- **4** Washington's First Constitution, 1878, may now be had in separate form. The installments of the proceedings of the Walla Walla convention and of the document itself, edited by Edmond S. Meany, Professor of History and John T. Condon. Dean of the Law School, University of Washington, are combined in a single book. It is for sale by the Printing Department, University of Washington, Seattle. Only 250 copies are printed and the price is placed at fifty cents a copy simply to cover the cost. The book will be found valuable for a comparative study with the present constitution.
- Those who have suggested names of places to the United States Geographic Board will find an important series of decisions in this issue of the Quarterly.
- The spirit of co-operation among the workers in history in the Pacific Northwest is revealed by aid received from George H. Hines of the Oregon Historical Society, W. P. Bonner of the Washington State Historical Society and William S. Lewis and Jacob A. Meyers of the Eastern Washington State Historical Society.
