


THEY GO TO SCHOOL

It is eight thirty. Everywhere the city's transportation system is hustling and bustling, getting the boys and girls to school. It is in the day of the Gibson Girl, with huge bustles which sway in the opposite direction from which the girls walk. It is the day in which mother goes bicycling when women's skirts sweep the ground; when the young gentlemen wear derbies, and sport moustaches; when the wind can't get skirts much above the ankles, —such "exposé" receives the appreciative whistle of the young blades of the day,—that is, those who dare!

School girls have long braids with big bows on the back of their heads. They wear middy-blouses and straight skirts, and narrow pointed shoes, which are buttoned or laced high in the wintertime.

Attired in such fashion, Adelle, Evelyn, Adeline, and their crowd have just gotten off the horse drawn trolley. Walking up Greenough Avenue to the school, they greet Lillian, then hasten to the locker room. There goes the bell for classes.

It is now the last period, and the coming Seventeenth Reunion, a formal dance at Eliot Hall has everyone excited all over the school.

"How are you going to get there?"

Ah, that is the question. There are the victorias and phaetons which look somewhat like stage coaches without the exquisite occessories. Then there are, of course, those new electric cars — the horseless carriages, but few there are who can aspire to this elegance. Can you imagine putting on one of those long canvas-like coats over your dreamy pink satin gown, with what appears to be a turkish towel turban around your hair, which takes you an hour and a half to fix? This headgear, plus a down-to ground "duster", are the things for riding when all cars and corriages are open and all roads dusty, — except when they are deep in mud.

Dismissal bell, and off to ice skating go the crowd. Just let's see you try one of those new fangled spins and whirls ending with a graceful glide and back kick. Ha! Ha! Can you just picture it? Well, you better try; for it is, in short, fifty years ago—the year, 1900.

THEY STUDY

The girls go to Curtis Hall to drill and do gymnastics. The young ladies, uniformed in blue middy blouses with black Windsor ties, pleated bloomers down to their knees, and long black cotton stockings, jump, walk the plank line, suspend themselves overhead, and then dance gracefully the measures of a waltz.

A soapy smell drifts from the chemistry laboratory. Inside, the girls are making colored soap, the boys are making gases. Often the smell of the gases forces the class and teacher out of the laboratory and into the corridor (I wonder, though, if it really is an accident.)

In the English classes enunciation and diction are greatly stressed, as is spelling. Penmanship is very important too, and everyone has to use the Spencerian handwriting to receive good marks.

Mr. Mann, the principal, conducts the French class and is very strict with his pupils. German, Spanish and Latin are taught, too, in the regular course. Singing is also a part of the curriculum.

Some of the girls, after bringing written permission of their parents, attend the Home Science classes. This course consists of home furnishing, use of cellar, kitchen and pantries; Daily Care of the House, which presents the problems of "dust, dirt, and danger". Food, including diets, "The five food principles, their sources and their uses in the human body"; Hygiene and Public Health, teaching the disposal of refuse. This course is assuredly of great benefit to the future home-maker of Jamaica Plain!

Algebra, geometry, and physics are additional subjects taught. There is a commercial course, but few students take it.

Football is a popular sport and the girls are always there, cheering.

THEY HAVE GAY PARTIES

Sleighrides, hayrides, and toboggan parties are common, and there are many house to house parties, as everyone in the class knows everyone else.

There are two formal dances every winter,

held either at Eliot Hall or Curtis Hall. When one enters the hall one has to meet the matrons, say "How do you do?", and curtsey. The boy that the girl comes with, receives the first and last dances, and the ones before and after intermission. The girls carry fans and whoever has her card filled with names first.

is considered the most popular girl. Dances

are conducted in a dignified manner.

The most important event of the school year is the Officers' Dance which is held after competitive drill. At one thirty P. M. the cadets, dressed in spick-and-span white duck trousers and blue jackets go on the floor to go through their paces before an appreciative audience of their friends. The floor is then cleared for dancing, which lasts until about six o'clock. At this delightful affair, cadets from Lynn, Medford, and other high schools in and around Boston are present. "A reception at the hands of the matrons" . . . "preceded the dancing, the guests being introduced by the officers of the occasion".

During the intermission, refreshments are served, and "the approach of evening closes the gaities of the day".

Another enjoyable occasion is the annual reunion. This is one of the few times when all the past and present graduates are able to exchange greetings. The students attend in formal dress. After a short program and refreshments, dancing is enjoyed for the rest of the evening. (And with what skill they execute the steps, which seem to us so intricate. Remember the times you have staggered around the gym with two left feet, trying in vain to acquire the grace and dexterity necessary for the old time dances?)

This year we were generously entertained by a comedian, a concert, an educational science program, and a variety show. Honor roll cards were given out in the hall this year also.

Until I get my crystal ball adjusted to read the future, I can only say that the Senior Prom on May 12 promises to be a big success and a memorable one, and that we are determined to capture a prize in the street parade this year. The ball is hazy again, but we know and hope that fifty years from now we can look back without a crystal on our fine times at Jamaica Plain.




