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PREFACE.

The object proposed in the present work, is to furnish a full and accurate history of the Leland family in America. It has been the aim of the author to make the history so complete that all the descendants of Henry Leland, the common family ancestor in this country, may learn from it at once, their relationship to him and to each other.

The better to accomplish this object the tabular form has been adopted, thus greatly facilitating the case and readiness with which any line of descent in the family can be traced. This, together with the full index inserted in the book, will make it eminently convenient for reference. It is hoped that the convenience thus resulting will more than compensate for the much greater expense of this mode of publication. The plates which appear in the Magazine, have been procured and inserted, with the kind consent of such as are living, and of the near relatives of such as have deceased, of those whom the plates represent. These, it is believed, will both contribute to the appropriate embellishment of the work, and prove a source of pleasure and interest to the numerous family connexions, whose friends may, in this way, be specially called to remembrance.

The sketches of the lives of individuals and families, introduced in the work, may be relied upon as accurate; having, in all instances, been prepared by those who know that whereof they affirm; and the accounts are as full as the materials and circumstances would allow. There are, undoubtedly, many others equally worthy of notice with those of whom special mention has been made. It will be sufficient apology, that such are passed in silence, to let it be known, that the requisite information could not be obtained to give even a sketch of their history. The author gratefully acknowledges his obligations to the numerous friends, who in great kindness and accommodation, have furnished him with the information indispensable to the accomplishment of his work. While correctness has been aimed at, it is not presumed that all errors have been avoided. It is hoped, however, they will be found to be few and unimportant, and such as will be readily pardoned by all who can, in any measure, appreciate the magnitude and difficulty of the labor to be performed.

It is unnecessary to say much in explanation of the unavoidably long delay in the appearance of the book. Those who know any thing of the nature of the task of collecting the materials for such a work from all parts of the land, and preparing them for the press, will demand no explanation. Those who do not, would be unprepared to appreciate it, should it be given. The author has only to say, that he has endeavored to furnish the book at the earliest practicable date.

The sketch of the English branch of the Leland family, which follows these brief introductory remarks, has been prepared and furnished by the Hon. P. W. Leland, of Fall River.

ASKETCH

OF THE

ENGLISH BRANCH OF THE LELAND FAMILY.

Family names among the early Saxons, and subsequently among the Anglo-Saxons, it is well known, were derived or adopted from trades, callings, professions, names of places, moral and physical excellencies or deformities, acts performed, places resident, or from terminal affixes to parental designations. English literature abounds in this species of etymology, a copious list of which may be found in "Harrison's Rise and Progress of the English Language."

The name Leland, variously written previously to the reign of George II., may owe its origin to the locality occupied by the family in England, or to the original Saxon or Norman district whence the family took its rise. It is stated by one eminent biographical writer, that a district of country in England gave name to the family. This may be true, or the reverse may be the true hypothesis, viz: that the family gave name to the district. The strip of territory, denominated Leyland, on most full maps of the Island of Great Britain, one of which is inserted in "McCulloch's Commercial Dictionary," gives color to either supposition. Leyland, as applied to a portion of country, is a description of the uses to which it is devoted, taking the etymology of the word in the sense used by the early Anglo-Saxons. The words, Lee, Leigh, Lea, Ley, Lye, though orthographically different, have all the same signification, and denote a pasture; and united with the last syllable of the name may properly mean pasture ground or land. Hence, in early times, the family may have been generally shepherds and tillers of the soil. In accordance with ancient orthography the last syllable of the name is often found written, lond or londe, this being the mode of spelling the word land, during the fourteenth and fifteenth centuries, as may be seen by consulting the speech of William Thirnyng to Richard II., at the Tower of London, as given by Lord Campbell, in his Lives of the Chief Justices.

The same name is somewhat common in France, slightly varied in its orthography to suit the genus of that beautiful language. It is there written Lalande, the article La being substituted for Le or Ley, the noun following being feminine, and the e final added in accordance with the grammatical structure of that tongue.

The orthography of the English language was in an unsettled state so late even as the time of Dr. Johnson, and the names of persons, as well as of things were, in the absence of any recognised standard of authority, written according to the ear of the writer, and the unestablished value attached to the

symbols used. Words were laden down with diphthongs, double consonants, and silent letters, without rule and without reason. During this state of learning the name, now universally written Izland, is found in books and ancient documents written Izgland, Izaland, Izgland, Ingland, and Izglande, nor is this, by any means, a singular instance of diversity: Campbell gives numerous instances in which the names of well known persons in England, during the fifteenth and sixteenth centuries, exhibit from five to twenty variations in their orthography.

The earliest of our name, historically known to the writer, is John Leland, born at London about the year 1512. He flourished in the reign of Henry VIII., and was one of the most accomplished scholars, and voluminous writers of the sixteenth century. In looking over a catalogue of his works, their vast variety and extent, one is astonished that a man dying at the age of about forty, could have accomplished so much. His education commenced under the famous William Lily, at St. Paul's, and was subsequently continued at Christ's College, Cambridge, where he became a fellow. His academic course was finally completed at All Souls' College, Oxford. Cotemporary and subsequent history pronounce, him one of the most accomplished linguists of his age. He spoke and wrote the Latin, Greek, Saxon and Welsh, with the facility and correctness of natives of those countries.

On leaving Oxford, he went to Paris, at which city, and on the continent, he spent several years, the literary associate and companion of Budaeu, Faber, Paulus Æmilius, Ruellius and Francis Sylvius. While there he added to his knowledge of European languages, those of French, Italian and Spanish, and returned to England about the year 1537. Shortly after, Henry VIII. made him his chaplain, and conferred on him the rectory of Pepling, and about the same time created for him a new office, that of the "King's Antiquary," which has this honorable distinction, that the office was created for John Leland, and expired with him, he being the first and last Royal Antiquary of England. With this commission he was authorized to survey and examine all the antiquities of the realm, monasteries, monastic and college libraries, natural curiosities, and whatever might contribute to the history of the country and the glory of the nation. In the execution of this trust he spent six years, visited every part of the island, "surveyed towns and cities and rivers; eastles, cathedrals and monasteries; tumuli, coins and inscriptions; collected authors and transcribed manuscripts," Over his vast collection of materials he wrought six additional years, writing out, mostly, in elegant Latin, an account of his great discoveries. Henry was a munificent patron, conferring on his Antiquary valuable livings, and cheering him on in the accomplishment of his magnificent undertakings. "Henry," says D'Israeli, "was worthy of Leland, and the genius of the author was magnificant as that of the monarch who created it." Among other elegant fruits of the Antiquary Royal, was the production of his "Strena, or a New Year's Gift," which he presented to the king in 1545. "It consists," says the author just quoted, "of an account of his studies; and sketches with a fervid and vast imagination, his magnificent labor, which he had already inscribed with the title "De Antiquitate Britannica," and which was to be divided into as many books as there were shires. All parts of this Address of the King's Antiquary to the King, bear the stamp of his imagination and his taste." His principal great works are the following: "Commentarii de Scriptoribus," "The Itinerary," "De Rebus Britanicus Collectane," and a work entitled "Assertio Inelytissimi Arturii Regis Britannia,"-relating to the illustrious Arthur, king of England.

In the midst of these great labors, the Antiquary frequently gave wings to his brilliant and chaste imagination, throwing off elegant effusions, sometimes in prose, but oftener in Latin and English verse; one of which, entitled the "Cygnea Cantio," or "the Song of the Swans," is still beautiful for its plan, and the subjects introduced. The Swan of Leland melodiously floats down the Thames from Oxford to Greenwich, and chants, as she passes along, the ancient names and honors of the towns and eastles.

The genius of Leland was lofty and brilliant. Whatever he tonched received the mark of his own greatness. Whether pouring over the dry details of antiquarian research, or striking the harp strings of the muses, he left the impress of a mind always profound, always brilliant, always alive to the honor and glory of his country. The man appears on every page; even his humbler efforts are worthy of himself. The king died soon after receiving the "New Year's Gift," and from this moment the Royal Antiquary was another being. His wonted energy gave way; the man of labor became melancholy, and began to look upon his vast labors with something of indifference. Once he had dreams of enduring and world-wide fame; in his hours of melancholy his ambition shrunk within the narrower

limits of his own country and his own age. He gave vent to this feeling in the following beautiful Latin verse, taken from D'Israeli's Miscellanies of Literature:—

POSTERITATIS AMOR DUBIUS.

"Posteritatis amor mihi perblanditur, et ultro Promitti libris secula multa meis. At non tam facile est oculato imponere, nasco, Quam non sim tali dignus honore frui. Græcia magniloquos vates desiderat ipsa, Roma suos etiam disperiise dolet. Examplis quum sim claris edoctus ab istis, Qui sperem Musas vivere posse meas? Certe mi sat erit præsenti scriberc seculo; Auribus et patriæ complacuisse meæ."*

This melancholy state of mind increased with time, and at length, involved the whole mental structure of the man. Various causes are assigned for this, and among them, the death of Henry, to whom the Antiquary seems to have been devotedly attached, has been regarded most prominent. It is also suggested by some writers, that his stipend or allowance was not regularly paid him under the new dynasty, but for this there does not seem to be any reliable evidence. The suggestion probably has its origin in some melancholy but touching Latin verses of the Antiquary, addressed to Archbishop Cranmer, which though abounding in allusions to the state of his mind, do not show that any thing relating to his worldly prospects was the cause of his mental depression. The Catholics attributed it to remorse for having withdrawn from the church of Rome. True, John Leland did withdraw from the Catholic communion, and adopt the more simple tenets and less gorgeous ceremonials of the church of England, but it does not appear that he was not to the last perfectly satisfied with the step he had taken. The more probable solution is, that he had over taxed his mental powers, and sank under the magnitude of his self imposed labors. Be the cause of his disorder what it may, the disease terminated in a permanent state of mental aberration. Edward VI., the successor of Henry VIII., by letters patent, dated March 5th, 1550, granted the custody of the Antiquary to his brother, and for his maintenance he was to receive the profits of the rectories of Hasely and Pepling, with his Salisbury prebend, which had been conferred on him by Henry VIII. He died April 18, 1552. His numerous manuscripts, and vast collection of papers, were committed by the king to the care of Sir John Cheke, who shortly after left the country, leaving the manuscripts in the custody of Humphrey Punefoy, Esq. Burton, the historian, subsequently obtained possession of them, and also of eight other volumes of manuscripts in quarto, comprising the "Itenerary," all of which are now in the Bodlian Library, London. Another collection of John Leland's manuscripts is in the Cottonian Collection in the British Museum, among which are the Latin and English verses, written by the Antiquary, and spoken in the Pageant, as Ann Bolyn, one of the wives of Henry VIII., and mother of Queen Elizabeth, went to her coronation

Leland has been the common fountain from which many subsequent writers on English antiquities have drawn. To him, Holinshed, Drayton, Camden, Dugdale, Stowe, Sambord and Battelay are indebted for the best portions of their valuable works—a noble fountain, which even those voluminous authors have not exhausted of its riches. He was buried in London, at the west end of Cheapside. The monument erected over his remains was destroyed by the great fire of 1666, and a street now

passes over the place of his ashes. The following inscription, the authorship of which, tradition ascribes to the Antiquary himself, was, says Weever, inscribed upon his monument.

"Quantum Rhenano debit Germama docto
Tantinu debebit terra Britimua milu.
Ille sua geniis ritus et nomina prisca
Æstivo teer hierdora die.
Tisse antiquarum rerum quoque magnus aniator
Oriabo patria humina clara mere.
Que emi prodierint miveis uiscripta labellis
Tun testes nostra sedulitatis erum "."

Whether the family, in the time of the Antiquary, was numerous in England, or otherwise, is unknown to the writer.

Nearly a century and a half after, appeared the eminently illustrious theologian, John Leland, D. D. born at Wigan, in Laneashire in 1691. The family moved to Dublin during his childhood, where, at the proper age, John entered upon his collegiate course of education. This completed, he prepared himself for the ministry, and was early settled over a congregation of Dissenters, in New Row, Dublin, about the year 1716. The father was cotemporary with Henry Leland, the ancestor of the American branch of the family, and in early life both were residents of nearly the same quarter of the island of Great Britain. Precisely what their relationship was, the writer has not been able to ascertain. As Dr. John Leland occupied an important place in the religious world, for the space of nearly half a century, a short account of his cast of mind and great labors may not be out of place.

Dr. Leland had the good sense to confine himself to the duties of his profession, and the results corresponded to the singleness of his life's purpose. To a mind eminently logical and analytical by nature, was added great historical and theological learning, resting on a memory vast and tenacious as his reading and observation were extensive. As a controversialist Dr. Leland had few equals, and fewer superiors. On all occasions he was ready to avow and to defend the faith that was in him. Learned, yet not ostentatious, fearless, yet far removed from recklessness or temerity, he met the opponents of Christianity, whether their approaches were openly or insidiously made, with a logical acuteness as admirable as it was irresistible. His first appearance, as an author, was in 1733, in answer to Tindal's book entitled "Christianity as Old as the Creation." This reply is a masterly refutation of the positions and assumptions of his able as well as ingenious antagonist, and brought its author prominently before the public. In 1737, he encountered Thomas Morgan, a man of celebrity, who had just written a bold work, of doubtful morality, entitled "The Moral Philosopher." Dr. Leland's answer is entitled "The Divine Authority of the Old and New Testament Asserted." In 1742, he wrote and published an answer to a pamphlet entitled "Christianity not founded on Argument;" and in 1753, appeared his "Reflections on the Late Lord Bolingbroke's Letters on the Study and Use of History, as they relate to Christianity and the Holy Scriptures." This is an admirable production, and added greatly to the fame of the author.

In 1754, Dr. Leland published his chief work, entitled "A View of the Principal Deistical Writers that have appeared in England in the Last and Present Century," in letters to a friend. To this great work he subsequently appended a supplement, relating to the works of Hume and Lord Bolingbroke. This is a masterly effort of learned and logical acamen, from which subsequent writers have liberally drawn, when treating on the same subject. It is still a standard work, and of high authority amongst theologians. Dr. Leland gave to the world but one other work, and this after he was seventy years old. It is entitled "The Advantages and Necessity of the Christian Revelation." In reading it one hardly knows which most to admire, its admirable logic or its beautiful display of fervid piety. Though now superseded by other works on the same subject, more elaborately written, it is still resorted to,

by thorough students, as well for its facts, as for its arguments. Dr. Leland died in 1766, being then in his seventy-fifth year. His Sermons, in four volumes, were subsequently published by the Rev. Isaac Weld, his associate and colleague at the New Row Church, in Dublin.

Nearly cotemporary with Dr. John Leland, but younger, and a resident of the same city, was Thomas Leland, D. D., born in 1722. The writer is not informed as to the relationship existing between them. Thomas was educated at Trinity College, Dublin, at which institution, in 1763, he became professor of oratory; and shortly afterwards was appointed chaplain to the lord lieutenant of Ireland He was not only a ripe, but an elegant scholar, and contributed largely to the literature of his time. His religious opinions were those of the church of England, of which he is said to have been a brilliant ornament. As an author he is well known to scholars and general readers of the present day; his principal works being still found in nearly all public, and in many private libraries. While occupying the professorship of oratory he translated from the Greek into Latin, the orations of Demosthenes, and subsequently put them in an English dress. His translation of these celebrated orations is still the very best extant, a beautiful model of correct rendering, and elegant English. He also translated the orations of Æschines with equal fidelity, and no less credit to himself. About the same time, or perhaps a little before, an ingenious historical romance appeared, entitled "Longsword," the authorship of which, though never avowed by Dr. Leland, is, and was believed, during his life time to have emanated from his pen. Of this book the writer knows nothing, never having seen a copy. It is said to possess some points of real excellence and great beauty.

Dr. Thomas Leland's most elaborate work, is a history of Ireland, in three volumes, quarto, commencing with the invasion of Henry II., and bringing the narration down to the time of the flight of James II., and the accession of Wiliam and Mary to the throne of England. The work is written in a plain, matter of fact style, according to the custom of that day, without much ornament, and with less of disquisition. It is, nevertheless, regarded as a faithful chronicle of events as they transpired within the period embraced, and altogether, a valuable standard work.

Another considerable work from the pen of Dr. Leland, is his "Life of Philip of Macedon," a well written and very instructive book. This was followed by an elaborate "Dissertation on the Principles of Oratory," an able and valuable work for the time, but now superseded by books of higher finish, and more in consonance with modern practice.

Dr. Leland was, during a long literary life, on terms of intimacy with many of the distinguished scholars of his age. It was at his suggestion, in 1765, in concurrence with Dr. Andrews, that Trinity College, conferred on Samuel Johnson, the great lexicographer, its highest academic honor, that of L.L.D. Dr. Leland obtained the prebend of Nothmichael in the cathedral church of St. Patrick, Dublin, where he occasionally officiated, with great satisfaction to the people, and with credit to the church of England. He is represented as a man of peculiar suavity of manners, and kindness of heart. He died in 1785, at the age of sixty-three. He left a family, but how numerous, is unknown to the writer. The name of his eldest son, was, or is, if living, John, who, it is believed, is father of the present eminent physician and surgeon, Dr Leland, of Dublin. The present "North Leland Street," Dublin, derives its name from this family.

The transatlantic branch of the family is still numerons in England, there being both at London and Liverpool, several houses of extensive business and sound reputation, all descendants, like the American branch, from a common ancestry. Of these, it is not in place here, to speak in detail.

THE LELAND COAT OF ARMS.

The Coat of Arms of the Leland family is, in heraldic language, thus described:—

Nors. One figure in the margin denotes the person whose name is opposite, to be a child, in that particular line of descent—two, a grandchild—three, a greatgrandchild, and the first figure indicates the numerical order of the child—the second, that of the grandchild—and the third, that of the greatgrandchild, among their respective brothers and sisters, who have descendants.

From the most accurate information available, Henry Leland, the Progenitor of all who bear the name in this country, (with two exceptions, one who adopted the name, the origin of the other not known,) was born in England about the year 1625.

It is supposed that he emigrated to America, in 1652, as the Ecclesiastical Records of Dorchester, show that he united with the church in that Town, in 1653. After a short residence in Dorchester, Mr Leland settled on a tract of land, included in what was afterwards the Town of Sherburne, where he resided until the time of his death, in 1680.

It is believed on evidence derived from some ancient records, confirmed by tradition, that Mr L. married previous to his removal to this country. It is much to be regretted that there are no sources of information, for determining the circumstances connected with his leaving the land of his nativity, to venture upon a life of hardship in the wilds of America.

All, however, who are conversant with the history of that period will readily understand the cause of this deficiency. In those "troublous times," in the midst of their labors and trials, our Fathers did not provide for transmitting their history to unborn generations.

There is good reason, however, for believing that Henry Leland was a man in character like his comrades in those days, distinguished for firmness, courage, patient endurance and invincible moral and religious integrity.

The whole number of lineal descendants from Henry Leland, the first family ancestor of the name in America, cannot be definitely ascertained, but from the statistics collected, it cannot be less than fifteen thousand. May they and their posterity through all coming ages emulate his virtues, and prove themselves worthy descendants of their justly honored ancestor.

It is thought that the will of Henry Leland, a copy of which has been obtained from the Probate Records, may be of sufficient interest to justify its insertion in connexion with this brief sketch.

HENRY LELAND'S WILL.

IN THE NAME OF GOD, AMEN-

The twenty-seventh day March, in the year of our Lord, 1680. I, HENRY LAYLAND, of Sherburne, being sick and weake in body, but of sound and perfect memorie, praised be God for the same; and knowing the uncertainty of this life, on earth, and being desirous to settle things in order, do make this, my last will and testament, in manner and form following: that is to say,

First and principally, I commend my soul to Almighty God, my Creator, assuredly believing that I shall receive full pardon, and remission of all my sins, and be saved, by the precious death and merits of my blessed Saviour and Redeemer, Jesus Christ, and my body to the earth, from whence it was taken, to be buryed in such decent and christian manner as, to my executors, hereafter named, shall be thought meete and convenient.

And as touching such worldly estate as the Lord, in mercy, hath lent mee, my will and meaning is, the same shall be imployed and bestowed as hereafter, by this my will, is expressed.

And first I doe revoke, renounce, frustrate, and make void all wills by me formerly made, and declare and appoint this my last will and testament.

I will that all those debts I owe to any manner of person, be well and truly

contented and paid.

Item—Unto my deare wife, Margaret Layland, during the term of her naturall life, she remayning my widdow, I give and bequeath the use of that part or halfe of my dwelling house which we now dwell in, with the use of that part of the barne which is now in my improvement; two acres of tillage land. behinde the barne, or where else she shall make choice of it, within the two hundred acres; six acres of meadow, to be taken at the upper corner of Brown's meadow, the fruite of one half of the orchard in the upper side of the highway and about the dwelling house and barne. My mind and will is that my said deare wife, shall (until she shall see well to dispose the same to my son Eleazur,) enjoy to her owne use and behalfe, one half of the land, both upland and meadow, lying on the lower side of the way; and my will is, that immediately after my decease my son Eleazur, do enjoy the other half of the said tract of land lying on the lower side of the way; and that after my wife's decease, the whole said tract of lands, with all the rights, privileges and appurtenances thereto belonging, benefits, profits, and comodities therefrom arising. shall be and remayne wholly and solely to the said Eleazur and his, forever.

Item—1 give to my deare wife, as her owne, to dispose what remains thereof, at her decease, among my children and grandchildren, as she shall see
meete, all the household stutis and necessary utensils, in that part of the house
we now live in or pertaining to it, as also my mare; two cows, at her choice:

all my swine, and all the fowls.

And it is my minde and will, that my wife, from time to time, and at all times, as she shall have occasion, shall have liberty of free and uninterrupted recourse to and from house, barne, meadow, tillage-land, orehard, not only for herself, but also all such other as she seeth meete to employ, as also of keeping such creatures as she shall see meete and are needful for her use.

Further—My minde and will is, that my dear wife and my son, Eleazur Layland, do and shall pay unto Bethia Twitchell, when she, the said Bethia

shall come of age, forty shillings.

Item—To my eldest son. Hopestill Layland, I do give and bequeath the whole two hundred acres of land which I purchased of Mr. Lane, with my new dwelling house and barne, and all other buildings upon the said land, and all the rights privileges and appurtenances unto the said land and housing: especially all land and meadow, which, in any after divisions or allottments, may or shall be allowed or laid out, upon the right of the said living (excepting the above mentioned particulars willed to my deare wife, for her use during the tearme of her natural flife, as aboves^d; all which, notwithstanding this gift to my son, Hopestill, she shall enjoy as abovesaid, and the reversion to be to him,) he paying out of the same in convenient time, that is so soon as may be, without extraordinary straitning himself, twenty pounds, in country pay, at this house, to my daughter Experience Colburne, and to my five grandchildren, now in being, forty shillings apiece, when they and as they shall attain to sixteen years of age; and excepting also, out of this gift, foure acres of meadow, hereafter otherwise disposed.

I also give to my son, Hopestill, one colt, and all the above mentioned par-

ticulars, to him bequeathed, to be to him and his forever.

To my son, Ebenezur, according to my agreement with my brother, Brazier, I give and bequeath the land I purchased of Goodman Holbrook, being sixty-

seveu acres of upland and five acres of meadow, as also four acres of meadow; to be taken in Brown's meadow, next the ditch throughout, provided he help his brother, Hopestill, to set up the remainder of fence about the said Brownes meadow. I also give unto my said son Ebenezur, that paire of my oxen which are now in his keeping, and the spaid mares colt, if he can finde it, to have the several p'ıculars to him bequeathed, to him and his forever.

To my son Eleazur, above and besides the above bequeathed land, I give one cow, to be chosen by him out of my cows, after his mother hath chosen hers; and I give to him also, the colt which came of the mare that Goodman

Breek had.

Item—I do constitute andap pointe my eldest son Hopestill, and my deare wife Margaret, joint executors of this, my last will and testament, hereby investing them with full power to call for and receive all debts and dues, to the said estate appertaining, either in or out of this jurisdiction. Nevertheless, my minde and will is, that my wife shall not be burdened with the payment of debts, but that matter to be wholly performed by my son Hopestill.

And I constitute my loving brother, Robert Badcock, overseer of this, my last will and testament, intreating his utmost care and endeavor that all things be ordered as is herein expressed. And I do sollemnly charge and command my children, each one, as they expect God's blessing with and upon what they receive, to avoid strife and discontentment, and to live in peace and unity one

with another.

Memorandum. Before signing and sealing, it was willed, by Henry Layland, that if his wife should change her condition she shall have liberty to take her thirds of the estate, according to law, instead of that which is given in this will, upon that condition (during her remaining his widow.)

This will was read to Henry Layland, and by him declared to be his last will and testament, in presence of

James Holbrook, Thomas Mighell.

Thomas Holbrook, and Thomas Mighell, witnesses, made oath before Wm. Stoughton, Esq., and Joseph Dudley, Esq., assistants, 8 June, 1680, that they were present and did see and heare Henry Layland signe and seale and publish this instrument to be his last will; and that then he was of disposing minde, to their best understanding.

Henry Leland's first child, was either born while on his passage from England, or very soon after his arrival in America, for it appears from the church records of Dorchester, that Hopestill, son of Henry and Margaret Layland, was baptized in May 1653. The births of his other four children, are entered upon the town records of Medfield. They were born before the existence of Sherburne as a town, not in Medfield, but upon the land, which, upon the incorporation of the town of Sherburne, became a part of its territory. His daughter Experience was married in 1672, settled in Dedham, and continued to reside there until the time of her death.—His three sons settled, lived and died in Sherburne, near the place of their births. There is nothing known of

them by which they were essentially distinguished from the other worthy citizens of their day and generation. They appear to have been prudent and industrious farmers, manifesting a lively interest in the civil, moral and religious welfare of the early settlers in Sherburne. Eleazer, died at the age of forty-three; Hopestill, at the age of seventy-four; and Ebenezer, at the age of eighty-five. Copies taken from the Probate records, of the wills of Eleazer and Hopestill, and of the settlement of the estate of Ebenezer, are here given for the gratification of those who may be desirous of knowing what estates they had, and how they were disposed of at their decease.

ELEAZER LELAND'S WILL.

I, Eliezar Layland, aged 33 yrs., being at present under the hand of Almighty God, and visited with great sickness and weakness, and uncertain of the time of my dissolution, yet through God's mercy, having the full use of my reason and understanding, I do give this as my last will and testament.—First. I give and bequeath my soul into the hands of my gracious Creator and Redeemer; my body, (at death) I commit unto the grave, in hope of a glorious resurrection; and as for what I here possess of the worlds goods, whether of lands, moneys, or moveables, I give, will and bequeath all unto my loving and dearly beloved wife, Sarah Layland, as her proper estate, to use and dispose of as she please, and do hereby make her the sole Executrix of this will.

In witness whereof I have, others present, set my hand and seal this 16th

HOPESTILL LELAND'S WILL.

In the name of God Amen, the eighteenth day of August, in ye third year of the reign of our Sovereign Lord King George the second; by the Grace of God of Great Britain, &c. Annoque Domini, one thousand seven hundred and twenty-nine, I Hopestill Lealand, Sen'r of Sherbourn, in the County of Middlesex, within his Majest's Province of the Massachusetts Bay in New England, yeoman, being ill and weak in body, but of sound mind and memory, Thanks be given to God for the same, being sensible of my own frailty and mortality, knowing that it is appointed by an unchangeable decree for men once to die, and not knowing how soon my change may be, do make and ordain this my last will and testament, wherein principally and first of all, I recommend my Soul into the hands of God who gave it, in and through Jesus Christ my ever blessed Redeemer, and my body I recommend to the earth, to be decently buried in Christian Burials, nothing doubting but at the General resurrection I shall receive the same again by the mighty power of God; and as touching such worldly estate wherewith it has pleased God to bless me, I give demise

and dispose of the same in the following manner and form, that is to say after

debts and funeral charges are defreyed.

Imp's.—I give and bequeath to Patience my well beloved wife, all my moveable estate and Household goods, within doors, of whatsoever sort or kind, and all my quick flock abroad, for her use, comfort and support, to be at her disposel as she shall please and House room comfortable, and a maintainance during her natural life, as hereafter mentioned.

Item.—I give to my son Henry Lealand, to my son Hopestill Lealand, to my son John Lealand, and to my daughter Abigail Bullard, the wife of Lieut. John Bullard, the sum of ten shillings apiece, in money or bills of credit, which shall be in full of their portion, in my Estate, I having heretofore suffi-

ciently advanced each of them out of my estate.

Item.—I Give to my son William Leland, ten shillings in the like money or Bills of Credit, in full of his portion in my Estate, he having been likewise

heretofore sufficiently advanced out of my Estate.

Item.—I give to my son Joseph Lealand, and to his heirs and assigns, forever, one-third of my lands and common rights lying and being at a place called New Sherbourn, westward of Uxbridge, which shall be in full of his portion in my estate, he having been heretofore advanced sufficiently out of my estate,

Item.—I give to my daughter Marget Lealand, and to her heirs and assigns, forever, a parcel of land that came by my wife, containing fifteen acres, as it is estimated be it more or less, lying in said Sherbourn, near a place called Dunstable Meadow; also a devident lot of thirty-six acres lying in Holliston, laid out in a fourth division near a place called Bald Hill. Also the sum of one hundred pounds, in current money or bills of credit to be paid to her, or to those that may represent her, within twelve months after my decease, by my executors hereafter named, which shall be in full of her portion in my estate, unless my wife sees cause to advance her.

And whereas by deed of gift I have conveyed to my son Isaac Lealand, the one halfe of my Farm at home, with ye one halfe of my buildings. My will is, and I do hereby give and bequeath to my son Joshua Lealand, and to his heirs and assigns forever, the other halfe of my farm, at home with the one

halfe of the buildings, they to divide as they please.

Furthermore I give and bequeath to my two sons Isaac Lealand, and Joshua Lealand, and to their heirs and assigns forever, all the remainder of my lands, viz: that which I purchased, adjoining to, or lying near my farm, and all my out lands and meadows, proprietary rights in common, in Sherbourn aforesaid or Holliston, or New Sherbourn, or elsewhere, and also, all my husbandry tools and utensils, of all sorts, as cart, plows, chains &c., and all iron and wooden tools abroad, the whole to be divided betwixt them, as near equally as they shall agree.

Provided always and my will is that the said Isaac and Joshua shall take care of my wife, their mother, and shall keep so many cows, winter and summer, as shee shall desire, (not exceeding three,) and a gentle horse to ride on when she desires it, and such house room, as she desires for her convenience, and all sorts of provisions, necessary, both in sickness, and health, during ye

term of her natural life.

And further my will is that my executor, hereafter named, shall pay all my just debts, and all the legacies afore mentioned, and my funeral charges, which I order shall not exceed the sum of twenty-five pounds, and I do hereby nominate and appoint my two sons Isaac Lealand, and Joshua Lealand aforesaid, to be the sole Executors of this, my last will and testament.

year, first afore mentioned.

Eleazer Leland left no issue; seven of the eight sons of Hopestill attained the age of manhood, established themselves in Sherburne, or Holliston, a town taken from Sherburne in 1724, and spent their lives there. All the sons of Ebenezer commenced their career in life, in Sherburne, and Holliston. Ebenezer remained through life in Sherburne. Timothy and Isaac settled, lived and died in Holliston. James married in Sherburne, and with his young family in 1723 removed to the county of Worcester, and settled upon a township of land, called Hassanamisco, which afterwards took the corporate name of Grafton. Amariah remained in Sherburne until about the year 1760, when he removed to Providence. R. I. and from Providence to the Island of Mount Desert, in Maine.

The family name appears to have been spelt by Henry and his son Eleazer, Layland. By his sons Hopestill and Ebenezer, Lealand. And their descendants, who remained in Sherburne and Holliston, continued to use the same mode of spelling, until about thirty years ago. But since the year 1820, the name, in all the different branches of the family, has been almost invariably spelt Leland.

Ebenezer Leland, whose posterity are the subject matter of this chapter, received from his father, Ebenezer Leland, his homestead estate, situated in the Southerly part of Sherburne, and in the adjoining part of Holliston, which passed from Ebenezer to his son Caleb, and from Caleb to his son John, and from John to his son John, who is now living upon the paternal estate in





Orlands Ware

Sherburne. And he, and his son, John J. Leland, are the only surviving descendants of the male line, from his greatgrandfather Ebenezer Leland. Ebenezer, his only son, Caleb and eight of his nine children, remained in Sherburne, during their lives. Rebecca, the other child of Caleb, on her marriage settled in Natick.

Orlando Ware was born in Sherburne, Mass, the twenty-ninth day of August, 1779. His father, John Ware, was a brother of Henry Ware, senior, late Professor of Divinity in Harvard University, and his mother was daughter of Caleb Leland, and granddaughter of Ebenezer, who was son of Ebenzer and grandson of Henry. He was for many years concerned in business as a merchant in Deerfield, Massachusetts. But for a few years past he has been engaged in farming. And he is what may be properly called a Gentleman Farmer. He has been called upon for many years by his fellow-citizens in Deerfield, to fill the more important municipal offices in the town, and has held the office of selectman and overseer of the poor, for the period of twelve years. He represented the town in the general court for the year 1819, and again in the year 1840.

When James Leland left Sherburne, in 1723, for the county of Worcester, the place where he settled was a new and uncultivated country. He acquired a large tract of land upon the Blackstone river, in the Southwest corner of the township of Hassanamisco, which was afterwards, in 1735, incorporated as a town, by the name of Grafton, and in the adjoining part of the town of Sutton. Six of his children were born in Sherburne, and five in the new township. He established his place of residence on the Eastern bank of the river, in Grafton. All his children, who attained the age of twenty-one, married and settled near him; Jerusha, Benjamin, James, Hannah, Deliverance and Phineas in Grafton; Moses and Thomas in Sutton; and Thankful, in Northbridge. From his large tract of land, he furnished his sons with farms.

All his sons, but James, remained at or near the places where they first settled, through life. James, at an advanced period of his life, removed from Grafton to Ashfield, Mass., and after a few years, he left his new place of residence, and went into the Western part of the state of New York, and settled in a place now called Hopewell, in the county of Ontario. Jerusha and Hannah remained in Grafton until their deaths. Thankful continued to reside in Northbridge, for many years; but after the death of her husband, she went to Croydon, N. H., to live with her children. Deliverance joined the society of Shaking Quakers, and went to live with them in the Northerly part of the county of Worcester.

All the children of Jerusha Leland were born in Grafton. Her son James, soon after his marriage, went to Hardwick, Mass., and remained there through life. Jerusha, on her marriage, settled in Framingham. Moses was one of the first settlers in Croyden, New Hampshire, and experienced, in full measure, those hardships and privations, which are allotted to those who first settle new countries. In the latter part of his life he removed to Charlestown, N. H. Hannah, after her marriage, lived in Shrewsbury. Prudence lived in Grafton, Mass., Croyden, Newport, N. H. Elizabeth, lived in no place but Grafton; and Susannah and Jemima, on their marriage, went to Upton, and remained there as long as they lived.

All the children of Benjamin Leland were born in Grafton; and all, except Deborah, Lucy and Benjamin, remained there through life. Deborah left Grafton at an advanced period of life, for Cato, Cayuga county, New-York, to live with her only daughter. Lucy, who was twice married, lived in Sutton, during the life of her first husband, and until after her second marriage. She then lived in Grafton until the death of her second husband. And after his death she went to Worcester, to live with her son. Benjamin sold his paternal estate in Grafton in 1795, and in the year 1804 removed to Weathersfield, Vermont, and after residing there seven or eight years, returned to Mass., and settled in Barre. He remained in Barre a few years, and then went back to Grafton.

The children of Moses Leland were all born in Sutton, Mass., and Solomon, Moses, Timothy, Abigail, and Prudence remained there during their lives. Elizabeth remained there for many years, but she finally went to Charlton, Mass. Jacob went among the first settlers to Croyden, New Hampshire, and after remaining there several years, removed to Sempronius, in the county of Cayuga, in the state of New York. Mary went to Douglass, soon after her marriage. After several years residence there, she returned to Sutton with her family. She then went to New Salem, Mass., and remained there until the death of her husband. She finally removed to Northbridge, where she died. Sarah lived in Sutton, till 1785, and then removed to Barre, Mass.

James Leland's children were all born in Grafton, Mass. His oldest son, James, lived in Sherburne, Mass., from 1769 to 1775. He went to Ashfield, Mass. in 1775 or 1776. He remained in Ashfield, for twenty, or twenty-five years. He then removed to the Western part of New York, and settled in

Hopewell, in the county of Ontario. Lydia married in Grafton, but went to Conway, Mass. Lucy married in Conway, and removed to Phelps, Ontario county, New York. Abigail married in Grafton, and remained there during the life of her first husband. On her second marriage, she went to Sutton, and continued there as long as she lived. Martha married in Conway, and settled there. Anna married and settled in Ashfield. Beulah married in Conway, and removed to Phelps, New York.

The Rev. John Leland, better known in the sections of the country where he resided, as Elder Leland, was born in Grafton, Mass., May 14th, 1754. He was connected with Henry Leland, the progenitor of all of the name in America, by a line of descent through Ebenezer Leland of Sherburne, James Leland of Grafton, Mass., and James Leland of Phelps, N. Y. He possessed a strong native vigor of intellect, and a genius purely original.

He spent his early years with his father, who could afford his son no other educational advantages, than those at that time furnished by the common schools of his native town. As John had a natural thirst for knowledge, he made the most of such facilities as were within his reach, and in its attainment and in mental discipline, he far excelled most of those of equal opportunities with himself.

At the age of eighteen years, his mind became deeply impressed upon the subject of religion; and after passing through various exercises—at one time being greatly depressed, and at another taking courage to persevere, during a period of about two years; he at length became settled, in the hope that he had "passed from death unto life," and made a public profession of his faith, by being baptized in June, 1774.

In connection with the other religious exercises of this period, Mr. Leland had the conviction, that it was his duty to preach the gospel; and his public ministry may be said to have commenced simultaneously with his Christian experience. As opportunities presented, in his own and adjoining towns, he immediately commenced "preaching the word," in which favorite employment he continued with great success, during sixty-seven years.

At the age of twenty-two, Mr. L. married, and with his wife, moved to Virginia, where he resided fourteen years. While a resident of Virginia, he travelled extensively in that and the adjoining states, and fulfilled the duties of his calling with great fidelity and success. During his sojourn there, he baptized precisely seven hundred persons, and left behind him two churches, gathered under his ministry; one containing two hundred, and the other three hundred members.

On his return to New England, he took up his abode in Cheshire, Mass., where he spent the most of the remainder of his life, "laboring to promote piety, and vindicate the civil and religious rights of all men;" and few, if any, have ever labored more sincerely, and it may not be too much to say, more successfully, for the promotion of these objects, than did John Leland. He fulfilled, with uncommon fidelity, a pledge he had publicly made; that "as long as he could move his tongue, wield a pen, or heave a cry to heaven; when-

ever the rights of men, the liberty of conscience, or the good of his country were invaded, by fraud or force, his feeble efforts should not lie dormant."

A truer or a more appropriate portrait of the life of Mr. L., cannot be given, than has been drawn by the faithful and discriminating pen of the compiler of his writings, "with additional sketches of his life," from which the following is an extract:

"To understand and appreciate the character of Elder Leland, it is only necessary to read his writings, and to trace the operation of the principles and sentiments they contain, in the actions of his life. That his writings were a transcript of his mind and heart, none will deny, who knew him. The candor and openness, with which he ever avowed his sentiments, even when they subjected him to reproach and censure, are well known.

Conversing with a friend, on one occasion, he remarked, 'though I have secrets which I would not reveal to you, or any one else, I have not a religious secret in the world.' The same frankness marked the expression of his political opinions. That his independence of mind, aided materially in supporting this character, will be evident, when we consider how many individuals there are, who dare not be honest; who have not the moral courage to sustain them in a course which they feel to be right, and in the expression of sentiments which they inwardly approve. A remark of Elder Leland on this subject, is suggested by these reflections: Though in a religious point of view, said he, self-dependence, (by which he meant the opposite of a Christian's trust in God,) is most pernicious and fatal in its tendency—yet, in worldly matters, it is one of the best qualities a man can possess.

Through a long life, Elder Leland sustained with uniform consistency, the twofold character of the patriot and the Christian. For his religious creed, he acknowledged no directory but the Bible. He loved the pure, unadulterated word of truth, and as a minister of that word, zealous and faithful, he preached it as far as he was able, unmixed with the doctrines and commandments of men, 'not for filthy lucre, but of a ready mind.'

He was clear in exposition, happy in illustration, often powerful and eloquent in appeals to the conscience and heart. He insisted, in absolute and unqualified terms, on the great fundamental truths of the gospel, the necessity of regeneration, faith and repentance. But on points not essential to salvation, though his opinions were no less firmly established, and he never shrunk from advocating them on proper occasions, yet he did not censure or denounce those who differed from him, nor exclude from fellowship as Christians any who gave evidence of a gracious change, whatever might be their peculiar doctrinal views. He never engaged in controversy; and whenever any of his published views were disputed, or commented upon, as was sometimes the case, with severity, he preferred to let the matter rest a little, and then give another thrust, as he expressed it, to the waste of time, repetitions, and tediousness of reviews and replies.

His political creed was based upon those sufficient truths of equality and of

inherent and inalienable rights, recognised by the master spirits of the revolution, as the principles for the support of which 'they pledged their lives, their fortunes and their sacred honor.' As a politician, he was above the influence of any but sincere and patriotic motives. He was a statesman rather than a politician. He studied the fundamental principles of government, and drew his conclusions directly from them, without any intervening medium of self or party interests. He judged men by their measures, and measures by their adaptedness to secure that resultw hich he deemed the legitimate object of government, the greatest good of the greatest number.

In his attachment to the administration of Jefferson, Madison, Jackson and Van Buren, he felt that he was contending for the same principles of democracy that nerved the arms, and strengthened the hands of the whigs of '76.

His feelings upon the subject of slavery, may be gathered from the fact that during his fourteen years residence in Virginia, he never owned a slave, as well as from his remarks in the 'Virginia Chronicle,' and from the resolution offered by him, when a member of the Baptist General Committee, and passed by them in 1789, in the following words: Resolved, that Slavery is a violent deprivation of the rights of nature, and inconsistent with a republican government, and we therefore recommend to our brethen to make use of every legal measure to extirpate this horrid evil from the land, and pray Almighty God that our honorable legislature may have it in their power to proclaim the great jubilee, consistent with the principles of good policy. The great object (next in importance to his mission as a preacher of Christ, for which he seemed to have been raised up by a special Providence,) was to promote the establishment of religious liberty in the United States. His efforts, perhaps, contributed as much as those of any other man to the overthrow of ecclesiastical tyranny in Virginia, the State of his adoption, and exerted a beneficial influence, though less successful, towards the promotion of the same end, in the State of his nativity. In the former, in the years 1786-7-8, we find his name in the doings of the Baptist general committee, with which he stood connected as messenger to the general assembly appointed to draft and present memorials respecting the 'incorporating act, the application of the glebe lands to public use, &c.

Though the cause of religious freedom was the common cause of all dissenters, yet the Baptist, as a sect, took the lead in those active, energetic and persevering measures, which at length prevailed in the establishment.

Speaking of his removal to New England, it is stated, 'as soon as he landed again on its shores, he commenced anew the warfare against religious intolerance, and in defence of the cause that had so signally triumphed in Virginia.' During his stay in New London, he published his 'rights of conscience inalienable,' and afterwards, from time to time, other works of the same character.

In Massachusetts religious liberty had struggled for existence, and found some advocates from the first settlement of the State, but was kept constantly shackled by certificate laws, and other expedients of ecclesiastical tyranny.

At length, in the beginning of 1811, a decision by Judge Parsons, that no society not incorporated by law could claim even the pitiful privilege of drawing back money, awakened the fears of the dissenters; and a circular address, accompanied by a petition to the legislature, praying for a revision of the laws respecting public worship, was circulated through the State.

At the solicitation of the people of Cheshire, Mr. Leland accepted a seat in the Legislature, for the special purpose of aiding the measures petitioned for. The following extract from the speech of Mr. L. in the Legislature of Mass., in 1811, may serve to exhibit both his views and his manner of expressing them.

'According to a late decision of the bench in the County of Cumberland, which it is presumed is to be a precedent for future decision, these non-incorporated societies are nobody, can do nothing, and are never to be known, except in shearing time, when money is wanted to support teachers they never hear. And all this must be done for the good of the State. One hundred and seventeen years ago, wearing long hair was considered the crying sin of the land. A convention was called, March 18th, 1694, in Boston, to prevent it. After a long expostulation, the committee close thus:—

"If any man will now presume to wear long hair, let him know that God and man witnesseth against him." Our pious ancestors were for bobbing the hair, for the good of the colony, but now, Sir, not the hair, but the purses must be bobbed for the good of the State. The petitioners pray for the right of going to heaven in that way which they believe is most direct; and shall this be denied them? Must they be obliged to pay legal toll, for walking the King's highway, which he has made free for all? Is not this a greater subordination, than to sail under British licenses, or to pay three pence on every pound of tea?

In Rhode Island, New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania and Delaware, of the old colonies; and in Kentucky, Tennessee and Ohio, the new States; there has never been any legal establishment of religion, nor any assessment to support Protestant Christianity for the good of the States; and yet, Sir, these States have stood and flourished as well as Massachusetts.

Since the Revolution, all the old States, except two or three in New England, have established religious liberty upon its true foundation, and yet they are not sunk with earthquakes, or destroyed with fire and brimstone. Should the commonwealth, Mr. Speaker, proceed so far as to distribute all settlements and meeting-houses, which were procured by public taxes, among all the inhabitants, without regard to denomination, it is probable that the outery of sacrilege, profanity, and infidelity would be echoed around; and yet, Sir, all this has been done, in a State which has given birth to a Henry, a Washington, a Jefferson and a Madison; each of whom contributed his aid to effect the grand event, for which event the Presbyterians prayed and joined.

It is there believed, Sir, that God hates robbery for burnt offerings; and ought not Massachusetts to pay a decent respect to the voice of fifteen of her sister

States! We should imagine that a laudable pride would prevent any one religious society, from forcing another to pay her laborers, and that the same principle would not admit a public teacher to take money collected by distraint, from those who did not hear him; but in this particular, we find that religion is made a covert, to do that at which common honesty blushes! Sir, it is not to disrobe towns of their corporate powers; no, let them go to heaven in such turnpike roads, and pay legal toll at every ministerial gate, which they choose. And what can they wish for more?

According to our best judgment, we cannot pay legal taxes for religious services descending even to the grade of chaplain for the Legislature. It is disrobing Christianity of her virgin beauty, turning the churches of Christ into creatures of State, and metamorphosing Gospel Ambassadors into State pensioners.

If my information be correct, the town of Boston has enjoyed the liberty which we plead for, more than one hundred years, yet the inhabitants increase and are virtuous. Fifteen States, now in the Union, have all that we ask for; and is religion demolished in these States?

Mr. Speaker, let gentlemen turn their eyes to the religious magazines published in this State, by those who plead for law-regulated religion, and they will find that while editors in one page plead for the old firm of Moses and Aaron—Ruler and Priest,—where the language is, you comb my hair and I'll scratch your elbows—you make laws to support me, and I'll persuade the people to obey you,—in the next page they will narrate the 'wonderful works of God,' in those States wherein there are no religious laws, and indeed, wherein the inhabitants know that religious establishments and assessments serve only to make one part of the community fools, and the other hypocrites, to support fraud, superstition, and violence on the earth. Let Christianity stand upon its own basis, it is the greatest blessing that ever was among men; but incorporate it into the civil compact, and it becomes the mother of all cruelties."

We have already spoken of Mr. Leland's narrow educational advantages in early life; but, limited as they were, through untiring and diligent industry, and close observation of men and things, he attained a mental culture, and an amount of knowledge that would have done credit to one favored with the advantages of the University. This is evident from his writings, as a whole, while some portions of them exhibit a logical acuteness, a literary discrimination, and an elegance of diction, which fully sustain the estimate we have put upon his character as a scholar. Indeed, as a man of learning, although self-taught, he had few equals, and fewer superiors in the age in which he lived. It must, we think, be admitted by those at all conversant with his writings, that he was not deficient in poetical genius. Some pieces from his pen, have been classed, by competent judges, among the choicest specimens of devotional poetry. As an example, might be mentioned the evening hymn, commencing—"The day is past and gone." Also the lines on death, beginning—"How

solemn the sight we behold!" and others of equal merit, which cannot be noticed in this hasty sketch.

The Rev. John Leland died Jan. 14th, 1841. In the language of the writer before quoted, "He was a man eminent above many, for piety and usefulness, whose name is connected with all that is pure in patriotism, lovely in social and domestic virtues; philanthropic in feeling and action, arduons, disinterested, and self-denying in the labors of the ministerial calling; one whose place in society, in the church, in the rakus of the ministry, will not soon be filled in the hearts of those who knew him—never.

He died as he had lived, a witness for the truth, testifying with his last breath the value of that religion, and that only, which has its seat in the heart. His life had been unostentations; his aspirations after worldly honors ever low and feeble; his humility and sense of dependence on God, deep felt and abiding,—thus he died.

"Being asked, very near his end, what were his views of the future, be exclaimed, with both hands extended upwards, and a smile on his countenance never to be forgotten, 'My prospects of heaven are clear.' He seemed already to feel the everlasting rest laying its sweet influences over his soul, and bearing it up, taking away the sting of death."

His remains lie beside those of his wife in Cheshire, and a "simple obelisk of blue marble, commemorative of both, mark their common resting place On its west side is inscribed the epitaph prepared by himself, some years before his death. "Here lies the body of the Rev. John Leland, of Cheshire, who labored 67 years to promote piety, and vindicate the civil and religious rights of all men. He died January 14th, 1841, aged 80 years and 8 months."

On the north side is the following: "Sarah, consort of Rev. John Leland. She died October 5th, 1837, aged 84 years." On the south: "This monument was erected by the children of the deceased, to point out the resting place of their revered parents."

We shall close this sketch, with the following extract from his funeral sermon, by the Rev. John Alden:

"Great and good man, he is gone! The tender and affectionate father, the kind husband, the wise counsellor, emphatically the peace-maker, the social warm-hearted friend, the sage, patriot, the lover of sound doctrine, the eloquent and unusually successful minister of Christ, is no more! Is no more? He still lives, we doubt not, where his intellect has found congenial spirits, and a wider range in the upper empire of Jehovah. He lives below in the affections of thousands, and his works do follow him. To live like him is, to mourn over the sins of earth, and hold up God's everlasting truth to a dying world. To die like him, is to stand on the confines of earth, looking off into eternity, and depart with the prospect of heaven clear. To rest at last like him, is, we doubt not, to rest forever in the paradise of God."

The children of Hannah Leland, who married Joseph Rice, were all born in Grafton. Those of them, that were married, settled in Grafton, Sutton and Conway, Mass. Sarah in Grafton, Hannah, Mary and Daniel in Sutton. Elizabeth, Israel, Timothy and Caleb, in Conway; and they all remained through life where they first settled, except Caleb, who removed from Conway to Phelps, New York.

The ten children of Thankful Leland, who married Lemuel Powers, were born in Northbridge or Grafton. Deliverance remained in Northbridge. Ezekiel, Lydia, Prudence, David, Sarah, Thankful, Mary and Samuel, went to Croydon, N. H., and all except Thankful, remained there as long as they lived. Thankful married and settled in Charlestown, N. H., and Lemuel in Stillwater, New York.

The three children of Thomas, were born in Sutton. Silence went to Athol, Mass., and remained there through life. Margaret did not leave Sutton. Thomas was a soldier, in the war of the Revolution; and after the peace, he went from Sutton to Schroon, in the northern part of the State of New York, where he resided several years. He afterwards lived in other places in the western part of New York. For some years before his death, he lived with his children in the northern part of the State of Ohio.

The eleven children of Phineas, were born upon the homestead estate, which he received from his father, situated upon the Blackstone River, in Grafton. Lydia married and died young, in Grafton. Phineas took the paternal estate, and remained upon it, for life. Eleazer first settled in Croydon, N. H., but soon returned to Grafton, where he spent the rest of his days. He was for many years one of the selectmen of Grafton, and in 1807, represented the town in the General Court. Joseph was in the army during a great part of the Revolutionary war. He commenced his service a private, or non-commissioned officer, and left the army a Lieutenant. After peace was established, he settled in Saco. Maine. During the whole active period of his life, he was connected in business there as a merchant. He was a judicious and discreet man: highly respected and much esteemed among the people of his acquaintance. He was once a Senator in the Legislature of Massachusetts. He was on one or more occasions, an unsuccessful candidate for a seat in Congress; but as, in the political divisions of his day, he belonged to the minor party in his town and county, he could not expect often to be a successful candidate for political honors. He was a man of quiet, domestic habits, and sustained an irreproachable moral character.

David W., never left Grafton. Thomas married young. He remained in Grafton three or four years after his marriage. He then went to Conway, Mass.; but after a residence of one or two years, he returned to Grafton. He continued in Grafton till 1795, when he removed to Chester, Vermont, and settled in a wilderness part of the town. The hardships and privations of new country life were his lot for several years; but by great effort and constant labor, in the course of a few years, he reclaimed from its native wildness a well cultivated farm.

The widow of Phineas Leland, married for her second husband, Ziba Abby, of Chatham, in the State of Connecticut. When she went with her husband to Chatham, she took with her, her two daughters, Sarah and Deliverance, and both of them married there. Deliverance remained in Chatham as long as she lived; but Sarah removed to the part of the State of New York upon the Susquehannah River, adjoining the State of Pennsylvania, now called Owego, in the county of Tioga, where she resided until her death.

Joshua married in Grafton, but soon after his marriage, went to Chester, Vermont, and settled in a new and uncultivated part of the town. He brought the land on which he established himself, into a good state of cultivation, and continued there as long as he lived.

Caleb married in Grafton, and continued to reside there for several years. But about the year 1800, he also removed to Chester, Vermont, and soon after to the adjoining town of Baltimore, where he continued to live until his death.

The second Lydia, born in 1767, soon after her marriage went to Weathersfield, Vermont, and continued to reside there for twenty years, or more; then removed to Springfield, Vermont, and continued there as long as she lived. Her husband was a representative for two or three years in the Vermont Legislature; and also Judge of Probate for the county of Windsor, for several years.

The descendants of JAMES WHIPPLE, son of Jacob Whipple and Jerusha Leland and Grandson of James Leland, born in Grafton, Mass. in 1732, married Lydia Powers, and died in Hardwick, Mass. in the year 1767.

James Whipple's four sons were born in Hardwick. Jacob remained through life near the place of his birth, and died in Dana, a town taken from flardwick. David settled in Greenwich, an adjoining town. James continued to live in Hardwick or Dana, till 1817, when he removed to Otsego, county of Otsego, New York; and after a few years residence there, went to Springfield in the same county, where he continued until the time of his death. Moses never left the place of his nativity. Their decendants, as appears by the foregoing table, are scattered into many different parts of the country.

Squire Whipple is descended from Henry Leland, the common ancestor of the Leland family in America, through Ebenezer Leland of Shurburne. James Leland and Jerusha Leland, who married Jacob Whipple of Grafton; James Whipple of Hardwick, Mass., and James Whipple of Springfield, New York. He was born in Hardwick, Mass., September 16th, 1804. His father was a farmer, and he labored upon the farm during the early period of his life. From the age of eight to thirteen, he attended the common district school, in Hardwick, about six months each year, and labored the other six, part of the time in a cotton factory, and part upon the farm. In 1817, his father removed to Otsego county, New York, and his son Squire continued to reside with him upon the farm, for the five succeeding years; attending school about three months each year, and laboring nine. At the age of eighteen or nineteen, he taught school a short time. From 1822 to 1829, he attended Academical schools three or four months each year, and was employed either in private study or agricultural and mechanical labor the other eight or nine. With the aid of these slender advantages for preparation, he was enabled in the year 1829, to enter the senior class in Union College, and at the expiration of the year to receive the degree of A. B. After he left college, he was employed between one and two years, as an assistant engineer, upon the Baltimore and Ohio He then commenced manufacturing mathematical instruments, to which business he has devoted a part of his time ever since, and has constructed a considerable number of valuable instruments. In 1839 or 1840, he designed the plan of a boat scale, for the Eric Canal Enlargement, and subsequently built a scale by contract at Utica, calculated to weigh draughts of three or four hundred tons; a work which has attracted a good deal of notice, and excited considerable admiration, as a machine possessing the essential requisites of strength, durability, convenience, simplicity and cheapness, to a degree scarcely to be exceeded. This work has served as a model for several others of the kind.

About the same time, he designed the plan of an *iron trussed bridge*, for which letters patent were obtained, and on which plan some six or eight bridges of from 70 to 100 feet have been built over the Erie Canal enlargement. Between 1840 and 1847, he conducted several preliminary surveys for canals and rail-roads, in New York and other States.

In 1846 and 1847, he prepared and published a small elementary and practical work, on the subject of bridge building. His work has received flattering no-

tices from distinguished engineers, and it is unquestionably a production of much merit. It is thus noticed in an article published in the American Rail-Road Journal, printed in Philadelphia, under date of May Sth, 1847.

"A treatise upon the construction of bridges, has lately been published, from the pen of S. Whipple, Esquire, C. E., of Utica, New York.

Mr. Whipple has given much time and attention to this important subject; and as he is a gentleman of high attainments, both scientific and practical, and warmly devoted to mechanical pursuits, his treatise is prepared in a very able manner, and will, no doubt, be productive of much good.

There is no branch of engineering so little understood by men of the profession, as that of the proper construction of bridges. This is evident from the diversity of plans adopted upon public works, which are as various almost as the works themselves—a state of things somewhat remarkable, as there cannot well be more than one best plan for bridges of the same dimensions and character, and which can only be accounted for by a want of that complete knowledge of the subject requisite for forming a correct judgement. This want, Mr Whipple aims to supply, and he begins at the right place, viz: at the foundation, by stating clearly the principles which should govern, and thence proceeding to the application of those principles in the arrangement of plans suited to various circumstances.

The treatise of Mr Whipple is drawn up in that plain and concise manner which indicates a clear and accurate mind, imbued with a very thorough knowledge of the subject. It is a work highly creditable to the profession, and will do honor to it at home and abroad. His illustrations and application of mechanical principles are brought as much as possible within the comprehension of all. He promises, if his present treatise meets with sufficient encouragement, to follow it by another of far more strictly practical character, giving full details of plans suited to different circumstances and localities. We trust he will be so far encouraged in his present effort, as to induce him to persevere until he has accomplished all that he proposes upon the subject on which he is engaged.

He is at present, (1849,) almost exclusively engaged in the construction of bridges of different dimensions, both of wood and iron, (principally of iron,) for rail-roads and common roads, in various parts of New York.

For more than thirty years past, he has discarded the use of animal food of all kinds, except the products of the dairy; mainly from a long cherished aversion to violence and cruelty to dumb creatures. And about the year 1847, he prepared and published a small work entitled, 'The way to happiness, being an essay on the motives to human actions, and the fundamental principles of morality;' in which he defends, and recommends with great ability, his peculiar system of diet, as being favorable to good health, rational economy and sound morality.

The three children of Benjamin Leland married in Grafton, Mass. Huldah with her husband, went to Springfield, Vt., in the year 1804 or 1805, and after residing there a few years, removed to Weathersfield, where she now resides. Daniel left Grafton in 1803 or 1804, and settled in Weathersfield, Vt. In 1813 or 1814, he removed to Barre, Mass., and after residing there about





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ten years, returned to Weathersfield. Benjamin was employed as a manufacturer of boots and shoes in Grafton, a few years after his marriage; he then removed to Boston, and was concerned in trade there until 1816, when he left Boston for New York, where he remained a few years, and then left New York for Philadelphia.

Ira Leland has his descent from Henry Leland, the common ancestor of the Leland family in America, through Ebenezer Leland of Sherburne, James Leland, Benjamin Leland, Benjamin Leland, Jr., of Grafion, Massachusetts, and Daniel Leland of Weathersfield, Vermont, He was born in Weathersfield, Vermont, June 1th, 1810. Until twenty-one years of age he followed a mechanic occupation in the manufacture of woolen cloth. He then commenced a course of study preparatory to college, which he pursued at the academy in New Ipswich, N. H., and at a classical school in Providence. R. L. and at the academy in Middleborough, Mass. He entered Brown University at Providence in 1833, and after the regular course of four years, received the degree of A. B. in 1837. Since that period he has been employed about seven years in teaching in English and classical schools in Grafton, Worcester, Fairhaven, and New Bedford, Mass. He was connected with a Baptist Church in Barnstable, Mass., as their minister, three years, and became pastor of the Baptist church in Lexington, Mass., in May, 1847, which relation he now sustains in December, 1849.

Jonathan Morse was among the first settlers upon the Androscoggin river, in the county of Oxford, Maine. His sister Mary and Silence, soon after settled near him.

Moses Leland Morse, son of Moody Morse and Abigail Leland, was born in Sutton, Mass., May 19th, 1781. His father and mother both died before he was twelve years of age. He resided upon a farm until the age of fourteen, attending school two or three months each year and laboring nine or ten. He served an apprenticeship as a watchmaker and goldsmith, from fourteen to twenty-one. After he became free, he carried on business as a watchmaker and goldsmith for several years, part of the time in Keene, N. H., and part of the time in Cambridge, Mass. He was married in 1804. His wife was a sister of the late Judge Sibley of Detroit, Mich. He at an early age became distinguished as a machinist. In 1813 or 1814, he invented a beautiful and useful instrument for weighing gold, silver and electuaries, which he called a pendulum scale. It was an ornamental and convenient article for counting rooms, so long as gold was circulated by weight. He received for this invention a patent from the government of the United States. He also in the year 1814, invented a machine for making pins, for which he likewise received a patent. This machine would draw the wire, cut, point, head and drop sixty pins in a minute. It was the first of the kind put in operation in the United States. He sold his machine with the patent right. The persons who purchased them, after making some improvements upon the machine, put it in operation in England. And it is said to be the basis on which most of the pin manufactories now in operation in England, are founded. Mr. Morse was employed for several years, as an agent in an extensive manufacturing establishment, owned by Asa Waters, Esq., in Milbury. He finally became connected in a large cutlery establishment in Worcester, where he died, on the second day of September 1831. He was a truly pious and good man. And in an article in the Massachusetts Spy, a newspaper printed in Worcester, under date of September 7th, 1831, the following just tribute was paid to his worth:-" Deacon Morse was a man of

great mechanical ingenuity, to whom the country is indebted for several useful inventions. He was the projector, and to the time of his death, the principal manager of the extensive cutlery establishment in this town. He was an affectionate husband, a kind father, a faithful friend, an exemplary and valuable citizen and meek and pious christian. Few men in his situation in life, would be more missed, and the void which he has left in the circle in which he moved, will not be readily nor easily supplied."

Prudence Morse married in Keene, N. H., and resided there with her husband several years. They then removed to Wilton, Maine, and from Wilton to Bloomfield, where she died.

Charles Morse, son of Moody Morse and Abigail Leland, has his descent from Henry Leland, the common ancestor of the Leland family in America, through Ebenezer Leland of Sherburne, James Leland of Grafton, Moses Leland and Abigail Leland of Sutton, Mass. He was born in Sutton, Mass., October 27, 1785, where he lived till he was fifteen years old. At an early age he was deprived of kindly parental influences—always so powerful in the developement of character—by the decease of both father and mother. His father, Moody Morse, had by his own industry, acquired a moderate competence, which was not sufficient to procure for his children more than the ordinary means of common school education. It is well known that these means were exceedingly limited at that early day. The death of Moody Morse and wife, was followed by the separation of their family. Charles went to live with Esquire King of Sutton, a wealthy farmer and estimable citizen. Having received from nature excellent parts and a good temper, he grew into favor with his aged patron. who was glad to impart to him those lessons which he had gathered from a long experience. This was an interesting period of his life. He now came to realize the fact that he must depend upon himself, that he had no arm to lean upon for assistance, and that the only inheritance he could claim was a character of undoubted honor and integrity. The circumstances of his situation induced those habits of thought and action, which in after life ripened into traits of character, giving him the power to plan wisely and to execute successfully. It was also during this period, ere the effervescence of boyish passions had subsided, that youthful vigor prompted him to a rash act which entailed its effects upon his subsequent life. It was attempting to do at mowing, the work of a man of twenty-five, while he had yet attained to only half that age. He was unable to do the least labor for two years and a half, and he probably never recovered entirely from the shock given to his constitution. A change of climate was recommended. A new country would probably affect him favorably. He accordingly accompanied his brother Jonathan on his return to the new home he had formed for himself among the forests of Maine, in what is now called Dixfield. The journey by water, and the fresh invigorating influences of forest life, soon imparted that strength which he sought. He suffered the vicissitudes and deprivations not unusual in a newly settled country; but by his perseverance and integrity, he succeeded in gaining the confidence and esteem of

the community in which he lived. In 1809, he took up his residence in Wilton, where he resided until his death. His cast of mind fitted him for directing in the affairs of men, and he became a highly esteemed and influential citizen, enjoying that popularity which is not sought after, but which follows from a just appreciation of moral and intellectual worth, directed by a sound and discriminating judgment and that practical wisdom called common sense. Hence, his counsel was sought after by his neighbors in their individual concerns, by the town in the management of its municipal affairs, by the militia as its commander, and by his fellow citizens as county commissioner, and as representative and senator in the state legislature. In these several situations he acquitted himself with honor. His deportment was modest. His benevolence and sympathy embraced all the sons of affliction without distinction of sect. clime or color. But it was reserved for religion to chasten and polish a character already estimable in the sight of man. In 1823 he made a public profession of the Saviour, and soon after united with a branch of his visible church. and ever after maintained the character of an active and consistent Christian.

Moses Leland Morse, son of Charles Morse, was educated at Bowdoin College, Brunswick, Maine, and received his degree of A. B. in 1846.

Eight of the nine children of the Rev. John Leland—Betsy, Hannah B., Polly, John D., Sally, Lucy, Fanny, and Nancy—were born in the State of Virginia, and Lemuel, the other child, was born in Cheshire, Massachusetts. They resided for several years in Cheshire, and were all married there. His descendants are numerous, and the above tabular account shows that they are widely scattered through the country.

John D. Leland, the eldest son, remained in Cheshire for several years after his marriage. He was a representative in the General Court of Massachusetts, from that town, in the year 1813. He afterwards removed to Deerfield, Oneida county, New York, and was for a considerable number of years clerk of the courts for that county; and he is now (1849) an opulent farmer and trader in the town of Deerfield.

Elijah Ford, the grandson of John Leland, born in 1805, is a lawyer of highly respectable standing at the bar, in the city of Buffalo, in the western part of the State of New York. He is descended from Henry Leland, the common ancestor of the Leland family in America, through Ebenezer Leland of Sherburne, James Leland of Grafton, Mass., James Leland of Phelps, N.Y., John Leland of Cheshire, Mass., and Polly Leland, who married Isaac Ford, and died in Hubberton, N. Y., in 1840.

Caleb Rice has his descent from James Leland of Grafton, Mass., through Hannah Leland, who married Joseph Rice, of Grafton, Israel Rice, and Joseph Rice, of Conway, Mass. He was born in Conway, April 4, 1792, educated at Williams College, in Williamstown, Mass., and graduated in September, 1814. He studied law with William Blair, Esq., of Westfield, Mass., and was admitted to the bar as an attorney in the county of Hampden, Nov. 1817. He was in practice one year after his admission, in Westfield. He then removed to West Springfield, where he continued his professional pursuits until 1831, when he was appointed sheriff of the county of Hampden, which office he now (1849) holds. He represented the town of West Springfield in the legislature of Massachusetts for five successive years, commencing in 1821. He was chief commissioner of highways, and chairman of the county commissions for the county of Hampden from 1826 to 1831.

Baron Stow was born in Croydon, N. H., June 16, 1801. At the age of eight years, his parents removed to Newport, an adjoining town, where, Dec. 31, 1818, he became a member of the Baptist Church. In the Newport Academy, he pursued his preparatory studies, and in Sept. 1822, he entered the Sophomore Class of the Columbian College, in the District of Columbia, then under the Presidency of the Rev. Dr. Staughton. He received from that Col-

lege the degree of A. B. in Dec. 1825. After this, for more than a year, he edited a religious newspaper in Washington City, entitled the Columbian Star. Oct. 34, 1827, he was ordained and settled as pastor of the Middle Street Baptist Church, in Portsmouth, N. H. In 1830, he received from Waterville College, in Maine, the degree of A. M. In Nov. 1832, he removed to Boston, and took the pastoral charge of the Baldwin Place Baptist Church. In 1835, he was elected one of the Corresponding Secretaries of the Baptist General Convention of the United States, but declined the appointment; and in 1841, he was again elected to the same office, which he also declined. In 1846, he received from Brown University the honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity. July 1, 1848, he resigned the charge of the Baldwin Place Church, and Nov. 1, of the same year, was settled as pastor of the Rowe Street Baptist Church, in Boston.

His time and strength for twenty-two years, have been mainly devoted to his duties as preacher and pastor; but he has sustained official relations to numerous benevolent societies, and performed a large amount of service on various Boards and Committees. He has also written considerably for the periodical press, edited several valuable works, and published some productions of his own pen. With a constitution naturally feeble, he has ever labored under special disadvantages; but, by the blessing of Providence, he has been able to execute far more than, in the earlier part of his public life, his friends anticipated.

He has his descent from Henry Leland, the common ancestor of the Leland race in America, through Ebenezer Leland, of Sherburne, James Leland, of Grafton, Thankful Leland, who married Lemnel Powers, of Northbridge, all in Massachusetts, Lydia Powers, who married Jonah Stow, of Croydon, and Peter Stow, of Newport, New Hampshire.

The descendants of DAVID POWERS, son of Lemuel Powers and Thankful Leland, and grandson of James Leland, born in Northbridge in the year 1750; married Miriam Ward and Naomi Goldthwait, and died in Croydon, N. H., in 1813.

Dennis Powers was born in Croydon, New Hampshire, May 24, 1808. He is a clergyman of the Trinitarian Congregational denomination. He was fitted for college in Wrentham, Massachusetts, at Day's Academy, under the instruction of Isaac Perkins, Esquire. He entered Amherst College in 1831, and graduated from the same institution in 1835. That same year he entered the Theological Seminary at Andover, Massachusetts, and graduated therefrom in 1838. On the 5th of December 1838, he was ordained and settled over the church and society in East Randolph, Massachusetts. At his own request, he was dismissed from this church and society, April 15, 1841. On the 29th of September, 1842, he was installed as pastor of the church and society in South Abington, Massachusetts, where he still resides in the ministry. He is connected with Henry Leland, the common ancestor of the whole Leland race in America, by a line of descent, through Ebenezer Leland of Sherburne, James Leland of Grafton, Thankful Leland, who married Lemuel Powers of Northbridge, and David Powers of Croydon, New Hampshire.

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Cyrus Powers, son of the Rev. Lemuel Powers, was born in Croydon, New-Hampshire, and removed with his parents while a child to Stillwater, New York. He was married to his first wife, Lydia Stow, in 1802, and settled in Sempronius, Cayuga county, New York. In 1804, he was appointed a justice of the peace, for that county, and in 1806, he received the appointment of judge of the county courts, which office he filled with ability for the period of about twenty-five years. For a part of that time he held the office of judge for the county of Cayuga and a part for the county of Tompkins. He married his second wife in 1826, and removed to Lansing, in the county of Tompkins; and in 1839 he left Lansing for Kelloggsville, Cayuga county, where he died in 1841. He was a professor of religion and a member of the Episcopal Church.

Mrs. Abigail Fillmore was born in Stillwater, Saratoga county, N.Y., in 1798. She is descended from Henry Leland, the progenitor of all of the name in America, through Ebenezer Leland of Sherburne, Mass., James Leland of Grafton, Mass., Thankful Leland, who married Lemuel Powers of Northbridge, Mass., and Lemuel Powers of Stillwater, N. Y. Her father, the Rev. Lemuel Powers, died when she was about two years of age. At an early period of her life, she removed, with her mother, from the place of her nativity, to Sempronius, in the county of Cayuga and state of New York, where she continued to reside until the time of her marriage, in February, 1826. She then went with her husband to Aurora in the county of Erie. She continued to reside there until the spring of 1830, when she removed with her husband to Buffalo. This has been her place of residence ever since. She was, however, with her husband in Albany during the year 1848 and part of 1849, while he was in the service of the state. She is a lady highly esteemed, for her intelligence, dignified manners, genteel deportment, and moral and christian virtues. is a truly pious Christian and constant worshipper at the Unitarian Congregational Church in Buffalo. Her husband, the Hon. Millard Fillmore, is a distinguished lawyer and statesman. His case is among the remarkable instances in this happy country, of wonderful success in life, by means of unaided exertion and well directed personal effort. He was born, in what is now called Summer Hill, in the county of Cayuga and state of New York, on the 7th day of January, 1800. His father Nathaniel Fillmore, about two years after, removed to Sempronius, now Niles, in the same county, where he continued to reside until 1819, when he removed to the county of Erie, where he still lives. Millard remained in his father's family until he was fifteen years of age. His father was a moderate farmer and could afford his son no advantages of education beyond what the imperfect and ill-taught common schools of the county afforded. He served as an apprentice to the trade of a clothier and wool carder from the age of fifteen to nineteen, four or five months in Livingston county and the other portion of the time in Niles. During this

period he had no time allowed for schooling. But during such portion of time as was allowed him for relaxation from the labors of his trade, he was assiduously employed in private study. At the age of nineteen he commenced the study of law with Walter Wood, Esquire, a respectable lawyer in Sempronius, and remained with him as a student for two years. During this period he devoted part of his time to his legal studies, and part to scientific and literary pursuits. To obtain funds to defray the expenses of his education, he taught school a few months in each year.

In the fall of 1821 he removed to the county of Eric, and the next spring he entered the office of a counsellor, as a student, in Buffalo. He continued his legal studies there until the spring of 1823, when he was admitted to the bar as an attorney of the court of Common Pleas. He soon after commenced practice in his profession at Aurora, in the county of Erie, and continued in practice there until the spring of 1830. In 1827 he was admitted as an attorney, and in 1829 as a counsellor of the Supreme Court. In the spring of 1830, he removed to Buffalo, where he has ever since resided, except during the year 1848 and part of 1849; while he held the office of Comptroller of the state, he resided in Albany. He was married in 1826. He was a member of the Legislative Assembly of New York, for the years 1829, 1830 and 1831, as a representative from the county of Erie, under three successive annual elections. He entered the Legislature young and inexperienced. but before the close of his service he acquired a commanding influence in the Assembly. He was a representative in the Congress of the United States from the state of New York, for two years, commencing March 4, 1833, and ending March 3, 1835. He was again a representative in Congress for six years commencing March 4, 1837, and ending March 3, 1843, under three successive biennial elections. In 1840 and 1841 he was a member of the important Committee on Elections, and in 1812 and 1813, he was at the head of the Committee of Ways and Means. During the latter part of his congressional service, he was a leading member of the House. In the state election in the fall of 1844, he was a candidate for Governor of the state of New York. But the late Hon. Silas Wright was his successful competitor. At the November election in 1847, he was chosen by a popular vote, Comptroller of the state, for the years 1848 and 1849. He entered upon the duties of the office, and continued to serve until February, 1849, when, on account of other paramount engagements, he resigned the office. In the fall of 1848, he was elected by the people, Vice-President of the United States, for four years, commencing on the fourth day of March, 1849; which office he now (February, 1850) holds.

William Freeman Cooper was born in Croydon, New Hampshire, on the twentieth day of September, 1802. He has his descent from Henry Leland, the common ancestor of the Leland race in America, through Ebenezer Leland of Sherburne, James Leland of Grafton, Thankful Leland who married Lemnel Powers of Northbridge, all in Massachusetts, and Mary Powers who married Sherman Cooper, of Croydon, New Hampshire. He is a physician and surgeon. He remained with his parents upon a small farm in Croydon until he was eighteen years of age. His parents had a large family and a small share of this world's goods. While he resided with them he attended the common district school two or three months each year, and labored upon the farm the other portion of the time. From the age of eighteen to twenty-two he was employed part of the time in study at the academy in Newport, New Hampshire, and the other part in teaching school to obtain money to defray the expense of his education. In 1824, at the age of twenty-two, he commenced his professional studies with Dr. Elijah Cooper, a surgeon and physician of considerable eminence in Newport. He pursued his studies with Dr. Cooper, and at the medical school in Bowdoin College, Brunswick, Maine, until 1826, when he received from that college a degree of M. D. He went into practice as a physician and surgeon in 1826, in Newport, and continued there about one year. In 1827 he removed to Kelloggsville, in the county of Caynga and state of New York, and commenced business there in his profession among entire strangers. His practice was small at first, but in the course of a few years it became extensive and lucrative, and he is now, in 1850, one of the most celebrated surgeons in the western part of New York.

Sarah Leland was born in Grafton, married, and continued to reside there, until the time of her death. Susannah was also born in Grafton. Upon her marriage, in 1808, she removed with her husband to Boston. They continued to reside in Boston and the adjoining town of Roxbury for about ten years. In 1818 they removed to Philadelphia, where she died in 1819. Charles was born in Grafton, married, and continued to reside there for about twenty years. He removed from Grafton to the county of Madison, N. Y., and remained there eight or ten years. He then went to Milwaukee, Wis., where he continued to reside until his death in 1844. His descendants are numerous, and most of them are settled in different parts of the Western country. Joshua W. was born in Grafton. He now, 1850, occupies the farm which was owned and occupied by his father, Phineas Leland, his grandfather, Phineas Leland, and his great-grandfather, James Leland. He has no descendants. He held the office of colonel in the militia for several years, and for one or two years was a representative from Grafton in the Massachusetts Legislature.

Prudence Leland, of this branch of the family, was born in Croydon, N. H. When she was about one year old, her parents removed from Croydon to Grafton, Mass. She resided with her parents in Grafton until her marriage, in 1799. She lived with her husband, Gregory Stone, in Weathersfield, Vt., from 1799 to 1810, the time of his death. She then returned to Grafton, Mass. She has since resided a part of the time in Grafton, a part in Milbury, and part in Westborough, where she now resides. Her husband was a highly respectable man. He had a good common education, and was employed in teaching school during the winter season, for several years. Soon after he settled in Weathersfield, Vt., he was elected a captain in the militia, and in a short time a major. He was for a series of years a represen-

tative from the town of Weathersfield, in the Vermont legislature. He was a truly pious man and an exemplary member of the Methodist Episcopal church. His death caused deep lamentation in his family and among his neighbors, and the manner of his death was such as greatly to augment their grief. While he was standing upon a bridge, over a small stream near his dwelling-house, at the time of an unusual flood of water, in that part of the country, a mill-dam, just above the bridge, was swept down by the force of thecurrent, by which the bridge on which he stood was carried away, and he fell amidst the foaming waters and crashing timbers, and perished. He was of the Leland family, and had his descent from Henry Leland, the common ancestor, through Ebenezer Leland of Sherburne, James Leland of Grafton, Jerusha Leland who married Jacob Whipple of Grafton, Jerusha Whipple who married David Haven of Framingham, and Hannah Haven who married Nahum Stone of Grafton.


Gregory D. Stone, son of Gregory Stone and Prudence Leland, was born in Weathersfield, Vt., in the year 1800. He was educated at Union College in Schenectady, N. Y., and received his degree of A. B. in the year 1823. He studied law, and was admitted to the bar in the state of Alabama. He commenced practice in Resselville, in the county of Franklin, in the northern part of that state, about the year 1825, and continued in practice there until the time of his death in 1838. He also held the office of judge of the orphan's court, for the county of Franklin, for about ten years.

John Leland, son of Eleazer, was born in Grafton, Mass., and remained there until the year 1804. During that year he was married, and settled upon a small farm in Springfield, in the state of Vermont. He remained there till 1813, when he returned to his native town, and he continued to reside in Grafton and the neighboring towns of Shrewsbury and Westborough, until his death in 1834.

Sherman Leland, who is connected with Henry Leland, the progenitor of the Leland race in America, by a line of descent through Ebenezer Leland of Sherburne, James Leland, Phineas Leland, and Eleazer Leland of Grafton, Mass., was born in Grafton, on the twenty-ninth day of March, 1783. He remained in his father's family, upon a farm in Grafton, until he was over twenty years of age. He attended the common district schools from two to four months each year, and was employed the other portion of the time in agricultural or mechanical labor. When he was in his twentieth year he taught a district school in Grafton about two months, and attended school about two. When he was in his twenty-first year, he taught school about four months in Weathersfield, Vt. In the spring of 1804, when he was twenty-one years of age, he attended a grammar school, kept by the Rev. Dr. Crane, in Northbridge, four or five weeks. During the summer and fall of that year, he was a student four or five months, at the academy in Woodstock, In the fall, winter, and spring of 1804 and 1805, he was employed in teaching a district school, about five months, in Brooklyn, Conn. At

the close of his school he returned to the academy in Woodstock, and continued there as a student about five months. In September or October, 1805, he commenced the study of law with Lucius Hubbard, Esquire, in Chester, He continued to pursue the study of law, with Mr. Hubbard, Joseph B. Caldwell, Esquire, of Grafton, Mass., and the Hon. Edward Bangs of Worcester, Mass., till December, 1809. He was, however, during this time employed in teaching school in Springfield, Vt., about four months in the winter season of 1805 and 1806; in Grafton, Mass., about three months in the winter season of 1806 and 1807, and about five months in the winter season of 1807 and 1808. He was admitted to the bar as an attorney of the court of common pleas, at Worcester, Mass., in December, 1809. He commenced practice in his profession, at Eastport, Me., about the first of January, 1810. He was an entire stranger in that part of the country, but he soon obtained a good share of business. He was admitted in due course attorney and counsellor of the supreme court. In July, 1810, he was elected an ensign in the militia, and in February, 1811, a lieutenant. On the second day of the same month he was appointed a justice of the peace for the county of Washington, then a part of Massachusetts, and on the eleventh of October, of that year, he was appointed prosecuting attorney for the commonwealth in the county of Washington. He was married October thirteenth, 1811. He was representative from the town of Eastport in the Massachusetts' legislature for the year 1812. In December, 1812, he was appointed first lieutenant in a corps of volunteer troops, raised under the authority of the United States, and served in the army of the United States, under that appointment, upon the eastern frontier until April, 1813. On the second of April, 1813, he received the appointment of captain in the 31th regiment of infantry, in the army of the United States, and continued in the United States' service, under that appointment, until the fifth of June, 1814. From December, 1813, to May, 1814, he had command of the military posts at Eastport and Robbuston, Mass. In June, 1814, he resigned his office in the army, and resumed the practice in his profession. Soon after the capture of Eastport by the British forces, in July, 1814, he removed from that part of the country, and settled in Roxbury, Mass. In the beginning of the year 1815, he opened an office in Boston, and again entered upon the duties of his profession in the counties of Suffolk and Norfolk. He has ever since been in practice in those two counties, but for the last five or six years, he has declined all business which required his attendance in court. He was a representative from the town of Roxbury in the legislature of Massachusetts, for the years 1818, 1819, 1820, and 1821. He was also a delegate from Roxbury in the convention for a revision of the constitution in 1820, on the separation of Maine from Massachusetts; and while he was a member of the house of representatives in 1820, he was one of the committee raised to consider the subject of the separation of Maine from Massachusetts. He was also, during the same year, one of the managers chosen by the house to

conduct the prosecution for the impeachment of the Hon. James Prescott, judge of probate for the county of Middlesex. For the year 1821 he was chairman of the committee on elections. He was a member of the senate of Massachusetts from the county of Norfolk for the years 1823 and 1824, and during the temporary absence of the Hon. Nathaniel Silsbee, the president, he was elected president, pro-tem. During both years of his service in the senate, he was chairman of the committee on new trials. This committee had charge of all the matters which are now committed in Massachusetts to the committee on the judiciary, and the committee on matters of probate and chancery. He was again a member of the house of representatives from Roxbury for the year 1825, and was chairman of the committee on the judiciary. He was also appointed a member of a joint committee raised to sit during the recess of the legislature, to investigate the concerns of the state prison, and report such reform in the government of that institution as might be found necessary. In 1824 he was a candidate for representative in congress for the Norfolk congressional district in Massachusetts. The Hon. John Bailey was his competitor, and after five or six animated contests at the polls, Mr. Bailey was elected by a small majority. In 1826, the government of Harvard University confered upon him the honorary degree of Master of Arts. On the 29th of June, 1827, he was appointed a master in chancery for the county of Norfolk, which office he held for eight successive years. On the twelfth of May, 1828, he was appointed an inspector of the state prison, and continued to hold the office under three successive appointments for twelve years. He was again a member of the senate for the county of Norfolk for the years 1828 and 1829, and was president of the senate for the year 1828, and chairman of the committee on the judiciary for the year 1829. On the 26th day of January, 1830, he was appointed judge of the court of probate for the county of Norfolk. He accepted the appointment and immediately commenced discharging the duties of the office. He has continued to hold the office ever since, being a period of more than twenty years. In April, 1837, he was appointed a justice of the peace for all the counties in the commonwealth. He made the most of the small advantages which he had for education preparatory to his professional studies, but his chief reliance for knowledge in science, literature and law, has been upon his own unaided exertions, made both before and since his admission to the bar. He has on no occasion within the last nineteen years, used any thing as a beverage but cold water, and for the last fifteen years he has abstained from the use of all kinds of animal food, except milk, butter and cheese, and he has now, in his sixty-seventh year, as vigorous health as he had at forty-five; for the last eighteen years he has been exempt from all the common diseases of life.

Edwin S. Leland, son of Sherman Leland, was born at Dennysville, a place near Eastport, Me., the 28th day of August, 1812. He was with his parents in Eastport until he was two years of age, when they left that place, and soon

after settled in Roxbury, Mass. He was a member of his father's family in Roxbury until he was over twenty-one years of age. He was educated at the Roxbury high school, and under the instruction of one or two private teachers. He studied law with his father and was admitted to the bar in 1834 or 1835. In October 1835, he left home for Illinois, and commenced practice in his profession in Ottawa, county of Lasalle, in that state. After a few years residence in Ottawa, he removed to Oregon, in the county of Ogle, in the same state. He continued in practice there five or six years, and then returned to Ottawa, where he now resides. He is a lawyer of highly respectable standing at the bar, and has an extensive practice in the county of Lasalle, and in four or five neighboring counties. He was married in the spring of 1840.

Elizabeth A. Leland, daughter of Sherman Leland, was born in Eastport, Me., on the fourth day of August, 1814. Before she was two months old she was removed from that part of the country by her parents, amidst the troubles, difficulties and perils of war and invasion, to Roxbury, Mass. She continued to reside with her parents in Roxbury until the time of her death, October 20th, 1847. She was much esteemed for her intelligence, virtues and piety. She made a public profession of religion, and became a member of the Congregational Unitarian church in Roxbury, several years before her death. She was blameless in her life and conversation, and a bright example in the church to which she belonged.

Catharine L. Henderson, is the daughter of Sherman Leland, of Roxbury, She was born in Roxbury on the first day of October, 1818. She remained with her parents in Roxbury, until her marriage on the thirtieth of June, 1847. She has a good, and to a considerable extent, a refined education. Her mind is well stored with ancient and modern literature. She has a good knowledge of the French language, and some acquaintance with the Spanish and Latin. She has accurate knowledge of the lower branches of mathematics, embracing arithmetic, algebra, geometry, and trigonometry. She is well informed in English grammar, geography, history, rhetoric, and the elements of natural and moral philosophy, and she has given some attention to logic and chemistry. Her manners are polished, and her deportment easy and graceful. Her moral and religious principles are well established and firm. She is of the Unitarian faith and a member of the Congregational Unitarian church. On her marriage, she went with her husband to St. Louis, Mo., where they resided until the Spring of 1848, when they removed to Pass Christian in the southern extremity of the state of Mississippi, where they have ever since resided. Her husband, John Henderson, Jr., is a lawyer. He is the son of the Hon. John Henderson, a lawyer of high standing and extensive practice in the states of Mississippi and Louisiana. He was, a few years ago, a senator in congress from Mississippi, for the constitutional term of six years. The father and son are concerned in business together.

Julia Leland was born in Roxbury, and went with her brother Edwin to the western country, in the spring of 1840, and died at Oregon, in the State of Illinois, Nov. 28th, of the same year.

Henry Leland was born in Roxbury. He is a mariner; and for the last five or six years he has been employed as chief mate on board several large vessels in the merchant service. In the month of February, 1849, he left Boston in the bark Duxbury, for California, and arrived at San Francisco in August of the same year. He is now, October, 1849, seeking his fortune in that golden country.

William S. Leland was born in Roxbury. He was educated at the high school in that place. He studied law with his father, and was admitted to the bar in April, 1848. He is now in practice in the counties of Suffolk and Norfolk, Massachusetts.

Cyrus Leland, son of Eleazer Leland, was born in Grafton, and he lived and died there. He was a very useful man in the town. He served for many years as one of the selectmen, and represented the town for several years in the legislature. He was a captain, major, and colonel in the militia, and an industrious and intelligent farmer.

His son, Cyrus Leland, was educated at Harvard University, but left the institution without taking his degree. He studied law, and was admitted to the bar in the state of Illinois. He commenced practice in his profession in Peoria, in that state, and after a few years he left Peoria for Prarie du Sac, in Wisconsin. He has been in practice there for six or seven years, and for the year 1848 he was a member of the house of representatives in the legislature of that state.

Lorenzo, his second son, is a lawyer in Ottawa, in the state of Illinois. He was educated at the public schools in Grafton, and at the academy in Leicester, Mass. He studied law and was admitted to the bar in Illinois. He has been in practice in Ottawa fifteen or sixteen years. He is in highly respectable standing at the bar. He has holden the office of clerk of the county of Lasalle for six or seven years.

James Leland, third son of Cyrus, is an intelligent merchant. He has been concerned in trade for twelve or thirteen years; first in Barre, Mass., and afterwards in Enfield, Mass., where he now lives.

Salmon Leland, son of Eleazer, is a farmer in the town of Cato, Cayuga county, N. Y. He was born in Grafton. He first settled upon a farm, in Westminster, Mass. After a few years he removed from that place to Cato, N. Y. His wife is also of the Leland family, and is sister to the wife of his brother Luke.

Betsy Leland, daughter of Eleazer, was born in Grafton, and resided there until her marriage, in 1814. She lived with her husband four or five years in Barre, Mass. They removed from Barre to Cato, Cayuga county, N. Y., where they resided ten or twelve years. They then left Cato for Ken-

dall county, Ill., where they dwelt until a short time before her death, in 1849. In the winter or spring of 1849, she went with her husband to Upper Alton, Ill., and died there in the summer of that year. Her husband, the Rev. Jeremy F. Tolman, is a Baptist minister of respectable talents and ardent piety. She was a pions christian and for many years a worthy member of the Baptist church.

Polly Leland, daughter of Eleazer, was born, brought up, and married in Grafton. On her marriage, in 1818, she settled with her husband in Barre, Mass. They remained there until 1843 or 1844, when they removed to Bowling Green, Kenn, where they resided until her death in 1846. Her husband, Tyler Adams, is a farmer. Her only son, George B. Adams, is a lawyer in highly respectable standing at the bar in Bowling Green. He was educated at Captain Partridge's Academy, in Norwich, Vt.

Luke Leland, son of Eleazer, is an intelligent, thriving farmer in Grafton, Mass., where he was born, and where he has always lived. He has been for many years much in the service of the town, in discharging the duties of many of its principal offices. He has been often called upon to act as guardian to minors, and has been much employed in settling the estates of deceased persons; and he was on one or more occasions a representative from the town in the general court. His wife is also of the Leland family, having her descent from Henry Leland, the common ancestor through Hopestill Leland and Henry Leland of Sherburne, Beulah Leland who married Isaac Bullard, and Mary Bullard who married John Mellen of Holliston.

Patty Leland, youngest child of Eleazer Leland, died in Grafton, Mass., in the year 1830. She was born in that place and always lived there. Her husband, Thaddeus Reed, was a respectable farmer. He was a useful man in the town, and on one occasion he represented the town in the legislature. His son, Hanson L. Reed, has been educated at Amherst College. He received his degree of A. B. with the class of 1848. Since he left college he has been employed as a teacher, and he now (Oct. 1849) is engaged as an assistant instructor in the academy at Leicester, Mass.

The descendants of JOSEPH LELAND, of Saco, Me., son of Phineas Leland, and grandson of James Leland of Grafton, Mass.; born in Grafton, in 1757; married Dorcas King; and died at Saco in 1839.

The children of Joseph Leland were all born in Scarborough, or Saco, Maine. Sarah, after her first marriage in 1812, resided with her husband Abel Boynton a short time in Bath, Me. He was a graduate of Harvard University of the class of 1804, and a lawyer by profession. In 1814 or 1815 he began to be afflicted with an incurable disease, which caused his death in 1817. He spent most of the last two or three years of his life in the West Indies, and in journeving in the southern and south-western states, in the vain hope of recovering his health. During his absence she resided in her father's family in Saco. And after the death of her first husband she remained with her parents until her second marriage in 1826 or 1827. She resided with her second husband, Hon. Edmund Parker, in Amherst, N. H., for about ten years after their marriage. They then removed to Nashua, N. H., where they have continued to reside until the present time, January, 1850. Her second husband was educated at Dartmouth College, and graduated with the class of 1803. He is of the legal profession, and for many years he was in practice at the bar in the county of Hillsborough, N. H., and for several years held the office of judge of probate for that county. When he removed from Amherst to Nashua, he gave up his practice at the bar and his office of judge of probate, and took upon himself the agency of a large manufacturing establishment. He continued in charge of this establishment until within a short time past, when he resigned the agency and retired from business. Mrs. Parker has no issue, she had two children by her first husband, and one by her second, but they all died in early infancy.

Mrs. Elizabeth K. Lord, who in her youthful days was called Betsy Leland, is the daughter of the late Hon, Joseph Leland of Saco, in the state of Maine, and her mother was a sister of Governor William King, of Bath, Maine, and of the late Hon. Rufus King, of N. Y. She is connected with Henry Leland, the common ancestor of the Leland family in America, by a line of descent through Ebenezer Leland of Sherburne, James Leland and Phineas Leland, of Grafton, Mass., and Joseph Leland of Saco, Me. She was born in 1791, and married to the Rev. Nathan Lord in 1815. She lived in her father's family, in Saco, until the time of her marriage. And since her marriage, she has resided with her husband, in Amherst and Hanover, N. H.: about thirteen years in the former place, and nearly twenty-two in the latter. She is a lady of superior talents, a well cultivated mind, genteel deportment, and commendable domestic habits and virtues. At an early period of her life she made a public profession of Christianity; and for nearly forty years she has been a pious and exemplary member of the Trinitarian Congregational Her husband is of the clerical profession. He was educated at Bowdoin College, Brunswick, Maine, in the class of 1809. He studied divinity at the Theological Institution in Andover, Mass. After completing his theological studies, he was employed for a year or two as an assistant instructor at Phillips Academy in Exeter, N. H. He was next the settled minister of the Trinitarian Congregational church and society in Amherst, N. H., from 1814 to 1828. In 1821 he received from Dartmouth College the honorary degree of Master of Arts; and in 1828 from Bowdoin College that of Doctor of Divinity. He has holden the office of president of Dartmouth College from 1828 to the present time, a period of nearly twenty-two years. Mrs. Lord has seven sons and two daughters now living; and she has buried two sons and one daughter. Six of her sons were educated at Dartmouth College. John K. in the class of 1836, Joseph L. in the class of 1839, Frederick R. in the class of 1842, William H., Henry C. and Samuel A. in the class of 1843, and Nathan is now a student in that college. John K. was a clergyman; and was for some considerable time connected with the Trinitarian Congregational church and society in Hartford, Vt., as their minister, and from the early part of the year 1848 till the time of his death, in 1849, he was pastor of a Trinitarian Congregational church and society in Cincinnati, Ohio. Joseph L., Henry C., and Frederick R., are of the legal profession. The two former are in practice at the bar in Boston, Mass.; and the latter in Lockport, N. Y. William H. is a settled minister of the Trinitarian Congregational denomination in Montpelier, Vt. And Samuel A. is of the medical profession, in practice as a physician in Danvers, Mass. And her daughter, Mary F., was in 1849 married to George H. Palmer, a graduate of Dartmouth College of the class of 1845, and a lawyer, in practice at the bar, in Boston, Mass.

Mary Leland, third daughter of Hon. Joseph Leland, was married to Benjamin F. French, about the year 1818. Since her marriage, she has resided with her husband, in Nashua, N. H., and Lowell, Mass. Her husband is of

the legal profession. He was educated at Dartmouth College, in the class of 1812, and was for many years in practice at the bar in Nashua, in the county of Hillsborough, and state of New Hampshire. But fifteen or twenty years ago he gave up his practice, removed to Lowell, Mass., and was employed, until within a few years past, as the agent of a large manufacturing establishment. Since the termination of his agency he has been connected with the Railroad bank, in Lowell, as its president. Mrs. French has no issue.

Harriet Leland, fourth daughter of the Hon. Joseph Leland, was married to William Richardson, a merchant of Bath, Me., in the year 1814. After her marriage, she resided with her husband in Bath until her death in 1836. Her son, Henry L. Richardson, is a graduate of Bowdoin College, of the class of 1839. He is of the legal profession, and now in practice at the bar in Bath, in the county of Lincoln, Me.

Joseph W. Leland, only son of Hon. Joseph Leland, was educated at Bowdoin College, and graduated with the class of 1826. He is a lawyer by profession, and has been in practice at the bar in Saco, in the county of York, and state of Maine, for about twenty years past. He is a gentleman of highly respectable standing in his profession. He has been married several years, but he has no issue.

Jane M. Leland, youngest daughter of Hon. Joseph Leland, was married to Robert Reed, a merchant of Manchester, N. H., about the year 1841, and she has ever since resided with her husband in Manchester.

Dorcas Leland, the other daughter, was never married. She has for some years past spent most of her time with her sister, Mrs. Lord, in Hanover, N. H.

The descendants of DAVID W. LELAND, son of Phineas Leland, and grandson of James Leland of Grafton, Mass.; born in Grafton in 1758; married Polly Rawson; and died at Grafton in 1832.

Hannah R. Leland was born in Grafton, Mass., where she was twice married, and always lived.

Mary Leland was born in Grafton, married John Page, a merchant of Beverly, Mass. She resided for several years with her husband in Beverly, then removed to Salem, Mass., where she now resides.

Sally Leland was born and married in Grafton, where she has always lived.

Mahalea Leland was born and married in Grafton, but soon after her marriage removed with her husband to Union, Conn., where she now resides.

Joseph Leland early in life left Grafton, Mass., his native place, for Charleston, S. C., in which city he has since continued, a period of about forty years, at the head of the extensive and well known house of Leland Brothers & Co. He is a successful merchant, and the firm of which he is head, is still amongst the largest commission houses in South Carolina. He is characterized by boldness of conception and energy in execution. His residence is at Grafton, Worcester county, Mass. He has his descent from Henry Leland, the common ancestor of the Leland family in America, through Ebenezer Leland of Sherburne, Mass., James Leland, Phineas Leland and David W. Leland, of Grafton, Mass.

David W. Leland, before attaining his majority, also went to Charleston, S. C., and early became a partner in the house of Leland, Brothers & Co., and he is still a member of the company. He has been an extensive traveller, as well in Europe as America, and he is distinguished for acts of liberal private benevolence.

Gardner S. Leland, another member of this commercial house, died of consumption, at Nice, Italy, in 1822, whither he had gone for the benefit of his health.



He is connected with Henry Leland, the common ancestor, by a line of descent through Ebenezer Leland of Sherburne, Mass., James Leland, Phineas Leland, and David W. Leland, of Grafton, Mass.

Ephraim S. Leland since the above table was prepared has removed from Sherburne, Vt., to the state of Wisconsin, where he now (1850) resides.

Thomas Leland, who had his descent from Henry Leland the common ancestor, through Ebenezer Leland of Sherburne, James Leland and Phineas Leland, of Grafton, Mass., and Thomas Leland of Chester, Vt., was born in Conway, Mass., in the year 1784. Before he was two years of age his parents left Conway and took him with them to Grafton, Mass., where they continued to reside eight or ten years. In 1795 the whole family removed from Grafton to Chester, Vt. He remained with his parents in Chester, until he was about twenty years of age. In 1804 he began his preparatory studies for college, and entered the freshman class of Middlebury college in 1805. After the usual term of four years he received his degree of A. B., from that institution in 1809. Immediately after he left college, he entered the office of the Hon. J. H. Hubbard, of Windsor, Vt., as a student of law. He continued under the instruction of Mr. Hubbard for three years, and until he was admitted to the bar, in 1812. He commenced his professional life in Windsor, and continued in practice there for about twenty-two years. During this period, his time and attention were especially devoted to the duties of his profession, but he took some part in the municipal concerns of the town, and for one or two years was a representative in the state legislature. In the year 1834 he removed



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from Windsor to Claremont, N. H. He here renewed and prosecuted his professional pursuits with fresh ardor. He soon obtained an extensive practice and an elevated rank at the bar. He assiduously devoted himself to the laborious duties of his profession, until a short time before his death, March 3, 1849. He was regarded as one of the first lawyers in the western part of the state. As a chancery lawyer he had few equals in the state. He was a worthy citizen, a good husband and a kind father. He was a professor of religion, and he had been for many years before his death, a worthy and exemplary member of the Episcopal church.

The descendants of SARAH LELAND, daughter of Phineas Leland, and granddaughter of James Leland of Grafton, Mass.; born in Grafton in 1763; married Eliakim Goodrich in 1781; and died at Owego, N. Y., in 1824.

Caleb W. Leland, son of Joshua Leland, was born in Chester, Vt. He remained in his father's family, upon a farm in his native town, until he was twenty-one years of age. After he left home, in 1810 or 1811, he was employed six or seven years by Abijah White, of Watertown, Mass., a large provision dealer. After he left Mr. White, he was concerned as a dealer in provisions in Boston, Mass., seventeen or eighteen years. In 1836 or 1837 he removed from Boston to Charlestown, now Somerville, Mass., where he has ever since resided. Since he left Boston he has been engaged in farming. He has been, for several years one of the selectmen of Somerville, and for two or three years he represented the town in the general court. In all his business concerns he has been remarkably successful; and he is regarded as a man of wealth.

Ziba A. Leland is a lawyer of high standing at the bar, and extensive practice in his profession, at Auburn, in the county of Cayuga, and state of New York. He is connected with Henry Leland, the common ancestor of the Leland family in America, by a line of descent through Ebenezer Leland of Sherburne, James Leland and Phineas Leland of Grafton, Mass., and Joshua Leland of Chester, Vt. He was born in Chester, in the year 1791, and remained with his parents upon a farm in that town during his minority. From 1812 to 1815 he was employed in preparatory studies for college. In the summer of the latter year he entered the junior class of Vermont University, Burlington, Vt., and continued a student in that institution for one year.

At the expiration of the year he entered the senior class in Middlebury College, Vermont, and remained there for one term. He then left college, and commenced the study of law in Schenectady, N. Y. He continued a student there until the fall of 1817, when he removed to Utica, N. Y., and continued his legal studies there until January, 1820, when he was admitted to practice as an attorney of the supreme court. In the spring of 1820, he commenced practice in his profession at Owego, in the county of Tioga, and state of New York. He continued in practice there until November, 1822, when he removed to Bath, in the county of Steuben, N. Y., where he continued to attend to the duties of his profession, until May, 1845, when he removed to Auburn, N. Y.. where he now resides. He held the office of first judge of the county of Steuben, being the presiding judge of the court of common pleas, from 1838 to He was a representative in the legislature of New York, from the county of Steuben, under two annual elections, for the years 1842 and 1843. During the first year he was at the head of the standing committee on railroads; and during the second, at the head of the committee on banks and insurance. His talents and information gave him a commanding influence in the house.

Thomas J. Leland, son of Joshua Leland, was born in Chester, Vt., and resided with his parents in that town, during his minority. Soon after he attained the age of twenty-one he commenced business as a provision dealer in Boston, Mass. He resides in Somerville, Mass., and for about fifteen years past he has been a member of a mercantile house in Boston, extensively concerned in the provision business.

Benjamin F. Leland, son of Joshua Leland, was born and brought up in Chester, Vt. After he was of age he resided several years in Boston, Mass., He then went to the state of Illinois, and after remaining there a few years, settled in Lowell, in the county of Dodge, state of Wisconsin, where he now resides. He is a farmer and trader.

The descendants of LYDIA LELAND, daughter of Phineas Leland, and granddaughter of James Leland of Grafton, Mass.; born in 1767; married Jonathan Whipple; and died at Springfield, Vt., in 1841.

Isaac Leland, son of Isaae, and grandson of Ebenezer, was born in Holliston, Mass., married, and resided there, till about the year 1772, when he removed with his family to Jaffrey, N. H. He served as a soldier in the Revolutionary army, in 1776 and 1777, and was killed in battle near New York city, in 1777. His children, John, Hannah, Isaac, Mary, Anna and Betsy, were born in Holliston, or Sherbune, Mass., and Lucy was born in Jaffrey. John was engaged as a mariner in the early part of his life. He married in 1790, and settled in Ipswich, Mass., where he carried on business as a tanner and currier, until 1800, when he removed to Londonderry, N. H., where he resided about fifteen years. He afterwards lived in Nashua and some other places in New Hampshire, for about twelve years. He removed to Charlestown, (now Somerville,) Mass., about the year 1827, where he has resided for about twenty-two years.

Isaac, brother of John, when he was a young man went from Jaffrey, N. H., to Dedham, Mass., and was employed for several years as a laborer among

the farmers in that town. He at length married and settled there. Deborah Fairbanks, whom he married, had before her marriage to him a son, by the name of Richard Williams. On his marriage he adopted her child and allowed him to take his name, and he has ever since been called Richard Leland. Isaac Leland continued to live in Dedham for twenty-five or thirty years. He then removed to Holden, Mass., where he has continued to reside till the present time, 1850. He has no issue.

Richard Leland, the adopted son of Isaac Leland, is about sixty years of age. He, with his wife and family of several children, is living in Dedham, Mass. His family, and that of the late Judge John D. Leland, of Missouri, are the only persons of the name of Leland, found in America, who are not connected by a regular line of descent with Henry Leland, the common ancestor of the Leland family in America.

Hannah Leland, Mary Leland, Anna Leland, and Lucy Leland, sisters of John and Isaac, are supposed to have been married in Jaffrey, N. H., and to have families of children living in that part of the country; but to whom they were married, and the names and number of their children are unknown.

It appears from the town records of Sherburne. Mass., that eight of the nine children of Amariah Leland were born in that town, and it is highly probable that the other, Rhoda, was also born there. The children, with their parents. left Sherburne, between 1755 and 1760, and settled in Providence, R. L. about the year 1760. They all remained in Providence for seven or eight years. Abner, the oldest son, left Providence about the year 1770, and settled in Sutton. Mass., where he remained until his death in 1783. His daughters, Susannah, Joanna, and Philena, married and settled in Sutton. His two sons, James and William, on the death of their father, went to live with their grandfather. upon that part of the island of Mount Desert, in Maine, which afterwards received the corporate name of Eden. They married in Eden and continued to reside there, or in the neighboring town of Trenton, for many years: but at a late period of their lives they both removed to the county of Washington, Me .. and remained there until their deaths. His other two daughters, Chloe and Nancy, married and settled in Providence, R. I., or its vicinity. Jesse, the second son of Amariah, established himself in Johnston, R. I., and continued there through life. His son Joseph, married in Johnston, and resided there for several years, and then removed to Barton, Vt., where he remained till his Daniel, his other son, settled in Killingly, Conn. His daughter. Luthana, lived and died in Attleborough, Mass., and his two other daughters, Margery and Meriba, both married and died in Providence. Sibella, oldest daughter of Amariah Leland, lived, married and died in Smithfield, R. I. Betty resided with her husband in Sutton, Mass., and died there. Her two children were born in Sutton. Her son Ebenezer was never married. Her daughter Betsy was married in Sutton, March 29th, 1798, and she continued to reside there with her husband, Timothy Lamson, for eight years. They then lived together in Oxford, Mass., for four years, in Dudley, Mass., one year, and in Pomfret, Conn., three years. And she continued to reside in Pomfret, after the death of her husband in 1814, for several years. In 1827 she removed to Providence, R. I., where she has ever since remained. Chloe, the third

daughter of Amariah, was never married. She lived many years in Sutton, but died in Sherburne, Mass. Abigail lived with her husband in Sutton, Mass., and died there. Rhoda married in Rhode Island or Massachusetts, removed with her husband to Troy, N. Y., and died there.

Ezra Leland, third son of Amariah, settled with his father upon the island of Mount Desert, in Maine, about the year 1769. He continued to reside upon that part of the island, which constituted the town of Eden, until his death. Ebenezer Leland, youngest son of Amariah, remained in Providence until after the commencement of the American Revolution. He was in the military service of the United States during a very considerable part of the war. Soon after the peace in 1783, he established himself, with his father and brother Ezra, upon Mount Desert, in Maine, where he continued to reside until his death, in 1808. He was a sergeant in the army during the war, and a captain in the militia after the peace. His children were all born in Eden. His eldest daughter, Ursula, was married in Eden, and she has continued to reside there ever since. Her husband was a master mariner, and died several years ago. With few advantages for education, she has acquired a considerable fund of information. She is a woman of energy, prudence and discretion, and has an uncommon share of practical common sense. And she is a truly pious christian, and a worthy member of the Baptist church.

Mrs. Mary M. Elliott, the daughter of Timothy Lamson and Betsy Boice, was born in Sutton, Mass., Jan. 3d, 1799. And she removed with her parents while young, from Sutton to Oxford, from Oxford to Dudley, Mass., and from Dudley to Pomfret, Conn., where she was married to Lemuel H. Elliott, April 28, 1817. She has her descent from Henry Leland, the common ancestor of the Leland family in America, through Ebenezer Leland of Sherburne, Mass., Amariah Leland of Eden, Me., Betsy Leland, who married Benjamin Boice of Sutton, Mass., and Betsy Boice, who married Timothy Lamson of Pomfret, Conn. Soon after her marriage, she settled with her husband in Providence, R. I., where they have continued to reside to the present time, 1850. She has strong hopes that she experienced a saving conversion to

Christianity, in the spring of 1834. And during that year she made a public profession of religion, and became a member of the First Baptist Church, in Providence, R. I.; and her connection with that church has remained unbroken to the present time.

Her husband has holden the office of steward of Brown University, since May, 1826, and that of register of the same institution, since September, 1828; the former for nearly twenty-four years, and the latter for more than twenty-one. Their son, Albert Timothy Elliott, was educated at Brown University, and graduated with the class of 1839. Since he completed his collegiate course, he has been concerned in business as a member of a large commercial and manufacturing establishment, in Providence, R. I.

Ebenezer B. Lamson, brother of Mrs. Elliott, was born in Sutton, Mass. He was a printer, and worked at his trade in Worcester, Boston, and Andover, Mass., and at the time of his death, was concerned as editor and publisher of the newspaper called the Concord Gazette, printed at Concord, Mass. Her sister, Caroline M., was born in Sutton, Mass., and married in Providence, R. I. Her husband was a master mariner, and died in 1836. She has lived in Providence continually since her marriage. Her other sister, Elizabeth M., was born in Oxford, Mass., and married in Providence, R. I. Her husband, at the time of her marriage, was concerned in a manufacturing establishment, in Gloucester, R. I. He soon after changed his place of business to Thompson, Conn., where she resided with her husband for several years. They at length removed to Providence, R. I., but he continued his manufacturing business in Thompson, Conn., in connection with a mercantile establishment in Providence, R. I. He was extensively concerned as a manufacturer and commission merchant; at the time of his death, in 1847. She is now, 1850, a widow, residing in Providence, R. I.

The twelve children of Henry Leland, were born in Sherburne, Mass.; and they all remained in Sherburne, or Holliston, (a town taken from Sherburne in 1724), through life, except Kesiah and Mercy. Kesiah settled in Framingham, and after a few years residence, died there in 1736. Mercy lived with her first husband in Holliston. He died about the year 1754, and on her second marriage, in 1763, she settled in Needham, Mass., and continued to reside there with her husband until his death. She afterwards lived with her children, part of the time in Needham, and part of the time in Dover, Mass., until her death in 1810.

The children of Jonathan Leland, son of Henry, were all born in Sherburne, Mass., and they all, except Kesiah and Martha, continued to reside there as long as they lived. Kesiah soon after her marriage, left Sherburne for Worcester, Mass., where she afterwards continued to live with her husband. Martha married in Sherburne, about the year 1760, and remained there with her husband till 1774, when they removed to Marlborough, N. H., where she continued to reside until her death in 1804.

Amos Windship, son of Nathaniel Windship and Mercy Leland, was born in Holliston, Mass., on the tenth day of August, 1745. He was connected with Henry Leland, the common ancestor of the Leland family in America, by a line of descent through Hopestill Leland and Henry Leland, of Sherburne, Mass., and Mercy Leland, who married Nathaniel Windship, of Holliston, Mass. He was educated at Harvard University, and graduated with the class of 1771, and was the first of the descendants of Henry Leland who received a collegiate education. He was a physician and surgeon. He received his medical education under the instruction of Dr. Ezekiel Hersey, a physician and surgeon of considerable eminence in Hingham, Mass. He commenced his professional course in Boston, Mass., and after continuing in practice there for a a few years, engaged as a naval surgeon on board the United States frigate Alliance, of the squadron under the command of Commodore John Paul Jones, and continued in the active service of his country in that capacity, until the close of the war in 1783. When the relations of peace were established, he visited England, and while there became a member of the London Medical Society. and was appointed a corresponding fellow. After a short residence abroad, he returned to the United States. He received the degree of M. D., from Harvard University, and resumed his practice in Boston. He continued in the discharge of his professional duties there for a series of years, and then removed to Wellfleet, Mass., where he died in 1811. He was highly esteemed in his professional and social relations.

The three children of Mercy Leland by her second husband, were born in Needham, Mass. John Day, the oldest child, settled in Needham, and remained there through life. Mercy, the only daughter, from her marriage in 1784, to her death in 1841, lived with her husband, Jonathan Battelle, in Dover, Mass.; Ralph, the youngest child, married in Dedham, Mass., and died at Cambridge, Mass.

The eight children of Beulah Leland, who married Isaac Bullard, were born in Holliston, Mass., and they all remained there as long as they lived, except Martha and Olive. Martha, on her marriage, settled in Hopkinton, (now Ashland), with her husband, and continued to reside there until her death, in 1841. Olive, from her marriage about the year 1783, to her death in 1846, continued to live in Upton, Mass.

Henry Leland, son of Henry and grandson of Hopestill, had eight children. They were all born in Sherburne, Mass. Two of them died in infancy, and five were married in Sherburne.

Mary continued to live in Sherburne, until her death in 1812. Jeremiah remained in Sherburne until 1781, when he removed to Barre, Mass., where he continued to reside till 1799. He then went to Claremont, N. H., and dwelt there four years. In 1803 he left Claremont for Middlesex, Vt., where he continued to live until his death in 1832.

Kesiah, after the death of her husband, about the year 1808, left Sherburne, Mass., for Shrewsbury, Vt., where she remained till her death in 1810. She left no issue.

Henry lived in Sherburne, Mass., till 1802. He then settled in Hubbardston, Mass., and remained there until 1816, when he removed to Sangerville, Me., where he continued to reside until his death in 1836.

Jonas remained in Sherburne, Mass., until about the year 1800, when he removed to Westford, Mass., where he dwelt until his death in 1843.

Benjamin married about the time he was twenty-one years of age, and settled in Shrewsbury, or Mount Holley, Vt. He continued to live in that part of the country for about fifty years. He died in Reading Vt., in 1841.

Jeremiah Leland, son of Micah, was bern in Sherburne, Mass. He was married in Natick, Mass., in 1791, and remained there for seven years after his marriage. In 1798 he left Natick for New Hampshire, and from that time until his death, in 1847, resided in Dublin and Sullivan in that state; two years in the former place and forty-seven in the latter. He was an industrious farmer, and for many years a pious member of the Trinitarian Congregational church in Sullivan. His son Martin, at an early period of his life, settled at Crown Point, N. Y., where he has ever since resided. His other surviving children have always lived in Sullivan. Josiah Peabody, husband of Betsy M. Leland, is a clergyman of the Trinitarian Congregational denomination, and a graduate of Dartmouth College of the class of 1836.

Micah Leland, second son of Micah, was born and married in Sherburne, Mass., and always continued to live there until his death in 1847. He was an intelligent, thriving farmer, and a useful citizen of the town. He was often called upon to discharge the duties of the more important municipal offices, and on one or two occasions was a representative from the town in the general court. For many years he was an exemplary member of the Unitarian Congregational church, in Sherburne, and at the time of his death held the office of deacon. His son Augustine was educated at Brown University, Providence, R. I., and received his degree of A. B., in 1834.

Anna Leland, daughter of Micah, on her marriage, settled in Dover, Mass., where she has ever since lived.

Calvin Leland, third son of Micah, married and settled in Natick, Mass., where he has ever since continued to reside.

Luther and Levi, fourth and fifth sons of Micah, never lived in any place but Sherburne, Mass.

Seven of the children of Henry Leland were born in Sherburne, Mass., and one, Mary, in Hubbardston, Mass. Walter lived with his father during his minority; about eighteen years in Sherburne, and three in Hubbardston. Soon after he was of age, he went to Sangerville, Me. He married and settled in Sangerville, and has ever since resided there. His son, Chauncy C., married his fifth cousin, Maria Perry, of the posterity of Hopestill Leland.

Kesiah was married in Hubbardston, in 1806. In 1807 she removed with her husband to Sangerville, Me., where she continued to live for twenty-two years. She then lived in Dover, Me., with her husband, for twelve years, then in Garland, Me., for five years. They then removed to Andover, Mass., where they have ever since resided.

Lowell went with his parents from Sherburne to Hubbardston, in 1803, where he has ever since lived. His daughter, Martha C., married her cousin, Charles M. Leland.

Sarah married in Hubbardston. She first lived, with her husband, a short time in Claremont, N. H.; then three or four years in Michigan, then about two years in Hoosick, N. Y., and then again in Claremont, N. H., where she now lives.

Lucy married in Sangerville, Me., and lived there several years, with her husband. They then left Sangerville for Dover, Me., where they have ever since resided.

Mary married in Sangerville, Mc., and has ever since resided there with her husband. She and her sister Lucy married brothers.

The children of Hopestill Leland were all born upon a farm, owned and occupied by him in the southwesterly part of Sherburne, Mass. Abigail, on her marriage, settled in some place near Sherburne. Daniel passed his life in Sherburne, upon the farm where his father lived.

Ruth was married in Sherburne, and lived with her first husband, Samuel Perry, about forty years; part of the time in Sherburne, and part in Natick, Mass. With her second husband, David Leland, she lived a few years in

Holliston, Mass., and in the same place a short time with her third husband, Ryder, and after his death she returned to Natick, and remained there until her death in 1799.

Rachel, Mary, Silence and Experience, were married in Sherburne. Rachel settled in the neighborhood of Sherburne, Mary in Sherburne. Silence in Hopkinton, and Experience in Holliston, Mass.

The eight children of Daniel Leland were born in Sherburne, Mass, upon the farm which belonged to their father and grandfather. Rachel was married in Sherburne in 1757, and lived in Medway, Mass., with her husband, Moses Adams; and as a widow, sixty-eight years.

Miriam was married in Sherburne, Mass., and remained there through life. Her husband, the Hon. Daniel Whitney, was a man of great influence and respectability. For years he was much employed in the municipal concerns of the town. He held many of the most important town offices, and for many years represented the town in the general court. He was also for several years a senator from the county of Middlesex, in the Massachusetts legislature, and for a number of years a member of the executive council.

Daniel was a farmer, and lived in Holliston, Mass., about seventy years, and died there.

Adam married his third cousin, and dwelt in Sherburne as long as he lived. Hepsebath, after her marriage, lived with her husband, Rev. John Leland, in Holliston and Partridgefield, (now Peru,) Mass., until her death in 1803, eighteen years in the former place and seventeen in the latter. She and her husband were second cousins.

Mary married her second cousin, and lived with her husband, Jonathan Leland, in Sherburne, Mass., about seventy years.

Aaron was an enterprising and successful farmer. He was particularly distinguished for the attention which he paid to the cultivation of fruit trees, at a period when this branch of agriculture was esteemed of little consequence. Many of the choice varieties of the apple and pear were brought into general notice by him. He was a pious Christian, and for more than fifty years, held the office of deacon of the Congregational church in Sherburne. And during the active part of his long life, he was frequently called upon to discharge the duties of the more important municipal offices of the town. His first wife was his second cousin, and he lived upon a part of the estate in Sherburne, which belonged to his father and grandfather, the whole period of his life, being ninety-six years.

Moses was a respectable and industrious citizen of Sherburne, and passed the entire period of his life upon that part of the estate derived from his ancestors. This branch of the family is remarkable for the great age to which most of its members attained.

The children of Samuel Perry and Ruth Leland were born in Sherburne, or Natick, Mass. Abel, Sarah, and Samuel, settled in Natick, and remained there through life.

Ruth and Asa went to Fitchburg, Mass., at an early period of their lives, and continued to reside there as long as they lived. Asa married his second cousin, Lydia Leland, a daughter of John and granddaughter of John.

Miriam, after her marriage, lived in Holliston, Mass., until her death in 1832. Eleazer passed most of his days in Medfield, Mass. Mary lived and died in Princeton, Mass. And Ichabod married in Leominster, Mass., and continued to live there until his death in 1825.



The seven children of Aaron Leland were born in Sherburne, Mass. Lewis remained in his father's family during his minority. He had his descent from Henry Leland, the common ancestor of the Leland family in America, through

Hopestill Leland, Hopestill Leland, Jr., Daniel Leland, and Aaron Leland of Sherburne, Mass. He was also connected with the common ancestor, by a line of descent through Ebenezer Leland, Ebenezer Leland, Jr., Deborah Leland, his grandmother, and Deborah Leland, his mother. His mother Deborah Leland, was also a daughter of Jonathan Leland, and granddaughter of Henry Leland, a son of Hopestill Leland, and grandson of Henry, the common ancestor. He was married in 1799, and soon after his marriage settled in Boston, Mass., and was concerned in business as a merchant there until 1824, when he removed to the city of New York, where he continued to reside till his death in 1835. About the year 1818, steam navigation was by his agency first introduced into Boston harbor. A company, of which he was the active member, about that time built the steamboat Massachusetts, and used her as a pleasure boat in the harbor of Boston. He had a talent and taste for music, and for many years was a leading member of the Handel and Haydn Society in Boston. In religion he was of the Baptist faith, and the Bible in his hands He was an estimable man, kind father and husband, was not a sealed book. and a good citizen. Augustus Leland, eldest son of Lewis who has been for a few years past in California, was many years a merchant in South America.

Lewis, his second son, settled in Apalachicola, Flor., and was in business there as a merchant for some considerable time before his death. Francis, at an early period of his life, went to South America, and continued to reside there until about eight years ago. Since he left South America, he has lived in the city of New York. Most of the other descendants of Lewis have continued to dwell in New York, Pennsylvania and Massachusetts.

Lydia Leland, daughter of Aaron, married her cousin, John Leland. After her marriage she lived with her husband in Partridgefield, now Peru, Roxbury, and Amherst, Mass., until her death in 1838.

Deborah Leland, the other daughter of Aaron, from her marriage, in 1808, till her death in 1817, lived with her husband in Worthington, Mass. Her two daughters soon after they were married settled in the western country, one in Michigan, the other in Indiana, where they now reside.

Joseph T. Leland, the other son of Aaron, has never left the place of his birth. Aaron L. Leland, son of Joseph T. Leland, and grandson of Aaron Leland, was educated at Harvard University, and received his graduating degree of A. B. in 1835. He is of the medical profession. He was in practice in Boston, Mass., a short time, about the year 1838. Since that time he has been in practice in the state of Michigan, part of the time in Pontiac, and part of the time in the city of Detroit, where he now resides.

Francis Leland, brother of Aaron L. who has his descent from Henry Leland, the common ancestor of the Leland family, through Hopestill Leland, Hopestill Leland, Jr., Daniel Leland, Aaron Leland, and Joseph T. Leland, of Sherburne, Mass., was born in Sherburne, December 26th, 1817. He remained with his parents in Sherburne until he was seventeen years of age. During this

time he was engaged in his studies preparatory for college, under the instruction of the Rev. Amos Clark, of that town. He entered as a student at Brown University in 1834, and after the usual term of four years, received his degree of A.B. in 1838. He was afterwards a student at the medical school in Harvard University, for the customary term, and received his degree of M.D. in 1842. He has since that time been in practice as a physician and surgeon in Milford, Mass.

Eliza T. Leland, daughter of Joseph T. Leland, married her cousin John H. M. Leland, a graduate of Amherst College, of the class of 1840. He is of the clerical profession, and resides in Amherst, Mass.

The descendants of MOSES LELAND, son of Daniel Leland, and grandson of Hopestill Leland; born in Sherburne, Mass., in 1751; married Mercy Twitchell; and died in Sherburne, in 1835.

Betsy Leland, who married Simon H. Mason and Horatio Mason, of Medway, Mass., and her mother was sister of the late Rev. Dr. Jasper Adams, who was president of Geneva College, N.Y., president of Charleston College, in Charleston, S. C., and professor of moral philosophy in the U.S. Military Academy, at West Point, N.Y. Samuel Leland, John Leland, and Abigail Leland, the three children of John Leland, were born in that part of the town of Sherburne, Mass., which by an act of incorporation in 1721, became the town of Holliston; and Samuel and Abigail continued to reside in Holliston as long as they lived. And John remained there until the latter part of his life, and then went to live with his son Caleb, in Leominster, Mass., and died there in 1786.

The children of Samuel, John and Abigail, were all born in Holliston.

Asa, the son of Samuel, settled in Holliston, and remained there until a short time before his death. He afterwards lived in Chester, Vt.

Abigail, daughter of Samuel, after her marriage, lived in Bellingham, Mass. She left no issue.

Abner, second son of Samuel, married in Holliston, and spent his life there.

Dinah, second daughter of Samuel, from the time of her marriage to the time of her death, lived in Tyringham, Mass.

Ebenezer Leland, son of John, was married in Holliston, Mass., in 1762, and continued to reside there for about ten years. He then removed to Peru, Mass., and continued to dwell in that place and the adjoining town of Hinsdale, as long as he lived.

Deborah Leland, daughter of John, remained in Holliston until her death in 1791.

John Leland, son of John, and grandson of John, was a remarkable man, the events of whose life and ministry, if they could be recorded, would afford a very interesting and useful specimen of biography. All that can now be done is to give the following imperfect and meagre sketch. He was born in Holliston, Mass., January 12th, A. D. 1744, enjoyed only a plain English education, and commenced life as a farmer and a schoolmaster. At an early age he married Hephzibah Leland, daughter of Daniel Leland, and granddaughter of Hopestill Leland, who was brother of his own grandfather, and to his providential union with this noble woman he was doubtless principally indebted for his success, character, and usefulness. For the defects which belonged tohis constitutional temperament, were well supplied by the uncommon wisdom and energy of his most excellent wife. At the commencement of the Revolution, John was found among the defenders of his country, and at the battle of Bunker Hill, he held a captain's commission, and led his company into the bloody conflict. Soon after, however, he became entirely convinced that he was ill suited to military life, resigned his commission, and returned to his farm. Within a year, or two, he became deeply impressed with a conviction that it was his duty to seek admission to the gospel ministry, which after some difficulties and delays, arising from his want of a classical education, he obtained. He then settled in the ministry in a large township on the mountains of Berkshire, then bearing the name of Partridgefield, but is now divided into the towns of Peru and Hinsdale. At that time there were perhaps 150 families, but most of them new settlers, and in low circumstances. A church consisting of a few members had been organized, and Mr. L. was their first pastor. In this unpromising field he commenced his ministry, and soon became one of the most successful popular preachers in that region. For about forty years he labored there with a remarkable degree of usefulness and efficiency. The church soon became one of the largest, most united, and flourishing in the vicinity. Successive seasons of revival at once increased and strengthened the church, and blessed the entire community. In his preaching, Mr. L. was simple and unpretending, but faithful, pungent and affectionate. His sermons had little of the learning of the schools, but were replete with strong sense, powerful appeals to the heart, and much of the pathos of native genius. Such was his remarkable influence in the community that for many years the whole population of the town were of one heart under his ministry; not only in the pulpit, but in his ordinary intercourse, he

exerted a most blessed influence. Pre-eminently he was a peace-maker. And so excellent was his spirit, so admirable his tact in conciliating the angry feelings of men, and so wise and indicious his opinions, that hardly once in ten years, did any dispute arise among his people, which was not instantly and amicably settled by his friendly arbitration. Details, which would fill a volume, must be compressed into the brief statement, that as the guide of immortal souls, as the vigilant watchman and concientious ruler over the church of God.—as an example of kindness and fidelity,—as a most useful member of civil society, and as the chosen instrument of conveying the richest blessings upon the people of his charge, his praise was in all the churches. Few, who knew him well would hesitate to apply to John Leland, the inspired enlogium: "He was a good man, and full of the Holy Ghost, and of faith, and much people were added to the Lord. 'Thus for nearly forty years, this devoted man labored in the same field, and all the support he ever received was an annual salary of two hundred dollars, and this not punctually, nor fully paid, especially in the earlier years of his pastorate. And yet, he lived comfortably and respectably, and exercised a hospitality which gave his house the title of the "minister's tayern." He owed no man anything. He trained up seven children respectably, giving them such an education as enabled most of them to commence life as teachers. To his youngest son he gave a liberal education. And how was all this done on such a salary. True, he had a small farm, but he had neither taste nor skill for its management. He was wholly given to his ministerial work. How then, it may well be asked, did he manage to get along comfortably with such slender resources! The reply is easily given, and it is worthy of being inscribed on tablets of marble. The secret of all this comfort and usefulness, the hidden spring whence flowed all these streams of blessing, was the simple fact that John Leland had a good wife, pre-eminently gooda model for all ministers' wives—she excelled in piety, good sense and energy. Not only as a mother in Israel, ready and prompt for every good word and work, but wise and prudent in increasing and husbanding their slender resources. In a word, she was all in all to the comfort and support, and moral training of her family, and to the usefulness and encouragement Her children and grandchildren may well rise up and of her husband. Many daughters have done nobly and virtuously, but thou, Hephzibah Leland, excellest them all. In 1805 this holy woman entered into her rest, and ever after, her bereaved husband was a living witness how essential she had been to him in every department of life. He labored years after in the ministry, acceptably and usefully; but his efforts were always like the attempts of an eagle to fly which has lost one of its wings. At length, he resolved to resign his charge, and unhappily did so; by which at least ten years of his last and best years were lost to the church. Finally, at the age of eighty years, he closed in peace a life of uncommon vicissitudes and usefulness, at the house of his elder son, Hon. John Leland, of Amherst, Mass.

Caleb Leland, son of John, from an early period in his manhood until his death, resided in Leominster, Mass. For many years he was actively and extensively concerned in business as a merchant, innholder, paper manufacturer, and mill owner. But before his death he met with reverses in business, and became poor.

Lydia Leland, second daughter of John, married her second cousin, Asa Perry, of the posterity of Hopestill Leland, and settled in Fitchburg, Mass., and continued to reside there until her death.

Martha Leland, third daughter of John, married her third cousin, Henry Leland, of the posterity of Timothy Leland, and remained in Holliston, until her death in 1800.

Abner Johnson, son of Isaac Johnson and Abigail Leland, continued to live in Holliston, until his death.

Isaac passed his days in Berlin, Mass.

Abigail settled in Hopkinton, Mass., and remained there through life.

The descendants of ASA LELAND, son of Samuel Leland, and grandson of John Leland; born in Holliston, Mass., in 1738; married Lois Marshall; and died in Chester, Vt., in 1822.

The eight children of Asa Leland were born in Holliston, Mass.

Lient, Goy. Aaron Leland, who had his descent from Henry Leland, the Pilgrim father of the Leland family in America, through Hopestill Leland. of Sherburne, John Leland and Samuel Leland of Holliston, Mass., and Asa Leland, who died in Chester, Vt., was born in Holliston, Mass., May 28th, 1761, he possessed no greater advantages of education than were afforded by the common schools in Massachusetts before the Revolution; but a naturally vigorous mind, devotedly applied to the means of self-culture within his reach. compensated, in a measure, for a regular course of theological studies, now considered so indispensable to a minister of the gospel. He became a member of the Baptist church in 1785, and took the pastoral charge of the Baptist church, in Chester, Vt., in 1787. His heart was in the cause he espoused, and it was the chief object of his long life to administer the consolations of the Christian religion to all who came within his influence. At the time of his settlement in Chester, the country was new, the church newly organized, and Mr. Leland was its first pastor; very few of the members were in better worldly circumstances than their preacher, and a salary was not easily raised, but his fellow citizens made him town clerk, and for many years elected him to represent them in the legislative assembly, as some pecuniary reward for his labors in the pulpit. Mr. Leland early became a leading member in the state legislature, and in 1804, was made speaker of that body, and was chosen to that place during four successive sessions. He was appointed, and continued to be for many years, judge of the county court of Windsor county. In 1822 he

was elected lieut. governor, which honor his fellow citizens conferred upon him during six terms of office. Up to this time his civil offices had not interrupted his services in the pulpit, and his duties as a minister of Jesus Christ: but when, in 1828, he was proposed as a candidate for governor, he found that the long relationship with his pastoral charge must cease, or that he must relinquish civil service, he yielded to the impulses of his heart, and, as he believed, to the paramount requirements of his master, whose minister he was, and caused his name to be withdrawn from the canvass. Mr. Leland possessed, in an eminent degree, the qualities that constitute a successful extemporaneous speaker, a powerful cast of mind, quick perceptive and large comparing faculties: and during a period of forty-six years' ministerial labors, never, it is believed, made use of written discourses. He was an agreeable companion, a liberal christian, and an honest man. He was one of the fellows of Middlebury College, Vermont, from 1800 to 1832. And that institution conferred upon him the honorary degree of Master of Arts in 1814. And he received a similar degree from Brown University, Providence, R. I., in 1815. He died, August 25th, 1832, and left no issue.

Abigail, from the time of her marriage, in 1791, to the time of her death in 1843, lived in Wrentham, Mass.

Miriam was married in Holliston, Mass., in 1791, and remained there until 1800, when she, with her husband and three young children, removed to Chester, Vt., where she resided until a few years before her death, which occurred at Londonderry, Vt., in August, 1846. Many years previous to her death she became a professor of religion, in connection with the Baptist denomination. During her life, she was enabled to adorn the doctrine of her God and Saviour, and in her death, as in her life, she enjoyed the consolations and the hope of the gospel. Her husband, Dr. Nathan Whiting, still survives, (1850), aged eighty-five years, and resides in Londonderry, Vt. Four of her children were born in Holliston, Mass., and three in Chester, Vt. Her son, Nathan N., passed his youth and early manhood in Chester, Vt. He is a clergyman of the Baptist denomination, and also a professor of languages. He is a graduate of Union College, of the class of 1815, and he has for several years been settled in Williamsburg, Long Island, N. Y.

Her daughter, Miriam, has continued to reside in Chester, Vt., from 1800 to the present time (1850). She was married in the year 1826. Her husband, Abram Lowell is of the medical profession, and in good practice as a physician and surgeon, in Chester, Vt. In 1825, he received from Middlebury College, Vt., the degree of M. D.

Rev. Marshall Whiting is connected with Heny Leland the Puritan father of the Leland family in America, by a line of descent, through Hopestill Leland, of Sherburne, Mass.; John Leland and Samuel Leland, of Holliston, Mass.; Asa Leland of Chester, Vt.; and Miriam Leland who married Nathan Whiting, and died in Londonderry, Vt. He was born in Holliston, Mass., on the 29th

of January, A. D. 1800. During the same year his father removed from Holliston to Chester, Vt., at which place and in the neighboring town of London-The subject of this sketch passed his childhood derry he has since resided. During this period he received from his parents, and and vouth in Chester. more especially from his affectionate mother, those instructions in morality and religion, which he subsequently found of inestimable value in the conduct of He fitted for college at Chester Academy, under the instruction of several preceptors, the most distinguished of whom, was the late James Dean, for many years professor of mathematics and natural philosophy, in the university of Vermont. Having qualified himself for college, in the spring of 1818, he entered at Hanover, N. H., the freshman class of the institution, established by the state legislature, which was called Dartmouth University. On the closing of the university, by the decision of the appropriate tribunal, pronouncing the law unconstitutional which established it, Mr. W. with several other members of the university, entered Dartmouth College, which having continued in operation during the existence of the University, now regained the possession of the college building and other property. He continued a member of the latter institution, until the close of his second collegiate year, when, at the suggestino of an elder brother, now the Rev. Nathan N. Whiting, who had recently finished his collegiate course at Union College, Schenectady, with a view of entering the last named institution, he asked and received, from professor Ehenezer Adams, of Dartmouth College, an honorable dismission. In the autumn of the same year, 1819, he entered the junior class of Union College in which institution, with a large class, he graduated in 1821. At a subsequent period, the degree of A. M. was conferred upon him. Shortly after leaving college Mr. W. went to Long Island, where he commenced, as a stated employment, the business of teaching, which, with the exception of the last year of his collegiate course, he had regularly followed, for a few months every year, By teaching he had obtained means to defray the since the close of 1815. chief part of the expense of his education. On arriving on Long Island in 1821, he took charge of a public school in the village of New Lots and town of Flatbush, Kings county, which he taught for nearly two years, and then in 1823, opened a select English and classical school for boys, in Newtown, Queens county, L. I., and subsequently changed it to a boarding school for boys. In the autumn of 1825 he left Newtown, and in connection with another teacher, opened a Seminary for boys in Brooklyn, Kings county, with a classical and English department, himself taking charge of the former and his partner of the latter. In this seminary a number of students were fitted for college, and afterwards graduated at different literary institutions. Mr. W. not having originally intended teaching as a profession for life, in the latter part of the year 1830, entered his name in an office in the city of New York, as a student at law, intending, as soon as convenient, to relinquish teaching, and to devote his

whole time to the study he had commenced. He, however, continued his labors in the seminary as usual, and appropriated only his leisure time to the study of law. While pursuing this course, he was taught by an event, to him the most important and interesting of any in the progress of life, "that the way of man is not in himself, that it is not in man that walketh to direct his steps." Reference is here made to his conversion, or to the change in his spiritual state and character. God, by his providence and grace, had for some time previous to this event, been teaching Mr. W. his need of a more enduring and satisfying portion for the soul, than this world can furnish, and in the month of February, 1831, had led him to form the solemn and unalterable purpose of seeking, and if possible, of securing that better portion which the gospel reveals. He had caused him to feel willing to make any sacrifice, which the gospel demands, in order to seek and secure an interest in the "great salvation." Acting under the impulse of this feeling, while attending on the ministry of the Rev. Mr. McIlvaine, now the Protestant Episcopal Bishop of Ohio, Mr. W. as a helpless and perishing sinner, devoted himself, soul and body, for time and eternity, to the Lord Jesus Christ, at the same time invoking the Holy Spirit to seal or confirm the act unto the day of judgment. As a necessary result of thus coming to Christ, who hath said, "him that cometh to me I will in no wise cast out," he was enabled to lay hold of the promise and hope of eternal life. The hope then embraced he has hitherto found "as an anchor of the soul both sure and steadfast." Shortly after the event referred to above, Mr. Whiting left the Academy at Brooklyn and directed his attention, unremittingly to the law. After having pursued this study for a time, he felt constrained to relinquish it and to enter upon the study of divinity, in order to qualify himself for preaching the gospel. Accordingly, in the autumn of 1831, he entered the general theological seminary of the Protestant Episcopal church, in the United States, located in the city of New York, and commenced with the class then entering, the prescribed course of studies. In September, 1832, during the annual vacation in the theological seminary, Mr. Whiting was united in marriage to Elizabeth Richardson, eldest daughter of Mr. Grant Thorburn, of the city of New York. In June, 1834, having completed the prescribed course of studies in the general theological seminary, he with the other members of the class received the usual testimonial. In the same month, in the city of New York, with a number of other candidates, he was ordained a deacon by the Right Rev. Benjamin T. Onderdonk, D. D., bishop of the Protestant Episcopal Church, in the State of New York. After his ordination, Mr. Whiting took the pastoral charge for a few weeks, during the absence of the rector, the late Dr. Milnor, of St. George's Church, N.Y., and then officiated for a short time in St. Luke's church, N.Y., which was at that time without a settled pastor. In November of the same year, he removed, with his family, to Jamesville, Onondago county, N. Y., where,

under the patronage of the Missionary Society of the diocess of N. Y., he took charge of the St. Mark's church, Jamesville, and Christ's church, Pompey, On the 1st of October, 1835, in Trinity church, in the city of Utica, Mr. W., with five other candidates, was ordained a priest by the Right Rey, Beni, T. Onderdonk, D. D. From the autumn of 1835, when he relinquished the charge of Christ's church, Pompey, until the spring of 1841, he continued to discharge the duties of the ministry in the parish at Jamesville, and during the latter part of this period in the neighboring parishes at Onondago Hill and Geddes. the spring of 1841, he removed with his family to Astoria, L. I., where he opened a boarding and day school for boys. Subsequently he was appointed principal of the male department of Astoria Institute, a situation which he still holds (1850). After removing to Astoria in 1841, Mr. W. officiated occasionally, either in St. George's church, Astoria, or in the neighboring churches, where his services were required, until July 1846. At that time, in consequence of the removal of the rector of Zion church, Little Neck, to another field of labor, Mr. W. was called to the charge of that church, and to that of a small adjoining parish, where in addition to his duties in teaching in the institute at Astoria, he continued to officiate for nearly two years, when, on the return of the former rector, in 1848, he resigned the charge of Zion church. He continued. however, to officiate in the adjoining parish, above referred to, until late in the autumn, when he resigned that also. Since that time until the present, May, 1850, Mr. W. has officiated only occasionally, and for the most part, in St. George's church, Astoria, where he still resides.

Laurin G. Whiting, son of Nathan Whiting and Miriam Leland, is a physician and surgeon, in practice in Chester, Vt. He commenced business in his profession, in the city of New York, and after a few years, removed to Londonderry, Vt., and from Londonderry to Chester, where he has resided for several years.

His brother, Franklin, passed his youthful days in Chester, Vt.: but he has, for a number of years, been in business, as a Druggist, in Williamsburg, N. Y.

Asa Leland, second son and fourth child of Asa Leland, was married in Holliston, Mass., in 1794; during the same year he removed to Chester, Vt., where he continued to reside until 1827. He then left Chester for Otto, Cattaraugus county, N. Y., and remained there till his death, in 1832. He was an active business man. In occupation a farmer and trader. He was a professor of religion, and for many years a member of the Baptist church in Chester, Vt., under the pastoral charge of his brother, Lient. Gov. Aaron Leland. He had fifteen children, and they were all born in Chester, Vt. His son, Moses N., has been an ordained minister of the gospel, of the Baptist denomination, since 1838. He was educated at the academies in Chester and Windsor, Vt., and removed to Otto, N. Y., with his father. He is an amiable and useful minister, and he has been for some time settled in Plymouth, Ia.

Asa Leland, also son of Asa, removed from Chester, Vt., to Otto, N. Y., in

1825. He remained in Otto from that time till his death in 1840. He was an active and useful citizen, a professor of religion, and at the time of his death, held the office of deacon in the Baptist church.

Eliza N. Leland, daughter of Asa, married and settled in Pike, N. Y., removed to Cuba, N. Y., and died there in 1840. She was a worthy member of the Baptist church.

Lois Leland, also daughter of Asa, was educated at the academy in Chester, Vt. She lived with her first husband, Rev. Anson Tuthill, in Pike, Almond and Howard, N. Y., until his death in 1834. In 1842 she married her second husband, Luther Allen, Esq., and continued to live with him until his death in 1847. She now (1850) resides in Lodi, Erie county N. Y. Early in life she became a member of the Baptist church, and under her repeated bereavements, she has been unwavering in her faith in Christ.

Achsa M. Leland, also a daughter of Asa, received her education at the academy in Chester, Vt. She was employed in teaching school in Chester from 1823 to 1827. From 1827 to 1842 she lived in Lodi and Irving, N. Y. She was married in 1842 to John Marsh. Since that time she has lived with her husband at South Bend, in Indiana. She and her husband are pious members of the Baptist church.

Cephas R. Leland, son of Asa, has his descent from Henry Leland the common ancestor of the Leland family in America, through Hopestill Leland of Sherburne, Mass., John Leland and Samuel Leland, of Holliston, Mass., Asa Leland, of Chester, Vt., and Asa Leland, of Otto, Cattaraugus county, N. Y.

He is of the legal profession, and for his education both classical and professional, he has depended almost entirely upon his own unaided exertions. During his minority he resided in his father's family in Chester, Vt., and had the advantage of attending the academy in that place for a short period of time. In 1827 he left Chester for Otto, N. Y. He was afterwards a student for a few months at the academy in Springville, N. Y. From about the year 1827 to 1834, he was engaged as a student at law and in teaching school, to obtain funds to defray the expense of his education, and to support some helpless members of his father's family. In 1832 he made a public profession of religion, and became a member of the Baptist church. He was admitted as an attorney and counsellor at law in 1835. Settled in Irving, Chatauque County, N. Y., where he has ever since been in practice in his profession. He has held the office of post master for eight years, in that place, and in 1846, he was appointed by Gov. Wright, attorney for the Seneca Nation of Indians. He is active and influential in all his social relations, both as a man and a christian. In 1834 he was married to Orphea Powers, his fifth cousin, who is connected with Henry Leland, the common ancestor, by a line of descent through Ebenezer Leland, of Sherburne, Mass., James Leland, of Grafton, Thankful Leland, who married Lemuel Powers, of Northbridge, Mass., Lemuel Powers, of Stillwater, N. Y., and Cyrus Powers, of Kelloggville, N. Y.



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Her mother was daughter of Jonah Stow and Lydia Powers, and grand-daughter of Lemuel Powers and Thankful Leland, and a cousin to her father. She was born in Sempronius, N. Y., February 22d, 1810. She resided in Moravia, a town within the township of Sempronius, and in Lausing, N. Y., until 1833. She was married in Lodi, Eric county, N. Y., in 1835, and immediately removed to Irving, N. Y., with her husband, where they have ever since resided. She was educated at the academies in Moravia and Ithaca, N. Y. She made a public profession of religion in 1827, and became a member of the Episcopal church, and in 1839 she joined the Baptist church, and she has ever since been a member of that communion. She is a lady of true piety and christian benevolence. Her mother died when she was only eleven years of age, and from that time until her marriage, she became the constant companion and nurse of her father. Between them more than ordinary attachment existed until his death in 1841.

Sarah Ann Leland, daughter of Asa, went with her parents from Chester, Vt., to Otto, N. Y., in 1827, and remained there until her marriage in 1831. Since that time she has lived with her husband in Dorr Village, Ia. She and her husband are both useful members of the Baptist church.

Marshall W. Leland, son of Asa, pursued his studies preparatory for college, at the seminaries in Springville, Hamilton and Newton, N. Y. He entered Georgetown College in the district of Columbia, and after remaining there the usual time, received his degree of A. B. And since 1839 he has been an ordained minister of the Baptist denomination. He is a pious and useful minister of the gospel, and resides in Dorr Village, Ia. He married the daughter of the Rev. Mr. Anson, of Cuba, N. Y., a worthy and pious lady, also a member of the Baptist church.

Miriam W. Leland, daughter of Asa, became a member of the Baptist church in 1831, and married to Cyrus Ferris, of the same church, in 1834, and they now, (1850), reside in Howard. Steuben county, N. Y.

William H. Leland, son of Asa, passed his youthful days in Otto, N. Y. After attaining the age of manhood he was engaged in mercantile business for several years in Dayton, N. Y. He left Dayton for Eden, Erie county, N. Y., where he now resides. He became a member of the Baptist church in 1832, and was married in 1840.

Abigail C. Leland, daughter of Asa, resided in the western part of New York from 1827 to 1845. In 1833 she professed religion and united with the Baptist church. She was married to the Rev. E. T. Manning, of the Baptist church, in 1845. Since that time she has lived with her husband in Indiana, Illinois and Iowa.

Dexter F. Leland, son of Asa, is of the medical profession. He was educated at the Lodi Select School, studied medicine with Dr. Field, of Lodi, and at the Laporte medical college, Ia. He received from that institution the degree of M. D. And he is now, (1850), in successful practice as a physician, in Perryville, Ia. He was married in 1846.

Laurette Leland, daughter of Asa, was educated at the Lodi Select School, and went to Irving, N. Y., with her brother Cephas R. Leland, and lived with him until her marriage. Since her marriage she has lived with her first and second husband in Friendship, N. Y. She is a member of the Baptist church.

Simeon Leland, third son and fifth child of Asa Leland, was married in Holliston, Mass, in 1806, and soon after his marriage removed from Holliston to the state of Vermont, and continued to reside in that state, part of the time in Londonderry, part in Landgrove, and part in Chester, from that time until his death in 1847. He was an intelligent, active and efficient man, and on one or more occasion, was a member of the state legislature. His surviving children, as appears by the foregoing account, are living in New York city, Cleveland, Ohio, and California. His son, Simeon, has been successfully concerned for several years in keeping a large hotel in the city of New York.

Nathan Leland, fourth son and sixth child of Asa Leland, was married in Holliston, Mass., in the year 1804, and soon after his marriage went to Chester, Vt., and remained there about two years. He then returned to Holliston and continued to reside there until his death in 1842. He was an industrious and intelligent farmer, and in the year 1837, represented the town of Holliston in the Massachusetts legislature. His oldest son Aaron, was born in Chester, Vt., but his other children were born in Holliston. His son, Aaron, married his fourth consin, Rowena W. Whiting, of the posterity of Henry Leland, in 1830. He is a teacher of music and a dealer in musical publications, and since he attained the age of manhood, he has lived in Worcester and Westborough, Mass., Hartford, Conn., Buffalo, N. Y., and Springfield, Mass. Alden Leland, second son of Nathan, has always lived in Holliston, Mass. He has been extensively concerned for several years in manufacturing shoes. He is an influential man in the town, and he has for a series of years, had much to do with its municipal concerns, and he was a representative from that town in the Massachusetts legislature for the years 1838, 1839 and 1843. His other children have all continued to reside near the place of their nativity. John P. and Leander F., have, however, within the past year (1849) removed to Springfield, Mass.

Betsy Leland, third daughter of Asa Leland, from the time of her marriage in 1810, to the time of her death in 1819, had her place of residence in Chester, Vt.

Alexander Leland, youngest son of Asa Leland, was married in 1813, and died in 1846. During this period he lived in Londonderry, Peru and Chester, Vt., and Boston, Mass. He held the office of post master for a short time in Peru, and that of deputy sheriff for some time in Chester, Vt.

The descendants of ABNER LELAND, son of Samuel Leland, and grandson of John Leland; born in Holliston, Mass., in 1713; married Hannah Thayer; and died in Holliston, Mass., in 1819.

The eight children of Abner Leland were born in Holliston, Mass.

His son, Elijah, was married in Boston, Mass., soon after he was twenty-one years of age, and in a short time after his marriage, settled in Chester, Vt., where he continued to reside for five or six years. He then removed to Bloomfield, now Mendon, in the western part of the state of New York, and remained there until his death in 1828. Two of his children were born in Chester, and eleven in Bloomfield and Mendon.

Amos Leland son of Elijah, has lived a considerable number of years in Norwich, Chenango county, New York.

His daughter, Hannah, was married in Mendon, N. Y., Sept. 15th, 1821. She afterwards lived with her husband, in Mendon, Rochester and Bethany, N. Y.; Oil Creek in the county of Crawford, Penn.: New Albany, Indiana and Sunbury, Delaware county, Ohio. Her husband, Rev. William Gildersleeve, was a clergyman of the Baptist denomination, and also a physician. He was a graduate of Williams College, Williamstown, Mass., and received a degree of M. D., from Yale College, New Haven, Conn. He was in practice as a physician for about four years in the western part of the state of New York. About the year 1828, he commenced preaching under a license from the Baptist church in Rochester, N. Y., and was soon after ordained in Bethany, New York, as a minister of the gospel of that denomination. And he continued to labor in the ministry from that time until his death in 1845. The other children of Elijah are settled in different places in western New York, Ohio, Michigan and Wisconsin, as appears by the foregoing tabular account.

Amasa Leland, second son of Abner, remained with his father in Holliston, Mass., until he was over thirty years of age. He afterwards lived in Southborough, Mass., a few years, and then settled in Milford, Mass., where he continued to reside until his death in 1838. He was a successful farmer. His three surviving children, Charles, Abner A., and Harriet T., have always lived in Milford.

Jotham Leland, third son of Abner, was married in Holliston, Mass., in 1805, and remained there for several years. He then lived in Hopkinton, Mass., until 1819. He then returned to Holliston, and continued to reside there until 1846, and since that time he has had his place of residence in Ashland, Mass. He is an industrious farmer.

Luther Leland, fourth son of Abner, was a clergyman. He fitted for college, with the Rev. Timothy Dickinson, of Holliston, Mass., was educated at Middle-

bury college, Vt., and graduated with the class of 1807. He studied divinity, and was the settled minister of the Congregational church and society in Derby, Vt., for the last twelve or thirteen years of his life. He died in 1822.

Eliab Leland, fifth son of Abner, was married in Holliston, Mass., in 1808, and since his marriage he has lived in Southborough, Hopkinton and Upton, Mass. He is a farmer, and now (1850) resides in Upton.

Deacon Samuel Leland was born in Holliston, Mass., May 21, 1784. He is descended from Henry Leland, the common ancestor of the Leland family in America, through Hopestill Leland of Sherburne, Mass., John Leland, Samuel Leland, and Abner Leland, of Holliston, Mass. He passed his infancy, youth and early manhood with his parents in Holliston. His father was a farmer, and he was brought up to labor upon the farm, except a few months in the winter season, when he was allowed to attend the common district school. He, however, for a few years during the latter part of his minority, taught a school in the winter season. He was married in 1806, at the age of twenty-two. After he left Holliston in 1811, he lived in Leverett, Mass., 16 years, in Montague Mass., 8 years, in Sunderland, Mass., 1 year, again in Holliston 10 years, and in Ashland, Mass., where he now (1850) resides, five years. He is a man of great moral purity and christian piety. He has ever been an ardent defender of the Christian religion, and his means, as far as prudence would permit, have been freely given for its support. He was early impressed with religious feelings, and as he humbly hopes, experienced religion at the age of twenty-one years, but did not connect himself with any church until 1813. He then became a member of the Leverett and Montague Baptist church. In 1821 he was chosen deacon of this church, and was set apart to the office a few years after by ordination. He continued in the office of deacon of that church until he removed to Holliston. He then united with the Baptist church in Medway, Mass., and in 1840, was chosen a deacon of this church, and continued to serve in this capacity until he left Holliston, for Ashland, in 1845. He immediately became a member of the Baptist church in Ashland, and was soon after chosen deacon, which office he now holds. He has ever been a firm and zealous advocate of all religious, moral, benevolent and philanthropic objects. He was early engaged in the temperance reform and has ever continued to labor in its behalf. He has been a member of the board of assessors or selectmen in every town in which he has resided long enough to be eligible, except Ashland, showing the great confidence his fellow citizens have reposed in his honesty and ability. In the early part of his life he held the offices of ensign and lieutenant in the militia, and was offered that of captain, which he declined. And now, he having nearly served his own generation, feels himself a sinnner in the sight of God, and trusts entirely in the atoning blood of Christ for pardon and salvation, and his constant desire and prayer is that, he, himself, and all of his, may be prepared for that rest that remaineth for the children of God. His surviving children are all living in Ashland and the neighboring town of Holliston.

Lemuel Leland, Luther Leland, Ebenezer Leland, James Leland, and Chloe Leland, children of Ebenezer, were born in Holliston, Mass., and his other three children, Abigail, Rhoda and Electa, were born in Partridgefield, now Peru, and Hinsdale, Mass. Those that were born in Holliston, when they were quite young, removed with their parents from Holliston to Partridgefield. Lemuel and Luther settled in the neighboring town of Middlefield and remained there as long as they lived. Ebenezer lived in Roxbury, Mass., from 1790 to 1817. He afterwards resided in Boston, Mass., for ten or twelve years, and finally went to Pepperell, Mass., where he died in 1836. James, many years ago, went to the western part of the state of New York and settled in Pendleton, Niagara county, where he is now (1850) living. Abigail, on her marriage settled in Middlefield, Mass., and continued to reside there with her husband until her death in 1816. Rhoda, on her marriage, went with her husband to Wallingford, Vt., where she now lives. Electa was married in Peru, and has continued to live there ever since. Chloe married in Peru and remained there until her death in 1808. death, her husband and their seven children removed to what was then called the Genesee country, in the western part of the state of New York, and became the first settlers in a township near Rochester, now called Parma. Her son Zolved, was one of the fathers of that place, and was much esteemed and respected by his fellow citizens. Her son Harry married his fourth cousin, Ann Thompson of the posterity of Hopestill Leland.

The descendants of DEBORAH LELAND, daughter of John Leland and Lydia Leland, and granddaughter of John Leland; born in Holliston, Mass., in 1739; married Drury Fairbanks; and died in Holliston in 1791.

The eight children of Drury Fairbanks and Deborah Leland, were born in Holliston, Mass. John remained there through life. Perley and Joseph, at an early period of their lives, settled in Wardsborough, Vt., and continued to reside there as long as they lived. Joseph Fairbanks, son of Joseph, was a graduate of Dartmouth College, of the class of 1810. Rhoda was married in Holliston in 1785, and soon after her marriage went with her husband, Eli Perry, to Wardsborough, Vt., and continued to live there and in Ryegate, Vt., until her death in 1844. Her son, Eli, is a physician, in practice in Ryegate, Vt. Elijah, settled in Lunenburgh, Mass., soon after his marriage, and remained there until his death in 1813. Drury, was educated at Brown University, Providence, R. I., and received his degree of A. M., in Sept. 1797. He is of the clerical profession. He was the ordained minister of the Congregational church and society in Plymouth, N. H., from 1800 to 1813. He was also pastor of the Congregational church and society in Littleton, N. H., from 1820

to 1836. In consequence of feeble health and old age, he gave up the services of the ministry in 1836, and he has since that time resided in Littleton. Deborah, married her consin, Caleb Perry, in 1799, and lived with him in Fitchburg, Mass., Plymonth, Marlborough, and Alstead, N. H., until her death in 1833. A particular account of the other descendants of Deborah Leland is given in the foregoing table.

Lydia Leland, Hephzibah Leland, Levi Leland, John Leland, Anna Leland, and Polly Leland, children of Rev. John Leland, were born in Holliston, Mass., and left Holliston with their parents for Partridgefield, now Pecu, Mass., about 5 the year 1785, and they all passed the early period of their lives in the latter place.

Lydia married in Peru, and continued to live there with her husband until I her death, in 1828.

Hephzibah married in Peru, and settled in Hinsdale, Mass.

John, for his first wife, married his cousin Lydia Leland, daughter of Aaron Leland, of Sherburne, Mass. He resided in Pern until 1820, when he removed to Amherst, Mass., and continued to live there until 1835. In that year he settled in Roxbury, Mass., and remained there for a few years. He then returned to Amherst, Mass., where he has ever since dwelt. He early made a profession of religion, and for many years he has holden the office of deacon in the Trinitarian Congregational church. He held the office of treasurer of Amherst College from its establishment in 1821, till he left Amherst for Roxbury, in 1835. He was a senator from the county of Hampshire in the legislature of Massachusetts for the years 1833 and 1834, and a representative from the town of Amherst, Mass., for the year 1847. His son John H. M. Leland, was educated at Amherst College and received his degree of A. B. in 1840. He is a clergyman of the Trinitarian Congregational denomination. He married his cousin, Eliza T. Leland, daughter of his mother's brother, Joseph P. Leland, of Sherburne, Mass.

Anna, twin sister of John, was married in IS00 to Eliashib Adams, then of Worthington, Mass. After her marriage, she resided with her husband in Worthington, Mass., in Bucksport, Me., and in Bangor, Me., till her death in the latter place, April 18th, 1846. She was a woman of fine personal appearance, strong sound sense, and decided piety. She suffered greatly from ill health the latter years of her life. Her husband descended from Henry Adams, who came from England and settled in Braintree, Mass., in 1630, through Edward of Medfield, Mass., Eliashib of Bristol, R. I., Eliashib of Preston, Conn., and Eliashib of Canterbury, Conn. He is still living in Bangor, Me.

Her son, George Eliashib Adams, born in Worthington, Mass., October 27th, 1801, is an eminent clergyman. He received his classical education at Yale college, New Haven, Conn., his professional, at the theological seminary in Andover, Mass., graduated at the former institution in 1821, at the latter in

1826. From 1826 to 1829, he was a professor in the Bangor Theological Seminary, and since 1829 he has been pastor of the Congregational church connected with Bowdoin College in Brunswick, Me. The government of that college in 1849, conferred upon him the degree of Doctor of Divinity. In 1826 he was married to Sarah Ann Folsom, a lady of fine accomplishments and true christian piety. She was granddaughter of Gen. Nathaniel Folsom, a member of the first congress from the state of New Hampshire. She died Feb. 27th, 1850. George E. has no children. Her daughter, Eliza L. Adams, was married in 1831, to James Crosby, a merchant of Bangor, Me., where she has ever since resided. John Leland Crosby, son of James Crosby and Eliza L. Adams, is now (1850) a student in Bowdoin College, Brunswick, Me.

Her second son, John C. Adams, is of the clerical profession. He received his classical education at Amherst College, Amherst, Mass., and graduated with the class of 1833. He studied theology mostly at New Haven, Conn., and he is now (1850) preaching to a Congregational church and society in East Machias, Maine.

Her third son, Aaron C. Adams, is a clergyman of the Congregational denomination. He graduated at Bowdoin College, with the class of 1826, studied theology at Bangor, Me., and at the Lane Seminary, Cincinnati, Ohio. He was several years in the ministry in Maine, and he is now pastor of a Congregational church in West Bloomfield, N. J. He was married in 1839.

Her youngest son, Henry M. Adams, died May 25th, 1846, at the age of 24. He was a remarkable young man. He chose a seafaring life, hoping that his health, which had ever been poor, would thereby be improved. He proved a very skilful seaman, and while quite young took charge of a vessel. He early united with a Christian church. Affectionate in disposition, full of charity, ever correct in all his conduct, patient and gentle under protracted sufferings, he was universally loved, and the memory both of his life and his death is exceedingly precious to his numerous friends.

Polly Leland, fourth daughter of Rev. John Leland, was married in Peru, Mass., in 1805, and she has ever since continued to live there.

Rev. Aaron Whitney Leland, of Columbia, S. C., is a clergyman of superior talents, high literary attainments, commanding eloquence, fervent piety, and deep biblical and theological learning. He is connected with Henry Leland, the original Pilgrim patriarch of the Leland family in America, by a three-fold line of descent, through Ebenezer Leland, Ebenezer Leland, Jr., of Sherburne, Mass., Lydia Leland, his grandmother, and John Leland, his father, through Hopestill Leland of Sherburne, John Leland and John Leland, Jr., of Holliston, Mass., and John Leland, his father; and through Hopestill Leland, Hopestill Leland, Jr., and Daniel Leland of Sherburne, Mass., and Hephzibah Leland, his mother. He was born October, 1, 1787, at Partridgefield, Berkshire county, Mass. His parents, John and Hephzibah Leland, were second cousins. In 1808 he was graduated at Williams College in his native state, and within a



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month afterwards, landed in Charleston, S. C. In four weeks after reaching Charleston, he was elected classical teacher in the Mount Pleasant Academy, within sight of the city, a very advantageous situation, affording not only useful and profitable employment, but leisure and facilities for pursuing the study of his future profession. In June of the succeeding year (1809) he was married to the eldest daughter of the Hon. James Hibben, a lady who still survives to bless her limsband and family, as one of the best of wives and mothers. In the year 4811, the subject of this brief memoir was beensed to preach the gospel by the Presbytery of Harmony, at their sessions in Charleston; and in the year following he was ordained by the same ecclesiastical body, to the work of the Christian ministry. In 1813, he was elected and installed pastor of the First Presbyterian church of the city of Charleston. In 1814, Brown University, Providence, R. L. conferred upon him the honoray degree of Master of Arts, and in 1815, he received the degree of Doctor of Divinity, from the South Carolina College. After his permanent settlement in the ministry, he continued in the regular discharge of its laborious duties nearly twenty years, part of the time as pastor of the church above mentioned, and subsequently of the Presbyterian church, of St. Andrews parish. 1833, he received from the united synods of South Carolina and Georgia. the appointment of Professor of Christian Theology in the Southern Theological Seminary, located in Columbia, S. C., and in the following year, was inaugurated into that office. Ever since, he has been exclusively devoted to the labors of that important professorship, in an institution so vitally important to the churches and the ministry of the south, that already a majority of the pastors of the Presbyterian churches in several states consists of those who have enjoyed its advantages. In his family, A. W. L. has been highly favored. He has five sons, of liberal education and of respectable standing. Of four daughters, he was called, in 1845, to mourn the death of the second, the wife of the Rev. A. A. Porter, pastor of the Glebe street church, in Charleston. The eldest daughter is the wife of the Rev. Edwin Cater, principal of the Young Ladies Institute, at Bradford Springs, S. C. The two younger daughters have not reached maturity. There is something remarkable in the uniform and vigorous health enjoyed by Dr. L., with scarcely an interruption, for forty years. When he first migrated to the south, it was predicted, and with every probability of correctness, that his sanguine and plethoric habit would ensure an early death. And yet, by the mysterious arrangement of Providence, he has not only outlived more than a whole generation, but has enjoyed a degree of uniform vigorous health, which is very rare, even in New England. So remarkable, indeed, has been his degree of health, that in forty years, he has not been prevented by sickness from attending the services of the sanctuary, more than seven or eight Sabbaths. It may be useful to add, that such a continuance of good health in so sickly a climate, while it should be ascribed to the good pleasure of Him to whom all things are possible, - the Sovereign Disposer of life and death,—may also be traced, instrumentally, to the practice of rigid temperance. On landing in Carolina, forty years ago, A.W. L. entered into a solemn covenant with himself, to drink nothing but water, and that covenant has been kept inviolate. He, therefore, practised total abstinence nearly a score of years before the name was invented, and practically adopted the principles of the temperance reform, long before the trumpet-tongued alarm of Beecher had disturbed the deathful slumbers of the world. However the fact may be, as to the efficacy of this peculiar habit in preserving the health and life of the subject of this memoir, it is his own settled conviction, that if he had continued to be what is called a moderate drinker of intoxicating liquors, he would have been in his grave thirty years ago. At the present time, (1850), Dr. Leland enjoys good health, with all his powers unimpaired, and is as well able to discharge the duties of his sacred office, as at any former period of life.

Perley Leland, only child of Martha Leland, was born in Holliston, Mass., but in the year 1804, removed from Holliston, to Warwick, Mass., where he remained until his death in 1847. He was connected with Henry Leland, the common ancestor, by a fourfold line of descent, through Timothy Leland, David Leland, and Henry Leland, his father, through Hopestill Leland, Henry Leland, Thankful Leland, his father's mother, and Henry Leland his

father, through Hopestill Leland, John Leland, John Leland Jr., and Martha Leland, his mother; and through Ebenezer Leland, Ebenezer Leland, Jr., Lydia Leland, his grandmother, and Martha Leland, his mother. Martha Leland, his oldest child, was born in Holliston, and his other children, Jasper, Alma, Harriet and Abigail R., were born in Warwick; Martha was married in 1827, and since that time she has lived with her husband, in Warwick, Canton and Norton, Mass., and Woonsocket, R. I., where she now (1850) resides. Her husband, Amory Gale, Jr., is a physician and clergyman. In the early part of his life he was in practice as a physician; but for several years previous to 1849, he was engaged in the ministry, as a Congregational clergyman, and since the beginning of the year 1849, he has been again in medical practice, in Woonsocket, R. I.

His other children have all continued to reside in Warwick. They are respectable agricultural people, and Jacob R. Gale, husband of Alma, was a representative from the town of Warwick, in the Massachusetts legislature, for the years 1837, 1838, and 1839. An account of this branch of the family appears in the third chapter, page 28, under the head of the descendants of Henry Leland. But, in consequence of some errors in it, as there published, its publication is here repeated.

Rev. Samuel Leland Rockwood, was born in Sherburne, Mass., Nov. 16th, 1810. He is of the Leland family, and has his descent from Henry Leland, the common ancestor, through Hopestill Leland, William Leland, Simon Leland, Samuel Leland and Hannah Leland, who married Elisha Rockwood, all of Sherburne. His grandmother, Mary Leland, was also descended from Henry Leland, the common ancestor, through Hopestill Leland, Henry Leland, and Henry Leland, Jr., of Sherburne, Mass. He early manifested a great fondness for reading, and it was his father's wish to give him a public edu-

cation. But as he then had no desire to engage in any of the learned professions, he did not so second the wishes of his father as to induce him to send his son to school preparatory to college. After the decease of his father in 1830, the subject of this notice experienced a change in his religious views and feelings, and desired to enter the Christian ministry. His wishes were warmly seconded by most of his friends, and especially by his elder sister, and he decided to obtain an education for this purpose. About the commencement of the year 1831, he entered upon a course of preparatory study at Wrentham Academy, and entered Amherst College in 1832, and graduated in 1836. soon repaired to the Andover Theological Seminary, and graduated at that institution in 1839. In April, of the same year, he commenced preaching to the South Church, in North Bridgwater, Mass. At the expiration of his engagement there, he was engaged to preach in Hanson, Plymouth county, Ms. He arrived in that place on the 16th of Nov., the anniversary of his birth. In the course of some weeks he received a call to settle over the Congregational church and society, in that place, and was ordained pastor, March 11th, 1840. He was married on the 9th of the same month, to Miss Christina Gilbert, of Taunton, Mass. He remains in Hanson at the present time, with a united and affectionate people.

Three children of Simeon Leland, Lynda, Hollis, and Bellarmine, were born in Sherburne, Mass.; and four, Simon, Amasa, Elbridge, and Rhoda, in Gardner, Mass. Hollis died in Sherburne, and Lynda and Bellarmine went from Sherburne to Gardner with their parents, about the year 1790. Lynda has continued to live in Gardner ever since, Bellarmine was married in 1809, and soon after settled in the city of New York, and remained there until his death in 1822. His son, Levi, is a lecturer in the cause of Temperance, and of the denomination of Christians, called Friends, or Quakers, the only person of the name of Leland, in America, known to be of that faith. Simon, son of Simeon, from an early period of his life, till his death, was concerned as a trapper and Indian trader in the remote western country. Amasa remained in Gardner until his death in 1847. Elbridge and Rhoda, have for a considerable number of years, lived in South Hanover, in the county of Jefferson and state of Indiana.

John Whitney, son of John, was concerned in business as a merchant, in Boston, Mass., from about the year 1795, till the time of his death in 1817. He was a worthy and respectable man. Hopestill Leland, Ruth Leland, Joshua Leland and Joseph Leland, were born upon the place in Sherburne, Mass., which was owned and occupied by Henry Leland, the primitive father of the Leland family in America. Hopestill,

Ruth and Joseph, remained in Sherburne as long as they lived. Joshua settled in Sherburne, and resided there until 1794, when he removed to the county of Madison, in the State of N. Y., and continued to dwell in the neighboring towns of Eaton, Morrisville and Madison, in that county, until the time of his death, in 1810. His death took place at Cherry Valley, in the county of Otsego, N. Y., in consequence of a fall from his wagon, while on a journey from Madison towards the Hudson river. He was a highly respectable man, held the office of colonel in the militia before he left Sherburne, and several offices of trust and responsibility after he settled in New York.

Sarah Leland, Amos Leland, Hopestill Leland, Mary Leland and Ruth Leland, children of Hopestill, were born in Sherburne, Mass. Sarah, from her marriage in 1779, to her death in 1850, lived first in Wrentham, and afterwards in Leominster, Mass. Amos remained in Sherburne until his death in 1842. Hopestill, since his marriage in 1803, has resided in Sherburne. Mary has lived a single life in Sherburne and Natick, Mass. Ruth, after her marriage in 1798, till her death in 1824, dwelt in Boston, Mass.

The eight children of Timothy Daniels and Ruth Leland, were born in Sherburne, Mass. Rachel is now living at the advanced age of ninety-six years, in Holliston, Mass., where she has resided for many years. Martha was married in Sherburne, and continued to live there until her death in 1847. Joseph never had his residence in any place but Sherburne.

Amasa Leland, Ezra Leland, Isaac Leland, Orrison Leland, and Uriah Leland, children of Joshua Leland, were born in Sherburne, Mass., and removed with their parents, in 1794, from Sherburne to Madison county, N. Y. His other five children, Phæbe, Sylvia, Juliette, Yale, and Joshua, were born in Madison and Morrisville, N. Y. Amasa Leland settled in Madison, was an industrious farmer, and a pious member of the Baptist church. Ezra, has for many years, lived in Morrisville, and has held several responsible municipal offices. He is a farmer, professor of religion, and a deacon in the Baptist church. Orrison, several years ago, settled in Northfield, near Ann Arbor, in the county of Washtenaw, Mich. He is a respectable farmer, and a pious Christian. Uriah, is now living in Morrisville, N. Y., where he has hitherto resided during his youth and manhood. He was in the active military service of his country at Sackets Harbor as a subaltern officer, for a short period of time, during the late war with Great Britain, and since that time, he has passed through all the grades of military promotion, from a cornet to a colonel in the horse-artillery, of the state troops of New York. He has also for many years, holden several responsible municipal offices in the town of Morrisville, and for the year 1839, he was a member of the legislative assembly of N. Y. for the ounty of Madison. Sylvia, was married in 1823, and since that time, she as resided with her husband in Madison, N.Y. Yale, has always lived in Jadison. He is a millwright of considerable note. He has holden the offices of colonel in the militia and county supervisor. He is a professor of religion, and holds the

office of class leader in the Methodist church. Joshua is an intelligent farmer, settled in Northfield, Washtenaw county, Mich., where he has resided for many years. He is an active and useful citizen, and a pious christian. He has holden the office of magistrate for several years, and for the years 1844 and 1846, he was a member of the legislature of Michigan. Joseph Leland, son of Joshua and grandson of Hopestill, remained through life, in Sherburne, Mass., upon a part of the estate owned by his great-grandfather, Henry Leland. His sister Achsah, was twice married, and always lived in Sherburne. For her second husband, she married her second cousin, Asa Leland, of the posterity of William Leland.

The house occupied by Jedediah P. Leland, and which was also owned and occupied by his father, Joshua Leland, stands upon land which belonged to Henry Leland, our primitive ancestor, and near the place where he first dwelt in Sherburne, Mass., and where he died. And an apple-tree is now (1850) standing near by, which, according to a tradition, universally credited, among his descendants in Sherburne, was produced from a seed brought from England, by his wife Margaret, and planted on his first settlement in Sherburne, near his dwelling house. And there is an ancient burying ground, a short distance from the house of Jedediah, in which Henry and his three sons, Hopestill, Ebenezer and Eleazer, were buried, and where their ashes, mingled with the dust, now repose. Henry Leland, between the time of his arrival in this country in 1653, and his death in 1680, acquired four or five hundred acres of land in Sherburne, which by his will, he distributed among his three sons; the parts which he gave to his sons Hopestill and Ebenezer, have ever since been owned and occupied by his descendants; but on the death of Eleazer his share passed Eleazer died without issue and by will, gave all his estate out of the family. to his wife Sarah.

The number of the descendants of Henry Leland, contained in this volume, is 9624. And there are, in 1850, among the living and the dead, ten generations of the Leland family in America. Three of them, embracing Henry Leland, his children and grandchildren, are recorded in the first chapter of this volume; two, embracing the children and grandchildren of the twelve grandsons of Henry, in the first division of the other twelve chapters; five, embracing the descendants of the grandchildren of the twelve grandsons of Henry, in the second division of the last twelve chapters. The persons whose names are at the head of the tables in this last division of the twelve chapters, are in all cases, in the fifth generation, and their descendants, in the column of parents, marked with one figure, are in the sixth generation; those marked with two figures, in the seventh; those with three, in the eighth; and those with four, in the ninth; and those persons in the column of children, opposite to the parents marked with four figures, are in the tenth generation.
