COPY of the printed Journals of the House of Representatives of his Majesty's Province of the Massachusetts-Bay in New England for the session which began at Boston on May 25, 1715, was given to Samuel Sewall by the printer, Bartholomew Green, on July 12, three weeks after the Governor had in angry mood prorogued that body. Stung by a slighting comment passed by Governor Dudley on their proceedings, the members of the House determined to print the full Journal of the session, as the best means of defending themselves. Thus began a practice of printing the Journals of the House which was continued in an almost unbroken series till the Revolutionary War. The convenience of having the record in such a form would alone have justified the publication; as time passed, the political advantages were also recognized, and the long controversies arising between the Governor and the House, or between the Council and the House, led to many papers, worthy to be called state papers, being spread upon the pages of the Journals. Such publications were intended more for the constituents of the House than for any effect they could produce upon those immediately engaged in the controversies; and, in the absence of an active press, the political questions received their discussion in messages, addresses, declarations, or the more formal proclamations, - the most final of all expressions of opinion.

The beginnings of this publication were small and uncertain. The clerk of the House was directed to prepare a copy of the Journal, and the representatives of Boston were desired to take care that the printing was seasonably done. The question of cost does not appear to have been considered at this time; but the expediency of continuing to print was at once recognized, and in the second session of this General Court measures were taken to learn the cost, and provide for the future regular appearance of the votes or minutes during the session. On June 30, 1715, the representatives of the Town of Boston were again desired to take the care of printing the Journals of the session, and "to Treat with a Printer about the Terms upon which they may be Printed here after." 1 Green was at this time printer to the Governor and Council, and appears to have been the only printer who submitted an estimate. He offered to print the Journals of the House "and all the other Printing directed by the Government, for the space of Seven Years next coming; and to furnish each Member of this Court, with a Copy of the said Votes, free of charge, on each Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday, of the several Sessions, during that Term, upon his being Allowed Thirty Pounds per Annum for his Service."² This offer was accepted by the House, and the concurrence of the Council was desired, but not given. The session came to an end while the matter was before the Council,

Council, and so the care of the printing of the Journal fell upon the representatives of Boston, "upon the foot of the Agreement with Mr. Green the Printer."

Thus for three sessions the House of Representatives took upon itself the printing of its votes and minutes, without any encouragement from the Governor and Council. The fourth and last session began on November 23, and continued until December 22, but the Journal was not printed, as the following entry in the proceedings in the House on June 27, 1716, proves: "An Accompt of Bartholomew Green, for Printing the Journal of this House, in their Sessions begun in May, July and August, the last Year, and finding Paper, Folding and Stitching them, Amounting to the Sum of *l.22 17s. 6d.* Presented to the House for Payment"—and allowed. Had the Journal of the November session been printed, it would have been mentioned with the others.

It is to be noticed that in each case the entire session was printed as one piece, and without title-pages. The form adopted was modelled after that of the printed laws, and had been used by the Governor and Council when they issued any resolves of the General Court. I have found one such resolve in the collections of the Boston Athenæum, and have reproduced it in a reduced form to serve as a frontispiece to this volume. It is the only issue in that form that I have seen, and might easily be mistaken for a page from the printed Journals, although no Journals were printed until 1715.

In default of the Journal of the House of Representatives for its November session (and the original manuscript records were long since destroyed), I have given the minutes of the Governor and Council during the sitting. Partial though this record is, so far as the proceedings of the House are concerned, it is better than nothing, and at least shows what business was sent up from the House. The minutes may also be accepted as the best contemporary record of public business, as they alone were copied to be sent to the English ministry, and not until the practice of printing the House Journals was introduced were these latter sent in like manner to the British authorities.

The political history of this session calls for little notice, as it turns more upon the change in the governorship than on any other factor. I have so fully described in another place the contest between the Governor and the Council for control of the government on the death of Queen Anne, that there is no necessity for attempting a summary of that intrigue.¹ Governor Dudley was restored to power by the act of the King, but enjoyed the office only a short time. For about a month before the date of the session it was known that Col. Elizeus Burges had been appointed Governor.

It would be unprofitable to exhume Elizeus or Elisha Burges from the oblivion which now engulfs him. Perhaps it would be unkind to do so, for the little we know of him is not greatly to his credit. There was a commission issued from Kensington, 13 March, 1693, appointing him to be "Brigdr and Eld-Lieut." in the Second Troop of Life Guard, but he had dropped from the regiment in 1694. We know that he served under General James, afterwards Earl Stanhope, in Spain, perhaps participating in the capture of Minorca in 1708, and in the surrender at Brihuega in 1710. Stanhope became second Secretary of State in 1714, under George I, and Hutchinson tells us that it was by Stanhope's interest that Burges was appointed in February, 1715 (the commission passed the seals March 17), and Sir William Ashurst wrote that the General (Stanhope) had promised to be answerable for his (Burges) good behavior.²

If Dudley was already discontented, the intelligence of the new appointment was not fitted to soothe his feelings. Bodily ills came to him as an added discomfort, and the first day of the sitting found him confined by a fit of gout to his house in Roxbury.

Roxbury. He gave a *Dedimus* to Col. Phillips, Col. Lynde and Judge Sewall to administer the oaths to the Deputies. This they did, and listened to the election sermon of Rev. Jeremiah Shepard, of Lynn, who preached from Isaiah lxiii. 12: "That led them by the Right Hand of Moses, with His Glorious Arm, Dividing the Water before them, to make Himself an Everlasting Name." A single sentence of this discourse will show its tendency: "A work never to be forgotten, is the Lord's preparing this wilderness for his people when he swept away thousands of those salvage Tawnies (those cursed Devil worshippers) with a mortal Plague, to make room for a better People."¹ The Deputies then dined at the Green Dragon, and later elected the Councillors, all of whom were satisfactory to the Governor except Nathaniel Byfield, long an object of Dudley's personal dislike.

It was not until May 31 that the Governor was able to come into Boston, and in the following fashion: "Was carried in Cous. Dumer's Sedan: but twas too tall for the Stairs, so was fain to be taken out near the top of them. He vehemently urg'd passing the Ministers' Motion for a Synod."² Thus it happens that there was no message or paper from the Governor at the opening of the session. For the first time in his long and not untroubled career, Dudley had nothing to say or to write to the Great and General Court. Bodily ill may in part account for this omission, but it may also be assumed that mental distress played a share in making the Governor silent on this occasion. The representative of the King in the Province followed the practice of the King at home, and the message to the Assembly was the counterpart of the message or King's speech in Parliament at the beginning of the session.

The cause of the printing of the Journal is given on page 34 of this publication, and bears every evidence of being a true account. The Governor was not a man who softened his expressions of opinion. Sewall's Diary gives a number of examples, where, perhaps, the zeal of a partisan has not made the words any gentler than the reality and may have added somewhat to their force. "A Comittee brought in something about Piscataqua. Gov! said he would give his head in a Stand-Basket as soon as he would pass it." When Dummer was appointed agent of the Province in England, Dudley, to whom he was obnoxious, burst out that "he will be drawn asunder with wild horses, before he will be thrust upon as last year." It will be interesting to add the version of Judge Sewall: "Tuesday, June 21. In the Forenoon Gov! signifies his Intention to prorogue the Court; had sat 4 weeks and done nothing, were distemper'd. Bill for the Tax Read; I express'd my desire that the voting of it might be left to a longer time, at least to the afternoon: but the Gov would have it voted then; and it past in the Negative because 't was but for 11,000 f. I voted not because of great moment, and so suddenly call'd for. Deputies are sent for in, and the Court prorogued to the 20th July at 10. M."³

While the appointment of Burges was well known in the Province, no official notice from the ministry had been received when the Assembly met on the day appointed. Dudley desired a short session, and in fact there was little to be done beyond providing the treasury with money and paying some regard to the condition of the bills of credit, already threatened with disparagement, and a menace to sound public credit. These two questions, however, were precisely the two questions on which there was the greatest difference of opinion between the House and the Council. The former, as the popular body, responded more quickly to the wishes of the people; and the people had tasted of the first delights of a resort to paper money, and began to see in that dangerous instrument a means of relieving themselves of the necessity of taxation, while supplying a medium of exchange. The House would divide the amount of the tax already passed and submitted

to the authorities in England, postponing the collection of one-half of it to a later year. To this the Governor and Council were greatly opposed, and thus arose the dead-lock between the two bodies. The session continued to August 1, without result, and thus another session, from August 24 to 27, was made necessary, but again with only partial results so far as the principal issues were concerned. The Governor prorogued the Assembly to September 28, and on September 22 issued a proclamation proroguing the meeting to October 26. These were among the last acts of Dudley's official career.

After the Governor had issued this proclamation an incident occurred of some interest. A new Secretary of the Province, Samuel Woodward, arrived bringing a letter of recommendation from the new Governor, Colonel Burges, addressed to the President and Council. The day after his commission was produced a Council meeting was held, and Sewall gives at length what passed:

"Gov' sits by the side of the Table facing to the South; L' Gov' [Tailer] in one of the South windows. The Comissions were produc'd and Read, Oaths given. Then the L' Gov' stood up and with deference enquired whether his Comission did not supersede the Gov! The Gov' answered No. L' Gov' said he reckon'd himself oblig'd to propound it, Should rest in the Council's Opinion. Some Debate was had. Col. Hutchinson propounded there might be a fuller Council. Others said 't was requisite it should be imediatly determin'd. Capt. [Andrew] Belchar answered in the Negative. Mr. [John] Clark seem'd to hesitat. I express'd my self that I was of Col. Hutchinson's mind, but if my answer was now expected, I said that, seeing the L' Gov" Comission directed him to Govern by the Comission and Instructions of Gov' Burgess, in case of his death or absence, I was of Opinion that the L' Gov" Comission did not impower him to be Comander in Chief of this Province : Because neither the Comission nor Instructions, Nor any Authentick Copy of them, refer'd to in it, were arrived. L' Gov' did not like the Vote should be so put. 'T was propounded to put it, whether the Governour did not abide.

"The Gov' call'd for the Proclamation, which was read. L' Gov' said, Now other provision was made, he had a Comission from King George. Mr. Cooke said, making other provision refer'd to the charter. Others said, The clause refer'd to what was pass'd, not to what was to come hereafter. At length the Gov' dictated to the Clerk to this purpose, Whether the Government was devolved on the Lieut. Gov', the Comission of Gov! Burgess, nor any copy of it, by which was to govern, not being arrived. It was *Nemine contradicente*, carried in the Negative. [Wait] Winthrop, Cooke, Elisha Hutchinson, [Samuel] Sewall, Joseph Lynde, Eliakim Hutchinson, [Andrew] Belchar, [Edward] Bromfield, [John] Clark, [Addington] Davenport, Thomas Hutchinson, All Noes."¹

The attempt to throw Dudley from the Governor's chair was thus foiled for the time, and to escape further contest with the Assembly he again postpones the day of meeting:

"Third-day 8' 18. The Gov' prorogues the Gen! Court to the 23^d Nov! I and Mr. Clark voted against it. Gov' pretended Deference to Gov' Burgess in doing it, in expectance of his Arrival; but in the Proclamation, never read to the Council, he said nothing of it, which was gravaminous to some."¹ His opponents had not been idle, and were intent upon obtaining from England the papers needed to establish their contention. Early in November the needed copy of Col. Burgess's commission reached Boston, and the government devolved on Lieutenant Governor Tailer. It was Dudley's old opponent, Colonel Byfield who brought the commission, and inveighed against "our Agent Dumer for betraying him after Dumer had given him his Word and Hand that he had done with Dudley." There was nothing for Dudley to do but to acquiesce in the act of the King, and so it was the new Lieutenant Governor who met the Assembly in its November meeting.

The newspaper of the day gave an account of the ceremonies attending the change of head, and the notice of the next session of the General Court:

"On Wednesday last an Exemplification of His Majesty's Most Gracious Letters Patents, bearing date the 17th of *March* last, Constituting, and Appointing *Elizeus Burges* Esq; His Captain General, and Governour in chief in, and over this His Majesty's Province of the *Massachusetts-Bay*, were Read, and Published; upon which the Cannon of the Castle, and the South Battery of the Town were discharged.

"Then the Honorable William Tailer Efq; Lieut. Governour of the faid Province, by virtue of the Powers, and Authorities there into him granted, and His Majefty's Commission to him, bearing date the 28th of April last, (being first duely Sworn) Issued forth a Proclamation, by, and with the Advice and Confent of the Council, Requiring all Officers Civil, and Military, to continue in, and proceed to the Execution and Discharge of their respective Trusts, and Offices, till further Order.

"After which the Honourable Lieut. Governour invited the Counfellors, the Reprefentatives of *Bofton*, and the Gentlemen prefent to his Houfe, Where His Majefty's, the Prince's, and all the Royal Family's Health were Drank, as alfo Col. *Burges's*, Col. *Dudley's*, and Profperity to the Trade, and Welfare of this Province.

"I am Commanded to give Notice, That the Great, and General Court, or Affembly is appointed to meet upon Wednefday the 23d of this Inftant *November*, it being the day to which it now ftands Prorogued, and then to fit and do bufinefs; and all Perfons therein concerned, are to take due notice thereof, and conform themfelves accordingly.

Sewall in his *Diary* describes the opening of the last session of this Assembly :

"Nov' 23. L' Gov' makes a Cold Treat to the Councillours and Comission Officers. Was not a House in the Fore-noon. Mr. Speaker and many Deputies visited the L' Gov' A. M. A little after 3 L' Gov' proceeded to the Town House. I went on his right Hand, Col. Lynde on his Left; Capt. Dyer and two of his Officers went before him; before them, Mr. Winchcomb bare-headed, Two Trumpets, 4 Serjeants in red Cloaths with Horlberts. Major Gen¹ [Wait Winthrop], Col. Hutchinson, Capt. Hutchinson met the L' Gov' at the Town-House. By [John] Cushing, [Nathanael] Norden, [Addington] Davenport, L' G. sent Message to the Deputies; The Lieut. Gov' is in the Chair and expects your Attendance. Seem'd to be out of Breath in reading his Speech."

On November 24 Mr. Cooke and others brought a message from the Lieutenant Governor appointing an election to fill the vacancies in the Council — four in number.

"Dec' I. Election. Voted twice, and brought it to Nothing: Voters, 76. Major Bond who was the highest had 32. Deputies voted to chuse only one in the room of him Negativ'd: Council came not into it. I said, All or none.

"Dec^r 2. Voters 79. [Penn] Townsend chosen by 41 votes. 4th Stroke, Voters 75. Thomas Noyes Esqr. chosen by 53 Votes.

"Province of Main, Voters 71.

"Adam Winthrop Esqr. chosen by 52.

"At Large, Voters, 69.

"Nathan! Byfield Esqr. chosen by 60."²

The choice was approved by the Lieutenant Governor, and the new Councillors took the oath. The advent to the Council Board of Col. Byfield foreshadowed trouble for Agent Dummer, who was unfortunate enough to antagonize this active politician. The Assembly in its August session had omitted to grant the usual allowance

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allowance to Dummer, a measure in all probability instigated by Byfield. That the action was not entirely just to the Agent is shown by the grant of $\pounds 200$ made by the Assembly in its November session, but disallowed by the Lieutenant Governor.

"Xr. 21 Now about the Gov' disallows the Votes for giving our Agent Mr. Dummer $\pounds 200$. And for continuing him Agent. I voted to the first but express'd my Doubtfullness as to the latter, when I heard what was pleaded by Col. Byfield as to his Unacceptableness to Gov' Burgess, and the Ministers. I also Consider'd his giving up in print the place of the Attorney General as Reserv'd in the Charter to the King—and writ hardly to any of the Council: but very largely to the Speaker, and to Mr. White. Gov' prorogues the Court to the 22^d of February."¹

Dummer had warm supporters in the Province, and as a rule they were also supporters of Dudley. For example Rev. Eben Pemberton was "very warm about the Agent," and regarded Tailer as a "usurper," occupying a position that rightly belonged to Dudley. His wife was quite as good a politician, and asserted that the Agent had been handled barbarously, an opinion which led the pious Sewall, who received at the hands of Tailer on the next day a commission as Judge of the Superior Court, to remark: "The people made light of the errand of God's people hither; indifferent"²—perhaps an early form of the creed that "to the victors belong the spoils." Sewall's position is all the more remarkable because he was a kinsman of Dummer; but his political creed was summed up in the dogma, "I was for upholding Government whether in or out of it."³

Apart from the Journals this session was not rich in issues from the press. The election sermon was printed as usual, and the title-page was as follows:

JOURNAL Of the Houfe of Reprefentatives.

At a Great and General Court or Affembly of His Majefty's Province of the Maffachufetts-Bay in **New-England**, begun & held at **Bolion**, upon Wednefday the 25th Day of **May**, **Anno Domíní**, 1 7 1 5.

Amuel Sewall, John Phillips, and Joseph Lynde Efqrs. came down from the Council Board, and Acquainted the House that they were Appointed and Authorized by His Excellency the Governour, That this House should take the Oaths, Make and Subscribe the Declaration, Take and Subscribe the Oath of Abjuration (as by the Royal Charter of this Province is Directed) before them, which was accordingly done by the Members present, and They withdrew.

The Houfe Proceeded to write their Votes for a Speaker, which being Collected, and Examined, it was found that *John Burrill* Efq; was chosen by a major part of the Houfe, and he was accordingly Conducted to the Chair.

The Houfe Proceeded to write their Votes for a Clerk, which being Collected and Examined, it appear'd that Mr. John White was chosen by a major part of the Houfe, who was accordingly fent for to the Houfe.

Post Meridiem.

A Meffage fent up to the Council Board, by Capt. Davis, and Mr. Cawley, to report to His Excellency the Choice the Houfe had made of a Speaker.

Who Returned, That His Excellency was not in Council, but by Sickness Confin'd at home.

Major Skeffe, and Mr. Chipman, were fent to Wait on His Excellency at His Houfe at Roxbury, to Report to His Excellency, the Choice of the Speaker.

Who Returned, That His Excellency faid, the Choice is very acceptable to him. A Meffage fent up to the Board, by Mr. Samuel Clap, and Capt. Davis, That the Houfe was now ready to proceed to the choice of Councellors.

Who Return'd, That the Board were ready to Proceed, and Join with the Houfe in the Choice.

Ordered, That Mr. Epps, Capt. Noyes, Col. Winthrop, Col. Thaxter, and Mr. Denison, be a Committee to carry up the Votes of this House for Councellors, and affist in Sorting and Numbering them, together with the Votes of the Board, and Report to the House, the several Elections that shall be made.

The faid Committee carried up the Votes of the House, for Councellors in the late Colony of the *Maffachufetts-Bay* until Eighteen were chosen by a major part of the Voters.

Then for the late Colony of *New-Plymouth*, until Four were chofen, as aforefaid. Then for the late Province of *Maine*, until Three were chofen, as aforefaid.

Then for the Territory between Sagadehoc and Nova Scotia, until One was chofen, as aforefaid.

And laftly, for Perfons dwelling in any Part of the Province, until Two were chofen, as aforefaid.

The Committee appointed to Examine the Treafurers Accompts, Reported, That in these Accompts is an Article of Eight Pounds, given to the Troops that attended His Excellency the Governour, when he Re-affumed the Government; for which the Treafurer has no Warrant, from the Governour and Council directing its Payment.

And the Queftion being put, Whether the faid Article be allowed in the faid Accompt? It pass'd in the Negative.

Capt. Noyes from the Committee for Petitions, made Report on the Petition of *Thomas Tarboll*, viz. That they are of Opinion that nothing is due from the Province to the faid *Tarboll*, fince he proceeded as a Volunteer in that Service to *Canada*, & not imploy'd by the Government, but recommended him to the favour of the Houfe.

Which was accepted by the Houfe. And the Houfe confidering the Service he had done: C Refolved,

Resolved, That the Sum of Ten Pounds be Allowed and Paid out of the Publick Treasury to Mr. Thomas Tarboll the Petitioner for his Service mentioned in his Petition, being Voluntary. Sent up for Concurrence.

Mr. Cooke from the Committee appointed to Examine the Treasurers Accompts, made Report, &c.

The Committee having perused the Treasurers Accompts for the Year 1714 in which he chargeth himself with the Sum of Eighty-three Thousand Eight Hundred and One Pounds, Ten Shillings and Eleven Pence.

We find that he has Difcharged himfelf by Order of the Governour and Council, of the Sum of Fifty One Thoufand Three Hundred & Four pounds One Shilling & Nine pence; and that there is ftanding out, Seven Thoufand, Seven Hundred and Seventy Five pounds, Three Shillings and Eight pence, of the Taxes; Fourteen Thoufand Two Hundred & Nine pounds & Two pence, Neat Province Bills, for the Exchange of Bills. 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In Confideration that the Trade of this Province is greatly Obstructed, and sunk by the Exportation of the Coin, & for want of a Medium of Exchange : and the only Medium now passing in Trade, is the Bills of Publick Credit, which are so far drawn in already, That it is a Difficulty, next to an Impossibility for this Province to pay the Tax of Twenty-two Thousand Pounds, Granted to be raised this Year, within the same.

And Confidering, That no Damage will accrue to the Publick, or to Private Perfons, but Conveniency & Advantage to both, by Protracting the Payment of Part of the faid Tax to a further convenient time.

But Advife & Exhort you, to ufe all proper Methods agreeable to your Duty as a Chriftian, a Member of this Court, and an Officer in the Town, to promote and forward a compliance, with the Orders of this Court, for the Support of the Ministry in your Town, that there be no further Difputes, or Differences about the raifing the Maintenance of your Ministers, so plainly Directed in the Orders of this Court. And in that Expectation, we continue & entertain you a Member of this Honourable House.

Provided always, and it is to be understood that those perfons shall be subject to such regulations of this Court, as has been made for their Settling in a defensible manner.

Voted, That the faid Townships be freed from the Province Taxes, for the space of Five Years, from their first Setting down; and this Court do encourage the Ministry, as shall appear reasonable unto them. Provided, That the Proposers on their part, perform what they offer of Encouraging a Ministry, Minister & Schools, and Proceeding forthwith, to Grant such Tracts in Fee to such as will Settle there. And in order to the Covering these Settlements the Stone Fort near Pejepscot Falls be repaired, and that Fisteen Men, One of which to be a Serjeant, with a Commission Officer upon Ensignes Pay, be placed there for the Protection & Afsistance of the New Settlements, in the room of the Fort, or Trading House at Casco, which being much out of Repair, We are of Opinion, It is for His Majesty's Service, It be flighted and no longer continued. That his Excellency the Governour be desired to give his Orders accordingly, and also for the Inlisting Five Men, which with Ten Men taken from Casco makes the Complement for Brunswick.

And in answer to the Representation of Mr. Edward Hutchinson, They humbly offer that the other Twenty Men of the Complement, that is now at Casco be removed to Arrowssick Island for their Covering, for the space of Six Months, and no more, agreeable to the Grant of the General Court.

Voted, That Major John Wheelwright, Mr. Abraham Prebble, Mr. Jofeph Hammond, Charles Frost Efq; Mr. John Leighton, and any Three of them be a Committee, to Profecute the regular Settlements, of the Eastern Frontier, and that in answer to the Petition of the Proprietors of Cape Porpus, and Black Point to the Committee for Claims, the faid Committee be Directed to lay out the Town Plats, in a regular and defensible manner, at the charge of the Proprietors, and of fuch other Town as shall offer agreeable to the Order of the Court.

Voted, That the Memorial offered by the Reverend Mr. Samuel Emery, and Mr. Samuel Moodey, be referred to the faid Committee, to Report to this Court the State of Winter Harbour.

Voted, That agreeable to the Committee of Claims Report, relating to a Road to the Eaftern Settlements. We are of Opinion that it is neceffary that a Road be laid out in the most convenient Place, from Wells or Newitchawanock to Pejepfcot Falls, as shall be thought most convenient & practicable, and a Computation made of the charge, be laid before this Court; and that it be an Instruction to the faid Committee, to cause the same to be Surveyed, & to make their Report of the Place & charge. And that a Committee of both Houses be appointed to prepare the Draught of an Act, for fettling and quieting the Titles of the Lands that are to the Eastward of *Pifcataqua River*. Sent up for Concurrence.

Complaint being made to the House that Capt. Benjamin Stevens, One of the Members thereof, Representative of the Town of Andover, was within the time of the present Selfion, viz. Yesterday Arrested in a Civil Action, by Benjamin Coker, Under Sheriff of the County of Effex, by virtue of a Warrant granted by Joseph Woodbridge Esq; Justice of the Peace; which is an Indignity offered to this House, a manifest Breach of the Privilege thereof, & a Transgression of the Law of this Province.

Ordered, That Mr. Justice Woodbridge, and Mr. Under-Sheriff Coker, be Summoned by a Warrant from Mr. Speaker forthwith to appear before this House to answer for their so doing.

Ordered, That Mr. Seth Sweetfor of Charlestown, be impowered, & imployed as a Meffenger of this House to go and Serve the said Summons.

A Petition of Serjeant *Daniel Tucker*, prefented to the Houfe & Read, praying for confideration & Allowance to be Granted to him towards his Support, being under Cure of a Gun-fhot Wound he received in the Service against the Indian Enemy, in the late War.

The Proprietors of the Town of *Rutland* having Reprefented to this Houfe, that the Direction given by this Court at their laft Seffion, for the laying out the faid Township contiguous to the Town of *Lancaster* (which was then so Ordered to preferve a Regular Face to the Frontiers, and not leave a flip of Land between the faid Towns too small for a Township) will remove them in some measure from the Lands they had purchased of the Natives.

Ordered, That the faid Proprietors be Directed to Protract, and lay out their Grant of Land for a Township, named as above faid, agreeable to the Plat above Delineated, by a Surveyor and Chain-men under Oath (to be fo returned on the Plat) Referving & Laying out for this Province, One Thousand Acres of Land, in the Angle between *Worcester* and *Leicester*, in a figure as near a Square as they can, and lay the Plat fo taken before this Court for Confirmation.

Sent up for Concurrence.

The Bill Intituled, An AEt for the more Convenient & equal Raifing of Money for Defreying of the charges arifing in each respective County within this Province.

Read a 3d. time, and

Resolved,

Refolved, That the faid Bill do pass to be Engross'd.

Sent up for Concurrence. A Meffage from the Board, that Mr. Speaker and the Houfe now come up to the Council Chamber, to attend the Hearing appointed to be this day, upon the Petition of Jonathan Hastings, between him & Job Bull; which was forth-with done. And the Parties being fully heard, with-drew; and Mr. Speaker, and the Houfe Return'd to their own Chamber.

The Precept fent to Plymouth : Return'd Major John Bradford chosen their Representative: who appeared.

A Petition of Jeremiah Dummer and Thirty Others, Merchants, &c. to whom this Court Lent of the Publick Bills of Credit, in the Year 1711. to enable them, to Supply the British Troops, then defigning an Expedition against Canada, for which Supplies they received of the Governour & Admiral of the faid Expedition Bills of Exchange on the Lord High Treasurer of Great Britain; prefented to the House and Read: Shewing, That as yet no more than two thirds of the Bills of Exchange are paid, and that with great Difadvantage: Praying, That one third part of the faid Bills of Credit that are out-standing in their hands, may be Lent to them for One Year more.

Major John Bradford Returned Representative of the Town of Plymouth, was sent up to the Board to take the Oaths, &c.

This House having at diverse times for several Years past, Voted the Fort or Trading-House at *Casco Bay*, to be of little or no Service as a Barrier to our Frontiers, a Bridle to the Indian Enemy, or Security to the Fishery, and therefore of no Publick Benefit. And this House with the Honourable Board (as by their Votes of the 7th & 10th Instant) having offered to His Excellency as their Opinion, That it is for His Majesty's Service, That the Fort at *Casco Bay* be flighted, and no longer continued, and that a Stone Fort near *Pejepscot* Falls be Repaired instead thereof, as more conveniently Situated for Covering the New intended Settlements and keeping the Indians, from their Fishery in case of a Rupture. And His Excellency having fignified under his Hand, That he cannot at prefent fee Reason to Demolish the Fortification at *Casco*, until His Majesty's pleasure be known therein.

And forafmuch as the Charter Granted to the Inhabitants of this Province, by their late Majefty's King *William* and Queen *Mary* of Glorious Memory, Doth give full Power to the Governour, for the time being, at his pleafure to Demolifh Forts and Fortifications.

Voted, That no more Money be drawn out of the Publick Treasury, for the Subsisting and Paying any Officers, or Souldiers at the Fort at Casco, after the First Day of September next.

A Petition of Peter Roe, John Kent, James Younglove & Jacob Adams, jun. Select-G men men of the Town of Suffield, Shewing, That the Town are in great Confusion by reason of Differences about the choice of their Town Officers, as set forth in the Petition, praying Remedy from this Court. Sent down from the Board, pass'd upon there, viz. In Council June 11. 1715. Be relieved from fundry Encroachments made upon them by the Englifh; particularly, Mr. Mitchel. And have fome further Powers granted to them neceffary in their Township. Sent down from the Board, pass'd on there, viz. In Council June 18th 1715. Non-Concurr'd, Inafmuch as Matters of charge ought to Originate in this Houfe. And this Houfe have a Week fince, appointed a Committee to provide for His Excellency's Reception, when he fhall Arrive, who have already proceeded in the Affair. Sent up.

A Petition of Simeon Stoddard, and One Hundred and Eighty-Eight Others Inhabitants of the Town of Boston, &c. Prefented to the House and Read, praying this Court to provide a Medium of Exchange in Trade, for want whereof the Trade of this Province is almost ruin'd.

Ordered, That the Confideration of the faid Petition be referr'd to the next Seffion.

A Meffage from His Excellency, That if the House have anything of neceffity to be done, they should bring it forward presently, for His Excellency had Determin'd upon a short Prorogation.

The Bill Intituled, An Act for the more fafe keeping the Registry of Deeds, and Conveyances of Lands. Sent down from the Board Concurr'd with fome Amendments; which Amendments were Read, and agreed to by the House.

And the Bill fent up.

Resolved, That the Bill do pass to be Enacted.

Ordered, That Worcester Petition be referr'd to the next Seffion.

Mr. Speaker, and the Houfe went up to the Council Chamber, and His Excellency Prorogu'd the Court to *Wednefday* the 20th Day of July next, at Ten a Clock in the fore-noon.

The Reprefentatives returning to their own Chamber, and taking into Confideration His Excellency's Speech, directed to the Court, before he Declared the Prorogation : — Importing, That it was almost a Month fince the beginning of the Selfions, and that they had done little or nothing for the good of the Province, and that the Houfes were distempered, and therefore he should Raife them by a short Prorogation, hoping they would come together in a better Temper : — Did therefore Unanimously Agree and Conclude to Print their Journal of the prefent Selfions, and Defired the Reprefentatives of Boston to take care that the fame might be Seasonably done; and the Clerk to prepare a Copy accordingly.

JOURNAL Of the Houfe of Reprefentatives.

At a Great and General Court or Affembly of His Majefty's Province of the Maffachufetts-Bay in **Dem=England**, begun & held at **Boffon**, upon Wednefday the 25th Day of **May**, **Anno Domini**, 1715. And continued by Prorogation to Wednefday the 20th Day of July next after, and then Met.

R. Speaker, fent up a Meffage to the Board, by Mr. John Sterns, That a Quorum of the Houfe are met, and ready to proceed upon the business of the Session.

A Meffage from His Excellency by *Thomas Hutchinfon* Efq; That Mr. Speaker and the whole Houfe forthwith attend him in the Council Chamber. Mr. Speaker and the Houfe went up accordingly, and His Excellency made a Speech to the Court, whereof Mr. Speaker obtain'd a Copy, and with the Houfe return'd to their own Chamber.

His Excellency's Speech, Read, and is as follows, viz.

GENTLEMEN

At the Last Sessions of this Assembly I earnestly recommended to you the Raising of 220001. Granted & Determined by two former Assemblies of the Province, for the Drawing in of that Sum of the Province Bills, Raifed & Emitted for the Support of the late War, and Troubles with the Indians; which faid Acts of Affembly were Paffed; by the Reprefentatives, and the Council of the Province, and Prefented to the Governour to be Sign'd, & Pass'd by the Seal in due manner and accordingly in that Form, were sent home, and are there of Record, and Accepted by the Right Honourable the Lords of the Council of Trade & Plantations, as I was commanded by the Instructions for the Government, of which every body Concerned, being apprized, I made no doubt you would without any Delay have Proceeded to Apportion, and Levy it as those AEts Direct; as vlso the Impost & Excise, which is thereby in like manner Determined, to be Raised in Aid, of the said Taxes severally; You are all fensible how well & thriftily, as well as fuccessfully those Sums were Disburfed, and applyed to Defray the necessary Expenses of the War, and with what Honour your Bills Paffed for the Support of those heavy Charges, without any Disparagement: And its as eafy to fee how the Credit of those Bills, must needs fink & fail, if the present or any future Affembly, shall upon any Pretence whatfoever, break in upon those Clauses in the faid AEts, for the time of Payment, which I am willing to give my Opinion, We have no Power to do. Nor if we had, any reason at present to Project it, for that we are in Peace, and very capable to Discharge our Debts, in such Proportion as they are Determin'd, and fince we have neither Power, nor need to delay the Payment, I am of Opinion we shall Difparage the Publick Faith of the Province, to that Degree that our Bills will fail in their Value, to the very great Injury of every Body that have taken them, or are in Poffession of them; and in this we are justified by His Majesty's Most Gracious Speech from the Throne, " That nothing can Contribute more to the Support of the Credit of the Nation, than a firit " Observance of Parliamentary Engagements.

I therefore earnefly Recommend the Confideration of the Tax, Impost and Excise to your present Resolves, and hope you will make no Delay but pass through them, in two or three Dayes, not admitting of any other business this Session.

You will also Remember, That the Treasurers Support in his Office, is not provided for, and others in Office at Home or Foreign depending on your Justice, and respect to them in such manner, as has been usual; which being done, I shall not further Delay your own Busines, which Demand your being at home.

I shall Account my self happy to see these Affairs well agree'd, and there shall be nothing wanting on my Part for His Majesty's Service, the Honour of the Government, and the benefit of all His Majesties good Subjects concern'd herein.

Cyprian Southack, Commiffioners appointed to Treat with the faid Indians, and know the reasons of their Infulting the Fishery, and Taking the Veffels, and Demand their Reftoration; and to Conciliate and Establish Friendship with the faid Indians. Read.

Post Meridiem.

A Petition of Archibald Stobo, a Minister of the Gospel, lately arriv'd from Carolina, Driven from his Habitation there by the Hostility of the Indians, presented to the House & Read, praying that the Duty upon Eleven Negro Women and Children by him Imported, may be abated.

A Meffage from the Board by Andrew Belcher Efq; That Capt. Southack being fick, Col. Higginson & Col. Goffe are appointed Commissioners to go and Treat with the Cape Sables Indians. And His Excellency & Council defire the Clerk of this House may be fpared to go with them, and affist in that Service, being acquainted with the Treaties that have been with the Indians.

A Meffage fent up to the Board by Mr. *William Paine*, That the Houfe (as his Excellency in his Speech to the Court Directs) are defirous to Difpatch the bufinefs of the Seffion as fpeedily as poffible, & therefore can by no means fpare their Clerk.

His Excellency's Speech Read again, and that Paragraph thereof which relates to the Levying of 22000l. this Year, long debated, and a Refolution formed.

In Confideration that the Trade of this Province, is greatly Obstructed, & funk by the Exportation of the Coin, and for want of a Medium of Exchange, &c. the only Medium now

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now paffing in Trade, is the Bills of Publick Credit, which are fo far drawn in already, that by reafon thereof the Inhabitants of this Province, will labour under great Difficulty to pay the Tax of Twenty two Thoufand Pounds, granted to be raifed this Year within the fame. And Confidering, That no Damage will accrue to the Publick, or to private Persons, the Poffeffors of the Bills: (this Court having abundantly fecured the Credit of the Bills by making them a legal Tender) but Conveniency, and Advantage to both by Protracting the Payment, of part of the faid Tax to a further Convenient time.

Voted, That Eleven Thoufand Pounds only of the faid Sum, be Levied and Collected this prefent Year, and that the Impost and Excise be a Fund & Security for drawing in the Sum of Four Thousand Pounds more thereof.

And that the remaining Sum of Seven Thousand Pounds be Levied at the Session of this Court in *May*, 1722, and paid into the Treasury by the last Day of *December* next after. Sent up for Concurrence.

Whereas

Whereas the Subjects of the French King are vigoroufly carrying on a very confiderable Settlement at Cape Breton, which must necessarily demand large Supplies, of Provisions, Timber, Plank Boards, Nails, &c. for the well effecting thereof. And inafmuch as there are just Grounds to believe that fome evil Minded Perfons, in this as well as in the Province of New-Hampshire, in manifest contempt of the Fifth & Sixth Articles of a Treaty for a Neutrality, in America, between England and France, made at Whitehall the 6th of November, 1686. wherein it is Inferted, in the Fifth Article of the aforefaid Treaty, "That if any Ship or Veffel shall be found "Trading or Fishing, contrary to the Tenour of the aforefaid Treaty, the faid Ship " or Vessel with its Loading, proof being made thereof, shall be Confiscated. Which Articles were lately fent from the Secretary of State to this Government, for their Observation thereof, and Printed & Published here. As alfo a Proclamation against a Commerce & Trade, with the French of Canada, Cape Breton, &c. Isfued forth by Order of the Governour, with the Advice of the Council the 3d Day of January last past, and one other of the fame Import, on the 29th Day of March last past, for the Lucre of gain have from time to time furnished the French at Cape Breton, with Live Cattel, Pork, Corn, Lumber, and other things, without which the aforefaid Settlement would have been very much Retarded, if not wholly Defeated.

Wherefore Refolved, That a Meffage be fent up to His Excellency the Governour to defire that he would be pleafed to Order Capt. Cayley in His Majefty's Ship Rofe after he has accomplifhed his intended Cruife to the Eastward, forthwith to proceed to Cape Breton, and there to Cruife as long as the Seafon will allow; to prevent the aforefaid clandeftine Trade, which will be of great Service & Honour to the Crown: But if not timely done, may prove very injurious to this Province, with refpect to the Fishery, which at all times deferves a very great Regard. And that the Commissioner be Inftructed to proceed to Cape Breton, and acquaint the Chief Officer there of the Infults & Captions, made by the Indians & French amongst the Fishery, on the Coast of Nova Scotia, which the Indians do affirm was by the Inftigation of the French at Cape Breton, from whom they have received great Prefents; which is a manifest Breach of the Peace concluded between Her late Majesty, and the Most Christian King; and that this Government accordingly represent the fame to His Majesty.

The Petition of Samuel Sewall Efq; país'd upon in this Houfe the laft Seffion. Brought down from the Board, not having been país'd upon there. Read again, and the Vote of this Houfe thereon, and

Ordered, That the faid Vote be Revived, and fent up for Concurrence.

A Plat of Seven Hundred Acres of Land, laid out by John Gardner, Surveyor, and the Chain-men under Oath, for John & Nathanael Higginson, pursuant to the Order of this Court at their last Session. Prefented to the House for Confirmation.

Ordered, That the Land laid out and protracted in the faid Plat be confirmed as the Seven Hundred Acres formerly Granted to the late Reverend Mr. John Higginson: provided it Intrench not upon any former grant. Sent up for Concurrence.

And then the Houfe Adjourn'd till to Morrow Morning Nine a Clock.

Loan received into the Treasury, the remaining 118371. 14s. 3d. thereof being fuch as were Exchang'd.

Ordered, That the Treasurer be Discharged of the faid Bills, which the Committee Report on the other fide they have feen burnt to afhes. Sent up for Concurrence.

A Report of the Committee last mentioned, Dated March 24. 1714 Read. Shewing, That they then had counted & burnt of Bills received

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Ordered, That the Treasurer be Discharged of the Bills, which the Committee report on the other fide they have feen burnt to afhes. It being agreeable to the Treasurers General Accompts, pass'd by this Court at their Seffion in May last, fo far as relates to them. Sent up for Concurrence.

A further Report of the Committee last mentioned, Dated May 19. 1715. Read. Shewing, That they had then counted & burnt, 79531. 5s. 7d. of the faid Bills of Publick Credit, that were receiv'd in Exchange as not fit to pass any longer.

Ordered, That the Treasurer be Discharged of the Bills which the Committee report on the other fide, they have feen burnt to afhes. Sent up for Concurrence.

A Petition of Peter Roe, James Younglove, John Burbank & Jacob Adams jun. Selectmen of the Town of Suffield, prefented to the House & Read, Shewing, That purfuant to the Order of this Court at their last Session, the faid Town had a Meeting and chose Town Officers, but that John Austan, Clerk of the faid Town the last Year, detain's and refuses to Deliver the Town Book to the Town Clerk chosen for this Year, which creates confusion in the affairs of the Town. Praying Remedy.

Refolved, That John Austan the late Town Clerk of Suffield, be preremptorily required to deliver the Town Books & Records to Joseph Winchel, the perfon laft chofen and Sworn to be Clerk of the faid Town, upon the Penalty of paying Ten Pounds per Week, for the use of the County of Hampshire, for every Week he continues to detain them, after the faid Winchel makes demand thereof.

Sent up for Concurrence.

The Vote of this House pass'd the 20th Currant for a Tax of 11000l. only to be raifed this Year. Sent down from the Board, pass'd on there, viz. In Council July 21. 1715. Read and Non-concurr'd.

Ordered, That the faid Vote be Infifted on, and fent up.

A Petition of Zechariah Tuthill Lieut. & Master Gunner, of His Majesty's Castle William, prefented to the Houfe & Read, praying, That Arrears of Wages due to him may be paid; as fet forth in the Petition. Ordered, That the faid Petition be referr'd to the next Seffion for further

Confideration.

A Petition of Mary Haddrell, and Magdalene Beauchamp, lately arrived from Carolina, being driven from their Livings there by the Incursions of the Indians, prefented to the Houfe & Read, praying, That the Duty on Eight Negro Slaves belonging to them here Imported, may be abated.

Resolved, That the prayer of the Petition be granted. Sent up for Concurrence. A Meffage from the Board by John Higginson, Andrew Belcher, John Cushing, and Addington Davenport Efqrs; Moving, That in the Bill for the Erecting & Maintaining a Light-house, &c. the Vessels belonging to the Province of New-Hampshire, may be inferted among those that are to be accounted Coasters.

The Queftion being put, Whether the House agree to the faid Amendment?

It pass'd in the Negative.

A Meffage was fent up to the Board to acquaint them with the faid Vote.

A Petition of James Minot, and Sixty feven others, prefented to the Houfe and Read, praying, That a Tract of Land of Eight Miles fquare, lying on the Wefterly and Northerly fides of *Brookfield*, may be granted to them and made a Township, and that they may have leave to purchase the Indian Title thereof.

Ordered, That the faid Petition be referr'd to the next Seffion, for further confideration.

Post Meridiem.

Whereas this Court have ordered the Calling in & Exchanging of feveral of the Denominations of the Bills of Publick Credit on this Province; and many of the Bills that are paid into the Treasury are Torn & Defac'd which can be of no use, but some hazard to lodge long in the Treasury.

Ordered, That the Reprefentatives of the Town of Bofton, Capt. An Engrofs'd Bill, Intituled, An Act Granting to His Majesty an Excise upon Wines, Liquors, & other Strong Drink, Sold by Retail. Read and

Resolved, That the Bill do pass to be Enacted.

A Plat of One thousand Acres of Land lying ten Miles, South-westward of *Wachusett-Hill*, laid out several Years since by *John Haynes*, Surveyor, pursuant to a Grant made *Anno* 1681. to the Six Youngest Children of Major *Simon Willard*, and now renewed by *John Haynes*, Surveyor, Son of the faid *John Haynes*; prefented to the House by *Samuel Sewall* Esq; for confirmation. And the following Vote pass'd thereon: *viz*.

Ordered, That the faid Accompt be Referr'd to the next Session, for further confideration.

Ordered, That fuch Petitions as were the last Session referr'd to this, and have not now been confidered, be referr'd to the next Session. The The Vote of this Houfe pafs'd this Day for a Wooden Fort to be built at Brunfwick; Sent down again from the Board with a Meffage, That they are of Opinion, fince there is a Stone Fort there that may be repaired, It is better to be proceeded in than that a New one fhould be built with Wood, and therefore the Board had not Concurr'd with the faid Vote.

A Memorial of Andrew Belcher Efq; at the defire and in behalf of Samuel Pa[r]tridge Efq; Moving, That liberty may be granted to those that had Boxed Pine Trees to draw Turpentine in the County of Hamp/hire, before the Act pass'd the last Seffion did prohibit it, may be allowed to draw the Turpentine from them this Summer, paying fuch acknowledgment as this Court shall see meet to Order, brought down from the Board, having been there Read, and Recommended. Read.

A Meffage from the Board by Andrew Belcher, Ifaac Winflow, & John Pynchon Efqrs; That His Excellency & Council, have found no proper Perfon, befides Col. Defiring the Advice of the Houfe in the affair. And left two Affidavits of fuch Perfons as have lately been in the hands of the faid Indians, which were Read:

And a Petition of Jotham Odiorn in behalf of himfelf, and William Pepperell Efq; of Kittery, Shewing, That the Indians at Cape Sables have taken two Fifhing Sloops and a Shallop belonging to the faid Pepperell, and two Fifhing Sloops of the faid Odiorn's: praying, That they may have liberty to fend and Ranfom their Veffels, and bring home Eleven Men now in the hands of the faid Indians: And that a fuitable Number of Men may be allowed to go with them, for that end in fuch Veffel as this Court fhall Order. Read and

Ordered, That the Petition be Rejected; the Petitioner Odiorn being an Inhabitant of the Province of New-Hampfhire; it is proper for him to apply there.

Ordered, That a Meffage be fent up to His Excellency the Governour, earneftly moving, That the Requeft of this Houfe of the 21ft. currant agreed to by the Council, for the Guard-fhip to proceed to *Cape Breton*, &c. when fhe had finished her Intended Cruife, may be answered.

That if it be Sufpected, That any of the English have Injured, or Defrauded any of the Indians, that it may be inquired into and Justice done to the Indians, That no proper means may be neglected to prevent the great Calamity of a War returning upon us.

That His Excellency will please to give Instruction to the Captain of the Man of War, to Represent to the Commander in Chief at Cape Breton, That the French are

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Fishing to the Westward of the Gut of Canfo, which is contrary to the late Treaty of Peace.

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A Meffage from the Board, That His Excellency did agree to the Meffage laft fent to him from the Houfe.

A Meffage from the Board by John Clark, Thomas Fitch, and Edmund Quinfey Efqrs; That the Man of War is delay'd Sailing on her Cruife Eaftward by nothing but the wanting of another Commiffioner, in which they fhould be glad of the advice of this Houfe.

A Meffage fent up to the Board by Capt. Noyes & Col. Thaxter, That the House is of Opinion, That Mr. John Nelson is a Person very proper for that Service.

Who Return'd, That Mr. Nelfon could not be obtain'd for that Service.

A Meffage from the Board by Addington Davenport and John Pynchon Efqrs; Defiring, Mr. William Paine a Member of this Houfe, to undertake the Service of a Commissioner, to Treat with the Cape Sables Indians; and that the House would confent to his proceeding therein.

But Mr. Paine acquainted the House, That he could by no means attend that Service.

Council Chamber in Boston, July 26. 1715.

GENTLEMEN,

The News from Cape Sables increasing upon us, that the Indians have proceeded in their Hostilities, so far as to make themselves Masters of about Twenty-seven of our Fishing Vessels, and Men belonging, of whom they have Murdered Eight, and wounded Others.

I am of Opinion, That the Frigot proceed immediately to Annapolis Royall, and Acquaint the Government there, of our prefent Posture, and their Danger, and obtain their advice of any Method, to be used to Recover our Vessels, and Prisoners out of the Indian hands; and from thence to proceed to Cape Sables, to advise our Fishing Vessels there of their Danger: And that there be taken up forth-with two good Sloops with Thirty Men each, to Defend and Secure our remaining Fishery, upon the Coast of Cape Sables, and Parts Adjacent, and to hold his Cruise there for Twenty Dayes; and then give us Notice for our further Proceedure; and that the Frigot Sail forth-with, with Col. Goffe on Board, no other fit Person to be joyned with him in this Negotiation appearing.

País'd upon in Council, viz. July 26th. 1715. Read and Accepted, and defired that it be forth-with proceeded upon. Sent down for Concurrence.

A Petition of John Austan, late Town Clerk of Suffield, prefented to the House and Read, praying this Court to Order the Proprietors of the faid Town, to have a Meeting; and that the Justices of the General Sessions of the Peace in the County of Hampshire, may Hear and Determine their Differences relating to Grants of Lands in the faid Town.

Ordered, That the Inhabitants of the Town of Suffield, be advifed & directed to Compromife, and Iffue their Differences in the Affairs afore-mentioned, among themfelves as fpeedily as may be. But if they fhall not be fo wife as to do it, in the fpace of three Months next coming, & fignifie it to the Honourable Samuel Partridge Efq; That then the Juftices of the General Seffions of the Peace in the County of Hampfhire, Hold a Special Seffion at the faid Town, Hear both Parties & Determine and Settle their Differences, whofe Determination fhall be a final Iffue, and be fo entred in their Town Book.

The charge of the Seffion to be born by the faid Town.

And the Town Clerk is directed to Enter no Record of the Lands in controverfy, before before the Seffion order'd of the Juffices, unless the Town come into a good and amicable agreement therein. Sent up for Concurrence. With a Meffage that the House have no business before them and defire to Rife.

A Meffage from the Board by John Clark, Thomas Hutchinfon, and Edmund Quinfey Efqrs; That feveral Allowances which are wont to be made Annually at the May Seffion, are not yet done; as the Allowance to the Judges, Treasurer, &c. Moving the House now to Grant the same. And intimated that the Treasurer is not willing to be Sworn for the Service of the Year currant, until his Allowance for the last Year's Service is Granted.

The Queftion being put, Whether the Houfe will proceed to make Allowances at this time, inafmuch as the Tax to be Levied this Year is not agreed on?

WE the Subscribers Proprietors of the Lands in Brunswick, Topsham, &c. being Defrous to make fuch a Settlement, as may be able to fuscin a War with the Indians, Do acknowledge the Favour of the General Court, in their readiness to Encourage and Protect the intended Settlements, and particularly in the Repair of the Fort there; yet perceiving the House inclinable to a Wooden Fort, on account of the cheapness of it; We being sensible that as this Fort is set, so as to be a Bridle to the Indians: So if a War should arise, it may be Expected, they will leave no means untryed, to become Masters of it, towards which the Remoteness from Succour will give them great advantage, and considering how much the Lives & Estates there will depend upon the Strength & Security of that Fort; We have been Induced to make the following Proposal.

That whereas the Wooden Fort at Winter Harbour coft, as we are informed 4001. Pounds, when Provisions, & Labour were much cheaper, than at this time, We can't suppofe such an one now would cost much less than 5001. Pounds; and a Stone Fort supposed to be much more Chargeable: Yet rather than the said Fort should be of Wood, and so liable to be Confumed by Fire, in case it should be Affaulted by French as well as Indians.

We Offer, That if the General Court will pleafe to Allow Five Hundred Pounds, and let us now have the Fifteen Men, which are Defigned for that Garrison, we will enter into Engagements to Repair & Finish the aforefaid Stone Fort: To be 50 Foot square, as proposed, with Four Bastions, Two of which of Wood on the Top of the Angle; at our own Charge, although it should amount to more than that Sum. And we shall set about it in a Weeks time if possible, and hope to finish it before Winter, if not Obstructed by the Indians. We desire to have Three Hundred Pounds of the said Sum as occasion shall require, to provide Materials, &c. and the remainder when the work is finished.

Bofton, July 28th. 1715. Memorandum, Thomas Hutchinfon. Adam Winthrop Oliver Noyes. In behalf of themfelves and partners.

It is agreed that the Foundation of the faid Fort shall be Three Foot under ground, That the Wall shall be Three Foot Thick at Bottom, and at least Ten Foot High above the

Ground; and laid in Lime Mortar, with Barracks for Fifteen Men; to be built on or near the Spot where the Fort now stands.

Voted, That the faid Propofals be accepted, and the Sums be paid out of the Treafury as propofed. Sent up for Concurrence.

A Meffage from His Excellency by Edmund Quincey Efq; That Mr. Speaker and the House forthwith attend him in the Council Chamber.

Mr. Speaker and the Houfe accordingly went up to the Council Chamber, and His Excellency made a Speech to the Court, whereof Mr. Speaker obtain'd a Copy, and with the Houfe return'd to their own Chamber.

It being Reprefented, That there is no Inn-holder in the Town of *Tiverton*, and that there is frequent Occasion for an Inn there, for the Entertainment of Travellers, &c.

Ordered, That the Petitioner Serve the Select-men of *Tiverton*, with a Copy of this Petition, that they may fhew reafon to the Juffices of the General Seffions of the Peace in the County of *Briftol*, at their next Seffion, if any they have, why the prayer thereof fhould not be Granted. And if they do not lay before them fufficient reafon why it fhould not be granted: That then the faid Juffices be and hereby are Impowred to Grant a Licence as prayed for, without the Approbation of the faid Select-men, If it appears to them that the Petitioner is a meet Perfon to be Licenfed.

Sent up for Concurrence.

The Vote last entred sent down again, Pass'd upon in Council, viz. Read and Concurr'd with the addition of any Law, Usage or Custom to the contrary notwithstanding. Sent down for Concurrence. Read and Concurr'd. And sent up.

A Plat of the Original Grant of the Township of Swampfield, and a Tract of Land adjoyned thereto Platted out therewith, which the Proprietors Defire may be added to the faid Township; The Surveyor Thomas Hastings, and the Chain-men being under Oath; prefented to the House for Allowance and Approbation. And the Question being put, Whether the said Trast of Land prayed for, being more than Eighteen Thousand Acres, be added to the said Township? It pass'd in the Negative.

Ordered, That the Plat of the Original Grant of the faid Town, being Nine Miles long and Four Miles Wide, be Allowed and Confirmed to the lawful Proprietors; Provided it interfere with no former Grants. Sent up for Concurrence.

A Meffage from the Board by *John Clark* and *Thomas Fitch* Efqs; That they have no bufinefs before them, and if there is any to come from this Houfe, they defire to have it quickly, for His Excellency is defirous foon to difmifs the Court.

The Committee appointed, brought in a Draught of a Vote, in answer to the last Vote of the Board on the Resolve for supply of the Treasury, which was Read and Pass'd by the House. *viz*.

This Houfe having for fundry Years paft reprefented, the Fort or Trading House at Casco Bay to be of no Service to His Majesty, either as a Barrier to our Frontiers, or Security to our Fifhery, and particularly on the Seventh & Tenth Dayes of their Seffions in June last, in Concurrence with the Honourable Board, did offer to His Excellency as their Opinion, That it was for His Majefties Service, that the faid Fort of Cafco Bay, be flighted, and no longer continued, and that a Stone Fort near Pejepfcot Falls, be repaired in flead thereof, as more convenient to cover the new intended Settlements of Brunfwick, Topfham, &c. and to keep the Indians from their Fishery in case of another Rupture; and did further Vote, That no more Money be drawn out of the Publick Treasury, for the fubfisting and paying any Officers or Souldiers, at the Fort of Cafco after the First Day of September next; and Ordered a Copy of the Vote to be fent to Mr. Treasurer, for his future Direction, to which the Council did concur; and having on the Twenty eighth Day of July, Ordered the Sum of Five Hundred Pounds to be Iffued out of the Treafury for repairing the faid Fort at Pejepscot Falls (which Fort was built by Sir Edmund Androfs as the best bridle to the Eastern Indians) And did Grant the Number of Fifteen Men as a Garrifon for the faid Fort, who are now the greatest part on the Place, to fecure the Work-men in repairing and finishing the fame, to receive the ftores from Casco, where they may be in greater Danger by the ruinous State of the Fort, than they will be at Pejepscot by the First of October; And the House thereon Refolved, That no more Money should be raifed, for the Subsistence of the faid Fort at Casco after the First Day of October next, and Asserted it, as their undoubted Right to Appropriate their Grants; which Refolve has been revived this Seffion; and as it is no Infringement on His Majefty's Honour or Service, but agreeable to the Charter, and a 'great Eafe to His Majesty's Subjects. Therefore Refolved, That the Houfe do adhere to their former Vote; and they think themfelves bound in Duty to His Majesty and the People they Represent, so to do. Sent up.

Ordered, That the feveral Petitions referr'd to this Seffion, be continued, and referr'd to the next Fall Seffion.

Post Meridiem.

Ordered, That Col. Winthrop, and Mr. William Paine, be defired to Confult with the Treasurer what are the feveral Articles of the ordinary Charge of the Province annually, and make Report to this House at their next Session.

A Meffage fent up to the Board by Mr. Newman, and Mr. Partridge, That there is no bufinefs lying before the Houfe, and if there be any to come from the Council they defire to receive it.

And then the Houfe Adjourn'd till to Morrow Morning Nine a Clock.

Sent down for concurrence. Read and Concurr'd.

Ordered, That a Meffage be sent up to the Board, Defiring that the Stores may be remov'd from Cafco to Pejepscot Fort, as soon as the latter shall be ready to receive them, which is hop'd will be sooner than the First of November: Which was carried up by Capt. Noyes, Mr. William Paine, and Mr. Epps, who return'd, That His Excellency faid, He would do all that he had faid concerning it.

A Motion being made that the Houfe will now have the Confideration of making an Allowance to Mr. Agent Dummer, for his Service. After fome Debate.

The Question being put, It pass'd in the Negative.

Ordered, That the Confideration of that Affair be Referred to the next Seffion.

A Meffage to His Excellency the Governour by Col. Winthrop and Capt. Noyes, That the Houfe defire to be Inform'd, Whether his Excellency has Confented to the Refolve for fupplying the Treafury, with the Amendments made to it; being willing to Proceed to Grant the ufual Allowances, if the Treafury is enabled to pay them. Who return'd anfwer, That His Excellency faid, He fhould under-write it, before he went out of the Court.

A Meffage from the Board by John Clark and Thomas Fitch Efqrs; That the Houfe would make Allowance for Mr. Secretary Addington's Service, the time he liv'd after his laft Allowance was made.

And to Mr. Joseph Hiller for the time he has Serv'd as Clerk of the Council.

A Meffage to the Board by Capt. Fullam and Mr. Knolton, That the Houfe is ready to Grant the usual Allowances, as foon as they are Certified that His Excellency has Sign'd the Refolve for Supplying the Treasury.

Who Return'd anfwer, That His Excellency faid, He fhould not Sign it this Day, It not being cuftomary for him to Sign the Votes of the Court before they were entred Fair in a Book: But that He would Sign it before any Money was drawn out of the Treafury.

A Meffage to the Board by Mr. *William Paine*, Capt. Noyes, and Col. Thaxter, That the Houfe think it neceffary, That all Acts and Votes of the Court fhould be Sign'd, and Perfected before the Seffion is ended. And that the Return of a Meffage from His Excellency this Day Inform'd the Houfe, That His Excellency was pleaf'd to fay, He would under-write the Vote for fupply of the Treafury before he went out of the Court.

Who Return'd That His Excellency faid, It had hitherto been his Cuftom to Sign the Votes of the Court after they are entred Fair in a Book, and not in the Original Draught: And that he is not willing to alter it now.

Sent up for Concurrence.

Refolved, That the Sum of Twenty Pounds, be Allowed and Paid out of the Publick Treafury to Mr. John White Clerk of this Houfe, in Part for his Service the Year Currant. Sent up for Concurrence.

Refolved, That the Sum of Twenty Pounds, be Allowed and Paid out of the Publick Treafury to Mr. Joseph Hiller, for his Service as Clerk of the Honourable Council, for half a Year, beginning the 13th Day of March laft.

Sent up for Concurrence.

Refolved, That the Sum of Forty Pounds, be Allowed and Paid out of the Publick Treafury to Mr. John Flagg, Door-keeper to His Excellency the Governour and Council, and this Court, for his Service the Year paft, ending the 26th Day of June laft. Sent up for Concurrence.

A Meffage from the Board by *Eliakim Hutchinfon*, Andrew Belcher, and Addington Davenport Efqrs; Moving the Houfe to Grant an Allowance to Mr. Agent Dummer at this time, It being more than a Year fince any Allowance had been Granted to him.

A Meffage fent up to the Board by Capt. *Chambers*, and Capt. *Fullam*, That the Houfe have already Voted to Refer the Confideration of Making an Allowance to Mr. Agent *Dummer*, to the next Seffion. And defire if the bufinefs of the Seffion be finished that the Court may Rife.

Who Return'd, That His Excellency defired the House now to Confider Mr. Dummer's Service, as they use to do.

A Meffage from His Excellency the Governour by *Edmund Quincey* Efq; That Mr. Speaker and the Houfe do now Attend Him in the Council Chamber.

Which they did accordingly, and His Excellency Prorogu'd the Court, to Wednefday the 28th Day of September next, at Ten a Clock in the Forenoon.



The great and infupportable Difficulty we now labour under with refpect to our Trade, deferves your confideration this Seffion, and I hope you will find out fome way for the Support and Increase of it.

In your former Seffions you were pleaf'd to give directions for the Reception of your Governour then Expected. In his Letter to the Council he has affur'd them that he has nothing fo much at heart as the Welfare and Intereft of this Province; You have in return the beft Opportunity now of fhowing your good Inclinations to him by timely providing a Suitable Houfe for him, which he has Signified to me would be very Acceptable to him, and which you may Expect he may requite in his readinefs to Serve you on all Occafions.

His Majesty has been pleased likewise to Appoint Mr. *Woodward* Secretary of this Province, which with the Character of his Excellency Col. *BURGES* has been pleased to give me of him, as likewise my Personal Knowledge of him fince his Arrival, makes me with the greater freedom Recommend him to you for your due Encouragement.

You cannot Oblige me more than by giving me an Opportunity to Serve my Country, therefore what neceffary Laws for the Good of the Province you may fee caufe either to Revive, or Enact, You may be fully affur'd of my ready Concurrence to them, while I have the Honour to Serve to my prefent Station: Thefe and all other Matters referred to this prefent Seffion, will, I hope by your Application, and Unanimity be fo difpatch'd, as will in a fhort time bring it to a happy Conclusion.

A Meffage from the Represent' by Cpt. Oliver Noyes & M! Elistha Cook requesting that an account of Colonel Edmund Goffes Proceedings at Annapolis-Royal may be laid before them.

The following Order pass'd in the House of Represent' Read & Concur'd.

Upon Reading the Petition of John Nelson of Boston in the County of Suffolk, fetting forth that John Cotta Jun^r & Sarah his Wife, Bethia, Martha & Dorothy Wharton, Spinsters, all of Boston aforefaid at the Inferior Court of Common Pleas for the faid County of Suffolk held at Boston on the first Tuesday of July 1714, Commenced an Action or Plea of the Case against your Petitioners, setting forth that whereas they the faid Cotta & by a Letter of Attorney impowered your Petitioner to fell fell & dispose of an Estate in Land to them belonging in the Colony of Rhoad-Island to their best Profit & Advantage & to render a true Account of the Proceedings therein to the faid Cotta &: And they in fact faid that your Petitioner by Virtue of the faid Letter of Attorney had fold & difpofed of the faid Lands for near Three Thousand Pounds, as it was faid, nevertheless the faid Petitioner tho' often thereto requested by the faid Cotta &^c utterly neglected & refused to render a just & true Account thereof, & to pay what of right belong'd to them out of the Proceeds of the s^d Lands to their Damage One Thoufand Pounds, And your Petitioner gave Bond to appear at & abide the Judgment of faid Court, wh Action was continued to October Court then next following, But by Reafon of the Demife of the late Queen, When it was fuppof'd all Actions at that Court would fall, yet they were continued to the first Tuesday of November. When by Reason that your Petitioner lived upon an Island, & the then Extremity of the Weather, he could not appear, but made default, and Judgment was render'd against your Petitioner to render an Accompt within one month afterwards, or pay the Sum of Five hundred Pounds, & Cofts of Suit, And your Petitioner sheweth that being altogether unacquainted with the Judgment aforefaid, Did not Render an Accompt, Pursuant thereunto, Whereupon Execution was taken out against him for the Five hundred Pounds & Costs; And as foon as your Petitioner had Knowledge thereof, He prefented an Accompt to the s^d Cotta &^c, Whereby it plainly, truly & honeftly appears, That there is not one Penny due to the faid Cotta &: And tho' your Petitioner has fundry times offer'd to fubmit his Accompt to any impartial Men, & give fecurity to pay what they fhall find due to them, yet they are fo unreasonable that they will not accept thereof, But take Advantage of your Petitioners Latches, and will not be fatisfied with any thing lefs than the faid Five hundred Pounds & Cofts, And Profecute your Petitioner with their Execution, That he cannot go about his lawfull Occasions. Now for afmuch as your Petitioner can have no Remedy at Law, to be reliev'd in the Premiffes without a new Tryal, By Reafon of his not appearing & Pleading to the faid Action, Your Petitioner therefore humbly Prays, That a new Tryal may be granted, & that he will be ready to pay to the faid Cotta & whatever shall be found due on a full & fair Hearing, and that in the mean time Execution against him may be fuspended &?

Ordered, That the Petitioner ferve John Cotta Jun! Bethia, Martha & Dorothy Wharton with a Copy of this Petition, That they may fhew Reafon, if any they have, why the Prayer thereof fhould not be granted, on Tuesday next at Ten o Clock Forenoon. And that in the meantime the ferving of the Execution be suspended.

C^{Olo. Thaxter} brought up M! Agent Dummer's Letters &^c directed to John Burrel Efq^r Speaker which he receiv'd in the Recefs of the Court: And were all feverally Read at the Board.

The following Order pass'd in the House of Representves, Read & Concur'd, viz!

Upon reading the Petition of John Legg Efq^t, Cap' Edward Brattle, Richard Skinner, Richard Trevot, Eleazer Ingols, John Stacey, John Hofman, John Palmer & Jeremiah Getchel, a Committee for Marblehead in behalf of themfelf & thole whom they reprefent, fetting forth that the faid Town of Marblehead being of late years by the good Providence of God greatly increaf'd, Infomuch that the Inhabitants cannot poffibly with any Conveniency affemble together in one Place or House for the Publick Worfhip of God, and a fecond or new Meeting House hath for fome time been tho't convenient & neceffary, Whereupon the Petitioners & their Affociates (being mov'd as they truft by a good Principle, & not in the least from any Difaffection to the Rev. Paftour & Church of Chrift with whom they have hitherto affembled) on the fifth day of February laft folemnly agreed upon feveral Articles referring to the building

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building a new Meeting Houfe in the faid Town of Marblehead for the Publick Worship of God, the Advancement of Religion, & the Ease & Comfort of themselves & Families, & all fuch as shall fucceed them with a particular regard to the Rev^d M^r Edward Holyoke for their intended Minister, As may be seen by a Copy of the Articles of Agreement, Of all which the faid Town of Marblehead were very well acquainted, and fo far fatisfied in, as on the fourteenth Day of March last past to come to the following Refolutions; viz: That the Town gives their Confent & Liberty to the Undertakers for building a new Meeting-Houfe in this Town, The faid Undertakers doing it at their own Coft & Charge, & the Town as a Town not to be burthen'd or charg'd therewith, Alfo in the Interim until the New Meeting Houfe be built & finish'd, M' John Bernard & Edward Holyoke be the two Gentlemen of the Ministry to help & affift the Rev'd M! Sam' Cheever the Minister of this Town in Preaching the Word of God to the Inhabitants in their turns, And that the faid M' Bernard & M' Holyoke be maintain'd at the Town Charge out of the Publick Treasury of the Town as formerly, or as can be agreed for : - Purfuant to which Articles under the Countenance & Encouragement of the Town of *Marblehead* by their Votes, the Petitioners have with great Diligence & Pains & Expence, raif'd & upon the matter finished a large, fair & convenient Meeting House or Church every way fitted for the Ufe & Service before mention'd & intended, & were under just Hopes & Expectations that their Fathers, Brethren & Neighbours of the Town of Marblehead would according to their good Beginning have gone on & held out in Affifting & Encouraging their lawfull commendable & indeed neceffary Defign as aforefaid, And therefore it is with great Unwillingness & Grief of Mind that they are under a Neceffity of laying their Complaint & Reprefenting their Condition to the Great & General Court, And that at a Town-meeting of the Inhabitants of Marblehead on the twenty fixth day of September last there was Voted a Salary of Eighty Pounds PAnnum to be paid to the Rev^d M' John Bernard the chosen Minister of the Town, fo long as he remain & continue a Minister there, to be paid out of the Town Treasury by Order of the Select Men of the faid Town, Against which Votes the Petitioners for themfelves & their Affociates, who are a very confiderable number, offered two feveral Petitions or Protefts in writing, one of which was refuf'd to be read, & the other tho' read, had no Anfwer made to it, contrary (as the Petitioners fuppose) not only to Christian Charity, but to the Rules of common Justice, and the Ufage & Practice of Towns in fuch cafes, So that your Petitioners have very little Reason to expect any manner of Relief under their deplorable Circumstances, unless it be from the Hon^{ble} General Court: — Humbly Reprefenting (1) That not only in the Judgment of the neighbouring Towns & People, But in the Judgment of the Inhabitants of *Marblehead* it felf, They are grown fo numerous as to be able com-fortably to fill two Houfes for the Publick Worfhip of God, And that in the manner & method of the Eftablished Churches & Congregations of New England. (2) That the Petitioners humbly hope & believe by the favour of God handfomely & Com-fortably to fupport the Charge of the Ministry by & among themfelves, & shall be very willing & thankful to be allowed fo to do. (3) That they have always declar'd themfelves to be & ftill are willing fo long as the Rev^d M! Cheever their worthy & faithful Pastour shall live to be at their full Proportion of Charge toward his Honorable maintenance. (4) That they humbly hope that the Hon^{ble} Court will be of Opinion, That fo foon & fo long as they shall support a Minister of the Ordinances of the Golpel by & among themselves at their own fole Charge (which will be very confiderable) they should not befides & added to all that, be oblig'd to support any Affistant or Successfour to the faid M' Cheever; (5) That they doubt not but the Hon^{ble} Court will think it very hard & unreasonable, When they were first encourag'd by a Vote of the Town to build a new Meeting Houfe They should now have that Grant of the Town encumbered & in a Sort defeated by Laying a Burthen upon the Petitioners which was not then fo much as thought of; (6) That they fuppofe it to be

be againft the Rules both of God & Man, That when they regularly & honourably fupport an Orthodox Minifter of their own, They fhould be oblig'd to pay any Thing towards the Maintenance of a Minifter of another Church, & under whofe Miniftry they are not to be. And forafmuch as there are feveral diftinct Precincts or Congregations in feveral Towns in this Province, efpecially in *Bofton*, Where with great Eafe Freedom Juftice & Cheerfulnefs they maintain their feveral & refpective Minifters; — That the Petitioners do humbly pray that the Hon^{ble} Court will be pleafed to take their Cafe into Confideration & either make them a diffinct & feparate Parifh or Order the whole Charge of the Minifters of M^r Cheever's Church as it is called, & that built by the Petitioners to be affefs'd & laid in Common upon the Inhabitants of the faid Town attending the faid Churches, or allow the Inhabitants or People of each refpective Church or Congregation by Subfcription or Contribution to maintain their refpective Minifters.

Ordered, That the Petitioners ferve the Town of Marblehead with a Copy of this Petition, That they may flew Reafon (if any they have) to this Court on the feventh Day of December next, why the Prayer thereof flould not be granted.

After which Tryal the Mortgagee proved the faid Mortgage, & enter'd it upon Record, when it had been hid for more than twenty Years before, And by Virtue thereof obtain'd a Verdict upon his Appeal to the Superior Court, Whereupon the Petitioner review'd having first tender'd to the Heirs of the faid Florence Maccarty more than sufficient to pay both the Principal & Interest Money in Current Silver Money, ready in the Court to have taken up the Mortgage, But it was faid it was too late; And the Court would give no Relief in the Premifes, the Mortgager having made Default & the Mort-gagee being in actual Poffession thereof, & had Possession beyond the Time limited by Law, That Judgment was given against the Petitioners, Which is to their utter Ruine, And this not thr.h any Default, He being beyond Sea, imprefs'd & detained on board one of His Majefty's Ships of War in Barbadoes, In which Service he died before the time of Redemption was expired, nor can it appear to be a Default in the Petitioner Hephfibah, fhe being an Infant, That notwithstanding the Mortgagee has been at no more charge than the Twelve Pounds, & a Yearly payment of five Pounds to the Mother of the faid Mortgager which the Land ftood charged, & fome fmall charge of Fencing &c. Humbly Praying the General Court to take the Premiffes into Confideration, & allow them their just Right of Redemption.

In the Houfe of Reprefent^{res}; Voted, that the Petitioners ought to have the Equity of Redemption, Inafmuch as the Mortgage made to Florence Maccarty by Joseph Newell father of the Petitioners was not recorded untill April the feventh 1714, By Reason whereof they were defeated of the Benefit of an Act entituded An Act for hearing & determining Cases in Equity made & pass'd the tenth of William the third &c. And that they be impower'd to file a Bill for their Right or Equity of Redemption in the next Court or Courts of Law proper to hear the fame.

under pretence of fome Grant or Purchafe, where upon there was Application made to the Great & General Court in the Year 1703. Upon which the Court were pleas'd to order a Committee to meet at Barnstable to confider of the Matter, that the faid Woono was at the faid Meeting, but for want of Copys of fome Records & a true Understanding of the English Laws, The Committee drew up a Report not altogether in their favour, upon which M! Mitchell of Bridgwater takes advantage thereby to Claim the best part of our faid Indian Town & gives us Trouble at Law, Wh they fuppofe to be contrary to the Intent of the General Court, when they accepted the Report of the faid Committee, Wh could be no otherwife than that Bridgwater should have the full Extent of your Grant, Which was fix miles South of Ketticutt, which is their Center to Ketticutt River, Which plainly appears by the Bridgwater Grant, By which the Indian Lands were referv'd to them, Wh was likewife done in Taunton Grant long before. That the faid M! Mitchel does profecute them at law for the greatest part of their Town. Upon Reading the Petition of Richard Car of Salifbury in the County of Effex, Mariner, Importing, That about the Year 1687, The then Governour & Council were pleaf'd to grant Liberty to Lieu Colº March to keep a new Ferry over the lower Part of Merrimack River between Newbury & Salifbury, During their Pleafure, W^h Ferry has been fince continued & of late fettled by the Quarter Seffions of the faid County upon the Towns of Newbury & Salifbury, both which are in Prejudice of a Grant formerly made by the General Court to M' George Car the Petitioners Father, and have been & now are very injurious to his Heirs, and humbly Prays that Juffice may be done him. To which End he offers the following Particulars; viz! That there was by Order of the General Court, a Covenant made between the Court of Salifbury & Mr John Car the Petitioners Father, about building a Float Bridge over Merrimack River & And Confirm'd by the General Court Anno 1650 & 1660, & therein an ancient Grant of the whole Ferry or Ferrys between Newbury & Salifbury was conditionally made to the faid Car & his Heirs; that the Covenant on the faid Cars Part was fulfilled to the Satisfaction of all, as appears not only on Record, But also in that there was never any Objection made against him, nor can there be justly at this time, That in Fulfilling this Covenant the faid Car was at more than Three Hundred Pounds expence in first Building the Bridge & other Accommodations for the Ferry, And that in the Settlement of the faid Car's Eftate, This Grant & Privilege was apportioned & appraif'd to his Heirs James & Richard (the Petitioner) at near Four hundred Pounds; That the Granting or Settling a Ferry between Newbury

Newbury & Salifbury or any others was a Breach of Covenant on the Countrey's Part, & contrary to the Intention & Meaning of the Covenanters on both Sides, & a manifest Illusion to faid Car & his Heirs; That the faid Car would not have been at so great a Charge, had he thought that a Ferry but a little below him would have ever been Granted to any other, Which would spoil both the Custom & Profitt of that which was attended with fo great a Charge, as it hitherto hath been, almost to the undoing of us to whofe Lot this Part of our Fathers Eftate fell, Who for being kept out of our Right are damnified at least Fifty & Sixty Pounds a Year, That it cannot be fuppofed the General Court made any Refervation to the Contrary, but that the true Intent & Meaning of their Grant & Covenant was the faid Car & his Heirs should have the fole Benefit of Ferry or Ferrys between the two Towns aforefaid, w^h is evident, in that the other Ferry below was put down as foon as the Bridge was finished, And that when another Ferry was thought needful some miles above the Ferry, The General Court judged it just to give the faid Car the Offer & Grant of it Anno 1669. And at the fame time declared it was needful fo to do to make good their ancient Covenant with him, And that if any other Ferrys should be thought useful for the Countrey within the aforefaid Limits, the st Car should have the Refufal of keeping them, That when the lower Ferry aforefaid was first fett up, The Offer of it was never made to M' Car's proper Heirs of that Right, Neither had they both the Refufal of it, That what ever was proposed to the Petitioner about it was not rejected. That he only objected against some Proposals, which he supposed he had just Reason for, as being contrary to the ancient Grant & Covenant, That the first Grant or Permit to keep the lower Ferry aforefaid to Coll. March was only during Pleasure, That it can be no Prejudice or Detriment to the Countrey nor any Perfon what foever, now to grant & fettle it on them to whom it of Right belongs; That the late Settlement by the Seffions of a Ferry at the fame Place upon the two Towns aforefaid was done without the least Offer to either of the Heirs or the faid Car or Giving them any oppertunity of Setting forth their Right or Speaking for themfelves, & contrary to the Grant & Covenant according to which the Ferry was not to be kept by Newbury & Salifbury till the aforefaid Bridge fell down, and then no longer to continue fo, but till it should be rebuilt by the faid Car or his Heirs; That it is of neceffity that that Ferry should be kept up, where & for which the Bridge was built for the publick Benefit of the Countrey, Becaufe it is impossible to keep or pass the lower Ferry at all Times, & very hazardous for a great Part of the Winter, tho' it may be convenient in the Summer, when it draw away all the Cuftom & Profit of the old ferry; That the Petitioner supposes it just & reafonable, that he who keeps up the old Ferry of neceffity for the publick Good fh^d have the Benefit & Profit of the new Ferry, W^h is only for the Conveniency of fome Perfons & at fome times, to fupport & maintain at an extraordinary charge that which is kept of neceffity, That he humbly offers these Confiderations to the General Court, Humbly Praying that the aforefaid Ferry over the lower part of Merrimack River, may be either wholly put down, or fettled according to the aforefaid Grant & Covenant with the faid Car & his Heirs, or that the Refufal of keeping the fame, at the fame price at which it is now kept may be given to the Petitioner.

A Report of the Committee relating to Sudbury.

In Obedience to the Order of the Great & General Court or Affembly, We the within named Committee have been at Sudbury, & have view'd the feveral Places fhewn to us by the Inhabitants on the Weft Side of the River for Setting up a New Meeting Houfe & are of Opinion that a Place called Poplar Swamp Gutter on the Weft Side of the faid Gutter & on the North Side of Lancaster Road between the ft Gutter & Heart Pond is the most convenient Place for Erecting the faid Meeting Houfe. We have also heard the Inhabitants on both Sides the River referring to the way of Supporting the Ministry; The Inhabitants on the East Side are willing to give one Half of the Land in Sudbury to make the Weft Precinct, & so each maintain their own Minister, Which the Inhabitants of the Weft Side of the River do refuse, & instead thereof propose to build a Meeting House at their own Charge & settle a Minister, And that the Ministry on both Sides the River be supported equally by the whole Town: The faid Committee do also report that there is a new School House erected on the West Side just by the River, Which may accommodate at prefent the whole Town, all which is humbly fubmitted:

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Upon Reading the Petition of Cord Wing, Ship wright, Son of Cpt. John Wing of Bofton Mariner Decd Importing, That at the Inferiour Court held at Bofton in January 1711. Sarah Tomlin as Executrix to the Will of her former Husband John Street Decd; And as Administratrix to the Estate of her late Husband Thomas Tomlin Dect Intestate recovered two Judgments. And again at the Superiour Court held at Boston in May 1712. as Executrix aforefaid obtain'd a third Judgment, all against the Eftate of the faid Cpt. John Wing Decd The feveral Sums by her recover'd including Cofts of Suit amounting in the whole to the Sum of One hundred forty fix Pounds or thereabouts, That three feveral executions iffued out upon the faid Judgments in the Month of December 1712. That on the twenty fifth Day of the faid Month the Sheriff of Middlefex levied the fame upon a Parcell of Upland & Meadow lying in the Township of Worcester shewn by the faid Sarah Tomlin to be the Estate of the faid Capt. John Wing Dec'd, Which Land with all the Eftate which he died feiz'd of in Worcester aforesaid was appraiz'd at the Sum of One hundred & fifty two Pounds, feventeen penny half penny weight and being reckon'd just enough to fatisfie the faid Executions & Charges thereupon. The faid Sarah Tomlin accepted the fame in Satisfaction thereof accordingly & paid the Sheriff his Fees; That he has Reafon to think that neither the Sheriff himfelf nor the Apprizers knew of all the Eftate, which the st Cpt. John Wing died feiz'd off in the Town of Worcester (altho' it be fo express'd in the Apprizment in very ambiguous terms) for that really the Estate of the faid Cpt. 
