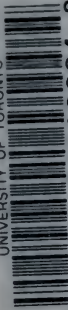
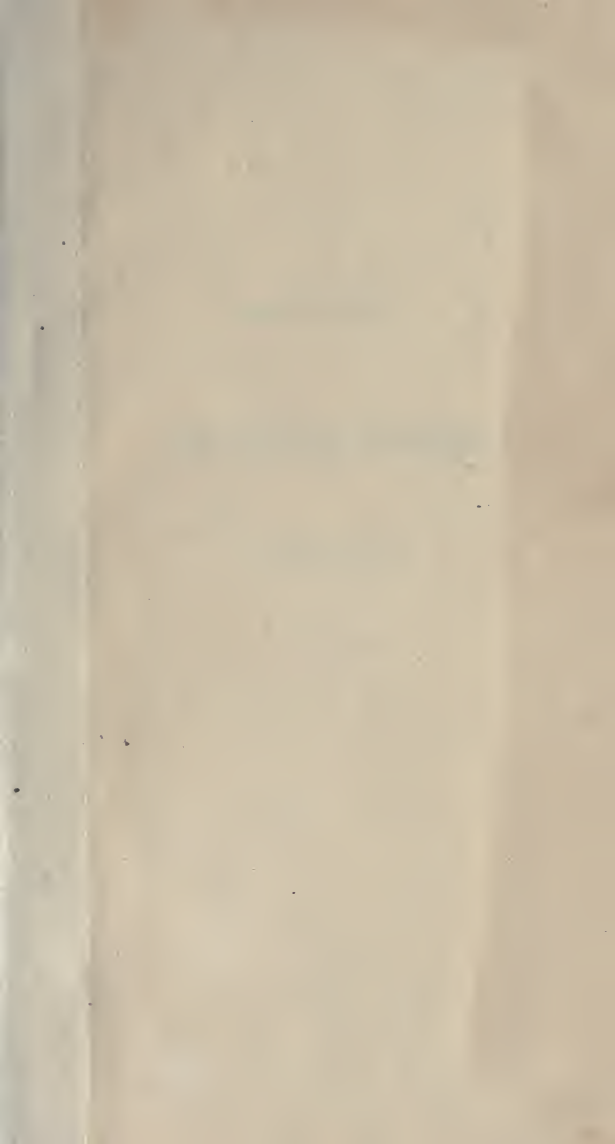




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PREFACE.

ON looking over PIGOTT's Political Dictionary, I find Pension thus defined by Johnson.—In England it is generally understood to mean pay given to a state hireling for treason to his country. Again, Pension.—This word has been well defined by Addison, to be “an allowance made to any one without an equivalent.” Had not pensions as it were, obtained a sanction by long and continued usage, we should have decried the measure as an absurdity; and the man who should have proposed it more fitted for the cells of Bedlam, than the departments of the state. It is, however, with civil absurdities as with religious ceremonies, whose fetters are first made easy by chaplets of roses, and afterwards retained by prescriptive rights. The time, indeed, may arrive when the ceremonies of the latter, and the absurdities of the former may moulder into dust, and be known only from the recording page of history.

Towards the close of the American war, when the burthen of expense pressed with extraordinary weight upon the resources of the country, and when application was made to Parliament to discharge the debts of the civil list, a more vigorous and decided step was taken than had characterized any former interposition of Parliament; and in the attempt to regulate the civil list and prevent the same from being in arrear for the future, it was endeavoured to obviate the excess of such grants, by limiting their amount and their abuse, *by giving publicity to them*, it was accordingly enacted: "That no pension exceeding the sum of 300l. a year should be granted for the use of any person, and that the whole of the pensions granted in any one year should not exceed 600l. *a list of which, together with the names of the persons to whom the same were granted, should be laid before Parliament in twenty days after the beginning of each session, until the whole Pension List should be reduced to 90,000l. which sum it should not be lawful to exceed by more than 5,000l. in the whole of all the grants, nor should any pension to be granted after the said reduction to or for the use of any one person, exceed the sum of 1,200 yearly, except to His Majesty's Royal Family, or on an address of either House of Parliament.*"

The efficiency of this measure did not entirely correspond with the expectations which were entertained of it, and it was found necessary to bring the subject

again before Parliament some years afterwards, when the annual provision of the civil list became insufficient for the charges to which it was liable.

The regulations which the Civil List Act contained, were not ill calculated to effectuate their object; it was highly expedient to bring all pensions under one head: *to have them paid at the same office, and to prohibit the diffusing of them over various departments* where they might be more likely to escape notice than if they were distinctly classed, with allowances of their own denomination.

With respect to the Scotch Pension List, little can be said of it, only the rapidity of its increase since the year 1761. The number of persons then receiving pensions were nineteen: in 1797, it had increased to 185, and it now amounts to 331, exclusive of twenty-four contingent pensions. The present pensions, however, are for the most part small, and about two thirds are granted to females.

As this work is intended to be an annual publication, the reader may be assured that no exertion will be wanting to render it complete, by giving every additional information respecting the finances of the country.

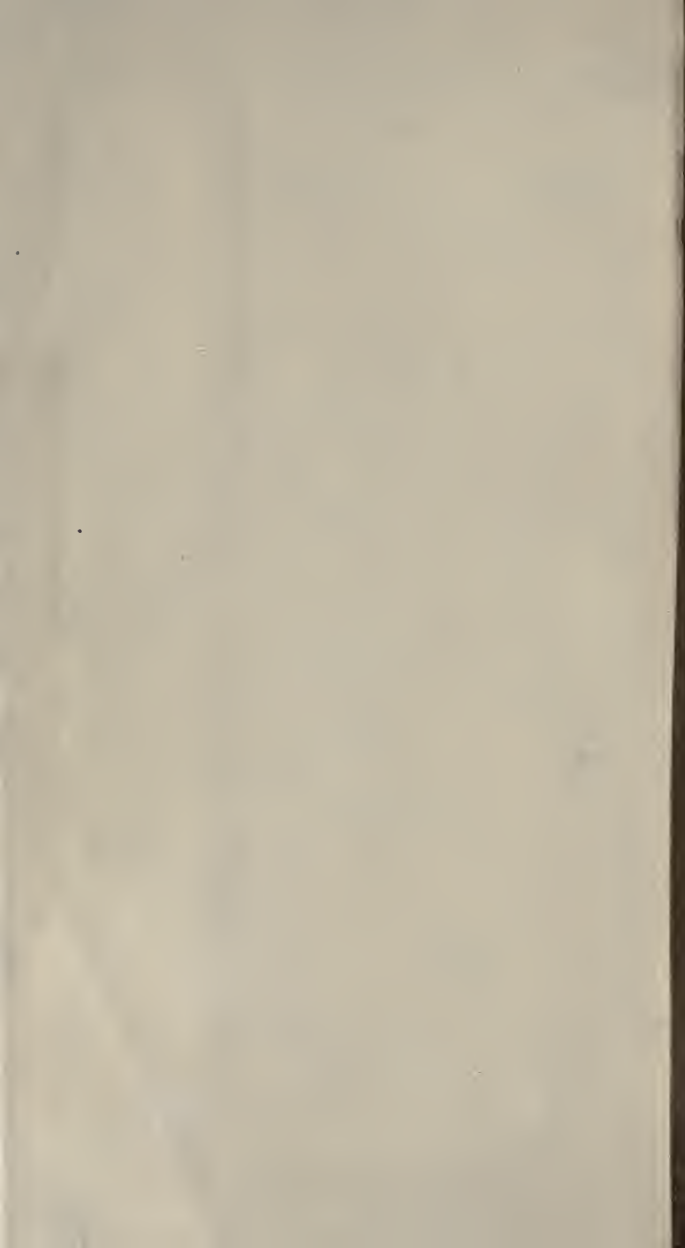
