The Board of Supervisors met in recessed session to resume consideration of the budget of estimated expenses for the fiscal year 1945-1946.

CALLING THE ROLL.

The roll was called and the following Supervisors were noted present:

Supervisors Colman, Gallagher, Gartland, Green, MacPhee, Mancuso, Mead, Meyer, Sullivan, Uhl—10.

Absent: Supervisor Brown—1.

Quorum present.

President Dan Gallagher presiding.

Supervisor Brown on leave of absence.

Consideration of Budget.

Supervisor MacPhee addressed the Board. The budget, he stated, as prepared by the Mayor and approved substantially by the Finance Committee, was before the Board. The Finance Committee, however, had not approved all expenditures in the budget, because of some differences of opinion. Supervisor MacPhee called attention to the very small increase in the assessment roll during the past seventeen years, as compared to the increased cost of municipal and county government. In 1928, he pointed out, the assessed valuation was \$807,000,000. It is normally assumed that assessed valuations could increase at 5 per cent annually, which, in 1945 would mean assessed values of \$1,760,000,000 instead of assessed valuation of only \$843,000,000 as at present. Because of the low assessment roll it has been necessary to increase the tax rate. The increase of assessed valuation has been only about 4 per cent over the past seventeen years.

Supervisor Colman objected to the statement by Supervisor MacPhee. It is not fair, he held, to assume that property values will increase 5 per cent annually. There is nothing on which to make that assumption.

Supervisor MacPhee agreed that probably Supervisor Colman was correct. However, the fact remained that during the past years the assessment roll has increased only about 4 per cent. However, at the present time values of real estate are changing. There has recently been a steadily increasing upward swing. If the assessed valuations are not increased, the tax rate must be increased.

Supervisor Green requested that the Assessor be requested to appear before the Board in order to give some information as to what the assessment roll may be expected to be for the coming fiscal year.

Supervisor Colman advised that the Board should start on a firm basis, in its budget consideration, by considering the meaning of the

tax rate. There is nothing more misleading, he stated, in determining the situation than the tax rate. It is perfectly obvious that the tax rate is determined by the amount of expenditures necessary in excess of revenue from other sources. If revenues from other sources increase, and the tax rate increases, it is because of increase in the cost of government.

Supervisor MacPhee agreed that the point mentioned by Supervisor Colman was very pertinent. However, it is important to consider assessed valuations on real estate to determine where the responsibility lies.

Supervisor Mancuso suggested that a reassessment of property should be undertaken. It might be that assessed valuations are entirely wrong, and there should be a Board or Commission appointed for the purpose of reassessing property in San Francisco.

Analysis of Budget Estimates.

Thereupon, Supervisor MacPhee presented an analysis of budget estimates. He suggested that no vote be taken on any particular departmental budget during the present morning session. The various departmental budgets should be taken up for approval at the subsequent sessions of the Board.

Index 14—*Public Library.*

Supervisor MacPhee explained that the budget for the Public Library called for one of the larger increases over the previous year. The increase is made up largely as follows: \$20,000 for land purchases, \$100,000 for new buildings. The Finance Committee has recommended some money for capital improvements instead of bond issue.

Mr. Clark, representing the Library Department, explained the need for the additional or increased appropriations. There has been a great many requests for establishment of branch libraries, many of which have had to be denied. The Marina and the North Beach districts have been selected for two new branch libraries.

Index 13—*Recreation Commission.*

Supervisor MacPhee pointed out that the budget of the Recreation Commission showed an increase of nearly \$88,000 over that of the previous year, and explained the reasons for said increase.

Miss Josephine Randall also explained the reasons for the required increase.

Index 64—*San Francisco Airport.*

Supervisor MacPhee explained the budget. The original request was for an increase of \$101,000; the Finance Committee recommends an increase of \$51,000. The tax increase in San Mateo County is about \$11,000. That leaves only \$40,000 over which the Board of Supervisors has control.

Captain Doolin, Superintendent of the Airport, reported that civil activities of the airport were building up very actively. There was a 70 per cent increase in actual schedules; mail tonnage has increased 109 per cent; and express has increased 248 per cent. All these increases have occurred during the past year. The mail increase reported did not include foreign or military mail. More than 700 passengers are passing through the field daily. The place is open 24 hours per day. The payroll on the field is \$15,500,000 annually.

Supervisor MacPhee pointed out that the Airport was running at a loss of \$304,000 during the current year.

Supervisor Colman believed that the Airport would pay tremendous dividends in the future. If the people vote a bond issue, and if San Francisco has more to sell, it will be good business for San Francisco. If this is not done, San Francisco will be going backward. The payroll of more than \$15,000,000 offsets some of the deficit. It is good business.

Supervisor Uhl declared that 50 per cent of the purchasing power of that payroll goes to San Mateo County.

Whereupon, in reply, Supervisor Colman declared that "It is still good business—it is real good business."

Captain Doolin pointed out that the taxpayers have invested less than \$5,000,000 in the Airport. The Airport has a valuation at the present time of \$17,000,000.

After further brief discussion, Supervisor Uhl reminded the Board that the matter was in the hands of the Post-war Planning Committee. It should be left alone until after that committee reports.

Index 62—*Public Utilities Commission, General Office.*

Mr. Robert Scott explained the increased employments in the general office. A large increase was in connection with legal services of the City Attorney's office.

Index 63—Light, Heat and Power.

Supervisor MacPhee explained the increase in the budget for the Public Utilities Commission, Heat, Light and Power. We pay, he stated, \$40 per year for company owned light standards. Where the City and County owns the standards, the cost is \$20 per year. He believed the City should own its own light standards, and Mr. Cahill has recommended an extensive program for the City and County to own its own standards. There is in the budget an item of \$200,000 for such purpose.

Supervisor Uhl announced that he would oppose the appropriation of \$200,700; he would also oppose an appropriation of \$41,000 for reconstruction and replacements.

Supervisor MacPhee declared that it was a question of policy as to what the Board wishes to do. Whether it is good business or not is for the Board to decide.

Index 65—Municipal Railway Consolidated.

Supervisor MacPhee announced that the Finance Committee was in agreement with most of the recommendations. Some of the committee, however, did not agree on the question of employments in the City Attorney's office.

Mr. H. S. Foley opposed the creation of position of Assistant Director of Public Relations in the general office. There was no need for such position, he held. However, he thought an additional personnel director for the Municipal Railway would accomplish much good. He requested, too, that an attorney be employed by the Public Utilities Commission to defend platform men charged with criminal offenses in connection with accidents. There were a number of employments he felt to be unnecessary, and he urged that the Board give them careful consideration before approving them. He objected particularly to the position of part-time physician.

Mr. Robert Scott reported on the part-time physician. He checks up on absent employees; he visits the homes of all employees on sick leave.

Supervisor MacPhee pointed out that of the new employments, 44 out of 48 were office employees.

Mr. Scott explained that both the Municipal Railway and the Market Street Railway were undermanned at the time of the consolidation. The Market Street Railway employees had worked a great deal of overtime, Saturdays and Sundays. He explained in detail the requested new employments. Mr. Scott also answered statement which had been made by Mr. Foley, with particular reference to duplicate employments and to Claims Adjuster and General Claims Agent.

RECESS.

At the hour of 12:15 P. M., pursuant to motion previously made by Supervisor MacPhee, the Board recessed to reconvene at 2:00 P. M.

Reconvening of Board of Supervisors.

The Board of Supervisors reconvened at 2:15 P. M. to resume consideration of budget of estimated expenses for the fiscal year 1945-1946.

CALLING THE ROLL.

The roll was called and the following Supervisors were noted present:

Supervisors Colman, Gallagher, Gartland, MacPhee, Mancuso, Mead, Meyer, Sullivan, Uhl—9.

Absent: Supervisors Brown, Green—2.

Quorum present.

President Dan Gallagher presiding.

Supervisor Green was noted present at 2:50 P. M.

Supervisor Brown on leave of absence.

Consideration of Budget.

Consideration of budget of estimated expenses for the fiscal year 1945-1946 was resumed.

Index 1—Board of Supervisors.

Supervisor MacPhee explained the increases in the budget for the Board of Supervisors, as follows: \$12,000 for alterations in the office of the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors; the remainder of the increases was for increase in rates of advertising and official printing, etc. As to the alterations in the office of the Clerk, that was a matter of policy for the Board to decide.

Supervisor Uhl moved that the item of \$12,000 for alterations in the office of the Clerk be deleted.

Supervisor Meyer took the Chair, at the request of President Gallagher, who desired to participate in the discussion of the Board's budget.

Supervisor Mead announced that the amount originally requested for alterations had been \$15,000, but that the Finance Committee had agreed to compromise on the reduced amount of \$12,000. The Committee had agreed that the work should be done at an expense not to exceed \$12,500.

Supervisor MacPhee stated that the item had received considerable discussion in the Mayor's office.

Supervisor Gallagher announced that the Board of Supervisors would have to do some cutting of the budget. The Board should first take into consideration its own budget. He was not sure that \$12,000 was needed for alterations in the Clerk's office, but something was needed. He then moved that the amount of \$12,000 be deleted from the budget, and in lieu thereof, the sum of \$2,000 be substituted. He objected to any proposal to keep the public out of the office of the Clerk. The Board, he held, had no more right to keep the public out of the office than it had to keep the public out of the City Hall.

The Clerk, pursuant to request by Supervisor Colman, stated that his office has been a general passage way for everybody. The public generally passes through the office. People sit at the desks of the different clerks, meet the Supervisors. People are brought into the office by the Supervisors. There should be some privacy in the office in the interest of greater efficiency,

Supervisor Uhl, thereupon, seconded the motion by Supervisor Gallagher, stating that in the interest of economy the Board should vote against the \$12,000 item.

Supervisor Mead, in discussing the matter, pointed out that it has nothing to do with the members of the Board. It is not a question of privacy except to members of the Board. It is a question of a reasonable amount of privacy for the people employed in the office. The office of the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors is close to a madhouse. The Board of Supervisors should not criticize any attempt to modernize its office. The clerks have to prepare legislation, reports, etc., often on just a very few minutes' notice. Each year the Board begins to economize with itself. A very bad situation in the Clerk's office should be corrected, and the office should be modernized. He was opposed to the motion to delete \$12,000 and setting up an arbitrary figure of \$2,000.

Supervisor Colman opposed the motion. Two thousand dollars would have no value at all, he held. The Board might as well strike out the entire amount.

Supervisor Mead again urged approval of the entire amount of \$12,000.

Supervisor Mancuso expressed the thought that the Board of Supervisors should pay attention to its own work before spending money on the outside. The Board should take care of its own office first. The improvement was really needed. He was opposed to any reduction.

Supervisor Gallagher raised a point of order, stating that there was a motion before the Board to decrease the item from \$12,000 to \$2,000. Any discussion as to the need of the improvement was out of order.

Supervisor Colman objected, stating that in considering an appropriation the need for the appropriation—what the money was being spent for—was entirely in order and that the members were entitled to such information before being requested to vote.

The Chair, however, ruled the point of order to be well taken.

Thereupon, the roll was called and the motion *failed* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Gallagher, Uhl—2.

Noes: Supervisors Colman, Gartland, MacPhee, Mancuso, Mead, Meyer, Sullivan—7.

Absent: Supervisors Brown, Green—2.

Index 1, sheet 1, line 9—Legislative Expense, \$5,000.

Supervisor MacPhee, at the request of Supervisor Gallagher, explained the foregoing item.

Thereupon, Supervisor Uhl, seconded by Supervisor Gallagher, moved that the foregoing item be reduced from \$5,000 to \$2,500.

Supervisor Mead opposed the motion, stating that the amount of \$2,500 was but an arbitrary amount. The item might as well be cut out entirely as reduced to such amount.

Supervisor Mancuso opposed the reduction. The money should be available if needed.

Supervisors Colman and MacPhee spoke briefly in favor of the motion.

Thereupon, the roll was called and the motion to reduce the item for Legislative Expense from \$5,000 to \$2,500 *failed* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Colman, Gallagher, MacPhee, Uhl—4.

Noes: Supervisors Gartland, Mancuso, Mead, Meyer, Sullivan—5.

Absent: Supervisors Brown, Green—2.

Consideration of Supplemental Budget Requests.

Supervisor MacPhee suggested that the Board take up each supplemental budget request with the department affected, because of past criticism that supplemental budget requests had not received sufficient consideration.

Proposal to Recess.

Supervisor Gallagher, seconded by Supervisor Uhl, moved that the Board recess until absent members are present.

The Clerk announced that Supervisor Brown was on leave of absence, and that Supervisor Green was on his way to the meeting. Supervisor Green, being noted present at 2:50 P. M., during the discussion on the motion to recess temporarily, action on the motion was not pressed.

Thereupon, Supervisor Colman suggested that the Board take up supplemental budget requests affecting its own budget. He desired to know the entire amount of the Board's budget requests before voting. Motion seconded by Supervisor Mancuso.

After brief discussion by Supervisor MacPhee, who supported the motion, the roll was called and the motion was *carried* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Colman, Gartland, MacPhee, Mancuso, Mead, Meyer, Sullivan—7.

Noes: Supervisors Gallagher, Green, Uhl—3.

Absent: Supervisor Brown—1.

Supplemental Budget Request, Joint Highway District No. 9 \$66,000.

Supervisor MacPhee presented supplemental budget request, Joint Highway District No. 9, \$66,000.

Supervisor Colman announced that he had always been opposed to the Joint Highway Districts. He did not believe the Board was required to vote for such appropriation. He would vote "No."

Supervisor Gallagher announced that the foregoing request had nothing to do with the Board of Supervisors' budget.

The Chair declared that the supplemental budget appropriation requested was mandatory.

Supervisor Colman declared that it might be mandatory on the Chief Administrative Officer, it was not on the Board of Supervisors, and moved approval of the Board of Supervisors' budget, without the requested \$66,000. Motion seconded by Supervisor Mancuso.

The Chair again declared that the supplemental budget had to be approved. The Board could not merely drop it.

Supervisor Colman objected to the appropriation, pointing out that the Supervisors were not charged with building highways.

The Chief Administrative Officer pointed out that he had always taken the position that the requested appropriation was not a just charge against the gas tax. However, the City Attorney has ruled on several occasions that it is a charge against the City and County of San Francisco, which the City and County must assume. If it is

a charge against the City and County, it must come either from taxes or the gas tax. Rather than include it in the tax base, it should be included in the gas tax. The second one-quarter cent. It should not be in the Supervisors' budget.

Thereupon, Supervisor Gallagher resumed the Chair.

Whereupon, the roll was called and the budget of estimated expense for the Board of Supervisors was *approved* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Colman, Gallagher, Gartland, Green, MacPhee, Mancuso, Mead, Meyer, Sullivan—9.

Noes: Supervisor Uhl—1.

Absent: Supervisor Brown—1.

Supplemental Budget Request, Joint Highway District No. 9, \$66,000.

Supervisor MacPhee again presented supplemental budget request for appropriation of \$66,000 for Joint Highway District No. 9, to be provided from gasoline tax.

Supervisor Uhl announced his intention to vote against the requested appropriation. He could not see what work had been done during the year just ending.

Supervisor Meyer, in urging approval of the supplemental budget request, reported that both Santa Cruz and San Mateo counties always pay their obligations as regularly as they become due. This is an obligation of the City and County of San Francisco.

Thereupon, Supervisor Uhl announced that he would vote for appropriation for Joint Highway District No. 9. He was opposed to Joint Highway District No. 10.

Supervisor Colman, in explanation of his vote, again stated that he had always taken the attitude that joint highway districts were not necessary economically, and that they were unwise. There was a question in the mind of the City Attorney as to whether it was entirely compulsory. He had declined to view with favor any such appropriations in the past. He would vote "No."

Thereupon, the roll was called and the supplemental budget request for appropriation of \$66,000 for Joint Highway District No. 9 was *approved* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Gallagher, Gartland, Green, Mancuso, MacPhee, Mead, Meyer, Sullivan, Uhl—9.

No: Supervisor Colman—1.

Absent: Supervisor Brown—1.

Periodic Reassessments of Property.

The Assessor, in answer to questioning by Supervisor MacPhee as to the advisability of reassessment of property every five years, stated that there was no need for such periodic reassessments. Every piece of property in San Francisco is covered yearly. Values are up to date. The assessment roll reflects the Assessor's opinion as to the value of property from year to year. The Assessor has felt for some time that he did not have a sufficient appraisal force, but he could not guarantee that if he had additional appraisers there would be any increase in the assessment roll. However, there is no relationship between the cost of government and the assessed valuation. The assessment rolls of most major cities have shown decreased values during the past ten years. The Assessor also expressed doubt as to San Francisco ever reaching the peak values of 1929.

Index 3—Assessor.

Supervisor MacPhee, in explaining increases in the budget of the Assessor, pointed out that there were four new employments. The major portion of the increase represents new employments.

Privilege of the Floor.

Mr. Arthur Younger, speaking for the Municipal Conference, urged that a closer budget be maintained. He objected to the method of providing for emergencies, resulting in large surplus in the budget. He believed that the Mayor's Emergency Reserve Fund should be increased to the maximum provided by law, and that the Mayor allow emergency funds to come from that fund.

Specifically, on the budget now before the Board, the Municipal Conference has certain ideas in regard to utilities. As to whether the City should go into the utility business, there are many and varied opinions, but after the City has decided to embark on a utility business there is very little difference of opinion as to whether such utility should pay its own way or become a burden on the general tax fund. As to the Water Department, it is the opinion of the Conference that the Hetch Hetchy expense, including bond interest and redemption, should come entirely from water and electricity revenues, and should not be a burden on the general tax fund. Rates fixed should be such as to bring in sufficient revenue to carry bonded indebtedness. This applies to street cars or any other utility that the City operates. The Conference hopes that the Supervisors, in considering the budget, will obtain from the Public Utilities Commission a definite promise to increase rates so that sufficient funds are obtained by the Water Department to take care of its obligations. Such, the Conference understands, is the recommendation of the Mayor. The Conference hopes that the Supervisors see to it that a commitment is made or the budget is reduced sufficiently so that the utilities will balance and not be a burden on the general fund. We have to pay the bills for essential service. We must raise money to pay for a lot of utility maintenance, but on what is essential and what is not, there may be a very marked difference of opinion. Another item in the budget on which the Conference feels rather strongly is the new philosophy in the Fire Department that like ranks must be relieved by like ranks. Under such a philosophy, the Board would require two clerks. There would not be a relief for anyone except by someone of equal rank. It is not good philosophy; it is not sound management. Another point is the matter of unfilled positions. Although there are many eliminations of positions, there still remain a number of positions in the budget for which money is being appropriated but positions have not been filled for some time. The Conference believes that in many cases money should not be appropriated for these unfilled positions. Another matter is a proposed increase of 10 per cent for carmen and a number of other employees. That, the Conference believes, is partial standardization. The salary standardization legislation is a protection to the employees as well as to the rest of the citizens of the City and County. If a majority of the Board of Supervisors should decide to reduce a basic rate by 10 per cent, there would be a storm of protest. So far as the Municipal Conference is concerned, it would join in that protest. The Conference believes the Board has no right to change any rate of pay, once it is fixed. If the Board believes that there is a wide variance of pay that is not warranted, it should proceed under the Charter and have a new salary survey. Salary standardization should not be piecemeal. The Conference is strongly against piecemeal standardization.

Approval of Assessor's Budget.

Thereupon, on motion by Supervisor Sullivan, there being no objection, the budget of the Assessor was *approved*.

Index 2—Mayor.

Supervisor MacPhee explained the net increase in the Mayor's budget. The budget before the Board shows a supplemental budget, of which the Board has no copy. (Thereupon, copy of supplemental budget was presented to the Board by Mr. David Lewis.)

The Mayor, in speaking on his own budget, stated that in his letter transmitting the budget, dated April 30, 1945, copies were given to every member of the Board as well as to the press, which went into some detail of the Mayor's budget. The total increase of his budget was \$56,446. Included in his budget was \$25,000 for salary and expense of the City's legislative representative at Sacramento. When Mr. Cleary was employed during the previous fall, it was at the rate of \$8,000 per year, but with the understanding that if he made good it would be increased to \$10,000 beginning July 1, 1945. The Mayor felt that Mr. Cleary was doing a good job, and he has included in the budget \$10,000 for the next fiscal year. There is also \$15,000 for expense. The Mayor's budget, as originally submitted included, if he recalled correctly, eight additional employments, of which six were so-called technical staff. In his letter of April 30, the Mayor had suggested a reduction of these six employments, to three. He needed these employments in connection with budget consideration. It is impossible to go over the budget in detail within the time allowed. During his budget consideration, in many cases he has been doubtful whether some appropriations have been right or wrong. When he took office, he had one administrative assistant, Mr. David Lewis, together with his stenographer. Last year the Board approved an additional man as assistant to Mr. Lewis. Now the Mayor is recommending that the staff be increased to three more men who will be available to develop facts in connection with the various budgets throughout the year, so that when the budget does come before the Mayor he will have more information. The Mayor realizes that each department furnishes very complete information; he realizes, also, the disposition on the part of those running the various departments is to ask for more than they actually expect to receive. That is perfectly natural from their point of view. The Mayor wants to be able to check up statements made by the commissioners and the heads of the various departments. In other cities, budget preparation is more thoroughly gone into than in San Francisco. Some cities have budget departments which are working throughout the year. He believed it good business to add the three additional employments. An assistant to Mr. Kane and an additional stenographer are also needed. It is necessary that people who visit the Mayor's office with complaints or suggestions can be heard by Mr. Kane or his assistant, and to insure that all correspondence be properly acknowledged and cared for. These five employments requested by the Mayor, he felt, were not out of line, considering the importance of the office. In making his recommendations for other departments, the Mayor stated, he has done the best he could. As to the Water Department, mentioned by Mr. Younger, the Mayor desired the record to show that in previous years that department has not been allowed sufficient funds to take care of replacements and extensions, due to the growing needs of the City, and on top of that, other revenues have been reduced by cuts in the water rates. The Mayor also said that he had suggested in his budget message that the Public Utilities Commission might well consider the restoration of the latest cut in the water rates. Such restoration would take in about \$1,250,000. As to the Public Utilities Commission, Water Department, the Mayor relied on the recommendations of the Manager of Utilities, and left in that budget substantial increases in capital expenditures for replacements and extensions of improvements. He had tried to look as reasonably as he could on other capital expenditures recommended, such as appropriations for new fire houses, new libraries, new police station, but we now have to make up for work that we

have failed to do in the past, within reason. The City is not in business for a profit, but at the same time the City and County expects service in the various ways in which service is expected.

Mr. David Lewis announced that there were two chauffeurs in the Mayor's budget. There is now one such position.

Supervisor Uhl announced that the Chief Administrative Officer is not requesting additional help to check up in his departments.

The Mayor then declared that in Mr. Brooks, the Chief Administrative Officer, the City has a very unusual city servant. However, Mr. Brooks has been handicapped by a lack of assistants.

The Chief Administrative Officer, in reply to Supervisor Uhl, announced that he had never requested additional employees until this current budget. He was now requesting one additional employment. In the past he had never been refused an employment, because he had never requested one.

Thereupon Supervisor Uhl announced that he could not go along with request for three additional employments, feeling that there nothing would be accomplished.

His Honor, the Mayor, in reply to Supervisor Uhl, declared that he was wrong. In the city charter the Mayor is supposed to be responsible for a number of things, including intelligent passing of the budget. He was casting no reflection on Mr. Brooks, for he was one of the best of our city servants. He, himself, the Mayor, continued, had been checked up; he was used to a board of directors that have asked questions. He had been checked up in the Army. He did not believe Mr. Brooks would take any exception if the Mayor himself asked a lot of questions—or Dr. Geiger—or Mr. Vensano— or Mr. Jones.

Index 2, sheet 4, line 2. Office Furniture and Equipment, \$1,000.

This item, Mr. Lewis explained, was placed in the budget to take care of desks, chairs, filing cabinet and one calculating machine.

Index 2, sheet 4, line 3. Furniture and Furnishings, \$500.

Mr. Lewis explained the need for the appropriation. The amount originally requested was \$1,000. It was for alterations in the Mayor's office. However, during the year, the Mayor has been able to use some of his funds for part of the work.

Index 2, sheet 4, line 4. Automobile, \$1,000.

Mr. Lewis explained the need for the requested automobile.

Index 2, sheet 2, line 16. Public Service Assistant, \$4,500.

Supervisor Uhl moved to delete.

Motion *failed* for want of a second.

Index 2, sheet 2, lines 18, 19 and 20. Administrative Analyst (Fiscal), \$4,500; Administrative Technician (4), \$14,400; and Administrative Analyst (Staffing), \$4,500.

Supervisor Uhl moved to delete.

Motion *failed* for want of a second.

Thereupon, Supervisor Mancuso, seconded by Supervisor Gallagher, moved approval of the Mayor's budget.

Supervisor MacPhee, however, moved reconsideration for the purpose of making a reduction in the appropriation for legislative expense.

Whereupon, Supervisor Mancuso announced that with the consent of his second, he would withdraw his motion.

Whereupon, Supervisor MacPhee moved that, in view of the fact that there was to be no legislative session, the item, Legislative Expense, \$25,000, Index 2, sheet 1, line 6, be reduced by \$10,000. Motion seconded by Supervisor Uhl.

Supervisor Mead objected to the proposed reduction. Legislative representative for the City and County of San Francisco can do a great deal of work for the benefit of the City and County during an off season as well as when the Legislature is in session. However, he would have no objection to making a reasonable reduction during an off season.

Thereupon, Supervisor Mead moved to amend the motion to reduce the amount by \$5,000, to \$20,000. Motion seconded by Supervisor Colman.

Supervisor MacPhee objected to the motion, stating that it would not be necessary to maintain an office at Sacramento, or to maintain stenographic help. Mr. Cleary would have access to the Board of Supervisors' office for that purpose. Five thousand dollars would be a sufficient amount for his expenses.

Thereupon, the roll was called and the motion to reduce the amount of the appropriation for legislative expense to \$20,000 was carried by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Colman, Gallagher, Gartland, Green, Mead, Meyer—6.

Noes: Supervisors MacPhee, Mancuso, Sullivan, Uhl—4.

Absent: Supervisor Brown—1.

Explanation of Vote on Approval of Budget.

Supervisor Colman, in explaining his vote on approval of the Mayor's budget, stated that in considering the importance of the office, and the fact that the Mayor has to cover all the budget, and this is the Mayor's budget, one can see that the Mayor could not give the budget proper consideration by himself, or even with one assistant. As to the Mayor's proposed method of budget consideration, it must be tried out to determine its value. If it works out practically as well as it appeals theoretically, hundreds of thousands of dollars may be saved. The amount involved is very small in proportion to the benefits that may be received. He was voting on that theory.

Thereupon, the roll was called and the Mayor's budget was approved by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Colman, Gallagher, Gartland, Green, MacPhee, Mancuso, Mead, Meyer, Sullivan—9.

No: Supervisor Uhl—1.

Absent: Supervisor Brown—1.

Index 79—*San Francisco Citizens' Protective Corps.*

Supervisor Uhl moved that the budget for the San Francisco Citizens' Protective Corps be reduced by \$40,153. That reduction would be effected by the deletion of three items, as follows: Headquarters, Coordinator's Office, \$26,663; Mileage Administrator, \$7,140; Communications, Control Centers, \$6,350.

Index 79, sheet 1, line 2. Supervisor Uhl moved deletion.

Supervisor MacPhee opposed the deletion. Included in that item was an amount to pay Mr. McKeon's secretary. It is intended to permit an assistant to carry on. However, Mr. McKeon's position can be eliminated. Another position in the service has been on loan from the Controller's office. He has to clean up his work there.

Index 79.1, sheet 4, line 1. Coordinator, Citizens' Protective Corps, \$4,800.

Supervisor MacPhee moved a reduction of \$4,799, leaving that item in the budget at \$1. The motion just made, Supervisor MacPhee stated, was but one item in a breakdown of Supervisor Uhl's motion.

Motion seconded by Supervisor Gallagher.

No objection, and motion carried.

Index 79.1, sheet 4, line 3. Administrative Assistant Coordinator of Citizens' Protective Service, \$3,600.

Supervisor MacPhee moved a reduction of \$2,700, leaving \$900 for payment of salary of Mr. Yost for three months. Motion seconded by Supervisor Gallagher.

No objection, and motion carried.

Further consideration of the budget for the Citizens' Protective Corps was temporarily postponed.

Subsequently during the proceedings, Mr. Yost was present and informed the Board that his duties with the Citizens' Protective Corps as Administrative Assistant to the Coordinator would be concluded within three months.

Index 79.8, sheet 11, line 2. Contractual Service, \$6,100.

Supervisor Uhl moved deletion thereof.

No action.

Mr. Yost explained the item, and stated that it should be reduced from \$6,100 to \$5,900.

Supervisor Gallagher moved that the item be so reduced. Motion seconded by Supervisor Uhl.

No objection, and motion carried.

Approval of Budget.

Thereupon, Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Gallagher, moved that the budget for the San Francisco Citizens' Protective Corps, in its entirety, and as amended, be approved.

No objection, and budget approved.

Index 5—*District Attorney.*

After explanation by Supervisor MacPhee, and on motion by Supervisor Mancuso, seconded by Supervisor Gallagher, there being *no objection*, the budget of the District Attorney was approved, as presented.

Supplemental Budget, District Attorney.

Index 5, sheet 2, line 18. Attorney, Criminal (part time). Change positions to full time, and provide additional amount of \$1,128 for said purpose.

Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Uhl, moved approval.

No objection, and supplemental budget approved.

Index 4—*City Attorney*

Supervisor MacPhee explained the reason for the increase of \$86,310, pointing out that because of transfer of funds from Public Utilities Commission, the actual increase was only \$3,000 to \$4,000.

Index 4, sheet 4, line 12. Automobile, \$2,000.

Supervisor Gallagher, seconded by Supervisor Uhl, moved deletion of the foregoing item.

Mr. Dion Holm, Assistant City Attorney, explained the need for the automobile in question. The automobile was needed for the use of claims investigators, the interview of witnesses, and the bringing of witnesses into court. The present automobile was useless.

Supervisor Mancuso opposed the deletion.

Thereupon, the roll was called and the motion *failed* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Gallagher, MacPhee, Uhl—3.

Noes: Supervisors Colman, Gartland, Green, Mancuso, Mead, Meyer, Sullivan—7.

Absent: Supervisor Brown—1.

Index 4, sheet 4, line 4. Rental of Office, \$6,000.

Supervisor Gallagher, seconded by Supervisor Colman, moved deletion.

No objection, and motion *carried*.

Index 4, sheet 4, line 11. Furniture and Office Equipment, \$2,000.

Supervisor MacPhee moved reduction of \$1,000, making the item read \$1,000.

No objection, and motion *carried*.

Additional Employments, City Attorney's Office

Supervisor MacPhee announced that there had been presented a supplemental budget request providing for an additional attorney in the City Attorney's office. The Board has already eliminated an \$800 position; the supplemental budget request would add another position at \$600.

Dr. Dion Holm, Assistant City Attorney, stated that the City Attorney was asking for two additional attorneys at \$600 and one at \$475. He wanted one at \$800 to relieve the top two trial men of the pressure they were under. However, the City Attorney had agreed to take two \$600 men and one attorney at \$475. It has been agreed to delete one of the three men in the budget for this coming year. There is now one person attending to all the utilities of the City and County other than the Municipal Railway. In Los Angeles they have one attorney at \$15,000, with nine assistants. Across the Bay, for water department work, there is one attorney with 12 assistants. In discussing further employments in the City Attorney's office, Mr. Holm stated that both the City Attorney and himself believed that the attorneys in the office should not be under Civil Service.

Supervisor Gallagher called attention to the City Attorney's 20 employees a year ago—he now has 30; whereupon, Mr. Holm pointed out, at length, the extra demands on the City Attorney's office occasioned by the acquisition of the Market Street Railway. Without enough attorneys to handle suits properly, the City and County can easily lose a half million dollars or more a year.

After further brief discussion, Supervisor MacPhee moved that certain new employments be eliminated, as follows:

Index 4, sheet 4, line 4. 7 General Clerk-Stenographers, reduce by 3.

Index 4, sheet 2, line 9. 5 Senior Attorneys, Civil, reduce by 1.

Index 4, sheet 2, line 11—4 Principal Attorneys, reduce by 2.

Motion seconded by Supervisor Uhl.

However, after brief discussion, Supervisor MacPhee changed his motion with respect to the third item immediately above, Principal

Attorneys, to provide for the elimination of one position instead of two positions.

Mr. Holm objected to the proposed eliminations, stating that the City Attorney's office could not function properly without the employments recommended by his Honor, the Mayor. If financial loss is suffered because of lack of help, it will be the responsibility of the Board of Supervisors. It is impossible for the present force to handle the number of cases that are coming in. The requested number of employments is the minimum number with which the City Attorney can function. Possibly the City Attorney will have to request even more help. The situation is serious.

Supervisor Mancuso agreed with Mr. Holm that the situation was serious, and he believed the Board should approve the request of the City Attorney.

Supervisor MacPhee, in reply, stated that the City Attorney was not being asked to get along with the same number of attorneys he had when the Market Street Railway was purchased. Five attorneys and two stenographers have already been provided for him.

Thereupon, the roll was called and the motion to eliminate employees *failed* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors MacPhee, Uhl—2.

Noes: Supervisors Colman, Gallagher, Gartland, Green, Mancuso, Mead, Meyer, Sullivan—9.

Absent: Supervisor Brown—1.

Supervisor Gallagher, seconded by Supervisor Sullivan, moved approval of the budget for the City Attorney.

Motion *carried* and budget approved by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Colman, Gallagher, Gartland, Green, Mancuso, Mead, Meyer, Sullivan—8.

Noes: Supervisors MacPhee, Uhl—2.

Absent: Supervisor Brown—1.

Supplemental Budget Request, City Attorney

Supervisor MacPhee presented supplemental budget request, approved by his Honor, the Mayor, to provide for one additional principal attorney, at \$600 per month, in place of one Chief Attorney, Civil, at \$800 per month, which had been eliminated. Supervisor MacPhee suggested that inasmuch as he intended to vote against the supplemental budget request, some one else should move approval thereof.

Thereupon, Supervisor Gallagher, seconded by Supervisor Colman, moved approval of the supplemental budget request as presented.

Motion *carried* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Colman, Gallagher, Gartland, Green, MacPhee, Mead, Meyer, Sullivan—8.

Noes: Supervisors MacPhee, Uhl—2.

Absent: Supervisor Brown—1.

Index 6. Treasurer.

Supervisor MacPhee explained the increased employments; they were required as a result of the consolidation of the Market Street and the Municipal Railway. The Finance Committee has felt that money should be transferred by the Public Utilities Commission for the purpose of off-setting charges or expense due to the Market Street Railway purchase.

Mr. Robert Scott, representing the Public Utilities Commission, announced that the Commission had not received any request from the Treasurer for such transfer of funds. Such request will be con-

sidered by the Commission, if received, and he believed the Commission would act favorably on such request.

After further brief discussion, and on motion by Supervisor Gallagher, *consideration of the Treasurer's budget was postponed until a later date.*

Index 7—*Sheriff.*

Supervisor MacPhee explained the increases in the Sheriff's budget.

Thereupon, on motion by Supervisor Gallagher, seconded by Supervisor Uhl, the budget of the Sheriff was *approved without objection.*

Index 8—*Public Defender.*

Supervisor MacPhee explained the increases in the Public Defender's budget.

Whereupon, Supervisor Mancuso, seconded by Supervisor Gallagher, moved approval of the budget of the Public Defender.

No objection, and budget approved.

Index 9—*Police Department.*

Supervisor Uhl called attention to budget item of \$100,000 for Mission Police Station. He suggested that the Board set up a policy to provide, wherever possible, that such improvements be set up as post-war projects.

Index 9, sheet 17, line 2. Buildings, Mission Station, \$100,000.

Supervisor Uhl, seconded by Supervisor Gallagher, moved deletion of the foregoing item.

Supervisor Mancuso opposed the motion. It is impossible to make every major improvement a post-war project. Some things must be taken care of as they are needed, on a "pay-as-you-go" basis.

Supervisor Gallagher disagreed. Most of the construction items in the budget can be set up as post-war projects. This \$100,000 will not be spent during this coming year. The people should decide as to which are the most important improvements.

Supervisor Mancuso announced that he agreed with the views expressed by Supervisor Gallagher on major programs, but not on a small program.

Thereupon, the roll was called and the motion *failed* by the following vote:

Motion carried, and budget approved by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Colman, Gallagher, Gartland, Green, MacPhee, Mancuso, Mead, Meyer, Sullivan—9.

No: Supervisor Uhl—1.

Absent: Supervisor Brown—1.

Index 9.79—*Police—War Emergency.*

Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Meyer, moved approval.

No objection, and budget approved.

Index 9.79.3—*Police—Air Raid Warden Service.*

Supervisor Mancuso, seconded by Supervisor Gallagher, moved approval.

No objection, and budget approved.

Index 9.79.12—*Police—Auxiliary Police.*

Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Gallagher, moved approval.

No objection, and budget approved.

Index 10. *Fire Department.*

Supervisor MacPhee suggested that Mr. Younger, who had previously addressed the Board, and the Chief of the Fire Department, be sent for.

No objection, and so ordered. Consideration of budget temporarily postponed.

Index 11. *Board of Permit Appeals.*

Supervisor Gallagher moved approval of the budget of the Board of Permit Appeals.

No objection, and budget approved.

Index 12—*Park Commission.*

Supervisor MacPhee explained the new employments and the increases in the budget of the Park Commission.

Index 12, sheet 9, line 10. Electrical, \$3,550.

Supervisor Uhl objected to the creation of said position at the present time, and moved deletion thereof.

Motion failed for want of a second.

Index 12, sheet 32, line 7. Engineering and Architectural Services, \$15,000.

Supervisor MacPhee moved deletion.

Motion failed for want of a second.

Index 12, sheet 33, line 32. Kezar Stadium, Painting Benches, \$18,000.

Supervisor MacPhee explained the necessity therefor, and moved approval of the foregoing item.

No objection, and budget item approved.

Index 12, sheet 34, line 8. Replacement Electric Cable, Fleishacker Pool, \$6,100.

Supervisor MacPhee explained the necessity therefor, and moved approval of the foregoing item.

No objection, and budget item approved.

Thereupon, Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Mancuso, moved approval of the budget for the Park Commission.

Motion carried and Park Commission budget *approved* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Colman, Gallagher, Gartland, Green, MacPhee, Mancuso, Mead, Meyer, Sullivan—9.

No: Supervisor Uhl—1.

Absent: Supervisor Brown—1.

Supervisor Colman, seconded by Supervisor Gallagher, moved that the Board recess to reconvene at 8:00 P. M.

Whereupon, there being no objection, the Board, at the hour of 6:00 P. M., recessed, to reconvene at 8:00 P. M.

Consideration of Budget.

Consideration of the budget was resumed.

Index 50.1 to 50.21, inclusive—*Department of Public Health.*

On motion by Supervisor MacPhee, the budget of the Department of Public Health, index 50.1 to 50.21, inclusive, was *approved without objection.*

Index 13, 13.1, 13.2, 13.3, and 13.89—*Recreation Commission.*

Supervisor MacPhee explained the increases in the budget, and the increased employments, some of which had been filled during the current fiscal year.

Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Colman, moved approval of the budget.

No objection, and budget approved.

Supplemental Budget Requests, Recreation Commission.

Supervisor MacPhee presented supplemental budget request, \$9,224, for improvement of Aptos Playground, the estimated cost of which has been set at \$19,024, and moved approval thereof.

Motion seconded by Supervisor Colman.

No objection, and supplemental budget approved.

Supervisor MacPhee presented supplemental budget request, "That the \$3,600 requested for an additional Assistant Superintendent in Appropriation 513.120.00 be transferred to Appropriation 513.120.01, Temporary Salaries."

Supervisor Colman, seconded by Supervisor Meyer, moved approval.

No objection, and supplemental budget request approved.

Supervisor MacPhee presented supplemental budget request, "That the sum of \$5,000 be added to Appropriation 513.800.00, Rentals for

the purpose of negotiating a new lease for the Crystal Plunge at yearly rental of \$20,000," and moved approval thereof.

No objection, and supplemental budget request *approved*.

Supplemental Budget Requests, Park Commission.

Index 12, sheet 26, line 13. Operating Engineer, \$3,300, should be increased to read \$3,600, an increase of \$300. *Approved* by the Mayor.

Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Colman, moved approval.

No objection, and supplemental budget request *approved*.

Index 12, sheet 15, line 5. Janitor, \$1,730. Should be changed to \$1,900, to provide proper compensation for employee returning from military leave of absence. Mayor approves additional amount of \$170.

Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Sullivan, moved approval.

No objection, and supplemental budget request *approved*.

Index 14—Public Library.

Supervisor MacPhee explained the reason for increases in the Public Library budget.

Supervisor Uhl announced that he was in favor of adding to the facilities of the Public Library Department. However, he believed the construction of branch libraries should be considered as post-war projects. He could not vote in favor of the Public Library budget for that purpose. He did not want finance by the taxpayers at this time. He could not vote, either, for \$20,000 for the purchase of a library site. He believed that land owned by the School Department might be obtained for library purposes.

Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Mancuso, moved approval of the budget for the Public Library.

Motion *carried* and budget *approved* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Colman, Gallagher, Gartland, Green, MacPhee, Mancuso, Meyer, Sullivan—8.

Absent: Supervisors Brown, Mead—2.

Index 15—War Memorial.

Supervisor MacPhee explained the increases in the budget for the War Memorial, which increases, undoubtedly, he stated, would be reflected in additional revenues.

Thereupon, Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Sullivan, moved approval of the War Memorial budget.

No objection, and budget *approved*.

Index 16—Art Commission.

Supervisor MacPhee explained the increases in the budget of the Art Commission, after which he moved approval of the budget for that commission. Motion seconded by Supervisor Meyer.

No objection, and budget *approved*.

Supplemental Budget Requests, Art Commission.

Supervisor MacPhee presented supplemental budget requests from the Art Commission, requesting additional supplemental appropriation of \$966 to cover increase in compensation for a General Clerk-Stenographer from part time to full time.

Supervisor Colman moved approval.

Motion *failed* for want of a second.

Index 17—*California Palace of the Legion of Honor.*

After explanation of the increases, Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Sullivan, moved approval of the budget for the California Palace of the Legion of Honor.

No objection, and budget *approved*.

Index 18—*M. H. deYoung Memorial Museum.*

Supervisor MacPhee explained the increases in the budget of the M. H. deYoung Memorial Museum.

Index 18, sheet 2, line 22. Supervisor MacPhee announced that three employments, Curator B, were requested, but two were allowed.

Thereupon, Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Sullivan, moved approval of the budget of the M. H. deYoung Memorial Museum.

Budget *approved* by the following vote:

Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Colman, moved approval.

Motion *carried* and supplemental budget request *approved* by the following vote:

No: Supervisor Uhl—1.

Absent: Supervisors Brown, Mead—2.

Index 19—*California Academy of Sciences, Steinhart Aquarium.*

Supervisor MacPhee explained the increases in the budget of the California Academy of Sciences.

Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Sullivan, moved approval.

No objection, and budget *approved*.

Supplemental budget request, \$1,007.99, for replacement of refrigeration system.

Supervisor MacPhee presented supplemental budget request for \$1,007.99 required for replacement of refrigeration system required to cool water for salmon and trout; Supervisor MacPhee reported that the Finance Committee had given careful consideration to the advisability of approving the request, in view of the fact that the Aquarium was privately owned. The California Academy of Sciences owns property on Market Street from which it receives revenue. The Board of Supervisors, and the Mayor, in approving the original budget and keeping the amount of money up to last year's, has gone along about as far as it could. He was not in favor of the request, although he knew the work was necessary.

Supervisor Colman held the situation was similar to that of the Palace of the Legion of Honor, and of the Museum.

Supervisor MacPhee disagreed; in this case, money is available from an endowment. The City and County has not included any building repairs in the budget for the Aquarium, and to the best of his knowledge, it has never included such funds.

Thereupon, Supervisor Colman moved approval of the supplemental budget.

Motion failed for want of a second.

Index 19—*California Academy of Sciences, Simson African Hall.*

Supervisor MacPhee explained budget increase of \$240.

Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Gallagher, moved approval of the budget for the Simson African Hall.

No objection, and budget approved.

Index 20—*Municipal Court.*

Supervisor MacPhee explained the increase in the budget of the Municipal Court. Supervisor MacPhee reported that the state law might change the salaries of the judges. If so, the Controller will recommend that increased amount be put in the budget.

Mr. David A. Lewis announced that the increased amount, if necessary, would have to come from some appropriation such as the Emergency Reserve Fund.

Thereupon, Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Gallagher, moved approval of the budget for the Municipal Court.

No objection, and budget approved.

Index 21—*Superior Court.*

Supervisor MacPhee explained the increases in the budget of the Superior Court.

After brief discussion as to increases in salaries of the Judges, Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Mancuso, moved approval of the budget.

No objection, and budget approved.

Index 22—*Law Library.*

Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Colman, moved approval.

No objection, and budget approved.

Index 23—*Juvenile Court, Probation Office.*

Supervisor MacPhee explained the increases in the budget, amounting to some \$171,000. Of the increase, \$140,000 is for Maintenance of Minors. The revenues will increase, but San Francisco must show the entire amount in the budget.

Mr. David Lewis reminded the Board that it had enacted an ordinance authorizing maximum payment for Maintenance of Minors, amounting to \$45.

Supervisor Mancuso, seconded by Supervisor Colman, moved approval.

No objection, and budget approved.

Index 24—*Juvenile Court, Detention Home.*

Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Gallagher, moved approval.

No objection, and budget approved.

Index 24.01—*Juvenile Court, Log Cabin Ranch School.*

Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Mancuso, moved approval.

No objection, and budget approved.

Index 24.02—*Juvenile Court, Laguna Honda Children's Home.*

Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Gallagher, moved approval.

No objection, and budget approved.

Index 25—*Adult Probation Department.*

Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Gallagher, moved approval.

No objection, and budget approved.

Supplemental Budget Request, Adult Probation Department.

Supervisor MacPhee presented supplemental budget request for an additional \$30 to correct salary as provided under salary standardization, and moved approval thereof. Motion seconded by Supervisor Gallagher.

No objection, and supplemental budget request approved.

Index 26—*Chief Administrative Officer.*

Supervisor MacPhee explained increases in the budget of the Chief Administrative Officer.

The Chief Administrative Officer explained that in his department there was not really an increase of three employments. Two employments of the three additional employments set up are transferred, one from the War Services, and one from the Department of Finance and Records.

Thereupon, Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Gallagher, moved approval.

No objection, and budget approved.

Index 26.79—*Chief Administrative Officer. War Service Activities.*

The Chief Administrative Officer explained the foregoing budget.

Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Gallagher, moved approval.

No objection, and budget approved.

Supervisor MacPhee explained the foregoing budget.

Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Gallagher, moved approval.

No objection, and budget approved.

Index 26.79.60—*Chief Administrative Officer. Victory Garden Advisory Service.*

Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Gallagher, moved approval.

No objection, and budget approved.

Index 26.79.61—*Chief Administrative Officer. Salvage for Victory.*

Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Meyer, moved approval.

No objection, and budget approved.

Index 26.79.62—*Chief Administrative Officer. Hospitality House.*

The Chief Administrative Officer explained the function of the Hospitality House.

Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Gallagher, moved approval.

No objection, and budget approved.

Index 26.79.65—*Chief Administrative Officer. Dormitories.*

Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Gallagher, moved approval.

No objection, and budget approved.

Index 26.79.68—*Chief Administrative Officer. San Francisco Council for Veterans' Services.*

Supervisor MacPhee explained the foregoing budget.

Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Gallagher, moved approval.

No objection, and budget approved.

Index 27—*Director of Finance and Records.*

The Chief Administrative Officer pointed out that in Index 26, there was a position of bookkeeper transferred from Index 26.79. There is an assistant which will replace the Director of Finance and Records if and when the position requested under Index 26 is allowed by the Board of Supervisors. One position can be eliminated when position is set up under a new classification. However, the Civil Service Commission must first hold an examination.

Index 27, sheet 1, line 2. Director of Finance and Records, \$6,375.

Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Mancuso, moved that the amount of \$6,375 be deleted from the budget, but that the position be allowed to remain.

No objection, and motion carried.

Thereupon, Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Sullivan, moved approval of the budget of the Director of Finance and Records, as amended.

No objection, and budget approved.

Index 28—*Tax Collector.*

Supervisor MacPhee, after explanation by himself and by the Chief Administrative Officer, moved approval of the budget for the Tax Collector. Motion seconded by Supervisor Mancuso.

No objection, and budget approved.

Index 29—*Registrar of Voters.*

Supervisor MacPhee, after explanation, moved approval of the budget for the Registrar of Voters. Motion seconded by Supervisor Sullivan.

No objection, and budget approved.

Index 30—*Recorder.*

Supervisor MacPhee explained the budget of the Recorder.

Supervisor Colman, in commenting on the budget of the Recorder, expressed regret that the Recorder's office could not take advantage of the newest equipment that is on the market. Such equipment would greatly increase the efficiency of the office and result in economy of operation.

Supervisor Gallagher suggested that the saving would be problematical.

Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Sullivan, moved approval of the Recorder's budget.

No objection, and budget approved.

Index 31—County Clerk.

Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Colman, moved approval of the budget of the County Clerk.

No objection, and budget approved.

Index 32—Public Administrator.

Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Sullivan, moved approval.

No objection, and budget approved.

Supplemental Budget Recommendation, Chief Administrative Officer.

Supervisor MacPhee presented supplemental budget recommendation, to change Index 26, sheet 2, line 9, Administrative Technician, \$400-500, to read Administrative Technician, \$225-275, in accordance with action by the Civil Service Commission, and moved approval thereof. Motion seconded by Supervisor Uhl.

No objection, and motion approved.

Supplemental Budget Recommendation, Recorder's Office.

Supervisor MacPhee presented:

Index 30, sheet 2, line 9. Change from 2 to 1, Senior Clerk, a reduction of \$3,000 in appropriation.

Index 30, sheet 2, line 10. Increase from 1 to 2 Head Clerk, an increase of \$3,000 in appropriation.

Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Uhl, moved approval.

No objection, and supplemental budget recommendation approved.

Supplemental Budget Recommendation, County Clerk.

Supervisor MacPhee presented:

Index 31, sheet 2, line 4. Courtroom Clerk, 22 at \$250-275, \$72,070. Change amount to \$71,950. (Provides for elimination of Courtroom Clerk, 9 months at \$260 and 3 months at \$270, and adding Courtroom Clerk, 9 months at \$250 and 3 months at \$260, a decrease of \$120.)

Index 31, sheet 2, line 5. Courtroom Clerk, 1 at \$250-275. Change to 2 Courtrooms Clerks at \$250-275. (Addition is for employee on military leave, for whom no funds are provided.)

Index 31, sheet 2, line 6. Law Clerk, 8 at \$200-250, \$26,475. Change amount to \$25,875. Also insert additional line, Law Clerk, 1 at \$200-250, no amount. (Provides for elimination of Law Clerk at \$250 per month, and addition of Law Clerk, 9 months at \$200 and 1 month at \$215. Also addition of 4 employments on military leave, for whom no funds are provided.)

Index 31, sheet 2, line 10. General Clerk, 7 at \$160-270 per month, \$15,600. Reduce amount to \$15,140. (Provides for elimination of General Clerk at \$200 per month, and substitution of another employment, 10 months at \$160 and 2 months at \$170, a reduction of \$460.)

Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Mancuso, moved approval.

No objection, and supplemental budget recommendation approved.

Index 33—*Purchaser.*

Supervisor MacPhee explained the budget of the Purchaser.

Supervisor Mancuso, seconded by Supervisor Uhl, moved approval.

No objection, and budget approved.

Index 34—*Real Estate Department.*

Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Mancuso, moved approval.

No objection, and budget approved.

Index 35—*Civic Auditorium.*

The Chief Administrative Officer explained that the increases required for the Civic Auditorium, were because of additional business being handled.

Supervisor Mancuso, seconded by Supervisor Green, moved approval.

No objection, and budget approved.

Supplemental Budget Recommendation, Civic Auditorium.

Supervisor MacPhee presented supplemental budget recommendation to provide for additional position tentatively classified by the Civil Service Commission as General Clerk-Stenographer, 1 month at \$190 and 11 months at \$200.

Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Uhl, moved approval.

No objection, and supplemental budget approved.

Supplemental Budget Recommendation, Civic Auditorium.

Supervisor MacPhee presented supplemental budget recommendation to add to the budget of the Civic Auditorium, 1 Elevator Operator, at \$154 per month, and moved approval thereof. Motion seconded by Supervisor Uhl.

No objection, and supplemental budget recommendation approved.

Index 64—*Public Utilities Commission, San Francisco Airport.*

Supervisor MacPhee advised the Board that funds from taxes would be required to continue the operation of the airport.

Captain Doolin reported that the airport was not, at the present time, self-supporting, and would not be until it has a proper plant.

Supervisor MacPhee suggested that some of the seven new employments might be eliminated, thus reducing the cost of operation.

Captain Doolin objected to the suggestion. There are 18 employees now at the airport—the same number as when he took charge. Altogether there are more than 6,000 people at the airport. The airport is now worth \$17,000,000. Two janitors, employed during the past year, are included in the seven additional employments requested.

Supervisor Colman, seconded by Supervisor Green, moved approval of the budget for the San Francisco airport.

Supervisor Colman explained his views, stating that in dealing with the airport and its bonds, the bonds should be dealt with in the same manner as are other bonds. They should not be figured as a

cost of operation. Bond expense is written off, and is not included in any deficit. In his opinion, street car transportation was the most important problem with which the City and County was confronted. The airport is the second most important. The importance of the airport to the future development of San Francisco cannot be estimated. Aviation is an assured thing, and San Francisco must have a fine airport.

Captain Doolin reported that the actual operating deficit at the present time is \$15,000.

Supervisor MacPhee disagreed, stating that the deficit would be over \$100,000.

Supervisor Colman still stressed the importance of the airport, even if the deficit was \$100,000. There is also the probability that the deficit will be reduced materially as time goes on and full development of the airport comes. Expenditures already voted will not return what this investment will. The Board has already granted practically all the increases in the various departments. These increases mean a great deal more than the actual expenditures. Spending this money brings in civilian population and big payrolls, and makes San Francisco headquarters of large companies.

Supervisor Mancuso agreed with the employments set up in the budget, but was opposed to the expenditure of \$12,500 for an administration building.

Supervisor Uhl announced that he did not want his vote for the airport budget to be construed as an indication that he would vote for a \$20,000,000 bond issue for the airport.

Supervisor MacPhee announced his intention to vote against the airport budget. The budget, he held, should not be adopted in its present form. The airport might need new employments, but the Board should give more consideration to the number of employments provided. The airport now is costing \$12,500 exclusive of bond interest and redemption. He would vote "No" on the budget.

Mr. Scott, from the Public Utilities Commission, stated that bond interest and redemption were chargeable to reconstruction and replacement, not operating expense. The Utilities Commission was estimating operating loss at about \$19,000.

Supervisor MacPhee disagreed; reconstruction and replacements must be part of the expense.

Supervisor Colman, in further argument in support of his views, called attention to the fact that the Board had already agreed on new employments in other departments. Department heads and the Mayor are convinced that the employments were necessary, and the Board has allowed them. Now this Department wants additional employments. There is more ground to give additional employments to the airport than to some of the other departments. Supervisor Colman announced that he would vote for these employments much more gladly than he had voted for some other departments, because he believed the need much greater.

Supervisor Green expressed agreement with Supervisor Colman. He was in favor of giving Captain Doolin what he has requested.

Thereupon, the roll was called, and the budget of the airport was *approved* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Colman, Gallagher, Gartland, Green, Mancuso, Meyer, Sullivan, Uhl—8.

No: Supervisor MacPhee—1.

Absent: Supervisors Brown, Mead—2.

Index 63—Public Utilities Commission—Light, Heat and Power.

Supervisor MacPhee explained the increases recommended by the Mayor. Mr. Olson, representing the Public Utilities Commission, urged approval of the budget, stating that good street lighting pays for itself. There have been much fewer accidents since the "dim out" period.

Supervisor Mancuso reported that it would cost \$20 less per year per light if the City and County owned its own light standards.

Mr. Olson reported that light standards average \$340 each; it would take 17 years to get back the money invested.

Supervisor Mancuso, seconded by Supervisor Uhl, moved deletion of \$200,700.

Supervisor Colman opposed the motion; it would be a great mistake to delete such amount.

Mr. Olson objected to the motion. He called attention to various amounts making up the total amount of \$200,700; \$3,000 was for alterations to secure lower rates; \$6,000 was for miscellaneous lighting construction and emergency replacements; \$12,500 was for lights on Harrison Street, between Fifth and Tenth Streets and a similar amount for Bryant Street, between the same streets. The two latter amounts are to bring the lighting on the bridge approaches somewhat equal to the lighting on the bridge. He urged approval of the budget as recommended by the Mayor.

Recess Proposed.

Supervisor Sullivan, seconded by Supervisor Uhl, moved that the Board recess, to reconvene on Monday morning, at 8:30.

Supervisor MacPhee objected to recessing. The Board should continue in its work.

Thereupon, the motion was called, and the motion to recess *failed* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Gallagher, Sullivan, Uhl—3.

Noes: Supervisors Colman, Gartland, Green, MacPhee, Mancuso, Meyer—6.

Absent: Supervisors Brown, Mead—2.

Consideration of Budget Resumed.

Mr. Olson announced further that part of the work to be done consisted in addition to lights already owned by the City and County. A great deal of it is for modernizing and adding to existing equipment.

Thereupon, Supervisor Mancuso announced that with the consent of his second he would change his motion, and move for the deletion of \$191,700, or a reduction of \$9,000, thus leaving in the budget \$3,000 for alterations to secure lower rates, and \$6,000 for miscellaneous lighting construction and emergency replacements. Supervisor Uhl, who had seconded the earlier motion, consented to the change.

Supervisor Colman opposed the motion, stating that he believed the people of San Francisco would approve action taken in support of better street lighting. The public wants better lighting. He would vote against the motion.

Thereupon, the roll was called, and the motion was *carried* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Gallagher, Green, Mancuso, MacPhee, Sullivan, Uhl—6.

Noes: Supervisors Colman, Gartland, Meyer—3.

Absent: Supervisors Brown, Mead—2.

Index 63, sheet 1, line 15. Current Reconstruction and Replacements, \$41,000.

Supervisor Uhl moved reduction to \$20,000.

Motion *failed* for want of a second.

Index 63, sheet 1, line 7. Lighting of Public Streets, \$851,000.

Supervisor MacPhee suggested that the above item be reduced.

Mr. Olson informed the Board that that item was merely for the lights already in service; \$11,000 more will be required for lights to be installed before the end of the fiscal year. The Board has already deleted from the budget the cheaper lights; it will have to add \$50,000 to this item in question.

Index 63, sheet 6, line 11. O'Shaughnessy Boulevard, \$17,000.

Supervisor Mancuso, seconded by Supervisor MacPhee, moved that the appropriation for lighting O'Shaughnessy Boulevard be restored.

No action.

Mr. Olson pointed out that there were four items in the same class, namely: O'Shaughnessy Boulevard, \$17,000; Army Street, Harrison to Guerrero Streets, \$20,000; Guerrero Street and San Jose Avenue, Army to Brooks, \$22,500; Guerrero Street, Market to Army Street, \$48,500.

Supervisor Colman moved that \$91,000 be restored to the budget for specific light installations just mentioned.

No action.

Supervisor Mancuso objected, stating that the districts named would not be ready to install the lights for a year or a year and a half, or longer.

Supervisor Colman stated he was taking the word of a department head.

Mr. Vensano then stated that his Department was going to ask for some \$300,000; if the Board is going to deny that request, it might as well deny this request for lighting. If that amount is included in the budget, the Board would almost have to include this amount under consideration. The Department of Public Works has its plans nearly finished. The work could be done during the next year, if money is provided.

Supervisor MacPhee questioned the possibility of having the work done as Mr. Vensano had stated. There was the question of purchase of property, moving buildings, etc.

Thereupon, Supervisor Colman moved that the Board reinstate \$91,000 as asked for by Mr. Olson.

The Chief Administrative Officer stated that the need for the street light installation would depend on approval of \$300,000 for the Department of Public Works.

Thereupon, Supervisor Colman suggested that action of the question be deferred until a decision is made regarding the appropriation for the Department of Public Works, and he so moved.

Supervisor MacPhee, in discussing the appropriation for the improvement of Army and Guerrero Streets, requested that a test vote be taken to determine the Board's desires on that matter. He announced that he was in favor of doing that work. However, he could not vote for the appropriation, because the work could not be done during the coming year. The required \$300,000 should come from gasoline tax.

Supervisor Vensano stated that the State was going ahead with the improvement. The Board must take care of the traffic from that freeway, and about \$300,000 is needed for the project. He could not guarantee to finish the project during the coming year, however.

Supervisor Colman announced that he was in favor of approving the request for \$300,000. The improvement is absolutely necessary, and it would be economical to do the work this year. The taxpayers are better able to take care of the burden now than they may be in another year. The proposition comes from the Mayor and it is in the budget of the Chief Administrative Officer.

The Chief Administrative Officer reported that the project was about 75 per cent completed. By expenditure of another \$300,000 the project will be completed. If the war should be over soon, practically all the materials necessary will be released. However, it is a "must" job. We can do without it for another year, or ten years, but we have postponed too many projects in San Francisco in the past. Los Angeles is spending millions of dollars widening and making their streets more usable. San Francisco must spend money for improvements. The money cannot come from the gas tax; the State has committed itself to a freeway and will spend all the first one-quarter cent gas tax on the freeway. That will distribute traffic in the district south of Market Street.

Thereupon, the roll was called and the motion to restore to the budget \$91,000 *failed* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Colman, Gartland, Meyer, Sullivan—4.

Noes: Supervisors Gallagher, Green, MacPhee, Mancuso, Uhl—5.

Absent: Supervisors Brown, Mead—2.

Supervisor Colman, seconded by Supervisor Sullivan, moved that the Board recess, to reconvene on Monday, May 21, 1945, at 9:00 A. M.

The roll was called, as follows:

Ayes: Supervisors Colman, Gallagher, Mancuso, Sullivan, Uhl—5.

Noes: Supervisors Gartland, Green, MacPhee, Meyer—4.

Absent: Supervisors Brown, Mead—2.

However, Supervisor Gallagher changed his vote from "Aye" to "No."

The vote then stood:

Ayes: Supervisors Colman, Mancuso, Sullivan, Uhl—4.

Noes: Supervisors Gallagher, Gartland, Green, MacPhee, Meyer—5.

Absent: Supervisors Brown, Mead—2.

The Chair announced that the motion had *failed*.

Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Mancuso, moved that the budget of the Public Utilities Commission—Heat, Light and Power, be approved as amended.

Supervisor Colman objected. Supervisors Mead and Brown would probably be present on Monday. This budget should have the vote of the full Board.

Thereupon, Supervisor MacPhee announced that he would withdraw his motion, stating that Supervisor Colman was right. However, he stated that he felt it was unfair for Supervisor Brown not to be present.

No objection, and motion withdrawn.

RECESS.

Thereupon, on motion by Supervisor MacPhee, the Board, at the hour of 11:30 P. M., recessed, to reconvene on Monday, May 21, 1945, at 9:00 A. M.

The Board of Supervisors reconvened at 9:40 A. M. to resume consideration of the budget.

CALLING THE ROLL.

The roll was called and the following Supervisors were noted present:

Absent: Supervisors Colman, Gallagher—2.

Presiding, Supervisor Green, pending the arrival of the President.

Supervisor Gallagher was noted present at 9:45 A. M.

Supervisor Colman was noted present at 10:15 A. M.

Consideration of Budget.

Consideration of the budget was resumed.

Index 2—*Mayor.*

Index 2, sheet 1, line 27. Emergency Reserve Fund, \$150,000.

On motion by Supervisor MacPhee, the foregoing budget item was *approved* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Brown, Gartland, Green, MacPhee, Mancuso, Mead, Meyer, Sullivan, Uhl—9.

Absent: Supervisors Colman, Gallagher—2.

Index 21—*Superior Court.*

Supervisor MacPhee, after explaining the increases in the budget of the Superior Court, moved approval thereof.

No objection, and budget *approved*.

Index 29.79.5—*Registrar of Volunteers.*

Supervisor MacPhee moved approval.

No objection, and budget *approved*.

Index 56—*Public Welfare Department.*

Supervisor MacPhee explained reason for reduction of employments by two.

Index 56, sheet 1, line 11. Aid to Needy Children, \$295,000.

Supervisor MacPhee moved the foregoing item be reduced by \$30,000.

Consideration postponed temporarily.

Index 57—*Coroner.*

Supervisor MacPhee explained changes in Coroner's budget. The Coroner desires one new employment.

The Chief Administrative Officer explained the necessity for the new employment. It was needed to take the place of a police officer heretofore assigned to the Coroner's office.

Supervisor Brown, in discussing the subject matter, declared that the Police Department might be short of police officers, but it was not short of money. Many jobs in the Department are unfilled, for which funds are appropriated. This transaction will increase the number of jobs for which the money will be provided. He could see no reason for approving the creation of the position.

Supervisor MacPhee suggested that the position might be filled by a partially disabled police officer.

The Chief Administrative Officer reported that the position had been filled during the current year.

Supervisor Mancuso moved approval.

Supervisor Brown requested that the several items be considered seriatim.

No objection, and so ordered.

Index 57, sheet 2, line 6. Bailiff (part time), \$1,800.

Supervisor Brown, seconded by Supervisor MacPhee, moved deletion.

Supervisor Mancuso explained discussion had in committee. It would be cheaper, he held, to create the position of Bailiff than to have the position filled by a police officer. The position is necessary. The Board should reduce the number of police officers by one, rather than to delete the position in question.

Supervisor Brown agreed that Supervisor Mancuso was probably correct, and the Police budget should be amended rather than the budget of the Coroner.

The Chief Administrative Officer reported that the position was absolutely necessary, otherwise there would have to be assigned a police officer to do work normally assigned to a bailiff.

Thereupon, Supervisor Brown announced that with the consent of his second, he would withdraw his motion.

Motion withdrawn.

Whereupon, Supervisor MacPhee moved approval of the Coroner's budget.

No objection, and budget approved.

Index 56—*Public Welfare Department.*

Consideration of the budget of the Public Welfare Department was again taken up.

Index 56, sheet 1, line 11. Aid to Needy Children, \$295,000.

Supervisor MacPhee, after brief discussion, moved that the foregoing item be reduced by \$20,000, to read \$275,000. Motion seconded by Supervisor Mancuso.

Motion carried by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Brown, Gartland, Green, MacPhee, Mancuso, Sullivan, Uhl—7.

Noes: Supervisors Gallagher, Mead, Meyer—3.

Absent: Supervisor Colman—1.

On motion by Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Mancuso, the budget of the Public Welfare Department was approved as amended.

Index 58—*Agricultural Commission.*

Supervisor MacPhee, after explaining that there were no increases in the budget of the Agricultural Commission except the normal salary increases, moved approval of the budget. Motion seconded by Supervisor Mancuso.

No objection, and budget approved.

Index 58.50—*Agricultural Commission, Farmers' Market.*

Supervisor MacPhee stated that this was a new budget, and he understood the Farmers' Market was self-supporting.

The Chief Administrative Officer stated that the Farmers' Market was supported from revenues collected for the use of the market.

Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Meyer, moved approval of the budget.

No objection, and budget approved.

Index 59—*Department of Weights and Measures.*

Supervisor MacPhee explained that the only increases in the foregoing budget were for normal salary increases.

Thereupon, Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Meyer, moved approval.

No objection, and budget approved.

Index 60—*Controller.*

Supervisor MacPhee explained increases in the Controller's budget. There are three new employments in the office of the Controller. Included in the budget is a transfer of funds from the Public Utilities Commission.

Mr. David Lewis explained transfers from the Public Utilities Commission to the Controller, in payment for services to be performed in connection with the Municipal Railway.

Supervisor MacPhee stated that the amount budgeted by the Municipal Railway to offset any charges by the Controller was only \$5,000. However, Mr. Cahill was expected to be present later in the day, at which time the Board should take up the Controller's budget again, and he suggested further consideration should be postponed temporarily.

No objection, and consideration continued temporarily.

Index 61—*City Planning Commission.*

Supervisor MacPhee explained increases in the budget of the City Planning Commission.

Index 61, sheet 1, line 6. Contractual Services, \$21,380.

Supervisor Brown, seconded by Supervisor Uhl, moved reduction of \$8,500.

Supervisor Colman, seconded by Supervisor Mancuso, moved as a substitute motion, that the Board send for Mr. Tilton, and that in the meantime consideration be postponed.

No objection, and further consideration postponed temporarily.

Index 71—*Civil Service Commission.*

Supervisor MacPhee explained the budget of the Civil Service Commission. He read excerpts from letter from the Manager of Utilities, addressed to himself, as follows:

"The Public Utilities Commission included in its budget requests sufficient amounts to cover such expenses as you mention for all departments which have made official representations to it for such funds.

"These were \$11,360 for the Controller's Office, \$67,520 for the City Attorney's Office and \$28,650 for the Purchaser's Office.

"If and when any other city departments feel that they should be

compensated from Municipal Railway funds for services performed by reason of acquisition of Market Street Railway Company the Commission will be glad to give them consideration. You were aware, of course, at the time you wrote your views on this matter that it was too late to make budgetary provisions for these items. It is not too late for any affected departments to initiate proceedings looking toward supplemental appropriations, and it occurs to me that your position in the entire matter should be made clear to them, rather than to me.

"To what limits you would have the Public Utilities Commission go in carrying out this fiscal philosophy, I do not know. In addition to the three offices I have mentioned, it is clear that the Civil Service Commission and the Retirement System are put to extra expense by reason of railway consolidation."

Supervisor Brown called attention to the fact that Municipal Railway expenses are paid out of revenues of the railway; the Controller's expenses are paid out of the tax rate. Any transfer that can be made will have the effect of reducing the tax rate. It is important that this Board make sure that all transfers of such nature are actually consummated. He did not believe the Controller's budget should be approved until assurance is given from the Mayor, specifying items involved, that he will see to it that such transfers are made.

Supervisor MacPhee presented a letter from the Mayor, together with copy of letter from the Civil Service Commission, addressed to the Mayor, and letter from the Controller, which will take care of the situation so there will be no misunderstanding, and he moved that the three letters be made part of the record. Motion seconded by Supervisor Mancuso.

No objection, and so ordered.

Dear Supervisor MacPhee:

In the printed copy of the Mayor's budget recommendations, I note the following:

Municipal Railway Consolidated Budget, sheet 1, line 2, Services of Other Departments, Controller—shows \$5,000 recommended by the Mayor for this item as against \$11,360 requested by the Public Utilities Commission. I did not reduce this item. My recommendations, as transmitted to the Controller, showed no reduction in the \$11,360 recommended by the Public Utilities Commission.

On May 8, 1945, I met with your Committee and considered supplemental budget requests. At that meeting there was a general discussion of the increases in the expenses of various city departments occasioned directly by the acquisition of the Market Street Railway lines. I stated my policy in this respect to be, that those increases in various city departments which could be definitely identified as resulting from the acquisition of the Market Street Railway Company should be provided by transfer from the Municipal Railway budget to departments affected.

In the budget of the Municipal Railway as submitted to me, provision was made for the services of other departments as follows:

Controller	\$11,360
City Attorney	67,520
Purchaser	28,650

These I approved as recommended.

At the May 8 meeting I had letters from the Civil Service Commission and from the Retirement System, each indicating an increase in their budgets resulting from Market Street Railway acquisition and I stated that these two departments' expenses in this connection likewise should be borne by the Municipal Railway. However, it was not possible for the Public Utilities Commission to take official action on these additional items, and recommend their inclusion as a supplemental budget, by May 10, the date set by the Supervisors as the deadline for receipt of supplemental requests. The Public Utilities Commission does not meet except on Monday and the next meeting day after our supplemental budget hearing was May 14. Therefore, these additional items could not be presented as a supplemental budget request. However, it was and is my intent that these additional charges be taken care of by an appropriation ordinance to become effective July 1, 1945. It also is my intent to request the Controller to adjust the \$6,360 item discussed hereinabove.

My dear Mr. Mayor:

You have requested a statement from us regarding the employments added to this office to administer Market Street Railway personnel transactions.

In May, 1944, the Commission requested that eight new positions be established to take care of the additional work occasioned by the acquisition of the Market Street Railway properties and these additional employments were allowed. However, I believe that the equivalent of the full time of six employees are engaged in performing the work incident to the acquisition of the Market Street Railway properties as follows:

My dear Sir:

You have made verbal inquiry today as to staff increases in this office as a result of the acquisition of the Market Street Railway property.

Three Market Street Railway employees were assigned to duty in this office as a result of the consolidation. You will understand, please, that these three positions do not represent an increase in staff of this office necessarily but represent three employees who were performing duties with the Market Street Railway of a type and nature that was decided to be not in conflict with the duties and responsibilities of the Controller's office. This assignment of personnel was made by the Civil Service Commission in conformance with charter provisions.

One of these employees was classified, by the Civil Service Commission, as "B4 Bookkeeper," annual salary \$2,100. He was assigned to the Utilities Audit Division of this office. It is to be noted that he is doing general audit work in that division and his duties are not exclusively restricted to work occasioned by the consolidation of the railway systems.

Another employee of the Market Street Railway was classified, by the Civil Service Commission, as "B222, General Clerk," annual salary \$1,920. He was assigned to the Payroll Division of this office. It is to be noted that his duties in that division are not restricted exclusively to payroll work occasioned by the consolidation of the two railway systems.

The third employment was classified, by the Civil Service Commission, as "B512 Clerk-Typist," annual salary \$1,920. Assignment was made to the General Office Division here. It is to be noted that this employment is not assigned to work occasioned by the consolidation of the two railway systems.

Summing the matter up: the payroll increase totals \$5,940 per annum but—I repeat—it would be practically impossible to determine how much of that \$5,940 should be regarded as incurred because of the consolidation of the two railway systems.

Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Mancuso, moved approval of the budget of the Civil Service Commission.

No objection, and budget approved.

Index 72—*San Francisco City and County Employees' Retirement System.*

Mr. David Lewis explained the reason for the increase in the Retirement System budget. The increased cost is largely due to changes in provisions for police benefits. There were eight additional employees, two of whom were made necessary by the acquisition of the Market Street Railway. Personal services are \$12,000 more than last year. There is an increase of \$10,000 in compensation insurance.

At the suggestion of the President, *further consideration was postponed until Mr. Nelson could be present.*

Index 73—Public Pound.

On motion by Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Mancuso, the budget for the Public Pound was *approved* without objection.

Index 61—City Planning Commission.

Consideration of the budget of the City Planning Commission was resumed on arrival of Mr. Tilton.

Mr. Tilton, in reply to questioning by Supervisor Brown, explained the increase in Contractual Services. An item was put in the budget for the purpose of employing outside engineering services and special services of the type that probably could not be employed under Civil Service rules, in order to wind up the Master Plan program. A similar item has been in the budget for the past two years, but the City Planning Commission has used very little of the money.

Supervisor Brown then stated that last year the item was \$12,400; this year it has been increased to \$32,000. The record shows that last year the money was all spent, as well as an appropriation of \$5,400 for a Senior City Planner.

Mr. Tilton answered that the Senior City Planner was a regular Civil Service employee, and he is still employed. The expenditure of the extra money depends on several things: the need, the availability of employees desired, etc.

Thereupon, Supervisor Brown continued, pointing out that \$8,500 is being added to Contractual Services in order to employ certain skills that the Commission needs, and yet there is no reduction in the permanent salaries of the department. The Board is appropriating the money even though it is known that the money is not going to be spent, because the positions are vacant. The Commission should be glad to get along with less money than it is asking for. Supervisor Brown then asked if it were possible to use the unexpended balance of Personal Services for Contractual Services.

Mr. Lewis, at the request of Supervisor MacPhee, explained that all funds unexpended because of unfilled positions are transferred each month by the Controller, to Compensation Reserve Fund for salary purposes.

Thereupon, Supervisor Brown moved that Contractual Services be reduced by \$8,500. That would leave the same amount as the Commission had during the current year. The Commission should be able to get along with that amount.

Supervisor Colman stated that if Mr. Tilton felt that the money would not be used, if there was a fairly good chance that the money would not be used, he would be inclined to favor the motion. The Board should try to budget as closely as it can.

Mr. Tilton stated that he thought the Commission could get along all right. It would have to get along with whatever amount the Board would allow. The Commission was trying to do a job for the City and County of San Francisco. It would use whatever money the Board makes available as efficiently as possible.

Supervisor MacPhee suggested that if help should become available and the Commission should need more money, it could come before the Board. Present experience indicates that \$12,480 is sufficient.

Thereupon, the roll was called and the motion to delete \$8,500 from Contractual Services was *carried* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Brown, Colman, Gallagher, Gartland, Green, MacPhee, Mancuso, Mead, Meyer, Sullivan, Uhl—11.

Thereupon, Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Meyer, moved that the budget of the City Planning Commission, as amended, be approved.

No objection, and budget approved.

Index 75—Coordinating Council.

After explanation that increases in the budget of the Coordinating Council were due to salary increments, Supervisor MacPhee moved approval of the budget. Motion seconded by Supervisor Green.

No objection, and budget approved.

Index 13—Recreation Commission.

Mrs. Kenneth Evans, representing the Ingleside-Taraval District Coordinating Council, on being granted the privilege of the floor, requested that the budget of the Recreation Commission, which had previously been approved, be again opened up for consideration. Mrs. Evans requested that an appropriation be approved for purchase of Pine Lake Canyon property. The property would be an immediate continuation of the Sigmund Stern Grove. The property has been purchased by the Standard Building Company, which intends to fill in part of the canyon and to proceed with home building there as soon as possible. It would be an economy move to purchase the property at this time instead of later. Mrs. Evans presented a letter from Miss Josephine Randall, dated May 10, 1945, indicating that the Commission needs more recreational area in the district.

Miss Randall announced that the Recreation Commission had requested an estimate of cost for the purchase of the property in question. The Real Estate Department has reported that it should not exceed \$37,500. That does not include the upper level. The upper level would cost from \$100,000 to \$125,000. The property desired by the Recreation Commission would cost about \$37,500.

Miss Randall, in reply to questioning by Supervisor Mancuso as to why the Commission had not requested a supplemental budget appropriation to acquire the property, stated that some of the amount requested for neighborhood playgrounds had been deleted.

Mrs. Evans stated that her committee desired that not only the base, but the property around rim, be purchased. The property desired could be purchased for \$125,000, in five annual payments of \$25,000.

Supervisor MacPhee, following questions as to how the matter could be put to the Board for consideration, suggested that some Supervisor might move that the amount be included in the budget as a Capital Expenditure.

Mrs. Stuckey, from the Commodore Sloat Parent-Teacher Association, urged that the property be acquired. It was needed for the children and for the Boy Scouts. There is an element of time; the property should be purchased now.

Mr. John Tisworth, executive secretary, Y. M. C. A., Golden West Branch, declared that facilities such as Pine Lake Park were needed. Such places within the City and County of San Francisco are very few. This particular site would afford many advantages to the Boy and the Girl Scouts, and to the Y. M. C. A.

Mr. Phillips, Director of Property, announced that in the opinion of his office, \$37,500 was all that the required property, that is, the lower level, was worth.

Supervisor Meyer, after questioning Mr. Phillips briefly, expressed the opinion that the property was not very desirable, and the Pine Lake people could never do anything with it.

Mr. Phillips, in reply to question by Supervisor Mancuso, reported that if condemnation proceedings were instituted, he thought that the property could be acquired for \$37,500.

Thereupon, Supervisor Green moved that \$37,500 be included in the budget for purchase of the property in question. However, on suggestion by Mr. Phillips that the amount be made \$40,000, in order to cover incidental expenses in connection with the acquisition of the property, Supervisor Green changed his motion to read \$40,000. Motion seconded by Supervisor Mead.

Supervisor Colman, in speaking to the motion, expressed regret that he would have to vote against a request of such a representative group of citizens. However, the tax rate was as high as it should be made. The Board has already treated the requests of the Recreation Commission with liberality. The Board has granted what the Commission has requested, but it must call a halt somewhere. The City cannot do everything at once. The district has the Sigmund Stern Memorial Grove and the Larson Playground. He would have to vote "No."

Supervisor Mead stated that the purchase of the Pine Lake Canyon seemed to him to be an emergency matter. It must be purchased immediately, or buildings will be erected, and the development of the property for recreational purposes will be forever prevented.

Supervisor Brown agreed with the views expressed by Supervisor Colman. The City and County is faced with a number of additional costs which it apparently cannot avoid. It already has a high tax rate. This project, while desirable, and no doubt useful, is not absolutely necessary. There are other facilities for playgrounds in that neighborhood. Here is a building project that is ready to go ahead as soon as the war is over, and which will create a considerable amount of employment in San Francisco. That must be taken into consideration. He was sorry that he could not go along with the desired acquisition.

Supervisor Uhl announced that if money were available, he could vote for it, but there are many undeveloped playgrounds in San Francisco. They should be developed first. He must vote "No."

Thereupon, the roll was called and the motion *carried* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Gallagher, Gartland, Green, Mead, Meyer, Sullivan—6.

Noes: Supervisors Brown, Colman, MacPhee, Mancuso, Uhl—5.

Index 10. *Fire Department.*

Consideration of the budget for the Fire Department was again taken up.

Mr. Al Smith, of the Bureau of Governmental Research, addressed the Board on behalf of Mr. Younger, who was not present. Mr. Younger, of the Municipal Conference, stated Mr. Smith, was opposed to the principle of relieving absentees by employees of like rank. The present practice should be continued.

Supervisor MacPhee pointed out that it was proposed to provide for 26 Battalion Chiefs this year, instead of 23, as in the past. However, other employments will be eliminated, and there will be only one more employment than last year.

Fire Chief Sullivan reported that 230 officers were needed to

complement the equipment of the department. The department will, under the improved plan, have 230 officers. The plan will be merely advancing men into positions for the work which they do continually. The Board of Fire Commissioners, and he, himself, believe it is only proper to compensate men for the work they actually perform. The lower brackets will be reduced by four, and the upper brackets increased by four. The number of officers in the budget will remain the same.

Supervisor Colman stated that he felt this would be a precedent that would continue to go down through all the ranks, not only in the Fire Department, but in the Police Department. The question is: is it necessary for men of equal rank to relieve men of equal rank. This principle could go down through every rank. It is not good organization. If it is done in the Fire Department there is no reason why it should not be done in the Police Department. It is not a new question; it has come up several times before. A man of lower rank always takes command during the absence of the next higher rank. It is done in private employment. This new procedure is not necessary. He would vote against the practice if he could, but he could not vote against the budget of the Fire Department.

Mr. J. W. Stevens, representing the National Board of Fire Underwriters, supported the proposal for additional officers. If a mistake is made by an officer of the Fire Department, it cannot be corrected the next day. The whole heart of the Fire Department is in the officers. This recommendation was made by the National Board of Fire Underwriters six years ago. He urged support of the proposal.

Supervisor Colman announced that the same reason would apply to the United States Army, the United States Navy, or in the Marine Corps.

Mr. Stevens then remarked that there is less respect shown to the acting officer than to the regular officer.

Supervisor Colman declared that in going along with the Commission, he did not lose his right to disagree with the Commission.

Mr. Robert Callaghan, on being granted the privilege of the floor, stated that the replacements have, since 1941, served full time. They are doing a permanent job and should be paid the salary of such jobs. It was not a question of emergency relief.

Thereupon, Supervisor MacPhee moved approval of the budget of the Fire Department.

Supervisor Colman, in explanation of his vote, stated he would vote for approval of the budget. He would like, however, to voice his disapproval of this particular feature of the budget. He would move as an amendment to the motion, that the Board vote on this particular item.

Index 10, sheet 2, line 21. Battalion Chief, \$124,800.

Supervisor Colman announced that he would like to have his opposition on the foregoing item noted in the record. Having made his position clear in this item, he would vote in favor of the budget.

Thereupon, Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Green, moved approval of the budget of the Fire Department.

No objection, and budget approved.

Index 10.79—*Citizens' Protective Corps—Auxiliary Fire Service.*

Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Green, moved approval.

No objection, and budget approved.

RECESS.

The hour of 12:10 P. M. having arrived, the Board recessed to reconvene at 2:00 P. M. to take up its regular order of business, at the conclusion of which it would continue its consideration of the budget.

MONDAY, MAY 21, 1945, 3:35 P. M.

The Board of Supervisors, at the hour of 3:35 P. M., on motion by Supervisor Brown, made at the regular meeting of the Board on this date, resumed consideration of the budget.

Present: Supervisors Brown, Colman, Gallagher, Gartland, Green, MacPhee, Mancuso, Mead, Meyer, Sullivan, Uhl—11.

Quorum present.

Supervisor Mancuso presiding.

Consideration of Budget.

Supervisor Brown announced that he had been handed a list setting forth the number of positions which have been unfilled this year, although they were budgeted. The list contains 524 such positions, with an average wage in the neighborhood of \$2,000 per year, which means about \$1,000,000 appropriated, but not expended. The Board of Supervisors can, if it desires, review this list and remove appropriations from the current year's budget without interfering with the status of the positions. By this means the Board can eliminate one-fourth of the increase with which it is confronted this year.

The Police Department, for example, have 84 patrolmen positions not filled, as well as other positions, about 120 in all. The Police Department should be represented before the Board to review these employments.

Thereupon, Supervisor Brown moved that the Board reconsider the budget of the Police Department at 8:30 P.M. and that the Department be requested to have a representative present at that time. Motion seconded by Supervisor MacPhee.

Mr. Al Smith, of the Bureau of Governmental Research, in reply to questioning by Supervisor Uhl, reported that money is appropriated for unfilled positions in the Police Department, but not for the Fire Department.

No objection, and so ordered.

Among some of the other departments where positions are not filled, are the following: Park Department, about 40 positions; Recreation Department, 12 to 15 positions; Public Works Department, 65 to 70 positions; Health Department, about 180 positions.

The Chief Administrative Officer explained that a large number of vacancies in the Department of Public Works was composed of street sweepers; the Department of Public Health was short of nurses. Proper care is not being given to patients. He had already agreed to eliminate the funds for many positions which were now unfilled. If the Departments could be assured that money would be available if and when positions could be filled, there would be no objection to the elimination of appropriations from the budget.

Supervisor Mancuso reported that Mr. Younger, of the Municipal Conference, had suggested that the Mayor's emergency funds might be increased to take care of any emergency that might arise.

Supervisor Brown held that many of the jobs in question would not be filled during the current year, and he could see no reason to appropriate the money, merely to have it go into a Reserve Fund and then back into the General Fund for the next year. There was already more than a half million dollars in the Reserve Fund at the present time. He desired to make some arrangement to delete some of these appropriations, and he suggested that the Health Department, Recreation Department, Park Department and the Department of Public Works be requested to send representatives to the Board during the afternoon, and he would so move.

No objection, and so ordered.

Thereupon, the Clerk was instructed to request the Park Department, the Recreation Department, and the Department of Public Health to send representatives to the Board meeting.

Index 40—*Department of Public Works, Engineering.*

Supervisor MacPhee explained the budget of the Bureau of Engineering, Department of Public Works.

Supervisor Gallagher announced that the foregoing budget had been approved at the meeting of Friday, May 18, 1945.

Supervisor Colman, however, declared that the Board had merely indicated how it felt, but had not taken any definite action.

Index 40, sheet 7, line 28. Street Improvements, \$300,000.

Supervisor Colman, seconded by Supervisor Gallagher, moved that the foregoing item be deleted from the budget.

Supervisor Brown called attention to Special Road Improvement Fund, \$686,000, and Special Gas Tax Fund, \$280,000, or a total of \$967,000. It is possible, he stated, that the Department of Public Works may have some plans for these funds, but in his opinion, they should be the source of the expenditure of this \$300,000.

The Controller, in reply to question by Supervisor Brown, stated that the State could legally appropriate the funds necessary for the contemplated work, since the work set up was a specific matter.

The Chief Administrative Officer, in answer to question by Supervisor Colman, stated that the money was already earmarked in connection with the street improvement. This money is needed above the amount to which Supervisor Brown has referred. The Department of Public Works will not have to postpone any work if the Board approves the \$300,000. Within three months, the Department will be able to call for bids and proceed with the work. The plans for this particular project are completed. Many departments that do not have plans completed are asking for money for postwar work.

Supervisor Brown, in continuing his discussion, stated that the fact of not appropriating \$300,000 will mean that the State will spend \$967,000 instead of \$1,267,000. He did not believe the taxpayers should be called on to add \$300,000 to an already liberal expenditure.

Supervisor MacPhee stated that the Board already knew his views. It would take considerable time to acquire the land through condemnation proceedings. Also buildings must be razed. It may take another year, or even two years. There is also the question of possible increase in gasoline tax. He was not opposed to the project, but hoped the work would be done. However, there will be time enough when the City and County has additional revenues, possibly during the next year.

The Chief Administrative Officer reported that the State of California is, at present, making ready for a freeway into San Francisco, which will terminate at the Bay Bridge. The State has turned over

to the City and County \$515,000 with which to acquire property for the widening of Army Street. The Director of Property states that it will be no problem to acquire the necessary property. Army Street has already been widened for a distance. This \$515,000 will provide for its widening to Guerrero Street. When the freeway is completed, the State will dump traffic south of Market Street. San Francisco must be ready at that time to distribute that traffic. Plans are already completed. We can invite bids within two months, and let contracts that can readily be construed as postwar work. But we cannot let contracts unless money is appropriated. This \$300,000 is needed to complete this project. Today the City and County has four playgrounds partially completed. In order to appease certain districts the Board has allowed money for playgrounds. The same situation exists here. You have streets and highways more than two-thirds completed. We are requesting this \$300,000 to complete them. Los Angeles has fine streets and highways. San Francisco is criticized for not having such streets and highways, but San Francisco has not appropriated the necessary money for them. On Friday, the Board approved appropriations to improve highways—Joint Highway Districts Nos. 9 and 10. These highways dump traffic into San Francisco, but we do not have the proper distribution of traffic. We are merely telling the Board what San Francisco needs. It is within the province of the Board, whether or not to support the Director of Public Works.

Supervisor Gallagher inquired whether the \$300,000 was needed before the Department of Public Works started the proposed work.

The Chief Administrative Officer replied that it was necessary. Next year, he stated, more money would be requested. This is only one step in a progressive program for improving the streets and highways in San Francisco.

After further brief discussion, Mr. H. C. Vensano reported that the cost to finish the widening of Army Street, from Harrison to Guerrero, would be \$1,600,000.

Supervisor Brown reported that there had been a lot of activity at Sacramento and at Washington, in reference to postwar projects, and he thought there would be funds available for any postwar projects ready to go when the war was over. There was no reason why the statement that federal funds would be available should not be accepted. He was opposed to appropriating \$300,000 out of tax funds when federal funds would be forthcoming. The City and County should do what it can with its available funds in the anticipation of receiving funds for the remainder of the work when available.

Supervisor Colman stated that it seemed to be the opinion that the job could not be done this year. However, Mr. Vensano and the Chief Administrative Officer state that they think it can be done this year. It would not be wise to refuse to appropriate this \$300,000. The job should be finished. The Mayor, the Chief Administrative Officer and the Department of Public Works all agree that the work should be done. The taxpayers may be better able to this year than perhaps next year. The importance of the improvements are so great that he would vote to leave the item in the budget.

After further brief discussion, Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Uhl, moved that the \$300,000 set up for widening of Army Street, etc., be deleted from the budget.

Motion carried by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Brown, Gartland, Green, MacPhee, Mancuso, Sullivan, Uhl—7.

Noes: Supervisors Colman, Gallagher, Mead, Meyer—4.

Thereupon, on motion by Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Meyer, the budget for the Department of Public Works, Engineering, Index 40, was *approved* without objection.

Art Commission—Tree Planting.

Supervisor MacPhee moved the privilege of the floor for Mr. Bufano, member of the Art Commission, in order to hear explanation of a tree planting program proposed by him.

Mr. Bufano explained his proposal to the Board. He presented arguments, at length, in support of his proposal and requested that \$100,000 be provided in the budget to carry out his proposals.

Supervisor Mancuso suggested that the program would run into a great deal of expense for additional employment, to which Mr. Bufano replied that it would cost about \$2 per tree per year.

Supervisor Mead suggested that the trees would affect the street lighting.

Mr. Bufano agreed that the trees would cut off some of the light, but did not believe they would necessarily affect the lighting system.

Supervisor Colman announced that he had been told that the Junior Chamber of Commerce was going to undertake to raise funds privately, up to \$150,000, for the purpose, with the cooperation of the City and the Park Department, to work on a program of this sort.

The Chair (Supervisor Mancuso) announced that no motion having been made, there was nothing before the Board.

During the foregoing proceedings, Supervisor MacPhee, noting the entrance of a group of boys into the Chambers, requested the President of the Board to invite them—members of Cub Pack No. 1—to take seats where they could hear and see what was going on.

Index 40.01—*Sewage Treatment Plant.*

Supervisor MacPhee, after explaining the increases in the budget for Sewage Treatment Plant, moved approval thereof. Motion seconded.

No objection, and budget approved.

Index 40.02—*Sewage Pumping Stations.*

Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Green, moved approval of the budget for Sewage Pumping Stations.

No objection, and budget approved.

Index 63—*Public Utilities Commission—Light, Heat and Power.*

Consideration of the foregoing budget was resumed.

Mr. Olson presented further data to the Board of Supervisors on the cost of lighting public streets. He stated that the difference in cost between City owned and privately owned street lights was \$20 per light per year. That was true, on an average. The City and County has about 30 different schedules. Mr. Olson suggested that the Board consider the possibility of including conduits on jobs the Chief Administrative Officer was contemplating doing, in order to avoid tearing up streets. He suggested that a total amount of \$135,500 be allowed in the budget, \$17,000 of which had previously been restored to the budget. Mr. Olson suggested that amounts be approved in the budget, as follows:

Index 63, sheet 6, line 12, reduce from \$20,000 to \$4,500.

Index 63, sheet 6, line 13, reduce from \$22,500 to \$5,000

Index 63, sheet 6, line 14, reduce from \$48,500 to \$24,500.

After brief discussion, Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Brown, moved that the recommendations by Mr. Olson be approved.

No objection, and motion carried.

Index 63, sheet 6, line 24. Replacement of obsolete or inadequate street lighting equipment, \$41,000.

Mr. Olson reported that street lights must be maintained in modern condition. Also lights have to be replaced from time to time. The Department has a definite program in connection with that item. The Department originally requested \$65,500, of which the Mayor deleted \$24,500.

Thereupon, Supervisor Uhl, seconded by Supervisor MacPhee, moved that the \$41,000 be reduced to \$10,000.

Mr. Olson objected to such reduction. He did not think such arbitrary reduction was good business.

Thereupon, Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Brown, moved as an amendment to the motion, that the item of \$41,000 be reduced to \$20,500.

No objection, and motion approved.

Whereupon, Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Colman, moved that the budget of the Public Utilities Commission—Heat, Light and Power, Index 63, as amended, be approved.

No objection, and budget approved.

Index 6—*Treasurer.*

Supervisor MacPhee reported that consideration of the budget of the Treasurer had been postponed because of two employments requested as a result of the acquisition of the Market Street Railway. Money for these employments should be made available from the Public Utilities Commission. The Treasurer's Office has not made any request for such funds.

Mr. Robert Scott reported that it was his belief that if the Treasurer should make such request it would be acquiesced in.

Supervisor MacPhee then continued, saying that when the matter was presented to the Finance Committee, it was presented with the understanding that it was necessary because of the acquisition of the Market Street Railway, and if conditions have changed, the Finance Committee has not been so advised. The Committee wants to know whether or not that money will be made available.

Mr. David Lewis reported that it was the desire and policy of the Mayor that all such items be transferred from the Municipal Railway to the Treasurer, or to other departments so affected.

Thereupon, Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Mancuso, moved approval of the budget for the Treasurer.

No objection, and budget approved.

Index 60—*Controller.*

Supervisor MacPhee announced that the budget of the Controller had been held up under the same circumstances as that of the Treasurer. Since that time a letter has been presented to the Clerk which will be made part of the record.

After brief discussion, and report by Mr. Vincent Ryan on three vacancies in the Controller's Office, Supervisor Mancuso, seconded by Supervisor Green, moved approval of the Controller's budget.

No objection, and budget approved.

Index 72—*San Francisco City and County Employees Retirement System.*

Mr. Ralph Nelson reported that the largest item of increase in the budget of his department came from the Police Pension Amendment. Two extra employments have been made necessary because of the acquisition of the Market Street Railway. That cost will be charged against the Municipal Railway.

Thereupon, Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Uhl, moved approval of the foregoing budget.

No objection, and budget approved.

Index 36—*Department of Public Works—General Office.*

Mr. H. C. Vensano, Director of Public Works, reported that there were no positions where funds could be deleted, but employments retained. He reported further, after studying list of unfilled positions which was shown him, that the Department was short 40 Laborers at the present time. Part of the money for unfilled employments is being used for Saturday and Sunday overtime pay. Some of the unfilled positions are Inter-Departmental; some are paid from tax funds.

Supervisor MacPhee thereupon explained the budget. He pointed out that there were two new employments in the General Office.

Mr. Sid Hester explained the necessity for the new employments.

Thereupon, Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Uhl, moved approval of the budget of the General Office, Department of Public Works.

No objection, and budget approved.

Index 36.04—*Bureau of Architecture.*

Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Meyer, moved approval.

No objection, and budget approved.

Index 37—*Department of Public Works—Bureau of Accounts.*

After explanation thereof, Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Meyer, moved approval.

No objection, and budget approved.

Index 38—*Department of Public Works—Bureau of Building Repair.*

After explanation by Supervisor MacPhee and Mr. Hester, Supervisor Meyer, seconded by Supervisor Uhl, moved approval.

No objection, and budget approved.

Index 39—*Department of Public Works—Bureau of Building Inspection.*

Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Mancuso, moved approval of the foregoing budget.

No objection, and budget approved.

Index 41—*Department of Public Works—Central Permit Bureau.*

Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Mancuso, moved approval.

No objection, and budget approved.

Index 42—*Department of Public Works—Bureau of Street Cleaning.*

Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Meyer, moved approval.

No objection, and budget approved.

Index 43—*Department of Public Works—Bureau of Sewer Repair.*

Supervisor Meyer, seconded by Supervisor Mancuso, moved approval.

Supervisor Brown requested Mr. Vensano to comment on article in the "San Francisco News" of May 21, 1945.

Mr. Vensano reported that the Department has at present \$4,000,000 worth of work to be done. The WPB has not yet approved the projects. The Department is ready to go ahead. There is about 20 cents in the coming tax rate for financing jobs that are not done.

The Chief Administrative Officer said that it was impossible to report at present just what the Department will be able to do or when it can proceed with the work. The ordinary method would be to budget the money and to allow the Department to proceed as things develop. If the money is deleted from the budget this year, the Department will have to come back next year. The present sewer system is 50 or 60 years old. Each year the same argument, "Are you going to be able to spend it?" is advanced. We do not know, but we hope to be able to. We are now dumping untreated sewage into the water. We will be stopped from doing that some day.

Supervisor Brown objected to approval of the budget of the Bureau of Sewer Repairs. There are \$12,000,000 in bond money available for the sewers. It is now proposed to provide additional money. The taxpayers will be saved interest but they will be charged \$1,500,000 this year.

Thereupon, the roll was called and the budget was *approved* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Colman, MacPhee, Mancuso, Mead, Meyer, Sullivan, Uhl—7.

Noes: Supervisors Brown, Gallagher, Gartland—3.

Absent: Supervisor Green—1.

Recess Proposed.

Supervisor Uhl moved that the Board recess, to reconvene at 8:00 P. M.

Motion failed by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Gallagher, Sullivan, Uhl—3.

Noes: Supervisors Brown, Colman, Gartland, MacPhee, Mancuso, Mead, Meyer—7.

Absent: Supervisor Green—1.

Index 45—*Department of Public Works—Bureau of Street Repair.*

Mr. Vensano explained the reason for increase in the budget of the Bureau of Street Repair.

Index 45, sheet 4, line 16. Dump Trucks (3), \$13,500.

Supervisor Meyer reported that the trucks should have been replaced five years ago.

Mr. Vensano reported that the cost of the trucks would come from Gas Tax funds, not from the tax rate.

Supervisor MacPhee suggested a compromise.

Mr. Vensano announced that he had compromised; he asked for three trucks instead of six. He had taken men off the payroll and so had saved money for a year. Now they were being put back. They had been in inter-departmental work.

The Chief Administrative Officer announced that he was opposed to any compromise. The budget should stand or fall on its merits.

Supervisor Mancuso, seconded by Supervisor Meyer, moved approval.

Budget *approved* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Brown, Colman, Gartland, MacPhee, Mancuso, Mead, Meyer, Sullivan, Uhl—9.

No: Supervisor Gallagher—1.

Absent: Supervisor Green—1.

RECESS.

The Board, at the hour of 6:15 P. M., recessed to reconvene at 8:00 P. M.

RECONVENING OF BOARD OF SUPERVISORS.

The Board of Supervisors reconvened pursuant to recess.

CALLING THE ROLL.

The roll was called and the following Supervisors were noted present:

Supervisors Colman, Gallagher, Gartland, Green, MacPhee, Mancuso, Mead, Meyer, Sullivan, Uhl—10.

Absent: Supervisor Brown—1.

Quorum present.

President Dan Gallagher presiding.

Supervisor Brown was noted present at 9:05 P. M.

Consideration of Budget.

The Board resumed consideration of the budget.

Sewer Bonds, 1944

Supervisor MacPhee announced that appropriations from Sewer Bond Issue, 1944, are set up in Index 40, Department of Public Works, Bureau of Engineering. He announced that although the budget for Index 40 had heretofore been approved, the specific appropriation items from the sewer bond issue had not been called to the Board's attention. He, therefore, felt that they should be approved by the Board, and he would so move.

No objection, and motion *carried*.

Index 27—Director of Finance and Records.

Supervisor MacPhee reported that the appropriation of \$6,375, salary for Director of Finance and Records, which had heretofore, on May 18, 1945, been deleted from the budget, should be restored, and he would so move. Motion seconded by Supervisor Uhl.

No objection, and motion *carried*.

Index 26—*Chief Administrative Officer.*

Supervisor MacPhee announced, following the restoration of the \$6,375, salary for Director of Finance and Records, that the salary for position of Principal Assistant to Chief Administrative Officer, \$6,375 salary for Director of Finance and Records, that the salary itself should be allowed to remain. (Index 26, sheet 2, line 8.)

Thereupon, Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Uhl, moved that the appropriation of \$6,600, salary for position of Principal Assistant to Chief Administrative Officer, be deleted from the budget.

No objection, and motion carried.

Index 46—*Department of Public Works—Bridges.*

Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Mancuso, moved approval of the budget for the Department of Public Works—Bridges.

No objection, and budget approved.

Index 47—*Department of Public Works—Special Road Improvement Fund (County Roads).*

Supervisor MacPhee explained the foregoing budget, and moved approval thereof. Motion seconded by Supervisor Meyer.

No objection, and budget approved.

Index 48—*Department of Public Works—Special Road Improvement Fund (County Roads).*

Supervisor MacPhee explained the foregoing budget, pointing out that funds are provided only "as available."

Supervisor Colman announced that he was opposed to Joint Highway Districts. Creation of such districts is merely the creation of other taxing bodies. He had always opposed them. However, he did not voice any objection to the foregoing budget.

Thereupon Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Meyer, moved approval of the foregoing budget.

No objection, and budget approved.

Indexes 49, 49.1, 49.2, 49.3 and 49.4—*Department of Electricity.*

Supervisor MacPhee explained the increases in the budget of the Department of Electricity. There were three new positions in the department.

The Chief Administrative Officer explained that actually there was but one additional employment. It has been necessary to request additional inspectors because of increase in the necessary work. The expense is partly compensated by inspection fees.

Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Meyer, moved approval of the budget of the Department of Electricity.

No objection, and budget approved.

Index 77—*Department of Public Works—Special Gas Tax (Street Improvement Fund).*

Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Uhl, moved approval of the foregoing budget.

No objection, and budget approved.

Index 13—*Recreation Commission.*

Supervisor Colman announced that Miss Randall had explained the vacancies in the Recreation Department.

Although the budget for the Recreation Commission had, on May 18, 1945, been approved, Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Colman, again moved approval thereof.

No objection, and budget again approved.

Index 12—Park Commission.

Mr. Wilson, Park Commissioner, addressed the Board on the vacancies in the Park Commission's staff. The vacancies, he stated, were chiefly in the Gardener classification. The Park is operating, and has been ever since the beginning of the war, with the lowest number of gardeners and laborers it has ever had. At the same time the use of the park system has gone beyond anything ever heretofore experienced. The Park Department is short-handed and does not wish to be in a position of not being able to fill needed positions if the labor market changes. During the summer season positions can be filled for a time, at least.

Supervisor Colman remarked that no criticism was directed at the Park Commission. It was merely desired to find out what positions were in the budget, but not filled, and if there was a chance that the positions would not be filled during the coming fiscal year, some of them might be eliminated from the budget.

Whereupon, Mr. Wilson continued that he had read that veterans 40 years or over in age could now be discharged from the service; also that the age would soon be reduced to 35. Men are being discharged constantly. If the labor market is to be as stated the Commission will be able to fill the now vacant positions.

Supervisor MacPhee announced that he was speaking in the absence of Supervisor Brown, but along the lines that he had suggested. The Civil Service Commission has stated that there were more than 40 places vacant a short time ago. Supervisor Brown does not want to eliminate positions, but merely to delete funds, with the understanding that funds would be available at any time. It is felt that the Salary Reserve Fund would supply a source of revenue from which money could be obtained to supply funds when and if it became necessary to fill vacant positions.

Mr. Wilson questioned the effect on the regular summer operations of the Park in bringing in people on vacation from schools and colleges if positions were left in the budget, but money was not provided.

Mr. Sues, representing the Civil Service Commission, explained that these jobs are placed in the budget without any funds. It has been understood that necessary funds will be appropriated. Each position requires salary ordinance amendment, and it takes from a month to six weeks to reestablish positions.

Supervisor MacPhee inquired if all the positions of Gardener were filled during the summer months.

Mr. Sues could not answer the question.

Supervisor Green suggested that if no appropriation should be made for the unfilled positions, and if the Park Department should secure men during the summer months, that the men and the Park Department might be embarrassed if the money were taken from the Salary Reserve Fund.

Mr. Wilson stated that he understood from the Civil Service Commission that if the money was not appropriated, the positions would not exist. The Park Commission would have to come to the Board to have the positions established.

Supervisor Brown, who was noted present in the Chambers during the foregoing discussion, suggested that the Gardeners should be paid as temporary employees instead of from the permanent salary appropriations. The Board wanted to give the Park Department what men could be employed, but did not wish to assess the taxpayer for positions that are not filled. The Board agreed with the sentiments expressed by Mr. Wilson, Supervisor Brown stated, but the general experience is that every year about 8 per cent of the budget labor is out for one reason or another, such as retirement, death, resignation, etc. It was his belief, Supervisor Brown continued, that any department can accept a reduction with the thought that during the fiscal year some of the budgeted salary will eventually find its way into the unemployment reserve fund. For that reason, the Board can safely ask the Park Commission to take a reduction in the number of vacant positions.

Supervisor Brown then moved that the Board delete the compensation for 10 employments in the Park Department, the number of employments, however, to remain the same. (Index 12, sheet 7, line 2.) Motion seconded by Supervisor Uhl.

Supervisor MacPhee suggested that if the Park Department can fill the jobs, the proper appropriation would be made for that purpose.

Motion *carried* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Brown, Colman, Gallagher, Green, MacPhee, Mead, Sullivan, Uhl—8.

Noes: Supervisors Gartland, Mancuso, Meyer—3.

Thereupon, Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Colman, moved that the budget of the Park Commission, as amended, be approved.

No objection, and budget *approved*.

Index 9—Police Department.

Supervisor Brown stated that he thought the same general policy as that adopted for the Park Department should apply to the Police Department. The budget of the Police Department might be reduced about 25 per cent in number of employments; the decrease would amount to about \$350,000.

Mr. John Butler, representing the Chief of Police, objected. The hours of the Police Department have been increased. Any surplus as accumulated must be used to pay for overtime. Reduction of the money will prevent payment of necessary overtime. With the shift of the war into the Pacific it is expected that the Police Department will be put on a 10-hour day, or possibly longer. The Department also expects a great many of its men will return. Last year, continued Mr. Butler, in answer to question by Supervisor MacPhee, the Police Department returned approximately \$250,000 to the Reserve Fund.

Supervisor MacPhee doubted if any positions would be jeopardized. The Board would make transfer of funds from Compensation Reserve Fund if the Department found it can fill necessary positions.

Supervisor Gallagher remarked that in comparison, the Police Department budget was lower than the budget of the Fire Department. He believed the Police, Health and Fire departments should get all the funds they request. If they do not give protection, the fault will be that of the Board of Supervisors.

Supervisor Brown stated that the Board did not want to take away funds that can be used. It is merely acting on the record of what has been the experience in the past.

Supervisor Brown then moved that the Board eliminate from the Police Department budget the funds representing 25 per cent of the compensation of unfilled positions, leaving the positions intact. Motion seconded by Supervisor MacPhee.

Supervisor Colman stated that he did not believe any member of the Board would think of doing anything to deprive the Police Department of a single patrolman. However, the Police Department is given the likelihood of getting back three-quarters of the amount. There are two sources from which the money can be obtained; one from Compensation Reserve and the other from the Mayor's Emergency Fund. This is just a case of cooperating in order that the Board need not set up compensation for positions where there is a reasonable chance of their not being filled. (Index 9, sheet 6, line 16.)

Supervisor Mead disagreed with the views expressed by Supervisor Brown. The United States Navy proposes to spend some \$400,000,000, most of which will be spent in this particular area, and in the near future. We are told that we have not seen anything yet, of the Pacific war, particularly around San Francisco Bay. Supervisor Mead stated that he could go along with the Park Department, but he did not feel he could take a chance with the Police Department, the Fire Department or the Health Department. If the war were not over in Europe, it would be different.

Supervisor Brown observed that if the Police Department could go for three months, without filling any of the positions, there would then be sufficient funds to fill all the vacancies.

Thereupon, the roll was called and the motion by Supervisor Brown was *carried* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Brown, Colman, MacPhee, Mancuso, Meyer, Uhl—6.

Noes: Supervisors Gallagher, Gartland, Green, Mead, Sullivan—5.

Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Mancuso, moved approval of the Police Department budget, as amended.

No objection, and budget *approved*.

Index 53—*San Francisco Hospital*.

The Chief Administrative Officer stated that he had anticipated Supervisor Brown's thoughts, and had already made deductions in the budget of the Health Department.

Mr. Louis Moran explained in detail the positions vacant in the Department of Public Health.

Thereupon, Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Mancuso, moved approval of the budget of the San Francisco Hospital.

No objection, and budget *approved*.

Mr. Otto Sues, representing the Civil Service Commission, and speaking to the question of the Annual Salary Ordinance, stated that the administrative provisions of the salary ordinance were presented to the Finance Committee and after several meetings of the Committee certain changes were made. In the salary ordinance it is provided that all time worked in excess of eight hours per day, 40 hours per week, shall be paid at the rate of time and one-half.

The Civil Service Commission also is recommending one step up in salary on promotion. This is in conformity with personal management.

Supervisor Brown declared that the War Labor Board would not permit the hiring of anyone except at entrance salary.

Mr. Sues reported that San Francisco was not bound by the rules of the War Labor Board.

Supervisor Brown declared that every firm in San Francisco who pays taxes is bound by regulations of the War Labor Board. Those regulations are rigidly enforced. This is not in conformity with the best interest of the war effort.

Mr. Sues, in continuing his explanation of the salary ordinance, administrative provisions, stated that a straight shift would be considered as eight hours within nine hours. The current salary ordinance defines a straight shift as eight hours within 9½ hours. There are only two departments affected: one, the Health Department, and the other, the Board of Education. Neither of these departments object. Eight hours within 9½ hours should be considered as a split shift. A split shift is 8 hours within more than 9 hours, but not to exceed 11 hours.

In Section 2.5, Overtime for Per Diem Employees, employees of the Public Utilities Commission have been eliminated.

The Civil Service Commission has recommended a 10 per cent differential for night shift work. Similar employees in private practice receive a differential in pay.

The Clerk presented and read opinion from the City Attorney, as follows:

OPINION OF CITY ATTORNEY

May 21, 1945.

Subject: *Annual Salary Ordinance of 1945 as Affected by Standardization Ordinance.*

Gentlemen:

You have referred to me a proposed salary ordinance and have requested an opinion as to its legality. I have since received from the Civil Service Commission the same bill with most of the schedules attached, but with several minor changes from the proposal submitted by you. My opinion will be based on this later form.

You have not directed your request to any particular sections of the bill. Examination has, therefore, been made of it in its entirety, and such specific reference will be made here as is pertinent to your inquiry. Particular reference is also made to some sections to which my attention has been directed by the Civil Service Commission.

Opinion.

The provisions of the Charter provide a division of functions among the various type of legislation required to regulate and administer the city service. They provide separately for a classification of positions, for a standardization of salaries, and for annual salary ordinances, annual budgets, annual appropriation ordinances and finally for annual tax levies to provide the funds appropriated to meet these expenses. Under this system required by the Charter, it is necessary that each type of legislation be confined to its own field. This is true not only in order that each type of ordinance may properly perform its assigned service, but also in order, by the operation of our government, to test adequately the justice and efficiency of the details of the method provided by the Charter.

Contrary to this system, one type of legislation is sometimes used in the difficult task of administration to attempt to accomplish a purpose of another, a purpose not committed to it by the Charter, and hence rendering such legislation void if enacted. This error is committed to some extent in the subject bill. The bill seems to betray a growing tendency for the annual salary ordinance to invade the functions of the salary standardization ordinance. Section 151

of the Charter provides that, by the standardization ordinance, the Board of Supervisors shall fix *"all salaries, wages and compensations of every kind and nature, except pension and retirement allowances," for all positions and employments paid for by the City and County, except those provided by the Charter itself.*

In fixing compensation, the standardization ordinance relates the compensation, as it must, to types of employment, hours of duty and the spread of those hours over the day. Compensation can be altered either by change in the rate or by change in the type or quantity of service to be given for it. *This is a function of the standardization ordinance and not one for the annual salary ordinance.* The annual salary ordinance should not cover these items in its provisions, except within the administrative limits authorized by Section 11 of the standardization ordinance. Section 11 is as follows:

"If during any succeeding fiscal year while this ordinance is in effect, it is determined by the Board of Supervisors, upon the recommendation of the Civil Service Commission, that changes in working conditions, hours of labor, or any other administrative provisions contained in this ordinance, should be made for the good of the service, such changes shall be made in the annual salary ordinance so as to reflect the necessary changes in working conditions, hours of labor or other administrative provisions in this ordinance; provided that no such change shall affect the basic compensation schedules provided for herein."

We are concerned primarily with the reference of the section to changes in hours of labor, that is in the time to be spent at work either as to number of hours or which hours of the day or days. The section states that such changes may be made in the annual salary ordinance, provided that these changes do not affect the basic compensation schedules set up in that ordinance. These schedules provide, for instance, that for monthly work, consisting of five-day weeks of forty (40) hours each, an employee of a certain classification shall receive a certain compensation, or for work per day as defined therein a certain compensation shall be paid. Any change may be made which does not alter the balance here set up of the amount of work given and the amount of pay received for it. *Any change which affects the quantity of that exchange must be made in the standardization ordinance.*

The rule is simple, but, if in the application of the rule it is departed from either much or little, then there is no rule left which may be used as a measure on the basis of which to give you an opinion. Applying this rule to the bill, certain facts become self-evident.

Section 2.1 of the bill provides an increase of pay of 10 per cent for monthly night shift employees without providing any offset of additional work performed, and thus destroys the balance of work and pay provided by the basic compensation schedules of the standardization ordinance. This affects the provisions as to the seven and one-half (7½) hour night shift, wherein you provide a 10 per cent differential as against the 6¼ per cent differential now in effect. *It comes within the prohibition of the proviso of Section 11 of the standardization ordinance, and is therefore void.* The word "basic" is not used to describe a compensation schedule to which a further compensation may be added, but to describe the service schedules of the standardization ordinance upon which are built the departmental schedules of the salary ordinance.

Section 2.6 of the subject bill, in its third paragraph, provides a 10 per cent pay increase for per diem employees. The standardization ordinance provides for certain fixed rates of compensation for per diem employees based on an eight (8) hour day, and provides

in addition to this that overtime may be paid such employees at a rate fixed in the salary ordinance. This overtime is not the time of the per diem employee's eight (8) hour shift, the rate of pay for which is already established by the standardization ordinance. It is time over that. *The salary ordinance cannot unqualifiedly provide for a different rate of pay from that already fixed by the standardization ordinance.* To do so, there must be a compensating offset, up or down, in the hours of service in accordance with the fixed standard set in the basic schedule. There is none here and the provision of the bill would destroy the balance of work and pay set up in the standardization ordinance. *The provision is therefore void.*

Section 151 of the Charter provides for changes in economic conditions warranting changes in compensation schedules. It provides for reflection of such conditions not only in the standardization ordinance but in amendments thereto. As I have pointed out in earlier opinions, the Charter also provides that such amendments, to be effective in the next fiscal year, must be adopted on or before April 1st. Restandardization of any schedule is not allowed to take effect except at the beginning of any fiscal year, apparently because the tax levy, which raises the money to pay the compensation fixed, is also on an annual basis.

To be considered by the Board of Supervisors on their merits, however, changes affecting the basic compensation schedules for the next fiscal year must be presented to the Board in time so that they can be acted on by April 1st, and, as I have pointed out in earlier opinions, they must be presented as amendments of the standardization ordinance. This is true whether these basic schedules are affected by changes within the body of the schedules or are affected by changes of the other provisions of the standardization ordinance to which they are expressly made subject.

CITY ATTORNEY.

Mr. Dan Scannell, representing labor, declared that if 7½ hours is a normal day's work on the night shift, anything worked more than 7½ hours must be overtime, and should be paid at rate of time and one-half. There would be no change in the basic rate of compensation.

Whereupon Mr. Peddicord, Assistant City Attorney, stated that emergency overtime is very definite in the salary standardization ordinance.

Supervisor MacPhee reported that the salary ordinance provides that compensation for night work shall be paid at an increase of 6¼ per cent instead of the present method of paying 8 hours' compensation for 7½ hours work.

There is also, Supervisor MacPhee reported, the question of providing the same number of holidays for all different groups in the City's employ. The salary ordinance provides, also, that in the event of a promotion, an employee shall advance to the second step of his new classification. That is to provide for additional compensation in the event of promotion. It provides that increments in compensation shall be received on the anniversary of employment.

Mr. Sues, in answer to Supervisor Brown, stated that the cost of this latter mentioned provision would be about \$150,000 out of revenues, and \$125,000 out of the tax rate. The change for employees being promoted will cost from \$12,000 to \$15,000. The change in the split shift will cost about \$11,500. The language deleted in connection with the Public Utilities Commission will cost about \$150,000. That amount will not be reflected in the tax rate.

Mr. Schlessinger, on addressing the Board, stated that his people in October, 1944, had requested the Board to start proceedings to iron out salary difficulties. They had met continuously every Thursday for months with the Finance Committee and the Civil Service Commission. On May 17th a meeting was called for Tuesday, May 22, at 3:00 P. M. Now, he desired to know why the salary ordinance sets up a five-day week schedule.

Mr. Sues explained that the five-day schedule was put into the ordinance after discussing the matter with various department heads.

Mr. Hare reported that the 10 per cent differential was in line with procedure by the War Labor Board. There was no change in the basic compensation rates. His group contended that in allowing the 10 per cent for night work, the basic rate was not affected.

Supervisor Brown stated that the Board was advised that it could not allow the 10 per cent as requested.

Mr. H. S. Foley also addressed the Board on the subject. Many meetings have been held, he stated, and efforts have been made to prevail on the Civil Service Commission to make certain recommendations to allow differentials and overtime payments to per diem and monthly employees. The Civil Service Commission has denied such requests, stating that in their opinion it would be in violation of the Charter. The City Attorney rendered an opinion favorable to his group's request. The opinion was submitted to the Finance Committee. The City Attorney has stated that the salary standardization ordinance cannot be amended, but Mr. Peddicord has stated that "any change may be made which does not alter the balance here set up of the amount of work given and the amount of pay received for it. Any change which affects the quantity of that exchange must be made in the standardization ordinance." Section 11 of the salary standardization ordinance provides, continued Mr. Foley, that when working conditions are changed, the salary ordinance can be amended to provide for such changed conditions. Changed conditions do exist on the street cars, especially in the "owl" runs. He urged the Board to give full consideration to paying 10 per cent differential to platform men of the Municipal Railway for night work.

Mr. Peddicord stated that the opinion referred to with regard to the platform men was in answer to question whether or not the provisions submitted followed Section 125 of the Charter. The answer was that it did not. It had nothing to do with the question of the salary standardization ordinance. Mr. O'Toole, continued Mr. Peddicord, has cautioned that any change in schedules should be taken up prior to April 1st. Nothing can be done now in the salary ordinance about matters covered by salary standardization. The administrative provisions may be changed provided that no change shall affect the basic compensation schedules.

Supervisor MacPhee requested an explanation of the change from 7½ per cent extra compensation to 6¼ per cent.

Mr. Sues explained that if an employee works a six-day week he gets 20 per cent additional pay; 6¼ per cent of 120 is equal to 7½ per cent on the basis of a normal week.

Supervisor MacPhee announced that there was a proposal, Section 1.7, that affected employees who did not operate on a seven-day basis.

Mr. Jack Smith requested a change in the wording of the section. The School Department does not normally have a seven-day week operation. He requested a change in language that would protect employees in their contracts in private employment.

Mr. Sues suggested that possibly the Department of Public Health could not operate under conditions as proposed, i.e., five days between Monday and Friday.

The Chief Administrative Officer reported that Dr. Geiger had objected to the provision. He felt that he could not operate economically on schedules as originally written.

Supervisor Gallagher objected to requesting the Board to act on a matter such as the salary ordinance that had "just now" been presented to the Board.

Mr. Sues reported that the Finance Committee had had the salary ordinance for some two weeks.

Supervisor Gallagher declared that he would vote against the ordinance; he did not know anything about it.

Supervisor Colman, after reading from the "Rules of the Board," pointed out that the annual salary ordinance and appropriation ordinance was passed for second reading.

Supervisor Gallagher moved that the platform men of the Municipal Railway who work nights be given a 10 per cent increase in their compensation.

Supervisor Brown stated that could not be done without a request by the department head and recommendation of the Mayor.

Supervisor MacPhee stated that the Finance Committee had recommended such procedure, but it had had the opinion from the City Attorney stating that it was illegal and could not be done.

Mr. Foley pointed out that the present salary ordinance provides for a 7½-hour shift for night work. The employees have been receiving the proposed differential for monthly employees. He saw no reason why something could not be provided for the platform men.

Mr. Peddicord pointed out that monthly employees were controlled by a different procedure entirely.

Supervisor Gallagher, however, after further brief discussion, renewed his motion that platform men be granted a 10 per cent increase for night work, i. e., from 7:30 P. M. until 4:30 A. M. Motion seconded by Supervisor Mead.

Mr. Dan Scannell declared that in accordance with statement by the War Labor Board, the Municipal Railway employees should get the proposed differential.

Supervisor Brown raised a point of order, stating that the Charter clearly provides that the Board of Supervisors cannot vote increases in the budget unless they are requested so to do by the department heads, with the recommendation of the Mayor.

The Chair ruled the point of order not well taken.

Supervisor Brown appealed from the decision of the Chair.

Supervisor Colman, at the request of the Chair, put the appeal. "An appeal has been taken from the decision of the Chair," he stated. "The question is: Is the decision of the Chair the decision of the Board?"

Supervisor Brown then read Section 72 of the Charter, following which he stated: "The employees who are now working nights have been set up in the budget with a 7½ per cent increase. Under the conditions as set forth by the Civil Service Commission, my understanding is that it has been reduced to 6¼ per cent. Heretofore the Board of Supervisors has set up salary standardization. The Board

of Supervisors amended the salary standardization ordinance with respect to institutional help and employees of other departments and it is not in error in doing the same things at this time as it has done heretofore."

Supervisor Colman announced that a vote "Aye" would sustain the Chair; a vote "No" would overrule the Chair.

Thereupon, the roll was called and the Chair was *sustained* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Gallagher, Gartland, Green, Mead, Meyer, Sullivan, Uhl—7.

Noes: Supervisors Brown, Colman, MacPhee, Mancuso—4.

Whereupon, Supervisor Brown warned that the Board would be invalidating the entire proceedings if it went through with its present procedure.

Supervisor MacPhee inquired as to the effect on the rest of the ordinance, assuming that the 10 per cent increase should be voted.

Mr. Peddicord stated that he had been instructed to confine his remarks to the items as presented.

Supervisor Mancuso stated that the Board could not amend the appropriation ordinance at this time and have it ready in time to go along with the budget. The Finance Committee has been considering the matter for some time. The Board has recommended a 10 per cent increase for certain employments, but has been advised that such increase is unconstitutional. He did not see how the Board could now tell the City Attorney's office that it was going to do just the opposite to what that office has approved.

Supervisor Colman, in discussing the question, stated that the principal argument against the motion was the reading of the Charter, which appeared to him to be conclusive. The wording of the Charter was very clear, and there could be no misunderstanding as to its meaning. The recommendation for increases should come from the department head, and should have the approval of the Mayor. That was his reason for voting against the proposed increase. The platform men in San Francisco are now getting a higher wage than the highest generally prevailing wage for like work performed elsewhere in the State.

Supervisor Colman, in continuing his argument, stated that he admitted that he did not jump at the beck and call of the city employees, yet he had as much respect for them as anyone else. The city employees, however, do not run the city government, or should not run it. The conduct of the city government is in the hands of the duly appointed officials. The City Attorney gives the impression that the proposed increase would be illegal. To go along with the proposal before the Board would be a very unwise thing to do. He could not go along with such decision.

Thereupon, the Chair, after reading Section 73 of the Charter, stated that he believed the Board was within its rights.

Supervisor MacPhee stated that he wanted to see the men get the 10 per cent increase. He had introduced it originally in the Finance Committee. The Committee requested an opinion thereon from the City Attorney. The City Attorney has stated that it cannot be done. He would not take any chance with other departments merely for the purpose of trying to show his big-heartedness to the Municipal Railway employees on something which he could not deliver. He would vote against the motion.

Supervisor Brown, in explanation of his vote, stated that he was voting against the motion merely because it was his opinion that it

was prohibited by the Charter. His vote was not based on the merits or demerits of the proposed increase.

Thereupon, the roll was called and the motion by Supervisor Gallagher, that the platform men be granted a 10 per cent increase in salary for night work, was *carried* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Gallagher, Gartland, Green, Mead, Meyer, Sullivan—6.

Noes: Supervisors Brown, Colman, MacPhee, Mancuso, Uhl—5.

Following the foregoing roll call, Supervisor Mead stated that he had not expected six members of the Board to vote "Aye." However, there was no use in being foolish about this thing, but he did not think that the Board had done the right thing. He was sympathetic, but he was fearful that the Board had jeopardized the entire salary ordinance.

Mr. Foley stated that the salary ordinance would be before the Board on May 26th, on Passage for Second Reading. If the Board should find out in the meantime that the amendment just voted would jeopardize the remainder of the ordinance, it could rescind its action.

Supervisor Brown pointed out that if the Board intended to allow the 10 per cent increase in the salary ordinance for platform men, it would have to allow funds in the budget that the Board must approve.

Supervisor Colman stated that it was his honest belief that the Board's action was a wrong thing to have done for everybody's peace of mind. Perhaps he had not understood Supervisor Mead, but if he did, he would move that the Board rescind its action just taken.

The Chair inquired of Mr. Peddicord if the Board would be jeopardizing the salary ordinance by its action just taken, to which Mr. Peddicord replied that he could find no flaw in Supervisor Brown's reasoning, and he believed the Board was jeopardizing the city employees.

Supervisor Uhl then stated that he would change his vote. He was in sympathy with the carmen, but he could not take a chance.

Supervisor Mead announced that he did not think any member of the Board wanted to take any chance. Thereupon, he moved that the Board rescind its action, and requested that the Board do so unanimously. Motion seconded by Supervisor Green.

The Chair announced that he did not want to jeopardize any city employee.

Supervisor MacPhee, before the roll was called on the motion by Supervisor Green, presented the following statement:

"As Chairman of the Finance Committee I have pointed out to the members of the Board that we were considering the annual salary ordinance, and that meetings for that purpose were to be held. I invited members of the Board to attend the meetings. I did the same thing with the budget. Only one member attended the meetings, and that was Supervisor Uhl. It is unfortunate that we did not have more information on these things, but the facts are there."

Thereupon, the roll was called and the action of the Board, whereby the motion to approve the 10 per cent increase for carmen had been approved, was *rescinded* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Brown, Colman, Gallagher, Gartland, Green, MacPhee, Mancuso, Mead, Meyer, Sullivan, Uhl—11.

Thereupon, Supervisor MacPhee proposed an amendment to Section 1.7, but adding thereto the words, "five consecutive days per week, but provided, however, that departments that do not have a normal seven day work week, normal work week shall consist of five days between Monday, through Friday, inclusive."

Following brief discussion, Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Green, moved that the foregoing language, as suggested by Supervisor MacPhee, be included in and made part of Section 1.7 of the annual salary ordinance.

No objection, and amendment approved.

Thereupon, Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Sullivan, moved approval, as amended.

No action.

Supervisor Brown, in discussing the annual salary ordinance, declared that it has, in effect, nullified all work done to reduce the tax rate. There have been four provisions included therein not heretofore enjoyed by the employees. He mentioned the question of salary increment on the anniversary date of employment, which would cost more than \$30,000. There was also the "step-up" in salary; he could see no objection to that provision. He believed the one step up in case of promotion was largely justified, but it would mean an increased cost to the City and County. However, the limit is fast approaching not only in the basic pay, but in working conditions. Hereafter any increases for employees must be fully justified. City employees should receive the same treatment—equal to the basic high pay rates available in private industry. Until it can be shown, though, that further consideration is due on that basis, it would be his intention to vote against increases.

Supervisor Colman announced that in discussing the question of the salary ordinance with Mr. Henderson, he stated that two of the provisions in the salary ordinance were to extend to all the employees certain privileges that are now enjoyed by some of the groups. Some groups are now receiving their salary increments on the anniversary of their employment, while others have to wait until the next fiscal year. In private employment, the employee gets everything the higher grade entitles him to. There was another statement—the question of holidays. Some employees receive six holidays; others get twelve. A move has been made to equalize the number of holidays. Naturally, the move was not made to cut down the twelve holidays to six, but to change the six to the twelve holidays. During his years as a Supervisor, continued Supervisor Colman, he had always felt that the city employees should have the equivalent of the highest prevailing wage paid on the outside or corresponding wages paid by a corresponding governmental agency in this particular State. He intended always to abide by that principle.

The Clerk announced that there were certain reclassifications that the Clerk should be authorized to make in the salary ordinance.

Mr. Sues announced that no motion was necessary to authorize the making of such corrections or changes.

Mr. Eneas Kane, from the Mayor's Office, addressed the Board. The Board, declared Mr. Kane, was debating on the budget, but at the same time it was considering a salary ordinance which did not conform to the figures set up in the budget. He believed that Mr. Sues and the Civil Service Commission should give consideration to the situation. In the salary ordinance draft submitted by the Civil Service Commission, certain salaries are lower than those recommended by the Mayor. There are some 25 or 30 classifications so affected.

Mr. Sues stated that it was not necessary to take up these classifications at the present time. There have been reclassifications of certain positions since the budget estimates were submitted for the coming fiscal year. These positions are still in the new budget under the old classifications. The Civil Service Commission is requesting that the Board of Supervisors take proper action so that the positions will be indicated in the salary ordinance under their proper classifications. The Commission suggests that the budget be adopted with the provision that the budget shall be corrected to conform with the proper Civil Service designations.

Mr. Kane declared that such procedure would give the Civil Service Commission the power to fix salaries that are not given by the Charter.

Mr. Sues then stated that his suggestion was that a motion be made that the classifications and salaries be reconciled in the salary ordinance to conform with the recommendations of the Civil Service Commission.

Thereupon, Supervisor Uhl moved that the salary ordinance be amended to conform to the classifications set up by the Civil Service Commission.

No action.

Mr. Kane continued, stating that the department heads had recommended certain salaries in the budget which the Board has been considering. The Board approves the Mayor's budget, and then along comes the Civil Service Commission, who asks that the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors be authorized to make any changes in discrepancies that may appear between the amount involved in the budget and the figures recommended by the Commission. That is wrong.

Supervisor MacPhee stated that he did not know how many employments were involved in the situation cited by Mr. Kane. The Finance Committee does not examine each individual salary; it would be a physical impossibility so to do. The Finance Committee has not approved Mr. Kane's salary, or the salary of any of the 25 or more employees about which he speaks.

Supervisor Gallagher advised that the Board adopt the budget with the salaries as set up, but not pass any motion that would give the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors the right to change any classifications. The Civil Service Commission should bring in any changes to the Board of Supervisors after such changes are made.

Supervisor Colman inquired if a recommendation would be presented by the Civil Service Commission regarding these particular matters.

Mr. Sues reported that the communication referred to by Mr. Kane was dated May 9. The salary recommended for Mr. Kane was \$375 to \$450. The Commission recommended salary of \$350 to \$425. Thereupon, Mr. Sues read the following:

Following the reading of the foregoing statement, Mr. Sues continued, saying that the annual salary ordinance would reflect all the changes as submitted to the Board. As for the salary for Mr. Kane, the recommended change shows an increase over his present salary. The matter, however, will have to be decided before the annual salary ordinance is passed.

Mr. David Lewis, following brief discussion as to procedure—whether the budget of the annual salary ordinance should be approved first, stated that there must be incorporated in the budget necessary money required by the provisions of the salary ordinance. If the Board adopts the budget before adopting the salary ordinance it must make provision in the budget for any additional costs. It must provide in the budget something predicated on a future action.

Thereupon, further consideration of the annual salary ordinance was temporarily postponed.

Index 62—Public Utilities Commission—General Office.

Supervisor MacPhee explained the budget for the Public Utilities Commission—General Office. In the budget, he stated, there is provision for transfer of funds for operation of other departments. There was one new employment.

Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Green, moved approval.

No objection, and budget approved.

Index 65—Public Utilities Commission—Municipal Railway Consolidated.

Supervisor Uhl called attention to item for General Manager, Municipal Railway Bureau, at a salary of \$15,000 (Index 65, sheet 4, line 32). He stated that he felt the proposed salary had brought about a most regrettable situation. The salary was above that of any other official of the City and County. Thereupon, he moved deletion of the item.

Motion failed for want of a second.

Supervisor MacPhee reported that there were other new employments set up to administer the operations of the Municipal Railway. There were 48 new positions under permanent salaries, many of which he thought could be eliminated. There are also provided for, services by other branches of the municipal government.

Mr. Robert Scott agreed that the budget did show 48 new employments. However, that was not a true picture. During the year there were six positions deleted and eight positions created. In a supplemental budget request which will be before the Board, the Public Utilities Commission is asking the deletion of 14 General Clerks. The Market Street Railway had one set of books. Its payroll procedure was simple. The City's procedure is not so. The Commission is deleting from the budget a Senior Accountant, and is asking that the job be classified as an Accountant. The Senior Accountant of the Market Street Railway did not come over to the City.

Index 65, sheet 1, line 4. Temporary Salaries, \$73,250.

Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Sullivan, moved that the appropriation for Temporary Salaries be reduced to \$60,000.

No objection, and motion carried.

Index 65, sheet 4, line 32. General Manager, Municipal Railway Bureau, \$15,000.

Supervisor Uhl moved that the salary for the General Manager, Municipal Railway Bureau, be reduced to \$10,000.

Supervisor Colman opposed the motion, stating that Mr. Scott was a very competent man, and it would be most unfair and unwise for the Board to make such reduction. Mr. Scott will not be overpaid at all.

Thereupon, the roll was called and the motion *failed* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Gallagher, Uhl—2.

Noes: Supervisors Brown, Colman, Gartland, Green, MacPhee, Mancuso, Mead, Meyer, Sullivan—9.

Thereupon, Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Meyer, moved that the budget of the Municipal Railway Consolidated be approved.

No objection, and budget approved.

Action Rescinded.

Supervisor Gallagher, seconded by Supervisor MacPhee, moved that the action just taken be rescinded:

Motion *carried* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Colman, Gallagher, Gartland, MacPhee, Mancuso, Mead, Meyer, Sullivan, Uhl—9.

Noes: Supervisors Brown, Green—2.

Index 65, sheet 13, line 29. Headway Recording Devices, \$25,000.

Supervisor Uhl moved deletion of the foregoing item, stating that such devices did not work on rubber tires. Motion seconded by Supervisor Gallagher.

Mr. Scott explained the device, its operation, and remarked that he understood it could be adapted to buses. It is doing that in Washington at the present time.

Thereupon, the roll was called and the motion *failed* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Gallagher, Mancuso, Mead, Uhl—4.

Noes: Supervisors Brown, Colman, Gartland, Green, MacPhee, Meyer, Sullivan—7.

Thereupon, Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Brown, moved approval of Index 65, Municipal Railway Consolidated.

Motion *carried* and budget *approved* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Brown, Colman, Gartland, Green, MacPhee, Mancuso, Meyer—7.

Noes: Supervisors Gallagher, Mead, Sullivan, Uhl—4.

Index 66 — *Public Utilities Commission — San Francisco Water Department.*

Index 66, sheet 20, line 4. Secondary Feeder Mains in Cast Iron, \$191,800.

Supervisor MacPhee suggested that the foregoing mentioned item, together with the other items on the same sheet, amounting to more than \$1,600,000, be considered as a whole. The appropriation of more than \$1,600,000 will be reflected in the tax rate.

Supervisor Uhl remarked that the Mayor had deleted some of the requested appropriation. Why should not all the items be deleted?

Supervisor MacPhee observed that it would be a matter of policy for the Board to determine. However, the Board should have the Public Utilities Commission on record as to what it intends with respect to restoring the water rates to the amount charged before reductions in rates had been granted.

Mr. Scott announced, when asked what action had been taken by the Public Utilities Commission, that he did not know, inasmuch as he had not attended the meeting of the Commission, but had been at the Board meeting all day. He could not speak for the Commission. However, the Commission might have taken action already.

Thereupon, Supervisor MacPhee suggested that the Board leave the items in the budget. The work must be done, anyway.

Supervisor Colman stated that he believed the Board should leave the items in the budget. However, he expressed the belief that the utilities should be self-supporting. He believed, though, that the latest rate reduction was ill-advised. It would be his strong recommendation that the rates be restored to the point that would take care of the situation. The Board, of course, could not force the Public Utilities Commission to take such action, but if the Commission knows that the approval of the budget is based on the hope that the Commission would act in restoring the previous water rates, it would have some weight.

Supervisor Brown stated that he understood approval of the items under consideration would represent a budget deficit of about one-half million dollars. He agreed that the Public Utilities Commission should be on a self-support basis. If not, the rates are inadequate. It is well to mention to the Board that Section 74 of the Charter provides that the budget will require a two-thirds vote of the full Board to approve a budget where a utility is not self-supporting. If the figures, as stated, are correct, eight votes will be required to approve the Water Department budget.

Index 66, sheet 4, line 6. General Manager and Chief Engineer, \$10,000.

Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Mead, moved deletion of the foregoing item.

Supervisor MacPhee, in discussing the foregoing motion, stated that Mr. Nelson Eckart, the General Manager and Chief Engineer of the San Francisco Water Department, was suing the City and County for an amount of approximately \$65,000, and that there was a good possibility that he could collect that amount.

Supervisor Uhl stated that if the position is not deleted, and Mr. Eckart wins his suit and continues in the employ of the City and County, he will receive a salary of \$15,000 per year.

Supervisor Brown opposed the motion. Personal feelings should not be allowed to influence the decision of the members of the Board in this matter. Mr. Eckart has shown ability for years in the position he now holds.

Supervisor Mead asserted that Mr. Eckart has apparently let the present condition, with respect to his compensation, continue with the thought in mind that sometime he would take such action, when there was sufficient money involved.

Supervisor Meyer also opposed the motion. Mr. Eckart, he stated, was assistant to Mr. O'Shaughnessy. His salary was originally \$15,000. It was arbitrarily reduced and Mr. Eckart has a perfect right to try to get it back. He is a high class man and a good engineer.

Supervisor Colman expressed surprise at the motion. The entire matter was news to him, he stated. He had known Mr. Eckart since school days. If Mr. Eckart has this money coming to him, there is no reason why he should not try to collect it. The courts will decide that question. He, Supervisor Colman, would vote against the motion.

Thereupon, the roll was called and the motion to delete the position of General Manager and Chief Engineer, at a salary of \$10,000, was *carried* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Gallagher, Green, MacPhee, Meyer, Mead, Sullivan, Uhl—7.

Noes: Supervisors Brown, Colman, Gartland, Meyer—4.

Whereupon, Supervisor Brown appealed to members of the Board to reconsider the matter. He thought that the Board was going too far, and that the Board would have reason to regret the incident if the vote were allowed to stand.

Supervisor Brown, seconded by Supervisor Colman, moved that the Board rescind its action in deleting the position of General Manager and Chief Engineer of the Water Department from the salary ordinance.

Supervisor Colman, in support of the motion to rescind action, stated that the grounds given were not grounds to discharge Mr. Eckart. The only grounds sufficient for discharge are: Is he morally all right; is he honest; is he capable? Nothing has been said against his integrity. In our own private business we do not fire a man for reasons given for the discharge of Mr. Eckart. Mr. Eckart has worked for the City and County since 1911. Supervisor Colman continued saying that he had never voted to put a man out of a job. He had voted against the creation of a job, but once created he would not put a man out.

Thereupon, the roll was called on the motion to rescind, as follows:

Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Meyer, moved approval.

No objection, and budget *approved*.

Index 70. *San Francisco Unified School District*.

Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Green, moved approval.

Supervisor Brown, in discussing the foregoing departmental budget, stated that the Board has nothing to say about the budget. The Board can only pass it, but cannot amend it. The school budget shows

an increase of \$1,252,000, or about 8 per cent or 9 per cent of the increase included in the budget. Included in the budget is \$1,000,000 for Special Accumulative Building Fund. There is a saving of \$40,000 on Civilian Defense. The Board can do nothing on this budget except to vote "Aye." However, Supervisor Brown stated, he was protesting against the increased cost of education in San Francisco. The school population for the past ten years has consistently shown a decrease. One-third of the responsibility for increase in the tax rate will belong to the School Department.

Supervisor Colman pointed out that there was \$1,500,000 in building funds. That will save the taxpayers of some future generation. Aside from the building program, their increase is about 2 per cent on a \$14,000,000 budget. That is not out of line.

Thereupon, Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Meyer, moved approval.

No objection, and budget approved.

Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Meyer, moved approval.

Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Mancuso, moved approval.

No objection, and budget approved.

Tree Planting Program.

Supervisor Mead again brought up the proposed tree planting program, which he had opposed earlier during the proceedings. He then moved approval of an item of \$10,000 to be included in the budget to start the three planting program proposed by Art Commissioner Bufano. Motion seconded by Supervisor Green.

Supervisor Colman opposed the motion. A group of responsible citizens are going to try to raise a sum of \$100,000 to \$150,000 for such project. That amount would apparently take care of the maintenance of trees. The Board of Supervisors should delay action on the matter. He would vote against the motion.

Supervisor MacPhee also opposed the motion. He stated he was not opposed to the program, which he thought to be very much worth while. He thought that the matter, though, should be considered at a later date, and he intended to bring the matter up before the Post War Planning Committee and see if money could not be provided in some way for the program.

The blame should fall on the Mayor, the commissions, the Supervisors, and on everyone else concerned for any increase in the tax rate.

Supervisor Colman declared that he did not care to vote against the budget. He must vote for it; he had no other responsibility.

Action Rescinded.

Thereupon, the Board rescinded its previous action, in refusing to approve the budget, by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Brown, Colman, Gallagher, Gartland, Green, MacPhee, Mancuso, Mead, Meyer, Sullivan—10.

No: Supervisor Uhl—1.

Supervisor MacPhee, following the foregoing vote, stated that he was well satisfied with the budget. With some of the items therein, he did not agree, but, all in all, he thought the budget would mean a great deal to San Francisco. The people would get real value from it. Funds have been provided for capital expenditures that should have been provided many years ago. The Mayor, he thought, had done a good job on the budget. It was not possible for any one man to do this job perfectly, and all the Supervisors have done a good job, and although the Board will be held up to criticism to a great extent, such criticism will not be justified. The public will get real value from the budget. He would be glad to vote for it.

Approval of Budget.

Thereupon, the roll was again called and the Board, by the following vote, *approved* the budget:

Ayes: Supervisors Brown, Colman, Gallagher, Gartland, Green, MacPhee, Mancuso, Mead, Meyer, Sullivan—10.

No: Supervisor Uhl—1.

Correction of Clerical Errors.

Supervisor Brown moved that the Clerk be authorized to correct any necessary clerical errors in the budget.

No objection, and so ordered.

Excused From Attendance.

Supervisor Meyer, at his own request, was excused from attendance at the next meeting of the Board.

ADJOURNMENT.

There being no further business, the Board, at the hour of 3:20 A. M., May 22, 1945, adjourned.

In Board of Supervisors, San Francisco, Saturday, May 26, 1945, 11:00 A. M.

The Board met in special session to consider the annual salary ordinance and the annual appropriation ordinance.

CALLING THE ROLL.

The roll was called and the following Supervisors were noted present:

Supervisors Brown, Colman, Gartland, Green, MacPhee, Mancuso, Mead, Meyer, Sullivan—8.

Absent: Supervisors Gallagher, Mancuso, Uhl—3.

Quorum present.

Supervisor Brown presiding, on motion by Supervisor Mead.

Supervisor Gallagher attending funeral.

Supervisor Mancuso was noted present at 11:30 A. M.

Consideration of Annual Salary Ordinance.

The Clerk presented communication from Civil Service Commission, suggesting, at the request of Mr. Harry Ross, of the Controller's Office, the addition, at the end of Section 1, of the following language:

"The word 'position' or 'positions' as used in this ordinance shall be construed to include 'office' or 'offices,' and the word 'employee' or 'employees' shall be construed to include 'officer' or 'officers'."

Mr. Henderson, representing the Civil Service Commission, stated that there were positions in the salary ordinance properly designated as offices, or officers. He could not see what particular good it would do, but the proposed amendment could do no harm. The Civil Service Commission had no objection to the inclusion of the words as suggested.

After further brief discussion, Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Green, moved approval of the proposed amendment.

No objection, and amendment approved.

The Clerk presented communication from Civil Service Commission, approving request of the Director of Public Works that the class F410 Engineer be deleted from the list of employments appearing in the salary ordinance for the fiscal year 1945-1946, and included in Section 1.8 thereof.

Mr. Henderson explained the effect of the proposal would be to permit payment for overtime worked, whereas, when the class F410 Engineers work overtime now, they are allowed time off in lieu of overtime pay. The Commission denied this request on two different occasions, but Mr. Vensano has urged that if the men are not allowed pay for overtime work, it will not be possible to complete necessary work on post-war programs. The Commission has now changed its decision, and has approved the request.

Deputy City Attorney Dion Holm, in reply to questioning as to the right of the Board to amend the salary ordinance, stated that the Board had such right so long as it did not affect the existing budget.

Mr. Henderson stated that money has been appropriated and was in the budget, as approved.

Thereupon, Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Green, moved approval of the proposed amendment.

Supervisor Brown objected to the amendment. He was opposed to that sort of procedure, making changes in a document so important as the salary ordinance, at the last moment.

The Chief Administrative Officer agreed with the statement by Mr. Henderson. The Engineering Department is trying to provide many projects for post-war work. The Department is short some 120 men that are required in order to get out a full program within a specified time. There is a possibility of getting engineers from down town, provided the Department can furnish supervision. The present salary ordinance does not provide for payment of overtime for engineers, but they are allowed time off. They are not interested in time off, or even in overtime, but they will cooperate in working evenings and Saturday mornings supervising such engineers as can be obtained from outside sources. For this reason we are asking permission to pay engineers for overtime employment. This matter has been discussed for a number of months, and we have just arrived at the point where the Civil Service Commission has agreed to recommending this amendment. It will not cost the City anything. If the amendment is not approved, the same work will have to be done, but over a longer period of time. Applications must be on file by the end of this year in order to participate in the \$10,000,000 allocation by the State.

Supervisor Colman, after discussing the proposed amendment briefly, stated that the amendment seemed to be in order, and, as far as he was concerned, was satisfactory. He could see no reason to vote against it.

Thereupon, the roll was called, and the amendment was *approved* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Colman, Gartland, Green, MacPhee, Mancuso, Mead, Meyer, Sullivan—8.

No: Supervisor Brown—1.

Absent: Supervisors Gallagher, Uhl—2.

The Clerk presented communication from the Civil Service Commission, announcing the classification of two positions established in the Bureau of Public Service and Employee Relations, as follows: B54, Director, Bureau of Public Service; B55, Assistant Director, Bureau of Public Service.

Mr. Henderson explained that the foregoing was merely the titling of positions heretofore set up in the budget. It does not affect the compensation at all.

Supervisor Green, seconded by Supervisor Mead, moved approval.

Motion *carried* without objection.

Subsequently during the proceedings, Supervisor MacPhee announced that he desired to have his vote recorded as "No" on the Director, Bureau of Public Service, and the Assistant Director of Public Service.

Supervisor Mead suggested that the foregoing statement be recorded in the record, inasmuch as the matter had already been acted on.

Whereupon, Supervisor MacPhee accepted the suggestion by Supervisor Mead.

The Clerk presented communication from the Civil Service Commission, transmitting, with the Commission's approval, request by the Board of Education that 90 positions be included in the list of positions of employees authorized to work in excess of 40 hours per week. These employments are included in the present salary ordinance, but were deleted at the meeting of the Finance Committee

held on the evening of April 23, 1945, at the behest of the employee organizations. The present request is only for the period of the summer vacations. The positions in question are: 40 C102 Janitresses, 40 C104 Janitors, and 10 C107 Working Foreman Janitors.

Supervisor MacPhee reported on the Finance Committee's consideration of the foregoing request. The Committee felt that if the janitors were called on to work on Saturday or Sunday, it was emergency overtime, and they should be so paid. The Board of Education wants men to work on Saturday and Sunday. The Board of Education wants the privilege of having the janitors work five days within seven days. If the salary ordinance is amended, the janitors will be called on to work five days within seven, otherwise they will work 40 hours per week, anytime from Monday to Friday, inclusive. If, as a result of a late meeting, janitors cannot be obtained to work on Friday night, they can come to work earlier on Monday morning to do the work.

Supervisor Colman inquired as to the effect upon expenditures. If the Board of Supervisors desires to take action to increase the appropriation of the Board of Education, he wanted to know about it.

Mr. Henderson stated that if the request is denied, and if the Board of Education requires janitors to work on Saturday, it would increase the Board's expenditures by paying time and one-half on Saturday instead of straight time. However, Mr. Henderson continued, he had been informed that if this request is denied, the Board of Education will charge the Recreation Department with the additional salary expense. Thus, the Board of Education will not have any extra pay at all. The proposal of the Board of Education is not in the draft of the salary ordinance at present, and nothing has yet been adopted.

Mr. Schlesinger, secretary of the Civil Service Building Maintenance Union, Local No. 66A, in discussing the foregoing matter, stated that this was the same situation that has been going on for several years in the Board of Education. During the ten-week holiday season there is operated a recreation center for small children in certain schools. Last year the janitors asked that they receive time and one-half for overtime work. It is not a permanent situation or a regular job, and it would defeat the purpose of salary standardization to consider it on a straight-time basis. Now the Board of Education wants to use the whip-hand situation of the Recreation Department taking the matter over.

Supervisor Mancuso then urged that the Board follow the recommendation of the Finance Committee. If the proposal of the Board of Education is adopted it would be in effect a reduction of salary. It would not be fair.

Supervisor Colman called attention to previous actions of the Board. The Board has already had requests from various departments to make amendments. One came from the Chief Administrative Officer, which he explained, and which was, as far as he personally was concerned, satisfactory, and the amendment was approved. The Board had an amendment from the Civil Service Commission, the explanation of which again, as far as he was concerned, was satisfactory. Now this request comes from a department over which the Board has very little control. He would like to hear what the Board of Education has in mind; he would like to be consistent. Because of the prospective high tax rate he was inclined to think that the request should be allowed.

Thereupon, the Chair advised that the parliamentary situation was, that the Board had received a request from the Board of Education,

for an amendment to the salary ordinance. If the amendment is defeated the appropriation ordinance is not changed.

Whereupon, Supervisor Colman moved that the request of the Board of Education be allowed.

Motion *failed* for want of a second.

The following communication from the Civil Service Commission was presented and read by the Clerk:

May 25, 1945.

Gentlemen:

Under date of May 9, 1945, the Chief Administrative Officer addressed a letter to the commission reporting the cost of meals furnished employees of the Department of Public Health, which reads as follows:

"Following is a tabulation of the cost of meals served during March, 1945, in the employees' dining room of the San Francisco Hospital. You may be interested in these cost figures in connection with your preparation of the salary ordinance for the next fiscal year.

"These figures have been furnished by the Department of Public Health."

On May 14 the Commission forwarded the above information to the Board of Supervisors for consideration in connection with the budget estimates but without specific recommendation from the Commission. At the Finance Committee meeting yesterday the Finance Committee requested that the Commission make a recommendation covering this matter. I have communicated with members of the Civil Service Commission and I am authorized to advise your honorable Board that the Commission feels that charges for meals furnished employees should cover the cost to the City of the meals and so recommends. Formal action confirming this recommendation will be taken by the Commission at its next meeting.

You are therefore advised that the Commission recommends the following schedule of charges for accommodations furnished employees. These charges for employees of the Department of Public Health cover the cost of meals as reported to the Chief Administrative Officer by the Department of Public Health:

We are advised that the cost report by the Department of Public Health included only the cost of food and direct labor involved in the preparing and serving of the meals, and does not include cost of overhead administration, rent, fuel, or equipment.

The schedule of charges should be included in Section 2.8 of the annual salary ordinance.

Supervisor MacPhee announced that the foregoing communication set forth the actual cost of meals provided to employees. He then requested the privilege of the floor for Mr. Arthur Hare.

Privilege of the Floor.

Mr. Hare objected to the Commission's recommendation with respect to the charges to be made for meals furnished employees. In the matter of breakfast, for instance, an employee may take only a cup of coffee, but he is charged the full rate for a breakfast.

A thorough survey should be made as to what each person eats. There has not been time to make a proper survey of the situation. This recommendation, if approved, will result in a reduction of salary of the low-paid workers. The City Attorney has ruled that anything done to change basic rates of the employees would be illegal. If it is illegal to give employees 10 per cent differential for night work, it is illegal to reduce the salary that they take home without making a proper survey. Restaurant prices are frozen; if the City increases the price of meals served to its employees, it will be violating OPA regulations. If this proposal is approved, it will mean a reduction of \$16.50 per month in the pay of some of the employees. In closing, Mr. Hare urged the members of the Board to realize that if the recommendation should be approved, those who would suffer would be the people in the very lowest bracket of the City government.

Mr. Frank Moitoza also opposed the proposed amendment. He agreed with the views expressed by Mr. Hare.

Mr. Jefferies, representing the CIO, also agreed with the remarks made by the previous speakers. Approval would be a violation of National Wage Stabilization as well as OPA. Although the City is not bound legally to such regulation, it is bound morally. He urged the Board not to approve the recommendation.

Supervisor Colman stated that he knew nothing about this matter. However, the prices as set up seem reasonable. If the men could eat elsewhere than at the various institutions, they would probably pay more and not get as good quality of food as the City offers. He did not believe there would be any violation of OPA regulations. The OPA makes provisions for adjustments.

The Chief Administrative Officer reported that the Health Department has merely filed the figures. That is the only position of the Health Department in the matter.

Supervisor MacPhee pointed out that this proposal has been recommended by the Finance Committee.

Supervisor Mancuso questioned the statement by Supervisor MacPhee. The statement was made, he held, that the matter be brought into the Board and that Mr. Henderson should bring in some recommendation. No recommendation was made by the Finance Committee.

Thereupon, Supervisor MacPhee stated that the matter was heard by the Finance Committee on Thursday. It was pointed out that these charges were the cost of operation for furnishing meals. The Civil Service Commission stated that it was making no recommendation. After discussing the matter the Committee felt that if this represented the proper cost, the employees should pay such costs. The Committee then asked Mr. Henderson to make the proper recommendation for consideration by the Board. However, since that time he had reconsidered his own position. He did not want to work any hardship on the lower paid employees. However, the Board should consider the entire matter during consideration of salary standardization.

Thereupon, Supervisor MacPhee moved that the matter be held in abeyance and that further study be made in connection with the salary standardization program, when made available to the Board for consideration. Motion seconded by Supervisor Mead.

Supervisor Colman stated that he had had nothing to do with the foregoing recommendation of the Civil Service Commission, but the proposal was before the Board for consideration. He was prepared to vote for payment of the highest prevailing wages paid for like work performed on the outside, whether it would increase or de-

crease the City's payroll. With regard to this proposal, we have come to a situation in which we are asking the City to provide meals, at cost. It opens up a great possible field as to what the City should do, which might run into large amounts of money. If the Civil Service Commission states that the prices reported represent the actual cost of materials, without any overhead charges, it seems that the City is performing its full duty to the employees. He agreed with Supervisor MacPhee that salary standardization should again be studied and that the Board should be told the highest prevailing wage, which is the law under which the City and County is governed. As to this matter, he must be in favor of it. He did not want to injure anyone, but in voting on meal schedules such as these, he was not hurting anybody. There are citizens in San Francisco, regardless of their wages and conditions, who cannot obtain the same food at the same prices.

Thereupon, Supervisor Colman moved, as a substitute motion, that the recommendation of the Civil Service Commission be adopted.

Motion failed for want of a second.

Supervisor Mead observed that the employees of practically every restaurant in California receive their meals free of charge.

Supervisor Colman confirmed that statement, saying that it was in accord with union contracts.

Mr. Henderson reported that no charge was being made for meals for kitchen helpers, cooks, waitresses, etc.

Supervisor Mancuso announced that he would vote for the motion, but not because of the statement that the recommendation was against OPA regulations, or against salary standardization. That was not a true statement of fact. His reason for voting for the motion was that he did not think the Civil Service Commission, or any other department, should arbitrarily set a group of prices as cost, and expect a group of employees to be bound by such prices without having an opportunity of making an investigation on their own behalf. Employees are entitled to such privilege. We now have a one-sided recommendation. The other side has not been given a fair opportunity to present its case.

Supervisor Colman, in closing his arguments, reviewed the status of the Civil Service Commission's recommendation. The position of the Finance Committee, according to Supervisor Mancuso, he stated, was this: The Committee was in favor of the employees paying the cost of the food. The Committee now finds out that the cost of the food has gone up. The Committee should have known that. When the Committee found that out, it changed its position.

However, there is nothing to vote on because the motion to accept the Civil Service Commission's recommendation has failed for want of a second.

Thereupon, the Chair, Supervisor Brown, stated that there was a motion before the Board, that the matter be held in abeyance.

Supervisor MacPhee restated his motion: that the matter be held in abeyance until salary standardization was again considered.

Thereupon, the Chair stated that in his opinion the determining factor would be the practice in private employments; if private employers, hospitals, etc., have not increased the price of meals to their employees, the City should not.

Mr. Hare reported that the price of meals in private hospitals, under signed agreements, has not changed at all. If an employee misses a meal, he is reimbursed.

Thereupon, the roll was called on motion by Supervisor MacPhee, and the motion was *carried* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Brown, Colman, Gartland, Green, MacPhee, Mancuso, Mead, Meyer, Sullivan—9.

Absent: Supervisors Gallagher, Uhl—2.

The Clerk presented and read recommendation of Civil Service Commission, that the classifications Q4 Policewoman and Q20 Juvenile Aid Officer be consolidated in a new class titled Q20 Policewoman and that the employments appearing under index 9, sheet 5, line 27, should read three Q20 Policewomen; and that the employments appearing in index 9, sheet 6, line 18, should read ten Q20 Policewomen.

After explanation of the recommendation by Mr. Henderson, and on motion by Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Meyer, the recommendation was *approved* without objection.

The Clerk presented and read the following communication from the Civil Service Commission.

At the Civil Service Commission meeting held on May 17, 1945, the Civil Service Commission approved all of the employments included in this list with the exception of the following:

- 1 B33 Assistant Department Secretary, Police Department
- 1 B84 Under Sheriff
- 1 D66 Superintendent of Jail
- 1 T72 Chief Juvenile Probation Officer

The reason the Commission does not approve the authorization for an incumbent in class B33 Assistant Department Secretary, Police Department, to work in excess of 40 hours per week is that at one time this position was filled by a Police Officer, but Civil Service records indicate that this position has not been occupied by anyone during his present fiscal year.

The other three positions are administrative and executive and are indicated on the list of such positions in the present salary ordinance, which employments are not allowed any compensation over the regular normal salary schedules adopted in the salary standardization ordinance.

The salary standardization ordinance provides that permission must be received from the Board of Supervisors before these employees are allowed to work in excess of 40 hours a week and the Finance Committee has requested the Civil Service Commission to make recommendations as to the propriety of such authorization. We have checked the payroll records and reports of overtime worked of various departments, and from an analysis of these records it would appear that all of the employments listed above are appropriate with the exception of the following:

T72	Chief Juvenile Probation Officer
B84	Under Sheriff
D66	Superintendent of Jail

These three positions are considered administrative or executive positions and so appear on the list of such positions.

It is therefore recommended that the employments requested to work in excess of 40 hours be forwarded to the Finance Committee of the Board of Supervisors recommending all employments other than the three mentioned above.

Supervisor MacPhee reported that the Finance Committee has approved the foregoing recommendation, except the Chief Probation Officer of the Juvenile Court. Judge Meikle has requested that consideration be given to the Chief Probation Officer for increase of salary. The Civil Service Commission has advised that no increase can be granted for this position. This position is actually on a 7-day basis. It is recognized that the salary range is entirely out of line. This position should be put on a 6-day week basis, but the Civil Service Commission does not agree. The position is different from the ordinary administrative position. The responsibilities have grown as a result of juvenile delinquency activities. If it is impossible that the Civil Service Commission grant a change in classification because of increased duties, the salary should be based on a 48-hour week instead of a 40-hour week. That is bad practice, but because of the circumstances it should be done.

Supervisor Mead held that the position warranted consideration by the Board of Supervisors. He wondered if the Board of Supervisors could not make the necessary change to provide the proper salary without considering a 48-hour week.

The Chair stated that the Board could not increase salaries, but it could extend the hours of work per week.

Supervisor MacPhee believed that the Board did have the right to set the position up on a 48-hour week basis.

Mr. Henderson reported that the Board could fix salaries only under Section 151 of the Charter, or salary standardization. There were a number of situations of the same kind, he stated. The effect of Supervisor MacPhee's proposal would be a 48-hour week, with a 20 per cent increase in the pay. The Chief Probation Officer does not get overtime. Mr. Ososke is an administrative employee and must work the necessary hours to accomplish his duties.

Thereupon, Supervisor MacPhee moved that the classification T72, Chief Probation Officer, be included in the positions which are allowed to work 48 hours per week. Unless the Civil Service Commission so recommends, nothing else can come from such proposal. It will give the Commission the right to reconsider its former action.

Supervisor Colman objected to such action, stating that the Board was going back to a condition that it had not been in for a long time, when the services rendered by one particular employee are discussed by the members of the Board. This would be spot standardization. He did not question Mr. Ososke's services or Judge Meikle's opinion, but this was an attempt to accomplish something indirectly that the Civil Service Commission will not recommend.

The Chair called attention to the fact that there was nothing before the Board in respect to the position of the Chief Probation Officer, since the motion by Supervisor MacPhee had not been seconded.

Mr. Henderson stated that the position in question was included in the ordinance among the positions not paid for work in excess of 40 hours per week. The Commission has been asked to delete it from that list and to include it in another section. The Commission has denied both these requests. If it should be taken out of the administrative section and put in a different section, who would pay the extra money? It is a matter for the Board to decide, and not the Civil Service Commission. The Board does not necessarily have to have the recommendation of the Civil Service Commission. If you set this precedent, there will no doubt be many other similar circumstances presented to you.

Supervisor MacPhee agreed that it would be a very dangerous precedent, but the Board did approve the request of the Chief Administrative Officer with respect to the engineers.

Thereupon, Supervisor MacPhee moved that the classification T72 be listed among those that are permitted to work 48 hours per week. Motion seconded by Supervisor Meyer.

Supervisor Mancuso, in explanation of his vote, stated that in considering the budget, he realized that the Chief Probation Officer was getting a miserable salary, but he could not go along with the motion. He did not believe the Board should attempt to do what it is trying to do in such manner. It will break down the entire administrative procedure. The only way to handle the matter is by salary standardization. He could not vote for the motion because it was absolutely against the principles of the Charter and the salary standardization ordinance.

Supervisor Mead stated that he would agree with Supervisor Mancuso if there were any assurance that there would be a new salary standardization during the coming year.

Supervisor Mead disagreed with the position taken by Supervisor MacPhee. Every department head would like to be excepted by the Board. He would be doing by indirection what could not be done by direction. The Civil Service Commission has considered the question and has rejected it. In the future, the Commission can go into the matter again.

Whereupon, Supervisor MacPhee agreed that the points that were brought out by Supervisors Colman and Mead were proper, but that the remarks made had at least brought the case to light. After further brief statement, with the consent of his second, Supervisor MacPhee withdrew his motion.

Thereupon, Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Colman, moved approval of the amendment as submitted by the Civil Service Commission.

No objection, and amendment approved.

The Clerk presented and read the following communication from the Civil Service Commission:

May 22, 1945.

The Board of Supervisors,
City Hall, San Francisco.

Gentlemen:

At the budget hearing last night employee representatives objected to the provisions of section 1.7 of the annual salary ordinance providing that a normal work week shall consist of tours of duty on each of five consecutive days. The employee representatives requested that this provision be made to apply only on those occupations and employments engaged in seven-day operations. They further requested that the normal work week for occupations and employments engaged in operations that do not run seven days per week be defined as tours of duty on Monday through Friday, inclusive.

We are advised that the granting of this request will involve substantial increases in cost to the Board of Education for janitorial service, and perhaps in other departments. The Board of Education has been providing janitorial service on playgrounds on Saturdays, and it had been their intention to provide for such service on a

staggered work week basis. Employees who are required to work on Saturday to provide this service would be given another day off during the week, but that this day would be consecutive with the other regular day off enjoyed by the employee. The proposed revision would require the payment of time and a half for the Saturday work unless the employment were included in the list of 5½-day or 6-day employments set forth in section 1.8 to section 1.37 inclusive. We suggest that the Board of Supervisors obtain from the Board of Education further information concerning the cost of the revision proposed by the employee representatives.

If, however, you desire to adopt the suggestion of the employee representatives may we suggest that section 1.7 be revised to read as follows:

"A normal work day for employees whose compensations are fixed in the schedule of compensations on a monthly basis shall consist of a tour of duty of 8 hours work completed within 9 hours and a normal work week shall consist of such tours of duty on each of 5 consecutive days for such employees engaged on 7-day operations and of such tours of duty on each Monday through Friday inclusive for such employees not engaged on 7-day operations. The compensations fixed in the schedules of compensations adopted by the Board of Supervisors pursuant to the provisions of section 151 of the charter on a monthly basis are in full payment for services rendered during a calendar month under this normal work schedule. Other than the occupants of the positions specified in sections 1.8 to 1.37 inclusive hereof, or as provided in section 2 hereof, no officer nor employee shall be required to work more than the normal work schedule."

Mr. Henderson explained the list, stating that there were certain new positions established in the budget this year. The rates of pay which were set up for these positions were not the same as the rates subsequently recommended by the Civil Service Commission. There had been no recommendations by the Commission. The Commission has recommended rates of compensation in accordance with those for the nearest comparable employments in the city government. These recommended rates of pay are less than the rates recommended by the appointing officers. The Commission is asking that its recommendation, rather than the recommendation of the appointing officers, be approved. He had understood that objection was raised to the ordinary action of the Board, in directing the Clerk to make proper adjustments.

Supervisor Colman announced that had the Board known it was doing that at the time, it would not have done it.

Supervisor Mead pointed out that a thorough discussion of the matter was had.

Supervisor Colman stated that it was not explained that the rates the Board was approving were higher than those recommended by the Commission.

Supervisor MacPhee stated that the Board, subsequently, authorized that rates be changed to conform with the Civil Service Commission's recommendations.

Supervisor Mead stated that he disagreed with the Civil Service Commission. It was a question whether the Civil Service Commission or the department heads had the right to make recommendations as to salaries. He was rather inclined to go along with the recommendations of the department heads.

Mr. Henderson stated that the Board had received the recommendations from the department heads, but for different rates. The Mayor had recommended one rate for Administrative Technician; the Chief Administrative Officer had recommended a different rate for the same classification.

Mr. David A. Lewis reported that the positions were titled the same. However, the Civil Service Commission had titled position in the office of Chief Administrative Officer as Administrative Technician, whereas the Chief Administrative Officer had recommended the title of Administrative Assistant, with a salary range of \$400 to \$500. The amount requested originally by the Chief Administrative Officer was higher than that requested by the Mayor.

Thereupon, Mr. Henderson stated that the Board was requested to accept the Commission's recommendations.

Thereupon, Supervisor Colman, seconded by Supervisor MacPhee, moved that the recommendations of the Civil Service Commission be approved.

Supervisor Mead suggested that such action would amount to a reduction in salary.

Mr. Lewis reported that the positions in question are new positions, which are set up for the first time in the budget for 1945-1946.

Thereupon, the motion to approve the Civil Service Commission's recommendations was *approved* without objection.

Thereupon, Supervisor MacPhee moved approval of the annual salary ordinance, as amended, and recommended to the Board.

The Clerk announced that the Board should first take up the annual appropriation ordinance.

Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Mancuso, moved approval of the annual appropriation ordinance.

Supervisor Brown, thereupon, stated that the appropriation ordinance, as he understood it, provided the funds for the carrying out of the provisions of the budget. If the funds are not provided in the appropriation ordinance, for any particular portion of the budget, that part of the budget will not be carried out, or will not be effective. During budget hearings there was considerable discussion about certain capital expenditures proposed for the Water Department. Some \$1,600,000 for work was set up in the budget and discussion was had as to how the work should be paid for. He had received the impression that the Water Department was considering an increase in water rates and would thus obtain the funds to do the work. He was informed by such means the taxpayers would not be required to pay for the Water Department improvements out of the tax rate. The total amount to be excluded would be about \$1,000,000, and that amount would have to be borne by the taxpayers unless there were an increase in water rates. Later during the week, after the Board had passed the budget, the members of the Utilities Commission expressed themselves through the press as being opposed to increased water rates.

Supervisor Brown stated he did not believe the Water Department should ask the taxpayers to put up funds for capital improvements out of taxes. That cost should be borne by Water Department Revenues. Thereupon, Supervisor Brown asked Mr. Dion Holm if the Board reduced the appropriation ordinance by an amount of \$1,000,000 in the Water Department budget or appropriation, what the effect would be on the balance of the appropriation ordinance and the budget proceedings. Could the Board do that without imperiling the proceedings?

Mr. Dion Holm, in reply, stated that this was the first time such a situation had come up. He assumed that Supervisor Brown desired to suggest that the Board pass the annual appropriation ordinance with a provision that there would be deleted from the budget an amount of \$1,000,000 or \$1,600,000, for Water Department improvements. His answer was "No." He was assuming, of course, that the budget has been formally adopted. There has to be an end to legislation somewhere along the line. The Board has, by ordinance, set up certain procedure and has decreed that there shall be a definite date to stop considering the budget. The budget, under provisions of ordinance adopted by the Board, must be approved not later than May 21. That has been done, and the Board may not now delete anything from it. That view is confirmed by a decision of the Supreme Court, in case Sullivan vs. McKinley, that: "Once the budget is approved by the Board of Supervisors the fiscal terms of the annual appropriation ordinance and the annual salary ordinance are automatically fixed beyond the power of change by any amendment."

Supervisor MacPhee disagreed with the statement by Mr. Holm. In the case mentioned, he stated, nothing was said that the Board could not fail to appropriate a certain amount of money for major improvements, if it decided in the appropriation ordinance to hold an appropriation up.

Supervisor Brown stated that he did not think it would be wise for the Board of Supervisors to take action against the opinion of the City Attorney's office. It would not be good policy. He, therefore, would not initiate any motion. However, one could point out that

certainly there has been a lot of talk about increases in the water rates. Now, after the Board has approved the budget, it gets a statement from the Utilities Commission that there will not be an increase in water rates. His vote on capital expenditures next year will be predicated entirely on what the Public Utilities Commission does with respect to water rates in the meantime.

Supervisor Colman stated that he believed the appropriation for the Water Department was necessary. However, as he recalled it, the Mayor's budget message contained an intimation that possibly water rates would be restored to their former level. He did not believe that the Utilities Commission had finally denied the request, or that the Commission had closed the door for the consideration of the problem. He believed that the matter was still before the Commission. The Commission was composed of business people, and they feel that every utility should stand squarely on its own feet, and should pay its own way so far as possible. He had no hesitation in voting; the Water Department needs must be taken care of, but whether this year or next, he did not know. If the Board does not make provision now, it will be only adding to the backlog of necessary expenditures.

Supervisor Brown announced that he would await action by the Public Utilities Commission during the next fiscal year. His future action would be determined by what the Public Utilities Commission did.

Mr. Holm stated that he understood that there were specific appropriations made for special projects. That being the case, there would be no action for the Commission to take. What the Board does now, would be final.

Supervisor Green stated that in accordance with the City Attorney's statement, the Board has no right to decrease salaries which have heretofore been approved.

Passage for Second Reading of Annual Appropriation Ordinance.

Thereupon, after further brief discussion, the annual appropriation ordinance, reading as follows, was taken up:

ANNUAL APPROPRIATION ORDINANCE 1945-1946

BILL NO. 3461, ORDINANCE NO. . . . (Series of 1939), as follows:

AN ORDINANCE APPROPRIATING ALL ESTIMATED RECEIPTS AND ALL ESTIMATED EXPENDITURES FOR THE CITY AND COUNTY OF SAN FRANCISCO FOR THE FISCAL YEAR ENDING JUNE 30, 1946.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco, as follows:

Section 1. The several amounts of estimated receipts, income and revenue enumerated herein are hereby appropriated to the several funds and departments indicated in this ordinance for the purpose of meeting appropriations herein provided.

Section 2. The several amounts of proposed expenditure for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1946, are hereby appropriated to the several funds and departments as enumerated herein. Each department for which an expenditure appropriation is herein made is hereby authorized to use, in the manner provided by law, the amounts so appropriated for the purposes specified in this appropriation ordinance.

Section 3. The Controller is hereby authorized and directed to set up appropriate accounts for the items of receipts and expenditures appropriated herein.

Where revenues for any fund or department are herein provided by transfer from any other fund or department, or where a duty or a performance has been transferred from one department to another, the Controller is authorized and directed to make the necessary transfer; provided further, that where revenues for any fund or department are herein provided by transfer from any other fund or department in consideration of departmental services to be rendered, in no event shall such transfer of revenue be made in excess of the actual cost of such service; provided further, that in no event shall transfers from utility surplus exceed the limitations set forth in Section 129 of the Charter.

The Controller shall make available for expenditure the amount of actual receipts for items of proposed expenditures that are designated herein as appropriated for Collection of Rents (Real Estate Department), Tearing Up Streets, Inspection Fees (Engineering), Advertising Fees (Engineering), Camp Mather (Recreation Department), and War Memorial Reserve Fund (in accordance with Ordinance 125, Series of 1939).

In connection with the operation of Camp Mather (Recreation Department) the Controller is authorized to establish an account for depositing revenues which are applicable to the ensuing fiscal year; said revenues shall be carried forward and become a part of the funds available for appropriation in said ensuing fiscal year.

Section 4. The several items of expenditures herein appropriated, being based on estimated receipts, income or revenues which may not be fully realized, it shall be incumbent upon the Controller to establish a schedule of allotments, monthly or quarterly as he may determine, under which the sums appropriated to the several departments shall be expended. The Controller shall revise such revenue estimates monthly. If such revised estimates indicate a shortage the Controller shall hold in reserve an equivalent amount of the corresponding expenditure appropriations set forth herein until the collection of the amounts as originally estimated is assured, and in all cases where it is provided by the Charter that a specified or minimum tax shall be levied for any department the amount of such appropriation herein provided derived from taxes shall not exceed the amount actually produced by the levy made for such department. The Controller in issuing warrants or in certifying contracts or purchase orders or other encumbrances pursuant to Section 86 of the Charter, shall consider only the allotted portions

of appropriation items to be available for encumbrance. In case of emergency or unusual circumstances which could not be anticipated at the time of apportionment, an additional allotment for a period may be made on the recommendation of the department head and that of the Chief Administrative Officer, board or commission, and the approval of the Controller. After the allotment schedule has been established or fixed, as heretofore provided, it shall be unlawful for any department or officer to expend or cause to be expended a sum greater than the amount set forth for the particular activity in the said allotment schedule so established, unless an additional allotment is made, as herein provided.

Allotments, liabilities incurred and expenditures made under expenditure appropriations herein enumerated shall in no case exceed the amount of each such appropriation, unless the same shall have been increased by supplemental appropriations made in the manner provided by Sections 79 and 80 of the Charter, or by transfer as provided by Sections 77 and 90 of the Charter. The Controller is hereby authorized to establish reserves for the purpose of providing funds for adjustments in connection with the liquidation of encumbrances.

Section 5. Where appropriations are made for specific projects or purposes which may involve the payment of salaries or wages, the head of the department to which such appropriations are made, or the head of a department authorized by contract or interdepartmental order to make expenditures from each such appropriation, shall file with the Controller, when requested, an estimate of the amount of any such expenditures to be made during the ensuing period.

Section 6. The Controller is hereby authorized and directed to prescribe the method to be used in making payments for interdepartmental services in accordance with the provisions of Section 77 of the Charter, and to provide for the establishment of interdepartmental reserves which may be required to pay for future obligations which result from current performances. Whenever, in the judgment of the Controller, the amounts which have been set aside for such purposes are no longer required or are in excess of the amount which is then currently estimated to be required, the Controller shall transfer the unrequired amount to the unappropriated balance of the particular fund of which the reserve is a part. Provided further that no expenditure shall be made for outlay purposes from any interdepartmental reserve without specific appropriation by the Board of Supervisors.

Section 7. Appointing officers shall not make appointments to any office or position until the Controller shall certify that funds are available.

Appointments to seasonable or temporary positions shall not exceed the term for which the Controller has certified the availability of funds.

The Controller shall be immediately notified of a vacancy occurring in any position.

Employees shall not be permitted to work overtime unless funds are available to pay for such overtime at the rates established or unless an actual emergency exists as provided by law.

Section 8. Surpluses existing in appropriations herein made for personal services shall be transferred by the Controller to a "Compensation Reserve" in the fund of which the appropriation is a part.

Each "Compensation Reserve" is appropriated for the following purposes:

For adjusting the provision for the compensation of an officer or a position wherein the amount provided for such compensation is not sufficient to pay the officer or employee returning to such office or position from military or war leave the compensation said officer or employee is legally entitled to receive.

For providing the compensation for an officer or a position wherein provision has not been otherwise made to pay an officer or employee returning from military or war leave to a regularly established office or posi-

tion the compensation said officer or employee is legally entitled to receive.

For adjusting the provision for the compensation of an office or a position wherein the amount provided for such compensation is not sufficient to pay the officer or employee the compensation said officer or employee is legally entitled to receive.

Such amounts as may be required to carry out the above provision shall be transferred by the Controller to the related appropriations upon the request of the department head concerned and that of the Chief Administrative Officer, board or commission for departments under their respective jurisdiction.

Each such request shall require the prior approval of the Secretary of the Civil Service Commission.

No such transfer shall be made from one fund to another.

Surpluses existing in "Compensation Reserve" may also be used for the making of appropriation for other compensation requirements in the manner provided by Charter.

Section 9. Under the provisions of Section 35½ of the Charter, salary warrants for extra time served by members of the Police Department shall be payable from the regular salary appropriation of the Police Department for the prevailing fiscal year or from any appropriation made for such purpose at no time shall extra compensation be authorized or paid in amounts exceeding the available unencumbered balance in any such appropriation.

Section 10. The Controller is hereby authorized and directed to continue the existing Special and Trust Funds, Revolving Funds, and Reserves and the receipts in and expenditures from each such fund are hereby appropriated in accordance with law and the conditions under which each such fund was established.

The Controller is hereby authorized and directed to set up additional Special and Trust Funds and Reserves, as they may be created by either additional bequests or under other conditions.

Whenever the City and County of San Francisco shall receive for a special purpose from the United States of America, the State of California, or from any public or semi-public agency, or from any private person, firm or corporation, any moneys, or property to be converted into money, the Controller shall set up on the books of his office a special fund or account evidencing the said moneys so received and specifying the special purposes for which they have been received and for which they are held, which said account or fund shall be maintained by the said Controller as long as any portion of said moneys or property remains.

Each Department of the City and County of San Francisco, which in the normal operations under its powers and duties is by law and upon deposit of moneys by persons, firms, or corporations authorized to perform certain services for and at the cost and expense of said persons, firms, or corporations, is hereby authorized to perform similar services for the United States of America, the State of California, or any division or agency of either, upon receipt of a legal and proper order or contract to pay to the City and County of San Francisco the full cost and expense of performing the required services upon completion thereof. City owned public utilities may with the approval of the Controller perform such services for privately owned public utilities in the manner provided in this paragraph.

The expenditures necessary from said funds or said accounts as created herein, in order to carry out the purpose for which said moneys or orders have been received or for which said accounts are being maintained, shall be approved by the Controller and said expenditures are hereby appropriated in accordance with the terms and conditions under which said moneys or orders have been received by the City and County of San Francisco, and in accordance with the conditions under which said funds are maintained.

omces and funds shall be construed only as estimates of such requirements. The Controller shall, upon the determination of the actual requirement, return to the Emergency Reserve Fund that portion of the appropriation which is not actually required for the stated emergency.

Prior to the close of the fiscal year the Controller shall transfer to Emergency Reserve Fund from any available balance in the appropriations of any department, office or fund the amount such department, office or fund has received as an appropriation from the Emergency Reserve Fund or as much thereof as is available for transfer.

Section 13. The term "department" as used in this ordinance shall mean department, bureau, office, utility, board or commission, as the case may be. The term "department head" as used herein shall be as defined in Section 20 of the Charter.

Section 14. The several amounts of estimated receipts herein appropriated, and each fund or department to which such appropriation is made, are as follows:

Passage for Second Reading of Annual Salary Ordinance.

Whereupon, the annual salary ordinance, as amended, and reading as follows, was taken up:

ANNUAL SALARY ORDINANCE

Fiscal Year Ending June 30, 1946

Bill No. 3510, Ordinance No. . . . (Series of 1939), as follows:

An ordinance enumerating all positions continued and/or created by the Board of Supervisors in adopting the Annual Budget and Appropriation Ordinance for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1946; continuing, and/or creating and/or establishing these positions; enumerating and including therein all positions established under the San Francisco Unified School District and all positions created by Charter or State law for which compensations are paid from City and County funds and appropriated in the Annual Appropriation Ordinance; authorizing appointments or continuation of appointments thereto; specifying and fixing the compensations and work schedules thereof; and authorizing appointments to temporary positions and fixing compensations therefor.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco, as follows:

Section 1. Establishment and/or Creation and/or Continuation of Positions: In accordance with the provisions of Section 73 of the Charter, the positions hereinafter enumerated under the respective departments are hereby created and/or established and/or continued for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1946. Positions created or authorized by Charter or State law and positions established under the San Francisco Unified School District compensations for which are paid from City and County funds and appropriated in the Annual Appropriation Ordinance are enumerated and included herein.

The word "position" or "positions" as used in this ordinance shall be construed to include "office" or "offices" and the word "employee" or "employees" shall be construed to include "officer" or "officers."

Section 1.1. Appointments and Vacancies—Permanent Positions: Appointing officers as specified in the Charter are hereby authorized, subject to the provisions of this ordinance, to make or continue appointments as needed during the fiscal year to permanent positions enumerated in their respective sections of this ordinance. Such appointments shall be made in accordance with the civil service provisions of the Charter. The Civil Service Commission shall be notified immediately of any change in the duties of a position herein established or of a vacancy occurring in a position herein enumerated. Appointing officers shall not make an appointment to a vacancy in a permanent position until the Mayor shall approve the requisition for such service. The requisition for such service shall be filed with the Civil Service Commission and if the proposed employment and compensation are legally authorized as herein provided, the secretary of the commission shall so certify and shall promptly transmit the requisition to the Controller and if funds are available for the compensation of the proposed employment he shall so certify and shall promptly transmit the requisition to the Mayor for his approval.

Section 1.2. Appointments—Temporary Positions: Temporary appointments to positions defined by the rules of the Civil Service Commission as seasonal or temporary positions may be made by the respective appointing officers in excess of the number of permanent positions herein established or enumerated and such other temporary services as required at rates not in excess of salary standardization schedules if funds have been appropriated and are available for such

temporary service. Such appointments shall be made in accordance with the civil service provisions of the Charter. No appointment to such temporary or seasonal position shall be made until the Mayor shall approve the requisition for such service. The requisition for filling such a position shall first be filed with the Civil Service Commission and if the proposed employment and the compensation are legally authorized as herein provided, the secretary of the commission shall so certify and shall promptly transmit the requisition to the Controller and if the funds are available for the compensation of the proposed employment, he shall so certify and shall promptly transmit the requisition to the Mayor for his approval. No such appointment shall continue beyond the period for which the Controller has certified the availability of funds.

Section 1.3 Compensation at Entrance to Municipal Service: Any employee entering the municipal service in any position, the compensation for which is subject to the salary standardization provisions of the Charter as set forth in Section 151 therein, shall be paid the entrance rate fixed for the classification in the schedules of compensation adopted by the Board of Supervisors pursuant to the provisions of Section 151 of the Charter to which the position occupied by the employee is allocated, or, if no schedule of compensation has been adopted by the Board of Supervisors for such classification the person appointed to such position shall, pending adoption of a schedule of compensation for such class of positions by the Board of Supervisors, receive the entrance salary or wage proposed by the Civil Service Commission for such classification; provided that where an existing position in the municipal service has heretofore been exempt from the salary standardization provisions of the Charter and becomes subject thereto, or where a new position becomes subject to salary standardization provisions of the Charter by reason of the acquisition of a public utility, the employee holding such position shall, for the purpose of determining the salary or wage to which such employee is entitled under the schedules of compensations, be credited with prior service had in such position immediately prior to such change in the status of the position provided that there was no interruption in the service of the employee at the time of such change in the status of the position.

Section 1.4. Compensation Adjustments: Compensations of all employees under permanent appointment whose compensations are subject to salary standardization provisions of the Charter shall be adjusted on July 1, 1945, to the amount that such employees are entitled to receive under the schedules of compensation adopted by the Board of Supervisors pursuant to the provisions of Section 151 of the Charter in accordance with their years of service as therein provided and calculated as set forth in Section 1.3 hereof, and shall thereafter be in accord therewith, subject, however, to the provisions of Sections 1.3 and 1.5 hereof. For the purpose of determining the salary or wage to which former employees of the Market Street Railway are entitled under the schedules of compensation and this ordinance, continuous service with the said Market Street Railway immediately prior to September 29, 1944, shall be credited and considered in the same manner as service with the City and County, provided that such prior service was in the same position in which the employee is engaged in the City and County service, and provided that there was no interruption in the service of the employee when the City and County acquired control of the Market Street Railway properties.

Salary adjustments based on years of service as provided in the schedules of compensation shall be effective and due on the first of the month following the anniversary of the date of permanent appointment of the employee to his current position, subject to the provisions of Sections 1.3 and 1.5 hereof, provided that platform men employed in the Municipal Railway shall receive salary adjustments during the fiscal year in accordance with their service as provided

in the schedules of compensation, such service to be calculated as provided in Section 1.3 hereof. No employee shall receive a salary adjustment as herein provided unless he shall have actually rendered service in his position for the major portion of the year preceding the anniversary of his appointment on which the increment otherwise accrues, provided that absence of an employee on approved military leave or the absence of an employee from his regular civil service position by reason of holding a promotive position in the City and County service shall not be deemed absence from service for the purpose of computing salary adjustments, and periods of such absence shall be credited in the same manner as actual service rendered.

Section 1.5. Compensation Upon Promotion or Transfer or Re-employment: An employee appointed to a position in a promotive classification who received in his former position a salary equal to or more than the entrance salary provided under the salary standardization schedules for such promotive classification shall enter such promotive classification at that salary fixed for such promotive class in the schedules of compensation which is immediately in excess of the salary which the employee received prior to his appointment to such promotive classification, provided that such employee shall receive no further increments until such time as his service in the promotive classification shall entitle him to further increase as provided in Section 1.4 hereof, and provided further, that an employee appointed during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1945, to a position in a promotive classification who received in his former position a salary equal to or more than the entrance salary provided under the salary standardization schedules for such promotive classification, shall receive, commencing July 1, 1945, that salary fixed for such promotive class in the schedule of compensation which is immediately in excess of the salary which the employee received prior to his appointment to such promotive classification, provided that such employee shall receive no further increments until such time as his service in the promotive classification shall entitle him to further increase as provided in Section 1.4 hereof.

An employee transferred in accordance with Civil Service Commission rules from one department to another, but in the same classification, shall transfer at his current salary, provided, that if the current salary is in excess of the maximum fixed in the salary standardization schedules for the classification to which he is appointed, he shall be reduced to such maximum.

An employee who has acquired permanent status in a position and who is laid off because of lack of work or funds and is re-employed in the same position after such lay off shall be paid a salary or wage which shall include credits for actual service in such position from date of permanent appointment in the position to date of lay off therefrom.

Section 1.6. Compensation for Intermittent or Temporary Service: Employees in positions for which compensations are fixed in the schedules of compensation adopted by the Board of Supervisors pursuant to the provisions of Section 151 of the Charter on a monthly basis whose regular work schedule is eight hours per day but less than five days per week, and all temporary employees whose compensations are fixed in the said schedules of compensation on a monthly basis, shall be paid for each day of work a daily wage derived by dividing the monthly compensation by the factor 20.75 days.

Section 1.7. Normal Work Schedule for Employees Whose Compensations Are Fixed on a Monthly Basis: A normal work day for employees whose compensations are fixed in the schedule of compensations on a monthly basis shall consist of a tour of duty of eight hours work completed within nine hours and a normal work week shall consist of such tours of duty on each of five consecutive days a week. Provided, however, that in departments that do not have

normal seven-day operation, normal work week shall consist of such tours of duty on each Monday through Friday, inclusive. The compensations fixed in the schedules of compensations adopted by the Board of Supervisors pursuant to the provisions of Section 151 of the Charter on a monthly basis are in full payment for services rendered during a calendar month under this normal work schedule. Other than the occupants of the positions specified in Sections 1.8 to 1.37, inclusive hereof, or as provided in Section 2 hereof, no officer nor employee shall be required to work more than the normal work schedule.

Section 1.8. Exceptions to Normal Work Schedule for Which Extra Compensation Is Not Authorized: In order that there shall be no diminution of service to the public it shall be the duty of the head of each department to arrange and assign the work of his department so that sufficient employees will be on duty on Saturday morning in each department which is required to be open on Saturday morning for the conduct of public business, provided that time worked on Saturday morning by employees on a normal work week schedule shall be compensated by equal time off in the same or succeeding week, provided also that employees whose positions are allocated to the classes included in Division R—Recreation Service, and employees whose positions are allocated in Division X—Library Service, may at the discretion of the appointing officer work the 40-hour schedule within six days without additional compensation or time off, and provided further that occupants of the following positions shall work such hours as may be necessary for the full and proper performance of their duties and shall receive no additional compensation for work in excess of eight hours per day for five days per week but, subject to rule of the Civil Service Commission, may be granted time off not to exceed the time worked in excess of forty hours per week:

Section 1.9. Exceptions to Normal Work Schedules (44 or 48-Hour Work Week for Specified Employments) for Which Compensation Is Authorized and Provision Therefor: Appointing officers may require occupants of the positions specified in Sections 1.10 to 1.35 hereof, inclusive, to regularly work a tour of duty on six days of the week, which tours of duty shall be eight hours per day for each of five days and may be four or eight hours on the sixth day as set forth in said sections. Occupants of such positions who regularly work tours of duty of four hours on the sixth day as specified therein shall be compensated for such four hours of work on the 6th day of the week at straight time, that is, 10 per cent of the compensation of the employee for the normal work schedule. Occupants of such positions who regularly work tours of duty of eight hours six days per week shall be compensated for such sixth day of work at straight time, that is, twenty per cent of the compensation for a normal work schedule. Exceptions to the normal work schedule as provided in this section shall not be authorized by appointing officers unless funds for the compensation thereof are provided.

Section 1.38. Exceptions to Normal Work Schedule—Part Time Services: Except as provided in Sections 1.8 and 2.1 hereof a tour of duty of less than eight hours' work a day for employees whose compensation is fixed on a monthly basis shall be considered part-time employment, and compensation therefor shall be fixed herein at a rate based upon the full time rate for the classification, proportionate to the hours worked, with due regard to seniority of service, provided that these provisions shall not apply to physicians employed in their professional capacity on a call basis or on a regular consultant basis. Positions occupied by part-time employees other than those on night shifts having a tour of duty of seven and one-half hours, shall be recorded as such by a department head, only with the approval of the Civil Service Commission and, when so recorded shall be noted as part-time on payrolls, budget estimates, salary ordinance and similar documents.

Section 2. Emergency Overtime and Compensation Therefor: It is the policy of the City and County to establish a five-day 40-hour week work schedule for its employees insofar as feasible, as set forth in Section 1.7 hereof. Whenever circumstances or exigencies of the service demand, appointing officers, subject to the provisions of this section, may require employees to work longer than eight hours per day or longer than the normal work schedules established under Section 1.7 hereof or longer than the exceptions authorized under Sections 1.8 to 1.37 hereof. Any time worked under proper authorization of the appointing officer by an employee, exclusive of part-time employees, whose compensations are subject to the provisions of Section 151 of the Charter and fixed in the schedules of compensation on a monthly basis in excess of the regular work schedule of employees as fixed in the said sections or as authorized under Section 1.8 hereof shall be designated as emergency overtime and shall be compensated at one and one-half times the rate of compensation fixed herein for the normal work schedule, provided that compensation for such emergency overtime shall be based on a maximum compensation of \$250 per month for the normal work schedule, and provided further, that no compensation as provided in this section for emergency overtime shall be paid for the purpose of keeping City or County or City and County offices and departments open on Saturday morning.

Appointing officers shall not authorize or permit employees to work emergency overtime as provided in this section unless funds are available for paying the compensations of employees performing such emergency overtime work, or unless an actual emergency exists as defined by law. When so authorized by the appointing officer the emergency overtime worked shall be recorded separately on time-rolls opposite the name of the employee and the facts and circumstances warranting or requiring the overtime work shall be clearly set forth thereon. The Civil Service Commission shall submit to the Board of Supervisors a monthly report showing the amount of extra compensation paid to employees for emergency overtime work each month under the provisions of this section

No employee shall be paid for emergency overtime worked as herein provided unless the duties performed by him during such overtime work are included in the classification in which the employee is regularly and legally serving, provided that when work in a department has to be completed within time limitation fixed by law, and the Civil Service Commission determines that no unemployed person or persons in the classification involved are available to perform the work and approves the assignment of employees of a different classification in that department or from other departments to perform the work under the provisions of Section 141 of the Charter, said employees may be compensated for such emergency overtime at rates of pay for their regular civil service classification.

Compensation for emergency overtime worked as provided in this

section shall be paid on an hourly basis. The Civil Service Commission shall cause a schedule of hourly rates to be established for the purpose of computing hourly rates of pay, and this schedule shall be in accordance with the provisions of Section 151 of the Charter and shall be the basis of computing compensation for emergency overtime worked.

If and when the Civil Service Commission determines that overtime payments in a department are excessive and finds that the required work can be performed to better advantage and more economically than through overtime work, the Civil Service Commission shall so report to the Board of Supervisors in order that the Board of Supervisors may consider the advisability of establishing additional employments in such departments or take such other action as may be deemed advisable.

Compensations fixed in the schedules of compensation on a per diem basis and converted and included herein on a monthly basis shall be subject to the provisions of this section.

Section 2.01. Overtime Payment for Members of Police and Fire Departments and Compensations Therefor: Under the provision of Section 35.5½ of the Charter, salary warrants for extra time served by members of the Police Department shall be payable from the regular salary appropriation of the Police Department or from any appropriation made for such purpose, and at no time shall extra compensation be authorized or paid in amounts exceeding the available unencumbered balance in any such appropriation.

Under the provisions of Section 36.1 of the Charter, salary warrants for extra time served by officers and members of the uniformed force of the Fire Department shall be payable from the regular appropriation of said uniformed force, and at no time shall extra compensation be authorized or paid in amounts exceeding the available unencumbered balance in said appropriation.

Section 2.1. Night Shift Work and Extra Compensation Therefor: A night shift is a tour of duty of 7½ hours work completed within 8½ hours or 8 hours work completed within 9 hours, which tour of duty commences after 2 p. m. and prior to 6 a. m. Employees whose compensations are fixed herein on a monthly basis who are regularly required to work a night shift of 7½ hours shall be paid the same amount of compensation as for 8 hours work on a normal day schedule and employees regularly required to work a night shift of 8 hours shall be paid 6¼ per cent more than the amount to which they are otherwise entitled. This provision shall not apply to employees whose compensations are fixed herein on a per diem or hourly basis

Section 2.2. Split Shift Work and Compensation Therefor: A tour of duty of 8 hours work completed within 11 hours but extended over more than 9 hours shall be considered a split shift. There shall be only one split in any shift. Employees required to work a split shift shall be paid 50 cents per day above the compensation to which they are otherwise entitled. This provision shall not apply to employees whose compensations are fixed herein on a per diem or hourly basis.

Section 2.3. Work Performed Under Contract and Compensation Therefor: In the execution and performance of any contract awarded to a city department under the provisions of Sections 95 and 98 of the Charter the rates fixed herein shall not apply to employments engaged therein and in lieu thereof not less than the highest general prevailing rate of wages in private employment for similar work, as fixed by a resolution of the Board of Supervisors and in effect at the time of the award of said contract, shall be paid to employees performing work under such contract.

Section 2.4. Holidays for Employees Whose Compensations Are Fixed on a Monthly Basis, and Compensation Therefor: Except when

normal operations require or in an emergency, employees, other than members of the uniformed forces of the Police and Fire Departments, whose compensations are fixed on a monthly basis in the schedules of compensations adopted by the Board of Supervisors pursuant to the provisions of Section 151 of the Charter shall not be required to work on the following days hereby declared to be holidays for such employees: January 1, February 12, February 22, May 30, July 4, September 9, October 12, November 11, December 25, but in the event one of these days falls on Sunday, the Monday following shall be observed as a holiday; the first Monday of September (Labor Day); any day appointed by the President of the United States or the Governor of California as Thanksgiving Day; and any day on which an election is held throughout the State; provided that the Board of Education may, for its own employees, substitute for the holidays declared above an equal number of different holidays. Such employees required by their respective appointing officers to work on any of the above specified holidays, or employees of the Board of Education required to work on those specified by the Board of Education, shall be paid extra compensation in the amount of a day's pay for the time worked, computed as provided in Section 2.5 hereof, provided further that occupants of positions enumerated in Section 1.8 hereof (administrative and executive positions) who are required by appointing officers to work on such holidays shall not receive extra compensation, but may be granted time off equivalent to the time worked. Compensations fixed in the schedules of compensation on a per diem basis and converted and included herein on a monthly basis shall not be subject to the provisions of this section but such employees shall be entitled to the six holidays specified in Section 2.6 hereof, and when required by their respective appointing officers to work on the holidays specified in Section 2.6, they shall be paid extra compensation in the amount of a day's pay for the time worked

Section 2.5. Method of Conversion of Rate of Pay From Per Diem Basis to Monthly Basis or Monthly to Per Diem and Application Thereof: In converting compensation schedules established in the schedules of compensation adopted by the Board of Supervisors pursuant to the provisions of Section 151 of the Charter on a per diem basis for inclusion in the annual salary ordinance as a monthly rate, the conversion shall be made by using the factor 21.25 days for a 5-day week work schedule; 23.4 for a 5½-day week work schedule; and 25.6 for a 6-day week work schedule, all of which factors include allowance for the six holidays listed in Section 2.6 hereof. In converting compensation schedules established in the schedules of compensation as a monthly rate to a per diem rate, the conversion shall be made by using the factor 20.75 days for a 5-day work schedule which factor includes allowance for the twelve holidays listed in Section 2.4 hereof. In calculating conversions from per diem to monthly salary rates, figures shall be rounded to the next highest half dollar. The Civil Service Commission shall establish schedules of such conversion rates as the basis of payment when converted rates are required.

Section 2.6. Overtime—Per Diem Employees: The wages specified on a per diem basis in the schedules of compensation adopted by the Board of Supervisors pursuant to the provisions of Section 151 of the Charter for the respective employments included herein are for eight hours' work per day, between the hours of 8:00 a. m. and 5:00 p. m., on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday. For purposes of this ordinance, the said work schedule shall be considered as regular work time.

Any time worked by employees engaged in the operations and occupations named in this section on Saturday and Sunday, or on New Year's Day, Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Thanksgiving Day and Christmas Day shall be considered as work on

holidays and such holiday work shall be compensated at double the rate herein provided for regular work time, subject, however, to the restrictions and provisions of this section. Any time worked by such employees after 12 o'clock midnight and before 8:00 o'clock a. m. prior to the days mentioned above shall be compensated at double the rate herein fixed, subject to the restrictions of this section.

Overtime for the employees engaged in the operations or occupations named herein shall be any time worked in excess of eight hours per day, or any time worked before 8:00 a. m. and after 5:00 p. m. on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday.

Overtime work for employees engaged in the operations or occupations set forth in this section whose compensation is fixed in this ordinance on a per diem basis shall be compensated as set forth in this section for such overtime, subject to the provisions of this section.

Operations and Occupations

Asphalt and related street repair crafts as determined by the civil service classification of positions and Laborers and Cribbers and Trackman.

Bricklayers, Hodcarriers, Stone Masons, Granite Cutters, Tile Setters, Plasterers, Cement Finishers, Steam Fitters, Machinists, Electrical Workers, Lathers, Engineers of Hoisting Engines and Compressor Operators and related crafts as determined by the civil service classification of positions.

Marble trades and related crafts as determined by the civil service classification of positions.

Carpenters and related crafts as determined by the civil service classification of positions.

Glaziers and related crafts as determined by the civil service classification of positions.

Painters and related crafts as determined by the civil service classification of positions

Basis for Computing Compensation for Overtime as Herein Defined.

One and one-half times the rate herein for regular time for the first four hours of overtime and twice the rate fixed herein for regular time thereafter, except that the rate for overtime between 6:00 a. m. and 8:00 a. m. shall be twice the rate fixed herein for regular time.

Twice the rate fixed herein for regular time.

One and one-half times the rates fixed herein for regular time for the first four hours of overtime and twice the rate fixed herein for regular time thereafter.

One and one-half times the rate fixed herein for regular time for the first four hours of overtime and twice the rate fixed herein for regular time thereafter.

One and one-half times the rate fixed herein for regular time for the first two hours of overtime and twice the rate fixed herein for regular time thereafter.

One and one-half times the rate fixed herein for regular time.

Basis for Computing Compensation for Overtime as Herein Defined

Operations and Occupations

Plumbers and Gas Fitters and related crafts as determined by the civil service classification of positions and employees engaged in pipe-caulking and installing meters and water services.

Twice the rate fixed herein for regular time.

Sheet Metal Workers and related crafts as determined by civil service classification of positions.

One and one-half times the rate fixed herein for regular time for the first four hours of overtime and twice the rate fixed herein for regular time thereafter.

Chauffeurs, Truck Drivers and related crafts as determined by the civil service classification of positions.

One and one-half times the rate fixed herein for regular time after 8 hours.

Boiler Makers and related crafts as determined by the civil service classification of positions.

One and one-half times the rate fixed herein for regular time after 8 hours

Sewer Cleaners

One and one-half times the rate fixed herein for regular time for the first four hours of overtime and twice the rate fixed herein for regular time thereafter, except that the rate for overtime between 6:00 a. m. and 8:00 a. m. shall be twice the rate fixed herein for regular time; and provided that when the ebb and flow of the tides in San Francisco Bay shall interfere with the work of cleaning, maintaining and repairing sewers to the extent that employees engaged therein cannot render service or perform work for more than four hours per day, the said four hours shall be considered and compensated as a full day's work, unless, immediately following such work, such employees are assigned to other duties within their classification.

The provisions of this section are subject to the following conditions and restrictions:

(a) Where night shifts are recognized and where operations as presently constituted and now carried on regularly and continuously require a tour of duty by employees of any of the crafts named in this section commencing after 5 p. m. and before 8:00 a. m. on Monday to Friday, inclusive, such employees shall be compensated therefor at straight time except if such employees presently receive premium pay for such work, in which event they shall continue to receive the premium pay they now receive;

(b) Where operations as presently constituted require tours of

duty on Saturday or Sunday, and the occupants of positions engaged in such operations have heretofore been paid straight time for work on Saturday and Sunday, such employees shall hereafter be paid time and one-half for such Saturday and Sunday work;

(c) Employees engaged in crafts which are not enumerated in this section shall be compensated at time and one-half the regular rate of pay for work in excess of eight hours per day;

(d) Compensations and work schedules of platform employees and bus operators at the Municipal Railway and compensation fixed in the salary ordinance on a monthly basis, shall not be subject to the provisions of this section.

Section 2.7. Per Diem—Miscellaneous: In accordance with established working conditions for theatrical stage employees, working schedules on holidays and Sundays shall be compensated for at the same rate as for week days, provided permanent employees in classes A165 Stage Carpenter and E109 Stage Electrician who are required to work a performance on a Sunday shall be allowed a day off during the week.

Employees in Classes A165 Stage Carpenter, A170 Stage Property Man, and E109 Stage Electrician, shall be paid time and one-half when required to work over eight hours per day.

Employees in Class C109 Stage Hand employed on a performance basis as provided in the salary standardization ordinance shall be paid overtime over four hours at the following rates: Between the hours of 8:00 a. m. and 5:00 p. m., \$1.75 per hour; and between the hours of 5:00 p. m. and 8:00 a. m., \$2.25 per hour.

Appointing officers shall not authorize or permit employees to work emergency overtime as provided in Sections 2.6 and 2.7 hereof unless funds are available for paying the compensations of employees performing such emergency overtime work, or unless an actual emergency exists as defined by law. When so authorized by the appointing officer the emergency overtime worked shall be recorded separately on time-rolls opposite the name of the employee and the facts and circumstances warranting or requiring the overtime work shall be clearly set forth thereon. The Civil Service Commission shall submit to the Board of Supervisors a monthly report showing the amount of extra compensation paid to employees for emergency overtime work each month under the provisions of this section.

If and when the Civil Service Commission determines that overtime payments in a department are excessive and finds that the required work can be performed to better advantage and more economically than through overtime work, the Civil Service Commission shall so report to the Board of Supervisors in order that the Board of Supervisors may consider the advisability of establishing additional employments in such departments or take such other action as may be deemed advisable.

Section 2.8 Charges and Deduction for Maintenance: The compensations fixed herein for all employees whose compensations are subject to the provisions of Section 151 of the Charter, and including also those engaged in construction work outside the City and County of San Francisco are gross compensations and include the valuation of maintenance provided such employees. Charges and deductions therefor for any and all maintenance furnished and accepted by employees shall be made and indicated on time rolls and payrolls in accordance with the following schedule of charges fixed by the Civil Service Commission for such maintenance. Provided, however, that no charge shall be made for meals furnished cooks, bakers, waiters, waitresses, and other kitchen workers:

Section 2.9. Compensation Reserves: Surpluses existing in appropriations made for personal services shall be transferred by the Controller to a "Compensation Reserve" in the fund of which the appropriation is a part.

Each "Compensation Reserve" is appropriated for the following purposes:

For adjusting the provision for the compensation of an office or a position wherein the amount provided for such compensation is not sufficient to pay the officer or employee returning to such office or position from military or war leave the compensation said officer or employee is legally entitled to receive.

For providing the compensation for an office or a position wherein provision has not been otherwise made to pay an officer or employee returning from military or war leave to a regularly established office or position the compensation said officer or employee is legally entitled to receive.

For adjusting the provision for the compensation of an office or a position wherein the amount provided for such compensation is not sufficient to pay said officer or employee the compensation said officer or employee is legally entitled to receive.

Such amounts as may be required to carry out the above provision shall be transferred by the Controller to the related appropriation upon the request of the department head concerned and that of the Chief Administrative Officer, board or commission for departments under their respective jurisdiction.

Each such request shall require the prior approval of the secretary of the Civil Service Commission.

No such transfer shall be made from one fund to another.

Surpluses existing in "Compensation Reserve" may also be used for the making of appropriation for other compensation requirements in the manner provided by Charter.

Section 2.10. Explanation of Symbols: The following symbols used in connection with the rates fixed herein have the significance and meaning indicated:

- (a) Protected rate based on same number of hours worked in 1943-44.
- (b) Salary fixed by Charter.
- (c) Salary fixed by State law.
- (d) Salary paid by City and County (balance paid by State)

- (i) Daily rate converted to monthly rate calculated on 6-day, 48-hour week.
- (j) Monthly rate converted to daily rate.
- (k) Salary based on Disability Transfer.
- (l) No funds provided.
- (m) Daily rate based on type of services provided by salary standardization ordinance.
- (n) Payroll symbol—Normal 5-day week, 40 hours.
- (p) Payroll symbol—Premium rate.
- (s) Payroll symbol—6-day week, 48 hours, plus 20 per cent.

The Board of Supervisors met in recessed session, pursuant to motion by Supervisor MacPhee, made in meeting of May 28, 1945, to read for the second time, and finally pass the annual appropriation ordinance and the annual salary ordinance for the fiscal year 1945-1946.

CALLING THE ROLL.

The roll was called and the following Supervisors were noted present:

Supervisors Brown, Colman, Gallagher, Gartland, Green, MacPhee, Mancuso, Mead—8.

Absent: Supervisors Meyer, Sullivan, Uhl—3.

Quorum present.

President Dan Gallagher presiding.

Finally Passed.

Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Colman, moved final passage of the annual appropriation ordinance.

Following brief statement by Mr. Dion Holm, Assistant City Attorney, in reply to questioning by Supervisors Gallagher and Green, that neither the annual appropriation ordinance nor the annual salary ordinance could be amended at this time, assuming, of course, they were in conformity with what had been provided in the budget.

Annual Appropriation Ordinance, Fiscal Year 1945-1946.

Thereupon, the following was taken up:

ANNUAL APPROPRIATION ORDINANCE 1945-1946

BILL NO. 3461, ORDINANCE NO. 3292 (Series of 1939), as follows:

AN ORDINANCE APPROPRIATING ALL ESTIMATED RECEIPTS AND ALL ESTIMATED EXPENDITURES FOR THE CITY AND COUNTY OF SAN FRANCISCO FOR THE FISCAL YEAR ENDING JUNE 30, 1946.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco, as follows:

Section 1. The several amounts of estimated receipts, income and revenue enumerated herein are hereby appropriated to the several funds and departments indicated in this ordinance for the purpose of meeting appropriations herein provided.

Section 2. The several amounts of proposed expenditure for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1946, are hereby appropriated to the several funds and departments as enumerated herein. Each department for which an expenditure appropriation is herein made is hereby authorized to use, in the manner provided by law, the amounts so appropriated for the purposes specified in this appropriation ordinance.

Section 3. The Controller is hereby authorized and directed to set up appropriate accounts for the items of receipts and expenditures appropriated herein.

Where revenues for any fund or department are herein provided by transfer from any other fund or department, or where a duty or a performance has been transferred from one department to another, the Controller is authorized and directed to make the necessary transfer; provided further, that where revenues for any fund or department are herein provided by transfer from any other fund or department in consideration of departmental services to be rendered, in no event shall such transfer of revenue be made in excess of the actual cost of such service; provided further, that in no event shall transfers from utility surplus exceed the limitations set forth in Section 129 of the Charter.

The Controller shall make available for expenditure the amount of actual receipts for items of proposed expenditures that are designated herein as appropriated for Collection of Rents (Real Estate Department), Tearing Up Streets, Inspection Fees (Engineering), Advertising Fees (Engineering), Camp Mather (Recreation Department), and War Memorial Reserve Fund (in accordance with Ordinance 125, Series of 1939).

In connection with the operation of Camp Mather (Recreation Department) the Controller is authorized to establish an account for depositing revenues which are applicable to the ensuing fiscal year; said revenues shall be carried forward and become a part of the funds available for appropriation in said ensuing fiscal year.

Section 4. The several items of expenditures herein appropriated, being based on estimated receipts, income or revenues which may not be fully realized, it shall be incumbent upon the Controller to establish a schedule of allotments, monthly or quarterly as he may determine, under which the sums appropriated to the several departments shall be expended. The Controller shall revise such revenue estimates monthly. If such revised estimates indicate a shortage the Controller shall hold in reserve an equivalent amount of the corresponding expenditure appropriations set forth herein until the collection of the amounts as originally estimated is assured, and in all cases where it is provided by the Charter that a specified or minimum tax shall be levied for any department the amount of such appropriation herein provided derived from taxes shall not exceed the amount actually produced by the levy made for such department. The Controller in issuing warrants or in certifying contracts or purchase orders or other encumbrances pursuant to Section 86 of the Charter, shall consider only the allotted portions

any allotment in excess of the amount of such allotment. In case of emergency or unusual circumstances which could not be anticipated at the time of apportionment, an additional allotment for a period may be made on the recommendation of the department head and that of the Chief Administrative Officer, board or commission, and the approval of the Controller. After the allotment schedule has been established or fixed, as heretofore provided, it shall be unlawful for any department or officer to expend or cause to be expended a sum greater than the amount set forth for the particular activity in the said allotment schedule so established, unless an additional allotment is made, as herein provided.

Allotments, liabilities incurred and expenditures made under expenditure appropriations herein enumerated shall in no case exceed the amount of each such appropriation, unless the same shall have been increased by supplemental appropriations made in the manner provided by Sections 79 and 80 of the Charter, or by transfer as provided by Sections 77 and 90 of the Charter. The Controller is hereby authorized to establish reserves for the purpose of providing funds for adjustments in connection with the liquidation of encumbrances.

Section 5. Where appropriations are made for specific projects or purposes which may involve the payment of salaries or wages, the head of the department to which such appropriations are made, or the head of a department authorized by contract or interdepartmental order to make expenditures from each such appropriation, shall file with the Controller, when requested, an estimate of the amount of any such expenditures to be made during the ensuing period.

Section 6. The Controller is hereby authorized and directed to prescribe the method to be used in making payments for interdepartmental services in accordance with the provisions of Section 77 of the Charter, and to provide for the establishment of interdepartmental reserves which may be required to pay for future obligations which result from current performances. Whenever, in the judgment of the Controller, the amounts which have been set aside for such purposes are no longer required or are in excess of the amount which is then currently estimated to be required, the Controller shall transfer the unrequired amount to the unappropriated balance of the particular fund of which the reserve is a part. Provided further that no expenditure shall be made for outlay purposes from any interdepartmental reserve without specific appropriation by the Board of Supervisors.

Section 7. Appointing officers shall not make appointments to any office or position until the Controller shall certify that funds are available.

Appointments to seasonable or temporary positions shall not exceed the term for which the Controller has certified the availability of funds.

The Controller shall be immediately notified of a vacancy occurring in any position.

Employees shall not be permitted to work overtime unless funds are available to pay for such overtime at the rates established or unless an actual emergency exists as provided by law.

Section 8. Surpluses existing in appropriations herein made for personal services shall be transferred by the Controller to a "Compensation Reserve" in the fund of which the appropriation is a part.

Each "Compensation Reserve" is appropriated for the following purposes:

For adjusting the provision for the compensation of an office or a position wherein the amount provided for such compensation is not sufficient to pay the officer or employee returning to such office or position from military or war leave the compensation said officer or employee is legally entitled to receive.

For providing the compensation for an office or a position wherein provision has not been otherwise made to pay an officer or employee returning from military or war leave to a regularly established office or posi-

tion the compensation said officer or employee is legally entitled to receive. For adjusting the provision for the compensation of an office or a position wherein the amount provided for such compensation is not sufficient to pay the officer or employee the compensation said officer or employee is legally entitled to receive.

Such amounts as may be required to carry out the above provision shall be transferred by the Controller to the related appropriations upon the request of the department head concerned and that of the Chief Administrative Officer, board or commission for departments under their respective jurisdiction.

Each such request shall require the prior approval of the Secretary of the Civil Service Commission.

No such transfer shall be made from one fund to another.

Surpluses existing in "Compensation Reserve" may also be used for the making of appropriation for other compensation requirements in the manner provided by Charter.

Section 9. Under the provisions of Section 35½ of the Charter, salary warrants for extra time served by members of the Police Department shall be payable from the regular salary appropriation of the Police Department for the prevailing fiscal year or from any appropriation made for such purpose, and at no time shall extra compensation be authorized or paid in amounts exceeding the available unencumbered balance in any such appropriation.

Section 10. The Controller is hereby authorized and directed to continue the existing Special and Trust Funds, Revolving Funds, and Reserves and the receipts in and expenditures from each such fund are hereby appropriated in accordance with law and the conditions under which each such fund was established.

The Controller is hereby authorized and directed to set up additional Special and Trust Funds and Reserves, as they may be created by either additional bequests or under other conditions.

Whenever the City and County of San Francisco shall receive for a special purpose from the United States of America, the State of California, or from any public or semi-public agency, or from any private person, firm or corporation, any moneys, or property to be converted into money, the Controller shall set up on the books of his office a special fund or account evidencing the said moneys so received and specifying the special purposes for which they have been received and for which they are held, which said account or fund shall be maintained by the said Controller as long as any portion of said moneys or property remains.

Each Department of the City and County of San Francisco, which in the normal operations under its powers and duties is by law and upon deposit of moneys by persons, firms, or corporations authorized to perform certain services for and at the cost and expense of said persons, firms, or corporations, is hereby authorized to perform similar services for the United States of America, the State of California, or any division or agency of either, upon receipt of a legal and proper order or contract to pay to the City and County of San Francisco the full cost and expense of performing the required services upon completion thereof. City owned public utilities may with the approval of the Controller perform such services for privately owned public utilities in the manner provided in this paragraph.

The expenditures necessary from said funds or said accounts as created herein, in order to carry out the purpose for which said moneys or orders have been received or for which said accounts are being maintained, shall be approved by the Controller and said expenditures are hereby appropriated in accordance with the terms and conditions under which said moneys or orders have been received by the City and County of San Francisco, and in accordance with the conditions under which said funds are maintained.

Section 12. Moneys which are appropriated during the fiscal year from the Emergency Reserve Fund to departments, offices and funds shall be construed only as estimates of such requirements. The Controller shall, upon the determination of the actual requirement, return to the Emergency Reserve Fund that portion of the appropriation which is not actually required for the stated emergency.

Prior to the close of the fiscal year the Controller shall transfer to Emergency Reserve Fund from any available balance in the appropriations of any department, office or fund the amount such department, office or fund has received as an appropriation from the Emergency Reserve Fund or as much thereof as is available for transfer.

Section 13. The term "department" as used in this ordinance shall mean department, bureau, office, utility, board or commission, as the case may be. The term "department head" as used herein shall be as defined in Section 20 of the Charter.

Section 14. The several amounts of estimated receipts herein appropriated, and each fund or department to which such appropriation is made, are as follows:

Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Colman, moved final passage of the annual salary ordinance.

Annual Salary Ordinance, Fiscal Year 1945-1946.

Thereupon, the following was taken up:

ANNUAL SALARY ORDINANCE

Fiscal Year Ending June 30, 1946

Bill No. 3510, Ordinance No. 3313 (Series of 1939), as follows:

An ordinance enumerating all positions continued and/or created by the Board of Supervisors in adopting the Annual Budget and Appropriation Ordinance for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1946; continuing, and/or creating and/or establishing these positions; enumerating and including therein all positions established under the San Francisco Unified School District and all positions created by Charter or State law for which compensations are paid from City and County funds and appropriated in the Annual Appropriation Ordinance; authorizing appointments or continuation of appointments thereto; specifying and fixing the compensations and work schedules thereof; and authorizing appointments to temporary positions and fixing compensations therefor.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco, as follows:

Section 1. Establishment and/or Creation and/or Continuation of Positions: In accordance with the provisions of Section 73 of the Charter, the positions hereinafter enumerated under the respective departments are hereby created and/or established and/or continued for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1946. Positions created or authorized by Charter or State law and positions established under the San Francisco Unified School District compensations for which are paid from City and County funds and appropriated in the Annual Appropriation Ordinance are enumerated and included herein.

The word "position" or "positions" as used in this ordinance shall be construed to include "office" or "offices" and the word "employee" or "employees" shall be construed to include "officer" or "officers."

Section 1.1. Appointments and Vacancies—Permanent Positions: Appointing officers as specified in the Charter are hereby authorized, subject to the provisions of this ordinance, to make or continue appointments as needed during the fiscal year to permanent positions enumerated in their respective sections of this ordinance. Such appointments shall be made in accordance with the civil service provisions of the Charter. The Civil Service Commission shall be notified immediately of any change in the duties of a position herein established or of a vacancy occurring in a position herein enumerated. Appointing officers shall not make an appointment to a vacancy in a permanent position until the Mayor shall approve the requisition for such service. The requisition for such service shall be filed with the Civil Service Commission and if the proposed employment and compensation are legally authorized as herein provided, the secretary of the commission shall so certify and shall promptly transmit the requisition to the Controller and if funds are available for the compensation of the proposed employment he shall so certify and shall promptly transmit the requisition to the Mayor for his approval.

Section 1.2. Appointments—Temporary Positions: Temporary appointments to positions defined by the rules of the Civil Service Commission as seasonal or temporary positions may be made by the respective appointing officers in excess of the number of permanent positions herein established or enumerated and such other temporary services as required at rates not in excess of salary standardization schedules if funds have been appropriated and are available for such

temporary service. Such appointments shall be made in accordance with the civil service provisions of the Charter. No appointment to such temporary or seasonal position shall be made until the Mayor shall approve the requisition for such service. The requisition for filling such a position shall first be filed with the Civil Service Commission and if the proposed employment and the compensation are legally authorized as herein provided, the secretary of the commission shall so certify and shall promptly transmit the requisition to the Controller and if the funds are available for the compensation of the proposed employment, he shall so certify and shall promptly transmit the requisition to the Mayor for his approval. No such appointment shall continue beyond the period for which the Controller has certified the availability of funds.

Section 1.3 Compensation at Entrance to Municipal Service: Any employee entering the municipal service in any position, the compensation for which is subject to the salary standardization provisions of the Charter as set forth in Section 151 therein, shall be paid the entrance rate fixed for the classification in the schedules of compensation adopted by the Board of Supervisors pursuant to the provisions of Section 151 of the Charter to which the position occupied by the employee is allocated, or, if no schedule of compensation has been adopted by the Board of Supervisors for such classification the person appointed to such position shall, pending adoption of a schedule of compensation for such class of positions by the Board of Supervisors, receive the entrance salary or wage proposed by the Civil Service Commission for such classification; provided that where an existing position in the municipal service has heretofore been exempt from the salary standardization provisions of the Charter and becomes subject thereto, or where a new position becomes subject to salary standardization provisions of the Charter by reason of the acquisition of a public utility, the employee holding such position shall, for the purpose of determining the salary or wage to which such employee is entitled under the schedules of compensations, be credited with prior service had in such position immediately prior to such change in the status of the position provided that there was no interruption in the service of the employee at the time of such change in the status of the position.

Section 1.4. Compensation Adjustments: Compensations of all employees under permanent appointment whose compensations are subject to salary standardization provisions of the Charter shall be adjusted on July 1, 1945, to the amount that such employees are entitled to receive under the schedules of compensation adopted by the Board of Supervisors pursuant to the provisions of Section 151 of the Charter in accordance with their years of service as therein provided and calculated as set forth in Section 1.3 hereof, and shall thereafter be in accord therewith, subject, however, to the provisions of Sections 1.3 and 1.5 hereof. For the purpose of determining the salary or wage to which former employees of the Market Street Railway are entitled under the schedules of compensation and this ordinance, continuous service with the said Market Street Railway immediately prior to September 29, 1944, shall be credited and considered in the same manner as service with the City and County, provided that such prior service was in the same position in which the employee is engaged in the City and County service, and provided that there was no interruption in the service of the employee when the City and County acquired control of the Market Street Railway properties.

Salary adjustments based on years of service as provided in the schedules of compensation shall be effective and due on the first of the month following the anniversary of the date of permanent appointment of the employee to his current position, subject to the provisions of Sections 1.3 and 1.5 hereof, provided that platform men employed in the Municipal Railway shall receive salary adjustments during the fiscal year in accordance with their service as provided

in the schedules of compensation, such service to be calculated as provided in Section 1.3 hereof. No employee shall receive a salary adjustment as herein provided unless he shall have actually rendered service in his position for the major portion of the year preceding the anniversary of his appointment on which the increment otherwise accrues, provided that absence of an employee on approved military leave or the absence of an employee from his regular civil service position by reason of holding a promotive position in the City and County service shall not be deemed absence from service for the purpose of computing salary adjustments, and periods of such absence shall be credited in the same manner as actual service rendered.

Section 1.5. Compensation Upon Promotion or Transfer or Re-employment: An employee appointed to a position in a promotive classification who received in his former position a salary equal to or more than the entrance salary provided under the salary standardization schedules for such promotive classification shall enter such promotive classification at that salary fixed for such promotive class in the schedules of compensation which is immediately in excess of the salary which the employee received prior to his appointment to such promotive classification, provided that such employee shall receive no further increments until such time as his service in the promotive classification shall entitle him to further increase as provided in Section 1.4 hereof, and provided further, that an employee appointed during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1945, to a position in a promotive classification who received in his former position a salary equal to or more than the entrance salary provided under the salary standardization schedules for such promotive classification, shall receive, commencing July 1, 1945, that salary fixed for such promotive class in the schedule of compensation which is immediately in excess of the salary which the employee received prior to his appointment to such promotive classification, provided that such employee shall receive no further increments until such time as his service in the promotive classification shall entitle him to further increase as provided in Section 1.4 hereof.

An employee transferred in accordance with Civil Service Commission rules from one department to another, but in the same classification, shall transfer at his current salary, provided, that if the current salary is in excess of the maximum fixed in the salary standardization schedules for the classification to which he is appointed, he shall be reduced to such maximum.

An employee who has acquired permanent status in a position and who is laid off because of lack of work or funds and is re-employed in the same position after such lay off shall be paid a salary or wage which shall include credits for actual service in such position from date of permanent appointment in the position to date of lay off therefrom.

Section 1.6. Compensation for Intermittent or Temporary Service: Employees in positions for which compensations are fixed in the schedules of compensation adopted by the Board of Supervisors pursuant to the provisions of Section 151 of the Charter on a monthly basis whose regular work schedule is eight hours per day but less than five days per week, and all temporary employees whose compensations are fixed in the said schedules of compensation on a monthly basis, shall be paid for each day of work a daily wage derived by dividing the monthly compensation by the factor 20.75 days.

Section 1.7. Normal Work Schedule for Employees Whose Compensations Are Fixed on a Monthly Basis: A normal work day for employees whose compensations are fixed in the schedule of compensations on a monthly basis shall consist of a tour of duty of eight hours work completed within nine hours and a normal work week shall consist of such tours of duty on each of five consecutive days a week. Provided, however, that in departments that do not have

normal seven-day operation, normal work week shall consist of such tours of duty on each Monday through Friday, inclusive. The compensations fixed in the schedules of compensations adopted by the Board of Supervisors pursuant to the provisions of Section 151 of the Charter on a monthly basis are in full payment for services rendered during a calendar month under this normal work schedule. Other than the occupants of the positions specified in Sections 1.8 to 1.37, inclusive hereof, or as provided in Section 2 hereof, no officer nor employee shall be required to work more than the normal work schedule.

Section 1.8. Exceptions to Normal Work Schedule for Which Extra Compensation Is Not Authorized: In order that there shall be no diminution of service to the public it shall be the duty of the head of each department to arrange and assign the work of his department so that sufficient employees will be on duty on Saturday morning in each department which is required to be open on Saturday morning for the conduct of public business, provided that time worked on Saturday morning by employees on a normal work week schedule shall be compensated by equal time off in the same or succeeding week, provided also that employees whose positions are allocated to the classes included in Division R—Recreation Service, and employees whose positions are allocated in Division X—Library Service, may at the discretion of the appointing officer work the 40-hour schedule within six days without additional compensation or time off, and provided further that occupants of the following positions shall work such hours as may be necessary for the full and proper performance of their duties and shall receive no additional compensation for work in excess of eight hours per day for five days per week but, subject to rule of the Civil Service Commission, may be granted time off not to exceed the time worked in excess of forty hours per week:

Section 1.9. Exceptions to Normal Work Schedules (44 or 48-Hour Work Week for Specified Employments) for Which Compensation Is Authorized and Provision Therefor: Appointing officers may require occupants of the positions specified in Sections 1.10 to 1.35 hereof, inclusive, to regularly work a tour of duty on six days of the week, which tours of duty shall be eight hours per day for each of five days and may be four or eight hours on the sixth day as set forth in said sections. Occupants of such positions who regularly work tours of duty of four hours on the sixth day as specified therein shall be compensated for such four hours of work on the 6th day of the week at straight time, that is, 10 per cent of the compensation of the employee for the normal work schedule. Occupants of such positions who regularly work tours of duty of eight hours on the sixth day as specified therein shall be compensated for such sixth day of work at

straight time, that is, 20 per cent of the compensation for a normal work schedule. Exceptions to the normal work schedule as provided in this section shall not be authorized by appointing officers unless funds for the compensation thereof are provided.

Section 1.36. At the discretion of the respective appointing officers, employees of the following offices may be required to work a four or eight-hour tour of duty on Saturday and such Saturday work shall be compensated as provided in Section 1.9 hereof:

In the office of the Assessor, during the months of March, April, May and June; in the office of the Registrar of Voters, one month beginning three weeks before the close of registration prior to each election; and in the office of the Tax Collector, November 1st to December 20th, March 1st to May 15th, and during the month of August, and the staff of the License Bureau and cashiers in the Tax Collector's office during the months of July and January. Exceptions to the normal work schedule as provided in this section shall not be authorized by appointing officers unless funds for the compensation thereof are provided.

Section 1.37. **Exceptions to Normal Work Schedules (48 Hour Work Week for Specified Classifications) for Which Extra Compensation Is Authorized and Provision Therefor:** Appointing officers may require all occupants of positions allocated to the classifications specified in this section to work tours of duty of eight hours on six days of the week, or a total work week of 48 hours. Occupants of such positions who regularly work tours of duty of eight hours six days per week shall be compensated for such sixth day of work at straight time, that is, twenty per cent of the compensation for a normal work schedule. Exceptions to the normal work schedule as provided in this section shall not be authorized by appointing officers unless funds for the compensation thereof are provided.

Section 1.38. Exceptions to Normal Work Schedule—Part Time Services: Except as provided in Sections 1.8 and 2.1 hereof a tour of duty of less than eight hours' work a day for employees whose compensation is fixed on a monthly basis shall be considered part-time employment, and compensation therefor shall be fixed herein at a rate based upon the full time rate for the classification, proportionate to the hours worked, with due regard to seniority of service, provided that these provisions shall not apply to physicians employed in their professional capacity on a call basis or on a regular consultant basis. Positions occupied by part-time employees other than those on night shifts having a tour of duty of seven and one-half hours, shall be recorded as such by a department head, only with the approval of the Civil Service Commission and, when so recorded shall be noted as part-time on payrolls, budget estimates, salary ordinance and similar documents.

Section 2. Emergency Overtime and Compensation Therefor: It is the policy of the City and County to establish a five-day 40-hour week work schedule for its employees insofar as feasible, as set forth in Section 1.7 hereof. Whenever circumstances or exigencies of the service demand, appointing officers, subject to the provisions of this section, may require employees to work longer than eight hours per day or longer than the normal work schedules established under Section 1.7 hereof or longer than the exceptions authorized under Sections 1.8 to 1.37 hereof. Any time worked under proper authorization of the appointing officer by an employee, exclusive of part-time employees, whose compensations are subject to the provisions of Section 151 of the Charter and fixed in the schedules of compensation on a monthly basis in excess of the regular work schedule of employees as fixed in the said sections or as authorized under Section 1.8 hereof shall be designated as emergency overtime and shall be compensated at one and one-half times the rate of compensation fixed herein for the normal work schedule, provided that compensation for such emergency overtime shall be based on a maximum compensation of \$250 per month for the normal work schedule, and provided further, that no compensation as provided in this section for emergency overtime shall be paid for the purpose of keeping City or County or City and County offices and departments open on Saturday morning.

Appointing officers shall not authorize or permit employees to work emergency overtime as provided in this section unless funds are available for paying the compensations of employees performing such emergency overtime work, or unless an actual emergency exists as defined by law. When so authorized by the appointing officer the emergency overtime worked shall be recorded separately on time-rolls opposite the name of the employee and the facts and circumstances warranting or requiring the overtime work shall be clearly set forth thereon. The Civil Service Commission shall submit to the Board of Supervisors a monthly report showing the amount of extra compensation paid to employees for emergency overtime work each month under the provisions of this section.

No employee shall be paid for emergency overtime worked as herein provided unless the duties performed by him during such overtime work are included in the classification in which the employee is regularly and legally serving, provided that when work in a department has to be completed within time limitation fixed by law, and the Civil Service Commission determines that no unemployed person or persons in the classification involved are available to perform the work and approves the assignment of employees of a different classification in that department or from other departments to perform the work under the provisions of Section 141 of the Charter, said employees may be compensated for such emergency overtime at rates of pay for their regular civil service classification.

Compensation for emergency overtime worked as provided in this

section shall be paid on an hourly basis. The Civil Service Commission shall cause a schedule of hourly rates to be established for the purpose of computing hourly rates of pay, and this schedule shall be in accordance with the provisions of Section 151 of the Charter and shall be the basis of computing compensation for emergency overtime worked.

If and when the Civil Service Commission determines that overtime payments in a department are excessive and finds that the required work can be performed to better advantage and more economically than through overtime work, the Civil Service Commission shall so report to the Board of Supervisors in order that the Board of Supervisors may consider the advisability of establishing additional employments in such departments or take such other action as may be deemed advisable.

Compensations fixed in the schedules of compensation on a per diem basis and converted and included herein on a monthly basis shall be subject to the provisions of this section.

Section 2.01. Overtime Payment for Members of Police and Fire Departments and Compensations Therefor: Under the provision of Section 35.5½ of the Charter, salary warrants for extra time served by members of the Police Department shall be payable from the regular salary appropriation of the Police Department or from any appropriation made for such purpose, and at no time shall extra compensation be authorized or paid in amounts exceeding the available unencumbered balance in any such appropriation.

Under the provisions of Section 36.1 of the Charter, salary warrants for extra time served by officers and members of the uniformed force of the Fire Department shall be payable from the regular appropriation of said uniformed force, and at no time shall extra compensation be authorized or paid in amounts exceeding the available unencumbered balance in said appropriation.

Section 2.1. Night Shift Work and Extra Compensation Therefor: A night shift is a tour of duty of 7½ hours work completed within 8½ hours or 8 hours work completed within 9 hours, which tour of duty commences after 2 p. m. and prior to 6 a. m. Employees whose compensations are fixed herein on a monthly basis who are regularly required to work a night shift of 7½ hours shall be paid the same amount of compensation as for 8 hours work on a normal day schedule and employees regularly required to work a night shift of 8 hours shall be paid 6¼ per cent more than the amount to which they are otherwise entitled. This provision shall not apply to employees whose compensations are fixed herein on a per diem or hourly basis

Section 2.2. Split Shift Work and Compensation Therefor: A tour of duty of 8 hours work completed within 11 hours but extended over more than 9 hours shall be considered a split shift. There shall be only one split in any shift. Employees required to work a split shift shall be paid 50 cents per day above the compensation to which they are otherwise entitled. This provision shall not apply to employees whose compensations are fixed herein on a per diem or hourly basis.

Section 2.3. Work Performed Under Contract and Compensation Therefor: In the execution and performance of any contract awarded to a city department under the provisions of Sections 95 and 98 of the Charter the rates fixed herein shall not apply to employments engaged therein and in lieu thereof not less than the highest general prevailing rate of wages in private employment for similar work, as fixed by a resolution of the Board of Supervisors and in effect at the time of the award of said contract, shall be paid to employees performing work under such contract.

Section 2.4. Holidays for Employees Whose Compensations Are Fixed on a Monthly Basis, and Compensation Therefor: Except when

normal operations require or in an emergency, employees, other than members of the uniformed forces of the Police and Fire Departments, whose compensations are fixed on a monthly basis in the schedules of compensations adopted by the Board of Supervisors pursuant to the provisions of Section 151 of the Charter shall not be required to work on the following days hereby declared to be holidays for such employees: January 1, February 12, February 22, May 30, July 4, September 9, October 12, November 11, December 25, but in the event one of these days falls on Sunday, the Monday following shall be observed as a holiday; the first Monday of September (Labor Day); any day appointed by the President of the United States or the Governor of California as Thanksgiving Day; and any day on which an election is held throughout the State; provided that the Board of Education may, for its own employees, substitute for the holidays declared above an equal number of different holidays. Such employees required by their respective appointing officers to work on any of the above specified holidays, or employees of the Board of Education required to work on those specified by the Board of Education, shall be paid extra compensation in the amount of a day's pay for the time worked, computed as provided in Section 2.5 hereof, provided further that occupants of positions enumerated in Section 1.8 hereof (administrative and executive positions) who are required by appointing officers to work on such holidays shall not receive extra compensation, but may be granted time off equivalent to the time worked. Compensations fixed in the schedules of compensation on a per diem basis and converted and included herein on a monthly basis shall not be subject to the provisions of this section but such employees shall be entitled to the six holidays specified in Section 2.6 hereof, and when required by their respective appointing officers to work on the holidays specified in Section 2.6, they shall be paid extra compensation in the amount of a day's pay for the time worked

Section 2.5. Method of Conversion of Rate of Pay From Per Diem Basis to Monthly Basis or Monthly to Per Diem and Application Thereof: In converting compensation schedules established in the schedules of compensation adopted by the Board of Supervisors pursuant to the provisions of Section 151 of the Charter on a per diem basis for inclusion in the annual salary ordinance as a monthly rate, the conversion shall be made by using the factor 21.25 days for a 5-day week work schedule; 23.4 for a 5½-day week work schedule; and 25.6 for a 6-day week work schedule, all of which factors include allowance for the six holidays listed in Section 2.6 hereof. In converting compensation schedules established in the schedules of compensation as a monthly rate to a per diem rate, the conversion shall be made by using the factor 20.75 days for a 5-day work schedule which factor includes allowance for the twelve holidays listed in Section 2.4 hereof. In calculating conversions from per diem to monthly salary rates, figures shall be rounded to the next highest half dollar. The Civil Service Commission shall establish schedules of such conversion rates as the basis of payment when converted rates are required.

Section 2.6. Overtime—Per Diem Employees: The wages specified on a per diem basis in the schedules of compensation adopted by the Board of Supervisors pursuant to the provisions of Section 151 of the Charter for the respective employments included herein are for eight hours' work per day, between the hours of 8:00 a. m. and 5:00 p. m., on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday. For purposes of this ordinance, the said work schedule shall be considered as regular work time.

Any time worked by employees engaged in the operations and occupations named in this section on Saturday and Sunday, or on New Year's Day, Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Thanksgiving Day and Christmas Day shall be considered as work on

holidays and such holiday work shall be compensated at double the rate herein provided for regular work time, subject, however, to the restrictions and provisions of this section. Any time worked by such employees after 12 o'clock midnight and before 8:00 o'clock a. m. prior to the days mentioned above shall be compensated at double the rate herein fixed, subject to the restrictions of this section.

Overtime for the employees engaged in the operations or occupations named herein shall be any time worked in excess of eight hours per day, or any time worked before 8:00 a. m. and after 5:00 p. m. on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday.

Overtime work for employees engaged in the operations or occupations set forth in this section whose compensation is fixed in this ordinance on a per diem basis shall be compensated as set forth in this section for such overtime, subject to the provisions of this section.

Operations and Occupations

Asphalt and related street repair crafts as determined by the civil service classification of positions and Laborers and Cribbers and Trackman.

Bricklayers, Hodcarriers, Stone Masons, Granite Cutters, Tile Setters, Plasterers, Cement Finishers, Steam Fitters, Machinists, Electrical Workers, Lathers, Engineers of Hoisting Engines and Compressor Operators and related crafts as determined by the civil service classification of positions.

Marble trades and related crafts as determined by the civil service classification of positions.

Carpenters and related crafts as determined by the civil service classification of positions.

Glaziers and related crafts as determined by the civil service classification of positions.

Painters and related crafts as determined by the civil service classification of positions

Basis for Computing Compensation for Overtime as Herein Defined.

One and one-half times the rate herein for regular time for the first four hours of overtime and twice the rate fixed herein for regular time thereafter, except that the rate for overtime between 6:00 a. m. and 8:00 a. m. shall be twice the rate fixed herein for regular time.

Twice the rate fixed herein for regular time.

One and one-half times the rates fixed herein for regular time for the first four hours of overtime and twice the rate fixed herein for regular time thereafter.

One and one-half times the rate fixed herein for regular time for the first four hours of overtime and twice the rate fixed herein for regular time thereafter.

One and one-half times the rate fixed herein for regular time for the first two hours of overtime and twice the rate fixed herein for regular time thereafter.

One and one-half times the rate fixed herein for regular time.

Basis for Computing Compensation for Overtime as Herein Defined

Operations and Occupations

Plumbers and Gas Fitters and related crafts as determined by the civil service classification of positions and employees engaged in pipe-caulking and installing meters and water services.

Twice the rate fixed herein for regular time.

Sheet Metal Workers and related crafts as determined by civil service classification of positions.

One and one-half times the rate fixed herein for regular time for the first four hours of overtime and twice the rate fixed herein for regular time thereafter.

Chauffeurs, Truck Drivers and related crafts as determined by the civil service classification of positions.

One and one-half times the rate fixed herein for regular time after 8 hours.

Boiler Makers and related crafts as determined by the civil service classification of positions.

One and one-half times the rate fixed herein for regular time after 8 hours

Sewer Cleaners

One and one-half times the rate fixed herein for regular time for the first four hours of overtime and twice the rate fixed herein for regular time thereafter, except that the rate for overtime between 6:00 a. m. and 8:00 a. m. shall be twice the rate fixed herein for regular time; and provided that when the ebb and flow of the tides in San Francisco Bay shall interfere with the work of cleaning, maintaining and repairing sewers to the extent that employees engaged therein cannot render service or perform work for more than four hours per day, the said four hours shall be considered and compensated as a full day's work, unless, immediately following such work, such employees are assigned to other duties within their classification.

The provisions of this section are subject to the following conditions and restrictions:

(a) Where night shifts are recognized and where operations as presently constituted and now carried on regularly and continuously require a tour of duty by employees of any of the crafts named in this section commencing after 5 p. m. and before 8:00 a. m. on Monday to Friday, inclusive, such employees shall be compensated therefor at straight time except if such employees presently receive premium pay for such work, in which event they shall continue to receive the premium pay they now receive;

(b) Where operations as presently constituted require tours of

duty on Saturday or Sunday, and the occupants of positions engaged in such operations have heretofore been paid straight time for work on Saturday and Sunday, such employees shall hereafter be paid time and one-half for such Saturday and Sunday work;

(c) Employees engaged in crafts which are not enumerated in this section shall be compensated at time and one-half the regular rate of pay for work in excess of eight hours per day;

(d) Compensations and work schedules of platform employees and bus operators at the Municipal Railway and compensation fixed in the salary ordinance on a monthly basis, shall not be subject to the provisions of this section.

Section 2.7. Per Diem—Miscellaneous: In accordance with established working conditions for theatrical stage employees, working schedules on holidays and Sundays shall be compensated for at the same rate as for week days, provided permanent employees in classes A165 Stage Carpenter and E109 Stage Electrician who are required to work a performance on a Sunday shall be allowed a day off during the week.

Employees in Classes A165 Stage Carpenter, A170 Stage Property Man, and E109 Stage Electrician, shall be paid time and one-half when required to work over eight hours per day.

Employees in Class C109 Stage Hand employed on a performance basis as provided in the salary standardization ordinance shall be paid overtime over four hours at the following rates: Between the hours of 8:00 a. m. and 5:00 p. m., \$1.75 per hour; and between the hours of 5:00 p. m. and 8:00 a. m., \$2.25 per hour.

Appointing officers shall not authorize or permit employees to work emergency overtime as provided in Sections 2.6 and 2.7 hereof unless funds are available for paying the compensations of employees performing such emergency overtime work, or unless an actual emergency exists as defined by law. When so authorized by the appointing officer the emergency overtime worked shall be recorded separately on time-rolls opposite the name of the employee and the facts and circumstances warranting or requiring the overtime work shall be clearly set forth thereon. The Civil Service Commission shall submit to the Board of Supervisors a monthly report showing the amount of extra compensation paid to employees for emergency overtime work each month under the provisions of this section.

If and when the Civil Service Commission determines that overtime payments in a department are excessive and finds that the required work can be performed to better advantage and more economically than through overtime work, the Civil Service Commission shall so report to the Board of Supervisors in order that the Board of Supervisors may consider the advisability of establishing additional employments in such departments or take such other action as may be deemed advisable.

Section 2.8 Charges and Deduction for Maintenance: The compensations fixed herein for all employees whose compensations are subject to the provisions of Section 151 of the Charter, and including also those engaged in construction work outside the City and County of San Francisco are gross compensations and include the valuation of maintenance provided such employees. Charges and deductions therefor for any and all maintenance furnished and accepted by employees shall be made and indicated on time rolls and payrolls in accordance with the following schedule of charges fixed by the Civil Service Commission for such maintenance. Provided, however, that no charge shall be made for meals furnished cooks, bakers, waiters, waitresses, and other kitchen workers:

Section 2.9. Compensation Reserves: Surpluses existing in appropriations made for personal services shall be transferred by the Controller to a "Compensation Reserve" in the fund of which the appropriation is a part.

Each "Compensation Reserve" is appropriated for the following purposes:

For adjusting the provision for the compensation of an office or a position wherein the amount provided for such compensation is not sufficient to pay the officer or employee returning to such office or position from military or war leave the compensation said officer or employee is legally entitled to receive.

For providing the compensation for an office or a position wherein provision has not been otherwise made to pay an officer or employee returning from military or war leave to a regularly established office or position the compensation said officer or employee is legally entitled to receive.

For adjusting the provision for the compensation of an office or a position wherein the amount provided for such compensation is not sufficient to pay said officer or employee the compensation said officer or employee is legally entitled to receive.

Such amounts as may be required to carry out the above provision shall be transferred by the Controller to the related appropriation upon the request of the department head concerned and that of the Chief Administrative Officer, board or commission for departments under their respective jurisdiction.

Each such request shall require the prior approval of the secretary of the Civil Service Commission.

No such transfer shall be made from one fund to another.

Surpluses existing in "Compensation Reserve" may also be used for the making of appropriation for other compensation requirements in the manner provided by Charter.

Opposing Installation of Ammunition Dump at California City.

Supervisor Brown presented:

Proposal No. 4840, Resolution No. (Series of 1939), as follows:

Whereas, despite considerable opposition, the United States Government has indicated its intention to install an ammunition dump of major proportion at California City situate in close proximity to the populous metropolitan district of San Francisco; and

Whereas, if consummated the plan for establishment of such a dangerous instrumentality in close proximity to the hub of industrial activities and valuable property installations on the Pacific Coast will constitute an unwarranted and unnecessary hazard; and

Whereas, while San Francisco has no desire to impede the war effort in any manner it is confidently asserted that there are other locations available for this purpose where the hazard to life and property would be reduced to a minimum and from which locations operations of such character can be carried on without undue inconvenience; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That this Board of Supervisors does hereby officially

record itself as opposed to the installation of an ammunition dump at California City or at any other place except a location remote from the populous communities of the Pacific Coast; and be it

Further Resolved, That copies of this resolution be sent to that agency of the United States Government having jurisdiction over the proposal for the installation of an ammunition dump at California City; and be it

Further Resolved, That copies of this resolution be sent to Senators Johnson and Downey and to Congressmen Welch and Havenner with the request that they exert their best efforts to the end that the proposal referred to may not be executed.

Supervisor Brown, after explaining the foregoing proposal, moved for suspension of the rules for the purpose of immediate consideration of the foregoing.

Supervisor Colman objected to suspension of the rules.

Thereupon, the Chair *referred the foregoing proposal to the County, State and National Affairs Committee.*

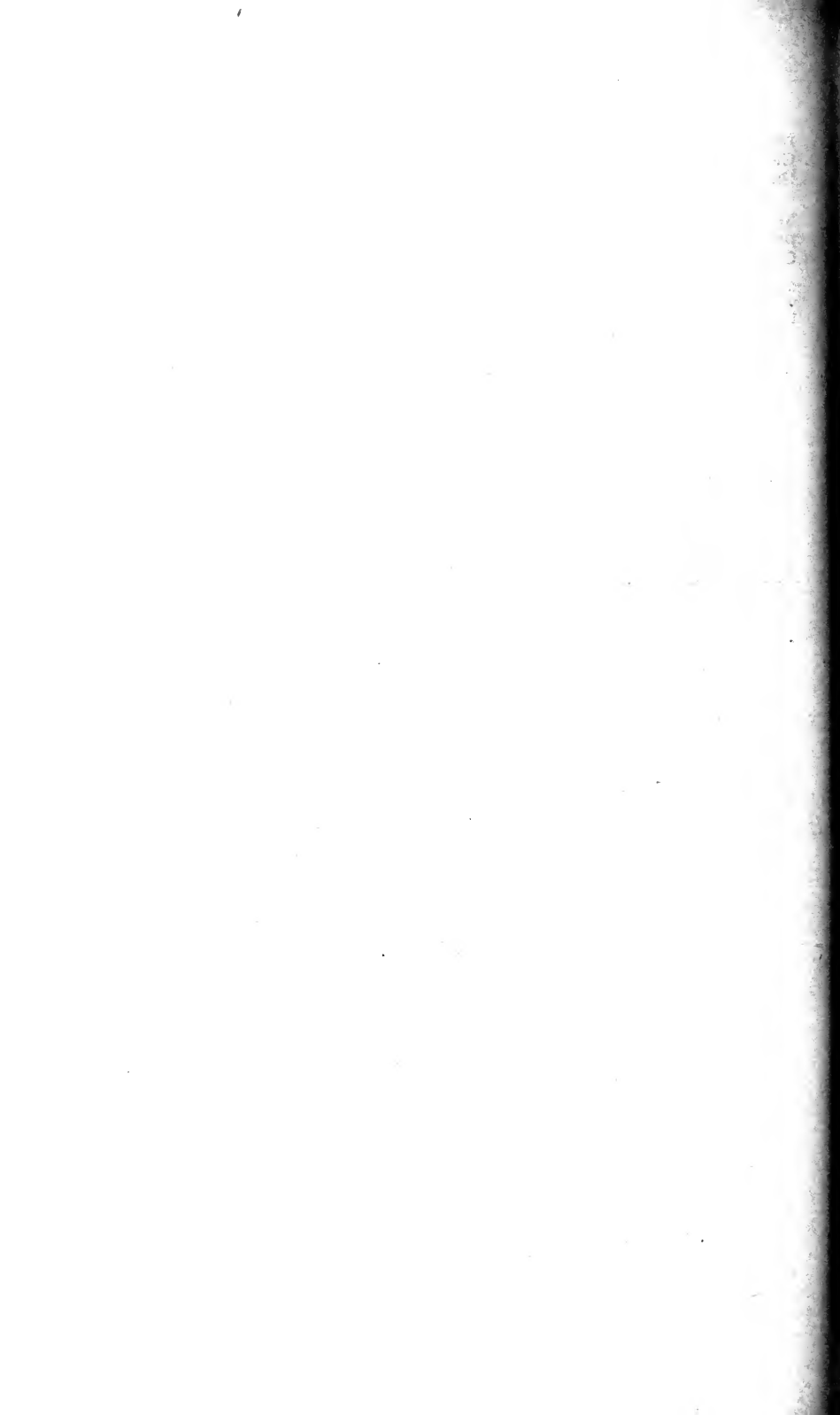

The Board of Supervisors met in regular session.

CALLING THE ROLL.

The roll was called and the following Supervisors were noted present:

Absent: Supervisor Uhl—1.

Quorum present.

President Dan Gallagher presiding.

Supervisor Uhl on leave of absence.

APPROVAL OF JOURNAL.

The Journal of Proceedings of the meeting of April 30, 1945, was considered read and approved.

Communications.

Communications, as follows, were presented, read by the Clerk, and acted on as noted:

From Chief Administrative Officer, copies of communications received in reference to amendment to Farmers' Market ordinance, which permit the pooling of farmers' shipments of surplus crops to the market.

Referred to Commercial and Industrial Development Committee.

From his Honor the Mayor, copy of report on legislative matters for the week ending May 25, 1945.

Referred to County, State and National Affairs Committee.

From his Honor the Mayor, returning Proposal No. 4800, endorsing the purposes of A. B. 3, and giving his reasons therefor.

Referred to County, State and National Affairs Committee.

From Mrs. Una C. Bush, commending the members of the Board who voted for the "Trader Vic" lease.

Filed.

From San Francisco Federation of Municipal Employees, requesting a new salary standardization survey for fiscal year 1946-1947.

Referred to Finance Committee.

From his Honor the Mayor, copy of letter addressed to Barnet Hodes, Corporation Counsel, Law Department, City of Chicago, in reply to Mr. Hodes' request that the Mayor join with the Mayors of other cities in support of Senate Joint Resolution 7, which provides for the establishment of a National Inter-faith Memorial in Washington, D. C.

Referred to County, State and National Affairs Committee.

From his Honor the Mayor, requesting the Board to authorize the Chief Administrative Officer to sign request for \$249,621, the city's share in the widening of Army Street, San Jose Avenue and Guerrero Street.

After brief discussion, and on motion by Supervisor MacPhee, seconded by Supervisor Meyer, the Chief Administrative Officer was authorized to sign request.

From Andrew F. Burke, attorney representing Mrs. Mary Alice Finnigan, protesting against the City Planning Commission's intention to rezone northeasterly corner of Taraval and Thirty-sixth Avenue and northwesterly corner of Thirty-seventh Avenue and Taraval Street, from Second to First Residential District.

Referred to Public Buildings and Lands Committee.

Presentation of Guest.

Supervisor Mead, noting the presence in the chambers of Captain E. J. Spaulding, United States Navy, formerly a Supervisor of the City and County of San Francisco, and moved that the President invite him to a seat on the rostrum.

No objection, and so ordered.

SPECIAL ORDER—2:30 P. M.

Sale of City Lands Not Needed for Governmental Uses.

On motion by Supervisor MacPhee, Public Utilities Commission, or its representative, and Mr. Nelson Eckart, Chief Engineer, San Francisco Water Department, to discuss the sale of unused and unneeded City owned land. Particular reference is made to land in San Mateo County.

Monday, May 21, 1945—Consideration postponed until Monday, May 28, 1945, at 2:30 p. m.

Discussion.

Mr. E. G. Cahill addressed the Board, explaining why he had recommended the sale of certain land referred to in motion by Supervisor MacPhee at \$1,000 per acre. Public Utilities lands whose use is not now needed, or need in the future not contemplated, is offered for sale whenever the price offered is considered right.

Mr. Cahill then took the opportunity to discuss with the Board another matter—that of water rates. He pointed out that \$2,000,000 per year was necessary for additions and betterments. The Mayor, the Finance Committee and the Board of Supervisors have already approved \$1,600,000 in the budget for the coming fiscal year. He agreed with statement made in meeting of the Finance Committee with the Mayor that in general a utility should pay its own bills. About \$15,000,000 have been diverted from betterments and additions during the past fifteen years, since the City and County took over the Spring Valley Water Company. This year the Water Department will require more than \$2,000,000 from taxes to meet the needs of the department. To restore the 15 per cent cut will provide about \$1,429,000. This will fall far short of the requirement of this fiscal year or any subsequent year.

Supervisor Brown remarked that the Board was told during the budget hearings that the amount to be taken from surplus was about \$570,000.

Mr. Cahill answered, stating that the actual situation was that after taking the water department and the power department revenues, a shortage of \$2,026,000 would be required to be made up from taxes. In reply to statement by Supervisor Brown that the water department has never paid any part of Hetch Hetchy bond interest and

redemption, Mr. Cahill declared that it had paid a material part. In order to pay its own way, which, Mr. Cahill assumed was the recommendation of all concerned, would require the restoration of the ten per cent original reduction in water rates.

After further brief discussion, Mr. Cahill stated that he was speaking only as Manager of Utilities, and was not speaking for the Public Utilities Commission. Mr. Cahill again stated that he felt that a utility should pay its own way and should not fall back on the tax rate, except in a special case like the airport, and that only for a limited number of years.

Mr. Joseph Phillips, Director of Property, referring to the sale of some thirty-three acres of land in San Mateo County, which cost the city \$400 per acre, stated that offers to purchase at price ranging from \$300 to \$1,000 per acre had been received. He believed the present was the best time to sell.

Mr. Cahill reported that it was the opinion of Mr. Sam McKee, Public Utilities Commissioner and a real estate broker, that the present was not a good time to sell.

Supervisor Brown then inquired if the Board of Supervisors might expect any increase in water rates this year, or if the taxpayers would be called on to meet the additional required expense of the department.

Mr. Cahill replied that the Public Utilities Commission had not yet determined the matter. However, he thoroughly believed in the doctrine that a utility should pay out of its revenue, all its operating costs, additions and betterments, and bond interest and redemption.

Whereupon, Supervisor Brown announced that his own attitude next year would be determined in large part on whether the Commissioners decide to finance additions and betterments out of its revenues or allow the taxpayers to carry the burden.

Mr. Cahill announced that undoubtedly a determination would be made shortly of the Commission's policy.

Supervisor Colman expressed accord with the views advanced. Utilities should pay their own way.

SPECIAL ORDER—2:30 P. M.

Regarding Reduction of Street Railway Fares for School Children.

Consideration of opinion of the City Attorney, pursuant to motion by Supervisor Brown, as to the power of the Public Utilities Commission to make a reduction in the street railway fares for school children.

Discussion.

The City Attorney presented an opinion, pursuant to motion by Supervisor Brown, as to the power of the Public Utilities Commission to reduce street railway fares for school children or to liberalize the use of school tickets, in which he ruled that the Commission could make a reduction in fares or could liberalize the use of such tickets.

Thereupon, Supervisor Brown moved that the Board reaffirm to the Public Utilities Commission its request made on October 16, 1944, that the Commission give the matter full consideration, and if possible increase the hours during which school tickets might be used.
No objection, and motion carried.

SPECIAL ORDER—2:30 P. M.

Hearing of George W. Stevens and Wanda N. Stevens, in opposition to transferring by the Tax Collector, of payment credited to the first installment of Lot 21A, Block 1638, to another real property pursuant to the provisions of Section 4911 of the Revenue and Taxation Code.

Discussion.

Mr. Alborn explained to the Board the situation from which the protest of George W. and Wanda N. Stevens against transfer of credit of tax payment had arisen. Mrs. George H. Wells of 658 Seventh Avenue, filed with the Tax Collector a cancellation voucher. She had by mistake paid taxes on Lot 21a, Block 1638, instead of on Lot 22, Block 1638. The Tax Collector on receiving the cancellation voucher, notified Mrs. Stevens of the action by Mrs. Wells. Mrs. Wells has receipt showing that she paid the taxes on Mrs. Stevens' property, but Mrs. Stevens contends that she, too, paid the taxes. The Tax Collector has a record of one payment.

Mrs. Stevens declared that she had paid the taxes on her property, although Mrs. Wells claims she had paid the taxes.

Mrs. Wells also declared that she had paid the taxes in error and presented receipt showing payment.

After further brief discussion and statements by both Mrs. Stevens and Mrs. Wells, Supervisor Colman, seconded by Supervisor Mancuso, moved that the entire matter be referred to the City Attorney for his opinion.

No objection, and motion carried.

Increasing Fee for Special Fumigation From \$1.00 to \$10.00.

Bill No. 3471, Ordinance No. 3288 (Series of 1939), as follows:

Amending Section 701 of Article 12, Chapter V (Health Code), Part II, San Francisco Municipal Code, by increasing the fee for a special fumigation permit from \$1.00 to \$10.00.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco, as follows:

Section 1. Section 701 of Article 12, Chapter V (Health Code), Part II, San Francisco Municipal Code, is hereby amended to read as follows:

SEC. 701. Permits. (a) **Application, Etc.** Any person, firm or corporation engaged in any business or calling, or who may hereafter engage in any business or calling, and who may desire to continue in said business or calling, where hydrocyanic acid gas, cyanogen or chloropicrin or any other poisonous, noxious or dangerous gases or fumes dangerous to the life or health of human beings are used shall make written application to the Director of Public Health; shall provide and shall set forth the name of the person, firm or corporation engaged in the use of or who is desirous of using said gas; the par-

ticular character of gas used or to be used, the purposes and place where the same is used and the probable amount thereof which will be used during the existence of said permit, and the name of the person or persons who will have direct charge of the use of said gas. Before issuing any permit for the use of said gas, the Director of Public Health shall himself or through such person or persons as he may designate for that purpose, inquire into the training, experience, character, reputation and general character of the applicant for said permit and of the person or persons who are to have direct charge of the use of said gas; and for the purpose of ascertaining the training, experience, character, reputation and qualification of either said applicant or said person who has, or is to have, direct charge of the use of said gas, the Director of Public Health, or his representatives, may cause said applicant or said persons to appear before him, or them, and propound to said applicant, or to said person or persons, such questions as will show the training, experience, qualifications, character and reputation of said applicant, or of said persons, in regard to the use of said gas, and the regulations governing said use. The Director of Public Health shall have full power and authority to refuse to grant any permit for the use of said above-mentioned gas should he ascertain or determine that the manner in which said gas is to be used, or the place where it is to be used, is dangerous to life or health, or the person under whose direction it is to be used has not sufficient training, experience, character and reputation so that the use of said gas can be entrusted to said person without danger, or probability of danger, to the lives of human beings.

Every permit issued under authority of this section shall state the place where said gas is to be used, the character thereof and the probable amount thereof to be used, and the name or names of the person, firm or corporation authorized to use the same, and the name or names of the person or persons in direct charge of said use; provided, however, that when a permit is issued to any person, firm or corporation engaged in the general business of fumigating at places other than a fixed place of business, said permit need not specify the various places where said gas is to be used. Any permit so issued shall remain in force for a period not exceeding one (1) year from the date thereof; provided, however, that the Director of Public Health may issue a permit for a shorter period if the same is requested in said application for said permit.

(b) **Fees for Permits.** Every person, firm or corporation making application for a permit under the provisions of this section shall accompany said application with a fee of Ten (\$10.00) Dollars, and every person, firm or corporation making application for the renewal of any such permit shall accompany said application with a fee of Five (\$5.00) Dollars, which said fees are hereby fixed as the cost of investigating the matter of the issuing or renewing of said permits, and shall not be returnable in the event that said permits are not issued or renewed. All applications for a renewal of any permit shall contain all of the information required for an original permit.

(c) **Special Permits.** Any person, firm or corporation engaged in the business of fumigation, which said fumigation is to take place at any place other than the place of business of the person, firm or corporation holding a permit under this section, shall, at least twelve (12) hours before generating or releasing any of the gases mentioned in Sections 700 and 701 of this Article for fumigation purposes outside of his, or its, fixed place of business, making application to the Director of Public Health for a permit to so do, which said application shall state the location of the building or enclosed space to be fumigated and the day and hour when such fumigation shall be commenced, and the name of the person or persons who will be in direct charge of said fumigation. If the person, firm or corporation making application for said permit provided for in this section has already received a permit under the provisions of this section, which will authorize him to carry on the business of fumigation outside of a

fixed place of business, and the person or persons in charge of said fumigation have been approved by the said Director of Public Health, a special permit to generate or release said gas for fumigation purposes at the place indicated in said application shall be issued by the said Director of Public Health upon the payment of a fee of Ten (\$10.00) Dollars. Such permit shall be kept on the premises to be fumigated, and should the applicant therefor be unable to do the work on the day and hour set forth in said permit, he shall notify the Director of Public Health at least six (6) hours prior to said time, and thereupon the Director of Public Health shall specify a new time for the fumigation of the premises or space specified in said permit.

(d) **Rules and Regulations.** The Director of Public Health shall have power to make and enforce all reasonable rules and regulations for carrying out the purposes of this section which are not in conflict therewith.

Now, therefore, in consideration of the premises and pursuant to Section 92 of the City Charter, the Director of Property in lieu of sale is hereby authorized and directed to arrange for such exchange. Said parcels of real property are situated in the City and County of San Francisco, State of California, and are more particularly described as follows:

Parcel "A." Beginning at a point on the westerly line of Bartlett Street distant thereon 36.045 feet northerly from the northerly line of Army street, said point being in a line parallel with said line of Army Street, and distant 36 feet measured at right angles northerly therefrom, and running thence northerly along said line of Bartlett Street 13.569 feet to the southerly line of the property now or formerly owned by Lucretia G. Lyons; thence deflecting an angle of 81° 39' 22" to the left and running westerly along said southerly line of the property of Lucretia G. Lyons 78 feet 4¾ inches more or less to the easterly line of the property of Milton M. Cook and Marie H. Parcel "B." Commencing at the point of intersection of the northerly line of Army Street and the westerly line of Bartlett Street; running thence northerly and along said line of Bartlett Street 24 feet 4 inches; thence westerly parallel with said line of Army Street 77 feet 8 inches; thence southerly parallel with said line of Bartlett Street 24 feet 4 inches to the northerly line of Army Street; thence easterly along said line of Army Street 77 feet 8 inches to the point of commencement. Being part of Mission Block No. 198.

Section 2. The Director of Property has made an appraisal of said real property and estimates the value of Parcel "B" to exceed the value of Parcel "A" by \$20,200.

Section 3. The improvements now located on Parcel "A" shall remain the property of the City until the widening of Army Street between Bartlett Street and Valencia Street, and at that time shall be removed from the premises by the City.

Bill No. 3417, Ordinance No. . . . (Series of 1939), as follows:

Amending Section 1216 of Article 17, Chapter VIII (Police Code), Part II, of the San Francisco Municipal Code referring to permit from Chief of Police—Procedure—Bond, by fixing amount of application fee for dealers in used motor vehicles.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco, as follows:

Section 1. Section 1216 of Article 17, Chapter VIII (Police Code), Part II of the San Francisco Municipal Code, is hereby amended to read as follows:

SEC. 1216. Permit From Chief of Police—Procedure—Bond. No person, firm or corporation shall hereafter engage in any business

as a used automobile dealer as defined in Section 1215 of this Article without first having received a permit in writing to do so from the Chief of Police of the City and County of San Francisco.

Before receiving or acting upon any application for the granting of a permit to a used automobile dealer, the Chief of Police shall require:

First: The payment of the sum of one hundred (\$100) dollars as an application fee, fifty (\$50) dollars of which shall be refunded in case application is denied.

Second: An application signed by the applicant showing that said applicant is to conduct the business of dealing in used automobiles at a fixed place where used motor vehicles are, or will be displayed for sale. Said application for a permit must be signed by the applicant, and if applicant is a corporation or partnership, the same must be signed by a duly authorized officer on behalf of the corporation, or by all the members of the partnership, and the same must contain the names and addresses of all officers of the corporation or of all the partners. The said application shall be verified by the applicant and if said applicant is a partnership or a corporation, said verification shall be made by a member of said partnership or by an officer of said corporation.

Third: Publication of said application one day a week for four consecutive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation in the City and County of San Francisco.

Fourth: Every applicant at the time of making said application, and every person, firm or corporation who has heretofore been engaged and hereafter engages in the business of dealing in used automobiles, shall file, within thirty days hereafter and thereafter maintain, a bond in the sum of two thousand (\$2,000) dollars, which shall run to the City and County of San Francisco and to any person, firm or corporation who shall sustain any injury covered by said bond. Such bond shall be executed by the person, firm or corporation operating or proposing to operate as a used automobile dealer as principal and by a corporation which is licensed by the Insurance Commissioner of this State to transact the business of fidelity and surety insurance as surety, or in lieu of said surety corporation bond, applicant may deposit cash or United States Government Bonds of the current market value in the amount of two thousand (\$2,000) dollars. The bond shall be conditioned that the principal will indemnify any and all persons, firms or corporations for any loss suffered by the substitution by the principal of a motor vehicle other than the one selected by the purchaser, or by his failure to deliver a clear title to those legally entitled thereto, or by any misappropriation of moneys or property belonging to a purchaser in connection with a sale of a motor vehicle by the principal, or any loss due to an alteration of a motor vehicle on the part of the principal to deceive the purchaser as to the year model of any vehicle sold and shall furthermore be conditioned that said obligor will faithfully conform to and abide by the provisions of the San Francisco Municipal Code regulating the business of used automobile dealers. Said bond shall not be void upon the first recovery but may be sued and recovered on from time to time by any person aggrieved until the whole penalty is exhausted. Such bond shall remain in full force and effect until the license of the principal is revoked or until the bond is cancelled by the surety. The surety may cancel said bond and be relieved of further liability thereunder by giving fifteen days written notice to the Chief of Police of the City and County of San Francisco. The total aggregate liability on said bond shall be limited to two thousand (\$2,000) dollars. Any person, firm or corporation who sustains an injury covered by this bond may, in addition to any other remedy that he may have, bring an action in his own name on the bond for the recovery of any damage sustained by him, provided, however, that no such action may be brought and maintained after the expira-

tion of one year from the time of the occurrence of said alleged dishonest act or other breach of condition of said bond.

Fifth: No application for permit hereunder shall be required of any person, firm or corporation now holding a permit as a used automobile dealer while such permit remains in effect, but upon the expiration thereof, such permittee must apply for a renewal thereof in conformity with the provisions of Sections 1216 and 1217 of this Article.

Monday, May 14, 1945—Consideration continued until Monday, May 28, 1945.

Discussion.

Mr. Partridge, attorney for Used Motor Car Dealers Association, on being granted the privilege of the floor, pointed out that the foregoing matter was fully considered by the Board at the time it passed the Used Car Dealers Ordinance, and that nothing new had arisen which would require consideration by the Board. The bill, he felt, should not be approved.

Supervisor Mancuso announced that he had introduced the amendment. The ordinance, as passed by the Board, he claimed, was discriminatory and unconstitutional. He pointed out that, although the city could be licensed for revenue, the charge for a permit, in distinction to a license, could be only enough to meet the necessary and reasonable cost of necessary investigation and advertising.

Supervisor Brown pointed out that the duties of the Board of Supervisors were legislative and not judicial. Referring to the cases cited by Supervisor Mancuso in support of his argument that the Used Car Dealers Ordinance was discriminatory and unconstitutional, Supervisor Brown declared that there were just as many different opinions as there were attorneys. The Board should be guided by the City Attorney. The place for any dispute was in the courts, not in the Board of Supervisors. Supervisor Brown expressed a dislike to wasting time on the bill as presented by Supervisor Mancuso, stating that the legislation as already passed should have a reasonable length of time in which to determine how it would work before attempting to amend it.

Supervisor Mead declared that in his opinion the original ordinance would be for the best interest of the people of the City and County of San Francisco. The fee for a permit should remain at \$250. He did not believe that anyone should be entitled to engage in the business of selling such type of merchandise as used automobiles if he should not have sufficient capital to enable him to pay the fee now imposed. He was opposed to the amendment.

Supervisor Colman disagreed. He believed that a fee of \$250 would keep people out of business. One hundred dollars was a sufficient fee to charge; it would encourage the little business man.

Mr. Partridge again addressed the Board at length, reviewing the arguments advanced by Mr. Les Vogel at the time of the consideration of the original ordinance.

Supervisor Colman again urged passage of the amendment as proposed. He felt the required bond of \$2,000 was sufficient to protect the public against "fly-by-night" operators.

Mr. Partridge announced that he would agree if the bond were \$5,000 or \$10,000. Two thousand dollars would furnish no protection to the public. It could be entirely used up in one day's sales.

Thereupon, the roll was called and the foregoing bill was *Refused Passage* by the following vote:

Section 1. The sum of \$3,200 is hereby appropriated from Appropriation No. 65.990.00, Surplus Fund—Municipal Railway, to credit of Appropriation No. 465.400.99, Equipment, to provide for purchase of two automobiles for use of the Claims Department—Municipal Railway.

Discussion.

Mr. Lloyd S. Ackerman, member of the Public Utilities Commission, in urging approval of the foregoing appropriation, repeated briefly his statement heretofore made to the Board. He again pointed out the seriousness of the situation with respect to the number and amounts of damage claims filed, and argued that a more efficient means of transportation for claims investigators could result in substantial savings to the Municipal Railway.

Mr. Benehoff of the City Attorney's office, explained his experience and the procedure necessary in the investigation of accident claims. Automobiles were greatly needed to speed up and make effective the necessary investigations. Street car transportation was too slow, and taxicabs are not always available. The duties of the claims investigators and adjusters are not confined to San Francisco; they often take the adjusters and investigators into San Mateo County. Speed is of the essence in settling and adjusting claims. Witnesses also must be located and interviewed as part of the work of the adjusters and investigators. The requested automobiles are greatly needed. They will facilitate the work and save great amounts of money for the Municipal Railway.

Mr. Robert Scott, representing the Public Utilities Commission, in reply to questioning by Supervisor Brown as to the disposition of automobiles taken over by the Municipal Railway in its consolidation with the Market Street Railway, announced that there were only two cars in question, and they were assigned to the same employees who had them prior to the consolidation.

Mr. Gardiner Griffith, also representing the Public Utilities Commission, confirmed the statement by Mr. Scott.

Supervisor Colman addressed the Board at length, urging approval of the requested appropriation. The cars were necessary in the efficient and economical conduct of the business of the Municipal Railway. It would be a wise thing to do to purchase the requested cars, and it would be good business. He would vote for the appropriation.

Supervisor Mead urged approval of the appropriation. It would be poor business not to allow the purchase of the two automobiles.

Thereupon, Supervisor Meyer, seconded by Supervisor Brown, moved Passage for Second Reading of Bill No. 3448.

Supervisor MacPhee, in discussing the motion, stated that there was apparently a difference of opinion as to the appropriation. There is a question as to whether it is more important to spend the funds for the two automobiles or for some other purpose. He could not vote for the appropriation.

Supervisor Mancuso stated that he could not vote for the appropriation. He was not convinced that it was the proper approach.

Supervisor Colman thereupon remarked that he had hoped that Supervisor Mancuso might change his mind and go a little further than he had previously agreed. He had stated that he would be in favor of supplying two three-wheeled motorcycles; he might go a little further and agree to two automobiles.

Thereupon, the roll was called and the foregoing bill was *Passed for Second Reading* by the following vote:

Presentation of Model for Proposed World Capitol.**Privilege of the Floor.**

Supervisor MacPhee moved that the privilege of the floor be granted to Mr. Vincent G. Rainey, architect, to explain a proposal for a world capitol.

Mr. Rainey presented and read to the Board, outlining his recommendation for a world capitol, to be erected on Twin Peaks, if San Francisco should be selected by the United Nations as a world capital.

Following the presentation by Mr. Rainey, the Clerk presented and read communication from his Honor the Mayor, enclosing proposed

resolution whereby the City and County of San Francisco would formally submit its offer on behalf of the city or the bay area, to become headquarters for the United Nations Organization.

Supervisor Mancuso suggested that the model capitol building, presented by Mr. Rainey, and on exhibition in the chambers of the Board, be placed in the Veterans Building in order that it might be seen by the delegates from the United Nations.

No objection, and so ordered.

Adopted.

Thereupon, the following recommendation of his Honor the Mayor was taken up:

San Francisco Offers All Facilities and Full Cooperation as Permanent Headquarters for United Nations International Peace Conferences.

Proposal No. 4833, Resolution No. 4714 (Series of 1939), as follows:

Whereas, the City of San Francisco is deeply conscious of the great honor bestowed upon it by its selection as the place of meeting for the United Nations Conference on International Organization; and

Whereas, the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco believes that any action which may be taken with regard to selection of headquarters for the peace organization to be created at San Francisco must be based primarily upon the welfare of that organization and on the location and conditions that will best contribute to its effective functioning; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That this Board of Supervisors, speaking on behalf of the City of San Francisco, would welcome with pride selection of this City of San Francisco or a location within the San Francisco Bay Area as headquarters for the United Nations Organization or any other conferences held in connection with the establishment of peace; and be it

Further Resolved, That the City of San Francisco pledges its fullest support of the United Nations Organization, and should the honor be bestowed on San Francisco, the City pledges itself to do everything in its power to cooperate in providing all the facilities necessary for any conferences that may be called and for the permanent United Nations headquarters.

She called attention to State legislation which would establish a Division of Recreation in the Department of Natural Resources, which would fill a need for a central unit to which many requests for information on playgrounds and recreational programs could be referred. She desired the Board's endorsement of such legislation.

Thereupon, Supervisor Green asked for suspension of the rules and moved that Mr. Donald Cleary, through the Mayor's office, be informed of the Board's endorsement of A. B. 1362.

No objection, and so ordered.

Federal Aid for Construction of Commercial Airports.

The Clerk presented resolution adopted by the Down Town Association of San Francisco, Monday, May 28, 1945, endorsing "in principle legislation proposed in the Lea Bill, H. R. 3170, that the Federal Government contribute financially toward the construction of commercial airport facilities throughout the United States, particularly those airports which serve interstate and international commerce," and requesting the Board of Supervisors to support by resolution the principles embodied in the Lea Bill.

Supervisor MacPhee, in commenting on the resolution by the Down Town Association, announced that he had had prepared a resolution as requested, and he requested the suspension of the rules for the immediate consideration thereof.

No objection, and rules suspended.

Supervisor Gallagher announced that if the matter of airport was not returned to the Board within the four weeks' time as ordered, he would ask that it be withdrawn from committee.

Supervisor MacPhee requested that the matter be presented to the Board at its next meeting.

Supervisor Mancuso objected, stating it should not be brought before the Board until after the Mayor's Post-War Committee had reported.

Supervisor MacPhee, however, stated that the matter would be presented to the Board at its next meeting.

Endorsing Lea Bill, H. R. 3170, Providing for Government Aid in Construction of Commercial Airports.

Whereas, the cost of this program may in some degree be met by federal funds allocated to San Francisco under legislation of the kind proposed; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco does hereby endorse the principle embodied in the legislation proposed in H. R. 3170, the Lea Bill, namely, that the Federal Government contribute financially toward the construction of commercial airport facilities throughout the United States, particularly those airports which serve interstate and international commerce, and that notice of this action be communicated to the House Committee on Interstate and Foreign Commerce of the Congress of the United States, the members of Congress from San Francisco and to Congressman Lea; and be it

Further Resolved, That copies of this resolution be forwarded to Senator Hiram W. Johnson, Senator Sheridan Downey, Congressman Richard J. Welch and Congressman Franck R. Havenner.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco, as follows:

Section 1. The Director of Public Works in written communication filed in the office of the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors May 16, 1945, having recommended the ordering of the following street work, the same is hereby ordered to be done in the City and County of San Francisco in conformity with the provisions of the Street Improvement Ordinance of 1934, of said City and County of San Francisco, said work to be performed under the direction of the Director of Public Works, and to be done in accordance with the specifications prepared therefore by order of said Director of Public Works, and on file in his office, which said plans and specifications are hereby approved and adopted.

That said Board of Supervisors, pursuant to the provisions of Street Improvement Ordinance of 1934, of said City and County of San Francisco, does hereby determine and declare that the assessment to be imposed for the said contemplated improvements, respectively, may be paid in ten (10) installments; that the period of time after the time of payment of the first installment when each of the succeeding installments must be paid is to be one year from the time of the payment of the preceding installment, and that the rate of interest to be charged on all deferred payments shall be seven per centum per annum.

The foregoing described lots of land are contained within and constitute the extent of the district benefited by said contemplated work or improvement, and to be assessed to pay the costs and expenses thereof, and reference to the same is hereby made for the description of such district.

Section 2. The amount of \$1600.00 is hereby appropriated and set aside from the surplus existing in the reserve for "City Aid" to the credit of Appropriation No. 448.906.03 for the purpose of extending City Aid necessary to legalize and equalize the assessment as provided in Section Six (6) of the San Francisco Street Improvement Ordinance of 1934, being Ordinance No. 12.0211, Bill 518.

This amount is based on estimated contract quantities and when exact figures are determined, the actual amount will be applied against this appropriation and the excess money will revert to the Reserve for City Aid.

Congratulating Fireman's Fund Insurance Company on Its "Story of San Francisco."

Supervisor MacPhee called attention to pamphlet published by Fireman's Fund Insurance Company, entitled "Story of San Francisco," which had been distributed to members of the United Nations Conference, and requested that the Clerk send an appropriate letter of congratulation to the Fireman's Fund Insurance Company on its excellent publication.

No objection, and so ordered.

Consideration of Modification of Venereal Disease Ordinance.

Supervisor MacPhee discussed briefly the "Venereal Disease Ordinance," enacted sometime ago by the Board of Supervisors and the good results obtained as a result of that enactment. However, the legislation does not go quite far enough. Promiscuous girls of all ages, from 18 years up, when picked up are confined in the county

jail and left to associate with prostitutes. Promiscuous girls who are found infected with contagious diseases should not be so treated. There is a possibility that the Immigration Building at Sharps Park might be made available for housing such women. He believed that a representative of the Department of Health, the Recreation Commission, the District Attorney and the State Department of Institutions should be invited to attend a meeting of the Joint Education, Parks and Recreation Committee and the Public Health and Welfare Committee to consider the entire matter.

Subject matter referred to Education, Parks and Recreation and to the Public Health and Welfare Committee.

Supervisor Colman suggested that Supervisor MacPhee introduce something more specific for consideration of the joint committee than his verbal statement.

Supervisor MacPhee announced that he intended to go to Sharps Park in the near future when he would inspect the Immigration Building, after which he would present the matter in resolution form.

"Trader Vic" Lease.

Supervisor Mancuso, in referring to the resolution recently adopted authorizing lease of city-owned land to Trader Vic, announced that although he had been opposed to the lease, he would abide by the will of the majority. However, he had learned that another offer for the property had been made, about which the Director of Property had not informed the Board. Mr. Phillips, when asked about bids for lease of the property had stated that there was no bid received other than that received from Trader Vic. That statement was not true. The Director of Property should have called the Board's attention to the additional bid which had been received. In support of his statement, Supervisor Mancuso read a letter from a Mr. Barnett, asking for information about the property proposed to be leased.

Supervisor Colman pointed out that the resolution authorizing the lease to Trader Vic had been passed in April, but the effective date of the resolution had been delayed due to Supervisor Mancuso's motion for reconsideration.

Supervisor Brown pointed out that the Utilities Commission had entered into negotiations with Trader Vic and had then asked for bids. No bid except that of Trader Vic was received. Bids were then closed. The only question remaining was the approval of the lease by the Board of Supervisors. Had the Board not approved the lease, the matter could have been reopened for bids. Until the decision of the Board, the bids were closed. It would not have been fair to have reopened the bids.

RECESS.

Thereupon, there being no further business, the Board, at the hour of 5:30 p. m., pursuant to motion by Supervisor MacPhee, recessed, to reconvene on Friday, June 1, 1945, at 10:00 a. m., to consider and to pass finally, the Annual Appropriation Ordinance and the Annual Salary Ordinance for the fiscal year 1945-1946.

Consideration of Proposed \$20,000,000 Airport Bond Issue.

The above subject matter from the Joint Finance and Public Utilities Committee without recommendation, was taken up pursuant to request of President Dan Gallagher.

Supervisor Meyer moved, seconded by President Gallagher, that this matter be made a Special Order of Business for Monday, June 11, 1945, at 2:30 p. m., and that the members of the Public Utilities Commission be requested to attend said meeting.

Discussion.

At this point Supervisor Mead raised the question whether it would be proper for the Board to consider the subject in view of the fact that the Mayor's Post-War Planning Committee had not rendered a report on the proposed bond issue, to which President Gallagher replied that in his opinion consideration of the matter at this time would be proper because up to the present time nothing has been done with regard to the bond issue and that the present time was propitious for a meeting of the minds of the members of the Board, the Public Utilities Commission, the Manager of the Airport, the interested airlines, after which the Board could take definite action.

Supervisor Colman asked the Chair if it was the Chair's intention to press for a decision at this time to which President Gallagher stated that the hearing was intended merely to find out whether the airport would cost ten, fifteen or twenty millions of dollars. The Chair informed the Board of a bill now pending in Congress, namely, the Lea-McCarran bill, designed to appropriate funds, on a matching basis, to those political subdivisions which have construction of airports on their post-war curriculums and therefore the proposed hearing would go far in arriving at constructive ideas in conformity with the Lea-McCarran bill.

Supervisor Colman: I do not think that this meeting would bring out any further information and believe that bringing this matter out prematurely would hurt the bond issue. First, the Mayor's Post-War Planning Committee has not reported on this matter, and secondly, the basic problem facing the city and by far the most important problem is street car transportation. That is vital and it comes first, and at the present moment we have a report from Mr. Newton who states that we need 23 millions of dollars, more or less, for the purpose of buying new equipment, repairs, etc., and until a decision is reached upon that, I believe that that takes precedence. If the people were allowed to vote on this matter, I think that they would all agree that this is correct. I cannot vote for it if you press for a decision next Monday. If you just want to hold a meeting, what can be accomplished, I cannot say.

President Gallagher: I think there is something to be accomplished. If you find you want to vote against it, it is up to you.

Supervisor Colman: I move as an amendment that the matter remain on the Calendar and taken up four weeks from today, Special Order, 2:30 p. m., which will give an opportunity to the committee of the Mayor to report and give us an opportunity of hearing in what manner the Mayor and the Public Utilities Commission are considering the street railway situation and possibly the water situation. Seconded by Supervisor Brown.

Supervisor Mead stated that there were certain people and some of the press, that were of the opinion that the Board of Supervisors was stalling on this matter and he wanted it definitely understood that no stalling is contemplated, that the Mayor had appointed a committee which was considering this bond issue and that it wasn't right and proper to go over the committee's head and consider the matter before a report could be rendered by the committee.

His Honor the Mayor was asked if he knew when such report could be expected, to which he replied that he did not know whether the report would be ready in four or six weeks or just when it would be.

Whereupon the roll was called on Supervisor Colman's amendment and it *passed* by the following vote:

Quorum present.

Supervisor Brown was noted present at 2:15 p. m.

Supervisor Mancuso was noted present at 2:20 p. m.

Supervisor Green was noted present at 2:45 p. m.

Supervisor Colman moved that Supervisor MacPhee take the Chair.
No objection and so ordered.

President of the Board Dan Gallagher left word that he desired to be excused as he was called to Sacramento.

No objection and so ordered.

Introduction of Hon. Howard Spellman, Lieutenant in the United States Navy by the Chair.

Acting President MacPhee introduced Lieutenant Howard Spellman of the Navy and Councilman of the City of New York to the members of the Board. Lieutenant Spellman spoke briefly on the duties and responsibilities of the councilmen of New York City. He mentioned the fact that he was convalescing here and expected to leave for home within a few days and while he has been here, he has heard many complimentary remarks about our great city, and expressed the hope that he would have the privilege of again visiting with us soon.

Supervisor Meyer Excused.

Supervisor Meyer asked the Chair if it would be possible to be excused at 4:15 p. m.

No objection and so ordered.

APPROVAL OF JOURNAL.

The Journal of Proceedings of the meeting of May 14, 1945, was considered read and approved.

Communications.

From his Honor the Mayor, returning Proposal No. 4821 and requesting the Board to reconsider this proposal in accordance with Section 14 of the Charter.

Reconsideration of Proposal No. 4821.

Supervisor Colman, seconded by Supervisor Uhl, moved that the Board reconsider its action in defeating Proposal No. 4821, approving A. B. 2176 which provides that cities, at their option, may contract with state agencies for the collection of taxes.

Supervisor Brown inquired as to parliamentary procedure, whereupon the Chair informed the Supervisor that the Charter provides for such reconsideration.

Supervisor Colman: I find that we acted rather hastily and without knowledge of the facts. I confess I did. This is merely an enabling act by which the state will collect for us, providing we pass these taxes and the question of whether or not we pass these taxes is determined by this Board. In other words, we are going to decide by majority rule whether we will adopt these taxes. After it has been decided, it will be very much in the interest of the city to have the state collect them. Accordingly and with the fact in mind that this does not commit us to the establishment of any taxes but is merely an enabling act, I feel, for one, that I acted too hastily and without consideration and am in favor of rescinding our action and going in favor of this legislation. I now move that we go on record as approving this legislation. Seconded by Supervisor Mancuso.

Supervisor Brown explained his stand on the matter, stating that he was unalterably opposed to the imposition of further tax burdens upon the people of the City and County of San Francisco and therefore he was also opposed to any legislation having for its purpose the setting up of machinery looking to the collection of additional taxes.

Mr. Thomas A. Brooks, Chief Administrative Officer, in answer to an inquiry, stated that it would be more economical for the city to have the state collect the taxes than to perform the work itself.

Adopted.

From his Honor the Mayor, returning Bill No. 3491, Annual Salary Ordinance, with his veto endorsed thereon and transmitting copy of legal opinion from the City Attorney on said ordinance.

Consideration of Mayor's Veto.

Supervisor Mead inquired of the Chair as to just what was the legal procedure, to which Assistant City Attorney Dion Holm informed the Board that the legislation must be out of the way by July 1st; that there were several ways to consider the matter; either override the Mayor's veto, or failing in that, introduce a new ordinance which

would take two readings and allow the Mayor ten days in which to sign it, and assuming that the Mayor signed it the same day it was finally passed, it would still not become effective until ten days after the Mayor signed it, which would carry the effective date into the third or fourth of July, or the new ordinance can be finally passed as an emergency in which case the ordinance can be passed on either the 18th or the 25th of June if desirable.

At this time discussion was had with reference to the various positions the salary ranges for which were lower than the amounts appropriated in the Annual Appropriation Ordinance. These ranges were those recommended by the Civil Service Commission and a reduction from those recommended by his Honor the Mayor.

In commenting on the position of Public Service Director, Mayor's office, Mr. William L. Henderson, Personnel Director and Secretary of the Civil Service Commission, stated that while the Mayor's letter commenting on the positions involved, showed a range recommended by him to be \$375-450, the Civil Service recommendation was \$350-425; however, that was not the entire story, in that the City Attorney has ruled now that the amount fixed in the budget is what governs.

Mr. Henderson also called the Board's attention to the savings clause contained in the Annual Salary Ordinance which would preclude the necessity of re-enacting a new ordinance.

The Clerk read the Mayor's letter with reference to the deletion in Section 1.3 of the Annual Salary Ordinance.

Assistant City Attorney Holm informed the Board, after reading Section 71 of the Charter, and speaking in connection with the position of Public Service Director in the Mayor's office previously mentioned by Mr. Henderson, that the position was a new one and that the Board had the right to fix salaries and that the method of standardizing salaries was set out in Section 151 of the Charter.

Supervisor Mead stated that the entire matter was purely a legal one. While he appreciated the duties of the Civil Service Commission, he felt that the Board should be guided by the City Attorney. He would vote to sustain the Mayor's veto.

Supervisor Colman asked Mr. Holm if the savings clause in the Annual Salary Ordinance would protect the employees with the exception of the twelve positions in dispute, to which Mr. Holm replied that the savings clause was a very proper one but that there might be some question.

Supervisor Mancuso expressed the view that the Mayor's veto should be overridden and the matter taken to court, to which Mr. Holm replied that such a procedure would be strictly a matter of legislative determination.

The Chair asked Controller Boyd what the attitude of the Controller's office would be in the event the Mayor's veto was overridden, to which Mr. Boyd replied that the salary ordinance would be considered as passed by the Board; that the Annual Salary Ordinance would be the only check the Civil Service Commission would have as to salaries and that the Controller's office would pay that which the Secretary of the Civil Service Commission approved.

Mr. Henderson, representing the Civil Service Commission, in commenting on this matter, informed the Board that the Commission was guided by the Annual Salary Ordinance but now it seems that it was the budget that governed and not the salary ordinance. He cited the position of Director of Public Service in the Mayor's office. The position showed a range of \$375-450, the amount appropriated in the budget was \$4,500 or \$375 per month, and under the City Attorney's

opinion, that is the money that must be put in the salary ordinance and that is the amount that will be paid.

At this time the Chair put the question to the Board in preparation for a vote: "An 'aye' vote sustains the veto. A 'no' vote overrides the veto."

Supervisor Mead stated that he was in the identical position in which Supervisor Colman found himself in that he was confused; that he hoped that the City Attorney was right but that he did not know that he was; that he hoped the Civil Service Commission was wrong but that he did not know that it was.

Explanations of Votes.

Supervisor Mead, in explaining his vote, stated that he intended to sustain the Mayor's veto and make the necessary arrangements to amend the present salary ordinance to comply with the budget.

Supervisor MacPhee, in explaining his vote, stated that notwithstanding the many conflicting views with regard to the present salary ordinance, there was nothing that he could find that could change his mind and that in his opinion the Board was on sound ground in passing the salary ordinance which was vetoed by the Mayor.

Supervisor Uhl stated that he had voted "no" on new salaries and that he was going to vote to override the Mayor's veto.

Whereupon, the roll was called and the Mayor's veto was *sustained* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Brown, Colman, Mead, Sullivan—4.

Noes: Supervisors Gartland, Green, MacPhee, Mancuso, Uhl—5.

Absent: Supervisors Gallagher, Meyer—2.

Supervisor Brown, at the conclusion of the above roll call, moved that the Board, when through with its deliberations, recess until Wednesday, June 13th, at 10 a. m., for the purpose of considering a new Annual Salary Ordinance.

No objection and so ordered.

Referred to Streets Committee.

Telegram from Edward Morris, addressed to Supervisor John J.

Sullivan, requesting the support of the Board on H. R. 2343 which provides for the raising of the price of gold from \$25 to \$56 per ounce.

Referred to County, State and National Affairs Committee.

Proposed Sale of Water Department Land Near San Carlos.

Supervisor MacPhee introduced to the members of the Board Mr. Conway of the firm of Conway & Culligan, realtors. Mr. Conway was asked to express his opinion with respect to the value of some thirty-three acres of land near San Carlos owned by the Water Department. Mr. Conway informed the Board that in his opinion the property was worth \$1,000 per acre and not more.

Mr. Weiner, also a realtor, informed the Board that the land was not worth more than \$800 per acre.

The Real Estate Department, through Mr. Riordan, stated that they had been offered \$1,001 per acre which had been rejected and at the present time there were no offers.

Mr. E. G. Cahill, Manager of Utilities, informed the Board that there seems to be a drive on to force the Commission to sell this land; that Mr. McKee who is a member of the Commission told the Manager of Utilities that the land in question was worth more than one thousand dollars per acre; that the money derived from the sale of such lands, goes into a special fund and cannot be used for any other purpose than for lands that the Water Department may need; therefore, there is no desire to sell the land unless the price is a very good one and the money so derived cannot be used other than to purchase land required by the Water Department, that he personally did not want to make any recommendation unless directed by the Public Utilities Commission.

Supervisor Brown asked Mr. Cahill the amount of taxes on the property, to which Mr. Cahill replied "about \$250." Mr. Cahill also informed the Board that the amount of rental of the property came to around \$400 or \$450.

Consideration of A. B. 3, California State Fair Employment Practices Act.

Supervisor Green, out of order and with the permission of the Chair, spoke on A. B. 3, California State Fair Employment Practices Act. He informed the Board that the matter was to have been considered on June 8 last but for lack of a quorum, no action could be taken on it.

Whereupon, Supervisor Green moved that the Board consider the matter at the present time.

Supervisor Brown objected and the Chair then stated that the subject could not be considered at this time.

for Parcel "A" plus the sum of \$20,200, subject to the provisions of Section 3 hereof; and

Whereas, Parcel "B" is required for the widening of Army Street; and it appears to the Board of Supervisors that public interest and necessity demand the sale or trading of Parcel "A"; and

Now, therefore, in consideration of the premises and pursuant to Section 92 of the City Charter, the Director of Property in lieu of sale is hereby authorized and directed to arrange for such exchange. Said parcels of real property are situated in the City and County of San Francisco, State of California, and are more particularly described as follows:

Parcel "A." Beginning at a point on the westerly line of Bartlett Street distant thereon 36.045 feet northerly from the northerly line of Army street, said point being in a line parallel with said line of Army Street, and distant 36 feet measured at right angles northerly therefrom, and running thence northerly along said line of Bartlett Street 13.569 feet to the southerly line of the property now or formerly owned by Lucretia G. Lyons; thence deflecting an angle of 81° 39' 22" to the left and running westerly along said southerly line of the property of Lucretia G. 2. Unarmored Concrete Curb.
3. 6-inch V. C. P. Side Sewers.
4. Water Services.

The assessment district hereby approved is described as follows:

Within the exterior boundary of those certain lots delineated, designated and numbered respectively as: Block 2089, Lots 1, 2, 3, 9, 10 and 12; being designated on the maps and books of the Assessor of the City and County of San Francisco and upon the assessment book of the City and County of San Francisco current at the time of the inception of the proceedings for the above-mentioned improvement.

The foregoing described lots of land are contained within and constitute the extent of the district benefited by said contemplated work or improvement, and to be assessed to pay the costs and expenses thereof, and reference to the same is hereby made for the description of such district.

Section 2. The amount of \$1600.00 is hereby appropriated and set aside from the surplus existing in the reserve for "City Aid" to the credit of Appropriation No. 448.906.03 for the purpose of extending City Aid necessary to legalize and equalize the assessment as provided in Section Six (6) of the San Francisco Street Improvement Ordinance of 1934, being Ordinance No. 12.0211, Bill 518.

This amount is based on estimated contract quantities and when exact figures are determined, the actual amount will be applied

Authorizing Sale of Easement Over Portion of Ravenswood-Belmont Right of Way for Roadway and Railroad Crossing.

Authorizing sale of easement over portion of Ravenswood-Belmont right of way for roadway and railroad crossing.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco, as follows:

Section 1. In accordance with the recommendation of the Public Utilities Commission, the Board of Supervisors hereby declares that public interest and necessity demand the sale of an easement to construct, reconstruct, maintain, operate, repair or remove a roadway and railroad crossing over the following described City owned real property situated in the County of San Mateo, State of California:

Beginning at a point on the southwesterly line of that certain strip of land described as San Mateo County Parcel 38-A in the deed from Spring Valley Water Company to the City and County of San Francisco, dated March 3, 1930, and recorded March 3, 1930, in Volume 491 at page 1, Official Records of San Mateo County, from which point an angle point on the northeast boundary of the Rancho de las Pulgas designated as P.M.C. No. 21 bears north 78° 29' 28" west 2134.77 feet distant, and a concrete monument on the westerly boundary of Bay Shore Highway opposite Engineer's Sta-

tion 1051+11.99 of the survey of said State highway bears south 82° 25' 28" west 825.21 feet distant; and running thence along the southwesterly line of said Parcel 38-A south 46° 53' 54" east 122.72 feet; thence north 7° 40' 36" east 122.72 feet to a point on the northeasterly line of said Parcel 38-A; thence along last named line north 46° 53' 54" west 122.72 feet; thence south 7° 40' 36" west 122.72 feet to the point of beginning.

Being a portion of said Parcel 38-A.

The bearings in the foregoing description refer to the rectangular coordinate system described in Special Publication No. 202 of the United States Coast and Geodetic Survey (1936) for Zone 3, California.

The grant of said easement shall be made subject to the following reservations and conditions:

First. Reserving to the City and County of San Francisco, a municipal corporation, hereinafter referred to as the City, the right to construct, reconstruct, maintain, repair, operate and remove pipes, pipe lines, conduits, power lines, telephone lines, sewers, or other utilities (but not buildings or wells) across, over or under said land. The grantee shall hereafter pay to the City any increase in cost of exercising the rights herein reserved over and above what the expense would have been had the property not been affected by said easement for roadway and railroad purposes; said payments to be made to the City whenever such utility work is necessary.

Second. The grantee shall do no work of constructing or reconstructing said roadway or railroad except in accordance with plans and specifications therefor first submitted to and approved by the Public Utilities Commission, Board or officer of the City having jurisdiction; provided, however, that if said plans and specifications be disapproved they shall be returned to the grantee with reasonable written objections thereto within twenty calendar days after submission, otherwise they shall be deemed approved within the meaning hereof. The provisions hereof shall not apply to emergency work. Upon notice from the San Francisco Water Department of its intention to construct a pipe line or other structure along said land the grantee shall within ninety calendar days provide any special structure necessary to carry the roadway or railroad over the City's pipe line or structure without any cost to the City.

Third. The grantee shall indemnify and hold the City harmless from and defend City against any and all claims, liens and judgments for death of any person or any injury or damage to any person or property whatsoever occurring in, on or about the premises or any part thereof, caused by or resulting from any act, negligence or omission of the grantee, its officers, employees, contractors or servants in the exercise of any right herein conveyed.

Fourth. This conveyance is made subject to all valid and existing terms, conditions and easements which are of record.

Fifth. The rights and conditions herein set forth shall inure to the benefit of and bind the successors and assigns of the parties hereto.

Sixth. The City reserves the right to grant easements to other parties, over, in and upon said land, provided such easements do not materially interfere with the use of said premises for roadway and railroad purposes as set forth herein, and provided, further, that claims for damage caused thereby shall be paid by the grantees of such other easements.

Section 2. The above described easement shall be offered for sale pursuant to the provisions of Section 92 of the Charter of the City and County of San Francisco.

Section 1. The City Attorney having recommended that the actions pending in the Superior Court, entitled Anna Mutti, by and through her guardian ad litem, Claire Mutti v. City and County of San Francisco, and Patricia McClelland Cremers, by and through her guardian ad litem Monta McClelland v. City and County of San Francisco, both of said cases being consolidated as Superior Court Action No. 321,425, be settled and compromised by the payment of \$3,500 to Anna Mutti, through her guardian ad litem, and \$3,000 to Patricia McClelland Cremers, through her guardian ad litem, said sums being in full payment and satisfaction of all claims which said claimants or their guardians may have by reason of injuries suffered by said minor claimants on or about the 24th day of April, 1943, when they received certain injuries in an automobile accident at Twentieth and Noe Streets, San Francisco, California; and said City Attorney is hereby authorized to compromise and settle the said claims for the sums above mentioned in full payment and satisfaction of all demands arising on account of said accident.

Supervisor Uhl informed the Board that he was strenuously opposed to the passage of this measure, stating that there were four persons seated in the Ford coupe, thus obstructing the driver's view. Supervisor Mancuso stated that if this matter went to court, the judicial body would probably charge ten times as much as the compromise arrived at by the City Attorney's office.

Extending the Time to June 30, 1946, Within Which to Grant Emergency Relief to Dependent Non-Residents of the City and County of San Francisco; an Emergency Ordinance.

Bill No. 3500, Ordinance No. 3307 (Series of 1939), as follows:

Amending Section 6 of Ordinance No. 121 (Series of 1939) entitled, "Providing for the granting of emergency relief to dependent non-residents of the City and County of San Francisco, defining certain terms used in this ordinance, determining the amount and character of relief which may be granted to dependent non-residents and authorizing the Public Welfare Commission to administer said relief and to make rules and regulations regarding the granting of said relief and to incur on behalf of the City and County of San Francisco the cost of transporting non-resident indigents to another county, another state, a territory of the United States, or a foreign country"; extending time for granting emergency relief to dependent non-residents of City and County of San Francisco. An emergency ordinance.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco, as follows:

Section 1. Section 6 of Ordinance No. 121 (Series of 1939), the title of which is recited above, is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 6. Any dependent non-resident who was, on the 15th day of March, 1939, receiving emergency relief through the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco or through the Public Welfare Commission thereof may, if the conditions on which the allowance of said relief was made have not changed, and if relief is continuously granted, continue to receive said relief through the agency of the Public Welfare Commission until the 30th day of June, 1946, and the Board of Supervisors does hereby declare that such persons, as long as the conditions on which the granting of said relief were based have not changed, and as long as relief is continuous, are entitled to emergency relief pursuant to the provisions of Section 2501 of the Welfare and Institutions Code, to and until the 30th day of June, 1946, or until proper provision has been made for relief of said dependent non-residents either by the federal government or the government of the State of California.

Section 2. This ordinance is passed as an emergency measure and the Board of Supervisors does by the vote by which this ordinance is passed declare that an actual emergency exists which necessitates this ordinance becoming effective immediately, the nature of said emergency being as follows: That under Section 6 of Ordinance No. 121 (Series of 1939) the period for granting of relief to dependent non-residents who have been receiving emergency relief since March 15, 1939, will expire on June 30, 1945, and it is necessary that this ordinance become effective immediately for the preservation of the health and safety of the people of the City and County of San Francisco and for the uninterrupted operation of the Department of Public Welfare.

Welfare Commission were with respect to this particular type of relief and suggested that the matter be made a Special Order of Business for Monday, June 18, 1945, at 3 P. M., and that the Public Welfare Commission be requested to be present at the above time to discuss the subject.

The amounts appropriated for the above purposes in the 1944-1945 Budget and Appropriation Ordinance are inadequate and there are no other funds available therefor.

Whereas, this endeavor on Mr. Smith's part became popularly known as a "One Man War Bond Drive" and was so successful that sales of bonds approximated the amount of two and one-half (2½) millions of dollars; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That this Board of Supervisors takes this opportunity to publicly express its admiration and recognition of Mr. Smith's patriotic zeal; and be it

Further Resolved, That the Clerk of the Board be and he is hereby authorized to transmit to Harry B. Smith suitably engrossed copies of this resolution.

Favoring S. B. 608, Relating to \$15,000,000 for the Construction and Maintenance of Rural County Feeder Roads.

Whereas, Senate Bill No. 608, now pending in the Assembly, appropriates \$12,000,000 to be used to match \$15,000,000 of Federal Aid Highway Funds for post-war construction and reconstruction of rural county feeder roads; and

Whereas, adequate county roads are essential to the economic development and prosperity of rural agricultural California; and

Whereas, urban areas of our State have a real interest in stimulating prosperity in the rural areas not only as good neighbors but

also because the prosperity of our entire State finally depends upon the prosperity of all sections of the State—rural or urban; and

Whereas, in consideration of the foregoing his Honor Mayor Roger D. Lapham has by telegram urged Senator John Shelley and the eight Assemblymen representing San Francisco to support Bill 608, pending in the Assembly; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That this Board of Supervisors approves the action of his Honor the Mayor and adds its request with respect to the proposed legislation and call on our representatives to use their efforts looking to the adoption of this measure.

The Board of Supervisors met in recess session.

CALLING THE ROLL.

The roll was called and the following Supervisors were noted present:

Supervisors Brown, Colman, Gallagher, Green, MacPhee, Mancuso, Mead, Sullivan, Uhl—9.

Absent: Supervisors Gartland, Meyer—2.

Quorum present.

President Dan Gallagher presiding.

Supervisor Gartland noted present at 3:10 p. m.

CALL OF THE BOARD.

Supervisor Sullivan, seconded by Supervisor Uhl, moved a call of the Board. Supervisor Brown objected. Whereupon the roll was called and the motion for a call of the Board was *defeated* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Gallagher, Green, Sullivan, Uhl—4.

Noes: Supervisors Brown, Colman, MacPhee, Mancuso, Mead—5.

Communications.

From the League of California Cities, dated June 8, 1945, with

attachments having to do with the availability of certain Federal funds to assist in the preparation of plans for local post-war public works.

Referred to Public Buildings, Lands and City Planning Committee.

From Hon. Richard J. Welch, member of Congress, addressed to Supervisor Uhl, offering his one-third interest in certain tidelands to the City and County of San Francisco and asking that his communication be made part of the record.

Supervisor Uhl moved that the communication be made part of the record, and that a copy of the Journal be sent to Congressman Welch and that a copy of the Congressman's letter be sent to the Mayor's Post-War Planning Committee. Motion seconded by Supervisor Colman. *No objection and so ordered.*

Supervisor Uhl presented and read an article under date of April, 1945, from the San Francisco City-County Record, by Henry J. Kaiser, in which he proposes a new airport for San Francisco Bay. Supervisor Uhl then stated that he desired to have Mr. Kaiser appear before the Board for the purpose of elaborating on his proposed plan for a new airport, whereupon he moved suspension of the rules for the purpose of considering a proposal having for its purpose the inviting of Mr. Henry J. Kaiser to address the Board on the airport matter on July 2, 1945, at 3:00 p. m. Supervisor Uhl also stated that he desired to have the members of the Mayor's Post-War Planning Committee present at the above meeting.

Objection to Suspension to the Rules.

Supervisor Green objected to suspension of the rules unless the airlines were also invited. Supervisor Uhl did not object to inviting the airlines, whereupon the motion to suspend the rules passed. Supervisor Uhl then moved the adoption of the proposal, to which there was no objection, and which reads as follows:

Proposal No. 4878, Resolution No. 4762 (Series of 1939), as follows:

Whereas, under date of April, 1945, the San Francisco City-County Record printed the following article by Henry J. Kaiser, the noted builder, in which he proposes a new airport for San Francisco Bay:

"The Henry J. Kaiser Interests have submitted to the United States Army Engineers a plan for a mid-bay airport, which would be one of the major developments in the region for use by post-war trade.

"While the Public Utilities Commission of San Francisco has proposed a \$20,000,000 airport improvement program which would result in San Francisco supplying the major needs of commercial trans-Pacific air transport operators, the arguments in support of the Kaiser project emphasize the need for development of adequate airways facilities within the region.

"The development of the airplane and air travel has been so rapid and its further growth is so evident to all that the necessity to create additional airport facilities in the San Francisco Bay Area is obvious. It is the opinion of many airport authorities that the San Francisco Bay Area requires a total of not less than 25 airports.

"New York commands the trans-Atlantic routes to the various European and mid-Eastern points. Miami commands the routes to South America and South Africa, while, all important, San Francisco is in the top place among all cities not only of the United States but of the entire Western Hemisphere, commanding the air routes of the vast Pacific.

"Four world-circling air routes emanate from San Francisco:

"1. West via Honolulu where branches lead either via Samoa or

New Caledonia to Auckland or Sydney, Darwin, Singapore and on to Bombay; or via Guam to Manila, Calcutta, and on to Bombay.

"2. Northwest via Fairbanks and Petropavlovsk to Tokyo, Shanghai, Chungking, Calcutta and on to Bombay.

"3. East via Chicago and New York, thence via the several trans-Atlantic routes leading to Moscow, London, or Lisbon to the various European and Middle East countries, and on to Bombay.

"4. South via Los Angeles, Mexico City, Panama, and South American countries, thence crossing the South Atlantic at Natal via either Dakar or Ascension and across Africa and on to Bombay. Bombay, being on the opposite of the world, is the 'half-way-around-the-world' stopping place for all globe-circling air routes.

"Great as are the potentialities for the San Francisco Bay Area as a key terminal in post-war international air commerce, this will probably be but a small portion of the commerce-by-air that will be carried on within North America, and especially within the United States. The San Francisco Bay Area should be the terminal for many major airlines, together with the many feeder lines, that will weave a web of skyways over America.

"It is claimed that no place on earth will be more than 60 hours distant from any other place when post-war air transport functions at its fullest. The airplane has condensed the world into an area reckoned by time to less than the former time limit of a trans-continental train trip and has brought most American cities within a few hours of each other, none being more than a third of a day apart.

"There can be no doubt that transport by air will become a dominant factor in post-war commerce. Air transport is already here. Today our Army Air Transport Command is flying most of the global air routes and carrying more air commerce than will probably be carried on these same routes for many years following the war's end.

"The most practical route from the West Coast of America as well as from the greater area of the United States for trans-Pacific Air Commerce to Australia, the Philippines, the East Indies, Japan, South China, Malay, and India is via Honolulu.

"San Francisco is 318 miles nearer to Honolulu than Seattle to the North, and 137 miles nearer to Honolulu than Los Angeles to the South, the distances from Honolulu being, San Francisco Bay, 2091 miles, Seattle 2409 miles and Los Angeles 2228 miles.

"From the standpoint of shipping, the mileage differences to Honolulu is extremely important. With a 12-knot ship that 318 miles lesser distance from San Francisco Bay over Seattle means a saving of one entire day; while the 137 miles lesser distance from San Francisco Bay over Los Angeles means a saving of nearly half a day. When these differences in mileage are reduced to airplane speeds, however, this gives the San Francisco Bay area a mere one hour advantage over Seattle, and less than one-half hour advantage over Los Angeles.

"Thus it can be seen that Metropolitan San Francisco's bid for its place in the post-war air is fraught with the keenest of competition. On its North is air-conscious Seattle; on its South, air-minded Los Angeles.

"These cities know about all there is to know about airplanes and aviation, while the communities comprising the San Francisco Bay area know little or nothing.

"Metropolitan San Francisco must pit her lack of knowledge of aviation against Seattle's and Los Angeles' thorough knowledge, to attain that mythical place on the post-war air map and become the Pacific Coast's main port of call in the coming air age, aided by that slim advantage of being one hour nearer by air to Honolulu than Seattle and one-half hour nearer than Los Angeles.

"If Metropolitan San Francisco is to be the leading terminal for trans-Pacific air transport and if she is to also handle the immense accumulation of domestic air commerce that will accompany the coming air age together with the individual number of airplanes that will be flown by our air-minded citizens, Metropolitan San Francisco must be ready with additional facilities. The combined existing airport facilities of San Francisco and Oakland cannot handle Metropolitan San Francisco's coming air traffic.

"The need for an additional major airport in the San Francisco Bay area, as is proposed by the Kaiser interests, is paramount. The sponsors of the Kaiser airport have established these standards for their project:

"1. The airport must be readily accessible to the main population centers. It must be located as to fulfill all requirements of the various jurisdictional federal agencies and comply with the mechanics of aviation.

"2. The airport must be suitable for the use of both land and sea planes.

"3. The airport must be planned to suit meteorological conditions.

"4. The site selected calls for the fill method of construction.

"5. Landing strips must be planned to serve future as well as present needs.

"6. Drainage must be provided.

"7. A lighting system must be provided.

"8. A terminal building must be provided.

"9. Hangars must be provided.

"10. A parking space must be provided.

"11. Financing is a public responsibility.

"12. The airport must be planned, as a whole, for the future."

and

Whereas, there is now under consideration a \$20,000,000 bond issue for improvements to the San Francisco Airport; and

Whereas, it is a matter of great importance that persons able to furnish pertinent information on airport matters should be invited by the Board of Supervisors to address said Board on this vital subject; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That Henry J. Kaiser be invited to address the Board of Supervisors on airport matters, particularly on the subject of the proposed \$20,000,000 airport bond issue now being considered by said Board; and be it

Further Resolved, That the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors be and is hereby authorized to invite Henry J. Kaiser to address the Board on said subject on July 2, 1945, at 3:00 p. m. or at the first Board meeting thereafter agreeable to Mr. Kaiser.

Adopted by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Brown, Colman, Gallagher, Green, MacPhee, Mancuso, Mead, Sullivan, Uhl—9.

Absent: Supervisors Gartland, Meyer—2.

Recess.

Supervisor MacPhee moved that the Board recess ten minutes. Seconded by Supervisor Green. Whereupon the roll was called and the motion to recess was defeated by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Green, MacPhee, Mancuso—3.

Noes: Supervisors Brown, Colman, Gallagher, Mead, Sullivan, Uhl—6.

Introduction of New Annual Salary Ordinance.

Supervisor Brown informed the Board that in his opinion the correct procedure would be to reintroduce a new annual salary ordinance and thereafter if the Board saw fit, amend it to take care of the eleven or twelve jobs that caused the difficulty. The Supervisor then moved suspension of the rules for the purpose of reintroducing the new Annual Salary Ordinance as an emergency measure. There was no second.

Assistant City Attorney Dion Holm informed the Board that he had deleted from the proposed new Annual Salary Ordinance powers which belonged to the Civil Service Commission but which legally belong to the Board of Supervisors. The Assistant City Attorney then went down the list with Mr. David Lewis, Administrative Assistant to the Mayor, and put in corrected figures in accordance with recommendations of the various department heads. Mr. Holm stated that all he did was to pick up a printed form of the Annual Salary Ordinance and made the necessary changes, and that he also attached an emergency clause.

Supervisor Brown thereupon moved suspension of the rules for the purpose of introducing the proposed new Annual Salary Ordinance with the changes outlined by Mr. Holm. Seconded by Mr. Colman. *No objection and so ordered.*

Mr. Holm called the Board's attention to the deletion in Section 1.3 after the words "by the employes is allocated" on the sixth line, the following: "or if no schedule of compensation has been adopted by the Board of Supervisors for such classification the person appointed to such position shall, pending adoption of a schedule of compensation for such class of positions by the Board of Supervisors, receive the entrance salary or wage proposed by the Civil Service Commission for such classification."

Mr. Holm explained to the Board that the deletion restored to the Board of Supervisors the power of fixing salaries for new positions and took such power away from the Civil Service Commission and that the language proposed to be deleted was contrary to the provisions of the Charter and should be stricken from Section 1.3.

Mr. Al Smith, representing the Bureau of Governmental Research, given the privilege of the floor, explained that when the Charter was adopted in 1930, there was no salary standardization. Section 151 set up the procedure for salary standardization. The appointing officer had the power to fix the rates pending salary standardization. Since that date, Section 151 was adopted and one of the provisions provided that when a new position is created, the Civil Service Commission shall, pending a successful salary survey, recommend salaries.

Assistant City Attorney Holm informed the Board that Section 71 of the Charter specifically recites that when new positions are created, their rates shall be fixed at the amounts recommended by the appointing heads and by the Board of Supervisors.

The Clerk read Section 71 of the Charter. Whereupon Supervisor Mancuso called Mr. Holm's attention to the fact that Section 151 definitely displaces Section 71.

Supervisor Green asked Mr. Holm if the Board, in passing the Annual Salary Ordinance as an emergency measure, had the right to raise salaries specified in the budget, to which Mr. Holm replied that the salary ordinance must conform to the Annual Appropriation Ordinance.

Mr. Henderson, representing the Civil Service Commission, informed the Board that the Civil Service Commission had no power

whatever to fix salaries; that the Commission was charged under Section 151 of the Charter to make recommendations to the Board of Supervisors which the Board had the power to either accept, amend or reject, and that Mr. Holm stated that Mr. Smith of the Bureau of Governmental Research had called his attention to certain provisions of Section 151 of the Charter, that the positions involved in this controversy were not new classifications but new positions. Mr. Henderson stated here, however, that such was not the case, that these were new classifications and do come under the provisions of Section 151 of the Charter.

Mr. Henderson went on to say: "Also that Mr. Holm stated that Section 71 of the Charter provides that salaries for new positions were subject to Section 71 of the Charter. That is not a fact either. Pending adoption of salary standardization, it was written to cover the period before we adopted salary standardization; therefore it governs only until that time and that is the way we were advised by the City Attorney in the past. I want to make it clear that these are new classifications and not new positions."

Mr. Holm, in speaking on the deletion of certain language in Section 1.3, informed the Board that if it was the Board's intention to leave the deleted language in the Annual Salary Ordinance, that by so doing, it was divesting itself of certain powers granted it under Section 71 of the Charter.

Supervisor Mancuso moved as a substitute, that the Board adopt the original Annual Salary Ordinance and the provisions for it. Seconded by Supervisor MacPhee.

Mr. Holm, speaking on the substitute, informed the Board that in adopting the substitute, it was creating an illegal salary ordinance; that the Board had set out in the budget and Annual Appropriation Ordinance salaries covering these disputed positions and that the Board was bound to follow the procedure set out in the two documents.

Supervisor MacPhee, in speaking on the substitute, stated that the motion made by Supervisor Mancuso was probably not the answer to the problem; that the proper course to pursue would be to rescind its previous action in sustaining the Mayor's veto and then move for a new vote on the matter; that if the veto is not upheld by the required number of votes, then the desired results would be accomplished.

Whereupon Supervisor Mancuso asked that his previous motion, with the consent of his second, be considered withdrawn. Supervisor MacPhee, who had previously seconded Supervisor Mancuso's motion, consented to withdraw his second. *No objection and so ordered.*

Supervisor Mancuso then moved that the Board rescind its previous action when it sustained the Mayor's veto. Seconded by Supervisor MacPhee.

Supervisor Mead stated that in his opinion the Board was wandering all over the lot on this matter; that its action to date lent the impression that the Board was unable to solve its own problems and respectfully suggested that the Board vote down Mr. Mancuso's motion and proceed on the matter properly before the Board, namely, the measure presented by Supervisor Brown.

Supervisor Brown, in speaking on the matter, informed the Board that in his opinion the best way out would be for the Board to reverse itself and vote to override the Mayor's veto and approve the new Annual Salary Ordinance with the emergency clause because to pass the measure in the usual way would entail going in the first part of July, around the 5th, before it would become effective and there

would be some question whether the employees could be paid for the entire month.

Whereupon the roll was called on Supervisor Mancuso's motion that the Board rescind its previous action when it sustained the Mayor's veto, and the motion was passed by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Brown, Colman, Gallagher, Gartland, MacPhee, Mancuso, Uhl—7.

Noes: Supervisors Green, Mead, Sullivan—3.

Absent: Supervisor Meyer—1.

Supervisor Mead raised a point of order as to what was now officially before the Board, to which the Chair replied that the Mayor's veto was the only thing before the Board.

Supervisor Mancuso stated that the Board was now in a position to override the Mayor's veto, thus adopting the Annual Salary Ordinance and in this way the civil service employees would be assured of receiving their pay on July 1st. It was the Supervisor's personal opinion that there would not be any court action if the Mayor's veto were overridden; however, if the Board adopted the Annual Salary Ordinance as proposed, the Supervisor ventured the opinion that court action would ensue because of such action being contrary to Section 151 of the Charter. The Supervisor asked the Board to be conservative and while he did not believe in overriding the Mayor in this case he believed he was justified in doing so.

Recess.

At this point, Supervisor MacPhee moved a five-minute recess. *No objection and so ordered.*

Supervisor MacPhee: Since consideration of this matter, it has been my observation that a smoke screen has been thrown around the salary ordinance, and that it has developed to the point that the Supervisors are giving away their powers. Those of us who are familiar with what we are doing here today recognize that no powers are being given away by the Supervisors and I resent any inference upon my intelligence because the ordinance is clear. The issue is this: Shall we pay the high bracket salaries recommended by the department heads or shall we accept the recommendations of the Civil Service Commission? In determining how to vote, whether to vote those high brackets or whether to pay the brackets recommended by the Civil Service Commission, I am confronted by one question. What do I know about these jobs? If you want to go ahead and prolong this issue, then I think we should not override the Mayor's veto, we should go into the ramifications and adopt a new ordinance. If you want a clean-cut budget, override the Mayor's veto, the issue is closed, the salary ordinance is behind us and it is finished. Our savings clause in the ordinance provides that if one salary is wrong, that does not throw the whole thing out. I am going to vote to override the Mayor's veto because that is the most expeditious way of handling the matter.

Supervisor Green: In your opinion, Mr. Holm, is the salary ordinance vetoed by the Mayor, illegal?

Mr. Holm: Yes, sir.

Supervisor Colman: That is Mr. Holm's opinion. Normally I would have liked to take the City Attorney's advice. Somehow or other I am not convinced that this thing is illegal and I think enough of the savings clause that I do not believe we are in any danger in passing the ordinance.

Supervisor Brown: In what respect is this ordinance illegal?

Mr. Holm: You have set out in your appropriation ordinance and in the budget a series of salaries to be paid these new positions. I will just read a paragraph to Mr. Colman, based upon an opinion of the Supreme Court, taken in considering your activities in creating fiscal procedure in conducting the affairs of this city. I quote to you this language from the case of *Sullivan vs. McKinley*, and it reads as follows:

“Once the budget is approved by the Board of Supervisors the fiscal program of the Annual Appropriation Ordinance and the Annual Salary Ordinance are automatically fixed beyond the power of change by any amendment.”

That is pretty clear-finding language. That is your program. You set out in the budget the salaries at given rates. You have passed the appropriation ordinance. You are now legally bound to pass the Annual Salary Ordinance. I hope I have made myself clear.

Supervisor Brown then inquired of Mr. Holm if the passage of the ordinance would jeopardize those salaries not in dispute, to which Mr. Holm stated that in his opinion they would be jeopardized.

Supervisor Brown: Is there not a savings clause in this ordinance?

In answering this query, Mr. Holm stated that the savings clause is a good one and while it is helpful, there is no assurance that it would prove a safeguard.

Whereupon the Chair explained the parliamentary procedure to be followed, to-wit: Shall the Mayor's veto be sustained? An “aye” vote sustains the Mayor's veto, a “No” vote overrides the Mayor's veto. The roll was then called and the vote read:

Ayes: Supervisors Green, Mead, Sullivan—3.

Noes: Supervisors Brown, Colman, Gallagher, Gartland, MacPhee, Mancuso, Uhl—7.

Absent: Supervisor Meyer—1.

Before the roll call was announced by the Clerk, Supervisor MacPhee changed his vote from “No” to “Aye” and moved for immediate reconsideration. Seconded by Supervisor Brown. The roll call then stood at 4 “Ayes” and 6 “Noes.”

Supervisor Brown then moved the suspension of the rules for the purpose of immediate reconsideration. Seconded by Supervisor MacPhee.

A ten-minute recess was then moved by Supervisor Brown, seconded by Supervisor Gartland, to which Supervisor Mead objected. The roll was called on the motion to recess and it *carried* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Brown, Colman, Gallagher, Gartland, Mancuso, Uhl—6.

Noes: Supervisors Green, MacPhee, Mead, Sullivan—4.

Absent—Supervisor Meyer—1.

Supervisor Mead moved call of the Board, seconded by Supervisor Sullivan. The roll was called and the motion *carried* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Brown, Colman, Gallagher, Gartland, MacPhee, Mancuso, Uhl—7.

Noes: Supervisors Green, Mead, Sullivan—3.

Absent: Supervisor Meyer—1.

The Clerk then read the Mayor's veto message.

At the conclusion of the reading, Supervisor Mead exhorted the Board to sustain the Mayor's veto, calling to its attention the statement of the City Attorney to the effect that by overriding the veto, an illegal document would be adopted.

Supervisor Brown, in commenting on the ordinance, informed the Board that it was in a dilemma; that in adopting the ordinance introduced by him, it would not solve matters in that he was not sure that the measure would receive the nine votes necessary to pass it as an emergency ordinance; that then it would have to be passed in the regular way which would mean that it would not become effective until July 5 and that there would be considerable doubt as to what the Controller can or will do with regard to city salaries; therefore, he felt that in overriding the Mayor's veto, it would produce the least inconvenience to the most number of people.

The question was then put by the Chair: Shall the Mayor's veto be now sustained? An "Aye" vote sustains, a "No" vote overrides. The roll was then called and the Mayor's veto was *sustained* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Green, Mead, Sullivan—3.

Noes: Supervisors Brown, Colman, Gallagher, Gartland, MacPhee, Mancuso, Uhl—7.

Absent: Supervisors Meyer—1.

Supervisor Mancuso then moved that the Board recess until June 14 at 10:00 a. m. and issue a call of the Board. Seconded by Supervisor Brown. Objection was raised by Supervisor Mead and the motion *carried* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Brown, Colman, Gallagher, Gartland, Green, MacPhee, Mancuso, Uhl—8.

Noes: Supervisors Mead, Sullivan—2.

Absent: Supervisor Meyer—1.

RECESS.

The Board recessed at 5:10 p. m. to meet again on Thursday, June 14, 1945, at 10:00 a. m.

THURSDAY, JUNE 14, 1945—10 A. M.

In Board of Supervisors, Thursday, June 14, 1945, the Board met in recess session at 11:30 a. m. for further consideration of the Annual Salary Ordinance for the fiscal year 1945-46.

CALLING THE ROLL.

The roll was called and the following Supervisors were noted present:

Supervisors Brown, Colman, Gallagher, Gartland, Green, MacPhee, Mancuso, Mead, Meyer, Sullivan, Uhl—11.

President Dan Gallagher presiding.

Supervisor Colman moved that the Board rescind its action with regard to the Mayor's veto. Seconded by Supervisor Brown.

Supervisor Brown stated that with the consent of his second, he would withdraw his original motion reintroducing a new Annual Salary Ordinance. Supervisor MacPhee, who had seconded Supervisor Brown's motion for the introduction of a new Annual Salary Ordinance, consented to such withdrawal.

Supervisor Green: Point of information. If the action is rescinded, where do we stand then?

The Chair: We will then have the Mayor's veto before us.

Whereupon the roll was called on motion to rescind and it was carried by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Brown, Colman, Gallagher, Gartland, MacPhee, Mancuso, Meyer, Uhl—8.

Noes: Supervisors Green, Mead, Sullivan—3.

Supervisor Brown: I will make a brief statement for the benefit of Supervisor Meyer. The situation is this: The Mayor vetoed the salary ordinance and returned it to us with his veto. The Mayor's veto was sustained; however, we recessed until Tuesday and then until today. Therefore, we have the right to rescind any action we desire. The Mayor vetoed the salary ordinance because there were 11 or 12 positions, newly created, for which the Civil Service Commission had established rates of pay which were less than the rates of pay set forth in the budget. The City Attorney took the position that the rate of pay for these positions had to be the same as in the budget. The City Attorney made the statement here that there was a savings clause in the ordinance which read that in the event any individual item in the salary ordinance was disputed, it would not affect the validity of the rest of the ordinance. My point of view is that if we override the Mayor's veto we would reestablish the salary ordinance as the law and the only salaries in danger would be the jobs not yet filled. Mr. Holm stated that while the savings clause was in there, there might possibly be some court action. On the other hand, if we try to pass a new salary ordinance, the new salary ordinance showing the rates as set forth in the budget, then there might be a possibility that no salaries would be paid for the first four or five days in July due to the necessary time to pass the salary ordinance.

Supervisor MacPhee, in commenting on the subject, informed the Board that the Finance Committee had conducted extensive hearings on the budget, and that when the Annual Salary Ordinance came up for consideration, the committee asked the City Attorney for an opinion as to its legality and that said opinion was received in writing; furthermore, the committee asked the City Attorney to have a representative at the meeting of the Board of Supervisors when the Annual Salary Ordinance came up for consideration so that questions could be answered, if necessary, and that questions were asked and the Board was told that the document was legal; that now, the Board is told that the document is illegal; that in his opinion there is greater jeopardy in passing a new salary ordinance than in overriding the Mayor's veto.

Supervisor Green: Mr. Holm, in your opinion, is there more jeopardy in passing a new salary ordinance than in overriding the Mayor's veto and sustaining the original salary ordinance?

In replying to the above query, Mr. Holm stated that any action on the salary ordinance would be a matter for legislative determination; that certain errors must be corrected; that in the case of *Sullivan vs. McKinley*, it developed that once the budget and the appropriation ordinance were adopted that those two documents were the factors governing the fiscal procedure for the ensuing year; that the Board committed an error in not carrying out in the salary ordinance what it had indicated in the appropriation ordinance and the budget; that the Board was not conducting itself legally when it failed to carry out what it had set forth in the budget and appropriation ordinance.

The Assistant City Attorney then put this question to the Board: Do you care to pay attention to what the Supreme Court has stated, that your budget and appropriation ordinance are the documents by which you conduct your fiscal affairs? If you do, the proper thing to do is to now submit a new and proper salary ordinance. You should

put into the ordinance all the corrections that were reflected in the budget and appropriation ordinance, pass it first as an ordinary ordinance and then reintroduce it as an emergency.

Supervisor Mead: We should sustain the Mayor's veto. The new salary ordinance complies with the budget and appropriation ordinance. I certainly think the City Attorney's office has made a very thorough explanation of this matter. I think and every thinking person on this Board will agree with me that in accepting legal advice, we should accept it from those who are in a legal position. The City Attorney's office are our legal advisers and I have to be guided by the suggestion of the City Attorney's representative, Mr. Holm.

Supervisor MacPhee then called the Board's attention to the fact that when the Finance Committee was considering the advisability of paying operators of the Municipal Railway 10 per cent overtime for four of duty between the hours of 7:30 p. m. and 4:30 a. m., the City Attorney's office was asked for a legal opinion on the matter and it was six weeks before an answer was forthcoming.

Supervisor Brown quoted a part of Section 73 of the Charter, reading as follows: ". . . which ordinance shall be passed or amended at the same time as the annual or supplemental appropriation ordinance is passed. . . ." and questioned the right of the Board to pass another Annual Salary Ordinance at this time instead of overriding the Mayor's veto.

Supervisor Brown: Mr. Holm, in your opinion, has the Mayor the right to veto the ordinance?

Mr. Holm: The Mayor has the right to veto any ordinance.

The Chair then put the question before the Board: Shall Bill 3491 become a law, notwithstanding the Mayor's veto? An "aye" vote overrides the Mayor's veto; a "no vote" sustains the veto.

Whereupon the roll was called and the Mayor's veto was *sustained* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Brown, Colman, Gallagher, Gartland, MacPhee, Mancuso, Uhl—7.

Noes: Supervisors Green, Mead, Meyer, Sullivan—4.

Supervisor Brown moved that the Board recess until 2:00 p. m. Seconded by Supervisor Gartland. Brown then withdrew the motion with the consent of his second.

Whereupon Supervisor Green moved that the Board recess until 2:00 p. m. Seconded by Supervisor Mancuso. Supervisor Mead objected. The roll was then called and the motion to recess until 2:00 p. m. was *defeated* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Gartland, Green, Mancuso—3.

Noes: Supervisors Brown, Colman, Gallagher, MacPhee, Mead, Meyer, Sullivan, Uhl—8.

Supervisor Colman: I move suspension of the rules so that we may consider the adoption of the salary ordinance as corrected and with the emergency clause.

Motion seconded by Supervisor Mead. *No objection and so ordered.*

Supervisor Colman: I move approval of this salary ordinance with the emergency provision as presented here, which, as I understand it, shows the necessary corrections to conform with the Mayor's

veto and to conform with the opinion of the City Attorney and the budget.

Seconded by Supervisor Brown.

Mr. Holm: If for any reason, and irrespective of whether it passes with the emergency clause, you should thereupon reenact the salary ordinance without the emergency clause as well. I am trying to safeguard an error which this Board made. Irrespective of whose error it was, there is an error existing and I am telling you that by taking the additional precaution of passing a regular ordinance, you are safeguarding all of the employees and by passing it as an emergency ordinance you take up whatever slack may occur from July 1st until the time the regular ordinance takes effect.

Supervisor Colman: Members of the Board, you know how I stand on this thing; I would have preferred the other way of doing it, but the Mayor's veto stands sustained and although it is true that a majority of the Board, namely 7 to 4, thought as I did, yet not enough members thought the way we thought and sustained the Mayor's veto. Therefore, I want a salary ordinance passed. In my opinion we must pass it. I do not believe in obstructionist tactics. I won't be a party to preventing the employees from receiving their money promptly and on time. The first matter before us is with the emergency clause. I shall certainly vote for it. Now, the responsibility for voting against it rests entirely upon those who vote against it. I feel this action is absolutely necessary under these conditions. I am enough of a realist to realize that and will try my best to accomplish the desired results and if unable to accomplish them, will not do anything to obstruct it but will try the next best thing.

Supervisor Brown: I feel strictly as before, that this was the proper course to follow but the fact remains we did not manage to secure the necessary number of votes. Now we are faced with a situation where the salary ordinance must be passed in some form or other. I certainly feel that this is not the time to obstruct its passage. The stakes are too high, the responsibility too much. I think today is possibly the last day we can pass it. While I should not make this statement, in fairness to all concerned, we have been poorly advised through this whole budget proceeding. We have been told one thing one time and another thing another time. Mr. Holm, for whom I have the greatest personal regard, made the statement here which I resent very much, that the Board of Supervisors made a mistake. The Board did not make a mistake. The responsibility is not here in the Board of Supervisors. I hope the Board will accept this statement for what it is worth and get this matter behind them. I am voting for the salary ordinance reluctantly because I do not feel it is the proper method to follow.

Supervisor Mancuso: I am definitely going to vote against it. I sincerely believe in overruling the City Attorney's opinion. We do not know where we are. We are told the salary ordinance must be passed on May 26th. Now we are told we can pass one now. Which one is correct? In my opinion the City Attorney's office is for the purpose of giving us information. We should make up our own opinion. If you pass this ordinance before you, it is going to be declared unconstitutional and you are going to jeopardize the employees' salaries and I am not going to be a party to it. If you do not adopt the proposed ordinance, and go back and override the Mayor's veto, there are only 12 jobs possibly in dispute, the rest will receive their pay on July 1st.

Mr. Henderson: I want to call attention to two items in the proposed salary ordinance..

Supervisor MacPhee: I want to state my position with respect to approving this matter before you. We should not allow ourselves to be irked by the statement that the Supervisors were responsible for the condition. We are told today that the ordinance is wrong by the City Attorney's office and that in spite of the fact that the Charter tells us we're right. We are told to pass a new ordinance and the Charter says you can't and the rules say you can't. I am confused and have to depend upon the Charter. I do not see how you can do anything less than to jeopardize the employees' salaries. Until I can be better advised and hear from the Controller, I shall vote against this proposal because I think it is foolhardy. However, I am going to move an amendment to the salary ordinance so that there will be twelve holidays in the salary ordinance this year; after the word "Day" on the twelfth line, insert the following: 'and any day on which the general municipal election is held.' *No objection and so ordered.*

Supervisor Colman: Does the provision include any additional holiday?

Mr. Holm: If any of them fall on a Sunday, the following Monday is declared a holiday.

Whereupon the roll was called on Supervisor MacPhee's amendment to Section 2.4 of the Annual Salary Ordinance and it was approved by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Brown, Colman, Gallagher, Gartland, Green, MacPhee, Mancuso, Mead, Meyer, Sullivan, Uhl—11.

Supervisor Mancuso moved that the Board recess until 2:30 p. m. Seconded by Supervisor Brown.

Whereupon the roll was called and it showed the following:

Ayes: Supervisors Brown, Gartland, Green, Mancuso, Uhl—5.

Noes: Supervisors Colman, Gallagher, MacPhee, Mead, Meyer, Sullivan—6.

Before the result of the roll call was announced, President of the Board Gallagher changed his vote from "No" to "Aye" and the roll call then stood, 6 ayes and 5 noes. Motion *carried*. Board recessed until 2:30 p. m.

The Board convened at 2:30 p. m., all members present.

Supervisor MacPhee called the Board's attention to the fact that the Juvenile Court's funds as set up in the Controller's budget is different from the amount set up in the Mayor's budget. He called specific attention to the position of T-33 Group Supervisor, Boys' Ranch School, and moved that the amount as set up in the budget shall be the amount to be included in the salary ordinance. Seconded by Supervisor Brown.

Whereupon the roll was called on the Annual Salary Ordinance as amended.

Ayes: Supervisors Brown, Colman, Gallagher, Gartland, Green, Mead, Meyer, Sullivan—8.

Noes: Supervisors MacPhee, Mancuso, Uhl—3.

Before the result of the foregoing roll call was announced, Supervisor Mead changed his vote from "aye" to "no" and served notice of immediate reconsideration. Seconded by Supervisor Brown. The roll call then stood 7 ayes and 4 noes.

Supervisor Mead then moved for suspension of the rules for the

purpose of immediate reconsideration. Seconded by Supervisor Sullivan.

Supervisor Brown: I want to call to the attention of the Board members that opposition to this matter is a very serious thing. If the emergency clause fails to pass there will be a hiatus of 5 days within which no salaries may be paid. I hope that some of the members who voted against the ordinance will vote for it.

Supervisor Mead thereupon moved for immediate reconsideration. Seconded by Supervisor Sullivan.

Supervisor Mead: We were within one vote of adopting this salary ordinance. We have had three days of discussion. At the outset seven members of the Board felt different than they are feeling now. It seems to me that there isn't a member who is not sincere and who desires to jeopardize the employees' wages. We are pretty close together. In view of the fact that eight members of the Board saw fit to vote for this proposal, it is not unfair to ask for unanimous approval of this ordinance. I ask in the spirit of cooperation and decency and on behalf of the employees of the City and County of San Francisco, that we receive at this time the unanimous vote of the Board in connection with this matter.

Supervisor Mancuso: I will go along on this basis. We have a salary ordinance vetoed by the Mayor. I will go along on the basis that we override the Mayor's veto and the ordinance immediately becomes a valid ordinance. Then we have the right to amend the salary ordinance. Then there can be an amendment by those favorable to it, to amend the salary ordinance, to conform to the salaries set up in the budget. There can be a second amendment submitted for the purpose of amending the provisions of the salary ordinance to delete portion of Section 1.3, which will conform with the other request of the Mayor. Both of those can be passed as emergency measures and there can be no question of anybody's salary being in jeopardy.

Supervisor Colman: The only thing to do today is to get passage for second reading if we fail to get the emergency clause passed. If we receive six votes, we can adjourn the meeting and wait until final passage and I am convinced that the Controller will pay the employees, so I suggest we take definite action on the emergency and if it fails, I will then move the other and that is all we can do today, as I see it.

Supervisor MacPhee: I move to a point of personal privilege. I want the opinion of the City Attorney on the point that Supervisor Mancuso has raised before taking a vote on the matter.

Supervisor Uhl: I do not want to jeopardize salaries of the employees, but I am opposed to six or seven positions. They are not filled at this time and no consideration should be given those particular jobs. When they are filled, they will know what the salaries will be.

Supervisor Colman: Your statement is a good one. I would rather have those jobs standardized and the salaries recommended to the Board by the Civil Service Commission and then approve or reject them, but at the moment it cannot be done, apparently because the City Attorney so states, and here we are, unable to do it. When the Civil Service Commission catches up and holds examinations the scale for the jobs will come before us for our approval. The jobs are not created yet so the gain is very small in proportion to the fifteen thousand others. It is really not right to penalize those who are practically dependent upon the twice-a-month paycheck. I would

not want to have it on my conscience, with their wives and families and no paycheck.

Supervisor Mancuso: Mr. Holm, it is my thought that there is some question as to our rights to pass a new salary ordinance at this time; that the first step and a proper step would be to override the Mayor's veto and then by overriding the Mayor's veto, the salary ordinance would automatically become law. Then we can introduce amendments to the salary ordinance so that the affected positions can conform to the amounts set up in the budget. The second move would be to delete Section 1.3. Then there would be no question on the validity of the ordinance on May 26, 1945, and the employees' salaries would be paid.

Mr. Holm: That is a new suggestion entirely. Let us assume someone did attack the salary ordinance and it was in the same shape as originally passed. Now you have overridden the Mayor's veto. They pick up the record and see the various steps. You have sustained the Mayor's veto three times. Consistently you have made your moves to override the veto. The Court would most likely say, "What is the matter with the legislative body, it acts so differently in the short space of time in considering the matter!" This throws a cloud on the proceedings. I do not favor that method. First of all, you have no assurance that you are going to amend your salary ordinance to conform to the budget. I think the safer course for you to pursue would be to come out and defend this ordinance as I have outlined it to you.

Supervisor Mancuso: In view of the opinion of the City Attorney's office, I will go along and vote for this emergency but want the record to show that I am not voting for it because I think it is good procedure but because there must not be insincerity. I still believe the proper procedure would have been to override the Mayor's veto and then amend the salary ordinance to conform to the requirements recommended by the City Attorney's office.

Supervisor MacPhee: I want to make one or two more observations. I have expressed my position in this matter many times and do not think it is necessary to repeat many of the statements that have been said. I am inclined to believe that the last recommendation of Supervisor Mancuso is the proper thing to do. I think that after the veto has been overridden and amendments added to the salary ordinance, we would have a document beyond reproach; I think we would have an ordinance properly amended. However, it has been pointed out that the Board desires unanimous vote on this matter and it is important to have at least nine votes for the emergency passage. For that reason I will vote for it. I want the statements that I have made made part of the record.

Mr. Holm: My office does not subscribe to any figures in the budget.

Mr. Henderson: I want to say this: I will approve the salaries in the salary ordinance providing they are the same as appropriated in the budget.

Final Passage.

Supervisor MacPhee moved that the proposed Annual Salary Ordinance as amended to conform with the budget and Annual Appropriation Ordinance and with the emergency clause attached, be finally passed. Seconded by Supervisor Meyer. Whereupon the roll was called and the Annual Salary Ordinance, as follows, was *Finally Passed* by the following vote:

ANNUAL SALARY ORDINANCE

Fiscal Year Ending June 30, 1946

Bill No. 3510, Ordinance No. 3313 (Series of 1939), as follows:

An ordinance enumerating all positions continued and/or created by the Board of Supervisors in adopting the Annual Budget and Appropriation Ordinance for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1946; continuing, and/or creating and/or establishing these positions; enumerating and including therein all positions established under the San Francisco Unified School District and all positions created by Charter or State law for which compensations are paid from City and County funds and appropriated in the Annual Appropriation Ordinance; authorizing appointments or continuation of appointments thereto; specifying and fixing the compensations and work schedules thereof; and authorizing appointments to temporary positions and fixing compensations therefor. An emergency ordinance.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco, as follows:

Section 1. Establishment and/or Creation and/or Continuation of Positions: In accordance with the provisions of Section 73 of the Charter, the positions hereinafter enumerated under the respective departments are hereby created and/or established and/or continued for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1946. Positions created or authorized by Charter or State law and positions established under the San Francisco Unified School District compensations for which are paid from City and County funds and appropriated in the Annual Appropriation Ordinance are enumerated and included herein.

The word "position" or "positions" as used in this ordinance shall be construed to include "office" or "offices" and the word "employee" or "employees" shall be construed to include "officer" or "officers."

Section 1.1. Appointments and Vacancies—Permanent Positions: Appointing officers as specified in the Charter are hereby authorized, subject to the provisions of this ordinance, to make or continue appointments as needed during the fiscal year to permanent positions enumerated in their respective sections of this ordinance. Such appointments shall be made in accordance with the civil service provisions of the Charter. The Civil Service Commission shall be notified immediately of any change in the duties of a position herein established or of a vacancy occurring in a position herein enumerated. Appointing officers shall not make an appointment to a vacancy in a permanent position until the Mayor shall approve the requisition for such service. The requisition for such service shall be filed with the Civil Service Commission and if the proposed employment and compensation are legally authorized as herein provided, the secretary of the commission shall so certify and shall promptly transmit the requisition to the Controller and if funds are available for the compensation of the proposed employment he shall so certify and shall promptly transmit the requisition to the Mayor for his approval.

Section 1.2. Appointments—Temporary Positions: Temporary appointments to positions defined by the rules of the Civil Service Commission as seasonal or temporary positions may be made by the respective appointing officers in excess of the number of permanent positions herein established or enumerated and such other temporary services as required at rates not in excess of salary standardization schedules if funds have been appropriated and are available for such temporary service. Such appointments shall be made in accordance with the civil service provisions of the Charter. No appointment to such temporary or seasonal position shall be made until the Mayor shall approve the requisition for such service. The requisition for filling such a position shall first be filed with the Civil Service Commission and if the proposed employment and the compensation are legally authorized as herein provided, the secretary of the commis-

sion shall so certify and shall promptly transmit the requisition to the Controller and if the funds are available for the compensation of the proposed employment, he shall so certify and shall promptly transmit the requisition to the Mayor for his approval. No such appointment shall continue beyond the period for which the Controller has certified the availability of funds.

Section 1.3 Compensation at Entrance to Municipal Service: Any employee entering the municipal service in any position, the compensation for which is subject to the salary standardization provisions of the Charter as set forth in Section 151 therein, shall be paid the entrance rate fixed for the classification in the schedules of compensation adopted by the Board of Supervisors pursuant to the provisions of Section 151 of the Charter to which the position occupied by the employee is allocated; provided that where an existing position in the municipal service has heretofore been exempt from the salary standardization provisions of the Charter and becomes subject thereto, or where a new position becomes subject to salary standardization provisions of the Charter by reason of the acquisition of a public utility, the employee holding such position shall, for the purpose of determining the salary or wage to which such employee is entitled under the schedules of compensations, be credited with prior service had in such position immediately prior to such change in the status of the position provided that there was no interruption in the service of the employee at the time of such change in the status of the position.

Section 1.4. Compensation Adjustments: Compensations of all employees under permanent appointment whose compensations are subject to salary standardization provisions of the Charter shall be adjusted on July 1, 1945, to the amount that such employees are entitled to receive under the schedules of compensation adopted by the Board of Supervisors pursuant to the provisions of Section 151 of the Charter in accordance with their years of service as therein provided and calculated as set forth in Section 1.3 hereof, and shall thereafter be in accord therewith, subject, however, to the provisions of Sections 1.3 and 1.5 hereof. For the purpose of determining the salary or wage to which former employees of the Market Street Railway are entitled under the schedules of compensation and this ordinance, continuous service with the said Market Street Railway immediately prior to September 29, 1944, shall be credited and considered in the same manner as service with the City and County, provided that such prior service was in the same position in which the employee is engaged in the City and County service, and provided that there was no interruption in the service of the employee when the City and County acquired control of the Market Street Railway properties.

Salary adjustments based on years of service as provided in the schedules of compensation shall be effective and due on the first of the month following the anniversary of the date of permanent appointment of the employee to his current position, subject to the provisions of Sections 1.3 and 1.5 hereof, provided that platform men employed in the Municipal Railway shall receive salary adjustments during the fiscal year in accordance with their service as provided in the schedules of compensation, such service to be calculated as provided in Section 1.3 hereof. No employee shall receive a salary adjustment as herein provided unless he shall have actually rendered service in his position for the major portion of the year preceding the anniversary of his appointment on which the increment otherwise accrues, provided that absence of an employee on approved military leave or the absence of an employee from his regular civil service position by reason of holding a promotive position in the City and County service shall not be deemed absence from service for the purpose of computing salary adjustments, and periods of such absence shall be credited in the same manner as actual service rendered.

Section 1.5. Compensation Upon Promotion or Transfer or Re-employment: An employee appointed to a position in a promotive

classification who received in his former position a salary equal to or more than the entrance salary provided under the salary standardization schedules for such promotive classification shall enter such promotive classification at that salary fixed for such promotive class in the schedules of compensation which is immediately in excess of the salary which the employee received prior to his appointment to such promotive classification, provided that such employee shall receive no further increments until such time as his service in the promotive classification shall entitle him to further increase as provided in Section 1.4 hereof, and provided further, that an employee appointed during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1945, to a position in a promotive classification who received in his former position a salary equal to or more than the entrance salary provided under the salary standardization schedules for such promotive classification, shall receive, commencing July 1, 1945, that salary fixed for such promotive class in the schedule of compensation which is immediately in excess of the salary which the employee received prior to his appointment to such promotive classification, provided that such employee shall receive no further increments until such time as his service in the promotive classification shall entitle him to further increase as provided in Section 1.4 hereof.

An employee transferred in accordance with Civil Service Commission rules from one department to another, but in the same classification, shall transfer at his current salary, provided, that if the current salary is in excess of the maximum fixed in the salary standardization schedules for the classification to which he is appointed, he shall be reduced to such maximum.

An employee who has acquired permanent status in a position and who is laid off because of lack of work or funds and is re-employed in the same position after such lay off shall be paid a salary or wage which shall include credits for actual service in such position from date of permanent appointment in the position to date of lay off therefrom.

Section 1.6. Compensation for Intermittent or Temporary Service: Employees in positions for which compensations are fixed in the schedules of compensation adopted by the Board of Supervisors pursuant to the provisions of Section 151 of the Charter on a monthly basis whose regular work schedule is eight hours per day but less than five days per week, and all temporary employees whose compensations are fixed in the said schedules of compensation on a monthly basis, shall be paid for each day of work a daily wage derived by dividing the monthly compensation by the factor 20.75 days.

Section 1.7. Normal Work Schedule for Employees Whose Compensations Are Fixed on a Monthly Basis: A normal work day for employees whose compensations are fixed in the schedule of compensations on a monthly basis shall consist of a tour of duty of eight hours work completed within nine hours and a normal work week shall consist of such tours of duty on each of five consecutive days a week. Provided, however, that in departments that do not have normal seven-day operation, normal work week shall consist of such tours of duty on each Monday through Friday, inclusive. The compensations fixed in the schedules of compensations adopted by the Board of Supervisors pursuant to the provisions of Section 151 of the Charter on a monthly basis are in full payment for services rendered during a calendar month under this normal work schedule. Other than the occupants of the positions specified in Sections 1.8 to 1.37, inclusive hereof, or as provided in Section 2 hereof, no officer nor employee shall be required to work more than the normal work schedule.

Section 1.8. Exceptions to Normal Work Schedule for Which Extra Compensation Is Not Authorized: In order that there shall be no diminution of service to the public it shall be the duty of the head

of each department to arrange and assign the work of his department so that sufficient employees will be on duty on Saturday morning in each department which is required to be open on Saturday morning for the conduct of public business, provided that time worked on Saturday morning by employees on a normal work week schedule shall be compensated by equal time off in the same or succeeding week, provided also that employees whose positions are allocated to the classes included in Division R—Recreation Service, and employees whose positions are allocated in Division X—Library Service, may at the discretion of the appointing officer work the 40-hour schedule within six days without additional compensation or time off, and provided further that occupants of the following positions shall work such hours as may be necessary for the full and proper performance of their duties and shall receive no additional compensation for work in excess of eight hours per day for five days per week but, subject to rule of the Civil Service Commission, may be granted time off not to exceed the time worked in excess of forty hours per week:

Section 1.9. Exceptions to Normal Work Schedules (44 or 48-Hour Work Week for Specified Employments) for Which Compensation Is Authorized and Provision Therefor: Appointing officers may require occupants of the positions specified in Sections 1.10 to 1.35 hereof, inclusive, to regularly work a tour of duty on six days of the week, which tours of duty shall be eight hours per day for each of five days and may be four or eight hours on the sixth day as set forth in said sections. Occupants of such positions who regularly work tours of duty of four hours on the sixth day as specified therein shall be compensated for such four hours of work on the 6th day of the week at straight time, that is, 10 per cent of the compensation of the employee for the normal work schedule. Occupants of such positions who regularly work tours of duty of eight hours on the sixth day as specified therein shall be compensated for such sixth day of work at straight time, that is, 20 per cent of the compensation for a normal work schedule. Exceptions to the normal work schedule as provided in this section shall not be authorized by appointing officers unless funds for the compensation thereof are provided.

Section 1.36. At the discretion of the respective appointing officers, employees of the following offices may be required to work a four or eight-hour tour of duty on Saturday and such Saturday work shall be compensated as provided in Section 1.9 hereof:

In the office of the Assessor, during the months of March, April, May and June; in the office of the Registrar of Voters, one month beginning three weeks before the close of registration prior to each election; and in the office of the Tax Collector, November 1st to December 20th, March 1st to May 15th, and during the month of August, and the staff of the License Bureau and cashiers in the Tax Collector's office during the months of July and January. Exceptions to the normal work schedule as provided in this section shall not be authorized by appointing officers unless funds for the compensation thereof are provided.

Section 1.37. **Exceptions to Normal Work Schedules (48 Hour Work Week for Specified Classifications) for Which Extra Compensation Is Authorized and Provision Therefor:** Appointing officers may require all occupants of positions allocated to the classifications specified in this section to work tours of duty of eight hours on six days of the week, or a total work week of 48 hours. Occupants of such positions who regularly work tours of duty of eight hours six days per week shall be compensated for such sixth day of work at straight time, that is, twenty per cent of the compensation for a normal work schedule. Exceptions to the normal work schedule as provided in this section shall not be authorized by appointing officers unless funds for the compensation thereof are provided.

Section 1.38. Exceptions to Normal Work Schedule—Part Time Services: Except as provided in Sections 1.8 and 2.1 hereof a tour of duty of less than eight hours' work a day for employees whose compensation is fixed on a monthly basis shall be considered part-time employment, and compensation therefor shall be fixed herein at a rate based upon the full time rate for the classification, proportionate to the hours worked, with due regard to seniority of service, provided that these provisions shall not apply to physicians employed in their professional capacity on a call basis or on a regular consultant basis. Positions occupied by part-time employees other than those on night shifts having a tour of duty of seven and one-half hours, shall be recorded as such by a department head, only with the approval of the Civil Service Commission and, when so recorded shall be noted as part-time on payrolls, budget estimates, salary ordinance and similar documents.

Section 2. Emergency Overtime and Compensation Therefor: It is the policy of the City and County to establish a five-day 40-hour week work schedule for its employees insofar as feasible, as set forth in Section 1.7 hereof. Whenever circumstances or exigencies of the service demand, appointing officers, subject to the provisions of this section, may require employees to work longer than eight hours per day or longer than the normal work schedules established under Section 1.7 hereof or longer than the exceptions authorized under Sections 1.8 to 1.37 hereof. Any time worked under proper authorization of the appointing officer by an employee, exclusive of part-time employees, whose compensations are subject to the provisions of Section 151 of the Charter and fixed in the schedules of compensation on a monthly basis in excess of the regular work schedule of employees as fixed in the said sections or as authorized under Section 1.8 hereof shall be designated as emergency overtime and shall be compensated at one and one-half times the rate of compensation fixed herein for the normal work schedule, provided that compensation for such emergency overtime shall be based on a maximum compensation of \$250 per month for the normal work schedule, and provided further, that no compensation as provided in this section for emergency overtime shall be paid for the purpose of keeping City or County or City and County offices and departments open on Saturday morning.

Appointing officers shall not authorize or permit employees to work emergency overtime as provided in this section unless funds are available for paying the compensations of employees performing such emergency overtime work, or unless an actual emergency exists as defined by law. When so authorized by the appointing officer the emergency overtime worked shall be recorded separately on time-rolls opposite the name of the employee and the facts and circumstances warranting or requiring the overtime work shall be clearly set forth thereon. The Civil Service Commission shall submit to the Board of Supervisors a monthly report showing the amount of extra compensation paid to employees for emergency overtime work each month under the provisions of this section.

No employee shall be paid for emergency overtime worked as herein provided unless the duties performed by him during such overtime work are included in the classification in which the employee is regularly and legally serving, provided that when work in a department has to be completed within time limitation fixed by law, and the Civil Service Commission determines that no unemployed person or persons in the classification involved are available to perform the work and approves the assignment of employees of a different classification in that department or from other departments to perform the work under the provisions of Section 141 of the Charter, said employees may be compensated for such emergency overtime at rates of pay for their regular civil service classification.

Compensation for emergency overtime worked as provided in this

section shall be paid on an hourly basis. The Civil Service Commission shall cause a schedule of hourly rates to be established for the purpose of computing hourly rates of pay, and this schedule shall be in accordance with the provisions of Section 151 of the Charter and shall be the basis of computing compensation for emergency overtime worked.

If and when the Civil Service Commission determines that overtime payments in a department are excessive and finds that the required work can be performed to better advantage and more economically than through overtime work, the Civil Service Commission shall so report to the Board of Supervisors in order that the Board of Supervisors may consider the advisability of establishing additional employments in such departments or take such other action as may be deemed advisable.

Compensations fixed in the schedules of compensation on a per diem basis and converted and included herein on a monthly basis shall be subject to the provisions of this section.

Section 2.01. Overtime Payment for Members of Police and Fire Departments and Compensations Therefor: Under the provision of Section 35.5½ of the Charter, salary warrants for extra time served by members of the Police Department shall be payable from the regular salary appropriation of the Police Department or from any appropriation made for such purpose, and at no time shall extra compensation be authorized or paid in amounts exceeding the available unencumbered balance in any such appropriation.

Under the provisions of Section 36.1 of the Charter, salary warrants for extra time served by officers and members of the uniformed force of the Fire Department shall be payable from the regular appropriation of said uniformed force, and at no time shall extra compensation be authorized or paid in amounts exceeding the available unencumbered balance in said appropriation.

Section 2.1. Night Shift Work and Extra Compensation Therefor: A night shift is a tour of duty of 7½ hours work completed within 8½ hours or 8 hours work completed within 9 hours, which tour of duty commences after 2 p. m. and prior to 6 a. m. Employees whose compensations are fixed herein on a monthly basis who are regularly required to work a night shift of 7½ hours shall be paid the same amount of compensation as for 8 hours work on a normal day schedule and employees regularly required to work a night shift of 8 hours shall be paid 6¼ per cent more than the amount to which they are otherwise entitled. This provision shall not apply to employees whose compensations are fixed herein on a per diem or hourly basis

Section 2.2. Split Shift Work and Compensation Therefor: A tour of duty of 8 hours work completed within 11 hours but extended over more than 9 hours shall be considered a split shift. There shall be only one split in any shift. Employees required to work a split shift shall be paid 50 cents per day above the compensation to which they are otherwise entitled. This provision shall not apply to employees whose compensations are fixed herein on a per diem or hourly basis.

Section 2.3. Work Performed Under Contract and Compensation Therefor: In the execution and performance of any contract awarded to a city department under the provisions of Sections 95 and 98 of the Charter the rates fixed herein shall not apply to employments engaged therein and in lieu thereof not less than the highest general prevailing rate of wages in private employment for similar work, as fixed by a resolution of the Board of Supervisors and in effect at the time of the award of said contract, shall be paid to employees performing work under such contract.

Section 2.4. Holidays for Employees Whose Compensations Are Fixed on a Monthly Basis, and Compensation Therefor: Except when

normal operations require or in an emergency, employees, other than members of the uniformed forces of the Police and Fire Departments, whose compensations are fixed on a monthly basis in the schedules of compensations adopted by the Board of Supervisors pursuant to the provisions of Section 151 of the Charter shall not be required to work on the following days hereby declared to be holidays for such employees: January 1, February 12, February 22, May 30, July 4, September 9, October 12, November 11, December 25, but in the event one of these days falls on Sunday, the Monday following shall be observed as a holiday; the first Monday of September (Labor Day); any day appointed by the President of the United States or the Governor of California as Thanksgiving Day; and any day on which the general municipal election is held and any day on which an election is held throughout the State; provided that the Board of Education may, for its own employees, substitute for the holidays declared above an equal number of different holidays. Such employees required by their respective appointing officers to work on any of the above specified holidays, or employees of the Board of Education required to work on those specified by the Board of Education, shall be paid extra compensation in the amount of a day's pay for the time worked, computed as provided in Section 2.5 hereof, provided further that occupants of positions enumerated in Section 1.8 hereof (administrative and executive positions) who are required by appointing officers to work on such holidays shall not receive extra compensation, but may be granted time off equivalent to the time worked. Compensations fixed in the schedules of compensation on a per diem basis and converted and included herein on a monthly basis shall not be subject to the provisions of this section but such employees shall be entitled to the six holidays specified in Section 2.6 hereof, and when required by their respective appointing officers to work on the holidays specified in Section 2.6, they shall be paid extra compensation in the amount of a day's pay for the time worked.

Section 2.5. Method of Conversion of Rate of Pay From Per Diem Basis to Monthly Basis or Monthly to Per Diem and Application Thereof: In converting compensation schedules established in the schedules of compensation adopted by the Board of Supervisors pursuant to the provisions of Section 151 of the Charter on a per diem basis for inclusion in the annual salary ordinance as a monthly rate, the conversion shall be made by using the factor 21.25 days for a 5-day week work schedule; 23.4 for a 5½-day week work schedule; and 25.6 for a 6-day week work schedule, all of which factors include allowance for the six holidays listed in Section 2.6 hereof. In converting compensation schedules established in the schedules of compensation as a monthly rate to a per diem rate, the conversion shall be made by using the factor 20.75 days for a 5-day work schedule which factor includes allowance for the twelve holidays listed in Section 2.4 hereof. In calculating conversions from per diem to monthly salary rates, figures shall be rounded to the next highest half dollar. The Civil Service Commission shall establish schedules of such conversion rates as the basis of payment when converted rates are required.

Section 2.6. Overtime—Per Diem Employees: The wages specified on a per diem basis in the schedules of compensation adopted by the Board of Supervisors pursuant to the provisions of Section 151 of the Charter for the respective employments included herein are for eight hours' work per day, between the hours of 8:00 a. m. and 5:00 p. m., on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday. For purposes of this ordinance, the said work schedule shall be considered as regular work time.

Any time worked by employees engaged in the operations and occupations named in this section on Saturday and Sunday, or on New Year's Day, Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Thanksgiving Day and Christmas Day shall be considered as work on

holidays and such holiday work shall be compensated at double the rate herein provided for regular work time, subject, however, to the restrictions and provisions of this section. Any time worked by such employees after 12 o'clock midnight and before 8:00 o'clock a. m. prior to the days mentioned above shall be compensated at double the rate herein fixed, subject to the restrictions of this section.

Overtime for the employees engaged in the operations or occupations named herein shall be any time worked in excess of eight hours per day, or any time worked before 8:00 a. m. and after 5:00 p. m. on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday.

Overtime work for employees engaged in the operations or occupations set forth in this section whose compensation is fixed in this ordinance on a per diem basis shall be compensated as set forth in this section for such overtime, subject to the provisions of this section.

Basis for Computing Compensation for Overtime as Herein Defined.

Operations and Occupations

Asphalt and related street repair crafts as determined by the civil service classification of positions and Laborers and Cribbers and Trackman.

One and one-half times the rate herein for regular time for the first four hours of overtime and twice the rate fixed herein for regular time thereafter, except that the rate for overtime between 6:00 a. m. and 8:00 a. m. shall be twice the rate fixed herein for regular time.

Bricklayers, Hodcarriers, Stone Masons, Granite Cutters, Tile Setters, Plasterers, Cement Finishers, Steam Fitters, Machinists, Electrical Workers, Lathers, Engineers of Hoisting Engines and Compressor Operators and related crafts as determined by the civil service classification of positions.

Twice the rate fixed herein for regular time.

Marble trades and related crafts as determined by the civil service classification of positions.

One and one-half times the rates fixed herein for regular time for the first four hours of overtime and twice the rate fixed herein for regular time thereafter.

Carpenters and related crafts as determined by the civil service classification of positions.

One and one-half times the rate fixed herein for regular time for the first four hours of overtime and twice the rate fixed herein for regular time thereafter.

Glaziers and related crafts as determined by the civil service classification of positions.

One and one-half times the rate fixed herein for regular time for the first two hours of overtime and twice the rate fixed herein for regular time thereafter.

Painters and related crafts as determined by the civil service classification of positions

One and one-half times the rate fixed herein for regular time.

Basis for Computing Compensation for Overtime as Herein Defined

Operations and Occupations

Plumbers and Gas Fitters and related crafts as determined by the civil service classification of positions and employees engaged in pipe-caulking and installing meters and water services.

Twice the rate fixed herein for regular time.

Sheet Metal Workers and related crafts as determined by civil service classification of positions.

One and one-half times the rate fixed herein for regular time for the first four hours of overtime and twice the rate fixed herein for regular time thereafter.

Chauffeurs, Truck Drivers and related crafts as determined by the civil service classification of positions.

One and one-half times the rate fixed herein for regular time after 8 hours.

Boiler Makers and related crafts as determined by the civil service classification of positions.

One and one-half times the rate fixed herein for regular time after 8 hours

Sewer Cleaners

One and one-half times the rate fixed herein for regular time for the first four hours of overtime and twice the rate fixed herein for regular time thereafter, except that the rate for overtime between 6:00 a. m. and 8:00 a. m. shall be twice the rate fixed herein for regular time; and provided that when the ebb and flow of the tides in San Francisco Bay shall interfere with the work of cleaning, maintaining and repairing sewers to the extent that employees engaged therein cannot render service or perform work for more than four hours per day, the said four hours shall be considered and compensated as a full day's work, unless, immediately following such work, such employees are assigned to other duties within their classification.

The provisions of this section are subject to the following conditions and restrictions:

(a) Where night shifts are recognized and where operations as presently constituted and now carried on regularly and continuously require a tour of duty by employees of any of the crafts named in this section commencing after 5 p. m. and before 8:00 a. m. on Monday to Friday, inclusive, such employees shall be compensated therefor at straight time except if such employees presently receive premium pay for such work, in which event they shall continue to receive the premium pay they now receive;

(b) Where operations as presently constituted require tours of

duty on Saturday or Sunday, and the occupants of positions engaged in such operations have heretofore been paid straight time for work on Saturday and Sunday, such employees shall hereafter be paid time and one-half for such Saturday and Sunday work;

(c) Employees engaged in crafts which are not enumerated in this section shall be compensated at time and one-half the regular rate of pay for work in excess of eight hours per day;

(d) Compensations and work schedules of platform employees and bus operators at the Municipal Railway and compensation fixed in the salary ordinance on a monthly basis, shall not be subject to the provisions of this section.

Section 2.7. Per Diem—Miscellaneous: In accordance with established working conditions for theatrical stage employees, working schedules on holidays and Sundays shall be compensated for at the same rate as for week days, provided permanent employees in classes A165 Stage Carpenter and E109 Stage Electrician who are required to work a performance on a Sunday shall be allowed a day off during the week.

Employees in Classes A165 Stage Carpenter, A170 Stage Property Man, and E109 Stage Electrician, shall be paid time and one-half when required to work over eight hours per day.

Employees in Class C109 Stage Hand employed on a performance basis as provided in the salary standardization ordinance shall be paid overtime over four hours at the following rates: Between the hours of 8:00 a. m. and 5:00 p. m., \$1.75 per hour; and between the hours of 5:00 p. m. and 8:00 a. m., \$2.25 per hour.

Appointing officers shall not authorize or permit employees to work emergency overtime as provided in Sections 2.6 and 2.7 hereof unless funds are available for paying the compensations of employees performing such emergency overtime work, or unless an actual emergency exists as defined by law. When so authorized by the appointing officer the emergency overtime worked shall be recorded separately on time-rolls opposite the name of the employee and the facts and circumstances warranting or requiring the overtime work shall be clearly set forth thereon. The Civil Service Commission shall submit to the Board of Supervisors a monthly report showing the amount of extra compensation paid to employees for emergency overtime work each month under the provisions of this section.

If and when the Civil Service Commission determines that overtime payments in a department are excessive and finds that the required work can be performed to better advantage and more economically than through overtime work, the Civil Service Commission shall so report to the Board of Supervisors in order that the Board of Supervisors may consider the advisability of establishing additional employments in such departments or take such other action as may be deemed advisable.

Section 2.8 Charges and Deduction for Maintenance: The compensations fixed herein for all employees whose compensations are subject to the provisions of Section 151 of the Charter, and including also those engaged in construction work outside the City and County of San Francisco are gross compensations and include the valuation of maintenance provided such employees. Charges and deductions therefor for any and all maintenance furnished and accepted by employees shall be made and indicated on time rolls and payrolls in accordance with the following schedule of charges fixed by the Civil Service Commission for such maintenance. Provided, however, that no charge shall be made for meals furnished cooks, bakers, waiters, waitresses, and other kitchen workers:

Section 2.9. **Compensation Reserves:** Surpluses existing in appropriations made for personal services shall be transferred by the Controller to a "Compensation Reserve" in the fund of which the appropriation is a part.

Each "Compensation Reserve" is appropriated for the following purposes:

For adjusting the provision for the compensation of an office or a position wherein the amount provided for such compensation is not sufficient to pay the officer or employee returning to such office or position from military or war leave the compensation said officer or employee is legally entitled to receive.

For providing the compensation for an office or a position wherein provision has not been otherwise made to pay an officer or employee returning from military or war leave to a regularly established office or position the compensation said officer or employee is legally entitled to receive.

For adjusting the provision for the compensation of an office or a position wherein the amount provided for such compensation is not sufficient to pay said officer or employee the compensation said officer or employee is legally entitled to receive.

Such amounts as may be required to carry out the above provision shall be transferred by the Controller to the related appropriation upon the request of the department head concerned and that of the Chief Administrative Officer, board or commission for departments under their respective jurisdiction.

Each such request shall require the prior approval of the secretary of the Civil Service Commission.

No such transfer shall be made from one fund to another.

Surpluses existing in "Compensation Reserve" may also be used for the making of appropriation for other compensation requirements in the manner provided by Charter.

Section 2.10. Explanation of Symbols: The following symbols used in connection with the rates fixed herein have the significance and meaning indicated:

- (a) Protected rate based on same number of hours worked in 1943-44.
- (b) Salary fixed by Charter.
- (c) Salary fixed by State law.
- (d) Salary paid by City and County (balance paid by State)
- (e) Salary fixed by department head.
- (f) Payroll symbol—5½-day week, 44 hours, plus 10 per cent.
- (g) Daily rate converted to monthly rate calculated on 5-day, 40-hour week.
- (h) Daily rate converted to monthly rate calculated on 5½-day, 44-hour week.
- (i) Daily rate converted to monthly rate calculated on 6-day, 48-hour week.
- (j) Monthly rate converted to daily rate.
- (k) Salary based on Disability Transfer.
- (l) No funds provided.
- (m) Daily rate based on type of services provided by salary standardization ordinance.
- (n) Payroll symbol—Normal 5-day week, 40 hours.
- (p) Payroll symbol—Premium rate.
- (s) Payroll symbol—6-day week, 48 hours, plus 20 per cent.

Section 87. If any section, subsection, sentence, clause or phrase of this ordinance is for any reason held to be unconstitutional, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this ordinance; if any compensation herein fixed is held to be contrary to the provisions of the Charter or other law or statute such decision shall not affect the validity of any other compensation fixed in this ordinance. The Board of Supervisors hereby declares that it would have passed this ordinance and each section, subsection, sentence, clause and phrase hereof, and approved and adopted each rate of compensation herein, irrespective of the fact that any one or more other sections, subsections, sentences, clauses or phrases may be declared unconstitutional, or that any compensation may be declared contrary to law.

Section 88. This ordinance is passed as an emergency measure and the Board of Supervisors does hereby declare by the vote by which this ordinance is passed that an actual emergency exists, the nature of the emergency being that this ordinance must be in effect prior to the 1st day of July, 1945, in order to provide for the uninterrupted operations of all City and County departments. The emergency arises out of the following situation: Subsequent to the adoption of the annual budget for the fiscal year 1945-1946, the Board of Supervisors adopted Bill No. 3491, the Annual Salary Ordinance, within the time prescribed for the fiscal year 1945-1946 and transmitted the same to the Mayor for his consideration. The Mayor returned the ordinance to the Board with his disapproval because it contained salaries not in accordance with the budget and appropriation ordinance. The veto of the Mayor was sustained June 14, 1945.

Supervisor MacPhee, as Chairman of the Finance Committee: I move adoption of the Annual Salary Ordinance for second reading and without the emergency clause. *No objection and so ordered.*

Explanation of Vote.

Supervisor Uhl: I have indicated my position here. I am willing to go along with the emergency matter but in this case where you have to have only six votes, I shall vote "no." I want to be consistent and the reason I voted with the nine was to get the matter behind us and not place in jeopardy the salaries of our municipal employees.

Passed for Second Reading.

Whereupon, the roll was called and the Annual Salary Ordinance, amended to conform with the budget and the Annual Appropriation Ordinance, and reading as above, with the exception of the emergency section and references thereto, was *Passed for Second Reading* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Brown, Colman, Gallagher, Gartland, Green, MacPhee, Mead, Meyer, Sullivan—9.

Noes: Supervisors Mancuso, Uhl—2.

Supervisor Brown: I think, as a matter of precaution, instead of adjourning, that we recess until Monday, June 18, 1945, at 1:55 p. m., and I so move. Seconded by Supervisor Sullivan.

In Memoriam—Lieutenant Commander Richard H. Hibbard.

Whereas, this Board of Supervisors learns with sincere regret of the death of Lieutenant Commander Richard H. (Dick) Hibbard, U.S.N.R., Housing Officer of the Twelfth Naval District; and

Whereas, Dick Hibbard, as he was familiarly known to the members of the Board of Supervisors, entered the Navy as District Morale Officer in 1942, subsequently was appointed Housing Officer of the Twelfth Naval District, where he played a leading part in overcoming the naval housing shortage in this war-crowded Bay Area; and

Whereas, Dick Hibbard, previous to his entrance into the service of the United States of America, was well and favorably known to all the members of this Board of Supervisors as a genial, courteous and capable representative of the San Francisco Chamber of Commerce at the City Hall, and served the City as well on the Civilian Defense Council and the Citizens' Hospitality Committee and in the Big Brother Welfare Movement; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That when this Board of Supervisors adjourns today it does so out of respect to the revered memory of Richard (Dick) Hibbard; and be it

Further Resolved, That the Clerk of the Board be directed to tender engrossed copies of this resolution to the family and relatives of Richard Hibbard commiserating them on the untimely passing of their beloved one.

Unanimously adopted by rising vote.

Opinion of City Attorney Re Salary Ordinance Must Conform to Budget and Annual Appropriation Ordinance.

June 8, 1945.

Dear Sir:

You have asked the following question:

"Will you please advise me whether the Salary Ordinance as passed by the Board of Supervisors is binding as to these salary rates in question, or whether the Annual Salary Ordinance should be amended to conform to the salary rates included in the budget as adopted and as reflected in the Annual Appropriation Ordinance?"

Facts.

By the 15th of February all departments of the City submitted budget estimates for their requirements during the coming fiscal year. Public hearings were conducted by the Public Utilities Commission and the Board of Education before submitting their budgets. Thereafter the Controller consolidated these budget estimates and transmitted the same to the Mayor.

The detail of these budget estimates as consolidated by the Controller showed revenues and estimated unencumbered surpluses expected for the ensuing fiscal year and set out the expenses and revenues of each department for the fiscal year 1943-44 and for the first six months of the current fiscal year. The Controller reported in the consolidated budgets the amounts required to pay interest and redemption on outstanding bonds and other charges against the City.

Hearings were then held by the Mayor, who rejected some items. These consolidated budgets were, prior to May 1st, transmitted to the Board of Supervisors accompanied by the Mayor's comments concerning the financial needs and revenues of the City for the fiscal year 1945-46. With the budget was submitted the Annual Appropriation Ordinance, which ordinance is required by the Charter to be prepared by the Controller.

Following these steps the necessary publication of the budget was made and printed copies circulated. Public hearings were held by the Board of Supervisors on the proposed budget.

The Board of Supervisors worked long and diligently in considering the budget, even to the extent of holding lengthy night sessions. On May 21st the budget was adopted by the Board. The Annual Appropriation Ordinance was on June 1st finally passed by the Board and reflected the expenditures set out in the budget.

The budget set out twelve new positions required by the Mayor, District Attorney, Park, Juvenile Court, Chief Administrative Officer, Electricity, Public Health and Public Utilities departments and fixed the salaries for these new positions at rates recommended by the appointing heads.

An Annual Salary Ordinance was introduced in the Board of Supervisors and finally passed. In this salary ordinance the Board fixed salaries at lesser rates than provided in the budget and Appropriation Ordinance, but in conformity with recommendations of the Civil Service Commission.

Opinion.

The facts as above related are given in somewhat detail for the purpose of emphasizing the importance of the budget and Appropriation Ordinance, as these form the basis by which expenditures are to be made throughout the coming fiscal year.

There is no opinion of any court of record on the precise question asked by you, although there is one that is quite analogous. In 1937

the Manager of Utilities sought to have the wages of car and auto painters of the Municipal Railway increased from \$9 a day to \$10 a day after the budget had been adopted and the Appropriation Ordinance had been passed for the ensuing fiscal year. The matter was tried before the local Superior Court and the employees in question were allowed the increase. This office appealed from the decision and the case reached the Supreme Court. It is entitled, *Sullivan v. McKinley*, 14 Cal. (2d) 113. At page 116 the Supreme Court states:

"The question to be determined is whether the Board of Supervisors and the Mayor, in fixing in the annual salary ordinance a rate of wage for auto and car painters different from that in the budget estimate of the employing department, and in the recommendation of the Mayor, and in the budget of said Board and Mayor, violate the terms of the organic law."

In answering this question, the court determined at page 117 as follows:

"Section 71 of the Charter provides: 'All increases in salaries or wages of officers and employees shall be determined at the time of the preparation of the annual budget estimates and the adoption of the annual budget and appropriation ordinances, and no such increase shall be effective prior to the fiscal year for which the budget is adopted. . . .'

"The time for establishing an increase in wage rate of municipal employees, such as the petitioner and his eight companions, is before the passage of the annual salary ordinance. And the instruments within which the increase of the rate of wage is to be expressed are (1) annual budget estimates, (2) annual budget, and (3) appropriation ordinance. Once the budget is approved by the Board of Supervisors, the *fiscal terms of the annual appropriation ordinance and the annual salary ordinance are automatically fixed beyond the power of change by any amendment*. Any effort of the Board of Supervisors to increase a wage scale in the annual salary ordinance over the amount provided in the approved budget is void."

Concerning the function of the Salary Ordinance, the court defined it at page 118 as follows:

"To the foregoing it might be added that, under the charter, salaries and wages are not fixed by the salary ordinance alone. The principal purpose of that document seems to be to bring the salaries and wages as finally determined into one ordinance for more convenient reference."

And, finally, in reversing the lower court, the opinion says:

"The wage scale of these car and auto painters had not been fixed at the rate of \$10 per day 'by the budget and annual salary ordinance,' as required by section 71, and clearly, from this language, the salary ordinance must find its support in the items of the budget."

In the instant case of the twelve new employments, the salaries fixed in the budget and Appropriation Ordinance, in my opinion, must prevail, as if the increasing of a provision concerning a wage scale in the Annual Salary Ordinance is void, it should logically follow that the decreasing of a provision of a wage scale set out in the budget and Appropriation Ordinance is likewise void.

It appears to me that after the many steps taken in preparing the budget and the Appropriation Ordinance and that all matters contained therein have been subject to careful study, that they could not be thereafter made useless by adopting an ordinance that differed

from the provisions of the enactments that the Supreme Court characterizes as fixing the fiscal terms of the City.

It is to be noted that the court does not say that the actual increasing of a wage scale in the Annual Salary Ordinance is voidable but holds it to be void, and if any credence at all is to be given to the expression of our Supreme Court that "once the budget is approved by the Board of Supervisors the fiscal terms of the annual appropriation ordinance and annual salary ordinance are automatically fixed beyond the power of change by any amendment," it must follow that the Board of Supervisors should amend the Annual Salary Ordinance to conform to the salary rates specified in the budget and included in the Annual Appropriation Ordinance.

In reaching the conclusion herein expressed particular attention has been paid to Section 151 of the Charter as well as all other pertinent Charter provisions.

SPECIAL ORDER—3:00 P. M.**Re Extending Time for Payment of Emergency Relief to Indigent Non-Residents of the City and County of San Francisco.**

On motion of Supervisor Brown the Clerk was instructed to invite the members of the Public Welfare Commission to attend the meeting of the Board of Supervisors on Monday, June 18, 1945, to explain the plans of the Commission with reference to extending the time for the payment of emergency relief to indigent non-residents of the City and County of San Francisco.

Discussion.

Amending Salary Ordinance, Public Utilities Commission, Municipal Railway, to Reflect Reclassification of 9 Positions, Subforeman Trackman at \$8.10 Per Day, to Track Foreman, Effective September 29, 1944.

Bill No. 3482, Ordinance No. 3314 (Series of 1939), as follows:

Amending Ordinance No. 2761 (Bill No. 2906), (Series of 1939), entitled: "Authorizing the Chief Administrative Officer to establish for the duration of the war a Farmers' Market and to direct the operations thereof, provided that said market shall be financed by fees and appropriations; fixing a site for said market; authorizing the Chief Administrative Officer to place the operation of said market in any department under his jurisdiction as provided in the Charter and authorizing the Chief Administrative Officer to appoint a committee which will advise with him as to the conduct of said market; providing for the adoption and promulgation by the Chief Administrative Officer of rules and regulations to govern said market; establishing policies providing as to who may make sales at said market, the hours during which said market shall be open and other matters in regard to the conduct of said market; providing that a violation of the provisions of this ordinance or the rules and regulations adopted and promulgated by the Chief Administrative Officer shall constitute a misdemeanor and authorizing the Chief of Police to enforce the penal provisions of this ordinance," approved July 12, 1944, as amended, by amending Sections 6 and 8 thereof, to provide for pooling of shipments of products to said Farmers' Market in case of emergency, sale of and fees applicable thereto.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco, as follows:

Section 1. Ordinance No. 2761 (Series of 1939), the title of which is recited above, is hereby amended by amending Section 6 and Section 8 thereof, to read as follows:

Section 6. Fees shall be charged to the sellers of all products offered for sale at said Farmers' Market, the amount of which fees shall be fixed by the Board of Supervisors by resolution on the recommendation of the Chief Administrative Officer and the approval of the Controller.

In case of pooled shipments, as provided in Section 8 hereof, such fees shall be charged to the several growers joining in such pool according to the weight of the products of such growers included therein.

The fees recommended by the Chief Administrative Officer shall be such as according to estimate will be sufficient to pay the operating costs and expenses of said market, and in addition thereto repay to the City and County of San Francisco within the period of two years from and after the date of the establishment of said market any capital expenditures appropriated for said market.

Section 8. Sales of products made in said market shall be limited to surplus or distressed fresh fruits and vegetables and, except as hereinafter stated, said products shall be sold or offered for sale only by the grower thereof or by members of his immediate family or by his bona fide employees who are permanently employed in and about the farm or place where said seller produces said products. No commission shall be paid by the growers or received by other persons involved in the transactions occurring at said market, except such commissions or fees as are paid at said market for the privilege of selling the products thereat.

Whenever the California Farm Production Council declares an

emergency or glut exists in any area as to any of said products, growers of such product may, during the effective period of such declaration, pool shipments to said market of such product grown in such area. Pooled shipments may be offered for sale or sold at said market only by one or more of the growers thereof or by members of the family or employees of one or more of said growers, as aforesaid. Each such pooled shipment must be certified by either the County Agent of said California Farm Production Council or the County Agricultural Commissioner for the county in which said product is grown. Such certificate shall list the name and address of each grower of products included in such shipment and shall be delivered to the person in charge of said market on arrival of such shipment at said market.

Approved as to form by the City Attorney.

Approved by the Chief Administrative Officer.

Committee of the Whole.

On motion by Supervisor Mead, seconded by Supervisor Colman, the Board of Supervisors resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole, President Gallagher acting as Chairman.

Mr. Ben Kline explained the purport of the proposed legislation.

Mr. John Brucato, member of the Farmers' Market Advisory Committee, addressed the Board at length, explaining the need for the legislation. The farmers want a provision in the ordinance permitting them to pool their shipments of fruits and vegetables, thus permitting those growers whose farms are not close to San Francisco, or whose surplus or distress vegetables and fruits are not sufficient in quantity to warrant their being brought to San Francisco separately, to pool their shipments, thus conserving both transportation facilities and manpower needed to bring their produce to the market. This is a practical way to salvage food and to give housewives an opportunity to get produce for canning. The produce merchants are claiming that crops sold at the Farmers' Market are not surplus or distress products.

Mr. Herbert F. Dalton of the Community Service Department, California Farm Bureau Service Federation, urged approval of the legislation. Because of transportation difficulties, farmers should be allowed to pool their shipments.

Mrs. Whitehead, Farmers Advisory Board, Women's Chamber of Commerce, declared that pooling of produce would make for more efficient transportation to the market. Produce should not be wasted at this time. The only opposition to the Farmers' Market is from the produce commission merchants. The Farmers' Market, moreover, distributes only from three to five per cent of fresh produce brought into San Francisco.

Mr. Russell D. Powell, president of the Central Council of Civic Clubs, announced that his organization was in favor of the proposed legislation.

Mr. William Stafford, representing the Wholesale Fruit and Produce Association, stated his people were unequivocally, unalterably and vigorously opposed to the proposed legislation. There is no reason, he held, for even the existence of the Farmers' Market. He urged the members of the Board to inquire into the operating and the practice of the Farmers' Market itself. Attempts are made to purchase produce from the commission merchants for resale in the Farmers' Market. The proposed amendment will grant authority to any person to pick up and haul merchandise from anyone. Such establishment of a common carrier does not reside within the jurisdiction of the Board of Supervisors, but with the Railroad Commis-

sion. The City and County of San Francisco is, in effect, through this ordinance, injecting itself into private business, private industry and private enterprise. Mr. Stafford also questioned the right of Mr. Brucato, as a city employee, to interest himself in the Farmers' Market. He also urged the Board, instead of approving the proposed legislation, to repeal the original creating the so-called Farmers' Market.

In reply to questioning by Supervisor Mead, Mr. Stafford stated that he was not referring to any growers, but only to the jobbers, the wholesalers, the importers and exporters, and the brokerage houses in San Francisco.

Mr. Stafford objected to any pooling of shipments, stating that there was ample means of transportation to bring into San Francisco any surplus vegetables or fruit.

Mr. Brucato, in reply to questioning, denied the contention that the passage of the proposed legislation would amount to the creation of common carriers. The ordinance would not permit any farmer to go out and pick up his neighbor's produce for transportation to San Francisco.

Mr. Gaston Goetting, in reply to questioning, stated that there were no records available as to the percentage of volume of merchandise brought into the market compared with that brought into the wholesale market. It might be five per cent, or it might be seven per cent.

Thereupon, Supervisor Mead stated that he desired all the information he could possibly get in order to properly decide how he would vote on the proposed legislation, and he would move temporary postponement of further consideration, and that the market master be brought into the Board for questioning. Motion seconded by Supervisor MacPhee.

Supervisor Brown objected to the motion. He was prepared to vote on the matter without delay.

Supervisor Colman, referring to statement by Mr. Stafford and by Mr. Goetting about violations of the rules for the conduct of the Farmers' Market, held that such cases as mentioned had no bearing on the question under consideration.

Thereupon, Supervisor Mead announced that with the consent of his second, he would withdraw that portion of his motion asking for temporary postponement of consideration. However, he did desire the presence in the chambers of the market master.

Before the roll was called on the motion to send for the market master, Supervisor Colman inquired if there were any other instances of violations other than the case of Mr. Scofield, which both Mr. Stafford and Mr. Goetting had reported.

Mr. Goetting replied that there were many cases.

Thereupon, the roll was called and the motion to send for the market master was *carried* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Colman, MacPhee, Mancuso, Mead, Sullivan, Uhl—6.

Noes: Supervisors Brown, Gallagher, Gartland—3.

Absent: Supervisors Green, Meyer—2.

Whereupon, Mr. Goetting presented list of violations together with several letters withdrawing the privileges of the market from violators.

Mr. John O'Connell of the San Francisco Labor Council, but present only as an observer, stated that from the evidence presented, it seemed to him there should be made a proper investigation of the many violations reported.

In Hands of the Board.

Supervisor Brown, seconded by Supervisor Uhl, moved that the entire matter be taken into the hands of the Board.

Supervisor Mead requested that before the matter was taken into the hands of the Board, Mr. John Brucato be given an opportunity to speak on a question of personal privilege.

Whereupon, there being no objection, Mr. Brucato addressed the Board briefly, in reply to statements made by Mr. Stafford. The time spent by him with the Farmers' Market was his own time. He denied that he had ever used a city-owned car on Farmers' Market business.

Thereupon, there being no objection, the Committee of the Whole arose and resolved itself into a Board of Supervisors.

Temporary Postponement of Consideration.

Thereupon, further consideration was postponed temporarily, pending the arrival in the chambers of the market master.

Subsequently during the proceedings, it having been reported that the market master was not available, the question of amendment to the Farmers' Market ordinance was again taken up.

Supervisor Brown expressed opposition to the proposed legislation. If the ordinance is passed, he stated, it would increase complications incident to the enforcement of the original ordinance. The operator of pool shipments would become a common carrier. The Board of Supervisors should not permit such a situation without being in a position to police it. The amendment would be dangerous. He was opposed to it.

Thereupon, Supervisor Colman, seconded by Supervisor Sullivan, moved reference to committee for additional hearing.

Whereupon, after further brief discussion, the roll was called and the motion to re-refer to committee was *carried* by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Colman, MacPhee, Mead, Sullivan, Uhl—5.

Noes: Supervisors Brown, Gallagher, Gartland, Mancuso—4.

Absent: Supervisors Green, Meyer—2.

Absent: Supervisors Green, Meyer—2.

Leave of Absence—Honorable Jesse C. Colman.

Proposal No. 4882, Resolution No. 4777 (Series of 1939), as follows:

Resolved, That in accordance with the recommendation of his Honor the Mayor, Honorable Jesse C. Colman, a member of the Board of Supervisors, is hereby granted a leave of absence for the period commencing June 19, 1945, and ending June 29, 1945, inclusive, with permission to leave the State.

Adopted by the following vote:

Confirming Appointment of D. Lyle Ghirardelli as a Member of the Board of Trustees of the San Francisco War Memorial.

Supervisor Colman presented:

Proposal No. 4883, Resolution No. 4761 (Series of 1939), as follows:

Whereas, his Honor the Mayor has appointed D. Lyle Ghirardelli as a member of the Board of Trustees of the War Memorial, vice Felix McGinnis, deceased; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the appointment of his Honor the Mayor be and it is hereby confirmed.

Adopted by the following vote:

Ayes: Supervisors Brown, Colman, Gallagher, Gartland, MacPhee, Mancuso, Mead, Sullivan, Uhl—9.

Absent: Supervisors Green, Meyer—2.

Ammunition Dump at Paradise Cove.

Supervisor Brown called attention to ammunition dump proposed to be established by the Federal Government at Paradise Cove, in Marin County. The property owners have already been notified to move out. The Marin County Board of Supervisors, he understood, were going to request the San Francisco Board of Supervisors to join in a protest to Washington against the establishment of such ammunition depot at that location. Thereupon, Supervisor Brown urged that the committee to which the matter had previously been referred, bring in its report at the next meeting of the Board for discussion. He also requested that the Clerk get in touch with the Chairman of the Committee, Supervisor Green, explain the situation, and ask him to hold a meeting of his committee to consider the subject matter as soon as possible.

In Memoriam—John Francis Kenney.

Supervisor Colman presented:

Proposal No. 4884, Resolution No. 4820 (Series of 1939), as follows:

Whereas, the Board of Supervisors learns with regret of the death on April 6, 1945, at Okinawa of John Francis Kenney, youngest son of Edward Kenney, director of the Golden Gate Bridge and Highway District; and

Whereas, John Francis Kenney, Purser and Pharmacist Mate in the United States Maritime Service, gave his life for his country in this cataclysmic struggle for our ideals of freedom and democracy; and

Whereas, John Francis Kenney is one of the many valiant names that will be forever emblazoned on the honor roll of those heroic Americans who gave their all for their country; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That this Board of Supervisors when it adjourns today does so out of respect to the revered memory of John Francis Kenney; and be it

Further Resolved, That the Clerk be directed to extend to the family of the deceased this expression of sincere sorrow on the loss of a good and devoted son.

Unanimously Adopted by rising vote.

Protesting the Bonding of Certain City Officials and Employees.

Supervisor MacPhee presented to the Board copy of letter from Joseph J. Webb, attorney at law, protesting the bonding of members of the Adult Probation Board, heretofore sent to the Board of Supervisors, and requested its reference to the Finance Committee for consideration.

The President announced that the communication had already been referred to Finance Committee.

Publication of Annual Salary Ordinance.

Supervisor MacPhee called attention to the Annual Salary Ordinance for the fiscal year 1945-1946, Finally Passed and also Passed for Second Reading during the previous week. The cost of the necessary advertising was reported at \$1,428 for each ordinance, or a cost of nearly \$2,900.

Supervisor Brown announced that the advertising cost could have been eliminated by overriding the Mayor's veto.

Supervisor Mead raised a point of order, stating that the Board was not sitting in recessed meeting, but in its regular meeting, hence could do nothing about the matter at this time.

The Chair ruled the point of order well taken.

Supervisor Mancuso, however, held that the Board could rescind its previous action and override the Mayor's veto.

Subsequently during the proceedings, and under his name on Roll Call, Supervisor Mancuso suggested that the Board rescind its action previously taken on the Annual Salary Ordinance. He was willing to go along with the two amendments heretofore proposed. Thereupon, he moved that the Board rescind its action previously taken on the Annual Salary Ordinance.

The Chair ruled the motion out of order. In addition thereto the advertising expense could not be saved, inasmuch as the Annual Salary Ordinance had already been published, both as Finally Passed and as Passed for Second Reading.

Charter Amendments Heretofore Referred to Mayor's Charter Revision Committee.

Supervisor Mancuso called attention to several charter amendments heretofore referred to the Mayor's Charter Revision Committee by the Board of Supervisors. No meeting of that committee has been held for the past six months. Several of the proposed amendments, he considered, were quite important. He intended, also, to present a charter amendment to provide for the setting up of a department or commission to have jurisdiction over San Francisco's transportation system, and he would dislike to have such amendment referred to the committee and then not be considered.

Thereupon, Supervisor Mancuso, seconded by Supervisor Mead, moved that the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors write to his Honor the Mayor and inquire as to what the Charter Revision Committee has in mind, and if the committee does not intend to proceed with the matters referred to it by the Board, that such matters be referred back to the Board of Supervisors.

No objection, and so ordered.

Log Cabin Ranch School.

Supervisor MacPhee announced that bill originally introduced here, and having for its purpose authorizing assistance by the State in the financing of Log Cabin Ranch School, had been passed by both branches of the State Legislature. He expressed the hope that the bill would receive the Governor's approval.

Report of Citizens' Post-War Planning Committee.

Supervisor Mancuso called attention to the report just issued by the Citizens' Post-War Planning Committee, and suggested that all members of the Board give the report very careful consideration.

In Memoriam—Bartley K. Oliver.

Supervisor Sullivan presented:

Proposal No. 4885, Resolution No. 4806 (Series of 1939), as follows:

Whereas, Almighty God has called from this life Bartley K. Oliver, distinguished citizen and philanthropist of San Francisco; and

Whereas, Bartley K. Oliver, aside from his prominence as an outstanding business man of this city, served San Francisco faithfully and loyally as chairman of the famous Oliver Grand Jury that was responsible for the indictments during the Graft Investigation of 1907; and

Whereas, Bartley K. Oliver, among his many charitable and philanthropic works was the founder of St. Elizabeth's Hospital and Foundling Home and during the great depression in 1931 provided for the building of St. Patrick's Shelter for homeless men and recently turned over his Los Altos summer home to a children's orphanage; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That this Board of Supervisors records its profound sorrow on the loss of so good a man and so sterling a citizen of San Francisco; and be it

Further Resolved, That when this Board of Supervisors adjourns today it does so out of respect to the revered memory of Bartley K. Oliver and that the Clerk of this Board be instructed to convey to the bereaved family of the deceased this expression of our regard and esteem for one who figured so largely in the business, political and charitable life of San Francisco.

Unanimously Adopted by rising vote.

There being no further business, the Board, at the hour of 5:10 p. m., adjourned.
