

PREFACE.

It is, I think, but fair and seemly, to express in the very forefront of these pages my most respectful gratitude to the Queen's Majesty for allowing me to dedicate to her this work. It appears to me most fitting that these records, which in a sense are Royal Records, should go forth as it were under Royal protection and patronage. When we consider how much our beloved King and Queen, as also the Prince of Wales and other members of the Royal Family, do to foster and encourage the gentle Art of music, we should indeed as a nation be proud and heartened to have such rulers and patrons.

I ought next to mention that these Records are published (and I fancy it is the first time that most of them have been brought under public notice) by kind permission of the Lord Chamberlain, which permission I value exceedingly.

Having discharged these two most pleasing obligations, it now remains to consider briefly what the work really is. One has only to turn a few pages of the text to discover that we have here a collection of documents, arranged in chronological order and classified under the various reigns, all coming from the Lord Chamberlain's records, as now preserved in the Record Office. Those selected treat for the most part of the maintenance and ordering of musicians attached to the English Court, but we gather up by the way many details concerning their lives which ought to be of much interest to students of music and musical history. These records commence in 1460-1, and are carried up to Michaelmas, 1700. It was thought that such date would be a convenient stopping-place; had investigations been carried further it would have made too bulky a volume, and this is more than sufficient for a first instalment.

It may be interesting to give some little account of the inception of such an undertaking, and the reasons which led to publication. The idea was first set in motion by Mr. Hardy, a

well-known and able authority on all that concerns antiquarian subjects. We went to the Record Office, and looked at some volumes of the Lord Chamberlain's accounts, and thereby gained some idea of what the task really meant. As I had not sufficient leisure, Mr. Hardy undertook the searching of the various volumes for any entries pertaining in any degree whatsoever to matters of music, and much time elapsed before this could be finished. at its completion, a small and friendly dinner was arranged at which a small committee met (a good deal of the business of Englishmen seems to be accomplished at dinners), and we afterwards adjourned to Mr. Hardy's offices in the vicinity of Chancery Lane, and surveyed the formidable mass of type-written slips which met our alarmed gaze. Various suggestions were made, all of them having as basis the absolute gain that there would be to musical history by the publication of facts selected out of this monument of paper. It was resolved that we should meet again, and we did so on two occasions, at Sir Frederick Bridge's delightful old-world abode in Westminster Cloisters. A third meeting was held after some interval in Mr. Hill's rooms in Bond Street. From that time till now the work has been carried on by Miss Stainer, the daughter of Sir John Stainer, and myself.

I daresay Miss Stainer would wish that her name should not be mentioned, but I regard her as so intimately associated with this work that I am impelled to speak of her labours on its behalf. Fearing that any errors might have crept into the copied slips, Miss Stainer re-examined (a formidable task) the whole of the documents; she also revised all the proofs, and they were afterwards subjected to a second revision (if necessary) at my hands; she further compiled the index, her only assistance being a rough form I sent to her, and which served as a basis. Out of this rough copy she had to evolve an alphabetical sequence, and at the same time to add the descriptions of the posts held by the various musicians. I can unhesitatingly say that had it not been for Miss Stainer's valuable aid, this work would never have been brought to a satisfactory conclusion. I therefore take this opportunity of expressing my obligation to her, not only for so aiding me, but also for rendering-and I think all will confess she has so done-signal service to musical literature.

I cannot say how many times I have turned and re-turned the leaves of the text, sometimes with a sense of disappointment that

information was here so meagre, sometimes with a sense of thankfulness that such a detail or such an event was there brought to light. It seems to me that the work cannot be without effect on our musical history; it opens out many possibilities for the musical historian, and gives indeed at times curious sidelights on the doings at Court and in the town during the Tudor and Stuart reigns. But during this frequent thumbing of the page, I thought it might be an aid if I collected certain particulars and classified them under the individuals to whom they belonged. I know from experience that it is very convenient to have everything "sous main," and much loss of time and temper may be avoided by this expedient. Hence the notes that I have written on certain musicians, and placed at the end of the text. Of course they bear a very small proportion to the whole number, and they mostly concern only leading names, so far at least as our present knowledge is concerned. In looking through the various volumes of Grove's "Dictionary of Music" we find but few of the names that are met with in these records, and in many instances, as I have premised, the information in our text will not help us to knowledge. This is matter requiring research, painstaking and accurate, whilst it is also possible that no particulars now exist of many of these old-time worthies. All I can do is in the main to present the skeleton; and though before it leaves my hands it has begun to put on flesh, such flesh must grow and acquire firm consistency by others' labours, and it is for the skilful and experienced to impart the breath of life. In the notes on Masques I have given many particulars respecting the Whitehall masque of 1674, as it is a prominent feature in the actual text, and it was, I believe, the last of these entertainments given at the English Court. I would fain see a revival of such artistic productions in these days, and many of our noble families might thereby give a great impetus to the poetic and melodic tastes of the painters and musicians now amongst us. The notes on Costume are somewhat meagre, but I have only inserted these as an explanation of many words that have passed out of use; to my thinking, the most interesting is the note which treats of the livery or actual clothing given to musicians. "Originally 'livery' meant the allowance in provisions and clothing made to the servants and officers of great households, whether of baron, prelate, monastery or college. Certain survivals of livery in this original sense still linger in the rations supplied to Fellows in the colleges of the

older universities. The term was gradually restricted to the gift of clothing as a badge of service and of protection." In the notes on references in the text, I have collected together various items, a sort of literary hotch-potch. But these, if carefully looked over, will show of how many matters these records treat; and how, from being essentially musical at a first point of view, they branch off into tributaries which may be pursued with infinite profit and amusement.

The Index has been subjected to many revisions, and I hope will be found correct; but it is quite possible that errors may still exist. If any should be discovered, I trust the hypercritical mind will look on them with gentleness, though I am not of those who look on honest criticism as an unmixed evil. Stinging as it at times may be, it acts, when taken at its proper value, as an educator and an incentive to more painstaking and accurate work. I have in some few instances in the Index enclosed certain of the references in brackets, meaning thereby either that I regard it as doubtful whether such references apply to the names under which they occur, or that they may be set down to two persons of the same name.

It is well to bear in mind in reading the text that the Chapel Royal establishment was mainly connected with the Palace at Whitehall, as, from the time of Henry VIII. to the reign of William and Mary, Whitehall was the principal residence of the Sovereign. The Chapel Royal, as a building, was destroyed in the great fire which raged in the Royal buildings at Whitehall in 1698, and William III. then removed to St. James's Palace. The Chapel Royal at St. James's Palace had been for a considerable period used as a guard-room, but on the accession of Charles I. it was furnished anew for Divine Service.

The following note, taken from Delaune's "Angliae Metropolis" (1690), may be useful in setting forth somewhat of the composition of the Chapel Royal establishment in those days: "By the Dean are chosen all the other officers of the Chapel—32 Gentlemen of the Chappell, where 12 are Priests; the other twenty, commonly called Clerks of the Chappell, are to perform, with the said Priests, the office of praying, singing, etc. One of these, being well-skilled in music, is chosen Master of the Children, whereof are 12 in ordinary, to instruct them in the Rules and Arts of Musick, for the Service of the Chappell; 8 others are chosen to be organists, to whom is

joined, upon solemn Days, a 'Consort' of the King's Musick, to make the musick more full and compleat." It links us on to those dear old days when we reflect that the Children of the Chapel Royal still have their livery from the Great Wardrobe—unless any change, of which I have not heard, has been made lately.

Dr. Rimbault, writing in 1893, gives the strength of the Chapel Royal staff as 9 Gentlemen, 10 Children, a Serjeant and Yeoman of the Vestry, a Groom of the Vestry, an Organist who is also Composer, and an Organ-blower. The posts of violist and bell-ringer have been abolished. It was the duty of the bell-ringer to attend at the Chapel at every stated hour of prayer, and to go round a certain part of the Palace with his handbell, in order to give notice that the time for Divine Service was approaching.

It will be observed that these records are in the commencement merely lists of names, and though these have their value, yet their frequent reiteration is apt to become monotonous. But as we go on these tiny rivulets broaden out like an ever-increasing stream, and in the voluminous details which mark the reign of Charles II. we are in full flood, and on our way to the open sea of clear knowledge. May the frail barque which we have launched on this stream, in the shape of our own small labours, ride to a haven of safety, there to encounter many nobler vessels that will bring rich stores of light and learning to create another chapter of our nation's history.

NOTES ON MUSICIANS AND OTHER PERSONAGES MENTIONED IN THESE RECORDS.

ABELL, JOHN.—A celebrated alto singer, and performer on the lute. In 1679 he is appointed in place of Antony Roberts, at a salary of £40 per annum. On p. 355 we learn that he took the place of Alphonso Marsh for the lute and voice, and the place of Richard Dornye for the violin. In 1686 he is paid £10 for a guitar bought by him for use in James the Second's bedchamber. In 1688 he is commanded, with Mr. Pedley, to attend the King in his progresses. Grove says he was dismissed from the Chapel Royal in 1688 on account of his Romanism.

ALBRIGI, VINCENT.—Composer and organist, born at Rome in 1631. He was at one time in the service of Christina, Queen of Sweden. He then went to Dresden, and in 1682 he was summoned to a post at Prague. He, together with two others of his family, is only mentioned once in these records, and that is on the occasion of being awarded by Charles II. three gold chains and medals for himself and company. Concerning such gifts, there is a note in Hawkins' History of Music to the following effect:—
"A golden medal and chain was the usual gratuity of princes to men of eminence in any of the faculties. It seems that the medal and chain once bestowed as a testimony of family favour was ever after a part of the dress of the person thus honoured, at least on public occasions." The name of Albrei, or Albreis, which occurs in the reign of James II., looks much akin to Albrigi, but it seems very doubtful whether the same family is intended.

BALTZAR, THOMAS.—Grove mentions that he was born at Lübeck in 1630, and that he was the finest violinist of his time, and the first really great performer heard in England. In the list of

musicians of 1660 he is entered as having a "a new place." In 1661 he is paid £34:13:4 for two violins bought by him for the King's service. In 1661 he is appointed violinist in the private music, at a salary of £110 yearly. In 1662 he is paid £6:13:4 for strings for one year, also in 1663. In 1667, Thomas Fitz is appointed in his place, and at the same rate of payment, such payment to commence from the June quarter-day. On p. 207 we read "Thomas Fitz succeeds one Mr. Baltzar, the Swede."

Banister, John.—An English violinist of considerable repute, born in the year 1630. In the lists given by these records for 1660 and 1661 "vacatur" is written against his name. In April, 1662, he is to have the ordering and direction of twelve violinists attending Charles II. to Portsmouth "or elsewhere, for the reception of his dearest consort the Queen." In the same year he is mentioned as succeeding Davies or Daniel Mell, at a salary of fino yearly. In October of this year, he is paid f40 for two Cremona violins for the King's service. On p. 150 we find his name, in conjunction with Matthew Lock and George Hudson, as a composer. In August, 1663, he is appointed to choose twelve out of the regular company of twenty-four violinists to form a select band to wait on the King, and for this service, and considering the smallness of the present wages, he and the twelve are to receive the magnificent sum of £600 yearly, this regal payment to commence on the March quarter-day, 1662, so that he at once draws more than sufficient for a present comfortable maintenance, provided the money is regularly paid. On p. 182 we can see the names of the full band of violinists "which was made choyce of by Mr. Banister and appointed by the Lord Chamberlain," and they are twenty-six in number. In 1666 the sum of £464 is paid to Banister and seven others for riding charges and etceteras, the riding occupying the space of 232 days, and extending to Oxford and Hampton Court. In the same year he and the seven receive some further £140 by way of an advance "to fitt and enable them to attend the Queene to and at Tunbridge." In 1666-and this was a knock-down blow for Banister-there is the order that Mr. Banister and the twenty-four violinists shall obey the directions of Mons. Louis Grabu, master of the private music. In 1666-7, to crown the indignity which he considered was put upon him, Grabu takes his place at the head of the select band of violinists, still twelve in number, and therefore the £600 passes to Grabu. In 1668 Banister is still in the

company of the twenty-four violinists, and his so continuing was doubtless a matter of pecuniary necessity, for in 1668-9 he is put down as having a yearly salary of £110. In 1674 we find him playing under the leadership of Mons. Combert. He seems never to have recovered from the misfortunes which overtook him through the advent of foreigners, and in May of 1679 we notice that leave to travel for six months or longer is granted to him. On p. 336 comes the brief notice "Obiit. 3 Oct., 1679." In November of the same year he is succeeded by his son. There are some very interesting particulars respecting Banister and his fall from favour in Sir Frederick Bridge's excellent little work on Pepys and his musical friends. Pepys himself says that Banister "was furious at the advent of Grabu."

Bartholomew, Mr.—In Evelyn's Diary, under date Nov. 20, 1679, he writes: "I din'd with Mr. Slingsby, Master of the Mint, with my wife, invited to hear musiq, which was exquisitely performed by four of the most renowned masters," and amongst these he enumerates, "Signor Bartolomeo, an Italian, on the harpsichord." On Feb. 7, 1682, he writes, "My daughter Mary began to learn musick of Signor Bartolomeo." And on March 10, 1685, when his daughter was sick of the smallpox, referring to her death on the 14th, he says: "She had an excellent voice, to which she play'd a thorough bass on the harpsichord, in both which she arrived at that perfection, that of the schollars of those two famous masters Signiors Pietro and Bartolomeo she was esteem'd the best."

BATTEN, ADRIAN.—A lay-vicar of Westminster Abbey, at the time of the death of James I. He was afterwards vicar-choral of S. Paul's, and organist, jointly with John Tomkins. This was in the time of Laud. He is said to have composed seven services and fifty anthems.

Beaupuls, Mr.—A famous French opera-singer, who made his "debut" under the direction of Lulli in 1672. He seems to have been specially engaged for the masque at Whitehall in 1674.

BIRDE, WILLIAM.—Mentioned as being at the funeral of Queen Elizabeth, and his name occurs amongst the household of Queen Anne, wife of James I. There is reference to an anthem by Bird, "O God, the proud," on p. 306. The Thomas Byrd mentioned on pp. 5 and 7 is evidently the father of this worthy, who is described in the Cheque Book as "William Bird, a Father of Musick."

BLOW, JOHN.—On p. 120 he is spoken of as "Master of his Majesty's musick," although on p. 178 he is described as being still under the tutelage of Captain Cooke, but it will be noticed that the date given to the former reference is queried as being evidently not quite trustworthy. In 1668-9 Blow is appointed to the virginalls in place of Giles Tompkins. In the list of those who attended at Windsor in 1671 he is mentioned twice as organist (p. 236). July 23, 1674, he is appointed Master of the Children and composer in the King's private music for voices in the place of Pelham Humfryes. On p. 288 he is said to have succeeded Captain Cooke in private musick for the voices. On pp. 305 to 307 we find in a long list of services and anthems Blow's Services in A and G, and his Benedicite, and the anthems, "Turn thou us," "Behold how good," "O Lord I have sinned," "Lord how are they increased," "O how amiable," "God is our hope," "O God wherefore art thou absent," and "Save me O God." In 1676 he is paid £143 for, "inter alia," charges and expenses for going to Windsor, Oxford, Gloucester, Hereford, and Worcester, to fetch boys for the quires for the King's Chapel, and for nurse and chamber rent and firing for one of the Children who was sick of the spotted fever (p. 312); and in 1677 there is amongst his charges an item "For the cure of a broaken legg of one of the Children" (p. 327). On p. 372 we have him as Composer under James II., and in 1689 he is still Master of the Children, "they being tenn in number." He is further mentioned during the reign of William and Mary (p. 399), and in 1695 is appointed with Bernard Smith tuner of virginalls and wind instruments in place of Henry Purcell. He and Smith are to share the place between them and the survivor is to enjoy the whole benefit. On p. 425 it is stated that he is appointed to the virginalls in place of Giles Tompkins, though this has already been mentioned on p. 211, nearly thirty years previously, so this may be a confirmation of the previous appointment, or a discrepancy, of which these records afford various instances. We leave him on p. 437 still alive. Pepys mentions in his Diary that Blow went with Loggins, who is mentioned on pp. 191 and 194, to sing in his presence, and Pepys was not at all pleased with their broken voices. The Cheque Book says, "Dr. John Blow, Organist, Composer in ordinary to His Majesty, and Master of the Children, dyed Oct. 1st, 1708, and had his full pay for both places to Xmas."

Bower, Richard.—The Household Book of Edward VI. has the following entry: "To Richard Bower, for playing before the King's Majestie with the Children of the Chappell, in rewarde, vjli. xiijs. iiijd." (This means a payment of £6:13:4.) Bower probably succeeded William Crane as Master of the Children, and his tombstone in old Greenwich Church recorded that he was Master under Henry VIII., Edward VI., Mary, and Elizabeth.

BRADDOCK, EDWARD.—The Cheque Book of the Chapel Royal mentions that he was Clerk of the Cheque from 1689 to 1706. Canon Sheppard in his "Memorials of S. James' Palace" mentions that the office of serjeant and yeoman of the vestry and that of clerk of the cheque were originally held by the same person, and that the two former are now held by one person, while the office of clerk of the cheque is joined to that of the sub-dean. Dr. Rimbault says that the duties of the clerk were to keep an account of the attendance and to note the absence of the priests and gentlemen, to attend all admissions into Chapel appointments and to keep a record of the same. No salary was attached to the office, but there It is possible that this is the Mr. Braddock, were certain fees. whose daughter, Elizabeth, was married to Dr. Blow, also that Hugh Braddock, mentioned as a Child of the Chapel, is Edward Braddock's son.

Bridges, Paul Francis.—In the Calendar of State Papers (Domestic Series) we find in 1660 the entry: "Francis Bridges. For appointment as Musician to the Chamber and Chapel, having left his service at Brussels on His Majesty's promise to that effect"—also "Certificate by the Earl of Worcester and six others that Paulus Franciscus Bridges, musician to the King of Spain at Brussels, often brought his companions to play for the King, or played for him alone, and has left his service to serve him in England." On p. 169 of these records there is an account paid to Mr. Perkins in Hatton Grounds for lodging "Mr. Briges of the musique" at 5/- per week, and on p. 207 his yearly salary in the private music is stated to be £56: 2:6. In 1671 a widow, Sarah Glascock, is to take her course at law against Bridges for a debt of £10, unless it be paid within a month. In 1673 he surrenders his place to John Young, this to take effect from June 24.

CAMBERT, or COMBERT, Mons.—Cambert was organist of S. Honoré in Paris, as well as "sur-intendant de la musique" to

Anne of Austria. About the year 1672 he was driven out of France by the machinations of Lulli, and it is recorded by French authentics that he was appointed "sur-intendant" of music at the Court of Charles II. Favoured by this monarch, he produced one of his operas, "Pomone," here, but with indifferent success. It is reported that he died of grief and vexation in 1677. His death is thus accounted for by Bourdelot in "L'Histoire de la Musique et ses Effets." "It was the spirit of envy, a not unknown companion to merit, that shortened his days. The English do not care for a foreigner to interfere with their own amusements, much less to instruct them. This poor fellow therefore died in England a little sooner than he would have died elsewhere."

CHEVALIER, THOMAS.—A member of the chamber-music under Henry IV. and Louis XIII. of France, he is said to have been one of the most skilful composers of instrumental music, more especially of music for the ballet.

CHILD, WILLIAM.—In the year 1660 he takes Alphonso Ferrabosco's place. On p. 119 those curious in such matters may see a detailed account of the materials for his actual livery. On p. 123 he is mentioned as taking the place of Clement Lanier, deceased, for the cornet. In 1664 we find him in the place of Henry Ferabosco, also deceased (p. 169). In 1670 he has a petition against the rest of his fellows for detaining six and a half years' board wages on the pretence of his not attending the service. On p. 269 he is mentioned as organist. On p. 295 we note that he has written from Windsor asking that the rest of his livery may be paid to the bearer, a certain serjeant Haynes. On pp. 305 to 307 he figures as composer of a Benedicite, an Evening Service in G, a Te Deum to his Benedicite, a Service in E flatt, a Service in A re, and the following anthems: "O pray for the peace of Jerusalem," "The earth is the Lord's," "Thou art my King," "O let my mouth be filled," "Behold how good and joyful," "Let God arise," "O sing unto the Lord," and "O Lord, rebuke me not." On p. 317 Thomas Haynes, Serjeant of the King's Vestry, is mentioned again, this time as his true and lawful attorney. The last notice of him in these records is the appointing (because the faithful Thomas Haynes is now dead) of Edward Bradocke, gentleman, of Westminster, as his true and lawful attorney. This is in the year 1690; he is supposed to have died in 1697, and was

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evidently blessed with a good constitution, as Grove gives the date of his birth as 1606. [As mention has been made here of a Serjeant of the Vestry, it may not be out of place to consider the duties which attached to that office. As to this particular individual, the Cheque Book says that Thomas Haines was sworn Serjeant in 1685 and that he departed this life in 1687. The Cheque Book mentions the following as the daily duties of the Serjeant-To open the vestry, to keep it clean, to assist the Sub-dean in putting on his surplice, to walk before the Dean, Bishops, and Sub-dean with his virge, and to place the velvet cover on the lesson desk. On Sundays and holy days to put the white linen cover on the communion table, and to mark the places in the Prayer Book. He is also to provide new books and surplices, and to attend to the washing of the surplices. When new surplices are ordered he is to procure from the Great Wardrobe the finest and best holland allowed, and to cause two to be made for each gentleman, each marked with the initials of the name, and he is to take special care that the surplices are long and large enough and fit in the neck.]

CLARKE, JEREMIAH.—A chorister under Blow, he was afterwards the original composer of the music to Dryden's Ode "Alexander's Feast." He was associated with Henry Purcell in writing music for various operas. So far as these records are concerned, he is only mentioned as having a livery on leaving the Chapel Royal, but a note on p. 427 says that even in this particular a mistake has been made, and that the name of Townsend must be substituted for that of Clarke, though on p. 400 Townsend is stated to be leaving the Chapel in 1690, and the livery alluded to above is of the date 1697. Probably there was some carelessness in making out these accounts.

Coleman, Dr. Charles.—Chamber musician to Charles I. After noting the appearance of his name twice in lists of musicians belonging to the Court of Charles I., we find that in 1660 he was appointed for a "viall" in Mr. Thomas Ford's place (p. 114). Dr. Coleman's son, also named Charles, seems to have been appointed with his father to share Ford's place. In 1662 he (the Doctor) is paid £10 for a viol, by him sold and delivered for the King's service. In Nov., 1662, he is appointed in the place of Henry Lawes as composer. In July, 1664, Henry Cooke is

appointed, at Dr. Coleman's decease, to take his place, with apparently the same wages, £40, to commence from June 24, 1664. In the next year Charles Coleman is appointed to succeed his father, appointment to date from Sept. 29, 1664.

Coleman, Charles, Junr.—In Sept., 1672, he is admitted as musician for the viol in the private music, and his name may be noted as being amongst the base violls for the Mask of 1674. In 1685 he is still occupying the same position, and in 1689 he is appointed to the private music under William and Mary. In 1694 one Robert Lewis takes his place, he being deceased, though his name is still retained in a list bearing date 1696. Grove places his death about 1694, but adds that information as to his existence was advertised for in the London Gazette of April 12–15, 1697. Although, as will be seen, there are so many entries in these records with regard to this name, most of them give no further information than the including of his name in the several lists of Court musicians of the time. Neither the Doctor nor his son Charles are mentioned in the Cheque Book.

COLEMAN, EDWARD.—Another son of Dr. Coleman. His wife, Mrs. Coleman, is mentioned by Pepys, and is said to have been one of the first actresses who appeared on the English stage. In 1660 Edward is appointed in "the place of John Lanier for a voyce." In a list bearing date S. Andrew, 1669, "mort ante diem" is written against his name, and the Cheque Book says "Mr. Edward Coleman departed this life at Greenwich on Sunday, August 26, 1669."

COOK, CAPT. HENRY.—He first appears in these records in 1660, and is then enjoying the following emoluments:—£60 per annum for lute and voice (in place of Duvall), £20 per annum for strings, £24 for "breeding" a boy for vocal music, and £10 each for two boys in quarterly payments from 1660 to 1672. His succeeding to Dr. Coleman's place has been before mentioned. He is first mentioned as Captain in the entry of April 6, 1661. He is to have the same livery as Thomas Day as Master of the Children, and the same as Duvall as musician in ordinary. On September 17, 1661, £19: 10:0 is to be paid to him for the attendance of himself and the Children on the King at Windsor, and a further sum of £2: 16:0 is to be paid for torches and lights used whilst practising the Coronation music. Later in the same year his name is

mentioned in connection with the materials for the clothing of the Children, their summer and winter liveries; and there is a further sum of £45 to him for sums expended to masters during the space of one year in teaching the Children to write and to learn and to speak Latin. In 1662-3 thirteen Prayer Books are delivered to him for the use of the thirteen Children in the Chapel. In 1663 he is paid £30 for the Children's learning of the violins and organ. In 1663-4 he is paid £20 for yearly cost of firing for the music room at the Chapel, and for strings for the "base voyall" and other Chapel instruments. In 1664 he is paid £60 for "learning Latin" to the children and teaching them the lute and organ for nearly one year, also fio for firing and strings for the half-year, for strings for virginals and lutes, fii: 6: o for coach hire and other expenses to Windsor and Canterbury. In 1665 he is paid £115: 10:6 for having the Children taught Latin as well as to write, to play on the violin, organ, and lute; for stringing and penning their harpsichords; for firing and strings; for clothes for Michael Wise; for going into the country and looking for boys, and for nursing three boys sick of the smallpox. In 1665 he is to be paid £40 yearly for the maintenance of Pelham Humphreys, £30 for John Blow, and £30 for John Blundivile. In 1666 thirteen more Prayer Books are delivered to him for the Children, but in this instance the New Testament is bound in with the Prayer Book. In 1668-9 his yearly fees are mentioned as totalling £188. In 1669 there is an order to repair his lodgings at the further end of the Old Bowling Alley, Hampton Court, and for the erection of chimneys there. In 1671 he is given a sum of money for, amongst other things, doctors' and nurses' fees; for looking after several children when sick; and for going to Westchester, Lichfield, Canterbury, and Rochester, to look for boys. In the same year he is paid $f_{431}:12:0$ for the attendance at Windsor during May, June, and July, of the Gentlemen of the Chapel, the organist, and two base violists. A further account seems to show that the Children (now twelve in number) were at Windsor during all or part of this period. He departed this life on July 13, His will, with its characteristically quaint provisions, will be found "in extenso" on pp. 245-6. He is immediately succeeded by one of his pupils, Pelham Humphreys. (Bumpus, in his "History of English Cathedral Music," says that his death was caused through jealousy of Humphreys.) In 1675 we have the certificate of his burial in the cloister at Westminster on July 17, 1672. From the

Cheque Book we learn that Cook acted as steward at the annual Chapel feast in 1663, but he only accepted the office on condition that it created no precedent, as he did not think it "meete or convenient for the Master of the Children to have that office." On May 28, 1666, in conjunction with Thomas Purcell and other Gentlemen of the Chapel, Cook petitioned "on behalf of themselves, the pages of the Chapel, and boys whose voices have changed, for payment, there being no money assigned to the Treasurer of the Chamber for that purpose." We may supplement this fact with a notice from Pepys' Diary bearing the date of Dec. 19, 1666. (Sir Frederick Bridge has already given this passage in his Pepysian volume, but it will bear repeating, especially in this context.) Pepys says, "Talked of the King's family with Mr. Hingston, the organist" (see "Hingston" in these notes). "He says many of the musique are ready to starve, they being years behindhand for their wages: nay, Evens, the famous man upon the Harp, having not his equal in the world" (he is mentioned in these records), "did the other day die from mere want." With regard to Pepys' appreciation of Cook, he writes in his Diary under date Sept. 14, 1662, "To White Hall Chapel, where sermon almost done, and I heard Captain Cooke's new musique—I could discern Capt. Cooke to overdo his part at singing, which I never did before"; and on Dec. 21, 1663-4, he writes, "To my Lord Sandwich's, where I find him with Capt. Cooke and his boys, Dr. Childe, Mr. Madge" (this would most likely be the Humphrey Madge of these records) "and Mallard, playing and singing over my Lord's anthem, which he hath made to sing in the King's Chapel." Pepys elsewhere states his opinion that Cook was a good singer, but a "vain coxcomb." Elias Ashmole says that at the festival of S. George at Windsor in 1661 "the hymn was composed and set with verse and chorus by Capt. Cook-by whose direction some instrumental loud musick was at that time introduced, namely, two double sackbuts and two double courtalls—one sackbut and courtal before the four petty canons who began the hymn, and the other two immediately before the prebends of the College." Cook in the Civil War was on the Royalist side, and obtained a captain's We have a glimpse of the Captain during the Commonwealth in Evelyn's Diary, as follows:-" Nov. 28, 1654. Came Lady Langham, a kinswoman of mine, to visit us; also one Captain Cooke, esteem'd ye best singer after the Italian manner of any in England; he entertained us with his voice and theorba."

CORBETT, Mr. Frasico.—Francesco Corbetti was born at Pavia about 1630. The Duke of Mantua sent him to Louis XIV., and from the French Court he came to England. Charles II. appointed him to an office in the Queen's Household, and it is said even provided him with a wife. He was esteemed to be the best guitarist of his time, and it may be noted that he appeared in the Whitehall Mask of 1674. He eventually returned to France.

CORNYSH, WILLIAM.—The second known Master of the Children of the Chapel. It is said that he had some renown as a poet, and that he was a great favourite of King Henry VIII. Under Cornish's direction the Gentlemen of the Chapel were accustomed to act plays before the King and Court. In 1504 he was committed to the Fleet prison, but afterwards came again into Royal favour.

CRANE, WILLIAM.—Crane succeeded Cornish in the Mastership. In the Household Book of Henry VIII. we have an entry similar to the one referred to under "Bower":—"to Maister Crane, for playing before the king with the children of the chappell, in rewarde, vjli. xiijs. iiijd." In a book of Receipts and Payments of the Exchequer, 18 Henry VIII., he is mentioned as "Wille Crane, Magister Puerorum Capellae Dom. Regis."

CUTTING, THOMAS.—Cutting was an excellent performer on the lute. In 1607 he was in the service of Lady Arabella Stuart, but she, at the instance of Ann, wife of James I., and sister of Christian IV. of Denmark, sent him to Denmark to replace Dowland. Cutting stayed in Denmark but little more than four years, for he appears as being in the service of Henry, Prince of Wales, in 1611.

Davies, Mrs.—Mary Davis, sometime comedian in the Duke of York's company of players, is the Moll Davis so frequently alluded to by Pepys. She seems to have been noted as a singer, and appeared in the Masque of 1674, as Father Thames in the prologue, and as Sylvia in the pastoral scenes. Her attainments as a dancer are thus referred to by the celebrated diarist:—"1666-7, March 7. To the Duke's playhouse.—Little Miss Davis did dance a jigg after the end of the play, and then telling the next day's play, so that it come in by force only to please the company to see her dance in boy's clothes." And again:—"1667. August 5. Miss Davis, dancing in a shepherd's clothes, did please us mightily."

EAGLES, SOLOMON.—According to Grove, this strange character was born in 1618, and was noted as a teacher of the virginals and viols. About 1660 he became a Quaker, broke his instruments, burned them, together with his music books, and turned shoemaker. There seems to be no direct evidence to connect this individual. despite his fanaticism, with the crazy prophet who has been immortalized by Ainsworth in his account of the great Fire of London, although there are undoubted points of similarity. The only information we gain from these records is that in 1693 he was in debt to the amount of £400, and that in 1700 a certain Solomon Eccles (a glance at the various references will show that the name Eccles and Eagles seems to describe one and the same person) was still amongst the Court musicians. There is one Eagles mentioned in the 1674 Masque, and this is more likely to have been Solomon than Henry, though one cannot pronounce with certainty. If the date given in Grove for Solomon's death-viz., 1683, be correct, then we are confronted with a difficulty, and can only suppose that Eccles and Eagles must be separately identified, but it is not easy to discern any break in the continuity. Solomon's eldest son, John, here set down as John Eccles, was appointed Master of the Musick in 1700, and Henry, his second son, also had a place amongst the Court musicians.

EVESEEDE, Mr. (See Oveseede, in Index).—Mr. Henry Eveseede is set down in the Cheque Book as one of the Yeomen of the Vestry. He is dismissed, after his petition being considered, "for a foule disease in his groine," for drunkenness, for blasphemy, and for actual violence, in 1620-1. "On S. Peter's Day last, beinge the day of our feast—Mr. Eveseed did violently and sodenly without cause runne upon Mr. Gibbons, took him up and threw him down upon a standard wherby he received such hurt that he is not yet recovered from the same." A "standard" was a large chest generally used for holding plate, &c., but sometimes for linen.

Ferabosco, Alphonso.—It seems doubtful whether this is the eldest Ferabosco who was in this country, as Grove says that he left England in 1578, whereas the first notice in these records of this Alphonso is in the year 1603. Fétis makes the following remarks on the earlier Ferabosco. "He was born in Italy about 1515, and appears to have established himself in England about

1540. Amongst the English writers there is a misty uncertainty as to the actual residence of this musician in England, and they are not even of one mind as to the orthography of his name." In our records, in 1627, another Alfonso is mentioned as succeeding his father, whilst Henry Ferabosco also appears as a brother of the second Alfonso, and there is a note on p. 63 to the effect that the father having had a musician's, a composer's, a violl's and an instructor's place to the Prince of Wales, the benefit of these places descends to his sons by the King's special grant. In 1630 there is a warrant for a livery for John Ferabosco, and on p. 78 we have all three brothers mentioned, Alfonso for the violin, Henry for the voices, and John for the wind instruments. John last appears on p. 107, in the years 1641-2, and Grove says that he was appointed organist of Ely Cathedral in 1662. Alfonso seems to have surrendered his place before 1660, and Henry is in that year spoken of as already deceased. On p. 127 we have the entry, "Thomas Bates, in the place of Alphonso Ferabosco, junr, which his father, Alfonso Ferabosco, enjoyed as instructor to his late majesty (Charles I.), when Prince of Wales, £50 per annum, and in the place of Henry Ferabosco, deceased, f.40 more."

FINGER, Mr.—A Moravian, who came to England in 1685. He appears in these records in the years 1687 and 1688. In 1693 he composed the music for Parsons' Ode to S. Cecilia. The London Gazette for Feb. 1 of that year makes the following announcement: "At the Consort in York Buildings on Monday next the 5th inst., will be performed, Mr. Finger's St. Cecilia's Song, intermixed with a variety of new musick, at the ordinary rates." In 1702 Finger received the appointment of Chamber musician to Sophia Charlotte, Queen of Prussia.

FITZ, THEOPHILUS.) On p. 315 these two musicians are men-FITZ, THOMAS. Stioned as "Fitz the elder" and "Fitz the younger," and they seem to have followed each other so closely during their lives that they may well be included in one notice. As violinist under Charles II., Theo. (it will be a convenience to shorten their names) has 1/8 per diem, besides his livery. On p. 124 Tom is described as musician of the violins in ordinary. In 1662, Theo. is amongst those attending on Charles II. to receive the Queen, and in 1664 he is to attend at His Majesty's Theatre, with others, whenever required by Mr. Killigrew. In 1665 he is appointed to the post

of double sackbutt, and in the same year we find him in Banister's company of violinists. In 1666 he is ordered to attend the Queen at Tunbridge. In 1666-7 he is transferred from Mr. Banister to Mons. Grabu. In 1667 he is appointed with another to "wait" during the allowed absence of Henry Comer, and in the same year he is to attend with three others at the Chapel Royal, Whitehall, whenever Captain Cook should so require. In this year also Tom is appointed to the violins in the private musick in the place of Baltzar. In 1668 he takes Richard Hudson's place—a place for life—with a fee of £46:12:8. In 1669 he is paid £21:10:0 for riding charges in attending Charles II. at Newmarket, Bagshot, Portsmouth, and Audley End. In 1670 they are both to attend at the Chapel, and in the same year Tom is amongst the twenty-four violinists who attended the King at Dover for twenty days. In 1674 the two are to be paid £24 for two violins bought by them for the Chapel. In the same year Theo. with five others is in attendance on the Queen at Hampton Court for thirty-six days, whilst at about the same time Tom is in attendance with six others on the King at Newmarket. They both figure amongst the violinists in the Mask of 1674, and in 1674-5 they are amongst those attending in the Chapel at Windsor for one-hundred-and-nine days. In 1675 "Mr. Fitzz" (this is evidently Theo.) is paid £12:10:0 for a "sagbutt." In 1677 we hear of the death of Tom, and in this same year we find Theo. petitioning with others against their dismissal from the playhouse by Mr. Killigrew, the Master of the Revels. In 1684-5 Theo. is to attend with others at the King's Theatre to practise music for a ball to be held there. In 1688 he is amongst those attending James II. to Windsor. In 1689 he is appointed to the private music under William and Mary. In 1693-4 John Godwin, of Westminster, bequeaths to Theophilus Fitzz, of Hampton, £5. In the year 1700 we leave Theo. still living.

FLEURI, NICHOLAS.—Fétis says that François Nicholas Fleuri was born about 1630, that he acquired remarkable skill on that difficult instrument, the theorbo; that in 1637 he entered the service of the Duc d'Orleans, and in 1678 was still in the same service. There must, however, have been some break in this engagement, as we find him in England in 1663, as one of Charles II.'s French musicians in ordinary, and this is the only notice he has in these records.

GAMBLE, JOHN.—His first appearance in these records is in the year 1660. In 1661 a livery is allowed him against the King's coronation, and in 1662 he has the livery formerly granted to Jerome Lanier, now deceased. In 1666 the sum of £7 is lent to him. In 1670 he is to attend in the Chapel with others, also in 1671 and 1672. In 1671-2 he assigns to one Parrott his livery due out of the King's Great Wardrobe. In 1674 he is to practise with others under Mons. Combert in the theatre at Whitehall, and in the same year he is waiting on the King at Windsor from July 11 to Sept. 1. We find him named amongst the violinists in the Masque of 1674. In 1675-6 he assigns to J. Talcott, apothecary of Westminster, one debenture for livery due Nov. 30, 1674. In 1676 he receives payment for attendance, with seven others, in the Chapel at Windsor from July 7 to Sept. 11, 1675. In 1676 there is a letter of assignment from John Gamble, of the Parish of S. Giles-in-the-Fields, appointing J. Spicer, of S. Martin'sin-the-Fields, his true and lawful attorney. He last appears in 1686. Grove says he performed at one of the theatres, and was a cornet player in the Royal Chapel.

GIBBONS, ORLANDO.—This well-known character is mentioned as privy organist in the list of King James' household. In the same list is Dr. W. Heather, who took his Doctor of Music degree at the same time as Gibbons, and Gibbons is said to have written Heather's exercise as well as his own. Grove says that he married Elizabeth, daughter of J. Patten, Yeoman of the Vestry. He died in 1625. It is related that Henry Eveseed, a drunken Groom of the Vestry, did him serious hurt five years before his death, and he does not seem to have recovered well from the shock, which may have accelerated his end.

GIBBONS, Dr. CHRISTOPHER. — This was the second son of Orlando, and he was born in 1615. In 1660 he is appointed to Warwick's place (Warwick had succeeded his father) for the virginals—"the virginall in the Presence"—and in the same year he is approved by the King at Baynards Castle, and it is ordered that an organ be built for him. In 1672 Dr. Gibbons and Mr. Pickering are to provide mourning for trumpeters, drummers, and fife at the funeral of Lord Sandwich. In 1676 C. Preston succeeds the Doctor, he being now deceased. Grove mentions that he was in the Royalist Army, and that, besides being organist of the Chapel Royal and private organist to the King, he was also organist of Westminster Abbey.

GILES, NATHANIEL.—According to Antony à Wood, he was "noted as well for his religious life and conversation (a rarity in musicians) as for excellence in his faculty." His last entry in these records bears the date 1628. Grove says that the inscription on his grave at Windsor says that he was Master of the Children there for forty-nine years, and at the Chapel Royal (presumably at Whitehall) for thirty-eight years.

GOSLIN, JOHN.—He takes Mr. John Harding's place, and is mentioned as Clerk on p. 436. He was later appointed precentor of Canterbury, and Sub-dean of S. Paul's. Henry Purcell wrote the bass solos in his anthems for this noted singer.

GRABU, LOUIS.—In the list of 1600 the name of Nicholas Lanier, Master, is crossed out, and Grabu's name inserted, and on p. 126 it is stated that Nicholas Lanier, Master of Musick, is dead, and that Grabu is Master in his place. In 1665 he is appointed composer in the King's music. (Many details concerning Grabu will be found under the name of Banister.) In Lanier's place he has £200 per annum—this, with the £600 taken from Banister, makes the respectable total of £800 per annum! In 1668 he is paid £165:9:6 for "fayre writing severall dances, aires, and other musick," &c., &c.; and in the same year he is to have the teaching of two boys, not, let us be sure, without due payment. He has also a yearly livery of £16:2:6 during the King's pleasure, and this is apparently in addition to the sums already mentioned. In 1671-2 he is paid £117:4:6 for "fayre writing and pricking severall sorts of musick," &c., at various times in 1668-9, and for other services. the same year he has £20 for riding and other charges in attending the King to Dover during the space of twenty days in 1670. he assigns, with another sum of $f_{137}:4:6$, to Walter Lapp, citizen and mercer of London, the same tradesman who, in 1647, made the wreaths for the King's musicians for the theatre at Whitehall. 1674 there is a warrant to deliver to Grabu, or his representative, the scenery from Whitehall for the use of the French opera in Bridges Street, the same to be returned after fourteen days. This bears date March 27, and on April 27 there is a warrant to deliver to Sir Christopher Wren, the King's Surveyor General of Works, the said scenery. In the list of 1674, against Grabu's name is written "vacatur," and Mr. Staggins is in his place. (From the course of events we can only suppose this to be an enforced and compulsory

resignation of his many emoluments, owing to the Royal countenance being turned against him.) In 1674-5 Mr. Staggins is to enjoy Grabu's £200 per annum, commencing from September 29, 1674. In 1675 there is still a warrant to pay Grabu his livery, and in 1676-7 certain violinists are ordered to practise some of his music, so his downfall was not a swift and sudden flight, but a little managed-"un peu adouci" expresses it. The real extent of his ill-luck can only be appreciated when we come to his pitiful petition on p. 317. In this he speaks of being a menial servant to the King, and asks for help for his distressed family, and to be kept from arrests. The King refers the whole petition to the Lord Chamberlain. This is in 1667, and in June of the same year Lord Arlington finds that there is due to Grabu out of the Exchequer the sum of £450, out of the office of the Treasury Chamber, £145:4:6, and out of the Great Wardrobe £32:5:0 making in all the sum of £627:9:6, and he further finds that Grabu's condition is "very poor and miserable." (This seems one of the saddest histories we have to deal with in these records.) On the back of a document bearing the date, Dec. 8, 1687, in the reign of James II., there is a memorandum that "Mr. Grabu received all his arrears as master of the music to his late Majesty, although not actually in his said Majesty's service at the time of his decease," so that as Grabu passes from our sight we have the pleasant reflection that justice was after all rendered to this strangely-fortuned individual. Grove says that Grabu came to England in 1666, but these records point to an earlier date-also that in 1690 he composed the music to one of Beaumont and Fletcher's pieces, but according to the information given above, Grabu was in 1687 already regarded as dead.

GREETING, THOMAS.—He is appointed in 1662. He figures in the band of twenty-four violins of the time of Charles II. In 1673-4 he is appointed to the violin and sackbut for the Chapel Royal at 2/4 "per diem." He is amongst the violinists in the Mask of 1674. In 1682 one Crouch takes his place. Grove mentions that he was a teacher of the flageolet, and that amongst his pupils were Mr. and Mrs. Pepys.

GUALTIER, JACQUES.—In 1637 this musician is paid £10 for a treble lute to be used in masques. In 1660 we find that P. Rogers, also a lutenist, took his place, and as the said Rogers is

appointed at a salary of £100 per annum, we may infer that Gaultier received the same payment. Grove says that Denys Gualtier and Gaultier "le vieux" were the last two members of a celebrated family of "lutheriens" who lived in Paris during the reign of Louis XIII. It is possible that the "le vieux" is identical with the above-named Jacques, and this same person, in the course of a correspondence with a certain Huygens respecting the sale of a "luth de Bologne," wrote, "After being thirty years in the service of so illustrious a king and queen, I have nothing to show for it save this lute; moreover I am encumbered with a wife."

Harding, John.—In the Cheque Book, under date 1671, there is this entry:—"It is ordered that the old bookes and surplices shall be to the use of the Gentlemen of His Majesties Chapell Royall, paying to the Serjeant of the Vestry 12d. for the old bookes and 10/- apiece for their old surplices. Upon the testimony of Mr. John Harding, Gentleman for fifty years standing."

HINGSTON, JOHN .- In 1660 he is appointed to the viol in place of A. Ferabosco. He also takes Norgate's place as repairer of organs. In 1662 he is paid £155 for organs and harpsichord for the King's Chapel and the organ for the Queen's private chapel. In the same year he is paid £76:5:0 for repairing the organs in the Chapel Royal, Whitehall, for a "base violl," and for erecting an organ in the Banqueting House at Whitehall. In the same year there is a direction given for enlarging the organ-loft at Whitehall, at Hingston's discretion. In 1663 he is paid £67:11:0 for removing and setting up the organ in Her Majesty's Chapel at S. James', for removing another organ from Whitehall to S. James' "for the French musick", and for "portage" of a larger organ from Mr. Nicoe's to S. James', and setting it up there. In 1663 there is a warrant for a new organ-loft at Whitehall in the place where formerly the great double-organ stood—the rooms over the bellowsroom to be rebuilt two stories high, as formerly; the lower story for the sub-dean, the upper story, with two rooms, one for the organistin-waiting, the other for Hingston-each room to have a chimney and boxes and shelves. In the same year he is paid f_{83} : 15: o for taking down the organ in the Queen's chapel at S. James' and remounting it in the "new musique room"; for mending organs and harpsichords; for mending the Queen's harpsichord "that stands in her own chamber"; for mending a "claricon"; and for erecting

an organ in the Banqueting House. In 1668 he is described as "tuner and repayrer of the wind instruments and organs under the Broad Seal," and in another list is put down as "organ maker." In 1669 he is paid for, amongst other items, stringing, penning, and repairing harpsichords. In 1673 he is paid £45: 3:6 for keeping, repairing, and "amending" the King's organs, harpsichords, and "pedalls," for the rent of a room to keep them in, for strings for "base violls," for a "base violl" bought by him, and various other services during the space of two years. In 1673 Henry Purcell is appointed as his assistant and successor. On pp. 298 to 300 there is a very interesting account presented by Hingston for work done from 1673 to 1675. We may note in it the following—"Repairing and amending two harpsichords and carrying them to the playhouse"— "Repairing and setting up organ in the Banqueting House for Maunday Thursday "-" Twenty yards of saile cloth to cover and secure the organ (at Windsor) from the weather and dust "-" For a grate harpsichord with three ranks of strings for His Majesties musick in the hall and in the privy lodgings." (In this account the name of Bernard, better known as Father, Smith, frequently occurs.) In 1678 we come across another account, a much shorter one, and lacking the interest of the first one, inasmuch as it repeats many of the previous items. In 1683 there is still another account, much resembling the previous one; from this it is evident that an organ was set up in the Banqueting House at Whitehall every Maunday Thursday. In 1683-4, Henry Purcell succeeds Hingston.

HOLDER, Dr. W.—On p. 306 two of his anthems are mentioned, "Thou, O God," and "O prayse our God." In 1680-1 there is a warrant to pay to Dr. Holder, Sub-dean of the Chapel, £12 for some parts of anthems and services written in the Chapel books, and for books and ruled paper for the Children. Grove says he was sworn Sub-dean in 1674, and that he resigned before Christmas, 1689—that he was also Sub-almoner. He married a sister of Sir Christopher Wren. Hawkins says that from being very exact in the performance of choral service, and frequently reprimanding the choirmen for their negligence in it, Michael Wise used to call him Mr. Snub-dean.

Humphryes, Pelham.—In 1666 he is bracketed with T. Purcell and Matthew Lock as composer. In 1665-6 he is appointed for the lute in the place of Nicholas Lanier. On p. 254 there is a bill for

teaching the Children for half a year, and to it is appended this note: "In this warrant was nothing for fetching children from several cathedrals, as is sometymes." In 1673 we have articles of agreement between Humfryes and J. Lilly, of S. Andrew's, Holborn, one of his Majesty's musicians in ordinary, for teaching and instructing four of the Children in the viol and theorbo, for which service Humfryes is to pay £30 yearly out of his salary. Humfryes departed this life on July 14, 1674, at the early age of twenty-seven years, and was succeeded by Blow. (It is strange that in the list of 1673 "mortuus" is written against his name.) The service alluded to on p. 305 is probably his full Service in E minor. On p. 307 six of his anthems are mentioned, including the well-known "Lord, teach us to number our days." Pepys tells us that Humfryes, on his return from a stay on the Continent, greatly decried everything English, though at the same time he mightily abused Louis Grabu; also that, when quite young, he was a pretty boy.

Jenkins, John.—He is mentioned in 1660 for the theorbo, and in 1661 for the flute. We have also an entry as to the probable date of his decease—"Died October, 1678." Grove says he was born at Maidstone in 1592, and that he resided for some time in the family of Sir Hamon l'Estrange. North has this passage:—"His talents lay in the use of the lute, and Base or rather Lyra-Viol. In most of his friends' houses there was a chamber called by his name. He kept his places at Court, as I understood, to the time of his death, and then he for many years was incapable to attend; the Court musitians had so much value for him that advantage was not taken; but he received his salary, as they were payd."

Lanier.—As will be seen by the Index, we have here to deal with a very numerous and intermarried family, and the information conveyed to us in these records concerning the various members is of the most meagre description. It is difficult to establish the exact relationships, but the most practical way of attempting an elucidation is to set down the individuals mentioned with their respective dates as given in the records. John Lanier, who is first in chronological order, is first mentioned in 1564, for the sackbut, and Edward Coleman succeeds him in 1662. Nicholas (the flute-player) is first mentioned in 1566. In 1603 we have the first mention of three members of the family, Alphonso, Jerome, and Innocent. Andrea

appears in 1618 for the flute, in place of his father, Nicholas; then Clement, in 1625; and Nicholas (the singer) in 1625. Another Nicholas comes to light in these records in 1625, and he is the best known of all the Laniers, but it seems doubtful whether here two persons have not been rolled into one, and possibly an error may have been made in indexing the luter and the Master as identical. However, there are indications, as will be seen below, of the correctness of such identity. This Nicholas appears as Master of the Music in 1626, but in 1660 his name is crossed out, and he is announced as dead. In 1665-6 we have probate of the will of Nicholas Lanier, of East Greenwich, in Kent, "dyed and buried there February 24th, 1665-6." In 1666 Humfryes succeeds him for the lute, and Grabu as Master. The erasure of his name some time before his death would appear to point to a dignified retirement to the pleasant village where he eventually died. In the "Life of Inigo Jones," printed for the Shakespeare Society in 1848, there are some reproductions of sketches of costumes for Masques made by that artist. On one of these sheets of drawings (it must be said that they are very roughly and hastily executed, though one can detect the master-hand) we find depicted "a damsell," a dwarf, and, as a third figure, a man of more than average height, stalwart, and mustachioed, in a standing posture, and evidently engaged in plucking the strings of a harp. Over against this figure is written the word "Lanier." Mr. Cunningham, the editor of the abovementioned work, informs us that Nicholas Lanier sang and composed the music for Ben Jonson's masque of "Lethe" after the Italian manner, "stylo recitativo." Nicholas was an artist as well as a musician, and sometimes assisted in painting the very scenes before which he figured. This same volume contains a hitherto unprinted Masque, or, more properly, Show, which is of rather a peculiar character, since it was written for the sake of introducing and terminating a supper, upon some occasion which has not been recorded. It is called the "Masque of the Four Seasons," and it is considered probable that Nicholas played the part of Orpheus in this Show, and that the sketch with the harp represents his costume on that occasion. We next have Henry Lanier, who appears in 1629, and is announced as deceased in 1633. During his lifetime Mrs. Emilia Lanier has a petition against him, showing that unanimity was not always a prevailing note in this family. In 1633 Mrs. Jone Lanier, the widow of Henry,

petitions to dispose of her child, William, to be trained in music. (William's dates in these records are from 1637 to 1660.) Thomas, the last member of this family to come before our notice, is the son of Mrs. Joyce Lanier. He also is trained by Andrea, and in 1660 he takes his place on his decease, and acts as executor for him. In 1663 there is an order for his arrest at the suit of a blind man. He is last mentioned in 1686.

Lawes, Henry.—He is first mentioned as a Gentleman of the Chapel in 1628, and he takes the place of Richard Marsh as musician for the lutes and voices. In 1635-6, Henry and William have two lutes at £10 each on the certificate of Mr. Lanier. On p. 114, Henry is described as composer in the private music for lutes and voices in Mr. T. Ford's place. On Nov. 16, 1662, T. Purcell is composer for the violin in place of Henry, and in the same year Dr. Coleman succeeds Henry for the voices. From the Cheque Book it appears that Henry was sworn in "Pisteller" in 1625, and Gentleman in November of the same year.

Lawes, William.—In 1635 he takes the place, as musician in ordinary, of J. Lawrence. In 1662 John Clement takes William's place (owing to William's death) for the lutes, viol, and voices, at £40 per annum. Grove says that on May 5, 1611, he resigned his place to Ezekiel Wade, but that on Oct. I he was re-admitted "without paie." (The Cheque Book gives May I as the date of resignation, and quotes his actual words in resigning.) William joined the Royalist Army, and was killed at the siege of Chester in 1645. Hawkins mentions that the King was so affected at his loss that he wore a particular suit of mourning for him.

Lock, Mathew.—In 1660 he takes the place of John Coperario. On p. 123 he is in the place of Alphonso Ferrabosco as composer for the wind music; on p. 124 he has "a new place" amongst composers for the violin, and on p. 126 he is bracketed amongst composers with T. Purcill and P. Humfryes. In 1661-2 he is appointed composer to the King's private band. On p. 169 there is an account paid to Margaret Pothero for lodging Mr. Lock, organist, and his servants, at 10/- per week. On p. 207 it is stated that his yearly salary as composer is £46: 10:0, but on p. 210 it is put down at £40. On p. 307 an anthem by Mr. Lock, "Not unto us, O Lord" is mentioned. On p. 318 he is mentioned as being deputy to Mr. Staggins. In 1677, Henry Purcell takes his place amongst the violins, and in the same

year Ed. Dyer takes his place as composer. North, in his "Memoires of Musick," gives us considerable information about Lock, and the following passages may here be appropriately quoted:-"He was organist at Somerset House Chappell as long as he lived "-(this statement is rather too ample)—"but the Italian masters that served there did not approve of his manner of play, but must be attended by more polite hands, and one while one Sabinico" (mentioned in these records) "and afterwards Sig. Baptista Draghi used the great organ, and Lock (who must not be turned out of place, nor the execution) had a small chamber organ hard by, on which he performed with them the same services." Also-"He" (Lock) "set most of the psalms to musick in parts, for the use of some vertuoso ladies in the city; and he composed a magnificent consort of four parts after the old style, which was the last of the kind that hath been made, so we may rank him with Cleomenes, king of Sparta, who was styled 'ultimus Nerooum.'" What dear old-fashioned sonorousness! We can fancy that even Lock himself would be rather startled to hear such magniloquent parallelism, not to mention the vocal adaptability of the Latin appellation.

MATTEIS, N.—This name only comes before us once in these records, and that is in 1686, when he witnesses a letter of assignment by F. Cruys. Grove says he was an eminent Italian violinist who came to England about 1672. In 1696 he composed an Ode for S. Cecilia's Day, but this, according to North, was never printed. Pepys thus alludes to him:—"By all that I have knowne of him and other musick of Italy, I cannot but judge him to have bin second to Corelli."

NIGHTINGALE, R.—Hawkins has a brief note about this musician, in which he says that he was distinguished as a singer, that he was one of the Chapel Gentlemen under Charles I., that he became a clergyman, and that at the Restoration, though then advanced in years, he was again appointed a member of the Royal Chapel.

Notari, A.—He first appears in 1625. In 1633 he is in debt. In 1660, Henry Purcell is put in his place, but see entry on p. 124. In 1662, Henry Purcell is appointed for the lute "in the same place" with Notari. In 1663 (?) he is written down as "mort," and in 1664, John Goodgroome is appointed in his place. Fétis says that he was an Italian musician who established himself in London

in the beginning of the 17th century. About 1614 he printed a collection of pieces under the following title, "Prime musiche nuove a 1, 2, e 3 voci, per cantar con la tiorba ed altri stromenti. Londres, 1616."

PORDAGE, Mr.—In Evelyn's Diary, under date Jan. 27, 1685, we have the following entry: "I din'd at Lord Sunderland's, being invited to heare that celebrated voice of Mr. Pordage, newly come from Rome; his singing was after the Venetian recitative, as masterly as could be, and with an excellent voice both treble and basse—Pordage is a priest, as Mr. Bernard Howard told me in private."

Pownell, N.—The Cheque Book says that Mr. R. Sandie (see Index) and Mr. N. Pownall had in 1630 an admonition given them to be more industrious and studious. This was when Laud was Bishop of London and Dean of the Chapel Royal.

Purcell, Henry.—In 1660 he is amongst the composers for the violin in the place of Angelo Notari; this is afterwards crossed out, and the name of John Goodgroome is written over Purcell's name, with the date August 20, 1664. This is confirmed on pp. 170 and 173, and is stated to be in consequence of Purcell the elder's death, though in 1662, Henry is appointed for lute and voice in the same place with Notari. On June 10, 1673, Henry Purcell, apparently the son, is appointed keeper of organs, &c., and assistant to John Hingston, and in December, 1673, clothing and £30 per annum is to be provided for a certain Henry Purcell, late Child of the Chapel, whose voice has changed. Also in January, 1674, there is an account for fine holland and a felt hat for this same Henry; in February and at Michaelmas bills for handkerchiefs; and in 1676 there is an order for four whole shirts, four half shirts, bands and cuffs. (Bumpus says that Henry, the younger, was born in 1658, so that he was fifteen years old when he left the Chapel-are we therefore to believe that at this age he was appointed to a responsible post?) About 1674, Henry's name is substituted in the list of musicians for that of Matthew Lock, and on Sep. 10, 1677, he is appointed composer in ordinary with fee for the violin, in the place of Lock, now deceased. In 1683, Henry is appointed organmaker and keeper, in place of Mr. Hingston, deceased. (Possibly this may point to his previously being under the tutelage of

Hingston, and perhaps in a manner apprenticed to him.) For the full terms of the warrant, allowing him the same powers and privileges as his predecessor, and the same salary (£60 per annum), and this quite apart from any sum for necessary expenses, see p. 364. On August 31, 1685, in the list of James II.'s musicians, we have the entry, "Harpsicall, Henry Purcell." On p. 394 he is described as "musician composer," and on Nov. 30, 1695, Dr. Blow and Mr. Bernard Smith succeed him on his decease. Henry lost his father when he was only six years old, and was left to the guardianship of his uncle, Thomas Purcell. It will be seen that unfortunately Henry the younger only lived for thirty-seven years.

Purcell, Thomas.—In Nov., 1662, he is appointed musician in ordinary in the place of Henry Lawes, deceased. On p. 124 he is put amongst composers for the violin in place of Henry Lawes, and on p. 155 is in the receipt for lutes and voices in the private music, in the place of Henry Lawes, of £36:2:6 per annum, the lowest amount mentioned in the list on p. 207. On p. 252 he is mentioned as Groom of the Robes. In 1673 he is appointed with Humfryes in the place of George Hudson, deceased, as composer for the violins—and payment to both is to be at the rate of £42:5:10 during their natural lives, and to be continued for the longest liver, but the next entry (p. 257) mentions the sum of £200 per annum, and the longest liver. In 1674 he receives three liveries, in the places respectively of Henry Lawes, Dr. John Wilson, and George Hudson. He receives £40 annually as Groom of the Robes (p. 289). In Oct., 1675, he is paid £410:8:0 for attendance of himself and organist on Charles II. at Windsor for seventy-two days. In 1676 he is appointed to the private music in the place of Dr. Wilson at £20 per annum. In 1679 he appears in the list of the Gentlemen who attended at Windsor in 1678. (Amongst the Children who were there at the same time is one Daniel Purcell. Grove says that Daniel was the youngest son of old Henry Purcell.) On p. 381 there is a memorandum of monies owing on the decease of Thomas Purcell.

SEBENICO, G.—On p. 222 this musician is with another of his countrymen mentioned in conjunction with Mr. Killigrew under the heading of "Italian Musitians," a curious circumstance, and evidently a clerical error in the inclusion of Mr. Killigrew. In 1673

"a chayne or medall of gold of about the value of £70" is to be given to him. Sebenico was a professor of singing, a good tenor, also a composer. He was born at Venice towards the middle of the seventeenth century. A note in North's Memoirs speaks of him as an obscure musician who came to this country with Mary d'Este, Princess of Modena. Some of his compositions are preserved in the Oxford Music School.

SHORE.—Of this family we have four members mentioned in these records. There is a John Shore, trumpeter, who appears in 1688, and in 1690 is appointed to attend King William to Holland, being paid for such service 5s. "per diem." In 1695 there is a John Shore, musician, who in 1696-7 is appointed one of the musicians in ordinary under William and Mary. The last mention of him is in 1700. Mathias Shore, serjeant trumpeter, appears in 1681-2. As serjeant he has £80 per annum. In the time of William and Mary he attends the King to Holland at the wages of 10d. a day. In 1696 he claims £60 for his livery for 1692. In 1697 he is in the enjoyment of froo per annum. It is said that the daughter of Mathias married the celebrated actor, Colley William Shore appears in 1679. In 1690 he is to attend King William to Holland. In 1693-4 there is an order for a new livery for him, he having been robbed whilst campaigning. In the same campaign, in Flanders, he also seems to have been robbed of his trumpet. In 1696-7, in company with three other trumpeters, he attends the Ambassadors for the Treaty of Peace. In 1700 he is appointed serjeant trumpeter in the place of Mathias, although previous to this date he is once mentioned (evidently in error) as serjeant. The title of Serjeant Trumpeter lapsed when the late Thomas John Harper retired (see Athenaum, Jan. 2, 1909). As the notes under this name deal with trumpeters, it may now be mentioned that in the case of Henry Peacock, who is many times mentioned in these records as a "pentionary trumpeter," we find the following in the Calendar of State Papers (Domestic Series):-" 1660. Henry Peacock, His Majesty's Trumpetere (Petition to the King) for restoration to the place which he held under him as Prince, and not confirmed therein in Scotland. Lost £1,500, all he had, in the Royalist cause, was dangerously wounded at the battle of Worcester, and imprisoned. With note that he is to bring a certificate to the Lord Chamberlain for serjeant trumpeter."

SMYTH, BERNARD.—The real name of the family is Schmidt. Bernard came to England at the time of the Restoration. He is said to have been called "Father" Smith to distinguish him from his two nephews. In 1674 he is spoken of as "the organ maker." In 1681 he is appointed organ-maker in the place of Farr. On p. 398 there is a special warrant to Bernard. In 1690 he is to provide a new organ for the Chapel at Hampton Court. In 1695 he is appointed with Blow as tuner of various instruments. In 1698, £200 is to be advanced to him for the organ at Whitehall Chapel. In 1699 he is to deliver to the minister and wardens of St. Ann's, Westminster, the organ in S. James' Chapel. He last appears in these records in 1699.

STAGGINS .- Of this family no less than six members are mentioned in these records, but of these six, three are only distinguished by a solitary reference, giving us the following dates: James, 1660-1; John and Thomas, 1676. Isaac, the father of Nicholas, appears in 1660, and in 1684, Charles, another son, takes Isaac's place. 1671, Nicholas is appointed for the violin in the place of W. Young, and in 1673 takes Young's place for the flute. In 1674 he is appointed to be master of the violinists, and in this year he appears to have taken Grabu's place. On pp. 297-8 there is a very interesting bill from Nicholas for £93:2:0. In 1678-9, Dr. Staggins and the violinists are to attend the King every night a play is acted at Court. In 1685 Dr. Nicholas Staggins is re-appointed Master of the Music under James II. On p. 280 we have another bill from Dr. Nicholas in connection with expenses incurred at the coronation of James II. On p. 383 there is an admonition to the Doctor. Later, we find that the Doctor attended King William to Holland. In 1695-6 (be it mentioned with bated breath) he owes the brewer £ 120 (!) for "beare and ale." In 1700, John Eccles is appointed Master, on the Doctor's decease.

Testa, Andrea.—In the Calendar of State Papers (Domestic Series) we have under date of 1668 a petition of Andrea to the King for a pension promised by His Majesty, "as formerly granted to Gerolamo Zenti, harpsicall maker, whose place he supplies, being sent over by Zenti, who went to Paris, and died in the French King's service.

TINKER, PHILIP.—In 1661 a Rev. Philip Tinker was Confessor of the Household. It was "the duty of the Clerk of the Closet or

Confessor to the Sovereign, who was usually a Bishop, to attend at the right hand of the Sovereign in the Royal Closet during Divine Service."

TOMKINS.—All of the family who are mentioned in these records appear to have been sons of a Rev. Thomas Tomkins, of Gloucester Cathedral. Thomas, who appears in 1625, was sworn as organist of the Chapel Royal in 1621, and died in 1656. John is mentioned in 1628, and in 1633 was organist on Charles the First's journey to Scotland. Giles succeeds Richard Deering, and is co-organist with his brother in 1633. He is appointed to the virginals in 1660, and is inscribed as dead in 1668, Blow being his successor. Robert is in 1641 amongst the King's musicians.

TURNER, WILLIAM.—In the time of Charles II. he is under Captain Cooke, who is to have £30 per annum for keeping him after he left the Chapel, his voice being changed. This is to commence in 1666. In 1671 he is amongst the Gentlemen at Windsor. In 1672 he is appointed for the lute and voice in the place of his master, now deceased. A warrant on page 264 shows that he had £30 yearly from 1666 to 1670. In 1674 he is singing in "The Tempest" at His Royal Highness' Theatre, and is to remain in town (even in the King's absence) all the week for that purpose, only taking the week-end at Windsor. In 1674 he is apparently engaged in the masque at Whitehall. Three of his anthems are mentioned on page 307-" Lord, what is man," "O Lord God of hosts," and "O Lord, Thou hast been our refuge." In 1689 he is appointed to the vocal music. "He had the singular honour," says Boyce, "of being a Gentleman of the Royal Chapels to seven kings and queens successively." He was eighty-eight years old when he died. Grove says that he died in 1739-40, having survived his wife, with whom he had lived nearly seventy years, only four days, and they were buried in one grave in the cloister of Westminster Abbey. A charming instance of wedded constancy, and a good trait in one who was the guardian of young Henry, his nephew!

Walsh, John.—In 1692 he is appointed "Musical Instrument Maker in Ordinary to His Majesty," in the place of John Shaw, surrendered. He last appears in 1699. He was one of the most eminent music-publishers of his day, and is said to have amassed a fortune of £20,000. He died in 1736.

Warwick, Thomas.—He first appears in 1628, and is mentioned in 1641 for the virginal. In 1660, Christopher Gibbons takes his place. "Mr. T. Warrick in 1630 received a check of his whole paye for the month of March because he presumed to playe verses on the organ at service tyme, being formerly inhibited by the Deane from doinge the same, by reason of his insufficiency for that solemne service." (Cheque Book.)

WHITE, BLASE.—" 1675. Mr. Blasius White was by the Subdeane discharged from His Majestie's service in obedience to His Majestie's pleasure so signified in this following letter from Mr. Vice-Chamberlain." (Cheque Book.) No reason is assigned in the letter for such discharge.

WILSON, Dr. John.—He was born in 1594, and first appears in these records in 1635. He is said to have been a Gentleman of the Chapel. His name is not found in the Cheque Book, but he is there described in a warrant of April 17, 1641, as being amongst "Musicians for the Waytes." He died at Westminster in 1673, and was buried in the cloisters of the Abbey, and on p. 266 we have the certificate of his burial. In 1673-4, Thomas Purcell takes his place. He is said to have been a fine lutenist, and Charles I. greatly admired his singing.

Wise, Michael.—In 1644, James Farr is to be paid £30 yearly for the maintenance of Wise, whose voice has changed; to commence from September last, 1663. In 1665, Captain Cooke is to be paid for his disbursements for clothes for Wise. In 1678, £30 is to be paid yearly to Wise during Charles the Second's pleasure. In 1684 Wise is mentioned with Dr. W. Child as musician in ordinary for the cornet, with wages of 20d. a day, and usual livery. Bumpus says that in 1668 he succeeded Giles Tomkins as organist of Salisbury, and that in 1675 he succeeded Courteville (mentioned in these records) at the Chapel Royal. Grove gives particulars respecting his somewhat tragic end.

Woodwarde, Richard.—He appears in these records in 1546-7. In 1563 he is mentioned as "musician to the lady the Queen" (Elizabeth). There is evidently some confusion here, as details given by Grove relate to R. Edwards, and yet they seem in part to fit this personage, who does not appear to have been really a bagpiper, as he is only once so mentioned. Possibly there should have been two separate entries in the Index, but the question presents difficulties.



NOTES ON REFERENCES TO COSTUME IN THESE RECORDS.

PAGE I.—"Sarsynett" = sarcenet. A thin silk, first used in the thirteenth century. In Henry II.'s time we find this material mentioned as being in use for trumpet banners.

PAGE 10.—" Sloppes "=slops. The wide Dutch breeches mentioned by Chaucer, and again introduced during the reign of Elizabeth.

Page 10.—"Cassock." A long loose coat, or gown, worn by both sexes. White and green were the Tudor colours.

PAGE 119.—"Chamblett"=camlet. A mixed stuff of wool and silk, used for gowns in the time of Elizabeth and James I. It was originally manufactured from camel's hair, and, though expensive, was said to be of lasting wear.

PAGE 119.—"Budge." Lambskin with the wool dressed outwards. It is still used for trimming livery gowns. (Budge Row is so named because of this fur, and of the skinners who dwelt there.) In an account made out for Lord Burghley about 1585 there appears the following:—

"Allowance of Apparrell for a Musician out of the Gardrobe."

"Chamlett, 14 yardes, at 3s. 4d. the yarde - 46s. 8d."

"Velvet, 6 yardes, at 15s. the yarde, amounteth to 4l. 10s."

"Damask, 8 yardes at 8s. the yarde - - 3l. 4s."

"One furre of Budge, pryce - - - 4l."

"Lyneing and making - - - - 20s."

Summa 15l. os. 8d."

The above sum was the usual livery in the time of Elizabeth, and it is said (I cannot vouch for the accuracy of the statement) to be equal to fifty or seventy pounds in our present monetary system. The usual provision for the livery, as will be seen in our records, was the sum of £16:2:6.

PAGES 136-7.—"Bastard." A term applied to several articles. Bastard cloth is mentioned as an English manufacture in the time of Richard III.

PAGE 153.—" Perfumed gloves." These were brought as presents from Italy in the sixteenth century, a custom that continued till the middle of the eighteenth century.

PAGE 229.—" Shalloon." A woollen stuff, first imported from Chalons, where it was originally manufactured, and of which its name is a corruption.

PAGE 285.—"Avinnion." A stuff upon which metallic colour was printed, chiefly used for fancy dresses, and named from Avignon, in Southern France, the place of its original manufacture.

PAGE 285.—"Tabby." A thick silken stuff with a soft nap. In 1487 "white and grey tab" is mentioned for carriage awnings in the wardrobe accounts of Henry VII.

PAGE 285.—"Taffata." A thin silk used in the sixteenth century for various articles of dress, and considered as a luxury. It was used for doublets and pages' dresses in the ensuing century.

PAGE 286.—"Tinsell." A kind of satin.

Page 288.—"Castor" = the beaver. The name was hence applied to beaver hats.

For most of the above information I am indebted to the Glossary appended to Fairholt's "Costume in England" (Bohn's Artists' Library.)

NOTES ON COURT MASQUES, PARTICULARLY THE WHITEHALL MASQUE OF 1674.

It will be noticed that in the years 1674-5 we have a vast amount of detail concerning the production of a masque at Whitehall. There is given a list of singers and musicians who took part in the masque, further on we have bills showing cost of dresses furnished for some of the musicians, with accounts as to materials and making, and lastly a bill to be paid to the Master of the Music for labours entailed in attending to the proper supplying of the music for the masque. I was at first inclined to consider this masque, which was evidently a function of considerable importance, as being an adaptation of some French opera of the time. But when I carefully read the chapter in Canon Sheppard's "History of Whitehall," which treats of this form of entertainment, I could come to no other conclusion, so identical were many of the particulars, that this is none other than Crowne's masque, "Calisto, or the Chaste Nymph." I should advise everyone to read the chapter referred to, as it really supplements all that is set down in these records.

Before speaking of this particular performance, I should like to mention three masques that were presented at Court in the reign of James I., and that may be fitly included in this section. They call for attention, because amongst those employed, we find the names of some musical worthies who live again in these records.

The Masque of Hymen, produced in 1605-6, was the work of Jonson and Jones. The music was composed by "Master Alphonso Ferrabosco," and the dances made and taught by "Master Thomas Giles." The Masque in celebration of the "Lord Viscount Haddington's marriage at Court on the Shrove Tuesday at night" (1607-8)—the Carnival season seems to have been a favoured time

for these performances — was called "The Hue and Cry after Cupid" (an admirable title for a modern play). Of the four dances in it, two were made by Thomas Giles, two by "Master Heer Herne," and, as before, the tunes were by "Master Alphonso Ferrabosco."

The Masque, "Love freed from Ignorance and Folly" (a rather cumbersome naming), was presented at Christmas, 1610-11. The Bill of Costs has been discovered among the Pell Records. Amongst "Rewards to the persons imployed in the Maske" are the following items:—"To Mr. Alfonso, for making the songes, £20; to Thomas Lupo" (mentioned in our records) "for setting the dances to the violins, £5; to the twelve musicians that were priests, that songe and played, £24; to the twelve other lutes that suplied, and wth flute, £12; to the ten violencas that continually practized to the Queen, £20; to four more that were added at the Maske, £4; fifteen musitions that played to the pages and fooles, £20; to eighteen hoboyes and sackbutts, £10."

Before giving any account of "Calisto," I here introduce two maxims which attracted my attention on reading through the "Mountebank's Maske," by John Marston. The one is, "He cannot be a cuckold that weares a Gregorian, for a periwigg will never fitt such a head." On p. 384 of our records it will be noticed that several musicians are classified under the heading "Gregorians." I do not mean to say that the above quotation has a note of explanation in it. I cannot imagine that in describing musicians any term of political significance would be used; rather, looking at the period in which this term occurs, must we conclude that it refers to the modal character of the music which they sang. The other maxim is somewhat in the nature of a pun, and I commend it as a motto: "Musicians cannot but be helthfull, for they live by good aire."

With regard to John Crowne, the writer of "Calisto," it will be sufficient to say that he was the son of an Independent minister "in that part of America which is called Nova Scotia"—that he was considered superior to Dryden as a writer of comedies—that he contributed a song or two, set to music by Henry Purcell, to the "Gentleman's Journal, or Monthly Miscellany," edited by Motteux in 1691-2—and that he got the nickname of "Starch Johnny Crowne" from the "stiff and unalterable primness of his long crayat."

It was owing to the influence of the Earl of Rochester that Crowne was selected to compose this Masque, for the task ought naturally to have fallen to Dryden, as Poet-Laureate. Dryden appears to have gracefully waived his rights, and was good-natured enough to write an Epilogue, but this, through the above-named influence, was rejected, a somewhat unnecessary insult.

The Masque, which was printed in 1675, is dedicated to "Her Highness the Lady Mary, Eldest Daughter of His Royal Highness the Duke." Crowne, in his "Preface to the Reader," says that he was only allowed a month to write the play, prologue, and songs. "I was also confined in the number of the persons; I had but seven allowed me—those seven to be all ladies, and of those ladies two only to appear in men's habits": "I have in the Prologue represented the river Thames by a woman, and Europe by a man, contrary to all authority and antiquity. I know no sexes in lands and rivers, nor of any laws in poetry, but the fundamental one to please,—and the graceful motions and admirable singing of Mrs. Davis" (mentioned in our records) "did sufficiently prove the discretion of my choice. And Thames, Peace, and Plenty, being represented by women, I was necessitated to make Europe a man-otherwise I must either have made those parts of the world men, and one a woman; or worse, representing them all by women, have spoiled the music by making it consist all of trebles."

Turning to the list of names in our records on pp. 280-1, the following can be identified with characters represented in the Masque: Mrs. Davies, the River Thames; Mrs. Knight, Peace; Mrs. Butler, Plenty; Mr. Hart, Europe; Mr. Richardson, Asia; Mr. Marsh, jun., Africa; Mr. Ford, America; Mr. Turner, the Genius of England. These were all in the Prologue, and the only words that came from the three continents, in response to Europe saying "I will my thanks in offerings proclaim," were the following:—(Asia) "I'll lend you spice;" (America) "I gold;" (Africa) "I the same;" so that these were not exacting parts!

In the "Choruses betwixt the Acts" the following were employed:—Mr. Hart, Strephon; Mrs. Turner, Coridon; Mrs. Davis, Sylvia; Mrs. Knight, Daphne; Mrs. Butler and Mrs. Hunt, two "African Women, or Blacks." These interludes break up the several acts of the Masque, filling up the time usually allowed for the "entr'actes." They are conceived in a pastoral vein, as the names of the characters will show, and whilst they formed a sort of

explanatory undercurrent to the play, they afforded opportunities for singing and dancing. They have some points of resemblance with the Spanish "entreméses." In the Prologue and the Masque itself there were also various dancing entries; for instance, in the Prologue one stage direction is: "Here the Princesses and the other ladies danced several sarabands, with castanets" (the saraband being really a Spanish measure). "A minuet was also danced by his Grace the Duke of Monmouth." At the end of Act I., there is the direction: "An entry of Basques" (probably to exhibit some quaint dance of the Pyrenean region). We find also at the end of the other acts respectively: "An entry of gypsies," "An entry of satyrs," "An entry of Bacchuses." In the Prologue we meet with this naïve direction: "The following stanza is properly part of the Genius's speech—but being set extremely pleasantly, and for a treble voice, it was sung by Thames."

As a specimen of the lyrical merit of the songs, we cull the vocal number at the conclusion of the Prologue. "Enter two, who sing this following song—

Now for the play, the prologue is done,
The dancing is o'er, and the singers are gone.
The ladies so fine, and so fair, it surpasses,
Are dress'd, and have all tak'n leave of their glasses.
Where are the slaves that should make ready the stage?
Here, here are the slaves should make ready the stage.
An Entry of Carpenters."

In praising and thanking the performers, Crowne mentions "the singers, and the composer of all the musick, both vocal and instrumental.—Mr. Staggins has not only delighted us with his excellent composition, but with the hopes of seeing in a very short time a master of music in England equal to any France or Italy have produced." (See Mr. Staggins' bill in connection with charges for the music of the Masque on p. 290 of our records.)

The Masque proper is taken from that incident in the Second Book of Ovid's Metamorphoses which shows the meeting of Jupiter with Calisto, a daughter of the King of Lycaonia. Crowne dexterously avoids the natural and realistic sequence of the story by making Calisto triumph by her chastity over the amorous advances of the monarch of Olympus, who presents himself to her affrighted gaze first in the guise of Diana and then in his own shape. Crowne also introduces an underplot of his own imagining in which he makes

Mercury fall in love with one of Diana's attendants, Psecas, "an envious nymph," who assists Juno against Calisto, and is rewarded with the jealous queen's friendship.

The characters in the Masque were represented by the following Royal and noble personages:—Calisto, H.H. the Lady Mary; Nyphe, friend to Calisto, H.H. the Lady Anne; Jupiter, the Lady Henrietta Wentworth; Juno, the Countess of Sussex; Psecas, the Lady Mary Mordant; Diana, Mrs. Blagge; Mercury, Mrs. Jennings. "The Nymphs who danced in the prologue and in the several entries in the play were, the Countess of Derby, the Countess of Pembroke, the Lady Katharine Herbert, Mrs. Fitzgerald, Mrs. Frazier." "The Persons of Quality of the men that danced were, His Grace the Duke of Monmouth, the Viscount Dunblaine, the Lord Daincourt, Mr. Trevor, Mr. Harpe, Mr. Lane."

The Princess Mary, afterwards Queen Mary, was born at S. James' Palace on April 30, 1662, and was therefore nearly thirteen years old when she acted in this Masque. Princess Anne, afterwards Queen Anne, was born Feb. 10, 1664, and was therefore nearly eleven years old at the end of 1674. Mrs. Jennings, Maid of Honour to the Duchess of York, subsequently married John Churchill, and was famous as the "confidante" and adviser of Queen Anne. Mrs. Frazier was a Maid of Honour to the Queen.

Evelyn mentions that Mrs. Godolphin, when Margaret Blagge, performed the character of Diana in this Masque, and "had on that day near twenty thousand pounds value of jewells," also that during the performance she lost a diamond lent to her by the Countess of Suffolk. The stage was swept and diligent search made, but it was probably stolen in "the infinite crowd." However, the King or the Duke sent sufficient money to repair the Countess' loss. "For the rest of that days triumph I have a particular account still by me of the rich apparel she" (Mrs. Blagge) "had on her, amounting besides the Pearles and Pretious Stones, to above three hundred pounds, but of all which she immediately disposed her selfe soe soone as ever she could get clear of the stage. Without complimenting any creature or trifling with the rest who staid the collation and refreshment-away she slips like spiritt to Berkley House to her little oratorye: whither I waited on her, and left her on her knees thanking God that she was delivered from this vanity, and with her Saviour againe; never, says she, will I come within this temptation more whilst I breath."

I extract the following from the particulars given by Canon Sheppard concerning the Masque in his Whitehall book:—"All the Women's Accounts of their Habits delivered into his Maty. Great Wardrobe, Madam Knight, Pease, £4:10:0; a Shephardess, £3:10:0; Madam Butler, Plenty, £3:15:0; Afrycan Lady, £3:3:0; Madam Hunt, shepherdess, £5:1:6; Mrs. Maistres and Mrs. Pearse, £4:1:6; Mrs. Hunt, £3:15:0." Also, these further charges, which may be compared with those that are to be found on pp. 286-7 of our records:—"Mascarading Habitts made by John Allan, 10 violins, £5; made by William Watts, 10 violins at 10/each, £5. Four gittar men at 18/- each, £3:12:0. Made by W. Watts, 3 trumpets at £1:14:6 each, £5:3:6; made by T. Allan, one trumpeter and one kettle drum, £3:9:0."

There is a large amount of useful information concerning this Masque in Vol. I. of the Dramatic Works of John Crowne, published by Sotheran in 1873, and I am indebted to this work for many of the particulars above given.

Evelyn in his Diary gives December 15 and 22, 1674, as the dates on which "Calisto" was presented at Court. On the first occasion he calls it "a comedie," and on the second "the Pastoral."

NOTES ON SOME GENERAL REFERENCES IN THESE RECORDS.

PAGE I.—"Mynstralls." The word "minstrel" does not appear to have been in use in this country before the Norman conquest. By a Record of the 9th year of Edward IV. it is recited to be the duty of minstrels to pray in the King's Chapel, "and particularly for the departed souls of the King and Queen when they shall die." "The minstrels derived their knowledge from the schools of the monasteries. They learnt something of the theoretical principles of music, the practical part of singing, and the elements of grammar, including perhaps as much knowledge of poetry as was sufficient for the composition of a song or ballad." North, in alluding to the reign of Henry VIII., says: "There was small show of skill in music in England, except what belonged to the cathedral churches and monasteries (when such were), and for that reason the consortiers wherever they went were called Minstels, and then the whole faculty of music—The Minstrelsie."

PAGE 2.—"Shalmoyes." "'Chalmy,''Shawm' in Old English, is a clarinet of low pitch." (Burney.)

PAGES 7 and 8.—In comparing the list of names given on these pages with a somewhat similar list given in Burney, and with another list (almost similar to Burney's) given in Hawkins, we may note that the following names correspond with those found in these records. [In any variation of the name, such variation is added in brackets.] "William Hychyns (Huchins), Robert Philipps, Thomas Byrde, Richard Bower (Bowyer), Robert Perrye (Perry), William Barber, Robert Richemound (Richemount), Thomas Whayt (Wayte), Thomas Talys, Nicholas Mellowe, Thomas Wright." From the same sources we have some particulars as to various payments, which may be compared with those on pp. 38 and 39. Though the sums mentioned in our records belong to a somewhat later date, there will in some instances be observed a striking similarity,

notwithstanding the fact that they have another origin. I quote those that deserve attention, placing on the left side details derived from the writers I have mentioned, and on the right side details which we find in the records.

PAGE 44.—The list of Gentlemen of the Chapel, given on this page of the records, when compared with the list given in the Cheque Book for the year 1604, gives as a result the dual occurrence of the following names (the variations in the Cheque Book version being signified by enclosure in brackets): "Doctor Ball, Nathaniel Giles, William Birde, Richard Canwell (Granwell), Drue (Crue) Sharpe, William Randall (Randoll), Edmond Browne, Thomas Woodison (Woodson), Robert Stone, Henry Oveseed (Henrie Eveseede), Robert Allison, John Stephens, John Howlett (Hewlett), Thomas Gold (Goolde), Richard Plumley, Peter Wright (Wryght), William Lawrence, James Davis (Davies), John Amery (Amerye), John Baldwell (Baldwin), Francis Wilbroughe (Wyborow), Arthur Cocke, George Woodison (Woodson), Edmund Hoop (Hooper)." A list given in the Cheque Book for the year 1603 does not agree so well with our records, but in one for the Coronation of James I. the names are almost the same as in these records.

PAGE 59.—"Black cloth for liveries." In the Cheque Book there is this notice:—"At the funeralls of Kinge James—Natha. Giles, Dr. and Mr. of the Children; William Heather, Dr.; T. Hewlett, Clerk of the Check; John Steephens, Recorder of Songes; and Orlando Gibbons, senior Organist, had the lyke

allowance of nine yards apiece for themselves as the ministers had, and two yards apiece for their servauntes. The rest of the gentlemen, being 17, had for their blacks every one seven yards, and for every of their servauntes two yards apiece."

PAGE 64.—The Masque here mentioned is probably "Pan's Anniversary," a Masque presented at Court before King James I. in 1625, the inventors being Inigo Jones and Ben Jonson.

PAGE 88.—There is a mention of two treble lutes for the Masque at Shrovetide. This would appear, from the date, to have been "The Temple of Love," a Masque at Whitehall, presented by the Queen and her ladies on Shrove Tuesday, 1634, by Inigo Jones and William Davenant.

Page 94.—" Chayre" = choir.

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PAGE 113.—The entries in the Cheque Book of the Chapel Royal cease in 1640, and re-commence in 1660. In these records, as will be seen, the entries stop at the beginning of 1644, and begin again about the middle of 1660. The gap is caused by the Commonwealth epoch.

PAGE 120.—We have an account of the amount of scarlet cloth given to, respectively, the Children, the wind musicians, the composers, and the violinists, for the Coronation of Charles II., and there is a similar reference on p. 392. This scarlet cloth was for the purpose of being made into mantles, according to the following directions: "These mantles were made like a Rocolo (but without a cape, button, or buttonhole), gathered and bound round with a silk Ferrit, to tye before with a Bow Not; and a silk button and loop stitched round to fasten it round the neck like a Rocolo. The length of the Mantle must be so as to reach the ground behind." This word "Rocolo" is evidently a somewhat misspelt form of an Italian word, and would seem to imply that these mantles were to be made on the model of a rochet. In Fairholt's "Costume in England" a Rochette is defined as a loose upper garment, and a clerical gown, and a Rochet as a cloak without a cape.

PAGE 134.—On this page we find a warrant for taking up all trumpeters, drummers, and fifers, who sound with trumpets, or beat drums, or blow fifes, at plays, dumb shows, or "models," without license from the serjeant-trumpeter. On p. 206 there is a similar order, with this addition—it empowers the serjeant to take fees from show-mongers. On p. 217 there is a warrant for apprehending

seven persons for keeping playhouses, and sounding trumpets, drums, and fifes, at dumb shows, and "modells," without paying the fee to the serjeant—the said fee being 12d. per day, to be paid by every playhouse when there are performances, the King's players excepted. On p. 225 there is a similar notice regarding the penalties attaching to dumb shows, &c. On pp. 232-3 there is set out in full the form of warrant used for apprehending these offenders. There are other references in these records, which, though they have to do with the Corporation of Music, and not with the Serjeant-Trumpeter, may here conveniently be noticed. On p. 169, "all persons professing the art and science of musick, who play at playhouses, gamehouses, taverns, victualling houses, or any place in the city of London and Westminster, without the approbation and lycense of the Marshall and Corporation of musique" are to be apprehended. On p. 217 we notice that five persons, amongst them Cæsar Duffill, one of the King's violinists, are arrested for "teaching, practising, and executing music, in companies and otherwise," without approbation or license. On p. 221 there are the names of five other persons so arrested. On p. 231 there are the names of four others. On p. 241 we have the text of a warrant for apprehending four musicians (names given); on p. 246 another body of five are to be arrested; and on p. 240 we read that no less a number than seventeen are to be arrested, although it should be stated that some of the names have occurred previously, and are only here repeated. Lastly, on p. 257 there are the names of seven persons to be arrested on similar charges. Grove points out that so early as 1469, Edward IV. granted a charter to his "beloved minstrels" empowering them to constitute themselves into a guild; that at the opening of the sixteenth century there is a mention of a new guild, a "Fellowship of Minstrels and Freemen of the City of London;" that this Fellowship was reconstituted under a charter of James I., which brought into existence the Company of Musicians. (For further information respecting the history of our Musicians' Company, I refer interested readers to the admirable hand-book issued by the Company some few years ago.) The main object of these respective bodies was always one and the same, viz., to safeguard their privileges, and to prevent the unlawful exercise of their calling by those not properly qualified for the same. Whether the Corporation of Music, above alluded to, is identical with the Company seems a question open to some doubt, but the use of the term

"Marshal" leads me to believe that such identity might be safely established. Burney is very severe and acrimonious when speaking of the Musicians' Company. "For what purposes does it exist," he asks, with a lofty scorn, "but to provide aliens with a cheap expedient of acquiring the freedom of the city, and it hinders from processions and city feasts those street and country-dance players who have talent. It has been ever held in derision by real professors. Upon what beneficial principle James I. incorporated the musicians of London into a Company it is now difficult to discover." If old Burney could be summoned to earth again, and see the excellent work the Company is now doing in the cause of music, I think he would rub his eyes a little, and ask for a pinch of snuff to clear his brain!

PAGE 142.—" Collar of S.S." "The collar of S.S. consisted of a silver collar, between the links of which were twelve small pieces of silver engraved with the twelve articles of the creed, together with a single trefoil; the image of S. Simplicius (S.S.) hung at the collar, and from it seven plates represented the seven gifts of the Holy Ghost" (Dodd's Manual). Possibly in the case under notice a modification of the original design may have been thought to be more in order.

PAGE 147.—Order concerning "curtolls." Hawkins writes, "Upon the revival of the choral service, in the royal chapel especially, they were necessitated for want of treble voices, to make use of cornets, and on particular occasions sacbuts and other instruments were also employed. At James the Second's coronation walked two of the King's musicians in scarlet mantles, playing each on a sacbut, and another, clad in like manner, playing on a double curtal or bassoon." Matthew Locke, in "The Present Practice of Music Vindicated" (1673), writes: "For above a year after the opening of His Majesty's Chappell the orderers of the musick there were necessitated to supply the superior parts of their musick with cornets and men's feigned voices, there being not one lad for all that time capable of singing his part readily."

PAGE 176.—An order for gowns of coloured silk for twenty-four violinists, half for the Theatre Royal, half for the Duke of York's Theatre, and twenty-four garlands of coloured flowers—all these things to be given to Mr. Killigrew for His Majesty's extraordinary service. On p. 211 there is another order to the same effect, only

in this case, the gowns are not to be so full, and are to have short sleeves to the elbow; it was probably found that the former habits seriously interfered with the playing of the violins; on p. 263 there is evidently a similar order; on p. 266 we have a like order, and again the gowns are to have short sleeves. On p. 269 we find still another order, "after the same manner and fashion as formerly." I think, looking at the date of the first of these entries, that it refers to the representation at the King's Theatre in Drury Lane, in January, 1664, of "The Indian Queen," a tragedy in heroic verse, by Sir Robert Howard and Mr. Dryden. With regard to Mr. Killigrew and the two theatres here mentioned, I must make a necessary digression, which, though not belonging strictly to the art of music, concerns a sister art, and may be interesting to a general reader. These particulars are taken from Dr. Doran's "Annals." Charles II., in 1663, granted patents for two theatres in London. Under one patent, Killigrew, at the head of the King's Company, opened a new theatre in Drury Lane in August, 1663: under the second patent, Davenant and the Duke of York's company found a house, first at the Cockpit, and then in Salisbury Court, Fleet Street. This second house was destroyed in the fire of 1666, but before the great conflagration Davenant and his troop went to the old Tennis Court. In 1671, after Davenant's death, his company migrated to a house designed by Wren, and decorated by Grinling Gibbons; this was the Duke's Theatre, in Dorset Gardens. It is worth remembering, for this presents a note of similarity with the Chapel Royal establishment, that the actors in Killigrew's company were sworn at the Lord Chamberlain's office to serve the King. Of these gentlemen, ten were enrolled in the Royal Household establishment, and provided with liveries of scarlet cloth and silver lace. In the warrants of the Lord Chamberlain they were styled "Gentlemen of the Great Chamber." It may not be inappropriate to quote here, with respect to the above-mentioned dresses for musicians, the following passage from North's "Memoires of Musick": "In the reign of King James the First musick had the greatest encouragement, for the masques at Court, which were a sort of Balles, or Operas, found imployment for very many of them, and in the Theaters at Court they were adorned with liverys, that is divers coloured silk mantles and scarfs with rich capps, and the master in the shape of an Apollo, for decoration of the same." The office of Master of the Revels is also alluded to on p. 176, and a

word of explanation may not be amiss. Hone's "Every-Day Book" (vol. i., p. 1243) has the following: "The late T. C. Crowle was master of the revels. In that quality he claimed a seat in any part of the theatres, and being opposed by the manager of the little theatre in the Haymarket, maintained his right. He was also trumpet-major of England, to whom every one who blows a trumpet publicly (excepting those of the theatres-royal) must pay a certain sum, and therefore the office has jurisdiction of all the merry-andrews and jack-puddings of every Fair throughout England. The office of master of the revels was created under Henry VIII., in 1546." "Sir Henry Herbert established his office of Master of the Revels, in Tothill Street."

PAGE 182 .- "Band of Violins." "During the rage for French fashions in music which obtained in Charles the Second's reign, the '24 violons' were imitated here, in the King's music, and became the 'four and twenty fiddlers all of a row' of nursery rhyme. The 'vingt-quatre violons' were formed under Louis XIII., and dissolved by decree of Louis XV." (Grove.) Antony à Wood, speaking of this same band, says: "Before the Restoration of Charles the Second, and especially after, viols begun to be out of fashion, and only violins used, as treble violin, tenor, and bass violin; and the King according to the French mode, would have 24 violins playing before him while he was at meals, as being more airie and brisk than viols." Pepys, on Oct. 1, 1667, writes: "To White Hall; and there in the Boarded Gallery did hear the musick with which the King is presented this night by Monsieur Grebus, the Master of his Musick: both instrumental (I think twenty-four violins) and vocall: an English song upon Peace. But, God forgive me! I never was so little pleased with a concert of music in my life." Possibly the presence of Grabu had something to do with the disgust here expressed.

PAGE 202.—"The prickers." There are many allusions throughout these records to the "pricking" of music. "Prick" is a Saxon word signifying a "small mark or point." A musical note was formerly called a "prick" (hence the term "prick-song"), and a dot, following a note, was called a "prick of addition." We find in the Cheque Book the phrase, "An admonition with a prick was sett upon his head." This means that a small mark or dot, equivalent to a bad mark, was set against his name. Grove defines

"prick-song" as "the name given by old writers upon music to divisions or descant upon a Plain-Song or Ground, which were written, or pricked down, in contradistinction to those which were performed extemporaneously." "The term 'pricking of music-bookes' was formerly employed to express the writing of them. Payments for so doing are frequently found in the accounts of cathedral and college choirs."

PAGE 219.—There is possibly an error in judgment in having admitted the last entry on this page as a purely musical item—the same remark may apply to the entry concerning bits and stirrups on p. 206, but neither entry is lengthy enough to offend against any canon of precision.

PAGE 254.—"Fetching children from cathedrals." An ancient custom existed in the Chapel Royal of "pressing" men and boys with good voices for the service of the choir. This practice may be traced as far back as the time of Richard III. Commissions "to take up well-singing boys for furnishing the Royal Chapels" are frequent among the Patent Rolls of the sixteenth and the early part of the seventeenth centuries. One of the latest, granted to Dr. N. Giles, Aug. 26, 1626, has these words: "Provided always, and we straightly charge and command, that none of the said Choristers or Children of the Chappell, soe to be taken by force of this Commission, shall be used or imployed as Comedians, or Stage Players, or to exercise or acte any Stage plaies, Interludes, Comedies, or Tragedies; for that it is not fitt or desent that such as should sing the praises of God Almighty should be trained or imployed in such lascivious and prophane exercises." A reference to p. 271 will show that these pious sentiments were sometimes more honoured in the breach than in the observance, and possibly they were in 1626 an almost unconscious reflection of that Puritanic spirit which was then taking its birth. Queen Elizabeth kept in full force during her whole reign the prerogative of issuing placards or writs for impressing singing boys for her Chapel, as well in the Capital as at Windsor, at least so says Burney.

PAGE 297.—"Scaramoucha." In this same year, 1675, Evelyn writes in his Diary, under date Sept. 29: "I saw the Italian Scaramucchio act before the King at Whitehall, people giving money to come in, which was very scandalous, and never so before at Court diversions. Having seene him act before in Italy, many

yeares past, I was not averse from seeing the most excellent of that kind of folly." To connect this with the item mentioned in the text is purely conjecture, but it seems to me reasonable to do so, both from similarities of name and date.

PAGE 321.—The will, transcribed out of the French, of Anthony Robert. He desires to be buried in Somerset Chapel, where he served the Queen Mother (Queen Henrietta Maria) as music master for forty years. If he cannot be buried there, he must in any case be buried with the full rites of the Roman Church, and he directs that a hundred masses should be said for the repose of his soul. Hare in his "Walks in London" says that "the building which projects into the grounds of Marlborough House and which is entered from the roadway into the Park on the left of S. James' Palace, is interesting as the Roman Catholic Chapel built by Charles the First for his Queen." Canon Sheppard, in his "Memorials of S. James' Palace," writes: "The Queen's Chapel was designed and built by Inigo Jones. As it was originally intended for the Infanta, the Spanish Ambassador laid the first stone in 1623. Its completion was due to the importunities of Queen Henrietta Maria." In the "Life of Inigo Jones" it is said that he "designed the Chapel for the Infanta at Somerset House. The front of the Chapel faced the Thames, and presented an harmonious elevation of a rustic arcade with five arches, and five well-proportioned windows between Corinthian pilasters, duplicated at the other end." Another passage in the same "Life" says that Inigo "is said to have been the architect of the Queen's Chapel, at St. James." Mr. W. B. Donne places the chapel assigned to Queen Henrietta Maria in Somerset House, which in 1616, James I., in honour of his Danish Queen, commanded to be called Denmark House. Stowe's Chronicle, under date 1616, has the entry, "Queen Anne feasted the King at her Pallace in the Strand, formerly called Somerset-House, and then the King commanded it should no more be so called, but that it should from henceforth be called Denmarke-House." These somewhat conflicting testimonies seem to prove that Queen Henrietta Maria originally had her Chapel at S. James' Palace, and that on the advent of Queen Catherine of Braganza, she moved it to Somerset House.

PAGE 347.—There is here an allusion to the old chimney tax, or, as it was called, hearth-money. On March 8, 1689, Evelyn

writes: "In the mean time to gratify the people, the Hearth Tax was remitted for ever, but what was intended to supply it, besides present great taxes on land, is not named."

PAGE 383.—Order for attendance of the violinists at the Chapel at Whitehall. On p. 9 of the Chapels Royal Register of Births, Marriages, and Deaths, there is the following order, given by the Lord Chamberlain to the Closet Keeper of the Chapel, and dated 1685. It runs: "It is His Matyes. pleasure that H.R.H. Princess Anne of Denmark do sit in His Matyes. Closet at his Chappell Royall at Whitehall upon one side of His Matyes. chayre, which might remayne in its place and not turn'd," and goes on to say that no one is to enter when the Princess is there, except the Clerk of the Closet or his deputy, or the Lord Chamberlain, and the Vice-Chamberlain. This is confirmed by Evelyn's statement that the Princess, "since his Majesty came to the Crown, allways sate in the King's closet, and had the same bowings and ceremonies applied to the place where she was, as his Majesty had when there in person."

PAGE 422.—Edward Kinnaston. He was originally one of the boys belonging to Davenant's company. It is said that Kynaston made "the loveliest lady" for a boy, ever beheld by Pepys. Kynaston was twice thrashed, the second time being cudgelled, for his impertinent mimicry of Sir Charles Sedley. He remained on the stage from 1659 to 1699. "Even at past sixty," Cibber says, "his teeth were all sound, white, and even as one would wish to see in a reigning toast of twenty." He died in 1712, and was buried in the churchyard of S. Paul's, Covent Garden. "So exalted was his reputation that it has since been disputable among the judicious, whether any woman that succeeded him so sensibly touched the audience as he." "Kinaston the boy had the good turn to appear in three shapes: first, as a poor woman in ordinary clothes—then in fine clothes, as a gallant; and in them was clearly the prettiest woman in the whole house: and lastly, as a man; and then likewise did appear the handsomest man in the house." "To the King's playhouse, where 'The Heyresse,' notwithstanding Kinaston's being beaten, is acted: and they say the King is very angry with Sir Charles Sedley for his being beaten, but he do deny it. But his" (Kynaston's) "part is done by Beeston." "To the King's

playhouse—and here we find Kinaston to be well enough to act again; which he do very well, after his beating by Sir Charles Sedley's appointment." (Pepys.)

PAGE 431.—A new organ for the Chapel at Whitehall. "A new organ is set up in the Banquetting House Chappel, with a Dial in the middle of it, this being the first of that make; the other is packt up in Boxes there, in order to be sent to Barbadoes." (London Post, October 4, 1699.)

PAGE 432.—"Mr. Thomas Betterton."—Mrs. Betterton played for thirty years the chief female characters, especially in Shakespeare's plays, with great success. When "Calisto" was to be played at Court in 1674, she was chosen as instructress to the Lady Mary and the Lady Anne. After Betterton's death, Queen Anne settled on her old teacher a pension of £500 per annum. Betterton himself, during a long career, played at Drury Lane, Dorset Gardens, Lincoln's Inn Fields, and the Opera House in the Haymarket. The highest salary he obtained was £5 per week, which included £1 by way of pension to his wife, after her retirement in 1694. Pepys on several occasions alludes to Betterton's acting, and his opinion of his talent may be summed up in the one sentence: "I only know that Mr. Betterton is the best actor in the world." With regard to this warrant about the wearing of hats, it must be remembered that in those days they were more frequently worn indoors than people are apt to imagine. Probably the "persons of quality," who complained about the musicians being covered in their presence, never thought for a moment of removing their own headgear. It can be readily seen that what they wanted was to mark once and for all the social difference which they thought should exist between themselves and those who contributed to their amusement. As to the practice of wearing a hat in houses, and even in churches. these two references from Pepys will show the custom of the day: "To church, and heard a simple fellow upon the praise of Church musique, and exclaiming against men's wearing their hats on in the church." (Evidently the hat-wearing in church was a decaying remnant of the Puritan regime.) "Home to bed; having got a strange cold in my head, by flinging off my hat at dinner, and sitting with the wind in my neck."

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
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
