"The woods are lovely, dark, and deep,
But I have promises to keep,
And miles to go before I sleep,
And miles to go before I sleep."

ROBERT FROST

After quoting these lines before a university audience, Mr. Frost was asked what he meant by saying he had "promises to keep." Mr. Frost replied he had promises to keep to his ancestors, to his contemporaries, to his successors, to himself, and to God. Those were the words of a poet, but they have been the life of Dr. Warren F. Jones . . .

Because he has kept his promises to his ancestors by accepting the challenge to continue to improve Union as an academic institution from a lone building one hundred and thirty-eight years ago, by exemplifying by his own character the personality of Union's whole administration, and by maintaining the fire of Union's spirit.

Because he has kept his promises to his contemporaries by completely devoting his life for eighteen years to Union University, by adding or rehabilitating nearly a dozen permanent buildings, by establishing the accreditation of this University, by expanding its curriculum, and by adding and strengthening new departments, but yet never losing sight of Union's goal: to create a center of intellectual activity with a spiritual end.

Because he has kept his promises to his successors by working for the future well-being of both the student and the college and by establishing a University with an undefeatable spirit of progress and pioneering that will remain a challenge for the people who will follow him.

Because he has kept his promises to himself, by even in the midst of his busy life, finding time to read and think, and grow, by never being impatient with people and never being too busy to stop and talk, to offer a kindly word, and by bringing himself to be respected as a worthwhile citizen, not only of the college but the community in which he lives.

Because he has kept his promises to God, by continuously trying to strengthen the magnitude and stability of his Christian character, by bringing to students a larger concept of the intellectual content of religion, and by serving his denomination through leading in all areas to help find the "truth."

And because of these and all other reasons which we are unable to express—because he did for this University in eighteen short years what many thought a century could not accomplish, we dedicate this, the 1963 *Lest We Forget* to

The President's Message

Campus life is composed of a multitude of experiences which become more and more meaningful to the student year upon year as he pursues his college career. "Your Campus," therefore, becomes an intriguing subject and it is eminently fitting that the staff of *Lest We Forget* focus the yearbook of 1963 upon that theme. Interestingly enough, this subject with its many connotations and relationships will become more deeply significant to you as the years go by when you, through your respective vocations, social relationships, and religious experiences, will be consciously and unconsciously integrating them into the warp and woof of your daily living. Thus you will look back on "Your Campus" in its fullest sense as having been one of the brightest spots in all the days of your years.

The Union University Ministerial Association was derived from the J. R. Graves Society which was founded in 1877. It is made up of some eighty ministerial students on Union University's campus.

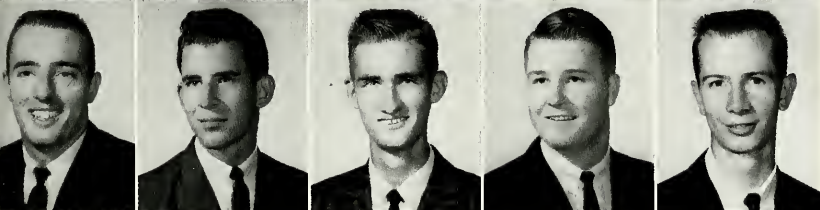

An annual banquet and fall social are also sponsored by the group.

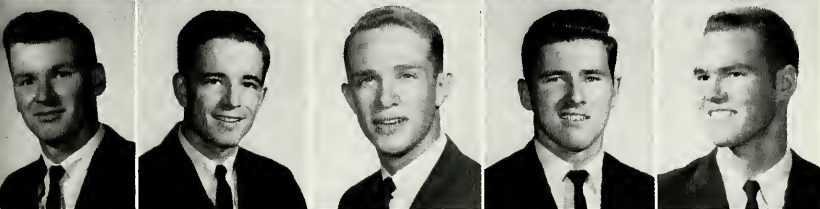

All of this is only a part of Zeta Tau Alpha sisterhood to be remembered in the years to come.

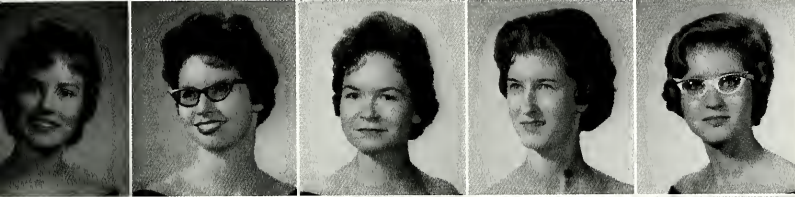

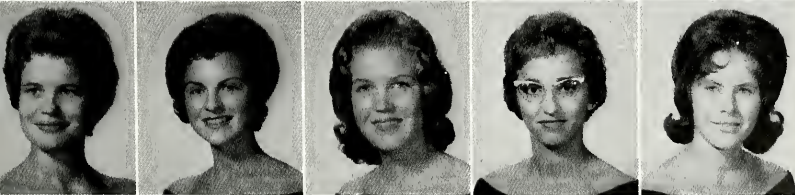

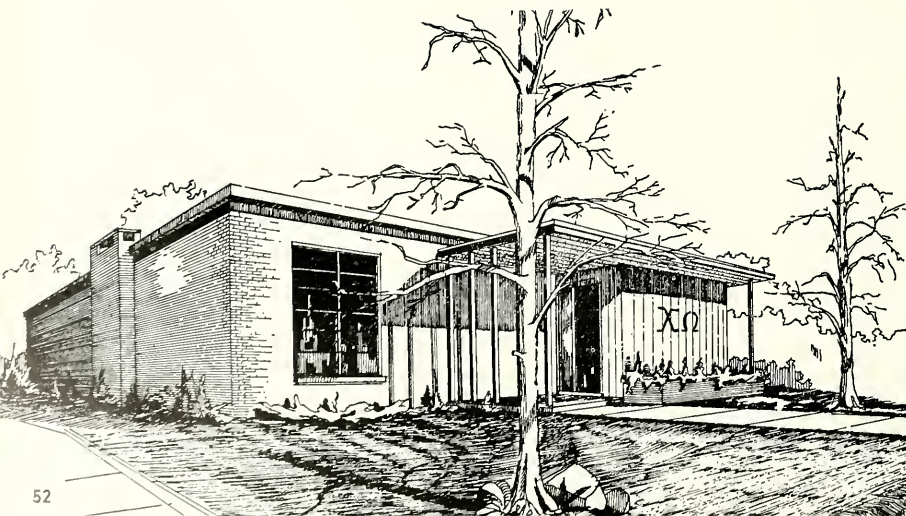

Lambda Chi Alpha

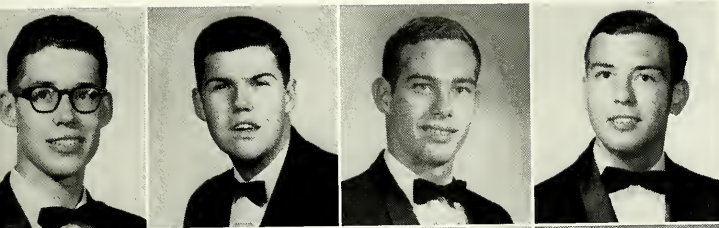

Yes, many wonderful memories come to mind as the year is reviewed—memories which will live on the minds and lives of the men who experienced them, and who were made better men because of them.

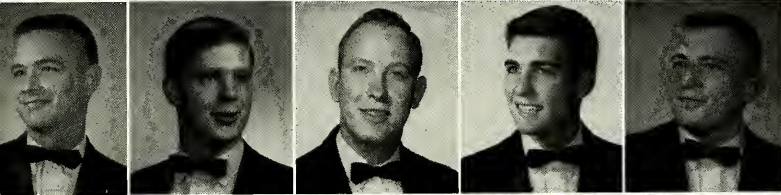




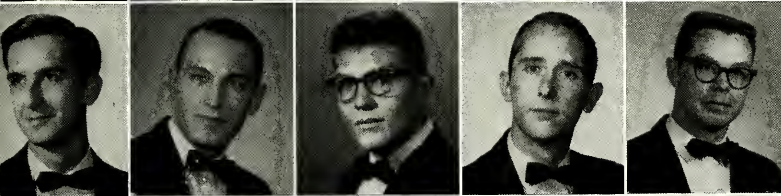
