## FOREWORD

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sence from this field, as a three-move composer in No. 87; and I enjoyed the highly complex humor of Gabor's No. 86. The three-movers in general are along much more intricate themes than would have been the case even a dozen years ago - but there are also delicately beautiful settings, such as Wurzburg's No. 100.

In the two-move section, the influence of recent studies of mechanisms is much in evidence. The discovery of "chain progressions" shown in Eaton's No. 22 offers wide possibilities. DeBlasio has some wonderfulty artistic renderings in the field of the Third Degree - No. 15 being a typical example. And Tump's No. 65 provides the first perfect doubling of the mechanism by two black pieces. Indeed there are problems of every calibre, from pure artistic loveliness, like Holladay's No. 51, to the highly specialized task shown in Buchwald's No. 4, where key and economy have had to be sacrificed a little to the achievement of the prize task of the year - differentiating two interferences by the Black Knight on each of three distinct lines. And finally there is the development of the concept of the changed mate, where only a few mates are modified, but these changes are done with special thematie values - as in Hassberg's No. 42. I think no one can study these problems and the others throughout the book without a sense of the leaven of thought stirring here in the United States among all our composers to-day. I wish I might see the companion voluines of the series as Eric Hassberg edits them for very many years to come.

## INTRODUCTION

This little book is designed to popularize chess problems in America. It aims to present the best work of American problemists last year. The problems were either published in 1946, or the tourney announcement or award is of this year. Only the most popular type of problems, direet mates in two or three moves, are reprodueed.

The 100 problems cover a wide variety of styles, themes and ideas, which speak volumes for the ingenuity of American eomposers. A short appreeiation of the problems is given, together with the solutions, in the back of the book.

If one or the other eomposer or solver may fail to find a problem in this book whieh he would have wished to be reprodueed here, I would like him to consider that tastes differ, and that moreover the time for the seleetion of problems for this book was very short. It is hoped that there will be another similar book next year, and eomposers and solvers are requested to submit their favorite problems for consideration to the editor at 757 Manhattan Avenue, Brooklyn 22, New York. Problems must either have been published in 1948, or awarded an honor in a 1948 tourney. No guarantee for inclusion of submitted problems can be given, and answers will be possible only if a stamped selfaddressed envelope aeeompanies the problems. Problems must be submitted by August, 1949.
