# **MEMOIRS**

### FRANCIS M. CONES

The Rev. F. M. Cones was a genial, high-minded man, without show or flurry, patiently plodding forward with plan and purpose to do his work in a way to win the Master's approval. He answered his country's call to arms in the sixties and the Grand Army button was his daily badge. He never shirked his duty. He always left a Charge better than he found it. He was an engaging Conversationalist and took great interest in tracing the genealogy of his friends. He was admitted on trial in the Holston Conference in 1875, and held the following appointments:

Holston; Leicester, 1875-6; Greenville, 1876-7; Holston Seminary, New Market, 1877-78; Supply in Kentucky, 1878-79; Supply in Northwest Indiana Conference, 1879-98; Agent Murphy College, 1898-99; Agent Advocate Journal, 1899-1900; Jones Chapel and Elm Grove, 1900; Lonsdale, 1901; Elizabethton, 1902; Chaplain, Indiana State Soldiers' Home, 1903-8; Field Agent Wesleyan Academy Chucky, Tenn., 1908-17.

On Sept. 26, 1917, death's shadow enveloped utterly Rev. Francis Marion Cones, D. D., and he entered on his rich reward. Dr. Cones was born in Hancock County, Indiana, Nov. 17, 1836. His father, Joseph Cones, was a Methodist Class Leader of the olden type—type never surpassed. His mother, Nancy G. Cones, was a devoted Christian woman. In 1872 he came to East Tennessee, and for two or three years engaged in teaching school. His last work was done as field agent of Wesleyan Academy, Chucky, Tenn. As a preacher, Dr. Cones was clear and evangelical. As a friend he was devotedly true. We shall see his cheerful face no more, until we rise up to the larger, brighter, holier fields to which our friend and brother has been transferred.

### REV. G. A. CONNER

Rev. Giles A. Conner, a retired minister of the Holston Conference, was born in Montgomery County, Va., about seventy-six years ago, and departed this life during the year 1918 at his old childhood home in Montgomery County, Va. Brother Conner was a son of Costly Conner who was one of the old time Methodist Classleaders—a man of great faith and power. Bro. G. A. Conner was converted when a young man and came into the church of his father's choice, and in a few years after was licensed a local preacher. Two or three years later he was admitted on trial into the Vir-

ginia Conference, and took up the Course of Study then required for traveling preachers and served as an assistant pastor on the Roanoke Circuit under Rev. J. W. Rumburg for one year. During his time in the Virginia Conference he served the following Charges: New River, Catawba, Roanoke, Floyd, Grayson, Washington and Wytheville. There may be some others that the writer cannot call to mind just now.

Brother Conner met his examinations in their order and was ordained accordingly. Brother Conner was a strong theological preacher—a teacher. He was a man of strong personal convictions and would dare to do what he thought was right in the sight of God and man. He retired from active service in the Holston Conference in 1910. He made a rule of tithing and so gave back to the church one-tenth of what he received, as a Conference claimant from year to year. His wife preceded him to Heaven by several years. He left seven or eight children to mourn their loss. He died in the same faith by which he walked through the long years of his life.

Our loved ones go from us but we hope to overtake them some time, and to know them as now. So may it be.



# CONFERENCE RULES

- 1. No person shall absent himself from the sessions of the conference without leave, unless he be sick or otherwise unable to attend.
- 2. The secretary shall keep a journal of the conference proceedings, which he shall cause to be published in the Annual Journal of the conference, and it shall be the official journal. He shall edit the minutes and all matter for publication, and shall make contracts for the printing of the journal as in his judgment may seem best. He shall have charge of the journal and conference files, and forward them to the place of the meeting of the annual conference each year.
- 3. All committees whose reports are to be printed in the journal shall present their reports to the secretary in writing, otherwise the committee on publication is not required to insert such reports in the journal.
- 4. All candidates for admission on trial, for admission into full membership, for admission on credentials from other churches, for readmission and for recognition of orders, shall be required to appear before the Committee on Conference Relations and the Board of Examiners, and to furnish such information as may be required touching their general character and their qualifications for the ministry.
- 5. All cases involving a change in conference relations or withdrawal, shall be referred to the Committee on Conference Relations.
- 6. Widows of deceased ministers who have never traveled with their husbands may be temporary claimants, and may be referred to the board of stewards, who shall decide each case from year to year.
- 7. The chairman of the board of stewards shall be ex-officio one of the assistant secretaries of the conference for secretarial work in connection with conference claimants, and shall be the last member of the Committee on Memoirs.
- 8. The memorial service for deceased members, and for the wives of deceased members, shall be the special order for conference Sunday afternoon following the ordination service.
- 9. Conference visitors shall be allowed 10 minutes in which to address the conference. District Superintendents' reports shall be

limited to 15 minutes, and reports of committees, except the board of stewards, to five minutes.

- 10. All applications for special collections to be apportioned to the charges in the conference shall be referred to the Committee on Special Collections.
- 11. There shall be elected each year a Nominating Committee, consisting of three members, which committee shall nominate the standing Committees and the Committee on Nominations for the ensuing conference session. No member of the Nominating Committee shall be eligible for consecutive re-election to this committee.
- 12. When a resolution has been introduced by a member, before the person who introduced the resolution shall speak, the question of consideration may be raised by a member saying, "Mr. President, on that I raise the question of consideration." The question of consideration shall then be put without debate, and if there is a two-thirds vote against consideration, the resolution shall not be entertained; but if consideration be not denied, the member introducing it may speak to the resolution if it be seconded.
- 13. The standing committees confirmed each year by the conference shall be as follows: 1. American Bible Society; 2. Auditing; 3. Church Literature; 4. Conference Claimants; 5. Conference Relations; 6. Deaconess Work; 7. District Conference Records; 8. Education; 9. Epworth League; 10. Foreign Missions; 11. Freedman's Aid Society; 12. Home Missions and Church Extensions; 13. Memoirs; 14. Nominations; 15. Public Worship; 16. Resolutions; 17. Sabbath Observance; 18. Sunday Schools; 19. State of the Church; 20. Social Service; 21. Special Collections; 22. Temperance; 23. Book Concern Accounts.

### RULES OF ORDER

- 1. The conference shall meet at 8:30 a. m., spending 30 minutes in devotional exercises, and adjourn at 11:45 a. m.
- 2. The president shall decide all questions of order, subject to appeal to the conference, and in case of appeal from the decision of the chair, the question shall be put without debate.
- 3. The president shall appoint all committees not otherwise provided for by the conference or the discipline, but any member may decline serving on more than one committee at a time.
- 4. All motions and resolutions introduced by any member shall be reduced to writing, if the president, secretary or any member requests it.
  - 5. No motion shall be considered unless it has been seconded.
- 6. A motion to adjourn shall be in order at any time, and shall be decided without debate.
- 7. When a motion, resolution or report has been read by the secretary, or stated by the president, it shall be deemed in possession of the conference, but any motion or resolution may be withdrawn by the mover at any time before decision or amendment.
- 8. No resolution or motion shall be made until the one under consideration has been disposed of, which may be done by adoption or rejection, unless one of the following should intervene, which motions shall have precedence in the following order: The previous question, indefinite postponement, laying on the table, reference to a committee, postponement to a given time, amendment or substitution.
- 9. When any motion or resolution shall have passed, it shall be in order for any member who voted in the affirmative, to move a reconsideration. The motion to reconsider shall be taken without debate.
- 10. No member shall be allowed to vote on any question who is not within the bar of the conference when said question is put by the chairman, except by leave of the conference.
- 11. Every member who is within the bar of the conference at the time a question is put shall give in his vote thereon, unless the conference for a special reason shall excuse him.

- 12. When any member is about to speak, in debate, or deliver any matter to the conference, he shall rise from his seat and resspectfully address the chairman.
- 13. No person shall speak more than twice on the same subject, nor more than five minutes at any one time, without special leave of the conference, and no person shall speak more than once until every other member desiring to speak shall have done so.
- 14. No member shall be interrupted while speaking, except by the chairman to call him to order, when he departs from the question, or uses personalities or disrespectful language, but any member may call the attention of the chairman to the subject when he considers the speaker out of order, or any other member may explain when he thinks himself misrepresented.
- 15. It shall be in order to move that the question be taken without further debate, on any measure pending before the conference, except in case where character or conference relations are involved, and if sustained by a two-thirds vote, the question shall then be put.
- 16. No motion, resolution or report shall be laid on the table until the member introducing such motion, resolution or report has been allowed to speak on the subject.
- 17. It shall require a majority vote to sustain the call for the yeas and nays.
- 18. The motion to adjourn, to suspend the rules, to lay on the table, to take from the table, and the call for the previous question shall be put without debate.
- 19. It shall require a two-thirds vote of the members present to suspend these rules.

# IMPORTANT INFORMATION FOR EXAMINERS AND CANDIDATES

- 1. The work of the Board is divided into six groups. Admission on trial; first, second, third and fourth years, and Local Orders. Each group to be in the hands of a committee—one of the committeemen to be chairman of the committee.
- 2. Mid-year examinations are required; time and place to be arranged and announced.
- 3. The day preceding the opening of the Annual Conference is the time appointed for examination.
- 4. The candidates are urged to buy their books at the very opening of the year, and study carefully the mid-year subjects, and after the mid-year examinations make complete survey of the remaining subjects immediately. The examiners are required to correspond with the candidates in the early winter, preparatory to mid-year examinations.
- 5. The requirements of the Discipline are to make the examinations written if practicable, and two weeks ahead of the Annual Conference to send written questions to the Chairman of the Board.
- 6. The chairman of each group is to submit in writing the grades of the candidates in his department to the registrar.
- 7. The provision for the mid-year examinations does not deprive any candidate of the opportunity of being examined on any subject at the time appointed for the examination at the Annual Conference.
- 8. The Board of Examiners, together with the candidates, are called to meet at the place of next Annual Conference session the night previous to the day of Conference examination.

Pastors statistical reports were collected.

Conference adjourned with the benediction by Brother Coleman.

### SECOND DAY.

### Morning Session.

Devotions—Conference convened at 8:30 a.m. and devotional exercises were conducted by R. A. Simonds.

Bishop Bristol announced that a draft of \$360.00 for the conference had been received from the Board of Conference claimants. On motion of R. L. Stapleton the draft was received with a vote of thanks.

B. M. Martin announced that a check for \$526.98 from the Manker Memorial Fund and from the Lucy Waters Memorial Fund would be given to the Conference Board of Stewards.

The secretary called the roll of charges from which pastor's reports had not been received and additional reports were collected.

Resolution—A resolution was introduced by J. A. Mitchell concerning Copper Hill charge providing for notice to be given the Georgia conference that at the next session of the General Conference request would be made that this charge be returned to the Holston conference. After discussion the resolution was adopted.

Correction—A correction of the conference journal was made, placing the name of H. A. Gamble in studies of the second year of the conference course of study instead of studies of the first year where his name had previously appeared through error.

Statistician—The statistician was permitted to select as an assistant, R. C. Elzey, instead of C. B. Tarwater. Alwyn Atkins was substituted for W. S. Gray on the Committee on Conference Relations.

- C. C. Hall, representing the Commission on Finance, was introduced and addressed the Conference.

On motion of A. C. Goddard the Conference voted to make Easter Sunday the climax of a great evangelistic campaign in the Conference, to observe Palm Sunday or Easter Sunday as Decision Day in Sunday school and to observe May and June as stewardship months. Conference also voted, on motion of A. C. Goddard, to use, so far as possible, the literature on evangelism furnished by J. W. Oborn.

J. S. Hill, President of the Morristown Industrial Institute, and C. N. Garland, of East Maine Conference, were introduced.

Conference adjourned to meet at 2 o'clock in the afternoon.

### AFTERNOON SESSION.

Conference sang "A Charge To Keep I Have," and M. H. Rambo led in prayer.

The Order of the Day was taken up and each of the District Superintendents, J. A. Mitchell, M. H. Rambo, L. D. Hamil, R. L. Stapleton and W. K. Harris spoke briefly upon the subject, "Finishing the Centenary Task on my District."

A stirring address was made by Bishop Bristol appealing to the members of the Conference for thoroughness of organization in preparation for the campaign for a million converts by June 1, 1920.

After general discussion of the subject Conference adjourned with the benediction by B. M. Martin.

### THIRD DAY.

### Morning Session.

Devotions—Conference convened at 8:30 a.m. and devotional exexcises were led by J. J. Robinette.

Journal—The minutes of the session of the preceding day were read and approved.

Disciplinary questions 17, 18, 19, 20, 21 were asked and properly answered.

Question 7-Who have been discontinued? J. E. Willis.

Question 23—The characters of C. F. Hunter, D. T. Lawson, E. M. Pippin, G. R. Rowan and J. S. Strange were passed and they were continued in the supernumary relation. C. D. Hauchins was referred to the Committee on Conference Relations.

M. H. Monroe was granted a year's rest in keeping with the provision of the discipline.

Question 24—Who are the retired ministers? The characters of J. H. Amis, T. R. Baker, T. W. Brown, W. R. Byerly, A. G. Cadle, G. W. Coleman, W. V. Elliott, A. H. Ingle, C. W. Miller, J. W. McGhee, H. W. McKenzie and H. B. Ogle were passed and they were continued in the retired relation.

On motion of J. M. Melear, J. M. Emert was appointed to invite the Lay Electorial Conference to joint session with the Annual Conference at 2 o'clock in the afternoon.

Election—The order of the day was taken up and on motion of W. K. Harris rules of order governing the election of delegates to the General Conference were adopted. It was voted, on motion of W. K. Harris, that the ballots be counted in open Conference. G. S. Bales, T. J. Crumley, W. L. Oliver, H. M. Hawk and W. A. Martin were appointed tellers.

First Ballot. Total effective ballots cast, 106. Necessary to choice, 54. J. M. Melear received 75 votes and was elected a delegate to the General Conference.

Second Ballot. Total effective votes cast, 109. Necessary to choice, 55. R. L. Stapleton received 64 votes and was elected a delegate to the General Conference. G. T. Byrd received 57 votes and was elected a delegate to the General Conference.

Election of Reserve delegates was taken up and on first ballot J. A. Mitchell was elected first reserve delegate to the General Conference.

A second ballot for reserve delegate was taken and on motion of O. R. Tarwater the former action of the Conference was reconsidered and the tellers were instructed to count the ballot during intermission. Dr. Clifford of the Baptist church and Dr. E. C. Wareing, Editor of the Western Christian Advocate, were introduced.

Conference adjourned with the benediction by Dr. Wareing.

### AFTERNOON SESSION.

Conference was called to order by Bishop Bristol in joint session with the Lay Electoral Conference at 2 p. m. H. M. Hawk led in prayer. J. A. Grigsby, president of the Lay Electoral Conference, was introduced and addressed the Conference. An address in response was given by Bishop Bristol. On motion of R. L. Stapleton a rising vote of thanks was given the laymen in appreciation of their action in setting as a good goal a minimum salary of \$1000.00 per year for the pastoral charges of the Conference.

The result of the second ballot for reserve delegate to the General Conference was given and it was announced that J. S. Burnette had been elected second reserve delegate to the General Conference. A third ballot was taken and the announcement made that there was no election. A fourth ballot was taken and B. M. Martin was elected third reserve delegate to the General Conference.

Question 24—Was again taken up and the characters of J. D. Roberson, L. A. Romiger, A. M. Rose, J. K. Rumburg, G. H. Thompson, J. T. Ware and E. J. Winkler were passed and they were continued in the same relation. G. A. Crowder was retired and his case referred to the Board of Stewards. C. D. Houchins was changed from the supernumerary to the retired relation. P. L. Clonce was granted a year for rest. R. L. Leslie was continued in the supernumerary relation. W. S. Bandy was retired.

A proposed amendment to the constitution of the Preachers' Aid Society was announced by B. M. Martin.

Conference adjourned with the benediction by T. W. Brown.

#### FOURTH DAY.

### Morning Session

Devotions—Conference convened at 8:30 a. m. and devotional exercises were conducted by O. R. Tarwater.

Journal—The minutes of the previous day's sessions were read and approved.

The order of the day was taken up and the proposed amendment to Constitution admitting laymen to the annual conference was read

and afterward discussed by various members of the Conference. The vote was taken resulting in 49 votes for the amendment to 41 against it. Bishop Frederic D. Leete was introduced and addressed the Conference.

It was moved by R. L. Stapleton that when Conference adjourned it should adjourn to meet at 2 p. m. in executive session. The motion was adopted.

Annuity—Motion was made by H. M. Hawk that the Annuity rate for retired ministers be fixed at \$6.00. The motion was adopted.

Memorial—A memorial from the West Wisconsin Conference asking the General Conference to discontinue, as soon as practicable, foreign language conferences and churches, was read and discussed by the Conference. The vote was 35 for and 37 against concurrence.

Dr. W. F. Sheldon, Assistant Secretary of the Board of Education, was introduced and addressed the Conference.

Question 30 (a)—What is the aggregate of the benevolent collections ordered by the Annual Conference? \$56,139.00. (b.) By the Annual Conference? \$28,693.00.

E. C. Thurston was referred to the Committee on Reference relation with a view to retirement. On motion of J. J. Robinette, W. F. Pitts, Conference Treasurer, and his assistants, were given a special vote of thanks for their efficient and painstaking labor in taking care of the business of the Conference. At the invitation of Bishop Bristol, Bishop Leete occupied the chair.

The report of the treasurer of the Preachers' Aid Society was given and the Conference voted that this report and the report of last year be printed in the minutes. The amendment to the constitution providing for the payment of funds in the hands of the treasurer of the Society to the treasurer of the Conference instead of the treasurer of the Conference Board of Stewards, was adopted. Nominations for members of the Board of Trustees of the Preachers' Aid Society were made, the names of G. F. Lockmiller, J. W. Fisher, W. T. Harshbarger and X. Z. Hicks being presented that two from this number might be elected as lay members. E. A. Bishop was introduced and spoke in behalf of Murphy College.

Election—Result of ballot. Total effective votes cast 52. Necessary to choice, 27. G. F. Lockmiller received 39 and was elected. J. W. Fisher received 29 votes and was elected. A. C. Goddard and W. L. Oliver were nominated for the position of ministerial members of the board. Total votes cast, 52. Necessary to choice, 27. A. C. Goddard received 28 votes and was elected. Dr. C. E. Powell was introduced to the Conference.

Conference adjourned with the benediction by Bishop Leete.

### AFTERNOON SESSION

Conference convened in executive session at 2 p. m. J. M. Melear led in praper.

Bishop Leete presented to the Conference a paper on the subject of Methodist Unification. The paper was received with interest and appreciation and a resolution was passed thanking Bishop Leete for his presence and for his instructive and inspiring message.

Conference adjourned to meet again in executive session at 4:30.

### SECOND AFTERNOON SESSION

Conference sang Hymn No. 1 and Alwyn Atkins led in prayer. A resolution concerning the University of Chattanooga, signed by thirty-two members of the Conference, was read by C. K. Mahoney, and after discussion was unanimously adopted by the Conference. Deacons' orders of Sydney E. Stringham, coming from the Church of Christ, were recognized; he was received on trial and placed in studies of the second year.

J. J. Ellington was elected to Deacon's Orders under Seminary Rule.

Lynn A. Harris was elected to deacons' orders, under Seminary Rule and placed on trial in studies of the third year.

The case of E. C. Thurston was reconsidered and he was placed in the supernumerary relation.

Conference adjourned with the benediction by Bishop Bristol.

### Morning.

Love feast was conducted at 9 a.m. by J. D. Roberson.

At 10:30 a. m. Bishop Bristol preached a masterful and inspiring sermon at the Conference Church.

### Afternoon.

At 3 o'clock the India Pageant which was a part of the Centenary celebration at Columbus was given by members of the churches of Knoxville, together with several members of the Conference, under the direction of Dr. C. E. Powell, Director of Missionary Education for the Chattanooga area.

### Evening.

At 7:30 Bishop Bristol, assisted by the District Superintendents, ordained as deacons Lynn H. Harris, Gerne L. Shupe and Hartsell G.

Williamson; as elders, Garland A. Crowder, John L. Cupp, John F. Lynch and Frederic D. Watson.

#### SIXTH DAY

At 8:30 a. m. devotional exercises were led by W. F. Pitts. J. M. Melear took the chair.

Journal—The minutes of previous sessions were read and approved.

General Conference Memorial—A memorial to the General Conference concerning censorship of moving pictures was presented by R. A. Simonds and, after amendment, was adopted.

Resolution—A resolution concerning the Laymen's program on Laymen's Day at the conference session was introduced by C. K. Mahoney. The resolution was adopted.

Memoirs—On motion of J. J. Robinette Conference voted that obituaries of those who had died during the year, including an obituary of F. M. Cones who had died previously, be published in the minutes, and that J. M. Melear and T. H. Hodge be added to the Committee on Memoirs.

Committees—It was moved by R. A. Simonds that the reports of the Committee on Education and the Committee on Resolutions be read and that reports of all other committees be submitted to the secretary for publication in the minutes. The motion was adopted. Committees on Education, Home Missions, Sunday Schools, American Bible Society, Freedman's Aid Society, Temperance, Sabbath Observance and Auditing submitted their reports.

Corporate Session—On motion of M. C. Bruner Conference went into corporate session. It was moved by G. T. Byrd that the old officers be re-elected and that their names be published in the Conference Minutes. The motion was adopted.

World Outlook—A. C. Goddard spoke in behalf of the World outlook.

Conference Minutes—It was moved by J. J. Robinette that the Secretary be authorized to send to each pastor his proportionate share of the Conference Minutes, together with bill for the same, if the charge had not paid its quota. Motion was adopted.

Special Appointments—Conference voted to request the Bishop to appoint J. H. Stevenson, Professor in Vanderbilt University, Erwin Omohundro, Associate Secretary of Inter-Church World Movement, and that G. J. Creswell, E. W. Elrod, J. J. Ellington and S. E. Taylor be left without appointment to attend one of our church schools.

Question 2—Who have been received by transfer? W. A. Graybeal, Blue Ridge, Atlantic.

Nominating Committee—The Nominating Committee was instructed to nominate the standing committee for next year and to submit these to the Secretary for publication.

Episcopal Fund—R. L. Stapleton reported concerning the apportionment of the Episcopal Fund to the various districts of the Conference.

Question 36—Where shall the next Conference be held? As there were no invitations the place for holding the next Conference was left, to the District Superintendents.

W. F. Ledford was added to the Board of Home Missions and Church Extensions.

The Statistician read his report.

Special Commission—On motion of G. T. Byrd the District Superintendents, the Secretary and the Statistician were appointed a commission to make corrections in the Conference Statistics.

The Conference Board of Stewards made its report and checks for Conference claimants were distributed.

The Conference voted to leave E. C. Thurston in the effective relation.

It was moved by H. M. Hawk that the sum of \$10,301 be apportioned to the pastoral charges for the relief of Conference claimants. The motion was adopted.

Conference Date—On motion of R. A. Simonds Conference voted to ask the Board of Bishops to fix the date for holding the Holston Conference so as to include the first Sunday in October.

Copper Hill Basin—J. A. Mitchell moved that the delegates to the General Conference be requested to do all in the power to have the Copper Hill Basin restored to the Holston Conference. The motion was adopted.

Resolutions—The Committee on Resolutions reported after an address by J. M. Melear the secretary put the vote which was unanimous for adoption. The report included a resolution complimentary to Bishop Bristol, and asking for his return to the Chattanooga area.

Adjournment—O. R. Tarwater moved that after the reading of the journal, devotional exercises and the reading of the appointments the Conference stand adjourned. The motion was adopted. The Secretary read the minutes of the session and L. D. Hamil led in prayer. Conference sang "Where He Leads Me I Will Follow." Bishop Bristol read the appointments and pronounced the benediction.

## REPORTS

### BRISTOL DISTRICT.

### M. H. Rambo, District Superintendent.

The Bristol District is the largest of the five districts composing the Holston Conference, and includes within its boundaries the larger portion of sixteen of the counties of southwest Va. Its topography is similar to that found in the whole of what is termed The Appalachian Region, but is distinguished by its greater fertility, and its adaptability to stock raising. It is truly "A land of hills and valleys, and drinketh water from the rain of Heaven."

The appointments on this District are scattered somewhat unevenly over its territory, and in consequence, require a great amount of travel in order to reach all the Charges four times within the year. An extra amount of travel was also required in connection with the work of the Centenary. The speedometer on my car shows that I have traveled over five thousand miles by automobile, and I estimate that my train mileage has been even greater, without taking into account several outside trips to Knoxville, Chattanooga, Columbus, and Cleveland, in the interest of the Centenary. Also some of my journeyings have taken me across mountains, afoot, on horseback, and by cart; and were all these taken into account, the total mileage would run into twelve thousand or more miles. I have preached seven to eight times per week, and have made numerous Centenary talks, and have held all my Quarterly Conferences but four. It has been a year of crowded endeavor, both for District Superintendent and Pastors, and we trust the result will show a commensurate increase.

There is some indication in the information which recently has been furnished me, in answer to a questionnaire sent to all my Pastors, that there has been a loss of several Sunday schools, and a corresponding loss in the number of Sunday school scholars. Pastors have been careful in correcting the Church Records, and a decrease is to be expected in the number of full members of the church, owing chiefly to former reports having been inflated; notwithstanding, there have been from three hundred to four hundred new members added. Indicated conversions amount to about 600.

The fact that we will have to report fewer additions to the Church Membership, and fewer Conversions than usual, may in part be accounted for by the long and fearful siege of Influenza which swept the country. Revival work during the winter and spring months was practically at a standstill. Most of the results to be reported along this line have been achieved since June first.

Generally speaking, the health of our pastors and their families has been good, with a few exceptions, where the "Flu" invaded the homes. Early in the year death invaded the ranks of our retired ministers and took from our midst Brother Giles A. Conner, of whom a suitable Memoir is to be read at the proper time.

The impetus given to the church by the Centenary has resulted in more than a thousand per cent increase in the benevolences, and the outlook for the church in the way of a constructive program has never before been so bright.

Some of the outstanding projects should be mentioned. A new church is contemplated at Nickelsville, to cost \$8,000.00; one at Fairview, on the Pattonsville Charge, to cost from four to five thousand; one at Hilton, to cost four thousand; and one at Lydia, at a cost of four thousand. These are all in the good county of Scott, and all at places where we at present have no church buildings. These are all Centenary undertakings, and are to be constructed substantially of brick. Methodism is in the lead in Scott county, and should by all means be so maintained. Rose Hill, in Lee county; St. Charles, at St. Charles; and Wise all look forward to fine buildings, adequate to meet the needs of the new day. Plans for some of the other charges are in the making.

During the present year two new churches have been dedicated, one at Lowland, on the Glenford charge. These are handsome frame structures, each worth two thousand, or more, dollars. Three others are nearing completion, two on the Wise charge and one on the Lafayette charge.

Our building program contemplates several new parsonages. One such has already been bargained for on the Hilton charge, at a cost of two thousand dollars. Counting the parsonage which has just been purchased by the Bristol congregation, there are now eighteen on the District. In this connection we should say that the Bristol church has had a phenomenal growth during the present pastorate. During the year an indebtedness of twenty-three hundred dollars has been provided for, the Centenary was put over with near fourteen hundred to spare, the Pastors' salary increased by two hundred, and subscription is in hand to cover the first year's payment on the splendid five thousand dollar parsonage.

The District Parsonage purchased at the beginning of the year at an original cost of forty-one hundred and fifty dollars is virtually provided for in good subscription, and all payments are being met as they become due. Thirteen hundred dollars has been collected and paid on this property, and money will be in hand by November to meet the second annual payment. The burden of this enterprise has been altogether managed by the District Superintendent.

Our District Conference was held in July, and while somewhat brief, was an inspiration to all who attended. We were fortunate in

securing some of the leaders of the church in this section to address the Conference on the leading topics confronting us. Centenary was given a large place in the program, and much information relative to the various Charges was obtained by informal discussions. There is a general feeling throughout the District that the Centenary quotas were unduly high, owing to inflated reports of membership, and to the seeming lack of knowledge on the part of those who prepared the quotas, of the unusual conditions of poverty which exists in some of our communities. Notwithstanding all this, we might have come much nearer going over the top, had there been ample time and workers to enlighten the people on the enterprise. In view of these facts we trust that some allowance may be made, and that proper recognition may be had for all that has been accomplished.

The six Woman's Missionary societies are doing splendid work, while our Epworth Leagues at the present time are not flourishing as we should like to see them.

### CHATTANOOGA DISTRICT

### J. A. Mitchell, District Superintendent

District Superintendent's Report of the Chattanooga District for 1919:

Every effective man in the Chattanooga District has given himself without stint to the work of the Master. No crew of men has ever been more faithful to their task than the pastors on this District this year.

Sane, aggressive, and Spiritual work has been done in every Charge, and God has blessed the work of these men in a marvelous way, and their reports will show quite an increase in the number of conversions and accessions.

Soon after Conference adjourned last November a number of changes were made. Dr. Gray, on account of his wife's health, had to go to Florida, leaving St. Marks without a pastor, but this was only for one week; we were fortunate in getting Bishop Bristol to change Dr. Robinette from Harriman to St. Marks where he has done a splendid year's work.

Rev. J. N. Sadler who was appointed to the Pikeville Charge, went to his work, but could not find a house to live in, so he asked to be relieved and Bishop Bristol granted his request, but three months later the Bishop appointed him to the Fairmont and Fairview Charge where he finished the year with success. And the Rev. N. H. Cardwell who was a student in the Chattanooga University, was appointed to the Pikeville Charge and has done a good work.

Rev. W. B. Martin, a local preacher, who was appointed as a supply on the Jasper and Whitwell Circuit, stayed one month on the work and then left it without saying a word, but fortunately I found

another student in the Chattanooga University, Rev. Clyde Newell, whom I appointed to supply the Charge, and he has done it admirably.

Rev. G. H. Williamson was changed from Soddy to Loudon, and Rev. Earl W. Hotalen was appointed to Soddy where he has had the best year of his life.

Rev. J. E. Willis, who came into the Conference on trial and was appointed to South Pittsburg, served the Charge three months and then joined the Congregational Church, and after the delay of some weeks I supplied the Charge with Rev. R. C. Elzey, who finished the year with success.

Increase in pastors' support has been made at Chatata, Alton Park, Manker Memorial, Ridgedale, Avondale, Coalmont, Englewood, Etowah, and South Pittsburg, aggregating \$2,175.00. Increase in District Superintendents salary, \$100.00.

In two or three years no Charge on the Chattanooga District will be paying less than a thousand dollar salary and a house, excepting two or three student Charges.

Benevolences have been well cared for as the pastor's reports will show, but the larger work has been done in the Centenary drive. Our churches had all been organized and we launched our campaign in dead-earnest, and as a result we have secured 400 tithers, eleven for life service and 500 have signed The Fellowship of Intercession enrollment card, and we will report from this District \$143,674.00 for the Centenary fund.

The Sunday Schools and Epworth Leagues did their part in the Centenary Campaign; the Sunday Schools in this district subscribed \$17,000 to the Centenary fund.

Our people have a new vision of the saving power of Christ, and a new and a better day is not far ahead of us.

We have had some splendid revivals on the district. A great revival was held at Coalmont, resulting in 136 conversions and 60 accessions to the church; the pastor did all the preaching. Nearly every Charge has had fine revivals and about 600 have been converted in these meetings.

In material improvement and church extension we have made some advancement. Harles Chapel on the Chatata Circuit, was destroyed by fire in the early spring, but the good people of that community, lead by their pastor, went to work for a new house, and in a few days they had purchased the Cumberland Presbyterian church building in that community and after some repairs were better housed than before, and with this arrangement no break was made in the Sunday school or church services.

They are also building a new church at Bell Fonte on this Circuit.

The St. James church has spent \$2,750.00 on the improvement of the church and parsonage, much credit is due the pastor for this splendid work.

The Highland Park church has installed a fine steam heating plant, and made other improvements at a cost of \$3,000.00.

At the close of the Conference a year ago, a debt of \$13,000.00 was on the Alton Park Church and the Church was in litigation and in a tremendous tangle, but today the Church is out of all litigation, the title absolutely clear and the debt reduced to \$3250. This seems almost like amiracle but it has been done.

Morse Hill Church on the Coker Creek Circuit has been recovered at a cost of \$150.

Avondale has repaired church and parsonage at a cost of \$600.

St. Marks has put a new roof on the church and made other improvements which cost \$1,200.

The parsonage at Athens has been finished at a considerable cost. And the church at Soddy has been recovered at a cost of \$250.00.

Many of our churches included in the Centenary campaign have enough money over and above the Centenary quota to pay their debts and make the necessary improvements on property, so in five years the Chattanooga District will have all debts paid, and all the property in splendid repair.

The past year for the Chattanooga University has been one of marked progress. The splendid Chapel building, a Memorial to the late Mr. John A. Patten who did so much for education, and especially for the Chattanooga University, was completed at a cost of more than \$75,000.00, and was dedicated during Commencement week of last June. All the other buildings have been completed, making the Chattanooga University the best equipped plant in the State.

We also made fine progress in our school at Athens, a Normal Course with State recognition, has been added to the school there this year, also a Bible Training Course for young men contemplating the Christian Ministry has been added.

And under the splendid leadership of Dean Robb, success is sure to follow. The new year opens with the finest prospects the school has ever had.

Personally I have had a good time, the Lord has been very gracious to me, I have had splendid health all the year, I have been able to hold all of my Quarterly Conferences in person, have preached four Commencement sermons, and have delivered numerous addresses and many sermons in addition to my regular work, and for all this I am deeply grateful to Almighty God.

### HARRIMAN DISTRICT

### L. D. Hamil, Superintendent

I presume this has been the busiest year in the history of Methodism, and the startling and unusual thing has been done almost everywhere. We have, however, been greatly handicapped on the Harriman District this year, for want of "Men and Money," but a fine percentage of the men we have had, have worked very hard, and we have, at least, a few things to report.

### Ministerial Support

Four of our churches have made noticeable advances in Ministerial Support, they are, naming them in alphabetical order: Clinton, Jellico, Oakdale and Rockwood. Clinton now pays \$1000.00 and house; Jellico, \$1500.00 and house; Oakdale, \$1200.00 and house, and Rockwood, \$1200.00 and house. Most of the salaries, where pastors have been on the Charges throughout the year, will be paid in full, I think.

### THE CENTENARY

We have not yet reached our Dist. Quota, but several of our churches went over the top. They are: Clinton, Dayton, Jellico, Graysville, Luminary, Lansing, Mt. View, Oneida, Oakdale, Rockwood and Sunbright, and I am sure we would have made a better showing on the rest of the territory, had we had pastors all the year for all the churches, and had not some of our quotas been too large, as a result of inflated reports in former years.

### IMPROVEMENTS

Quite a number of our churches have made improvements this year, the most prominent and valuable of which is the buying of a splendid Parsonage at Oakdale, worth \$1350.00. All improvements on the Charge total \$4010.00.

### PASTORAL LABOR

Approximately 2318 sermons have been preached, 741 days have been spent in revival work, resulting in 435 professions and about 300 accessions. Also, 7506 Pastoral visits have been made, and the Sacrament of Baptism administered to approximately 200 persons. Our total subscription to the Centenary is approximately \$60,124.00, and our total collection will show up pretty well, one charge, the Decatur, going way over the top, and two others, the Dayton and Oakdale, going over. I fear we are a little short on Conf. Clmts., Episcopal fund and Gen. Conf. expenses, for some of the Charges have not collected any thing at all on these, and a few

others only small amounts, while others have done, perhaps better than usual. Several of our churches have been without pastors throughout the year, and a few of them have had pastors for only a part of the year, and on this account our report is not what it should be, but with more pastors, and better salaries, we hope to do much better next year."

# JOHNSON CITY DISTRICT R. L. Stapleton, Superintendent

Dear Fathers and Brethern:

We began the year on the District with twenty members of the Conference and five supplies. These faithful pastors have all continued in health and useful service the entire year. There were two general conditions which interferred very much with the work of the pastors during the winter, namely; the country was at war, with thousands of our young men in patriotic service, and the 'Flu' epidemic was raging throughout the District. Happily those two handicaps to our work are now removed, for which we devoutly thank God.

Our work during the winter and spring consisted principally in organizing the District for the great financial drive which was put on in May. Owing to the fact that it was difficult to assemble the people, and the fear of the other part, enthusiasm, interest and information were difficult to establish. However certain great results were secured which are tabulated in the Statistical report.

While the report of the District on finances will be the greatest the District has ever had, it will be found that professions and accessions will fall short of some years of the past. This will be easily accounted for, when we realize that most all the energy of the pastors and people was consumed in putting over the Centenary Drive for the financial goal; and, as one pastor expressed it, 'the smoke of the battle has not cleared away yet.' We preached to our churches the proposition that the financial campaign was only a part and preliminary to the essential heart of the centenary program, which is the winning of the world to the Kingdom of God, through the work of converting the people from sin and adding them to the membership of the organized church. We are now saying to them that this is the program for the coming year.

During the entire fourth quarter of the year, there has been only one kind of request from the membership and leaders among the laymen of the church, and this is, more preaching, better preaching, more visiting among the people by the pastors, revivals among the churches and the conversion of sinners to God. This I consider a good sign of the good times coming, for the scriptures declare by the word of Jesus, 'Blessed are they that hunger and

thirst after righteousness, for they shall be filled.' We have been saying to those who have so generously supported their Centenary quotas, that they are now in position to receive the fulfilment of the promise of God in Malachi 3:10, 'Bring ye the whole tithe into the storehouse, that there may be food in my house, and prove me now herewith, saith Jehova of hosts, if I will not open you the windows of Heaven and pour you out a blessing, that there shall not be room enough to receive it.'

In any proper analysis of the work of the year on this District, it is clearly seen that the one great outstanding feature is the wonderful showing of the Charges in a financial way. Every different department of the financial interests will show a large increase in collections over any other past year. If one were disposed to criticize the direction of effort, he might say we had succeeded in getting the finances, but failed in getting souls. However, I do not think this would be a fair criticism, as this is as we had planned for this particular year. I am clearly convinced that if we put the same degree of zeal, courage and faith into our plans for souls in the coming year, we shall have the rewards of faith in a great revival in the churches of the District and many souls for the Kingdom. This is what we are expecting.

I have asked the pastors to report to me on certain items, with the following results for the District:

Professions, 850; Accessions, 462; Baptisms, 255; Tithers, 445; Subscribers to the Centenary, 3545. Total amounts subscribed,

The District has normally been paying about \$2000.00 per year for regular benevolences; this year their collections will total probably from \$15 to \$20,000 dollars.

Regarding the educational interests of the District, it has commonly been understood and so reported, that there are two church schools among us, Wesleyan Academy at Chuckey, and Oakland Seminary at Baileyton. As a matter of fact, however, the church, that is the Board of Education, for some reason withdrew its support of the school at Baileyton some years ago, and has been gradually reducing its support of the school at Chuckey, with the purpose of eliminating it also from support by the Board. The Chuckey school trustees have been carrying a considerable amount of debt for several years, and feeling discouraged that the church would not assist them in paying off this debt, they began negotiations for the sale of the property to Greene county for high school purposes. appeal however to our Board of Education, through the proper authorities, I secured a proposition from the Board to assist us in paying off the debt and also provision for assistance in the salary of the principal of the school. The Board of Trustees at Chuckey have unanimously agreed to raise a sum to meet the proposition of

the Board of Education and the matter is well on the way of raising the debt and equipping the school more materially than it has ever been.

It would be impossible to set forth in detail the activities of the pastors in this report, but the statistics will speak for them as to what results have been obtained. Great credit for the year's successes must be given to them for their fidelity and sacrifices through difficulties and discouragements of every kind.

In the pursuit of my own work of the oversight of the district, I have preached and made addresses 176 times, held 92 quarterly conferences, traveled about 6000 miles, have held all my quarterly conferences except one, which was held for me by E. O. Woodyard. During the Centenary Drive the laymen of the District gave very valuable assistance, and there were so many of them who did this that I am sure I should leave out some of them if I should attempt to name them. Among those who gave the most assistance outside of their own churches are Brother W. Z. Harshbarger, who spoke and helped the cause very much at a large number of places, and Brothers J. G. Hays, Dr. B. C. Weesner of Morristown church, and Brother W. A. Robeson of Morristown Circuit.

The pastors were very generous with their time and energy in assisting the District Superintendent in every way possible.

Bishop Bristol took a swing around the circle with us in the spring of this year, preaching the jubilee sermon at Greeneville, and touching also the points of Kingsport, Mountain City and Mountain City Circuit. His sermons, addresses, and his presence among us was in every way a great blessing to the people.

### KNOXVILLE DISTRICT

### W. K. Harris, Superintendent

The year has been one of unusual lights and shadows in the Knoxville District. We began the year in November, at least two weeks later than is our custom, in the midst of the most serious epidemics which has visited this section in many years. This condition continued during the entire winter and many churches were closed by the state or city authorities for periods of from two to six weeks. The attendance at all services was greatly reduced. Revival work was well nigh impossible during the first half of the year. In this especially our people suffered a real loss for we record the most positive conviction that there is no substitute for the old time Methodist revival.

In spite of the obstacles a number of fine meetings have been conducted. Chestnut Hill, Erie, Fair Garden, Jefferson City, Maryville Circuit, Loudon, Pigeon Forge, Asbury & Thorn Grove are among the rural charges that report successful meetings. Lenoir

City, Oakwood Second church and Jones Chapel each reported meetings of unusual power. Among the pastors whose names should appear on the honor roll as successful revivalists are J. O. Cox, F. P. Sanders, J. M. Dew, O. R. Tarwater, W. E. O. Robeson and others too numerous to mention, while conference evangelist A. B. McKenzie has done very effective work during the year.

The Centenary occupied the minds of the people of the District for several months to the exclusion of all other topics. The campaign was conducted, not entirely in accord with instructions from the Central office, but in most Charges the uniform plan was adhered to with fair success. Inadequate training, during former years, of both preachers and laymen, has made the task more difficult. Determined opposition was met in some quarters and this could not be entirely overcome in the brief weeks of the campaign. Some who entirely approved the cause thought the time inopportune. In spite of these things we have succeeded in fair measure. Twentynine charges reported a total of more than one hundred and forty thousand dollars for the five years.

Examples of heroic giving have been numerous, perhaps none more conspicuous than Trinity Church where they faced \$23,000.00 indebtedness carried for some years on the church building. Under the leadership of the devoted pastor, O. R. Tarwater, and the splendid co-operation of the people, the whole quota, including the church debt, was subscribed.

Only nine Charges have reported "Over the top" viz: First Church, Park City, Second Church, Trinity, Whittle Springs, Lenoir City, Loudon, Maryville and Sevierville. Every one of these deserve special mention for each had its problems and difficulties to overcome. Some of the churches which did not succeed in pledging the entire quota did as heroic work as any in the District. Nearly all pastors were in labors abundant. One who could not induce his members to organize and carry their part of the load walked the entire Charge in hot June weather and canvassed the entire membership with fair success. Another literally spent weeks among the people, abandoning, for the time, his wife and child and canvassing the membership by fireside and around the family altar. In the records kept by the recording angel such will have special mention.

Two churches have been destroyed by fire; Pleasant Hill on the Maryville circuit and Pigeon Forge. The first is being rebuilt with a much better structure. The other will soon begin the work of building one of the best rural churches in the District. Both should have Centenary aid.

Two or three places adjacent to Maryville have recently offered opportunities for an investment of Centenary money. Many thousands of people have come and other thousands are coming to the great plant of the Aluminum Company of America and are calling

upon us for the gospel. This field has opened since the surveys were made and is not included. Provision should in some way be made for this work. Murphy college has entered upon a new era in its history. The tireless efforts of President E. A. Bishop has at last been rewarded in the purchase of one of the most beautiful and appropriate college sites I have ever seen. It consists of sixty five acres of fine Sevier County soil giving ample space for buildings and extensive agriculture experiment.

Pastors salaries will in nearly all instances be reported paid in full. A number have been advanced but not in proportion to the increased cost of living. Sunday schools, Epworth Leagues, and other church societies have done excellent work. The women's Missionary societies have had an unusually good year. Our only regret is that we do not have at least one of these in every Charge.

Mrs. Harris spent some time in the hospital early in July and is just now regaining her strength in sufficient measure to take charge of the home again. We do not complain. Safely through another year God has brought us on our way and we are happy in HIM.

In the great program of our church to reach and save a million souls by June 1, 1920, also in securing a million tithers, the Sunday schools must and will play a great part in enabling the pastor to secure his full quota of these millions. Therefore, we urge that every pastor take renewed interest in the Sunday school work, strengthening the forces where there are now Sunday schools and organizing and establishing Sunday schools in needy places where there are no Sunday schools. We also urge that the pastor organize Home and Cradle Roll Departments in the Sunday schools where these departments are not already found, thereby bringing the Sunday school and its influence in touch with every home and individual in reach of the church.

We wish further to urge that the pastors have the principle of tithing taught, in the Sunday school, as God's plan of recognizing Stewardship, and that each pupil be given opportunity to pledge himself to tithe.

We further urge that Easter Sunday be set apart by all our Sunday schools as decision day, that the pastors make this day the climax of the evangelistic program of our church.

### UNIVERSITY OF CHATTANOOGA

There are two great present needs of the institution which should come to our attention; first, of closer co-operation of the pastors directing our young people to our institution and second, of funds to erect dormitories and to equip fully the department of Agriculture. The assets of the Institution at this time, including grounds, buildings and endowment, amounts to more than \$1,000,000. The combined campus comprises 33 acres. There are sixteen buildings in all.

The institution is fortunate in the frequent visits made by leaders of the church—bishops, editors and educators. The best literature of the church is on the shelves of the libraries and through these the young people are kept well informed as to the world-wide activities of the church. These young people have a real and intelligent loyalty to the church. There have been no serious cases of discipline within the past year.

The academic standards are high and credits from the University are honored in the best graduate schools of America.

The University craves the hearty and continuous support of all our people. The co-operation of our ministers and official laymen will be of very great value. With increased facilities and at the present rate of increase of our student body it is evident that in two or three years more, we are to have a very much larger group of students than ever before and the ministry of the Institution will widen beyond the expectation of its friends.

We are in sympathy with the resolutions passed by the Conference relative to prohibiting dancing in the Institution and earnestly hope that the proper authorities will give the question their hearty support.

### WESLEYAN ACADEMY SAVED TO THE CHURCH

At the Johnson City District Conference in July it was reported that the trustees of Wesleyan Academy, Chuckey, Tennessee, were negotiating a sale of the property to Greene County. The Rev. R. L. Stapleton, superintendent Johnson City District sends the following statement which will be pleasing news to all our people. There ought to be a ready response from friends of the school.

### Superintendent Stapleton's Statement

After District Conference I immediately took the matter up with our Board of Education at New York, and they made me a proposition to assist us in paying off the debt, and also a donation on improvements and repairs, if the trustees at Chuckey should be willing to meet their offer. The offer was \$2,250.00 on the buildings, and \$1,000.00 on salary of Principal.

The Trustees met in Chuckey last Monday night and unanimously voted to accept the offer, and also to raise \$2,500.00 to meet the needs of the situation. This as you see, put us in the way of getting the school on its feet again. We shall be glad to receive any assistance that friends of education and of Wesleyan Academy can give us in raising this money. It is certainly worthy of every consideration. If money is sent to me at Johnson City, Tennessee, I will forward it to the trustees.

### MURPHY COLLEGE

The school year 1918-19 was in some respects out of the ordinary in Murphy College. Two interruptions because of influenza, a siege of measles and the burning of a dormitory are sufficient to mark any school year as eventful. Yet despite these adverse conditions, the attendance came up to the record of other years, the financial balance was on the right side of the ledger and an unusually large class was graduated. Interesting and eventful as the above may be the past year will go down in history not for these events, but because it marks the beginning of a new era for the institution. With the approval of the Board of Education of the M. E. Church the trustees have purchased a new site on which will be built a new Murphy College. This property was secured from the heirs of the late Col. M. P. Thomas whose father secured it under state grant number 321 in 1806. It is located about 450 yards from the old college grounds, lies partly within the village corporation and contains 63 acres. The property has a street and pike frontage of one-third of a mile, every foot suitable for building sites; has 40 acres of the finest bottom land and 8 acres suited to gardening, orcharding, dairying and chicken raising. It is proposed under a trained agriculturist to give practical instruction along all of the lines. As early as possible funds will be provided for erecting

a modern dormitory to accommodate the teachers and 65 young men. It is hoped that a year later a similar building may be provided for young ladies. The present administration building will be used until after the dormitories are completed. This new order of things becomes possible through the Centenary, and the management plans to make this one of the outstanding institutions of Methodism in the southern mountain area.

### THE AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY

Through the work of the American Bible Society the Bible is now printed in four hundred and thirty-five languages, and dialects, and as we have seen in the last few years, there is a greater demand for the Bible than for any other book published,

THEREFORE, we recognize more and more our need of the help of the American Bible Society, in publishing, and distributing the written word of God.

THEREFORE, we urge greater loyalty on the part of our Pastors, and people, to the American Bible Society, and urge that at some time during the year a special offering be taken for its benefit.

program the Laymen's Association may desire to give unless the laymen should give notice that they do not desire to use this date.

### FREEDMEN'S AID

The work of this Society has been carried on for over fifty years. The General Conference authorized and directed each pastor to observe the Lincoln Day Anniversary in February. Discipline of 1916, Par. 455, Page 302.

As a result of the work of the Society we have 350,000 colored members, 3500 churches and over 2,000 ministers. Our schools supply these with pastors and intelligent Christian leaders. For this purpose the 21 schools of the Freedmen's Aid Society with their 334 teachers and 5,702 students must be maintained.

### THE FREEDMEN'S AID SOCIETY AND THE CENTENARY

Any program of world conquest for the Kingdom of Christ must include one hundred millions of black people in Africa, and twelve millions more in the United States of America. If we cannot uplift and evangelize these black millions in the home land, how shall we ever reach those across the seas. The school house and the church go hand in hand in bringing the Negro in the United States to a knowledge of the Christian faith, and fitting him that he may do his part in bringing the dark continent into a league of Christian nations dominated by the Christ spirit.

We recommend, therefore, that each pastor preach at least once a year on the outlook for the black man in the United States and in Africa, and the relation of the schools of the Freedmen's Aid Society to his evangelization.

We further recommend that each pastor observe Lincoln Memorial Sunday, and use the program and literature furnished by the Freedmen's Aid Society for that occasion.

We further recommend that this subject be also brought before our Sunday schools, Epworth Leagues and social gatherings for study and prayerful consideration. Literature and other material necessary for the presentation of the work of the Freedmen's Aid Society to any of our congregations can be obtained without cost by sending a postal card request to the Secretaries of the Freedmen's Aid Society, 420 Plum Street, Cincinnati, Ohio.
