After days of anticipation, the 1995 homecoming court was announced. Freshman Victoria Long and Brad Minto, Sophomores Brian Anderson and




Parents' Weekend was a great success despite the annual threats of rain and the "wild" behavior of our elders!





When you stop to think about it, music plays a significant role on campus. A week doesn't go by at SU without something musical going on. Whether it's an Artist Series event, a student recital, a university ensemble performance, or even a student band set-up outside a dorm, music is alive here at Susquehanna.*

For a small school, SU is fortunate to have such a wide variety of musical events. The Artist Series, for example brought the Kiev Chamber Orchestra to campus this year. In addition, SAC brings a variety of performers and bands to campus throughout the entire year including Dave Binder, Christine

Happy Anniversary

Since 1976, Susquehanna University students have volunteered over 186,000 hours of service through the Project House System. The year marks the 20th Anniversary of the volunteer Project House System. The system has grown to 12 student-initiated projects responding to the needs on campus and in the surrounding communities for volunteer services. Collectively the 12 projects gather under the Susquehanna University Neighborhood (S.U.N.) Council.

As a means to share ideas and information, as well as coordinate large volunteer events, representatives from the 12 projects meet regularly with S.U.N. Council's executive officers. In addition to individual project work, as a whole S.U.N. Council worked together this year in providing help and assistance to victims of the flood.

The 1995-96 Project House System consisted of the following projects: Acts 29: Acts 29 is made up of teams of students who through

singing, puppetry, clowning, drama, and preaching declare the Good News. This year Acts 29 celebrated their 15th anniversary. Arts Alive!: Sewing as a liaison between the university and surrounding communities, Arts Alive! promotes university events and sponsors special events such as students art shows and workshops for area children. Big Brothers/Big Sisters: Affiliated with Big Brothers/Big Sisters of America this project provides children in the community with appropriate camaraderie, support, guidance and understanding in regard to their various social and emotional needs. Computer Consultants: In their effort to provide information and assistance to the students, faculty, staff, and surrounding communities on a variety of computer related topics, Computer Consultants run a hotline and an electronic bulletin board system, and hold workshops and tutoring sessions.

This group of men join Senior Friends in interacting with members of the Selinsgrove Senior Citizen's Center. Members also assist senior citizens with odd jobs in their homes. *Study Buddy:* By presenting a positive role mode, enhancing study skills and academic performance, the S.U. Study Buddies promote positive self-esteem for students from the Selinsgrove Middle School through a structured tutorial program. *Womenspeak:* This project is concerned with expanding the services of the Women's Resource Center, providing leadership opportunities for women of the university, and working with administration to be proactive regarding women's concerns at the university.



Although off-campus students miss the experience of truly being part of campus life; the new attributes of living in an apartment or house have their own luxuries. These include everything from


barbecuing, to playing a friendly game of outdoor Beirut.






Track and Field




Women's Basketball






Wrestling

The season was filled with great ball playing and good team dynamics.







hanna.


Perhaps the most important part of graduation day was not the ceremony or the pieces of paper the graduates took away, but the 1460 other days of memories and challenges it took for them to get there-




