



Introduction

COPY of the printed Journals of the House of Representatives of his Majesty's Province of the Massachusetts-Bay in New England for the session which began at Boston on May 25, 1715, was given to Samuel Sewall by the printer, Bartholomew Green, on July 12, three weeks after the Governor had in angry mood prorogued that body. Stung by a slighting comment passed by Governor Dudley on their proceedings, the members of the House determined to print the full Journal of the session, as the best defence of themselves. Thus began a practice of printing the Journals of the House which was continued in an almost unbroken series till the Revolutionary War. The convenience of having the record in such a form would alone have justified the publication; as time passed, the political advantages were also recognized, and the long controversies arising between the Governor and the House, or between the Council and the House, led to many papers, worthy to be called state papers, being spread upon the pages of the Journals. Such publications were intended more for the constituents of the House than for any effect they could produce upon those immediately engaged in the controversies; and, in the absence of an active press, the political questions received their discussion in messages, addresses, declarations, or the more formal proclamations — the most final of all expressions of opinion.

The beginnings of this publication were small and uncertain. The clerk of the House was directed to prepare a copy of the Journal, and the representatives of Boston were desired to take care that the printing was seasonably done. The question of cost does not appear to have been considered at this time; but the expediency of continuing to print was at once recognized, and in the second session of this General Court measures were taken to learn the cost, and provide for the future regular appearance of the votes or minutes during the session. On July 30, 1715, the representatives of the Town of Boston were again desired to take the care of printing the Journals of the session, and to "Treat with a Printer about the Terms upon which they may be Printed here-after." 2 Bartholomew Green was at this time printer to the Governor and Council, and appears to have been the only printer who submitted an estimate. He offered to print the Votes of the House "and all the other Printing directed by the Government, for the space of Seven Years next coming; and to furnish each Member of this Court, with a Copy of the said Votes, free of charge, on each Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday, of the several Sessions, during that Term, upon his being Allowed Thirty Pounds per Annum for his Service." 3 This offer was accepted by the House, and the concurrence of the Council was desired, but not given. The session came to an end while the matter was before the Council, and so the care of the printing of the

Journal fell upon the representatives of Boston, "upon the foot of the Agreement with Mr. Green the Printer." 1

Thus for three sessions the House of Representatives took upon itself the printing of its votes and minutes, without any encouragement from the Governor and Council. The fourth and last session began on November 23, and continued until December 22, but the Journal was not printed, as the following entry in the proceedings in the House on June 27, 1716, proves: "An Accompt of Bartholomew Green, for Printing the Journal of this House, in their Sessions begun in May, July and August, the last Year, and finding Paper, Folding and Stitching them, Amounting to the Sum of 1.22 175. 6d. Presented to the House for Payment"—and allowed. Had the Journal of the November session been printed, it would have been mentioned with the others.

It is to be noticed that in each case the entire session was printed as one piece, and without title-pages. The form adopted was modelled after that of the printed laws, and had been used by the Governor and Council when they issued resolves of the General Court. One such resolve has been found in the Boston Athenæum. It is the only issue in that form known, and might easily be mistaken for a page from the printed Journals, although no Journals were printed until 1715.

The practice, thus begun, was continued in the House of 1716–17, and on the day of proroguing the first session it ordered the printing of the Journal under the direction of the representatives of Boston.³ The inconvenience of delay in printing and distributing the Journal at the end of the session, and the advantage of having the record of proceedings at hand during the session, led the House to order that "the Votes of this House be Printed Twice a Week." ⁴ This accounts for the form and divisions of the sheets and for the comparative rarity of the issues. In no one library of New England can a full set be found, and even that in the office of the Secretary of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts is far from complete.

The present publication is made possible by a fund given to the Massachusetts Historical Society by a member, Mr. William Bradford Homer Dowse, of Sherborn. As the intention is to reprint the original volumes errors of type and printing have been followed; a proper correction in names of persons and places will be found in the index. As the first volume of the Journals contained no list of the members of the House for 1715 one has been taken from the Boston News-Letter.

JOURNAL

Of the House of

Representatives.

At a Great and General Court or Assembly of His Majesty's Province of the Massachusetts-Bay in prin England, begun & held at Boston, upon Wednesday the 25th Day of Pay, Anno Domíní, 1715.

Amuel Sewall, John Phillips, and Joseph Lynde Esqrs. came down from the Council Board, and Acquainted the House that they were Appointed and Authorized by His Excellency the Governour, That this House should take the Oaths, Make and Subscribe the Declaration, Take and Subscribe the Oath of Abjuration (as by the Royal Charter of this Province is Directed) before them, which was accordingly done by the Members present, and They withdrew.

The House Proceeded to write their Votes for a Speaker, which being Collected, and Examined, it was found that *John Burrill* Esq; was chosen by a major part of the House, and he was accordingly Conducted to the Chair.

The House Proceeded to write their Votes for a Clerk, which being Collected and Examined, it appear'd that Mr. *John White* was chosen by a major part of the House, who was accordingly sent for to the House.

Post Meridiem.

A Message sent up to the Council Board, by Capt. Davis, and Mr. Cawley, to report to His Excellency the Choice the House had made of a Speaker.

Who Returned, That His Excellency was not in Council, but by Sickness Confin'd at home.

Major Skeffe, and Mr. Chipman, were sent to Wait on His Excellency at His House at Roxbury, to Report to His Excellency, the Choice of the Speaker.

Who Returned, That His Excellency said, the Choice is very acceptable to him. A Message sent up to the Board, by Mr. Samuel Clap, and Capt. Davis, That the House are now ready to proceed to the choice of Councellors.

Who Return'd, That the Board were ready to Proceed, and Join with the House in the Choice.

Ordered, That Mr. Epps, Capt. Noyes, Col. Winthrop, Col. Thaxier, and Mr.

Denison, be a Committee to carry up the Votes of this House for Councellors, and assist in Sorting and Numbering them, together with the Votes of the Board, and Report to the House, the several Elections that shall be made.

The said Committee carried up the Votes of the House, for Councellors in the late Colony of the *Massachusetts-Bay* until Eighteen were chosen by a major part of the Voters.

Then for the late Colony of New-Plymouth, until Four were chosen, as aforesaid. Then for the late Province of Maine, until Three were chosen, as aforesaid. [2] Then for the Territory between Sagadehoc and Nova Scotia, until One was chosen, as aforesaid.

And lastly, for Persons dwelling in any Part of the Province, until Two were chosen, as aforesaid.

And the said Committee Reported the choice to be as follows, viz.

Of the Inhabitants, or Proprietors of Lands in the Territory formerly called the Massachusetts-Bay.

The Hon. William Tailer Esq; Wait Winthrop Esq; Elisha Cooke Esq; Elisha Hutchinson Esq: Samuel Sewall Esq; John Appleton Esq; John Higginson Esq; Andrew Belcher Esq; Edward Bromfield Esq: Nathaniel Norden Esq; Benjamin Lynde Esq; John Clark Esq; Addington Davenport Esq: Thomas Hutchinson Esq; Samuel Brown Esq: John Pinchon Esq; Thomas Oliver Esq: Thomas Fitch Esq;

Of the Inhabitants or Proprietors of Lands within the Territory formerly called New-Plymouth, viz.

Nathaniel Paine Esq; Isaac Winslow Esq; John Cushing Esq; John Otis Esq;

Of the Inhabitants or Proprietors of Lands within the Territory formerly called the Province of Maine, viz.

Eliakim Hutchinson Esq; Ichabod Plaisted Esq; John Wheelwright Esq;

Of the Inhabitants or Proprietors of Lands lying within the Territory between Sagadehoc and Nova Scotia, viz.

Joseph Lynde Esq;

Of the Inhabitants or Proprietors of Lands in any Part of the Province.

Nathaniel Byfield Esq; Edmund Quinsey Esq;

And then the House Adjourn'd till to Morrow Morning Nine a Clock.

Jovis 26 Maii 1715.

Rdered, That Col. Thaxter, Col. Winthrop, Capt. Noyes, Capt. Osgood, and Capt. Davis, Wait on His Excellency the Governour, with the above-written List of the Councellors, or Assistants, newly chosen for the Year ensuing, for His Excellency's Approbation of the Persons, therein Named, to be given in Writing under his Hand.

And inquire of His Excellency's Health.

The House Proceeded to Examine the Returns of the Precepts, made from the several Towns, of the choice of their Representatives.

Which being Passed through,

The usual Orders of the House were Read: And

Ordered, To be the Orders, of the House during the Sessions thereof.

Ordered, That Mr. John Sternes, Mr. Reed, and Capt. Arnold, be Monitors of the House to take care that the Orders thereof are duely observed. [3]

Ordered, That Mr. Speaker, Mr. Denison, and Mr. Cawley, Give the Thanks of this House to the Reverend Mr. Jeremiah Shepard for the Sermon Preach'd at their Desire, before this Court in a Publick Assembly Yesterday, being the Anniversary Day of Election of Councellors: And that they Desire him to give a Copy thereof to be Printed.

Post Meridiem.

An Accompt of William Paine Joyner, of the charge of Wainscotting, one half of the Chamber of the House of Representatives, and making of Seats therein, amounting to the Sum of 40 l. 16 s 8 d. Presented to the House for Allowance.

Read and

Resolved, That the Sum of Forty Pounds Sixteen Shillings and Eight Pence be Allowed and Paid out of the Publick Treasury, to William Paine, the Accomptant to Discharge his Accompt.

Sent up for Concurrence.

An Accompt of Edward Pell Painter, for Painting half of the Representatives Chamber, amounting to the Sum of 5 l. & 2 s. offer'd to the House for Payment.

Read and

Resolved, That the Sum of Five Pounds and Two Shillings, be Allowed & Paid out of the Publick Treasury to Edward Pell, the Accomptant to Discharge his Accompt. Sent up for Concurrence.

The List of Councellors sent to His Excellency the Governour this Morning: was Return'd to the House again, by the Members who carried it, His Excellency having Entred thereon as follows: viz.

I Consent to this Election of Councellors, except Nathaniel Byfield Esq; Given under My Hand, J. DUDLEY.

And then the House Adjourn'd till to Morrow Morning Nine a Clock.

Veneris 27 Maii 1715.

Rdered, That Capt. Noyes, Col. Thaxter, Mr. Parsons, Mr. Denison, and Capt. Fullam, be a Committee for Petitions to Examine the Matters and Allegations thereof, and report the same with their Opinion thereon to the House.

A Petition of John Brigham, Hopestill Brown, and Twenty-nine others, Presented to the House and Read, Praying, That the Land lying between the Towns of Marlborough, Lancaster, Worcester and Hassanameesit, may be granted to them, and made a Township.

Ordered, That the Petition be Rejected all the Names affixed thereto, except

one being written by the same hand.

A Petition of Francis Fullam and Daniel Livermore, both of Weston, Presented to the House and Read, Praying this Court to give them leave to Purchase a piece of Land, containing about Six Hundred Acres, Lying on the Easterly side of the Town of Oxford, of the Indian Owner thereof, called Mallalawing David, for Reasons therein expressed.

Ordered, That the said Petition be committed to the Committee for Petitions. Ordered, That Capt. Noyes, Mr. Cooke, and Col. Thaxter, be a Committee to prepare the Draught of a Vote, to bring forward, the Running of the Line between this Province and the Colony of Rhode-Island, pursuant to the Agreement of the Commissioners of the Two Governments for that end.

A Petition of John Small-piece of Boston, who was very much wounded, by a Blast of Gunpowder, in the Burning of the Impost-Office, the last Winter, when he was attempting to save what he could therein; Presented to the House and Read, Praying some Allowance towards his Cure and Subsistence.

In answer to the said Petition. [4]

Resolved, That the Sum of Twenty Pounds be Allowed and Paid out of the Publick Treasury to John Small-piece the Petitioner, towards his Relief.

Sent up for Concurrence.

Andrew Belcher and Addington Davenport Esqrs. brought down a Letter from His Excellency the Governour, dated yesterday at Roxbury, and directed to the Gentlemen of the Council and Representatives: Intimating that he is under such Bodily Illness, that he is unable at present to Attend the Court, but would have the Court Proceed in the Business that lies before them.

And a Letter from Mr. Agent Dummer, dated at Whitehall, Decemb. 4th last, Directed to Mr. Secretary Addington, for the General Assembly: Which were Read.

Mr. Edward Hutchinson, having Represented to this House, That he with Mr. John Watts, have now more than Ten Families, gone and ready to go, to Arowsick Island, to make a Settlement there.

Voted, That His Excellency the Governour be requested, now to order a Serjeant with Nineteen Sentinels, from Casco Fort, to Defend and Assist their Settlement, agreeable to the Vote of this Court in October last: The said Undertakers having likewise represented that convenient Barracks will be ready for their reception, by the time they can remove thither.

Sent up for Concurrence.

A Report of the Committee, appointed by this Court, the 20th of last October, to Run the Line, between the Town of Groton, and the Plantation of Nashoba, offer'd to the House, and was Read accordingly.

Resolved, That the Report be Accepted.

Sent up for Concurrence.

And then the House Adjourn'd till to Morrow Morning Nine a Clock.

Sabbeti 28 die Maii 1715.

Apt. Noyce from the Committee for Petitions, made Report to the House on the Petition of Francis Fullam, and Daniel Livermore, the prayer whereof was entred yesterday: That the Committee were of Opinion that the prayer of the Petition be granted.

Resolved, That the prayer of the Petitioners be granted; Provided the Land be no Part of Land appropriated by the Government, and the Quantity exceeds not Seven Hundred Acres.

Sent up for Concurrence.

Ordered, That Col. Adam Winthrop, Mr. William Paine, Mr. Elisha Cooke, Mr. Abraham Prebble, Mr. James Cawley, and Luke Hitchcock Esq; be a Committee to joyn with such as the Honourable Board shall Nominate, to Prepare the Draught of a humble Address and Memorial to His Majesty, humbly to Represent, and lay before His Majesty, the present State of this Province.

Sent up for Concurrence.

A Report of the Committee for Setling of the Eastern Parts of this Province: Offered to the House, and Read.

A Petition of Joseph Morse Representative of the Town of Sherbourn, Presented to the House, and Read; Praying that a Plat of Four Thousand Acres of Land, (there-with exhibited) laid out and protracted by Thomas White Surveyor, pursuant to a Grant of this Court, may be confirmed to the said Town.

A Message from the Board by John Wheelwright, and John Clark Esqrs. Desiring the House to have a further consideration of the Memorial of the Council that manag'd the Government, after the Death of Lieut. Governour Stoughton, until the Arrival of His Excellency our present Governour.

The said Memorial purporting as entred Feb. 20th 1713. Read. And then the House Adjourn'd till Monday next Three a Clock afternoon. [5]

Lunce 30 die Maii 1715.

A Petition of Richard Coomes and Hephzibah his Wife Daughter of Joseph Newel, late of Roxbury, deceas'd, presented to the House & Read; Praying Relief from great wrong they suffer, by the Heirs of Florence Maccarty late of Boston, deceas'd, injuriously with-holding from them Lands that were her Father's, lying in Roxbury aforesaid; and for which they are without remedy in the Law.

Ordered, That a hearing be granted on this Petition, before this Court, on Friday next at Ten a Clock in the forenoon: And that the Petitioners serve the adverse Party with a Copy of the Petition, and a Notification, That they may be heard, if they have any thing to Alledge why the prayer of the Petition should not be Granted.

Sent up for Concurrence.

A Petition of Daniel Marsh Representative of the Town of Hadley, presented to the House & Read, praying, That a Tract of Land of Four Miles Square adjoyning to the said Town may be annexed, and made part thereof, Agreeable to a Grant of this Court, formerly made, That the said Quantity should be laid to them.

And a Petition of *Ebenezer Pumry* and Nineteen others Inhabitants of the said Town, and the Town of *Northampton*; presented to the House & Read; Praying, That the said Lands, with others near adjoining may be Granted to them, to Settle and Form a Township there.

Ordered, That the said Petitions be referr'd to further Consideration, at the Session of this Court in the next Autumn.

And that in the mean time the Town of *Hadley* lay out their Grant, of Four Miles Square, made to them by the General Court in *May* 1683. by a skilful Surveyor, under Oath, either of the South-west, or North-east End of the said Town. That the Province Land lying between the said Town, and the Town of *Springfield*, may not be cut in pieces, and made unfit for future Grants and Settlements, and return a Plat thereof to this Court for Confirmation.

Whereas a great Number of Guns were fired yesterday, being the Lords Day, at Castle William, for which we are not sensible of any necessary occasion.

Ordered, That Mr. Speaker be desired to wait on His Excellency the Governour, and inquire, Upon what occasion, and by whose order they were fired; and desire that for the future Orders may be given, That no Guns may be fired there on the Lord's Day, but in cases of necessity.

And then the House Adjourn'd till to Morrow Morning Nine a Clock.

Martis 31 die Maii 1715.

A Petition of Samuel Partridge Esq; Praying as entred the Third day of Novemb. last, Read again and Committed.

Sundry Accompts of charge arising for the furnishing of Major John Stoddard,

and the Reverend Mr. John Williams, and their Attendants, to proceed on their Journey to Canada, Anno 1713. being sent by this Court to obtain the English Captives there.

And Accompt of charge after their Return, and charge upon the Captives return'd, Presented to the House for Allowance and Payment: Read and committed to the Committee for Petitions.

The following Report offered to the House, viz. We under-written, having been appointed by the Honourable General Assembly of this Province the 10th day of June, Anno 1714. To view a Tract of Land adjoyning to Brookfield on the South, and to Brimfield on the East, extending from Brookfield South-west Corner Eastward, Three Miles, in order to its being added to the Town of Brimfield, whose Bounds are straitned on the South, by the Partition Line of this Province, and the [6] Colony of Connecticut, and make Report thereof. Having strictly Measured said Brimfield West Line, which we find to be Seven Miles & Sixteen Perch, as it Bounds on Springfield, tho' not so much Square off from the said Partition Line; and also the Distance between Springfield, and the South-west Corner of Brimfield, which we find to be Eight Miles one Quarter, and Twenty-two Perch, and no more; which said Tract is short of the Contents of Eight Miles Square, and withal very Mountainous, and uncapable to entertain a suitable Number of Families, without an addition at the East End: Are therefore humbly of Opinion, That unless Three Miles be added, to the said Town of Brimfield, as described in the Subsequent Map; It will not be inviting nor capable to entertain a Suitable Number of Families, according to the Direction of the Court, relating to the Settlement thereof; the said Eastermost End only being capable to entertain Inhabitants to Settle in a defensible manner. more, agreeable to the Grant of the General Court.

And a Petition of the Inhabitants of the Town of Worcester, praying, That they may have Liberty to Purchase the said Land of the said Indian. Were both severally presented to the House and Read.

And then the House Adjourn'd till to Morrow Morning Nine a Clock.

A Petition of John Higginson jun. and Nathanael Higginson of Salem, presented to the House and Read, praying, That they may be Allowed to lay out a New Farm of Seven Hundred Acres, formerly Granted to the Reverend Mr. John Higginson, and laid out by a Pond called Haverhill Bound Pond, the Marks then made being mostly Effac'd, and not to be found. And this House with the Honourable Board (as by their

Votes of the 7th & 10th Instant) having offered to His Excellency as their Opinion, That it is for His Majesty's Service, That the Fort at Casco Bay be slighted. and no longer continued, and that a Stone Fort near Pejepscot Falls be Repaired in stead thereof, as more conveniently Situated for Covering the New intended Settlements and keeping the Indians, from their Fishery in case of a Rupture. And His Excellency having signified under his Hand, That he cannot at present see Reason to Demolish the Fortification at Casco, until His Majesty's pleasure be known therein.

And forasmuch as the Charter Granted to the Inhabitants of this Province, by their late Majesty's King William and Queen Mary of Glorious Memory, Doth give full Power to the Governour, for the time being, at his pleasure to Demolish Forts and Fortifications.

Resolved, That the Sum of Twenty Pounds be Allowed and Paid out of the Publick Treasury, towards the Maintenance of the Ministry in the Town of Dartmouth, for the Year ensuing. Sent up for Concurrence. [29]

A Message from the Board, Moving that the Salary for the Treasurer's Service the last Year be Granted; he being unwilling to be Sworn in order to the Service of another Year, until that is done.

A Petition of Henry Bridgham of Boston Guardian of Sarah, and Esther Maccarty Daughters and Co-heirs of Florence Maccarty, late of Boston, deceas'd, Intestate, presented to the House and Read, praying, That he may be enabled to make Sale of the Real Estate Divided & Assigned to the said Minors, for Reasons therein alledged.

Committed.

Ordered, That the House now proceed to Apportion to the several Towns of the Province, the Sums they are to Pay in a Tax of the Eleven Thousand Pounds.

The House proceeded to Vote the Sum which each Town in the County of Suffolk should pay in the Tax afore-mentioned, each Town being consider'd, and their Sum Voted separately, Opportunity being first given to the respective Representatives to inform the House of the State and Circumstances of their Town, and wherein they differ from what they were the last Year.

Mr. Speaker and the House went up accordingly, and His Excellency made a Speech to the Court, whereof Mr. Speaker obtain'd a Copy, and with the House return'd to their own Chamber.

His Excellency's Speech, Read, and is as follows, viz.

GENTLEMEN,

T the Last Sessions of this Assembly I earnestly recommended to you the Raising of 22000 1. Granted & Determined by two former Assemblies of the Province, for the Drawing in of that Sum of the Province Bills, Raised & Emitted for the Support of the late War, and Trouble with the Indians; which said Acts of Assembly were Passed, by the Representatives, and the Council of the Province, and Presented to the Governour to be Sign'd, & Pass'd by the Seal in due manner and accordingly in that Form, were sent home, and are there of Record, and Accepted by the Right Honourable the Lords of the Council of Trade & Plantations, as I was Commanded by the Instructions for the Government, of which every body Concerned, being apprized, I made no doubt you would without any Delay have Proceeded to Apportion, and Levy it as those Acts Direct; as also the Impost & Excise, which is thereby in like manner Determined, to be Raised in Aid, of the said Taxes severally; You are all sensible how well & thriftily, as well as successfully those Sums were Disbursed, and applyed to Defray the necessary Expences of the War, and with what Honour your Bills Passed for the Support of those heavy Charges, without any Disparagement: And its as easy to see how the Credit of those Bills, must needs sink & fail, if the present or any future

Assembly, shall upon any Pretence whatsoever, break in upon those Clauses in the Said Acts, for the time of Payment, which I am willing to give my Opinion, We have no Power to do. Nor if we had, any reason at present to Project it, for that we are in Peace, and very capable to Discharge our Debts, in such Proportion as they are Determin'd, and since we have neither Power, nor need to delay the Payment, I am of Opinion we shall Disparage the Publick Faith of the Province, to that Degree that our Bills will fail in their Value, to the very great Injury of every Body that have taken them, or are in Possession of them; and in this we are justified by His Majesty's Most Gracious Speech from the Throne, "That nothing can contribute more to the Support "of the Credit of the Nation, than a strict Observance of Parliamentary Engagements. [36]

I therefore earnestly Recommend the Consideration of the Tax, Impost and Excise to your present Resolves, and hope you will make no Delay but pass through them, in two or three Dayes, not admitting of any other business this Session.

You will also Remember, That the Treasurers Support in his Office, is not provided for, and others in Office at Home or Foreign depending on your Justice, and respect to them in such manner, as has been usual; which being done. I shall not further Delay your own Business, which Demand your being at home.

I shall Account my self happy to see these Affairs well agree'd, and there shall be nothing wanting on my Part for His Majesty's Service, the Honour of the Government, and the benefit of all His Majesties good Subjects concern'd herein.

And inasmuch as there are just Grounds to believe that some evil Minded Persons, in this as well as the Province of New-Hampshire, in manifest contempt of the Fifth & Sixth Articles of a Treaty for a Neutrality, in America, between England and France, made at Whitehall the 6th of November, 1686. wherein it is Inserted, in the Fifth Article of the aforesaid Treaty, "That if any "Ship or Vessel shall be found Trading or Fishing, contrary to the Tenour of the "aforesaid Treaty, the said Ship or Vessel with its Loading, proof being made "thereof, shall be Confiscated. Which Articles were lately sent from the Secretary of State to this Government, for their Observation thereof, and Printed & Published here. As also a Proclamation against a Commerce & Trade, with the French of Canada, Cape Breton, &c. Issued forth by Order of the Governour, with the Advice of the Council the 3d Day of January last past, and one other of the same Import, on the 29th Day of March last past, for the Lucre of gain have from time to time furnished the French at Cape Breton, with Live Cattel, Pork, Corn, Lumber, and other things, without which the aforesaid Settlement would have been very much Retarded, if not wholly Defeated.

Wherefore Resolved, That a Message be sent up to His Excellency the Governour to desire that he would be pleased to Order Capt. Cayley in His Majesty's Ship Rose after he has accomplished his intended Cruise to the Eastward, forthwith to proceed to Cape Breton, and there to Cruise as long as the Season will allow; to prevent the aforesaid clandestine Trade, which will be of great Service & Honour to the Crown: But if not timely done, may prove very injurious to this Province, with respect to the Fishery, which at all times deserves a very great Regard. And that the Commissioner be Instructed, to proceed to Cape Breton, and acquaint the Chief Officer there of the Insults & Captions, made by the Indians & French amongst the Fishery, on the Coast of Nova Scotia, which the Indians do affirm was by the Instigation of the French at Cape Breton, from whom they have received great Presents; which is a manifest Breach of the Peace concluded between Her late Majesty, and the Most Christian King; and that this Government accordingly represent the same to His Majesty.

The Petition of Samuel Sewall Esq; pass'd upon in this House the last Session. Brought down from the Board, not having been pass'd upon there. Read again, and the Vote of this House thereon, and

Ordered, That the said Vote be Revived, and sent up for Concurrence.

A Plat of Seven Hundred Acres of Land, laid out by John Gardner, Surveyor, and the Chain-men under Oath, for John & Nathanael Higginson, pursuant to the Order of this Court at their last Session. Presented to the House for Confirmation.

Ordered, That the Land laid out and protracted in the said Plat be confirmed as the Seven Hundred Acres formerly Granted to the late Reverend Mr. John Higginson: Provided it Intrench not upon any former grant. Sent up for Concurrence.

Ordered, That the Petition be Rejected; the Petitioner Odiorn being an Inhabitant of the Province of New-Hampshire; it is proper for him to apply there.

Ordered, That a Message be sent up to His Excellency the Governour, earnestly moving, That the Request of this House of the 21st. currant agreed to by the Council, for the Guard-ship to proceed to Cape Breton, &c. when she had finished her Intended Cruise, may be answered.

I am of Opinion, That the Frigot proceed immediately to Annapolis Royall, and Acquaint the Government there, of our present Posture, and their Danger, and obtain their advice of any Method, to be used to Recover our Vessels, and Prisoners out of the Indian bands; and from thence to proceed to Cape Sables, to advise our Fishing Vessels there of their Danger: And that there be taken up forth-with two good Sloops with Thirty Men each, to Defend and Secure our remaining Fishery, upon the Coast of Cape Sables, and Parts Adjacent, and to hold his Cruise there for Twenty Dayes, and then give us Notice for our further Proceedure; and that the Frigot Sail forth-with,

with Col. Goffe on Board, no other fit Person to be joyned with him in this Negotiation appearing.

WE the Subscribers Proprietors of the Lands in Brunswick, Topsham, &c. being Desirous to make such a Settlement, as may be able to sustain a War with the Indians, Do acknowlege the Favour of the General Court, in their readiness to Encourage & Protect the intended Settlements, and particularly in the Repair of the Fort there; yet perceiving the House inclinable to a Wooden Fort, on account of the Cheapness of it; We being sensible that as this Fort is set, so as to be a Bridle to the Indians: So if a War should arise, it may be Expected, they will leave no means untryed, to become Masters of it, towards which the Remoteness from Succour will give them great advantage, and considering how much the Lives & Estates there will depend upon the Strength & Security of that Fort; We have been Induced to make the following Proposal.

That Whereas the Wooden Fort at Winter Harbour Cost, as we are Informed 400 l. Pounds, when Provisions, & Labour were much Cheaper, than at this time, We can't suppose such an one now would Cost much less than 500 l. Pounds; and a Stone Fort supposed to be much more Chargeable: Yet rather than the said Fort should be of Wood, and so liable to be Consumed by Fire, in case it should be Assaulted by French as well as Indians.

We Offer, That if the General Court will please to Allow Five Hundred Pounds, and let us now have the Fifteen Men, which are Designed for that Garrison, we will enter into Engagements to Repair & Finish the aforesaid Stone Fort: To be 50 Foot

square, as proposed, with Four Bastions, Two of which of Wood on the Top of the Angle; at our own Charge, although it should amount to more than that Sum. And we shall set about it in a Weeks time if possible, and hope to finish it before Winter, if not Obstructed by the Indians. We desire to have Three Hundred Pounds of the said Sum as occasion shall require, to provide Materials, &c. and the remainder when the work is finished.

Memorandum,

It is agreed that the Foundation of the said Fort shall be Three Foot under ground, That the Wall shall be Three Foot Thick at Bottom, and at least Ten Foot High above the Ground; and laid in Lime Mortar, with Barracks for Fifteen Men; to be built on or near the Spot where the Fort now stands.

Post Meridiem.

Mr. Speaker sent up a Message to the Board by Col. *Thaxter*, and Capt. *Cawley*. That a *Quorum* of the House are now met, and ready to proceed upon the Business of the Session.

A Message from His Excellency by *Edmund Quincey* Esq; That Mr. Speaker and the House forthwith attend him in the Council Chamber.

Mr. Speaker and the House accordingly went up to the Council Chamber, and His Excellency made a Speech to the Court, whereof Mr. Speaker obtain'd a Copy, and with the House return'd to their own Chamber.

The Vote last entred sent down again, Pass'd upon in Council, viz. Read and Concurr'd with the addition of any Law, Usage or Custom to the contrary not-withstanding. Sent down for Concurrence. Read and Concurr'd.

And sent up. [54]

A Plat of the Original Grant of the Township of Swampfield, and a Tract of Land adjoyned thereto Platted out therewith, which the Proprietors Desire may be added to the said Township; The Surveyor Thomas Hastings, and the Chainmen being under Oath; presented to the House for Allowance and Approbation. And the Question being put, Whether the said Tract of Land prayed for, being more than Eighteen Thousand Acres, be added to the said Township?

It pass'd in the Negative.

Ordered, That the Plat of the Original Grant of the said Town, being Nine Miles long and Four Miles Wide, be Allowed and Confirmed to the lawful Proprietors; Provided it interfere with no former Grants.

Sent up for Concurrence.

A Message from the Board by John Clark and Thomas Fitch Esqs; That they have no business before them, and if there is any to come from this House, they desire to have it quickly, for His Excellency is desirous soon to dismiss the Court.

The Committee appointed, brought in a Draught of a Vote, in answer to the last Vote of the Board on the Resolve for supply of the Treasury, which was Read and Pass'd by the House. viz.

This House having for sundry Years past represented, the Fort or Trading House at Casco Bay to be of no Service to His Majesty, either as a Barrier to our Frontiers, or Security to our Fishery, and particularly on the Seventh & Tenth Dayes of their Sessions in *June* last, in Concurrence with the Honourable Board. did offer to His Excellency as their Opinion, That it was for His Majesties Service, that the said Fort of Casco Bay, be slighted, and no longer continued, and that a Stone Fort near Pejepscot Falls, be repaired in stead thereof, as more convenient to cover the new intended Settlements of Brunswick, Topsham, &c. and to keep the Indians from their Fishery in case of another Rupture; and did further Vote. That no more money be drawn out of the Publick Treasury, for the Subsisting and paying any Officers or Souldiers, at the Fort of Casco after the First Day of September next; and Ordered a Copy of the Vote to be sent to Mr. Treasurer, for his future Direction, to which the Council did concur; and having on the Twenty eighth Day of July, Ordered the Sum of Five Hundred Pounds to be Issued out of the Treasury for repairing the said Fort at Pejepscot Falls (which Fort was built by Sir Edmund Andross as the best bridle to the Eastern Indians) And did Grant the Number of Fifteen Men as a Garrison for the said Fort, who are now the greatest part on the Place, to secure the Work-men in repairing and finishing the same, to receive the Stores from Casco, where they may be in greater Danger by the ruinous State of the Fort, than they will be at Pejepscot by the First of October; And the House thereon Resolved, That no more Money should be raised, for the Subsistence of the said Fort at Casco after the First Day of October next, and Asserted it, as their undoubted Right to Appropriate their Grants; which Resolve has been revived this Session; and as it is no Infringement on His Majesty's Honour or Service, but agreeable to the Charter, and a great Ease to His Majesty's Subjects. *Therefore Resolved*, That the House do adhere to their former Vote; and they think themselves bound in Duty to His Majesty and the People they Represent, so to do.

Sent up.

Ordered, That the several Petitions referr'd to this Session, be continued, and

referr'd to the next Fall Session.

Post Meridiem.

Ordered, That Col. Winthrop, and Mr. William Paine, be desired to Consult with the Treasurer what are the several Articles of the ordinary Charge of the Province annually, and make Report to this House at their next Session.

A Message sent up to the Board by Mr. Newman, and Mr. Partridge, That there is no business lying before the House, and if there be any to come from the Council they desire to receive it.

And then the House Adjourn'd till to Morrow Morning Nine a Clock. [55]

Message sent up to the Board by Mr. William Paine, Col. Thaxter, and Capt. Cawley, To inquire whether the Council had Concurr'd to the Votes of this House Granting 500 Acres of Land to Mr. Speaker Burrill; and for the annual Printing proposed to be done for the Government. And to desire if there is any business to come from the Board, that it may be sent as soon as conveniently may be, the House having none before them. Who Return'd, That the Council said, the said Votes were now under their Consideration.

The Resolve of this House for supply of the Treasury, sent down from the Board with the following Vote, viz. In Council Aug. 27th. 1715. The Resolve of the House of Representatives of the 24th Currant being read, Concurr'd with, only extending the Limitation relating to Casco Fort, to the First of November next ensuing; And Ordered, That the Undertakers to build the Fort at Pejepscot, be directed with utmost Speed and Diligence to Proceed in that affair, and accomplish the same by the time, so that it may be capable, to receive and entertain the Men and Stores proposed; and that if it be not possible to build and finish the said Fort according to the Order of this Court by the time, then what is wanting to be made up by Stockadoes, to Secure and make it defensible, until the Season will Allow the Stone-work to be finished.

Sent down for Concurrence.

Read and Concurr'd.

Ordered, That a Message be sent up to the Board, Desiring that the Stores may be remov'd from Casco to Pejepscot Fort, as soon as the latter shall be ready to receive them, which is hop'd will be sooner than the First of November: Which

was carried up by Capt. Noyes, Mr. William Paine, and Mr. Epps, who return'd, That His Excellency said, He would do all that he had said concerning it.

A Motion being made that the House will now have the Consideration of making an Allowance to Mr. Agent *Dummer*, for his Service.

After some Debate.

The Question being put, It pass'd in the Negative.

Ordered, That the Consideration of that Affair be Referred to the next Session.

A Message to His Excellency the Governour by Col. Winthrop and Capt. Noyes, That the House desire to be Inform'd, Whether his Excellency has Consented to the Resolve for supplying the Treasury, with the Amendments made to it; being willing to Proceed to Grant the usual Allowances, if the Treasury is enabled to pay them. Who return'd answer, That His Excellency said, He should under-write it, before he went out of the Court.

A Message from the Board by John Clark and Thomas Fitch Esqrs; That the House would make Allowance for Mr. Secretary Addington's Service, the time he liv'd after his last Allowance was made.

And to Mr. Joseph Hiller for the time he has Serv'd as Clerk of the Council. A Message to the Board by Capt. Fullam, and Mr. Knolton, That the House is ready to Grant the usual Allowances, as soon as they are Certified that His Excellency has Sign'd the Resolve for Supplying the Treasury.

Who Return'd answer, That His Excellency said, He should not Sign it this Day, It not being customary for him to Sign the Votes of the Court before they were entred Fair in a Book: But that He would Sign it before any Money was drawn out of the Treasury.

A Message to the Board by Mr. William Paine, Capt. Noyes, and Col. Thaxter, That the House think it necessary, That all Acts and Votes of the Court should be Sign'd, and Perfected before the Session is ended. And that the Return of a Message from His Excellency this Day Inform'd the House, That His Excellency was pleas'd to say, He would under-write the Vote for supply of the Treasury before he went out of the Court.

Accordingly Mr. Speaker with the House went up; And His Honour the Lieut. Governour made a Speech to the Court, whereof Mr. Speaker obtained a Copy, and with the House Returned to their own Chamber. His Honours Speech was Read, and is as follows, viz.

Gentlemen,

A Tour last parting I had little Expectation of now speaking to you from the Chair, believing His Excellency Col. BURGES our Governour would before this time have happily Arrived among us, and I am well assured he may be daily expected, and that he comes with full Resolutions to do his utmost for the Interest of this Province, which he has signified to the Council in divers of his Letters, and has likewise expressed his grateful sense of the Honourable Provision you have made of so suitable a House for his Reception, in which you have not only obliged him but done much Honour to your selves.

Therefore my time in this Station will in all Probability prove short, yet to the last Moment of it I shall rejoyce to meet with any Opportunity of shewing my Zeal and Affection to the Crown, and the true Interest of my Native Country; and doubt not but you all come with hearty and sincere Dispositions to promote both in your respective Stations. The good Agreement with the last General Court, gives me great hopes to meet the same in this. And I should esteem it the happiest Circumstance of my Life to have the Honour of delivering up the Government in a perfect Unity between both Houses, which would contribute to your own Reputation and the Disappointment of those few, who have with great Industry endeavoured to prevent it.

Gentlemen,

His Excellency Bragadier Hunter favoured me with the Commissioners of Albany's Report to him, as if the Indians had some Designs of making an Attempt on our Frontiers in the Spring, which I immediately communicated to His Majesty's Council, who were of Advice that it was proper to reinforce Fort George, as likewise the New Settlement of Arowsick, with Ten Men each, which accordingly I have done. And on Monday last by an Express from the Honourable Lieut. Governour Vaughan, I have received Intelligence that gives further Grounds for Suspicion, and nothing but the General Election prevents me from doing my Duty to my Country in Visiting the Frontiers, and putting 'em into a suitable posture of Defence, but I have dispatched Expresses to the Commanding Officers, to give timely Advice to their several Towns in order to prevent a Surprize; what other Methods I have taken in this Affair I shall lay before you; And I think it a proper Season to offer it as my Opinion, that nothing can be of more Service both for the Crown and this Country, than for both Houses to be Unanimous in Supporting and Encouraging the New Settlements.

Gentlemen of the House of Representatives,

I shall Order Mr. Treasurer to lay before you the state of the Treasury, in which I

believe you will find no unnecessary Article of Charge, and therefore have no reason to doubt but you will make all suitable Provision for Support of the Government in the ensuing Year. And as it has pleased Almighty GOD of His Infinite Wisdom and Goodness, to frustrate the Counsels of Evil and Rebellious Traitors in their late Unnatural Rebellion against the best of Kings, which had a Tendency to Extirpate the whole Royal Family; so now Gentlemen, We have an Opportunity to Congratulate His most Sacred Majesty on this His great Deliverance, by way of an Address; and to Assure His Majesty of our Constant and Steady Loyalty and Affection to His Person and Government, and that we will with our Lives and Fortunes as we have Opportunity, Defend His Rightful Title to the Crown of Great Britain, and the Dominions and Provinces depending thereon, as also to the Protestant Succession as by Law Established against all Pretenders whatsoever:

Gentlemen,

This is usually the Session for Business, which I shall give all the Encouragement I can to forward, but if upon the Expectation of His Excellency's sudden Arrival you incline to make it short, I shall [4] readily consent to it. If any proper Methods can be found out for the promoting the produce of this Country, and so consequently the Trade thereof, I shall chearfully concur with you therein. I have nothing more to add, but to express my sincere Wishes that the Crown may long Flourish on the Head of our Soveraign Lord King G E O R G E, with all its Ancient Prerogatives, and that it may from Him descend to His Illustrious Family to lasting Posterity.

Isaac Winslow Esq; brought down from the Board several Letters that had been Express'd to His Honour the Lieut. Governour from the Eastward, Importing Apprehensions of a Rupture with the Indians there, which were read and sent up.

Ordered, That Mr. Payne, Col. Basset, Mr. Anthony Stoddard, Capt. Chambers, Mr. Rogers, Mr. Thomas, Capt. Gallop, Mr. Hammond, and Major Stoddard be a Committee to Examine and Audit the Treasurers Accounts, and make report to the House.

The following Vote sent down from the Board, viz. In Council, May 31st. 1716. Upon Reading the Expresses from the Eastward, giving just Grounds to suspect the Indians intend mischief to our Frontiers, which we conclude is fomented by false Reports of a War likely to break out between Great Britain and France. It being much for His Majesty's Service, and the Security and Peace of this Province, that some Method be immediately taken for undeceiving the Indians in that matter.

Advised, That some Discreet Person, with an Interpreter, be forthwith Dispatched to their Head Quarters to let them know, that we justly take Umbrage at the suspicious Words and Deportment they have lately been guilty of, contrary to the Peace Established, That we are desirous to remain in Peace, but if they against their Faith & Allegiance, Commit any Hostilities, they must expect to be treated as Rebels and Enemies to the Crown of Great Britain. Yet if they act upon supposal of a War with France, we do assure them there is no War to be Expected, but a perfect Amity between the Two Crowns. That the Pretender has been driven out of Great Britain, his Forces wholly Defeated, and he with his Adherents, ordered by the Regent, to Depart the Dominions of France.

Sent down for Concurrence.

Read and Concurr'd, and further Advised, That some British News-Papers be sent, to be Read and Interpreted to the *Indians*, to satisfy them of Peace between the Two Crowns.

A Message sent up to the Board by Capt. Noyes, Col. Goffe, and Col. Somersby, desiring that this House may be informed, whether the Votes of this Court for Demolishing of Casco Fort, and the removing of the Stores from thence, have been Attended and Complyed with.

Mr. Secretary *Woodward* brought down the Council Book, and shewed, That in Answer to the Memorial of Capt. *Samuel Moodey*, laid before His Honour the Lieut. Governour in Council, the further proceeding in that Affair had been suspended till the meeting of this Court, and then withdrew.

This House being informed, That the Votes of this Court to Demolish Casco Fort and Remove the Stores from thence are not yet fully Complyed with: which this House Apprehend may be of dangerous Consequence, by exposing His Majesties Stores, and the few People that still remain there, contrary to the Acts of this Courts, to the Insults of the Indians.

Resolved, That His Honour the Lieutenant Governour be desired, to direct a full Performance of the Votes of this Court in that Affair, and order the removing of the Stores to Boston, and the intire Demolition of the Fort, and Houses therein without delay.

Sent up for Concurrence.

By several Messages that Pass'd between the Houses, it was Agreed, That the Person, to be sent to the Head-Quarters of the Eastern *Indians*, pursuant to the Vote of this Day be Mr. *John Watts*, and Capt. *John Gyles*. [5]

Ordered, That Mr. Cooke, Col. Thaxter, Col. Goffe, Capt. Chambers, Capt. Gardner, Col. Somersby, Mr. Thomas, Col. Basset, Major Stoddard, Capt. Southworth, and Mr. Hammond be a Committee to consider and propose to the House, such Method as they think most effectual to obtain a true and just Valuation of the Rateable Estate of this Province, in order to a more just and equal Levying of Taxes upon the several Towns.

A Petition of Mary Woodcock Widow, Relict of William Woodcock, late of Attle-borough, Deceas'd, Presented to the House and Read, Praying that she may be enabled to Sell some Lands, that were her said late Husbands, for her Support and Maintenance in her old Age.

At a Great and General Court or Assembly of His Majesty's Province of the Massachusetts-Bay in princengland, begun & held at Boston, upon Wednesday the 30th Day of May, Anno Domíní, 1716. And continued by Prorogation to Wednesday the First Day of August, and then Met.

Message sent up to the Board by Col. Thaxter, Capt. Chambers, and Major Stoddard, That this House are Met, and ready to proceed upon the Business of the Session as soon as it shall be laid before them.

A Message from the Board by John Clark and Thomas Hutchinson Esqrs, That His Honour the Lieut. Governour, is at the Board and desires the Attendance of this House.

Mr. Speaker and the House went up accordingly: And His Honour the Lieut. Governour made a Speech to the Court, whereof Mr. Speaker received a Copy, and with the House return'd to their own Chamber.

His Honours Speech Read, and is as follows: viz.

GENTLEMEN,

It is by the advice of His Majesty's Council that I meet You at the Time, to which You were Prorogued, tho' I confess it be a very busy Season. And am now to tell You, That the Committee appointed to Sit in the Recess of the General Court, to Consider of the Report of the Committee, of both Houses, for the Promoting the Produce and Trade of this Province (wherein was Projected the Making, and Emitting the Sum of One Hundred Thousand Pounds, in Bills of Credit,) and prepare and lay before this Court, the Draught of a Bill agreeable thereto, have acquainted Me, That they have Prepared a Bill accordingly, and are ready to lay it before this Court, for their Approbation; which I hope if agreed to, will greatly Tend both to the Support of the Government, and the Encouragement of Trade; therefore I chearfully recommend it to You, being very much inclined to do my Country, all the Service that lyes in my Power.

Gentlemen,

I Hear His Excellency Col. SHUTE may in a Short time be Expected, and I shall do my Duty to Him, in giving Him as handsome a Reception as this Government is capable of; And take this Opportunity to acknowledge your Regards to Me, in your Recommendation of Me to Him, for my being Continued in my Post.

Some time since, I received a Letter by the hands of a Norridgawog Indian, wrote by the Friar of that Place, which was very insulting: And which occasioned Me, to Summon His Majesty's Council; and what was done thereon I shall lay before You, and doubt not but will be to your Acceptance. The time of Year will not Admit of a long Session, Wherefore I should be glad, You would in a few Dayes Conclude what lyes before You, that so You may return Home, to the Ingathering of the Remainder of Your Harvest.

Provided, That all things being duly weighed what the Estate has been bettered by the Lessees an equitable Allowance therefore shall be made according to Apprizement, of three Persons of Integrity upon Oath.

Sent down for Concurrence. Read and Non-Concurr'd.

Edmund Quincey, and Adam Winthrop Esqrs; Brought down a Draught of a Proclamation for a Day of Publick Thanksgiving agreeable to the Votes of the Court. Which was Read, and sent up.

A Message from the Board, That His Honour the Lieut. Governour Desires this House to Attend Him immediately in the Council Chamber.

Mr. Speaker and the House accordingly went up; and His Honour the Lieut. Governour *Prorogu'd* the Court to Wednesday the Ninteenth Day of September next, at Ten a Clock in the Forenoon.

At a Great and General Court or Assembly of His Majesty's Province of the Massachusetts-Bay in pewengland, begun & held at Boston, upon Wednesday the 30th Day of Day, Anno Domíní, 1716. And continued by Prorogations to Wednesday the 7th Day of Dovember next after, and then Met.

Message to His Excellency the Governour, by Elisha Cooke and Charles Chambers Esqrs. That a Quorum of the House are now met, and ready to proceed to the business of the Session.

A Message from His Excellency the Governour by Addington Davenport Esq; That the House forthwith Attend him in the Council Chamber.

Mr. Speaker, and the House went up accordingly. And His Excellency made a Speech to the Court; and gave a Copy thereof to Mr. Speaker, who with the House, return'd to their own Chamber.

His Excellency's Speech Read, and is as follows: viz.

GENTLEMEN,

H IS Majesty having been pleas'd to appoint Me His Governour of New-England; I am by the good Providence of GOD arriv'd here, with the firmest Resolution to study the true Interests of this Province, and to promote them to the utmost of my Power.

You have always been distinguish'd by a due Regard to Religion and Vertue; to advance which shall be my first and principal Care, and I desire your Assistance in it.

It's my Lot to enter upon the Government at a Time when your Commerce (a very Important Article of a Peoples Happiness) is under a great Discouragement by a universal want of Money, which is the Medium of Trade.

I must therefore Recommend it to you, as a Matter worthy your greatest Application, to find out some effectual Measures to supply this Want, and thereby to restore Trade to a flourishing Condition, in which you shall have my best Endeavours and hearty Concurrence.

I hope I shall find no Parties or Divisions amongst you, but that the only Contention shall be, who shall best approve his Loyalty to his KING, and Love to his Country: Such a Harmony will make you very Happy, and me very Easy.

It's a great Honour and Pleasure to me, that I Serve the best of KINGS; and I assure you, His Majesty's just and mild Administration at Home, shall be the Rule of my Government here, as far as I am capable to imitate so great and perfect an Example. It is also my unspeakable Felicity and yours, that I Arrive here, when His Majesty hath entirely defeated the monstrous and unnatural Rebellion, which hath been rais'd in Great Britain: So that now His Majesty's Person and Government, their Royal Highnesses the Prince and Princess of Wales, with the whole Royal Family are secured, and in them the Protestant Religion, and the Happiness of us and our Posterity.

Gentlemen,

His Majesty has Commanded me to Acquaint you, that there is no Province in America, under the Crown of Great Britain, except this, where stated Salarys are not settled upon their Captain General & Governour, and Lieut. Governour. I was also to recommend to you the Building of a House for the Governour; but I am prevented from it, by your having provided a very good One, for which I return you my Thanks.

I am further to observe to you, that notwithstanding there was an Act Pass'd in England in Her late Majesty's Reign, for Encouraging the Importation of Naval Stores; and another for the preservation of White and other Pine Trees, growing in Her Majesty's Colonys of America; yet nevertheless, His Majesty hath been inform'd, that great Spoils are daily committed in His Woods, in the Province of Main, and other parts of the Massachusetts, by cutting down and putting to private Use, such Trees as are or maybe proper for His Majesty's Royal Navy. I am therefore Charged to Acquaint you that [34] [it] is His Majesty's Will and Pleasure, that the said Acts, and every Clause, Article and Proviso therein, be strictly and duely comply'd with: And if anything further might be done by this Government, to enforce those Acts of Parliament, and to Secure His Majesty's Masts and Timber, I most earnestly Recommend it to your Consideration; as also the Refitting the Fort of Pemaquid, or the Building of some Fort near that place, that may be a greater Security to your Frontiers.

Gentlemen,

You have always been so Conspicuous for your Loyalty, that I make no Doubt of your ready Compliance in these Matters.

Gentlemen of the House of Representatives,

I shall depend on your Care to make the necessary Supplies for the Support and Defence of the Province in all Articles: And give me leave to Conclude, by promising you, That my own private Interest shall never interfere with the Publick, which I hope may engage you to enable me to Maintain that Station with Dignity, which His Majesty has been pleas'd to honour me with.

A Tour last Meeting I was Assured by the Votes of the Lower House, That my Speech should be answered, Paragraph by Paragraph, which not having been as yet comply'd with, I was willing to give you an other Opportunity, that so I might send the Minutes of the Last Sessions to Great Britain compleat; which I am sure will be very much for the Service of this Country.

I have promised you my best endeavours to watch against every thing that may be hurtful to this Province, and therefore must acquaint you with a very Momentous Affair; which if we don't quickly arm against, will bring a Swarm of evils upon the Massachusetts, and must in the end point to its Destruction: I mean the Intolerable Discount upon your Paper Money, which is the more surprizing because these Bills are supported with double their value upon Land Security.

I own some part of this Community can fence against this evil, and ward it off from themselves, by advancing their Commodities: but the other part must unavoidably suffer. All Rents must fall of consequence, and what will your Ministers do, who are highly Worthy of their Salaries, how heavy will it fall upon them and their Families, when what they are paid in grows Low in Value; and their necessaries for Life are daily advancing?

I do therefore earnestly Recommend this to your serious Consideration, and make no doubt but every Person who is a Lover of his Country, will set his Head at work to

find out some expedient to stop this Deluge; and am sure that they who are so happy to fix their Dam against it, will well deserve the Name of true Patriots.

Gentlemen of the House of Representatives,

I shall conclude by Recommending Unanimity and Dispatch in this Session, because I believe, the Season of the Year will require you to be at home, to attend your own Private Affairs.

Ordered, That Oliver Noyes, Elisha Cooke, William Payne, Charles Chambers, and Samuel Thaxter, Esqrs; with such as the Honourable Board shall join, be a Committee in the recess of this Court, to consider that part of His Excellency's Speech, which relates to the Discount upon the Bills of Publick Credit; and report such Expedients as they think will be most effectual to preserve and maintain the Credit and Value of the said Bills, at the Sessions in May next.

Sent up for Concurrence.

Ordered, That Mr. William Denison be added to the Committee appointed to consider His Excellency's Speech at the last Sessions, &c.

, Mr. Stoddard from the Committee appointed further to consider His Excel-

lency's Speech at the last Sessions, brought in their Report, which was Read and Accepted by the House, and accordingly,

Ordered, That a Message be sent up to His Excellency the Governour,

That upon a further Consideration of His Excellency's Speech to this Court at the beginning of the last Sessions, the House are humbly of Opinion.

That Considering the low Circumstances of this Province, and the heavy Debts that are upon it; that His Majesty's Subjects here are not able to come into so great a Charge, as the Rebuilding the Fort at *Pemaquid* would be. And that in case of a Rupture, a Fortification there, would be no great security to the Lives and Estates of His Majesty's Subjects here: as our past Experience hath abundantly convinced us, by reason that *Pemaquid* is at so great a distance from our English Settlements. But that at all times what shall be necessary for the Defence and Preservation of the Government here, We, as Good and Loyal Subjects, shall readily and chearfully comply with.

That considering our Constitution, it will not be for His Majesty's Service, nor for the Good and Advantage of His Subjects here, to have fixt and stated Salaries; but that we shall very readily do, according to our Ability, what shall be proper and necessary for the Support of His Majesty's Government over us.

That this Court at their last Session did fully consider of what His Excellency said, relating to the Preservation of the Pine Trees. And were then, and still are, humbly of Opinion, That they are secured, both by a late Law for their Preservation, as well as by the Interest of all with whom they grow; their Value being many times more, when improved for Masts, than in any other way.

A Message from the Board by Andrew Belcher and Adam Winthrop Esqrs; That the time for which Ten Soldiers were Posted at Northfield, being Expired, His Excellency and Council on the 13th of March last, did upon Application made to them; That there was a necessity of their being further continued, Order their Continuance till this Session; and now Propose it to the House, to consider what is further proper to be done therein.

Voted, That Ten Soldiers be allowed and continued in the Publick Pay for the covering and encouraging of the Settlement at the Town of Northfield, until the Session of this Court in May next.

Sent up for Concurrence.

A Petition of John Pickering and 217 others, Inhabitants of the Town of Salem, presented to the House and Read, praying an Explanation of the Law relating to the Division of Common Lands in Towns.

And the Question being put, Whether the Prayer of the Petition be Granted? It pass'd in the Negative.

Since Your EXCELLENCYS Happy Arrival to us, This is the First Opportunity of an Annual and General CONVENTION, which the Ministers of the Gospel in this Province could Enjoy, to Express our grateful Sense of the Happiness, which we have therein received.

An Happiness whereinto we have been indeed most agreeably Surprized, by the Providence of our Glorious LORD, who has with most Remarkable Circumstances herein testified His Tender Care of His Flocks in the Wilderness.

But this Delay of a Duty, whereto we had the most Early as well as the most Hearty Dispositions, has only Enabled us now to Speak with Experience, what we could before have Spoken only with Expectation; and to say, The One Half has not been told us.

Your EXCELLENCY having honourably spent your Younger Years in the Armies which bravely fought for the Glorious Cause of Rescuing the Liberties of Europe and of Mankind, from the Chains which the most famous of all Tyrants designed for them, does not now wear your Laurels in an Unserviceable Retirement; But you have been generously Willing to devote your later Years, to the Publick Service in a Care for the Good of Others. Gentlemen,

We are now by the favour of GOD arrived to your Anniversary Court of Election, which I perswade my Self is so much the pleasanter to you, by the removal of some fears that you may have lately had of being deprived of so valuable a Privilege. GOD Almighty long continue your Religious and Civil Rights and Liberties; with Wisdom so to improve them, that they may never be forfeited. And I assure you Gentlemen as on my part, that nothing shall be wanting, so I shall always be pleas'd with Opportunities and Occasions, to secure & advance, your best Interest. And therefore if any thing this Sessions may be thought of for the further Service of your Religion, Learning, the Peace and Prosperity of the Province in General, the advancement of your Trade & Manufactures in special, I shall most sincerely and affectionately come into it, and the rather, because I am so commanded by Instructions from His Most Excellent Majesty, of whose gracious Protection & Favour I may adventure to give you the utmost Assurance.

You cannot have forgot that upon my Arrival, I Congratulated you, upon His Majesty's happy deliverance from an unnatural Rebellion at Home, I must now give you Joy upon a like gracious and wonderful deliverance from an Intended Invasion from Abroad; And which, I hope, will be the last Effort of Wicked and Unreasonable Men against Our Most Rightful, Gracious, Soveraign Lord, the KING, and His Illustrious Family, as also against His Most Wise, Just and Happy Government.

I am also very glad to acquaint you that by Letters from Our Agent, and Others, we have great reason to hope that the Parliament of Great Britain are Inclinable, and have it actually under consideration, how that part of the Trade of this Country which consists of Masts, Boards, Hemp, with other Naval Stores, may be encouraged, and

rather at this present Juncture, by reason of the Unjust & Surprizing Intended Invasion from Sweden, which we have lately had the News of. Upon which occasion you will do well to consider what may be done by the Government here as to that Matter, It being as well for the Service of His Majesty's Navy at Home as the great advancement of Our Interest here.

It was but the Last Sessions that I mentioned the keeping up of the Credit of your Publick Bills; and yet, I cannot forbear repeating it now again to you, it being a Mat-

ter of so great an Importance to the Province.

Gentlemen of the House of Representatives,

The Support of the Government in all the Branches of it, being a Matter that more particularly belongs to and of right begins with you: I must recommend that in an especial Manner to your thought & care, not doubting but that you will always make the proper & necessary Provision, and do it with so much Honour & Justice, as that there may be no reason to complain. It also appertains to you with great Care & Justice to examine into all the Publick Debts that are due & owing from the Province, and see that they be well & seasonably discharged. And tho' it be a time of Peace with respect to our Neighbours the French & Indians, yet, considering the uncertainty of its continuance, and the Annoyance we have lately had from the worst of Enemy's the Pirates that have lately insulted our Coast, you will be of Opinion with me, that it will be very proper & necessary to put such Fortifications as we have yet remaining into some good posture of Defence: And also to have some Effectual Provision in readiness to Secure our Sea Coast and Trading Places, from such Danger & Violence by the way of the Sea.

Gentlemen,

I think I have nothing farther in particular to recommend to you, but that you will apply your Selves to the business of this Sessions with great calmness & moderation, diligence & unanimity and a single aim at the Publick Good, and give every thing the proper Dispatch, that so you may the sooner return to your own private and necessary Affairs.

May it please Your Excellency,

E His Majesty's Loyal and Dutiful Subjects the Representatives of the Province of the *Massechusetts-Bay*, now in General Court Assembled, as well for our Selves, as in the Name of the People we Represent, Do with great Sincerity, Duty and Thankfulness Acknowledge your Excellency's great Respect, Favour, Care and Affection expressed to us, and to our Country, in your Speech to the General Assembly, in this your first Meeting them at a Session for the Anniversary Election of Councellors.

Nothing could have laid us under greater and more endearing Obligations, than your Excellency's affectionate Expressions, and Assurances with reference to our *Religious* and *Civil Rights*, *Liberties* and *Privileges*; and that your Excellency hath so much at heart the true Valuable, and best Interest of this Country, as if it had been indeed your Own.

We gladly take this Publick Occasion to Testify our Gratitude, first to Almighty GOD, and then to Our most gracious Soveraign Lord the KING, under whose happy Reign, and your Excellency's good Government, We hope to enjoy those inestimable Blessings for many Years to come; that so we and our Posterity, may be leading quiet and peaceable Lives in all Godliness and Honesty, and thereby approve our selves to be such as Fear GOD, and Honour the KING.

We greatly Rejoyce with your Excellency in the good Tidings, We have from time to time, of the Remarkable Protections, and Blessings of Heaven, upon His Sacred Majesty and His Illustrious Family, and His Wise and Just Governmen

And we thankfully Accept your Excellency's Exhortation to Moderation, Unanimity, Publick Spiritedness, and Expedition in the business of this Session, and shall endeavour to put it in Practice accordingly.

To which His Excellency was pleased to Reply, as follows, viz.

Gentlemen,

Y Our Answer to My Speech is so Expressive of your Loyalty and Duty to the KING, and His Illustrious House; as is also your joyning your Congratulations and Acknowledgments with Mine in owning the Signal Hand of Divine Providence, in the timely discovery of the horrid Swedish Conspiracy against His Maj-

esty's Sacred Person, and His Royal Family; that you must give Me leave to Assure you, That they are the Most agreeable Topicks upon which you cou'd Speak.

As to what you so kindly mention in reference to My Self and My Administration, it shall carry its just weight with it, and it will induce Me to give you constant Proofs that My Words and Actions shall never jarr.

I am glad of this Opportunity to Return you My hearty Thanks for this your Agreeable Answer.

And then the House return'd to their own Chamber. [10]

A Petition of Elizabeth Hobart, Widow relict of Jer. Hobart, late of Haddam, Clerk, Deceased, presented to the House and Read, praying that 600 Acres of Land Granted in May 1679. to Mr. Samuel Whiting, Sen. of Lynn, which now belongs to the Petitioner, may be laid out in some Unappropriated Land of this Province.

But that the Matter of the Complaint in the Petition of ——— Pease, upon which a Hearing was Granted, is accommodated.

Mr. Speaker and the House went up accordingly; And the Attorney, for the *English* Inhabitants of *Nantucket*, prayed to have further Day given them, not being fully prepared for the Hearing. Whereupon the Parties were ordered to withdraw.

And the House Return'd to their own Chamber to Consider of the said Motion. And after Debate,

Ordered, That a Message be sent up to the Honourable Board by Col. Thaxter, and Mr. Turner, That this House see no reason to comply with the said Motion, for Deferring the Hearing: But are of the Mind that the Hearing ought now to proceed, the Respondents to the Petition having had sufficient time to prepare their answer.

A Message brought unto the House, That the English Inhabitants of Nantucket were content that the Hearing should now proceed.

Mr. Speaker and the House went up again to the Council Chamber. And when both Parties had been fully heard Return'd to their own Chamber.

A Message from His Excellency the Governour by Penn Townsend,

and John Wheelright Esqrs; That the House do now attend him in the Council Chamber.

Mr. Speaker and the House went up accordingly. And his Excellency made a Speech to the Court, and gave a Copy thereof to Mr. Speaker, who with the House return'd to their own Chamber.

His Excellency's Speech Read, and is as follows, viz.

GENTLEMEN,

SINCE our Last Sessions, upon the Advice of the Council and at the pressing Instance of the Eastern Indians, I have been at the Island of Arrowsick, where I met with a considerable Body of the Indians of those Parts with their Sachems, and have in His Majesty's Name ratified & confirmed the former Treaty's of Pacification; and accepted their Submission, with promises of Allegiance to King GEORGE, and very great Assurances of Peace, Friendship and Faithfulness to this Government: As you will find by an account of that Transaction to be laid before you, so that I hope by the favour of GOD, we may depend upon having Peace in our Borders, if we on our part are but wise for our Selves and just to them.

I have very lately, Pursuant to the Act of Parliament, for the Suppression of Piracy, and a Commission founded thereon, and inrolled in this Province, with His Majesty's Proclamation in the beginning of His happy Reign, as also His most Express Instructions to Me for that purpose, Opened and Held a Special Court of Admiralty, for the Tryal of the Pirates we have had so long in Prison; And I doubt not, but that the great Care, Zeal and Justice of the Court in that Matter, will very much repute and Honour us, and have a good tendency to prevent the like Piracy's for the future.

I have no late Commands from His Majesty to lay before you at this time, so that you will have the greater leasure to attend and sooner finish the Ordinary Affairs of the Province, and this being your usual time of the Year for it, I hope you will apply your Selves to the consideration and dispatch thereof accordingly, and therein, not suffer your Selves to be delay'd, hindred or diverted by the Affairs, Designs or Insinuations of any private particular Persons, but be always and wholly Imployed in the general Affairs of the Government and Province, and also Animated and Acted by a Publick Spirit, wherein you shall always have my ready and sincere Incouragement and Concurrence.

A Number Sufficient to Constitute a House not Appearing, Mr. Speaker Issued his Warrant to the Representatives of the Towns of Sherborn, Medfield, Wrentham, Bradford, Haverhill, Salisbury, Plympton, Bridgwater, Middleborough, Rochester and Dartmouth, requiring them forthwith to Attend his Majesties Service in the House.

Mr. Secretary Willard, came in and Acquainted the Members present, That his Excellency the Governour, had by and with the Advice of the Councill, Prorogued the Court by a Proclamation till to Morrow Morning Ten a clock in the forenoon.

R. Speaker Sent a Message to his Excellency the Governour, by Mr. Remington, Col. Thaxter, Mr. Lindal and Col. Somersby, to Acquaint him that a Quorum of the House are now Met, ready to attend the Business of the Session.

His Excellency's Speech Read, and is as follows, viz.

GENTLEMEN,

Had not given You or myself the Trouble of a Winter Sessions, but that thro' the Providence of GOD in the late Sickness, We were obliged to break up the last Sessions, before some Affairs of Importance were finished; and among others a Pro-

posal that was then made for some Additional building to your College at Cambridge. I doubt not but that it is very acceptable to you to hear the Sons of the Prophets say, The Place where we dwell is too streight for us! You are very much in the right to have the Interest of Learning much at heart: And therefore, if any further Buildings for that purpose be intended the next Summer, You must make the proper Provision for it this Sessions.

I am glad to find the Trading part as well as the Gentlemen of the Country begin generally to be convinced, that as it was only the Necessity, and great Emergency of our Affairs, that brought us into a Paper Credit; so we shall never be upon a firm and lasting Foundation, till we Recover and Return to Silver and Gold, the only true Species of Money. And to that End I would propose it to your consideration, whether a certain Clause in the late Act, for Emitting a Hundred Thousand Pounds; whereby the Commissioners are directed to let out any of the Principal Money of the Loan, after it is once paid into the Treasury, unless Repealed or Altered, will not have a Tendency to prolong the Inconvenience we Complain of. [46]

I don't intend by mentioning these particulars to confine you to them; but if any thing else of Importance, and for His Majesty's Service, and the Interest of the Government, come before You it will I doubt not, meet with a just consideration.

I have been inform'd that vast quantities of Deer were destroyed last Winter, and also in this, even when the Skins and Flesh were not worth fetching: If you don't design they should be entirely Destroyed, some Law must be made, for the preventing them from being killed for a few Years, and a weighty Fine laid upon the Offenders.

I shall only add, that I design it for a short Sessions, and therefore hope You'l give every thing its proper Dispatch.

Ordered, That a Message be sent up to the Board by Capt. Wadsworth, and Mr. Tay, moving that a Day of publick Fasting with Prayer, be Appointed and Solemnized throughout the Several Towns of this Province, upon the various occasions thereof, particularly the Epidemical mortal Fever that is in most of them.






