francisco War Council for the purpose of building barracks to provide needed overnight accommodations for the armed forces, presently guests of San Francisco.

General attendance of all the parks and squares under the jurisdiction of the Park Commission increased beyond all expectations and has been estimated to have more than doubled the attendance of recent years. This large increase in attendance no doubt can be attributed, in part, to reduced travel and increased population.

## RECREATION COMMISSION

The Recreation Department, operating 120 units during 1943, faced many new problems brought about by war conditions.

Many of the trained experienced workers were called into the armed forces, causing a constant turnover in personnel and necessitating the employment of inexperienced people for whom in-service training courses were conducted.

The youth problem, the opening of large housing projects, and the influx of thousands of service men into the city demanded a widened scope of recreational activities.

The Directors-at-Large, through their program of recreational counseling and guidance, have alleviated important aspects of the youth problem. Teen-age dances were held weekly at twelve Recreation Centers throughout the city. In addition to the regularly conducted units of forty-eight playgrounds and centers and twenty-eight schoolyards, eight Teen-age Centers were provided for in sections of the city where there were no other recreational facilities, for the purpose of establishing supervised places for the teen-age youth of the neighborhood to meet and plan their own activities, both social and athletic.

The Annual Christmas program held in the Civic Auditorium presented Christmas carols and tableaux by 300 children from the San Francisco playgrounds and a physical fitness demonstration by 200 boys from the physical fitness classes held weekly in the fifteen evening gymnasiums supervised by the Recreation Department.

The Department took over the supervision of recreation at the Sunnydale, Valencia Gardens, and Hunter's Point Housing Projects. The centers at Hunter's Point provided recreation for three dormitory units which house 1500 single men and women, both negro and white, and three family units, one of 500 families, one of 550 families, and one of 950 families, both negro and white. Another family unit, housing 2200, is under construction.

An expansive program of recreation was conducted for service men and women. Gymnasiums and athletic fields were placed at their disposal, and athletic leagues conducted for them. The Department's swimming pools became centers for swimming and life-saving classes for the Army, Navy and Coast Guard. Service men's dances were held several evenings a week at the Century Club and numerous parties were given at the three service men's centers sponsored by the Recreation Department. Several hundred junior hostesses were furnished for dances held monthly at Treasure Island. The Photography Center was moved from Seventh and Bryant Streets to larger quarters at 1254 Market Street, to accommodate the great number of service men interested in photography.

About 500 children a week participated in the activities at the Junior Museum, which were geared to helping the war effort. Scale aircraft models were constructed for use by the Army and Navy in training men in aircraft recognition. More than 30,000 children, from five to fifteen years of age, cultivated Victory Gardens, both at the Junior Museum and playgrounds throughout the city. Children in the handcraft classes were instructed in making useful gifts which were sent to service men through the Junior Red Cross. The Department also cooperated with the Red Cross in establishing classes in nutrition and home nursing.

In addition to the swimming activities for service men, 91,699 children were instructed throughout the year in all phases of swimming and life-saving. The Recreation Department cooperated with the School

Department in conducting classes for the children from the junior and senior high schools.

In cooperation with the public schools and the Department of Health, the Recreation Department participated in the organization of the first Day Care Center to be opened in San Francisco, and supervised this center during the summer vacation.

During the summer twenty-four schoolyards were supervised on a full-time basis in addition to the regularly supervised grounds.

War conditions necessarily brought about revisions in the adult recreation program. However, athletic tournaments were successfully conducted in the gymnasiums and athletic fields. With the lifting of the dimout regulations, night lighted playgrounds were reopened and were crowded nightly.

The Midsummer Musicals held on Sunday afternoons throughout the summer in Sigmund Stern Grove drew the largest crowds in the history of the concerts, with more than 145,000 music-loving San Franciscans in attendance.

Camp Mather, despite food and gasoline rationing, opened as usual and was filled to capacity throughout the season—providing restful vacations for 17,288 San Franciscans.

A start was made on the survey of the Ike Dye Homestead, located about five and one-half miles west of Camp Mather, to determine the feasibility of establishing a children's camp.

General maintenance and repair work was carried on with considerable difficulty due to delays in obtaining necessary materials and the turnover in maintenance personnel. Baseball and softball diamonds on all the playgrounds were regraded during the year.

The budget for 1943-1944 showed an increase over last year's budget of \$31,913, of which \$22,700 was allotted for the Hunter's Point centers. An additional appropriation of \$41,790 from the Emergency Reserve Fund was granted to provide the money necessary for the establishment and operation of eight 'teen-age centers.

The foregoing list of activities indicates the well-rounded program carried on by the Recreation Department during 1943, with the physical activities, including swimming, physical fitness groups and athletics; the cultural activities of music, drama and dance; the athletic and social program for service men.

A more detailed account of the Department's activities is contained in the annual report of the Commission for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1943.

## CITY PLANNING COMMISSION

The City Planning Department is now well organized and functioning smoothly as an important part of the machinery of government in San Francisco. The time and effort of the Commission and its technical staff are being devoted largely to the preparation of a Master Plan. This is the primary duty of the Department, according to the Charter. It is a responsibility assigned to no other agency in the City and County of San Francisco.

### Funds.

The progress which the Commission now reports has been made possible by generous budget allotments. The Department was given \$109,502 during the fiscal year 1942-43 but turned back \$32,795.98 unspent. Sound policies govern expenditures. No commitments will be made beyond those contributing directly to the efficient and economical administration of the Department and the advancement of the Master Plan.

### Personnel.

Limitations of manpower have been a major handicap during the year. Established positions and available funds would permit employment of a technical and clerical staff of 20, but the maximum number

on the payroll during the year was 18. The normal employment has been about 14, of which 10 are technicians. Because of military service, resignations, and the residence restrictions of the Charter, well-trained and experienced city planners have been difficult both to find and to hold.

### **Traffic Improvements.**

The initial phases of the program of traffic improvement inaugurated last year were completed with the elimination of parking on Market and Mission Streets. The flow of wartime traffic in the congested area has been greatly improved by introduction of a simple system of one-way streets, elimination of standing vehicles on certain important routes and control of left turns. The return of a normal volume of automobile traffic and its attendant congestion, however, will place new responsibilities upon the city. More systematic study of circulation problems will be required; comprehensive fully-coordinated plans for further improvement of traffic conditions must be ready for execution.

### **Zoning.**

This Department has the duty of checking all Health, Police, Fire and Building permits against the zone plan. This service in the protection of community standards and property values has been of less immediate importance, however, due to wartime limitations on building. Only 15 applications for rezoning were received during the year. Of these five were approved by the Commission, eight were disapproved, two were withdrawn. One disapproval was overruled by the Board of Supervisors, one was upheld. Continuing experience with zoning administration, however, indicates the pressing necessity of modernizing the ordinance which establishes standards for property development and use in this City. The limited and precious land resources of San Francisco constitute the base for its industrial and other economic activities, its homes and general pattern of living, and also its supporting tax revenues. This base deserves better protection than it has under the present zoning ordinance.

### **Shoreline Report.**

The first of a series of Master Plan studies, a report on Shoreline Development, was published in September. This is not the Master Plan of the city, but it does represent a step toward the development of such a plan. It indicates the process of analysis by which a Master Plan will be developed and suggests a number of improvement projects that may be worthy of incorporation into the final Plan.

### **Public Works.**

A new report on Public Works is being prepared for publication. This will be a compilation and analysis of construction projects proposed to date by other city departments. The total estimated cost of these improvements will approach 300 million dollars. In the absence of a completed Master Plan these lists must be given consideration as the only available basis for a post-war public works program.

### **Master Plan.**

A long list of construction projects, regardless of their individual or collective merit, does not constitute a Master Plan. It represents at best a patchwork of ideas rather than a clear concept of the future city. Work is going ahead on a comprehensive, coordinated scheme of civic improvements based upon careful, scientific study of growth trends and an evaluation of present and prospective needs. A firm foundation for the Master Plan is being laid now by thorough study of population shifts and the uses of land in the city. In this effort the

records compiled by several survey and research projects of the WPA are being used. A report of the findings and conclusions of this inquiry will be published next year. As fundamental questions of land use and population are clarified, more rapid progress can be made in the establishment of objectives and the incorporation of necessary and desirable improvements into a comprehensive plan.

### **The Future of San Francisco.**

The Commission has been gratified by the warm and generous citizen support given its work during the year. Many civic and improvement clubs have offered aid. The local chapter of the American Institute of Architects has appointed an advisory committee to work with the staff of the Commission. The San Francisco Planning and Housing Association has stimulated the reorganization of the Citizens Master Plan Committee, which promises to be of great value in formulating policies related to the Master Plan.

Cooperation with public agencies has been satisfactory. The San Francisco Housing Authority has indicated a commendable desire to work directly with this Commission in the development of post-war plans for the removal and improvement of war housing and the rebuilding of slums and blighted areas.

The growing interest of the people in the work of this Department spells progress for San Francisco. The need for a Master Plan is understood; its value to the city becomes more evident as the uncertainties of the post-war period are considered. It will be an essential instrument in the development of the grand strategy by which this city prepares to meet the crisis of demobilization and the shift from war to peacetime activity.

### **BOARD OF PERMIT APPEALS**

The Board of Permit Appeals is comparable to the Small Claims Court, inasmuch as appeals can be taken from the various departments and commissions having granting and revoking power, with regard to permits and licenses, without any cost whatever. There are five members appointed to sit as an appellate court with regard to permits and licenses, although the members of this Board are laymen. It is their duty, when matters are appealed to them, to hear both sides and make their decisions.

On numerous occasions, appeals were taken where a permit or license was denied, due to a minor infraction of the law. While this Board has not the power to authorize anyone to violate any laws, in many instances methods were suggested by which minor changes could be made so that the appellant would be conforming with our laws and the permit granted.

During the year 124 appeals were heard. These were taken from actions by the following officials and departments: Public Works Department, 117 actions, of which 14 were concurred in and 103 were overruled; Health Department, three actions, of which two were concurred in and one overruled; Police Department, one action, same being concurred in; two actions in which the Board held it had no jurisdiction and five rehearings were granted.

Many of the matters heard and decided by this Board concerned the United States Government in its essential war activities and housing problems, for which the Board found a legal solution and advised a helpful method of assisting the Government.

A recent decision by the State Supreme Court upheld the discretionary power of the Board in denying a permit, relative to San Francisco home owners.

The work of the office is up to date with no matters pending at the end of the current year. It is the aim of this department to dispose of causes before it as rapidly as possible.

## WAR MEMORIAL

The War Memorial of San Francisco, consisting of the Veterans' Building, the Opera House, and the Art Museum, is the most outstanding memorial to deceased war veterans.

The management and operation of these buildings is vested in the War Memorial Board of Trustees of the City and County of San Francisco.

The San Francisco Opera House is the only municipally owned building of its kind in the United States; the Veterans' Building is the most pretentious home ever built for the exclusive use of veterans of wars in which our country has participated, while the Museum of Art attracts a large attendance at their exhibits.

Music lovers of San Francisco appreciate the magnificent Opera House, which is the headquarters of the cultural life of the city. The veteran organizations make advantageous use of the facilities afforded them in the Veterans' Building.

Students of art recognize the fine Museum which occupies the entire fourth floor of the Veterans' Building.

Numerous patriotic programs have been presented in the Opera House and Veterans' Building during the past year. No opera season has been more successful or outstanding than the Grand Opera Season of 1943.

The president of the War Memorial Board of Trustees during 1943 was Claudius A. Marekley.

## ART COMMISSION

"Music maintains morale—music must go on." As the first city in the United States to support municipal music, San Francisco has accepted her wartime duties of leadership. With the above slogan as one of the most potent aids to morale, civil, and military, the Art Commission has devoted its time and efforts to the offering of good music, not only to the citizens of San Francisco, but to the tens of thousands of men and women in the Armed Forces of the United States.

The Art Commission, under whose jurisdiction the City of San Francisco presents municipal music embracing the San Francisco Symphony, the Municipal Chorus and the Municipal Band, has never limited its programs to a restricted few but has presented the beauty and inspiration of music appealing to every man, woman and child.

In 1943, the Symphony Concerts presented at the Civic Auditorium and the season of Russian Ballet at the Opera House were given to an audience of 85,000 persons. It has been a source of gratification to this Commission to compare this record-breaking number with the 9000 attendance of just seven years ago.

The advance season sale of the Art Commission's series closed with a sale of \$13,467 as compared with the previous year's sale of \$11,200 and \$7,913 for 1942. The first Art Commission concert of the season, given on November 24, 1943, with Leopold Stokowski as guest conductor of the San Francisco Symphony Orchestra, drew an attendance of 8720. This represents the largest number ever present at a symphony concert in this city. The advance sales for the Ballet Theatre to date, almost two months before the performance, is 50 per cent greater than the advance sales of one year ago.

It has been the policy of the Art Commission to provide free admittance to the men and women serving in the armed forces of the United States to all concerts, ballets, and attractions. Even though concerts are sold out, accommodations are made for the Army, Navy, and Marine personnel.

Of particular significance was the Commission's offering of Brahms' "Requiem" with the San Francisco Symphony and the Municipal Chorus on Pearl Harbor Day. This concert was presented free of charge

in memoriam of the Allied dead and was attended by six thousand who reverently paid homage to our hallowed heroes, "who have given the last full measure of devotion."

During the past year, the Municipal Band and Municipal Orchestra were assigned 68 performances devoted exclusively to the entertainment of the men and women in the armed forces of the United States. These concerts were given at such places as the Hospitality House, Fort Miley Hospital, Naval Hospital, Treasure Island, Stage Door Canteen, and various Army and Navy Camps in San Francisco and its environs. It is estimated that approximately 154,000 persons attended and enjoyed these performances. Many letters have been received expressing deep appreciation to the Art Commission for the splendid type of entertainment given, which means so much to the morale of the men and women in the service.

In the coming year, the Art Commission will continue to carry on its policy of good music within the reach of all—with confidence in victory, the assurance of ultimate peace, and the realization that music will re-build what war has destroyed. For after all—war does not last forever, but music does.

Today, the Art Commission is giving study to the tremendous post-war plans that will confront the City of San Francisco. Whatever the blueprints may be, there will be included public buildings, bridges, parks, platting of public ways, monuments, works of art—in fact, all structures erected on property belonging to the City of San Francisco. All these will come under the jurisdiction of the Art Commission for approval, as specified in the city Charter. To this group of architects, artists, and laymen of distinction, will be the responsibility that ugliness does not creep in, and that the beauty, charm, and color of San Francisco will be carried out on a scale of grandeur that will not only be a credit and achievement to the city that has built them, but a proud heritage for our future generations.

### M. H. de YOUNG MEMORIAL MUSEUM

The year 1943 stands out as one of the best the Museum has ever had as far as attendance is concerned. With 549,875 visitors through December 12th, the record of the best peace year of 1939 (the year of the Golden Gate International Exposition) is closely approached and may well be exceeded by the actual end of the year. In view of war conditions, which normally might be expected to reduce the number of visitors, this is indeed a sign of the tremendous popularity of the de Young Museum with the public.

Despite the fact that no spectacular shows of priceless old masters could be arranged because of war risks, the Museum nevertheless succeeded in having significant and attractive exhibitions through the year. Greatest event of 1943 was the exhibition "Meet the Artist," containing self-portraits by American painters, cartoonists and comic strip artists. The idea of the show, for which invitations were issued to leading artists throughout the country, was hailed by them with gusto, resulting in their wholehearted response. The exhibition received nation-wide and most favorable publicity. It alone attracted almost 200,000 people during the time of its display. Outstanding also were exhibitions of "Contemporary American Paintings," lent by the University of Arizona and "Contemporary British Art" assembled by the British Consul. The series of comprehensive one-man shows was continued throughout the year and included such artists as Jean Charlot, Victor Tischler, Prof. Chang Shu-Chi, Francis de Erdely and Jane Berlandina. Among the other exhibitions may be mentioned "Art of Fighting China," Oriental Collection of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Marcus, "Life in the Service," and an exhibition of soldiers' work assembled by the Museum, 16th and 18th Century Italian and Spanish Jewelry, several

exhibitions of prints and photographs, the latter including "Our Navy in Action" and the annual "Salon of the Photographic Society of America."

Important acquisitions were again made by the de Young Endowment Fund, notably paintings by George Romney, Phillip de Koninck and Lucas Cranach. Other valuable items, including paintings, Staffordshire Figurines, prints, drawings, costumes and South Sea Island weapons, were added to the Museum's permanent collection through the generosity of Mrs. M. C. Sloss, Mr. and Mrs. H. D. B. Soule, Mr. Victor Tischler, Mr. Eugene Berman, the Federal Art Project, Mr. W. Sprott Boyd and others.

The Educational Department has continued its program of special courses for adults and children. The Saturday classes have been very successful and will continue throughout the coming year.

## THE CALIFORNIA PALACE OF THE LEGION OF HONOR

The Museum has again concluded a successful year, with the exhibitions and educational activities gaining in popularity. Seventy-six exhibitions, in comparison with fifty-three in 1942, have been held at the Museum. The Educational Department has had an ever-increasing attendance which has contributed 35,136 to the total attendance, which was over 140,000.

Many generous donations have been made to the permanent collections of the Museum. In addition to the gifts made by benefactors who have been actively interested in the Museum for many years, the Museum deeply appreciates the gifts of those who have become new donors in this past year.

Precautions in regard to the safeguarding of the building and its contents during wartime, have been continued.

### Loan Exhibitions.

The Museum presented five notable exhibitions which were brought to San Francisco in their entirety and distributed throughout the year to maintain a sustained interest. One of these was the large "Retrospective Exhibition of Paintings and Drawings by Charles Dana Gibson." Working models, based on the drawings of Leonardo da Vinci, were assembled under the title "Leonardo, the First Modern." A comprehensive exhibition of "Twentieth Century Portraits" was held during the summer. The progress of the United States under wartime conditions was illustrated by photo-murals and supplementary material in the timely and impressive exhibition, "Road to Victory," attended by over 20,000 persons during a period of less than a month. To appeal to other tastes, superb "Tapestries from the Fifteenth to the Eighteenth Centuries" were exhibited during the month of August. In September, the Museum held a show of "Boxing and Wrestling in Art," which was primarily composed of important American paintings and sculpture and a fine collection of prints and drawings. Because San Francisco has been the scene of so many famous prize fights, a supplement to this exhibition was arranged in a gallery of well-known fighters' photographs, one of the largest collections of which is owned in this city. The exhibition program also included the following large exhibitions: Modern French Tapestries; American Artists, Past and Present; Soldiers of Production; Master Drawings; The Collection of D. O. Mills; Photographs of the San Francisco Fire by Arnold Genthe; Marine Paintings by Leon Lundmark; Nineteenth French Painters; Children in England Paint; National War Posters; Bronzes by Arthur Putnam; Paintings from the Collection of Mr. Gordon Blanding; Emblems of Unity and Freedom; Prints by Honore Daumier; Egypt, Civilization's First Horizon; North Atlantic Patrol and Convoy Duty; British Architecture; Action Photography; From Gericault to Renoir; Painting and sculpture sponsored by the Society for Sanity in Art;



Faces and Places in Brazil, Photographs; Etchings by Francisco de Goya; Children's Paintings from the Collection of Miss Fannie Brice; Saints and Madonnas, an Exhibition of Religious Art; Illuminated Gothic Woodcuts, and fifty-one other exhibitions.

#### Gifts and Contributions to the Museum.

Mr. H. K. S. Williams has continued his contributions to the Mildred Anna Williams Collection, which is steadily becoming one of the finest collections in the West. Because of this donor's unceasing generosity, the following paintings were given to the Museum: "Sunday Morning," by Thomas Hovenden (1840-1895); "Portrait of Colonel Thomas Thornton," by George Romney (1734-1802); "Charles, 4th Duke of Richmond," by John Hoppner (1758-1810); "Joshua Henshaw," by John Singleton Copley (1737-1815); "Rebecca at the Well," by Jean Jacques Henner (1829-1905); "The Pension Agent," by Eastman Johnson (1824-1906); "Borda de C'Allier," by Henri Harpignies (1819-1916); "Miss Summer-ville," by Francis Cotes (1726-1770); "River Scene," by Leon Augustin Lhermitte (1844-1925).

Outstanding among the Museum's supporters is Mrs. Adolph B. Spreckels, who has again contributed generously and has made possible various social functions in the Museum for the benefit of the San Francisco public and for new residents and the great transient population of military personnel.

One of the most important gifts which has come to the Museum is the Albert Campbell Hooper Collection. This collection contains paintings, sculpture and decorative arts. The following is a list of the paintings: "Portrait of a Man," by Anthony Van Dyck (1599-1641); "Earl of Pembroke and Montgomery," by Anthony Van Dyck (1599-1641); "William Sotheron," by George Romney (1734-1802); "Lady Elizabeth Churchill," by John Hoppner (1758-1810); "Cottage Scene," by Isaac van Ostade (1621-1649); "Portrait of a Woman" and "Portrait of a Man," by Nicolas Maes (1632-1693); "Ripperd van Groevendijk," and "Claudina van Groevendijk," by Paulus Moreelse (1571-1638); "Jemima Saintsbury," by Thomas Beach (1738-1806); "Self-Portrait," by Cornelis Janssens van Ceulen (1593-1664); "Portrait of a Woman," by Quiry Brekelenkam (1620-1669); "Landscape," by Jean Baptiste Camille Corot (1796-1875); "Portrait of a Man," by Gonzalez Cocues (1614-1684); 18th Century French Painting by an Unknown Artist; "Portrait of a Women," by Gabriel Max (1840-1915); "Endymion," by Michel Francois d'Andre-Bardon (1700-1783); "Portrait of a Man," and "Portrait of a Woman," by Thomas de Keyser (1596/7-1667). The collection also includes 98 pieces of European and Oriental porcelains; 28 pieces of French and English furniture; 39 pieces of silver and many other items.

Other donors to the Museum were Florence Maria Ahlberg, Mrs. William P. Reid and Miss Jean Scott Frickelton.

#### Educational Activities.

Indicative of the growing importance of this Museum in the cultural life of the community is the 15 per cent increase in the educational attendance over that of last year. Art appreciation courses, special lectures and tours were conducted weekly for the adult public. Every Saturday morning, children's art classes were carried out by the educational staff. Over 1500 children attended. Besides these classes, special tours were arranged for children's groups. The educational department continued its policy of presenting historically important films every Saturday afternoon. Because of the enthusiastic response, the educational department arranged special courses, given by authorities, on the appreciation and historical evolution of the motion picture. These courses were among the first on the subject to be presented by any museum.

One of the new projects assumed by the educational department was the creation of a children's museum. In this gallery, monthly exhibitions were presented for the education and interest of children. Also in this gallery, space has been turned over to children where they have carried on museum work of their own.

#### **New Publication.**

In April, the Museum began publication of a Bulletin which each month is devoted primarily to new acquisitions and to current activities. This Bulletin is circulated throughout the country to museums, libraries, private galleries and public institutions, in addition to having a subscription list of approximately two hundred. With the publication of the Bulletin, in addition to the Handbook of the Museum's Collections which came out in 1942, nation-wide publicity has been gained.

#### **Organ Recitals.**

As has been customary, the Museum continues to present, every Saturday and Sunday afternoons, organ recitals in the Sculpture Court. These concerts continue to draw large crowds.

#### **Civil Service.**

On July 1, 1943, the Museum went under Civil Service, with the result that the duties of each position were clarified and a standardization of salaries made.

It has been heartening to the Director and staff of the Museum to arrange these many special exhibitions and correlated educational activities when the response was so enthusiastic.

### **SAN FRANCISCO MUSEUM**

War conditions have naturally been reflected in Museum policy during the past year as in every phase of living in San Francisco. Utmost care has been taken to adapt Museum functions and operation to the times, while maintaining the essential and most fundamentally valuable and valued services a museum specializing in contemporary art can give to its public and to the community in general. Thus, though 110 varied exhibitions ranging from one-man shows to national annuals and headlined exhibitions reflecting activity of eastern art centers have been presented, thoughtful planning and cooperative enterprise with other western galleries have avoided adding to the heavy strain on shipping facilities to this port expressage of large and bulky exhibitions except when they could render multiple service to many art publics in the West. The dim-out regulations naturally restricted somewhat the Museum's unique evening service to the community which permits even those busy during the day with pressure of wartime tasks to keep in touch with artistic currents of the times. However, some galleries were always open and the most important exhibitions always in them to be seen at all times, and the activities such as the history of the movies and the studio sessions, so largely patronized by servicemen as well as civilians, were continued.

Approximately a fourth of the exhibitions had some bearing on the war, though the Museum's policy of insisting on an exhibition's relationship to art quality was never forgotten. Again, in 1943, strong emphasis was laid on exhibitions of contemporary art of Latin American countries in the belief that this is one helpful avenue, not complicated by language barriers, by which the cultural character and aspirations of our neighbors of the hemisphere can be grasped. By purchase and gift the Museum's own collection in this field of contemporary art has grown by half a dozen important items during the year. Much of this material is used in circulating exhibitions carefully labeled and supplied

with supplementary information which serve other communities as well.

Among the interesting exhibitions of the year should be cited:

*Oregon Artists*—an invitational exhibition of a regional group, stressing fine quality, and initiating a new museum policy of exploring art of the United States by group shows;

*Contemporary American Figure Paintings*—proving that American artists have achieved individual styles in the most exacting of art expressions;

*Paintings by Jan Schreuder*—an original and gifted young artist of Ecuador;

*California Watercolorists*—a review of the year's work in this most popular and expertly handled medium favored by California artists;

*Contemporary Canadian Paintings*—a survey of achievement in Canada today;

*Americans, 1943*—A Museum of Modern Art review of one aspect of our art; and

*Marinship*—work by artists in shipyards about the shipyard.

The international aspect was further stressed by exhibitions of English watercolors and drawings, Latin American watercolors, drawings and prints, photographs from Britain and China. The three Annuals for the Art Association—an open opportunity for local artists to show side by side with all who send in from outside the state—were held as usual.

A new service to the community in line with modern museum practice of supplying general cultural and informational background for art—which is simply the distilled expression of how people think, live and adjust themselves to their environment—is the free "Know Your World" program given every Saturday afternoon and repeated on Sunday. In carefully selected factual and instructional motion pictures, mostly in color and sound, of a type that never appears in the commercial theaters, programs centered successively on all parts of the world were presented. Latin American material is featured the first week-end in each month for the convenience of those specializing in this field. The programs are patronized by teachers, students and men and women eager to learn more about the ever smaller world through this modern visual medium, and finding this type of instruction a valuable background for the exhibitions in the galleries. The programs are not restricted to travelogues, but explore also techniques of art and other aspects of contemporary life finding reflection in art. This program will be further developed during 1944, for it represents the most modern technique of museum activity, and an obvious extension of interest for a museum of contemporary art like the San Francisco Museum of Art.

### SAN FRANCISCO PUBLIC LIBRARY

In accord with President Roosevelt's following message to librarians, "In this war, we know, books are weapons. And it is a part of your dedication always to make them weapons for man's freedom," the library has geared itself to an all-out war effort to supply the armed forces and war agencies with all available information from the printed page.

Large and costly additions have been made to the already outstanding collection of technical books. This collection, embracing such classes as aeronautics, shipbuilding, welding, chemistry, etc., is proving of inestimable assistance to war industries in this vicinity.

This institution has been designated as the war information center for this area by the United States Office of War Information for the

purpose of supplying vital information to the army, navy, and other governmental agencies. All government documents, publications and releases which relate to the war effort are being received and are available in the reference department. Timely displays of posters and literature are maintained on the various bulletin boards. The numerous and continuous requests from local governmental agencies are also handled through this department.

There were approximately 63,000 books collected in San Francisco during the second national Victory Book Campaign and the type of reading material was far superior to that collected during the first drive. All the books have been delivered to the army, navy, merchant marine, Red Cross and U.S.O. Clubs.

The library system consists of the main library in the Civic Center, twenty-one branches in the various sections of the city, and six deposit stations in the outlying districts. The circulation of books for home reading for the past fiscal year amounted to 2,511,610 volumes. This total does not include the volumes used in the reference and reading rooms of the library and it has been estimated if this amount were included it would bring the total to over 6,000,000 volumes used. During the year 36,473 borrowers were enrolled, making a total registration of 120,289. The number of books in the collection amounts to 539,838. This does not include thousands of unbound pamphlets or the collections in the Max Kuhl and Phelan memorial rooms.

A regional institute, sponsored by the American Library Association, to consider war and post-war library problems was held in the assembly room on May 17th and 18th. Over one hundred and fifty persons attended, representing libraries, schools, health and welfare departments, civilian defense agencies, Pacific relations and allied organizations.

The California Library Association also held the annual meeting of the Bay districts on May 14th in the main library and about two hundred librarians were present.

Through the City Planning Commission the library has applied for the following post-war projects from the federal government: completion of the main library by adding the unfinished wing to provide sufficient space for the rapidly growing book collection, seven branch buildings to replace branches now inadequately housed in rented stores and three other branch buildings for certain thickly populated districts now without library facilities.

The only extension to the library system was the collection of books installed at the Hunter's Point Housing Project to provide reading matter for war workers. This is a general collection and consists of approximately 5000 volumes.

To take care of the increased population in the Potrero district the station has been completely renovated and a renewed collection of 5000 volumes installed.

The children's rooms at the main library and branches had a very active year. During national Book Week in November an attractive program was presented which included talks by authors and illustrators of children's books.

Among the many gifts received during the year was an extensive collection of programs and autographed photographs from the estate of Selby Oppenheimer. This is an outstanding collection and is an interesting addition to the music department.

The Library Commission has invested the \$14,000 on deposit with the City Treasurer for United States Treasury bonds of 1950-52. This money is from the Fuhrman fund and could not be spent wisely at the present time for books on economic and political subjects as provided under the terms of the bequest. The remaining \$4,000 from the Phelan Memorial fund was also invested in similar bonds.

The total budget for 1943/44 amounts to \$486,695 and \$52,300 from this sum will be expended for books.

## SAN FRANCISCO LAW LIBRARY

The management and maintenance of the Law Library for the past fiscal year are similar in scope and character to that of the previous year. The purchases made have been largely a continuation of reports, statutes, digests, legal periodicals and texts heretofore acquired, and the addition of all new legal publications appropriate to the requirements of the library and the needs of the legal profession.

Effort has been consistently made to limit purchases to strictly legal material, and to some extent quasi-legal material. Purchases of foreign legal material have been through necessity, limited mostly to continuations of British legal material heretofore purchased by direction of the board of trustees.

There are now on the shelves of the Law Library approximately 117,000 volumes of legal material, consisting of text-books, statutes, reported decisions, legal periodicals, citations and digests of all American States, British countries and dominions, and many other foreign countries.

The library also carries all available war law service, War Labor Board decisions, text-books on military and martial law, law of court martial, decisions of the Judge Advocate General, court martial orders relating to the Army and Navy, and the Federal regulations of the various governmental boards and bureaus.

The present investment of the library, aside from operating expenses, is \$593,420.70. The present value is very much more, because of the library's wealth of rare material in texts and statutes now out of print, and largely unobtainable.

## CHIEF ADMINISTRATIVE OFFICER

Wartime problems rooted in San Francisco's swollen population, its predominant importance as a Pacific port of embarkation, and its greatly increased industrial activity thrust themselves during 1943 upon the Chief Administrative Officer, whose principal duty under the Charter is the supervision of fifteen city and county departments.

Overcrowded conditions in insanitary housing, particularly in the so-called "Japtown" area, became one of the most acute local problems of the year. Responsibility for abatement of the dangerous housing situation rested under the law upon the Department of Public Health, which is under the jurisdiction of the Chief Administrative Officer.

It became necessary to order unsafe and inadequate buildings vacated and either demolished or put in proper condition to be used as living quarters. Generally such orders were complied with, but in some cases resort had to be taken to court action. After a setback was received in the Municipal Court steps were taken to obtain Superior Court orders under state law.

The problem was made more difficult by the background of some of the recent arrivals in the city who had not in their former surroundings been accustomed to the higher living standards maintained in San Francisco. Though some of the tenants in the condemned housing were Negroes, the Chief Administrative Officer did not recognize in the situation a race problem, but merely one of protecting residents of the city against the dangers of bad moral conditions, disease and fire.

It was recognized that eviction of tenants from unsatisfactory living quarters would not solve the problem, but the two other steps that could be taken for a solution are beyond the responsibility and power of local government. One would be to discourage any further influx of population until the proper housing is provided, and the second would be issuance of permits for construction of additional homes.

Representations to federal agencies in this regard have been made.

At the request of the Board of Supervisors, the Chief Administrative

Officer investigated and held a public hearing on allegations that eating facilities in large war industries in the San Francisco Bay Area, especially the shipyards, were inadequate. He found that generally such facilities were inadequate, that management of the industries had been indifferent to the problem and that the inadequacy contributed to inefficiency and absenteeism. He recommended that managements assume responsibility for correcting the situation and that government agencies cooperate. These findings and recommendations were made public.

Since they were made steps have been taken by shipyard managements and government agencies to provide proper meals for workers on the premises where they work.

Personnel shortages, or extreme difficulty in obtaining the services of qualified personnel, have become a chronic wartime condition in departments under the Chief Administrative Officer. The departments are Public Works, Public Health, Real Estate, Purchasing, Electricity, Finance and Records (including the county offices of Tax Collector, Recorder, County Clerk, Public Administrator and Registrar of Voters), Coroner, Weights and Measures, Agriculture, and the Coordinating Council. These departments have performed their necessary functions during the year, however, despite such difficulties.

The Chief Administrative Officer and the Health Department, Department of Public Works and Coroner have continued their assigned activities in connection with Civilian Defense preparations.

To make possible the holding of the general municipal election in November, the Chief Administrative Officer selected and assigned employees of various classifications in several other departments to assist the Registrar in the adjustment and distribution of voting machines.

The State Legislature, at its biennial session, failed to amend the law to permit photography to be substituted for typewriting in the Recorder's Office. This change would permit some twenty-five copyists to be assigned to more constructive work, would save the city about \$30,000 a year, and would ease a situation in which the city only with extreme difficulty, if at all, can purchase new typewriters. The Chief Administrative Officer has requested the Governor to include this subject in his expected call for a special session of the Legislature.

The WPA work program was discontinued during the early part of the year. Microfilming of vital city and county records and their deposit in a place safe from bombing attacks or fire was completed.

The Chief Administrative Officer brought about a reorganization in the Department of Public Health inspection services, which is expected to result in better inspection of restaurants, housing, industrial establishments and markets while relieving business firms of overlapping inspections.

The Publicity and Advertising fund, which is under the control and administration of the Chief Administrative Officer, was reduced for this fiscal year from \$300,000 to \$200,000. The lower amount is proving sufficient for its purposes under wartime conditions.

Separate reports are made on the activities of the various departments under the Chief Administrative Officer.

## DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC HEALTH

The Department of Public Health has maintained its protective services and institutional care program during the past year despite the seriousness of increased public health problems due to the influx of population and other wartime conditions and the impossibility of obtaining the services of sufficient trained personnel.

San Francisco's war-industry population increase caused overcrowding in undesirable housing, with attendant dangers to public health,

and intensified problems in connection with child nutrition and care, communicable disease control and hospitalization. The manpower shortage has hampered operation of our own institutions for the indigent and caused a tendency toward lowered sanitation in private industry, particularly in food establishments that are trying to meet greatly increased demands.

### Death Rate.

Over ten years the death rate in San Francisco has fluctuated between 11.7 and 14.3 per 1,000 population, at no time showing a significant difference between any two years. However, the rate of 1942 shows a significant decrease, 12.8, and the estimated rate for 1943 is practically the same, 12.9. The death rate being lower in 1943 suggests that San Francisco population has been increased by a younger group.

### Epidemics.

Interest was directed during 1943 to the unusually high incidence of cerebrospinal fever (meningococcic meningitis) with a report of 151 local cases, 32 non-local cases and 29 deaths. About the time that a decline was noted in the reported cases of cerebrospinal fever, a definite increase in reported poliomyelitis cases became apparent. To date a total of 142 local cases and 169 non-local cases have been reported, with thirteen deaths (two local and eleven non-local).

Deaths from lobar pneumonia have shown sharp increases in 1942 and 1943. A considerable number of the cases were among shipyard workers. The figures for the three years follow: 1941, 144 deaths, 1.6 per cent of total deaths; 1942, 242 deaths, 2.6 per cent of total; 1943 (9 months), 278 deaths, 3.8 per cent of total.

Broncho pneumonia deaths increased less sharply to 201 in nine months of 1943, which was 2.7 per cent of the total deaths.

Tuberculosis cases declined. There were 674 cases in 1941, 792 in 1942 and only 672 cases reported in 1943. This decrease in pulmonary tuberculosis is surprising but satisfactory.

In December, 1941, the monthly reported incidence of venereal disease in San Francisco dropped to the lowest point on record. During that month 148 cases of primary syphilis, secondary syphilis and gonorrhea were reported. Since Pearl Harbor the incidence has gradually increased in an almost steady ascent. In August, 1943, the greatest amount of venereal disease was reported, 482 cases. In October, 1943, 416 cases were reported and in November, 335 cases.

It is important to differentiate infectious from total venereal diseases reported because latent and late syphilis are not generally infectious. Due to Selective Service activities a large amount of unknown non-infectious syphilis has been discovered. It is estimated that approximately 50 per cent of all latent syphilis discovered through Selective Service activities in San Francisco was previously unknown and untreated syphilis. From the public health point of view it is important that this stage of syphilis be discovered because if it is promptly treated the potentiality of the development of the disastrous effects of late syphilis are to a considerable degree eliminated.

Venereal disease prophylaxis stations have been established in San Francisco with the cooperation of the United States Army and the United States Navy. Approximately 19 per cent of prophylaxis administered at our stations is administered to civilians. Thousands of placards stating the availability of prophylaxis in San Francisco have been placed in public lavatories. In addition 1000 lavatory placards advising of the availability of free diagnosis for venereal diseases and treatment for those who cannot afford to pay have been posted.

Two outstanding developments in the control of venereal diseases have been (1) the psychiatric service of the San Francisco City Clinic, which is organized on a voluntary basis to carry on a psychiatric social

readjustment program among sexually promiscuous females, and (2) the establishment of the Women's Court for trial of women arrested for vagrancy and prostitution.

These new institutions constitute an effort to present a coordinated program for the disposition of female prostitution cases on the basis of scientific evaluation and justice.

Although the reported incidence of venereal disease in San Francisco has increased 100 per cent since Pearl Harbor, venereal disease rates have not increased to this extent. Venereal disease rates have increased perhaps 20 to 30 per cent, which is a much lower rate of increase than has been experienced in other countries, such as Great Britain.

#### **Birth Rate.**

Since 1935 the birth rate for San Francisco has shown a very definite upward trend, but the annual increase since 1940 has been greatly in excess of the changes which occurred in the preceding seven years. It may be estimated there were 15,734 births in 1943, producing a rate of 20.3 per thousand population. The peak World War I rate was 17.8 in 1920, a post-war year.

A fact to be noted in the present study of birth registration is that mothers are younger. Over this ten-year period the percentage of mothers in the 20-24 age group held at a level of 29 per cent to 30 per cent. In 1942, this increased abruptly to 32.9 per cent, seemingly indicative of a younger age group in the current influx of population.

#### **Infant Mortality Rate.**

A darker side of the picture is reflected in the high mortality among these infants. For the first ten months of the current year 422 babies under one year of age have died, giving an infant mortality rate of 34.1.

An important cause of death among these infants was epidemic diarrhea, or diarrhoea of the newborn. After a study of this outbreak, it was the conclusion of this department that there were 324 cases and 45 deaths from infant diarrhoea since December 1, 1942.

Neonatal deaths (deaths under one month of age) constitute 72 per cent of the total infant deaths in this present period, most of them attributable to natal and prenatal causes such as prematurity, injuries at birth, congenital malformations and atelectasis.

#### **Hospitalization.**

A survey was made in April, 1943, of the private hospitals in San Francisco. This showed a capacity of 3606 beds, of which 3153 were occupied. On August 9, the census showed a normal bed capacity of 3687 with 3084 beds occupied and a vacancy of 615.

For October, 1943, the average number of daily patients in San Francisco Hospital was 926, of which 353 were in tuberculosis. The average number of officers and employees was 841. There were 65 vacancies among the nursing personnel and 12 among the hospital orderlies. If these personnel shortages continue, it may be necessary to place a limit below normal capacity on daily patient load.

*Private Patients and the City and County Hospital.* Since the first of January, 1943, there have been approximately 85 requests by physicians to our San Francisco Hospital to accept hospital cases due to lack of beds or other reasons at other hospitals in San Francisco. These were emergency cases, some surgical; five were acute pneumonia cases. The problem of securing beds for private cases includes finding space for the Negro patient, the aged patient who may develop long duration chronic complications, the maternity case which had not made previous reservations, the contagious disease case requiring special



isolation care, the psychopathic case also needing a special type of accommodation, and the case able to afford only part pay.

### **Acute Housing Shortage.**

Early in 1943 it became obvious that the rate of influx of new residents into San Francisco was greater than the available housing units. This new population included Negroes, many of whom settled in the area from which the Japanese had moved. The average dwelling in this section was not desirable for human habitation. Overcrowded conditions became noticeable and general insanitary conditions prevailed. A survey of a 114-square-block area revealed many unsatisfactory health conditions and fire hazards. Owners of the properties were cited before the Director of Public Health and ordered to vacate premises and repair structures to comply with the law.

Hearings were held weekly, commencing June 24, 1943, and continuing to September 1, 1943. At that time 11 premises had been evacuated; 24 had not been evacuated, and five were being repaired and altered. Beginning October 4, 1943, all premises ordered vacated and repaired that had not complied were written up for condemnation. Three condemnation meetings have been held and approximately 20 premises have been condemned and ordered repaired or demolished. Notifications were forwarded to the District Attorney with requests for citations and warrants aimed at evictions. Federal housing agencies are endeavoring to secure suitable housing for persons and families evicted.

### **Infant and Pre-School Child Hygiene.**

Due to the influx of families from rural areas of the nation for employment in defense industries and of service men's families, an increase in the Well-Baby Centers conducted by the department may be necessary.

Many of these families are transient and attend health centers for one visit and then fail to return. Others come to the centers for immunization and other services in order to place their children in nursery schools. Many of these children have never had any immunization and appear undernourished. They need a great deal of health supervision and follow-up by the field nursing staff.

### **School Child Hygiene.**

The presence of large numbers of new out-of-state children in the San Francisco Schools made it necessary to divert school physician and school nurse hours to this group. These new children have questionable health backgrounds; immunization histories are sometimes vague or non-existent. Limited and curtailed physician time has been taken from the physical examinations of new children to the immunization programs.

Overcrowding and substandard hygienic conditions have played a part in the increased incidence of communicable diseases. Skin conditions alone with scabies and impetigo secondary to flea bites have been of more than minor significance.

The pressing problems of the new group have taken precedence over the long-range school health program, and yet physician time has not been sufficient to cover the physical examinations of the out-of-state children after almost a year. An outstanding need is for additional school physicians and school nurses when there is an apparent shortage of both.

### **Food.**

For quite some time it has been obvious that the general local food supply, particularly fresh fruits and vegetables, is not of the same

quality as in normal times. The wide variety of food products normally available for selection is no longer seen in most markets throughout the city.

Food manufacturing concerns such as bakeries, delicatessens, meat processing plants, have not been able to maintain the high degree of sanitation that usually prevails in normal times. Consequently it has been necessary for the inspection services of the Department of Public Health to increase their activities in these industries.

The shortage of manpower is the outstanding reason for this condition. Another important factor, however, is the increased population of the city, which has resulted in increased demands for the commodities processed in these food establishments. Most concerns are working very long hours in order to meet the demand, and with the lack of help there is always an inclination to slip up on general cleaning practices. Therefore, inspections must be more frequent than in normal times.

### **Restaurants.**

Many restaurants have gone out of business due to the labor shortage and their inability to obtain sufficient food supplies at prices that would enable them to continue in business.

In certain sections of the city the facilities of public eating places have been taxed beyond normal capacity. This is true particularly in certain apartment house and hotel areas where individuals are entirely dependent upon public eating houses for their meals.

The general sanitation of these establishments has been maintained at a satisfactory level. There have been instances, however, where personnel in small counter establishments have become careless because of heavy patronage during peak hours. The shortage of trained personnel has been obvious and carelessness in sanitation has been traceable to untrained help.

More than 170 employees of the Department of Public Health have been granted military and war leaves and many others have resigned to accept private employment. Despite this, the work of the department has been maintained at a high standard.

## **HEALTH SERVICE SYSTEM**

Medical and hospital care has been provided for employees of the City and County and the Board of Education through the Health Service System for five years. The System completed its fifth year of operation under Plan 1 of the Health Service Board on September 30, 1943.

During that year the System covered an average membership of 15,000 persons per month. Of these the greater part were active employee members. About one-third of the persons covered were dependents of city and school employees and retired city and school employees.

The average membership figures based on monthly contributions were: employees, 9918; retired employees, 424; adult dependents, 2721; minor dependents, 1850; total 14,913. The total disbursement for medical care during the year ending September 30, 1943, was \$410,485. The sum of \$291,541 was paid for the services of physicians and surgeons. The balance of \$118,944 covered hospitalization, X-ray and laboratory examinations, physiotherapy, and ambulance service.

The Health Service System was established with the adoption of Charter Section 172.1 in 1937. The first year was spent in studying methods of providing prepayment medical care, organizing the present system, and establishing its legal status. The benefits of the system became available to the membership on October 1, 1938.

Each of the five years during which benefits have been available has been beset with the problems of a new enterprise. The most pressing of these problems since the outset has been the difficulty in paying for medical services at rates recognized by competent authority to be adequate for a group such as the city and school employees of San Francisco.

The system pays for hospitalization and other auxiliary medical services on a dollar for dollar basis, either according to a uniform schedule of fees, or uniform indemnification for medical service under which the medical agency is paid in full at its regular rate. The doctors, or members of the professional staff, however, are paid according to a schedule of units for the various medical and surgical services. The full value of the service unit is \$1.00.

During the first four years of operation of the Health Service Plan the system met with varying degrees of success in its payment under the unit method. Adjustments were made from time to time to bring the risk on various subscriber groups, particularly dependents, into accord with contributions made for their membership. It was not until December of 1942, however, that the full payment for medical services was achieved on a basis that would permit continuance of such payment. At that time the membership rates were adjusted to permit full payment for the medical services received and to permit the stabilizing of the unit rate of payment at a figure which would assure the best of medical care for members of the system and continued participation by the doctors of San Francisco.

The system has maintained the full dollar unit of payment for the professional staff since December of 1942 and has accumulated a surplus in the medical fund with which to protect the system against epidemic conditions, and which may permit an extension of the scope of benefits.

There was a decrease of approximately 1000 members during 1943 below the membership for 1942. The decrease was about equally divided between employees and dependents. Military leaves accounted for a temporary reduction in employee membership, and the removal of dependent subscribers for non-dependency accounted for much of the decrease in that type of membership.

Wartime conditions have drastically affected the distribution of medical service in the entire community. This, of course, has been felt by the Health Service System. Many doctors are in military service and are no longer available to Health Service patients. Hospital facilities are often overtaxed, with a resulting decrease in demands for elective operations. These factors have tended to reduce the normal medical requirements of Health Service members.

The city and school employees, however, are receiving more and better medical care than they received prior to establishment of the Health Service System. This should be reflected in the quality of their service to the city. Proper health protection promotes efficiency and minimizes time lost through illness and injury.

## DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS

The Department of Public Works has gone forward with plans for post-war projects and has kept its crews busy on maintenance work during 1943 while carrying on such construction as has been possible under wartime restrictions.

In addition, the Department has performed its essential operations despite the difficulty of obtaining and retaining personnel. It has cleaned and flushed 750 miles of streets and kept in repair our 146,000,000 square feet of street pavement. It has cleaned and kept in repair 790 miles of main sewers, maintained janitorial and elevator service in the City and County's nearly 400 buildings.

Noteworthy contributions to the city's state of preparedness to meet enemy action has been made by this Department in the setting up and maintenance of a Demolition and Clearance Corps, and a Decontamination Corps. More will be said about this activity in the section of this report devoted to Civilian Defense.

As of November 5, the Department had the preliminary engineering and plans and specifications completed on a list of work projects—streets, sewers, bridges—totaling \$1,800,000 in estimated costs. For projects totaling \$4,367,000 in estimated costs plans and specifications were from 40 to 99 per cent complete. Engineering work was being done on still other projects.

Contracts let by the Department for school construction, alterations, repairs and additions totaled for eleven months, to November 30, \$211,733. Construction totaling \$146,889 was done for Civilian Defense—air raid sirens, degassing stations, auxiliary fire houses, Civic Center dormitories, etc. Sewer and drainage contracts awarded during the period totaled \$235,352 and those for street work \$211,933.

Thus far federal authorities have given permission for construction of only one (Ingleside) item in the scheduled sewer construction program for this fiscal year; six items have thus far had to be deferred. The program will be carried out as wartime restrictions permit. The program for new school buildings and additions has also been curtailed, and the street and highway construction program has been hampered by personnel shortages and material restrictions.

Due to the granting of federal permits for \$1,000 small homes for war industry workers, fees for building permits increased as compared with 1942, but still were well below normal. During eleven months 2731 building permits were issued for private construction estimated to cost \$11,154,301. With the lifting of wartime restrictions private building construction is expected to boom, as there are evidences of a big backlog of demand for housing and business buildings.

### Private Building Construction.

The fees collected on private building construction for the first eleven months of 1943 evidence an increase of 8½ per cent as compared to fees collected for a like period in 1942. During 1943, 2731 building permits were issued at an estimated building cost of \$11,154,301 as compared to 2872 permits issued with building valuations of \$9,633,530 for a like period in 1942.

### Operation and Maintenance.

In addition to new construction, additions and betterments the Department of Public Works performed its regular functions of maintenance and repairs covering the following:

#### Bureau of Streets.

Cleaned and flushed approximately 750 miles of streets. Maintained, planed and kept in repair our 146,000,000 square feet of paved streets.

#### Bureau of Sewers.

Flushed, cleaned and kept in repair our approximately 790 miles of main sewers, in addition approximately 8000 catchbasins were cleaned.

#### Bureau of Buildings.

Maintained janitorial and elevator service in City Hall, Hall of Justice and Health Center Building. Performed all miscellaneous repair work on all public buildings, including Police, Fire and School Buildings totaling in all approximately 388 buildings.

## PURCHASING DEPARTMENT

Total purchases for the year 1943 amounted to \$5,601,959.23 as compared with a total of \$7,412,863.25 for the year 1942, showing a decrease of 24 per cent. The total amount of the decrease is spread pretty well through all departments with the exception of the Department of Public Health in which there was a slight increase. The number of purchase orders issued this year decreased by 19 per cent, to 40,254.

While there was a decrease of more than 10 per cent this year as compared with last year in the total cost of operating the Purchasing Department, there was at the same time a slight increase in the ratio of total cost to the total value of the purchases made. There was at the same time a slight increase in the cost per order because of the fact that the fixed expenses were spread over a smaller number of orders issued.

The Department continues to do all purchasing for all departments, commissions, boards and institutions of the city and in addition operates and supervises repair shops for automotive and mechanical equip-

ment, garages, storerooms, warehouses, and a gasoline and oil service station for municipally-owned automotive equipment.

The equipment inventory maintained by the Purchaser of Supplies for all departments continues to furnish a valuable record showing the amount of equipment on hand and where it is located. Many transfers of equipment and supplies between departments have been effected.

The Department has participated actively in the several scrap and salvage disposal drives, and through the sale of useless or unnecessary property has been able to convert a considerable quantity of old material and equipment into cash.

The Tabulating Division of the Purchasing Department, which handles statistical operations for the Traffic Fines Bureau, the courts, the police and other departments, has been expanded recently to serve the Civil Service Commission and the office of the Controller.

The work of the Department during 1943 has again involved problems and difficulties due to priority regulations and the shortage of many types of equipment and supplies necessary for the operations of city departments. During the year a procedure has been adopted by which hundreds of small purchases have been made through a cash revolving fund. This procedure as it continues should effect economies, while affording all necessary protection in the expenditure of city funds. It accounts to some extent for the reduction in the number of purchase orders issued this year.

## DEPARTMENT OF ELECTRICITY

Operations of the Department of Electricity for calendar year 1943 included:

*Civilian Defense:* Electric control equipment was installed for five Victory sirens. Monthly test was made of all sirens as follows: Five Victory sirens, thirty electric sirens. Maintained and repaired circuits for all sirens.

*Station KGPD:* Monthly test was made of frequency measurements of Station KGPD.

*Traffic Signals:* Installed traffic signals at two additional intersections during the year, making a total of 213 intersections at which traffic signals are installed. Circuits and traffic signals maintained and repaired. Construction has been started on new traffic signal installation at Bay and Hyde.

*Fire Alarm System:* Installed thirteen new fire alarm boxes, removed three, making total of 1643 now in service. Monthly tests made, 19,658, signals transmitted, 37,970.

Maintained and serviced two-way radio for Police Department. During the year fourteen additional cars were equipped with two-way radio which are also equipped for inter-car communication, bringing total number of cars equipped with two-way radio to 64. Radio receiving sets were maintained in all Police cars and motorcycles, 19 Police Stations, as well as in Fire Department cars, two fire boats and one police boat.

Teletype system maintained for Police Department. Maintained and serviced Police boxes.

*Inspection Bureau:* 7017 applications received, 5904 applications approved, 36,105 inspections made, 4310 pinball machines inspected, 5079 phonographs inspected. Inspection fees and other revenues totaled \$34,525.57. Overhead line construction inspections totaled 6458.

*Street Signs:* New signs made and installed, 26, signs repaired or replaced, 161.

*Machine Shop:* Manufactured eleven fire alarm boxes, five police boxes, eight police panels and parts for various electric control equipment.

Total expenditures amounted to \$202,379.45.

During the year the Real Estate Department collected rentals in the total sum of \$306,692 from city-owned lands and improvements and \$53,738 from the Civic Auditorium.

Under the Director of Property fifteen parcels of real property were sold at public auction for the sum of \$29,733, and many leases of city-owned lands and improvements were entered into with various lessees, including Bishop Oil Company, Wm. L. Hughson, J. H. Mohr, S. & G. Gump Co., Hale Bros., and others. A considerable number of leases were also negotiated in connection with Air Raid Warden Services, Public Welfare Department, Board of Education, Ration Boards, Health Department, Registrar of Voters, Library Department, Red Cross Rescue Trucks, War Housing Center, military purposes, servicemen's dormitories, and the Stage Door Canteen. Many Victory Garden permits were also issued by the Director of Property.

## SEALER OF WEIGHTS AND MEASURES

The State law provides that all weighing and measuring devices used commercially must be tested and sealed at least once a year. This has been accomplished and in conjunction with this work this Department has, upon request of the Army and Navy, tested all the weighing and measuring devices used by them.

This Department has also cooperated with the Office of Price Administration concerning all foodstuffs. Several arrests were made and fines ranging as high as \$500 were imposed due to black market conditions.

We have visited, daily, since its inception, the Farmers Free Market, located at Duboce and Market Streets, testing all scales used by the visiting farmers and watching the weights to see that the purchasing public is fully protected.

Gasoline pumps sealed, 3643; adjusted, 26; condemned, 109; confiscated, 2; total, 3780. Liquid measures sealed, 7296; adjusted, 2; condemned, 5; total, 7303.

Merchandise in containers sealed, 163,068; condemned, 17,318; total, 180,386.

Complaints received and adjusted, 122; establishments visited, 11,442; certificates issued, 9470. Cash returned to complainants, \$78; arrests, 12; convictions, 12; fines, \$1,475.

### CORONER

The Coroner's office has functioned efficiently in spite of the shortage of both men and materials due to our present emergency.

Immediately following the onset of the war the Coroner's office was placed on an emergency basis, and at present is prepared to function and cope with any catastrophe that might occur. All of our members are on call twenty-four hours every day of the year. Working under our direction as a division of Civilian Defense are 187 trained volunteer auxiliary deputy coroners. At our disposal for emergency use are thirty-five auxiliary morgues and sixty-six auxiliary ambulances. This will give us storage space for 3975 bodies.

This office handled 2315 cases during the last ten months, an increase of 158 cases over a corresponding period last year. The number of inquests held was 2315, autopsies performed, 2281.

Motor vehicle traffic deaths increased from 73 in 1942 to 92 in 1943. Of this number, 78 were pedestrians, compared with 55 in 1942. This relative increase in pedestrian deaths was due in part to the dimout.

Occupational fatalities increased from 40 in 1942 to 42 in 1943, due undoubtedly to the industrial speed-up resulting from the defense program. Sixty-one cases collapsed at work from natural causes. Homicides increased from 31 in 1942 to 34 in 1943, while suicides decreased to 117 from 136 in 1942.

The office in this period handled the cases of twenty-seven members of the armed forces, collaborating with the Army and Navy in investigations.

Revenue received by the office for certification of papers, verdicts and transcripts of testimony increased from \$1,757.67 to \$1,918.45.

### JUVENILE PROBATION DEPARTMENT

Chief Probation Officer R. R. Miller reports as follows for the Juvenile Probation Department:

The fiscal year 1942-1943 will be remembered for the successes of the Allied armies on the battlefield and the rise of juvenile delinquency as a national problem on the home front. Juvenile delinquency increased in San Francisco obviously because of war conditions and an increased population, with resultant social ramifications. However, there has also come an intelligent interest on the part of the general public toward endeavoring to solve this intricate problem.

The actual increase in the volume of work is reflected in the following comparative figures showing the number of boys and girls under Juvenile Court supervision during the fiscal years of 1941-1942 and 1942-1943.

These figures represent a present increase of 56.6 per cent over the normal program of the five years preceding the outbreak of the war. An analysis of these statistics, however, discloses two interesting facts: First, that one-third of the children brought to us are residents of cities and towns in California outside of San Francisco, or are residents of states outside of the State of California; secondly, that 18 per cent of the children brought to the Detention Home came from families who have established residence in San Francisco since December, 1941. It, therefore, would appear that 51 per cent of these children are not what we would term San Francisco residents. Consequently, while our overall increase has been 56.6 per cent, our actual increase in San Francisco residents has been 5.6 per cent.

Due to this increase in numbers of children our facilities of detention, foster home care, institutional placement, and so forth, have been taxed to the breaking point. Our Detention Home, built in 1915, has proven quite inadequate to meet the increased load. Foster homes have practically ceased to exist. Private institutions have long waiting lists and commitments to state schools have to be held in the Detention Home for days awaiting a vacant bed in the state institution. Without the facilities of the Log Cabin Ranch as a rehabilitating project for problem boys the court would have experienced insurmountable difficulties in the handling of these youths.

The war has brought to us additional difficulties. Where, for many years, resignations from our staff were very few, within the last fiscal year we experienced approximately a 50 per cent turnover. Many of our men have gone into the armed services, American Red Cross and war industries; the women have joined such service corps as the WACS, Marines and Army Nurses. Replacements have been extremely difficult.

However, we wish to report that this Department has worked diligently to meet the problems and feel that we have done so with considerable success. Hoodlumism, gangsterism, et cetera, that has arisen in other communities, has not been experienced in San Francisco to any appreciable degree. We have not lowered our standard of case work and we can point with pride to the fact that no child called to our attention has failed to receive service. In addition to this we have cooperated with all preventive agencies in community plans, not only for the present, but also the post-war period.

We are now formulating plans for a new Detention Home unit for the post-war period, to provide modern and adequate detention home facilities to meet the needs of future years.

The need of additional personnel to meet this increased volume of work led to our requesting, and your granting, sixteen additional employees for the Probation Department, Detention Home, and Log Cabin Ranch; also, a staff of six people to operate the neglected children and girls' school which we expect to place in operation the early part of January, 1944.

There was expended from the Maintenance of Minors Fund, including all children placed through the Juvenile Court with foster homes, institutions and own families, the total amount of \$553,305.24. Breaking this down, there was expended in Institutions, \$28,229.21; Agencies and foster homes, \$339,504.39; with own families (Mothers' Aid), \$183,721.62; Transportation of minors to homes, \$1,850.02.

## AGRICULTURAL COMMISSIONER

Inspection of all inter- and intrastate shipments of plants, bulbs and seed is the responsibility of this Department. During the year 1943 the total amount of incoming nursery stock was 7942 shipments, 3,678,371 plants, with no shipments rejected. Nurseries inspected totaled 52; retail nurseries, 33.

Retail stores numbering 1403 were inspected for the condition of fruits, nuts, vegetables, honey and eggs. Fruits, nuts and vegetables conditioned, 739 packages; dumped, 60 packages. Eggs conditioned, 5803 dozen; marked, 3599 dozen; dumped, 286 dozen.

Wholesale fruit and vegetable market: Number of inspections, 1229; fruits and vegetables conditioned, 17,501 packages; marked, 3,841 packages; dumped, 23,606 packages.

There were 2223 inspections of fruits, nuts, vegetables, cereals, garden seed, plants and other miscellaneous commodities shipped to points in the United States and foreign countries amounting to a total of 177,862 packages.

There were 1502 inspections of food and feed products for city institutions with only six rejections, as follows: 480 dozen eggs and 40,332 pounds of butter and potatoes.

The revenue taken for export work and city institutions together for the present year will amount to approximately \$3,100.

Inspectors have been cooperating with the Department of Health and the Department of Weights and Measures in our inspection of wholesale and retail establishments, reporting violations and adverse conditions to those departments.

Request inspection on produce for export shipments were far below normal, due to war conditions. Quality inspections, however, were heavier with the opening of the Farmers' Market. This market is requiring almost full time of one inspector and satisfactory results are being maintained.

This office continued to give assistance to the Victory Garden movement. Inspectors have given home gardeners counsel on soil preparation, fertilizers and control of insect pests. This has necessitated many visits to home garden plots to assist with particular problems. A competent entomologist is available to identify insects and diseases on plants brought to the Commissioner's office by gardeners and nearly 500 specimens were identified in this way. Advice on proper methods of control was given.

## DEPARTMENT OF FINANCE AND RECORDS

Under Section 61 of the Charter this Department includes the functions and personnel of the offices of Tax Collector, Registrar of Voters, Recorder, County Clerk and Public Administrator, and is administered by a Director who is appointed by the Chief Administrative Officer.

Even more so than in 1942, the year 1943 saw many changes in personnel. Because of the war, and with so many employees leaving either to enter the armed services or to work in industries connected with the war, the problem of securing competent help has been at times an acute one.

The various activities of the five divisions enumerated above are submitted in separate reports.

The expenses for the Director's office during the year 1943 were \$8,995.70.

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**COUNTY CLERK**

The work of the County Clerk's Office increased under wartime conditions in 1943 and this growth was reflected in a substantial increase in the total of fees collected.

The largest increase in revenue was in the Marriage License Bureau, where fees amounted to \$20,221. The comparable figure for 1942 was \$15,767. The total of fines and fees collected during the fiscal year which ended June 30, 1943, was \$150,175.90, as against \$140,225.48 during the prior fiscal year.

The State Legislature in February enacted as emergency legislation special laws simplifying procedure for the delayed registration of births. Due to the need for birth certificates in connection with military service and in securing employment in essential industries, considerable use has been made of this legislation by the citizens of San Francisco. By the end of 1943 some 600 applications under the new legislation have been filed in our Superior Court. The new procedure provides both a simple and inexpensive means of providing and restoring this vital statistics record. This is important especially in San Francisco, where all original birth certificates were destroyed in the fire of 1906.

The County Clerk's Office continued its service in cooperation with the Federal Government by supervising the issuance of Explosives Licenses to applicants in this City and County, acting as licensing agents for the United States Bureau of Mines.

**COUNTY RECORDER**

The Recorder's Office received for recording during the calendar year 1943 a total of 64,921 instruments. Out of this number, 14,226 were deeds; 9533 deeds of trust; and 10,407 marriage certificates. There was also a marked increase in the number of reconveyances recorded, the number totaling 10,078.

The Recorder participated in efforts made by the Recorders of the State to amend the State law to permit the installation of late, up-to-date photographic equipment for reproducing official instruments. One was an attempt to amend Section 4131 of the Political Code. The amendment to this section, which was brought before the Judiciary Committee of the State Legislature, failed to receive the required majority vote of the committee, and therefore was tabled.

A later attempt was made by petition to the Appellate Court in Los

Angeles, to test the legality of Section 4131 of the Political Code, which prohibits the use of photo recording in this State.

California cities now remain the only cities of any size in the country that are still using the old-style method of copying instruments by typewriter. Owing to the manpower shortage and the difficulty of purchasing typewriters, it is imperative that we use every means possible to remove the restrictive language in Section 4131 of the Political Code, so that photographic equipment may be installed.

### REGISTRAR OF VOTERS

The office of the Registrar of Voters handled registrations for and conducted two elections during 1943.

Under the provisions of the Elections Code it was necessary to cancel 117,981 of the names on the register for 1942. This left 251,106 persons eligible to vote at the beginning of the year. Registration in the office and at branch stations during the year increased the registration by 35,700.

At the special election held April 20, 1943, there were 255,227 persons registered, of whom 143,595 voted.

At the general municipal election there were 286,806 registered, of whom 221,274 voted.

At the close of the November election the office was obliged to vacate the Otis Street warehouse and through the Directory of Property secured more spacious accommodation at 1440 Broadway.

The work of the office proceeded smoothly at all times, but the scarcity of men made it necessary to get help from other departments in the city government for handling, preparing and rechecking the voting machines.

Negotiations are being concluded for the purchase of fifty additional voting machines at a very low figure.

### PUBLIC ADMINISTRATOR

The operations of the Public Administrator's office were highly successful, and indicated a profit for the first eleven months of 1943 of \$17,144.91.

The following data are gleaned from the report of the operations of the Public Administrator's office for the period from January 1 to November 30, 1943: Number of estates wherein Public Administrator took possession, 464; number of estates in which final accounts have been settled and allowed, 319; Administrator's commissions collected and paid into County Treasury, \$29,255.90; attorney's fees collected and paid into County Treasury, \$29,255.89; sundry revenue collected and paid into County Treasury, \$419.06; total collections paid into County Treasury, \$58,930.85; total cost of operation of office, \$41,785.94; profit, \$17,144.91.

The operations of this office have been particularly affected by the war, in that, in many estates heirs and beneficiaries are either alien enemies or nationals of occupied countries. The Federal Government has issued many rules and regulations affecting their accounts and the disposition of their property, which this office is obliged to critically follow. The Alien Property Custodian has filed his appearance in many of the estates. This has increased the detail of the office, as it is necessary to furnish the Alien Property Custodian with a copy of the inventory and account. He then issues a vesting order, vesting in himself, as Alien Property Custodian, the rights of the particular alien.

There has been a great increase in estates of \$200 and less, administered under Sections 1143-44 of the Probate Code, where there are no fees. In 1942, for the first eleven months we administered 80 of such

estates and in 1943 144. This increase has arisen from the influx of defense workers who come here without funds or assets, are living alone and have only their salary or some small savings. This, too, has increased the detail work of the office without a corresponding increase in help.

Regulations, restrictions and taxes are ever-increasing, covering property and income of all of our estates, particularly the income tax, as this office is obliged to furnish the Internal Revenue Department with a detail of earnings. Usually we are without sufficient information upon which to base reports and it becomes necessary to write many letters to trace employment and earnings to ascertain if a tax liability exists.

All of these changes have greatly augmented the work of the personnel and placed additional responsibility on all concerned.

### PUBLIC WELFARE COMMISSION

The following summary of the activities of the Public Welfare Department, together with essential statistics and financial data covers the calendar year 1943:

While caseloads and total costs of public assistance in San Francisco have decreased during the past year, there has been no decrease in the number of problems or diminution in services rendered by the Public Welfare Department. In addition to its normal functions, the services of the Department have been adapted to include war related activities and cooperative responsibilities which have arisen as a result of the war. Broad changes in public assistance laws during the past year have necessitated many changes in procedures, and the loss of personnel to the armed forces, or war industries, has made necessary the consolidation of various functions of the Department in order that the interests of individuals requiring the services of the Department might best be served.

The programs administered by the Department during the past year have included Old Age Assistance; Aid to Needy Children; Aid to Needy Blind; Indigent Aid or general relief; War Services and Assistance cases, and Child Welfare Consultation Service.

The three public assistance programs which come within the provisions of the Federal Social Security Act, i. e., Old Age Assistance, Aid to Needy Children and Aid to Needy Blind have been financed by federal, state and county funds while the cost of Indigent Aid has been borne wholly by the county. War Services and Assistance cases have been financed entirely by federal funds, as has the Counseling Service provided in the Child Welfare Services program.

The Public Welfare Department authorized the disbursement of \$6,652,200 to the needy aged, the needy blind, the needy children, the indigents and War Services and Assistance cases during the period from January 1, 1943, to December 31, 1943. The cost of administration was \$455,800, or 6.4 per cent of total disbursements of \$7,108,000. Of the grand total, the total cost from City and County tax funds for the year was \$2,020,600 as compared with \$3,027,000 for the preceding year, or a decrease of \$1,006,400. The balance of the total cost was met from federal and state funds.

### Old Age Assistance.

The bulk of the public assistance granted in San Francisco County during the past year was through the Old Age Assistance program. Over 78 per cent of all disbursements of the Department for the year were for the benefit of the aged. While the number of persons receiving this type of assistance was less than in the previous year, the total cost of the program increased because of changes in the Old Age Assistance law whereby the basic grant was increased from \$40 to \$50 per month as of July 1, 1943. The cost of care of the aged for the year just ended was \$5,565,200 as compared with \$5,219,000 for the previous year—an increase of \$346,100 or 6.6 per cent. For the month of November, 1942, there were 11,546 cases aided on the Old Age Assistance program, the average cost per case being \$36.92. In November, 1943, there were 11,236 cases aided, the average cost being \$46.66—an increase of 26.4 per cent in the average cost per case. The down trend in this type of assistance which had prevailed since February, 1942, continued through June, 1943. Starting with July, 1943, however, there has been an increase each month in the number of persons receiving Old Age Assistance. This results from the liberalization in the law and the consequent greater number of persons eligible for this assistance. From January to June, 1943, an average of 11,091 recipients per month received assistance, whereas from July through December the number of recipients per month averaged 11,136.

Increased employment opportunities had a greater effect upon this program than has been revealed by the trend in number of cases. Of the 2174 cases discontinued during the year, 631, or 29 per cent, were discontinued because recipients secured jobs and became self-supporting or because relatives assumed the support of their aged dependents.

For the first six months of the year, during which period the basic grant was \$40 per month, the Federal Government contributed one-half the cost of each case up to \$40 per month and the state and county shared equally the remaining portion. Although federal participation was not increased when California elected to increase the basic grant to \$50, the state assumed five-sixths of the remaining cost and the county one-sixth. As a result the cost of Old Age Assistance to San Francisco County decreased from \$1,324,100 in 1942 to \$934,600 in 1943—a reduction of \$389,500, or 29 per cent less than was expended for Old Age Assistance during 1942.

### Aid to Needy Children.

On July 1, 1943, the Public Welfare Commission assumed the responsibility for administering, in addition to half-orphan aid, all Aid to Needy Children cases previously administered through the Dependency Division of the Juvenile Court, exclusive of foster home placements. From November, 1942, when aid was extended to 284 cases, representing 696 children the number of Aid to Needy Children recipients declined and there were remaining on the rolls of the Department in June only 226 cases, representing 565 children. With the acceptance of the additional classifications of Needy Children's Aid on July 1, 1943, the caseload was increased to 366 families, including 878 children.

Notwithstanding the enlarged scope of this program, the total amount disbursed for Aid to Needy Children during the calendar year 1943, including supplementary aid, was less than in the previous year. The total amount disbursed during 1943 was \$236,100 as compared with \$261,800 in 1942, or \$25,700 less than was expended in 1942.

### Aid to Needy Blind.

The number of blind persons receiving assistance through the Public Welfare Department in November, 1943, was 445 as compared with 509 in November, 1942. The cost of care of the blind during the calendar year 1943 was \$268,500 as compared with \$295,000 in the previous year, or a decrease of \$26,500.

### Indigent, Aid.

The decline in this type of assistance during the past year was proportionately greater than in any other single program. Increased employment opportunities enabled many persons who were formerly considered to be unemployable to obtain employment within their physical and mental ability. Also, many persons who were physically unable to hold a full-time job obtained part-time work. As of December 15, 1943, only 1135 cases remained on the rolls as compared with 2055 cases as of December 15, 1942—a decrease of 45 per cent. With the decreased caseloads more intensive casework has been possible and emphasis in this program has been placed on rehabilitation of the individual in order that he might become self-supporting. With the cooperation of the United States Employment Service excellent results were obtained. During the year indigent aid food grants were maintained at the current food cost level, by means of food pricing surveys made at three-month intervals.

The cost of indigent aid for the year 1943 was \$575,000 as compared with \$1,116,800 for the previous calendar year, a difference of \$541,800 in the cost of general relief in San Francisco County.

### War Services and Assistance.

Under the War Services and Assistance program two types of aid are administered by the Public Welfare Commission. First, the Enemy Alien program, which was designed to cover persons who because of restrictive orders found it necessary to move from certain areas or to discontinue their normal occupations and needed assistance for this reason, and second, Civilian War Assistance, a program to provide assistance to meet emergency need resulting from enemy attack or of action to meet such attack or the danger thereof. Under the Enemy Alien program the Department has been called upon to assist only six such cases during the past year. Under the Civilian War Assistance program 150 cases have been aided. These persons have included evacuees from Hawaii, air raid wardens who were injured while on official duty, dependents of internees in Japan, and others. The total aid granted under the War Services and Assistance program during the calendar year 1943 was \$7,800, which amount was entirely reimbursable by the Federal Security Agency through the State Department of Social Welfare. The cost of administration was \$1,375, the total amount of which likewise was borne by the Federal Government.

In connection with war related activities, the Director of Public Welfare is Chief of Emergency Welfare Services of the Civilian War Council and is Deputy Evacuation Officer. All employees of the Public Welfare Department are subject to 24-hour call in the event of any war emergency.

### Child Welfare Services Program.

The Public Welfare Department has cooperated in the Child Welfare Services program since July 26, 1943. At this time federal funds were made available by the United States Children's Bureau through the State Department of Social Welfare and two child care counselors were appointed from the Public Welfare Department staff to give assistance to children through counsel and advice to mothers who contemplated taking employment. The purpose of this counseling service has been to help the particular mother to determine whether or not she should enter into industry and if so, to assist her in making plans for the care of her children, and by furnishing information to her concerning available resources for the type of care which would be desirable for her children in the light of their ages, their conditions of health and other factors.

While the number of mothers requesting counseling service was not sufficient to justify the continuance of more than one worker, and one counselor was withdrawn in August, 1943, the results indicate that a

substantial number of women have benefited through the counseling service in the Child Welfare Services program.

### Membership of Public Welfare Commission.

During the year 1943 I made two new appointments to the Public Welfare Commission. Mr. Lloyd E. Wilson was appointed on January 15, 1943, and Mr. Lawrence R. Palacios I appointed to serve the unexpired term of Mr. Edward D. Vandeleur who resigned as a member of the Commission on May 18, 1943. And here I must pay tribute to Mr. Vandeleur, my friend, San Francisco's friend. He gave generously of his time and energy as a member of this Commission that the burdens of the needy might be made more easy. We mourn his passing.

Mr. F. M. McAuliffe, Chairman, Mrs. Eugene M. Prince and Miss Ruth A. Turner continued to serve as members of the Commission for the past year.

The Public Welfare Commission has carried out its duties and responsibilities in a manner that reflects credit on the City and County of San Francisco. I am confident that San Francisco's needy have been adequately provided for during the past year and I am equally confident that there has been no extravagant use of public funds entrusted to this Commission.

### SAN FRANCISCO-SAN MATEO LIVESTOCK EXPOSITION BUILDINGS

At the present time this property of No. 1-A District Agricultural Association is leased to the United States Army and is occupied and being used by them.

The first show held by the association was such an outstanding success that there is every reason to feel that subsequent livestock shows, to be held there when conditions permit, will not only be equally successful but more so and that they will prove a vital factor in maintaining San Francisco as a livestock center of national importance.

Not only from a livestock standpoint but because of a multitude of other activities that can and will be held in these buildings, they will be an asset of considerable value to this community.

There will be further construction needed and it should be made part of the post-war plan of the State and the City and County of San Francisco to make this one of the first projects for consideration.

### MUNICIPAL COURT

For the period January 1, 1943-November 30, 1943, inclusive, twelve courts handled 9227 civil actions, 5108 small claims and 299,151 criminal proceedings.

Receipts in the Civil Department, \$56,620; traffic fines, \$474,058.73; items other than traffic, \$26,756.17; total, \$557,434.90; expenditures, \$274,159.12; receipts in excess of expenditures, \$283,275.78.

Official and pauper actions filed, for which no fees were collected, 238. Small Claims—City and County, 1538; others, 28; total, 1566.

### PUBLIC DEFENDER.

Public Defender Gerald J. Kenny handled during the fiscal year ending June 3, 1943, 741 cases in the Superior Court; cases certified from Municipal Court, 224; received on information or grand jury indictment, 460; pleas of guilty as charged, entered by defendants, 123; trials by jury, 62; trials jury waived, 86; probation without jail sentence, 70; probation with jail sentence, 26; probation denied, 104.

Felony cases held to answer, 473; certified to Superior Court, 215; reduced to misdemeanor, 22; dismissed, 494; private counsel, 125;

county jail sentence, 94; probation or turned over to probation office, 84; suspended sentences, 27; off calendar, 42; sent to Elridge, 3; transferred to Juvenile Court, 27; sent to Detention Hospital, 13; turned over to Navy, 11; sent to Ukiah, 2; sent to Stockton, 2; sent to Napa, 1; transferred to Federal Court, 3; fugitives waived extradition, 22. Total number of felony cases handled, 1660.

The Public Defender handled 43 misdemeanor cases; 111 cases in Juvenile Court; participated in 5 insanity hearings; in 4 jury trials; verdicts, sane, 4; Coroner's inquest, 4.

During the fiscal year 2717 appearances in the Municipal Courts were made; in the Superior Court 2233; in all courts 4950. Consultations with defendants in County Jail and City Prison, 3480. Indigent persons receiving advice in civil matters (not required by Charter), 2963.

In comparison to the previous year the cases assigned to the Public Defender show an increase of 26 per cent in the Superior Courts and 41 per cent in the Municipal Courts.

### DISTRICT ATTORNEY

During 1943 this office participated in and conducted approximately 50,000 court hearings; issued 25,000 citations; conducted 23,000 citation hearings; was represented at all sessions of the Grand Jury during the year, both regular and special, and collected and turned into the City Treasurer's office in bail money the total sum of \$894,071.

Also, this office participated in all Coroner's inquests wherein suspicion of crime in connection with deaths was present, attended all meetings of the Parole Board, all meetings of the Traffic Committee on safety matters, met with groups of merchants and organizations interested in the various phases of the Unfair Practices Act and prepared and gave instructions and lectures on the same to such groups for the purpose of averting law violations and court prosecutions.

The total cost of conducting the office for the year was \$127,630. I am informed that this is lower than that of any other District Attorney's office of comparable size in the United States.

Of the cases handled by the office of the District Attorney in 1943, of the 50,000 court hearings, approximately 2400 were felony cases that reached the Superior Court, and approximately 46,600 were misdemeanor cases disposed of in the Municipal Court; approximately 1000 were crimes involving children, disposed of in the Juvenile Court.

Of the total number of approximately 25,000 citations issued, 8200 were issued by the Bureau of Domestic Relations of this office, dealing with failure to provide for minor children, indigent wives and aged parents and similar domestic cases; 1100 were issued by the Fraud Bureau of this office, dealing with crimes of frauds, swindles and violations of the Corporate Securities Act, misleading advertising and various other rackets; 15,100 were issued by the Warrant and Bond Office dealing with miscellaneous offenses, felony and misdemeanor alike, and with violations of city ordinances; 600 were issued by the deputy in charge of the Juvenile Court work, relating particularly to sex offenses and juvenile delinquencies. Hearings on citations were approximately as follows: Bureau of Domestic Relations, 7500; Fraud Bureau, 1000; Warrant and Bond Office, 14,000; Juvenile Department, 500.

The Warrant and Bond Department, aside from the issuance of citations as above noted, prepared 90,000 complaints, and 32,000 warrants were issued upon these complaints, and by telephone and personally answered over 21,000 requests for advice and information.

The Food and Health Bureau of this office, which investigates and prosecutes offenders under the Pure Food and Drug Act, the State Agricultural Code and various city health ordinances, handled and disposed of more than 175 cases during the year.

An innovation during the year 1943 was the establishment of the Women's Clinical Court at the Health Center Building. The District

Attorney had an assistant district attorney present and prosecuting at each and every court session. The cases tried were principally misdemeanors involving prostitution and other crimes of a similar nature.

Out of 151 narcotic cases disposed of during the year, 138 were convictions. These figures pertain to proceedings in the Superior Court.

## HOUSING AUTHORITY

To keep pace with the rapid and tremendous wartime expansion of the Hunter's Point Naval Drydocks and its urgent need for housing recruited immigrant war workers, the Authority has rushed construction of seven large war housing developments in the Hunter's Point vicinity during 1943 in addition to completing two permanent projects in other sections of the city. Shortages of manpower, critical materials and other delays have been overcome. Six of the projects were completed in 1943 and the seventh partially completed and scheduled for full completion early in 1944.

The seven projects consist of 1500 dormitory units and 4000 family dwellings covering 325 acres on which are located 521 buildings, plus many auxiliary structures, including seven management and maintenance buildings, three cafeterias, four recreation buildings, an 18-bed infirmary, six nursery school buildings, and a large commercial center. By early 1944 housing accommodations of the Authority will shelter in excess of 20,000 persons.

There is in addition an early impending assignment of 1000 additional dormitory units and 2000 more family dwellings to meet expanding needs of the Navy for housing civilian war workers engaged in naval ship repair.

All dormitory units are furnished and 13,707 rooms in family dwellings are equipped with basic furniture such as stoves, beds, tables, chairs, chests, etc.

San Francisco city departments have moved with equal swiftness in meeting the education, recreation, health, nursery school, police and fire needs of these new areas. The United States Department of Health operates the infirmary, California Physicians' Service affords medical care to all tenants, religious services are conducted by San Francisco churches on the premises, other services are extended by American Red Cross and various Community Chest agencies.

All activities of the Housing Authority at Hunter's Point are carried on in the closest cooperation with the United States Navy and with our principal, the Federal Public Housing Authority.

The Housing Authority has removed many substandard structures at Hunter's Point and has developed the area to an extent which will readily facilitate the later building by private enterprise of a middle income residential district in close proximity to San Francisco's probable largest peacetime industry.

The two permanent Authority-owned projects completed during the year, Valencia Gardens and Westside Courts, bring the total of completed permanent projects to five. The construction of six additional permanent developments will be forwarded as an early post-war undertaking of the Authority.

A payment in lieu of taxes equivalent to full taxes will be paid to the City and County of San Francisco by the Federal Government on all temporary federally owned projects in an estimated amount of \$100,000 annually. The current operations of the five Authority-owned projects indicate a surplus for the year beginning October, 1943, exclusive of federal contributions which will permit, it is anticipated, the payment in lieu of taxes to the city of an amount equal to full taxes, or approximately \$86,000. Income from properties owned by the Authority for post-war construction in the North Beach and Chinatown developments will also allow full payment in lieu of taxes of about \$17,500 annually. The total rate of payments in lieu of taxes on properties

owned or managed by the Authority will be, according to present estimates, in excess of \$200,000 per year.

Holly Courts, the first housing development built in the West now in operation three and one-half years, has never lost a penny in bad debts; this gratifying record is reflected in the operations of other permanent projects, none of which record bad debts above the low figure of less than  $\frac{1}{2}$  of 1 per cent.

Annual temporary refinancing one-year loan notes will be issued in February, 1944. The current interest rate of 77/100 of 1 per cent represents a decrease over the previous annual rate of 88/100 of 1 per cent paid in 1942.

All operations of the Authority have been placed on a 48-hour week to more effectively carry on its war housing program for the United States Navy at Hunter's Point.

The following is a summary of facts concerning each of the projects:

**SAN FRANCISCO CIVILIAN WAR COUNCIL**

The multitude of war-caused activities undertaken by the Civilian War Council can be generally classified as direct and indirect. The direct activities are those in which the Council establishes policy and procedure it desires to be followed and regarding which it maintains continuous direction through the Director of Civilian Defense. The indirect activities are those having a bearing upon the war effort in which the War Council has an interest and has indicated a willingness to participate financially. These indirect activities are, for the most part, under the control of organizations or persons not subject to direction or control by the Director of Civilian Defense.

For purposes of administration, the direct activities are themselves

subdivided into three main branches, namely, Civilian Protection, otherwise known in this report as the Defense Corps; Civilian War Services, otherwise identified in this report as the Service Corps; and the activities of Public Information and Recruitment under which we have placed, for administrative purposes, the Volunteer Office, the War Information Center, the Personnel Officer, the Credentials Officer and the Speakers Bureau. Each of these main subdivisions is under the direction of an Assistant Director of Civilian Defense.

It should be noted here that the classification and subdivisions as enumerated above have not been entirely established by ordinance. Certain of these activities are the outgrowth of a recognized need as war conditions changed and others have been organized or reorganized to simplify procedure or to improve administrative control. The City Attorney has been requested to review the entire field covered by the War Council's activities with the view of proposing, with your approval, to the Board of Supervisors a new ordinance to encompass more directly and simply the operations of the Council.

A review of the activities of the past two years clearly establishes, I believe, the need for adequate administrative personnel to direct all functions undertaken by the Council. Volunteers have given long and unselfishly of their time and ability and if not overburdened will, I feel sure, continue to do so. They cannot be expected, however, to undertake with continuous enthusiasm for long periods of time in the face of ever-changing conditions the necessary detail work required of every project where city funds are involved.

In this regard we propose, with your approval, to shortly review the personnel strength of each unit of the Defense Corps for the purpose of reclassifying the manpower into "active" and "reserve" groups.

Such reclassification will serve two main purposes. It will establish the present active strength of each unit upon which we may depend for action under any conditions and bring to light weaknesses in organization not readily apparent from the normal personnel records of the unit. It will also maintain within the ranks of the "reserve" that portion of the civilian population who have been properly trained for action during "air raid conditions" but who have evinced no desire to continue training or activities of a subordinate nature within their unit.

Such a program will in time give to San Francisco an "active" force of lesser proportions but immeasurably better trained due to continuing activities and a "reserve" of civilians who are properly credentialed to serve during "air raid periods" only, who have taken their basic training, received their equipment and can function effectively under the direction of the "active" personnel.

The maintenance of a high level of civilian enthusiasm is particularly difficult in these days of apparent optimism on the part of high-ranking military and governmental officials. To combat this all Chiefs of Service in the Defense Corps have been requested to make special efforts to have their training programs interesting to the civilian. Moving pictures, many from England, have been made available by our Information Bureau, service certificates with bars issued by the national Office of Civilian Defense are now being distributed to volunteers as are new automobile and window stickers indicating volunteer participation for more than one year. Likewise ready for immediate distribution are certificates of membership in the Service Corps, a group hitherto practically unrecognized since they cannot receive arm-bands or protective equipment as do the members of the Defense Corps.

Implied lethargy on the part of volunteers in the Defense Corps is not, I am happy to report, borne out by a critical examination of the personnel records. As an example of this, the Air Raid Warden Service, our largest single unit with an enrollment in excess of 27,000 persons, actually showed a slight increase in each of the last three months.

Constant effort, however, will be necessary to maintain the high standard of enrollment previously acquired. Several service units will

require some reorganization to place a greater degree of administrative responsibility and direction in the hands of the volunteers, without which they will not long retain the enthusiasm necessary to effective operation.

Barring some new problem, hitherto unconsidered, the fiscal expenditures for the purpose of Civilian Defense have passed their peak. Estimates based upon financial reports for the first five months of the fiscal year lead me to believe that we should be able to report next June 30th a return to the general fund of at least \$200,000. Should our estimates on the amount of state subvention to the city be correct this should be augmented by not less than \$150,000 additional, making the total return to the general fund something more than a third of a million dollars.

This potential saving is possible due to several factors. A further consolidation of administrative operation in the headquarters at 955 Potrero Avenue is presently contemplated. Many employments have already been discontinued and more are under review as to their necessity. The Control Center operation has been materially reduced in expense and considerable equipment for which funds have been appropriated cannot be purchased because of priority restrictions. Other equipment items have been found to be unnecessary in the light of new techniques or changes in the defensive plans of the city. Some additional items are being furnished by the OCD.

The Civic Center dormitories for service men will show a return of some \$40,000 in revenue by the end of June, 1944, and should receive a direct subvention from the state in the neighborhood of \$100,000.

### The Defense Corps.

During the past two years the organizing, training and equipping of the many units of the Defense Corps has been the paramount problem. Utilizing volunteers almost entirely the many service units have been drilled continuously in the problems of fire and war gas defense, control of pedestrians and traffic, police protection for lives and property, high explosive and incendiary bomb control and specialized problems such as evacuation, emergency medical treatment, war gas and bomb reconnaissance, demolition and rescue procedures and many others.

Each month through the past year Master and Zone Control Centers have been activated for reporting and dispatching tests and critiques, many of them under the direction of military officers. By special code, test "alerts" have been called at unusual hours of the day and night to test the effectiveness of our system of response. On several occasions the military have received our cooperation in special problems regarding the defense of the Bay Area.

With the completion of the special installation of five Victory sirens and the change of location of several of the electric sirens, particularly to cover the increased population of the Hunter's Point area, the city is now completely blanketed for the purpose of Air Raid warning.

Construction and improvements made necessary to round out our Control Center plan are completed and ready for instant activation with trained crews of both police and volunteer telephonists and dispatching personnel. In all locations we are three deep in trained personnel. Control tests continue monthly for all personnel.

In the field men and women Sector Air Raid Wardens for twenty-four hour coverage every week have gone through communications drills with the Zone Controls until their reporting procedure has been brought to a high point. As an example of the excellence of this training, we are able to dispatch equipment in any part of the city in less than two minutes from the time the Air Raid Warden starts his report in the field. This has been established in test incident drills encompassing more than six hundred incidents in one hour.

In the protection of San Francisco as on the war fronts dispersion of equipment and facilities has been accepted for all services. We have therefore established throughout the city in schools, private and public



buildings and other effective locations, equipment depots, casualty stations, degassing stations, rest centers, dispatch points, supply depots for demolition and clearance crews, etc., for the purpose of protecting the lives and property of the civilians. No part of the city has been left without adequate coverage and irrespective of the part of the city under attack forces are so dispersed that immediate dispatch could be made to the area under attack.

### Air Raid Warden Service.

The reservoir of man and woman power for Civilian Defense is found in the Air Raid Warden Service with its more than 27,000 persons trained as Wardens, Fire Guard squads, and Child Shelter Wardens. Shortly a fourth unit will be placed under this service, that of Incident Officers. Of the 86,700 stirrup pumps available, the Wardens have already distributed throughout the blocks of the city more than 45,000 and more are being distributed daily as Fire Guard squads are recruited and trained. Five thousand additional stirrup pumps have been distributed to members of the regular and auxiliary Police and Fire services.

During the time the dimout was enforced the Warden Service gave special training to several hundred of their personnel in traffic control and nightly these men were placed at strategic locations to enforce the military proclamations. More than \$96,000 in fines was collected by the city and the Warden Service was responsible for approximately 75 per cent of this collection.

Outstanding among their activities has been the education of the public in home protection against war gas, always a potential threat in San Francisco, as well as the recruitment of several thousand Fire Guards, a new activity initiated several months ago to replace the Fire Watchers.

The continuing weakness of this service, a lack of adequate personnel in the downtown and warehouse areas, continues as insurmountable and in these areas we are dependent upon a minimum of volunteers augmented by members of the regular Police Department for reporting purposes.

As long as the Warden Service can maintain an adequate personnel for the purposes of population control, reporting of incidents and assistance to other services San Francisco's first line of defense will be effective. Their past record of unstinting willingness to serve the city's need is entitled to the highest commendation.

### Auxiliary Fire Service.

Our fire hazard is probably not to be exceeded by any other city in the world. It is therefore a matter of first importance that our fire-fighting facilities be at all times ample to cope with the maximum potential danger. We have, therefore, ready for dispatch 569 auxiliary pumper units of 500-gallon per minute pumping capacity. This is the largest number of auxiliary units per capita of any metropolitan city in the United States. Of these units 159 are self-motivated and 410 are trailer units to be towed by other vehicles. Each self-motivated unit has a towing connection as do many other city-owned trucks. More than one hundred Yellow Cabs, at their expense, have been similarly outfitted. Armbands, credentials and driving masks have been issued to the Yellow Cab Company, and detailed plans worked out with the Fire Department to make immediately available in any part of the city as many cabs, with drivers, as may be necessary. The Fire Department has also worked in close collaboration with the military on fire protection plans for the waterfront. In this regard the Coast Guard has been particularly cooperative making daily reports as to the locations of their equipment and available manpower and have agreed to loan to us the services of two hundred and fifty men trained in fire fighting to assist the city as may be necessary. A recent minimum estimate of the static water supply immediately available for fire fight-

ing purposes indicates that we have in storage tanks, reservoirs, etc., more than 2,894,000,000 gallons of water, roughly enough water to permit all available auxiliary pumbers to be operated continuously for seven days, twenty-four hours per day.

The most serious unsolved problem has been and is today the lack of adequate volunteer manpower to activate this equipment in emergencies. Although approximately 6000 men have received some fire training since Pearl Harbor fewer than 1000 men are responding to the weekly drills and the most recent report of the Fire Chief indicates that only 1413 are now on the active rolls. Since six men, a captain, a lieutenant and four hosemen, are required to properly activate a unit our auxiliary force should not be less than 3414 men, without the higher administrative echelons of command.

In order to make this service more attractive and build up its strength the Fire Department has recently agreed to a reorganization of the Auxiliary Service, placing more authority and responsibility during non-action periods in the hands of volunteers. Recently, with this reorganization in mind, the Fire Code was revised by ordinance recognizing the volunteers as provisional members of the regular department and authorizing the issuance of badges for this purpose.

To assist the regular and auxiliary services in coping with an extreme emergency some 10,000 Air Raid Wardens have also taken supplementary training in the operation of pumper units and the handling of fire hose.

Competitive drills indicate that the volunteers who have taken continuous training are the best trained and most efficient volunteer force to be found in any large city and fully capable of giving a splendid account of themselves.

#### Auxiliary Police Service.

The Auxiliary Police Service has acted as the guinea pig for recent studies in the merits of establishing "active" and "reserve" classifications. Their findings indicate that the majority of the volunteers desire to remain on the active rolls and require only adequate activities in the police field to keep them enrolled.

With this in mind the regular department is now expanding the field of police service in which these volunteers may engage and is permitting them to take limited tours of duty with prowler cars, traffic patrols and special service fields operating out of police stations.

The personnel, numbering some 1881 active members at the present time, are thoroughly trained and equipped for any contingency and during the past year have been of invaluable assistance to the regular department in dimout prosecution in cooperation with the Warden Service, in traffic control in the downtown area and at the Beach and in several special service functions of the department.

As a detached unit of the Auxiliary Police Service, some sixty odd volunteers have been recruited and trained by the Senior Gas Officer as Gas Reconnaissance Agents. These men, principally chemists and druggists, are fully equipped with protective clothing, gas masks and gas detector kits. They are dispatched from any of the regular police stations for the purpose of gas detection and identification and have received special training at the Presidio under officers of the Chemical Warfare Service of the U. S. Army.

#### Emergency Medical Service.

By far the most complicated service from an organizational point of view is the Emergency Medical Service. For its most effective functioning it requires the cooperation of all the facilities of the Department of Public Health, physicians and surgeons, members of the County Medical Society, the operating staffs personnel and equipment of the twenty member hospitals of the Hospital Association, the recruited personnel and equipment of the Medical Aid Division of the Red Cross, the Nurses' Council and the Visiting Nurses' Association. The normal

facilities of all these groups have been augmented by additional volunteer personnel for the activation of sitting case cars, ambulances and supply trucks to fulfill the large transportation needs of this service. Substantial augmentation of medical equipment and supplies has been made through purchase by the War Council and by loans to the city by the Office of Civilian Defense.

Some five hundred physicians have been assigned to duty in hospitals, casualty stations and as leaders of one hundred and nine medical field teams for dispatch to the scene of incidents. First-aid squads trained by the Red Cross, with a personnel of some five hundred members, are available to assist in the field or in casualty stations as needed.

Available as casualty stations throughout the city are forty-nine locations established as follows: Twenty casualty stations located at hospitals; five emergency hospitals; six additional casualty stations set up by the Department of Public Health; eighteen casualty stations activated by the Red Cross. Each of these locations has adequate medical equipment and supplies, most of which has been furnished by the War Council or loaned by the Office of Civilian Defense. These locations are available for activation at any time by regular or volunteer trained personnel, according to the location involved. Emergency operating rooms have been blacked out adequately and procedures for the handling of casualties have been a matter of continuous training, both among the volunteers and the regularly employed personnel.

More than 2000 hospital workers are enrolled in the auxiliary group of Civilian Defense for emergency medical work. Fifteen hundred beds are immediately available in the emergency hospitals of San Francisco, and 2000 cots have been distributed to key locations to augment this need. In addition, the servicemen's dormitories of the city are immediately available to handle in excess of 3000 more bed patients, and plans have been prepared for the immediate activation and distribution of necessary supplies and equipment to all dormitory locations.

The Disaster Relief Commission of the Red Cross has furnished their eighteen casualty stations with some \$12,000 worth of equipment and has a credentialed personnel in the Defense Corps, including 92 physicians, 75 dentists, 317 nurses, 34 practical nurses, 180 women trained in first aid, and 117 volunteer medical assistants.

In casualty stations the Department of Public Health has assigned 363 of their personnel—23 physicians, 70 nurses and 270 volunteers. Twenty-three nurses are assigned to assist the regular emergency hospital personnel of 77 persons. The Social Service Division has a total personnel available of 103 persons for the purpose of registering the patients.

Aside from the expenditures made by the War Council and the equipment and supplies loaned by the Office of Civilian Defense, private hospitals of San Francisco have expended in the neighborhood of \$50,000 of their own funds in preparation for emergency action.

Arrangements have also been made by the Chief of the Emergency Medical Service to immediately supplement the existing supplies by emergency purchase from nine wholesale drug and medical equipment supply houses in the city. Detailed procedures have been established for the opening of these warehouses to assist us.

For the purpose of transporting casualties from the scene of incidents, the AWVS has made fifty station wagons available in which we are presently establishing stretcher racks so that all equipment can carry at least two injured persons. The White House has volunteered nineteen of its delivery trucks and the United Parcel Delivery is now equipping fifty of their vehicles with our stretcher racks for the same purpose. The Red Cross Motor Corps has made six ambulances and six station wagons available, augmenting the twelve city emergency ambulances. In excess of 200 volunteer ambulance drivers and forty-seven inspectors of the Department of Public Health have been assigned as drivers for emergency purposes.

To make medical service immediately available to casualties who have also suffered from war gas, eighteen degassing stations have been established, largely in schools, and are fully equipped and staffed for immediate action. Under the Medical Gas Officer some 641 dentists and pharmacists have been trained in the special techniques for treating war gas casualties and have been credentialed and assigned to cleansing stations. Two thousand stretchers that can also serve as cots have been constructed and have been placed in supply depots throughout the city. War gas first-aid kits to be assigned to ambulances going into the field have been supplied to all dispatch points, and with the recent completion of our two property degassing stations all vehicles handling casualties can be rapidly washed and cleansed for further use.

Twelve stations throughout the city have been established for home nursing service, and medical equipment and supplies purchased by the city for the personnel working out of these stations have been distributed.

All casualty stations and hospitals have established morgues for the receiving of the dead. The Coroner's office has assigned 187 of its personnel for this work, and 67 hearses have been volunteered by private individuals for this purpose. These hearses are also available to augment our ambulance equipment, if necessary.

In all cases the vehicles to be used by the Emergency Medical Service have received their blackout driving masks and necessary credentials. Helmets and gas masks have also been supplied in all cases where field units are involved.

Posters to be placed throughout the city to warn the population of procedures to be followed in the maintenance of safe water, food, and milk supplies have been printed and are available for immediate distribution as may be required by the Director of the Department of Public Health.

Through the facilities of the Disaster Relief Commission of the Red Cross the casualty information service for the registration and emergency recording of casualties, dead and lost persons, has been established. The volunteer personnel of the Red Cross for this purpose has been augmented by the employees of the Department of Public Welfare. Both the emergency and continuing care of unhomed civilians has been arranged for between the Red Cross and the Department of Public Welfare.

Ten thousand extra blankets, 2000 cots, 2000 stretchers, 2000 mattresses, as well as medical and surgical equipment and supplies in excess of \$75,000 have been purchased for the purposes of the Emergency Medical Service. This equipment has been carefully selected so that no medical supplies likely to deteriorate have been purchased, and all equipment and supplies are of standard specifications, and are usable by city departments in the event that no emergency occurs in San Francisco for the duration of the war.

### Rescue Service.

The Rescue Service, by agreement, has been developed entirely by the Red Cross and consists of nineteen excellently equipped heavy rescue units. In addition equipment for seventy-two light rescue units is available, although manpower is lacking to activate more than twenty-five. Some experimentation has been made in the use of woman first-aiders as light rescue squads, and to date fifteen such squads have been trained. Reports from the Office of Civilian Defense Rescue Division and recent information from Great Britain indicate that this service may have to be augmented by equipment of a heavier caliber than that previously envisaged. For this purpose the Department of Public Works has marshalled the available equipment of private contractors and builders of the city, including such items as traveling cranes, bulldozers, tractors, etc. The availability of this equipment is always

doubtful, since it is in constant use throughout the Bay Area, but to the degree it is available arrangements have been made for its use with the personnel of the Department of Public Works to augment the volunteer staffs of the owners of the equipment.

### **Utility Repair Service.**

The Utility Repair Service encompasses the facilities, both public and private, of all the utilities in San Francisco. Their key personnel have been trained in dispatch procedure, both in the field and in Control Centers. Since most of their work will be done subsequent to enemy action, only those persons required to activate the basic units have been credentialed. They are unquestionably in a position to afford effective service to the city at any time and have supplemented our equipment with all their facilities, valued at many millions of dollars.

### **Demolition and Clearance—Road Repair.**

These two units of the Defense Corps are activated under the Department of Public Works, utilizing the regular personnel of the Department. Twenty-two depots, distributed throughout the city, have been established, each with a large quantity of small tools purchased by the War Council for this purpose. Voluntary manpower to supplement the regular department personnel has been difficult to recruit. Here again reliance is principally placed upon the regular city personnel.

### **Decontamination Squads.**

At a cost of approximately \$27,000 two main depots for the operation of the property decontamination service have been established, also organized under the Department of Public Works. One of these has a large concrete floor for the washing of equipment contaminated by war gas, and both stations have facilities, consisting of lockers, washing rooms, and undressing rooms, for the personnel. Some 200 more of the Department of Public Works personnel have been given intensive training in this work and have been completely equipped, with the exception of rubber boots, by the War Council. In addition, shovels, brooms, brushes, rakes, sprays, etc., for the decontamination of property have been purchased and are available. Heavy equipment of the Department, including five new high-pressure street flushers, sewereductors, dump trucks, and two truck-mounted tree sprays have been allocated for this work.

In no other city in the United States has the problem of combatting war gas been as completely effective as in San Francisco, and with the exception of impermeable clothing and rubber boots every item of equipment needed for the effective operation of personnel in this regard has been purchased.

### **Bomb Reconnaissance Agents.**

The necessary examination and investigation of reports regarding unexploded bombs has been entirely charted, and this operation is carried on by 125 members of the regular Police Department, augmented by fourteen employees of the railroads and the Harbor Commission. All of this personnel have taken very complete training under the Army Bomb Disposal Unit of the Western Defense Command. A cemetery for the disposal of unexploded bombs has been selected, and complete unification with the program of the Army Bomb Disposal Unit has been perfected.

### **Transportation.**

In order to provide adequate transportation facilities for all conceivable purposes and for the rapid mobilization of these units during periods of emergency, the Transportation Service has been organized.

This service maintains a coordinated system for the dispatch of

equipment and personnel and at last report had available for use 2000 vehicles in the following classifications:

In addition, the Transportation Service has assisted in the recruitment of light weight vehicles for use as ambulances and sitting case cars for the Emergency Medical Service, and for the recruitment of specialized trucking equipment for the Demolition and Road Repair crews.

With the approval of the Commanding General of the Northern California Sector, Western Defense Command, the Transportation Service has established convoy officers and convoy procedures in the event of need for large evacuations, and has processed its programs with the Office of Defense Transportation.

#### Evacuation Service.

Complete evacuation plans, approved by the Western Defense Command, have been drafted and personnel has been trained in the procedures required under the plan. During the past year, specialized training has been given to this personnel, including a test water evacuation in which more than 2000 persons were evacuated from the area at Yacht Harbor to a point below Mile Rock. This test evacuation was the first of its kind to be held in the United States and was carried out to the complete satisfaction of the Coast Guard.

Preparation has been explored thoroughly and locations established for the opening of rest centers, assembly centers, use of necessary transportation facilities, registration procedure, and panic control. In accordance with the request of the military, maps and charts developing these plans have been completed and are in all required locations. In addition, 240,000 copies of informational data has been issued through the Air Raid Warden Service to all homes in San Francisco.

#### Communication and Messenger Service.

San Francisco's emergency operation is predicated upon rapid communication by means of telephone; however, in order that we may be secure under all contingencies, alternate methods of communication have been established. Messenger service, composed of motorcycle, bicycle and foot messengers has been organized with more than 2000 boys between the ages of 14 and 18 assigned to duty in the foot messenger and bicycle messenger bracket. A special subdivision of motorcycle messengers has been recruited and trained, using motorcycles transferred to the War Council by the Police Department, and augmented by sixty volunteer motorcyclists using their own machines. All these men have been trained in special dispatch procedure and equipped. In addition, 109 motorcyclists have indicated their willingness to serve during emergencies. The Auxiliary Police Service has an additional motorcycle unit of thirty-odd members for necessary augmentation during emergencies.

In addition to the telephone and messenger service, a supplementary unit of mobile radio transmitter-receiver units has been established with the approval of and licensing by the Federal Communications Commission. Forty-seven licensed operators are now available and trained for this activity. Thirty-one of these units were purchased by the city and these are supplemented by eight transmitter receivers

made available by volunteer personnel. A complete radio network to cover the city under emergency conditions as needed has been set up and has been tried out under all circumstances in continuous drills of the Defense Corps. Our call station is known as KGCW.

As an additional safety factor between Zone Controls and Master Control we have established a carrier pigeon service, which is probably the first of its kind to be activated by Civilian Defense. The finest racing pigeon stock in the West has been utilized. Fifteen pairs of pedigreed birds, donated by owners, were originally obtained and to date fifty-four birds have been trained for this work. One loft has been installed, and two additional lofts are now under consideration for construction. We are advised that our program can be expanded to cover the entire Bay Area with a speed of communication second only to the telephone network.

#### **Petroleum Supply.**

Recognizing the importance of adequate supplies of gasoline and oil for the rolling stock required to activate the field units of the Defense Corps, the Petroleum Supply Officer was appointed. Through this officer information has been made available by all companies in the Bay Area as to the source and manner of distribution of petroleum products, the location, storage capacity, hours of operation of all service stations, a complete list of all delivery equipment, its capacity, and the names and addresses of all persons operating the same. Stations throughout the city have been designated as supply depots, and the personnel necessary to activate this plan have been credentialed and trained. Key stations have cooperated by keeping at all times a maximum amount of these products on hand, and plans for their immediate utilization to the extent required have been developed.

#### **Plant and Building Protection.**

In the direct protection of buildings and plants, continuous training has been maintained for personnel of these facilities who are credentialed in the Auxiliary Group, permitting them to travel during air raid conditions to their assigned locations. Special assistance in the fields of fire protection and emergency medical protection have been made available through the War Council's agencies. More than 9000 persons have been trained for this purpose to date. Contact has been established with over 400 firms in San Francisco and of this number 373 have already established some form of interior organization for the protection of plants. Procedures through which they may call for assistance have been correlated with our Control Centers, and at the request of the Federal Government we are now embarking upon a thorough inspection of all plants having a direct bearing upon the war effort. Special advice has been given to the most important plants regarding sabotage and similar specialized problems.

#### **Air Raid Shelters.**

More than 250 buildings have been examined as to their availability and protection qualities for the purpose of air raid shelters. Of this number 192 have been officially designated, after a thorough inspection, as air raid shelters. In the recent past, curb level signs have been installed in front of these buildings and through the air raid shelter managers unit, key personnel in these buildings are being trained continuously in the necessary techniques of panic control, property protection, and fire protection. All stations were manned upon the occasion of all red alerts during the past year.

#### **Volunteer Office.**

As previously indicated in this report, the Volunteer Office encompasses not only the master files and records of all Civilian Defense volunteers, but also operates the War Information Center. 163,100 reg-

istration cards are in our files with arealized "in service" cards, indicating some service in the war effort on the part of 102,000 citizens. The War Information Center, which has been in operation only since last August, for the purpose of advising persons on all questions in connection with the war effort, to date has served 1339 queries and is continuing as an important service to the city.

The Personnel Officer is charged with the certification of all claims for hospitalization or compensation of volunteers injured as a result of their duties in the Defense Corps or the Service Corps. Through the Federal Government compensation and hospitalization are available in most instances. The State Government has also made available compensation and hospitalization in a broader field. The city itself has set up a fund of \$5,000 to supplement these two agencies.

#### **Training Plans Officer.**

Continuous programs for specialized training in the many fields of Civilian Defense have been perfected by the Training Plans Officer. Special attention should be called to the series of seven booklets on the basic training for all Civilian Defense volunteers which were drafted completely under the direction of this unit, and which have become a criterion to be followed by many other cities in the United States. San Francisco was the first city to establish a logical and effective training manual on the subject of panic control. This manual has received broad endorsement throughout the country and has been accepted by the national Office of Civilian Defense. Substantial assistance has been given by both the instructors unit of the AWVS and by a specially selected and trained group of teachers of the public schools.

#### **Public Information and Speakers Bureau.**

The matter of public information has been developed under this unit for continuous dissemination in thirty-nine publicity channels within the city. Continuous information is forwarded from this service to the metropolitan papers and to the district newspapers from week to week, and has blanketed the field of magazines and periodicals issued by local agencies. Commendation in the organ of the national Office of Civilian Defense has been received many times during the past year. This unit has received excellent cooperation from the local radio stations and the Victory Advertising Committee of the San Francisco Advertising Club. These agencies have been particularly helpful in spot drives of the salvage program and in perfecting campaign procedures for the War Housing Campaign which has gone on for the past several months.

The Speakers Bureau has a roster of 136 speakers and up to November 1, 1943, had addressed 113 large meetings and 150 meetings on training programs for the Defense Corps.

The Public Information Service has acted as a liaison with the OCD, the State War Council, the War Production Board, and the Western Defense Command. In addition, through the purchase of 16-millimeter motion picture projector and sound equipment, it has been able to show 109 films for training purposes of the Defense Corps.

Under the direction of this unit fifteen expert amateur photographers have been credentialed and have assisted in the compilation of a photographic record of many of the important activities of the War Council.

Four hundred and five news releases have been prepared by the Public Information Service to date, with assistance to service units in the Defense Corps in the preparation of releases in 365 additional cases.

#### **Summary.**

In summarizing the activities of the Defense Corps for the protection of San Francisco, may I call to your attention the excellent relationship which has been developed and maintained between the War Council and the Red Cross, the private utilities of San Francisco, the Board



of Education, and the Army and Navy command personnel of this area. Without their constant assistance it would have been impossible for San Francisco to have perfected the excellent program for protection which is available today. All of these agencies have given us the benefit of expert assistance by their specialists whenever they have been called upon to a degree probably hitherto unknown and without fanfare or publicity on their behalf at any time. I would recommend the utmost commendation for the unselfish and patriotic participation they have always offered.

### War Services.

The Service Corps, which encompasses the entire field of war services, has not had the detailed examination and perfection in operation to the same degree found in the Defense Corps. However, several units of this Corps have established an outstanding record for San Francisco. Present indications in this field portend a greatly increased activity for the future. Thorough exploration appears imminent for the purpose of giving factuality and emphasis to many presently incipient plans. The increased population and intensification of war industry with all the supplemental problems points to the need for specific attention to this Corps.

### Service for Service Men.

The entire field of service for servicemen is one of which San Francisco may justly be proud. Outstanding functions are Hospitality House, which has given daily entertainment from noon until midnight to more than 1,000,000 servicemen since its opening. Nightly dances with semi-monthly balls in the Civic Auditorium or Veterans' Building have been heavily attended by members of the armed forces. Some 400 clubs, organizations, and groups have sponsored evenings, donating in excess of \$100,000 in food, refreshments, smoking materials, etc., as a part of their sponsorship. Five thousand sponsored hostesses have assisted in the entertainment of the personnel of the armed forces whenever called upon. Since the establishment of the Civic Center dormitories, Hospitality House has been utilized for free breakfasts for servicemen served every Sunday morning by the Red Cross. Hospitality House has been under the direction of the War Council since July 1, with a budgeted appropriation of \$31,568.

The Civic Center dormitories, with a present capacity of 1592 beds constructed and operated by the War Council at a cost of approximately \$240,000, is probably the most unique operation of its kind in the country. Here at the nominal cost of 50 cents per night servicemen have available facilities second only to an established hotel. Clean sheets, pillow cases, and towels are furnished with adequate heat, hot water, shower and bathing facilities immediately available. These dormitories, with one unit in Hamilton Square, are augmented by the following facilities, all of which have received financial assistance directly or indirectly from the War Council:

- Harbor Club for Servicemen, with a capacity of 350 beds;
- St. Vincent de Paul, with a capacity of 250 beds;
- Ferry Building, with a capacity of 172 beds;
- American Legion-Pepsi-Cola Center, with a capacity of 400 beds;
- Laguna Honda Home, with a capacity of 155 beds;

making a total of 2919 beds now available in San Francisco for service personnel.

The Stage Door Canteen has received from the War Council for this fiscal year the amount of \$7,800 and the Recreation Department has received an appropriation of \$2,150 for the purpose of conducting dances for servicemen at the Century Club twice a week.

In addition the Recreation Commission has established a photography center for the use of servicemen and has requested the War Council to assist in this project.

The Servicemen's Art Center, where musical instruments, art materials for painting and sketching, etc., are available to servicemen, also has a present request for assistance in their excellent work which has been carried on so far on a completely volunteer basis.

Funds have been appropriated to the War Council for the purpose of establishing a lounge for wives and relatives of servicemen at the War Housing Center at 50 Post Street. Upon receipt of required equipment, this lounge will augment the existing facilities and will be operated by the AWVS.

Both the Red Cross Canteen Service and the AWVS have established lounges and canteen service in many locations, figures indicating that the Red Cross alone is feeding more than 9000 persons per month. Mobile units of the AWVS have been feeding large numbers of men at isolated posts throughout the past year.

Ordinances are presently being prepared to establish a trust fund for the Navy Mothers Club of San Francisco for the purpose of subvention from the State and the Servicemen's Overnight Housing Fund in the operating of a dormitory for convalescent naval personnel. This group also gave untiring assistance to the War Council in the early summer of the past year when a temporary dormitory for servicemen was established in the gymnasium of the High School of Commerce.

Through a gift from the Salvage Committee, the Soroptimist Club has been assisted in its operation of a club for enlisted men's wives.

While all the above are activities in which the War Council has participated directly, many more activities of a similar nature have been undertaken by public-spirited groups and organizations within the city. It is estimated that entertainment facilities are available daily for more than 10,000 servicemen.

#### Rationing.

Although rationing is normally a unit of the Service Corps with recognition being given to volunteer workers on Rationing Boards, actually the War Council's activity in this regard has been confined to the financial allocation of \$24,090 for this fiscal year. The greater proportion of this money was for the establishment of the fourteen rationing board headquarters throughout the city and for their maintenance. More than 400 volunteers are giving continuous service on these boards. This number was augmented by many thousand additional workers during the times that rationing books were issued during the past year. Particular commendation should be directed to the teachers of the Board of Education who were recruited for the most part for this very difficult task. Direction of the rationing program is by the OPA with assistance being given during the past year by a Rationing Coordinator, an employment established under the War Council.

#### Salvage.

The Salvage for Victory Committee, including representatives from all fields of endeavor in San Francisco, has been collecting effectively throughout the past year tin, fats and greases, bones, waste paper and old clothes. This committee has continually stimulated the salvage of essential materials at the request of the Salvage Division of the War Production Board, and has had the assistance of many organizations, including units of the Defense Corps. Approximately 800,000 pounds of fats and greases, 20,000 pounds of silk and nylon hosiery; and many thousands tons of tin and scrap metal have been collected to date. Present emphasis is being placed upon the salvage of clothing, most of which will be shipped overseas. A quota of 70,000 pounds has been allocated to San Francisco. The Salvage Committee and the Public Information Service are also emphasizing the critical need of waste paper, collection of which is continuing.

As of last July 1 this operation was brought directly under the War Council with an appropriation of \$5,420 for its operation for the fiscal

year, supplementing funds amounting to \$3,486 originally deposited in trust from previous salvage collections.

### **Welfare, Youth, Child Care, Education, Recreation, and Block Activities.**

In collaboration with the Board of Education and the Recreation Department of the city, various subcommittees of this unit have established plans and programs for the operation of day care centers for children. Nursery school facilities and recreation facilities of all kinds have been urged upon the city departments charged with the responsibility for operation and direction. Investigations of similar planning in other cities have been studied intensively, and as an outgrowth of the studies made by the subcommittees of this unit during the year, a Conference on Youth in Wartime was held under direction of the War Council.

The findings of the various subsections of this conference are being studied presently by the committees, and it is anticipated that many concrete recommendations will be forthcoming early in 1944.

This unit has also interested itself in the Child Shelter Warden program of the Air Raid Warden Service for the emergency care of children during air raid conditions; in the problems of institution and foster home care; in the problems of identification, registration and information regarding children in the event of enemy attack on San Francisco and has assisted the Parent-Teacher Association in completing its system of registering and tagging of children under eighteen years of age. This procedure has been operated continuously by the Parent-Teacher Association during the past year.

A special subcommittee has studied the problem of evacuation of children in conjunction with the Evacuation Service of the Defense Corps, and together they have completed programs acceptable to the military.

This unit has urged upon the War Council the establishment of city-wide block clubs, a matter still pending before the Council. More than 300 volunteer block clubs have been organized, and a majority are still functioning.

The problems involved in the day care of children of working mothers have received substantial attention, and this unit has urged the expansion of summer camps and child care centers to minimize these problems.

### **War Housing Center.**

The San Francisco War Housing Center is a joint operation of the War Council and the National Housing Agency. The Center is charged with the promotion of conversions of private and public property, the listing of rentals of property available only to war workers, and with the effort to promote out-migration of non-essential residents of San Francisco. During the past year the Center has received requests for housing from 39,079 military persons and 21,996 civilian war workers. The Center has listed 6431 family units; 11,543 rooms; and 878 "Share Your Home" locations. They have rented 5416 family units; 8473 rooms, and 679 "Share Your Home" units. The figures above do not include 717 government priority built dwellings completed in San Francisco during the year.

The Center has developed the local approach to the national campaign on housing with newspaper advertising, billboards, and other campaign material, and has taken a progressive interest in one of San Francisco's most important pressing problems—that of sufficient housing for persons desirous of working in San Francisco.

The Council provided an appropriation of \$9,900 for rental, office equipment and expenses, and an additional appropriation of \$3,000 for the "Share Your Home" campaign initiated last October and continuing at the moment.

### Nutrition.

The San Francisco Nutrition Council has continuously emphasized a program of education of the civilian population in the problems of their field. Particular emphasis during the year has been laid upon well-baby clinics, adequate lunches for school children and war workers, and proper nutrition standards for day care centers. Home canning and preservation programs have also been emphasized during the past year with publicity posters and other material being distributed. Additional education through agencies of the Red Cross, AWVS, Parent-Teacher Association, women's clubs and churches is estimated to have reached 10,000 women during the year. Volunteer workers have been recruited to emphasize the programs of this service in some 400 organizations throughout the city. Special investigations of nutritional needs in local industry have been made, with distribution of many thousands of folders on many specific subjects. One thousand copies of a new Walt Disney food poster series have been distributed throughout the city.

Assistance has been given to civilians who desire to utilize the 300 pressure cookers now available in San Francisco for canning purposes.

The Nutrition Council has also supplied nutritional information to 152 block club chairmen and has participated in demonstrations at cooking schools on several occasions. It is estimated that some 2000 women have attended these schools.

They have received an appropriation of \$9,220 for this fiscal year.

### Consumer Interest.

Although a Consumer Interest Committee was activated prior to the period of this report, during the past year few accomplishments have been possible, since a reorganization of this work was requested by the committee and has not yet been determined by the War Council.

However, several hundred volunteer women were recruited to assist the rationing boards in the rationing educational campaigns and three hundred volunteers were recruited by the Volunteer Office to act as information aides in the seventy-seven schools of the city during the registration week for War Ration Book No. 2. A point rationing pamphlet was prepared by the War Council, and 310,000 copies were distributed in the city through the assistance of the Boy Scouts.

### Victory Gardens.

The Victory Garden Advisory Council during the past year so stimulated the growth of victory gardens that it is estimated some 60,000 gardens were cultivated. With the assistance of the local newspapers and radio stations, an educational campaign was carried on, instructing the amateur gardeners in the opportunities of this area. Three hundred classes in victory gardening and poultry raising were conducted in various parts of the city. Some 20,000 persons have been informed of the need of victory gardens through the Speakers Bureau and other publicity means. Ten thousand school children were encouraged to participate in this activity, and a series of twelve ground demonstrations under the direction of the University of California were sponsored.

Since early summer the Council has encouraged the operation of the Farmers Free Market, which this group estimates has been responsible for the salvaging of some 9000 tons of produce that otherwise would not have reached a consumers' market.

The Victory Garden Advisory Council received an appropriation in the budget for the fiscal year of \$4,320.

### Wartime Harvest Council.

In order to recruit civilians of San Francisco to assist the rural communities in the harvesting of 1943 crops, the Council appropriated \$2,700 to publicize and encourage this activity.

Studies were made by this unit of the complex problems of housing the volunteer harvest workers, transportation, gasoline rationing, and the establishment of harvest labor camps which would be sufficiently comfortable to encourage city workers to participate in crop harvesting.

As the need developed for augmentation of harvest workers in areas in the vicinity of San Francisco, publicity campaigns were formulated in collaboration with other organizations having similar interests. Some 1460 San Franciscans were recruited during the season for work in harvest camps within 150 miles of San Francisco. Some 2000 additional applications were received at the Farm Labor Office, and although many of them were not utilized, due to the influx of a greater number of migrant workers than had been anticipated, the indication of desire to assist established a much more favorable feeling of cooperation between San Francisco and the rural communities adjacent. In the field of public relations, this has undoubtedly been of substantial benefit to the city.

### **Expressing Best Wishes to Mayor Angelo J. Rossi.**

Following the presentation and reading of the Mayor's message, the Chair requested Mr. Eneas Kane to convey to Mayor Rossi the greetings of the Board of Supervisors; to say that the Board had listened to the reading of his message with rapt attention; to tell him that his splendid years of service were greatly appreciated; and that the entire Board extended best wishes for the early recovery of his health.

### **Farewell Remarks by Supervisor Shannon.**

Today, for the last time I am responding to my name under roll call of this Board where I have served for almost twenty-five years.

On July 21st, 1919, the well beloved James Rolph, Jr., appointed me to a vacancy on this Board, as the successor to Supervisor Edward Brandon, who had died in office.

I was elected for the first time in November of the same year and was re-elected in 1923—in 1927—in 1931—in 1935, and finally in 1939.

During my six terms in office it has been my privilege to serve at one time or another, on every important committee of this Board.

On three different occasions my colleagues accorded me the high honor of electing me the President of this Board.

It has been my privilege to serve as a Board member under the administrations of two Mayors—James Rolph, Jr., and Angelo J. Rossi.

It has been my privilege to serve as a Board member under two Charters, the Charter of 1900 and the present Charter, which has been in operation now for twelve years, and hence should no longer be referred to as "the new Charter."

Twenty-five years of service has provided me with some knowledge of legislative procedure and legislative problems and I seek the indulgence—on this, my final day of service—for the purpose of commenting briefly on certain aspects of problems which the future holds for municipal government of this good city of ours.

It cannot be denied that elections turn largely on personalities; neither can it be denied that for certain types of men a political campaign is a trying ordeal.

Maybe those two factors deter men—*outstanding men*—from entering public life. That is regrettable, because our city government is entitled to, deserves, and needs the highest caliber of business and professional men, if our governmental structure is to successfully withstand the impact of events in the uncertain years that lie ahead.

Organized Labor has always sent its leaders into public service here in San Francisco. Two presidents of the Labor Council have served on this Board during recent years—Andrew J. Gallagher and William

Stanton. The president of the Building Trades Council—Dewey Mead—sits with us today. John Shelley, the president of the Labor Council, is San Francisco's State Senator.

Why have not men of equal stature from industry or the professions, or the retail world more often come forward as candidates for supervisor? Too long have men successful in the business life of the community shunned political office. The idea that men who have done well as business leaders are thereby disqualified as political leaders, is nonsense.

Men called upon to serve, no matter what station in life they may occupy, must stand ready to take a hand. Roger Lapham was not afraid to take the chance and the people of San Francisco were not afraid to entrust the high responsibilities of the Mayor's office to him.

It cannot be argued that men of this type take no interest in governmental affairs. You know, my colleagues, as well as I do, that close to election time successful businessmen of San Francisco are ready and willing to take a hand in the selection or endorsement of candidates, especially candidates for the office of Supervisor, but having done this—having made their selection, or given their endorsement, they seem to feel that they have done their full duty.

San Francisco deserves more than that. San Francisco needs more than that.

Of course—of course—it could be argued, and maybe some of those present are even thinking, "If men of the caliber the speaker is describing had come forward during the past quarter of a century, maybe Shannon would not have been elected six times." That is a question, which, while debatable, can never be settled; I am speaking of what has happened, and not of what might have been.

During the past twelve years there has come into being an idea that the Board of Supervisors has but little power. Some members of this Board have voiced that belief. It has been said, "Let us amend or re-draft the Charter in order that the Board may exercise a greater degree of authority."

After mature deliberation, I find myself in conflict with that view. I submit that a careful study of the Charter will reveal that this Board has tremendous power. In many, many instances it is true that the Board has failed to realize, and naturally to make use of, the full authority which it has.

Far too often the Board—being uncertain as to how to act, or reluctant to act at all—has asked the City Attorney, "May the Board do so and so?" and has permitted the City Attorney to solemnly shake his head negatively and has taken his answer as final.

You know and I know that not one dollar may be appropriated for any purpose save by action of this Board.

You know and I know that no legislation of any kind can be enacted save by action of this Board.

Again, I say to you, my colleagues, that a study of the Charter will convince you that the legislative branch of local government possesses powers equal to and, in many instances, exceeding those of the executive branch.

The Board possesses no administrative powers.

The activities of local government in a city of this size, where the governmental functions of a city and county are merged, are so complex—due in no small part to the social and economic trends of our time, that in administrative matters expert and specialized knowledge is essentially necessary.

Despite twenty-five years as a Supervisor, I do not believe myself qualified to run the San Francisco Hospital, nor to pass on engineering

or traffic problems, nor to instruct the Manager of Utilities how to operate the public enterprises of the municipality; neither am I completely familiar with the manifold obligations of county officers as set forth in the Constitution and the Statutes of the State of California.

Legislation is itself a specialized endeavor. Policies of doubtful wisdom, ill-adapted to conditions and problems, sponsored by group-minded people, come constantly before a legislative body. Group-pressures are exerted on a legislative body.

Legislation is, after all, a piecemeal process, a concession to popular grievances, a product of pressures and compromises. It could be said, in a general way, that every piece of legislation enacted helps some and hinders some.

To avoid even some of the traps, the pitfalls and the dangers of ill-advised legislation, the legislative body must work in harmony with all branches of local government but should not presume to interfere in those administrative affairs, nor seek to assume functional administrative responsibilities which the Charter—very wisely, I think—has placed in the hands other than our own.

I am particularly indebted to the staff of this Board for the gracious assistance that they have always given me. I am also deeply indebted to the members of the press assigned to this department for their uniform, kindly treatment of me.

To each of my ten colleagues on the Board and to all my fellow-servants in the municipal service, I want to say that I leave you with every good wish for the future of San Francisco, and every fond wish for your own personal good fortune.

During the past twenty-five years, I have presided over, or participated in many a lively debate in this Chamber. Words of mine may have been uttered in the heat of debate that were afterwards regretted. I want everyone to know, particularly the present members of this Board, that when I leave here today, I do so with no bitterness in my heart for any man—living or dead.

I take with me as I pass through that door for the last time as a Supervisor, only the most pleasant of memories.

#### Remarks by Supervisors.

Supervisor Colman, following the remarks by Supervisor Shannon, addressed Supervisor Shannon, saying that he was one of the colleagues mentioned. He had served on the Board for the last twenty-two years of Supervisor Shannon's twenty-five years. "When you go out of the door today," continued Supervisor Colman, in addressing Supervisor Shannon, "I want you to know that your presence here will be lost. There is no question in the world about it. Your genial wit, your sense of humor, your keenness of intellect will always be remembered. You have given one-quarter of a century of splendid service to your city. You and I have had many of the debates about which you spoke, but I feel like you, that there is no bitterness. I am speaking for the entire membership of the Board when I say that you have our good wishes. Whatever you may attempt to do, we wish you great success. Please come to see us often. I know there will always be a hearty welcome for you. God bless you and give you a long and happy life."

Supervisor Brown announced that he had already expressed to the members of the Board and to Mr. Shannon, his feeling about his departure some time ago. He felt that Supervisor Shannon had added much to the deliberations of the Board. He has brought to the Board a native Irish wit; he has added a great deal to the spirit of the meetings. All members of the Board share the feeling of regret that he will no longer be a Supervisor, and we all hope he will avail himself of the invitation to be present frequently. This was the first time since

he had been a member of the Board, Supervisor Brown continued, that a member had retired of his own volition, so to speak. It might be fitting that the Board of Supervisors prepare a suitable resolution expressing its sentiments to Supervisor Shannon, and he would move that the President of the Board express by resolution, appreciation for the many years of service which Supervisor Shannon had given to the City and County of San Francisco. Motion seconded by Supervisor Mead.

Supervisor MacPhee announced that he could add but little to what had already been said about Supervisor Shannon. He had sat alongside Supervisor Shannon for two years, and would miss him. He expressed the hope that Supervisor Shannon's public service would not be ended, but that he would continue to take an active part in public life, and at all times give the Board the benefit of his counsel and wisdom. Supervisor MacPhee suggested that a similar resolution be prepared for presentation to Supervisor Roncovieri. The Board should also present an appropriate resolution to Mayor Rossi. These resolutions should be prepared in proper form, and with a dignity that would make them lasting mementoes.

Supervisor Mead stated that he was sure Supervisor Warren Shannon knew how he felt, and that he was speaking for the entire Board of Supervisors in wishing Supervisor Shannon every success and expressing the hopes that he would return to the Chambers as often as he could. His leaving the Board would be a great loss to the Board of Supervisors, and to the city as a whole. In closing, Supervisor Mead requested that Supervisor Shannon's remarks be made part of the record.

No objection, and *so ordered*.

Supervisor Shannon, in a few final remarks, stated that he could not overlook the opportunity to express his deep appreciation for the very fine words that had been spoken by the members of the Board, and to say that the resolution presented by Supervisor Brown would be prized highly. It would be one of his documents which he would have framed.

Thereupon, the following resolution was presented by Supervisor Brown:

**Commendation of Supervisor Warren Shannon Upon His Retirement From the Board of Supervisors.**

(Series of 1939)

Resolution No. 3770, as follows:

Whereas, Warren Shannon is about to retire after an outstanding, brilliant career of almost a quarter of a century as a public official and Supervisor of the City and County of San Francisco, to which position he was repeatedly elected six times by an increasingly large and flattering vote; and

Whereas, we who have known Warren Shannon through all the years as Acting Mayor, as President of the Board of Supervisors and as chairman of many of the important committees of the Board, have noted his devoted, loyal and conscientious service; have observed his competent and thorough knowledge of legislative procedure and the legal perspicacity with which he addressed himself to the manifold questions of municipal government; and

Whereas, Warren Shannon is a lovable character and a man among men whose great heart and deep knowledge of human nature has made him look with understanding and sympathy on the problems of many who have had recourse to him; now, therefore, be it



Resolved, That we, his colleagues and fellow members of the Board of Supervisors, extend to Warren Shannon our highest commendation for the excellence of his service to his native city over so many years of its colorful history; and be it

Further Resolved, That the Clerk of the Board express to Warren Shannon our sincere best wishes for many years of happiness and success in all his future undertakings; and be it

Further Resolved, That the Clerk tender to Warren Shannon an engrossed copy of this resolution as a token of the high regard and esteem by which he is held by his fellow members of the Board of Supervisors.

*Unanimously adopted.*

**Commending The Honorable Angelo J. Rossi for His Distinguished Service as Mayor of the City and County of San Francisco.**

(Series of 1939)

Supervisor MacPhee presented:

Resolution No. 3771, as follows:

Whereas, the Honorable Angelo J. Rossi, Mayor, is about to retire from the official life of San Francisco as its chief executive after a long and notable career of loyal, conscientious and faithful service; and

Whereas, notwithstanding the period covered by his administration was marked by a great national depression, widespread unemployment, labor disputes and the World War, Mayor Angelo J. Rossi's incumbency, due to his ability and combined qualities of sincerity and sympathetic and intelligent understanding was one of outstanding achievement; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That this Board of Supervisors express to the Honorable Angelo J. Rossi its grateful appreciation for his so worthy contribution to our City's cultural and material welfare over so many eventful years; and be it

Further Resolved, That the Clerk of this Board be directed to tender to the Honorable Angelo J. Rossi an engrossed copy of this resolution as a token of the esteem and regard in which he is held by all its members.

*Unanimously adopted.*

**Commendation of Alfred Roncovieri for His Service as Supervisor and Superintendent of Schools.**

(Series of 1939)

Supervisor MacPhee presented:

Resolution No. 3772, as follows:

Whereas, Supervisor Alfred Roncovieri, after twenty years of intelligent, honest and conscientious service as a member of this Board of Supervisors and as chairman of its most important committees, is about to leave us and retire to private life; and

Whereas, Alfred Roncovieri—a graduate of the University of California and distinguished as a musician and linguist—brought to the public service a mind replete with culture and scholarly attainments and gave generously of his time and energy, through all the critical reconstruction years following the fire and earthquake of 1906, to the rebuilding of a new and greater San Francisco; and

Whereas, such loyal and devoted service to our beloved City for over two-score years—twenty-one years as its superintendent of schools and twenty years as a member of this Board of Supervisors—is entitled to the recognition and honor it merits; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That this Board of Supervisors express to Alfred Roncovieri its grateful appreciation and commendation for his outstanding and intelligent contribution to our manifold civic problems; and be it

Further Resolved, That the Clerk be and he is hereby directed to have suitably engrossed copies of this resolution prepared and tendered to our colleague in token of the high regard and affection in which he is held by the members of this Board of Supervisors.

*Unanimously adopted.*

**Commending Matthew Brady for His Distinguished Services to the City and County of San Francisco During His Tenure in the Important Offices of Police Judge, Civil Service Commissioner, and District Attorney.**

(Series of 1939)

Supervisor Brown presented:

Resolution No. 3774, as follows:

Whereas, Matthew Brady, after having served the City and County of San Francisco for over a quarter of a century in the important offices of District Attorney, Civil Service Commissioner, and Police Judge, is about to retire from public office; and

Whereas, Matthew Brady as District Attorney, particularly, conducted his office with honesty, efficiency, and distinction; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That this Board of Supervisors extends its highest commendation to Matthew Brady who, while dispensing equal justice to all, has done so much to prevent crime by his vigorous prosecution of the subversive elements that infest all seaport cities like San Francisco; and be it

Further Resolved, That the Clerk be and he is hereby directed to tender to Matthew Brady an engrossed copy of this resolution testifying to the high esteem and regard in which he is held by the members of this Board of Supervisors.

**In Memoriam—Mrs. Lillian Small.**

(Series of 1939)

Supervisor Mead presented:

Resolution No. 3773, as follows:

Whereas, this Board of Supervisors learns with sincere regret of the untimely passing of Lillian Small, who was well known to all members of the Board of Supervisors as a constant and interested spectator at all our meetings; and

Whereas, as well as a helpful and devoted wife, Lillian Small was active in everything that made for the good of our city and was a member of the Women's Civic Center, the Central Council of Civic Clubs and the West of Castro Improvement Club, and gave much of her time and energy to public affairs and charitable work; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That when the Board of Supervisors adjourns this day it does so out of respect to the revered memory of the late Lillian Small; and be it

Further Resolved, That the Clerk of the Board be and he is hereby instructed to prepare suitably engrossed copies of this resolution to be tendered to the family of the deceased.

**Repeal of Prohibition Against Night Driving in Golden Gate Park.**

(Series of 1939)

Supervisor Gallagher presented:

Bill No. 2696, Ordinance No. . . . . , as follows:

Repealing Bill No. 1989, Ordinance No. 1896 (Series of 1939) entitled: "An Ordinance Making It Unlawful to Drive Any Motor Vehicle in Golden Gate Park During the Existence of Any Dim Out Regulation Except on Certain Excepted Routes; and Providing for the Issuance of Citations by Police-Officers and Auxiliary Policemen for the Violation Hereof."

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco, as follows:

Section 1. Bill No. 1989, Ordinance No. 1896 (Series of 1939) entitled: "An ordinance making it unlawful to drive any motor vehicle in Golden Gate Park during the existence of any dim out regulations except on certain excepted routes; and providing for the issuance of citations by police officers and auxiliary policemen for the violation hereof," approved December 23, 1942, is hereby repealed.

*Passed for Second Reading* by the following vote:

Absent: Supervisors Roncovieri, Uhl—2.

**Cleaning of Streets After New Year's Eve Celebration.**

Supervisor Brown, under his name on Roll Call, called attention to the New Year's Eve festivities and the necessity of expending some \$3,000 for street cleaning resulting from the great quantities of paper thrown into the streets, for which no funds had been appropriated. Because of the importance of the matter he suggested that it be referred to the Streets Committee.

No objection and matter *referred to Streets Committee.*

**Caucus of Board of Supervisors.**

Supervisor Colman reminded the members of the Board of Caucus of Board, as it would be constituted for the coming year, to be held on Tuesday, January 4, at 4:00 P. M., to consider election of President for the next two years.

**Arrangements for Inaugural Ceremonies.**

Supervisor Gallagher, who had been appointed by the President to arrange for proper inaugural ceremonies to be held on January 8, 1944, announced that the Mayor-Elect and the District Attorney-Elect would be inaugurated promptly at noon on Saturday, January 8, 1944. He suggested that the Board meet promptly at noon, and after its business had been concluded that it participate in the ceremonies to take place in the rotunda of the City Hall at about 12:15 P. M. A complete program of the entire affair would be furnished for each Supervisor.

**Consideration of San Francisco's Transportation Situation.**

Supervisor Brown referred briefly to the Office of Defense Transportation's decision regarding San Francisco's transportation situation, which had been referred to the Public Utilities Committee. He had already been in consultation with the Manager of Utilities and with the Mayor-Elect. It seemed to him, Supervisor Brown, that no practical purpose would be accomplished by hearing prior to the reorganization

of the Board of Supervisors, inasmuch as there will doubtless be a **change** in the Public Utilities Committee, as well as in the Mayor's office. The matter should remain in committee until the new committee has been appointed.

**Excused From Attendance.**

Supervisor Mead announced that he would be obliged to be absent from the Caucus of the Board, to be held on January 4, and from the meetings of January 8, 10 and 17, 1944, and requested to be excused.

No objection, and excuse *granted*.

There being no further business, the Board, at the hour of 5:00 P. M., recessed, to reconvene on Saturday, January 8, 1944, at 12:00 noon.

Following the reading of the foregoing communications, the roll was called by the Clerk and the following Supervisors were noted present:

Supervisor Mead was excused from attendance.

Supervisor Sullivan was noted present at 12:07 p. m.

#### **Election of President.**

Following the roll call, Supervisor Colman, in placing in nomination for the office of President of the Board of Supervisors, addressed the Board, as follows:

Allow me, as retiring President, to express my appreciation of the many courtesies, the consideration and the cooperation extended to me by my colleagues, our staff and the press, and all the civic groups of San Francisco.

Now it is with real pleasure that I place in nomination for the office of President of the Board of Supervisors the name of one of our col-

leagues. He comes from a pioneer San Francisco family. His grandfather came to San Francisco from Ireland, made this his home, founded a business. The business he founded is still in existence and is being conducted by our colleague who is of the third generation. Our colleague's mother and father were both born in San Francisco, as was he himself.

He represented his city for two terms in the State Legislature and acquired valuable experience and rendered good service. His conduct as a member of the Board of Supervisors during the past two years has earned him the respect and confidence not only of his colleagues but of the people who elected him with such a splendid vote.

As far as I am personally concerned, Dan Gallagher has been drafted for the office of President. No one, not even himself, spoke to me in behalf of his candidacy. He seems the logical choice. He will not be an experiment because on the occasions in which he has presided he has acquitted himself with dignity and with fairness. So, with firm confidence in his ability and his integrity, I am proud to place in nomination the name of Supervisor Dan Gallagher.

Supervisor Brown, in seconding the nomination, stated that it gave him great pleasure in seconding the nomination of Dan Gallagher for the position of Chairman of the Board of Supervisors, "I know," continued Supervisor Brown, "that he will acquit himself in this office with merit and with credit to himself. It is with great pleasure that I second the nomination."

Supervisor MacPhee stated that having been one of the "Fusion Five" elected with Dan Gallagher, and realizing his capabilities, he was honored and proud to second his nomination for President.

Supervisor Uhl moved that the nominations be closed. "Having known Supervisor Gallagher now for a matter of two years, and knowing his qualifications," stated Supervisor Uhl, "I move that nominations be closed." Motion seconded by Supervisor Meyer.

No objection, and *nominations closed*.

Thereupon, the roll was called and Supervisor Dan Gallagher was elected as President of the Board by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Brown, Colman, Gallagher, Gartland, Green, MacPhee, Mancuso, Meyer, Sullivan, Uhl—10.

Absent—Supervisor Mead—1.

Following the foregoing vote, Supervisor Colman announced that he had been authorized to say that if Supervisor Mead had been able to be present, he would have cast his vote for Supervisor Dan Gallagher for President.

Thereupon, Supervisor Colman declared Supervisor Dan Gallagher to have been elected to the office of President of the Board of Supervisors, and in relinquishing the office and handing the gavel to President Dan Gallagher, congratulated him and expressed, in behalf of the Board, pleasure at the justly deserved honor and confidence in the integrity and fairness of President Dan Gallagher.

Whereupon, President Dan Gallagher, in taking the Chair, and assuming his new duties, addressed the Board as follows:

"First may I express my thanks to you, Mr. Colman, for placing my name in nomination for this all-important post of President of the Board of Supervisors, and for the compliment that was paid to my family. May I further express my thanks to all of the members of the Board of Supervisors for electing me unanimously to this high office. My hope is that this expression of confidence you have placed in me will never wane. That cooperation at all times will be the theme

of our endeavors. Cooperation with one another—cooperation with the new administration that is about to come into office today—moreover, cooperation with the People of the City of San Francisco. From the display of temperament experienced at the caucus on Tuesday and again here today will lead us to believe that it will exist during our tenure of office—that all petty jealousies and political manipulations will be forever forgotten—that we will all unite to work for the common interests of the taxpayers of this city. From the list of committees you will note that I have tried to be fair in appointments to each of you. My belief is that every one of you is qualified to be chairman of all important committees. I have tried to be fair by placing each one on one important committee without a feeling of political judgment. Again my thanks and I assure you that while I have the best interest of all I know that you will work harmoniously with me and the new administration to an end that we will in the years to come reap a harvest of good will of the electorate of this, the Queen City of the Pacific Coast.”

Supervisor Mancuso, on being presented to the Board, and to the citizens present, addressed the Board as follows:

“I am very grateful to the people of San Francisco for electing me to the Board of Supervisors at this opportune time. Being fully aware of the many urgent problems facing the City and County of San Francisco, as well as the fact that the people are expecting things ‘to be done’ by the incoming Mayor, District Attorney as well as the Board of Supervisors, I will devote my best efforts and experience obtained in participating in civic and community affairs in the many years past to do everything possible to aid in the accomplishment of the many problems that are now facing our community.

“In this behalf I pledge to the new Mayor, Roger Lapham, and to the President of the Board of Supervisors, Dan Gallagher, my utmost support and cooperation in solving our immediate problems as well as aiding in any progressive and constructive program that might be presented in the interest of our community’s development.

“I am aware of the many immediate problems facing San Francisco, including the street-car problem; the traffic congestion and inadequate housing facilities; and our obsolete sewer situation and the necessity of taking immediate steps towards looking forward to a post-war plan.

“These matters must receive our immediate attention, even if only a temporary solution is the first step, but arrangements must be made for the permanent solution of the problems. With this thought in mind I will work with the present Board and attempt to solve these and other problems.

“I wish to take this opportunity of again expressing to my many friends who worked in behalf of my candidacy my sincere thanks for their kind thoughts expressed as to my ability to assist in solving San Francisco’s present problems.”

The President then presented Supervisor Sullivan, who spoke briefly, saying:

“Mr. Chairman, Dan Gallagher, Members of the Board of Supervisors, and my fellow Americans:

“I am very happy today to be officially a member of the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco. I know that my wife is happy and that my boy in the United States Army Air Force is happy.

“I would like to celebrate this occasion, but feel the time for celebration is when this war is over and when we have won it.

“I am going to be a Supervisor of all the peoples of San Francisco,



whether they be rich or poor, Jew or Gentile, Catholic or Protestant, laborer or capitalist. I am going to represent all of you all of the time.

"I wish all of you a successful administration."

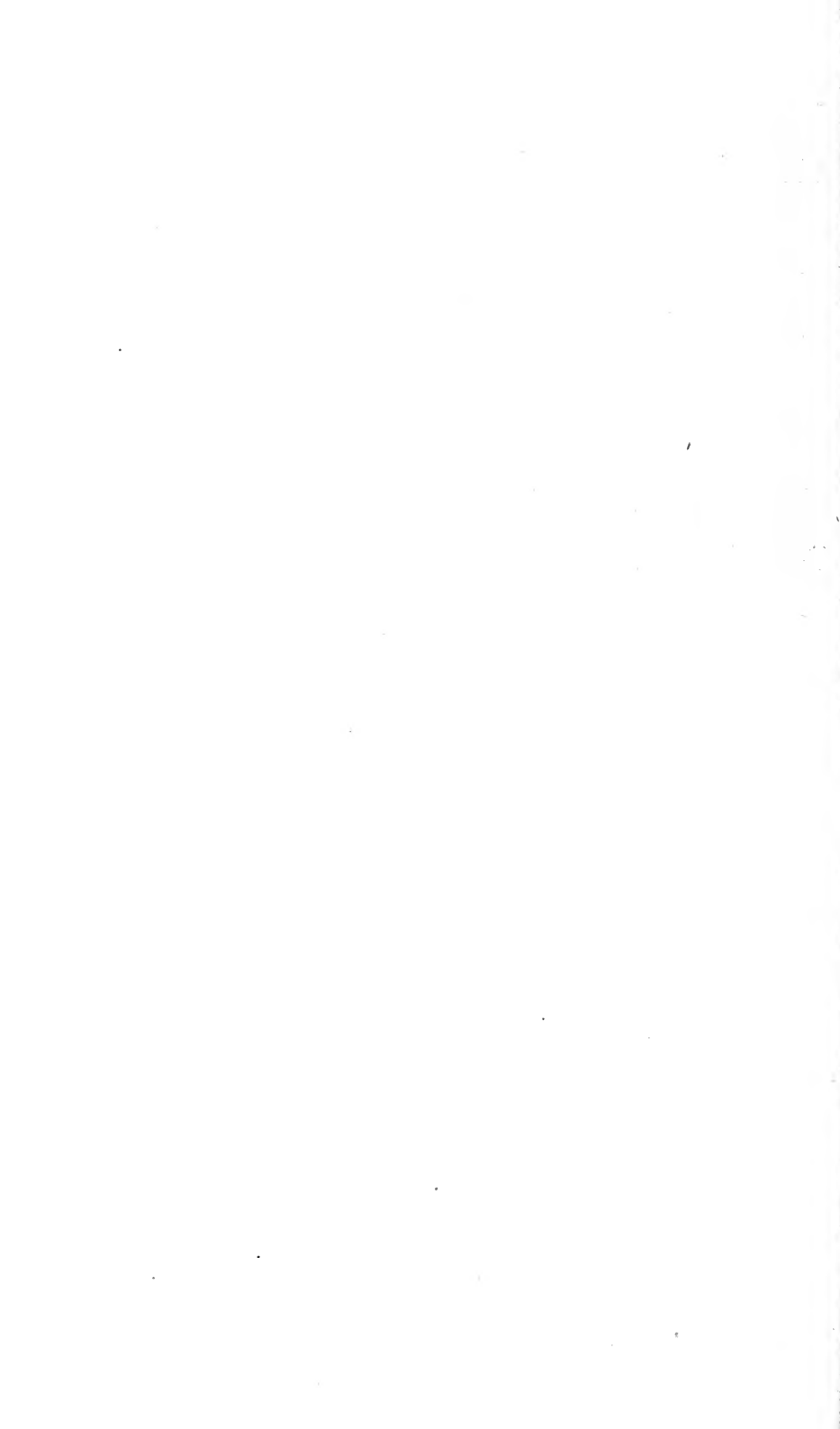

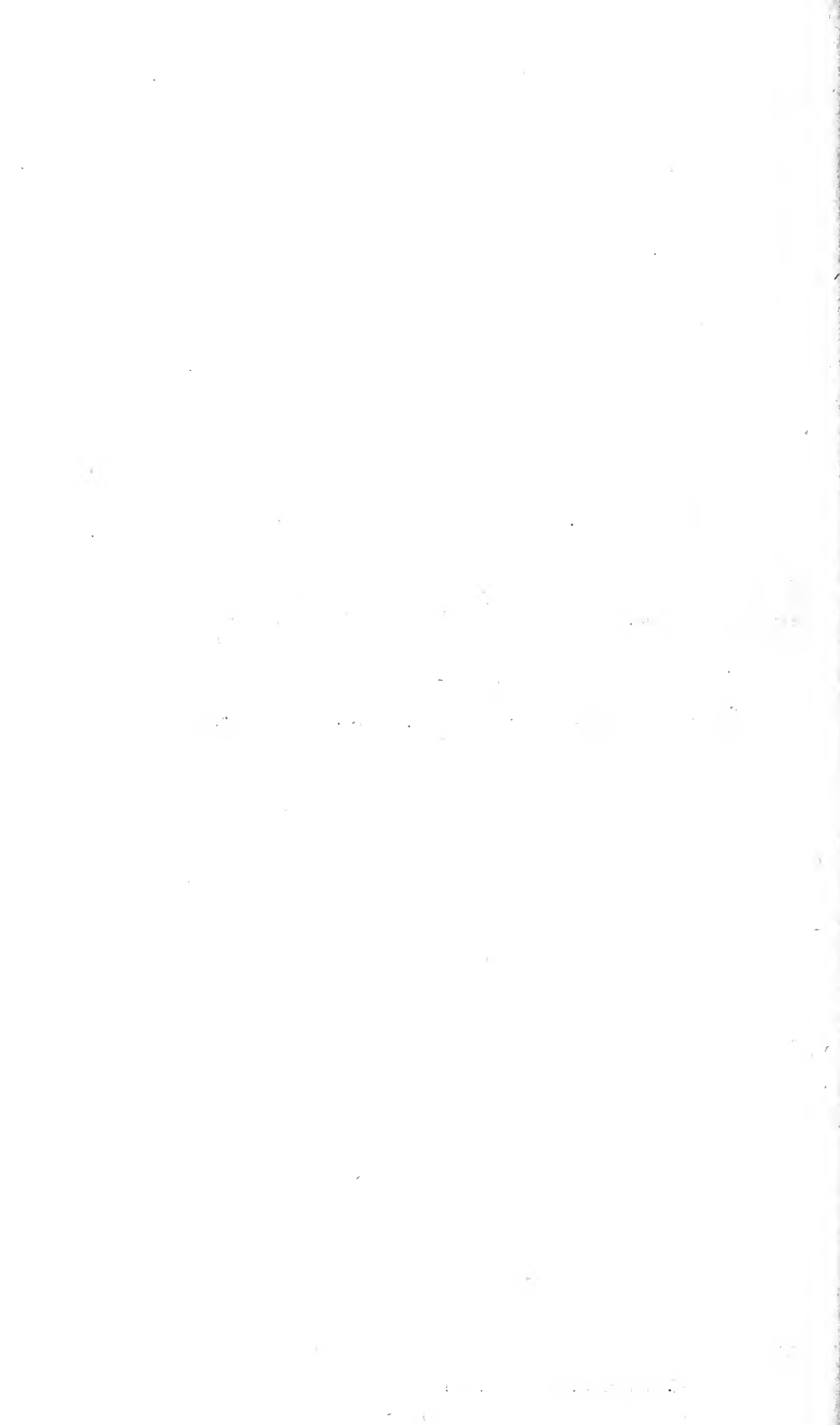

The Board of Supervisors met in regular session.

## CALLING THE ROLL.

The roll was called and the following Supervisors were noted present:  
Supervisors Brown, Colman, Gallagher, Gartland, MacPhee, Mancuso,  
Meyer, Sullivan, Uhl—9.

Absent: Supervisors Green, Mead—2.

Quorum present.

President Dan Gallagher presiding.

Supervisors Green and Mead excused from attendance because of illness.

## APPROVAL OF JOURNAL.

The Journal of Proceedings of the meeting of December 27, 1943, was considered read and approved.

## Presentation of His Honor the Mayor.

During the proceedings, the Chair presented to the members of the Board and to the citizens present, his Honor Mayor Roger D. Lapham, who was present in the chambers.

Mayor Lapham addressed the Board briefly, expressing his pleasure at being present, and stating that he expected to visit the Board often. He was trying to learn as much as he could, as rapidly as possible.

## Communications.

The following recommendation of Public Health and Welfare Committee, heretofore Passed for Second Reading, was taken up:

**Amending Municipal Code to Provide for Hospitalization and Medical and Surgical Care of Wives and Minor Children Under One Year of Age of Non-Commissioned Members of the United States Armed Forces During the War in Which the United States Is Now Engaged.**

(Series of 1939)

Bill No. 2695, Ordinance No. 2570, as follows:

Amending Section 150, Article III, Chapter V, Part II of the San Francisco Municipal Code to provide for the hospitalization and medical and surgical care of wives and minor children under one year of age of non-commissioned members of the United States Armed Forces during the war in which the United States is now engaged.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco as follows:

Section 1. Section 150, Article III, Chapter V, Part II of the San Francisco Municipal Code, is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 150. Admission to San Francisco Hospital and Allied Institutions. There shall be admitted to the San Francisco Hospital, including the Isolation Division and the Hassler Health Home, the following:

(a) An indigent sick person of the City and County of San Francisco who possesses the required residence qualifications, upon application and after investigation and approval by the Director of Public Health;

(b) A psychopath, narcotic addict or habitual inebriate temporarily in custody;

(c) A physically defective and physically handicapped person under the age of eighteen (18) years when the parents or guardian of such person are not financially able to secure proper care or treatment and when such person's admission and treatment has been duly authorized in the manner provided by law;

(d) A prisoner confined to the City or County Jail who requires medical or surgical treatment necessitating hospitalization where such treatment cannot be furnished or supplied at such jail when any Court of the City and County shall have ordered the removal of such prisoner to the City and County hospital (and said prisoner elects not to furnish such treatment at his own expense);

(e) A dependent, or partially dependent, poor sick person, who possesses the required residential qualifications;

(f) A person in need of immediate hospitalization on account of accident or sudden sickness or injury or by reason of sickness or injury caused by or arising in a sudden public emergency or calamity or disaster;

(g) A person in the active stages of tuberculosis, in wards established for the treatment of such persons;

(h) A person to be quarantined or isolated in the city and county hospital with a contagious, communicable or infectious disease;

(i) An expectant mother who is unable to pay for her care and the cost of her maintenance (and care shall be paid by and be a proper charge against the county of her residence);

(j) An indigent sick or dependent poor person from another county which lacks the proper facilities for the caring of such patients (and

care shall be paid by and be a proper charge against the county of which said person is a resident);

(k) *A city and county employee who is judged by the retirement board to have suffered an injury arising out of and in the course of his employment by the city and county, when hospitalization is reasonably required to cure and relieve the effects of such injury; and, during the war the United States of America is now engaged in, San Francisco civilian defense volunteer members who are judged by the retirement board to have suffered an injury arising out of and in the course of performance of duties in connection with San Francisco civilian defense, when hospitalization is reasonably required to cure and relieve the effects of such injury.*

(l) A person sent by the Immigration authorities of the United States Government (under such conditions as may be contracted for between the Director of Public Health and the United States Government);

(m) Provided, nothing in this section shall be construed as restraining the Director of Public Health from obeying or carrying out or giving effect to any law that may exist or be hereafter passed, relating to the hospitalization of patients in county hospitals which may affect the San Francisco Hospital, including the Isolation Division and the Hassler Health Home.

(n) *During the war in which the United States is now engaged, and for six months thereafter, a wife or minor child under one year of age of a non-commissioned member of the United States Armed Forces when the City and County is reimbursed from funds appropriated by Congress for the hospitalization and care of such person.*

**Requesting State Lands Commission to Consent to Stipulation by Attorney General for State of California or to Consent to Judgments Permitting United States Government to Acquire in Fee Simple Title to Treasure Island, and Waiving Compensation or Damages Arising Out of Said Acquisition.**

(Series of 1939)

Proposal No. 3778, Resolution No. 3778, as follows:

Whereas, the City and County of San Francisco is about to enter into certain agreements with the Army and with the Navy of the United States relative to the settlement of the pending litigation between the Government of the United States and the City and County of San Francisco involving the taking of Treasure Island by the Government of the United States for military purposes; and

Whereas, the consummation of said agreements depends to a large

extent upon the Government of the United States obtaining title, in fee simple absolute, to Treasure Island; and

Whereas, the State of California has by proper legislative action ceded to the City and County of San Francisco said Treasure Island for airport purposes, reserving unto the people of the State of California the right to fish in the waters surrounding said Island and reserving to the State all deposits of mineral including oil and gas on said land granted; and

Whereas, by subsequent action the Legislature of the State of California granted permission to the City and County of San Francisco to permit the use of said Treasure Island by the United States of America for military and naval purposes; and

Whereas, it has been definitely determined that there are no deposits of minerals, oil or gas on said Treasure Island; and

Whereas, the Government of the United States has by decree of the District Court of the United States, Northern District of California, Southern Division, in that certain action No. 22164-W, vested possession of Treasure Island in said government for military purposes, and the same is now occupied by the United States naval forces; and

Whereas, it is provided in Section 111 of the Governmental Code of California that the Legislature of the State of California consents to the purchase or condemnation by the United States of any tract of land within the State for the purpose of erecting forts, magazines, arsenals, dockyards and other needful buildings, reserving the authority to serve and execute process and the State's entire power of taxation as provided in said article; and

Whereas, it is to be provided in said agreements to be entered into between the City and County of San Francisco and said United States Army and said United States Navy that the said Army and Navy will do and perform certain necessary and beneficial work at San Francisco Airport in San Mateo County, said improvements being presently required in the defense of the nation and in peacetime prove of uses and great benefit to all the people, on condition that the United States Government obtains title, in fee simple absolute, to said Treasure Island; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, by this Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco, That the Division of State Lands—State Lands Commission, by resolution, or otherwise, express its consent to the Attorney General to execute in behalf of the State any and all stipulations, or consent to judgments or decrees to be entered in the court, so as to permit the Government to obtain an estate in fee simple absolute in said Treasure Island waiving compensation or damages arising out of said acquisition; be it

Further Resolved, That certified copies of this resolution be forwarded to each member of State Lands Commission and the Attorney General.

(Series of 1939)

Bill No. 2701, Ordinance No. . . . . , as follows:

Authorizing the entering into and execution of an agreement between the City and United States of America for the uses and benefit of the Army, wherein the Government will obligate itself to construct and complete additions to the existing NW/SE landing strip at the San Francisco Airport in San Mateo County as part consideration for the City waiving any claim for damages arising out of the eminent domain proceedings condemning Treasure Island and 85 acres at the San Francisco Airport in San Mateo County.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco, as follows:

Section 1. That an agreement be entered into in behalf of the City and County of San Francisco by the Mayor and the Public Utilities Commission with the United States of America for the uses and benefit of the Army. The agreement shall provide, among other things, that the Government shall undertake to construct and complete an addition to the existing NW/SE landing strip at the San Francisco Airport in San Mateo County to produce a landing strip 1500' by 8000' with a 1000' extension at the southeast end filled to approximate grade and the 1000' extension to be left rough graded but free of obstructions and adequate for the extension of the existing NW/SE runway to a total length not exceeding 9000 feet, and that the Government shall alter and extend the existing paved NW/SE runway so that for a width of 150 feet it shall have a minimum length of 7000 feet with a 1000-foot stabilized clear zone at the southeast end thereof and provision for an aggregate of 40,000 square yards of parking apron with necessary taxiways connecting the ends of the runway to the proposed parking apron and an adequate drainage system, as well as the extension of the existing night lighting system to provide permanent contact lighting for the runway. The agreement shall provide that the improvements described shall revert to and become the property of the City and County six months after the termination of the present existing emergency.

Section 2. The City under the agreement will obligate itself and agree to release and discharge the Government from any and all actions, causes of action, rights or claims to compensation or damages for or arising from the taking of the property known as Treasure Island in San Francisco Bay and now subject to that certain proceeding in eminent domain entitled United States of America v. 380 acres of tidelands and submerged lands, pending in the United States District Court for the Northern District of California, Southern Division, and numbered 22164-W, and from the taking of certain property in San Mateo County, California, commonly known as a portion of the San Francisco Airport and now subject to a similar proceeding in eminent domain entitled United States of America v. 118 acres of land, pending in the aforesaid Court and numbered 22650-S. The City will agree to execute, through the City Attorney, or otherwise, all necessary instruments, stipulations and consents to effectuate such waiver, release and discharge as may be required or deemed necessary by the Government.

The City will further obligate itself and agree that the Army may have full use of the facilities to be constructed during the present existing emergency and for a period of six months thereafter as defined in that certain lease entered into the 5th day of February, 1942, and amendments thereto, which said lease shall be kept in full force and effect during the term therein created, and after the termination of the existing emergency, Army shall, in the event of any future states of war or unlimited emergency or emergencies proclaimed by the President of the United States, be and become entitled without rental or other compensation, to exclusively occupy and use the improvements to be constructed and in peacetime Army shall be permitted to make normal use of the facilities of the Airport without charge.

Section 3. The exact terms of the agreement to be entered into are contained in that certain document before this Board entitled "Contract between the United States of America and the City and County of San Francisco [The Army]" undated but consisting of thirteen sections and eight pages, and Exhibits A and B attached thereto, to which specific reference is hereby made and herein incorporated as if set out at length.

Section 4. The City Attorney is hereby requested, directed and authorized to execute any and all documents required under the agreement to cause complete satisfaction of all claims and demands of the City to be entered in the two actions at law described in this ordinance.

Section 5. This ordinance is enacted pursuant to Resolution No. 5939 of the Public Utilities Commission. The Mayor, and the Clerk of the Board attesting the signature of the Mayor, and the members of the Public Utilities Commission are hereby authorized and directed to sign the said agreement in behalf of the City and County of San Francisco.

Authorizing the entering into and execution of an agreement between the City and United States of America for the uses and benefit of the Navy, wherein the Government will obligate itself to continue and complete construction of certain improvements so as to provide a usable seaplane terminal and operating base at the San Francisco Airport in San Mateo County as part consideration for the City waiving any claim for damages arising out of the eminent domain proceedings condemning Treasure Island and 85 acres at the San Francisco Airport in San Mateo County.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco, as follows:

Section 1. That an agreement be entered into in behalf of the City and County of San Francisco by the Mayor and the Public Utilities Commission with the United States of America for the uses and benefit of the Navy. The agreement shall provide, among other things, that the Government has undertaken and will complete the construction at the San Francisco Airport in San Mateo County, so as to provide for war purposes, a usable seaplane terminal and operating base the following structures and improvements: (a) Reclamation, filling and grading work; (b) Buildings usable for administration, terminal, cafeteria, storage and shop purposes; (c) One seaplane type hangar, with shop and office lean-tos; (d) Dope shop; (e) Heating plant; (f) Gasoline storage facilities of approximately 100,000 gallons capacity; (g) Marine railway or ramp, usable for transporting seaplanes from the water; (h) Four loading floats, usable for air passenger and air cargo; (i) Pavement, roadway, utility, drainage and other facilities. All of said improvements with land on which they are situated shall become the property of the City within twenty-four months after the termination by appropriate action by the President or of the Congress of the United States of the national emergency proclaimed by the President on May 27, 1941, or at such earlier time as the Secretary of the Navy declares that said property is no longer needed for naval purposes.

Section 2. The City under the agreement will obligate itself and agree to release and discharge the Government from any claims to compensation or damages arising out of that certain eminent domain proceeding entitled United States of America v. 380 acres of tidal lands and submerged lands, No. 22164-W, pending in the United States District Court for the Northern District of California, Southern Division, which suit embraces the condemnation of Treasure Island in San Francisco Bay, and in the eminent domain proceeding entitled United States of America v. 118 acres of land, No. 22650-S, in which certain lands of the Airport are sought to be condemned, will in any decree of condemnation obtained in the latter action stipulate that the Government is to have an estate in fee until the expiration of a period of twenty-four months after the termination by appropriate action of the President or of the Congress of the United States of the national emergency proclaimed by the President on May 27, 1941, or until such earlier time as the Secretary of the Navy declares said property is no longer needed for naval purposes, and upon such event the said real property and all the structures and facilities herein described shall be and become the property of the City in fee simple absolute. The Navy shall have the right, without rental or other compensation in peace times to the normal use of the facilities of the seaplane base without interfering with the rights of those claiming under the City by license, lease, permit, or contract. The City obligates itself to obtain from the State of California similar waivers, release and discharge of the Government in respect to the Treasure Island property, as the City has obligated itself to do.

Section 3. The exact terms of the agreement to be entered into are contained in that certain document before this Board entitled "Tentative Draft of Agreement Between Navy and San Francisco," consisting of fourteen sections and ten pages, to which specific reference is hereby made and herein incorporated as if set out at length.

Section 4. The City Attorney is hereby requested, directed and authorized to sign and file any and all documents required by the Government in either or both of the eminent domain proceedings to bring about the results described in the agreement.

Section 5. This ordinance is enacted pursuant to Resolution No. 5940 of the Public Utilities Commission. The Mayor, and the Clerk of the Board attesting the signature of the Mayor, and the members of the Public Utilities Commission are hereby authorized and directed to

sign the said agreement in behalf of the City and County of San Francisco.

Twenty-fifth Street between Texas Street and Pennsylvania Avenue, including the intersection of Twenty-fifth and Mississippi Streets, by the construction of a sewer and appurtenances.

The assessment district hereby approved is described as follows:

The Director of Public Works does hereby set forth the district to be benefited by said contemplated work, and to be assessed to pay the costs and expenses thereof as follows:

Within the exterior boundary of those certain lots delineated, designated, and numbered respectively as:

Block 4224, Lots 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, 18, 19, 20, 21 and 22;

Block 4225, Lots 15, 16, 17, 18, 19, 20, 21, 22, 23 and 24;

Block 4288, Lot 1; and

Block 4290, Lots 1 and 5;

being designated on the maps and books of the Assessor of the City and County of San Francisco and upon the assessment book of the City and County of San Francisco current at the time of the inception of the proceedings for the above-mentioned improvement.

City aid will be extended where necessary to equalize assessment.

**Granting Market Street Railway Company Permission to Operate Motor Coaches Outbound Over, Upon and Along Phelps Street and Evans Avenue in the City and County of San Francisco.**

Resolved, That Market Street Railway Company, a corporation, be and it is hereby granted permission, revocable at the will of the Board

of Supervisors, to maintain and operate a public passenger motor coach service as a part of and supplementary to the motor coach service authorized by resolution of the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco Number 1486 (Series of 1939), regularly adopted and duly approved by the Mayor of said City and County of San Francisco on December 4, 1940, over, upon and along the hereinafter described route in the City and County of San Francisco, State of California, to-wit:

In a general southwesterly direction on Phelps Street from Third Street to Evans Avenue; thence in a general easterly direction on Evans Avenue to and across Third Street.

That said permit be and the same is hereby granted upon the terms and conditions hereinafter set forth, and the acceptance or use of said permit by said Market Street Railway Company shall be deemed to be an assent to all of said terms and conditions, and for the holding of said permit subject thereto, which said terms and conditions are as follows:

(a) That nothing herein contained shall be considered to be a franchise granted to said Market Street Railway Company to operate said motor coaches, nor shall the same ever become or ripen into a franchise, and that the permit herein granted shall at all times be revocable at the will of the Board of Supervisors, and, upon revocation of the same, all rights and privileges herein granted shall cease and terminate, and that the said permit or any of the privileges thereby granted or exercised thereunder shall not in any proceeding instituted by the City and County of San Francisco to acquire the system of said Market Street Railway Company be deemed an asset or thing of value to said system;

(b) That said motor coaches will at all times be operated by skilled operators and, in the operation of the same, the said Market Street Railway Company will comply with all state and municipal rules, laws and regulations relating to the operation of such motor coaches;

(c) Transfers shall be issued to and from the motor coaches operated over said street and avenue pursuant to this permit by and to the coach lines and street cars operated by said Company in accordance with its rules and regulations and to the same effect and in the same manner as transfers are now issued to and from the street cars and coaches of said Company.

## ROLL CALL FOR THE INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTIONS, BILLS AND COMMUNICATIONS NOT CONSIDERED OR REPORTED UPON BY A COMMITTEE.

### Post-War Employment Problem.

Supervisor Brown, under his name on Roll Call, pointed out the advisability of devising ways and means to meet the post-war employment problem. It is generally considered, he stated, that the war in Europe will probably end during the present year. The ending will undoubtedly create material changes in the economic situation in the United States. There may actually be some unemployment during the coming year. Certain war industries are already changing from three-shift to two-shift employment, which will release several thousand men from employment in the Bay Area. The Board of Supervisors, as the legislative body of San Francisco, should begin to give some thought to making provision for the employment of citizens of San Francisco who will be released from employment during the current and in the years to come. Legislation should be enacted to provide for financing a program of public works as part of the effort to meet post-war unemployment. Immediate work is available in certain fields; sewer reconstruction, street repair and street construction can be done. The entire problem should be referred to a committee of the Board of Supervisors. The committee should confer with elected officials of San Francisco and with civic leaders, leading to accumulation of suggestions for creating employment to tide over the men during the months immediately following the end of the war. Both the state and federal governments are considering programs along such lines.

*Matter referred to County, State and National Affairs Committee.*

Supervisor MacPhee, also speaking on same general subject, called attention to necessary street repairs. There are, he stated, about \$1,750,000 of delinquent street repairs in connection with Market Street Railway Company's repair program. The program has been heard several times in the Joint Finance and Public Utilities Committee. Supervisor MacPhee expressed the desire that the Market Street Railway Company put up money or a bond to assure that the work would be completed, if not now, at the completion of the emergency when manpower and equipment will be available. He urged the members of the County, State and National Affairs Committee to take cognizance of that situation.

Supervisor Uhl also addressed the Board on the same subject, and presented the following:

I submit the following post-war proposals in sequence to their importance.

1. Construction of modern, up-to-date sewer systems.
2. Acquisition by purchase South Basin tidelands and Candlestick

Point. Reclamation of tidelands by disposal of refuse and covering same by earth from Candlestick Point. Approved by Dr. Geiger. For past several years refuse matter has been disposed of by fill and cover system on Southern Pacific tidelands south of San Francisco. Several hundred thousand dollars of Southern Pacific tidelands have been reclaimed by refuse and garbage from San Francisco. Therefore, it will be good business to acquire the South Basin tidelands and reclaim same by the refuse and garbage from San Francisco and covered by earth from Candlestick Point.

3. A blight upon a vast tract of land exists at Butcher Town. Butcher Town has been located in the vicinity of Third and Evans Avenue for years. Butcher Town because of the odors from the abattoirs has retarded the growth of the section known as Butcher Town.

Butcher Town has outgrown its present location and should be moved ——— miles to the south adjacent to the area of reclaimed tidelands. It is a considerable distance to the residence section.

The city should acquire from the State the tidelands adjacent to Butcher Town and reclamation of said tidelands by refuse matter and garbage by fill and cover.

4. A municipal garage located on the block bounded by Grove, Hayes, Franklin and Van Ness. This block is now used as athletic field of the High School of Commerce. Honorable Thomas A. Brooks, Chief Administrative Officer, informs me it will be practical to construct a garage on this block and also be possible to continue the athletic activities of the High School of Commerce thereon.

The cost of building said garage, \$600,000, and accommodation of 500 automobiles and trucks.

5. An underpass on Market Street at Sixth Street and an underpass on Market Street at Tenth Street.

The model of such an underpass and how traffic moves on can be seen at foot of Market Street at The Embarcadero.

6. Tunnel at either Broadway or Lombard Street.

7. Widen Upper Market Street west of Castro Street and elimination of curves.

8. Erection of Court Building on block bounded by Polk, Larkin, Grove and Hayes and construction of garage in basement for use of the public.

9. Completion of the construction of Civic Center on south side of Fulton Street between Leavenworth and Hyde. Present condition is not in harmony with remainder of Civic Center and existing conditions have been an eyesore for upward of twenty years.

10. Low level bridge from Alameda Point to Hunter's Point.

11. In order to meet the competition of East Bay regarding speed at which motorists can reach Richmond, Piedmont, Berkeley, a similar "speed way" should be erected on this side of the Bay. It is a positive fact that when a San Franciscan moves to the east side of Bay said individual is lost to San Francisco. Whereas, moving to San Mateo retains said person's contact with San Francisco and for this reason:

*Proposal:* Elevated roadway from Folsom and Sixth Streets via Folsom to Potrero Avenue, via Potrero to San Bruno Avenue, via San Bruno Avenue to Bayshore Boulevard, and said elevated roadway to extend from Folsom and Sixth to Bayshore County Line. Such a structure will speed up traffic and will tie San Mateo and San Francisco more closely.

12. Narrow sidewalks on business thoroughfares, Kearny, Larkin, Polk, Fillmore, Mission, Haight, Bush, Pine, Geary and Post Streets.

Many will remember that there were trolley tracks on Taylor Street, Market to Post Streets. Car tracks were removed and sidewalk re-



duced from 15 feet to 9 feet. It converted Taylor Street into first class. Narrowing Taylor Street has not interfered with the pedestrian but has improved movement of traffic.

13. In order to meet the unemployment problem, which is inevitable, the State should pass legislation whereby a special sales tax of one cent should be provided for and accumulated exclusively for meeting the unemployment problem.

*Referred to County, State and National Affairs Committee.*

**Designating Supervisor Colman as Administrative Officer to Arrange for Interment of Indigent Veterans and to Authorize Expenditures Therefor.**

(Series of 1939)

Supervisor MacPhee presented:

Proposal No. 3782, Resolution No. 3782, as follows:

Whereas, Section 942 of the Military and Veterans' Code of California provides for the appointment by the Board of Supervisors of an administrative officer whose duty it shall be to provide decent burial for veterans, one of the requirements being that such administrative officer shall be an honorably discharged veteran; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That Jesse C. Colman, a member of this Board of Supervisors, who has honorably served in the United States Army, be and he is hereby designated as administrative officer for the purpose of arranging decent interment for veterans who die in the City and County of San Francisco without having sufficient means to defray the expenses for burial and for such other purposes as may be provided by law; and be it

Further Resolved, That Jesse C. Colman, be and he is hereby empowered to authorize expenditures from the moneys appropriated for the burial of indigent veterans.

*Adopted by the following vote:*

**Commending Senate Committee on Labor and Education for Its Consideration of Economic Problems of "White Collar Workers."**

(Series of 1939)

Proposal No. 3783, Resolution No. 3783, as follows:

Whereas, due to the ever-increasing cost of living undue burdens have been placed upon the "white collar workers"; and

Whereas, President Roosevelt has stated that these workers must not become the forgotten men and women of our war economy; and

Whereas, in conformity with the President's statement the Senate Committee on Labor and Education has declared that a meeting on this matter will be held by the sub-Committee on War Time Health and Education on January 25, 26 and 27, 1944; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That this Board of Supervisors takes this opportunity to commend the Senate Committee on Labor and Education for making inquiries into the problems of "White Collar Workers" by means of public hearings to be held by the Sub-Committee on War Time Health and Education on January 25, 26, 27, 1944; and it does hereby memorialize said Committee to bring to light the true economic plight of the "White Collar Workers" and to make recommendations for legislation to adjust these conditions; and be it

Further Resolved, That copies of this resolution be forwarded to Senator Elbert Thomas, Senator Claude Pepper and to California's Congressmen and Senators.

Whereas, legislation enacted by the Legislature of the State of California and the Congress of the United States directly affects the revenues and financial structure of the City and County of San Francisco, as well as many other matters of vital importance to this City and County; and

Whereas, It is necessary that the City and County of San Francisco make representations before the Federal and State legislative bodies, as well as boards and commissions, on issues affecting said City and County of San Francisco; and

Whereas, it is necessary that constant contact be maintained by said City and County of San Francisco with various Federal and State agencies; and

Whereas, the said City and County of San Francisco requires the services of one experienced and skilled in legislative matters and in making representations for and on behalf of the City and County of San Francisco before legislative bodies, boards and commissions; and

Whereas, this Board is desirous of employing such person for the purposes herein stated, and to advise and make recommendations to this Board on legislative matters; and

Whereas, Jefferson E. Peyser is a practicing attorney in the City and County of San Francisco of unquestioned ability and skill, and is particularly qualified and highly skilled in legislative procedure and practice by reason of having been a member of this Board, a member of the State Legislature for a period of four years, and having acted as a legislative counsel for a period of six years; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the City and County of San Francisco does hereby employ said Jefferson E. Peyser as Legislative Counsel for the City and County of San Francisco; and be it

Further Resolved, That a contract be executed between the City and County of San Francisco and said Jefferson E. Peyser, subject to the approval of this Board, which contract shall provide for the term of employment, compensation to be paid, and such other matters as may be deemed necessary or proper; and be it

Further Resolved, That all further and necessary procedure be taken to effectuate the purposes of this resolution.

**In Memoriam—William L. Wilson, Employee With Municipal Railway on Military Leave.**

**Amending Article 16, Chapter VIII, Part II, of the San Francisco Municipal Code, by Adding Thereto Section 1138.1, Providing That It Shall Be Unlawful for Any Driver, Proprietor or Lessee of a Taxicab to Refuse to Convey or Transport Any Person Within the City Limits.**

(Series of 1939)

Supervisor MacPhee presented:

Bill No. 2703, Ordinance No. . . . ., as follows:

Amending Article 16, Chapter VIII, Part II, of the San Francisco Municipal Code, by adding thereto Section 1138.1, providing that it shall be unlawful for any driver, proprietor or lessee of a taxicab to refuse to convey or transport any person within the city limits; providing for a sign to be placed on the exterior of each taxicab to such effect; and providing a penalty for the violation thereof.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco, as follows:

Section 1. Article 16, Chapter VIII, Part II, of the San Francisco Municipal Code, is hereby amended by adding thereto Section 1138.1, to read as follows:

Section 1138.1. *Unlawful to Refuse to Convey or Transport Within City Limits.* It shall be unlawful for any driver, proprietor or lessee of any taxicab to refuse to convey or transport any person, at the rates provided for in this Article, within the city limits when request is made for said purpose, unless previously engaged; or, having undertaken to convey or transport such person, shall omit or neglect so to do. The Chief of Police shall cause each proprietor or lessee of a taxicab to place a sign in a conspicuous and uniform place on the exterior of each taxicab to read as follows: "This taxicab is for public hire. Notify Chief of Police if driver refuses to convey you to any destination within the city limits." Said sign shall be of such design and size as the Chief of Police shall prescribe. Any person violating any of the provisions of this Section shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof the Chief of Police shall revoke the license of the driver and the operating permit for the taxicab.

*Referred to Police Committee.*

#### **Appointment of Director, Joint Highway District No. 10.**

President Dan Gallagher announced that he had been notified that a vacancy had occurred on the Board of Directors of Joint Highway District No. 10, and if there was no objection, he would appoint Supervisor Meyer as Director of that District.

#### **Remarks by Supervisor Mancuso.**

Supervisor Mancuso, under his name on Roll Call, expressed his interest in the remarks by Supervisor Brown relative to post-war problems. The Board of Supervisors must act as a body to meet post-war problems, otherwise San Francisco will not be prepared for the condition when it does come. He hoped that the Board would take advantage of the situation as outlined by Supervisor Brown, and he would do everything possible to provide for the enactment of legislation for the improvement or benefit of the City and County of San Francisco. Supervisor Mancuso pledged to his Honor the Mayor 100 per cent cooperation.

#### **Greetings to Supervisor Mead.**

Supervisor MacPhee requested that the Clerk express to Supervisor Dewey Mead, the Board's condolences at his illness and the wish for a speedy recovery.

*No objection, and so ordered.*

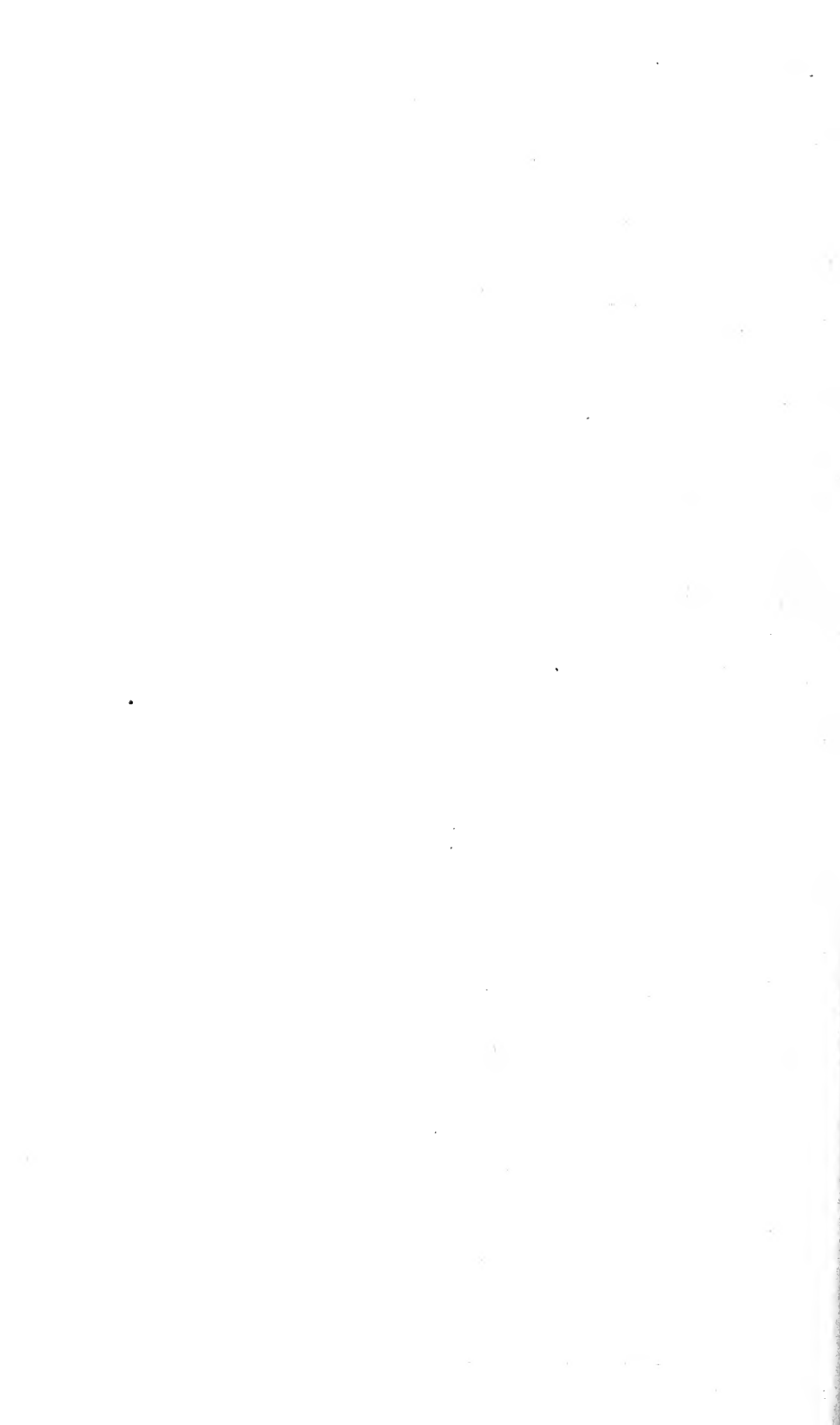

## Authorizing Attendance of Representative of the Board at Meeting of the California Highway Commission.

Supervisor Meyer announced that the California Highway Commission would meet in Sacramento on Thursday, January 20, 1944, at 9:00 a. m. The Board should be represented at that meeting.

### Amending Section 108, Article 2, Part III, of the San Francisco Municipal Code, Providing for the Licensing of Circuses and Wild Animal Shows.

(Series of 1939)

Bill No. 2695A, Ordinance No. 2573, as follows:

Amending Section 108, Article 2, Part III, of the San Francisco Municipal Code, providing for the licensing of circuses and wild animal shows, by adding the word "operator" to those who shall obtain a

license; by amending the definition of a circus and repealing that of a wild animal show; and by providing for certain data to be set forth in the permit required from the Chief of Police.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco, as follows:

Section 1. Section 108, Article 2, Part III, of the San Francisco Municipal Code, is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 108. **Circuses.** Every owner, lessee or operator of a circus, as hereinafter defined in this Section, shall pay a license fee for each and every day any exhibition or performance is given therein according to the following schedule:

(a) Where the seating capacity is not more than thirty-five hundred (3,500) persons, the sum of One Hundred (\$100) Dollars for the first day and the sum of Seventy (\$70) Dollars for each additional day thereafter.

(b) Where the seating capacity is more than thirty-five hundred (3,500) persons, the sum of Five Hundred (\$500) Dollars for the first day and the sum of Three Hundred (\$300) Dollars for each additional day thereafter.

(c) For each side show in connection with or belonging to a circus, where a separate admission fee is charged or collected, the sum of Ten (\$10) Dollars a day.

(d) Where the circus is given in or about the Municipal Auditorium located at the Civic Center, and said auditorium is rented or leased at the regular rates usually charged therefor, the sum of Fifty (\$50) Dollars each day, with no additional license fee for any side show.

No additional license shall be required of such owner, lessee or operator of a circus for any team, wagon, truck, automobile, freight or passenger car or equipment that is a part of such circus and in actual use.

For the purpose of this Section, a circus is hereby defined to be an exhibition or entertainment at which feats of horsemanship, acrobatic feats, and trained or wild animals are exhibited or displayed, or any combination of same, for which exhibition or entertainment an admission fee is charged, and which exhibition or entertainment is conducted by a person having no regular established place of business in the City and County of San Francisco for the exhibition or display thereof. Provided, however, that the definition of a circus shall not include a rodeo exhibition or show which is licensed under the provisions of Section 84 of this Article, nor shall it be held to include pictorial representations or theatrical performances.

The Tax Collector shall not issue a license under the provisions of this Section unless the owner, lessee or operator of said circus shall obtain a permit to conduct the same from the Chief of Police and present to the Tax Collector such permit duly certified by the secretary of the Chief of Police. Said permit shall set forth the seating capacity of the circus, the date or dates of the year on which the exhibition or entertainment are to be held, and the number of side shows in connection with or belonging to such circus.

**Transfer of Lot 5-A, Assessor's Block 7201, at Southwest Corner of Parkmerced Tract, From Public Utilities Commission to Department of Public Works.**

Whereas, pursuant to the provisions of the Municipal Code, Part I, Sections 158 to 163, inclusive, the Department of Public Works requested the Mayor to arrange for transferring jurisdiction of certain San Francisco Water Department land, known as Lot 5-A in Assessor's Block 7201, San Francisco, from the Public Utilities Commission to the Department of Public Works; and

Whereas, the Director of Property has reported to the Mayor that said land has a steep slope, is not suitable for any buildings, is of nominal value, and can be more advantageously used by the Department of Public Works; and

Whereas, on January 10, 1944, the Public Utilities Commission adopted Resolution No. 5950, consenting to the transfer of jurisdiction of said land to the Department of Public Works, reserving however to said Commission a right of way across said lot 23 feet in width, being 11.5 feet each side of the center line between the two existing pipe lines of the San Francisco Water Department crossing said lot; subject also to the condition that in the event said land is disposed of by the City and County of San Francisco, then the City and County of San Francisco shall reserve the pipe line right of way above described together with all subterranean waters under said Lot 5-A as appurtenant to the real property described as San Francisco Parcel 55 in deed from Spring Valley Water Company to the City dated March 3, 1930, and recorded March 3, 1930, in Liber 2002 at page 1, Official Records of San Francisco, and for the purpose of protecting and augmenting the waters and water sources of Lake Merced, and also for the purpose of facilitating the supply and distribution of water to consumers in the City and County of San Francisco and vicinity; and

Whereas, the Mayor has recommended that said transfer be made; and

Whereas, this Board has considered the proposed transfer and hereby determines that said lot is no longer necessary for the purposes of the San Francisco Water Department except as to the reservation for said pipe lines and water rights and can be more advantageously used by the Department of Public Works partly as a site for a pumping plant and partly for the purpose of exchange for additional land required for said pumping plant; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the jurisdiction of said land be and is hereby transferred to the Department of Public Works, subject to said reservations.

**War Production Board Requested to Permit Resumption of Private Home Building in the San Francisco Bay Area.**

(Series of 1939)

Supervisor Uhl presented:

Proposal No. 3797, Resolution No. 3791, as follows:

Whereas, the official United States Census releases indicate that the San Francisco metropolitan counties have experienced since 1940 the greatest numerical civilian population increase among 137 metropolitan

areas of the nation, and it has been shown that a large percentage will remain in this area after the war; and

Whereas, the war housing program now nearing completion has provided only minimum and temporary shelter for a limited number of new residents; and

Whereas, there is a strong desire to check inflationary values of old homes by providing new housing to meet the demand of the San Francisco market for homes in the medium bracket; and

Whereas, there are responsible builders in the San Francisco congested production area who have capable organizations and construction crews of older men not adaptable to war production, and who are adequately financed to carry on a private program of reasonable proportions that would be beneficial in relieving the critical housing needs; and

Whereas, it will require some three to four months to prepare plans and develop sites for home building operations after authorization, before actual construction can get under way; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That this Board of Supervisors requests the War Production Board to remove immediately all restrictions including priorities of materials, allocations of housing units, and certifications of home buyers regulating home building so as to permit home building by private enterprise, using private capital, to supply sufficient new homes to overcome the dangerous shortage of housing in the San Francisco Bay Area; and

Further Resolved, That the War Production Board assign a representative to meet immediately with representatives of the San Francisco Bay Area home building industry to plan for the earliest possible resumption of unrestricted private home building in this critical area.

3. Erection of a fit and proper Juvenile Detention Home. That a good weather area be selected for the site, with sufficient area befitting a modern Juvenile Detention Home.

### Castro Street Car Schedule.

Supervisor MacPhee requested that the Clerk address a communication to the Market Street Railway Company, requesting that a better schedule be maintained on Castro Street. People are often required to wait as long as an hour for service, whereas the schedule is supposedly based on a five-minute headway.

*No objection, and so ordered.*

**Committee Consideration of Market Street Railway Company's  
Street Repair and Maintenance Obligations.**

Supervisor MacPhee called attention to the delinquency of Market Street Railway Company in its franchise obligations for repair and maintenance of portions of streets over which it operates. There have been several meetings of the Joint Finance and Public Utilities Committee to consider the matter, but it has been found difficult to get the committee together. Therefore, he would request the Board to set a definite time for a meeting of that committee.

Thereupon, the Chair, after brief discussion of the matter, announced that the Joint Committee on Finance and Public Utilities would meet on Friday, January 21, 1944, at 3:00 p. m.

**Construction of Inner Street Car Tracks on Market Street.**

Supervisor Uhl called attention to contract entered into between the Market Street Railway Company and the Public Utilities Commission, to provide for the reconstruction of the inner street car tracks on Market Street, west of Valencia Street, and the removal of the outer tracks. The Market Street Railway Company is anxious to go ahead with the work; the Utilities Commission is procrastinating. Supervisor Uhl requested that the matter be placed on the calendar for the Joint Committee.

Supervisor MacPhee objected. He agreed with the statement made by Supervisor Uhl, but pointed out that there was a discussion going on with the Office of Defense Transportation, Municipal Railway and the Market Street Railway Company, and until it was cleared up it would be foolish to do anything about it.

**ADJOURNMENT.**

There being no further business, the Board, at the hour of 2:30 p. m., adjourned.

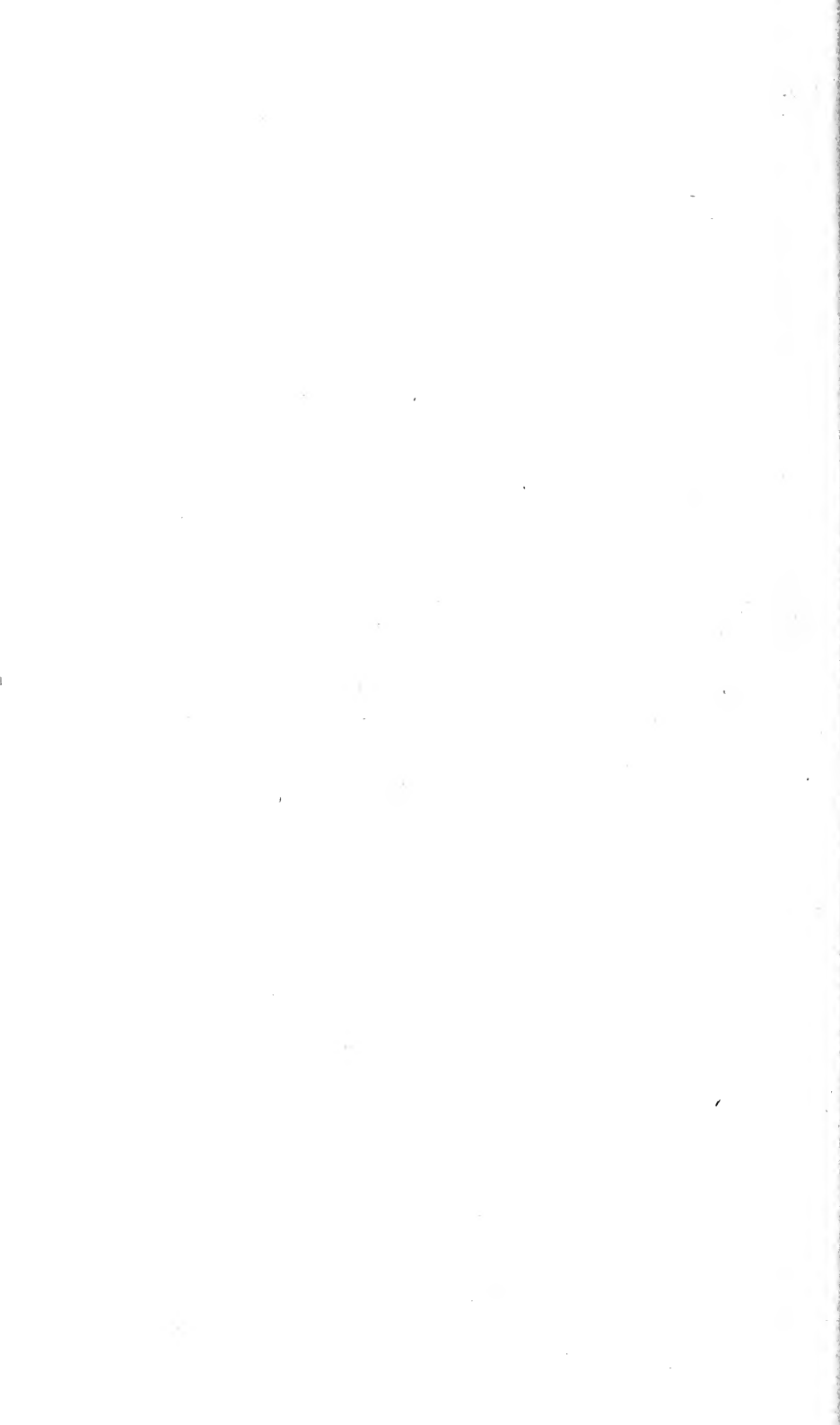

**Authorizing the Entering Into and Execution of an Agreement Between the City and United States of America for the Uses and Benefit of the Army, Wherein the Government Will Obligate Itself to Construct and Complete Additions to the Existing NW/SE Landing Strip at the San Francisco Airport in San Mateo County as Part Consideration for the City Waiving Any Claim for Damages Arising Out of the Eminent Domain Proceedings Condemning Treasure Island and 85 Acres at the San Francisco Airport in San Mateo County.**

(Series of 1939)

Bill No. 2701, Ordinance No. 2584, as follows:

Authorizing the entering into and execution of an agreement between the City and United States of America for the uses and benefit of the Army, wherein the Government will obligate itself to construct and complete additions to the existing NW/SE landing strip at the San Francisco Airport in San Mateo County as part consideration for the City waiving any claim for damages arising out of the eminent domain proceedings condemning Treasure Island and 85 acres at the San Francisco Airport in San Mateo County.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco, as follows:

Section 1. That an agreement be entered into in behalf of the City

and County of San Francisco by the Mayor and the Public Utilities Commission with the United States of America for the uses and benefit of the Army. The agreement shall provide, among other things, that the Government shall undertake to construct and complete an addition to the existing NW/SE landing strip at the San Francisco Airport in San Mateo County to produce a landing strip 1500' by 8000' with a 1000' extension at the southeast end filled to approximate grade and the 1000' extension to be left rough graded but free of obstructions and adequate for the extension of the existing NW/SE runway to a total length not exceeding 9000 feet, and that the Government shall alter and extend the existing paved NW/SE runway so that for a width of 150 feet it shall have a minimum length of 7000 feet with a 1000-foot stabilized clear zone at the southeast end thereof and provision for an aggregate of 40,000 square yards of parking apron with necessary taxiways connecting the ends of the runway to the proposed parking apron and an adequate drainage system, as well as the extension of the existing night lighting system to provide permanent contact lighting for the runway. The agreement shall provide that the improvements described shall revert to and become the property of the City and County six months after the termination of the present existing emergency.

Section 2. The City under the agreement will obligate itself and agree to release and discharge the Government from any and all actions, causes of action, rights or claims to compensation or damages for or arising from the taking of the property known as Treasure Island in San Francisco Bay and now subject to that certain proceeding in eminent domain entitled United States of America v. 380 acres of tide-lands and submerged lands, pending in the United States District Court for the Northern District of California, Southern Division, and numbered 22164-W, and from the taking of certain property in San Mateo County, California, commonly known as a portion of the San Francisco Airport and now subject to a similar proceeding in eminent domain entitled United States of America v. 118 acres of land, pending in the aforesaid Court and numbered 22650-S. The City will agree to execute, through the City Attorney, or otherwise, all necessary instruments, stipulations and consents to effectuate such waiver, release and discharge as may be required or deemed necessary by the Government. The City will further obligate itself and agree that the Army may have full use of the facilities to be constructed during the present existing emergency and for a period of six months thereafter as defined in that certain lease entered into the 5th day of February, 1942, and amendments thereto, which said lease shall be kept in full force and effect during the term therein created, and after the termination of the existing emergency, Army shall, in the event of any future states of war or unlimited emergency or emergencies proclaimed by the President of the United States, be and become entitled without rental or other compensation, to exclusively occupy and use the improvements to be constructed and in peacetime Army shall be permitted to make normal use of the facilities of the Airport without charge.

Section 3. The exact terms of the agreement to be entered into are contained in that certain document before this Board entitled "Contract between the United States of America and the City and County of San Francisco [The Army]" undated but consisting of thirteen sections and eight pages, and Exhibits A and B attached thereto, to which specific reference is hereby made and herein incorporated as if set out at length.

Section 4. The City Attorney is hereby requested, directed and authorized to execute any and all documents required under the agreement to cause complete satisfaction of all claims and demands of the City to be entered in the two actions at law described in this ordinance.

Section 5. This ordinance is enacted pursuant to Resolution No. 5939 of the Public Utilities Commission. The Mayor, and the Clerk of

the Board attesting the signature of the Mayor, and the members of the Public Utilities Commission are hereby authorized and directed to sign the said agreement in behalf of the City and County of San Francisco.

Bill No. 2702, Ordinance No. 2585, as follows:

Authorizing the entering into and execution of an agreement between the City and United States of America for the uses and benefit of the Navy, wherein the Government will obligate itself to continue and complete construction of certain improvements so as to provide a usable seaplane terminal and operating base at the San Francisco Airport in San Mateo County as part consideration for the City waiving any claim for damages arising out of the eminent domain proceedings condemning Treasure Island and 85 acres at the San Francisco Airport in San Mateo County.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco, as follows:

Section 1. That an agreement be entered into in behalf of the City and County of San Francisco by the Mayor and the Public Utilities Commission with the United States of America for the uses and benefit of the Navy. The agreement shall provide, among other things, that the Government has undertaken and will complete the construction at the San Francisco Airport in San Mateo County, so as to provide for war purposes, a usable seaplane terminal and operating base the following structures and improvements: (a) Reclamation, filling and grading work; (b) Buildings usable for administration, terminal, cafeteria, storage and shop purposes; (c) One seaplane type hangar, with shop and office lean-tos; (d) Dope shop; (e) Heating plant; (f) Gasoline storage facilities of approximately 100,000 gallons capacity; (g) Marine railway or ramp, usable for transporting seaplanes from the water; (h) Four loading floats, usable for air passenger and air cargo; (i) Pavement, roadway, utility, drainage and other facilities. All of said improvements with land on which they are situated shall become the property of the City within twenty-four months after the termination by appropriate action by the President or of the Congress of the United States of the national emergency proclaimed by the President on May 27, 1941, or at such earlier time as the Secretary of the Navy declares that said property is no longer needed for naval purposes.

Section 2. The City under the agreement will obligate itself and agree to release and discharge the Government from any claims to compensation or damages arising out of that certain eminent domain proceeding entitled United States of America v. 380 acres of tidal lands and submerged lands, No. 22164-W, pending in the United States District Court for the Northern District of California, Southern Division,

which suit embraces the condemnation of Treasure Island in San Francisco Bay, and in the eminent domain proceeding entitled United States of America v. 118 acres of land, No. 22650-S, in which certain lands of the Airport are sought to be condemned, will in any decree of condemnation obtained in the latter action stipulate that the Government is to have an estate in fee until the expiration of a period of twenty-four months after the termination by appropriate action of the President or of the Congress of the United States of the national emergency proclaimed by the President on May 27, 1941, or until such earlier time as the Secretary of the Navy declares said property is no longer needed for naval purposes, and upon such event the said real property and all the structures and facilities herein described shall be and become the property of the City in fee simple absolute. The Navy shall have the right, without rental or other compensation in peace times to the normal use of the facilities of the seaplane base without interfering with the rights of those claiming under the City by license, lease, permit, or contract. The City obligates itself to obtain from the State of California similar waivers, release and discharge of the Government in respect to the Treasure Island property, as the City has obligated itself to do.

Section 3. The exact terms of the agreement to be entered into are contained in that certain document before this Board entitled "Tentative Draft of Agreement Between Navy and San Francisco," consisting of fourteen sections and ten pages, to which specific reference is hereby made and herein incorporated as if set out at length.

Section 4. The City Attorney is hereby requested, directed and authorized to sign and file any and all documents required by the Government in either or both of the eminent domain proceedings to bring about the results described in the agreement.

Section 5. This ordinance is enacted pursuant to Resolution No. 5940 of the Public Utilities Commission. The Mayor, and the Clerk of the Board attesting the signature of the Mayor, and the members of the Public Utilities Commission are hereby authorized and directed to sign the said agreement in behalf of the City and County of San Francisco.

Twenty-fifth Street between Texas Street and Pennsylvania Avenue, including the intersection of Twenty-fifth and Mississippi Streets, by the construction of a sewer and appurtenances.

The assessment district hereby approved is described as follows:

The Director of Public Works does hereby set forth the district to be benefited by said contemplated work, and to be assessed to pay the costs and expenses thereof as follows:

Within the exterior boundary of those certain lots delineated, designated, and numbered respectively as:

Block 4224, Lots 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, 18, 19, 20, 21 and 22;

Block 4225, Lots 15, 16, 17, 18, 19, 20, 21, 22, 23 and 24;

Block 4288, Lot 1; and

Block 4290, Lots 1 and 5;

being designated on the maps and books of the Assessor of the City and County of San Francisco and upon the assessment book of the City and County of San Francisco current at the time of the inception of the proceedings for the above-mentioned improvement.

City aid will be extended where necessary to equalize assessment.

Section 2. Bill 2594, Ordinance 2487 (Series of 1939) is hereby repealed.

## Discussion.

The Public Defender, on being granted the privilege of the floor, explained the need for the requested additional employment in his office, and stated that in addition to the larger number of cases referred to him by the courts, he was called on to defend many members of the armed forces, especially members of the United States Navy. His present staff was unable properly to care for the increased load.

Supervisor MacPhee, in reply to inquiry by Supervisor Colman for the reason for his dissenting from the recommendation of the Finance Committee, announced that he was opposed to the creation of any new employments unless he was convinced that such employments were absolutely necessary. He was not so convinced in this case. He felt that with the lack of unemployment, and with increased compensations being paid, there should be a decrease in the Public Defender's work, rather than an increase.

Thereupon, Supervisor Colman announced that he was in accord with the views of the Chairman of the Finance Committee about new employments. He would like the opportunity of considering the matter further. He would have to vote against passage at the present time. For that reason, he would move that consideration be postponed for one week in order to allow time for further consideration. Motion seconded by Supervisor Brown.

Supervisor Mead objected to postponement. There has been a definite increase in the work of the Public Defenders' office. The Public Defender must accept cases referred to him by the courts. In his opinion, that office has always been under manned, and the Public Defender should be given the additional employment. The legislation should be approved without delay.

Supervisor Green agreed with the opinions expressed by Supervisor Mead.

Supervisor Mancuso also opposed postponement. He had investigated the needs of the office and was convinced that the employment was necessary.

### Requesting Report and Recommendations on Various Proposals in Connection With the Post-War Planning Program.

(Series of 1939)

Proposal No. 3798, Resolution No. 3796, as follows:

Resolved, That in connection with the post-war planning program, recommendation and report be procured on the proposals hereinafter set forth from the source as indicated below:

1. Construction of modern, up-to-date sewer systems.—Chief Administrative Officer, Dept. of Health & City Planning Commission.

2. Acquisition by purchase South Basin tidelands and Candlestick Point. Reclamation of tidelands by disposal of refuse and covering same by earth from Candlestick Point. Approved by Dr. Geiger. For past several years refuse matter has been disposed of by fill and cover system on Southern Pacific tidelands south of San Francisco. Several hundred thousand dollars of Southern Pacific tidelands have been reclaimed by refuse and garbage from San Francisco. Therefore, it will be good business to acquire the South Basin tidelands and reclaim same by the refuse and garbage from San Francisco and covered by earth from Candlestick Point.—Chief Administrative Officer, Dept. of Health & City Planning Commission.

3. A blight upon a vast tract of land exists at Butcher Town. Butcher Town has been located in the vicinity of Third and Evans Avenue for years. Butcher Town, because of the odors from the abattoirs, has retarded the growth of the section known as Butcher Town.

Butcher Town has outgrown its present location and should be moved at least two miles to the south adjacent to the area of reclaimed tidelands. It is a considerable distance to the residence section.

The city should acquire from the State the tidelands adjacent to Butcher Town and reclamation of said tidelands by refuse matter and garbage by fill and cover.—Assemblyman O'Day, Senator Shelley.

4. A municipal garage located on the block bounded by Grove, Hayes, Franklin and Van Ness. This block is now used as athletic field of the High School of Commerce. Honorable Thomas A. Brooks, Chief Administrative Officer, informs me it will be practical to construct a garage on this block and also be possible to continue the athletic activities of the High School of Commerce thereon.

The cost of building said garage, \$600,000, and accommodation of 500 automobiles and trucks.—Chief Administrative Officer, Dept. of Health & City Planning Commission.

5. An underpass on Market Street at Sixth Street and an underpass on Market Street at Tenth Street.

The model of such an underpass and how traffic moves on can be seen at foot of Market Street at The Embarcadero.—Chief Administrative Officer, Dept. of Health & City Planning Commission.

6. Tunnel at either Broadway or Lombard Street.—Chief Administrative Officer, Dept. of Health & City Planning Commission.

7. Widen Upper Market Street west of Castro Street and elimination of curves.—Chief Administrative Officer, Dept. of Health & City Planning Commission.

8. Erection of Court Building on block bounded by Hyde, Larkin, Grove and Fulton, and construction of garage in basement for use of the public.—Chief Administrative Officer, Dept. of Health & City Planning Commission.



9. Completion of the construction of Civic Center on south side of Fulton Street between Leavenworth and Hyde. Present condition is not in harmony with remainder of Civic Center and existing conditions have been an eyesore for upward of twenty years.—Frederick H. Meyer, Kohl Building.

10. Low level bridge from Alameda Point to Hunter's Point.—Chief Administrative Officer, Dept. of Health & City Planning Commission.

11. In order to meet the competition of East Bay regarding speed at which motorists can reach Richmond, Piedmont, Berkeley, a similar "speed way" should be erected on this side of the Bay. It is a positive fact that when a San Franciscan moves to the east side of Bay said individual is lost to San Francisco. Whereas, moving to San Mateo retains said person's contact with San Francisco, and for this reason:

Proposal: Elevated roadway from Folsom and Sixth Streets via Folsom to Potrero Avenue, via Potrero to San Bruno Avenue, via San Bruno Avenue to Bayshore Boulevard, and said elevated roadway to extend from Folsom and Sixth to Bayshore County Line. Such a structure will speed up traffic and will tie San Mateo and San Francisco more closely.—Chief Administrative Officer, Dept. of Health & City Planning Commission.

12. Extending streets through Calvary and Laurel Hill Cemeteries.—Chief Administrative Officer, Dept. of Health & City Planning Commission.

13. Purchase of properties adjacent to Hall of Justice and bounded by Washington, Montgomery and Merchant Streets. Erection on said property, an addition to the Hall of Justice and modernization of said Hall of Justice.—Chief Administrative Officer, Dept. of Health & City Planning Commission.

14. Erection or purchase of a fit and proper Juvenile Detention Home. That a good weather area be selected for the site, with sufficient area befitting a modern Juvenile Detention Home.—Judge Theresa Meikle.

15. Narrowing of sidewalks on business thoroughfares, where desirable.—Chief Administrative Officer, Department of Public Works.

16. That the Fire Commission consider demolishing and rebuilding dilapidated fire houses.—Fire Commission.

#### Amendments.

Supervisor Uhl expressed appreciation for the prompt committee consideration given to proposals which he had advanced. However, he was disappointed to note that two of his proposals had not been included in the resolution.

Thereupon, Supervisor Uhl moved that there be added to the various proposals, for reference to the Chief Administrative Officer and the Department of Public Works, the following: Narrowing of sidewalks on business thoroughfares, where desirable. Motion seconded by Supervisor MacPhee.

Supervisor Green, in speaking on the motion, reported that at the meeting of the committee the matter now being proposed was referred to the administrative department having jurisdiction. One specific proposal by Supervisor Uhl, with respect to certain streets, was tabled by the committee. However, he saw no harm in approving the amendment.

Whereupon, there being no objection, the motion was declared *carried*.

Supervisor MacPhee called attention to the conditions of many fire houses, and moved that there be added to the foregoing proposals, also, another proposal, to read: That the Fire Commission consider demolish-

ing and rebuilding dilapidated fire houses. Motion seconded by Supervisor Uhl.

No objection, and motion declared *carried*.

Thereupon, the roll was called and Proposal No. 3798, as amended and reading as above, was *Adopted* by the following vote:

(Series of 1939)

Bill No. 2726, Ordinance No. . . . . ., as follows:

Amending Bill No. 2680, Ordinance No. 2555 (Series of 1939), entitled "An ordinance providing that prior to 'passage' and 'final passage' or adoption, ordinances and resolutions, respectively, shall be designated 'Bills' and 'Proposals'; prescribing, in connection with ordinances and resolutions, the scope of the terms 'passage,' 'final passage,' and 'adoption' providing the manner in which bills and proposals shall be presented for enactment or adoption and for the publication of bills, ordinances and resolutions; providing the manner and time in which committees shall act upon bills and proposals and for their disposition for non-action thereon after lapse of time, and repealing Bill No. 1630, Ordinance No. 1573 (Series of 1939)," by amending Section 4 thereof to provide that all bills, proposals, communications and matters intended for or requiring consideration or action by the Board of Supervisors shall be submitted to the Board of Supervisors for reference to the committee having jurisdiction over the particular subject matter, and by repealing Section 7 of said ordinance prescribing the time within which bills, proposals and other matters shall be filed with Clerk.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco, as follows:

Section 1. Section 4 of Bill No. 2680, Ordinance No. 2555 (Series of 1939), is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 4. Except bills containing emergency measures, *proposals* [resolutions] introduced or presented for *immediate* consideration and adoption by unanimous consent of the members present, and bills or *proposals* [resolutions] prepared and reported out by committee, all bills [and] proposals, *communications and other matters* intended for or requiring consideration or action by the Board shall before consideration thereof or action by the Board thereon, be filed with the Clerk [and written twenty-four hours thereafter the President or the Clerk shall refer the same] and by the Clerk presented to the Board at its next meeting for reference to the committee or agency having jurisdiction over the subject matter, for hearing report and recommendation, or such other action as the Board deems necessary or advisable.

Section 7. [Except as to a contemplated bill or proposal which is in the course of preparation in committee and except in the case of a matter which is recognized and agreed, by unanimous consent of

the members present, to constitute an actual emergency, no bill or proposal shall be considered or acted upon by committee unless such bill or proposal be submitted to the Clerk in proper form with all requisite signatures of recommendation and approval inscribed thereon at a time not later than 5:00 o'clock P. M., of the day preceding the day of the meeting of the committee having jurisdiction over the subject matter.]

#### Discussion.

Before discussing the foregoing bill, the Chair explained the purpose thereof.

Supervisor Mead objected to the bill, holding that it would add to the delay in consideration of legislation.

Supervisor MacPhee, also, discussed the proposed legislation, and suggested that the Clerk be authorized to refer matters to the various committees, but if the committee should take no action within a week on matters so referred by the Clerk, that the Clerk should report the matter to the Board. After further brief discussion, Supervisor MacPhee modified his suggestion to provide that the Clerk should refer matters to committee after consultation with the President of the Board.

Supervisor Meyer believed the proposed legislation to be good; it would give notice to the public of matters presented to the Board for consideration.

Thereupon, Supervisor MacPhee suggested that the rules be amended to provide that upon receipt of any legislation or correspondence, the Clerk should contact the President of the Board, asking him to which committee he desires such proposed legislation or such correspondence to be assigned, with the proviso that if the President is not available the Clerk should use his own discretion, but if said matter is not acted upon by committee within a week, the Clerk shall report the matter to the Board.

There being no objection, the Chair declared the foregoing suggestion to be *approved*.

#### Passed for Second Reading.

Thereupon, Bill No. 2726, as amended, and reading as follows, was *Passed for Second Reading* by the following vote:

#### Amending Ordinance Regulating Legislative Procedure.

(Series of 1939)

Bill No. 2726, Ordinance No. . . . . ., as follows:

Amending Bill No. 2680, Ordinance No. 2555 (Series of 1939), entitled "An ordinance providing that prior to 'passage' and 'final passage' or adoption, ordinances and resolutions, respectively, shall be designated 'Bills' and 'Proposals'; prescribing, in connection with ordinances and resolutions, the scope of the terms 'passage,' 'final passage,' and 'adoption' providing the manner in which bills and proposals shall be presented for enactment or adoption and for the publication of bills, ordinances and resolutions; providing the manner and time in which committees shall act upon bills and proposals and for their disposition for non-action thereon after lapse of time, and repealing Bill No. 1630, Ordinance No. 1573 (Series of 1939)," by amending Section 4 thereof to provide that all bills, proposals, communications and matters intended for or requiring consideration or action by the Board of Supervisors shall be submitted to the Board of Supervisors for reference to the committee having jurisdiction over the particular subject matter, and

by repealing Section 7 of said ordinance prescribing the time within which bills, proposals and other matters shall be filed with Clerk.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco, as follows:

Section 1. Section 4 of Bill No. 2680, Ordinance No. 2555 (Series of 1939), is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 4. Except bills containing emergency measures, proposals introduced or presented for immediate consideration and adoption by unanimous consent of the members present, and bills or proposals prepared and reported out by committee, all bills and proposals, communications and other matters intended for or requiring consideration or action by the Board shall before consideration thereof or action by the Board thereon, be filed with the Clerk, whereupon, the Clerk shall immediately contact the President of the Board to ascertain the committee to which the matter should be referred. In the absence of the President of the Board, the Clerk shall exercise his own discretion in assigning matters to committee. If said matter is not acted upon by said committee within a week, the Clerk shall report the matter to the Board.

Section 2. Section 7 of Bill No. 2860, Ordinance No. 2555 (Series of 1939) is hereby repealed.

Adopted.

**Amending Rule 50, of the Rules of Order, to Provide That Two Weeks After Reference of a Matter to Committee, Any Member Thereof May Call a Meeting for Its Consideration.**

(Series of 1939)

Proposal No. 3786, Resolution No. 3794, as follows:

Resolved, That Resolution No. 2568 (Series of 1939), Rules of Order of the Board of Supervisors, be and is hereby amended by amending Rule 50 thereof to read as follows:

Rule 50. Every committee shall meet at the time set by the Board, the Chairman, or as a majority of the committee may decide.

*When a matter has been referred to committee and the Chairman thereof does not call a meeting on the subject-matter within two weeks after such reference to said committee, any member of the committee has the right to call a meeting for the consideration of said subject-matter.*

Adopted by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Brown, Colman, Gallagher, Gartland, Green, MacPhee, Mancuso, Mead, Meyer, Sullivan, Uhl—11.

Consideration Postponed.

The following recommendation of Police Committee was taken up:

**Preventing the Solicitation From Any Person Upon the Streets, Doorways or Areas Adjacent Thereto of Magazine Subscription or Sales of Personal Property of Any Kind or Character for Future Delivery; an Emergency Ordinance.**

(Series of 1939)

Bill No. 2724, Ordinance No. . . . . , as follows:

Preventing the solicitation from any person upon the streets, doorways or areas adjacent thereto of magazine subscription or sales of

personal property of any kind or character for future delivery; an emergency ordinance.

Whereas, due to the existing war emergency there are daily on the streets of the City and County of San Francisco a large number of the armed forces of the United States; and

Whereas, divers persons continuously solicit said members of the armed forces and other persons engaged in war work in and adjacent to the City and County of San Francisco to subscribe for various magazines and periodicals or to purchase various kinds and character of personal property to be delivered in the future; and

Whereas, especially in the armed forces of the United States, the members thereof, when subscribing for said magazines or periodicals and personal property for future delivery, by reason of their service in said armed forces, can give no definite place of address, and it is impossible to deliver to said members of the armed forces, and other persons engaged in necessary war work, the articles subscribed to and sold for future delivery, and said persons are often times deprived of any payment made on account of said subscriptions for said periodicals or on account of the down payment made on the sale of any article of personal property; and

Whereas, further, when said members of the armed forces are asked as to where said publications subscribed for, or articles of personal property sold, should be delivered, said members of the armed forces inadvertently divulge military information which should not be available to the public at large; now, therefore,

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco, as follows:

Section 1. No person shall on any public street or sidewalk in the City and County of San Francisco, or in any area or doorway or entrance-way immediately abutting thereon, solicit the sale of any subscription to any magazine, periodical or other publication for future delivery, or the sale of any tangible personal property to be delivered to the purchaser thereof, or to any other person, at a subsequent time.

Section 2. This ordinance is passed as an emergency measure, and the Board of Supervisors does, by the vote by which this ordinance is passed, declare that an actual emergency exists, necessitating this ordinance becoming effective forthwith, the nature of said emergency being that the armed forces of the United States are now and will be in the future, unless this ordinance becomes effective, importuned to take subscriptions to magazines, publications and periodicals and to purchase various articles of personal property for future delivery, and by reason of their transitory stay in San Francisco said magazines, publications and periodicals and said personal property cannot be delivered to them, and they will be deprived of any down payment made upon the same.

Approved as to form by the City Attorney.

On motion by Supervisor Meyer, seconded by Supervisor Green, consideration of the foregoing bill was *postponed until Monday, January 31, 1944.*

#### Communication Filed.

#### Notice of Filing by Police Committee of Communication From Normand Winfield Mohr.

The Police Committee, at its meeting on January 18, 1944, considered communication from Normand Winfield Mohr, architect and engineer, 481 Noe Street, making certain allegations in connection with election held November 2d, 1943, and ordered same filed.

Action of committee *confirmed* and communication ordered *filed*.

**ROLL CALL FOR THE INTRODUCTION OF RESOLUTIONS,  
BILLS AND COMMUNICATIONS NOT CONSIDERED OR  
REPORTED UPON BY A COMMITTEE.**

**Reconsideration of Appointment of Edward Kenney as Director of  
Golden Gate Bridge and Highway District.**

Supervisor Mead inquired about the status of the matter of reconsideration of resolution, adopted on January 3, 1944, appointing Edward Kenney as Director of the Golden Gate Bridge and Highway District. He had expected the matter to be on the Board's Calendar pursuant to request made by him on January 3, 1944.

Supervisor Mead was informed that, on motion by Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Colman, on January 10, 1944, the entire matter had been postponed for three weeks, and would be before the Board on Monday, January 31, 1944.

**Observance of the Hundredth Anniversary of California's Statehood.**

Supervisor Brown announced that it had been reported to him that certain groups in Southern California are quietly commencing to organize for the celebration of the one hundredth anniversary of the statehood of California in 1950. Inasmuch as the early history of California was made in the northern part of the state he believed that the northern part of the state should take an active and leading part in the organizing for such celebration. Thereupon, Supervisor Brown presented the following resolution for immediate consideration by the Board:

**Requesting His Honor the Mayor to Appoint a Committee for  
Proper Observance of the State of California's One Hundredth  
Birthday in 1950.**

(Series of 1939)

Proposal No. 3811, Resolution No. 3805, as follows:

Whereas, 1950 will mark the one hundredth birthday of our great State of California; and

Whereas, it is fitting and proper that the City and County of San Francisco should participate, with pride, in the celebration of this epochal event; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Mayor be and he is hereby respectfully requested to appoint a suitable committee that will begin to formulate plans that will insure our city's participation in the glorious pageant that will ensue in 1950, commemorating California's Centennial.

*Adopted* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Brown, Colman, Gallagher, Gartland, Green, MacPhee, Mancuso, Mead, Meyer, Sullivan, Uhl—11.

**Commending San Francisco War Chest.**

(Series of 1939)

Supervisor Colman presented:

Proposal No. 3812, Resolution No. 3802, as follows:

Whereas, the San Francisco War Chest has been fully subscribed; and

Whereas, the amount subscribed is the highest that San Francisco has ever been called upon to reach; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco does enthusiastically commend the officials and membership of the San Francisco War Chest for the splendid cooperation dis-

played and the noble efforts exerted in making possible the attainment of such a worthy goal.

*Adopted* by the following vote:

**Appointing Supervisor Frederick W. Meyer as Director of Joint Highway District No. 10.**

(Series of 1939)

Supervisor Gallagher presented:

Proposal No. 3805, Resolution No. 3799, as follows:

Resolved, That, in accordance with the provisions of Joint Highway Act of the State of California, and pursuant to proceedings heretofore taken in the matter of the creation of Joint Highway District No. 10, composed of the City and County of San Francisco and the County of San Mateo, for the purpose of construction and extension of Junipero Serra Boulevard, Supervisor Frederick W. Meyer be and he is hereby named and appointed as director of said Joint Highway District No. 10 to represent the City and County of San Francisco, vice Alfred Roncovieri, term expired, said appointment to be effective January 8, 1944.

*Adopted* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Brown, Colman, Gallagher, Gartland, Green, MacPhee, Mancuso, Mead, Meyer, Sullivan, Uhl—11.

**Appointment of Supervisor Frederick W. Meyer to Represent the Board of Supervisors at Meeting of California Highway Commission in Sacramento, January 20, 1944.**

(Series of 1939)

Supervisor Gallagher presented:

Proposal No. 3806, Resolution No. 3800, as follows:

Resolved, That the action of the President of the Board of Supervisors, in appointing Supervisor Frederick W. Meyer to represent the Board of Supervisors at the meeting of the California Highway Commission, held on January 20, 1944, be and it is hereby confirmed.

*Adopted* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Brown, Colman, Gallagher, Gartland, Green, MacPhee, Mancuso, Mead, Meyer, Sullivan, Uhl—11.

**Appointing Supervisor Dan Gallagher, President of the Board, to Represent the City and County of San Francisco at the Special Session of the State Legislature to Be Held in Sacramento Commencing Thursday, January 27, 1944.**

(Series of 1939)

Supervisor Uhl presented:

Proposal No. 3807, Resolution No. 3801, as follows:

Resolved, That Supervisor Dan Gallagher, President of the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco, be and is hereby authorized to represent the City and County of San Francisco at the special session of the Legislature of the State of California, called by His Excellency Governor Warren, to commence Thursday, January 27, 1944, at the State Capitol, Sacramento, California.

*Adopted* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Brown, Colman, Gallagher, Gartland, Green, MacPhee, Mancuso, Mead, Meyer, Sullivan, Uhl—11.

**Urging the Abrogation of the White Paper by Great Britain Barring Jews to Palestine.**

(Series of 1939)

Supervisor MacPhee presented:

Proposal No. 3808, Resolution No. . . . . ., as follows:

Whereas, the White Paper issued by the British Government in May, 1939, under the leadership of Prime Minister Chamberlain, stops the immigration of Jews into Palestine after March 31, 1944, and imposes unfair restriction on the rights of Jews in Palestine; and

Whereas, the ruthless persecution of the Jewish people in Europe and the resultant existence of hordes of refugees in Nazi-occupied countries has clearly demonstrated the need for a haven for the large numbers who have become homeless because of this persecution; and

Whereas, such White Paper is a vestige of an appeasement policy which has been repudiated by Great Britain under the leadership of Winston Churchill and by the other United Nations; and

Whereas, the terms of said White Paper in closing immigration constitute a flagrant breach of the provisions of the mandate accepted by Great Britain as to Palestine, which provisions were approved by the Congress of the United States together with fifty-two nations; and

Whereas, many San Franciscans are now dedicating their lives, together with other Americans, to protect human decencies and to assure the preservation of freedom of all peoples, and equality of rights throughout the world; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, By the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco, State of California, that it calls upon the present government of Great Britain to abrogate immediately and before the effective date of March 31, 1944, the White Paper and that it requests the Government of the United States through its State Department, its Senate and its House of Representatives to urge that this White Paper be abrogated so that the doors of Palestine may be kept open for free entry of Jews into that country and so that there shall not be any restrictions on the opportunity for land purchase or colonization in Palestine and so that the pledges of governments may be honorably kept and human beings given an opportunity for life free from persecution and misery.

*Adopted by the following vote:*

Ayes: Supervisors Brown, Colman, Gallagher, Gartland, Green, MacPhee, Mancuso, Mead, Meyer, Sullivan, Uhl—11.

**Impounding of Certain Funds of Market Street Railway Company to Apply on Payment of Portion of That Company's Delinquent Paving Obligations.**

(Series of 1939)

Supervisor MacPhee presented:

Proposal No. 3809, Resolution No. . . . . ., as follows:

Whereas, the California State Railroad Commission, by order filed November 30, 1943, ordered the Market Street Railway Company to reduce the street railway fares of said company in San Francisco from seven cents to six cents, effective December 20, 1943; and

Whereas, the Market Street Railway Company did file with the California State Railroad Commission a petition for a rehearing of said order requiring such fare reduction, which petition for a rehearing was denied by the California State Railroad Commission but resulted in extending the effective date of the subject order to February 11, 1944; and

Whereas, on January 20, 1944, the Market Street Railway Company filed a petition with the Supreme Court of the State of California requesting a review of the California State Railroad Commission's order reducing fares; and



Whereas, the Market Street Railway Company has incurred certain paving obligations under the provisions of the franchises and operating permits granted said company by the City and County of San Francisco, which obligations have accrued to June 30, 1943, in the estimated amount of \$1,691,162.72; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That this Board of Supervisors does hereby memorialize the California State Railroad Commission and does urge that the California State Railroad Commission impound, escrow or otherwise hold the amount of money represented by the difference in fare between six cents and seven cents which will be collected by the Market Street Railway Company in violation of the order of said Commission during the period between February 11, 1944, and such time as the petition or petitions by the Market Street Railway Company to courts of competent jurisdiction are finally disposed of; and be it

Further Resolved, That, if the action of the California State Railroad Commission in reducing said fares heretofore charged by the Market Street Railway Company from seven cents to six cents be not sustained by the courts, that the California State Railroad Commission order and provide that said moneys so impounded, escrowed or otherwise held instead of being paid to the Market Street Railway Company be ordered paid to the City and County of San Francisco to pay a part of the delinquent paving obligations now due by the Market Street Railway Company as hereinbefore set forth.

Supervisor MacPhee requested that the foregoing proposal be considered in connection with the general question to be taken up as a Special Order of Business at the next meeting of the Board.

The Chair, however, *referred the proposal to the Public Utilities Committee.*

#### Discussion.

During the discussion of the foregoing proposal, before same had been referred to committee, Supervisor Mancuso suggested amendment thereto to provide that the Market Street Railway Company be required to furnish each passenger paying a seven-cent fare to be given a receipt for the amount of the fare paid in excess of the fare ordered by the Railroad Commission, in order that refunds of excess fares paid, in the event that the order of the Railroad Commission was sustained, might be refunded to passengers.

Mr. Gardner Griffith, representing the Market Street Railway Company, announced that Mr. L. V. Newton had stated that the figures heretofore presented by Mr. Errol Rosenthal were not complete. Those figures were taken from the files of the Railroad Commission. The Board of Supervisors should authorize someone to get the correct figures from the Market Street Railway Company during the coming week.

Thereupon, on suggestion by Supervisor MacPhee, Mr. Rosenthal was requested to comply with Mr. Griffith's suggestion.

Supervisor Colman announced that he had noted, in the press, that the Mayor and the new president of the Public Utilities Commission were already tackling the transportation problem, and he suggested that it would be wise before taking any direct action to see what plan the Mayor and the Public Utilities Commission has for the solution of the problem.

Supervisor Uhl raised a point of order, stating that the Board was not discussing the transportation problem; it was merely considering the street repair problem.

The Chair declared the point of order not well taken.

Following the foregoing discussion, the Chair declared that the foregoing proposal had already been referred to committee.

**City Attorney to Oppose Application of Market Street Railway Company for Permission to Issue \$3,800,000 First Mortgage Serial Bonds, or to Make Payments on Certain Indebtedness Until Funds Due as Paving Obligations Have Been Impounded.**

(Series of 1939)

Supervisor MacPhee presented:

Proposal No. 3810, Resolution No. . . . . , as follows:

Whereas, it has been reported that a firm known as Allyn & Co. has recently purchased the controlling interest in the Market Street Railway Company and now own approximately forty per cent (40%) of said company's capital stock; and

Whereas, the Market Street Railway has incurred certain paving obligations under the provisions of the franchises and operating permits granted said company by the City and County of San Francisco, which obligations have accrued to June 30, 1943, in the estimated amount of \$1,691,162.72; and

Whereas, the Market Street Railway Company now has an application pending before the California State Railroad Commission requesting authorization to issue \$3,800,000 first mortgage serial bonds, which application has been set for hearing on February 14, 1944, by the California State Railroad Commission; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That this Board of Supervisors hereby instructs the City Attorney of the City and County of San Francisco to petition the California State Railroad Commission, at the time of the hearing of the application of the Market Street Railway Company before said Railroad Commission for authorization to issue the hereinbefore described first mortgage serial bonds, to so instruct and order the Market Street Railway Company to covenant and agree not to make any payment on account of principal or interest on its indebtedness to Allyn & Co., previously an "open book account" payable to the Standard Gas and Electric Company, existing on the date authorization is granted by the California State Railroad Commission to the Market Street Railway Company to issue \$3,800,000 of first mortgage serial bonds, until such time as the sum of \$1,691,162.72 shall have been impounded, escrowed, or otherwise held by the California State Railroad Commission from funds belonging to the Market Street Railway Company; said sum of \$1,691,162.72 representing the estimated amount of the Market Street Railway Company's paving obligations as of June 30, 1943, which obligations have accrued under the provisions of franchises and operating permits granted by the City and County of San Francisco to the Market Street Railway Company; and be it

Further Resolved, That the California State Railroad Commission be urged to further provide that the Market Street Railway Company covenant and agree not to pay any dividends due nor to declare any future dividends on any of said company's capital stock until the sum of \$1,691,162.72 shall have been escrowed, impounded or otherwise held for the purpose hereinbefore set forth.

*Referred to Public Utilities Committee.*

#### Discussion.

Following the reference of the foregoing proposal to the Public Utilities Commission by the Chair, Supervisor MacPhee stated that the proposal was but a matter of policy as to what the Board might desire to do. He was merely seeking to protect the interest of the City and County of San Francisco. Inasmuch as application pending before the California State Railroad Commission requesting authorization to issue \$3,800,000 first mortgage serial bonds has been set for hearing on February 14, 1944, any action that the Board might take, either for or against the petition, must be taken before February 14th. For that

reason he urged prompt consideration by the Public Utilities Committee.

Supervisor Brown, Chairman of the Public Utilities Committee, announced that there was a difference of opinion as to the amount of the delinquency of the Market Street Railway Company. That amount is the entire argument. He could not promise any early report from his committee.

**Commending Ernest Page, Sixteen-Year-Old George Washington High School Student, for Winning the Nationwide William Randolph Hearst History Award.**

(Series of 1939)

Supervisor Sullivan presented:

Proposal No. 3803, Resolution No. 3798, as follows:

Whereas, Ernest Page, sixteen-year-old George Washington High School student, was declared winner of the \$1,000 war bond for first place in the William Randolph Hearst American History Award; and

Whereas, the youth's victory over thousands of students in other parts of the country focuses attention on San Francisco and its schools; and

Whereas, Ernest Page deserves special credit for his quick grasp of American ideals, having come to this country with his parents from Germany only nine years ago; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That this Board of Supervisors goes on record as commending Ernest Page and the George Washington High School for bringing this honor to San Francisco.

*Adopted by the following vote:*

Ayes: Supervisors Brown, Colman, Gallagher, Gartland, Green, MacPhee, Mancuso, Mead, Meyer, Sullivan, Uhl—11.

**Requesting His Honor the Mayor to Appoint a Committee of Citizens to Assist in Preparation for the Observance of St. Patrick's Day.**

(Series of 1939)

Supervisors Sullivan and Gallagher presented:

Proposal No. 3804, Resolution No. 3804, as follows:

Resolved, That his Honor the Mayor be and he is hereby respectfully requested to appoint a Committee of Citizens to collaborate with and assist in the preparations for the observance of St. Patrick's Day, March 17, 1944.

*Adopted by the following vote:*

Ayes: Supervisors Brown, Colman, Gallagher, Gartland, Green, MacPhee, Mancuso, Mead, Meyer, Sullivan, Uhl—11.

**Refusal of Taxicab Drivers to Take Passengers to Their Destinations.**

Supervisor MacPhee called attention to refusal of some taxicab drivers to take passengers to their destinations, especially in outlying districts. Some of the larger companies, he stated, were interested in the proposed legislation which he had presented, and for this reason he was anxious that such legislation be given prompt consideration.

The Chair announced that the subject matter was in Police Committee where it had been referred. The committee would consider the subject matter on Wednesday, January 26, 1944, at 4:00 p. m.

**One-Way Traffic on San Carlos and Lexington Streets.**

Supervisor MacPhee inquired as to what consideration was being given to proposal advanced by him that San Carlos and Lexington Streets be declared "one-way traffic" streets.

The Clerk announced that the matter was in Police Committee. The committee was awaiting report from the Police Department, and had no jurisdiction, and could not act, without recommendation from the Police Commission thereon.

**Street Repair Obligations of Market Street Railway Company.**

Supervisor MacPhee reported that the Joint Finance and Public Utilities Committee had had under consideration for some time, the question of the Market Street Railway Company's obligations for repair and maintenance of certain streets, but, because of the inability of having a quorum present at meetings, the committee had been unable to bring any recommendation to the Board. For that reason, he would move that the subject matter be made a Special Order of Business for Monday, January 31, 1944, at 2:30 p. m.

*No objection, and so ordered.*

**Reception for Mayor Lapham.**

Supervisor Mancuso reminded the Board that the Civic League of Improvements Clubs was proposing a celebration or reception for Mayor Lapham. A table had been reserved for Supervisors who desired to attend, but to date, the response from the Supervisors had been very poor. In conclusion of his remarks, he invited members of the Board to communicate with him on the matter.

**ADJOURNMENT.**

There being no further business, the Board, at the hour of 4:10 p. m., adjourned.

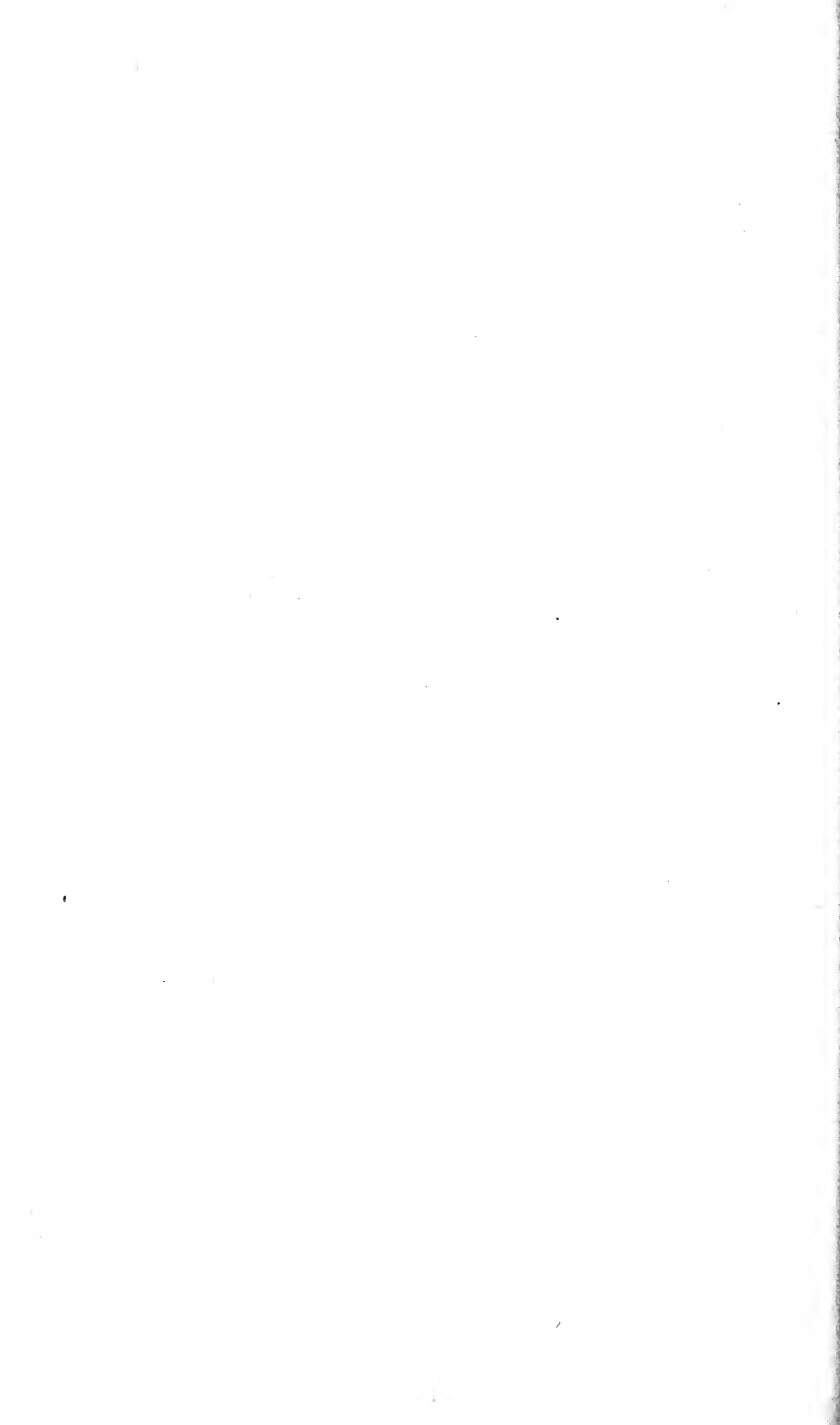

#### SPECIAL ORDER—2:30 P. M.

Consideration of obligations of Market Street Railway Company as to the use of streets and condition of streets used.

#### Discussion.

Supervisor MacPhee reported in detail on hearings by the Joint Finance and Public Utilities Committee on the subject of the Market Street Railway Company's obligations for street maintenance. Because of the lack of a quorum at a number of the meetings of the Joint Committee, the committee was unable to make a recommendation to the Board. In February, 1942, the committee had under consideration a resolution asking the City Attorney to institute proceedings to terminate the franchises of the Market Street Railway Company because of the failure of that company to fulfil its obligations with respect to street repair and maintenance. In March, 1942, that resolution was refused adoption by the Board. In November, 1942, Supervisor O'Gara proposed a resolution asking the City Attorney to take necessary steps to terminate the franchises of the Market Street Railway Company, and to protect the rights of the people. Early in 1943 the Board requested the Chief Administrative Officer to determine the amount of the company's delinquency in its street repair program. That report was submitted to the Board of Supervisors on about June 30, 1943. It showed a balance of approximately \$1,700,000 of work which was



delinquent. The report was referred to the Joint Finance and Public Utilities Committee. The company requested time in which to study the report; that time was granted. The company has proposed to perform in 1944 the same amount of street work which it did in 1943. Because of the amount of the delinquency, that proposal is not satisfactory to the committee. Two weeks ago the City Attorney and his rate expert was requested to investigate a proposal for refinancing the company. There are but two choices left to the City and County; either to accept the program that the Market Street Railway Company will perform the same amount of street repairs in 1944 that it did in 1943, or to terminate the franchises and show that the Board of Supervisors means business.

### **Declaration of Policy Re Termination of Franchises of Market Street Railway Company.**

(Series of 1939)

Thereupon, Supervisor MacPhee presented the following:

Proposal No. 3821, Resolution No. . . . . ., as follows:

Whereas, the Market Street Railway Company is the successor in interest of various franchises issued to various persons and corporations authorizing the operating of street railways over and on the streets of San Francisco, and is especially the successor in interest of a certain operating permit issued pursuant to the provisions of Section 6-B, Chapter II, Article II, of the Charter of the City and County of San Francisco, effective on January 8, 1900, and thereafter amended; and

Whereas, said operating permit was issued pursuant to all of the terms and conditions contained in the original franchises authorizing the operation and maintenance of said street railways; and

Whereas, the Market Street Railway Company is operating its several street railway lines in the City and County of San Francisco under and pursuant to said operating permit issued pursuant to the provisions of said Section 6-B, Chapter II, Article II of the said Charter of 1900 as amended, and under and pursuant to certain supplemental and additional permits issued by the Board of Supervisors of the City and County, which said permits were an extension of original franchises granted for the operation of street railway on the streets of the City and County of San Francisco; and

Whereas, it is provided in all franchises, the conditions of which became a part of said operating permit issued pursuant to the provisions of said Section 6-B, Chapter II, Article II of the said Charter of 1900 as amended, that the holder of said permit would pave the streets between the railroad tracks laid thereon and on two feet on each side of said tracks with the same materials which said streets were paved; and

Whereas, the Market Street Railway Company is now the owner and holder of said operating permit mentioned aforesaid, and has failed and neglected to pave the streets on which said railroad tracks are laid, between said tracks, and on two feet on each side of said tracks, and has therefore violated the provisions of said operating permit; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Board of Supervisors does hereby submit to the electors of the City and County of San Francisco the following Declaration of Policy, to-wit: Shall the Board of Supervisors adopt an ordinance directing the City Attorney to take the necessary proceedings to cancel and annul the existing operating permit and all other permits and franchises held by the Market Street Railway Company under and by which said company operates street railway cars and buses over and on the streets of San Francisco, and upon the cancellation of said operating permit, permits or franchises, shall the Board of Supervisors issue to said Market Street Railway Company a month to month oper-

ating permit permitting the operation of street railway cars and buses over and on the streets of the City and County upon such terms and conditions as said Board shall deem proper.

Supervisor MacPhee, in answer to inquiry by Supervisor Green, stated that the amount of approximately \$1,700,000 delinquency was determined by the city engineers, at the request of the Board. Although four Supervisors could, by their signatures, order a question of policy submitted to the people at a general election, if this question of policy is to be submitted to the voters at the coming primary election, it will require the approval of six Supervisors.

Supervisor Brown, seconded by Supervisor Meyer, moved that consideration of the entire subject matter, together with the foregoing resolution be continued for one week, and printed on the Calendar of the Board for the meeting of February 7, 1944. Since the matter has been before the Board some two years, another week's delay will not do any harm.

Supervisor Meyer announced that he understood there was a movement on foot to take over the Market Street Railway by purchase or lend-lease, and he did not desire to do anything to handicap any such arrangements. He believed the failure of the people to approve the previous proposals for the acquisition of the railway company was because of misinformation.

Supervisor Mead disagreed. The people of San Francisco, he declared, knew what they were doing when they voted against the purchase of the Market Street Railway Company.

Thereupon, consideration of the entire subject matter, together with the foregoing resolution was *continued until Monday, February 7, 1944.*

the foregoing resolution. Therefore, in compliance with that request, he moved that the Board reconsider its vote by which Mr. Edward Kenney was elected as Director of the Golden Gate Bridge and Highway District.

There being no second to the motion, the Chair declared the resolution stood *adopted*.

Supervisor Mead thereupon announced that he was of the opinion that Mr. Kenney had already been elected.

Supervisor Gallagher expressed agreement with Supervisor Mead.

**Prohibiting the Solicitation From Any Person Upon the Streets, Doorways or Areas Adjacent Thereto of Magazine Subscription or Sales of Personal Property of Any Kind or Character for Future Delivery; an Emergency Ordinance.**

(Series of 1939)

Bill No. 2724, Ordinance No. . . . ., as follows:

Prohibiting the solicitation from any person upon the streets, doorways or areas adjacent thereto of magazine subscription or sales of personal property of any kind or character for future delivery; an emergency ordinance.

Whereas, due to the existing war emergency there are daily on the streets of the City and County of San Francisco a large number of the armed forces of the United States; and

Whereas, divers persons continuously solicit said members of the armed forces and other persons engaged in war work in and adjacent to the City and County of San Francisco to subscribe for various magazines and periodicals or to purchase various kinds and character of personal property to be delivered in the future; and

Whereas, especially in the armed forces of the United States, the members thereof, when subscribing for said magazines or periodicals and personal property for future delivery, by reason of their service in said armed forces, can give no definite place of address, and it is impossible to deliver to said members of the armed forces, and other persons engaged in necessary war work, the articles subscribed to and sold for future delivery, and said persons are often times deprived of any payment made on account of said subscriptions for said periodicals or on account of the down payment made on the sale of any article of personal property; and

Whereas, further, when said members of the armed forces are asked as to where said publications subscribed for, or articles of personal property sold, should be delivered, said members of the armed forces inadvertently divulge military information which should not be available to the public at large; now, therefore,

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco, as follows:

Section 1. No person shall on any public street or sidewalk in the City and County of San Francisco, or in any area or doorway or entrance-way immediately abutting thereon, solicit the sale of any subscription to any magazine, periodical or other publication for future delivery, or the sale of any tangible personal property to be delivered to the purchaser thereof, or to any other person, at a subsequent time.

Section 2. This ordinance is passed as an emergency measure, and the Board of Supervisors does, by the vote by which this ordinance is passed, declare that an actual emergency exists, necessitating this ordinance becoming effective forthwith, the nature of said emergency being that the armed forces of the United States are now and will be in the future, unless this ordinance becomes effective, importuned to take subscriptions to magazines, publications and periodicals and to purchase various articles of personal property for future delivery, and by reason of their transitory stay in San Francisco said magazines, publications and periodicals and said personal property cannot be delivered to them, and they will be deprived of any down payment made upon the same.

Supervisor Meyer announced that he favored the intent of the foregoing proposed legislation, but he feared it would not, as presented, accomplish the intended purpose. Bill No. 2743, Ordinance No. . . . ., as follows:

Amending Article 5, Part III, of the San Francisco Municipal Code, “Electrical Musical Devices.”

An ordinance amending Article 5, Part III, of the San Francisco Municipal Code, “Electrical Musical Devices,” regulating the installation and use of electrical amusement devices in the City and County of San Francisco; defining certain terms used in this Article; providing

for the issuance of permits and licenses for the use, operation and maintenance of electrical musical devices; providing for their impounding and confiscation when installed, operated or maintained to be operated in violation of this Article and for the destruction or other disposal thereof by the Chief of Police; providing for the payment and collection of fees for said license; authorizing the Chief of Police to adopt, promulgate and enforce the rules and regulations governing such inspection and operation; provides penalties for the violation of this Article; repealing conflicting ordinances to such extent as conflict may exist and providing for a saving clause and non-waiver of debts due and unpaid.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco, as follows:

Section 1. Article 5, Part III, of the San Francisco Municipal Code, entitled "Electrical Musical Devices," is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 2. The Table of Contents of said Article 5 is hereby amended to read as follows:

#### ARTICLE 5

##### Electrical Musical Devices

- Sec. 350. Definitions.
- Sec. 351. Requirements for machines.
- Sec. 352. Unlawful acts.
- Sec. 353. Application for permit.
- Sec. 354. Investigations.
- Sec. 355. Expiration of permits.
- Sec. 356. Permit forwarded to Tax Collector.
- Sec. 357. License fees.
- Sec. 358. Contents of licenses.
- Sec. 359. Removal or transfer of license to other person or premises prohibited. No prorating or refunding of license.
- Sec. 360. Notification of issuance of license. Placing of Seal of Approval.
- Sec. 361. Application for renewal of license or for additional license.
- Sec. 362. Procedure where no current license.
- Sec. 363. Suspension, revocation or reinstatement of a permit, procedure for.
- Sec. 364. Devices not to be used for dancing without a permit.
- Sec. 365. Devices not to be used so as to affect public health or morals.
- Sec. 366. Chief of Police to promulgate rules.
- Sec. 367. When deemed a public nuisance.
- Sec. 368. Violation a misdemeanor.
- Sec. 369. Permit and license required notwithstanding any other provision of code.
- Sec. 370. Partial repeal.
- Sec. 371. Saving clause—non-waiver of debts due and unpaid.

Section 3. Sections 350 to 375, inclusive, are hereby amended to read as follows:

SEC. 350. **Definitions.** As used in this Article, the following words shall have the following respective meanings:

"Electrical Musical Devices" shall mean any machine, apparatus or device operated or which may be operated by electricity and designed or constructed for the purpose of producing or playing any musical tone or tones or combination of tones; and the use, operation or playing of such machine, apparatus or device which is permitted or allowed by the deposit of any coin, slug, or token in any slot or receptacle attached to said machine, apparatus or device, or connected therewith; and which machine, apparatus or device does not dispense any article or thing and cannot be operated as a game or contest.

"Operator," as used in this Article, shall mean:

- (a) Any owner of such electrical musical device who oper-



ates or permits the same to be played or operated in his place of business or in any place open to the public under his control.

(b) The person in whose place of business any such electrical musical device is placed for the use, amusement, patronage or recreation of the public or of persons in or about said place.

"Person," as used in this Article, shall mean: Any corporation, association, syndicate, joint stock company, partnership, club, Massachusetts business or common law trust, society or individual.

**SEC. 351. Requirements for Machines.** Every electrical musical device shall have a seal or tag permanently attached thereto showing the serial number of said electrical musical device; and, in addition thereto a label indicating the name and address of the manufacturer and the voltage and current necessary for the proper operation of said electrical musical device.

Every portable electrical musical device shall be equipped with not more than six (6) feet of electric cord of a type approved by the Department of Electricity, and shall be connected to a convenience plug receptacle adjacent to said electrical musical device. Where it is necessary to install electrical wiring to said electrical musical device location said wiring shall be installed by a registered electrical contractor in accordance with the provisions of Article 1, Chapter III, Part II, of the San Francisco Municipal Code.

**SEC. 352. Unlawful Acts.** It shall be unlawful for any operator of an electrical musical device to install, operate or maintain to be operated any electrical musical device in the City and County of San Francisco without first having obtained a permit in writing so to do from the Chief of Police and having the seal of approval, as hereinafter provided for, placed on each of said electrical musical devices.

It shall be unlawful to remove said seal of approval from said electrical musical device to which it was attached as provided for in this Article, and affix same to another device or machine.

**SEC. 353. Application for Permit.** Application for said permit shall be made to the Chief of Police in triplicate on forms provided by the Police Department, and shall be signed by the applicant, and shall contain the following information:

(a) Name and address of the operator, and the type and character of the business or calling carried on by the operator;

(b) The type and serial number of the electrical musical device and the name or number of the premises where same is to be operated or installed;

(c) Total number of electrical musical devices to be operated at or in said premises;

(d) Such additional information as the Chief of Police shall deem necessary to enable the Chief of the Department of Electricity to fully investigate the nature and character of said electrical musical device and the proposed method for the installation of the same, and such other information as the Chief of Police shall deem necessary to enable him to determine the purposes for which said electrical musical device shall be operated.

**SEC. 354. Investigations.** Upon receipt of said application the Chief of Police shall cause to be investigated the statements set forth in the application. Should he, after said investigation, determine that the operation and maintenance of said electrical musical device will not violate any law of the State of California, or ordinance of the City and County of San Francisco, or rule or regulation of any department of the state or municipal government, and will not be detrimental to the health, morals and welfare of the people of the City and County, he shall approve said application, but should he determine to the contrary he shall disapprove said application, stating his reasons

for said disapproval, and in the event of such disapproval said application shall be deemed to be denied, provided, however, that if said Chief of Police should find that any existing condition which caused the disapproval of said application can be remedied, he shall allow a reasonable time to correct said condition, and when corrected to his said satisfaction shall approve said application.

Within ten days after the receipt of any application for the installation, operation or maintenance of any electrical musical device the Chief of Police shall cause a copy of said application to be forwarded to the Chief of the Department of Electricity, and the latter shall investigate said application, and after said investigation if it shall appear that the installation, operation and maintenance of said electrical musical device conforms with all ordinances of the City and County, and the rules and regulations of the department thereof, and that said electrical musical devices can be maintained and operated without danger to the safety of the people of the City and County of San Francisco, the Chief of the Department of Electricity shall approve the same, but should he determine to the contrary, he shall disapprove the same, stating his reasons for said disapproval, and in the event of said disapproval said application shall be deemed denied, provided, however, that if said Chief of the Department of Electricity should find that any existing condition which caused the disapproval of said application can be remedied, he shall allow a reasonable time, not to exceed ten days, to correct said condition and when corrected to his satisfaction shall approve said application.

On the final action of the Chief of the Department of Electricity upon any application for the installation, maintenance and operation of an electrical musical device, he shall report his action thereon to the Chief of Police. If the Chief of the Department of Electricity has finally disapproved said application, upon any of the grounds under his jurisdiction, said application shall be denied by the Chief of Police, but if the said application is approved by the Chief of the Department of Electricity, and the same has also, or is thereafter approved by the Chief of Police, the said application shall be deemed granted, and the Chief of Police shall issue a permit for the installation, maintenance and operation of said musical device as required in said application. Provided, however, that nothing in this section shall be deemed to abridge or limit the right, power and authority given the Chief of Police by Section 35.6 of the Charter of the City and County of San Francisco to refuse to issue the police permit required under this ordinance or to revoke such permit.

**SEC. 355. Expiration of Permits.** Any permit so issued shall expire on the last day of March, June, September and December of each year, and the renewal or continuance of said permit shall be governed by the provisions of Section 23 of Article 1, Part III of the San Francisco Municipal Code, provided that any permit for the installation, operation or maintenance of any electrical musical device in force on the effective date of this ordinance shall be continued in effect for the current quarter for which it has been issued.

**SEC. 356. Permit Forwarded to Tax Collector.** On the granting of any permit for the installation, maintenance and operation of any electrical musical device by the Chief of Police, he shall transmit said permit to the Tax Collector to be delivered to the permittee upon the payment of the fees provided for in Section 357 of this Article. Said Chief of Police shall also advise the Chief of the Department of Electricity of the granting of said permit and it shall be the duty of the latter to supervise the installation of said electrical musical device insofar as the electrical installation thereof is concerned.

**SEC. 357. License Fees.** Every permittee shall pay to the Tax Collector a monthly license fee of one dollar (\$1.00), plus a monthly license fee of an additional one dollar (\$1.00) for each separate electrical musical device which the permit authorizes, payable quarterly in advance, for the periods ending on the last days of March, June, September and December of each year.

**SEC. 358. Contents of Licenses.** The Tax Collector shall issue a license for such electrical musical devices for which the fee was paid, showing thereon the

- (a) Name and address of the permittee;
- (b) Number and kind of the electrical musical devices the permit authorizes;
- (c) Serial number of the permit and the expiration date of the license.

**SEC. 359. Removal or Transferring of License to Other Person or Premises Prohibited.** The permit and license issued pursuant to this Article shall be valid only for the person to whom issued and the premises for which issued, and license fees paid under the provisions of this Article shall not be prorated or refunded.

**SEC. 360. Notification of Issuance of License—Placing of Seal of Approval.** Upon the issuance to the permittee of the license as provided for in this Article, the Tax Collector shall immediately notify in writing the Chief of the Department of Electricity of such fact. Upon receipt of such notification, the Chief of the Department of Electricity shall cause to be placed in a conspicuous place on each of said electrical musical devices for which a permit and license has been obtained a seal of approval for the public to see, of such shape, design, wording and material as the Controller shall specify. Upon revocation of such permit the Chief of Police shall notify the Chief of the Department of Electricity of that fact, and said seal of approval shall be removed by the latter from such device and destroyed. The Chief of the Department of Electricity or any representative of the Department of Electricity shall have access to any electrical musical device at any and all times. In the event of the renewal of any permit or license for any electrical musical device it shall not be necessary for the Chief of the Department of Electricity to renew the seal of approval if the same is intact.

**SEC. 361. Application for Renewal of License or for Additional License.** Application for renewal of license shall be made to the Tax Collector and shall be made within ten (10) days prior to the expiration of the current license. If said application for a renewal of license be not made within the times specified, the permit authorized by this Article shall automatically become null and void.

Whenever a permittee desires to install, operate or maintain to be operated electrical musical devices in addition to the number of said devices authorized by his current permit and license, the provisions of this Article shall apply provided that the monthly license fee of one dollar shall not be required to be paid.

**SEC. 362. Procedure Where No Current License.** If any electrical musical device is placed, operated, or maintained to be operated without a license, the Chief of Police shall immediately cause the same to be impounded and shall not release said electrical musical device until a permit and license has been obtained as provided for in this Article for obtaining an original permit, and a penalty of twice the amount of the delinquent quarterly license fee for the current period has been paid to the Tax Collector, and the amount of said delinquent licenses and penalties shall be a lien on said electrical musical devices and the same may be sold by the Tax Collector to satisfy said lien.

**SEC. 363. Suspension, Revocation or Reinstatement of a Permit. Procedure for.** When the Chief of Police shall determine that the permittee or any of the permittee's employees, servants or agents in the use, operation or maintenance of any such electrical musical device is violating or attempting to violate any law of the State of California or any ordinance of the City and County of San Francisco or the rules and regulations of any department thereof concerned; or, if in the opinion of the Chief of Police it is deemed necessary for the protection of the public, the Chief of Police, after written notice to the per-

mittee, and after due and proper hearing, shall have power to suspend or revoke any permit issued under the provisions of this Article.

The Chief of Police shall cause to be forwarded to the Tax Collector and to the Chief of the Department of Electricity written notice of any revocation, suspension or reinstatement of any permit herein provided for.

**SEC. 364. Devices Not to Be Used for Dancing Without a Permit.** It shall be unlawful for any person having a permit to operate an electrical musical device, to use, or to permit the same to be used, for the furnishing of music for dancing on any premises or in any place where a permit allowing dancing on said premises or place has not been granted.

**SEC. 365. Devices Not to Be Used so as to Affect Public Health or Morals.** No person having a permit to operate or maintain an electrical musical device shall maintain or use the same or permit the same to be used so that the same shall be detrimental to the health, safety or morals of any person on or about the premises where said electrical musical device is operated or maintained, and the Chief of Police is hereby given full authority to determine when any such musical device is maintained or used so as to be detrimental to the health, safety and morals of those in and about said premises.

**SEC. 366. Rules and Regulations to Be Adopted.** The Chief of Police is hereby authorized to adopt, promulgate and enforce such rules and regulations regarding electrical musical devices as will enable him to enforce and carry out the meaning and intent of this Article.

**SEC. 367. When Deemed a Public Nuisance. Procedure Thereon.** Any electrical musical device operated or maintained to be operated in violation of this Article or any ordinances of the City and County of San Francisco or the rules and regulations of any state or municipal department concerned shall be deemed to be a public nuisance, and any such electrical musical device so operated or maintained to be operated shall be impounded by the Chief of Police, and if any court of competent jurisdiction shall determine that said electrical musical device or the use or operation thereof violates or has violated any of said ordinances or rules and regulations, said electrical musical device shall be confiscated by said Chief of Police; but, if said electrical musical device is one which may be legally operated under the provisions of this Article and is seized for the failure to pay the necessary license fee for the maintenance or operation of said electrical musical device, said electrical musical device shall be dealt with as provided in Section 366 of this Article.

**SEC. 368. Violation, a Misdemeanor.** Any person violating any of the provisions of this Article shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.

**SEC. 369. Permit and License Required Notwithstanding Any Other Provision of Code.** The issuance of a permit or license under the provisions of this Article shall not exempt the permittee or licensee, notwithstanding any section of the San Francisco Municipal Code or any section of any ordinance of the City and County of San Francisco making any section or sections thereof inapplicable, from the provisions of the San Francisco Municipal Code or any ordinance or ordinances of the City and County of San Francisco requiring a permit or license.

**SEC. 370. Partial Repeal.** Any and all ordinances, or parts thereof, in conflict with the provisions of this Article are hereby repealed but only to such extent as conflict may exist.

**SEC. 371. Saving Clause—Non-Waiver of Debts Due and Unpaid.** If any section, subsection, subdivision, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase of this Article is for any reason held to be unconstitutional, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Article. The Board of Supervisors hereby declares that it would have passed this Article, and each section, subsection, subdivision, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase thereof, irrespective of

the fact that any one or more other sections, subsections, subdivisions, paragraphs, sentences, clauses or phrases be declared unconstitutional.

The enactment of this Article shall not in any manner be construed as a waiver of any license or permit fee or any other fees or money due and unpaid under the provisions of the San Francisco Municipal Code or any ordinance of the City and County of San Francisco.

Supervisor MacPhee explained the foregoing bill, and stated wherein it differed from present legislation.

Supervisor Green objected to the immediate consideration of the foregoing bill. Copies had not been made available to the members of the Board. Some of the interested parties had but just received copies. The matter should be printed on the Board's Calendar in order that it might be properly examined. For that reason, he would move that consideration be postponed until Monday, February 7, 1944.

Motion seconded by Supervisor Mead.

Supervisor MacPhee, thereupon, stated that all interested parties had had a copy of the ordinance for sometime. The City Attorney had merely titled the ordinance and had placed the various paragraphs thereof in proper sequence.

Supervisor Mancuso objected to postponement. All parties interested were present and they were familiar with the ordinance. The matter could be taken care of without delay.

Supervisor Mead again urged postponement. The members of the Board were not familiar with the proposed legislation.

Thereupon, the roll was called and the motion to postponed was *defeated* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Brown, Green, Mead, Meyer, Sullivan—5.

Noes: Supervisors Gallagher, Gartland, MacPhee, Mancuso, Uhl—5.

Absent: Supervisor Colman—1.

Whereupon, Supervisor Brown announced that he desired a copy of the proposed legislation, and moved that further consideration be postponed until copy could be placed on each member's desk. Motion seconded by Supervisor Mead.

Motion *carried* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisor Brown, Green, Mead, Meyer, Sullivan, Uhl—6.

Noes: Supervisors Gallagher, Gartland, MacPhee, Mancuso—4.

Absent: Supervisor Colman—1.

Thereupon, Supervisor MacPhee moved, that because of the time required to prepare copies of the proposed legislation, that further consideration be postponed until Monday, February 7, 1944.

*No objection, and so ordered.*

### Endorsing Legislation to Limit Federal Income Taxation in Normal Peacetime.

(Series of 1939)

Supervisor Brown presented:

Proposal No. 3823, Resolution No. . . . . ., as follows:

Whereas, the burden of federal income taxes assessed upon business and individuals alike, has reached a point where it will in normal times be beyond the power of those affected to pay; and

Whereas, it appears that the trend of federal income taxation has been consistently upward and that no earnest effort has been made to so limit federal expenditures in normal times as to permit a reduction in the income tax rate; and

Whereas, although at present the nation is engaged in war and during a period of national emergency it would be unwise to attempt any

limitation of federal income or expenses, yet when the present emergency is concluded it will be necessary for the welfare of the country and its citizens to reduce to somewhere near sane levels the rates of federal income tax imposed on business and individuals; and

Whereas, as of this date, fifteen states as follows: Wyoming, Rhode Island, Mississippi, Iowa, Maine, Massachusetts, Michigan, Indiana, Arkansas, Delaware, Pennsylvania, Texas, Illinois, Wisconsin and Alabama have already passed resolutions requesting Congress to call a convention for the purpose of proposing an amendment to the Federal Constitution, limiting to a maximum rate of 25 per cent the power of Congress in peacetime to impose taxation on income, inheritance and gifts; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco does hereby petition the Legislature of the State of California to pass a resolution patterned along the lines of the resolution adopted by the Rhode Island Legislature and the other states listed above, as follows:

Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the State of Rhode Island, That application be and it hereby is made to the Congress of the United States of America to call a convention for the purpose of proposing the following article as an amendment to the Constitution of the United States:

#### ARTICLE —

"Section 1. The sixteenth article of amendment to the constitution of the United States is hereby repealed.

"Section 2. The Congress shall have power to lay and collect taxes on incomes, from whatever source derived, without apportionment among the several states, and without regard to any census or enumeration: Provided that in no case shall the maximum rate of tax exceed 25 per centum.

"Section 3. The maximum rate of any tax, duty, or excise which Congress may lay and collect with respect to the devolution or transfer of property, or any interest therein, upon or in contemplation of or intended to take effect in possession or enjoyment at or after death, or by way of gift, shall in no case exceed 25 per centum.

"Section 4. The limitations upon the rates of said taxes contained in sections 2 and 3 shall, however, be subject to the qualification that in the event of a war in which the United States is engaged creating a grave national emergency requiring such action to avoid national disaster, the Congress by a vote of three-fourths of each house may for a period not exceeding one year increase beyond the limits above prescribed the maximum rate of any such tax upon income subsequently accruing or received or with respect to subsequent devolutions or transfers of property, with like power, while the United States is actively engaged in such war, to repeat such action as often as such emergency may require.

"Section 5. Sections 1 and 2 shall take effect at midnight on the 31st day of December following the ratification of this article. Nothing contained in this article shall affect the power of the United States after said date to collect any tax on incomes for any period ending on or prior to said 31st day of December laid in accordance with the terms of any law then in effect.

"Section 6. Section 3 shall take effect at midnight on the last day of the sixth month following the ratification of this article. Nothing contained in this article shall affect the power of the United States to collect any tax on any devolution or

transfer occurring prior to the taking effect of section 3, laid in accordance with the terms of any law then in effect.”

and be it further

Resolved, that the Congress of the United States be, and it hereby is requested to provide as the mode of ratification that said amendment shall be valid to all intents and purposes, as part of the Constitution of the United States, when ratified by the legislatures of three-fourths of the several states; and be it further

Resolved, that the Secretary of State be, and he hereby is, directed to send a duly certified copy of this resolution to the Senate of the United States and one to the House of Representatives in the Congress of the United States.

and be it

Further Resolved, That the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco does go on record as favoring such legislation as soon as the termination of the national emergency will permit; and be it

Further Resolved, That a copy of this resolution be forwarded to His Excellency, Governor Warren, the San Francisco delegation in the State Legislature and to Senator Hiram Johnson, Senator Sheridan Downey, Representative Thomas Rolph and Representative Richard Welch at Washington, D. C.

*Referred to County, State and National Affairs Committee.*

**Appropriating \$1,530 From Unappropriated Reserve for Civilian Defense, to Provide Funds for Additional Contract Costs and Equipment in the Installation of a Kitchen in the Hospitality House; an Emergency Ordinance.**

(Series of 1939)

Supervisor MacPhee presented the following Finance Committee recommendation:

Bill No. 2742, Ordinance No. 2595, as follows:

Appropriating the sum of \$1,530 from Appropriation No. 302.000.79, Unappropriated Reserve for Civilian Defense, to provide funds for additional contract costs and equipment in the installation of a kitchen in the Hospitality House; an emergency ordinance.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco, as follows:

Section 1. The sum of \$1,530 is hereby appropriated from Appropriation No. 302.000.79, Unappropriated Reserve for Civilian Defense, to the credit of the following appropriations in the amounts and for the purposes recited:

Section 2. This ordinance is passed as an emergency measure, the nature of such emergency being as follows: The Citizens' Service Corps (Civilian War Council) is charged with the duty of providing service

for service men. One of the services being rendered to service men is the operation of the San Francisco Hospitality House. This ordinance is being passed to provide for the uninterrupted operation of this service.

Recommended and Approved by the Mayor, and President of the Civilian War Council.

Approved as to funds available by the Controller.

Approved as to form by the City Attorney.

*Finally Passed* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Brown, Gallagher, Gartland, MacPhee, Mancuso, Mead, Meyer, Sullivan, Uhl—9.

Absent: Supervisors Colman, Green—2.

**Chief Administrative Officer Urged to Formulate Plan for Continued Operation of Farmers' Free Market for Duration.**

(Series of 1939)

Supervisor MacPhee presented:

Proposal No. 3822, Resolution No. . . . . ., as follows:

Whereas, the United States Government is constantly emphasizing the necessity of increasing the volume of farm products and requesting the people of this country to eliminate waste and conserve food; and

Whereas, the operation of the Farmers' Free Market, opened in response to the numerous requests of our citizens and the endorsements of various agricultural organizations, has provided the farmers of adjacent communities with a necessary outlet for the disposal of fruit and vegetables which would have otherwise been ploughed under or been allowed to rot on the trees due to present war conditions over which farmers have no control and which restrict their normal channels of distribution; and

Whereas, the Farmers' Free Market has greatly benefited the people of the City and County of San Francisco during the past six months of operation by making accessible to them such fruit and vegetables at full ripeness for proper canning and processing at a reasonable price; and

Whereas, the people of the City and County and the growers of adjacent communities are desirous of having this project continue in operation during the war in which the United States of America is now engaged; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That this Board of Supervisors does hereby urge the Chief Administrative Officer to formulate a plan for the continued operation of the Farmers' Free Market for the duration of the war by negotiating an agreement with the owners of the site presently used for this purpose, proposing minimum improvements thereon, and formulating a schedule of fees to be paid by growers using said market sufficient to pay all costs of operation, including rent and personal services, and to amortize capital outlay; and be it

Further Resolved, That the Chief Administrative Officer is requested to submit said plan when formulated to this Board of Supervisors for necessary approval of any lease agreements and appropriation of funds for the purposes herein outlined.

Supervisor Uhl moved that consideration of the foregoing proposal be considered at the next meeting of the Board, February 7, 1944, at 3:00 p. m. and that all interested persons be notified of the hearing and be invited to be present.

*No objection, and so ordered.*



**Requesting Public Utilities Commission to Report on Practicability  
of Inaugurating an Extensive System of Bus Service.**

(Series of 1939)

Supervisor Uhl presented:

Proposal No. 3820, Resolution No. 3815, as follows:

Whereas, years have passed and we are no nearer the solution of our transportation problem; and

Whereas, purchase of the Market Street Railway System is not the answer to our problem; and

Whereas, purchase of the Market Street Railway System—a second-hand, dilapidated and practically worn-out transportation system, will require not alone the purchase of equipment to take the place of the dilapidated units of the Market Street Railway System, but will require purchasing additional equipment needed to provide an up-to-date transportation system; therefore, it behooves us to forget the purchase or any other means, lease-lend—for acquiring the Market Street Railway System; and

Whereas, progressive cities, with few exceptions, and San Francisco is one of the exceptions, are substituting bus transportation for trolley transportation—Seattle being one of the progressive cities that recently junked the old trolley transportation system and substituted busses; and

Whereas, the millions of dollars required for the purchase of the Market Street Railway System and the immediate purchase of new equipment—busses, necessary to take the place of the old Market Street Railway System's equipment, would leave San Francisco holding the sack, that is just about what happened to Seattle; millions would be needed to remove overhead construction, poles, tracks and pavings; and

Whereas, three cardinal points can be realized in bus operation compared with trolley operation, as follows:

1. Express service, possibly only by bus operation, inasmuch as one bus can pass another bus. It is a common sight on lines of mass transportation that two and three trolley cars are hunched. On afternoon of January 28th (5:00 P. M.) the Mission Street car on which I rode was crowded; at Mission and Twenty-second Street, two crowded Mission Street cars overtook the car on which I was a passenger. These cars always trailed us; a Greyhound bus passed us. Had those trolley cars been busses, they could have passed us.
2. Stopping at the curb in place of stopping in the middle of the street, thereby protecting the lives of our citizens.
3. The capacity of a bus is practically fifty per cent the capacity of a trolley car. Capacity of a bus should be limited to 90 passengers, a trolley car to 130. Whereas a trolley car requires two employees, the bus requires only one employee. It is presumed the capacity of two busses equals the capacity of one trolley car, and therefore in place of a ten-minute service on the trolley car, headway on two busses will be five minutes, and furthermore, crowded trolley cars take longer than the bus to load and unload passengers.

Since 1935 I have advocated use of busses. In 1937 I presented a map setting forth forty bus routes. Said map was referred to the Public Utilities Commission and never acted upon. Busses were available as late as 1940. Regrettable that the Public Utilities Commission failed to become bus-minded; and

Whereas, in order to improve transportation at least 150 busses should be immediately ordered, to apply on the following routes:

**CABRILLO STREET:** From Forty-eighth Avenue, via Cabrillo,

First Avenue, Turk, Taylor, Golden Gate; returning via Golden Gate Avenue, First Avenue and Cabrillo. Persons living adjacent to said route would receive the benefit of the five-cent fare.

**BUSH-PINE-CALIFORNIA:** From California and Twenty-fifth Avenue via California, Presidio Avenue, Bush, Market, Ferry; returning via Market, Pine, Presidio Avenue and California to Twenty-eighth Avenue.

**H and D:** Substitute busses on H and D lines. Extend H line via San Bruno Avenue, Bayshore Boulevard, to Visitacion to County Line; return same route.

**D Line:** Change route from Geary to Post, Market to Ferry. Removal of tracks on Van Ness Avenue and planting trees Van Ness, Market to North Point, will make Van Ness Avenue the most beautiful boulevard in the United States.

4. Route No. R: Extension of service by bus from Van Ness Avenue South at Army, via Mission, Silver Avenue, Alemany Boulevard, Junipero Serra Boulevard to metropolitan section. At peak hour, route the bus from Army via Van Ness Avenue South to First and Howard.

**Bus Route —:** From Forty-eighth Avenue and Noriega, via Noriega, Twentieth Avenue, Lincoln Way, Stanyan, Ellis, Fourth to Plan X Terminal, returning via same route.

As surplus revenues increase, additional busses should be purchased so that service can be extended; and be it therefore

Resolved, That the Public Utilities Commission be submitted a copy of this resolution with request that they, the Public Utilities Commission, report on same in the immediate future.

*Adopted by the following vote:*

Ayes: Supervisors Brown, Gallagher, Gartland, Green, MacPhee, Mancuso, Mead, Meyer, Sullivan, Uhl—10.

Absent: Supervisor Colman—1.

**Mr. Howard Freeman Proposed as Legislative Representative for City and County of San Francisco.**

Supervisor Green, under his name on Roll Call, suggested that Howard Freeman be considered for appointment as Legislative Representative for the City and County of San Francisco, at the State Capital and at Washington, D. C. Mr. Freeman is a newspaper man. He has handled publicity for the Exposition and for Agricultural District No. 1, and is, Supervisor Green believed, acceptable to both labor and capital.

*Suggestion referred to Rules Committee.*

#### **Salary Standardization Schedules.**

Supervisor MacPhee announced that the Salary Standardization Schedules proposed by the Civil Service Commission, would be presented to the Board on Tuesday, February 1, 1944, and requested that upon presentation they be referred directly to the Finance Committee for consideration.

*No objection, and so ordered.*

#### **Inspection of Log Cabin Ranch School.**

Supervisor MacPhee announced that the members of the Finance Committee had arranged to visit Log Cabin Ranch School on Thursday, February 3, 1944. They were to leave San Francisco at 8:00 a. m. Any member of the Board so desiring, was invited to make the trip.

**ADJOURNMENT.**

There being no further business, the Board, at the hour of 3:55 p. m., adjourned.

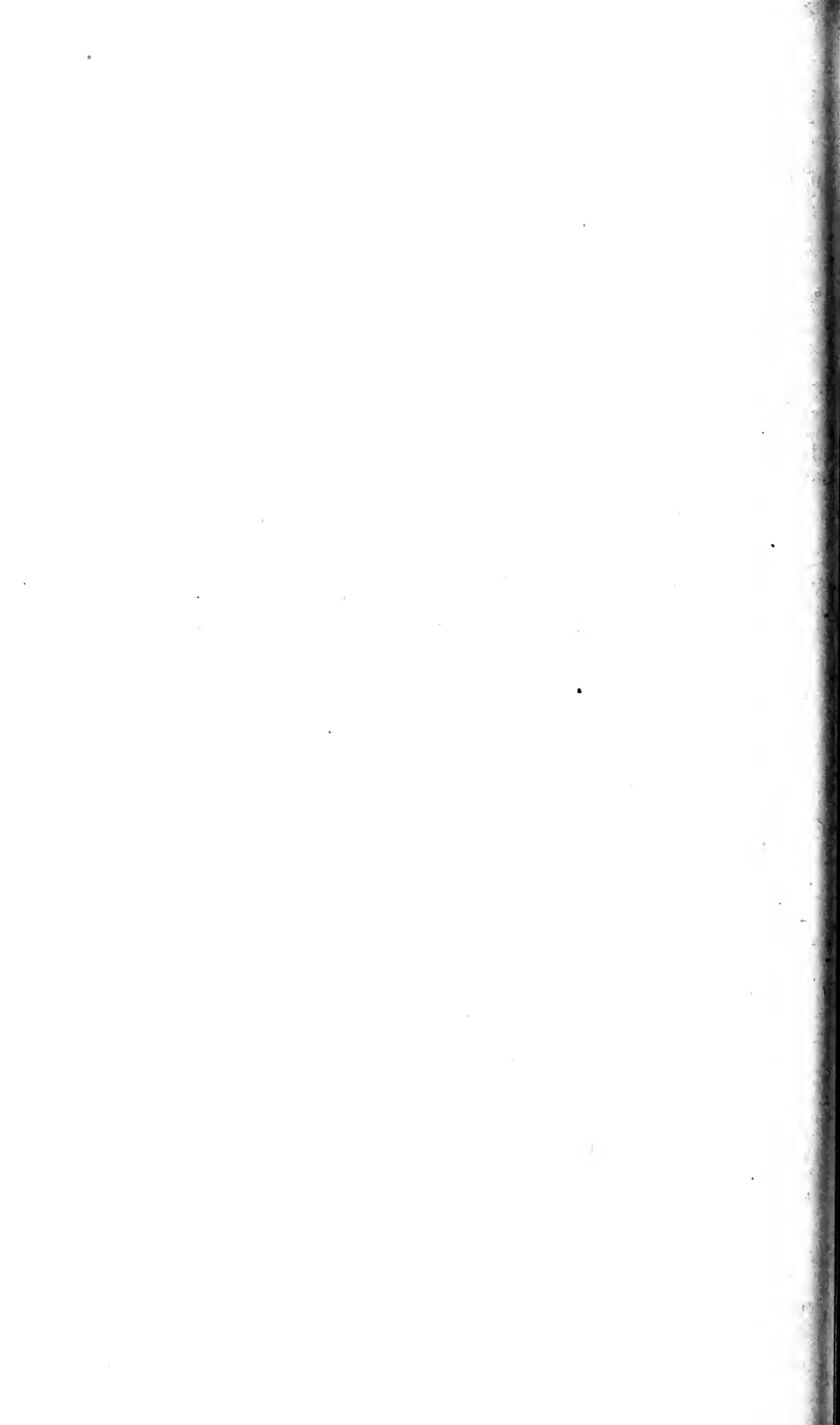

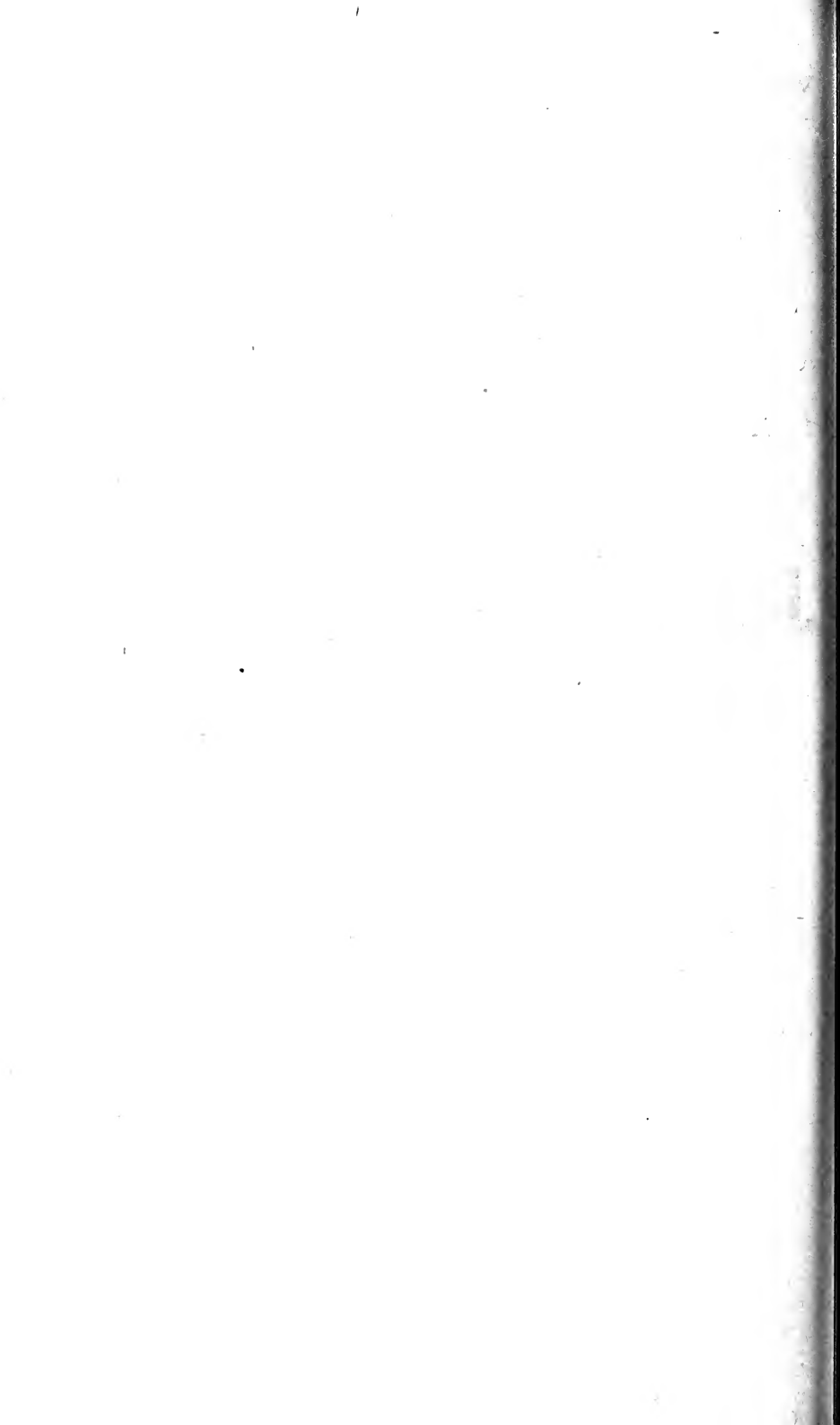

## APPROVAL OF JOURNAL.

The Journal of Proceedings of the meeting of January 24, 1944, was considered read and approved.

## Communications.

Communications, as follows, were presented, read by the Clerk, and acted on as noted:

From Congressman Rolph, a brochure on "The Hoboken Case" in connection with removal of government property from the tax roll.

From California State Library, requesting cooperation in state-wide "Send your Books to War" campaign in February.

*Referred to County, State and National Affairs Committee.*

From Redwood Empire Association, requesting that a member of the Board be named to represent the City and County of San Francisco on the Association's "Nine-Counties Highway Field Survey Committee."

The Chair appointed Supervisor Fred W. Meyer so to serve.

From his Honor the Mayor, recommending exemption of Field Nurses from residential qualifications of the Charter.

Consideration of obligations of Market Street Railway Company as to the use of streets and condition of streets used.

#### **Declaration of Policy Re Termination of Franchises of Market Street Railway Company.**

(Series of 1939)

Presented by Supervisor MacPhee at meeting of January 31, 1944.

Proposal No. 3821, Resolution No. . . . ., as follows:

Whereas, the Market Street Railway Company is the successor in interest of various franchises issued to various persons and corporations authorizing the operating of street railways over and on the streets of San Francisco, and is especially the successor in interest of a certain operating permit issued pursuant to the provisions of Section 6-B, Chapter II, Article II, of the Charter of the City and County of San Francisco, effective on January 8, 1900, and thereafter amended; and

Whereas, said operating permit was issued pursuant to all of the terms and conditions contained in the original franchises authorizing the operation and maintenance of said street railways; and

Whereas, the Market Street Railway Company is operating its several street railway lines in the City and County of San Francisco under and pursuant to said operating permit issued pursuant to the provisions of said Section 6-B, Chapter II, Article II of the said Charter of 1900 as amended, and under and pursuant to certain supplemental and additional permits issued by the Board of Supervisors of the City and County, which said permits were an extension of original franchises granted for the operation of street railway on the streets of the City and County of San Francisco; and

Whereas, it is provided in all franchises, the conditions of which became a part of said operating permit issued pursuant to the provisions of said Section 6-B, Chapter II, Article II of the said Charter of 1900 as amended, that the holder of said permit would pave the streets between the railroad tracks laid thereon and on two feet on each side of said tracks with the same materials which said streets were paved; and

Whereas, the Market Street Railway Company is now the owner and



holder of said operating permit mentioned aforesaid, and has failed and neglected to pave the streets on which said railroad tracks are laid, between said tracks, and on two feet on each side of said tracks, and has therefore violated the provisions of said operating permit; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Board of Supervisors does hereby submit to the electors of the City and County of San Francisco the following Declaration of Policy, to-wit: Shall the Board of Supervisors adopt an ordinance directing the City Attorney to take the necessary proceedings to cancel and annul the existing operating permit and all other permits and franchises held by the Market Street Railway Company under and by which said company operates street railway cars and buses over and on the streets of San Francisco, and upon the cancellation of said operating permit, permits or franchises, shall the Board of Supervisors issue to said Market Street Railway Company a month to month operating permit permitting the operation of street railway cars and buses over and on the streets of the City and County upon such terms and conditions as said Board shall deem proper.

*January 31, 1944—Consideration postponed until Monday, February 7, 1944, at 2:30 P. M.*

#### Discussion.

Following the reading of Proposal No. 3821 by the Clerk, Supervisor MacPhee explained at length the consideration given to the matter of the obligations of the Market Street Railway Company to repair and maintain streets in the City and County of San Francisco, and reviewed briefly the attempts which had previously been made either to compel the Market Street Railway Company to carry out its franchise obligations or to terminate their franchises. He believed the question of the termination of the franchises was something that the people should decide. He believed that the Board should extend to the people the right to vote on the matter.

Supervisor Colman objected to the adoption of the proposed resolution. There is no question, he stated, but that the most pressing problem facing the present administration is the question of transportation. The new administration is tackling the problem. Many meetings have been held and a plan has been formulated for the acquisition by the City and County of the Market Street Railway Company. Until this plan had been studied and approved or disapproved, the resolution should not be adopted. The resolution was not constructive. If the Board should accept the proposal, the adoption of the proposed resolution would be a futile act. Adoption of the resolution will not bring transportation; it might bring lengthy and expensive litigation, but no transportation. Litigation never pays, and particularly now, when nothing can be accomplished except confusing the issue. Negotiations are now under way, and within a reasonable time something will come before the Board approved by the administration responsible for the solution of the problem. The Board should wait until that time.

Supervisor Mead held that the proposed submission of a declaration of policy would not conflict with any plan that might be in the making. If such plan is eventually approved, the proposed submission can be withdrawn. The obligations of the Market Street Railway Company to the people should be fulfilled. The Board has not been able to solve the problem; the people should be given the opportunity to express themselves in the matter. This is the proper procedure to follow. The matter should go to the people.

Supervisor Brown opposed adoption of the proposed resolution. Adoption of the resolution will not aid in the solution of the traffic problem. People of San Francisco will not be able to ride to work on a law suit;

they need street car transportation. As for himself, Supervisor Brown continued, he did not need instructions from the people of San Francisco to know what to do, if the case should come to a point where some sort of action must be taken. The Board of Supervisors do not need to be told to do their duty. Their duty is very plain. If the Market Street Railway Company owes the City and County money, it should pay. It has not yet been proved that they owe it. Supervisor Brown could see no reason for taking the action as proposed. Nothing could be submitted to the people for some months. The matter should be laid on the table until the Board has had an opportunity to study the Mayor's plan in detail and passing on it. For that reason he would move that the matter be laid on the table. Motion seconded by Supervisors Meyer and Colman.

Thereupon, the roll was called and the motion to table was *defeated* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Brown, Colman, Green, Meyer, Sullivan—5.

Noes: Supervisors Gallagher, Gartland, MacPhee, Mancuso, Mead, Uhl—6.

Supervisor MacPhee, in answering Supervisors Colman and Brown, agreed that the Board was, of course, interested in transportation. However, it seemed typical to hear subject matters of this kind distorted so as to confuse the people who had to vote. The subject before the Board was not transportation; it was street paving. He believed that by adoption of the proposed resolution and showing the people that something must be done with regard to the obligations of the Market Street Railway, the Mayor's hands would be strengthened. Supervisor MacPhee then referred to the Journal of Proceedings of the meeting of March 2, 1942, wherein Supervisor Colman's explanation of his vote against a proposal to terminate the franchises of the Market Street Railway Company was recorded. Supervisor Colman had explained his vote at that time in a similar manner by stating that the termination of the franchises would not afford transportation. At that time it was stated that the company was financially unable to perform its obligations. There would be long and costly litigation, also, before the franchises could be terminated. Today the Market Street Railway has money to do the necessary work, or it can put aside money to do the work after the war. The Board should leave the responsibility for transportation to the proper officials, but it is the responsibility of the Board of Supervisors to see that the streets are kept in repair. Today, and for the past year, the Market Street Railway Company has enjoyed peak earnings and revenues. Two years later the company may not be enjoying the same revenues. As to the amount of delinquency in street repairs, the figures from the city's own engineers apparently do not satisfy Supervisor Brown. It was true, as Supervisor Brown had stated, that the sum of \$625,000 was mentioned in the negotiations for the purchase of the Market Street Railway a year or more ago. That was an estimated amount. It was subsequently brought up to date.

After further brief discussion, the Chief Administrative Officer stated that the amount of nearly \$1,700,000 was determined after very careful study by the city's engineers, and they were prepared to defend that figure. The amount includes the work that is considered the responsibility of the Market Street Railway Company.

Supervisor Meyer agreed with Supervisor MacPhee and others in the belief that the Market Street Railway Company should be compelled to do its street work. However, it is now the eve of making some sort of deal with the railroad company. If the company is compelled now to make the requested repairs it will raise the amount of the price of the railway properties by some \$1,700,000. The new administration should be given the opportunity of bringing in something concrete before the Board goes into this present matter.

Mr. L. V. Newton, representing the Market Street Railway Company, on being granted the privilege of the floor, held that the resolution proposed by Supervisor MacPhee was based on the assumption that the Market Street Railway Company has created a breach of contract by not carrying out the underlying obligations contained in the franchises which carry over into the operating permits under which that company is now operating. The company contends that it has not created a breach of contract, but is living up to its obligations.

At a joint meeting of the Finance and Public Utilities Committee on December 23, 1943, five members out of six being present, the only meeting of the Joint Committee at which there was a quorum, the report on which this action was based, was discussed in detail. At that meeting, continued Mr. Newton, he had pointed out that the report did not give credit for work which had been agreed on and which was covered by agreement or ordinance. Pursuant to legislation but recently enacted, the Market Street Railway Company has deposited some \$57,000 for street repair and reconstruction on streets where car tracks have been or are to be removed due to substitution of buses for street cars. Credit has not been given for that amount. Then, too, the franchises, or many of them, are silent on the question of track reconstruction. As to breach of contract, the burden of proof rests with those making such charge.

Thereupon, Supervisor Green, seconded by Supervisor Brown, moved that further consideration be postponed for four weeks.

Mrs. Nora Brady, representing San Francisco Property Owners' League, urged that action be taken to compel the Market Street Railway Company to fulfill the terms of its franchises. Mrs. Brady also stressed the need for adequate transportation, and stated that the people should persist in their endeavors to get transportation, especially for war workers. She urged that the people be given an opportunity to express their opinion as to the way they are now being treated.

Supervisor Colman, in reply to Mrs. Brady, stated that she had made an excellent argument, not for Supervisor MacPhee's resolution, but for transportation, and she was right. If the streets of San Francisco were like the streets in the legendary city of El Dorado, and paved with gold, the people would not have a bit better transportation. Why, on the very eve of the time when a proposal is going to come to the Board that will, undoubtedly, have the approval of the administration, bring up a matter that will not in any way help transportation? The city should get rid of the Market Street Railway Company once and for all, then it would not be faced with its present problem. The people, in his opinion, would have a much improved service. But the passage of Supervisor MacPhee's resolution would not bring about what Mrs. Brady and the people desire. It would only mean long litigation, and litigation is always costly. The people of San Francisco elected the Board, and gave the members certain powers. If the Board feels it necessary to take action, it has a perfect right to do so, and the people will appreciate action by the Board rather than the Board running to them for advice. The problem of street repair is neither complex nor difficult. It is purely and simply a financial one. Streets can be paved if the money is appropriated. But the transportation problem is a very difficult one. It is complex and requires a great deal of thought and constructive planning and action. As to confusing the two issues, continued Supervisor Colman, he was not so doing. He merely believed that transportation should come first, as it was the most important. The people had elected a new administration because, he believed, they wanted some action on problems on which no action had heretofore been taken. The new administration is acting; it is taking up, apparently, the most important thing first. That prob-

lem is transportation. The administration has something to present to the Board. The Board should give it a chance. The proposed resolution cannot help at all.

Supervisor Mead announced that he agreed with Supervisor Colman in one statement; that is, the people of San Francisco expect the Supervisors to perform their duties. The trouble is that there has been a minority which have been desirous to do what they have thought was for the welfare of the people. The majority of the Board has acted for the benefit of the Market Street Railway Company in the past, and not for the people. There is no harm, Supervisor Mead believed, in the Board going on record in submitting this proposal to the people at the next primary election. If a deal is consummated in the meantime, this proposal under consideration can be withdrawn.

Supervisor MacPhee again reviewed the history of the Board's consideration of the question of cancelling the franchises of the Market Street Railway Company. The matter had been under consideration since February, 1942, when a similar resolution had been presented. Again, in November, 1942, Supervisor O'Gara had also introduced a similar resolution. It is the responsibility of the Board, not of the new administration, to see that the streets are kept in repair. Today the Market Street Railway Company has the money for performing its obligations. Of course, any action the Board might take at the present time would not bring about better transportation. But the subject matter is not transportation; it is street repair. The proposed action probably will bring litigation, but it will, perhaps, bring about street repair.

Miss Clemmie Barry, representing the Communist Party of San Francisco, spoke briefly against the proposed postponement of further consideration. The matter should be on the ballot for the May primary election.

Mr. Lloyd Taylor, representing the Market Street Association, held that the proposed legislation did have an effect on transportation. It will postpone any opportunity to get better transportation. This matter would confuse the issue.

Mrs. Rose Walker did not believe that the Market Street Railway Company was giving the people adequate transportation. The Board of Supervisors should find out why they have not done so. She believed the entire question of better transportation and the enforcement of franchise obligations was in the lap of the new administration. The present proposal would only cause more confusion in the minds of the citizens and voters of San Francisco. She was in favor of postponement until a definite proposal has been submitted by the Mayor. The administration should be given a chance to do something. If the administration fails, the people can then do something for themselves.

Supervisor Green rose to a point of order, stating that every one had spoken all around the motion, but had not spoken to it.

No ruling on the point of order was made. The Chair announced that he recognized that the speakers had not spoken altogether to the motion to postpone, but had been allowed some latitude.

Supervisor MacPhee objected to the inference that might be drawn from remarks by Mr. Lloyd Taylor that the Supervisors are responsible for conditions created by the Market Street Railway Company. The people should be permitted to vote on the proposed declaration of policy, and get rid of the Market Street Railway Company. The resolution should be adopted.

Supervisor Green again raised a point of order. Supervisor MacPhee

was not speaking to the motion. It was not the question of not taking the matter to the people at all. The question was merely one of a four weeks' postponement in order to permit the Mayor to bring in some coordinated program.

Supervisor Uhl inquired as to the cost of holding a special election for the submission of such declaration of policy, and was told by the City Attorney that such election could be, under the state law, he believed, consolidated with the primary election, at little or no cost. Thereupon, Supervisor Uhl announced that he had voted against tabling the matter, but that he could see no objection in a four weeks' postponement. Such postponement would give ample time to follow the matter up.

Supervisor Mead opposed postponement. He held that any obligations to the people with respect to the maintenance of streets had nothing to do with the purchase of the Market Street Railway.

Thereupon, Supervisor Mancuso moved as an amendment to the motion for a four weeks' postponement, that the matter be postponed for two weeks. Seconded by Supervisor MacPhee, who announced that his seconding the motion was not to be considered as a commitment to vote for the motion, but was merely in order to get the matter before the Board.

Supervisor Mancuso explained the reason for his motion, stating that he felt that the people of San Francisco were definitely entitled to have the matter come before them. He felt that it was the only way to give them the opportunity of expressing their opinions as to whether or not the Board of Supervisors should take definite steps one way or the other to settle this problem once and for all. He was highly in favor of submitting this question of policy to the people, along with the proposal that the Mayor or the Public Utilities Commission might present. However, he was of the opinion that the Board was putting the "cart before the horse" in adopting the resolution at the present time. He believed a solution could be arrived at, but he felt that if the resolution should be adopted at the present time it would definitely interfere with the working out of a solution to the transportation problem. The resolution merely calls for submission of a question of policy to the people. If the people vote against the resolution, the question of taking steps to terminate the franchises of the Market Street Railway will be finished. If the people vote in favor, the Board will definitely know their feeling toward terminating the franchises. There would be no question of a court issue until this has been determined by the people.

Supervisor Green opposed the amendment to his motion. He desired to give the administration sufficient time to bring in some sort of a report. Four weeks, he believed, was only reasonable.

Thereupon, the roll was called and the motion to postpone further consideration for a period of two weeks was *defeated* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Mancuso, Uhl—2.

Noes: Supervisors Brown, Colman, Gallagher, Gartland, Green, MacPhee, Mead, Meyer, Sullivan—9.

#### Consideration Continued Four Weeks.

The roll was again called on motion for postponement of further consideration for a period of four weeks. Motion *carried* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Brown, Colman, Gallagher, Green, Meyer, Uhl—6.

Noes: Supervisors Gartland, MacPhee, Mancuso, Mead, Sullivan—5.

## SPECIAL ORDER—3:00 P. M.

**Chief Administrative Officer Urged to Formulate Plan for Continued Operation of Farmers' Free Market for Duration.**

(Series of 1939)

Supervisor MacPhee presented:

Proposal No. 3822, Resolution No. . . . . ., as follows:

Whereas, the United States Government is constantly emphasizing the necessity of increasing the volume of farm products and requesting the people of this country to eliminate waste and conserve food; and

Whereas, the operation of the Farmers' Free Market, opened in response to the numerous requests of our citizens and the endorsements of various agricultural organizations, has provided the farmers of adjacent communities with a necessary outlet for the disposal of fruit and vegetables which would have otherwise been ploughed under or been allowed to rot on the trees due to present war conditions over which farmers have no control and which restrict their normal channels of distribution; and

Whereas, the Farmers' Free Market has greatly benefited the people of the City and County of San Francisco during the past six months of operation by making accessible to them such fruit and vegetables at full ripeness for proper canning and processing at a reasonable price; and

Whereas, the people of the City and County and the growers of adjacent communities are desirous of having this project continue in operation during the war in which the United States of America is now engaged; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That this Board of Supervisors does hereby urge the Chief Administrative Officer to formulate a plan for the continued operation of the Farmers' Free Market for the duration of the war by negotiating an agreement with the owners of the site presently used for this purpose, proposing minimum improvements thereon, and formulating a schedule of fees to be paid by growers using said market sufficient to pay all costs of operation, including rent and personal services, and to amortize capital outlay; and be it

Further Resolved, That the Chief Administrative Officer is requested to submit said plan when formulated to this Board of Supervisors for necessary approval of any lease agreements and appropriation of funds for the purposes herein outlined.

*Monday, January 31, 1944—Consideration postponed to Monday, February 7, 1944, at 3:00 P. M.*

**Privilege of the Floor.**

Mr. John Brucato, representing Farmers' Market, Advisory Board of Consumer Groups, labor groups and Farmers' Committee, urged the adoption of the foregoing resolution. Both the farmers and the public want the market. The market stands on its own merits. If the public and the farmers did not want it, it would have closed up long ago. The expense involved in the improvement of the market will be very little.

Mr. John Hagopian, representing Wholesale Fruit and Produce Dealers' Association, declared there was no need for the market. The present channels of distribution are sufficient to take care of any products, large or small. He objected to the city spending any public money to finance the market. He believed the subject matter should be referred to the State Department of Agriculture before the city is called on to appropriate any money for it.

Mr. L. J. Hopkins, representing himself, was opposed to the farmers market. Products are being sold there at ceiling prices; it is no longer a Farmers' Market. They are peddlers rather than farmers who operate there.

Mrs. Whitehead, a proponent of the Farmers' Market, urged that it be retained. It would be effective against the wholesalers' monopoly if it should be retained.

Mrs. Annie Scanlon also spoke in favor of the market. The wholesalers object, she declared, because they want a monopoly. The market will enable the people to get surplus foods at fair prices.

Supervisor MacPhee, in discussing the resolution, stated that he believed it met with the ideas that have been suggested by both the proponents and opponents. The resolution provides for a "schedule of fees to be paid by growers using said market sufficient to pay all costs of operation, including rent and personal services, and to amortize capital outlay." The market will provide an outlet for fruit and vegetables that would otherwise be plowed under or allowed to rot. The resolution provides for the Chief Administrative Officer to formulate a plan under which all these things can be accomplished, and to report back to the Board on the costs of such plan and operation.

Supervisor Uhl announced that he could not vote for a free market. He would be willing to give it consideration if he could know the cost, but he could not commit himself at the present time by voting for the resolution.

Supervisor Meyer opposed the free market. He expressed opposition to the erection of any buildings or anything else for a free market. He could see no good reason for putting in the term "for the duration." If the proposal is good, it will be good for all time.

Supervisor Uhl, after questioning the Chief Administrative Officer concerning his interpretation of the resolution, stated that the first "Resolve" apparently gave the Chief Administrative Officer a free hand to close any deal with the owners of the property on which the market was located. The Board should know just what the market would cost before making any commitments.

#### In Hands of the Board.

On motion by Supervisor Brown, the matter was taken into the hands of the Board.

Supervisor Brown, in discussing the subject matter, agreed that the free market did, in some instances, save money for those who patronized it. The Board of Supervisors, however, must consider the interests of the entire city. The Board of Supervisors must play fair with the people who pay taxes, and pay license fees—with the people who make up San Francisco. The resolution proposes that the City and County of San Francisco put up money to build structures in which will be carried on industries competing with already existing channels of trade in San Francisco. It will permit people to compete with men who pay taxes, but who do not themselves pay any taxes in San Francisco. In addition to that, it is illegal for the city to spend money to construct buildings on leased property. The Board would be unwise to pass the proposed resolution. The city should not spend money to aid in competition against people in established channels of trade who are doing a good job. The Board should not support the resolution. In closing, Supervisor Brown stated that he could not vote for the measure, whether it was merely permissive, or whether it went further than that.

Supervisor Mead stated that he believed the second "Resolve" nullified the first "Resolve," in some degree, at least. The matter has to come to the Board of Supervisors under the terms of the resolution.

The Chief Administrative Officer then stated that he believed that if he were to have the power to negotiate for the use of the property, he should have the power to close the transactions.

Supervisor Mead contended that the resolution merely would give the Chief Administrative Officer power to negotiate an agreement, subject to approval by the Board of Supervisors.

Supervisor MacPhee agreed with the views expressed by Supervisor Mead. He believed that any lease the Chief Administrative Officer might negotiate on behalf of any branch of the city government not under his own jurisdiction, would have to receive the approval of the Board of Supervisors.

Thereupon, the Chief Administrative Officer asked that the intent be made clear. As the resolution was written, he believed it would give him the right to negotiate and to close an agreement. If that should not be the wish of the Board, the resolution should be made clear.

Whereupon, Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Sullivan, moved as an amendment, that in the first "Resolve," after the words "for the duration of the war," in the third line of that Resolve, the rest of the "Resolve" be stricken out.

Supervisor Brown raised a point of order, stating that the proposed amendment to the committee report must itself be referred to committee, except by unanimous consent of the Board.

The Chair ruled the point of order not well taken. The matter was before the Board of Supervisors as a committee report. Any member of the Board could offer an amendment to the committee's report at any time. As presented by the committee, according to the interpretation of the Chief Administrative Officer, he was given full authority to proceed; if the amendment is approved, the Chief Administrative Officer would merely be given authority to do certain things and then report the matter back to the Board.

Thereupon, Supervisor Brown announced that if the amendment should prevail he would raise a point of order that the matter must be re-referred to committee.

Whereupon, the roll was called and the motion to amend was *carried* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Colman, Gallagher, Gartland, MacPhee, Mancuso, Mead, Sullivan, Uhl—8.

Noes: Supervisors Brown, Meyer—2.

Absent: Supervisor Green—1.

Supervisor Brown then requested a ruling on his point of order that the entire matter, having been amended, must be returned to committee.

The Chair ruled the point of order not well taken.

Subsequently during the proceedings, Supervisor Brown announced that his point of order was based on a bill which had earlier in the proceedings been finally passed. His attention having been called to the fact that that bill had not yet been approved by the Mayor, and so not being effective, he agreed with the Chair that his point of order was not well taken.

Supervisor Colman announced that there had been enough demand from customers who had patronized the free market, in his opinion, to make it the duty of the Board to investigate thoroughly the possibilities of its continuance. The Board will not be bound, by the adoption of the amendment, in any way, shape or manner. If the points brought out by Mr. Hopkins that inferior merchandise is being sold at



higher prices, conditions of that character should not be continued. If people buy merchandise and take it to the market to peddle at a profit, that should not be permitted. The adoption of a plan to be formulated should do away, as far as possible, with any abuses that might otherwise take place. Those who have visited the free market have been amazed at the number of San Francisco citizens who patronize it. However, he would reserve his final vote until he had heard the Chief Administrative Officer's report.

Thereupon, Supervisor Brown questioned the Chief Administrative Officer, asking if the law permitted the City and County of San Francisco to erect buildings, with public funds, on private property, even where such property is leased to the City and County.

The Chief Administrative Officer replied, saying that the same question came before the Civilian War Council several months previously, and the Controller expressed a doubt as to whether such funds could be utilized for improvement of private property.

Thereupon, Supervisor Brown, seconded by Supervisor Meyer, moved that the matter be referred to the City Attorney for an opinion on that point.

Whereupon, the roll was called and the motion to refer to the City Attorney was *defeated* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Brown, Gallagher, Gartland, Meyer—4.

Noes: Supervisors Colman, MacPhee, Mancuso, Mead, Sullivan—6.

Absent: Supervisor Green—1.

Supervisor Uhl, seconded by Supervisor Gartland, then moved that further consideration be temporarily postponed, and the City Attorney be sent for.

*No objection, and so ordered.*

Subsequently during the proceedings, the City Attorney being present, Supervisor Brown questioned him, asking if the city could erect buildings from public funds on lands not owned by the City and County.

The City Attorney, in reply, stated that such right to expend public funds would depend on the extent and purpose for which such funds were to be used, and on the terms of a lease.

Supervisor Mancuso declared that there was nothing for the City Attorney to determine at the present time, nor would there be prior to the receipt of plans formulated by the Chief Administrative Officer pursuant to the terms of the resolution under consideration.

Supervisor Colman expressed agreement with the views of Supervisor Mancuso.

The City Attorney, after examining the proposed resolution, announced that no expenditure of city funds was involved in the resolution. He would answer the question fully when he had received plans formulated by the Chief Administrative Officer.

Thereupon, the roll was called and the foregoing resolution, amended to read as follows, was *Adopted* by the following vote:

### Chief Administrative Officer Urged to Formulate Plan for Continued Operation of Farmers' Free Market for Duration.

(Series of 1939)

Proposal No. 3822, Resolution No. 3825, as follows:

Whereas, the United States Government is constantly emphasizing the necessity of increasing the volume of farm products and requesting the people of this country to eliminate waste and conserve food; and

Whereas, the operation of the Farmers' Free Market, opened in response to the numerous requests of our citizens and the endorsements of various agricultural organizations, has provided the farmers of adjacent communities with a necessary outlet for the disposal of fruit and vegetables which would have otherwise been ploughed under or been allowed to rot on the trees due to present war conditions over which farmers have no control and which restrict their normal channels of distribution; and

Whereas, the Farmers' Free Market has greatly benefited the people of the City and County of San Francisco during the past six months of operation by making accessible to them such fruit and vegetables at full ripeness for proper canning and processing at a reasonable price; and

Whereas, the people of the City and County and the growers of adjacent communities are desirous of having this project continue in operation during the war in which the United States of America is now engaged; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That this Board of Supervisors does hereby urge the Chief Administrative Officer to formulate a plan for the continued operation of the Farmers' Free Market for the duration of the war; and be it

Further Resolved, that the Chief Administrative Officer is requested to submit said plan when formulated to this Board of Supervisors for necessary approval of any lease agreements and appropriation of funds for the purposes herein outlined.

An ordinance amending Article 5, Part III, of the San Francisco Municipal Code, “Electrical Musical Devices,” regulating the installation and use of electrical amusement devices in the City and County of San Francisco; defining certain terms used in this Article; providing for the issuance of permits and licenses for the use, operation and maintenance of electrical musical devices; providing for their impounding and confiscation when installed, operated or maintained to be operated in violation of this Article and for the destruction or other disposal thereof by the Chief of Police; providing for the payment and collection of fees for said license; authorizing the Chief of Police to adopt, promulgate and enforce the rules and regulations governing such inspection and operation; provides penalties for the violation of this Article; repealing conflicting ordinances to such extent as conflict may exist and providing for a saving clause and non-waiver of debts due and unpaid.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco, as follows:

Section 1. Article 5, Part III, of the San Francisco Municipal Code, entitled “Electrical Musical Devices,” is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 2. The Table of Contents of said Article 5 is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 3. Sections 350 to 375, inclusive, are hereby amended to read as follows:

**SEC. 350. Definitions.** As used in this Article, the following words shall have the following respective meanings:

“Electrical Musical Devices” shall mean any machine, apparatus or device operated or which may be operated by electricity and designed or constructed for the purpose of producing or playing any musical tone or tones or combination of tones; and the use, operation or playing of such machine, apparatus or device which is permitted or allowed by the deposit of any coin, slug, or token in any slot or receptacle attached to said machine, apparatus or device, or connected therewith; and which machine, apparatus or device does not dispense any article or thing and cannot be operated as a game or contest.

“Operator,” as used in this Article, shall mean:

(a) Any owner of such electrical musical device who operates or permits the same to be played or operated in his place of business or in any place open to the public under his control.

(b) The person in whose place of business any such electrical musical device is placed for the use, amusement, patronage or recreation of the public or of persons in or about said place.

“Person,” as used in this Article, shall mean: Any corporation, association, syndicate, joint stock company, partnership, club, Massachusetts business or common law trust, society or individual.

**SEC. 351. Requirements for Machines.** Every electrical musical device shall have a seal or tag permanently attached thereto showing the serial number of said electrical musical device; and, in addition thereto a label indicating the name and address of the manufacturer and the voltage and current necessary for the proper operation of said electrical musical device.

Every portable electrical musical device shall be equipped with not more than six (6) feet of electric cord of a type approved by the Department of Electricity, and shall be connected to a convenience plug receptacle adjacent to said electrical musical device. Where it is necessary to install electrical wiring to said electrical musical device location said wiring shall be installed by a registered electrical contractor in accordance with the provisions of Article 1, Chapter III, Part II, of the San Francisco Municipal Code.

**SEC. 352. Unlawful Acts.** It shall be unlawful for any operator of an electrical musical device to install, operate or maintain to be operated any electrical musical device in the City and County of San Francisco without first having obtained a permit in writing so to do

from the Chief of Police and having the seal of approval, as herein-after provided for, placed on each of said electrical musical devices.

It shall be unlawful to remove said seal of approval from said electrical musical device to which it was attached as provided for in this Article, and affix same to another device or machine.

**SEC. 353. Application for Permit.** Application for said permit shall be made to the Chief of Police in triplicate on forms provided by the Police Department, and shall be signed by the applicant, and shall contain the following information:

(a) Name and address of the operator, and the type and character of the business or calling carried on by the operator;

(b) The type and serial number of the electrical musical device and the name or number of the premises where same is to be operated or installed;

(c) Total number of electrical musical devices to be operated at or in said premises;

(d) Such additional information as the Chief of Police shall deem necessary to enable the Chief of the Department of Electricity to fully investigate the nature and character of said electrical musical device and the proposed method for the installation of the same, and such other information as the Chief of Police shall deem necessary to enable him to determine the purposes for which said electrical musical device shall be operated.

**SEC. 354. Investigations.** Upon receipt of said application the Chief of Police shall cause to be investigated the statements set forth in the application. Should he, after said investigation, determine that the operation and maintenance of said electrical musical device will not violate any law of the State of California, or ordinance of the City and County of San Francisco, or rule or regulation of any department of the state or municipal government, and will not be detrimental to the health, morals and welfare of the people of the City and County, he shall approve said application, but should he determine to the contrary he shall disapprove said application, stating his reasons for said disapproval, and in the event of such disapproval said application shall be deemed to be denied, provided, however, that if said Chief of Police should find that any existing condition which caused the disapproval of said application can be remedied, he shall allow a reasonable time to correct said condition, and when corrected to his said satisfaction shall approve said application.

Within ten days after the receipt of any application for the installation, operation or maintenance of any electrical musical device the Chief of Police shall cause a copy of said application to be forwarded to the Chief of the Department of Electricity, and the latter shall investigate said application, and after said investigation if it shall appear that the installation, operation and maintenance of said electrical musical device conforms with all ordinances of the City and County, and the rules and regulations of the department thereof, and that said electrical musical devices can be maintained and operated without danger to the safety of the people of the City and County of San Francisco, the Chief of the Department of Electricity shall approve the same, but should he determine to the contrary, he shall disapprove the same, stating his reasons for said disapproval, and in the event of said disapproval said application shall be deemed denied, provided, however, that if said Chief of the Department of Electricity should find that any existing condition which caused the disapproval of said application can be remedied, he shall allow a reasonable time, not to exceed ten days, to correct said condition and when corrected to his satisfaction shall approve said application.

On the final action of the Chief of the Department of Electricity upon any application for the installation, maintenance and operation of an electrical musical device, he shall report his action thereon to the Chief of Police. If the Chief of the Department of Electricity has

finally disapproved said application, upon any of the grounds under his jurisdiction, said application shall be denied by the Chief of Police, but if the said application is approved by the Chief of the Department of Electricity, and the same has also, or is thereafter approved by the Chief of Police, the said application shall be deemed granted, and the Chief of Police shall issue a permit for the installation, maintenance and operation of said musical device as required in said application. Provided, however, that nothing in this section shall be deemed to abridge or limit the right, power and authority given the Chief of Police by Section 35.6 of the Charter of the City and County of San Francisco to refuse to issue the police permit required under this ordinance or to revoke such permit.

**SEC. 355. Expiration of Permits.** Any permit so issued shall expire on the last day of March, June, September and December of each year, and the renewal or continuance of said permit shall be governed by the provisions of Section 23 of Article 1, Part III of the San Francisco Municipal Code, provided that any permit for the installation, operation or maintenance of any electrical musical device in force on the effective date of this ordinance shall be continued in effect for the current quarter for which it has been issued.

**SEC. 356. Permit Forwarded to Tax Collector.** On the granting of any permit for the installation, maintenance and operation of any electrical musical device by the Chief of Police, he shall transmit said permit to the Tax Collector to be delivered to the permittee upon the payment of the fees provided for in Section 357 of this Article. Said Chief of Police shall also advise the Chief of the Department of Electricity of the granting of said permit and it shall be the duty of the latter to supervise the installation of said electrical musical device insofar as the electrical installation thereof is concerned.

**SEC. 357. License Fees.** Every permittee shall pay to the Tax Collector a monthly license fee of one dollar (\$1.00), plus a monthly license fee of an additional one dollar (\$1.00) for each separate electrical musical device which the permit authorizes, payable quarterly in advance, for the periods ending on the last days of March, June, September and December of each year.

**SEC. 358. Contents of Licenses.** The Tax Collector shall issue a license for such electrical musical devices for which the fee was paid, showing thereon the

- (a) Name and address of the permittee;
- (b) Number and kind of the electrical musical devices the permit authorizes;
- (c) Serial number of the permit and the expiration date of the license.

**SEC. 359. Removal or Transferring of License to Other Person or Premises Prohibited.** The permit and license issued pursuant to this Article shall be valid only for the person to whom issued and the premises for which issued, and license fees paid under the provisions of this Article shall not be prorated or refunded.

**SEC. 360. Notification of Issuance of License—Placing of Seal of Approval.** Upon the issuance to the permittee of the license as provided for in this Article, the Tax Collector shall immediately notify in writing the Chief of the Department of Electricity of such fact. Upon receipt of such notification, the Chief of the Department of Electricity shall cause to be placed in a conspicuous place on each of said electrical musical devices for which a permit and license has been obtained a seal of approval for the public to see, of such shape, design, wording and material as the Controller shall specify. Upon revocation of such permit the Chief of Police shall notify the Chief of the Department of Electricity of that fact, and said seal of approval shall be removed by the latter from such device and destroyed. The Chief of the Department of Electricity or any representative of the Department of Elec-

tricity shall have access to any electrical musical device at any and all times. In the event of the renewal of any permit or license for any electrical musical device it shall not be necessary for the Chief of the Department of Electricity to renew the seal of approval if the same is intact.

**SEC. 361. Application for Renewal of License or for Additional License.** Application for renewal of license shall be made to the Tax Collector and shall be made within ten (10) days prior to the expiration of the current license. If said application for a renewal of license be not made within the times specified, the permit authorized by this Article shall automatically become null and void.

Whenever a permittee desires to install, operate or maintain to be operated electrical musical devices in addition to the number of said devices authorized by his current permit and license, the provisions of this Article shall apply provided that the monthly license fee of one dollar shall not be required to be paid.

**SEC. 362. Procedure Where No Current License.** If any electrical musical device is placed, operated, or maintained to be operated without a license, the Chief of Police shall immediately cause the same to be impounded and shall not release said electrical musical device until a permit and license has been obtained as provided for in this Article for obtaining an original permit, and a penalty of twice the amount of the delinquent quarterly license fee for the current period has been paid to the Tax Collector, and the amount of said delinquent licenses and penalties shall be a lien on said electrical musical devices and the same may be sold by the Tax Collector to satisfy said lien.

**SEC. 363. Suspension, Revocation or Reinstatement of a Permit. Procedure for.** When the Chief of Police shall determine that the permittee or any of the permittee's employees, servants or agents in the use, operation or maintenance of any such electrical musical device is violating or attempting to violate any law of the State of California or any ordinance of the City and County of San Francisco or the rules and regulations of any department thereof concerned; or, if in the opinion of the Chief of Police it is deemed necessary for the protection of the public, the Chief of Police, after written notice to the permittee, and after due and proper hearing, shall have power to suspend or revoke any permit issued under the provisions of this Article.

The Chief of Police shall cause to be forwarded to the Tax Collector and to the Chief of the Department of Electricity written notice of any revocation, suspension or reinstatement of any permit herein provided for.

**SEC. 364. Devices Not to Be Used for Dancing Without a Permit.** It shall be unlawful for any person having a permit to operate an electrical musical device, to use, or to permit the same to be used, for the furnishing of music for dancing on any premises or in any place where a permit allowing dancing on said premises or place has not been granted.

**SEC. 365. Devices Not to Be Used so as to Affect Public Health or Morals.** No person having a permit to operate or maintain an electrical musical device shall maintain or use the same or permit the same to be used so that the same shall be detrimental to the health, safety or morals of any person on or about the premises where said electrical musical device is operated or maintained, and the Chief of Police is hereby given full authority to determine when any such musical device is maintained or used so as to be detrimental to the health, safety and morals of those in and about said premises.

**SEC. 366. Rules and Regulations to Be Adopted.** The Chief of Police is hereby authorized to adopt, promulgate and enforce such rules and regulations regarding electrical musical devices as will enable him to enforce and carry out the meaning and intent of this Article.

**SEC. 367. When Deemed a Public Nuisance. Procedure Thereon.** Any electrical musical device operated or maintained to be operated in violation of this Article or any ordinances of the City and County of San Francisco or the rules and regulations of any state or municipal department concerned shall be deemed to be a public nuisance, and any such electrical musical device so operated or maintained to be operated shall be impounded by the Chief of Police, and if any court of competent jurisdiction shall determine that said electrical musical device or the use or operation thereof violates or has violated any of said ordinances or rules and regulations, said electrical musical device shall be confiscated by said Chief of Police; but, if said electrical musical device is one which may be legally operated under the provisions of this Article and is seized for the failure to pay the necessary license fee for the maintenance or operation of said electrical musical device, said electrical musical device shall be dealt with as provided in Section 366 of this Article.

**SEC. 368. Violation, a Misdemeanor.** Any person violating any of the provisions of this Article shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.

**SEC. 369. Permit and License Required Notwithstanding Any Other Provision of Code.** The issuance of a permit or license under the provisions of this Article shall not exempt the permittee or licensee, notwithstanding any section of the San Francisco Municipal Code or any section of any ordinance of the City and County of San Francisco making any section or sections thereof inapplicable, from the provisions of the San Francisco Municipal Code or any ordinance or ordinances of the City and County of San Francisco requiring a permit or license.

**SEC. 370. Partial Repeal.** Any and all ordinances, or parts thereof, in conflict with the provisions of this Article are hereby repealed but only to such extent as conflict may exist.

**SEC. 371. Saving Clause—Non-Waiver of Debts Due and Unpaid.** If any section, subsection, subdivision, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase of this Article is for any reason held to be unconstitutional, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Article. The Board of Supervisors hereby declares that it would have passed this Article, and each section, subsection, subdivision, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase thereof, irrespective of the fact that any one or more other sections, subsections, subdivisions, paragraphs, sentences, clauses or phrases be declared unconstitutional.

The enactment of this Article shall not in any manner be construed as a waiver of any license or permit fee or any other fees or money due and unpaid under the provisions of the San Francisco Municipal Code or any ordinance of the City and County of San Francisco.

#### Privilege of the Floor.

Assemblyman Call from San Mateo County, representing a state-wide organization of operators of electrical musical devices, was granted the privilege of the floor, on motion by Supervisor Green.

Mr. Call announced that he had not had the opportunity to study the proposed legislation. The Chairman of the Police Commission, stated Mr. Call, had never heard of the bill. It would be taken up and considered by the Police Commission at its meeting of Monday, February 7, 1944. He, too, desired to familiarize himself with the proposed legislation, and requested that the Board postpone consideration thereon until he had been given that opportunity.

Thereupon, Supervisor Green, seconded by Supervisor Sullivan, moved that further consideration be postponed for two weeks.

Supervisor MacPhee objected to postponement. The matter had been in committee for about four months. It was originally recommended by the Chief of Police and a comprehensive study has been made of it.

Numerous hearings have been held, and interested parties have been successful in arranging for delays, time after time. There is nothing to prevent interested parties from appearing before the Board two weeks hence and ask for further postponement. He was opposed to any further continuances.

Supervisor Uhl inquired as to the number of machines in operation and the receipts therefrom. He could not vote for the proposed legislation at the present time, since he did not have the information he desired.

Supervisor Mead urged postponement. Mr. Call, he stated, was entitled to the courtesy of a two weeks' postponement.

Supervisor Sullivan also stated that he believed Mr. Call was entitled to the courtesy of a two weeks' postponement.

Supervisor Colman desired to hear the recommendations of the Police Commission. He was ready to vote for two weeks' postponement. He would, however, vote against any further continuance.

Supervisor MacPhee stated that the Chief of Police desired the legislation; if the Police Commission were to follow the Chief's recommendations, as it usually does, the Commission would be behind the measure.

Supervisor Green objected to the statement by Supervisor MacPhee. It was the Chief of Police who usually follows the advice of the Commission; it was not the Commission which followed the advice of the Chief of Police.

Thereupon, the roll was called, and the motion to postpone consideration until Monday, February 21, 1944, was *carried* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Brown, Colman, Gallagher, Gartland, Green, Mead, Meyer, Sullivan, Uhl—9.

Noes: Supervisors MacPhee, Mancuso—2.

#### Action Rescinded.

Subsequently during the day's proceedings, Supervisor MacPhee announced that there were some ladies who had been present during the meeting but who would be unable to be present on February 21st. He did not believe there would be any objection from the opponents for an additional week's delay, which had been requested by those ladies. For that reason, he would move that the previous action of the Board, whereby consideration had been continued until February 21, 1944, be rescinded.

*No objection, and action rescinded.*

Thereupon, Supervisor MacPhee moved that consideration be postponed until Monday, February 28, 1944, at 2:30 p. m.

*No objection, and so ordered.*

**Requesting War Labor Board to Adjust Wage Scale of Platform Men of Market Street Railway Company and to Order That Company to Put Into Service Fifty Idle Cars or to Lease Said Cars to the City and County of San Francisco.**

(Series of 1939)

Supervisor Uhl presented:

Proposal No. 3834, Resolution No. . . . . , as follows:

Whereas, two factors are involved regarding transportation in San Francisco; one, wages of the platform men on the Market Street Railway; two, street car equipment; and

Whereas, due to the low wage paid the platform men of the Market Street Railway, 82½ cents per hour as compared to the wage scale of the Municipal Railway, 85 cents per hour for the first six months, 87½ cents second six months, 90 cents third six months and 92½ cents thereafter, there exists an abnormal condition on the Market Street Railway; and

Whereas, said increased wages to the platform men of the Municipal Railway have resulted in Municipal Railway operations being normal; and

Whereas, in the event that the City purchases the Market Street Railway, the wage scale of the Market Street Railway's platform men will automatically be equalized with the wages paid Municipal Railway platform men; and

Whereas, the manpower shortage of the Municipal Railway was overcome by the wage increase of July 1, 1943, and evidences the fact that an adjustment in the wage scale of the Market Street Railway should be made; and

Whereas, Mr. Joseph P. Eastman, Director, Office of Defense Transportation, has notified the city that unless transportation is improved, his office will step in; and

Whereas, there no longer exists a manpower shortage on the Municipal Railway and that cars are running on schedule; and

Whereas, due to existing manpower shortage on the Market Street Railway and which manpower shortage will, under existing conditions, continue in the event the Office of Defense Transportation steps in, unless the wage scale is adjusted; and

Whereas, fifty Market Street Railway cars are idle, due to the wage scale, said cars being listed on the attached letter from Mr. L. V. Newton, vice-president of the Market Street Railway; and

Whereas, Mr. Newton stated those fifty cars could be placed in service within a month, and Mr. Cahill has stated those fifty cars could be reconditioned at a cost of \$1,800 each; and

Whereas, in order that those fifty cars can be placed in service, the Market Street Railway should be notified to place those cars in service, and failing to do so, the Market Street Railway should then lease the cars to the city; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco appeal to the War Labor Board and the Office of Defense

Transportation to grant the request of the Board of Supervisors to adjust, as soon as possible, the wage scale of the Market Street Railway platform men and to order the Market Street Railway to place those fifty cars in service, and if unable to do so, to lease said cars to the city; and be it

Further Resolved, That the Office of Defense Transportation notify the Market Street Railway to grant permission to the city to operate the L and J cars on the inner tracks of the Market Street Railway.

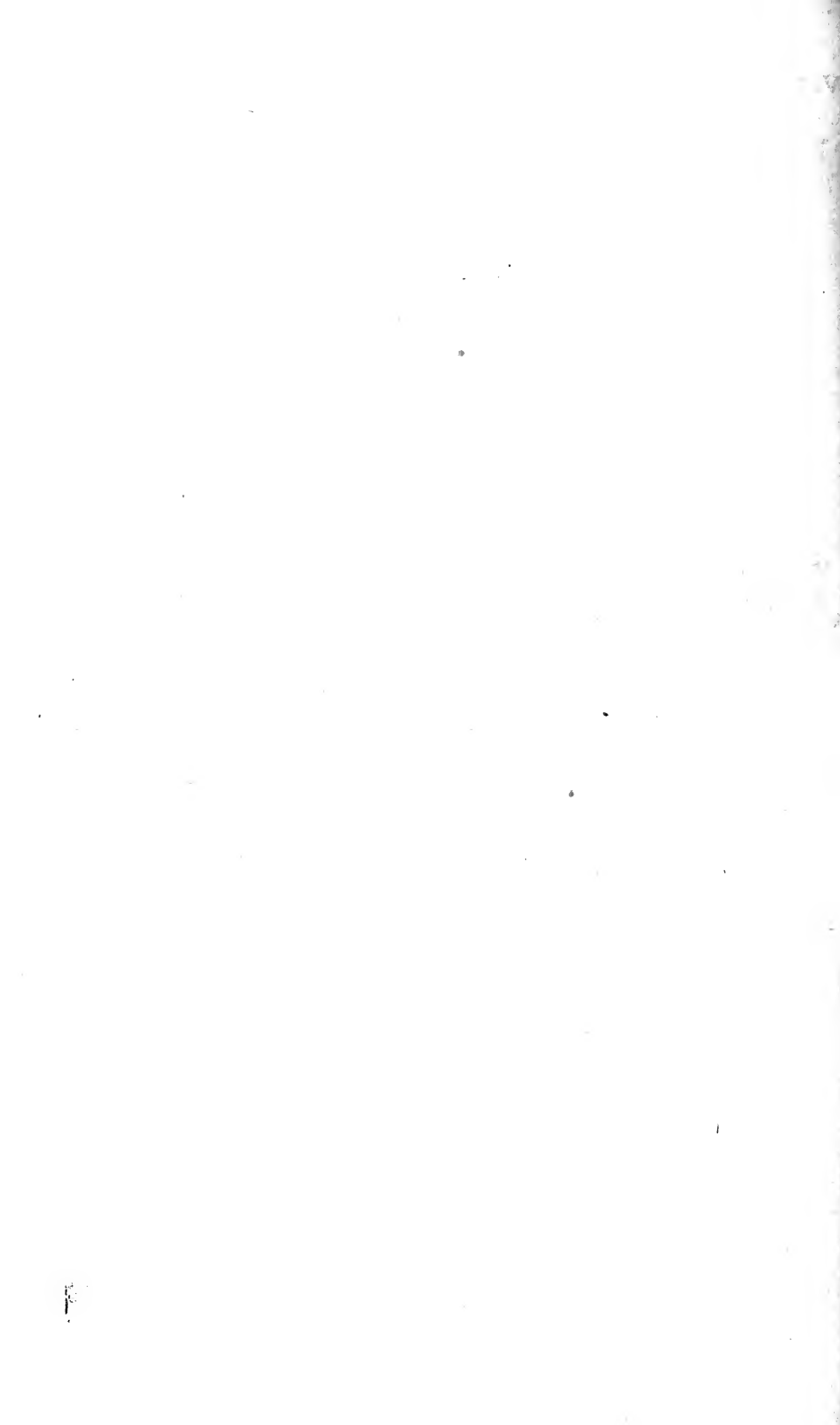

While he was a Director of the Supervisors Association he had worked with Mr. Jansen in Sacramento quite often, and had also worked with Mr. Bartell when they went to Omaha and to Chicago together.

**Amending Ordinance Regulating Budget Procedure to Provide That Supplemental Budget Requests Must Be Submitted to the Board Not Later Than May 1st, Instead of Not Later Than May 15th.**

Bill No. 2757, Ordinance No. . . . . ., as follows:

Amending Bill No. 1925, Ordinance No. 1847 (Series of 1939) entitled "Providing the procedure to be followed by the Board of Supervisors in adopting the Annual Budget and related ordinances, and providing for financial planning in connection therewith," by amending Section 3 thereof by changing from May 15th to May 1st, the last date upon which supplemental budget requests may be submitted for consideration of the Board of Supervisors.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco, as follows:

Section 1. Section 3 of Bill No. 1925, Ordinance No. 1847 (Series of 1939), the title of which is recited above, is hereby amended to read as follows:

NOTE: Amendments, are indicated by *light face italics*. Cancellations are set out in bold face and bracketed [ ].

Section 3. **Supplemental Budget Requests.** The Board of Supervisors shall not consider any requests to increase any amount or add any new item for personal services or materials, supplies or contractual services for any department or office in the proposed budget unless such requests are received by the Board [**prior to the 15th**] *not later than the first day of May.*

Approved as to form by the City Attorney.

#### Discussion.

Supervisor Colman, in discussing the foregoing bill, announced that the Controller had called his attention to the fact that if the foregoing bill were passed, as presented, it would do away with supplemental budgets, since the Mayor has until May 1st to present his budget to the Board, and after that time there would be no possibility of presenting any supplemental budgets. If fifteen days' time for presenting supplemental budget requests is considered too long, the Board might consider a period of ten days.

Supervisor Colman then moved, seconded by Supervisor MacPhee, to delete the words "the first day of May" at the end of Section 3, and to insert in lieu thereof the words and figures "May 10th."

Thereupon, Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Mancuso, moved that the matter remain on the Calendar for one week, in order that the Mayor might give his views on the question.

*No objection*, and motion to continue consideration *carried*.

Whereas, we believe that it is the duty of the Police Department to take cognizance of this situation to the end that those already defrauded shall not be put to further expense for transportation and care of arresting officers and prisoners; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That in consideration of the budget for the ensuing fiscal year, if the contingent fund of the Chief of Police is not sufficient to

cover this situation, that an additional amount of \$1,000 be allowed and earmarked for the purpose above indicated.

**Certifying to the State Director of Finance That the Invoices Submitted for the Construction of Dormitories in the Civic Center and the Furnishing of the Same Are Supported by Proper Vouchers.**

Resolved, That the Mayor of the City and County of San Francisco be and he is hereby authorized to sign and present the required application to the State of California upon behalf of the City and County of San Francisco in order to request the said State of California to contribute to said City and County of San Francisco from the funds appropriated by Chapter 805 of the Statutes of 1943, the sum of \$3,376.28 to be added to the said sum of \$27,350.13 heretofore allocated to said City and County of San Francisco to defray one-half the cost of constructing and furnishing the said dormitories; and be it

Further Resolved, That said Mayor is hereby designated as the person who shall administer any funds so appropriated by the State of California subject to the budgetary and fiscal procedure of the Charter of the City and County of San Francisco; and be it

Further Resolved, That the Mayor is hereby designated as the representative of the City and County of San Francisco to negotiate all agreements with the State Director of Finance covering the terms and conditions under which any amount of State aid is to be granted to said City and County of San Francisco, and said Mayor is hereby authorized to sign on behalf of the said City and County any and all such agreements; and be it

Further Resolved, That this Board of Supervisors hereby certifies that the said sum of \$61,452.83 has been expended in the construction of the aforesaid dormitories and the furnishing of the same.

### **Condemning Alleged Practice of Wholesalers Requiring Purchasers of Liquor to Purchase Copies of the Bible.**

Whereas, it has been brought to the attention of this Board of Supervisors that a practice has recently sprung up whereby certain wholesale distributors of liquor or their salesmen, require the purchaser thereof to accept and pay for that number of copies of the Holy Bible, equal in number to the amount of bottles of liquor purchased; and

Whereas, those who are required to purchase liquor under such conditions are required to pay for the copies of the Holy Bible which accompany the liquor at the rate of \$16.50 per dozen, and upon the representation that the Bibles are being furnished, as a patriotic gesture, to the members of the armed forces for their spiritual consolation and betterment; and

Whereas, such a practice is despicable in an unmentionable degree and constitutes not only a sacrilege but an affront to the members of the armed forces for whom the Bibles are represented to be intended; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That this Board of Supervisors publicly condemns the practice whereby a potential vendee of liquor is required to also purchase copies of the Holy Bible and urges such authorities as have jurisdiction over such matters to invoke, if legally possible, some means which will provide for the immediate discontinuance of this reprehensible practice.

This ordinance is passed as an emergency measure, the nature of such emergency being as follows: The approval of this measure will provide funds for the purposes above recited which are necessary to the health, welfare and care of juvenile inmates of the Juvenile Detention Home as well as providing for the uninterrupted operation of that department.

Supervisor MacPhee, following his presentation of the foregoing bill, reported on a visit to Log Cabin Ranch School made by members of the Finance Committee, the District Attorney and members of the San Mateo County Board of Supervisors. A number of improvements at the school are greatly needed. Roads are in need of repair, for which San Francisco County may have to share the cost, although an effort will be made to have San Mateo County itself meet that expense. An effort is being made to arrive at an agreement with San Mateo County for that county to increase the amount of its payments for board and lodging of boys which it sends to the school.

Following the foregoing statement, Supervisor MacPhee announced that the foregoing requested appropriation was for another purpose.

Whereupon, Mr. George Ososke, on being granted the privilege of the floor, reported on the need for the appropriation and urged its passage.

Supervisor Uhl, however, objected to immediate passage, and the bill was referred to Finance Committee.

**ADJOURNMENT.**

There being no further business, the Board, at the hour of 2:50 p. m., adjourned.

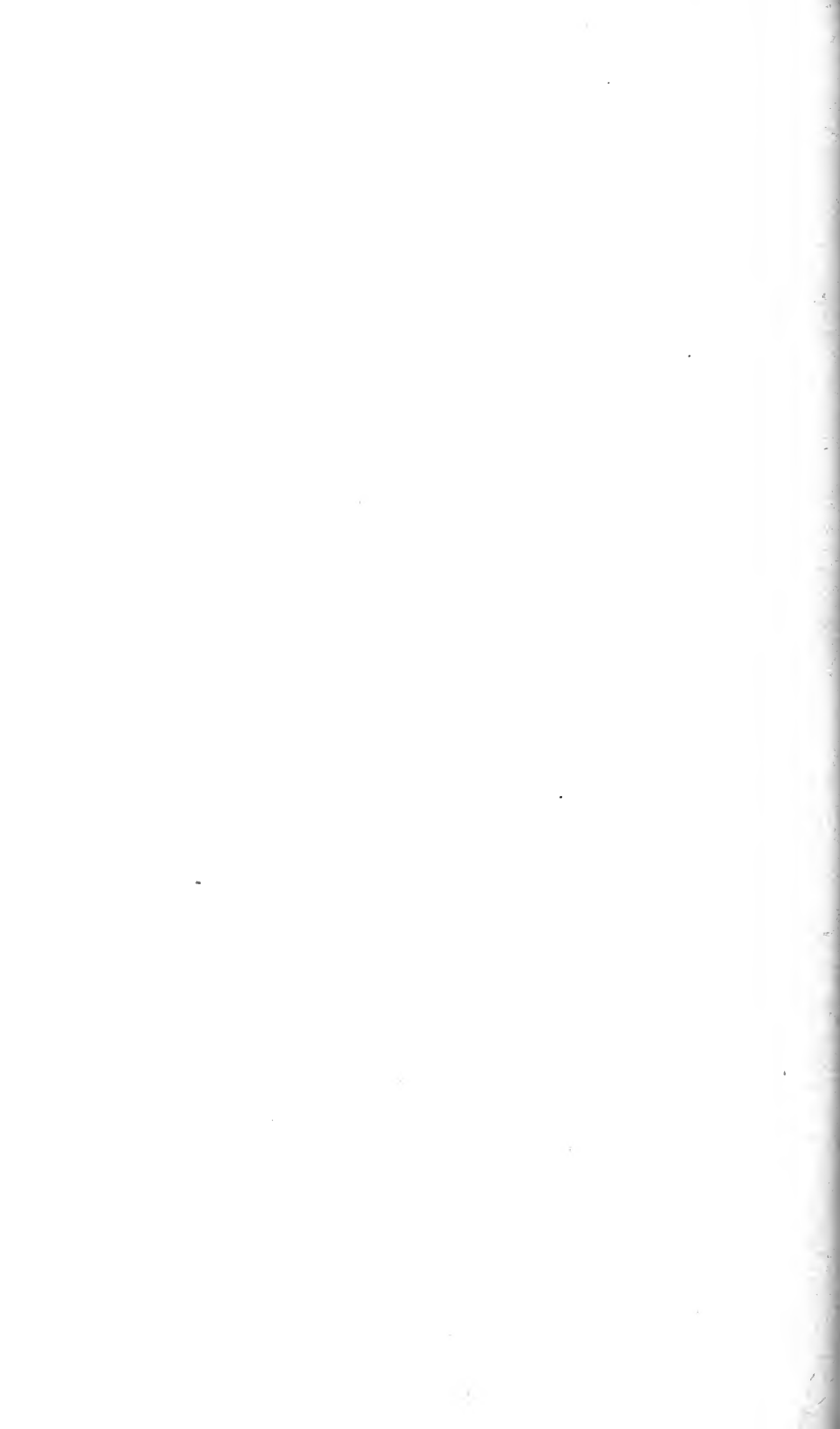

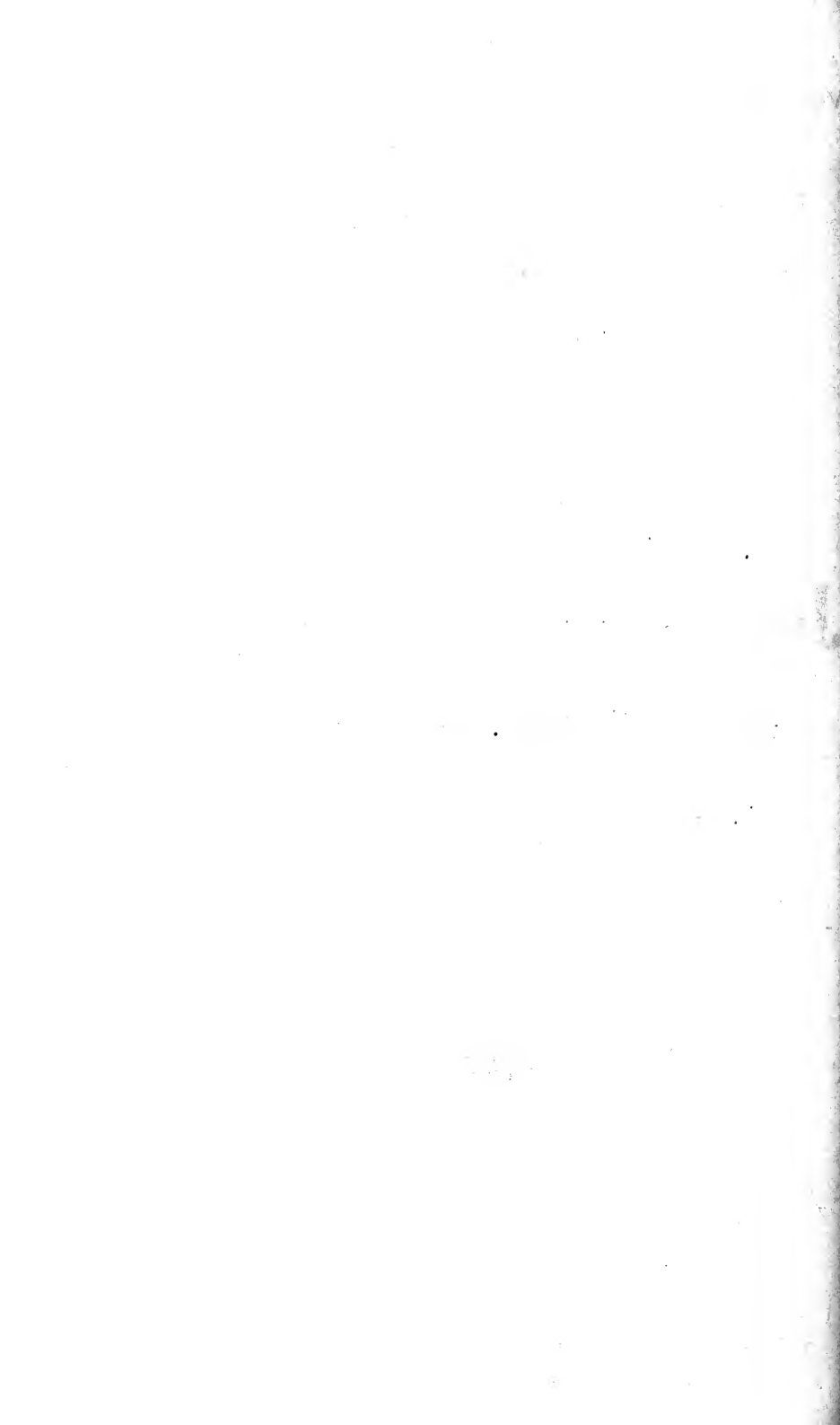

**Privilege of the Floor.**

Sheriff Daniel C. Murphy, having been granted the privilege of the floor, on motion by the Chair, explained the reason for request for appropriation for the purchase of two automobiles at the present time rather than bringing the matter before the Board as a budget item.

There is, at this time, the Sheriff stated, a possibility of securing two automobiles that will be relinquished by another department of the city government. In addition to the purchase of the two new automobiles, the Sheriff requested to be permitted to retain the old machines to be replaced by the new ones, because of the great need for additional transportation facilities. The Sheriff explained the situation, pointing out that the increased need for facilities, together with the greater delay caused for repair of automobiles has made it necessary to ask the cooperation of the Police Department in furnishing Police cars, and has occasionally made it necessary to secure the services of the van of the United States Marshal. Also employees of the department have had to use their own private cars, a practice which, because of the gasoline shortage, they can no longer continue.

Supervisor MacPhee, in discussing the foregoing bill, pointed out that unless the cars were purchased now, there was a very distinct likelihood that they could not be obtained.

Thereupon, there being no objection, the foregoing bill was *Passed for Second Reading* by the following vote:

**Authorizing Conveyance of Electric Transmission Line Right of Way in Alameda County and Payment of \$446 to Pacific Gas and Electric Company in Exchange for Easements in San Mateo County Required for Crystal Springs Pipe Line No. 2.**

(Series of 1939)

Bill No. 2760, Ordinance No. . . . ., as follows:

Authorizing conveyance of electric transmission line right of way in Alameda County and payment of \$446 to Pacific Gas and Electric Company in exchange for easements in San Mateo County required for Crystal Springs Pipe Line No. 2.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco, as follows:

Section 1. Whereas, in accordance with the recommendation of the Public Utilities Commission, it appears that a conveyance by the City and County of San Francisco, a municipal corporation, hereinafter referred to as the City, of a right of way to the Pacific Gas and Electric Company, a corporation, hereinafter referred to as the Company, for an electric transmission line over certain City owned real property situated in the County of Alameda, State of California, will not inconvenience the City, and it appearing to the Board of Supervisors that public interest and necessity demand the sale or trading thereof; and

Whereas, the Director of Property has received a written instrument dated January 27, 1944, from the Company, offering to convey the easements to the City required for its Crystal Springs Pipe Line No. 2 over certain real property situated in the County of San Mateo, State of California, in exchange for said transmission line right of way plus the sum of \$446 to be paid by the City to the Company; and

Whereas, the Director of Property and the Public Utilities Commission have recommended that said exchange be made;

Now, therefore, in consideration of the premises and pursuant to Section 92 of the Charter, the Director of Property in lieu of sale is hereby authorized and directed to arrange for trading said electric transmission line right of way to the Pacific Gas and Electric Company in exchange for said pipe line easements, subject to the provisions of this ordinance.

Section 2. The Director of Property has made an appraisal of said property and estimates the value of the electric transmission line right

of way to be \$4,110 and the value of the pipe line easements to be \$4,556 including interest since the City took possession thereof on September 19, 1935, under the eminent domain proceedings hereinafter referred to as San Mateo County Superior Court Case No. 24781.

Section 3. The Mayor and the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors are hereby authorized and directed to execute the necessary deed or deeds on behalf of the City and County of San Francisco. The Director of Property is hereby authorized and directed to deliver the transmission line right of way deed to the Company upon receipt of a deed conveying the pipe line easements to the City and to accept and record the latter deed.

Section 4. The sum of \$446 mentioned in Section 1 of this ordinance shall be paid from the money on deposit with the County Clerk of San Mateo County, Superior Court Case No. 24781.

Section 5. The deeds to said right of way and easements shall be subject to the rights, limitations, reservations, terms and conditions set forth in said written offer on file in the office of the Director of Property.

Section 6. Descriptions of right of way and easements herein referred to.

#### TRANSMISSION LINE RIGHT OF WAY

A right of way for the erection, construction, reconstruction, replacement, repair, maintenance and use of a single line of towers, poles or other overhead structures, together with all wires suspended upon and supported by such towers, poles or other structures, which the Company may from time to time deem to be reasonably required for the transmission and distribution of electric energy and for telephone and telegraph purposes, including the necessary and proper cross-arms, braces, connections, fittings, anchors, guys, and other appliances and fixtures for use in connection therewith, in, on, across and along those certain strips of City owned land situated in the County of Alameda, State of California, particularly described as follows, to-wit:

1. A strip of land of the uniform width of 80 feet extending entirely across the parcel of land described and designated Parcel 65 in the deed, executed by Spring Valley Water Company to City and County of San Francisco dated March 3, 1930, and recorded in Book 2350 of Official Records at page 1, records of the County of Alameda, State of California, and lying contiguous to and northwesterly of the northwesterly boundary line of that certain strip of land described and designated B (1) in the deed executed by Spring Valley Water Company to Pacific Gas and Electric Company, dated February 15, 1928, and recorded in Book 1835 of Official Records at page 115, records of said Alameda County.

2. A strip of land of the uniform width of 80 feet extending entirely across the parcel of land described and designated Parcel 62 in said deed dated March 3, 1930, and lying contiguous to and northwesterly of the northwesterly boundary line of the strip of land described and designated B (2) in said deed dated February 15, 1928.

Also the right to suspend, maintain, and use wires for the aforesaid purposes within strips of land of the uniform width of 80 feet across those two roads of the City, 40 feet in width, one of which extends along the westerly boundary line of the 100 acre parcel of land of the Estate of John Dutra Mendonca as described in the deed recorded October 30, 1906 in Book 1201 of Deeds at page 385, records of said Alameda County, and the other of which extends along the easterly boundary line of said 100 acre parcel of land, and lying contiguous to and northwesterly of the northeasterly and southwesterly prolongation of the northwesterly boundary line of the parcel of land



described and designated Parcel No. 2 in the Final Order of Condemnation entitled "Pacific Gas and Electric Company, plaintiff, vs. Rosa Angeline Mendonca, as administratrix, defendant," dated October 8, 1926 and recorded in Book 1423 of Official Records at page 276, records of said Alameda County.

#### PIPE LINE EASEMENTS

An easement to lay, relay, construct, reconstruct, maintain, operate, patrol, repair, renew, replace, remove, increase and/or change the number and size of, pipes, pipe lines, conduits and/or connections, appurtenances and appliances, for the conveyance, distribution, supply and/or sale of water through, in and along those certain seven parcels of land situated in the County of San Mateo, State of California, now owned by the Pacific Gas and Electric Company and particularly described in Paragraphs XV, XVI, XVII, and XVIII of the Complaint in that certain action entitled "City and County of San Francisco, a municipal corporation, plaintiff, vs. Title Insurance and Guaranty Company, a corporation, Pacific Gas and Electric Company, a corporation, et al., defendants, San Mateo County Superior Court Case No. 24781." The Lis Pendens in said action was recorded August 22, 1935 in Volume 675, at page 4, Official Records of San Mateo County.

**Authorizing and Directing Cancellation of Taxes Upon Property Acquired and Owned by the Housing Authority of the City and County of San Francisco and Authorizing and Directing Cancellation of Tax Sales to the State of California or Other Subdivisions.**

(Series of 1939)

Bill No. 2762, Ordinance No. . . . ., as follows:

Authorizing and directing cancellation of taxes upon property acquired and owned by the Housing Authority of the City and County of San Francisco and authorizing and directing cancellation of tax sales to the State of California or other subdivisions.

Whereas, the Housing Authority of the City and County of San Francisco has acquired, and now owns, various parcels of real property in the City and County of San Francisco for the purpose of carrying out the provisions of law under which said authority was organized; and

Whereas, upon said property so acquired and owned by the Housing Authority of the City and County of San Francisco, there are existing various liens of taxes and assessments, including the lien of taxes for the fiscal years 1941-42, 1942-43 and 1943-44; and

Whereas, pursuant to the provisions of Section 3, Chapter 1 of the laws passed at the special session of the Legislature of the State of California in 1938, approved March 21, 1938, it was by act provided that the property of Housing Authorities shall be exempt from all taxes and special assessments of the State, or any city, city and county, county, town or political subdivision of the State; and

Whereas, in the Municipal Cooperation Agreement between the City and County of San Francisco and the Housing Authority of the City and County of San Francisco, it is provided:

"The City agrees that during the period commencing with the date of acquisition of any part of the site or sites for each project and continuing throughout the useful life of such project, it will not levy, impose, or charge any taxes or special assessments against the project or against the Authority . . ."

and

Whereas, the City Attorney of the City and County of San Francisco has given his written consent to the cancellation of such taxes and special assessments as provided in Section 3804a of the Political Code of the State of California;

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco, as follows:

That all liens for taxes and assessments on any property acquired and owned by the Housing Authority of the City and County of San Francisco, for the purposes for which said Authority has been organized, be, and the same hereby are, canceled, in conformity with the provisions of Section 3804a of the Political Code of the State of California, and the Assessor, Tax Collector and all public officers having custody of the records of said taxes and assessments are hereby ordered and directed to cancel the same and to take no action for the collection thereof; that the Assessor, Tax Collector and all public officers having custody of the record of any certificate of sale or deed issued to the State or other subdivision for nonpayment of any tax or assessment upon real property acquired and owned by the Housing Authority of the City and County of San Francisco, be and he hereby is directed to cancel such certificates or deeds.

Approved and recommended by the City Attorney.

#### Discussion.

Supervisor MacPhee explained the reason for the foregoing proposed legislation. Property of the Housing Authority cannot be taxed, but the Authority is making token payments, in lieu of taxes, on property which it has acquired.

Thereupon, Supervisor Uhl suggested that the Board defer action on the proposal, and let the status continue as at present.

Supervisor Brown objected to cancellation of taxes on property owned by the Housing Authority. The situation, he declared, was very dangerous. In effect, the proposed legislation supported the privilege of the Housing Authority to acquire as much land as it sees fit, and then permits the Authority to ask the Board to eliminate its taxes on that land. The Board has opposed elimination of taxes on federal property. This is the same situation, and he was opposed to the extension of the principle of tax exemptions or eliminations. There has been enough property taken from the tax rolls now. Were the Housing Authority having difficulty in renting property, it would be a different matter. All projects, however, are filled, and the Authority is getting an adequate income to permit it to pay taxes to the City and County. The Board of Supervisors should have a statement from the Housing Authority showing returns from properties of the Housing Authority.

Thereupon, Supervisor Brown moved re-reference to Committee, the Committee to secure from the Housing Authority a statement of its income for the year 1943 so the Board might be able to determine whether the Authority is entitled to any cancellation of taxes. Motion seconded by Supervisor Uhl.

Supervisor Meyer requested that the Committee also obtain a list of properties now held by the Housing Authority. Request made part of the motion.

Supervisor MacPhee announced that he was in sympathy with the views expressed by Supervisor Brown, but he would be opposed to any

act similar to the Board's act in refusing to cancel taxes on property held by the Federal Government. The Board by that action was really hurting the owners of property who are entitled to a refund of their taxes; the Board was taking nothing away from the Federal Government. The Housing Authority has been paying an "in lieu" tax. Refusal to permit cancellation of taxes on property of the Housing Authority will accomplish nothing except to refuse the Controller and the Tax Collector the right to keep their books straight.

Mr. Carroll Newburgh, on motion by Supervisor Mancuso, was granted the privilege of the floor. Mr. Newburgh stated that every property owner and association of owners was interested in the matter, and urged that the entire matter be re-referred to Committee to enable the Committee to learn the attitude of the taxpayers as to cancellation of taxes.

The City Attorney, in reply to questioning by Supervisor Uhl, stated that the proposed legislation was prepared pursuant to request by the Housing Authority.

Supervisor Uhl again objected to the proposed cancellation of taxes, and requested a list of properties owned by the Housing Authority, and a statement of the amount of taxes now levied against that property, together with statement as to what the City and County is now receiving from the Housing Authority.

Supervisor Brown then stated that he desired to make an addition to the motion. The Housing Authority was created to provide low cost housing to aid in the slum clearance program. The rent for the properties was to average \$4.07 per room per month for shelter rent. There might have been some excuse for cancellations of taxes in the past, but there can be no excuse at the present time. Occupants of the projects now are able to pay a good rent which will allow payment of taxes to the City and County, and there can be no good reason for cancellation of taxes on properties. Thereupon, he moved that there be added to the original motion, the following: that the Committee take up with the City Attorney the question of whether or not in the light of the changed uses to which the properties are now being put, the Authority is acting under the meaning of the state law for low cost housing for slum clearance. Motion seconded by Supervisor Uhl.

Thereupon, the roll was called and the motion, as amended, and reading as follows, was *carried* by the following vote:

That the proposed legislation be re-referred to Committee, the Committee to secure from the Housing Authority a statement of its income for the year 1943, so the Board might be able to determine whether the Authority is entitled to any cancellation of taxes; that the Committee also obtain a list of properties now held by the Housing Authority; that the Committee take up with the City Attorney the question of whether or not, in the light of the changed uses to which the properties are now being put, the Authority is acting under the meaning of the state law for low cost housing for slum clearance.

Ayes: Supervisors Brown, Colman, Gallagher, Gartland, Green, MacPhee, Mancuso, Meyer, Sullivan, Uhl—10.

Absent: Supervisor Mead—1.

Following the foregoing vote, the City Attorney suggested that representatives of the Housing Authority be invited to be present at the meeting of the Committee. The City Attorney believed there might be a chance to secure increased contributions from the Authority to the City and County.

#### Cancellation of Taxes on Federally-Owned Properties.

Supervisor MacPhee requested the privilege of taking up, briefly, and out of order, another question of cancellation of taxes. The Board had

about two months earlier, refused to authorize the cancellation of taxes on certain federally-owned properties. The sole effect of that refusal was to work a hardship on former owners of the property, and to prevent the clearing of the books of the Controller and the Tax Collector. Whether cancelled or not, the taxes could not be collected from the Federal Government. The matter should be re-referred to Finance Committee, and he would so request.

*No objection, and so ordered.*

Section 1. The sum of \$10,950 is hereby appropriated from the surplus existing in Appropriation No. 323.251.00, "Maintenance of Minors," to the credit of Appropriation No. 324.500.00, to provide funds for the following improvements at the Juvenile Detention Home:

Section 2. This ordinance is passed as an emergency measure, the nature of such emergency being as follows: The approval of this measure will provide funds for the purposes above recited which are neces-

sary to the health, welfare and care of juvenile inmates of the Juvenile Detention Home as well as providing for the uninterrupted operation of that department.

Recommended by the Chief Probation Officer.

Approved by the Juvenile Probation Committee.

Approved by the Judge of the Juvenile Court.

Approved by the Mayor.

Approved as to form by the City Attorney.

Approved as to funds available by the Controller.

#### Discussion.

Supervisor Uhl objected to the foregoing proposed appropriation, stating that he had visited the Detention Home. He objected to the item of \$4,000 for painting, and believed it to be unnecessary at the present time. He would be willing to allow \$1,000 for that purpose. He was opposed also to the item of fence around ledge of extension from fourth floor, holding that he did not believe matters would be helped particularly thereby. Thereupon, he moved that the item, painting interior of offices and various floors be reduced from \$4,000 to \$1,000 and the item fence around ledge of extension from fourth floor, \$700, be deleted.

Motion failed for want of a second.

Mr. George Ososke disagreed with the recommendations of Supervisor Uhl. In December, 1943, a boy lost his life because of negligence. Two years ago there was a recommendation for the fence around the fourth floor. Mr. Ososke believed the need for such fence should be given immediate consideration. Conditions at the Detention Home were in a terrible state, Mr. Ososke stated, and post-war planning will not materialize for three, four or perhaps five years. Mr. Ososke strongly recommended painting, which was a small item in comparison with the entire department. It is only about one-third the painting really necessary. The repairs to windows and fasteners are also really necessary. The Board should remember it is dealing with youth. We have reached a state of hysteria, when delinquency is on the up trend, and the small amount of the requested appropriation is actually necessary.

Supervisor Uhl announced that he did not object to repairs to windows and fasteners. The fasteners would safeguard the opening of windows.

Thereupon, the roll was called and the foregoing bill was *Refused Passage* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Colman, Gallagher, Gartland, Green, MacPhee, Mancuso, Meyer, Sullivan—8.

Noes: Supervisors Brown, Uhl—2.

Absent: Supervisor Mead—1.

Appropriating the sum of \$40,000 from the Unappropriated Balance of Funds, Municipal Railway, to credit of Appropriation No. 365,804.00, Passenger and Damage Claims, to provide for deficiency in latter appropriation.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco, as follows:

Section 1. The sum of \$40,000 is hereby appropriated from the Unappropriated Balance of Funds, Municipal Railway, to credit of Appropriation No. 365,804.00, Passenger and Damage Claims, to provide for deficiency in the latter appropriation occasioned by the abnormally high accident costs for passenger and damage claims paid in the first seven months of present fiscal year.

Approved by the Public Utilities Commission.

Approved as to form by the City Attorney.

Recommended by the Manager of Utilities.

Approved as to funds by the Controller.

Approved by the Mayor.

**Discussion.**

Supervisor MacPhee, in discussing the foregoing matter, announced that the Finance Committee had considered the possibility of amending same to provide that no claim should be paid or compromise and settlement made without approval by the Board of Supervisors. There was originally set up in the budget for the fiscal year 1943-1944, \$150,000 for payment of claims. That money, by February 1, 1944, was almost entirely expended. The Finance Committee desires to amend the proposed bill to provide for approval by the Board of Supervisors before any settlements are made.

Mr. Robert Scott, representing the Public Utilities Commission, addressed the Board briefly, pointing out that the Finance Committee recognized the need for the appropriation. The right of the Board to approve expenditures is a legal question which the City Attorney should advise on.

Thereupon, the City Attorney advised that there was no question about the necessity of the additional appropriation. The Board of Supervisors, however, has no authority over claims, and he had prepared an opinion to that effect.

Supervisor MacPhee questioned the correctness of the City Attorney's ruling. The Charter, he said, Section 126, states that the City Attorney *may*, not *shall*. More control should be vested with the elected representatives of the people, he believed. Therupon, he moved that Bill No. 2756 be amended by adding thereto a new section, to be known as Section 2, and reading as follows:

Section 2. No claim shall be paid or compromise or settlement made which involves a disbursement of any of the funds appropriated under the provisions of this ordinance unless and until such claim, compromise or settlement shall have been approved by the Board of Supervisors.

Motion seconded by Supervisor Mancuso.



The City Attorney advised that such amendment would be illegal. He informed the Board, also, that on every Monday the Public Utilities Commission settle from five to seven claims, after which they have to be filed with the Controller, and sent to his office for investigation. The Public Utilities Commission tries to settle claims without litigation, where possible.

Supervisor Uhl objected to the proposed amendment. The intent of the Charter was to make the Public Utilities Commission responsible for the operation of the utilities, and it would be a mistake to change existing conditions.

Supervisor Mancuso argued in favor of the proposed amendment. He did not believe that Section 126 or Section 121 of the Charter gave to the Public Utilities Commission authority to compromise claims. Section 126 does not refer to settlement of claims, but to the legal work of the Commission. In Section 121 there is no authority for the Public Utilities Commission to settle claims. He was in favor of the suggested amendment and urged approval thereof.

Supervisor Colman held it would be unwise to approve the amendment. The result would be that there would be burden put on the Board of Supervisors. The Board has not the machinery or the time to go into such matters thoroughly, and is not in a position to judge technical features of claims with regard to the various utilities. Many questions will arise on which the Board cannot make a determination. There has been no abuse under the present system, so far as he knew, and it would be a mistake to make any change.

Supervisor MacPhee agreed that the Board had no machinery, as stated by Supervisor Colman, but he held that it needed no machinery. The claims will come to the Board for approval as do other claims, and the Board can proceed in the same manner as it now does. The burden of the responsibility will fall on the Finance Committee, and the Committee is willing to take on the added duties which may, in some measure, help the City and County. That extra protection should be provided for the taxpayers of San Francisco. The entire question will be that of having the Board of Supervisors pass on the recommendations of the Public Utilities Commission and the City Attorney on such claims.

Supervisor Meyer called attention to the many small claims which would be brought to the Board. He believed the Board would be taking on too much of a job. There are many of such small claims that should be settled quickly.

Supervisor Mancuso, thereupon, stated that he felt that Supervisor MacPhee had overlooked excepting claims of less than \$50, which might be approved by the Public Utilities Commission.

Thereupon, Supervisor MacPhee moved that there be added to his proposed amendment, the words "except claims in the sum of \$50 or less." Amendment *accepted* as part of the original motion.

The City Attorney, in reply to a question by Supervisor Brown, again stated that such amendment would be illegal and also in violation of Section 22 of the Charter.

Supervisor Brown moved, as a substitute for the motion before the Board, that the amount of the appropriation be reduced to \$5,000.

*Motion failed for want of a second.*

Thereupon, the roll was called and the motion by Supervisor MacPhee was *defeated* by the following vote:

Thereupon, Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Colman, moved that the matter remain on the Calendar for one week, in order that the Mayor might give his views on the question.

No objection, and *so ordered*.

**Consideration of Report of Committee on Juvenile Delinquency.**

Supervisor Chester R. MacPhee, Chairman.

**Discussion.**

Supervisor MacPhee, in discussing the following resolutions, called attention to the report of Committee on Juvenile Delinquency, a copy of which had been presented to each Supervisor, and with which they were no doubt familiar. No resolution was being presented to the

Board with respect to the Coordinating Council, although the committee had recommended certain amendments to the ordinance establishing the Coordinating Council, which amendments, the committee recommends, be immediately referred to the Judiciary Committee for report and for inclusion in a re-drafted ordinance. Thereupon, Supervisor MacPhee requested approval of the report of the Committee on Juvenile Delinquency, which will be laid over until the next meeting of the Board.

Supervisor Colman, in discussing the report, stated that he had read it carefully and it was a carefully prepared document. However, the report seems to "run all over the lot," so far as other departments of the municipal government are concerned. It tells the Police Commission, the Board of Education, the City Planning Commission and the Probation Court what to do. These people are treating the problem of juvenile delinquency, and must be doing something about it. Before approving the report, these departments should tell the Board what their views are, and what they are doing in the matter. He agreed with the report in praising the Travelers' Aid Society, but would not, at the present time, want to put himself on record as asking the Community Chest to make additional funds available to that organization. He would have no objection to reference to Judiciary, but he did object to acting at the present time on Supervisor MacPhee's recommendations. As to increased appropriations for the Coordinating Council, he would consider the recommendations of the Chief Administrative Officer. In closing, Supervisor Colman announced that he could not vote to approve the report as it was presented; it went too far afield and the Board has not sufficient information to be able to determine whether the recommendations made are feasible or possible, or if it was duplicating other efforts being made by other departments of the city government.

Supervisor Brown raised the point of order that the Board should confine itself to the items on the Calendar; the report is not on the Calendar, but it might be submitted by Supervisor MacPhee on Roll Call.

The Chair ruled the point of order well taken.

Thereupon, further consideration was *postponed temporarily*, to be taken up under Supervisor MacPhee's name on roll call, where, after brief discussion, during which Supervisor Colman again objected to immediate action, the report of the committee, together with the following resolutions, were *referred to Judiciary Committee*:

**Requesting the Chief Probation Officer of the Juvenile Court to Submit to the Board a Report on Feasibility of an In-Service Training Program for Personnel of Juvenile Court.**

(Series of 1939)

Proposal No. 3857, Resolution No. . . . ., as follows:

Whereas, the juvenile delinquency problem in San Francisco has been aggravated and rendered increasingly difficult of control and solution since the war and has accentuated the need for an additional number of employees qualified to cope with the situation; and

Whereas, it is apparent that there must be immediately instituted and constantly persisted in, a movement to provide more effective administration of juvenile welfare and probation work; and

Whereas, the conduct of an intelligently designed in-service training program will equip the personnel presently engaged in juvenile delinquency work to more efficiently and expeditiously execute their functions and will incite them to even greater efforts for control and repression of juvenile delinquency; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That this Board of Supervisors does hereby request the Chief Probation Officer of the Juvenile Court to submit to this Board,

within the next thirty days, a report on the feasibility of an in-service training program for personnel of the Juvenile Court.

*Referred to Judiciary Committee.*

**Memorializing His Excellency Governor Warren to Give Serious Consideration to the Proposal to Increase the Personnel Charged With the Supervision of Paroled Juvenile Delinquents.**

(Series of 1939)

Proposal No. 3858, Resolution No. . . . . , as follows:

Whereas, investigation has disclosed the fact that there is only one parole officer in Northern California charged with supervision of girl delinquents and an insufficient number of parole officers charged with supervision of boy delinquents; and

Whereas, adequate and constructive counsel imparted to delinquents by qualified authorities will tend in great measure to prevent recurrences of improper or unlawful acts by juveniles with a delinquent record and will result in better supervision, for the welfare of those released from juvenile homes; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That this Board of Supervisors does hereby memorialize His Excellency Governor Warren and does urge that serious and early consideration be given a proposal to increase the personnel charged with the supervision of paroled juvenile delinquents, particularly in Northern California.

**Petitioning Board of Education to Appoint a Committee to Study and Report on Feasibility of Establishing Certain Courses for Those Children Capable of Directing Intelligent Consideration of Such Courses.**

Whereas, the integrity of our homes and of our very social structure are presently challenged by the untoward increase in juvenile delinquency; and

Whereas, one cause for this unhappy situation is represented to exist in the fact that boys and girls do not have proper or adequate concepts of their responsibilities, as members of contemporary society, particularly with reference to:

1. The duties and responsibilities owed to parents;
2. The duties and responsibilities of parenthood;
3. The duties and responsibilities of citizenship; and

Whereas, the dissemination by proper and responsible authorities of that information which reflects the true American philosophy regarding such matters would be an effective deterrent to juvenile delinquency; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That this Board of Supervisors does hereby petition the Board of Education and requests that agency to appoint a committee to study and report on the feasibility and desirability of establishing required courses in the foregoing subjects, for those children capable of directing intelligent consideration to such matters.

**Requesting Library Commission to Give Consideration to a Proposal to Make Branch Libraries Available for Conduct, During Evening Hours, of Supervised Recreation Activities for Juveniles.**

Whereas, the need for additional facilities required for supervised

recreation of juveniles has long been recognized by the agencies dealing with child welfare; and

Whereas, facilities for such purposes are available in several branches of the Public Library but are not presently utilized; and

Whereas, the use of such facilities will enable youth agencies to supplement their activities for the benefit of youth; now, therefore, be it

**Endorsing the Provision of Section 8286 of the State Education Code, Permitting School Children to Be Absent From School for Participation in Religious Exercises or to Receive Religious or Moral Instruction.**

(Series of 1939)

Supervisor Colman presented:

Proposal No. 3865, Resolution No. . . . ., as follows:

Whereas, Section 8286 of the Education Code of the State of California provides that the governing board of a school district (in San Francisco, the Board of Education) may, in its discretion, adopt a resolution pursuant to which, with the written consent of parents or guardians, their children or wards may absent themselves from school, under regulations adopted by the governing board, for participation in religious exercises or to receive moral and religious instruction at their respective places of worship or at other suitable places designated by their respective religious groups, churches or denominations; and

Whereas, any effective endeavor for the suppression and ultimate elimination of delinquency, juvenile and adult, must be postulated upon the existence of a Supreme Being and the necessity in an orderly society for compliance with His commands; and

Whereas, to attain the highest in social order, such precepts, obviously, must be promulgated to our youth as soon as they attain the usual age necessary to understand them and to effect their practice; and

Whereas, even from a purely mundane point of view it is expedient that every possible effort be made to inculcate religious and moral teachings in this and succeeding generations, thus to promote the public peace, to protect life, liberty and property, to conserve the effort and mitigate the colossal monetary expense to public and private agencies as well as individuals, for corrective and unavailing punitive measures, and to relieve the mental anguish and physical suffering occasioned by transgressors; and

Whereas, many nationally known lay figures, eminently qualified to pass upon the merits of such a proposal, have declared unequivocally the imperative necessity for religious and moral teaching as an integral part of requisite education; and

Whereas, no valid objection has been advanced against the inauguration of such a plan in the public schools of San Francisco nor have any difficulties or objections been encountered where the plan is now operative in 500 cities in thirty-eight states, including approximately fifty Northern California communities; and

Whereas, it is the considered opinion of this Board of Supervisors, supported by experience, that objective restraint alone is wholly inadequate and unsatisfactory as an approach to the problem of delinquency; that rather there must inhere within the individual the desire and the will so to comport himself as to denote him an asset to society, and that uncultivated human nature being selfish, the individual can only be constrained to adopt such a philosophy and attitude as a result of acquaintance and compliance with the directives of that authority which, in omniscience, has established the rules for order; and

Whereas, authorities declare that no person is educated whose erudition embraces no study or knowledge of culture, chief among the components of which stands religious philosophy and history; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That cognizant of the fact that the Board of Education has the proposal for religious and moral teaching (in accordance with Section 8286 of the Education Code) under advisement, pending expressions of opinion thereon, this Board of Supervisors convinced of its practicability and desirability hereby records itself as favoring the invocation of such proposal for the best interests of the people of the City and County of San Francisco; and be it

Further Resolved, That a copy of this resolution be transmitted to the Board of Education.

#### Revision of Rules of the Board.

Supervisor Brown, under his name on Roll Call, called attention to the Rules of the Board of Supervisors, which had last been revised in April, 1942. Since that time there have been a number of changes. Thereupon, Supervisor Brown moved that the Rules Committee give consideration to revising and reprinting the Rules of the Board of Supervisors.

The Chair announced that the matter was already being taken care of.



### State Constitutional Amendment to Be Voted on by the Electors at May Election.

Supervisor Uhl requested that the City Attorney be requested to draft a resolution in keeping with the thought that the public should be thoroughly advised of the constitutional amendment to be voted on at the coming election in May, which, if approved by the voters, would remove the present prohibition against taxing federally-owned properties within the State of California.

City Attorney agreed to draft requested resolution.

### Discussion on Regulations With Respect to Calling Matters Out From Committees.

Supervisor Uhl called attention to resolution adopted on January 24, 1944, amending the Rules of the Board to provide that two weeks after reference of a matter to committee, any member might call such matter up for consideration. For that reason, he was calling out from committee, a matter which he had presented, relating to increased fare on Market Street Railway, and payment of increased compensation to platform men of that company; also, the right to use the inner tracks on Market Street.

Supervisor Brown announced that a meeting of the Public Utilities Committee, to which Supervisor Uhl's resolution had been referred, was called four days after reference to committee. At that time further discussion of the resolution was postponed until the next meeting of the committee.

Supervisor MacPhee, in discussing the matter, expressed his opposition to reference of a matter to committee, and then require it to remain in such committee just because the chairman of the committee might not like the particular legislation.

The Chair then announced that the matter of wages had already been taken care of. The matter of use of the inner tracks of the Market Street Railway was still in committee. After thirty days' time Supervisor Uhl could move that the matter be called out from committee.

Supervisor Brown rose to a question of personal privilege. He objected to complaint by Supervisor MacPhee that the action in committee with reference to certain matters, was undemocratic. In a democracy, the will of the majority prevails. Two members of the committee had voted to postpone consideration of the measure to which Supervisor Uhl had referred. The rule of the majority had prevailed.

### Consolidation of Elections.

The City Attorney, at the request of Supervisor Uhl, in reporting on the right to consolidate special election with the May primary election, reported that he had an opinion thereon by Attorney General Kenney. The Attorney General, stated the City Attorney, had ruled that elections could not be consolidated. There must be separate election officers and separate ballots. He did not know whether there could be two ballots on the same voting machine, although the Registrar of Voters thought that separate elections could be held on one machine.

### ADJOURNMENT.

There being no further business, the Board, at the hour of 4:20 p. m., adjourned.

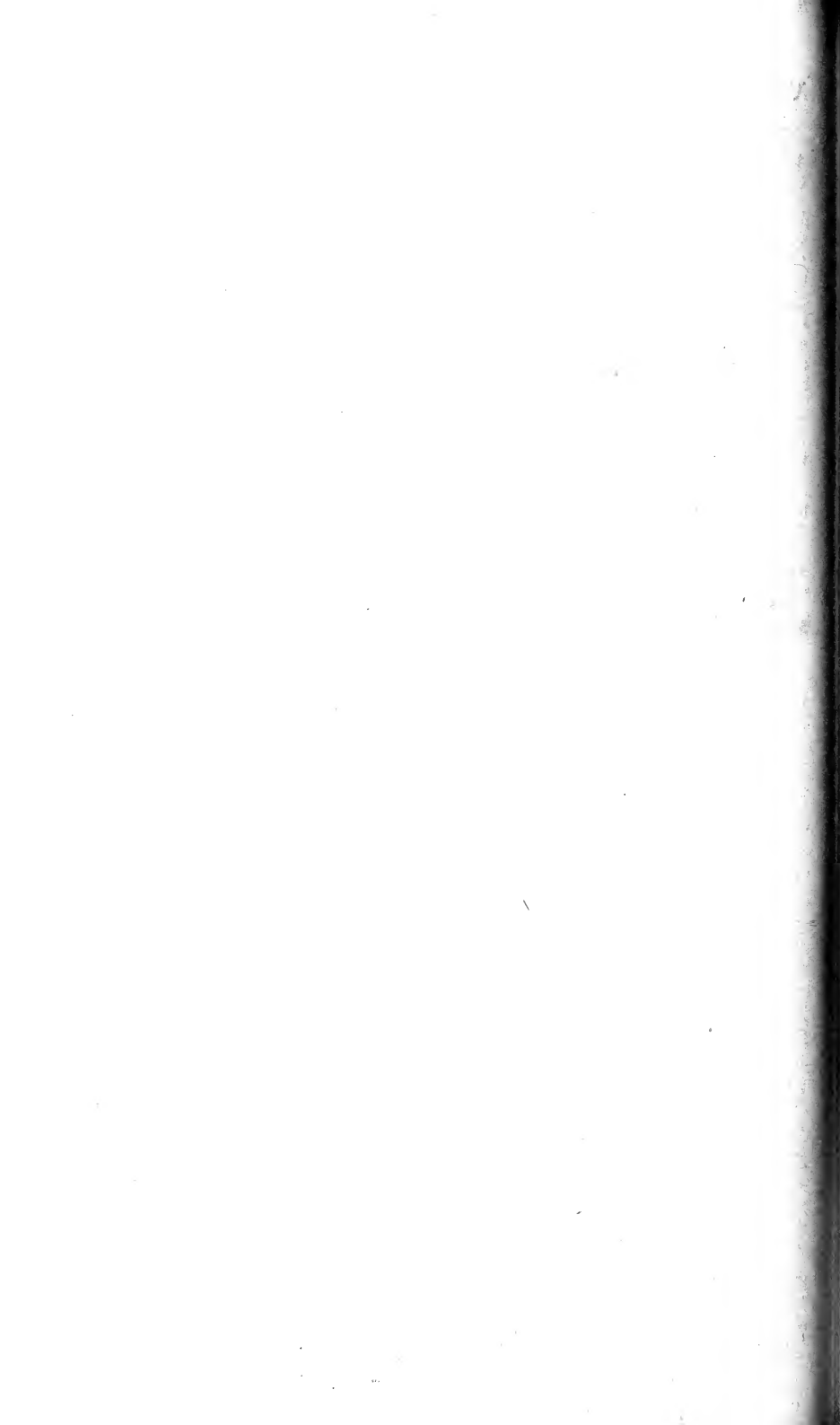

### SPECIAL ORDER—2:00 P. M.

#### Assessments Confirmed.

Hearing of protests against assessments for the costs and expenses of work on or improvement of Quintara Street between Thirty-first and Thirty-second Avenues, including the crossing of Quintara Street and Thirty-first Avenue, by paving, et cetera, by Chas. L. Harney, as described in Declaration of Intention, Order No. 17,215, of December 26, 1941.

No protests having been made, the assessments were confirmed and the Clerk was directed so to notify the Director of Public Works.

### SPECIAL ORDER—2:00 P. M.

Hearing of appeal from the decision of the City Planning Commission by its Resolution No. 2820, dated January 20, 1944, denying application to rezone from Second Residential District to Commercial District, property located at the southeasterly corner of Nineteenth Avenue and Noriega Street.

#### Discussion.

Dr. Harry L. Ryberg, appellant, representing himself and family, outlined the reasons for seeking the requested rezoning and the appeal from the decision of the City Planning Commission denying said request. Dr. Ryberg desired to maintain an office in his residence in connection with his practice of his profession as chiropractor and chiropodist, together with installation of wiring for X-ray machine

and other equipment necessary for his practice. While physicians and attorneys are, under the zoning ordinance, permitted to maintain their offices in residential districts in their residences, chiropractors are not, hence the request for the rezoning.

Mr. Deming Tilton, representing the City Planning Commission, explained the reasons prompting the Commission to deny the application for rezoning.

Supervisors Brown and Mead stated that it appeared that the law was discriminatory, in that it did not permit chiropractic offices in residential districts, whereby it did permit offices for physicians and attorneys. They both agreed that the petition should be approved.

Supervisor MacPhee expressed the thought that this case seemed to be a borderline case, which the Board might well approve.

Mrs. A. O. Field, resident at 1465 Twentieth Avenue, representing herself, protested the requested rezoning. She stated that she was not opposed to the rezoning for the purpose for which it was being requested, but feared that once the rezoning had been approved, other enterprises permitted in commercial districts might be established.

Supervisor Mead thereupon suggested that Dr. Ryberg agree to a stipulation that the premises for which the rezoning was being sought would be used for no other purpose than that of his office and the installation of equipment necessary to carry on his profession.

Dr. Ryberg agreed to such stipulation.

The Clerk announced that such stipulation was not part of the resolution as presented for consideration by the Board; such stipulation should be sent to the City Planning Commission.

Supervisor MacPhee, however, moved that the resolution, as presented by the Public Buildings, Lands and City Planning Commission, be amended to provide that the premises in question should not be used for any purpose other than those in connection with the chiropractic business, including the use of X-ray and other equipment necessary to the conduct of that profession. Motion seconded by Supervisors Meyer and Mead.

Supervisor Mancuso moved that there be added to the motion, the further stipulation that in the event the property was used for any other purpose, it should revert to its previous status. *No objection.*

Thereupon, the following resolution, presented by the Public Buildings, Lands and City Planning Committee, and as amended by the Board was taken up and *Adopted* by the following vote:

**Rezoning of the Southeasterly Corner of Nineteenth Avenue and Noriega Street From Second Residential District to Commercial District.**

(Series of 1939)

Proposal No. 3888, Resolution No. 3862, as follows:

Resolved, That the decision of the City Planning Commission by its Resolution No. 2820, dated January 20, 1944, denying application to rezone from Second Residential District to Commercial District, property located at the southeasterly corner of Nineteenth Avenue and Noriega Street, is hereby disapproved; and be it

Further Resolved, That the premises shall not be used for any other purpose than those of chiropody and chiropractic, including the use of X-rays. If and when the premises are used for any other purposes, it shall revert to Second Residential.

## "Electrical Musical Devices" Ordinance.

(Series of 1939)

Bill No. 2743, Ordinance No. . . . . , as follows:

Amending Article 5, Part III, of the San Francisco Municipal Code, "Electrical Musical Devices."

An ordinance amending Article 5, Part III, of the San Francisco Municipal Code, "Electrical Musical Devices," regulating the installation and use of electrical musical devices in the City and County of San Francisco; defining certain terms used in this Article; providing for the issuance of permits and licenses for the use, operation and maintenance of electrical musical devices; providing for their impounding and confiscation when installed, operated or maintained to be operated in violation of this Article and for the destruction or other disposal thereof by the Chief of Police; providing for the payment and collection of fees for said license; authorizing the Chief of Police to adopt, promulgate and enforce the rules and regulations governing such inspection and operation; provides penalties for the violation of this Article; repealing conflicting ordinances to such extent as conflict may exist and providing for a saving clause and non-waiver of debts due and unpaid.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco, as follows:

Section 1. Article 5, Part III, of the San Francisco Municipal Code, entitled "Electrical Musical Devices," is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 2. The Table of Contents of said Article 5 is hereby amended to read as follows:

## ARTICLE 5

- Sec. 351. Requirements for machines.
- Sec. 352. Unlawful acts.
- Sec. 353. Application for permit.
- Sec. 354. Investigations.
- Sec. 355. Expiration of permits.
- Sec. 356. Permit forwarded to Tax Collector.
- Sec. 357. License fees.
- Sec. 358. Contents of licenses.
- Sec. 359. Removal or transfer of license to other person or premises prohibited. No prorating or refunding of license.
- Sec. 360. Notification of issuance of license. Placing of Seal of Approval.
- Sec. 361. Application for renewal of license or for additional license.
- Sec. 362. Procedure where no current license.
- Sec. 363. Suspension, revocation or reinstatement of a permit, procedure for.
- Sec. 364. Devices not to be used for dancing without a permit.
- Sec. 365. Devices not to be used so as to affect public health or morals.
- Sec. 366. Chief of Police to promulgate rules.
- Sec. 367. When deemed a public nuisance.
- Sec. 368. Violation a misdemeanor.
- Sec. 369. Permit and license required notwithstanding any other provision of code.
- Sec. 370. Partial repeal.
- Sec. 371. Saving clause—non-waiver of debts due and unpaid.

Section 3. Sections 350 to 375, inclusive, are hereby amended to read as follows:



**SEC. 350. Definitions.** As used in this Article, the following words shall have the following respective meanings:

"Electrical Musical Devices" shall mean any machine, apparatus or device operated or which may be operated by electricity and designed or constructed for the purpose of producing or playing any musical tone or tones or combination of tones; and the use, operation or playing of such machine, apparatus or device which is permitted or allowed by the deposit of any coin, slug, or token in any slot or receptacle attached to said machine, apparatus or device, or connected therewith; and which machine, apparatus or device does not dispense any article or thing and cannot be operated as a game or contest.

"Operator," as used in this Article, shall mean:

(a) Any owner of such electrical musical device who operates or permits the same to be played or operated in his place of business or in any place open to the public under his control.

(b) The person in whose place of business any such electrical musical device is placed for the use, amusement, patronage or recreation of the public or of persons in or about said place.

"Person," as used in this Article, shall mean: Any corporation, association, syndicate, joint stock company, partnership, club, Massachusetts business or common law trust, society or individual.

**SEC. 351. Requirements for Machines.** Every electrical musical device shall have a seal or tag permanently attached thereto showing the serial number of said electrical musical device; and, in addition thereto a label indicating the name and address of the manufacturer and the voltage and current necessary for the proper operation of said electrical musical device.

Every portable electrical musical device shall be equipped with not more than six (6) feet of electric cord of a type approved by the Department of Electricity, and shall be connected to a convenience plug receptacle adjacent to said electrical musical device. Where it is necessary to install electrical wiring to said electrical musical device location said wiring shall be installed by a registered electrical contractor in accordance with the provisions of Article 1, Chapter III, Part II, of the San Francisco Municipal Code.

**SEC. 352. Unlawful Acts.** It shall be unlawful for any operator of an electrical musical device to install, operate or maintain to be operated any electrical musical device in the City and County of San Francisco without first having obtained a permit in writing so to do from the Chief of Police and having the seal of approval, as hereinafter provided for, placed on each of said electrical musical devices.

It shall be unlawful to remove said seal of approval from said electrical musical device to which it was attached as provided for in this Article, and affix same to another device or machine.

**SEC. 353. Application for Permit.** Application for said permit shall be made to the Chief of Police in triplicate on forms provided by the Police Department, and shall be signed by the applicant, and shall contain the following information:

(a) Name and address of the operator, and the type and character of the business or calling carried on by the operator;

(b) The type and serial number of the electrical musical device and the name or number of the premises where same is to be operated or installed;

(c) Total number of electrical musical devices to be operated at or in said premises;

(d) Such additional information as the Chief of Police shall deem necessary to enable the Chief of the Department of Electricity to fully investigate the nature and character of said electrical musical device and the proposed method for the installation of the same, and such other information as the

Chief of Police shall deem necessary to enable him to determine the purposes for which said electrical musical device shall be operated.

**SEC. 354. Investigations.** Upon receipt of said application the Chief of Police shall cause to be investigated the statements set forth in the application. Should he, after said investigation, determine that the operation and maintenance of said electrical musical device will not violate any law of the State of California, or ordinance of the City and County of San Francisco, or rule or regulation of any department of the state or municipal government, and will not be detrimental to the health, morals and welfare of the people of the City and County, he shall approve said application, but should he determine to the contrary he shall disapprove said application, stating his reasons for said disapproval, and in the event of such disapproval said application shall be deemed to be denied, provided, however, that if said Chief of Police should find that any existing condition which caused the disapproval of said application can be remedied, he shall allow a reasonable time to correct said condition, and when corrected to his said satisfaction shall approve said application.

Within ten days after the receipt of any application for the installation, operation or maintenance of any electrical musical device the Chief of Police shall cause a copy of said application to be forwarded to the Chief of the Department of Electricity, and the latter shall investigate said application, and after said investigation if it shall appear that the installation, operation and maintenance of said electrical musical device conforms with all ordinances of the City and County, and the rules and regulations of the department thereof, and that said electrical musical devices can be maintained and operated without danger to the safety of the people of the City and County of San Francisco, the Chief of the Department of Electricity shall approve the same, but should he determine to the contrary, he shall disapprove the same, stating his reasons for said disapproval, and in the event of said disapproval said application shall be deemed denied, provided, however, that if said Chief of the Department of Electricity should find that any existing condition which caused the disapproval of said application can be remedied, he shall allow a reasonable time, not to exceed ten days, to correct said condition and when corrected to his satisfaction shall approve said application.

On the final action of the Chief of the Department of Electricity upon any application for the installation, maintenance and operation of an electrical musical device, he shall report his action thereon to the Chief of Police. If the Chief of the Department of Electricity has finally disapproved said application, upon any of the grounds under his jurisdiction, said application shall be denied by the Chief of Police, but if the said application is approved by the Chief of the Department of Electricity, and the same has also, or is thereafter approved by the Chief of Police, the said application shall be deemed granted, and the Chief of Police shall issue a permit for the installation, maintenance and operation of said musical device as required in said application. Provided, however, that nothing in this section shall be deemed to abridge or limit the right, power and authority given the Chief of Police by Section 35.6 of the Charter of the City and County of San Francisco to refuse to issue the police permit required under this ordinance or to revoke such permit.

**SEC. 355. Expiration of Permits.** Any permit so issued shall expire on the last day of March, June, September and December of each year, and the renewal or continuance of said permit shall be governed by the provisions of Section 23 of Article 1, Part III of the San Francisco Municipal Code, provided that any permit for the installation, operation or maintenance of any electrical musical device in force on the effective date of this ordinance shall be continued in effect for the current quarter for which it has been issued.

**SEC. 356. Permit Forwarded to Tax Collector.** On the grant-

ing of any permit for the installation, maintenance and operation of any electrical musical device by the Chief of Police, he shall transmit said permit to the Tax Collector to be delivered to the permittee upon the payment of the fees provided for in Section 357 of this Article. Said Chief of Police shall also advise the Chief of the Department of Electricity of the granting of said permit and it shall be the duty of the latter to supervise the installation of said electrical musical device insofar as the electrical installation thereof is concerned.

**SEC. 357. License Fees.** Every permittee shall pay to the Tax Collector a monthly license fee of one dollar (\$1.00), plus a monthly license fee of an additional one dollar (\$1.00) for each separate electrical musical device which the permit authorizes, payable quarterly in advance, for the periods ending on the last days of March, June, September and December of each year.

**SEC. 358. Contents of Licenses.** The Tax Collector shall issue a license for such electrical musical devices for which the fee was paid, showing thereon the

- (a) Name and address of the permittee;
- (b) Number and kind of the electrical musical devices the permit authorizes;
- (c) Serial number of the permit and the expiration date of the license.

**SEC. 359. Removal or Transferring of License to Other Person or Premises Prohibited.** The permit and license issued pursuant to this Article shall be valid only for the person to whom issued and the premises for which issued, and license fees paid under the provisions of this Article shall not be prorated or refunded.

**SEC. 360. Notification of Issuance of License—Placing of Seal of Approval.** Upon the issuance to the permittee of the license as provided for in this Article, the Tax Collector shall immediately notify in writing the Chief of the Department of Electricity of such fact. Upon receipt of such notification, the Chief of the Department of Electricity shall cause to be placed in a conspicuous place on each of said electrical musical devices for which a permit and license has been obtained a seal of approval for the public to see, of such shape, design, wording and material as the Controller shall specify. Upon revocation of such permit the Chief of Police shall notify the Chief of the Department of Electricity of that fact, and said seal of approval shall be removed by the latter from such device and destroyed. The Chief of the Department of Electricity or any representative of the Department of Electricity shall have access to any electrical musical device at any and all times. In the event of the renewal of any permit or license for any electrical musical device it shall not be necessary for the Chief of the Department of Electricity to renew the seal of approval if the same is intact.

**SEC. 361. Application for Renewal of License or for Additional License.** Application for renewal of license shall be made to the Tax Collector and shall be made within ten (10) days prior to the expiration of the current license. If said application for a renewal of license be not made within the times specified, the permit authorized by this Article shall automatically become null and void.

Whenever a permittee desires to install, operate or maintain to be operated electrical musical devices in addition to the number of said devices authorized by his current permit and license, the provisions of this Article shall apply provided that the monthly license fee of one dollar shall not be required to be paid.

**SEC. 362. Procedure Where No Current License.** If any electrical musical device is placed, operated, or maintained to be operated without a license, the Chief of Police shall immediately cause the same to be impounded and shall not release said electrical musical device until a permit and license has been obtained as provided for in this Article for obtaining an original permit, and a penalty of twice the

amount of the delinquent quarterly license fee for the current period has been paid to the Tax Collector, and the amount of said delinquent licenses and penalties shall be a lien on said electrical musical devices and the same may be sold by the Tax Collector to satisfy said lien.

**SEC. 363. Suspension, Revocation or Reinstatement of a Permit. Procedure for.** When the Chief of Police shall determine that the permittee or any of the permittee's employees, servants or agents in the use, operation or maintenance of any such electrical musical device is violating or attempting to violate any law of the State of California or any ordinance of the City and County of San Francisco or the rules and regulations of any department thereof concerned; or, if in the opinion of the Chief of Police it is deemed necessary for the protection of the public, the Chief of Police, after written notice to the permittee, and after due and proper hearing, shall have power to suspend or revoke any permit issued under the provisions of this Article.

The Chief of Police shall cause to be forwarded to the Tax Collector and to the Chief of the Department of Electricity written notice of any revocation, suspension or reinstatement of any permit herein provided for.

**SEC. 364. Devices Not to Be Used for Dancing Without a Permit.** It shall be unlawful for any person having a permit to operate an electrical musical device, to use, or to permit the same to be used, for the furnishing of music for dancing on any premises or in any place where a permit allowing dancing on said premises or place has not been granted.

**SEC. 365. Devices Not to Be Used so as to Affect Public Health or Morals.** No person having a permit to operate or maintain an electrical musical device shall maintain or use the same or permit the same to be used so that the same shall be detrimental to the health, safety or morals of any person on or about the premises where said electrical musical device is operated or maintained, and the Chief of Police is hereby given full authority to determine when any such musical device is maintained or used so as to be detrimental to the health, safety and morals of those in and about said premises.

**SEC. 366. Rules and Regulations to Be Adopted.** The Chief of Police is hereby authorized to adopt, promulgate and enforce such rules and regulations regarding electrical musical devices as will enable him to enforce and carry out the meaning and intent of this Article.

**SEC. 367. When Deemed a Public Nuisance. Procedure Thereon.** Any electrical musical device operated or maintained to be operated in violation of this Article or any ordinances of the City and County of San Francisco or the rules and regulations of any state or municipal department concerned shall be deemed to be a public nuisance, and any such electrical musical device so operated or maintained to be operated shall be impounded by the Chief of Police, and if any court of competent jurisdiction shall determine that said electrical musical device or the use or operation thereof violates or has violated any of said ordinances or rules and regulations, said electrical musical device shall be confiscated by said Chief of Police; but, if said electrical musical device is one which may be legally operated under the provisions of this Article and is seized for the failure to pay the necessary license fee for the maintenance or operation of said electrical musical device, said electrical musical device shall be dealt with as provided in Section 366 of this Article.

**SEC. 368. Violation, a Misdemeanor.** Any person violating any of the provisions of this Article shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.

**SEC. 369. Permit and License Required Notwithstanding Any Other Provision of Code.** The issuance of a permit or license under the provisions of this Article shall not exempt the permittee or licensee, notwithstanding any section of the San Francisco Municipal Code or any section of any ordinance of the City and County of San Francisco

making any section or sections thereof inapplicable, from the provisions of the San Francisco Municipal Code or any ordinance or ordinances of the City and County of San Francisco requiring a permit or license.

**SEC. 370. Partial Repeal.** Any and all ordinances, or parts thereof, in conflict with the provisions of this Article are hereby repealed but only to such extent as conflict may exist.

**SEC. 371. Saving Clause—Non-Waiver of Debts Due and Unpaid.** If any section, subsection, subdivision, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase of this Article is for any reason held to be unconstitutional, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Article. The Board of Supervisors hereby declares that it would have passed this Article, and each section, subsection, subdivision, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase thereof, irrespective of the fact that any one or more other sections, subsections, subdivisions, paragraphs, sentences, clauses or phrases be declared unconstitutional.

The enactment of this Article shall not in any manner be construed as a waiver of any license or permit fee or any other fees or money due and unpaid under the provisions of the San Francisco Municipal Code or any ordinance of the City and County of San Francisco.

*February 7, 1944—Consideration continued until February 28, 1944, at 2:30 p. m.*

#### Privilege of the Floor.

Deputy Chief of Police Michael Riordan, at the request of the Chief of Police and on motion by Supervisor MacPhee, was granted the privilege of the floor. Deputy Chief Riordan announced that in general, the purpose of the proposed legislation was to enable the Police Department better to enforce the law and to combat the increasing juvenile delinquency. Deputy Chief Riordan then explained in detail, section by section, the differences between the proposed legislation and the legislation at present in effect.

Mrs. Tevis Jacobs, representing the Commodore Sloat Mothers' Club, expressed the interests of her organization in seeing that the conditions surrounding the "juke" boxes were properly policed. She had no opposition to the juke boxes themselves, but believed that because of conditions in many establishments where they were located, the insufficient lighting, etc., that the proposed legislation would aid in proper policing.

Mr. Leo H. Shapiro, attorney, representing the Automatic Music Merchants Association, was, on motion by Supervisor Green, granted the privilege of the floor. Mr. Shapiro answered in detail the points raised by the Deputy Chief of Police. The change of control from the Chief of the Department of Electricity to the Chief of Police was the very crux of the situation. The proposed legislation would legislate out of business, the small business man. Under the proposed legislation he would have no authority to apply for permission to conduct his business. The "juke" box industry has nothing to do toward contributing to juvenile delinquency, and he objected to the granting of such powers to the Chief of Police for the regulation of such industry. No one has suggested that such powers be granted to him to regulate music played in theatres and in other places. The Chief of Police, under the proposed legislation, is apparently the sole judge as to whether the morals or the public welfare of the community would be damaged by these juke boxes. No other ordinance gives any one person such power in the regulation of a legitimate business. Section 363, Mr. Shapiro characterized as one of the most vicious sections he had read in a long time. It would permit the revocation of a permit if anyone employed in a location where juke boxes were installed, were guilty of the infraction of any law or even regulation.

Mr. Harrison Call, attorney representing operators throughout the state, with the exception of San Francisco, agreed with the views expressed by the previous speaker, that the proposed legislation would not regulate or restrict an industry; it would put that industry out of business. The proposed legislation places in the hands of someone without whom you cannot deal. The District Attorney and Mr. George Reilly of the State Board of Equalization see no need for the proposed legislation; they believe there is sufficient law to force people to light their places of business properly. No new laws are needed; the need is the enforcement of the present laws. In this proposed legislation there is no provision for appeal from the decision of the Chief of Police. This legislation also places a legitimate industry in the category of something vicious, and placing it in the hands of the Police.

Mr. J. W. Ehrlich, attorney, representing manufacturers of electrical musical devices, also objected to the proposed legislation. He denied that juke boxes contributed to juvenile delinquency. Juvenile delinquency is created in the homes, by mothers and fathers, by broken homes, by lack of proper supervision over children; not by music. Minors are not permitted in saloons or taverns. The Police need no invitation or specific license by the Board of Supervisors or any specific tax levied by the Board of Supervisors to enter a tavern to see that the laws are obeyed. Not one reason has been advanced sufficient to warrant the addition of an additional tax. If this increased tax is levied, tomorrow a tax on radios will be proposed, the next day it will be something else, and so on, ad infinitum.

Chief of Police Dullea, on being granted the privilege of the floor, asserted that his department was not directing any attacks against any legitimate operators or against any people who conduct their business in a lawful manner; it was merely trying to reach into places that will not obey the law. In some establishments where liquor is sold the lighting is dim, minors do go in there and purchase soft drinks, which are often "spiked"; juveniles do dance in those places. The police are charged with certain responsibilities; they should then be granted certain authority. The Chief of Police, referring to statement made by a previous speaker, stated that he wished the District Attorney were present to tell him, and to tell the Board that he is opposed to the proposed legislation. Juke boxes of themselves, of course, do not contribute to juvenile delinquency, and no one has contended that they do. But there operation, under certain surroundings does contribute to such delinquency, a condition that the Chief of Police was trying to correct. As to appeal from his decision, the Chief called attention to the Board of Permit Appeals, to which any one could appeal, so his decisions were not final. As to the operators of machines, the same legislation obtains for the pin ball machines. The person who operates a pin ball machine is responsible. There are warnings, reprimands, suspensions, but very few confiscations. No action is ever taken except after hearing, and every decision of the Chief of Police is subject to appeal before the Board of Permit Appeals.

Deputy Chief of Police Riordan, on again taking the floor, answered some of the statements by those opposed to the proposed legislation. He explained, also, the method of hearings on violations. The responsibility of the owner of machines, he felt to be the hub of the entire matter. The Police Department wants to relieve the owner of the machines from responsibility and instead, hold the man who operates them responsible. Minors are permitted in taverns, although they cannot be employed in such establishments, nor can they be sold liquor. As to the taxes proposed, the Police Department is not concerned.

Mr. Spencer of the Automatic Music Merchants Association, denied that juke boxes in any way contributed to juvenile delinquency, and read letters of appreciation and commendation to his association for furnishing such machines to furnish music for "teen age dances."

### In Hands of the Board.

On motion by Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Mead, the matter was taken into the hands of the Board.

*No objection and so ordered.*

### Supervisor Brown Temporarily Excused From Meeting.

Supervisor Brown, at the hour of 3:55 p. m., was excused temporarily from the meeting in order that he might attend another meeting at 4:00 p. m. Before leaving the chambers, Supervisor Brown stated that he was opposed to the passage of the legislation under consideration, and his absence would, therefore, have the same effect as a negative vote if the roll should be called before his return. Supervisor Brown returned to the chambers at 4:50 p. m.

Supervisor Uhl requested a summary from the attorneys who had addressed the Board. He desired to know just what their objections were, and what remedy they could offer.

Thereupon, Mr. Shapiro announced that the principal objection was against being legislated out of business. The operators of electrical musical devices are in a legitimate business and should not be subject to any police regulation. They objected to so much power being placed in the hands of one man.

Mr. Call held that the proposed legislation would take away the operation of a legitimate business and put it into the hands of the tavern owners.

Mr. George A. Miller, State President of California Music Operators Association, objected to the proposed legislation. In no place in California, he stated, was there such taxation or such legislation. No police department, city council or board of supervisors has seen fit to put the music business in the category of pin ball machines. The biggest objection against this particular ordinance is that it will set a precedent for such legislation all over the state.

The Chief of Police stated, in reply to question by Supervisor Uhl, that the general condition that prevails, especially in residential and apartment house districts, had prompted the request for the proposed legislation. The juke boxes, in many locations, are nuisances.

Supervisor Mancuso stated that he did not think proper information had been presentd. In this ordinance there was a definite change in the regulation of juke boxes. In the past they were not regulated as individual units in so far as individual operators were concerned. In this ordinance, the Police Department will be given direct control of juke boxes and will be enabled to act, where they cannot act at the present time. No individual has opposed this legislation. Only the individuals who own juke boxes by the score or so, through their attorneys, are fighting this ordinance. This ordinance will give the Chief of Police better control over juvenile delinquency. Supervisor Mancuso did not care what any other county or city had done with regard to passing such an ordinance. San Francisco should be a leader instead of a follower. There is no comparison between the radio and the juke box. Radio does not furnish selective music. Supervisor Mancuso also called attention to an article in the *Argonaut*, issue of February 4, 1944, entitled "A Cheap Racket and the Service Men Pay Off," protesting the increased cost of operating a juke box. Supervisor Mancuso, in continuing his presentation, pointed out wherein the proposed legislation differed from the previous ordinance. The new legislation gives control over the person getting the permit, rather than over the owner. The ordinance is not discriminatory; people can appeal from any decision of the Chief of Police before the Board of Permit Appeals. In closing, Supervisor Mancuso urged the members of the Board to support the Finance Committee's recommendation.

Supervisor Mead announced that contrary to the statement by Supervisor Mancuso that no one except the owners of a score or more of juke boxes were protesting, he had received many letters from tavern owners opposed to the ordinance, and that no one had appeared in favor of the legislation, with a single exception. The various clubs and civic organizations have not been represented before the Board, so apparently they are not particularly interested in the matter. As for the present Chief of Police, he is the outstanding Chief of Police in the United States and is deserving of great respect. But he does not need the proposed type of legislation to enable him to enforce the law. Mrs. Jacobs was not objecting to juke boxes; her objection was to the improperly lighted taverns, and there are plenty of laws to correct that condition, or if not, the Board of Supervisors can take the necessary steps to provide laws. This ordinance will put legitimate business out of business. The Board of Supervisors should encourage business. The City and County is enjoying some \$25,000 or \$30,000 income from the juke boxes. This legislation will drive many of the owners out of business and San Francisco will lose some of its revenue. The bill is not necessary. The entire discussion is much ado about nothing.

Supervisor Mancuso, in reply, stated that he thought it was much ado about nothing. There was considerable agitation before the Board of Supervisors when pin ball machines were being discussed, but they did not go out of business. Of course, music does not contribute to juvenile delinquency, and no one is trying to eliminate juke boxes. The little operators are not represented by the prominent array of attorneys present. If this law is passed, the Chief of Police will use his customary diligence, and the law will not affect these people as has been said. Increased revenues will come to the city. Tavern owners will not object to the \$1 fee which is proposed. However, the most important thing is that by passage of the proposed ordinance, the control of the machines will be placed in the hands of the Chief of Police, in whom everyone has confidence. The only ones who have any fear of this type of legislation are the people who are likely to tolerate infractions of normal rule and normal control over the taverns. The Board of Supervisors should pass this recommendation of the Chief of Police.

Deputy Chief Riordan explained the effect of the proposed change in license fee, stating that while the Police Department was not at all concerned in that feature of the legislation, the City and County, under the proposed fees, would receive greater revenue than under the present ordinance.

Thereupon, the roll was called and the proposed legislation was *Refused Passage for Second Reading* by the following vote:

He had previously felt that some of the items requested might be postponed until after the war, but was told that was impossible. On those representations he was perfectly willing to vote for the bill.

Supervisor Uhl announced that at the meeting on February 21, 1944, he had expressed his opposition to some of the appropriations. He had not changed his views, and requested that the various items be taken up seriatim.

Thereupon, the various items for which appropriations were requested, were taken up seriatim:

**Condemning Alleged Practice of Wholesalers Requiring Purchasers of Liquor to Purchase Copies of the Bible.**

Whereas, those who are required to purchase liquor under such conditions are required to pay for the copies of the Holy Bible which accompany the liquor at the rate of \$16.50 per dozen, and upon the representation that the Bibles are being furnished, as a patriotic gesture, to the members of the armed forces for their spiritual consolation and betterment; and

Whereas, such a practice is despicable in an unmentionable degree and constitutes not only a sacrilege but an affront to the members of the armed forces for whom the Bibles are represented to be intended; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That this Board of Supervisors publicly condemns the practice whereby a potential vendee of liquor is required to also purchase copies of the Holy Bible and urges such authorities as have jurisdiction over such matters to invoke, if legally possible, some means which will provide for the immediate discontinuance of this reprehensible practice.

Repealing Section 6, relating to prohibited lighting during an emergency, Ordinance No. 1461, entitled "Providing for an 'Air Raid Ordinance'; the construction thereof, defining terms used therein; providing for authorized warning signals; providing for rules and regulations for the conduct of persons during 'Air Raid Periods' and emergency; providing for the appointment of persons to enforce the provisions of this ordinance; prohibiting the display of lights during a 'Blackout'; prohibiting certain specified lighting during emergency; making unauthorized lights a nuisance and providing for their abatement; regulating vehicles during 'Air Raid Periods'; forbidding unauthorized interference with public during 'Air Raid Periods'; providing for publication; providing penalty for violation; providing that an emergency exists which requires that this ordinance become effective at once; providing for severability of various parts of this ordinance"; and providing that an emergency exists which requires that this ordinance become effective forthwith.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco, as follows:

Section 1. Section 6 of Ordinance No. 1461, the title of which is recited above, is hereby repealed.

Section 2. Section 1, this ordinance, is passed as an emergency measure, and the Board of Supervisors does by the vote by which this ordinance is passed declare that a national emergency exists, which necessitates this ordinance become effective forthwith; the nature of said emergency being that Section 6 of Ordinance No. 1461 (Blackout Ordinance) is in direct conflict with the provisions of Chapter 229 of

the General Laws of the State of California for 1943; and it is necessary that this ordinance should become effective forthwith for the protection of the public peace, and safety of the people of the City and County of San Francisco.

**Requesting Mayor and Chief Administrative Officer to Inaugurate Movement for Making Available for Refabrication, Surplus and Unnecessary Paper in the Various City Departments.**

Whereas, the War Production Board has recently announced that due to lack of pulp, because of a labor shortage in logging areas, and due to the fact that the vast shipments of exported paper products are not recoverable, paper and paper products are now on the No. 1 Priority List; and

Whereas, in order to insure the minimum requirement of this vital product for use in the war effort as well as for ordinary business and personal use, it is imperative that all surplus supplies of used and waste paper be made available for refabrication; and

Whereas, undoubtedly there is on hand, in the various departments of the City and County of San Francisco, surplus and unnecessary paper which could be made available for refabrication; and

Whereas, Ordinance No. 9141 (New Series) provides for the destruction of useless paper of the City and County of San Francisco; and

Whereas, by making all surplus and unnecessary paper available for the war effort, as well as for vital home-front operations, the departments of municipal government will not only perform a patriotic service but will set an example which will serve as an incentive for like action in private business; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That his Honor the Mayor and the Chief Administrative Officer be and they are hereby respectfully asked to inaugurate a movement which will result in making available for refabrication all of the surplus and unnecessary paper in the possession of the departments of the government of the City and County of San Francisco.

**Recommending the Adoption of Senate Constitutional Amendment No. 2.**

Supervisor Uhl presented:

Proposal No. 3886, Resolution No. . . . . ., as follows:

Whereas, the Senate of the State of California, the Assembly concurring, has presented to the electors of the State of California an amendment to Section 1 of Article XIII of the Constitution of California, which removes the prohibition against the taxation of property owned by the United States; and

Whereas, the United States during the past three years has acquired large holdings of real property including buildings and improvements thereon throughout the State of California and especially in the City and County of San Francisco; and

Whereas, the exemption of this property from taxation is an additional and unfair burden upon the other owners of real property in the City and County of San Francisco; and now, therefore, be it

Resolved, by the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco that it heartily endorses said Constitutional Amendment No. 2 to be voted upon by the people of the State of California on May 16, 1944, and urges all the electors of the City and County of San Francisco to vote in favor of said amendment, to the end that property owned by the United States in the City and County of San Francisco and throughout the State of California may bear a fair proportion of the taxes assessed against other property in the City and County and throughout the State of California; be it

Further Resolved, That the President of the Board of Supervisors be and he is hereby authorized to appoint a committee in such numbers as he shall deem proper for the purpose of giving publicity to

said Constitutional Amendment No. 2 and obtaining the support of the electors of the City and County of San Francisco for a favorable vote on said amendment.

#### **Consideration of Establishment of a Consolidated Airport Authority.**

Supervisor Green announced the hearings would start on Friday, March 3, 1944, looking to the establishment of a Consolidated Airport Authority, and he desired to obtain the services of a reporter therefor.

#### **Employment of Attorney by the Public Utilities Commission.**

Supervisor Uhl read resolution adopted by the Public Utilities Commission concerning the appointment of Mr. Jesse H. Steinhart as attorney for the Public Utilities Commission, stating that while he realized that the Commission could make its own appointments, it was his understanding that necessary appropriation therefor must come from the Board of Supervisors.

On being informed by Supervisor MacPhee that such was not the case, Supervisor Uhl requested the Board to ask the City Attorney to explain to the Board, at its meeting on Monday, March 6, 1944, why his department was not able to fulfill the requirements of the Public Utilities Commission.

On objection by Supervisor Mead, who pointed out that Supervisor Uhl could make such a request himself, Supervisor Uhl announced that he would write to the City Attorney and also to the Public Utilities Commission thereon.

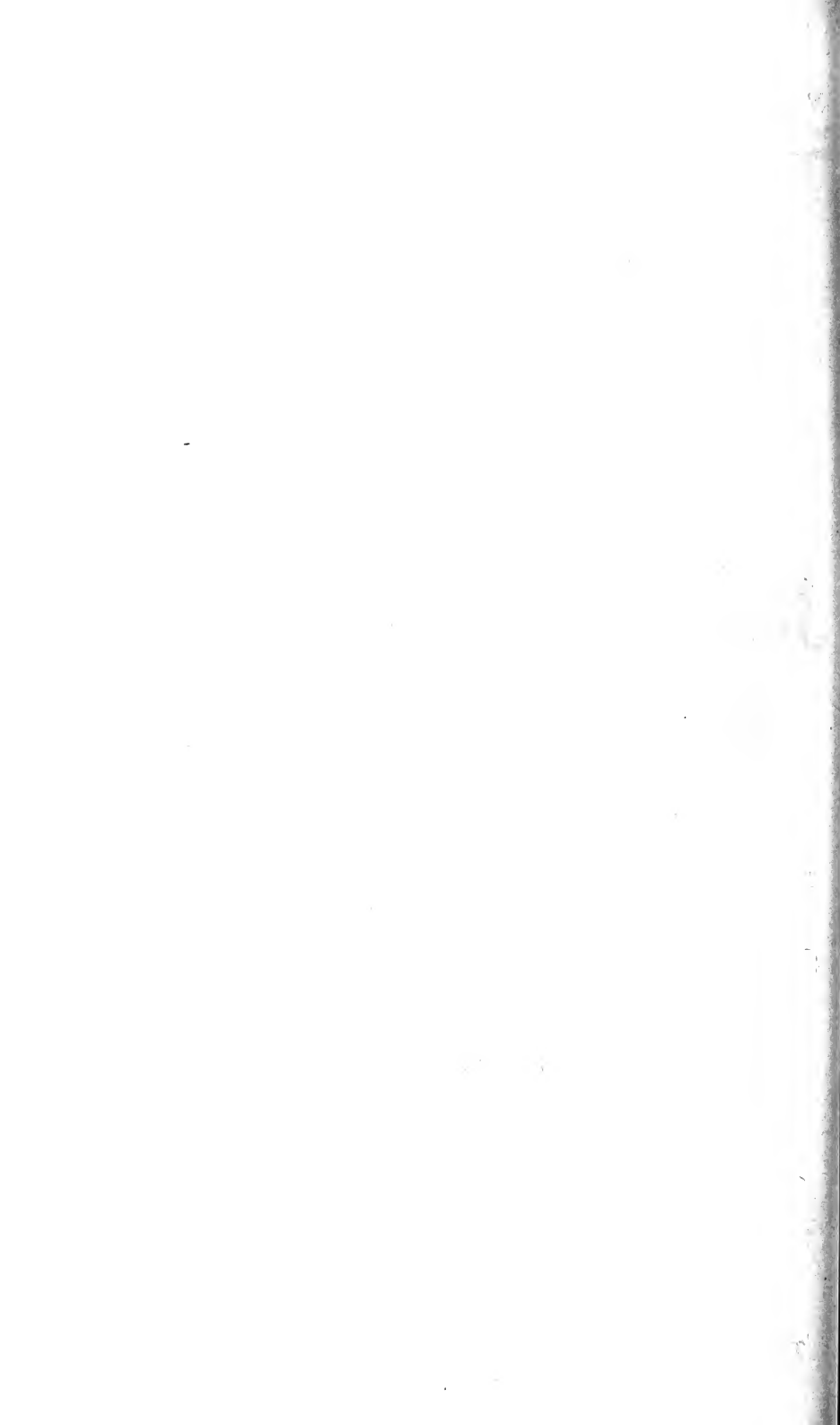

From Civil Service Commission, reply to protests of the San Francisco Municipal Conference and the Bureau of Governmental Research in regard to the proposed salary standardization schedules of the Civil Service Commission; also, charts indicating the distribution of the estimated increased costs in the proposed salary schedules and the estimated increased cost of overtime after forty hours per week.

From Civil Service Commission, reporting that in accordance with union rates and prevailing practice, straight time only will be approved for any time in excess of a normal work week, or for holiday work other than construction, for the following classes: A165 Stage Carpenter; E109 Stage Electrician; A170 Stage Property Man.

From Civil Service Commission, reporting that since proposed salary standardization recommendations were submitted to the Board on February 1, 1944, changes have been made in the rates in the trades as follows: A252 Glazier; A254 Foreman Glazier; C268 Granite Cutter. Classes affected are as follows: J4 Laborer; J10 Labor Sub-Foreman; J12 Labor Foreman; J152 Trackman; J156 Switch Repairer; J166 Track Foreman; U112 Pipe Calker; U114 Main Pipe Foreman; U116 Serviceman; U120 Gateman; U206 Water Department Worker.

From Civil Service Commission, recommending amendment by addition of "10 cents extra per hour while instructing new employees as assigned by the Superintendent" to the following classes: S102 Conductor; S104 Motorman; S106 Bus Operator. Also recommending that there be added the following to Class J4 Laborer: "When performing duties of Pneumatic Tool Operator, \$8.50 per day."

From San Francisco Bureau of Governmental Research, protesting salary standardization schedules recommended by the Civil Service Commission.

From International Hod Carriers' Building and Common Laborers' Union of America, copy of decision as rendered by the Wage Adjustment Board on increase of wages for laborers, of five cents per hour; also schedule of laborers' classifications and wage rates.

From Public Utilities Commission, protesting payment of penalty overtime for work in excess of forty hours per week and penalty overtime for night shift work after seven and one-half hours per shift, to employees of the Public Utilities Commission paid on a monthly basis who are engaged in the operation of any utility.

Consideration of obligations of Market Street Railway Company as to the use of streets and condition of streets used.

#### Consideration Continued.

#### Declaration of Policy Re Termination of Franchises of Market Street Railway Company.

(Series of 1939)

Proposal No. 3821, Resolution No. . . . . , as follows:

Whereas, the Market Street Railway Company is the successor in interest of various franchises issued to various persons and corporations authorizing the operating of street railways over and on the streets of San Francisco, and is especially the successor in interest of a certain operating permit issued pursuant to the provisions of Section 6-B, Chapter II, Article II, of the Charter of the City and County of San Francisco, effective on January 8, 1900, and thereafter amended; and

Whereas, said operating permit was issued pursuant to all of the terms and conditions contained in the original franchises authorizing the operation and maintenance of said street railways; and

Whereas, the Market Street Railway Company is operating its several street railway lines in the City and County of San Francisco under and pursuant to said operating permit issued pursuant to the provisions of said Section 6-B, Chapter II, Article II of the said Charter of 1900 as amended, and under and pursuant to certain supplemental and additional permits issued by the Board of Supervisors of the City and County, which said permits were an extension of original franchises granted for the operation of street railway on the streets of the City and County of San Francisco; and

Whereas, it is provided in all franchises, the conditions of which became a part of said operating permit issued pursuant to the provisions of said Section 6-B, Chapter II, Article II of the said Charter of 1900 as amended, that the holder of said permit would pave the streets between the railroad tracks laid thereon and on two feet on each side of said tracks with the same materials which said streets were paved; and

Whereas, the Market Street Railway Company is now the owner and holder of said operating permit mentioned aforesaid, and has failed and neglected to pave the streets on which said railroad tracks are laid, between said tracks, and on two feet on each side of said tracks, and has therefore violated the provisions of said operating permit; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Board of Supervisors does hereby submit to the electors of the City and County of San Francisco the following Declaration of Policy, to-wit: Shall the Board of Supervisors adopt an ordinance directing the City Attorney to take the necessary proceedings to

cancel and annul the existing operating permit and all other permits and franchises held by the Market Street Railway Company under and by which said company operates street railway cars and buses over and on the streets of San Francisco, and upon the cancellation of said operating permit, permits or franchises, shall the Board of Supervisors issue to said Market Street Railway Company a month to month operating permit permitting the operation of street railway cars and buses over and on the streets of the City and County upon such terms and conditions as said Board shall deem proper.

*January 31, 1944—Consideration postponed until Monday, February 7, 1944, at 2:30 P. M.*

*February 7, 1944—Consideration continued until Monday, March 6, 1944, at 2:30 P. M.*

#### Discussion.

Supervisor MacPhee, in discussing the foregoing proposal, stated that on February 7, 1944, at which time further consideration had been postponed for four weeks, two members of the Board had announced that if within four weeks' time there was nothing definite as to the acquisition of the Market Street Railway properties, they would vote in favor of the foregoing proposal. There is nothing definite before the Board today, although discussions are still going on with respect to the purchase of the Market Street Railway properties. Now the people of San Francisco should be given the opportunity to determine whether or not the Market Street Railway Company has fulfilled the terms of their franchises. There is no need further to review the situation; the picture is the same.

Supervisor Colman moved that further consideration be postponed for four weeks. Motion seconded by Supervisor Brown.

Supervisor Colman, in discussing his motion for postponement, stated that while it was true that nothing of an entirely definite nature had been presented to the Board of Supervisors in regard to the solution of the transportation problem, the members of the Board knew that the matter was being pursued as rapidly as possible. A definite proposal was well on the way to be presented to the Board of Supervisors for consideration. Because the negotiations could not be completed in four weeks there was no reason to rush action that might seriously interfere with a solution to the problem. If there were any lack of diligence on the part of the officials conducting the negotiations, it would be different. But such is not the case. The approval of this proposal might spoil a plan that may be suggested to the Board. Because of the importance of the matter of transportation, as compared to the importance of street paving, this matter should be postponed to give the administration an opportunity to present its program to the Board.

Supervisor MacPhee, in reply, declared that Supervisor Colman was again attempting to confuse the issue. There was nothing in the proposed legislation that had anything to do with transportation. It deals only with street paving. For the past two years we have tried to get something done in this matter. Street repair is important; it is equally important with many other problems facing San Francisco. If there is any program for better transportation that is to be brought before the Board, we want to know about it, but we do not want the streets to get any worse. There has been nothing to change the picture of four weeks ago when four Supervisors voted for adoption of this program, and two Supervisors stated unless there was a definite program presented within four weeks, they would go along with this proposal. If something important should be presented, this matter can be removed from the ballot. The Board could well afford to go along with this proposal and give the Mayor a better hand for dealing

with the pressing problem of transportation. His hand will be immeasurably strengthened by passing this proposal.

Supervisor Mead expressed agreement with the views set forth by Supervisor MacPhee. Supervisor Colman has expressed his individual opinion. He seems to be of the opinion that submitting this matter to the people will have a tendency to confuse the issue. That may be his opinion, but so far as he, Supervisor Mead, was concerned, no attempt has been made to prove that it will bring about confusion. It has been the general consensus of opinion that the Market Street Railway can get anything they want from the Board of Supervisors. It is about time that the people should have the opportunity to instruct the members of the Board of Supervisors as to what they want. This seems to be the only manner in which the people can instruct the Board of Supervisors as to what they do want. The Board can later on withdraw this from the ballot if it desires to. In closing Supervisor Mead urged the approval of the foregoing proposal.

Supervisor Colman, in further argument in favor of his motion for postponement, after reading the "Resolve" of the foregoing proposal, declared that if the foregoing declaration of policy were submitted to the people, and if it were approved by the people, the city would not be able to deal with the Market Street Railway on the proposal to be submitted by the Mayor and the Public Utilities Commission. The plan could not then even be considered. The transportation problem would continually grow worse. There would be long litigation, which would not be helpful to the people in regard to transportation. If the Board should adopt the proposed proceedings, the people will get poorer transportation. While street repair is important, in comparison with transportation it is relatively unimportant. The adoption of the proposed legislation will not result in any immediate improvement of the streets.

Supervisor Colman, in additional argument against adoption of the proposal, objected to the Board running to the people with its problems. The Supervisors were elected to solve such problems, and they were given enough authority to do so. This problem is strictly with the rights of the Board. It is the Board's duty to make the decision. Four weeks' delay cannot seriously alter the situation, in view of the fact that a proposal to remedy the transportation problem is sure to be presented to the Board. The new administration should be given a chance to solve the transportation problem. In a spirit of cooperation and for the best interest of San Francisco, the requested postponement should be granted to permit the administration's proposal to be presented.

Supervisor Mead stated that he did not think Supervisor Colman was quite fair in trying to lead the people to believe that the proposed proposal had to do with the canceling of certain lines of the Market Street Railway Company. The proposal would provide for a month-to-month operating permit; it says nothing about putting the Market Street Railway Company out of business. It will let the Market Street Railway Company know, though, that the Board means business in protecting the interest of the public in general, and also those who use the streets for automobile traffic. The adoption of the proposal will not mean that certain lines will be discontinued.

Supervisor Brown, in supporting the motion for postponement, stated that, as the Board know, the question of the paving obligations is something that has been before the City and County for twenty years, at least. It cannot be corrected today or tomorrow. For several years the Market Street Railway Company has been in difficulty and unable to provide funds to keep up its paving obligations, and so the portion of work done to that which should have been done, was unfavorable. However, during the past few years the situation has been reversed.

The company now is doing more paving each year than it would be required under a strict pro rata to keep its obligations alive. It is making some progress on its delinquency. That is about all the company can do any way, no matter what legislation should be passed. The income of the company is regulated by the Railroad Commission. The company does not have the money to bring its laxity of the past many years up to date all at once. So long as the company is making a reasonable progress toward properly meeting its paving obligations, that is about all that can be expected of it.

Supervisor Brown further stated that he had suggested that a proper method of procedure might be to require the Market Street Railway to impound money so work could be more rapidly done at the conclusion of the war emergency. He had not seen any legislation along those lines though. Supervisor Brown agreed with Supervisor Colman that the Supervisors had been elected to do a job, and they should not run to the electorate to find out just how to do that job. This proposal would not give the Board of Supervisors any more power than it now has. The Board can do what this is requesting now. The real question for the Board to decide is if the company is doing the best it can under the existing circumstances to keep up its paving program. However, four weeks' postponement is reasonable. This measure should not be adopted until it is known whether or not the city is going to buy the Market Street Railway.

Mr. L. C. Newton, representing the Market Street Railway Company, announced that since a month ago he had discussed Supervisor MacPhee's proposal in detail, it was not necessary to do so again. However, he would call attention to the fact that in his estimation, the passage of the proposed resolution would be tantamount to the supposition, at least, by the Board of Supervisors, that there had been a breach of contract so far as the Market Street Railway Company was concerned. He would call attention, also, to the fact that at the one and only full meeting of the Joint Finance and Public Utilities Committee in December of last year, that the majority of that committee did not concur with Supervisor MacPhee, and did not find that there had been a breach of contract. Mr. Newton stated further that he had pointed out that the document prepared by the Director of Public Works did not reflect the full statement of conditions existing in December, 1943, or as they exist today. The document did not give cognizance to a number of agreements and ordinance that had been passed and that provided for a great deal of work to be done. It was only on December 31, 1943, that the Chief Administrative Officer directed a letter to the president of the Market Street Railway Company directing that the work be done as indicated in his report, and he questioned the reasonableness of anyone taking the position that such work, amounting to \$1,700,000, as set forth in the report, should be done in two and one-half months. Yet, in adoption of the proposed resolution, it must be admitted that there has been a breach of contract, and the only way the requested work could be done would be by canceling the company's twenty-five-year operating permit. That is not so at all. In the report by the Director of Public Works is listed a great deal of work in which track raising is concerned. That work cannot be done unless the city is prepared to go along and raise the street grade at the same time. The City Attorney has agreed that from a practical standpoint, such is the case. The whole thing boils down to a legitimate obligation of some \$646,000 of street paving. In 1943 the company spent \$368,000, or \$118,000 more than the statistical expert of the Board had developed. A month ago, Mr. Newton continued, he had filed a letter from the president of his company, in which it was stated that the company contemplated doing an equal amount of work in 1944. The company is bringing up the condition of its street paving, and it is doing so at a time when manpower and materials are scarce.



Since the last discussion of this proposal, the Tenth Regional War Labor Board has approved the municipal rate of pay for the carmen, which will cost some \$450,000 per year. This decision is retroactive to June 1, 1943, which will cost in back pay some \$300,000. The men, he believed, were entitled to the increase, and he was glad that it was awarded, but it would be impossible for his company to pay this amount and then do a million dollars' worth of street work. If the company loses in the courts and is compelled to operate on a six-cent carfare, it will end up the year with a deficit of about three-quarters of a million dollars. These facts must be considered by the Board of Supervisors. However, it has been agreed that the company will spend \$368,000 on street work this year, the same as last year, and that promise will be kept.

Any action as requested at this time would have a very bad effect upon the negotiations which the Mayor is now conducting with the Market Street Railway Company, through the Public Utilities Commission. If this proposal should not be voted down further consideration should be postponed for at least a month in order that nothing be done that will in any way hamper the chance of working out an improvement in the San Francisco transportation problem.

Supervisor MacPhee, in answer to statement by Mr. Newton, pointed out that on or about July 1, 1943, a copy of the report by Mr. Vansano had been presented to Mr. Newton, who had asked for time to examine it. Mr. Newton has been familiar with that report since that time rather than only from December 31, 1943. The Market Street Railway Company has been successful for many years in delaying action on street work. That is why it is so far behind. Now, if the people say they do not want the franchises cancelled, the Board will go along. However, he was opposed to any further postponement. There has been too much postponement in the past.

Supervisor Colman questioned the Mayor, who was present, asking him if he could tell the Board when, in his opinion, the Board of Supervisors would receive for its consideration, the proposal that is being studied by the Utilities Commission and himself.

In reply, the Mayor stated that he could not make any promise as to when such proposal would be ready to be sent to the Board. He expected, though, to have some kind of report within the next few days.

Mr. H. S. Foley, representing employees of the Municipal Railway, pointed out that to accomplish the purpose desired, a "yes" vote would be necessary. He believed the people would vote "no" on any matter pertaining to the Market Street Railway. The matter should be postponed in order to get the "Resolve" drawn so that the people will know just how they are voting on the proposal.

Supervisor Mead then stated that he believed in any matters of importance, the people of San Francisco would do a very fine job. They would not be fooled.

Supervisor Uhl stated that since street improvement work is now under way, and would continue, he could see no objection to a week's postponement of further consideration of the proposed resolution, and so would move as an amendment to the previous motion, that consideration be postponed for one week. Motion seconded by Supervisor Green.

Motion *failed* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Green, Uhl—2.

Noes: Supervisors Brown, Colman, Gallagher, Gartland, MacPhee, Mancuso, Mead, Meyer, Sullivan—9.

Whereupon, the roll was again called, and the original motion for a four weeks' postponement was *defeated* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Brown, Colman, Gallagher, Meyer, Uhl—5.

Noes: Supervisors Gartland, Green, MacPhee, Mancuso, Mead, Sullivan—6.

Supervisor Colman, thereupon, in discussing the main question, held that if the proposed legislation should be approved, the Board will have done more to harm the question of transportation in San Francisco than by anything that has ever come up before the Board. The problem of transportation, he believed, was approaching a sound solution. He believed there was great merit in the proposal which the Board was about to receive. Should this proposal be approved, the negotiations with the Market Street Railway could no longer be considered. And if the voters should express themselves in favor of the termination of franchises and permits of the Market Street Railway Company, the Board must go through with their verdict. This proposal does not bring transportation, but simply brings long and costly litigation. The public may construe this as a transportation solution and the public may think it will bring transportation, but it will not. We will be taken into one court after another. In the meantime the emergency will continue in its present condition, or it may get worse and worse until we have no transportation. We should give the Mayor a chance to see what he can do. He is tackling the transportation problem in a business like manner. The Board should have the courage to decide questions rather than to submit them to the people. It is a matter for the Board to decide. Supervisor Colman announced he would vote "No" on the proposal.

The President, Supervisor Gallagher, requested the City Attorney, who had sat in on hearings at which the proposal for acquisition of the Market Street Railway properties were discussed, to give to the Board something on the background of the proposal which was to be presented to the Board, and to state whether or not the proposal before the Board would be in conflict with the proposal to be submitted by the Mayor and the Public Utilities Commission.

The City Attorney, in reply, stated that he did not know what would be submitted to the Board. He did state that he believed there would be a conflict, because the proposal being discussed by the Board, if it should be approved by the voters, would possibly do away entirely with the necessity for any other agreement. He declined to state anything further, saying it would be a breach of ethics to give a statement that should come from the Mayor or from the Manager of Utilities.

Supervisor MacPhee, in addressing the Board on the main question, declared that history is about to be made in the Board of Supervisors. This is the first time, stated Supervisor MacPhee, that he had ever seen six Supervisors oppose any program for the Market Street Railway. There is nothing proposed in this resolution that will embarrass the Mayor. He believed it would help the Mayor. It would let the Market Street Railway Company know that the Board means business. This is the responsibility of the Board of Supervisors—not of the Mayor. It is our responsibility to see that the street repair program is carried through.

Supervisor Green, referring to the statement by Supervisor Colman that the Board should make its own decisions rather than refer matters to the people for their decision, pointed out that Supervisor Colman had voted to submit to the people the question of the purchase of the Market Street Railway properties and also, the one-man car operation. He, too, had voted to submit both those matters to the people, because he believed it was his duty to let the people express

themselves. He announced, also, that he intended to vote to submit to the people this proposal under consideration.

Supervisor Mead, in further reply to statement by Supervisor Colman that the Board should decide matters itself rather than submit them to the people, declared that apparently the Board had not had the courage so to do.

Mr. Lloyd Taylor, representing the Market Street Association, stated that he believed if the proposal under consideration were to be submitted to the voters it would be carried. The voters, he felt, because they were getting poor transportation, would do anything to embarrass the company. Mr. Taylor questioned whether the Market Street Railway would continue to make any attempt to live up to its street paving obligations if the proposal should be approved by the voters. The proposal would not result in any increased service. If it would, he would be in favor of it.

Mr. Adolph Petry stated that he believed it about time that the streets were put in proper condition according to the terms of the franchises. The Board should do something about it. The Board should do its duty, regardless of whom it hurts.

Mr. Robert Scott, Carmen's Union, Division 1004, opposed the proposal under consideration. The members of his union believed it would hurt their chances of eventually becoming employees of the City and County if the proposal were approved. Mr. Scott urged the Board, on behalf of 1700 men and their families, to vote the proposal down. If the proposal were adopted the men feared that the company might feel compelled to hand back the recent wage award to the Tenth Regional Board for reconsideration.

Supervisor Mead, thereupon, interjected that he believed the company would take advantage of any technicality to refer the matter back to the Regional Board.

Mr. Scott, in continuing, stated his group was in favor of the purchase of the Market Street Railway by the City and County, and they believed the proposal under consideration would hinder that.

Supervisor MacPhee stated that such was not the unanimous view of the employees. There were many employees of the Market Street Railway Company who were not interested in becoming municipal employees.

Supervisor Colman expressed interest in the statement by Mr. Scott and the hope that he would give the Board the benefit of his views, and would present all the reasons for appearing before the Board in opposition of the proposal. He urged that Mr. Scott be not heckled.

Supervisor Mead denied that Mr. Scott was being heckled. It would make no difference at all, he continued, whether the Board should submit the declaration of policy to the people or not; the Market Street Railway would request a review if they had any reason at all so to do.

Thereupon, Mr. Scott, in closing, announced that he had been called on, only at the last moment, to take the place of the president of his union, who was ill. He had not had the opportunity, himself, to study the matter in detail, but he had appeared under instructions of his executive board.

Mr. E. G. Cahill, on being questioned by the Chair, stated that the draft of a proposed contract has just been made by the attorneys. It is being submitted to Mr. Samuel Kahn. He believed the legislation being considered by the Board would be detrimental to the proposal of his commission. Even if the franchises, in the final analysis, were forfeited, the City would still be in the position where it would have

to buy the Market Street Railway. The City would have killed the Market Street Railway, but it could not operate the corpse. It would be impossible to operate without buying the properties of the railway.

Supervisor Brown, in discussing the proposal, stated that the proposed legislation proposes to ask the people of San Francisco to tell the Board whether or not they want the Board to institute proceedings for the cancellation of franchises of the Market Street Railway and to substitute therefor month-to-month operating permits. It would probably take from five to seven years to complete legal proceedings. The City could not refuse to renew any thirty-day operating permit. It would not be a simple matter for the City to take over the railway and operate it. There would be many practical difficulties encountered. Cars, overhead, sub-stations, etc., would be required. The company has made some progress in its paving obligations. As long as the trend is in that direction, the Board should be setting its sights towards an increase of that trend. No practical good can come from the approval of this proposed measure.

Mr. Newton of the Market Street Railway Company, referred to statements previously made, saying that Supervisor Mead had made a statement to the effect that his company was looking for a loophole to beat the decision of the War Labor Board.

Supervisor Mead denied having made such statement, and if Mr. Newton had got such an impression, he was mistaken. What he had said, continued Supervisor Mead, was if the company wanted to take advantage of a technicality, it would take such advantage if it could find one.

Thereupon, Mr. Newton continued, stated that he had already expressed his pleasure that the War Labor Board had made the award to the men. Up to the present time it was the intent of the management to go along and pay the increased wages, but if this legislation is passed, placing in jeopardy the financial integrity of the company, the company will advise the War Labor Board of this action and show them the financial disaster that may occur. On that account, it will be necessary to file for a rehearing. That can be the only logical conclusion to action by the Board of Supervisors in passing the proposed legislation.

Whereupon, Supervisor MacPhee announced that if there were no reason before to adopt the proposed resolution, there was every reason in the world to adopt it after hearing the statement just made.

Supervisor Colman, in again speaking on the proposed resolution, remarked that a statement had been made that nobody had stated before the Board of Supervisors that the proposed legislation would be detrimental to the pending negotiations. Mr. Cahill has now told the Board in plain terms that the adoption of this legislation would be detrimental to the negotiations and that in all probability they would stop. If negotiations should fall through then we might pass this legislation. What is illogical and unsound about waiting until the proposals of the Mayor and the Public Utilities Commission are brought here? Those proposals will be presented to us within a short time. No agreement with Mr. Kahn can be reached if this legislation passes. It would be wise to vote this down today. It can be brought up again later on. As to Mr. Scott's statement, should this proposal go through there would be infinitely better opportunity for better wages for all the employees of the system than with the litigation, enforced curtailment and possibly receivership that might come from litigation.

Mr. J. Robert Gerhart, Secretary-Treasurer of the Building Material Drivers' Local No. 216, expressed fear, because of the statement by Mr. Newton, that the question of wages for employees of the Market Street Railway Company might be re-referred to the War Labor Board, and

the negotiations for increased wages might be held up. He could see no reason for adopting the resolution at the present time.

Supervisor MacPhee announced that sometime ago when Supervisor Mead had presented a resolution requesting the Board to go on record for increased salaries to Market Street Railway employees, Supervisor Colman did not advocate such proposal.

Supervisor Gallagher announced that he had been one of the minority that had voted against the Market Street Railway, and he had so voted at all times. He was not committing himself as to whether he would be in favor of the proposed legislation that might come from the Public Utilities Commission. However, he felt the present proposal should not be acted on for a period of one or two weeks until the Board knows whether or not the Mayor or the Public Utilities Commission is going to submit a proposal. We have to give the administration a chance. Consideration of this proposal should be postponed.

Supervisor Uhl announced that he was in sympathy with the views expressed by Supervisor Gallagher, and moved that the matter remain on the Calendar for two weeks. Motion seconded by Supervisor Meyer.

Thereupon, the roll was called and the motion to postpone for two weeks *failed* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Brown, Colman, Gallagher, Meyer, Uhl—5.

Noes: Supervisors Gartland, Green, MacPhee, Mancuso, Mead, Sullivan—6.

His Honor Mayor R. D. Lapham requested the privilege of addressing the Board, saying that inasmuch as he understood from the City Attorney that if the proposed legislation should be approved by the Board he would have no veto power over it, and the declaration of policy would be submitted to the voters, and inasmuch as one of the Supervisors had stated that he had not heard from the Mayor, and this would probably be the only opportunity that he could speak on the question, he believed he should give the Board, very briefly, what was in his mind.

He, the Mayor, has felt that the transportation problem was the No. 1 problem. Since taking office he had been doing a great deal of thinking and discussing that problem. San Francisco will never have a satisfactory surface transportation system or subsurface transportation system unless it can be under one hand; unless there can be one system. It can only be the city's system. Everyone is pretty well agreed on that. There must be one system, one fare, a universal transfer and one control. That was what he was seeking. In the discussions that have been taking place that is the objective; to get for the city of San Francisco a unified transportation system under the control of the city. Unless we have that San Francisco can have no permanent improvement, or building for the future, and cannot make any reasonable progress. The attorneys have been working on that for sometime. A draft is now before the Utilities Commission which has for its objective that purpose. If the present legislation is approved, it will, at least, he believed, tend to delay the objective which the Mayor is trying to achieve. It will be unfortunate if the final solution of the transportation problem is delayed any further. If this legislation is approved and submitted to the people it will unquestionably result in a great deal of delay.

The Mayor, in closing, stated that he disliked to have to make such statement to the Board, for he did not wish to interfere with the Board's prerogatives, but he would deplore the passage of the proposed legislation because it would, he felt certain, delay what might possibly be a satisfactory solution to the transportation problem.

Supervisor Mead, following the Mayor's statement, declared that he would not want to bring about a condition whereby the Mayor's office

and the Board of Supervisors would be working at cross purposes. He was interested in the Mayor's statement, and was very happy to get the information. He would, therefore, ask for temporary postponement of further discussion of the matter for the purpose of discussing it with his colleagues on the Finance Committee.

Thereupon, Supervisor Mancuso questioned the Mayor, asking whether he sincerely believed that it would be detrimental to the working out of a solution for the acquisition of the Market Street Railway if the legislation were to be approved.

The Mayor replied that he did. He believed if the legislation were passed it would make the acquisition of the Market Street Railway more costly to the City and County.

Supervisor MacPhee disagreed with the Mayor, stating that he believed the passage would give the Mayor a greater bargaining advantage. However, after the plan of the Mayor and the Utilities Commission has been presented to the Board, the declaration of policy might be withdrawn from the ballot, if it should be thought desirable.

The City Attorney agreed that the Board could undo what it had done. But withdrawing the matter from the ballot would require another Board action, and the time wherein the Board could take such action would be short.

The Mayor, in further discussion of the matter, stated that if the declaration of policy should be submitted to the people, he could not even guess what could be done in getting a better price from the Market Street Railway. He was in favor of getting something done. He would rather go ahead with that than to take a chance of getting a little better price. His main thought was to get the deal over with.

Supervisor MacPhee then questioned the Mayor, asking him if, in the event no action was taken with respect to the purchase of the Market Street Railway by the Supervisors, if legally it was not possible, or if the Board of Supervisors decided not to purchase the properties without reference to the people, would he then be in favor of this proposed legislation to make the Market Street Railway live up to the terms of its franchises or operating permit.

The Mayor stated he thought that was reaching a little far ahead.

Supervisor Mancuso raised a point of order, stating that was not a fair question.

The Chair ruled the point of order well taken.

Thereupon, Supervisor MacPhee stated that since the Mayor had expressed his views with regard to his feeling about the legislation, he thought it was a fair question. He had asked the question to learn if it was merely the Mayor's desire to get more time for his negotiations. If so, he would propose more time. He had urged this proposal for about two years, but he would be the last member of the Board to stand in the Mayor's way. However, it was still his personal opinion that passage of the legislation would strengthen the Mayor's hand. However, he would go along with the Mayor's judgment.

Supervisor Meyer stated that after hearing the day's discussion he was convinced that it would cause delay if the proposal were to be approved. He believed the Board should know pretty well what it could do within the next two weeks.

Supervisor Colman moved that further consideration be postponed for three weeks. Motion seconded by Supervisor Uhl.

Supervisor Mead objected. The matter had been before the Board several times. The Board has the right to refuse a request for further postponement until it gets the proper information.

Thereupon, the roll was called and the motion to postpone further consideration for three weeks *carried* by the following vote:

**Authorizing Conveyance of Electric Transmission Line Right of Way in Alameda County and Payment of \$446 to Pacific Gas and Electric Company in Exchange for Easements in San Mateo County Required for Crystal Springs Pipe Line No. 2.**

(Series of 1939)

Bill No. 2760, Ordinance No. 2625, as follows:

Authorizing conveyance of electric transmission line right of way in Alameda County and payment of \$446 to Pacific Gas and Electric Company in exchange for easements in San Mateo County required for Crystal Springs Pipe Line No. 2.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco, as follows:

Section 1. Whereas, in accordance with the recommendation of the Public Utilities Commission, it appears that a conveyance by the City and County of San Francisco, a municipal corporation, hereinafter referred to as the City, of a right of way to the Pacific Gas and Electric Company, a corporation, hereinafter referred to as the Company, for an electric transmission line over certain City owned real property

situated in the County of Alameda, State of California, will not inconvenience the City, and it appearing to the Board of Supervisors that public interest and necessity demand the sale or trading thereof; and

Whereas, the Director of Property has received a written instrument dated January 27, 1944, from the Company, offering to convey the easements to the City required for its Crystal Springs Pipe Line No. 2 over certain real property situated in the County of San Mateo, State of California, in exchange for said transmission line right of way plus the sum of \$446 to be paid by the City to the Company; and

Whereas, the Director of Property and the Public Utilities Commission have recommended that said exchange be made;

Now, therefore, in consideration of the premises and pursuant to Section 92 of the Charter, the Director of Property in lieu of sale is hereby authorized and directed to arrange for trading said electric transmission line right of way to the Pacific Gas and Electric Company in exchange for said pipe line easements, subject to the provisions of this ordinance.

Section 2. The Director of Property has made an appraisal of said property and estimates the value of the electric transmission line right of way to be \$4,110 and the value of the pipe line easements to be \$4,556 including interest since the City took possession thereof on September 19, 1935, under the eminent domain proceedings hereinafter referred to as San Mateo County Superior Court Case No. 24781.

Section 3. The Mayor and the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors are hereby authorized and directed to execute the necessary deed or deeds on behalf of the City and County of San Francisco. The Director of Property is hereby authorized and directed to deliver the transmission line right of way deed to the Company upon receipt of a deed conveying the pipe line easements to the City and to accept and record the latter deed.

Section 4. The sum of \$446 mentioned in Section 1 of this ordinance shall be paid from the money on deposit with the County Clerk of San Mateo County, Superior Court Case No. 24781.

Section 5. The deeds to said right of way and easements shall be subject to the rights, limitations, reservations, terms and conditions set forth in said written offer on file in the office of the Director of Property.

Section 6. Descriptions of right of way and easements herein referred to.

#### TRANSMISSION LINE RIGHT OF WAY

A right of way for the erection, construction, reconstruction, replacement, repair, maintenance and use of a single line of towers, poles or other overhead structures, together with all wires suspended upon and supported by such towers, poles or other structures, which the Company may from time to time deem to be reasonably required for the transmission and distribution of electric energy and for telephone and telegraph purposes, including the necessary and proper cross-arms, braces, connections, fittings, anchors, guys, and other appliances and fixtures for use in connection therewith, in, on, across and along those certain strips of City owned land situated in the County of Alameda, State of California, particularly described as follows, to-wit:

1. A strip of land of the uniform width of 80 feet extending entirely across the parcel of land described and designated Parcel 65 in the deed, executed by Spring Valley Water Company to City and County of San Francisco dated March 3, 1930, and recorded in Book 2350 of Official Records at page 1, records of the County of Alameda, State of California, and lying contiguous to and northwesterly of the northwesterly boundary



line of that certain strip of land described and designated B (1) in the deed executed by Spring Valley Water Company to Pacific Gas and Electric Company, dated February 15, 1928, and recorded in Book 1835 of Official Records at page 115, records of said Alameda County.

2. A strip of land of the uniform width of 80 feet extending entirely across the parcel of land described and designated Parcel 62 in said deed dated March 3, 1930, and lying contiguous to and northwesterly of the northwesterly boundary line of the strip of land described and designated B (2) in said deed dated February 15, 1928.

Whereas, in the Municipal Cooperation Agreement between the City and County of San Francisco and the Housing Authority of the City and County of San Francisco, it is provided:

**Amendment to the Fire Code Providing Revised Procedure for the Inspection and Regulation of Vehicles Transporting Flammable Liquid, and Providing Fees Therefor.**

(Series of 1939)

Bill No. 2782, Ordinance No. . . . ., as follows:

Amending Article 12, Chapter IV (Fire Code), Part II, of the San Francisco Municipal Code, providing inspection and regulation of vehicles used to transport flammable liquid, by revising the title and table of contents to reflect amendments, additions and deletions to said

Article; providing amendments, additions and deletions to definitions, permit and certificate of approval required, construction, tank vehicle chassis, assembly and appurtenances, operation of tank vehicles, tank full trailer prohibited—exception, permit procedure—fees—identification, rules and regulations, suspension or revocation of a permit—procedure for, exceptions, enforcement, and violations; providing for permits now in force—expiration date; and providing a saving clause.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco, as follows:

Section 1. Article 12, Chapter IV (Fire Code), Part II, of the San Francisco Municipal Code, is hereby amended to read as follows:

## ARTICLE 12

### TANK VEHICLES

- Sec. 400. Definitions.
- Sec. 401. Permit and Certificate of Approval required.
- Sec. 402. Construction.
- Sec. 403. Tank vehicle chassis, assembly and appurtenances.
- Sec. 404. Operation of tank vehicles.
- Sec. 405. Tank full trailer prohibited—exception.
- Sec. 406. Permit procedure—fees—identification.
- Sec. 407. Rules and regulations.
- Sec. 408. Suspension or revocation of a permit—procedure for.
- Sec. 409. Exceptions.
- Sec. 410. Enforcement.
- Sec. 411. Violations.

SEC. 400. **Definitions.** Whenever used in this Article, the following words and phrases are defined as herein specified and shall be deemed and construed to have the meaning ascribed to them in this Section. Words and phrases not defined are to be construed according to the general usage of the language.

(a) **Tank truck.** Any single self-propelled motor vehicle equipped with a cargo tank mounted thereon, and used for the transportation of flammable liquid.

(b) **Tank full trailer.** Any vehicle, without motive power, equipped with a cargo tank mounted thereon, and used for the transportation of flammable liquid, and so constructed that when drawn by a self-propelled motor vehicle no part of its weight rests upon the towing vehicle.

(c) **Tank semi-trailer.** Any vehicle, without motive power, equipped with a cargo tank mounted thereon, and used for the transportation of flammable liquid, and so constructed that when drawn by a self-propelled motor vehicle by means of a fifth-wheel connection some part of its load and weight rests upon the towing vehicle.

(d) **Tank vehicle.** Any tank truck, tank full trailer or tank semi-trailer, as defined in subsections (a), (b) and (c) of this Section.

(e) **Tractor truck.** Any single self-propelled motor vehicle used for the purpose of drawing a tank full trailer, or tank semi-trailer, or any combination of such trailers, as defined in subsections (b) and (c) of this Section.

(f) **Cargo tank.** Any container having a liquid capacity in excess of one hundred (100) gallons, used for the carrying of flammable liquid, and mounted permanently or otherwise upon a tank vehicle. The term "cargo tank" does not apply to any container used solely for the purpose of supplying fuel for the propulsion of the tank vehicle upon which it is mounted.

(g) **Flammable liquid.** Any liquids having a flash point below one hundred and eighty-seven (187°) degrees Fahrenheit (Tag closed cup, ASTM D56 API 509) which, for the purpose of this Article, shall be divided into two (2) classes, to wit:

(1) Class A, embracing those flammable liquids having a flash point of one hundred (100°) degrees Fahrenheit or less.

(2) Class B, embracing those flammable liquids having a flash point above one hundred (100°) degrees Fahrenheit to and including one hundred and eighty-seven (187°) degrees Fahrenheit.

(h) **Person.** Any individual, co-partnership, society, association, joint stock company, corporation and any combination of individuals.

(i) **Chief.** The Chief of the Division of Fire Prevention and Investigation of the Fire Department of the City and County of San Francisco.

(j) **Approved.** In conformity with the requirements of the Chief of the Division of Fire Prevention and Investigation of the Fire Department of the City and County of San Francisco.

(k) **City and County.** The City and County of San Francisco.

**SEC. 401. Permit and Certificate of Approval Required.** It shall be unlawful for any person engaged in the business of manufacturing, refining, distilling, storing or transporting any flammable liquid to maintain, operate, drive or use any tank vehicle for the purpose of transporting flammable liquid on the public streets of the City and County without first obtaining from the Chief a permit and certificate of approval for such vehicle, except as otherwise specifically provided for in this Article.

**SEC. 402. Construction.** All cargo tanks shall be so constructed as to meet the following requirements:

(a) **Material.** Except as hereinafter provided, all steel sheets for cargo tanks shall be of open hearth or blue annealed steel meeting the following requirements:

Yield Point .....	25,000 lbs. per sq. in.
Ultimate strength .....	45,000 lbs. per sq. in.
Elongation—2 in. sample.....	20%

(b) **Thickness of Sheets.** Except as hereinafter provided the minimum thickness of cargo tank sheets shall be as follows:

<i>Aggregate Cargo Tank Capacity Gallons</i>	<i>Minimum Thickness of Material Shell</i>	<i>Thickness of Material Head</i>
600 or less.....	14 gauge, U.S. Standard	14 gauge, U.S. Standard, if suitably bilged, stiffened, or corrugated; otherwise 12 gauge.
Over 600 to and including		
1,200 .....	12 gauge, U.S. Standard	12 gauge, U.S. Standard, if suitably bilged, stiffened, or corrugated; otherwise 10 gauge.
Over 1,200—Divided into compartments of 600 gal. each or less, or with 600 gal. included between baffles.....	12 gauge, U.S. Standard	12 gauge, U.S. Standard, if suitably bilged, otherwise, 10 gauge.
Over 1,200—Not so divided...	10 gauge, U.S. Standard	10 gauge, U.S. Standard, if suitably bilged, stiffened, or corrugated; otherwise 8 gauge.

(c) **Exception.** Material other than as specified in subsections (a) and (b) of this Section may be used in thicknesses which will give strength equivalent to that of open hearth or blue annealed steel.

(d) **Joints—Method of Joining.** Joints shall be made in accordance

with recognized good practice, and the efficiency of any joint shall not be less than eighty-five (85%) percent.

(e) **Bulkheads.** Tanks with compartments carrying fluids of different classes shall be provided with an air space between the compartments, and this air space shall be equipped and maintained with drainage facilities.

(f) **Baffles.** Every cargo tank, and every compartment of a cargo tank, over ninety (90) inches in length shall be provided with baffles, the number of which shall be such that the linear distance between any two (2) adjacent baffles, or between any tank head or bulkhead and the baffles nearest it, shall in no case exceed sixty (60) inches. Each baffle shall have a minimum area as great as eighty (80%) percent of the cross sectional area of the cargo tank.

(g) **Liquid Expansion.** Each cargo tank or cargo tank compartment shall be equipped with a dome equal in size to three-fourths ( $\frac{3}{4}$ ) of one (1%) percent of the capacity of the cargo tank or cargo tank compartment to which it is connected, or an outage marker set at three-fourths ( $\frac{3}{4}$ ) of one (1%) percent. The dome shall not be filled with liquid and the cargo tank or cargo tank compartment shall not be filled beyond the outage marker.

(h) **Vents.** Each cargo tank or cargo tank compartment shall be provided with an approved vacuum and pressure operating vent with a diameter of at least three-fourths ( $\frac{3}{4}$ ) of an inch, and, in addition thereto, a vent opening with an area of at least two (2) square inches shall be provided, which normally shall be kept closed by an approved device that will open and relieve such internal pressure as may be created by exposure to fires or heat.

(i) **Draw-off Valves.** Withdrawal of flammable liquid from a cargo tank shall be by gravity or other approved method through approved draw-off valves having discharge end threaded or otherwise so designed as to permit of tight connection with hose, and installed in an approved location on the cargo tank.

(j) **Internal Valves.** Each cargo tank or cargo tank compartment shall be equipped with an approved internal valve located inside the shell of the tank or compartment in the outlet at the bottom of the tank or compartment, and, except during delivery operations, such valve shall automatically be kept closed. Internal valves shall be operated by an approved method, and the controlling device shall be installed close to the draw-off valve. The operating mechanism shall be so designed and constructed as to insure automatic closing of the internal valve in the event of fire.

(k) **Emergency Control—Internal Valves.** The operating mechanism for such internal valves shall be provided with an approved emergency control remote from the draw-off valves for use in the event of accidents or fire during delivery operations.

(l) **Internal Valve Protection.** Any pipe work leading from the internal valves shall be so designed as to insure its failure, in the event of an accident, without injury to the internal valve.

(m) **Capacity.** The aggregate capacity of the cargo tank or cargo tanks on any single tank vehicle shall not exceed six thousand five hundred (6,500) gallons, and if the capacity of any single cargo tank transporting Class A flammable liquid shall exceed six hundred (600) gallons, the cargo tank shall be subdivided into two (2) or more compartments, no one of which shall exceed six hundred (600) gallons. A tolerance of ten (10%) percent is permitted for individual compartments or cargo tanks, but in no case shall the aggregate capacity of the combined compartments or cargo tanks, including tolerance, exceed six thousand five hundred (6,500) gallons.

(n) **Test.** Each cargo tank and each compartment thereof shall be



tested and proven tight at five (5) pounds per square inch minimum pressure.

**SEC. 403. Tank Vehicle Chassis, Assembly, and Appurtenances.** Any tank vehicle chassis, assembly and appurtenances thereof shall meet the following requirements:

(a) **Wheels.** No tank truck or tank full traller shall be equipped with less than four (4) wheels.

(b) **Tires.** All tank vehicles shall be equipped with rubber tires on all wheels.

(c) **Assembly.** The cargo tank shall be adequately supported upon and securely attached to or be a part of the tank vehicle upon which it is carried.

(d) **Bonding and Grounding:**

(1) Cargo tanks, chassis, axles, and springs shall be metallically interconnected.

(2) Adequate provision shall be made prior to each filling or delivery operation for the grounding of any static charges that may be present.

(3) Drag chains or other flexible electrical conductors providing a pathway for the dissipation of static charges from the tank vehicle to the ground may be used but shall not be construed as meeting the requirements of subdivision (2) of subsection (d) of this Section.

(e) **Protection Against Collision.** Draw-off valves or faucets projecting beyond the frame at the rear of the tank vehicle shall be adequately protected against collision by steel bumpers or similar means.

(f) **Lighting.** Tank vehicles and tractor trucks shall not be equipped with any artificial light other than electricity. Lighting circuits shall have suitable over-current protection (fuses or automatic circuit breakers). The wiring shall have sufficient carrying capacity and mechanical strength, and shall be secured, insulated, and protected against physical damage, in keeping with recognized good practice.

(g) **Fuel Tank.** The fuel tank shall not be placed over or adjacent to the engine. It shall be constructed and mounted in such a manner as to present no unusual hazards.

(h) **Exhaust System.** The exhaust system, including muffler and exhaust line, shall have ample clearance from the fuel system and combustible materials, and shall not be exposed to accumulations of grease, oil, or gasoline. The exhaust line shall terminate in an approved location remote from the draw-off valves.

(i) **Fire Extinguishers.** Each tank vehicle and tractor truck shall be equipped and maintained with at least one (1) approved hand fire extinguisher of a type suitable for extinguishing flammable liquid fires. Fire extinguishers shall be kept in good operating condition at all times, and they shall be located in an accessible place on each tank vehicle and tractor truck.

**SEC. 404. Operation of Tank Vehicles.** The operation of tank vehicles shall be conducted in conformity with the following requirements:

(a) **Loading Operations.** Tank vehicles shall be filled from approved storage tanks and equipment only. During filling operations the fill pipe shall be electrically connected to the tank vehicle by a bond wire attached to a metallic part of the cargo tank. This bond shall be made before removing covers of fill openings. When a funnel is used it shall be so designed as to insure metallic contact between the fill pipe and the cargo tank.

(b) **Unloading Operations.** Delivery of flammable liquid from tank vehicles shall be to underground containers only, unless written authority to the contrary has been first obtained from the Chief, and shall be by an approved hose connected to a draw-off valve. Provisions shall be made for a continuous electrical conductor between the tank vehicle and the fill opening of underground tanks and containers. Where delivery by hose is not practical, an approved delivery bucket may be used, provided it is substantially made, constructed entirely of metal, with a mouth not larger than six (6) inches in diameter and with a capacity not exceeding five (5) gallons. A metallic connection shall be maintained between the bucket and draw-off valve when flammable liquid is withdrawn from tank vehicles in this manner. It is prohibited to deliver flammable liquid from tank vehicles to fuel tanks of motor vehicles or containers other than herein specified.

(c) **Shut Down of Motors.** Motors of tank trucks or tractor-trucks shall be shut down during making and breaking hose connections. If loading or unloading is done without the use of a power pump, the tank truck or tractor truck motor shall be shut down throughout such operation.

(d) **Where Deliveries May Be Made.** Tank vehicles are prohibited inside any building during delivery operations, and all containers shall be filled outside of buildings.

(e) **To Whom Deliveries May Be Made.** No person shall deliver to another person any flammable liquid in violation of the provisions of this Article, and no delivery of flammable liquid shall be made unless the person receiving such flammable liquid has a valid permit, or a valid permit and license, as may be required under the provisions of the San Francisco Municipal Code for the storing, handling, sale, or using of flammable liquid.

(f) **Storage and Repairs.** Tank vehicles shall not be permitted inside any building except while undergoing repairs or unless the building is used exclusively for the storage of tank vehicles. Where flame, fire, or other intense heat is required in repairing any part of a tank vehicle, cargo tanks shall first be made free of all flammable or explosive vapor and liquid.

(g) **Chock Blocks.** Each tank vehicle shall carry at least one (1) approved chock block, which shall be placed against one of the rear wheels while the tank vehicle is parked on a grade.

**SEC. 405. Tank Full Trailer Prohibited—Exception.** The distribution of flammable liquid within the City and County by means of a tank full trailer is prohibited; provided, however, the use of a tank full trailer or other tank vehicle to transport flammable liquid from outside points to flammable liquid bulk plants within the City and County or from such flammable liquid bulk plants to outside points shall be permitted. The Chief shall designate the route to be traveled by such tank vehicle within the City and County and shall prohibit within the City and County any such tank vehicle which, in his judgment, constitutes a danger to public life or property. Cargo tanks on such tank vehicles transporting, as permitted in this Section, Class "A" flammable liquid shall be exempt from the provisions of this Article which provide that each cargo tank in excess of six hundred (600) gallons capacity shall be subdivided into two (2) or more compartments, no one of which shall exceed six hundred (600) gallons.

**SEC. 406. Permit Procedure—Fees—Identification.** (a) **Application.** Application for the permit and certificate of approval required by Section 401 of this Article shall be made to the Chief on forms supplied by the Division of Fire Prevention and Investigation, and shall contain such data as the Chief shall deem necessary.

(b) **Fees.** Upon filing an application for an original permit and certificate of approval, the applicant shall pay to the Chief, in advance,

a fee of Three (\$3.00) Dollars for each tank vehicle for which such application was made.

(c) **Investigation.** Upon receipt of said application the Chief shall cause to be inspected each tank vehicle for which said application for a permit and certificate of approval was made, to determine whether the provisions of this Article are complied with. The Chief shall, after the required investigation, approve said application if such tank vehicle meets the requirements of this Article.

(d) **Disapproval of Application—Conditions Corrected—Approval.** In the event that such application is disapproved by the Chief, the Chief shall notify in writing the applicant of such fact and the reason therefor. Upon receiving said notice, the applicant shall have the opportunity of correcting such conditions as have been disapproved. This correction shall be made within ten (10) days after delivery of said notice and, if such conditions have been corrected to comply with the provisions of this Article, the application shall be approved.

(e) **Issuance of Permit—Expiration Date.** Upon approval of said application, the Chief shall issue the permit applied for to said applicant, which permit shall be serially numbered and shall expire on the last day of the calendar year in which issued.

(f) **Issuance of Certificate of Approval—Expiration Date.** The Chief shall, upon the issuance of said permit, issue to the permittee, for each tank vehicle authorized by said permit, a serially numbered certificate of approval of such shape, design, wording and material as may be agreed upon by the Chief and the Controller. Said certificate of approval shall expire on the last day of the calendar year in which issued. The Chief shall cause said certificate of approval to be placed in a conspicuous and uniform place on each tank vehicle for which said certificate was issued. Upon expiration or revocation of the permit said certificate of approval shall be removed from such tank vehicle and destroyed.

(g) **Removal or Transferring of Certificate of Approval Prohibited.** Nothing in this Article shall permit the removing or transferring of said certificate of approval to any other tank vehicle other than that for which said certificate of approval was originally issued.

(h) **No Prorating or Refunding of Fees.** Fees paid under the provisions of this Article shall not be prorated or refunded.

(i) **Identification Number.** Every tank vehicle for which a permit and certificate of approval was issued shall be given an identification number by the Chief, and said identification number shall be painted in an approved manner in places on said tank vehicle designated by the Chief.

(j) **Marking.** Every tank vehicle shall have prominently displayed on each side and rear thereof a trademark, trade name, other designating mark or legend substantially descriptive of the flammable liquid carried therein and generally known and recognized by the public as being applied thereto.

(k) **Application for Renewal of a Permit.** When the permittee desires to continue to operate a tank vehicle as provided for in this Article for the ensuing year, he shall make application for the renewal of his permit so to do to the Chief in the same manner and pay a fee of One (\$1.00) Dollar. The procedure set forth in this Section for an original application for a permit shall be followed. If application for a renewal of said permit is not made within thirty (30) days after the expiration of the last permit, it shall be unlawful to operate said vehicle for which a permit was previously obtained under the provisions of this Article until a new permit has been issued as herein in this Section provided.

**SEC. 407. Rules and Regulations.** The Chief shall make such rules and regulations for the use, operation, maintenance and con-

struction of tank vehicles and the handling of flammable liquid in connection therewith as shall serve to carry into effect the expressed intent and purposes of this Article. Such rules and regulations shall become effective at twelve o'clock noon on the second day following the publication thereof in the official newspaper of the City and County and after a copy of said rules or regulations has been filed in the office of the Division of Fire Prevention and Investigation of the San Francisco Fire Department.

**SEC. 408. Suspension or Revocation of a Permit—Procedure for.** When the Chief shall determine that the permittee, or any of the permittee's principals, agents or employees, in the use, operation or maintenance of any vehicle provided for in this Article, is violating or attempting to violate any provision of this Article or any rule or regulation made thereunder, the Chief, after written notice to the permittee, shall have the power to suspend, and, after due and proper hearing, shall have the power to revoke, any permit or certificate of approval issued under the provisions of this Article.

**SEC. 409. Exceptions.** Tank vehicles transporting flammable liquid from outside points to flammable liquid bulk plants within the City and County or from such flammable liquid bulk plants to outside points, and not used for distribution purposes within the City and County limits, shall be exempt from the provisions of this Article insofar as such provisions relate to City and County certificates of approval and permits, and the payment of the fees therefor; provided, however, that this exemption shall apply solely to such tank vehicles which are constructed, maintained and operated in accordance with the codes, rules and regulations of the Interstate Commerce Commission, the National Fire Protection Association, and the American Petroleum Institute governing the construction, maintenance and operation of said tank vehicles, as such codes, rules and regulations exist upon the effective date of this ordinance.

At any time that the aforementioned codes, rules or regulations are amended or changed to provide additional safety standards or precautions for the transportation of flammable liquid, and the Chief deems such amendments or changes necessary or essential for the protection of life or property in the City and County, the Chief shall adopt such amendments or changes in the manner provided in Section 407 of this Article.

**SEC. 410. Enforcement.** It shall be the duty of the Chief to enforce the provisions of this Article, and to that end he is authorized and empowered to inspect or test any tank vehicle, vehicle, apparatus or equipment used for the transportation of flammable liquid at any time or place.

**SEC. 411. Violations.** Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of this Article shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.

**Section 2. Permits Now in Force—Expiration Date.** Any permit, certificate of approval, or serial number issued or granted under the provisions of Article 12, Chapter IV (Fire Code), Part II, of the San Francisco Municipal Code, prior to the effective date of this ordinance, and which permit, certificate of approval, or serial number has not been suspended or revoked prior to said effective date, shall become null and void on said effective date. Application for any new permit and certificate of approval for all tank vehicles to take the place of any permit which has expired pursuant to the provisions of this section shall be made as provided in this ordinance, unless said permit and certificate of approval was exempted under the provisions hereinabove set forth.

**Section 3. Saving Clause.** If any section, subsection, subdivision, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase of this ordinance is for any reason held to be unconstitutional, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this ordinance. The Board of

Supervisors hereby declare that it would have passed this ordinance, and each section, subsection, subdivision, paragraph, sentence, clause and phrase thereof, irrespective of the fact that any one or more other sections, subsections, subdivision, paragraphs, sentences, clauses or phrases be declared unconstitutional.

Approved as to form by the City Attorney.

#### Discussion.

Supervisor Uhl objected to the foregoing bill, stating it had not been heard in the Police Committee.

Supervisor MacPhee reported that the bill had been recommended by the Finance Committee. The Finance Committee had given no consideration to the gallonage set up in the bill. The bill had been considered by the Police Committee and referred to the Finance Committee for the purpose of fixing fees.

Supervisor Green reported that the proposed legislation was the result of compromise between the Fire Department and interested parties representing the trucking concerns. The Police Committee had agreed on 6500 gallons.

Mr. Joseph Gilmore, representing the Truck Owners' Association of California, urged passage of the foregoing bill. The matter was taken up in Police Committee, and on recommendation of Supervisor Green the 6500 gallons provided for was approved.

Mr. Frank Kelley objected to the recommended capacity of 6500 gallons for any single tank truck; that was far in excess of what he believed safe for general delivery. The present permitted capacity of 3000 gallons will not work any hardship on the companies.

Mr. P. A. Anderson, representing the Municipal License Tax Association, also announced that the gallonage of 6500 was definitely agreed on in Police Committee. The matter was then referred to the Finance Committee for consideration of the question of fees.

Mr. Gilmore, in further explanation of the views of his organization, declared that if the proposed 6500 gallonage were not approved, he feared that San Francisco's gasoline supply would soon be exhausted. The Office of Defense Transportation now prohibits the use of tank cars over hauls of less than 200 miles. The smallest units coming into San Francisco have a capacity of 4674 gallons. If such trucks are prohibited from coming to San Francisco, the delivery of gasoline will have to stop. The trucks cannot be operated on pay load less than that.

Thereupon, the roll was called and the foregoing bill was *Passed for Second Reading* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Gallagher, Gartland, Green, MacPhee, Mancuso, Mead, Meyer, Sullivan, Uhl—9.

Noes: Supervisors Brown, Colman—2.

#### Consideration Postponed.

The following recommendation of County, State and National Affairs Committee was taken up:

Present: Supervisors Green, Mancuso, Meyer, Sullivan.

#### Recommending the Adoption of Senate Constitutional Amendment No. 2.

(Series of 1939)

Proposal No. 3886, Resolution No. . . . ., as follows:

Whereas, the Senate of the State of California, the Assembly concurring, has presented to the electors of the State of California, an

amendment to Section 1 of Article XIII of the Constitution of California, which removes the prohibition against the taxation of property owned by the United States; and

Whereas, the United States during the past three years has acquired large holdings of real property including buildings and improvements thereon throughout the State of California and especially in the City and County of San Francisco; and

Whereas, the exemption of this property from taxation is an additional and unfair burden upon the other owners of real property in the City and County of San Francisco; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, by the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco, that it heartily endorses said Constitutional Amendment No. 2 to be voted upon by the people of the State of California on May 16, 1944, and urges all the electors of the City and County of San Francisco to vote in favor of said amendment, to the end that property owned by the United States in the City and County of San Francisco and throughout the State of California may bear a fair proportion of the taxes assessed against other property in the City and County and throughout the State of California; be it

Further Resolved, That the President of the Board of Supervisors be and he is hereby authorized to appoint a committee in such numbers as he shall deem proper for the purpose of giving publicity to said Constitutional Amendment No. 2 and obtaining the support of the electors of the City and County of San Francisco for a favorable vote on said amendment.

#### Discussion.

Supervisor Brown opposed the foregoing proposal, stating that he could not see what difference it would make whether the taxpayers of San Francisco pay the added burden or pass it to the Federal Government and in turn get the money back from the Federal Government. The total tax bill would be the same.

Thereupon, Supervisor Uhl moved that further consideration be postponed one week and that Mr. Thomas Maloney be invited to be present at the Board meeting on March 13, 1944, and explain the situation.

*No objection, and so ordered.*

#### Adopted.

The following recommendation of Judiciary Committee was taken up:

Present: Supervisors Mancuso, MacPhee.

**Favoring Compliance With Provision Under the State Education Code to Permit Children to Be Absent From School to Participate in or to Receive Moral and Religious Instruction.**

(Series of 1939)

Proposal No. 3865, Resolution No. . . . ., as follows:

Whereas, Section 8286 of the Education Code of the State of California provides that the governing board of a school district (in San Francisco, the Board of Education) may, in its discretion, adopt a resolution pursuant to which, with the written consent of parents or guardians, their children or wards may absent themselves from school, under regulations adopted by the governing board, for participation in religious exercises or to receive moral and religious instruction at their respective places of worship or at other suitable places designated by their respective religious groups, churches or denominations; and

Whereas, any effective endeavor for the suppression and ultimate

elimination of delinquency, juvenile and adult, must be postulated upon the existence of a Supreme Being and the necessity in an orderly society for compliance with His commands: and

Whereas, to attain the highest in social order, such precepts, obviously, must be promulgated to our youth as soon as they attain the usual age necessary to understand them and to effect their practice; and

Whereas, even from a purely mundane point of view it is expedient that every possible effort be made to inculcate religious and moral teachings in this and succeeding generations, thus to promote the public peace, to protect life, liberty and property, to conserve the effort and mitigate the colossal monetary expense to public and private agencies as well as individuals, for corrective and unavailing punitive measures, and to relieve the mental anguish and physical suffering occasioned by transgressors; and

Whereas, many nationally known lay figures, eminently qualified to pass upon the merits of such a proposal, have declared unequivocally the imperative necessity for religious and moral teaching as an integral part of requisite education; and

Whereas, no valid objection has been advanced against the inauguration of such a plan in the public schools of San Francisco nor have any difficulties or objections been encountered where the plan is now operative in 500 cities in thirty-eight states, including approximately fifty Northern California communities; and

Whereas, it is the considered opinion of this Board of Supervisors, supported by experience, that objective restraint alone is wholly inadequate and unsatisfactory as an approach to the problem of delinquency; that rather there must inhere within the individual the desire and the will so to comport himself as to denote him an asset to society, and that uncultivated human nature being selfish, the individual can only be constrained to adopt such a philosophy and attitude as a result of acquaintance and compliance with the directives of that authority which, in omniscience, has established the rules for order; and

Whereas, authorities declare that no person is educated whose erudition embraces no study or knowledge of culture, chief among the components of which stands religious philosophy and history; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That cognizant of the fact that the Board of Education has the proposal for religious and moral teaching (in accordance with Section 8286 of the Education Code) under advisement, pending expressions of opinion thereon, this Board of Supervisors convinced of its practicability and desirability hereby records itself as favoring the invocation of such proposal for the best interests of the people of the City and County of San Francisco; and be it

Further Resolved, That a copy of this resolution be transmitted to the Board of Education.

#### Discussion.

Supervisor Gallagher, when the foregoing proposal was called up for consideration, relinquished the Chair in order to explain the matter and make an argument therefor from the floor. Supervisor Mead presided temporarily, at the request of the President.

Supervisor Gallagher reported that Section 8286 of the Education Code of the State of California, which provides that the governing board of a school district may, in its discretion, adopt a resolution pursuant to which, with the written consent of parents or guardians, their children or wards may absent themselves from school, under regulations adopted by the governing board, for participation in religious exercises or to receive moral and religious instruction at their respective places of worship or at other suitable places designated by

their respective religious groups, churches or denominations, was passed by both houses of the State Legislature on May 12, 1943. Those provisions have already been put into effect in many communities surrounding San Francisco, and if it is good for those communities it is equally good for San Francisco.

Supervisor Colman opposed the proposal, stating that his opposition was not based on any consideration of its merits. He had not investigated the merits of the proposal, nor would he do so. His opinion was that the matter was not one proper for the determination by the Board of Supervisors. It was solely a matter in the province of the Board of Education, and it was up to the Board of Education to make a decision as they saw fit. The Board of Supervisors had no jurisdiction and no authority to enforce any resolution that might be passed. Accordingly, he would vote "No."

Supervisor Brown also expressed agreement with Supervisor Colman. He did not believe the Board of Supervisors should presume upon the Board of Education's prerogatives. The Board of Supervisors has no jurisdiction over the Board of Education. The City Attorney has on occasion told the Supervisors that during budget consideration. The public generally does not know the situation, and might feel, if the passage of the proposed resolution is passed, that the Board of Supervisors does have some weight.

Supervisor Uhl did not want to be put in the position of being considered as opposed to affording children the opportunity of receiving religious or moral instruction. A vote "No" might be so construed.

Mrs. Frank Silva, a taxpayer and former school teacher, pointed out the intimate connection between moral and religious training and juvenile delinquency. Children cannot receive such instruction in the public schools under the present system. They should be allowed to receive such instruction under the proper auspices. She was in favor of the proposed resolution.

Miss Clufts, a former principal of the Garfield School, opposed the resolution, stating that if some of the children were permitted to be excused from classes to receive religious and moral instruction it would shorten the program by one hour per week.

Mrs. Jennings, a former teacher, recommended the adoption of the resolution. It would enable the children to receive moral training, and would tend to reduce juvenile delinquency. Children need moral training more than anything else, moral and religious training.

Supervisor Brown, in explanation of his vote, stated that he desired the record to show that his vote against the measure was made purely on the ground that the Board of Supervisors should not advise the Board of Education in this, or any other matters, so long as it has no financial control over their activities. It has nothing to do with religious persuasion or faith.

Supervisor Gallagher, in final statement before the roll was called, reported that J. Edgar Hoover has declared that one of the principal causes of juvenile delinquency is due to lack of moral and religious training.

Thereupon, the roll was called and the foregoing resolution was *Adopted* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Gallagher, Gartland, Green, MacPhee, Mancuso, Mead, Meyer, Sullivan, Uhl—9.

Noes: Supervisors Brown, Colman—2.



## Consideration Postponed.

## REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON JUVENILE DELINQUENCY.

NOTE: *Italics* indicate changes recommended by Judiciary Committee.

Cognizant and apprehensive of the increase in San Francisco's juvenile delinquency and its inevitable effect upon our social and cultural standards, and responsive to the importunities for corrective legislation advanced by various civic and youth organizations, as well as immediately-concerned departments of municipal government, Supervisor Chester R. MacPhee, on November 22, 1943, presented to the Board of Supervisors, Resolution No. 3714 (Series of 1939). This resolution, adopted on the date of its introduction, recorded the Board of Supervisors as taking official notice of the gravity of juvenile delinquency and authorized the President of the Board to consider and report on the matter of juvenile delinquency with a view to adopting legislation looking toward the correction of the situation.

Pursuant to the foregoing authorization, the President of the Board of Supervisors appointed Supervisor MacPhee, Chairman of a committee to be immediately organized, and delegated to the committee authority to conduct hearings and studies in connection with juvenile delinquency and to report to the Board its findings and recommendations for remedial legislation.

General.

Besides the accumulation of exhaustive data on the subject of juvenile delinquency, the committee conducted four hearings attended by the general membership, in addition to numerous hearings by, and discussions among, lesser numbers of the committee, possessed, through education or peculiar experience, with a superior and authoritative knowledge of the problem.

Concentration and expansion of vital home-front activities in San Francisco and the Bay Area has, of course, resulted in an in-migration of thousands of workers, accompanied by their families, to supply the added labor operations necessary to extended and accelerated industry.

Seeking employment, or for whatever purpose, thousands of boys and girls under the age of eighteen years, unaccompanied by parents and not subject, unofficially, to an imposed guiding influence, have migrated to this area since the entry of the United States into the war.

Because the mothers of many children, both resident and transient, are now employed in war industries and the fathers of the same or other children are in many cases required to work on night shifts, parental control, in numerous instances, has been rendered almost wholly ineffective.

The present inadequate housing situation in San Francisco is by no means conducive, in many instances, to the maintenance of such happy and well regulated homes as would impel children to appreciate them and to prefer them to outside places and to activities where temptations abound and where through improper associations and other circumstances, the tendency to delinquency is made attractive and very easy.

Finally, the unnatural pace, the glamour of the uniform, false notions as to what constitutes patriotism, the supply of money to some juveniles unaccustomed to its possession, value and proper use, and the lack of it by others, the too prevalent attitude of fatalism and abandon—all of the abnormal conditions attendant upon war, aggravate and complicate the problem of juvenile delinquency, for which, in normal times, no adequate solution had been effectively applied, if recognized to exist.

If it be considered necessary to demonstrate the urgency for immediate and decisive legislative action for more effective control of juvenile delinquency, that imperative requirement is conclusively found in a glance at the figures recording the alarming increase in the known number of cases of children, under the age of 18 years, afflicted with venereal disease during the past year as well as the number of general delinquency cases. The record shows:

**Children Under Eighteen, Afflicted With Venereal Disease.**

There are those who, upon superficial, if any, consideration of this dread actuality, accept it as a matter of course and attribute it solely

to our wartime increase in population, but an analysis of the figures shows that the ratio of increase in population, due to the war, to the increased number of cases of venereal diseases among children under the age of eighteen years, is as of 1 to 10, that is, although our population, according to reliable estimates, has increased only 15 per cent, the rate of venereal disease among children, under the age of eighteen years, has increased 150 per cent, and although our population has increased by only 15 per cent, juvenile delinquency, as shown by the foregoing figures, did, in the year 1943, practically double.

It is recognized, of course, that governmental action alone is no panacea for juvenile delinquency, but it has its place in the general plan to abolish or minimize the evil, and government would be remiss in its function, were its agents to fail to explore every avenue and invoke every proper regulation for its suppression. Prudent legislation, judiciously enforced and construed will constitute a very effective deterrent and will provide some of the means for control of juvenile delinquency necessary to the effective functioning of the agencies charged with prevention and correction.

Many suggestions have been advanced by concerned agencies proposing legislative or procedural changes and supplemental aids which are imperative to a fair degree of efficiency in their operations.

The committee has endeavored to analyze these suggestions and to submit to the Board for its consideration and action certain definite proposals, which if executed, it is confidently felt, will materially assist the responsible agencies in their endeavors to retard and minimize juvenile delinquency.

The juvenile problem which now confronts us renders it exigent that immediate and decisive steps be taken to cope with that situation but such action, being emergency in character, cannot provide comprehensive control or full minimization of delinquency during the post-war period or upon our return to normalcy or transition to a new era.

Perfection in human conduct is a slow process and so, although those details which are dependent upon future conditions must be left for subsequent deliberation and determination, certain broad and indispensable principles can presently be decided and promulgated and a properly integrated organizational structure conceived and established.

Accordingly this report on juvenile delinquency is divided into three sections.

## **MEASURES IMMEDIATELY NECESSARY—CORRECTION**

### **Improvement of Juvenile Administrative Service.**

Your committee recommends that immediate action be taken looking to the establishment of higher standards for the personnel charged with supervision over, and work in, juvenile delinquency matters and for the provision for such increased salaries as will be commensurate with the responsibility involved and the comprehensive knowledge required, efficiently and wisely to decide the problems and to administer or perform the duties incident thereto. This action will result in the development of such an organization for control and prevention of juvenile delinquency as is acutely necessary and to which additional capable personnel will be attracted, thus providing more effective and expeditious results in corrective and preventive endeavors.

In connection with the foregoing your committee took the following action:

Recommended that in the consideration of the Salary Standardization Schedules soon to be presented to the Board of Supervisors, careful thought be directed to a proposal for such increased salaries to workers in juvenile delinquency as will more nearly reflect the value of the work performed or necessary in this vital field.

### In-Service Training for Juvenile Authorities.

Through cooperation of the local juvenile authorities, the Civil Service Commission, and the directors or faculties of nearby universities, arrangements should now be undertaken to provide an in-service training program for the municipal personnel engaged in juvenile delinquency work.

The resolution recommended by your committee on this subject follows:

Whereas, the juvenile delinquency problem in San Francisco has been aggravated and rendered increasingly difficult of control and solution since the war and has accentuated the need for an additional number of employees qualified to cope with the situation; and

Whereas, it is apparent that there must be immediately instituted and constantly persisted in, a movement to provide more effective administration of juvenile welfare and probation work; and

Whereas, the conduct of an intelligently designed in-service training program will equip the personnel presently engaged in juvenile delinquency work to more efficiently and expeditiously execute their functions and will incite them to even greater efforts for control and repression of juvenile delinquency; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That this Board of Supervisors does hereby request the Chief Probation Officer of the Juvenile Court to submit to this Board, within the next thirty days, a report on the feasibility of an in-service training program for personnel of the Juvenile Court.

### Necessity for Additional Parole Officers.

Investigation has disclosed that in Northern California there is but one parole officer for girl delinquents and an inadequate number of parole officers for boy delinquents.

Your committee therefore recommends adoption of the following resolution:

Whereas, investigation has disclosed the fact that there is only one parole officer in Northern California charged with supervision of girl delinquents and an insufficient number of parole officers charged with supervision of boy delinquents; and

Whereas, adequate and constructive counsel imparted to delinquents by qualified authorities will tend in great measure to prevent recurrences of improper or unlawful acts by juveniles with a delinquent record and will result in better supervision, for the welfare of those released from juvenile homes; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That this Board of Supervisors does hereby memorialize His Excellency Governor Warren and does urge that serious and early consideration be given a proposal to increase the personnel charged with the supervision of paroled juvenile delinquents, particularly in Northern California.

### MEASURES IMMEDIATELY NECESSARY—PREVENTION.

#### Utilization of Public Schools and Facilities.

Consideration was given by your committee to the question of fullest utilization of public schools in the program for prevention of juvenile delinquency, and it was agreed by your committee that, in connection with public schools and the public education system, the following recommendations be made:

(a) That public schools shall also serve as community centers and remain open until a reasonable hour each evening throughout the year.

(b) That students be supervised and assisted in the selection of such reading matter as will inculcate in them a proper concept of parenthood and its obligations and that consideration be given to

the inclusion, in the public schools curricula, of a course on parental responsibility. In this connection, your committee recommended adoption by the Board of Supervisors of that resolution next appearing in this report.

(c) That classes in parent education be provided in the schools of each district throughout the city, voluntary enrollment in which should be encouraged through Board of Education-Parent-Teacher publicity. Such courses should include *current* discussions on behavior problems, child guidance and sex education for children.

(d) That a committee ascertain the extent of present instruction in sex education prescribed for students in the public schools and make such recommendations with respect thereto as are deemed advisable.

(e) That the Student Court within the junior and high schools be continued and extended.

(f) That the principals of the schools certify to the juvenile court, the parents of neglected children for parent education classes.

Following is the resolution referred to in subdivision (b) preceding:

Whereas, the integrity of our homes and of our very social structure are presently challenged by the untoward increase in juvenile delinquency; and

Whereas, one cause for this unhappy situation is represented to exist in the fact that boys and girls do not have proper or adequate concepts of their responsibilities, as members of contemporary society, particularly with reference to:

1. The duties and responsibilities owed to parents.
2. The duties and responsibilities of parenthood.
3. The duties and responsibilities of citizenship; and

Whereas, the dissemination by proper and responsible authorities of that information which reflects the true American philosophy regarding such matters would be an effective deterrent to juvenile delinquency; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That this Board of Supervisors does hereby petition the Board of Education and requests that agency to appoint a committee to study and report on the feasibility and desirability of establishing required courses in the foregoing subjects, for those children capable of directing intelligent consideration to such matters.

#### Trial Plan—Use of Schools for Afternoon and Evening Activities of Juveniles.

It was the considered opinion of your committee that responsibility for failure to make all public school buildings and facilities available to our youth during the afternoon and evening, must rest with the Board of Education.

A meeting between the Board of Education and your committee was held on December 21, 1943, in the Chambers of the Board of Education at which time the foregoing recommendations were discussed, and a subsequent meeting arranged.

At the later meeting between Dr. Warren, Miss Randall, Mr. Nichols and Mr. MacPhee arrangements were concluded for the use of the James Denman School for the trial of a plan having for its purpose the designation of one school to be made available to youth groups for the purpose of demonstrating the practicability of the joint use of schools for educational as well as recreational and other approved juvenile activities. This program is now being executed, as a result of the direct action by your committee.

#### Control of Truancy.

It is the considered opinion of your committee that the Board of Education must establish more effective control in the matter of tru-

ancy, which, many authorities contend, is responsible, in a great number of cases, for the start of a child's delinquency. Truancy in San Francisco has doubled in the last year, despite the fact that work permits must be obtained for employed youths and that such permits are revoked upon notice of truancy on the part of the holder thereof. The fact that, even with this additional safeguard, truancy continues and increases, demonstrates that more effective measures for the prevention of truancy must be immediately adopted by the attendance bureau of the Board of Education. Of 175 known truant cases last year, only eighteen actually appeared before the judge.

Your committee has recommended to the Board of Education that where there is repeated truancy by any child, its parents shall be cited and required to appear before the Juvenile Court. Under existing law, after conviction pursuant to a proceeding instituted by the District Attorney, the parent responsible for a truant child may be required to attend Parent Education School or to post a bond in the amount of \$200 conditioned against further truancy by the child.

To assure registration, for school purposes, of all children resident in San Francisco; to provide periodical opportunities for city-wide apprehension of truants and to test the validity of excuses proffered on behalf of absentee children it is recommended that the Police Department in cooperation with the Board of Education arrange for the interrogation, upon certain unannounced dates, of every child found upon the streets during school hours upon those particular dates and that those children who have no, or insufficient, excuse, shall be taken to register, where necessary, or if registered, detained in school or juvenile detention until their excuse for absence has been corroborated by a parent or guardian; or in the event of inability to immediately contact the parent or guardian, released, subject to such further action as in the opinion of the juvenile authorities shall be deemed prudent and necessary. Such a procedure, if followed from time to time, will reduce truancy and will assure that all children of school age are registered for attendance.

#### Motion Pictures.

Through the courtesy and cooperation of the California Theatres, Incorporated, your committee had the opportunity to view several motion pictures on the subject of juvenile delinquency. Two of these pictures, both short subjects, were considered particularly instructive and appropriate for attention of school children.

Your committee therefore recommends that arrangements be made by the school authorities for the presentation of these pictures to the children of our schools. The California Theatres, Incorporated, will be happy to cooperate in every manner possible.

#### Counseling Agents for Potential Delinquents.

Your committee decided that one important phase of an effective program to prevent juvenile delinquency can and should be undertaken through the employment of *additional personnel for counseling endeavors* in the Juvenile Probation Department. Such personnel would do particularly useful prevention work among those juveniles who have demonstrated a tendency to delinquency. *Your committee therefore recommends that consideration be given to augmenting the staff of the Juvenile Probation Department by the appointment of three additional Probation Officers to serve as counsel to potential juvenile delinquents.*

#### Volunteer Assistance.

In connection with the program for prevention of juvenile delinquency your committee decided that a plan must evolve through which responsibility will rest and assistance be rendered by all the residents of San Francisco, individually or through organizations of which they are members.

Suggestions were made that the Big Brother Detail of the Police Department should develop, coordinate and generally direct the activities under such a plan. Another proposal would result in the establishment of a youths' club in each air raid battalion headquarters under the sponsorship and guidance of the air raid wardens. Both plans have merit and should be exploited.

Members of your committee were instrumental in arranging for the establishment of one such boys' club under the auspices of the Air Raid Wardens of Battalion 10 with headquarters at Twenty-sixth and Sanchez Streets.

The following letter is indicative of the reaction to the foregoing suggestion of the committee:

Civilian War Council.

Because your committee realizes that every possible means of co-operation must be invoked for control and prevention of juvenile delinquency, it is requested that the Civilian War Council give consideration to the inclusion of an appropriation in its budget of such funds as will be necessary in the utilization of additional or all Battalion Headquarters for the purposes referred to above, together with funds necessary to provide the facilities, if any, required in connection with their use for such purposes, and that an endeavor be made to procure subventions from the State War Council to augment and to reimburse the City for such expenditures.

A sub-committee, headed by Robert Simcock of the Council of Churches, has accomplished material progress in the organization of volunteers in juvenile delinquency work. It is hoped that this good work will continue and expand.

Utilization of Public Libraries.

A survey of our public libraries discloses the fact that the junior section in many of the branches is not now open during the evening hours for recreational and youth activities.

It is the considered opinion of your committee that these facilities should be open until a reasonable hour each evening and available to all approved youth agencies for supervised recreation. Through the

efforts of your committee, the Library Commission has allowed the use of the Bernal Branch Library for this purpose.

Your committee recommends the adoption of the following resolution:

Whereas, the need for additional facilities required for supervised recreation of juveniles has long been recognized by the agencies dealing with child welfare; and

Whereas, facilities for such purposes are available in several branches of the Public Library but are not presently utilized; and

Whereas, the use of such facilities will enable youth agencies to supplement their activities for the benefit of youth; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That this Board of Supervisors does hereby request the Library Commission to give consideration to a proposal for use of all such facilities as are available in branch libraries for the conduct, during evening hours, of supervised recreation activities for juveniles.

#### Coordinating Council.

Any measure of successful accomplishment in prevention and control of juvenile delinquency must, of course, be predicated upon the character and extent of the organization charged with the administration of the functions involved, and upon the facilities available for its operation.

Your committee has studied the legislation establishing the Coordinating Council and prescribing its powers and duties and has concluded that the legislation and the Council which it establishes are inadequate for the purposes sought to be accomplished through such agency.

Your committee has, therefore, recommended certain amendments to the ordinance establishing the Coordinating Council, which proposed amendments are hereby submitted with the request that they be immediately referred to the Judiciary Committee for report and for *possible* inclusion in a re-drafted ordinance.

The recommendations of your committee are:

1. That the Mayor, with the approval of the Board of Supervisors, shall appoint as members of the Coordinating Council, such public officials as are deemed necessary to its functions, including the District Attorney and one member of the Board of Supervisors.

2. That the membership of the Coordinating Council be composed of that number of private citizens interested in youth equal to the number of public officials appointed to the Council.

3. That the President of the Council shall be elected by the membership thereof from among the non-official members.

4. That the salary of the Secretary to the Coordinating Council shall not exceed \$9,000 per year.

5. That there shall be an annual appropriation not in excess of \$25,000 to cover the cost of the Council's operations.

6. That the Council shall make and file with the Mayor and the Board of Supervisors a monthly report of its activities and accomplishments.

#### Cooperation of District Attorney.

Your committee considered a proposal for more diligent and strenuous opposition to and prosecution of those holders of licenses to sell or dispense liquor, who in any manner contribute or permit contribution to the delinquency of minors.

The District Attorney, Edmund G. Brown, addressing himself to your committee, agreed that in subsequent hearings before the Board of



Equalization where charges are considered involving juveniles, he would appear in each case, representing the Police Department, and, where the facts warrant it, urge revocation of the license of such offender.

#### Use of Automobiles by Juveniles.

Approximately 45 per cent of the juveniles presently cited for appearance before the juvenile authorities are charged with offenses involving automobiles.

Your committee has recommended:

**That the Police Department conduct a thorough survey of minors driving or riding in pleasure vehicles at night, to determine that the possession of, or presence of minors in, such automobiles, in no way constitutes an infraction of any law.**

#### Taverns.

Your committee recommends initiation of endeavors to effect such changes in the state law as will dispense with the necessity for serving food in premises licensed for "on-sale" of liquor.

The prohibition against the use of the name "saloon" being not only a subterfuge, but in fact a decoy and inveiglement to those who ought not or would not in many cases enter or patronize the places bearing such designation, should be abrogated so that the true character of such places may be known to the public, and avoided by juveniles as well as those adults possessed of scruples adverse to such activities.

#### Transient Youth.

The problem presented by transient youth was given consideration. Your committee was apprised of a survey and studies now being conducted by authorized agencies upon the subject and upon which a report and recommendations will be submitted in the near future.

#### Travelers' Aid Society.

It was the consensus of opinion that the effective work being accomplished by the Travelers' Aid Society is worthy of highest commendation and that its continuance should be encouraged and made financially possible. To that end it was agreed that a copy of this report be transmitted to the Community Chest with the request that additional funds be made available to the Travelers' Aid Society for the continuance and increase of the valuable functions performed by that agency.

### POST-WAR PLANNING FOR YOUTH.

#### Children's Center.

Post-war planning has provoked considerable thought and discussion in recent months. Especially emphasized, have been the needs for industrial development and expansion, building and highway construction and improved transportation.

It is gratifying to observe the enthusiastic interest which has been manifested for the material development of San Francisco. Such foresight and civic concern are, of course, laudable and worthy of the highest commendation.

Contemporaneous with such program, however, there must be inaugurated such plans for the intellectual, physical and moral competency of those necessary to successful execution of that task as will render them capable to assume the responsibilities involved.

Furthermore, intelligent and comprehensive planning must embrace proposals for the rehabilitation and improvement of our social structure and this necessarily and fundamentally requires effective remedies

for infractions and ultimate provision for abrogation or fullest minimization of those acts of human conduct which constitute a nuisance, to our neighbors, a deterrent to the progress of human society and a heavy financial drain upon both private and public funds.

Authorities are agreed that knowledge of, and the desire to abide by, the rules necessary to a serene and progressive human society must be inculcated and imbued in its members, early in life.

Accordingly, to, and for, the position of the child in post-war and future planning generally, particular and conscientious thought must be given and adequate provision made.

One of the greatest needs for the future consists in a plan for perfect coordination of the activities to be devoted to child welfare and in cooperation with those undertaking to develop such plans, the City Planning Commission should now entertain consideration of a proposal for the construction of such facilities as will be necessary and convenient in the efficient administration thereof.

Subject to details subsequently to be found necessary, it would seem that such facilities should consist in a municipally-owned structure situated in that location, which is most central, and surrounded by land sufficient for attractive flower gardens, small scale agricultural endeavors and complete outdoor recreational facilities.

The building should be so constructed as to house the Juvenile Court and Detention Home, besides the administration offices of the several City departments responsible for Youth activities, such as the Recreation Commission, Board of Education, etc. There should also be quarters for the Big Brother Bureau, Big Sister Bureau, and an office for each of the recognized private agencies that are concerned with juvenile work, such as P. T. A. There should be an auditorium where conferences and meetings may be held. There should be proper conference rooms attached to each department within the building. The architecture should be so planned as to conform or be adaptable for the usual activities of children. The building should approximate perhaps six stories in height, with the fifth and sixth floors devoted to the Juvenile Court, Probation Department and Detention Home. The Detention Home located on the top floor allowing for recreational area on the roof so constructed as to provide maximum protection to the children.

It can be easily realized what a building of this type would mean to the Youth activities of San Francisco. It would coordinate all activities. It would remove the stigma of a child going to a Juvenile Court, because it would not be known as a Juvenile Court building, but be known as the CHILDREN'S CENTER OF SAN FRANCISCO. It would eliminate the confusion and the inefficiencies that now exist because parents do not know where to take their children for the various services required, or where to seek advice from proper authorities.

It would be a great saving to the taxpayers, because of the coordinated administration. It is very evident that the present housing conditions of the various departments for children are in a deplorable condition—they are costly to maintain and they retard juvenile activities.

Each department housed within the CHILDREN'S CENTER would have its own autonomy, yet coordinated effort would result through regular meetings of the department heads and those interested in Youth activities. The CHILDREN'S CENTER will engender a spirit of assistance to Youth in San Francisco. Its doors shall be open to the Youth of the City to partake of counseling service and guidance at all times.

#### Conclusion.

The foregoing recommendations are the result of careful study, sincere application and close cooperation from the members of the com-

mittee. It was agreed that the committee would adjourn subject to the call of the chair to consider further recommendations for future action.

**Approving Rule 31.2 of the Civil Service Commission Providing for Leaves of Absence to Officers and Employees of the City and County of San Francisco for the Purpose of Accepting Other Employment Directly Connected With the Prosecution of the War or National Defense or Preparedness.**

(Series of 1939)

Supervisor Gallagher presented:

Bill No. 2790, Ordinance No. . . . ., as follows:

Approving Rule 31.2 of the Civil Service Commission providing for leaves of absence to officers and employees of the City and County of San Francisco for the purpose of accepting other employment directly connected with the prosecution of the war or national defense or preparedness.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco, as follows:

Section 1. On the recommendation of the Civil Service Commission and by a three-fourths vote, the Board of Supervisors hereby approves rule 31.2 of the Civil Service Commission, providing for the granting of leaves of absence to officers and employees of the City and County to accept employment directly connected with the prosecution of the war in which this country is engaged or with national defense or preparedness, subject to the terms and conditions of said rule, which is as follows:

**RULE 31.2**

**Military Leaves (for Non-Military Service in the War Effort.)**

(a) The Civil Service Commission may grant leaves of absence to officers and employees of the City and County, except members of the Police and Fire Departments, for the purpose of accepting employment in service directly connected with the prosecution of the war or national defense or preparedness when, in its judgment, the Civil Service Commission determines that the officer or employee making application therefor possesses a skill which is needed in the war effort or national defense or preparedness and such skill is not utilized in his municipal employment, or if such officer or employee is utilizing such skill in his municipal employment, the Civil Service Commission determines that the granting of such leave will not disrupt or curtail essential municipal services.

(b) The Civil Service Commission shall grant such leaves to officers and employees only if the Civil Service Commission determines that

the proposed employment is directly connected with the prosecution of the war or with national defense or preparedness, and that the granting of such leave would further the war effort or national defense or preparedness and would not disrupt or curtail essential municipal services. Appointment of a new person to replace an employee granted leave under this rule shall continue only for the period of such leave.

(c) Such leaves as may be granted under the terms of this rule may continue for the duration of the war emergency and not longer than three months after the cessation of hostilities. Such leaves shall be automatically terminated if the officer or employee either voluntarily or involuntarily leaves the service for which the leave was granted. In the event the officer or employee leaves the service for which the leave was granted, such officer or employee shall forthwith report to the Civil Service Commission for return to duty in his municipal employment or he may file a new request with the Civil Service Commission in the same manner as provided herein for the original request if he desires to accept other work directly connected with the prosecution of the war or national defense or preparedness. In the event the officer or employee desires to return to his municipal position he shall be returned to duty therein if a position of his classification and under his appointing officer is available to which such officer or employee is eligible, according to his years of service, under the rules of the Civil Service Commission, and if no such position is available he shall assume the status of a holdover as defined by the rules of the Civil Service Commission and shall be entitled to the benefits thereof as provided by rule of the Civil Service Commission. In the event that a request is filed for a new leave, the officer or employee must show evidence of satisfactory service in the position in the war effort for which the previous leave or leaves were granted.

(d) If any officer or employee is granted a military leave (for non-military service in the war effort) pursuant to the provisions of this rule and during the period that such leave is in force, such officer or employee becomes subject to lay-off under the rules of the Civil Service Commission governing reduction in force, the military leave (for non-military service in the war effort) shall thereupon be automatically terminated and the employee shall be laid off in accordance with the rules of the Civil Service Commission governing reduction in force and shall be governed thereafter by the provisions of such rule.

(e) Officers and employees serving probationary periods under civil service appointment or serving under limited tenure appointments shall not be granted leaves under the provisions of this rule. Periods of leave granted under this rule shall not be calculated as City and County Service, except for purposes of the Retirement System as provided in Section 161 of the Charter.

(f) Leaves granted under the provisions of this rule shall be designated military leaves (for non-military service in the war effort). Application therefore shall be made by the officer or employee on forms provided by the Civil Service Commission and shall contain the information requested therein. Requests for military leave (for non-military service in the war effort) shall be filed by the officer or employee with the appointing officer under whose jurisdiction he serves. The appointing officer shall either approve or disapprove the request and shall without delay forward the request of the officer or employee with or without his approval to the Civil Service Commission for action. The Civil Service Commission shall investigate the circumstances of the request of the officer or employee and shall consider all of the circumstances in connection therewith and shall thereupon approve or disapprove the request of the officer or employee in accordance with its judgment. The appointing officer shall indicate on the request whether the position will be filled during the absence of the officer or employee requesting the leave. If the appointing officer disapproves such request, he shall state his reasons therefor. The action of the Civil Service Com-

mission in approving or disapproving a request for military leave (for non-military service in the war effort) shall be final.

(g) No officer or employee granted military leave (for non-military service in the war effort) under the terms of this rule shall be entitled to any salary or compensation for any portion of such leave of absence, nor shall compensation for such officer or employee for any portion of such leave be approved or paid by any officer or employee of the City and County.

Section 2. Whereas, an ordinance authorizing and approving the aforesaid rule was enacted by this Board of Supervisors on the 19th day of April, 1943, by a vote of eight members of said Board instead of by nine members as required by Section 153 of the Charter, the aforesaid rules of said Civil Service Commission shall be deemed to be effective on the 21st day of April, 1943.

**Requesting City Attorney to Prepare Legislation as Will Provide for Reinstatement of All Municipal Employees Who Were Forced to Relinquish Their Positions in Order to Serve in Agencies Connected With Our Fighting Forces and Will Provide for Leaves for Persons Desiring to Serve in Those Agencies.**

(Series of 1939)

Supervisor Mead presented:

Proposal No. 3893, Resolution No. . . . . ., as follows:

Whereas, as a result of the heroic death of Miss Esther Richards, former employee of the Public Welfare Department, it has come to the attention of this Board of Supervisors that many employees of the City and County of San Francisco believing prosecution of the war effort to be of supreme importance and desiring to lend competent assistance to that end, are either precluded the opportunity to serve, or as an alternative are required to resign their city positions and relinquish the benefits incident thereto; and

Whereas, this anomalous situation arises as a result of the policy of certain commissions of the City and County of San Francisco to the effect that leaves of absence for incidental services necessary to the war effort shall not be granted to municipal employees whose services for the city are similar to those proposed to be entered into while on leave; and

Whereas, such a policy has undoubted merit insofar as certain home-

front operations are concerned but is wholly unjustified as relates to leaves of municipal employees for service closely allied with combat duty, including care of and ministrations to the physical and moral well-being of our fighting or incapacitated service men and women; and

Whereas, such a policy seems neither fair to municipal employees nor conducive to the best interests of our service men and women; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the City Attorney be and is hereby requested to prepare and submit to this Board as soon as possible, such proposed legislation as will:

1. Provide for the reinstatement, with all those benefits which would have accrued but for their resignations, of all those municipal employees who were required to relinquish their positions in order to serve in those agencies immediately adjunctive to our fighting forces, either for their physical or moral well-being.

2. Establish a mandatory procedure which, in future, will permit of leaves of absence for municipal employees desiring to serve in the agencies heretofore referred to.

**In Memoriam—Miss Esther Richards.**

(Series of 1939)

Supervisor Mead presented:

Proposal No. 3894, Resolution No. 3873, as follows:

Whereas, there has recently emerged, to scintillate upon the revered banner of the American Red Cross, another star of brilliant gold, marking the heroic passing of Miss Esther Richards of San Francisco, California; and

Whereas, the interesting and highly purposeful career of Miss Richards records the following accomplishments designed for succor of her fellow-man:

- Completed High School in Michigan, 1914;
- Completed Nurses' Training in Michigan, 1917;
- Registered Nurse in World War I, 1918-1919;
- Served with U. S. Veterans' Administration in California, 1920-1932;
- Attended University of California and graduated with A.B., majoring in Social Service, 1932-1935;
- Attended Columbia University, New York, 1936-1937;
- Social Service Worker, Department of Public Welfare, San Francisco, 1937-1943;
- American Red Cross Worker, World War II;
- Killed in Action, Italian Theatre of War, February 7, 1944.

Whereas, although she served as a registered nurse in World War I, Miss Richards, after having volunteered for similar duty in the present war, was, because slightly over the age limit, officially precluded the fulfillment of that desire, but undaunted, and at the sacrifice of her city position, she proffered her services, was accepted as an American Red Cross Worker and in August, 1943, assigned to duty in North Africa, from whence she was transferred to the Italian front; and

Whereas, ironically, although Miss Richards sought and was denied the opportunity to enlist in the nursing corps, thus requiring her resignation from the Public Welfare Department so that she might serve in a line of endeavor similar to that in which she was employed by the City and County of San Francisco, a scarcity of qualified personnel at the front necessitated her transfer to the nursing division soon after she reached the scene of combat in this manner bringing to fruition her originally frustrated desire, but in the consummation of which, her potential right to return to her City position and to receive re-



tirement benefits and the right of her heirs to death benefits were abrogated; and

Whereas, notwithstanding that voluntarily to lend capable and experienced assistance to her country in its hour of greatest need, Miss Richards was compelled to sacrifice all of her rights to that for which all her life she had studied and striven, she did not hesitate, she did not equivocate—she relinquished her position and the increments attached thereto, she renounced a life of comparative comfort and safety—and she died for love of her fellow-man; and

Whereas, such patriotism and devotion to the welfare of others are singular and beautiful qualities, such qualities as serve, in a world of sorrow, hate and doubt, to revive a waning faith in human nature and to win for their possessor an entry emblazoned on the pages of history, a niche deep in the hearts of man, and a place high in the Book of Gold; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That this Board of Supervisors notes with poignant regret the untimely passing of Miss Esther Richards and takes this opportunity, on behalf of the People of the City and County of San Francisco, to express its heartfelt sympathy to her family and to approbate the fervent spirit of patriotism and deep love for humanity which resulted in the sacrifice of her life; and be it

Further Resolved, That engrossed copies of this resolution be prepared and presented to her family, to the San Francisco Chapter of the American Red Cross and to the Public Welfare Commission.

*Unanimously Adopted by rising vote.*

## CHARTER AMENDMENT

Supervisor Sullivan presented the following:

### LEAVES OF ABSENCE

**NOTE:** Amendments are indicated by *light face italics*. Cancellations are set out in **face** and bracketed [ ].

Section 153. Leaves of absence to officers and employees of the city and county shall be governed by rules established by the civil service commission, provided that leave of absence to any officer or employee for the purpose of leaving the city and county, taking a position outside of the city and county, or accepting a position in some department or office of the city and county other than the one in which he is employed and where the duties are in no way related to the duties covered by his civil service classification, shall be limited to six months; and provided further, that no limit shall be placed on leave of absence granted to enable an officer or employee to accept promotion to a non-civil service position in the same department in which he is in civil service status, or promotion to co-related work in another department or office of the city and county.

Leaves of absence shall be granted to officers and employees of the city and county of San Francisco and non-certificated officers and employees of the San Francisco Unified School District [and to eligibles on lists for appointment to positions] therein for service in the armed forces of the United States or the State of California [or for service on ships operated by or for the United States government] in time of war and for such time thereafter as may be provided by rule of the civil service commission, but not to exceed five years after the proclamation of peace, except in case of disability incurred in line of duty with the armed forces [or the merchant marine] when such disability shall extend beyond such period.

Whenever any officer or employee of the city and county of San Francisco or any non-certificated officer or employee of the San Francisco Unified School District [or any eligible on a list for appointment to positions there shall, by order of the government of the United States or by lawful order of any of its departments or officers, or by lawful order of the State of California or any of its departments or officers, be directed in time of peace to report for service or training in the armed forces of the United States, or in the armed forces of the State of California, and shall be inducted into said service] said officer or employee [or eligible] shall be entitled to a leave of absence from his office or position [or eligibility] during the time of such service for a period not to exceed three months after the expiration thereof. *Leaves granted pursuant to the provisions of the two preceding paragraphs of this section shall be designated "Military Leaves"*.

In addition to such leaves, the board of supervisors by a three-fourths vote may, on the recommendation of the civil service commission, provide by ordinance that leaves of absence shall be granted to such officers and employees [and eligibles] during time of war or in time of peace for service on ships operated by or for the United States government or for other service directly connected with the prosecution of the war or national defense or preparedness. Leaves granted pursuant to the provisions of [the two preceding] this paragraph[s] and ordinances adopted pursuant to the provisions of this paragraph shall be designated "*War Industrial Leaves*".

If a person on military leave has been appointed to a permanent position, he shall be entitled to resume such position at the expiration of his leave, and if any civil service rights accrue to any appointee by reason of seniority, the term of service shall be reckoned a part of his service under the city and county, exclusive of service under the retirement provision of this chapter.

*If a person having standing on an eligible list is inducted or enlisted in military service in time of war or during any emergency declared by the President of the United States, he shall retain his place on said eligible list and upon presenting an honorable discharge or certificate of honorable active service, he shall be preferred for appointment for a period of four years after the proclamation of peace in the order of standing upon such register at the time of induction into military service and before candidates securing standing through an examination held subsequent to such induction, and if while in said military service the number of said person is reached for appointment to a permanent position, said person shall be appointed to said position and shall be granted a military leave from said position for the expiration of his term in said military service or during any emergency which may have been declared by the President and for six months thereafter, and upon presenting to the civil service commission an honorable discharge or certificate of honorable active service he shall assume the duties of said position and his appointment to said position shall be deemed to be the date his name on said eligible list was reached for appointment and he shall receive the benefits which may accrue by reason of his appointment to the same position and in the same manner as though he were actually engaged in performing the duties of the position to which he was appointed, provided that no person shall be appointed to any entrance position in the uniformed ranks of the police or fire departments under this provision who is more than thirty-five years of age unless the name of such person was reached for appointment to such position before said person reached said age of thirty-five years.*

any person who participates in a regular civil service examination and who, by reason of his induction or enlistment in the Army, Navy, or Marine Corps, is unable to complete all parts of the examination, shall retain his standing on the eligible list in accordance with the relative excellence attained by his participation in the part of the examination already completed; provided that upon presenting his discharge or certificate of honorable active service within the time specified in this section, he must qualify in the remainder of the examination not already completed. When properly qualified, he shall be appointed as of the date he was first reached for appointment in accordance with relative excellence attained by his participation in the examination.

**Officers, employees, or eligibles entering or being inducted into any service in which military leave may be granted under the provisions of this section shall, prior thereto, file with the civil service commission a copy of the orders authorizing such service.]**

The civil service commission shall adopt rules to govern the administration of **[military]** leaves as herein provided and to govern lay-offs occasioned by the return of officers, employees or eligibles who have been *appointed and inducted* **[military]** leaves as provided in this section.

**Military leaves granted to officers, employees or eligibles for service on or after September 7, 1941, shall be retroactive to September 7, 1941.]**

Military leaves of absence granted prior to January 15, 1941, shall be deemed to be effective as of September 16, 1940, and all leaves of absence granted under rule 31.2 of the Civil Service Commission approved by ordinance of the Board of Supervisors on the 19th day of April, 1943, shall be deemed to be **[military]** leaves as provided in this section.

The civil service commission, by rule and subject to the approval of the Board of Supervisors by ordinance, shall provide for leaves of absence due to illness or disability, which leave or leaves may be cumulative, if not used as authorized, provided that the accumulated unused period of sick leave shall not exceed six months, regardless of length of service, and provided further that any violation or abuse of the provisions of said rule and ordinance by any officer or employee shall be deemed an act of insubordination and inattention to duties.

**An Amendment to the Charter Abolishing the Department of Finance and Records, and Establishing Separate Elective Offices of the Tax Collector, County Clerk, Recorder, Public Administrator and Registrar of Voters.**

From the San Francisco Property Owners League:

*Proposed changes hereinafter listed are sections of the Charter of the City and County of San Francisco.*

Section 61. *Delete the following:* Department of Finance and Records which shall include the functions and personnel of the offices of Tax Collector, Registrar of Voters, Recorder, County Clerk and Public Administrator, and shall be administered by a Director of Finance and Records who shall be appointed by the Chief Administrative Officer and hold office at his pleasure. The Public Administrator shall appoint and at his pleasure may remove an attorney who shall be paid an annual salary of \$8,000.

He may also appoint such assistant attorneys as may be provided by the budget and annual appropriation ordinance.

Section 62. *Delete the following:* Offices heretofore elective which are, by the provisions of this Charter, made appointive, shall come within the civil service provisions of this Charter and any incumbent in any such office at the time this Charter shall be ratified by the State Legislature shall, if he has held such office for one year continuously prior thereto, be deemed appointed to such position, at his then existing salary, under the civil service provisions of this Charter, and thereafter shall hold office under such provisions; provided that such salaries so continued shall apply only to such incumbents as long as they legally hold such positions and, on the appointment of a successor to any such incumbent, the salary of such position shall be subject to the salary standardization provisions of this Charter and shall not in any case exceed six thousand dollars (\$6,000) per annum.

*Amend Section 5 as follows:*

The mayor, the members of the board of supervisors, an assessor, a district attorney, a city attorney, a sheriff, a treasurer, a public defender, a tax collector, a county clerk, a recorder, a public administrator, a registrar of voters, and municipal court judges shall be elected by the voters of the city and county. At the general municipal election in 1943, and at the general municipal election in every fourth year thereafter, there shall be elected a mayor, six supervisors, a district attorney and a sheriff, and at the general municipal election in 1945, and

at the general municipal election in every fourth year thereafter there shall be elected five supervisors, a city attorney, a treasurer, a county clerk, a tax collector, a recorder, a public administrator, a registrar of voters, and at the general election in 1942 and at the general election in every fourth year thereafter there shall be elected an assessor and a public defender. All of the aforesaid officials shall be elected for a term of four years from the commencement of their respective terms as herein specified. The term of the assessor who shall hold office on the 8th day of January, 1943, shall expire at 12 o'clock noon on said date, and the person elected assessor at the general election in 1942 shall succeed to said office at 12 o'clock noon on said 8th day of January, 1943.

At the general municipal election in 1943, there shall be elected four municipal court judges to succeed those judges whose respective terms of office expire on the 8th day of January, 1944, and at the general municipal election in each sixth year after 1943 the successors to said four municipal court judges shall be elected, and at the general municipal election in 1945 there shall be elected four municipal court judges to succeed those judges whose respective terms of office expire on January 8, 1946, and at the general municipal election in each sixth year after 1945, the successors to said last mentioned judges shall be elected, and at the general municipal election in 1947, there shall be elected four municipal court judges to succeed those judges whose respective terms of office expire on the 8th day of January, 1948, and at the general municipal election in each sixth year after 1947, the successors to said last mentioned judges shall be elected. The term of each municipal court judge shall be six years from and after twelve o'clock noon on the eighth day of January following his election. All terms of office of elective officials shall begin at 12 o'clock noon on the 8th day of January following the date of their election.

Any appointive officer or employee of the city and county who shall become a candidate for election by the people to any public office shall automatically forfeit such city and county office or position.

No person elected as mayor or supervisor shall be eligible, for a period of one year after his last day of said service as mayor or supervisor, for appointment to any full time position carrying compensation in the city and county service.

Should this amendment not be approved by the legislature of the State of California so that the office of assessor may be voted for at the general election to be held in November, 1942, as in this section provided, then in that event the term of the incumbent in the office of assessor at 12 o'clock noon on the 8th day of January, 1943, shall not expire at 12 o'clock noon on said date, but shall continue until the 8th day of January, 1944, and the office of assessor shall be filled at the general municipal election in 1943, for a three year term from said date, and said office of assessor shall again be filled at the general election in 1946 for a four year term from said date, and at the general election in each fourth year thereafter. (Ratified by Legislature December 22, 1941.) (Refer to Digest.)

*There shall be added to the Charter the following section to be known as Section 33.1, which shall read as follows:*

The Tax Collector, County Clerk, Recorder, Public Administrator and Registrar of Voters shall be elective officials and shall each receive an annual salary of eight thousand dollars (\$8,000). The Tax Collector, County Clerk, Recorder and Registrar of Voters shall each appoint, and at their pleasure may remove, one chief assistant or deputy, and one general-clerk stenographer. The Public Administrator may appoint and at his pleasure may remove an attorney who shall be paid an annual salary of \$8,000. He may also appoint such assistant attorneys as may be provided by the budget and annual appropriation ordinance.

*The purpose of this amendment is to (1) abolish the Department of*

Finance and Records; (2) to establish separate elective offices of Tax Collector, County Clerk, Recorder, Public Administrator and Registrar of Voters.

*Referred to Judiciary Committee.*

#### Rezoning of Property in Sunset and Parkside Districts.

Supervisor MacPhee called attention to bill presented by him on Monday, February 28, 1944, and referred to Public Buildings, Lands and City Planning Committee, and stated that the proper procedure required reference of such bill to the City Planning Commission for report. Thereupon, Supervisor MacPhee moved that said bill be referred to the City Planning Commission for report and that all other action in reference thereto be postponed until report is received from the City Planning Commission.

*No objection, and so ordered.*

#### Employment of Jesse H. Steinhart as Special Counsel for the Public Utilities Commission.

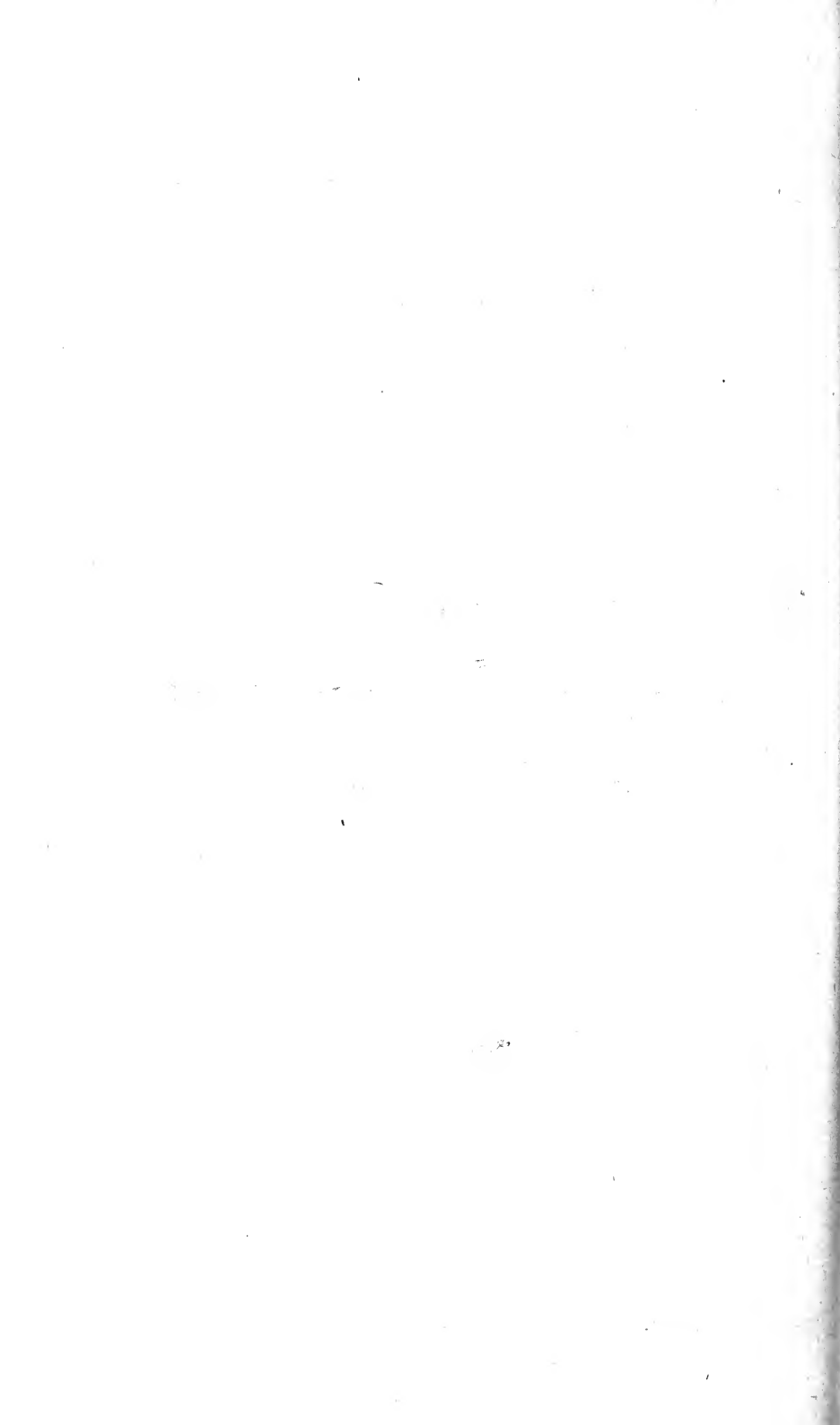

The Board of Supervisors met pursuant to recess, to consider Salary Standardization.

## CALLING THE ROLL.

The roll was called and the following Supervisors were noted present:

Supervisors Gallagher, Gartland, MacPhee, Mancuso, Mead, Meyer, Sullivan—7.

Absent: Supervisors Brown, Colman, Green, Uhl—4.

Quorum present.

President Dan Gallagher presiding.

Supervisor Brown was noted present at 4:10 p. m.

Supervisor Colman excused from attendance.

## Consideration of Proposed Salary Standardization Ordinance.

Mrs. Kathleen Dolen, on being granted the privilege of the floor, presented, on behalf of the Civil Service Commission, the following statement:

### Statement of the Civil Service Commission to the Board of Supervisors, Tuesday, March 7, 1944, Regarding the Proposed Salary Standardization Ordinance Pending Before the Board.

I would like to make a brief statement in support of the salary report of the Civil Service Commission now pending before you. This report was made at the request of the Board of Supervisors who promised the employees last year that a new survey would be made this year and salary adjustments made in the 1944-45 budget to correct many inequities which resulted from the compromise salary plan adopted last year.

Immediately prior to starting the wage survey the Civil Service Commission revised the classification plan upon which the salary plan is based. The result of this study was the elimination of about 160 or 19 per cent of the specialized classes. It is our intention to further decrease these classifications as time and opportunity permits. By decreasing the number of specialized classifications we have broadened promotive opportunities and eliminated special salary treatment for individual classes.

Our salary survey covered 141 of San Francisco private firms and thirteen public jurisdictions in the State of California. We wish to report that we received excellent cooperation from industry in this city and of the 141 firms contacted only twelve were unable to contribute data and generally for reasons beyond their control. The report covers salary data on more than 21,000 jobs in private employment. For the first time a salary report submitted to the Board of Supervisors recommends the establishment of standard working conditions, which are based on a five-day week of forty hours with a dif-

ferential for night work and a recommendation that time and one-half be paid for overtime worked in excess of forty hours, in accordance with national legislation. It is further recommended that a minimum of six holidays be granted to all employees.

The Civil Service Commission held four hearings on protests and as a result of the hearings recommended revisions in 49 rates out of 246 protested. The total increased cost of the Civil Service Commission recommended salary recommendations approximately \$522,000, which provides salary increases for about 2600 employees out of a total of 7200 affected by Section 151 of the Charter. The greatest amount of the increase in cost is distributed among the lower brackets. For example, 82 per cent of the cost is for classes with a maximum salary range of not more than \$300. Only about \$17,000, or 3 per cent, is distributed among the so-called higher brackets—classes with a maximum of more than \$500. This report gives relief to white collar workers, sub-professional and professional classes who have been greatly hit by the rising cost of living and who have had no salary relief. Each year since 1937 the Board has adjusted the rates of pay for the organized crafts and trades and rightly so but no such adjustments have been made for the white collared worker. A new salary standardization schedule should therefore attempt to correct deficiencies in salaries and working conditions both to prevent further loss of trained employees and to strengthen the morale of those loyal to the service.

We do not expect you to be fully satisfied with this report. There are bound to be differences of opinion in a salary report affecting 7000 employees and covering 650 different classifications, but in our judgment it is a sound report, based upon facts and data gathered under the provisions of Section 151 of the Charter and adequately reflects proper rates of pay. We hope that you will give favorable consideration to the report.

Mr. J. Arthur Younger of the Municipal Conference, stated that several weeks ago he had written to each Supervisor the conclusions of the Conference at that time, based on the findings of the Bureau of Governmental Research. Unfortunately the Conference was laboring under the opinion that salary standardization meant that salaries from time to time could be raised or lowered to meet conditions. That was the basis on which the voters had approved the last change in the Charter. That was the argument used in the campaign. That was the theory on which the Conference had approached the study of salary standardization but during the week just passed the Conference found out that the Charter did not mean that. An opinion was rendered by the City Attorney on February 17, 1943. The Conference knew nothing about it. According to this opinion salary standardization, under the present city Charter, means that the Board is considering maximum salaries which can never be lowered for the incumbent. That is contrary to the understanding of the Conference and the understanding, by and large, of the voters who approved salary standardization. When the Charter was first adopted, salaries were frozen. The City Attorney's opinion differs entirely from the opinion of the counsel of the Municipal Conference. For that reason the Conference has changed its feeling on this whole matter. Until there is a salary standardization, and the Conference knows what it means, it does not believe that salaries, at this level, should be fixed that can never be changed, so far as the incumbent is concerned. For that reason the Conference is opposed to the adoption of any change or salary standardization or new schedules at this time. There would be no particular hardship. Average salaries have increased 18 per cent; that is the report of the Conference, and no refutation of that has been made. The Conference believes the Board should defer action until such time as a salary standardization, or interpretation of the Charter can be had. No hardships will be inflicted upon the employees of the City and County of San Francisco other than are now inflicted upon private employment.

For these reasons the Conference feels that no new ordinance should be passed or changed at this time until the interpretation of the ordinance or the Charter can be had. The City Attorney's opinion skips over entirely the provision that the attorneys of the Municipal Conference rely on.

The proposed ordinance provides for a forty-hour week for all departments. The Conference accepts the forty-hour week as the accepted work week for most employees. However, there are two departments which by conditions and by the standardization at present are on a forty-eight-hour week. They are the Institutions, and the Municipal Railway. The forty-hour week should not be put into operation in those departments. Cutting down the work week by a one-half day gives a double raise in salary. The Conference has no objection to working in war industries, but there are a number of employees who are working in competition with the taxpayers and not for the war effort. Another half day would be very good for that purpose. The City Attorney has ruled that under the present ordinance and the Charter no one has any right to stop a city employee from working. Mr. Wolff has stated that the Civil Service Commission has no right to stop anyone from working except where it definitely interferes with his city employment.

The Conference objects to using differential in living costs between San Francisco and other cities, Los Angeles, for example, being considered in establishing rates of salary. The United States Civil Service makes no differential in salaries between San Francisco and Los Angeles. The State Civil Service makes no differential. Three of the largest employers and taxpayers of San Francisco, who maintain places of business in Los Angeles, make no such differential in salaries paid in San Francisco and in Los Angeles. There is nothing in the Charter or in the Salary Standardization section of the Charter which states that differences in living cost should be taken into consideration. It is not consistent with other governmental jurisdictions and with private employment.

The Municipal Conference takes the position that nothing should be done until the opinion of the City Attorney is clarified, and there is a salary standardization that can be adjusted to meet conditions, and must be adjusted every five years.

Supervisor MacPhee, referring to statement just made, stated that Mr. Younger refers to the "I" and the "S" Classifications being placed on a five-day week. The "S" Classification is Municipal Railway. As to the "I" Classification, that has been set up on a five-day week, but there has been no decision by the Finance Committee as yet with regard to payment for the sixth day, whether on an overtime or on a regular basis. If on a regular basis, the five-day would really have no effect. The changes that the Finance Committee is recommending and that are before the Board at present involve in a great measure changes made because of new labor contracts that have been formulated since the original matter was presented to the Board of Supervisors by the Civil Service Commission. The Finance Committee has been advised, on certain classifications within the laboring group, of changes in wages, and we have included them in the report. In addition, the Committee has made additional recommendations based on information presented to the Committee, particularly with reference to nurses in the San Francisco Hospital, who, we feel, have been wrongly classified for many years in that their work is entirely different from that of nurses in private hospitals. These recommendations are contained in our report. The Finance Committee, in its study, has enjoyed the greatest amount of cooperation possible from the Civil Service Commission, from the Municipal Conference, from the San Francisco Center, League of Women Voters, and from city employees generally. The Civil Service Commission has been able to substantiate its recommendations, especially for the lower brackets.

Thereupon, the Clerk, at the request of Supervisor MacPhee, read the following recommendation of the Finance Committee:

**Transmitting to Civil Service Commission for Report, Recommended Changes in Schedules of Compensation.**

(Series of 1939)

Proposal No. . . . ., Resolution No. . . . ., as follows:

Whereas, the Civil Service Commission has presented to the Board of Supervisors a schedule of compensations submitted under the provisions of Section 151 of the Charter; and

Whereas, Section 151 of the Charter states "that the Board of Supervisors may approve, amend or reject schedule of compensations proposed by the Civil Service Commission"; and

Whereas, the Board of Supervisors after considering the report of the Civil Service Commission and protests thereon, considers that the report should be amended; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Board of Supervisors does hereby transmit to the Civil Service Commission for review, analysis and report the following changes in the schedule of compensations recommended by the Civil Service Commission; and be it

Further Resolved, That the Board of Supervisors make such recommendations on the basis of their interpretation of the data submitted by the Civil Service Commission and information submitted by protestants and agreements presented by organized groups.

**Privilege of the Floor.**

Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Mancuso, moved the

privilege of the floor for anyone who might desire to be heard, the time for each speaker to be limited to five minutes.

*No objection, and so ordered.*

Thereupon, Mr. Al Smith of the Bureau of Governmental Research announced that his organization had filed a report stating in detail most of the objections to the Civil Service Commission's recommended schedules. The Bureau feels that the Civil Service Commission has not adhered to the Charter provision to fix city salaries based on generally prevailing rates in private and in public employments. They have taken some 21,000 positions in private employment on which they based a great many rates, and used them as a background for many rates. Out of that group we find that only 6 per cent of employees in private employment were getting salaries in excess of the Civil Service Commission's recommendations. About 4 per cent were receiving same amount as recommended by the Commission. The other 90 per cent were below. That, we do not believe, is salary standardization. In getting rates from other jurisdictions, the Commission has set rates above the highest rates that they were able to find. They justify their position on the grounds that rates that they found were not comparable to like positions in other jurisdictions or in private employment. The Commission fixed salaries considerably in excess of anything paid in the State of California. We feel this is a violation of the principle of salary standardization. We believe that salaries of city employees should be equal to, or in accord with generally prevailing rates in private or in other public employment. The details of our report have been filed with the Board.

Thereupon, the Clerk presented and read correspondence, as follows:

From Civil Service Commission, copy of communication addressed to Mr. J. Arthur Younger, enclosing copy of opinion of the City Attorney, dated February 17, 1943, regarding protected salaries of employees.

From Civil Service Commission, reply to protests of the San Francisco Municipal Conference and the Bureau of Governmental Research in regard to the proposed salary standardization schedules of the Civil Service Commission; also, charts indicating the distribution of the estimated increased costs in the proposed salary schedules and the estimated increased cost of overtime after forty hours per week.

From Civil Service Commission, recommending amendment by addition of "10 cents extra per hour while instructing new employees as



assigned by the Superintendent" to the following classes: S102 Conductor; S104 Motorman; S106 Bus Operator. Also recommending that there be added the following to Class J4 Laborer: "When performing duties of Pneumatic Tool Operator, \$8.50 per day."

From San Francisco Bureau of Governmental Research, protesting salary standardization schedules recommended by the Civil Service Commission.

*Referred to Finance Committee for consideration at meeting Wednesday, March 8, at 4 p. m.*

From International Hod Carriers' Building and Common Laborers' Union of America, copy of decision as rendered by the Wage Adjustment Board on increase of wages for laborers, of five cents per hour; also schedule of laborers' classifications and wage rates.

From Public Utilities Commission, protesting payment of penalty overtime for work in excess of forty hours per week and penalty overtime for night shift work after seven and one-half hours per shift, to employees of the Public Utilities Commission paid on a monthly basis who are engaged in the operation of any utility.

*Referred to Finance Committee for consideration at meeting to be held on Wednesday, March 8, at 4 p. m.*

From International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers, reporting new agreement with the employers of radio technicians in radio stations has been negotiated, which will result in increases of from \$5 to \$7.50 per day, and requesting increases in salaries, as follows:

From International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers, requesting the Board to recommend wage rates for classes as follows: M202, Car Repairers; M206, Sub-Foreman Car Repairer; M208, Foreman Car Repairer; J162, Car Repairer Welder.

*Referred to Finance Committee for consideration at meeting to be held on Wednesday, March 8, at 4 p. m.*

The Chair, in the interest of orderly procedure and to expedite the hearings, announced that he would call the various classifications in alphabetical order, at which time anyone so desiring might make a presentation.

A Classification. None.

B Classification.

Mr. Cameron King, Registrar of Voters, addressed the Board on the general proposition of whether wages, once fixed, could be lowered. There was nothing before the Board, at present, on that matter. It will be time enough to determine that when the question arises. However, there is a provision in the Charter which provides that direct deductions can be made from salaries when conditions so require. The Municipal Conference objects to these wages on the ground that at sometime in the future there may be a reason to reduce wages, but the Board should not obstruct justice to a large number of people as proposed in this present salary standardization measure just because of those objections.

B66, Registrar of Voters. Mr. King then reiterated briefly the arguments previously submitted by him in support of his request for increased compensation to bring him in line with some seventeen other positions with which, he declared, his own position was comparable.

Mr. Paul Schnoor, representing the C.I.O. Council, speaking in general on the "B" Classifications, declared that present recommended

increases in that classification were in comparison with similar jobs in private industry. It was his contention that the recommendations of the Civil Service Commission were inadequate. Holders of similar positions in private industry in San Francisco and in the nation have really been the forgotten men. "White Collar" workers have suffered more than any other group of workers throughout the United States with respect to salary increases over a period of years. The "B" group has had an increase of \$5 per month in the past twelve years, and that is all they have had. That is why the C.I.O. feels that the recommendations of the Civil Service Commission, while entirely inadequate, constitute a step forward and in the right direction. The Council hopes that the sympathetic treatment given the proposal by the Civil Service Commission and the Finance Committee will be given the support of the Board of Supervisors.

Mr. Charles Foehm spoke on Classifications E120 and E122. These employees work in the power house at Hetch Hetchy. E122, Power House Operator is promotional from E120, Governorman. The scale for E120 is \$175 to \$210 per month. E122 starts at \$210. There should be a \$5 differential and the scale for E122 should start at \$215.

P Classification.

Mr. Frank Moitoza suggested that increases for nurses should be reflected throughout the classification.

Supervisor MacPhee reported that the Board would have to be guided thereon by the Civil Service Commission's recommendations.

O Classification.

O304, Hydrantman-Gateman. Request was made by a speaker that this classification be considered as related to the classification of Plumber. The comparable scale should be \$13.60 per day.

Supervisor MacPhee announced that a report on that classification would be made later during the meeting.

Q Classification. None.

R Classification.

Mr. Frederick Levy, speaking for Federation of Municipal Employees, declared that Classification R106, Supervisor of Activities, was comparable to Classification R105, Supervisor of Athletics. The same applied, also, to Supervisor of Music and other classifications.

S Classification.

Mr. H. S. Foley addressed the Board on classifications for platform men of the Municipal Railway. His organization requested that starting wage for Classifications S102, Conductor, S103, Street Car Operator (female) and S104, Motorman, start at \$1 per hour, and S106, Bus Operator, start at \$1.05 per hour. The Civil Service Commission did

not make such recommendation. The same request has been made of the Finance Committee, but no recommendation has been made by the Committee so far. The Finance Committee has recommended increase for laborers from \$7.60 per day to \$1 per hour. The responsibilities involved in the railway positions call for comparable rates of pay, if not higher. The wages should be established at twenty or thirty cents per higher per hour than rate of pay for laborers, although only comparable rates of pay is being requested. If the present rate of pay should be maintained, the Municipal Railway will lose many of its employees, who will accept laborers' jobs, paying \$1 per hour rather than remaining at their 92½-cent rate. Mr. Cahill has no objection to the requested wage rates of \$1 and \$1.05 per hour.

S110, Inspector, Municipal Railway. Mr. Foley objected to proposed reduction of \$15 per month in salary, with a corresponding reduction of four hours in the work week. Nor should employees be compelled to work six days per week for straight time. The request is for forty hours per week at the same monthly salary of \$240.

Mrs. Kathleen Dolen reported that the recommended salary was based on the proposed working time of forty hours per week.

T Classification. None.

U Classification.

U112, Pipe Calker, and U116, Serviceman. Statement was made that the foregoing classifications were related to the Plumber's Classification, for which the prevailing wage is \$13.60.

Supervisor MacPhee announced that during the hearings of the Finance Committee, many people had requested increased salaries because they were performing certain duties and felt that they should receive increased compensation. After discussing the matter with employee groups and taxpaying groups he believed a study should be made with regard to classifications of employments. He intended to present to the Board a resolution along such lines.

Mr. John O'Connell, in addressing the Board, stated that as a result of a survey of this kind, there are bound to be some disappointments. He commended the Civil Service Commission and the Finance Committee for reports made, and urged adoption. The Board always meets the same opposition to standardization surveys. In the several surveys in which he took part, the gang downtown voted "No" on every item. It is the same thing now. Mr. O'Connell, in closing, complimented the Civil Service Commission and the Finance Committee on the fine job they had performed, and stated that it would be perfectly agreeable to the people he was interested in if the Board should adopt their recommendations as a whole.

#### Requesting Civil Service Commission to Conduct a Survey Looking to the Adoption of a Revised and Equitable Classification of Duty Schedule.

(Series of 1939)

Thereupon, Supervisor MacPhee presented:

Proposal No. 3898, Resolution No. 3867, as follows:

Whereas, much dissatisfaction prevails because of inadequacies and inequalities in the Classification of Duty Schedule for municipal employees; and

Whereas, it is confidently believed that a great deal of the contention and protest, which is encountered each year in connection with the enactment of the Annual Salary Ordinance, could be eliminated by the adoption of a Classification of Duty Statement revised to properly and fairly reflect the actual duties of the various municipal employees and to reduce, as far as possible, the number of classifications; and

Whereas, in order to effectuate such a proposal, an immediate and

complete survey of the employments in each department should be undertaken and public hearings had on the proposed revision of the Duty Statement, at which hearings all interested persons, including department heads and interested civic, labor and employee organizations, shall be invited to be present and to express their views, in order that the revised Classification of Duty Schedule may be adopted in sufficient time to apply to the salary rates proposed for inclusion in the Annual Budget for 1945-1946; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Civil Service Commission be and is hereby requested, pursuant to its powers under Section 141 of the Charter, to institute a thorough survey looking to the adoption of such a revised and equitable Classification of Duty Statement as is contemplated and referred to in this proposal; and be it

Further Resolved, That a copy of this resolution be transmitted to the Civil Service Commission.

*Adopted* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Gallagher, Gartland, MacPhee, Mancuso, Mead, Meyer, Sullivan—7.

Absent: Supervisors Brown, Colman, Green, Uhl—4.

#### Recess.

Supervisor MacPhee, following the adoption of the foregoing resolution, announced that the Finance Committee might want to amend its resolution presented earlier, and requested that a recess of fifteen minutes be declared.

There being no objection, the Board, at the hour of 4:10 p. m., recessed for a period of fifteen minutes.

Supervisor Brown was noted present at 4:10 p. m.

#### Reconvening of the Board.

The Board, at the hour of 4:30 p. m., reconvened to resume its consideration of Salary Standardization.

Supervisor MacPhee reported on Finance Committee's consideration of various classifications, as follows:

R106, Supervisor of Activities. The Finance Committee did not consider favorably the request to extend the maximum salary to \$300.

M202, Car Repairer. A specialized classification and not comparable to any other classification. After consultation with the Civil Service Commission, the Committee recommends salary scale of \$8.40, \$9.20 and \$10.

U112, Caulker, and U116, Service Man. It was pointed out that 70 per cent of the work is that of a plumber and 30 per cent the work of a laborer, and salary is requested on that basis. Actual time worked is about 50 per cent plumbing, 20 per cent traveling, making out reports, etc., and the balance doing the work of a laborer. The Commission was willing to establish rate based on 60 per cent of time plumbing and 40 per cent of the time performing duties of laborer, making a rate of \$11.36, which the Finance Committee recommends.

S102, Conductor; S103, Street Car Operator (Female); 104, Motorman; S106, Bus Operator. The Finance Committee is recommending for Classifications S102, S103 and S104, hourly rates as follows: First six months, 92½ cents; second six months, 95 cents; third six months, 97½ cents; fourth six months and thereafter, \$1 per hour; plus 10 cents extra while instructing.

For Classification S106, the Finance Committee is recommending 97½ cents for the first six months; \$1 for the second six months; \$1.02½ for the third six months; for the fourth six months and thereafter, \$1.05 per hour; plus 10 cents extra while instructing.

For Classification S110, the Committee is recommending salary range of \$200 to \$240.

N204, Housing and Industrial Inspector. The Finance Committee considered this classification, but through error, it was not placed in the original report. It is the same classification as other inspection service, and the Committee is recommending the same rate, \$215 to \$260.

E110.1, Sound Technician. A point was raised that a new contract for salary increases had been signed. Because the Finance Committee did not have any information concerning that, the Committee is making no recommendation.

B66, Registrar of Voters. The Committee has taken no action on request for \$600 salary. There is pending in the Finance Committee the question of higher bracket salaries. It is held up temporarily.

#### Recess.

The Board, at the request of Supervisor MacPhee, recessed at 4:35 p. m. while awaiting receipt of resolution heretofore presented by the Finance Committee, but amended to include the foregoing amendments.

#### Reconvening of the Board.

At the hour of 5:45 p. m., the Board reconvened.

Supervisor MacPhee, thereupon, presented the following Finance Committee recommendation, the result of the Committee's deliberations with respect to salary increases for platform men of the Municipal Railway.

#### Transmitting to Civil Service Commission for Report, Recommended Changes in Schedule of Compensation for Classes S102, S103 and S104.

(Series of 1939)

Proposal No. 3987, Resolution No. 3866, as follows:

Whereas, there is now pending before the Board of Supervisors a Salary Standardization report of the Civil Service Commission; and

Whereas, it is the intention of the Board of Supervisors to propose an amendment to this ordinance to provide for an increase in the rate of pay for laborers from 95 cents to \$1 per hour in accordance with wage agreement in private employment; and

Whereas, the rates of pay recommended by the Civil Service Commission for the classes of S102, Conductor, S103, Street Car Operator, S104, Motorman, and S106, Bus Operator, a semi-skilled class of employees are less than the rates of pay recommended for the unskilled class of J4, Laborer; and

Whereas, the rates of pay for chauffeurs and related classes, positions requiring generally comparable training and experience, included in the report are more than the rates of pay recommended for the classes of S102, S103, S104 and S106; and

Whereas, Section 151 of the Charter provides that when it is determined that generally prevailing rates of pay for a particular service in private employment or in other governmental organizations are inconsistent with the rates generally prevailing in private employment or other governmental organizations for services requiring generally comparable training and experience, the Board of Supervisors shall fix a compensation for such service that shall be consistent with the compensations fixed by the Board of Supervisors for other services requiring generally comparable training and experience; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Board of Supervisors does hereby propose to amend the rates of pay for the classes of S102, S103, S104 from 85¢-95½¢ to 92½¢ first six months, 95¢ second six months, 97¢ third six months and \$1.00 per hour fourth six months, and S106 from 90¢-97½¢

to 97¢ first six months, \$1.00 second six months, \$1.02 third six months, \$1.05 per hour fourth six months; and be it

Further Resolved, That this proposed amendment be submitted to the Civil Service Commission for review and analysis; and be it

Further Resolved, That the Board of Supervisors recommends these changes in rates of pay to maintain equity for the classes requiring generally comparable training and experience.

#### Discussion.

Supervisor Brown, in discussing the foregoing resolution, announced that he would make a statement later on. So far as individual classifications are concerned, where justification is shown for increases, he was not opposed. The Municipal Railway is short about 100 men. It cannot get them because they are not paying a sufficient scale. For the duration of the emergency the reasonable course to follow would be to pay a wage which would enable the railroad to staff its cars.

Thereupon, the roll was called and the foregoing resolution was *Adopted* by the following vote:

Proposal No. 3896, Resolution No. 3865, as follows:

Whereas, the Civil Service Commission has presented to the Board of Supervisors a schedule of compensations submitted under the provisions of Section 151 of the Charter; and

Whereas, Section 151 of the Charter states "that the Board of Supervisors may approve, amend or reject schedule of compensations proposed by the Civil Service Commission"; and

Whereas, the Board of Supervisors after considering the report of the Civil Service Commission and protests thereon, considers that the report should be amended; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Board of Supervisors does hereby transmit to the Civil Service Commission for review, analysis and report the following changes in the schedule of compensations recommended by the Civil Service Commission; and be it

Further Resolved, That the Board of Supervisors make such recommendations on the basis of their interpretation of the data submitted by the Civil Service Commission and information submitted by protestants and agreements presented by organized groups.

### Discussion.

Supervisor Brown, in discussing the foregoing resolution, and Salary Standardization in general, announced that he had been told that the foregoing resolution involves some 2000 further increases and some 86 decreases, more or less. The general principle behind salary standardization, regardless of meanings that have been read into the Charter, is this:

Taxpayer groups in San Francisco, some employed and some employers, are all concerned with the salaries paid at the City Hall. They are concerned because in some cases they represent a comparable salary to what is being paid for similar occupations, in the case of the employed groups. In the case of the employer it means that he is competing for the services of those classifications with the City Hall. That latter situation has been severely aggravated by the condition that at present exists where the employers downtown and elsewhere in the city are regulated by the War Manpower Commission, War Labor Board and the Treasury Department, and what they may pay in the form of salary increases and in the form of starting salaries. Brackets have been established for the purpose of meeting the requirements in the President's "Hold the Line" order, April 8, 1943, and the supplemental ruling by the Economic Stabilization Director. The War Labor Board, and in my own individual capacity I have had some dealings with them, have established brackets which, in their opinion, represent going rates of pay in this area. For instance, the city provides for Classification B302, Adding Machine Operators, \$160 to \$200 as the wage scale. The bracket of the War Labor Board shows \$113 to \$134. The city's schedule for B454, Telephone Operator, is \$160 to \$190; the War Labor Board's scale is \$113 to \$130. These two instances are ample to show what I am talking about.

I am not in sympathy with the idea of grinding down employees' salaries. It is not my practice in business nor my general attitude



here. I am going to try to vote in accordance with my own conclusions. I am not going along with a classification or proposed range so entirely different from that which the War Labor Board recommends for private employment and practice which I know from my own experience are out of line with those generally prevailing in San Francisco. To the situation formerly existing is now added another which employers downtown must deal with. That is, not only is he placed at a disadvantage in securing employees which he cannot meet by law, but he is placed at a disadvantage in retaining his present employees because he may not by virtue of the law increase salaries in competition with the salaries proposed here for city employees. The city is made up of the people of San Francisco. It should not be competitive with the people of San Francisco unless the people have signified their consent to such competition, for example: the Municipal Railway should not compete in the labor market at a disadvantage, especially during war times, with the people who make up the business life of the community. It should not even suggestively set itself up as an authority on wage scales beyond the opinion which has been secured and set up by the War Labor Board in attempting to establish a ceiling for the express purpose of preventing inflation. The city should not go beyond the program set up by the Federal Government in that direction. To do so is in contravention of the war effort. The Federal Government has said that in its opinion it is essential that the government place a ceiling on labor. It is the express idea of the Federal Government. It is not something with which we should take issue merely according to our own feelings. This proposal goes far beyond the ceilings which the War Labor Board and the Treasury Department are attempting to maintain.

I do not expect to swing any votes here. I am making this statement merely because I want it to be a matter of public record. It shows how I feel. It is just my opinion that the proposed standardization, so called, goes far beyond anything that can be justified in the light of the emergency that confronts us and in the light of what has been established by the Federal Government.

Mrs. Kathleen Dolen reminded the Board that the proposed resolution was merely to refer certain matters to the Civil Service Commission for further report.

Thereupon, the roll was called and the foregoing resolution was *Adopted* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Gallagher, Gartland, MacPhee, Mancuso, Mead, Meyer, Sullivan—7.

No: Supervisor Brown—1.

Absent: Supervisors Colman, Green, Uhl—3.

Supervisor MacPhee, in brief statement as to reasons prompting the recommendations of the Finance Committee, stated the reason that the Committee was making its recommendations was because it was thoroughly familiar with it. The Committee worked on it and spent a great deal of time on it. Those Supervisors who have worked on the matter recommend that the document be sent to the Civil Service Commission as a step in the right direction. Testimony was presented during the day's hearing that white collar workers have worked for twelve years and have received but a \$5 increase in salary.

### RECESS.

After announcing a meeting of the Finance Committee for Wednesday, March 8, at 4 p. m., to consider the administrative provisions of the proposed Salary Standardization ordinance, Supervisor MacPhee moved that the Board recess, to reconvene on Thursday, March 9, 1944, at 2 p. m., to resume consideration of Salary Standardization.

Supervisor Mead requested that unless members of the Board have

been excused from attendance they be requested to attend the recessed meeting at 2 p. m.

#### Supervisor Meyer Excused.

Supervisor Meyer reported that he must attend an important meeting in Los Angeles on Thursday, and asked to be excused from attendance.

*No objection, and excuse granted.*

Supervisor Brown reported that he had been obliged to attend a meeting which had been called two weeks ago. He had intended to be present at the meeting of the Board earlier, but could not. If, when calling special meetings, members could receive more notice, perhaps they could be present.

Thereupon, there being no further business, the Board, at the hour of 6:08 p. m., recessed, to reconvene on Thursday, March 9, 1944, at 2 p. m.

The Board of Supervisors met pursuant to recess to resume consideration of proposed Salary Standardization Schedules.

Supervisor Meyer excused from attendance.

#### Report From Civil Service Commission.

Mrs. Kathleen Dolen presented report of the Civil Service Commission, approved at the regular meeting of that Commission held Wednesday, March 8, 1944. The report reviewed and analyzed the proposed amendments to the Civil Service Commission's recommended compensation schedules pending before the Board of Supervisors. The report showed an estimated increased cost of the proposed amendments to be \$500,765, with an additional estimated increased cost of \$10,847 for overtime worked by classes on a straight time basis, or \$16,270 on a time and a half basis. The proposed amendments affect 3307 employees and 205 employees in related classes. Approximately \$247,625.

*Report to be considered in connection with subject matter of Salary Standardization.*

#### Protest Against Elimination of Salary Increases for Employees Receiving \$300 Per Month or More.

The Clerk presented communication from Municipal Executive Employees Association, protesting proposed elimination of salary increases for employees receiving \$300 per month or more, and requesting that the original recommendations of the Civil Service Commission, in that respect, be approved.

The Chair, in reply to questioning by Supervisor Mead, stated that no such proposal to eliminate salary increases for employees receiving \$300 per month or more had been made.

Supervisor MacPhee reported that at an informal meeting of a few members of the Board, a few evenings previously, such proposal was discussed, but, of course, no action was taken.

### RECESS.

Supervisor MacPhee reported that the Finance Committee was not yet ready to report on the proposed Salary Standardization ordinance, but would be in position to report on Friday, March 10, 1944. Thereupon, he moved that the Board recess, to reconvene, under Call of the Board, on Friday, March 10, 1944, at 2 p. m. Motion seconded by Supervisor Uhl.

The Chair reported that Supervisor Meyer had been excused from attendance.

Supervisor MacPhee, thereupon, agreed that Supervisor Meyer be exempted from the Call of the Board.

Thereupon, there being no further business, the Board, at the hour of 2:25 p. m. recessed, to meet on Friday, March 10, 1944, under Call of the Board (Supervisor Meyer exempted) to resume its consideration of Salary Standardization.

Supervisor Uhl, seconded by Supervisor Sullivan, moved a Call of the Board.

Motion *carried* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Gallagher, Gartland, MacPhee, Mancuso, Mead, Sullivan, Uhl—7.

Absent: Supervisors Brown, Colman, Green, Meyer—4.

Immediately following the foregoing roll call, Supervisor Green was noted present.

Thereupon, the Chair announced that the Board was under Call, and directed that doors be locked, and that the Sergeant-at-Arms be di-

rected, with the aid of a police officer, if necessary, to bring to the chambers all members of the Board not excused from attendance.

**Endorsing Suggestion by the San Francisco Call-Bulletin of Memorial Service Dedicated to the Memory of Miss Esther Richards.**

(Series of 1939)

Supervisor Mead presented:

Proposal No. 3905, Resolution No. . . . . ., as follows:

Whereas, the heroic life and tragic death of Miss Esther Richards has deeply stirred all San Francisco and surrounding communities; and

Whereas, what we say here or do here, can add nothing to the lustre of the crown of immortality which Miss Richards by her life of service to her fellowman, as well as her unfortunate death, has already earned; and

Whereas, that we do not forget in the turmoil of our own lives the nobility so well exemplified in the life and in the death of Miss Esther Richards; be it

Resolved, That the Board of Supervisors in grateful recognition of the superb service Miss Esther Richards has rendered to her fellowman and the supreme sacrifice which has clothed her with the garments of immortality, does hereby heartily endorse the suggestion of the San Francisco Call-Bulletin of a fitting memorial service dedicated to the everlasting memory of Miss Richards; of all the American women serving the same mission; of those six patients and fourteen hospital corpsmen who died with her, and of all our fighting men, and does strongly recommend to all San Franciscans, of all ages, of all faiths, that they avail themselves of the precious opportunity of participating in such memorial service.

*Adopted by the following vote:*

Ayes: Supervisors Gallagher, Gartland, Green, MacPhee, Mancuso, Mead, Sullivan, Uhl—8.

Absent: Supervisors Brown, Colman, Meyer—3.

Following the arrival of Supervisor Brown, Supervisor Uhl moved that the Call of the Board be dispensed with, inasmuch as the two absent Supervisors, one of whom had been excused from attendance, were out of San Francisco.

*Motion failed for want of a second.*

Thereupon, Supervisor Brown moved that Supervisor Colman be excused from attendance, since he was in Los Angeles. Motion seconded by Supervisors MacPhee and Mancuso.

*Motion carried by the following vote:*

Ayes: Supervisors Brown, Gallagher, Gartland, Green, MacPhee, Mancuso, Mead, Sullivan—8.

No: Supervisor Uhl—1.

Absent: Supervisors Colman, Meyer—2.

Whereupon, Supervisor Brown moved that the Board proceed with the business for which it was meeting.

*No objection, and motion carried.*

Supervisor MacPhee announced that the Finance Committee, after discussion with his Honor the Mayor, and other interested parties, was of the considered opinion that the Finance Committee report should not be amended beyond any of the recommendations of the Civil Service Commission. As to the administrative provisions of the Salary Standardization ordinance, he thought the Board should take them up section by section.

Before taking up consideration of proposed Salary Standardization legislation, Supervisor Brown suggested that the doors, which had been locked at the time of the Call of the Board, be opened.

The Chair, however, pointed out that the Call of the Board was still on. Any member of the Board, however, could move that it be lifted.

Thereupon, Supervisor Brown, seconded by Supervisor Mancuso, moved that the Call of the Board having been fulfilled, it be dispensed with.

*No objection, and so ordered.*

### **Seriatim Consideration of Administrative Provisions of Proposed Salary Standardization Ordinance.**

The Clerk read Section 1, as follows:

Section 1. Pursuant to the provisions of Section 151 of the Charter, the schedule of compensations set forth herein shall, beginning July 1, 1944, determine and fix the salaries, wages, and compensations for the several classifications of employment in the San Francisco municipal service and the noncertificated personnel of the San Francisco Unified School District hereinafter enumerated, subject to the terms of this ordinance; provided, however, that the salaries of occupants of permanent positions as of June 30, 1944, shall not be reduced below the salaries such employees were receiving in the same classification on June 30, 1944, for the same number of hours worked.

Mrs. Kathleen Dolen explained Section 1. The section provides method of payment. Last year's ordinance did not specify the San Francisco Unified School District. Salaries as of June 30, 1944, are protected. This year's schedules are based on week of forty hours.

The Clerk read Section 2, as follows:

Section 2. (a) **Method of Payment:** Employees entering the municipal service in any of the specified classifications enumerated herein on or after July 1, 1944, shall be paid the entrance rate provided for their particular classifications in the schedule of compensations herein contained; provided, however, that employees promoted within the service who receive in the lower class a salary higher than the minimum of the compensation schedule for the higher class shall not be reduced to the entrance rate of the promotive class. The compensations of all employees receiving less than the minimum of the schedules specified herein for their particular classifications shall be adjusted to the minimum on July 1. Every employee who entered the service by permanent appointment or was promoted in the service on or before July 1, 1943, shall receive on July 1, 1944, and annually thereafter on July first, the salary fixed for his years of service based on his original date of appointment to a permanent position in his present classification; provided, however, that for the fiscal year 1944-45 and in such other years as the Board of Supervisors shall designate in the annual salary ordinance, each such employee shall receive one full increment as established for his particular classification. Provided further that each employee entering the service by permanent appointment or being promoted in the service after July 1, 1943, shall receive annually one full increment increase as set forth in the compensation schedule established for his particular classification payable on the first day of the month immediately following his anniversary of employment or promotion; provided, however, that no annual increment for such employee shall be allowed if the granting of the increment will establish the compensation at a rate beyond which the employee is entitled by reason of accrued years of service in the class. No employee shall receive more than one salary increment annually, except for adjustment to the proper step in the compensation schedule on the basis of seniority. No increase in compensation shall cause the salary of an employee to exceed the maximum fixed herein for his classification.

(b) Except as provided in Section 2a hereof advancement from the

entrance salary to the maximum salary where such minima and maxima are recommended shall be by annual increment as set forth below, depending upon the amount of range from the entrance to the maximum and the said table of annual increments is hereby made a part of the compensation schedules herein determined.

Mrs. Kathleen Dolen explained Section 2. Section 2 provides method of payment. In the past little attention has been paid to the administrative provisions of the Salary Standardization Ordinance, and as a result, the Civil Service Commission has had difficulty in interpreting what the Board has intended. This year the proposed ordinance provides definitely what is proposed. In this legislation, provision is made so employees can have the proper annual salary increment upon the anniversary date of their employment. That is the standard practice in private employment. It eliminates the provision for payment of salary "one step in advance," in case of promotion to a higher classification. It provides that up to the bracket of an \$80 spread in salary range, the maximum salary for a classification is reached at the beginning of the fifth year. Beyond the spread of \$80, the maximum is reached at the beginning of the sixth year.

The Clerk read Section 3, as follows:

**Section 3. Maintenance.** Salaries and wages set forth in the schedule of compensations herein contained are gross compensations. Deductions shall be made from such salaries or wages, as provided by law, for maintenance or other accommodations and charges therefor shall be fixed by law in accordance with the schedule established in the annual salary ordinance; provided, however, that no charge shall be made for maintenance or other accommodations available to employees in public institutions unless such employees actually receive such maintenance or utilize such accommodations.

No explanation needed.

The Clerk read Section 4, as follows:

Section 4. **Hours of Work:**

(a) Compensations fixed herein on a per diem rate are based on an eight-hour day.

(b) Except as otherwise provided herein, or in the annual salary ordinance, compensations fixed herein on a monthly basis are based on an eight-hour day and a five-day week. In order that there shall be no diminution of service to the public it shall be the duty of the head of each department to stagger, arrange and assign the work of his department so that a skeleton crew will be on duty in each department which is required to be open on Saturday morning for the conduct of public business, and no officer or employee in such department shall work more than a five-day week, except as part of a skeleton crew to keep such office open on Saturday morning, and except as provided in Section 4, subdivisions (e) and (f) hereof. Time worked on Saturday morning as part of a skeleton crew shall be compensated for by equal time off of one half day in the same or succeeding week.

(c) **Night Shifts:** Seven and one-half hours per day and five days per week shall constitute the normal work day and week for employees whose compensations are fixed herein on a monthly basis and who work on night shifts. A night shift is any full time shift which commences after 2 P. M. and prior to 6 A. M.

(d) **Part-time Services:** Except as provided in subdivision (e) herein a daily work schedule of less than eight hours or a night schedule of less than seven and one-half hours shall be considered part-time employment, and compensations therefor shall be fixed in the annual salary ordinance at a rate based upon the full time rate for the classification, proportionate to the hours worked, with due regard to seniority of service. Provided, however, that these provisions will not apply to physicians employed in their professional capacity on a call basis or on a regular consultant basis, compensations for such positions shall be established annually by the Board of Supervisors in the annual salary ordinance.

(e) **Exceptions:** To provide for the uninterrupted operation of the service, employees in classifications included in Division R—Recreation Service, and Division X—Library Service, may work the forty-hour week schedule within six days and shall not be subject to the provisions of Section 4 (g).

(f) No increase or decrease in the number of hours and days worked per week on a regular schedule different from eight hours per day and five days per week shall be allowed except upon approval of the Board of Supervisors in the annual salary ordinance, or as provided herein.

(g) **Split Shift:** A straight shift shall be considered as eight hours work within a spread of nine and one-half hours; a working shift of eight hours over a spread of nine and one-half hours, but not to exceed eleven hours per day shall be considered a split shift, and there shall not be more than one split in any one shift. Employees required to work a split shift shall receive fifty cents per day extra.

Mrs. Dolen explained Section 4. This is the first time that standard hours of work have been recommended for city employees. Schedules are based on a five-day, forty-hour week.

The Clerk read Section 5, as follows:

Section 5. **Holidays:** Monthly employees shall be allowed the following minimum number of holidays off with pay: New Year's Day, Admission Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Thanksgiving Day and Christmas Day. Work on such holidays, and other legal holidays heretofore regularly recognized by departments in 1942, shall be considered as overtime worked; provided, however, that employees in services commonly operating seven days per week, who are required to work on any of the above legal holidays or other legal holidays recognized by depart-

ments in 1942, shall be allowed a day off in lieu of such holiday, in accordance with the rules of the Civil Service Commission. Employees whose regular day off falls on one of these holidays shall be allowed another day off in lieu thereof.

Mrs. Dolen explained Section 5. This is the first time holidays have been listed for recognition by city offices. In answer to Supervisor Brown, who inquired whether or not the number of holidays were being increased, Mrs. Dolen explained that they were being increased only for those departments that had never kept any holidays. She would try to get the cost occasioned thereby, as requested by Supervisor Brown. In reply to Supervisor Mancuso, who suggested that all city departments be limited to six holidays, Mrs. Dolen explained that Charter provisions precluded that.

The Clerk read Section 6, as follows:

Section 6. (a) **Regular work schedules of more than five days of eight hours:** Except as otherwise provided herein, or in the annual salary ordinance, straight time payment shall be made for time worked in excess of five days of eight hours up to and including six days of eight hours on day shifts, or after seven and one-half hours up to and including eight hours per day, and after five days of seven and one-half hours up to and including six days of eight hours on night shifts.

(b) **Emergency Overtime Payment, monthly employees:** Except as otherwise provided herein, or in the annual salary ordinance, overtime shall be paid for emergency work on an hourly basis of one and one-half times the normal rate of pay to all employees who are paid on a monthly basis and who are required to work in excess of eight hours per day, or in excess of a five-day forty-hour week, or who are required to work on regular holidays specified herein and such other legal holidays generally recognized by departments; provided, however, that the maximum overtime payment shall be based on \$250 per month, and no overtime payment shall be made on any portion of an employee's compensation in excess of \$250 per month; and provided further that no overtime payment or additional cost through straight time payment shall accrue for the purpose of keeping city, county, or city and county, or department offices open on Saturday morning, with the exception of busy seasons in the offices of the Assessor, the Tax Collector, and the Registrar of Voters, as provided in the annual salary ordinance.

(c) Compensations fixed herein on a per diem basis and converted to a monthly basis in the annual salary ordinance shall be subject to the provisions of Sections 6 (a) and (b) hereof, unless otherwise provided in the per diem overtime ordinance adopted annually by the Board of Supervisors.

(d) **Exceptions:** No overtime compensation or other payment shall be made to employees in positions established on a part-time basis, and such other officers and employees as are listed in the salary ordinance annually by the Board of Supervisors.

Employees in classifications included in Division R—Recreation Service, and Division X—Library Service, who work a weekly schedule of forty hours in six days or a night schedule of thirty-seven and one-half hours in six days, shall be paid for emergency overtime worked at the rate of one and one-half times their normal rate of compensation for time worked in excess of their regular daily schedule and after forty hours per week. Straight time payments shall be made as provided in Section 6 hereof.

Mr. Arthur Hare, representing institutional workers, urged that time and one-half be paid to institutional workers for all work after five days. Such employees are in the bracket of the lowest paid in the city service. The hospital is greatly understaffed now, and unless some-



thing is done to correct a very serious situation, it will be even more understaffed.

Mr. Frank Moitoza reported that per diem men were protected by union contracts. Municipal employees were not. Culinary workers at the hospital could not, for many years, work more than forty hours per week. Now, under the present labor shortage, they are permitted to work more than forty hours, but with the understanding that they receive time and one-half for overtime.

Mr. John O'Connell reported that the contracts call for forty hours per week, with time and one-half for over forty hours. The institutional workers should be taken care of.

Mr. Roland Davis, representing the C.I.O., agreed with the views expressed by the previous speakers. The Board should change the recommendations and keep up the prevailing practice. The Federal Government has the general practice of paying time and one-half for the sixth day and for time more than forty hours.

Mr. Hardy of the Building Service Association, declared that if the time and one-half should be taken away from the hospital workers, they would be driven out of the city service, where they are greatly needed. As for janitors, time and one-half for the sixth day is paid by everyone. If that is taken away, the Building Service Association will have to take them out of city service and put them into its own service.

Mrs. Dolen explained that the present proposal effected saving of some \$200,000 for time and one-half for all over forty hours per week. \$600,000 includes time and one-half for all classes working more than five days or forty hours.

Supervisor Uhl objected to payment of only straight time for forty-eight hours. That would not be fair.

Mr. Ederley from the Sheriff's department declared that the present proposal would actually cut salaries. No salaries should be reduced under the present conditions.

Mrs. Dolen answered saying that Mr. Ederley now works forty-eight hours per week. After July 1 he would work but forty-four hours. His wages are not being reduced; there is a difference in his working time.

Mr. H. S. Foley, representing Municipal Carmen's Union, protested the adoption of Section 6. Some thirty-seven employees of the "S" Classification will be affected. They should be paid time and one-half for work beyond five days, the same as any other employees.

Mr. Frank Moitoza requested that the Mayor be invited to come to the Chambers of the Board. If the Mayor has made a blanket statement, as reported, that if any amendments should be made to the Civil Service Commission's recommendations, he would veto the entire measure, the Mayor should be present. No one has the right to make such statement without proper consideration.

Mr. Hardy declared that irrespective of what Mrs. Dolen had stated about no salary reduction, if any one gets a reduction in his monthly check, it is a reduction in the amount he has to live on.

Supervisor Mead inquired as to how the Board could correct the situation in view of the Mayor's reported statement that he would veto the entire measure, if it were amended.

Supervisor Uhl also asked what could be done to correct the situation. He was in favor of paying overtime where necessary, as in the case of the nurses and of institutional workers.

Supervisor MacPhee stated that he believed the Board generally was in favor of what was suggested, but it was faced with the necessity of getting a document that would be fair to all parties. He believed that

substantially the Board was in favor of so doing. He did not believe that the majority of the Board desired to jeopardize the rest of the people.

Supervisor Uhl remarked that he believed that the Mayor, having made a statement regarding his intention as to salary standardization he would be willing to come to the Chambers and hear the discussion, and for that reason he would move that the Chair explain the situation to the Mayor and invite him to come to the Board. Motion *failed* for want of a second.

The Chair thereupon stated that he did not know whether the Mayor would be willing to come to the Chambers. However, Supervisor Uhl could invite him to be present, if he so desired.

Supervisor Uhl then moved that the Board approve the particular findings of the Civil Service Commission, which, the Commission reported, would result in the cost of \$600,000 for overtime.

Supervisor MacPhee pointed out that if the Board should make any changes it would be just playing with the city employees. Salary standardization would be killed. He pointed out, too, that there were many amendments that he would like to make.

Mr. Pickel referred to power house operators at Hetch Hetchy. They will be on a 40-hour week, but will have to work the sixth day at straight time, which will in reality make a 48-hour week.

Supervisor MacPhee, in defense of the Mayor's stand, reported that the Mayor had not made any positive statement as to his intentions. However, he had indicated what his ideas were with regard to good procedure. He felt that the report should not be amended beyond what the Civil Service Commission would recommend. He felt that the question of overtime was a very important point to be settled. For that reason, Supervisor MacPhee continued, he was trying to get a document that the Mayor would be willing to approve. After two conferences with the Mayor, he was confident that the requested amendments would not meet with the Mayor's approval.

Supervisor Mead then reported that while the Mayor did not say directly that he was going to veto the measure, he did say that he could not see his way clear to go along with any amendments to the Civil Service Commission's report.

Mr. Frederick Levy, president of the Federation of Municipal Employees, addressed the Board, saying: "Originally I was of the opinion that probably the executive branch of the government did not think very much of the brains or the integrity or understanding of the Board of Supervisors. Mr. Lapham has been declared to be a big, broad-shouldered man. I do not see why in the name of conscience any man, particularly a man of Mr. Lapham's reputation, should hesitate at all to listen to these arguments. He has not heard from the representatives of the employees. Someone has handed him a bill of goods that the Civil Service Commission recommendations are proper and anything the Board of Supervisors proposes is all wrong. You should have him come here and listen to the requests. I think we are entitled to know just what the Mayor stands for. Now we are informed that the Mayor will not listen to anything that the Board of Supervisors will recommend."

Supervisor Uhl suggested that if the Board should adopt the recommendations of the Civil Service Commission in which an overtime cost of \$632,000 was recommended, 52 per cent of which was for institutional and nursing services, etc., all the objections of the various groups would be met.

Mrs. Dolen pointed out that the Board was merely considering the

administrative features of the measure. It is up to the Board to decide what it desires to do.

Mr. Charles Foejm wondered if the day for collective bargaining was over. He had always thought that the bargaining agency was the Board of Supervisors, and he had come to the Board of Supervisors. Now he wondered where to go—to whom to appeal—on behalf of his people. It looks like bargaining days are over, if one man, or one certain group from down town, can make the Board of Supervisors back up, there is something wrong somewhere.

Supervisor Gallagher announced to the Board that he had just been informed that the Mayor was out with the Public Utilities Commission, and would not be back to the City Hall during the rest of the day.

Supervisor Uhl expressed dissatisfaction with the way things were. He would be willing to meet on the next day, and have the Mayor present. Also, Supervisors Colman and Meyer could be present then.

The Clerk then read Section 7, as follows:

Section 7. **Overtime—per diem employees:** Overtime shall be paid all employees whose rates of pay are fixed herein and in the salary ordinance on a per diem basis in accordance with an ordinance to be established by the Board of Supervisors, annually.

No explanation needed.

The Clerk then read Section 8, as follows:

Section 8. **Method of Computation:** In converting per diem rates to monthly rates, the conversion shall be made by using the factor 21.25 days per month for a five-day week, 23.4 for a five and one-half day week, and 25.6 for a six-day week; all of which factors include allowance for the six holidays listed in Section 5 thereof. In figuring conversions, figures shall be rounded to the next highest half dollar.

No explanation needed.

The Clerk read Section 9, as follows:

Section 9. **Intermittent Service:** Permanent employees or temporary employees in classifications for which compensations are fixed herein on a monthly basis, who work less than a five-day week of forty hours as a regular condition of employment, and temporary employees in such classifications in positions which are intermittent in service or subject to irregular working schedules, shall be paid on a daily basis derived by dividing the normal monthly compensation by the factor 21.25 days. The Civil Service Commission shall determine which positions shall be subject to the provisions of this section.

No explanation needed.

The Clerk read Section 10, as follows:

Section 10. **Additional Employment:** No employee covered by the provisions of this ordinance shall accept any employment in addition to his regular city employment, except with the permission of the Civil Service Commission under the provisions of its Rule 36, or any amendments thereto. Employees shall be subject to any penalties provided for failure to comply with the provisions of said Rule 36.

Mrs. Dolen explained that Section 10 was written at the request of downtown groups. It merely activates the rule that has been in effect for several months.

The Clerk read Section 11, as follows:

Section 11. If during any succeeding fiscal year while this ordinance is in effect, it is determined by the Board of Supervisors, upon the recommendation of the Civil Service Commission, that changes in working conditions, hours of labor, or any other administrative provision contained in this ordinance, should be made for the good of the

service, such changes shall be made in the annual salary ordinance so as to reflect the necessary changes in working conditions, hours of labor or other administrative provisions in this ordinance; provided that no such change shall affect the basic compensation schedules provided for herein.

No explanation needed.

The Clerk read Section 11.1, as follows:

Section 11.1. If it shall be determined by any court of competent jurisdiction that any provision, salary or wage fixed in the administrative provisions or the schedule of compensations herein contained is contrary to the provisions of Section 151, or any other provision of the Charter, such determination shall not affect the validity of any other provision, salary or wage fixed in said ordinance and schedule of compensations.

No explanation needed.

The Clerk read Section 11.2, as follows:

Section 11.2. This ordinance shall take effect July 1, 1944.

#### Recess.

Supervisor Mead moved that the Board recess for fifteen minutes in order to permit any groups present to discuss the entire matter among themselves.

Supervisor Brown moved as a substitute that the Board recess until Saturday, March 11, 1944, at 10:00 a. m. Motion seconded by Supervisor Uhl.

Supervisor MacPhee opposed the motion by Supervisor Brown. It is a matter of greatest importance that the Salary Standardization Ordinance be finally passed by the Board on March 20, 1944. If action is postponed, the Board cannot take final action until March 21. Ten days for the Mayor's consideration will bring the matter back to the Board on March 31st. The Mayor may not take a full ten days' time before acting on the ordinance—he has so indicated—but if he should, there would not be sufficient time properly to act on a veto. There will be nothing to be gained by postponement. The Board knows what it wants. The Finance Committee is not in favor of what the Board will have to vote on. However, something will be done for many employees who are entitled to increases in their salaries.

Mr. Schlessinger, representing several classifications of city employees, urged that some action be taken without delay. His group would not be present on Saturday.

Thereupon, the roll was called and the motion to recess until Saturday morning, at 10:00 a. m., was *defeated* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Brown, Uhl—2.

Noes: Supervisors Gallagher, Gartland, Green, MacPhee, Mancuso, Mead, Sullivan—7.

Absent: Supervisors Colman, Meyer—2.

Whereupon, there being no objection, the Board, at the hour of 4:45 p. m., pursuant to motion by Supervisor Mead, recessed.

#### Reconvening of the Board.

The Board, at the hour of 5:08, reconvened to continue consideration of proposed salary standardization ordinance.

Supervisor Mancuso moved that Section 1, heretofore read by the Clerk and explained by Mrs. Dolen, be amended by deleting therefrom, at the end of the section, the words "provided, however, that the salaries of occupants of permanent positions as of June 30, 1944, shall not

be reduced below the salaries such employees were receiving in the same classification on June 30, 1944, for the same number of hours worked." Motion seconded by Supervisor MacPhee.

Mr. H. S. Foley objected to the amendment, holding it to be unfair. Employees should retain their present salaries.

Mr. Perkins, of the Grand Jury, urged a scale for Bailiff of \$225 to \$250.

The Chair ruled that point of order, raised by Supervisor Brown, that question of salary range for bailiffs was out of order, was well taken.

Mrs. Dolen reported that the proposed amendment would, if approved, remove the protection of employees' salaries. The Commission, in its recommendation, has followed through on the basis of the City Attorney's opinion.

Mr. Alfred Smith of the Bureau of Governmental Research questioned the legality of the City Attorney's opinion regarding protection of salaries of city employees.

Mr. Cameron King objected to the proposed amendment, declaring that in another section of the Charter, employees were protected as to their salaries.

After further brief discussion, Supervisor Mancuso, with the consent of his second, withdrew his motion for amendment.

Mr. Walter Duane, on motion by Supervisor Gallagher, was granted the privilege of the floor. Mr. Duane, speaking on behalf of the bailiffs, declared them to be the forgotten men for many years. This year the Civil Service Commission is recommending a slight increase, but it will not make their salaries at all comparable with those paid by other counties. Their scale should be \$225 to \$250 per month.

Supervisor MacPhee reported that the Board was considering the legislation as presented by the Civil Service Commission, with amendments approved by the Commission. Thereupon, Supervisor MacPhee presented the following resolution, prepared by the Civil Service Commission, and recommended by the Commission for the Board's adoption. This resolution contains amendments approved by the Civil Service Commission:

Whereas, on March 7, 1944, the Board of Supervisors considered the proposed compensation schedules presented to them by the Civil Service Commission under the provisions of Section 151 of the Charter; and

Whereas, the Board of Supervisors transmitted to the Civil Service Commission for review, analysis, and report, proposed amendments to 106 classifications included in the compensation schedules recommended by the Civil Service Commission; and

Whereas, on March 8, 1944, the Civil Service Commission adopted a report which reviewed and analyzed the proposed amendments of the Board of Supervisors; and

Whereas, the report of the Civil Service Commission analyzing and reviewing the proposed amendments of the Board of Supervisors to the compensation schedules recommended by the Civil Service Commission was received and considered by the Board of Supervisors at its meeting held March 9, 1944; and

Whereas, the Board of Supervisors has carefully considered the administrative provisions of the compensation schedules as recommended by the Civil Service Commission; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Board of Supervisors does hereby adopt the com-

pensation schedules submitted by the Civil Service Commission with the following amendments thereto:

Resolved, That the Board of Supervisors does hereby adopt the administrative provisions as part of the compensation schedules attached hereto:

Supervisor MacPhee reported that there had been inadvertently omitted from the foregoing resolution, provision for an additional rate of 10 cents per hour for municipal railway car operators while instructing new employees. It is the Finance Committee's recommendation that such addition be included in the resolution, as well as a rate of \$8.50 per day for laborers operating pneumatic tools. This latter is also a recommendation by the Civil Service Commission.

Mr. Jack Leonard, international representative of Laborers, opposed the Finance Committee's recommendation. Laborers were granted an increase by the Wage Adjustment Board on February 21, 1944. The present wage scale is \$1 per hour and the laborers want that scale recognized in the budget for the coming fiscal year. Mr. Leonard objected to the Mayor's attitude with regard to laborers, stating that he was willing to approve increases in salaries for people in his own office, but is denying legitimate increases to the lowest paid employees in the city employ. The laborers now average \$38 per week, but after deductions for taxes, pensions, etc., their actual check is for \$28 to \$32 per week. Consideration should be given to this poorly paid group. Laborers in San Francisco are actually being paid \$1.06½ per hour; cribbers get \$1.21½ per hour. The great majority of the laborers receive from \$8.50 to \$9.60 per day. Many of them get \$1.50 per hour. The pay for city laborers has always been based on other laborers' pay. Longshoremen receive \$1.12 per hour. Helpers on trucks get \$1.40 per hour. They are all laborers. The basic scale in San Francisco is really higher than \$1 per hour. For these reasons, it is requested that laborers' pay be restored to \$1. The laborers are prepared to take the matter into court if the prevailing wage is not paid.

Supervisor Mead, in commenting on the situation, announced that he could not grasp the Mayor's attitude. In addition to the laborers, the machinists' group has a contract which should be recognized.

Mr. Harry Hook, representative of the machinist group, also addressed the Board. Mr. Hook stated that he understood a scale of \$12.30 per day had been recommended for machinists. Now that has been deleted. In private employment, machinists receive a much better wage than that paid by the City and County. He protested the proposed cut and requested the wage of \$12.30 be restored.

Supervisor Mead announced that he was reasonably willing to go

along with a program that would protect the major portion of the city employees. However, he could not make up his mind to go along with anything that has been deleted with respect to wages where there are bona fide contracts existing. He believed an effort should be made, on behalf of interested parties, to let the Mayor know the procedure for the past many years. He believed the Board was in duty bound to recognize legitimate contracts.

Supervisor MacPhee reported that the Board had sent to the Civil Service Commission recommendations that it felt were justified. Those recommendations included laborers, nurses in detention home, and others. They included municipal car operators. The Commission returned them to the Board with a list of those they would be willing to accept and those they would not accept. The Civil Service Commission accepted the laborers but the Mayor made a particular point that he would not accept them. All we could do was to put into the report what the Mayor would accept. We would also like to eliminate some of the things that are unjust, particularly some of the higher brackets. Rather than jeopardize the entire salary standardization we are recommending what we believe will be approved.

Mrs. Dolen announced that the Metal Trades differed from the Building Trades. They do not have one single rate of pay for trades. Metal trades have three rates of pay. It is the recommendation of the Civil Service Commission that the second rate of pay is appropriate for the kind of work being done by the employees in the city service. The rate requested by the machinists is for construction work. It is the opinion of the Commission that the rates recommended are in accord with those generally prevailing.

Dr. Dick Allen, representing Laborers' Local 261, also urged that the recent wage award of \$1 per hour for laborers be recognized. Unless city laborers get that scale many will leave the city service.

Thereupon, Supervisor Uhl, seconded by Supervisor Mead, moved that the pay for laborers be set up at \$1 per hour.

Supervisor Brown agreed with Mr. Leonard that the city pay for laborers had always followed the scales of pay for like work in private industry, and he believed the matter should be explained to the Mayor.

Mr. John O'Connell asserted that he and the other representatives of various groups were going to stand on their original statements to the Board, which they know are justified. If the Mayor wants to veto it, let him do so. Labor will take the chance of having that veto overridden.

Mr. Blackmer, from the Machinists' Union, agreed with the sentiments voiced by Mr. O'Connell.

Mr. H. S. Foley, speaking for the carmen, urged the Board to stand by its recommendations of Tuesday, March 7th. The carmen want \$1 per hour for platform men, \$1.05 for bus operators, and \$240 per month for inspectors. If the Mayor vetoes the ordinance, let him veto it. The men are making no threats but it should be pointed out that they have been working overtime for the past year and one-half, doing double their previous work, and they are getting pretty well fed up with it. They want to get back their eight hour day, otherwise they will get tired and will demand a rest.

#### RECESS.

Supervisor Brown, at the hour of 6:20 p. m., moved that the Board recess, to reconvene at 8:30 p. m.

No objection, and so ordered.

## RECONVENING OF THE BOARD.

The Board of Supervisors, at the hour of 9:05 p. m., reconvened.

### CALLING THE ROLL.

The roll was called and the following Supervisors were noted present: Supervisors Gallagher, Gartland, MacPhee, Mancuso, Mead, Sullivan, Uhl—7.

Absent: Supervisors Brown, Colman, Green, Meyer—4.

Supervisor Brown was noted present at 10:10 p. m.

After very brief discussion, the Board, at the hour of 9:10 p. m., again recessed to meet with the Mayor at his office.

At the hour of 9:35 p. m., the Board again met in the Chambers to resume consideration of the Salary Standardization Ordinance.

### Consideration of Motion Re Salary for Laborers.

Supervisor Mead requested there be included in the motion by Supervisor Uhl, which he had seconded, the words "and related classification," making that motion read "that the pay for laborers and related classifications be set up at \$1 per hour." Amendment accepted by Supervisor Uhl.

Supervisor MacPhee, in discussing the motion, observed that he did not think it would take any particular courage to vote for the amendment. The entire Board wants to vote for it, and wants to see it become effective. The members, though, should consider very carefully whether they would be doing the right thing. The laborers should get \$8 per day. In voting for Supervisor Uhl's motion, the members should recall that the Mayor has stated that he had no alternative except to veto the measure. By voting this amendment, the Board will be assuring the city employees that their salary increases will be lost. The Board must consider that there are people other than the laborers who are entitled to consideration. There are municipal railway employees, employees in the detention home, nurses, machinists, etc. If the Board is going to adopt a measure that will result in nothing except loss to every one, that is what the Board should do, if it thinks it is the right thing. It is very easy to say "yes" to the employees, and mighty hard to say "no," but on the other hand, the results will be wrong, because people who are entitled to raises this year will not get them, as a result of adding laborers' requests to the Board's recommendations. This subject should be kept open a little while longer. Thereupon, Supervisor MacPhee requested that Supervisor Uhl withdraw his motion temporarily, so the entire matter could be discussed further.

Supervisor Uhl stated that he did not think it fair that the Board should consider such an important matter with only seven members of the Board present. He believed the Board should recess until Saturday, at 10:00 a. m., under Call of the Board, and have full membership present.

Mr. Foley reported that the San Francisco Labor Council had adopted a resolution recommending the adoption of the original report of the Finance Committee, and petitioning the Board of Supervisors to approve that report.

Supervisor Mead moved that the Board concur in the recommendations of the San Francisco Labor Council. Motion *failed* for want of a second.

Supervisor Uhl, in further discussing the situation, stated that he believed the Mayor's attitude was predicated very largely on the question of \$1 per hour for municipal carmen. The Mayor is desirous of settling the transportation matter and the purchase of the Market



Street Railway. If the Board approves this new rate, it is simply going to ruin the purchase of the Market Street Railway, because if the wage is increased and the railway is purchased the new scales will be paid employees of the Market Street Railway when taken over by the City and County.

Mr. Leonard, in addressing the Board, stated that he would not like to see anything done that would jeopardize the chance of the laborers getting anything. The increase is fair and legitimate. It has been granted by the War Labor Board. If the motion is voted down the door will be closed on the poorer paid employees of the City and County. There is no reason why the salary standardization ordinance could not be approved, on first reading, as originally recommended by the Finance Committee. On second reading, if necessary, it could be amended and passed as an emergency ordinance.

Thereupon, Supervisor MacPhee stated that Mr. Leonard had a good idea which might be worked out, although not in the manner suggested. He suggested that the salary standardization ordinance be approved by the Board in form that the Mayor might approve, and then, if possible, to pass the legislation subsequently, in an amended form, and as an emergency measure, if the Mayor states that he is willing to go along with other ideas. In the meantime no one else would be jeopardized. It is true that the laborers and the machinists are not included now, but they would not be included if the Mayor should veto the ordinance, nor would any one else be included. The Mayor would be fair enough to meet with the groups of labor. In closing Supervisor MacPhee asserted that it was in his heart to vote for labor, but he was satisfied that in so doing he would be jeopardizing everyone.

Mr. Leonard thereupon declared that he had heard that the Municipal Conference would take the entire salary standardization matter into court. If the laborers are not included in salary standardization at the proper rates, they will take it into court.

Supervisor MacPhee pointed out that in his opinion, if the laborers were not included, the court would be in a better position to order their rates so included, than if they had been included but the ordinance had been vetoed.

Supervisor Mancuso expressed agreement with statement by Supervisor MacPhee. He agreed also with labor that it would be a good thing to have their rates in the ordinance, but it would be to the disadvantage of all the others. The Board would like to put in the \$1 rate for laborers and for platform men, but it would prefer to see the measure adopted and then have the various groups go into court than have the matter vetoed.

Mr. Foehm, in again commenting on the situation, declared that it would appear that the day of bargaining agreements was gone, and it was about time that labor took the matter on. If labor should lose, it would be too bad. Who has the final action here, the Board or the Civil Service Commission? Mr. Foehm asked. And if this is a one-man town, then the dictator is right here in the City Hall, and apparently he is showing his hand right from the beginning.

Supervisor Uhl declared that since there was an agreement between laborers and employers for a rate of \$8 per day, the Board should adopt such rate.

Mr. Ivan Flamm, Secretary of the Municipal Civil Service Association, stated that while the requests made by the laborers were absolutely justified, as well as many of the other requests he wanted to speak for 2600 people who are affected by salary standardization and are affected to the amount of \$944,480, which they will receive if the standardization measure is adopted, and which they will lose if standardization is lost. These people received no consideration last year.

At that time the Board went on record in favor of immediate resurvey to take effect on July 1. The promise was fulfilled, and money was appropriated to conduct the survey. The Commission rendered a report which to a great many of these people was satisfactory. Now they are faced with a situation where they will lose everything, and with no hope for relief. These people are all entitled to their wishes, and they do not believe in going down to a glorious defeat that gives nobody anything. The laborers should get their increases, but in view of the definite threat of veto, the white collar group should not be denied their chance for increases. They are entitled to consideration.

Mr. Moitoza, in discussing the situation, stated that it was true that last year the white collar people were "left out," because of threatened referendum. The Civil Service Commission made one recommendation; the P.A.S. presented another recommendation. Mr. Flamm was one of the leaders for the P.A.S. recommendation; he did not want anything to do with the recommendation of the Civil Service Commission. This year employees should all get together, and go down together, if they must go down.

Mr. Flamm rose to a point of personal privilege, and objected to statements made.

Mr. John McLaughlin, representing Municipal Park Employees Union, announced that there were some 380 gardeners in the Parks for whom increases had been recommended. These increases would be jeopardized if the increased rate for laborers were included in the ordinance. In the Park there were only seventeen laborers.

Mr. Allen objected to some of the sentiments voiced, stating that from the trend of remarks made it would appear that labor is crucifying everyone else in the City Hall. However, labor has a legitimate claim which should receive recognition. He declared, too, that it was the duty of the Supervisors to uphold collective bargaining.

Mr. Leonard pointed out that in 1939, when the Board of Supervisors was in accord with increases for laborers and building trades mechanics, his people took it on the chin and went down to defeat because of a referendum. At that time they had gone along with the "white collar" group. Now they have a legitimate claim; they should not be compelled to "take it" again for the "white collar" group.

Supervisor MacPhee, in explanation of his vote on the motion by Supervisor Uhl that the rate for laborers be set at \$1 per hour, expressed his desire to vote for the motion. However, he felt very sincerely, after three definite conversations with the Mayor, that the measure will be vetoed if the recommendation were included. In view of that fact he would not be able to vote in favor of the amendment. He would cast such vote with a great deal of reluctance, but with the thought that there would still be a chance of saving something out of the situation.

Supervisor Brown pointed out that each year for the past thirteen years he had been a member of the Board of Supervisors, the Board had recognized scales that had been brought to the Board, and that the basis for negotiations has always been the wages paid in private employment. The Civil Service Commission and Mr. Leonard state that \$8 is the scale for laborers in private employment. For that reason he could see nothing to do but to approve such scale. As far as the Mayor's veto was concerned, he had stated earlier in the day, and he would state again, that he would try to convince the Mayor that labor's point of view, and his own, was the correct one. If the Mayor chooses to veto the measure that should not influence the members of the Board in doing their duty.

Supervisor Mancuso announced that he would vote for the amendment, but he wished it known that he thought he would be doing wrong

in so voting. He was convinced that in approving the amendment the Board would be doing exactly what the people affected did not want done, in the long run, in view of the fact that it would lead to a veto by the Mayor. He believed it was a selfish action on behalf of a group which realized the position the Board is in at the present time. The entire salary standardization will be jeopardized. In going along with labor, the Board must go along with the remainder of the recommendations. This will mean only one thing; a veto by the Mayor and no opportunity to override the veto.

Supervisor Mead declared that he did not think he was doing wrong. The only person doing wrong would be the Mayor in vetoing the ordinance.

Supervisor Sullivan announced that he would have to vote "Yes" on the motion.

Thereupon, the roll was called and the amendment was *approved* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Brown, Gallagher, Gartland, Mancuso, Mead, Sullivan, Uhl—7.

No: Supervisor MacPhee—1.

Absent: Supervisors Colman, Green, Meyer—3.

#### Additional Amendments Proposed.

Supervisor MacPhee, following the immediately preceding roll call, announced that he felt that since the situation was then wide open, everybody should be included. For that reason he would move that the rates for the "S" Classification, affecting S102, S103, S104, S106 and S110 be amended to conform to the previous recommendations of the Finance Committee: that is, S102, Conductor; S103, Street Car Operator (Female); S104, Motorman. Rates for those classifications should be 92½ cents per hour for first six months; 95 cents per hour for second six months; 97½ cents per hour for third six months, and \$1 per hour thereafter. S106, Bus Operator, 97½ cents first six months; \$1 per hour for second six months; \$1.02½ for third six months, and \$1.05 per hour thereafter. In addition to foregoing rates, 10 cents per hour additional for Classes S102, S104 and S106, when instructing new employees when so assigned by the superintendent. For Class S110, Inspector, Municipal Railway, rate should be \$200 to \$240 per month. Motion seconded by Supervisor Mead.

Supervisor Uhl moved as a substitute motion, that the Board recess, to reconvene on Saturday, March 11, at 10:00 a. m., under Call of the Board. Motion seconded by Supervisor Brown.

Supervisor MacPhee objected to the motion.

Motion *lost* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Brown, Gallagher, Gartland, Uhl—4.

Noes: Supervisors MacPhee, Mancuso, Mead, Sullivan—4.

Absent: Supervisors Colman, Green, Meyer—3.

Supervisor Uhl, in explanation of his intended vote on motion by Supervisor MacPhee that the original recommendation of the Finance Committee with respect to certain of the "S" Classification be approved, stated he would vote "No." He believed the Mayor was somewhat influenced on the question of a veto, by the proposed rate of \$1 for car men. This proposed recommendation will bring about a veto of the measure. The car men can wait, and the Supervisors can take the matter up at a later date.

Supervisor Brown favored the amendment. The Board has just approved a wage of \$1 per hour for laborers; street car motormen and conductors should be paid no less. It would not make sense. On the

basis submitted there can be nothing other than complete justification for a \$1 per hour rate for platform men.

Motion *carried* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Brown, Gallagher, Gartland, MacPhee, Mancuso, Mead, Sullivan—7.

No: Supervisor Uhl—1.

Absent: Supervisors Colman, Green, Meyer—3.

Thereupon, Supervisor MacPhee moved that the report be amended to include the original recommendations for Classifications M254, Machinist, at \$12.30 per day and M255, Bracemaker, at \$12.30 per day, together with related classifications. Motion seconded by Supervisor Mancuso.

Supervisor Brown opposed the motion, stating that to a large extent, the actions of the Board had been based on the recommendations of the Civil Service Commission. In this classification of M254, Machinist, the Board has a very definite recommendation by the Commission. It was explained earlier in the day why machinist's wage was set as it was. The findings were that the wage recommended by the Commission was comparable to that paid in private industry.

Supervisor MacPhee, in reply, stated that the matter was entirely one for interpretation by the Board of Supervisors.

Mrs. Dolen reported that the Civil Service Commission had recommended what it believed to be the proper rate. However, the matter of final recommendation was up to the Board of Supervisors.

Thereupon, the roll was called and the motion was *carried* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Gallagher, Gartland, MacPhee, Mancuso, Mead, Sullivan—6.

Noes: Supervisors Brown, Uhl—2.

Absent: Supervisors Colman, Green, Meyer—3.

Supervisor MacPhee then moved that the Finance Committee's original recommendation for Class E154, Lineman, and related classifications, be approved.

Mr. Foehn suggested that the related classifications were E150, E152, E151, E160, and E156.

Mrs. Dolen pointed out that Class E156, Cable Splicer, was separate from the other classes mentioned.

The rates recommended were as follows:

E150, Lineman Helper, \$8.50, \$8.75, \$9; E151, Transmission Line Patrolman Helper, \$9; E152, Transmission Line Patrolman, \$13.60; E154, Lineman, \$13.60; E156, Cable Splicer, \$16; and E160, Foreman Lineman, \$14.60.

Motion seconded by Supervisor Mancuso.

Motion *carried* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Gallagher, Gartland, MacPhee, Mancuso, Mead, Sullivan, Uhl—7.

No: Supervisor Brown—1.

Absent: Supervisors Colman, Green, Meyer—3.

Supervisor MacPhee moved that the Finance Committee recommendations with respect to employments in the "P" group be approved. As to P102, particularly, the committee's recommendations were made only after very serious consideration. The rates recommended were as follows:

P2, Emergency Hospital Steward, \$200 to \$225; P203, Senior Emergency Hospital Steward, \$225 to \$250; P52, Public Health Nurse, \$185

to \$215; P54, Supervisor, Public Health Nursing, \$215 to \$250; P102, Registered Nurse, \$160 to \$180; P104, Head Nurse, \$180 to \$200.

Motion seconded by Supervisor Mancuso.

Motion *carried* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Gallagher, Gartland, MacPhee, Mancuso, Mead, Sullivan, Uhl—7.

No: Supervisor Brown—1.

Absent: Supervisors Colman, Green, Meyer—3.

Supervisor MacPhee moved that the Finance Committee recommendations with respect to employments in the "O" group be approved. The specific classifications were O1, Chauffeur, Passenger; O6, Ambulance Driver, and O8, Morgue Ambulance Driver. It has always been the practice of the Board of Supervisors to provide the same rates for such employments as was recommended for Emergency Hospital Stewards, etc. The rates of pay have been similar to rates of policemen. The rates recommended are as follows:

O1, Chauffeur, Passenger, \$225; O6, Ambulance Driver, \$185 to \$225; O8, Morgue Ambulance Driver, \$185 to \$225.

Motion seconded by Supervisor Mancuso.

Recommendations *approved* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Gallagher, Gartland, MacPhee, Mancuso, Mead, Sullivan—6.

Noes: Supervisors Brown, Uhl—2.

Absent: Supervisors Colman, Green, Mead—3.

Supervisor MacPhee moved that the Finance Committee recommendations with respect to employments in the "C" group be approved. The specific classifications were C102, C104, C107, C108 and C110. The rates recommended are as follows:

C102, Janitress, \$140 to \$170; C104, Janitor, \$150 to \$180; C107, Working Foreman Janitor, \$180 to \$210; C108, Foreman Janitor, \$190 to \$220; C110, Supervisor of Janitors, \$230 to \$290.

Motion seconded by Supervisor Mead.

Supervisor Mancuso stated that during discussion of the foregoing classifications it had been agreed that the rates as above recommended were a little too high, and he moved, as an amendment to the previous motion, that the rates be set as follows:

C102, Janitress, \$140 to \$160; C104, Janitor, \$150 to \$175; C107, Working Foreman Janitor, \$175 to \$205; C108, Foreman Janitor, \$190 to \$215; C110, Supervisor of Janitors, \$230 to \$285.

Motion *failed* for want of a second.

Supervisor MacPhee requested that his original motion be considered as including related classifications.

*No objection, and so ordered.*

Thereupon, Supervisor Mancuso announced that he would vote against the motion by Supervisor MacPhee. He felt that the Board would be going out of its way in the proposed increases. They were too high. Outside pay was much lower.

Thereupon, Supervisor MacPhee stated that in view of the fact that Supervisor Mancuso's change of vote would not give enough votes to carry, he would move to accept the proposal by Supervisor Mancuso.

Thereupon, Supervisor Sullivan announced that he favored a \$10 increase in pay for janitors.

Supervisor Mancuso stated that he thought his amendment was really fair, and he would repeat the motion.

Supervisor Sullivan seconded the motion, to get it before the Board, but stated that his second did not mean that he was in favor of the motion.

Thereupon, the roll was called, and the motion *failed to carry* by the following vote:

Noes: Supervisors Brown, Gallagher, Gartland, MacPhee, Mead, Sullivan, Uhl—7.

Absent: Supervisors Colman, Green, Meyer—3.

On motion by Supervisor Uhl, the foregoing recommendations were taken up and voted on seriatim.

However, after reconsideration, the Committee went back in line with the Civil Service Commission. The specific classifications and rates now being recommended by the Committee are as follows:

B352, Storekeeper, \$170 to \$210; B354, General Storekeeper, \$210 to \$260.

Supervisor Uhl, in explanation of his vote, stated that he was influenced greatly by the effect of increased cost of living. The Federal Government and other counties in the State have allowed from 10 to 20 per cent increases due to the increased cost of living.

Supervisor MacPhee moved that the Finance Committee recommendations with respect to employments in the "L" group be approved.

Motion seconded by Supervisor Mead.

The specific classifications and rates now being recommended are as follows:

L152, Dental Hygienist, \$190 to \$240; L202, Dietitian, \$180 to \$210; L206, Chief Dietitian, \$210 to \$250.

Recommendations *approved* by the following vote:

Recommendations *approved* by the following vote:

#### D102, Writ Server, Action Rescinded.

Supervisor Uhl called attention to Classification D102, Writ Server, for which a salary range of \$200 to \$230 had heretofore been approved, stating that he had voted "No" on that classification in error. He desired to change his vote to "Aye" and so would move that the previous action of the Board on said classification be rescinded.

Motion seconded by Supervisor MacPhee.

Motion *carried* by the following vote:

Noes: Supervisors Brown, Mead—2.

Absent: Supervisors Colman, Green, Meyer—3.

Thereupon, Supervisor Mancuso, seconded by Supervisor MacPhee, moved that the Finance Committee recommendation with respect to D102, Writ Server, with salary range of \$200 to \$230 be approved.

Motion *carried* by the following vote:

No: Supervisor Brown—1.

Supervisor MacPhee moved that the Finance Committee recommendation that salary range for J162, Car Repairer Welder, be set at \$11 per day be approved.

Motion *approved* by the following vote:

Supervisor MacPhee moved that the Finance Committee recommendation with respect to employments in the "T" group be approved. Motion seconded by Supervisor Mancuso.

The specific classifications and rates being recommended are as follows:

T2, Attendant, Juvenile Detention Home, \$160 to \$200; T56, Probation Officer, \$200 to \$250; T60, Senior Probation Officer, \$250 to \$290; T157, Social Service Worker, \$185 to \$225.

Mr. Ronald Born, Director of Public Welfare, announced that a Mr. Elkus had presented correspondence to the Board, which he desired to be read.



Supervisor MacPhee reported that Mr. Elkus was very much interested in the social service workers, and he was anxious to see that increased salaries be granted. He desired greater salaries, even than were being recommended.

Mr. Born reported that it was the recommendation of the Public Welfare Commission that salaries paid to social service workers and to probation officers be the same.

Recommendation of Finance Committee was *approved* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Gallagher, Gartland, MacPhee, Mancuso, Mead, Sullivan, Uhl—7.

No: Supervisor Brown—1.

Absent: Supervisors Colman, Green, Meyer—3.

Supervisor MacPhee moved that the Finance Committee recommendation with respect to employments in the "U" group be approved, together with related classifications. Motion seconded by Supervisor Mancuso.

The specific classifications and rates being recommended are as follows:

U52, Supervisor of Collections, \$275 to \$325; U112, Pipe Calker, \$11.36 per day; U116, Servicemen, \$11.36 per day; U114, Main Pipe Foreman, \$11.86 per day; U120, Gateman, \$11.86 per day; U206, Water Department Worker, \$8 per day. Some of the foregoing classifications are related to J4, Laborer. However, they will not conflict with changes in the laborer classification.

Recommendations *approved* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Gallagher, Gartland, MacPhee, Mancuso, Mead, Sullivan, Uhl—7.

No: Supervisor Brown—1.

Thereupon, Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Mead, moved that if the Board has neglected to take into consideration any of the related classifications in the amendments heretofore approved, that they be considered as approved by the Board, so they will receive equal consideration.

Motion *carried* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Gallagher, Gartland, MacPhee, Mancuso, Mead, Sullivan, Uhl—7.

No: Supervisor Brown—1.

Absent: Supervisors Colman, Green, Meyer—3.

Supervisor Uhl moved that the matter of reductions in some salaries of the higher brackets be taken up, or to be more specific, that there be granted no increases in salaries over \$500.

Supervisor Mead opposed such proposal. Motion *failed* for want of a second.

Supervisor Uhl then moved that there should be no increases in salaries where employees are receiving \$400 per month.

Motion *failed* for want of a second.

Supervisor MacPhee then moved that the administrative provisions of the proposed salary standardization ordinance be approved.

Supervisor Brown suggested that before voting on salary standardization itself, the Board should adopt a resolution approving amendments heretofore agreed to by the Civil Service Commission, together with amendments just approved by the Board.

The Chair ruled that such should be the order.

Supervisor Brown, in explanation of his views on proceedings just being concluded reminded the Board of his statement made a few days

earlier. In his consideration of salary standardization he had tried to be consistent. He wanted to go along with the Civil Service Commission's recommendations, but he could not accept the sum total. There were too many brackets that have been adopted by the Board which do not represent the condition actually existing in private employment. Supervisor Brown continued, stating that he was not opposed to anyone trying to get more money for his job. However, the Board of Supervisors has a responsibility to the people who pay the bills, the taxpayers. The Charter is quite specific on how the Board shall determine what employments in the city service should receive. The Charter states, in most cases, at least, that they should receive no higher than the highest prevailing wage in private employment. There is quite a wide scope there. The Civil Service Commission has placed one interpretation on it. It is capable of another interpretation. We have had several independent surveys filed with the Board. For the first time, this year, there has been an impartial survey made by the War Labor Board. Whether the Board agrees with the figures or not, the fact remains that they are here, and the War Labor Board states they are the prevailing brackets, and wages should be kept within those brackets. The recommendations by the Civil Service Commission are in many cases much higher. It is a serious thing for a city like San Francisco to fly in the face of the best evidence submitted by the Federal Government in determining the wage scales that should be paid. Although there is no legal obligation, there exists a moral obligation to give due weight to what the government wishes. If the Board chooses to deviate from that course, the responsibility will rest with the Board. In concluding his remarks, Supervisor Brown stated "I am perfectly willing to accept my share of any responsibility and to vote as I see fit on the resolution about to be presented. I cannot go along with it."

Supervisor Uhl announced that he could not vote to adopt the resolution about to be presented, because such a vote would be a vote in favor of proposed increases for the street car men.

Thereupon, the following recommendation of the Finance Committee was presented by Supervisor MacPhee:

**Adoption of Compensation Schedules Submitted by the Civil Service Commission, Relating to Various Classifications as Amended.**

(Series of 1939)

Proposal No. 3912, Resolution No. 3874, as follows:

Whereas, on March 7, 1944, the Board of Supervisors considered the proposed compensation schedules presented to them by the Civil Service Commission under the provisions of Section 151 of the Charter; and

Whereas, the Board of Supervisors transmitted to the Civil Service Commission for review, analysis, and report, proposed amendments to 106 classifications included in the compensation schedules recommended by the Civil Service Commission; and

Whereas, on March 8, 1944, the Civil Service Commission adopted a report which reviewed and analyzed the proposed amendments of the Board of Supervisors; and

Whereas, the report of the Civil Service Commission analyzing and reviewing the proposed amendments of the Board of Supervisors to the compensation schedules recommended by the Civil Service Commission was received and considered by the Board of Supervisors at its meeting held March 9, 1944; and

Whereas, the Board of Supervisors has carefully considered the administrative provisions of the compensation schedules as recommended by the Civil Service Commission; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Board of Supervisors does hereby adopt the compensation schedules submitted to the Civil Service Commission with the following amendments thereto:

Noes: Supervisors Brown, Uhl—2.

Absent: Supervisors Colman, Green, Meyer—3.

Thereupon, Supervisor MacPhee moved passage of the Salary Standardization Ordinance.

Mr. Arthur Hare, on motion by Supervisor Mead, was granted the privilege of the floor. Mr. Hare requested that the Board restore to the Salary Standardization Ordinance the provision for payment of time and one-half for the sixth day of employment per week of institutional workers.

Supervisors Uhl and Mead both expressed their sympathy with the request.

Supervisor Uhl moved that the Board follow the five-day "set-up" as requested by the Federal Government, and beyond the five days the pay should be on the basis of time and one-half.

Motion *carried* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Brown, Gallagher, Gartland, MacPhee, Mead, Sullivan, Uhl—7.

No: Supervisor Mancuso—1.

Absent: Supervisors Colman, Green, Meyer—3.

Supervisor Mancuso, in explanation of his foregoing vote, stated he had voted "No" because he felt that the motion would mean certain death to the entire Salary Standardization Ordinance.

Supervisor MacPhee thereupon moved that it be the sense of the Board that the Civil Service Commission place in the legislation the proper wording to carry out the intent of the foregoing motion.

*No objection, and so ordered.*

Thereupon, Supervisor MacPhee presented the following:

## Salary Standardization Ordinance

(Series of 1939)

Bill No. 2800, Ordinance No. . . . ., as follows:

An ordinance fixing a schedule of compensations to be paid employees of the City and County of San Francisco and noncertificated employees of the San Francisco Unified School District in certain specified classifications which are subject to the provisions of Section 151 of the Charter and providing for the administration of such schedule and that the said schedule shall become effective July 1, 1944.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco, as follows:

Section 1. Pursuant to the provisions of Section 151 of the Charter, the schedule of compensations set forth herein shall, beginning July 1, 1944, determine and fix the salaries, wages, and compensations for the several classifications of employment in the San Francisco municipal service and the noncertificated personnel of the San Francisco Unified School District hereinafter enumerated, subject to the terms of this ordinance; provided, however, that the salaries of occupants of permanent positions as of June 30, 1944, shall not be reduced below the salaries such employees were receiving in the same classification on June 30, 1944, for the same number of hours worked.

Section 2. (a) **Method of Payment:** Employees entering the municipal service in any of the specified classifications enumerated herein on or after July 1, 1944, shall be paid the entrance rate provided for their particular classifications in the schedule of compensations herein contained; provided, however, that employees promoted within the service who receive in the lower class a salary higher than the minimum of the compensation schedule for the higher class shall not be reduced to the entrance rate of the promotive class. The compensations of all employees receiving less than the minimum of the schedules specified herein for their particular classifications shall be adjusted to the minimum on July 1. Every employee who entered the service

by permanent appointment or was promoted in the service on or before July 1, 1943, shall receive on July 1, 1944, and annually thereafter on July 1st, the salary fixed for his years of service based on his original date of appointment to a permanent position in his present classification; provided, however, that for the fiscal year 1944-45 and in such other years as the Board of Supervisors shall designate in the annual salary ordinance, each such employee shall receive one full increment as established for his particular classification. Provided further that each employee entering the service by permanent appointment or being promoted in the service after July 1, 1943, shall receive annually one full increment increase as set forth in the compensation schedule established for his particular classification payable on the first day of the month immediately following his anniversary of employment or promotion; provided, however, that no annual increment for such employee shall be allowed if the granting of the increment will establish the compensation at a rate beyond which the employee is entitled by reason of accrued years of service in the class. No employee shall receive more than one salary increment annually, except for adjustment to the proper step in the compensation schedule on the basis of seniority. No increase in compensation shall cause the salary of an employee to exceed the maximum fixed herein for his classification.

(b) Except as provided in Section 2a hereof advancement from the entrance salary to the maximum salary where such minima and maxima are recommended shall be by annual increment as set forth below, depending upon the amount of range from the entrance to the maximum and the said table of annual increments is hereby made a part of the compensation schedules herein determined.

Section 3. **Maintenance:** Salaries and wages set forth in the schedule of compensations herein contained are gross compensations. Deductions shall be made from such salaries or wages, as provided

by law, for maintenance or other accommodations and charges therefor shall be fixed by law in accordance with the schedule established in the annual salary ordinance; provided, however, that no charge shall be made for maintenance or other accommodations available to employees in public institutions unless such employees actually receive such maintenance or utilize such accommodations.

#### Section 4. Hours of Work:

(a) Compensations fixed herein on a per diem rate are based on an eight-hour day.

(b) Except as otherwise provided herein, or in the annual salary ordinance, compensations fixed herein on a monthly basis are based on an eight-hour day and a five-day week. In order that there shall be no diminution of service to the public it shall be the duty of the head of each department to stagger, arrange and assign the work of his department so that a skeleton crew will be on duty in each department which is required to be open on Saturday morning for the conduct of public business, and no officer or employee in such department shall work more than a five-day week, except as part of a skeleton crew to keep such office open on Saturday morning, and except as provided in Section 4, subdivisions (e) and (f) hereof. Time worked on Saturday morning as part of a skeleton crew shall be compensated for by equal time off of one-half day in the same or succeeding week.

(c) **Night Shifts:** Seven and one-half hours per day and five days per week shall constitute the normal work day and week for employees whose compensations are fixed herein on a monthly basis and who work on night shifts. A night shift is any full time shift which commences after 2 P. M. and prior to 6 A. M.

(d) **Part-Time Services:** Except as provided in subdivision (e) herein a daily work schedule of less than eight hours or a night schedule of less than seven and one-half hours shall be considered part-time employment, and compensations therefor shall be fixed in the annual salary ordinance at a rate based upon the full time rate for the classification, proportionate to the hours worked, with due regard to seniority of service. Provided, however, that these provisions will not apply to physicians employed in their professional capacity on a call basis or on a regular consultant basis; compensations for such positions shall be established annually by the Board of Supervisors in the annual salary ordinance.

(e) **Exceptions:** To provide for the uninterrupted operation of the service, employees in classifications included in Division R—Recreation Service and Division X—Library Service, may work the forty-hour week schedule within six days and shall not be subject to the provisions of Section 4(g).

(f) No increase or decrease in the number of hours and days worked per week on a regular schedule different from eight hours per day and five days per week shall be allowed except upon approval of the Board of Supervisors in the annual salary ordinance, or as provided herein.

(g) **Split Shift:** A straight shift shall be considered as eight hours work within a spread of nine and one-half hours; a working shift of eight hours over a spread of nine and one-half hours, but not to exceed eleven hours per day shall be considered a split shift, and there shall not be more than one split in any one shift. Employees required to work a split shift shall receive fifty cents per day extra.

**Section 5. Holidays:** Monthly employees shall be allowed the following minimum number of holidays off with pay: New Year's Day, Admission Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Thanksgiving Day and Christmas Day. Work on such holidays, and other legal holidays heretofore regularly recognized by departments in 1942, shall be considered as overtime worked; provided, however, that employees in services commonly operating seven days per week, who are required to work on any of the above legal holidays or other legal holidays recognized by departments in 1942, shall be allowed a day off in lieu of such holiday, in accordance with the rules of the Civil Service Com-

mission. Employees whose regular day off falls on one of these holidays shall be allowed another day off in lieu thereof.

**Section 6. Overtime—Monthly Employees:**

(a) Except as otherwise provided herein, or in the annual salary ordinance, overtime shall be paid on an hourly basis of one and one-half times the normal rate of pay, to all employees who are paid on a monthly basis and who work in excess of eight hours per day or in excess of five days of forty hours per week, or seven and one-half hours per night and in excess of five nights of thirty-seven and one-half hours per week on night shifts, or who work on regular holidays specified herein, and such other legal holidays generally recognized by departments; provided, however, that the maximum overtime payment shall be based on \$250 per month and no overtime payment shall be made on any portion of an employee's compensation in excess of \$250 per month; and provided, further, that no overtime payment or additional cost shall accrue for the purpose of keeping City, County, or City and County, or department offices open on Saturday morning, with the exception of "busy seasons" in the offices of the Assessor, the Tax Collector, and Registrar of Voters, as provided in the annual salary ordinance.

(b) Compensations fixed herein on a per diem basis and converted to a monthly basis in the annual salary ordinance shall be subject to the provisions of Section 6(a) hereof, unless otherwise provided in the per diem overtime ordinance adopted annually by the Board of Supervisors.

(c) **Exceptions:** No overtime compensation or other payment shall be made to employees in positions established on a part-time basis, and such other officers and employees as are listed in the salary ordinance annually by the Board of Supervisors.

Employees in classifications included in Division R—Recreation Service, and Division X—Library Service, who work a weekly schedule of forty hours in six days or a night schedule of thirty-seven and one-half hours in six days, shall be paid for overtime worked at the rate of one and one-half times their normal rate of compensation for time worked in excess of their regular daily schedule and after forty hours per week.

**Section 7. Overtime—Per Diem Employees:** Overtime shall be paid all employees whose rates of pay are fixed herein and in the annual salary ordinance on a per diem basis in accordance with an ordinance to be established by the Board of Supervisors annually.

**Section 8. Method of Computation:** In converting per diem rates to monthly rates, the conversion shall be made by using the factor 21.25 days per month for a five-day week, 23.4 for a five and one-half day week, and 25.6 for a six-day week; all of which factors include allowance for the six holidays listed in Section 5 hereof. In figuring conversions, figures shall be rounded to the next highest half dollar.

**Section 9. Intermittent Service:** Permanent employees or temporary employees in classifications for which compensations are fixed herein on a monthly basis, who work less than a five-day week of forty hours as a regular condition of employment, and temporary employees in such classifications in positions which are intermittent in service or subject to irregular working schedules, shall be paid on a daily basis derived by dividing the normal monthly compensation by the factor 21.25 days. The Civil Service Commission shall determine which positions shall be subject to the provisions of this section.

**Section 10. Additional Employment:** No employee covered by the provisions of this ordinance shall accept any employment in addition to his regular city employment, except with the permission of the Civil Service Commission under the provisions of its Rule 36, or any amendments thereto. Employees shall be subject to any penalties provided for failure to comply with the provisions of said Rule 36.

**Section 11.** If during any succeeding fiscal year while this ordinance



is in effect, it is determined by the Board of Supervisors, upon the recommendation of the Civil Service Commission, that changes in working conditions, hours of labor, or any other administrative provision contained in this ordinance, should be made for the good of the service, such changes shall be made in the annual salary ordinance so as to reflect the necessary changes in working conditions, hours of labor or other administrative provisions in this ordinance; provided that no such change shall affect the basic compensation schedules provided for herein.

Section 11.1 If it shall be determined by any court of competent jurisdiction that any provision, salary or wage fixed in the administrative provisions or the schedule of compensations herein contained is contrary to the provisions of Section 151, or any other provision of the Charter, such determination shall not affect the validity of any other provision, salary or wage fixed in said ordinance and schedule of compensations.

Section 11.2. This ordinance shall take effect July 1, 1944.

Section 12. The compensation schedule for classifications included in Division A—BUILDING TRADES SERVICE, as set forth in the Civil Service Commission's classifications of positions are as follows, subject to the provisions of this ordinance:

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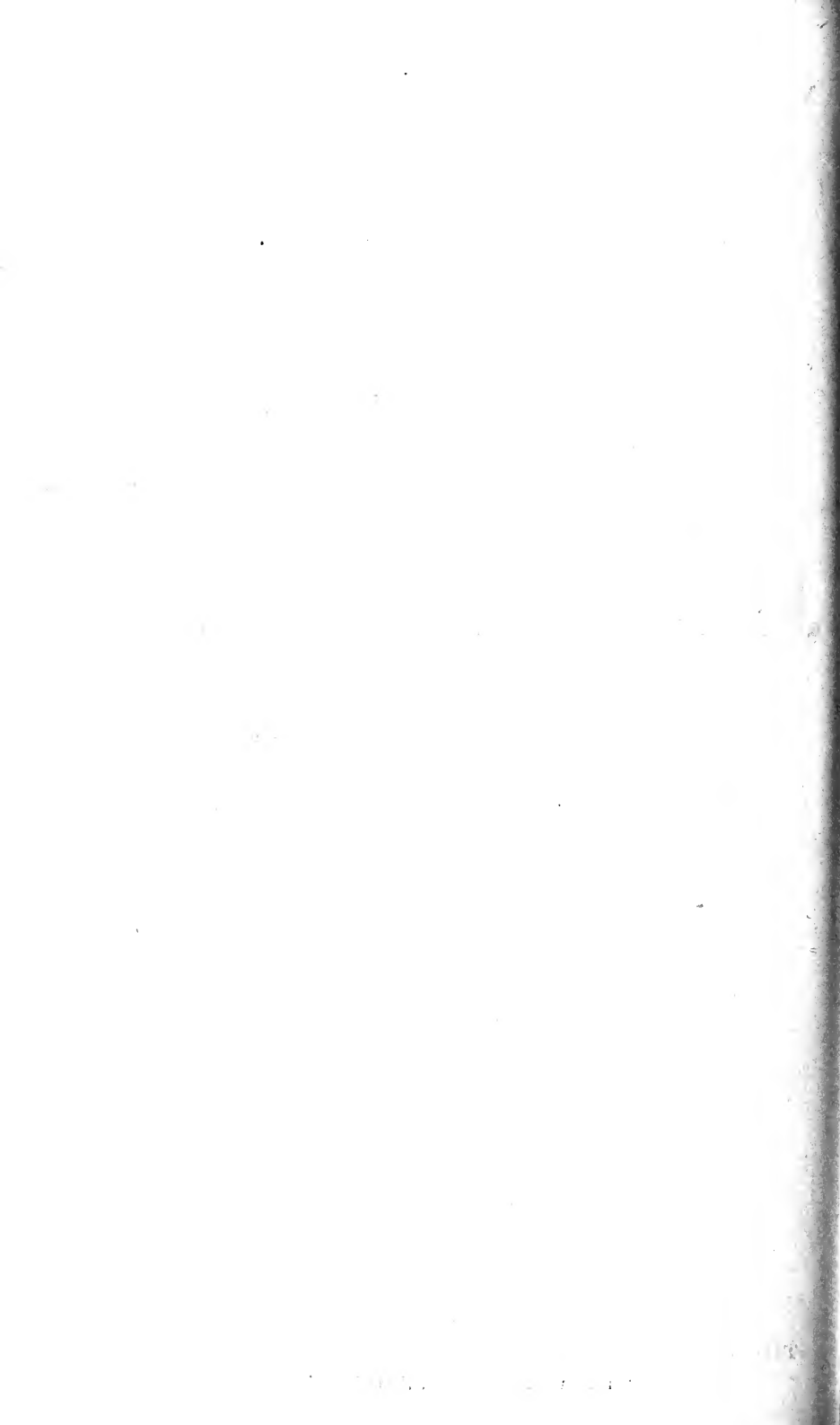

### SPECIAL ORDER—2:30 P. M.

**Authorizing and Directing Cancellation of Taxes Upon Property Acquired and Owned by the Housing Authority of the City and County of San Francisco and Authorizing and Directing Cancellation of Tax Sales to the State of California or Other Subdivisions.**

(Series of 1939)

Bill No. 2762, Ordinance No. . . . ., as follows:

Authorizing and directing cancellation of taxes upon property acquired and owned by the Housing Authority of the City and County of San Francisco and authorizing and directing cancellation of tax sales to the State of California or other subdivisions.

Whereas, the Housing Authority of the City and County of San Francisco has acquired, and now owns, various parcels of real property in the City and County of San Francisco for the purpose of carrying out the provisions of law under which said authority was organized; and

Whereas, upon said property so acquired and owned by the Housing Authority of the City and County of San Francisco, there are existing various liens of taxes and assessments, including the lien of taxes for the fiscal years 1941-42, 1942-43 and 1943-44; and

Whereas, pursuant to the provisions of Section 3, Chapter 1 of the laws passed at the special session of the Legislature of the State of California in 1938, approved March 21, 1938, it was by act provided that the property of Housing Authorities shall be exempt from all taxes and special assessments of the State, or any city, city and county, county, town or political subdivision of the State; and

Whereas, in the Municipal Cooperation Agreement between the City and County of San Francisco and the Housing Authority of the City and County of San Francisco, it is provided:

"The City agrees that during the period commencing with the date of acquisition of any part of the site or sites for each project and continuing throughout the useful life of such project, it will not levy, impose, or charge any taxes or special assessments against the project or against the Authority . . ."

and

Whereas, the City Attorney of the City and County of San Francisco has given his written consent to the cancellation of such taxes and special assessments as provided in Section 3804a of the Political Code of the State of California;

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco, as follows:

. That all liens for taxes and assessments on any property acquired and owned by the Housing Authority of the City and County of San Francisco, for the purposes for which said Authority has been organized, be, and the same hereby are, canceled, in conformity with the provisions of Section 3804a of the Political Code of the State of California, and the Assessor, Tax Collector and all public officers having custody of the records of said taxes and assessments are hereby ordered and directed to cancel the same and to take no action for the collection thereof; that the Assessor, Tax Collector and all public officers having custody of the record of any certificate of sale or deed issued to the State or other subdivision for nonpayment of any tax or assessment upon real property acquired and owned by the Housing Authority of the City and County of San Francisco, be and he hereby is directed to cancel such certificates or deeds.

Approved and recommended by the City Attorney.

#### Discussion.

The Assessor reported that the Housing Authority has indicated that it would pay some \$86,000 in lieu of taxes on its properties. However, the taxes on properties owned by the Housing Authority, is assessed on same basis as are other properties, should return to the City and County a tax of \$125,000 instead of \$86,000. The Authority has agreed that it will pay an amount higher than the \$86,000 originally agreed upon. The Authority has agreed to pay full amount of taxes on Chinatown and North Beach projects. The Authority will pay \$125,000 on permanent projects; \$150,000 on temporary structures; \$17,750 on Chinatown-North Beach projects. There is no reason, under the present circumstances, why taxes should not be continued on properties.

Mr. Charles Christin, representing Owners and Lessees' Association, asked that action be deferred until the City and County had a more comprehensive proposition from the Housing Authority. He suggested that matter be postponed until more information is available.

The City Attorney advised that the properties of the Housing Authority were exempt from taxes under the law. The Assessor has pointed out that if the properties were ever returned to private ownership, the taxes now levied against the properties will still be a lien thereon.

The Assessor reported that in his opinion, it was an open question that had not yet been decided by the courts whether taxes could be levied upon Housing Authority properties.

The City Attorney explained that he had never advised that it was mandatory to cancel taxes; he had stated that the taxes, if levied, could not be collected.

The Assessor, in reply to questioning by Supervisor MacPhee, stated that only the one lien, already existing, would be on properties if the taxes were not cancelled. However, the whole question was one of policy to be determined by the Board of Supervisors. The amount of "in lieu payment" was solely up to the Authority.

Supervisor Colman announced that he was in favor of voting for the matter as it appeared on the Calendar. The Board of Supervisors went into the matter very thoroughly on first granting the Authority the right to purchase properties. The Board, at that time, thought that no

taxes at all would be paid. Now conditions have changed. Tenants are no longer in the low income bracket. The Authority has a substantial revenue, and the City and County is getting a large percentage of the amount it would ordinarily receive as taxes. San Francisco may again be faced with the same problem of providing a decent place for people to live in which private capital cannot afford to provide. He, Supervisor Colman continued, would hate to see the step forward created by the founding of the low cost housing projects be endangered. For that reason, he would vote in favor of the bill as it is presented.

**Postponement.**

Thereupon, Supervisor MacPhee moved that, in view of the request for postponement in order to make a further investigation, and because the Assessor is at present making such investigation, further consideration be postponed for two weeks. Motion seconded by Supervisor Uhl.

*No objection, and further consideration postponed.*

Whereas, between October 1, 1940, and April, 1943, the City and County of San Francisco, through its Public Welfare Department, has paid to George N. Folker, the father of Herbert Folker, the sum of \$930; and

Whereas, an action has been instituted by the City and County of San Francisco, at the request of the Public Welfare Department, against said Herbert Folker to recover said sum of \$930; and

Whereas, it appears from the reports of the Public Welfare Department that there is no liability resting on said Herbert Folker to **make**

any refund of said amounts paid as old age security to his said father for the reason that said Herbert Folker became an emancipated minor by reason of the desertion of his family by his said father, George N. Folker, and for the said reason said Public Welfare Department recommends that said action against said Herbert Folker, on account of old age security advanced to his said father, George N. Folker, be dismissed; and

Whereas, said City and County of San Francisco, through its Public Welfare Department, between the dates of May 1, 1940, and April, 1943, advanced to Alice Folker, the mother of said Herbert Folker, the sum of \$1,080 as old age security; and

Whereas, said Herbert Folker has offered to pay the sum of \$100 on account of said moneys heretofore advanced by the City and County as old age security to said Alice Folker and to continue to pay \$15 per month commencing July 1, 1943, for the future support and maintenance of said Alice Folker; and

Whereas, the said Public Welfare Department has recommended that the said offer of said Herbert Folker to reimburse the City and County in the sum of \$100 and to pay \$15 per month, beginning July 1, 1943, for the support and maintenance of said Alice Folker, be accepted and the said litigation be settled and compromised;

Now, therefore, be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco that the City Attorney be and he is hereby authorized to dismiss the action against said Herbert Folker for old age security to his father, George N. Folker, and to settle and compromise the action against said Herbert Folker for old age security paid to his mother, Alice Folker, upon payment of the sum of \$100 and the further sum of \$15 per month commencing July 1, 1943.

Section 1. The sum of \$3,604.68 is hereby appropriated from Appropriation No. 930, "Salvage for Victory Fund," to the credit of Appropriation No. 930.2, to provide funds for the payment of scavenger bills for the collection of tin cans.

Section 2. This ordinance is passed as an emergency measure, the nature of such emergency being as follows: It is necessary to provide funds for the above purpose in order to continue without interruption services performed by the Citizens' Service Corps, Civilian War Council.

This ordinance is passed as an emergency measure and the Board of Supervisors does hereby declare by the vote by which this ordinance is passed that an actual emergency exists in order to provide for the uninterrupted operation of the San Francisco Airport, particularly serving the needs of the United States Government in the war effort.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco, as follows:

Section 1. The sum of \$4,500 is hereby appropriated from the surplus existing in Appropriation 312.500.57 (San Francisco Zoo Amphitheatre) to the credit of Appropriation 312.400.02 (Equipment—Zoo Division) to provide funds for the replacement of one male giraffe for the San Francisco Zoological Gardens.

Section 2. The subject funds were appropriated for the construction of an amphitheatre at the San Francisco Zoological Gardens. Inasmuch as wartime restrictions on construction materials make the acquisition of the materials and supplies needed for the project, virtually unobtainable, the construction of the amphitheatre has been abandoned, thereby creating a surplus of \$4,500 in Appropriation 312.500.57 (San Francisco Zoo Amphitheatre).

Recommended by the Superintendent of Parks.

Approved by the Park Commission.

Approved as to form by the City Attorney.

Approved as to funds available by the Controller.

Approved by the Mayor.

March 6, 1944—*Consideration postponed until Monday, March 13, 1944.*

**Discussion.**

Mr. Herbert Fleishhacker, after urging approval of the requested appropriation, asked that Mr. L. Wilson, Park Commission, be permitted to present further argument in support of the Park Commission's request.

Mr. Wilson declared that San Francisco wants a good Zoological Garden, and that gifts are out of the question. Another giraffe is needed, and the only way to obtain it is by purchase. San Francisco has an opportunity to obtain a giraffe at a saving of about \$4,000.

Supervisor MacPhee, in discussing the proposed appropriation, stated that the question to be determined was whether or not San Francisco wanted to go into the business of raising giraffes, or whether three giraffes are enough for a showing. For the present, Supervisor MacPhee believed, San Francisco has enough giraffes to make a good showing. Perhaps in the future someone might make a gift to the city of a giraffe.

Supervisor Colman announced that if the Park Commission wanted to spend its own money for a giraffe, he was for it. He believed the Commission was competent to run its own department. Thousands of people visit the Zoo and get a great deal of pleasure there.

Mr. Fleishhacker warned the Board that a delay in approving the requested appropriation might result in an increased cost to the city.

Supervisor Mead announced that he would not like to see anything happen to San Francisco's Zoo, but he felt that for the time being it was amply filled. He did not think it was good business to spend \$4,500 for another giraffe at this time; he believed such expenditure, during the war period, was somewhat out of line, particularly in view of the attitude of some people who refuse to pay prevailing wages to common ordinary labor, or for conductors and street car operators. They do not want to pay a decent wage, but they want to spend \$4,500 for a giraffe.

Supervisor Mancuso stated that during the past two weeks the Board had passed two appropriations for the Park Commission to which he objected. He would be more in favor of this appropriation than he was of those two other appropriations.

Mr. Wilson, in closing remarks in support of the requested appropriation, expressed regret that the question of salaries should have been brought up in connection with that of a proper expenditure for the Zoo. The question was, though: do you want a balanced Zoo, or do you want it unbalanced—completely on one side? Supervisor MacPhee may be willing to wait two or three years, but nature doesn't wait on any man.

Thereupon, the roll was called and the foregoing bill was *Passed for Second Reading* by the following vote:

#### **Recommending the Adoption of Senate Constitutional Amendment No. 2.**

(Series of 1939)

Proposal No. 3886, Resolution No. 3878, as follows:

Whereas, the Senate of the State of California, the Assembly concurring, has presented to the electors of the State of California an amendment to Section 1 of Article XIII of the Constitution of California, which removes the prohibition against the taxation of property owned by the United States; and

Whereas, the United States during the past three years has acquired large holdings of real property including buildings and improvements thereon throughout the State of California and especially in the City and County of San Francisco; and

Whereas, the exemption of this property from taxation is an additional and unfair burden upon the other owners of real property in the City and County of San Francisco; and now, therefore, be it

Resolved, by the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco that it heartily endorses said Constitutional Amendment No. 2 to be voted upon by the people of the State of California on May 16, 1944, and urges all the electors of the City and County of San Francisco to vote in favor of said amendment, to the end that property owned by the United States in the City and County of San Francisco and throughout the State of California may bear a fair proportion of the taxes assessed against other property in the City and County and throughout the State of California; be it

Further Resolved, That the President of the Board of Supervisors be and he is hereby authorized to appoint a committee in such numbers as he shall deem proper for the purpose of giving publicity to said Constitutional Amendment No. 2 and obtaining the support of the electors of the City and County of San Francisco for a favorable vote on said amendment.

*March 6, 1944—Consideration postponed until Monday, March 13, 1944.*

#### Statement by Supervisor Brown.

Supervisor Brown announced that he had opposed the adoption of the foregoing proposal on March 6, 1944, on the ground that it would accomplish no real good, since the Federal Government must secure money to pay taxes by levying taxes on the general public. Since then he had looked into the matter further. In several of the lesser populated states most of the property is in the hands of the Federal Government. That condition is not true of some of the more densely populated eastern states. This measure would have a beneficial effect on California and certain other western states. Under the circumstances, it would be appropriate to pass the foregoing proposal, although the net effect in taxation, country wide, would add additional expense in tax revenue. He would withdraw his objection.

Thereupon, the roll was called and the foregoing proposal was *Adopted* by the following vote:

Subsequent to the adoption of the foregoing proposal, and under his name on Roll Call, Supervisor Uhl suggested that Assemblyman Maloney be invited to draft an argument in support of Senate Constitutional Amendment No. 2 for insertion with sample ballots to be sent to the voters by the Registrar.

The Chair suggested that Supervisor Uhl prepare a proper resolution therefor for reference to the Judiciary Committee.

#### Adopted.

**Requesting City Attorney to Prepare Legislation as Will Provide for Reinstatement of All Municipal Employees Who Were Forced to Relinquish Their Positions in Order to Serve in Agencies Connected With Our Fighting Forces and Will Provide for Leaves for Persons Desiring to Serve in Those Agencies.**

(Series of 1939)

Proposal No. 3893, Resolution No. 3889, as follows:

Whereas, as a result of the heroic death of Miss Esther Richards, former employee of the Public Welfare Department, it has come to the attention of this Board of Supervisors that many employees of the City and County of San Francisco believing prosecution of the war effort to be of supreme importance and desiring to lend competent assistance to that end, are either precluded the opportunity to serve, or as an alternative are required to resign their city positions and relinquish the benefits incident thereto; and

Whereas, this anomalous situation arises as a result of the policy of certain commissions of the City and County of San Francisco to the effect that leaves of absence for incidental services necessary to the war effort shall not be granted to municipal employees whose services for the city are similar to those proposed to be entered into while on leave; and

Whereas, such a policy has undoubted merit insofar as certain home-front operations are concerned but is wholly unjustified as relates to leaves of municipal employees for service closely allied with combat duty, including care of and ministrations to the physical and moral well-being of our fighting or incapacitated service men and women; and

Whereas, such a policy seems neither fair to municipal employees nor conducive to the best interests of our service men and women; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the City Attorney be and is hereby requested to prepare and submit to this Board as soon as possible, such proposed legislation as will:

1. Provide for the reinstatement, with all those benefits which would have accrued but for their resignations, of all those municipal employees who were required to relinquish their positions in order to serve in those agencies immediately adjunctive to our fighting forces, either for their physical or moral well-being.

2. Establish a mandatory procedure which, in future, will permit of leaves of absence for municipal employees desiring to serve in the agencies heretofore referred to.

*Adopted by the following vote:*

#### Final Passage.

**Approving Rule 31.2 of the Civil Service Commission Providing for Leaves of Absence to Officers and Employees of the City and County of San Francisco for the Purpose of Accepting Other Employment Directly Connected With the Prosecution of the War or National Defense or Preparedness and Making Said Rule Retroactive to April 21, 1943, Declaring Bill No. 2088, Ordinance No. 2082 (Series of 1939), Invalid and Repealing Same; an Emergency Ordinance.**

(Series of 1939)

Bill No. 2790, Ordinance No. 2638, as follows:

Approving Rule 31.2 of the Civil Service Commission providing for leaves of absence to officers and employees of the City and County of San Francisco for the purpose of accepting other employment directly connected with the prosecution of the war or national defense or preparedness and making said rule retroactive to April 21, 1943, declaring Bill No. 2088, Ordinance No. 2082 (Series of 1939) invalid and repealing same. An emergency ordinance.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco, as follows:

Section 1. On the recommendation of the Civil Service Commission and by a three-fourths vote, the Board of Supervisors hereby approves rule 31.2 of the Civil Service Commission, providing for the granting of leaves of absence to officers and employees of the City and County to accept employment directly connected with the prosecution of the war in which this country is engaged or with national defense or preparedness, subject to the terms and conditions of said rule, which is as follows:

#### **RULE 31.2**

##### **Military Leaves (for Non-Military Service in the War Effort.)**

(a) The Civil Service Commission may grant leaves of absence to officers and employees of the City and County, except members of the Police and Fire Departments, for the purpose of accepting employment



in service directly connected with the prosecution of the war or national defense or preparedness when, in its judgment, the Civil Service Commission determines that the officer or employee making application therefor possesses a skill which is needed in the war effort or national defense or preparedness and such skill is not utilized in his municipal employment, or if such officer or employee is utilizing such skill in his municipal employment, the Civil Service Commission determines that the granting of such leave will not disrupt or curtail essential municipal services.

(b) The Civil Service Commission shall grant such leaves to officers and employees only if the Civil Service Commission determines that the proposed employment is directly connected with the prosecution of the war or with national defense or preparedness, and that the granting of such leave would further the war effort or national defense or preparedness and would not disrupt or curtail essential municipal services. Appointment of a new person to replace an employee granted leave under this rule shall continue only for the period of such leave.

(c) Such leaves as may be granted under the terms of this rule may continue for the duration of the war emergency and not longer than three months after the cessation of hostilities. Such leaves shall be automatically terminated if the officer or employee either voluntarily or involuntarily leaves the service for which the leave was granted. In the event the officer or employee leaves the service for which the leave was granted, such officer or employee shall forthwith report to the Civil Service Commission for return to duty in his municipal employment or he may file a new request with the Civil Service Commission in the same manner as provided herein for the original request if he desires to accept other work directly connected with the prosecution of the war or national defense or preparedness. In the event the officer or employee desires to return to his municipal position he shall be returned to duty therein if a position of his classification and under his appointing officer is available to which such officer or employee is eligible, according to his years of service, under the rules of the Civil Service Commission, and if no such position is available he shall assume the status of a holdover as defined by the rules of the Civil Service Commission and shall be entitled to the benefits thereof as provided by rule of the Civil Service Commission. In the event that a request is filed for a new leave, the officer or employee must show evidence of satisfactory service in the position in the war effort for which the previous leave or leaves were granted.

(d) If any officer or employee is granted a military leave (for non-military service in the war effort) pursuant to the provisions of this rule and during the period that such leave is in force, such officer or employee becomes subject to lay-off under the rules of the Civil Service Commission governing reduction in force, the military leave (for non-military service in the war effort) shall thereupon be automatically terminated and the employee shall be laid off in accordance with the rules of the Civil Service Commission governing reduction in force and shall be governed thereafter by the provisions of such rule.

(e) Officers and employees serving probationary periods under civil service appointment or serving under limited tenure appointments shall not be granted leaves under the provisions of this rule. Periods of leave granted under this rule shall not be calculated as City and County Service, except for purposes of the Retirement System as provided in Section 161 of the Charter.

(f) Leaves granted under the provisions of this rule shall be designated military leaves (for non-military service in the war effort). Application therefore shall be made by the officer or employee on forms provided by the Civil Service Commission and shall contain the information requested therein. Requests for military leave (for non-military service in the war effort) shall be filed by the officer or employee with

the appointing officer under whose jurisdiction he serves. The appointing officer shall either approve or disapprove the request and shall without delay forward the request of the officer or employee with or without his approval to the Civil Service Commission for action. The Civil Service Commission shall investigate the circumstances of the request of the officer or employee and shall consider all of the circumstances in connection therewith and shall thereupon approve or disapprove the request of the officer or employee in accordance with its judgment. The appointing officer shall indicate on the request whether the position will be filled during the absence of the officer or employee requesting the leave. If the appointing officer disapproves such request, he shall state his reasons therefor. The action of the Civil Service Commission in approving or disapproving a request for military leave (for non-military service in the war effort) shall be final.

(g) No officer or employee granted military leave (for non-military service in the war effort) under the terms of this rule shall be entitled to any salary or compensation for any portion of such leave of absence, nor shall compensation for such officer or employee for any portion of such leave be approved or paid by any officer or employee of the City and County.

Section 2. Under the provisions of this ordinance, Rule No. 31.2 of the Civil Service Commission be and it is hereby made retroactive to the 21st day of April, 1943.

Section 3. Bill No. 2088, Ordinance No. 2082 (Series of 1939) finally passed by the Board of Supervisors on April 19, 1943, and approved by the Mayor on April 21st, not having received the requisite number of votes as required by Section 153 of the Charter the same is hereby declared to be invalid and the same is hereby repealed.

Section 4. This ordinance is passed as an emergency ordinance and the Board of Supervisors does, by the vote by which this ordinance is passed, declare that an actual emergency exists which necessitates this ordinance becoming effective forthwith, the nature of said emergency being as follows: Under and pursuant to the provisions of the aforesaid rule of the Civil Service Commission many persons have been granted leaves of absence thereunder and it is necessary for the uninterrupted operation of many of the departments and offices of the City and County of San Francisco that this ordinance becomes effective forthwith.

Approved as to form by the City Attorney.

#### Discussion.

Supervisor MacPhee, in discussing the foregoing bill, pointed out that it was intended to correct an error previously made by the Board in passing an ordinance with only eight votes instead of nine votes as required.

Supervisor Brown announced that he had not objected to the preceding matter just adopted, because he did not want to oppose the restoration of rights of those who might have been affected by an error of the Board of Supervisors. However, he was opposed to this item under consideration, because he felt it was going too far. Where men actually enter the armed forces, merchant marine or combat activities of the United States Government, well and good, but to leave the city employ and take another position, seems to me to be the responsibility of the employee and not the responsibility of the city government. He could see no reason why employees should be allowed to change their military status by taking defense jobs, and then retain their city rights.

Supervisor MacPhee, in reply, stated that Supervisor Brown was reciting the exception rather than the rule. The Manpower Commission has asked for this legislation. There were many skilled mechanics

doing other than mechanical work who were needed in the war effort. The Civil Service Commission, before granting leaves of absence, require persons be qualified by experience and skill. The Commission requires, also, approval by the department head.

Supervisor Brown then stated that he understood that in Los Angeles the request for a leave of absence must come from the Federal Government, for a specific man, in order for a man to obtain a leave of absence.

Supervisor MacPhee reported that such was done in San Francisco in practically every case.

**REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON JUVENILE DELINQUENCY.**

*NOTE: Italics indicate changes recommended by Judiciary Committee.*

Cognizant and apprehensive of the increase in San Francisco's juvenile delinquency and its inevitable effect upon our social and cultural standards, and responsive to the importunities for corrective legislation advanced by various civic and youth organizations, as well as immediately-concerned departments of municipal government, Supervisor Chester R. MacPhee, on November 22, 1943, presented to the Board of Supervisors, Resolution No. 3714 (Series of 1939). This resolution, adopted on the date of its introduction, recorded the Board of Supervisors as taking official notice of the gravity of juvenile delinquency and authorized the President of the Board to consider and report on the matter of juvenile delinquency with a view to adopting legislation looking toward the correction of the situation.

Pursuant to the foregoing authorization, the President of the Board of Supervisors appointed Supervisor MacPhee, Chairman of a committee to be immediately organized, and delegated to the committee authority to conduct hearings and studies in connection with juvenile delinquency and to report to the Board its findings and recommendations for remedial legislation.

#### General.

Besides the accumulation of exhaustive data on the subject of juvenile delinquency, the committee conducted four hearings attended by the general membership, in addition to numerous hearings by, and discussions among, lesser numbers of the committee, possessed, through education or peculiar experience, with a superior and authoritative knowledge of the problem.

Concentration and expansion of vital home-front activities in San Francisco and the Bay Area has, of course, resulted in an in-migration of thousands of workers, accompanied by their families, to supply the added labor operations necessary to extended and accelerated industry.

Seeking employment, or for whatever purpose, thousands of boys and girls under the age of eighteen years, unaccompanied by parents and not subject, unofficially, to an imposed guiding influence, have migrated to this area since the entry of the United States into the war.

Because the mothers of many children, both resident and transient, are now employed in war industries and the fathers of the same or other children are in many cases required to work on night shifts, parental control, in numerous instances, has been rendered almost wholly ineffective.

The present inadequate housing situation in San Francisco is by no means conducive, in many instances, to the maintenance of such happy and well regulated homes as would impel children to appreciate them and to prefer them to outside places and to activities where temptations abound and where through improper associations and other circumstances, the tendency to delinquency is made attractive and very **easy**.

Finally, the unnatural pace, the glamour of the uniform, false notions as to what constitutes patriotism, the supply of money to some juveniles unaccustomed to its possession, value and proper use, and the lack of it by others, the too prevalent attitude of fatalism and abandon—all of the abnormal conditions attendant upon war, aggravate and complicate the problem of juvenile delinquency, for which, in normal times, no adequate solution had been effectively applied, if recognized to exist.

If it be considered necessary to demonstrate the urgency for immediate and decisive legislative action for more effective control of juvenile delinquency, that imperative requirement is conclusively found in a glance at the figures recording the alarming increase in the known number of cases of children, under the age of 18 years, afflicted with venereal disease during the past year as well as the number of general delinquency cases. The record shows:

#### Children Under Eighteen, Afflicted With Venereal Disease.

Total Cases (1942) .....	208
Total Cases (1943) .....	513

#### General Delinquency Cases.

Total Cases (1942) .....	591
Total Cases (1943) .....	946

There are those who, upon superficial, if any, consideration of this dread actuality, accept it as a matter of course and attribute it solely

to our wartime increase in population, but an analysis of the figures shows that the ratio of increase in population, due to the war, to the increased number of cases of venereal diseases among children under the age of eighteen years, is as of 1 to 10, that is, although our population, according to reliable estimates, has increased only 15 per cent, the rate of venereal disease among children, under the age of eighteen years, has increased 150 per cent, and although our population has increased by only 15 per cent, juvenile delinquency, as shown by the foregoing figures, did, in the year 1943, practically double.

It is recognized, of course, that governmental action alone is no panacea for juvenile delinquency, but it has its place in the general plan to abolish or minimize the evil, and government would be remiss in its function, were its agents to fail to explore every avenue and invoke every proper regulation for its suppression. Prudent legislation, judiciously enforced and construed will constitute a very effective deterrent and will provide some of the means for control of juvenile delinquency necessary to the effective functioning of the agencies charged with prevention and correction.

Many suggestions have been advanced by concerned agencies proposing legislative or procedural changes and supplemental aids which are imperative to a fair degree of efficiency in their operations.

The committee has endeavored to analyze these suggestions and to submit to the Board for its consideration and action certain definite proposals, which if executed, it is confidently felt, will materially assist the responsible agencies in their endeavors to retard and minimize juvenile delinquency.

The juvenile problem which now confronts us renders it exigent that immediate and decisive steps be taken to cope with that situation but such action, being emergency in character, cannot provide comprehensive control or full minimization of delinquency during the post-war period or upon our return to normalcy or transition to a new era.

Perfection in human conduct is a slow process and so, although those details which are dependent upon future conditions must be left for subsequent deliberation and determination, certain broad and indispensable principles can presently be decided and promulgated and a properly integrated organizational structure conceived and established.

Accordingly this report on juvenile delinquency is divided into three sections.

## **MEASURES IMMEDIATELY NECESSARY—CORRECTION**

### **Improvement of Juvenile Administrative Service.**

Your committee recommends that immediate action be taken looking to the establishment of higher standards for the personnel charged with supervision over, and work in, juvenile delinquency matters and for the provision for such increased salaries as will be commensurate with the responsibility involved and the comprehensive knowledge required, efficiently and wisely to decide the problems and to administer or perform the duties incident thereto. This action will result in the development of such an organization for control and prevention of juvenile delinquency as is acutely necessary and to which additional capable personnel will be attracted, thus providing more effective and expeditious results in corrective and preventive endeavors.

In connection with the foregoing your committee took the following action:

**Recommended that in the consideration of the Salary Standardization Schedules soon to be presented to the Board of Supervisors, careful thought be directed to a proposal for such increased salaries to workers in juvenile delinquency as will more nearly reflect the value of the work performed or necessary in this vital field.**

### In-Service Training for Juvenile Authorities.

Through cooperation of the local juvenile authorities, the Civil Service Commission, and the directors or faculties of nearby universities, arrangements should now be undertaken to provide an in-service training program for the municipal personnel engaged in juvenile delinquency work.

The resolution recommended by your committee on this subject follows:

Whereas, the juvenile delinquency problem in San Francisco has been aggravated and rendered increasingly difficult of control and solution since the war and has accentuated the need for an additional number of employees qualified to cope with the situation; and

Whereas, it is apparent that there must be immediately instituted and constantly persisted in, a movement to provide more effective administration of juvenile welfare and probation work; and

Whereas, the conduct of an intelligently designed in-service training program will equip the personnel presently engaged in juvenile delinquency work to more efficiently and expeditiously execute their functions and will incite them to even greater efforts for control and repression of juvenile delinquency; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That this Board of Supervisors does hereby request the Chief Probation Officer of the Juvenile Court to submit to this Board, within the next thirty days, a report on the feasibility of an in-service training program for personnel of the Juvenile Court.

### Necessity for Additional Parole Officers.

Investigation has disclosed that in Northern California there is but one parole officer for girl delinquents and an inadequate number of parole officers for boy delinquents.

Your committee therefore recommends adoption of the following resolution:

Whereas, investigation has disclosed the fact that there is only one parole officer in Northern California charged with supervision of girl delinquents and an insufficient number of parole officers charged with supervision of boy delinquents; and

Whereas, adequate and constructive counsel imparted to delinquents by qualified authorities will tend in great measure to prevent recurrences of improper or unlawful acts by juveniles with a delinquent record and will result in better supervision, for the welfare of those released from juvenile homes; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That this Board of Supervisors does hereby memorialize His Excellency Governor Warren and does urge that serious and early consideration be given a proposal to increase the personnel charged with the supervision of paroled juvenile delinquents, particularly in Northern California.

### MEASURES IMMEDIATELY NECESSARY—PREVENTION.

#### Utilization of Public Schools and Facilities.

Consideration was given by your committee to the question of fullest utilization of public schools in the program for prevention of juvenile delinquency, and it was agreed by your committee that, in connection with public schools and the public education system, the following recommendations be made:

(a) That public schools shall also serve as community centers and remain open until a reasonable hour each evening throughout the year.

(b) That students be supervised and assisted in the selection of such reading matter as will inculcate in them a proper concept of parenthood and its obligations and that consideration be given to



the inclusion, in the public schools curricula, of a course on parental responsibility. In this connection, your committee recommended adoption by the Board of Supervisors of that resolution next appearing in this report.

(c) That classes in parent education be provided in the schools of each district throughout the city, voluntary enrollment in which should be encouraged through Board of Education-Parent-Teacher publicity. Such courses should include *current* discussions on behavior problems, child guidance and sex education for children.

(d) That a committee ascertain the extent of present instruction in sex education prescribed for students in the public schools and make such recommendations with respect thereto as are deemed advisable.

(e) That the Student Court within the junior and high schools be continued and extended.

(f) That the principals of the schools certify to the juvenile court, the parents of neglected children for parent education classes.

Following is the resolution referred to in subdivision (b) preceding:

Whereas, the integrity of our homes and of our very social structure are presently challenged by the untoward increase in juvenile delinquency; and

Whereas, one cause for this unhappy situation is represented to exist in the fact that boys and girls do not have proper or adequate concepts of their responsibilities, as members of contemporary society, particularly with reference to:

1. The duties and responsibilities owed to parents.
2. The duties and responsibilities of parenthood.
3. The duties and responsibilities of citizenship; and

Whereas, the dissemination by proper and responsible authorities of that information which reflects the true American philosophy regarding such matters would be an effective deterrent to juvenile delinquency; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That this Board of Supervisors does hereby petition the Board of Education and requests that agency to appoint a committee to study and report on the feasibility and desirability of establishing required courses in the foregoing subjects, for those children capable of directing intelligent consideration to such matters.

#### Trial Plan—Use of Schools for Afternoon and Evening Activities of Juveniles.

It was the considered opinion of your committee that responsibility for failure to make all public school buildings and facilities available to our youth during the afternoon and evening, must rest with the Board of Education.

A meeting between the Board of Education and your committee was held on December 21, 1943, in the Chambers of the Board of Education at which time the foregoing recommendations were discussed, and a subsequent meeting arranged.

At the later meeting between Dr. Warren, Miss Randall, Mr. Nichols and Mr. MacPhee arrangements were concluded for the use of the James Denman School for the trial of a plan having for its purpose the designation of one school to be made available to youth groups for the purpose of demonstrating the practicability of the joint use of schools for educational as well as recreational and other approved juvenile activities. This program is now being executed, as a result of the direct action by your committee.

#### Control of Truancy.

It is the considered opinion of your committee that the Board of Education must establish more effective control in the matter of tru-

ancy, which, many authorities contend, is responsible, in a great number of cases, for the start of a child's delinquency. Truancy in San Francisco has doubled in the last year, despite the fact that work permits must be obtained for employed youths and that such permits are revoked upon notice of truancy on the part of the holder thereof. The fact that, even with this additional safeguard, truancy continues and increases, demonstrates that more effective measures for the prevention of truancy must be immediately adopted by the attendance bureau of the Board of Education. Of 175 known truant cases last year, only eighteen actually appeared before the judge.

Your committee has recommended to the Board of Education that where there is repeated truancy by any child, its parents shall be cited and required to appear before the Juvenile Court. Under existing law, after conviction pursuant to a proceeding instituted by the District Attorney, the parent responsible for a truant child may be required to attend Parent Education School or to post a bond in the amount of \$200 conditioned against further truancy by the child.

To assure registration, for school purposes, of all children resident in San Francisco; to provide periodical opportunities for city-wide apprehension of truants and to test the validity of excuses proffered on behalf of absentee children it is recommended that the Police Department in cooperation with the Board of Education arrange for the interrogation, upon certain unannounced dates, of every child found upon the streets during school hours upon those particular dates and that those children who have no, or insufficient, excuse, shall be taken to register, where necessary, or if registered, detained in school or juvenile detention until their excuse for absence has been corroborated by a parent or guardian; or in the event of inability to immediately contact the parent or guardian, released, subject to such further action as in the opinion of the juvenile authorities shall be deemed prudent and necessary. Such a procedure, if followed from time to time, will reduce truancy and will assure that all children of school age are registered for attendance.

#### Motion Pictures.

Through the courtesy and cooperation of the California Theatres, Incorporated, your committee had the opportunity to view several motion pictures on the subject of juvenile delinquency. Two of these pictures, both short subjects, were considered particularly instructive and appropriate for attention of school children.

Your committee therefore recommends that arrangements be made by the school authorities for the presentation of these pictures to the children of our schools. The California Theatres, Incorporated, will be happy to cooperate in every manner possible.

#### Counseling Agents for Potential Delinquents.

Your committee decided that one important phase of an effective program to prevent juvenile delinquency can and should be undertaken through the employment of *additional personnel for counseling endeavors* in the Juvenile Probation Department. Such personnel would do particularly useful prevention work among those juveniles who have demonstrated a tendency to delinquency. *Your committee therefore recommends that consideration be given to augmenting the staff of the Juvenile Probation Department by the appointment of three additional Probation Officers to serve as counsel to potential juvenile delinquents.*

#### Volunteer Assistance.

In connection with the program for prevention of juvenile delinquency your committee decided that a plan must evolve through which responsibility will rest and assistance be rendered by all the residents of San Francisco, individually or through organizations of which they are members.

Suggestions were made that the Big Brother Detail of the Police Department should develop, coordinate and generally direct the activities under such a plan. Another proposal would result in the establishment of a youths' club in each air raid battalion headquarters under the sponsorship and guidance of the air raid wardens. Both plans have merit and should be exploited.

Members of your committee were instrumental in arranging for the establishment of one such boys' club under the auspices of the Air Raid Wardens of Battalion 10 with headquarters at Twenty-sixth and Sanchez Streets.

The following letter is indicative of the reaction to the foregoing suggestion of the committee:

Civilian War Council.

Because your committee realizes that every possible means of cooperation must be invoked for control and prevention of juvenile delinquency, it is requested that the Civilian War Council give consideration to the inclusion of an appropriation in its budget of such funds as will be necessary in the utilization of additional or all Battalion Headquarters for the purposes referred to above, together with funds necessary to provide the facilities, if any, required in connection with their use for such purposes, and that an endeavor be made to procure subventions from the State War Council to augment and to reimburse the City for such expenditures.

A sub-committee, headed by Robert Simcock of the Council of Churches, has accomplished material progress in the organization of volunteers in juvenile delinquency work. It is hoped that this good work will continue and expand.

#### Utilization of Public Libraries.

A survey of our public libraries discloses the fact that the junior section in many of the branches is not now open during the evening hours for recreational and youth activities.

It is the considered opinion of your committee that these facilities should be open until a reasonable hour each evening and available to all approved youth agencies for supervised recreation. Through the

efforts of your committee, the Library Commission has allowed the use of the Bernal Branch Library for this purpose.

Your committee recommends the adoption of the following resolution:

Whereas, the need for additional facilities required for supervised recreation of juveniles has long been recognized by the agencies dealing with child welfare; and

Whereas, facilities for such purposes are available in several branches of the Public Library but are not presently utilized; and

Whereas, the use of such facilities will enable youth agencies to supplement their activities for the benefit of youth; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That this Board of Supervisors does hereby request the Library Commission to give consideration to a proposal for use of all such facilities as are available in branch libraries for the conduct, during evening hours, of supervised recreation activities for juveniles.

#### Coordinating Council.

Any measure of successful accomplishment in prevention and control of juvenile delinquency must, of course, be predicated upon the character and extent of the organization charged with the administration of the functions involved, and upon the facilities available for its operation.

Your committee has studied the legislation establishing the Coordinating Council and prescribing its powers and duties and has concluded that the legislation and the Council which it establishes are inadequate for the purposes sought to be accomplished through such agency.

Your committee has, therefore, recommended certain amendments to the ordinance establishing the Coordinating Council, which proposed amendments are hereby submitted with the request that they be immediately referred to the Judiciary Committee for report and for possible inclusion in a re-drafted ordinance.

The recommendations of your committee are:

1. That the Mayor, with the approval of the Board of Supervisors, shall appoint as members of the Coordinating Council, such public officials as are deemed necessary to its functions, including the District Attorney and one member of the Board of Supervisors.

2. That the membership of the Coordinating Council be composed of that number of private citizens interested in youth equal to the number of public officials appointed to the Council.

3. That the President of the Council shall be elected by the membership thereof from among the non-official members.

4. That the salary of the Secretary to the Coordinating Council shall not exceed \$9,000 per year.

5. That there shall be an annual appropriation not in excess of \$25,000 to cover the cost of the Council's operations.

6. That the Council shall make and file with the Mayor and the Board of Supervisors a monthly report of its activities and accomplishments.

#### Cooperation of District Attorney.

Your committee considered a proposal for more diligent and strenuous opposition to and prosecution of those holders of licenses to sell or dispense liquor, who in any manner contribute or permit contribution to the delinquency of minors.

The District Attorney, Edmund G. Brown, addressing himself to your committee, agreed that in subsequent hearings before the Board of

Equalization where charges are considered involving juveniles, he would appear in each case, representing the Police Department, and, where the facts warrant it, urge revocation of the license of such offender.

#### Use of Automobiles by Juveniles.

Approximately 45 per cent of the juveniles presently cited for appearance before the juvenile authorities are charged with offenses involving automobiles.

Your committee has recommended:

That the Police Department conduct a thorough survey of minors driving or riding in pleasure vehicles at night, to determine that the possession of, or presence of minors in, such automobiles, in no way constitutes an infraction of any law.

#### Taverns.

Your committee recommends initiation of endeavors to effect such changes in the state law as will dispense with the necessity for serving food in premises licensed for "on-sale" of liquor.

The prohibition against the use of the name "saloon" being not only a subterfuge, but in fact a decoy and inveiglement to those who ought not or would not in many cases enter or patronize the places bearing such designation, should be abrogated so that the true character of such places may be known to the public, and avoided by juveniles as well as those adults possessed of scruples adverse to such activities.

#### Transient Youth.

The problem presented by transient youth was given consideration. Your committee was apprised of a survey and studies now being conducted by authorized agencies upon the subject and upon which a report and recommendations will be submitted in the near future.

#### Travelers' Aid Society.

It was the consensus of opinion that the effective work being accomplished by the Travelers' Aid Society is worthy of highest commendation and that its continuance should be encouraged and made financially possible. To that end it was agreed that a copy of this report be transmitted to the Community Chest with the request that additional funds be made available to the Travelers' Aid Society for the continuance and increase of the valuable functions performed by that agency.

### POST-WAR PLANNING FOR YOUTH.

#### Children's Center.

Post-war planning has provoked considerable thought and discussion in recent months. Especially emphasized, have been the needs for industrial development and expansion, building and highway construction and improved transportation.

It is gratifying to observe the enthusiastic interest which has been manifested for the material development of San Francisco. Such foresight and civic concern are, of course, laudable and worthy of the highest commendation.

Contemporaneous with such program, however, there must be inaugurated such plans for the intellectual, physical and moral competency of those necessary to successful execution of that task as will render them capable to assume the responsibilities involved.

Furthermore, intelligent and comprehensive planning must embrace proposals for the rehabilitation and improvement of our social structure and this necessarily and fundamentally requires effective remedies

for infractions and ultimate provision for abrogation or fullest minimization of those acts of human conduct which constitute a nuisance, to our neighbors, a deterrent to the progress of human society and a heavy financial drain upon both private and public funds.

Authorities are agreed that knowledge of, and the desire to abide by, the rules necessary to a serene and progressive human society must be inculcated and imbued in its members, early in life.

Accordingly, to, and for, the position of the child in post-war and future planning generally, particular and conscientious thought must be given and adequate provision made.

One of the greatest needs for the future consists in a plan for perfect coordination of the activities to be devoted to child welfare and in cooperation with those undertaking to develop such plans, the City Planning Commission should now entertain consideration of a proposal for the construction of such facilities as will be necessary and convenient in the efficient administration thereof.

Subject to details subsequently to be found necessary, it would seem that such facilities should consist in a municipally-owned structure situated in that location, which is most central, and surrounded by land sufficient for attractive flower gardens, small scale agricultural endeavors and complete outdoor recreational facilities.

The building should be so constructed as to house the Juvenile Court and Detention Home, besides the administration offices of the several City departments responsible for Youth activities, such as the Recreation Commission, Board of Education, etc. There should also be quarters for the Big Brother Bureau, Big Sister Bureau, and an office for each of the recognized private agencies that are concerned with juvenile work, such as P. T. A. There should be an auditorium where conferences and meetings may be held. There should be proper conference rooms attached to each department within the building. The architecture should be so planned as to conform or be adaptable for the usual activities of children. The building should approximate perhaps six stories in height, with the fifth and sixth floors devoted to the Juvenile Court, Probation Department and Detention Home. The Detention Home located on the top floor allowing for recreational area on the roof so constructed as to provide maximum protection to the children.

It can be easily realized what a building of this type would mean to the Youth activities of San Francisco. It would coordinate all activities. It would remove the stigma of a child going to a Juvenile Court, because it would not be known as a Juvenile Court building, but be known as the CHILDREN'S CENTER OF SAN FRANCISCO. It would eliminate the confusion and the inefficiencies that now exist because parents do not know where to take their children for the various services required, or where to seek advice from proper authorities.

It would be a great saving to the taxpayers, because of the coordinated administration. It is very evident that the present housing conditions of the various departments for children are in a deplorable condition—they are costly to maintain and they retard juvenile activities.

Each department housed within the CHILDREN'S CENTER would have its own autonomy, yet coordinated effort would result through regular meetings of the department heads and those interested in Youth activities. The CHILDREN'S CENTER will engender a spirit of assistance to Youth in San Francisco. Its doors shall be open to the Youth of the City to partake of counseling service and guidance at all times.

#### Conclusion.

The foregoing recommendations are the result of careful study, sincere application and close cooperation from the members of the com-

mittee. It was agreed that the committee would adjourn subject to the call of the chair to consider further recommendations for future action.

#### Discussion.

Supervisor MacPhee reported that the foregoing report had received very complete hearing in committee and he hoped that it would receive the approval by the Board of Supervisors as presented. A number of matters were deleted which were not in accord with the committee's ideas.

Supervisor Mancuso then stated that all that is requested is approval of the report. It does not mean any agreement with views expressed therein. It merely means that the Board discharge the committee and thank Supervisor MacPhee and the rest of the committee for their work. The report should be adopted as a whole.

A Mrs. Steinnert, on being granted the privilege of the floor, called attention to the case of a deserted child, in which she was interested, and suggested that an investigation be made of the working of an Abandonment Bureau, in New York, which handled such cases.

Thereupon, Supervisor Green reported that there was in New York a bureau, the sole function of which was to bring back delinquent husbands and fathers, and suggested that the members of the Board take cognizance of the matter, and he would, under his name on Roll Call, introduce the matter as a separate thought for the future.



Mrs. William E. Burns and Mrs. Frank Silva, both opposed sex education in the schools. The place for such education was the home. Teachers themselves are not in favor of sex education in schools.

Supervisor Colman expressed opposition to the measure. "It runs all over the municipal lot," he stated. As to sex education in schools, that was a subject for the Board of Education to consider. It is not the function of the Board of Supervisors to decide or to recommend whether we should have sex education in the schools. Such decision should be made by the Board of Education. The report recommends increased salaries for workers in juvenile delinquency. The same recommendation would apply to social workers and to employees of the Board of Health who do social service work. Those matters should be left to the Civil Service Commission. The adoption of the report would automatically pass certain resolutions.

Supervisor Mancuso reported that all matters contained in the report received thorough consideration. The adoption of the report would not mean that the things were to be done at all; it would merely mean that Supervisor MacPhee and his colleagues recommend that these things be considered.

Supervisor Colman declared that he did not believe it was the function of the Board of Supervisors to make recommendations to the various departments.

Supervisor Mancuso reported that in the Judiciary Committee it was learned that nearly one-half of the recommendations in the report had been taken by the various agencies and had been voluntarily considered. The committee's recommendations should be adopted and the respective bureaus or boards should act on them as they felt proper. However, as to the "In Service Training Program," Supervisor Mancuso stated he knew nothing. He would like to hear from the Chief Probation Officer on that matter. He could not recommend it. Supervisor Mancuso discussed in detail various other proposals in the report.

Supervisor MacPhee requested that the report be given the same consideration as was given to the report by Supervisor Green's committee on racial and minority group discrimination, which Supervisor Colman had voted to approve. He wanted the record to show that on Supervisor Green's report on racial discrimination, there were ten different recommendations made to different organizations. Supervisor Colman was very glad to vote for Supervisor Green's report, and to give it his approval, without even questioning it. There have been too many reports on juvenile delinquency, and not enough action. In general, the reports made and the conclusions reached are in the form of asking that consideration be given. No one is told to do anything, as Supervisor Colman would have the Board believe. The report should get serious consideration. The proposed amendments should be given consideration.

Supervisor Mead announced that he had no particular objection to the report as a report. The only thing he was really opposed to was in reference to the salary of the Secretary of the Coordinating Council. He was afraid that the maximum salary would wind up as a minimum salary. The same, he feared, would be true of the proposed \$25,000 to cover the cost of the Council's activities.

Supervisor Brown then moved that the report be received and filed. Motion seconded by Supervisor Colman.

Supervisor Green moved as a substitute motion that the report be approved with the thought that no designation of salaries be included. Motion seconded by Supervisor Mead.

Supervisor Brown then stated that the report did not call for any action on the part of the Board of Supervisors. The Board was not asked to do anything except to receive it. The approval of the report

would be tacitly, at least, the approval of the suggestions contained therein. It would be better to consider those various proposals when they come before the Board in the form of resolutions or ordinances.

The Chair, however, moved that the motion by Supervisor Green was not in order. The matter on the Calendar was a recommendation of the Judiciary Committee. Supervisor Brown had moved that the matter be received and filed, which in itself was a substitute motion.

Supervisor MacPhee asked the Board to vote down the motion by Supervisor Brown. There could be no reason for such discrimination. The members of the Board might not be in agreement with regard to salaries for the Coordinating Council. Supervisor Green's motion would take care of that. Supervisor Brown's motion, Supervisor MacPhee stated, was discriminatory. He voted for approval of one kind of report on racial discrimination. A similar treatment should be accorded this report.

Supervisor Colman, in further argument, stated that nobody admitted more freely than did he, that his past was not free from mistakes and errors, but it was being argued now that that because he had made one error he should follow it up with another. However, it was never too late to reform. He could give no strength to that argument.

Thereupon, the roll was called and the motion to receive and file the report was *carried* by the following vote:

**Authorizing Permission to Hale Bros. Realty Co. to Install Utility Services Through Fire Department Buildings on Jessie Street.**

The Clerk presented:

Proposal No. 3902, Resolution No. . . . . ., as follows:

Whereas, pursuant to Resolution No. 3611 (Series of 1939), adopted by this Board on September 20, 1943, and approved by the Mayor on September 22, 1943, the City and County of San Francisco, a municipal corporation, as lessor, entered into a written lease with Hale Bros. Realty Co., a corporation, as lessee, of certain City owned real property and improvements located between Stevenson and Jessie Streets, 175 feet southwest of Fifth Street, San Francisco, California, size 50 feet by 75 feet, known as Lots 7 and 8 in Assessor's Block 3704, for a period of five years beginning October 1, 1943, and ending September 30, 1948; and

Whereas, due to the expiration of Hale Bros. Realty Co.'s lease of the store building located on the southwest corner of Fifth and Market

Streets, said company desires permission from the City and County of San Francisco to install certain pipe lines and wires through the City's fire house located on Lot 6 in said Block 3704 and through the north-easterly one-half of the building located on Lots 7 and 8 for the purpose of furnishing utility services from Hale Bros.' administration building in said block to the demised premises on said Lots 7 and 8, and it appears that this is the most feasible and economical method of reestablishing such services to the demised premises; and

Whereas, the Fire Department and the Director of Property have recommended that the desired permission be granted, subject to the hereinafter mentioned conditions; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That permission is hereby granted to Hale Bros. Realty Co., a corporation, to install five lines of pipes and wires through said property by suspending the same from the ceilings of the basements therein, to be used for said utility purposes. **Instructing Judiciary Committee to Study Advisability of Proposing Certain Amendments to the Charter.**

Whereas, over a period of the last few years it has developed that certain changes are advisable in some of the amendments to said Charter which have not already been taken care of; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Board of Supervisors instruct the Judiciary Committee to study the advisability of proposing to the electorate amendments to said Charter so as to conform to the changes that have become necessary as a result of changed conditions during the past twelve years and particularly the advisability of amendment to Section 22 and to those Sections 35 and 36, which pertain to the Fire and Police Departments, and other matters that might be called to its attention as a result of the hearings held thereon; and be it

Further Resolved, That the Judiciary Committee give said matter immediate attention and report to the Board of Supervisors their findings not later than June 15, 1944.

**Urging Additional Federal Appropriation to Provide for Continuance of the Child Care Center Project.**

(Series of 1939)

Supervisor Mead presented:

Proposal No. 3909, Resolution No. . . . . ., as follows:

Whereas, the Lanham Act, passed by Congress in 1941, provided, among other matters, that certain sums might be appropriated for the establishment, particularly in the centers of war industry, of child care centers where proper supervision and care would be provided throughout the day for the children of working mothers; and

Whereas, pursuant to the Lanham Act, Congress has appropriated certain sums of money for the maintenance of child care centers and this service has proved a valuable asset in the recruitment of personnel necessary to the war effort as well as to child welfare; and

Whereas, the funds formerly appropriated by Congress for this purpose are practically depleted and unless further sums are immediately made available, the child care center project so valuable and necessary to the war endeavor will have to be abandoned, resulting in a serious deterrent to the war endeavor; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That this Board of Supervisors, cognizant of the importance of child care centers to the war effort and apprehensive of the deterrent effect upon the war effort which will result from their abandonment does hereby memorialize the Congress of the United States and does urge that a further appropriation be immediately made available to provide for the continuance of the child care center project; and be it

Further Resolved, That copies of this resolution be sent to Senators Sheridan Downey and Hiram Johnson and to Representatives Welch and Rolph.

**Requesting Governor Warren to Place the Matter of Votes for Eighteen-Year-Old Members of the Armed Forces as the First Order of Business in Any Call He Makes for a Special Session of the Legislature.**

Proposal No. 3910, Resolution No. . . . . ., as follows:

Whereas, young men and women 18 years of age are serving their country in the military forces; and

Whereas, if they are old enough to fight for their country, they should be old enough to vote; and

Whereas, Hearst newspapers, including the San Francisco Examiner, and such patriotic organizations as the American Legion and Veterans of Foreign Wars are campaigning to give the franchise to 18-year-old service men and women; now therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Board of Supervisors requests Governor Warren, if he calls a special legislative session, to present the matter of votes for the 18-year-olds as the first order of business; and be it

Further Resolved, That copies of this resolution be sent to the State Legislature and the Governor.

**Statement by Supervisor Colman Re His Views on Salary Standardization Ordinance.**

Supervisor Colman announced that at the meeting on Monday, March 6, 1944, he had informed the Board, when it was about to recess to reconvene on the next day, that he had to leave town that evening. He did not return to San Francisco until Saturday, March 11, 1944, during the morning. He had read in the papers, and had found out by inquiry, what had transpired during his absence. Had he been present when the final vote was taken on the Salary Standardization Ordinance on Friday, March 5th, he would have voted "No."

**Abandonment Bureau.**

Supervisor Green requested that the Clerk communicate with the District Attorney, asking him to look into the advisability of establishing an Abandonment Bureau.

No objection, and *so ordered.*

**Title Insurance Companies to Be Notified of Policy of the Board Regarding Cancellation of Taxes.**

Supervisor MacPhee called attention to resolutions adopted by the Board canceling taxes on property acquired by the United States of America, and, pursuant to discussion had during the consideration of those resolutions, requested that the Clerk be instructed to write to the title insurance companies notifying that in the future there might be a question of Supervisors passing similar resolutions, so that they will be on notice and the property owners may have such information.

No objection, and *so ordered.*

**Consideration of Possible Mayor's Veto.**

Supervisor Uhl called attention to an alleged statement by the Mayor, in which he had stated that he must act on salary standardization legislation as a whole, either for or against it—that he could not veto separate items to which he might object. After brief discussion during which it was asserted that the Mayor's position was correct and that he could not veto any separate item in the salary standardization legislation, but must act on the entire Bill, Supervisor Uhl suggested that a charter amendment be drafted which, if approved, would permit the



opportunity for the Mayor to veto individual items in salary standardization legislation.

The Chair suggested that Supervisor Uhl take his suggestion up with the City Attorney.

**Proposed Charter Amendment to Delete From the Charter Reference to Salaries of Members of the Police and Fire Departments.**

Supervisor Uhl presented draft of a proposed charter amendment, amending Section 35.5 of the Charter, relating to the Police Department, by deleting therefrom certain provisions establishing rates of compensation for members of the Department, and amending Section 36, relating to the Fire Department, and Section 36.1, relating to the Salvage Corps, also deleting rates of compensation for members of the departments affected.

*Referred to Judiciary Committee.*

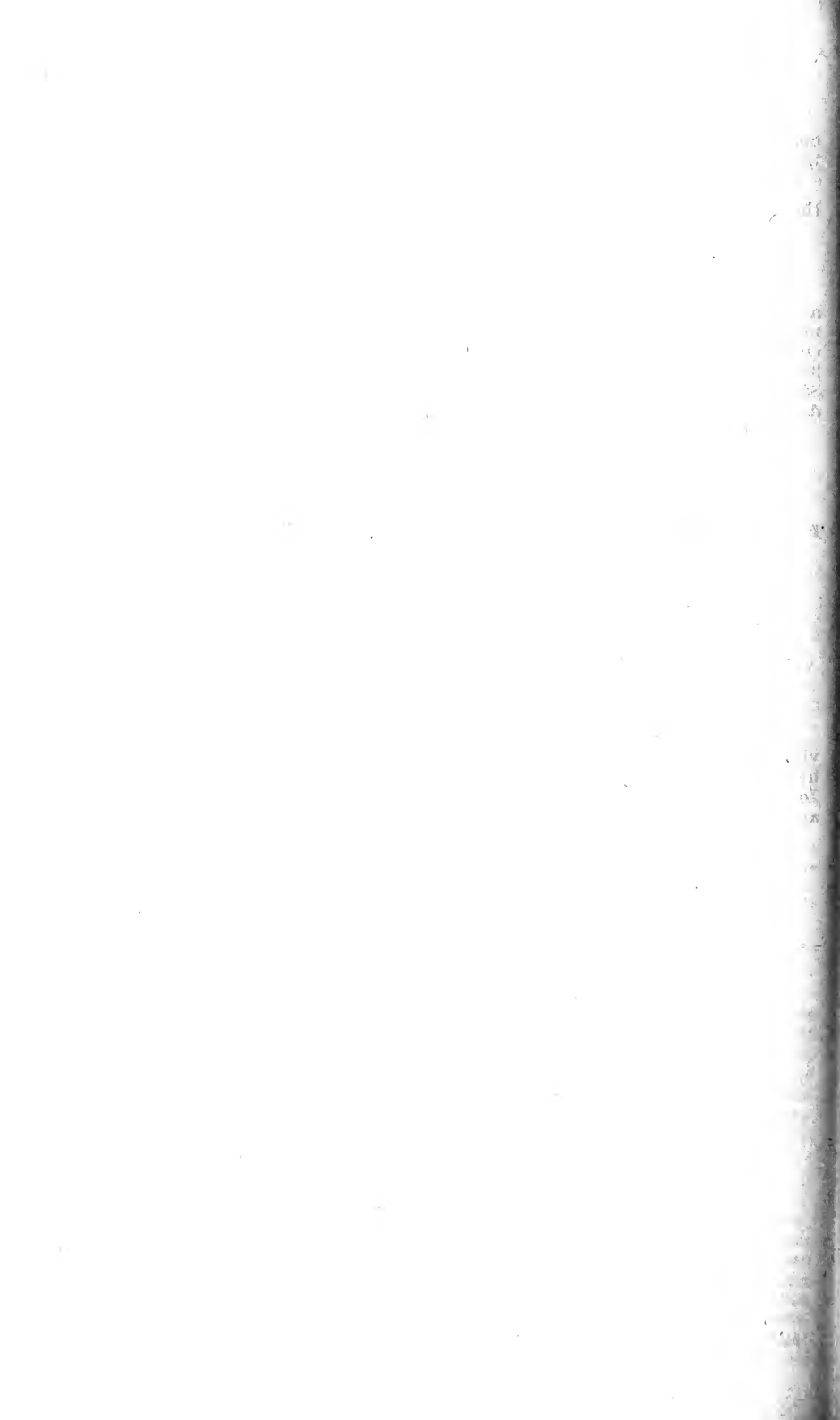

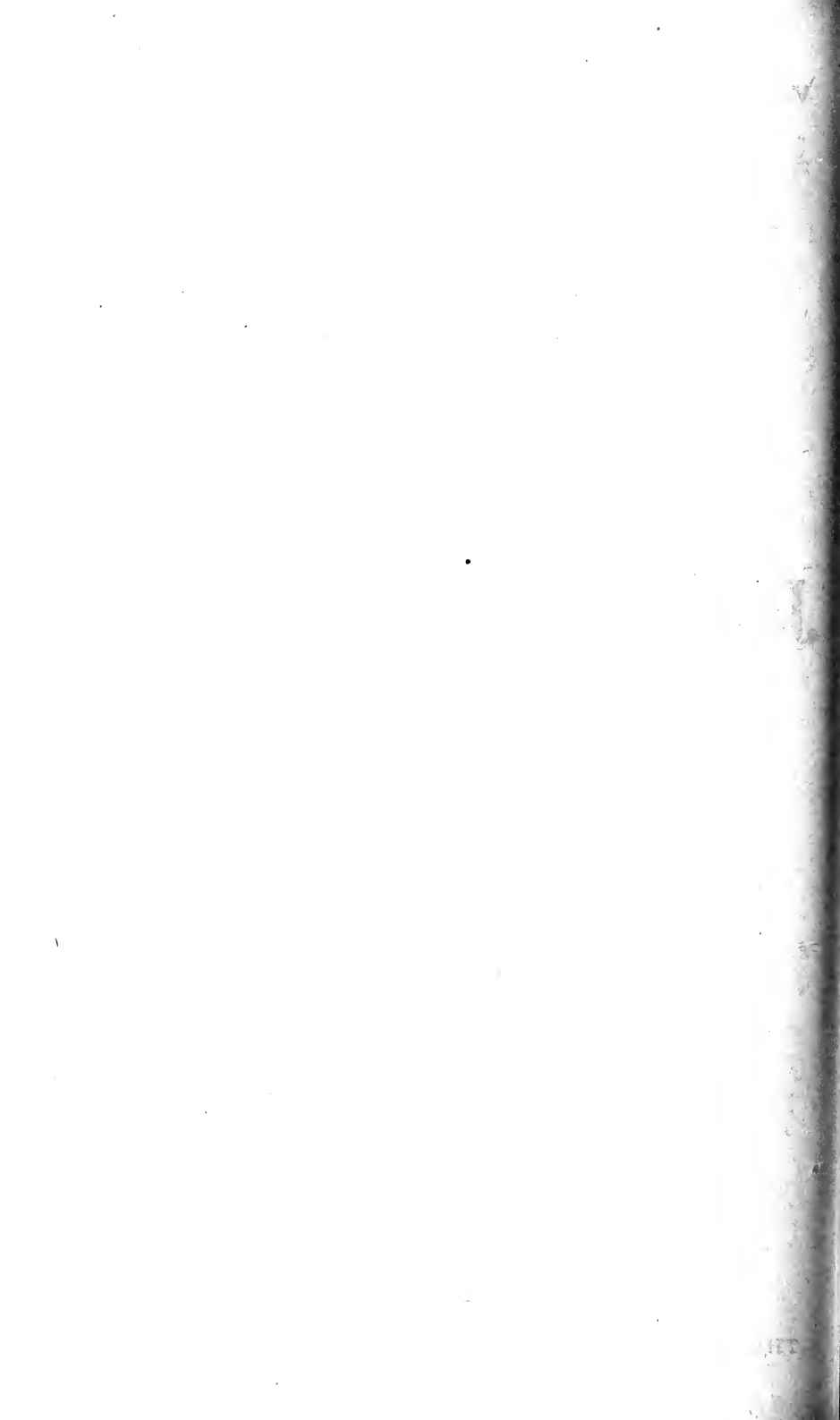

The Board of Supervisors met in regular session.

## CALLING THE ROLL.

The roll was called and the following Supervisors were noted present:

Quorum present.

President Dan Gallagher presiding.

Supervisor Brown was noted present at 2:55 p. m.

The Clerk announced during Roll Call that Supervisor Brown had reported he was attending a corporation meeting and could not be present before 2:30 p. m.

## APPROVAL OF JOURNAL.

The Journal of Proceedings of the meeting of March 6, 1944, was considered read and approved.

## Communications.

Communications, as follows, were presented, read by the Clerk, and acted on as noted:

From Public Utilities Commission, communication transmitting copy of Public Utilities Commission Resolution No. 6047, requesting enactment of ordinance authorizing Public Utilities Commission to make an offer to the Market Street Railway Company for purchase of its operative properties in the City and County of San Francisco and that portion of the system extending to San Mateo; also copies of "Agreement" under which terms and conditions of said purchase are set forth; also, certified copies of Public Utilities Commission Resolution No. 6048, approving the recommendation of the Manager of Utilities for the acquisition of the operative properties of the Market Street Railway Company.

## UNFINISHED BUSINESS.

Tabled.

The following recommendations of Finance Committee, heretofore Passed for Second Reading were taken up:

# Salary Standardization Ordinance

(Series of 1939)

Bill No. 2800, Ordinance No. . . . ., as follows:

An ordinance fixing a schedule of compensations to be paid employees of the City and County of San Francisco and noncertificated employees of the San Francisco Unified School District in certain specified classifications which are subject to the provisions of Section 151 of the Charter and providing for the administration of such schedule and that the said schedule shall become effective July 1, 1944.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco, as follows:

Section 1. Pursuant to the provisions of Section 151 of the Charter, the schedule of compensations set forth herein shall, beginning July 1, 1944, determine and fix the salaries, wages, and compensations for the several classifications of employment in the San Francisco municipal service and the noncertificated personnel of the San Francisco Unified School District hereinafter enumerated, subject to the terms of this ordinance; provided, however, that the salaries of occupants of permanent positions as of June 30, 1944, shall not be reduced below the salaries such employees were receiving in the same classification on June 30, 1944, for the same number of hours worked.

Section 2. (a) **Method of Payment:** Employees entering the municipal service in any of the specified classifications enumerated herein on or after July 1, 1944, shall be paid the entrance rate provided for their particular classifications in the schedule of compensations herein contained; provided, however, that employees promoted within the service who receive in the lower class a salary higher than the minimum of the compensation schedule for the higher class shall not be reduced to the entrance rate of the promotive class. The compensations of all employees receiving less than the minimum of the schedules specified herein for their particular classifications shall be adjusted to the minimum on July 1. Every employee who entered the service by permanent appointment or was promoted in the service on or before July 1, 1943, shall receive on July 1, 1944, and annually thereafter on July 1st, the salary fixed for his years of service based on his original date of appointment to a permanent position in his present classification; provided, however, that for the fiscal year 1944-45 and in such other years as the Board of Supervisors shall designate in the annual salary ordinance, each such employee shall receive one full increment as established for his particular classification. Provided further that each employee entering the service by permanent appointment or being promoted in the service after July 1, 1943, shall receive annually one full increment increase as set forth in the compensation schedule established for his particular classification payable on the

first day of the month immediately following his anniversary of employment or promotion; provided, however, that no annual increment for such employee shall be allowed if the granting of the increment will establish the compensation at a rate beyond which the employee is entitled by reason of accrued years of service in the class. No employee shall receive more than one salary increment annually, except for adjustment to the proper step in the compensation schedule on the basis of seniority. No increase in compensation shall cause the salary of an employee to exceed the maximum fixed herein for his classification.

(b) Except as provided in Section 2a hereof advancement from the entrance salary to the maximum salary where such minima and maxima are recommended shall be by annual increment as set forth below, depending upon the amount of range from the entrance to the maximum and the said table of annual increments is hereby made a part of the compensation schedules herein determined.

**Section 3. Maintenance:** Salaries and wages set forth in the schedule of compensations herein contained are gross compensations. Deductions shall be made from such salaries or wages, as provided by law, for maintenance or other accommodations and charges therefor shall be fixed by law in accordance with the schedule established in the annual salary ordinance; provided, however, that no charge shall be made for maintenance or other accommodations available to employees in public institutions unless such employees actually receive such maintenance or utilize such accommodations.

**Section 4. Hours of Work:**

(a) Compensations fixed herein on a per diem rate are based on an eight-hour day.

(b) Except as otherwise provided herein, or in the annual salary



ordinance, compensations fixed herein on a monthly basis are based on an eight-hour day and a five-day week. In order that there shall be no diminution of service to the public it shall be the duty of the head of each department to stagger, arrange and assign the work of his department so that a skeleton crew will be on duty in each department which is required to be open on Saturday morning for the conduct of public business, and no officer or employee in such department shall work more than a five-day week, except as part of a skeleton crew to keep such office open on Saturday morning, and except as provided in Section 4, subdivisions (e) and (f) hereof. Time worked on Saturday morning as part of a skeleton crew shall be compensated for by equal time off of one-half day in the same or succeeding week.

(c) **Night Shifts:** Seven and one-half hours per day and five days per week shall constitute the normal work day and week for employees whose compensations are fixed herein on a monthly basis and who work on night shifts. A night shift is any full time shift which commences after 2 P. M. and prior to 6 A. M.

(d) **Part-Time Services:** Except as provided in subdivision (e) herein a daily work schedule of less than eight hours or a night schedule of less than seven and one-half hours shall be considered part-time employment, and compensations therefor shall be fixed in the annual salary ordinance at a rate based upon the full time rate for the classification, proportionate to the hours worked, with due regard to seniority of service. Provided, however, that these provisions will not apply to physicians employed in their professional capacity on a call basis or on a regular consultant basis; compensations for such positions shall be established annually by the Board of Supervisors in the annual salary ordinance.

(e) **Exceptions:** To provide for the uninterrupted operation of the service, employees in classifications included in Division R—Recreation Service and Division X—Library Service, may work the forty-hour week schedule within six days and shall not be subject to the provisions of Section 4(g).

(f) No increase or decrease in the number of hours and days worked per week on a regular schedule different from eight hours per day and five days per week shall be allowed except upon approval of the Board of Supervisors in the annual salary ordinance, or as provided herein.

(g) **Split Shift:** A straight shift shall be considered as eight hours work within a spread of nine and one-half hours; a working shift of eight hours over a spread of nine and one-half hours, but not to exceed eleven hours per day shall be considered a split shift, and there shall not be more than one split in any one shift. Employees required to work a split shift shall receive fifty cents per day extra.

**Section 5. Holidays:** Monthly employees shall be allowed the following minimum number of holidays off with pay: New Year's Day, Admission Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Thanksgiving Day and Christmas Day. Work on such holidays, and other legal holidays heretofore regularly recognized by departments in 1942, shall be considered as overtime worked; provided, however, that employees in services commonly operating seven days per week, who are required to work on any of the above legal holidays or other legal holidays recognized by departments in 1942, shall be allowed a day off in lieu of such holiday, in accordance with the rules of the Civil Service Commission. Employees whose regular day off falls on one of these holidays shall be allowed another day off in lieu thereof.

**Section 6. Overtime—Monthly Employees:**

(a) Except as otherwise provided herein, or in the annual salary ordinance, overtime shall be paid on an hourly basis of one and one-half times the normal rate of pay, to all employees who are paid on a monthly basis and who work in excess of eight hours per day or in

excess of five days of forty hours per week, or seven and one-half hours per night and in excess of five nights of thirty-seven and one-half hours per week on night shifts, or who work on regular holidays specified herein, and such other legal holidays generally recognized by departments; provided, however, that the maximum overtime payment shall be based on \$250 per month and no overtime payment shall be made on any portion of an employee's compensation in excess of \$250 per month; and provided, further, that no overtime payment or additional cost shall accrue for the purpose of keeping City, County, or City and County, or department offices open on Saturday morning, with the exception of "busy seasons" in the offices of the Assessor, the Tax Collector, and Registrar of Voters, as provided in the annual salary ordinance.

(b) Compensations fixed herein on a per diem basis and converted to a monthly basis in the annual salary ordinance shall be subject to the provisions of Section 6(a) hereof, unless otherwise provided in the per diem overtime ordinance adopted annually by the Board of Supervisors.

(c) **Exceptions:** No overtime compensation or other payment shall be made to employees in positions established on a part-time basis, and such other officers and employees as are listed in the salary ordinance annually by the Board of Supervisors.

Employees in classifications included in Division R—Recreation Service, and Division X—Library Service, who work a weekly schedule of forty hours in six days or a night schedule of thirty-seven and one-half hours in six days, shall be paid for overtime worked at the rate of one and one-half times their normal rate of compensation for time worked in excess of their regular daily schedule and after forty hours per week.

**Section 7. Overtime—Per Diem Employees:** Overtime shall be paid all employees whose rates of pay are fixed herein and in the annual salary ordinance on a per diem basis in accordance with an ordinance to be established by the Board of Supervisors annually.

**Section 8. Method of Computation:** In converting per diem rates to monthly rates, the conversion shall be made by using the factor 21.25 days per month for a five-day week, 23.4 for a five and one-half day week, and 25.6 for a six-day week; all of which factors include allowance for the six holidays listed in Section 5 hereof. In figuring conversions, figures shall be rounded to the next highest half dollar.

**Section 9. Intermittent Service:** Permanent employees or temporary employees in classifications for which compensations are fixed herein on a monthly basis, who work less than a five-day week of forty hours as a regular condition of employment, and temporary employees in such classifications in positions which are intermittent in service or subject to irregular working schedules, shall be paid on a daily basis derived by dividing the normal monthly compensation by the factor 21.25 days. The Civil Service Commission shall determine which positions shall be subject to the provisions of this section.

**Section 10. Additional Employment:** No employee covered by the provisions of this ordinance shall accept any employment in addition to his regular city employment, except with the permission of the Civil Service Commission under the provisions of its Rule 36, or any amendments thereto. Employees shall be subject to any penalties provided for failure to comply with the provisions of said Rule 36.

**Section 11.** If during any succeeding fiscal year while this ordinance is in effect, it is determined by the Board of Supervisors, upon the recommendation of the Civil Service Commission, that changes in working conditions, hours of labor, or any other administrative provision contained in this ordinance, should be made for the good of the service, such changes shall be made in the annual salary ordinance

so as to reflect the necessary changes in working conditions, hours of labor or other administrative provisions in this ordinance; provided that no such change shall affect the basic compensation schedules provided for herein.

Section 11.1 If it shall be determined by any court of competent jurisdiction that any provision, salary or wage fixed in the administrative provisions or the schedule of compensations herein contained is contrary to the provisions of Section 151, or any other provision of the Charter, such determination shall not affect the validity of any other provision, salary or wage fixed in said ordinance and schedule of compensations.

Section 11.2. This ordinance shall take effect July 1, 1944.

Section 12. The compensation schedule for classifications included in Division A—BUILDING TRADES SERVICE, as set forth in the Civil Service Commission's classifications of positions are as follows, subject to the provisions of this ordinance:

Civil Service Commission and Rescinding Action Previously  
Taken by the Board of Supervisors.**

(Series of 1939)

Supervisor MacPhee presented the following recommendation of the Finance Committee:

Proposal No. 3921, Resolution No. 3888, as follows:

Whereas, on March 7, 1944, the Board of Supervisors considered the compensation schedules recommended to them by the Civil Service Commission under the provisions of Section 151 of the Charter on February 1, 1944; and

Whereas, the Board of Supervisors then transmitted to the Civil Service Commission for review, analysis, and report, proposed amendments to 106 classifications included in the report of the Civil Service Commission; and

Whereas, the report of the Civil Service Commission analyzing and reviewing the proposed amendments of the Board of Supervisors to the compensation schedules recommended by the Civil Service Commission was received and considered by the Board of Supervisors at its meeting held March 9, 1944; and

Whereas, on March 10, 1944, the Board of Supervisors adopted the report of the Civil Service Commission after amending it by changing the proposed compensation schedules for approximately 74 classifications and classes related thereto, and adopted revised administrative provisions to govern the administration of such compensation schedules; and

Whereas, since March 10, 1944, careful consideration has been given as to whether or not such actions were for the good of the service as a whole; and

Whereas, after due deliberation it is now the consensus of opinion that the action of the Board of Supervisors in amending the report of the Civil Service Commission and adopting revised administrative procedures in connection with such report, was inadvisable; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That this Board of Supervisors does hereby rescind the action taken at its meeting of March 10, 1944, adopting the report of the Civil Service Commission, and wherein amendments were made to the compensation schedules recommended by the Civil Service Commission and to the administrative provisions governing such schedules; and be it

Further Resolved, That this Board of Supervisors does hereby adopt the compensation schedules recommended by the Civil Service Commission in its report of February 1, 1944, with the following amendments thereto:

Further Resolved, That the Board of Supervisors does hereby adopt the administrative provisions to govern the administration of the compensation schedules adopted herewith; and be it

Further Resolved, That the compensation schedules as amended and the administrative provisions thereof be adopted as an emergency measure to comply with the time limits established by law.

Supervisor MacPhee, after presenting the foregoing resolution, explained the purport thereof and pointed out that if adopted, it would rescind action taken by the Board on Friday, March 10, 1944. After several conferences with the Mayor and discussion with a number of Supervisors, it was decided that this action be taken in order to get a document which would be satisfactory, to some extent, to all concerned. It still is not entirely satisfactory to all the Supervisors nor to the Mayor, but for the purpose of attempting to get together on a program that would give relief to many of the people in the lower brackets this report is being recommended to the Board. It is being recommended very reluctantly by the Finance Committee, because the Committee feels that some people should be given consideration and others are given too much consideration. However, before adoption of the foregoing resolution, Bill No. 2800, on the Calendar, should be tabled, and he would so move. Motion seconded by Supervisor Green.

Whereupon, the roll was called and Bill No. 2800, Salary Standardization Ordinance, was *tabled* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Colman, Gallagher, Gartland, Green, MacPhee, Mancuso, Mead, Meyer, Sullivan, Uhl—10.

Absent: Supervisor Brown—1.

#### Consideration of Resolution No. 3888.

Thereupon, Resolution No. 3888 was taken up and considered.

Supervisor Mead, in expressing his views on the foregoing resolution, stated that he, as one member of the Finance Committee, was recommending the resolution with great reluctance. The Board of Supervisors, through no fault of its own, had got into a position where judgment and reason must be used. The Supervisors could stand back of their original program, but he was fearful that if they did they would be cutting off their noses to spite their faces. As for himself, he was not willing to see 82 per cent of the people in the lower brackets harmed because of the stand taken by the Board of Supervisors. He was not satisfied; neither were the Mayor and other members of the Board. If the original recommendations were sent to the Mayor, and returned with the Mayor's veto, Supervisor Mead continued, he was satisfied that the Board could override the veto, but the measure would undoubtedly go to a referendum vote. If that should happen, it was his opinion that it would take a tremendous beating. If the Board did not go along with this present proposal it would be supplying those interested in a referendum with more ammunition than they had had for a number of years, with the result that the people in the lower brackets would be getting nothing. That is not the desire of the members of the Finance Committee. A sincere effort has been made to take care of people who were not taken care of previously, but through circumstances beyond the control of the members of the Board, or the Mayor, the Board is forced to consider a compromise. He regretted that such position had been brought about, and he was not apologetic for his position, because he did not think it was the fault

of the Supervisors or of the Finance Committee. The position as outlined by Supervisor MacPhee and by the other members of the Finance Committee seems to be at the moment the only solution, and he was sorry that he could not go along with the position taken by the Board of Supervisors as a whole on Friday, March 10, 1944. He was particularly interested in those employees in the lower brackets, but he was also interested in those in the higher brackets. He disagreed with some of the members of the Board who have taken the position that those in the \$300 bracket were in the so-called higher brackets. He was in favor of raises in the lower brackets and for some in the higher brackets.

Supervisor Colman, in discussing the situation, stated that he was not satisfied with the report of the Civil Service Commission. He did not believe that it properly and correctly reflected the wage conditions either on the outside or in similar governing bodies. From his own knowledge and after consultation with others, he was firmly convinced that in the majority of instances, and probably in a large majority, that his statement was absolutely correct. He had come to the Board firmly of the opinion that he would vote against the report of the Civil Service Commission. However, it was the desire of his colleagues that the Board should vote unanimously on Salary Standardization. Mayor Lapham has probably taken some things into consideration which he himself did not like and probably under other conditions might not have accepted. In order to produce harmony, and to continue it in the Board, with the statement that he had just made, he announced, that he was decidedly not in accord with it, for entirely different reasons than his colleagues, for he had investigated the matter fully, nevertheless, he believed it would be better for all concerned for the whole Board to support Salary Standardization recommendations on the same basis, and out of respect primarily to the fact that his Honor the Mayor has seen fit to compromise his views, he would compromise his own and would vote in favor of the recommendation of the Finance Committee.

Mr. Charles Foehm, representing electricians, after citing the history of salary standardization as it had affected employees whom he was representing, and calling attention specifically to cable splicers and car repairers, protested against discrimination in the Civil Service Commission's report.

Mr. Jack Leonard, representing laborers, stated that his people could not go along with the amended ordinance. They felt that they had appeared before the Civil Service Commission and the Board of Supervisors with a fair and legitimate claim for wage accorded them by governmental agencies. They had received a wage increase through the Wage Adjustment Board. There are many laborers working for the Public Utilities Commission and for the Department of Public Works. These two departments bid on contracts let by the City and County of San Francisco and on any number of occasions they are successful in getting the contracts. In the future they will have to pay the laborers working on those contracts \$1 per hour and then will have to revert back to the lower wage when the contracts are finished. That will not be too healthy a situation. In denying the increase to laborers the Board is denying the lowest paid employees of food and clothing.

Mr. Thomas McWilliams, representing pharmacists at the San Francisco Hospital, held that the pharmacists had been sadly neglected. He pointed out the requirements for employment as pharmacists. The present scale for pharmacists is \$200 to \$250 per month. The minimum wage should be \$225. Wages for pharmacists in private employment are \$275 to \$300 per month.

Mr. H. S. Foley, representing Municipal Railway streetcar men, urged consideration for the "S" Classification. He objected strongly to the change of attitude on the part of the Board of Supervisors. Now, on the last date when standardization can be considered, the Board of

Supervisors, at the insistence of one man, has taken a definite change in attitude toward increases in wages for the "S" Classification, as well as for other city employees. The streetcar men in San Francisco are not the highest paid streetcar men in the United States, as has been stated. The Streetcar Men's International has signed contracts at rates of from \$1 to \$1.15 per hour. A statement has been made that men at the front cannot strike for a raise in pay. There are ten men with the Municipal Railway who have returned from all points in the front, and who have advised the men to strike for increases in pay for platform men. The men intend to do so. They can do more than just use words. One man refuses to grant proper increases in pay; he states he will veto such a proposal even before he gets the reasons, before representatives of organizations can speak to him. The Mayor refused to receive him, Mr. Foley, because he was too busy.

Mrs. Mollie Minudri, on being granted the privilege of the floor, stated that Mr. Arthur Hare, representing institutional workers, because of his inability to be present, had requested her to take up with the Board the matter of overtime for institutional and hospital workers. The Board of Supervisors eliminated overtime pay for the sixth day of employment. They should be given overtime. The denial of overtime pay will seriously affect the morale of those people.

Supervisor MacPhee, at the request of Supervisor Uhl, explained that the salary standardization legislation to be presented by the Board would provide that time and one-half be paid after forty-eight hours per week. Between forty and forty-eight hours, straight time would be paid. That would be the recommendation of the Finance Committee.

Mr. John Devani, speaking in behalf of Municipal Railway employees, urged that proper consideration be given to those employees.

Mr. Frank Moitza urged that consideration be given to library employees and to nurses. Those people deserve an increase in pay.

Mr. E. P. Troy addressed the Board in behalf of the carmen. There are no employees of the City and County, he stated, who are more loyal to the positions they hold than are the carmen. From the very beginning that has been so. The Municipal Railway would not be the success it is today, or has been in the past, but for the loyalty of the carmen. They deserve kindly consideration. Although the wage scale of the Market Street Railway Company is below that of the Municipal Railway, the men work overtime and they get time and one-half for overtime, and according to the report of the Market Street Railway to the Railroad Commission there are about ten men in the employ of that company as motormen who are receiving in wages from \$5,000 to \$6,000 per year. Doubtless there are many others receiving from \$3,000 to \$4,000 per year.

Mr. Joe Murphy, representing International Laborers, and also speaking for Water Department workers, announced that men working in the Water Department receive about \$32 per week after deductions from their salaries are made. He requested that the wage originally recommended be given those employees.

Mr. A. J. Younger of the Municipal Conference stated that so far as the Conference was concerned, it had no part in the compromise bill before the Board. The Conference was opposed to it.

Supervisor Mancuso announced, that as a member of the Finance Committee, he wanted the record to show that although he was going along with the Committee's recommendation, he was not fully in accord with it. It was a matter of giving some justification to equities. The Committee realizes that it is better to take part of what it wants than to get nothing at all. The Committee realizes that there are inequities in the Civil Service Commission's report, but it provides for increases in salaries for many who should receive such increases. As for the laborers, Supervisor Mancuso continued, he believed they had a justifiable claim and that they would be sustained if they took the

matter into court. He urged that the Board go along as a unit with the Finance Committee's recommendations.

Mr. Fred Levy inquired as to what the Board had in mind relative to employees for whom it had made recommended increases but who apparently would not be taken care of this year. Will that particular group be taken care of next year? He expressed a desire for an answer to that question. Was there any provision contemplated for such employees? It was quite conceivable that the measure about to be approved would go along for another five years without anything being done for them.

Mrs. Kathleen Dolen, in reply, declared that partial standardization was out. There could be no commitments for any particular group of employees; any changes would have to be made following a complete survey.

Supervisor MacPhee stated that each year there could be appropriated \$10,000 for a salary survey if it should be the opinion of the Board of Supervisors that such survey was necessary.

Supervisor Brown, in expressing his views, stated that his attitude was made very clear at a previous meeting of the Board. Now this matter has been the subject of negotiations between the Finance Committee of the Board and his Honor the Mayor, and that a meeting of minds has been reached which, though apparently not satisfactory to everyone is, at least, a workable compromise. He understood that the proposal was to follow the original recommendations of the Civil Service Commission, with a list of some thirteen or fourteen corrections which the Commission had approved after its original recommendations were before the Board. The changes made by the Finance Committee had been abandoned. The Civil Service Commission has stated that it can justify every scale that it has recommended, but he felt that it was by the devise of interpreting a clause in the Charter which is a little ambiguous in its working. The Mayor has approved the findings of the Civil Service Commission. Since the Mayor and the Finance Committee have come to an agreement, and the Mayor is willing to accept the Commission's interpretations of the Charter, and will sign the ordinance as passed by the Board of Supervisors, Supervisor Brown continued, he would accept those findings. However, he wanted to call attention to the fact that the basis on which the Civil Service Commission had arrived at its conclusions was certainly susceptible to a number of interpretations, and the Commission has accepted the most liberal, with the result that in many cases the scale they have proposed are to a considerable degree higher than the scales which the War Labor Board has arrived at for the City and County of San Francisco and to which the scales for private employment are limited. Private employers cannot pay more than the War Labor Board grants for the various groups of employees, while the City and County of San Francisco proceeds to pay not only more, but plenty more. The City now, in a period of manpower shortage, is competing with the taxpayer for employment of people at a 20, 30 or 40 per cent advantage over the taxpayer, which means that the City can keep its ranks of employment filled and it attracts employees from the ranks of private employment.

Supervisor Brown, in continuing his statement, said he did not agree with the policy adopted by the Civil Service Commission. He was inclined to believe that there might be some attempt made to find out just what did constitute wage scales in private employment. "I take issue with the fact," he stated, "that the Commission has seen fit in wartime, having full knowledge of the necessity to control in some degree the national income to prevent run away inflation, that they have seen fit to give wages very considerable above those scales and to allow brackets to be established with which private employment cannot compete. I do not think it is right. That is the way I feel about it. However, I do not propose to be the single vote against this



matter because that would accomplish no purpose, but I want my feelings in the matter to become a part of the record."

Supervisor Uhl, in presenting his views of the situation, stated that apparently his vote would be the only one against the matter. He could not understand why the head of one of the museums should receive a \$100 increase in salary which was denied him the year before. He intended to fight for the little fellow. His vote would be a vote of protest. On the Board's Calendar for the day's business is an item for a general clerk at \$165 per month. It is amazing to think a man can bring up a family and raise children on such a wage. He would register his "No" vote as a protest.

#### In Hands of the Board.

On motion by Supervisor MacPhee, all citizens present and so desiring having been heard, the matter was taken into the hands of the Board.

Thereupon, Supervisor MacPhee stated that both Supervisors Mead and Mancuso had reflected the attitude of the Finance Committee that the report does not nearly come up to what the Committee had hoped it would. The Committee was trying to get some place by compromise. Under the Committee's recommendation, approximately 82 per cent of the money involved goes to employees earning less than \$300 per month. There will be a certain amount of relief given to a large group of employees which have not been receiving large wages. He would like to see it include all groups receiving under \$300, but because some employees could not be taken care of there was no reason why everyone should be thrown out. Just because one man is receiving \$100 per month and others are receiving \$50 or \$75, is no reason to deny everyone else what they are entitled to. That is not democracy. The Mayor has given full cooperation in the matter. The Committee has not agreed with his findings, nor has he agreed with the findings of the Committee, but he has been kind enough to sit down with the Committee and try to work out a solution on the basis of which both he and the Board can go along. The Commission has been criticised as well. The Commission, though, has given the Committee full information and cooperation through its representatives. It is too bad that Supervisor Uhl will not vote for the Committee's recommendations, but life is just a matter of compromise.

Supervisor Sullivan announced that he would vote for the Finance Committee's recommendation, although it was not with a smile that he was so voting.

Thereupon, the roll was called and the foregoing resolution was *Adopted* by the following vote:

## Salary Standardization Ordinance

(Series of 1939)

Supervisor MacPhee presented:

Bill No. 2809, Ordinance No. 2639, as follows:

An ordinance fixing a schedule of compensations to be paid employees of the City and County of San Francisco and noncertificated employees of the San Francisco Unified School District in certain specified classifications which are subject to the provisions of Section 151 of the Charter and providing for the administration of such schedule and that the said schedule shall become effective July 1, 1944, an emergency ordinance.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco, as follows:

Section 1. Pursuant to the provisions of Section 151 of the Charter, the schedule of compensations set forth herein shall, beginning July 1, 1944, determine and fix the salaries, wages, and compensations for the several classifications of employment in the San Francisco municipal service and the noncertificated personnel of the San Francisco Unified School District hereinafter enumerated, subject to the terms of this ordinance; provided, however, that the salaries of occupants of permanent positions as of June 30, 1944, shall not be reduced below the salaries such employees were receiving in the same classification on June 30, 1944, for the same number of hours worked.

Section 2. (a) **Method of Payment:** Employees entering the municipal service in any of the specified classifications enumerated herein on or after July 1, 1944, shall be paid the entrance rate provided for their particular classifications in the schedule of compensations herein contained; provided, however, that employees promoted within the service who receive in the lower class a salary higher than the minimum of the compensation schedule for the higher class shall not be reduced to the entrance rate of the promotive class. The compensations of all employees receiving less than the minimum of the schedules specified herein for their particular classifications shall be adjusted to the minimum on July 1. Every employee who entered the service by permanent appointment or was promoted in the service on or before July 1, 1943, shall receive on July 1, 1944, and annually thereafter on July 1st, the salary fixed for his years of service based on his original date of appointment to a permanent position in his present classification; provided, however, that for the fiscal year 1944-45 and in such other years as the Board of Supervisors shall designate in the annual salary ordinance, each such employee shall receive one full increment as established for his particular classification. Provided further that each employee entering the service by permanent appointment or being promoted in the service after July 1, 1943, shall receive annually one full increment increase as set forth in the compensation schedule established for his particular classification payable on the first day of the month immediately following his anniversary of employment or promotion; provided, however, that no annual increment for such employee shall be allowed if the granting of the increment will establish the compensation at a rate beyond which the employee is entitled by reason of accrued years of service in the class. No employee shall receive more than one salary increment annually, except for adjustment to the proper step in the compensation schedule on the basis of seniority. No increase in compensation shall cause the salary of an employee to exceed the maximum fixed herein for his classification.

(b) Except as provided in Section 2a hereof advancement from the entrance salary to the maximum salary where such minima and maxima are recommended shall be by annual increment as set forth below, depending upon the amount of range from the entrance to the maximum and the said table of annual increments is hereby made a part of the compensation schedules herein determined.

**Section 3. Maintenance:** Salaries and wages set forth in the schedule of compensations herein contained are gross compensations. Deductions shall be made from such salaries or wages, as provided by law, for maintenance or other accommodations and charges therefor shall be fixed by law in accordance with the schedule established in the annual salary ordinance; provided, however, that no charge shall be made for maintenance or other accommodations available to employees in public institutions unless such employees actually receive such maintenance or utilize such accommodations.

**Section 4. Hours of Work:**

(a) Compensations fixed herein on a per diem rate are based on an eight-hour day.

(b) Except as otherwise provided herein, or in the annual salary ordinance, compensations fixed herein on a monthly basis are based on an eight-hour day and a five-day week. In order that there shall be no diminution of service to the public it shall be the duty of the head of each department to stagger, arrange and assign the work of his department so that a skeleton crew will be on duty in each department which is required to be open on Saturday morning for the conduct of public business, and no officer or employee in such department shall work more than a five-day week, except as part of a skeleton crew to keep such office open on Saturday morning, and except as provided in Section 4, subdivisions (e) and (f) hereof. Time worked on Saturday morning as part of a skeleton crew shall be compensated for by equal time off of one-half day in the same or succeeding week.

(c) **Night Shifts:** Seven and one-half hours per day and five days per week shall constitute the normal work day and week for employees whose compensations are fixed herein on a monthly basis and who work on night shifts. A night shift is any full time shift which commences after 2 P. M. and prior to 6 A. M.

(d) **Part-Time Services:** Except as provided in subdivision (e) herein a daily work schedule of less than eight hours or a night schedule of less than seven and one-half hours shall be considered part-time employment, and compensations therefor shall be fixed in the annual salary ordinance at a rate based upon the full time rate for the classification, proportionate to the hours worked, with due regard to seniority of service. Provided, however, that these provisions will not apply to physicians employed in their professional capacity on a call basis or on a regular consultant basis; compensations for such positions shall be established annually by the Board of Supervisors in the annual salary ordinance.

(e) **Exceptions:** To provide for the uninterrupted operation of

the service, employees in classifications included in Division R—Recreation Service and Division X—Library Service, may work the forty-hour week schedule within six days and shall not be subject to the provisions of Section 4(g).

(f) No increase or decrease in the number of hours and days worked per week on a regular schedule different from eight hours per day and five days per week shall be allowed except upon approval of the Board of Supervisors in the annual salary ordinance, or as provided herein.

(g) **Split Shift:** A straight shift shall be considered as eight hours work within a spread of nine and one-half hours; a working shift of eight hours over a spread of nine and one-half hours, but not to exceed eleven hours per day shall be considered a split shift, and there shall not be more than one split in any one shift. Employees required to work a split shift shall receive fifty cents per day extra.

**Section 5. Holidays:** Monthly employees shall be allowed the following minimum number of holidays off with pay: New Year's Day, Admission Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Thanksgiving Day and Christmas Day. Work on such holidays, and other legal holidays heretofore regularly recognized by departments in 1942, shall be considered as overtime worked; provided, however, that employees in services commonly operating seven days per week, who are required to work on any of the above legal holidays or other legal holidays recognized by departments in 1942, shall be allowed a day off in lieu of such holiday, in accordance with the rules of the Civil Service Commission. Employees whose regular day off falls on one of these holidays shall be allowed another day off in lieu thereof.

**Section 6. (a) Regular Work Schedules of More Than Five Days of Eight Hours:** Except as otherwise provided herein, or in the annual salary ordinance, straight time payment shall be made for time worked on regular work schedules in excess of five days of eight hours up to and including six days of eight hours on day shifts, or after seven and one-half hours up to and including eight hours per day, and after five days of seven and one-half hours up to and including six days of eight hours on night shifts.

(b) **Emergency Overtime Payment, Monthly Employees:** Except as otherwise provided herein, or in the annual salary ordinance, overtime shall be paid for emergency work on an hourly basis of one and one-half times the normal rate of pay to all employees who are paid on a monthly basis and who are required to work in excess of eight hours per day, or in excess of a five-day forty-hour week, or who are required to work on regular holidays specified herein and such other legal holidays generally recognized by departments; provided, however, that the maximum overtime payment shall be based on \$250 per month, and no overtime payment shall be made on any portion of an employee's compensation in excess of \$250 per month; and provided further that no overtime payment or additional cost through straight time payment shall accrue for the purpose of keeping city, county, or city and county, or department offices open on Saturday morning, with the exception of busy seasons in the offices of the Assessor, the Tax Collector, and the Registrar of Voters, as provided in the annual salary ordinance.

(c) Compensations fixed herein on a per diem basis and converted to a monthly basis in the annual salary ordinance shall be subject to the provisions of Section 6(a) hereof, unless otherwise provided in the per diem overtime ordinance adopted annually by the Board of Supervisors.

(d) **Exceptions:** No overtime compensation or other payment shall be made to employees in positions established on a part-time basis, and such other officers and employees as are listed in the salary ordinance annually by the Board of Supervisors.

Employees in classifications included in Division R—Recreation Service, and Division X—Library Service, who work a weekly schedule of forty hours in six days or a night schedule of thirty-seven and one-

half hours in six days, shall be paid for emergency overtime worked at the rate of one and one-half times their normal rate of compensation for time worked in excess of their regular daily schedule and after forty hours per week. Straight time payments shall be made as provided in Section 6 hereof.

**Section 7. Overtime—Per Diem Employees:** Overtime shall be paid all employees whose rates of pay are fixed herein and in the annual salary ordinance on a per diem basis in accordance with an ordinance to be established by the Board of Supervisors annually.

**Section 8. Method of Computation:** In converting per diem rates to monthly rates, the conversion shall be made by using the factor 21.25 days per month for a five-day week, 23.4 for a five and one-half day week, and 25.6 for a six-day week; all of which factors include allowance for the six holidays listed in Section 5 hereof. In figuring conversions, figures shall be rounded to the next highest half dollar.

**Section 9. Intermittent Service:** Permanent employees or temporary employees in classifications for which compensations are fixed herein on a monthly basis, who work less than a five-day week of forty hours as a regular condition of employment, and temporary employees in such classifications in positions which are intermittent in service or subject to irregular working schedules, shall be paid on a daily basis derived by dividing the normal monthly compensation by the factor 21.25 days. The Civil Service Commission shall determine which positions shall be subject to the provisions of this section.

**Section 10. Additional Employment:** No employee covered by the provisions of this ordinance shall accept any employment in addition to his regular city employment, except with the permission of the Civil Service Commission under the provisions of its Rule 36, or any amendments thereto. Employees shall be subject to any penalties provided for failure to comply with the provisions of said Rule 36.

**Section 11.** If during any succeeding fiscal year while this ordinance is in effect, it is determined by the Board of Supervisors, upon the recommendation of the Civil Service Commission, that changes in working conditions, hours of labor, or any other administrative provision contained in this ordinance, should be made for the good of the service, such changes shall be made in the annual salary ordinance so as to reflect the necessary changes in working conditions, hours of labor or other administrative provisions in this ordinance; provided that no such change shall affect the basic compensation schedules provided for herein.

**Section 11.1** If it shall be determined by any court of competent jurisdiction that any provision, salary or wage fixed in the administrative provisions or the schedule of compensations herein contained is contrary to the provisions of Section 151, or any other provision of the Charter, such determination shall not affect the validity of any other provision, salary or wage fixed in said ordinance and schedule of compensations.

**Section 11.2.** This ordinance shall take effect July 1, 1944.

**Section 12.** The compensation schedule for classifications included in Division A—BUILDING TRADES SERVICE, as set forth in the Civil Service Commission's classifications of positions are as follows, subject to the provisions of this ordinance:

#### Final Passage.

### Amendment to the Fire Code Providing Revised Procedure for the Inspection and Regulation of Vehicles Transporting Flammable Liquid, and Providing Fees Therefor.

(Series of 1939)

Bill No. 2782, Ordinance No. 2643, as follows:

Amending Article 12, Chapter IV (Fire Code), Part II, of the San Francisco Municipal Code, providing inspection and regulation of vehicles used to transport flammable liquid, by revising the title and table of contents to reflect amendments, additions and deletions to said Article; providing amendments, additions and deletions to definitions, permit and certificate of approval required, construction, tank vehicle chassis, assembly and appurtenances, operation of tank vehicles, tank full trailer prohibited—exception, permit procedure—fees—identification, rules and regulations, suspension or revocation of a permit—procedure for, exceptions, enforcement, and violations; providing for permits now in force—expiration date; and providing a saving clause.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco, as follows:

Section 1. Article 12, Chapter IV (Fire Code), Part II, of the San Francisco Municipal Code, is hereby amended to read as follows:

#### ARTICLE 12

#### TANK VEHICLES

- Sec. 400. Definitions.
- Sec. 401. Permit and Certificate of Approval required.
- Sec. 402. Construction.
- Sec. 403. Tank vehicle chassis, assembly and appurtenances.
- Sec. 404. Operation of tank vehicles.
- Sec. 405. Tank full trailer prohibited—exception.
- Sec. 406. Permit procedure—fees—identification.
- Sec. 407. Rules and regulations.
- Sec. 408. Suspension or revocation of a permit—procedure for.
- Sec. 409. Exceptions.
- Sec. 410. Enforcement.
- Sec. 411. Violations.

SEC. 400. **Definitions.** Whenever used in this Article, the following words and phrases are defined as herein specified and shall be deemed and construed to have the meaning ascribed to them in this Section. Words and phrases not defined are to be construed according to the general usage of the language.

(a) **Tank truck.** Any single self-propelled motor vehicle equipped with a cargo tank mounted thereon, and used for the transportation of flammable liquid.

(b) **Tank full trailer.** Any vehicle, without motive power, equipped

with a cargo tank mounted thereon, and used for the transportation of flammable liquid, and so constructed that when drawn by a self-propelled motor vehicle no part of its weight rests upon the towing vehicle.

(c) **Tank semi-trailer.** Any vehicle, without motive power, equipped with a cargo tank mounted thereon, and used for the transportation of flammable liquid, and so constructed that when drawn by a self-propelled motor vehicle by means of a fifth-wheel connection some part of its load and weight rests upon the towing vehicle.

(d) **Tank vehicle.** Any tank truck, tank full trailer or tank semi-trailer, as defined in subsections (a), (b) and (c) of this Section.

(e) **Tractor truck.** Any single self-propelled motor vehicle used for the purpose of drawing a tank full trailer, or tank semi-trailer, or any combination of such trailers, as defined in subsections (b) and (c) of this Section.

(f) **Cargo tank.** Any container having a liquid capacity in excess of one hundred (100) gallons, used for the carrying of flammable liquid, and mounted permanently or otherwise upon a tank vehicle. The term "cargo tank" does not apply to any container used solely for the purpose of supplying fuel for the propulsion of the tank vehicle upon which it is mounted.

(g) **Flammable liquid.** Any liquids having a flash point below one hundred and eighty-seven (187°) degrees Fahrenheit (Tag closed cup, ASTM D56 API 509) which, for the purpose of this Article, shall be divided into two (2) classes, to wit:

- (1) Class A, embracing those flammable liquids having a flash point of one hundred (100°) degrees Fahrenheit or less.
- (2) Class B, embracing those flammable liquids having a flash point above one hundred (100°) degrees Fahrenheit to and including one hundred and eighty-seven (187°) degrees Fahrenheit.

(h) **Person.** Any individual, co-partnership, society, association, joint stock company, corporation and any combination of individuals.

(i) **Chief.** The Chief of the Division of Fire Prevention and Investigation of the Fire Department of the City and County of San Francisco.

(j) **Approved.** In conformity with the requirements of the Chief of the Division of Fire Prevention and Investigation of the Fire Department of the City and County of San Francisco.

(k) **City and County.** The City and County of San Francisco.

**SEC. 401. Permit and Certificate of Approval Required.** It shall be unlawful for any person engaged in the business of manufacturing, refining, distilling, storing or transporting any flammable liquid to maintain, operate, drive or use any tank vehicle for the purpose of transporting flammable liquid on the public streets of the City and County without first obtaining from the Chief a permit and certificate of approval for such vehicle, except as otherwise specifically provided for in this Article.

**SEC. 402. Construction.** All cargo tanks shall be so constructed as to meet the following requirements:

(a) **Material.** Except as hereinafter provided, all steel sheets for cargo tanks shall be of open hearth or blue annealed steel meeting the following requirements:

Yield Point .....	25,000 lbs. per sq. in.
Ultimate strength .....	45,000 lbs. per sq. in.
Elongation—2 in. sample.....	20%

(b) **Thickness of Sheets.** Except as hereinafter provided the minimum thickness of cargo tank sheets shall be as follows:

<i>Aggregate Cargo Tank Capacity Gallons</i>	<i>Minimum Thickness of Material Shell</i>	<i>Thickness of Material Head</i>
600 or less.....	14 gauge, U.S. Standard	14 gauge, U.S. Standard, if suitably bilged, stiffened, or corrugated; otherwise 12 gauge.
Over 600 to and including 1,200 .....	12 gauge, U.S. Standard	12 gauge, U.S. Standard, if suitably bilged, stiffened, or corrugated; otherwise 10 gauge.
Over 1,200—Divided into compartments of 600 gal. each or less, or with 600 gal. included between baffles.....	12 gauge, U.S. Standard	12 gauge, U.S. Standard, if suitably bilged, otherwise, 10 gauge.
Over 1,200—Not so divided....	10 gauge, U.S. Standard	10 gauge, U.S. Standard, if suitably bilged, stiffened, or corrugated; otherwise 8 gauge.

(c) **Exception.** Material other than as specified in subsections (a) and (b) of this Section may be used in thicknesses which will give strength equivalent to that of open hearth or blue annealed steel.

(d) **Joints—Method of Joining.** Joints shall be made in accordance with recognized good practice, and the efficiency of any joint shall not be less than eighty-five (85%) percent.

(e) **Bulkheads.** Tanks with compartments carrying fluids of different classes shall be provided with an air space between the compartments, and this air space shall be equipped and maintained with drainage facilities.

(f) **Baffles.** Every cargo tank, and every compartment of a cargo tank, over ninety (90) inches in length shall be provided with baffles, the number of which shall be such that the linear distance between any two (2) adjacent baffles, or between any tank head or bulkhead and the baffles nearest it, shall in no case exceed sixty (60) inches. Each baffle shall have a minimum area as great as eighty (80%) percent of the cross sectional area of the cargo tank.

(g) **Liquid Expansion.** Each cargo tank or cargo tank compartment shall be equipped with a dome equal in size to three-fourths ( $\frac{3}{4}$ ) of one (1%) percent of the capacity of the cargo tank or cargo tank compartment to which it is connected, or an outage marker set at three-fourths ( $\frac{3}{4}$ ) of one (1%) percent. The dome shall not be filled with liquid and the cargo tank or cargo tank compartment shall not be filled beyond the outage marker.

(h) **Vents.** Each cargo tank or cargo tank compartment shall be provided with an approved vacuum and pressure operating vent with a diameter of at least three-fourths ( $\frac{3}{4}$ ) of an inch, and, in addition thereto, a vent opening with an area of at least two (2) square inches shall be provided, which normally shall be kept closed by an approved device that will open and relieve such internal pressure as may be created by exposure to fires or heat.

(i) **Draw-off Valves.** Withdrawal of flammable liquid from a cargo tank shall be by gravity or other approved method through approved draw-off valves having discharge end threaded or otherwise so designed as to permit of tight connection with hose, and installed in an approved location on the cargo tank.

(j) **Internal Valves.** Each cargo tank or cargo tank compartment



shall be equipped with an approved internal valve located inside the shell of the tank or compartment in the outlet at the bottom of the tank or compartment, and, except during delivery operations, such valve shall automatically be kept closed. Internal valves shall be operated by an approved method, and the controlling device shall be installed close to the draw-off valve. The operating mechanism shall be so designed and constructed as to insure automatic closing of the internal valve in the event of fire.

(k) **Emergency Control—Internal Valves.** The operating mechanism for such internal valves shall be provided with an approved emergency control remote from the draw-off valves for use in the event of accidents or fire during delivery operations.

(l) **Internal Valve Protection.** Any pipe work leading from the internal valves shall be so designed as to insure its failure, in the event of an accident, without injury to the internal valve.

(m) **Capacity.** The aggregate capacity of the cargo tank or cargo tanks on any single tank vehicle shall not exceed six thousand five hundred (6,500) gallons, and if the capacity of any single cargo tank transporting Class A flammable liquid shall exceed six hundred (600) gallons, the cargo tank shall be subdivided into two (2) or more compartments, no one of which shall exceed six hundred (600) gallons. A tolerance of ten (10%) percent is permitted for individual compartments or cargo tanks, but in no case shall the aggregate capacity of the combined compartments or cargo tanks, including tolerance, exceed six thousand five hundred (6,500) gallons.

(n) **Test.** Each cargo tank and each compartment thereof shall be tested and proven tight at five (5) pounds per square inch minimum pressure.

**SEC. 403. Tank Vehicle Chassis, Assembly, and Appurtenances.** Any tank vehicle chassis, assembly and appurtenances thereof shall meet the following requirements:

(a) **Wheels.** No tank truck or tank full trailer shall be equipped with less than four (4) wheels.

(b) **Tires.** All tank vehicles shall be equipped with rubber tires on all wheels.

(c) **Assembly.** The cargo tank shall be adequately supported upon and securely attached to or be a part of the tank vehicle upon which it is carried.

(d) **Bonding and Grounding:**

(1) Cargo tanks, chassis, axles, and springs shall be metallically interconnected.

(2) Adequate provision shall be made prior to each filling or delivery operation for the grounding of any static charges that may be present.

(3) Drag chains or other flexible electrical conductors providing a pathway for the dissipation of static charges from the tank vehicle to the ground may be used but shall not be construed as meeting the requirements of subdivision (2) of subsection (d) of this Section.

(e) **Protection Against Collision.** Draw-off valves or faucets projecting beyond the frame at the rear of the tank vehicle shall be adequately protected against collision by steel bumpers or similar means.

(f) **Lighting.** Tank vehicles and tractor trucks shall not be equipped with any artificial light other than electricity. Lighting circuits shall have suitable over-current protection (fuses or automatic circuit breakers). The wiring shall have sufficient carrying capacity and mechanical strength, and shall be secured, insulated, and pro-

ected against physical damage, in keeping with recognized good practice.

(g) **Fuel Tank.** The fuel tank shall not be placed over or adjacent to the engine. It shall be constructed and mounted in such a manner as to present no unusual hazards.

(h) **Exhaust System.** The exhaust system, including muffler and exhaust line, shall have ample clearance from the fuel system and combustible materials, and shall not be exposed to accumulations of grease, oil, or gasoline. The exhaust line shall terminate in an approved location remote from the draw-off valves.

(i) **Fire Extinguishers.** Each tank vehicle and tractor truck shall be equipped and maintained with at least one (1) approved hand fire extinguisher of a type suitable for extinguishing flammable liquid fires. Fire extinguishers shall be kept in good operating condition at all times, and they shall be located in an accessible place on each tank vehicle and tractor truck.

**SEC. 404. Operation of Tank Vehicles.** The operation of tank vehicles shall be conducted in conformity with the following requirements:

(a) **Loading Operations.** Tank vehicles shall be filled from approved storage tanks and equipment only. During filling operations the fill pipe shall be electrically connected to the tank vehicle by a bond wire attached to a metallic part of the cargo tank. This bond shall be made before removing covers of fill openings. When a funnel is used it shall be so designed as to insure metallic contact between the fill pipe and the cargo tank.

(b) **Unloading Operations.** Delivery of flammable liquid from tank vehicles shall be to underground containers only, unless written authority to the contrary has been first obtained from the Chief, and shall be by an approved hose connected to a draw-off valve. Provisions shall be made for a continuous electrical conductor between the tank vehicle and the fill opening of underground tanks and containers. Where delivery by hose is not practical, an approved delivery bucket may be used, provided it is substantially made, constructed entirely of metal, with a mouth not larger than six (6) inches in diameter and with a capacity not exceeding five (5) gallons. A metallic connection shall be maintained between the bucket and draw-off valve when flammable liquid is withdrawn from tank vehicles in this manner. It is prohibited to deliver flammable liquid from tank vehicles to fuel tanks of motor vehicles or containers other than herein specified.

(c) **Shut Down of Motors.** Motors of tank trucks or tractor-trucks shall be shut down during making and breaking hose connections. If loading or unloading is done without the use of a power pump, the tank truck or tractor truck motor shall be shut down throughout such operation.

(d) **Where Deliveries May Be Made.** Tank vehicles are prohibited inside any building during delivery operations, and all containers shall be filled outside of buildings.

(e) **To Whom Deliveries May Be Made.** No person shall deliver to another person any flammable liquid in violation of the provisions of this Article, and no delivery of flammable liquid shall be made unless the person receiving such flammable liquid has a valid permit, or a valid permit and license, as may be required under the provisions of the San Francisco Municipal Code for the storing, handling, sale, or using of flammable liquid.

(f) **Storage and Repairs.** Tank vehicles shall not be permitted inside any building except while undergoing repairs or unless the building is used exclusively for the storage of tank vehicles. Where flame, fire, or other intense heat is required in repairing any part of a tank

vehicle, cargo tanks shall first be made free of all flammable or explosive vapor and liquid.

(g) **Chock Blocks.** Each tank vehicle shall carry at least one (1) approved chock block, which shall be placed against one of the rear wheels while the tank vehicle is parked on a grade.

**SEC. 405. Tank Full Trailer Prohibited—Exception.** The distribution of flammable liquid within the City and County by means of a tank full trailer is prohibited; provided, however, the use of a tank full trailer or other tank vehicle to transport flammable liquid from outside points to flammable liquid bulk plants within the City and County or from such flammable liquid bulk plants to outside points shall be permitted. The Chief shall designate the route to be traveled by such tank vehicle within the City and County and shall prohibit within the City and County any such tank vehicle which, in his judgment, constitutes a danger to public life or property. Cargo tanks on such tank vehicles transporting, as permitted in this Section, Class "A" flammable liquid shall be exempt from the provisions of this Article which provide that each cargo tank in excess of six hundred (600) gallons capacity shall be subdivided into two (2) or more compartments, no one of which shall exceed six hundred (600) gallons.

**SEC. 406. Permit Procedure—Fees—Identification.** (a) **Application.** Application for the permit and certificate of approval required by Section 401 of this Article shall be made to the Chief on forms supplied by the Division of Fire Prevention and Investigation, and shall contain such data as the Chief shall deem necessary.

(b) **Fees.** Upon filing an application for an original permit and certificate of approval, the applicant shall pay to the Chief, in advance, a fee of Three (\$3.00) Dollars for each tank vehicle for which such application was made.

(c) **Investigation.** Upon receipt of said application the Chief shall cause to be inspected each tank vehicle for which said application for a permit and certificate of approval was made, to determine whether the provisions of this Article are complied with. The Chief shall, after the required investigation, approve said application if such tank vehicle meets the requirements of this Article.

(d) **Disapproval of Application—Conditions Corrected—Approval.** In the event that such application is disapproved by the Chief, the Chief shall notify in writing the applicant of such fact and the reason therefor. Upon receiving said notice, the applicant shall have the opportunity of correcting such conditions as have been disapproved. This correction shall be made within ten (10) days after delivery of said notice and, if such conditions have been corrected to comply with the provisions of this Article, the application shall be approved.

(e) **Issuance of Permit—Expiration Date.** Upon approval of said application, the Chief shall issue the permit applied for to said applicant, which permit shall be serially numbered and shall expire on the last day of the calendar year in which issued.

(f) **Issuance of Certificate of Approval—Expiration Date.** The Chief shall, upon the issuance of said permit, issue to the permittee, for each tank vehicle authorized by said permit, a serially numbered certificate of approval of such shape, design, wording and material as may be agreed upon by the Chief and the Controller. Said certificate of approval shall expire on the last day of the calendar year in which issued. The Chief shall cause said certificate of approval to be placed in a conspicuous and uniform place on each tank vehicle for which said certificate was issued. Upon expiration or revocation of the permit said certificate of approval shall be removed from such tank vehicle and destroyed.

(g) **Removal or Transferring of Certificate of Approval Prohibited.** Nothing in this Article shall permit the removing or transferring of

said certificate of approval to any other tank vehicle other than that for which said certificate of approval was originally issued.

(h) **No Prorating or Refunding of Fees.** Fees paid under the provisions of this Article shall not be prorated or refunded.

(i) **Identification Number.** Every tank vehicle for which a permit and certificate of approval was issued shall be given an identification number by the Chief, and said identification number shall be painted in an approved manner in places on said tank vehicle designated by the Chief.

(j) **Marking.** Every tank vehicle shall have prominently displayed on each side and rear thereof a trademark, trade name, other designating mark or legend substantially descriptive of the flammable liquid carried therein and generally known and recognized by the public as being applied thereto.

(k) **Application for Renewal of a Permit.** When the permittee desires to continue to operate a tank vehicle as provided for in this Article for the ensuing year, he shall make application for the renewal of his permit so to do to the Chief in the same manner and pay a fee of One (\$1.00) Dollar. The procedure set forth in this Section for an original application for a permit shall be followed. If application for a renewal of said permit is not made within thirty (30) days after the expiration of the last permit, it shall be unlawful to operate said vehicle for which a permit was previously obtained under the provisions of this Article until a new permit has been issued as herein in this Section provided.

**SEC. 407. Rules and Regulations.** The Chief shall make such rules and regulations for the use, operation, maintenance and construction of tank vehicles and the handling of flammable liquid in connection therewith as shall serve to carry into effect the expressed intent and purposes of this Article. Such rules and regulations shall become effective at twelve o'clock noon on the second day following the publication thereof in the official newspaper of the City and County and after a copy of said rules or regulations has been filed in the office of the Division of Fire Prevention and Investigation of the San Francisco Fire Department.

**SEC. 408. Suspension or Revocation of a Permit—Procedure for.** When the Chief shall determine that the permittee, or any of the permittee's principals, agents or employees, in the use, operation or maintenance of any vehicle provided for in this Article, is violating or attempting to violate any provision of this Article or any rule or regulation made thereunder, the Chief, after written notice to the permittee, shall have the power to suspend, and, after due and proper hearing, shall have the power to revoke, any permit or certificate of approval issued under the provisions of this Article.

**SEC. 409. Exceptions.** Tank vehicles transporting flammable liquid from outside points to flammable liquid bulk plants within the City and County or from such flammable liquid bulk plants to outside points, and not used for distribution purposes within the City and County limits, shall be exempt from the provisions of this Article insofar as such provisions relate to City and County certificates of approval and permits, and the payment of the fees therefor; provided, however, that this exemption shall apply solely to such tank vehicles which are constructed, maintained and operated in accordance with the codes, rules and regulations of the Interstate Commerce Commission, the National Fire Protection Association, and the American Petroleum Institute governing the construction, maintenance and operation of said tank vehicles, as such codes, rules and regulations exist upon the effective date of this ordinance.

At any time that the aforementioned codes, rules or regulations are amended or changed to provide additional safety standards or precautions for the transportation of flammable liquid, and the Chief

deems such amendments or changes necessary or essential for the protection of life or property in the City and County, the Chief shall adopt such amendments or changes in the manner provided in Section 407 of this Article.

**SEC. 410. Enforcement.** It shall be the duty of the Chief to enforce the provisions of this Article, and to that end he is authorized and empowered to inspect or test any tank vehicle, vehicle, apparatus or equipment used for the transportation of flammable liquid at any time or place.

**SEC. 411. Violations.** Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of this Article shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.

**Section 2. Permits Now in Force—Expiration Date.** Any permit, certificate of approval, or serial number issued or granted under the provisions of Article 12, Chapter IV (Fire Code), Part II, of the San Francisco Municipal Code, prior to the effective date of this ordinance, and which permit, certificate of approval, or serial number has not been suspended or revoked prior to said effective date, shall become null and void on said effective date. Application for any new permit and certificate of approval for all tank vehicles to take the place of any permit which has expired pursuant to the provisions of this section shall be made as provided in this ordinance, unless said permit and certificate of approval was exempted under the provisions hereinabove set forth.

**Section 3. Saving Clause.** If any section, subsection, subdivision, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase of this ordinance is for any reason held to be unconstitutional, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this ordinance. The Board of Supervisors hereby declares that it would have passed this ordinance, and each section, subsection, subdivision, paragraph, sentence, clause and phrase thereof, irrespective of the fact that any one or more other sections, subsections, subdivision, paragraphs, sentences, clauses or phrases be declared unconstitutional.

Whereas, proof has been made to the Board of Supervisors that the Butte Valley State Bank, a banking corporation, doing business in the State of California, was on the 1st day of January, 1943, the owner of bonds No. 4304 and No. 4305, Hetch Hetchy Water Bonds, and that there was attached to each of said bonds coupon No. 36 of the face value of \$25, and that subsequent to the 1st day of January, 1943, said coupons were detached from said bonds for the purpose of collecting the face amount thereof from the Treasurer of the City and County of San Francisco and were sent to the Treasurer of the City and County of San Francisco for payment; that said coupons were never received by said Treasurer and were lost in transit and that said coupons have never been recovered by the owner of said bonds and have never been received by the Treasurer of the City and County of San Francisco and no trace thereof has been found and that a stop payment has been placed with the Treasurer of the City and County of San Francisco against the payment of said coupons and the Board of Supervisors of said City and County does now declare that said coupons have been lost or destroyed within the meaning of the Act of the Legislature of the State of California entitled "An Act to Provide for the Issuance of Duplicates of Bonds, Warrants and other Evidences of Indebtedness of Counties and Municipalities and other Corporations as set forth in Chapter 824, Statutes of 1933"; and

Whereas, said Butte Valley State Bank has made application to this Board of Supervisors for the payment of the amount of said coupons without the presentation thereof and has offered to guarantee and indemnify the City and County of San Francisco and all officials thereof against any loss or damage of any kind or character arising out of any subsequent presentation, demand or payment of said coupons; and

Whereas, in view of the small amount due on said bonds it would be uneconomical to have duplicate coupons issued in lieu thereof; now, therefore, be it

Section 2. The Director of Property has made an appraisal of said

easements and estimates the value of Parcel "A" to be equal to the value of Parcel "B."

Section 3. The Mayor and the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors are hereby authorized and directed to execute the necessary deed on behalf of the City and County of San Francisco, a municipal corporation, relinquishing Parcel "A" to the Company. The Director of Property is hereby authorized and directed to deliver the deed to Parcel "A" to the Company upon receipt of a deed conveying Parcel "B" to the City and to accept and record the latter deed.

Section 4. The deed to Parcel "B" shall be subject to the reservations and conditions set forth in said written offer on file in the office of the Director of Property.

Section 5. Said property is situated in the County of San Mateo, State of California, and is more particularly described as follows:

*PARCEL "A"*

That certain portion of the 40 foot easement referred to as Parcel 2 in the aforesaid deed dated April 9, 1943, being 10 feet measured at right angles southerly and 30 feet measured at right angles northerly from the following described line and the easterly extension thereof:

**Declaration of Policy as to Advisability of Purchasing Operative Properties of the Market Street Railway Company for \$7,500,000.**

(Series of 1939)

The Chair presented, at the request of his Honor the Mayor:

Proposal No. 3922, Resolution No. . . . . ., as follows:

Resolved, That the following declaration of policy be submitted to the electors of the City and County of San Francisco, for their approval or disapproval, at a special election to be held on May 16, 1944:

Shall the City and County purchase from Market Street Railway Company all of its operative properties for the sum of \$7,500,000, by paying \$2,000,000 in cash from existing earnings of the Municipal Railway and paying \$5,500,000, with interest not to exceed 4 per cent per annum, solely out of earnings of the Market Street Railway properties, all in accordance with that certain proposed agreement dated March 14, 1944, and in which the City and Market Street Railway Company are designated the contracting parties, copies of which agreement are on file with the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors?; and be it

Further Resolved, That the Registrar of Voters be and he is hereby

directed to place the above proposition upon the ballot at said election, so that the electors can express their preference for or against said proposition by voting "Yes" or "No" thereon.

*Referred to Public Utilities Committee.*

The President of the Board, in presenting the foregoing proposal to the Board, announced that it was presented in lieu of other matters pending before the Board on the same subject matter. He would refer the foregoing resolution to Public Utilities Committee. Matters previously presented should be returned to the Public Utilities Commission.

Thereupon, the Mayor addressed the Board at length. This declaration of policy, he stated, referring to proposed agreement which was on file, was the result of a great deal of consideration on his part. As the members of the Board all must know, the Public Utilities Commission has been endeavoring to reach some sort of agreement with the Market Street Railway which could be submitted to the Board of Supervisors for action. The proposed agreement accompanying the declaration of policy has been printed in the press and has been given considerable publicity. The City Attorney has passed upon it, and in his opinion it is a document that is legal within the terms of the Charter. If the Board so wished, it could approve the agreement without reference to the people. However, a taxpayers' suit might be brought, and may be brought in any event, and after a great deal of thought and consulting with your Board of Supervisors, individually, and with a great many other people, the Mayor was asking the Board to submit the declaration of policy to the people at the May 16th election. It will be a special election technically, but it will be held at the same time as the primary election, and there will be no duplication or extra expense, as he understood it, that amounts to anything.

The Mayor then stated that he believed the proposed agreement was a sound and businesslike agreement, and one that he was prepared to advocate before the people. Looking at the matter from a long range point of view, San Francisco will never get anywhere towards any final solution of its transportation problem until the transportation is in the hands of one party, and that party must be the City and County. Unquestionably something can be done in a temporary manner to serve the transportation needs of San Francisco, in a better way than it can be done now under two heads. We all realize that until the war is finished we cannot expect to do as much as we would like to do. The agreement pretty well speaks for itself. It describes the various operative properties of the Market Street Railway, certain real estate, cars, barns and certain rolling stock which is well over age but which is probably the only thing we can get. If the people vote to purchase the Market Street Railway they will be disposing of a real nuisance.

The proposed agreement calls for a seven-cent fare with universal transfers. It calls for \$2,000,000 to be paid out of the current funds which are on hand in Municipal Railway funds and the balance is paid out of the Market Street Railway's portion of the earnings of the whole system when the two railways are consolidated. In effect, we are only paying \$2,000,000 for the property and are operating it ourselves, as the Public Utilities Commission sees fit, and are obligated to pay the Market Street Railway only out of that section of the consolidated earnings.

In closing, the Mayor expressed the hope that the Board of Supervisors would agree by unanimous vote to put the declaration of policy on the ballot, and if the Board believed that the agreement, all things considered, was the proper thing for the City and County, and was a sound and constructive agreement, that it would support it. The Mayor also said that in his pre-election statement he had stated that he would approach the transportation problem from the standpoint of a business man; that he would consider all angles, and having made a

decision, he would urge adoption. He had conscientiously approached this problem from that standpoint, and, if the Board would agree to put the declaration of policy on the ballot, he would do his best to convince the voters of San Francisco that this was, at least, a step, **and a most vital step**, in the final solution of San Francisco's transportation problem.

Supervisor MacPhee thereupon suggested that the Board hear the matter as a Committee of the Whole rather than sending the matter to the Public Utilities Committee, and moved that on Monday, March 27, 1944, at 3 p. m., the Board resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole for the purpose of considering the matter.

*No objection, and so ordered.*

An emergency ordinance."

Bill No. 2808 (Series of 1939), entitled "Reappropriating the sum of \$450 out of the surplus existing in Appropriation No. 333.110.00 to provide funds for the compensation of one B512 General Clerk-Typist at \$150 per month in the Purchasing Department, which position is created; abolishing the position of one B408 General Clerk-Stenographer at \$155 per month in the same department."

Bill No. 2805 (Series of 1939), entitled "An amendment to Bill 2269, Ordinance 2148, Section 58, DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC HEALTH—SAN FRANCISCO HOSPITAL, by decreasing the number of positions under item 3.3 to three B222 General Clerk (part time) at \$79.50; by decreasing the number of positions under item 12 from five to four B512 General Clerk-Typist (part time) at \$79.50, and by adding item 14 one B512 General Clerk-Typist at \$150."

Bill No. 2806 (Series of 1939), entitled "An amendment to Bill 2269, Ordinance 2148, Section 62, DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC HEALTH—HASSLER HEALTH HOME, by deleting item 1 one B454 Telephone Operator at \$180, and adding in lieu thereof item 1 one B512 General Clerk-Typist at \$150. An emergency ordinance."

#### Memorializing Congress to Make Available Further Appropriation to Provide for the Continuance of Child Care Center Projects.

(Series of 1939)

Supervisor Colman presented the following recommendation of the Education, Parks and Recreation Committee:

Proposal No. 3909, Resolution No. 3891, as follows:

Whereas, the Lanham Act, passed by Congress in 1941, provided, among other matters, that certain sums might be appropriated for the establishment, particularly in the centers of war industry, of child care

centers where proper supervision and care would be provided throughout the day for the children of working mothers; and

Whereas, pursuant to the Lanham Act, Congress has appropriated certain sums of money for the maintenance of child care centers and this service has proved a valuable asset in the recruitment of personnel necessary to the war effort as well as to child welfare; and

Whereas, the funds formerly appropriated by Congress for this purpose are practically depleted and unless further sums are immediately made available, the child care center project so valuable and necessary to the war endeavor will have to be abandoned, resulting in a serious deterrent to the war endeavor; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That this Board of Supervisors, cognizant of the importance of child care centers to the war effort and apprehensive of the deterrent effect upon the war effort which will result from their abandonment does hereby memorialize the Congress of the United States and does urge that a further appropriation be immediately made available to provide for the continuance of the child care center project; and be it

Further Resolved, That copies of this resolution be sent to Senators Sheridan Downey and Hiram Johnson and to Representatives Welch and Rolph.

**CHARTER AMENDMENT No. ....**

**REQUIRING VARIOUS DEPARTMENT HEADS TO ATTEND  
MEETINGS OF BOARD OF SUPERVISORS**

Supervisor Mead presented:

Describing and setting forth a proposal to the qualified electors of the City and County of San Francisco to amend the Charter of said City and County by amending Section 20 thereof, "Powers and Duties of Department Heads", to require the attendance of various city officials at regular meetings of the Board of Supervisors.

The Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco hereby submits to the qualified electors of the City and County of San Francisco at an election to be held therein on May 16, 1944, a proposal to amend the Charter of said City and County by amending Section 20 thereof "Powers and Duties of Department Heads", to require the attendance of various city officials at regular meetings of the Board of Supervisors.

**POWERS AND DUTIES OF DEPARTMENT HEADS**

Section 20. Each elective officer in charge of an administrative office, chief executive appointed by each board or commission, the controller, chief administrative officer, and each department head appointed by the administrative officer shall have the powers and duties of a department head except as otherwise specifically provided in this charter.

Each appointive department head shall be immediately responsible to the chief administrative officer or the board or commission, as the case may be, for the administration of his department, and shall file an annual report and make such other reports, estimates and recommendations at the time and in the manner required by law, or as required by the chief administrative officer, board or commission.

He shall act as the "appointing officer" under the civil service provisions of this charter for the appointing, disciplining and removal of such officers, assistants and employees as may be authorized. On the written recommendation of the department head concerned and the approval of the chief administrative officer, board or commission to whom such department head is responsible, the head of any utility, institution, bureau or other subdivision of such department may be designated as the "appointing officer" for the utility, institution, bureau or other subdivision. Non-civil service appointments and any temporary appointments in any department or subdivision thereof, and all removals therefrom shall be made by the department head or bureau head designated as the appointing officer only with the approval of the chief administrative officer or the board or commission in charge, as the case may be.

He shall issue or authorize all requisitions for the purchase of materials, supplies and equipment required by such department, provided that, on the written approval of the chief administrative officer or the board or commission in charge of any department, the head of any utility, institution, bureau or other subdivision of a department may likewise be vested with such power. Each department head or the head of a utility, institution, bureau or subdivision of each department shall be responsible for the proper check-out of all materials, supplies and equipment ordered for its purposes, and for

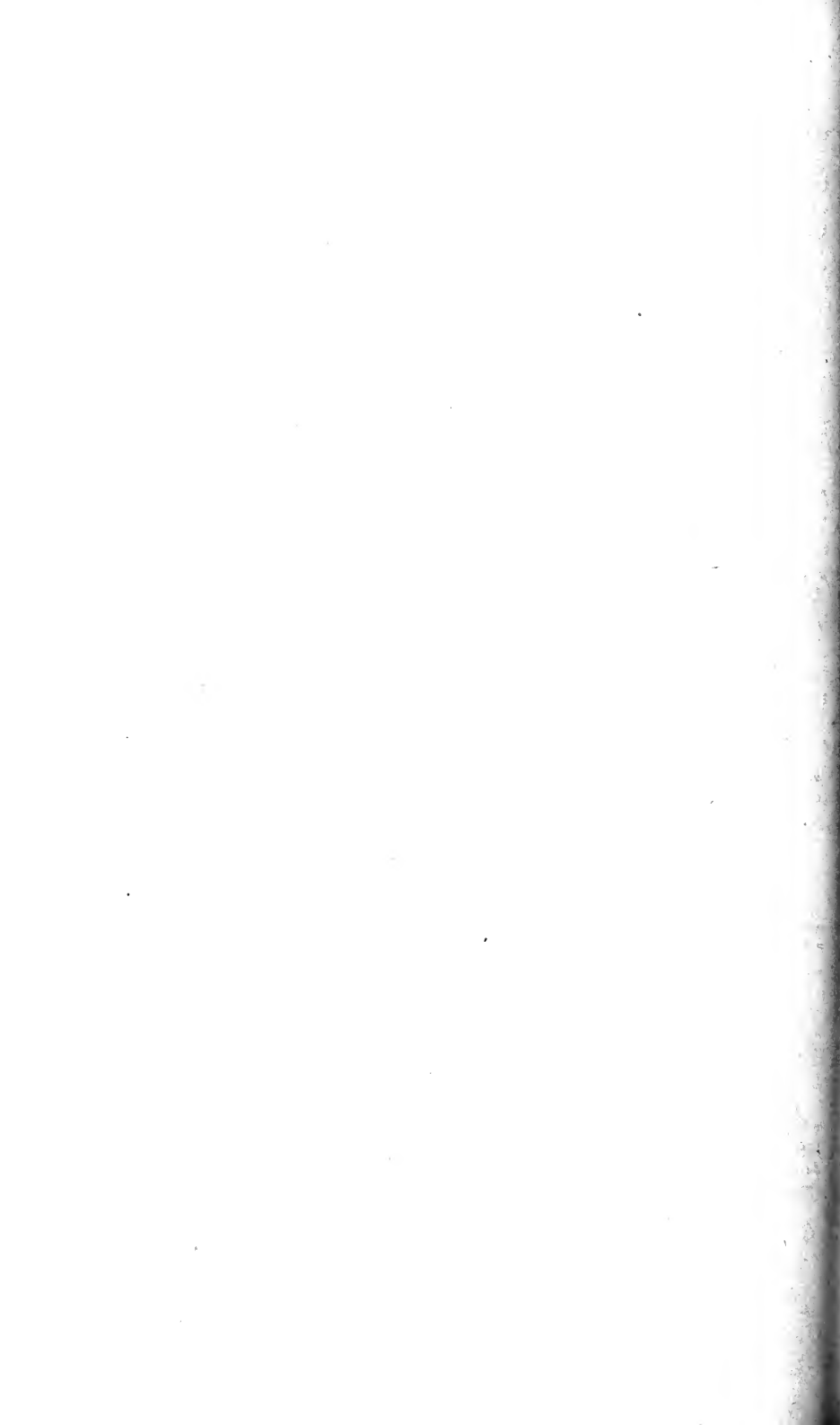

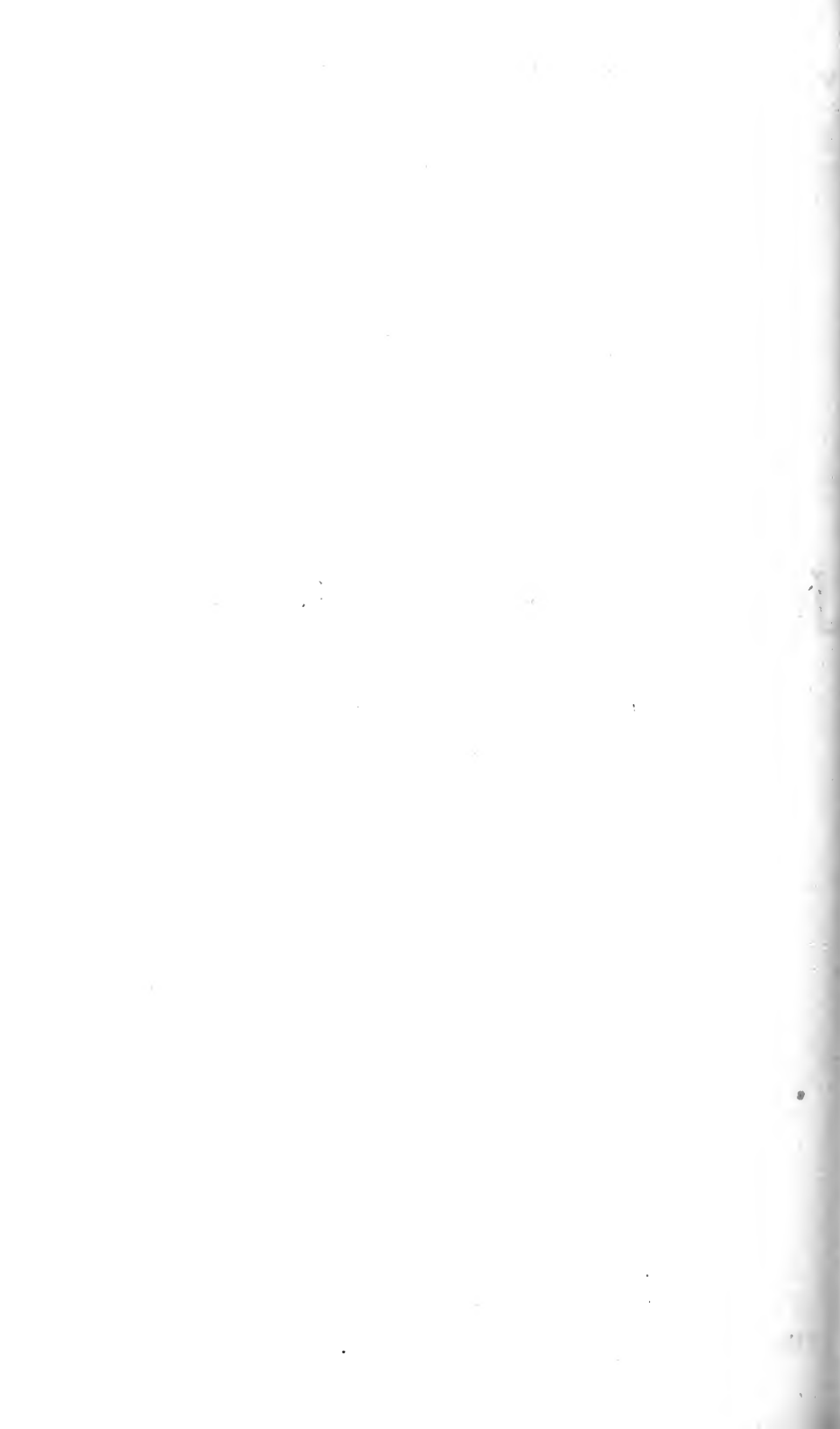

#### Mayor's Supplemental Proclamation.

The following Supplemental Proclamation by his Honor, the Mayor, was received, read and *ordered filed*:

March 21, 1944.

Whereas, pursuant to the provisions of Section 25 of the Charter of the City and County of San Francisco, it has heretofore been declared that a public emergency exists which involves and threatens the lives, property and welfare of the citizens of the City and County of San Francisco, as well as the property of said city and county, all by reason of the war between the Axis Powers and the United States of America; and I now declare that said public emergency does continue to exist; and

Whereas, pursuant to the said Section 25 of the Charter of the City and County of San Francisco proclamations were heretofore executed, issued and published suspending the provisions of Section 145 of the said Charter insofar as the same pertains to the age limit for applicants for entrance positions in the uniformed forces of the Police and Fire Departments of the City and County of San Francisco; and

Whereas, the said proclamations, and each of them, did direct and decree that the age limit for applicants for entrance positions in the said uniformed forces of the said Police and Fire Departments shall be between the ages of twenty-one years and forty-five years; and

Whereas, the said proclamations, and each of them, are now in full force and effect, and reference is hereby made to the said proclamations and they are incorporated herein by reference as though the same were set out in full; and

Whereas, Section 162 of the said Charter was in full force and effect during all of the times herein mentioned and is now in full force and effect, and said Section 162 makes it mandatory that only members of the uniformed forces of the said Police and Fire Departments who were appointed to their respective positions and at the date of their respective appointments were not over thirty-five years of age shall be considered to be members of the said uniformed forces of said Police and Fire Departments so as to be eligible to receive the Retirement System benefits provided for members of the Police and Fire Departments in said Charter and the ordinances enacted pursuant thereto; and

Whereas, it now appears that notwithstanding the said respective proclamations heretofore given and made, persons entering the uni-



formed forces of said Police and Fire Departments pursuant to the provisions of said proclamations are ineligible to receive the benefits provided for members of the uniformed forces of said Police and Fire Departments because of the limitations prescribed in said Section 162 of the Charter; and

Whereas, it further appears that notwithstanding the said proclamations, there are now 130 vacancies in the Police Department and 137 vacancies in the Fire Department; that said vacancies are the result of the prevailing lack of eligible manpower, and that unless the members of said uniformed forces of said Police and Fire Departments who have entered and will hereafter enter said departments, pursuant to the provisions of said proclamations, are legally allowed and permitted to be recipients of and to participate in the Retirement System benefits provided for in said Charter and the ordinances adopted pursuant thereto, there will be further and additional vacancies in said Police and Fire Departments, all of which will intensify and aggravate the present public emergency to the detriment of the lives, property and welfare of the citizens of the City and County of San Francisco, as well as the property of the said city and county;

Now, therefore, under and pursuant to the power and authority vested in me by said Section 25 of the Charter, I hereby suspend the provisions of Section 162 of the said Charter insofar as the maximum age at the time of employment of not over 35 years of age is concerned, and I hereby declare and direct that all persons referred to in, dealt with in, and governed by, the said proclamations shall, for all purposes of the Retirement System and the ordinances enacted pursuant to Charter provisions relating to said Retirement System, be considered members of said Police and Fire Departments as the case may be.

**Declaration of Policy Re Termination of Franchises of Market Street Railway Company.**

(Series of 1939)

Proposal No. 3821, Resolution No. . . . . , as follows:

Whereas, the Market Street Railway Company is the successor in interest of various franchises issued to various persons and corporations authorizing the operating of street railways over and on the streets of San Francisco, and is especially the successor in interest of a certain operating permit issued pursuant to the provisions of Section 6-B, Chapter II, Article II, of the Charter of the City and County of San Francisco, effective on January 8, 1900, and thereafter amended; and

Whereas, said operating permit was issued pursuant to all of the terms and conditions contained in the original franchises authorizing the operation and maintenance of said street railways; and

Whereas, the Market Street Railway Company is operating its several street railway lines in the City and County of San Francisco under and pursuant to said operating permit issued pursuant to the provisions of said Section 6-B, Chapter II, Article II of the said Charter of 1900 as amended, and under and pursuant to certain supplemental and additional permits issued by the Board of Supervisors of the City and County, which said permits were an extension of original franchises granted for the operation of street railway on the streets of the City and County of San Francisco; and

Whereas, it is provided in all franchises, the conditions of which became a part of said operating permit issued pursuant to the provisions of said Section 6-B, Chapter II, Article II of the said Charter of 1900 as amended, that the holder of said permit would pave the streets between the railroad tracks laid thereon and on two feet on each side of said tracks with the same materials which said streets were paved; and

Whereas, the Market Street Railway Company is now the owner and holder of said operating permit mentioned aforesaid, and has failed and neglected to pave the streets on which said railroad tracks are laid, between said tracks, and on two feet on each side of said tracks, and has therefore violated the provisions of said operating permit; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Board of Supervisors does hereby submit to the electors of the City and County of San Francisco the following Declaration of Policy, to-wit: Shall the Board of Supervisors adopt an ordinance directing the City Attorney to take the necessary proceedings to cancel and annul the existing operating permit and all other permits and franchises held by the Market Street Railway Company under and by which said company operates street railway cars and buses over and on the streets of San Francisco, and upon the cancellation of said operating permit, permits or franchises, shall the Board of Supervisors issue to said Market Street Railway Company a month to month operating permit permitting the operation of street railway cars and buses over and on the streets of the City and County upon such terms and conditions as said Board shall deem proper.

#### Amendment.

Supervisor MacPhee moved that the foregoing proposal be amended by substituting the following language for the "Resolve" as presented:

"Resolved, That the City Attorney of the City and County of San Francisco be and he is hereby directed to forthwith take whatever legal action may be necessary to cause an immediate forfeiture of said operating permit and the rights, franchises, privileges and permits heretofore acquired by said Market Street Railway Company."

Motion seconded by Supervisor Mancuso.

Supervisor Brown raised a point of order, that the proposed substitution would make the matter as presented, an entirely new proposal, which would require its reference to committee.

The Chair ruled the point of order well taken.

Supervisor MacPhee thereupon objected, stating that both matters, the proposal as printed on the day's Calendar of Matters, and the "Resolved," which he had moved as a substitute therefor, had been under consideration for some two years. The proposed substitute "Resolve" was the one originally presented to the Board and considered by Committee. The reason for asking to amend was to avoid delay. He desired that the proposal before the Board be amended, after which he would move that action be postponed until May 22, 1944.

Supervisor Colman, speaking on the proposed amendment, announced that he believed the matter was properly one for the Board to decide, not the people. Accordingly, he would have no objection to the amendment, providing it did not bind him to vote for the proposal as amended.

Thereupon, there being no objection, the Chair declared the amendment approved.

Thereupon, Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Mancuso, moved that the matter remain on the Calendar for hearing by the Board on May 22, 1944.

Supervisor Brown again raised the point of order that the amendment made the proposal an entirely different matter. It was now a question of instructing the City Attorney to act instead of submitting the matter to the voters. It would have to follow Charter procedure.

The Chair ruled the point of order well taken.

Supervisor MacPhee appealed from the ruling of the Chair. A "courtesy" second was given by Supervisor Mead.

Supervisor Colman, at the request of the President, put the appeal, stating: "An appeal has been taken from the decision of the Chair. The question before the Board is: 'Is the decision of the Chair the decision of the Board?' A vote 'Aye' sustains the Chair; a vote 'No' overrides the Chair. Supervisor MacPhee and the Chair are entitled to the privilege of the floor."

Thereupon, Supervisor MacPhee, taking the floor, stated that the matter had been before the Board for the past two years. The question of instructing the City Attorney to terminate the franchises of the Market Street Railway for failure to repair the streets, was the original matter before the Board. About four weeks ago the proposal to submit the question to the voters came up. The only point at issue was whether the declaration of policy was at extreme variance to that of having the present franchises terminated. Supervisor MacPhee continued, stating that his desire was to be able to have some action taken by the Board on May 22. If the Chair should be sustained, the matter would come before the Board on May 22 again and it would again be referred to committee for hearing, for the purpose of further delay.

The President requested the Clerk to read Section 13 of the Charter, on which he had based his ruling.

The Clerk read Section 13 of the Charter, as requested.

Thereupon, the roll was called and the Chair was sustained by the following vote:

Noes: Supervisors MacPhee, Mead—2.

**Authorizing and Directing Cancellation of Taxes Upon Property Acquired and Owned by the Housing Authority of the City and County of San Francisco and Authorizing and Directing Cancellation of Tax Sales to the State of California or Other Subdivisions.**

(Series of 1939)

Bill No. 2762, Ordinance No. . . . ., as follows:

Authorizing and directing cancellation of taxes upon property acquired and owned by the Housing Authority of the City and County of San Francisco and authorizing and directing cancellation of tax sales to the State of California or other subdivisions.

Whereas, the Housing Authority of the City and County of San Francisco has acquired, and now owns, various parcels of real property in the City and County of San Francisco for the purpose of carrying out the provisions of law under which said authority was organized; and

Whereas, upon said property so acquired and owned by the Housing Authority of the City and County of San Francisco, there are existing various liens of taxes and assessments, including the lien of taxes for the fiscal years 1941-42, 1942-43 and 1943-44; and

Whereas, pursuant to the provisions of Section 3, Chapter 1 of the laws passed at the special session of the Legislature of the State of California in 1938, approved March 21, 1938, it was by act provided that the property of Housing Authorities shall be exempt from all taxes and special assessments of the State, or any city, city and county, county, town or political subdivision of the State; and

Whereas, in the Municipal Cooperation Agreement between the City and County of San Francisco and the Housing Authority of the City and County of San Francisco, it is provided:

"The City agrees that during the period commencing with the date of acquisition of any part of the site or sites for each project and continuing throughout the useful life of such project, it will not levy, impose, or charge any taxes or special assessments against the project or against the Authority . . ."

and

Whereas, the City Attorney of the City and County of San Francisco has given his written consent to the cancellation of such taxes and special assessments as provided in Section 3804a of the Political Code of the State of California;

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco, as follows:

That all liens for taxes and assessments on any property acquired and owned by the Housing Authority of the City and County of San Francisco, for the purposes for which said Authority has been organized, be, and the same hereby are, canceled, in conformity with the provisions of Section 3804a of the Political Code of the State of California, and the Assessor, Tax Collector and all public officers having custody of the records of said taxes and assessments are hereby ordered and directed to cancel the same and to take no action for the collection thereof; that the Assessor, Tax Collector and all public officers having custody of the record of any certificate of sale or deed issued to the State or other subdivision for nonpayment of any tax or assessment upon real property acquired and owned by the Housing Authority of the City and County of San Francisco, be and he hereby is directed to cancel such certificates or deeds.

**Declaration of Policy as to Advisability of Purchasing Operative Properties of the Market Street Railway Company for \$7,500,000.**

(Series of 1939)

Proposal No. 3922, Resolution No. . . . ., as follows:

Resolved, That the following declaration of policy be submitted to

the electors of the City and County of San Francisco, for their approval or disapproval, at a special election to be held on May 16, 1944:

Shall the city and county purchase from Market Street Railway Company all of its operative properties for the sum of \$7,500,000, by paying \$2,000,000 in cash from existing earnings of the Municipal Railway and paying \$5,500,000, with interest not to exceed 4 per cent per annum, solely out of earnings of the Market Street Railway properties, all in accordance with that certain proposed agreement dated March 14, 1944, and in which the City and Market Street Railway Company are designated the contracting parties, copies of which agreement are on file with the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors?; and be it

Further Resolved, That the Registrar of Voters be and he is hereby directed to place the above proposition upon the ballot at said election, so that the electors can express their preference for or against said proposition by voting "Yes" or "No" thereon.

### AGREEMENT

Whereas, war conditions have created an emergency in the matter of transportation in the City and County of San Francisco and the Office of Defense Transportation of the United States has insisted that steps be taken to increase and improve such transportation, and by reason of such war conditions and emergency and the insistence of the Office of Defense Transportation as aforesaid it is necessary that the City make extensions to and improvements of its Municipal Railway, and

Whereas, such extensions and improvements cannot presently be made to the Municipal Railway by reason of inability to obtain materials and equipment and can therefore be made only by extending and improving the Municipal Railway System with the operative properties of the Market Street Railway Company by means of cut-overs, transfer tracks and other connections with Market Street Railway Company tracks and by means of existing rolling stock and other equipment and operative property of the Market Street Railway Company,

Now, therefore, in order to accomplish the extension and improvement of the Municipal Railway necessary to provide adequate transportation in the City and County of San Francisco and in consideration of the premises the parties hereto agree as follows:

1. The City and County of San Francisco, a municipal corporation (hereinafter referred to as "City") agrees to purchase from Market Street Railway Company, a California corporation (hereinafter referred to as "Company"), and Market Street Railway Company agrees to grant, bargain, sell, remise, convey, confirm, assign and transfer unto the City all and singular the operative properties of the Company in the City and County of San Francisco and County of San Mateo, State of California, and franchises in said County of San Mateo, briefly referred to and identified as follows, to-wit:

*Electric Supply and Distribution System*—The complete electric supply and distribution system of the Market Street Railway, including transmission lines, feeders, trolley lines, poles, joint pole rights, underground conduits and appurtenances.

*Machinery and Tools*—All machinery, tools and equipment located at all shops, car houses and yards of the Market Street Railway and at other locations, used in the operation of said railway or normally stored in any of such places.

*Materials and Supplies*—All material and supplies which the Market Street Railway has on hand on the date of acquisition.

*Franchises*—All franchises within the County of San Mateo.

*Contracts, Agreements, Leases, Etc.*—All contracts, agreements, leases and other intangible rights pertinent to the operation of the operative properties of the Market Street Railway Company, not including purchase contracts.

*Maps and Records*—All maps, drawings, plats, engineering records, and other records pertaining to the operative properties.

Provided, however, that the foregoing property descriptions are not a limitation upon the properties and items to be included in the designation of operative properties of the Market Street Railway Company, but the same shall include all of the operative properties now owned by the Market Street Railway Company or acquired by it prior to the acquisition of the operative properties by the City hereinafter referred to as "purchased property," all upon the terms, covenants and conditions hereinafter set forth. Coincident with the sale and transfer of said property Company agrees to surrender all rights, privileges and obligations under Company's operating permit within the City and County of San Francisco and thereupon all rights, privileges and obligations under said operating permit shall be terminated and cancelled. The Company agrees that the title to purchased property to be transferred by it to the City will be good and merchantable and will be free and clear of all claims, liens and incumbrances of every kind and character whether in favor of Company or in favor of anyone other than Company.



2. The purchase price to be paid by the City to Company hereunder shall be the sum of Seven Million Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$7,500,000.00), Two Million Dollars (\$2,000,000.00) of which shall be paid by City to Company upon execution by Company in favor of City of deeds and bills of sale and assignments covering purchased property and upon surrender by Company of its said operating permit within the City and County of San Francisco. The parties agree that promptly after the execution of this agreement they will cooperate to complete the transaction by the payment of said sum of Two Million Dollars (\$2,000,000.00) by the City and execution and delivery by the Company of said deeds, bills of sale and assignments as expeditiously as practicable and with all due diligence. The balance of said purchase price shall be paid to Company in the manner hereinafter provided and shall bear interest on the unpaid balances of said purchase price at the rate of .....% per annum.

3. The City agrees that until the Five Million Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$5,500,000.00) balance of purchase price, plus interest as aforesaid, has been paid to the Company the City will fully and faithfully observe and perform each and all of the following terms, provisions and agreements:

(a) The City will operate the purchased property as a street railway as provided in Paragraph 4 hereof until the purchase price payable to the Company has been paid in full, and will utilize the purchased property for that purpose in an efficient and economical manner in accordance with the established operating and business standards and practices of the street railway industry, subject to breakdowns and other causes beyond the control of the City;

(b) The City will keep and maintain the purchased property in good running order and repair;

(c) The City will not create any extensions of or improvements to purchased property other than through or because of unification with Municipal Railway hereinafter provided for.

4. The City agrees to unify the operation of said purchased property with the property of the Municipal Railway and to operate the said combined properties as a single street railway system, such unification to be accomplished as soon as practicable after the acquisition by the City of purchased property.

5. The City agrees that in the operation of the said unified street railway system the regular fare for transportation of passengers in the City and County of San Francisco will be not less than 7c so long as any part of the purchase price remains unpaid and that universal transfer privileges will obtain over the entire unified street railway system, subject to the right of the City to establish or maintain reduced fares and permit free transportation in special cases and categories in accordance with the practice of the Municipal Railway now or heretofore in effect.

6. Anything herein to the contrary notwithstanding, the City is not and shall not be obligated to pay the said balance of purchase price of Five Million Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$5,500,000.00), or any part thereof, from any fund except the Market Street Railway Purchase Fund hereinafter described, and the payment of said purchase price or any part thereof is not and shall not be an obligation of the City enforceable against the City or any funds or property of the City except only to the extent of the net revenue from purchased property as hereinafter provided; save and except that the City is hereby accorded the right and privilege to pay the whole or any part of any unpaid balance of said purchase price at any time out of funds legally available for such purpose.

7. From the gross revenue of the unified street railway system of the City there shall be allocated to a fund to be designated as Market

Street Railway Purchase Fund all gross revenues derived from the purchased property. It is agreed that such gross revenue derived from purchased property will be 57% of the gross revenue derived from the entire unified railway system. From the said gross revenue so credited to the Market Street Railway Purchase Fund there shall be deducted and paid

(a) Operating expenses, pension charges and proportionate payments to such compensations and other insurance and accident reserve funds as the Public Utilities Commission may establish or the Board of Supervisors may require. In order to ascertain the amount of said payments, it is agreed that the same will constitute 55.96% of the said operating expenses and other above-described charges and payments of the entire unified municipal railway system.

(b) Amounts expended for repairs and maintenance, which it is agreed will constitute 56.49% of the entire amount expended for repairs and maintenance of the entire unified municipal railway system.

(c) An amount needed to provide for reasonable annual depreciation of the purchased property as provided in Section 128 of the Charter of the City, plus such amount as may be needed to create and maintain a reconstruction and replacement fund applicable to the purchased property, such amounts to be determined by the Public Utilities Commission of the City as provided in Sections 128 and 128.1 of the Charter of the City, the aggregate of such amounts not to exceed, however, Seven Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$750,000.00) per annum.

The balance remaining in the Market Street Railway Purchase Fund after such deductions shall constitute a trust fund held for the benefit of the Market Street Railway Company and when paid to the Company shall be applied first to the payment of interest on the purchase price aforesaid and then to the payment on account of such purchase price. Such payments from said trust fund may be made from time to time but shall be made to the Company not later than thirty (30) days after the close of the City's fiscal year.

8. The Company shall have access at all reasonable times to the operating and financial records of the City applicable to the operation of the City's unified street railway system, and shall be furnished with quarter-yearly statements in respect thereto.

9. Payments made to the Company as provided in Paragraph 7 hereof shall be accompanied by a written statement of the City setting forth the items of revenue, expenses and other deductions entering into the determination by the City of the amount of such payment. Such statement shall set forth the result of the operation of the unified street railway system in sufficient detail to enable the Company to determine therefrom the amount of net revenue payable to the Company for the fiscal year covered by such statement. The rights provided for in this paragraph are in addition to those provided for in Paragraph 8 hereof.

10. The Company represents that it has sold and issued tokens entitling the holder thereof to present the same for transportation in lieu of 7c. The City agrees to honor such tokens on the unified street railway system and the Company agrees to reimburse the City at the rate of 7c each for all of such tokens presented by the City to the Company.

11. All operating expenses of purchased property shall be prorated between the City and Company as of the date of the acquisition of the purchased property by the City.

In Witness Whereof Market Street Railway Company has caused this agreement to be executed by its President and Secretary and its corporate seal to be affixed hereto, and the City and County of San

Francisco has executed this agreement by its Mayor thereunto duly authorized by ordinance of the Board of Supervisors of said City and County, all the ..... day of ....., 1944.

Committee of the Whole.

On motion by Supervisor Sullivan, seconded by Supervisor Colman, the Board of Supervisors resolved itself into Committee of the Whole, the President acting as Chairman.

*No objection and so ordered.*

Withdrawal of Declaration of Policy.

The Chair announced that it was his understanding that the Declaration of Policy, Proposal No. 3922, was to be withdrawn and a proposed Charter Amendment was to be substituted therefor.

Supervisor Uhl announced that he had received a copy of the proposed Charter Amendment, which, he believed, should be referred to committee.

The Chair announced that it was before the Committee of the Whole.

Thereupon, his Honor, Mayor Roger D. Lapham, who was present in the Chambers, announced that in the judgment of the City Attorney and the special counsel employed by the Public Utilities Commission, as well as other attorneys, the feeling was unanimous that as long as the proposal to acquire the operative properties of the Market Street Railway was to be submitted to the people, it should be submitted in the form of a Charter Amendment rather than as a declaration of policy. If adopted by the people there will be much less doubt than if a declaration of policy should be approved. This is carrying out the

intention to submit the proposed contract worked out by the Utilities Commission and the Market Street Railway to the people at a special election to be held on May 16, 1944, at the same time as the primary election.

Mr. Dion Holm, Deputy City Attorney, announced that heretofore a contract was submitted and it was anticipated that the Board might pass an ordinance authorizing the execution of the contract. The contract was subject to many attacks. It clearly violated several provisions of the Charter. If the people desire to obtain the operative properties of the Market Street Railway the safe way would be by Charter Amendment. In this Charter Amendment the specific amendments that we know conflict with the original contract have been set aside insofar as they relate to the purchase of the Market Street Railway operative properties. The purport of the Charter Amendment is that if the majority of the people vote in favor of it, the City will acquire the Market Street Railway properties for \$7,500,000, \$2,000,000 of which is to be paid in cash and the balance of \$5,500,000 will be paid solely out of the earnings of the Market Street Railway portion of the combined system. The interest charge on the unpaid portion of the purchase price will not exceed four per cent per annum. What the rate will be is not yet known. In the proposed Charter Amendment there is agreement of minds of all parties concerned.

Mr. Dion Holm, in reply to questioning by Supervisor Uhl, and in further explanation of the proposed Charter Amendment, pointed out that the moment the City and County had paid the \$2,000,000, title to all the operative properties would pass to the City and County. The properties must be free and clear of all encumbrances. The Market Street system and the Municipal Railway will be considered as one system and will be so operated. At the outset the framers of the contract wanted to set aside a certain portion of revenues as distinguished from the Municipal Railway portion of the combined system. It was decided to divide the profit of the combined system as follows: 57 per cent Market Street Railway, 43 per cent Municipal Railway. Such proportionate basis is set up in the Charter Amendment.

Mr. Holm, in answer to a question by Supervisor Mancuso as to whether any provision had been made for setting aside funds for taxes of any kind out of income in case the City should eventually default, replied that no provision had been made, because it did not seem conceivable that the City would divest itself of the properties once it had received title to them. The City is limited here insofar as operation of the operative properties of the Market Street Railway is concerned, to operate them solely out of revenues obtained from that part of the combined system, and to make the balance of the purchase price available for that purpose.

Mr. Holm, in further explanation of the proposed Charter Amendment, and in reply to questioning by Supervisor Mancuso, pointed out that the provision that the fare should be "not less than 7 cents" was incorporated in the amendment at the request of the bankers. The proposed financing is based on the theory that a 7-cent fare will be charged; on that estimate, the revenues have been predicated.

Thereupon Supervisor Mancuso suggested an amendment to paragraph 5, subparagraph (d), to provide that the fare shall be "not less than 6 cents nor more than 7 cents."

Mr. E. G. Cahill announced that he believed the language as expressed was proper. It would be impossible to pay the balance of the purchase price within a reasonable length of time if the fare were set at 5 cents.

Supervisor MacPhee observed that under the proposed Charter Amendment, any rate at all could be fixed.

Mr. Holm in reply stated that such provision would be applicable only until the purchase price had been paid in full. The banks want to be assured of a reasonable income.

Supervisor Mancuso then suggested that there be inserted, after the word "Commission," the words "subject to approval of the Board of Supervisors."

Mr. Cahill, in reply to questioning by Supervisor Uhl, stated that on the basis of a 7-cent fare, it was estimated that the earnings of the Municipal Railway portion of the combined system would be about \$1,400,000, while the Market Street Railway portion would earn \$2,140,000.

#### Privilege of the Floor.

On motion by Supervisor Uhl, the privilege of the floor was granted to citizens present desiring to be heard on the subject of the acquisition of the Market Street Railway operative properties.

Mr. George Gerhard, representing the Civic League of Improvement Clubs, reported that the Civic League had endorsed the purchase of the Market Street Railway. The Civic League believes the only way to accomplish betterment in transportation service is by the acquisition of the Market Street Railway. The proposal should be submitted to the people on May 16, 1944.

Mr. John A. Reynolds, representing himself as a property owner and taxpayer, objected to the proposal. The people have already turned down such a proposal three times, and the Mayor and the Board of Supervisors should be convinced that the people do not want it.

Mr. A. Petry, representing Haight-Fillmore District, Inc., was opposed to another election for the acquisition of the Market Street Railway. The acquisition of the properties would saddle on the people of San Francisco one of the biggest "white elephants" ever put over on any one. The people want new equipment, and the \$7,500,000 proposed to be spent for the Market Street Railway properties should be spent for new equipment for the Municipal Railway. He was opposed, also, to the proposed increase of fare to 7 cents.

Mr. E. P. Troy, representing himself, congratulated the Board in referring the matter to the people. The people, however, have rejected the proposal to purchase the Market Street Railway. They do not want it.

Mr. W. H. Gillam, representing Glen Park Improvement Club, urged that better transportation be provided. The people, though, do not want the Market Street Railway, and the proposed purchase is merely a stall for time. The only way to get rid of that company is by terminating their operating permits for failure to comply with its franchise or operating permit obligations.

Mrs. Annie Scanlon opposed the proposed Charter Amendment. She objected to giving \$2,000,000 of the Municipal Railway's earnings to the Market Street Railway and thus wrecking the Municipal Railway. The Market Street Railway, she declared, has only a nuisance value. Mayor Lapham, she stated, was elected to put over this deal, but he is not going to do it. It will be a fight between the mass of the people and certain organized groups.

Mrs. Nora Brady objected to the purchase of the Market Street Railway properties.

Mr. Carroll Newburg reported that the Central Council of Civic Clubs had not gone on record either for or against the proposal under consideration, because the Council had not yet had an opportunity to hear both sides of the question. However, he questioned the right of the Board, or the propriety, to pass on the proposal without having sufficient opportunity to consider changes that have been suggested.

Supervisor Mead remarked that he understood the Public Utilities Commission had authorized an attorney to bring the proposal to the Board in a foolproof manner. What can the Board of Supervisors do against a man whose services are valued at \$20,000?

Mr. Holm reported that the proposed Charter Amendment was the result of the efforts of several attorneys, namely, Mr. Steinhart, Mr. Goldberg, Mr. Harrington, City Attorney O'Toole and himself. The attorneys feel that the proposal will satisfy all the legal lights involved, and that the amendment is as finished a document as it could possibly be. If the people of San Francisco decide that they want to purchase the properties of the Market Street Railway, this document will be able to withstand any legal attack that may be brought against it.

Supervisor MacPhee announced that he was concerned with the fear that the Board of Supervisors would be surrendering a great deal of its rights to the Public Utilities Commission during the period of time the Market Street Railway would be under purchase by the City and County. For that reason he desired to propose several amendments to the proposed Charter Amendment.

Thereupon, Supervisor MacPhee suggested that the amount to be set aside as a replacement and reconstruction fund, instead of reading \$250,000 (paragraph 3, subparagraph c) should be "not exceed \$500,000 and not less than \$300,000."

In paragraph 5, after the words "and approval of the Mayor," there should be inserted the words "and with the approval by the Board of Supervisors."

In paragraph 5, subparagraph d, after the words "established and maintained," Supervisor MacPhee suggested that there be inserted the words "by the Board of Supervisors upon recommendation of the Public Utilities Commission."

In paragraph 6, in the phrase "which said funds the Board of Supervisors may in its discretion appropriate," there should be inserted the words "by a two-thirds vote."

In paragraph 8, just before the word "Commission," there should be inserted the words "Board of Supervisors upon recommendation of the Public."

Assistant City Attorney Dion Holm announced that he would have to study the foregoing suggested amendments proposed by Supervisor MacPhee.

#### Committee of the Whole Arises.

Thereupon Supervisor Brown moved that the Committee of the Whole arise and report to the Board.

*No objection.*

Thereupon, the Board reconvened as a Board of Supervisors.

Supervisor MacPhee stated that he desired to move the amendments suggested by him in Committee of the Whole.

Assistant City Attorney Holm suggested that the question of depreciation allowance (paragraph 3, subparagraph c) could be straightened out, if the Board so desired to provide for the first year after acquisition an amount not exceeding \$500,000 and not less than \$300,000, and in subsequent years, amounts not exceeding \$750,000 and not less than \$500,000.

Thereupon, on motion by Supervisor MacPhee, paragraph 3, subparagraph (c), as amended, and reading as follows, was *approved* by the following vote:

(c) Amounts determined by the Commission to be necessary to create and maintain a reconstruction and replacement fund applicable to said operative properties, not exceeding for the first year after such acquisition \$500,000, and not less than \$300,000, and in subsequent years, until the purchase price shall have been paid in full, a sum not exceeding \$750,000 for the first year and not less than \$500,000 per annum thereafter. Any unencumbered balance remaining in said reconstruction and replacement fund at the close of each fiscal year shall become a part of the moneys to be paid to the Market Street Railway Company pursuant to subparagraph (d) hereof;

Ayes: Supervisors Brown, Colman, Gallagher, Gartland, Green, MacPhee, Mancuso, Mead, Meyer, Sullivan—10.

No: Supervisor Uhl—1.

Supervisor MacPhee then moved that the second paragraph of paragraph 5 be amended by inserting after the word "Mayor," the words "and Board of Supervisors." Motion seconded by Supervisor Mancuso.

Mr. E. G. Cahill, speaking on the motion, stated that he, personally, had no objection to the proposed amendment, but he did not know what effect it would have on the bankers who were to loan the money.

Supervisor Colman opposed the motion.

Supervisor Mancuso announced that in his opinion, if the Public Utilities Commission and the Mayor should approve the contract, the Board would probably accept it. Under the terms of the proposed Charter Amendment, the Board of Supervisors would be waiving a great many of its rights it has heretofore enjoyed. He believed the Board of Supervisors should protect its interests so it would still have some control. He believed the Board would be making a mistake in approving this paragraph in the form in which it was presented.

Thereupon the roll was called and the motion was *defeated* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors MacPhee, Mancuso, Mead—3.

Noes: Supervisors Brown, Colman, Gallagher, Gartland, Green, Meyer, Sullivan—8.

Supervisor Mancuso suggested that there be added to Section 5, paragraph (d), the following language: "And provided, however, that said fares shall not be increased in excess of 7 cents per passenger without approval by a majority of the Board of Supervisors."

Mr. Cahill pointed out that the proposed amendment would be adding power not now possessed by the Board of Supervisors. A rate change now requires the Public Utilities Commission to make it, and the Board of Supervisors can overturn it, but it takes eight votes. "Personally," Mr. Cahill continued, "I would have no objection to the same control that the Board has at present, but the bankers will have some objection, and especially in the matter of fares."

Thereupon, Supervisor Colman moved to amend by putting in "two-thirds majority," which conforms to the present Charter provision. That is, "We may reject the Public Utilities Commission proposal to raise fares by a two-thirds vote. I will make that amendment." Motion seconded by Supervisor Mancuso.

Supervisor Uhl announced that he would object to the amendment.

Thereupon, Assistant City Attorney Dion Holm suggested that the amendment be worded in the following language in order properly to effect the purpose intended: "and provided, however, that said fares shall not be increased in excess of 7 cents per passenger except in accordance with the procedure of Section 130 of the Charter."

Whereupon, the roll was called and the amendment, as re-worded in accordance with the suggestion of Assistant City Attorney Dion Holm, and reading as above, was *approved* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Brown, Colman, Gallagher, Gartland, Green, MacPhee, Mancuso, Mead, Meyer, Sullivan—10.

No: Supervisor Uhl—1.

Supervisor MacPhee then moved that paragraph 6 be amended by inserting, in the second line, just before the word "Commission," the words "Board of Supervisors upon recommendation of the."

Mr. Cahill observed that the amendment, if approved, would make the Board of Supervisors collectors of fares, etc.; the Board of Supervisors would become the operators. The present situation would be completely reversed.

Thereupon, Supervisor MacPhee withdrew his motion.

Supervisor Mancuso, seconded by Supervisor Colman, moved that the proposed Charter Amendment, as presented, be ordered submitted to the voters at a special election to be held May 16, 1944.

#### Explanation of Vote.

Supervisor Uhl, in explanation of his intended vote, stated that the last time the proposal to acquire the Market Street Railway was submitted to the people, a group of Supervisors placed in the envelope with the ballot, a statement explaining the situation and stating that the Public Utilities Commission had not given the people all the facts. The bond issue at that time was \$7,950,000. Now it is \$7,500,000. Now it is proposed to pay \$2,000,000 from surplus in Municipal Railway funds. Supervisor Uhl read from statement previously sent to the voters opposing a previous plan for the acquisition of the Market Street Railway. Further bond issue would be required for the purchase of street cars, rehabilitation of the system, etc., and Supervisor Uhl announced it would be his intention to call such conditions to the attention of the public. He could not vote in favor of placing the proposed Charter Amendment on the ballot. He believed the Municipal Railway funds should be saved for the purchase of buses, etc.

Supervisor Colman announced that he intended to vote for submission. He believed it was the only way by which the transportation for San Francisco could be improved. There must be one system, one management, one fare, and a universal transfer. It is agreed, too, that the City must own that railroad. If San Francisco overcomes this first hurdle of getting rid of the Market Street Railway it will have done something of tremendous value that cannot be evaluated in terms of dollars and cents. As to the price, the previous price of \$7,900,000 was approved by Supervisor Uhl in a stirring statement written two years earlier in which he stated it was a good and fair price. By opposing the acquisition of the Market Street Railway properties, the people will be keeping the present poor transportation instead of improving it. By consolidating the two systems, it will be easier to obtain priorities to get new equipment. A vote "No" is a vote to continue the present condition, and to make it worse. This proposal is a real sound solution to the transportation problem. The Railroad Commission, the Public Utilities Commission, and the Controller feel the proposal to be fair. If a property will pay itself out, as this property will, it is not junk; it is a splendid buy. All the people will spend is \$2,000,000 and the balance will come from profits. The proposal to purchase the Market Street Railway has been beaten twice, but no one else has offered a solution to the problem. Transportation has not improved; it has gotten worse. He would vote "yes" with the hope and prayer that the people of San Francisco look on the proposal as being in their own best interest.



Supervisor Brown expressed himself as being in favor of submission of the proposed amendment to the people. In addition to the arguments presented by Supervisor Colman, there was another point that should not be overlooked. For the first time, San Francisco has a chance to buy the Market Street Railway properties without issuance of any bonds. Heretofore there has been a bond issue required; in this case there are to be no general bonded obligations, and no revenue bonds to be issued, both of which have many opponents. This proposal is a good business deal. We are told by the authorities, Public Utilities Group, Mr. Cahill, and attorneys representing the City and the bankers, that the bankers are willing to lend the money to the Market Street Railway to finance this deal on the security of the proposal that is now before the Board of Supervisors. When a banker is willing to lend money on such a transaction, there is pretty good evidence that it is a good deal.

Supervisor Gallagher stated that he was going to vote to submit the proposed Charter Amendment to the people. He believed it was the only thing, the democratic thing, to do. He would, however, have voted against submission to the people had it not been for the election to be held on May 16th. He believed the people were intelligent and would vote the way they believe to be correct. If they want the Market Street Railway they will vote "yes"; if they do not want it, they will vote "no."

Supervisor Mead announced that he had opposed the purchase of the Market Street Railway in the form in which it was submitted to the Board of Supervisors previously. There is a tremendous difference, however, between this and any previous proposals that have been before the Board. Regardless of any expressions of opinion that have been before the Board, the City and County is obligated to spend only \$2,000,000 of its own money. The balance is to come from the revenues. However, he was not too optimistic; he would make no prediction. The so-called primary election is an off-year election and there is generally a small vote. However, all the "no" votes will be out.

Supervisor Mead, in continuing, stated that he was taking the position that the City and County was eliminating the Market Street Railway rather than purchasing it. He believed that was the attitude that should be taken. He had always felt, previously, that the purchase price had been too high. Now only \$2,000,000 of the City's own money was being spent. He believed that the elimination of the Market Street Railway was necessary before progress could be made. However, if the people of San Francisco were stubborn about this, they will have to suffer for a great many years. He believed San Francisco would become a large industrial area, and the population would increase instead of decrease. It is the duty of the citizens, and of the Board of Supervisors, to see that something is done with respect to the Market Street Railway; there is a problem that must be solved, and the only solution is the elimination of the Market Street Railway by purchase. However, he was afraid the people would turn the proposal down. Supervisor Mead stated that he, like Supervisor Gallagher, would not vote for submission if it had meant the calling of a separate election, but under the circumstances, he felt it to be his duty to submit the matter to the people.

Supervisor Mancuso announced that he would vote for submission. The Market Street Railway has been termed a nuisance; here is a way to dispose of that nuisance for \$2,000,000 and he would go out wholeheartedly behind the proposal. He believed it to be a good business transaction.

Supervisor MacPhee stated that the last time the question of the acquisition of the Market Street Railway was before the Board, he had drawn attention to the fact that the Board of Supervisors was without authority to institute any action with regard to transportation. This

present proposal is the opinion of the Public Utilities Commission as to how the transportation problem should be solved. He had no objection to allowing the voters to decide the matter.

Thereupon, the roll was called and the proposed Charter Amendment, as amended, and reading as follows, was *ordered submitted* by the following vote:

## PROPOSED CHARTER AMENDMENT

### ACQUISITION OF MARKET STREET RAILWAY

The Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco hereby submits to the qualified electors of said City and County at a special election to be held therein on May 16, 1944, a proposal to amend, as hereinafter set forth, the Charter of said City and County by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 119.1, relating to the acquisition of the operative properties of the Market Street Railway Company and providing for the payment of the cost thereof, and providing for the consolidation of the operative properties of said Market Street Railway Company with the Municipal Railway of the City and County of San Francisco.

### EXTENSION OF MUNICIPAL RAILWAY BY UNIFICATION WITH MARKET STREET RAILWAY

#### Section 119.1.

1. The City and County of San Francisco shall have power and is hereby authorized, in addition to all other powers howsoever conferred upon the City and County, to extend the existing San Francisco Municipal Railway by the acquisition of the operative properties of Market Street Railway Company, hereinafter called "said operative properties," and to acquire said operative properties, thereby supplying said City and County and the inhabitants thereof with a unified street railway system and incidentally furnishing transportation in and to San Mateo County.

2. The adoption of this section shall be deemed to and shall constitute a finding by the people of the City and County of San Francisco that the public interest and necessity demand the extension of the existing Municipal Railway by the acquisition of said operative properties, thereby providing a unified Municipal Railway system for the benefit of said City and County and its inhabitants.

3. Upon the payment in full of the cost of said operative properties herein provided, said operative properties shall be consolidated with the present Municipal Railway and shall become a part thereof and both of the systems so consolidated, and all additions, betterments and improvements thereto, shall constitute the Municipal Railway of the City and County of San Francisco, and shall be subject to all the provisions of this Charter then in effect. Prior to the payment in full, as herein provided, of the cost of said operative properties the same shall be operated by the Public Utilities Commission, hereinafter called "Commission," and the provisions of Sections 74, 127, 128, 128.1, 129 and 130 of this Charter shall not be applicable to the operation thereof, the operation thereof, or the revenues derived therefrom nor shall any other provision of this Charter, inconsistent with the provis-

Section 119.1, be applicable; provided, however, that said Commission nevertheless manage, control and operate said properties as an extension of the Municipal Railway with uniform fares and transfer privileges so as to constitute a unified street railway system.

Prior to the acquisition of said operative properties, the Commission shall submit, and the Mayor shall approve and the Board of Supervisors shall adopt, a budget relating to such unified operation in the same manner and subject to the same conditions except time as provided in the Charter and Section 119.1, for the submission and approval of the annual budget, annual appropriation ordinance and the annual salary ordinance. Provided that such budget and ordinances shall become effective upon such acquisition.

For the purpose of accounting for the revenues derived from the operation of said operative properties prior to the payment in full of the cost thereof, 57% of the gross revenues of the Municipal Railway and said operative properties shall be deemed to be and shall constitute the revenues applicable to and derived from the operation of said operative properties, and said revenues shall be set aside by the Controller in a special fund, which is hereby created, to be designated "Municipal Railway-Market Street Extension Fund," and after called "extension fund" and shall be held separate and apart from other moneys in the treasury.

Out of the moneys estimated to be received in said extension fund there shall be appropriated by the Board of Supervisors the amounts recommended by the Commission for the following purposes and in the following order:

(a) The operating expenses of said operative properties, including penalties and proportionate payments to such compensation and other funds and accident reserve funds as the Commission may establish or the Board of Supervisors may require in connection with said operative properties. The aggregate amount provided from said extension fund for such purposes in any year shall be 55.96% of the annual cost of all of the operating expenses and above described charges and payments made on account of both the existing Municipal Railway and said operative properties then operated as a unified system;

(b) All amounts provided for repairs and maintenance of said operative properties. The aggregate amount provided from said extension fund for such requirements in any year shall be 56.49% of the annual cost of repairs and maintenance of both the existing Municipal Railway and said operative properties, then operated as a unified system;

(c) Amounts determined by the Commission to be necessary to create and maintain a reconstruction and replacement fund applicable to said operative properties, not exceeding for the first year after such acquisition \$500,000, but not less than \$300,000, and in subsequent years until the purchase price has been paid in full, a sum not exceeding \$750,000 for the first year but not less than \$500,000 per annum thereafter. Any unencumbered balance remaining in said reconstruction and replacement fund at the close of each year shall become a part of the moneys to be paid to the Market Street Railway Company pursuant to sub-paragraph (d) hereof;

(d) The entire balance remaining in the extension fund which shall be paid to the Market Street Railway Company as required by the terms of the purchase

contract, but in any event not later than thirty days after the close of fiscal year of the City and County. It is hereby found and determined the ratios herein established for gross revenues, operating expenses other charges, and repairs and maintenance of the Municipal Railway said operative properties represent the exact ratios prevailing between systems based on a study and report of the Commission which is hereby approved and adopted.

4. All amounts herein required to be paid from the extension fund shall be paid by the Treasurer of the City and County upon presentation of the Controller's Warrant drawn at the demand of the Commission. It is hereby made the duty of the Commission to make such demand in accordance with the terms of the purchase contract and for the purposes herein provided.

All moneys paid to Market Street Railway Company shall be applied first to the payment of interest on the purchase price and the balance to the unpaid principal of said purchase price. None of the moneys in said special trust fund shall be diverted to any other purpose or used or applied for any other City and County purposes or transferred to any other fund.

5. The provisions of this Section 119.1 shall prevail over any other provision of this Charter or general law, and the method herein provided for the extension of the existing Municipal Railway by acquisition of said operative properties shall be deemed to constitute an additional method of providing for such extension by the acquisition of said operative properties for the payment of the cost thereof.

Whenever the Commission, with the advice and approval of the Mayor, shall agree with the Market Street Railway Company upon the terms and conditions of such acquisition of said operative properties, it shall be the duty of the Commission and the Mayor to execute such contract for and on behalf of the City and County of San Francisco and in its name. Subject only to the provisions of this Section 119.1, such contract may provide, and may do, any other things;

(a) That the maximum purchase price shall be \$7,500,000, whereof \$2,000,000 shall be paid forthwith from surplus in any of the funds of the existing Municipal Railway derived from earnings of the existing Municipal Railway, which surplus is hereby determined to exist and to be available for, and is hereby appropriated for, said purpose, and the City and County shall be obligated solely to pay the balance of said purchase price exclusively from moneys in said extension fund, as herein provided. The unpaid balance of said purchase price shall bear interest at the rate of not to exceed four per cent per annum, payable annually.

It is hereby found and determined that after making said initial payment herein provided to be made to Market Street Railway Company there shall remain in the funds of the Municipal Railway moneys fully sufficient to pay and discharge all current obligations of the bonds issued by the City and County for the acquisition, construction and completion of said Municipal Railway and all other costs and charges now payable from said funds;

(b) That the title to said operative properties shall be transferred to the City and County upon payment of said \$2,000,000 and the execution of proper instruments of conveyance and shall be good and merchantable title free and clear of all claims, liens and encumbrances of every kind and character.

her in favor of the Market Street Railway Company or in favor of any other than Market Street Railway Company;

) That upon the delivery of such instruments of conveyance, Market Street Railway Company shall assign and transfer to the City and County all franchises, permits and licenses of any kind or character necessary or desirable in connection with the operation of said operative properties, and shall surrender and cancel its existing operating permit, whereupon all rights, privileges and obligations under said operating permit and all other permits and franchises granted by the City and County shall be terminated and annulled;

l) That uniform rates, fares and charges, and universal transfer privileges shall be established and maintained by the Commission and that except for school children and other special cases pursuant to which reduced or free transportation now exists in accordance with the existing practice of the Municipal Railway, the regular fare for transportation of passengers on said street railway system shall not be less than 7 cents per passenger and the purchase price of said operative properties shall have been paid in full as herein provided; and provided, however, that said fares shall not be increased in excess of 7 cents per passenger except in accordance with the procedure of Section 130 of the Charter;

) That the City and County of San Francisco and all commissions, boards, officers and employees thereof shall comply with the terms and conditions of said contract and this Section 119.1. Such contract may contain other terms and conditions not inconsistent with the provisions of this section, as the Commission may deem appropriate for the purpose of carrying out the objects and purposes of this section, including but without being limited to the agreement that the City and County will operate said operative properties and maintain the same in good running order, and otherwise operate the said operative properties in an efficient and economical manner in accordance with the established operating and business standards and practices of the street railway industry, subject only to breakdown and other matters beyond the control of the City and County; that the City and County shall not make any extensions, radical changes or alterations to said operative properties or abandon any substantial portion thereof except only to the extent that such extensions or abandonments are required by reason of the unification of the operations of said operative properties with those of the Municipal Railway. The City and County, however, shall not be obligated to pay any of the costs or expenses provided to be paid under such contract from any source other than said extension fund.

Except for the sum of \$2,000,000 to be paid Market Street Railway Company as herein provided, the obligation of the City and County to pay the balance of said purchase price, interest thereon, all operating expenses, and other charges of any other kind or character incurred in connection with said operative properties shall be limited exclusively to moneys in said extension fund as herein provided and under no circumstances shall the payment of any part thereof constitute a debt, liability or obligation of the City and County of San Francisco, nor shall the City and County be obligated to pay any part thereof from any moneys derived from the levy or collection of taxes upon the taxable property of the City and County of San Francisco, and provided that nothing herein or elsewhere in the Charter contained shall

prevent the City and County from paying any part of the balance of said purchase price and interest thereon or any other charges in connection with operation or maintenance of said operative properties from any funds of Municipal Railway appropriated by the Board of Supervisors for that purpose, which said funds the Board of Supervisors may in its discretion appropriate; and in the event of such appropriation the provisions of Section of the Charter, insofar as the revenues of the Municipal Railway are concerned, shall be suspended until the cost of the acquisition of said operative properties is paid in full, and provided further that under no circumstances shall the City and County make such payments from its general funds from any funds other than as provided by this Section 119.1.

7. The acquisition of said operative properties in the manner herein provided is hereby determined to be and shall constitute an extension and improvement of the existing Municipal Railway.

8. Until the purchase price of said operative properties shall have been paid in full, the Commission is hereby authorized to fix, establish and collect uniform rates, charges and fares for the transportation of persons on both the Municipal Railway and the said operative properties, without regard to Section 130 of the Charter, except as herein provided and provided that such rates, charges and fares shall not be less than those specified in this Section 119.1. After the purchase price of said operative properties shall have been paid in full all rates, charges and fares for transportation service furnished by the unified and extended Municipal Railway shall be fixed, established and collected only in accordance with the then existing provisions of the Charter, with regard to this Section 119.1.

Section 61. The surety of said bond shall be a duly organized surety company authorized to do business in the State of California in the manner provided by law, and the original bond or suretyship shall be filed with the Controller and a duplicate shall be filed with the Purchaser of Supplies. Where the bond or suretyship of any officer or employee is required by Charter or the general laws of the State to be recorded in the office of the Recorder of the City and County of San Francisco, the original of said bond shall be recorded and when the same is recorded in the proper book or record it shall be returned to the Controller and no fee shall be charged by the Recorder for the recording of said bond, as said bonds or suretyship are hereby declared to be public documents.

Section 62. All bonds or suretyship shall be duly conditioned that the officer or employee giving the same shall well, truly, honestly and faithfully perform all of his official duties required of him at the time said bond is given or that may thereafter be imposed or required of him by law, ordinance or Charter and that at the expiration of his term of office or employment he will surrender to his successor all property, books, papers and documents that may come into his possession as such officer or employee.



**Section 63.** All bonds or suretyship issued by authority of this ordinance shall be approved by the City Attorney as to form and shall thereupon be approved as to sufficiency of surety by the Controller and shall thereupon be filed with the Controller and the Purchaser of Supplies as hereinbefore set forth.

Whenever any officer or employee who is covered by any bond or suretyship written or issued under authority of this ordinance shall cease to hold the office or position for which said bond or suretyship was issued, the head of the department in which said officer or employee was serving shall notify the Purchaser of Supplies and the controller of said fact, and shall also notify said Purchaser of Supplies and Controller of the name of the officer or employee who has been appointed to succeed said officer or employee. Thereupon the Purchaser of Supplies shall forthwith notify the company carrying the said bond or suretyship for said office position of said change in the occupancy thereof and arrange with said company that the new appointee shall be covered by said bond or suretyship.

Whenever any officer or employee shall cease to hold any office or employment covered by any bond or suretyship written pursuant to this ordinance and the head of the department concerned notifies the Purchaser of Supplies and Controller of said fact, he shall advise said Controller if any liability has accrued in favor of the City or in favor of any officer thereof on said bond or suretyship, and if no such liability has accrued, the Controller shall recommend to the Board of Supervisors that said bond or suretyship covering said officer or employee be exonerated so far as such officer or employee is concerned, and the Board may by resolution exonerate said bond or suretyship, provided that such exonerated shall not in any way release said bond or suretyship for any liability which may have accrued while said officer or employee was covered by said bond or suretyship.

**Section 64.** All bonds heretofore given by any officer or employee, and which are required to be given pursuant to the provisions of this ordinance, are hereby declared to be bonds given in conformity with the provisions of this ordinance, provided the conditions in said bonds comply with the conditions herein contained.

**Section 65.** The bonds or suretyship herein provided for shall be obtained by the Purchaser of Supplies and the premiums thereon shall be paid by the City and County of San Francisco and where any officer or employee is an officer or employee of any department that is allowed by law a specific fund, then the cost of said bond shall be charged against said fund and the premium on all bonds covering any officer or employee of any utility or utilities shall be a charge against the fund of said utility or utilities and where said officer or employee serves more than one utility the premium on said bond shall be equitably prorated among the various utilities which said officer or employee may serve, and where any officer or employee is being paid from the proceeds of any bond issue the premium on any bond or suretyship written for said officer or employee shall be paid from said bond fund.

**Section 66.** Any bond or suretyship given for any employee or officer pursuant to this ordinance shall inure to the benefit of his superior, whenever said superior is liable for the acts or omissions of said employee or officer.

**Section 67.** The bonds or suretyship given for any department may be grouped so that all employees and officers of said department will be covered by one bond, when such procedure shall be deemed to be for the best interests of the department and the bonds given for all departments may be grouped so that all employees and officers of all departments will be covered by one bond.

All positions not heretofore bonded and for which bond is required under the provisions of this ordinance may be grouped under one schedule. In such event all other positions now bonded shall be added

to the schedule as the respective anniversary dates of the existing bonds covering such positions shall be reached.

Section 68. Nothing herein contained shall in any way change or modify any Charter provision requiring a bond from any officer or employee, but the bonds herein required shall be supplemental to said bonds required by Charter.

Section 69. The respective sections of this ordinance covering the suretyship to be given by the officers or employees of any particular department may be covered by amendment of the appropriate section of this ordinance without the necessity of republishing said ordinance in its entirety and the consent of the surety shall be evidenced by a proper rider or endorsement to said bonds or suretyship.

Section 70. The surety of any said bond or suretyship may at any time terminate its liability on behalf of any officer and employee or other incumbent under said suretyship by giving thirty (30) days' notice in writing to the Purchaser of Supplies and the Controller of the City and County of San Francisco and likewise the Purchaser of Supplies and Controller of the City and County of San Francisco may cause the termination of the surety's liability on behalf of any and every officer, employee or other incumbent by notice in writing to the surety, specifying the date of cancellation. Upon the determination of the notice of cancellation and provided no loss has been reported, the pro rata unearned portion of premium shall be returned to the City and County of San Francisco.

Section 71. The several bonds herein provided, for the several officers and employees mentioned in this ordinance, shall be accepted in the place and stead of any bond heretofore given by any of said officers or employees for the faithful performance of the duties of their respective offices or employments.

Section 72. Bill No. 1092, Ordinance No. 1058, and Bill No. 1923, Ordinance No. 1837, are hereby repealed.

## CHARTER AMENDMENT No. ....

## LEAVES OF ABSENCE

Amending Section 153 of the Charter giving protection to the sta eligibles after service in the United States armed forces.

Describing and setting forth a proposal to the electors of the City and County of San Francisco to amend the Charter of said City and County by amending Section 153 thereof so as to protect the status of eligibles on service lists who are in the military service and providing that leaves granted for services directly connected with the prosecution of the war shall be treated as war effort leaves.

The Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco hereby submits to the electors of the City and County of San Francisco at the primary election to be held on May 16, 1944, a proposal to amend the Charter of said City and County by amending Section 153 thereof so that the same shall read as follows:

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NOTE: Amendments are indicated by *light face italics*. Cancellations are set in **bold face and bracketed [ ]**.

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## LEAVES OF ABSENCE

Section 153. Leaves of absence to officers and employees of the City and County shall be governed by rules established by the Civil Service Commission, provided that leave of absence to any officer or employee for the purpose of leaving the City and County, taking a position outside of the City and County service, or accepting a position in some department or office of the City and County other than the one in which he is employed and whose duties are in no way related to the duties covered by his civil service classification, shall be limited to six months; and provided, further, that no officer or employee shall be placed on a leave of absence granted to enable an officer or employee to accept promotion to a non-civil service position in the same department in which he holds civil service status, or promotion to co-related work in another department or office of the City and County.

Leaves of absence shall be granted to officers and employees of the City and County of San Francisco and non-certificated officers and employees of the San Francisco Unified School District [and to eligibles on lists for appointment to positions therein] for service in the armed forces of the United States or the State of California or for service on ships operated by the United States government in time of war and for such time thereafter as may be provided by rule of the Civil Service Commission, but not to exceed two years after the proclamation of peace, except in case of disability incurred [in line of duty] while in active service with the armed forces of the merchant marine when such disability shall extend beyond such period.

### POWERS AND DUTIES OF DEPARTMENT HEADS

on 20. Each elective officer in charge of an administrative office, the  
 xecutive appointed by each board or commission, the controller, the  
 ministrative officer, and each department head appointed by the chief

administrative officer shall have the powers and duties of a department head except as otherwise specifically provided in this charter.

Each appointive department head shall be immediately responsible to the chief administrative officer or the board or commission, as the case may be, for the administration of his department, and shall file an annual report and make such other reports, estimates and recommendations at the time and in the manner required by law, or as required by the chief administrative officer, board or commission.

He shall act as the "appointing officer" under the civil service provisions of this charter for the appointing, disciplining and removal of such department assistants and employees as may be authorized. On the written recommendation of the department head concerned and the approval of the chief administrative officer, board or commission to whom such department head is responsible, the head of any utility, institution, bureau or other subdivision of such department may be designated as the "appointing officer" for the utility, institution, bureau or other subdivision. Non-civil service appointments and any temporary appointments in any department or subdivision thereof, and all removals therefrom shall be made by the department head or bureau head designated as the appointing officer only with the approval of the chief administrative officer or the board or commission in charge, as the case may be.

He shall issue or authorize all requisitions for the purchase of materials, supplies and equipment required by such department, provided that, with the written approval of the chief administrative officer or the board or commission in charge of any department, the head of any utility, institution, bureau or other subdivision of a department may likewise be vested with such authority. Each department head or the head of a utility, institution, bureau or other subdivision of each department shall be responsible for the proper care and use of all materials, supplies and equipment ordered for its purposes, and for the approval or disapproval of bills for claims rendered for such materials, supplies or equipment.

The head of any department, through the chief administrative officer or the board or commission in charge thereof shall recommend to the board or supervisors such ordinances as may be required to carry out the powers and the duties imposed, and to establish or readjust fees or charges for permits issued to or work performed for persons, firms or corporations where these are subject to his or its jurisdiction.

*The following named officers of the City and County shall have the duty to attend and, unless official business prevents, shall attend all regular meetings of the Board of Supervisors.*

*The Mayor, the Chief Administrative Officer, the Controller, the City Attorney, the Assessor, the District Attorney, the President of the Civil Service Commission, who may be represented by the Commission Secretary, the President of the Police Commission, who may be represented by the Chief of Police or the Chief of Police, the President of the Fire Commission, who may be represented by the Chief Engineer of the Department or by the Chief, Fire Prevention Inspector, the President of the Public Utilities Commission, who may be represented by the Manager of Utilities.*

Each department head may suggest the creation of positions subject to the provisions of this charter, and may reduce the forces under his jurisdiction.

conform to the needs of the work for which he is responsible, any revision of this charter to the contrary notwithstanding. The mayor, the chief administrative officer, or the board or commission, on the recommendation of any department head, or on his or its motion, may combine or may transfer and redistribute among department offices under his or its authority, respectively, any function or duty added to or continued by this charter in any department.

#### Discussion.

Supervisor Mancuso explained the purpose of the foregoing proposed charter amendment, pointing out that it would require department heads to be present at meetings of the Board of Supervisors without the necessity for the President so to request. He believed it would be in the interest of the City and County as a whole for department heads to be present.

Supervisor Colman agreed that the idea of having department heads present at the meetings of the Board was good, but he did not believe it should be a charter requirement. It should not go into the basic law. He would vote against submission.

Supervisor Mead urged Supervisor Colman to change his mind. He stated that on many occasions matters have had to be postponed because of the inability to have department heads who were interested in a matter present.

Supervisor Brown held that while the basic thought behind the charter amendment was sound, he felt that it went a lot farther than it should. On occasion the Board desires the counsel of various department heads, but they are not all needed at the same time. However, some modification of the ruling might afford a proper solution. He believed that department heads should be "on call" on Mondays, and they should so regulate their affairs that they would be available when needed, but their actual presence should not be required at all times. He would have to vote against the proposed amendment as presented, but if it could be amended so as to require department heads to be on call, he would be in favor of it.

Supervisor Uhl expressed agreement with the thoughts of Supervisor Brown.

Thereupon, the roll was called and the foregoing proposed charter amendment was *refused submission* by the following vote:

#### Re-reference to Committee.

#### Requesting Presiding Judge of Federal District Court to Adopt Rules for Selection of Jurors.

(Series of 1939)

Proposal No. 3929, Resolution No. . . . . ., as follows:

Whereas, it has been represented to the Board of Supervisors by the Central Council of Civic Clubs that after investigation and examination of the present methods used to select trial jurors in the local Federal District Court that no rules are prescribed by the judges to guide the clerk and jury commissioner in making their selections of jurors as is done in our local State Superior Court; that one woman is purposely selected for every four men on the panel instead of an equal proportion and that jurors are selected almost entirely from one class of our citizens so that little or no representation is given to working

men or their wives who constitute the greater part of our citizens; and

Whereas, the Central Council of Civic Clubs by motion respectfully requested the Presiding Judge of the local Federal District Court to call a meeting of the Judges to adopt rules to govern the selection of trial jurors for that Court so as to bring about a fair cross-section of all classes of our citizens as jurors; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Board of Supervisors, if the condition complained of is as stated, endorse the request of the Central Council of Civic Clubs requesting said Presiding Judge to give consideration to the adoption of such rules as will provide for a fair cross-section representation of the community as jurors without favoring or excluding any one group because of sex, race, occupation, wealth or social position and to be fairly distributed among different geographic sections.

#### Privilege of the Floor.

Mr. Carroll Newburg, President of the Central Council of Civic Clubs, in discussing the foregoing resolution, reported that the findings of the Central Council of Civic Clubs were as set forth in the "Whereases" of the foregoing resolution.

Mr. Allen Spivock also reported on the consideration given to the foregoing resolution by the Central Council of Civic Clubs. The resolution merely brings the request of the Central Council to the attention of the Federal Judges.

Supervisor Green announced that he had voted for the resolution in Committee because he thought it important enough to get it before the full Board. However, the Board should proceed with caution, because it would be criticising Federal Court procedure. Before voting to adopt the resolution, members of the Board should be sure that the statements contained in the "Whereases" are true.

Mr. Spivock thereupon stated that the truth of the "Whereases" had already been admitted by the Clerk of the Court.

Supervisor Colman objected to the resolution, stating that it was not a matter for consideration by the Board. The Charter did not give the Board the right or authority to tell the federal judges of this country how they should select their jurors. That was a matter for the determination of the federal judges. He would not vote to ask them to change their rules.

Supervisor Green announced that he had been employed as a clerk in the Federal Courts. At the time he was so serving, the conditions were as set forth in the proposed resolution. However, he did not believe the Board should adopt the proposed resolution without some sort of statement from one of the federal judges. However, he disagreed with the views expressed by Supervisor Colman; he believed the matter was one of concern to the Board, but he believed, also, that the Board should proceed very cautiously. The Board should have more information before acting.

Supervisor Mead suggested that the matter be re-referred to committee in order that the federal judges, and anyone else interested in the matter, might be heard. Thereupon, he moved re-reference to committee. Motion seconded by Supervisor Colman.

Supervisor MacPhee suggested that the motion be amended to provide that the matter be heard by the Board of Supervisors as a Special Order of Business on Monday, April 3, 1944, at 3 p. m.

Supervisor Mead announced that he had no particular objection to the suggestion by Supervisor MacPhee nor did he favor it. However, he believed it would be better for hearing by committee rather than by the entire Board.

Supervisor Green believed that the resolution should be re-referred to committee, with the thought that the committee would meet with

the Presiding Judge and have an informal talk with him before returning the matter to the Board.

No objection, and resolution was *re-referred to Judiciary Committee.*

Providing for the Acceptance of Gifts of Money and Merchandise by the Mayor to Be Used for the Purpose of the Victory Garden Service and as Prizes in Contests and Exhibitions for Amateur Victory Gardeners in San Francisco, and Prescribing Procedure in Connection Therewith.

(Series of 1939)

Bill No. 2817, Ordinance No. . . . . ., as follows:

Providing for the acceptance of gifts of money and merchandise by the Mayor to be used for the purpose of the Victory Garden Service and as prizes in contests and exhibitions for amateur Victory Gardeners in San Francisco, and prescribing procedure in connection therewith.

Whereas, the Mayor, as Commander of the Citizens' Service Corps, through the Victory Garden Service, contemplates the encouragement of Victory Gardens and the staging of a series of contests and exhibitions to be participated in by amateur Victory Gardeners of San Francisco; and

Whereas, various business people and individuals may from time to time desire to make contributions of money or gifts of merchandise to be used to encourage Victory Gardens and as awards to the winners of such Victory Garden events; and

Whereas, the staging of such events would tend to encourage the citizens of this city in victory gardening and this Board of Supervisors does declare it to be to the public interest to promote and encourage amateur Victory Gardening in San Francisco; now, therefore,

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco as follows:

Section 1. All contributions of money or gifts of merchandise which



from time to time may be offered voluntarily to this City and County through any of its officers, boards or commissions for the Victory Garden Service are hereby accepted for such purposes.

Section 2. All money so received shall be deposited in the Treasury of the City and County in a special fund to be known as the "Victory Garden Trust Fund."

Section 3. All expenditures from said fund shall be made for the purposes for which such funds have been received and in accordance with the fiscal provisions of the Charter.

Section 4. All merchandise or orders for merchandise received shall be held in trust by the Commander of the Citizens' Service Corps and used for the purpose for which given.

Section 5. Receipts, pre-numbered and in triplicate, shall be prepared by the person, or persons, authorized to accept donations hereunder. Receipts so issued shall show thereon the date, name and address of the donor, the amount of money or description of the merchandise, and the purpose for which the donation was made. The original receipt shall be filed currently with the Controller, the duplicate given to the donor, the triplicate to be retained for use by the Citizens' Service Corps.

Section 6. All awards shall be made by, and under rules and regulations prescribed by the Commander of the Citizens' Service Corps. Upon making the awards, each donor thereof shall be notified as to the date of the award, name and address of the recipient and the purpose for which the award was made.

**Relative to Workmen's Compensation Insurance for Volunteer  
Civilian Defense Workers.**

(Series of 1939)

Supervisor Gallagher presented:

Proposal No. 3930, Resolution No. 3905, as follows:

Whereas, Section 1596 of the Military and Veterans' Code, Chapter 920, Statutes of 1943, provides:

"The California State War Council shall establish by rules and regulation various classes of civilian defense workers and the scope of the duties of each class. The California State War Council shall also adopt rules and regulations prescribing the manner in which civilian defense workers of each class are to be registered. All such rules and regulations shall be designed to facilitate the paying of workmen's compensation";

and

Whereas, the California State War Council, on October 7, 1943, adopted rules and regulations establishing classes of civilian defense workers, the scope of the duties of each class and the manner of registration of such workers, which rules and regulations were amended on December 2, 1943, and March 3, 1944; and

Whereas, Section 1597 of the Military and Veterans' Code, Chapter 920, Statutes of 1943, provides:

"Any civilian defense organization which both agrees to follow the rules and regulations established by the California State War Council pursuant to the provisions of Section 1596 of this code and substantially complies with such rules and regulations shall be certified by the California State War Council. Upon making the certification, and not before, the civilian defense organization becomes an accredited civilian defense organization"; and

Whereas, the City and County of San Francisco has registered and will hereafter register civilian defense workers for participation in either civilian protective services or civilian war services; and

Whereas, the City and County of San Francisco desires to become an

"accredited civilian defense organization" in order that injured civilian defense workers registered with it may benefit by the provisions of Chapter 920, Statutes 1943;

Now, therefore, the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco hereby agrees to the rules and regulations established by the California State War Council under date of October 7, 1943 (as amended December 2, 1943, and March 3, 1944) pursuant to the provisions of Section 1596 of the Military and Veterans Code, Chapter 920, Statutes of 1943, and that said rules and regulations will be followed by the San Francisco Civilian War Council. The Clerk of the Board of Supervisors is hereby instructed to send two certified copies hereof to the California State War Council.

**Joint Committee, Public Buildings, Lands and City Planning, and Finance, to Make an Immediate Study Regarding Reclamation of Lands East of Third Street and North of Evans, Necessary for Future Development of San Francisco.**

(Series of 1939)

Supervisor Uhl presented:

Proposal No. 3932, Resolution No. . . . . ., as follows:

Whereas, east of Third Street and north of Evans Street are fifty blocks, much of which is tidelands; and

Whereas, said tidelands reclaimed will provide muchly needed industrial sites; and

Whereas, much of said tidelands belong to the State of California; and

Whereas, immediate study should be made regarding reclamation of lands at the above location, necessary for the future development of San Francisco; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Joint Committee on Lands and Finance make an immediate study regarding reclamation of lands at the above location, necessary for the future development of San Francisco.

The following recommendation of the Public Buildings, Lands and City Planning Committee was taken up:

**Authorizing Permission to Hale Bros. Realty Co. to Install Utility Services Through Fire Department Buildings on Jessie Street.**

(Series of 1939)

Proposal No. 3902, Resolution No. 3899, as follows:

Whereas, pursuant to Resolution No. 3611 (Series of 1939), adopted by this Board on September 20, 1943, and approved by the Mayor on September 22, 1943, the City and County of San Francisco, a municipal corporation, as lessor, entered into a written lease with Hale Bros. Realty Co., a corporation, as lessee, of certain City owned real property and improvements located between Stevenson and Jessie Streets, 175 feet southwest of Fifth Street, San Francisco, California, size 50 feet by 75 feet, known as Lots 7 and 8 in Assessor's Block 3704, for a period of five years beginning October 1, 1943, and ending September 30, 1948; and

Whereas, due to the expiration of Hale Bros. Realty Co.'s lease of the store building located on the southwest corner of Fifth and Market Streets, said company desires permission from the City and County of San Francisco to install certain pipe lines and wires through the City's fire house located on Lot 6 in said Block 3704 and through the northeasterly one-half of the building located on Lots 7 and 8 for the purpose of furnishing utility services from Hale Bros.' administration building in said block to the demised premises on said Lots 7 and 8, and it appears that this is the most feasible and economical method of reestablishing such services to the demised premises; and

Whereas, the Fire Department and the Director of Property have recommended that the desired permission be granted, subject to the hereinafter mentioned conditions; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That permission is hereby granted to Hale Bros. Realty Co., a corporation, to install five lines of pipes and wires through said property by suspending the same from the ceilings of the basements therein, to be used for said utility purposes. Said pipes and wires shall be installed and maintained by the permittee, at its own expense, in a proper manner to the satisfaction of the Fire Department. The permittee shall abide by all laws and governmental orders or regulations and amendments thereto controlling or limiting the installation, maintenance, and use of said pipe lines and wires. The permittee shall be responsible for any damage or injury to persons or property due directly or indirectly to the installation, maintenance, and use of said pipe lines and wires on the City's property and shall hold the City and County of San Francisco free and harmless from any and all claims in connection therewith.

This permit shall expire upon termination or expiration of said five year lease, and within thirty days thereafter the permittee shall, at its own expense, remove said pipe lines and wires from the said property and repair any damage caused by such removal.

*Adopted by the following vote:*

**Explanation of Position With Respect to Salaries of Municipal Carmen.**

Supervisor Brown, under his name on Roll Call, commented briefly on stories in the local press as to commitments by the various members of the Board in connection with the question of the carmen's salaries. As far as he was concerned, he had had a conference with Mr. Shelley on Saturday evening, who had asked him two questions: In view of the fact that the War Labor Board has allowed an increase to Key Route platform men, how would you feel about 97½ cents per hour? Also, if the Mayor should veto the measure, how would you vote? In reference to the first question, Mr. Shelley held that the award granted the Key Route platform men was a basis for approving the requested scale for the Municipal Railway platform men; the positions were comparable. In answer to the first question, Supervisor Brown said that he had stated that if the representations should be substan-

tiated, he would vote for the proposed scale. In reply to the second question, he was not prepared to commit himself.

#### **Appointment of Supervisor Meyer as Director of Alta California, Inc.**

Supervisor Gallagher announced that pursuant to Resolution No. 3860, adopted by the Board on February 28th, he was naming Supervisor Fred W. Meyer as Director of Alta California, Inc.

#### **Consolidated Airport Authority.**

Supervisor Green reported on meeting of special committee appointed to consider a plan for a Consolidated Airport Authority, at which it was decided to submit the matter for the consideration of the Bay Area Regional Development Committee. A meeting of the Bay Area Regional Development Committee was held on Saturday, March 25th, at which representatives from all the nine bay area counties were present. Another meeting will be held within about four weeks, after which recommendations will be made to the various Boards of Supervisors.

#### **Reimbursement of Money Advanced by Social Service Worker to Person on Indigent Aid.**

Supervisor MacPhee reported that a Miss Frances Larson, Social Service Worker employed by the Public Welfare Department, had advanced \$7 of her own money, as union dues in order that an individual on indigent aid might secure a job. It has been the practice from time to time to do that, thus saving the City and County some \$50 per month for each such case. Some plan should be worked out whereby funds so advanced could be returned. Thereupon, Supervisor MacPhee suggested that Mr. Born be requested to present a report thereon to the Board at its meeting on Monday, April 3, 1944.

The Chair, however, *referred the matter to the Public Health and Welfare Committee.*

#### **Consideration of Charter Amendments.**

Supervisor Mancuso announced that beginning Wednesday evening, April 5, 1944, at 7:30 p. m., there would be the beginning of a series of meetings to consider proposed charter amendments.

#### **Resumption of Home Building in San Francisco Bay Area.**

Supervisor Uhl requested the Clerk to read communication from the San Francisco Chamber of Commerce re resumption of private home building in the San Francisco Bay Area. The communication had been referred to the Public Buildings, Lands and City Planning Committee.

The Clerk was directed to acknowledge receipt of the communication.

#### **RECESS.**

There being no further business, the Board at the hour of 7:00 p. m., recessed, to reconvene on Thursday, March 30, 1944, to consider salary standardization legislation.

## CALLING THE ROLL.

The Roll was called and the following Supervisors were noted present:

Absent: Supervisor Green—1.

Quorum present.

President Dan Gallagher presiding.

Supervisor Green was noted present at 2:30 p. m.

## Opinions of City Attorney.

The following opinions of the City Attorney were presented and read by the Clerk:

March 27, 1944, 4:40 p. m.

*Subject: In re Standardization Ordinance, and Possibility of Amending Same.*

Dear Sir:

You have submitted to me a copy of the 1944-45 Standardization Ordinance. It appears to have been passed by your Board as an emergency measure, the nature of the emergency being declared as follows:

"Sec. 37. This ordinance is passed as an emergency measure and the Board of Supervisors does by the vote by which this ordinance is passed hereby declare that an actual emergency exists which necessitates this ordinance becoming effective forthwith, for the reason that said ordinance to be made effective for the coming fiscal year must be passed on or before the 1st day of April, 1944, and, therefore, the passage of said ordinance under date hereof is necessary to comply with time limitations as established by law."

You ask: (1) Can the Standardization Ordinance be passed as an emergency measure, and (2) can it be amended after passage by making changes specified in the compensations provided therein?

*Opinion.*

Answering your first question, I will state that in the past in some instances the Salary Standardization Ordinance has been passed as an emergency measure and its validity has not been questioned. Undoubtedly as to the "employees" of the City, as distinguished from "officers" of the City, it is absolutely valid as an emergency measure, but there is some doubt as to its validity as an emergency measure in so far as "officers" are concerned. I base this statement on the decision of the District Court of Appeals in the case of *Brown v. Boyd*, 33 Cal. App. (2d) 416. (Hearing by Supreme Court denied.) This case had to do with the legality of the appointment of three captains of police in the San Francisco Police Department. They were appointed under an appropriation ordinance creating the positions which was passed by the Board of Supervisors as an emergency measure. In passing upon the validity of the appointments, the court held that the captains of police were "officers" of the City and County and that to create their positions by an emergency measure would be a violation of Section 1 of Article IV of the Constitution of California, the pertinent portions of which are as follows:

"Providing, however, that no measure creating or abolishing an office or *changing the salary*, term or duties of an officer . . . shall be construed to be an emergency measure."

In disposing of the matter, the court said:

"From the foregoing it follows that when the City and County of San Francisco adopted its present Charter 'consistent with and subject to' the Constitution, the constitutional reservation of the power of referendum was read into and became a part of the Charter with the same effect as though it had been expressly incorporated in the Charter. By the same reasoning, when the Constitution declared that 'no measure creating or abolishing any office or changing the salary, term or duties of any officer' should be construed as an urgency measure, it in express terms defined in part what that reserved power of referendum should be. Thus, though the City Charter could extend the limitations upon the powers of the Supervisors and thereby add to the reserved powers in the electors, it could not, by definition, or otherwise, limit that reserved power. This being so it follows that the ordinances under attack are invalid if they create an office or change the salary, term or duties of an officer."

I am, therefore, of the opinion that, at least for safety's sake, the passage of the Standardization Ordinance on March 20th as an emergency measure should be ignored, and that the action of the Board on that day should be considered as a passage for second reading and on some date, at least ten days from March 20th and prior to April 1st, the ordinance should be finally passed and again submitted to the Mayor for his approval.

The ordinance will have to continue to carry the emergency section which it now contains, for the reason that to strike out the emergency clause would be to amend the ordinance after first reading, which is forbidden by Section 15 of the Charter. Note the language:

"To amend an ordinance which has proceeded to second reading shall require publication of the ordinance as amended and proceeding *de novo*."

You next ask: Can the Standardization Ordinance, after it is finally passed and signed by the Mayor, be amended? The answer to this



question is in the affirmative if the amendment refers to "employees" as distinguished from "officers," for the reason that any amendment will have to be approved by the Board of Supervisors by April 1st, which can only be accomplished by an emergency ordinance, which, as I have above stated, can be made to apply only to "employees" and not to "officers." Therefore, to amend the ordinance, the Board should hold a special or adjourned meeting on Thursday or Friday of this week and pass any amendatory ordinance by at least nine votes. In all probability such an ordinance will be valid. If it is not, it will not affect the existing ordinance. In any event such a course is the only one open to the Board at this late date.

You are advised accordingly.

*Subject: Re: Compensation of Employees Whose Salaries  
Have Been Heretofore Standardized.*

Gentlemen:

You have directed my attention to my opinion rendered to the Civil Service Commission on February 17, 1943, relative to compensations to which employees, whose salaries have been heretofore standardized, are entitled.

*Opinion.*

There is no question that under the provisions of Sections 71 and 151 of the Charter that the compensation of those employees who were in the employ of the City on January 1, 1931, cannot be reduced below what they were receiving at that time.

In my opinion of February 17, 1943, I not only ruled that the salary of any employee could not be reduced beyond that which he was receiving on January 1, 1931, but, furthermore, Section 73 of the Charter proposed a further limitation upon the reduction of salaries. The pertinent portion of this Section reads as follows:

"Rates of compensation enumerated shall be those established by salary standardization schedules, and shall not be listed for individuals or individual position, except where the compensation of incumbents is higher than the rate fixed by salary standardization, which compensations shall not be reduced so long as the incumbents legally hold such positions."

It appears to me that the meaning of this Section is that when salaries are standardized the compensation of the incumbent of any position cannot be reduced below the amount which said incumbent was receiving at the time of the standardization, for the Section clearly provides that when the compensation of incumbents is higher than the rate fixed by standardization compensations of incumbents shall not be reduced so long as the incumbents legally hold such positions. This does not mean that the compensation of the incumbent of any position cannot be reduced by one standardization ordinance below the amount at which it has been fixed in a prior standardization ordinance, but merely that it cannot be reduced below the amount which the incum-

bent was receiving at the time the compensation of the position was standardized. I believe that the first partial standardization of compensations was made effective on July 1, 1937, and that a more general standardization was made effective in June, 1942.

Therefore, to clear up any misunderstanding relative to my opinion of February 17, 1943, you are advised that the compensation of any position occupied by a present incumbent cannot be reduced below the amount which the incumbent was receiving at the time the position was first standardized. For instance, that for those positions which were standardized for the first time in 1942, the incumbents were entitled to receive a compensation not lower than they were receiving when that particular standardization ordinance went into effect and their present salaries cannot be reduced below that amount. This does not mean that persons whose compensations were increased since the date of the standardization of their respective positions cannot be deprived of any increase in compensation granted since the date of their respective standardizations, that is to say, if the compensation of an employee was standardized in 1937 or in 1942 and subsequent to either of these dates was increased, that the increase cannot now be taken away from them provided that the compensation is not reduced below what they were receiving at the time of the first standardization.

You also ask the question if it is permissible to include in the year's Salary Standardization Ordinance a similar provision to that contained in last year's ordinance, to-wit, that salaries of occupants of positions as of the last day of the fiscal year shall not be reduced below the salaries of that date—such a provision while not necessary is not improper in your ordinance.

CC to Civil Service Commission and Mayor.

#### Discussion.

The City Attorney, in reply to questioning by the Chair and by Supervisor Mead, stated that in his opinion it was perfectly legal for the Board of Supervisors to take up and finally pass the bill heretofore passed on March 20, 1944, Bill No. 2809, fixing a schedule of compensations to be paid employees of the City and County of San Francisco, and providing for the administration of such schedule, and known as the Salary Standardization Ordinance, although the day's meeting was a meeting recessed from Monday, March 27, at which time ten days had not elapsed since the Salary Standardization Ordinance under consideration had previously been voted on. The ten days, as required by the Charter, had elapsed.

The City Attorney further advised, pursuant to request by the Chair, that it should be considered that the bill under consideration, although it had been passed as an emergency measure on March 20, 1944, it should be considered as having been Passed for Second Reading, and being before the Board at the current meeting for Final Passage. The emergency section, however, would have to be retained in the bill, but the Bill could be passed by only six votes.

The City Attorney further advised, in reply to question by Supervisor MacPhee, that it would not be necessary to adopt another resolution setting forth a list of schedules before final passage of the ordinance.

Supervisor Colman, in discussing the situation, suggested that since the legislation had been Finally Passed as an emergency measure on March 20, 1944, and had been signed by the Mayor, that it had become law.

In reply thereto, the City Attorney agreed that it had become law as far as employees of the City and County were concerned. He was doubtful as to its effect as far as officers were concerned.

Thereupon, Supervisor Colman questioned further, asking if the bill, already signed by the Mayor, could be taken up again, be Read the Second Time and Finally Passed. In other words, could the Mayor's signature be removed, and the bill be treated as though it had never been signed.

The City Attorney, in reply, expressed some doubt, but declared there was nothing else that could be done. Perhaps the proposed procedure was all wrong. Nothing similar had ever before come up. All the Board could do would be to try its best to get out of a bad situation.

Supervisor Colman, then, in expressing his views on the situation, stated that when the matter first came up he did not like the report of the Civil Service Commission, but in view of conditions, such as they were, and in view of the statement that the bill would be signed by the Mayor, and in the nature of a compromise that there would be no more matters to come up and other matters would be withdrawn and for harmony on the Board, because apparently the members had come to an understanding, he had voted for the bill. He was making this statement simply to recall conditions under which he had cast his vote, because that might have a bearing on any future activities.

Supervisor Meyer suggested that inasmuch as the meeting was still the meeting of March 27th, the Board, on that day having recessed, he believed the Board should adjourn, and call another meeting for the next day, Friday, March 31, 1944.

Supervisor Mancuso, however, pointed out that the City Attorney had advised that action would be all right, it being ten days since the Salary Standardization Ordinance was previously voted on, and he requested that the Board proceed with the order of business.

#### Final Passage.

Thereupon the roll was called and the following bill was *Finally Passed* by the following vote:

## Salary Standardization Ordinance

(Series of 1939)

Bill No. 2809, Ordinance No. 2639, as follows:

An ordinance fixing a schedule of compensations to be paid employees of the City and County of San Francisco and noncertificated employees of the San Francisco Unified School District in certain specified classifications which are subject to the provisions of Section 151 of the Charter and providing for the administration of such schedule and that the said schedule shall become effective July 1, 1944, an emergency ordinance.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco, as follows:

Section 1. Pursuant to the provisions of Section 151 of the Charter, the schedule of compensations set forth herein shall, beginning July 1, 1944, determine and fix the salaries, wages, and compensations for the several classifications of employment in the San Francisco municipal service and the noncertificated personnel of the San Francisco Unified School District hereinafter enumerated, subject to the terms of this ordinance; provided, however, that the salaries of occupants of permanent positions as of June 30, 1944, shall not be reduced below the salaries such employees were receiving in the same classification on June 30, 1944, for the same number of hours worked.

Section 2. (a) **Method of Payment:** Employees entering the municipal service in any of the specified classifications enumerated herein on or after July 1, 1944, shall be paid the entrance rate provided for their particular classifications in the schedule of compensations herein contained; provided, however, that employees promoted within the service who receive in the lower class a salary higher than the minimum of the compensation schedule for the higher class shall not be reduced to the entrance rate of the promotive class. The compensations of all employees receiving less than the minimum of the schedules specified herein for their particular classifications shall be adjusted to the minimum on July 1. Every employee who entered the service by permanent appointment or was promoted in the service on or before July 1, 1943, shall receive on July 1, 1944, and annually thereafter on July 1st, the salary fixed for his years of service based on his original date of appointment to a permanent position in his present classification; provided, however, that for the fiscal year 1944-45 and in such other years as the Board of Supervisors shall designate in the annual salary ordinance, each such employee shall receive one full increment as established for his particular classification. Provided further that each employee entering the service by permanent appointment or being promoted in the service after July 1, 1943, shall receive annually one full increment increase as set forth in the compensation schedule established for his particular classification payable on the first day of the month immediately following his anniversary of employment or promotion; provided, however, that no annual increment for such employee shall be allowed if the granting of the increment will establish the compensation at a rate beyond which the employee is entitled by reason of accrued years of service in the class. No employee shall receive more than one salary increment annually, except for adjustment to the proper step in the compensation schedule on the basis of seniority. No increase in compensation shall cause the salary of an employee to exceed the maximum fixed herein for his classification.

(b) Except as provided in Section 2a hereof advancement from the entrance salary to the maximum salary where such minima and maxima are recommended shall be by annual increment as set forth below, depending upon the amount of range from the entrance to the maximum and the said table of annual increments is hereby made a part of the compensation schedules herein determined.

**Section 3. Maintenance:** Salaries and wages set forth in the schedule of compensations herein contained are gross compensations. Deductions shall be made from such salaries or wages, as provided by law, for maintenance or other accommodations and charges therefor shall be fixed by law in accordance with the schedule established in the annual salary ordinance; provided, however, that no charge shall be made for maintenance or other accommodations available to employees in public institutions unless such employees actually receive such maintenance or utilize such accommodations.

**Section 4. Hours of Work:**

(a) Compensations fixed herein on a per diem rate are based on an eight-hour day.

(b) Except as otherwise provided herein, or in the annual salary ordinance, compensations fixed herein on a monthly basis are based on an eight-hour day and a five-day week. In order that there shall be no diminution of service to the public it shall be the duty of the head of each department to stagger, arrange and assign the work of his department so that a skeleton crew will be on duty in each department which is required to be open on Saturday morning for the conduct of public business, and no officer or employee in such department shall work more than a five-day week, except as part of a skeleton crew to keep such office open on Saturday morning, and except as provided in Section 4, subdivisions (e) and (f) hereof. Time worked on Saturday morning as part of a skeleton crew shall be compensated for by equal time off of one-half day in the same or succeeding week.

(c) **Night Shifts:** Seven and one-half hours per day and five days per week shall constitute the normal work day and week for employees whose compensations are fixed herein on a monthly basis and who work on night shifts. A night shift is any full time shift which commences after 2 P. M. and prior to 6 A. M.

(d) **Part-Time Services:** Except as provided in subdivision (e) herein a daily work schedule of less than eight hours or a night schedule of less than seven and one-half hours shall be considered part-time employment, and compensations therefor shall be fixed in the annual salary ordinance at a rate based upon the full time rate for the classification, proportionate to the hours worked, with due regard to seniority of service. Provided, however, that these provisions will not apply to physicians employed in their professional capacity on a call basis or on a regular consultant basis; compensations for such positions shall be established annually by the Board of Supervisors in the annual salary ordinance.

(e) **Exceptions:** To provide for the uninterrupted operation of

the service, employees in classifications included in Division R—Recreation Service and Division X—Library Service, may work the forty-hour week schedule within six days and shall not be subject to the provisions of Section 4(g).

(f) No increase or decrease in the number of hours and days worked per week on a regular schedule different from eight hours per day and five days per week shall be allowed except upon approval of the Board of Supervisors in the annual salary ordinance, or as provided herein.

(g) **Split Shift:** A straight shift shall be considered as eight hours work within a spread of nine and one-half hours; a working shift of eight hours over a spread of nine and one-half hours, but not to exceed eleven hours per day shall be considered a split shift, and there shall not be more than one split in any one shift. Employees required to work a split shift shall receive fifty cents per day extra.

**Section 5. Holidays:** Monthly employees shall be allowed the following minimum number of holidays off with pay: New Year's Day, Admission Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Thanksgiving Day and Christmas Day. Work on such holidays, and other legal holidays heretofore regularly recognized by departments in 1942, shall be considered as overtime worked; provided, however, that employees in services commonly operating seven days per week, who are required to work on any of the above legal holidays or other legal holidays recognized by departments in 1942, shall be allowed a day off in lieu of such holiday, in accordance with the rules of the Civil Service Commission. Employees whose regular day off falls on one of these holidays shall be allowed another day off in lieu thereof.

**Section 6. (a) Regular Work Schedules of More Than Five Days of Eight Hours:** Except as otherwise provided herein, or in the annual salary ordinance, straight time payment shall be made for time worked on regular work schedules in excess of five days of eight hours up to and including six days of eight hours on day shifts, or after seven and one-half hours up to and including eight hours per day, and after five days of seven and one-half hours up to and including six days of eight hours on night shifts.

(b) **Emergency Overtime Payment, Monthly Employees:** Except as otherwise provided herein, or in the annual salary ordinance, overtime shall be paid for emergency work on an hourly basis of one and one-half times the normal rate of pay to all employees who are paid on a monthly basis and who are required to work in excess of eight hours per day, or in excess of a five-day forty-hour week, or who are required to work on regular holidays specified herein and such other legal holidays generally recognized by departments; provided, however, that the maximum overtime payment shall be based on \$250 per month, and no overtime payment shall be made on any portion of an employee's compensation in excess of \$250 per month; and provided further that no overtime payment or additional cost through straight time payment shall accrue for the purpose of keeping city, county, or city and county, or department offices open on Saturday morning, with the exception of busy seasons in the offices of the Assessor, the Tax Collector, and the Registrar of Voters, as provided in the annual salary ordinance.

(c) Compensations fixed herein on a per diem basis and converted to a monthly basis in the annual salary ordinance shall be subject to the provisions of Section 6(a) hereof, unless otherwise provided in the per diem overtime ordinance adopted annually by the Board of Supervisors.

(d) **Exceptions:** No overtime compensation or other payment shall be made to employees in positions established on a part-time basis, and such other officers and employees as are listed in the salary ordinance annually by the Board of Supervisors.

Employees in classifications included in Division R—Recreation Service, and Division X—Library Service, who work a weekly schedule of forty hours in six days or a night schedule of thirty-seven and one-

half hours in six days, shall be paid for emergency overtime worked at the rate of one and one-half times their normal rate of compensation for time worked in excess of their regular daily schedule and after forty hours per week. Straight time payments shall be made as provided in Section 6 hereof.

**Section 7. Overtime—Per Diem Employees:** Overtime shall be paid all employees whose rates of pay are fixed herein and in the annual salary ordinance on a per diem basis in accordance with an ordinance to be established by the Board of Supervisors annually.

**Section 8. Method of Computation:** In converting per diem rates to monthly rates, the conversion shall be made by using the factor 21.25 days per month for a five-day week, 23.4 for a five and one-half day week, and 25.6 for a six-day week; all of which factors include allowance for the six holidays listed in Section 5 hereof. In figuring conversions, figures shall be rounded to the next highest half dollar.

**Section 9. Intermittent Service:** Permanent employees or temporary employees in classifications for which compensations are fixed herein on a monthly basis, who work less than a five-day week of forty hours as a regular condition of employment, and temporary employees in such classifications in positions which are intermittent in service or subject to irregular working schedules, shall be paid on a daily basis derived by dividing the normal monthly compensation by the factor 21.25 days. The Civil Service Commission shall determine which positions shall be subject to the provisions of this section.

**Section 10. Additional Employment:** No employee covered by the provisions of this ordinance shall accept any employment in addition to his regular city employment, except with the permission of the Civil Service Commission under the provisions of its Rule 36, or any amendments thereto. Employees shall be subject to any penalties provided for failure to comply with the provisions of said Rule 36.

**Section 11.** If during any succeeding fiscal year while this ordinance is in effect, it is determined by the Board of Supervisors, upon the recommendation of the Civil Service Commission, that changes in working conditions, hours of labor, or any other administrative provision contained in this ordinance, should be made for the good of the service, such changes shall be made in the annual salary ordinance so as to reflect the necessary changes in working conditions, hours of labor or other administrative provisions in this ordinance; provided that no such change shall affect the basic compensation schedules provided for herein.

**Section 11.1** If it shall be determined by any court of competent jurisdiction that any provision, salary or wage fixed in the administrative provisions or the schedule of compensations herein contained is contrary to the provisions of Section 151, or any other provision of the Charter, such determination shall not affect the validity of any other provision, salary or wage fixed in said ordinance and schedule of compensations.

**Section 11.2.** This ordinance shall take effect July 1, 1944.

**Section 12.** The compensation schedule for classifications included in Division A—BUILDING TRADES SERVICE, as set forth in the Civil Service Commission's classifications of positions are as follows, subject to the provisions of this ordinance:

#### Remarks by His Honor the Mayor.

His Honor, Mayor Roger D. Lapham, thereupon addressed the Board, setting forth his views of the salary standardization question in detail. The Mayor stated that he believed it only fair, both to the members of the Board of Supervisors and to the public and the press, that before he took any action with respect to the Salary Standardization Ordinance that had just been passed the second time as a regular measure, that he should summarize factually what had happened since March 7th. He would try to give the facts as he recalled them, and make some observations, and then possibly make some inquiries. Thereupon the Mayor traced the history of the present legislation from its inception in June, when the Board of Supervisors had passed a resolution requesting the Civil Service Commission to report on a salary standardization program, until the present time. After a survey in which a great deal of data had been secured by the Civil Service Commission, hearings were had by the Commission, and the Commission's recommendations were sent to the Board. The Board held hearings and then referred to the Commission a number of changes which the Board proposed to make. The Commission reported to the Board on the proposed amendments, some 106 in all, agreeing to a few of the recommendations, but opposing most of them, and stating the reasons for the opposition. On March 9, 1944, the members of the Finance Committee had visited him, of their own volition, and had inquired of him as to his reaction to the proposed amendments, many of them for additional compensation, and some for reductions, as well as to his reactions to the entire matter.

Mrs. Dolen, who had been sent for, reported on the Commission's comments on the 106 proposed amendments. Mrs. Dolen reported that the increased cost of the proposed amendments, most of them increases, but a few reductions, to be \$500,765. There would be an additional cost of \$10,847 based on straight time, or \$16,270 based on time and one-half. The original recommendations of the Civil Service Commission showed an increased cost of \$522,888 of basic wage increase, with an estimated increase of overtime, based on time and one-half, of some \$600,000 to \$700,000. Among the additional items proposed were increases for the laborers and for the carmen. For the laborers the Commission had recommended 95 cents per hour; the Supervisors were proposing an additional 5 cents. This increase was based on action taken by the Wage Adjustment Board after the Civil Service Commission had made its recommendations on February 1. The recommendation by the Wage Adjustment Board was for laborers in the building trades. It had always been the Mayor's understanding, he stated, that wages of laborers in the Building Trades have always been higher than wages in comparable jobs where employment was continuous. It then developed that the 7½ cents increase for the platform men of the Municipal Railway that had been proposed by the Supervisors was based on the feeling that if common labor was to be paid \$1 per hour, the platform men of the Municipal Railway should likewise have the same amount. The Finance Committee requested an expression of opinion almost immediately as the Board of Supervisors intended to meet that same afternoon. That, the Mayor stated, he could



not do on such short notice, but stated that he would give them an expression of opinion on the next day, March 10th, in the forenoon.

The Committee appeared the next morning, at which time the Mayor had told them he had given considerable thought to the matter; that he had checked up as much as he could in the short time; he found that on March 3rd, he believed it was, that the War Labor Board had handed down a decision in the Market Street Railway case in which they gave the Market Street Railway platform men the same rate of pay as was at that time enjoyed by the Municipal men. During the presentation before the War Labor Board it was argued that the Municipal Railway wage might be increased, but the opinion of the majority members of the Board was even if the Municipal Railway rates were increased, it would not follow that the rates of the other companies would have to be increased correspondingly. However, the City of San Francisco was not free to make unstabilizing wage rates. The Charter forbids such rates.

After further discussion, the Mayor told the committee of the Board that it had called on him voluntarily to ask his views, and that he could do nothing else but to veto the Salary Standardization Ordinance if it included the increases suggested by the Board of Supervisors over and above the recommendations of the Civil Service Commission. The Board met on Friday afternoon. The Mayor was not present. About 6:00 p. m. that evening, Friday, March 10, 1944, he had received a message asking if he would be available in his office about 9:00 p. m. or shortly thereafter, as the Board would like to confer with him. The Mayor had agreed. There were about eight members of the Board present that evening and they asked substantially the same questions that the Finance Committee had asked and the Mayor's answer was substantially the same. The Mayor was invited to attend the Board session that same evening, he stated, but he did not wish to engage in any debate, so he did not attend. The next morning he had learned that the Board had adopted not only the recommendations made by the Civil Service Commission, but the increases that were proposed by the Board, by a vote of 7 to 1, Supervisors Colman, Green and Meyer being absent.

On Monday, March 13, the Board had met in regular session, when it was suggested by the Chairman of the Finance Committee that the Mayor and the Finance Committee get together again to discuss the whole thing and possibly there would be a way to find something, or a measure that would be, while not acceptable, might be jointly agreeable to the majority of the Board and to the Mayor. That was on Monday, March 13. The Mayor agreed to that. That afternoon, Mr. Foley addressed the Board and made certain remarks, and complained that the Mayor had not seen him when he had called. The next morning the Mayor had phoned to Mr. Foley, and invited him to call and talk matters over with him. Mr. Foley was gracious enough to call with Mr. Sherry the next day. The Mayor went over the whole document with him, and Mr. Foley, who told him of the meeting to be had by the carmen on Sunday, March 19, at 4:00 a. m., and that possibly the workers might take a little vacation. The Mayor had not made any particular comment at that time except to say that he would be very glad to address his executive committee or his membership committee if he so desired.

The next day, Thursday, March 16th, the press had various reports on something that might happen as a result. The Public Utilities Commission, he had learned later, had a meeting with representatives of the employees. It was pointed out, though, that the Utilities Commission had no power to act, and he, the Mayor, had suggested that Mr. Foley might like to confer with him. He was gracious enough to call on the Mayor again on Friday afternoon, March 17th, when a lengthy and friendly discussion was held. On Saturday the press carried accounts of a possible tie-up. Steps were taken by the Utilities Commission and the Chief of Police to handle the situation if there

were signs of any trouble. The Mayor learned later of a meeting on Saturday afternoon, March 18, which had been suggested by the Labor Council. He did not attend that meeting, but his secretary did, and the Mayor was informed of what took place, and reference was made at that time to a decision in the Key Route case which had been handed down by the War Labor Board that day in which the Key Route people had been granted an increase in wages to 97½ cents per hour.

On Sunday morning the Mayor had received word from Mr. Cahill that the men had returned to work, after a stoppage of about three hours. It was reported that the men had returned to their work on the understanding that ten out of the eleven Supervisors had agreed to vote for a five cent increase in their pay. Monday morning, March 20, the Mayor got in touch with the War Labor Board people, and asked their advice, but did not ask them to take jurisdiction. He had asked the War Labor Board, in accordance with General Order 12B, which is a matter of public record, to advise him whether the present wages and conditions of the Municipal Railway employees were in line with wage stabilization policies of the Board, and whether any increases would be in conflict with their policies or would have an unstabilizing effect. On March 29, the opinion was released, the sum and substance of which was that the Tenth Regional War Labor Board, on the basis of evidence before it, deemed that a general increase in wage rates of any substantial group would be in conflict with the National Wage Stabilization policy and would have an unstabilizing effect upon wage rates of other employees in the San Francisco Bay region labor market. The opinion was rendered by an eight to four majority of the board.

The Mayor reported also on an informal meeting held at the Whitcomb Hotel, which he had attended because he wanted to talk to the Board about the Market Street Railway acquisition plan. At that meeting the so-called compromise wage stabilization plan was also discussed, and the Mayor had learned that nobody was particularly satisfied with it. The Board, at its meeting on Monday afternoon, March 20, 1944, had passed the so-called compromise measure by a 10 to 1 vote, as an emergency measure. Now that measure is before the Board. Whether the Mayor would sign the present measure again, as he originally did when it was passed as an emergency measure, he was not quite prepared to say. It was true that he had told the City Attorney, a week or so earlier, when he had been advised of the situation, that he would be glad to "clear title," and to sign the bill as a regular measure. However, now he desired to point out a few things that must be apparent. The bill he had signed was a compromise measure. Then came along dissatisfaction because the carmen and other groups got nothing out of it. Then came the use of an economic strike. The Mayor considered, he stated, the stoppage of work, no matter what the excuse, was in effect, a strike. He had also read in the press commitments that had been made in the face of a threatened strike. Although labor's pledge not to strike has been violated, it has not been violated to any great extent. But in their case the carmen and others, the carmen particularly, put it up to the Board of Supervisors that if the Board did not vote their increase they would not run the cars. That was the use of economic strike in war. Before signing the measure just passed, the Mayor stated, he felt it only fair to know just what demands, if any, have been made of any members of the Board of Supervisors. Of course, the Mayor stated, he realized that members of the Board did not have to answer him, but he believed the people of San Francisco were entitled to know, under the circumstances, the answer to that query.

Supervisor Mead, thereupon, on taking the floor, stated that in his opinion the Mayor had asked a very fair question, and he was ready to answer. He was speaking only for himself, though. Nobody, Supervisor Mead continued, knew his position with respect to the street

carmen better than did the Mayor. He had pointed out to the Mayor at the outset of the series of meetings between the Mayor and the Finance Committee that it was his opinion, and he believed it was the opinion of the other members of the Finance Committee, that what the street carmen were asking for was the equivalent, if not a little bit more than the wage granted laborers, and it was his opinion, at least, that their duties were more responsible than the duties of the laborer, and they were entitled to consideration. He believed the carmen should receive a minimum wage of \$1 per hour. The Mayor pointed out that wage was out of line with the national policy, and he could not go beyond the confines of the State of California for comparable employment. However, at the meeting held on Saturday afternoon, it was pointed out that the War Labor Board had seen fit to grant increases to the operators of the Key System cars. It is true that the major portion of the cars operating in the City of Oakland are operated by one man, but the decision was rendered for all the carmen. In some cases there is not only a motorman, but there are two or three, or possibly more conductors. He believed such increases should be considered for the Municipal Railway employees, and even for the Market Street Railway employees. The work is comparable. Certainly it behooved him to take advantage of that situation and to attempt to convince all interested parties, and particularly the Mayor, that the Board of Supervisors should go along with such program. On that basis he had committed himself to the increase as requested by the representatives of the Municipal street car employees, and he understood that later in the afternoon there would be introduced necessary amendment to the legislation just passed with the hope in mind to secure the acquiescence of the rest of the members of the Board. He had already committed himself.

Supervisor Brown reported that on Monday he had gone on record in the Board as to the nature of his commitment.

Supervisor Colman, in expressing his views, stated that there was one thing brought out pretty clearly by the Mayor's statement which he was sorry he had not thought of before. The Clerk of the Board rang him up at his home about noontime on the previous Saturday and told him that Senator Shelley wanted to have a meeting of the Supervisors to discuss the carmen's problem. He had been happy to extend that courtesy and to attend the meeting, and to explain his position, but one point he had overlooked: that was, that the Board would be taking advantage of the Mayor. He had gone along with the Salary Standardization Ordinance because he had wanted to see some men get raises that were justified, and not have the whole thing knocked out. That, he believed, was also in the mind of the Mayor. The Mayor was on the level with the Board of Supervisors; he put his cards on the table and told the Board just exactly what he was going to do. We, the Board of Supervisors, told the Mayor what we were going to do, or at least, we gave him the impression that we would abandon the other amendments and would be content with the measure which he signed. That did not occur to him then. It was true that the reason the Board got together was that it did not want to lose everything. The Board was then right back to the same situation. It seemed to Supervisor Colman that the Board owed something to the Mayor in return for his fairness. With regard to his own case, Supervisor Colman then stated, he was not pledged to anything at all. Beyond agreeing to pay the highest prevailing wage, he was making no pledges whatsoever.

Supervisor Gallagher announced that he was one of the members of the Board who had voted for increases of seven and one-half cents per hour for Municipal carmen. At the luncheon at the Whitcomb Hotel he had stated that he was not satisfied with the salary standardization, but he had stated nevertheless that if it were the consensus

of opinion of the majority of the members that they were going along with the measure, that he would go along, too, but he was told that the Mayor was satisfied with the contents as was set forth in the standardization ordinance that was then before the Board in the form of an emergency measure. That afternoon the old measure was tabled and the new bill was introduced. His feeling at all times was that the matter was not correct, and while he did not have any assurance that any of the members of the Board were going to vote against the measure, he had thought it would be foolish for one or even two Supervisors to vote against it at that time. He had gone along. However, a man changes his mind sometimes, even, as has been said, under pressure. On Saturday, Senator Shelley called him and asked if the members of the Board would sit down at a meeting at 4 p. m. and discuss the wage of the Municipal carmen. It was Supervisor Gallagher's belief, at all times, that the carmen should receive \$1 per hour and he had so stated to the Mayor. He believed that the Municipal carmen should be paid a premium—a premium in comparison to the wage of the Market Street Railway carmen. They had, in the past, enjoyed such premium. He had stated that he would be happy to introduce an amendment to give them that wage, and he would, even today, introduce such amendment and he would support it.

Supervisor MacPhee reported that he was called to the telephone by Senator Shelley, but had advised him that a possible arrangement had been worked out whereby salaries of the people affected under the Salary Standardization Ordinance would not be jeopardized, and amendments suggested to help out the carmen could be introduced on Monday, and he would go along with them. He had told Senator Shelley that he would be happy to see what could be done for the carmen, and as long as the situation otherwise, as regards the salary standardization program was not jeopardized, he would be glad to go along.

Supervisor Sullivan announced that the meeting held on Saturday had no bearing on his vote. He was for the carmen's raise two weeks earlier. He believed they were entitled to it. He was not acting under pressure.

Supervisor Mancuso stated that he felt that before he could answer the Mayor's question, it would be only fair to call to his attention a few other conversations had in his office. The Finance Committee, and he, in particular, had informed the Mayor that they were not satisfied with the Civil Service report, after which the Mayor had inquired if the amendments that had been submitted were the only amendments that were proposed to be submitted. Supervisor Mancuso had then called to the Mayor's attention that there were numerous others in the higher brackets that the Finance Committee was anticipating amending, but until the Committee could find out his stand, there was no need of going any further so far as they were concerned, and if these additional amendments would bring down the higher brackets so the increases the Committee was proposing would not be so high in proportion that it was definitely the thought of the Finance Committee, of himself in particular, that the labor group were entitled to increases to \$1 per hour, and the carmen, public health nurses, playground directors and certain other classifications were entitled to increases. At that time the Mayor had definitely informed the Committee that the only classifications that he would approve were those substantiated by the Civil Service Commission. Subsequently those were adopted by the Board. He had told the Mayor that he was not in favor of the ranges that were adopted; he still was not in favor of them. He did not believe that there was ever a definite commitment made by the Finance Committee that it would go along on the various amendments only if there were no other additions. The Committee informed the Mayor that it would have to do the best it could.

On Saturday the members met with the labor group. The City Attorney was present also, and he stated that there was a way by which something could be done for those classes that the Board was originally trying to help in that if the original Salary Standardization Ordinance was repassed and then signed by the Mayor, as he was assured it would be, then the Board could pass amendments whereby it could give relief that it might desire to give. Then the Mayor would be in a position to veto the amendment that the Board might pass and the Salary Standardization Ordinance itself would remain in effect. That was what the Committee was trying to do. When we were informed by the City Attorney that this could be done, we were approached by numerous classifications for commitments. We refused to consider in a caucus any other than the street carmen's amendment at that particular time. We have been informed that the Key System had received approval of a 97-cent per hour wage since the Mayor informed us that he would not go along with the \$1 request. The increased wage applied both to one-man and to two-man car operation.

Supervisor Mancuso stated that he was for the carmen who had always been underpaid. Because of the poor pay the City could not get the type of men it should have. Therefore, he stated, he would definitely go along with the increase to 97 cents per hour. He would not go along with the wage of \$1 per hour. He also stated that he would vote to override any veto of 97½ cents per hour. Of course, if his Honor the Mayor wanted to, he could wait until the last minute before signing the ordinance just passed, in which event the Board could do nothing. However, that would be the very worst thing he could do; whether the Mayor approved or not, he should give the Board the opportunity to do what it has tried to do. To refuse to give that opportunity to the Board to act by failure to return the measure would be, Supervisor Mancuso repeated, the worst thing that could possibly be done. As to the ruling on the 97½ cents, it was a foregone conclusion what the answer was going to be, considering the frame of mind in which the request was put.

The Board knew that the Mayor was not favorable to the increases. If we had had a Mayor who was favorable, Supervisor Mancuso stated, he believed that the report of the War Labor Board would have been favorable. He definitely disagreed with the War Labor Board's opinion that approval of the requested wage would be in contravention to the wage stabilization policy, and the reason for that was that the carmen have been underpaid. They all have families and they cannot live decently on a wage of 92½ cents per hour.

Supervisor Mancuso also disagreed with the Board when it stated that the increased wage would create an unstabilized effect on employees. He was also in favor of the increased carmen's wage because he believed it would help the Mayor to put over the elimination of the Market Street Railway. If the platform man can be assured of a decent wage, the Market Street carmen will be working for passage of the charter amendment. That is worthy of consideration. In closing, Supervisor Mancuso expressed the hope that the Mayor would not put the Board in the position of not being able to express themselves further on the matter of salary standardization.

Supervisor Gartland stated that he had committed himself to vote for increases and he was prepared to live up to that commitment.

Supervisor Meyer announced that he had attended the meeting at the Whitcomb Hotel. His only question was whether the railroad men would be taken care of, and he was assured that they would be. He intended to go along with the raises for the carmen.

Supervisor Green announced that from the start he had publicly announced that he was for increased salaries for carmen employed by the Municipal Railway. He had been unable to attend all the hearings

between the Mayor and the Board of Supervisors. However, he had conferred with Supervisor MacPhee and with others interested and had learned that the Mayor would veto the Salary Standardization Ordinance were certain matters to be included. He had thought that a half loaf was better than nothing at all, and had gone along. Since then he had felt that the Board had made a mistake and had not been fair to itself. Practically every member of the Board had felt that the carmen should have been included. Supervisor Green, in closing, stated that he was willing to go along not only for 97½ cents, but even for \$1 rate.

Supervisor Uhl announced that he was glad of the opportunity to express his sentiments regarding Municipal Railway carmen and also for any men who work for either the Municipal or the Market Street Railway regarding the matter of salaries. He had always taken the position and had worked for increased wages for Municipal carmen. He considered it a tremendous responsibility on both motormen and conductors. He had not been pressured in this matter at all, and he would regret if the Mayor should veto legislation providing for increase for carmen. If he should veto it, he, Supervisor Uhl, would vote to override the veto.

Thereupon, his Honor the Mayor thanked the members of the Board for the expressions of their views. However, he desired to say to Supervisor Mancuso that he had not made any statement as to what he would do or would not do. It was true that he had overlooked a few things, because there was a lot of talk, as the Supervisors will recall. It was true that the Finance Committee had recommended some reductions, but they were relatively few in number and they applied mainly to certain individuals. The Mayor had expressed at the time, without going into the merits of anything, that that was not the way to go about it. He had pointed out that in the original recommendations of the Civil Service Commission, \$522,000 basis salary increases were, in his opinion, quite liberal, and he had stated that he did not think the Civil Service Commission was anti-employee. The carmen did appear before the Civil Service Commission prior to February 1st, and requested increased salaries. The records show that the Civil Service Commission denied the requests.

The charter amendment for the acquisition of the Market Street Railway and the Salary Standardization Ordinance are two separate affairs. Of course, there may be certain conflict, but as far as he was concerned he had to look at this particular measure or any other amendments that the Board might make today, as something that has to stand or fall by itself. With respect to the charter amendment for the purchase of the Market Street Railway, he hoped the Board would look at that by itself. As to his inquiry of the Wage Labor Board, he felt that he was entitled to ask for their opinion. He could not get it out of his little "bean" that when a private system has recently been granted a raise to 92 cents per hour, it would not take any War Labor Board to tell him that raising the Municipal line wage to 97½ cents would have an unstabilizing effect on the wage structure. The street carmen employed by the Municipal Railway are working a fifty-four hour week, and are being paid time and one-half for all over forty-eight hours. Of course, he stated, it was hard work, but there were other people doing hard work. San Francisco has been pretty liberal, on the whole, in its treatment of employees in rates of pay, vacations, sick leaves and protection under Civil Service rules.

Although he could hold the legislation just passed for ten days, during which time no amendments could be made, that was not going to be his policy. He would not be any dog in the manger. He just wanted to get these things on the table, though. He believed everybody understood his position. He had given his reasons to the press, making it very plain that the Salary Standardization Ordinance was a compromise. He was perfectly willing to sign the bill before him,

and then the Board could go ahead and introduce whatever amendments it desired. The City Attorney had informed him that the Board could act prior to midnight, April 1st.

The Mayor, in continuing his remarks, declared that if the Board should meet on Friday afternoon he would be prepared to let the Board know then on the various amendments that it might submit, whatever they might be. He would be prepared to declare, by 2:00 p. m. on Friday, whether he would sign or veto them so that the Board would have full opportunity to act. If he should veto the amendments, some of them or all of them, it would be the Board's privilege to override his veto; it would be also the Board's responsibility.

Supervisor Mead, following the foregoing statement by the Mayor, took the opportunity to say that the Mayor had unquestionably taken a very fine and sportsmanlike attitude in the entire affair, and he appreciated it. The Mayor had laid his cards on the table, and he was very grateful for it. The Mayor had been exceptionally fair to the Board of Supervisors.

Supervisor Mancuso also desired to congratulate the Mayor on his stand.

Thereupon, Senator John Shelley, on motion by Supervisor Mead, was granted the floor. Senator Shelley expressed the desire to thank his Honor the Mayor for his fairness. When the rumor was spread around that the Mayor would exercise his authority to delay signing the Salary Standardization Ordinance, he had stated that he thought he knew that Roger Lapham had a sense of fair play, a keen sense of sportsmanship and a sense of honor. He had felt that the Mayor would do exactly what he had done, and he desired to express his appreciation to the Mayor.

There had been nothing done, declared Senator Shelley, by himself or by any of the labor men in this situation, behind closed doors or with any thought of pressure. He had told the carmen that he did not think they had a chance of getting the \$1 per hour which they were requesting, but the men had not agreed with him. Personally, though, he had felt that they were entitled to what they were requesting, but he realized that there were certain charter provisions in the way. There was the requirement that existing comparable rates must be found somewhere in California, and because of the lack of such rates he did not feel that the men could justify such rate, on that technicality. Had there been eight votes assured to override a Mayor's veto, matters might have been different. If not, and a new ordinance could not be introduced, those who had got something in the measure would be denied perhaps four or five years. That, he believed, was what motivated most of the Supervisors to do what they did. They did not want to endanger those who were getting something but who had been cut out in the ordinance heretofore passed.

Last Friday night, March 23rd, there were numerous complaints because he had not spoken and because Mr. O'Connell had not spoken. But the picture had changed. Last Friday afternoon the Tenth Regional War Labor Board handed down a decision establishing 97½ cents per hour as the rate for operators of the Key System. By that there was a prevailing rate established in this area. A year ago there was a five-cent per hour increase for the street carmen voted by the Board. That increase was attacked and proceedings on writ of mandamus had. The Supreme Court rendered an opinion that the charter provision had been complied with. Knowing that, Senator Shelley continued, he told the carmen he would try to get a meeting with the members of the Board of Supervisors for Saturday afternoon, and the Council authorized him to do that so the new evidence could be presented to the Board. There were six members of the Board present, some of whom stated they did not like to discuss a matter under threat of a strike. His answer was that he was not approving a strike,

and was not talking in the light of a threatened strike. He was simply trying to get justice for the men. He had already committed himself to attend the 4 a. m. meeting of the street carmen and to urge them, no matter what happened, to keep the street cars moving.

The five members who were not present were contacted by Senator Shelley and representatives of the Carmen's Union. Each of which answered as he has already stated. At 4 a. m. he attended the meeting. It was an orderly meeting. Services were not disrupted for three hours, but for two hours and five minutes, and that was against the advice of the street carmen's officers. At that meeting the prevailing sentiment was \$1 or nothing. He, Senator Shelley, recommended that the men forget their request for \$1 because he did not think it could be justified. The men almost unanimously took that advice and left the meeting and returned to their jobs.

Senator Shelley, in commenting on the reply of the War Labor Board to the Mayor's communication, pointed out that that board did not know the provisions of the City and County Charter; it was not familiar with the history of the Municipal Railway; it was not familiar with what had been done at the meeting of March 20th; it was not asked for advice; it was not familiar with the fact that there were 109 salary increases approved, from \$75 to \$150 per month, all for people receiving \$300 per month or more. All the men are requesting is justice, equity and decent consideration, and not a kicking around.

Argument has been made that granting raises to the Municipal Railway carmen will injure the chances of the purchase of the Market Street Railway. That, Senator Shelley believed, was a specious argument. The people have turned down the proposal to acquire the Market Street Railway at least twice. It is a specious argument that granting men a five cent per hour raise in wages should be denied because it might interfere with the purchase of what has been openly and publicly called "a pile of junk." The Senator agreed with Supervisor Mancuso, that the proposal to acquire the Market Street Railway would get support of the Market Street Railway employees if the increase should be granted.

Senator Shelley, in conclusion, announced that whether the streetcar men get the raises they are requesting, to which he thought they were entitled, or whether they do not get it, it would be his duty to appear before them, or before any other union, and do as he did last Sunday morning, and urge and advise them to stay on the job and not to go on a strike, and he assured the Mayor and the members of the Board that he would do that. He desired that statement to be made part of the record. That was one thing, he stated that the people who "run the Examiner" might print. "I am not a draft dodger; tell Bill Reynolds that." He expressed appreciation for the Mayor's appearance before the Board and permitting the Board to decide the matter in its own way.

Supervisor Brown, in addressing Senator Shelley at the conclusion of his remarks, referred to the salary increases for employees and officials in the higher brackets, and announced that those increases were not effective immediately, but were to spread over a number of years. For example, an increase of \$100 in a bracket would be reflected in increases of \$20 per month per year for five years.

#### Committee of the Whole.

Supervisor Mead, following suggestion by the City Attorney that inasmuch as proposed amendments to the Salary Standardization Ordinance had not been considered by Committee, it would be advisable for the Board to sit as a Committee of the Whole, Supervisor Mead, seconded by Supervisor Meyer, moved that the Board resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole.

No objection, and *so ordered*.

Whereupon Supervisor Colman, seconded by Supervisor Mead, moved



that the President of the Board act as Chairman of the Committee of the Whole.

No objection, and so ordered.

**Amending Salary Standardization Ordinance, Section 30,  
Division S—Street Railway Service.**

Thereupon, Supervisor Mead presented the following jointly with Supervisors Gallagher, Sullivan and Meyer:

Bill No. 2834, Ordinance No. . . . . (Series of 1939), as follows:

Amending Section 30 of Bill No. 2809, Ordinance No. 2639 (Series of 1939), entitled "An ordinance fixing a schedule of compensations to be paid employees of the City and County of San Francisco and non-certificated employees of the San Francisco Unified School District in certain specified classifications which are subject to the provisions of Section 151 of the Charter and providing for the administration of such schedule and that the said schedule shall become effective July 1, 1944; an emergency ordinance," so as to change the compensation provided therein for Conductor, Street Car Operator (Female), Motorman and Bus Operator, Special Instructor, Municipal Railway; Inspector, Municipal Railway, Day Dispatcher and Supervisor of Schedules; an emergency measure.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco, as follows:

Section 1. Section 30 of Bill No. 2809, Ordinance No. 2639 (Series of 1939), the title of which is recited above, is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 30. The compensation schedule for classifications included in Division S, STREET RAILWAY SERVICE, as set forth in the Civil Service Commission's classifications of positions, are as follows, subject to the provisions of this ordinance:

Section 2. This ordinance is passed as an emergency measure and the Board of Supervisors does by the vote by which this ordinance is passed hereby declare that an actual emergency exists which necessitates this ordinance becoming effective forthwith for the reason that said ordinance, to be made effective for the coming fiscal year, must be passed on or before the 1st day of April, 1944, and, therefore, the passage of said ordinance under date hereof is necessary to comply with the time limitations as established by law.

## Committee of the Whole Rises and Reports.

Following the presentation of the foregoing bill, Supervisor Mead, seconded by Supervisor Green, moved that the Committee of the Whole rise and report.

No objection, and *motion carried*.

Whereupon, Supervisor Mead moved that Bill 2834, amending Section 30 of the Salary Standardization Ordinance, be Finally Passed.

## Discussion.

Supervisor Colman, in discussing the proposed amendment, held that the proposed wage of 97 cents for street carmen was higher than the prevailing wage for comparable duties, and he could not vote to approve it. The wage of 97½ cents per hour, approved for the Key System, was based on one-man car operation. It was perfectly obvious that the operator of a one-man car was entitled to more money than the man who acted simply as a motorman or as a conductor. The proposed wage of 97½ cents would have an unstabilizing effect; the Market Street Railway employees would ask for 97½ cents, and the Key Route carmen would want an increased rate. The same thing would happen in San Diego, and elsewhere. While it is strictly true that the War Labor Board exercises no direct control over the City and County of San Francisco, it is equally true that the City and County is morally bound to follow its dictates. Accordingly he would vote "No."

Supervisor Brown, in expressing his views on the proposed amendment, announced that when he had heard that the Key Route had been awarded a 97½ cent rate, it had impressed him as being a very definite new piece of evidence to be considered by the Board of Supervisors and by the Mayor in making a decision as to the proper rate of pay for the street carmen of San Francisco. He was asked on Saturday how he felt, and he had told Mr. Shelley that if there was a parallel wage granted he would vote for the 97½ cents. On Monday one of the newspapers stated that ten members of the Board had pledged themselves to the 97½ cent rate. On Monday, so that there would be no misunderstanding, Mr. Shelley made the point that the Supreme Court of California had ruled a year ago about the parallel condition between the Key System and the San Francisco situation. The War Labor Board, without doubt, when it made its decision, knew about the ruling of the Supreme Court. He was sorry, Supervisor Brown continued, if

anybody had gained the impression that he had committed himself to a 97½ cent rate. Mr. Shelley himself stated it was incumbent on those who wanted the increase to demonstrate the fact that rates paid across the Bay should apply to San Francisco. He regretted any misunderstanding, but he had always tried to make his position clear at all times, and he had tried to do so in this case. However, he did not suppose, in view of statements that had been made, that his position would mean anything in regard to passing the proposed amendment.

Supervisor MacPhee called attention to statements made that increases in rates of pay for Municipal Railway men would reflect favorably upon the purchase of the Market Street Railway. He did not think that even an inference should be permitted to go into the record that the Board had voted for increases in pay because it would help the proposition that would shortly be placed before the people. He did not think that members of the Board should vote for increases based upon such a reason. The question of increased wages should be decided upon its merits.

Supervisor MacPhee then called the attention of Supervisor Brown to the fact that in 1943, in determining the rate of wage to be paid to Municipal carmen, the Board used the rate of pay in effect on the Key Route System in Oakland as the basis for comparison. Supervisor Brown voted for that increase at that time, as had all the other Supervisors, with the exception of Supervisor Shannon. Common labor gets 95 cents per hour now, and assumes no responsibility. The basis of 97½ cents is entirely fair, in view of the responsibility and the duties of the carmen. Also, regardless of other rates of pay, Supervisor MacPhee stated, he believed San Francisco should attempt to establish wages that other organizations could look up to. The Municipal carmen would have a long wait before obtaining any wage increases if San Francisco should wait until the Market Street Railway increased the wages of its carmen. The increase of wages for the Municipal Railway carmen should be based on merit.

Supervisor Mead announced that he agreed 100 per cent with the statement just made by Supervisor MacPhee, and he moved that all reference to increased wages aiding the proposal for the acquisition of the Market Street Railway be expunged from the record.

Motion *failed* for want of a second.

Supervisor Uhl announced that he had been informed, and he hoped reliably, that Mr. Cahill had advocated a wage of \$1 per hour for the carmen, in order to be able to obtain the kind of men needed for the operation of the street cars. That was his reason for favoring the amendment.

#### Final Passage.

Thereupon, the roll was called and the foregoing bill was *Finally Passed* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Gallagher, Gartland, Green, MacPhee, Mancuso, Mead, Meyer, Sullivan, Uhl—9.

Noes: Supervisors Brown, Colman—2.

#### Committee of the Whole.

Supervisor Mead, seconded by Supervisor MacPhee, moved that the Board again resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole.

No objection, and *so ordered*.

Thereupon, Supervisor Mead, seconded by Supervisor Green, moved that the President act as Chairman of the Committee of the Whole.

No objection, and *so ordered*.

Supervisor Mead presented a proposed amendment to Section 21 of the Salary Standardization Ordinance, changing rates of Laborers and of Trackmen from \$7.60 to \$8.00 per day.

Supervisor MacPhee, in the interest of the economy of time, and in order to permit the day's business to be concluded as early as possible because of the necessity for some of the members of the Board to leave early, suggested that all proposed amendments be presented to the Committee of the Whole, after which the Committee would rise and report to the Board.

No objection, and suggestion *accepted*.

Supervisor Mead then presented an additional amendment to Section 21, changing rate for Book Repairer from minimum rate of \$120 and maximum rate of \$145, to minimum rate of \$130 and maximum rate of \$160; also changing rate for Sub-Foreman Book Repairer, minimum rate \$150 and maximum rate \$175, to minimum rate of \$160, maximum rate of \$180.

Supervisor Meyer presented amendment to Section 21, changing rate for Supervisor of Street Cleaning from minimum rate of \$300 and maximum rate of \$375 to minimum rate of \$325 and maximum rate of \$400; also Section 26, changing rate of Supervisor of Street Repair, minimum rate of \$300 and maximum rate of \$375 to minimum rate of \$325 and maximum rate of \$400.

Supervisor Mead presented amendment to Section 32 of the Salary Standardization Ordinance, changing rate of Water Department Worker from \$7.60 per day to \$8.00 per day.

Supervisor Mead presented amendment to Section 16 of the Salary Standardization Ordinance, changing rate of Lineman Helper from \$8.50 per day to \$9.00 per day, and to change related positions in order to maintain proper differential.

Supervisor Mead moved that it be understood that in all amendments proposed, it be considered that appropriate changes be made to "related classes" in order that proper relationship might be maintained.

No objection, and *so ordered*.

Supervisor Mead presented amendment to Section 24 of the Salary Standardization Ordinance, changing rates of pay for Machinists and Car Repairers, as follows: Machinist, change rate from \$11.12 to \$12.30 per day; Car Repairer, change rates from \$8.40, \$8.96, \$9.20 to \$8.40, \$9.20 and \$10 per day.

Supervisor Mead presented amendment to Section 26 of the Salary Standardization Ordinance, changing the rate of Junior Operating Engineer from \$200 per month to \$215 per month.

Supervisor Mead presented amendment to Section 23 of the Salary Standardization Ordinance, changing rate of Dental Hygienist from minimum rate \$175, maximum rate \$200, to minimum rate \$200, maximum rate \$240.

Supervisor Mead presented amendment to Section 29 of the Salary Standardization Ordinance, changing rate of Playground Director from minimum rate \$165, maximum rate \$200, to minimum rate \$175, maximum rate \$225.

Supervisor MacPhee presented amendment to Section 14 of the Salary Standardization Ordinance, changing rate of Janitress from minimum rate \$130, maximum rate \$155, to minimum rate \$140, maximum rate \$170; Janitor, minimum rate \$140, maximum rate \$170, to minimum rate \$150, maximum rate \$180; Working Foreman Janitor, minimum rate \$170, maximum rate \$200, to minimum rate \$180, maximum rate \$210.

Supervisor MacPhee presented amendment to Section 27 of the Salary Standardization Ordinance, changing rate of Public Health Nurse, minimum rate \$175, maximum rate \$200, to minimum rate \$185, maxi-

minimum rate \$215; Supervisor Public Health Nursing, minimum rate \$200, maximum rate \$250 to minimum rate \$215, maximum rate \$250; Registered Nurse, minimum rate \$150, maximum rate \$175, to minimum rate \$160, maximum rate \$180; Head Nurse, minimum rate \$175, maximum rate \$200, to minimum rate \$180, maximum rate \$200; Anaesthetist, minimum rate \$175, maximum rate \$200, to minimum rate \$180, maximum rate \$200; Operating Room Nurse, minimum rate \$175, maximum rate \$200, to minimum rate \$180, maximum rate \$200.

Supervisor MacPhee presented amendment to Section 31 of the Salary Standardization Ordinance, changing rate of Attendant, Juvenile Detention Home, minimum rate \$150, maximum rate \$175, to minimum rate \$160, maximum rate \$210; Probation Officer, minimum rate \$190, maximum rate \$240, to minimum rate \$200, maximum rate \$250; Social Service Worker, minimum rate, \$175, maximum rate \$215, to minimum rate \$185, maximum rate \$225.

Supervisor Gallagher presented amendment to Section 20 of the Salary Standardization Ordinance, changing rate of Seamstress, minimum rate \$115, maximum rate \$140, to minimum rate \$125, maximum rate \$150; Head Seamstress, minimum rate \$140, maximum rate \$165, to minimum rate \$150, maximum rate \$180.

#### Committee of the Whole Arises.

Supervisor Mead moved that the Committee of the Whole rise and report. Motion seconded by Supervisor Green.

No objection, and motion *carried*.

Thereupon, on motion by Supervisor Mead, the Board reconvened as a Board of Supervisors.

#### Remarks by Supervisor Brown.

Supervisor Brown, in commenting on amendments presented in Committee of the Whole, stated: "I am wondering whether a compromise is a compromise. A few days ago the Board voted a Salary Standardization Ordinance on the basis that it was a compromise. Now I recognize some of our friends asking to be included in these amendments. It is all right with me. There is no harm in trying. So far as I am concerned, I feel I went a long way when I voted for the compromise measure. My only reason for so voting was to keep peace in the family and to see that those entitled to raises got what they were entitled to. I do not think the whole subject should be opened up again."

#### Amendment to Salary Standardization Ordinance, by Changing Rates of Compensation of Laborers and Related Classifications.

Supervisor Mead presented:

Bill No. 2832, Ordinance No. . . . . (Series of 1939), as follows:

Amending Sections 21, 26 and 32 of Bill No. 2809, Ordinance No. 2639 (Series of 1939), entitled "An ordinance fixing a schedule of compensations to be paid employees of the City and County of San Francisco and non-certificated employees of the San Francisco Unified School District in certain specified classifications which are subject to the provisions of Section 151 of the Charter and providing for the administration of such schedule and that the said schedule shall become effective July 1, 1944; an emergency ordinance," so as to change the compensation provided in Section 21 for Laborer, Labor Sub-Foreman, Labor Foreman, Trackman, Switch Repairer, Track Welder and Track Foreman; so as to change the compensation provided in Section 26 for Tree Topper, and Teamster 2-Horse Vehicle; and so as to change the compensation provided in Section 32 for Pipe Caulker, Main Pipe Foreman, Serviceman, Gateman, Water Department Worker, General

Section 1. Sections 21, 26 and 32 of Bill No. 2809, Ordinance No. 2639 (Series of 1939), the title of which is recited above are hereby amended to read as follows:

#### Discussion.

Supervisor Colman, in discussing the foregoing bill, said that he had considered the proposal to increase the compensation for laborers very carefully. In the report of the Wage Adjustment Board, he had found that their jurisdiction was "limited to mechanics and laborers in the building and construction industry employed directly upon the site of the work." There are practically none of the laborers in the City's employ engaged in construction work, and "on the site of the work." There are 22 laborers in the Park Department; 8 in the Recreation Department; 2 in the Bureau of Building Repair; 4 in Bureau of Street Repair; 28 in Bureau of Sewer Repairs; 262 in Bureau of Street Cleaning; Hassler Health Home, 3; Hetch Hetchy, 16; Municipal Railway, 4; Department of Agriculture, 4; Water Department, as needed, 64; etc. He could not consider the recent wage award to mean that \$1 was the right wage for the classification of Laborer in the City government. He would vote "No" on the bill.

Supervisor MacPhee announced that he would vote "Aye" on all the amendments to be presented, but he did not want his vote to be construed as a commitment to override any veto by his Honor, the Mayor.

Supervisor Mancuso announced that he desired to make the same statement as did Supervisor MacPhee.



Supervisor Uhl, in explaining his views, stated that he had always been in sympathy with the "low brackets" and still was. But there is a long string of amendments to be presented today, some of which might well wait until a future date. His sympathies were with the laborers and the nurses, but he felt that if he voted for one he should vote for quite a number of them. He believed the Board should show some cooperation with the Mayor and not press these amendments. He might then approve the wage increases for the carmen.

Thereupon, Supervisor Mead moved approval of bill just presented, involving laborers and that the related classifications be adjusted in order to maintain the proper relation. He desired that in all motions for approval that might be made, that it be understood that the adjustments in compensations for "related classifications" be included.

Thereupon, the roll was called and the foregoing bill was *Refused Passage* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Gallagher, Gartland, Green, MacPhee, Mancuso, Mead, Meyer, Sullivan—8.

Noes: Supervisors Brown, Colman, Uhl—3.

Supervisor MacPhee, following the foregoing "roll call," questioned Supervisor Uhl if he intended to vote "No" on all the amendments to be presented. He was inquiring merely with the idea in mind of saving time.

Supervisor Uhl replied that the statement covered his views.

Thereupon, Supervisor MacPhee moved that all other amendments be presented at one time.

Motion *failed* for want of a second.

Supervisor Colman expressed the desire to make a statement, saying that he felt he should present a specific reason for his vote on the amendments proposed for both the carmen and the laborers. He felt that the Board had broken faith with the Mayor. The Mayor has signed the Salary Standardization Ordinance because he felt that it was a compromise, and he had intimated that he was going to veto all amendments.

Supervisor Mead, referring to the bill for which Final Passage had been refused, stated that had it been approved, it would not have been breaking faith with the Mayor. The laborers had been awarded an increase in wages.

Supervisor Colman, in further statement, said that the Mayor had stated that he was not particularly happy about the Civil Service Commission's report. He gave the Board the idea that he intended to veto all amendments not approved by the Civil Service Commission. The members of the Board should get together with a united front and take what they can get. He had already agreed to that. He had felt that all the rest was a closed issue.

Supervisor Mead stated that he was of the opinion that all the proposed amendments could be justified.

Supervisor Mancuso raised as a point of order that both Supervisor Colman and Supervisor Mead were out of order.

The President ruled the point of order well taken.

#### Action Rescinded.

Subsequently during the proceedings Supervisor Uhl announced that he had made a mistake in his vote on the foregoing bill, and moved that the previous action be rescinded in order that he might change his vote. Motion seconded by Supervisor Mead.

No objection, and action *rescinded*.

### Final Passage.

Thereupon, the roll was again called and Bill No. 2832 was *Finally Passed* by the following vote:

**Statement by His Honor the Mayor.**

The following statement, setting forth his reasons for disapproving Bill 2834, was presented and read by his Honor the Mayor:

March 31, 1944.

To the Honorable  
The Board of Supervisors  
City Hall.

Gentlemen:

I disapprove Bill No. 2834, amending Section 30 of Bill No. 2809, Ordinance No. 2639 (Series of 1939), because in my opinion, its adoption would be contrary to public interest—the national interest as well as the interest of the City of San Francisco.

1. It runs contrary to the considered opinion of the Civil Service Commission who last December heard requests for upward revisions of present wages and denied such requests because "salaries paid in both private and public employ do not justify any increase over recommended rates"; and on March 9 last, the Civil Service Commission found no reason to change the recommendations submitted February 1, 1944, to the Board of Supervisors.

2. It runs contrary to the opinion of the Tenth Regional War Labor Board who have declared ". . . a general increase in the wage rates of any substantial group of the operating employees of the Municipal Railway would be in conflict with the national wage stabilization policy and would have an unstabilizing effect upon the wage rates of other employees in the same occupations in the San Francisco Bay labor market area."

3. The evidence is plain and can be understood by any layman. This amendment to Ordinance No. 2639 would increase the wage rate for conductors (S102 and S103, involving 634 employees) and motormen (S104, involving 541 employees) operating two-man cars for the Municipal Railway, 5 cents per hour over the conductors and motormen who operate the two-man cars of the Market Street Railway. The rate would be 12½ cents higher than the rate now paid by the Los Angeles Street Railway for its two-man operation in Los Angeles.

4. The ordinance increases the rate for one-man bus operators (S106, involving 17 employees), 5 cents an hour, making the rate here for the Municipal Railway bus operators \$1.02½ an hour, as compared to the 97½ cents an hour one-man bus operator rate now paid by the Market Street Railway and the rate last week ordered for the one-man car operation of the Key System employees.

5. From the data submitted by the Tenth Regional War Labor Board, this \$1.02½ would become the highest one-man car rate paid in the State of California.

6. Historically, there has been and should be a differential between wages paid one-man and two-man car operators.

7. I must emphasize here that in asking the Tenth Regional War Labor Board to advise me whether the present wages and conditions of employees of the Municipal Railway were in line with the National Wage Stabilization policy and whether any wage increase granted Municipal Railway employees would be in conflict with the national policy and have an unstabilizing effect, I did so in accordance with the request made by the National War Labor Board and the Commissioner of Internal Revenue on May 25, 1943. I quote from their joint statement issued at that time: "It was stated that Congress in the Act of October, 1942, clearly intended that all employers and employees would be covered by the National Stabilization policy and since millions of public employees are engaged in the same kind of work as private employees, the duty of public employers to conform to that policy is as plain as that of private employers." In asking the advice of the Tenth Regional Board, I did not ask them to take

jurisdiction. I am aware that the City of San Francisco is a sovereign entity and is under no legal compulsion to follow the recommendations of any federal agency designated to control wages of private employers.

8. However, as Chief Executive of the City of San Francisco, I dislike to run counter to national wage policies; nor can I subscribe to the theory advanced—as I understood it—by one Supervisor who said that this City should take the lead in raising wages and who implied that private employers would be compelled to follow suit.

9. I emphasize, that generally speaking the wages and working conditions of the civil servants of the City and County of San Francisco are most generous. These employees have the benefit of Civil Service Commission protection, the benefit of liberal vacations and sick leave, as well as the benefits arising from the retirement pay system.

10. Further, I believe the decision runs counter to the spirit and intent of Section 151 of the City Charter providing that compensations fixed by the City "shall be in accord with the general prevailing rates of wages for like service and working conditions in private employment or in other comparable governmental organizations in this state."

11. But, above all, if this ordinance is enacted over my veto, it indicates that at least eight out of eleven Supervisors have countenanced the threat to use—as well as the practice of—economic force. By so doing, they admit to the servants of the City, to the citizens of the City as well as to the nation at large that, when a group of organized city servants strike—and with our nation at war—they would prefer to grant the strike demands of these City servants rather than insist on obedience such as is required of others who now serve their country in uniform.

12. If this ordinance is passed over my veto, the conclusion is inescapable. Those Supervisors who vote to override my veto, will have put other interests, whatever they may be, ahead and above the interests of the City and the nation. As for myself, I refuse to take or to justify such action.

#### Explanation of Vote.

Supervisor Colman announced his intention to vote to sustain the Mayor's veto. He believed the Mayor's message was sound. It expressed the thoughts that he could not express so clearly. It would be a great mistake, in his opinion, to override the Mayor's veto.

Thereupon, the Chair put the question: Shall Bill 2834 become a law, notwithstanding the Mayor's veto.

Mayor's veto *overridden* by the following vote:

Consideration of Mayor's Veto of Bill 2832, Amending Salary Standardization Ordinance, Section 21, Division J, Labor Service; Section 26, Division O, Miscellaneous Trades Service, and Section 32, Division U, Water Service.

Bill No. 2832, heretofore Finally Passed by the Board of Supervisors and vetoed by his Honor the Mayor, was taken up:

#### Privilege of the Floor.

Mr. P. H. McCarthy, Jr., representing Laborers in the city's employ, was granted the privilege of the floor. Mr. McCarthy called attention

to statement in the Mayor's veto message with respect to street carmen's compensation, wherein he had stated that it was the duty of public employers, as well as private employers, to comply with the recommendations of the War Labor Board, but did not find any such duty with regard to recommendations of the Wage Adjustment Board as to laborers. There is no continuity of logic in the Mayor's reasoning. On the strength of one recommendation, the Mayor has vetoed one bill, while completely disregarding another recommendation, he has vetoed another bill. The laborers request the Board to sustain the federal wage stabilization program. The Wage Adjustment Board has found that laborers, under the classification J4, are entitled, under the Little Steel Formula, to \$1.00 per hour. Today, any laborer in San Francisco, working for a private employer, is making well over 25 per cent more than the city employees will make at the rate of \$1.00 per hour.

Supervisor Colman, in explanation of his vote, announced that he intended to vote to sustain the Mayor's veto. In support of his stand he referred to statement heretofore mentioned by him, that "the jurisdiction of the Wage Adjustment Board hereunder, shall, as heretofore, be limited to mechanics and laborers in the building and construction industry employed directly upon the site of the work." The Salary Ordinance shows that the overwhelming majority of laborers on the city's payroll cannot be classed as being in the building industry.

Thereupon, by direction of the Chair, the roll was called, as follows:

Ayes: Supervisors Gallagher, Gartland, Green, MacPhee, . . .

Noes: Supervisors Colman, Mancuso

Absent: Supervisor Brown

During the roll call, immediately after the name of Supervisor Mancuso had been called, and he had voted "No," Supervisor Mancuso announced that he desired to explain his vote. He had voted "No" because it was his opinion that the views that had been expressed by the Mayor were worthy of serious consideration.

Supervisor Mead raised as a point of order that the Board was in the midst of a roll call, and any argument of explanation of vote was out of order. An explanation of vote could be made, however, after the completion of the roll call.

The Chair ruled the point of order well taken.

Supervisor Colman remarked that it had always been the practice that in the midst of a roll call, no discussion could be had.

Thereupon, Supervisor Mead, after declaring that discussion had taken place, moved that whatever action had taken place be rescinded. Motion seconded by Supervisor Green.

Whereupon, the roll was called and the motion to rescind action was *carried* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Gallagher, Gartland, Green, MacPhee, Mancuso, Mead, Meyer, Sullivan, Uhl—9.

No: Supervisor Colman—1.

Absent: Supervisor Brown—1.

Thereupon, Supervisor Mead, in addressing the Board, reurged that Supervisor Mancuso be made aware of Section 151 of the Charter to the effect that like wages for like work prevailing in private industry should be paid to city employees. We are not, Supervisor Mead continued, particularly interested in the opinion of the War Labor Board or the Wage Adjustment Board. The Supervisors should be guided by the Charter and not by the opinion of any group. The City and County has for a great many years recognized all the building trades rates. There was no difference between the work of laborer in the city employ or the laborer in building trades construction work. He

hoped that Supervisor Mancuso would see his way clear to change his mind with respect to the laborers. Supervisor Mancuso was, unintentionally, he thought, doing a great injustice to the city's laborers.

Supervisor Mancuso announced that he was not being guided by any haphazard decision or thought. When the Supervisors had met originally in the Mayor's office and the Mayor had informed the Finance Committee that he would not go along with the proposed raises for street carmen and laborers, and gave his reasons therefor, he, Supervisor Mancuso, had expressed his opinion that the Mayor's explanation for refusal to go along with the raises, as far as the laborers were concerned, had great merit, and was sound basically. The Mayor's contention was, and Supervisor Mancuso had agreed with him, that the laborers of the City and County were on full time basis in distinction to part time employment of laborers in private industry. The city laborer is also entitled to many privileges. Supervisor Mancuso also stated that he had told Supervisor MacPhee that if the Salary Standardization Ordinance was adopted with increased rates for carmen and laborers, that he would vote to sustain the Mayor's veto, as far as the laborers were concerned. He had always been of the opinion that the carmen were underpaid and were entitled to more money than the laborers. Now the carmen's pay is 2½ cents per hour above the wage of the laborers. The Mayor's veto, in the case of the laborers, had a basic foundation behind it. He would vote to sustain the veto.

Supervisor Colman, in answer to Mr. McCarthy, repeated his statement as to the jurisdiction of the Wage Adjustment Board. He also pointed out that he was entrusted with the spending of the taxpayers' money, and stated that the refusal to spend their money was not a true measure of a man's real feeling of liberality and desire to do justice.

Mr. Jack Leonard, on motion by Supervisor Mead, was granted the privilege of the floor. Mr. Leonard pointed out that laborers, other than those in the city's employ, have been enjoying for the past two years, some more than \$1.00 per hour, and all are now raised to \$1.00 per hour. They enjoy many benefits, too. On the Golden Gate Bridge and Highway District, laborers are receiving \$200 per month. Laborers with the San Francisco Housing Authority are receiving \$172.50 per month. They have two weeks vacation each year; they have two days per month sick leave, and enjoy twelve holidays a year, not the six or seven that the city permits. The laborers for San Francisco cannot possibly work more than forty hours per week because there is not enough money set up for them, with the exception of a very few in the street sweeping department.

Thereupon, the roll was called and the Mayor's veto of Bill 2832 was *sustained* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Gallagher, Gartland, Green, MacPhee, Mead, Meyer, Sullivan, Uhl—8.

Noes: Supervisors Colman, Mancuso—2.

Absent: Supervisor Brown—1.

#### Consideration of Mayor's Veto of Bill 2833, Amending Salary Standardization Ordinance, Section 27, Division P, Nursing Service.

Bill No. 2833, heretofore Finally Passed by the Board of Supervisors, and vetoed by his Honor the Mayor was taken up:

Supervisor Uhl, in discussing proposed salaries for the Nursing Services, stated that his feeling toward the nurses had always been with regard to overtime. Mrs. Dolen advised the Finance Committee that when matters became normal, overtime would not exist. Now the Board is considering the question of the wage scale, and that changes the picture entirely.

Mr. Frank Moitoza, having been granted the privilege of the floor, on motion by Supervisor MacPhee, urged that the Mayor's veto be not sustained. He had not heard a single person, or a group, objecting to increases for nurses.

Thereupon, the roll was called and the Mayor's veto of Bill 2833 was *sustained* by the following vote:

### Discussion.

The Clerk presented and read communication from Josephine Shelley, seamstress, pointing out the duties of her classification and presenting arguments in support of the proposed increases in compensation for the classes of Seamstress and Head Seamstress.

Supervisor MacPhee pointed out, also, that the Mayor, in his message explaining the reason for his veto, had referred to a classification for which no change was contemplated.

His Honor the Mayor agreed that his communication was incorrect, and should be corrected.

Supervisor MacPhee, in continuing his presentation, pointed out that the cost of the proposed amendment would be only \$1,260, and because of the very low salaries paid the two classifications affected, he felt the Board could well go along with the bill and vote to override the Mayor's veto.

Supervisor Uhl, in addressing the Board, stated that he was sorry that the Mayor had seen fit to veto the bill. He noted that the salary

of the Administrative Assistant to the Mayor was increased from \$500 to \$625, and yet the Mayor had seen fit to pass up a little seamstress. Because of the low salary for the positions, he would vote to override the veto.

Supervisor Colman, in discussing the bill, announced that the Civil Service Commission had considered the case and had made no recommendation for any increase in salary. Apparently the Commission had good reason for its failure to make any recommendation. Had the Commission made any recommendation, doubtless it would have been accepted.

Supervisor MacPhee pointed out unless the Mayor's veto is overridden, there would be, in fact, a decrease of wages for the people affected. They will work for only forty hours per week, and will actually be receiving less salary than they now get.

Thereupon, the roll was called and the Mayor's veto was *overridden* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Gallagher, Gartland, Green, MacPhee, Mancuso, Mead, Meyer, Sullivan, Uhl—9.

No: Supervisor Colman—1.

Absent: Supervisor Brown—1.

#### Supervisor Colman Excused From Attendance.

Following the foregoing roll call, Supervisor Colman, at his own request, was excused from attendance.

#### Charter Amendments to Be Considered as Special Order of Business.

Supervisor MacPhee, after addressing the Board briefly, and thanking the members for their support of the Finance Committee's original recommendations, called attention to the fact that charter amendments were to be considered by the Judiciary Committee, following the adjournment of the Board meeting, and requested that any charter amendments that might be approved by the Committee be heard by the Board on Monday, April 3, 1944, as a Special Order of Business at 2:00 p. m.

*No objection, and so ordered.*

#### Numbering of Charter Amendments.

Supervisor Mancuso, seconded by Supervisor Mead, moved that the Clerk be instructed to number such charter amendments as shall be ordered submitted by the Board on the ballot for the special election May 16, 1944, with the charter amendment designed for the acquisition of the properties of the Market Street Railway Company be designated Charter Amendment No. 1.

*No objection, and so ordered.*

#### Privilege of the Floor.

Senator Shelley, on being granted permission to address the Board, stated that he felt he would be remiss in his duty if he did not express some thoughts before the Board adjourned. He desired to thank his Honor the Mayor for his sense of fair play. He appreciated that there had been differences of opinion between the Mayor and himself in the past and there would probably be differences in the future. However, he desired to pay personal tribute to the Mayor for his fairness and sportsmanship, and he desired, also, to pay tribute to the honesty and fairness of the members of the Board.

Mr. H. S. Foley, representing the Municipal carmen, on motion by Supervisor Mead, was granted the privilege of the floor. Mr. Foley apologized for statement he had made in reference to the Board of Supervisors on Monday, March 20, when he had learned that a compromise with respect to salary standardization had been effected and

that the requested increases for the carmen had not been approved. It was only in anger and disappointment that he had made the statement. He had no animosity toward any member of the Board. Even had the Board sustained the Mayor's veto, the position of the carmen would have been "go to work and stay on the job." That was the feeling of the members of the carmen's organization.

Mr. Foley then expressed the desire to say a few words relative to the statement by the Mayor in reference to the veto of Bill 2834. The Mayor, in paragraph 9 of his communication, stated:

"I emphasize, that generally speaking the wages and working conditions of the civil servants of the City and County of San Francisco are most generous. These employees have the benefit of Civil Service protection, the benefit of liberal vacations and sick leave, as well as the benefits arising from the retirement pay system."

In commenting on the foregoing statement by the Mayor, Mr. Foley stated that one time city employments were unique. However, that position has been changed by reason of the war and economic straits. Now contracts have been negotiated and approved by the War Labor Board carrying liberal vacations and other benefits which carmen working under the city Charter cannot enjoy. The only thing that we did enjoy, which others possibly did not, was the sick leave, and that is in the process of being granted through negotiations and arbitration. That is one clause that has been referred back for further negotiation and arbitration.

Mr. Foley also criticized paragraph 11 of the Mayor's communication. At no time was there any threat of a strike or lockout. The men were not attempting to pressure anyone.

In conclusion, Mr. Foley thanked the members of the Board on behalf of the carmen, and 83 per cent of the citizens of San Francisco who have indicated that they were in favor of the increased pay for the carmen. Had the Mayor sought the advice of the citizens on the matter, he too, Mr. Foley believed, would have agreed to sanction the increased pay.

The Board of Supervisors met in regular session.

## CALLING THE ROLL.

The roll was called and the following Supervisors were noted present:

Supervisors Colman, Gallagher, Gartland, MacPhee, Mancuso, Mead, Meyer, Sullivan, Uhl—9.

Absent: Supervisors Brown, Green—2.

Quorum present.

President Dan Gallagher presiding.

Supervisor Brown was noted present at 2:15 p. m.

## Presentation of Guest.

During the day's proceedings Sister Kenney, the distinguished Australian nurse whose treatment for infantile paralysis has been so successful, visited the Board of Supervisors.

At the request of the President, Dr. J. C. Geiger presented Sister Kenney to the members of the Board and to the citizens present, reporting on the remarkable success of the Kenney treatment, and expressing his appreciation and the appreciation of the Health Department in being permitted to meet Sister Kenney and to witness demonstrations of her method of treatment.

Sister Kenney addressed the Board briefly, expressing her appreciation of courtesies accorded her and her happiness at being able to give something to the children and the people of San Francisco.

## Communications.

Communications, as follows, were presented, read by the Clerk, and acted on as noted:

From the Controller, urging the repeal of Ordinance No. 1069, providing for the publication of a summary report monthly on the number of traffic citations issued and cases disposed of during the month by the court.

From the County Supervisors Association, notice of a meeting at Visalia, April 21, 1944, to consider legislative matters.

At the suggestion of Supervisor Colman, who had previously been designated to represent San Francisco at the meeting, the President appointed Supervisor Mancuso in his stead.

From Robert McCarthy and Alfred Pasani, petitioning the Board to close off one block of Barneveld Street.

### CHARTER AMENDMENT—DISABILITY TRANSFERS

Describing and setting forth a proposal to the qualified electors of the City and County of San Francisco to amend the Charter of said City and County by amending Section 156 thereof, relating to "Transfer of Disabled."

The Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco submits to the qualified electors of the City and County of San Francisco at an election to be held therein on May 16, 1944, a proposal to amend the Charter of said City and County by amending Section 156 thereof, so same shall read as follows:

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NOTE: Amendments are indicated by *light face italics*. Cancellations are shown in **bold face and bracketed** [  **]**.

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### TRANSFER OF DISABLED.

Section 156. When a *permanent* civil service employee, other than a member of the Fire Department and Police Department, who has served not less than five years in his position, has become incapable through *advanced* age, accident, or other disability, of performing the duties of his position, the Civil Service Commission may, with the consent of the appointing officer or appointing officers, transfer him to a position within his capacities to *perform* whether or not the [class] classification for which he qualified for appointment; but such transfer shall [be one having a lower] *not be in a classification having a higher position schedule* than the one from which he [may be] is transferred, and compensation shall not thereafter be increased *beyond the maximum salary of the classification to which such employee is transferred, nor in any event shall his salary be increased to equal the salary such employee would have received had he remained in his former position; provided, however, that a permanent employee who has become incapable of resuming his former position through a disability incurred while on active service with the armed forces while on military leave, upon application after his discharge from military service be transferred to a position under the provisions of this Section, regardless of his length of service.*

*Employees transferred under the provisions of this Section may, upon application, be transferred from the disability, and with the consent of the Civil Service Commission, to a vacancy in their former classification.*



*tions filled under the provisions of this Section shall not be subject to standardization, but the salaries thereafter shall be fixed by the Civil Service Commission within the limitations herein provided. The Civil Service Commission shall make the rules to carry out the intent of this Section and such rules shall govern all matters referred to in the provisions of this Section.*

Supervisor Sullivan reported that the foregoing proposed charter amendment had been approved by the County Council, American Legion.

Dolen announced that the proposed amendment was self-explanatory. It would affect two groups of employees: those in the armed forces now; those people who have been transferred under disability provisions of the charter and who are working as employees getting far higher compensation.

Thereupon, the roll was called and the foregoing proposed charter amendment was submitted by the following vote:

**Resolution for Additional Compensation to Certain Members of the Fire Department for the Duration of the War and Six Months Thereafter.**

The following recommendation of the Judiciary Committee was taken up:

### CHARTER AMENDMENT No. . . . .

Whereas it is the duty of the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco to amend the Charter of said City and County by adding a new section thereto to be designated Section 36.2, providing for additional compensation for certain members of the Fire Department during the existing war between the United States of America and the Axis Powers and for six months after the termination thereof.

Therefore, the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco hereby proposes to the qualified electors of said City and County at a special election held on the 16th day of May, 1944, a proposal to amend the Charter of said City and County by adding a new section thereto to be designated as Section 36.2, providing for additional compensation for certain members of the San Francisco Fire Department during the existing war between the United States of America and the Axis Powers and for six months after the termination of the same.

Section 36.2. For the purpose of properly compensating the members of the uniformed force of the San Francisco Fire Department whose compensation is provided for in section 36 of this Charter and the members of the Fire Department, which corps is provided for in section 38.1 of this Charter, during the existing war between the United States of America and the Axis Powers and for six months after the termination of said war, the compensation provided for the several ranks of the uniformed force mentioned in section 36 of this charter and the compensation of members of the Salvage Corps shall be increased \$25.00 per month for each person serving in said uniformed force and in said Salvage Corps.

This amendment containing this section is ratified by the Legislature prior to May 1, 1944, it shall become effective on said last mentioned date, and if not ratified at a later date, it shall become effective within fifteen days after the date of its ratification.

### Discussion.

Following the presentation of the foregoing, Supervisor Mead announced that there was another charter amendment affecting the members of the Fire Department which he would attempt to have consolidated with the amendment just presented.

The Chair, however, suggested that the foregoing amendment should be acted upon. Then if the Board so desired the additional amendment could be consolidated, as proposed by Supervisor Mead.

Supervisor Colman inquired as to the purport of the other amendment to be proposed as it might have some bearing on the foregoing amendment.

Thereupon, Supervisor MacPhee explained that there were two matters pertaining to the Fire Department, one of which would provide that firemen might be compensated out of such surplus funds as might exist in the salary account of the Fire Department at straight time, for work performed on "days off" or during vacation periods; the other would provide for a \$25 increase in compensation for firemen for the duration of the war and six months thereafter.

Thereupon, the Clerk read the proposed amendment to Section 36.1 of the Charter as follows:

### CHARTER AMENDMENT No. . . . .

Describing and setting forth a proposal to the bona fide electors of the City and County of San Francisco to amend the Charter of said City and County by adding a new section thereto to be designated as Section 36.1, authorizing the Fire Commission to allow members of the uniformed force of said Fire Department to work on their days off and during vacation periods and to be compensated for said additional service.

The Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco hereby submits to the qualified electors of said City and County at a special election to be held on the 16th day of May, 1944, a proposal to amend the Charter of the City and County of San Francisco by adding a new section thereto to be designated as Section 36.1, providing that the Fire Commission may allow members of the uniformed force of said Fire Department to work on their days off and during vacation periods and providing for additional compensation to said members of said department for said additional service rendered.

### **AUTHORIZING FIRE COMMISSION TO ALLOW MEMBERS OF THE UNIFORMED FORCES TO WORK ON THEIR DAYS OFF AND DURING VACATION PERIODS AND TO BE COMPENSATED THEREFOR.**

Section 36.1. (a) The tours of duty provided for in Section 36.1 of the Charter and the length thereof, and the platoon system provided for in said section for the officers and members of the uniformed ranks shall continue to be as now set forth in said section.

(b) Each member of the uniformed force shall be entitled to at least one day off in each seven and such additional days or time off as may be approved by the Fire Commission.

(c) When, in the judgment of the Fire Commission, it is in the best interest that any member of the uniformed force of said Fire Department should work on his day off and said member consents to so work, he may, in the direction of the Chief Engineer of the department work on said day

addition to the regular compensation provided for said member as set in Section 36 of this Charter, said member shall be entitled to be compensated at his regular rate of pay as provided for in Section 36 for said extra served.

Each member of the uniformed force of the Fire Department shall be entitled to a vacation period of two weeks as provided for in Section 151 of the Charter, provided, however, that if in the judgment of the Fire Commission is in the public interest that any member of the said department should devote his service to the department during his vacation period, and said member consents to continue his said service, the Chief Engineer of the department may permit said member to continue such service, and said member shall be in addition to his annual vacation pay, be paid additional compensation for said vacation period, which said compensation shall be equal to the vacation pay allowed to said member of the department.

Salary warrants for extra time served by officers and members of the uniformed force of the department shall be payable from the regular salary appropriation of said uniformed force for the prevailing fiscal year, and at no time shall extra compensation be authorized or paid in amounts exceeding the available unencumbered balance in said appropriation.

Nothing in this section contained shall in any way interfere with the right to disability leave provided for in Section 301, Part I, of the San Francisco Municipal Code.

This section shall be effective on the first day of July, if the same is not adopted prior thereto by the Legislature of the State of California, and if not adopted shall be effective within fifteen days after the date of its ratification.

The provisions of this section shall continue in force for a period of twenty-four months after the termination of the present war between the United States and the Axis Powers.

Following the presentation and the reading of the proposed amendment to Section 36.1 of the charter, Supervisor Mead announced that he had been asked by representatives of the Fire Department to offer a motion to consolidate the two amendments.

The City Attorney reported that he did not think there was any conflict between the two amendments; they cover separate subjects. The amendments could be consolidated for the physical task necessary. Due to the shortness of time before copy must be presented to the printer he feared it would be physically impossible to get the consolidated amendment properly prepared.

Robert Callaghan, in discussing the proposed amendment to Section 36.1 of the Charter, stated that he could see no incentive for men to work extra time in the Fire Department for \$60 per week when they could receive \$100 per week on the outside. However, the men want the extra \$25 per month proposed in the amendment to Section 36.2.

Supervisor Mead thereupon moved that the proposals to amend the charter, Section 36.1 and Section 36.2, be consolidated for submission to the people. Motion seconded by Supervisor Uhl.

Supervisor MacPhee expressed the thought that if the motion to consolidate should be adopted, things might be left in such a situation that neither amendment could get on the agenda.

Robert Callaghan, in reply to questioning by Supervisor Colman, reported that the Commission had taken no action with respect to the proposed amendment to Section 36.2. In his communications to the David Scannell Club, the Commission has extended

sympathy to the men for the poor salaries they are receiving though. However, the Commission has approved the proposed amendment to Section 36.1.

Mr. John R. McGrath, Clerk of the Judiciary Committee, advised the Board that the City Attorney held that today (April 3, 1944) would be the last day for publication. Publication must start at 4:00 p. m., it would be impossible to get the proposed consolidated amendment prepared for publication.

The City Attorney, however, stated that there could be no further delay, and that publication must be in all editions of the paper.

Thereupon, Supervisor Mead, with the consent of his second, withdrew his amendments so that both amendments be consolidated.

#### Ordered Submitted.

Thereupon, Supervisor Brown, seconded by Supervisor Meyer, moved that the proposed charter amendment, amending Section 36.2 of the charter, and reading as follows be ordered submitted to the electors at the special election to be held May 16, 1944.

### CHARTER AMENDMENT No. . . . .

Describing and setting forth a proposal to the qualified electors of the City and County of San Francisco to amend the Charter of said City and County by adding a new section thereto to be designated Section 36.2 providing for additional compensation for certain members of the Fire Department during the existing war between the United States of America and the Axis Powers and for six months after the termination thereof.

The Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco hereby submits to the qualified electors of said City and County at a special election to be held on the 16th day of May, 1944, a proposal to amend the Charter of said City and County by adding a new section thereto to be designated Section 36.2 providing for additional compensation for certain members of the San Francisco Fire Department during the existing war between the United States of America and the Axis Powers and for six months after the termination of the same.

Section 36.2. For the purpose of properly compensating the members of the uniformed force of the San Francisco Fire Department whose compensation is provided for in Section 36 of this Charter and the members of the San Francisco Salvage Corps, which corps is provided for in Section 38.1 of this Charter during the existing war between the United States of America and the Axis Powers and for six months after the termination of said war, the compensation provided for the several ranks of the uniformed force mentioned in Section 36 of this Charter and the compensation of members of the San Francisco Salvage Corps mentioned in Section 38.1 of this Charter is hereby increased \$2.00 per month for each person serving in said uniformed rank and in said Salvage Corps.

If the amendment containing this section is ratified by the Legislature prior to July 1, 1944, it shall become effective on said last mentioned date.

#### Explanation of Vote.

Supervisor Colman, in explaining his vote just cast, stated that he was not opposed to the submission of the foregoing proposed charter amendment. If a group of employees of the people of San Francisco want to go to their employers and ask for an increase in wages, he would not deny them that right. It was with that thought that he had voted for the amendment submitted to the people. His vote did not necessarily mean that he approved or disapproved the amendment itself.

### AUTHORIZING FIRE COMMISSION TO ALLOW MEMBERS OF THE UNIFORMED FORCES TO WORK ON THEIR DAYS OFF AND DURING VACATION PERIODS AND TO BE COMPENSATED THEREFOR.

Section 36.1. (a) The tours of duty provided for in Section 36 of this Charter and the length thereof, and the platoon system provided for in said section for the officers and members of the uniformed ranks shall continue as set forth in said section.

(b) Each member of the uniformed force shall be entitled to at least one day off in each seven and such additional days or time off as may be approved by the Fire Commission.

(c) When, in the judgment of the Fire Commission, it is in the public interest that any member of the uniformed force of said Fire Department should work on his day off and said member consents to so work, he may at the direction of the Chief Engineer of the department work on said day off,

and in addition to the regular compensation provided for said member forth in Section 36 of this Charter, said member shall be entitled to be compensated at his regular rate of pay as provided for in Section 36 for said time served.

(d) Each member of the uniformed force of the Fire Department be entitled to a vacation period of two weeks as provided for in Section this Charter, provided, however, that if in the judgment of the Fire Commission it is in the public interest that any member of the said department continue his service to the department during his vacation period, and a member consents to continue his said service, the Chief Engineer Department may permit said member to continue such service, and said member shall in addition to his annual vacation pay, be paid additional compensation for said vacation period, which said compensation shall be equal to the vacation pay allowed to said member of the department.

(e) Salary warrants for extra time served by officers and members of the uniformed force of the department shall be payable from the regular appropriation of said uniformed force for the prevailing fiscal year, and time shall extra compensation be authorized or paid in amounts exceeding the available unencumbered balance in said appropriation.

(f) Nothing in this section contained shall in any way interfere with sick or disability leave provided for in Section 301, Part I, of the San Francisco Municipal Code.

(g) This section shall be effective on the first day of July, if the same is ratified prior thereto by the Legislature of the State of California, and if not so ratified shall be effective within fifteen days after the date of its ratification.

(h) The provisions of this section shall continue in force for a period of six months after the termination of the present war between the United States and the Axis Powers.

#### **Stabilizing of Basic Work Week for Members of Police Department.**

The following recommendation of the Judiciary Committee was taken up:

#### **CHARTER AMENDMENT No. . . . .**

Describing and setting forth a proposal to the electors of the City and County of San Francisco to amend the Charter of said City and County by adding Section 35.5½ thereto, providing for the stabilization of the basic work week for members of the Police Department, and providing that the Police Commission shall have power to require additional service from members and to allow additional compensation or time off for said service.

The Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco hereby submits to the qualified electors of said City and County at a special election to be held on the 16th day of May, 1944, a proposal to amend the Charter of said City and County by adding a new section thereto to be designated as Section 35.5½ providing for the stabilization of the basic work week

ers of the Police Department, and providing that the Police Commission have power to require additional service from said members and to allow additional compensation or time off for said service.

**UTILIZATION OF HOURS FOR MEMBERS OF THE POLICE DEPARTMENT AND PROVIDING THAT POLICE COMMISSION SHALL HAVE POWER TO REQUIRE ADDITIONAL SERVICE FROM MEMBERS OF THE DEPARTMENT AND TO ALLOW COMPENSATION OR TIME OFF THEREFOR.**

Section 35.5½. (a) The word "member" or "members" as used in this section shall mean the members of the several ranks in the Police Department mentioned in Section 35.5 of this Charter.

The basic week of service for each member shall be forty-eight (48) hours and the annual compensation set forth in Section 35.5 of this Charter shall be based upon said basic week of service.

Each member shall be entitled to one day off during each week, as hereinafter provided.

Whenever in the judgment of the Police Commission public interest requires the services of any member to serve in excess of the basic week of service during any week, the said Police Commission may authorize the Chief of Police to permit said service, and said member shall be compensated therefor and shall receive equivalent time credited to him in lieu thereof in accordance with this subsection. For service performed in excess of the basic week, members shall be compensated on the basis of straight time in accordance with the ratio, which said excess service bears to the basic week of service and the annual compensation provided therefor in Section 35.5, or in lieu thereof equivalent time off duty with pay.

Nothing contained in this section shall be deemed to interfere with vacation, as provided for in Section 151 of this Charter, or the normal day of service per week; provided, however, that when in the judgment of the Police Commission public necessity requires the services of any member to serve during vacation, or part thereof, or normal day off, the said Commission may authorize the Chief of Police to permit said member to serve during said vacation, or part thereof, or normal day off, and he shall receive additional compensation for the period so served. Said additional compensation shall be based on the basis of straight time in accordance with the ratio which said extra service performed bears to the basic week of service and the annual compensations provided therefor in Section 35.5.

The Police Commission is hereby authorized to require a member or members to work more than forty-eight (48) hours per week in any week when public necessity requires such services, and the member or members so working more than forty-eight (48) hours shall be granted added compensation or time off with pay for said extra service performed.

Nothing in this section shall abridge or limit in any way the provisions of Section 301, Part I, of the San Francisco Municipal Code, approving Article 2 of the Civil Service Commission, insofar as sick leaves and disability for members are concerned.

Whenever in the judgment of the Police Commission the efficient

performance of police duty requires that one or more members of the Department should report for roll call, orders, and assignments, prior to on duty, the said Commission may designate a period not to exceed (15) minutes in any one day for said reporting, and the said periods of (15) minutes need not be compensated for in money or in time off with

(i) Notwithstanding the provisions of any of the foregoing subsections, the Police Commission is empowered to designate certain legal holidays as additional days off with pay for members of the Police Department and members required to perform police service in said department on said days; be compensated on the basis of straight time as herein computed or shall be granted equivalent time off duty with pay in the judgment of said Commission.

(j) This section shall become effective on the 1st day of July, 1944, provided the same is ratified prior to said date by the Legislature of the State of California. If not ratified prior to said date, this section shall become effective on the 1st day of the month immediately following the date of ratification.

Now, therefore, in consideration of the premises and pursuant to Section 92 of the Charter the Director of Property in lieu of sale is hereby authorized and directed to arrange for trading said Parcel "A" to the Company in exchange for said Parcel "B," subject to the provisions of this ordinance.

Section 2. The Director of Property has made an appraisal of said easements and estimates the value of Parcel "A" to be equal to the value of Parcel "B."

Section 3. The Mayor and the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors are hereby authorized and directed to execute the necessary deed on behalf of the City and County of San Francisco, a municipal corporation, relinquishing Parcel "A" to the Company. The Director of Property is hereby authorized and directed to deliver the deed to Parcel "A" to the Company upon receipt of a deed conveying Parcel "B" to the City and to accept and record the latter deed.

Section 4. The deed to Parcel "B" shall be subject to the reservations and conditions set forth in said written offer on file in the office of the Director of Property.

Section 5. Said property is situated in the County of San Mateo, State of California, and is more particularly described as follows:

*PARCEL "A"*

That certain portion of the 40 foot easement referred to as Parcel 2 in the aforesaid deed dated April 9, 1943, being 10 feet measured at right angles southerly and 30 feet measured at right angles northerly from the following described line and the easterly extension thereof:

Commencing at the terminal point of the line described in Parcel 2 in the hereinabove mentioned deed, said point being on the common boundary line between the lands conveyed by the Capuchino Land Company to the Capuchino Golf Corporation by deed dated January 26, 1927 and recorded February 3, 1927 in Book 281, page 121, of Official Records, San Mateo County (Parcel 2, 67.47 acre tract in said deed) and the lands of E. **In Memoriam—James William Stewart.**

Whereas, prematurely, a life of unselfish devotion to and loving concern for his family and his country has terminated, notice thereof having been received March 27, 1944, in a brief communique, reciting: James William Stewart, killed in action in the South Pacific as a result of multiple injuries received in line of duty"; and

Whereas, after having served overseas for sixteen months in World War I, during which time he participated in the Battles of Chateau Thierry and Belleau Woods, James Stewart returned to San Francisco and in 1925 was appointed to the San Francisco Fire Department; and

Whereas, although happily married, and the father of nine children, the eldest of which, Tommy, is now serving in the United States Navy, James Stewart, at the age of 42 years, took leave from his position as driver of Engine 37, enlisted in the Seabees of the United States Navy and soon thereafter was transferred to duty in the Antipodes, where his life was made sacrifice, that other men might live in freedom and security; and

Whereas, the measure of fervent loyalty which was evinced by James Stewart is, in modern times, a rare quality—such an attribute as denotes its possessor "Patriot" in the largest sense of the word, and such as, when publicly divulged, should serve to inspire and arouse those of less fortitude to a realization of the privileges of democracy and of their obligations for its preservation; and

Whereas, San Francisco, which is much poorer for the loss of James Stewart, will find it impossible to replace him or to assuage the feeling of sorrow which pervades us at his passing; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That this Board of Supervisors, noting with sincere regret the passing of James William Stewart takes this opportunity upon behalf of the People of the City and County of San Francisco, officially commend his patriotism and heroism and to convey to his bereaved wife and family its expressions of profound sympathy; and be it

Further Resolved, That the Clerk be and is hereby directed to cause suitably engrossed copies of this resolution to be prepared and delivered to the family of the late James William Stewart and to the David Hannell Club.

Further Resolved, That the said special election hereby called for May 16, 1944, is hereby consolidated with the State special election to be held on the 16th day of May, 1944, and that this resolution is to be deemed a proclamation and notice of said election by the Board of Supervisors calling said special City election; and be it

Further Resolved, That notice of the election herein called be given in accordance with law and that the same precincts, polling places and officers as are used at the State special election be used and employed at the special City election, and the Registrar of Voters is hereby authorized and directed to use said State special election precincts, polling places and officers at the said special City election, and where voting machines are used at the election herein called the charter amendments above described shall be given a separate space on said machines, and where ballots are used, separate ballots shall be provided for the voting for or against said charter amendments and the said special City election shall be conducted in accordance with the Charter and General Laws.

**Request for Information as to Program for Future Improvement of Transportation for San Francisco in the Event That the People Approve Charter Amendment Re Purchase of the Market Street Railway.**

(Series of 1939)

Supervisor Mead presented:

Proposal No. 3952, Resolution No. 3935, as follows:

Whereas, the Charter Amendment to be submitted to the voters on May 16, 1944, and which provides for the purchase of the operating properties of the Market Street Railway Company and the establish



ment of a consolidated transportation system, is proposed as a necessary first step towards permanent transportation improvement; and

Whereas, the riding public will be asked, by the payment of increased fares on the Municipal Railway, to raise millions of dollars annually to provide for future transportation improvements; and

Whereas, at two recent elections, the people of San Francisco by the rejection of similar proposals indicated a lack of confidence in the existence of a satisfactory program for future transportation improvement; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco, on behalf of the general public of the City and County, hereby most respectfully suggests that the City Administration and the Public Utilities Commission submit to this Board and to the public, a general outline of a program for the future improvement of transportation if, as, and when consolidation is effected and purchases of new equipment are possible; and be it

Further Resolved, That, fully realizing the uncertainty in the early securing of new equipment, the Board of Supervisors respectfully, but most earnestly suggests that there be a frank statement of policy as to be following:

1. The extent to which it is proposed that modern motor coaches and trolley buses will be used;
2. Intentions as to the four tracks on Market Street;
3. Whether the Administration and the Commission are committed to the street car as the major vehicle for San Francisco's future transportation;
4. Whether or not the Administration and the Commission plan to propose a subway or elevated railway, before, by the use of modern equipment, the most efficient use is made of street surfaces;
5. Whether it is proposed to abandon the Powell Street Cable Line or retain it as part of the consolidated system;
6. The policy of the Administration for the establishment and maintenance of a permanent low fare, after consolidation is effected and modern economical equipment is available;

and be it

Further Resolved, That in passing this resolution the Board of Supervisors is not outlining a policy, or making a suggestion as to policy to the Administration or the Public Utilities Commission, but is seeking information that will permit of an enthusiastic and confident effort to support the proposed Charter Amendment.

Bill No. 2835 (Series of 1939), entitled "Authorizing compromise of action against Edward Egan and Margaret Egan, his wife, for services rendered at the San Francisco Hospital to Margaret Egan."

Bill No. 2837 (Series of 1939), entitled "Authorizing a supplemental appropriation of \$188,000 from the Unappropriated Balance of Funds—Municipal Railway, to provide for deficiencies in the operation of the Municipal Railway."

Proposal No. 3942 (Series of 1939), entitled "Closing certain streets for the duration of the present war between United States and Germany and Japan to the end that they may be used by Federal Public Housing Authority for a war housing project."

*Referred to Streets Committee.*

Proposal No. 3943 (Series of 1939), entitled "Approving map Toland Street Extension from Oakdale Avenue to Industrial Street and dedicating same as an open public street."

*Referred to Streets Committee.*

**Appointment of Special Committee to Investigate the Effect of Newly Imposed Federal Taxes on Cafes, Night Clubs, Etc., and to Attempt to Find Some Method of Ameliorating the Situation Caused by the Imposition of Such High Taxes.**

Supervisor Brown, under his name on roll called attention to the effect of the high tax imposed by the new Federal Revenue bill on patrons of cafes, night clubs, etc., where music is available for dancing and entertainment. There would be, Supervisor Brown stated, certain restrictions applicable to the tax which would make it impossible for the owners or operators of such places of business to pass the tax on to the customer, which will mean that several of the better known establishments in San Francisco will, to all intents and purposes, be obliged to go out of business; they will have to discontinue their orchestras and floor shows. Many of the patrons of such cafes and night clubs are members of the armed forces, and it would be a shame to curtail the facilities San Francisco now has for clean, wholesome amusement. It is a matter in which, perhaps, the Board of Supervisors should interest itself. A committee should be appointed, Supervisor Brown believed, to hold hearings and see if something might be done to ameliorate the situation if it is actually as bad as it has been described, and he would so move. Motion seconded by Supervisor Mancuso, who suggested that the President of the Board appoint Supervisor Brown as chairman of such committee.

Thereupon, the President appointed Supervisors Brown, Mead and Gartland as members of such committee, Supervisor Brown to act as chairman.

**Notice of Meetings of the Judiciary Committee for Consideration of Proposed Charter Amendments.**

Supervisor Mancuso called attention to a series of meetings to be held, commencing Wednesday, April 5, at 7:30 p. m., to consider proposed charter amendments. He announced, also, that in the future the Committee would not consider any proposed charter amendments unless they were introduced prior to thirty days before the forty-day period required for publication.

**Request for Statement of Financial Condition of Municipal Railway.**

Supervisor Uhl requested that the Public Utilities Commission furnish the members of the Board with a prospectus showing the financial condition of the Municipal Railway, and that the information be made available in time for the next meeting of the Board.

**Consideration of Proposal to Reclaim Tidelands.**

Supervisor Uhl announced that the Joint Committee on Lands and Finance, would meet in the chambers of the Board on April 12, 1944, at 8:00 p. m., to consider the possibility of reclaiming fifty blocks of land east of Third Street and north of Evans Avenue, and requested that the sum of \$20 be appropriated for the purpose of taking photographs of the lands under investigation so that said pictures might

be available to the public attending the meeting of the Joint Committee.

*No objection, and so ordered.*

**ADJOURNMENT.**

There being no further business, the Board, at the hour of 3:25 p. m., adjourned.

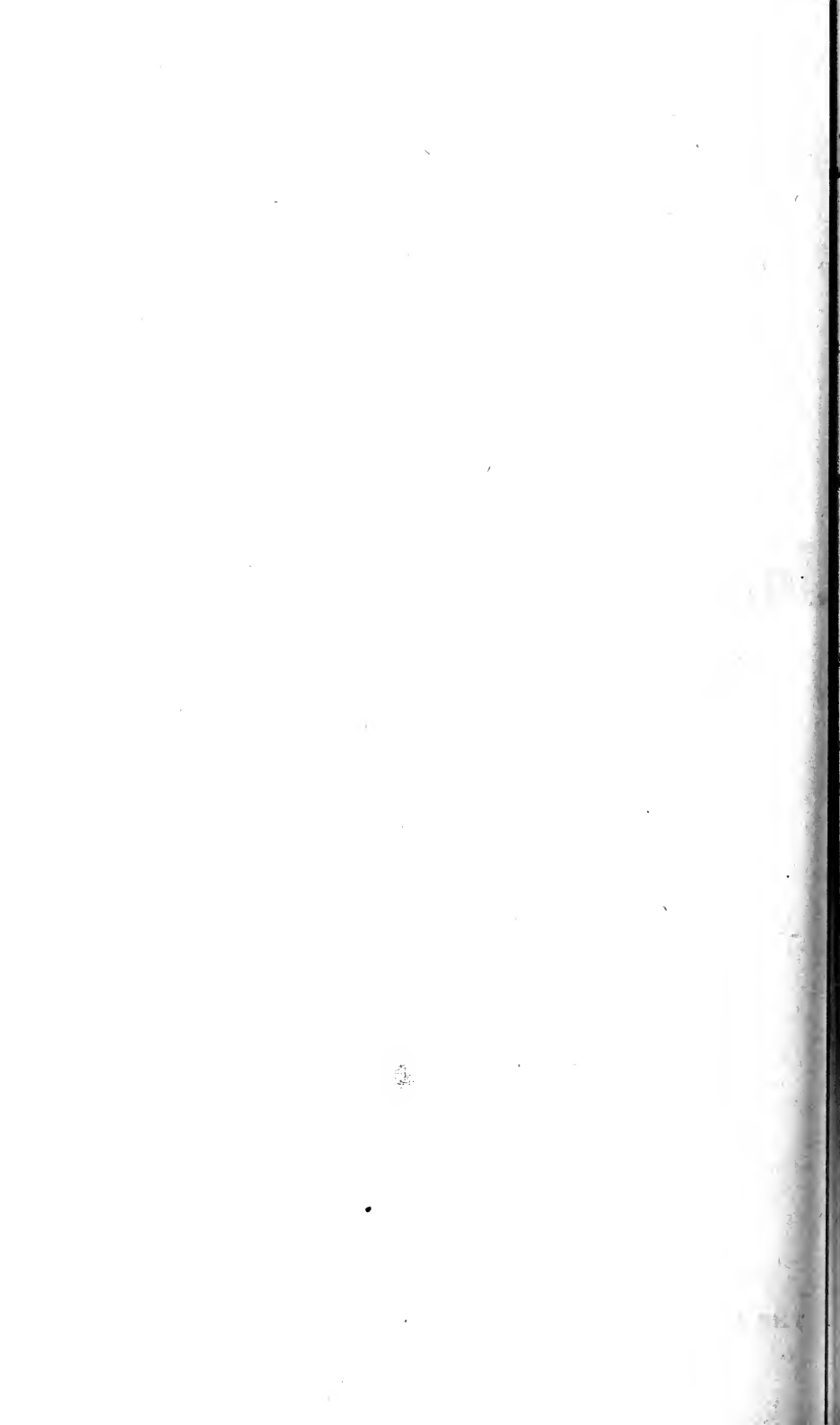

Section 61. The surety of said bond shall be a duly organized surety company authorized to do business in the State of California in the manner provided by law, and the original bond or suretyship shall be filed with the Controller and a duplicate shall be filed with the Purchaser of Supplies. Where the bond or suretyship of any officer or employee is required by Charter or the general laws of the State to be recorded in the office of the Recorder of the City and County of San Francisco, the original of said bond shall be recorded and when the same is recorded in the proper book or record it shall be returned to the Controller and no fee shall be charged by the Recorder for the recording of said bond, as said bonds or suretyship are hereby declared to be public documents.

Section 62. All bonds or suretyship shall be duly conditioned that the officer or employee giving the same shall well, truly, honestly and faithfully perform all of his official duties required of him at the time said bond is given or that may thereafter be imposed or required of him by law, ordinance or Charter and that at the expiration of his term of office or employment he will surrender to his successor all property, books, papers and documents that may come into his possession as such officer or employee.

Section 63. All bonds or suretyship issued by authority of this ordinance shall be approved by the City Attorney as to form and shall thereupon be approved as to sufficiency of surety by the Controller and shall thereupon be filed with the Controller and the Purchaser of Supplies as hereinbefore set forth.

Whenever any officer or employee who is covered by any bond or suretyship written or issued under authority of this ordinance shall cease to hold the office or position for which said bond or suretyship was issued, the head of the department in which said officer or employee was serving shall notify the Purchaser of Supplies and the controller of said fact, and shall also notify said Purchaser of Supplies and Controller of the name of the officer or employee who has been appointed to succeed said officer or employee. Thereupon the Purchaser of Supplies shall forthwith notify the company carrying the said bond or suretyship for said office position of said change in the occupancy thereof and arrange with said company that the new appointee shall be covered by said bond or suretyship.

Whenever any officer or employee shall cease to hold any office or employment covered by any bond or suretyship written pursuant to this ordinance and the head of the department concerned notifies the Purchaser of Supplies and Controller of said fact, he shall advise said Controller if any liability has accrued in favor of the City or in favor of any officer thereof on said bond or suretyship, and if no such liability has accrued, the Controller shall recommend to the Board of Supervisors that said bond or suretyship covering said officer or employee be exonerated so far as such officer or employee is concerned, and the Board may by resolution exonerate said bond or suretyship, provided that such exoneration shall not in any way release said bond or suretyship for any liability which may have accrued while said officer or employee was covered by said bond or suretyship.

Section 64. All bonds heretofore given by any officer or employee, and which are required to be given pursuant to the provisions of this ordinance, are hereby declared to be bonds given in conformity with the provisions of this ordinance, provided the conditions in said bonds comply with the conditions herein contained.

Section 65. The bonds or suretyship herein provided for shall be obtained by the Purchaser of Supplies and the premiums thereon shall be paid by the City and County of San Francisco and where any officer or employee is an officer or employee of any department that is allowed by law a specific fund, then the cost of said bond shall be charged against said fund and the premium on all bonds covering any officer or employee of any utility or utilities shall be a charge against the fund of said utility or utilities and where said officer or employee serves more than one utility the premium on said bond shall be equitably prorated among the various utilities which said officer or employee may serve, and where any officer or employee is being paid from the proceeds of any bond issue the premium on any bond or suretyship written for said officer or employee shall be paid from said bond fund.

Section 66. Any bond or suretyship given for any employee or officer pursuant to this ordinance shall inure to the benefit of his superior, whenever said superior is liable for the acts or omissions of said employee or officer.

Section 67. The bonds or suretyship given for any department may be grouped so that all employees and officers of said department will be covered by one bond, when such procedure shall be deemed to be for the best interests of the department and the bonds given for all departments may be grouped so that all employees and officers of all departments will be covered by one bond.

All positions not heretofore bonded and for which bond is required under the provisions of this ordinance may be grouped under one schedule. In such event all other positions now bonded shall be added

to the schedule as the respective anniversary dates of the existing bonds covering such positions shall be reached.

Section 68. Nothing herein contained shall in any way change or modify any Charter provision requiring a bond from any officer or employee, but the bonds herein required shall be supplemental to said bonds required by Charter.

Section 69. The respective sections of this ordinance covering the suretyship to be given by the officers or employees of any particular department may be covered by amendment of the appropriate section of this ordinance without the necessity of republishing said ordinance in its entirety and the consent of the surety shall be evidenced by a proper rider or endorsement to said bonds or suretyship.

Section 70. The surety of any said bond or suretyship may at any time terminate its liability on behalf of any officer and employee or other incumbent under said suretyship by giving thirty (30) days' notice in writing to the Purchaser of Supplies and the Controller of the City and County of San Francisco and likewise the Purchaser of Supplies and Controller of the City and County of San Francisco may cause the termination of the surety's liability on behalf of any and every officer, employee or other incumbent by notice in writing to the surety, specifying the date of cancellation. Upon the determination of the notice of cancellation and provided no loss has been reported, the pro rata unearned portion of premium shall be returned to the City and County of San Francisco.

Section 71. The several bonds herein provided, for the several officers and employees mentioned in this ordinance, shall be accepted in the place and stead of any bond heretofore given by any of said officers or employees for the faithful performance of the duties of their respective offices or employments.

Section 72. Bill No. 1092, Ordinance No. 1058, and Bill No. 1923, Ordinance No. 1837, are hereby repealed.

Whereas, the City Attorney of the City and County of San Francisco has given his written consent to the cancellation of such taxes and special assessments as provided in Section 3804a of the Political Code of the State of California;

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco, as follows:

That all liens for taxes and assessments on any property acquired

Section 2. All money so received shall be deposited in the Treasury

of the City and County in a special fund to be known as the "Victory Garden Trust Fund."

Section 3. All expenditures from said fund shall be made for the purposes for which such funds have been received and in accordance with the fiscal provisions of the Charter.

Section 4. All merchandise or orders for merchandise received shall be held in trust by the Commander of the Citizens' Service Corps and used for the purpose for which given.

Section 5. Receipts, pre-numbered and in triplicate, shall be prepared by the person, or persons, authorized to accept donations hereunder. Receipts so issued shall show thereon the date, name and address of the donor, the amount of money or description of the merchandise, and the purpose for which the donation was made. The original receipt shall be filed currently with the Controller, the duplicate given to the donor, the triplicate to be retained for use by the Citizens' Service Corps.

Section 6. All awards shall be made by, and under rules and regulations prescribed by the Commander of the Citizens' Service Corps. Upon making the awards, each donor thereof shall be notified as to the date of the award, name and address of the recipient and the purpose for which the award was made.

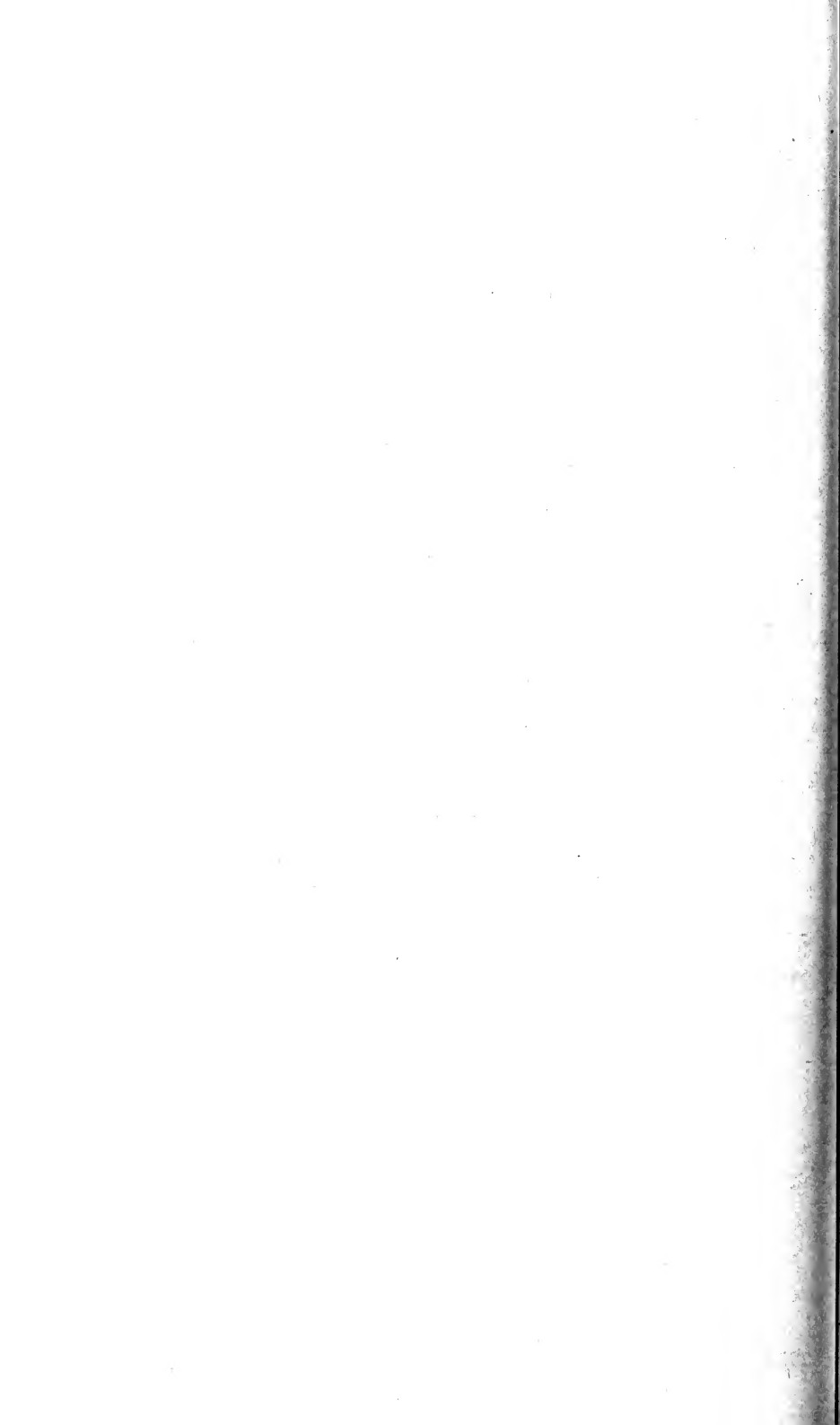

**Endorsing Request of Central Council of Civic Clubs That Presiding Judge of Federal District Court Adopt Rules to Provide for a Fair Cross-Section Representation of the Community as Jurors.**

(Series of 1939)

Proposal No. 3929, Resolution No. ...., as follows:

Whereas, it has been represented to the Board of Supervisors by the Central Council of Civic Clubs that after investigation and examination of the present methods used to select trial jurors in the local Federal District Court that no rules are prescribed by the judges to guide the clerk and jury commissioner in making their selections of jurors as is done in our local State Superior Court; that one woman is purposely selected for every four men on the panel instead of an equal proportion and that jurors are selected almost entirely from one class of our citizens so that little or no representation is given to working men or their wives who constitute the greater part of our citizens; and

Whereas, the Central Council of Civic Clubs by motion respectfully requested the Presiding Judge of the local Federal District Court to call a meeting of the Judges to adopt rules to govern the selection of trial jurors for that Court so as to bring about a fair cross-section of all classes of our citizens as jurors; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Board of Supervisors, if the condition complained of is as stated, endorse the request of the Central Council of Civic Clubs requesting said Presiding Judge to give consideration to the adoption of such rules as will provide for a fair cross-section representation of the community as jurors without favoring or excluding any one group because of sex, race, occupation, wealth or social position and to be fairly distributed among different geographic sections.

April 10, 1944—Consideration postponed until Monday, April 17, 1944.

### Privilege of the Floor.

Mr. Allen Spivock, on being granted the privilege of the floor, urged that inasmuch as the Presiding Judge of the Federal Courts had been invited to appear and express his views on the foregoing proposal, but had signified that he did not care to be present and had stated that the Board of Supervisors could proceed in the matter as it desired, the Board could with propriety, and should, as representatives of the people, approve the proposal.

Supervisor Green announced that proper notice to the Presiding Judge had been given, and that as he had not cared to attend, there was no reason why the Board could not proceed. He was satisfied to vote for approval.

The Clerk of the Board announced that the Clerk of the Federal Courts had stated that there were pending in Congress two bills pertaining to the matter, and any resolution should properly be addressed to Congress.

Mr. Spivock declared that the bills pending in Congress did not hit what the Central Council was striving for.

Mrs. Gould, representing Women's Clubs, urged, on behalf of the State and County Federation of Women's Clubs, that the Board adopt the proposal.

### In Hands of the Board.

On motion by Supervisor Brown, there being no objection, the proposal was taken into the hands of the Board.

Thereupon, Supervisor Brown, in discussing the proposal, stated that it was no doubt a well intentioned and well conceived proposal, but it was another example of interference. The Board of Supervisors had no right to tell the judges how to conduct their business. If any citizens desire to go before the judges directly, that would be their right. He would vote "No."

Supervisor Mead pointed out that by adoption of the proposal, the Board would merely be endorsing request submitted by the Central Council of Civic Clubs. The Board of Supervisors has the right to adopt anything it desires, so long as it does not legally affect anybody.

Supervisor Mancuso expressed agreement with the views just offered. All the Board would be doing, by approval of the proposal, would be to ask the Federal Judges to consider the proposal set forth.

Thereupon, the roll was called and the foregoing proposal was *Adopted* by the following vote:

### Requesting General Outline of a Program for Future Transportation.

(Series of 1939)

Proposal No. 3952, Resolution No. 3935, as follows:

Whereas, the Charter Amendment to be submitted to the voters on May 16, 1944, and which provides for the purchase of the operating

properties of the Market Street Railway Company and the establishment of a consolidated transportation system, is proposed as a necessary first step towards permanent transportation improvement; and

Whereas, the riding public will be asked, by the payment of increased fares on the Municipal Railway, to raise millions of dollars annually to provide for future transportation improvements; and

Whereas, at two recent elections, the people of San Francisco by the rejection of similar proposals indicated a lack of confidence in the existence of a satisfactory program for future transportation improvement; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco, on behalf of the general public of the City and County, hereby most respectfully suggests that the City Administration and the Public Utilities Commission submit to this Board and to the public, a general outline of a program for the future improvement of transportation if, as, and when consolidation is effected and purchases of new equipment are possible; and be it

Further Resolved, That, fully realizing the uncertainty in the early securing of new equipment, the Board of Supervisors respectfully, but most earnestly suggests that there be a frank statement of policy as to the following:

1. The extent to which it is proposed that modern motor coaches and trolley buses will be used;
2. Intentions as to the four tracks on Market Street;
3. Whether the Administration and the Commission are committed to the street car as the major vehicle for San Francisco's future transportation;
4. Whether or not the Administration and the Commission plan to propose a subway or elevated railway, before, by the use of modern equipment, the most efficient use is made of street surfaces;
5. Whether it is proposed to abandon the Powell Street Cable Line or retain it as part of the consolidated system;
6. The policy of the Administration for the establishment and maintenance of a permanent low fare, after consolidation is effected and modern economical equipment is available;

and be it

Further Resolved, That in passing this resolution the Board of Supervisors is not outlining a policy, or making a suggestion as to policy to the Administration or the Public Utilities Commission, but is seeking information that will permit of an enthusiastic and confident effort to support the proposed Charter Amendment.

#### Discussion.

Supervisor Mead, after explaining the purport of the foregoing proposal, urged approval thereof.

Supervisor Uhl, in explanation of his vote, announced that he could not vote in favor of the proposal, inasmuch as such vote might be interpreted as a vote in favor of the purchase of the Market Street Railway, to which he was opposed. He would vote "No."

Section 1. Ordinance Number 1623, Bill Number 1698 (Series of 1939), providing for the identification and care of children between the ages of six months and eighteen years, during the now existing war emergency, by the furnishing, distribution and compulsory wearing of identification tags, and the duties of parents, guardians and custodians; and the amendments thereto, are hereby repealed.

**Amending San Francisco Municipal Code, Relating to Auctioneers.**

(Series of 1939)

Bill No. 2848, Ordinance No. . . . ., as follows:

Amending Article 17, Chapter VIII, Part II of the San Francisco Municipal Code, relating to auctioneers, by amending the following Sections thereof: Section 1245, Exceptions; Section 1246, Bona Fide Closing-Out Sales—Permits for Auction Sales; Section 1247, Verified Inventory—Filing With Application; Section 1256, Time of Holding Sale—Exceptions, and by adding a new section to be known as Section 1250(a) Relating to Residential Requirements.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco, as follows:

**NOTE:** Amendments are indicated by *light face italics*. Cancellations are set out in **bold face** and bracketed [ ] .

Section 1. Article 17, Chapter VIII, Part II of the San Francisco Municipal Code is hereby amended by amending Sections 1245, 1246, 1247 and 1256, thereof, and by adding a new section to be known as Section 1250(a), to read as follows:

**SEC. 1245. Exceptions.** The provisions of Section 1244 shall not apply to household furniture, vehicles, automobiles, machinery, *fixtures and store equipment*, livestock and such bulky articles as have

been usually sold in warehouses, or in the public streets or on the wharves, or to goods placed in a warehouse or storeroom by a duly licensed auctioneer for convenience or necessity of the sale of such goods by auction.

**SEC. 1246. Bona Fide Closing-Out Sales—Permits for Auction Sales.** The provisions of Section 1244 shall not apply to any bona fide sale of a stock of merchandise by public auction where the owner thereof or the creditors of the owner are engaged in the legitimate closing out of the business [of such owner] and such sale is held upon the premises where the business [of the owner] has been carried on for not less than one (1) year immediately preceding such sale; provided, however, that no public auction shall be conducted under the provisions of this section unless [the owners or the creditors of the owners shall first obtain] a permit is first obtained from the Police Commission, which Commission may grant the permit applied for or in its discretion and in the event in its judgment the public interest so requires, they may deny the same. The Commission may designate the number of days that the said auction sale may be conducted and in no case shall the sale continue for a period longer than thirty (30) calendar days at any one time; provided, that in no event shall any stock of merchandise or other personal property be offered for sale or sold at said auction unless the same has been upon the said premises [and owned by said applicant] for a period of not less than ninety (90) days prior to the filing of said application.

**SEC. 1247. Verified Inventory—Filing With Application.** In all cases where a public auction sale is held under provisions of Section 1246 of this Article, [the owner or creditor of the owner must make] an inventory of the stock of merchandise on the premises which is to be sold at public auction [and must submit said inventory] must be made and submitted to the Police Commission at the time of the filing of the application as provided for in Section 1246 of this Article.

The inventory required by this section must show the items of merchandise contained in the stock to be offered for sale on the premises by public auction and the said [owner or creditors of the owner] applicant must make and subscribe an oath to be attached to the inventory that said inventory contains a true and itemized account of all property to be sold at said auction, that all of said merchandise so inventoried has been [owned by said applicant] located on the premises for not less than ninety (90) days next immediately preceding the filing of said application, and that the same is a bona fide closing out of the business [of the said owner and the owner intends to retire from said business.] No property or merchandise shall be sold under the provisions of Section 1246 of this Article except those items shown in the inventory provided for herein.

**SEC. 1256. Time of Holding Sale—Exceptions.** All sales of goods, wares or merchandise by public auction must be made between the hours of 7 o'clock AM and 7 o'clock PM, and no such sales can be made on Sundays or [legal holidays] the following holidays: *New Year's Day, Washington's Birthday, Decoration Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Admission Day, (when the celebration is in San Francisco), Thanksgiving and Christmas;* provided, however, that the Police Commission may grant a special permit for such a limited period of time as the Commission shall fix for the sale by public auction of books, prints or paintings, or goods sold in the original packages as imported, according to a printed catalogue, of which samples must have been opened and exposed to public inspection at least one (1) day previous to the sale, at an hour or hours later than 7 o'clock PM to be specified in said permit, and provided that any such permit may be revoked by the Police Commission for the reasons and in the manner provided in Section 1254 of this Article for the revocation of a permit.

*SEC. 1250 (a). Residential Requirements. No person shall be granted an auctioneer's license who has not been a bona fide resident of the City and County of San Francisco for a period of one year prior to making application with the exception of any person who did hold a license on January 2, 1944.*

**Requesting the Mayor to Accept Temporary Transfer of Fourteen Heavy Rescue Trucks, With Equipment, and to Provide Funds for Maintenance Thereof for Period Not to Exceed Ninety Days.**

(Series of 1939)

Supervisor MacPhee presented:

Proposal No. 3968, Resolution No. 3945, as follows:

Whereas, the San Francisco Chapter of the American National Red Cross desires to be relieved of their present responsibility for the organization, equipment and maintenance of a Rescue Service in the City and County of San Francisco; and

Whereas, the continued operation of a Rescue Service as an integral part of the Defense Corps is essential to the protection of the citizenry of San Francisco; and

Whereas, the Chairman of the Disaster Relief Commission of the local chapter of the Red Cross in a letter dated April 4, 1944, to the Director of Civilian Defense, said:

"In answer to your letter requesting the use of fourteen Heavy Rescue trucks owned by the San Francisco Chapter of the Red Cross, we shall be glad to temporarily transfer this equipment to you under the following conditions:

- "1. Since the Chapter will continue to maintain a Headquarters Rescue Company, the truck used by this unit will not be available for transfer. In its place we would turn over to you the truck used by our District No. 18, making a total of fourteen Rescue trucks.
- "2. Full responsibility for rescue operations for the City and County of San Francisco must be assumed by you in writing for the term that these trucks are controlled and operated by the San Francisco Civilian Defense. You are also to indicate in writing that your Office of Civilian Defense will assume full responsibility and legal liability for the safety and proper maintenance of this equipment.
- "3. We also ask that you advise us in writing of your agreement to a 90-day transfer period, during which time all arrangements shall have been completed for the permanent transfer of equipment and all Rescue operations for the City and County of San Francisco."

and

Whereas, the Mayor as Commander of the Defense Corps is now endeavoring to consummate an agreement with the San Francisco Chapter of the Red Cross to the end that equipment required by the Rescue Service to be transferred by the Red Cross to the City and County; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Mayor as Commander of the Defense Corps is hereby authorized to accept from the San Francisco Chapter of the American Red Cross the temporary transfer of fourteen heavy rescue trucks with full equipment, said temporary transfer to be for a period of not more than ninety days in accordance with the request of the Red Cross; and be it

Further Resolved, That the Mayor as Commander of the Defense Corps be and is hereby authorized to assume full responsibility for the maintenance of an adequate rescue service; and be it



Further Resolved, That an ordinance appropriating funds for the maintenance and operation of this equipment as required by the Red Cross in the above quoted letter, be prepared.

### Amending Ordinance Creating Coordinating Council.

(Series of 1939)

Supervisor MacPhee presented:

Bill No. 2859, Ordinance No. . . . . , as follows:

Amending Bill No. 1792, Ordinance No. 19.101, entitled "Creating commission to be known as the Coordinating Council for the purpose of furthering the cooperation and coordination among the public departments and between the public departments and social agencies in a more effective program for the youth of San Francisco," by amending Section 1 thereof designating

The members of said Council; by amending Section 2 thereof, relating to qualifications of the administrative head of said Council and his assistants; by amending Section 3, to provide for inclusion in the Annual Appropriation Ordinance of an amount not in excess of \$5,400 for such additional employments as in the discretion of the Council are necessary to develop and expand the work of District Councils, and amending Section 9 relating to appointments of members to conform to Section 1 as amended.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco, as follows:

Section 1. Sections 1, 2, 3 and 9 of Bill No. 1792, Ordinance No. 19.101, the title of which is recited above, are hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 1. There is hereby created a Coordinating Council to be appointed by the Mayor. The Coordinating Council shall consist of the Chief of Police, *the District Attorney*, the Chief Probation Officer of the Juvenile Court, the Superintendent of Public Schools, the Superintendent of the Recreation Department, the Director of Public Welfare, the Director of the Bureau of Child Hygiene of the Department of Public Health, and seven additional members *who are not at the time of their appointment, by the Mayor, officials or employees of the City and County of San Francisco, and who shall be qualified to serve by reason of their knowledge and experience in the coordinating of youth activities.*

Section 2. All members of the Coordinating Council shall serve without compensation except in so far as compensation is provided for other official positions which said persons may hold.

Said Coordinating Council shall, pursuant to the provisions of Subdivision (h) of Section 19 of the Charter, appoint a Secretary who shall not be subject to the civil service provisions of the Charter and who shall hold office at the pleasure of said Coordinating Council. Said Secretary shall be the administrative head of said Council and shall have all the powers

and duties of a department head as provided for in Section 20 of the Charter. Said administrative head shall, with the approval of said Coordinating Council, pursuant to the civil service and budgetary provisions of the Charter, appoint such additional employees as may be necessary to conduct the affairs of said Coordinating Council.

The salary of the said Secretary shall be fixed by the Coordinating Council in accordance with the budgetary provisions of the Charter, but in no event shall said salary exceed the sum of four thousand dollars (\$4,000) per year.

*The administrative head and his assistants shall be selected from among persons whose training and experience qualify them for organization and leadership in community service activities.*

Section 3. Upon the recommendation of the Mayor and the approval of the Board of Supervisors, an amount not to exceed seven thousand five hundred dollars (\$7,500) shall be appropriated each year to said Coordinating Council for the purpose of defraying cost of carrying on its work, which said cost shall include salaries and all other expenses incidental to the work; *provided, however, that there shall be included in the Annual Appropriation Ordinance such amount, not in excess of \$5,400 as will provide such full time or part time workers, not in excess of three, as are deemed necessary by the Council to assist the Secretary in developing and expanding the work of the district councils.*

Section 9. Whenever any of the officials of the City and County of San Francisco who are made ex-officio members of the Coordinating Council shall cease to hold their official positions as such officers then, in that event, their membership in said Coordinating Council shall cease and determine and their respective successors shall be appointed to succeed them as members of said Council.

*The seven undesignated members of the Council which, pursuant to Section 1 hereof the Mayor is authorized to appoint, shall be appointed to serve for a period of four years, under such plan as to staggering of appointments as shall be prescribed by the Mayor.*

**Recommending That Provision Be Made in New State Sales Tax Bill That Provision Be Made for Allocation From Sales Tax Funds to Political Subdivisions of Percentage of Moneys for Reduction of Taxation on Real Property.**

(Series of 1939)

Supervisor Mancuso presented:

Proposal No. 3969, Resolution No. 3946, as follows:

Whereas, the legislation effecting a reduction from three cents to two and one-half cents in the State Sales Tax, by its own terms limits such reduction to the period of the 1943-45 biennium; and

Whereas, an Interim Committee composed of members of the State Legislature is now considering proposals for inclusion in a new sales tax bill to be enacted either at a special session of the Legislature or at the regular session in 1945 and to that end is inviting suggestions and recommendations of counties and other political subdivisions as to the provisions to be contained in the new sales tax act particularly with reference to subventions to political subdivisions for post-war construction or for other purposes; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That this Board of Supervisors in response to the invitation of the Interim Committee for recommendations in connection with this matter does hereby declare it to be its position, without any present commitment as to the amount of sales tax to be levied, that aside from whatever subvention it may be found possible to make for post-war construction purposes the sales tax act should henceforth contain a permanent provision for the allocation from sales tax funds to political subdivisions of the State of a substantial percentage of such moneys to be used exclusively for a reduction of the taxes on real property; and be it

Further Resolved, That copies of this resolution be sent to the Interim Committee headed by Senator Jesse M. Mayo of Angels Camp and to the members of the San Francisco delegation to the State Legislature with the request to the latter that when sales tax legislation be presented for their consideration they provide for the inclusion of the recommendation contained in this resolution and endeavor in every manner possible to procure the enactment of the legislation with such provision contained therein.

**Requesting General Program for Future Improvement of Transportation Upon Consolidation of Street Railway Systems in San Francisco.**

(Series of 1939)

Supervisor Uhl presented:

Proposal No. 3970, Resolution No. 3947, as follows:

Whereas, the Charter Amendment to be submitted to the voters on May 16, 1944, and which provides for the purchase of the operating properties of the Market Street Railway Company and the establishment of a consolidated transportation system, is proposed as a necessary first step towards permanent transportation improvement; and

Whereas, the riding public will be asked, by the payment of increased fares on the Municipal Railway, to raise millions of dollars annually to provide for future transportation improvements; and

Whereas, at two recent elections, the people of San Francisco by the rejection of similar proposals indicated a lack of confidence in the existence of a satisfactory program for future transportation improvement; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco, on behalf of the general public of the City and County hereby most respectfully suggests that the City Administration and the Public Utilities Commission submit to this Board and to the public a general outline of a program for the future improvement of transportation if, as, and when consolidation is effected and purchases of new equipment are possible; and be it

Further Resolved, That, fully realizing the uncertainty in the early securing of new equipment, the Board of Supervisors respectfully, but most earnestly suggests that there be a frank statement of policy as to the following:

1. How much additional equipment will be available to the car riders if we buy the Market Street Railway?

2. What additional service will the car rider who now pays five cents receive if the rate is increased to seven cents?

3. If the Bondholders of the Market Street Railway take over the system in April, 1944, is there not a reasonable likelihood that the Market Street Railway system will be available for purchase at about \$3,000,000?

4. Will the delinquent street repairs of the Market Street Railway, said to total approximately \$2,000,000, be discussed before the public during the campaign so the public will be informed that this is not being deducted from the purchase price?

5. Exactly what additional services will be available to the public by buying the Market Street Railway that cannot be accomplished through full utilization of equipment under joint management?

6. Can the people of San Francisco be assured that the money to be used for down payment of Market Street Railway system will be returned to the Public Utilities Commission for payment for new buses when buses are available?

Further Resolved, That in passing this resolution the Board of Supervisors is not outlining a policy, or making a suggestion as to policy to the Administration or the Public Utilities Commission, but is seeking information that will permit intelligent consideration of the Charter Amendment.

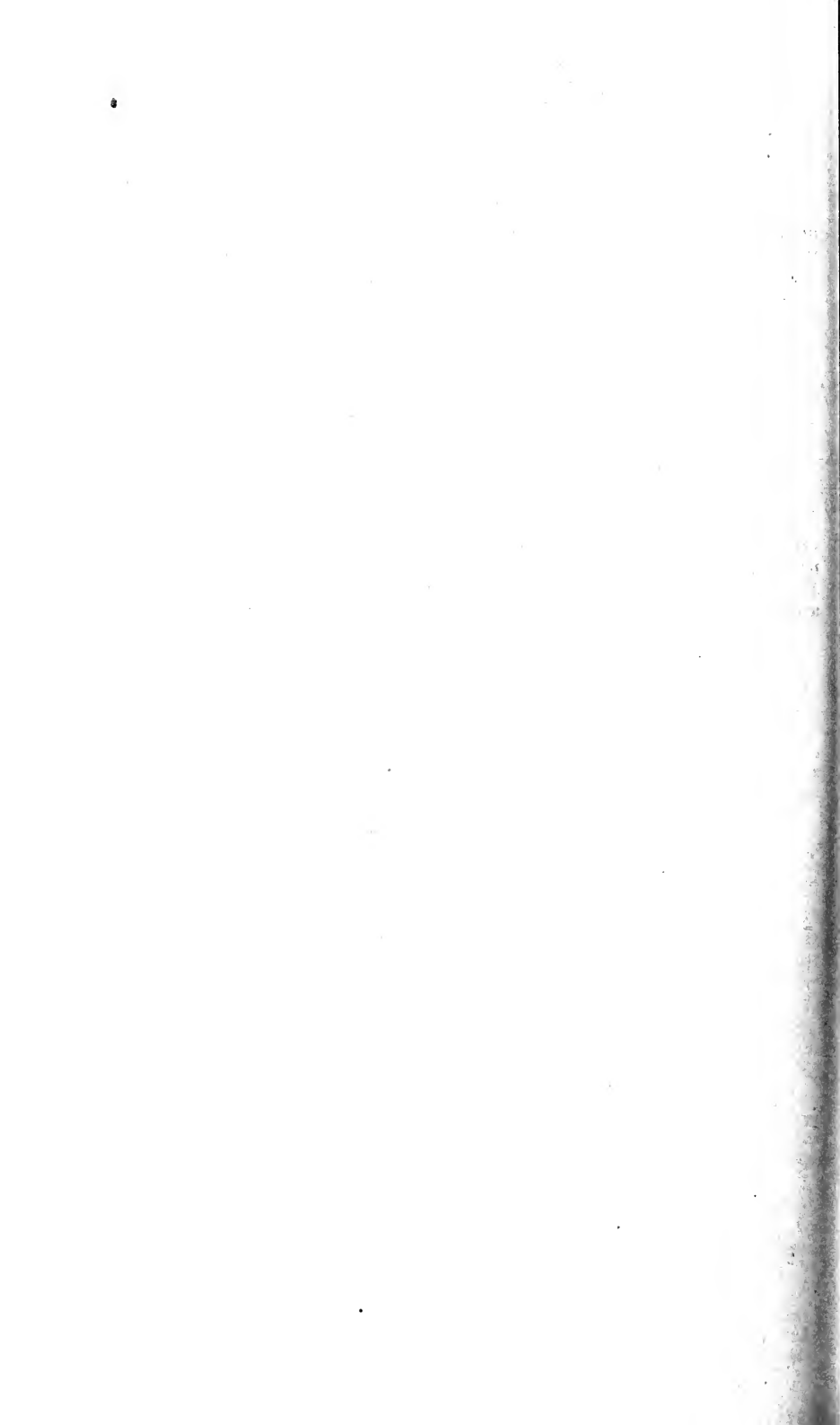

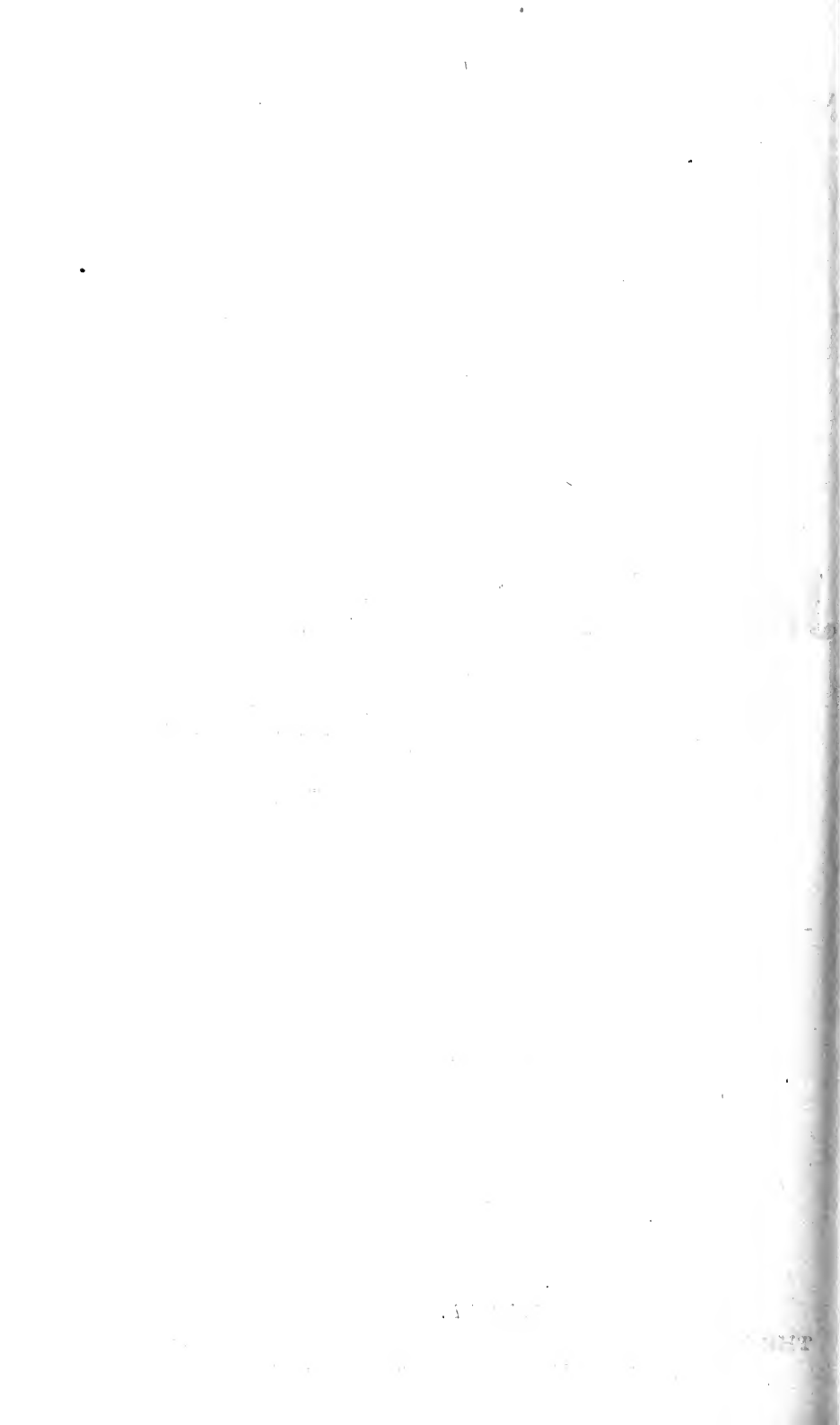

Appropriating the sum of \$250,000 from the surplus existing in Appropriation No. 366.800.01—Bond Interest and Redemption, 1942 Water Works System, to the credit of the 1942 Water Works System Bond Fund and authorizing and directing the cancellation of \$250,000 of said bonds falling due on June 10, 1944.

Whereas, it is not now economical to sell the lot of bonds in the amount of \$250,000 falling due on June 10, 1944, and in such circumstance there exists a surplus in Appropriation 366.800.01 Bond Interest and Redemption, 1942 Water Works System Bonds, by virtue of such nonsale; now, therefore,

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco, as follows:

Section 1. The sum of \$250,000 is hereby appropriated from the surplus existing in Appropriation No. 366.800.01 Bond Interest and Redemption, 1942 Water Works System, to the credit of the 1942 Water Works System Bond Fund in order to provide that sufficient funds shall be available, either through cash on hand or bonds still remaining to be sold, to enable the Public Utilities Commission to complete the project for which the 1942 Water Works System Bonds were voted.

Authorizing the Chief Engineer of the San Francisco Fire Department to Permit the Use of Salvage Covers by Individuals, Firms and Corporations When, in His Opinion, the Same Are Necessary for the Preservation of Property After Fires, Conflagration or Other Calamities, and Fixing the Amount to Be Charged for the Use of Said Salvage Covers; Providing for the Method of Accounting for Amounts Received by the Fire Department for the Use of Said Covers; Providing a Penalty for the Violation of This Ordinance.

(Series of 1939)

Bill No. 2860, Ordinance No. . . . ., as follows:

Authorizing the Chief Engineer of the San Francisco Fire Department to permit the use of salvage covers by individuals, firms and

corporations when, in his opinion, the same are necessary for the preservation of property after fires, conflagration or other calamities, and fixing the amount to be charged for the use of said salvage covers; providing for the method of accounting for amounts received by the fire department for the use of said covers; providing a penalty for the violation of this ordinance.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco, as follows:

Section 1. Whenever in the opinion of the Chief Engineer of the San Francisco Fire Department the covers which are used by the Salvage Corps, which said corps is provided for in Section 38.1 of the Charter, are not necessary for the immediate protection of property by said Salvage Corps, the same may be used by any private individual, firm or corporation for the purpose of protecting his or its property from further damage by smoke, fire, water or weather conditions upon the following conditions herein set forth:

(a) That application shall be made to the Chief Engineer of the Fire Department for the use of said covers and the same shall be used only when said permission is granted by said Chief Engineer or by some person or persons directly authorized by him to grant said permission.

(b) Said covers shall not be used for any greater period of time than is absolutely necessary for the purpose of protecting the property of said individual, firm or corporation from damage by smoke, water, fire or weather conditions.

(c) The following charges shall be made for the use of said covers:

For covers spread at fires by the Salvage Corps for the protection of personal property, for the first five days during which the same are in use no charge shall be made and thereafter a charge of \$1.00 per day per cover shall be made for each day during which said covers are used or are in possession of said individual, firm or corporation.

For roof covers spread at fires or other calamities by the Salvage Corps, for the first ten days in which the same are used no charge shall be made and thereafter a charge of \$1.00 per day per cover shall be made for each day during which said covers are used or are in the possession of said individual, firm or corporation.

(d) When said covers are spread by the Salvage Corps no charge shall be made for the transportation of the same from the headquarters of the Salvage Corps to the place where the same are used, but in cases where the same are used for the protection of personal property and are kept for more than five days, or are kept for more than ten days when used for roof covers, in addition to the amounts to be paid for the use of said covers as provided for in subdivisions (b) and (c) of this section, the individual, firm or corporation using said covers shall pay the cost of transporting same from the place where they are used to the headquarters of the Salvage Corps.

In cases where said covers are not spread by said Salvage Corps, in addition to the amounts to be paid for their use, the individual, firm or corporation using the same shall pay the cost of transportation of said covers from and to the headquarters of the Salvage Corps from which they were received.

The individual, firm or corporation using said covers shall pay all damage occurring to the same while said covers are in his or its possession.

(e) At any time when in the opinion of the Chief Engineer of the Fire Department said covers are needed for actual service, he shall have the power to order them returned to the Salvage Corps from

which they were taken and it shall be the duty of the individual, firm or corporation to forthwith return said covers.

Section 2. The Controller shall provide the manner in which the Fire Department shall account for all moneys received for the use of said covers.

Section 3. Any individual, firm or corporation using any of said covers of said Salvage Corps contrary to the provisions of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.

**Prohibiting Smoking on Docks, Piers, Etc., Along San Francisco Waterfront Except at Certain Designated Places; an Emergency Ordinance.**

(Series of 1939)

Bill No. 2865, Ordinance No. 2692, as follows:

Amending Chapter VIII, Part II of the San Francisco Municipal Code by amending Section 55 dealing with smoking on wharves, docks and piers of the San Francisco Waterfront and on ships, boats and watercraft adjacent to said waterfront, and by adding to said Chapter and said Part a new section to be known as Section 55.1 thereof dealing with the use of open flames and/or electric arcs on said wharves, docks and piers and on ships, boats and watercraft adjacent to said waterfront, and by amending Section 56 of said Chapter and Part dealing with the authority of the Chief Engineer of the Fire Department and the Chief of the Division of Fire Prevention and Investigation to make rules on the matters referred to in Sections 55 and 55.1 above mentioned, and by amending Section 57 of said Chapter and Part dealing with the penalties for the violation of the provisions of Sections 55, 55.1 and 56 above mentioned; an emergency ordinance.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco, as follows:

Section 1. Section 55 of Chapter VIII, Part II of the San Francisco Municipal Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 55. (a) It shall be unlawful for any person to smoke, carry or possess a lighted cigar, cigarette, or pipe, or to smoke tobacco or any other similar substance in any form, or to ignite any match or mechanical lighter on or in any wharf, pier, dock, bulkhead, or marine facility; provided, however, that tobacco may be smoked in any area or space on or in any such place or structure, that may be set apart for such purpose by the joint action of the Chief of the Fire Department and the Board of State Harbor Commissioners, and clearly so designated by duly posted signs; but, any such permission to smoke in a designated area or space may be withdrawn at any time by like joint action. Provided, however, that in every area or space set apart as a space or area within which smoking is permitted, in accordance with the provisions of this section, there shall be provided at least one approved fireproof container filled with sand for every three hundred square feet or fraction thereof of floor area for the purpose of depositing cigarettes or cigar butts, tobacco, matches and other material which may be productive of starting fires and at least one approved portable fire extinguisher for every five hundred square feet or fraction thereof of said floor area, which fire extinguisher shall be at least two and

one-half gallon capacity or at least one quart capacity if said fire extinguisher is of the carbon tetra chloride type.

(b) It shall be unlawful for any person to smoke, carry or possess a lighted cigar, cigarette, or pipe, or to smoke tobacco or any other similar substance in any form, or to ignite any match or mechanical lighter on any vessel moored at any wharf, pier, dock, bulkhead, or marine facility; provided, however, that tobacco may be smoked in any area or space that may be set apart for such purpose on any such vessel by the joint action of the Chief of the Fire Department and the master of said vessel, and clearly so designated by duly posted signs; but, any such permission to smoke in a designated area or space may be withdrawn at any time by like joint action; and provided further, that in no case shall smoking be permitted

- (1) On weather decks,
- (2) When loading or discharging explosives,
- (3) In cargo spaces,
- (4) When gas freeing ship's tanks or when loading in bulk any liquid inflammable cargo having a flash point of 80° F. or below.

Section 2. A new section is hereby added to said Chapter VIII, Part II of said San Francisco Municipal Code to be designated as Section 55.1, to read as follows:

Section 55.1. It shall be unlawful for any person to use an open flame of any character or an electric arc, excepting only when said open flame or electric arc is necessarily employed in the making of repairs, alterations, or structural changes on or in any wharf, pier, dock, bulkhead or marine facility or within any hatch, hold or other space wherein cargo of any character is or may be kept or stored in any vessel on or within the limits of the City and County of San Francisco.

Section 3. Section 56 of said Chapter VIII, Part II of said San Francisco Municipal Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 56. The Chief Engineer of the Fire Department, in conjunction with the Chief of the Division of Fire Prevention and Investigation, is hereby authorized and given full power and authority to make all necessary rules and regulations, not in conflict with the provisions of Sections 55 and 55.1 of this chapter, providing for the use of any open flame or electric arc when the same are used in the making of repairs, alterations, or structural changes on any wharf, pier, dock, bulkhead or marine facility or within any hatch, hold or other space wherein cargo of any character is or may be kept or stored in any vessel on or within the limits of the City and County of San Francisco, and providing for the safe and proper fire protection for any area or space, including any office or lunchroom, wherein smoking is permitted in accordance with Section 55 of this chapter.

Section 4. Section 57 of said Chapter VIII, Part II of said San Francisco Municipal Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 57. Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance, or any rule or regulation made by the Chief of the Fire Department, in conjunction with the Chief of the Division of Fire Prevention and Investigation, under authority hereof, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be punished by a fine of not exceeding five hundred dollars (\$500), or imprisonment in the County Jail for not more than six (6) months, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

Section 5. This ordinance is passed as an emergency measure and the Board of Supervisors does by the vote by which this ordinance is passed declare that an actual emergency exists which necessitates this ordinance becoming effective forthwith, the nature of said emergency being that under existing conditions there is great danger of fires being



started on the wharves, piers and docks in the City and County of San Francisco and on ships and boats and other watercraft moored adjacent thereto, and it is therefore necessary for the protection of the property, health and safety of the people of the City and County of San Francisco that this ordinance become effective forthwith.

**Discussion.**

Captain Selph, United States Army, requested the approval of the foregoing legislation as a wartime necessity. He stated that the Army would be able to enforce the ordinance.

Supervisor Uhl, noting that the legislation, as presented, was not in form of an emergency measure, moved that it be amended by the addition of a section declaring same to be an emergency measure in order that it might become effective immediately.

*No objection, and so ordered.*

Thereupon, the bill, as amended, and reading as above, was taken up and *Finally Passed* by the following vote:

Whereas, as soon as conditions permit, it is proposed to construct new facilities for the San Francisco State Teachers College upon property owned by the State of California, adjacent to the Metropolitan Housing Project; and

Whereas, upon completion of the new San Francisco State Teachers College the land and facilities presently occupied and utilized by that institution, on the block bounded by Haight Street, Herman Street,

Buchanan Street and Laguna Street, can be made available by the State of California for other purposes; and

Whereas, the property referred to is free from trust or dedicatory restrictions; and

Whereas, it is imperative that San Francisco provide as soon as possible, on a centrally located site, facilities for a Children's Center, wherein all of the activities relating to child welfare may be integrated and made conveniently available; and

Whereas, the present situs of the San Francisco State Teachers College is ideal for the establishment of a Children's Center; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That this Board of Supervisors does hereby present this matter for the attention of the members of the San Francisco delegation to the State Legislature, with the request that such legislation as is necessary to effect a grant, by the State of California to the City and County of San Francisco, of the property referred to, be prepared, submitted and pressed for enactment at the next regular session of the State Legislature; and be it

Further Resolved, That the Finance Committee of this Board together with the City Attorney, be and are hereby authorized and directed to confer with the members of the State Legislature representing San Francisco and to draft such proposed legislation as is necessary to effect the proposal in this resolution contained.

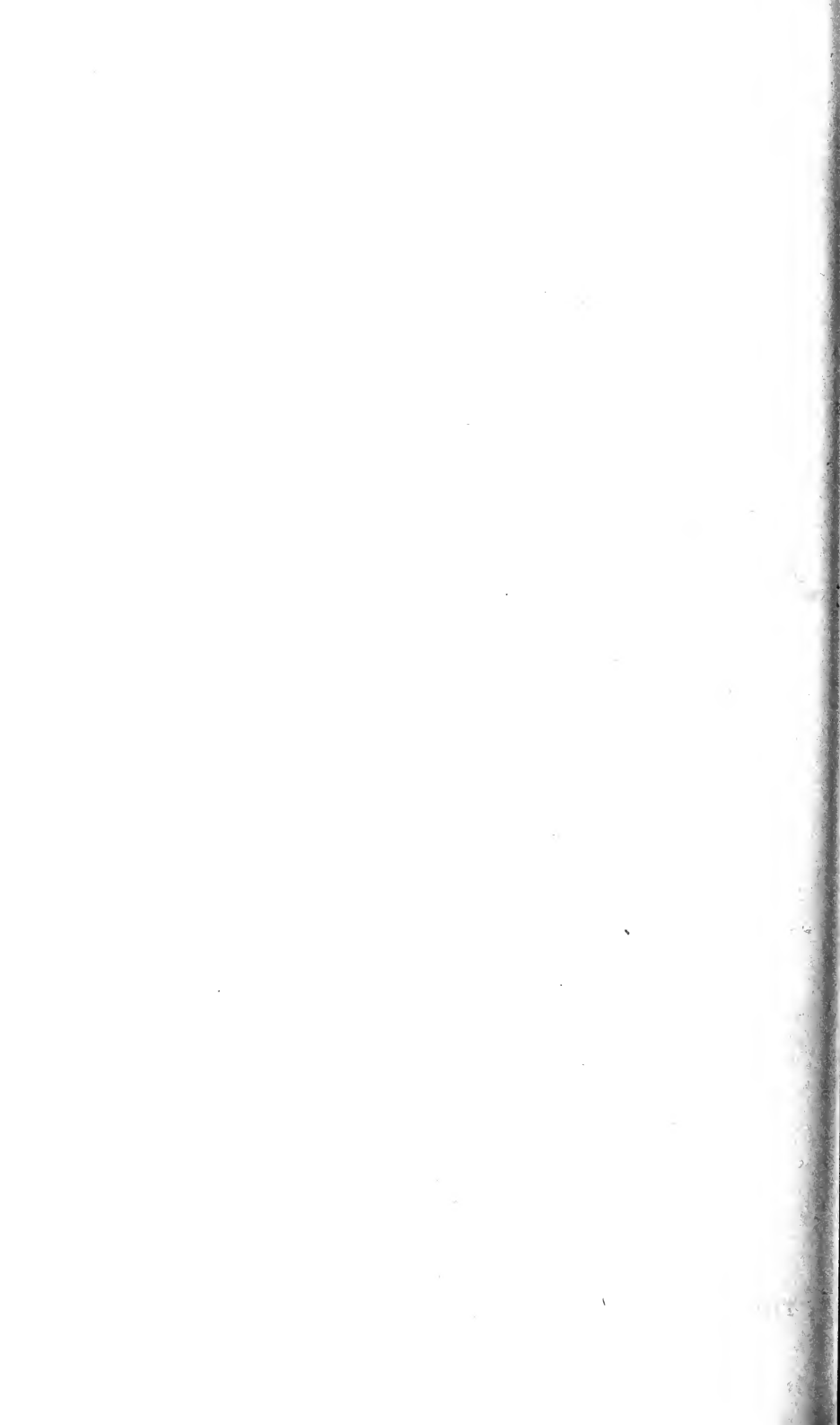

## APPROVAL OF JOURNALS.

The Journals of Proceedings of the meetings of March 30 and 31, 1944, and April 3 and April 10, 1944, were considered read and approved.

## Communications.

Communications, as follows, were presented, read by the Clerk and acted on as noted:

From his Honor the Mayor, the consolidated 1944-45 budget estimates for all departments and offices of the City and County, together with draft of the 1944-45 annual appropriation ordinance, and message transmitting same, which was read by the Clerk, as follows:

Gentlemen:

As required by Section 72 of the Charter, there have been transmitted to your Honorable Board this day the following:

The consolidated 1944-45 budget estimates for all departments and offices of the City and County;

The proposed 1944-45 budget;

The detailed estimates of all 1944-45 revenues of each department;

The estimate of the 1944-45 requirements to meet bond interest and redemption and other fixed charges and revenues applicable thereto;

The draft of the 1944-45 annual appropriation ordinance prepared by the Controller.

Also in accordance with the provisions of Section 72 of the Charter, I comment hereunder upon the financial program incorporated in the 1944-45 budget, and the important changes as compared with the previous budget.

As you know, this is my first budget to recommend to your Honorable Board. However, the budget does not come to you "cold." At the suggestion of Supervisor MacPhee, Chairman of your Finance Committee, that Committee and myself considered jointly the budgets of the various departments, interviewing the department heads, and in many cases the department Commissioners, and going over each budget in detail. The recommendations contained in my budget were concurred in by your Finance Committee. This marks a new procedure in budget practice, which I know has made for better understanding between myself and the members of the Finance Committee. I feel certain that it will make the consideration of the budget easier for your Board.

Briefly, my policy in passing upon the departmental requests was to approve those items of increase representing matters of vital immediate necessity, and to disapprove those expenditures which could be postponed for the post-war period without hindering the affected departments. In my opinion, this postponement of all possible projects to the post-war period is most desirable. It is to be anticipated that with war's end and the demobilization of a great many fighting men, a period of unemployment may result before conversion to peace-time production can be completed. Therefore, we should have on tap as many employment-producing projects as possible—not only those larger projects requiring time to put in motion, but also smaller items of repairs and rehabilitation which can be made available at short notice.

I did not approach this budget from the standpoint of the tax rate alone. We all know that in government, as well as in private business, money must be spent if things are to be done. It is poor economy to delay necessary upkeep of our physical properties to such an extent that ordinary maintenance and repairs are no longer adequate and a large replacement program becomes imperative. It is as poor business now to be "penny-wise and pound-foolish" as it was when Benjamin Franklin coined the phrase.

We now have a population in San Francisco roughly approximating 800,000 people, a gain of about 150,000 in the last two years. It goes without saying that such an increase in population brings with it a necessary increase in many of the city functions—fire, police, health, juvenile court, recreation, parks, etc. We cannot be expected to serve 800,000 citizens with the same force and at the same expense as we served a population of 650,000 or less. For these reasons, I and your Finance Committee approved several new employments which were recommended by the various departments. About sixty new firemen were allowed for the Fire Department, but no funds were provided for these new employments because of the inability of the Fire Department fully to staff the present provision for personnel. If and when it is possible to fill these jobs, the necessary funds will be requested.

The net departmental budget requests for 1944-45, as submitted to me on March 10, represented an increase over the 1943-44 budget as adopted of \$10,533,118. This does not include the increases in salaries and wages resulting from the new Salary Standardization Ordinance. I have recommended reductions in which your Finance Committee concurred, aggregating \$9,121,403.

(Not included in the foregoing, nor in the department estimates as originally submitted to me, but subsequently added to the Municipal Railway budget, is an item of \$2,000,000 for the acquisition of Market Street Railway operative properties. This was inserted for the purpose of appropriating from the surplus existing in the funds of the Municipal Railway the amount set forth in Proposition No. 1 on the May 16 ballot as the amount to be paid "forthwith" upon the approval of this amendment by the voters. This appropriation is mandatory under Section 5 (a) of the Charter amendment, which reads as follows: ". . . the maximum purchase price shall be \$7,500,000 whereof \$2,000,000 shall be paid forthwith from surplus in any of the funds of the existing Municipal Railway derived from earnings of the existing Municipal Railway, which surplus is hereby determined to exist and to be available for, and is hereby appropriated for said purpose . . ." This \$2,000,000 appropriation is qualified, however, with the proviso that it is to be appropriated for other purposes if Proposition No. 1 is defeated on May 16. I want to emphasize that this sum is appropriated out of *surplus* in the funds of Municipal Railway, and no part thereof is to come from taxes.)

I made my recommendations for the expenditure budget after giving due consideration to the amounts which would have to come from the several sources of revenue to finance it. Examination of the Controller's preliminary revenue estimates shows that certain of the budget increases are offset to some extent at least by increased non-tax revenues. For example, Park Department estimated operating revenues for 1944-45 show an increase of \$131,700 over the current fiscal year, and the Civic Center Dormitories are expected to be self-supporting, the revenue therefrom for next fiscal year being estimated at \$54,000, which

more than offsets the operating expenses allowed of \$46,000. The increase in appropriations for Municipal Railway are fully met by that department's own revenues, and so do not affect the tax rate.

Estimated non-tax revenues of the general fund show an increase of over \$1,000,000 for next fiscal year. It is not known at this time (nor can any accurate forecast be made so early) what surpluses will accrue as revenue for the next fiscal year. However, the Public Welfare Department has indicated that at least \$250,000 of City and County funds will be returned as surplus at June 30. I understand the Board of Education will have a sizeable surplus which will be returned for next year's revenue. The indications are from the appropriation reports that the Fire Department will have a sizeable surplus in Permanent Salaries, and other departments throughout the city also are accumulating surpluses. Therefore, it is not being too optimistic, I believe, to state that when the books are closed as of June 30 this year, a considerable amount of surplus will be available to carry over as revenues in the next fiscal year and will to the extent of those surpluses offset whatever increases in the budget, or decreases in other revenues, there may be.

One large loss in revenue is reflected in the Water Department. For the current fiscal year, \$1,906,020 was budgeted for transfer from the Water Revenue Fund to the General Fund for Bond Interest and Redemption of the Hetch-Hetchy issues. At best, only a minor amount can be transferred next year because of a decrease in revenues and an increase in the amount allowed for Additions and Betterments. It is estimated by the Manager of Utilities that the 15 per cent water rate reduction, made effective last fall, will result in a decrease in Water Department revenues for the next fiscal year of \$1,100,000. The balance of the \$1,900,000 is accounted for by an increase of \$800,000 in the appropriation for Additions and Betterments in the Water Department. This represents vital additions to the water system, absolutely necessary, in my opinion, if the Water Department is to continue to render adequate service to the citizens of San Francisco. One large item in this program is the beginning of the development of the Sutro Reservoir site. The first unit of this development, i.e., the grading of the site, is provided in the 1944-45 budget; likewise, new pipe lines are provided and other much needed improvements which have not been allowed to the Water Department in prior years. In this connection, I think it proper for me to state that the Public Utilities Commission has submitted to me their proposed program for the Water Department for the next several fiscal years and that it appears from that program that all the excess revenues or surplus earnings of the Water Department for the next several years will be necessary to catch up on their program of Additions and Betterments.

With respect to Civilian Defense, I have sought advice and counsel from many sources on this activity because, coming new into the picture, I could not expect to gain a first-hand knowledge of the workings of Civilian Defense and what in my opinion were the necessary activities thereof, in the short time at my disposal before my recommendations had to be made to you. With the full agreement of your Finance Committee, I have made considerable reductions in this budget as originally proposed to me. The Unappropriated Reserve is reduced to \$50,000. The number of Air Raid Battalion Headquarters have been reduced to eight. Many positions have been deleted, including two positions of Assistant Directors of Civilian Defense at \$400 per month each. In my opinion, no reductions have been made which will tend to cripple any necessary activity in Civilian Defense, and that opinion is shared by your Finance Committee.

Should further streamlining appear desirable during the next fiscal year, it will be done.

There will be some supplemental budgets to present to you, resulting from adjustments of errors discovered during our budget hearings and

from developments since the budgets were filed by the various departments on February 15. The amounts involved are comparatively minor. No needs determinable during our hearings have been eliminated to be later presented as supplemental requests.

Mr. Mason was Clerk of the State Assembly in 1891; he was one of the organizers of the League of California Cities; he occupied the position of Bond and Ordinance Clerk, Clerk's Office, Board of Supervisors, for many years, from which position he was retired in 1927.

Mr. Mason greeted the members of the Board and attaches of the Clerk's Office, with whom he had served, spoke of his experiences as a member of the Clerk's staff, and expressed his pleasure at being permitted to visit with his old friends.

Supervisor Colman, in responding to remarks by Mr. Mason, expressed appreciation for remarks addressed to him and declared that the Board was honored by the visit of Mr. Mason.

**Amending San Francisco Municipal Code, Relating to Auctioneers.**

(Series of 1939)

Bill No. 2848, Ordinance No. ...., as follows:

Amending Article 17, Chapter VIII, Part II of the San Francisco Municipal Code, relating to auctioneers, by amending the following Sections thereof: Section 1245, Exceptions; Section 1246, Bona Fide Closing-Out Sales—Permits for Auction Sales; Section 1247, Verified Inventory—Filing With Application; Section 1256, Time of Holding Sale—Exceptions, and by adding a new section to be known as Section 1250 (a) Relating to Residential Requirements.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco, as follows:

NOTE: Amendments are indicated by *light face italics*. Cancellations are set out in **bold face** and bracketed [ ].

Section 1. Article 17, Chapter VIII, Part II of the San Francisco Municipal Code is hereby amended by amending Sections 1245, 1246, 1247 and 1256, thereof, and by adding a new section to be known as Section 1250 (a), to read as follows:

SEC. 1245. **Exceptions.** The provisions of Section 1244 shall not apply to household furniture, vehicles, automobiles, machinery, *fixtures and store equipment*, livestock and such bulky articles as have been usually sold in warehouses, or in the public streets or on the wharves, *or to goods placed in a warehouse or storeroom by a duly licensed auctioneer for convenience or necessity of the sale of such goods by auction.*

SEC. 1246. **Bona Fide Closing-Out Sales—Permits for Auction Sales.** The provisions of Section 1244 shall not apply to any bona fide sale of a stock of merchandise by public auction where the owner thereof or the creditors of the owner are engaged in the legitimate closing out of the business **[of such owner]** and such sale is held upon the premises where the business **[of the owner]** has been carried on for not less than one (1) year immediately preceding such sale; provided, however, that no public auction shall be conducted under the provisions of this section unless **[the owners or the creditors of the owners shall first obtain]** a permit *is first obtained* from the Police Commission, which Commission may grant the permit applied for or in its discretion and in the event in its judgment the public interest so requires, *they may deny the same.* The Commission may designate the number of days that the said auction sale may be conducted and in no case shall the sale continue for a period longer than thirty (30) calendar days at any one time; provided, that in no event shall any stock of merchandise or other personal property be offered for sale or sold at said auction unless the same has been upon the said premises **[and owned by said applicant]** for a period of not less than ninety (90) days prior to the filing of said application.

SEC. 1247. **Verified Inventory—Filing With Application.** In all cases where a public auction sale is held under provisions of Section 1246 of this Article, **[the owner or creditor of the owner must make]** an inventory of the stock of merchandise on the premises which is to be sold at public auction **[and must submit said inventory]** *must be made and submitted* to the Police Commission at the time of the filing of the application as provided for in Section 1246 of this Article.

The inventory required by this section must show the items of merchandise contained in the stock to be offered for sale on the premises by public auction and the said **[owner or creditors of the owner]** applicant must make and subscribe an oath to be attached to the inventory that said inventory contains a true and itemized account of all property to be sold at said auction, that all of said merchandise so inventoried has been **[owned by said applicant]** *located on the premises* for not less than ninety (90) days next immediately preceding the filing of said application, and that the same is a bona fide closing out of the business **[of the said owner and the owner intends to retire from said business.]** No property or merchandise shall be sold under the provisions of Section 1246 of this Article except those items shown in the inventory provided for herein.

SEC. 1256. **Time of Holding Sale—Exceptions.** All sales of goods, wares or merchandise by public auction must be made between the hours of 7 o'clock AM and 7 o'clock PM, and no such sales can be made on Sundays or **[legal holidays]** *the following holidays: New*



*Year's Day, Washington's Birthday, Decoration Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Admission Day, (when the celebration is in San Francisco), Thanksgiving and Christmas;* provided, however, that the Police Commission may grant a special permit for such a limited period of time as the Commission shall fix for the sale by public auction of books, prints or paintings, or goods sold in the original packages as imported, according to a printed catalogue, of which samples must have been opened and exposed to public inspection at least one (1) day previous to the sale, at an hour or hours later than 7 o'clock PM to be specified in said permit, and provided that any such permit may be revoked by the Police Commission for the reasons and in the manner provided in Section 1254 of this Article for the revocation of a permit.

*SEC. 1250 (a). Residential Requirements. No person shall be granted an auctioneer's license who has not been a bona fide resident of the City and County of San Francisco for a period of one year prior to making application with the exception of any person who did hold a license on January 2, 1944.*

The above described property is required by said City and County for a public use and purpose, to wit: For the construction, maintenance and use of a series of aqueduct pipe lines for the purpose of conveying water from its reservoirs in San Mateo County, California, to the City and County of San Francisco for the use of said City and County and its inhabitants. It is necessary that a fee simple title in and to said property be taken for said purpose, subject to such reservations and conditions as may be necessary and proper to secure to

the present owners of said property the privilege of crossing over the same and to construct and maintain over and across said parcels of land roads, streets, overhead power lines, telephone lines, telegraph lines, also sewers, water pipes, gas pipes and other underground utilities; provided, however, that the present owners shall not use said parcels of land or permit the same to be used for any purpose or in any manner which will interfere with, damage or endanger in any way any aqueduct pipe lines or other structures of the City and County of San Francisco.

The City Attorney is hereby authorized and directed to commence proceedings in eminent domain against the owners of said real property and any and all interests therein or claims thereto for the condemnation thereof for the public use of the City and County of San Francisco as aforesaid.

#### Amending Ordinance Creating Coordinating Council.

(Series of 1939)

Bill No. 2859, Ordinance No. . . . ., as follows:

Amending Bill No. 1792, Ordinance No. 19.101, entitled "Creating commission to be known as the Coordinating Council for the purpose of furthering the cooperation and coordination among the public departments and between the public departments and social agencies in a more effective program for the youth of San Francisco," by amending Section 1 thereof designating the members of said Council; by amending Section 2 thereof, relating to qualifications of the administrative head of said Council and his assistants; by amending Section 3, to provide for inclusion in the Annual Appropriation Ordinance of an amount not in excess of \$5,400 for such additional employments as in the discretion of the Council are necessary to develop and expand the work of District Councils, and amending Section 9 relating to appointments of members to conform to Section 1 as amended.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco, as follows:

Section 1. Sections 1, 2, 3 and 9 of Bill No. 1792, Ordinance No. 19.101, the title of which is recited above, are hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 1. There is hereby created a Coordinating Council to be appointed by the Mayor. The Coordinating Council shall consist of the Chief of Police, *the District Attorney*, the Chief Probation Officer of the Juvenile Court, the Superintendent of Public Schools, the Superintendent of the Recreation Department, the Director of Public Welfare, the Director of the Bureau of Child Hygiene of the Department of Public Health, and seven additional members *who are not at the time of their appointment, by the Mayor, officials or employees of the City and County of San Francisco, and who shall be qualified to serve by reason of their knowledge and experience in the coordinating of youth activities.*

Section 2. All members of the Coordinating Council shall serve without compensation except in so far as compensation is provided for other official positions which said persons may hold.

Said Coordinating Council shall, pursuant to the provisions of Subdivision (h) of Section 19 of the Charter, appoint a Secretary who shall not be subject to the civil service provisions of the Charter and who shall hold office at the pleasure of said Coordinating Council. Said Secretary shall be the administrative head of said Council and shall have all the powers and duties of a department head as provided for in Section 20 of the Charter. Said administrative head shall, with the approval of said Coordinating Council, pursuant to the civil service and budgetary provisions of the Charter, appoint such additional employees as may be necessary to conduct the affairs of said Coordinating Council.

The salary of the said Secretary shall be fixed by the Coordinating Council in accordance with the budgetary provisions of the Charter, but in no event shall said salary exceed the sum of four thousand dollars (\$4,000) per year.

*The administrative head and his assistants shall be selected from among persons whose training and experience qualify them for organization and leadership in community service activities.*

Section 3. Upon the recommendation of the Mayor and the approval of the Board of Supervisors, an amount not to exceed seven thousand five hundred dollars (\$7,500) shall be appropriated each year to said Coordinating Council for the purpose of defraying cost of carrying on its work, which said cost shall include salaries and all other expenses incidental to the work; *provided, however, that there shall be included in the Annual Appropriation Ordinance such amount, not in excess of \$5,400 as will provide such full time or part time workers, not in excess of three, as are deemed necessary by the Council to assist the Secretary in developing and expanding the work of the district councils.*

Section 9. Whenever any of the officials of the City and County of San Francisco who are made ex-officio members of the Coordinating Council shall cease to hold their official positions as such officers then, in that event, their membership in said Coordinating Council shall cease and determine and their respective successors shall be appointed to succeed them as members of said Council.

*The seven undesignated members of the Council which, pursuant to Section 1 hereof the Mayor is authorized to appoint, shall be appointed to serve for a period of four years, under such plan as to staggering of appointments as shall be prescribed by the Mayor.*

#### Passed for Second Reading.

The roll was called and the foregoing bill was *Passed for Second Reading* by the following vote:

#### Action Rescinded.

Subsequently during the proceedings, Supervisor Colman, noting the presence of the Chief Administrative Officer in the Chambers, inquired of him if the foregoing bill met with his approval.

The Chief Administrative Officer announced that he had had no chance at all to study the legislation. He would like to discuss the matter with the Mayor.

Thereupon, Supervisor Colman, seconded by Supervisor Uhl, moved that the action of the Board, whereby the foregoing bill had been Passed for Second Reading, be rescinded.

No objection, and *action rescinded*.

Whereupon, Supervisor Colman, seconded by Supervisor Green, moved re-reference to committee.

Supervisor MacPhee objected to re-reference to committee. He had no objection to temporary postponement. The bill was in accordance with the recommendations of the Coordinating Council and the special committee on juvenile delinquency. Any delay might hamper the work of that Council. There might not be time to have necessary supplemental budget requests approved and presented to the Board.

Supervisor Colman, with the consent of his second, withdrew his previous motion, and moved that consideration be postponed until Monday, May 8, 1944.

No objection, and *so ordered*.

#### Refused Passage.

#### Providing for Local Enforcement of O.P.A. Regulations in Connection With Housing.

(Series of 1939)

Bill No. 2878, Ordinance No. . . . ., as follows:

Prohibiting the renting of any housing accommodation for which a maximum rent has been prescribed by regulation, order or price schedule issued by the Office of Price Administration under the authority of the Emergency Price Control Act; making a violation of this ordinance a misdemeanor and providing a penalty for said violation.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco, as follows:

Section 1. It is hereby ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco that the National anti-inflation program adopted by the Government of the United States and the maintenance of ceiling prices on housing accommodations in the City and County of San Francisco are necessary for the effective prosecution of the war now existing between the United States of America and the Axis Powers and for the welfare of the citizens of the City and County of San Francisco.

Section 2. Any person who in renting any housing accommodation in the City and County of San Francisco for which a maximum price or maximum rent has been prescribed by regulation order or price schedule issued by the Office of Price Administration under the authority of the Emergency Price Control Act as heretofore or hereafter amended, demands or receives a price or rent in excess of the maximum rent for said accommodation as fixed in the schedule issued by the Office of Price Administration, which schedule is in force and effect at the time of the renting of the said housing accommodations or who intentionally or wilfully violates any other provisions of such regulation or order governing the rental of said housing accommodations, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and on conviction shall be punished by a fine of not more than \$100 (one hundred dollars) or im-

prisonment in the County Jail for not more than ninety (90) days or by both such fine and imprisonment for each violation of this ordinance.

Approved as to form by the City Attorney.

#### Privilege of the Floor.

Senator John F. Shelley, on being granted the privilege of the floor, addressed the Board at length, urging approval of the foregoing bill, as well as the bill immediately following. The National Labor Advisory Council has recommended local regulations throughout the country. Thirty-four or thirty-five cities have similar legislation. Three states have enacted state legislation. Similar legislation is pending in forty different cities.

Supervisor Colman announced that representatives of several groups had stated that they were not familiar with the proposed legislation, and inquired if there was any objection to re-referring both bills, the foregoing bill, and the bill immediately following, to committee. He intended to move such re-reference.

Mr. Shelley announced that the matter had been in committee for about five weeks, and had been heard twice. However, he did not believe the apartment house people had been heard. He believed the legislation should be enacted, but he agreed that all interested parties should know what was proposed.

Supervisor Mancuso announced that he had been requested, the same as had Supervisor Colman, that the legislation be re-referred to committee. He believed that both matters, Bill 2878 and Bill 2879, should be returned to committee.

Thereupon, Supervisor Colman moved that Bill 2878 and Bill 2879 be re-referred to committee. Motion seconded by Supervisor Green.

Mr. Carroll Newburgh stated that his people were interested in Bill 2878, and were prepared to present their views.

Supervisor Mead objected to any re-reference of Bill No. 2878 to committee. That bill could be acted on.

After further brief discussion, Supervisor Colman, with the consent of his second, withdrew his motion for re-reference to committee.

Thereupon, Mr. John F. Shelley discussed at some length the proposed legislation, urging the approval thereof. Doubtless an argument will be made that there is no need for such ordinance in San Francisco; that the OPA has the necessary machinery. However, there should be outlined procedure for local enforcement. He believed that the people operating properly would prefer local legislation rather than in the federal courts.

Mr. Joseph Casey, chairman of the Labor Advisory Committee of local OPA, urged approval of the proposed legislation. Eighty-five or ninety per cent of the landlords and hotel owners in San Francisco are operating properly, but there is a definite need for some type of ordinance because of a small percentage of chiselers.

Mr. Paul Schnur, representing the CIO, and a member of the Mayor's Fair Rent Committee, also urged approval of the proposed legislation.

Reverend Thomas Simpson, representing the San Francisco Committee to Combat Inflation, urged approval of the bill. The legislation is designed merely to protect the city against those who will not obey any law.

Mr. M. B. Pritchard, representing the Railroad Brotherhood, endorsed the views expressed by the previous speakers.

Mr. Robert Truehalf, representing the National Lawyers' Guild, also favored the approval of the proposed legislation.

Mr. Fitz-Harris opposed the proposed legislation, declaring there was no necessity for such law. There are too many laws on the books now, he declared. It is the duty of the Police Department to enforce ordinances of the City and County of San Francisco; the OPA is well equipped to take care of its own regulations. There has been complaint against treatment received from the OPA. The OPA has stated that there has been no widespread violation against its rulings.

Mr. Ray Crummey, representing the San Francisco Hotel Association, and the Hotel Employers Association, did not feel that the proposed legislation was necessary.

Mr. Charles Christin, speaking for the Owners and Lessees Apartment House Association, opposed the legislation. Most of the violations in the past have been caused by misunderstanding or misapprehension of the OPA rulings. There is no need for the legislation.

Mr. Carroll Newburgh, speaking as vice-president of the Apartment House Industry, also opposed the legislation.

Mr. Joseph Brown, attorney, representing property owners, objected to the legislation.

Mrs. Robert Smith also objected to the proposed legislation.

#### In Hands of the Board.

On motion by Supervisor Colman, there being no objection, the entire matter was taken into the hands of the Board.

Supervisor Uhl announced that he was not clear as to whether there would be a duplication of effort if the proposed legislation should be approved. If the legislation were to result in duplication of effort, he would be opposed to it.

Supervisor Colman opposed the legislation. The law was not necessary at all, and it would provide for a duplication of effort by the Police Department.

Thereupon, the roll was called and the foregoing bill was *Refused Passage for Second Reading* by the following vote:

#### Re-reference to Committee.

#### Providing for Local Enforcement of O.P.A. Regulations in Connection With Commodities.

(Series of 1939)

Bill No. 2879, Ordinance No. . . . . , as follows:

Prohibiting the buying, selling or delivering of rationed commodities contrary to the order, and regulation of the Government of the United States or any of its agencies and prohibiting the selling or offering for sale at retail any commodity or service for which a maximum price has been prescribed by regulation of the United States Government or any of its agencies: Making the violation of this ordinance a misdemeanor and providing a penalty for said violation.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco, as follows:

Section 1. That the proper allocation of commodities needed for the defense of the United States or for civilian supply and for the effective enforcement of the National anti-inflation program is necessary for the effective prosecution of the existing war between the United States of America and the Axis Powers and for the welfare of the citizens of the City and County of San Francisco, it is hereby

declared to be the policy of the said City and County of San Francisco in order to insure fair dealing and the prevention and elimination of so-called black markets to cooperate with the Federal Government's Price Rationing Program.

Section 2. (a) Any person who sells, transfers or delivers to an ultimate consumer or who buys or acquires for ultimate consumption any commodity rationed by order or regulation heretofore or hereafter issued by the United States Government or any agency thereof; without, at the time of said transaction, taking or giving tokens, coupons, stamps, certificates, ration checks or other evidences required by such order or regulation, or

(b) Any person who uses any rationing commodity as an ultimate consumer or who possesses, acquires, transfers or otherwise disposes of any rationing coupon or other rationed evidences in a manner prohibited by such an order or regulation at the time of such use, possession or transaction, or

(c) Any person who in selling or offering for sale at retail any commodity or service for which a maximum price has been prescribed by regulation, order or price schedule issued by the Office of Price Administration under the authority of the Emergency Price Control Act as heretofore or hereafter amended, or who intentionally or wilfully violates any other provisions of such regulation or such price schedule giving or selling at retail, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and on conviction shall be punished by a fine of not more than one hundred dollars (\$100) or by imprisonment in the County Jail for not more than ninety (90) days or by both such fine and imprisonment for each violation of the prohibitions contained in subdivisions (a), (b), and (c) of this section.

Approved as to form by the City Attorney.

Supervisor Colman moved that the foregoing bill be re-referred to committee.

Supervisor Mancuso moved as a substitute, that the Board vote on the matter immediately.

Thereupon, Supervisor Colman announced that he would withdraw his motion.

Supervisor Mead objected to immediate consideration, calling attention to the desire expressed by Supervisor Colman during the consideration of the immediately preceding measure, that all interested parties should have the opportunity of being heard. Parties interested in Bill 2879 had not been heard.

Thereupon, Supervisor Mead moved that the foregoing matter be referred to committee. Motion seconded by Supervisor Uhl.

*No objection, and so ordered.*

Proposal No. 3980, Resolution No. 3958, as follows:

Whereas, it is manifest that victory for the allied forces can only be achieved by the united cooperative efforts of all loyal Americans; and

Whereas, the California State Chamber of Commerce, the San Francisco Chamber of Commerce and other associations actuated by high patriotic motive, have repudiated and urged the defeat of the initiative petition now being circulated entitled "Right of Employment" because this initiative petition will precipitate chaos, confusion and industrial discord; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, by the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco in session assembled this 1st day of May, 1944, that we concur in the action of the Chambers of Commerce and join with them in urging citizens not to support this untimely, ill-advised petition which will produce industrial strife at this time when we must have unity of action and the fullest possible production on material necessary for the maintenance and support of our armed forces.

Whereas, such reclamation will undoubtedly induce outside firms to locate their industries here, and

Whereas, such industries will not only provide work for many of our citizens but will increase the value of adjacent lands with its attendant increase in the assessment rolls, and

Whereas, at a joint meeting of the Public Buildings, Lands, City Planning and Finance Committee on Wednesday, April 26th, it was the consensus of opinion of the citizens present that such reclamation would be a greatly desired post-war project and that efforts should now be made to conduct a survey as to the cost of such a worthwhile and laudable enterprise; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That this Board of Supervisors respectfully requests the Chief Administrative Officer to take the necessary steps to determine the amount of money that will be required to conduct a survey having for its purpose the reclamation of the tidelands located east of Third and north of Evans and to render a report to this Board in ample time for the inclusion of the determined amount in the 1944-45 budget.

Whereas, it has been represented to the Board of Supervisors by the Central Council of Civic Clubs that after investigation and examination of the present methods used to select trial jurors in the local Federal District Court that no rules are prescribed by the judges to guide the clerk and jury commissioner in making their selections of jurors as is done in our local State Superior Court; that one woman is purposely selected for every four men on the panel instead of an equal proportion and that jurors are selected almost entirely from one class of our citizens so that little or no representation is given to working men or their wives who constitute the greater part of our citizens; and

Whereas, the Central Council of Civic Clubs by motion respectfully requested the Presiding Judge of the local Federal District Court to call a meeting of the Judges to adopt rules to govern the selection of trial jurors for that Court so as to bring about a fair cross-section of all classes of our citizens as jurors; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Board of Supervisors, if the condition complained of is as stated, endorse the request of the Central Council of Civic Clubs requesting said Presiding Judge to give consideration to the adoption of such rules as will provide for a fair cross-section representation of the community as jurors without favoring or excluding any one group because of sex, race, occupation, wealth or social position and to be fairly distributed among different geographic sections.

Section 1. Section 1 of Bill No. 754, Ordinance No. 9.0924, commonly known as the San Francisco Contractors Registration Ordinance, now designated Section 200, Part III of the San Francisco Municipal Code, is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 1. A "contractor" within the meaning of this ordinance, is a person, firm, copartnership, corporation, association or other organization, or any combination thereof, who or which, in any capacity other than that of employee of another, with wages as the sole compensation for the work or labor performed or to be performed, advertises as such, or represents himself, themselves or it as such, or undertakes or offers to undertake or purports to have the capacity or ability to undertake or submits a bid, to construct, reconstruct, alter, repair, add to, subtract from, improve, move, wreck or demolish, any building, highway, road, railroad, excavation, or other structure, project, development, or improvement, or to do any part thereof, including the erection of scaffolding or other structures or works in connection therewith; provided that the term "contractor" as used in this ordinance shall include subcontractor, but shall not include anyone who merely furnishes materials or supplies without fabricating the same into, or consuming the same in the performance of, the work of the contractor as herein defined, and provided further that effective retroactive to July 1, 1935, the term "contractor" as defined herein shall be construed and expressly held not to include

any person or any of the agencies enumerated above, who or which are engaged in painting or decorating work.

Authorizing conveyance of an easement to County of San Mateo for water tanks and pipe lines on portion of Hassler Health Home property.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco, as follows:

Section 1. In accordance with the recommendation of the Department of Public Health, the Mayor and the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors on behalf of the City and County of San Francisco, a municipal corporation, are hereby authorized and directed to execute a deed conveying to the County of San Mateo, a political subdivision of the State of California, an easement to construct, reconstruct, maintain, operate, repair, use, and remove water tanks and pipe lines in and upon the following described real property situate in the Rancho de las Pulgas, County of San Mateo, State of California, and being a portion of that certain tract of land conveyed to the City and County

of San Francisco by deed recorded March 27, 1924, in Volume 110 of Official Records, at page 143, Records of San Mateo County, California, and more particularly described as follows:

Beginning at a point on the line dividing said tract and Parcel 1, containing 10 acres, as said Parcel 1 is described in deed from Libby A. Scheier to the County of San Mateo, recorded December 18, 1941, in Volume 998 of Official Records, at page 168, Records of San Mateo County, California, said dividing line being also the northwesterly line of said Parcel 1, said point of beginning being distant along said dividing line south 36° 41' west 144.57 feet from the most northerly corner of said Parcel 1; thence from said point of beginning and continuing along said dividing line south 36° 41' west 125.00 feet; thence leaving said dividing line north 53° 19' west 25.00 feet; thence north 36° 41' east 125.00 feet; thence south 53° 19' east 25.00 feet to the point of beginning.

Section 2. The grant of said easement shall be made subject to the following reservations and conditions:

*First.* The grantor hereby reserves the right to use said land for any purposes not inconsistent with the use thereof by the grantee under the provisions hereof.

*Second.* Before commencing construction work on the easement herein described the grantee shall obtain approval of its plans for such work from the Department of Public Health of the City and County of San Francisco.

*Third.* Said tanks and pipe lines shall be used by the grantee for the purpose of storing and delivering water to its Canyon Sanitarium located on said 10-acre parcel of land.

*Fourth.* In consideration for said easement, the grantee shall, at its own expense, install a fire hydrant at one of the tanks and at least one additional fire hydrant on one of the water pipe lines to be constructed on said easement, which hydrants shall be of the proper size to fit the City's fire protection hoses in use at the Hassler Health Home.

*Fifth.* The grantee shall be responsible for and shall hold the City harmless against any and all damages and expenses due directly or indirectly to the exercise of the rights herein granted.

*Sixth.* This grant shall not be assigned without the written consent of the grantor. Said easement shall revert to the grantor in the event of abandonment or violation by the grantee of any of the conditions hereof.

Authorizing the Chief Engineer of the San Francisco Fire Department to Permit the Use of Salvage Covers by Individuals, Firms and Corporations When, in His Opinion, the Same Are Necessary for the Preservation of Property After Fires, Conflagration or Other Calamities, and Fixing the Amount to Be Charged for the Use of Said Salvage Covers; Providing for the Method of Accounting for Amounts Received by the Fire Department for the Use of Said Covers; Providing a Penalty for the Violation of This Ordinance.

(Series of 1939)

Bill No. 2860, Ordinance No. 2704, as follows:

Authorizing the Chief Engineer of the San Francisco Fire Department to permit the use of salvage covers by individuals, firms and corporations when, in his opinion, the same are necessary for the

preservation of property after fires, conflagration or other calamities, and fixing the amount to be charged for the use of said salvage covers; providing for the method of accounting for amounts received by the fire department for the use of said covers; providing a penalty for the violation of this ordinance.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco, as follows:

Section 1. Whenever in the opinion of the Chief Engineer of the San Francisco Fire Department the covers which are used by the Salvage Corps, which said corps is provided for in Section 38.1 of the Charter, are not necessary for the immediate protection of property by said Salvage Corps, the same may be used by any private individual, firm or corporation for the purpose of protecting his or its property from further damage by smoke, fire, water or weather conditions upon the following conditions herein set forth:

(a) That application shall be made to the Chief Engineer of the Fire Department for the use of said covers and the same shall be used only when said permission is granted by said Chief Engineer or by some person or persons directly authorized by him to grant said permission.

(b) Said covers shall not be used for any greater period of time than is absolutely necessary for the purpose of protecting the property of said individual, firm or corporation from damage by smoke, water, fire or weather conditions.

(c) The following charges shall be made for the use of said covers:

For covers spread at fires by the Salvage Corps for the protection of personal property, for the first five days during which the same are in use no charge shall be made and thereafter a charge of \$1.00 per day per cover shall be made for each day during which said covers are used or are in possession of said individual, firm or corporation.

For roof covers spread at fires or other calamities by the Salvage Corps, for the first ten days in which the same are used no charge shall be made and thereafter a charge of \$1.00 per day per cover shall be made for each day during which said covers are used or are in the possession of said individual, firm or corporation.

(d) When said covers are spread by the Salvage Corps no charge shall be made for the transportation of the same from the headquarters of the Salvage Corps to the place where the same are used, but in cases where the same are used for the protection of personal property and are kept for more than five days, or are kept for more than ten days when used for roof covers, in addition to the amounts to be paid for the use of said covers as provided for in subdivisions (b) and (c) of this section, the individual, firm or corporation using said covers shall pay the cost of transporting same from the place where they are used to the headquarters of the Salvage Corps.

In cases where said covers are not spread by said Salvage Corps, in addition to the amounts to be paid for their use, the individual, firm or corporation using the same shall pay the cost of transportation of said covers from and to the headquarters of the Salvage Corps from which they were received.

The individual, firm or corporation using said covers shall pay all damage occurring to the same while said covers are in his or its possession.

(e) At any time when in the opinion of the Chief Engineer of the Fire Department said covers are needed for actual service, he shall have the power to order them returned to the Salvage Corps from which they were taken and it shall be the duty of the individual, firm or corporation to forthwith return said covers.

Section 2. The Controller shall provide the manner in which the

Fire Department shall account for all moneys received for the use of said covers.

Section 3. Any individual, firm or corporation using any of said covers of said Salvage Corps contrary to the provisions of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.

(Series of 1939)

Bill No. 2781, Ordinance No. ...., as follows:

Amending Section 2 of Article 1, Chapter II, Part II, of the San Francisco Municipal Code, entitled "Use Districts," by reclassifying and rezoning certain property in the City and County of San Francisco as defined and indicated in the accompanying zone maps Nos. 5A and 6A, which are amended copies of and supersede Nos. 5 and 6 of Ordinance No. 5464 (New Series), passed October 3, 1921.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco, as follows:

Section 1. Section 2 of Article 1, Chapter II, Part II of the San Francisco Municipal Code, the title of which is recited above, is hereby amended to read as follows:

NOTE: Amendments are indicated by *light face italics*. Cancellations are set out in **bold face** and bracketed [ ].

**SEC. 2. Use Districts.** For the purpose of regulating and establishing the location of trades and industries, businesses, dwellings and the location of buildings designed for specific uses, the City and County of San Francisco is hereby divided into six (6) classes of districts: (1) First Residential District, (2) Second Residential District, (3) Commercial District, (4) Light Industrial District, (5) Heavy Industrial District, (6) Unrestricted District, as shown on the use of property zone maps, Sections 1 to 14, inclusive, which accompany the original enactment and are hereby declared to be part thereof.

*Property Zone Maps Nos. 5A and 6A are hereby substituted for Property Zone Maps Nos. 5 and 6.*

The use districts designated on [said] zone maps *5A and 6A* are hereby established. The use of property zone map designations which accompany said use of property zone maps are hereby declared to be part hereof. No building or premises shall be erected or used for any purpose other than a purpose permitted in the use district in which such building or premises are located.

Approved as to form by the City Attorney.

#### Discussion.

Supervisor Mead announced that he had been requested by the Associated Home Builders, and by Mr. Henry F. Wrigley, attorney, to ask for a week's postponement of the foregoing matter, and in accordance with said request, he moved that consideration be postponed for one week. Motion seconded by Supervisor Meyer.

Supervisor Colman objected to postponement. There was a very extensive hearing before committee on Wednesday evening, May 3. There had been four hearings before the City Planning Commission. No good could come from postponement.

#### Privilege of the Floor.

Mr. Fred M. Weidemann, on motion by Supervisor Uhl, was granted the privilege of the floor. Mr. Weidemann declared that postponement was only a subterfuge. The people present at the meeting on Wednesday evening, May 3, 1944, were assured that the matter would come to a conclusion without further delay. Postponement would merely allow more "cracker-box" buildings to be erected. He was opposed to postponement.

Mr. F. L. Newton, acting secretary of the Associated Home Builders, urged postponement.

Mr. Henry F. Wrigley, representing builders, Chas. L. Harney, and Doelger, particularly, the Associated Home Builders and the San Francisco Real Estate Board, urged postponement. Mr. Wrigley announced that, generally speaking, he was not opposed to the rezoning. His concern was the rezoning of vacant corner lots, on which, at present, multiple dwellings and apartment houses might be constructed. He believed, too, that the wording of the proposed ordinance was not correct, and he desired time to study the matter fully. Mr. Wrigley questioned, also, whether damages sustained by property owners, whose property might be depreciated by reason of the proposed rezoning, were recoverable.

Supervisor Colman pointed out that the questions about which

Mr. Wrigley was concerned were all brought out in committee, and were considered. He believed the Board should act without delay.

Mr. Carroll Newburgh, president of the Central Council of Civic Clubs, and speaking on behalf of improvement clubs in the Sunset and the Parkside districts, opposed any postponement.

Mr. Deming Tilton, Director of Planning, explained the proposal for rezoning, and explained maps showing the proposed rezoning to which reference was made in the legislation before the Board.

Mrs. Thomas R. Best, on behalf of the Great Highway Association, urged approval of the proposed legislation.

Supervisor MacPhee suggested that the proposed legislation be passed for second reading. If, before the matter is again before the Board on final passage, it develops that the measure is improperly worded, it can be amended and started anew, otherwise, it can be finally passed and no time will be lost.

**Providing for Return to San Francisco, From Points Within the State of California, of Persons Arrested After Being Charged With the Commission of a Criminal Offense.**

(Series of 1939)

Bill No. 2881, Ordinance No. . . . . ., as follows:

Providing that when a warrant of arrest is issued upon a complaint charging any person with the commission of a criminal offense, filed in any court in the City and County of San Francisco having jurisdiction of the matter complained, or when any indictment is returned by the Grand Jury, charging any person with the commission of a criminal offense, and a warrant of arrest is issued for said person by any court having jurisdiction in the premises, and said person complained of or indicted can be located outside the City and County of San Francisco, but within the State of California, and said person is arrested on said warrant or pursuant to said indictment, said person for whom said warrant is issued or against whom said indictment is returned, may be returned to the City and County by the Chief of Police of the City and County for arraignment and preliminary hearing and/or trial, in the court having jurisdiction in the premises, at the expense of the City and County of San Francisco and on the terms and conditions set forth in this ordinance.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco, as follows:

Section 1. Whenever a complaint charging any person with the commission of a criminal offense is filed in any court in the City and County of San Francisco having jurisdiction of the matter complained of, or when any indictment is returned by the Grand Jury, charging any person with the commission of a criminal offense, and a warrant of arrest is issued for said person by any court having jurisdiction in the premises, and said person complained of, or indicted can be located outside the City and County of San Francisco, but within the State of California, and said person is arrested on said warrant, or pursuant to said indictment, said defendant for whom said warrant is issued or against whom said indictment is returned, may be returned to the City and County of San Francisco by the Chief of Police for arraignment, preliminary hearing, and/or trial in the court having jurisdiction in the premises at the expense of the City and County of San Francisco upon the following terms and conditions:

Section 2. The person upon whose complaint any warrant of arrest is issued, or at whose request any indictment has been issued, against any person, shall advise the Chief of Police where the defendant complained of and against whom said warrant of arrest has been issued, or against whom said indictment is returned, may be, or has been apprehended, and it shall thereupon be the duty of the Chief of Police to advise the said person upon whose complaint any warrant of arrest has been issued, or upon whose complaint any indictment has been returned, as to the amount necessary to defray the cost of returning said defendant charged or indicted to the City and County of San Francisco for arraignment, preliminary hearing and/or trial, and if said person desires said defendant against whom said warrant has been issued, or against whom said indictment has been returned, to be returned to the City and County of San Francisco for arraignment, preliminary hearing and/or trial, he shall deposit with the Chief of Police the amount so specified, and it shall thereupon be the duty of the Chief of Police to cause said defendant for whom said warrant has been issued, or against whom said indictment has been returned, to be returned to the City and County of San Francisco.

Section 3. Upon the return of said defendant to the City and County of San Francisco it shall be the duty of the District Attorney to provide for the proper arraignment of said defendant, for his preliminary examination and trial, if held for trial.

Section 4. When any defendant for whom a warrant has been issued, or against whom an indictment has been returned has had a preliminary examination, or has pleaded guilty to the offense charged against him, either in the complaint filed against him or in the indictment returned against him, or has been tried for said offense, then the person at whose request said person was returned to the City and County of San Francisco shall be entitled to be reimbursed for the amount of money deposited with the Chief of Police to defray the cost of returning said defendant to the City and County of San Francisco, and it shall be the duty of the Chief of Police to approve the payment of said sum, and the Controller to draw his warrant therefor from such funds as are available for the purpose, in favor of said person at whose request said defendant was returned, and the Treasurer shall pay the same. No person who refuses to aid in the prosecution of said defendant, or to testify as to the matters which are complained against said defendant, or who settles or compromises, or agrees to settle or compromise any claim, which is, or may be the basis of charges against said defendant, or who agrees to the dismissal of said charges, shall be reimbursed for any deposit with the Chief of Police except with the approval of said Chief.

Section 5. It shall not be obligatory upon the Chief of Police to accept any amount offered to defray the cost of returning any defendant in conformity with the provisions of this ordinance, and the Chief of Police shall cooperate in the returning of said defendant only when

he is of the opinion that the ends of justice will be served by said return, and he may at all times exercise his sound discretion as to the return of any defendant.

Section 6. Nothing in this ordinance contained shall in any way abridge, set aside or render inoperative any provision of the Penal Code or of any other law or statute of the State of California dealing with the apprehension, arrest, extradition or return for trial of any person charged with crime, but this ordinance shall be deemed to be supplemental and in aid of all existing laws and statutes.

Approved as to form by the City Attorney.

On motion by Supervisor MacPhee, pursuant to request by the Controller, the foregoing bill was *re-referred to Committee*.

Passed for Second Reading.

### Amending Ordinance Creating Coordinating Council.

(Series of 1939)

Bill No. 2859, Ordinance No. . . . . , as follows:

Amending Bill No. 1792, Ordinance No. 19.101, entitled "Creating commission to be known as the Coordinating Council for the purpose of furthering the cooperation and coordination among the public departments and between the public departments and social agencies in a more effective program for the youth of San Francisco," by amending Section 1 thereof designating the members of said Council; by amending Section 2 thereof, relating to qualifications of the administrative head of said Council and his assistants; by amending Section 3, to provide for inclusion in the Annual Appropriation Ordinance of an amount not in excess of \$5,400 for such additional employments as in the discretion of the Council are necessary to develop and expand the work of District Councils, and amending Section 9 relating to appointments of members to conform to Section 1 as amended.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco, as follows:

Section 1. Sections 1, 2, 3 and 9 of Bill No. 1792, Ordinance No. 19.101, the title of which is recited above, are hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 1. There is hereby created a Coordinating Council to be appointed by the Mayor. The Coordinating Council shall consist of the Chief of Police, *the District Attorney*, the Chief Probation Officer of the Juvenile Court, the Superintendent of Public Schools, the Superintendent of the Recreation Department, and five additional members *who are not at the time of their appointment, by the Mayor, officials or employees of the City and County of San Francisco, and who shall be qualified to serve by reason of their knowledge and experience in the coordinating of youth activities.*

Section 2. All members of the Coordinating Council shall serve without compensation except in so far as compensation is provided for other official positions which said persons may hold.

Said Coordinating Council shall, pursuant to the provisions of Subdivision (h) of Section 19 of the Charter, appoint a Secretary who shall not be subject to the civil service provisions of the Charter and who shall hold office at the pleasure of said Coordinating Council. Said Secretary shall be the administrative head of said Council and shall have all the powers and duties of a department head as provided for in Section 20 of the Charter. Said administrative head shall, with the approval of said Coordinating Council, pursuant to the civil service and budgetary provisions of the Charter, appoint such addi-

tional employees as may be necessary to conduct the affairs of said Coordinating Council.

The salary of the said Secretary shall be fixed by the Coordinating Council in accordance with the budgetary provisions of the Charter.

*The administrative head and his assistants shall be selected from among persons whose training and experience qualify them for organization and leadership in community service activities.*

Section 3. Upon the recommendation of the Mayor and the approval of the Board of Supervisors, an amount not to exceed seven thousand five hundred dollars (\$7,500) shall be appropriated each year to said Coordinating Council for the purpose of defraying cost of carrying on its work, which said cost shall include salaries and all other expenses incidental to the work; *provided, however, that there shall be included in the Annual Appropriation Ordinance such amount, not in excess of \$5,400 as will provide such full time or part time workers, not in excess of three, as are deemed necessary by the Council to assist the Secretary in developing and expanding the work of the district councils.*

Section 9. Whenever any of the officials of the City and County of San Francisco who are made ex-officio members of the Coordinating Council shall cease to hold their official positions as such officers then, in that event, their membership in said Coordinating Council shall cease and determine and their respective successors shall be appointed to succeed them as members of said Council.

*The five undesignated members of the Council which, pursuant to Section 1 hereof the Mayor is authorized to appoint, shall be appointed to serve for a period of four years, under such plan as to staggering of appointments as shall be prescribed by the Mayor.*

May 1, 1944—Consideration continued until Monday, May 8, 1944.

#### Amendment.

Supervisor MacPhee, in discussing the foregoing bill, announced that it met with the approval of the Mayor and the Chief Administrative Officer, with one or two exceptions. The proposed amendments were recommended by the Judiciary Committee. The bill as presented provided that the Coordinating Committee should include, among other members, the Director of Public Welfare and the Director of the Bureau of Child Hygiene of the Department of Public Health, and seven additional members, who "are not at the time of the appointment, by the Mayor, officials or employees of the City and County of San Francisco." The Judiciary Committee was recommending the deletion of the Director of Public Welfare and the Director of the Bureau of Child Hygiene of the Department of Public Health, and the reduction of the seven additional members, to five additional members. The elimination of the word "seven" in the second paragraph of Section 9, and the substitution therefor of the word "five" was also necessary.

No objection, and amendment *approved*.

Thereupon, the Clerk presented and read to the Board, communication from the Civil Service Commission, quoting paragraph 3 of Section 2, of the proposed legislation, which read, as presented, as follows:

"The salary of the said Secretary shall be fixed by the Coordinating Council in accordance with the budgetary provisions of the Charter, but in no event shall said salary exceed the sum of four thousand dollars (\$4,000) per year."



The Commission called attention to the fact that the position of Secretary to the Coordinating Council was subject to the salary standardization provisions of the Charter and, therefore, the foregoing provision was not a proper part of the proposed ordinance.

Thereupon, Supervisor MacPhee moved that the entire third paragraph of Section 2 be eliminated.

Supervisor Mancuso suggested that instead of eliminating the entire paragraph, there be eliminated only the wording as follows: "but in no event shall said salary exceed the sum of four thousand dollars (\$4,000) per year."

Whereupon, Supervisor MacPhee changed his motion, and moved, in accordance with the foregoing suggestion, that there be eliminated the words: "but in no event shall said salary exceed the sum of four thousand dollars (\$4,000) per year." Motion seconded by Supervisor Mancuso.

No objection, and motion *carried*.

Thereupon, the roll was called, and Bill No. 2859, as amended, and reading as above, was *Passed for Second Reading* by the following vote:

#### Passed for Second Reading.

**Amending Ordinance 1892 (Series of 1939) to Provide that Chief Administrative Officer Shall Make Report to the Board as to Compliance With Provisions of Permits and Franchises by the Holders Thereof Annually Instead of Quarterly.**

(Series of 1939)

Bill No. 2884, Ordinance No. . . . . ., as follows:

Amending Bill No. 1979, Ordinance No. 1892 (Series of 1939), entitled: "Conferring upon the Chief Administrative Officer and upon the Controller certain powers and duties relative to the examination of the provisions of franchises and permits over which the Board of Supervisors has jurisdiction or control heretofore and which may hereafter be granted and issued to various persons, firms and corporations for the conduct of certain callings, and for the use and occupation of public streets, ways and places," by providing that the Chief Administrative Officer and the Controller shall file an annual report with the Board of Supervisors instead of a quarterly report.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco, as follows:

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NOTE: Amendments are indicated by *light face italics*. Cancellations are set out in **bold face** and bracketed [ ].

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Section 1. That this Board of Supervisors under and pursuant to the power and authority vested in said Board by Section 9 of the Charter of the City and County of San Francisco, does hereby confer upon the Chief Administrative Officer of the City and County of San Francisco the power and authority to examine all and singular, the provisions, covenants and obligations contained in the several franchises and permits heretofore and which may hereafter be issued or granted to any person, firm or corporation for the conduct of any business or calling over which the Board of Supervisors has jurisdiction or control, or for the use and/or occupation of any public street, way or place insofar as said provisions, covenants and obligations contained in said franchises and permits pertain to or affect public streets, traffic, health and safety and commencing July 1, 1941, it shall be the duty of

the Chief Administrative Officer to file [a quarterly] an annual report with the Board of Supervisors showing in detail the manner in which the holders of said franchises and/or permits are complying or failing to comply with the provisions, covenants and obligations contained in or imposed by said franchises or permits.

*Section 2. It shall be the duty of the Chief Administrative Officer to investigate and to file with the Board of Supervisors from time to time, at least annually, a report showing the name and address of each person, firm or corporation ascertained to be engaged in or to maintain, without a permit or franchise, such a business or enterprise as under the law requires a permit or franchise for its conduct, maintenance or operation, as well as a statement showing the various franchises and permits which have become inoperative, suspended or void for non-user, for failure to pay required fees or for any other reason.*

Section 3. Under and pursuant to the power and authority vested in this Board of Supervisors by Section 9 of the Charter of the City and County of San Francisco, said Board of Supervisors does hereby confer upon the Controller of the City and County of San Francisco the power and authority to examine all and singular, the provisions, covenants and obligations contained in the several franchises and permits heretofore and which may hereafter be issued or granted to any person, firm or corporation for the conduct of any business or calling over which the Board of Supervisors has jurisdiction or control or for the use and/or occupation of any public street, way or place insofar as said provisions, covenants and obligations contained in said franchises and permits pertain to finance or the payment by the holders of said franchises or permits to the City and County of San Francisco of money or other thing of value and commencing July 1, 1941, it shall be the duty of the Controller to file [a quarterly] an annual report with the Board of Supervisors showing in detail the manner in which the holders of said franchises and/or permits are complying or failing to comply with said provisions, covenants and obligations contained in or imposed by said franchises or permits.

Approved as to form by the City Attorney.

## CONSIDERATION OF MAYOR'S VETO.

### Consideration Continued.

The following proposal, adopted by the Board of Supervisors, on Monday, April 10, 1944, and sent to his Honor the Mayor, for his approval or disapproval, was returned by him on April 24, 1944, with his disapproval noted thereon:

**Endorsing Request of Central Council of Civic Clubs That Presiding Judge of Federal District Court Adopt Rules to Provide for a Fair Cross-Section Representation of the Community as Jurors.**

(Series of 1939)

Proposal No. 3929 Resolution No. . . . ., as follows:

Whereas, it has been represented to the Board of Supervisors by the Central Council of Civic Clubs that after investigation and examination of the present methods used to select trial jurors in the local Federal District Court that no rules are prescribed by the judges to guide the clerk and jury commissioner in making their selections of jurors as is done in our local State Superior Court; that one woman is pur-

posely selected for every four men on the panel instead of an equal proportion and that jurors are selected almost entirely from one class of our citizens so that little or no representation is given to working men or their wives who constitute the greater part of our citizens; and

Whereas, the Central Council of Civic Clubs by motion respectfully requested the Presiding Judge of the local Federal District Court to call a meeting of the Judges to adopt rules to govern the selection of trial jurors for that Court so as to bring about a fair cross-section of all classes of our citizens as jurors; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Board of Supervisors, if the condition complained of is as stated, endorse the request of the Central Council of Civic Clubs requesting said Presiding Judge to give consideration to the adoption of such rules as will provide for a fair cross-section representation of the community as jurors without favoring or excluding any one group because of sex, race, occupation, wealth or social position and to be fairly distributed among different geographic sections.

*Monday, April 24, 1944, ordered held on file.*

*Monday, May 1, 1944—Consideration postponed until Monday, May 8, 1944.*

Pursuant to request by Mr. Allen Spivock, there being no objection, *consideration was postponed until Monday, May 15, 1944.*

Whereas, Mr. Marckley, as a member of the American Legion, was past commander of the San Francisco County Council, charter member of George Washington Post 144 and also had served as vice departmental commander of the State and was a member of Post 1205, Veterans of Foreign Wars; and

Whereas, as chairman of the San Francisco War Council's Hospitality House Committee, Mr. Marckley was active in the campaign to provide lodgings for the thousands of service men visiting the City and County of San Francisco on leave; and

Whereas, prominent both in State and City Masonic circles, Mr. Marckley was a life member of California Bodies Scottish Rite, a member of Islam Temple of the Shrine and was past Grand High Priest for the Royal Arch Masons of the State; and

Whereas, the passing of Claudius A. Marckley results in a great loss to the community and he will be sorely missed by his bereaved family and the many friends who loved and respected him; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That this Board of Supervisors does adjourn its meeting this day out of respect to the memory of the late Claudius A. Marckley; and the Clerk is hereby directed to forward to Mrs. Minnie Stewart Marckley, wife of the late Claudius A. Marckley, a suitable copy of this resolution as an expression of the Board's deep sympathy and heartfelt condolence.

#### **Opposing Acquisition of Market Street Railway.**

Supervisor Uhl called attention to two editorials in the San Francisco News, urging an "Aye" vote on the Charter Amendment to provide for the acquisition of the Market Street Railway. In the same issue, he stated, was printed also leaflet which he has submitted to the public opposing the approval of that Charter Amendment, and he believed that his statement would aid in the defeat of the proposal.

#### **Public Hearing of the Budget.**

Supervisor MacPhee moved that the Board recess, to reconvene on Tuesday, May 9, 1944, at 2:00 p. m. for the purpose of hearing the expressions of the public as to the budget for the coming fiscal year.

No objection, and *so ordered.*

Supervisor MacPhee moved that the date for presentation of supplemental budget requests be extended from May 10 to May 15, 1944.

On being informed by the Clerk that the date of May 10, beyond which supplemental budget requests could not be received, had been set by ordinance and could, therefore, be changed only by ordinance, and that there was not a sufficient number of Supervisors present to pass such an amendment as an emergency measure so that it could become effective immediately, Supervisor MacPhee did not press his motion.

**ADJOURNMENT.**

There being no further business, the Board, on motion by Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Sullivan, at the hour of 3:28 p. m., adjourned.

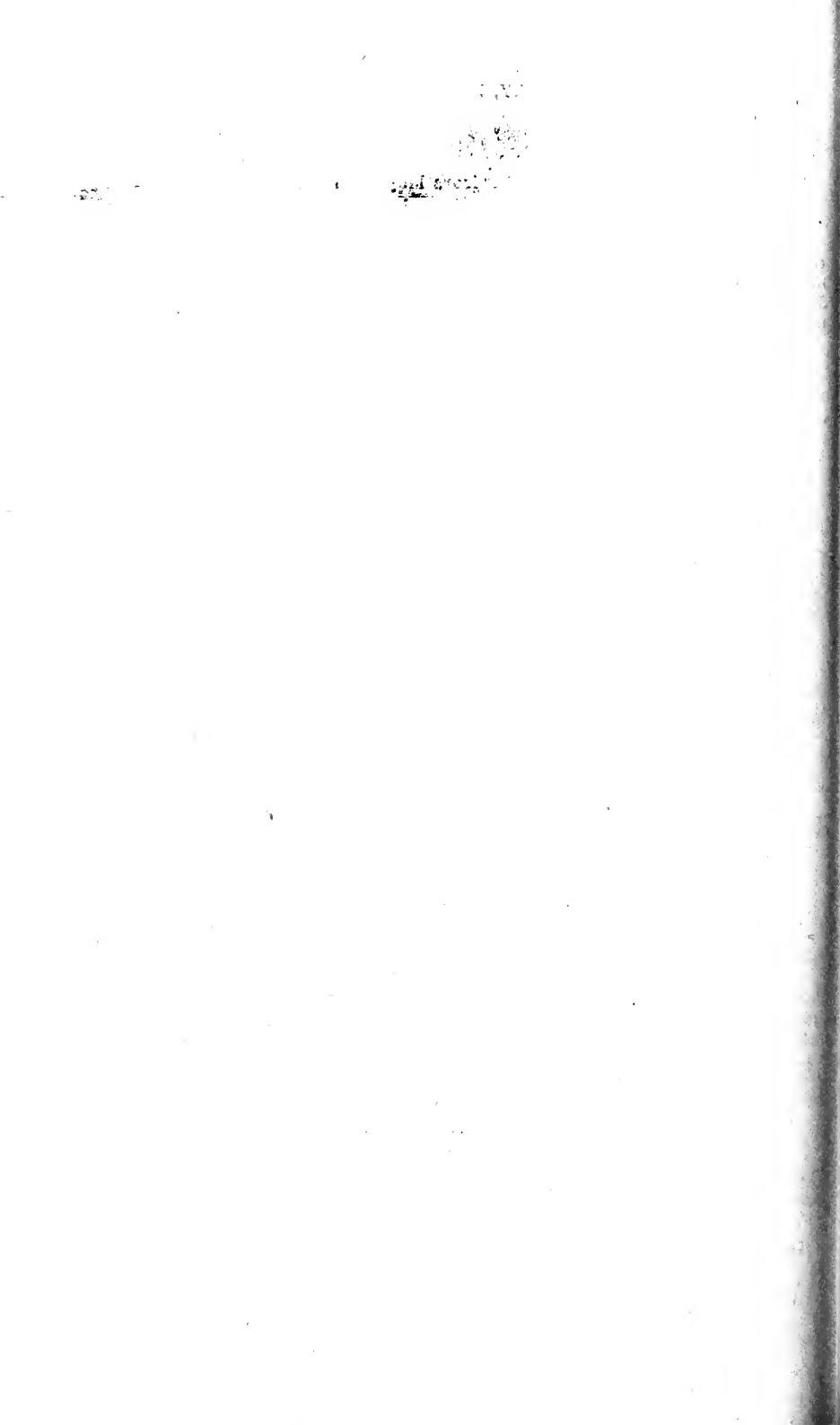

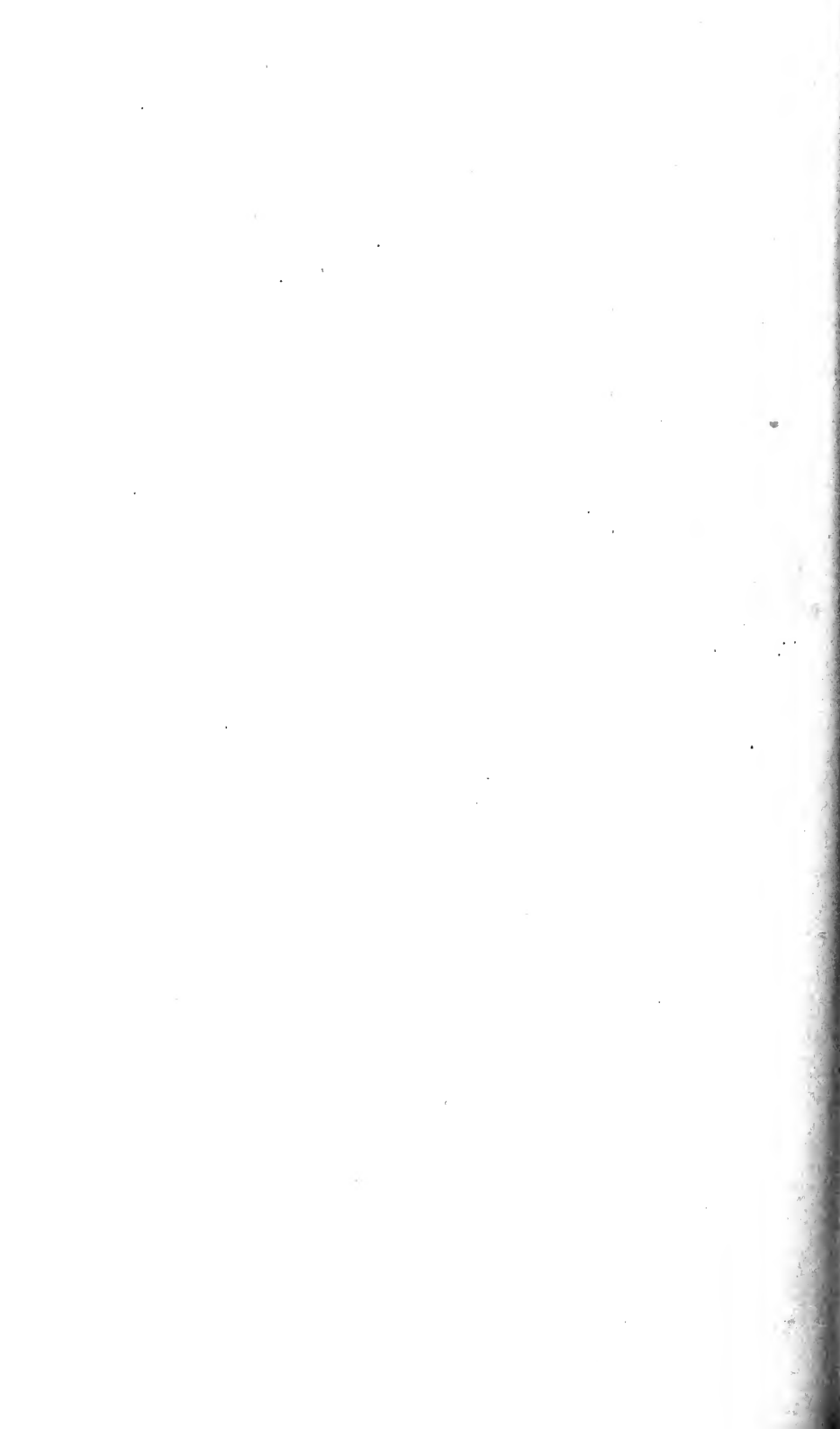

2. The Army and/or Navy will furnish the City and County with copies of plans and specifications of construction or remodeling work when such plans and specifications are completed;

3. The Army and/or the Navy will invite inspection of construction done in accordance with such plans and specifications;

4. The Army and/or the Navy agree to abide by and follow, insofar as restrictions contained in directives from higher authority and in rules and regulations pertaining to use of strategic materials permit, suggestions of city inspection bureaus and provisions of local ordinances and state laws regarding building construction;

5. Departments of the City and County concerned with regulation of building construction agree to cooperate with the Army and Navy by assisting in making building plans that will result in safe construction and by inspecting Army and Navy building projects while under construction, and by waiving certain formalities with regard to applications for building permits and payment of building permit fees by the Army and Navy; therefore be it

Resolved, That this Board of Supervisors does hereby approve said operating understanding as an emergency arrangement calculated to further the war effort and protect the lives and property of San Francisco residents, such approval being only for the duration of the war emergency; and be it

**Amending Municipal Code—Providing for Regulation of Auctioneers and Auction Sales.**

(Series of 1939)

Bill No. 2848, Ordinance No. . . . ., as follows:

Amending Article 17, Chapter VIII, Part II of the San Francisco Municipal Code, relating to auctioneers, by amending the following sections thereof: Section 1245, Exceptions; Section 1246, Bona Fide Closing-Out Sales—Permits for Auction Sales; Section 1247, Verified Inventory—Filing With Application; Section 1256, Time of Holding Sale—Exceptions, and by adding a new section to be known as Section 1250(a), Relating to Residential Requirements and to Annual or Semi-Annual Auctions of Agricultural Commodities When Such Auctions Are Conducted by Bona Fide Producers' Cooperatives or Producers' Associations.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco, as follows:

NOTE: Amendments are indicated by *light face italics*. Cancellations are set out in **bold face** and bracketed [  **]**.

Section 1. Article 17, Chapter VIII, Part II of the San Francisco Municipal Code is hereby amended by amending Sections 1245, 1246, 1247 and 1256, thereof, and by adding a new section to be known as Section 1250(a), to read as follows:

**SEC. 1245. Exceptions.** The provisions of Section 1244 shall not apply to household furniture, vehicles, automobiles, machinery, *fixtures and store equipment*, livestock and such bulky articles as have been usually sold in warehouses, or in the public streets or on the wharves, *or to goods placed in a warehouse or storeroom by a duly licensed auctioneer for convenience or necessity of the sale of such goods by auction.*

**SEC. 1246. Bona Fide Closing-Out Sales—Permits for Auction Sales.** The provisions of Section 1244 shall not apply to any bona fide sale of a stock of merchandise by public auction where the owner thereof or the creditors of the owner are engaged in the legitimate closing out of the business **[of such owner]** and such sale is held upon the premises where the business **[of the owner]** has been carried on for not less than one (1) year immediately preceding such sale; provided, however, that no public auction shall be conducted under the provisions of this section unless **[the owners or the creditors of the owners shall first obtain]** a permit *is first obtained* from the **[Police Commission]** *Chief of Police* **[which Commission]** *who* may grant the permit applied for or in **[its]** *his* discretion and in the event in **[its]** *his* judgment the public interest so requires, **[they]** *he* may deny the same. The **[Police Commission]** *Chief of Police* may designate the number of days that the said auction sale may be conducted and in no case shall the sale continue for a period longer than thirty (30) calendar days at any one time; provided, that in no event shall any stock of merchandise or other personal property be offered for sale or sold at said auction unless the same has been upon the said premises **[and owned by said applicant]** for a period of not less than ninety (90) days prior to the filing of said application.

**SEC. 1247. Verified Inventory—Filing With Application.** In all cases where a public auction sale is held under provisions of Section 1246 of this Article, **[the owner or creditor of the owner must**

**make**] an inventory of the stock of merchandise on the premises which is to be sold at public auction **[and must submit said inventory]** *must be made and submitted* to the **[Police Commission]** *Chief of Police* at the time of the filing of the application as provided for in Section 1246 of this Article.

The inventory required by this section must show the items of merchandise contained in the stock to be offered for sale on the premises by public auction and the said **[owner or creditors of the owner]** applicant must make and subscribe an oath to be attached to the inventory that said inventory contains a true and itemized account of all property to be sold at said auction, that all of said merchandise so inventoried has been **[owned by said applicant]** located on *the premises* for not less than ninety (90) days next immediately preceding the filing of said application, and that the same is a bona fide closing out of the business **[of the said owner and the owner intends to retire from said business.]** No property or merchandise shall be sold under the provisions of Section 1246 of this Article except those items shown in the inventory provided for herein.

*SEC. 1250 (a). No person shall be granted an auctioneer's license who has not been a bona fide resident of the City and County of San Francisco for a period of one year prior to making application with the exception of any person who did hold a license on January 2, 1944. This requirement shall not be applicable to any annual or semi-annual auctions of agricultural commodities when such auctions are conducted by bona fide producers' cooperatives or producers' associations.*

**SEC. 1256. Time of Holding Sale — Exceptions.** All sales of goods, wares or merchandise by public auction must be made between the hours of 7 o'clock AM and 7 o'clock PM, and no such sales can be made on Sundays or **[legal holidays]** *the following holidays: New Year's Day, Washington's Birthday, Decoration Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Admission Day, (when the celebration is in San Francisco), Thanksgiving and Christmas;* provided, however, that the **[Police Commission]** *Chief of Police* may grant a special permit for such a limited period of time as the **[Police Commission]** *Chief of Police* shall fix for the sale by public auction of books, prints or paintings, or goods sold in the original packages as imported, according to a printed catalogue, of which samples must have been opened and exposed to public inspection at least one (1) day previous to the sale, at an hour or hours later than 7 o'clock PM to be specified in said permit, and provided that any such permit may be revoked by the **[Police Commission]** *Chief of Police* for the reasons and in the manner provided in Section 1254 of this Article for the revocation of a permit.

**Providing for the Placing of the San Francisco Police Pistol Range Under the Jurisdiction of the Police Department, Defining the Purposes for Which and by Whom It May Be Used, Creating a Pistol Range Fund, and Prescribing Fees to Be Charged, and Authorizing Acceptance of Prizes.**

(Series of 1939)

Bill No. 2887, Ordinance No. . . . ., as follows: .

Providing for the placing of the San Francisco Police Pistol Range under the jurisdiction of the Police Department, defining the purposes for which and by whom it may be used, creating a pistol range fund, and prescribing fees to be charged, and authorizing acceptance of prizes.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco, as follows:

Section 1. The pistol range located near the Skyline and Lake Merced Boulevards, in the City and County of San Francisco, is hereby placed under the jurisdiction and management of the Police Department.

Section 2. The said pistol range may be used for the following purposes:

- (a) To instruct, train and qualify regular members of the San Francisco Police Department, auxiliary civilian defense police in good standing, patrol special police officers, and such other law enforcement officers who in the judgment of the Chief of Police cooperate or may be called upon to cooperate with the San Francisco Police Department in the apprehension of criminals or the maintenance of peace in the City and County of San Francisco;
- (b) To instruct and train individuals and members of clubs, organizations and associations not included in subdivision "a" of this section, who may be interested in the proficient use of firearms;
- (c) To conduct firearms tournaments by the San Francisco Police Department.

Section 3. The following range fees, in connection with the use of said pistol range, shall be charged and collected in advance:

- (a) For each singular use of the range by an individual in firearm practice with a minimum time allowance of one (1) hour, a range fee of fifty (50) cents;

Section 4. The following tournament fees, in connection with the use of said pistol range, shall be charged and collected in advance:

For each Class A tournament a registration fee of fifty (50) cents per person and an entry fee of one (1) dollar per person for each match.

For each Class B or Class C tournament a registration fee of twenty-five (25) cents per person and an entry fee of fifty (50) cents for each match per person.

Section 5. Should the foregoing fees, or any portion thereof, be subject or become subject to tax, the amount of said tax shall be collected in addition to the said fees.

Section 6. Range fees, provided for in section 3 of this ordinance, shall not be charged nor collected from persons authorized to use the pistol range under the provisions of subdivision "a" of section 2 of this ordinance.

Section 7. A "Police Range Fund" is hereby created and all fees collected pursuant to the provisions of this ordinance shall be handled in conformity with the provisions of section 82 of the charter and shall be deposited in the said "Police Range Fund."

Section 8. The Police Department of the City and County of San Francisco is hereby authorized to hold membership in the National Rifle Association and the cost of the said membership shall be paid from such funds as may be appropriated or set aside for that purpose.

Section 9. The Chief of Police is also authorized to collect and receive registration fees prescribed by the Rules and Regulations of the National Rifle Association and on behalf of said Association in connection with the holding of the firearms tournaments. The said fees shall be deposited in and paid from the "Police Range Fund."

Section 10. Trophies, medals, and prizes, awarded in tournaments, shall be purchased with money in the "Police Range Fund."

Section 11. The acceptance by the Chief of Police, with the approval of the Police Commission, of trophies, medals, gifts and donations for

use in connection with the operation of the said pistol range or the conduct of matches or tournaments is hereby authorized.

Section 12. The Chief of Police, with the approval of the Police Commission, is hereby authorized to adopt, promulgate and enforce such rules and regulations regarding said pistol range, the operation thereof, firing thereon, and the course of said firing, as will enable him to enforce and carry out the meaning and intent of this ordinance.

Section 13. The Chief of Police, through the Purchaser of Supplies, shall procure such insurance as may be necessary to protect the City and County of San Francisco against claims and suits which may be brought against it because of injury to person or damage to property arising out of the maintenance, operation or control of said pistol range, out of such funds as may be appropriated or set aside for that purpose.

### Regulating Pedestrians' Limited Right to Use of Roadway.

(Series of 1939)

Bill No. 2886, Ordinance No. . . . . ., as follows:

An ordinance amending the San Francisco Municipal Code, Part II, Chapter XI, Article IV (Traffic Code), by adding thereto new sections to be known as Section 75(a) and Section 75(b), regulating a pedestrian's limited right to use of roadway.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco, as follows:

Section 1. Part II, Chapter XI, Article IV of the San Francisco Municipal Code, is hereby amended by adding thereto Section 75(a) and Section 75(b), to read as follows:

Section 75(a). Pedestrian's Limited Right to Use of Roadway. When within traffic zone one or a business district, no pedestrian shall cross a roadway other than by a crosswalk.

Outside of traffic zone one or a business district no pedestrian shall cross a roadway other than by a route at right angles to the curb.

Section 75(b). Violation not negligence as a matter of law. In any civil action proof of violation of Section (a) hereof at a particular time and place shall not establish negligence as a matter of law, but in all civil actions it shall be necessary to establish as a fact that the act of a pedestrian crossing a roadway in a manner prohibited by subdivision (a) constituted negligence.

Section 1. Section 2 of Ordinance No. 5464 (New Series), above captioned, and now known, designated and codified as Section 2 of Article I, Chapter II, Part II of the San Francisco Municipal Code, is hereby amended to read as follows:

SEC. 2. **Use Districts.** For the purpose of regulating and establishing the location of trades and industries, businesses, dwellings and the location of buildings designed for specific uses, the City and County of San Francisco is hereby divided into six (6) classes of districts: (1) First Residential District; (2) Second Residential District; (3) Commercial District; (4) Light Industrial District; (5) Heavy Industrial District; (6) Unrestricted District, as shown on the use of property zone maps, Sections 1 to 14, inclusive, which accompany the original enactment and are hereby declared to be part hereof.

Property Zone Maps Nos. 5A and 6A are hereby substituted for Property Zone Maps Nos. 5 and 6, and said maps 5A and 6A shall hereafter be deemed to show the respective specific uses of property embraced within the respective areas shown on said maps.

The use districts designated on *Zone Maps 1 to 4, 5A, 6A and 7 to 14, inclusive*, are hereby established. The use of property zone map designations which accompany said use of property zone maps are hereby declared to be part hereof. No building or premises shall be erected or used for any purpose other than a purpose permitted in the use district in which such building or premises are located.

Approved as to form by the City Attorney.

On motion by Supervisor Uhl, the foregoing bill was *referred to the City Planning Commission*.

### CONSIDERATION OF MAYOR'S VETO.

Veto Sustained.

The following proposal, adopted by the Board of Supervisors, on Monday, April 10, 1944, and sent to his Honor the Mayor, for his approval or disapproval, was returned by him on April 24, 1944, with his disapproval noted thereon:

**Endorsing Request of Central Council of Civic Clubs That Presiding Judge of Federal District Court Adopt Rules to Provide for a Fair Cross-Section Representation of the Community as Jurors.**

(Series of 1939)

Proposal No. 3929, Resolution No. . . . ., as follows:

Whereas, it has been represented to the Board of Supervisors by the Central Council of Civic Clubs that after investigation and examination of the present methods used to select trial jurors in the local Federal District Court that no rules are prescribed by the judges to guide the clerk and jury commissioner in making their selections of jurors as is done in our local State Superior Court; that one woman is purposely selected for every four men on the panel instead of an equal proportion and that jurors are selected almost entirely from one class of our citizens so that little or no representation is given to working men or their wives who constitute the greater part of our citizens; and

Whereas, the Central Council of Civic Clubs by motion respectfully requested the Presiding Judge of the local Federal District Court to

call a meeting of the Judges to adopt rules to govern the selection of trial jurors for that Court so as to bring about a fair cross-section of all classes of our citizens as jurors; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Board of Supervisors, if the condition complained of is as stated, endorse the request of the Central Council of Civic Clubs requesting said Presiding Judge to give consideration to the adoption of such rules as will provide for a fair cross-section representation of the community as jurors without favoring or excluding any one group because of sex, race, occupation, wealth or social position and to be fairly distributed among different geographic sections.

*Monday, April 24, 1944, ordered held on file.*

#### Privilege of the Floor.

Mr. Allen Spivock, representing the Central Council of Civic Clubs, having been granted the privilege of the floor, on motion by Supervisor Green, urged that the Mayor's veto be not sustained. The proposal which the Mayor had vetoed was merely an endorsement of the request of the Central Council of Civic Clubs. As to the declaration of policy to which the Mayor had referred in his veto message, the Board was not bound by that. Only four of the Supervisors who had voted for adoption of that policy were now members of the Board; certainly the present Board could not be bound by the votes of those four members. Moreover, the resolution previously adopted by the Board refers to controversial matters; there is no controversy in the proposal under discussion.

Mrs. Field, president of State and County Federation of Women's Clubs, also urged that the Mayor's veto be not sustained.

Mr. Eugene Pfaeffle opposed the proposal. He had served on federal juries and had never seen any discrimination shown.

#### In Hands of the Board.

On motion by Supervisor Brown, seconded by Supervisor Mancuso, there being no objection, the matter was taken into the hands of the Board.

Supervisor Mead, in urging the Board to override the Mayor's veto, questioned the right of the Mayor to say that the Board of Supervisors should not offer constructive suggestions to the federal courts or to anyone else. He believed the Mayor was too hasty in vetoing the resolution, and he urged that the veto be overridden.

Supervisor Colman agreed with the views expressed by the Mayor. The powers of the Board of Supervisors were pretty well defined in the Charter. The Supervisors were elected by the people in accordance with that basic law. Their duties do not include jurisdiction over the federal courts. The Supervisors were not trained nor competent to consider such recommendation to the federal courts. Attorneys would be qualified, if they so desired, to suggest change of procedure in the federal courts.

Supervisor Brown urged that the Mayor's veto be sustained. The Board of Supervisors would not welcome comments as to how it should conduct its own affairs. The juries selected are fair and impartial, and he could see no reason for any change in the method of their selection. He intended to vote to sustain the Mayor's veto.

Supervisor Mead, in commenting on the remarks of the previous speakers, declared that Supervisor Colman had left the impression that the Board of Supervisors was interfering with the policy of the fed-

eral courts. The Board was merely offering constructive suggestions, and requesting the federal courts to give the matter their consideration.

Supervisor Brown, in answer to the foregoing statement, announced that he was inclined to believe that Supervisor Mead had become confused between his personal rights and his rights as a member of the Board of Supervisors. He believed the Central Council of Civic Clubs had the right to make such recommendations to the federal courts but not the Board of Supervisors.

Thereupon, the question, "Shall Proposal No. 3929 be approved, notwithstanding the Mayor's objection thereto?" was put, the roll was called and the Mayor's veto was *sustained* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Green, MacPhee, Mead, Meyer, Uhl—5.

Noes: Supervisors Brown, Colman, Gallagher, Gartland, Mancuso, Sullivan—6.

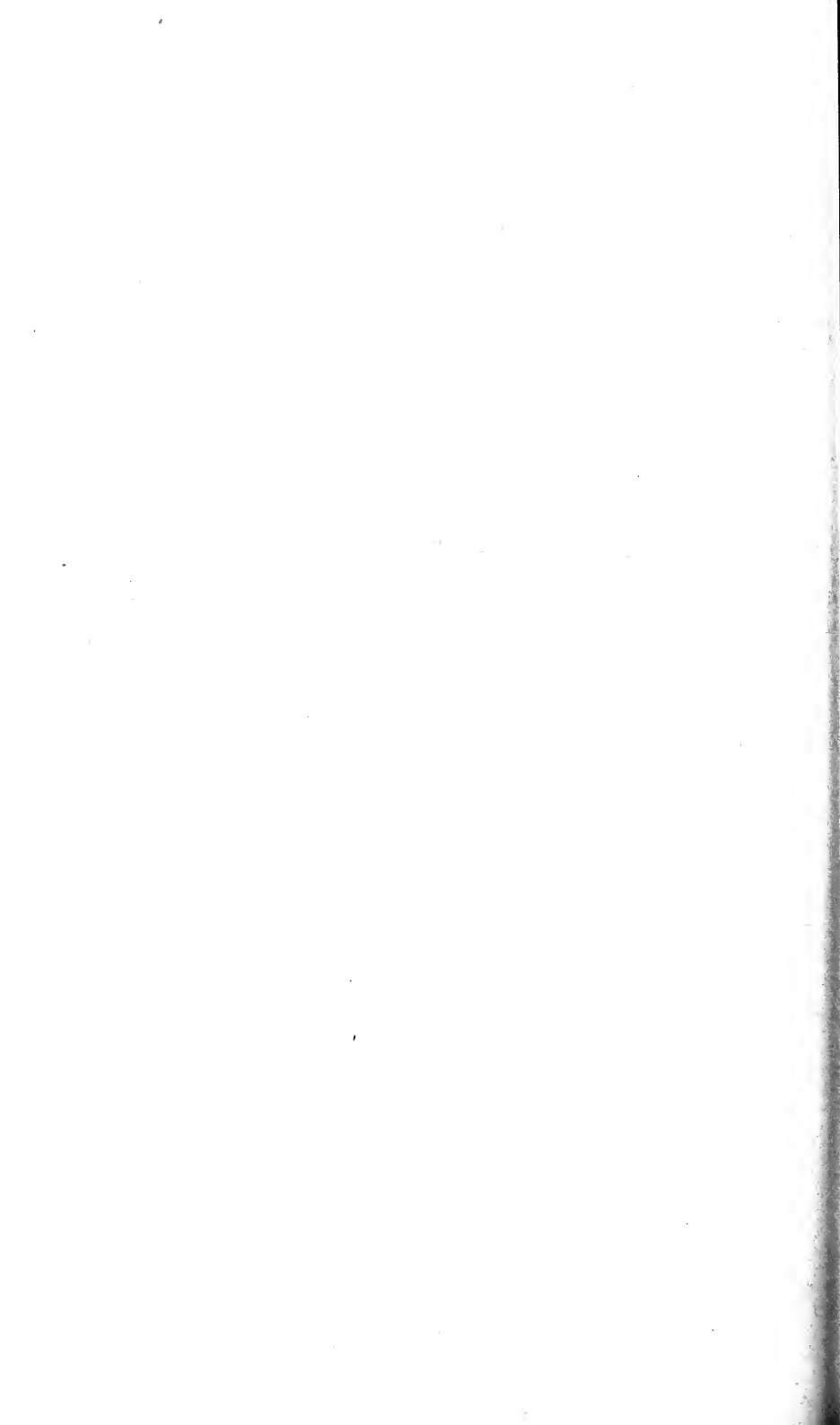

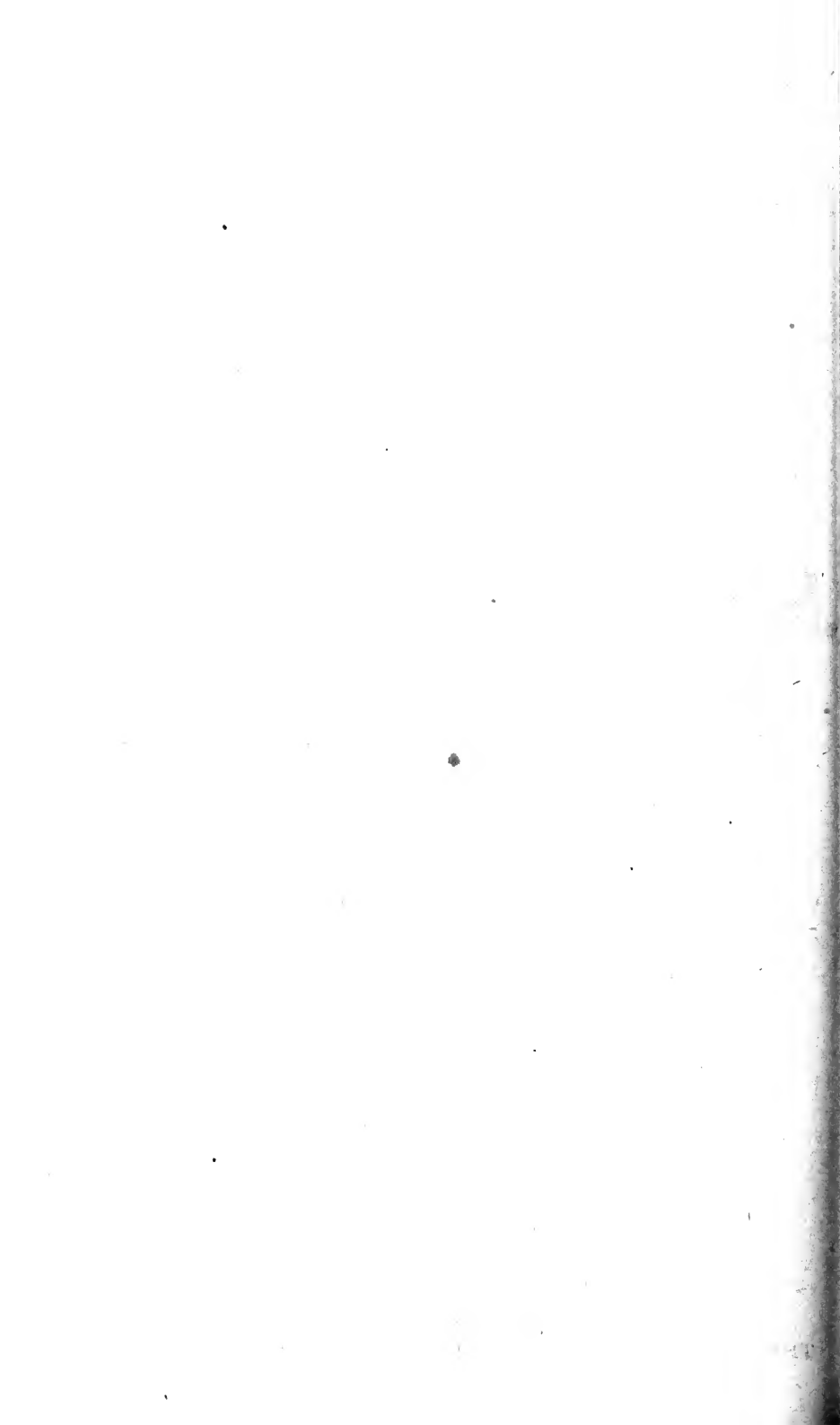

Use Districts.** For the purpose of regulating and establishing the location of trades and industries, businesses, dwellings and the location of buildings designed for specific uses, the City and County of San Francisco is hereby divided into six (6) classes of districts: (1) First Residential District, (2) Second Residential District, (3) Commercial District, (4) Light Industrial District, (5) Heavy Industrial District, (6) Unrestricted District, as shown on the use of property zone maps, Sections 1 to 14, inclusive, which accompany the original enactment and are hereby declared to be part thereof.

*Property Zone Maps Nos. 5A and 6A are hereby substituted for Property Zone Maps Nos. 5 and 6.*

The use districts designated on [said] zone maps 5A and 6A are hereby established. The use of property zone map designations which accompany said use of property zone maps are hereby declared to be part hereof. No building or premises shall be erected or used for any purpose other than a purpose permitted in the use district in which such building or premises are located.

Amending Bill No. 1792, Ordinance No. 19.101, entitled "Creating commission to be known as the Coordinating Council for the purpose



of furthering the cooperation and coordination among the public departments and between the public departments and social agencies in a more effective program for the youth of San Francisco," by amending Section 1 thereof designating the members of said Council; by amending Section 2 thereof, relating to qualifications of the administrative head of said Council and his assistants; by amending Section 3, to provide for inclusion in the Annual Appropriation Ordinance of an amount not in excess of \$5,400 for such additional employments as in the discretion of the Council are necessary to develop and expand the work of District Councils, and amending Section 9 relating to appointments of members to conform to Section 1 as amended.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco, as follows:

Section 1. Sections 1, 2, 3 and 9 of Bill No. 1792, Ordinance No. 19.101, the title of which is recited above, are hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 1. There is hereby created a Coordinating Council to be appointed by the Mayor. The Coordinating Council shall consist of the Chief of Police, *the District Attorney*, the Chief Probation Officer of the Juvenile Court, the Superintendent of Public Schools, the Superintendent of the Recreation Department, and five additional members *who are not at the time of their appointment, by the Mayor, officials or employees of the City and County of San Francisco, and who shall be qualified to serve by reason of their knowledge and experience in the coordinating of youth activities.*

Section 2. All members of the Coordinating Council shall serve without compensation except in so far as compensation is provided for other official positions which said persons may hold.

Said Coordinating Council shall, pursuant to the provisions of Subdivision (h) of Section 19 of the Charter, appoint a Secretary who shall not be subject to the civil service provisions of the Charter and who shall hold office at the pleasure of said Coordinating Council. Said Secretary shall be the administrative head of said Council and shall have all the powers and duties of a department head as provided for in Section 20 of the Charter. Said administrative head shall, with the approval of said Coordinating Council, pursuant to the civil service and budgetary provisions of the Charter, appoint such additional employees as may be necessary to conduct the affairs of said Coordinating Council.

The salary of the said Secretary shall be fixed by the Coordinating Council in accordance with the budgetary provisions of the Charter.

*The administrative head and his assistants shall be selected from among persons whose training and experience qualify them for organization and leadership in community service activities.*

Section 3. Upon the recommendation of the Mayor and the approval of the Board of Supervisors, an amount not to exceed seven thousand five hundred dollars (\$7,500) shall be appropriated each year to said Coordinating Council for the purpose of defraying cost of carrying on its work, which said cost shall include salaries and all other expenses incidental to the work; *provided, however, that there shall be included in the Annual Appropriation Ordinance such amount, not in excess of \$5,400 as will provide such full time or part time workers, not in excess of three, as are deemed necessary by the Council to assist the Secretary in developing and expanding the work of the district councils.*

Section 9. Whenever any of the officials of the City and County of San Francisco who are made ex-officio members of the Coordinating Council shall cease to hold their official positions as such officers then, in that event, their membership in said Coordinating Council shall cease and determine and their respective successors shall be appointed to succeed them as members of said Council.

*The five undesignated members of the Council which, pursuant to Section 1 hereof the Mayor is authorized to appoint, shall be appointed to serve for a period of four years, under such plan as to staggering of appointments as shall be prescribed by the Mayor.*

Amending Bill No. 1979, Ordinance No. 1892 (Series of 1939), entitled: "Conferring upon the Chief Administrative Officer and upon the Controller certain powers and duties relative to the examination of the provisions of franchises and permits over which the Board of Supervisors has jurisdiction or control heretofore and which may hereafter be granted and issued to various persons, firms and corporations for the conduct of certain callings, and for the use and occupation of public streets, ways and places," by providing that the Chief Administrative Officer and the Controller shall file an annual report with the Board of Supervisors instead of a quarterly report.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco, as follows:

NOTE: Amendments are indicated by *light face italics*. Cancellations are set out in **bold face** and bracketed [ ].

Section 1. That this Board of Supervisors under and pursuant to the power and authority vested in said Board by Section 9 of the Charter of the City and County of San Francisco, does hereby confer upon the Chief Administrative Officer of the City and County of San Francisco the power and authority to examine all and singular, the provisions, covenants and obligations contained in the several franchises and permits heretofore and which may hereafter be issued or granted to any person, firm or corporation for the conduct of any business or calling over which the Board of Supervisors has jurisdiction or control, or for the use and/or occupation of any public street, way or place insofar as said provisions, covenants and obligations contained in said franchises and permits pertain to or affect public streets, traffic, health and safety and commencing July 1, 1941, it shall be the duty of the Chief Administrative Officer to file [**a quarterly**] *an annual* report with the Board of Supervisors showing in detail the manner in which the holders of said franchises *and/or* permits are complying or failing to comply with the provisions, covenants and obligations contained in or imposed by said franchises or permits.

Section 2. *It shall be the duty of the Chief Administrative Officer to investigate and to file with the Board of Supervisors from time to time, at least annually, a report showing the name and address of each person, firm or corporation ascertained to be engaged in or to maintain,*

*without a permit or franchise, such a business or enterprise as under the law requires a permit or franchise for its conduct, maintenance or operation, as well as a statement showing the various franchises and permits which have become inoperative, suspended or void for non-user, for failure to pay required fees or for any other reason.*

Section 3. Under and pursuant to the power and authority vested in this Board of Supervisors by Section 9 of the Charter of the City and County of San Francisco, said Board of Supervisors does hereby confer upon the Controller of the City and County of San Francisco the power and authority to examine all and singular, the provisions, covenants and obligations contained in the several franchises and permits heretofore and which may hereafter be issued or granted to any person, firm or corporation for the conduct of any business or calling over which the Board of Supervisors has jurisdiction or control or for the use and/or occupation of any public street, way or place insofar as said provisions, covenants and obligations contained in said franchises and permits pertain to finance or the payment by the holders of said franchises or permits to the City and County of San Francisco of money or other thing of value and commencing July 1, 1941, it shall be the duty of the Controller to file [a quarterly] an annual report with the Board of Supervisors showing in detail the manner in which the holders of said franchises and/or permits are complying or failing to comply with said provisions, covenants and obligations contained in or imposed by said franchises or permits.

Whereas, the high standards of the educational system of our great country will be irreparably damaged with its attendant increase in illiteracy; and

Whereas, many eminent educators have declared themselves as unalterably opposed to the enactment of such a vicious measure; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That this Board of Supervisors does hereby urge his Excellency Governor Earl Warren not to include this ill-advised and destructive proposal in his forthcoming call for a special session of the Legislature and the Clerk of the Board is hereby directed to transmit forthwith a copy of this resolution to Governor Earl Warren.

Property Zone Maps Nos. 5A and 6A are hereby substituted for Property Zone Maps Nos. 5 and 6, and said maps 5A and 6A shall hereafter be deemed to show the respective specific uses of property embraced within the respective areas shown on said maps.

The use districts designated on *Zone Maps 1 to 4, 5A, 6A and 7 to 14, inclusive*, are hereby established. The use of property zone map designations which accompany said use of property zone maps are hereby declared to be part hereof. No building or premises shall be erected or used for any purpose other than a purpose permitted in the use district in which such building or premises are located.

**Continuation of Street Paving Obligation of Market Street Railway  
Irrespective of Negotiations for the Purchase of the Company's  
Operative Properties.**

(Series of 1939)

Supervisor Mancuso presented:

Proposal No. 4030, Resolution No. . . . . ., as follows:

Whereas, the People of the City and County of San Francisco have approved the proposal for the purchase of the operative properties of the Market Street Railway Company and negotiations looking to the consummation of such transfer are now in progress, or presently will be undertaken, to acquire said properties for such sum not in excess of \$7,500,000 as the Mayor and the Public Utilities Commission by contract with the Market Street Railway Company shall agree to; and

Whereas, the cost to the Market Street Railway Company to comply with its paving obligations as prescribed under the terms of its permits and franchises, is estimated in varying amounts up to the sum of \$1,600,000, and there is on file in the office of the Board of Supervisors a communication from the Market Street Railway Company, dated January 12, 1944, confirming a verbal statement of its vice-president, Mr. L. V. Newton, to the effect that the company "contemplated during the year 1944 expending for track, paving and roadway maintenance and improvements a sum at least equal to that spent during the year 1943, namely, \$368,000.00"; and

Whereas, in any effective degree whatsoever, to endeavor to rehabilitate and make traversable the tracks of the Market Street Railway Company and the pavement adjacent thereto, it is imperative that at least the aforementioned sum shall be expended by the company this year, prorated by months and that negotiations for the purchase of the company's property shall not be permitted to interfere with nor deter this vitally necessary work; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That this Board of Supervisors does hereby petition his Honor the Mayor and the Public Utilities Commission and does respectfully request, that the street paving program of the Market Street Railway Company as indicated in its letter of January 12, 1944, be required to progress irrespective of the negotiations for the purchase of the company's operative properties; and be it

Further Resolved, That his Honor the Mayor and the Public Utilities Commission be requested to prepare and hold available, a current estimate of the outstanding obligations of the Market Street Railway Company for paving and that at the execution of the contract for the purchase of the company's properties, such obligation shall be taken into account and a deduction, equal to the balance of such obligation, made from the price fixed as representing the value of the operative properties of the company intended to be purchased by the City and County of San Francisco.

The Board of Supervisors met in recessed session to consider the budget for the fiscal year 1944-1945.

## CALLING THE ROLL.

The roll was called and the following Supervisors were noted present:

Absent: Supervisors Brown, Colman, Green, Mancuso—4.

Quorum present.

President Dan Gallagher presiding.

Supervisor Brown was noted present at 2:55 p. m.

Supervisor Mancuso, who had been excused from attendance at 2:00 p. m., to attend a meeting of the "Committee for Safety for Public Housing in San Francisco Bay Area," at Oakland, was noted present at 4:15 p. m.

Supervisor Colman was excused from attendance.

## Consideration of Budget for Fiscal Year 1944-1945.

Supervisor MacPhee, preliminary to presenting and explaining the budgets of estimated expenses for the various departments of the city government for the fiscal year 1944-1945, announced that the budget had been studied very thoroughly by the Finance Committee and by the Mayor, and it was recommended to the Board in its present form, by the Finance Committee.

Supervisor MacPhee explained the foregoing budget. He announced, however, that there would be a supplemental budget presented to take care of increased costs of advertising and printing, because of increase of rate therefor from 6 cents to 14 cents per line.

### Discussion of Procedure for Budget Consideration.

Supervisor MacPhee, in reply to questioning by Supervisor Uhl, pointed out that the Board, if it desired to consider further any of the departmental budgets which it had previously approved, action on such budgets could be rescinded. Supervisor MacPhee suggested, too, that the Board meet on Saturday, May 20, 1944, to conclude its consideration of the budget. However, Supervisor MacPhee, following statement by the City Attorney that inasmuch as May 21, 1944, the day on which the budget should be adopted was Sunday, the budget could be adopted on the following day, announced that he would move, at the close of the day's deliberations, that consideration of the budget be continued until Monday, May 22, 1944, at 2:00 p. m., and that the Board be under call.

Index No. 13.—*Recreation Commission.*

Mr. Boyd Oliver, representing the people in the Miraloma District,

was, on motion by Supervisor Uhl, granted the privilege of the floor. Mr. Oliver called attention to the need of a playground for the smaller children in his district, and urged that the appropriation of \$10,000 for the purchase of land for said playground, which had been deleted by the Mayor, be restored to the budget.

Miss Henley, of the Parent-Teacher Association, also stressed the need of a playground in the district.

Supervisor MacPhee, in explanation of the recommendation of his Honor the Mayor, announced that there was no intention of not allowing the appropriation for the requested playground; it was a question of how to allow it without taking more property off the tax roll. An effort was to be made to acquire a recreation site by exchange of city-owned property.

Thereupon, on motion by Supervisor MacPhee, further consideration of the budget of the Recreation Commission, Index No. 13, was *continued until Monday, May 22, 1944.*

The Board approved the increased salaries for the carmen and the Mayor's veto of the increased salaries was overridden. The Board of Supervisors, meeting in regular session of the Board, and pursuant to motion by Supervisor MacPhee, continued its consideration of the budget for the fiscal year 1944-1945.

**Budget Consideration.**Index No. 13—*Recreation Commission.*

Supervisor MacPhee reminded the Board of budget item for the Purchase of Land for Miraloma Playground, \$10,000 (Index No. 13, sheet 2, line 15), which remained to be considered. He moved that, inasmuch as the Mayor has stated that he had no objection to the reinstatement of that item, that the amount of \$10,000 for the purchase of land for Miraloma Playground be reinstated in the budget and be approved. Motion seconded by Supervisor Uhl.

Motion *carried* by the following vote:

Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Green, moved approval.

*No objection, and supplemental budget request approved.*

Index No. 2.79—*Civilian War Council.*

Request for supplemental appropriation of \$240 to provide funds for Senior Clerk-Stenographer; eliminate one position of Clerk-Stenographer.

Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Mead, moved approval.

*No objection, and supplemental budget request approved.*

Index No. 2.79—*Civilian War Council.*

Supplemental recommendation that one Assistant Director and one Supervisor of Volunteer Registration be deleted from the budget, and in lieu thereof, in order to redistribute the duties formerly performed



by above employees, that one position held by a General Clerk-Stenographer be reclassified as Senior Clerk-Stenographer.

Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Mead, moved approval.

*No objection* and supplemental budget recommendation *approved*.

Index No. 2.79, sheet 7, line 8, eliminate position of one General Storekeeper, and in lieu thereof, provide for position of General Storekeeper, Services of Other Departments, at \$2,280.

Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Mead, moved approval.

*No objection* and supplemental budget request *approved*.

Index No. 2.79.3, sheet 15, line 15, Contractual Services, Maintenance and Repair of Automobiles, \$2,120; Index No. 2.79.3, sheet 15, line 18, Telephone and Telegraph, \$1,000; Index No. 2.79.3, sheet 16, line 2, Tires and Tubes, \$282; Index No. 2.79.3, sheet 16, line 5, Gas and Oil, \$1,014.

Supplemental budget requests for amounts as indicated were taken up.

His Honor the Mayor reported that while communication reporting the foregoing requested increases for the Air Raid Warden Service had been sent to the Board on May 4, 1944, he had withheld his recommendation. Before acting on the requests, representatives of the Air Raid Warden Service should be permitted to present their views to the Board.

Mr. Eugene Broderick urged approval of the foregoing budget requests. He pointed out the work that the Air Raid Warden Service had done and were continuing to do, and the necessity for approval of the requests if the service were to be continued.

Supervisor Colman called attention to the fact that the budget requests had not received the approval of his Honor the Mayor, and, therefore, there was nothing before the Board.

Thereupon, his Honor the Mayor stated that the letter, as phrased, was not a recommendation. He had withheld his recommendation having in mind the giving of everyone interested an opportunity to be heard on the matter. He had not fully realized, perhaps, that the Charter provided that unless the supplemental budget requests were approved by him the Board of Supervisors could not act on them. Now it was apparent to him that he must decide whether or not to make a recommendation. There is the question of whether the sixteen automobiles involved should be maintained at city expense for the use of the Air Raid Wardens. It is a small item, but there has been criticism of the use of the automobiles. Whether or not the criticism was proper, he was not prepared to say. While the danger of air raids is still with us, it is not so great as it was. He realized that the responsibility of maintaining necessary protective services was his, but he was prepared, at the present time, to recommend only the \$1,000 for the telephones. He was not prepared to recommend the balance of the requests, amounting to \$3,416. As for the automobiles in question, they belong to the city and can be used elsewhere in the city service where the need is greater. There is included in the original budget certain allowances for the upkeep of cars owned by those in the Air Raid Warden Service.

Supervisor Mead, in commenting on the situation, stated his belief that the Air Raid Warden Service should be kept intact until the war should be definitely over. He suggested that further consideration be postponed temporarily in order to give the opportunity of going into it further. He believed the morale of such a group of volunteers as the Air Raid Wardens was worth four or five thousand dollars; that is what the proposal amounts to. He disliked disagreeing with views of

his Honor the Mayor, but he wondered if a little more time might not be given the members of the Board that they might have the opportunity of giving a little more thought to the matter.

His Honor the Mayor, in further discussion, stated that he realized the amount in question was relatively small in dollars and cents; he realized, too, that the Air Raid Wardens have done a good job, and their morale should be maintained. Frankly, though, he would like to see civilian defense streamlined back to regular form of government, and created on a permanent basis as a disaster relief set-up. The Chief of Police is quite willing to take over general supervision. The present appropriations for the upkeep of the cars in question can continue until July 1. If, at that time, there should be any change in the situation that would alter his views of the present, the necessary appropriation could come from the unexpended reserve. In the meantime he was recommending only the \$1,000 for the telephones, and was so endorsing his approval on the letter originally sent to the Board.

Thereupon, Supervisor Colman declared that the only matter before the Board was approval of supplemental budget appropriation of \$1,000 for telephones, as recommended by his Honor the Mayor, and he moved approval thereof.

Mr. Jack Kaufmann, also of the Air Raid Warden Service, questioned how, without the automobiles in question, equipped for service during an alert, deputies could get to control centers if there should be need therefor. The automobiles were needed for other uses in connection with the Air Raid Warden Service, too, especially in the continuing work of recruiting members for the service.

Supervisor Meyer objected to not allowing the full amount requested.

Supervisor MacPhee, however, urged that the Board appropriate the \$1,000 approved by his Honor the Mayor, and then see if something could be worked out before July 1, with regard to the automobiles.

Thereupon, the roll was called and the supplemental budget recommendation for an appropriation of \$1,000 for telephones was *approved* by the following vote:

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## Consideration.

In discussing the foregoing supplemental budget recommendation, the legality of approval was questioned, inasmuch as the recommendation had not reached the Board by May 10, the limit beyond which, the Board by ordinance has decreed that no supplemental budget recommendations would be received.

The Civil Service Commission pointed out that it had, prior to May 10, notified the Board that should the charter amendment providing for the acquisition of the Market Street Railway operative properties be approved by the people on May 16, a supplemental budget recommendation would be necessary therefor. A notice had also been sent to the Board along the same lines, relating to charter amendment to provide for adjustment of the present method of compensation of persons transferred under the disability provision of Section 156.

The City Attorney, when his opinion thereon was requested, stated that the charter would supersede any ordinance of the Board and it

would be the duty of the Board to make provision for any increases which would become effective July 1st.

Thereupon, Supervisor MacPhee moved approval of the foregoing supplemental budget items.

### Statements by Supervisors.

Supervisor Brown announced that before the roll was called on approval of the budget, stated that there were two things that should be commented on. The budget represents a material increase over last year's budget, which, he thought, would amount to about 20 per cent in the tax rate. At any event, it can be taken for granted that there will be a substantial increase. There are types of increase that have been forced on the City and County by war conditions—increases in cost of food, cost of operation of the hospital, etc. There are contractual services and other items. There are, however, a number of other increases, some of which he had heretofore spoken about briefly. Despite that, he believed, by and large, the budget represented a great deal of thought and work on the part of the Finance Committee and other city officials, especially on the part of the Mayor. He believed that sooner or later, the Board of Supervisors will reach a point where budget increases will prove disastrous. He believed the Board had been too free in granting some of the increases. In spite of what happened last year, the Board has this year received another landslide of appropriations coming under the head of supplemental appropriations, which total between \$500,000 and \$600,000. He, Supervisor Brown, deplored that condition. The budgets as submitted should be complete. Many of the supplemental items could, with a little more thought and care, have been anticipated. Some of the supplemental budgets come pretty close to being an evasion of the Board's action in fixing the deadline of May 10, as being the last day for supplemental appropriations. He hoped the Board, during the next year, would be more rigid in its permission to the various departments, allowing such last minute, unlooked for increases in the budget. The supplemental budgets represent some \$500,000 to \$600,000, for which the Board of Supervisors will be charged.

We are again confronted with substantial increase in the budget of the Board of Education. That item alone, he understood, would add 10 cents to the tax rate, if not more, depending on the amounts of increases in salaries granted school teachers. The Board of Supervisors cannot interfere in any way with expenditures made by the Board of Education. If the Board of Supervisors were given jurisdiction over the expenditures of the Board of Education, some reductions could be made, and money could be saved for the taxpayers of San Francisco.

However, Supervisor Brown stated, in closing, he thought the budget was a pretty fair document. It goes further than he would have liked to see it, but increased costs are more or less a corollary of war times. He hoped that at the next budget time, the Board would be faced with a waning rather than a waxing war moon, and that money can be saved for the taxpayers of San Francisco.

Supervisor Mead expressed the desire to take advantage of the opportunity to compliment the Chairman of the Finance Committee and the Mayor of San Francisco for their work. During the past, budget consideration has taken four or five days; one time the Board sat all night. This year has seen hardly any comment at all. He believed that was due to the close cooperation between the Mayor and the Board of Supervisors, and Chester R. MacPhee in particular. He desired to pay his respects to Supervisors MacPhee and those who worked with him—and to Mr. David Lewis. He believed the budget would meet with the approval of the people of San Francisco.

**Adopted.**

Thereupon, on motion by Supervisor MacPhee, the roll was called and the budget for the fiscal year 1944-1945, including supplemental budgets, was adopted by the following vote:

The Board of Supervisors met in special session to consider the Annual Appropriation Ordinance and the Annual Salary Ordinance for the Fiscal Year 1944-1945.

**CALLING THE ROLL.**

**Annual Appropriation Ordinance.**

The Clerk presented the Annual Appropriation Ordinance for the Fiscal Year 1944-1945.

Supervisor MacPhee moved that the Annual Appropriation Ordinance be Passed for Second Reading.

**Remarks by Supervisors.**

Supervisor Colman announced that he desired, before calling the roll, to make a brief statement with regard to the budget. "Some two or three months ago," stated Supervisor Colman, "the Mayor made a statement with regard to his policy in drawing up the budget, and he stated that his policy would be to consider each request that came before him and to decide it strictly on its merits, and if it were necessary for the benefit of the city, he would favor it and would not cut it out merely for the purpose of effecting economy. That statement received wide publicity throughout the city. Later on, as the figures developed more and more, the Bureau of Governmental Research issued a factual statement calling attention to the possible increase in the cost of government that would come from the passage of this particular budget. This statement of the Bureau also received wide comment in the press, and, I am told, copies of the statement were sent to the Chamber of Commerce, the Down Town Association, Building Owners and Managers, the Real Estate Board and, in fact, to every large taxpaying group in the City and County of San Francisco. From the statement, first by the Mayor, and second, from information having been spread about by the Bureau, the taxpaying groups of the city, large and small, were aware of the conditions just as they existed. The Board of Supervisors received not one letter of protest from any of those groups. When the public hearing was held, not one group or

one representative of a group came before the Board of Supervisors to protest against the budget. The result of that, it would appear to me, as one of the members of the Board, not being a member of the Finance Committee, and who had not the opportunity, nor did I go into the budget in detail, is that I think we have kept our ear to the ground with regard to the attitude of the taxpayers on the budget, and I feel, in view of these conditions, that we are absolutely justified in passing the budget.

"Just a word as to the budget itself. Of course, there are a good many increases. On the other hand, taking the over-all picture, and considering the amount of money that is under the direct control of the Mayor and of the Board of Supervisors, the actual increase was comparatively moderate. Of that increase, too, it seems to me, we can be proud of the fact that it was for constructive things; it was not to increase personnel—which cannot be reduced, or which might be reduced only with great difficulty, in times like these—it was really for providing those absolutely necessary things which have been turned down in past by the city administration even though the necessity for them existed. In a measure, appropriations of that character are non-recurring.

"I have gone into quite an elaborate set of figures that came from the Bureau of Governmental Research, and from Mr. David Lewis, and the fact that the Finance Committee sat down with the Mayor at the start, shows me that all possible economies and cuts have been considered, and were reconciled. The Finance Committee and the Mayor got together on the budget so that practically, when the Mayor presented his budget, he presented a budget which had the approval of the Finance Committee of the Board of Supervisors. In view of that fact I feel that the other members of the Board, who have the same information as I—we are in touch with the situation and what is going on. We do not know the breakdown, nor can we be expected to, but we can all vote for the budget with the feeling that the people of San Francisco, by and large, have been duly prepared for this budget and are satisfied with it.

"With regard to the Board of Education's budget, it shows a substantial increase, but, I am told that part of that was due to the fact that some subventions from the State fell below the usual level, and had to be taken up, and further, that there was a difference in the amount of surplus from the Department. In all fairness to the Board of Education, I want to state that had the budget of the Board of Education been in the hands of the Board of Supervisors, one of our members has said that he has no doubt that it would be materially cut. My only comment is that there is no evidence to support that conclusion.

"Another significant thing about the hearing on the budget, I am told, is that when the budget was considered by the Board there was only one motion made by any member of the Board to take out any item from the budget. That, I believe, was a motion made by Mr. Brown to take out \$10,000 which was for a survey to be made by private agencies of our Public Health Department to see whether it was going along the right lines. I think that was in line with the feeling of the Board of Supervisors that they were satisfied with the budget.

"Accordingly, as one member of the Board, I feel that I can vote with a clear conscience for the appropriation which puts the budget into effect."

Supervisor Brown, in brief reply to remark made by Supervisor Colman, stated that it was true that there was only one direct motion to remove an item from the budget, but in addition to that there were several occasions where he had voted "No," but having been chastened by the Board for his vote, he did not take the time to make other objections. Referring to the budget of the Board of Education, Supervisor Brown declared that over a period of years items in the Board's

budget have been increased considerably less than they have in the budget of the Board of Education. The Board of Education has not done so well in keeping down the figures as has the Board of Supervisors.

Supervisor Uhl, in explaining his views, stated that he had received many complaints regarding severe increase in the tax rate. However, he felt that the Mayor was elected by a large majority of the people, and the majority rule. His vote would be in protest. He would not vote against the budget, but he would vote "Aye" in protest. Supervisor Uhl then remarked on requests for transfer of surpluses made by some of the departments. He felt that whatever surpluses there were at the end of the fiscal year should be transferred to the General Fund, and he intended to bring in legislation to provide for such transfer in order to save the taxpayers that additional burden. In conclusion, Supervisor Uhl announced that he was going to vote "Aye," as a protest vote. He was not satisfied with several increases, taking the budget as a whole.

**Annual Appropriation Ordinance.**

Thereupon, the Annual Appropriation Ordinance, reading as follows, was taken up:



# ANNUAL APPROPRIATION ORDINANCE 1944-1945

FRIDAY, MAY 26, 1944

1077

BILL NO. 2885, ORDINANCE NO. .... (Series of 1939), as follows:

AN ORDINANCE APPROPRIATING ALL ESTIMATED RECEIPTS AND ALL ESTIMATED EXPENDITURES FOR THE CITY AND COUNTY OF SAN FRANCISCO FOR THE FISCAL YEAR ENDING JUNE 30, 1945.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco, as follows:

Section 1. The several amounts of estimated receipts, income and revenue enumerated herein are hereby appropriated to the several funds and departments indicated in this ordinance for the purpose of meeting appropriations herein provided.

Section 2. The several amounts of proposed expenditure for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1945, are hereby appropriated to the several funds and departments as enumerated herein. Each department for which an expenditure appropriation is herein made is hereby authorized to use, in the manner provided by law, the amounts so appropriated for the purposes specified in this appropriation ordinance.

Section 3. The Controller is hereby authorized and directed to set up appropriate accounts for the items of receipts and expenditures appropriated herein.

Where revenues for any fund or department are herein provided by transfer from any other fund or department, or where a duty or a performance has been transferred from one department to another, the Controller is authorized to make the necessary transfer; provided further, that where revenues for any fund or department are herein provided by transfer from any other fund or department in consideration of departmental services to be rendered, in no event shall such transfer of revenue be made in excess of the actual cost of such service; provided further, that in no event shall transfers from utility surplus exceed the limitations set forth in Section 129 of the Charter.

The Controller shall make available for expenditure the amount of actual receipts for items of proposed expenditures that are designated herein as appropriated for Collection of Rents (Real Estate Department), Tearing Up Streets, Inspection Fees (Engineering), Advertising Fees (Engineering), Camp Mather (Recreation Department), and War Memorial Reserve Fund (in accordance with Ordinance 125, Series of 1939).

In connection with the operation of Camp Mather (Recreation Department) the Controller is authorized to establish an account for depositing revenues which are applicable to the ensuing fiscal year; said revenues shall be carried forward and become a part of the funds available for appropriation in said ensuing fiscal year.

Section 4. The several items of expenditures herein appropriated, being based on estimated receipts, income or revenues which may not be fully realized, it shall be incumbent upon the Controller to establish a schedule of allotments, monthly or quarterly as he may determine, under which the sums appropriated to the several departments shall be expended. The Controller shall revise such revenue estimates monthly. If such revised estimates indicate a shortage the Controller shall hold in reserve an equivalent amount of the corresponding expenditure appropriations set forth herein until the collection of the amounts as originally estimated is assured, and in all cases where it is provided by the Charter that a specified or minimum tax shall be levied for any department the amount of such appropriation herein provided derived from taxes shall not exceed the amount actually produced by the levy made for such department. The Controller in issuing warrants or in certifying contracts or purchase orders or other encumbrances

pursuant to Section 86 of the Charter, shall consider only the allotted portions of appropriation items to be available for encumbrance or expenditure and shall not approve the incurring of liability under any allotment in excess of the amount of such allotment. In case of emergency or unusual circumstances which could not be anticipated at the time of apportionment, an additional allotment for a period may be made on the recommendation of the department head and that of the Chief Administrative Officer, board or commission, and the approval of the Controller. After the allotment schedule has been established or fixed, as heretofore provided, it shall be unlawful for any department or officer to expend or cause to be expended a sum greater than the amount set forth for the particular activity in the said allotment schedule so established, unless an additional allotment is made, as herein provided.

Allotments, liabilities incurred and expenditures made under expenditure appropriations herein enumerated shall in no case exceed the amount of each such appropriation, unless the same shall have been increased by supplemental appropriations made in the manner provided by Sections 79 and 80 of the Charter, or by transfer as provided by Sections 77 and 90 of the Charter.

The Controller is hereby authorized to establish reserves for the purpose of providing funds for adjustments in connection with the liquidation of encumbrances, and such reserves shall remain in existence until the purposes for which they have been set aside have been accomplished.

Section 5. Where appropriations are made for specific projects or purposes which may involve the payment of salaries or wages, the head of the department to which such appropriations are made, or the head of a department authorized by contract or interdepartmental order to make expenditures from each such appropriation, shall file with the Controller, when requested, an estimate of the amount of any such expenditures to be made during the ensuing period.

Section 6. The Controller is hereby authorized and directed to prescribe the method to be used in making payments for interdepartmental services in accordance with the provisions of Section 77 of the Charter, and to provide for the establishment of interdepartmental reserves which may be required to pay for future obligations which result from current performances. Whenever, in the judgment of the Controller, the amounts which have been set aside for such purposes are no longer required, or are in excess of the amount which is then currently estimated to be required, the Controller shall transfer the unrequired amount to the unappropriated balance of the particular fund of which the reserve is a part. Provided further that no expenditure shall be made for outlay purposes from any interdepartmental reserve without specific appropriation by the Board of Supervisors.

Section 7. Appointing officers shall not make appointments to any position until the Controller shall certify that funds are available.

Appointments to seasonable or temporary positions shall not exceed the term for which the Controller has certified the availability of funds.

The Controller shall be immediately notified of a vacancy occurring in any position.

Employees shall not be permitted to work overtime unless funds are available to pay for such overtime at the rates established or unless an actual emergency exists as provided by law.

Section 8. Surpluses existing in appropriations herein made for personal services shall be transferred by the Controller to a "Compensation Reserve" in the fund of which the appropriation is a part.

Each "Compensation Reserve" is appropriated for the following purposes:

For adjusting the provision for the compensation of an officer or a position wherein the amount provided for such compensation is not sufficient to pay the officer or employee returning to such office or position from military or war leave the compensation said officer or employee is legally entitled to receive.

ensation said officer or employee is legally entitled to receive.

For adjusting the provision for the compensation of an office or a position wherein the amount provided for such compensation is not sufficient to pay the officer or employee promoted or transferred to said office or position the compensation said officer or employee is legally entitled to receive.

Such amounts as may be required to carry out the above provision shall be transferred by the Controller to the related appropriations upon the request of the department head concerned and that of the Chief Administrative Officer, board or commission for departments under their respective jurisdiction.

Each such request shall require the prior approval of the Secretary of the Civil Service Commission.

No such transfer shall be made from one fund to another.

Surpluses existing in "Compensation Reserve" may also be used for the making of appropriation for other compensation requirements in the manner provided by Charter.

Section 9. The Controller is hereby authorized and directed to continue the existing Special and Trust Funds, Revolving Funds, and reserves and the receipts in and expenditures from each such fund are hereby appropriated in accordance with law and the conditions under which each such fund was established.

The Controller is hereby authorized and directed to set up additional Special and Trust Funds and reserves, as they may be created by either additional bequests or under other conditions.

Whenever the City and County of San Francisco shall receive for a special purpose from the United States of America, the State of California, or from any public or semi-public agency, or from any private person, firm or corporation, any moneys, or property to be converted into money, the Controller shall set up on the books of his office a special fund or account evidencing the said moneys so received and specifying the special purposes for which they have been received and for which they are held, which said account or fund shall be maintained by the said Controller as long as any portion of said moneys or property remains.

Each Department of the City and County of San Francisco, which in the normal operations under its powers and duties is by law and upon deposit of moneys by persons, firms, or corporations authorized to perform certain services for and at the cost and expense of said persons, firms, or corporations, is hereby authorized to perform similar services for the United States of America, the State of California, or any division or agency of either, upon receipt of a legal and proper order or contract to pay to the City and County of San Francisco the full cost and expense of performing the required services upon completion thereof. City owned public utilities may with the approval of the Controller perform such services for privately owned public utilities in the manner provided in this paragraph.

The expenditures necessary from said funds or said accounts as created herein, in order to carry out the purpose for which said moneys or orders have been received or for which said accounts are being maintained, shall be approved by the Controller and said expenditures are hereby appropriated in accordance with the terms and conditions under which said moneys or orders have been received by the City and County of San Francisco, and in accordance with the conditions under which said funds are maintained.

Section 10. The Controller is hereby authorized and directed to set up appropriations for refunding amounts deposited in the treasury in excess of amounts due.

Section 11. Monies which are appropriated during the fiscal year from the Emergency Reserve Fund to departments, offices and funds shall be construed only as estimates of such requirements. The Controller shall, upon the determination of the actual requirement, return to the Emergency Reserve Fund that portion of the appropriation which is not actually required for the stated emergency.

Prior to the close of the fiscal year the Controller shall transfer to Emergency Reserve Fund from any available balance in the appropriations of any department, office or fund the amount such department, office or fund has received as an appropriation from the Emergency Reserve Fund or as much thereof as is available for transfer.

Section 12. The funds provided herein for compensating the members of the uniformed force of the Fire Department shall be used to pay the compensations as established by Sections 36 and 38.1 of the Charter as amended by the addition of Section 36.2 (approved by the voters at the election of May 16, 1944) and these funds shall be supplemented by appropriation at the time the tax is levied to support this ordinance by an amount which, together with the amounts herein provided in Appropriations Nos. 410.110.01 and 410.110.02, will be sufficient to pay the compensations hereinabove enumerated for the fiscal year 1944-45.

Authorization is hereby granted to pay the revised compensation effective as of July 1, 1944, provided that said amendment has been ratified prior to that date by the Legislature of the State of California.

In the event that ratification is at a later date, this authorization shall become effective within fifteen days after the date of its ratification.

Section 13. The term "department" as used in this ordinance shall mean department, bureau, office, utility, board or commission, as the case may be. The term "department head" as used herein shall be as defined in Section 20 of the Charter.

Section 14. The several amounts of estimated receipts herein appropriated, and each fund or department to which such appropriation is made, are as follows:

The Annual Salary Ordinance, reading as follows, was taken up:

# ANNUAL SALARY ORDINANCE

Fiscal Year Ending June 30, 1945

(Series of 1939)

Bill No. 2918, Ordinance No. . . . . , as follows:

An ordinance enumerating all positions continued and/or created by the Board of Supervisors in adopting the Annual Budget and Appropriation Ordinance for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1945; continuing, and/or creating and/or establishing these positions; enumerating and including therein on the basis of the normal work week of 40 hours all positions of the officers and employees of the City and County of San Francisco and non-teaching and non-technical employees of the Unified School District created by Charter or State law for which salaries are appropriated in the said Annual Appropriation Ordinance; specifying and fixing the compensation thereof, and fixing the methods of computation for payment for services rendered on regular schedules in excess of the normal work week of 40 hours; fixing the method of payment for overtime worked by monthly and per diem employees; and fixing compensation of persons appointed to positions herein enumerated which may become vacant during the fiscal year, and for temporary positions; and providing for the method of making effective retitling and reclassifications of positions by the Civil Service Commission pursuant to section 141 of the Charter.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco, as follows:

Section 1. In accordance with the provisions of Section 73 of the Charter, the positions hereinafter enumerated under the respective departments are hereby created and/or established and/or continued for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1945. Positions created or authorized by Charter or State law are enumerated and included herein.

Appointing officers as specified in the Charter are hereby authorized, subject to the provisions of this ordinance, to make or continue appointments, as needed, during the said fiscal year to positions enumerated in their respective sections of this ordinance; but in no case to exceed the number of positions or the rate of pay herein enumerated and established, provided that temporary appointments to positions defined by the rules of the Civil Service Commission as seasonal or temporary positions may be made by the respective appointing officers in excess of the number of permanent positions herein established or enumerated if funds have been appropriated and are available for such temporary service. No appointment to such temporary or seasonal positions shall be made until the Mayor shall approve the requisition for such service. The said requisition shall first be filed with the Civil Service Commission and if the proposed employment and the compensation are legally authorized as herein provided, the secretary of said Commission shall so certify and shall promptly transmit the said requisition to the Controller and if the funds are available for the compensation of the proposed employment, he shall so certify and shall promptly transmit the said requisition to the Mayor for his approval as herein provided. No such appointment shall continue beyond the period for which the Controller has certified the availability of funds. At the request of the Mayor, the Civil Service Commission may investigate and report to him on the necessity for such temporary or seasonal services.

Section 1.1. **Compensation Reserves:** Surpluses existing in appropriations made for personal services shall be transferred by the Controller to a "Compensation Reserve" in the fund of which the appropriation is a part.



Each "Compensation Reserve" is appropriated for the following purposes:

For adjusting the provision for the compensation of an office or a position wherein the amount provided for such compensation is not sufficient to pay the officer or employee returning to such office or position from military or war leave the compensation said officer or employee is legally entitled to receive.

For providing the compensation for an office or a position wherein provision has not been otherwise made to pay an officer or employee returning from military or war leave to a regularly established office or position the compensation said officer or employee is legally entitled to receive.

For adjusting the provision for the compensation of an office or a position wherein the amount provided for such compensation is not sufficient to pay said officer or employee promoted or transferred to said office or position the compensation said officer or employee is legally entitled to receive.

Such amounts as may be required to carry out the above provision shall be transferred by the Controller to the related appropriation upon the request of the department head concerned and that of the Chief Administrative Officer, board or commission for departments under their respective jurisdiction.

Each such request shall require the prior approval of the Secretary of the Civil Service Commission.

No such transfer shall be made from one fund to another.

Surpluses existing in "Compensation Reserve" may also be used for the making of appropriation for other compensation requirements in the manner provided by Charter.

Section 1.2. The Civil Service Commission shall be notified immediately of any change in the duties of a position herein established or of a vacancy occurring in a position herein enumerated. Appointing officers shall not make appointments to any such vacancy in a permanent position until the Mayor shall approve the requisition for such service. The requisition for such service shall first be filed with the Civil Service Commission and if the proposed employment and compensation are legally authorized as herein provided, the secretary of said Commission shall so certify and shall promptly transmit the said requisition to the Controller and if funds are available for the compensation of the proposed employment, he shall so certify and shall promptly transmit the requisition to the Mayor for his approval as herein provided. In the event the Hetch Hetchy Power Project shall suspend or cease operations during the fiscal year, the employments engaged thereon shall be terminated when, in the judgment of the Manager of Utilities, and the Public Utilities Commission, such action is necessary.

Section 1.3. Section 141 of the Charter provides that the Civil Service Commission shall be the judge of the classification of positions. Any changes made by the Civil Service Commission during the fiscal year 1944-45 in the classification of the duties of a position or the title of a position herein enumerated shall be made effective, providing no change in compensation nor the creation of any new position is involved, by delivering forthwith to the Controller a transcript of the action of the said Commission in changing the title of the position. Copies of such transcript shall also be forthwith filed with the Mayor, the Board of Supervisors, and the head of the department concerned.

Section 2. Salary or wage rates herein specified are maximum gross compensations, based on an 8 hour day for per diem employees and 40 hour week for monthly employees, including the valuation of maintenance furnished.

In filling vacancies in positions herein enumerated or in appointing employees to temporary or seasonal positions as provided in Section 1 hereof, which are subject to the provisions of Section 151 of the

Charter, the person appointed to such vacancy or temporary or seasonal position shall be paid the entrance salary or wage fixed for such position in the schedule of compensations adopted by the Board of Supervisors pursuant to the provisions of Section 151 of the Charter, or if no schedule of compensation has been adopted by the Board of Supervisors for the classification to which said position is allocated or classified, the person appointed to such position shall, pending adoption by the Board of Supervisors of a schedule of compensation for such position, receive the entrance salary or wage proposed by the Civil Service Commission for such position and shall remain at the said entrance rate during the current fiscal year; provided, however, that platform men employed in the Municipal Railway shall advance during the fiscal year in accordance with their seniority within the schedules established herein for their respective classifications.

**Section 2.1. Method of Payment:**

(a) Employees entering the municipal service in any of the specified classifications enumerated herein on or after July 1, 1944, shall be paid the entrance rate provided for their particular classifications in the schedule of compensations herein contained; provided, however, that employees promoted within the service who receive in the lower class a salary higher than the minimum of the compensation schedule for the higher class shall not be reduced to the entrance rate of the promotive class, and provided further that employees transferring in accordance with Civil Service rules may transfer at their current salary. The compensations of all employees receiving less than the minimum of the schedules specified herein for their particular classifications shall be adjusted to the minimum on July 1. Every employee who entered the service by permanent appointment or was promoted in the service on or before July 1, 1943, shall receive on July 1, 1944, and annually thereafter on July first, the salary fixed for his years of service based on his original date of appointment to a permanent position in his present classification; provided, however, that for the fiscal year 1944-45 each such employee shall receive one full increment as established for his particular classification. Provided further that each employee entering the service by permanent appointment or being promoted in the service after July 1, 1943, shall receive on July 1, 1944, the entrance salary for his present classification, and shall receive annually one full increment increase as set forth in the compensation schedule established for his particular classification payable on the first day of the month immediately following his anniversary of employment or promotion; provided, however, that employees promoted in the service during the fiscal year 1943-44 and who are receiving a higher salary than the entrance salary for such promotive class shall not be reduced to the entrance rate of the promotive class and provided further that no annual increment for such employee shall be allowed if the granting of the increment will establish the compensation at a rate beyond which the employee is entitled by reason of accrued years of service in the class. No employee shall receive more than one salary increment annually except for adjustment to the proper step in the compensation schedule on the basis of seniority. No increase in compensation shall cause the salary of an employee to exceed the maximum fixed herein for his classification. No employee, eligible under the above provisions, other than those on military leaves, shall receive a salary increment unless he shall have received compensation for the major portion of the preceding fiscal year.

(b) Persons who have acquired permanent status in a position other than those on military leaves of absence, who are re-employed in the same positions after layoff or leave of absence shall be paid a salary or wage calculated on his years of service based on his original date of appointment to the permanent position to the date of his severance of service.

(c) Provided that in the execution and performance of any contract awarded to a city department under the provisions of Sections 95

and 98 of the Charter, not less than the wage scale fixed by the Board of Supervisors in the prevailing Wage Resolution and in effect at the time of the award of said contract shall be paid to employees performing work under such contract.

(d) **Intermittent Service:** Permanent employees or temporary employees in classifications for which compensations are fixed herein on a monthly basis, who work less than a five-day week of forty hours on a regular condition of employment, and temporary employees in such classifications in positions which are intermittent in service or subject to irregular working schedules, shall be paid on a daily basis derived by dividing the normal monthly compensation by the factor 21.25 days. The Civil Service Commission shall determine which positions shall be subject to the provisions of this section.

**Section 2.2. Hours of Work:**

(a) Compensations fixed herein on a per diem rate are based on an eight-hour day.

(b) Except as otherwise provided herein, or in the salary standardization ordinance, compensations fixed herein on a monthly basis are based on an eight-hour day and a five-day week. In order that there shall be no diminution of service to the public it shall be the duty of the head of each department to stagger, arrange and assign the work of his department so that a skeleton crew will be on duty in each department which is required to be open on Saturday morning for the conduct of public business, and no officer or employee in such department shall work more than a five-day week, except as part of a skeleton crew to keep such office open on Saturday morning, and except as provided herein. Time worked on Saturday morning as part of a skeleton crew shall be compensated for by equal time off of one-half day in the same or succeeding week. Employees in Division R—Recreation Service and employees in Division X—Library Service may work the 40-hour week schedule within six days.

(c) **Night Shifts:** Seven and one-half hours per day and five days per week shall constitute the normal work day and week for calculating the compensations for employees whose compensations are fixed herein on a monthly basis and who work on night shifts. A night shift is any full time shift which commences after 2 p. m. and prior to 6 a. m.

(d) **Part-Time Services:** Except as provided in subdivision (e) of the salary standardization ordinance a daily work schedule of less than eight hours or a regular schedule of less than five days a week or a night schedule of less than seven and one-half hours shall be considered part-time employment, and compensations therefor shall be fixed herein at a rate based upon the full time rate for the classification, proportionate to the hours worked, with due regard to seniority of service. Provided, however, that these provisions shall not apply to physicians employed in their professional capacity on a call basis or on a regular consultant basis.

(e) **Split Shift:** A straight shift shall be considered as eight hours work within a spread of nine and one-half hours; a working shift of eight hours over a spread of nine and one-half hours, but not to exceed eleven hours per day shall be considered a split shift, and there shall not be more than one split in any one shift. Employees required to work a split shift shall receive fifty cents per day extra, except as provided by Section 125 of the Charter.

(f) **Holidays:** Monthly employees in the City and County service and non-teaching and non-technical employees in the Unified School District shall be allowed the following minimum number of holidays off with pay: New Year's Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Admission Day, Thanksgiving Day and Christmas Day. Work on such holidays, and other legal holidays heretofore regularly recognized by departments in 1942, shall be considered as overtime worked; provided, however, that employees in services commonly operating seven days per week, who are required to work on any of the above legal holidays

or other legal holidays recognized by employing departments in 1942, shall be allowed a day off in lieu of such holiday, in accordance with the rules of the Civil Service Commission. Employees whose regular day off falls on one of these holidays shall be allowed another day off in lieu thereof.

**Section 2.3. Regular Work Schedules of More Than Five Days of Eight Hours:**

(a) Straight time payment shall be made for time worked on regular work schedules in excess of five days of eight hours up to and including six days of eight hours on day shifts, or after seven and one-half hours up to and including eight hours per day, and after five days of seven and one-half hours up to and including six days of eight hours on night shifts.

(b) Pursuant to the provisions of Section 4, Subdivision (f) of the Salary Standardization ordinance department heads may require occupants of the following specified positions the salaries for which are based on a monthly basis to work in excess of the five days and 40 hours for day shifts and five days of 7½ hours for night shifts for the number of hours hereinafter specified. Employees required to work in excess of the normal work weeks as above specified shall be compensated as follows:

and provided further that the following offices shall be entitled to work in excess of five-day 40-hour week during the periods specified herein:

In the office of the Assessor, during the month of March; in the office of the Registrar of Voters, one month beginning three weeks before the close of registration prior to each election; and in the office of the Tax Collector, November 1st to December 20th, March 1st to May 15th, and during the month of August, and the staff of the license bureau and cashiers in the Tax Collector's Office during the months of July and January.

Provided further that employment for which the salary or wage is based upon a per diem rate, and the occupants are required to work in excess of five days and 40 hours for day shift shall be converted to a monthly rate and listed separately in the section of the salary ordinance concerned as provided in Section 8 of the salary standardization ordinance.

#### Section 2.4. Emergency Overtime Payment, Monthly Employees:

(a) Except as otherwise provided herein, employees of the City and County and non-teaching and non-technical positions in the Unified School District, paid on a monthly basis shall be paid overtime on an hourly basis of one and one-half times the normal rate of pay, when required to work emergency overtime in excess of their regular work schedules, or who are required to work on regular holidays as provided herein; provided, however, that the maximum overtime payment shall be based on \$250 per month, and no overtime payment shall be made on any portion of an employee's compensation in excess of \$250 per month; and provided further that no overtime payment or additional cost through straight time payment shall accrue for the purpose of keeping city, county, or city and county, or department offices open on Saturday morning, with the exception of the busy seasons in offices of the Assessor, the Tax Collector, and Registrar of Voters as provided herein.

(b) Compensations fixed in the salary standardization ordinance on a per diem basis and converted to a monthly basis herein shall be subject to the provisions of Section 2.4 (a) hereof.

(c) **Exceptions:** No overtime compensation or other payment shall be made to employees in positions established on a part-time basis, and such other officers and employees as are listed herein.

(d) Overtime for monthly employees shall be paid on an hourly basis. The Civil Service Commission shall cause a schedule of hourly rates to be established for this purpose in accordance with the provisions of Section 151 of the Charter, and the hourly rates established by the Civil Service Commission shall be the basis for payment of overtime worked. No employee shall be compensated for overtime worked as herein provided except on the specific approval of the appointing officer and unless funds are available to pay for such overtime worked, or unless an actual emergency exists as provided by law.

(e) Overtime compensation shall be shown separately on timerolls opposite the name of the employee and the reason for such overtime shall be clearly indicated.

(f) No employee shall be paid for overtime worked as herein provided unless the duties performed by him during such overtime worked are included in the classification in which the employee is regularly and legally serving; provided that when work in a department has to be completed within time limits fixed by law and the Civil Service Commission determines that no unemployed person or persons are available to perform the work and approves the assignment of employees in that department, or other departments, to perform the work under the provisions of Section 141 of the Charter, said employees may be paid overtime at their regular rate of pay for any overtime worked in the performance of such duties.

(g) Except as provided in Section 2.3, subdivision (b) hereof, the rates of compensations fixed herein for the following classifications are full compensation for the working time required for the proper performance of the duties of the positions covered by such classifications, and employees in such classifications shall receive no overtime payment or additional compensation for work in excess of eight hours per day or five days per week, or seven and one-half hours per night and thirty-seven and one-half hours per week.

## Section 2.5. Overtime—Per Diem Employees:

(a) The wages specified on a per diem basis in this ordinance for the respective employments included herein are for eight hours' work per day, between the hours of 8:00 a. m. and 5:00 p. m., on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday. For purposes of this ordinance, the said work schedule shall be considered as regular work time.

Any time worked by employees engaged in the operations and occupations named in this section on Saturday and Sunday, or on New Year's Day, Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Thanksgiving Day and Christmas Day shall be considered as work on holidays and such holiday work shall be compensated at double the rate herein provided for regular work time, subject, however, to the restrictions and provisions of this section. Any time worked by such employees after 12 o'clock midnight and before 8:00 o'clock a. m. prior to the

days mentioned above shall be compensated at double the rate herein fixed, subject to the restrictions of this section.

Overtime for the employees engaged in the operations or occupations named herein shall be any time worked in excess of eight hours per day, or any time worked before 8:00 a. m. and after 5:00 p. m. on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday.

Overtime work for employees engaged in operations or occupations set forth in this section whose compensation is fixed in this ordinance on a per diem basis shall be compensated as set forth in this section for such overtime, subject to the provisions of this section; provided that employees engaged in these operations and occupations, under the jurisdiction of the Public Utilities Commission, shall be paid for overtime and holidays worked on the same basis that prevailed for the fiscal year 1938-39, regardless of the fact that a higher compensation is specified in this section for overtime and holiday work.

#### *Operations and Occupations*

Asphalt and related street repair crafts as determined by the civil service classification of positions and Laborers and Cribbers and Trackmen.

Bricklayers, Hodcarriers, Stone Masons, Granite Cutters, Tile Setters, Plasterers, Cement Finishers, Steam Fitters, Machinists, Electrical Workers, Lathers, Engineers of Hoisting Engines and Compressor Operators and related crafts as determined by the civil service classification of positions.

Marble trades and related crafts as determined by the civil service classification of positions.

Carpenters and related crafts as determined by the civil service classification of positions.

Glaziers and related crafts as determined by the civil service classification of positions.

Painters and related crafts as determined by the civil service classification of positions.

Plumbers and Gas Fitters and related crafts as determined by the civil service classification of positions and employees engaged in pipe-caulking and installing meters and water services.

#### *Basis for Computing Compensation for Overtime as Herein Defined*

One and one-half times the rate fixed herein for regular time for the first four hours of overtime and twice the rate fixed herein for regular time thereafter, except that the rate for overtime between 6:00 a. m. and 8:00 a. m. shall be twice the rate fixed herein for regular time.

One and one-half times the rate fixed herein for regular time for the first four hours of overtime and twice the rate fixed herein for regular time thereafter.

Chauffeurs, Truck Drivers and related crafts as determined by the civil service classification of positions.

One and one-half times the rate fixed herein for regular time after 8 hours.

Boiler Makers and related crafts as determined by the civil service classification of positions.

One and one-half times the rate fixed herein for regular time after 8 hours.

Sewer Cleaners.

One and one-half times the rate fixed herein for regular time for the first four hours of overtime and twice the rate fixed herein for regular time thereafter, except that the rate for overtime between 6:00 a. m. and 8:00 a. m. shall be twice the rate fixed herein for regular time; and provided that when the ebb and flow of the tides in San Francisco Bay shall interfere with the work of cleaning, maintaining and repairing sewers to the extent that employees engaged therein cannot render service or perform work for more than four hours per day, the said four hours shall be considered and compensated as a full day's work, unless, immediately following such work, such employees are assigned to other duties within their classification.

Regardless of other provisions of this section, whenever operations as now constituted and as now carried on regularly and continuously require the services of any of the crafts named in this Section before 8:00 a. m. or after 5:00 p. m., and the employee engaged therein has during the fiscal year 1938-1939 received only straight time for such work, such employee shall be compensated for straight time only.

Section 2.6. In accordance with established working conditions for theatrical stage employees, working schedules on holidays and Sundays shall be compensated for at the same rate as for week days, provided permanent employees in classes A165 Stage Carpenter and E109 Stage Electrician who are required to work a performance on a Sunday shall be allowed a day off during the week.

Employees in Classes A165 Stage Carpenter, A170 Stage Property Man, and E109 Stage Electrician, shall be paid time and one-half when required to work over eight hours per day.

Employees in Class C109 Stage Hand employed on a performance basis as provided in the salary standardization ordinance shall be paid overtime over four hours at the following rates: Between the hours of 8:00 a. m. and 5:00 p. m., \$1.75 per hour; and between the hours of 5:00 p. m. and 8:00 a. m., \$2.25 per hour.



Section 2.7. No employee, who is eligible to be paid for overtime worked shall be permitted to work overtime as herein described unless funds are available to pay for such overtime worked at the rates herein established or unless an actual emergency exists as provided by law.

Section 2.8. If and when the Civil Service Commission determines that overtime payments in a department are excessive and finds that the required work can be performed to better advantage and more economically than through overtime work, the Civil Service Commission shall so report to the Board of Supervisors in order that the Board of Supervisors may consider the advisability of establishing additional employments in such departments or take such other action as may be deemed advisable.

Section 2.9. The Civil Service Commission shall submit to the Board of Supervisors each month a report showing the amount of overtime compensation in each department during the preceding month under the terms of this ordinance.

Section 2.10. No maintenance shall be provided to any employee in a position subject to the provisions of Section 151 of the Charter in addition to the compensation herein fixed or provided. The compensations fixed for employees engaged in construction work outside of the City and County of San Francisco which are not subject to Section 151 of the Charter include the valuation of maintenance provided such employees and deductions for such accommodations shall be made and indicated on payrolls and timerolls.

Section 2.11. Charges for any and all maintenance furnished and accepted by employees in positions subject to Section 151 of the Charter shall be made and indicated on timerolls and payrolls, and deductions for such maintenance shall be indicated and made on timerolls and payrolls in accordance with the following schedule fixed by the Civil Service Commission for such maintenance; provided, however, that no charge shall be made for meals furnished cooks, bakers, waiters and other kitchen workers.

**Providing for the Amount Per Day for Traveling Expenses of  
Officers and Employees on Official Business During the Fiscal  
Year 1944-1945.**

(Series of 1939)

Supervisor Mead presented:

Bill No. 2923, Ordinance No. . . . ., as follows:

Providing for the amount per day for traveling expenses of officers and employees on official business during the fiscal year 1944-1945.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco, as follows:

Section 1. During the fiscal year 1944-1945 any officer or employee of the City and County of San Francisco, except in the discharge of routine duties, who shall under the authority of law or ordinance, leave the City and County for the purpose of performing any official duty for or on behalf of the City and County, or for the purpose of rendering any service to or for the City and County, or for the purpose of officially representing said City and County, or any board, commission, office or department, shall be allowed as the expense incident to said service the actual cost of transportation, including Pullman charges, if any, together with an amount for living expenses not to exceed twenty (\$20) dollars per day for each and every day while said officer or employee is absent on said official business.

Section 2. Allowance for traveling expense shall be based upon the most efficient, direct and economical mode of transportation required by the occasion, provided, however, that at the option of the person authorized to leave the City and County of San Francisco on official

business, travel may be accomplished in the State of California by such means as the person so authorized deems proper. In extraordinary emergency cases, transportation to points outside the State of California may be contracted in the most expeditious and expedient manner.

Section 3. The number of days, which shall be used as the basis for computing the allowance for expenses other than transportation hereunder shall not exceed the number of days required in traveling and in attending to the business or to the purpose for which the trip is made. Provided, however, that if necessary, two (2) additional days be allowed to consummate traveling arrangements and that days taken up by unavoidable accidents or illness while en route and certified to by a duly licensed physician or surgeon, shall be construed as days devoted to official business.

Section 4. The Controller shall establish rules for the payment of all amounts payable pursuant to Section 1 hereof, and for the presentation of such vouchers as he shall deem proper in connection with expenditures made pursuant to said section. No allowance shall be made for traveling expense provided for in this ordinance unless funds have been appropriated or set aside for such expenses in accordance with the provisions of the Charter.

Section 5. The Controller shall advance the sums necessary for traveling expenses, but proper account and return must be made of said sums so advanced by the person receiving the same within ten (10) days after said person returns to duty in the City and County of San Francisco.

**Approving Proposed Legislation as Set Forth in Section 9 of the Governor's Proclamation Calling Special Session of the State Legislature June 5, 1944.**

(Series of 1939)

Supervisor Gallagher presented:

Proposal No. 4060, Resolution No. 4023, as follows:

Resolved, That the Board of Supervisors does hereby request Senator John F. Shelley and the members of the Assembly from the City and County of San Francisco to support the legislation provided for in subdivision 9 of the Proclamation of the Governor of the State of California to be considered at the special session of the Legislature convening on June 5th, 1944, said proposition 9 having to do with an appropriation to cities, counties and cities and counties for a post-war public works program; and be it

Further Resolved, That a copy of this resolution be forthwith transmitted to Senator Shelley and to the members of the Assembly from San Francisco.

#### Discussion.

The City Attorney explained at length the deliberations had at a meeting in his office on Wednesday, May 31, 1944, attended by the President, the Chief Administrative Officer, the Oakland City Manager, the City Attorney from Oakland, Mr. Skelly and himself. The measure to be presented at the State Legislature would appropriate \$40,000,000 from state surplus, to be allotted to cities, counties and to counties, on a matching basis, for post-war programs.

Supervisor Colman announced that he had no objection to the Resolution, but he believed the time had come or was about to come when

states and cities should depend on themselves, and not look to the federal government and that cities and counties should also depend on themselves, and not look to the states for aid.

Supervisor Uhl called attention to proposal for reclamation of tide lands at Butcher Town and at South Basin, and inquired whether it would be advisable for the Board to go on record as favoring that project, and so notifying San Francisco delegation to the State Legislature.

The City Attorney, in reply, pointed out that the matter of approval of specific projects was not to be considered at this time. Each project proposed would be considered on its merits at a later time.

Thereupon, the foregoing resolution was adopted by the following vote:

Resolved, That as to the volume on file in the office of the Registrar of Voters of the City and County of San Francisco, entitled "Statement of Votes Consolidated Primaries and Special Election, May 16, 1944," bearing the identifying letters "BL" that section of said volume now containing a statement of the vote cast at the Special Election, held in the City and County of San Francisco on Tuesday, May 16, 1944, be and the same is hereby approved and the same shall constitute the record of the official canvass of the votes cast at said Special Election.

### PROPOSED CHARTER AMENDMENT

Supervisor MacPhee presented:

Describing and setting forth to the qualified electors of the County of San Francisco, a proposal to amend the Charter of said County by amending Section 136 to provide that the superintendent schools may appoint a confidential secretary who shall not be subject civil service provisions of the Charter.

The Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco submits to the qualified electors of the City and County of San Francisco an election to be held on November 7, 1944, a proposal to amend the Charter of said City and County by amending Section 136 thereof so that the same read as follows:



## SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

Section 136. The superintendent of schools shall be the executive officer of the board of education. He shall be appointed by said board to serve for a term of four years and he shall receive an annual salary of \$10,000 unless an increase in said salary shall be fixed by the board of education and approved by the board of supervisors. The incumbent in the office of superintendent on the 1st day of July, 1942, shall continue to serve at the pleasure of the board.

*The superintendent may appoint a confidential secretary who shall not be subject to the Civil Service provisions of this charter and who shall serve at the pleasure of the superintendent.*

During his term in office the superintendent may be removed from his office, as in this section hereinafter provided, for misconduct or incompetency or charges setting forth the nature and character of said misconduct or incompetency are filed against the said superintendent. Said charges must be in writing and shall be signed by at least two members of the board of education. A copy of said charges, together with a notice of the time and place of the hearing on the same, shall within five days after the filing of the same be served upon the said superintendent. The mailing of a copy of said charges, with notice of time and place of hearing on the same, by United States registered mail, with the proper amount of postage prepaid thereon, addressed to said superintendent at his last known place of residence, shall be deemed to be a service of said charges as provided for in this section. A public hearing on said charges shall be had by the board of education not less than ten, nor more than twenty, days after the filing of said charges, provided that full power and authority is hereby given to the board of education to continue said hearing from time to time not to exceed sixty days from the commencement thereof, provided that for good cause said board may grant a further continuance on said hearing. The superintendent shall have the right to answer said charges, to appear at the hearing thereof and to be represented by counsel thereat for the purpose of defending himself against said charges. Pending the determination of said charges, the superintendent may be suspended from his office by a majority vote of the board of education, and the board may appoint a qualified person to discharge the duties of said superintendent during the period of suspension. If the board of education after hearing said charges shall by a two-thirds vote of all the members, determine that said charges have been sustained, it may by the same vote remove said superintendent from his office. No member of the board shall be entitled to vote on the removal of said superintendent unless he or she has been present at the entire hearing of such charges, provided that any member of the board who has not been present may vote for the removal of said superintendent, if such member has read a transcript of all the testimony taken on said hearing during his absence therefrom, and shall file with the board an affidavit to this effect. If said charges are not sustained by a two-thirds vote of all the members of said board, or if after said charges are sustained, the superintendent is not removed from office as a result thereof, said superintendent shall be reinstated in his position and shall be allowed his salary for the time that he has been under suspension, together with the costs of defending himself against said charges, including a reasonable fee

for his attorney to be fixed and allowed by the board. If the charge sustained, and as a result thereof said superintendent is removed from no further salary shall be allowed to said superintendent from the date suspension. In the hearing and determination of said charges filed against said superintendent, the judgment of said board of education shall be unless in determining the sufficiency of said charges said board of education commits a clear abuse of discretion.

The superintendent shall have the powers and duties specified by charter for department heads, in addition to such powers and duties as fixed by general law.

The positions of superintendent and deputy superintendent shall be only by persons of expert or technical training, but shall not be subject to provisions of this charter prescribing a residence qualification for office appointees, provided, however, that during their incumbency appointees in such positions shall reside in the city and county, and in case any appointee shall fail so to do, his appointment shall at once be revoked by the board.

#### **Final Passage.**

#### **Annual Appropriation Ordinance, Fiscal Year 1944-1945.**

Supervisor Mead, seconded by Supervisor Brown, moved final passage of the Annual Appropriation Ordinance for the fiscal year 1944-1945, as follows:

BILL NO. 2885, ORDINANCE NO. 2750 (Series of 1939), as follows:

AN ORDINANCE APPROPRIATING ALL ESTIMATED RECEIPTS AND ALL ESTIMATED EXPENDITURES FOR THE CITY AND COUNTY OF SAN FRANCISCO FOR THE FISCAL YEAR ENDING JUNE 30, 1945.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco, as follows:

Section 1. The several amounts of estimated receipts, income and revenue enumerated herein are hereby appropriated to the several funds and departments indicated in this ordinance for the purpose of meeting appropriations herein provided.

Section 2. The several amounts of proposed expenditure for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1945, are hereby appropriated to the several funds and departments as enumerated herein. Each department for which an expenditure appropriation is herein made is hereby authorized to use, in the manner provided by law, the amounts so appropriated for the purposes specified in this appropriation ordinance.

Section 3. The Controller is hereby authorized and directed to set up appropriate accounts for the items of receipts and expenditures appropriated herein.

Where revenues for any fund or department are herein provided by transfer from any other fund or department, or where a duty or a performance has been transferred from one department to another, the Controller is authorized to make the necessary transfer; provided further, that where revenues for any fund or department are herein provided by transfer from any other fund or department in consideration of departmental services to be rendered, in no event shall such transfer of revenue be made in excess of the actual cost of such service; provided further, that in no event shall transfers from utility surplus exceed the limitations set forth in Section 129 of the Charter.

The Controller shall make available for expenditure the amount of actual receipts for items of proposed expenditures that are designated herein as appropriated for Collection of Rents (Real Estate Department), Tearing Up Streets, Inspection Fees (Engineering), Advertising Fees (Engineering), Camp Mather (Recreation Department), and War Memorial Reserve Fund (in accordance with Ordinance 125, Series of 1939).

In connection with the operation of Camp Mather (Recreation Department) the Controller is authorized to establish an account for depositing revenues which are applicable to the ensuing fiscal year; said revenues shall be carried forward and become a part of the funds available for appropriation in said ensuing fiscal year.

Section 4. The several items of expenditures herein appropriated, being based on estimated receipts, income or revenues which may not be fully realized, it shall be incumbent upon the Controller to establish a schedule of allotments, monthly or quarterly as he may determine, under which the sums appropriated to the several departments shall be expended. The Controller shall revise such revenue estimates monthly. If such revised estimates indicate a shortage the Controller shall hold in reserve an equivalent amount of the corresponding expenditure appropriations set forth herein until the collection of the amounts as originally estimated is assured, and in all cases where it is provided by the Charter that a specified or minimum tax shall be levied for any department the amount of such appropriation herein provided derived from taxes shall not exceed the amount actually produced by the levy made for such department. The Controller in issuing warrants or in certifying contracts or purchase orders or other encumbrances

pursuant to Section 86 of the Charter, shall consider only the allotted portions of appropriation items to be available for encumbrance or expenditure and shall not approve the incurring of liability under any allotment in excess of the amount of such allotment. In case of emergency or unusual circumstances which could not be anticipated at the time of apportionment, an additional allotment for a period may be made on the recommendation of the department head and that of the Chief Administrative Officer, board or commission, and the approval of the Controller. After the allotment schedule has been established or fixed, as heretofore provided, it shall be unlawful for any department or officer to expend or cause to be expended a sum greater than the amount set forth for the particular activity in the said allotment schedule so established, unless an additional allotment is made, as herein provided.

Allotments, liabilities incurred and expenditures made under expenditure appropriations herein enumerated shall in no case exceed the amount of each such appropriation, unless the same shall have been increased by supplemental appropriations made in the manner provided by Sections 79 and 80 of the Charter, or by transfer as provided by Sections 77 and 90 of the Charter.

The Controller is hereby authorized to establish reserves for the purpose of providing funds for adjustments in connection with the liquidation of encumbrances, and such reserves shall remain in existence until the purposes for which they have been set aside have been accomplished.

Section 5. Where appropriations are made for specific projects or purposes which may involve the payment of salaries or wages, the head of the department to which such appropriations are made, or the head of a department authorized by contract or interdepartmental order to make expenditures from each such appropriation, shall file with the Controller, when requested, an estimate of the amount of any such expenditures to be made during the ensuing period.

Section 6. The Controller is hereby authorized and directed to prescribe the method to be used in making payments for interdepartmental services in accordance with the provisions of Section 77 of the Charter, and to provide for the establishment of interdepartmental reserves which may be required to pay for future obligations which result from current performances. Whenever, in the judgment of the Controller, the amounts which have been set aside for such purposes are no longer required, or are in excess of the amount which is then currently estimated to be required, the Controller shall transfer the unrequired amount to the unappropriated balance of the particular fund of which the reserve is a part. Provided further that no expenditure shall be made for outlay purposes from any interdepartmental reserve without specific appropriation by the Board of Supervisors.

Section 7. Appointing officers shall not make appointments to any position until the Controller shall certify that funds are available.

Appointments to seasonable or temporary positions shall not exceed the term for which the Controller has certified the availability of funds.

The Controller shall be immediately notified of a vacancy occurring in any position.

Employees shall not be permitted to work overtime unless funds are available to pay for such overtime at the rates established or unless an actual emergency exists as provided by law.

Section 8. Surpluses existing in appropriations herein made for personal services shall be transferred by the Controller to a "Compensation Reserve" in the fund of which the appropriation is a part.

Each "Compensation Reserve" is appropriated for the following purposes:

For adjusting the provision for the compensation of an officer or employee returning to such office or position from military or naval service; for the compensation of an officer or employee returning to such office or position from military or naval service; for the compensation of an officer or employee returning to such office or position from military or naval service.

such compensation is not sufficient to pay the officer or employee promoted or transferred to said office or position the compensation said officer or employee is legally entitled to receive.

Such amounts as may be required to carry out the above provision shall be transferred by the Controller to the related appropriations upon the request of the department head concerned and that of the Chief Administrative Officer, board or commission for departments under their respective jurisdiction.

Each such request shall require the prior approval of the Secretary of the Civil Service Commission.

No such transfer shall be made from one fund to another.

Surpluses existing in "Compensation Reserve" may also be used for the making of appropriation for other compensation requirements in the manner provided by Charter.

Section 9. The Controller is hereby authorized and directed to continue the existing Special and Trust Funds, Revolving Funds, and reserves and the receipts in and expenditures from each such fund are hereby appropriated in accordance with law and the conditions under which each such fund was established.

The Controller is hereby authorized and directed to set up additional Special and Trust Funds and reserves, as they may be created by either additional bequests or under other conditions.

Whenever the City and County of San Francisco shall receive for a special purpose from the United States of America, the State of California, or from any public or semi-public agency, or from any private person, firm or corporation, any moneys, or property to be converted into money, the Controller shall set up on the books of his office a special fund or account evidencing the said moneys so received and specifying the special purposes for which they have been received and for which they are held, which said account or fund shall be maintained by the said Controller as long as any portion of said moneys or property remains.

Each Department of the City and County of San Francisco, which in the normal operations under its powers and duties is by law and upon deposit of moneys by persons, firms, or corporations, authorized to perform certain services for and at the cost and expense of said persons, firms, or corporations, is hereby authorized to perform similar services for the United States of America, the State of California, or any division or agency of either, upon receipt of a legal and proper order or contract to pay to the City and County of San Francisco the full cost and expense of performing the required services upon completion thereof. City owned public utilities may with the approval of the Controller perform such services for privately owned public utilities in the manner provided in this paragraph.

The expenditures necessary from said funds or said accounts as created herein, in order to carry out the purpose for which said moneys or orders have been received or for which said accounts are being maintained, shall be approved by the Controller and said expenditures are hereby appropriated in accordance with the terms and conditions under which said moneys or orders have been received by the City and County of San Francisco, and in accordance with the conditions under which said funds are maintained.

Section 10. The Controller is hereby authorized and directed to set up appropriations for refunding amounts deposited in the treasury in excess of amounts due.

Section 11. Monies which are appropriated during the fiscal year from the Emergency Reserve Fund to departments, offices and funds shall be construed only as estimates of such requirements. The Controller shall, upon the determination of the actual requirement, return to the Emergency Reserve Fund that portion of the appropriation which is not actually required for the stated emergency.

Prior to the close of the fiscal year the Controller shall transfer to Emergency Reserve Fund from any available balance in the appropriations of any department, office or fund the amount such department, office or fund has received as an appropriation from the Emergency Reserve Fund or as much thereof as is available for transfer.

Section 12. The funds provided herein for compensating the members of the uniformed force of the Fire Department shall be used to pay the compensations as established by Sections 36 and 38.1 of the Charter as amended by the addition of Section 36.2 (approved by the voters at the election of May 16, 1944) and these funds shall be supplemented by appropriation at the time the tax is levied to support this ordinance by an amount which, together with the amounts herein provided in Appropriations Nos. 410.110.01 and 410.110.02, will be sufficient to pay the compensations hereinabove enumerated for the fiscal year 1944-45.

Authorization is hereby granted to pay the revised compensation effective as of July 1, 1944, provided that said amendment has been ratified prior to that date by the Legislature of the State of California.

In the event that ratification is at a later date, this authorization shall become effective within fifteen days after the date of its ratification.

Section 13. The term "department" as used in this ordinance shall mean department, bureau, office, utility, board or commission, as the case may be. The term "department head" as used herein shall be as defined in Section 20 of the Charter.

Section 14. The several amounts of estimated receipts herein appropriated, and each fund or department to which such appropriation is made, are as follows:
