JUDICIAL CRIMINAL STATISTICS, 1940

INTRODUCTION

Twenty-seven States, including the District of Columbia, cooperated with the Bureau of the Census in furnishing reports of defendants in criminal cases disposed of in courts having original felony jurisdiction, during the year 1940. This is the ninth year in which the judicial criminal statistics collection has been made by the Bureau of the Census. The first collection in 1932 included reports from 16 States, 24 States furnished information for 1933, 27 for 1934, 30 for 1935 and 1936, 29 for 1937, 27 for 1938, and 25 for 1939. The two States returned to the 1940 collection were California and Indiana.

Scope of statistics.—The judicial criminal statistics gathered by the Bureau of the Census are limited for the most part to statistics of criminal defendants disposed of by courts of general jurisdiction. Under the judicial organization of most States, there is a court of general jurisdiction in each county that has authority to try and dispose of all serious or felony offenses and of such minor or misdemeanor offenses as are not within the exclusive jurisdiction of inferior courts. Thus any offender charged with a felony will be tried in a court of general jurisdiction, although he may have a preliminary examination in a minor court. In a few States, the power to try and dispose of felony charges has been extended in certain instances, to minor courts, such as municipal and county courts.

While most offenders convicted of felony charges are disposed of by courts of general jurisdiction, this does not mean that all felony charges are finally disposed of in these courts. Many offenders arrested on felony charges are finally disposed of in minor courts, either by the dismissal of the charge at the preliminary examination or by the reduction of the charge to a misdemeanor that is within the jurisdiction of the minor court. This means that statistics gathered mainly from courts of general jurisdiction fall far short of accounting for the prosecution of all offenders charged with felonies. Not until judicial criminal statistics can cover all action taken in a criminal case from the point of arrest or the filing of the first charge to final disposition, will there be data available to give us an adequate picture of the administration of criminal justice.

Methods of collection. - The judicial criminal statistics collected by the Bureau of the Census are based on annual reports made by the clerks of court on a uniform tally sheet supplied by the Bureau of the Census. This provides for the tallying of all defendants disposed of during the year, by offense and method of disposition, and for the tallying of all persons convicted, by offense for which convicted and by sentence imposed. The 1940 data were collected by this tally-sheet method in 22 of the 27 States. In two of these 22 States, Michigan and Pennsylvania, a summary tally sheet was prepared from the clerks' reports and submitted to the Bureau by central agencies: The Department of Correction in Michigan and the Department of Welfare in Pennsylvania. Reports were received from Massachusetts and New York on the basis of the reporting forms used by the Departments of Correction in those States. For the Dis-trict of Columbia, Minnesota, and 74 of the 88 Ohio counties, the data were reported by means of individual-case cards.

Tally-sheet Method

The accuracy of the data reported on the tally sheets necessarily depends on the care with which clerks of court enter the tally marks in accordance with the instructions furnished them. The fact that instructions are necessarily general in order to apply to many jurisdictions, that most clerks of court are exceedingly busy officials usually without sufficient clerical assistance, and that they are asked to make these reports voluntarily without compensation or other assistance, means that the tally sheets are not always made out with the care desired.

The task of making up an annual tallysheet report from the court records is not
a simple one. Court dockets and registers
have been evolved primarily for reference
purposes. They are not uniform from county
to county or from court to court. They are
not always uniform within the same county
and court, as newly elected clerks may make
changes in the detail recorded in their
books. The classification of cases according to offense and particular method of disposition or type of sentence also is quite

difficult, and inasmuch as different clerks have different ideas as to how an offender should be classified, there is a resulting lack of uniformity in the data reported. There is seldom any other summary of court dispositions available with which to compare the tally made on the census schedules. Even if another summary were available, it probably would not be based on the same terms or units as the census reports. Further, if errors have been made in the process of tallying, there is no way to check or eliminate them except to repeat the entire process.

Case-card Method

A new method of collecting judicial criminal statistics on the basis of individual-case reports was tried out in 1937 in Ohio, Minnesota, and the District of Columbia, and was continued during 1938, 1939, and 1940. Under this system the clerks of court fill out a standard card furnishing a summary of the action taken in each case filed and disposed of in his court. The collection, editing, and clarification of recorded data is done by a central statistical agency of the State, insuring uniform interpretation of the data reported. The cards are forwarded annually to the Bureau where they are coded and tabulated.

This method is far more flexible than the tally-sheet method because it makes possible a more intensive analysis of the data collected and can be adapted quite easily to the particular record-keeping routines used by the different clerks of court. As more work is required to tabulate, analyze, and summarize reports collected under the individual-case method, it would be difficult for the Bureau to undertake detailed supervision of such reports from a large number of States. Having tested the practicability of the individual-case method, the Census Bureau would encourage the establishment of State statistical bu-reaus or agencies for the collection of judicial criminal statistics. Such an agency could adapt the system to the particular laws, procedure, and practice of the State and make a much more detailed analysis of the statistics collected than could a national agency attempting to deal with all States. The development of a satisfactory national system of judicial criminal statistics will depend to a large extent on the successful establishment and operation of such State bureaus.

Limitations of the statistics.—There wide differences to be found between States both in the organization of the general trial courts and in the particular jurisdiction possessed by them. It will be noted in table 9 of this report (page 10) that the 1940 statistics were collected

from several different kinds of courts and occasionally from two or three types within a single State. While most States have a single type of court of general jurisdiction, in some States special jurisdiction to dispose of felony offenses has been given to courts that otherwise would be classified as courts of limited jurisdiction. In Vermont, for instance, the county courts are the general trial courts of the State and have complete power to dispose of felony cases. However, the municipal courts of that State have been granted power to dis-pose of felony cases where the defendant pleads guilty. As most of the felony cases are disposed of by pleas of guilty in the municipal courts, it is necessary to collect statistics from both types of courts in Vermont to obtain adequate coverage of the felony convictions in that State.

There may be a great deal of variance in the extent of jurisdiction possessed by the general trial courts even within a single State. These courts have essentially a residual jurisdiction, that is, they handle and dispose of all types of cases that are not specifically given over to some other court for disposal. In some States this jurisdiction is divided between general trial courts and minor courts, having concurrent jurisdiction over misdemeanors. Frequently, in metropolitan counties the court of general jurisdiction will handle only felony cases, as the authority to dispose of all misdemeanor cases has been granted exclusively to the municipal court of the main city in the county. In the same State, however, the general trial courts in the rural counties will handle not only felony cases, but also a large number of misdemeanor cases that are not disposed of by local justices of the peace. There are, therefore, some very real difficulties in comparison of these statistics. As has been the case each year since 1935, summary and comparative analysis of State material is limited to the major offense categories. It is thought that this method eliminates a great deal of variability in the statistics that would otherwise result from the widely differing jurisdiction over criminal cases of the reporting courts.

There are no refinements of selection, however, which will make up for the fact that these statistics do not embody the results of the early stages of prosecution of felony cases. In many counties large numbers of offenders arrested and charged with felonies are eliminated or disposed of on reduced charges in municipal or other minor courts before the cases ever reach the general trial courts, whereas in other counties very few felony cases will be disposed of in the minor courts, and the number of cases appearing in the trial courts will be, by comparison, exceedingly large. Consequently,

it is impossible to assume that statistics of courts of general jurisdiction fully account for prosecution practices. This fact limits the conclusions that may be drawn concerning variations in procedural and sentencing practices from State to State.

ANALYSIS OF 1940 DATA

Disposition and sentence, by States.—
The 1940 report consists principally of summaries for each of the 27 cooperating States. For 26 States it was possible to present a 4-year comparison showing, for major offenses, the number of defendants disposed of, by type of disposition and sentence. any comparisons that might be made between States, for reasons already outlined.

The first four tables present the summary data on disposition and sentence, by States. Tables 5 to 8, inclusive, present the same information for the 27 States combined, by offense.

bined, by offense.

Table 1¹ shows, by States, the number and proportion of defendants charged with major offenses who were eliminated without conviction, and the number and proportion convicted. The proportion of defendants eliminated without conviction ranges from 35.8 in Indiana to 4.8 in Rhode Island, and conversely the proportion convicted ranges from 95.2 in Rhode Island to 64.2 in Indiana. For the 27 States taken individually, the median proportion convicted is 81.2 percent.

Table 2 shows the number and proportion of defendants eliminated without conviction for each of the three types of elimination: (1) dismissed and other no-penalty dispositions, (2) acquitted by court after waiver of jury trial, and (3) acquitted by jury. Dismissals and other no-penalty dispositions account for the great majority of defendants eliminated, ranging from 93.6 percent in Wisconsin to 44.4 percent in Massachusetts. The median proportion dismissed for the 27 States taken individually is 81.3 percent. It will be noted that in several States there were no acquittals by court after waiver of jury trial. In most of these States this is due to the fact that there is no legal provision for waiver of jury trial in a felony case. The proportion of defendants eliminated who were acquitted by jury ranges from 44.6 percent in Utah to 2.6 percent in Indiana. The median proportion of defendants acquitted by jury for the 27 States is 16.4 percent.

Table 3 shows the number and proportion of convictions for each of the three types of conviction: (1) plea of guilty, (2) conviction by court after waiver of jury trial, and (3) jury verdict of guilty. usual, a plea of guilty was the predominant method of reaching a conviction. The proportion of convictions resulting from pleas of guilty ranges from 98.9 percent in Rhode Island to 76.8 percent in Pennsylvania. The median percentage for the 26 States taken individually is 89.6 percent. (Data method of conviction were not available for New York State.) Jury verdicts of guilty accounted for 19.4 percent of all convictions in Utah and 1.1 percent in Rhode Island. The median proportion of convictions by jury among the 26 States is 6.1 percent. Table 4 shows, for each of the 27

States, the number and percent of those convicted and sentenced, by type of sentence imposed. In Montana, 77.5 percent of the defendants sentenced for major offenses received a prison sentence, while Pennsylvania, at the other end of the scale, showed only 13.1 percent of those convicted as sentenced to prison or death. For the 27 States, the median proportion of convicted defendants receiving a prison or death sentence is 47.8 percent. Probation was used most extensively in Rhode Island, where 74.1 percent were reported as being placed on probation or given a suspended sentence. This is not surprising since Rhode Island law permits defendants to waive indictment by the grand jury and plead nolo contendre. Such defendants very frequently receive a deferred sentence. Probation was used next most extensively in New Hampshire where 53.0 percent of convicted defendants received such treatment. North Dakota reported the

least use of this type of sentence with 11.7 percent, while the median percentage of the 27 States is 32.1. Pennsylvania reported the highest proportion of jail sentences, and Wyoming reported the lowest. The median percentage of defendants sentenced to jail is 13.5.

Disposition and sentence, by offense.—
In interpreting the data presented in tables 5 to 8, showing disposition and sentence by offense, for the 27 States combined, it must be remembered that a few States account for most of the cases reported and that the practices followed in those States in regard to both disposition and sentence influence dominantly the results shown in these tables. Five States, Pennsylvania, New York, New Jersey, California, and Ohio, account for about 3/5 (61.2 percent) of the cases covered, while the other 22 States account for the remainder.

Table 5 shows the number of defendants

disposed of in the 27 States and those eliminated and convicted in each offense group. Burglary, auto theft, violating drug laws, forgery and counterfeiting, and lareeny, except auto theft, show, in that order, the highest proportions of convictions, while manslaughter and aggravated assault show the lowest proportions.

Table 6 shows, by offense, the number and percent of defendants eliminated in the 27 States for each of the three types of elimination. Defendants charged with forgery and counterfeiting show the highest proportion of eliminations by dismissal and lowest proportion of acquittals by jury. Defendants charged with manslaughter show the lowest proportion of eliminations by dismissals, but those charged with murder show the highest proportion of acquittals

by jury.

Table 7 shows, for each offense group, the number and percent of defendants convicted and sentenced in 26 States by type of conviction. Forgery and counterfeiting, auto theft, and burglary are the offense groups showing the highest proportion of convictions by plea of guilty; and murder, assault, and manslaughter are those showing the lowest. Murder and manslaughter, however, show the highest proportions of convictions by jury verdict.

Table 8 shows, for each offense group,

Table 8 shows, for each offense group, the number and percent of defendants convicted and sentenced in the 27 States, by type of sentence imposed. As might be expected, nearly all persons convicted of murder were given a death or prison sentence Of the 483 defendants shown in the table as

receiving death or prison sentences for murder, 62 were given the death sentence. Probation and suspended sentence were used most frequently for those defendants convicted of embezzlement and fraud, auto theft, and receiving stolen property. The offense groups showing the highest proportions of defendants given jail sentences were violating drug laws, and carrying, etc., weapons.

As already pointed out, all reports received in the Census Bureau's collection of judicial criminal statistics are made voluntarily, and in some of the 22 States reporting by the tally-sheet method reports were not received from all clerks of court. Table 9 shows, by States, the total number of counties and the number of courts, by type, that furnished statistics for 1940 and the percentage of the population in each State that resides within the jurisdiction

of the reporting courts, as based on the 1940 Census.

Table 10 presents the number of defendants convicted of all offenses who were reported as sentenced to adult State prisons and reformatories as compared with the total number admitted to adult State prisons and reformatories from the courts. As might be expected, court sentence and prison-reformatory admission figures are not identical. For 14 States more persons are reported admitted to prisons and reformatories than are reported as sentenced, whereas in 13 States the converse is true.

In only 3 States (the District of Columbia, Minnesota, and Ohio) is there a rigid check on the accuracy of court statistics. Elsewhere errors are possible through omissions, repetition, and misclassification of offense or disposition. Discrepancies

other than simple mistakes between judicial and prison reports fall into two groups. The first may be called minor and normal. These would include discrepancies induced by time lag between sentence and receipt at prison, granting of stay of execution or appeal after sentence, death or hospitalization of sentenced defendants, commitment to prison as probation violators of persons given probation, and incomplete judicial reporting. The major discrapancies appear in those jurisdictions in which the reporting courts try considerable numbers of defendants who are not imprisoned in reporting institutions if sentenced or where appreciable numbers of prisoners admitted were sentenced by courts having primarily or exclusively misdemeanor jurisdiction.

The prison reports indicate that Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Connecticut, New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Ohio, Mich-

ciable numbers of misdemeanor prisoners. Many of these are committed by minor courts not covered in Judicial Criminal reporta. In addition, the Ohio Reformatory received 89 prisoners on commitments from juvenile courts. On the other hand, Massachusetts and Indiana put some prisoners in penal farms not included in prison reports and the District of Columbia has some prisoners incarcerated in various Federal penitentia-ries. Comparisons for California, Michigan, and Vermont are invalidated by incomplete coverage. Probation violations are an important factor in the discrepancies in the States of Minnesota, Ohio, Pennsylvania, and New York.

offenders in courts of general jurisdiction as were found in the analysis of the 1935, 1936, 1937, 1938, and 1939 data. As in 1939, the 1940 report is presented chiefly as a brief summary of the statistical data collected from the cooperating States. The reader is referred to the reports of 1935 and 1936 fora more comprehensive discussion of the scope of these statistics and the methods and limitations of their collection, as well as for detailed analysis of the data collected.

It is again emphasized that comparisons between States should be made only with extreme caution and that probably no general conclusions concerning differences in the prosecution practices of the States can justifiably be based on the variations observed in the statistics of this report. The most valuable comparisons are to be foundin each State summary which shows, for defendants

charged with major offenses, the distribution of sentences and dispositions for the years 1937, 1938, 1939, and 1940.

Again in 1940, as in the past years, these statistics indicate that from 70 to 80 percent of all defendants prosecuted for major offenses in the courts of general jurisdiction were convicted. About seventenths of those eliminated without conviction were eliminated by dismissal of the charges against them. Pleas of guilty accounted for between 80 and 90 percent of all convictions. Slightly over one-sixth of the defendants prosecuted in the trial courts were disposed of by means of trial. Of the defendants convicted and sentenced, slightly more than one-third received sentences to State prisons or reformatories, and about one-third were given probation or a suspended sentence.



JUDICIAL CRIMINAL STATISTICS: CALIFORNIA, 1940

The Bureau of the Census received reports on 5,873 defendants charged with major offenses who were disposed of in the superior courts in 25 of the SS counties of California during the calendar year 1940. The publication of these statistics for 1940 has been made possible by the District Attorneys of California who prepared the reports or secured the

cooperation of the court clerks. Table 1 shows the disposition of defendants charged with major offenses for each of the last 4 years for which these statistics are available. In 1940 approximately 8 out of 10 (80.1 percent) of the total of 5,873 defendants were convicted.

Table 2 presents detailed figures of all dis-

JUDICIAL CRIMINAL STATISTICS: COLORADO, 1940

The Bureau of the Census received from the clerks of court reports on 1,327 defendants charged with major offenses who were disposed of in the district courts of 59 of the 63 counties of Colorado during the calendar year 1940.

Table 1 shows the disposition of defendants

charged with major offenses for each of the last 4 years. In 1940 approximately 8 out of every 10 (79.4 percent) of the total of 1,327 defendants were convicted.

Table 2 presents detailed figures of all dispositions in 1940, showing the method of disposition

JUDICIAL CRIMINAL STATISTICS: CONNECTICUT, 1940-1941*

The Bureau of the Census received from the clerks of court reports on 901 defendants charged with major offenses who were disposed of in the superior and common pleas courts of the 8 counties of Connecticut during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1941. Table 1 shows the disposition of defendants

charged with major offenses for each of the last 4 years. In 1940 approximately 9 out of every 10 (86.6 percent) of the total of 901 defendants were convicted.

Table 2 presents detailed figures of all dispositions in 1940, showing the method of disposition of all defendants, by offense groups.

The Bureau of the Census has announced that 1,341 defendants charged with major offenses were disposed of in the District Court of the District of Columbia during the calendar year 1940, according to data obtained from the records of the court.

Table 2 shows the disposition of defendants charged with major offenses for each of the last 4

years. In 1940 approximately 8 out of every 10 (81.1 percent) of the total of 1,341 defendants

were convicted.

Although 18 defendants were charged with first degree murder only 1 was convicted; 5 were released without conviction and 12 convicted for a lesser offense.
