Continuous activity in Holston Conference Methodist Episcopal Church was abandoned until the close of the Civil War. In 1865 the Holston Conference was re-organized at Athens, Tennessee, under the Presidency of Bishop David W. Clark.

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## MEMOIRS

### ALWYN JAMES ATKINS

Alwyn James Atkins was born in Heflin, Alabama, August 5th, 1890, and was called from earth's labors to his heavenly reward on March 22nd, 1921, at St. Joseph's Infirmary, Atlanta, Ga., after an illness of several months. He was converted in early life and became a member of the Methodist Episcopal Church at Heflin, Alabama. After completing the public school course in his home town he entered the University of Chattanooga in 1906, and graduated in 1910. The following year he entered Boston University School of Theology, from which he graduated in 1914. While in school there he served as student pastor at North Methodist Episcopal Church at Fall River, Massachusetts. Following this he took a graduate course at Harvard and was then given a regular charge at Chartley, Massachusetts. On June 30, 1915, he was married to Miss Julia E. Shaw, Fall River, Massachusetts. Mrs Atkins and two children of tender age are left behind to feel the loss of a kind father and thoughtful, loving husband. They have been cheered in their sorrow by the tender sympathy of a multitude of friends who feel a personal bereavement in the going away of our brother when, to us, it seemed that his life-work was but fairly begun.

In October, 1917, Brother Atkins was transferred from New England Southern Conference to Holston and appointed to the pastorate of St. Mark's Church. Chattanooga. In 1918 he was appointed to the Cleveland charge and was serving for a third year as pastor of this church at the time of his death. Brother Atkins was Conference Host at Cleveland last year. Little did we think at that time that he would be called to the church triumphant before the close of the Conference year. We remember his wife and the two children, Marjorie, age 4 years, and Alwyn Jr., age 2 years, and the impressive service on the afternoon of Conference Sunday last year at which Alwyn Jr. was baptized by Bishop Bristol.

Brother Atkins was thorough and conscientious in all his work as a minister, his sermons always bearing the mark of the student and thinker, his pastoral labor that of the Christian gentleman. As instructor in Bible Study at the Holston Conference Epworth League Institute he had won the hearts of this large company of young people who paid respect to his memory in a special memorial service held at the Institute last August. In pulpit power and in effectiveness as a pastor and administrator he was developing rapidly and gave promise of large achievement in the days to come. And now he has gone from us even before reaching the noon time of life. We believe that the Heavenly Father has a place for him in the homeland where his ripening powers are to be employed and that, at the close of life's little day we shall meet him in that city where cometh no night.

### MARY AQUILA DOOLEY WALKER

Mary Aquila Dooley Walker was born September 10, 1851, and died at her home in Morristown, Tennessee, August 1, 1921, age 69 years, 10 months and 21 days. She was twice married, first to George McFee, in 1870, and to this union two daughters were born. These have all preceded her to their eternal reward. She was again married, July 16, 1884, to Rev. Thomas S. Walker who answered the summons some twelve years ago, and left his faithful companion and four children to battle with the conflicts of life. Sister Walker professed faith in Christ in her childhood and joined the M.E. Church, to which she remained a loyal and faithful member until her death. She loved her church, and it was always her pleasure to serve in whatever capacity she was able. She loved her home, and her children were the joy of her life, making any sacrifice for their welfare. The Bible was "The lamp unto her feet and the light unto her path" and during the years served as her pastor whenever I went into her home she wanted me to read from its pages and pray with her. Truly a good woman has fallen; but we weep not as those who have no hope for we know that we shall see her again. A short service was held at the home and the body was laid to rest beside her husband in the cemetery at Morristown to await the call when "The earth shall give up its dead; and the corruptible bodies of those who slept in Him shall be changed and made like unto His own glorious body; according to the mighty workings whereby He is able to subdue all things unto Himself."

### MARY TRUAN DURHAM

Mary Truan Durham was born October 20, 1850, and departed this life at the home of her daughter, Mrs. W. A. Gibbs, Knoxville, Tennessee, April 2, 1921, having lived seventy years, five months, and twelve days. Sister Mary was converted when only fifteen years old and joined the church, and ever thereafter lived a Christian of the most excellent type. May 20, 1869, she was married to the Rev. J. M. Durham, an honored and worthy member of the Holston Conference, M.E. Church, for more than fifty years. Of this union eleven children were born, four died in infancy. Brother Durham and two daughters, Mrs, G. M. Norwood and Mrs. R. H. Williams, died some years ago. Mrs. J. W. Burson followed her April 5th, leaving three sons, W. L., H. W., T. H., and one daughter, Mrs. W. A. Gibbs with whom she lived, and where she was most graciously cared for, to mourn their loss. For more than 44 years Sister Durham was not only willing to share the privations and sacrifices incident to the life of the wife of an itinerant minister of the Methodist Church, but esteemed it a great privilege to be counted worthy to be called with her husband to lead "The Host of Israel". While he was away

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preaching Christ to others she worked for Him in the home. Her earnest Christian life in the home circle yielded its fruit in the conversion and Christian development of her children and neighbors' children. For years she was an invalid and suffered much. But with a strong faith in God she was submissive, and was indeed a most beautiful example of Christian patience. Her piety was deep, earnest, and uniform That sweet spirit of submission was often expressed in word like these "The will of the Lord be done." She often spoke of her hope and prospects of Heaven. She was faithful to her home, her church, and her God. When He called she was ready. Like Paul having fought a good fight, finished her course, and kept the faith. She has entered into rest.

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## **CONFERENCE RULES**

1. No person shall absent himself from the sessions of the conference without leave, unless he be sick or otherwise unable to attend.

2. The Secretary shall keep a journal of the conference proceedings, which he shall cause to be published in the Annual Journal of the conference, and it shall be the official journal. He shall edit the minutes and all matter for publication, and shall make contracts for the printing of the journal as in his judgment may seem best. He shall have charge of the journal and conference files, and forward them to the place of the meeting of the annual conference each year.

3. All committees whose reports are to be printed in the journal shall present their reports to the secretary in writing, otherwise the committee on publication is not required to insert such reports in the journal.

4. All candidates for admission on trial, for admission into full membership, for admission on credentials from other churches, for re-admission, and for recognition of orders, shall be required to appear before the Committee on Conference Relations and the Board of Examiners and to furnish such information as may be required touching their general character and their qualifications for the ministry.

5. All cases involving a change in conference relations or withdrawal shall be referred to the Committee on Conference Relations.

6. Widows of deceased ministers who have ever traveled with their husbands may be temporary claimants, and may be referred to the board of stewards, who shall decide each case from year to year.

7. The chairman of the board of stewards shall be *ex officio* one of the assistant secretaries of the conference for secretarial work in connection with conference claimants, and shall be the last member of the Committee on Memoirs.

8. The memorial service for deceased members, and for the wives of deceased members, shall be the special order for conference Sunday afternoon following the ordination service.

9. Conference visitors shall be allowed 10 minutes in which to address the conference. District Superintendents' reports shall be limited to 15 minutes, and reports of committees, except the board of stewards, to five minutes.

10. All applications for special collections, to be apportioned to the charges in the conference shall be referred to the Committee on Special Collections.

11. There shall be elected each year a Nominating Committee, consisting of three members, which committee shall nominate the Standing Committees and the Committee on Nominations for the ensuing session. No member of the Nominating Committee shall be eligible for consecutive re-election to this committee.

12. When a resolution has been introduced by a member, before the person who introduced the resolution shall speak, the question of consideration may be raised by a member saying, "Mr. President, on that I raise the question of consideration". The question of consideration shall then be put without debate, and if there is a two-third vote against the consideration, the resolution shall not be entertained; but if consideration be not denied, the member introducing it may speak to the resolution if it be seconded.

 The standing committees confirmed each year by the conference shall be as follows: 1. American Bible Society; 2. Auditing; 3. Church Literature;
 4. Conference Claimants; 5. Conference Relations; 6. Deaconess Work; 7. District Conference Records; 8. Education; 9. Epworth League; 10. Foreign Missions; 11. Freedman's Aid Society; 12. Home Missions and Church Extension; 13. Memoirs; 14. Nominations; 15. Public Worship; 16. Resolutions;
 17. Sabbath Observance; 18. Sunday Schools; 19. State of the Church; 20. Special Collections; 22. Temperance; 23. Book Concern Accounts.

## **RULES OF ORDER**

1. The conference shall meet at 8:30 a.m., spending 30 minutes in devotional exercises, and adjourn at 11:45 a m.

2. The president shall decide all questions of order, subject to appeal to the Conference, and in case of appeal from the decision of the chair the question shall be put without debate.

3. The president shall appoint all committees not otherwise provided for by the conference or the discipline, but any member may decline serving on more than one committee at a time.

4. All motions and resolutions introduced by any member shall be reduced to writing, if the president, secretary, or any member requests it.

5. No motion shall be considered unless it has been seconded.

6. A motion to adjourn shall be in order at any time, and shall be decided without debate.

7. When a motion, resolution, or report has been read by the secretary, or stated by the president, it shall be deemed in possession of the conference, but any motion or resolution may be withdrawn by the mover at any time before decision or amendment.

8. No resolution or motion shall be made until the one under consideration has been disposed of, which may be done by adoption or rejection, unless one of the following should intervene, which motions shall have precedence in the following order: The previous question, indefinite postponement, laying on the table, reference to a committee, postponement to a given time, amendment or substitution.

9. When any motion or resolution shall have passed, it shall be in order for any member who voted in the affirmative, to move a reconsideration. The motion to re-consider shall be taken without debate.

10. No member shall be allowed to vote on any question who is not within the bar of the conference when said question is put by the chairman, except by leave of the conference.

11. Every member who is within the bar of the conference at the time a question is put shall give in his vote thereon, unless the conference for a special reason shall excuse him.

12. When any member is about to speak, in debate, or deliver any matter to the conference, he shall rise from his seat and respectfully address the chairman. 13. No person shall speak more than twice on the same subject, nor more than five minutes at any one time, without special leave of the conference, and no person shall speak more than once until every other member desiring to speak shall have done so.

14. No member shall be interrupted while speaking except by the chairman to call him to order, when he departs from the question, or uses personalities or disrespectful language, but any member may call attention of the chairman to the subject when he considers the speaker out of order, or any other member may explain when he thinks himself misrepresented.

15. It shall be in order to move that the question be taken without further debate, on any measure pending before the conference, except in case where character or conference relations are involved, and if sustained by a two-thirds vote, the question shall then be put.

16. No motion, resolution, or report shall be laid on the table until the member introducing such motion, resolution, or report has been allowed to speak on the subject.

17. It shall require a majority vote to sustain the call for the yeas and nays.

18. The motion to adjourn, to suspend the rules, to lay on the table, to take from the table, and the call for the previous question shall be put without debate.

19. It shall require a two-third vote of the members present to suspend these rules.

#### IMPORTANT INFORMATION FOR EXAMINERS AND CANDIDATES

1. The work of the Board is divided into six groups. Admission on trial; first, second, third, and fourth years, and Local Orders. Each group to be in the hands of a committee—one of the committeemen to be chairman of the committee.

2. Mid-year examinations are required; time and place to be arranged and announced.

3. The day preceding the opening of the Annual Conference is the time appointed for examination.

4. The candidates are urged to buy their books at the very opening of the year, and study carefully the mid-year subjects, and after the mid-year examinations make complete survey of the remaining subjects immediately. The examiners are required to correspond with the candidates in the early winter, preparatory to mid-year examinations.

5. The requirements of the Discipline are to make the examinations written if practicable, and two weeks ahead of the Annual Conference to send written questions to the Chairman of the Board.

6. The chairman of each group is to submit in writing the grades of the candidates in his department of the registrar.

7. The provision for the mid-year examinations does not deprive any candidate of the opportunity of being examined on any subject at the time appointed for the examination at the Annual Conference.

8. The Board of Examiners, together with the candidates, are called to meet at the place of next Annual Conference session the night previous to the day of Conference examinations.

Dr. Baxter Gass, Secretary of State Charities, D. W. Haga, District Superintendent of the Blue Ridge-Atlantic Conference, R. A. Kilburn, Director of Religious Education of the Athens School, and Mrs. J. A. Patten, of Chattanooga, were introduced to the Conference.

After the announcements Conference adjourned with the benediction by M. H. Rambo.

#### Afternoon Session

Conference sang Hymn 677, and J. A. Mitchell led in prayer.

Bishop Richardson called the roll of charges, pastors reported their work, and statistics were collected.

On motion of W. F. Pitts, J. W. Cardwell was substituted for A. C. Ketron as assistant to the treasurer.

W. E. Hotalen was released from the position of railroad secretary and the committee previously appointed was asked to nominate some one in his place.

The Treasurer reported that he had received checks dated some weeks ahead of time and asked instruction from the Conference in regard to the use of them.

R. A. Simonds moved that these checks be returned to pastors to be held by them until due.

R. L. Stapleton moved to amend by instructing the treasurer to hold said checks until date of maturity and use them then. Conference voted on the amendment and it was adopted. The motion was passed as amended.

E. A. Bishop, President of Murphy College, was introduced and spoke in behalf of the institution.

C. F. Hunter, T. J. Crumley, A. C. Ketron, J. C. Harmon, T. O. Brumley, E. M. Pippin, J. S. Strange, R. L. Leslie, and E. C. Thurston, were referred to the Committee on Conference Relations.

#### SECOND DAY

#### Morning Session

On motion of B. M. Martin a meeting of the Preachers' Aid Society was made the order of the day after the reading of the Journal on Friday morning.

*Constitutional Amendments*: Bishop Richardson brought before the Conference the amendments proposed by the General Conference to the Consitution of the Church.

Proposed amendment to substitute "Local Conference" for "Quarterly Conference" in the Discipline was considered and the vote stood nothing for to 72 against.

Explanation was made that the framers of proposed amendment to admit laymen to the annual asked that it be defeated because the wording was defective. The vote was 0 for to 70 against. The Conference voted to postpone action on the amendment in its corrected form until later in the quadrennium.

Proposed amendment to change the ratio of representation in the General Conference was takn up and Conference voted to postpone action until later in the quadrennium.

Questions 18, 19, 20, and 21, were asked and properly answered.

J. H. Pritchard, from the Baptist Church, was referred to the Committee on Conference Relations with a view to Recognition of Orders as a layman.

*Introduction.* Rev. Charles W. Gant, of the Illinois Conference, and Assistant Superintendent of the Anti-Saloon League for Tennessee, was introduced and spoke to the Conference in behalf of the work of the League.

Wm. V. Dye, received from Kansas Conference, N. R. McConnell, received from the New Jersey Conference, and C. E. Powell, received from Blue Ridge-Atlantic Conference, were introduced.

Miss Carolyn Jenkins, Superintendent of Ritter Home, Athens. Tennessee, was introduced and spoke in behalf of the Institution.

J. M. Emert was elected Biographical Secretary.

On motion of the Secretary, Conference requested the District Superintendents to nominate a member of the Conference to serve on the Board of Stewards in the place of O. R. Tarwater. T. V. Peters was elected a member of the Committee on District Conference Records in place of M. H. Monroe.

J. J. Ellington was elected a member of the Committee on Education in place of C. K. Mahoney.

E. R. Branam was elected to membership on the Committee on nominations in place of Alwyn Atkins.

J. S. Burnette spoke so the Conference in behalf of the mountain schools being maintained within the bounds of the Conference.

After the announcements Conference adjourned with the benediction by M. P. Murphy.

#### THIRD DAY

#### Morning Session

Conference met at the usual hour and spent thirty minutes in devotional exercises, the address being made by Bishop Richardson.

The Journal of the previous day's session was read and approved.

Order of the Day. The order of the day was taken up and the Conference enetered into a meeting of toe Preachers' Aid Society. It was announced that \$30.00 had been received from the Lucy Waters Fund, \$1469.50 from the Manker Memorial Fund, and \$22.28 from a fund held by the trustees of First Church, Chattanooga, for distribution among Conference Claimants. The report of the treasurer of the Society was read, approved by the Society, and ordered printed in the Journal.

On motion of B. M. Martin, Conference voted that \$70.00 received last year from pastoral charges be distributed to Conference Claimants of the territory, as no information had been received whereby proper credit could be given the charges paying the amount.

Regular business of the Conference was taken up and L. B. Clarke was made a member of the Board of Stewards in place of O. R. Tarwater.

Visiting Bishops. Upon invitation of Bishop Richardson, Bishop Cooke and Bishop Bristol took seats upon the platform.

J. M. Melear moved that the Conference enter into a consideration of the condition and needs of the University of Chattanooga and the Athens School. The motion was adopted and Dr. Arlo Ayres Brown, President of the University, was introduced and addressed the Conference.

Bishop Bristol was presented and spoke to the Conference in behalf of the institution. G. F. Lockmiller, a member of the Board of Trustees, was introduced and addressed the Conference.

Endowment Campaign. J. M. Melear moved the adoption of a resolution pledging the support of the Conference to co-operation with the trustees in a

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campign for an increased Endowment Fund for the University of Chattanooga and the Athens School. The motion was adoted. (See Resolution).

A letter from the Board of Education, in regard to the establishment of a Theological School within the bounds of the Conference, was read.

On motion of J. A. Mitchell, Dr. Brown was invited to transfer to Holston Conference.

Bishop Cooke was presented and addressed the Conference.

*Question* 23. C. F. Hunter was changed from the effective to the supernumerary relation. R. L. Leslie was continued in the supernumerary relation and recommended to the Board of Stewards for claim. E. M. Pippin was changed from supernumerary to the effective relation. J. S. Strange was granted the retired relation.

*Question* 24. G. A. Crowder was changed from the retired to the effective relation, C. D. Houchins, C. N. Sadler, E. C. Thurston, H. M. Torrey, and J. T. Ware were continued in the retired relation. S. G. Ketron and T. J. Crumley were granted the retired relation.

*Crumley Memorial.* Conference voted to appoint a committee consisting of M. H. Rambo, G. L. Shupe, and O. A. Lawson to assist in raising a fund for a memorial window in the Nickelsville Church in honor of brother T. J. Crumley.

J. W. Van Cleave, representing the Board of Conference Cliamants, was introduced and presented to the Conference a check of \$500.00 from the Board.

J. S. Hill, President of the Morristown Industrial Institute, was introduced and spoke in behalf of the Board of Education for Negroes.

Question 6. E. G. Gillespie, N. H. Cardwell, and Solon McNeese were continued on trial in studies of the first year. Joe M. Hampton, E. H. Ogle, G. W. Woodward, and W. E. Hotalen were continued on trial and advanced to studies of the second year. E. H. Ogle was advanced, conditioned on two studies. S. E. Taylor having attended a theological school for two years was voted admission into the Conference, upon his answering the disciplinary questions, and was elected to Deacon's Orders. Elbert L. Bowyer, Noah A. Conner, Charles H. Ely, and William H. Coffee were elected to Deacons' Orders and to full membership in the Conference. S. E. Stringham, whose Deacons' Orders had been recognized, was elected to full membership in the Conference. E. W. Elrod, R. C. Elzey, W. L. Pickering, M. B. Gass, H. A. Gamble, W. E. O. Roberson, and J. N. Sadler were continued on trial in studies of second year. J. J. Ellington was admitted to full membership in the Conference and elected to Elders Orders under Seminary Rule.

Ex-Governor Harris, of the State of Georgia, was introduced and spoke to the Conference.

Question 9. W. A. Smith, C. B. Tarwater, and G. L. Shupe were advanced to studies of the 4th year. N. R. McConnell, having been received by transfer, was placed in studies of the 4th year. T. O. Brumley and I. L. Cox were continued in studies of the third year.

B. M. Martin and C. B. Tarwater were excused from attending further sessions of the Conference.

T. V. Peters and W. C. Winslow were appointed members of the Board of Examiners. Rev. W. I. Hanna, of the Methodist Episcopal Church South, Dr. Mathew J. Trennery, of the Board of Sunday Schools, and Mrs. E. W. Mathes, representing the Woman's Home Missionary Society, were introduced.

Conference adjourned with the benediction by Bishop Bristol.

#### FOURTH DAY

#### Morning Session

Conference convened at 8:30 and after singing Hymn 42, and prayer by W. L. Oliver, the address of the morning was given by Bishop Richardson.

The Bishop announced that such progress had been made with the business of the Conference that it would probably be possible to adjourn Sunday evening. On motion of G. T. Francisco, Conference voted to work toward adjournment at that time.

Question 6. R. M. Huff was continued on trial and advanced to studies of the second year.

*Question* 5. James W. Grace, Joseph M. Dew, Isaac G. Crowder, Charles G. Wren and Joseph F. Caldwell, having been duly recommended by Quarterly or District Conferences, and having passed, satisfactorily, the required examination, were admitted on trial and placed in studies of the first year.

Question 12. What others have been elected and ordained Elders? None.

*Question* 2. The transfer of Arlo Ayres Brown from New York Conference was announced.

*Question* 15. The Bishop announced the transfer of Charles F. Hunter to the Georgia Conference and of H. E. Sumner to West Virginia Conference.

Dean James L. Robb, of the Athens School, was introduced and addressed the Conference.

*Election.* The Secretary of the Cabinet announced as nominations for ministerial member of the Board of Trustees of Preachers' Aid Society, J. J. Robinette, and G. T. Byrd. The Conference voted by ballot and J. J. Robinette was elected.

For lay members of the Board, W. B. Townsend, E. M. Rupe, J. E. Laningham, and J. H. Jarvis were nominated. W. B. Townsend and J. H. Jarvis were elected. Colonel John H. Early, of Chattanooga, was introduced and spoke to the Conference in behalf of Near East Relief.

J. M. Emert introduced a resolution requesting the Commission on the Course of Study to co-operate with the Conference in conducting a Summer School of Theology for ten days at the Athens School during the Summer School for Rural Pastors to be held there. The resolution was adopted. Conference voted to require attendance on the part of those in the Conference Course of Study at this School.

*Corporate Session.* Conference went into Corporate Session. On motion of M. C. Bruner the Committee previously appointed to consider the qustion of providing interest for on a sum loaned by the incorporation to the Conference was instructed to take up this matter during the coming year. The Corporate Session adjourned.

A. B. McKenzie reported his work as Conference Evangelist and the Conference requested the Bishop to appoint him to this position for another year.

Conference requested that N. H. Cardwell, E. W. Elrod, S. E. Taylor, J. E. Milburn, Solon McNeese, and H. G. Williamson be left without appointment to attend one of our church schools.

By vote of the Conference it was asked that W. H. Newton be granted a year for rest and study.

R. A. Simonds introduced a resolution making it the policy of the Conference hereafter to admit to membership on trial no one past the age of 35 years except by a three-fourths majority. The resolution was adopted.

G. T. Byrd moved that the present Committee on Conference Relations be constituted a permanent Committee on Ministerial Qualifications. The motion was adopted.

The treasurer, W. F. Pitts, read his report and was re-elected treasurer for next year. He nominated as his assistant, E. O. Woodyard, W. E. Hotalen, A. B. McKenzie, and G. J. Creswell. They were elected.

Question 30. (a) What was the aggregate of the Benevolent Collections ordered by the General Conference? \$54,789.00.

(b) What is the aggregate of the Benovolent Collections ordered by the Annual Conference? \$31,443.00.

The Statistician read his report and by vote of the Conference was reelected for the following year.

*Question* 36. Where shall the next Conference be held? This was left to the District Superintendents.

Upon recommendation of the Committee on Conference Relations, T. O. Brumbley was granted the supernumerary relation.

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William H. Coffee, Noah H. Conner, Elbert L. Bowyer, and Charles H. Ely gave satisfactory answers to the Disciplinary Questions and were admitted to full membership in the Conference and placed in studies of the third year.

G. T. Byrd introduced a resolution asking the cabinet to appoint a Commission of five, one Conference member from each district, to represent the Conference in making plans in conjunction with the Trustees of the University of Chattanooga, for the proposed Endowment Campaign.

Conference adjourned to meet at 2 p.m.

#### Afternoon Session

Conference convened at 2 o'clock with Bishop Cooke in the chair.

Hymns 310 and 311 were sun and O. R. Tarwater led in prayer.

Reports of Committees were called for and the following Committees reported: Church Literature, Conference Claimants, Epworth League, Education, Nominations, American Bible Society, Sunday Schools, Sabbath Observance, Temperance and Social Service.

J. J. Robinette and G. T. Byrd were added to the Committee on State of the Church and Country with the requst that the Committee report at the Sunday evening session of the Conference.

W. M. Dye moved that the secretary be requested to have printed the names and addresses of all the supplies serving pastoral charges. The motion was amended to ask the District Superintendent to furnish these names and addresses. Motion was passed as amended.

*Harvard Plan.* J. J. Robinette introduced a resolution adopting the Harvard Plan of entertainment for the Conference and providing that each pastoral charge shall raise an amount equal to one per cent of pastor's salary to be used in providing two meals each day for pastors during the Conference session. (See Resolution.)

W. C. Martin, pastor of the Church at Rockwood, invited the Conference to meet in this church next year. As the question had been previously referred to the District Superintendents this invitation was referred to them by vote of the Conference.

Report of the Methodist Advocate-Journal Endowment Fund was presented and ordered printed in the Minutes.

The Secretary of the Conference was authorized to proceed upon the same plan as last year in sending out the Journal.

After prayer, led by G. W. Coleman, Conference adjourned to meet in special session after the evening program to hear report of the Board of Stewards and for other business.

*Questions* 7, 17, 22, 26, *and* 27. were asked and properly answered. (See Disciplinary Report).

On motion of J. A. Mitchell the Commission on Boundaries was dismissed by vote of the Conference.

Conference adjourned to meet at the close of the Sunday evening service to hear the reading of appointments and for the transaction of any necessary business.

#### FIFTH DAY

#### Conference Sunday

#### Morning

At 9:45 a.m., the Conference Love Feast was conducted by S. G. Ketron.

At the morning hour of worksip Bishop Richardson preached an appropriate and masterful sermon on "The Kingship of Jesus," from the text, Rev. 19:16.

#### Afternoon

At 3:00 o'clock Conference met for the Ordination Service. The Ordination Address was delivered by Bishop Cooke. Bishop Richardson ordained as Deacons, William H. Coffee, Noah H. Conner, Elbert L. Bowyer, and Charles H. Ely.

Assisted by Bishop Cooke, the District Superintendents and other Elders, Bishop Richardson ordained as Elders, Jewel J. Ellington.

At 4:00 o'clock the Conference Memorial Service was held, J. M. Melear presiding.

It was announced that Alwyn Atkins, a member of the Conference, and Mrs. J. M. Durham, and Mrs. T. S. Walker, widows of deceased members of the Conference, has died during the year.

The Memorial Address was delivered by R. A. Simonds.

#### **Evening Session**

Conference convened at the close of the Sunday Evening Service to hear the reading of the appointments and for any necessary business.

On motion of G. T. Byrd, Conference voted to omit the reading of the Journal of previous day and the reports of the committees, which had not yet been received, and to instruct the Secretary to edit these and have them printed in the Journal

B. M. Martin introduced resolutions in appreciation of the Athens Summer School for Rural Pastors and of the Mountain Schools being maintained within the bounds of the Conference and asking for the continuance of these schools. The resolutions were adopted.

Special Committee. A committee, consisting of W. L. Oliver, J. F. Rowe, and H. E. Murkett was appointed to co-operate with a similar committee from the Holston Conference Epworth League Institute in securing assembly grounds for the Methodist Episcopal Church in this section.

Question 36. Where shall the next Conference be held? Rockwood.

*Final Adjournment.* O. R. Tarwater moved that after the reading of the Journal, devotional exercises and the reading of the appointments, Conference stand adjourned. The motion was adopted.

The Journal for the evening session was read and approved. Bishop Richardson led in prayer, read the appointments, and pronounced the benediction.

# REPORTS

#### BRISTOL DISTRICT

#### M. H. RAMBO, Superintendent.

To adequately report the work accomplished on the Bristol District during the past year would require the mentioning of every pastor and every charge by name, which can hardly be done with justice to the space required for publication in our Conference Minutes; nor could we easily comply with the Conference rule, that "District Superintendents' Reports shall be limited to fifteen minutes." We shall, therefore, confine our report to the outstanding features of the District's accomplishments.

We began the year with a scarcity of eight men, but by dint of searching managed finally to find Supplies for every charge but one. The Wise Circuit is the one referred to. It is a rough and rugged charge in more ways than one, and with but little prospet for support for the one who might be willing to brave the hardships of the coalfields, and a country thickly infested with moonshiners and boot-leggers. This latter feature is not confined to this particular region in the Bristol District. The number of them is getting to be legion, and instances there are where Pastors' lives have been threatened. Your humble servant has had occasion to be wary of these lawbreakers. Once was he mistaken for a Revenue officer, once for a Boot-legger, and once was held up in the night time by the occupants of a Booze-wagon.

There has been one death among the Supplies. Brother J. J. Maness, esteemed local preacher, agreed after Conference last year to supply the St. Charles Circuit. After serving as pastor for three months, he was suddenly stricken with paralysis and lived for only a few days. He was a faithful pastor and his people love him. We secured the services of brother James H. Ely for the remainder of the year.

The health of our pastors has generally been good all the year, and their labors have been abundant. The tide of evangelism has run high in nearly every charge, resulting in 1235 conversions, and in 835 accessions. This is more than three hundred advance over last year.

The Sunday Schools have perhaps prospered as never before. The pastors seem to realize more and more the value of the Sunday School as a factor in Church life. We do no have as many other organizations as some of the other Districts of the Conference, and this fact may account for an added interest in this department. The greatest need that we have is that of leadership, so that all departments of the Church might be cared for. Our Sunday School enrollment exceeds nine thousand, and our field is so great that this number should be increased from year to year almost indefinitely. In many places these

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Church and School buildings are small and inadequate to meet the demand of our Sunday Schools, while in a few places our Pastors have caught the vision of proper housing for this purpose and are properly equipping their plants. There are numerous places where Sunday School work could be carried on if a meeting place could be secured. If it is true, as we have been told, that 80% of the Church's membership comes from the Sunday Schools, then the Bristol District surely has a good outlook.

Some effort to add to the number of Epworth Leagues and Woman's Home Missionary Societies has been made, but with little success, though what we seem to have gained in efficiency.

Our District Conference was held at Gate City, June 23-25. Bishop Bristol was present for a portion of two days and presided while present. His inspirational addresses and his Sunday morning sermon were greatly appreciated.

Pastors' salaries were considerably increased at the beginning of the year. This increase amounted to \$2500.00. We hope sometime to see the salaries of our pastors reach the standard set by the Conference. It is evident now that we shall have to suffer some chagrin on account of some salaries not being paid in full. It is being freely passed around that we have come upon hard times. The cut in the prices of farm products and the release of large numbers of men from public works has had a decided effect on Church finance, and the expected has come true in many places, so that the effect will be felt by a number of pastors. We are glad, however, to be able to report that some charges are paying out on salary, as well as increasing their collections, so that when the totals appear we hope to find that there has been no great let down.

Special mention should be made of new work that has developed during the year. In West Bristol under the efficient management of Rev. G. T. Byrd, a class of thirty members has been organized, and titled has been secured to property valued at two thousand dollars. With the aid of an emergency fund which was held for the District from last year a pastor was secured for the last four months of the year, and we now have a Sunday School of one hundred and thirty-five, with fine congregations attending the preaching services. Rev. Mouroe Ball, a local preacher, is doing efficient service at this place. Here is a fine opportunity for a community school.

A class of thirty members has been organized near Elliston on the La-Fayette charge. Brother F. B. Slusher, the LaFayette pastor, had a brush arbor built in which to hold a revival, and this class is the result. The people of this community are preparing to build a new church.

Brother Rupe, the Christiansburg pastor, pitched his tent at Vicker's Switch, in a community ripe for evangelism, and the result will be a new Church for this community. A thousand dollars has already been subscribed toward this enterprise. There are a number of other places in the District where pioneer work of this character would result in similar gains for the Kingdom.

Our building program has been largely hindered from lack of promised funds from the Centenary. At many places in the District a little help at this time would result in new Churches. With from one to three hundred dollars for each, a half dozen Church buildings would be ready for dedication within another year. We trust that a way may be found to assist these needy communities.

The greater building enterprises of the District are advancing slowly, but nevertheless, surely. Bristol Church has completed a basement with some other improvements at a cost of three thousand dollars. The exterior of the Nickelsville Church has been completed. The building is of cement brick, which presents an attractive appearance. The total cost will approximate twelve thousand dollars. Rev. O. A. Lawson, the faithful pastor has labored almost day and night in order that this Church might be dedicated this fall.

Robinette Memorial at Fairview is under way again, but will hardly hope to get their building completed before another year. This Church is a replica of the one at Pennington Gap, and was started by the Rev. T. J. Crumley. Throughout the District there have been many minor improvements made, and much credit is due the pastors who have labored so faithfully for the advancement of the Redeemer's Kingdom.

We have tried to labor faithfully all the year. Much has been accomplished, but not all that we would like to have seen. We have endeavored to be "All things to all men, if by all means we might save some". We trust only that Christ's Kingdom has been advanced by our efforts.

#### CHATTANOOGA DISTRICT

#### J. A. MICTHELL, Superintendent.

The Chattanooga District has Twenty-eight charges, 16 stations, and 12 circuits. Sixteen of these charges have Conference men for pastors, and twelve charges are supplied with local preachers the most of them attending our school at Athens, and for true devotion, untiring effort, and abundant zeal on the part of the pastors and laymen the year just closing has been a success. The reports of the pastors will show large results.

Special attention has been given to all the departments of our Church work, especially have we been working at our Centenary job, and while the results are not as large as we had expected, yet the reports from the various charges on the District will make a splendid showing, holding the standard up to the average, if not a little above that of the past years.

In January the Area Council met in Chattanooga which was well attended; and at the close of the Council meeting a great rally service was held in the First Church with Bishop Bristol presiding. Bishop Thomas Nicholson, and Bishop T. S. Henderson made splendid addresses at this meeting, which proved to be a great inspiration to our people in Chattanooga. A District meeting was also held in Chattanooga in February which was a success in every way, and was quite a help to the pastors and laymen of the Chattanooga District.

Our Sunday Schools are growing. Men's classes, women's classes, young people's classes, boys' and girls' departments, all continue to increase, and we are greatly rejoiced to see this important branch of our Church advance.

The Epworth Leagues on this district are doing a fine work, they are aiding the pastors in their revival meetings, and are successful in leading many of the young people to accept Christ.

Increase in pastors' salaries has been made at Athens, Alton Park, Avondale, First Church, Highland Park, Manker Memorial, St. Marks, St. James, Cleveland, Etowah, Chatata Circuit, Red Bank, and Soddy. Also District Superintendent's salary increased some.

And here I state with sorrow the sad fact that on the 22nd of March, 1921, Rev. Alwyn Atkins, pastor at Cleveland passed from the Church Militant to the Church Triumphant, He was indeed a fine man, well equipped for life's work, diligent in his work, an earnest preacher, a faithful pastor, and sincerely loved by all his people. May the bereaved know the full comfort and hope the gospel he so fervently preached, and may they all be some day united in that home above.

> "There is a world above, Where parting is unknown; A long eternity of love Found for the good alone: And faith beholds the dying here Translated to that happier sphere."

Some improvements on our Church and Parsonage property has been made this year, but the phenomenal record of building and improvements of the past few years on the Chattanooga District, can not be duplicated in this report, but we want to mention a few places where improvements have been made. The First Church of Chattanooga has remodeled, refinished and beautified the interior of the Church at a cost of \$6,500.00.

Our church at Soddy has been greatly improved, a basement has been put under the entire building with a fine heating plant, they have also purchased a parsonage, and in all, have spent \$3.300.00, all of this has been paid but \$1,200.00. Much credit is due Rev. Joe Hampton, the pastor, for this splendid work.

Our St. Marks Church was finished and dedicated by Bishop Bristol, January 23rd, and the unique feature of this dedication was that no collection was taken, all the debt was provided for before the day of dedication.

St. James Church under the splendid leadership of Rev. B. M. Morrison has taken on new life, the debt has all been paid, some improvements made on church and parsonage, and they have now the largest Sunday School and Congregation in the history of the Church.

Our church and parsonage at Cleveland has been improved at an expense of about \$2.000.00. Rev. N. H. Cardwell a student from the Boston School of Theology has supplied this Church since May.

Etowah has improved its property in the sum of \$1.000. Rev. W. K. Harris, the pastor, has had a fine year at Etowah and they are unanimous in asking for his return.

Red Bank has purchased a splendid lot to build a new church on, and Rev. W. E. Hotalen, the pastor, reports that the new church will be built soon.

A church on the Chatata circuit has also been improved at a cost of about \$1,000.00. And lesser improvements have been made on many of the charges, and in all cases the money has been provided.

Our Chattanooga University has had a splendid year, under Dean Hooper, the acting President, last year was perhaps the best year of the Institution.

To our new President, Dr. Brown, we open our hearts and extend to him a hearty welcome, and we pray that the greatest possible success may attend him in presiding over this splendid University.

Our School at Athens—judging by results, this school has had the greatest year of its history. This has been made possible by our splendid equipment, the character of the student body, and the aggressive methods and work of the faculty.

#### HARRIMAN DISTRICT

REV. M. P. MURPHY, Superintendent.

Harriman District embraces eight whole counties and extends its borders more or less into nine others. Scattered over this mountainous territory, there are one hundred and three churches. These churches are grouped into twenty-seven charges; eight stations, and nineteen circuits. Fourteen charges are served by Conference men, the other thirteen, by supply pastors. Seven of these supply preachers farm or follow some other occupation as a necessary means of supplementing their meager salaries. To measure up to our opportunities in this difficult, yet promising field, we need more trained men and a better pastoral support.

In spite of industrial conditions, effecting the whole country and subjecting our faithful pastors and loyal people to sacrifice and in many instances to hardship, the work of the district has moved steadily forward with a good degree of success. The reports will show that more than \$26,000.00 has been spent this year on building and improvement of Church and parosnage property. There will be an increase in ministerial support of about \$1,000.00 over last year. It is generally conceded that this has been by far, the hardest year

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to collect for Centenary and other benevolent causes we have had since the Centenary campaign was launched. Some charges, however, will make a good showing in this direction, while others will fall off considerably in their collections. Being unable to secure full reports from the pastors on this item, I am unable to state here whether we will have a gain or loss. Probably a loss.

. Our pastors have gone about their work faithfully and for the most part have done their work well. D. C. Slagle, Pastor of the Decatur charge, has been hindered considerably during the year on account of illness in his family. R. F. Ball, Pastor of the Norma and Oneida Charge, has been ill much of the time during the year, and at times, unable to fill his appointments. Mrs. T. V. Peters, wife of our faithful pastor at Harriman, was quite ill during the summer months. With these exceptions, no serious illness has invaded the homes of our pastors.

Burrville charge was left to be supplied at the last Conference. A few weeks later, John B. Peters was secured to take the Charge and finish up the year's work. Because of ill health W. O. Duncan gave up the work on Big Valley Charge last winter. At the opening of spring, O. W. Alexander took the work and served the Charge until the middle of July, when he asked to be relieved in order to pursue studies in the University of Chicago. J. N. Sadler was prevailed upon to take the Charge and finish up the work of the year. With this exception, all the pastors appointed at the Annual Conference remained on their Charges until the end of the year.

The new Church at Solway, Byington Charge, built last year but finished up this year at a total cost of about \$3,000.00, was dedicated in July by L. D. Hamil. The New Church at Sunbright will be complete as soon as a new heating plant is installed. The congregation has been using the building during the warm weather. The total cost of this Church will be about \$3,500.00. The Board of Home Missions and Church Extension has granted a donation of \$570.00 to this project, but more is needed to finish the Church free of debt. H. A. Gamble, the pastor, deserves much credit for pushing the work through so near completion, in spite of difficulties and delays.

The new Church in Jellico is in the course of construction and when completed, will cost \$50,000 to \$60,000. It will be one of the most beautiful and modern churches in the Conference. This project receives \$5,000 from Centenary funds this year. W. H. Ragan, the popular pastor, and his loyal official board are to be commended for getting the work under way after suffering several delays in securing plans and material. We hope they will be able to push the work to completion in the very near future.

Plans are on the way toward the construction of a new church at New Tazewell. In order to stimulate the growing interest in a new church program, Bishop Bristol was invited to visit this Community on Sunday, September the 11th. It was a day long to be remembered in New Tazewell, and in Claiborne County. None of our bishops it seems, had ever visited this section. The people came from every direction. The benches were carried

out of the Church into the yard and were soon filled, while the rest of the crowd stood or sat on the lawn. From an automobile which served for a pulpit, Bishop Birstol preached a great sermon, which stirred the hearts of the audience. Drs. Martin, Emert, and Hubble were also present and made addresses during the day. Following this meeting, a committee has been taking subscriptions for the new Church. The report comes to me that more than \$4,000 has already been subscribed with a fair prospect to bring the subscriptions up to \$10,000. With help from Centenary funds, which we hope to get, we expect to build in this growing town a church costing about \$20,000, which will not only make our work permanent in New Tazewell, but will encourage and strengthen our work in that whole section of Country.

The following churches have been repaired this year: Beaver Ridge, Crossville, Graysville, Harriman, Rockwood, Rugby Road, Vine Grove, and Well Springs.

Extensive repairs have been made on the District Parsonage at a total cost of \$1,000. \$400 of this comes from Centenary funds.

The Parsonage at Jellico has been remodeled at a cost of \$2,000 which makes it as good as a new building. The parsonage at Clinton has received repairs costing \$550. The parsonages at Rockwood, Vine Grove, and Andersonville have also been repaired. At Kingston, the old parsonage has been sold and a more suitable site has been secured for a new parsonage, which is now in the course of construction. When completed, it will cost \$2,500 to \$3,000 and will be one of the best in the district.

Several of these projects have received assistance from our Missionary Board.

With all this material improvement, the spiritual side of our work has not been neglected. Gracious revivals have been held in most of the Charges of the District. Aside from a few very fruitful revivals held by A. B. McKenize, our Conference Evangelist, the pastors have for the most part held their own meetings, or have assisted one another in evangelistic efforts. As a result, the pastors have reported 1,100 professions and about 50 accessions to our Church. Owing to the fact that the Litton Charge with a reported membership of 258 was transferred to the Chattanooga District at the last Annual Conference, and Mays Chapel was transferred from Heiskell Charge to the Knoxville District, with probably fifty members together with a small loss of membership here and there, will cut our gain in membership down to a minimum when compared with the figures of last year.

The Sunday Schools for the most part have had splendid increase in attendance and we fully expect a gain in enrollment when the reports are tabulated. We very much need a wide-awake Sunday School man in this territory.

There are fifteen Ladies Aid Societies in the District. Most of these are doing splendid work along several lines of material improvement.

There are nine Epworth Leagues and several Junior Leagues. We need at least two dozen more of these organizations among our young people. One of our greatest needs in the district is enthusiastic, efficient leadership, and especially so among our young people.

In February, a District meeting was held in Harriman in the interest of the Centenary program. The meeting was very well attended, and the program rendered was inspirational and stimulating. Addresses were made by Bishop Bristol, Drs. Martin, Melear, Sullivan, Neal, and others. This meeting was followed by up group meetings held in the various charges. T. V. Peters, W. C. Martin Cicero Dobbs, H. A. Gamble, and others served as team workers visiting the Charges and presenting various phases of the Centenary work.

Our District Conference held in Byington in July was very well attended. The Conference sessions were enlivened by the stimulating addresses of our visitors. President Brown of the University of Chattanooga, Dr. Martin, Melear, Murkett, Prof. Kilburn, and others brought inspiration and encouragement by their timely addresses.

As to personal labors, I will say that I have travelled throughout the District making the rounds of the quarterly meetings and several special trips, assisting the brethren wherever I could, and looking after every interest of the work. I have preached at 210 services, held 101 Quarterly Conferences, visited in the homes of the people and at places of business as opportunity afforded. When not on the field, I have labored at my desk, and among other things accomplished there, I have mailed 1165 letters and 700 cards in the interest of the work.

All the hardships of the work have been fully compensated for by the kind reception I have received everywhere, by the exceedingly abundant hospitality of the people, by the fellowship of the brethren, and by the hearty co-operation and brotherly spirit which have characterized all our Quarterly Conferences.

#### JOHNSON CITY DISTRICT

R. L. STAPLETON, Superintendent.

When the Annual Conference adjourned last fall, every charge in the Johnson City District was supplied with a pastor except Elizabethton. In the month of November Rev. E. C. Powell was appointed, moved with his family to Elizabethton, and has continued there through the year.

W. A. Thompson resigned the Unicoi charge, to which he had been appointed for the second year. Late in the summer I appointed J. L. Cupp, who had returned from Colorado, to finish out the work of the year on this charge vacated by Brother Thompson.

W. S. Brackney, formerly a member of Holston Conference, but now a retired member of an Ohio Conference served one appointment of the Watauga Circuit part of the year. J. W. May took an appointment in the Georgia Conference, and N. R. McConnell from the New Jersey Conference, was transferred and appointed to Pittman Community Center in his stead. With the exception of these changes, the other pastors have all continued as appointed last fall, and all have gone along in the work of the year with zeal, fidelity, and patience.

The year has been fruitful in revivals and accessions to the church. Many of the pastors have had splendid revival meetings at all the appointments, and these statistics will show up well in the reports.

The benevolent collections will probably not appear as well as last year. But proportionately to other sections of the country and Confe ence, it is probable that we will make as good a report. This district is mostly rural, and as all know, money is not flowing into the country now as it did when the prices of farm products was as they were last year.

Financial conditions appear to be fairly good among our people who live in the towns in the district, but in some of our rural churches and sections the reports will be less in comparison with last year on all financial claims.

The entire benevolences will probably total around \$10,000.00. The statistics will show about \$4,000.00 increase in pastoral support, and about \$30,000.00 paid out for new buildings and improvements. We have had about 1,500 professions of religion on the district and about 600 additions, with a probable net gain in membership of 400.

Ground has been broken and the foundations laid for our new churches at Sulphur Springs Camp Ground and at Kingsport. Many improvements on churches and parsonages have been made. The new parsonage at Baileyton is completed Telford charge has had a remarkable year in the improvement of the churches of the charge and the parsonage. The new Slagles Chapel in Carter County is now completed and about ready for dedication.

Our new Pittman Community Center on Webbs Creek in Sevier County was dedicated by Bishop Bristol on September 25th. This represents one of the great outstanding accomplishments of the Centenary Program of the Board of Home Missions and Church Extension for our section. The school opened with a fine enrollment of 150 pupils. It represents so far an outlay of about \$30,000.00. The building and rooms are equipped with every modern convenience for the purpose of serving the moral and intellectual needs of the large population to which the school will minister.

In the pursuit of my own duties I have traveled about 6000 miles during the year. I have held 104 business sessions of the Quarterly Conferences, have preached 184 times, and have used up 160 days of the year in travel and service on the district. I am profoundly grateful to God for continued good health and sufficient energy for my responsibilities through the year.

#### KNOXVILLE DISTRICT

J. W. BOLING, Superintendent.

Unusual difficulties have confronted the church this year. The challenges thus brought to our ministers and laymen has not baffled them in their effort, nor defeated them in achievements purposed, attempted, and wrought.

The long expected paralysis in the business world arrived coincident with our new Conference year. As the purchasing value of a dollar rapidly rose toward pre-war equivalents the difficulty with which the dollar was obtained, gave rise to an appreciation of money which resulted in a peculiar comradeship between the average churchman and his money not unlike the adhesive union existing between Ephraim and his idols. This sudden revolution created an emergency which gripped and threatened the whole range of religious activities. The consequent drying up of the fountains of Christian beneficence resulted not only in embarrassment to the ministry on account of inadequate support and in increased difficulties to our great Boards because of depleted treasuries, it also carried with it the inevitable and deadly scourge of spiritual stagnation. As a consequence stewardship assumed a new meaning, not only in the parsonage pantry but in the counsels of the great Boards presiding over the issues of the advance program of our great church involving world wide interests of the Kingdom of God.

The strategy of the church in successful contention with the emergencies arising in great historic movements such as the world has just experienced has been one of the distinctive features evidencing not only her Divine origin but her ability to triumphantly conquer the world for Jesus Christ. In fact the exclesiastical statesman expects to discover in every great crisis the elements, which when woven together by a great and purposeful strategy, provide an advantageous solution of difficulties to be overcome. A wise providence has led us in the discovery and utilization of at least some of the exponents created by the very difficulties to be overcome.

The first step in a logical order of procedure was to revolve the disk until the financial pinch could be seen from the proper angle. It was easy to lead the intelligent believer to see that the greater value a dollar assumed and the greater the difficulty with which a dollar was acquired, the swifter would run a valid remedy to cure the spendthrift habit. Our first effort was to convince the leadership in our churches that in the ratio with which poeple ceased to

spend money with prodgiality for illegitimate and needless purposes, the greater would be their ability to invest in the high and permanent values of life.

We made much also of the element of faith. Any widow could feed a prophet of God from a barrel of meal so long as streams of prosperity kept the barrel fed to the brim. But only she who believes in God can gamble on the last thin crust while famine strides in seven league boots and the carcasses of the lean kind rattle in the dreams of the king. That the "Children of God walk not by sight but by faith", and that "only they who seek first the Kingdom of God and his righteous" enjoy assurance of absolute exemption from want ceased to be merely scriptural phrases to be quoted in prayer meeting and assumed the sanctified dignity characterizing the substantial principle sof every day life.

Thus the foundation was laid for achievements otherwise impossible to obtain.

The pressure is unduly high in the sphere of building and improvements. In so very many places our people were not provided with the equipment essential to the largest measure of success, to say nothing of quarters in some degree at least in keeping with modern show houses and other public hall of entertainment so well designed for utility and for public comfort. The heroism of our people in their attempt to make better provision for the successful prosecution of the spi itual program of the church by providing better material facilities has been sublime. Our church at Pigeon Forge has been completed. More than \$5,000 has been expended in the completion of this structure, the entire cost of which has been approximately \$12,000. The heroic congregation at Niota has faced difficulties which were positively staggering. Churches very decidely stronger have hesitated and faltered in contemplation of difficulties much less formidable But our congregation at this point has begun and almost completed since last Conference a splendid brick edifice reflecting great honor upon the church. The aggregate cost of this structure has been approximately \$12,000. The finest achievement in this kind of constructive work has been at Inskip. A spirit of unrest characterized the situation at this place. A number of good financial supporters had removed their membership in changing their residences. After a vigorous canvass the subscriptions were at least \$300 less than the budget. A substantial number of members were out of employment. The building was defective as well as inadequate. With a vision like unto a prophet the pastor and people decided to rebuild the church. An improvement was begun and completed at a cost of \$6,000. Four thousand of this has been paid. The pastor's salary was paid in full and a strong resolution adopted in the Quarterly Conference requesting his return.

At Pleasant Hill on the Maryville Circuit a beautiful brick structure was begun last year. This project was carried on to successful completion this year and was dedicated free of debt. The cost of this building was \$8,000.

At Murphy College the first in a large group of proposed building has been in process of construction this year. This dormitory with rooms for ninety students is a prophecy of that which is yet to come in the development of a great program for this fine institution located in one of the most resourceful territories in the South for our Methodism.

Other improvements meeting distinct need on various charges to the amount of approximately \$10,000 have been made.

The building program has merely begun. Next year's forecast predicts the largest in the history of the District. At Oakwood, dirt has been broken for a building that will cost probably in excess of \$25,000 This project will be carried out next year beyond question. At Park City, plans are ready for immediate action. The plans for a \$50,000 structure are already approved. A subscription of \$15,000 has been raised this year. The Centenary is behind this enterprise and a great achievement will be wrought there next year. At Loudon, a twin project to that at Niota as reported heretofore, will be carried on to completion. The old church has been torn down and work has already begun on a new \$10,000 structure. This will put Methodism on the map in this, the oldest and one of the most classic little towns in the state. At Alcoa, the babe in the large family of charges on the district, a substantial organization has been effected and a building that will cost approximately \$4,000 will be projected early in the year. A donation has been granted from the Board at Philadelphia and money is being raised on the ground. Our little mission at South Knoxville has begun to see the dawn of a new day. A fine lot has been secured and the foundation is already in for a Bungalow Church that will cost probably \$4,000. The church at Maryville is in the midst of a great campaign and one of the best church buildings in the Conference is to be erected next year. Cash to the amount of \$27,000 has already been raised and deposited in bank. Subscriptions to the amount of \$10,000 have already been secured. Thus a long felt need is to be met in next year's program.

Every interest of the benevolent interests of the church has had diligent and constant attention. In view of the unusual financial conditions, results are very satisfactory

In this age of distinctive organization, one of the outstanding features of our district policy has been renewed emphasis on the value of organization in the church. With the transfer of emphasis from the spasmodic and emotional to the sane and purposeful motives of life, the church school now occupies a strategic position. This does not mean that the deeper feelings of our holy religion have been abandoned. It simply means that feelings directed by intelligence and governed by self control will not only save us from fanaticism, but will bulk large in the great harvest field of results. Hence the value of the Sunday School, the Epworth League, the Junior League, the Ladies' Aid, the great missionary societies, the Social, Educational, and other organizations given to the promotion of the group and crowd movements actuated by religion and controlled by intelligence, has been intensely emphasized.

The supreme work of the church and the great end of all her activities should be, of course, identical with the motive of Him who came "not to be

ministered unto but to minister, and to give himself a ransom for many-to seek and to save that which was lost". The one supreme reason for better houses of worship, better and more efficient leadership, and organization, a stronger ministry with more adequate support, stronger Benevolent Boards, with immense sums of money, is to the one great end and purpose that people may be saved from the stain and guilt—the power and dominion of sin. In the absence of a supreme emphasis upon the salvation of the lost the Church loses her distinctive identity. True to this conception the evangelistic program has constituted the paramount issue on this district. Pronounced emphasis has been placed upon the advantage to be taken of the psychology created by the conspiring circumstances producing the transition of the hour. In the financial stress following one of the most sudden and terrific deflations in the history of revolutions, effecting the standards of value in mediums of exchange, the peculiar attitude of the average man was opportune for the conviction that "A man's life consisteth not in the abundance of the things that he posseth"-that "man lives not by bread alone". Men were growing tired of substituting fiction for fact. The frivolities of pleasure and the shams of luxury had deadened the physical sensibilities until the sting had destroyed the thrill. Thus a mighty hour had arrived when Jesus Christ who holds the priceless gifts of life's unchanging verities need but to be presented in the glorious "challenge of a new chance to be good". "Preach Jesus, for the multitudes are ready to hear Him gladly" was the watch word carried from the largest church in the city to the remotest and smallest in the rural parish. The pastors took up the note and the weary, heart-sick, prodigal welcomed the voice of a gracious invitation to come and be fed. The writer shares the common joy of the faithful pastors and their churches in the abundant harvest garnered from the ranks of the lost. As nearly as I can compute in the absence of reports arriving too late to record near two thousand souls have professed to have found their redeemer at our altars this year.

While we have encountered the proverbial difficulty in showing a net gain in membership proportionate to the number of conversions, somewhere near twelve hundred members have been added to the church.

Not satisfied with merely leading souls to God and into fellowship with the church, we have made desperate efforts to secure a purposeful dedication of the entire range of life powers to the promotion of the Kingdom. That to give the life with all the powers possessed is merely the inauguration of an ever increasing capacity unfolding and ripening with the accumulation of the years was the ideal held with sustained emphasis before the expanding visions of life.

Desperate as was the effort to get men for God, no less desperate was the effort to get all the man there was in each new recruit for the King. We proceeded upon the presumption that for a soul to find God is to find the secret of discovering not only its powers but the secret by which the highest intensification of its powers is to be realized. "Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who hath blessed us with all spiritual blessings in heavenly places in Christ. According as he hath chosen us in him before the foundation of the world, that we should be holy and without blame before him in love. \* \* \* Till we all come in the unity of the faith, and of the knowledge of the Son of God unto a perfect man, unto the measure of the stature of the fullness of Christ."

## **Reports of Committees**

#### HARVARD PLAN OF ENTERTAINMENT

Whereas, None of the churches within our bounds, for the past year or two have invited the Conference to hold its session with them, due not so much to the disappearance of the spirit of hospitality as to changed industrial conditions; and,

Whereas, It is hurtful to the Church as well as embarrassing and somewhat humiliating to assemble for our annual session from year to year with no response from the churches to the demand for entertaining communities;

*Therefore*, Resolved that we hereby adopt what is known as the Harvard Plan of Entertainment;

Resolved, (2) That we instruct the District Superintendents to apportion, at the time of the First Quarterly Conference, to each pastoral charge, a sum equal to one per cent (1%) of the pastor's salary; to be known as the Holston Conference Fund; to select a treasurer for said fund, who shall receive and hold this money, subject to the action of the Conference at its next session, when this action shall be completed, and rules for the application of this fund adopted.

*Resolved*, That the District Superintendents shall urge, where necessary, that this money be collected and transmitted to said Treasurer, along with other Conference Collections.

#### **EDUCATION**

The high standard maintained in the educational work of the Methodist Episcopal Church should excite our pride and enlist our interest.

The Board of Education, a constituted agency for the promotion of our educational interests, has seen the work grow to its present proportions. Through its Loan Fund thousands of deserving students have been helped. We heartily endorse the Board in its forward looking program.

#### The University of Chattanooga

The College of Liberal Arts of the University of Chattanooga starts the year with the largest enrollment in its history, an increase of nearly forty per cent having been reached over last year. Its standard is high and credits from the University are honored in our best graduate schools.

The institution is fortunate in securing as its new president, Dr. Arlo Ayers Brown, who has entered upon his work with much zeal and enthusiasm. Under his able administration we confidently expect rich results.

The University is in need of more money if it is to serve its constituency. In securing an enlarged endowment our ministers and our Laymen's Association can render invaluable assistance.

#### The Athens School

The Athens School under Dean Robb enters upon what promises to be one of its best years. The first month of the present year recorded thirty more men and six more women than was covered by the same period last year.

The faculty of the School is one of the best in its history. The instruction is thorough and painstaking. The expenses are low, with numerous opportunities for self-help, so that any young man or woman who has sufficient ambition and grit can get the benefits of the institution.

Thirty ministerial students are enrolled, a number of whom are serving charges in the Conference. A decidedly religious atmosphere prevails in the School.

The operation by the Women's Home Missionary Society of the Elizabeth Ritter Home for girls in connection with the School is one of its valuable features.

The new department of religious education and rural leadership recently established by the Rural Department of the Board of Home Missions is already doing a fine work, and bids fair to render a great service in preparing men for the rural work of the church, in particular, and for more efficient work in general.

#### Murphy College

Murphy College, under President Bishop, is enjoying much prosperity. The new property purchased in 1919 has been carefully plotted and plans drawn for seven new buildings. The first unit, a dormitory for boys is nearing completion. It is 157 feet long, 45 feet wide  $\bar{a}t$  one end, and 77 feet at the other, and will accommodate 90 students. It meets a long felt need. We confidently expect to see the completion of the entire plant at an early day and when this is accomplished, Murphy College will have an equipment second to none in the South.

We are pleased to report that the Woman's Home Missionary Society of Holston Conference is planning to have a Home for girls at Murphy College, and we commend this laudable undertaking.

#### State University

We must take into account our relation to the educational institutions supported by the State. Many of our young people are entering such institutions. We recognize the growing importance of the relationship between the University of Tennessee and our Knoxville Methodism. The Rev. J. J. Ellington, associate pastor of First Church, Knoxville, is doing a splendid work among the students of the State University and we recommend that this Conference give the Board of Education the largest possible support in carrying forward this matter of pastoral oversight among the student body.

#### Wesleyan Academy

For the past forty years this institution has been doing a vitally important service, not only for the advancement of Methodism in East Tennessee, but also for the advancement of public education. Through stress and storm of financial embarrassment it still survives as the logical center for the establishment of a strong Methodist school. And we hope that the Brethren of the church and all friends of education everywhere, will see to it that Wesleyan Academy be classed as one of our best secondary schools. We have everything except financial means—a climate unsurpassed; a community of Christian citizens; and a host of young people hungry for educational opportunity.

Its work for the present scholastic year opened August 31st, with the following instructors in charge:

Benjamin H. Bowers, Principal, Miss Eileen Register, A.B., Miss Irene Keebler, Miss Elsie Shanks, Prof. I. N. Pickering, Mrs. Hazel Thompson, Miss Maude Reynolds, and Miss Mariadah Huffaker. Misses Huffaker and Keebler have charge of Music and Domestic Science, respectively, and, as pertains to their work, their ability is unquestioned. The other members of the faculty have had either academic or collegiate training.

The State High School Inspector of Tennessee has placed the Academy on the list of first class High Schools. Therefore a Diploma from the Academy entitles its holder to a certificate to teach for one year in the public schools of the State without examination, and also entrance to the Freshman Year in the State University.

The enrollment has increased steadily since the opening of the term until it is now 230. Many more students are expected at the opening of the second semester.

Our present needs are a chemical laboratory, a boys' dormitory, and a field agent to secure the necessary funds. When these will have been provided Wesleyan Academy will be prepared to do more thorough and efficient work.

#### RESOLUTIONS CONCERNING UNIVERSITY OF CHATTANOOGA

(a). Realizing the necessity of providing the best possible educational facilities for our young people in order to prepare them for successful achievement as Christian home-makers, laymen, and ministers, this Conference pledges its hearty support to the proposed plan of the Trustees of the University of Chattanooga to raise in the year 1922 a fund which will provide an adequate endowment and permit the expansion of this growing insitution located in Chattanooga and Athens, Tennessee.

(b). We record our enthusiastic approval of the plan of the trustees to request from the Board of Education of the Methodist Episcopal Church the assistance of the Department of F nance of the Board in leading this forward movement.

#### AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY

The Bible is still the greatest seller on the bookshelves of the world. The demand for the Holy Scriptures is greater than at any time in the past. The Bible is still the greatest single evangelizing force in the world. The obligation resting upon the church to give the Bible to the whole race in the languages spoken by men the world over was never so binding as now. It is the only way out of the dark. The fundamental principles of God's Word are still the guiding star of the nations and nothing can take their place.

This work of Bible distribution is pre-eminently a church task. It is not right to turn it over to irresponsible commercial interests and allow them to exploit the Bible for the sake of gain. The poor in all sections of the country are being imposed upon by men greedy of gain who are making merchandise out of the instinctive love that people have for the Word of God. The church cannot afford to permit this to go on. She cannot evade the repsonsibility for Bible translation, publication, and distribution, any more than she can evade the responsibility of preaching the gospel by word of mouth. They are God's two ordained agencies and no man can put them asunder.

The budget of the Bible Society for this current year is \$1,222,367 for its world-wide work. About \$400,000 of this will come back from sale of Scriptures; about one hundred thousand will be received from legacies and invested funds; the remainder must come from the free-will offerings of churches and individuals. The Bible Societies of the world, supported by the offerings of the chruches, supply five-sixths of the whole Bible output of the world, and 99 per cent of the languages in which the Bible is now being read. In other words, the world is dependent on Bible Societies, working as the agencies of the Church, for its Bible supply. This is as it should be.

The demands upon the Society are greater every year. Every new missionary sent out increases the demand for the Bible and thus intensifies the work of the Bible Society

We, therefore recommend and again solicit your prayers and hearty cooperation. We urge upon every pastor the duty of keeping this work before his people. We ask every church to observe Bible Sunday, the last Sunday in November. G. S. BALES
