### Memoirs

#### TRIBUTE TO A SAINTLY WOMAN

On Saturday evening, August 30, 1913, Amanda Thomas, wife of Rev. T. R. West, D.D., heard the words of the Master himself saying "I am the resurrection and the life." She had passed her three score and ten, lacking about five months of being seventy-five years of age. For fifty four years, three months and eight days she was the faithful companion of her husband, who is left to mourn his loss.



She was born near Bluff City, Sullivan County, Tennessee, January 7, 1839. She was converted in early childhood, and the witness of the Spirit obtained in her conversion was the beginning of a long, beautiful Christian life, a life that has adorned her home, inspired her husband, blessed the community in which she lived, instilled into her children's lives a faith and confidence in God, who is able to keep that which is committed to Him.

Her sympathy for the hungry, for the sick, for the needy and the distressed was more than mere words. She ministered to such in the spirit of the Master, and in eternity there will be those who will rise up to call her blessed.

On the 22d of May, 1820, she was united in marriage to Dr. T. R. West, and to this union eight children were born, two girls and six

boys. Two of these died in infancy, and Oscar L. West died June 7, 1900. The surviving children are: Mrs. S. A. Bowen, of Chattanooga; G. H. West, of Dayton; Clyde West, of Maryville; Rev. Victor West, of Kellerton, Iowa, and Capt. O. M. West, of Chattanooga. Those who knew her best in her daily life are best able to appreciate her noble character. She was a woman who believed in prayer—who loved to talk to God, who loved to commune with Him. When her husband, a messenger of God, was away from home about his Father's business, she, like every other itinerant's wife, was left to care for the children. About her knees they were taught to kneel and pray, to reverence God, to love the church, to aspire to be all God intended them to be as upright, noble citizens and Christians. The memories of her amiable disposition, her motherly advice, and her untarnished character are so deeply instilled into their lives that they will never forget them, but will cherish them as their richest heritage on earth.

In her early life she united with the Presbyterian church, but in 1867 she joined the Methodist Episcopal church. To her vows she was always faithful. Every interest of the church was dear to her; she never tired of working, and at the ripe old age of seventy-four years, her sisters in the church recognized her ability and willingness to serve and elected her to the presidency of the Ladies' Aid Society and in this office she labored to the end. Only three days before her death it was the pleasure of the writer of this obituary to take her in his buggy to the meeting of the society. She verily died working for the church. The sentiment of her soul is found in that familiar old hymn:

I love thy church, O, God,

Her walls before thee stand,
Dear as the apple of thine eye,

And graven on thy hand.

For her my tears shall fall;
For her my prayers-ascend;
To her my cares and toils be given
Till toils and cares shall end.

The editor of the Athenian, a newspaper published in her home town, said of her:

It can be truly said of this good, queenly, faithful woman that God was in all her thoughts. Mrs. West weighed events, incidents, human life at real values. Nothing was insignificant for her, for she could always find enfolded in story or incident a seed pearl of truth, and no labor seemed too great for her loving patience if by its endurance she might but win a blessing for others. Living this life of love and services from fairest girlhood to a radiant old age, her path along the highway of life was strewn with the munificent offerings of her warm, unselfish nature that the results can never be estimated until the angel who writes opens his record book. The love of Christ energized and thrilled her daily life, and her magnetic personality won friends for

her wherever she went, and caused all who knew her to remember and realize the meaning of St. John's sweet words: "Beloved, let us love one another; for love is of God."

Her patience, in her suffering, was most remarkable. Her submission to whatever the Lord would permit her to pass through demonstrated her consecration to His will. Her career has ended. She will never walk again among us here, but "She being dead yet speaketh." She has gone to Him who has promised to reward the gift of a cup of water when given in His name; to Him who has said to her, "Come ye blessed of my Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world; For I was an hungered and ye gave me meat; I was thirsty, and ye gave me drink; I was a stranger and ye took me in; naked, and ye clothed me; I was sick and ye visited me; I was in prison, and ye came unto me."

#### MRS. J. A. BAKER

Martha E. Trotter was born at Walden, Sevier County, Tennessee, December 18th, 1858. She was married to Rev. J. A. Baker, November 8th, 1877.

She was the daughter of Rev. John N. Trotter, of Sevier County. In early life she was converted and joined the Methodist Episcopal Church at the age of twelve years.

She was the mother of nine children, seven of whom are living,

two having preceded her to the Holy City.

In the last eight years of her life she was an invalid and hardly able to leave her room, but in all the long years of suffering she was patient and kind and loving, always resigned to the will of God and leaning trustingly upon Him.

Her life was one that had been sweetened by the Grace of God. All who knew here bear testimony to the sweetness and beauty of her spirit. And none spoke more kindly than they who knew her best.

She was ill only a short while at the last, and the end came early on the morning of May 9th, 1913. 

## IMPORTANT INFORMATION FOR EXAMINERS AND CANDIDATES

- 1. The work of the Board is divided into six groups: Admission on trial; first, second, third and fourth years, and Local Orders. Each group to be in the hands of a committee—one of the committeemen to be chairman of the committee.
- 2. Mid-year examinations are required; time and place to be arranged and announced. No examinations are allowed except at mid-year appointments and at the seat of the annual conference. Candidates for admission and local orders are excused from mid-year work.
- 3. The day preceding the opening of the Annual Conference is the appointed time for examination.
- 4. The candidates are urged to buy their books at the very opening of the year and study carefully the mid-year subjects, and after the mid-year examinations make complete survey of the remaining subjects immediately. The examiners are required to correspond with the candidates in the early winter, preparatory to mid-year examinations, furnishing the candidates with from 50 to 100 questions or suggestions—at least covering the subject. The final examination questions to be drawn from these questions or suggestions previously given.
- 5. The requirements of the Discipline are to make the examinations written if practicable and two weeks ahead of the annual examination at Conference to send written questions to the Chairman of the Board.
- 6. The chairman of each group is to submit in writing the grades of the candidates in his department to the registrar.
- 7. Mid-year examinations to be conducted the second Tuesday in April.
- 8. The provision for mid-year examinations does not deprive any student of the opportunity of being examined on any subject at the seat and time of the Annual Conference.
- 9. The Board of Examiners, together with the candidates, are called to convene at the place of next Conference session the night previous to the day of Conference examination.

Conference Postmaster.—On motion of R. L. Stapleton, R. E. Ayers was elected Conference Postmaster.

Jubilee Sermon.—On motion of J. S. Burnett, T. R. West was invited to deliver a Jubilee Sermon at the next session of the Holston Conference.

Memorial Service.—The hour having arrived for taking up the order of the day, the Memorial Service was held.

Bishop Henderson presided, and announced Hymn No. 628. After singing, J. M. Emert read the memoir of Mrs. T. R. West.

M. C. Bruner read the memoir of Mrs. J. A. Baker. J. M. Wolfe read the memoir of Mrs. E. O. Woodyard. The Maryville Church quartette sang the hymn, "Some Sweet Day." C. L. Kirby read the memoir of Mrs. A. Y. Snaveley, and S. G. Ketron the memoir of Mrs. Mary A. Seaton. Bishop Henderson lead the Conference in prayer. It was reported also that Mrs. G. H. Thompson had died during the year, but no memoir had been prepared.

Hours of Adjournment.—On motion of R. L. Stapleton, the hours of adjournment of the morning business sessions was fixed at 11:30 a. m.

Advocate Journal Fund.—Dr. Manker made a final report on the Methodist Advocate Journal Fund, and, on motion of J. M. Emert was given a vote of thanks for his carefulness and faithfulness in handling this fund. See reports.

Introduction.—Dr. E. C. Clemans, representative of the Board of Conference Claimants was introduced, addressed the Conference in the interests of the work of the Board, and presented the Conference with a check for \$300.00.

Announcements.—Announcements were made by Bishop Henderson, J. J. Manker, B. M. Martin, W. F. Pitts, J. S. Burnett, and Secretary Stapleton.

Board of Education.—W. S. Bovard asked to substitute the name of R. B. Stansell for A. R. Lambert, on the Committee on Education, and the request was granted.

Committee on Nomination.—The Committee on Nominations was instructed to supply the vacancies on the Committees.

**Benediction.**—Dr. Herbert Scott of the Ohio Conference pronounced the Benedicton.

#### FIRST DAY

#### Afternoon Sesson

**Opening Exercises.**—The Conference met in Statistical Session at 1:30 p. m. with Bishop Henderson presiding.

The Hymn, "Blessed be the tie that binds," was sung by the Conference.

After a consecration service the benediction was pronounced by Bishop Henderson.

#### SECOND DAY

October 16, 1913.

Opening Exercises.—The Conference Session was opened at 8:30 a. m., by Bishop Henderson, who announced Hymn No. 315. After singing, William Haggerty led the Conference in prayer. The Scripture lesson was read in Acts 1:1-8. The Bishop then gave the Conference a helpful and earnest address on "Pastoral Efficiency."

Journal Approved.—The minutes of Wednesday's sessions were read and approved.

Invitation from Maryville College.—An invitation was received from Dr. Wilson, President of Maryville College, for the Conference to visit the chapel exercises in a body, and on motion of the Secretary of the Conference, the invitation was accepted for Friday morning.

Telegram.—The Secretary read a telegram from Bishop Cooke sending love, and a promise to visit the Conference this week.

Announcement.—W. F. Pitts, Treasurer, announced changes in the list of his assistants.

Minute Fund Motion.—A motion made by W. F. Pitts to give to the Minute Fund all the overplus funds under one dollar found undesignated, both for the last year and the present Conference year, was adopted.

Statistics.—On the call of the roll of delinquent charges reports were received.

Committee Changes.—The Committee on Nominations reported on the changes in the Standing Committees.

Law Enforcement Resolution.—J. M. Emert offered the following:

"Whereas, The Legislature of Tennessee is now assembled in extraordinary session in Nashville, by a special call of Governor Hooper, for the purpose of passing the law enforcement bills, recommended by the Governor and demanded by a very large majority of the people of the State; Resolved, that we, as a Conference, authorize the Secretary to send to Governor Hooper our greetings and assure him of our loyalty, sympathy, and prayers for the final victory in driving the liquor traffic from our State."

Introductions.—H. G. McCain, Oregon Conference, Extension Secretary of the Church Temperance Society; Herbert Scott, Ohio Conference, representing the Board of Foreign Missions, and Herbert Welch, of West Ohio Conference, representing the Board of Education, were introduced to the Conference and made addresses in the interest of the causes they came to represent. Request of C. C. Morris.—C. C. Morris made a request to be present with the Committee and this was referred by the Bishop to the Chairman of the Committee.

Methodist Brotherhood.—W. S. Bovard addressed the Conference on the interests of the Methodist Brotherhood.

Question of Personal Privilege.—J. J. Manker rose on a question of personal privilege and stated to the Conference, regarding his attitude on the right of challenge, he had no motive of opposition towards the author of the request for the appointment of the Committee of Inquiry.

Methodist Review.—J. W. Boling was appointed to take subscriptions for the Methodist Review.

Asks to be Excused From Committee Service.—J. C. Harmon asked to be excused from serving on the Committee of Inquiry in the C. C. Morris case and the request was refused.

Standing Committees.—The Standing Committees were called and places of meeting announced. Announcements were made by the Secretary.

Time Extended.—On motion the time was extended.

John H. Race.—The Bishop here introduced John H. Race, Agent of the Book Concern at Cincinnati, and he addressed the Conference. After closing he handed to the Conference a draft on the Book Concern for \$1,711.00 and one on the chartered fund for \$30.00.

Call of the Delinquents.—The Bishop called again for the reports not yet in.

The Conference adjourned with the benediction by G. W. Paul.

#### THIRD DAY

## **Morning Session**

October 17, 1913.

Opening Exercises.—The Conference met in the Maryville College Chapel for devotional exercises on the invitation of President Wilson of the College.

G. T. Francisco led in prayer. Bishop Henderson addressed the assembled congregation on the subject of "The Life Worth While."

Returning to the Conference room Hymn No. 355 was sung, and J. F. Giles offered prayer.

Reading of the Journal.—The minutes of Thursday's sessions were read and, after correction, were approved.

Invitation to the Laymen.—On motion of F. M. Cones, the Laymen's Association was invited to meet with the Conference in joint session at 10:45 a.m. On motion a committee, consisting of J. J. Manker, F. M. Cones and G. T. Francisco, was appointed to convey the greetings of the Conference to the Laymen and report to them the action of the Conference.

Morris, have made diligent and thorough inquiry into these rumors, and we report that there are rumors of imprudent and unministerial conduct of sufficient prevalence and persistency to justify in all fairness to Brother Morris and the Church, action by the Conference."

## THIRD DAY

## Night Session

**Executive Session.**—The Conference met in executive session at 6:30 p. m. After singing Hymn No. 144, G. W. Paul led the Conference in prayer. J. C. Patty and William Haggerty were appointed door-keepers.

Report of the Committee on Charges.—C. H. Myers read the report of the Committee of Three on Charges, in the case of C. C. Morris, which was as follows:

## IMPRUDENT AND UNMINISTERIAL CONDUCT

To the Holston Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church:

Inasmuch as Brother C. C. Morris, a member of the Holston Conference, asked for a Committee of Inquiry concerning certain rumors respecting his ministerial conduct, and inasmuch as such committee appointed by the Holston Conference to make inquiry into said rumors did, after thorough and diligent investigation, report to said Conference that there are rumors of imprudent and unministerial conduct of sufficient prevalence and persistency to justify in all fairness to Brother Morris and the Church, action by the Conference, and inasmuch as the said report was received by the Holston Conference and the undersigned appointed as a committee to formulate specific charges:

We, the undersigned members of the Holston Conference, complain to you that the said C. C. Morris has been guilty of high imprudence and unministerial conduct, and he is hereby charged therewith as follows:

Specification One: That the said C. C. Morris, during the last two years has had intimate relations with one Annie Andis, a divorced woman widely reputed in her own community to be of immoral character.

Specification Two: On or about June, 1912, the said Annie Andis did make her home at the house of C. C. Morris in Bristol, and continued there for approximately nine months.

Specification Three: During said residence said C. C. Morris and said Annie Andis were frequently seen together on the streets of Bristol, day and night; on the outskirts of the City, and at places of amusement.

Specification Four: That the said C. C. Morris refused to dismiss the said Annie Andis from the house after being earnestly entreated to do so by official members of the Bristol Charge and by a member of his own family, who made it plain to him that his conduct with said Annie Andis was creating hurtful suspicion and talk.

Specification Five: That the said C. C. Morris did frequently visit the said Annie Andis at the home of the parents about seven miles from Abingdon after her return there, and they were known to be together late at night.

Specification Six: That the said C. C. Morris and said Annie Andis did, during the past Conference year, take several buggy rides in the vicinity of Abingdon and Greendale, Virginia.

Specification Seven: That there are now existing certain letters which evidently passed between said parties, and said letters evidence highly imprudent intimacy.

- R. B. Stansell moved that J. W. Boling and J. M. Emert be appointed as the counsel for the Church. The motion was adopted.

Question 23—Cases Referred.—J. S. Burnett stated that inasmuch as J. S. Best had been recommended for readmission he desired the case to go before the Committee on Conference Relations.

The cases of A. M. Rose, William Haggerty, J. W. Cardwell and G. R. Rowan were referred to the Committee on Conference Relations.

Recess.—At this juncture a recess was ordered to await the report of the Committee on Nominations. It was also moved to change the place of the meeting of the session to the M. E. Church, South, in order to make room for the mass meeting of the Laymen's Association.

Committee on Conference Relations—The Committee on Conference Relations reported and the relations of W. C. Haltom, William Haggerty, J. W. Cardwell, and G. R. Rowan were changed from effective to supernumerary.

John W. May was discontinued.

J. G. Cairns moved that the case of S. D. Tuttle be referred to the Board of Stewards for favorable consideration. B. M. Martin moved that a message of sympathy be sent to Brother Tuttle. The motion was adopted.

**Question 36.**—William F. Pitts brought an invitation from Cleveland for the holding the next annual session of the conference and the invitation was accepted.

**Question 23.**—L. A. Rominger was continued in the supernumerary relation.

Question 22.—H. A. Gamble and F. Taylor Munsey, elders from the Missionary Baptist Church, were recognized as Local Deacons.

Question 3.—On motion of B. M. Martin, Charles H. Taylor was readmitted and placed on trial in studies of the second year.

**Question 7.**—The Bishop stated the case of C. F. Pafford and he was discontinued.

Years in Supernumerary Relation.—On motion of J. G. Cairns the Secretary was instructed to place the number

of the years of relationship of those who hold the supernumerary relation after the names.

Method of Proceedure.—J. M. Emert asked the Bishop to state the legal procedure in the investigation of the charges preferred against C. C. Morris. The Bishop made the statement and cited Paragraph No. 243 of the Discipline.

Counsel.—C. C. Morris requested that M. H. Monroe and J. S. Burnett be recognized as his counsel.

Report of the Committee on Nominations.—The Committee on Nominations reported the Committee of Investigation of the Charges as follows: J. A. Mitchell, M. H. Rambo, W. K. Harris, B. M. Morrison, J. D. Roberson, R. B. Stansell, M. P. Murphy, R. F. Porter, and W. L. Oliver.

The committee was called to meet immediately on the adjournment of the session. The Conference adjourned to meet at 8:00 a.m. Saturday morning.

## FOURTH DAY.

# Morning Session.

October 18, 1913.

Opening Exercises.—The Conference met at 8 a. m. with Bishop Henderson presiding. Hymn No. 551 was sung and A. A. Newman led in prayer. The Bishop then gave the Conference the third of his addresses on "Pastoral Evangelism."

Reading of the Journal.—The Journal of two of the previous day's sessions were read and approved. At this time G. T. Francisco moved that the Conference go into executive session. The motion was adopted. Wm. Haggerty and J. C. Patty were appointed door keepers. The Journal of the night session was read and approved.

R. B. Stansell Relieved from Duty.—J. A. Mitchell moved that R. B. Stansell be relieved from serving on the Committee of Investigation in the case of C. C. Morris. The motion was adopted. W. K. Harris moved that the Committee on Nomi-

nations select a member to serve in the place of R. B. Stansell. Adopted. J. M. Wolfe was elected.

Stenographer.—W. K. Harris moved that the services of a Stenographer be secured for the purpose of taking the minutes of the committee. This was adopted.

**Executive Session Adjourned.**—At this juncture the executive session adjourned).

Introduction.—Bishop Henderson presented Bishop R. J. Cooke of Portland, Oregon, who spoke to the Conference and later took the chair on the invitation of Bishop Henderson.

Bard of Stewards.—J. J. Manker read the report of the Conference Board of Stewards, and asked to be excused.

Introduction.—Dr. Ward Platt, one of the secretaries of the Board of Home Missions and Church Extension, was introduced to the Conference and spoke in the interests of the Society.

Reports.—Dr. John A. Patten was given the floor to read the report of the Joint Committee, consisting of the Conference Board of Stewards, and a committee from the Layman's Association, appointed to consider the raising of a Retired Minister's Fund of \$100,000.00.

Mr. Patten first read a report of the Methodist-Advocate Journal Fund, which was received.

On reading the report of the Joint Committee it was adopted.

Watson was elected to full membership in the Conference, and to deacon's orders and advanced to studies of the third year.

George J. Cresswell was continued in studies of the second year.

Question 11.—On the call of question eleven, What members have completed the Conference course of study, D. C. Slagle was continued in studies of the fourth year.

Report of the Committee on Sunday Schools.—G. T. Francisco read the report of the Committee on Sunday Schools and it was adopted.

Bishop Cooke.—Bishop Cooke spoke a few words in behalf of the new Petty-Manker Hall at Athens.

J. C. Patty.—J. C. Patty spoke of his Conference course record.

Historical Society.—M. C. Bruner nominated J. J. Manker to succeed Bishop Cooke as a member of the Holston Conference Historical Society.

Time—The time was extended.

Afternoon Session.—G. T. Francisco moved to meet when adjourned, in an afternoon session at 1:30 p. m.

**Deaconess' Report.**—The Deaconess' report was read and adopted.

**Adjournment.**—The session adjourned with the benediction by Bishop Cooke.

**Report.**—The Committee on Social Service reported and the report was adopted.

Question 11.—James Osborne and J. C. Patty were graduated from the Conference course of study, and elected to Elders' orders.

Question 10.—W. L. Oliver and Cicero Dobbs were continued in studies of the 4th year. W. F. Ledford and R. M. Millard were advanced to studies of the fourth year.

Question 9.—E. R. Branam was continued in studies of the third year.

F. H. Carey was referred to the Committee on Conference Relations. J. O. Cox was continued in studies of the third year.

Question 6.—J. J. Genthner was continued on trial in studies of the second year. J. F. Hutchinson and C. V. Bellamy were continued on trial in studies of the first year.

Question 4.—Henry A. Gamble was received on his credentials from the Missionary Baptist Church and placed on trial in the studies of the first year.

Adjournment.—It was moved and passed that when the session should adjourn it stand adjourned to meet at 7:00 p. m.

Committee on Conference Relations.—The Committee on Conference relations recommended that Frank H. Carey be placed on the supernumerary list in studies of the third year. The report was adopted.

Committee on the State of the Church.—The report of the Committee on the State of the Church was read and adopted.

E. J. Winkler.—On motion by G. T. Francisco, E. J. Winkler was placed on the retired list.

The session adjourned with the benediction by R. B. Stansell.

# FOURTH DAY

## Night Session

**Opening Exercises.**—The night session met at 7:00 p. m., and after a song, G. T. Byrd led the Conference in prayer.

Question 10.—William Bull was advanced to studies of the fourth year.

Resolution.—G. T. Byrd offered the following: "Whereas, some of our young men are unable to purchase the regular Conference Course of Study; and, Whereas, in order to relieve this situation and provide for them; Resolved, first, that a committee of three be appointed by the Presiding Bishop, who shall take this matter in hand, and provide at least two Conference Courses of study, which shall be in use as a circulating library course of study. Resolved, 2nd, That all the brethren who will donate books for this purpose please report to the committee, consisting of G. T. Byrd, E. O. Woodyard, H. M. Torrey."

Case Referred.—B. M. Martin moved that the case of W. R. Suman be referred to the Board of Stewards. The motion was adopted.

Adjournment.—On motion the session adjourned to meet at 2:30 p. m. Sunday.

## FIFTH DAY

Sunday Afternoon, October 19th.

On motion, M. O. Fletcher and J. F. Rowe, after a report from the Board of Examiners, were elected to Deacons' Orders under the Seminary rule, received on trial and placed in studies of the third year.

The session adjourned by motion to meet at 7:30 a.m., Monday, October 20th.

#### SIXTH DAY

# Morning Session

October 20, 1913.

Opening Exercises.—The Conference met in executive session at 7:30 a.m., with Bishop Henderson in the chair. After singing Hymn No. 349, E. R. Branam led the Conference in prayer.

Journal Approved.—The minutes of Saturday's and Sunday's sessions were read and approved.

Case of C. C. Morris.—J. A. Mitchell read the report of the select committee of nine which was appointed to investigate the charges preferred against C. C. Morris, which was as follows: "The committee of nine members of the Holston Conference appointed to investigate the charges preferred in the case of C. C. Morris, after thorough and diligent investigation of all the testimony at hand, report to the conference that the charges have been sustained, and we recommend that the accused shall be suspended from all ministerial services until such a time as trial can be had."

# J. A. MITCHELL, President, W. K. HARRIS, Secretary.

- J. A. Mitchell moved that the report of the committee be adopted and the committee discharged. The motion was adopted.
- J. M. Emert moved to appoint a select number for trial. It was adopted.
- G. T. Francisco moved that the Committee on Nominations be instructed to nominate the Select Committee of Nine, for the trial, and that the committee report the nominations at the afternoon session. The motion was adopted. J. W. Boling was relieved from duty on the Committee on Nominations. On motion of M. C. Bruner, S. P. Angel was substituted for J. W. Boling.

Statistical Corrections.—The Bishop called for corrections of discrepancies between his semi-annual reports and the statistical report.

R. E. Walker spoke on his statistical report.

**Excused.**—T. W. Brown and T. H. Hodge were excused from further sessions of the Conference.

**Minute Fund.**—The Secretary called the roll for the purpose of receiving and collecting subscriptions for the minutes.

Holston History.—Resolutions were offered by F. M. Cones, as follows: "We, the committee appointed to secure some one to write the History of the Methodist Episcopal Church in the Holston country, beg leave to report the following: After organization these resolutions were agreed upon: Resolved, 1st, that we request Bishop R. J. Cooke to write said history. Resolved, 2nd, that we request any of the brethren who may have in their possession any historic knowledge suitable for such a publication to place the same in the hands of M. C. Bruner. Resolved, 3rd, that at the earliest opportunity, Bishop Cooke be informed of this request."

J. J. MANKER, Chairman, F. M. CONES, M. C. BRUNER, G. W. COLEMAN, T. R. WEST.

These resolutions were adopted.

Bible Society.—T. H. Conner read the report of the Committee on American Bible Society, and it was adopted.

Adjournment.—S. G. Ketron moved that when the session adjourn it stand adjourned to meet in executive session at 1:30 p. m. Adopted.

At this juncture G. T. Francisco took the chair.

J. J. Robinette.—W. F. Pitts offered the following:

Resolution.—"Whereas the Rev. J. J. Robinette, for thirty years a member of the Holston Conference, who did efficient service both as presiding elder and pastor, filling some of the most important charges, and also served for a number of years as Secretary of the Conference, and was twice elected as a delegate to the General Conference, and is

now a member of the Indiana Conference, and a visitor among us, therefore, be it Resolved, that we appreciate the visit and presence of Dr. Robinette and express to him our utmost good will, and if in the providence of God the opportunity should ever come, and he should desire to return to this Conference, we would extend to him a hearty welcome."

#### SIXTH DAY

## Afternoon Session.

**Opening Exercises.**—The Conference was called to order by G. T. Francisco, and J. A. Mitchell led in prayer.

**Reports.**—G. T. Byrd read the report of the Committee on Epworth League and it was adopted.

J. J. Robinette.—J. J. Robinette, of the Indiana Conference, took the chair and on the resumption of reports, R. L. Stapleton read the report of the Committee on Temperance and it was adopted. A. G. Cadle moved that copies of the temperance report be given to the public press, and the motion was adopted.

**Methodist Review.**—J. W. Boling spoke in the interests of the Methodist Review.

J. J. Robinette Speaks to Conference.—G. T. Francisco moved that J. J. Robinette be requested to address the Conference, the motion was carried and he spoke to the Conference for a few minutes.

Bishop Henderson Resumes the Chair.—At this juncture Bishop Henderson took the chair.

Reports.—The Treasurer's report was read by W. F. Pitts. O. R. Tarwater read the Statistical Report.

Question 33.—The amount of the five per cent of the collections for Conference Claimants, due the Board of Conference Claimants was reported to be \$150.00.

Question 34.—The amounts apportioned to the Pastoral Charges within the Conference to be raised for the support of Conference Claimants for the coming year was reported as \$6,000.00.

Question 23.—A. M. Rose and W. C. Haltom were made effective.

Trial Committee.—The Committee on Nominations reported the nominations for the select number for the Trial Committee in the case of C. C. Morris, and the following were chosen: H. M. Torrey, L. B. Clark, R. E. Walker, W. S. Bandy, W. A. Martin, A. A. Newman, James Osborne, F. P. Sanders.

Ruling by Bishop Henderson.—The Bishop was requested to give a ruling on the right of the Conference to select the chairman for the trial court, and cited Paragraph 256, Section 3, as the Disciplinary provision by which he appointed the chairman. J. G. Cairns, Superintendent of the Chattanooga District, was appointed by the Bishop to try the case.

**Executive** Session Adjourned.—The executive session then adjourned.

Corporate Session.—With J. J. Robinette presiding, M. C. Bruner moved to go into Corporate Session. The Board of Incorporators reported by R. A. Simonds. M. C. Bruner made additional report on the work of the Board. The report was received by motion, and such moneys as were on hand were voted to be continued on interest. .G. T. Francisco was elected president of the Board, R. A. Simonds was elected Secretary, and M. C. Bruner was re-elected Treasurer. The Corporate Session then adjourned.

Treasurer.—W. F. Pitts read the Treasurer's report by grand totals.

**Temperance.**—Additional reports were offered by G. W. Coleman and G. T. Byrd on the report of the Committee on Temperance and these were adopted.

Minute Fund.—G. T. Byrd moved that a committee consisting of the Secretary, W. K. Harris and J. C. Patty be appointed to formulate a plan for the improvement of the plans already in operation for the Minute Fund collections. The motion was adopted.

Board of Stewards.—The Conference Board of Stewards reported on the apportionments for the retired preachers, the report was adopted and the checks distributed.

Recess.—It was moved to take recess for twenty minutes and the motion prevailed.

At 4 p. m. the Conference was called to order by Chairman Robinette, and Bishop Henderson then assumed the chair.

Official Journal.—It was moved by B. M. Martin that the minutes of the day's sessions be approved without reading, and that the minutes be the Official Journal of the Conference. The motion was adopted.

Resolutions.—J. M. Emert read the report of the Committee on Resolutions and the report was adopted.

J. J. Manker Files Appeals.—J. J. Manker being unable to be present at the closing session of the Conference on account of illness, asked leave through the Secretary to file appeals from the rulings of Bishop Henderson, and did so in the following statements:

"In view of the grave issues involved in the case of Bro. C. C. Morris, I feel compelled to renew my appeal to the General Conference against the ruling of Bishop Henderson along a challenge by Brother Morris against members nominated for the committee of five; this being only a committee of five could not in the nature of the case do anything more than a committee of inquiry into the nature of the rumors about Brother Morris, and in the appointment of a committee of inquiry, there is no disciplinary authority, according to my judgment, for a challenge. I therefore remove my appeal against this ruling to the General Conference."

Correct copy of appeals of J. J. Manker from the rulings of Bishop Henderson in the C. C. Morris case:

"In view of the grave issues involved in the case of Brother C. C. Morris, I feel compelled to renew my appeal to the General Conference against the ruling of Bishop Henderson allowing a challenge by Brother Morris against members nominated for the committee of five. This being only a committee of five could not in the nature of the case be anything more than a committee of inquiry into the nature of the rumors about Brother Morris. And in the appointment of a committee of inquiry there is no disciplinary authority according to my judgment for a challenge. I therefore renew my appeal against this ruling to the General Conference."

"Furthermore, as charges have been presented, with specifications, against Brother Morris, and said charges having been accepted by the conference, in my judgment the only disciplinary proceedings possible in the case were: First, to try the case in open conference with the bishop presiding; Second, to appoint a select number of not less than nine nor more than fifteen to whom the case should be referred for trial, that select number sitting under the presidency of a member of the conference appointed for that purpose by the presiding bishop; or Third, to refer the case to a district superintendent for disciplinary investigation. But the Bishop ruled that the committee of nine appointed should take the case under consideration in the way of a preliminary investigation for the purpose of determining what further proceedings should be necessary. this ruling I feel compelled to make appeal to the General Conference."

NOTE.—In the case of C. C. Morris, after additional study in procedure, it is the judgment of the Presiding Bishop that the procedure should have been as follows:

- (1) There is no well defined law in the church which permits the right of challenge in a Committee of Inquiry;
- (2) When formal charges were preferred and entertained, the Conference should have proceeded to formal trial without the appointment of a Committee on Investigation;
- (3) Because the Conference, after ordering a Select Number, adjourned sine die instead of adjourning to meet until the Select Number completed its work, the present Select Number should not proceed to act in this case.

# **REPORTS**

#### BRISTOL DISTRICT

C. C. Morris, Superintendent

In presenting this, my second report of the Bristol District, I am not unmindful of the mercies of God, through whose providence death has not been permitted to enter the ranks of the active ministry within the District.

Twenty-five pastors have taken care of one hundred and sixty appointments, an average of more than six for each, with an average salary of \$344.68. Fifteen new appointments have been opened. 8,198 pastoral visits have been reported. 1,332 conversions, with 743 accessions to the church. 83 Sunday Schools show an enrollment of 5,592, with an average attendance of 3,348. A few Cradle Rolls have been organized. The Home Department work has seemed to be impracticable in this territory as yet, and only a few organizations have been attempted.

It has not been possible to carry on the four-fold program as was suggested in our District meeting in January, but the subjects have been presented on each charge, and their adoption urged. Our people as a whole are slow to respond to a system so different from customs that have been followed for so long.

Church buildings, improvements and debt paying have been prominent this year. \$8,012.00 have been raised for this purpose.

The benevolent collections will fall far short of the apportionments made by the new Board, which, to some is more than one-half the amount of salary received by the pastor. This has tended to discourage many, and as a result the collections for the benevolences will not meet the expectations. However, reports from the pastors indicate it will be about the same as that of last year. It should be remembered that this is a Missionary field, and will be for some time to come.

On the Benham and Hilton work the pastor, J. W. Grace, is finishing his fourth year. The work is in a satisfactory condition.

At Bristol, W. F. Ledford has just completed a successful campaign, raising \$4,014.00, on the church indebtedness of the church.

At Christiansburg, C. W. Smith, transferred from the Blue Ridge Atlantic Conference, has had a successful year, and the charge is in a good condition. A part of the Lafayette work has been attached.

At Floyd, J. K. Rumberg has liquidated some old indebtedness, and improved the parsonage property by putting in a good well.

Franklin is situated in the county bearing its name, and has been successfully served for four successive years by H. T. Weaver, a local preacher of spiritual power. He is loved by all of his people. This is one of our weakest charges, but a more loyal Methodist people would be hard to find.

On the Fries charge, F. B. Slusher is wearing out his third buggy in as many years, and successfully meets fifteen appointments covering a territory of forty miles long and perhaps thirty wide. A splendid six room parsonage will be completed and painted this winter.

T. J. Crumley, at Gate City, has completed a church at Blairs, wihch was recently dedicated. Another chapel is under way, and the frame work of a new church at Gate City is partially up.

At Glenford, J. T. Ware, serving his first year on the work, has, in addition to his pastorate, completely overhauled and remodeled the parsonage, doing most of the work with his own hands.

J. H. Barton, at Greendale has been busy as results will show. An indebtedness of one hundred dollars has been lifted from the parsonage.

Honaker has had a successful year under the pastorate of W. E. Reese.

Lafayette has been divided. The appointments have been added to the Christiansburg and Salem charges respectively. Marion, Oakvale, Riner, and Russell, have had a good year under the pastorates of D. C. Slagle, N. A. Conner, E. L. Kilgore, and A. V. Dye, respectively.

At Nickelsville, J. F. Giles has, in addition to a successful year, practically completed the new parsonage in the town of Nickelsville.

Pattonsville has had a hard year. The pastor who was serving as supply, abruptly left the work, and under great difficulties D. B. S. Stone, has filled the appointments until the close of the year.

Pennington, Big Stone Gap, and Appalachia has had a successful year with G. S. Bales as pastor. Under many difficulties he has labored, increasing the confidence and interest. A lot has been secured and part of the lumber for a new church at Dalton's Gap is ready. Sixty per cent. membership gain is reported and notwithstanding great financial losses by the removal of members, the outlook is encouraging.

At Roanoke, G. T. Byrd has been almost constantly engaged in revivals in various parts of the city, establishing missions and using local assistance in order to carry on same.

At Rose Hill, G. W. Paul has principally walked a large circuit of nine appointments. He reports 110 accessions, and has led the pastors in the district in the number of pastoral visits, reporting 1,214.

At Salem E. G. Gillespie is closing his fifth year's pastorate. The principal victory for the year is the purchase of a parsonage, which is probably worth \$1,800.

Swords Creek and Wytheville have had a good year under the pastorates of Levi Murray, and M. F. Marsh, respectively.

At Princeton, for lack of leadership and support, the prospect for building has been temporarily abandoned. St. Charles has had a good year with H. G. Osborne as pastor.

While little has been accomplished on the Church at Wise, M. H. Monroe has not been idle. That entire country and over the State line into Kentucky, have felt something of his influence. Several classes have been added. Lots have been purchased and now it will be necessary that he have an assistant to help him successfully carry on this work, which under his management has grown beyond the ability of any one man to care for it.

Much encouragement and inspiration have been given to the district because of the personal visitation of our resident Bishop Henderson to St. Charles, Pennington Gap, Wise, Bistol and Greendale. His fatherly interest in each pastor and detail of the work, together with a personal knowledge of existing conditions before unknown by our great leaders, make us confident that many perplexing problems that have hindered the progress of the work of the district will be solved.

The year has passed quickly. Each day has brought its duties. I have tried to meet them honestly and perform them faithfully as God has given me the physical, mental and spiritual strength to deal with them, and the record is made. I sincerely thank all who have in any way contributed toward its success.

With gratitude to God for His mercy and imploring His pardon for all imperfections, I respectfully submit this report.

#### CHATTANOOGA DISTRICT

#### J. G. Cairns, Superintendent

Chattanooga District is composed of twenty-eight appointments, equally divided into stations and circuits. Ninety-three churches and preaching places are served. City and country, valley and mountain, manufacturing center, farming community and mining camp, combine to offer a complex problem. That this problem is being solved this report will show.

For many years the work of our church in this section has been characterized by energy and aggressiveness. Generations past and passing have left their mark, but during the year just closing a new note has been sounded and a quality of definition, hitherto unstressed, has been emphasized.

The district as a whole has passed the goal of a ten per cent gain in membership and has added five per cent more for good measure.

The following paragraphs touch briefly on the work at each point:

Copperhill was deprived of the services of its pastor W. C. Haltom in the Spring. His place was satisfactorily filled by W. A. Burnett. Here is a fine new church and parsonage, and an unparalleled opportunity.

Etowah is a rapidly growing railroad town of three thousand. W. A. Mirton has made a profound impression in the community and has added largely to the membership.

At Tellico Plains C. F. Hunter has carried forward the work with characteristic zeal and has been in a series of remarkable revivals.

Englewood, W. C. Martin, pastor, has finished a new church building and prospects there were never brighter.

Athens, under J. M. Emert, has had a most happy and useful year. The pastor has given himself unsparingly to his work and progress has been made in every department.

Athens Circuit, with eight appointments, is execeedingly difficult to administer, but A. B. Dennis, by his fine constructive work has placed the circuit on a good foundation.

Cleveland Station has, during the year, stepped into the front rank. The salary has been increased by eight hundred dollars, and an elegant residence has been secured for the use of the pastor.

W.F. Pitts has received one hundred and sixty-five new members during the year.

Cleveland Circuit after being deprived of the services of its pastor, J. W. May, finished the year under the care of W. F. Pitts and Lincoln Steere.

Chatata Circuit has grown under the pastorate of E. C. Thurston, a new comer in our Conference, who has proven himself of sterling worth.

Chestue Circuit, E. J. Winkler, has been blessed during the year. A number of successful revivals have been held with the pastor as his own evangelist.

McDonald Circuit has greatly enjoyed the pastorate of J. N. H. Miller. Several churches regarded as down and out, have been rejuvenated under his ministry.

Alton Park is showing marked advance under the leadership of J. D. Harris. Eleven hundred dollars has been paid on improvements, interest and indebtedness during the year.

St. James has had a year of phenomenal growth. The pastor, R. M. Millard, keeps in close touch with his people and is largely responsible for the increase in membership of eighty-four per cent.

North Chattanooga, led by G. B. Thompson, ranks with St. James in the rapidity of its growth, over eighty per cent gain being reported. Brother Thompson's work as pastor and preacher is the more remarkable in that he is engineering the construction of a new church to cost thirty-five thousand dollars.

Epworth has been favored with the services of three pastors during the year. J. J. Genthner, who closed the year, has seen the church take on new life under his care.

Avondale has found in Frank Mandrell a most faithful pastor. This church has a fine property and a superb location.

Manker Memorial was never in better condition. M. O. Fletcher, while carrying full college work, has made over five hundred pastoral visits, brought about a net increase in membership of 34 per cent and secured, free of debt, a site for a new parsonage.

Ridgedale, under the pastorate of J. C. Patty, has nearly doubled in membership in the past two years. The church is in splendid condition.

Highland Park is ideally located in one of the best residence sections of Chattanooga. Under the leadership of J. M. Wolfe this church has grown in prestige and power.

First Church, C. H. Myers, pastor, is making steady growth in attendance, membership and influence. Property to the value of \$25,000 has, during the year, been added to the holdings of the church.

Daisy Circuit has had a good year. The pastor, C. N. Sadler, has paid particular attention to our opportunity at Soddy, where lots have been purchased and plans made for the erection of a ten thousand dollar church building.

Fairmount is fortunate in having the services of George Creswell who has handled a difficult situation in diplomatic fashion. He is deservedly popular at both points on his work.

South Pittsburg has been blessed under the pastorate of Joseph Hutchinson. We have, at South Pittsburg, an up-to-date church and a high grade of people.

Jasper Circuit is rich in undeveloped possibilities. J. L. Sadler has caried on this work faithfully in addition to teaching school.

Whitwell Circuit embraces eight preaching places and has made advances at every point. James Osborne, the pastor, is beloved of his people.

Pikeville Circuit, under T. R. Baker, has developed into a most promising point. Pikeville will soon demand and support a stationed pastor. Welch's Chapel, at the lower end of the circuit, has made a substantial growth.

Mt. Olivet is the hard scrabble circuit of the district. Farrell Tate, the pastor, has done excellent work. In fifty square miles of mountain country we are the only denomination represented.

Tracy City Circuit, H. E. Sumner, pastor, is fulfilling every expectation. This work, abandoned for four years, is now one of the best circuits in the Conference.

During the year many revivals have been held in Chattanooga District and over two thousand conversions are reported.

We have gained over nine hundred members, an increase of over fifteen per cent.

Much of the credit for this fine showing is due to our resident Bishop who sounded the trumpet call, but the lion's share of the credit belongs to these devoted men, who, in most cases, with an inadequate support, and under conditions the most disheartening, have fought their way to the indicated goal. Of a certainty their reward is not here. Worse than the meagerness of the support is the irregularity of its receipt and the ever present dread of a deficit with consequent debt and discouragement.

At many points in our rural sections we have yet a far road to travel toward the better day.

Real progress, however, has been made and there is a growing conviction that the pastor should receive adequate support for services rendered.

The statistical record for the district will be marred by the appearance of deficits in several charges. We are discouraging the old-time custom of reporting salaries paid in full when they are not paid in full.

The University of Chattanooga lies within the bounds of this district and is having a good year.

We also have a proprietary interest in the Advocate Journal and note with pleasure that the Advocate Journal fund has, owing to the heroic and persistent efforts of Dr. J. J. Manker, been completed.

The ranks of our preachers have been uninvaded by death or serious illness.

Bishop Henderson has been an inspiration, a comfort and a refuge in the time of storm. Our only grievance is that demands from the wide field take him too much from us. Under his direction our District Conference proved a delightful and profitable occasion.

In conclusion I can only say that God has been good to us, in thrusting us into the face of a wonderful opportunity.

Truly He has set before us an open door and no man can shut it.

#### HARRIMAN DISTRICT

#### B. M. Martin, District Superintendent

We entered the new year with 27 charges under our care. Nine stations and eighteen circuits. We had by appointment a man for each charge at the beginning.

The lines have remained unbroken with these exceptions: W. P. Shockley appointed to Litton did not go to his work. Some ten days after Conference he asked to be released, because of illness of Mrs. Shockley's mother.

Ira Gibson, coming to us from another church, was appointed to the vacancy.

R. H. Millard, on the Norma and Oneida Circuit, worked well for eleven months. At this time he married, went on his "bridal tour," entering school while away at Nashville and did not return to close up the year.

E. M. Steppe, appointed to Lone Mountain charge, was early in the year placed under rumor from his associations near the close of last year and at Conference last fall, and came to a like experience in the latter half of this year on the Lone Mountain Circuit. Legal investigations were held, and he was duly suspended and released from the charge. But the suspension came too late for an appointment, saye the naming of a man in whose name the report is to be filed.

S. E. Taylor has been appointed.

The call is for charity. But forbearance sometimes ceases to be a virtue, and the cry comes to dismiss men from the Methodist Pastorate who want to play the part of Mormon Elders.

Changes in Lines.—The New Tazewell charge, composed of old classes, three cut off from the Well Spring charge, and prospective new territory, was manned by two men. But at the opening of the second quarter, with the approval of Bishop Henderson, we formed a new work to be known as Arthur Circuit, leaving P. E. Ramsey, the regularly appointed pastor, in charge of New Tazewell, and F. T. Munsey, the associate pastor, in charge of the new work.

New Tazewell and Well Spring have about done their usual work, and the new circuit with a good showing has become an actual gain for the District.

Classes Reorganized.—At Red Hill, within former bounds of Well Spring, now on Arthur Circuit, Suee Grove embraced by Decatur bounds, and Arthur more recently in New Tazewell bounds.

We have restored classes during the year with splendid promise of a good future. Have added a new class at Burgess Town on Litton Circuit. Red Hill has been abandoned some three years. Arthur seven years. And Suee Grove for more than a decade. Arthur and Red Hill retain their old names and Suee Grove is changed to Getty's Chapel. At Red Hill we own one-third interest in a Church building.

At Arthur we have secured a lot on which to build. We had a church building at Suee Grove without clear title. But in the re-organization the church comes to us without limitations.

Church Enterprises.—During the year we have completed the following churches: Young's Chapel on Sunbright and Rugby Road Circuit. Lancing Church, on Burrville and Lancing Charge. Cawood, on Well Spring work. May's Chapel, on Andersonville Circuit.

Value of These Churches.—Young's Chapel, \$600.00; Lancing, \$1,500.00; Cawood, \$2,000.00, and Andersonville, \$3,000.00.

At Oakdale our neat Chapel, worth \$2,300.00, was, in April, lost by fire. The people saving the organ, pews, pulpit, choir furniture. But the heroic band and faithful preacher, C. H. Taylor, encouraged by the generosity of Mr. John A. Patten, and the timely aid from the Board of Home Missions and Church Extension, are rebuilding.

They will have a neat brick structure with basement accommodations at the cost of at least \$5,000.00.

They hope to be in the new structure by the last of November. They have already applied on the building \$2,300.00. The property as it now stands is valued at \$4,400.00.

Dedication of Churches.—We have dedicated the following churches: King's Chapel, on Maynardville Circuit, Luther Clear, pastor.

After securing \$100.00 from the Board of Home Missions and Church Extension it was needful to provide \$66.00 on day of dedication. Dr. G. T. Francisco preached the sermon and with the pastor aided the District Superintendent in dedicating the church.

May's Chapel, on Andersonville Charge, Otey Dyke, pastor. On day of dedication it was required to raise \$430.00. Rev. J. M. Emert, former District Superintendent, directed the money raising and aided by the Pastor and District Superintendent, dedicated the church.

Cawood, on the Well Spring Circuit, C. L. Kirby, Pastor. It was found necessary on dedicatory Sunday to provide \$330.00. But we raised \$420.00. The Superintendent of the District preaching the sermon, leading in the providing of the finances and dedicating of the church, aided by the Pastor, Rev. C. W. Miller, and Rev. M. H. Rambo, of LaFollette.

Young's Chapel on Sunbright and Rugby Road Charge, H. A. Gamble, Pastor. The day of dedication approached with a shortage of \$20.00 on the indebtedness. And that was provided before the service began. The Superintendent of the District preached the sermon and dedicated the church, aided by the pastor.

Only last Sunday we dedicated our new church at Lancing, on Burrville and Lancing Circuit, L. W. Ellison, Pastor. Had to provide on day of dedication, \$500.00, the seemingly impossible thing for a small community with a class of 12 members, without a dollar of help from a distance. But in record breaking time it was done. The Superintendent of the District preached the sermon and dedicated the church, being aided in the services by the Pastor and Rev. H. E. Little.

District Parsonage.—At Harriman, in January, we bought an eight-room, well-located, commodious district parsonage, costing \$3,000.00. It is claimed by well-informed real estate men that the property is worth \$4,000.00. Have paid on the property near \$1,250.00. Have near \$1,000.00 more subscribed. The remainder will be found. The local church at Harriman, lead by the Pastor, R. F. Porter, provides \$1,000.00 on the enterprise.

Increased Valuation in Church and Parsonage.—We have a splendid showing of increased valuation in church and parsonage property during the year. About \$1,100.00 has been added. We have also done much improving and repairing and paying old debts. Outlays as follows: Andersonville Circuit, \$75.00; at Arthur, \$60.00; on Graysville Charge, parsonage and Sale Creek Church, \$150.00; Vine Grove Charge, including re-covering of church, \$220.00; Well Spring Circuit, improvements on parsonage, \$67.00; Decatur Circuit on parsonage debt \$75.00; Clinton Charge, at Taylor's Chapel, \$140.00; LaFollette and Jacksboro work, a disbursement of \$75.00; Newcomb Charge, \$125.00; Maynardville Circuit, \$133.00 at Scarboro, on old debts, \$22.00; Sunbright and Rugby Road work, on parsonage debt, \$52.00.

At Rockwood they have placed Sunday School addition to the old church and made large repairs on the church grounds at cost of from \$1,200 to \$1,500.00.

Spiritual Fight and Results.—Revivals have been somewhat general. In the most cases the pastors have been their own evangelists, or have exchanged with brother pastors. Miss Lilly B. Swinnea aided E. M. Pippin, P. E. Ramsey, T. F. Heird, and Wm. Haggarty on their respective charges, Decatur, New Tazewell, Morgan Springs, and Rockwood. Rev. Mr. Pittman, W. J. Letsinger and J. B. Cobble, on Newcomb and Scarboro Circuits. Dr. Wright of New York, led revival with R. F. Porter of Harriman.

Rev. C. O. Jones, of Oklahoma City, aided J. W. Boling at Jellico, and M. H. Rambo at LaFollette and Jacksboro. We have a large showing in conversions, approximately 1,478. Additions approximately 778. While our data is not complete, we have, despite our losses by pruning the books, throwing out imperfect records, some material gains, probably in full members, 438, and probationers, 33; total, 471. Allowing for discrepancy the gains would be 623.

Service Record.—We have conducted 110 Quarterly Conferences, and several adjourned sessions. Have preached three-fourths of the year upon an average of three sermons to each charge per quarter. And the other one-fourth of year has been given to Institute work. During this time we have held 28 Institutes, always making one of the addresses and often supplying for the absent team man and in connection with the most of the Institutes, preaching once or twice.

Only had my place supplied once during year at regular hour. Made three rushing trips to parts of the district accompanying our good Bishop Henderson in his strenous campaigns. Following plans of last year I have reached all of the 141 preaching places on the District, save three missed by emergency conditions arising during the last quarter, compelling me to cancel dates.

District Conference Session.—We have held one District Conference and one adjourned session of the same. The regular session lasts for three days and nights. The attendance was gratifying. Enthusiasm high. Interest intense. Program of unusual value.

Professor S. H. Thompson, Vice-President Dr. R. B. Stansell, Sunday School Missionary Dr. G. T. Francisco, representing their work, were welcome visitors and made good addresses. Rev. J. M. Wolfe, of Highland Park Church, Chattanooga, by request to speak on Bible Study, completing plans for a splendid program. He made a fine contribution to the program, with the District men who, in turn, did their part well. Our resident Bishop, T. S. Henderson, gave us his untiring and efficient services for one day and night. The evening sessions, Tuesday and Thursday, under presidency of C. H. Taylor and J. H. Jarvis, for the Epworth League and Laymen's Associations, were services of high order and promised much for the future of these organizations within in the District.

Our Department Work.—At Harriman, headquaters for the District, we have live auxiliaries of the Women's Home and Foreign Missionary Societies. The Ladies' Aid Society is a growing factor in pushing the finances in many of the local churches. New and thriving Epworth Leagues have been organized at Dayton, Jonesville, Oliver Springs, Sunbright, Vine Grove, and Well Spring, and New Junior Epworth Leagues at Clinton, Oakdale and Rockwood.

There has been an increased interest manifest in the Sunday School work throughout the District. In some places we have maintained large enrollments.

Our Closing Word.—Upon the whole we have had a good year on the District. We have met many of the usual limitations on spiritual lines, and general and special limitations on financial lines, but if we are not mistaken in our data, which is not complete absolutely, we have an advance of near \$1,200.00 pastor's salary; have saved the record on benevolences as compared with last year; gained small advance on Conference Claimants' Fund, and more than doubled collections for the Board of Home Missions and Church Extension, providing every dollar of apportionment accepted under agreement with Conference Board for the larger policy for the Conference on this cause.

We praise God for the victories of the year. And thank the preachers and laymen for the co-operation in plans, and must record our appreciation for the kindly friendship of Dr. John A. Patten and timely services of Bishop Henderson, and ask no honors for ourselves.

# JOHNSON CITY DISTRICT

# S. G. Ketron, District Superintendent.

I present this, my second report as District Superintendent of the Johnson City District. This District comprises twenty-eight pastoral charges; one hundred and forty-two classes, and covers a territory embracing the whole, or a part, of thirteen counties in upper East Tennessee.

All of the pastors have remained at their post of duty, looking after the different interests of the church, and it affords me great pleasure to report that the majority of them have had good health, and have rendered efficient service on their respective charges.

- J. C. Harmon, pastor at Elizabethton, was confined to his room and bed a few weeks on account of ill health, but the work of the church did not suffer.
- J. F. Reed had an attack of pneumonia, which kept him from his work six weeks. But every interest of the charge received attention by the laymen.

Death has entered only one of the homes of the pastors, and sore affliction another. The oldest daughter of Brother D. F. Smith, sixteen years' of age, and of rare qualities, was taken from his home and transplanted in the Paradise of God. The wife of Brother T. E. Goodman has had a long spell of serious sickness and it still looks as though she is near the crossing of the Jordan for the other shore.

I would be glad to enter into detail and report every worthy work of the heroic men who have helped to bring things to pass for the cause of Christ in this District. But time and space forbid this, and I can only mention the names of the pastors as they are connected with such work as demands special attention. But I will say that the pastors of this district have wrought faithfully and heroically, whether their names are mentioned in this report or not, or whether the statistical tables will show a large or small increase along any or all lines. If they have been faithful in that which is small, as well as that which is large, the Lord knows it, and our Christ will say "Well done!"

We have placed great stress on the pastors keeping a correct roll of membership. Each pastor has been requested to send a complete list of the members to me, giving the names and post office of each charge. The great majority of the pastors have responded, but a few have failed to do so. Hence we have not been able to complete our district roll, and there may be some discrepancies in our membership. Such a record is of great importance, and should receive the immediate attention of every pastor and every member of the Official Board. But I wish to state that each pastor has made improvements in correcting his list of membership, and we think that the report of the pastors will be about correct.

Eight thousand seven hundred an six members were reported last year, but the added up number shows 8,806, making 100 more than the pastors reported. This year the pastors reported 9,430 members, making a net gain in full membership of 724.

The spiritual condition of the district is good. Gracious revivals have been held in almost every pastoral charge, and the happy results are shown in the conversion of 2,213 souls, and 651 received into full membership.

Our Sunday Schools are in excellent condition. We have one hundred and twelve schools, a gain over last year of five. The added up column in our Annual shows 117 schools, where there were only 107. The Annual also shows in the total, 7,739 pupils, when it should be 8,039. Yet we have made a gain of 2,922, which makes our present enrollment 10,961.

Our Sunday School Missionary, Dr. G. T. Francisco, has rendered valuable service in different ways on the district. His visits here have been productive of much good.

On account of the terrible drought which swept over a large part of my district, we have not been able to reach the standard set the first of the year on benevolences, but with scarcely an exception the pastors have pushed the collections and have tried to raise their apportionments. Some of the pastors have made quite a gain over last year, and but very few, if any, will fall below the previous year. The salaries were fixed, on nearly all the charges, the same as they were last year, and, by making a few slight changes, every pastor will be paid in full. The amount for Conference Claimants will be in advance of last year.

The Ladies' Aid Societies are doing splendid work.

We also have some good Epworth League Chapters.

We have located within the bounds of this district, two church schools, one at Baileyton, the other at Chuckey. Both of these schools are doing good work. A full report of them will be given by the Committee on Education.

Our District Conference, held at Chuckey, was a success in all respects. Bishop T. S. Henderson was with us on Sunday and preached three splendid sermons.

A house has been purchased at Mountain City for a parsonage for the Mountain City Circuit, worth \$1,200.00. This excellent house and lot were secured through the wise and untiring efforts of the pastor, T. O. Brumley, and B. G. and J. N. Wills, leading laymen.

Another house, for a parsonage, was bought in the Newport Circuit, for which the pastor R. F. Harris, and H. H. Shultz, and other leading layment deserve much credit.

For years we have felt the need of a new church at Elizabethton, but the difficulties seemed so great that no pastor was willing to launch the enterprise at that place. Through the wise management and energetic efforts of the pastor, J. C. Harmon, aided by a hearty

co-operation on the part of our membership, and by the liberal help of John A. Patten, the enterprise was begun. The old church was sold and work on the new one began at once. The work has been pushed every day since, and the church will be completed in a few months, and when finished it will be worth \$10,000.00. It is the best located church in the city, and will be one of the finest.

On the Bloomingdale Circuit, the pastor, I. B. Leonard, has secured two lots for churches; one at Bloomingdale and the other at Cedar Grove, and has a large amount in good subscriptions, and will soon begin work on them.

Under the wise leadership of O. R. Tarwater, pastor at Johnson City, more than six thousand dollars has been raised in cash and in good subscriptions, to pay off the church indebtedness. He also reports the largest benevolent collections, the largest number of accessions, and the largest Sunday School attendance in the history of the church.

The same can be said of M. C. Bruner, at Newport; A. S. Beaman, at Morristown, and J. A. Mitchell, at Greeneville, except they did not raise so large a sum, and largely for other purposes.

The following amounts have been spent in repairing church and parsonage property on the respective charges:

Nearly every other charge in the district has made some improvement on its property. We have paid out for buildings, improvements and debts, over \$20,000.00.

As to my own work, will say that I have been very busy throughout the year; have held my quarterly meetings in person, except one; carried out the co-operative program given to us by Bishop Henderson, on the entire district; and outside of this, made a number of special and extra visits on some of the charges; presided over one District Conference, and helped at our District Camp Meeting at Sulphur Springs; held the Camp Meeting at Ross', and attended the Bishop at different places when he was present in the District.

Have done an immense amount of correspondence; preached 211 times; made a number of short addresses, and travelled over 8,000 miles. The Lord has blessed me with good health. I have not been sick a day during the year, although exposed to all kinds of weather, travelling through heat and cold, rain and sunshine on trains, automobiles, buggies, wagons, horseback and sometimes afoot.

I give God all the praise for the blessings of His providence, and for all that has been accomplished.

#### KNOXVILLE DISTRICT

# J. S. Burnett, Superintendent

Dear Fathers and Brethren:

I wish to acknowledge the favoring hand of Providence that has brought back all those who parted from you a year ago to serve on Knoxville District. J. T. Bird is the only one of our number who has suffered serious illness, and he seems fully well again. The only latalities in our minister's homes were the wives of Brothers J. A. Baker and E. O. Woodyard, who went in triumphant faith.

General conditions in our territory have been favorable to the work. Good roads are more general, but there is still much to be lone in that line. Telephone systems are being extended and improved; rural mail delivery reaches nearly every family, and a marked mpetus has been given the educational movement by the increase in interest in that cause. Last, but not least, there have been very few infavorable Sabbaths this year.

The larger Protestant denominations cover this country and operate in peace with each other as a general rule. M thodist churches conflict in but few places. The most lamentable thing about the whole situation is the lack of personal religious instruction of the young. It does not take a prophet to foretell the future if this continues.

The year's work can best be expressed by referring to the Disrict Program which was presented by Bishop Henderson last January n Knoxville. We adopted it as fully expressing a satisfactory articuation of our work and have tried hard to carry it out.

Institutes on the plan of the one held by Bishop Henderson when our program was launched, have been presented in whole, or in part, on every one of our charges except two, and they are city churches.

My report will be grouped under the headings of that program.

1st. Ten per cent gain.—This seemed the easiest to achieve, certainly the most needful. While we have not reached it, we have made a District gain of 7 per cent. The pastors report about 1,200 conversions and 1,030 accessions. The majority of these accessions have some from the Sunday Schools through the revivals.

Last year our District had to cover a loss of more than 500 mempers who had gone through bookkeeping and this year we have made up for about 300 more. If we had suffered only normal losses the District would show a full ten per cent gain.

The pastors have made another desperate effort to correct our Church records and I believe they will stand the test this time.

2d. Religious Life in the Home.—Our emphasis has been placed on family prayer, the spread of Christian literature, a religious concern for our children, and the incoming of so much religious interest that worldliness will not claim our whole life.

Surely this crusade is not premature. If anyone thinks it is let him glance over the semi-annual reports of our pastors and see for one thing how few family altars exist. Ask if the rules for the instruction of children are observed? How many of our children are dedicated to God in baptism? Is the subscription list of the Advocate-Journal growing?

If it is not time to preach a crusade against general lawlessness and worldly conformity with all the zeal of an apostle I fail to perceive the signs of the times.

3d. Financial Obligations Met According to the Discipline.—Nearly all charges make an effort to pay their obligations with a degree of regularity and all pay before the year is out. Reports show that the pastors are all paid but two. I have urged that Claimants and Episcopal fund be met in full and I hope such is the case. The total of ministerial support will show more than \$27,000.

I believe every material interest of the church would be helped by the adoption of the duplex envelope plan throughout our District.

Church Improvements—Oakwood Church, Knoxville, was so completely rebuilt that a formal dedication seemed appropriate. The District Superintendent was assisted in this service by Dr. A. R. Lambert, Rev. E. O. Woodyard and the Pastor, Rev. E. R. Branam. The improvements aggregating more than \$800.00, are fully paid for.

A parsonage, valued at \$1,800.00, was purchased by the heroic pastor and people of Oakwood in addition to this church and payments are being made on it as they fall due.

The Friendsville Church is completed and valued at \$1,500. A parsonage was purchased at Pigeon Forge early in the year, and Brother Bull, the pastor, is leading in paying for it in his usual successful way.

Numerous churches have been repaired and improved, the whole aggregating a very creditable advance in the value of our church property.

Just here I want to call attention to the small amount of insurance carried on our churches. Eighteen of our churches out of a total of nearly one hundred are all that have any insurance at all. The parsonages fare better for nine of the eighteen seem to be protected. But the protection for both classes of buildings is usually small. I call attention and urge this matter at every quarterly meeting and there is some improvement, but not much.

The Enlistment of Young People, together with men and boy's work, has claimed a large share of our time.

The Junior League is but feebly represented and the Epworth League is not strong, but the Sunday School work is growing at a flattering rate. More than 2,500 advance will be noted in our enrollment.

The organized Sunday School Class is our only way of reaching men and boys by themselves, but we have several of the best classes for this purpose to be found in the country. Our Sunday Schools are an inspiration.

These Sunday Schools are furnished with our own literature, with practically no exception. But we do not fare so well in song books. Many Churches and Sunday Schools are supplied with song books other than our own. Some of these are published by independent concerns or by other denominations.

One of the chief reasons for this is that our Book Concern does not publish a shape note book. Many of our congregations and Sunday Schools are not acquainted with any other system of notation, and must buy these if they learn any new songs.

If a book containing about two hundred songs which had been selected by the song leaders best known to our church in the South, were issued in shape notes by our Book Concern, I believe it would sell in paying quantities if the price is right.

Miscellaneous.—Our District Conference was well attended. Bishop Henderson spent one day with us preaching and presiding to the help and delight of all.

Through Bishop Henderson's patronage and direction we are maintaining eight school teachers in our community schools. These schools are doing a great work where they are situated.

Murphy College continues to grow. Dr. Bishop and his associates are developing the school according to high ideals.

Concerning my own work, I will say in a word, I have done the best I could. Others could have done better but no one could try harder.

I thank my brethren, both ministerial and lay, for the sympathy and brotherly kindness they have shown me. And to God be the praise for the results.

As your Conference Stewards, custodians, in a very important sense of the interests of our retired ministers and of the widows of our departed members, we respectfully submit the following report:

Mrs. W. R. Suman—Secretary

Our duties have been delicate and perplexing. The funds coming into our hands are not sufficient to meet the necessities and the claims justly due the claimants. We have, therefore, been compelled to cut the garments according to the cloth at our command.

The average salary of our ministers in active service, according to our last published minutes, 1912, was \$637.00. The full annuity rate, according to that figure, should be \$9.10 for each year of active service. But our funds are not sufficient to pay at that rate. The best we could do, after setting aside the sum urgently needed for cases of special necessity, was to fix the annuity rate at \$5.00 instead of the full Disciplinary rate of \$9.10.

If the Conference should make the apportionment for Conference Claimants \$8,000 instead of \$4,000, as it was made a year ago, and should raise the full amount, it would then be barely sufficient to meet the just claims of our living Veterans and of the dependent families of our departed brethren.

But that would perhaps be a larger advance than it would be wise to make at this time. We do, however, urgently recommend, as the Laymen's Association in their session yesterday recommended, that the apportionment for the coming year be \$6,000, and that that sum be apportioned to the several districts on the basis of the salary payments in the districts as reported in the Minutes for 1912. It would require about 7 per cent of the total salary payments to make the \$6,000.

On that basis the apportionments to the several districts would be: For the Bristol District, \$760.00; Chattanooga District, \$1,550.00; Harriman District, \$1,015.00; Johnson City District, \$1,115.00; Knoxville District, \$1,560.00.

The sums indicated for the several districts should, in our judgment, be apportioned to the several charges in each district on the basis of 7 per cent of the sums apportioned for the pastor and the district superintendent, and then paid quarterly on the pro rata plan as directed in the Discipline, and we respectfully recommend that the Conference so authorize and direct, in order that these sacred obligations may be fully met.

We commend Dr. J. J. Manker, editor, and S. H. Thompson, business manager, on the excellent paper they are giving us, and plead with our pastors to use special diligence in urging the claims of the Methodist Advocate-Journal.

'We congratulate the book concern on the high character of the literature coming from its presses, and, inasmuch as we are the peneficiaries of its profits we hold it to be the duty of every minister to do all he can to bring this rich and elevating literature to the attention of the people under his care.

# REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION.

Reports from the Corresponding Secretary of the Board of Education, Dr. Thomas Nicholson, indicate that the past year has been one of unusual prosperity in the field of Christian education. Large sums have been added to the permanent funds of our schools, important improvements have been made upon buildings and equipment, and the attendance upon our church schools is most gratifying.

Our pastors are urged to make much of "Children's Day." The loan fund secured on this day, amounting now to more than a million and a half dollars, makes possible the education of large numbers of worthy young people who become efficient leaders and workers in the church.

# OUR UNIVERSITY.

During the year Dr. John H. Race, who has been president of the University of Chattanooga for the past fifteen years, was elected one one of the publishing agents of the Methodist Book Concern, with headquarters in Cincinnati. This was a well merited recognition. His peculiar fitness for this responsible office, in the church, is quickly seen. At the earnest solicitation of the board of trustees of the university, Dr. Race continues as a member of that body and also consents to serve as acting president of the university until his successor is elected.

In January Dr. W. S. Bovard tendered his resignation as vice-president of the university to accept the position as general secretary of the Methodist Brotherhood, with headquarters at New York. At the annual meeting in June the board of trustees unanimously elected Dr. Robert B. Stansell vice-president of the university. Dr. Stansell has been abundant in labors in the interests of the institution and is able to report that every member of the faculties at Chattanooga and Athens is at his post and happy in his work. The student bodies are fully as large as on previous years. A large percent of last year's students have enrolled. While payments have been made on the subscriptions to the endowment and equipment fund amounting to a large sum in the aggregate, it is of the utmost importance that every subscriber shall meet his obligation promptly. Pastors will do well to remind their people of the work of the university and put upon thir hearts its needs.

One of the best improvements in progress is the building of the Petty-Manker hall at Athens. This dormitory for boys is nearing completion. It is modern and complete in its appointments. It is a most valuable and greatly needed addition to the equipment of our school at Athens. It is very fitting that this new hall should bear the names of two of the honored and revered members of this conference, the late Dr. Petty and Dr. J. J. Manker.

Your committee desires to urge upon the pastors as one of the most far reaching services possible in their ministry, the sending of the young people of their charges to one of our own institutions. We are able to offer them instruction as good as the best at the minimum expense. The Christian ideals for which our church stands are emphasized and exemplified in these schools. The trained young people from our schools are in great demand as teachers and Christian workers.

Regretting that Dr. Thomas Nicholson could not be present at the conference to represent the board of education, we greatly appreciate the presence and forceful address of Dr. Herbert Welch, of the Ohio Wesleyan University, who represented the board of education at the anniversary and before the conference.

# OTHER SCHOOLS.

Report from Wesleyan Academy, Chuckey, Tenn.

The Wesleyan Academy at Chuckey, Tenn., began its work for the present scholastic year September 2, 1913. Some changes in the board of instruction were made at the beginning of the present term. The following teachers constitute the faculty:

Prof. E. N. Jones, A. B., principal; Prof. R. H. Burkhart, Miss Flora S. Dunham, Prof. H. L. Painter, Miss Lillian Gillespie and Miss Mary M. Vincent, teacher of music. These instructors have each had academic and collegiate training and are competent for the work in the departments assigned them.

Since the opening of this academic year there have been daily additions to the enrollment of students, and it is believed that the members will reach more than two hundred before the mid-winter vacation.

The citizens of Chuckey and vicinity are very generous in opening their homes for the accommodation of non-resident students. As relates to the dormitory known as Fisher Hall, by a recent act of the board of trustees no gentlemen students will occupy this building. But ladies of the faculty and others of the student body room and board in the dormitory.

Most excellent facilities are afforded in this school for the study of music, and a large class organized for the same is now in attendance. The constant increase in the number of students demand greater capacity in school buildings. Dr. F. M. Cones, field agent for the institution, has done much during the past year in soliciting students, and securing funds for the varied necessities of the school.

Murphy College.—The past year in Murphy College has been one of advancement. The total enrollment for the school year 1912-13 was 455. The attendance this term shows an increase of sixteen per cent over the same date last year.

Twelve teachers of broad training and successful experience under the leadership of President Bishop are working together harmoniously and enthusiastically. A new department of home economics has been organized and is meeting a great need of our people.

During the summer months much needed improvements were made. Wall paint and varnish have changed the interior of the administration building; a good high-grade piano and a large cabinet organ have been added to the music equipment; new single desks have made another large room inviting, and a well drilled eighty feet in solid rock insures pure drinking water.

Special religious services of a week, under the leadership of Dr. Charles H. Myers were productive of much good. It is the purpose of the administration to put strong emphasis on religious training and culture.

Additional accommodations are greatly needed. The administration hall is not large enough to care for the students already in attendance. An addition costing about \$10,000 would give room for our work and lend symmetry and beauty to the present structure. We should have a dormitory for girls. At present our girls are scattered over town. It is not possible to accommodate all who want to come nor do our best work for those who are able to secure accommodations.

Oakland Seminary—The Oakland Seminary is located at Baileyton in one of the best sections of the south. It was here that such men as Col. G. A. Bailey, E. K. Weems, Dr. G. N. Bailey, Sr., M. L. Bailey and A. H. Jones and others founded this school in a community of Methodists as loyal to the Methodist church as any people on earth. They worked, and toiled and labored for this institution until it became one of the best schools of its grade anywhere to be found in Methodism. It was established in 1872. The Methodist Church owns the property valued at \$12,000.

Last year was the beginning of new things for Oakland Seminary. The trustees elected Joel N. Pierce principal, and Mrs. Pierce and L. D. Hundord, Prof. L. E. Easterly and Miss Wells assistants. Under their work there was \$500 improvement fund raised, to repair and equip buildings.

There was enrolled during the year two hundred and fifteen students. Eight graduates, consisting of three young men and five young ladies. The present board of education, on the account of Principal Joel N. Pierce being elected superintendent of county schools, elected Prof. Leon E. Easterly principal; Mrs. Joel N. Pierce, assistant; L. D. Hundord, primary teacher, and Eunice Robison and Miss Victoria Neas as assistants.

The board realized that their accommodations were insufficient to accommodate the present school, decided to buid an annex which cost \$2,000. J. M. Yokelay, O. C. Morrison, Dr. G. N. Bailey, G. B. Bailey and W. R. Bailey obligated themselves for this amount. The building is completed.

The department of domestic science has been added, also agriculture. There are six teachers in all with an enrollment of 210 students up to date. The Methodist Church owns all this beautiful property, and what does she pay for its support? One hundred and twenty-five dollars.

With the sacrifice of the people at Baileyton, they think the educational board should give this school at least \$1,000 for this year. The community raised \$400 in connection with their own struggles for the endowment fund for Chattanooga University. They have also

purchased equipment for the domestic science department. This school needs a laboratory. It needs some funds to pay some debts, that will fall very heavy upon a few individuals unless the church helps. There is a bright future for this old institution which has sent out hundreds of strong men and women for the church. Will the men in authority visit this school and see the great work it is doing for the young people of this section.

We suggest that our people should be kept well informed upon the work of this board; that we emphasize frequently the importance of its work and as early as possible in the year, our apportionment be collected and promptly forwarded to the office in Philadelphia.

Thirdly, that we urge upon every member of the church to contribute something during the year to foreign missions.

We need to organize a Cradle Roll and Home Department in every school, enlisting those who belong to us. Many Cradle Rolls and Home departments have been organized this year, but we have only made a beginning, a splendid one it is true, but let us continue the good work.

We are under many obligations to the board of Sunday schools for the interest that they are manifesting in us. Many grants of literature have been made to us by this board.

As we go out from this conference let us go with the Sunday School cause on our hearts.

# REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON STATE OF CHURCH.

The committee on the State of the Church submits the following report:

Probably no year of the history of the Holston Conference has there been reported so decided a gain as the statistics show for the conference year just closing. The report of a net gain in membership of 2,316 in Sunday school enrollment of 8,258, in church property of \$51,375 is cause for thankfulness. There is however a need of vital spirituality that will reach the home life within our territory.

The 'oyalty to the Methodist Episcopal church and her interests on the part of ministers and laymen is worthy of great commendation. However hopeless may have seemed the struggle in other years, the reward has come. The Methodist Episcopal church assumes with characteristic grace their rightful place of leadership among the sister denominations.

Moreover Methodism's adaptability and the flexibility of her policy allows the church to quickly enter and develop any field. The rapid development of the material resources in East Tennessee will demand an increasing service from our church.

We urge the pastors to give more thought and time to the development of system in their work, without which, in many instances all that has been previously gained is lost.

The problem of the rural church is gigantic, but more hopeful than in other sections where the drift is city-ward. There seems to be unlimited opportunities to utilize the rural churches as community centers.

We must advance. With eagerness and faithfulness, let us return to the work of another conference year.

# REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE

Holston Conference, Methodist Episcopal Church, October 15-20, 1913.

The developments of recent years concerning the warfare between the forces of righteousness and the liquor business, are so encouraging and hopeful that for all we have gained we look up to God with grateful hearts and profound thanksgiving for the present prospect and outlook for this cause, especially in the State of Tennessee.

From Memphis to Knoxville, and from Chattanooga to Bristol the cry is ringing out, "Tennessee is going dry." God grant that the prayers of all these blood-dripping and heart-breaking years may be answered speedily.

In the language of the Episcopal address of 1912, "All the woes of perdition lurk in the bar-room, all that conspires against decency of living, peace of home, good of country, progress in achievement, honor in men, purity in women, and hope in humanity, has there its haunt.

Ruin writes its record, despair and death are its closing chapters. Language has been exhausted in denunciation of it; souls have been dissolved in tears by reason of its deadly ravages; but the monsters jaws still drip with the blood of the innocent as well as the guilty.

O, the patience of God with its keepers; O, the compassion of Christ for its victims; O, the apathy of men who shun battle with it.

Men of Europe, Asia, Africa and South America, carry back to your people this message from the Methodists of America, that in practice and principle, we stand for total abstinence from strong drink; and that so long as the spirit of God abides with us, there will be no truce with the making or selling of whiskey, wine, beer or other intoxicants to be used as a beverage. We stand for the speediest possible suppression of the liquor traffic. We are in favor of reclaiming every foot of territory which can be wrested from the liquor traffic,

and we, therefore recommend that all our people participate in every wise movement for local prohibition as a step towards state and national prohibition."

We rejoice that Methodism in Holston Conference has not been asleep on this most engrossing subject.

The present situation in Tennessee indicates a constant advancement in the forces that are arrayed against the already outlawed saloon, and the question has assumed the condition of a fight for the enforcement of the laws already passed by previous legislatures.

Thus do the forces of unrighteousness recede slowly from one position to another. But a mighty and harmonious voice was again heard through the state, and the people rallied to the request of our Tennessee Governor, Ben W. Hooper, for an expression of their sentiments regarding the enforcement of the law and there was heard no uncertain sound.

Resolved First, that we congratulate Governor Ben W. Hooper and the patriotic men who stood true to him in the extraordinary session of the Tennessee legislature just closed, upon the great victory achieved in passing the Law Enforcement Bills, and that we, as a conference, pledge him our loyal support in the carrying out of the provisions of those measures.

Second. We condemn emphatically the efforts of all persons whatsoever, whether in the Legislature or out of it, who have sought by unfair and dilatory tactics to retard or defeat the efforts of the Governor, and the Christian citizenship of the State to free us from the curse of the out-lawed liquor business.

Third. We endorse and recommend all our ministers to support the Temperance society of our church in the spead of the work in which it is engaged.

Fourth. We endorse and commend the Anti-Saloon League and congratulate this organization for the marvelous help it has been to the cause of sobriety and law enforcement in Tennessee.

Fifth. We join hand to hand with every society, church or other organization which has for its purpose the fight for the suppression and final destruction of the traffic in the manufacture and sale of intoxicating drink.

Sixth. We pledge ourselves again on the beginning of another year's work to everlasting enmity to the saloon and the liquor business, and to renewed energy and effort against it in the year that is before us.

Whereas, there is before the Virginia Legislature and Senate an act called the "Enabling Act," which provides that the people themselves express their wishes whether or not they shall have the open saloon.

Resolved, first, That we, the Holston Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, express ourselves as being in hearty sympathy with such act.

Resolved, Second, That we urge all our members in the Virginia territory to use all laudable means to secure the passage of the above law.

Resolved, First, That we heartily endorse the Christian attitude of our church on the use of tobacco in all its forms, and we congratulate the ministry of the church in its total abstinence from its use.

Resolved Second, that we greatly deplore the growing habit among the boys in our Methodist families of smoking the demoralizing and destructive cigarettes, which it is everywhere admitted among scientists and medical practitioners, as having a very damaging effect upon physical health, growth in intelligence and morals.

# · REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

Realizing man's need for rest of hand and head and heart, based upon scientific, economic and moral principles, and rembering that God has said "Remember the Sabbath Day to Keep it Holy." We submit the following:

First. We greatly deplore the increasing desecration of the Christian Sabbath by many or most of the railroads of our country, practically all kinds of freight being handled seven days of every week.

Second. We further deplore the very prevalent custom of most drug stores and many grocery stores as well, of selling of tobacco, cigars and chewing gum, as well as many kinds of soft drinks on the Sabbath Day.

Third. Also in our rural sections this day seems to be increasingly used for the purpose of buying, selling, driving cattle, sheep and hogs, as well as other business transactions.

Fourth. We recommend that our pastors, everywhere, continually seek to convey to our people the voice of God and the church as to the sacredness and holiness of the Christian Sabbath.

# REPORT OF THE

JOINT COMMITTEE OF THE HOLSTON CONFERENCE AND THE LAYMEN'S ASSOCIATION OF THE HOLSTON CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST EPISCOPAL CHURCH,

APPOINTED TO CONSIDER THE PROVISION OF AN ENDOW-

MENT FUND FOR THE RETIRED MINISTERS OF SAID CONFERENCE AND THEIR WIDOWS AND ORPHANS.

I.

At the session of the Laymen's Association, held in Chattanooga, October 27, 1912, the following action was taken:

"We must not delay provision for our veteran ministers. A fund of \$10,000 is imperatively needed now. We pledge ourselves to cooperate with every effort that may be put forth to this end and authorize our President to appoint committees to confer with the annual conference and arrange plans for such a campaign, either this year or to begin in October, 1913, as the conference may decide.

#### II.

While addressing a joint session of the ministers and laymen of the conference on October 25, 1912, Samuel H. Thompson, president of the Laymen's Association, gave notice that the laymen of the conference were ready to co-operate in the creation of a permanent fund for the benefit of the conference claimants. Before adjournment the conference resolved: "That we, the members of the Holston conference, have heard with profound satisfaction the recommendation made by Prof. S. H. Thompson, president of the Holston Conference Laymen's Association, in that body that a movement be undertaken by the laymen to raise a fund of \$100,000 as a permanent endowment fund for the benefit of the conference claimants of the Holston conference and that we pledge our hearty co-operation in such a worthy undertaking."

## III.

To represent the conference in the consideration of this important matter the conference board of stewards were appointed.

To represent the Laymen's Association this committee was named: S. H. Thompson, J. A. Patten, J. A. Grigsby, C. L. Parham and J. W. Fisher.

# IV.

After extensive correspondence with the general board of conference claimants of the denomination and with numerous conference organizations doing a similar work, the joint committee met in Chattanooga September 4, 1913. Following a discussion the meeting unanimously voted to recommend that a campaign for a \$100,000 permanent

fund be entered upon at the earliest practical date. Two subsequent meetings of the joint committee have resulted in the preparation of the attached plan, which is submitted for approval

v.

We recommend that the conference board of stewards and the laymen's association committee be given power to open the campaign when in their judgment, the time is opportune for its successful consummation and satisfactory executive leadership is assured.

VI.

On October 17, 1913, the Laymen's association unanimously adopted the following resolution:

Resolved, That we approve and adopt the report presented and, pending the larger accomplishment, we pledge ourselves to co-operate with the district superintendents and the pastors in raising from the churches at least \$6,000 for the Holston conference claimants for the coming conference year.

#### CONSTITUTION AND RULES

of the

BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE RETIRED PREACHERS' FUND Of the Holston Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church.

#### Article I.

The corporate name of this organization shall be the Board of Trustees of the Retired Preachers' Fund of the Holston Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church.

#### Article II.

The object of this organization is to raise and perpetually maintain a fund for the relief of the retired, itinerant preachers and the widows and minor children of deceased preachers of said conference. The board shall be auxiliary to said conference in its support of retired ministers and shall make an annual report of its financial condition to the conference and to the conference Laymen's association.

The said fund shall consist of monies, notes and other property received from bequests, donations, annuities and from any other available sources. The fund shall be permanent and the whole of the proceeds, less necessary cost of administering the fund, shall be applied:

First, to the support of the retired members of the Holston An-

nual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church.

Second, to the support of the widows and minor children of deceased members of Holston Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal church.

Third, to the support of such ministers who have served as supplies in the Holston Conference as may be as exceptional cases recommended for such aid by the Holston Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church.

#### Article III.

The membership of this board shall consist of seven members, three of which number shall be chosen from the members of the Holston Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church and four from the lay membership of the churches of the Holston Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church.

The ministerial members of the board shall be chosen annually by the Holston Annual Conference; the lay members shall be chosen annually by the Laymen's association of the Holston Conference, or, in case of the failure of the said association to elect, the Holston Annual Conference shall elect said lay members. The members shall serve for three years, except for the first year, which shall be as follows: One minister and two laymen shall be chosen to serve one year each; one minister and one layman shall be chosen to serve two years each and one minister and one layman shall be chosen to serve three years each; and thereafter each member chosen shall serve three years, except he be elected to fill an unexpired term.

#### Article IV.

Section 1. The officers of this board shall consist of a president, a vice-president, a secretary and a treasurer, to be chosen by the board. The officers shall serve without compensation.

Section 2. The treasurer, before entering upon his duties, shall give bond and security in an amount approved by the board and filed with the secretary, the cost of the bond to be paid by the proceeds of the fund.

Section 3. The board shall select the executive officer subject to appointment by the presiding bishop.

The board shall have power to make by-laws or rules not inconsistent with its charter and constitution for its own government, and four members shall constitute a quorum.

#### Article V.

Section 1. The annual meeting of the board shall be held duringthe regular session of the Holston Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal church, and in the same city, at a time that may be fixed by the board; at which time the president and other officers of the board shall be elected for the ensuing year, who shall serve until their successors are elected.

Section 2. Special meetings of the board may be called by the president or by any three members upon reasonable notice being given.

#### Article VI.

Section 1. The board shall at its annual meeting provide for investing funds in its hands by appointing an investing committee of

three, consisting of the president and treasurer and one other member of the board. No loans nor investments shall be made without the approval, in writing, of all members of said committee.

Section 2. All investments shall be made by direct loans or in United States bonds or other approved securities; and loans shall be secured by first mortgage or unincumbered and improved real estate, the cash value of which shall be at least double the amount loaned.

Section 3. A record shall be kept by the investing committee and the treasurer of all their acts.

Section 4. The investing committee shall make a full report of all its doings and of the condition of the entire fund to the said board at its annual meeting.

Section 5. The treasurer shall at the same time present reports of the receipts and expenditures during the current year and of the amount on hand; also the amount available for distribution for the said year. The board shall order the treasurer to pay over the annual fund to the annual conference.

# Article VII.

This constitution and rules may be altered or amended at any meeting of the board by a vote of two-thirds of the members present, such alterations or amendment having first been recommended by three members of the board and having secured the approval of the Holston Annual Conference and the Holston Conference Laymen's Association.

## Article VIII.

This board is hereby given the authority to fill any vacancies during the year caused by death or otherwise, but the person filling such vacancy shall serve until the next meeting of the annual conference and the Laymen's Association at which time the vacancy shall be filled in the prescribed manner.

#### THE ADVOCATE JOURNAL FUND

The Advocate Journal Fund having been completed and the cash securities having been turned over to Dr. J. A. Patten, the treasurer of the board, organized to handle the fund, it is right and proper that I render to the conference and to the Laymen's Association an account of my stewardship.

The funds were turned over to Mr. Patten June 30, 1913, and were as follows:

Of the sum above named \$390.02 was interest collected on funds in bank and on notes; and \$308.10 was interest on the \$3,250.00 of the fund which was used in purchasing a press and a Linotype machine for Mr. Hedge, he paying back the purchase money with interest in weekly payments. By paying cash for these machines a cash discount was secured of a little over \$160.00. This discount went into the fund. The total of interest and discount transferred was \$858.12.

When the fund was transferred, June 30, there was accrued interest on the notes up to that date amounting to \$159.10. If this should be included in the amount transferred the total would be \$11,033.31.

It is only fair both to Mr. Patten and myself to state that in his mind there is some doubt as to the present value of three of the notes, which together amount to \$400.00, and the accrued interest on those three notes is, or was at the time of the transfer, \$48.00. I think all those notes are likely to prove good. But deducting their face value from the total turned over, there will still remain in cash and in gilt edged securities \$10,474.21. And adding the accrued interest on the perfectly good securities \$111.10, the total assets as they passed from my hands would be \$10,585.31.

But in addition to the foregoing it is due to state that interest was collected and paid into the current expense account of the Advocate Journal as follows:

January, 1910, \$371.00; January, 1911, \$319.17; January, 1912, \$300.00; total \$990.17.

In submitting this report it may not be amiss to say that although there was necessarily some expense involved in raising this fund, yet not a penny of that expense money was ever taken from the fund, nor a penny for any other purpose except as above stated as to the \$990.17, which was paid over to the running expense of the paper, and that seemed to be necessary to save the paper itself. I may

also add that there are some pledges yet outstanding, not turned over to Mr. Patten, and most of these I hope to collect to the amount of one or two hundred dollars.

# TO PATRONIZING CONFERENCES OF THE METHODIST ADVOCATE-JOURNAL.

The board of trustees of the Methodist Advocate-Journal fund, through the undersigned officers of said board, namely, J. G. Cairns, president; J. A. Grigsby, secretary, and J. A. Patten, treasurer, respectfully make and submit the following report of its transactions to the date hereof:

# Organization.

At the meeting of the board of trustees of the Methodist Advocate-Journal, theretofore chosen and appointed under the plan for securing ten thousand dollars (\$10,000.00) for the equipment and publication of the Methodist Advocate-Journal, duly and regularly called and held at Chattanooga, Tennessee, on Tuesday, the third day of June, in the year A. D. 1913, it was resolved by unanimous vote that said board of trustees should then make application for a charter from the state of Tennessee for the "Board of Trustees for the Methodist Advocate-Journal Fund."

At said meeting, by unanimous vote of all said trustees present, the following officers of said board were duly chosen and elected, namely, J. G. Cairns, chairman; J. A. Grigsby, secretary, and J. A. Patten, treasurer, to serve respectively as such without compensation and for the term of one year.

The treasurer, J. A. Patten, thereupon gave and still maintains in force a solvent and approved bond for ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) for the due and full performance of his duty. After having given said bond the treasurer received from the Rev. J. J. Manker, trustee, the monies paid into and derived from the investment of said fund, as shown in detail under the heading "Financial" hereinafter in this report.

The board voted to sumit a financial report to each annual conference in the patronizing territory of the Advocate-Journal each year, and also to submit nominations for members of the board to the conference of which the new member belongs for confirmation.

The names of the present trustees of said fund, the contributing conference from which each was chosen, the present place of residence of each, and the date upon which his term of service as such expires, are as follows:

Dowdy, of the Central Tennessee conferences, were elected to succeed them, to serve for the unexpired terms, subject to confirmation by the conferences to which they belong.

By resolution unanimously adopted, said board devolved and imposed upon said officers the performance of the details of its duty to receive and control and administer said fund, and said officers have performed said details as hereinafter shown without expense of any kind.

The above \$6,380.53 is invested in notes of approved and solvent individuals, secured by first mortgage deed of trust upon improved real estate, at a net annual interest return of six per cent (6), payable semi-annually, and is less than sixty per cent (60) of the appraised value of said real estate to the amount of \$8,150.00.

The above \$882.00 is secured by printing machinery under contract with J. B. Hedge, whereby he repays \$20.00 weekly to the principal of the fund, and \$1.89 weekly to account of interest. Previous payments under his contract have been made promptly to the total amount, principal and interest, of \$2,284.98.

The above \$3,020.00 is the aggregate of the principal of 22 separate notes, in amounts ranging from \$25.00 to \$1,000.00, of various dates, but all bearing interest at six per cent (6) from date, given for subscriptions to the fund. Neither the principal nor the interest of these notes has been paid with equal promptness and regularity by all those who so generously made them in aid of our undertaking. We believe, however, that all have been as prompt in the past as they found practicable, and that they will do their best in the future. At present, however, we can not say with certainty just when nor how promptly all these notes and the interest thereon will be paid to the trustees, but we will collect them with the greatest possible dispatch.


